Answers RSVP study

Holding dismisses charges

SUN VALLEY — Sun Valley Co. owner Earl Holding met with local business people and the press here Thursday to respond to accusations of mismanagement and restraint of trade leveled by a small group of area businessmen.

Using terms including "mythical" and "a bunch of hoo-doo," Holding said a study sponsored by the Committee to Restore Sun Valley's Ski Prominence is totally illogical and inaccurate. The study released last month blames the decline in skier days at Sun Valley on mismanagement on the part of the Sun Valley Co.

The closely held Sun Valley Co., which leases the right to operate ski facilities on Bald and Dollar Mountains from the U.S. Forest Service, rarely releases financial information.

But Holding said, "The (RSVP) information going out was so bad and so mythical that I felt I needed to respond."

RSVP concluded from the study that Sun Valley's loss of skier market share in the last few years has been the result of the company's failure to compete successfully with other destination ski resorts both in upgrading skiing facilities on Bald Mountain and in advertising and marketing aggressively.

While Holding agreed that the number of skier days — the number of people who use ski facilities for all or part of one day — has declined in recent years, he cited light snowfall over the last several years and air transportation difficulties as the primary reasons.

"Considering snow conditions, we have done a brilliant job of bringing in skiers," he said.

The company has promoted the resort well, he said. It spends 4 percent of its gross sales — about \$1 million a year — on advertising and marketing. That compares favorably with the rest of the industry, he said.

"You can always spend more but you have to consider a level of cost effectiveness," he said.

Jim Gibson, a Ketchum businessman who heads RSVP, said spending only 4 percent of gross sales on promotion is less than half the industry average of 9 percent.

"When you are losing skier numbers, spending even the average amount is not enough," Gibson said.

Citing rarely disclosed figures on the company's profits and expenditures, Holding also disputed previous statements from RSVP that the company had reaped more than \$65 million in profit from the mountain in 10 years and had spent little on upgrading ski facilities.

During the past 11 years, investment on Bald Mountain has greatly exceeded profits, Holding said. After-tax profit

GOP, Demos like Pentagon scandal

WASHINGTON — The burgeoning Pentagon bribery investigation may be developing into the kind of scandal both Democrats and Republicans can love.

Little more than a week after it emerged into public view, the contract-fraud affair shows potential to become the most politically popular scandal in years, says one defense lawyer for a man targeted by the investigators.

"This is the best thing that's happened to both the Republicans and Democrats in six months, because for the Republicans it gets everybody's mind off (Attorney General) Ed Meese and for the Democrats it gets everybody's mind off (House Speaker) Jim Wright," said this lawyer, who has no desire for any more publicity for his or his client's name.

"So what you have is a natural tendency on the part

of both parties to try to pump it up. You've got a Republican, (Iowa Sen. Charles) Grassley, who's pumping it up, and you've got the Democrats too" including Sens. David Pryor of Arkansas and Sam Nunn of Georgia, and Rep. Les Aspin of Wisconsin, the lawyer added. All four have joined the public outcry over the affair.

"It's the one thing everybody can join in on because it gets reporters off their leadership," the lawyer said. "It's terrific, a perfect opportunity."

This experienced attorney is one of a dozen Washington lawyers already hired by the contractors, consultants and Pentagon officials named in government search warrants or grand jury subpoenas.

He was giving his admittedly self-interested view of how government investigators had received such voluminous and favorable publicity for their side of the case

through leaks, speeches and news conferences even before the investigators have brought any charges or made any arrests.

Meese, who 365 days out of most years solemnly refuses to discuss ongoing investigations in public, even held a news conference to outline the scope of the investigation and rebut Grassley's complaints that the Justice Department had moved too slowly.

Since the government's coordinated searches on June 14, the Pentagon story has insinuated two high-profile investigations of the nation's front pages: the special prosecutor's imminent report on whether Meese used his office to benefit himself and friends, and a House ethics investigation of Democratic Speaker Jim Wright's finances and official actions.

The well-known names Meese and Wright have been replaced by those of Pentagon bureaucrats, private consultants and contractors who are hardly household words — Berlin, Galvin, Gunn, Lackner, Paisley, Par

'Greenhouse effect' warming here but not causing drought

WASHINGTON — The "greenhouse effect" global warming of the earth is here, but the current drought and heat wave over much of the United States can't be blamed on it, a scientist told a Senate panel Thursday.

However, similar heat waves and droughts can be expected much more often as a result of future warming, said James E. Hansen, a climatologist at the National Aeronautics and Space Administration's Goddard Institute for Space Studies in New York City.

No rain, relief from heat for Midwest, Plains states

WASHINGTON — The six-to-10-day weather outlook for the Plains and Midwest promises no relief from heat and dry weather, the National Weather Service said Thursday in its first "drought advisory" for 1988.

The special weather announcement comes as farmers across much of the nation watch their

fields bake in the sun and crops wither for lack of moisture.

The new forecast through June 30 extends an earlier prediction for hot, dry weather northward to the Canadian border between Montana and the Great Lakes.

The forecast calls for below-normal rainfall from the Central Plains to Illinois and Indiana, although surrounding areas may have closer to nor-

mal precipitation.

The Climate Analysis Center issues drought advisories when lack of rain has continued over a large area for several weeks and the forecast fails to indicate any new rain upcoming.

The period from April 1 to June 1 was among the driest since 1920 in the North Central states, the advisory noted, though not yet as dry as that of 1934.

Hansen told the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee there is only a 1 percent chance that he is

wrong in blaming rising temperatures around the world on the buildup of man-made gases in the atmosphere.

For unknown reasons, the earth has been getting warmer for more than a century, though with cooler in-

tervals. The four warmest years on record have been recorded in the 1980s — and without what Hansen

called an improbable cooling for the rest of the year, 1988 will break all records.

Though there has been much speculation by scientists around the world that the warming resulted from the greenhouse effect, Hansen's statement is the most definite yet.

Syukuro Manabe, soil specialist at the Geophysical Fluid Dynamics Laboratory of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, said it was more likely that the current drought was the result of natural fluctuations than the greenhouse warming.

Outlook rosier for economy

WASHINGTON — The U.S. economy grew at a strong 3.6 percent rate in the first three months of 1988, prompting the Reagan administration on Thursday to make what was once considered a too-rosy forecast even rosier.

After the October stock market collapse, many private economists expected a slowdown or even a recession this year. They criticized as unrealistic White House projections saying the economy, as measured by the gross national product, would grow at a steady 2.9 percent pace, the same as in 1986 and 1987.

But booming growth in the last three months of 1987 and continued strength this year sent analysts scrambling to revise their forecasts upward until the administration estimate began looking pessimistic.

On Thursday, Barj Sprinkel, chairman of the pre-

sident's Council of Economic Advisers, boosted the administration's GNP forecast for all of 1988 to 3.5 percent. At the same time, he predicted that consumer price inflation would hold steady at 4.3 percent.

The administration is looking for a sixth straight year of economic expansion, the longest in peacetime since the Civil War, to bolster the chances for a Republican presidential victory in November.

Sprinkel said the expansion "gives every indication of continuing ... on into next year."

"Our rosy forecast wasn't rosy enough," he told reporters. "The economy is doing better than we expected."

Private analysts said Sprinkel's growth projections now are on target, but that his inflation forecast should be higher because of the expected effect of the widespread drought on food prices.

U.S. could escalate subsidy battle

BRAINERD, Minn. — Trade Representative Clayton Yeutter on Thursday raised the prospect of U.S. escalation of the already-hostile farm subsidy battle unless progress is made on eliminating all subsidies by the year 2000.

Yeutter said Congress could likely increase export subsidies, just as it did in 1985, if it appears that current global trade negotiations on the matter are at a stalemate.

"Sometimes one must have a higher level of confrontation in order to achieve progress," Yeutter said at a news conference held during trade talks with America's largest trading partners.

The two days of discussions with trade ministers from Japan, Canada and the 12-member European Community came on the heels of the seven-nation economic summit in Toronto, where farm subsidies were a major item of dispute.

The allies rebuffed President Reagan's call for totally scrapping subsidies. The final economic communique simply repeated language calling for further negotiations aimed at reducing subsidies rather than eliminating them.

The world leaders "directed" their trade ministers to keep negotiating, but officials said they did not expect any breakthrough in this round of talks, being held at a resort in the lake country of Minnesota.

The trade ministers reported after the first session Thursday morning that significant progress was being made in other areas, particularly a U.S. effort to speed up the process for settling trade disputes before the 96-member General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade, or GATT, the Geneva-based organization which governs world trade.

The GATT is conducting the current round of trade liberalization talks, known as the Uruguay round. Because they were launched at a conference in that country in 1986.

However, there are fears that the dispute over agriculture has become so contentious that it could jeopardize progress in other areas.

Dukakis backs \$115 million in new Massachusetts taxes

 Massachusetts Gov. Michael Dukakis announced his backing Thursday for \$115 million in new taxes to "make sure the state's fiscal base is solid and strong" and also freed questions about his administration's acquisition of land for a new prison a deal now under scrutiny by the FBI.

Ambassador Jean Kirkpatrick while an independent group called "Americans for Bush" announced plans to spend \$10 million supporting him in the presidential campaign. Jesse Jackson said he's made up his mind about the Democratic vice-presidential nomination but won't reveal his decision unless asked by Dukakis. Making two long-awaited fiscal decisions early in the campaign announcement to the Republicans, the Democratic governor announced he

had signed a \$40 million cigarette tax and favored raising another \$75 million by bringing the Massachusetts tax code in line with federal tax law changes. Dukakis said he had balanced nine state budgets, a record he characterized as in "sharp contrast" to that of the Reagan administration. "I think the people of this state and the people of this country can recognize when someone is talking about fiscal responsibility and someone who

is doing it," Dukakis told a Statehouse news conference. The Massachusetts Constitution requires the governor to balance the budget although Dukakis has twice inherited deficits. In statements issued in Washington and Boston, the FBI acknowledged it has opened a preliminary inquiry to determine if federal laws were violated in connection with a proposal to place a new state prison in New Braintree, Mass. "Gov. Michael Dukakis is not the

subject of an investigation," FBI spokeswoman Kathy Bradford said in Washington. Residents of the rural community of 800 people waged a bitter fight against placement of the medium-security prison in their area and some opponents have contended that the current owners of the 200-acre parcel had inside information that the property would be chosen as the site of the new prison.

 on the mountain between 1977 and 1987 was \$8.5 million. Investment through 1988 will reach \$17.5 million, including \$6 million for three high-speed detachable quad chairlifts now under construction, he said. Investment in the resort has also exceeded profits there, he said. The excess profits since 1977 on the company's total operations, including the mountain, come to \$11.9 million. The total amount of investment through 1988 will be \$41 million, he said. Gibson said he would like to see all that investment.

Gibson's group also accuses Sun Valley Co. of restraint of trade. It asserts that having a monopoly on the area ski activity in conjunction with operating lodging and dining facilities at the Sun Valley Lodge allows the company to offer total vacation packages with reduced room rates that no other local business can compete with. Gibson was unwilling to go so far as to say that Sun Valley Co. should then give up either its lease on Bald Mountain or sell all its lodging facilities. Both Holding and Sun Valley Co. general manager Wally Huffman said those charges are false. Their operation offers the same reduced lift rate package to every other lodging establishment that it uses, Huffman said.

"We subsidize wholesalers coming in no matter where they stay," Holding said. The company has done nothing to take away business from the community, he added. It has built no additional restaurants, condominiums or rooms. Holding's final strike at RSVP was to announce that he will not meet with the group at any time, as it has requested. "Our relationship is with the Forest Service and this community. It would be to no one's benefit to meet with them," he said. "We aren't changing any of our plans because of an RSVP group, or whatever the initials are." Gibson said RSVP members will study the financial figures released by the Sun Valley Co. before deciding their next course of action.

Even the congressmen whose names have been pulled in by Justice Department or investigative leakers as potentially of interest to investigators are not the best known on Capitol Hill — Democrats William Chappell Jr. of Florida; Roy Dayton of Maryland; Thomas J. Downey and Samuel S. Stratton, both of New York; and Republican Andy Ireland of Florida. Aides to those five point out that even the leakers don't say they're under investigation at this time. Federal prosecutor Henry Hudson publicly says no one on the Hill is now a target.

This is as close as a Washington scandal came to catnip for politicians. As Texas Gov. chairman George Strake told the Dallas Times Herald, "Every morning when I wake up, I run out to get the paper and see what the scandal of the day is, whether it's on them or us." The defense lawyer also offered some cautionary words for those tempted to translate leaks and FBI search warrant affidavits into automatic convictions. "It's a specific federal crime if you trade inside information on Wall Street, but there is a sensitive information flow between the Pentagon and its contractors that is not only legal but even encouraged. Only in certain circumstances is that illegal," he said. The leakers have crowded over how unguarded their targets were as government agents secretly monitored their telephone calls and office conversations. But this lawyer, who has heard similar government tapes before, said, "They may not have tapes that are that clear and what they are hearing may be legal or illegal depending on the intent involved."

Based on his experience, this lawyer said, "The people hemorrhaging information now are the ones who know the least. The ones who know the most don't talk at this stage."

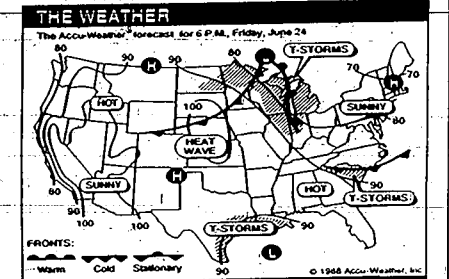

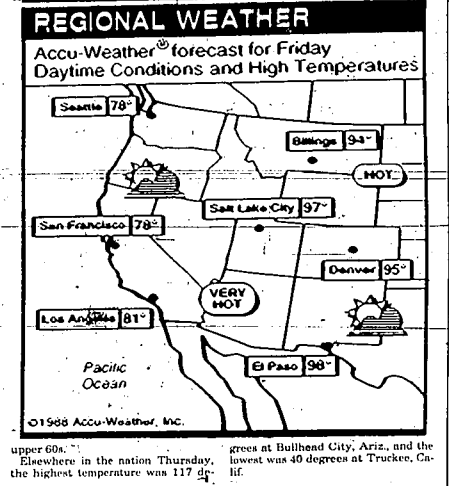

Boyfriend charged in girl's death

CALDWELL (AP) — The boyfriend of a Caldwell girl stabbed to death at the College of Idaho was arraigned on a charge of first-degree murder Thursday before 3rd District Magistrate Juneal Kerrick.

A second hearing for Steve Waddell, 18, Caldwell, to determine bond was scheduled for Friday.

He was charged in the death of Michelle Sebree, 17. She died of multiple stab wounds in a girls' dorm room at College of Idaho after an apparent fight with Waddell, a boyfriend of two years with whom she was breaking off the relationship.

Canyon County Prosecutor Richard Harris said he decided to pursue a first-degree murder charge because of the nature of the crime.

Sebree, who was attending a conference for gifted students, died Thursday morning, said Caldwell Police Lt. Ellen Erskine.

Waddell is a 1988 graduate of Vallivue High School, while Sebree would have started her senior year this fall.

Witnesses reported hearing an altercation in the girl's dorm room about 10:20 a.m., then seeing Waddell standing over her with a bloody pocketknife in his hand, Erskine said.

The knife used in the killing had a blade between three inches and four inches long, but police had not located the weapon late Wednesday.

Waddell was listed in "serious condition at St. Alphonsus, where he was being treated for a drug overdose and shock.

An hour after the stabbing was reported, Waddell went to Treasure Valley Livestock, where his father is employed. Waddell's father took him to West Valley Medical Center in Caldwell. He was then transported to St. Alphonsus, where a guard watched his room.

The more than 60 honor students from Idaho attending a two-week writing conference huddled in small groups outside the dormitory following the killing.

Mountain forest fire spreads to 40 acres

DEADWOOD SUMMIT (AP) — A mountain forest fire near here grew to 40 acres Thursday afternoon, spurred by hot temperatures and dropping humidity.

About 110 firefighters battled the blaze, in heavily wooded mountainous area just south of Deadwood Summit in the Boise National Forest.

The fire, believed to be spawned by lightning Wednesday afternoon, "is the largest fire we've had this early in the year since 1979," when the state was hit by one of its worst fire seasons ever, National Forest spokesman Frank Carroll said.

Fire bosses were trying to get a line around the blaze, using a water-dumping helicopter on hot spots. But with daytime temperatures running near the 90s and humidity low, Carroll said no containment target had been set.

No structures or stock were in immediate danger from the fire, which was about 20 miles east of Cascade.

Carroll said individual alpine fires crowned Thursday morning, and flames were spotting outside the main

area of the blaze.

Land managers have been bracing for a severe fire season this summer because of the extremely dry conditions in the forests due to the state's second straight year of drought.

The fire was near the area of the forest where flames blackened 63,000 acres of timbered wildlands last year, burning for some two months before fall snows finally doused them. The fire was in such a remote area that fire bosses decided to let it burn because of the cost of suppressing it.

Andrus unveils development plan

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — Gov. Cecil Andrus has unveiled a new program designed to provide focused technical assistance to local community development efforts.

In a speech prepared for the Association of Idaho Cities convention, Thursday Andrus announced the new "Gem Communities" program. It will be designed to build a lasting ability in local government to meet economic development challenges.

Areas taking part in the "Gem Communities" program will receive training in organizing economic development efforts, principles of development, strategic planning, community assessment, retention and expansion and economic diversification strategies.

The Idaho Department of Commerce estimates that a community can complete the training programs in 6 to 12 months. The major commitment will be volunteer time, with little other cost, the department said.

The deadline for submitting applications is Sept. 2.

Regulators Committee to allow grazing to replace flat-rates

BOISE (AP) — State regulators have agreed to change the way long-distance telephone companies pay local exchanges to handle in-state long-distance calls among the three Idaho market areas.

But in replacing its five-year-old flat-rate charge with one based on usage, the Public Utilities Commission has warned the telephone industry that it will not condone attempts to significantly shift the burden of so-called nontraffic-sensitive costs to basic telephone service bills.

The commission is not blind to the possibility that some may interpret this move ... as a green light to resurrect the previous proposals to shift more, or even 100 percent, of nontraffic-sensitive costs to local service," the PUC order said.

The access charge is used to cover part of the local exchange companies' costs that cannot be directly linked to providing basic service, the so-called nontraffic-sensitive costs.

In 1983, the commission imposed the flat-rate charge based on the capacity of a local exchange rather than how much the access was used by customers. It made the decision on the assumptions that AT&T would be the only long-distance company in the state and the federal government would carry out its plan to add a significant charge to basic service for long-distance access.

AMERICAN FALLS (AP) — The state Agricultural Stabilization Committee's yen to grazing but nay to haying won't offer much help for drought-pressured cattlemen seeking cattle feed, experts say.

The local ASCS office asked permission to cut hay and graze land set

aside under federal programs to supplement BLM and other pasture that is drying up in the drought. Power County has approximately 2,000 acres of usable grassland set aside.

The grazing petition will be passed on to Washington, where the final decision will be made next week.

Idaho must preserve the authority to manage its streams

The use and control of Idaho's water has been and will continue to be one of the most important issues facing our state.

Traditionally, Idaho public officials have spoken with one voice, united in their determination to maintain control over our rivers and streams.

In recent weeks, there has been much discussion about who should control our water resources. And too much political rhetoric. It is time to set the record straight. Once and for all.

My opponent has suggested that I do not care about maintaining state control of water rights. Nothing is farther from the truth. Apparently, he either is not well-informed on this subject or has decided to play partisan politics with one of our precious natural resources.

Idaho and its people do not deserve and cannot afford to play this kind of political game. The best interests of the state must be placed ahead of any political consideration.

Water is truly the lifeblood of Idaho's economy. We cannot afford to give the federal government an opportunity to interfere with state decisions on water allocation and stream

flows. My position on this issue is very clear. Any water right established must be done under Idaho law through the state appropriation process.

Idaho is very fortunate to have in place a State Water Plan which serves as a guiding document in water resource management decisions. This plan is in the public interests and has served us well over the years.

The state also has initiated a major effort to identify and determine what water rights exist in the Snake River Basin and to confirm them through the court system. I believe the adjudication process is the appropriate vehicle to quantify various water rights.

In addition to the State Water Plan and adjudication process, the Swan Falls Water Rights Agreement will play an important role in water resource decisions and serve as a sound management plan for the Snake River. However, before the agreement could be implemented, it required both state and federal approval.

The Federal Energy Regulatory Commission's (FERC) failure to take action on the agreement had left Idaho water users in a state of uncertainty. A legislative solution became necessary to resolve this longstanding dispute. Late last year, the Congress approved a bill mandating federal approval of the water rights agreement.

The passage of the Swan Falls measure does not jeopardize the traditional state right to control its water resources. In my view, it is deliberately and specifically neutral on water rights and jurisdiction issues. The legislation does not transfer control of the Snake River to the federal government.

Furthermore, the bill and study provision were agreed to by the principal players, including Governor Andrus, Attorney General Jones, Senator McClure, Congressman Craig, and Idaho Power Company. All parties involved agreed to the study as a necessary step to get the bill passed.

Regarding the study provision, the bill states that FERC is given no authority to take any action based upon the findings, recommendations, results, or conclusions of the

study. In short, the commission is given no new power to either implement or enforce the study.

Once again, it appears my opponent's criticism is nothing more than an effort to divert attention from his own poor record on the Swan Falls issue - a record that takes as many turns as the Snake River. He has cast his votes on both sides of the issue, walked away from a critical vote, and then attempted to take credit for "crafting" the legislation.

It also has been stated by my opponent that the State of Idaho would have been better off without a Swan Falls bill. This opinion has little public support. Without a legislative solution, there would have been years of litigation and a continued moratorium on processing water rights applications. In short, thousands of water rights permits and applications pending before the Idaho Department of Water Resources would remain tied up.

As the Congress considers various legislative proposals, the federal government must respect state water rights laws. In a recent letter to Attorney General Jim Jones, I reaffirmed my support for state control over our

water resources.

Current concern over water rights language in the City of Rocks and Hagerman Fossil Beds legislation was significantly slowed the progress of both bills. Even though there were appeals to me to amend the bill, I strongly support Senator McClure's language and have indicated that I will oppose any attempt to delete the current water rights provision.

It is imperative that we continue our efforts to preserve state authority and management over Idaho rivers and streams. By working together, we can help ensure that Idaho continues its effective stewardship of the Snake River and our water resources.

There is not a politician in the state who would do anything to compromise Idaho water. By creating a controversy over the water rights issue, the real losers are the people of Idaho. Our water resources are too important to be held hostage by partisan politics. Idahoans expect more from their congressional candidates, and they deserve no less.

Drama in Moscow has wide audience

President Reagan, in rooting for a victory by Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev over old-guard opposition to his reform program, has done everything but wear a Gorbachev campaign button.

Predictably, right-wingers are suggesting that Reagan was taken in by those slickers in Moscow - and by his own State Department.

Caution is always in order, of course. When dealing with the Soviet Union, but it is important to note that the president's willingness to see Gorbachev as a new kind of Soviet leader, one whose success is important to the West as well as to the Soviet people, is shared by some folk who are anything but naive.

Aldrei D. Sakharov and Alexander Dubcek, for example.

Sakharov, the Soviet H-bomb builder who turned dissident and became a human-rights champion, continues to campaign for the release of political prisoners, and just last month criticized the Kremlin's handling of unrest in Armenia. But in a press conference last week he strongly reiterated his support for Gorbachev's reform program and his confidence in the Soviet leader's commitment to greater respect for human rights.

Gorbachev listened to his explanation of the then-emerging ideas of the Prague Spring. The future Soviet leader expressed his frustration with the centralized, Stalinist system of economic management and his disappointment at the lack of reform.

"Gorbachev is a man who is capable of throwing out dogmas that have been in effect for decades," Mlynar told the Washington Post. "I trust him."

Most Western experts, initially skeptical, are now convinced that Gorbachev is sincerely dedicated to the creation of a new, more liberal and less threatening form of communist rule. But they still question whether he can overcome opposition from bureaucrats and party officials who do not fancy losing their powers and perks.

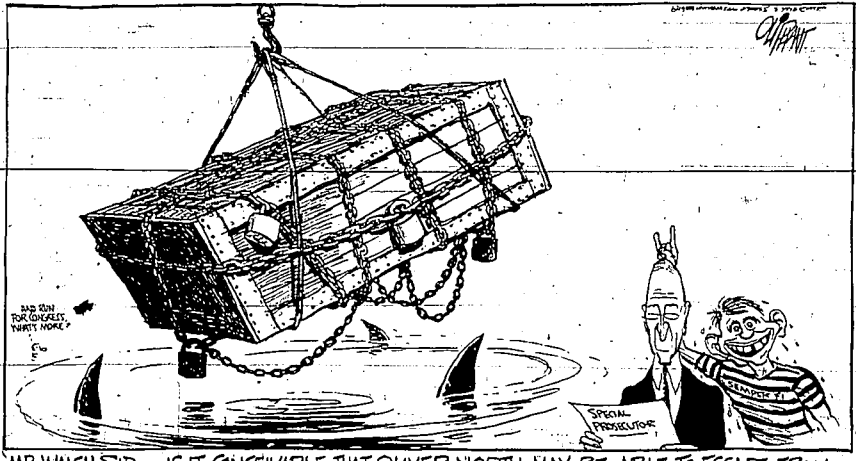
Something of a showdown will come later this month when a Communist Party conference, called by Gorbachev to give perestroika a powerful shove, meets in Moscow.

Any forebodings may or may not be justified. But Michel Tatu, a sober-minded French Kremlinologist, doesn't rule out the possibility of a palace coup. However, he thinks this unlikely because, after all that Gorbachev has done to win favorable opinion abroad, foreign reaction to his ouster "would be disastrous" to Soviet interests.

But another suggestion that cannot be ruled out, Tatu suggests, is a fatal "accident" that would "allow the reformer to be buried with full honors while his successor proclaims the slogans perestroika and glasnost loud and clear" - but goes back to business as usual.

There is, in any event, little that the West can do to affect the outcome of the drama being played out in the Soviet Union. But it wouldn't hurt to cross our fingers and join Ronald Reagan in wishing Gorbachev luck.

Kitty worries over jam at shower time

BROOKLINE, Mass. - Things are still relatively normal on Perry Street.

The fledgling tomato plants are growing in front of the brick house in this middle-class neighborhood. Kitty Dukakis comes to the door dressed in a T-shirt and blue jeans.

You have to look a bit closer to see the differences a year can make. Secret Service men now ask to X-ray the gift box on the porch. Media cars now roll up in planned sequence.

Not long ago, when a man came for an interview, he asked Kitty incredulously, "This is wealthy Brookline?" The woman who may move to the White House in January still talks wistfully about her wish for another full bathroom at home.

"It gets a little testy when there are six of us in the house and we have to figure out showers in the morning."

For Kitty Dukakis, the outspoken and intense wife of the next Democratic candidate for President, these are a few weeks of enforced leisure. She has been sidelined by surgery. A piece of her hipbone is now lodged in her neck under the high surgical collar.

Yet these are also weeks when the country will start, slowly, in the up-close-and-personal politics of our day, getting to know her. Getting to know Kitty and Mike as a couple. Everything normal about the Dukakis marriage, even their differences, will become enlarged in the public eye. In the process of going public, the last of the Perry Street privacy may get lost.

What is already known, fixed in print about their complexities?

Mike Dukakis is Greek Orthodox, the son of a doctor. Kitty is Jewish, the daughter of a musician. They met when she was a young divorced mother with small child.

Mike is an optimist. Kitty is, she says, braced

for the worst. Mike is an ardent nonsmoker, Kitty a recidivist smoker. He is frugal (to put it kindly) or cheap (honestly). She is, well, not. On the kitchen table where she writes, is a checkbook for her separate bank account. "It's the one piece of advice my mother gave me before I married Michael," she says with a smile.

"The Dukakis are, undoubtedly, more diverse than the couples on their separate bank accounts. "He's calm and cool and cerebral and I'm intense, and much more emotional." He is serenely confident - to a flaw? - and she is "still working on it." When they go to a campaign event together, he will remember what was said, she will remember, as well, what was unsaid.

As for their marriage? There is no adoring stare in Kitty Dukakis' marital repertoire. Nor does she consider herself a political partner. She is strong-minded with serious interests of her own - especially in Cambodian and other refugees and in the protection of open space.

But in this era when male-female relationships have become a subtle piece of the political landscape, their strong marriage, modern style, is likely to be an asset. The parts of Mike Dukakis' life that caused some snickering among the old boys on Beacon Hill ten years ago - his insistence on being home for dinner, his familiarity with a vacuum cleaner and a PTA meeting - may show others especially women, that he understands their lives.

"When we started off, there was one working

mother on this street," remembers Kitty, a lifetime resident of this streetcar suburb. "There is nobody who isn't working now. And our street is a kind of microcosm of where this country is going. We've got blue-collar workers and professors, a real mixture."

About her husband's high standing with women in the gender gap polls she says, "You can't find a real commitment to women. A lot of women will come up to me and say, the way your husband treats you personally is something I respond to. I think it's all a part of a piece."

But is this would-be first lady prepared for what comes next? Is this worrier ready for the spotlight on everything from their garden to their three grown children? As governor's wife Kitty Dukakis has had her share of criticism. "I think in the past I've been more volatile than is acceptable," she says carefully. Imperious, pushy, the Dragon Lady of Brookline, charged one relentless press critic. Admittedly traumatized by these attacks, she now says they toughened her. But not very much.

For now, though, Kitty Dukakis is recuperating in the relative quiet of her home, dipping into a book about the first ladies, marveling at Eleanor Roosevelt, thinking about our national "ambivalence" to the women in the White House. And also thinking about normalcy.

"When I came home from the hospital, Michael brought my suitcase in," she recounts. "There was my husband who was the nominee for President not only unpacking my stuff but folding it and putting it away. I was laughing, and Mike said, 'What's so funny?' I said, 'How many other candidates for President would do that?' It was so normal." On Perry Street, normalcy is about to become a rare and prized commodity.

Sales policy not fair, stupid

The Feds are at it again!

I represent a group of clients who, I grant you, are no better than they should be. They were convicted of smuggling aliens and, during that investigation, had four of their vehicles impounded by the Immigration and Naturalization Service.

I lost a trial at which my clients vehicle owners tried to get back their three pickups and one passenger car. Nonetheless, my clients asked if they could "buy" back the vehicles.

Justified this wish on to the Feds, who promised to let me know when the auction would take place. On June 16, a U.S. marshal phoned me to say that it was the "policy" of the Marshal Service net to self-forfeited property back to owners.

(b) As anyone who watches TV news knows, the feds are merrily selling back yachts to rich dope-users whose boats, as my clients' pickups, could legally be forfeit to the government.

While I cannot minimize my clients' misdeeds, I believe that smuggling undocumented aliens across the border to harvest crops on Idaho farms is intrinsically less evil than smuggling narcotics.

The result of this uneven application of the law is that my clients - who are not wealthy - lose their property and have no chance to buy it back at full price, while the owner of the infamous "Monkey Business" pays what amounts to a modest fine and keeps his yacht.

(c) Since three of the vehicles are customized, my clients would pay more for the damned things than anyone else in the civilized world.

The policy, it seems, has deprived the U.S. government of somewhere between \$100 and \$1000, depending upon the enthusiasm my clients would have displayed at the auction.

I realize that this is not the end of the world, but it seems to me both unfair, and stupid to treat wealthy wrongdoers more leniently than poor wrongdoers and, in the process, cost the U.S. government money.

Convoy arrives in Washington

WASHINGTON (AP) - Thirty rickety trucks and buses comprising the Veterans Peace Convoy circled the White House on Thursday to protest administration opposition to their mission of delivering the vehicles and tons of food, medicine and clothing to Nicaragua.

The convoy arrived in Washington from Laredo, Texas, where officials seized four vehicles and barred the group from crossing into Mexico without posting bond and signing an agreement that the aging school buses and pickup trucks would be returned to the United States.

"We have come to take care of the children of Nicaragua," said convoy organizer Gerry Condon of San Francisco. "We intend to lobby and gain support for this convoy to pass. We want to feed the children, not the war."

Rep. Mickey Leland, D-Texas, expressed support for the group with a resolution introduced in Congress on Wednesday that the treasury secretary should not regulate the donation of articles to relieve humanitarian suffering in Nicaragua.

Rowan won't face charges

WASHINGTON (AP) - Syndicated columnist Carl T. Rowan will not be charged with assault after shooting a youth who had taken a pre-dawn dip in his backyard swimming pool, the U.S. attorney's office said Thursday.

Instead, prosecutors reinstated charges of unlawful entry against Benjamin N. Smith, 18, of suburban Chevy Chase, Md., and a companion, 19-year-old Laura Bachman of Bethesda, Md.

Smith, who suffered a wrist wound in the June 14 incident, and Bachman pleaded innocent to the misdemeanor charge before a District of Columbia Superior Court hearing commissioner. Trial was scheduled for Aug. 18.

U.S. Attorney Jay B. Stephens said his office found insufficient evidence to warrant an assault charge against Rowan but believed he should be charged with possession of an unregistered firearm.

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Dennis Day, the Irish tenor best known as "Mr. Benny's" sidekick, was remembered Thursday as a loving man devoted to helping himself and others battle Lou Gehrig's disease.

Day, whose trademarks were the line "Go, Mr. Benny" and skits in which he tricked the comedian into letting him unleash his singing voice, died at 71 late Wednesday night at his Bel Air Estates home.

He had never fully recovered from a fall 12 months ago, and returned home after treatment this week at St. John's Hospital and Health Center in Santa Monica.

The cause of death was pneumonia, said his mother-in-law, Margaret Almqvist.

"I'm very, very saddened by Dennis' death," said comedian Jerry Lewis, national chairman of the Muscular Dystrophy Association, for which Day worked. "He was a great friend to me and to so many during his life. When he found out that he had ALS - the disease that led inexorably to his death - he put all the remaining energy he had into helping MDA fight this tragic disorder."

Doctors discovered last summer that Day had amyotrophic lateral sclerosis.

Koop wants U.S. focus on health

WASHINGTON (AP) — Surgeon General C. Everett Koop, best known for his battles against the dangers of AIDS and smoking, said Thursday the nation should rethink the way it deals with medicine in general.

"It is a strange paradox in our health system," Koop told a congressional panel. "We recognize that the promotion of good health and the prevention of disease is the way to go. We recognize that it is every effective and we recognize that it is very cheap."

"But we tend not to pay for it," Koop, appearing before the health subcommittee of the Joint Economic Committee, said he

wanted to focus on "over-arching issues" in keeping with the panel's series of hearings into the future of health care in America.

There are three such issues facing the nation, said Koop:

- The future relationship between technology and health care.
- The changing relationship between the public and the health care system.
- Potential changes in how society's values affect support for the health system.

On the first, he said, Americans are "preoccupied with health and they love to read about it and the high-tech things are glamorous."

Rear lap belts pose greater risk

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rear-seat lap belts expose victims of car crashes to greater risk of paralysis or death than lap-and-shoulder restraints, according to a study released Thursday by product-liability lawyers.

The Institute for Injury Reduction, a Dunkirk, Md., organization founded this year by attorneys involved in product-injury litigation, presented the study at a hearing of the House government activities and transportation subcommittee.

"In a crash after crash, children and adults are dying, being rendered paraplegic or quadriplegic or suffering disabling injuries to their abdominal organs while wearing only rear-seat lap belts," A. Benjamin Kelley, president of the institute, testified.

The tests commissioned by the institute were conducted by Automotive Safety Testing Inc. of East Liberty, Ohio.

Study advances end to deafness

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two studies of key cells in the inner ear of birds suggests a possibility of developing therapy to correct deafness in people, such as President Reagan, caused by exposure to loud noises.

In companion studies published Friday in the journal Science, teams of researchers report that after exposure to traumatic levels of noise both adult quails and young chickens are able to regrow damaged cells that are essential to hearing. The studies suggest that there is a hormone or protein secreted by the damaged cells

that causes a growth of the new, replacement cells.

"This is a truly new finding," said Edward W. Rubel of the University of Washington, co-author of a study using adult quail. "We have not found a cure for deafness, but we have found something in the ear of birds that we haven't before thought possible."

"We can't yet show that it happens in quails or humans," but the discovery offers a theoretical possibility of correcting one type of deafness in humans, said Douglas A. Conchne, an assistant professor at Boston University's school of medicine, who conducted inner ear studies using baby chickens.

Both of the bird studies concentrated on an inner ear organ called the cochlea, a key part of the hearing process. The researchers discovered that when sensory cells within the bird cochlea are destroyed by loud noise, some chemical process causes the growth of new cells, apparently restoring a key link in the hearing process.

In the hearing process, sound waves cause the ear drum to vibrate,

Tom Wallner, associate regional administrator of the U.S. Health Care Financing Administration's Division of Health Standards and Quality in Seattle, said the state is not penalizing deficient care among some of the 258 providers of health care.

The conflict is outlined in 21 docu-

ments, dating from October 1986 to this month, obtained from the HCFA by the Idaho Statesman through the Freedom of Information Act.

The state rejects the allegations. Rep. Richard Stallings, D-Idaho, intervened in March, calling on Wallner to end "the continual harassment from the federal government," but was rebuffed.

Among facilities inspected by the state was a condition of receiving more than \$100 million a year in Medicaid and Medicare funds are

hospitals, nursing homes, homes for the mentally retarded, laboratories, outpatient surgery centers and providers of home nursing care.

Richard Schultz, administrator of the Idaho Division of Welfare, said the regulators he oversees are fulfilling their duty. "I don't think we're soft."

Schultz said Idaho does not want to give up its regulatory control, although he has told Wallner that if the federal government fails to make some accommodations, that

may occur.

The HCFA, which administers the Medicaid and Medicare programs, pays the state \$620,000 a year to inspect federally-funded institutions. Certification for funding is subject to review by the HCFA, which has been overturning Idaho recommendations more and more. Among them: a state approval of the Idaho State School and Hospital's operations for mentally and physically disabled in Nampa.

Wallner said the HCFA could contract with other states or with private inspectors if the inspection agreement with Idaho ends, but he said it would be an unprecedented move in the program's 23-year history.

In his toughest message, Wallner wrote to Schultz on Feb. 2: "While I hope the state wishes to continue to work with us in these programs, the state is free to terminate its agreement with us if compliance

with federal requirements is not possible or is too distasteful.

Bureau management leans toward a softer approach which most often depends on gaining the cooperation of deficient facilities and provides little penalty for deficient performance," Wallner wrote.

While praising the staff at the state Bureau of Facility Standards, Wallner wrote that management goes easy on providers.

Rush goes to drought conference

BOISE (AP) - Dick Rush, director of the Idaho Department of Agriculture, was the state's representative at a drought conference in Chicago Thursday, sponsored by the National Governors' Association.

Gov. Cecil Andrus said he asked Rush to point out that the national drought demonstrates once again the need for effective farm programs. Farmers cannot handle the financial losses caused by uncontrollable factors such as drought, the governor said.

To protect our nation's food supply and to maintain our foreign markets, the U.S. Department of Agriculture must move quicker and more decisively.

"Agriculture is Idaho's number one industry and we are faced with a major crisis," Andrus said in a statement. "The importance of Idaho agriculture compels us to be represented at the conference."

Richard Lyng, secretary of Agriculture, will speak to the drought conference and a panel of national experts will give background on the drought and its impact. Ten drought-stricken states are sending delegates.

"The unseasonably hot weather so early this year is intensifying the drought problem in Idaho," said Andrus. "Some increased losses will be equal to those in the Midwest. Statewide, however, Idaho is in somewhat better shape than those states."

The governor said the water supply is not expected to change significantly.

Resignation won't affect research

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) - The departure of artificial heart pioneer William C. DeVries from Humana Heart Institute International will not affect research on the mechanical pump, a spokesman said Thursday.

DeVries' research on the device will continue at Humana Hospital-Audubon, where the institute is based, hospital spokesman Tom Grissom said.

"We don't anticipate any change at all at Audubon," he said.

Dr. Allan M. Lansing, director and chairman of the institute, received a letter of resignation last week from DeVries, Grissom said. The institute's advisory board met Monday night and accepted the resignation, which was effective that day, Grissom said.

"I think Dr. DeVries was concerned that in the minds of the public it wasn't clear that there were still independent physicians, cardiologists and surgeons who were practicing medicine rather than all of that having to flow through the Heart Institute," Grissom said.

DeVries' resignation as the institute's physician consultant in cardiovascular surgery was announced in a news release Thursday.

Lansing and DeVries had reviewed the release and had no further comment, Grissom said.

Last June, DeVries announced he was leaving Lansing's private practice group to establish his own surgical practice.

The institute will no longer have a part in artificial heart research, Grissom said.

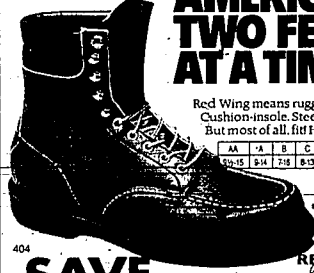

Profit taking sends stocks into retreat

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market retreated slightly Thursday in moderate trading, weakened by investors cashing in on profits from the strong gains of the previous two sessions.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrial stocks, which had risen nearly 70 points over Tuesday and Wednesday to its highest level since the October crash, lost 3.91 points to close at 2,148.29. Broader indexes were largely lower.

Some traders were disheartened by what they called the market's failure to sustain the momentum of a rally that began two days earlier. They said it reflected a reluctance by a broad range of investors to commit significant money to the market for a prolonged period.

Others were more optimistic and said the slight retreat should be regarded as a sign of underlying strength.

Some traders said they expected

large institutional investors and money managers to put cash into stocks over the next several sessions to bolster portfolios before the quarter ends June 30. That development likely would raise prices.

In addition, they said foreigners likely will be increasingly attracted to U.S. stocks if the dollar's strength is maintained. That would be another positive for the stock market.

Declining issues outnumbered advances by about an 8-to-7 ratio in nationwide trading of New York Stock Exchange-listed stocks, with 803 issues down, 708 up and 473 unchanged.

Volume on the floor of the NYSE totaled 185.77 million shares, down from 197.4 million on Thursday.

Jerome passes 1st test for development grants

TWIN FALLS - Jerome had not Twin Falls, has cleared the first hurdle to obtaining government grants needed to finance local economic expansion.

The state Economic Advisory Council, meeting in Post Falls, has asked the cities of Pocatello, Jerome and Meridian along with Bonneville County to resubmit full applications for Community Development Block Grants.

"These communities will be expected to fine tune their costs in the full application process," state officials said. The ultimate decision on the award of the grants will be made by Gov. Cecil Andrus.

The four were selected from nine applications.

Jerome is requesting \$269,000 for some sewage collection improvements for a planned industrial park south of town across from the Tupperware plant.

Bridon West, a cordage manufacturer, plans to move into the park when services are ready. Magic Valley Cheese Inc., a specialty cheese company to be started by Utah developers, is also planning a plant in the park.

Twin Falls was seeking a \$250,000 grant to help fund expansion of its sewer treatment plant.

The city council is considering whether to build an on-site anaerobic treatment facility on the property of Universal Frozen Foods, the plant's

biggest customer, or add capacity to the existing treatment plant.

City Manager Tom Courtney said funding for the expansion, which could cost as much as \$4 million, will come from a portion of the city's \$1.6 million reserves and from the proceeds of a \$3.4 million lawsuit or from bonds.

"That's going to set us back a little," said Gary Young, city engineer. "We need the expansion."

Young said the city would explore other possibilities of funding. "We may be able to come up with something else," he said.

Pocatello is seeking \$500,000 to rehabilitate a commercial building that would be used by Domsen Farms of Washington state for a \$2.3-million trout

and salmon processing plant. Domsen has made relocation of its operation from Washington state to Pocatello contingent on the government assistance.

Proposed industrial park developments spurred the request from Meridian for \$500,000 and Bonneville County is seeking \$170,000 for a business incubator development.

The council designated Shoshone County, seeking \$500,000 for purchasing the Bunker Hill water system, as a stand-by project to be considered if one of the initial four is rejected.

Others seeking grants were: American Falls, \$371,000 for recreational area development; Nampa, \$220,000 for down-

town development; and Owyhee County, \$66,000 for community building rehabilitation.

"The department is committed to working with the remaining four communities on finding alternate sources of funding, reevaluation of the project's scope and additional means of moving those projects forward in a positive manner," said Wayne Forrey of the Division of Community Development.

Commerce Department Director James Hawkins said the number of applications for the available grant money was a positive sign of a growing state economy and also a demonstration of the need for additional ways of financing economic development projects.

Mueller studies farming problems

TWIN FALLS - Idaho Rural Council President Walt Mueller will soon be bringing the gospel of international cooperation and production limits to family farmers.

"The old concept - the concept of the 1986 Farm Bill - is just not working," Mueller said. "We're losing too many people on the farms."

IBC represents and advocates for family farms. Mueller is a Twin Falls County farmer and is also a Democrat running for the legislative seat being vacated by Sen. Darrel McRoberts, R-Twin Falls.

Mueller attended an International Trade Conference in Brainerd, Minn., June 20 and 21. He said 200 participants arrived from at least eight countries including Canada, Japan and members of the European Economic Community.

"I was going to see how our farm problems compare to others around the world," Mueller said. He said the basic solution voiced was one of coordinating farm production internationally, through supply quotas, so that countries with cheap labor and conglomerates with mass production don't elbow family farmers aside.

"Apparently oversupply is a problem worldwide. Even though there are starving people, supplies are not getting where they belong," said Mueller. He referred to India becoming a net exporter, despite continuing starvation within that country.

Solutions focused on setting internationally agreed upon levels of farm production, so that countries and companies with cheaper workforces are hindered from dumping commodities across their borders.

Chicken rustlers leave just 1 lonely chicken

RUPERT - About 12 miles north of here, a lonely chicken - a very, very lonely chicken - scratches the dirt and wonders where everyone has gone.

Not too long ago, he had 174 other chickens to frolic with. They sat gravel together, clucked together, pecked each other's beaks. But bad things happened to them. Fourteen died, and last week the other 160 were stolen.

So now the chicken roasts alone, rejected both by death and chicken rustlers.

"It's a strange one all right," Minidoka County Deputy Sheriff Steven Benkula said. "It's not one that happens everyday."

The chicken's owner, Minico High School student Stephen Kunzler, was raising the broilers as part of a Future Farmers of America project. Kunzler earlier won an FFA poultry proficiency award for raising so many birds, but now he's down to the single, black and white speckled chicken.

"It's pretty lonely," Kunzler said. "He seems to be the survivor."

The chickens, bought in early April, were stolen between June 12 and 18, Benkula said. The broiler burglar apparently stole

between 20 and 30 chickens a night.

Kunzler's father, Mark, said the mixed-breed chickens were enclosed in a converted dairy barn. When the thefts started, the Kunzlers secured the shed so that anyone wanting to get in had to go around the back.

But it didn't work. The next time the burglar simply knocked the door down.

"You can see where they backed up to the door. They just loaded 'em up and away they went," the father said.

Benkula said there's a list of fowl crimes is still under investigation. "We have a theory,

Symms: Wild lands for 'bears and bugs'

Senator believes Idaho already has enough wilderness

TWIN FALLS - U.S. Sen. Steve Symms said Thursday he has not yet begun lobbying congressmen to oppose Idaho's wilderness bill, but he would not rule out aggressive dissent in the future.

At the same time, Symms commended fellow Republican Sen. James McClure and Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus for hammering out the compromise legislation, while blaming "environmental extremists" for the bill's potential defeat.

Also during a teleconference interview with Idaho journalists, Symms called the nationwide drought serious, but not a situation for panic. He called it an opportunity to get the government out of the grain business.

Symms repeated his opposition to the Idaho Forest Management Act for creating 1.4 million more acres of wilderness in a state that he feels already features enough roadless areas. He instead advocates multiple uses for federal lands.

Referring to 161,100-acre Malheur-Larkins area in Harney and Clearwater national forests, Symms said, "I think it's outrageous to turn all that good timber into wilderness."

"Another facet of the proposal that distresses Symms is the amount of new wilderness - 165,200 acres - in Targhee National Forest's Palisades. He suggested that for every new acre designated wilderness, one should be removed from Idaho's nearly 4 million acres already carrying that label.

"Wilderness does not help tourism," said Symms, arguing that tourists visit recreation areas, not wilderness. "We save

Youth crews will work in schools, parks and Sawtooth National Forest Work program benefits Magic Valley

TWIN FALLS - Many Magic Valley communities will receive benefits this summer from youth work crews employed by the state of Idaho.

Administered by the Region IV Development Association and operated through Magic Valley Youth Services, the work crew program offers employment to low-income or disadvantaged youths while improving the appearance of local communities.

Almost 100 youths, ages 14-21, will take part in the program. Each of the 17 work crews is supervised by an adult trainer who acts as a teacher, a coach, a mentor, a counselor, said Robert Lundgren, employment and training director of Magic Valley Youth Services.

While three crews work in the South Hills on National Forest Service projects, the remaining crews work in local communities. Each community liking part in the program must submit project proposals.

"We want them working on real projects rather than just maintenance jobs," said

Lundgren. "There is a lot more self worth when they can stand back after seven weeks and look at what they've produced. There's pride of ownership."

Although the workers' \$3.35 hourly wage is provided by the federal Job Training Partnership Act, communities must cover the cost of building materials and other supplies. To date, over \$110,000 has been raised.

The 40-hour work week is only one aspect of the work crew program. Participants will also attend lectures on finding and keeping a job, and drug and alcohol abuse.

In addition, they will go on several short field trips, including a trip to a local bank. While at the bank, they will be shown how to open an account and be told the importance of maintaining a good credit rating.

"We want to prepare these kids for adulthood," said Lundgren. "This program is a whole learning process. For a lot of these kids, there's a really positive impact."

Following are the planned work crew projects: Twin Falls - The College of Southern Idaho has assigned crews to complete a nine-

acre park on the east side of campus. The college also wants crews to install redwood borders around lawn areas, construct ditch reinforcements and renovate its waterfront area.

The city of Twin Falls, the municipal golf course and the men and women's golf associations have asked crews to build a picnic shelter at the Twin Falls Municipal Golf Course. Two bridges will be constructed and several course improvements will be made.

Gooding - Gooding's East Park and playgrounds will be landscaped and their buildings renovated. Playground equipment will be installed at the State School for the Deaf and Blind and in West Park. A new shelter will also be built at West Park. A new park, Water Tank Park, will be constructed downtown.

Many contributors have provided funds and materials for these projects, including the City of Gooding, the Chamber of Commerce, the Merchants Bureau, Gooding County, the Basque Association, Valco, Gooding Lumber, and the Rotary and Opti- • See WORK on Page B2

Robbins' opponents spent over \$16,000

BOISE - The two losers in a hotly contested, three-way battle for the Republican nomination for an Idaho House of Representatives seat spent more than \$16,000 between them.

Campaign finance reports filed with the secretary of state's office show the incumbent, Rep. Jerry Callen, R-Jerome, spent just under \$12,000 in an unsuccessful effort to win the primary election.

Telephone company manager ODeen Redman, Albion, spent just over \$4,000 but finished third.

The winner, Rep. Gary Robbins, R-Dietrich, hasn't filed his post-primary report yet but said in earlier interview he spent about \$20,000.

Robbins won the GOP nomination in a large, "floating" legislative district which covers 135,000

residents of the Magic Valley. No Democrat filed.

For the latest reporting period, May 9-June 3, Callen reported contributions of \$4,689, and spending of \$10,855. He listed a \$1,389 balance in his campaign account.

Callen reported putting \$3,139 of personal funds into the campaign in the latest period, making a total of nearly \$8,000 for the election.

He received \$600 from Union Pacific Railroad and \$300 from PAC 5, an organization backing conservatives.

Redman, a political newcomer making his first bid for state office, listed \$3,000 in personal funds among his \$4,353 in contributions.

Another political newcomer who lost his first bid for office, Gordon Tronson of Boise, reported spending nearly \$8,000. • See SPENDING on Page B2

Pillsbury and Boeing, which (Montanans) are the country's leading potato producer.

He plans to begin giving presentations to area farmers about the conference.

environmental extremists (who defeat the bill by using) Idaho as a whipping boy to raise money for their organizations."

As drought and persistent high temperatures plague the national farm scene, Symms said cooler heads must prevail in administration federal programs.

"I don't think this situation is a total panic," Symms said. "It is a big deal. But the travesty and the tragedy is that there may be more food available than people think.

"This is a golden opportunity for the federal government to get out of the grain business," he added.

He said the 1985 Farm Bill "is actually working," with good price supports for Idaho's potato and sugar crops. And he said corn and wheat remain plentiful elsewhere across the country.

"I would hope this would be an opportunity to keep on selling, keep on exporting," Symms said. "Let's don't get panicked until we see how bad it is."

Officials hope for contract agreement

IDAHO FALLS (AP) - About 400 Westinghouse Idaho Nuclear Co. workers at the Idaho National Laboratory have approved a three-year contract, and officials of another contractor, EG&G Idaho, are optimistic their employees will do the same.

Contract negotiations have been under way with several contractors at INEL, a federal nuclear research center in eastern Idaho. The Westinghouse workers are the first to ratify a new contract.

Argonne National Laboratory employees planned contract negotiations late Thursday. The near-

ly 70 Argonne workers rejected a contract offer last Friday and authorized a strike.

Employees of the three contractors threatened strikes last week. WINCO and EG&G reached tentative agreements last weekend.

All three groups are represented by the Oil, Chemical and Atomic Workers Union Local 2-652.

Lynn Schwartz, WINCO vice president, would not release details of the contract but said the vote carried by a fairly good margin.

He added, however, "We still have a lot of people who aren't

too pleased."

Schwartz said the WINCO ratification brought a sigh of relief from EG&G negotiators. Their employees were scheduled to decide whether to approve a three-year contract Thursday night.

If EG&G also ratifies, Argonne negotiators were hoping for a domino effect.

"There are still a lot of upset people out there," said Duane Allen, president of Oil, Chemical and Atomic Workers Local 2-652. "There are things they like (in the contract) and things they don't like."

Yanks playing musical chairs

NEW YORK (AP) — Billy Martin's fifth stint as New York Yankees manager ended Thursday as he was replaced by Lou Piniella in yet another bizarre front-office shakeup.

Martin's stormy term ended when impatient owner George Steinbrenner again punched the panic button and made his 15th managerial change since buying the team in 1975. Martin, whose plaque at monument park in Yankee Stadium proclaimed him "A Yankee Forever," had feuded with umpires and been in a highly publicized bar fight this season.

The Yankees, leading the American League East for most of the year, just finished a 2-7 road trip and fell out of

first place when they lost their last three games to Detroit in the Tigers' final at-bat.

Piniella, whom Martin replaced as manager after last season, had resigned as general manager on May 29. He took over for Thursday night's game against Cleveland.

"I'm not an interim manager. I can tell you that," Piniella said. "I expect to be here a good while."

Piniella was given a contract extension by Steinbrenner, but he did not reveal the terms.

Martin was offered reassignment to another job, but neither that job nor Martin's inclination to take it were immediately known. Martin was not

at Yankee Stadium and was not available for comment.

In other moves, pitching coach Art Fowler, a close friend of Martin, third-base coach Cleve Boyer and "eye-in-the-sky" coach George Mitterwald were reassigned. Stan Williams replaced Fowler in the 22nd pitching coach change under Steinbrenner and Gene Michael took over for Boyer.

First-base coach Mike Ferraro, bullpen coach Jeff Torborg and hitting coach Chris Chambliss will remain with the club in their current capacities.

"Here I am, back in the frying pan again," Piniella said. "But I'm back where I belong, back on the field."

McEnroe leaves in furor

WIMBLEDON, England (AP) — In his glory days, John McEnroe played some of his greatest tennis at Centre Court at Wimbledon. On Thursday, it was the scene of some of his worst.

McEnroe, playing in the grass-court Grand Slam tournament for the first time since 1985, blew set points in the first and second sets and lost to Australian Wally Masur 5-7, 7-6, 6-3 in a second-round match that featured disputes over two crucial line calls.

"That's the best I've got to give. I quit tomorrow," said McEnroe, who won the tournament in 1981, 1983 and 1984. "It was a disgusting effort. I wouldn't have won the women's tournament the way I played today."

McEnroe was hoping to show that, at 29, after four years as a part-time player, he still has what it takes to win a major tournament. But his dream was shattered by Masur, a 25-year-old grass-court specialist ranked 64th in the world.

McEnroe has won seven Grand Slam tournament titles, the last the U.S. Open in 1984. His loss to Masur extends to nine the consecutive Grand Slam events in which he has competed without a title.

"It just shows me how much more I have to overcome," McEnroe, the No. 8 seed, said. "It's just not the guy on the other side of the net."

Masur, who had never won a set from the American in three previous matches, admitted he didn't beat a "vintage John McEnroe."

"His concentration was sporadic throughout," Masur said. "Especially in the first set; he served three double-faults in one game."

Before he took a two-year leave from Wimbledon, McEnroe was well known for arguing with officials. He did it again Thursday when he questioned the two biggest calls of the match, both of which went against him. But his outbursts damaged none of the profanity that earned him his bad-boy reputation.

The crowd appreciated the change and showed it with their applause. But McEnroe felt that bottling his emotions may have also put a lid on his instinctive style of play.

"I'm trying to fire up, but it's so carefully looked at here that it becomes a big deal."

McEnroe was the fifth men's seed to be eliminated from the tournament, and the third of the day.

Earlier, American Jim Grabb upset 11th-seeded Anders Jarryd of Sweden 3-6, 7-6, 6-3, 6-0.

"I've had some other wins over big names, but the venue of this one is a little more attractive," said Grabb, ranked 63rd in the world. Also knocked out of the tournament was No. 13 Emilio Sanchez of Spain, a 7-6, 6-3, 3-6, 0-6, 6-1 loser to Petr Korda of Czechoslovakia.

It wasn't all upsets on a hot, sunny day at the All England Club.

Fifth-seeded Jimmy Connors, a two-time champion, beat Australian teen-ager Jason Stoltenberg 7-6, 6-3, 6-3, and second-seeded Mats Wilander, seeking his third straight Grand Slam title, beat Glenn Michibata of Canada 6-2, 7-6, 6-4. Other second-round winners included third-seeded Stefan Edberg, No. 9 Miloslav Mecir and No. 16 Slobodan Zivonjovic.

Expansion teams fill rosters

NEW YORK (AP) — The Miami Heat and Charlotte Hornets concentrated on youth and wheeling and dealing Thursday instead of big names as they acquired their first players for their NBA debut next season.

The Hornets, however, did trade for Kelly Tripucka, one of the two former All-Stars to change teams. Eight were available.

The Heat made six deals with existing teams, four of them for agreeing to pick or not pick a player off the unprotected list in Thursday's expansion draft. The most important acquisition Miami made was to get Dallas' first-round pick in next Tuesday's college draft in exchange for agreeing to select, with the first pick, an unknown who had not played in the NBA since 1980.

The Hornets selected guard Dell Curry of Cleveland with the No. 2 expansion draft pick and later made one deal to get Tripucka from Utah.

"I didn't think it was possible to get both Dell Curry and Tripucka," Char-

lotte general manager Carl Scheer said. "We feel we got the top two players in the draft and if we don't screw up in the college draft, we feel pretty good about the team we'll put together in the fall."

Miami selected Billy Thompson from the champion Los Angeles Lakers with the third pick and also acquired a 1991 or 1992 second-round pick in exchange for not selecting 41-year-old Kareem Abdul-Jabbar.

With the fifth pick of the draft, the Heat selected Fred Roberts of Boston and acquired a second-round pick this year in exchange for not selecting veteran Dennis Johnson. Roberts later was traded to Milwaukee for a second-round pick in 1989.

Because of its deals, Miami will have two first-round picks, No. 3 and No. 20, in the first round of the college draft on Tuesday, plus three second-round choices.

"We had a philosophy when we started out a very long time ago — to build a certain way," said Lewis Schaffel, managing partner of the

Heat. "We wanted youth, we wanted athletes and we wanted flexibility over the next three to four years in a changing basketball business. The draft after this year is only two rounds. We wanted to be able to take advantage of any contingency as we move forward."

Charlotte's even-numbered picks were Curry, Dave Hoppen of Golden State, Washington's Tyrone Bogues, Chicago's Mike Brown, Rickey Green of Utah, Michael Holton of Portland, Michael Brooks of Denver, Bernard Thompson of Phoenix, Ralph Lewis of Detroit, Clinton Wheeler of Indiana and Sedic Toney of New York. Brown then was traded to Utah for Tripucka.

Miami, in exchange for Dallas' pick in the first round of the college draft, acquired the rights to Arvid Kramer, who played eight games in the NBA for Denver in 1979-80 before playing the next eight years in Europe. Miami got the draft pick in exchange for not picking Steve Alford, Bill Wennington or Uwe Blab, who also reportedly were of Dallas' unprotected list.

Ore-Ida challenge match series begins 9-day run Saturday

BOISE — For the next nine days, some of the world's finest cyclist will vie for their share of \$26,000 prize money in the fifth annual Ore-Ida Women's Challenge bike race that will take 92 participants from Boise to Stanley and back in a series of sprints, climbs and distance competitions.

The challenge was conceived by Ore-Ida's Director of Management Administrative Services, Jim Rabdau and, since it's beginning, the race has seen more than a few world class women cyclists participate in the only such challenge in the world solely for women.

The challenge knows only two champions in the past four years — Rebecca Twigg, three-time winner and silver medalist in the 1984 Olympics, and last year's victor, Inga Thompson, the 1987 national champion.

Twigg is expected to compete along with another Olympic hopeful, Ketchum's Katrin Tobin, the 1986 national champion and bronze medalist in the 1987 Pan American games in Indianapolis.

Rabdau first thought of the challenge idea while stationed in Europe with the military, according to race spokesperson Lauren Wilson. Rabdau had taken in more than a few bike races in Europe and was intrigued at the thought of holding a race in the

Sawtooths of central Idaho. Rabdau sold his idea to then Ore-Ida President Paul Corddry and in five short years it has become one of the premier women's races in the country if not the world.

In only its second year, the challenge played host to the Chinese women cycling team — their first race ever in the West.

Twenty-three teams are scheduled to compete, but the 7-11 team, led by Thompson, has decided to forego the event in preparation for the Olympic trials at the end of July.

Prize money will be awarded to winners in several categories, including overall winner, several individual short sprints and Queen of the Mountain competitions where comes will be

placed at a starting elevation and at the end of a particular ascent.

Today's prologue time trial is scheduled to begin at 7:30 p.m. and will feature a 2.6 kilometer (1.6 miles), 625 ascent up Boise's Bogus Basin Road.

•Saturday at 3 p.m., stage 1 of the challenge will take the teams on 43-mile course through Emmet, Eagle and into Boise. The race will feature two hot sprints and a queen of the mountain competition.

•Sunday's competition will feature the five-lap St. Luke's Women's Life Criterium at 3 p.m. A 1.2 kilometer (7.7 mile) sprint course through downtown Boise.

•On Monday at 10 a.m., racers will travel 40 miles on Highway 21 from Boise to Idaho City. The course fea-

tures a 1200-foot ascent and queen of the mountain and hot sprints honors will be awarded.

•Tuesday's competition will be a 57-mile distance race from Lowman to Stanley beginning at 11 a.m. and cyclists will ascend over 3000 feet, before an 800 descent to their destination. Two hot sprints and a queen of the mountain sprint will be featured.

•Wednesday will feature the Sawtooth Team Trials beginning at 10 a.m., a 40-mile course in the foothills around Stanley.

•Thursday's competition will feature the Mountain Bell Long Distance Road Race at 10 a.m. A 60-mile course from Stanley to Ketchum. Two hot sprints and a queen of the mountain race will be featured. Also on Thurs-

day will be the Fran Creek Individual Time Trials at 8 p.m. This 5.2 kilometer (3.25 miles) challenge will pit two riders in head-to-head competition as in slalom skiing and will feature a 219-foot climb.

•Friday July 1, will feature the Elkhorn Circuit Race at 1 p.m. Cyclists will travel 15 laps on the 1.6 mile course and five queen of the mountain sprints will be featured.

•On Saturday July 2 at 3 p.m., competition will conclude in Boise with the Parkener Criterium. Riders will travel 30 laps around a one-mile course downtown.

The 1988 Ore-Ida Women's Challenge will conclude with an awards banquet at 7:30 p.m. on Saturday at the Shakespear Festival Theatre.

Those wrong things have not affected his batting performance. Dan leads the Babe Ruth league with a .579 average. "I have learned a little from each team."

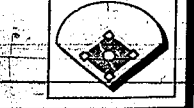
"There is no "I" in team," yells Slotten at the B Legion practice. This is a motto Dan feels is very true. In his own words, "It's been a team effort all the way."

Landslide in Turkey leaves 100 buried

ANKARA, Turkey (AP) - Mud and rock loosened by rain roared down on a mountain village and highway Thursday, burying up to 100 people, including 30 travelers stranded in a coffee house by an earlier landslide, officials said.

The Black Sea region is known for frequent landslides, some of which are blamed on extensive cutting of forests.

Several buses and cars were on the road when the landslide hit, Antalya reported. Television said it also clogged a river, which flooded the village, and showed footage of submerged houses.

State television said villagers reported hearing people cry out for help from beneath the ooze and rubble.

Deputy Gov. Haydar Ozgun told The Associated Press by telephone the rescue work would resume when landslide experts declared it safe.

Turkey's Red Crescent, the Moslem equivalent of the Red Cross, sent 150 tents to the area, Antalya said.

Another witness, Zeki Ilha, was quoted as saying: "I saw the mountain coming at me and started running away."

Tens of mud and rock covered at least three houses, four stores, a restaurant and the coffee house crowded with at least 30 bus passengers, stranded by an earlier landslide, the news agencies reported.

A dispatch by Hürriyet said the Red Crescent announced over loudspeakers at scene that 300 people had been killed, causing a temporary panic.

Soviet party meet to keep door closed

MOSCOW (AP) - Next week's Communist Party conference may name few members to the policy-setting Central Committee, but it will stick to the old practice of closing the door on most of its debates, an official said Thursday.

Many Moscow intellectuals now say they expect the conference to be more of a dress rehearsal for a pro-reform congress in 1991, saying Gorbachev may have learned from this experience how to do a conservative maneuvering to dominate delegate elections.

OTTAWA (AP) - Two more Soviet envoys were expelled or barred from Canada on Thursday in a spy squabble, and a Soviet Embassy spokesman said his side would take further retaliation.

But he did not say definitely that there would be new members to replace so-called "dead souls" - 60 to 70 members who have died or lost the jobs that entitled them to Central Committee seats since the last party congress in 1986.

Debate speeches will be summarized on TV and printed in full in newspapers once the speakers themselves have had a chance to approve the text, Sklyarov said.

The government also announced it will cut by three the total number of Soviet diplomats assigned to Canada.

Pope recalls evils of Nazis at start of visit to Austria

VIENNA, Austria (AP) - Pope John Paul II recalled the evils of Nazism during a meeting Thursday with President Kurt Waldheim, who has been accused of committing war crimes while serving in Adolf Hitler's army.

Amongst the many who were persecuted for religious, racial and political reasons were large numbers of Catholics - priests, members of religious orders and lay people, the pope said during a meeting in the president's office in the Hofburg Palace.

Protests coincided with the arrival. American Jews displayed banners at the windows of a hotel saying "Nazi Waldheim" and "Don't Meet Waldheim."

In his own greeting, Waldheim thanked the pontiff for receiving him at the Vatican in June 1987 - a meeting that drew a bitter response from Jewish leaders because of questions about the president's war service.

The Vatican said at the time John Paul was receiving the pope, and spokesman Joseph Navarro has said of the pope's trip to Austria: "This is not a political visit, it is a pastoral visit. He was invited by the bishops."

Do not embrace Waldheim, no! Weiss declared to a small crowd attracted to the demonstration. The other five members of the group were dressed in black and white striped uniforms similar to those of concentration camp inmates.

HAILEY - It's natural for people to become accustomed to the inherent beauty of the area in which they live. So much so, they don't often stop to really "see" the surrounding hills, valleys or farmlands and the people who choose to stake their roots there.

It only takes a tour of the state in any direction - north, south, east or west - from where you live to quickly remind yourself each region of state is filled with a beauty all its own. It's then you realize the little niche you call home is a pretty special place - it's a part of Idaho.

Thanks to the efforts of three individuals, now you don't have to jump in the car to explore the state's 44 counties, but you just might want to.

Oh! Idaho

THE IDAHO STATE MAGAZINE

That's the hope of the publishers of Oh! Idaho - The Idaho State Magazine. Their new quarterly publication, with its second issue due on newstands this week, will help remind the Panhandlers there is something special about southern Idaho, and will show us southern Idahoans the uniqueness of eastern Idaho or the Palouse country.

"The general feeling in the area, in the state right now is very upbeat," says partner, publisher and creative director Mark Kashino. "That's why we came up with the concept for a magazine and that's why we named our magazine Oh! Idaho."

For those of you who have not seen a copy of the magazine yet, it is an impressive product with local writers and a host of glossy photographs, all attempting to capture the essence of Idaho.

Published in Hailey, Oh! Idaho joins Peak Media, Inc.'s other publishing ventures, The Valley Magazine and The Valley Directory, a phone directory for the Wood River Valley. Kashino has teamed up with Clarence Stilwell and Alan Pesky to produce what they aim to be "one of the nicest magazines in the country."

The premiere issue, which came out in March, set the stage for the magazine by providing a generalized backdrop of the state with a look at its government, its economy, its natural resources and its people.

The publishers say the second and subsequent issues will move away from generalizations and focus on specifics. Each of seven geographical zones will be covered, creating a magazine which is truly for all Idahoans.

For example, the summer issue features a story on buckaroos, the Ore-Ida Women's Challenge bicycle race, the "boom" in north Idaho, the Idaho side of the Tetons and Idaho's seaport. Each issue will also carry a personal

message written by Gov. Cecil D. Andrus. The publisher's goal for the magazine is to be a strong sales pitch for the state and the lifestyle of Idahoans. Stilwell says, "They want the magazine to be a 'timeless read,' that can be picked up and read three years from now and be as pertinent then as it is today.

They are hoping to capture the attention of both in-state residents and those out-of-staters who might travel to Idaho. "Anybody who has either a connection to or an interest in Idaho is perceived as our readership," Stilwell says.

This private business venture has very lofty goals to achieve.

We want to become an award-winning, nationally recognized, people-subscribing-to-this-just-because-they-want-the-magazine-type piece," Kashino says.

The partners studied 83 regional, city and state magazines before they set the format for Oh! Idaho and they say nothing is quite like the one they've settled on.

Indeed, the magazine does meet the standards of a high quality publication suitable for coffee table display, with a stiff, durable cover, excellent high-gloss photos inside and articles from every region of the Gem State.

7th Annual Sun Valley Music Festival to offer jazz, chamber, choral variety

SUN VALLEY - Jazz, chamber and choral music will abound during the Seventh Annual Sun Valley Music Festival, formerly known as the Wood River Music Festival.

This month-long celebration is presented by the Sun Valley Center for the Arts and Humanities. It begins Saturday and runs through July 24.

The festival opens tomorrow with Electric Phoenix, an English group known for generating an entirely new vocal repertoire. The group members describe themselves "as a sort of string quartet with sound technician."

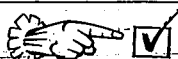

Featured vocalist will be Margaret Fogwell, Ketchum. She has had various acting and singing roles, including singing for NBC's

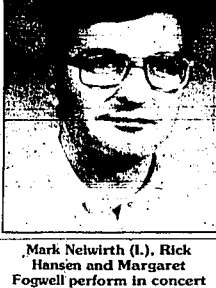

And to pay for that quality, Peak Media charges \$4 per copy, which, for some, may seem a little steep.
"It's a fairly pricey, but we feel people are willing to pay for quality," Stilwell says.
"Is \$4 too much to pay for Idahoans to read about the things they already know about?"
"The thing is, most of them don't know about it," Stilwell says. "That's really what we're here for."
Kashino explains because of the geographical configuration of the state - there are 479 miles between the north and south borders and 305 miles at its widest point from east to west - they hear people who look at the magazine and "over" and say, "That's in Idaho?"
"We definitely would love to create a wanderlust," Stilwell points out. "When you read this magazine, you need to make a reservation, you need to pile in your car, you need to head west, or if you're a neighbor, you need to cross the line."
Twenty thousand issues of *Oh! Idaho* were printed for the first edition and have been selling out at the newsstands. Another 20,000 have been printed for the second issue, and subscription rates are increasing from not only people within the state, but across the United States and even overseas. Each issue has an estimated pass-on readership of five people, theoretically reaching 100,000 people, the publishers say.
While part of the firm's goal is to help the state's economy, Peak Media receives no financial support from the state government. It is strictly a private venture.

'The Great Outdoors' will tire you

HOLLYWOOD — "The Great Outdoors" is about as much fun as ants at a picnic for anyone over the age of 10. It is a crass, blab comedy about summer vacation periods that teams Dan Aykroyd and John Candy, but gives them next to nothing to work with. If the prolific and profit-making John Hughes were not the writer — as well as the co-executive producer — of this scattershot nonsense directed frenetically by Howard Deutch, it is hard to imagine the film getting made, let alone attracting Aykroyd and Candy.

Aykroyd plays obnoxious Chicago man Roman Craig who arrives uninvited with his wife (Annette Bening) and near-mute little twin daughters (Hilary and Rebecca Gor-

don) to a mountain cabin rented by his brother-in-law, Chet (Candy).

just as Chet, his wife (Stephanie Faracy) and two sons (Chris Young, Ian Giatti) are settling in for a brief vacation. Chet is a sweet, sentimental guy, a conscientious husband and father, who loves the serenity and natural beauty of the forest and lake. Roman takes a look at the view from Chet's porch and envisions condo-developments, lumber or paper mills and toxic waste disposal plants.

"You wait in vain for the men to struggle over the fate of the environment — or anything else, for that matter — while Roman subjects the eternally susceptible and forgiving Chet to an endless series of humiliating pranks too inane to warrant description. (However, let it be said that Candy woffling down a 96-ounce slab of rare meat is not a pretty sight).

The movie turns to mush when Roman pointlessly turns out to be not such a bad guy after all. The only time when the film rings remotely true is when Chet's older son Buck (Young) attempts a romance with a local girl (Lucy Deakins), who is understandably wary of dating boys who will soon be going back to the city. Unfortunately, the effect of this whiff of reality is to make everything else seem false and forced.

Aykroyd and Candy, who can be hilarious, should have been choosier. If you manage to sit through "The Great Outdoors" (MPAA-rated PG for a few of the milder four-letter words) stay for the end credits. This is when Aykroyd dances to Wilson Pickett's 60s hit "Land of a 1,000 Dances," working up in a few final minutes the only genuine fun and energy in the entire film.

'Milagro' offers Redford in director role

The following are capsule reviews of some of the films playing locally in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

THE MILAGRO BEANFIELD WAR (R) This magical semi-fable — of a New Mexican that stands up to the politicians and the developers by watering his bean field — is warmly intended, well-acted and full of love for the land and its people. But for all the movie's good liberal intentions, the film's tone has not progressed much beyond Frank Capra's classic side-view of corruption. Director Robert Redford has soaked the film in reverence; yet for all the realism, and all the down-in-the-dirt ripeness of the performances, nothing about "The Milagro Beanfield War" seems real.

BIG (PG) Funny, warm, sophisticated and highly imaginative comedy-fantasy in which a 12-year-old boy's wish to be transformed into a wide-eyed view of corruption. Director Robert Redford has soaked the film in reverence; yet for all the realism, and all the down-in-the-dirt ripeness of the performances, nothing about "The Milagro Beanfield War" seems real.

'CROCODILE' DUNDEE II (PG) Discursive but almost as much fun as the first outing with that archetypal Australian bloke, played with such winning ease by Paul Hogan. This time out, Crocodile's lady (Linda Kozlowski), a New York reporter, is endangered by a Central American drug kingpin, sending the couple deep in hiding in the Australian bush. Nothing special as an action adventure but shrewdly effective as a projection of a mythical hero. With John Mellon, Charles Dutton, Hechter Ubarry, Juan Fernandez.

FUNNY FARM (PG) Not about a farm, and not particularly funny either — though Chevy Chase has his

moments and co-star Madolyn Smith has even more. An urban yuppie couple, sports-writer and wife, retreat to the countryside for a literary haven and learn the horrible consequences of answered prayers. But the movie has a shallow satiric conception of small-town America — "The Egg and I" with drab yokels and bad yokels — and though George Roy Hill gives it a smooth finish, it is neither celebration nor nightmare enough to churn up any comic intensity.

POLTERGEIST III (PG-13) One would think anyone making movies like this second sequel to a 1982 box-office hit that did not need even one would have abandoned their ignorance long ago. But it is nice to know sentiment survives packaging. Not much else does. Here, an entirely new set of film makers sends a member of the bedeviled, bothered and bespooked Freeing family, little Carol Anne (the late Heather O'Rourke) through another horrendous battle with the great beyond: With evil, squishy grabby things reaching through mirrors, walls and puddles to yank her off to some Lovecraftian underworld.

THE PRESIDIO (R) This thriller — about a feisty old Army dog and a testy civilian police pup (Sean Connery and Mark Harmon) gnawing at each other during a murder investigation at San Francisco's Presidio military base — is so slick and flat it cuts into you like a cellophane knife: no edge, no blood. The action is slambang and empty, the family drama is smutty-mouthed soap opera, and though

the cast, including Meg Ryan and Jack Warden, is good, they are jumping bits of personality up through the cellophane. All they can work up are a few smiles and crinkles.

RAMBO III (R) The third Rambo movie — in which the one-man attack squad spreads his worldwide vendetta to Afghanistan — is an avestruck memorial by writer-star Sylvester Stallone to his own musculature, a would-be pop IIIiad lousy with self-regard. Fast, loud, murderously professional, with more than \$60 million worth of explosions and spectacle, it is also a real talk-back-to-the-screen picture: a giganantically swollen self-parody, loaded with howlers; an unconsciously camped-up heroic male-bonding adventure rife with beefcake and grandiose phallic symbols.

RED HEAT (R) A Soviet-fish-in-American-water cop thriller in which a Russian Dirty Harry (Arnold

Schwarzenegger) teams with a wisecracking Chicago cop (Jim Belushi) to track down a defecating drug smuggler. (Right-wing glamor: West is West, East is Eastwood and never the twain shall meet.) Walter Hill directs in a fiery, muscular, pop-graphic style — with a James Horner score that amusingly blends Prokofiev with rhythm and blues.

WILLOW (PG) Here we have perfectly agreeable tale of magic, little people, heroic warriors, babies among the bullrushes and a wicked queen who must be overthrown lest the world be engulfed in fire. This preparation is too bad, because producer George Lucas so clearly wants his films to do good and to carry positive messages.

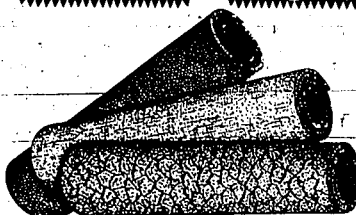

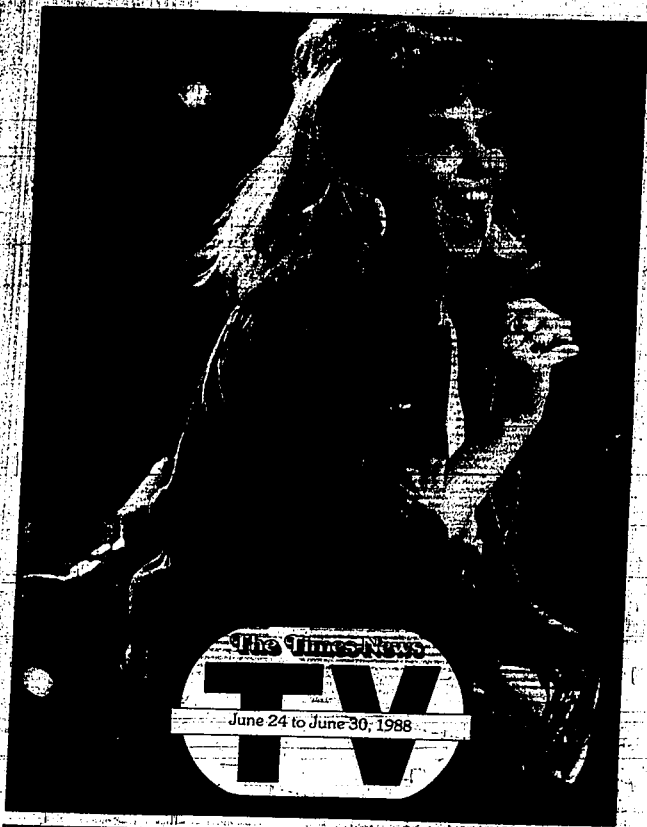

It's 40 years for Atlantic — Page 2

Debbie Gibson headlines Atlantic 40th anniversary musical reunion

The amount of attention given to the Atlantic Records 40th Anniversary Concert, highlights of which air Sunday, June 26 on ABC, under the title of "Atlantic Records 40th Anniversary: It's Only Rock 'n' Roll," shows that there is "currently" an insatiable appetite for nostalgia, no matter how poorly done.

The concert, which was held May 14 at Madison Square Garden, was a lackluster grouping of performers from the label's history. But the resulting publicity — from broadcasts on HBO and the BBC as well as ABC, a photo album and the inevitable live record — will be greater than anyone imagined.

The premise of such a concert is that a record label has a personality that runs through its best work. In pop music, this has proven to be remarkably true. Sun Records invented rockabilly; Motown streamlined R&B; Asylum nurtured singer-songwriters; IRS polished punk for college audiences and MTV.

Atlantic, as its laudable reissue series has made clear, can claim as durable a personality as any of them. The label was founded in 1948 by Ahmet and Nesuhi Ertegun, two jazz and blues aficionados. In the mid-'50s, as radio began to open up to black music, the label introduced such gospel-trained R&B singers as Ray Charles and Ben E. King, as well as such vocal groups as the Drifters and the Coasters, whose hits were written by Jerry Leiber and Mike Stoller, two of the most creative songwriters in pop history.

In the '60s, with the label serving as distributor for the smaller labels Stax and Volt, producers Tom Dowd

and Jerry Wexler helped create Atlantic's trademark sound, which came to be known as "guitar soul": gruff vocals, a lazy backbeat, clipped rhythm guitar, swirling Hammond organ. Atlantic's touring shows, which often featured a dozen acts, all backed by Booker T. and the MGs, made stars of Sam and Dave and Otis Redding. By the end of the decade, as Aretha Franklin was recognized as one of the most gifted singers in pop history, Atlantic could claim to have virtually invented soul music.

From then until recently, though, Atlantic seemed bent on forgetting its former self. The biggest Atlantic acts of the '70s were merely distributed by the label: The Rolling Stones and Led Zeppelin ran their own "custom labels," Rolling Stones Records and Swan Song, and the Allman Brothers recorded for Capricorn, a Florida-based Atlantic subsidiary. Atlantic's late-'70s releases made only periodic nods to the past. There were a scatter-shot series of anthologies, as well as standees like The Blues Brothers, which bucked comics Dan Aykroyd and John Belushi with former members of the

MGs. And ex-Led Zeppelin vocalist Robert Plant recorded a set of new versions of R&B classics which was produced by Ahmet Ertegun.

The divergence between the label's earlier and later history is evident in the concert lineup. It seems absurd to find performers from the soul reviews — Ruth Brown, Ben E. King, the Coasters — on the same bill with Genesis, Yes and two-thirds of Emerson, Lake & Palmer, possibly the three least soulful groups ever. The label's current star, 17-year-old songwriter Debbie Gibson, has little in common with anyone else on the bill. The surviving members of Led Zeppelin, who reunited for the event, swagger like adolescents, although all of them are over 40. And the best Atlantic acts — Charles, Franklin, the Rolling Stones, Cream, Chic — were nowhere to be seen.

Q: I know Danielle Steel is quite successful with her books. Do you have any idea how much she makes? It's said she writes at least a novel a year. Is this possible? — D.R.

A: You could call Danielle a writing fool as actually she does each of her novels in less than a year. Her writing income is a closely guarded secret, but I know it's in the eight figure range — or, to be blunt, over \$10 million a year.

Q: Who is this Lady Stevens I've been hearing about on the talk shows? I understand she's causing quite a stir in feminist circles

because she's supposedly critical of liberated women. — R.A.

A: Melissa Lady Stevens, the wealthy wife of the British media mogul Lord Stevens, has written a book called "Woman as Chameleon or How to Be an Ideal Woman." Feminists don't much like her ideas, but that didn't stop two of the most liberated women in Washington, Sally Quinn and Katherine Graham, from hosting a party for her recently in the capital.

Q: Just saw "Dirty Dancing" on the VCR and I was wondering if Patrick Swayze learned how to dance just for this movie. — S.L.

A: No. Swayze's mother was a choreographer and taught her son to dance as a youngster. And before deciding to be an actor, he was a principal with a ballet company, so in "Dirty Dancing" the 34-year-old actor wasn't an overnight dancing success. That was years of practice.

Q: What can you tell us about some movie-star group called the Hollywood Women's Political Committee? Someone suggested that despite its fancy name it's just a bunch of starlets giving wild parties. — R.O.

A: The Committee is a serious and militantly liberal organization that is avidly courted by politicians because of its financial and political clout. The members include the likes of Barbra

Dwan Smith provides role model for many as recurrent Dr. Foster

In the world of soaps, where neurotics reign, role models usually play a losing game. Viewers look for trouble-makers, not voices of reason.

But on "General Hospital," when the call goes out to Dr. Foster, chief of the psychiatric department, audiences are in for a surprise. Instead of a bald, nearsighted shrink, down the corridor strides shapely Irma Foster, a well-dressed, beaming black woman in her early 40s. Irma's an expert on Alzheimer's Disease and common sense. She's also involved with M.I.A.s. Because Dr. Foster remains single and never has any dates, she's thought to have a love from Vietnam who's still missing in action.

Played by Dwan Smith, a former "Mrs. California," Dr. Foster is clearly a role model — a vibrant, educated woman who tells black kids by her presence that there is room at the top if you go to school and work your tail off.

True, "General Hospital" uses Foster as a supporting character, but the soap intends to keep her around by signing Dwan for a few more seasons. There's more action ahead for Irma.

Meanwhile, Dwan Smith has time to lead six other lives. Campaigning for Jesse Jackson in California, Dwan wangled time off for rallies in San Diego and in Northern California. She also lectures about how fabulous it can be to be 40 — about how to work, raise children, keep fit and not give in to fear and doubts about middle age.

Married to Nate Fortier, a Los Angeles Fire Department paramedic, Dwan has enough time at home to handle two kids — Ayann, 16, and Andre, 5 — and to dabble in real estate, buying homes and fixing them up for resale.

"We're a do-it-yourself couple," says Dwan. "So far, we've bought four houses, fixed them up and made a tidy profit. The market is flat right now but, after the fall election, prices are going to rise. Right now houses in the \$80,000 to \$100,000 bracket are the best buy. Above that, you can get into trouble with escalating costs."

Raised in Kansas City and Tennessee by an upper-class family of educators and doctors, Dwan attended the University of Wisconsin with the intention of becoming a doctor. But a relative in the drama department knew that Dwan belonged in the theater world.

After graduation, Dwan chose Los Angeles over New York, partially out of fear. She wangled a job at IBM and taught school half-days while out hustling for commercials.

"I was here at the right time," Dwan admits. "Black consciousness was in vogue and I hit a lucky streak: 100 commercials, and TV guest spots. I learned one thing: a career in entertainment is a luxury. You have to have a job on the side."

Becoming "Mrs. California" in 1985 changed Dwan's life. H. Wesley Kenney from "The Young and the Restless" was one of the pageant judges. Wes offered the pageant winner an appearance on the soap and, after-

ward, promised to keep in touch.

"Wes is the rare man in the business who keeps his word," Dwan declared. "Two years later, as the new boss of "General Hospital," he called and said "Come to work."

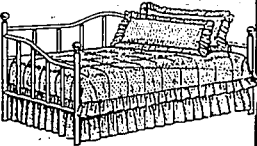

TV convention interest fades with candidates

Back when it all began this election year, with no incumbent and the seven dwarfs and the wimp factor and the threat from the religious right, the news divisions of the television networks dared to dream the impossible dream: political conventions that really might be compelling television.

That, of course, would translate to: political conventions that somebody might really want to watch.

But the dream, as they say, is over. The seven dwarfs dropped from sight quickly, disappearing into various holes (And then there was one). The wimp factor was no factor, a doleful development for some (Dole-less, actually). The religious right was less a threat than a sideshow.

Those wistful words — whispered all winter in the corners of network news offices — "brokered convention," have been swallowed, with great anguish. It did not come true.

If anything, this political season has been a bigger dud than any other in recent memory. After the brief stir generated by Jesse Jackson, the race for the presidential nomination has not been able to raise a blip on the nation's consciousness. In general, TV ratings follow the national consciousness rather closely.

The networks have conceded early: the political conventions will be getting about as little coverage this year as the networks can get away with. But in the case of at least one network, NBC, the coverage that convention does get is going to be new and improved, with the addition of a little manufactured conflict: electronic confrontation.

Figuring the convention floors will be filled with happy people in funny hats all saying wonderful things about each other, NBC "in order to fill all the dead time," as one network staffer put it, will bring on some representative of an opposing point of view, beamed in by satellite from locations all over the country, who will be allowed to press a delegate or party leader on why the party is putting some element (or not putting some element) in its platform.

Despite the limitations on the coverage, CBS, ABC and NBC will not be shirking their journalistic responsibilities. The convention events will be dutifully displayed: keynote address, nominating process, acceptance speeches. All those elements will get on the air, live on all networks. The public interest is sure to be served, even by this somewhat limited coverage. Frankly it would probably be served by a lot less; the public interest in this campaign seems to be minimal.

Horsford plays 'vampy virgin'

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Anna Maria Horsford has turned a supporting role as Thelma, the unmarried, 39-year-old deacon's daughter on "Amen," into one of the most popular characters on the NBC hit copeddy.

Thelma, who's been engaged and jilted 18 times, has been described as a "vampy virgin."

Horsford said in an interview that she sees Thelma as a reluctant spinster who, even at 39, is still holding on to her virtue.

"It's always a challenge to a man to be first," she said. "Don't ever assume that virtuous girls are uninteresting."

Horsford was born and raised in Harlem, the daughter of a businessman, and attended New York's High School for the Performing Arts. She said she began to draw up a history for Thelma as soon as she was cast.

"She's unemployed, unmarried and living at home with her father (played by Sherman Hemsley)," she said. "I wrote it all down. Then I could see what's my attitude toward someone like that. My first reaction was that she was spoiled by her father. She doesn't do what she doesn't have to do."

"I looked for her endearing qualities, too. She'd been engaged many times, so I looked back in my past at the girls who got the ring but never got to the altar. I created a woman

who is quiet, strong, manipulative and secure in the sense that her life has been consistent since childhood."

If Daddy spoils her, it's the handsome Rev. Reuben Gregory, played by Clifton Davis, who puts her in a matrimonial mood. So far, her love is unrequited.

Before "Amen," Horsford worked regularly in films, including "St. Elmo's Fire," "Heartburn," "Class," "Crackers," "The Fan" and "Street Smart," plus in a number of television movies.

"I've played a lot of strong women in films," she said. "Sometimes I've

been a policewoman and carried a gun. But I really hate guns and abhor screen violence. My father was shot by a holdup man when I was 4, and thereafter he wore a gun to work. I never dated in high school. All the boys knew Daddy carried a gun."

She said in her screen roles she has tried to portray strength through her presence. "I think a character who can scare you with his presence is much stronger than a person who needs a gun," she said. "I try to show that in my acting."

Because of the regularity of her work in movies, she said she wasn't terribly worried about whether she would land the role in the network series. She had tested for the role in New York, then was called to Los Angeles to test opposite Hemsley.

"I came out on a Sunday, auditioned on Monday and was told there'd probably be a decision off Tuesday. Well, there was no word on Tuesday, or Wednesday or Thursday. By then I was back in New

York. My agent called me on noon Friday and said, 'Guess what? You have the job.'"

NBC had made a reservation for her on a 4 p.m. plane that day.

"I said, 'Oh, no, is this the way Hollywood does it? I flew back to L.A. and went to work the next day.'"

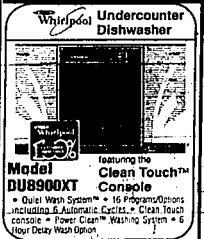

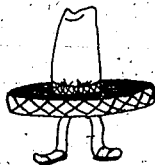

Miniseries reflects real-life presidential candidate flap

LOS ANGELES (AP) — When Steve Sohmer began writing his novel "Favorite Son," Gary Hart was a promising presidential aspirant and the Iran-Contra scandal was still a dark secret.

When Sohmer finished his tale of a leading presidential candidate who's wounded on the Capitol steps in the assassination of a top Contra leader and who is eventually undone by his deep involvement with a woman, he had a political thriller combining elements of Washington's hottest headlines.

Although the senator appears to be the leading character, Sohmer said it's really his staff assistant, Sally Crain, played by Linda Kozlowski of the "Crocodile Dundee" movies.

"She's smart as hell; highly motivated, a role model," he said. "But she has a pretty disorganized love life. After the first draft, I knew I had Sally right artistically. But I didn't understand her. I took the book to Toni Grant, who counsels career women. She told me that many have to be like men in their professional lives. And they end up being victimized by the men they associate with."

NBC's miniseries based on the novel will be televised before the November presidential election.

Crain becomes involved with a young FBI agent, played by Lance Guest, who is assigned to investigate the assassination.

"It began as an idea for a feature motion picture when I was president of Columbia Pictures," said Sohmer, also a former executive at NBC and CBS. "I suggested it to a producer — who shall be nameless — and he said, 'Steve, that's a terrible idea.' I got huffy and said I'd write it myself."

The six-hour miniseries also stars Harry Hamlin as the senator, Robert Loggia as a tough old FBI agent, James Whitmore as the president, Ken McMillan as head of the FBI, Ronnie Cox as head of the CIA, and Stephanie Kramer as Sally's assistant.

Sohmer completed the book in November 1986, before either big news story broke. He showed the manuscript to his old boss, Brandon Tartikoff, president of NBC Entertainment, who bought it as a miniseries.

The show is also serving as a "back door pilot" for a possible series starring Loggia as Nick Mancuso, the cynical FBI investigator.

CBS wins Niensens

NEW YORK (AP) — Big audiences for the NBA finals and a rerun of a popular made-for-TV movie gave CBS a rare win in the Nielsen ratings last week.

Thursday night's game five in the National Basketball Association championship series between the Los Angeles Lakers and the Detroit Pistons was the fourth highest-ranked prime-time program of the week, with a rating of 16.0, according to the A.C. Nielsen Co.

Game four on June 14 ranked ninth with a 14.8.

CBS' rerun Sunday night of "Intimate Strangers," starring Teri Garr as a female prisoner of war who returns home, won the night and ranked seventh even though NBC put up an original made-for-TV movie, "A Father's Homecoming."

CBS also had good results from the cult hit "Wiseguy," which got off to a promising start in summer reruns with a two-hour introductory episode that ranked 20th. Tied for 20th place was ABC's "20-20," featuring an interview with Jane Fonda, who apologized for her actions during a trip to

CBS also won Friday night with a first-run theatrical film, "Jaws III," which ranked 22nd.

For the week ending June 19, CBS had an average prime-time rating of 11.8; NBC had 11.0, and ABC had 8.7. CBS pulled into a tie with ABC for second place in season-to-date ratings which now stand at: NBC 15.4, CBS and ABC 13.0 each.

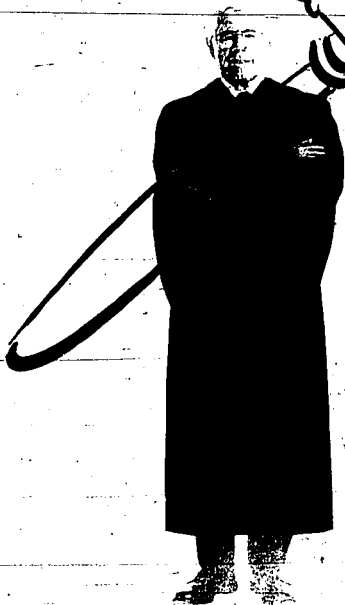
CBS has only won one other week in the television season, the first week of May when the "Magnum, P.I." finale finished No. 1. CBS tied one week with NBC.

NBC had won six weeks in a row when CBS broke the streak. But bad news for NBC's prime-time schedule was countered by good news for the news division. "NBC Nightly News" got out of third place to tie ABC for second.

Only a tenth of a rating point separated NBC and ABC from first-place CBS, and the three newscasts had identical shares.

The rating is a percentage of the nation's estimated 88.6 million households with televisions.
