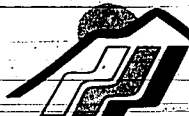

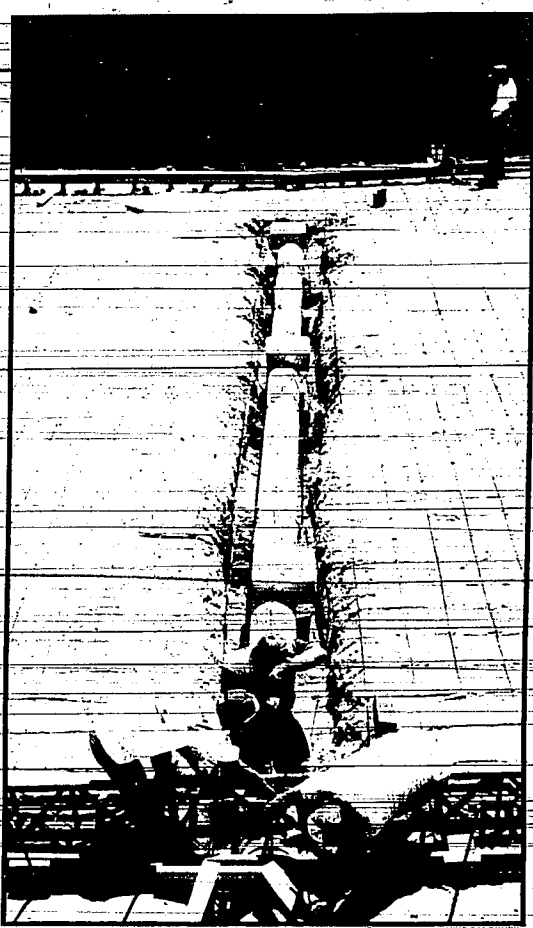

Ortega threatens all-out military offensive

 MANAGUA, Nicaragua — President Daniel Ortega warned the U.S. Congress Thursday night that if it votes more war funds for the Contra rebels, his government will launch an all-out military offensive against them and clamp down on the political opposition.

Ortega also said the Congress would "shatter the negotiating table" for talks between the Sandinista government and the Contras. He "will the possibility for peace in Central America if new Contra funds are approved."

Ortega spoke out as Congress neared a vote on aid, and three days before the first anniversary of the Central American peace plan.

Earlier Thursday in neighboring Costa Rica, the principal author of that peace plan, President Oscar Arias, rebuked the Sandinista government for what he called "major sins" in failing to implement the democratic reforms required under it.

However, the Nobel Peace Prize winner also warned that U.S. congressional approval of new military aid to the Contras would damage the peace process and sully what he described as the improving international image of Washington's Central America policy.

In Washington, Senate Democrats and Republicans reported the possibility of recording an aid bill that would provide no immediate military aid but would establish a procedure for prompt release of impounded funds under certain circumstances.

Ortega warned, "The Yankee president and

Congress should be aware that if they approve more funds to continue the war against Nicaragua, they will be leading us into a total military confrontation with their necessary forces."

"They will be forcing us to take all the measures we deem necessary so as not to leave the most minimal space for our internal enemies," he added, referring to the opposition parties. Nicaragua will support U.S. policy will be left without oxygen," Ortega said.

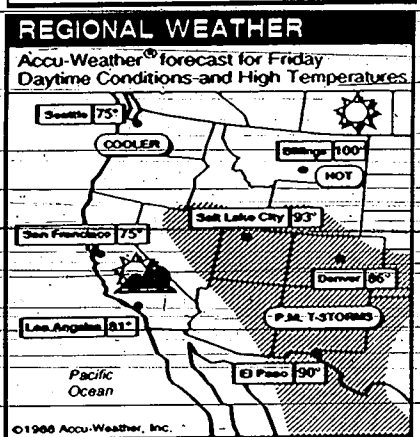
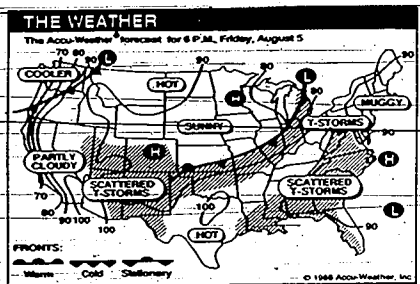

Biaggi, 70, was downcast as the jury foreman, Maria Andino, a dietitian for the Veterans Administration, announced the verdicts to U. S. District Court Judge Constance Baker Motley. He was found guilty on 15 of 16 counts.

The white-haired congressman took off his glasses, then held his head in his hands. He left the courtroom complaining of chest pains and was assisted to the courthouse nurse's office where his family picked him up. He already faces expulsion from the House, and 2 1/2 years in prison, because of last year's conviction.

If the convictions are upheld, the racketeering law calls for forfeitures, and they will be substantial, according to an agreement reached Thursday afternoon by all attorneys.

Biaggi, who was accused of looting Wedtech of \$12 million before it went bankrupt, was ordered to surrender \$11.7 million. He will be allowed to keep his home in Scarsdale, two cars and \$300,000 in cash that his wife is holding.

Biaggi and his longtime partner in a New York law firm, Bernard Ehrlich, will each have to pay \$300,000 in escrow until appeals are resolved.

The highest bid for the \$25,000, was assessed against former Bronx Borough President Stanley Simon, a Democrat. He was convicted of racketeering conspiracy, extortion of \$50,000 from Wedtech, income tax evasion and three other felonies.

Latah OKs 25% pay raises

MOSCOW (AP) — The Latah County Commission has tentatively adopted a new salary plan for elected officials that means 25 percent raises for commissioners, about \$4,000 a year.

Under the new plan, elected officials would lose annual longevity increases but would be paid in relationship to a \$27,000 base salary. Each year, the base salary rate could be increased, but the percentages would remain the same, said Deputy Auditor Barb Karoska.

The commissioners also plan to give courthouse employees 8 percent pay increases in 1989. That would raise the average clerk's salary from \$1,045 a month to \$1,190 a month, said Karoska. Employees also will be eligible for 2 percent longevity increases after working five years.

Montana Rail sees sabotage

SANDPOINT (AP) — Montana Rail Link officials say one of its tracks was sabotaged east of Sandpoint Wednesday evening, causing a train to spill 2,000 gallons of fuel.

No one was injured in the accident.

Bernie Bidwell, the railway's director of operations services in Missouri, said two locomotive tanks apparently were punctured by debris piled on the tracks, causing extensive damage.

Montana Rail Link has been plagued by vandalism and other problems since the firm was purchased from Burlington Northern. Bidwell said the incident has been reported to the FBI.

Pollution grant expected

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — State environmental officials expect to hear from federal officials on a bid for \$500,000 in state and federal funds to study pollution sources and monitoring of the Rathdrum Aquifer.

The 11-point proposal, which includes \$850,000 in federal money and \$150,000 in state money, was assembled by Ron Lustig, Panhandle Health District environmental health director in Coeur d'Alene, and state Division of Environmental Quality officials.

Last month, the federal government released \$700,000 in Clean Water Act funds to study the aquifer and \$650,000 to study pollution on the 283-acre Rathdrum Aquifer, Lustig said.

Democrat drops from race

BOISE (AP) — Rep. Dean Haagensohn, R-Coeur d'Alene, has lost his Democratic opponent for the fall election.

The secretary of state's office said Thursday Tom Tuggart of Rathdrum, the Democratic candidate, has withdrawn, citing family and business reasons.

Haagensohn, a Coeur d'Alene contractor, is in his sixth year in the House and is chairman of the Resources and Conservation Committee.

His only remaining opponent, unless Democrats pick a replacement for Tuggart, is independent candidate Ron Rankin of Coeur d'Alene.

Man drowns in canal swim

EMMETT (AP) — A 21-year-old Caldwell man has drowned after he attempted to swim through a tunnel on the Black Canyon Canal near Emmett.

Gem County Sheriff Bill McConnell said his name was being withheld pending notification of relatives.

The man was swimming with three other friends from Caldwell when the drowning occurred at 4:45 p.m. Wednesday about 36 miles southwest of Emmett, McConnell said.

The tunnel on the canal where the drowning occurred is 1,800 feet long. The water inside is up to 20 feet deep and the air space between the water and the top of the tunnel is about three feet, McConnell said.

"Four went in and three came out," McConnell said. "One of the others barely made it. It's very hazardous and is off limits to swimmers."

Home schooling comes under intense scrutiny

POCATELLO (AP) — Administrators are asking the school board to intensify regulations governing home schooling in Pocatello, but trustees want a longer look at the proposal.

Board members, scheduling the issue for its next meeting, have tried to assure the three dozen home school families in the district that they have no intention of curtailing their rights or casting doubt on their educational programs.

But Assistant Superintendent Jack Thompson said he believes the board "is uncomfortable with reporting procedures on how the children are being educated."

Recently, the district received a number of complaints about children supposedly being home schooled, who were left unattended and seen outside playing.

Board members, Thompson said, "are charged with assuring that all children in the district get a good education and it is difficult in many cases to tell if the home school students are getting that education."

The proposed policy specifies the hours children are to be in classes, following the attendance standards set by the state Board of Education.

"The office has a copy of the new proposal and we are studying it," said Bannock County Prosecutor Larry Echolaw, whose office forced a number of home schoolers to comply with the current curriculum reporting requirements.

Tests show lead contamination in tequila

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — A federal laboratory has confirmed that samples of a brand of tequila marketed throughout Idaho contained unsafe amounts of lead, a Panhandle Health District official says.

Shirlene Sementi, senior environmental health specialist, said the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms laboratory in Maryland found a lead content of 0.7 parts per million in samples of Idaho Gold tequila taken from a Coeur d'Alene restaurant.

That amount is 14 times higher than the level allowed in safe drinking water.

Idaho Gold is Mexican-made tequila out and bottled at Frank-Lin Distillers in San Jose, Calif. The product is marketed in Idaho by Cougar Gulch Distilling of Coeur d'Alene.

Bureau spokeswoman Dot Koester said testing is now under way on tequila samples taken from vats and unopened bottles at Frank-Lin's plant, and from unprocessed bulk shipments the company receives from Mexico.

Results on those tests are expected next week, she said.

Officials said the federal government cannot regulate the manufacture of the uncut tequila in Mexico, but it can prohibit the distribution of it in the United States if it does not meet health standards.

The Idaho Liquor Dispensary banned sale of the product last week.

John Stevens, a chemist with Frank-Lin Distillers, said the company does not test its liquor products for lead contamination. Until he was alerted about the

tainted tequila, he said, his company never had a complaint regarding tequila bottled at Frank-Lin Distillers.

"We feel comfortable that all of our products that we have are tequila done at Frank-Lin's is fine," Carter Mitchell of the Washington Board said.

The Panhandle Health District began its investigation of Idaho Gold in several women dining together at the Red Street restaurant, were treated for nausea and vomiting when they became ill after eating a beef dish and drinking a cocktail containing the tequila.

Ms. Sementi said the amount of lead found in an unopened bottle of Idaho Gold at the restaurant was seven times higher than the amount found in the federal tests. Another bottle with a different fill date on the label was free of any lead.

Officials with state liquor control agencies in Washington and Oregon said they have not received any alerts from ATF regarding tequila bottled at Frank-Lin Distillers.

County magistrate charged with drunk driving

CALDWELL (AP) — Canyon County Magistrate Swafford was charged with drunk driving Tuesday night near Middleton and charged with drunken driving, according to court records.

Swafford, 47, was stopped by Idaho State Police Sgt. Robert Storm at about 7:20 p.m. two miles east of Interstate 84 on Highway 44. He was taken into custody and posted a \$500 surety bond.

Swafford was arrested Thursday and court records show that charges were filed against him Tuesday.

Police officials said the arrest was routine.

According to the citation, Swafford submitted to a blood alcohol test at the Canyon County Jail to determine blood alcohol content. The citation indicated that Swafford was tested twice, with results of 0.10 and 0.12 percent blood-alcohol content. Under Idaho law, a person is legally drunk if a blood alcohol content measurement is 0.10 percent or higher.

Canyon County prosecutors said in an affidavit that charges were filed Tuesday against Swafford, who as a magistrate regulates the drunk driving cases.

Swafford is scheduled for arraignment Monday.

Third District Court Administrator Stephen Bouch said a magistrate outside the 3rd Judicial District will be appointed by the Idaho Supreme Court to handle the case.

Bouch said the court has taken no action against Swafford, who as a magistrate regulates the drunk driving cases.

Crews gaining upper hand against stubborn Idaho fires

Fire bosses declared the Stewart-Gulch range fire officially controlled Thursday after it burned 2,300 acres within a few miles of the state Capitol in Boise, and they were nearing full control on two forest fires to the north.

Near the Wyoming border, meanwhile, crews mounted a directed assault on the head of the rain-dampened 1,300-acre Spring Canyon fire in eastern Idaho, and strategists hoped to "completely ring the fire with break fire by day's end.

Crews contained the Stewart-Gulch range fire late Wednesday, after quickly squelching a 15-acre last-minute rupture in the lines. No structures were ever seriously threatened by the blaze.

Manpower was continuing to be shifted from the 5,000-acre Willis Gulch fire about 35 miles northeast of Boise and the 200-acre Riordan Lake fire near Cascade, and managers expected control on both these blazes Thursday night.

A lightning strike sparked the Riordan Lake fire in remote rugged terrain, but the Willis Gulch fire was man-caused. Investigators were still trying to determine the exact cause.

Rehabilitation work was under way at the fire sites, and only a handful of crews were being retained to mop up the Riordan Lake and Willis Gulch fires, which destroyed over \$7.5 million in timber and other resources and cost more than \$2 million to extinguish.

Demobilization at the Willis Gulch fire freed up a double rotor Chinook helicopter for the battle in Spring Canyon, about eight miles east of Swan Valley.

That helicopter, capable of carrying 1,000 gallons of water on each trip, and five smaller choppers dumped water on the head of the fire to keep it cool while over 500 firefighters finished digging in the line that blocked any further advance of the flames.

Rain that kept the fire quiet on Wednesday created dangerously slick conditions for crews working the mountainous area and precluded backburning operations to clear fuels between established lines of the fire front.

But fire bosses targeted the situation to their advantage by making a direct assault on the head of the fire, linking the two flanking break lines.

Symms' drift to right weakens Idaho voice

Sen. Steve Symms is hardly ever at a loss for words, so we have no doubts that he will have a ready explanation of what is wrong with the fair housing law which passed the Senate this week.

Once again, he will leave the impression that his "No" vote was an act of independence and courage, that he is one of the few in the Senate willing to stand up to the pernicious trends of liberalism which he frequently says are "destroying America."

But a closer look suggests another conclusion: that the junior Idaho senator is developing a reputation as an obstructionist, a shrill, reactionary voice who can always be counted on to be on the "right" side of issues, but whose importance in a less-conservative Senate is thereby diminished.

At what point does independence become recalcitrance? Where does solid conservatism cross over into die-hard reactionism? Where does standing for principle slide over into insignificance, irrelevance and perhaps embarrassment?

Since politics is, at least in part, the art of impressions, none of these points are easy to define. But Symms, in our view, is in danger of crossing what is admittedly a blurry line.

Look at the record. In the past six months, he has been in the conspicuous minority on a number of important issues.

In May, he was one of 5 senators who voted against the nuclear treaty; 93 senators voted for it. Last week, he was one of 2 senators voting against extension of the Endangered Species Act; 93 senators voted for it. This week, he was one of 3 senators opposing the housing measure; 93 senators voted for it.

A similar pattern can be found earlier in the senator's record as well. In 1986, for example, he was one of 11 senators opposing the Genocide Treaty and the only senator to vote against the banning of armor-piercing bullets, known as "cop killers."

Symms won a second term in 1986 partly because he portrayed himself as a man of convictions. He defeated a candidate, former Gov. John Evans, who could not shake the tag of being wishy-washy.

But if Symms is going to mature and grow in the Senate, we think he will have to expand both his vision and his voting record.

He will have to come to represent, or at least to understand better, the multiple constituencies of both Idaho and the nation.

Symms will also have to reassess his role of aligning himself on many votes with a tiny band of arch-conservatives who apparently see themselves as a thin blue line of purists holding back the floodwaters of liberalism.

This kind of voting pattern has already earned him a reputation beyond Idaho as both rigid and reactionary.

One of Idaho's great traits is the integrity that it fosters in its people.

Idahoans have a right to expect their political leaders to reflect independence without bull-headedness; moderation and reasoned opinion without weakness; judgment, tolerance and yes, wisdom.

Idaho deserves voices in politics who are effective representatives for both the state and the evolving common wisdom of the nation.

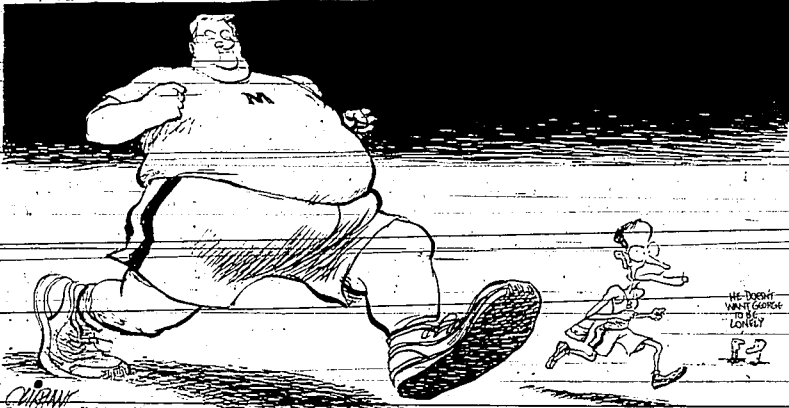
National politics is a rapidly changing scene, particularly now as the country reaches the end of the Reagan era. Without effective voices, we Idahoans are effectively disenfranchised from that debate.

This does not mean all politicians must think alike. A strength of American politics is the diversity of the nation, its people and regions, in our legislative bodies. There is room for much diversity.

But Idaho voters are plenty independent enough to dump political reactionaries who do not meet these tests, as George Hansen in Congress and a lengthy list of hard-heads in the Idaho Legislature have learned in recent years.

Idaho's junior senator has a number of positive attributes. But as we see it, those are in danger of being lost in a voting record which many would call extremist.

In short, a warning bell is sounding. Symms would be wise to hear it.

No alternative to ending the arms race

Just after the end of World War II, in 1945, the Secretary of War, Henry L. Stimson, asked for long term policy advice from four eminent physicists who had been major wartime weapon makers. Their topic was the bomb and its future.

They said that "because of nuclear weapons, far more powerful and numerous than the two or three then in existence, were within reach technologically. They gave their firm opinion that 'an military counter measures will be found, effective in preventing the delivery of atomic weapons.'"

They said that there was no way in which the United States could maintain hegemony in these matters, and that even weapon superiority "could not protect us from the most terrible destruction."

The report said finally, "We believe that the safety of the nation — as opposed to its ability to inflict damage on an enemy power — cannot be wholly or even primarily in its scientific or technical prowess. It can be based only on making future wars impossible."

That was and remains a remarkable document all now too clearly true. It is made more remarkable, however, by the fact that the "four" senior advisers to the Secretary had advised him, only shortly before, and just before the slaughter of Hiroshima and Nagasaki, that in their opinion there was no way the bombs could be effective in helping to end the war — such as threats and warnings or demonstrations over an uninhabited island — other than their full-scale military use.

"Use" meant, of course, the bombing of city populations, "strategic warfare." Many millions had already been killed, hundreds of thousands in the

bureaucratic secrecy and preparation to "fight the last war over again."

Whatever else may have influenced their arguments, they were motivated by a profound understanding of what these weapons would mean for the future of the planet and of the kinds of institutions which must evolve to replace those of war.

They saw that what the whole world now needed was what Abraham Lincoln had seen for our country when he wrote the Gettysburg Address: the commitment to a human existence beyond all differences of institutions and beliefs.

After 43 years the utility of the arms race is finally becoming a great and vital public fact. Governments are groping, at last, to undo its profound follies and dangers, and to develop those kinds of international cooperation which can replace them.

Long-cherished institutions and beliefs still stand in the way but for alternatives — there simply are no other. It is a time for great leadership to appear.

Wouldn't you know the old saying that politics is the art of the possible. So, what great leadership can now bring about will only become possible as we develop a constantly growing public understanding, urging, and support.

bombings of English, German, and Japanese cities, thought at a vastly greater cost. These bombs made the slaughter cheap.

How can we understand this shift in recommendations, which other major scientists disagreed with, from nuclear violence to sober pacifism? Was it just because pacifism is always easiest when war is over? Or was it the impact, the sheer horror of what was now done in Japan that finally got through to cool, scientific minds?

I think much more was involved. These men had been committed to the war and to our government's prosecution of it. More importantly, they had long been aware, far longer than almost anyone else, civilian or military, of the profound repercussions these weapons would create, for the military institutions of the whole world, and for all future time. They brought about, as Robert Oppenheimer said, a change in the nature of the world.

But would that world understand so profound a change? War itself, an age-old institution, was teetering in the balance of history. Rightly or wrongly, these men believed that a once-and-final use of the bomb was necessary, from its sheer magnitude and horror, to reach the understanding of the people of the world and, only so, of its governments. Otherwise, they feared, so profound a change would be too great a challenge to military prestige and habit, and would swept under the covers of

At the time the watershed improvement program was going into action the highway people decided to make a fill and raise the crossing a right of way. This right of way was obtained and signed for by the Cedar Mesa Board.

The Clark daughter, the late Edna Cox Bailey, inherited the Clark holdings at Cedar Creek and sold them to Tews. Now I'm wondering when Tews bought the trading land from the Water Company?

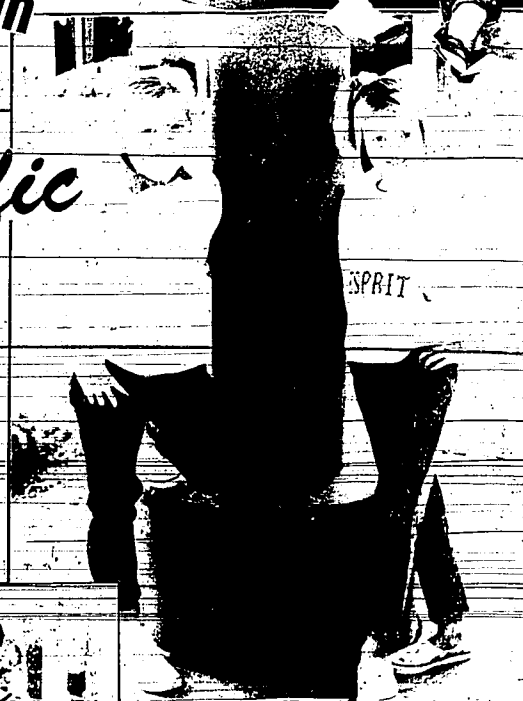

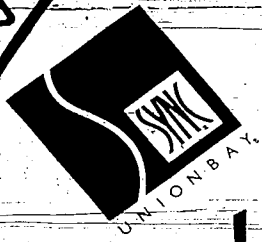
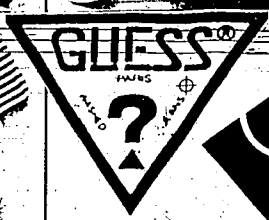

Dukakis stumps in Mississippi

PHILADELPHIA, Miss. (AP) — Michael Dukakis campaigned in rural Mississippi on Thursday and said his promise of economic change would deliver opportunity to all, "no matter who they are or where they come from or what the color of their skin."

Visiting near one of the civil rights battlegrounds of the 1960s, the Democratic presidential nominee made only brief reference to that struggle for equality for blacks.

But he did say, "Here in Mississippi, you know the importance of equal rights and civil rights. Today I say to all Americans — not just in Neshoba County, but all over America — we've got to work together, we've got to work together to bring down the barriers to opportunity for all our people."

Dukakis spoke to a noontime crowd at the Neshoba County Fair, where a crowd filled a grandstand and many more sat in lounge chairs on the red dirt of a horse track in front of the covered podium.

The appearance was "loaded with symbolism, as the Neshoba fair was the place where Ronald Reagan kicked off his campaign as the Republican presidential nominee eight years ago, nearly to the day, Dukakis has directed

rumors that Dukakis had undergone psychiatric treatment. No substitution for the rumors has been presented, and Dukakis and his doctor said Wednesday he had never undergone psychiatric treatment or counseling of any kind.

He did not mention the matter in his public appearances Thursday.

Dukakis received a friendly greeting from the local and state crowd, although some in the audience waved signs supporting Republican George Bush. One sign said, "Liberal Go Home."

In his 1980 visit, Reagan declared his support for "states' rights" and a restoration of powers to state and local governments.

Dukakis, in his remarks, made no reference to Reagan. He repeated his broad calls for investment in schools and industrial revitalization to produce more and better jobs. He referred to Mississippi as "a state that's hurting."

"We can settle for what Lloyd Bentsen calls a Swiss cheese economy," Dukakis said, using his running mate's term to describe a nation marked by pockets of economic hardships.

"Or, we can go to work and build an economic future for this country that will create good jobs at good wages for every citizen in this land."

Campaigning in Mississippi much of his campaign efforts since winning the nomination at attracting the support of independent and Democratic voters who supported Reagan in the past two elections.

At the same time, he was campaigning in a state where he lost the Democratic primary to Jesse Jackson.

It may be early, but campaign is already turning mean

WASHINGTON (AP) — These are supposed to be the dog days of the presidential campaign, when the candidates rest between conventions and the voters' vacation. But in this summer's record heat, the 1988 race is turning mean.

A month before the traditional Labor Day kick-off for the fall campaign, Democratic presidential nominee Michael Dukakis has already taken a hard shot: The news was filled with stories about rumors that he did — or didn't — have psychiatric treatment.

This was more than just the usual jabbing at your opponent that is part and parcel of the political wars.

"It was a nasty trick, an effort to raise doubts about the stability and sanity of a presidential candidate — without a single fact to back up the rumors."

The Democratic presidential nominee and his doctor firmly denied the rumors on Wednesday, and now the Democrats are pointing the finger at the Republicans as the ultimate source.

"There's something significant about what the Republicans have done here," said New York Gov. Mario Cuomo on Thursday, "the fact that they would use Lyndon LaRouche to get this thing started, the fact that they would get negative, that they would get so irrelevant so early."

The only fingerprints on the rumors are those of LaRouche, a political extremist, whose supporters have handed out fliers spreading the Dukakis

rumors. But other news organizations have reported hearing the same sort of talk from Republican sources and even from White House officials.

Asked by a LaRouche supporter about the matter, Reagan made a crack Wednesday about Dukakis as "an invalid." Then he said he shouldn't have said that, that his joke had fallen flat.

But what he had said had been enough. The president had dealt with the issue in front of the cameras, and Dukakis felt he had to step forward and deny the rumors personally.

Now the question is: Will the mud-slinging continue or will the tone of the campaign improve dramatically.

Bush and his fellow Republicans have the major opportunity in the next two weeks to set the tone. The indications are their message will be a tough one.

His campaign officials have outlined a program through the Republican convention of sharp attacks on Dukakis and his record.

Thursday's theme was defense and Bush himself said Dukakis is for "unilateral disarmament," a favorite charge aimed at painting a liberal as weak on defense.

Former presidential hopeful Jack Kemp added his blast in a Chicago speech, saying Dukakis is "not a Kennedy

Democrat. He is a liberal Democrat of the McGovern era."

Those attacks are to continue with Reagan playing a role in his appearance on the opening night of the GOP convention in New Orleans.

That strategy can hurt Dukakis, said pollster Andrew Kohut of the Gallup Organization.

"They can use the dreaded 'L' word," Kohut said. "They can make Dukakis out to be a liberal."

But there are dangers for the Republicans in this strategy. One is that voters will find it all too negative and too boring.

The Democrats tried to avoid that danger at their Atlanta convention by using humor, making fun of Bush with Sen. Edward

Kennedy asking "Where was George?" and keynote speaker Ann Richards talking about "Bush's being born with a silver foot in his mouth."

The other danger is that the American people would never get a chance to hear the positives about Bush, amid all the Dukakis bashing.

Kohut said the Republicans have to spend more time talking about Bush's positives than about Dukakis' negatives. Bush is widely recognized by the public, but poll after poll has shown that the voters don't really know much about him.

The Republican convention — and Bush's acceptance speech in particular — are prime opportunities for Bush to introduce himself to America and to put forward a positive vision for the country.

Bush slams Dukakis' foreign policy

CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas (AP) — Republican George Bush said Thursday that Michael Dukakis views on foreign policy would amount to "unilateral disarmament" and called the Democratic platform "the black hole of American politics."

Speaking to the G.I. Forum, a Hispanic veterans' group, the Republican nominee-to-be said Dukakis had "veered far outside the mainstream" bipartisan consensus formed after World War II — a consensus that believed "it was America and only America that could lead the world to freedom and peace."

"His positions ... amount to a rejection of America's role as a world leader and a repudiation of the Truman doctrine and the vision of John Kennedy," Bush said.

His speech came in the wake of the vice president's repeated attempts this week to portray Dukakis as soft on foreign policy — an area seen by Republican strategists as one in which the Massachusetts governor is vulnerable.

Bush cited Dukakis' support for a nuclear freeze, and opposition to a new MX missile, the Midyeum missile and the Reagan administration's proposed "Star Wars" nuclear defense system.

Dukakis' views add up to no modernization of U.S. forces and no modernization amounts to unilateral disarmament," Bush said.

He said that the Democratic platform is no help in trying to determine where the Democratic presidential nominee stood on foreign policy issues.

"The Democratic platform is the black hole of American politics," Bush said. "Issues get sucked into it and lost, never to reappear again."

At an airport news conference, Bush was asked whether members of his campaign staff had been advancing rumors concerning Dukakis' mental health. "I assume no one in my campaign is doing anything of that kind," he said. "I would thoroughly disapprove of it."

He also said President Reagan was "broad-minded" in retracting his comment on Wednesday in which he referred to Dukakis as an "invalid" and said the Massachusetts governor's response was fine.

Meanwhile, Bush campaign staffers have been told to do nothing to keep alive the rumors about Dukakis' mental health after Bush himself wondered whether some of the information was coming from his campaign, according to his chief of staff, Craig Fuller.

"He asked me the question," Fuller said. "I have no reason to believe we have any of our people behind it."

Fuller said Campaign Manager Lee Atwater gathered the Bush staff together Wednesday and admonished "everybody" to stay out of this story, stay out of the rumor business.

"George Bush doesn't want us involved in that kind of a story," Fuller said. "One of the troublesome aspects of a presidential campaign is that a rumor takes off and has a life of its own. You don't know what the reality is but I figure it's up to somebody else besides us to find out."

On another subject, Fuller confirmed that Treasury Secretary James A. Baker III would resign his post to become chairman of the Bush campaign before the start of the GOP convention.

Stealth final checks begin

WASHINGTON (AP) — Final checkout work has begun on the Air Force's first Stealth bomber and the aircraft will be displayed for the first time during a "roll-out" ceremony in mid-November, the service announced today.

The Air Force said that the new bomber, designated the B-2, will be powered by four General Electric Co. jet engines; will be an unusually short plane because of its unique design, and will be flown by a crew of two, reflecting the technology that has gone into its development.

The B-52 bomber requires a crew of six and the new B-2 bomber is flown by a crew of four.

Today's statement on the Stealth bomber marked the second step in a process begun last April; when the Air Force finally began to lift a decade-long veil of secrecy by releasing an artist's sketch of the plane.

Officials said then that they anticipated the first flight of the plane would occur this fall and that additional details, including a new estimate of cost overruns, would be revealed this summer.

The Air Force said today it was not yet prepared to release the new cost estimates. But it said it still anticipated the bomber would make its first flight this

fall, despite the fact the first plane won't be rolled out from its production plant until mid-November.


The first B-2 won't fly on that day of its public unveiling, but preparations for that event are well under way, the service said.



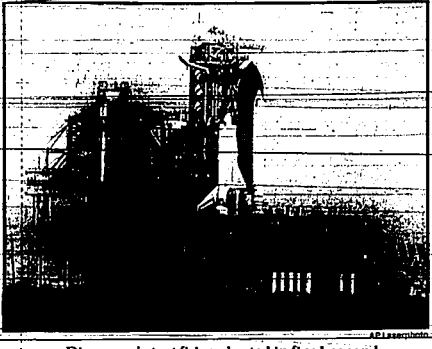

Faulty valve delays shuttle firing

CAPPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — A computer spotted a valve problem and scrubbed NASA's test firing of space shuttle Discovery's engines in the final second Thursday, dealing another setback to American's 2 1/2-year effort to return to space. Engineers said it will be three to seven days before they can try the

test again. The postponement was the fifth in two weeks and made it almost certain that Discovery's flight will be delayed from late September into October. "That's why we have flight readiness firings, to work the bugs out of equipment before we launch," said James Fletcher, the administrator

of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration. No American has been launched into space since the shuttle Challenger exploded 73 seconds after lift-off Jan. 28, 1986, killing seven crew members. The problem Thursday either was a valve that didn't close as fast as it was supposed to or a sensor that gave a wrong reading of the valve's open-closed position. "We don't know whether it was a faulty indication or really a malfunction in the valve," said Joseph A. Lombardo, engine program director at NASA's propulsion facility in Mississippi.



Discovery's test firing aborted in final second

To remain liquid, hydrogen must be kept at 423 degrees below zero. Boyle Mix, engine manager at NASA's Mississippi engine test facility, said historically some sensors are more temperature-sensitive than others. Engineers were looking at the possibility that the sensor might have been affected by long exposure to the extreme cold of the liquid hydrogen fuel. The tanks were loaded for 10 hours, four hours longer than normal, so that special tests could be run on the fuel system.

The active-duty personnel AIDS infection rate "probably underrepresents the prevalence in the civilian population" for three reasons, the CDC said. Those reasons are: homosexual men and injectable drug abusers are, because of rules, less common among military personnel than in the general population; hemophilia victims are not eligible for military service; and military recruits who test positive for AIDS infections are not enlisted.

AIDS virus exposure lower among military personnel

ATLANTA (AP) — The largest testing program yet in a specific group of Americans has found that just more than one in 1,000 active-duty military personnel have been exposed to the AIDS virus, lower than among the general population, officials said Thursday. The U.S. Centers for Disease Control said 2,232 of 1,782,191 people on active duty on April 24 had tested positive for antibodies to the virus which causes AIDS, a rate of 1.3 per 1,000. The Defense Department began screening for AIDS exposure in January 1986.

take, although purification techniques have greatly lessened that concern. Federal health officials have estimated that 1.5 million Americans are infected with the AIDS virus, that would be roughly five times the rate among active-duty military personnel. Despite the differing infection rate for the two groups, the military data "can be used for monitoring trends and trends of infection in the United States," the Atlanta-based CDC said in its weekly report. For example, the agency noted blacks in the military were 3.6 times as likely as whites to test positive for AIDS antibodies, and Hispanics were 2.5 times as likely.

The Defense Department plans to continue to test all active-duty personnel for AIDS infections at least every year or two, the CDC said. "Therefore, the incidence of new infection can be measured directly." "This is the closest to a general population in which it will be possible to actually measure the rate of new infections," said Dr. Tim Dandero, a CDC AIDS specialist.

A September 1987 report showed new AIDS infections for every 10,000 Army personnel during a year, the CDC said. "The Pentagon reported earlier this year that in testing nearly 4 million people since October 1985 — both recruits and active-duty personnel — roughly 1.6 positive AIDS test results were found in every 1,000 people tested. That figure includes recruits who tested positive and then were not enlisted." The new active-duty findings are "pretty consistent with what's been seen in the other groups, particularly the recruits," Dandero said.

Among active-duty age groups, the highest rate of positive AIDS tests was among those 25-29 — 2.1 per 1,000. The lowest was among personnel 17-19 — 0.1 per 1,000. AIDS is spread most often through sex or the sharing of infected hypodermic needles. Hemophilia patients were at risk because of the blood-derived clotting products they must use.

Compensation faces hurdles

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan's plan to pay humanitarian compensation to the families of the 290 people killed in the U.S. destruction of an Iranian jetliner last month faces serious hurdles in Congress and may not be approved, House members said Thursday. "I think you're going to have serious trouble selling what you're trying to sell," said Rep. Ike Skelton, D-Mo., told State and Defense department officials. Skelton said the Iranian government bears a heavy burden of responsibility for dispatching the Iran Air Airbus into a Persian Gulf combat zone where it was destroyed by missiles from the U.S. cruiser Vincennes. Rep. Les Aspin, D-Wis., chairman of the House Armed Services Committee, told reporters that Congress might be persuaded to appropriate funds for humanitarian compensation

to the families if it is established that mistakes by the Vincennes crew during combat caused the downing of the plane. Pentagon sources said Wednesday that preliminary findings of an official investigation show that human error rather than malfunctioning equipment caused the Vincennes to fire on the jetliner July 3. Aspin told State and Defense department witnesses at the hearing that they face "a tough sell" in obtaining compensation funds from Congress because "the visceral reaction against the Iranian government runs very deep." Aspin said the chances for approval of compensation would be a lot higher if there is an end to the eight-year Iran-Iraq war and to attacks on international shipping in the gulf. Several committee members said they would oppose paying compensation unless there were "absolute guarantees" that the money would go only to victims' families and not benefit the Iranian government in any way.

Eastern Airlines claims compliance impossible

WASHINGTON (AP) — A lawyer for Eastern Airlines told a federal judge Thursday that the financially troubled carrier could not possibly comply with his broad order not to curtail flights and drop service to 14 cities. Michael Madigan told U.S. District Judge Barrington D. Parker "there were numerous operational difficulties" to complying with a blanket order to halt implementation of Eastern's plans to reduce service by 201 flights a day by Aug. 31. Eastern, which has sought wage concessions from its unions, wants to close its hub in Kansas City, Mo., and focus operations on the East Coast and Latin America. "The scheduling of an airline is an incredibly complex problem that must be done in advance," Madigan said at a hearing convened to discuss implementing Parker's order temporarily

barring Eastern from laying off 4,000 workers and ending service to 14 cities. Parker granted the temporary restraining order at the request of the Air Line Pilots Association and the International Association of Machinists and Aerospace Workers, ruling the reorganization might be a violation of federal labor law. Eastern has already taken steps to implement the new schedule, which involves allowing pilots to bid on certain flights under union work rules, Madigan said. Madigan said the airline would be in "contempt of Parker's order" if it were required to undo the steps it has already taken to reorganize its schedule.

House passes tax bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House today passed the only tax bill Congress is likely to consider this year, a relatively modest effort that offers relief for a variety of special interests and increases in others. The vote was 380-25, with solid support from both parties. The bill now goes to the Senate. "This bill is in keeping with the spirit of tax reform" enacted in 1986, said Rep. Dan Rostenkowski, D-Ill., chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee. He noted the bulk of the new legislation aims to correct errors and clear up confusion in that law. The bill provides special breaks for rural mail carriers, freelance writers, first-time homebuyers and farmers and other off-road users of diesel fuel. To pay for those tax reductions, the bill would put the bite on pipe smokers, defense contractors, corporations that own other corporations, some farmers, and certain people who claim deductions for maintaining an office in their home. At 660 pages, the bill is almost as lengthy as the landmark 1986 law. But in dollar terms, it is one of the smallest pieces of tax legislation in recent years. The Joint Committee on Taxation estimates it would cut taxes by about \$7.1 billion through 1991 and raise taxes by about \$47 billion less.

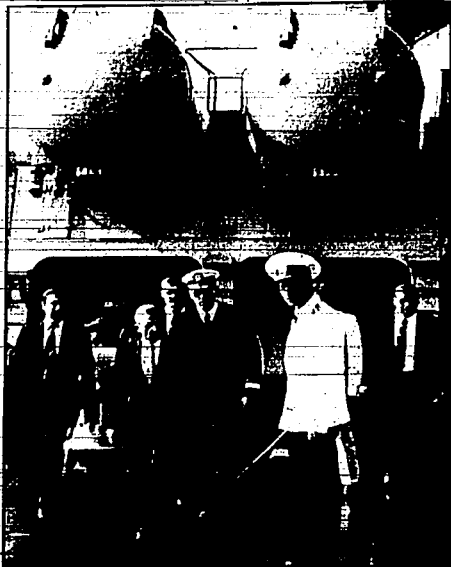

Defense chiefs inspired by talks

SEVASTOPOL, U.S.S.R. (AP) — Soviet Defense Minister Dmitry Yazov said Thursday he and Defense Secretary Frank Carlucci became good friends during four days of talks and unprecedented tours of secret Soviet military bases.

The rotund, red-cheeked 64-year-old Soviet general was the constant companion of Carlucci, 57, a career foreign service officer.

"We parted not only as colleagues, but as good friends," Yazov told reporters after a 46-mile drive with Carlucci over mountain roads on the Crimean Peninsula from the navy's Black Sea port in Sevastopol to an airport in the city of Simferopol.

Yazov saw Carlucci and his advisers off on a flight over the Black Sea to Turkey for talks with Turkish leaders and a visit to a NATO base.

Yazov, who first met Carlucci in Bern, Switzerland, in March and then during the recent superpower summit in Moscow, said increasing U.S.-Soviet military contacts "contribute to lessening tensions and strengthening peace."

The two discussed U.S. and Soviet military doctrines, imbalances in each other's forces, and regional conflicts in the Persian Gulf, Afghanistan and Southeast Asia, Yazov said. He did not elaborate.

Carlucci said the two sides refined procedures for preventing dangerous military incidents.

The Soviets continued Thursday to

provide the visiting Americans access to their latest military hardware.

Carlucci and accompanying U.S. Navy officers were allowed aboard a missile cruiser replete with sophisticated electronic communications and navigational equipment, and capable of carrying nuclear weapons.

The American defense chief spent 45 minutes inspecting anti-submarine, navigational and missile-launching systems aboard the cruiser Slava (Glory) docked at a civilian sea terminal on the Bay of Sevastopol, the headquarters of the Soviet Black Sea fleet.

It was the first time the Soviets have allowed Americans to board the Slava, which is the prototype for a class of modern Soviet missile cruisers. The Slava is the pride of the Black Sea fleet as its most advanced warship.

Carlucci, Yazov and the Black Sea fleet commander, Admiral Mikhail N. Khronopulo, emerged from limousines and walked across a gangway as a 20-member navy band played and 30 honor guards carrying Kalashnikov submachine guns stood at attention on the freshly painted deck.

American and Soviet flags flying on the ship were dwarfed by a crowded

crowd of antennis.

Reporters and photographers were not allowed on the tour, but watched from the deck as radar antennas twirled around and a 130mm gun pivoted on its turret before Carlucci.

Ex-general to lead Thailand

BANGKOK, Thailand — An extroverted, 66-year-old former army general, Chatichai Choonhavan, was named Thursday as Thailand's prime minister, becoming the first elected member of Parliament to hold the post in more than a decade.

Chatichai, as leader of the strongest party in last month's national elections, was thrust into office when the incumbent, Prem Tinsulanonda, withdrew from the contest. King Bhumibol Adulyadej made Chatichai's selection official Thursday by royal command.

Prem, 68, an easygoing, low-profile leader, headed the Thai government for more than eight years, surviving two attempted coups and overseeing a steadily strengthening economy. A former army chief of staff with solid military backing, Prem was appointed prime minister five times but never stood for election to Parliament.

The Thai constitution does not require that a prime minister be elected, and the failure of any political party to establish a majority position has led to a series of coalition governments headed by military strongmen. In the 1980s, however, students and other advocates of greater democracy

here have called for an elected prime minister, the first since the brothers Seni and Kukrit Pramoj in the mid-1970s.

Chatichai, at first a reluctant candidate for the post, likely was surprised to have the honor fall to him. When his Thai Nation party received a plurality in the July 24 elections, Chatichai declared that he was supporting Prem.

"A Chatichai government," he insisted, "wouldn't last three months. I do not have the military backing."

But Prem, impatient with politicians and apparently losing popular support, had had enough.

U.S. makes partial FAO payment

MANAMA, Bahrain — Jordan's King Hussein may have planted a time bomb in the ranks of the Palestine Liberation Organization by his surprise decision to relinquish legal and administrative links with the Israeli-occupied West Bank, knowledgeable Arab diplomats said Thursday.

The PLO, after three days of silence, said Wednesday that it had not been consulted on Jordan's move, which made the PLO the "sole legitimate representative" of the Palestinian people.

The PLO simultaneously said it was still "adhering to the special relationship between the Palestinian and Jordanian people" and to the "acquired rights" of the Palestinians — an apparent reference to the large Palestinian component in Jordan's 2.7 million population.

Jordan's decision sets time bomb

ROME (AP) — The United States has paid \$25 million of what it owes to the U.N. Food and Agriculture Organization to show it is encouraged by the agency's progress in budgetary reform, a diplomat said Thursday.

FAO spokesman Richard Lydiker confirmed the United States made the payment last week, saying the payment came in the wake of a compromise agreement on the budgetary process.

The diplomat said the compromise suggested to the U.S. government that "FAO was making progress to-

ward reforms" sought by the United States and other nations. He also said the U.S. government was "pleased and encouraged by the favorable developments and therefore decided to release the funds."

The United States had withheld payments of its assessments, which amount to a quarter of the agency's budget, in an effort to force the organization to make budgetary reforms.

The Rome-based organization coordinates agricultural projects in developing countries and is the largest specialized agency in the United Nations.

The diplomat, who spoke on condition that he not be identified by name or country, said United States made the payment July 27 in Washington and that it will be applied to the arrears of \$67.4 million for 1986 and 1987.

The United States also has not paid its 1988 assessment of \$60.7 million and \$3.9 million for its share of the working capital and special reserve accounts.

"Future payments will depend on continued progress by the organization in pursuing the reforms," he said.

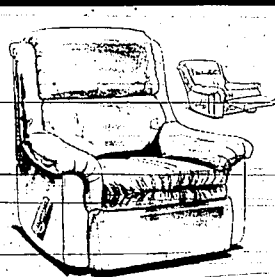

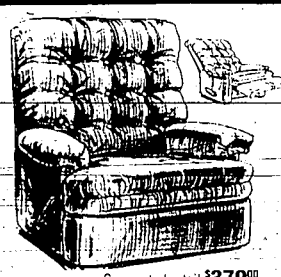

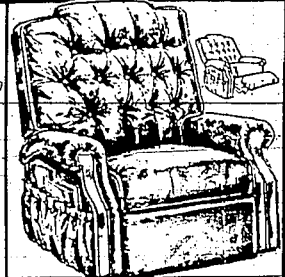

Iranian gunboats attack tanker in violation of gulf cease-fire

NICOSIA, Cyprus — Iranian gunboats attacked a Norwegian supertanker in the Persian Gulf Thursday, the first major attack on civilian shipping since Iran accepted a ceasefire in the war with Iraq.

The incident occurred four days after an Iranian envoy had pledged that Iran would refrain from attacking neutral shipping while talks were taking place to arrange a cease-fire in the gulf.

No injuries were reported in the attack on the tanker, the 284,502-ton Barge Lord, which was carrying crude oil from Saudi Arabia to Rotterdam in the Netherlands. The ship was 25 miles off Dubai in the southern gulf at the time of the attack.

Leif Klausen, the Barge Lord's captain, said that the ship was hit by machine-gun fire after he

refused an Iranian request to stop and be searched. Under international law, countries at war have the right to search neutral ships to determine whether they are carrying goods for the enemy.

After the attack began, Klausen appealed for help by radio and the U.S.-guided missile cruiser Halsey responded. But Klausen declined an offer to be escorted and steamed independently through the Strait of Hormuz into the Arabian Sea.

Iran's deputy foreign minister, Ali Mojtahed Besharati, had told reporters in the United Arab Emirates earlier in the week that until a cease-fire was implemented "we will not do anything to shipping."

Iran announced July 18 that it was accepting a U.N. Security Council resolution calling for a cease-fire in the gulf war. The resolution had been adopted a year earlier and accepted by Iraq.

But Iraq recently demanded that any cease-fire be preceded by direct negotiations between the two sides.

Before Thursday's incident, the only attack reported in the gulf since July 18 was an Iranian gunboat attack on a Kuwaiti fishing boat.

At the United Nations, the head of a military team sent to Iran and Iraq to arrange details of a cease-fire presented his findings to Secretary-General Javier Perez de Cuellar. The contents of the report were not released, however.

Although Thursday's incident was obviously an attack on unarmed shipping, diplomats in the region reacted cautiously.

20,000 Palestinians lose jobs

AMMAN, Jordan — Jordan announced Thursday that it would terminate employment of Palestinians on the Israeli-occupied West Bank of the Jordan River as of Aug. 16.

The move affects more than 20,000 employees whose salaries have been paid by the Jordanian treasury since Israel's capture of the territory in 1967. The total salaries involved are estimated at \$70 million a year.

The Jordanian announcement said that only the employees of religious-endowments departments would be kept, to follow up efforts to protect Islamic shrines in Jerusalem.

Jordan provided a detailed list of compensation to be paid the dismissed employees in accordance with Jordanian law.

The move followed King Hussein's announcement Sunday that he was severing legal and administrative links with the West Bank.

He described this as a concession to Arab leaders who want the Palestine Liberation Organization to be "sole legitimate representative" of the Palestinian people. The PLO said it was not consulted on the move.

The Jordanian government meanwhile suspended the application of martial law imposed on its East Bank territory since the 1967 war.

The East Bank's population of about 2.7 million includes 900,000 Palestinians, by Jordanian government figures.

PLO officials Thursday began publicly to voice reservations and apprehensions about the Jordanian moves, which they had initially sought to portray as a victory for the Palestinian cause.

The Bahrain-based Gulf News Agency quoted PLO officials in Baghdad as saying that efforts were being made to prevent the Jordanian measures from being turned into a pressure tool.

Soviets clear Bolsheviks of 1930s political errors

MOSCOW (AP) — The Communist Party said Thursday that two prominent Bolsheviks were innocent of anti-Soviet activity and political mistakes, the charges Josef Stalin used to destroy them in the 1930s.

The report on the work of a commission of the ruling Politburo distributed by the Tass news agency was not a political rehabilitation of Bolshevik leaders Grigory Zinoviev or Lev Kamenev, but it indicated such a move probably was not far behind.

Tass said the commission had received a report from the Soviet Supreme Court, which has cleared the names of several old Bolsheviks this year, and that it was continuing its work.

The party under Mikhail S.

Gorbachev has sought to clear the names of its leaders purged by Stalin in the 1930s, stress his legacy of repression and assure party members they won't be punished for speaking their minds.

In June, the Supreme Court cleared Zinoviev, Kamenev, Karl Radek and Grigory Pyatkov of criminal charges of the 1930s. Zinoviev, Kamenev and Pyatkov were shot and Radek died in a prison camp.

Among the first Bolshevik leaders to be cleared was Nikolai Bukharin, who in February was declared innocent of the charges for which he was shot. On July 9, the Politburo committee posthumously readmitted him to the party.

Gunmen kill 2 in N. Ireland

BELFAST, Northern Ireland (AP) — Four gunmen fired more than 100 bullets in point-blank range and killed two men who were returning home Thursday from maintenance jobs at a police station in the town of Belleek, police said.

There was no immediate claim of responsibility, but suspicion fell on the Irish Republican Army, which has threatened any contractors working on police or army installations and killed several.

The IRA has killed four members of Britain's security forces this week — three in attacks in Northern Ireland and one in the bombing of an army barracks in north London. Forty-two people

also were injured in the attacks. Thursday's victims, aged 60 and 64, had been doing maintenance work at the Royal Ulster Constabulary station in Belleek, County Fermanagh, near the border with the Irish Republic.

Fans say Stooges deserve postage stamp of their own

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Fans of three knuckleheads famed for bopping each other on the head, throwing pies and churling "a-ya, a-ya, a-ya" are writing letters and circulating petitions to get the government's attention.

The Three Stooges, they insist, deserve to be honored on a U.S. postage stamp.

They were the longest-running comedy team in the history of motion pictures. Laurel and Hardy, Abbott and Costello and the Marx Brothers pale in significance compared with the Stooges, said Jeff Lenberg, a Southern California writer and Stooge historian.

Lenberg and other admirers of Moe, Larry and Curly — not to forget Shemp, Joe and Curly-Joe — say the Stooges are part of modern American culture.

"My father always said their comedy was based on the upsetting of dignity. And I thought of George Washington getting his wig knocked off. That's what the Stooges would have done to him," said Jean Howard Maurer.

Maurer, daughter of Moe Howard — the one with the trademark bangs and scowl — launched the stamp campaign last year in her fifth book on the Stooges.

After all, W.C. Fields was honored with

a stamp in 1980, and recently the postmaster general said Laurel and Hardy could appear on a stamp.

But Stooge aficionados point out that while Fields and Laurel and Hardy are seldom seen nowadays, the Stooges — who began with vaudeville and reached their height in film — are still seen on television all over the world.

"If you stopped people on the street and showed them a picture of the Three Stooges, they'd know them right away," said Gary Lussin, president of the Three Stooges Fan Club, with about 2,000 members worldwide.

Stephane Salter, a San Francisco Examiner columnist, is relaying hundreds of pro-Stooge letters to the Postal Service's Citizens Stamp Advisory Committee.

"I just think that it's the fact the world is getting heavier every day. I just can't emphasize the importance of silliness," Salter said.

The silliness as most people know it began in 1934, when Moe, brother Curly and a violin player with a receding mop named Larry Fine made "Women Haters," their first short for Columbia.

The whole concept was that Moe was the brains of the outfit, supported by Larry

the middleman, who was supposed to be a little less smart than Moe but more intelligent than Curly, Lenberg said.

"But Moe always came out as not so smart after all. He was as much a stooge as Curly or Larry," he said.

Curly, the one with the shaved head and high-pitched "EEE-bee-bee-bee," was sidelined by a stroke in 1946 and replaced by Shemp Howard. Shemp died in 1955 and was replaced first by Joe Besser, who stayed with the group for three years, and finally by Joe DeRita, who resembled the original Curly and was known as Curly-Joe.

Peace cruise starts down river today

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — A boatload of Soviets and Americans will steam down the Mississippi River from St. Louis this week in a cruise organized by peace groups in both countries.

During a nine-day trip to New Orleans, 50 Soviets and 125 Americans will get to know one another during workshops on "peacefully, peacefully and democratization" and "social issues and human rights," among others.

"We're trying to avoid a nuclear holocaust," said Lou Friedman, spokesman for Promoting Enduring Peace — of Woodmont, Conn., the cruise's U.S. sponsor.

The two nuclear superpowers as antagonists destabilize the nuclear situation in the world terribly. So ... the one thing that can help this situation is for Americans and Soviets to get to know each other.

The cruise begins today in St. Louis and ends in the French Quarter on Aug. 14, one day before the Republican-National Convention. That is coincidence — plans for the cruise began a year before those for the GOP convention, said Friedman.

This summer's drought may make a stop planned Saturday at Cape Girardeau, Mo., impossible if the river is still too low. Other stops are planned Tuesday at Memphis, Tenn.; Wednesday at Greenville, Miss.; Thursday at Vicksburg, Miss.; Friday at Natchez, Miss.; and Aug. 13 at Baton Rouge.



Seven new Magic Valley football coaches will greet players

Seven new high school football coaches will greet Magic Valley football teams when season-opening drills start next Wednesday.

The Magic Valley Conference, an alignment in the A-2 classification, leads the way with a total of six coaching changes involving four of its seven schools.

Not far behind follows the A-3 Canyon Conference, which has only one new football head man, but will have a trio of newcomers pushing clipboard come basketball time.

The new Raft River High School football coach, Dwight Richins, inherits a 5-4 third in the MVC a year ago team from Tom Harrison, who has moved on to Snake River High School.

Richins will be aided by the return of second-year assistant Dennis Lee and the hiring of newcomer Thomas Thomas, a former offensive tackle at Idaho State University.

"The defense will stay pretty much the same," said Richins, who is coming off a three-year stay at Valley as an assistant to Scott Tingey after shorter stints as an assistant at Highland of Pocatello and West Jefferson high schools.

"On offense, I imagine we'll throw the ball quite a bit more than they have in the past," he predicted. "We have a kid with a good arm and will not run the option as they have in the past. Ours will be a pro-type set — throw to set up the run."

Brett Patterson, in just his second year at the school, has worked his way up from last season's assistant

role with the Trojans, replacing Harrison in heading Raft River's basketball program.

Another MVC school, Castelford, found itself in a similar position when Sam Wiseman resigned to accept a coaching job at the Community College of Spokane. Like its Cassia County counterpart, Castelford went to one new, but not unfamiliar, individual while elevating another.

Rod Rutherford accepted the gridiron slot Thursday. Rutherford, a two-time state wrestling champion in his prep days at Buhl, has been out of coaching since 1974, but brings experience gained at Meridian and Gooding, a conference championship and a 24-7 head coaching mark.

"They gave me all the stuff (on the 1987 season) today," said Rutherford. "I've got stats and a VCR to see what

we have, but I don't know the kids yet."

"I've got three offenses, depending on my skill people," he added. "I'm not worried. We've got some good, tough farm kids. They know how to work and sweat and they don't quit."

Andy Wiseman, Sam Wiseman's younger brother and the Castelford v-a-g teacher, will take over the basketball job.

Ed Sandy, who already holds the athletic directorship at Shoshone in addition to coaching girls' varsity basketball, had added the head football job to his duties.

Sandy, starting his 22nd year at Shoshone, takes over from Larry Bond, who is returning to school for his master's degree in education after holding the spot for seven years. The Indians are coming off a disas-

trous 2-7 campaign, but a man already familiar with most of his charges from their junior high days holds high hopes of regaining the winning touch.

"I'll run what I've always run before," he said. "A variety — basically the I, but some pro-set, some shotgun and a variation of the single wing. A lot of looks. On defense, probably an odd front."

Tobin barely misses spot on Olympic cycling team

SPOKANE, Wash. — The final day of the U.S. Olympic Women's Cycling Trials was a day of heart-break and a day of hope for Idaho's two top women cyclists.

Going into Thursday's final race — the second Comstock road race — Ketchum's Katrin Tobin's chances for a place on the three-member team looked good. She was third overall in the point standings and trailed her Lovell's Meat Snacks teammate Sally Mathes by only one point after the best few races but a top five was not in the cards for Tobin.

She finished ninth in the final race and dropped from third to sixth. The top three finishers qualify for the Olympics.

All is not lost for Tobin, however. The 1980 graduate of Ketchum/Sun Valley Community School was selected as first alternate behind equalers Inga Benedict of Reno, Nev., Zack of Boulder, Colo., and Danute "Bunky" Bankaitis-Davis of Boulder and will train with them until they leave for Seoul, South Korea, in September, according to national cycling team director Mark Hodges.

Still, the anguish was there for Tobin after the last race. The 1988 champion was visibly distressed and said she said she didn't want to talk.

For 22-year-old Ruthie Mathes, a Ketchum native who now lives in Boulder, the completion of the trials was a bittersweet moment. On one hand, Mathes was the inexperienced cub who surprised everyone by finishing third in Sunday's national road racing championships and settled for fifth in the second

Comstock race after Davis, Janelle Parks and Jeanne Golay broke away from the pack in the final lap, turning it into a three-way sprint to the finish.

Mathes was not expected to do that well, but she did. Her only downfall came in Tuesday's first Comstock race when she finished 15th and that, for the most part, dropped her out of the running.

The fact is that Mathes proved to her peers something she has felt all along — that she can compete with the nation's best.

"I've proved I have a pretty good sprint," Mathes said.

Like Tobin, Mathes has been tagged a climber, not a sprinter. But her second-place finish in the field sprint — that is second in the field that trailed the three frontrunners — on Thursday may get Mathes the respect she seeks.

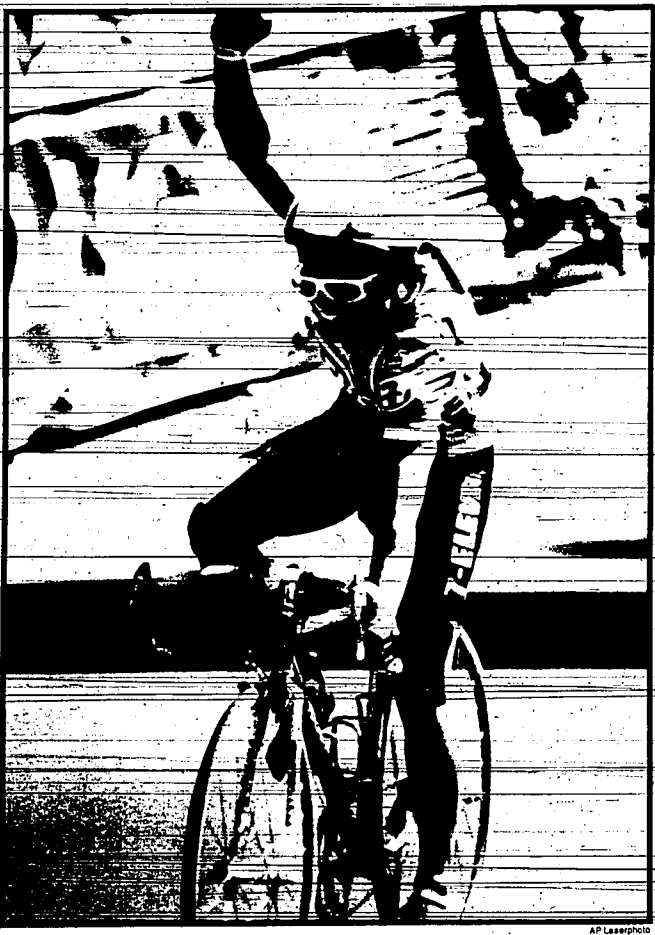
Mathes finished eighth overall in the point standings.

As disappointing as these Olympic trials have been for Tobin and Mathes, there is hope for the future. Tobin, 26, now begins her role as first alternate. Should one of the three regular team members have to leave the team, she would be the first to replace her in Seoul.

But Tobin's hope goes beyond 1988. Still in her prime, she said in a June interview, that with her domestic riding success under her belt she's "ready to take the next step" and mentioned the tour de France as one of her goals for coming years.

While Mathes has actually ridden competitively for nearly as long as Tobin, she hasn't realized the same success. After a disappointing showing in this year's Ore-Ida Women's Challenge, Mathes set out to make a

Leonard's back to seek two championships

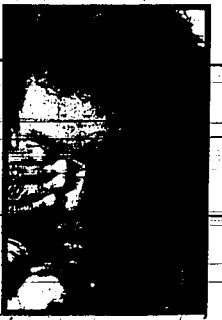

avoid the \$1,000-a-day fines that would be leveled against them for holding out.

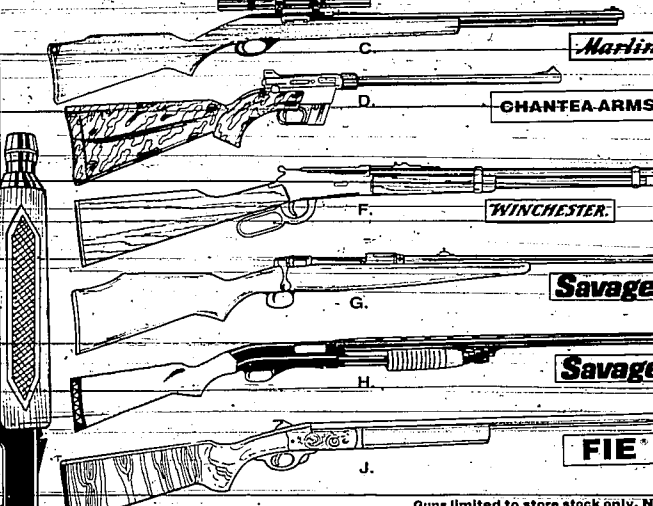

New ban on water transfers sought

WASHINGTON — A ban on federal studies on importing water into the Colorado River Basin, which expires in November, would be extended for another 10 years under legislation introduced Thursday by Rep. Richard Stallings.

For the past 20 years, Idaho politicians have been able to win support for moratoriums, effectively stopping the possibility that Idaho water could be exported.

Stallings said his bill aims to prevent future diversions of water from the Columbia-Snake River Basin, and Rep. Larry Craig of Idaho has agreed to be cosponsor.

Stallings said it might be difficult to get action this session of Congress. "With very few legislative days left in this Congress, I believe it is critical to move forward to ensure that Idaho's water is safe from outside threats," he said.

Even though the possibility of a major interbasin water transfer is remote, it is a risk that Idahoans cannot afford to take," he said.

Stallings said he discussed the bill with Rep. George Miller, chairman of the House Subcommittee on Water and Power Resources. Miller was a little uncomfortable with it because it won't be popular in California, Stallings said. But Stallings said he told Miller sending the moratorium was the right thing to do.

The coastal water areas in Southern California need more water, but the State Water Project has plans to obtain it without going out-of-state, said Tim Skrovs, spokesman for the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California.

Team starts hunt for barrels in dump

MURTAUGH — With a magnetic detection probe extended, Steve Fuller and Carla Marzicola stamped across the rolling terrain of the county dump Thursday past rusted cans and tangled baling wire.

The pair of environmental consultants were not in search of buried treasure, but old barrels. The U.S. Bureau of Land Management, the dump's owner, brought the consultants to the prime farming country in Murtaugh after receiving reports that 2,500 barrels, possibly containing hazardous chemicals, were buried during the 1960s and 1970s.

Max Pressnell told BLM that while working for Henry's Produce of Kimberly he buried thousands of barrels that once contained disyton, a pesticide so strong that 3.5 mg can kill a rat. But disyton readily breaks down in the environment and should not be present after 20 years, according to a local seed company. Henry's Produce is no longer in business.

BLM is trying to find out whether the barrels are there and, if so, how much disyton is present.

Thursday the consultants were laying out 20-foot square grids across the 40-acre dump. They are trying to get a better idea of where buried trenches might be. The plan is to mark the trenches, excavate what they find and test it for contamination.

Consultants recorded magnetic readings above normal for the site. A draft report of their findings will be released in the middle of next month.

BLM is concerned about threats to groundwater used for drinking and irrigation.

BLM doesn't know the water table depth at the dump but the nearest well is 800 feet deep, said Kirk Koch, BLM hazardous waste director.

A 1986 general pesticide survey of nearby drinking water wells didn't reveal any contamination. But irrigation wells were not surveyed.

"I would like to know what is buried at this point—I am not overly concerned about it," said David Moyes, whose bean fields are about a mile east of the dump. The Moyes rely on well water for drinking and irrigation.

Moyes said he would be interested in having his wells tested for contamination.

"You see too many cases of cancer. It's definitely something we are do-

ing," he said.

The dump sits atop an inactive volcanic cone. By the main gate is a trench filled with garbage and pieces of rusted steel metal.

To the east are farms and Murtaugh Lake. There are also farms to the south. A combine harvested wheat in a nearby field as the BLM consultants from Washington state did their work.

A visitor to the dump doesn't need to look far to find evidence of chemical containers.

Several hundred feet north of the main gate, dented, five-gallon chemical containers lie on the ground.

The point on them is fading but the words "Ept Selective Herbicide" and "Stauffer Chemical" were visible on one. Some of the containers were punctured.

Currently the dump does not accept chemical containers, not even empty ones. They have to be taken to the Twin Falls landfill, said Darrell Heider, Twin Falls County solid waste director.

Before 1964, when the county leased the land from BLM, the location was an unauthorized dump that was on fire half the time, said Heider.

This is just one of a half dozen cases of unauthorized dumping that BLM is investigating on its land in the Burley District, says Koch.

BLM also leases a dump to the county in Twin Falls and Koch says there is the potential for chemical contamination there, though there have been no reports of it.

People have been using chemicals for ages and the presence of chemical contamination seems to occur in most of the agricultural areas of the West, Koch said. Solvents used by the auto industry are also a concern in these dumps, he said.

The ability of contaminants to reach the water table depends on the soil. The Murtaugh dump's soil is a silt loam that is more porous than clay, but not as porous as sandy gravel.

Several years ago chemical contamination of drinking water turned up in a residential area near Farmington, N.M.

Koch said if contamination is found at Murtaugh, cleanup could cost hundreds of thousands of dollars and maybe more. The consultant's study cost \$10,000.

Because BLM owns the land, the

Twin Falls officials draft budget with future needs in mind

TWIN FALLS — City planners are setting their sights years in advance to anticipate the needs that may have to be met with a stagnant city income.

"We're trying to move from an annual budget to a five-year plan based on operating on a three- to five-year basis," Rick Thompson, finance director, said.

The city manager's office recently completed a preliminary budget for the 1988-89 year which begins Oct. 1. A budget hearing will be scheduled for later in the month and the council is required to adopt a budget by Sept. 9, said City Manager Tom Courtney.

The proposed \$14,189,821 budget is 10 percent less than this year's budget, due primarily to the reduction in capital projects, Thompson said.

It includes \$55,000 to pay off 25 acres of

land adjacent to the municipal golf course, \$50,000 for a new park or park expansion, and \$170,000 for a signal light at one of two inter-

sections. Courtney said the improvements are part of the city's attempt to identify trends to make sure funding is in step with the future.

Thompson said identifying trends, such as a shift in traffic patterns, will help the city anticipate problems and avert them, sometimes at a lower cost.

"It is less expensive to repair a road than re-

build one," he said.

Courtney said the city is trying to improve efficiency so that as the growth of revenue decreases and the city is not forced to reduce its services.

The budget report "conservatively" projects that the growth in revenues for 1988-89 will be 1.7 percent. Courtney said that figure could increase if the city decides to add a surcharge on utility bills for expansion of the sewer treat-

ment plant.

He said the growth figure is well below the expected inflation rate of between 5 to 8 percent during the same period and 2.3 percent last year's revenue growth rate.

"We'd hate to get to the point where we have to discontinue the fire department because we don't have enough money," Thompson said.

He didn't think that would hap-

pen.

HALLEY — The Blaine County Airport Commission is considering ways to alleviate noise and safety concerns at Friedman Memorial Airport.

Prohibiting aircraft from using the airport during certain hours and restricting noisy aircraft to certain flight paths are the two options the commission discussed at its Tuesday.

Horizon Airline Vice President George Bagley attended the meeting and answered questions on Horizon's operations at the airport, including the airline's position on installing a control tower and relocating the air-

port. He also told the commission Horizon will shut its operations down if it can't land from the north.

Steve Crabtree and Ned Williamson — co-attorneys for the commission — recommended the board look at developing at least two new ordinances to address safety concerns and ease any legal concerns surrounding airport operations.

One ordinance would establish hours that planes could not use the airport, although no specific limitations on hours were discussed.

Last fall, before Halley representatives boycotted the airport board meetings and the commission was subsequently restructured, the board

suggested closing the airport from 10 or 11 p.m. until 6 a.m. Only emergency landings would be allowed during those hours. Williamson said after the meeting he would recommend an 11-6 curfew.

A second ordinance would regulate air traffic by restricting aircraft above a certain decibel level from flying over the north end of the runway which is over a residential section of Halley.

"Limitations" on approaches and landings based on decibel levels have been upheld in the courts," Crabtree said. Courts have denied ordinances which restrict specific types of aircraft, such as jets or large aircraft, he said.

The commission was unsure how to actually enforce any ordinance they would create. Several commissioners questioned the ability to enforce ordinances without a control tower to provide official observations.

If these ordinances are drafted and enforcement problems resolved a series of public meetings would be held to talk with such groups and individuals as the Federal Aviation Administration, Horizon Airlines, legal users, private pilots and others.

In other action, commissioners, residents and members of the citizens group SAF — ETY Inc. got a chance to speak directly with a top official of

Lawsuits piling up against tax lawyers

TWIN FALLS — Lawyers charging two local tax lawyers with malpractice continue to pile up in Jerome and Twin Falls counties.

Although more than two dozen people are suing the two lawyers, Thomas G. Walker and M. Gary Atkinson, all the suits contain the same basic allegations. The doctors, lawyers, businessmen and veterinarians say the two were negligent in the operation of a corporation designed to give professionals, such as doctors, pension plans and other benefits.

The two attorneys separated in January 1986 and now practice alone. Atkinson declined to comment on the cases, and Walker was out of town and unavailable for comment.

Seven lawsuits have been filed in Twin Falls County and four in Jerome County. Another lawsuit was filed in federal district court in Boise.

Walker set up the tax shelter through a corporation called Professional and Executive Leasing (PEL). PEL purportedly hired professionals and businessmen, loaned them back to their practices, and offered pension and benefit plans.

More than 40 Magic Valley law-

yers, doctors, other professionals and businessmen signed up with PEL.

PEL's promotional literature said professionals could get a very liberal fringe benefit package and retirement plan "without having to offer the same benefits to their employees.

The U.S. Tax Court ruled in August 1987 the tax shelter was invalid because it depended on an employer-employee relationship that didn't exist.

Walker maintains PEL was valid. In court records in some of the suits, he says PEL's professionals knew the risks of the plans and that the plans had been submitted to the IRS but hadn't been approved yet.

The U.S. Tax Court said PEL couldn't offer retirement plans because it wasn't the employer of its professionals. Walker has appealed the decision to the U.S. 9th Circuit Court of Appeals.

The recent onslaught of lawsuits adds even more legal complexity to PEL's operation and apparent demise—in addition to Walker's appeal of the tax court's decision, one lawsuit has been filed at federal district court in Boise over a spin-off investment from PEL and another hotly contested lawsuit over

Gooding citizens press for use of gym

GOODING — More than three dozen people showed up at Gooding city's budget hearing this week to talk about paying for recreation facilities and the size of city councilmembers' salaries.

Recreation dominated the discussion as residents said they want the use of the old gym and pool at the Idaho State School for the Deaf and Blind, which Gooding assumed responsibility for last year to prevent it from being torn down.

After considerable discussion, the council adopted a \$2 million budget for next year. In doing so, it continued its insistence that the city does not

have enough money to open the gym up for basketball, volleyball or other sports.

It will, however, continue to fund a pool program.

Most items in the new budget show less funding over the past two years. Police spending is down by \$10,600, fire funds are down by \$5,000 and funds for streets, airport and sanitation have also declined.

The new budget — \$2,283 million — is down overall from the current year's \$2,450 million, mostly due to a decline in property values and the inability of some taxpayers to pay the entire amount of their taxes, Mayor Gene Hepler said. The city anticipated the reduced revenue and cut back on spending by consolidating some city

offices and piling back in individual department budgets, Hepler said.

The budget includes \$1.1 million in state and federal grants to improve the city's water system and upgrade services at the industrial park being developed in the northeast section of the city.

One area that shows an increase is the recreation budget, which has \$21,000 for the coming year, compared with \$16,000 this year and \$15,500 last year.

But that's deceiving. The additional \$5,000 is money the city wants from a local resident who wishes to sub-lease the gym and operate it as a private venture.

The cost of providing recreation in Gooding has been an on-going issue

for several years. Currently, residents are talking about the pool and gym in one of the State School for the Deaf and Blind's buildings, which the city began leasing last year for \$1 a year to prevent it from being torn down.

The city last year allocated \$4,500 to help Gooding Community Swim Committee operate a seasonal swimming program. Additional committee funds came from swimming fees.

But city officials have said Gooding doesn't have the money to open the gym for recreation. It only has funds to maintain the facility, officials said, which last year was about \$2,000.

Jim Muscat, councilman in charge of recreation, said the city has recreation funds now to maintain the city's



You cannot force a man to marry you, but it will give you peace of mind to know to what you are legally entitled. Good luck.

"Living together for a specified number of years" is not enough to constitute a common-law marriage as legal. The couple living together must be known as man and wife by friends, neighbors, associates and by the land lady. They must profess to being husband and wife and receive mail addressed to them as Mr. and Mrs. If their acquaintances, business associates and friends recognize that they are merely "living together," they do not qualify as a married couple. Further, if a couple establishes a common-law marriage in a state where such is recognized as legal, the marriage is recognized as legal in all the other 49 states.

Experts trade words at National Scrabble Championship

RENO, Nev. (AP) — Armed with lucky hats and T-shirts and a love of dictionary oddities, competitors 19 to 92 years old are huddling over game boards this week in a bid for glory at the National Scrabble Championship.

For a parlor game, the tension is unusually high and, yes, there is some cheating. But then, Scrabble isn't usually played for \$25,000 purses.

"Oh, everybody uses tricks to win; some call it strategy," Bahette Cornine of Greenport, N.Y., said Wednesday. "There's more to this game than just knowing how to spell."

Ms. Cornine is vice president of Scrabble Players Inc., and one of 320 top Scrabble players in the United States and seven foreign countries, including Canada, Britain and Nigeria, competing in the championship.

During the tournament, which ends Friday, games are limited to an hour

and each player has only 3 minutes to spell a word or forfeit that turn.

"The intensity level sometimes gets very high," Ms. Cornine said. "Sometimes, even with good players, the tiles just aren't turning up right."

Some competitors chew gum to ease tension. Others wear lucky hats and T-shirts or juggle the tiles in their own leopard skin or zebra-striped bags.

One player sits in the corner and juggles.

"It's better not to talk to him when he's reached the point of juggling," Ms. Cornine warned.

Scrabble is played with 100 small wooden tiles imprinted with a letter of the alphabet, each worth from 1 to 10 points. The tiles spill across a cross-word-like game board from a "hand" of seven tiles with their score tallied from the number of points each letter is worth.

A Scrabble expert averages more than 400 points. The national record is 719 and the world record is 725.

"Some people hesitate to talk about the record score because it was made using phony words," snifled Michael Willis, a competitor from Ballus. "Sometimes you do use phony words, but not with everybody and you shouldn't when you're going for the record."

One legal trick is to know Scrabble words that begin with the 10-point "Q" but have no immediately following "U"—such as qadi (Moslem judge), qin-tar (Albanian monetary unit), qivut (muskrat hair) and qoph (Hebrew letter).

Keeping track of letters also is allowed and Rita Norr, the defending national champion from New York, carefully writes down each tile played.

"I need every advantage I can get," she said.

Competitors don't have to know the meaning of the word to play it — and many don't. But it has to be included in the "bible," the official Scrabble Players Dictionary.

Words can be challenged, but players lose a turn if they're wrong. Some successful challenges Wednesday were for dry, lig and ova.

Stroyer (antiquated form of destroyer), atony (archaic for atom), miaous (plural of meow) and seeling (blinding) were found in the dictionary.

"I can tell by looking at it if the word is right or not," said Ethel Sherard, a 92-year-old great-grandmother from Pasadena, Calif., and the tournament's oldest player.

"I'm not sure sometimes if it's a real word. But I just hold my breath and see if it will be challenged."

Mrs. Sherard has been playing the game since it was commercially produced in 1948, 17 years after it was

developed.

Brian Cappalietto, 19, the tournament's youngest player, became hooked three years ago.

"I don't know why I like it; it's so intangible," said the University of California, Los Angeles sophomore.

"There's so many strategies."

Settlement heartens strikers

BOISE (AP) — Striking Boise Cascade Corp. workers hope that a tentative settlement between a woodworkers' union and a Portland-based wood-products company is a sign they will soon get off the fire lines and into the mills.

Millworkers, who have been fighting fires and working in mines to make up for wages lost during the strike, are optimistic a tentative settlement reached Tuesday by Willamette Industries Inc. will lead to an agreement with Boise Cascade.

More than 1,200 Willamette workers were expected to vote on the proposed contract Thursday. It is the first to be put to a vote since the strike against Willamette and other companies began June 6.

The strike now involves eight companies in the Northwest, affecting an estimated 9,000 workers.

The unions also have threatened to strike Weyerhaeuser Co., the region's largest wood-products company, which employs 6,000 union workers in Oregon and Washington. Representatives said last week, however, Weyerhaeuser strike plans were on hold.

Mike Draper, executive secretary of Western Council of Industrial Workers, said he was pleased with the terms. "We didn't get everything on our wish list, but neither did Willamette Industries," he said.

Taggart withdraws from House race

BOISE (AP) — Rep. Dean Haagen-son, R-Coeur d'Alene, has lost his Democratic opponent for the fall election.

The secretary of state's office said Thursday Tom Taggart of Rathdrum, the Democratic candidate, has withdrawn, citing family and business reasons.

Haagen-son, a Coeur d'Alene contractor, is in his sixth year in the House and is chairman of the Resources and Conservation Committee.

His only remaining opponent, unless Democrats pick a replacement for Taggart, is independent candidate Ron Rankin of Coeur d'Alene.

Brad Witt of WCIV said it was possible other companies would agree to a similar settlement if it is approved by the union.

"It certainly increases the heat on the remaining companies that are sidelined out there," Witt said. "Willamette here in the near future will be entering that market. It may be incumbent on the rest of the companies to accept if they don't want to lose their share."

The striking workers seek restoration of wages and benefits that were cut three years ago.

Town votes to hook up power lines

POST MOUNTAIN, Calif. (AP) — Voting literally electrified this tiny community, one of the last in the country without the power that millions of people take for granted.

Tuesday's vote for a public utility district was 45-44, said Gwen Smith, election clerk in Northern California's Trinity County. The turnout in the main election was 80 percent.

Opponents had argued the rural flavor of the area about 200 miles northeast of San Francisco would be tainted by electricity and that those wanting power at the flip of a switch had plenty of other places to live.

But residents such as Art Zacharias, who moved into the area in the late 1960s, were pleased.

"Do you like your toast in the morning? Do you pop it in the toaster and then do something else?" he asked. "We have one of those toasters that sits on the stove. When you're turning your bacon or eggs, your toast burns."

Zacharias said the generators many residents use are worse than electricity, since the machines also generate noise and smoke.

The new district may be able to obtain low-interest loans from the federal government to construct a power distribution network, which would be linked to an electricity supply.

But before power can flow through the community, all landowners would have to vote on any financing package.

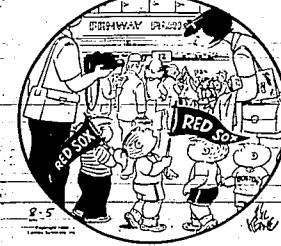

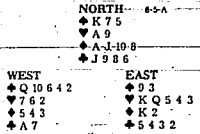

South had a compliment for East's defense after East made a brave play. Unmentioned was the fact that it was South's poor plan that gave East his chance to shine.

South won the spade jack and led his club king down into West's ace. West shifted to the heart seven. East winning the queen. A heart return went to dummy's ace, and South cashed three clubs and the king and ace of spades. To put pressure on East, on the third spade, East calmly parried with his diamond deuce. Convinced that the diamond finesse would succeed, South ran his queen to East's blank king. East's remaining hearts put the contract two down.

"Had East discarded a heart instead of courageously blanking his diamond king, I would have made the game," announced South. "I would have put East on lead in hearts for a forced diamond return for nine tricks."

Good marks for East of course, but South missed a better play. At trick two, he should have taken the diamond finesse. The finesse would have led to East's king, but the game would have been safe. East could not attack in hearts without giving South two stoppers, and instead of going two down, South would have scored an overtrick.

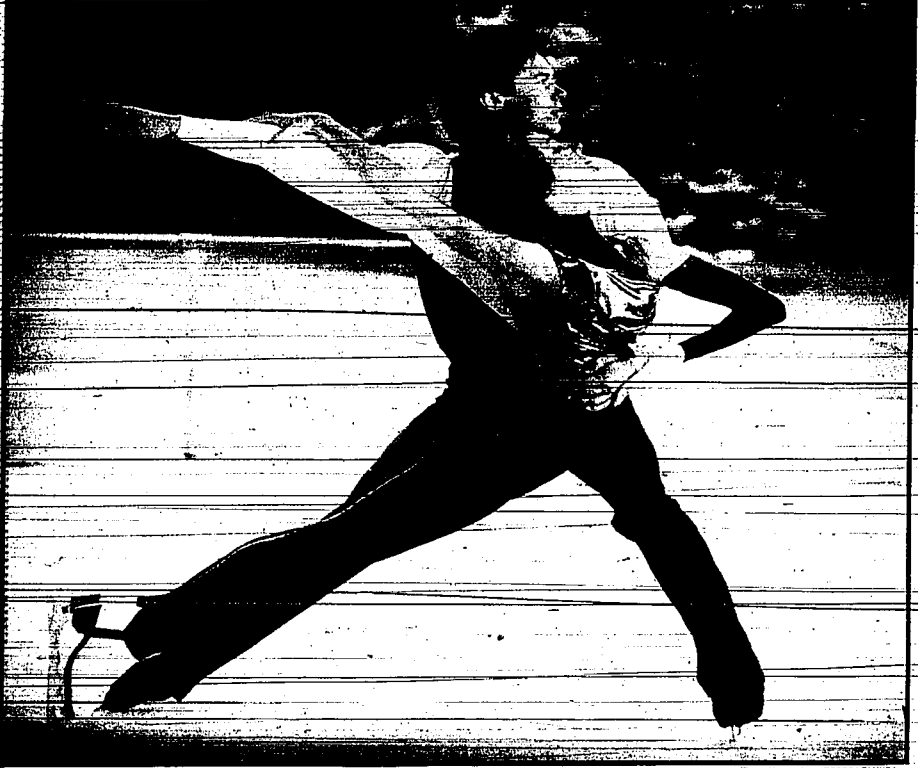

Soviets bring glasnost to Idaho

SUN VALLEY — Glasnost has unexpectedly enveloped Sun Valley in the form of a six-person entourage direct from the Soviet Union.

It is this new Soviet openness instilled by the Gorbachev era that has allowed the Sun Valley Co., for the first time, ever, to bring in two of the world's top ice dancing teams to star in three of the summer's ice shows and participate in an skating judges school and workshop.

Working and playing in Sun Valley are Marina Klimova and Serguei Ponomarenko, the 1988 Olympic and World Silver Medalists.

With them is the ice dancing team of Maya Usova and Aleksandr Gulin of the Soviet World Team; their coach Natalia Dubova and their team captain Eugene Shevatovski.

The Soviets took time out of their schedule early this week to talk with the local press. To bridge the language barrier, Vadim Kotlyar, a reporter for the Wood River Journal who is originally from Russia, interpreted the interview for his English-speaking colleagues.

"After much physical training, we have found paradise here because we do nothing but rest," said Klimova of her impressions of Sun Valley. "It is a pleasure to be greeted by such welcoming people."

ALBION — In 1897, Diamondfield Jack was sentenced to hang for the murder of two sheepherders. After six years in jail and several stays of execution, the day of the hanging had finally come.

That morning, the Governor, due to public outcry on behalf of the Jack, issued a pardon. The telegram came from Boise to Minidoka. Riders were dispatched to take word to Albion, which was then the Cassia County seat.

The trip was a long ride on horseback and involved crossing the Snake River by ferry. But the messengers made it in time because the sheriff, due to his fondness for Jack, had decided to postpone the hanging until sundown.

Diamondfield Jack was released from jail and went on to strike it rich in Goldfield, Nev., only to lose his fortune again in about five years.

Some of the highlights from the life of this colorful historical figure will be featured in a play tonight and Saturday night in Albion. The play is called "Diamondfield Jack: Fact and Fiction." Valerie Powell, of Albion, who wrote the script, says, "The play is historical, but it has a lot of humor."

The play will be presented by The Albion Valley Players, a group which draws its cast from Albion and the surrounding areas. Don Meyer of there plays the part of Diamondfield Jack, and State Senator Denton Darrington serves as one of the witnesses during the play's trial scene.

Albion resident Dick Anderson will play the part of his father,

Dick Anderson Sr., who was the sheriff that arrested Diamondfield Jack for murder.

"The play isn't just about the trial, however. According to Powell, "It takes in his saloon hangouts and serves the purpose of putting across his personality."

Powell researched the play by reading about Diamondfield Jack and from talking to old-timers in the area who remember him. She also read old newspapers.

"Most information came from the book, 'Diamondfield Jack, Frontier Justice,' by David H. Grover," Powell said.

Diamondfield Jack seemed to have a double personality," she says. "On one hand he would be extra kind and generous, but on the other hand his temper would flare."

At the time of Jack's arrest, tensions were running high between the cattlemen and the

sheepmen. A line, called the Goose Creek Divide, was drawn to separate the cattle grazing area from the sheep area, and Jack was hired by the Sparks Herald Cattle Company to patrol that line to make sure the sheep didn't cross it.

Both the Sheepmen's Association and the Sparks Herald Cattle Company called big game for the trial, William Borah from Boise was hired to prosecute, and James Holly, also of Boise, was hired for the defense.

According to Powell, Holly wasn't worried about the trial because the residence appeared to be a circus. "He was alarmed somewhat when the jury came up with a guilty verdict," she says. "Some say that all the jury members were sheepmen and they were prejudiced and angry."

The play will be performed at the gymnasium of the Albion Normal College Campus. Current time built nights is 7:30 p.m., but Powell suggests arriving before 7:00 to catch the clogging performance prior to the play. Advance tickets are available at the D.L. Evans Bank in Albion and Burley for \$2.50; tickets at the door the night of the performance will be \$2.00.

Friday and Saturday evenings before the play is a Chuckwagon Dinner at the campus starting at 4:00 p.m. Cost is \$3.50 a plate.

On Saturday afternoon, starting at noon, Alton Johnson will give stagecoach rides and the Oregon Trail Muzzleloaders will demonstrate skills of mount men of the 1800s. There will also be guided tours of the old campus.

Proceeds from the play will be used to promote the interests of the Albion campus and the arts.

Cloggers to perform at World's Fair

TWIN FALLS — The sound of frantic tapping resolves into a steady rhythm, and the eight dancers launch themselves into an exciting toy-soldier-style march.

Moments ago the room was filled with vague perplexity and confusion as the dancers went over endless lists of necessities — clothes and cameras, visas and voltage converters — but now the Sawtooth Country Cloggers are back on familiar footing.

One of the last practices before they leave Thursday for the other end of the world — Australia, and the 1988 World's Fair — is naturally a giddy affair. They spend what seems like hours on

a single step of the "Washington Post-March," correcting misplaced elbows and overextended feet. The line of smirking soldiers murmurs its relief when teacher Julie Whitehead announces, "OK, we're going to try two in a row!"

Gradually, their intense concentration pays off. Heads turn and feet pump in perfect time with the patriotic music. In a way, this new dance is unfamiliar ground for the group; the rest of their program will be set to bluegrass music, the staple of an art that originated in the Appalachians.

Clogging looks like a cross between tap and square dancing. The fancy footwork is done mostly with the toes, while the heels

keep a beat with a continuous sliding motion. The dance is frequently performed in couples or sets to the instructions of a caller, and may be precision, where steps are done in unison, or freestyle.

The Sawtooth Country Cloggers, at present a group of junior and senior high school students, have performed precision clogging throughout the Northwest. Their special invitation to Brisbane, the site of this year's fair, was the result of an appearance two years ago at the Northwest Folklife Festival in Seattle. After that performance, they were invited to Expo '86 in Vancouver. Unfortunately, that invitation was for the same time as the Twin Falls County Fair, which they had already promised to attend.

"We were so depressed," recalls Julie Whitehead, the leader of the group.

The cloggers were delighted, then, to receive an invitation to the Australian fair last August, leaving them plenty of time to plan ahead.

Clogger Missi King, of Twin Falls, says, "I was just totally thrilled to hear that the group would be going after months of fund-raising performances and projects."

The dancers will leave Twin Falls next week for Hawaii, where they will attend a workshop taught by Charlie Bures of Richmond, Ky., one of the country's top cloggers. They will then

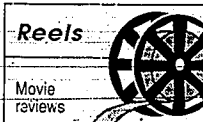

American version of Pippi Longstocking loses out

The following are capsule reviews of some of the films playing locally in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.



THE NEW ADVENTURES OF PIPPI LONGSTOCKING (G). In the late '60s, Pippi Longstocking, heroine of Astrid Lindgren's long-running series of children's books, was at the center of a series of Swedish films, whose badly dubbed American versions have now virtually disappeared from video rental stores. Pippi, who always comes out on top, has lost this time, to a badly thought-out, glaring, grating American hybrid, stuffed full of forgettable plastic songs and treadbare special effects. Although she is possible in Pippi's few sober moments, Jan-Eric, who plays her, is brahishly charming for most of the film's 1 hour and 40 minutes.

BIG (PG). Funny, warm, sophisticated and highly imaginative comedy-fantasy in which a 12-year-old boy's wish to be transformed into a man comes true. Then the 12-year-old with the body of a 30-year-old winds

up vice president of development at a toy company. Wonderful fun. With Tom Hanks, Elizabeth Perkins, John Heard, Robert Loggia, Jerrod Rushton and David Moscow.

CADDYSHACK II (PG). After an attempt to block his membership to Bushwood Country Club construction tycoon Jack Hartoumian (Jackie Mason) plans revenge against the club president, Chandler Young (Robert Stack), by turning Bushwood into America's only 6,000-yard, par-68 miniature golf course. Also stars Dyan Cannon. Special appearances by Chevy Chase and Dan Aykroyd. Directed by Allan Arkush.

COMING TO AMERICA (R). As a 21-year-old princeling of Zamunda, a mythical African kingdom, Murphy

reins in his scatology, making do with a soupcon of bathroom humor. John Landis, directing from Murphy's original story, has created a plentiful waste of time and money. Also stars Arsenio Hall, John Amos and James Earl Jones.

THE DEAD POOL (R). Nobody squeals like Clint, and in this fifth of the Eastwood "Dirty Harry" series, our man once again squints up a storm, descending gingerly into another cesspool of urban slime and "smugness." Sexuality — along with a cult horror director (Liam Neeson), whose betting pool on celebrity deaths backfires bloodily, Eastwood is good as always — full of coiled tension and fury, whispering irony — but the movie has an overly stylized media-fable script and nearly styleless direction by Malpasso's second unit specialist, Buddy Van Horn. Predictably, only the action scenes come alive, especially one tongue-in-cheek toy-car parody of the chase in "Bullitt."

DIE HARD (R). Archetypal bad-deal Hollywood exploitation, technically breathtaking yet disgusting and silly. Bruce Willis, however, is terrific as a

Witty New York cop conducting a one-man war against a bunch of terrorists who have taken over a Los Angeles office tower. With Reginald VelJohnson, Bonnie Bedelia and Alan Rickman.

MIDNIGHT-RUN (R). The script is ordinary: A wild cross-country chase from New York to Los Angeles with hard-case skip tracer (Robert De Niro) bringing back a soft-shelled accountant (Charles Grodin) who's embezzled millions from the Mafia — with the mob and the "FBI" on their tails and friendship blossoming in the midst of chaos and jeopardy. But here is a movie that really transcends itself through brilliant execution. Everyone does a terrific job: the actors, the crew, the composer, director Martin Brest. ... Did we miss anyone? As for De Niro, he is, once again, the pro.

PHANTASM II (R). Not the inspired surreal nightmare fantasy of the 1979, but a fast, entertaining, fright show all the same. The Tall Man (Angus Scrimm), that evil mortician with the lethal whirling silver spheres, is up to his ghoulish tricks. Once again directed and written by

Don Costarelli. With James Le Gros, Reggin Bannister, Paula Irvin, Samantha Phillips.

SHORT CIRCUIT 2 (PG). More adorable robot highlinks: with Fisher Stevens, Michael McKean (a fine, wily job) and the blissful runaway cyborg, Number Five — who looks something like a praying Minolta, and has country cousin misadventures in the Big City. There is nothing really wrong with this movie, though some adults should avoid it strenuously. The film wobbles along doing its job so effectively, mechanically and coyly, it often seems like a winking, flirtatious robot itself.

WHO FRAMED ROGER RABBIT (PG). Dense, satisfying, feverishly inventive and a technical marvel. "Who Framed Roger Rabbit" has Robert Zemeckis' "Back to the Future" as its director and Richard Williams, an Academy Award winner for "A Christmas Carol" (1972), as director of animation, under the joined banners of Disney's Touchstone and Steven Spielberg's Amblin companies. All hands and the artists involved may have created a film that no one sees just once. But — amidst the usual "treasure of the piece" is Bob Hoskins' pungent, visceral comic performance.

Movie 'Vibes' has a bad case of itself

HOLLYWOOD — "Vibes" is a low-vibration romantic comedy about two incompatible psychics falling in love on an Ecuadorean treasure hunt, and everything in it seems nine or 10 years out.

The production is lavish and plush; the story empty and silly; the photography is gorgeous; the lines gauche. The actors are talented, but they do not connect. The movie is about second sight, but it is mostly made by people who cannot convince us they see straight the first time — like six blind men grabbing at a High Concept.

The two main characters, Nick Deszy (Jeff Goldblum) and Sylvia Pickel (Cyndi Lauper), are supposed to be attuned to mental waves. Deszy is a psychometric who can pick up the past history of objects by touching them, and Ms. Pickel (accent on the "l") is in constant touch with a clairvoyant spirit named Louise.

Yet their penetration into future and past flips off conveniently when

they are recruited by Peter Falk's shifty-eyed Harry Bensusen. First, this obvious ploy begs help in locating a lost treasure. Then Deszy switches to a Scrooge McDuck expedition for a lost city of gold. Finally, he leads them to near death — and a mammoth crystal slab that may be Energy Central for the universe.

"Vibes" is one of those movies that tries to mix up small, recognizable human emotions — in this case, the skewed attraction between straight-arrow antiquities expert Deszy and ditzy beauty parlor kook Pickel — with a high-speed adventure backdrop. But screenwriters Lowell Ganz and Babco Mandel cannot create a credible romance here any more than they can dish up credible adventure or comedy.

Ganz and Mandel's script ("Night Shift" and "Splash" work from the collision of two characters: an unbuttoned, screwball character

against a repressed romantic. Here, the flake and the straight arrow are the romantic couple Lauper and Goldblum, with Falk a sort of second-rate flake. And the love scenes have a flat, goody gee.

Lauper is not served well in her

movie debut; she is exploited as a star and left floundering as an actress.

But then, none of the other actors is served, either. Only one scene in this movie really clicks — a macabre hospital episode with Michael Lerner as Harry's ravaged, gray-faced partner — and that may be purely due to Lerner's zombie intensity.

Director Ken Kesavaia showed a nice, gentle comic touch in the Seaside Street movie, "Follow That Bird," but here he seems buried under the top-heavy production, the thudding wisecracks and the unchemical combination of Goldblum and Lauper (When they tango together, they resemble Jabbaud Crane cutting a rug with Betty Boop).

"Vibes" (MPAA rated PG) misfires so badly that its most typical element may be villain Georgi Gress' appalling attempt at a Scandinavian accent. The rhythm is all wrong and he seems to be mixing up "Yumpin' Yiminy" style vaudeville Swedish with stage comic Nazi and Connecticut Yankee. Here, as everywhere else, the vibes do not jibe — and every mind we read comes out blank.

'For Keeps' to be released on videotape soon

FOR KEEPS, PG-13, 1988, 98 minutes, RCA Columbia Pictures Home Video, \$89.95.

Molly Ringwald gets swollen ankles, backaches and bladder problems but remains perky as ever in this cautionary, can-do romance about teenage pregnancy. She and leading man Randall Batinkoff play Darcy and Stan, "a couple most likely to succeed" till a romp in the rain results in an unwanted pregnancy. When their worst fears are confirmed, the youngsters discuss the matter with their ludicrously insensitive parents. "Forget it. You had a gorbil last year. You for-

got to feed it and it died," says Stan's father. Darcy's mother, however, insists that she have an abortion, but Darcy decides to get married and have the baby. Afterward, the sensible achievers turn into characters out of "God's Little Acre," fussing, drinking and laboring at low-skilled jobs. Writers Tim Kazurinsky and Denise DeClue forfeit their characters' integrity for what they imagine is social relevancy. But inevitably there are as wispy-wasby about the issues as about the heroes, serving up a "you can have it all" scenario in the end. The didactics, along with John G. Avildsen's sex-ed routine, undercut the pleasing teamwork of Ringwald and Batinkoff. But worst of all is the dumb dialogue. "When you're pregnant, you get hemorrhoids," says Darcy. "Bummer," says Stan. Bummer.

RAW, R, 1986, 90 minutes, Paramount Home Video, \$89.95.

"Raw" is the name of Eddie Murphy's concert film and an appropriate description of the fare within. Directed by Robert Townsend

("Hollywood Shuffle"), the film captures Murphy between features that are obviously intended to refine the image he projects here: a vibrant comic with an adult's vocabulary and a kids-frenetic energy, blessed with a wildly elastic face that demands both laughter and attention. Most of the routines will be familiar — fantasy marriages and the perils of palmistry,

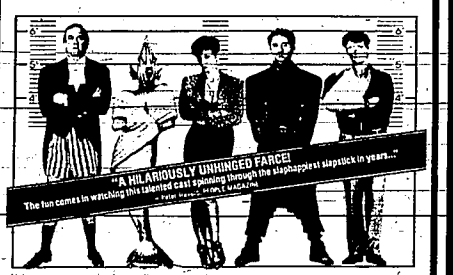
women of the '80s whose motto is "what have you done for me lately?," married men as unfaithful dogs, and the sweet sexual revenges afforded women.

For much of the film, Murphy trades on racial and sexual stereotypes even as he skewers them, and while this may be offensive to some, it's achingly funny to others.

so successful that Soviet officials formally proposed a non-currency exchange agreement providing for regular annual tours by Up With People, according to a news release from the organization's headquarters in Tucson, Ariz.

SPUTNIK, the travel/exchange bureau of Komsomol, the 40-million Communist youth league, sponsored the tour and arranged for the visitors to tour schools, camps, museums and historical and cultural sites in Leningrad, Kalinin and Moscow.

The entire tour was filmed by a Western television crew for a one-hour special to be aired nationwide this fall, hosted by Entertainment Tonight anchor Mary Hart, who accompanied the raise in Moscow.

show. The audience witnessed a perfection of classical ice dancing which parallels the ballet in grace, beauty and interpretation of music. Ice dancing style does not include the twirls and jumps which many people associate with figure skating, but it presents a quality and difficulty of mastery all its own.

The Soviets will skate tonight in a special Friday night performance and again tomorrow night on the outdoor ice arena.

Klimova, 22, and Ponomarenko, 27, have been married for four years and have been skating together as an ice dancing team since 1980. They captured the silver medal in both the 1988 Olympics and the 1988 World Championships, just behind teammates Andrei Bukin and Natalia Besteminnova. Klimova and Ponomarenko are now considered to be the best in the world. They have plans to skate in the 1992 Olympics and perhaps perform professionally in one of two professional skating shows in the Soviet Union after the Olympic competition.

Klimova, whose smile is captivating even as a shy newcomer, said she is impressed with the many ice dancing fans in the United States, some of whom are

very experienced and understand the nuances of the sport.

Her husband Sergei appears as if he were Prince Charming himself wearing a flowing shirt with a deep-cut neckline, his dark hair brushed back away from his face to look out at the world through crystal-clear blue eyes.

He said he is impressed with the large number of people in the United States who take up figure skating as a sport, and ice dancing in particular.

The Soviet Union has a good system of teaching children to skate through skating schools. As in the case of these Russian champions, ice dancing is taken up some four to five years after the individual learns to skate.

Dubova, who has coached Klimova and Ponomarenko since 1978, paired the couple up in 1980 and they have been together since.

Working intensively with the twosome for so many years, Dubova said they are like children to her. But she added, as ice dancers they are now her colleagues and she is interested to hear their opinions about what they do.

Dubova noted a similarity and difference between Russian and American skating circles. She

said each country has similar groups of adult skaters, both amateur and professionals. However, she was impressed with the caliber of famous professionals which come to express their ideas and exchange their talents as in the week-long Dance Judges' School in Sun Valley.

Dubova hopes when she returns to Moscow a similar exchange between famous athletes demonstrating their talents can be made.

Team captain Shevalovski, who is also a member of the Soviet Committee for Peace, expounded on Dubova's thoughts about exchanging ideas.

He suggested starting a program between the United States and the Soviet Union whereby young athletes from America will stay with Soviet families and learn of Soviet life and skating, and vice versa.

There have been exchanges of sporting talents with the highest levels of professional athletes in the Good Will Games and in the Sun Valley performances, he said. But he would like to see such exchanges done on a lower

skill level as well.

Sitting quietly during the press conference next to their teammates were the ice dance team of Maya Usova and Aleksandr Ghulin. However, when asked why ice dancing is so special, they came alive with eyes sparkling and voices laughing now and then.

Usova said it is the combination of two people and the interaction between the couple that make it beautiful.

Ghulin said ice dancing presents a bigger possibility to reveal or portray an emotion and is less difficult when done as a couple than when done alone.

"Ice dancing reveals a relationship between a man and a woman, much like Romeo and Juliet, much like life itself," Ghulin said. The Russian skaters have been to the United States only once before with the Tour of Champions which followed the world championships. Their unofficial ambassadorship carries all the facets of peace, goodwill and understanding. These Russian skaters will almost certainly leave a mark on the people they have met in America.

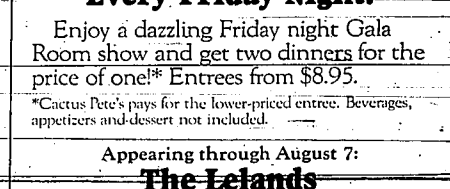

Success of 'Murder, She Wrote' no mystery to Angela Lansbury

By LYNN HOOGENBOOM

The reasons for the success of "Murder, She Wrote," one of the few remaining bright spots on the CBS schedule, are no mystery to Angela Lansbury. "I think the audience really loves mysteries," says Lansbury. "They love trying to figure out a knotty plot. And the cast is very much a part of our format. We bring back actors who haven't been seen for years, so there's always more than just the plot to watch."

Jessica Fletcher's antecedents are literary, rather than electronic: Agatha Christie's Miss Marple and Ariadne Oliver, the widowed mystery-writer friend of Hercule Poirot. But Lansbury was interested in playing Jessica Fletcher because of the resemblance she saw between Jessica and Agatha Christie herself. "I have a tremendous admiration for her — the woman, not just the writer," she says. "She was an all-around woman, which is inherent, I think, in her stories. And the way she understood human beings is very much, of course, my role as an actress. That's what I do, I study and observe people."

Lansbury, 62, has been acting and observing people for a long time. She was born in London, and came to America in 1940. By 1944, at the age of 18, she was making her motion-picture debut in "Gaslight." Her role as the Cockney maid garnered Lans-

bury's first Oscar nomination for Best Supporting Actress. She followed "Gaslight" with "National Velvet" (1944), "The Picture of Dorian Gray" (1945), for which she received a second Best Supporting Actress nomination, and "The Harvey Girls" (1946).

However, in "The Harvey Girls" more than one disturbing trend emerged. First, the future four-time Tony winner for Best Actress in a Musical was not allowed to do her own singing. And second, it was also the role in which Lansbury demonstrated how well she could play a heavy. In the years that followed, that was increasingly all she was allowed to play, and she was often cast as women who were 15 to 20 years her senior. Her quintessential movie role came in 1962, when Lansbury, then only 37 and made up to look 20 years older, delivered a chilling performance as the overbearing, manipulative mother of a Korean War hero in the political thriller "The Manchurian Candidate." Her performance gained Lansbury her third nomination for Best Supporting Actress.

Broadway's "Mame" (1966) finally broke the mold for Lansbury, proving that she was a certified star with a power and range that few actresses could match. "When I read the script, I said to my husband, 'This is it. If any show is going to make it for me on Broadway, 'Mame,' is the show. This part is written for me,'" Lansbury recalls.

Lansbury won the first of four Tony Awards with this show, and with her success on Broadway, other opportunities came her way. She did a number of TV movies, then landed a series of her own in 1984. "I think I've brought a lot of my own attitudes to the role," she says. But there are a few differences between Angela Lansbury and Jessica Fletcher. "Well, she doesn't drive a car," says Lansbury with a laugh. "I'll put up with not driving a car, although it's difficult for me to justify the bicycle."

The trend-setting "General Hospital" just has to be different. While the competition caters to the kids this summer with adolescent traumas, GH gives viewers Alan Feinstein as Bobbie's (Jackie Zeman) new love interest, the mysterious Gregory.

Feinstein is a veteran of quality theater work. Tennessee Williams picked him to play Stanley in the 1973-74 Broadway revival of "A Streetcar Named Desire," and he won a New York Drama Desk Award for his performance in Arthur Miller's "A View From the Bridge." A Circle Repertory Theater alumnus, Alan keeps going back to do more plays. When Vanessa Redgrave changes sex in CBS's upcoming "Second Serve," there's Alan in support.

Seeking a class act, GH boss Wesley Kenney called Alan after seeing him in "Equus" on a local stage. But just before Gregory surfaced on the soap, the writers' strike hit, so things are frozen.

All Alan knows is that Gregory is eyeing both Bobbie and her brownstone. Bobbie thinks she's being used and grows jealous over Gregory's wife. It's obvious that Gregory is going to have it both ways — wrap Bobbie around his finger and seize the brownstone. But for what? A park? A condo?

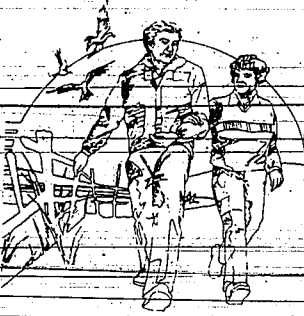

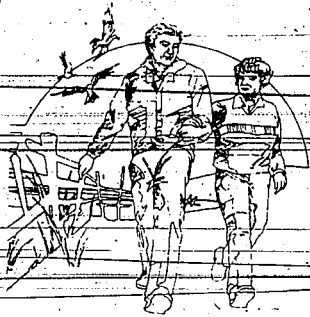

ABC's fall lineup not doomed yet

HOLLYWOOD — If the writers' strike ends within the next two weeks, ABC could get most of its new fall programming on the air in November, either "just before 'Wait and Remembrance' or just after," network entertainment President Brandon Stoddard said.

But at least two of the series on the prime-time slate — the "ABC Mystery Movie" anthology and "A Fine Romance" — an hour show about a divorced couple who find themselves reunited as hosts of a talk show, which the network plans to film on location in Europe — probably will not make it to the air until January. Stoddard said the network does not want to begin any new series in December to avoid competition with the holiday specials that are so prevalent that month.

Although one of ABC's new series, "Roseanne," starring comedian Roseanne Barr, is in production under an interim-guild agreement and could be ready to air as early as Oct. 16, Stoddard told a press conference Monday evening that the network will not necessarily put it on the schedule then.

"We want to test the waters first, and see what the NBC and CBS have planned," he said. Stoddard, the first of the three network entertainment chiefs to face reporters gathered for TV's annual summer press tour here, said that if the Writers Guild of America strike ends soon, fall programs could be ready to launch either just before the Nov. 13 debut for the first half of the network's 30-hour World War II miniseries, or following its Nov. 23 conclusion.

With the late start of the 1988-89 season, viewers can expect to see more first-run series each week than

usual in April and May, he said, but the network does not plan to extend original programming into the summer months next year.

Stoddard said that the plans ABC announced last weekend for an interim schedule of comedy reruns, movies, specials, news programs and sporting events for September and October could still change depending on developments in the 21-week-old writers' walkout.

"In a strike, boy, things can change," Stoddard said. "You don't want to commit to too much, then wake up the next morning and find out the strike is over."

Asked for reaction to recent statements by Hollywood producers that they would use every method available to produce their shows during the strike — including offering legal and financial protection to guild members who cross the picket line — Stoddard said decisions on whether to air shows produced during the strike would be made on a case-by-case basis.

"We're hoping first that the strike ends, obviously," Stoddard said. "We'd like to get our shows on the air, of course, but one of the problems you've got is who's going to write them. Obviously, we have to be concerned about the quality of those shows. There's no point in putting a brand-new show on the air if the writing is terrible."

If the network decides to air prime-time shows written by non-union writers, Stoddard noted, it risks the same problems it has encountered in daytime TV, which has been employing non-union writers since the strike began. Stoddard said daytime viewership has dropped during the strike.

"Where we're hurting is daytime," he said. "Those (advertising) revenues are off, and it's beginning to hurt."

Stoddard said that, like the production companies, the network is considering all options for producing new material during the strike, including importing writers from other countries, producing shows outside the United States and reviving old scripts — which ABC is already doing with remakes of "Mission: Impossible" and "Police Story." (Those two shows, he noted, will go on the air at some point next season regardless of when the strike is settled).

"At this point, we're looking at so many different things in so many different places, we're really looking at things on a case-by-case basis," Stoddard said. "There are ideas coming in from all over the world, ideas from England, Canada, Australia, everywhere... I don't think there's a situation we're not looking into at this point."

ABC continues to hold that, in support of the Alliance of Motion Picture and Television Producers, it will not accept any shows during the strike from companies that signed interim agreements with the writers' guild, he said.

"The reason that we (support) the alliance, quite honestly, is that we believe the situation in network television right now is very difficult," Stoddard said.

"Costs are rising, revenues are flat, (audience) shares are dropping and we are in the midst of a big change in network television," he added. "We support the producers in general because we believe in general they are attempting to hold production costs down, which is crucial to the future of network television."

Cable TV enjoys improved new status.

HOLLYWOOD — The cable television executives came cruising into the television critics' tour with a swagger that bordered on arrogance.

They have a reason to feel confident: The big East Coast cities are finally being wired so cable penetration — the number of homes taking the service, the economic foundation of the industry — is again on the upswing after a few flat years.

Moreover, cable's competitors, the still-dominant big three networks, are staggering under the combined-economic burden of their ownership changes and the loss in advertising revenue caused by a drop in viewers.

Add to that the fact that the networks' big fall draw — new programming — has been put on hold by the writers' strike, and you have a pretty cucky cable industry.

"We want the viewers to know that there's plenty of original programming on TV this fall on cable," said Paul Corbin, director of programming for the Nashville Network.

In general, cable audiences are at their highest in April, when overall viewership is still fairly high and the networks first go into repeats. It declines, along with overall viewership, through the summer and is low in the fall when the networks debut their schedules.

"Though the networks will have the Olympics and the World Series, for the first time we will not have the broadcast network debuts against us," Corbin said.

"So, presumably that decline will not happen this year. Cable has an opportunity to create the type of awareness of what's on cable in the fall that it usually has in April."

Specifically, the Nashville Network is heavily promoting a series of specials it calls "The American Music Festival." Virtually every cable chan-

nel has similar special plans for the fall.

But beyond that, there seems to be an overall feeling that cable has survived several crises and is now here to stay.

"Basic cable is hot and we're a part of that," said Thomas Burchill, president of the Lifetime channel. Emphasizing that, he announced that Lifetime had agreed to buy 13 new episodes of "The Days and Nights of Molly Dodd," the interesting series that did not make it on NBC, the type of programming that was out of the economic reach of basic, non-pay cable channels a few years ago.

"The cable business is enormously robust," said Michael Fuchs, chairman of HBO, probably the best known cable channel. "In the '70s, HBO pulled the cable business along. Now we're riding a little bit on the shoulders of the cable business. We're still the big brand in cable, but they've got a lot of momentum and we're taking advantage of it."

"So, I think we're in pretty good shape and everyone is saying that the strike is going to do irreparable damage to the networks. I don't know if

the damage will be irreparable, but I think it's going to hurt them very much this year," Fuchs continued.

"But this is a steady erosion that has been going on certainly since 1980."

The upbeat side of the cable story has had one important manifestation — the rise in original programming. When HBO was pulling cable along in the '70s, the reason to get cable was to see first-run movies, uncut without commercials.

The advent of the VCR and the cassette rental business ended that. Movies, new and old, shown in large numbers, are still a big part of cable's appeal, but they can no longer be the foundation.

In searching for other ways to get subscribers, cable has started producing programs of its own.

Ted Turner's new TNT announced its monthly original production. The Disney Channel has a couple of new movies that it is making along with some music shows. The culture channels, Arts and Entertainment and Bravo, each had shows about the movies. The Discovery Channel is running the new Christian Science Monitor's news program. The list goes on.
