Gem revenues end year \$11 million ahead

BOISE — The final tax collection figures from the Department of Revenue and Taxation show the state ended the budget year on June 30 with revenues running just over \$11 million ahead of projections.

The final tally on the revenue totals for the 1988 budget year will not be made by state Auditor Joe Williams until later this month.

But significant increases in sales and corporate income tax receipts and a modest boost in individual income revenues coupled with extra earnings on invested state funds will push total general account revenues to around \$675 million, according to the final tax figures.

Projections made by both the Andrus administration and the Legislature last January placed the revenue total at around \$663.5 million, and it

was that amount lawmakers used as a benchmark in making spending decisions during last winter's session. The budget for the year that just ended was \$661 million.

Since prospects for the state's first revenue surplus in years materialized six weeks ago, estimates on the amount of the windfall have run as high as \$20 million. That sparked some talk that Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus should call a special legisla-

tive session to disburse the extra money to education, which came up \$6-million short of his recommendation last winter.

Andrus declined to make any commitment on what should be done with a surplus, refusing up through Thursday to say anything more than that the state was ending the spending year in "a positive cash position."

But even though the Senate Republican majority favored a special ses-

sion in hopes of minimizing the negative political fallout over the school aid issue, a sharply divided House GOP majority killed any chance of lawmakers returning to Boise before next winter.

Analysts have also warned that much of the windfall is one-time money that cannot be counted on recurring in future budget years. They have expressed concern that increased corporate tax payments may

actually be accelerated payments of taxes not really due until the next budget year that began July 1.

In addition, those analysts have pointed out that even at \$20 million the surplus would represent only 3 percent of the total budget — well within the range of normal forecasting errors.

Officials have also cited a number of looming state expenditures not covered by the surplus.

Lawsuit menaces hunting

Northern Nevada Indians say rights cover South Hills

JEROME — A suit for off-reservation hunting and fishing rights by a tribe of Northern Nevada Indians threatens South Hills deer hunting and could eliminate some promising transplanting projects in Cassia and Twin Falls counties.

No deer hunting is the worst scenario possible from a demand by the Western Shoshone National Council for off-treaty rights reportedly guaranteed in the Ruby Valley Treaty of 1863, according to Indian tribal leaders.

"The council is claiming off-reservation hunting and fishing rights in an area running roughly from Burley to Buhl and from the Snake River south to the Nevada state line."

The suit was discussed Thursday at the Fish and Game Commission quarterly meeting in Idaho Falls. Fish and Game Department Director Jerry Conley said talks between the department and the council already have begun.

"It would all depend on the regulations the Indians would hunt under," says Carl Nellis, Region 4 supervisor in Jerome, who was hearing the news for the first time, too. "If they are given unrestricted hunting rights, then, yes, it could eliminate sport deer hunting in a couple of our more accessible units, particularly Unit 54 (Cassia Division)."

Commissioner Louis Racine, Pocatello, who has worked with and against the Shoshone-Bannock Tribes on the Fort Hall Reservation in previous treaty litigation, says he suspects the Western Shoshone National Council, previously unknown in Idaho hunting-fishing annals, lives on the Paiute Tribe's Duck Valley Reservation in northern Nevada.

The band contends it was given treaty rights on land in Nevada, California and Idaho through the 1863 treaty.

But Racine said he'd never heard of that pact and was suspicious of the Western Shoshones' claim.

"I think you ought to research it pretty darn carefully," he told Conley, adding that at 3,500 members the band would be larger than either Idaho's Shoshone-Bannock or Nez Perce tribes.

Good odds big quake will strike

MENLO PARK, Calif. — Southern California faces a 60 percent chance and the San Francisco Bay a 60 percent chance within three decades of being rocked by a major earthquake that could kill thousands of people, the U.S. government said Thursday.

"Unless we aggressively pursue earthquake reduction measures, there is the potential for many people to die, perhaps more people than ever died in a single day from any disaster in the United States," said Richard Andrews, deputy director of California's Office of Emergency Services.

The report by the U.S. Geological Survey and a working group of the National Earthquake Prediction Evaluation Council deals only with the San Andreas, Hayward, San Jacinto and Imperial faults.

So, with other major faults such as the Newport-Inglewood Fault in Los Angeles excluded from the report, the likelihood of large earthquakes "may significantly exceed the probabilities we present," said geophysicist James Dieterich of the Geological Survey and other authors of the report.

The report said a 60 percent probability exists within 30 years and a 20 percent chance within 10 years that a quake measuring 8.0 on the Richter scale or a major quake registering 7.5 on the Richter scale,

164 feared dead in oil rig explosion, fire

ABERDEEN, Scotland — Rescuers Thursday night found two more survivors of an explosion and lowering fire that consumed the Piper Alpha platform and killed up to 164 people in the world's worst oil rig disaster.

The search was suspended for the night, to resume at daylight Friday. But authorities said there was little hope of finding anyone else alive in the North Sea's frigid waters.

Asked whether rescuers had given up hope of finding more survivors, Energy Department minister Peter Morrison said: "To be honest, yes. At

this stage there is very little hope indeed."

The rig owners said the probable cause of the conflagration was a gas leak, which a survivor said was "screaming like a banshee" seconds before the blast Wednesday night.

Government officials said 67 rig workers survived; 16 bodies had been recovered and 148 people were missing, including two lifeboat men who vanished into the flames while on a rescue mission.

Fire track veers away from Mount Rushmore

A roaring forest fire veered away from Mount Rushmore on Thursday after chasing a thousand residents and tourists from the area, while another huge grass fire was stopped 10 miles short of the Alaska pipeline.

"When we told them it was burning 1,000 acres per hour... and it was three miles away, they kind of believed us," said Sgt. Howard Bruner of the Pennington County Sheriff's Department, who helped evacuate the town of Keystone, S.D., late Wednesday.

Visitors were allowed to return to Mount Rush-

more on Thursday morning, but it was accessible only from the west. Superintendent Dan Wenk said smoke was visible in the distance but there was no smoke at the memorial itself.

"The fire behavior was so extreme and erratic that the fire line was lost several times" during the night, said Richard Hohmann, a spokesman for the state division of forestry.

In Alaska, 72 firefighters ended the uphill hand after a three-day battle 125,000-acre fire in the center of the state.

"Their goal has been to stop the fire from getting closer to the pipeline," said Sue Mitchell, an

information officer for the Bureau of Land Management.

Firefighters also reported progress in their attempts to contain a 53,230-acre fire burning since Saturday in the Yukon Flats National Wildlife Refuge, 25 miles northeast of Fort Yukon.

Elsewhere in a dry and fire-prone country:

• Low winds and cooler temperatures helped to contain a 1,300-acre fire ignited by fireworks in Wyoming's Bridger-Teton National Forest on Thursday. A fire line was completed Wednesday afternoon, but "we still have a ways to go before we call it controlled," said forest spokesman Fred Kingwill.

Survivors told of having to choose between trying to survive the flames in hopes aid would come and plunging 150 feet into a blanket of burning oil that covered water cold enough to kill.

Roscoe pilots described flames up to 400 feet high. The fire still flickered nearly 24 hours later.

Airline corridor no safety guarantee, U.S. says

WASHINGTON — The Defense Department acknowledged Thursday that an Iranian A300 Airbus shot down by a U.S. warship was within a corridor for commercial airliners, but it said that alone did not guarantee the plane's safety.

"An airway is not a safety zone," said chief Pentagon spokesman Dag Howard. "It doesn't mean that everything inside there is a safe airfall,

that it's all commercial traffic... All this means is that within that zone, within that area, the air traffic control authorities have agreed to track aircraft..."

The fact that the airliner was in a civilian air corridor did not rule out the possibility in the mind of the skipper of the USS Vincennes, Capt. Will C. Rogers III, that he faced an attacking F-14 fighter, Howard added.

Wary and occasionally irritated after days of repeated questioning, the

spokesman angrily said that Iran must share some responsibility for the deaths of the plane's 290 passengers and crew because the Airbus took off from a military-civilian airport at Bandar Abbas during an exchange of fire between the Vincennes and Iranian Boghammar gunboats.

"The Iranians are the ones who bear the responsibility for ensuring that if they are the ones who provoke the hostilities, they are the ones who began the shooting in this incident,

that they ensure the safety of their civilian aircraft by not sending them into harm's way," Howard said.

Mentioning the "White House" appeared to be edging toward a decision to propose paying compensation for the destruction of the plane and the loss of lives.

"I suspect that doing what we think is right will be the deciding factor," said presidential spokesman Marlin Fitzwater. He said "humane and moral" considerations will be taken

into account.

At the Pentagon, Howard discounted speculation on Capitol Hill that an Iranian warplane might have been flying behind the commercial flight in an attempt to use it as a cover to sneak up behind the Vincennes.

Howard repeated that U.S. warships had broadcast 12 warnings to the Iranian aircraft, seven from the Vincennes and two from the USS

At least 8 dead, 40 injured when Texas store collapses

BROWNSVILLE, Texas (AP) — A three-story department store crowded with people seeking shelter from torrential rains collapsed Thursday, killing at least eight people, injuring more than 40 and trapping others in the rubble, authorities said.

"It looks real bad," Cameron County Sheriff Alex Paves said of the scene in the downtown area of this city across the Rio Grande from Matamoros, Mexico. "It's a disaster. It was just like a bomb hit that corner-store there."

The roof and front wall of La Tienda Amigo, known as the Amigo Store, caved in at about 1:20 p.m. MDT. Emergency crews using portable lights continued into the night digging through mounds of broken bricks, cinderblocks, glass, twisted steel and merchandise to pull out survivors and look for victims.

"They thought they heard some voices and that's where they're dig-

ging now," city spokeswoman Pam Downing said about 10 p.m.

Rescuers cut through a wall inside a Woolworth's store next door to reach some of those trapped. Witnesses said they heard screams from the wreckage. Linens and clothing blown from the store by high winds were being used to wrap the wounds of the injured.

Police Sgt. Dean Poos said shortly after 7 p.m. that "we don't really think there are going to be any more live people coming out of there."

Ambulances and rescue personnel were hampered in reaching the scene by floodwaters from the downpour. Steve Fitzgibbons, acting assistant city manager, said some local businesses had volunteered front-end loaders and cranes to help.

The National Weather Service said the collapse could have been caused by the weight of the rainwater, which dumped more than 2 inches in less

than 30 minutes.

The store was half a block from the international bridge, and sheriff's Lt. Johnny Castillo said that when the storm began, a large number of Mexican nationals were running there to get out of the rain. The store was packed.

Poos said store owner Bernard Levine told him that when the roof collapsed, "he jumped under a table, and all he knows is that when everything settled, he looked up and there was blue sky above him."

Levine said he escaped with three employees and three customers.

Poos said six bodies had been removed from the rubble and identified, and Johnny Economides, head of one rescue team, said workers had found two more bodies.

Poos said eight people were admitted to hospitals and another 34 were treated at three hospitals in Brownsville and nearby San Benito.

Conley said the council recently had completed a hunting and fishing agreement with the state of Nevada and that officials there were concerned about the possible impact.

"It's the numbers that tend to make us fear for sport deer hunting along the southern rim of the state."

"I allow 2,000 permits on the Cassia Division each year and we manage for intensive harvest because it is such a productive unit," Nellis said.

"I don't know how many of a 3,500 hand would be hunters, but if it is half and the tribe limit is one deer annually, that would pretty well eliminate all the permits in Unit 54," he said.

"For every deer they would take, it would eliminate one available to non-Indian sport hunters."

Anything above that one-deer-per-year would decrease non-Indian permit availability proportionately, and perhaps reduce hunting on Brown's Bench and portions of Black Pine and other eastern units.

The Cassia Division deer hunt would carry the major impact of off-

reservation hunting as it runs roughly from just west of Oakley through U.S. 93.

Indian hunting rights probably would be the death knell for the promising California desert bighorn sheep transplanting program the department began three years ago. Under that management plan, desert bighorns would be moved into suitable habitat in the South Hills to grow into huntable populations.

About 40 head, representing some major translocations from Owyhee County and natural reproduction, currently are trying to become permanent residents of Big Cottonwood Canyon.

"Unrestricted hunting on a sheep population that small would have an immediate and major impact," Nellis said.

He also noted the department's aim of expanding wild turkeys across the southern part of the state also probably would be eliminated.

The department has established huntable populations of turkeys in the Almo-City of Rocks area and this past winter trapped and translocated

about 20 into new habitat in Big Cottonwood Canyon. The turkey plan was for translocations in all South Hills riparian habitat as birds became available.

Nellis said elk populations were too small to make any major case for either side. But he noted a natural movement of moose into the area probably would be stopped.

"We've had a natural expansion of moose from the eastern part of the state into Unit 55 and we are receiving increased reports of sightings of moose in Units 54 and 56," he said.

"But moose are such a desirable target that I'm sure the new immigrants would quickly be taken and the expansion would stop."

"I doubt they would make any major impact in upland birds — at least they usually don't," he said.

From a fishing standpoint, the large body of water probably would be Salmon Falls Reservoir and it does not lend itself to spearing and netting. Other than the Snake River, there is no major stream in the area, although there are several creeks that run water year-round.

ered in the new budget that will have to be financed before next summer. Among the worst potential costs is a possible multimillion-dollar shortage in Medicaid and Medicare funds.

According to the final tax collection figures, personal income tax receipts, which generate over 40 percent of all general tax revenue, totaled \$287.2 million. \$1 million over the administration's forecast. Corporate tax payments hit \$63.9 million, \$3.6 million

over the forecast, and sales tax generated \$258.8 million for the treasury, \$6 million over the projection.

Product taxes ran slightly under the \$14.4 million projection, largely because of sluggish cigarette sales following a doubling of that tax a year ago.

In the miscellaneous category, insurance premium tax payments, once expected to run as much as several million dollars over the forecast, fell short by \$1 million to \$2 million as

claims for a reduced preferential tax rate exceeded expectations.

But a \$2.9 million increase over projections from the state treasurer's office, due mainly to improved management and higher interest rates, more than offset the premium tax shortfall.

The revenue surplus is in addition to the \$2.5 million lawmakers had always anticipated would be left over after bills from their \$661 million budget were paid.

And he released the transcript of an Iranian F-14 responding to a similar warning the day before the Airbus went down. The F-14 identified itself to the USS Halsey and "went away," Howard said. A second F-14 was flying with that jet, but only the one conversed with the USS Halsey. The second jet also moved away.

On Sunday, the chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, Adm. William Crowe, told reporters that one reason Capt. Rogers believed the Iranian aircraft was a military jet was because it was outside the air corridor.

Both Crowe and Howard have stressed that the most compelling reason was an electronic emission from the Airbus, a transmission that

Howard on Tuesday identified as identification-signals broadcast on a frequency used only by military aircraft.

The signal sent by the Airbus was similar to codes that had been broadcast within the previous several days by Iranian F-14 fighters recently stationed at Bandar Abbas, Howard said.

Iran Air Flight 455 was 4 1/2 miles from the center of a civilian air corridor stretching from its departure point, Bandar Abbas, to Dubai, in the United Arab Emirates on the opposite side of the Strait of Hormuz at the mouth of the Persian Gulf.

According to the code governing international air flights, said Howard, commercial airliners, those carrying passengers, are expected to adhere to

the center line of the airway.

But he said it was unclear how wide the air corridor was at the point where the Airbus was hit, because Iran claims a corridor 10 miles on each side and many other countries, including the United Arab Emirates, recognize a corridor 4 1/2 miles from the center.

On another matter, Howard said that tapes recording events aboard the Vincennes had been flown from the gulf to the U.S. Naval Surface Warfare Facility at Dahlgren, Va.

Analysis of the tapes, which contain encrypted data, will be turned over to Rear Adm. William M. Fogarty, who is now in the gulf conducting an investigation into the incident, Howard said.

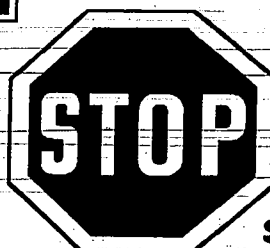

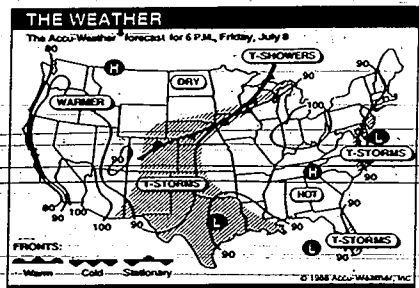

Pharmacists object to AMA decision

MOSCOW (AP) - The national retail pharmacists are decrying the decision of the American Medical Association to let stand its recognition of mail-order pharmacies as an established method of distributing drugs.

After the AMA's House of Delegates adjourned without changing the policy drafted last December, the National Association of Retail Drugists said Thursday that puts the nation's doctors in the "dubious position of endorsing a practice that endangers the public health."

The pharmacists organization has renewed its challenge to the policy in light of last month's involuntary manslaughter charge filed by Latah County Prosecutor Craig Mosman against Medco

Containment Corp. of New Jersey in the January death of an elderly Princeton, Idaho woman.

Iris Heimelman, 70, reportedly died of poisoning from coumadin, a blood-thinning agent sometimes used in rat poison. "Authorities" found coumadin tablets in a bottle labeled "poisons."

The drug was provided under an insurance plan by National Prescription Services of Las Vegas, a subsidiary of the New Jersey company.

In a recent letter to AMA Executive Vice President James H. Smoots, the pharmacists group said, "It is difficult to understand how the nation's largest physicians' organization could come to sanguine a conclusion about mail-order drugs."

Investigation finds no evidence of abuse of Ritalin

BOISE (AP) - Investigations by the state boards of Medicine and Pharmacy have turned up no evidence that the controversial drug Ritalin has been abused by physicians or patients in Idaho.

"This substance is being properly prescribed with appropriate examination and followup," Board of Medicine Chairman J.V. Drost said. "This treatment receives serious attention. It appears that patients who need it

are being referred for treatment. The investigations were prompted by statistical reports showing that in each 1987, Idaho ranked fifth nationally in per capita use of Ritalin, or methylphenidate hydrochloride, a drug used to control a form of hyperactivity in children called Attention Deficit Disorder. Six years earlier, Idaho ranked 91st in per capita use of the drug.

The boards, their findings included in statements released Friday, reviewed medical records of 13 Idaho doctors most frequently prescribing the drug and more than 17,000 prescriptions issued to their 387 patients over 21 months through December 1987. More than 1.4 million Ritalin tablets, ranging from five to 20 milligrams, were issued through those prescriptions.

The doctors, who voluntarily cooperated with the investiga-

tions and were each personally interviewed, were not identified. But the Board of Medicine said their practices were in Coeur d'Alene, Boise, Twin Falls, Ketchum, Pocatello and Idaho Falls.

The boards did not attempt to determine why per capita use of Ritalin had risen so dramatically in Idaho. But they pointed out that the same statistical information showed neighboring Utah ranked first nationally.

Commerce department receives high marks

Robert Bork would be a good nominee to succeed Meese

WASHINGTON — In the first of two moves to make himself seem bold and interesting, George Bush should say:

Mr. President, nominate as Ed Meese's successor the man obviously most qualified to be attorney general, a man who has served with distinction as a judge and as solicitor general, a man who, Lord knows, is familiar with the confirmation process and has been shown to have no skeletons in his closet (his enemies scored the closest in vain), a man so familiar to the senators that they would have no excuse for not acting with dispatch.

The man is Robert Bork. Nominating Bork would be a condescension for the senators who comprised last year's lynch mob. They would have to slither around the oily hypocrits they then advanced. You remember. Many said they only opposed Bork because of the "balance" of the Supreme Court, and no one questions his intelligence or integrity, only his "judicial temperament," and if Bork had been nominated to a position to serve as the President's man, dur-

ing the President's term, it would be different. So they said.

Nominating Bork would make the President seem fisting in his final phase. Democrats do not want to fight with him because he is popular and because the nation's problems require the torture of thought. And Democrats do not want to enter the autumn campaign looking like so many Brutuses, with Bork's blood again on their togas, and with Bush saying to the voters: Hey, the Democrats have done it again so you should again whack them across the bridges of their noses with an electoral repudiation.

The second thing Bush should do is settle on an interesting running mate. Here are three possibilities.

Wyoming's Sen. Alan Simpson is funny — intentionally so, unlike... well, never mind — and has the advantage of coming from a state with a piddling three electoral votes that Bush will win anyway.

The choice of Simpson would signal heroic disregard for conventional calculations, which is a clever calculation; Simpson does have a volcanic, indeed Vesuvian temper, and he is, even by current disgraceful Republican standards, awfully smitten with Gorbachev. But boys will be boys.

Another good choice would be Gen. Colin Powell, President Reagan's national security adviser. He is bright as a new nickel and sound on the issue it can be fatal to be unsound on (the Soviet Union). His nomination would underscore Michael Dukakis' weakest dimension, foreign policy. And Powell is black. His nomination would come one month after Democrats do not nominate Jesse Jackson for vice president.

Some say the nation's residual racism would make Powell's nomination politically impru-

dent. They are underestimating the country and the capacity of boldness by a conservative Party to have a constructive effect. Remember, the Conservative Party gave Britain its first Jewish and female prime ministers.

A third possible Bush choice is a man who currently holds in sacred trust the nation's highest office: Peter Ueberroth, baseball commissioner. He is intelligent and formidable. Butter does not melt in his mouth when pursuing an objective, as he showed when running the 1984 Olympics. And on this season's simmering issue, drugs, he makes sense.

He says: Ninety percent of all coca plants are grown in two countries, Bolivia and Peru. In 1984, Peru had upwards of 40,000 acres of them. Today it has 600,000 acres. It would be cheap — a pittance compared to the costs of the drug epidemic — to buy out the farmers, who get little drug money. Remember what Nixon did with Turkey — pressure and incentives — to diminish the heroin trade. On the demand side, we have inexpensive communications technologies for teaching health to

young people; thereby ending America's role as the world's drugstore.

And there is Ueberroth's California connection. If Dukakis does not carry California, he goes back to Brooklyn. In late 1985, a California poll measured the standing of various public figures. An equal number of favorable and unfavorable responses earned a person a 100. Two-to-one favorable over unfavorable was 200. California's Sen. Alan Cranston had 200, Gov. George Deukmejian 270, Gerald Ford 370, Ueberroth 1,100. A Los Angeles Times poll of February, 1986, showed Ueberroth with 88 percent favorable, 9 percent unfavorable, 5 percent no response.

Polls today would reflect the fact that he has been less conspicuous than he was when running the Olympics and becoming Time's person of the year. However, he has not been invisible since then and the basic point of these polls is that change is happening to him something like a lot. Neither Dukakis nor Bush has yet generated such polls.

Gorbachev opens up political process, economy stagnates

Mikhail S. Gorbachev's party conference will not be soon forgotten. While the concrete effect, there is no doubt that it was a radical departure from past procedures. Gorbachev managed to open up the political process in an unprecedented way, and he undoubtedly hoped that there would be a parallel reaction in

the economy. But with delegates unleashing pent-up complaints about food shortages, pollution, corruption, incompetence and political skulduggery, there must have been times when Gorbachev found himself asking just what he had set in motion. That would explain his desperate plea last Thursday to curb the complaining and political name-calling and to focus instead on plans for reform.

But when his message went unheeded and former Moscow party chief Boris Yeltsin and Politburo member Yegor Ligachev openly sought to destroy each other, Gorbachev evidently concluded that too much of a good thing would do nothing for his economic reforms. That may explain why Gorbachev seemed to end the conference so abruptly.

But if one of Gorbachev's goals was to provoke economic change, it is hard to see where he succeeded. He called for an increase in operating autonomy for Soviet peasants, even a form of private farming as well as for more private and cooperative business and manufacturing activity. All this in turn would mean curbing the role of ministries and Gosplan (the state planning commission), as well as a more meaningful price and market system.

But Gorbachev has been calling for such changes for several months. Nothing that happened at the conference would seem to have accelerated the process. Instead, caught up in the



dynamic negativism, numerous delegates vented their anger and frustration over the economic inadequacies of the Ural Mountains put it at the conference. "The workers ask directly, where is 'perestroika'?" Nothing has changed in the food shops except for the addition of sugar rationing. Meat is still unavailable, as it has been for a long time, and now non-food consumer goods also disappear periodically. Such protests certainly did not come as news to the average Soviet citizen who knows firsthand that Gorbachev has been unable to generate economic change. But to hear such shortcomings proclaimed repeatedly by conference delegates seemed to

confirm the overall dimensions of the problem. Even Gorbachev's economic advisers found themselves swept up in the process. Leonid Abalkin, the director of the Institute of Economics of the

Academy of Sciences, complained that the rate of growth of the Soviet national income for the last two years was below what it was during the Brezhnev period. Gorbachev was clearly hoping that

the party conference would stimulate the process of economic transformation. But while he commanded Prime Minister Nikolai I. Ryzhkov to increase food supplies and Politburo member Nikolai P. Slyuzkov to do the same for other consumer goods, Gorbachev did not accompany these words with deeds: there was no abolishing the collective farm or Gosplan. Instead, there is general acknowledgment that the enterprise law passed by the Soviet government in 1987 that was supposed to free the factories from ministerial control has been sabotaged by the bureaucrats. The Soviet cooperative law that was to encourage non-state production appears to have suffered the same fate. The fate of these earlier reforms

and the lack of any noticeable improvement in the day-to-day standard of living bodes poorly for any new economic initiative that Gorbachev may propose. It would be different if Gorbachev could point to an outpouring of increased consumer goods, as Deng Xiaoping can do in China. But even in China there is seething discontent because of the price increases of the reform. The Chinese are upset by their price reforms; however, they have at least seen that their economic reforms can produce more goods. What will be the Soviet reaction when and if Gorbachev allows prices to rise and there still is no sign of a major improvement in consumer well-being?

It may be that because "glasnost" has made it possible for people to complain publicly about the country's economic shortcomings, their sense of frustration is made deeper than it might otherwise be. Yet for the recent visitor to Moscow the extent of the disappointment and the cynicism about the economic reforms are unmatched by anything since the mid-1960s. Gorbachev has bought about the same time in political discourse during his more than three years in power, but he has nothing to show for his efforts in terms of economic improvements. If the situation is anything like Abalkin and the delegates from the Urals suggest, the economic situation may have deteriorated.

A Soviet worker was asked on Soviet television what perestroika meant to him. "It means work harder for less," he said. If Gorbachev is to succeed, he will have to reverse that equation. Unfortunately, nothing happened at the party conference to indicate that such changes will take place soon.

Boaters face many hazards

I am a person, among several, that likes to go boating and hiking. One of my favorite places to go is Piller Falls. Although you have a choice to hike it or boat it, boating is usually the way I go.

For approximately 15 years now, I've been putting my boat in down by Canyon Springs Country Club and going up river. It's good fun especially when you see a beaver or two or a pair of fawns with their mother off to the side.

All of this is pretty and peaceful until you get to the Perrine Bridge. On both sides you see several shopping carts and many bikes just to mention a few of the things people throw off the bridge. The real reason that I am writing though is that for years I've had somebody either throw something or shoot at me from the bridge. For example one time my friend and I were coming back from Piller. I had the motor off and was just relaxing watching the red sun disk behind the canyon rim and on the right hand side was a beaver slapping its tail at us. When all of a sudden the water came alive with splashes no further

I was on slide rock and I was sliding right down to the water's edge which is where the first rock hit. It was followed by two or three more rocks. One rock hit the rocky edge that I was standing on and it sent splinters of rock in every direction including one into my pant leg, and cut into my skin. Well, that's all it took to get me to release a volley of 22s into the concrete of the bridge, the people disappeared, and an old man that was in the middle of the bridge started yelling at me to stop and that he was going to get the police and turn me in. I was mad to say the least.

I've talked with other people over the years and in fact, actually had the front of his boat hit by a beer bottle. A fellow worker was telling me just the other day he was looking over the bridge and there was a boat below and he thought it was me, when from the other side of the bridge some kids started throwing bottles off at the boat which in turn, he started chasing them.

I'm sure this thing happens all the time.

You take a rock that weighs a half pound and drop it off the bridge and it's going to reach 125 mph and it will go through a boat and no saying what it will do to a person and the same holds true with a bottle or anything else a person throws.

Is this what you would call premeditated destruction to private property and bodily injury? Another thing, if you decide to print this, who's going to suffer? Low water slows river barge traffic

By The Associated Press

One Ohio official asked communities to aim for a 25 percent reduction in water use and another warned Thursday of likely statewide restrictions, and low water again kept barges from moving on the lower Mississippi River.

Rain fell on some dry sections of Minnesota, but Pennsylvania officials declared a statewide drought watch Thursday, triggering voluntary reductions in water use and a ban on open fires in state parks and forests.

Illinois Agriculture Director Larry Worries estimated Thursday that his state's average corn yield of 119 bushels per acre had been cut in half by the beginning of the week, and was dropping 6 percent a day. At that rate, a farmer with 500 acres of drought-stricken corn would lose about \$10,000 a day at current grain prices.

"It gets very depressing thinking about it, but I have lots of company," said Platt County, Ill., farmer Wilbur Blacker.

The Mississippi River remained closed at Black Hills, Miss., about 20 miles south of Natchez, Miss.

where water had been as low as five feet.

"Hopefully by this weekend we will have the river open if somebody doesn't mess up," L.C. Fumbanks, chief of navigation for the Army Corps of Engineers, said in a radio-telephone interview from aboard the dredge Jeddwin.

The Jeddwin worked south of Greenville, Miss., where traffic resumed Wednesday, while another dredge pumped sand from the blockage at Black Hills.

The Coast Guard decided Thursday to close the Ohio River at Mound City, Ill., for 12-hour shifts to clear a build-up of sand and silt from the channel, said Coast Guard Lt. j.g. Jim Clifton.

He said the affected two-mile stretch would be opened for six hours Friday morning, closed for 12 hours, then reopened for six hours. "It will just alternate back and forth like that until they get it cleared through," Clifton said, adding that he had no estimate how long that would take.

Traffic on the Missouri River is normal, although barges are carrying lighter loads, thanks to reservoirs upstream, said Paul Johnston, director of public affairs for the Army Corps of Engineers at Omaha, Neb.

Educators wind up annual conventions

NEW ORLEANS (AP) - The American Federation of Teachers and Archival National Education Association wound up their annual conventions apparently closer than ever to agreeing on workable approaches to school reform.

But don't tell that to NEA President Mary Hatwood Futrell or AFT President Albert Shanker, who seem far more comfortable nursing their rivalry than contemplating a ceasefire.

NEA's 8,000 delegates meeting here this week, and AFT's 3,000 delegates in San Francisco, endorsed reform proposals aimed at freeing teachers to experiment. The separate schemes differed in detail, not spirit.

The AFT proposed creating thousands of "satellite" "thin schools" where small clusters of teachers could try out their ideas. The NEA would designate at least one entire school district in each state as "learning laboratories."

Asked if her plan signaled a rare consensus with the AFT, Futrell flinched.

The AFT plan was "not a new idea," she said, and was more narrow than what we proposed."

"And Shanker ridiculed NEA officials who, he said, still believe that money alone will solve educators' problems.

The AFT-NEA war goes on. Throughout Shanker's seven two-year terms - he won his eighth unopposed this week - there has never been a doubt about who was in charge at AFT's conventions. But even he is occasionally unanswerable to higher, hidden authorities in matters of technology.

"This is for whoever is controlling the microphones," bellowed Shanker when six floor mikes weren't turned on. "Leave them on. This is the way it is done at AFT conventions!"

Futrell has authority, too, but usually waxes it lightly. In his keynote address, Shanker said some teachers complain about his frequent criticisms of public schools.

"It's the system that stinks, not the workers," he explained.

Store roof collapses

BROWNSVILLE, Texas (AP) - The roof collapsed Thursday in a department store, trapping an undetermined number of people inside, officials said.

Lt. Johnny Castillo of the Cameron County Sheriff's Department said he did not know immediately whether anyone was hurt. The roof fell during a rain storm Thursday afternoon.

'Fry and die or jump and try' for men aboard blazing oil rig

ABERDEEN, Scotland (AP) — Men jumped from the blazing oil platform or slithered down searing pipes as the heat popped windows like bubbles, but most had no chance and comrades could only watch helplessly from a nearby vessel.

"It was a case of fry and die or jump and try," said technician Roy Carey, 45, who leaped into the cold North Sea to escape the flames that engulfed the giant, Piper Alpha rig after an explosion Wednesday night.

His face was burned and his arms were in slings. "I was smothered with smoke. I could hardly see and couldn't breathe, so it was over the side or die there," he said from his hospital bed in Aberdeen.

Carey said one of the rig's survival boats floated past him and three other men.

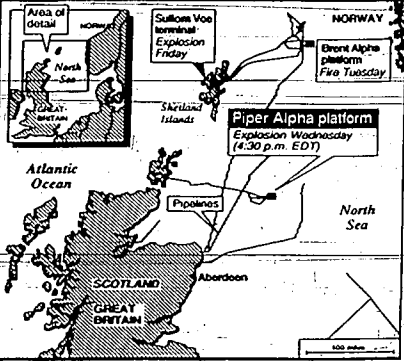
They grabbed at it and a man aboard held out his hands, "but I couldn't get a foothold. The waves were hitting me in my chest. I didn't want to drag him off so I just stayed in the water." Another boat picked him up half an hour later.

"We had all that water around us and no way to get it to us," to fight the fire, Carey said. "We had sprinklers but they weren't strong enough."

John Maxwell, an oil rig worker, watched from the nearby safety and supply vessel Tharos as men tried to get off the rig. Most of the 200 who were aboard the rig are missing and presumed dead.

"We were in our survival suits ready to go to the rescue when we saw the drill derrick giving way, falling toward the pipe deck and possibly on the accommodation

tion (crew's quarters). I don't know," he said.

"If there were men inside then, they couldn't have survived all that heat."

"The heat was blowing out the windows. Panes of glass were all cracking off and the ferocity of the heat would suck all the oxygen out and the men inside would have smothered. It was terrible."

Bill Elder, 48, a burly Scot who also had been on the Tharos, said he watched men slide down pipes and hoses on the side of the blazing platform.

"Some were swimming from the ship," he said. "I felt helpless,

sick. There was panic all around. We saw 10 guys waving from the deck. There was nothing you could do."

He waited at a hotel in a dirty undershirt and "fifteen sweat suit, cap stuffed in his pocket, to tell his story to investigators. Elder arrived in Aberdeen by helicopter, with other survivors and witnesses, more than 12 hours after the disaster.

Rig worker Dave Lambert said the deck collapsed as he tried to find a way through the flames.

"The cabin slid forward and a hole appeared, so we made for it and jumped," he said. "We fell in the sea. It must have been 60 or 70 feet."

Angry mourners in Tehran bear coffins through streets

TEHRAN, Iran (AP) — Pall-bearers Thursday paraded 78 flag-draped wooden coffins through Tehran's streets, where thousands of mourners shouted their anger at the United States for shooting down an Iranian jetliner, and killing all aboard.

"No compromise! No surrender! Fight with America!" shouted waves of marchers who carried wreaths, anti-American posters and golden-framed photographs of the victims.

The mass funeral started with a fiery speech from Iran's president, Ali Khamenei, who mocked American statements on the incident and called for revenge.

"The case is not closed in the opinion of those who are seeking retribution," he said, referring to a remark by President Reagan that no more could be said about U.S. responsibility for one of its missile cruisers shot down the Iran Air

jetliner over the Persian Gulf on Sunday, killing all 290 people aboard.

"The issue is not closed in the powerful opinion of revenge," he said, speaking from a podium on the steps of the majlis, or parliament, a modern marble structure built during the reign of the Shah.

The front of the podium was decorated with an ascending Iran Air jet, with birds flying above it and waves lapping at the base.

Many of Iran's leading clergy and parliament members were on both sides of the podium, sitting cross-legged on the top step. Hashemi Rafsanjani, speaker of the Iranian parliament and commander of its armed forces, sat one person away from the wooden podium.

The coffins, each covered with an Iranian flag, were arrayed in front of the steps. At the base of the steps, an Iranian flag had been driven through the seal of the president of the United States.

The coffins were sprayed with rose water, considered holy from a Shiite. The crowd, all male at the front, packed the square in front of the parliament and the narrow street leading away from it.

The clergy descended the steps of the parliament to lead the funeral procession more than a mile to Hassan Abad Square.

"The crowd spilled around the coffins, yelling 'Death to America!' 'Death to Reagan!' 'Revenge! Revenge!' 'All foreigners, go home!'"

Behind some of the coffins, mourners carried pictures of the victims, one in a huge gold frame, others embedded in wreaths of roses and carnations.

Mars moon probe starts its journey

MOSCOW (AP) — The Soviet Union launched an unmanned probe Thursday night on a six-month trip to Mars' moon, Phobos, for a mission designed to pave the way for a manned voyage to the red planet.

The 180-foot-tall booster-rocket spewed orange and blue flames as it illuminated the nighttime sky at the Baikonur space center in the Soviet Central Asian republic of Kazakhstan.

"The launch of the Proton rocket carrying the probe, Phobos 1, was carried live on Soviet television, which reported that the spacecraft's flight was proceeding normally.

More than a dozen nations are participating in the mission.

Radicals threaten hostages as part of Iranian revenge

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — A radical Shiite Moslem group that holds two American hostages said Thursday their fate will be part of Iran's revenge for the shooting down of an Iranian airliner in which 290 people were killed.

"Everybody knows that all the strong cards are still in our hand, including the hostages issue, which will be part of a comprehensive response that will make the killers and their partners pay the price," said a statement from the Revolutionary Justice Organization, Iran's main newspaper.

Missiles fired by the U.S. missile cruiser Vincennes destroyed the airliner Sunday over the Persian Gulf.

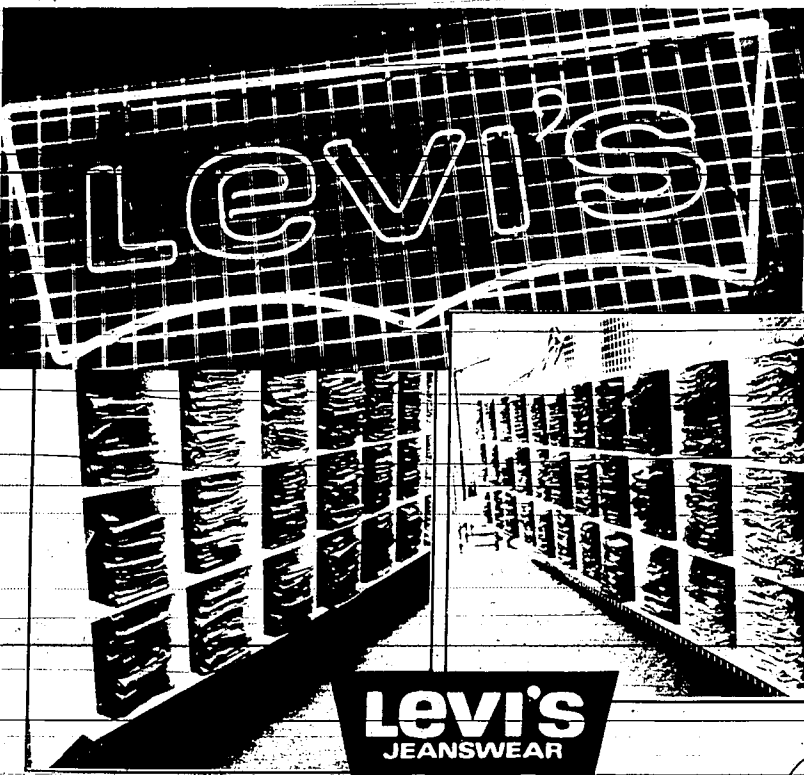
The typewritten statement in Arabic was delivered to a Western news agency in Beirut with a photocopy of a page from hostage Edward Austin Tracy's U.S. passport.

Revolutionary Justice says it is holding Tracy and another American, Joseph James Crippie.

"We have monitored all the positions denouncing or supporting the American crime," the statement said. "We consider whoever has denounced it a friend to the peoples of the area and whoever has supported it a partner."

On Oct. 21, 1986, the group calling itself the Revolutionary Justice Organization claimed responsibility for kidnapping Tracy, 57.

Bobcat owner plays cat-and-mouse game

NEW YORK (AP) - Bobcat? Ralph Ferrara asked the animal protection officers who'd stepped into his three-room apartment. What bobcat?

"Then Daisy started growling. So they took under the dining room table, and under the dining-room table, under a piece of cloth, is the bobcat," ASPCA spokesman Jeffrey Hon recounted Thursday. "The bobcat weighs 30 pounds and is seemingly very vicious."

The officers, alerted Wednesday afternoon by a neighbor's complaint of a wild animal in the Queens building, had found their prey. Their next step was obvious, said Hon. They take refuge in the bedroom.

The encounter was not all that unusual for the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, which enforces animal cruelty laws in the city. "At least once a year we get a really weird case. We had a lion out in Staten Island once. Somebody had it living in their garage."

This time it was Daisy, a healthy 5-year-old female bobcat, declawed but "very, very fast," said Hon. "It could jump you if it wanted to. Its lair was Ferrara's apartment, decorated with porcelain cat heads and stocked with cat-related videos."

"The guy's really into cats," said Hon.

When the officers arrived, Ferrara tried to throw them off the scent by denying that he had a bobcat but allowing as how he once had an ocelot that died. He displayed a cremation certificate and a sympathy card from the Long Island Ocelot Club.

But the cat-and-mouse game ended when Daisy started growling.

"The guy knows the jig is up," said Hon. Ferrara, a 53-year-old executive secretary at a perfume company, said Thursday that Daisy was a gift from friends and he didn't know it was illegal to keep a wild animal as a pet in New York City. He said Daisy stayed at home, was paper trained, ate cat food and chicken gizzards and occasionally even paid him attention.

"She's a feline. She will do some things that I tell her. Other commands she will acknowledge but will only react to them if she feels like it," he said. "She had the run of the place."

Friendly? "To me, yes." To ASPCA officers, apparently not. They called police, who arrived on a hopar later and shot Daisy with two tranquilizer darts. Freed from their bedroom retreat, the officers confiscated the cat and gave Ferrara a ticket. They are holding Daisy while they seek an appropriate home.

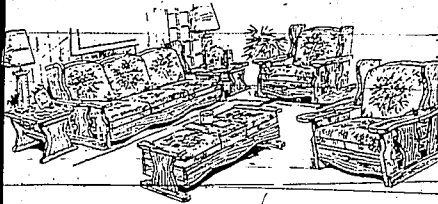

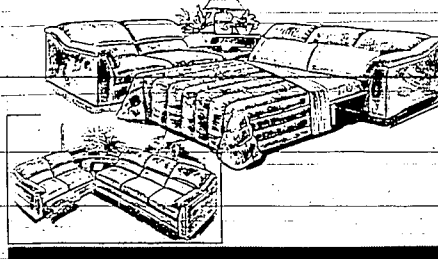

Jury returns guilty verdict in manslaughter trial

TWIN FALLS — A jury convicted Jerome resident Rose Dry Phillips of the vehicular manslaughter of her two nieces Thursday after an emotional, three-day trial.

In a quiet voice, the 34-year-old Phillips told the jury she only had four sips of Tequila the day after Christmas, 1987, when the accident occurred. The key point prosecutors had to prove is that Phillips was driving under the influence of alcohol.

When she left her ex-husband's house in Kimberly, she said "I was crying, but I wasn't drunk."

Other witnesses said Phillips had a strong odor of alcohol on her breath. Her ex-husband, Danny Dry of Kimberly, said she was slurring her speech and

wobbling while at his house. But Dry said he couldn't smell anything on Phillips' breath because he has bad sinuses. Ambulance personnel said she talked coherently before being taken to the hospital.

A blood-alcohol test taken for medical, not legal, reasons showed her blood-alcohol level to be 18. A blood-alcohol level of 10 percent by weight is legally drunk in Idaho.

Phillips reacted to the verdict with her eyes closed and head lowered. During the trial, she spent trial breaks surrounded by friends, often in the arms of her husband.

Her daughter, Tamara Daniel, who was subpoenaed by James to testify, sobbed after the jury announced its verdict. A group of women in the back corner of the courtroom gasped with joy.

"I hope you're happy," Daniel shouted at the women in the corner.

Two of Phillips' nieces died in the accident near Rock Creek on Blue Lakes Boulevard South. A deputy coroner said Maria Juarez Phillips, 17, died of multiple internal injuries when she flew from the car and struck a chain-link fence.

Jamy Jo Johnston, 13, died when the car struck a telephone pole. Johnston was sitting in the seat struck by the pole.

Deputy Prosecutor J. Scott James, who used prose liberally during his closing argument, told the jury the facts of the case clearly proved Phillips was drunk the day of the accident.

Waving a hospital report at the jury, James argued the figures on the sheet of paper clearly proved a blood-alcohol level past the legal level of intoxication.

James had fought for nearly five hours Wednesday to get the test results on the hospital report admitted, even though Phillips never consented to a blood-al-

cohol test and the test didn't conform to proper procedures.

"As you look at it, you can say this defendant was driving under the influence of alcohol," James said.

James also placed the bottle of Tequila that Phillips was drinking from the day of the accident on the podium and waved pictures of the dead teenagers at the jurors.

But Phillips' attorney, Assistant Public Defender Jonathan Hull, said the test was fatally flawed because an alcohol swab was used on Phillips before taking the test.

"The DuPont corporation, which made the machine, says don't use alcohol swabs. The Department of Health and Welfare, which makes the regulations for using the machine, says don't use alcohol swabs," Hull said. "The people from Magic Valley Regional Hospital says it's no big deal."

"Why, if it's no big deal, does the manufacturer and the state of Idaho both say 'Don't use alcohol swabs'?"

Hull said the accident was simply a tragedy, not a criminal act.

"What we have here, ladies and gentlemen, is a tragic accident," Hull said. "What we don't have are two counts of vehicular manslaughter."

Phillips, who had been free without bail, went directly to the county jail after the trial. Hurlburt decided to set a \$10,000 bail after James asked Hurlburt to increase the bond.

Phillips, who maintained a tight-lipped composure throughout the trial, broke down into tears as she was booked into the Twin Falls County jail.

Phillips faces a maximum of seven years in prison and a \$7,000 fine. After a presentence report is completed in about a month, 5th District Judge Daniel Hurlburt will sentence Phillips.

Drought leads to fish kill

Fish and Game lifts fishing limits on 6 of Idaho's reservoirs

TWIN FALLS — A combination of hot weather and low water is killing fish by the thousands below Magic Reservoir and may be a factor in a fish kill at the boat ramp above Twin Falls, says the state Department of Fish and Game.

Also because of the drought, the Idaho Fish and Game Commission has lifted fishing limits on six southern Idaho reservoirs, effective Saturday. Continuing drought conditions could force the lifting of restrictions on up to 20 more within the next month.

After discovering thousands of dead fish at the Glory Hole below Magic Reservoir this week, Fish and Game netted live fish and moved them to better location in the Big Wood River above the reservoir, says Carl Nellis, Fish and Game supervisor for Region IV.

Above Twin Falls about 19 trash fish were dead in the water by the boat ramp Thursday afternoon. The fish were floating in an algae bloom.

Fish and Game, which is investigating, says there may be several reasons for the fish kill at Twin Falls.

Low river flows and hot weather are causing algae to bloom and that could reduce the water's oxygen, says Nellis. If the oxygen level falls too low, fish die.

Another possibility causing fish kills at Twin Falls is chemical pollution coming from the return to the river, says Nellis.

"It's always a possibility. Up that far we don't have that many return flows. We do have some," says Jack Enkin, Twin Falls Canal Co. manager.

The Twin Falls Canal Co. uses Magnesium H. and Xylene to control moss growth in the canals. Enkin says the chemicals are manufactured for moss control.

Fish and Game is also investigating reports of fish kills in Billingsley Creek near Hagerman.

Fish and Game Director Jerry Carey said the condition of southern Idaho reservoirs is the worst he has seen in eight years as head of the department.

Limits have been lifted on Fish Creek Reservoir northeast of Carey, Thorne Creek north of Gooding and Little Camas Reservoir near Fairfield.

These reservoirs are expected to be dry by the end of the month. By removing limits, both the public and the fish benefit, Nellis says. People can have more fish to eat and there is more oxygen available for the remaining fish in the water, he says.

The Fish and Game Commission, meeting in Idaho Falls Thursday, also voted unanimously to eliminate bag and possession limits on Mountain Home Reservoir and its outlet canal, and Hot Creek Reservoir and Blair Trail Diversion, both north-

Airport manager retires this month

TWIN FALLS — In the 45 years that he has been in the area, Harry Merrick has been almost inseparably connected with the airport, and maybe always will.

Merrick has been the Twin Falls-Sun Valley Regional Airport manager for 19 years, but his retirement this month only means he will be taking on a flurry of other responsibilities connected with the airport.

Merrick was appointed last April as an advisory board member to the state Aeronautics and Public Transportation Board.

In that capacity, he will meet with other board members twice a month to consider matters related to the state's airports.

Merrick said he will continue to be a flight instructor and pilot examiner at the airport. All flight instructors in the area must be tested periodically by him, he said.

He said he will also continue as an accident prevention counselor.

Merrick said his biggest challenge as an airport manager may have come shortly af-

ter his appointment in 1969 with the proposal to build a regional airport less than three miles from the existing one.

"We already had an airport," he said. "We would have been saddled with a white elephant."

He said proponents of the new airport would have taken care of the area's passenger needs and promote development in the area.

The Southern Idaho Regional Airport Authority was defeated after two popular-

Sugar hearing: Stallings wants to protect existing program

TWIN FALLS — The first opportunity for Idahoans to protect and defend the federal sugar program from would-be slashers comes Saturday.

A public hearing of the U.S. House Agriculture Subcommittee on Cotton, Rice and Sugar will be held at 10 a.m. in the Burley Inn to take testimony on the economic importance of the sugar beet growing and processing industry to the state.

Chairman Jerry Huckaby, D-Louisiana, and Idaho Congressman Richard Stallings, D-Bozeman, will conduct the hearing.

"We're laying the groundwork for the 1990 Farm Bill," said Chuck Barnes, an aide to Stallings, who requested the hearing. "We want Huckaby out here to see how the sugar program affects the Idaho economy, and use that information to protect the program in the drafting of the new farm bill."

Congress will begin working on the 1990 Farm Bill next year.

There are currently several bills in Congress designed to make changes in the existing program. They range from increasing the import quotas to lowering the target price to total elimination of the program.

More than 4 million tons of sugar were produced in Idaho in 1987, bringing in \$170 million to farmers for the raw product, ac-

ording to the Idaho Sugar Beet Growers Association. Sugar beets are the third largest revenue-generating crop in Idaho. The Amalgamated Sugar Co. processes these beets at its factories that employ 1,200 full-time and 1,600 processing season employees.

Addressing the Idaho sugar beet industry's economic impact Saturday will be Idaho Department of Agriculture Director Richard Rush; state Rep. Doug Jones, R-Elmer, and Sen. Denton Darrington, R-Burley; county commissioners and mayors; sugar beet growers and processors; labor and transportation; lenders and input dealers; and producers of other farm commodities.

The sugar program guarantees sugar beet growers a minimum price, and makes sure they receive it from the commercial market rather than from government payments. By imposing quotas on imported sugar, the government prevents an oversupply that could drop the market price and force the U.S. Department of Agriculture to buy the American-grown surplus.

Most other sugar-producing nations directly subsidize their sugar growers in some way. Only one congressman in nine represents a primarily rural district, Stallings said. The few need evidence to convince the many that farm programs are needed.

If the results of a recent national survey are accurate, the job may not be that difficult.

More than 73 percent of Americans support protection of the U.S. sugar industry by limiting imports of foreign sugar, according to the survey conducted for the U.S. Sweetener Producers Group.

It showed 75 percent of Americans favor continuing the current policy of supporting "prices" for domestic sugar.

When asked why they support the current sugar policy, 54 percent cited the need to save farm jobs and 27 percent said the policy helps keep business in the United States.

The poll also found that 62 percent of the respondents believe that reducing sugar supports would result in increased profits for major food processors and soft drink bottlers, not in increased savings for consumers.

Stallings also plans to address the issue of imported blended sugar products exceeding the quota limits at the hearing.

More than 300,000 tons a year of foreign sugar is entering the country under the guise of being in already-blended products such as cake mixes, he said. Some "illegal" imports are so blatant as to be almost pure sugar.

Acid rain study will use hikers

TWIN FALLS — Hikers in the Sawtooth National Forest can contribute to acid rain research while they enjoy the mountain scenery.

The Sawtooth National Forest and the Environmental Protection Agency are studying the impact of air pollution and need volunteers to take water samples from 50 mountain-lakes during the next few months.

"Our purpose is to figure out how sensitive the lakes in the Sawtooth Wilderness are to acid rain," said Robert Hendricks, SNF soil, water, air and planning director. "We've already had indications that there are a lot of enthusiastic people out there who want to help us."

Volunteers are needed because "this is a very labor-intensive project," said Scott Phillips, Sawtooth National Recreation Area recreation director. "There are a lot of lakes involved... We don't have the manpower to go to all of them. Not to restate the obvious, but no mechanized vehicles can be used because the lakes are in a wilderness area."

The Forest Service will provide volunteers with training, maps and equipment.

"You don't just go to a lake and dip your bottle in," said Phillips. "It's absolutely critical that we tell them how to take the sample correctly."

The current project follows a 1985 EPA study which sampled lakes throughout the western states. "The EPA originally in-

Tornadoes strike near Casper

CASPER, Wyo. (AP) — Three tornadoes touched down around Natrona County on Thursday, ripping the roof off a tool shed at the Alcoa Marina, but there were no reports of injuries, according to authorities.

Minutes after that, workers at the Natrona County airport reported seeing a third tornado in a field 5 miles northeast of there, but again there were no reports of injuries or damage.

The National Weather Service issued a tornado warning in effect until 8 p.m. for east central Natrona County and west central Converse County, including Glenrock, but the warning later was canceled as the storms petered out.

The National Weather Service reported that at about 6 p.m. a tornado hit the Alcoa Marina on the Alcoa Reservoir, located 29 miles southwest of Casper.

"We had no clue it was coming," she said. "We just thought it was a strong wind, and then you could see it coming out across the lake."

While the Casper area was not included in that warning, it was pelted with heavy rain Thursday afternoon and evening, and a team from the Casper Fire Department was called to rescue a 21-year-old Casper resident who was trapped while climbing on wet rocks in the Garden Creek Falls area of Casper Mountain.

Drugs, alcohol not cause of air crash

SPOKANE, Wash. (AP) — Neither alcohol nor drugs appears to have been a factor in a Montana plane crash last year that killed 10 people, including five members of the musical group Montana Band, according to a preliminary National Transportation Safety Board report.

initial lab report showed a blood alcohol level of .035 percent, but he stressed this probably was not Taylor's condition at the time the plane went down.

Under Federal Aviation Administration regulations, pilots cannot fly with a blood alcohol level of .04 percent or more, said Jim Danaher of the NTSB Human Performance Division.

Laboratory tests on blood samples of pilot Joe Taylor, of Athol, Idaho, produced conflicting results. But an analysis of the findings, written by Merritt Birky, a chemist with the NTSB's Washington, D.C., headquarters, concluded there was no evidence the pilot had ingested alcohol or drugs prior to the July 4, 1987, crash.

"My conclusions based on my analysis (were) that the alcohol cannot be shown to have been from ingestion," the chemist said. "The presence of that low alcohol concentration was most likely due to blood sample decomposition. Certain bacteria generate alcohol when they grow, and this most likely was the cause of this position."

In addition to band members, victims of the crash included the bluegrass and country-rock group's sound technician and road manager, the 12-year-old son of a band member, the pilot and the pilot's female friend.

5 Twins players may help AL All-Star effort

NEW YORK — After finishing the World Series at home in the Metrodome last year, five players from the Minnesota Twins will try to help the American League win the All-Star Game on the road.

Pitchers Frank Viola and Jeff Reardon, catcher Tim Laudner, infielder Gary Gaetti and outfielder Kirby Puckett were among the pitchers and reserves selected Thursday by AL President Bobby Brown and Twins manager Tom Kelly for Tuesday's game against the National League in Cincinnati. No Twins were among the starters selected in fan balloting and announced Wednesday.

The Oakland Athletics, with three elected starters, are the only other club with five players on the team.

Starters Roger Clemens of Boston, Mark Gubicza of Kansas City, Dave Stieb of Toronto, Doyle Alexander of Detroit made the team in addition to Viola, who leads the AL in victories with a 14-2 record and in earned run average at 2.24. Clemens, at 12-3 with a 2.45 ERA, is second in both categories. Gubicza is 11-5, Stieb 10-4 and Alexander 8-4.

Bypassed starters included Dave Stewart of Oakland (11-7), Frank Tanana of Detroit (10-4), Bob Welch of Oakland (10-4), Bret Soberhagen of Kansas City (10-7) and Greg Swindell of Cleveland (10-7).

Relievers Dennis Eckersley of Oakland (25 saves), Doug Jones of Cleveland (20 saves), Don Plesac of Milwaukee (19 saves) and Reardon (23 saves) were picked.

Jeff Russell of Texas, a spot starter who is 10-2, completed the 10-man staff, which has only two left-handers — Viola and Plesac.

George Brett of the Royals was named to the team for the 13th consecutive season. Starting outfielder Dave Winfield of the New York Yankees is on the team for the 12th consecutive year.

Two shortstops were picked, Cal Ripken of Baltimore and Ozzie Guillen of Chicago. One of them probably will replace starter Alan Trammell of Detroit who is on the 15-day

disabled list with a broken left elbow. Ripken is batting .276 with 13 homers and 46 runs batted in after a terrible start and Guillen is batting .265 with no homers and 19 RBI.

Infield reserves are Carney Lansford of Oakland, Don Mattingly of New York, Johnny Ray of California, Harold Reynolds of Seattle, Brett, Gaetti, Guillen and Ripken. First baseman Mark McGwire of Oakland, second baseman Paul Molitor of Milwaukee and third baseman Wade Boggs of Boston are starters.

Lansford is fifth among AL batters at .332, Brett is sixth at .331 with 13 homers and 59 RBI and Mattingly is 10th at .317 with six homers and 41 RBI. Gaetti is batting .304 with 18 homers and 53 RBI, Ray is batting

.299 with 43 RBI and Reynolds is hitting .291.

Laudner, batting .271 with nine homers and 31 RBI, is the only reserve catcher behind starter Terry Steinbach of Oakland.

Mike Greenwell of Boston and Puckett are the backup outfielders behind Jose Canseco of Oakland, Rickey Henderson of New York and Winfield. Puckett, who finished fourth among outfielders, 80,000 votes behind Henderson, is batting .350, the leading average of any reserve in either league. Greenwell is fourth in the AL in batting at .337.

Among the players not picked were Ellis Burks of Boston, Cory Snyder and Joe Carter of Cleveland, Kent Hrbek of Minnesota, Jack Clark of New

York and Alvin Davis of Seattle.

Clemens, the two-time Cy Young Award winner, earned a \$150,000 bonus for making the team, which will be added to his \$1.35 million salary. Among other players earning bonuses for making the team were Brett, Lansford, Stieb and Viola, who each earned \$50,000, Gaetti and Ray, \$25,000 each, Plesac, \$15,000, and Ripken, \$10,000.

There are 12 first-time all-stars in the AL — Alexander, Gaetti, Greenwell, Guillian, Jones, Lansford, Laudner, Ray, Russell, Steinbach and Viola. The team averages 28.9 years in age and includes 10,300 hitters, four 10-game winners and three 20-save relievers.

NL All-Star team adds 6 pitchers

NEW YORK (AP) — Chicago's Greg Maddux, the National League leader in victories, was among six pitchers selected for the All-Star team for the first time Thursday as the pitchers and reserves were named for Tuesday's game in Cincinnati.

Also making the team for the first time were New York's David Cone, San Diego's Mark Davis, Philadelphia's Kevin Gross, Cincinnati's Danny Jackson, and the Cardinals' Todd Worrell.

Rounding out the nine-man staff are New York's Dwight Gooden, making the All-Star team for the fourth time, and Houston's Bob Knepper and the Dodgers' Orel Hershiser, both selected for the second time.

Eleven reserves were also selected, including Montreal first baseman Andres Galarraga, the league's leading hitter at .341, and Atlanta Braves outfielder Gerald Perry, whose .336 average is second to Galarraga in the league.

The other backup players chosen for the 26-man roster by Cardinals manager Whitey Herzog and NL President Bart Giannetti were: catcher Lance Parrish of the Philadelphia Phillies; infielders Shawn Dunston and Vance Law and outfielder Rafael Palmeiro of the Chicago Cubs; Chris Sabo and Barry Larkin of the Cincinnati Reds; San Francisco second baseman Robby Thompson; outfielder Andy Van Slyke of the Pittsburgh Pirates, and St. Louis outfielder Willie McGee.

Worrell leads the league with 16 saves, followed by Davis with 15. Maddux is 14-3 with a 2.15 earned run average. Hershiser is second to Maddux in wins with 43 and has a

2.46 ERA. Gooden is 11-4 and is tied for the league lead in complete games with Jackson and Maddux at seven. Knepper is 8-2 with a 2.47 ERA while Jackson is 9-4 and Gross 8-4.

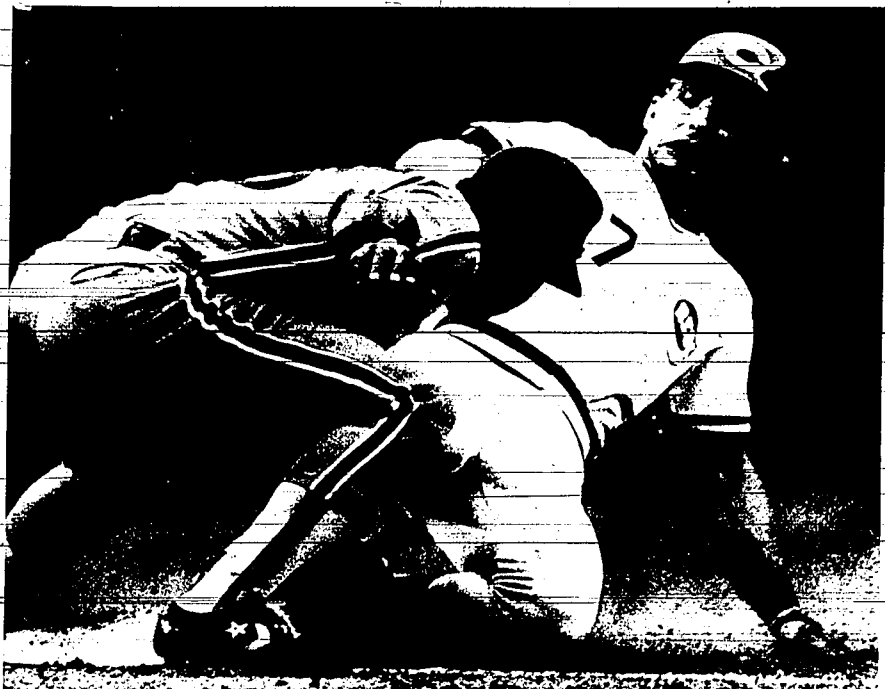

Sabo, Larkin, Law, Palmeiro, McGee and Thompson, all batting .300 or better, are among the top 10 hitters in the National League. Van Slyke is fourth in runs batted in with 56; Dunston is batting .290. Parrish is hitting .236 with 12 homers.

All-Star selections by fans draw questions

NEW YORK (AP) — It's a controversy that is as much a part of the All-Star Game as the game itself: do the best players make the starting lineup?

Consider some of the starters selected by the fans this year. At second base for the American League is Milwaukee's Paul Molitor, a solid .300 hitter. But he has not played at second since last season.

Vince Coleman of the St. Louis Cardinals was chosen as a starting outfielder. Coleman is batting .282 with 45 stolen bases, but is he having a better season than teammate Willie McGee, a .320 hitter who finished fifth in voting?

How about the starting catchers: Gary Carter for the National League and Terry Steinbach for the American League? Carter is batting .245 and

has not homered since May 16. Steinbach is hitting just .217 with four homers and has only 143 at-bats.

Is there a better way of deciding who should start, other than by a vote of the fans?

"I think there should be a multiple way of picking the team," Chicago White Sox manager Jim Fregosi said. "It is very important to have the fans involved in picking the team, but the players should also have a vote."

Dale Murphy of the Atlanta Braves goes along with the idea of letting people besides the fans decide.

"I always thought it would be good if we could divide it among the fans, the writers and the players," Murphy said. "Fans always do a good job, but occasionally there are inequities."

Jim Morrison of the Braves defended the fans' selections, given the tough task of choosing the right players.

Some fishing restrictions lifted

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — The state Fish and Game Commission has lifted fishing limits on six southern Idaho reservoirs, and continuing drought conditions could force the lifting of restrictions on up to 20 more within the next month.

The commission, meeting in Idaho Falls Thursday, voted unanimously to eliminate bag-and-possession limits on Mountain Home Reservoir and its outlet canal, and Hot Creek Reservoir and Blair Trail Reservoir, both northeast of Mountain Home.

Limits also were lifted on Fish Creek Reservoir northeast of Carey, Thorne Creek north of Gooding, and Little Camas Reservoir near Fairfield.

Al Van Voorzen, resident fisheries manager for the Idaho Department of Fish and Game, said water-levels drawn down by irrigation demand from the already depleted reservoirs has made the situation serious for fish populations. But he did not ask the commission to approve "salvage" fishing on the reservoirs, which would have allowed fish to be caught with nets or by hand.

"We're not to that point yet," Van Voorzen said. "What we're saying is let's take the limit off and see if it reduces the pressure."

Fish and Game Director Jerry Conley said the condition of southern Idaho reservoirs is the worst he has seen in eight years as head of the department. He said

he expects Thursday's action to be followed by the lifting of bag and possession limits on 15 or 20 additional reservoirs in the next 30 days but doubts the low water levels will result in massive fish kills.

"Generally the fish move out with the last irrigation flush," he said. "But then they're just being lost in the irrigation system, so why not let people catch them?"

The commission also agreed to close the salmon fishing season on the Little Salmon River, effective at 6 p.m. Sunday.

Van Voorzen said the river has been open for chinook salmon fishing on most weekends since May, but that the run now has essentially ended.

Through June 25, he said, about 2,600 chinook had been taken from the Little Salmon by members of the Nez Percé Indian Tribe. Another 700 were caught by sport anglers.

Fish and Game officials also advised the commission of plans to transplant about 30 young trumpeter swans this weekend from the Red Rocks National Wildlife Refuge in the Island Park Area.

Conley said the cygnets would be moved to the Grays Lake area and the Fort Hall Bottoms in eastern Idaho in the first attempted transplant of trumpeter swans in the state.

"I got the blame for allowing this game to make," writes a dejected reader. "I still think I made the normal play for the conditions; partner insists I blew the defense. What do you say?"

West won his ace of hearts and played the spade king. (I was South and had played the heart try on partner's heart king.) Partner followed with the spade deuce and I refused the ace, hoping to shut out dummy's suit. West continued with the ace and a small diamond, and partner won his king. Partner then cleared the hearts, giving West a second heart and his contract. West led a diamond to dummy and knocked out my spade ace, and a second diamond entry brought in the spades.

"Partner pointed out that had I won the first spade and led a heart, we would have defeated the game easily—Was my play as bad as he makes out of it?"

This department doesn't think your spade duck was bad at all—most would refuse the king just as you did. The real blame belongs to North. When he won his diamond king, he should have led a low heart instead of trying to cash the entire suit. That would have left you with a heart to lead when you won your ace of spades.

Heritage Museum scores a first

Gem State
Days offer
Idaho's past

HOLLISTER - The air will be spiced with the scent of barbecued buffalo and the authentic dishes of a native Laguna Pueblo Indian woman. Dust will rise and fall as the descendants of Idaho's first families' away to the pulse of century-old rhythms. Children may shriek with delight as they are lifted aside stamping horses for a sample ride.

It will be more than you could ever hope to enjoy in one place. That's Jerry Lee Young's billing for Idaho Gem State Days which will run today through Sunday from 10 a.m. until dusk at the Heritage Museum, two and a half miles south of Hollister.

Young shuffles through the names of exhibitors - bead and quill workers, sculptors, woodcarvers, cooks, gem-dealers, Indian dance-horse clubs, storytellers and historical stagecoach owners - who have all promised to make the event one to usher in Idaho's Centennial with a celebration of the history and talents of the state's people.

No one can believe we've been able to get all of this together in a little spot out in the desert," says Young with a smile as he pushes back a shack of sun-streaked hair.

But Young is used to wowing folks. Last October - when he opened the doors to his 7,000-square-foot museum, people stood up and took notice. It's filled with mounted wildlife exhibits, Indian artifacts, prehistoric animal bones and Winchester rifles - all the incredible booty of his 30 years as a collector.

Now he's adding to the museum's appeal with living exhibits of Idaho's rich human heritage and he plans to make Gem State Days an annual event.

"It's going to be quite a party out here," he says as he flips open a copy of an Idaho magazine and points to a picture of a handsome young Shoshone Indian brave on horseback with battle lances raised in a classic pose.

"That's Randy West," Young says.

"He's been in several motion pictures and is going to be here with his horses and costumes. The kids will love him."

Young speaks with great affection and pride for those native Americans who have agreed to participate in Idaho Gem State Days.

"I just feel so honored when they say they'll come. I give them as much freedom as I can, and just let them do what they want...when and where," he says.

Utes from Colorado, Oghala Sioux from South Dakota who trace their family tree to the famous chief, Red Cloud, Northern Putes from the Duck Valley Reservation in Nevada, and Idaho's Bannock and Shoshone tribes from Fort Hall, have all agreed to do native dances for the visitors all three days, once in the morning and again in the afternoon.

Young says guests shouldn't be surprised if they are pulled from the audience and made to join in

the undulating steps. He hopes all who attend will be willing to enter into the spirit of this special event.

He says that many of the costumes the dancers will wear are more than a century old and it never ceases to thrill him to watch them put to use again.

The native Americans only begin a lengthy roster of the talent to be found this weekend:

Jerry Young

HOLLISTER - Jerry Lee Young will be the first to admit he's had a wonderful life. He opened the Idaho Heritage Museum, two and a half miles south of Hollister, in October of last year. Young filled it with his own personal collection - more than 10,000 antique leavings of early natives of Idaho, fossils and bone fragments of prehistoric animals, and the taxidermed examples of most Idaho wildlife and other worldwide exotic animals.

In less than a year, the doors of this rock-and-steel-walled desert wonder have opened to welcome visitors from 39 states, 21 foreign countries, 8740 school children from Idaho, Washington, Oregon and Nevada; and Malibu Valley residents' savvy enough to take advantage of this gem of history in their own backyards.

"It's taken a lot of money, a lot of time and more than a touch of guts to make it a reality, let alone keep it going," but Young says it's been worth it. "People love this place," he says. "There's nothing like it in the western states. They'll see things right here in Hollister, Idaho that they'd have to travel to the East Coast to see anywhere else."

"If Young sounds a bit proud, we'll just have to forgive him. He's giving Idaho something to brag about, especially as we enter the exciting time of our Centennial celebration.

SHOSHONE - Marnie Shaw's Fiddler's Jamboree is 25 years old.

The event, held annually on the second Sunday in July at Shoshone's Mary L. Gooding Memorial Park, received statewide recognition in 1963 as part of the Idaho Territorial Centennial celebration.

The Silver Anniversary edition will begin at noon on Sunday in the historic Shoshone park which nestles along the banks of the Little Wood River. The event has been sponsored by the Shoshone Chamber of Commerce since 1964.

The jamboree is free to the public and musicians are wel-

come to join Shaw and members of the Idaho Old-Time Fiddler's Association on stage.

Stringed instruments have been the mainstay of the jamboree with everything from pianos and violins to homemade fiddles and washtubs being represented over the years. Shaw said last week he would also welcome other types of instruments to join his "celebration of music."

Musicians of all ages and abilities are always welcome and the event has attracted enthusiasts from around the Northwest during its history.

Shaw, now 80, lives in Fairfield. He has played an active role in preserving the folk music traditions of Idaho. "Fiddling is one of America's traditional values, it has been part of our culture since

the country began," he says fervently. Shaw says it is important to preserve the melodies and techniques of fiddling for future generations.

He started a backyard barbecue "jam session" at his Camas County ranch that attracted area fiddle enthusiasts in the mid-1950s. Out of that local get-together has grown the now-famous jamboree at Shoshone.

Shaw was also instrumental in organizing the Fiddler's Association in Idaho and served as its first president.

In 1960 he had Fairfield resident George Perkins Jr. draw his cartoon caricature "Marnie's Little Fiddler," which symbolizes, Shaw says, fiddle music and the

Winning 10 Grammy Awards during his career, Getz has also gained international acclaim with performances in South Africa, Australia, and numerous European and Latin American countries as well as in the Far East.

'Short Circuit 2' will please kids more than adults

HOLLYWOOD - Is it a symbol of over-mechanization that our movies now sentimentalize robots and computers, instead of making them monsters, like HAL 9000 or the Golem? In a cock-eyed way, turning borgs into cute little funny-bunnies and elf equivalents lets movie makers celebrate the technology that makes them powerful, while complaining that it is not always human enough.

"That is a leading theme of 'Short Circuit,' and also of its sequel, 'Short Circuit 2.' Here, the most whimsical automation of them all, Number Five, who came alive and went benignly amok after an over-jigged generator zapped him during a thunderstorm - is set loose in the big city of Toronto disguised as a nameless U.S. metropolis. There, civilian

spiced-up with ear-crashes, dirty jokes, TV trivia and a toy merchandising tie-in. One can see why agents and studio executives went crazy over it. Contained in a University of California, Los Angeles film class by the students Brent Maddock and S.S. Wilson, the original script, which is not all that good, must have seemed like marketer's heaven.

Wilson and Maddock have improved considerably here. They are just as derivative and glib, but more thoughtful. Their construction is more deft, their dialogue is better, and they make Number Five - who sometimes looks like a blissful, praying Minolta camera on a wheeled tripod - an even more delicate of robots, even more than tart C-3PO in 'Star Wars.'

In 'Circuit 2,' there is a human candidate to match him, Eagerbeaver Indian scientist Ben Jahvi (Fisher Stevens) makes a deal with a scrumptious toy execu-

utive (Cynthia Gibb) - to deliver tiny toy copies of Number Five. Through some predictable machinations, Ben picks up two partners: street scambler Fred Ritter (Michael McKean, who has a great hustler's grin and delivers the film's best performance) and mass production expert Number Five himself. Later, all of them are bedeviled by a band of brutal bank robbers, who just want to sneer, steal, lie and smash everything up.

Ben Jahvi was a pretty annoying character in 'Short Circuit.' No one ever corrected his dopey malapropisms and at times he seemed like some bad Bengali equivalent of the Czech swingers of Steve Martin and Dan Aykroyd.

But he is more vulnerable and affecting here; Stevens surmounts the dialect humor. The similarities and links between Ben and Johnny - and the contrast between them - and the affable shark, Ritter - make a more effective mix.

In 'Short Circuit,' director John Badham seemed to be handling material that was beneath him. But the director here, Kenneth Johnson, comes from TV. He

There is nothing really wrong with this movie. It is a pleasantly slick, well-tooled little fairy tale without much real character or substance. A PG special that some adults should avoid strenuously, but that children should like. It rolls along.

Schwarzenegger plays Russian Dirty Harry in 'Red Heat' outing

The following are capsule reviews of some of the films playing locally in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

RED HEAT (R), A Soviet-fish-in-American-water cop thriller in which a Russian Dirty Harry (Arnold Schwarzenegger) teams with a wisecracking Chicago cop (Jim Belushi) to track down a detecting drug smuggler. (Right-wing glasnost: West is West, East is Eastwood and never the twain shall meet.) Walter Hill directs in a fiery, muscular, pop-graphic style - with a James Bond score that amusingly blends Prokofiev with rhythm and blues. But the action seems to squeeze out everything else. Most importantly, the character hyplay which might have made 'Heat' memorable.

Crocodile's lady (Linda Kozlowski), a New York reporter, is endangered by a Central American drug kingpin, sending the couple deep in hiding in the Australian bush. Nothing special as an action adventure but shrewdly effective as a projection of a mythical hero. With John McElliott, Charles Dutton, Hechter Uharry, Juan Fernandez.

FUNNY FARM (PG), Not about a farm, and not particularly funny. Nothing special as an action-adventure but shrewdly effective as a projection of a mythical hero. With John McElliott, Charles Dutton, Hechter Uharry, Juan Fernandez.

But the movie has a shallow scientific conception of small-town America and it is neither celebration nor nightmare.

BIG BUSINESS (PG), Like a sensational party, this film may not bear the closest scrutiny in cold light of day - the pacing sags at times, and some endings sometimes fizzle out - but it gives an irresistible glow at the time. Both Bette Midler and Lily Tomlin are in splendid form as the two acts of identical-twins mismatched at birth (it switched baby plot squared). Finally, it is director Jim Abrahams' light in exploring the plot's visual possibilities and the seamless technical credits that make looking for tricks seem churlish.

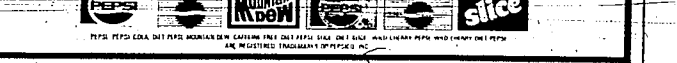

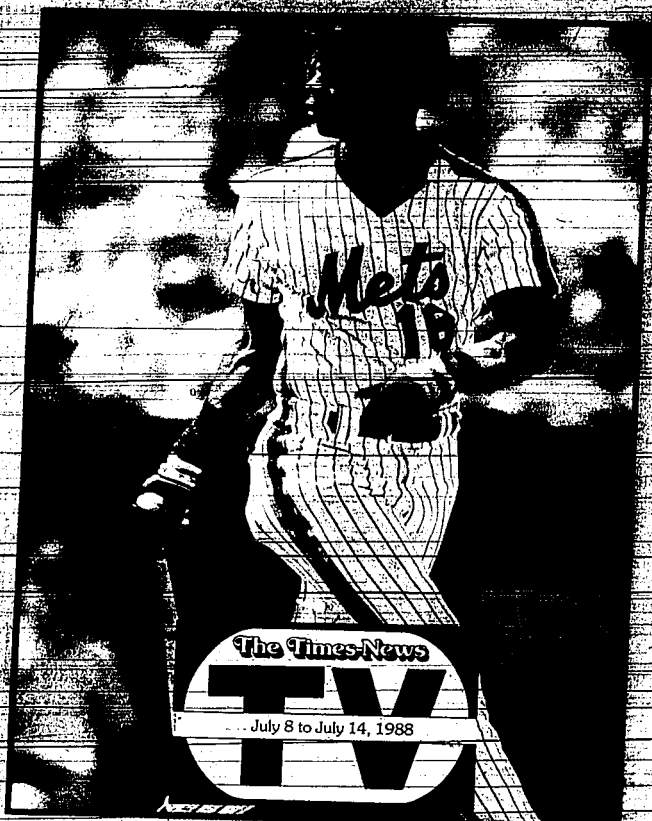

Major League All-Star Game has given baseball a shot in the arm

The Major League All-Star Game, which will be played Tuesday, July 12, in Cincinnati's Riverfront Stadium and televised by ABC, has come a long way since 1933. Then Arch Ward, sports editor of the Chicago Tribune, thought it would be good to gather the top baseball players for one "Game of the Century," which would be an adjunct to the Chicago World's Fair.

The All-Star Game would also give baseball a shot in the arm; what with the Depression and dwindling gate receipts. The receipts were to go to establish a fund to assist former ball-players who were hard hit financially.

But who would pick the starts to play in the game? Ward believed the fans should, so the Tribune ran a poll and 18 players were selected by fans for each team. The same system was used in the second All-Star Game, but the voting was light, so a new method was chosen.

From 1935 to 1946, the players were selected by the 16 managers of the two leagues, with the all-star manager picking the starting lineup. Fans got back into the act in 1947 and, for the next 11 years, selected the starting teams with the all-star manager picking the reserves and pitchers.

In 1957, however, Cincinnati voters stuffed the ballot boxes, and only one non-Red, the incomparable Stan Musial, was selected to the team. Commissioner Ford Frick tried to undo some of the damage, ousting two Cincinnati outfielders and replacing

them with Willie Mays and Henry Aaron, but it was obvious that a new selection system was needed. The following year, the power to select the all-stars was given to the players, managers and coaches of each league.

In 1970, the fans got back in the booth, with the Gillette company handling the promotion and counting the votes. One problem was that not every player was included on the ballot. Steve Garvey of the Los Angeles Dodgers, for instance, was omitted from the 1974 ballot, but was picked as starting first baseman on a write-in vote. He further complicated things by being elected the game's most valuable player.

These days, the balloting is run by USA Today, and the results aren't always perfect. Players in the bigger cities are often chosen more for their names than for what they do on the field. The Mets' Darryl Strawberry, for instance, has been high in the balloting every year since he came up, but he hasn't been able to live up to the voting results.

This year, however, "The Straw," who again leads the National League

outfielders in the voting, finally has the credentials to back him up. In mid-June, he was hitting .309 (more than 30 points higher than his lifetime average), with 45 RBI and 17 home runs. Even his fielding once lackadaisical, has picked up considerably.

Most all-star managers select the reserves by following the fans' selections, and most players not selected don't really mind. After all, they get a three-day vacation. But not everyone.

In 1979, San Diego's Garry Templeton, then a Cardinal shortstop, was not picked by the fans, but was named to the squad by the manager, Hurt, but poetic, Templeton notified the manager that he wouldn't travel to the game. "If I ain't startin'," he announced, "I ain't departin'."

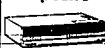

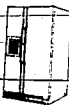

Daytime Emmy Awards bring tears, cheers but very few real surprises

The 15th Annual Daytime Emmy Awards offered few surprises but plenty of tears. The tears flowed almost nonstop in all of the clips featuring the various nominees. There were only three clips out of over 30 in which the nominees showed any restraint, and only Arleen Sorkin (Calliope of "Days of Our Lives") appeared in a funny scene.

The first winner to be announced in the supporting actress category was Ellen Wheeler (Cindy of "All My Children"), and she couldn't stop crying through her acceptance speech. At one point it seemed that New York City's Waldorf Astoria Ballroom, the site of the event, would require the assistance of flood control patrols.

Backstage, Ellen Wheeler once again succumbed to tears as she spoke to the assembled press. The actress explained that her storyline, in which she plays an AIDS victim, took on special meaning for her when Max Navarre, a writing consultant for the AIDS plot, died of the disease six weeks ago. David Canary, who won the Best Actor Emmy for his work in the same show (as Adam & Stuart Chandler), also singled out Max in his acceptance speech.

Also missing from the festivities was Helen Gallagher, who won a Best Actress Emmy for the role of Maeve in "Ryan's Hope." Ms. Gallagher beat out Susan Lucci, who established a record this year for the

most Daytime Emmy nominations (nine) without winning. Actually, the speculation backstage had been that this could very well be Susan's year, but once again daytime's most popular star was deprived of the golden statuette. Oh well, maybe 10 will be Susan Lucci's lucky number.

They paraded to the stage and exclaimed that it was nice to see their colleagues once again since most of their time these days is spent on the picket lines. Privately run TV networks cater to individual demands

LOS ANGELES (AP) — When Arco, JCPenney and Merrill Lynch employees turn on their TVs, it's not always to catch the latest "Cosby" or "Moonlighting." They may be watching their company's own TV network to learn the latest from the boss.

"There are now around 45 private television networks" run by individual companies, said Marc Porat, head of the New York-based Private Satellite Network. "On top of that there are about 21 industry-wide networks" linking members of a profession, such as lawyers, educators and hospital staffers.

Private TV networks are tailored to each user's need. ARCO executives in different cities communicate through video conference calls. Buyers for Penney's view new clothing they can stock. Merrill Lynch brokers watch "ActionLine," a weekly program on sales techniques and new products.

"We've got rooms in Anchorage, Los Angeles, Dallas, Philadelphia, Houston and Washington, D.C.," said Arco's Don Walton. The Los Angeles-based system airs 80 hours a

month, mainly teleconferences. Arco Chairman and CEO Lod Cook also conducts dialogues with 14 employees monthly on "Primetime."

Private television is rapidly moving past conferences and meetings. Some companies air regular shows for employees. Trade groups, churches and health organizations use networks to pass along industry updates, train employees or spread the gospel.

"This is the way corporate television is going, by satellite and live," said Judy Noble of Merrill Lynch's Video Network. The investment firm produces two to five shows a week in its Manhattan studio, beaming them live in 482 offices for viewing by brokers and, sometimes, investors.

"I've been amazed at how many churches have used memorial funds to purchase a satellite dish," said Pat Correll of the United Methodist Church's network in Nashville. She said 25,000 Sunday school leaders recently viewed a three-session workshop aired at 350 sites nationwide.

There are 12,000 receiving sites with satellite dishes around the country, up from several hundred a few years ago, said Elliott Gold, publisher of BusinessTV magazine in Altadena,

Calif. He predicts 42,000 locations by 1992.

"We're running at about \$20 million (in annual revenues). We have about 16 networks and we're building others," said Porat, whose company started in 1983. "We went from \$300,000 the first year. We're growing at about 30 percent."

Porat's firm has served IBM, Ford Motor Co. and other organizations looking to pinpoint specific audiences. Private network programs are as varied as the groups airing and viewing them.

"FedEx Overnight" updates Federal Express employees on delivery conditions. The Hospital Satellite Network airs programs on topics ranging from sexually abused children to fund raising. Merrill Lynch's network briefed local brokers during last year's stock market tumble, and a two-way communications feature allowed some audience members to phone in questions.

JCPenney uses two-way communication on its Dallas-based network to plan advertising and promotional campaigns. The merchandising chain hopes to finish equipping 650 of its largest stores with satellite dishes by October.

Connors teaches tennis with video

The one thing tennis players love to do even more than play the game is to play the game better.

A quick route to improvement is available in two instructional videos by Jimmy Connors scheduled for release Wednesday. The two one-hour volumes are "Jimmy Connors' Winning Fundamentals" and "Jimmy Connors' Match Strategy" (Vestron, \$39.98 each).

A 16-year veteran of the tennis wars, Connors has won more than 100 Grand Prix championships. He is engaging and convincing as he covers just about every aspect of the game.

At times he's not saying anything your local pro or favorite doubles part-

ner hasn't said. But when an all-time great says it, the suggestions come across with more impact.

Match footage of Ivan Lendl, John McEnroe, Boris Becker, Martina Navratilova, Steffi Graf, Chris Evert and Connors demonstrates each step and enlivens the presentation.

In the first volume Connors covers the essential elements that will improve your fundamentals and techniques: body position, grip, serve, groundstrokes, volley, overhead smash, lob and approach shots.

In the second reel he covers developing your serve, return of serve, stroke variation, passing shots, doubles, exercise and practice racquets, and mental approach.

Connors calls the tapes "a private

lesson with me. It's everything you'll need to know to be a better tennis player."

That positive attitude carried Connors from the kid who learned the game from his mother and grandmother to a player who was ranked No. 1 in the world seven times.

And it comes across on almost every point he serves up to the viewer. In addition to his way, he offers alternatives practiced by other giants of the sport.

Interestingly enough, Connors points out that his two-handed backhand began when he was quite young and still small, but insisted on a regular-sized racket. As he got stronger, his mother and grandmother tried to break him of the habit.

Kids refresh 'Sesame Street'

For years, PBS's "Sesame Day" introduction has used the same "Sunny Day" introduction for its daily installments.

But now that the Children's Television Workshop production is closing in on 20 years, it's time to "refresh" (as they say) the opening.

Last week camera crews followed youngsters around Washington monuments for new montages that will appear daily—beginning in mid-November.

It's not that "Sunny Day" is fading or, in fact, the same bright song will still be used.

But this time the children on tape will be from Washington, D.C., Phoenix and environs, New Orleans and other parts of Louisiana, and Appalachia.

Last week cameramen taped youngsters from the Housing and Urban Development Department's Child Development Center frolicking at the Einstein statue on Constitution Avenue, the Lincoln and Jefferson Memorials;

the dinosaur statue opposite the Smithsonian Museum of Natural History and the Capitol end of the Mall.

At the Smithsonian dinosaur producer Arlene Sherman's assistant passed out "Sesame Street" postcards to youngsters, who had to be shooed away from the statue temporarily so that taping could progress.

The children consoled themselves with the cards, then watched the cameramen at work with fascination and afterward swarmed toward the dinosaur to resume their play.

For Sherman, taping in Washington was a trip home. She grew up in Kensington and attended the University of Maryland, then went to New York University film school.

After four years in Europe she joined Children's Television Workshop. ("It really is like a family," she said). When she was finished with her "Sesame Street" task, she planned to visit her mother in Oxon Hill, Md.

"Kids have changed," Sherman remarked.

Kids refresh 'Sesame Street'

The Washington Post

For years, PBS's "Sesame Street" has used the same "Sunny Day" introduction for its daily installments.

But now that the Children's Television Workshop production is closing in on 20 years, it's time to "refresh" (as they say) the opening.

Last week camera crews followed youngsters around Washington monuments for new montages that will appear daily beginning in mid-November.

It's not that "Sunny Day" is clouding over. In fact, the same bright song will still be used.

But this time the children-on-tape will be from Washington, D.C., Phoenix and environs, New Orleans and other parts of Louisiana, and Appalachia.

Last week cameramen taped youngsters from the Housing and Urban Development Department's Child Development Center frolicking at the Einstein statue on Constitution Avenue, the Lincoln and Jefferson Memorials,

the dinosaur statue opposite the Smithsonian Museum of Natural History and the Capitol end of the Mall.

At the Smithsonian dinosaur, producer Arlene Sherman's assistant passed out "Sesame Street" postcards to youngsters, who had to be shooed away from the statue temporarily as that taping could progress.

The children consoled themselves with the cards, then watched the cameramen at work with fascination and afterward swarmed toward the dinosaur to resume their play.

For Sherman, taping in Washington was a trip home. She grew up in Kensington and attended the University of Maryland, then went to New York University film school.

After four years in Europe she joined Children's Television-Workshop. ("It really is like a family," she said.) When she was finished with her "Sesame Street" task, she planned to visit her mother in Oxon Hill, Md.

"Kids have changed," Sherman remarked.

CNN anchor Battista makes hit in Poland

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — Every night about midway through "Panorama of the Day," one of Poland's most popular news programs, a pert, blond American pops up on the screen and says, in English, "This is Headline News, I'm Bobbie Battista."

That one line has been enough to make the CNN anchor the best-known American television personality in Poland, as she learned as the official guest of Polish television recently.

Her celebrity status has both pleased and baffled the seven-year CNN veteran. "The viewers don't even see me that much every night — like for two minutes and I barely say anything," Battista said.

Rarely, it seems, has the global network gotten so much for so little.

"We're on in 60 countries at this point and we get letters from all over the place, but nowhere has the impact been greater than in Poland. I think it just goes with their fascination with anything Western," she said.

This April, CNN signed a deal with Poland under which its broadcasts will be carried regularly on state-run television. Poles privileged enough to own satellite dishes have been able to pick up CNN in English for several years.

Under the agreement, Polish television can use CNN's international feed for domestic broadcast. The six-hour time difference makes Battista's midday anchor shift in Atlanta an ideal pickup for Panorama, which airs nightly at 9:30 p.m. in Warsaw.

Each day, "Panorama" uses one CNN Headline News report, which it intersperses with a similar report from the Soviet evening news program, "Vremya," an addition to clips from Polish TV.

"Above all, 'Panorama' is able to present different points of view of what is going on in the world. Even if the subjects are the same, there is a different point of view," said Jozef Wegrzy, the director of Polish television's second-channel, which produces "Panorama."

The international angle and the program's fast-paced formula have earned it an average of 12 million viewers a night since it went on the air just over a year ago.

Polish TV tapes and translates the CNN report daily and has the right to edit it. While still in Atlanta, Battista received a couple of tapes of the program which the Poles had retranslated in English and sent back to her.

"I was surprised a couple of times because I kind of looked at the screen and thought, 'That's not what I said.'"

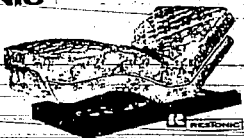

Sottnick takes TV back to classics for children

Mark Sottnick is turning children's programming around and taking it "one giant step backwards."

And that is progress.
Over the past four years, Sottnick, 42, and his Westport, Conn.-based Rabbit Ears Productions have brought storybook classics to the small-screen in a form that the producer-director says "is much more in the tradition of storytelling than it is of cartoons."

In an age where Transformers rule kiddid and mind-numbing special effects are leaving children slack-jawed rather than enlightened, Sottnick is turning back the pages to a time when family entertainment was found in books, and stories were told rather than videotaped.

Rabbit Ears' first production, "The Velveteen Rabbit," narrated by Meryl Streep, made its debut in 1985 on PBS.

In September, pay cable's Showtime packaged Rabbit Ears' equally impressive follow-ups — such as "The

Elephant's Child," narrated by Jack Nicholson (which won a Grammy Award for Best Recording for Children) and "The Ugly Duckling," narrated by Cher — as a series called "Children's Storybook Classics."

The ninth and newest production, "The Legend of Pecos Bill," is also the first story to be adapted from a legend rather than from an author's original work.

Narrated by Robin Williams, with music by Ry Cooder, the program will be broadcast Sunday on Showtime.

"Pecos Bill" is the story of the fabled cowboy who was raised by coyotes. Williams — cast as the old Texas teller of tall tales — explains that Pecos Bill invented such Wild West institutions as the cattle drive (Pecos thought people in Kansas might like them as pets). He used a 40-foot rattler as a lariat, a massive cougar as his steed and "picked his teeth with a wagon wheel."

As is the case with the best of children's television, such as PBS' always entertaining "Sesame Street," the fun works on two levels.

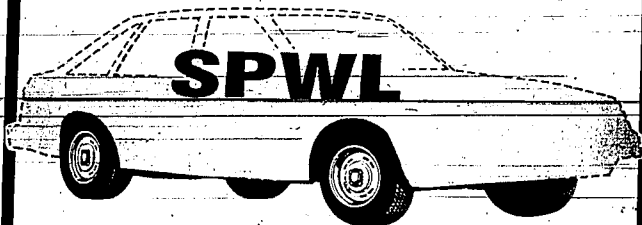

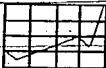
