Tech college at BSU wins board's OK

MOSCOW — The state Board of Education agreed Thursday to expand engineering and technology education in Idaho by creating a College of Technology at Boise State University.

Under preliminary estimates, the expansion proposal would cost \$20 million — including \$5 million for construction of a new building.

Formal budget requests will be presented to the education board in September. The board's recommendations will go to the governor, who will then make requests to the state Legislature in January 1989.

Larry Selland, academic vice president at BSU, said he expects the board to approve the building proposal when it meets in September.

Miron Technology, part of Idaho's growing high-technology industry, agreed to expand its operations in Boise based on Gov. Cecil Andrus' commitment to support technology-related education and training in the area, Selland said. That support included plans for the new building, he noted.

In addition to BSU programs, space will be provided for upper-division engineering courses from the University of Idaho, he said.

Andrus said in May that additional facilities are needed to allow UI to offer engineering courses and to relieve

overcrowding in existing technology classes at BSU.

UI officials had hoped the college would be developed at Moscow, but Selland said BSU was a more appropriate location. "Our contention is that's where the people are," he said.

Miron Technology has said it plans to expand its workforce by more than 1,000, adding \$27 million to its payroll. This would translate into \$5 million to \$6 million in annual tax revenue to state, officials say.

The proposed college would combine a number of existing vocational-technical and technology-oriented programs into one administrative unit.

Earlier Thursday, the board agreed to increase college-and-university-presidents' salaries by 2 percent.

Presidents Richard Bowen of Idaho State University and John Kelsie of BSU will be paid \$75,509 a year. Lee Vickers, president of Lewis-Clark State College, will be paid \$60,139 and the president of UI, a post currently held by Richard Gibb, who is retiring, will be paid \$81,434.

The board approved spending nearly \$128 million to operate the state's colleges in the next year and another \$6.7 million for capital improvements.

The board also agreed to release \$100,000 allocated to UI by the Legislature for a Microelectronics Research Center.

Magic flow stops

Low reservoir level shuts off water to fields

SHOSHONE — The water of life from Magic Reservoir will stop flowing Saturday.

Today, the water level is still just enough above the main floodgate to feed the irrigation canal. By Saturday, the water will be so low that over the gate and the canal system will shut down.

For some farmers here who planned ahead for the shortage, the 55 days of water they got may be enough. For others, the ensuing hardship could be severe.

The Big Wood Canal Co. has been providing its shareholders who use Magic Reservoir water with 1,500 acre-feet a day.

Dick Oneida, the company manager, calculated the water will end Saturday, and then the staff will "run and hide" as the mad farmers don't come and beat on us.

The reservoir normally provides about 160 days of water a year to farmers in the Dietrich, Richfield and north Shoshone areas. If the water shuts off as expected, the crops will have received only 55 water days this season.

After the irrigation shutdown, the water in Magic will begin building again, Oneida hopes there will be enough stored by August to turn on the water for another week then.

But the inflow from the Big Wood River and Camas Creek is dropping every day, he said.

The area did get some relief from 1.5 inches of rain over Memorial Day weekend. It allowed the company to shut off the water from June 1 through 6.

Foreign debt load \$368 billion in '87

WASHINGTON — The United States' foreign debt burden climbed to \$368.2 billion in 1987, a sharp 36.8 percent rise over the previous year, as the country continued to lead as the world's largest debtor nation.

The Commerce Department said the new debt total was \$99 billion higher than the \$269.2 billion in debt to foreigners that the United States owed at the end of 1986.

The debt means that foreigners now own more in U.S. assets than Americans own abroad. For 1987, the government reported that foreign holdings in the United States increased to \$1.54 trillion from \$1.34 trillion at the end of 1986. American investments overseas totaled \$1.17 trillion at the close of 1987, up from \$1.07 trillion a year earlier.

The difference between foreign investments in this country and American holdings overseas represents the \$368.2 billion debt burden the country is carrying.

The country now has a debt load greater than the combined total of Brazil, Mexico and Argentina, the Third-World countries with the largest debt burdens.

Critics have charged that the transformation of the United States from the world's largest creditor nation, a

position it held as recently as 1983, to the world's biggest debtor is the chief failure of President Reagan's economic policies.

Democrats, who hope to use the issue to their advantage in this year's presidential campaign, have charged that the burgeoning debt is eroding America's political and economic standing in the world.

But the administration on Thursday sought to minimize the annual accounting of the country's investment position, contending that the figures were a sign of strength showing foreigners still believed America was an excellent place to invest.

The United States had an investment surplus of \$29.4 billion recently as of 1983. That surplus fell to \$3.5 billion in 1984 and disappeared altogether in 1985, the year the country became a net debtor for the first time in 71 years with a debt of \$110.7 billion.

America's investment surplus has evaporated as the country ran up huge merchandise trade deficits during the 1980s; transferring billions of dollars into the hands of foreigners to pay for color televisions, stereo equipment and automobiles.

These dollars, now in foreign hands, have been reinvested in the United States in everything from government bonds to real estate.

White House, Senate Democrats unveil separate plans for drug war

WASHINGTON — Election-year jockeying to seize the initiative in the fight against drugs escalated Thursday as top Reagan administration officials and Senate Democratic leaders unveiled separate, far-reaching plans.

In treating a problem that they called "epidemic," a special task force of leading Senate Democrats for out-paced administration proposals in calling for drastically increased funding for drug programs. Senate Democrats urged an annual increase of \$3 billion — a doubling next year from current levels of about \$3 billion —

while Reagan's National Drug Policy Board, headed by Attorney General Edwin Meese III, called for a modest 13 percent increase next year.

And on an issue that promises to spark fervent debate on Capitol Hill over the summer, administration officials and Senate Democrats both made proposals aimed at reducing demand, though they diverged on how far to go.

The Democrats' proposals were radical in their realignment of the drug budget: they proposed devoting 60 percent of all funds toward prevention, education, treatment and other efforts aimed at cutting drug demand,

and 40 percent toward reducing the supply. The administration, they said about 25 percent to 30 percent of all drug funding over the last five years has gone toward cutting supply.

"This major imbalance in supply-demand efforts may help to explain the apparent failure of past anti-drug efforts," said the Senate Democratic panel, which was formed last month by Majority Leader Robert C. Byrd, W.Va., and headed by Daniel P. Moynihan, N.Y., and Sam Nunn, Ga.

The Senate Democrats said that their proposals were "based on the firm belief that there will always be a

Asteroid explosion a chiller

WASHINGTON — An asteroid measuring more than a quarter-mile across smashed into the South Pacific with a force of 12-billion tons of TNT some 2.3 million years ago and may have contributed to the cooling in the Earth's last age of glaciers, according to a California study.

In a paper to be published today in the journal Science, three researchers said the giant space-rock, weighing more than 8 trillion pounds, hit the ocean just southwest of South America, near Antartella, and sprayed billions of tons of water into the upper stratosphere.

Frank T. Kite, a member of the team at the University of California at Los Angeles, said the asteroid actually could have been much larger than a quarter-mile across, but researchers studying samples cored from the ocean floor can only confirm a minimum size.

In what he said is strictly speculation, Kite said tons of water ejected into the upper stratosphere by the blast could have formed clouds.

Court may ban death penalty for young slayers

WASHINGTON — The Supreme Court, in a dramatic episode to its just concluded term, announced Thursday it will consider banning capital punishment for all juvenile murderers after it returns to the bench next fall.

In formally wrapping up its 1987-88 term Wednesday, the court came close to banning the death penalty for anyone who commits a murder before they are 16.

Just 24 hours later and without recovering, the justices issued written

Henry Schwarzschild of the American Civil Liberties Union said, "It's very startling." But he cautioned against reading too much into the court's willingness to restudy the issue so promptly.

"It's foolish to try and predict what the court will do," he said. In other action Thursday, the court agreed to study alleged race discrimination in Alaskan salmon canneries, setting the stage for an important sequel to the court's ruling on Wednesday that makes it easier for workers to prove their bosses are

guilty of illegal bias.

A circuit away the last legal obstacle to a \$180 million settlement — with interest now worth some \$240 million — between Vietnam veterans and manufacturers of the herbicide Agent Orange. The court let stand rulings dismissing lawsuits by about 300 veterans who challenged the settlement, in which as many as 250,000 others could participate.

In the death penalty appeals, the court said it will consider overturning the death sentences of Oregon death row inmate Jose Martinez High, who was 17 when he participated in a

1976 murder, and Missouri death row inmate Heath Wilkins, who was 16 when he committed a 1985 murder.

Were the Supreme Court to ban the death penalty for those under 18, it would affect most of the 37 states with death penalty laws — including those that do not specify a minimum age for killers subject to capital punishment and states that specify age limits under 18.

On Wednesday, four justices said the death penalty is unconstitutional for those who were younger than 16 when they committed murder. Three

'Many indictments' expected from Pentagon bribery probe

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two members of Congress said they expected "many indictments" in the investigation of fraud and bribery in Pentagon contracts after they were briefed in secret session Thursday by the director of the Naval Investigative Service.

The officials "are very, very sure of their case," Rep. Barbara Boxer, D-Calif., said after Rear Adm. Ted Gordon met with members of the House Armed Services Committee.

"It's pretty iron-clad," she said, adding that she expects "many indictments." Rep. Larry Hopkins, R-Ky., said, "many, many indictments will be forthcoming. I don't think it will be too long before the first of them will be coming down."

Hopkins cautioned that "This case has a long, long way to go. But when it's finished, people are going to go to jail."

Committee Chairman Les Aspin, D-Wis., sounded an even more cautious note, saying, "The information collected so far is not much of an investigation. It's been more like an information-gathering process. From now on, with the subpoenas, the search warrants, the investigation is just beginning."

The real test of the system, said Aspin, "is how many indictments there are."

Under investigation are allegations that defense contractors and consultants, many of them former military

men, bribed Pentagon officials for contracting details that could be vital in winning contracts worth billions of dollars.

Aspin's call Wednesday for Defense Secretary Frank C. Carlucci to order "absolutely no contracts signed for 60 days (or) six weeks" with companies implicated in the criminal investigation was rejected Thursday by the Pentagon.

"We would be glad to discuss with the Congress the question of freezing awards of new contracts while the Justice Department is investigating allegations of procurement fraud," said Pentagon spokesman Fred S. Hoffman.

"But at this point we feel it would be imprudent to apply such a freeze or moratorium."

Those few extra days of water were enough to save the grain crop, said Jim Wellhausen, a farmer near Richfield.

"If they can have another rain, it'll really save the grain — and give them a partial second cutting of hay — and maybe a pretty good second cutting at that," said University of Idaho Extension irrigation specialist Dorrell Larsen.

Farmers taking water out of Magic have known for a long time that the drought was coming. Most have prepared, as well as they could, Onida said, using federal land set-aside programs, and planting more forage crops instead of grain to feed their cows and livestock.

Wellhausen planned ahead by putting his wheat in early. He had finished planting by April 1. Now that crop is far enough along that it will survive without water, he said.

After his first alfalfa cutting, he took his water off the wheat, and doubled the amount on the alfalfa in an attempt to soak the ground good before the water gets out.

Although the water levels are climbing, he needs the hay for his 100 dairy cows.

"What you don't raise, you have to buy," he said. In a normal year, he grows all his own feed. This year, he expects to sell out between \$40,000 and \$50,000 just for hay alone.

"When you have a year like this, you lose a couple years on your payments," Wellhausen said.

His milk checks will carry him through, he said, but farmers who only raise crops "have to get to pay their bills. They've got to pay their mortgages. And with what? There's nothing there."

Prospects for profits at the resorts that edge Magic Reservoir are no better than they are for the farmers.

"We're hoping we don't have a severe death toll on the water table," said John Peace, owner of Magic Lake Resort. "I'm lucky to take in \$20 or \$30 a day."

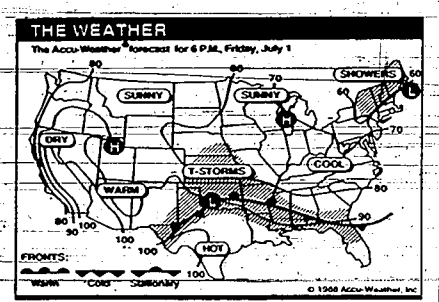

supply of illicit drugs if people pay large sums to use them and that our ability to make any meaningful progress in the overall war on drugs will ultimately depend on efforts to reduce such demand."

"Toward that goal, the Senate Democrats offered these recommendations: creating a top-level drug czar"

which has been opposed by the White House — "to bring together federal anti-drug efforts that are now fragmented and uncoordinated," pulling together all the Department of Justice agencies that deal with drug and organized crime, under the direction of a new assistant attorney

general; assigning 20 new federal judges and allowing U.S. magistrates to hear drug cases to alleviate the tremendous backlog at the district court level; denying federal loans and other benefits for repeat offenders; and toughening drug penalties and fines.

The White House task force on Thursday set out several priorities that included mandating drug-free work places for those companies getting federal funds and, similarly, requiring anti-drug programs at federally funded colleges; stripping federal aid away from any students found guilty of drug offenses; and providing increased military assistance to foreign nations to combat drug trafficking.

Receiving the task force's report, Reagan said: "These recommendations send a strong message to drug law offenders, including users and traffickers. I join the Chairman (Meese) in emphasizing that we cannot tolerate criminals who violate our borders, terrorize our communities, or poison our citizens."

Senate Republicans expect to submit their own plan next week. On the House side, the Judiciary Committee on Thursday approved and sent to the full chamber a massive drug package of their own.

Justices said the Constitution does not set such age limits for executions.

Justice Sandra Day O'Connor provided a fifth vote to throw out the death penalty for a convicted Oklahoma killer who was 15 when he helped kill his former brother-in-law.

O'Connor stopped just short of calling for abolition of capital punishment for killers under 16.

A key vote in next term's cases will be provided by Justice Anthony M. Kennedy, who joined the court in February, to take part in the Old Idaho case.

In other developments, the court agreed to decide whether states may ban virtually all lawyer advertisements that feature testimonials or client endorsements. The justices will review a California rule that presumes such ads are false or misleading.

Refused to kill a suit against Rep. Don Sundquist, R-Tenn., accused of defaming a legal services lawyer in a news release and a letter to the U.S. attorney general.

Left intact the way cable television operators pay copyright royalties for retransmitting broadcast programming. The justices refused to hear arguments that cable industry is being overcharged at least \$40 million a year in royalties.

Teachers like trimester for students' learning

MOSCOW (AP) — A plurality of Idaho's high school teachers involved in the new schedule believe their students perform better in a trimester system than they do in a semester system, a study by the Idaho State University College of Education shows.

And education experts say trimester systems appear to increase enrollment in vocational, advanced placement and college preparatory courses.

But while the study's results, presented to the Board of Education at its meeting that wrapped up Thursday in Moscow, bolstered the perception of the "trimester" system, State Schools Superintendent Jerry Evans

said more information may still be needed.

"There seems to be a fairly high level of acceptance from schools that have been using trimesters," Evans said. "Concerning the report that has been issued, trimesters seem to have come out on the positive side, with more advantages than disadvantages."

But the board is particularly concerned that students in a trimester system can obtain more credits for the same amount of time spent on subjects than students on the traditional semester system, he said.

The issue is whether students are actually learning more under in trimesters, Evans said.

UI dean to return to teaching

MOSCOW (AP) — Galen Rowe, dean of the University of Idaho College of Letters and Science, has announced he will return to full-time teaching next year.

Rowe, a professor of foreign languages and literature, became dean of the college in July 1981. His resignation is effective June 30, 1988.

"That will be eight years of service," he said Wednesday in a prepared

statement. "And I'm really looking forward to returning to full-time faculty status. It's time for a change, both for me and for the college."

Rowe, 51, previously was chairman of the department of Foreign Languages and Literature. He also has served as acting graduate dean, and as assistant vice president for academic affairs and research on the Moscow campus.

State urged to reject swap

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — The former watermaster of the Hayden Lake Watershed Improvement District is urging the state to reject a proposed land swap intended to end three years of court battling with Idaho Forest Industries.

Otis Wuest told the state Lands Department official Thursday that access to Hayden Lake is already unlimited.

"If we lose that lake access, it's lost forever," Wuest said. "And that's 1,200 feet that doesn't belong to Idaho Forest Industries."

Idaho Forest Industries has gone to court to prohibit the district from building a dock and other facilities along the quarter-mile stretch of southwestern lake shoreline. But the state claims that 29 acres west of the dike is government land since it should be considered lakebed because it was navigable water at the time Idaho was granted statehood. Idaho Forest Industries President Tom Richards lives near the area.

Challis man killed while cutting trees

CHALLIS (AP) — A 36-year-old Challis man has been killed in a tree-cutting accident in Custer County.

Authorities said the identity of the victim was being withheld pending notification of relatives.

The accident occurred when the victim was felling trees for an outfitter's cabin on Little Loon Creek in the Frank Church River of No Return Wilderness and a tree fell on him.

Eagle man dies in 2-car collision

BOISE (AP) — An Eagle man has been killed in a two-car collision at an Ada County intersection, authorities reported.

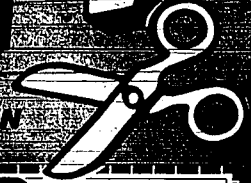

'Many indictments' expected from Pentagon bribery probe

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two members of Congress said they expected "many indictments" in the investigation of fraud and bribery in Pentagon contracts after they were briefed in secret session Thursday by the director of the Naval Investigative Service.

"The officials are very, very sure of their cases," Rep. Barbara Boxer, D-Calif., said after Rep. Adam Tomlin met with members of the House Armed Services Committee.

"It's pretty iron-clad," she said, adding that she expects "many indictments."

Rep. Larry Hopkins, R-Ky., said many "indictments will be forthcoming. I don't think it will be too long before the first of them will

be coming down."

Hopkins cautioned that "this case has a long, long way to go. But when it's finished, people are going to go to jail."

Committee Chairman Les Aspin, D-Wis., sounded an even more cautious note, saying, "The information collected so far is not much of an investigation. It's been more like an information-gathering process. From now on, with the subpoenas, the search warrants, the investigation is just beginning."

The real test of the system, said Aspin, "is how many indictments there are."

Under investigation are allegations that defense contractors and consultants, many of them former military

men, bribed Pentagon officials for contracting details that could be vital in winning contracts worth billions of dollars.

Aspin's call Wednesday for Defense Secretary Frank C. Carlucci to order "absolutely no contracts signed for 60 days (or six weeks) with companies implicated in the criminal investigation" was rejected Thursday by the Pentagon.

"We would be glad to discuss with the Congress the question of freezing awards of new contracts while the Justice Department is investigating allegations of procurement fraud," said Pentagon spokesman Fred S. Brennan. "But at this point we feel it would be imprudent to apply such a freeze or moratorium."

Dry

Those few extra days of water were enough to save the grain crop, said Jim Wellhausen, a farmer near Richfield.

"If they can have another rain, it'll really save the grain — and give them a partial second cutting of hay," said Wellhausen, who is a good second cutting at that, said University of Idaho Extension irrigation specialist Dorral Larsen.

Farmers taking water out of Magic Lake known for a long time that the drought was coming. Most have prepared as well as they could, Oneida said, using federal land set-aside programs, and planting more forage crops instead of grain to feed their cows and livestock.

Wellhausen planned ahead by putting his wheat in early. He had finished planting by April 1. Now that crop is far enough along that it will survive without water, he said.

After his first alfalfa cutting, he took his water off the wheat, and dou-

bled the amount on the alfalfa in an attempt to soak the ground good before the water goes off.

Although wheat prices are climbing, he needs the hay for his 100 dairy cows.

"What you don't raise, you have to buy," he said. In a normal year, he grows all his own feed. This year, he expects to shell out between \$40,000 and \$50,000 just for hay alone.

"When you have a year like this, you lose a couple years on your payments," Wellhausen said.

His milk checks will carry him through, he said, but farmers who only raise crops "have got to pay their bills. They've got to pay their mortgages. And with what? There's nothing there."

Prospects for profits at the resorts that edge Magic Reservoir are no better than they are for the farmers.

"We're hoping we don't starve to death before we get some water back," said John Peace, owner of Magic Lake Resort. "I'm lucky to take in \$20 or \$30 a day."

His normal income is 10 times that much.

Peace's resort and recreational vehicle park on the west side is about in the middle of the 12 mile long reservoir. The view from his bar and boat dock used to be shimmering water. Now it is a grand mud flat.

There is still fishing and boating at the south end of Magic, but none of the resorts are there. West Shore Inn is near Peace's place. And the Rainbow Lodge didn't even open this season.

But the fishing is terrific, Peace said. And it is going to get better because the fish are concentrated in the small area of remaining water.

Peace is going to continue serving Saturday and Sunday brunches and having live bands at the bar on Saturday night and hopes to make his payments with that.

This is the second consecutive light snow year. But it will be better next year, Oneida insisted.

"Surely we can't have three bad years in a row."

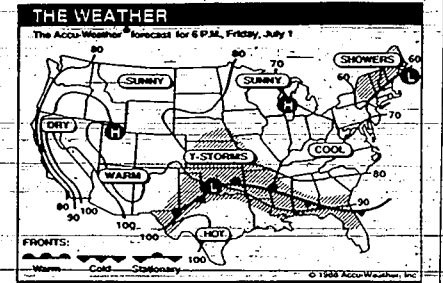

supply of illicit drugs if people pay large sums to use them and that our ability to make any meaningful progress in the overall war on drugs will ultimately depend on efforts to reduce such demand.

Toward that goal, the Senate Democrats offered these recommendations, creating a top-level drug "czar" which has been opposed by the White House — to bring together federal anti-drug efforts that are now "fragmented and uncoordinated," pulling together all the Department of Justice agencies that deal with drug and organized crime, under the direction of a new assistant attorney

general, assigning 20 new federal judges and allowing U.S. magistrates to hear drug cases to alleviate the tremendous backlog at the district court level; denying federal loans and other benefits for repeat offenders; and toughening drug penalties and fines.

The White House task force on Thursday set out several priorities that included mandating drug-free work places for those companies getting federal funds and, similarly, requiring anti-drug programs at federally funded colleges; stripping federal aid away from any students found guilty of drug offenses; and providing increased military assistance to foreign nations to combat drug trafficking.

Receiving the task force's report, Reagan said: "These recommendations send a strong message to drug law offenders, including users and traffickers: I join the Chairman (Meese) in emphasizing that we cannot tolerate criminals who violate our borders, terrorize our communities, or poison our citizens."

Senate Republicans expect to submit their own plan next week. On the House side, the Judiciary Committee on Thursday approved and sent to the full chamber a massive drug package of their own.

A key vote in next term's cases will be provided by Justice Anthony M. Kennedy, who joined the court in February, too late to participate in the Oklahoma case.

Teachers like trimester for students' learning

MOSCOW (AP) — A plurality of Idaho's high school teachers involved in the new schedule believe their students perform better in a trimester system than they do in a semester system, a study by the Idaho State University College of Education shows.

And education experts say trimester systems appear to increase enrollment in vocational, advanced placement and college preparatory courses.

But while the study's results, presented to the Board of Education at its meeting that wrapped up Thursday in Moscow, bolstered the perception of the trimester system, state Schools Superintendent Jerry Evans

said more information may still be needed.

There seems to be a fairly high level of acceptance from schools that have been using trimesters, Evans said. "Concerning the report that has been issued, trimesters seem to have come out on the positive side, with more advantages than disadvantages."

But the board is particularly concerned that students in a trimester system can obtain more credits for the same amount of time spent on subjects than students on the traditional semester system, he said.

The issue is whether students are actually learning more under in trimesters, Evans said.

UI dean to return to teaching

MOSCOW (AP) — Galen Rowe, dean of the University of Idaho College of Letters and Science, has announced he will return to full-time teaching next year.

Rowe, a professor of foreign languages and literature, became dean of the college in July 1981. His resignation is effective June 30, 1989.

"That will be eight years of service," he said Wednesday in a prepared

statement. "And I'm really looking forward to returning to full-time faculty status. It's time for a change, both for me and for the college."

Rowe, 51, previously was chairman of the department of Foreign Languages and Literature. He also has served as acting graduate dean, and as assistant vice president for academic affairs and research on the Moscow campus.

State urged to reject swap

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — The former watermaster of the Hayden Lake Watershed Improvement District is urging the state to reject a proposed land swap intended to end three years of court battling with Idaho Forest Industries.

Ois Wuest told the state Lands Department official Thursday that the swap to Hayden Lake is already too limited.

"If we lose that lake access, it's lost forever," Wuest said. "And that's 1,200 feet that doesn't belong to Idaho Forest Industries."

Idaho Forest Industries has gone to court to prohibit the district from building a dock and other facilities along the quarter-mile stretch of southwestern lake shoreline. But the state claims that 29 acres west of the dike is government land since it should be considered lakebed because it was navigable water at the time Idaho was granted statehood. Idaho Forest Industries President Tom Richards lives near the area.

Challis man killed while cutting trees

CHALLIS (AP) — A 36-year-old Challis man has been killed in a tree-cutting accident in Custer County.

Authorities said the identity of the victim was being withheld pending notification of relatives.

The accident occurred when the victim was felling trees for an outfitter's cabin on Little Loon Creek in the Frank Church-River-of-No-Return Wilderness and a tree fell on him.

Eisenhower's concern becomes principal problem today

Nearly three decades have passed since President Dwight Eisenhower warned that the necessary creation of a huge, permanent defense establishment in the nuclear era posed dangers of "the acquisition of unwarranted influence by the military industrial complex."

lie — intrude into almost every aspect of a weapon system's conception, development, manufacture and deployment.

There is a multiplier effect as the different military services, members of Congress, presidential administrations and defense industries all push and shove — as well as swap support for — each other's projects. The cumulative effect of many special interests battling to get their way further distorts the entire national defense effort.

Most of our defense programs originate from the legitimate motivations of people who rationalize that they are serving the country's best interests — as well as the needs of their particular military service, corporation, community or personal political career. Unfortunately, widely diverse interests in defense seldom automatically combine to form a coherent national interest.

The people of Texas or Michigan have a legitimate right to seek a defense base or weapons contract important to their local economy. When one community's desire for a base or plant is multiplied too many times across the country, however, we end up with too many unneeded bases and weapons. And when the Air Force, Navy, Army and Marine Corps trade bases and weapons contracts for civilian

support for their prized military programs, we get even more bases and weapons. And no one wants any bases or programs to shut down.

Executives of the large weapons manufacturers properly seek profits for their shareholders. But in a one-customer market characterized by feast or famine, winning or losing a single contract may determine the fate of huge companies as well as communities. Who gets the profits and who gets the dislocated economy often depends on who has the most stock rather than on which company has the best product and the lowest price — or even on whether the weapon is needed at all.

Members of Congress must continually balance national defense needs against the interests of their constituents in sharing the pork barrel of job-producing defense bases and plants. And members are bound to be influenced by the campaign funds and lucrative speaking fees that are lavished on them by defense contractors. As in the case of the B-1 bomber, these contractors also have been known to spread parts of their projects around congressional districts, whether or not this division of spoils led to the most efficient weapons production.

American military officers are dedicated to defending their country, but the four armed services ferociously pursue their own priorities to the detriment of coherent, effective national defense plan. When a succession of presidents has turned down a service's requests — as

Eisenhower did with a bomber program — has not been uncommon for uniformed military officers to exert raw political pressure to undermine the decision of the commander in chief.

What will it take to untie this knot? There obviously is no substitute for high standards of ethical conduct, in which all the many participants in the military-industrial immunity show at least as much concern for the nation's common good as for their own personal gain.

A admitted president and secretary of defense must enforce defense reform laws that now are ignored or undermined almost as soon as they are enacted. Several statutes are designed to limit conflicts of interest of federal employees who go through the revolving door to private industry. One law aims to protect whistle blowers who try to point out problems. Congress should also have an independent testing service to find out whether weapons actually perform to their specifications. The 1986 Goldwater-Nichols defense reorganization act represented a thoughtful effort to limit service paternalism and to encourage a coherent national defense plan. It ordered that defense procurement programs be centralized in the office of a new undersecretary of defense. The first holder of that job resigned in frustration because the various armed service brass were permitted to ignore his authority.

Congress needs to focus its attention on overall defense needs, rather than trying to

micromanage hundreds of programs in an effort to exert influence and serve the special needs of constituents. A bill approved by the Senate but stalled in the House seeks to insulate legislators from constituent pressures by creating a bipartisan commission to recommend a list of unneeded bases that should be closed. The secretary of defense would be required to close all the bases or none. A \$2 billion annual savings could be realized.

It is unlikely that the country will really be able to rid itself of many wasteful and unneeded defense programs unless the government actively promotes development of meaningful economic alternatives to defense jobs. The entire nation would benefit by redirecting its high-tech capabilities — now unduly concentrated in the defense industry — to compete in more peaceful and rewarding pursuits. The public revulsion that surely will be triggered by the current Pentagon scandal creates a unique opportunity for the next president and his secretary of defense to implement more effective defense programs. The 1988 presidential campaign is a good place to start. The candidates have yet to offer meaningful defense ideas, and they are unlikely to do so unless a better informed electorate demands change.

Government which polices drugs shouldn't provide needles

BOSTON — There is a moment in any heated debate about AIDS when someone inevitably says, with deep conviction, "We can't afford any longer to be moralists."

The overriding terror of this epidemic, they will suggest, wraps the slate clean of moral issues. We must all become pragmatists.

It isn't quite true, of course. AIDS doesn't eliminate moral questions. Rather it adds a new and powerful piece to the moral equation. Even the people who insist on pragmatism eventually make their pitch on moral grounds: How will we explore our actions and intentions if the deaths mount?

One by one, AIDS is uprooting some of the most fixed moral positions. In Washington this week, President Reagan took the first few steps in an unexpected direction — toward the AIDS Commission's support of anti-discrimination laws for victims of the disease. In Minnesota, Catholic bishops reaffirmed the prom-

ise not to oppose programs that give out clean needle information for AIDS prevention.

And in Boston or more cities from New York to San Francisco, people deeply concerned about drugs are nevertheless wrestling with the question of whether to give clean needles to addicts. Which is worse: to take part in the drug culture, or withhold some tool, any tool, that might just slow the spread of AIDS?

In some ways, this last dilemma is most unsettling and uncertain. In Portland, a needle-exchange trial program is about to begin. In Boston, such a program was just rejected by the state legislature. In New York, San Francisco, New Haven, the issue is in various

stages of consideration.

The arguments for needle-exchange programs are compelling. AIDS is spreading fastest among IV drug users sharing needles. These drug users are a direct route into the "general" community, through the partners they have sex with, and the children they conceive. The mayor of Boston, Roy Flynn, arguing for the needle-swap program, rested his case on the fact that ten out of every 100 babies born in Boston inherit the virus.

The arguments against dispensing needles are compelling as well. Drugs, after all, are destructive. The messages exchanged with needles would be, at best, mixed. One arm of government abhors drugs, while another distributes their sterile paraphernalia. There may even be a more subtle message delivered with the syringe: You may destroy yourself, destroy your community, as long as you don't infect

it's hard enough for moralists. But not even a pragmatist's yardstick can measure this issue precisely. The programs already in effect in other countries, other cultures, don't give clear direction signals.

The initial evidence from Europe is that needle-exchange programs don't increase drug use. People don't start shooting up because they get a free needle. In some places, these needle exchanges even draw addicts into treatment.

Yet the same evidence disputes how effective these programs are in controlling AIDS infection. In one London study, only 27 percent of the addicts stopped sharing equipment while 19 percent actually started. In Amsterdam, after three years of exchanges, addicts do share less. But they are getting infected with AIDS at the same rate.

Where does this leave us? In 38 states today, anyone — alcoholic or addict — can go into a drugstore without a prescription and buy a

needle and syringe for as little as 20 cents. I wouldn't deny this private access. I would extend it to the other 12 states. But I don't think that the government should give out these needles as a matter of approved public policy.

Is this a moralism we can't afford anymore? These are times of uncertainty and high AIDS anxiety. Our minds are continually changing. There is a natural impulse to Do Something. Anything. We will be held morally accountable to the next generation of AIDS victims.

But for now, the evidence in favor of needle-exchange programs as a way to halt AIDS is too shaky to overcome the concern about supporting drug use. More to the point, one moral point of many: It is untenable for a government that polices illegal drugs to turn around and provide the very syringes with which to inject them.

Bank-officers plead guilty

CHICAGO (AP) — A former Continental Illinois National Bank & Trust Co. officer and an ex-banker from Oklahoma accused of contributing to Continental's near-collapse pleaded guilty Thursday to criminal charges.

John R. Lytle pleaded guilty to misapplication of bank funds and William G. Patterson pleaded guilty to aiding and abetting Lytle before U.S. District Judge Milton I. Shadur.

Shadur had been scheduled to preside over a retrial of the men on charges of wire fraud and misapplication of bank funds after the defendants' initial trial ended with a deadlocked jury two months ago.

Zaccaro to begin sentence

MONTPELIER, Vt. (AP) — John Zaccaro Jr., sentenced to jail for selling one-quarter gram of cocaine to an undercover officer, will begin his four-month term Friday, a court clerk said.

The son of former vice presidential candidate Geraldine Ferraro was sentenced two weeks ago, but the sentence had been stayed for 30 days pending appeal to the Vermont Supreme Court. If an appeal had been granted, it may have been a year or more before the high court decided the case.

But in a surprise move, Zaccaro's lawyers dropped the request for the stay and asked permission for Zaccaro, 24, to begin his sentence Friday.

Seattle to sponsor gay Mass

SEATTLE (AP) — The Seattle Archdiocese will assume sponsorship of Mass for homosexuals, the archbishop announced Thursday, but the group that had run the ministry is divided over whether to accept the change or move elsewhere.

While accepting homosexuals within the church, Archbishop Raymond G. Hunthausen made clear that "church teaching rejects homosexual acts."

The Seattle chapter of Dignity, a group for homosexual Catholics, was evenly split Sunday in a vote on whether to endorse Hunthausen's decision or to move the Mass elsewhere. Calls to the organization's office Thursday were answered by a recording.

Orders for goods fall in May

WASHINGTON (AP) — Orders to U.S. factories for manufactured goods fell 0.6 percent in May as a sharp drop in demand for aircraft offset strength in other areas, the government reported Thursday.

The Commerce Department said factory orders declined \$1.36 billion to a seasonally adjusted \$217.97 billion in May. It was the largest one-month decline since a 1.4 percent plunge last August.

Orders had been up sharply in the previous two months, rising by 1.5 percent in April and 1.6 percent in March. Analysts said the one-month breather would be good for the economy, giving factories more time to catch up with a backlog of unfilled orders.

EPA deadline set for today

WASHINGTON (AP) — A new age in environmental monitoring begins today.

It's the deadline under a 1986 law for 30,000 industrial installations to file with federal and state authorities an estimated 1.5 million pages reporting all their releases of 328 hazardous chemicals to the environment in 1987.

The Environmental Protection Agency is supposed to put the information into a data base that anyone with a personal computer and a telephone modem can query. That system won't be up and running until sometime next year.

White House to administer drug tests

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Reagan White House, chafing over revelations of drug abuse by presidential employees in sensitive jobs, announced Thursday that all 1,600 workers on its payroll will be subject to random narcotic tests in about 60 days.

President Reagan said he was not surprised by the disclosure that two National Security Council clerks resigned and three Secret Service officers were suspended during a drug probe. "We've known this for some time, and the investigation goes on," he said. "This problem crosses all kinds of lines," Reagan said.

Reagan did say that "I am upset."

Nancy Reagan, who has been carrying a "just-say-no" message to America's youth, said "drugs are everywhere." And spokesman Martin Fitzwater said private business should use the sort of random drug-testing program the White House plans to invoke shortly after Labor Day.

Neither the White House nor the U.S. Secret Service would describe what drugs were involved in the investigation.

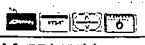

Marriage-license applicants must test for AIDS in Idaho

Convicted sex offenders in Georgia and Washington will be required to submit to AIDS tests under laws effective today, while Colorado apparently is the first state to require such a test for those charged, but not yet convicted, of sex offenses.

Of dozens of new state laws taking effect July 1, many are efforts to deal with acquired immune deficiency syndrome, a deadly disease for which there is no cure and which is spread mainly through sexual contact and the sharing of needles by drug abusers.

Starting today, applicants for marriage licenses in Idaho will have to state that they have read a pamphlet on AIDS provided by the county clerk. The pamphlet includes information on how AIDS is spread and how to seek testing.

Only Illinois and Louisiana now re-

quire AIDS tests of marriage-license applicants, said Mona Rowe, codirector of the AIDS Policy Center at George Washington University.

Another new law in Idaho provides for testing for the AIDS virus in organs and fluids to be transplanted and of people donating organs or fluids for transplant, and makes it a felony to knowingly transmit the disease to another.

Colorado's law would make test results available to any victim of the sexual offense who requests such disclosure, but those victims would face fines or jail terms if they disclosed the information to unauthorized people.

Of the dozen states which now require AIDS tests for sex offenders, Colorado is the first to put the test before conviction of sex crimes other than prostitution, Rowe said.

"If you wait for the person to be convicted, that could be a year or two. If you were assaulted, that wouldn't

give you a very good feeling," state Sen. Dave Wattenberg, the Republican who sponsored the Colorado law, said Thursday.

Nevada requires AIDS tests of people arrested for prostitution, and those suspects are billed \$100 for the test if convicted, Rowe said Thursday. Georgia's new law requires AIDS tests of anyone convicted of crimes involving sex or drug abuse and, eventually, of all inmates in state prisons. Beginning today, an AIDS carrier who engages in AIDS-transmitting behavior in Georgia without informing his partner will be guilty of the felony of reckless conduct.

Washington's law, which also extends anti-discrimination protection to people infected with AIDS, requires testing and counseling for those convicted of sex crimes, prostitution or intravenous drug use. Violent prison inmates could be subjected to AIDS tests against their will.

Ralph Nader attacks AAA laxity

WASHINGTON (AP) — Consumer-advocate Ralph Nader took the giant American Automobile Association to task Thursday for its alleged laxity in defending consumer interests.

The national association of auto clubs performs a wide variety of services for its nearly 30 million members, Nader said. But that "contrasts with its abdication of the consumer cause in other quite consequential fronts," he said.

Nader's charges came in a 10-page letter addressed to AAA President James B. Greal.

He was critical of the club for generally opposing government regulations, for example, pointing to club statements that safety and emissions rules should not be imposed without verifiable evidence of their need and value.

Nader asserted that the AAA has been weak in its efforts to encourage more recalls and said the organization has too quickly accepted an adequate industry effort to improve fuel efficiency.

AMA urges prison contact tracing, AIDS tests of prison inmates

CHICAGO (AP) — The American Medical Association on Thursday called on the states to trace the sexual partners of people infected with the AIDS virus and urged prisons to test inmates for exposure to the "deadly" disease.

The AMA approved both measures by voice vote along with a package of other AIDS proposals before adjourning its annual policy-making convention.

"I think that contact tracing (of sexual partners), at least in the heterosexual community, has the potential to substantially reduce the proliferation and spread of AIDS," said Dr. James Sammons, executive vice president of the 295,000-member AMA.

The AMA's 120-member House of Delegates also approved policies aimed at prohibiting athletes from using steroids, posting health warnings on tanning booths, urging airlines to ban smoking on all domestic flights and evaluating whether health warnings should be required on alcoholic beverages.

Dr. Don Chaplin, a delegate from Burlington, N.C., warned that doctors must emphasize the need to protect the identities of AIDS victims.

"I caution us to be very careful to do anything we can to protect confidentiality and to fight any discrimination because it would thwart our efforts to bring this disease under control," Chaplin said.

The doctors' organization renewed its call for mandatory AIDS-virus testing of all inmates because of the problems of intravenous drug use and homosexuality in prisons, practices that

spread the disease.

The AMA adopted a similar prison-testing proposal last year and re-approved it Thursday despite objections from several doctors that it would accomplish little.

The doctors approved what Chaplin said would be "broad expansions on contact tracing" of sexual partners to slow the spread of AIDS among heterosexuals.

Sammons said contact tracing had been effective in reducing such other sexually transmitted diseases as syphilis and gonorrhea.

The delegates also called on federal and state governments to expand treatment programs for intravenous drug abusers because they pose the most explosive potential for spreading AIDS into the heterosexual population.

Group opposes forest plan

WASHINGTON — The U.S. Forest Service's draft plans for the harvesting of old-growth trees in the Pacific Northwest spells disaster for the ancient forests, an environmental group charged Wednesday in a new report.

The Service "badly miscalculated" the amount of old-growth forest in the Pacific Northwest when developing the recently-released 50-year management plans for the 12 forests, according to the Wilderness Society.

As a result, logging could rise 15 percent above historic levels and decimate the remaining unprotected old-growth in the forests in western Washington, Oregon and northern California, the group said.

The Forest Service is proposing to continue a rapid liquidation of the

Stocks' broad gain caps erratic period

NEW YORK (AP) - Stock prices ran up a broad gain Thursday with a lift from declining interest rates, capping off an erratic but generally upbeat first half of 1988.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrial stocks rose 2.14 points. The average finished the first half of the year with a gain of 202.88 points, or 10.36 percent.

Advancing issues outnumbered declines by nearly 3 to 1 in nationwide trading of New York Stock Exchange-listed stocks, with 1,164 up, 411 down and 406 unchanged.

Volume on the floor of the Big Board came to 227.41 million shares, against 159.59 million in the previous session. Nationwide, consolidated volume in NYSE-listed issues, including trades in those stocks on regional exchanges and in the over-the-counter market, totaled 251.76 million shares.

A big chunk of Thursday's activity, as in many recent sessions, came in a handful of high-yielding utility stocks involved in trading strategies based on their impending dividend payments.

"Overall, analysts said investors

draw some management from a drop in bond market interest rates.

West German authorities raised some of their key interest rates Thursday, following a similar move in Britain earlier in the week.

But investors in the U.S. markets took the news in stride, apparently concluding that the Federal Reserve would not necessarily feel compelled to tighten credit in this country.

Brokers were expecting the pace of activity to slow today for the long July 4 holiday weekend approaches.

The NYSE's composite index of all its listed common stocks added 1.34 to 154.74.

Archbishop defies Pope by consecrating 4 bishops

EMDBOECONE, Switzerland (AP) — Archbishop Marcel Lefebvre defied the pope and consecrated four bishops Thursday, causing the first Roman Catholic schism in a century and his own expulsion from the church that was his life for 60 years.

The 82-year-old rebel prelate, who has spent a generation fighting the "autan" in-ches in a century and his own expulsion from the church that was his life for 60 years.

Lefebvre performed the historic act in a meadow below the seminary he founded 18 years ago and named the St. Pius X Pri-terianity for the pope who condemned mod-ernism in a 1907 encyclical.

His chosen Mass, as usual, was the 16th-century Tridentine rite in Latin, which was replaced by the vernacular under the 1962 Second Vatican Council reforms he detests.

A Vatican statement issued less than two hours later condemned the consecra-tions as an act of schism, a formal break

with the Holy See that had not occurred since the so-called Old Catholics rebelled when the doctrine of papal infallibility was proclaimed.

It announced the excommunication of Lefebvre and the four new bishops — British, French, Spanish and Swiss gradu-ates of traditionalist seminaries — for refus-ing to submit to papal authority. The Briton, Richard Williamson, 44, heads a traditionalist seminary in Ridgefield, Conn.

During the four-hour ceremony, the French archbishop told thousands who

crowded the tent that he was creating new bishops as an "operation of survival" for his movement to ensure continuity "of the church of all times."

Lefebvre says the church has been infil-trated by "wolves and thieves" and is being consumed by the "cancer of liberalism."

"The Lord may soon call me home," he said Thursday. "I must not leave you or-phaned."

John Paul sent Lefebvre a telegram Wednesday urging him "not to betray the episcopate" and summoning him to Rome.

At the consecration, his audience laughed

when the archbishop said the pope sent the official card of the papal nuncio to take him to Rome the same night.

He called the Vatican "sanctions" null and void and told his supporters "not to pay any attention" to them. He said canon law permits his actions "in a state of emer-gency," which the Vatican denies.

In a hastily beginning the ceremony, he showed his argument that the Vatican not be, was on a "schismatic" course be-cause it accepted "errors once condemned" that were leading to "destruction of the church."

Israelis close 7 schools

JERUSALEM (AP) — Arab students threw stones and smashed windshields during protests in Jerusalem on Thursday, and authori-ties shut down seven Palas-tinian schools.

A 17-year-old Arab was shot and wounded in a clash with soldiers during a funeral in the occupied West Bank.

An Arab-teen-ager shot by sol-diers two weeks ago died in a West Bank hospital, bringing to 213 the number of Palestinians killed since the "intifadeh," or uprising, began Dec. 8. Four Israelis also have been killed.

In Jerusalem, Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir told reporters that Israel was "closer to the end" of the uprising against the 21-year occupation of the West Bank and Golan Strip.

Dozens of high school girls staged rock-throwing protests in several parts of Arab east Jerusalem, and police responded with tear gas, Israeli radio reported. It said several car windshields were smashed and two girls were arrested.

Two male students were arrested after throwing stones at police from a high school in the walled Old City, the radio said.

Hanoi quits Cambodia

PHNOM PENH, Cambodia (AP) — A group of fleeing Cambodians lined up airport road Thursday as Vietnam pulled its military leaders out of Cambodia, loosening its grip on this long-suffering country after nearly a decade of combat.

Vietnam admitted for the first time that about 25,000 of its troops have died since it invaded Cambodia in 1978 and toppled the China-backed Khmer Rouge regime.

On Thursday, it officially turned over control of its war against anti-Vietnamese insurgents to Cambodian commanders.

We think the Cambodian armed forces can shoulder their responsibility themselves," said Lt. Gen. Le Kha Phieu, a former deputy commander of Vietnamese forces in Cambodia.

Gen. Le Ngoc Hien, the Viet-namese commander in Cambodia, and about 300 of his officers were arrested by thousands of Viet-namites after flying from Phnom Penh to Ho Chi Minh City, once known as Saigon.

Earlier in Phnom Penh, an esti-mate of 100,000 Cambodians fled the city by boat, bus and on foot, and about to the airport as the Viet-namese officers departed aboard Soviet-made aircraft for the short flight to Vietnam.

Stover trial jury to be picked in north Idaho

BOISE — The jurors for the first-degree murder trial of former Twin Falls elementary school principal William M. Stover will be chosen in northern Idaho.

Thursday, Fourth District Judge Alan Schwartzman announced his decision on a proposed change of venue and asked for briefs to be filed on the validity of a statute forbidding insanity defenses.

Stover's attorney has filed a motion

indicating he wants to use an insanity defense in the trial.

Widespread publicity of the case had prompted Ada County Public Defender Alan Trimming to ask Schwartzman to move the trial to another county.

Schwartzman exercised one of the options available to judges faced with a potentially tainted jury pool: picking jurors in another county, bringing the jurors to Ada County and sequestering them.

"While I feel the press coverage has not been exaggerated, inflammatory

or excessive, this is a case, in my own off-hand opinion, that a vast, vast majority of Ada County has heard about and formed an opinion on," Schwartzman said.

Ada County Deputy Prosecutor Jay Rosenthal dropped his opposition to the change of venue motion at the hearing Thursday.

"I am somewhat relieved the state is not contesting this motion," Schwartzman said. "In the interest of justice, the criminal justice system, this is much wiser."

Stover, 50, sat through the hearing,

which lasted less than an hour in an orange jumpsuit with handcuffs attached to waist chains. He has been in custody since early December after being charged with three counts of first-degree murder.

He is charged with the murder of his wife and two teen-age daughters last Nov. 30. His wife, June, 50, and two daughters, 12-year-old Korinne and 16-year-old Kristina, died of shotgun wounds to the chest at their Boise duplex.

Stover was found in the duplex with his wrists slashed. He spent

about a week in a Salt Lake hospital while recovering from the wrist wounds before returning to Ada County.

Trimming started in motion two legal challenges at the Thursday hearing.

He wants to suppress three statements made by Stover while in the hospital. Rosenthal agreed to suppress one statement made by Stover in Boise a few hours after he was admitted to the hospital.

The statements have not been made public.

The attorneys will file written briefs on whether two statements made after the original, inadmissible statement, can be used at trial.

Schwartzman said he intends to rule on the motions July 22.

Trimming said he wanted to see what impact the inadmissible statements had on two subsequent interviews in Salt Lake, and whether the last two interviews are fruits of the first.

Trimming also said he wanted to use an insanity defense in the trial.

Commission OKs zoning for company

TWIN FALLS — The City Planning and Zoning Commission has approved a zoning ordinance that could enable a handicraft manufacturer to locate in town, bringing between 30 to 40 jobs with it.

Mario Jason Originals, a company based in North Hollywood, Calif., has indicated its interest to buy the old Wolterton building for a manufacturing plant, said Joan Brawley, chairman of the commission.

The company makes specialty items for gift shops.

The commission unanimously voted Tuesday to recommend that the city council pass the ordinance that would rezone an area in the southwest quadrant of the original town plat from commercial to manufacturing.

City Planning Director LaMar Orton said the commission voted to exclude from the proposed zone change the portions of two blocks that front on Shoshone Street.

Brawley said the streets, from 3rd Avenue West to 5th Avenue West on Shoshone Street are best suited for commercial businesses.

She said the rest of the area that would be affected by the proposed zone change consists mostly of businesses that do not depend on foot traffic.

Brawley said the change would bring some nonconforming businesses including Pepsi Cola Bottling Co. and Triangle-Young's Dairy, into conformance.

"We all felt like it would clean up an area of the town that had a whole lot of nonconforming uses," Brawley said.

She said the move is part of an ongoing strategy to keep zones current with the growth of the town.

"It allows the city to grow in an orderly fashion," Brawley said.

She said allowing light industrial plants into the area would promote a good business atmosphere.

Orton said he has been telling people requesting permission to set up light industrial businesses or add light industrial operations to existing businesses in the area that they could not do so.

Brawley said the decision to rezone was not sparked by the gift-manufacturing company, but by the existing need.

"(Mario Jason Originals) had nothing to do with the zoning request," Brawley said. "It happened to come at the same time that we were making the plans."

She said before the company would buy the property, the city council would have to approve the zone change at their next council meeting July 18.

"It's not dirty manufacturing" that produces waste, she said. "It's strictly creative work with their hands."

"If we could find all sorts of businesses that didn't have any waste we'd be in seventh heaven," Brawley said.

She said Wayne Bausch, president of Mario Jason Originals, has indicated to the commission that he supports the new zone change.

Brawley said the company, which markets its products internationally, would build a central shipping area and parking space for employees and retailers.

School budgets

Blaine includes school expansion

KETCHUM — The Blaine County School Board recently approved an estimated \$9.4 million school budget for fiscal 1988-89 that includes \$1.3 million for expansion of Hemingway School.

The total budget is about a \$176 million more than the current year's budget of \$8.28 million, or a 6.5 percent increase. It includes a \$1.6 million special levy approved by voters in March.

Nine new positions have been added in the district, causing the facility salary budget to jump to \$1,767 million from \$816,294. Among the new positions are two guidance counselors, one for elementary-aged children and the other for secondary school children. This will be Blaine County's first counselor for elementary ages.

Construction began recently on a media center and eight new classrooms at Hemingway. Other improvements include carpeting, a restructured roof, structured rather than accordion-type walls and an indoor-sprinkler system necessary to meet state codes.

The project could be scaled back, however, due to complaints from area residents that other schools in the area are being neglected. The board, responding to the complaints, asked architect Jim McLaughlin of Ketchum to determine how much the district could save if work on half of the classrooms is stopped.

Carol Rhinehart and Gail Newman, co-chairs of the Hailey/Bellevue Parents-Teachers Organization, have said this year's scheduled improvements for Heming-

way include the media center and just two classrooms. Construction on the project began earlier this month.

Gooding agrees to 5-percent rise

GOODING — The Gooding School Board earlier this month adopted a \$2,946,915 annual budget for the 1988-89 school year.

The new budget represents a 5-percent increase in the local property tax levy and about \$68,000 more in state support money for a total budget increase of \$4,222 over last year, new Superintendent Jim Cobble told the board.

Anticipated revenue for the new year is based on Gooding school enrollment remaining stable at 1,050 students, Cobble said. State money for supporting local districts is based on the number of students in the district, as well as the value of taxable property in the district.

Cobble said tax value has declined by \$2 million, causing a compensation mechanism in the state equalization formula to kick in and increase state support for the district.

Gooding teachers and support personnel received a 2 percent salary increase and an increase in fringe benefits to pay for a 24 percent jump in health insurance.

The salary increase puts Gooding's base salary for a beginning teacher at \$14,404, which, when coupled with fringe benefits, still makes Gooding salaries the

lowest in the Magic Valley, Cobble said.

Cobble says as long as the student enrollment remains stable the district "should be all right," but any serious drop in enrollment could spell financial difficulties for Gooding schools.

Negotiations may affect Shoshone

SHOSHONE — The Shoshone School Board earlier this month adopted a budget for the coming school year that calls for a \$1.2 million total budget and reflects almost \$45,000 in increased revenue from all state programs. It includes all federal funds and a local taxpayer approved \$455,000 supplemental levy.

The spending plan includes plans for a \$34,364 reserve and calls for continued reduction in the district's estimated \$100,000 operating deficit.

Superintendent Wayne Waddoups told the board the budget, although adopted, could have to be amended in the future if the ongoing teacher negotiations result in a new contract that significantly affects the district's funding projections.

The amount of money expected to come into the district for the coming school year is "pretty well set," he said.

He said yesterday, however, that he doesn't expect any major problems to arise between the Shoshone Education Association and the district. The two sides may be able to meet next week, he said.

City tables sign law amendments

TWIN FALLS — The City Planning and Zoning Commission has tabled a number of amendments to the city's sign ordinance, including a proposal to increase the size of electronically activated signs.

Commission member Henry LeMoynes said the proposed ordinance is too broad to be effective for all parts of town.

"We need to refine it a little more," LeMoynes said. "(And) add a little more control."

However, he said there were too many good points about the ordinance to kill it altogether.

This was the second time that the commission has tabled an ordinance regulating the size of the signs.

Earlier in the year, the commission sent a proposal back to the sign committee that would have allowed some businesses to display messages up to 75 square feet.

Magic Valley Mall officials have said they want to build a 73 square foot electronic message center.

The latest proposed ordinance would have allowed the electronic messages on signs to be 100 square feet regardless of how big the sign is.

Existing requirements limit messages to no larger than 25 percent of an entire sign and no more than 50 square feet overall.

The new ordinance would have placed limitations on the size of professional office overlay signs.

The ordinance also would allow schools and churches to have message centers by special use permit.

LeMoynes said the sign committee will rework the ordinance and the commission will review their recommendations at its next meeting.

Hailey adds airport commission

Members of the Hailey City Council met Monday with the Blaine County Board of Commissioners to sign an addendum to the 1985 Joint Operating Agreement, which governs the control and operation of the airport.

"The atmosphere was congenial as

Hailey councilmembers Mary Anne from the state Department of Aeronautics and Rick Davis were present for the signing.

The recomposed airport commission will have 11 members, replacing the seven-member board to which the Hailey City Council objected in November. As a compromise to the city's demand of 50 percent representation, the commission will include all four Hailey city councilmembers, all three county commissioners, and one elected official either the mayor or a council member from each of the cities of Bellevue, Ketchum and Sun Valley. The 11th representative will be appointed by Gov. Cecil D. Andrus.

At a press time yesterday, Andrus had yet to make the appointment, but has promised Mix a representative would be present at the newly formed commission's first meeting on Tuesday.

To lay the groundwork for the new airport board to function smoothly, the Hailey City Council had a special meeting June 23 to vote on the addendum and the repeal of two city ordinances on the books.

City ordinances 441 and 494 placed restrictions on airport operations.

The atmosphere is designed to recreate the feeling of a cool desert plateau in the evening. It features neon, awnings, cactus silhouettes and thousands of tiny mirrored ceiling lights to give the impression of a night sky.

High-tech firms reverse their ed stand

MOSCOW (AP) — High-technology industry leaders in Boise still are assessing their specific hiring needs, but overall they support creation of a College of Technology at Boise State University, a spokeswoman for the group says.

Cynthia Johnson, public affairs manager for Hewlett-Packard Corp. in Boise, said Wednesday that a group of representatives from high-tech companies in the Boise area still does not know exactly what sort of educational services it needs near those

companies' southwestern Idaho operations. But, Ms. Johnson told the Lewiston Morning Tribune, reports that the group had sent a letter to the state Board of Education stating that its members would not hire many of the type of four-year technology degree graduates (STU hopes to produce) at the now college were inaccurate and premature.

The initial report of the letter originated with the Moscow Idahoian, and Managing Editor David Ledford

said Ms. Johnson contacted the paper after the story was written, had it read to her and said it accurately portrayed the feelings of the business leaders. Ledford also quoted Ms. Johnson as saying at that time that she had been contacted by numerous people about her original comments on the situation.

Among those original comments, Ms. Johnson said, "We've really been up front about the fact that we prefer people to go for a full engineering degree rather than a four-year technol-

ogy degree." She also said Hewlett-Packard hires very few people with four-year technology degrees.

The board meeting in Moscow this week was considering plans to proceed with the first of four phases of the \$20 million College of Technology complex.

"Basically, all of the firms feel strongly in support of the College of Technology," Ms. Johnson said. "We're in the process of drafting some sort of letter, but it was not timed for this meeting."

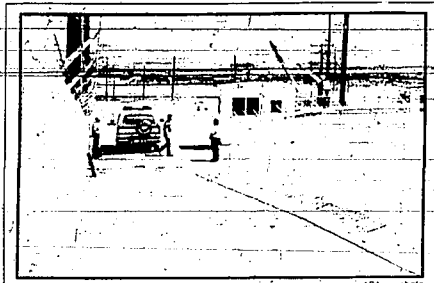

Hercules prepares for Soviets' arrival

MAGNA, Utah (AP) — The impending arrival of Soviet inspectors at missile manufacturer Hercules Inc. has prompted sweeping security enhancements and employee training in counter-intelligence awareness, officials say.

The Soviets, who will watch shipments of Pershing II missiles banned under the Intermediate-Range Nuclear Forces treaty, are expected to arrive sometime this weekend to begin their visit at the sprawling complex in the western Salt Lake Valley.

An advance team arrived Monday to prepare the contingent's living quarters.

"We have updated, renewed and increased our security," said company spokesman Jack DeMann. "We're prepared to do anything to

safeguard our operations." Hercules, a major defense contractor involved in the development of every U.S. strategic missile system since 1960, stopped producing the Pershing II a year ago.

Nevertheless, the inspectors will be stationed at a checkpoint outside Plant 1, where the missiles once were assembled, for up to 13 years to assure the Kremlin the U.S. is abiding by the treaty signed by President Reagan and Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev.

The inspectors will have access only to the checkpoint and a single-lane, fenced-in road that encircles a 185-acre parcel of land containing Plant 1, DeMann said.

The rest of the 7,000-acre facility, including the new Backlog West automated missile manufacturing plant,

Panel: Building maintenance gets nod

POCATELLO (AP) — The new state "prison" will command a large share of the state's building budget in the coming years, but the chairman of the state's Permanent Building Fund Advisory Council sees maintenance of current buildings as a priority spending need.

Robert Peyron, acknowledged the council's tour of state facilities this spring and summer has underscored the need for major construction activity at some sites.

"Everywhere you go to, the needs are very legitimate," Peyron said. "But I would say the most pressing

thing in this state is maintenance. ... We've got to budget more for maintenance and save what we've got."

"This knocking down a building to put up a new one," he said, "well, I'm of the opinion that we've got to take care of what we already have."

The state has about \$12 million a year from dedicated revenue sources available for capital improvements. But because of a number of major projects it has only been able to commit less than half that amount to maintaining the government's billion-dollar inventory of buildings throughout the state.

Hydro project gets extension

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — The city of Idaho Falls has been granted an 18-month extension to study its proposed Shelley Hydroelectric Project.

Approval of the extension by Federal Energy Regulatory Commission came two months after the city sought more time to complete research on the project.

Municipal officials will now will have until March 15, 1989, to study the Shelley project. The commission had originally set a Sept. 15 deadline on the environmental studies.

"That extension is a plus," Idaho Falls Councilman Paul Hovey said Thursday. But he said the city may still need more time to finish the work if it runs into problems gaining access to private property along the Snake River and another extension request was possible.

The commission has asked the city to complete 29 studies on the 110-megawatt generation project's environmental, recreational and economic effects on the Shelley area.

Water users at odds over Portneuf flows

POCATELLO (AP) — Farmers and fisheries experts are clashing in southeastern Idaho over flows in the upper Portneuf River that has been clogged with so much sediment and aquatic vegetation during the past two drought years that irrigation water is being lost.

"Nobody will allow us to flush it out so we are losing a lot of the water," said Keith Bennett, president of the Portneuf Marsh Valley Canal Co.

The blockage has resulted in upstream meadows being flooded and downstream flows reduced. Officials say flows will be so low in two more weeks the diversion ditches will no longer fill.

River watermaster Tom Bloxham has applied for a permit to remove the obstructive vegetation even though the Army Corps of Engineers said one was not needed. But the state Department of Fish and Game has opposed the work because it would disturb fishery habitat.

"Where they were talking about it would not have increased water yield and we didn't feel the benefits were there to do it at this time," said regional Fish and Game Supervisor David Nader. He said dredging would increase turbidity and reduce spawning areas.

Environmental officials believe previous canal dredging was a major factor in causing the sediment problem, which was identified as the leading cause of the fishery's decline.

Bennett acknowledged the need to regulate streams but farming should take precedence over fish during times of drought. He claimed hay and grain yields have dropped because the stream has not been cleaned out.

"We feel as irrigators that we should be able to do work so we can provide water to the users," he said. "The fish people don't see it that way."

By mid-July, officials said irrigators in the area will have to turn to springs and wells to keep their stock watered.

Polygamist brother calls kin 'gentlemen'

OGDEN, Utah (AP) — The brother of two one-time members of a polygamist sect named down in Texas says his siblings were "gentlemen and fantastic fathers."

"They'd do anything for you if you asked for help. They were good people," Glen Chynoweth said Wednesday at his Ogden home.

Mark and Duane Chynoweth, who once followed polygamist Ervil LeBaron, were shot to death Monday in Houston, along with Duane Chynoweth's 8-year-old daughter, Jennifer.

A third man, Eddie Marston, was fatally shot the same day in Irving, Texas. Marston was one of LeBaron's stepsons. Mark Chynoweth was LeBaron's son-in-law. Investigators say the slayings are part of a long-running polygamist cult dispute.

The slain Chynoweth brothers left the Church of the Lamb of God after LeBaron, the sect's founder, died at Utah State Prison in 1981.

Glen Chynoweth denies either of his brothers were polygamists. However, two of LeBaron's wives were Chynoweth sisters, and one of LeBaron's daughters was married to another Chynoweth brother.

Mark and Duane Chynoweth are among a number of people who have been killed or have disappeared since breaking their ties with LeBaron's sect. Authorities speculate the victims were on a hit list left by LeBaron now being possibly being carried out by sect members.

"I don't know why they were on that list. They were true to him (LeBaron) until he died," Glen Chynoweth said.

Glen Chynoweth, a divorced father of nine, said he left home shortly before his mother joined LeBaron's church.

"My mom converted to that and that put them (his brothers and sisters) under her influence. I was out of the house when they converted," he said.

polygamy in 1890. Though their religious beliefs were at odds, Chynoweth maintained close ties with his family. "There was a difference of belief, but there was a gentleman's difference," he recalled.

Now, in the wake of his brothers' slayings, Glen Chynoweth says he is concerned about his own safety.

"I'm a little apprehensive. I got my deer rifle where I can get to it a little quicker," he said.

Overweight kids need special exercise plan

Ask an overweight child about exercise, and chances are you'll find someone who shuns activity. Many avoid competitive sports and hate gym class because they're picked last for teams and tend to sit on the sidelines.

If your child is 20 percent above normal weight, popular workouts like running or aerobic dance may injure her because of the stress of extra pounds on joints. Kids with weight problems need activities that will get them moving without overwhelming or discouraging them.

Walking is best because it's simple and safe. Taking a walk at least four times a week for 30 minutes, or longer, is a sound exercise program. Most sedentary kids should start with 10 minutes and gradually increase duration. For most, the pace should raise the heart rate to at least 150 beats per minute.

Cycling supports body weight without stressing back, knees or hips. But some heavy children might feel uncomfortable on a bike, and others may pedal too slowly for a training effect.

Swimming will not children active, work the cardiovascular system and improve muscle tone, though it may not promote weight loss. Water makes movement easier for overweight kids since body fat makes them buoyant. But many shy away from wearing a swimsuit in public.

These low-impact aerobic activities help burn calories. Once children start to lose weight, you might encourage them to try calisthenics.

Should Tyson retire - at 22?

Fellow boxers say he shouldn't - and probably won't - call it quits

NEW YORK (AP) - On the day Mike Tyson turned 22, several great boxers, including Sugar Ray Leonard and Joe Frazier, said the undefeated heavyweight champion should not retire - and did not think he would.

Tyson, saying he was "burned out" and wanted to devote more time to his family, said this week he would call it quits. His comment came after he had raised his record to 35-0 by stopping previously unbeaten Michael Spinks in 91 seconds at Atlantic City, N.J., Monday night for his 31st knockout.

Thursday, at the United Nations, where many outstanding fighters and boxing dignitaries honored Jose Sulzmann, president of the World Boxing Council, there was almost unanimous agreement that Tyson would be back.

"I think you'll see him back," said Leonard, a three-time world champion, who retired for a third time last year after outpunching Marvellous Marvin Hagler for the middleweight title.

"I think it's just a matter of re-

solving some of the differences he's had in his career, such as his managerial problems.

The managerial problems, involving Bill Cayton, whom Tyson is suing in an effort to break the contract and prevent the manager from getting his one-third share of a more than \$21 million purse from the Spinks fight.

"He's so young; he has so much going for him," Leonard said. "I think he'll take a break to take care of those problems, and then you'll see him back."

"But then again, who's out there for him to fight?"

"I wish I could knock my guys down as fast as he does."

Frazier, the former heavyweight champion and a quick knockout artist during his prime, agreed with Leonard.

"I don't see any reason why he should retire," Frazier said. "For what reason? He's only 22."

"What would he do, get bored? Why should he retire and get rusty, and try and come back two or three years later? It doesn't make any sense."

Supplemental draft turns up few stars

Many NFL teams remain wary; several don't plan to take part

NEW YORK (AP) - Running back Brian Davis, who flunked out of Pittsburgh, and David Hood, a nationally ranked punter in 1985-86, at Tennessee State who did not play last season, were among 17 players who will be available in an NFL supplemental draft Wednesday.

Also eligible was Desmond Moreland, listed as a wide receiver from Purdue, but the Chicago Bears, listed as a wide receiver, said it had no record that he ever had played.

There were no big names on this year's list, unlike last year when Seattle selected All-American linebacker Brian Bosworth, who opted to turn pro after completing his degree requirements, rather than use his final year of eligibility at Oklahoma.

NFL spokesman Jim Hofferman declined Thursday to identify the players who will be available, but the Associated Press learned that they also include Tennessee kicker Ian Howfield, a walk-on who did not play in a varsity game, offensive lineman Jerome McLaurin of Mississippi State and 13 others from smaller

schools or junior colleges.

Under a procedure which went into effect this year, any supplemental draft will be held before training camps open, and if necessary, another before the start of the regular season.

The drafts are for players who were not eligible for the regular college player draft last April.

At least one team, the Chicago Bears, said Thursday it does not plan to participate Wednesday.

Spokesmen for the Denver Broncos and Buffalo Bills indicated it was unlikely their teams will take part.

Some teams are reluctant to risk offending college coaches, including Pitt's Mike Gottfried, who opposes supplemental drafts for players who get involved with sports agents.

Ohio State wide receiver Chris Carter was chosen by Philadelphia prior to the start of the 1987 season after losing his eligibility because of involvement with an agent.

Navratilova scrambles for narrow victory

WIMBLEDON, England (AP) - Martina Navratilova did it the hard way, beating her oldest rival and close friend in a bizarre ending that left her feeling like a creature from outer space.

"Steffi Graf did it the easy way, leaving her opponent feeling very, very naked out there."

Both ways led to the women's singles final at Wimbledon, where the two best female players in the world will battle for a place in tennis history.

Navratilova beat Chris Evert Thursday in a seamy semifinal that ended in confusion and controversy, while Graf breezed into the final by routing third-seeded Pam Shriver.

Navratilova, seeking a tournament-record seventh straight singles title and their 78th meeting dating back to 1973, Graf then overwhelmed Shriver 6-1, 6-2 in 59 minutes, leaving her one victory away from her third straight Grand Slam tournament title and setting up a rematch of last year's Wimbledon final.

The pressure is certainly on me because she has won this title so many times and grass is her surface," Graf ranked No. 1.

Both matches Thursday were replays of last year's semifinals, when Navratilova beat Evert in a thrilling three-setter and Graf won all but two games from

Shriver.

The latest Navratilova-Evert battle had the strangest ending in their long and lively series.

Facing her fourth match point in this rain-interrupted contest, Evert hit a cross-court forehand that clipped the net and landed by the Navratilova's sideline.

Evert, thinking the ball was in and she

had another chance, jumped up and raised her arms in celebration.

Navratilova, unsure of the call, turned toward linesman David Shepherd to look for an in or out signal.

After a brief pause, Shepherd stuck his right arm out to indicate the ball was out. Evert stood by the baseline and stood at chair umpire Richard Lamb,

who announced "the ball was called out."

Television replays were inconclusive.

Evert, a three-time Wimbledon champion, remained on the court for several seconds before walking to the net and shaking hands with Navratilova. She bypassed the traditional handshake with the umpire, however, as the capacity Centre Court crowd boomed his call.

"I just was stunned," Evert said. "I thought the ball was in, I guess I needed time for it to sink in."

"It was just a bad break for me," she added, "and bad luck considering the match was so close."

But Evert, who has always been gracious in defeat, remained philosophical.

"I was not surprised he called it out," she said. "After thinking about it, though, it really doesn't matter what I think. I wasn't sitting on the line."

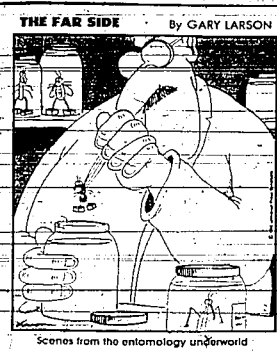
Navratilova, who leads the series 41-37, was as uncertain as the crowd about the final call.

"I can't say it was good and I can't say it was not," she said.

Despite the controversial ending, Navratilova said the victory didn't leave any sour taste in my mouth. "It's just too bad that it had to end that way."

The pro-Evert crowd was sorry. "I asked how she felt about getting the cold shoulder from the fans," Navratilova said. "I thought I was a Martian out there."

Magic Valley celebrates the Fourth

*Parades, barbecues,
rodeos, fireworks, art,
music, games abound*

Magic Valley residents have plenty of reason to celebrate this long Fourth of July weekend. Not only are we commemorating our nation's birthday, we are also celebrating Idaho's upcoming Centennial.

Among the many activities and events planned around the valley this weekend, perhaps none is more significant than the Idaho Centennial Statehood Day planned for Sunday at the Twin Falls County Fairgrounds in Eiler.

The event will combine an old-fashioned county fair with a variety of entertainment groups, historical exhibits and demonstrations of old-time skills. Highlights include an antique style show, a visit by Gov. Cecil Andrus and a stagecoach ride.

The celebration begins at noon and runs until dusk. And it's all free.

"People who want to bring their picnic lunch can come and stay all day and not spend a dime," says Carol Stephens, chairman of the fair.

The first event will be an "old-fashioned church service" at 12:15 p.m. with a circuit riding preacher portrayed by Jim Summell of the Filer United Missionary Church.

At 1 p.m., patriotic music by Roger Vincent and Mary Walker will be followed by the keynote speech by Gov. Andrus.

George Lattimer, a Jerome pioneer, will tell about "100 Years of Change" and the Buhl High School trumpet group will perform.

Other afternoon entertainment includes the Magic Valley Little Theatre at 2:30 p.m.; Shim Sham Dancers at 3 p.m.; Col. Christian's German Bavarian band at 3:30 p.m.; Partners, Brothers and Friends at 4 p.m. and Lori Head Dancers at 4:30.

Demonstrations will be given throughout the day in the Merchants Building.

The fair concludes with a concert by the Twin Falls City Band at 8:15 p.m.

Other Fourth of July events planned in the area for the weekend include:

TWIN FALLS

Twin Falls residents will be treated to the traditional fireworks display on Monday night at the College of Southern Idaho.

The celebration begins at 8 p.m. with a concert presented by the City Band in front of the Fine Arts Auditorium.

The fireworks show, sponsored by Universal Frozen Foods, begins at approximately 9:30 p.m. at the usual campus location — south of the Herrett Museum and west of the Expo

Center. The show is expected to last approximately 30 to 40 minutes. Spectators should be aware that a fall-out area will be roped off in front and behind the fireworks display. Organizers say good views will be available at most areas around the campus since none of the show is ground display.

BUHL

This Fourth of July weekend marks Buhl's 23rd annual Sagebrush Days. The celebration begins at 9 p.m. on Tuesday night with a youth street dance held on Main Street between Roper's and Western Auto.

A horsehoe tournament is planned for Saturday, at 10 a.m. Players can start signing up at 9 a.m. at the Eastman Park horsehoe pits. A rainbow trout luncheon is scheduled for 11 a.m. until 2 p.m. at the Senior Citizen's Center. Then, at 8 p.m., adults will get their chance to dance. "Dakota" will play at the National Guard Armory.

Activities begin on Sunday with an ecumenical church service at 11 a.m. in the middle school gymnasium. At 4 p.m., Raphael Cristy will perform "Charlie Russell's Yarns" in the middle school auditorium. At 7 p.m., a gospel concert is scheduled in the school gym. Also at 7 p.m., the Eastern Idaho Rodeo Association rodeo begins at the Buhl rodeo grounds.

Monday's events begin at 7 a.m. with a pancake breakfast at the senior center. A Fourth of July Fun Run along Main Street starts in front of the center at 8 a.m. Registration begins at 7.

Buhl's famous Fourth parade is set to begin at 10:30 a.m., running along Main Street and Broadway. After the parade, an antique car display and a wild trout scramble are on tap for Eastman Park. The firehose competition will be at 2 p.m. at Paris Field.

For those in the mood, a summer evening concert will begin at 8:30 p.m. in the park. The rodeo continues at 7 p.m. A fireworks display will be set off at dusk in North Park.

BLISS

The Old Time Family will entertain Monday at a family barbecue in the Bliss Community Park, followed by a fireworks display at dusk.

The barbecue begins Monday at 6 p.m. Cost is \$1.50 per plate and drinks of pop, ice tea and coffee are 25 cents each.

"We tried to keep the cost down so the families can afford it," says Charlene Stroud of the Bliss Chamber of Commerce, noting that several businesses donated food and funds to minimize the cost to the public.



Western fiddle music also starts at 6 p.m. and will continue until dark, when the fireworks begin.

"We'll have twice as many fireworks as we had before," says Stroud. To raise money for improved fire works, businesses contributed cash and local residents filled donation cans in stores and restaurants. School children sold tickets on a drawing for a new video cassette recorder. For selling the most tickets, Mandy Faulkner won a 10-speed bicycle. The winning ticket for the VCR will be drawn during the barbecue.

GOODING

The annual free community barbe-

cue will be held in Gooding July 4. Sponsored by the Gooding Chamber of Commerce and Gooding City, the Fourth of July meal will be served in East Park beginning at noon. Idaho beef, corn and potatoes will be featured items on the menu. Mayor Gene Heller says food will be served until all participants have been served.

Fireworks are scheduled for Gooding High School Football field at dusk. There will be a variety of entertainment at the park through the day, as well as activities, games and races for children.

WENDELL

Veterans from Wendell American

Legion Post 41 are presenting their annual July 4 fireworks display Monday at dusk.

Expanding rockets will be ignited at the football field behind the new gymnasium at 700 East Main Street.

"It usually takes about an hour to set off the display that we have," says Veteran Dee Collins.

Although the legion is the main sponsor for the fireworks display, Collins says, other contributors include the Wendell Recreation Dept., Wendell Volunteer Firemen, the City of Wendell and various businesses and individuals.

"The public is invited free," he says. The Wendell legion's annual barbecue, traditionally held on July 4, has

been moved to the latter part of August to be held in conjunction with Farm Appreciation Day.

RUPERT

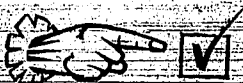
The Rupert 4th of July Celebration is the main attraction in the Mini-Cassia area.

JACKPOT — Radio stations that play a tape of 10 songs, back-to-back without comment, would do well to revive the friendly disc jockey-music fan relationship of older radio days, says country music star Janie Frickie.

"A little bit more of a personal approach, I guess is what I think radio needs to go back to," she says. "It would be nice to have the programmers and the radio disc jockeys have a little bit more creativity with the audience... and play what the fans want to hear."

In a telephone interview from California on Tuesday, Frickie said she is on a three-week tour that includes shows in six states in as many days. On Sunday, she will stop at Coeur d'Alene in Jackpot to perform two shows at 8 and 11 p.m.

In the old days, says Frickie, a DJ would chat with listeners about the country-western songs and singers.

A nice change for modern radio, she says, would be for announcers to "tell interesting little stories about the songs they play on radio instead of just plugging in a tape that plays 10 in a row, where there's just no rela-

Betty White enjoys change of pace as Rose Nylund in 'Golden Girls'

Golden is defined in the dictionary as "prosperous and joyful; gifted in some way that promises future success." Since 1985, "The Golden Girls," NBC's Emmy-winning Saturday-night comedy series, has lived up to the name. It has been an inspiration to television viewers—especially those in the over-50 generation. In a society that stresses youthfulness, most of the episodes examine situations that older adults face and add light to the humorous and poignant relationships of the four single and mature women living together.

"I am thrilled with the show's success," says Betty White, who plays widow and grief counselor Rose Nylund. "Through the years, we have cut through the demographics of every group. You don't get that many opportunities."

White's character is quite different from her well-known role as Sue Ann Nivens, the aggressive, man-hungry "Happy Homemaker" on "The Mary Tyler Moore Show" (1972-77).

At the start of the first year, White was set to read for the role of the man-hungry Blanche, now played by Rue McClanahan. But Blanche was too close to the Nivens character, and the producers decided that White would fit better in the part of Rose. White was delighted.

"The rule of thumb hasn't changed from the pilot," the actress says. "And I don't think she has changed a lot either. It was Jay Sandrich who directed the pilot and worked with White on "MTM" and his wisdom that said Rose wasn't dumb. She just takes a little longer to get things than the others.

"Rose was a switch for me," she continues. "I always thought in some ways that I was Sue Ann. But I'm dis-

covering now that there is some of Mary Tyler Moore Show" (1975 and 1976). The others were for hosting the daytime game show "Just Men!" (1983) and for Outstanding Actress in a Comedy Series for "Golden Girls" in 1985.

White, along with co-stars Beatrice Arthur, Estelle Getty and Rue McClanahan, brings an abundance of experience into the show. After a career in radio, White starred in her own

gets her chest, upper lip, nose, and baby hair from mom Janet Leigh. And what about dad, Tony Curtis? "The circles under my eyes!" she jokes.

Q: We hear that entertainer Ann Jillian has fallen hard for a much younger man. How is her husband taking it? — M.R.

A: The story's not that exciting. For a long time now, Ann has been married to Andy Murcia, a tough ex-cop from Chicago. He also has been functioning as her manager. Murcia apparently tired of the business end of show biz, and Ann hired 22-year-old Brad Rumble, a recent UCLA grad, to take her husband's place. It's all very unspicy and unglamorous. "We both trust Brad, and I'll still be ground," Andy tells me.

Q: Is William Boyd, the author of "The New Confessions," the currently acclaimed novel, by any chance related to William Boyd, whom I remember as TV's famed "Hopalong Cassidy"? —

A: Not even distantly. William Boyd, the author, is a young Brit-isher, while the cowboy star of the same name died in 1972 at the age of 74, and was as American as well. Roy Rogers. Novelist Boyd had me in stitches when I relayed your query, relating how they were mixed up once during a recent radio interview in France. The announcer (who'd obvi-

It soon became very clear to Jean that he was never going to hang out his shingle as a doctor. Acting became his primary interest and he was soon working in stage and TV productions all over Canada. A part in a TV drama about the legendary actress Sarah Bernhardt starring Zoe Caldwell brought Jean to the attention of the producers of the Broadway play "Dracula." He read for the part and was signed to

take over the lead from Frank Langella. He was supposed to go into the play in two weeks, but when Langella developed a sore throat he had to step in sooner.

His present stint on "All My Children" has given the actor the largest exposure so far and he is happy to stay with the soap as long as his character continues to be richly defined.

The actor is also involved with the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation. He has put together softball games between rival soap stars which have proven very successful as charity events. His involvement started when he was

asked to participate in an auction in which he and other actors were bid for to benefit the charity. Jean commanded the highest price and became the dinner companion of a rich lady for the evening. The Cystic Fibrosis committee members were so impressed with Jean that they made him the National Fund Raising Chairman for their organization, at which he spends a good deal of his free time.

Jean Le Clerc is a man of conscience. He believes in giving something back for all the good fortune he has had.

Networks cut convention coverage but local coverage is largest ever

NEW YORK — When TV first covered a political convention, H.L. Mencken, writing of the GOP keynote speaker, worried that "under the television superglare, he may faint or even catch fire."

Forty years later, NBC's Joe Angotti has a new worry: collisions of network, cable and local TV reporters in the small aisles of Atlanta's Omni Coliseum, site of the July 18-21 Democratic National Convention.

"There's a real possibility that there'll be gridlock on the floor," says the head of NBC's convention coverage. "I'm serious."

Such is the reality of the new electronic era, of changing times in conventioning. The quadrennial get-togethers of the Democrats and Republicans faithful used to be primarily a network event. But no more.

Thanks to satellite technology, the ranks of local broadcast journalists and crew members at this Democratic convention will be the largest in history. More than 4,000 of them have been accredited, compared to 3,000 in 1984.

Conversely, CBS, NBC and ABC, under pressure to keep costs down, are dispatching only 350 to 400 full- and part-time staffers per network, sources say. That's half the size of their convention armies of 1984.

In the halcyon days of large-scale, spare-no-expense coverage, the networks often were accused of overkill. Now, one veteran of those days wryly observes, network newsmen "are worried about underkill."

Gavel-to-gavel network convention coverage is only a memory. The networks aired only two prime-time hours each convention night in 1984. CBS and NBC will again do that next month.

ABC, in charge of the television "pool" coverage at the Democratic convention, hasn't yet disclosed its plans, but probably also will go the two-hour-a-night route.

Gavel-to-gavel coverage continues,

though, but now on cable TV. It's available on C-SPAN, which next month basically will broadcast each day's session without reportage or commentary, as it first did in 1984.

Gavel-to-gavel, with reportage, also will be offered by the Atlanta-based Cable News Network, which has a home-court advantage of sorts in that it is located only a short walk from the arena in which the Democratic Convention will be held. CNN, which will have a staff of up to 300 at the convention, says it now is seen in more than half the nation's 88.6 million TV households.

The conventions have increasingly become tailored for TV. Indeed, the Democrats have hired Gary Smith and Dwight Hemion, producers of Emmy-winning TV musical specials, to help produce next month's gathering. The idea, a Democratic spokeswoman says, is to "make it interesting, keeping it fast-paced and getting our message out."

That is a far cry from 1948, when it was considered a feat just to televise convention interviews with such participants as Interior Secretary Julius A. Krug or a delegate with the wonderful name of Leslie Biffle.

By 1952 the technology had markedly improved. However, in contrast to the sophistication of today, there

still was a certain innocence then that made TV coverage of political conventions refreshing.

"The Democrats just thought they were having their picture taken," recalls Perry Wolff, who co-produced CBS' coverage then.

With 50 stationary TV cameras to be set up in and around the Omni next month, it is safe to say the Democrats once again will have their picture taken.

The Democrats will help television's picture-takers with a convention first — a Convention Satellite News Service.

At no cost to stations, the service provide, via satellite, 46 hours of coverage, including 10 hours a day during the convention, and will arrange for stay-at-home local anchors and reporters to interview delegates, legislators and party officials at the convention.

It also will tape three interview "packages" about various aspects of the convention, says Paul Byers, who is heading the service. The interviews are done by former CBS News correspondent Iko Pappas.

Democratic leaders didn't create the service because they were worried about the networks' reduced convention coverage, says Byers, a former coordinating producer on NBC's short-lived "1986" newsmagazine series. "Not at all," he says. "Our primary purpose is to supplement the efforts made by the media in Atlanta, to help those stations who aren't able to be in Atlanta, and to put out the material and give them a chance to utilize it."

As in past years, the focal point of the three networks' effort will be their convention anchors. NBC will go with Tom Brokaw and John Chancellor, ABC with Peter Jennings and David Brinkley, CBS with Dan Rather and Bruce Morton (Morton is billed as senior political analyst, a role previously occupied by Bill Moyers).

The new kids, so to speak, on the convention anchor block are CNN's Bernard Shaw and Mary Alice Williams.

Lakers top week's Nielsens

NEW YORK (AP) — The Los Angeles Lakers beat all the competition in the A.C. Nielsen Co. ratings last week, but even the highest-rated pro basketball game ever wasn't enough to overcome NBC's popular reruns.

The seventh game between the Lakers and the Detroit Pistons, which Los Angeles won 108-105, was the top-rated program for the week of June 20-26, pulling a 21.2 rating and piling up a fat-four-point lead over NBC's "Night Court," the second-rated program.

The rating for Tuesday night's seventh game beat the previous mark of 19.3 for the final game of the 1984 series between the Lakers and the Bos-

ton Celtics, Michael Eisenberg, director of research at CBS, said Tuesday.

The seven-game series this year, however, averaged half a point lower than the 15.9 average for the Celtics-Lakers series in 1987, Eisenberg said.

Each rating point represents 886,000 homes with television.

NBC had seven programs in the top 10 — CBS had the other three — and won the week with a 12.1 average. CBS was second at 11.3 and ABC limped in with an 8.8.

A week ago, CBS won the weekly ratings on the strength of two NBA games.

'Try to Remember' clones ABC

CBS News clearly believes that there is a great deal of interest in going back to the good old days — of 1987.

That's when ABC News had a show on the air called "Our World." The show was all about short bursts of time in recent history, when events sort of came together in sort of a context to sort of illustrate what American life was like at the time.

CBS says that "Try to Remember," the special on Wednesday night (which CBS has pitched as a possible future series), is not at all a copy of "Our World." Nothing at all like it. Why, this one has Charles Kuralt instead of Linda Ellerbee!

Listen up: This is the same show. Maybe not so much the same that CBS should be worried about a suit (after all, who can put a copyright on taking nostalgic looks backward?) but the format amounts to a tracing. In Wednesday night's show, Kuralt uses archival footage to examine the week of Aug. 10, 1969.

It was a big week. The moon astronauts were just out of quarantine and riding through ticker-tape parades around the nation. Half a million flower children invaded a farm in the

up-state New York community of Woodstock and took part in the seminal rock concert-event-of-the-Sixties generation. A devastating hurricane named Camille tore apart sleepy-communities along the Gulf Coast.

OK, it's fun to look back to yesterday, so let's do it ourselves — in its Sept. 25, 1986. A show called "Our World" had its premiere telecast that night. What did that show cover?

The theme of the night was "the summer of 1969." The events examined included the moon landing and the Charles Manson killings in July; the Woodstock concert and Hurricane Camille in August and the stunning World Series win of the New York Mets in October.

Guess what: In quick photographic montages used at the commercial breaks, "Try to Remember" includes one shot of Charles Manson and another of a Mets shortstop in mid-double-play.

What we have here is a failure to differentiate. If this were print journalism, somebody would surely be using the p-word. (Plagiarism, for those who haven't taken Journalism 101.)

How on earth could CBS News have picked exactly the same items to talk about in a show they are trying to claim is not a rehash of ABC's show?

Admittedly, the approaches are

marginally different: Kuralt does very little from a studio set; the studio set was on one of the best things about "Our World." The focus on one week seems to bring in more smaller detail; the section on the astronauts Wednesday night concerns a woman who was accidentally exposed to some moon rocks and so was quarantined along with the spacemen.

And Kuralt does have a way with everyday people; his talk with some survivors of the full horror of Camille in a small Mississippi town is the standout section of this telecast. It is worth watching for that moving story alone.

But CBS's contention that "Try to Remember" will bring us more up-to-date by interviewing folks who were there all these years later is empty. "Our World" did exactly the same thing.

None of that means that "Try to Remember" is worthless television — only that it is copycat television. Nostalgia has its pleasures. Something is added to the Woodstock memories by having filmmakers Martin Scorsese and Thelma Schoonmaker discuss their perspective of that weekend, and the never-before-seen clips of Janis Joplin's performance there will surely excite some, though she seemed startlingly passe in the clips to me.

After 4 months, Letterman resumes 'Late Night' show

NEW YORK (AP) — Funny man David Letterman left his writers at home but brought along his humor Tuesday as production of his show resumed for the first time since a writers strike began four months ago.

The host of "Late Night With David Letterman" kept his audience laughing through the hour-long show with repeated references to the strike by the Writers Guild of America.

"We've got nothing but time to kill tonight," the chuckling, cap-toothed comedian said at one point as the show was taped Tuesday for broadcast early Wednesday morning.

Last week, scriptwriters voted to continue their strike by a 75 percent to 25 percent margin.

Normally, the show has 13 writers, including Letterman. The show resumed with only Letterman, who wrote his own material, said Peter Spivey, a spokesman for NBC.

The show's head writer, Steve O'Donnell, had said the other writers thought it was all right for the show to halt reruns and resume production.

And Letterman let his sympathies

be known on the show as he blamed the strike on producers, whom he repeatedly called "money-grubbing scum" and "jerks."

"I certainly have a bright future, don't I?" he asked his audience, which responded with laughter.

Then he filled time talking about his \$1,500 ringside seat at Monday night's heavyweight bout in Atlantic City between Mike Tyson and Michael Spinks and about his failure to impress friends at the Indianapolis 500 when he said hello to actor Paul Newman, who all but ignored him.

"And this strike may go on until Christmas, so I'm going to ask every member of the staff, all of you in the band, if you can come up with stories. As this unfolds, we'll call on you to help kill a little time," he said.

On Tuesday, he called on an associate producer in the show's control room to play his accordion for the audience.

"Anything to kill a little time," he said, as Pete Fatovich performed "Lady of Spain."

Sandy Duncan comes full circle with her role in 'The Hogan Family'

Sandy Duncan started in show business when she was only 12, singing and dancing her way to Broadway and into movies and television, collecting awards and building a reputation as one of the more promising young stars.

Her career was blooming when, at 25, a brain tumor robbed her of her sight in one eye.

Today Sandy Duncan has developed a new perspective on life, if you will. She lives in Los Angeles with her third husband, Don Correia, and their two young sons, and stars in an NBC television series, "The Hogan Family." Like a lot of American women, she's trying to combine both motherhood and career.

Things are working out well for the energetic, ambitious Duncan, 42, who earned her first paycheck as one of the Siamese children in "The King and I" at State Fair Music Hall in Dallas in 1958.

Her series once belonged to Valerie Harper, but Duncan is glad to have it. Besides, she says there's very little work in New York for people in musical theater.

Four years ago Duncan worked with her childhood pal Tommy Tune in "My One and Only," one of Broadway's more successful musicals that was not a British import (although its story concerned an English aquacade star of the '20s).

"What we did is sort of escapism and good for the soul. I think Tommy was very smart when he did 'My One and Only.' Backstage musicals will still work," she said. "We want to do a project based on 'Topper,' a stage project. It will have new directions in the way he stages it and projects it, but it will be a nostalgia piece."

In Los Angeles, she said, New York's transplanted singers and dancers try to keep their craft alive. "There are AIDS benefits, revues. Jerome Robbins is planning a retrospective of his work."

Sandra Kay Duncan, born in Henderson, Texas, grew up in Tyler, Texas, as one of two daughters of M. R. and Sylvia Duncan. He owned Tyler's big-

gest Esso service station; she was a housewife.

She danced on local television and at Tyler's annual rose festival, and for a year, while attending Lon Morris Junior College in Jacksonville, Texas, she appeared in "Gypsy," "The Music Man," "Showboat," "Little Me" and "The Sound of Music" in Dallas.

In 1965, at 19, she left for New York, where success came quickly: "The Music Man," "Agnes de Mille's 'Carousel,'" "Finian's Rainbow," "Life With Father," "The Music Box," "Love Is a Time of Day," "Gypsy," "Brigadoon," "Peter Pan" (as Wendy) and "Your Own Thing."

And then came the year 1971 and the end of her three-year marriage to singer-actor Bruce Scott, whom she had met in "Your Own Thing." Duncan, at 25, went to Hollywood to star in two films, "The Million-Dollar Duck" for Disney, and Neil Simon's "The Star Spangled Girl" for Paramount. She starred in "Sandy Duncan in Disneyland" with a young dancer named Don Correia and provided the voice of Vixey Fox for an animated Walt Disney movie, "The Fox and the Hounds."

At the time of the tumor, she thought she was going mad. "I was working until 3 every morning, only getting three hours of sleep a night, and I weighed 86 pounds. The panic and anxiety that took hold of me at that moment were unbelievable. I started fantasizing that I was in an insane asylum."

The brain tumor was benign, as it turned out, but 10 hours of surgery at the UCLA Medical Center in November 1971 could not save the sight in her left eye.

Still, it's her eye, she emphasized, not a prosthesis, and "it tracks the reflex in the other eye. I still have to go in for a CAT scan" periodically, she said. "The only thing that bothers me is that it tires me. And it made me suddenly aware of my mortality." Even now, Duncan admitted, she worries about death.

So she went back to show business, playing the title role in "Peter Pan" in a Dallas summer-stock production in

1975. The following year she appeared in a CBS 90-minute special, "Pinocchio" (Danny Kaye was Geketto), and made her Los Angeles stage debut in the Mark Taper Forum production of "Vanities" for which she received an L.A. Drama Critics nomination.

In 1977 she won an Emmy nomination for her role in the landmark mini-series "Roots," and the next year she made another Disney film, "The Cat from Outer Space." Her six-year-old second marriage ended not long afterward.

But what many of her fans remember most was her Tony-nominated, three-year run in "Peter Pan." In some 1,000 performances, Duncan flew over the stage in a wire harness devised by Peter Foy, who also "flew" Mary Martin. She and Rose, who played Mr. Darling-Capt. Hook, took the show on the road.

Less than a year after the "Peter Pan" tour ended, Duncan's life changed with the arrival of Jeffrey and, a year later, Michael. They are now 5 and 4.

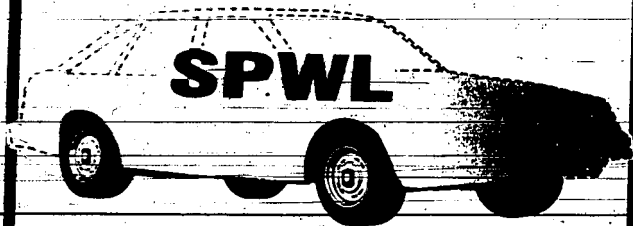
"I gained 60 pounds with each baby. It's just the way I do pregnancy," she said. For a while, out of shape and depressed, she considered giving up show business.

Meanwhile, Valerie Harper was squabbling with Lorimar Productions over her NBC series, "Valerie." Harper parted company with Lorimar and NBC last summer, and Brandon Tartikoff, NBC Entertainment chief, offered Duncan the female lead.

Tartikoff earlier had put Duncan in the pilot for a series called "Act II," casting her as a Broadway actress who married a widower and moved to Santa Fe, N.M., to begin life as stepmother to his children.

For Duncan, her new role worked out well. On the small screen she managed a household of four men; at home she coped with three. "It was the only thing I could do," she said. "I could never have seen my children otherwise. I drop one of my children off at nursery school, and I'm home by 6:30 or 7. I have weekends off. It's not unreasonable. I don't want to miss all this."

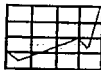
