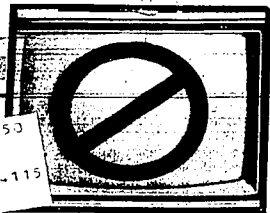

Dukakis accepts as an American

ATLANTA (AP) — Michael Dukakis, accepting the Democratic presidential nomination as a son of immigrants and product of the American dream, proclaimed Thursday night that "the Reagan era is over and a new era is about to begin."
In remarks to the closing session of the Democratic National Convention, the Massachusetts governor pledged to "forge a new era of greatness for America."
The nominee was introduced by his cousin, Academy Award winning actress Olympia

Dukakis, who narrated a brief film with scenes from his life — including his home in Brookline, Mass., and the 25-year-old snow-blower she wheeled out of the garage as an example of his tightfistedness.
He opened his speech by recalling the night of the Oscar ceremonies when Ms. Dukakis raised her Oscar over her head and said, "OK, Michael, let's go."
The nominee's eyes filled with tears and he

bowed his head briefly when he referred to his late father "the young man who arrived at Ellis Island with only \$25 in his pocket, but with a deep and abiding faith in the promise in America."
The joyful Democrats who packed the hall cheered lustily when he told them, "We're going to win this race."
For many of the party faithful, it was the first opportunity for genuine cheers since the

Republican era ushered in by Ronald Reagan in 1980.
Moments earlier, Dukakis' father-in-law, Harry Ellis Dickson, associate conductor emeritus of the Boston Pops orchestra, conducted "Fanfare for Michael Dukakis," composed for the occasion by John Williams.
For Dukakis, the speech marked the culmination of a 15-month campaign for his party's presidential nomination and the formal opening of his challenge to Republican George Bush.
Dukakis and his running mate, Texas Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, will leave the convention city

together on Friday for joint campaign appearances in Texas, California, North Dakota, Missouri and Pennsylvania.
The nominee paid tribute to his defeated Democratic rival, Jesse Jackson, as "a man who has lifted so many hearts with the dignity and the hope of his message throughout this campaign; a man whose very candidacy says to every child — aim high; to every citizen — you count; to every vote — you make a difference; to every American — you are full shareholder in our dream."
Jackson was in the hall and Dukakis waved.

Stallings thanks delegates for nod

ATLANTA — A slightly baffled Rep. Richard Stallings, D-Idaho, thanked three pro-life delegates from Minnesota on Thursday for casting their votes for him for the Democratic presidential nomination.
"I must thank the good people of Minnesota," Stallings said in brief remarks to the convention. "They certainly know how to select a candidate. To the three who voted for me last night, thank you, I appreciated that

The support from the three uncommitted, pro-life delegates caught Stallings by surprise. He said he had no idea why they singled him out since a number of other lawmakers also have taken strong anti-abortion stands.

The rest of his speech before the Democratic National Convention Thursday night carried a more sober message about the problems of Idaho farmers.

Stallings, who is seeking a third term in the 2nd District, was among several congressmen who briefly addressed the convention. He stood out the one who — to his own surprise as much as anyone else's — placed third behind Michael Dukakis and Jesse Jackson in Wednesday night's roll call ballot.

Stallings said he did not know of the pro-lifers' plan until his name was read on the convention floor. While he sat stunned, his fellow Idahoans, along with the rest of the convention, wondered what was going on.

"The comment I made was, 'Could there be two Richard Stallings,'" said former Idaho Gov. John Evans, the delegation's co-chairman.

"He slumped down in the chair, initially, and almost looked embarrassed. I said, 'You've come in third place,'" said Evans.

Similar thoughts were running through the mind of state Democratic

Chairman Conley Ward, also a delegate.
"I was wondering at the time, 'Gee, do they have a candidate or representative named Richard Stallings, too,'" Ward said.

Stallings said in an interview prior to his speech that he had not talked to the three delegates, but hoped to reach them before leaving Atlanta. He stressed that he did not understand why he was singled out.

"There are several Democrats who have been very consistent on that issue," he said.

Evans and Ward said the attendant publicity could only help Stallings' campaign.

Peavey casts her first vote

ATLANTA — The first time Diane Joseph-Peavey was in a convention arena to witness a presidential nomination, it was 1960 in Los Angeles where John F. Kennedy captured the Democratic nomination.

She "somehow had come across a press pass" and recalls wandering with fascination around the chaotic convention hall.

On Wednesday night, in Atlanta's tightly-packed Omni Coliseum, she cast her first vote as a delegate. She said it felt different to be there as a voter and committed to a candidate, Michael S. Dukakis.

"I committed to Dukakis early in June, primarily because of his stand on rural issues," said the 45-year old Ketchum resident, who is a national committeewoman and director of the non-partisan Idaho Rural Council.

As a voter, Peavey said she carefully studied her final choice: "I wanted to make sure Dukakis would incorporate issues (into his administration) that Jackson has been committed to, like hanging on to the family farm system."

Sitting in a corner of the cavernous Georgia World Congress Center where caucuses and press converge, she said she was glad to be there.

INS amnesty education rules draw praise, criticism

WASHINGTON — A "significant" portion of amnesty applicants will be exempted from taking a required English and civics exam, under proposed regulations completed this week by the U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service.

Those under 16 and over 65 years of age, as well as those who have completed high school, a high school equivalency course or one year of study in a state accredited school would be exempted from the exam, which is required of aliens seeking permanent residence under the am-

nesty program.
The regulations also exclude applicants who complete 30 hours of a 100-hour INS-approved course, and they provide for development of a test which applicants may take at independent testing centers instead of the government exam.

"We're interested in getting as many people through the amnesty program as possible," said William King, director of legislation for the agency's western region, where most of the proposals originated. In announcing the easing of the educational requirements at a press conference Thursday in Los Angeles, regional officials noted that there are more than one million amnesty applicants in Western states — far more than the public education system can handle, they said.

The immigration service this week also released textbooks that will form the basis for the exam, immediately triggering complaints from immigrants' advocates that the books are much too difficult for many unschooled immigrants and resemble the old Southern literacy tests and poll taxes. But the changes in educational requirements were generally lauded.

"These are positive developments,"

said Rick Swartz, president of the National Immigration, Refugee & Citizenship Forum. "They hopefully demonstrate the kind of flexibility INS will continue to exhibit throughout the balance of the legalization program."

Although government officials had no estimates on the number of amnesty applicants who would be exempted from taking exams under the proposed regulations, King said he expected it to be a "significant" number. Anyone may exempt himself, he noted, merely by taking the minimum 30-hour course.

But officials cautioned amnesty ap-

plicants to be wary of "fly-by-night" schools that are cropping up in immigrant communities and offering English classes that supposedly satisfy the government exam requirement. Los Angeles District Director Ernest Gustafson noted that the Immigration and Naturalization Service has not yet certified any schools to teach the courses. He suggested that applicants who wish to get started go to their public schools system because the agency plans to retroactively certify those to teach the courses.

"The proposed regulations have been sent to the Office of Management and Budget for final approval and are expected to be published in the Federal Register by the end of the month, officials said.
The tests are part of the second step toward citizenship for illegal aliens who applied for legal residency in the amnesty program that ended in May. Unlike regular immigrants, amnesty recipients are denied most public services and must pass an exam to gain permanent residency. Such exams are required of regular immigrants only when they opt for citizenship. Applicants have 2½ years in which to demonstrate their citizenship skills after they receive permanent residency cards.

Iraq blocks cease-fire moves

UNITED NATIONS — Iraq Thursday withheld permission for a team of U.N. military experts to visit Baghdad as the first step toward a cease-fire in the Persian Gulf war.

U.N. officials confirmed reports that Secretary General Javier Perez de Cuellar's request for cooperation was being "held hostage" to an Iraqi demand for direct talks between the foreign ministers of Iraq and Iran at U.N. headquarters in New York.

Secretariat officials and the Brazilian president of the Security Council, Paulo Nogueira-Batista, made clear that Baghdad's insistence on direct negotiations before a cease-fire takes place will not succeed.
But the U.N. officials confirmed

that Perez de Cuellar was considering an invitation to high-level negotiators for the two sides to work out with him a detailed schedule for implementing the various elements in Security Council Resolution 598, adopted a year ago, which constitutes a framework for peace in the Persian Gulf.

Iranian Ambassador Mohammed Jafar Mahallati said his government would be willing to send a top-level negotiator at the secretary general's request, but rejected Iraq's demand that the talks be face-to-face.

Perez de Cuellar told reporters the Iraqi idea of a high-level negotiation "is a valid one and I intend to take it into serious consideration. I think Iraq wants some clarifications. I am prepared to give them, and I do not think" that is going to stop the peace

process.
Other diplomats, however, said it was not yet certain whether the tough line taken by Baghdad in Wednesday's letter from Foreign Minister Tariq Aziz was intended to make sure of Iran's sincerity, to gain time, or to sabotage the peace process.

Iraqi Ambassador Ismet Kittani held a news conference Thursday in which he insisted that while the first step in the Gulf must be a cease-fire, it cannot begin until the sequence and procedures for all other steps — withdrawal to borders, exchange of prisoners, negotiations on a complete peace accord and timetables for clearing the Shatt al Arab waterway — are spelled out by the negotiators.

Only problem is Elvis — born Jan. 8, 1935, died Aug. 16, 1977 — could be out visiting friends or vacationing, according to a new book and assorted tabloid stories.

This is not amusing to employees at Graceland.
"Elvis is alive" rumors have floated since Elvis' death turned his Memphis, Tenn., mansion into a waiting wall-cum-tourist trap, but in recent months they've been

the focus of talk shows, radio programs and... and this story.
Tabloid readers, responding to a "Spot the King" campaign, have reported sighting Elvis watching a stock car race in Minnesota, fishing in upstate New York and dining in the California wine country.

If the King only temporarily abdicated, how has he avoided detection — a man with 45 gold records, 80 top-selling albums, 170 hit singles, and millions of obsessive fans?

"Elvis' cover — if he is alive — is there's so many Elvis lookalikes," explains Gail Brewer-Giorgio, author of the book "Is Elvis Alive?," which questions many of the cir-

Commission rehires chief

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Commission for the Blind has rehired Howard Barton as its executive director, instead placing him on administrative leave at full pay.

Barton was fired last month, and the commission's three-member board has until Nov. 12 to decide whether to reinstate him permanently or fire him again.

Board member Edna Mithollin, who succeeded Walt Hine on July 1, said she proposed putting Barton on leave because people were angry that he was fired before the June 22 deadline set for receiving comments on his performance.

At a six-hour meeting — much of which was closed to the public — Ms. Mithollin and fellow board members Jack Ugaki and Marjorie Ruth Moon voted to put Barton on administrative leave.

The board fired him June 17 on a 2-1 vote, with Ugaki casting the dissenting vote. Miss Moon said Barton was perceived as giving his supporters preferential treatment, and Hine said the commission was not giving its clients enough help.

Separatists eye Montana

MISSOULA, Mont. (AP) — A group that wants to change the U.S. Constitution to make the United States a whites-only nation says it may move its headquarters from California to Montana, calling the region the "last bastion of white culture."

Arch Edwards, a spokesman for the League of Peace Amendment Advocates, came to Missoula after speaking at the recent World Aryan Congress in Hayden Lake, Idaho.

He said the group is considering moving the group from California to Missoula or Helena. Many "white nationalists" are moving to the Northwest because of the "low density of non-whites," he said.

Edwards said his group is seeking approval of a constitutional amendment that would limit U.S. residence to U.S. citizens — and make citizenship dependent on racial ancestry.

Hydro builder may sue USFS

MOSCOW (AP) — Hy-Tech Inc., which wants to build a hydroelectric dam on Elk Creek Falls near the town of Elk River, may sue the U.S. Forest Service in order to complete the project.

The Federal Energy Regulatory Commission has ordered Hy-Tech to submit an interim status report on negotiations aimed at resolving differences with the Forest Service over the project.

But company spokesman Richard Sigismont said talks have fallen short of the "significant" progress demanded by FERC.

"There wasn't much to report. The next step probably is court," Sigismont said.

By November, an agreement must be reached and any changes in the project design must be filed with FERC for consideration in granting a project license.

Forest worker disappears

LEWISTON (AP) — Search crews used a helicopter and tracking dogs today to scour the Seven Devils Mountain area near Riggins for a missing Forest Service worker, Idaho County Sheriff Randy Baldwin said.

Donna Smith, 25, Riggins, was last seen after she reported not feeling well and left a Forest Service trail crew about 1 p.m. Wednesday to walk two miles to her car, Baldwin said.

Officers were trying to locate the driver of a light-colored van seen speeding down a road about 3 p.m. in the area where Ms. Smith was last seen, Baldwin said. The van, described as tan or cream with dark brown striping, was possibly a 1985 or 1986 Volkswagen bearing blue and white out-of-state license plates, he said.

State windfall stalls Idaho Falls teacher talks

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — What state education officials believed was good news for school districts across the state — a higher-than-expected final state aid payment — has soured teacher contract talks in Idaho Falls.

That there was additional money is probably what prevented the parties from reaching agreement, chief school board negotiator Fred Hahn said. "They're mindful of it, and the board established its offer before this."

Because of lower-than-expected enrollment across the state, the six and final payment of the last budget year to each of Idaho's 116 school districts was some \$2.2 million higher than projected.

"This will be good news for school districts, particularly since in the past two years the final payment has been lower than originally projected," state Schools Superintendent Jerry Evans said.

But hopes for an agreement on a new 1988-1989 contract in Idaho Falls evaporated on Wednesday after the

district received nearly \$100,000 more in state aid than originally expected.

In spite of the increase, the board stood by its previous salary proposal for a 2.5 percent pay raise, Hahn said.

PUC orders phone service

BOISE (AP) — State regulators have ordered toll-free service among three north Idaho cities by Sept. 1, installation of telephone facilities in a small central Idaho community and a nine-month suspension of an Idaho Falls trucking permit.

In the series of decisions announced on Thursday, the Public Utilities Commission said there was a strong community of interest between the towns of Denry, Bovill and Elk River that justified toll-free service from GTE Northwest.

The toll-free service will carry a residential surcharge of 68 cents a month and a business surcharge of \$2.74 to \$3.44 with possible adjustments depending on commission decisions in other matters.

Tourism tax needs

LEWISTON (AP) — Unless regional concerns are addressed, the Idaho Travel Council will have difficulty getting support for a proposed broad-based tourism tax, a special task force representative told the council meeting in Lewiston.

"We have people that are really frustrated," said William McLaughlin, representing a statewide independent tourism industry group.

Regional tourism committees have been established by the Travel Council, but McLaughlin said Wednesday that they need help.

"We don't have a sound infrastructure out there that can really deliver the kinds of tourism services that we're already advertising," he said.

The proposed tourism tax would increase revenue for tourism promotion by expanding the state's hotel-motel tax to include other sectors of the travel industry, including food and beverage businesses, outfitters, guides and car rental services.

GTE has said it will have the proper equipment in place by next summer to eliminate the need for one-plus dialing between those communities.

The commission did not make a decision on whether reduced-cost toll service should be implemented from the three communities to the cities of Moscow, Pocatello, Genesee, St. Maries and Orofino. It said that ruling will be based on the outcome of another GTE case pending in the Panhandle.

In the central part of the state, the commission ordered U.S. West Communications, the successor of Mountain Bell, to provide service to the Valley of the Pines near Idaho City if at least 10 people sign up at an initial charge of \$1,400.

The commission estimated the construction costs to bring service to the 42 lots in the remote mountain community would be over \$66,000.

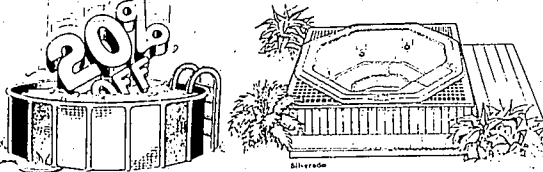

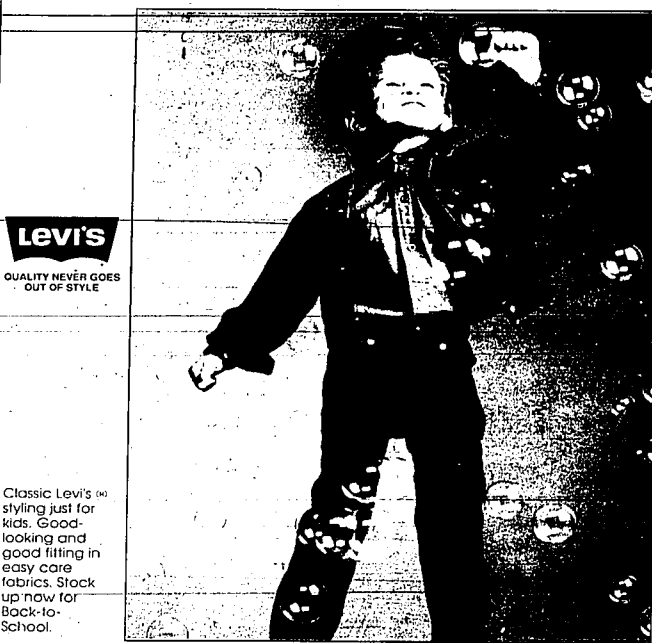

Jackson may be inching American politics in new direction

The speech was not new. Some sentences fell flat, and the metaphors were overabundant.

Cynical Democrats, and probably many Republicans as well, guffawed at the references to patched quilts, unheated homes and hardworking single women. "I understand," said the Rev. Jesse L. Jackson—alluding to the quiet misery of quiet people. Only late at night, after they served turkey to their employers, did the moms wearily return to prepare Thanksgiving dinner for their children. "I understand," said Jackson. Even if planned for prime time, Jackson seems unprepared, perhaps unbuttoned. In his address to the Democratic National Convention in Jackson evoked religion and spirit. He addressed the outcast and the forgotten. And for a moment, at least, he touched a chord.

After eight years of Ronald Reagan it is hard to remember why the president has been known as the Great Communicator. He shuns news conferences and interviews. He shuns sentences with difficulty. He reads speeches like a beginning student.

Is this one of the many ironies of Jesse Jackson? In the high-tech age of video and slick commercials, it is neither the Hollywood actor nor the consummate manager who breaks through, drawing a response.

Rather, it is the outsider, the black preacher educated in small towns and churches. The insiders are prepared and overprepared; their advisers and consultants advise and consult. They evaluate every factor, interest group, gesture, remark. But the meticulous script is surface, not soul. The audiences yawn.

On the campaign trail Jackson was known as regularly, wildly, sometimes uncontrollably late. He scheduled more events for one day than he could possibly complete. Even for a live television interview Jackson showed up when it was half over. This, too, hints of a spontaneous dimension that other presidents and candidates have long jumped; Jackson is tough to schedule. Once, already late, passing

through a hospital he was beckoned by a man whose wife upstairs was deathly ill. Might Jackson make a quick visit and pray for her? No cameras. No votes. No reporters. Jackson went.

Yet it is not simply gestures or speeches that set Jackson apart. He explicitly appeals to the disfranchised, those who have been left out and those who have not voted. This is not a marginal group. A shrinking number of eligible voters cast ballots. That most popular president, Ronald Reagan, governs on the basis of a minority of eligible voters. Anyone who moves this vast array of non-voters to the polls reconstitutes American politics.

And no one can doubt that Jackson has begun to stir this army. He gained 6.7 million votes in the primaries and won in many cities—including New York, Chicago, Houston, Philadelphia and San Francisco. He obtained these victories by provoking the inactive and the apathetic—those who never saw any reason to vote because government seemed so distant and indifferent. Not only among blacks and minorities, but also among the young, union members and even farmers, Jackson

generated palpable enthusiasm. Jackson is more than a preacher. After years of sneering Reaganite references to "welfare queens in designer jeans," the language of care and concern sounds fresh. Jackson reminds us that the presence of the homeless in American cities is not a command of nature or God, but the result of bad policies—the absence of jobs and decent housing.

We see the homeless and avert our eyes, but Jackson reminds us that a wealthy nation is devoted to the common good of all. He recalls that, of the advanced industrial countries, the United States alone has no national health care. For too many, sickness is not simply a tragedy but a family financial disaster.

Jackson looks back to the civil rights movement when moralism also became political. The continuity and the change are remarkable. Martin Luther King Jr.'s "I Have a Dream" speech was delivered to a protest rally; Jackson invokes King's dreams and hopes, but as a runner-up Democratic presidential candidate. For this reason he spurns talk of breaking rank and forming a new party. The

millions whom he mobilized have a future not as a splinter but inside the Democratic Party. It is impossible to see how this will unfold. It has been remarked, however, that in 2008—five campaigns down the pike—the 65-year-old Jackson will be two years younger than Reagan was when he first took the presidential oath.

It is easy to dismiss Jackson—too much moralism, hope, dreaming and not enough specific policies. But it is harder to dismiss his appeal and his votes. We live in a cynical self-obsessed period. But even the toughest shudder, at least sometimes, at the poverty, pollution and sickness that is never far from the front door.

Jackson speaks to that perpetual pain, the realization that the United States excludes and damages too many. In galvanizing the disfranchised and in making respectable—once again—frank calls of moralism and concern, Jesse Jackson may be inching American politics in a new direction.

Bentsen's record in Senate is designed to avoid enemies

The last time George Bush's name appeared alone on a November ballot—in the 1970 Texas Senate race—Lloyd Bentsen bested him.

The Nixon administration tried to put the best face on Bush's defeat by claiming Bentsen as a member of its ideological majority. But while Bentsen had defeated a liberal incumbent in the Democratic primary, he quickly disavowed any allegiance to Nixon. In his first Washington news conference Bentsen emphasized, "In coming here as part of the liberal opposition, not part of the Nixon forces."

People outside Texas are still misclassifying Lloyd Bentsen. No sooner had Massachusetts Gov. Michael S. Dukakis made known his choice of Bentsen as his running mate than the national media began describing Bentsen as a Southern conservative Democrat. Never mind that the label is almost as obsolete in American politics as White. Even Mississippi's John Stennis, the last of the old-line Southern senators, has a moderate record on social issues these days. But Bentsen never was a Southern conservative Democrat. He was, and is, a Texas conservative Democrat—a different political species altogether.

The Southern tradition is that the primary concern of politics is race; the Texas tradition is that the primary concern of politics is economics. In the 1930s and '40s, the benefits of oil began changing Texas from an agrarian to an industrial state. The small farmers who had dominated the state's politics were overwhelmed by an emerging business establishment—Dallas bankers, Houston oilmen, oil-rich ranchers and land developers, one of whom was Lloyd Bentsen Sr., the senator's father.

For a half-century the conservative Democrats have had a single interest: to promote a "good business climate." The concept is pragmatic rather than partisan or ideological. It means using the government to intervene in the economy on the side of business. A good business climate does not have strong unions, strong regulations or high business taxes, all typically favored by liberal Democrats, but neither does it have unadulterated free enterprise, so favored by Republicans. It envisions government as a stimulator of the economy

through devices like tariffs, trade reprisals, tax breaks and loan guarantees.

This philosophy first appeared in Texas during the late years of the New Deal. Though it has been dominant ever since, it has not been unchallenged. In the two decades preceding the Bentsen-Bush Senate race, when Texas was still a one-party state, liberal Democrats repeatedly lost fights for control of the party and the state. They avenged their defeats by boycotting the 1966 Senate race, allowing a Republican to win. When Bentsen won the 1970 primary after a divisive campaign, he faced the same danger. But Bentsen spent the summer courting the liberal interest groups—Inbores, blacks, Hispanics. It helped that he spoke Spanish. Barbara Jordan, then a state senator, endorsed him; so did a popular Hispanic congressman. Assured of Democratic unity, Bentsen ran a front-runner's cautious race. Not even a Nixon-Agnew visit to Texas could save Bush.

If Bentsen neutralized the liberals in 1970, he won them over completely 12 years later. Bentsen faced weak opposition in 1982, a Republican congressman too conservative that he kept calling Bentsen a liberal. But below Bentsen on the ballot the Democrats were in trouble. The Republicans were defending the governorship for the first time since Reconstruction, and they were making a bid to win lesser statewide offices as well. For the first time the Democratic ticket included an array of liberals. Bentsen dipped into his bulging campaign treasury to fund get-out-the-vote drives and phone banks for the entire ticket. The Democrats swept the state, and Bentsen got the credit.

Texas liberals may not exactly love Lloyd Bentsen, but they do regard his name at the top of the ticket as a security blanket. The oil slump has also made Bentsen's pro-business stance less controversial. Every Texas politician wants a good business climate these days.

Bentsen's concept of a good business climate is evident from his Senate voting record.

Even before Ronald Reagan became president, Bentsen urged tax cuts for business (unlike Reagan; however, Bentsen wanted the tax breaks conditioned on reinvestment in new plants and equipment). Bentsen has delivered for the Texas establishment by winning tax breaks related to oil. He has been less successful in championing a government-imposed oil import fee (Texas' other senator, free-market Republican Phil Gramm, opposes it). He voted for the government-backed bailout of Chrysler and against stricter automobile pollution standards. He opposed labor's major initiative for a common-sense picketing bill.

But outside of economic issues, Texas conservative Democrats do not have fixed principles. Bentsen is no exception. His voting record is that of a man who has purposefully situated himself in the middle. On civil rights, for example, Bentsen has supported sanctions

against South Africa and opposed the confirmation of Supreme Court nominee Robert Bork, but he has opposed court-ordered busing. On labor issues, where one might expect a business-oriented politician to be weak, the AFL-CIO scored Bentsen 51 percent pro-labor in 1985 and 50 percent in 1986. Regardless of the voting index, whether it is based on ideology or a special interest, Bentsen seldom strays far from 50 percent.

The trouble with a record like Bentsen's is that it is designed not to win friends but to avoid enemies. The Texas conservative Democratic philosophy appeals to the political and business establishments—not to broad constituencies. It is hard to sell on television. This explains why even many Texans were surprised by Dukakis' choice of Bentsen. It is hard to see how Bentsen's strengths will bring the ticket a single vote east, north or west of

Texas. Most voters outside the state, to say nothing of the Washington press corps, neither understand nor empathize with the Texas political tradition.

On the other hand, it is easy to see why Bentsen appealed to Dukakis. A former congressman who took a leave from politics to get rich in the insurance business, Bentsen viewed being a senator as a management problem. No sooner had he won his seat in 1970 than he hired consultants to devise an organizational plan for his office. His greatest legislative successes have come on impenetrable issues like pension reform that offer scant public reward.

If Dukakis is the technocrat as senator, then Bentsen is the technocrat as governor.

Emergency plan may save shuttle

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — Taking a cue from heart surgeons, engineers are considering a thin tube with an expandable balloon on the end to plug a leak that threatens a long delay of the next space shuttle mission.

To work, the device would have to follow a "tortuous path" 20 feet through a one-half inch line that contains six sharp bends.

It would be something like a medical procedure known as an angioplasty, but instead of opening a clogged artery, it would close off the leaking line.

This approach is just one of several being weighed to fix the small leak on the launch pad and avoid rolling Discovery back to a hangar for repairs, which could delay the planned early September launch by as much as two months.

A decision on moving Discovery is not expected until after a test-firing of the shuttle's three main engines on the pad. That test is set for July 28, but officials said Thursday prepara-

tions were behind schedule and it might have to be postponed a day or two.

The leak of nitrogen tetroxide gas is in a fitting on an engine compartment vent line leading to an oxidizer tank. It is six feet from the nearest access panel and thus inaccessible for normal repairs.

"We've got people looking at the prudent and safe thing to do," said Forrest S. McCartney, director of the Kennedy Space Center. The odds, he said, are 50-50 on a rollback of Discovery.

The three main NASA centers involved with the shuttle are working on different approaches to fixing the leak on the pad.

At the Johnson Space Center in Houston, the focus is on entering the shuttle's cargo bay and cutting holes through both the rear of the bay and the engine compartment to reach the leak, then plug it by some method, including encapsulating it with a clamshell-like device filled with a sealant.

Rain eases drought for some

Rain this week over some drought-stricken areas brought "instant recovery" for some hay farmers, but other crops are still "thirstened" and more rain is needed.

"Overall it has eased things a little bit. But the drought is still in effect," said Alan Ringo, a hydrologist with the National

Weather Service in Cleveland. "Those streams and reservoirs that were low are still going to be low because for the most part, all this rain was sucked up into the earth."

"The grass will turn green, and it will help, somewhat, for the crops. But if they had the rain two or three weeks ago it would have been much better," he said.

"Farmers are in a much better mood than three weeks ago," said Morris Bitzer, an extension specialist with the University of Kentucky in Lexington.

A bill to give drought-stricken Wisconsin farmers a property tax cut of up to \$1,000 was signed Thursday by Gov. Tommy Thompson.

State Department puts lie to defector's charge

WASHINGTON (AP) — The State Department on Thursday denied charges by an American who defected to the Soviet Union that the United States targeted the French Embassy when it bombed Libya in April 1986. Deputy spokeswoman Phyllis Oakley called the allegations "ridiculous and absolutely untrue."

Glen Michael Souther, a former U.S. Navy intelligence specialist who recently defected to the Soviet Union, said on Soviet television Wednesday that he had access to secret photographs used to plan the bombing attack on Tripoli. He said that he learned that the French Embassy was targeted in the Bin Ashur neighborhood of Tripoli.

A Soviet announcer charged that the embassy was targeted in retaliation for France's refusal to allow U.S.

bombers to fly over its territory en route to Libya from bases in Britain. The Pentagon had no immediate comment on Souther's allegations.

However, two days after the raid, then-Defense Secretary Caspar W. Weinberger said that damage to the French Embassy may have been caused by an American plane that was apparently shot down in the raid and was not the result of the embassy being a target or near a target.

Probe search warrants set

NEW YORK (AP) — The government, in response to a court order, today released search warrants for three businesses and a consultant and documents describing material seized from them as part of the Pentagon procurement probe.

The documents detail the reams of financial records, computer files, letters and other property seized during searches at the Hazeltine Corp. in Greenlawn, Kane Paper Co. in Baldwin, the office of Dennis Mitchell, an employee of the Unigys Corp., and the home of Charles Gardner, a consultant.

The papers were heavily edited to protect individuals and companies not previously named in court papers. This was a condition set by U.S. Dis-

trict Judge Edward Korman, who ordered their release at the request of Newsday.

The documents were released by the office of U.S. Attorney Andrew Maloney of Brooklyn.

The documents relating to the search of Mitchell's office stated that investigators were looking for information "pertaining to schemes to defraud Unigys by diverting monies to individuals and business entities to illegally influence the defense contracting process."

Among the documents seized at Kane Paper, which included searches of trash receptacles, were a "Florida condo file," a "contribution file," a "political file box" and a folder labeled "golf tournament 1984-87."

Demos optimistic about party unity

ATLANTA (AP) — Democratic officials and delegates to the party's 40th national convention seem convinced that this week's low-drama show of balance and unity may be just the ticket for Michael Dukakis' fall campaign against George Bush.

Optimism was unmistakable here as Democrats examined the implications of the Dukakis-Bentsen-Jackson pact forged at the convention week began.

"We're on the threshold of putting together one of the most powerful coalitions in recent history," party chairman Paul Kirk said Thursday.

Throughout many of the 50 state delegations, as Dukakis-Bentsen backers began to explore their tentative alliances with Jackson supporters, the implications of having a moderate white Southerner on a ticket embraced by Jesse Jackson seemed to offer attractive possibilities.

"Jackson's people and Dukakis' people are now one and the same," said Jackson campaign chairman Willie Brown on Thursday.

Many delegates said they were struck by Jackson's call Tuesday night for Democrats to find "common ground," whatever their ideological differences. He began with a salute to former President Carter, and then brought civil rights pioneer Rosa Parks to the stand for a salute.

"It takes two wings to fly," he said. That was clearly the thinking that motivated Dukakis as he worked over the past two weeks to juggle two delicate political deals: the addition of Bentsen to his ticket and the courtship of Jackson and his supporters for the fall campaign.

His success in holding together the new coalition — in working with both Bentsen and Jackson without alienating supporters of either — could be a key to

Dukakis' success in a close election (and in building the sort of party-wide base that eluded Carter during his term of office).

"People come to conventions for different reasons, usually to fight or win," said Illinois Attorney General Neal Hartigan, a white party regular whose state delegation feuded at some times fractious racial split. "This time you can smell it. People want to win."

Following Dukakis' Wednesday night victory for the nomination, Rep. Charles Hayes of Chicago said, "I can't help but say

my preference is Jesse, but I'm willing to face up to what is real."

What is real is Bentsen, the moderate-to-conservative Texan who was blasphemed by another Illinois congressman, Rep. Gus Savage, as a "white male Southern Reaganite warhawk," about whose nomination "I am insulted."

Marching to the beat of his own drummer, Savage said that if Dukakis wants to pander to white Southerners with the Bentsen choice, "tell them to get their votes from the white South."

That's just what more prominent black leaders said they have in mind.

3 Palestinians die in West Bank riots

JERUSALEM (AP) — Three Palestinians were killed and 16 wounded Thursday in clashes with Israeli soldiers in the West Bank, and Jerusalem police used bulldozers to clear streets of crowds protesting the early closing of Arab schools.

It was the second day in a row that three Palestinians were fatally shot and was among the worst in seven months of Palestinian rebellion.

At least 231 Palestinians have been killed since the uprising began Dec. 8 among the 1.5 million who live in the West Bank and Gaza Strip, which Israel has occupied since capturing them from Jordan and Egypt in the Middle East 1967 war. Four Israelis also have been slain.

Army authorities imposed curfews on about 225,000 Palestinians in the occupied areas in an effort to end the violence and to punish those who joined a commercial strike ordered by the rebellion's underground leadership.

A new directive from the underground leadership, the 22nd since the

violence began, praised Israeli Arabs in Jerusalem and elsewhere for joining the uprising and warned against Israeli secret agents posing as journalists or news agency reporters ... in spying and arresting people.

Thursday's protests stemmed from Palestinian anger over an Israeli order to close the schools Thursday, a month early.

They swept from Arab east Jerusalem to the West Bank cities of Nablus, Hebron and Ramallah. Protesters burned tires, blocked roads and hurled stones at Israeli vehicles and police.

West Bank schools, which 300,000 Palestinian children attend, have been closed more than four months of this academic year by army order. Teachers wanted hold classes through the summer to make up, but Israeli officials said schools had become centers of unrest and ordered them closed.

About 600 Arabs marched through the winding streets of the open-air marketplace of Nablus.

Vietnam agrees to more MIA searches

HANOI, Vietnam (AP) — Vietnam said Thursday it had agreed to resume joint searches with the United States for the remains of 70 U.S. servicemen listed as missing in action after the Vietnam war.

Vietnamese Foreign Minister Nguyen Co Thach mentioned the agreement in a letter to U.S. presidential envoy Gen. John Vessey earlier this month, a Foreign Ministry spokesman told a news conference here.

Joint searches were suspended after initial efforts in November 1985 were cut short by disagreements between the two countries over humanitarian issues.

The agreement calls for the remains of the 70, considered "priority" cases by Washington, to be found by the end of the year, the spokesman

said. The searches would take place between August and October in an undisclosed area, he added.

The initial searches involving both countries took place in a Hanoi suburb where a U.S. aircraft had come down.

Vietnam "favorably welcomes the American participation in joint search operations," Thach was quoted as telling Vessey in his letter.

Thach, who had talks with Vessey in New York last month, also renewed an appeal for the United States to fulfill its promise to help resolve humanitarian problems in Vietnam resulting from the war, the spokesman said.

Vessey said in a reply dated Monday that the United States would "continue its efforts to respond to Vietnam's humanitarian needs."

Armenians avoid strike

MOSCOW (AP) — Armenians ignored activists' calls for a strike Thursday to protest the government's rejection of their demand to annex a region in neighboring Azerbaijan, residents and the state-run media reported.

The reports indicated the government, after a five-month struggle, may be gaining the upper hand in controlling labor unrest that has costed millions of dollars in lost production in Armenia.

However, a 2-month-old strike was reported continuing in the disputed region, Nagorno-Karabakh, whose population is mostly Armenian.

"The people are embittered," said a worker with the Gostelradio state broadcasting authority in Stepanakert, Nagorno-Karabakh's administrative center. "We don't know what to do. But we know that the refusal to make Nagorno-Karabakh part of Ar-

menia wasn't just."

A correspondent for the official news agency Tass in the Armenian capital of Yerevan said the call for a strike beginning Thursday went largely unheeded.

"The majority of enterprises are working. It's a normal working day," said the journalist, who declined to give his name.

Nicaragua reports 3 Contra attacks

MANAGUA, Nicaragua (AP) — Eleven rebels and seven civilians were killed this week in three rebel attacks that violated the leftist Sandinista government's unilateral ceasefire, the Defense Ministry said.

Also Wednesday, the Foreign Ministry requested a U.S. visa for Ambassador Carlos Tunnerman, whom the Reagan administration expelled last week.

The Defense Ministry statement said a Contra rebel band ambushed two vehicles on Tuesday near Tapalpa, 55 miles east of Managua, killing seven civilians, including two children aged 7 and 9.

Five civilians were wounded in the attack, it said.

Nine rebels were killed Monday when Sandinista troops fought off an attack near Muelle de los Bueyes and Muban, neighboring villages in southern Nicaragua near the Caribbean coast, the ministry said.

It did not mention any government casualties.

Two more rebels were killed and one wounded in a Tuesday attack on troops near San Rafael del Norte, 110 miles north of the capital, the ministry said. It said the troops repelled the attack by the U.S.-supported rebels.

President Daniel Ortega announced Tuesday that the government was unilaterally extending to Aug. 30 its cease-fire with the Contras.

Each side in the 7-year-old war has accused the other of violating the truce, which began when a preliminary peace accord was signed March 23, a month after Congress voted against renewed military aid for the Contras.

Negotiations for a lasting peace broke down June 9.

New airport chief plans to spend time listening

TWIN FALLS — Ron Madsen says it would be foolish to barrel his way into his new position as manager of the Twin Falls-Sun Valley Regional Airport.

Madsen, who learned how to fly in 1950, says he intends to follow the management style set by his predecessor, Harry Merrick, and not make many changes.

Madsen began fulfilling his full-time duties this week.

"I plan on spending a lot of time listening to what people have to say to me," he says, adding that he considers his ability to listen attentively

to customers and employees one of his strong points.

Madsen, who will make \$28,500 a year, says he wants to help local people become aware of what it has and learn what they feel the airport is lacking and try to meet those needs.

"An airport has to be sold," he says. "The airport can be an outsider's first impression of the community and it could be a lasting one, he says. People could see something of the airport that makes them decide not to bring their family to the area.

"It might be just the dirt on the floor that turns people off," he says.

Madsen, a native of Twin Falls, learned to fly

Burley hearing demonstrates local support Park Service elusive on park at Craters

BURLEY — Southern Idaho backers of Craters of the Moon have been courting National Park Service officials considering national park status for the lava expanse near Arco and adjacent attractions.

But the officials are playing hard to get. Meeting of the Burley Inn Thursday, the Park Service wouldn't commit to recommendations for a Craters national park or any other change in status for Craters, which is now a national monument.

National monuments have a main attraction. National parks have many.

Under ideal circumstances, it would take 18 months to chart the course at Craters over the next five to 10 years, said Doug Cornell, Park Service team leader on Craters of the Moon.

The national park idea is just one idea on a Park Service list of many for the future of the monument.

Local public officials, Burley development officials and citizens gave the national park idea near unanimous support at the meeting. About 100 people attended.

"We are talking about tourism. It will have a (positive) effect on all of southern Idaho," said Rep. Ralph Peters, R-Idaho.

Last year Craters attracted 206,000 visitors. Enthusiasm for the national park idea and the lack of opposition was good, said Cornell.

"It makes congressmen happy. But I am still concerned we haven't heard the other side. People tend to wait until you have a proposal and they tend to it shoot it down," he said.

What the private Craters of the Moon Development Corp. wants is a national park comprised of what is now the monument plus the Crystal

Ice Caves southeast of there and the Great Rift volcanic feature near American Falls.

Staff of Rep. Richard Stallings and Sen. James McClure attended the meeting.

Stallings supports a Craters national park. McClure is to meet with Glen Allen of the Craters Development Corp. in August.

Congress creates national parks or other changes in the status of federal lands.

Though support for the national park was near unanimous, some attending the meeting raised potential sticking points.

People said they were concerned about additional wilderness acreage in a Craters national park. Motorist access could become a problem, one man said. Wilderness areas generally don't allow motorized vehicles.

Another issue at the meeting was whether a national park would interfere with long established sheep crossings and grazing in the area.

The Park Service will look at conditions of roads and trails, air quality deterioration, mining and mineral exploration, concessions, campground rehabilitation and other issues.

According to Cornell, the Park Service will pose questions such as whether Craters is a missing feature in the national parks system.

"I will ask itself whether the location is endangered, whether it has adequate access or should be left alone."

Park Service officials toured Craters of the Moon for 13 hours on Tuesday viewing the lava flows and spatter cones by daylight and then late into the evening by the light of a crescent moon. Wednesday they flew over it.

"The extent of it is fantastic. Seeing it from the air is just unbelievable. It's a beautiful area," Cornell said.

Gooding jury convicts man on rape charges

GOODING — A jury has convicted a Gooding County resident of rape in a March 1 incident that started in a bar and ended in a deserted field.

Antonio Segura Hinojosa, 22, faces a possible life sentence for the rape. He was also convicted Wednesday of an "infamous crime against nature" for having oral sex with the victim. The second charge carries a five-year sentence.

A companion charged with raping the woman at the same time will go on trial Aug. 15.

The episode involving guns, knives and a rape in a deserted field in Gooding County started in a Jerome bar, according to court records.

The victim and two male companions were drinking in the Northern Tavern when Hinojosa and his companion, Jose Salvador Gomez, asked the trio if they wanted to go to Wendell to drink some beer, according to a pre-trial statement by the victim.

At about 1 a.m., the group left the bar, in a faded, green-and-

white 1972 Chevrolet Impala, according to court records. They drove into the country, where the victim alleged that Hinojosa and Gomez pulled a gun and forced her two male companions, Christopher Quintana and Bob Watson, out of the car.

The victim was told to get back in the car and she, Hinojosa and Gomez drove for about a mile to a deserted field, court records state. The victim alleged she was raped at that location.

Meanwhile, Quintana and Watson had notified the Jerome County sheriff's office, records state.

Jerome County Deputy Darryl Cameron pulled the car over shortly after Quintana and Watson's call. Cameron then referred the investigation to the Gooding County sheriff's office.

The court hired an interpreter to translate the three-day trial for Hinojosa. Hinojosa is a Mexican citizen living in Gooding, said Gooding County Prosecutor Jayne Nelson.

Gomez is charged with rape, infamous crime against nature and aggravated assault.

Tews has allowed use of his Cedar Creek Reservoir frontage for years BLM, rancher work out land swap

TWIN FALLS — Gerald Tews says the federal government can have his 272 acres of "takefront" property at Cedar Creek Reservoir and all the trash that goes with it.

"It's just as well for us and everyone else who uses it," Tews said of a land trade he worked out with the Bureau of Land Management.

Tews is swapping his property for 2,624 acres of sage-covered federal land he plans to graze cattle on.

He said he will pay an additional \$1,800 to match the value of the BLM property, worth about \$20 an acre.

The deal comes after 15 years of negotiation between the Twin Falls rancher and the BLM. Earlier tentative arrangements fell through because of water right and grazing squabbles, Tews said.

"These land trades take a long time," he said. "It isn't anybody's fault."

Dolores Hilde, BLM realty specialist, said most land exchanges take two years at the most to complete.

"There were millions of reasons why it didn't go through sooner," Hilde said. "It's to Mr. Tews' credit that he didn't close his

property. There was a high level of frustration."

"Tews said so far the most recent proposal has taken over four years of wrangling. He said the BLM had to complete its land use plan for the area including an environmental impact study before the trade could be considered.

Tews said he has allowed fishermen and boaters to use his property for more than 15 years.

During that time, Twin Falls County has maintained a portable toilet and a few dumpsters on Tews' property, which extends more than a mile along the southeastern shore of the reservoir.

"We haven't objected to people using it," he said.

However, Tews said he came close to closing his property to boaters and fishermen a few times when trash started piling up.

"I wasn't going to tolerate a big mess," he said. Hilde said it was difficult for Tews to maintain his cattle operation with as many as 30 vehicles and campers on his property at a time. She said the rancher's fences were occasionally damaged.

Tews said he also considered developing the property for a subdivision, but decided he didn't want to close the area to fisher-

men. He said several elderly people, including some good friends of his, would lose an accessible fishing hole.

Tews said he plans to retrace his now property, which is about four miles west of Balanced Rock, and fence it in to keep his cattle from wandering into the reservoir.

Hilde said BLM reserves the right to nullify the action within a 60-day public and government comment period beginning next Monday.

She said the purpose of the exchange is to acquire heavily used recreational land.

"The acquisition of these lands has received significant support by the public, and some state and local government agencies," she said.

Hilde said the BLM has applied for funding of a picnic area with permanent restroom facilities.

The BLM would manage the area with Twin Falls County. She said the reservoir is stocked with 150,000 fingerling and mature rainbow trout every year.

Hilde said final approval of the trade could come within three months if there is no significant opposition.

"We don't anticipate any problems," she said.

Cowboys upset Jerome; Buhl, Pocatello win

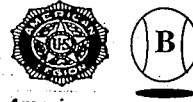

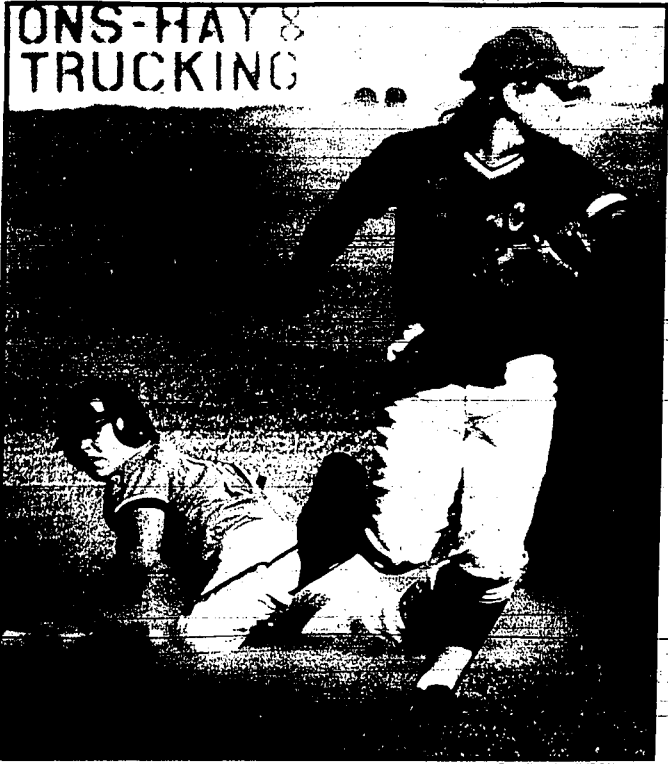

Host professional Earl Simpson said the tournament would be restricted to the first 180 players and noted there still were spots available in most flights. He said he would accept entries "until it's time to start making pairings

and tee-off times Friday afternoon late."

Simpson noted the tournament would be paid in gross only over the seven flights. The meet again offers \$1,500 in added money.

Simpson said he couldn't be sure who might be showing up for the championship flight. He noted that Joe Malay and some other top names in Southern Idaho hadn't entered as yet, but added there was a possibility of them still coming in.

However, with an increase of the entry fee this year to meet the \$400 first-place per flight expectations, Simpson said he anticipated overall entry would be down.

He will have a solid home crew with former champion Glenn Blakeley and veterans Terry

Spackman and Ken Huizinga. Upstarts against that old guard will be Cary Darling and Heyburn's Denny Simpson.

Rupert will be sending Scott Erling, headed for Utah State's golf team this fall and Perry Hanchey will be heading a reduced Twin Falls contingent. Jim Brown of Boise State will be making his first appearance in a local tournament.

Last year's tournament conclusion was one of the toughest with Hase blazing around the front nine, knocking in a birdie from well off the green on No. 11 when double bogey was a big possibility, and then hanging on over the last few holes to offset Spackman's late charge.

Blakeley was in that battle until knocking his tee shot into Goose Creek on No. 17.

Battle lines forming over increase in golf entry fees

There is a problem building in amateur golf and the battle lines are being struck right now.

Of course, it has to do with money.

But there are arguments on both sides and it is obvious the test is going to continue.

"The first under the microscope is this weekend's Burley Amateur."

Professional Earl Simpson raised his entry fee to \$50 for the two-day event and evidently will see perhaps the smallest field in many, many years.

Simpson says he is aware that \$50 for two days is a bit of money but he points out a good portion of the demand for that increase comes from the players themselves.

"Since they (the US Golf Association) increased the allowable limit an amateur can win (and still maintain his status) to \$400 per event, everyone is saying they like to have a \$400 prize for each flight winner," Simpson says.

"Now, there are only two ways you can do that. The first is to go out to the merchants in your home town who are being pumped for money two and three times a day anymore and ask for donations for added money that simply is added to the top of the entry fee list. The other way is to take the entry fee to \$50 and cut out the

free chicken dinner or just pay a couple-three places per flight."

Simpson is aware that he thus becomes the stumping fall for the \$50 entry fee.

"Some of his longtime standbys are not entered in this year's meet. And they also have arguments concerning their absence."

"I love to play tournament golf and I do just about every weekend. But it comes to the point of whether I can afford \$50—I swallowed pretty hard when they took it to \$35," one Twin Falls amateur said. "But I've decided I'm not going to play in this one because my feeling is if Burley fills up with a \$50 fee, then everyone will be at \$50 next year."

It won't be long before the \$50 issue is tested again because Mike Hamblin, professional at Twin Falls Municipal, says the Magic Valley Amateur is carrying that fee for its Labor Day run this year.

"It's the increase in the expected pay-back somewhat," Hamblin said. "We discussed it quite a while before we felt we had to go up this year. We have a three-

day tournament plus the special events Saturday, the derbies and the hamburger fry. It all adds up."

"Anyway, you cut it, the probability right now is that at least one of Magic Valley's 'major' amateurs is history."

Del Ericson, who leases and operates Canyon Springs Golf Course in Twin Falls, is maintaining the Canyon Springs Amateur will not have a renewal next July.

"We went out and raised \$5,000 added money, we had \$400 top prize in our flights and we still couldn't get 100 players," Ericson said. "I agonized over how to pay the gross-net situation in the championship flight and finally came up with what I thought was the most equitable way and I just got myself in deeper trouble because of it."

"In my special position, I can make more money taking greens fees on open play, not be hounding my business customers for added money and save myself and my staff a lot of hassle. Weekends always are our biggest days and I really believe that I can net more money just keeping it open."

By and large most tournament chairmen find that \$400 for first place in a flight a very tough nut to crack. Especially if the tournament is run on a gross and net basis.

It leads to no frills, like derbies, driving contests, or meals, and in the end, the money still seldom reaches.

Since that \$400 now is considered the Cadillac of the golfing tour, everyone wants to be there. But the certainty is, if the top guy gets \$400, at least three lower-scoring players in the flight aren't going to get anything.

The old pay system was \$250 maximum. Someone told us the rule of thumb for maximum amateur payback is based on the price of a new set of irons.

Of course, with golf now entering its ninth year of incredible boom, the price of irons is far beyond that and pegged at what the market will bear.

So the inflationary spiral ingredients are there. If the \$50 entry fee becomes an accepted norm, the next move will be from the USGA and PGA in raising the maximum another hundred or two.

"But the one thing I can't understand," says Simpson, with his tongue pushing his cheek well out, "Some of the guys who are telling me they can't afford \$50 are plunking out \$300 to \$500 to play in their club's member-guest."

BOSTON (AP) — Dennis "Oil Can" Boyd pitched a perfect game for 6 1/3 innings Thursday night as the Boston Red Sox improved their record to 8-0 under manager Joe Morgan with a 6-1 victory over the Chicago White Sox.

Backed by two first-inning runs, Boyd, 37, retired the first 19 batters before former Red Sox player Steve Lyons lined a clean single to center field. Harold Baines then struck out and Dan Paqua flied out to end the seventh inning.

Boyd, who threw 80 pitches, was replaced by Tom Bolton to start the eighth on the cool, drizzly night.

Milwaukee 6, Texas 1

MILWAUKEE (AP) — Robin Yount singled, tripled, walked twice and scored twice and Jeffrey Leonard homered Thursday night as the Milwaukee Brewers defeated the Texas Rangers 6-1.

Don August, 6-3, pitched a nine-inning-for-his-fourth complete game, striking out five and walking none. He had a shutout entering the ninth but Pete Incaviglia and Pete O'Brien singled and Incaviglia scored on a fielder's choice.

St. Louis 6, San Francisco 4

Kinder wins decathlon crown

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Gary Kinder, an assistant track coach at New Mexico, held off Tim Bright by six points to win the decathlon in the U.S. Olympic Track and Field Trials on Thursday.

Kinder completed the two-day, 10-event competition with a career-best 8,293 points, just enough to beat Bright's total of 8,287. Bright made it close by running the final event, the 1,600-meter, in 4 minutes, 45.12 seconds. Kinder was 10.27 seconds slower, but he had built up just enough of a margin by winning the ninth event, the javelin.

Kinder moved into the lead by throwing the javelin 217 feet, 6 inches, compared with Bright's 198.8.

Dave Johnson earned the other place on the Olympic team, accumulating a career-best 8,245 points.

Kinder had set the stadium first-day decathlon record on Wednesday with 4,284 points, and held the lead through most of Thursday's final five events.

He was out of the top spot only when Bright set an American decathlon record of 19:41 in the pole vault, the eighth event of the competition, to take a 20-point lead.

Bright, the 1983 NCAA Division II champion from Abilene Christian and the 1987 national champion, made up a 170-point deficit with his record vault, which surpassed by 3/4 inch the mark he had held. The world decathlon pole vault record is 18-5 1/4 by Thierry Vigneron of France.

Bright failed to clear 19-0 1/4, a height never previously attempted by a decathlete.

Tyson starts purse divvy

NEW YORK (AP) — Heavyweight champion Mike Tyson and manager Bill Cayton moved closer to solving their differences Thursday and reached an interim agreement on dividing the purse from the Michael Spinks fight.

Tyson received a check for \$10 million, Cayton was paid \$5 million and trainer Kevin Rooney \$1.5 million.

Richardson reinstated

NEW YORK (AP) — Michael Ray Richardson won clearance to return to the NBA Thursday but his attorney said the former All-Star guard may choose to continue playing in Italy.

Richardson, banned from the league Feb. 25, 1986 after testing positive for drugs, has a two-year guaranteed contract to play with Bologna of the Italian League.

"At this point, he needs that guarantee," said Charles Grantham, Richardson's ex-agent and an official of the Players Association.

Sox suspend Rice

BOSTON (AP) — The Boston Red Sox suspended veteran Jim Rice for three days without pay on Thursday as a result of an altercation with new manager Joe Morgan after Rice was lifted for a pinch-hitter against Minnesota Wednesday night.

The suspension, which became effective prior to the start of a four-game series with the Chicago White Sox, was announced by General Manager Lou Gorman.

"You can't allow any player on the club to question the manager's discipline in any situation during the ballgame," Gorman said.

Yanks get Seattle slugger

NEW YORK (AP) — The New York Yankees acquired veteran designated hitter Ken Phelps from the Seattle Mariners Thursday in exchange for outfielder Jay Buhner, pitcher Rick Balaban and a minor league player to be named later.

Phelps, who turns 34 on Aug. 6, was hitting .284 with 14 home runs and 32 RBI in 72 games for Seattle this season. He is the Mariners' all-time leader with 105 career home runs and entered the current season with a career average of one home run per 12.6 at bats against right-handed pitchers, tops among active players.

Texas rehires Sundberg

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — The Texas Rangers Thursday signed Jim Sundberg in a deal that will pay the veteran catcher about \$30,000 the rest of this season, general manager Tom Creeve said.

Sundberg returns to the team as its all-time hit leader, batting .263 with 64 home runs and 459 RBI from 1974 to 1983. He has a career lifetime batting average of .248 and has won six American League Gold Gloves since entering the majors in 1974.

"I went after my best suit," allied South. "With a little luck, I could have won five spade tricks to gain us two overtricks."

"I may suggest individualism was showing," chastised North. "At the cost of two possible overtricks, you could have multiplied your chances to cinch the game by enlisting the help of the enemy."

North then explained the best line. "Winning the club ace immediately and drawing trumps was correct. Playing the spades yourself was not. Instead, you should have exited with a club, giving the lead to the defense. They would cash and cashing two diamonds, the defenders would become your best friends. If they lead a minor, you get a trick-and-if they lead the game-going trick—if they lead a spade, you can't cross without picking up the suit."

Families find TV bans successful

TWIN FALLS — Their television set is off this summer for the third year running, but the McBride children are surviving and — even more shocking — they're having fun.

If you drive by their home during the evening, you'll probably see them in the front yard playing baseball — 10-year-old Jonathan and 9-year-old Christina dutifully abiding by the rules, and little 4-year-old Molly blissfully batting for whatever team happens to be up at the time.

And the neighbor kids will be out there, too, vicariously benefiting from the McBride's TV boycott. They're drawn out of their homes like metal filings to a magnet when they see some real-life action going on across the street.

Jan McBride, the children's mother and co-enforcer of the summer program along with her husband, Mike, tells how it all began three years ago.

She says that one week into the summer vacation, she noticed an alarming pattern developing between her children and the television set: after watching it for an hour or so, and then turning it off at her request, they'd immediately say, "We're bored. There's nothing to do."

"It was frightening, almost as if the TV was draining all of their creativity," she remembers. "When it was turned off, they couldn't think of ways to entertain themselves."

And so she sold one television and put the other in the attic.

"And you know," she says, "I don't think I heard them say 'We're bored,' for the rest of that summer."

The family went for long bike rides together in the evening, played basketball and baseball, read and often just sat on the porch and talked.

And, something McBride worried about just didn't happen: Her kids did not slip over to the neighbors to watch television. Quite the opposite. She always found her house and yard full of more than her own three children because it appeared the neighbor kids liked what the McBrides were doing more than their favorite sit-coms.

And that's the way McBride likes it. When children get together without a television to distract them, they seem to squeeze creative juices from each other.

"Last night they were all playing field hockey with golf clubs and balls," says McBride. "They just kept finding new things to do and adapting the equipment to suit their needs."

McBride says she has nothing against television per se, just what it seemed to be doing to her kids. Her decision to remove the set wasn't meant to

Dan says it really wasn't "that bad," and he often forgives he's still not on the bot. The year away from TV weaned him from it a bit. He checks with his mom now before turning on the set, and says he doesn't really remember what programs he liked watching before he started the boycott.

"I made my sketchboard a lot and played Nintendo with my friends. You can ask Casey. He'll tell you."

The sound of a scuffle follows and laughter. Casey Frieder, Dan's best friend, never did get on the line but made Dan promise his name would appear in the article.

Dan's friends "were pretty nice" about the project and didn't try to sway him from his goal.

"Oh, they'd joke about it sometimes when I

Daniels looks forward to Idaho shows

JACKPOT, Nev. — The two Charlie Daniels Band performers Sunday at Cactus Pete's in Jackpot have sold out faster than any other show in the casino's history.

"I think that's fantastic," Daniels said in a telephone interview Wednesday. "Are there a lot of cowboys up there?"

The country-western singer, famous for drinking his baby good-bye and out-fiddling the devil, says the CDB has been a favorite with cowboys for a long time and the band really likes to play for them in out-of-the-way western towns.

"We don't get to do stuff like that very often; to go out and play in small places like that," Daniels says, "and we've been

looking forward to gettin' up there and playing for those guys."

Hesitant to call himself a "redneck" because of its variety of meanings, Daniels says he's a Christian who likes to ride horses, team rope, go fishing, shoot guns, eat grits and eggs for breakfast and, in general, be out of doors.

Standing 6-foot-tall at 250 pounds, wearing a size 7-3/8 hat and size 11 boots, the bearded Tennessee rancher has produced 14 albums since his CDB formed about 17 years ago.

The hard-driving blues-rocker has had several gold albums and three multiple-platinum collections. He has a Grammy Award and four Country Music Association honors from such hits as "Long-Haired Country Boy," "Still In Saigon," "American Farmer," "The Devil Went Down to Geor-

gia" and "Drinkin' My Baby Goodbye."

The latest CDB album, scheduled to be released in September, is called "Homestead Heroes." The single to be released from that LP is "Bonnie-Woogie Fiddle Country Blues."

When asked to describe the sound of this new release, the singer says, "It's easily recognizable. It sounds like us."

Born the son of a North Carolina lumberjack in 1937, Daniels grew up to the sound of bluegrass music. At age 15 he was performing on guitar and in 1956 he began working as a professional rock 'n' roll musician.

During the '60s, Daniels recorded in Nashville studios behind Marty Robbins, Flatt and Scruggs, Ringo Starr, Bob Dylan and other pop and country hit makers.

Fontaine pays tribute to rock 'n' roll

JACKPOT, Nev. — Goodness-Gracious! Great balls of fire!

Louie Fontaine and the Rockets will be blasting through the Gala Room at Cactus Pete's tonight and through the weekend, a-rockin' and a-rollin' around a medley of '50s and '60s golden oldie tunes.

The Seattle-based group bops and weaves through tributes to Elvis Presley, Patsy Cline and Paul Revere and the Raiders. They high-step through numbers honoring Motown and Creedence Clearwater.

"All we do is old rock 'n' roll and classic tunes," a grinning Fontaine tells his audience.

Fontaine, who used to play with Paul Revere and the Raiders, opened in Jackpot on

Monday night to a modest crowd of reserved casino diners.

"Jimmy Christmas!" exclaimed an elderly woman, jumping when sound exploded from Peavey speakers lining the small platform stage.

Fontaine, short, stocky and exuberant, skillfully leads the five-member band through such songs as "A Whole Lot of Shakin' Going On," "Splish, Splash," "Dream Lover," "My Little Runaway," "Pretty Woman" and "Rockin' Robin."

Powerful vocals, good instrumentals and energetic, simple choreography lend themselves well to a fast-paced mixture of classic tunes.

Fontaine also intersperses his show with comedy routines and a patter of off-the-cuff humor.

At his best, he's funny.

In costume, as Luke the Cow-

boy, Fontaine sings a clever parody of a classic western song. He sings another to an imaginary estranged wife, titled, "I Hope You're Livin' As High on the Hog as the Pig You Turned Out to Be."

At his worst, Fontaine's jokes range from sophomoric to offensive.

The enjoyable dinner show, which should clip right along, begins to lose momentum.

"I've got to actually make a couple crude remarks," Fontaine says after the show. "I just like the audience to enjoy themselves and be loose. The people going to casino shows, sometimes they're so uptight, really stiff."

Still out of breath, a very affable Fontaine sits in his dressing room, cigarette in hand, instead of a tux, he's now wearing white sneakers, cotton pants and a loose-fitting, green-tinted shirt

'Arthur 2' should include surgeon general's warning

The following are capsule reviews of some of the films playing locally in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and the opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

ARTHUR 2 ON THE ROCKS (PG). This is so excruciating it should come with a surgeon general's warning. "This sort of stupidity may save your will to live or to watch movies ever again." It rips the irrepressible Arthur Bach (Dudley Moore), still richer than Donald Trump's widest dreams, and his now-wife Linda (Liza Minnelli), still besotted with him, although this time it is impossible to know why. Back for the merest of moments is John Gielgud, this time as Arthur's guardian angel, with lines that make you cringe for him. If limp, offensive humor and lousy character motivation were not enough, Bud Yorkin's direction is alternately awkward and show-offy.

BIG (PG). Funny, warm, sophisticated and highly imaginative comedy-fantasy in which a 12-year-old boy is transformed into a man. It comes true. Then the 12-year-old with the body of a 30-year-old winds up vice president of development at a toy company. . . Wonderful fun. With Tom Hanks, Elizabeth Perkins, John Heard, Robert Loggia, Jared Rushton



and David Moscow.

COMING TO AMERICA (R). As a 21-year-old princeling of Zamunda, a mythical African kingdom, Murphy yams in his scatological, making do with a soupçon of bathroom humor. John Landis, directing from Murphy's original story, "has created a plentiful waste of time and money. Also stars Arsenio Hall, John Amos and James Earl Jones.

THE DEAD POOL (R). Nobody squints like Clint, and in this fifth of the Eastwood "Dirty Harry" series, our man once again squints up a storm, descending gingerly into another cesspool of urban slime and '44 magnum-sexuality — along with a cult horror director (Liam Neeson), whose betting pool on celebrity deaths buckfires bloodily. Eastwood is good as always — full of coiled tension and wry, whispering irony — but the movie has an overly stylized media-fable script and nearly styelezed direction by Malpas's second unit specialist, Buddy Van Horn. Predictably, only the action scenes come alive: especially one tongue-in-cheek toy-car

parody of the chase in "Bullitt." **DIE HARD (R).** Archtypal big-deal Hollywood exploitation, technically breathtaking yet disgusting and silly. Bruce Willis, however, is terrific as a witty New York cop conducting a one-man war against a bunch of terrorists who have taken over a Los Angeles office tower. With Reginald VelJohnson, Bonnie Bedelia and Alan Rickman.

LICENSE TO DRIVE (PG-13). In their theatrical feature debuts writer Neil Tikin and director Greg Beaman get as carried away as their young hero (Corey Haim) who has just failed his driver's license exam but cannot resist borrowing his grandfather's vintage Cadillac for an unexpected date with the most beautiful girl (Heather Graham) in school.

Hairbreadth predicaments ensue, but the film's makers forget to bring impressive young audiences down to earth in regard to legal and safe driving. Lots of fun, however, along the way. With Corey Feldman, Carol Kane, Richard Masur.

SHORT CIRCUIT 2 (PG). More adorable robot highinks: with Fisher Stevens, Michael McKeen (a fine, wily job) and the blissful runaway cyborg, Number Five — who looks something

like a praying Minolta, and has country cousin misadventures in the Big City. There is nothing really wrong with this movie, though some adults should avoid it strenuously. The film rolls along, doing its job so efficiently, mechanically and coyly, it often seems like a winking, flirtatious robot itself.

WHO FRAMED ROGER RABBIT (PG). Dames, satisfying, feverishly inventive and a technical marvel. "Who Framed Roger Rabbit" has

Robert Zemeckis ("Back to the Future") as its director and Richard Williams, an Academy Award winner for "A Christmas Carol" (1972), as director of animation, under the joint banners of Disney's Touchstones and Steven Spielberg's Amblin companies. All hands and the artists involved may have created a film that no one sees just once. But — animation aside — the treasure of the piece is Bob Hoskins pungent, visceral comic performance.

Herman and Gillespie, Jackson was a founding member of the Modern Jazz Quartet. Then in 1957 he was appointed to the faculty of the School of Jazz in Lenox, Mass.

Jackson has played and recorded with almost all of the jazz greats. He has been playing in clubs and doing concerts as a single and with a quartet, as well as traveling with a quintet to Japan and Europe.

Bass player Percy Heath was raised in Philadelphia where he sang on a children's radio program. This entitled the youngsters to special theater passes and they were allowed to go backstage and shake hands with such jazz greats as Fats Waller, Louis Armstrong and Duke Ellington.

Heath's father was an automobile mechanic who also played clarinet and his mother sang in the church choir. The musical influence rubbed off and Heath learned to play the violin. Later he studied the bass and took harmony classes at the Granoff School of Music in Philadelphia.

His early associates included Howard McGhee, J.J. Johnson and Art Blakey. Then in 1950 he joined Dizzy Gillespie's band. He has recorded on his own and with other groups and also performs with his brothers Jimmy and Albert.

Pianist John Lewis was born in Illinois but grew up in Albuquerque. Lewis began piano lessons at age six and wanted to quit but was not permitted to do so. By the time he was 15, he was working in dance halls and

nightclubs. As a student at the University of New Mexico he led a dance band. Coming back from army service in Europe, he went to the Manhattan School of Music, then played with Miles Davis, Illinois Jacquet and Dizzy Gillespie before the founding of the Modern Jazz Quartet.

Lewis has performed and recorded extensively with symphony orchestras and from 1958 to 1984 was musical director of the Monterey Jazz Festival. In 1962 he organized an ensemble of leading jazz and classical musicians called Orchestra U.S.A. Drummer Connie Kay grew

up in the Bronx where his mother taught her unwilling son piano, but also indulged his percussive sensibilities by letting him stay up to listen to Cab Calloway broadcasts. One of his first jobs was in a Harlem nightclub where he performed with a young trumpet player named Miles Davis.

As his name got around, he worked with musicians who were to be among the great men of jazz — Lester Young, Charlie Parker, Coleman Hawkins and Stan Getz. He joined the Modern Jazz Quartet in 1955.

shelter them from what might be on it, but to encourage them not to rely on a passive form of entertainment.

She says the only drawback she found when they had no TV at all, was missing the news. For that reason alone, they kept the television out of the attic last summer and just disconnected the cable service so the family could have the option of watching only that portion of programming. That's the plan of attack again this year.

Limited television really wasn't a completely new concept at the McBride home. Even during the school year the children were not supposed to turn on the set after dinner.

"I just don't think homework gets done properly if the kids have one eye on the TV while they're doing it," says McBride.

She tells other parents who might be considering the "No TV" option not to worry that they will be stuck inside a house full of kids with cartoon withdrawal.

She explains that she hasn't reverted to super-human efforts to entertain the kids during these long summer days without the television. She gives them a few suggestions and says they take it from there.

"Because they know it's not an option anymore, they don't rely on the TV and really do make the most of their summer vacation," McBride says.

And if a summer without the set goes well, why not eliminate it all together?

At a time when several of the new fall TV series feature former stars and recycled premises, CBS's "Blue Skies," a summer replacement series that airs Mondays, fits right in. This one has a decidedly old-fashioned feel.

Tom Wopat plays an advertising-executive-turned-mill owner. Season Hubley plays a sophisticated New Yorker vacationing in his Oregon town who decides to give up high society for small-town values and marriage to him. Between them, they have three children. Sound sort of familiar? Well, what if we hum, "Here's the story, of a lovely lady..." Or what about "Green Acres is the place to be..." "Blue Skies" sounds an awful lot like a modern "Brady Bunch," with a splash of "Green Acres" thrown in.

Critic claims TV vacation worthwhile

It may be something akin to professional suicide for a TV critic to advocate video abstinence, but my recent summer vacation convinced me of the value of going without — at least some of the time.

Analysis

Unlike many people with what might be considered "normal" jobs, it is difficult for TV critics to totally escape their profession even when they are out of the office. And, as it happens, I have never been so inclined anyway.

I have always found it genuinely entertaining, for instance, when traveling around the United States, to compare local newscasts — which city has the anchor team with the biggest

For Wopat, however, it's also the vehicle he was looking for to re-establish himself after the demise of the successful "The Dukes of Hazzard," in which Wopat and co-star John Schneider played good ol' boys.

"I'm trying to maintain myself as a leading man, so there are only certain types of roles I'll take," Wopat says. "I'd like to do a meaningful film, like 'All the President's Men,' and I'd have to have at least a significant secondary role." But like many stars coming off a series, Wopat has had some trouble finding "meaningful" roles.

"I basically located myself in Nashville and worked at being a country singer," he says. "I also did an off-Broadway show, so I kept busy."

But until "Blue Skies," it looked like Wopat would be an ex-Duke for a long time. "I was a little surprised when I was cast in this, because I haven't seen that much action in the past few years," he admits. "This is a total departure from the Dukes. One of the producers saw me being interviewed on the CBS morning news, and he liked some sort of rural quality, in me. Well, that's what they wanted;

that's what they got. I just hope this will help me establish some acting credibility."

Despite the departure offered by this role, however, Wopat readily admits that in many ways "The Dukes of Hazzard" was one of the best things that has happened to him.

"There's nothing I can do about being identified with that role, because it was such a phenomenon," he says. "It probably won't be repeated again in my career."

Wopat also admits that few things were as fun as being a Duke, lofty goals aside. "Shooting 'Blue Skies' wasn't fun the way 'Dukes' was fun," he says. "It wasn't wild and wacky, but it was satisfying. Thinking about 'Dukes' is like looking back at high school. You might never be happy like that again, but everyone has to grow up."

'Santa Barbara' finds good luck; wins Best Dramatic Series Emmy

Talk about a run of good luck. NBC can't seem to do anything wrong. After slogging along with the new soap "Santa Barbara" in the afternoon, always losing to "General Hospital" and "Guiding Light" in the ratings, the longshot rookie suddenly wins Best Dramatic Series in the recent Daytime Emmy Awards. Surprise, surprise, surprise.

Recognition by vote may attract the curious. After all, the oldtimers have always maintained that it takes five years for a soap to gain acceptance. No one can sneer now at four-year-old "Santa Barbara," which is maturing after a management reshuffle and is overcoming its story problems about the stumbling Mexican hero Cruz and those wealthy dingbats, the Capwells.

"Santa Barbara" is even attracting quality names. The deaf actress Phyllis Frelich, a Tony winner for "Children of a Lesser God" on Broadway, has just joined the cast as Sister Sarah, a nun at the lovely old mission on the hill. She was discovered locked in the basement because, as Father Michael claims, she sleepwalks. Sister Sarah knows some things that Father Michael wants to keep hidden. Julia realizes Sarah can offer enlightenment in many ways.

Frelich's presence gives everybody a boost, especially the young actors. Phyllis works through an interpreter, usually her husband, Bob Steinberg, and reads lips.

In her company you become mesmerized by her hand signals and begin slowly to connect. Then humor pops out in the signing and you begin to feel at ease. Frelich knows her lines, and her husband signs any information from the director.

Last seen in the Hallmark Hall of Fame "Love is Never Silent," Phyllis is the first deaf actress to land a steady job on a soap. Of course, it's a breakthrough. Such roles are few and far between.

Born to deaf parents in Devil's Lake, N.D., one of eight deaf offspring, Phyllis turned to acting while

a student at Washington, D.C.'s illustrious school for the deaf, Gallaudet College. It took nerve to switch from library training to acting, but Phyllis displayed obvious talent and moved quickly into the National Theater of the Deaf.

With TV guest spots on "Barney Miller" and "Gimme a Break," her national tour of "Children of a Lesser God" and New York and Los Angeles stage plays, Frelich has become the most visible deaf performer in the business (along with Marlee Matlin, who won the Best Actress Oscar for the movie version of "Children").

Her talent is clear, but obtaining material is a problem. "Santa Barbara," at least, plans to keep Phyllis busy. This woman won't stand for being a mere window display. Sister Sa-

rah may even leave the cloth and take up life in the outside world. The growing viewership of prize-winning "Santa Barbara" will be the first to know.

When this year's Daytime Emmy winner Helen Gallagher took the role of Maeve Ryan on "Ryan's Hope" 13 years ago, she had an ulterior motive. It seems Helen, who had been honored with a Tony Award for "No No Nanette," wanted to star in a summer stock production of "Gypsy." She soon found out that, outside of the Great White Way, Helen Gallagher wasn't a big enough name to carry a touring production. An agent suggested she

 hair; which "Action News" broadcast makes the most of the least action around town; which, if any, TV station in the country has an unfriendly anchor team? There are times I have even looked to TV as a travel companion — familiar faces in even the most remote destination. I remember some years back translating New York City cop-shop slang for my British hosts in London.

But for a variety of reasons, on this year's vacation I was either unwilling or unable to watch one minute of prime-time television.

On the one hand, while I was relaxing in Maine and New Hampshire, it seemed tantamount to original sin to bathe myself in those sickly blue-white rays when I could be sunning myself beside a trout stream. And even when I did get to a television set at my brother-in-law's house in New Hampshire, it was black-and-white.

At first, the sensation was decidedly odd, uncomfortable. I felt as though I had a big thirst in a dry town.

As the anxiety subsided and I turned to other forms of entertainment — books, music, conversation

— I realized more than ever the power of television in its most negative sense. I have seen it in the glazed eyes of my 3-year-old, who seems incapable of hearing or answering me as she watches "Pinocchio" for the hundredth time. I have seen it in the "Stepford Wives" sincerity of TV actors and producers who explain that a sitcom on the order of Suzanne Somers' "She's the Sheriff" can shed light on profound social issues such as AIDS and drug abuse.

Too often when we plug into television it suspends our judgment and sense of place. And for the genuine couch potato there is a danger of being sapped of the ability to think at all, to merely reflect the reflections.

A colleague takes great joy from time to time in depositing on my desk newsletters from a fringe group called Society for the Eradication of Television.

I stop far short of its goal to have citizens "remove televisions from their homes" and its that television absolutely "retards the inner life of human beings, destroys human interaction, squanders time and draws viewers into abject addiction" (Their rather unenlightening newsletter is, in my view, proof that they may not be making the best use of all that non-TV time they have on their hands).

Television has come too far, too fast and is, in fact, too valuable in proper doses to be vanquished from society.

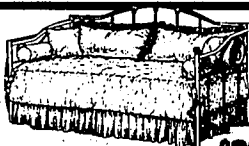

CBS shuffles important executives

NEW YORK — CBS shuffled its top executives Wednesday to put news division president Howard Stringer in charge of entertainment, news and other broadcast operations, and filled his job with David W. Burke, who had been the No. 2 executive at ABC News.

Gene F. Jankowski, whose current job as president of the CBS Broadcast Group will be filled by Stringer, will move upstairs to become the group's chairman, a new post, officials announced at a news conference here. But sources close to the company said Jankowski will probably remain only for a transitional period, and made clear that the most important job at the division will be Stringer's, who will report directly to Chief Executive Officer Laurence A. Tisch.

The moves mark the most important rearrangement of the executive suite since Tisch took over at CBS in September 1986 and raised eyebrows among some CBS journalists and Wall Street analysts. The analysts pointed out that Stringer has had no direct experience in entertainment

programming, while the journalists questioned whether the once-supreme broadcast news operation needed to pick a president for the first time from outside its ranks.

Tisch strongly defended the choices, describing Stringer as "one of the most knowledgeable people in programming." Tisch said that Jankowski, who has filled the job for 11 years, came to him last week to propose a change in command, and had independently concluded that Stringer would be the best choice to succeed him.

Asked why CBS had gone outside to fill the news job, Tisch said that the next highest ranking CBS News officials were "new in their jobs." "We will develop the people, and we hope CBS never again has to go to outsiders to fill such a position," he said.

Stringer, a native of Wales and a 23-year CBS news veteran, has won Tisch's confidence in the past two years as he headed the news division during a stormy period in which it cut staff sharply and struggled to maintain the ratings lead of its centerpiece evening news program.

The new appointment, which be-

comes effective Aug. 1, was hinted last spring, when Stringer attended CBS' big fall programming conference in Los Angeles — much to the surprise of some CBS programming executives.

Stringer's appointment may raise questions within CBS about whether the cost-conscious Tisch hopes to use less expensive programming from the news division to fill out its programming lineup, former CBS executives said. There have been rumors that CBS might, for example, try to recycle some old news footage or documentaries this fall to fill in gaps left by the writers' strike.

But Stringer declined to spell out any specific plans for programming at the network. "We'll just be seeking quality programming," he said.

Although he has no entertainment programming experience, Stringer has been behind the creation of such news series as "West 57th Street" and, more recently, "48 Hours." Stringer was executive vice president of the news division between January, 1984, and October, 1986, and was executive producer of the "CBS Evening News" between 1981 and 1984.

All-Star Game leads week

NEW YORK (AP) — Baseball's All-Star Game on ABC was the top-rated television program last week, but NBC's loyal couch potatoes kept the peacock No. 1 by coming back for second helpings of popular shows.

Despite what some fans considered a dull 2-1 victory by the American League, the All-Star Game had a rating of 20.5 and 36 percent of the Monday night viewing audience, according to figures released Tuesday by the A.C. Nielsen Co.

It was the best rating for the game since 1985, said Gerald Jaffe, NBC's vice president for research.

The All-Star pre-game show also did well, placing 11th for the week with a 14.6 rating.

The only other original programming in the top-10 was CBS' "60 Minutes." The rest were NBC reruns: "The Cosby Show," "Golden Girls," "A Different World," "Night Court," "Hunter," "Cheers," "Amen" and "The Abdication of Keri Swensen."

For the week ending July 17, NBC

won with an average rating of 11.8, followed by ABC at 10.5 and CBS at 9.6. For the 43 weeks of the current season, NBC leads at 15.1, followed by CBS at 12.7 and ABC at 12.6.

The rating is a percentage of the nation's estimated 88.6 million households with televisions. The share is a percentage of sets in use.

Among the big three networks, CBS had the week's least-watched prime-time program, a preview of the Democratic National Convention which attracted a 4.4 rating.

CBS had the top-rate evening news program with an average rating of 9.1, followed by ABC at 9.0 and NBC at 8.7.
