Fire near Fairfield covers 1,800 acres of brushland

FAIRFIELD - About 175 firefighters

FAIRFIELD — About 175 firefighters battled a slippery blaze Tuesday that swept over 1,800 to 2,250 acres of hilly brushland northeast of Fairfield.

"It's been kind of touch and go for the whole afternoon," said Carlos Mendiola, fire management officer for the Bureau of Land Management's Shoshone District.

BLM and National Forest Service firefighters used-buildozers, airplanes and helicopters to tackle the blaze, which started around 4 p.m. Monday.

The fire escaped control and spread to the northeast Tuesday afternoon, Mendiola said. That section was sealed off around 4.45 p.m., after which firefighters had to run around to the fire's southern and eastern edges to battle newly reported breakouts.

The fire's northern edge surged to within a mile of the Sawtooth National Forest boundary.

Meanwhile, about 20 other firefighters were occupied with a smaller blaze that

started around 3 p.m. in the South Hills south of Twin Falls. Barbara Todd, a public information officer with the Sawtooth National Forest, said the fire had consumed about 20 acres of land by 4.45 p.m.

The larger fire, about 10 miles northeast of Fairfield along Willow Creek, burned land, that is mostly privately owned, Mendiola said, Other patches are owned by the BLM and the state.

Brush covers the hilly terrain, which has no big timber but is dotted by quaking aspens.

Mendiola said the fire's cause is still under investigation.

Two belicopters surveyed the fire area, Two brelicopters surveyed the fire area, the bare of the fire search out of Boise doused the fire's escaping northeastern edges with a fertilizer trardant that coated vegetation, keeping it from catching fire so casily. Later in the afternoon, a second airplane repeated the process on the fire's searcher edges.

The fertilizer has a heavy salt content and deep not evaporate as much as drop-

WASHINGTON — An estimated 240,000 people left the land last year, dropping the nation's firm population to the lowest level since before the Civil War, the government reported Tuesday.
Officials said an average of 4,986,000 people—one out of every 49 Americans—lived on furms in 1987, representing 2 percent of the U.S. population of 243.4 million.

That compared with 5,226,000 farm residents in 1986, which was 2.2 percent of the national population of 241.1 million.

The figures were derived from an annual survey by the Census Bureau, an agency of the Commerce Department, and released jointly with the Agriculture Department. A preliminary report was issued on Feb. 8.
Although the 1987 farm population estimate was down by 240,000 people, the report said that represented "no statistically significant, change" from 1986. The one-year decline would have lifed to have been at least 275,000 for that, the report said. Court OKs Tax Commission ruling

BOISE (AP) — A sharply divided Idaho Supreme Court has backed the state Tax Commission's refusal to allow an eastern Idaho business to offset more recent tax liabilities with earlier tax overpayments.

In a 3-2 decision written by new

In a 3-2 decision written by new Justice Byron Johnson, the high court majority ruled on Tuesday that the commission acted legally when it denied Harman's of Idaho Inc. a 33,500 refund on 1976 and 1977 tax payments but demanded nearly \$6,000 in additional taxes for 1981, 1982 and 1983.

gal technicalities. gal technicalities.
The dispute centered on how the company handled net operating losses for the year's 1978, 1979 and 1980.
The company used the losses as deductions on the 1981, 1982 and 1983

tax returns.

But in August 1984, the Tax Com-mission held that under state law net operating losses had to applied to prior tax years before they could be carried forward to subsequent years.

It recolculated the impact of the net additional taxes for 1981, 1982 and It recalculated the impact of the net 1983. operating losses to determine the Chief Justice Allan Shepard and Justice Stephen Bistine said the majority decision signaled that taxpaysers were fair game to be caught in leclaiming the refund due for the 1976

and 1977 tax years. Harman's maintained the three-year time limit began running again in August 1984 when the Tax Commission made its determination.

Johnson, joined by Justices Robert. Bakes and Robert Huntley, said the case was not a matter of equitable re-coupment of overpoid taxes by Har-man's since it did not involve an attempt by the commission to double tax income from a single transaction as required by judicial guideline.

But Shepard called the reasoning nothing but "legal niceties and gobble-dygook to explain why it (the Tax Commission) need not return the money legitimately due the taxpayer."

Investment tax credit helps Idaho economy turn the corner

"If it ain't broke, don't fix it," goes the old expression and that's what Idahoans have said, in effect, to those who tried to tamper with the state's seconomy by repealing the investment tax credit (ITC).

With unemployment dropping, and tax receipts and business activity rising, Idaho's economy has clearly turned the corner. In fac-tax receipts are up so much that the state is ing a revenue surplus this year of \$11

The ITC is a small, but important part of the overall complex of forces that have resulted in the state's economic turnaround. The Legislature, recognizing this, has consistently refused to do away with the tax credit.

But the Idaho Education Association, the state's teachers' union, helped launch a drive in May to gather signatures to qualify for the November ballot an initiative that would repeal the state's ITC:

The money gained from the repeal, an estimated \$12 million in 1988, would go into the general fund, but be earmarked for education,

particularly for teacher salary increases. Organizers of the drive had until July 8 to turn in the needed 38,743 signatures required to qualify an initiative for the batlot. According to the Idaho Secretary of State's Office, they failed, submitting only 28,311 signatures.

they failed, submitting only 28,31T signitures. Although the repeal drive organizers claimed that if they had had one more week, they could have gotten enough signatures, I doubt it. Their failure is a Clear signal that the majority of Idaho voters support the tax credit. Like most of our legislative leaders, they recognize that the ITG is important for the long-term economic health of the state.

Proponents had attempted to portray the re-peal of the state ITC as simply a small tax in-crease for business-This wear a gross-misropre-sentation of its importance to the state. The investment tax credit is the primary way we have rewarded businesses for investing in the

future of the state.

As a result, repeal would be penny wise and pound foolish. The initial \$12 million annual gain (out of a total state budge of \$580 million) would be dwarfed by the long-term loss in jobs not created, factories and farms not expanded and businesses not relocated to Idaho. The ITC, which allows husinesses womens to deduct a percentage of their purchases of new-equipment and facilities from their state income tax, is an investment by the state in its economic future.

Repeal drive organizers had attempted to portray the ITC as a tax break for big business. It is not. On the contrary, it is an important investment incentive that is used largely by small businesses. Department of Revenue and Taxation figures show that 83 percent of the 3,400 corporations using the rule claimed an investment tax credit of \$1,000 or le

an investment tax credit of \$1,000 or less. An other 15 percent claimed an investment tax credit fo \$10,000 to \$100,000. Only 16 corporations in the whole state claimed a credit of greater than \$100,000.

That's why our state's small-business owners are overwhelmingly in favor of retaining the ITC. A december 1987 pollby the National Federation of Independent Business' dato, the state's biggest small-business association with 7,000 members, found that 85 percent were in flavor of retaining the tax.

We all want the best for our children. We want them to have a good education and a healthy economy where they can find plenty of opportunity.

But repeal of the ITC would move us in just the opposite direction. Entrepreneurs who want to open new businesses and create new jobs should be encouraged. We need to have more incentives for them, not destroy the ones we have.

Earlier polls had shown Dukhkis with more than a 10-point lead over Bush.
A USA Today-Cable News Network survey taken July 6-10 shawed 47 percent for Bush, 44 percent for Dukhkis.

Home construction rebounds slightly from slump in May

The hot, dry weather of June, bad for farming but ideal for home building, also contributed to the uptick. And, mortgage interest rates, which had climbed by three-quarters of a percentage point from post-stock crash lows in early March, eased slightly in June, falling by nearly a quarter of a percentage point. However, interest rates began edging up again in July and most analysts expect the slump in housing, one of the weakest sectors of a growing overall economy, to continue through

Shuttle pressure may have hinted of problems

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — A pressure drop detected in January might have aleried engineers to the small leak that now threatens a long delay in the next space shuttle flight, but there is no conclusive evidence that workers acted improperly, the launch director said Tuesday.

Director Bob Sieck said a pressure check was made on the oxidizer tank in an engine compartment before Christmas, and a second reading was taken about two weeks later.

"There was a pressure drop of about 16 pounds per square inch between the two data points," he said in an interview.

A tiny leak of nitrogen tetroxide gas was detected in an engine compartment of space shuttle Discovery on the launch pad Friday. Engineers have been pur2ling over how to fix the





Sun World has launched a national marketing effort for its seedless watermelons, while Petoseed has provided several growers with seeds and is promoting bybrid seedless varieties, the company developed.

The newer the unit, the more simple the styling, sans all the complicated-looking arrews and valves.

Designed in Italy and manufactured by the world leader in home-heating appliances. the aix-quart Delonghi cooker (\$89) is made of 18-10 stainless steel body and lid with graceful lines. It is one of the few foods recommended by the American Cancer Society, American Diabetes Association and American Diabetes Association. It is also a good source of fiber, with many brainds containing 2 to 3 grams in each serving.

But the very property that allows microwave popcorn to pop — a solid square of oil incrusted with unpopped kernels — is what gives the snack its calories. While three cups of the air-popped treat amount to 91 calories, the same serving of Pillsbury's frozen original microwave popcorn, with its artery-cloging occount oil, has 210 calories. And when consumers graduate, to more exotic flavors, the calories often escalate. For example, Orville. Redenbacher's microwave caramel popcorn contains 240 calories per 2½-cup serving.

Sodium can also put a damper on the wholesome, healthy appeal of microwave popcorn. While a number of companies produce salt-free brands, other innocent-looking boxes like Planters natural-flavored microwave popcorn products.

Some people are fooling themselves when they believe microwave popcorn is healthy, says Esther Marsigia, a Baltimore home economist, who has the content of the same content, who has the content of the content of the same conten

Consumers may disagree about what constitutes a good bag of microwave popcorn, but many of them are drawn to the snack because of its health benefits. It is one of the few foods recommended by the American Cancer Society, American Dental Association and American Diabetes Association. It is also a good source of fiber, with many brands containing 2 to 3 grams in each serving.

But the very property that allows microwave popcorn to pop — a solid square of oil incrusted with unpopped kernels — is what gives the snack its calories. While three cups of the air-popped treat amount to 91 calories, the same serving of Pillsbury's frozen original microwave popcorn, with its artery-clogging coconut oil, has 210 calories. And when consumers graduate to more exotic flavors, the calories often escalate. For example, Orville-Redenbacher's microwave caramel popcorn contains 240 calories per 2½-Redenbacher's microwave caramel popcorn contains 240 calories per 21/2-

Redenbacher's microwave catalogue proports on chains 240 calories per 24-cup serving.

Sodium can also put a damper on the wholesome, healthy appeal of microwaye popcorn. While a number of companies produce salt-free brands, other innocent-looking boxes like—Planters natural-flavored-microwave-popcorn contain a whopping 550 milligrams of sodium, compared with 260 milligrams for many other microwave popcorn products.

Some people are fooling themselves, when they believe microwave popcorn is healthy, says Esther Marsiglia, a Baltimore home economist, who has been teaching microwave-cooking classes for 20 years. The bost snack is plain popeorn or unsatted pretezls.

The consumer who is really health-conscious will make hot-air popoorn," Frustaci says. "But it has very little flavor. It's like pasta; it needs a little tomato, alfredo or pesto sauce on it. 





Creating a garden you can hold in your hands

Scenic 'potscaping' has gone stylish

By AMALIE ADLER ASCHER

BALTIMORE — An invitation to take in a flower show put on jointly a couple of weeks ago by the Garden Club of Twenty and the Green Spring Valley Club of America sounded too good to pass up. For one thing, the two groups are known for their horticultural prowess, so it stood to reason the plants on display would be well above the neverge.

the plants on display would be well above the average.

But-what-really-drove me. to. make the journey to the Garrison Forest School in Owings Mills, where the show was held, was the "Flower Show in Miniature" theme. One class in particular, "All of nature is to be found in the smallest thing," from a Latin proverb, I was eager to see.

In it, the schedule said, would be found miniature landscapes in containers no bigger than 24- and 16-inches and consisting of no fewer than three different varieties of plant.

To.my.way.of.thinking, a.make.believe tiny landscape would be a de-

To my way of thinking, a make-be-lieve tiny landscape would be a de-light for anyone to dote on, whether possessed of a regular garden or not. Even if there were plenty of plants outside, the time would inevitably ar-rive when they would retreat into their shell, so to speak, to undergo a period of reat. What better substitute at that time than a garden with live greenery — even flowers — but small enough to hold in your hands? For folks, too, with no outdoor spaces at al, a garden in a container would make the wish for even a scrap of ground come true.

the wish for even a scrap of ground come true.

Scenie potscaping — to coin a phrase — has come a long way from thur dish gardens of grandmotherady. Sophisticated, stylish and ever so tasteful, they no more resemble the traditional grouping — a snake plant towering like rabbits ears over some measly stands of philodendron intervined with a poof or two of a common-type pepieromin or aluminum plant, all set in a glazed ceramic roceptate with no drainage — than a puddle could suffice for a reflecting pool.

At the flower show featuring the miniature landscapes, containers ranged from clay saucers to bonsai ools to homennede troughs to an antique bronze basin.

And as proof of how easy it is to plant a fairy-tale landscape, ribbons were won by at least one or two entires whose creators had not a single shred of experience.

The alternative was to make a land-scape yourself scape yourself

Fortunately, Olivia Welbourn, an exhibitor in the class, was in the hall to tell how to create such miniature landscapes. First though, she wanted to point out the half-dozen teeny live goldfish inhabiting her display. She had borrowed the dear little things for the show, she said, from an aquarium store. The pool they were swimming in, she noted, was improvised from an ordinary yellow plastic kidney-shaped basin such as hospitals provide to paents for brushing their teeth.

Ms. Welbourn had saved hers from a recent stay and painted it black to make it look more like a pond.

The container for her landscape garden was a 16-inch clay saucer, inches deep. To create drainage in the solid bottom of the saucer, she drilled five holes, using a Vi-inch mortar bit, five holes, using a W-finen morar bit, in a star-shaped pattern. As protection against breaking the saucer in the process, she drilled it right side up and rested it on the lawn. That way if the drill burst through the saucer, it would hit soil and no damage would. be done. Pot shards were laid over the holes to keep the soil around the

plants in the saucer from spilling through.

On planting the saucer, Ms. Wel-bourn's first step was to spread a V-inch layer of commercial potting soil across the bottom. Then ahe began setting the plants, explaining that the soil already in place could be pushed around the varying stred root balls to fill in where needed.

As the starting point for the design.

As the starting point for the design, she put in the tailest plant, a Serissa. Its form, Ms. Welbourn said, was perfect for representing the tree underwhich someone might be fishing. She had titled her exhibit, "Going Fishing" (hence the goldfish), and further to convey the idea she had tucked in under the "tree," which incidentally bore pink, roselike flowers, such props as a wooden bench, fishing pole, hat and pail, all elfin in size.

Encircling the pond were creeping thyme tone fairly large plant divided to do the work of two and set side by side along one edge of the saucer; three miniature blue-cycel grasses resembling burshes, whose botanical name is Sisyrinchium alatum; two everyores. Seisinglia, farme; and some orgreen Selaginella forms; and some Irish moss. The grass, a perennial and a type of iris, produces tiny purple blossoms on the order of iris in June. while the moss features an infinitesimal white flower



DEAK ABBY: 1 just read the let-ter from the mother whose feelings were hurt because her 41-year-old son did not remember her on her birthday or Mother's Day.

I know how she feels because I

I know how she feels because I am in the very same situation. I once read a book about "irregular people," and the message was very helpful. I copied it, and when I feel hurt and neglected, I read it, and it makes me feel better. Here it is:

Mandela birthday is quiet

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP)—South Africa was quiet on Nel-son Mandela's 70th birthday, showing once again the government's ability to defuse potentially explosive events und-ite-refusal to bow to world opin-

Dozens of governments — including the United States — appealed for Mandela's release. Thousands of peo-ple held rallies in world capitals to mark the birthday Monday of the Af-rican National Congress leader who has been imprisoned since 1962.

In South Africa even the pro-government, Afrikaans-language newspaper Beeld said it now would be better, to free Mandela rather than further enhance his stature as a martyr.

But the government responded in-s customarily blunt fashion: no birthday celebrations and no freedom for Mandela until he renounces vio-

Mandela's birthday passed in South Africa without a major public celebra-tion or an outburst of violence.

"This day turned into what the gov-ernment wanted to be made of it," the leader's wife, Winnie Mandela, said

The government banned all celebra-tions, including concerts, festivals, sports events and even a private tea party. More than 30 people involved in organizing the events were de-tained.

The Southern African Catholic Bishops' Conference said government authorities "were making themselves look quite ridiculous."

But Minister of Information Stoffel van der Merwe said Monday on national felevision. No matter how much international pressure is brought upon us ... we must do what is right from our own perspective."

Van der Merwe said that "as far as the government is concerned, (Mande-la's) punishment has altready been met." But he added that political and security considerations keep the black leader in prison.

"His imprisonment serves to ensure that this type of (political unrest) does not recur in the society." Van der not recur it Merwe said.

Mrs. Mandela said it was unlikely her husband would be released soon. "There appears to be no climate in the country for the release of Mande-la," she said. "There does not seem to anything on the cards for the next

Mrs. Mandela said she was disappointed with the bans placed on the events planned for her husband's birthday. But she said it was wrong to interpret the day as evidence of the government's ability to stifle black re-

"We wanted this to be a peaceful day, she said, "It's our own way of focusing on the crimes of apartheid."

Mandela was juiled in 1962 for inciting unrest and thering from the country. While serving a five-year term, he was sentenced to life imprisonment in 1964 for subotage and politing the everthrow of the government. The government maintains that Mandela must renounce supporting violence before he is freed. He has said he will do so only if the government liffs its ban of the ANC and dismantles its policy of apartheid.

An estimated 30,000 people have been detained without charge for varying periods of time since the government imposed a nationwide state of emergency in June 1986. All leading anti-apartheid organizations have been banned, including the ANC, which is the main gueerilla group fighting the government.



ATLANTA (AP) — Police arrested 134 hymn-singing abortion opponents blocking a medical clinic Tuesday, while at the official convention protest site a mock trial convicted House. Speaker Jim Wright of ethics violations.

As temperatures climbed above 90 once again, demonstrators of every stripe took to the streets to bid for attention from delegates and reporters on the second day of the Democratic National Con-

and reporters on the second day of the Democratic National Convention.

Groups waiting their turn on the stage of a two-arc parking lot near The Omni convention site included the American Indian 'Movement with a pro-Jesse Jackson message; No Business as Usual, to denounce the 'Star Wars' defense plan; and the Palestine Solidarity Committee. The stage was provided by the city, which has scheduled protests throughout the convention at two-hour intervals.

The day began with mass arrests three miles north of the convention zone outside the Atlanta SurgiCenter, a medical clinic which performs abortions and other outpatient surgery. Abortion opponents singing hymns sat or lay across the steps and in front of the door, blocking cacess to the plain brick building. Police moved in at about 7 a.m., arresting 134 protesters, at the request of the clinic.

We did not have any kinds of abuse. They simply would not move, 'said Police Maj. Ken Burnette.

The protesters, part of a group called Operation Rescue Atlanta, did not interfere with any patients, said a clinic employee who declined to be identified: "It's so early, in the morning that we really did not have patients scheduled."

Charges included criminal tres-Charges included criminal trespassing, unlawful assembly and interfering with a police officer. Burnette said. Those arrested were taken to the city's Lakewood Fairgrounds, where buildings are equipped to house and process people arrested during the convention.

Meanwhile, a group called Public Advocates of the U.S. staged a Trial of Wright complete with a Judge in black robes. The mock court. found Wright guilty of ethics violations before a small Jury of early-morning onlookers.







According to an accountants' report by Kaufman Greenhut Lebowitz and Forman, Tyson had \$25,886 in cash on Dec. 31. He had an additional \$1,213,552 in a cash management account with Merrill Lynch and \$1,466,865 in the committee of the control of the

Tyson owned automobiles worth \$241,007 and invested in single premium life Insurance policies worth \$2 million. His net worth was \$5,187,097.

Tyson made \$6,737,666 from fights last year and additional income of \$191,015 from Reel Sports, presumably from promotional work. He made \$127,381 in interest and dividend income.


