Falling spans kill Texas trucker

BURLEY — An overpass east of Burley collapsed in Thursday's pre-dawn hours and buried a Texas man whose moving van veered off Interstate 84 and smacked the bridge's support columns.

Crop aid legislation gains OK

WASHINGTON — The Senate Agriculture Committee approved disaster legislation Thursday that would provide payments of up to \$100,000 each to farmers whose crops have been wrecked by drought afflicting the midcontinent.

The president said he would support good drought legislation — well, the Senate — Agriculture Committee has given him good drought legislation.

Leahy told reporters there was virtual certitude the disaster bill, which also would cancel a dairy price cut set for next year, would get final congressional approval and be sent to the president's desk in September at the latest but more likely next month.

The president, who had just toured sections of drought-ravaged Illinois, said he was "a little edgy" about the flood of amendments to the bill and that "I hope we're successful at stopping that."

Canadian drivers miss death by 'half a heartbeat' or less

BURLEY — Canadian trucker Dave Perkins escaped death Thursday by 20 feet.

past the overpass while his trailer was stripped and mutilated.

Fellow trucker Ken More came even closer, missing 220 tons of crashing concrete by 'half a heartbeat.'

"I'm going to church right now," said More, 32, of Spruce Grove, Alberta. "That's too close for comfort, that is."

The two truckers ended up on different sides of the wreckage when an overpass folded before their eyes early Thursday morning, but both escaped unscathed.

Perkins, 33, of Edmonton, Alberta, and More were hauling peat moss for the Henry, Hanna trucking company based in Canada.

Perkins said the crash sounded "like someone had just dropped a bomb. From the time I saw him hit those pillars, it just went poof. There was no more bridge, just ... lying at the truck like crazy — air tanks, fiberglass, stuff outside the trailer."

On their way west to Camarillo, Calif., both men left Pocatello around 2:30 a.m. At the same time, Texas trucker Harless Coleman was leaving Mountain Home on his way east.

Perkins, trailing More by approximately six truck lengths, stopped 20 feet short of the bridge amid flying debris. More drove through the explosion; his cab nosing

More said he saw Coleman's approaching headlights cutting toward him through the median. He quickly used the radio to inform Perkins, then "stayed steady on the radio."

Coeur d'Alene has baby boom

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — The Coeur d'Alene area is experiencing a mini baby boom.
 For the third consecutive month, births in June set a record at a local hospital. There were 112 babies born, the most ever in a single month.

"For some reason, we're experiencing a mini baby boom here," Kootenai Medical Center administrator Joe Morris said Wednesday. Millie Inkley, head nurse of the hospital's Obstetrics Department, can't figure out why. She said the average monthly birth rate at the facility is about 80.

Spirit Lake tries levy again

SPIRIT LAKE (AP) — The Spirit Lake City Council will try again on a \$20,000 override levy, defeated by voters on Tuesday, to reinstate the community's police department.

The proposition didn't get a two-thirds majority Tuesday night, with the vote 85-79 in favor. About 10 local residents told Wednesday's City Council meeting they didn't hear about the election in time to register, or were confused by news reports on the levy.

IU shows low minority numbers

MOSCOW (AP) — The University of Idaho has the lowest percentage of minority students enrolled among the state's four institutions of higher education, according to a new federal Department of Education study.

UI officials say that's because of the relatively small number of minority students in the state and a lack of resources to recruit them.

The federal study is based on 1986 enrollment statistics, and is compiled every two years by the Department of Education for its Office of Civil Rights.

The latest figures show 3.4 percent of the UI's 8,586 enrolled students are minorities. Lewis Clark State College, Lewiston, showed 3.5 percent of its 2,048 students were minorities.

Man held on assault charge

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — A 23-year-old Coeur d'Alene man was held on \$10,000 bail after allegedly dousing his father with gasoline and threatening to light him on fire.

Terry J. Leu was charged Wednesday with aggravated assault after his father, Larry Leu, testified that his son had thrown gasoline on him and lunged at him with a lighted cigarette lighter June 30 after being prevented from driving home from a bar in Hayden.

"He said, 'Better back off or I'm going to burn you,'" Larry Leu said. "I was scared to death."

Boise woman dies after crash

BOISE (AP) — A Boise woman has died after her car collided with a garbage truck, Idaho State Police Cpl. Rodger Arnot said.

The woman, identified as Juanita Irwin, 61, of Boise, apparently failed to yield Wednesday at the intersection of Marsing and Perch roads; south of Lake Lowell in Canyon County. She struck a Browning Ferris Industries truck.

IEA refuses to make change in endorsement for election

POCATELLO (AP) — The Idaho Education Association says it will not change its controversial endorsement of a Republican incumbent legislator over a Democratic challenger who is a Pocatello school teacher and former IEA official.

In a round of endorsements released earlier this summer, the IEA backed Rep. L. Ed Brown, R-Pocatello, over Democrat Terry Haggard, Pocatello.

Brown is a moderate in his second term in the Idaho House. "We've already endorsed Rep. Brown, and we have no intention of pulling that support," said Lamar Hagar, chairman of the IEA's regional political action committee.

Pocatello Education Association President Cathy Littenecker said earlier in the week she planned to ask the IEA to reconsider the Haggard-Brown race and remain neutral. The association also asked the state group to review its policy of making political endorsements.

"For us to pull an endorsement would not be in-keeping with our policy," said Hagar, a Blackfoot educator. He said the IEA could be receptive to suggestions on improving its selection process, but there's no guarantee they would be put into effect.

Idaho flunks vacation test

BOISE (AP) — Idaho has flunked The New York Times test for promptly sending out vacation information, dropping from an "A" to an "F" in four years.

Using a private name and return address in New York City, the newspaper sent identical letters to 50 state travel organizations and the District of Columbia, asking for a map, schedule of events and sources of other information.

The letters were sent May 24. A month later, 29 states had replied.

Idaho flunked. The Gem State was not among the 29. The Times reported in an article in last Sunday's travel section.

Red-faced state officials are unsure how it happened.

Karl Tueller, deputy director of the Idaho Department of Commerce, said Wednesday The Times did essentially the same thing four years ago. In July 1984 it ranked Idaho as one of the six

Crews work to contain 5-day wildfires

Ground crews supported by aerial water bombardments reinforced fire lines and mopped up hotspots Thursday five-day wildfires in central and southeastern Idaho. Fire bosses hoped to declare both contained Thursday evening.

Caribou National Forest officials said the 2,300-acre Devil's Creek fire 10 miles north of Malad City appeared to be dying out after firefighters scrambled the night before to resecure the fireline after flames whipped by hot, gusting winds jumped the barrier.

dropped water on remaining hotspots and some 250 firefighters cleared out unburned fuels.

A Forest Service rehabilitation team was on the scene, finalizing plans for restoration of the heavily-sagebrushed range. Officials said they hoped to begin rehabilitation work by the weekend. Demobilization of the main firefighting force was planned for Friday.

To the north in the Frank Church-River of No Return Wilderness, fire bosses demobilized a dozen smokejumpers on the Cat's Creek fire 22 miles northeast of Challis, and two ground crews mopping up the hotspots inside the 55-acre perimeter on a mountain ridge.

"With the natural breaks and the fireline they've built, they're pretty much got line all around it," Challis National Forest spokesman Jim James said. "But they've been fighting winds up to 50 miles an hour."

Phone service begins deregulation in area

LEWISTON (AP) — Larger companies in the Lewiston area will have their telephone service partially deregulated beginning sometime next year.

But larger customers around Moscow will continue to receive service overseen by the Idaho Public Utilities Commission.

US West, which includes the reorganized Pacific Northwest Bell and Mountain Bell companies, will undergo partial deregulation under Idaho's new law. US West serves the Lewiston area.

"We haven't set a specific date yet," said Rick Hays, director of US West's Idaho public relations. "Our initial plan is to get the southern Idaho portion filed and then take a look at the northern Idaho area."

But GTE Northwest, which serves Moscow and much of northern Idaho, will not exercise its option to deregulate.

"They're looking at the alternatives, but it's really not beneficial for us to take that route, primarily because the majority of our lines in Idaho are single lines and they're not

covered (by the deregulation law)," said Tom Borgford of Everett, Wash., external communications director for GTE Northwest.

Mountain Bell pushed for deregulation the last several years, although this year's successful legislation dropped a provision that would have limited PUC control over the rates charged to residential customers and businesses with five lines or less.

Under the deregulation umbrella were long-distance rates, rates for businesses with at least six lines and options such as call forwarding, and speed dialing.

Governor endorses choice of Bentsen

MOUNTAIN HOME (AP) — It was "aaching short of a stroke of genius" for Democratic presidential candidate Michael Dukakis to pick Sen. Lloyd Bentsen of Texas as his running mate, Gov. Cecil Andrus said.

"It's a solid ticket, a ticket that can win, and a ticket that can bring the kind of changes Americans are demanding," Andrus said Thursday night, in remarks prepared for the Elmore County Democratic dinner.

"The ticket now has a Southerner, a man who knows Washington, D.C., and a man who has strong ties to the business community," Andrus said.

"He has the added benefit of being a man who beat George Bush in a U.S. Senate race in Texas. Someone said that alone should drive George Bush crazy, but it'll also make the vice president once and for all decide whether he's really a Texas cowboy or a downstate-erner from Maine," the governor said.

Andrus said Bush, in a recent visit to Idaho, promised a balanced budget. But he said he's part of an administration that not once in eight years has proposed a balanced budget.

Travel officials predict good year for tourism

POCATELLO (AP) — Despite fears the drought might dry up summer-tourist dollars, state travel officials are predicting another growth year for Idaho's third-largest industry.

Mike Smith, outgoing chairman of the Idaho Travel Council, said tourism is booming in the north-central part of the state, with the Selway and Lochsa rivers providing sufficient flows for rafting, kayaking and fishing.

"The drought hasn't hit northern Idaho," Smith said.

"I'm sure it is affecting the farm industry, but it's not having an effect on the tourist industry."

Smith said tourism revenue is up 10 percent in his part of the state and business is even better in the resort he operates at Lowell.

Business hasn't been so good on the Salmon River. Hank Miller, owner of Idaho Adventure River Trips, Salmon, blamed negative news reports for a 40 percent drop in business.

He said out-of-state travelers are canceling their trips because they fear there won't be enough water to run the river.

"It's kinda like when you want to go skiing in Colorado and you hear conditions are bad, so you bag it and go to Utah," he said.

Miller said that's frustrating because flows are sufficient for recreation and water conditions are better than last year.

State travel officials earlier this year said negative press reports and misperceptions about the drought could steer travelers away from the state.

Pocatello-area tourism promoters, meanwhile, say the drought hasn't hurt them.

David Petersen, chairman of the Pioneer Country Travel Council, said he has seen no indicators that the dry weather is having an impact on tourism.

"I don't think it has. I haven't heard the comments and concerns that would go along with that," he said.

In fact, Petersen said he believes tourism will increase 3-5 percent this year.

Attendance at Yellowstone National Park usually is a good indicator of tourism in Idaho.

In June, 447,649 visitors entered Yellowstone, a 1.8 percent decrease from 1987. For the year to date, attendance at Yellowstone is 734,782, down 2.9 percent from a year ago.

Fortunes of GOP, conservatives apparently in a downturn.

The fortunes of the Republican Party and its conservative movement appear to be heading downward.

The Democrats are in an excellent position in the presidential race. While Vice President George Bush seems to have picked up ground against Massachusetts Gov. Michael S. Dukakis in recent polls, he is hampered by strong negative ratings. A Gallup Poll last month found that 40 percent of voters surveyed hold an unfavorable opinion of Bush, a number that will be hard to overcome.

Bush, who has been dogged with image problems, now is increasingly viewed by a large segment of the American population as dangerously tangled up with dictators and drugs. Most everyone seems to believe that he lied about his role in the administration's dealings with Iran and Central America. Unfortunately, Bush's campaign efforts in the past few months to improve his image problems have been ineffective.

Republican House members face a dim future of minority status for at least another decade, reducing the possibility of financial support from special interests. While there appear to be some opportunities for gains in the Senate (Florida, Mississippi), there are also seats that may be lost (Nevada, Virginia, Washington). The psychological victory that was so

close in the state governorships, will almost certainly elude the party with the loss of the Arizona governorship and likely loss of at least a couple more this fall.

The high-water mark of modern conservatism was 1981. Those were heady days in the 10-month aftermath of the 1980 election. Ronald Reagan, the principal standard-bearer of the conservative movement since 1964, was incredibly popular. That the great names of the cause such as Jeane J. Kirkpatrick and David A. Stockman manned the key posts of government was the wildest of dreams come true for conservatives. Massive tax cuts were passed. A start on cutting back federal spending was launched. Surely, a new age had arrived.

Then the changes began to unravel. The economy slipped into recession. A short-term analysis of the Reagan economic program doomed the tenuous working majority of the new president in the 1982 election.

One of the great tragedies of this early period was the effort by administration opponents to discredit conservative domestic social ideas and efforts before they had a chance

to take effect. This discrediting was begun with the hatchet job delivered to Stockman by the Washington news media and angered bureaucracy.

Stockman saw the market as central to a more productive and wealthier society, increased political freedom and maximized incentives for the disadvantaged. Minimal government, with an emphasis on getting people to try to look after themselves, was, in fact, a traditional GOP concept until the mid-1970s, when the party drifted into moderation.

Stockman's altruistic vision of greater individualism was twisted and presented to the public as a dream of a heartless accountant aiming to balance the books of the federal government on the backs of the poor.

The rejection of the administration's Social Security reform package in the fall of 1981 effectively put conservative domestic efforts on the defensive for the rest of the administration. The furious liberal attack led to policy back-pedaling.

How can the conservative social agenda be assessed if it was never really enacted? The role of federal domestic spending in the American economy is almost exactly the same as it was in 1981. The Department of Ag-

riculture today, for example, spews out more than \$25 billion in handouts to U.S. farmers.

The prospects for the conservative goal of smaller government based on an ethic of greater self-reliance are remote. If government is going to be restrained, it will be because Washington politicians do not have the guts to tax people to pay for what they are giving them. Limits on government spending won't come with a message that "we're doing this because we, the government, think you, the people, should look mainly to yourselves to get ahead," but with the message that "we know it's not your responsibility that you're disad-vantaged and here's as much as we can give in tight budgetary times." This is hardly the atmosphere in which to re-create a true individualistic consensus.

The rhetoric of the GOP as it enters the 1988 election has lost its proud conservative strain. This is ironic, since it was on a conservative agenda that the GOP won the 1980 election, the party's greatest victory since at least 1952.

It is as if the party has brought into the line that Reagan drastically cut government spending. He hasn't cut back government; he has only stopped its growth. Much of the Republican Party seems to act as if the war is over instead of just begun.

The administration has achieved some limited successes in foreign policy. Yet, the American left has managed to cast aspersions on most all Reagan efforts. In Central America, Congress, pressured by so-called peace groups, finally implemented a policy to torpedo the Contras. Even clearly successful policies and actions such as the Grenada invasion were condemned. The critics never could effectively challenge the fact that the people of Grenada, the United States and the world are better off when people are brought out from under pro-Soviet regimes. They claimed the invasion was wrong on legalistic grounds.

But today's foreign policy muddle cannot solely be blamed on opponents of the administration. The administration has played a role in the discrediting of its foreign policy through such episodes as the Iran-Contra debacle.

The Republican Party may be heading for a rough November. Much of the conservative agenda appears to be stalled. Whether a party that often seems more interested in everything but governing can motivate and rejuvenate itself is the question for the long summer ahead.

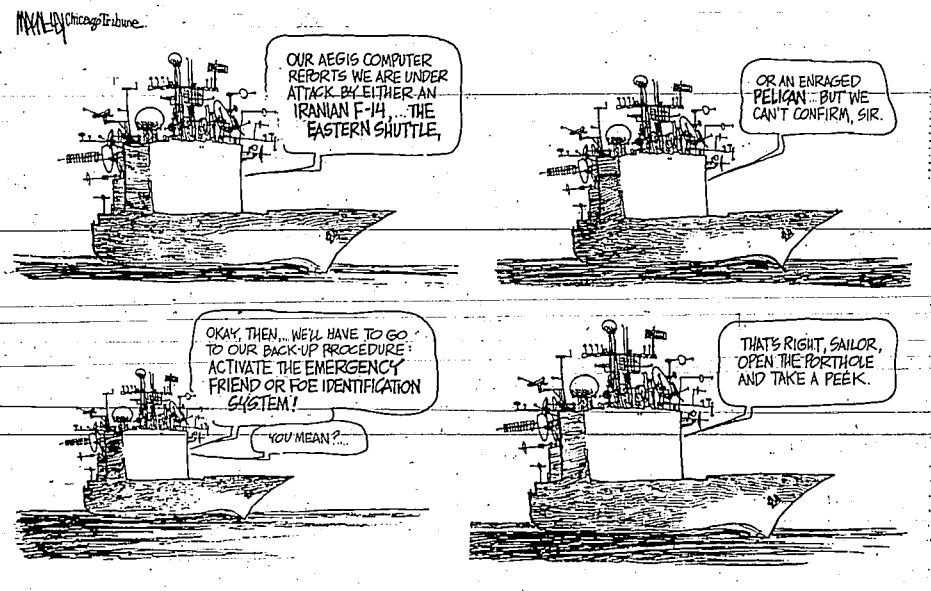
I wrote the Fish and Game and their answer was, they had not put any hatchery fish in Silver Creek for ten years.

Greenhouse effect requires thoughtful, long-term response

Our species has lost its environmental innocence. The drought in the Middle West and the heat wave over much of the nation are the first indications of this greenhouse effect. Is the problem dire, or is a less hasty response needed?

Concerned people feel that they must exaggerate to get the public's attention. Exaggeration to shatter complacency polarizes the public, since some accept the claims at face value and can't understand why others seem unwilling to make large sacrifices. The believers and the skeptics tend to talk only among themselves, and see the other group as growing more unreasonable. When scientists learn enough to justify action, they find it difficult to

get a hearing, since everyone already "knows" the answer.

There is a buildup of greenhouse gases. Current weather patterns almost certainly have nothing to do with the greenhouse effects. Precisely what the result will be is highly uncertain. If the resulting changes in climate are large and highly disruptive, we will have to re-forest, to stop burning fossil fuels and to curtail emissions of both and methane. These steps will be disruptive and extraordinarily costly (since almost all of our generated en-

ergy comes from fossil fuels), and could increase strife as nations taking these steps attempt to coerce others refusing to comply. Some energy would come from increasingly costly solar sources, and most energy from nuclear power.

Society would bear the disruption and the costs. Why rush into such disruptive steps? Future technologies should enable us to use much less energy and to generate it with less harmful consequences. Greenhouse effects might be much less devastating than we fear.

What we should be doing now is to:
- Encourage other nations to join us in implementing and strengthening the Montreal

treaty to cut the production of chlorofluorocarbons. That would involve little cost and would be beneficial in two ways: It would reduce the threat to the stratospheric ozone, and it would decrease the magnitude of greenhouse effects.

Turn our creative energies toward finding ways to conserve energy without pain. This is good economics, good politics and good environmentalism, both for current air and water pollution and for future greenhouse effects.

Promote basic research on greenhouse effects, on solar energy and on nuclear power. We need a better understanding of greenhouse effects and better energy technologies to turn to when the need arises.
- Increase our efforts to help poor countries

develop economically and be able to adjust to climate changes. My current research shows that poor countries are much more vulnerable to greenhouse effects than are rich nations. It is able to cope with changes in weather, pests and financial markets.

The rich nations must awaken to their power to affect the environment now and in the future. Our creative efforts must be focused on energy conservation and on discharging less waste into the environment. The greenhouse effect doesn't call for panic, but it does require a thoughtful long-term response.

Afflictions of America can't be changed by any mandate

Wednesday morning I drove through the dawn street to the plane that would return me to Boston after my first prolonged stay in Los Angeles since that poignant night in 1968 when I stood in a hospital room and watched the doctors turn off the machine that sustained the dead Robert Kennedy in a technological misery of life.

But, the morning papers in my lap, I was not thinking of Robert Kennedy or of the curious mixture of vitality and the obscene proportions of wealth that define the capital of the Pacific Rim. Instead, reading Mike Dukakis' announcement of his running mate and the contemptuous manner in which Jesse Jackson had been informed, I felt anger mingled with renewed awareness of just how large his movement, Bobby's loss had been — not only to me but to the America he loved and whose hate and myriad afflictions he so intensely wished to heal.

It was not the refusal to nominate Jackson, for it was certain from the beginning that he would not be named. However, he wanted and deserved — had fairly won — to be dealt

with respectfulness as an important leader with a large following, one whose voice on vital issues should be heard and heeded.

But it was not just Jesse Jackson who was being denied. It was all of us who had shared and still retained the progressive, liberating hope of the 1960s. Having known Dukakis for a long time, I knew that he was not a careless or clumsy man; that his actions — his manner of action — had been calculated, deliberate, planned. He was telling the country that he was alien to Jackson and what he stood for; that he was not a liberal, nor — and not incidentally — one who would accommodate his own will to that of a black man. He intended to take that same message to the Democratic convention, welcoming a fight on important platform issues so that his victories might reinforce that same message.

It did not matter that millions of Americans had voted for Jackson. It did not matter that millions who had

not voted shared the concerns and ideals to which he had given eloquent voice. Nor did it matter that Jackson was the first black American to attain a position of national leadership through the political system — a living, historic symbol of America's progress toward victory over racial injustice. The people to whom these things mattered — the once-dominant progressive wing of the Democratic Party — had nowhere else to go. They would not vote for the Republicans and so could safely be ignored, even taunted, in pursuit of other constituencies.

I cannot judge the accuracy of this calculation, although my instincts, tortured by long experience, tell me it is

probably a fatal mistake. All the victories of the Democratic Party in this century have come when it stood as the party of liberating change: that when the people mainly wanted management of the status quo, they had turned to the Republicans. But my anger was not fueled by the beliefs that a political mind had been made. Rather it was sourced in a awareness that all those who believed that the most serious problems of this nation — from dwindling economic productivity to the growth of a permanent impoverished underclass — should be addressed and resolution sought, even at the cost of temporary sacrifice — were now effectively being disfranchised. The honored designation

"liberal" was now to be regarded as a term of opprobrium. And those of us who cling to the public philosophy of liberalism — even if many deny the label — were in the wilderness, without voice or power to share in the direction of that great experiment that is America.

It is obvious that those who now control the Democratic Party have the power to exclude the principles and people who constitute the advocates of liberating change. But no convention majority, no popular mandate, can — with a simple vote — eliminate the profound afflictions of today's America. Poverty and injustice, crime and drugs, the approach of national bankruptcy and the relative decline of America's economic strength cannot be voted out of existence. No ballot can decide that the air shall once again be pure or the water freed from the poison of technology. These realities must either be confronted or allowed to diminish the America we will bequeath to our children.

It is ironic that this reality of a Democratic Party stripped of its noblest heritage should be conveyed by the nomination of a Texas senator,

made in explicit analogy to the selection of Lyndon Johnson in 1960. For it was Johnson — a president who did more to further the cause of black America than any president since Lincoln — who proposed and compelled passage of the Voting Rights Act that made the Jackson candidacy possible; whose vision of a Great Society — consumed in the agonies of Vietnam — is as desirable and compelling and as far from attainment today as it was in 1965.

They are a source of the values Jackson advocated, of the issues he raised. And not just Jackson. Millions of us, Tens of millions, and reshaped to the condition of modern life: they will once again be heard in the unending struggle for the soul of America's future. But not, it seems, this time. Not this election year. I may be wrong. I hope so. But if not, there is still a future to be won, a movement to be built, a place to be created where none now exists.

Forecast shows little improvement for drought areas

WASHINGTON (AP) — The focus of the drought plugging much of the nation has shifted eastward, but little relief is in sight for most areas, the National Weather Service reported Thursday.

The new short-range forecast through next Monday calls for hot, dry weather to expand eastward from the Rockies through the Ohio Valley to the Mid-Atlantic states.

Rapidly moving weather systems are expected to drag weak fronts along the U.S.-Canadian

border, possibly triggering scattered showers in the extreme northern Plains and upper Mississippi Valley. The heavy rain which has hit portions of Texas is expected to diminish.

Long-term drought conditions now cover a large area of the Great Lakes region and the Ohio and Tennessee valleys, the agency's Climate Analysis Center reported.

In addition, drought conditions persist over large areas of the northern Great Plains and Rocky Mountains.

A 30-day weather forecast issued Wednesday held little hope for improvement. And a separate climate assessment added that many areas now experiencing extreme drought have less than a 4 percent chance of recovering from the drought within 3 months.

At the beginning of July, 29 percent of the nation was undergoing severe or extreme drought, the agency said.

On Tuesday, the Agriculture Department announced sharp reductions in the anticipated har-

vest of many crops because of the water shortage — and the projections were based on the assumption of normal weather from here on, according to department officials.

The new National Weather Service forecasts cast a dark cloud over that assumption.

The drought region now extends well into West Virginia and includes nearly all of Ohio and Indiana and much of Kentucky and Tennessee, the weather service drought advisory said. On the other hand, western portions of the Mississippi Valley have received some relief due to recent rains.

The drought has been accompanied by higher than normal temperatures over much of the nation, most notably over the western Great Lakes region.

The national picture shows the current drought to be about equivalent to that of 1911, and still somewhat less severe than in several years — in the 1930s or 1956. However, in the Midwest, the weather service reported that large areas have experienced the driest April-June period on record since 1895.

Recent rains have resulted in local flooding in Texas, but nationally streamflows are below normal, and even in Texas are expected to fall back to below average levels. Flows in many major rivers remain low and continue to restrict navigation.

Reservoir levels remain close to average in much of the nation, however, the weather service noted.

In addition to Thursday's short-range forecast, the medium-range

outlook through July 23 anticipates much of the nation will remain drier than normal, particularly the Tennessee Valley, lower Midwest, central and northern Great Plains, northern Rockies and Great Basin. The only areas escaping heat in the forecast are the nation's northwestern and

northeastern corners and the Louisiana-Texas-New Mexico area.

Most of the hot area is expected to be drier than normal, although some significant rain could penetrate northwestward from Texas into New Mexico, Colorado and eastern Wyoming.

Reagan pays visit to radio station in Iowa where he worked in 1932

DAVENPORT, Iowa (AP) — Ronald Reagan seems to be the same handsome, good-natured fellow he was in 1932, when he started out as a 35-a-week sports announcer at WOC radio, a former co-worker said on the eve of the president's return visit.

"I don't think success has changed him a lot," Lucile Mauget said Wednesday. "He always had a joke and a smile."

Fifty-six years ago, Reagan borrowed his father's Oldsmobile and set out from the family home in Dixon, Ill., in search of a job in radio. He found one, and today he's returning on Air Force One. Reagan planned to attend the dedication of WOC's new building — about three miles from where

he started work broadcasting football games — deliver a speech and reminisce on WOC about his radio days. The visit to this eastern Iowa city was to be part of his tour of the drought-ravaged Midwest.

"For someone who covers the White House every day, this is probably pretty ho-hum. But for us, it's very exciting," said WOC News Director Mark Minnick, who was to spend 10 minutes chatting on the air with Reagan.

"I'm excited and nervous," Minnick said, "I hope and pray I don't stumble all over my tongue. He'll probably be less nervous than I am."

When Reagan was at WOC more than half a century ago,

Ms. Mauget worked in the business department and wrote paychecks for the station's 15-20 employees, including "the man known to listeners as 'Dutch'."

Reagan went on to become a movie star, governor of California and president of the United States. Ms. Mauget worked off and on at WOC for 35 years.

When she retired three years ago, Reagan remembered her. "I got a very nice letter from him mentioning that those were 'happy times he spent here,'" she said.

Reagan, whose hometown of Dixon, Ill., was a 75-mile drive away, started at WOC shortly after graduating from Eureka College in Illinois in 1932.

Dry spell hits Northeast

BOSTON (AP) — Watering the lawn in Plymouth can mean a ticket. Boaters on Pennsylvania's Allegheny River are warned to watch out for underwater hazards in increasingly shallow water. Egg farmers are selling birds for slaughter because of rising feed prices.

The Northeast is suffering through a dry spell that compares in some spots to the Midwest drought.

"Peas have essentially been taken off the market," said Don Geise, a field man at Furman's, a Northumberland County, Pa., farm where nearly 85 percent of the pea crop was stunted by the drought.

"Pennsylvania drought damage has approached the level of the parched Midwest: 95 percent of its farmers report inadequate soil moisture, 86 percent of pasture land is below average, 23 percent of the soybean crop is rated poor or very poor."

Pennsylvania issued a drought watch this month calling for a voluntary 5 percent reduction in water consumption. Rainfall in the Philadelphia area — where the temperature has hit 100 degrees three times already — is about 7 inches off the average for this time of year of 20.55 inches.

Farmers in western Massachusetts report up to 75 percent losses of peas and 25 percent failures of green peppers. All five acres of one grower's eggplant crop were destroyed and another lost his small carrot crop.

"What's a farmer to do? 'I don't know — keep irrigating and hope, pray,'" said Scott Danner, sales coordinator for the Pioneer Valley Growers Association in Whately, Mass., a 66-farm cooperative.

The Midwest drought has raised the price of poultry feed in the Northeast by 30 percent.

"Feed has been as high as I've ever seen it and I've been in business 35 years," said John Ricca, president of Westminster Egg Farms in Westminister, Mass., whose 560,000 birds lay about 200,000 dozen eggs a week.

"The price of a ton of feed — made of soybean and corn, two hard-hit Midwestern crops — that cost \$130 last year now sells for \$200. Ricca said he has begun selling birds for slaughter earlier than normal to reduce production.

In the driest summer in Connecticut since 1910, about 600 acres of state woodland have burned in the past week. Gov. William A. O'Neill banned open fires in or within 100 yards of brush, forests or grass fields — the state's first such summer ban.

More than 5,000 acres of forest have burned in the Palisades Interstate Park complex in New York and New Jersey.

Plains states see humid conditions

Hot, humid conditions dominated from the Plains east to the Atlantic Coast on Thursday, while showers and thunderstorms were scattered from the northeast parts of the Great Lakes into the middle Mississippi Valley.

Chicago's temperature reached 99 degrees Thursday afternoon, tying the record high for the date in 1976, and temperatures were in the 80s or 90s across much of the nation. In the desert Southwest and the high Plains of Kansas, temperatures reached about 100 degrees.

The strongest thunderstorms developed in northern and western New York state and across much of New England, where cooler air from the north clashed

with the warm, humid air mass over the upper Ohio Valley.

Thunderstorms blew down trees and power lines at Amsterdam, N.Y., Thursday afternoon causing power outages, and strong winds accompanying thunderstorms uprooted trees, overturned a trailer and downed power lines at Syracuse, N.Y.

A severe thunderstorm watch was posted for parts of New York state, Pennsylvania, Vermont, New Hampshire, Maine, Massachusetts, Connecticut and Rhode Island.

Showers were scattered from southern Iowa through central Illinois into central Indiana. Rainfall amounts ranged from a quarter-inch to three-quarters of an inch across the region.

Thunderstorms were widespread across the southeastern United States, but were spotty from north-central Colorado into the Nebraska, Panhandle and across central New Mexico.

Temperatures around the nation at 3 p.m. EDT ranged from 55 degrees at Mullan, Idaho, to 106 degrees at Gila Bend, Ariz.

Hot weather beneficial

Retail sales surge during June; attire, coolers lead tickets

WASHINGTON (AP) - The hot, dry-weather that has caused grief for many U.S. farmers proved to be a boon for the nation's retailers in June as consumers rushed to purchase items ranging from summer clothes to air conditioners.

The Commerce Department said Thursday that retail sales rose a moderate 0.5 percent to a seasonally adjusted \$132.8 billion last month. It said sales rose 0.3 in May, an upward revision from the previous estimate of 0.1 percent.

Much of the strength in June came at department stores and other general merchandise outlets, where sales jumped 1.87 percent to \$15.2 billion, the strongest gain since last August, when the increase was 1.94 percent.

In a report last week, major department stores had reported strong sales of air conditioners, summer clothes, barbecue equipment and sporting goods.

"I think what we're seeing is the upside of the current weather situation," said James Newton, head of Economic Perspectives Inc., a Delaware, Ohio, consulting firm.

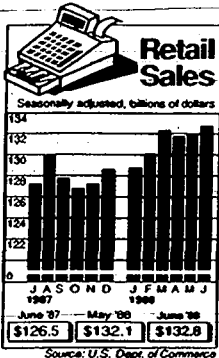
In the short term, the heat is helping boost sales of all kinds of things: lawn furniture, sprinkling systems. Also, by this time, generally retailers would be heavily marking down summer clothing. They haven't had to do that, Newton said.

Automotive sales also were strong, posting a 1.2 percent gain to \$29.7 billion. They had been off 0.8 percent in May and 1.1 percent in April.

Excluding autos, the June sales increase was 0.3 percent, down from a 0.6 percent gain in May. Offsetting the gains at auto showrooms and department stores were declines in two areas linked to the housing market, which has been softening this year.

Sales of building supply materials and hardware dropped 1.0 percent and furniture sales were off 0.5 percent.

Overall, analysts said the moderate June increase should ease fears in the financial markets that a too-strong economy poses the danger of



inflation.

"This is confirmation that consumers certainly haven't retreated to a serious degree," said Sandra Shaber, an economist with the Futures Group in Washington. "But on the other hand there's no sign that consumers are going to heat up prices."

For the first six months of the year, overall sales were up 6.4 percent over the same period a year ago. However, excluding autos, first half sales were up only 4.6 percent, barely ahead of the 4.4 percent consumer inflation rate for January through May.

Sales of durable goods - the "big ticket" items expected to last more than three years - were up 0.5 percent. Sales of non-durable goods rose 0.6 percent.

There was gains of 1.6 percent at specialty clothing stores, 0.4 percent at restaurants and bars and 0.3 percent at gasoline stations. Food and grocery store sales were down 0.4 percent, a surprise to some economists who expected a slight rise. Price increases to inflate sales figures. Drug store sales were down 0.5 percent.

New measure fixes errors in '86 tax bill

WASHINGTON (AP) - The House Ways and Means Committee approved a fat-bill Thursday correcting errors in the 1986 tax overhaul after tacking on a fistful of special-interest benefits and tax increases to pay for them.

Pipe smokers, some farmers and moonlighters accustomed to writing off part of their telephone bills would pay more.

Recipients of special tax cuts would miss out on schools that benefit from scholarships granted in the name of Christa McAuliffe, the New Hampshire teacher who died in the Challenger space shuttle disaster, to football fans who contribute to scholarships at their alma mater.

The bill, approved on a 33-3 vote behind closed doors, now goes to the House, but the presidential election campaign could prevent it from becoming law this year.

The House bill originally was introduced to fix mistakes that crept into the big 1986 tax-overhaul legislation. Those errors, such as wrong legal citations, are so numerous and so complex that congressional staffers wrote a 446-page book explaining them.

Since this is the only tax bill with a chance of passing Congress this year, lawmakers know that if they expect to get a tax provision enacted this year, it will have to be attached to this measure.

Some of the dozens of provisions in the bill would:

Renew at a reduced level the tax

exclusion for employer-provided educational assistance. Only \$1,500 of such aid per year could avoid tax.

Extend several expiring provisions, including credits for research and experimentation and for owners of low-income rental housing.

Relieve farmers from a 1987 requirement that they pay tax on off-road diesel fuel and then apply for a refund.

Allow owners of mutual fund shares to deduct certain fund expenses without regard to the usual 2-percent floor under miscellaneous deductions.

Remove some tax benefits from single-premium life insurance policies.

Raise taxes on various corporations, including those that own parts of other corporations and defense contractors.

Allow an 80 percent deduction for contributions to college athletic scholarship funds when such "gifts" guarantee a fan the privilege of buying a game ticket.

Allow rural mail carriers to deduct 33.75 cents for each mile a personal car is driven on a mail route; most people are allowed 22.5 cents a mile for business-related mileage.

Permit operators of offshore or Alaska oil rigs to deduct the full cost of meals provided to employees; most business may deduct only 80 percent.

Residents on the narrow, tree-lined street on the city's near north side said crack cocaine was sold and used for parties at one of the building's two units.

Armenians rally to press for transfer of republic

MOSCOW (AP) — Armenians stayed away from work by the thousands Thursday and held a giant rally to press for the transfer to their republic of a mountain enclave that has been part of neighboring Azerbaijan since 1923.

"The people are still not prepared to work," said a Communist Party worker in the disputed Caucasus region of Nagorno-Karabakh, which has been disrupted by strikes for two months. Three-quarters of the territory's 160,000 residents are ethnic Armenians.

In Moscow, police arrested 15 protesters who unfurled the Latvian flag and several protest banners near the Kremlin. They were demonstrating on behalf of Baltic nationalities and Ukrainians as well as Armenians.

The party worker in Nagorno-Karabakh said paramilitary police were deployed in rural areas. In Moscow, Foreign Ministry spokesman Vadim P. Perfilov told reporters the situation was tense in the region, which is about the size of Delaware.

A resident of Stepankert, the territorial capital, said people were suffering because of the job actions resulting from months of ethnic turmoil over the region's fate.

"Our situation is very bad because the strike is continuing. No one is working," said the resident, a woman who hung up the phone before giving her name.

She said Nagorno-Karabakh residents had to rely on food produced locally. "We aren't receiving food from Azerbaijan or Armenia," she said, but "we get some potatoes from the Stepankert area."

of the republic's official news agency Armenpress, said by telephone from Yerevan, capital of Armenia, that more than 200,000 people rallied Wednesday night and at least one more mass demonstration was planned.

Armenians have defied Azerbaijan and central authorities all the way up to Mikhail S. Gorbachev with a 5-month-old campaign to annex Nagorno-Karabakh.

Opposition refuses to accept returns of Mexican election

MEXICO CITY (AP) — The opposition on Thursday refused to recognize the official returns proclaiming Carlos Salinas de Gortari winner of the presidential election and pledged a nationwide protest campaign.

Final results released Wednesday night by the Federal Election Commission, a week after the polls closed, gave Salinas the victory by the slimmest margin in the 59 years the Institutional Revolutionary Party, or PRI, has controlled Mexico.

The opposition also won Senate seats for the first time, taking four out of 64.

The PRI-dominated election commission said Salinas received 9.64 million votes, or 60.36 percent, far below the 70 percent level that was the minimum victory level for the governing party presidential candidate in the past.

Cauquitemoc Cardenas of the leftist National Democratic Front was second with 5.96 million, or 31.12 percent; and Manuel J. Clouthier of the conservative National Action Party was third with 3.27 million votes or 17.07 percent. Two minor candidates accounted for the rest of the vote.

Of 38 million registered voters, 50.3 percent cast ballots, the commission said. Government and party officials initially described the turnout as larger than the 73 percent in 1982 and blamed a heavy turnout for the slow vote count.

Cardenas, 54, son of the late President Lazaro Cardenas who

is one of the most revered Mexican leaders, announced plans to tour the country next week after calling his supporters to a protest march Saturday in the downtown Zocalo plaza.

He said he would target regions where he considers "fraud was the most brutal and ran roughshod on our party members."

Cardenas broke from the PRI last year and united the normally fragmented left to leap ahead of the conservative National Action Party as one of the country's largest opposition groups.

Clouthier, 54, planned to start his protest rallies Thursday afternoon in Guadalajara, Mexico's second-largest city, then tour northern Mexico where his party has its strongholds until July 23.

Opposition representatives on the commission accused it of fraud and said the release of the vote totals was delayed so they could be doctored.

"It appears that there are two Mexicos," said Jorge Amador, a National Democratic Front supporter on the commission.

He said there is a modern Mexico where the federal electoral code is respected, honest results are posted and the victorious candidate is Cardenas, and a second, backward Mexico in which the federal electoral code is not known, is not applied, and the popular will is thwarted.

Amador's aides carried into the commission boxes of ballots, some of them partially burned and others he said they found in the

streets. "It is now the task of all the competing political parties to accept the basic principle of democracy," Interior Secretary Manuel Bartlett, the commission's leader, said at the day after the tallying and the majority verdict of the people in the terms and proportions with which it was expressed.

The PRI has not lost a presidential or Senate race or gubernatorial election since its founding in 1929.

Salinas, who proclaimed his victory the day after the tallying and has been receiving congratulations from the major organizations making up his party throughout the week, planned to meet Thursday with all Mexico's governors.

The Harvard-educated economist was President Miguel de la Madrid's budget secretary for five years until his nomination last fall as the PRI's candidate. He promises modernization and political reforms will mark his six-year term.

Cardenas, Clouthier and fifth-place finisher Rosario Ibarra de Piedra of the radical Revolutionary Workers Party have said they will not recognize the winner of a fraudulent election.

"We will not permit an electoral fraud to continue and for a usurping government to take power," Cardenas said Wednesday night.

"The long wait for the final count gave rise to widespread speculation that the outcome was being altered."

South Africa, Cuba negotiate plan to ease conflict in Angola

JOHANNESBURG — South Africa (AP) — South African and Cuban officials said Thursday that major issues remain unresolved following a milestone agreement aimed at ending conflict in Angola and South West Africa.

South Africa's foreign minister, P.W. Botha, said President P.W. Botha will chair a government meeting next week to decide whether to accept the principles agreed upon by delegates after three days of talks in New York.

A Cuban official in New York said a U.S. mediator's assertion that agreement in principle had been reached on a Cuban withdrawal from Angola was "inexact." This issue remained under discussion, the Cuban said.

On Wednesday, U.S. Assistant Secretary of State Chester Crocker said Angolan, Cuban and South African negotiators agreed on a set of principles aimed at removing Cuban troops from Angola and ending South Africa's 73-year rule over South West Africa, also known as Namibia.

The agreement will be referred back to the three governments. If they approve, another round of negotiations probably would be held next month.

The negotiators did not resolve the most contentious issue — a timetable for the Cuban withdrawal and implementation of U.N. Resolution 435, which outlines a procedure for granting independence to Namibia.

On Thursday, a Cuban delegate differed with Crocker's account of the talks.

"It is not precise to say that an agreement has been reached on

the withdrawal of Cuban troops," said Alcibiades Hidalgo, a member of the central committee of Cuba's Communist Party.

"This issue ... is part of all the discussions that are part of a process that is continuing," he said. "It is our opinion that we made substantial progress."

The agreement, linking the withdrawal of Cuban forces from Angola to South African withdrawal from Namibia, received low-key treatment in South Africa.

"The road is still far that we have to travel, but as of now the momentum and confidence have been established to enable us to continue," Neil van Heerden, director-general of foreign affairs and head of the South African delegation, was quoted as saying.

Crocker said the negotiators in New York decided it was not yet time to address the timing of the Cuban withdrawal.

South Africa and the United States would like to see the estimated 50,000 Cubans leave Angola within a year, the same timetable the United Nations has suggested for South African withdrawal from Namibia.

The Cubans and Angolans have said in the past it would take four years, and that South African and American military support for the UNITA guerrillas must end first. UNITA is the Portuguese acronym for the National Union for the Total Independence of Angola.

Crocker said the parties realized there had to be a compromise, "that there's going to have to be no losers, that it's going to have to be something that can be verified to the satisfaction of everybody."

One of the first steps would be withdrawal of South African troops from Angola. South Africa has said it has a maximum of about 3,000 troops in Angola, while its foes claimed 9,000. South Africans were there last year fighting alongside UNITA.

More than 45 white South African soldiers have died in Angola in the past year, and each death brings more domestic pressure on the government to justify its military policy. The military does not give up-to-date reports on black South Africans killed in combat.

Crocker said the South African administration in Namibia would be replaced by U.N. civil and military administrators to comply with U.N. Resolution 435.

France celebrates anniversary

PARIS (AP) — France on Thursday celebrated the 199th anniversary of the storming of the Bastille, and the president said he was inviting leaders of rich and poor nations to help fete the bicentennial of the French Revolution.

Tens of thousands of people celebrating the national holiday, known as the Champs Elysees, to watch the traditional grandiose July 14 military parade.

Planes trailing exhaust in the blue, white and red of the French tricolor swept low over the Champs Elysees to open the parade of 5,000 men, 120 aircraft, 500 tank soldiers and 300 members of the cavalry.

President Francois Mitterrand reviewed the troops at the Arch

of Triumph, now draped in tinsel or to hide renovation work, then moved down the avenue to the reviewing stand at the Place de la Concorde.

Twelve Mirage 2000 Ns, designed to carry nuclear missiles, made their first public appearance in a sweep over the Champs Elysees, as Foreign Legionnaires with white kepis and the Republican Guard with feathered brass helmets strutted below.

More than 4,000 invited guests attended a garden party at the presidential Elysee Palace, where from a back lawn Mitterrand gave a televised interview, his eighth such July 14 interview since coming to power in 1981.

Thursday night, a massive fireworks display designed to call in

the year of the bicentennial was planned at the Palais de Chaillot, facing the Eiffel Tower across the Seine river.

The storming of the ancient Bastille prison on July 14, 1789, when just seven prisoners were held, led to the fall of the French monarchy and the proclamation of the republic three years later.

"I want the Third World to be present that day," Mitterrand said of next year's bicentennial celebrations. "This universal presence in Paris of a world so different in its realities ... is a great thing."

Leaders of the seven major industrialized democracies are to hold their annual summit meeting in Paris July 14-18, 1989.

11-year-old pilot crosses Atlantic

PARIS (AP) — An 11-year-old Californian, the youngest pilot to fly the Atlantic, stepped from the cockpit Thursday with a huge grin on his freckled face. He was greeted by champagne toasts and a proud but worried mother.

"We're finally here. We made it," said Christopher Lee Marshall, weary but beaming, as he stood on the wing of his single-engine Money-252 aircraft at Le Bourget, the same airfield where Charles Lindbergh completed the first solo transatlantic flight in 1927.

"Mommy missed you so much. Give me a kiss," said his mother, Gail Marshall of Oceana, Calif., who waved an American flag and handed Christopher a new stuffed bear.

His old stuffed bear Charles

Lindbergh, cuddly and blue with aviator's helmet and goggles, accompanied him on the long flight.

Charles Lindbergh was one of my heroes," the young aviator told reporters. "So we decided on this trip, then next year hopefully around the world."

He still wore his bright blue flight suit, with a baseball cap reading "Chris Marshall Bear" covering his straw-colored hair, as he stepped onto a champagne and soft-drink reception inside an airport hangar.

Unlike Lindbergh, Christopher made several stops between New York and Paris. In Canada, Greenland, Iceland, and Scotland, and he had emergency and

aid from retired Navy pilot Randy Cunningham, 48. Their trip started in San Diego on July 7.

"I didn't want to take an 11-year-old boy and make him fly for 20 hours straight," Cunningham said. "I had a hard enough time having him fly eight hours a day and keeping him awake. You know an 11-year-old boy wants to go to sleep when he gets tired."

Christopher's mother and friends who helped plan the trip said they did not know who the previous youngest pilot to fly the Atlantic might have been, but they were confident no one younger had done it.

Mountain men will gather in Montana

LIVINGSTON, Mont. (AP) — Nearly 5,000 people are expected to gather on a large ranch just north of Yellowstone National Park next week for the annual mountain men rendezvous of the National Muzzle Loading Rifle Association and the National Association of Primitive Rifemen.

The rendezvous is a modern-day attempt to recreate the annual gatherings of mountain men in the early 1800s, who brought the pelts and furs from a year of trapping to trade with eastern businessmen for traps, guns, gunpowder, coffee, alcohol, tobacco and the like.

"They'd have their big blowout of the year and spend all their money, then head back into the mountains for another year of trapping," said Alan Monson of Big Timber, Mont., chief organizer of this year's event.

Modern-day outdoorsmen from all 50 states, whose hobby is recreating the life of the mountain man of the early 1800s, try to duplicate those gatherings as accurately as possible.

And while there are limits on the extent to which western American of 1840 can be recreat-

ed, at least many of the non-conforming features can be eliminated to maintain the mood.

—Outsiders—in—shorts—and T-shirts, for example. While the encampment will be open to the general public one day—July 19—those attending other than the open day must dress properly—buckskins and moccasins.

Officials brace for arrests during races

KENNEWICK, Wash. (AP) — The first weekend court sessions in Benton County history are planned to handle an anticipated crowd of people arrested on minor violations during the annual Columbia Cup hydroplane races.

District Court Judges Craig Matheson and Eugene Pratt and Court Commissioner Bill Platt met Tuesday to coordinate plans with representatives from the county prosecutor's and sheriff's offices, Washington State Patrol, Kennewick and Richland police and city attorneys from both towns.

Also present was Karen Miller, the Water Follies director.

There are no plans for weekend sessions in Franklin County District Court or in Pasco Municipal Court, but Franklin County commissioners did vote 2 to 1 Wednesday to follow the lead of Benton County in establishing "beer gardens," limiting consumption of brew to roped-off areas—where thunderboat fans would be barred from bringing their own and could buy only from a concessionaire.

Crew finds abandoned baby on jet

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — A woman suspected of giving birth in an airline bathroom and stuffing the infant under the sink was arrested this morning for investigation of attempted murder.

Christina Locasto, 24, of New York City turned herself in to San Mateo County Sheriff's deputies in Redwood City and was jailed on \$50,000 bail, said Lt. Mike Dow.

A United Airlines cleaning crew found the infant in a blood-spattered bathroom about 20 minutes after Flight 35 from Newark, N.J., landed at San Francisco International Airport on Wednesday, authorities said.

"The cleaning crew heard the baby crying, and that was what led them to the baby," said Rob Doughty, an airline spokesman in Chicago.

Minutes earlier, the mother had disappeared among the 252 other passengers who had disembarked after the non-stop flight. The baby apparently had been born five hours earlier, before the plane took off, Dow said.

"She had the baby and she stuffed it under the sink. That's attempted murder," Dow said.

The baby was listed in good condition at Mills Memorial Hospital in San Mateo, where nurses named the 8-pound, 9-ounce girl Elizabeth.



Judge threatens lawyer with jail for using 'Ms.'

PITTSBURGH (AP) — A federal judge apologized Thursday to an attorney he had scolded and threatened with jail when she insisted on using her maiden name and the courtesy title "Ms." in court.

"I have always referred to married women by their married name. This is the way my generation was taught," said Senior U.S. District Judge Hubert Tittelbaum, 73.

"I recognize your right to be addressed in any manner in which you see fit, and I apologize for my comments and the resulting situation," the judge told Barbara Wolovitz and three other attorneys involved in the trial of a race discrimination suit against PPG Industries Inc.

On July 8, Tittelbaum told Ms. Wolovitz, whose husband is University of Pittsburgh law professor Jules Label. "From here

on, in this courtroom you will use Mrs. Label. That's your name."

The judge originally threatened her with jail when she resisted his instruction, and when her co-counsel, Joji Pushinsky, protested—Tittelbaum found him in contempt for "obnoxious intermeddling"—and gave him a suspended 30-day jail sentence.

Ms. Wolovitz, representing two black men suing PPG, moved Monday for a mistrial, which Tittelbaum rejected. When she again stated her preference, he said: "What if I call you sweetie?" The judge said he would settle for calling her "counselor." He also vacated his contempt order for Pushinsky.

The jury began deliberations Wednesday afternoon and was still out when the judge made his apology, which was officially entered into court records.

Lesson aids girls in fire rescue

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (AP) — Two teen-age girls rescued an 87-year-old man from his burning house, and said they remembered from a junior high school lesson what to do.

Shontier McDaniels and Wanda Boone, both 15, were walking Wednesday night with another friend, Chevon Moore, also 15, when they noticed flames in the home of Josh Williams.

Williams said he was watching television in his bedroom when he felt heat behind him. He said he unsuccessfully tried to douse the blaze with water from his kitchen.

Miss Moore went for help while Miss McDaniels and Miss Boone, both students at McIntyre Junior High School, went to the house.

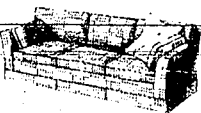

Police identify jailed suspect as Heber LeBaron

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) — A man wanted for questioning in four slayings in Texas and one in Utah sat in the Maricopa County Jail for 12 days after he was booked under an assumed name before detectives learned who he was, officials say.

Sgt. Andy Anderson, a police spokesman, said late Wednesday that Heber LeBaron, 27, was identified from fingerprints forwarded to the department by Houston police detectives.

LeBaron, who was booked under the name Henry Givens, and four companions were arrested July 1 after they were stopped on a road near Interstate 17 in a stolen vehicle, Anderson said.

LeBaron is the son of the late Ervil LeBaron, whose Church of the Lamb of God is linked to slayings from Utah to Mexico.

If found to be the work of LeBaron followers, the four deaths in Texas last June 27 would bring to 18 the number of the polygamist patriarch's former disciples who have died or disappeared in the last 22 years.

The senior LeBaron, 56, died in 1981 of a heart attack at the Utah State Prison. He had been sentenced to a life term for masterminding the 1977 gun-shot slaying of Murray, Utah, naturalist Ron Allred, a rival polygamist.

Although he has not been charged in the Texas deaths, Heber LeBaron wanted for questioning in the execution-style slayings of three people, including an 8-year-old girl, in Houston and one similar shooting the same day in a Dallas suburb.

And Sanpete County Sheriff Chuck Ramsey and Utah Bureau of Criminal Identification investigator Steve Vojtecky flew to Phoenix to question LeBaron and the others in the slaying last October of Colorado polygamist leader Daniel Ben Jordan.

Anderson said police determined through fingerprints that the man booked as Joseph Michaels, 24, was Doug Barlow, 26.

The others arrested gave the names of Lawrence Melton, 18; Christina Adams, 22, and Melanie Martin, 22, Anderson

said. He said investigators were working to determine if those were their true identities.

LeBaron, Barlow and Ms. Martin were charged with illegally conducting an enterprise, a Maricopa County jail records supervisor said. She said LeBaron and Michaels were being held in lieu of \$13,700 bond, with Ms. Martin held under a \$3,425 bond.

The spokeswoman said Ms. Adams and Melton were not listed in jail records, but Anderson said they were in custody.

Barlow and Ms. Martin face a preliminary hearing in Phoenix Justice Court on Friday, while LeBaron's appearance date is Monday, the supervisor said.

Anderson said the five were booked for investigation of auto theft after it was discovered they were riding in a vehicle stolen in Texas.

"In the meantime, some of our investigators are in contact with some investigators from Houston, and they were sharing information and they were able to send us some information and

the fingerprints we used to make a positive identification," Anderson said.

In the Houston shootings, Duanne Chynoweth, 31, and his daughter, Jennifer, 8, were shot to death as they sat in a pickup truck parked outside a vacant house in Houston, and about the same time, Chynoweth's brother, Mark, 36, was slain at an appliance business a few miles away.

Turner said, Mark Chynoweth was LeBaron's son-in-law.

In Irving, Eddie Murston, 32, one of LeBaron's stepsons, was found shot to death the same day.

LeBaron's Church of the Lamb of God is one of many groups that advocate a return to polygamy, once practiced by The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints but banned in 1890.

Although the Utah-based church now excommunicates those who advocate or practice polygamy, authorities estimate that 20,000 to 30,000 people live in a religion-based polygamist lifestyle in Utah and neighboring states.

Ervil LeBaron's daughter, Lillian Chynoweth, has said her father targeted

a number of people for death for departing from the faith.

Those who have died or vanished since 1966 have included LeBaron followers, brothers, nephews, wives, critics and rivals.

Jordan, who had split with the LeBaron group and moved his family to Colorado, was shot to death in a deer-hunting camp in central Utah.

Aron LeBaron was questioned but never charged in that killing. However, he was arrested for menacing Jordan's family, with which he had lived for two months. The charge was later dropped.

At the heart of the ongoing struggle may be fundamentalist belief that God will send "one-mighty and strong" to reform the Mormon Church.

LeBaron and Jordan both claimed that calling, as did Leo Evoniuk, who founded his own church after LeBaron's death and vanished from Santa Cruz, Calif., in May 1987. Police found blood and a partial denture, but Evoniuk's body never has been found.

Computer sketching aids police

BOISE (AP) — The Nampa Police Department had no motive or weapon in connection with the June 5 killings of Eugene and Shirley Morey — just witnesses and evidence collected from the dirt lot where they were shot to death.

They were able to overcome those problems, thanks to the Idaho Bureau of Investigation's new computerized sketching program.

A sketch generated by Compusketch was being broadcast over Boise-area television stations by the end of the next day.

"We needed something in a hurry," Nampa Police Chief Marshall Brisbin said.

With the help of Compusketch, Don Hebert, a senior investigator with the bureau, created the image that led to the arrest of David Leslie Card, who is accused of the killings.

The computer program is one of 60 being used to generate images of crime suspects across the country.

The \$7,500 program works best when investigators have good witnesses. They are asked multiple-choice questions describing the suspect, including details of facial structure and characteristics.

"The first series of questions is just to get the witness thinking about who they are describing," Hebert said.

After more detailed questions are answered, the computer uses the information to generate a composite.

Witnesses also are asked to give more details, like height and weight, to eliminate people with only facial similarities to a suspect.

The images that can be generated by the program are limited only by the operator's ability to communicate with a witness, Hebert said.

"Our major concern is not what they don't remember," Hebert said, "but what they do remember."

He said features like a large nose, certain hairstyle or a distinct scar can be a key in generating a sketch people will recognize.

Before acquiring the new program, the Bureau of Investigation used a set of cut-outs and overlays, which included various noses, ears, cheeks and lips, to compile a picture of a suspect.

For the past few weeks, Hebert has traveled across Idaho to acquaint law enforcement officials with the program.

Fire conditions unusually severe

Dry conditions leading to fires in Wyoming's Bridger-Teton National Forest and national forests across the West are the result of unique conditions that rarely occur, a forest official said Thursday.

Fred Kingwill, public information officer for the Bridger-Teton, said the conditions that have allowed a fire to spread to 1,000 acres inside the Teton Wilderness Area have not been witnessed in 150-200 years.

"The fire and others burning in the West are the result of unique conditions that have not been seen for some time," Kingwill said. "Everyone should realize that years of moderate drought have brought about conditions in national forests that only occur infrequently over many, many years."

"We have some conditions now that are really ripe for major burns in areas where we have not had much of a problem in the past. We are at a period of time where you can see the kind of big burns that created this area so many years ago."

Because the "Mink Lake" fire, burning in a 15,000-acre blow-down believed to contain about 100 million board feet of dry timber, is within a wilderness area, officials will allow it to burn unless it threatens areas of the forest with special values, such as recreational areas, Kingwill said.

"As a result, the fire could get quite large, he said.

"We may see a massive, massive fire before the snows come to melt it out if we allow it to burn unless it burns," he said. "It has the potential to be several thousand acres in size."

But Kingwill added the same type of large fire created the

wilderness area in the first place by ridding the area of old, diseased trees and allowing new growth.

"The reason we have trees here is they were burned back 150 to 200 years ago," he said.

"These conditions only occur every so often. This is certainly among the most natural and powerful processes that are occurring."

Alleged discrimination draws federal attention

BOISE (AP) — U.S. Justice Department officials traveled to Caldwell this week to help resolve allegations of discrimination against Hispanics holding concerts in the Canyon County town.

Representatives of the Justice Department's Community Relations Service from Seattle interviewed city officials and Hispanics Tuesday regarding restrictions placed on the city-operated Caldwell Events Center.

Last month, Mayor Pete Cowles said permission for several concerts planned by entertainment consultant Roman Reyna would be reviewed on a case-by-case basis. Liability insurance and security arrangements were to be approved for each event.

That came shortly after a June 12 disturbance at the Multi-Purpose Center, a private facility in Caldwell. When a Hispanic band failed to appear for a concert by another promoter, 30 police officers were called to the scene and three arrests made.

Four days later, Cowles said:

"I don't think 20,000 taxpayers should have to pick up the tab every time there's a Hispanic dance in town. These people have to demonstrate to me that they're responsible. So far, they haven't done that."

Some Hispanics, upset by the comments, called the Community Relations Service to help resolve the dispute.

Acting Mayor Jack Raymond said talks with the service had turned out well.

"One issue we talked about was the public perception by some members of the community that there's different treatment for different people," he said. "I don't think that to be true."

He acknowledged Cowles had used a poor choice of words.

Reyna said there have been no problems at the three concerts he put on this year.

Falling tree kills logger

EMMETT, Idaho (AP) — A logger has died when a 150-foot fir tree he was cutting down crushed him, Gem County authorities said.

Lloyd Shawver, 34, died about 30 miles north of Ola Wednesday, Gem County Sheriff Bill McConnell said.

Shawver was using a chainsaw to cut down the tree about 7:30 a.m. As the tree was falling, it hit a snag and fell in the opposite direction.

"He had no way to get away," McConnell said. "He didn't know what hit him."

Shawver, who worked for Carlock Logging, was discovered by one of the crew bosses.

My biggest goal is to make the Olympic team, go to Seoul and win the gold medal," she said. "My dream last year was to win the gold medal at the World Championships, and I did that."

If she wins, it would make up for her disappointment four years ago when a hamstring injury and inexperience combined to cost her the title by five points.

Slaney has dreamed of an Olympic medal since 1972, when she began competing on a world-class level at 13. She was too young to participate in the Trials that year, missed the 1978 Trials because of injury, was denied an opportunity to compete in the 1980 Olympics because of the U.S.-led boycott of the Moscow Games, and was

upended by her celebrated collision with Britain's Zala Budd during the 3,000 final in the '84 Games.

After missing the past two seasons for the birth of her daughter in 1986 and because of Achilles tendon surgery in 1987, Slaney will now suffer for her race this year. She is confident of finally breaking her Olympic jinx.

"If I get to the Olympics healthy, I think I will be able to run well," she says. "I feel as physically fit as I've ever been."

The 32-year-old Moses, 1976 and 1984 Olympic 400 hurdles champion, will have to ward off challenges from Danny Harris, who ended his 122-race winning streak last year, Andre Phillips, ranked No. 1 in the world in 1985 and 1986, and two-time NCAA champion Kevin Young of UCLA.

Adams didn't learn of his fate until Hull disclosed it at news conference. Adams and his lawyer, Robert Turman of Colorado Springs, Colo., stood behind about 20 sportswriters, listening to Hull.

Hull said the federation's appeals committee agonized over the Adams issue. A key element in the appeal decision was a federation rule, Hull said, requiring all members who participate in boxing events to be members in good standing.

"In effect, since we had suspended Adams, he retroactively eliminated him from the position," he said.

The seven-member committee voted by a substantial majority, he said, to deny Adams appeal.

After Hull left, Turman, Adams' lawyer, told reporters he had not been permitted to submit a sworn affidavit taken from the only disinterested bystander to the May 12 incident in which Adams was accused of choking Amateur Boxing Federation controller Kerstan Dahl.

"We felt the committee would overturn the suspension if they were presented with this new testimony, but they wouldn't consider it," Turman said.

Turman wouldn't disclose what was in the affidavit or from whom it was taken.

'Last Temptation of Christ' makes favorable impression on the clergy

NEW YORK - Director Martin Scorsese gave some liberal, mainline Christians the first look at his controversial, all-but-finished film "The Last Temptation of Christ," and most came away favorably impressed.

"Overall, I had a very, very positive reaction. I saw nothing blasphemous in it," said Episcopal Bishop Paul Moore of New York. Like others interviewed, Moore accepted the reminder by Scorsese in his brief remarks at the secrecy-shrouded screening that the movie is based on the novel by Nikos Kazantzakis, not on the Gospels. Nevertheless, some said the film powerfully stated the human struggle of Jesus, which has a biblical basis and could stimulate fruitful discussion in churches.

The 30 to 40 Protestant and Catholic officials who accepted the invitation to the Tuesday screening expressed only personal and preliminary opinions, pending the announced Sept. 23 release of the film by Universal Pictures.

But if first impressions are indicative, Universal should have some ammunition to combat protests and threatened boycotts of the

film from conservative Christians, principally fundamentalist Protestants. Fundamentalists have based their opposition on early versions of the movie script - which, it turns out, differ from the movie - at least in one love-making scene.

Picketers - eight Catholics carrying cardboard crosses inscribed "Universal Crucifies Christ" - found the hotel-gathering point for people invited to the screening.

But the actual screening site was undisclosed even to the invites until shortly before vans whisked them off to a theater on 23rd Street. Nor were they told why Universal was giving them the sneak preview, but the invitation list was a tip-off: It included representatives from Fundamentalists Anonymous and clergy officials of People for the American Way, two organizations critical of the religious right; and a liberal American Baptist pastor from Evanston, Ill., who had phoned Universal to side with them against fundamentalist objections.

The film was 2 hours and 38 minutes long, about the length Scorsese said it would be in its completed version. Several religious officials thought it could stand shortening.

"It was a long, demanding film," said poet-critic Daniel Berrigan, who was a consul-

tant to and had a small part in the film "The Mission." Noting that Scorsese spent years thinking about how to translate the novel to the screen, Berrigan said the least he could do was to "think about it a few days" before commenting.

Andrea Cano, communications officer for the U.S. office for the World Council of Churches, said she personally "perceived this as an art film, not a religious film." Yet, Cano said she thought it could be useful in church settings as a videocassette accompaniment by a study guide.

Evangelicals have objected to a scene, described in at least one surreptitiously circulated version of the script by Paul Schrader, where Jesus dreams he is making love to Mary Magdalene and praises her with the words, "Good sleeps between your legs." No one could remember that being said in the film, nor did Jesus agree to comply with his guardian angel's request to watch him making love, dialogue found in the script.

No one who was interviewed termed the movie blasphemous. Most of us don't know how to spell the word, quipped one invitee, explaining that liberal Christians tend to be more tolerant of ambiguities in biblical inter-

'Bitterroot Marathon' isn't just for runners

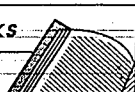
Never has the old adage "you can't tell a book by its cover" been more true. "The Bitterroot Marathon" is an acceptable title, but the cover photo leads you to believe that the book is a runner's manual. Nothing could be further from the truth.

Once inside, this book becomes a tale of robbery, deceit, survival, starvation and even cannibalism. I liked it.

The story does involve the running of a Montana marathon, but that is completed in the first third of the book and seems almost incidental. The plot revolves around three friends and

their newfound female acquaintance. All are marathon runners who plan and pull a supermarket robbery in Hamilton, Mont. and attempt a getaway on foot across the Selway-Bitterroot Wilderness to Lowell, Idaho where they have left their car.

Their motive for the robbery is to get enough money to pursue their college careers, since the summer jobs they had at a Glacier National Park lodge left them short of funds for the fall semester.

The reason for the getaway on foot is that there is only one road into the valley and one road out, and of course there would be roadblocks on both ends. But the robbers figured that they could make a clean escape by going

cross-country through the wilderness, where no one would expect them to have gone.

The perfect crime? It may have worked very nicely, but for the time of year (late September), I'm not sure why the robbers thought they could take off through the wilderness in late September and not encounter adverse weather. Still, the book is generally well-written.

Some of the dialogue seems a little forced, but the characters in the book are given adequate development to let you empathize with some of their more unusual behavior, yet at times you wonder what could make anyone do some of the things these people try.

The book begins with the sheriff getting news of the robbery. The authors then take you back to find out why and how the robbery came about. During the book we look in on the sheriff a couple of times to see how the investigation is proceeding. But even though the sheriff seems a likable sort and one that you would like to see succeed, you find yourself cheering for the fugitives to make good their escape.

The authors, Morton L. Arkava and John E. Russell, have co-authored other non-fiction books, and have wilderness experience and running experience. The publisher is Wilderness Adventure Books of Fowlerville, Mich.

One nit-picking error I found in the book - which could be attributed to the publishing

house being in Michigan and the authors being from Montana - is that they referred to Lewiston, Idaho as "Lewistown."

Look for "The Bitterroot Marathon," but don't expect it to look like an exciting novel. And remember, despite its cover, an exciting, chilling and intriguing novel is exactly what you'll be getting.

Lucas, Spielberg find some new tricks with rabbits

There has never been anything quite like it on the screen. "Who Framed Roger Rabbit" is a true Frank Capra combination. Other films have included segments in which live actors have worked with cartoon characters, but none as realistic as this.

The new film is a technological marvel. It also has plot, action, humor and, above all, Kathleen Turner doing the voice for Roger's wife, Jessica Rabbit, who is suspected of having helped frame her innocent husband.

Turner did not want billing, so she gets none, but the voice is unmistakably hers, and it and the figure for whom she speaks make an irresistible combination.

"Who Framed Roger Rabbit" was three years in the making. That is what the studio releases say, and you can believe that. A lot of time, energy and talent have gone into this film. It runs 103 minutes, and 55 minutes of that includes the cartoon.

Sometimes, the movie is all animation. That's how it begins.



with a cartoon that is just a little madder than the maddest "Tom and Jerry" cartoon. When it is finished, one of the lead characters, a cigar-smoking bawd, begins behaving like a spoiled movie star. He has done too many takes, he is exhausted, and he is irritated with Roger, who has ruined a take.

Sometimes you lose track of what is going on here. Sometimes it is difficult to remember that you are watching cartoon characters working in harmony with real actors, but this is part of the charm of this film, one that gives you laugh after laugh.

The special effects were done at Industrial Light and Magic, the Lucasfilm division, and any time the Lucas company has something to do with film, you know

we are in for a zap climax, footage here in which the principals turn each other into tree stumps and fire hydrants.

Actually, all this is quite acceptable in this instance. This is, after all, a cartoon, and the finish works very well within this framework.

The plot of "Who Framed Roger Rabbit" has Eddie Valiant, an alcoholic detective, look for the people who have made it look as though Roger has committed murder. The victim is the man who owns a Toontown novelty company, and because Jessica is thought to have been involved with him, Roger is the likeliest of suspects.

It is not easy to keep track of the plot, but this is no real drawback. There is so much happening that you hardly have need for a plot.

The film, for instance, takes place in 1947, and when Valiant reports to the Maroon Studios where the "Baby Herman" cartoons are made, we see characters from Walt Disney's "Fantasia." Alligators and hippopotamuses are running about, getting

ready to appear on camera. We also see Dumbo, who appears at the window of a studio executive. All he wants is a peanut. He gets that, and we get the laugh.

There are other cartoon characters. In fact, the film includes almost every cartoon figure known to the movie industry. Visible, here and there, are Bugs Bunny, Woody the Woodpecker, Porky Pig, Betty Boop, Snow White, "Trinker" Bill, Mickey Mouse and Pluto. Trinker Bill was yet to appear on the screen in 1947, but who is going to object?

"Who Framed Roger Rabbit" is a movie you may want to see twice. There is too much to absorb in just one sitting. The film is so busy and so rich that one screening may not suffice.

Christopher Lloyd is the evil Judge Doom, who has his greedy eyes on Toontown, Charles Fleischer does the voice for Roger Rabbit, Study Kaye is the owner of a novelty factory, and Joanna Cassidy is Valiant's girlfriend, a burlesque with a heart of gold and a mouth of brass.

Steven Spielberg is one of the executive producers of "Who Framed Roger Rabbit." The other producers are aware that Spiel-

berg and George Lucas are currently experiencing professional backlash that can happen when a person becomes too successful in this business, so they are making it clear that neither had that much to do with this film. They insist that it belongs to Zemeckis and to the hundreds of artists who gathered in London, where this film was made.

Jessica, by the way, is a singer at the Ink and Paint Club, a night spot in which Toon cartoon characters serve human patrons. Jessica sings "Why Don't You Do Right?" and when she does, the voice is that of Amy Irving, Mrs.

Who Framed Roger Rabbit" has a PG rating, meaning some of the violence is suggestive and some of the violence, though cartoon, may frighten very small children. In one scene, Judge Doom immerses one of the Toon characters in a poisonous dip, something the producers feel was necessary to establish the fact that Doom is a really evil guy, they say.

"Who Framed Roger Rabbit" reinforces the notion that when it comes to movie-making, there is always a new way to pull a rabbit out of a hat.

Eastwood saves 'Dead Pool' with the power of his squint

HOLLYWOOD - Nobody squints like Clint Eastwood, and in "The Dead Pool," fifth of the Eastwood "Dirty Harry" series, our man once again squints up a storm.

Harry squints threateningly at another out-gunned gang of restaurant robbers. He squints bitterly at his pompous San Francisco Police Department superior. He squints seductively at another liberated Ms. With peckaboo blonde bangs, not Sandra Locke, but Patricia Clarkson as an inquisitive TV reporter.

He squints meanly at the Mafia torpedoes on his tail, and sympathetically at his Asian-American partner Quan (Korean actor Evan Kim) - even when Quan tells horrible jokes. He squints suspiciously at his main suspect, horror-movie director Peter Swan (Liam Neeson), and he squints in disbelief at the gruesome welter of serial killings - and psychopathology dumped outlandishly on his caseload.

Descending gingerly into another backlit cesspool of urban slime, slam-banging cars, quiche-eating liberals and 44 magnum sexual kits, Harry once again emerges bitterly and squintingly triumphant.

So does Eastwood. The voice may be more gravely, the hair receding and dustier, and he may be stretching the bounds of belief to imagine him, at 57, ducking hot lead in a glass elevator, harpooning psychos and wasting handits with the elan of a farm boy bopping milk bottles at the county fair. But Eastwood's charisma remains rock-solid, smoky-soft. His mixture of coiled tension, brutal wisecracks, incongruously sweet gallantry, preternatural wariness and wry whispering irony is still in force.

The movie is something else again. Along with the 1976 "Enforcer," "The Dead Pool" is among the weakest of the entire "Dirty Harry" series. With its stylized story line and almost styleless direction, it sometimes resembles a juggling act with sledg-hammers.

In the movie, cult director Swan - a sub-We Craven, mini-George Romero goremeister, who runs a betting pool predicting celebrity deaths, or may be committing them himself. All the people in his pool bets are dying off, and the last person on the list is Harry himself. At bottom, this movie is

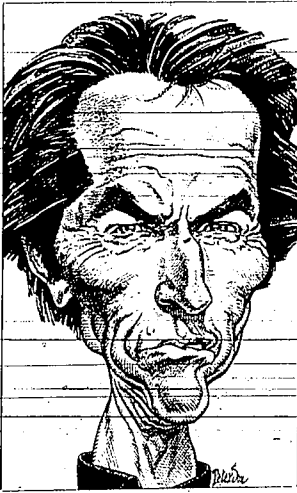
an action fable laid over a long, flip commentary on media responsibility. Does Swan stimulate his audiences to pathology and violence? Does TV journalism encourage crime by sensationalizing its coverage? Harry tips the message: He wants nothing to do with his own department-sponsored media hype, but he lends a chivalrous hand to winsome TV reporter Clarkson.

But, though Eastwood's acting suggests a moral center, the story has little. It often bends into the usual young-screenwriter pirouette of TV gags. Because the murder victims include a heavy-metal rocker, a TV talk-show host and a female movie critic, writer Steve Sharon almost seems to be taking his own revenge against MTV. Phil Donahue and movie reviewers in general ("I give this murder an 8," Quan comments over a bloody corpse, a joke that elevates the film). Typically, Sharon indicts horror fans instead of the director - and TV journalists more than society - another example of killing the bad-news bearer.

This script, shallow as it is, might have worked if the movie had the panache and dynamism of Don Siegel's 1971 original or Eastwood's own "Sudden Impact." But Eastwood - for mysterious, possibly economic reasons - has not worked with a first-rate established director, other than himself, since Siegel's "Escape From Alcatraz" in 1979. He does not hire his action-movie peers or bring back the legendary older directors or spend much time seeking out younger talents, like John Milius or Michael Cimino. "Dead Pool" director Buddy Van Horn, like "The Enforcer's" James Fargo, is another old Malpaiso teammate, elevated, not too happily, to the main chair.

Van Horn was the second-unit action director on most of Eastwood's movies since 1968's "Cannon's Bluff" - a good recommendation. But his non-action scenes here, as in his previous "Any Which Way You Can," lack zest and depth. "The Dead Pool" (MPAA-rated R for language and violence) is snazzier than "Which Way," with film noir lighting by Jack Green in the Bruce Stricker manner. But Van Horn's groupings, frames and pacing are often mechanical, dead as the pool. This movie does not really breathe, and unlike the ones Eastwood directs himself, its rhythm seems off.

Paradoxically, it is only in the second-unit scenes - namely here of the "Bullitt" hilltop chase, with a toy car in deadly pursuit, is "Dead Pool's" humorous high point. Other than that, you are left with a string of brutal zaps and zingers.

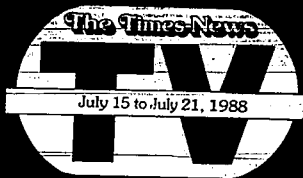

Dan Rather enjoys instructor role in convention 'crash civics lesson'

"It's a once-every-four years crash civics lesson," says CBS News anchor Dan Rather of the Democratic National Convention, which will air in prime time on all three networks this Monday through Thursday, July 18 through July 21. "It's part of the dance of democracy. And it's always a terrific story."

The convention, he might add, is also a once-every-four-years World Cup of television news. As the three-network news divisions cover the same event — or non-event, as this convention could turn out to be — it isn't difficult to tell the difference between high-class and low-class, high ratings and low ratings.

But Rather, relaxing after the evening news, emphasizes the presidential race, not the ratings race. Asked what he expects the major stories to be, he assumes the role of political analyst. It is a civics lesson, and he — not Walter Cronkite, not Bill Moyers, not Charles Kuralt — is the instructor.

"One is, does anyone make a big mistake?" he says. "This election looks to be wide open, and in that kind of environment, a big mistake can be decisive — if the nominee says something that leaves him vulnerable, or the nominee does not say something at a crucial time that leaves him vulnerable."

"Another is, what kind of party do they throw? The conventions are the parties' parties, if you understand my meaning. The party's behavior, its posture at the convention, sketches its outline for the nation. If the public

senses that one party's party is a little too slick, a little too scripted, a little too pat, it will hurt the party later on. On the other hand, if chaos and confusion reign...."

— Though it seems odd to think of him as an elder statesman, Rather, 57, first covered a convention in 1956, when Michael Dukakis was a student at Harvard Law and Jesse Jackson was still in high school. By now he commands more attention than even the most prominent delegates — which reveals less about the decline of Democratic Party politics than it does about the ascent of TV news.

"Fame, doubtless, makes it hard for Rather to get the inside story.

"In some ways it does," he admits. "But I've found that for every way it impedes me, there's another way it opens doors, gets people to take my calls."

This year, more than ever, the print media has carped about the deleterious effects of television on politics. But Rather points out that TV began to influence the convention process almost as soon as it was invented.

"Over the years, television has

changed the nature of what goes on," he says. "In 1956 and 1960, you still had a lot of back-room wheeling and dealing among the delegates. The old smoke-filled room was still a reality. But once we got the equipment to go into those rooms, the delegates stopped doing it."

The changes haven't always come so gracefully. "The 1964 convention was the first time we used wireless microphones," Rather recalls. "I remember the late (longtime ABC correspondent) Frank Reynolds, a man of great dignity, wearing a mike that looked like nothing so much as a helicopter beanie. Some of the other outfits looked like space suits at an early stage. The equipment of TV news was making great advances at that time — but frankly we all looked ridiculous."

ON THE COVER Dan Rather will be anchoring CBS coverage of the Democratic National Convention, which opens Monday, July 18, and closes Thursday, July 21.

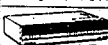

'The Young and the Restless' devotes summer to AIDS storyline

Summertime on the world of soaps, where the living is easy, usually caters to the younger set and their traumas.

To be different, "The Young and the Restless," while acknowledging teenagers during the dog days of summer, devotes its red-hot storyline to a serious consideration of AIDS. Cricket's mother, Jessica, fiancée of tycoon John Abbott, turns out to be an AIDS victim slowly recovering from pneumonia. Which means her AIDS secret is finally out in the open.

The storyline carries a message: compassion. And that doesn't come easily. Can Cricket stand by her mother after learning that mom was once a prostitute? Can patriarch John Abbott, a lucky man in one sense — he and Jessica never went to bed — be strong enough to stick by his latest love regardless of her situation?

Stick around. Compassion isn't going to flower overnight on "Young and Restless." There will be the outraged citizens who consider the disease the wrath of God and who will claim that Jessica deserves punishment for her illicit past. Fear won't disappear in a flash in Genoa City.

Played by lovely, blonde Rebecca Street, a Washington, D.C., stage actress, AIDS victim Jessica must be brave and forgiving while focusing on each day as if it were her last. How long Jessica will last is up to producer Bill Bell and the writers. The conventional wisdom assumes that Jessica will be around at least until Thanksgiving. That's time enough to educate soap characters and viewers about the need for compassion for victims of the fearful, incurable disease. In other words, producer Bell and actress Street are blending entertainment with education. And we must get educated in a hurry.

This assignment is right down Rebecca Street's alley. When she auditioned last fall, nobody mentioned AIDS. But since Jessica was a woman with a disreputable past and was recovering from a serious illness, the actress put two and two together and

guessed that her character would be the show's first AIDS victim. The fact that Rebecca happened to be a member of a Santa Monica church support group for AIDS patients didn't hurt.

A teacher in Washington, D.C., before marrying and having two children, Rebecca decided at age 30 to try acting. She received her training at the illustrious Arena Theatre. "I felt gifted in acting," says Rebecca. "It's like flying to me." Helping others was also a credo, but that fell by the wayside during her move to Hollywood, where she looked for jobs and raised two youngsters by herself.

Rebecca felt useful and fulfilled once again after joining the church support group last year. By reaching out to victims who are savoring the last precious moments of life, Jessica is learning to be aware and appreciative.

"I can't think of a better place than a soap to ease fears about AIDS and to teach compassion," she says. "I'm a very lucky woman."

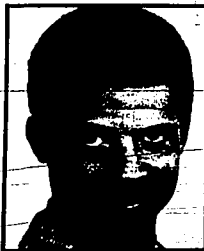



Striking writers OK interim contract; long-term effect on dispute unclear

The membership of the striking Writers Guild of America has voted overwhelmingly to ratify an interim contract that will be offered to any TV or movie producers who wish to sign it.

In the late Wednesday balloting, which was not tabulated until Thursday afternoon, some 88.5 percent (or 1,652) of 1,866 Guild members who voted on the West and East Coast elected to ratify the new contracts, while 11.5 percent (or 214) voted against.

The new "interim" contracts being offered reflect agreements already reached in otherwise-stalled negotiations over the last 18 weeks between the Guild and the Alliance of Motion Picture and Television Producers and the three networks. In the unresolved areas still in dispute with the Alliance — such as residuals for one-hour TV shows — the contractual provisions will be based on the final agreement reached with the Alliance and the networks.

Before Wednesday's vote, some 124 independent companies had signed contracts with the Guild. With the new contract approval, they can replace those contracts with the new interim agreements, too.

The Guild announced Thursday that 14 companies had already accepted the new interim contracts, raising the total of independent producers who have signed with the union to 138. The Alliance, however, represents the major studios as well as the networks, none of which have buckled during the strike of 9,600 writers that began March 7.

Precisely what effect Wednesday's vote will have toward a settlement of the strike, which has already created a serious delay in next fall's TV schedule planning, could not be determined Thursday.

But the vote did draw statements from all three networks and seemed to hint, for the first time, at a major split between strongly positioned NBC and its two rivals, CBS and ABC.

NBC has already announced plans to air new shows this fall from the in-

dependent producers of "The Cosby Show," "A Different World," "ALF" and "Highway to Heaven," each of which had signed earlier agreements with the Guild.

But both CBS and ABC, relying on studios still standing firm with the Alliance, Thursday said flatly they wouldn't deal with independent producers who sign with the Guild.

CBS' statement said, in part, that "CBS completely supports the industry position in its dealings with the Writers Guild. We do not believe it is in the best interest of any producer to sign the interim agreement the WGA is offering. In support of that position, we will not enter into new agreements for product produced under the interim WGA agreement, we believe acceptance of the WGA interim agreement will prolong this strike to the disadvantage of all."

ABC Entertainment president Brandon Stoddard issued a statement saying, in part, "we want the television production community to know that we will not enter into new agreements for new programs with those independent producers who could offer programs by signing the Interim Agreement being offered by the WGA."

"We strongly believe that the economic issues remaining in this labor dispute with the WGA are directly related to the long-term viability of the television industry. We feel that independent production companies tempted to sign the interim agreement, in fact, would be prolonging the strike and contributing to further industry uncertainty without gaining any real advantage."

But NBC, in its statement, backed off from criticism of the contract vote, saying only that "NBC's greatest hope is that this lengthy strike comes to a swift settlement and the writers go back to work. We don't feel we're in a position to give economic or business advice on a series of complex issues. We are taking whatever steps are necessary to keep NBC programming original and on the air."

After the vote, Moma Mungan, executive director of Writers Guild East, said, "The offering of an interim contract is a major step by the Guild to put our industry back to work. Individual companies that sign the pact

can return to work immediately, without waiting for the Alliance and networks to come to a final agreement. We hope the Alliance and networks will now also take constructive steps to end this strike."

ABC News in Washington has promoted Dan Noyes to general assignment correspondent. A former producer on "World News This Morning," he most recently was off-air reporter for ABC covering the Bob Dole presidential campaign.

Also at ABC, Kathy O'Hearn, deputy bureau chief in L.A., has been named senior producer for "World News Tonight," replacing Pat Roddy, who is now executive producer of the program.

He probably didn't notice, but the Soviet Union's top military officer, visiting Washington this week, got bumped from ABC's "Good Morning America" Thursday morning — which is what happens to news priorities on network TV when an entertainment division is in charge.

Marshal Sergei S. Akhromeyev, chief of the Soviet General Staff, had granted an interview to Charlie Gibson, co-anchor of ABC's "Good Morning America" Wednesday — billed by GMA as "exclusive" — which was to be shown Thursday morning on GMA.

ABC Entertainment chose to bump the Marshal's appearance when late-breaking news on the oil rig tragedy in the North Sea cut into the program's schedule of showbiz guests (hey gang, we've got to make room for Joey Deel!).

A spokeswoman for GMA said Thursday they'll try again Friday morning to air the Soviet visitor's interview — at 7:17 a.m.

The staff of "USA Today: The Television Show" will start daily rehearsals on Monday, Aug. 15, in their posh Gannett Tower digs in Rosslyn, Va., as the Sept. 12 debut of the syndicated show draws nigher (or more nigh, perhaps?).

As of Thursday, the TV version of the national newspaper of the same name has been bought by 150 stations — all but one of them, a Gannett-owned UHF in Boston — a network affiliate.

CBS makes major changes in top management positions

NEW YORK (AP) — CBS Inc. announced major management changes Wednesday, naming an executive from ABC as the president of CBS News, and making news division chief Howard Stringer president of the CBS Broadcast Group.

Stringer replaces Gene F. Jankowski, who will become chairman of the broadcast group. Succeeding Stringer will be David Burke, an executive vice president at ABC News for the last two years.

The changes take effect Aug. 1. CBS broadcast division has struggled during the past season, with its entertainment schedule lagging in third place behind NBC and ABC for the first time ever. The "CBS Evening News" has been No. 1 among the three major networks' nightly news program in recent weeks after trailing ABC during the second quarter of the year.

William S. Paley, chairman of the CBS board of directors, and Laurence A. Tisch, the company's president and chief executive officer, announced the changes at a news conference.

Stringer has been with CBS for 23

years, the last 22 months as president of CBS News. Jankowski has served 11 years as president of the CBS Broadcast Group.

It was Stringer who steered the beleaguered news division through the controversial and highly publicized layoffs and budget cuts that prompted even CBS notables such as anchor Dan Rather to criticize network management.

Despite the cutbacks, the division under Stringer managed to launch a new news show, "48 Hours," and, with a little help from the Writers Guild strike prompting the need for prime-time programming not subject to its delays, kept three prime-time news hours on the fall schedule, compared to one for ABC and none for NBC.

Jankowski moved up through the CBS sales division to become head of the Broadcast Group, overseeing the finances of the network. During his tenure, CBS' prime-time schedule fell victim to NBC's rise and last year embarrassed the network by placing a miserable third. Kim LeMasters became a mid-season replacement for CBS Entertainment President Bud Grant and will be tested when his first full-season schedule finally gets on the air in 1988-89.
