Drought parching Midwest 'worst since '36'

Texas farmers burned the thorns off cactus to provide emergency cattle feed in a drought called the worst in a half-century, while growers in the Midwest bemoaned Thursday's scattered showers as little more than tantalizing.

"It's going to help a few farmers, but for most farmers it's too little too late," said Dan Bowman, a meteorologist for WeatherData in Wichita, after some Kansas communities got more than 2 inches of rain and Joplin, Mo., got 1½ inches Thursday morning.

Drought has plagued the nation's midsection, where it's as dry as it's been since the Dust Bowl, and the Southeast, forcing farmers to sell off cattle they can't afford to feed and to plow under shriveled crops. The June shortfall of rain follows a dry winter

House passes \$44 billion farm program, food aid bill

WASHINGTON — The House approved a \$44-billion farm program and food aid Thursday with fewer complaints this year from urban lawmakers that payment programs have gotten out of hand.

"Everyone's pointing to agriculture like we're the ones who are causing the deficit, like we're all causing all this international debt," Agriculture Committee Chairman E. "Kika" de la

Garza said.

He said agriculture represented only a small part of the estimated \$176 billion budget deficit for the fiscal year that starts Oct. 1.

Farm payment programs, which include price supports, income supports and conservation programs, peaked at \$26 billion in 1986. Those programs now are down to an estimated \$17 billion in fiscal 1988.

The drop in overall farm payments has muted somewhat the chorus of complaints that met

1986 legislation designed to alleviate painful problems in the farm economy.

But while farm payments have gone down as the farm economy has recovered, a number of critics of "excesses" in the farm programs say there still is much to complain about.

The House voted 343-54 to approve the money bill amid calls from farm-bloc lawmakers for aid to growers and livestock producers squeezed financially by a drought across broad areas of the country.

Thursday's showers, said Herb Kinneer of the Indiana Farm Bureau, were "just enough to settle the dust. But it's keeping the sun from shining and baking things. That's one consolation."

Another consolation was an additional \$10 million in emergency state loans for up to 45,000 Hoosier farmers.

Elsewhere, barges along the Mississippi were stranded at low-water bottlenecks, fires were on the rise in Mis-

souri and Georgia, and ginseng growers in Wisconsin were discovering that even they were suffering, although the exotic root thrives on arid soil.

In Washington, President Reagan appointed an interagency committee

to deal with the widespread drought.

Texas ranchers in the Lower Rio Grande Valley are using propane burners to remove thorns from prickly pear cactus to allow cattle to graze on the water-retaining plants, said Kraig Gallimore of the Texas Department of

Agriculture's farmer assistance program.

However, the drought has struck so deep in some areas that ranchers have stopped the practice because even cactus is shriveling, he said.

In North Dakota, which the U.S. Agriculture Department said was hit hardest, an agricultural economist predicted losses from three major crops could total \$2.7 billion this year.

"The estimate accounts for losses in federal deficiency payments and turnover of the money in the economy, but not for the losses we'll likely have on crops other than wheat, barley and oats," said Arlen Lehman, an economist with North Dakota State University.

Bill Lytle, a South Dakota climatologist, said the state normally gets 3-4 inches of rain in June and this year

Officials let data slip out

WASHINGTON — A massive amount of confidential information was improperly funneled from the Defense Department to McDonnell Douglas Corp., a search warrant issued in a nationwide investigation of possible Pentagon contracting corruption revealed Thursday.

The search warrant said the government is investigating the "bribery of public officials" in connection with a scheme in which defense contractors got inside information from former government officials whom they had hired as consultants.

Attorney General Edwin Meese III declined to give a direct answer when asked if bribes had been accepted in the Pentagon.

"That will all come out in the course of the indictments and ultimately in the trials," he told reporters.

The fraud and bribery investigation, involving the alleged sale of information to some of the nation's biggest defense contractors, drew attention all over Washington.

President Reagan "is very concerned" about the revelations of the past few days, spokesman Marilyn Fitzwater said after a meeting that included the president, Vice President George Bush, Meese and FBI Director William Sessions.

Reagan instructed them to move "as rapidly as possible" to get the facts.

"Meese" said "indictments" may be handed down in 30 to 90 days.

The search warrant that shed new light on the case was unsealed in federal court in St. Louis. It said Melvyn Paisley, who served from 1981 to April 1987 as assistant secretary of the Navy for research, engineering and systems, a key acquisitions post, provided "classified and/or confidential" documents to McDonnell Douglas.

Paisley was a key associate of former Navy Secretary John F. Lehman. Paisley now has numerous defense contractors as clients in his consulting business.

Verdict acquits Mecham

PHOENIX — Amid cheers and applause from supporters, former Arizona Gov. Evan Mecham and his brother, Willard, were found not guilty Thursday of fraud and perjury charges in connection with allegations that they had a huge campaign loan during Mecham's bid for governor.

The verdict was at least partial vindication for the feisty Mecham, who was impeached and removed from office on two unrelated counts on April 4.

Mecham, dressed in a tan suit, yellow shirt and burgundy tie, appeared flushed as he leaned across the rail separating him from the first row of spectators and kissed his tearful wife after the final verdict to the last count was read.

The 64-year-old conservative Republican then rushed over to shake hands with and hug the six men and two women of the Maricopa County Superior Court jury, who had deliberated for just over six and a half hours before reaching their verdict.

"I have said since October 1987 (when the loan was first reported in the Arizona Republic newspaper) that there was no law that we had broken that we knew of," Mecham told a throng of reporters. "We didn't intend to, we didn't mean to. It was a technicality and the jury agreed."

The jury acquitted the former governor of six felony counts, carrying prison terms of up to nearly 22 years and his brother, Willard, treasurer of his 1986 gubernatorial campaign, of three counts punishable by up to 9½ years in prison.

To celebrate the victory, Mecham said that he was going to "go home and finish my day's work." He said that he would hold a news conference today to discuss the verdict and his future. Mecham and his brother were accused of hiding a \$350,000 campaign loan in 1985 from Tempe lawyer and developer Barry Wolfson on personal and campaign disclosure statements.

In a letter to Wolfson confirming the loan agreement, Mecham wrote that, as agreed, he would keep the loan "confidential."

Senate passes welfare measure, 93-3

WASHINGTON — The Senate on Thursday passed a far-reaching welfare bill designed to help people break out of poverty through jobs, backing it almost unanimously after conceding to White House demands for more stringent work requirements.

The vote on the Family Security Act was 93-3.

The five-year, \$2.8 billion measure requires stepped-up child support collections and creation of a comprehensive education, training and job program. Long-term welfare recipients or those likely to become long-term, such

as teen-age mothers, would receive particular attention.

Sen. Daniel Patrick Moynihan, D-N.Y., who wrote the bill and fashioned a broad coalition of Senate supporters, said it would make fundamental improvements in a system that has not changed in 53 years.

Senate Finance Committee Chairman Lloyd Bentsen, D-Texas called the Moynihan bill "an opportunity ... to set an entirely new direction for the outdated and ineffective system we have today."

And Senate Minority Leader Bob Dole, R-Kan., described it as "the best hope" for lifting people out of poverty

and restoring their dignity.

Voting no on the bill were Sens. Jesse Helms, R-N.C., Gordon Humphrey, R-N.H., and William Proxmire, D-Wis. Not voting were Sens. Joseph R. Biden Jr., D-Del.; Dave Durenberger, R-Minn.; Chic Hecht, R-Nev., and James A. McClure, R-Idaho.

A bipartisan group of senators negotiated with White House officials throughout the week following word last Friday that Reagan would veto the Moynihan bill as it stood.

The main obstacle as the bill neared passage late Thursday was a White House demand that some welfare recipients be required to partici-

pate for 16 hours a week in "workfare," or community work projects, to work off their grants.

Governors of both parties opposed the provision to phase in mandatory workfare participation by one adult in each two-parent welfare household. But Dole offered it as a floor amendment and the Senate passed it by voice vote after refusing 54-41 to kill it.

Moynihan said the provision would affect only 6 percent to 7 percent of the welfare caseload.

Only nine states have statewide mandatory workfare programs.

Gem wilderness bill changes earn 'window dressing' label

TWIN FALLS — Conservation groups call the changes in the Idaho wilderness bill window dressing for a bill that Congress isn't buying.

But spokesmen for Gov. Cecil Andrus and Sen. James McClure say the changes in their bill announced Wednesday show responsiveness to concerns raised at the state hearings in March.

"It's not posturing for later down the road.

We went over the testimony, I read dozens, if not hundreds of letters. The changes do have an effect," says Andy Brunelle, Andrus' natural resources aide.

But Pat Ford, former Idaho Conservation League president, says that "it's a virtual certainty the bill won't pass." Ford says he welcomes some of the changes but they don't go far enough.

Rick Price, ICL board president, says McClure and Andrus didn't listen to what people had to say at the hearings. "They are screaming for more wilderness," he says.

A spokesman for the Magic Valley Trail-Machine Association, an off-road vehicle group cool to more wilderness, was contacted but did not return a phone call.

Conservationists aren't the only ones predicting a difficult sell for the bill.

The wilderness bill contains the same water rights language that is scuttling other public lands bills in Idaho at the City of Rocks near

Oakley and the Hagerman fossil beds.

Rep. Bruce Vento, chairman of the national parks and public lands subcommittee, opposes the water language in the Hagerman and City

of Rocks bills. His staff says this may indicate how he will react to the language in the Idaho wilderness bill, officially known as the Idaho Forest Management Act.

In the Senate, time for the sales pitch is running out and there is much to resolve. Senate hearings are scheduled next Tuesday but there is only a month to six weeks left before adjournment.

The Senate leadership is restricting floor debate on all but the major bills such as welfare reform.

After initially taking a stance of no major

changes in the bill, McClure and Andrus have backed-peddled a little.

Of the changes announced Wednesday, the major one of interest to southern Idaho is adding 50,000 acres in the White Clouds and Boulder Mountains near Ketchum.

This extends the wilderness to the south-east into the Boulders. The original proposal called for 100,200 acres in the White Clouds, much less than what the conservation groups wanted.

McClure's office seems to be adding new

 drus are serious about getting the bill through and point to their clout in Washington.
 "This isn't an introductory exercise in forest management debate," Palmer says.
 Congress is concerned about the water language because of the national precedent it could set for present and future public lands legislation.
 Other possible precedent setting parts of McClure-Andrus involve special management areas language.
 Special management doesn't restrict activities as much as in wilderness but includes some restrictions.
 In wilderness areas access is allowed only by foot. There are a few exceptions to this restriction.
 Another precedent setting issue is mandating the size of the timber cut such as the 283.5 million board feet annual cut McClure-Andrus calls for in the Bonner's Ferry District of the Idaho Panhandle Forests.
 Conservationists say this could mood appeals of timber sales.
 The broad issue in the wilderness debate is how 9 million acres of roadless lands in Idaho's 10 national forests should be managed.
 The state has 3.9 million acres of wilderness. McClure-Andrus initially

proposed 1.4 million acres of new wilderness plus 611,000 acres of special management areas. The total with the changes wasn't available Thursday.
 Conservation groups want 3.9 million acres of new wilderness.
 There are some details of how Wednesday's changes affect popular southern Idaho recreation areas:
 Besides changes in the Boulder-White Clouds, in the Pioneers McClure-Andrus is calling for different boundaries to accommodate off-road vehicle users and mining claims.
 The northern boundary of the wilderness proposal will be south of a trail that runs up Aspen Creek and down Little Kams Creek. That will exclude an important ORV trail from wilderness. Motorized equipment is generally banned from wilderness.
 The Scorpion Mountain area in the Pioneers will be moved one mile east to exclude a group of mining claims.
 In the Smoky Mountains, the area is still proposed for "special management" status. Special management restricts some activities but not as much as wilderness.
 McClure-Andrus now calls for allowing existing grazing and mineral discoveries but no new road construction or timber harvesting.

Judge calls for more information before staying Lafferty execution

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A federal judge on Thursday said he wanted more information before deciding whether to stay the scheduled June 24 execution of convicted killer and "self-proclaimed" prophet Ronald Lafferty.
 U.S. District Judge J. Thomas Greene ordered attorneys to file briefs by 5 p.m. today addressing the effectiveness of Lafferty's trial attorney and whether transcripts of some hearings had not been placed in the trial record.
 Greene scheduled a hearing for Monday at 11:30 a.m. to consider the defense motion for a stay of execution and an evidentiary hearing on the case.
 Lafferty was sentenced to die for killing his sister-in-law, Brenda Wright Lafferty, formerly of Kimberly, Idaho, and her 15-month-old daughter, Erica, on July 24, 1984.
 Following the state's automatic review of Lafferty's death sentence, the defendant said he planned no further appeals because he disliked prison life.
 However, as the execution date ap-

"I'm not aware of any case in federal court where a stay has not been granted when the case was in this posture," said Esplin.
 Esplin also said unless the stay was granted, there would not be time for a full hearing to consider new testimony in the case. Esplin said he wanted to question trial attorney Richard Johnson about difficulties he had in representing Lafferty, who wanted to represent himself.
 Esplin said he also planned to put on the stand an expert witness to testify as to Lafferty's competency to assist in his own defense.

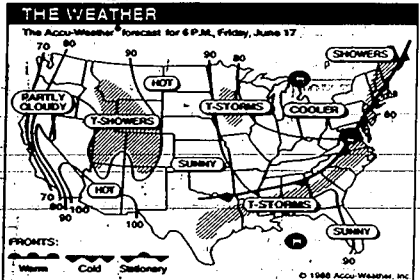

 has only received 0.3 inches so far for the month.
 "It's worse than '76. I think it goes back to '34," said Lytle, who blamed the drought on a large high-pressure ridge that is diverting low-pressure storm systems north into Canada. Because the system covers most of the nation's midsection, it's likely to persist for some time, he said.
 Firmin Rottenghau, 72, whose three farms near his land near Gilbertville in northeast Iowa, walked through his parched fields and proclaimed: "There ain't gonna be no

crop. It's the worst I've seen since '36."
 In southwest Iowa, cattle farmers continued selling off herds as pastures baked in the sun and feed prices skyrocketed.
 "The man in the cow business is having to sell his factory, is what it amounts to," said Gary Schwab, whose Lamoni Livestock Sales barn is reporting cattle sales 50 percent higher than a year ago. "I'd rather talk to a hotting than talk to a man about selling his herd."
 Two convenience store owners in Walford, Iowa, decided that if farmers

were going to take a loss, they would, too.
 The owners said their sign advertising "Ice cream cones, 25 cents, until it rains" will stay up until the area gets a drenching. Cones normally sell for 40 cents.
 Dropping water levels in the Mississippi and Ohio rivers made the waterways un-navigable Thursday, hurting the inland shipping industry.
 A seven-mile stretch of the Ohio River near Mount City, Ill., remained closed to all traffic while a dredge deepened a shallow channel.

Group questions Democratic platform

POCATELLO (AP) — Every two years, Idaho Democrats try to hold a quiet, unified state party convention to get everybody organized behind Democratic candidates.

Democrats being Democrats, every time, it appears that something happens to ruffle the calm.

The more than 380 Democrat delegates opened their 1988 state convention Thursday night with an executive committee meeting.

But Friday's meeting of the Platform Committee, chaired by Rep. Patricia McDermott, D-Pocatello, promised the first action.

The Democrats also pick a number of party leaders at this convention. Top Democrats were hoping on the eve of the gathering that regionalism in those races would not result in a divided party for the fall elections.

Anna Wilson of Wallace, party vice chairman who is acting state chairman, said as the convention started that delegates could expect a nonconventional party platform and a show of unity.

But Jim Kerns, AFL-CIO state president, wasn't having any of it. The labor organization wound up its 30th annual state convention here on Wednesday, and Kerns said he didn't like what appears to be a "generic" Democrat platform.

He also demanded a seat for labor on the Platform Committee.

"We want to be involved in development of the platform, plank by plank," said Kerns. "Labor has always been supportive of the Democrats and we want that to continue."

He said labor planned to work to change "this generic platform" and the process that produced it.

Former state chairman Mel Morgan resigned to take a state job. Former state chairman Lloyd Walker of Twin Falls, former Public Utilities Commission member Conley Ward of Boise and retired labor leader Wally Wright of Pocatello want the job. The new chairman will serve the remainder of Morgan's term, which expires in February.

Court rules law on hearings is justified

BOISE (AP) — An Idaho law designed to expedite the nearly endless hearings in death penalty cases is justified because it serves a legitimate purpose, the Idaho Supreme Court says.

The court on Thursday ruled 4-1 against a petition from convicted slayer Albert Ray Beam in a Canyon County case. Beam, whose conviction and death penalty already has been upheld by the Supreme Court, filed petitions for post-conviction relief and for reduction of sentence.

The Supreme Court upheld former

district judge Edward Lodge, now a federal bankruptcy judge, even conceding Lodge's refusal to obey a Supreme Court order to resentence a co-defendant to life imprisonment rather than death.

Justice Stephen Bistline was the lone dissenter.

Idaho in 1984 passed a law, designed to expedite appeals in death penalty cases, requiring defense attorneys to file within 42 days all claims for relief that are known or reasonably should be known.

Other state laws require such

claims to be filed within five years.

"This particular piece of legislation presents some good cause for concern," said Bistline. "For a man on death row the 42 days allotted is probably meaningless. For his attorney, however, I would venture that it is such a short time as to have a devastating effect upon an attorney's intentions of pursuing relief long before there has been sufficient time to appraise the situation."

Beam, 25, was one of two people convicted and sentenced to death for the 1983 rape-slaying of Mondri Lent-

en, 13, Nampa. But defendant Michael Shawn Scroggins, now 22, eventually was resented to life imprisonment. The Supreme Court held that Scroggins did not deserve the death penalty because of his relative youth, lack of mental capability and lack of previous criminal activity.

Lodge was ordered to resentence Scroggins to life, along with Karla Windsor, a defendant in a separate Canyon County murder case.

The judge refused, saying he was convinced the death penalty was justified, and disqualified himself.

Study shows roads aren't gems to tourists

BOISE (AP) — Idaho's scenic wonders and friendly people are major drawing cards for tourists, but its road system is not considered a gem, according to a year-long study by the University of Idaho.

The 103-page travel and recreation study profiles leisure travelers in Idaho and makes recommendations for improving the state's recreation and tourism offerings.

"The report will be useful to chambers of commerce, tourist business operators, recreation managers and anyone with an interest in tourism in Idaho," said Charles Harris, project director of the University of Idaho's depart-

ment of Wildlife Recreation Management.

The \$130,000 study was commissioned by the state departments of Commerce and Parks and Recreation.

The new study echoes findings of a preliminary report released last year. It concluded that Idaho's outdoors plays a dominant role in the state's tourism industry.

While university researchers determined the state's scenic attractions are the biggest part of Idaho's image and appeal as a tourist destination, they also learned the state's road system was found lacking.

Petition drive to repeal tax credit loses steam

LEWISTON (AP) — Three weeks before the deadline, the petition drive to place the repeal of Idaho's investment tax credit on the November ballot has less than one-third of the signatures required.

State Rep. Kenneth Robison, D-Boise, who helped launch the petition drive last spring, Wednesday estimated 12,000 signatures have been gathered. The movement needs 38,000 signatures from registered voters by July 8 to put the question on the ballot.

To reach that number, Robison says he will need another 35,000 signatures by June 30 to give county clerks enough time to verify the petitions.

Generally, 20 percent of petition signatures are disqualified because the individuals are not registered to vote.

"We're making appeals to people to get petitions in," Robison said. "There are still more petitions going out in the mail."

The problem, Robison said, is not reluctance on the part of voters to sign petitions. Rather, the challenge has been getting the petitions out to people.

"An initiative campaign is largely a volunteer effort," Robison said.

The investment tax credit was a major sticking point this year between Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus, who views its repeal as a source of \$15 million for education, and the Repub-

lican legislative majority which contends it serves to attract business to the state.

A number of organizations have come out in favor of the credit, including the Idaho Farm Bureau, Idaho Cattle Association and Potlatch Corp. Todd Maddock, Potlatch's public affairs director, was surprised at the low number of signatures gathered so far.

"I'd like to think it means the general public perceives the value of retaining the investment tax credit," Maddock said. "While we support funding for education, we didn't feel this was an appropriate way to do it."

Talks with Mountain Home board, teachers break down

MOUNTAIN HOME (AP) — No new negotiations have been set after talks broke down again between the Mountain Home School Board and teachers, who staged a 12-day strike last month.

"Emotionally, I feel we've lost ground because we expected progress," teacher negotiator Suzanne Rankin said. "But teachers are eternal optimists, and we'll see if we can come up with something."

The board had proposed bringing in a federal mediator to help solve the dispute on the condition that teachers would accept a procedural agreement outlining the issues subject to negotiating.

But Ms. Rankin said that proposed agreement was virtually identical to the one the teachers' association rejected May 24, the day they agreed to return to work despite the continued contract impasse.

The teachers are demanding a greater voice in non-economic policies

of the district's operations, but school board members have resisted, maintaining that would invade their authority to run the district.

"In my mind, I feel like we're back where we were three months ago," board member David Humphreys said.

Humphreys contended the negotiations regressed because teachers withdrew a "no-strike clause" from the proposed procedural agreement.

Author L'Amour: American original

He described himself as a sort of historian, but whether the Old West of Louis L'Amour's more than 100 novels and short stories ever existed almost doesn't matter.

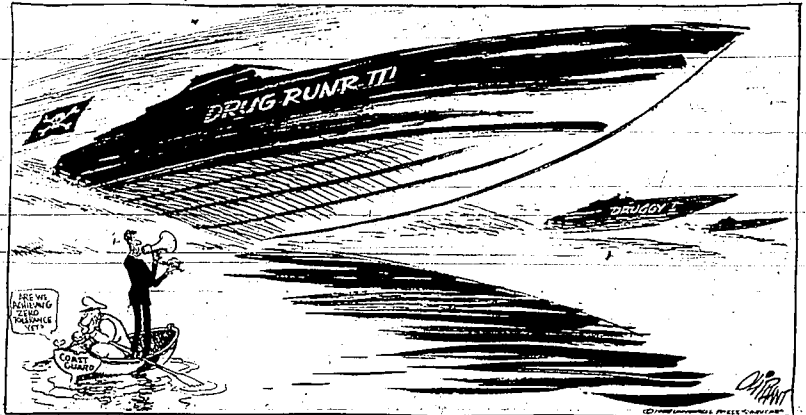
What matters is that L'Amour, who died this past week at 80, was a master storyteller in a great tradition whose vivid tales of frontier life magically turned history into legend.

His was a landscape of outsized contrasts, of characters whose virtues and vices assumed epic proportions. He wrote of cowpokes and drifters, saloon girls and gamblers, farmers, ranchers, sheriffs, gunfighters and outlaws. For L'Amour the West was a great morality play in which good and evil, law and lawlessness clashed in mortal combat. That is the essence of the Western.

The man who penned these tales might himself have lived them. He was a longshoreman, lumberjack, elephant handler, fruit picker and professional prize fighter before taking up writing in midlife. But after his first novel, "Hondo," was published in 1953 (and later made into a movie starring John Wayne) he devoted the rest of his life to it with single-minded devotion. Nor was he bothered by the critics' neglect. His books were meticulously researched and marvelously detailed. Almost 200 million copies of them are now in print.

It may well be that long after today's literary fads and fashions are forgotten, L'Amour will be remembered as the original master of the authentic Western.

Now it's abstinence or judgment for all

If you believe the cries from various private, state, and federal agencies, America has become a nation of addicts.

According to the Phil Donahue Show, we have a high proportion of alcoholics, workaholics, foodaholics, drug addicts, cigarette addicts, TV addicts, and yes, even sex addicts.

These agencies can quote inflated figures and point to graphs that purport to prove that the present alarming number of addicts in any given area is always increasing. Their combined figures show that America is suffering from a runaway epidemic of addiction.

In our deperate search for America's Narrowest Golden Mean of human behavior, we have indicted at least half the population. We are creating a guilt-ridden nation of outcasts and outlaws.

And America must have Zero Tolerance for addiction, says our president.

At one level, the underlying message is the same as any college kid's letter home: "Send money - yesterday." Social, health, and law enforcement agencies worry state legislatures and the federal government for more and ever more funds to combat addiction. The larger the magnitude of the perceived problem, the greater the funds requested; consequently, staff sizes increase and even more money is needed. "Crisis" is the highest magnitude a problem can have in government circles. Most of these "addictions" have reached crisis proportion, according to agencies' claims.

In the true American entrepreneurial spirit, a wide gamut of "helpful" merchandise and businesses has been created to meet the problems of addiction: weight-right foods, calorie-less sodas, diet centers and spas, non-alcoholic beers and wines, non-tobacco cigarettes, fat clinics; withdrawal drugs, stress clinics, home exercise units, and 101 varieties of jogging and walking shoes. You get the picture: There's money in addiction. It's a billion dollar business. The more addictions

that society defines, the more money can be pocketed from people's fear and peer pressure. Money fuels the engine that drives this social movement.

At a more serious level, our tolerance for the wide range of human behavior has constricted severely. It's zeroed down: oval to micro-dot. We've become a nation of anal retentive, vitamin popping, health fascists eager to cast the weak and overweight into clinics and ghettos.

It is no longer fashionable to show your prejudice about racial or ethnic minorities; but not to worry, many Americans have replaced racial prejudice with behavior prejudice.

Neighbors shake their heads and whisper to one another, "You know Beverly, don't you? I know you wouldn't think so, but she smokes. She's a nicotine addict! I stopped inviting her to my house."

"Well, I'm not surprised; her husband is a couch potato and fat, too. Tsk, tsk."

Pressure from neighbors and community has forced some people to stand up and admit, shamefully, to others, "I am a sex addict. Yes, forgive me, I have even searched for sexually arousing material in books and magazines. I confess that I crave sex too much. I am trying to limit the number of times I have sex. I'm down to twice a month. I'll strive to do less. I promise. I realize that sexual addiction is a terrible waste of a life."

I'm not surprised that such people are shunned. The unspoken prayer of advocates of the Narrowest Golden Mean can be paraphrased: If only there were a sufficient number of large islands, so that we could create Adolph Hitler Archipelagos and send all those JUNKIES to live out the rest of their short, miserable lives with their own kind,

like lepers, like AIDS carriers, like meat eaters - so help them, King Normality.

It has become fashionable to be intolerant of the behavior of others - from religious to sexual preferences, from food to ideas ingested, from hobbies to habits. We're seeing the return of Puritanism, with a vengeance. This isn't "moderation in all things," but abstinence or judgment for all.

Advocates of the Narrowest Golden Mean mean well. Undoubtedly, they have our best interests in mind. They will drag us into normal, healthy ways, kicking and screaming about our rights. "Not give us your urine sample?" They smile at our innocence, our naivete. "Rights? What good are rights when you're dying of bad living habits?" They do hate to proscribe our behavior, but it's for our own good. They know that. It's for their own good, too. Especially the power. They know that, too.

Power is the engine that drives this social movement - power to control other people's lives. Narrowest Golden Meaners want to lead us back to Paradise; they pretend that we didn't really want to take a bite of the apple. They insist that we don't really desire or deserve the freedom of choice. If we live right, we will live forever, says the dogma.

NG Meaners are the youth cult, now middle aged - fighting potbellies, sagging chins and other parts of their anatomies - still believing in the immortality of youth. NG Meaners cannot accept aging or dying. So how can they accept that all of us feed the seeds of our deaths, just as we water the new growth in our lives. As essence that's what it means to be human.

We owe each other compassion, yes - but certainly more tolerance, not less.

Which form is best for us?

When we pledge allegiance to the flag, "and to the Republic for which it stands." Yet most people and current history textbooks believe we are a democracy. Which are we and which of these two forms of government is best?

Upon these questions hinges the destiny of our civilization, for the difference between the two is like the difference between good and evil.

By definition, a democracy is a form of government in which the people elect representatives (pure or direct democracy) or indirectly (indirect democracy) through elected representatives. It is characterized by the "rule of men" since the powers of government are limited only the consciences of the numerical majority. There are no safeguards for the rights of the individual in a democracy, and in actual practice this form of government functions as a mobocratic tyranny (pure democracy) or as an elective dictatorship (indirect democracy).
The U.S. Army Training Manual of 1928

characterized democracy as follows: "Attitude toward property is communistic - negating property rights. Attitude toward law is that the will of the majority shall regulate, whether it be based upon deliberation or governed by passion, prejudice, and impulse, without restraint or regard to consequences. Results in demagogism, license, agitation, discontent, anarchy."

Fortunately for the liberties of the American people, our Founding Fathers understood the true nature of democracy and they repeatedly and emphatically insisted that they had established a republic.

As in the case of an indirect Democracy, within a Republic the people elect representatives to enact, enforce, and interpret the statutory laws that govern society. Also like a Democracy, a Republic is founded upon the concept of majority rule. The crucial difference, however, is that within a Republic the majority may rule only in those areas where the Constitution authorizes them to rule. Should the majority attempt to govern in areas beyond the limits established by the Constitution, its acts will be null, void, and of no force.

It is this crucial concept of limited government that sets a Republic apart from a Democracy, and makes one form of government good and the other evil. And since the people within a republic establish and define the limits of the government through a constitution, which is set over the government, the people, not the government, are supreme and sovereign. As long as the government is confined to constitutional limits, the people within a republic remain the masters in the political system.

'Concerned' president wants speedy work on Pentagon probe

WASHINGTON (AP) - Taking a rare active role in an ongoing federal investigation, President Reagan told top law enforcement officials Thursday to move "as rapidly as possible" to get the facts in a burgeoning Pentagon fraud investigation.

Reagan, who told Congress two years ago that he did not want lawmakers "scrutinizing every paper-clip, bolt and

bullet" in the defense budget, was described by spokesman Marlin Fitzwater as "very concerned" about allegations of bribe-paying and kickbacks.

"I think we're all aware of the wide scope of this investigation," Fitzwater said, "and it certainly poses an internal security problem and an abuse problem of dimensions that have to be dealt with forthrightly."

"I'm just not at liberty to expand on any of the details," he said when asked to elaborate.

Federal investigators armed with evidence from two years' worth of wiretaps and this week's coast-to-coast raids are preparing to approach witnesses who now may be forced to cooperate in the probe.

The investigation has turned up "ram-

panant bribery in the government" and includes allegations of cash payments, purchase of cars and payments of bills for government employees, Sen. John Warner of Virginia, the ranking Republican member of the Armed Services Committee, said Wednesday.

Fitzwater said Reagan believes this is a matter "that deserves his attention, and that everyone involved should know

of his feelings—the intensity which he feels about dealing with any kinds of crimes that have been committed here."

Government sources familiar with the probe said searches of offices of 15 defense contractors on Tuesday stemmed from wiretaps on the offices of two top Pentagon officials. The bugs have been in place for much of the two-year investigation.

Ferraro's son draws 4 months in jail

RUTLAND, Vt. (AP) - The son of former vice presidential candidate Geraldine Ferraro was sentenced Thursday to four months in jail for selling \$25 worth of cocaine to an undercover police officer.

John Zaccaro Jr., 24, also was ordered to pay a \$1,500 fine and perform 300 hours of community service.

"We are obviously very disappointed by the harshness of the sentence," Ferraro said, noting that other defendants in Vermont drug cases have received lighter penalties. She said the conviction would be

appealed. During his sentencing hearing, Zaccaro told Vermont District Judge Francis McCaffrey in a shaky voice that he has sworn off drugs.

Zaccaro's attorney, Charles Tutzlaff, asked McCaffrey to accept a probation officer's recommendation of a suspended sentence, probation and community service.

But McCaffrey told Zaccaro, "I can't in good conscience sentence you without any time to serve." Zaccaro faced a maximum of five years in prison and a \$10,000 fine.

Maseng returns to post in White House

WASHINGTON (AP) - Mari Maseng, who left the White House last year to be press secretary to Sen. Bob Dole's presidential campaign, will return to work for President Reagan as chief of communications and planning, succeeding Thomas C. Griscom, it was announced Thursday.

Griscom submitted his resignation, effective June 30. He did not disclose what he planned to do next, though he had said for months that he planned to leave the White House after the Moscow summit.

Griscom joined the White House in February 1987 when former Sen. Howard Baker, his long-time associate, took over as chief of staff.

U.S. losing development leadership

WASHINGTON (AP) - The head of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration warned Thursday that the United States is losing its position as leader of the world's industrial nations because it is spending less now on technical research and development.

James Fletcher, in a speech prepared for the National Conference on Strategic Management of Research and Development, said the nation is "just now beginning to recognize a long-term drought in the national technical capability."

For instance, he said, the American machine tool industry "has been swamped" by Japan, West Germany and Italy and the U.S. market share of civil aircraft has dropped to 65 percent "and promises to continue its decline."

"We have focused on marketing old products in newer packages at the expense of investments in innovation and evolutionary improvements," the NASA administrator said.

Fletcher said the federal investment in aeronautics and space research and development has declined, causing NASA to be less bold in its technological innovation and exploration of the unknown.

"This is the wrong direction for leadership," he said. "This is living off the advances of the past in NASA's case, of the Apollo era."

No bids for bases

WASHINGTON (AP) - Secretary of State George P. Shultz said Thursday the United States would not get dragged into "bidding wars" for the right to locate American military bases in the Philippines or anywhere else in the world.

Asked whether the United States should get into "bidding wars" for such bases, Shultz told the Senate Appropriations subcommittee on foreign operations that "the concept of rent for bases we have to reject."

Radical mobs in Korea battle police

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — Radical mobs shouting about government corruption attacked riot squads Thursday, and police said they arrested six students who tried to throw firebombs at the home of former President Chun Doo-hwan.

Foreign Studies in eastern Seoul when police fired volleys of tear gas to keep 1,000 radicals from five nearby schools from marching off the campus.

Students hurled firebombs and rocks for two hours, screaming "Punish criminals!" "Yankee go home!" and other demands for withdrawal of the 42,900 U.S. troops stationed in South Korea under a mutual defense pact.

Anti-Americanism has become a strong element in recent protests by the radical students, who contend the United States enforces partition of the Korean peninsula and treats the South as a colony.

Birth control pills linked to AIDS risk in African women

STOCKHOLM, Sweden (AP) — Prostitutes in Africa who use birth control pills are two to three times as likely as other prostitutes to become infected with AIDS, researchers said Thursday.

They said it is not known why birth control pills should increase a woman's risk of getting AIDS, but the pills can produce a condition that might serve as an entry point for the virus into the bloodstream.

Beirut clash claims 12 lives

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Mortars and rockets whizzed through two refugee camps in Beirut on Thursday, leaving 12 people dead and 29 injured as rival Palestinian groups fought for control of the areas.

In southeast Lebanon, Israeli soldiers killed two Lebanese guerrillas in an ambush on the western slopes of Mount Hermon, police said.

Troops round up Arabs after Israeli shooting

NABLUS, Occupied West Bank (AP) — An assailant shot and wounded an Israeli soldier here Thursday, and troops rounded up dozens of Arabs for questioning. One witness said suspects were forced to stand on one foot under the hot sun.

The army clamped a curfew on Nablus, the West Bank's largest city. It was the second shooting of an Israeli soldier since the Arab uprising against Israel's occupation of the West Bank and Gaza Strip began Dec. 8.

Lapse in security blamed for death of British soldiers

LISBURN, Northern Ireland (AP) — Officials admitted Thursday that a security lapse allowed an IRA guerrilla squad to kill six British soldiers by attaching a bomb to their van while they ran in a charity race.

"unceasing war" against British forces in the province. A half-marathon for charity had just ended at the close of a warm, sunny day in this garrison town, headquarters for the British army in Northern Ireland. The exploding bomb turned the van into a fireball and scattered torn, burning bodies onto the street.

The army said the reserve soldier was traveling in his own car when he was hit by a bullet. A spokesman declined to say if the soldier was in uniform.

Senators attack proposal to sell planes to Kuwait

WASHINGTON (AP) - Several senators Thursday attacked a proposed \$1.9-billion U.S. weapons sale to Kuwait that includes advanced fighter planes and an array of bombs and air-to-ground missiles.

It is "inconceivable" that the administration would contemplate such a large sale to a country which is so small and has been on less than friendly terms with the United States until recently, Sen. Dennis DeConcini, D-Ariz., told Secretary of State George P. Shultz at a Senate hearing.

DeConcini also said he feared that the sale would make some of

the most advanced weapons in the U.S. arsenal accessible to the Soviet Union.

Sen. Frank Lautenberg, D-N.J., said he was concerned that the F-18 fighter-bomber, the most sophisticated plane of its type in the U.S. arsenal, could be outfitted with larger fuel tanks that could render it capable of attacking Israel.

Concern also was expressed by Sens. Bob Kasten, R-Wis., and Arlen Specter, R-Pa., at the hearing of the Appropriations subcommittee on foreign operations.

Industry at highest level of operation since 1980

WASHINGTON (AP) - American industry operated at the highest level in more than eight years in May, the government said Thursday, but overall capacity use has not yet reached a level economists say would clearly fuel inflation.

The Federal Reserve Board said U.S. factories, mines and utilities operated at 82.9 percent of capacity in May, a 0.2 percentage point increase over April.

It was the sixth increase in eight months and the highest operating level since March 1980 when the rate hit 83.7 percent. Operating rates rose by 0.3 percentage points

in April, after dropping 0.1 percent in February and remaining unchanged in March.

Analysts had expected the modest rise in overall operating rates in May after the Federal Reserve reported Wednesday that production levels among U.S. industries had increased 0.4 percent.

Some economists are expressing concern that the upward creep will push prices higher as manufacturers have difficulty producing enough to meet demand. But others say the May report is good news because operating rates cooled in the hottest industries.

German group accesses U.S. defense computers

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) - Members of a West German computer club improperly gained access to a U.S. defense network computer at NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory and an Navy facility last month, a lab spokesman said today.

One thing I can tell you with absolute certainty is they didn't get into my classified data banks (at JPL) nor did they get into any sensitive information in the lab," said George Alexander, chief spokesman for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration

facility.

However, Alexander wasn't sure if other parts of the computer network, operated by the Defense Advanced Research Projects Agency, contained classified information.

He said members of the Computer Kaos Club in Hamburg gained access on May 17 to a Digital Equipment Corp. computer at the lab that is part of the network. He wasn't sure how they were tracked down or if any action was being taken against club members.

Treasure draws \$2.89 million

NEW YORK (AP) - Sunken treasure from two 17th-century Spanish galleons fetched \$2.89 million at a two-day auction, with silver bars selling for about twice their value at previous metal.

The Nuestra Señora de Atocha and its sister ship, the Santa Margarita went down off the Florida Keys in a 1622 hurricane, taking to the bottom booty collected from Spain's New World colonies. Treasure hunter Mel Fisher and his team of divers located and salvaged the wrecks of the two ships.

Besides silver coins and bullion bars weighing up to 90 pounds, Western's auctioneer, Christie's, also featured a silver-gilt rosewater dish that failed to sell during the

main session Tuesday night.

The Spanish Ministry of Culture claimed the dish for \$49,500.

Wednesday's session drew about 100 numismatic buffs.

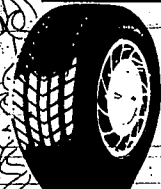

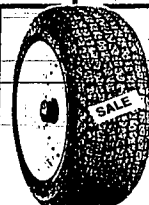

Courtroom building will receive detector

TWIN FALLS - A committee bent on getting the lead out of the Theron Ward Judicial Building opted Thursday to buy a metal detector to screen for guns.

District Judge Daniel Hurlbutt, head of the court-security committee, said officials hope to have the system operational within the next six weeks. A new information and security desk will supplement the walk-through detector, estimated to cost roughly \$3,500.

"I think we've come up with a system that's very reasonable and effective in terms of what we're trying to do," Hurlbutt said.

The decision followed in the

wake of a judicial order issued last week that prohibited police officers from carrying guns in the courtroom. Law enforcement officials opposed the order, claiming it would disarm them instead of criminals.

But the newest developments apparently turned "any disgruntlement into water under the bridge."

"I'm just satisfied with the way things turned out," said Tim Qualls, chief of the Twin Falls Department of Public Safety.

A host of law enforcement officials attended the afternoon meeting, including representatives from Buhl, Filer, Hansen and Kimberly.

"They're trying to work the wrinkles out and we're working with

Flies pester Amalgamated neighbors

TWIN FALLS - Amalgamated Sugar Co. is spraying and harrowing the breeding grounds of a hoard of flies that have been tormenting the plant's neighbors.

But homeowners say the work comes about a month late.

"They're shutting the gate after the horses are already out," said Lorraine Burton, who lives across the field from the sugar beet processing plant.

Corney Lanting, Amalgamated factory service manager, said the refuge flies breed in crevices created at the bottom of the plant's 8-acre lime settling pond when it dries up.

Lanting said the insects appeared for the first time a few years ago and have been pestering neighbors during the summer.

"It's terrible," Burton said. "They get in my ice, they're on my bread and cereal, they're all

over the windows and rug. I had to throw out a salad."

She said the flies have kept her up at night and forced her to close her windows during the afternoon because the tiny black flies get through screens.

"We have to raise hell with them for weeks in order to get anything done," Burton said.

(Bill Stewart, Amalgamated assistant plant superintendent) seems like a nice person but that doesn't get the job done."

She said something needs to be done every year before conditions get so miserable that residents are forced to complain.

Burton said she has been considering a lawsuit to resolve the problem.

Mike McMasters, source control field officer for the state Division of Environmental Quality, said although the flies are a nuisance, they have not been identified as a health hazard.

However, he said residents could file a civil complaint and attempt to have the courts im-

pose sanctions against the company.

"They need to get them under control," McMasters said. "If you don't manage them, you're going to have tremendous amounts of them reproducing."

He said the measures the plant has taken have not been adequate because the flies are back this year in the same numbers as last year.

McMasters said the health department also received a number of complaints last year about the flies.

"We've aired been trying to fight them," Lanting said.

He said spraying the area from airplanes has not been completely effective because the insecticide does not penetrate crevices that are up to two feet deep where the flies breed.

Lanting said even when the poison reaches the insects in the cracks, it doesn't kill the eggs.

Program honors volunteer seniors

TWIN FALLS - Today's senior volunteers are pioneers showing the nation how to respond to the growing greying of America.

That was the message Thursday of John B. Keller, Seattle, Region X director of Action.

He told about 325 area volunteers they are providing a new role for retirees, who "have to retire to something - not from something."

He was principal speaker at the Action Recognition Jamboree at CSI Thursday afternoon honoring volunteers in the Retired Grandparent and Retired Senior Volunteer Programs throughout the Magic Valley. Action is a separate federal agency coordinating these two programs nationwide, as well as several volunteer programs for younger people, including VISTA, Keller said.

Following brief remarks by College of Southern Idaho President Gerald Meyerhoefler and Idaho Action Director Will Overgaard, of Boise, volunteers were entertained on the CSI portico by clown, juggler, tumbler and mime acts, as well as the Shihm Sham Tappers, The Cloggers and a German band.

Keller, who has been with Action since 1976, said this agency "was the first to recognize the retired population as a resource rather than presenting problems to be

solved."

Other senior programs which operate under the Office on Aging deal with needs of the elderly such as nutrition.

He listed six trends "which will have an effect on all of us" and for which he sees no foreseeable change.

The first is the "dramatic" aging of the U.S. population, a combination of the extension of life expectancy and today's lower birthrate, the speaker said.

The population of persons 65 years and over has doubled since 1950 and it is predicted that within 25 years one-quarter of the U.S. population will be in that age bracket.

Not only are the elderly living longer, but they are healthier and therefore more active and need to be involved in meaningful activity, the speaker stressed.

A third trend, which Keller said has wide implications, is that people are retiring at an earlier age.

In 1960 he said 60 percent of the work force was 65 or over, but by 1976 that percentage had shrunk to half that figure - or 25 percent.

In 1984, only 16 percent of the work force was in that age group.

Even the percentage of men aged 55 to 64 in the work force has shrunk from 88 percent in 1960 to 84 percent in 1984, the official said.

The elderly are better off financially, Keller

said, although "those who are not may find it hard to believe."

But fact is, he said, to be the second richest group in the country, behind the 65 to 84 age group, Keller said.

He credits this to a combination of pensions, SSI (supplemental security income), tax breaks, Social Security and private savings.

Another trend is that the ratio of active workers to retirees is dropping at a substantial rate. In 1940 there were nine workers for each retiree, but by 1978 the number had dropped to six.

"By the year 2020 it is predicted there will be only three workers for each retiree," Keller said.

"The last trend Keller mentioned is the increasing number of women in the work force, which began with World War II and is expected to continue. More than half the mothers of children under age 1 are now working, he said.

This means many of the younger women who used to do community volunteer work no longer do so.

All these factors combine to make the services of retired people increasingly important, Keller said.

He termed the volunteer work done by 785 area persons through the RSVP as "worth a half million dollars" if the 122,000 hours re-

Witnesses escape grand theft charges

TWIN FALLS - Prosecutors have dropped criminal charges against two key witnesses in the Jesse Ray Jagers murder trial, but at least for now the two remain in jail on \$100,000 witness bonds.

Prosecutors dropped grand theft charges against Williams, Jagers' brother-in-law, and James Langham Thursday. They plan to interview the two at 9 a.m. today.

Today's interview will be in preparation for a deposition next week. Depositions are used to lay out in testimony of witnesses and are uncommon in criminal trials, said Twin Falls County Prosecutor K. Ellen Baxter.

Keeping witnesses in custody on bond is also "very unusual," Baxter said.

The last time Twin Falls prosecutors took that action was a 1986 murder trial against Robert Wade Sanders, Baxter said.

The 18-year-old Jagers is charged with the first-degree murder of Virginia Westergren. He also faces second-degree burglary and grand theft charges.

The preliminary hearing, where prosecutors will try to prove Jagers more likely than not committed the crime, is scheduled for July 8.

If the magistrate judge presiding over the preliminary hearing agrees with prosecutors, Jagers will face trial in district court. At trial, the state must prove the case beyond a reasonable doubt.

Baxter said she couldn't comment on why her office dropped charges against Langham and Williams without violating ethical codes. "The formal motion in court files says the charges were dropped 'in the interest of justice.'"

Langham, 31, and Williams, 34, were charged with grand theft after Las Vegas police arrested them June 17. They were driving Westergren's gray Buick, which police suspect was stolen by Westergren's killer.

The two waived extradition earlier this week and were transported to Twin Falls Wednesday night.

Both men said they bought the car from Jagers, according to police. The pair also turned over what they called a bill of sale from Jagers.

Westergren, 79, was stabbed to death in her Buchanan Street home May 13. Her husband was visiting relatives in Portland at the time.

Jagers had done yard work for the Westergrens. The last time he worked for the Westergrens was on May 9.

Treasurer: County let worker off early

TWIN FALLS - The Twin Falls County treasurer says commissioners ordered her to write off delinquent property taxes for a volunteer worker before she had completed her work.

However, Commissioner Jim Fraley said volunteer worker Sheri Mills is an outstanding person who worked off her debt even though the county could have cancelled it for nothing.

Mills entered into an agreement with the county commissioners in January to do part-time work in the county welfare office. In exchange, the county agreed to dismiss her taxes that have been delinquent since 1984 at a rate of \$5 per hour.

However, Mills worked 232 hours, an amount that would cover \$1,160 in taxes, which is approximately \$800 short of what she owed, including penalties and interest.

Treasurer Bonnie Bruning said Mills sent her a note listing her 288 hours worked as being 288

hours.

The note stated that there are 18 weeks from Jan. 17 to May 6, when there are only 17. But paperwork filed by Mills with the commissioners showed that she did not always work 16 hours a week, the note to the treasurer was signed by Judy Felton said.

Felton said Mills actually began working on Jan. 18 and was hired full time by the county on May 1.

Felton said the commission decided to delete the penalty and interest on the debt when Mills completed a computer class at the College of Southern Idaho that included credit for the work she was doing at the county.

"We had determined that she had made a good faith effort to pay the taxes back and made an offer to her to work full time," Felton said. "She very likely fell short of her total hours but at that point we felt it was better to get her off the welfare rolls at \$500 a month than worry about the last amount that was due."

Felton said Mills, who is a divorced mother of three, has been

Buhl council votes to vacate alley in attempt to end disparity

BUHL - The Buhl City Council Monday voted to vacate an alley, a decision it hopes will be first step to resolve a decades-old discrepancy between physical and legal boundaries on one of the town's blocks.

But a property owner involved has indicated she won't participate in the action, prompting suggestions that the matter will have to be resolved in court.

The issue involves a five-foot rectangular piece of property that runs perpendicular to an alley so that only the lot at the western edge of the property borders the alley. The alley is on Sixth Street South, next to Farmer's National Bank. The problem is the legal boundaries separating the five lots are about four feet off of the actual

physical boundaries, which are fences and street walls.

The council action Monday, suggested by Buhl realtor Jim Barker, will make available a piece of property extending about four feet into the alley so that the legal boundaries can be moved over to conform with the current physical boundaries.

The city would maintain an easement in the middle of what had been the alley property for utility maintenance. The adjustment would be strictly a paper move and would not involve moving physical boundaries.

But an agreement is required among the five property owners and Virginia Smith, who owns the lot adjacent to the alley, has said she won't sign. She has said signing is not in her best interest.

Barker said the matter will likely have

to be resolved in court.

Also at the meeting, Public Works Director Gary Winn said the city pool will open by tomorrow "if weather permits..." A lifeguard has been hired, the pool has been painted and the health department has been scheduled to inspect the pool today, if it is filled then, Winn said. The council agreed to maintain the fees that were charged last season.

Winn also told the council about Henry Fawcett, a retiring city employee of 40 years who dug water and sewer lines by hand in the early days and most recently was maintaining city equipment. Fawcett, a Buhl native, was honored two weeks ago at a celebration.

City Attorney Bill Nungesser read city ordinance No. 763, which states that any new water meter hookups for residential

lines will require a fee of \$670, more than double the old \$250 fee. The increase is needed to cover costs, which have increased considerably since the fee structure was set about 10 years ago.

Responding to a question, the council decided that the new ordinance would not necessarily affect changes in meters currently in place. Costs would have to be determined on an individual basis, the council said.

In other actions:

- An elevator has been ordered for the Senior Citizens Center and a recreation room is complete, according to a J.U.B. Engineering Report on the project.
- The Recreational District Committee will have petitions out in two weeks, and committee members will meet with Jerome officials to confer on matters pertaining to

recreational districts.

- License applications for fireworks stands at several Buhl business locations were approved.
- The Buhl Rodeo Association received permission to sell tickets door to door, from June 13 to July 2, for the association's annual Fourth of July rodeo on July 3 and 4.
- The Boy Scouts and 4-H groups will sell the tickets and the usual fees will be waived.
- The council granted a request by the Buhl Education and Recreation Association to conduct a Fourth of July Fun Run to begin at 8 a.m.
- The council was notified by the State Department of Agriculture that it will place non-toxic Gypsy Moth traps in the area. The traps will remain in place until sometime in August.

on welfare.

"I think she has a lot of spunk," Felton said, adding that Mills was also taking classes at CSI.

"This is a Cinderella story of success where someone picked themselves up by the bootstraps," she said.

Bruning also said the action was taken after the state took action after a foreclosure on the property. The property reverted to local real estate agent Lynn Rasmussen.

"I don't think Mr. Rasmussen would have qualified for a hardship cancellation," Bruning said. Mills entered into an agreement with Rasmussen to buy the home back after a one year lease provided that Mills pay all back taxes.

Fraley said when he authorized the cancellation of taxes, he did not know that the deed was no longer in Mills' hand and did not have any reason to doubt it.

"We know that the taxes were due and we were under the impression they were under her name," Felton said. "I don't think it would have made much difference."

Felton said the tardiness of their notice to the treasurer to wipe out the taxes was the commission's fault. Commissioners had promised to write them off after the work was completed, which still was after the foreclosure, she said.

"In retrospect, we should have done that sooner, but still, the parties involved in the situation knew about it," she said.

Bruning said although the county gets something accomplished, the taxing district does not get its money.

"Those taxes were never paid, they were just cancelled," she said, adding that the road department and schools will just get that much less.

Ted Spangler, deputy attorney general from the state tax commis-

sion, said practically speaking the districts would probably not miss the amount they would forfeit by the action, but theoretically the county would be obligated to compensate for their loss.

"In some way their interests need to be considered," Spangler said.

Felton said the county routinely writes off taxes for people in hardship situations, but it has never replaced the lost money.

She said the taxing districts still wouldn't have gotten any money if the commission would have decided to grant Mills a cancellation flat out.

Mills was granted another cancellation for her 1983 taxes and paid her delinquent 1982 taxes in 1985.

Felton, who was a commissioner in 1985 when the earlier cancellation was approved, said she did not know about it when she approved the more recent cancellations.

The documents did not state why the 1983 cancellation was approved.

Felton said the commission usually looks to see if an applicant for a cancellation has been granted any cancellations before but for some reason they did not in this case.

She said it is rare that someone can qualify year after year for cancellations because the county has the obligation to collect taxes or be compensated through a sale of the property.

"Spangler said he has never heard of the practice of letting needy people work off their taxes but added that he did not see anything wrong with it."

"It's ingenious," he said. "It's unique and unusual."

Fraley said the county has written off taxes in the past in exchange for work done, but only when the person qualifies for a cancellation and the work they offer is needed.

Rasmussen declined to comment. Mills could not be reached.

Top Republican women give support to Bush at convention

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — He's not a charismatic leader in the Ronald Reagan mold, but Vice President George Bush might just be the kind of senator, experienced facilitator the country needs right now, say two of Idaho's top Republican women.

As state GOP leaders gathered Thursday for their 3-day convention in Coeur d'Alene, the growing role of women in the electorate was on the minds of many.

"But even though national opinion

polls indicate Bush is not as popular a presidential candidate with women as with men, two of the most prominent ladies in Idaho politics are not concerned.

"George Bush has my total respect as a woman leader," said state Treasurer Lydia Justice Edwards. "I can't think of one negative thing about George Bush as far as women's rights, women's needs or women's opportunities."

"But she and state Sen. Ann Ry-

dalch, R-Idaho Falls, vice chair of the Idaho Republican Party, conceded the vice president may suffer an image problem, both in relation to the past eight years of tall-in-the-saddle Reagan leadership and because of his own political style.

"It's just a little bit harder for some candidates to project past the footlights," Mrs. Rydalch said. "Ronald Reagan is a tough act to follow, and it will take people some time to realize his qualifications."

But Idaho Republicans hope voters get a chance to read Bush's resume before he gets much further behind Democratic candidate Michael Dukakis in the national polls.

The president of the 140,000-member National Federation of Republican Women, a keynote speaker on Thursday, also underscored the need for the female side of the GOP to help elect or re-elect state and national Republican candidates.

"It's very important retaining your

comfortable majority in the state Legislature," said Judy Hughes, referring to the Republican's 90-36 superiority over Democrats in the Statehouse.

She urged those attending to "give equally of your time and talent to your congressional races ... The president is helpless unless you elect a friendly Congress."

Most GOP leaders see little chance of Dukakis upsetting Bush in Idaho in November, ending a string of Republican presidential victories in the state

dating back to 1968. But what people need to realize and what is being stressed at the state convention, said Mrs. Edwards, is that the vice president offers a different kind of leadership than the nation has seen in the 1960s.

"He is a gentleman and because of that, he may seem reserved to some, but I think that's erroneous," she said. "He's an international leader with the courage to deal with people on both sides of the aisle."

INEL worker misled panel, official claims

WASHINGTON (AP) — Don Ofte, the manager of the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory, allowed a congressional panel to be deliberately misled about a drug investigation at an Energy Department laboratory and helped exert pressure to prematurely end the probe, the chairman of the House Energy and Commerce Committee claims.

Rep. John Dingell, D-Mich., in a memorandum to members of his Subcommittee on Oversight and Investigations, said Ofte was among top ranking Energy Department officials who tried to keep the lid on the drug probe at the Lawrence Livermore Laboratory in California.

Dingell also said the subcommittee staff had evidence that Ofte was among those who decided that drug probe should be shut down in September 1986 despite evidence that an "alarming" number of employees were involved in drug use and trafficking.

Ofte, who was the department's principle deputy assistant for defense programs at the time of the incidents, was among a number of officials called to testify before the subcommittee this week in Washington. No questions, however, were directed to Ofte during the hearing.

There was also a report that Ofte pressured a department official into revealing the names of anonymous whistleblowers at the Livermore Laboratory.

DOE Idaho spokesman Pete Mygatt said the Idaho Dept. did not plan to issue any statement on Ofte's involvement in the drug investigation, and spokesmen for members of the state congressional delegation said they were unaware of the details of the charges against Ofte.

During Wednesday's subcommittee hearing, Dingell charged that a pervasive drug problem, including evidence of a "leaf-for-leaf" ring, still exists in highly classified parts of the Livermore Lab, 21 months after a controversial drug probe was torpedoed.

His memorandum said the subcommittee staff had evidence that Ofte was among the three high-ranking department officials to reach a consensus in September 1986 that the probe dubbed "Operation Snowstorm" be terminated at Livermore.

Prior to that, Dingell said Ofte was among those officials attending a March 1986 closed subcommittee hearing who failed to inform the panel that the Livermore investigation had been under way since January of that year.

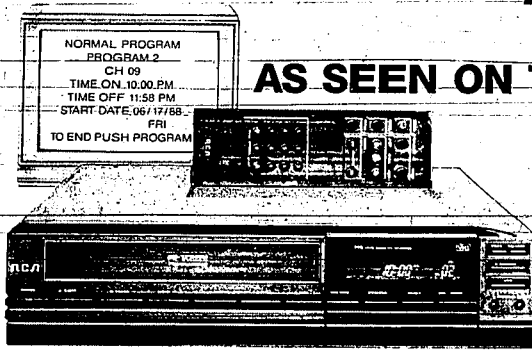

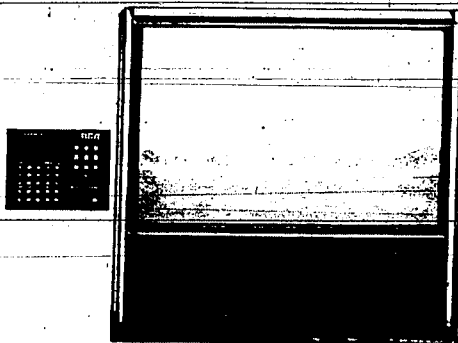

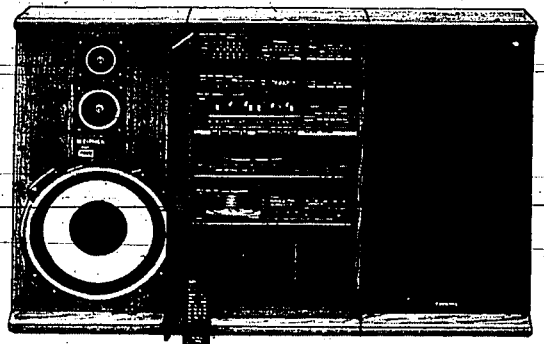

Pistons take 3-2 series lead to Los Angeles

PONTIAC, Mich. (AP) — A huge crowd and a huge first-half comeback Thursday night brought the Detroit Pistons to the verge of bursting the Los Angeles Lakers' hopes of a repeat championship.

"We've got a chance because we're up 3-2," Pistons coach Chuck Daly said after their 104-94 victory in front of a record playoff crowd in the last NBA game at the Pontiac Silverdome. "The Lakers are great in their building. We did it once and we'll have to see what happens."

Standing in the way of the Pistons' first championship are two games at the Forum, the home of the Lakers, who can become the first repeat winner in 19 years with two victories there. Game 6 will be Sunday and

Game 7, if necessary, on Tuesday night.

The Lakers, who are in the NBA finals for the seventh time in the last nine years, are trying to become the first team since the 1968-69 Boston Celtics to repeat as champions.

Los Angeles coach Pat Riley, who said after winning the title a year ago, "I'm going to guarantee everyone we're going to repeat," did not back away from that statement after Thursday's defeat.

"I like our chances," Riley said. "I still believe this team is going to win the championship. I'm sure our fans will be very vocal. The buck stops in Los Angeles. We'll have to be highly motivated to get the job done."

Detroit's Adrian Dantley scored 19 of his 25 points in the first half, 18 of

them during a 52-26 spurt that wiped out an early 13-point deficit.

"They just came out and jumped on us," Dantley said. "I looked liked they were going to bury us. They had fire in their eyes, but we got back into it and did what we had to do. At the end, they looked a little tired."

Defensive specialist Joe Dumars added 19 points, making nine of his first 12 shots, reserve guard Vinnie Johnson added 16 and Isiah Thomas had 15 points and eight assists for the Pistons, who won the opening game of the series at the Forum 105-93.

Forty-one-year-old Kareem Abdul-Jabbar was brilliant in defeat, scoring 26 points, one short of his high for the entire season. Magic Johnson added 15 points and 17 assists for the Lakers.

The game set an NBA playoff attendance record with a crowd of 41,732. Los Angeles trailed only 59-50 at halftime, despite being outscored 52-26 in a span of 16:38 in the first and second quarters.

The Lakers opened a 15-2 lead, but 18 points by Dantley fueled Detroit's big rally, which turned the 13-point deficit into a 54-41 lead.

James Worthy, who played only eight minutes because of foot trouble, and scored just two points in the first half, had eight points as the Lakers outscored Detroit 17-10 to start the third quarter, cutting the deficit to 69-67. The Pistons led 81-75 after three quarters.

A jumper by Vinnie Johnson gave the Pistons a 90-79 lead with 7:44 left in the game; but a basket by Worthy

and a 3-pointer by Byron Scott got the Lakers within six.

Detroit came back with six straight points, including two baskets by Thomas, for a 96-84 advantage with 4:21 to go, and the Lakers got no closer than seven the rest of the way.

The Lakers, who scored only 35 points in the second half of Tuesday's 25-point defeat, took a 15-2 lead just 4:19 into the game, giving it the look of a blowout as Detroit turned the ball over on six of its first eight possessions.

"One of the things we wanted to do was reduce our turnovers in the set offense and we did just the opposite," Daly said. "But we fought back and got back in it before the end of the quarter."

But after two timeouts, the Pistons

responded with a 23-10 run, tying the score, 25-25, with 1:40 left. Dantley scored nine in a five-minute span during the spurt and forced Worthy to the bench with his third foul less than five minutes gone into the game.

Los Angeles led 30-27 going into the second quarter, but Vinnie Johnson scored eight points in the first 4:00 of the period, giving the Pistons a 37-36 edge.

A free throw by Abdul-Jabbar tied the score before Dantley started a 17-4 run with a three-point play. The spurt gave the Pistons a 54-41 lead with 3:03 left in the half.

The Lakers have won four titles in this decade and 10 overall, the first five when the franchise was located in Minneapolis.

Lyle's 15-foot closing putt earns share of U.S. Open lead

BROOKLINE, Mass. (AP) — Masters champion Sandy Lyle coaxed a hard-fought 68 out of difficult conditions on Thursday and gained a place in a three-way tie for the lead in the first round of the 88th U.S. Open Golf Championship.

"I squeaked about as much out of it as I could," said Lyle, a Scot who ranks as the outstanding figure on the PGA Tour this season, leading the earnings list while being the only three-time winner.

"I can't believe I shot 68 playing the way I did," Lyle said. "I missed a lot of greens and I missed the fairway about 10 times."

But he scrambled when he had to, chipped in from about 25 yards for a birdie and finished in a rush, dropping an 18-20 foot birdie putt on the 16th hole then gaining a share of the lead with a 15-footer on the final hole.

That put him in a tie for the lead with a couple of long-struggling Americans, Bob Gilder and Mike Nicolette.

Seven Ballesteros of Spain, twice a winner of the Masters and a two-time British Open winner who gained some confidence in his putter with a playoff victory at Westchester last week, led a group at 69.

"My putting stroke came back," Ballesteros said. "I made some putts like the old days. I don't know what will happen, but I have a good feeling about this week."

He was tied with Scott Simpson, the defending Open champion, former-Masters champion Larry Mizel, Dick Mast, and Paul Azinger, the 1987 Player of the Year.

Curtis Strange, hailed by some of his fellow American tourists as the outstanding player in the game today, holed out a fairway shot for an eagle-2 on the 14th hole and was within six strokes of the lead until he bogeyed the final hole from a bunker.

He was tied at 70 with veteran Lanny Wadkins, a two-time winner this season, and former Masters champion Craig Stadler.

That put 11 men under par for the day. By comparison, the last time the U.S. Open was held on this course, in 1953, only seven sub-par rounds were recorded for four rounds of competition.

The reason? "They gave you some fairway to play with," said Gilder, 37, who has played in 13 of the last 15 American national championships.

"It's the best setup I've ever seen for a U.S. Open course," Gilder said. "It's still tough. But it's not as tough as Open courses usually are."

Both Gilder and Nicolette played in the more forgiving conditions of the morning while Lyle's late tee time put him out in the worst of the weather — strong, swirling winds that tormented some of golf's greatest names.

Jack Nicklaus, for example, struggled to a 74 as did Australian Greg Norman. PGA champion Larry Nelson took a 78 that included a fat 41 on the back nine at the Country Club, the course in suburban Boston known as "The Old Lady of Clyde Street."

Tom Watson, who won the Open in 1982 and holds five British Open titles, was among the leaders at one under par after 12 holes.

But, just as it has done so often in recent years, his putter suddenly went sour.

He 4-putted from the fringe on the 13th hole. He ran his log putt about two feet beyond the cup, missed that one, missed from about the same distance on a third putt and finally tapped in for a double bogey.

He also 3-putted-for par on the next hole, took 40 over the back and finished with 74.

"The wind was picking up, making

it tough to pull a club, and the greens were getting hard and fast when we finished," Nicolette said. "Good luck to the late starters. We had the best of it."

Nicolette, 37, has lost his exempt status on the PGA Tour three times due to lack of performance, has made

his way into only three tournaments this season and has a grand total of \$6,450 in 1988 earnings.

It's the every-year change that keeps coaches' interest

TWIN FALLS — While adults battled it out over one of the softball fields and co-ed practice took up the southwest section of Harmon Park, two groups of teenagers were making up a rained out Babe Ruth contest on the old American Legion Field Thursday evening.

Fourth-place Depot Grill (5-6) was challenging perennial power Wilson-Bates/Maxies (8-4) and presently in a tie for second, in a rematch.

Depot Grill led through most of the first meeting before dropping a one-



run decision. This time around the Depot boys held the home team designation and things were looking a shade rocky in the top of the first.

"Why do they do this to us Jerry?" asked assistant-coach Bob Burke of first-year Depot Grill manager Jerry Brown as a pickoff attempt eluded the first baseman sending the leadoff batter on to second.

Compounding the error, a late throw sailed into the outfield as the baserunner scurried into third.

"This team doesn't beat us," added Joe Arnold, two years a head coach, but now filling an assistant role alongside Burke. "We beat ourselves."

"Don't go throwing the ball around out there," Brown urged his infield calmly. "Just settle down and gather the next batter."

In contrast to his counterpart, Dal Ames of the orange-clad Wilson-Bates nine has been with the alignment for many years and led his charges to an unprecedented four consecutive titles this decade.

It was a trade off this year for the Depot Grill staff when Brown — an assistant a year ago — picked up the reins from Arnold, who had managed the club through two previous campaigns.

"I got into it kind of late last year," Brown explained. "They needed someone else to help out and I volunteered. Joe (like Burke a controller at Twin Falls-Sun Valley Regional Airport) had around a month of training limit his time this year, so I'm in."

Jerry's father Harold hung up his whistle at Twin Falls High School some time back and older brother Chuck picked up where he left off at Robert Stuart Junior High, so coaching is nothing new to the Brown family.

"Every year is different," Brown said. "What's interesting is watching the 13-year-olds getting in with the 15-year-olds. You can just see it their eyes at first. They're thinking oh my gosh."

Brown went on to explain that each team is made up of 12 players. Four each in age groups 15-14 and 13 with drafts, based on final standings at the end of the previous season filling out the rosters.

"The criteria is set up before the draft (and when you go into the draft each coach can freeze up to five players," he said. "They have a separate tryout for the 13-year-olds. They each play outfield, infield and hit. All the coaches are there to watch them."

"That's really what makes your team," he continued. "But there are different types of coaching. Some prefer to protect their 15-year-olds and go for it all this year. The three of us got together and were looking for younger kids in the first draft."

Of course that strategy doesn't make for a title contender right off, but paid dividends early in Thursday's game.

The visitors' second batter lofted a high fly to right field where Patrick Brown, a son of the coach, snagged it and threw a strike to the plate killing the scoring threat. Bryan Rasmussen, a 15-year-old southpaw, then ended the inning on a strikeout.

Three blue-suited runners tallied for Depot in their half of the inning on but a single hit, but a new problem followed that success.

Each Babe Ruth hurler is allowed 21 outs in a calendar week running from Saturday through the second ensuing Sunday and, as the game represented a makeup, Rasmussen would have to be lifted.

Today's West had no problems visualizing that a trick in diamonds held the key to a winning defense. What he failed to realize was that a direct assault is not always as effective as a more controlled one.

West led the club king and was disappointed after seeing dummy and noting East's club deuce. Since there was no hope of a club ruff for the defense, the only obvious chance lay with a diamond trick for East. So West switched to a diamond at trick two, East's jack forcing South's king. The trump ace was knocked out and West continued with another diamond to dummy's ace. Another round of trumps exhausted the defense and a club was surrendered to West's ace. Since there was no entry to East's high diamond, the defense collapsed. South was able to throw both of his remaining diamonds on dummy's clubs making 10 tricks.

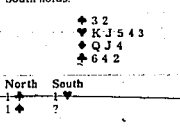
West's defense would have worked had East held the diamond king. However, had that been the case, any reasonable defense would have also succeeded.

For a better result, West should have continued with clubs at tricks two and three. And after West wins the first trump lead with his ace, a fourth round of clubs is ruffed by East. South overruns, to be sure, but one of dummy's club winners disappears and South gets only nine winners instead of 10.

Stargazers to gather for a peek

Ancient Mayan astronomers set standards

TWIN FALLS — For us, it started with a K-Mart special.

While cleaning out their garage, my parents found an Army-green, metal telescope with a 3-inch lens and "K-Mart" inscribed on the screw-in lens cap. It used to belong to my older brother. He used it just once about 20 years ago — to count the number of peas on a neighbor's plate.

The telescope was passed along to my 8-year-old daughter and 4-year-old son. As a result, we've become a family of enthusiastic, if inexperienced, stargazers.

The first time we ever used our telescope was during a local "star party" sponsored by the Magic Valley Astronomer's Club and the Herrett Museum.

One of the next times will be this Tuesday night, when the astronomy club and museum will host this year's annual stargazing event on the north lawn of the Herrett Museum.

Jim Woods and Bill West, members of the Herrett staff, will give a free lecture and slideshow on Mayan mathematics and astronomy at 7 p.m. From dusk until 11 p.m., the public is invited to view the heavens through telescopes set up outside.

"We just gather with our telescopes and invite the public to come look at things in the sky," says Jake Reichard, a retired farmer from Jerome and member of the astronomy club.

Members' telescopes range in lens size from 4-inches to 17-inches in diameter. The 17-inch weighs a couple of hundred pounds and is too big to move easily. It's one of three reflector telescopes owned by Reichard.

Wilma Titmus, office manager at the museum, says the Magic Valley Astronomer's Club, which has about a dozen members, is a good resource organization.

"The members always have been happy to answer questions," she says. "Kids like it because it isn't anything that's hurried out there. You take your turn, then go to another telescope. They have something else sighted in, and they explain it to you."

Here's what you and your family can expect to see through the telescopes Tuesday night.

• The Moon — First-time moon-peepers are in for a real treat. It's spectacular viewing because of the detail



of the image.

"Detail means a pop-eyed view of craters and plains on the face of the lunar sphere, which will be in the first quarter, or half-moon phase. The plains are called 'mares' (pronounced mar-ree) which means 'sea.' They are the areas where the Apollo probes landed.

"We'll see big craters with little craters inside them, mountainous areas, and quite a few interesting things," says Reichard.

• Saturn — This is exciting, too. You can see the rings, even with a K-Mart special.

"Saturn will be rising a little before sundown, and by the time it's

dark, it ought to be up high enough for good viewing. Saturn is always interesting because we get a good view of its rings. Even small telescopes will show one of its moons," says Reichard.

• Star clusters — These clusters are small groups of stars that are often invisible to the naked eye. If they are visible without a telescope, they may appear to be "little blobs with no form particularly," says Reichard. With optical aid, the clusters make interesting patterns.

• Double stars — That means two of them. These stars rotate

TWIN FALLS — Bill West, a curator at the Herrett Museum, says it's no accident the Magic Valley Astronomer's Club has chosen to hold its annual "star party" on June 21.

The stargazing event coincides with the summer solstice, or the first day of summer. "Solstice" in Latin means "sun stand still."

"Every day the sun moves a little bit in our sky toward its limits," says West, meaning the point at which the sun is at its greatest distance from the celestial equator. "The summer limit is the summer solstice — the sun appears to stand still for a couple days and then starts rising farther to the south again."

West and Jim Woods, museum director, will give a lecture and slide show at 7 p.m. Tuesday night at the Herrett Museum on the College of Southern Idaho campus. The free, hour-long presentation will cover Mayan mathematics, their calendar, astronomy and design.

After the talk and a break for refreshments, the public is invited to view the night sky through telescopes set up by the Magic Valley Astronomer's Club. The "star party" will be

Tour of historic Oakley homes provides step to past

OAKLEY — When most southern Idaho pioneer settlements had dot-

ted with log cabins and temporary homesteaded shacks, the residents of Oakley were building sturdy two or even three story brick homes.

About 50 of these homes featuring German, English and Victorian architectural designs, have not only survived, but have been carefully and lovingly restored to original beauty by the current generation of Oakley residents.

On Saturday, these homes will go on public parade in the annual day of tours sponsored by the Oakley Valley Improvement Group.

Once again between 300 and 400 persons from Magic Valley and even adjoining states will be taking the meandering one and one-half to two hour walking tour through town.

Kent Hale, who is a key figure in the community restoration effort and tours, said the first tour is at 9 a.m. tomorrow with new groups starting every 20 minutes through 2:30 p.m. Cost is \$3 per person. Tickets will be sold at the old Oakley Playhouse

where the tour originates.

Hale said about 35 homes, built between 1880 and 1915, illustrate the history of Oakley, an early Mormon settlement that during the building

era had some four brick plants that furnished local building material. Tours begin at the old opera house on Blaine Street, a block north of the city park. Here a brief slide show by

Hale explains the architecture and history involved in the annual event.

This year members of the Magic Valley Chapter, Veterans Motor Car Club of America will have a special tour late in the day and will be displaying their old cars at the city park during the afternoon.

Hale said four homes will be open so tour members can inspect the interiors, furnishings and restoration work. These include the Howells' Castle, a showplace home built by Benjamin P. Howells who also provided the pioneer town with the opera house. The home is owned and restored by Gary Mullard and is distinguished by its turret shaped two-story tower and curved porches surrounded by white wooden railing and gingerbread trim.

The doors of the Charles Haight home, now owned by Harjo and Becky Clark, and the Jacob Dayley home where Kendal Dayley grew up and still resides, will also be open. The Layton log cabin which was moved to

its present site on the Layton property, will again be open. Restored and furnished with antiques by Rita Lay-

Writer's strike to hurt home video

The TV and movie industries are reeling from the writers strike. What does this mean for home video?

Right now, industry observers believe, not much. However, there are fears that if the strike now in its 15th week continues much longer, there will be long-range, negative effects on home video.

About six months after a movie

reaches the theaters, it generally debuts on home video. If there are fewer theatrical releases down the road because of the strike that began March 7, there will be a similar decline in new home-video product.

"If (the strike) is settled in the next month or two, there won't be much of an effect on home video," said Reg Childs, president of Nelson Entertainment. "A few months gap in the start of new productions can be overcome."

However, John Taylor of Ingram Video, a distribution company, insisted that a longer strike — six months or more — would seriously hurt home video: "That would mean a big decrease in the number of movies released. We distributors count on a continuous flow of movies from Hollywood. Without that steady flow, the whole system gets fouled up. Business would be way down."

Nelson's Childs added, "If the strike goes on into the fall, home video will feel the effects as early as late '89, but certainly in 1990 and 1991. There won't be enough product to fill the home-video pipeline."

Golf video tees up memorable classics

Golf's most coveted and treasured prize, the U.S. Open championship, has produced many of the game's greatest moments. Most of those historic head-to-head finishes and amazing shots are included in the recently released "The U.S. Open: Golf's Greatest Championship" (Vestron, and the USA, 60 mins., \$29.98).

From its humble beginnings in 1895 through Scott Simpson's surprise triumph in 1987, this cassette tees up all the classic finishes plus a lot of vintage film clips of the greats of yesteryear.

These dramatic moments are selected to make one feel as if you were strolling through 93 years of Open glory with Jim McKay, the game's most descriptive commentator, at your side.

In the first Open, 36 holes on a nine-hole course, Horace Rawlings, an Englishman who had just become an assistant pro at the host Newport Golf Club, won with rounds of 91 and 82 to take the fat portion of the \$325 prize. There wasn't even an admission

charge until 1922.

The big names atop the scoreboard are familiar even if they played decades before television: Harry Vardon, Ted Ray. And 20-year-old amateur Francis Ouimet, who in 1913 beat them both in a playoff. Bobby Jones, Tommy Armour, Gene Sarazen, Ben Hogan, Sam Snead and Lew Worsham. Television favorites Arnold Palmer, Jack Nicklaus, Lee Trevino, Billy Casper, Tom Watson and Greg Norman.

None of the great moments of the U.S. Open since television are missing. This is a keeper for any follower of the sport.

Jack Nicklaus has a visually exciting video coming out July 7, "Jack Nicklaus Shows You the Greatest 18 Holes of Major Championship Golf" (CBS Fox Video, approx. 60 mins., \$49.98).

Nicklaus put out a two-volume instructional set titled "Golf My Way," takes viewers on the ultimate golf tour. It consists of great holes on major courses from Augusta, Ga., to St. Andrews in Scotland, played through the mind of the master.

Summer films may set box-office record

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Rambo, Crocodile Dundee and a dwarf named Willow began the summer movie season last month with a blast that industry analysts expect to help propel the nation's theaters to a record year.

"It looks like another record," said Art Murphy, financial writer for the entertainment trade paper Daily Variety. "The first four months are already \$100 million more than last year's record. If the pace is continued at the same rate, the year will easily exceed 1987's \$4 billion."

The 15 weeks of summer, which amount to 40 percent of the year's total, look very promising. First-sequence big hits are always strong, and you've got 'Crocodile Dundee II,' plus 'Rambo III,' which is really a first sequel since the original film was 'First Blood.' Plus you have a George Lucas film which is not in the same 'Star Wars' mold.

'Crocodile Dundee II' and 'Rambo III' opened on May 27, while the Lucas epic, 'Willow,' was moved ahead to May 20 in an apparent attempt by MGM-UA to

beat the crowd. The company is understandably nervous about the \$35 million film — plus \$20 million for advertising and promotion — which has no stars, and the hero is a dwarf-to protect a baby from an evil queen.

'Rambo III' also seems a perilous investment in view of its reported \$63 million cost, including \$20 million to Sylvester Stallone. Also, Stallone's last two releases failed to ignite the box office.

Other repeats of past hits will be offered for the summer trade: 'Poltergeist III,' the last film of young Heather O'Rourke; 'Caddyshack II,' with Jackie Mason replacing Rodney Dangerfield; 'Arthur 2 on the Rocks,' again with Dudley Moore and Liza Minnelli, and a ghostly appearance by John Gielgud; 'Short Circuit II,' plus 'Christmas II,' 'Deathstalker III,' 'Angel III' and 'Barbarian Queen II.'

Once again comedy is the strong suit of summer. The original offerings include: 'Big Business,' Bette Midler and Lily Tomlin as a pair of twins

who are switched in the maternity ward and find out 30 years later.

'Punchline,' Sally Field and Tom Hanks as stand-up comic hopefuls who fall in love.

'Me and Him,' Griffin Dunne as an architect who suffers a sexual crisis.

'Funny Farm,' Chevy Chase and Madolyn Smith as a fast-lane pair seeking tranquility in a small town.

'Hot to Trot,' comic Bob Goldthwaite and a talking horse.

'Big,' Tom Hanks as a 13-year-old whose wish to grow up in a hurry is granted.

'Big Top,' Pee-wee Herman as a country kid who falls for a circus star.

'Coming to America,' Eddie Murphy as an African prince in search of a bride.

'A Fish Called Wanda,' John Cleese, Jamie Lee Curtis and Kevin Kline in a comedy about United States-British relations.

'Married to the Mob,' Michelle Pfeiffer and Matthew Modine in a Mafia comedy.

'Bull Durham,' the lighter

side of baseball with Kevin Costner and Susan Sarandon.

'Who Framed Roger Rabbit,' a Steven Spielberg-produced Disney fantasy starring Bob Hoskins and a host of Hollywood cartoon stars.

'The Great Outdoors,' Dan Aykroyd and John Candy as brothers-in-law on a disastrous summer vacation.

'Midnight Run,' Robert De Niro in a comedy about a bounty hunter for the Mob.

'Moon over Parador,' Richard Dreyfuss as an actor who impersonates a Caribbean dictator.

'Vibes,' Cyndi Lauper in her film debut, with Jeff Goldblum and Peter Falk.

The macho men will be back for summer. Besides Stallone, theaters will be offering Clint Eastwood ('The Dead Pool'), Arnold Schwarzenegger ('Red Heat'), Chuck Norris ('Hero and the Terror'), Michael Dudikoff ('Nam') and Charles Bronson ('Messenger of Death').

Summer will also bring Bruce Willis as a New York cop fighting terrorists in 'Die Hard,' and Sean Connery and Mark Harmon as investigators of murder in 'Presidio.'

A handful of dramatic films offer hope for adult audiences. Francis Coppola returns with his long-planned 'Tucker,' with Jeff Bridges as the inventor who tries to revolutionize the automobile industry.

Tom Berenger and Debra Winger star in 'Betrayed,' about an FBI agent who infiltrates a Midwest huto group.

That nearly extinct species, the Western, gets another chance for revival with 'Young Guns,' whose cast includes Emilio Estevez, Charlie Sheen, Kiefer Sutherland and Lou Diamond Phillips.

'And for the small fry: 'The New

Adventures of Pippi Longstocking,' and a revival of Disney's 'Bambi.'

How does the summer season look to movie buyers?

'I think it's going to be 'Willow,' 'Rambo' and 'Crocodile Dundee,' said Todd Zamanian, hooker for the 75-screen Mescomp chain in Michigan and Wisconsin.

Local movie offerings feature something for entire family

The following are capsule reviews of films playing locally in the Magic Valley. The ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and similar are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

BIG (PG). Funny, warm, sophisticated and highly imaginative comedy-fantasy in which a 12-year-old boy's wish to be transformed into a man comes true. Then the 12-year-old winds up vice president of development at a toy company. Wonderful fun. With Tom Hanks, Elizabeth Perkins, John Heard, Robert Loggia, Jared Rushton and David Moscow.

it a smooth finish, it is neither celebration nor nightmare enough to churn up any comic intensity.

RAMBO III (R). The third Rambo movie, in which the one-man attack squad spreads his worldwide vendetta to Afghanistan — is an awe-struck memorial by writer-director Sylvester Stallone to his own musculature, a would-be pop film parody, loaded with howlers, murderously professional, with more than \$60 million worth of explosions and spectacle, it is also a real talk-back-to-the-screen picture: a gigantically swollen self-parody, loaded with howlers; an unconsciously camped-up homoerotic male-bonding adventure rife with beefcake and grandiose phellic symbols.

George Lucas so clearly wants his films to do good and to carry positive messages. Willow (Warwick Davis) and Madmartigan (Val Kilmer) very nearly bring it off but in the end they are engulfed as effects overwhelm character and this slim story.

'CROCODILE' DUNDEE II (PG). Discursive but almost as much fun as the first outing with that archetypal Australian bloke, played with such winning ease by Paul Hogan. This time out, Crocodile's lady (Jinda Kozlowski), a New York reporter, is endangered by a Central American drug-kingpin, sending the couple deep in hiding in the Australian bush. Nothing special as an action adventure but shrewdly effective as a projection of a mythical hero. With John Meillon, Charles Dutton, Hechter Ubarry, Juan Fernandez.

WILLOW (PG). Not about a farm, and not particularly funny either, though Chevy Chase has his moments and co-star Madolyn Smith has even more. An urban yuppie couple, sportswriter and wife, retreat to the countryside for a literary haven and learn the horrible consequences of unanswered prayers. But the movie has a shallow satiric conception of small-town America — 'The Egg and I' with drag yokels, and bud yokels — and though George Roy Hill gives

Martina Navratilova feels pressure to dominate Wimbledon this year

By LYNN-HOOGENBOOM

Throughout the '80s, Martina Navratilova has decimated her opponents with a machine-like precision. But last year, a few cracks began to appear in her wall of domination. West Germany's Steffi Graf defeated her for the 1987 French Open. Navratilova came back strong at Wimbledon, which she has all but owned in recent years, and the U.S. Open, but failed to reach the final in the Australian Open. The real shocker, however, came last month when Navratilova was knocked out of the 1988 French Open by Soviet teen-ager Natalia Bykova. It was a particularly bitter defeat for Navratilova, who still carries a strong grudge against the Soviet Union for its invasion of Czechoslovakia in 1968.

Could the Navratilova era of women's tennis be coming to an end?

Maybe, but it's hard to think of Navratilova as anything but the favorite of the All-England Tennis Championships from Wimbledon, England. She has won that tournament an incredible eight times. It's also the one that means the most to her. "To this day, when my parents talk about my career, it is not winning the U.S. Open or being the big cheese on the women's tour, or all the money, or Australia or France. Everything is Wimbledon," she said in her 1985 autobiography, "Martina." Two weeks of Wimbledon coverage begins Sunday, June 19, on NBC, with a Wimbledon preview and concludes with the men's singles final, airing Sunday, July 3. HBO also airs Wimbledon action from June 20-30.

These days, fans think of Navratilova as a lean, mean tennis machine. But it wasn't always that way. When

she first visited the United States in 1973, she was a gawky and enthusiastic teen-ager who fell in love with all things American, including ice cream and fast food. She enjoyed them so much that she gained 25 pounds during eight weeks on the women's tour and was later dubbed "the greatwide hope."

In 1975, during the U.S. Open, she defected to the United States. A year later, during the U.S. Open in 1976, as memories from the year before cascaded back, Janet Newberry took advantage of her lapses in concentration and knocked her out of the first round. After the match, Navratilova threw a towel over her head, sat on the bench and sobbed uncontrollably. She later apologized, and her apology, characteristically, was without reservation. "I'm ashamed of what happened," she told Bud Collins. "That wasn't nice the way I acted. And I took something away from Janet with my behavior."

In those days, her emotions always bubbled near the surface. She was a bundle of raw, undisciplined talent,

the all-too-human counterpart to the super-disciplined Chris Evert. Although Navratilova won her first Wimbledon title in 1978, it wasn't until the early 1980s that she brought her formidable talent under control. Once she did, she was unbeatable. Complaints even arose that a tennis competition with Navratilova in it wasn't quite fair.

"Look at me in a crowd and I don't tower over anybody," she pointed out in her book, adding, "If anybody wants my forearms, I can direct them to the nearest exercise machine." Only with the ascendance of Graf have those complaints begun to fade.

If she loses Wimbledon, she could become an underdog for the first time in years. Who knows? Now that Navratilova is vulnerable again, fans may rediscover her lovable side.

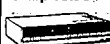

James Goodwin stays on 'Guiding Light' by miraculously recovering

James M. Goodwin, who plays Johnny Bauer in "Guiding Light," had one of soaps' best storylines awhile back. He was dying of cancer and he and his girlfriend, Roxie, had to come to terms with his impending death. The situation paved the way for some heavy emoting, and Goodwin was more than up to the task. The young, tall, handsome actor found a way to play doom without ever becoming obvious or maudlin. For my money, his performance in "Guiding Light" for the past seven or eight months was among the best seen this season. The fact that he didn't receive an Emmy nomination just shows how out of step with reality those daytime Emmy Awards are.

Jamie, as he is called by many of his co-workers, admitted that he enjoyed playing the up and downs of a guy who is looking at death closeup.

"It was really a showcase for an actor. Everything rode on relationships during that period in the storyline, and as an actor I got to play a scale of emotions that I hadn't explored before. It's really interesting how fans reacted to the storyline at the time. Many of them were certain that I was headed for death and they would write and say they were sorry I was leaving the show. Others said Johnny should pray for a miracle."

The "miracle" turned out to be prophetic on the part of the viewers, since that was exactly what transpired in the plot. Johnny Bauer met up with a faith healer of sorts in Europe and went into total remission a short time later. Now this would tax the talents of the most seasoned of actors but it is to Jamie Goodwin's credit that he carried off the miraculous recovery with total conviction.

"Soap opera plots deal with life and death issues on a grand scale, and an actor has to find the truth in the situation and play that, so he won't come across in an artificial manner. I think our cast in "Guiding Light" has some very good actors who rise to the occasion."

Like so many other actors, Jamie is an army brat — his dad was an Air Force pilot for 23 years. Although they moved around a bit for the first few years of Jamie's life, the family ultimately settled in Waukomis, Okla., where the clan still resides.

There was never any doubt in Jamie's mind that what he wanted to do was act. He veered only once, when he gave some serious consideration to becoming a veterinarian, but that lasted only a short time. He acted in school plays and when he went to college it was as a drama student. While still in college at Southern Methodist University in Dallas, Texas, Jamie appeared in commercials and industrial shows. He also got his feet wet in local productions of "The Glass Menagerie" and "The Pirates of Penzance."

Upon graduation from SMU, Jamie got married. He and his wife,

Michelle, who is a legal assistant, are expecting their first child in the fall.

"Everyone advised us not to get married. They said trying to get a foot in the door as an actor would take up all my emotional energy and I wouldn't have any left to pour into my marriage. Michelle and I thought about it for about ten minutes and decided to get married anyway. It's been a wonderful five years."

Actually, Jamie was lucky to land the role of Johnny Bauer almost immediately upon arriving in New York. He also got a chance to appear in a Central Park production of Shakespeare's "Two Gentlemen of Verona," for which he received glowing notices. Jamie recently took some small roles in an off-Broadway production of "Julius Caesar" so that he could work with the stars of the production, Al Pacino and Martin Sheen.

A. Madonna and Sean are estranged, but reconciliation is not out of the question. The time they've spent apart has had a good effect on each of them. For instance, Penn has taken on a new maturity that Madonna welcomes. Sean is making a movie in far-off Thailand right now. But during a break in shooting he flew all the way back to New York to catch Madonna in her "Speed-the-Plow" stage debut. He realized her reviews weren't terrific, and he wanted to be an hand to help.

Q. I remember a while back you had an item that Paul Newman was planning a Connecticut camp for children with cancer or other-

wise life-threatening diseases. The idea is a wonderful one — is it still on the drawing boards? — G.L.

A. It's much further along than that since the camp, on 300 acres with a 47-acre lake, is opening this month. The camp is called "The Hole in the Wall Gang" camp and will be open the year round. It has a Wild West motif with corals and animals. The ratio of campers to counselors (mostly medical students) is one to one and campers continue to receive whatever medical treatment needed during their two-week stay.

Q. I hear that Joan Collins has decided to return for another season on TV's "Dynasty" — provided no sexy, strong-willed actresses are cast to upstage her. True? — G.W.

A. Hold on a minute: Joan loves to be front and center, but she doesn't especially like to hog the "Dynasty" spotlight. In other words, she'll be

back for another "Dynasty" season and the fur will undoubtedly fly. It seems that Sable of "The Colbys," played by supersoxy Stephanie Beacham, will show up again as an adversary to Jgan's Alexis Carrington. The action, I'm told, promises to be hot, heavy and very theatrical.

Q. I know Jackie Mason was involved in a paternity suit in Florida: Any idea of the outcome? — E.D.

A. A judge has ruled that the 21/2-year-old child is Mason's daughter by 36-year-old Ginger Reiter, a North Miami actress and writer with whom Mason has had an on-and-off relationship since the two met in a restaurant 12 years ago. Not only does the little girl look like the 57-year-old-comedian, but a blood test indicated that the likelihood that Mason was the father was 99.4 percent. Mason is appealing.

ABC affiliates meet, consider programming improvements

WASHINGTON — ABC is considering moving its weekly "Health Show" to a two-hour Sunday morning block that also would include Sander Vanocur's "Business World" and "This Week With David Brinkley".

The move is designed to help affiliates, many of whom are increasingly wary of paid religious programs, while providing them with competition for NBC News' expanded Sunday morning block of "Sunday Today" and "Meet the Press".

The proposal surfaced during the ABC affiliates meeting in L.A. last week. Affiliates also seemed receptive to a proposal to scrap local "station breaks" in the hour during prime time, which reduce the impact of a network promotion, for the program that will immediately follow while giving viewers a chance, too often taken, to sample another network.

Meanwhile, ABC executives Monday discounted reports in the trades from that L.A. affiliates meeting that suggested the network was seriously considering reducing by an hour the 22 hours of prime time aired on the network each week.

John Sias, network group president, in a speech to the affiliates, threw out the alternative while discussing a number of issues the affiliates and the network need to discuss in the changing broadcast environment facing free TV these days.

Other executives, notably Mark Mandala, network TV president, hammered at the pre-emption problem facing ABC, whose affiliates, on average, are pre-empting an hour of prime time each week — often the 8 p.m. Saturday slot during the past year — at a cost of millions in lost revenue.

But ABC executives Monday emphasized there are no plans to reduce prime-time programming whatsoever. They noted that in fact, such a proposal never surfaced during closed sessions of the affiliates.

The worrisome relationship of net-

works that aren't delivering first-place audiences with their affiliates these days also has surfaced this week as CBS, which last season finished third for the first time in its history. CBS met with representatives of its 206 affiliates, not a few of whom have begun pre-empting low-rated network series during the prime time week in recent years.

At a press conference Sunday, Laurence Tisch, president of CBS Inc., was asked specifically about the reports of ABC cutting its prime time hours. "We have no thought of reducing prime time hours," Tisch responded. "We have a thought of doing better in the 22 hours we have. But we have no interest whatsoever in discussing or thinking about reduction of the number of prime time hours. And you know, there's no question in our minds if we produce better programming, our pre-emptions will go down."

Earlier Sunday, at an affiliates business meeting — which ran 90 minutes longer than scheduled — Tisch and other CBS executives felt the heat of the third-place finish.

Network affiliates were particularly unimpressed with CBS promotion efforts last year and during the day word-leaked that Warren Spellman, vice president for advertising and promotion, had been asked to resign (late Monday, there was still no word on a replacement).

In a press conference later that day,

Tisch said that in the business meeting, affiliates were "saying the same thing I've been saying for the past six months. I think we're all in agreement that our promotion and advertising needs a major overhauling. It has to be much better."

Gene Jankowski, CBS broadcast group president, who will introduce the network's upcoming promotion campaign Tuesday, added that "we have to have a different, more exciting, more creative campaign promoting specific product tune-in to specific television programs."

As expected, Tisch himself was the target of tough questioning during the business meeting, according to witnesses, as affiliates queried him on his commitment to CBS, his lack of knowledge about the broadcasting business and the apparent lack of a long-term strategy for CBS.

The questioning was just tough enough that Tisch revised a prepared luncheon address to reiterate his recent public statements pledging that he is at CBS for the long haul, that he has no intention of selling the network and that his sole goal is to see the network back in the number one spot among the networks, while warning (again) that it will take time, "several years," in fact.

ABC Entertainment will air a two-hour "Second Annual Star-Spangled Celebration" starting at 9 p.m. on

Sunday, July 3.

NEW YORK (AP) — Television adds to Dad's haul of loud neckties and other useless gifts with a sappy TV movie on NBC.

Michael McKean (Lenny on "Laverne and Shirley") stars in "A Father's Homecoming" on NBC, a schmaltzy tale of parental wisdom that is, in fact, an above-average offering for this time of year. It was written by Gloria Katz and Willard Huyck, who co-wrote "American Graffiti" with George Lucas.

McKean plays a refugee from the '60s who returns to his alma mater, Oakmont Prep School, as the new headmaster — much to the consternation of his party animal son, played by Jonathan Ward, a student at the newly co-educational school, and bookish daughter, played by Marcianne Warman, who has been forced to relocate from her all-girls school in New York. In one of the movie's forced cute music-video sequences, she discovers the opposite sex to the strains of "Bad Boys."

Once ensconced, the new headmaster takes up with a girlfriend from his prep-school days (Nann Visitor), now a widowed mother and town leader.

A jealous rival for the headmaster's job (Peter Michael Goetz) and an overzealous editor of the school paper provide typical situation comedy. But clashes between the overprivileged preppies and the locals add a violent labor-management dispute at the town's only factory add some sophistication to the plot.

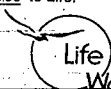

Composer Safan talks of creating a sound

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Composer Craig Safan was looking for the right sound to express the feeling of NBC's "Cheers."

"One of the most important things a film composer does is come up with a sound for a project," he said. "Every movie and television show sounds different. After reading the first script of 'Cheers' the sound came to me.

"I said I wanted an instrument that sounds like a bar. Jimmy Burrows, who's the director and one of the executive producers, suggested a clarinet. Then it came to me: Woody Allen playing the clarinet at 3 a.m. in a bad band. It's not slick. They're not trying to impress anyone. It's just Woody Allen and a few guys playing because they love to play."

Safan writes the background music for "Cheers." He did not write the theme song that opens the show.

"We do the music for 'Cheers' at a studio," said Safan. "I play the piano."

Safan has composed the theme music for ABC's "Supercarrier" and scores for "The Twilight Zone," "Alfred Hitchcock Presents" and "Amazing Stories." He wrote music for such TV movies as "Samaritan: The Mitch Snyder Story," "Timetalkers" and "Getting Married," and more recently the theatrical feature "Stand and Deliver."

Ordinarily, Safan records most of his music in the little studio in the converted garage behind his home. He works primarily with electronics, but may find a tune in anything from a plastic water bottle to his son's xylophone.

He recorded the soundtrack for "Stand and Deliver" in the studio. His primary instruments were a water bottle and a lag bolt.

"It has a feeling of traditional Latin music in the main title," he said. "But I tried to go into the subtlety. What is this really about? It's about a man

yearning to do something specific for people. It never matters that it's a Latin story. It's like saying 'Romeo and Juliet' is a story about two Italians.

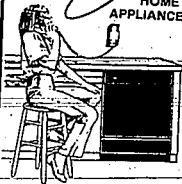
"I listened to a lot of Latin music, but there are so many different kinds. Then I began to mimic sounds. I used a water bottle for a conga. I recorded it digitally and played it back through the computer. The guiro is a gourd with little ridges you scrape with a piece of wood. I took a lag bolt and scraped wood along the threads and recorded it digitally in the Synclavier. You can record every possible sound into the computer. That's how you turn a lag bolt into a percussion instrument."

His studio is lighted by skylights. One side is all glass and opens onto what will be a Japanese garden. A 400-year-old Buddha is set up there, and the gate is a 100-year-old Japanese sliding door.

"Since I do most of my work at home I want to create my own environment," he said.

He composed a Japanese musical that was performed at the Goodspeed Opera House in East Haddam, Conn., which is where "Annie" and "Man of La Mancha" began.

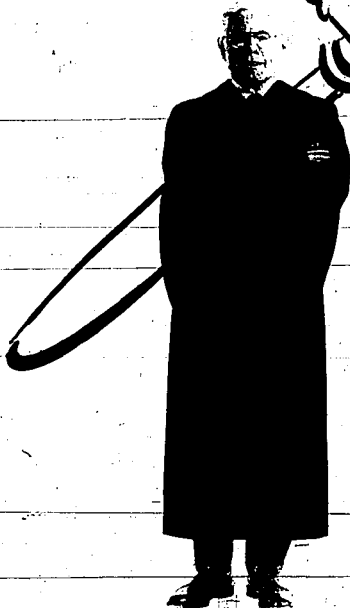
