## Easing winds give firefighting crews a break

More reinforcements joined the fire lines on major blazes in Idaho Thursday, and fire bosses got a second break in the battle against the worst of 17 wildfires when once-gusting winds moderated throughout the state.

"The screwy wind conditions that blew things up before have not materialized again," said spokeswoman Elizabeth Close of the Caribou National Forest on the Wyoming border.

Extra manpower and lighter winds enabled fire bosses there to gain ground on the 7,000-acre Trail Creek blaze, that had been threatening ranches in the Star Valley.

The same was the case in northern Idaho Clearwater National Forest, where fire bosses kept the stubborn 720-acre Opus 7 fire from overrunning U.S. 12 just west of the Montana border.

The lighter winds also improved prospects for corralling the 8,000-acre Eagle Bar fire burning in valuable commercial timber near Hells Canyon on the Oregon border and for protecting summer homes and a Forest Service compound from the 17,500-acre Battle Axe fire on the Middle Fork of the Salmon River in the central Idaho's Frank Church-River of No Return Wilderness.

Additional crews swelled manpower to over 3,000 from the Panhandle National Forest in the north to the Caribou on the east as flames continued burning on over 70,000 acres of forest lands. Losses, mainly in commercial timber, were running at around \$4.5 million and mounting.

Fire bosses on the Panhandle were preparing to begin releasing crews this weekend for other assignments around finally containing the 170-acre Crescendo Creek fire.

Meanwhile, the Boise National Forest announced that it was considering opening up the Willis Gulch area near Logan to a winter salvage log sale. More than 5,000 acres of timber, originally valued at over \$2 million, was burned by wildfire earlier this summer.

"There's usable product there and we want to put it back into the local economy through sawmills and loggers' wages," timber officer Truman Puchbacher said. The sale would be continued.

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In eastern Oregon, officials banned recreational users from 3.8 million acres of state-protected forest and range land, effective Friday — the first day of the long holiday weekend. Already closed are 2.8 million acres of land in western Oregon.

"The state needs to limit the risk of wildfire, and this has proven to be an effective way to do that," State Forester James E. Brown said.

Last year, 10.3 million acres in western Oregon were closed to the public for 11 days because of extreme fire danger. In that period, fires blamed on human activities dropped from six to one a day, said Kathy Apling, a state forestry spokeswoman.

Strict fire restrictions have also been imposed throughout Washington state, said Kathy Albert, a Forest Service spokesperson.

Fires also burned Thursday in Montana, Utah, Washington, Idaho and California.

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The delay affected as many as 75,000 hunters, state officials said.

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## Pinned pilot coaxed others out

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DALLAS — The last survivor of Delta Flight 1141 reached by rescuers was the pilot, who passengers say coaxed them out of the burning wreckage while pinned on his back beneath debris.

Capt. Larry Lon Davis, 48, was listed in fair condition at Parkland Hospital on Thursday, the day after the plane crashed on takeoff from Dallas-Fort Worth International Airport. The jet lost power suddenly and bounced three times before skidding to a stop at the end of the runway and catching fire. At least 95 people survived the crash; 13 died, including two flight attendants.

Many of the survivors escaped near the cockpit, which broke off from the fuselage and rolled skidded.

David Carmichael, a 33-year-old restaurateur from Monticello, Ark., said he could hear Davis telling passengers to remain calm as they scrambled to get out.

## Veterans shell findings of new Agent Orange study

CHICAGO — A new study of Vietnam veterans suggests that most escaped heavy exposure to the poison dioxin, even if they served as ground troops in areas extensively sprayed with the dioxin-containing herbicide Agent Orange.

But a Vietnam veterans' spokesman criticized the study as a twisted reshuffle of old data and said it misleads people into thinking smaller exposures were probably harmless.

The study's findings, based on a comparison of blood tests between 646 Vietnam veterans and 97 non-Vietnam veterans, confirm results of three previous studies on blood levels of dioxin in similar subjects, researchers said.

"Current TCDD (dioxin) levels were nearly identical in Vietnam and non-Vietnam veterans," researchers at the federal Centers for Disease Control reported in Friday's Journal of the American Medical Association.

Only two Vietnam veterans, or 0.3 percent of all 646 tested, had blood dioxin levels greater than 20 parts per trillion, considered "clearly elevated," the researchers said.

"These two men each reported their health status as 'excellent' and did not attribute any health problems to Agent Orange exposure," the CDC researchers added.

The two men were not among the 14 percent of the Vietnam veterans in the study group who did link health problems to exposure.

"This study is consistent with other studies and suggests that most U.S. Army ground troops who served in Vietnam were not heavily exposed to TCDD (dioxin), except perhaps men whose job involved handling herbicides," the researchers said.

Dioxin stays in the bloodstream for many years, and high levels of the chemical can be measured with blood tests as long as two decades after someone has been exposed, researchers said.

The CDC said it conducted the latest study to explore whether military records of troop locations and locations of Agent Orange spraying might prove useful in identifying which veterans had been heavily exposed.

It concluded that such records would be of no help, since its subjects were deliberately drawn from battalions that had served in the most heavily sprayed areas around Saigon in 1967 and 1968.

Barry Kasinitz, a spokesman for the 35,000-member Vietnam Veterans of America, criticized the report, saying it twisted data released a year ago.

Thursday its expert consultants still believe the elimination of measles in the United States "should be pursued," but the two lingering problems — young children who aren't vaccinated and older children whose vaccines fail — will require different solutions.

"Increased efforts are needed to vaccinate preschool-aged children," the CDC said in its weekly report. Many of the preventable cases "occurred in preschool-aged children living in inner-city areas," it said. Innovative strategies are needed to increase immunization levels in these populations.

Meanwhile, the CDC said, "aggressive revaccination strategies" may be needed during measles outbreaks to eliminate the so-called non-preventable cases in already-vaccinated children.

Such a revaccination would involve a program of additional shots for most children vaccinated before 1980, when the new vaccine recommendations began to improve the protection somewhat, Hersh said.

Researchers cannot say just what the latest drop in measles really means, Hersh said.

## Measles continues to decline in U.S.; no cases in Idaho

ATLANTA — Measles, the most common childhood disease, decreased by 42 percent in the United States last year to 3,652 cases — the first drop in four years, since the record low of 1,497 cases in 1983.

The national Centers for Disease Control reported Thursday that 1,010 of the cases, or 28 percent, were theoretically preventable: occurring in people who should have been vaccinated but weren't — mostly preschool children.

But nearly three-fourths of the cases were classified as non-preventable: occurring in patients who had been vaccinated but got measles anyway. Most of those were schoolchildren.

The last reported case of measles in Idaho occurred in 1986, near Pocatello, according to Cheryl Becker, epidemiologist with Twin Falls County's public health office. The most serious recent outbreak was a group of 23 cases discovered in the Panhandle in 1984.

Citing the state's more than satisfactory immunization level, Becker suggested that the only measles infections likely to occur in the future will be imported from outside Idaho.

"We've got two fronts," said Dr. Bradley Horin, a CDC measles specialist, "the young kids in those preventable cases, and the vaccine failure in older children."

Measles has fallen 99 percent since the era before measles vaccine was licensed in 1963, and the disease was thought headed for eradication when the record low came in 1983. But the case count then surged, researchers going back up in 1984, '86 and '86.

The Atlanta-based agency said Thursday its expert consultants still believe the elimination of measles in the United States "should be pursued," but the two lingering problems — young children who aren't vaccinated and older children whose vaccines fail — will require different solutions.

**Fire destroys F&G winter hay for elk**  
**JEROME** — A full hayload, part of the Idaho Department of Fish and Game's annual winter elk feeding on the Boise River South Fork, was completely destroyed by fire Saturday night. Craig Kvale, Region 4 wildlife manager, said the shed, located on Willowcreek and the first feeding site above Fentherline, was the victim of a man-caused fire and the Forest Service is trying to determine if it was accidental or arson. Kvale said the game department will decide this week how best to protect the hay that will be trucked in before snowfall. "We don't know if there is time to get the shed replaced and if now how we would want to protect the hay, with tarps or plastic or whatever," he said.

## Stan Potts will guide \$68,000 hunt

**JEROME** — Stan Potts of Hailty, who is donating his services, will serve as outfitter-guide for Robert Senter of New Hampshire in his highest tag auction hunt this fall. Earlier it was reported Seven Devils Outfitters of Higgins would be the outfitter but Senter owns that service and will not use it because of Potts' contribution. Senter paid \$68,000 for a non-resident Idaho tag at auction in Reno last fall and the funds already have been dedicated to transplanting 90 sheep into currently vacant habitat in Idaho. Through the auction plan and commission cooperation, the Idaho Chapter of the North American Bison Sheep Foundation hopes to provide at least 300 sheep-hunting tags a year for Idaho residents.

## Be aware of shorter hunting hours

**BOISE, Idaho (AP)** — With the approach of hunting seasons, hunters should be aware of a change in the hours during which it is legal to hunt. Earlier this year, the Idaho Fish and Game Commission set upland and big game hunting hours that will run from a half hour before sunrise to a half hour past sunset. The shorter hours were established in response to a report that most hunting accidents occur during low-light conditions at dawn and dusk, and to prevent a crippling loss of big game, Fish and Game officials said. In the past, big game hunting hours ran from one hour before sunrise to one hour after sunset, while upland game hunting hours were defined as "natural light." Officials said hours for hunting waterfowl during the 1988-89 season will run from sunrise to sunset.

## Special elk hunt causes mild flap

**IDAHO FALLS, Idaho (AP)** — A special controlled hunt is under way in an area south of the controversial Egin-Hamer Road to reduce a small herd of elk that has taken up permanent residence. Justin Naderman, regional wildlife biologist for the Idaho Department of Fish and Game, said the hunt is the result of requests by farmers for relief from damage to fields and haystacks done by the 40 to 50 animals in the herd. The either-sex hunt began Saturday and will run through Oct. 16. But Fremont County Commission Chairman James Siddoway said the hunt runs counter to Fish and Game's earlier statements about elk populations being endangered by the Egin-Hamer Road, an 8.8-mile farm-to-market route between Jefferson and Madison counties.

## BLM offers report on 10-year goals

**TWIN FALLS** — A new report describing the goals between now and the year 2000 for managing fish and wildlife habitat on public lands is available from the Bureau of Land Management. The 30-page color publication called "Fish and Wildlife 2000" describes the bureau's approach to managing the 300 million acres of multiple-use public lands inhabited by more than 3,000 species of mammals, birds, reptiles, fish and amphibians. The report was developed over two years following in-depth consultation with conservatory organizations, state officials and other interested parties. "The document is a roadmap to the future for fish and wildlife habitat management on public lands," said Robert F. Burford, director of the BLM. ## Attention steelheaders

Attention steelhead fishermen who fish on the upper Salmon River in the spring for steelhead. The Idaho Fish and Game Department (F&G) has just announced a very liberal bag limit for the lower Salmon River this fall (two a day limit, four in possession and six for the season). The F&G is aware that the steelhead run into Idaho this fall is very poor. Numbers are down at least 16 percent from last year. We need to conserve this small number of returning steelhead now, not next spring. Last fall these same bag limits on the lower Salmon River caused the spring steelhead fishing on the upper Salmon River to be severely restricted. These restrictions in-

cluded a catch and release on some areas of the upper Salmon River. The Central Idaho Rod and Gun Club is therefore recommending an October opening for steelhead fishing this fall. This late opening would give the F&G a little more time to determine a more accurate number of harvestable steelhead. We are also recommending a bag limit of one per day, two in possession and three per season with a size restriction of 31 inches on the entire Salmon River. Please take the time to call your local F&G commissioner and express your views.

We had been drifting nymphs from the boat for nearly an hour. The technique worked well. The trout seemed unable to resist the properly presented nymph. In stream nymph fishing, concentration is absolutely essential. The rhythm of casting and intense visual contact with leader, line and strike indicator is hypnotic. The three of us were mesmerized by the clarity of the water, the compliant trout and the requirements of our technique. Without fanfare, we suddenly found duns appearing on the surface. Duns were up — party time. Pale morning sun is an inclusive name for several species of mayfly, infrequently, intermis and lacetra being some of the more abundant types in Idaho and Montana. The hatch we had be-

Jim Barry and I found a gravel bar about 100 yards long. We stationed ourselves about 30 yards apart and commenced fishing. Trout were rising with a regularity that cries "mother lode" to the fly-fishing prospector. There were many trout but they required precision. This was complicated by a warm downstream wind of about 10 to 15 miles per hour. The long fine leaders of 6X and 8X with tippets 24 inches or better would bend downstream, preceding the fly if not properly cast. The most effective technique was to quarter the cast upstream, into the wind and well above the rising trout you chose to catch. With the correct application of force, the line would drive the leader and fly above the fish and

when it settled the leader would fall into place in a hooked curve, allowing the fly to precede the leader and line downstream. We fished the 100-yard stretch for four and one-half hours, each of us fishing less than 30 yards apiece. The fish rose consistently the whole time, always on the pale morning dawn. The rod-trout sum filtered through the heavy smoke of the Yellowstone Area, causing an orangish, unreal light. Anglers a few hundred yards away were indistinct, impenetrable in colors and outline; even their motions seemed slower. Time froze, only the fish seemed to react to real time. The senses record each trout, like a colored snapshot, freezing their motion into the mind's eye, part

 quality but brands do differ in capacity so it is best to use brass of the same brand and even better, from the same lot. The same is true for primers though some powders may require a magnum primer to get them properly motivated. Finding the proper powder and charge is where the work and patience comes in. Again research and reading of what powders other shooters have had success with can help you select two or three powders which are most likely to perform well in your gun with the selected bullet. The following steps should be helpful in developing the proper powder charges. They are a composite of suggested procedures from several different sources and I have found them very useful in developing a new load from scratch. Find as many sources of loading data for your gun as you can. Reloading manuals are best but technical articles in reputable magazines also can be considered. List the maximum charges from each source from heaviest to lightest. Be careful that you copy the data correctly. Select the median charge from the list of maximums. The median is the charge in the middle.

 • Reduce the median charge by 10 percent and use that as the starting charge.  
 • Test fire.  
 The test fire should be from a bench and printed on a target at 100 yards. This will allow you to not only check the load for high pressure signs but also for accuracy. If a chronograph is available, it can also help you measure how the load is performing. Two or more powders and/or bullets can be tested at the same time. This will make each trip to the range more productive.  
 • Increase the charge as described below:  
 A. 0-15 grains, increase by 1/10 grain.  
 B. 15-30 grains, increase by 1/8 grain.  
 C. 30-up grain, increase by one grain.  
 • When you reach the original median, stop if accuracy and performance are satisfactory. If you proceed past the median, do so with extreme caution, checking for any signs of high pressure.  
 • If high pressure signs appear before reaching the median, stop and reduce the charge by 2 percent.  
 Remember that very seldom are maximum charges the most accurate. Good luck and have fun reloading.

 Matt Jensen of Idaho Falls rushed to a small outboard-driven boat to help us out. But before they were able to get to us, we were carried into a rapid—the kind where the wa-

ter grows very deep and the pressure of its passing creates large standing waves. The long canoe was stable in the rapid, but my one-handed grip shook loose as I dropped into a hole between two waves.

Deprived of the canoe, I struck out for the shore which was very close. But my hand went beneath each standing wave, and the seat cushion was little help. Even in the calmer water below the rapid, I had to swim to stay afloat. Just as I reached the slower water at the rapid's edge, I saw the Jensen's boat downstream, waiting to pick me up. It looked a lot safer than the shore at that point and I grabbed the gunnel. They then picked Dorothy off the canoe, caught its bow painter and deposited us on a gravel beach.

 and we're hopeful of getting another 50 or so this fall to supplement the carryover we had from the original planting, Kvale said. Region 4 won't get all the ruffed grouse taken this year and Idaho is working on a wildlife exchange with Nevada for 150 birds. They've been in operation for a little over a week and so far only have six birds," Kvale said. "We think we can still get our 50 because we think they've located some better trap sites this fall." The unannounced depredation hunt began Monday on a small portion of Camas County in which deer have caused damage on agricultural lands. Kvale said the hunt is part of the special depredation option the department director is given by the commission to accommodate such complaints. This one allows for 50 permits, with the permit holders being selected off the depredation sign-up sheet that is filed with the department each year by hunters. Hunters are requested to supply their preferred hunting units and the permits are released if a depredation hunt is put into effect. Kvale said five antlerless deer

were taken on Monday's opener and a close watch will be maintained, although the easy accessibility to the area will allow some successful hunters to move in and out without being checked. At this hunt's conclusion, the department will assess the impact on the degrading herd and if more pruning is required, a second 50-permit rifle hunt will be put in place for Sept. 10-25. The current season ends Sept. 5. The general deer season opens Saturday in Units 43, 46, 47, 48, 49, 54, 56 and 57 and runs through Sept. 30. That portion of unit 53 east of U.S. Highway 93 will have a long season, running from Sept. 3 through Dec. 31. The general elk archery season will run Sept. 3-30 in Units 43, 48 and 49. "We have every indication that our deer and elk herds are in good shape," Kvale said. "Due to two mild winters in a row, we've had excellent fawn-toe carryover. The problem right now might be that due to the drought, the animals are pretty closely tied to water sources." Kvale emphasized again that the overlapping of rifle hunters and archers in that special depredation hunt area south of Hill City should be remembered by individuals working that area.

# Bush, Dukakis on road, trade words over environment, education

George Bush, venturing into Michael Dukakis's backyard, accused his opponent Thursday of fighting efforts to clean up dirty Boston harbor. Dukakis attacked his rival's claims on education and asked "Where was George?" when school programs were being cut. "He was playing hooky," Dukakis said, answering his own question.

The presidential candidates cam-

paigned on opposite ends of the country each trying to take the offensive and demonstrate that their full campaign is near full swing well before the traditional Labor Day kickoff. A day after declaring himself to be a life-long environmentalist, the Republican nominee traveled to Massachusetts and took a boat tour of the harbor — an overt aimed at making its pollution problems an embarrassment for the governor.

The vice president was encouraged by a new poll showing his race with Dukakis deadlocked even in Dukakis' home state, where he has won three terms as governor. Two hundred years ago tea was spilled in the Boston harbor in the name of liberty, Bush said. "If tea were spilled in the Boston harbor today, it would dissolve in the residue of my opponent's neglect and delay." Dukakis, ridiculing Bush's claims to

be an environmentalist, said Bush was "one of the charter members of the environmental wrecking crew" of the Reagan administration. He also charged Bush had told California voters he opposed offshore oil drilling while telling Texas audiences he supported it. Dukakis said his environmental policy doesn't change with the times. Bush's running mate Sen. Dan Quayle was on a week-long trip through the

South. In Little Rock, Ark., he said that despite his wealth, "I identify with people that need help." Democratic vice-presidential nominee Lloyd Bentsen, was on vacation in Wyoming. In Boston, Bush contended that as governor Dukakis opposed and delayed cleaning up the harbor and had sought permission from the Environmental Protection Agency to delay a ban on dumping wastes in the harbor.

Dickinson cautioned that the NTSB investigation team had just begun to study positions of the Delta aircraft's wings and slats. NTSB investigators said none of the witnesses they interviewed who were on nearby planes could tell them the position of the airplane's flaps.

Dickinson said investigators have not talked to the crew, but hoped to interview First Officer Wilson Kirkland on Friday. The NTSB official also said control tower personnel indicated the Boeing 727 took off at an angle that was higher than normal.

Control tower workers who watched the plane leaving told investigators the plane had a "nose high attitude of 15 to 20 degrees." Investigators assume that they meant that was higher than normal," Dickinson said. Earlier Thursday, Dickinson told reporters the plane's crew had another indication of trouble during takeoff. A cockpit tape recording recovered from the plane showed that pilots had talked about an engine problem seconds before the jetliner crashed. "Shortly after takeoff there was a sound, (apparently) warning a stall condition may be

approaching," Dickinson said. He said the sound came from the shaking of the "stick," a device similar to the steering wheel that automatically makes a sound when a problem develops. "This indicates the plane may be approaching a point where it won't be able to fly," he said. "Shortly after that, there was some conversation about an engine problem." But he stressed that the warning sound could have stemmed from something besides an engine problem. He would not state, except to say, "In this case, we're talking about hydraulics."

ued burning toward a dude ranch, fire officials in Montana said. "We've got major fires on both sides of the Silverpit Ranch," fire information officer Chris Comstock said Thursday. The Storm Creek and the Hellroaring Creek fires in the Absaroka-Bearfoot Wilderness have charred more than 90,000 acres and were only three miles apart.

"Down-canyon" wind blew the flames of the Storm Creek blaze through a 5.5-mile fire line that crews had spent four days building in rugged canyon, fire information officer Nick Tafuya said. Near West Yellowstone, Mont., crews used bulldozers to carve a 12-foot wide fire line between the gateway town and the western flank of the North Fork fire inside the nation's oldest national park.

Control lines held on the northwestern corner of the fire, where several blow-outs had occurred earlier in the week, and a 2-mile run on the eastern edge cooled down, easing the danger for ranches just a mile away. "They're still definitely on alert there," Ms. Close said. "But that area that advanced on them Tuesday has not moved since it was arrested." Fire bosses encircled the finger with retardant, water drops from a double-rotored VTOL he-

licopter and bulldozer lines. A crew remained near the farmlands in the event the fire escaped the lines, Ms. Close said. "But the focus of the attack was on strengthening the control line on the northwest corner and reining in flames moving to the north toward Black Mountain. On the Opus 7 fire, bosses massed crew strength on the steep slope above U.S. 12 to battle the blaze that had crept within 200 yards of the highway, sending loose rock and flaming snags down onto the roadside. Hoses were stretched across the roadway from the Lochsa River to get water on the flames, and the road remained open with motorists subjected to only brief delays. "As long as the wind doesn't blow, we're not too bad off," said Jerry Chapman, spokesman for the Clearwater Forest. "It gives us a false sense of security."

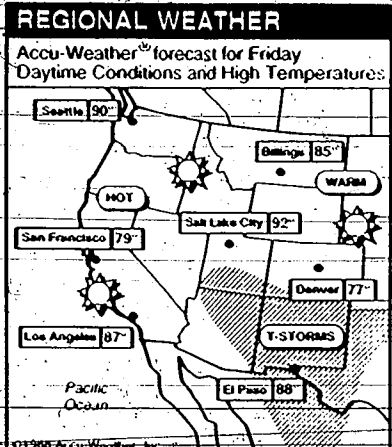
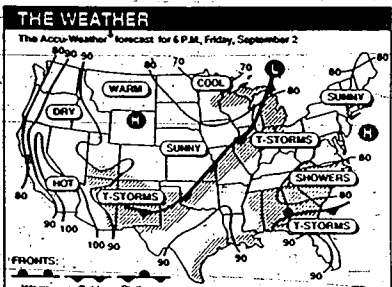

out of the plane near him. "The pilot's seat back was broken so that he was lying flat on his back with all this debris on top," Carmichael said. "And the whole time he was saying, 'Slow down; watch your step.'"

Davis has flown for Delta since October 1985. He has flown more than 17,000 hours commercially, with nearly 7,000 hours logged on a B727, the type of plane he flew Wednesday.

Firefighters found Davis strapped to his seat, slipped a backboard underneath him and pulled him from the wreckage. He was the last survivor to get out of the plane.

"He was conscious, and he was hurting," said Cpl. Bill Taylor, an airport firefighter. Passenger Dan Walker, a Dallas veterinarian, credited the pilot for keeping the plane level as it plummeted toward the ground.

"We got airborne about 300 feet and then we got in trouble and the pilot did an excellent job of getting us flat," he said. "All he did was save a few hundred lives."

Neighbors in Davis' hometown of Greenville praised him as a community leader. He is on the board of trustees for the Greenville Christian School and is active at Aldersgate Church.

Raiford Stainback, also a school board member, said he was not surprised by the pilot's actions during the disaster. "He's so calm. He's always got a cool-head when he has to make decisions," Stainback said.

"You don't have too many folks like Larry Davis in your community," said school secretary Barbara Christian. "We're just so thankful that it didn't turn out as bad as it could have for both him and the passengers."

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# ISU submits bid for 15% budget increase Charges still pending

POCATELLO (AP) — Idaho's rejuvenated economy has the state's higher education officials optimistic about next year's budget, but Pocatello area lawmakers warn not to expect a windfall.

Idaho State University made its request for a 15.8 percent budget hike to the state Board of Education on Thursday. ISU President Richard Bowen acknowledged that the school won't get all of its request, but he said the state's revenue surplus indicates it should be a pretty good year for education funding.

Before the meeting, state Sen. Ralph Lacy, D-Pocatello, said demands on the state budget will be great next session. He's a member of the Legislature's Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee, which makes the major budget decisions.

The state ended the 1988 budget year July

with a surplus of \$12 million. Lacy said some of that may be available for supplemental appropriations.

If the economy continues to expand, revenue next year could increase by \$14 million over this year, he said.

But that tax income still may fall \$30 million short of spending commitments the state already has made for next year.

"I have sort of a two-fold opinion on the education budget outlook," said Lacy. "I think higher education deserves more than anyone else because its only source of funding is at the state level."

Rep. Pete Black, D-Pocatello, another member of the budget committee, said the Legislative Budget Office already projects that the 1989 session will have to come up

with \$40 million to \$50 million to fund maintenance-level operations.

"If you know where we can find that kind of money, let me know," said Black.

The session was called to justify ISU's budget request, but developed into a discussion of higher education in Idaho Falls.

Idaho State wants to create a dean-level position to administer courses it offers at University Place in Idaho Falls.

Sen. C.E. "Chick" Bilyeu, D-Pocatello, complained that the University of Idaho has been allowed to "dominate" the Idaho Falls area, even though its main campus is 600 miles away.

Bilyeu asked board members and university officials if the establishment of a new ISU administrator would put the Pocatello school on equal footing in Idaho Falls.

ST. ANTHONY (AP) — Charges probably will not be filed until after the Labor Day weekend in the apparent slaying of an Ohio woman found dead Wednesday in the Island Park area, Fremont County Sheriff Terry Thompson said.

The sheriff said he would not seek a complaint and arrest warrant until reviewing the results of an autopsy and interviewing a suspect in the death of Christine Warnick, 36, of Powell, Ohio.

Thompson declined to identify the suspect, who he said was being held in another county on felony charges unrelated to the Warnick case.

Only sketchy information has been released about Mrs. Warnick's death and the suspect. Thompson said he did not want to jeopardize his investigation by being more specific.

The suspect is not an Idaho resident and almost certainly did not know the mother of three before she disappeared Aug. 22, the sheriff said.

Fremont County Coroner Paul Romrell said Thursday that preliminary results from an autopsy being conducted in Pocatello indicated Mrs. Warnick probably died the same day she disappeared after making charcoal sketches in a nearby canyon.

## EPA recommends approval of permit for toxic waste storage by Envirosafe

BOISE (AP) — The Environmental Protection Agency has recommended approval of Envirosafe Services of Idaho Inc.'s "Part-B" permit to store toxic waste at its Owyhee County facility for a decade, despite opposition from its Grand View neighbors.

Envirosafe, which paid more than \$335,000 in fines between 1983 and 1986 for improper handling of waste and other violations, has been operating under a temporary permit since it took over the dump in 1981 from Wes Con.

Thousands of tons of hazardous waste, including polychlorinated biphenyls, or PCBs, are stored in a series of trenches and old missile silos. PCBs, extracted in the disposal of old generators, have been banned as suspected cancer-causing agents.

Although Wes Con's idea of burying waste in missile silos

was lauded at the time, the silos later were found to be leaking wastes into the ground. In 1985, Envirosafe drilled a new monitoring well in the silo area and unwittingly plowed a path for wastes to trickle into a groundwater aquifer 200 feet below.

Catherine Massimino, EPA environmental engineer in Seattle, said the agency's approval amounts to giving Envirosafe a clean bill of health with several stipulations attached.

The EPA has investigated the groundwater and determined that "the contamination doesn't appear to still be there," she said.

The EPA will hold a public hearing later this month on the Part-B application at Rimrock High School near Bruneau and Grand View. A final decision is expected in late October, EPA officials said.

David Hodge, Envirosafe pro-

ject manager, said his company is pleased with EPA's initial approval.

Several Grand View residents, including Rep. Frances Field, R-Grand View, have requested the EPA deny the application and shut down the waste dump. Mrs. Field is concerned the groundwater may be contaminated, and fears the waste poses long-term health consequences for southern Idahoans.

"I think the EPA is doing a better job monitoring it, but I am very concerned about the site," she said Wednesday.

Hodge said the violations occurred mainly from "having too many drums stored above ground" and from faulty paperwork.

Ms. Massimino said the long delay on the company's application stems from tests on the groundwater around the site.

## Water fears 'false alarms'

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — The chief executive officer of Coeur d'Alene Mines Corp. says northern Idaho residents' concern with the quality of water in their lakes is understandable, but misplaced.

Frankly, it becomes rather disturbing to listen to the same old ghost and horror stories that aren't accurate," Dennis Wheeler said at a public hearing sponsored by state Sen. Mary Lou Reed, D-Coeur d'Alene.

Wheeler said testimony at the meeting focusing on the deterioration of water quality in the lakes was a rehash of earlier environmental false alarms.

Long-term environmental planning is necessary to protect local property values, he said.

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# By not voting, Americans forfeit their influence on politics

There's a tendency to think, as "Campaign '88" grinds inexorably toward resolution in November, that it has again been "politics as usual."

There've been the gibes and insults, the usual hypocrisy, the dancing around issues for fear of offending some large bloc of voters or in hopes of placating another. We see it happening again and we wonder why we bother to vote. Does it really make any difference?

I think it does - to the extent that it enables us to participate in the political process. By not voting, we give up, completely, any influence we might have on governmental actions or policies. The reasons why we vote the way we do need examination, because that determines why we wind up with so many poor candidates.

As long as we vote for candidates on the basis of tradition, or because someone tells us to, without examining whose interests these candidates are working in, we'll continue to feel victimized by the processes of government. We're obliged, if we're dissatisfied with the way things are, to work to hang them - either by finding better candidates, attempting to influence incumbents or by running for office

ourselves. The first thing we need is more people in office who represent the people who financed their campaigns, not the people who voted for them.

That's the feeling I have about the past eight years. Some of us seem satisfied with the way things have gone during that time. Environmental degradation, armed conflict, and serious, unresolved social problems either don't concern these folks or they seem to feel it's all an inescapable part of life - there's not much we can, or should, do about it.

There seems to be a fair amount of cynicism in the air, the feeling that some of the problems facing humanity are so overwhelming it's beyond our ability to correct them.

At the same time, other people are saying... that the time to stop, even begin to reverse, what some see as the decay of America and the decline of American influence abroad is now. By the choices we make, not only in who we vote for this November but in how we lead our own lives, we will all determine our collective

future. It's in our hands.

Personally, I'm offended by the way George Bush has conducted his campaign so far. Without any apparent personal vision of a future better than the present, Bush resorts to accusations and innuendos to defame his opponent. Dukakis needs only to point to the Reagan administration's record on fighting environmental degradation, or in fighting the erosion of vital government services, drugs, poverty, tyranny, budget deficits or the influence of special interests on government to provide reasons for giving him a crack at the job.

The governor of Massachusetts, apparently a capable administrator, is criticized for a lack of charisma; but we've seen how that quality can be used to bamboozle us into believing that the delusions of a charismatic leader are actually vision.

Bush, who so far hasn't been accused of having charisma, questions his opponent's patriotism, a sleazy ploy peculiar to right-wing zealots. In defending the incumbent administration's record on environmental issues, raised by concern over the desecration of Atlantic Coast beaches by garbage washed ashore,

Bush implies Dukakis was somehow responsible for the pollution of Massachusetts Bay, neatly overlooking the fact the Reagan administration - of which he portrays himself as being a loyal member (when it's wise to do so) - has systematically gutted the powers of the Environmental Protection Agency and its abilities to prevent pollution. Maybe George didn't know that.

The Republicans, understandably, want to keep their grip on the White House, so they talk a good deal about the value of sending a "team" to Washington. What they hope for is the eventual elimination of organized opposition to the arrogant, ego-driven abuses of the Reaganauts.

Let's not mistake affection for a charming former actor for endorsement of policies detrimental to the welfare of many Americans. The Reaganauts will long be remembered for not doing what they said they'd do - balance the budget and provide responsible leadership - and for doing what they said they wouldn't - acknowledging the Soviets are fellow human beings.

They've taken credit for anything that went right, whether or not they had much to do with it, and evaded responsibility for anything that went wrong, trying to blame it on the Democrats.

I'm less concerned with how Wall Street is doing than how Main Street's making out, and Main Street has some problems. What's good for General Dynamics is not necessarily what's good for us. I don't believe we need weapons in space, more aircraft carriers or higher-technology weapons.

I do believe the time has come to peacefully work toward reducing tensions in the world.

Dukakis may not be a fiery orator or a dynamic leader, but I guess I prefer someone who can handle the job and solve problems without creating new ones; it would be a refreshing change.

But why blame anyone or any party for anything? We elected these people. If anyone's responsible for what's wrong, it's us.

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# Pilot aborts flight on Salt Lake route

GRAPEVINE, Texas (AP) — One day after Delta Flight 1141 crashed on takeoff from Dallas-Forth Worth International Airport, killing 13, a pilot taking another Boeing 727 on the same flight to Salt Lake City aborted takeoff because of apparent equipment problems, Delta Air Lines officials said.

Passengers, six of them from among the 95 survivors of Wednesday's crash, were stunned when the captain brought the jet to a halt and taxied it back to the terminal.

"We figured this would be the safest flight we could ever take today," said passenger Louise Cox, of Baton Rouge, La., as she waited to board another 727 for Salt Lake City. "Evidently not."

The flight, scheduled to depart at 8:31 a.m., finally left Dallas at 10:42 a.m.

"The captain feels that he had what is called a compressor stall," said Delta spokesman Bill Berry from the airline's Atlanta headquarters. "There was a crosswind blowing across the runway. That can interrupt the smoothness of the airflow that goes into the engine, creating a temporary loss of power. That is very likely what happened."

The pilot's name was not immediately available.

The plane was up to about 20-25 knots, which is extremely slow," Berry said, when the pilot decided to stop the takeoff. "The airplanes get up to 100 knots before they become airborne. He did not get the proper readings from one of his engines. He decided to go back to the gate."

Under normal circumstances, a pilot would "simply increase thrust to see if everything continued to perform right. But based on the incident that happened yesterday, the captain was extremely cautious and elected simply to come back to the gate and let maintenance look at the engine," Berry said.

On any day, he emphasized, captains have got to go by their years of experience. If they don't like what they feel, if they've just got a gut feeling, it's their responsibility not to do anything.

Thursday's flight carried 102 passengers plus a crew of seven, according to Delta spokesman Henry Conley in Dallas. Conley said that his knowledge, all on board the aborted flight got on the replacement plane.

Shaken passengers waiting to board that plane described their experience.

"It was a routine take off until we got almost to the end of the runway," said Assis-

tant U.S. Attorney Don Burkhalter of Jackson, Miss., where the flight originated. "Then we heard what sounded like bumps and the pilot decelerated." He said there was a problem with the "compressors," Burkhalter said.

"The captain said, and this is a quote, 'It's just one of those things. We just laughed.'"

It was a nervous laughter, said Burkhalter, who was on his way to Fresno, Calif., with his wife.

"When he (the pilot) said 'Get your bags and get off; it didn't take me long,'" said G.W. Estelle of Baton Rouge.

"We didn't think anything about taking the plane at first, but when they said they had a problem... I was proud to get off," he said.

Waiting to board Thursday's flight — before it was aborted — a survivor from Wednesday's crash talked of the difficulty in lining up to get on Flight 1141 a day after.

"It's pretty hard," said Ronald Black, 30, of West Monroe, La. "You've got to do it sometime. Can't live in Dallas. I've either got to go home or go hunting. I've gotta fly either way, so I might as well go hunting."

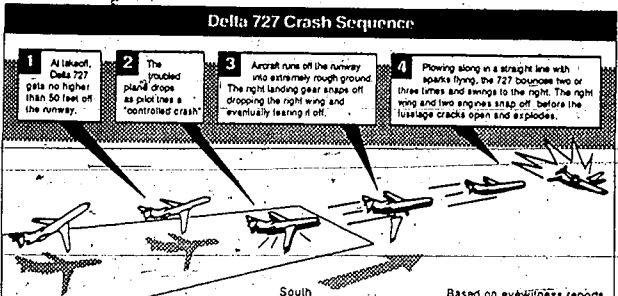
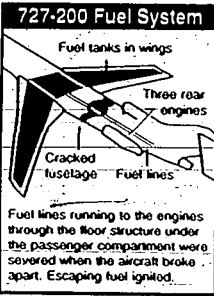

# Fires pose continuing crash problem

WASHINGTON (AP) — Efforts to protect airline passengers from rapidly spreading post-crash fires, such as the one that swept through the Delta Air Lines jet in Texas, remain stalled after more than a decade of frustrating research.

Four years ago, the Federal Aviation Administration was on the verge of requiring airplanes to use a special fuel additive which its supporters said would stop aircraft fuel vapors from igniting in a crash.

Although the anti-misting additive suppressed the spread of flames in repeated static tests, a highly publicized test using a remote-controlled Boeing 720 in the California desert failed miserably in November 1984, as the deliberately crashed jet was engulfed in a ball of flames.

The failed test came only weeks before a regulation requiring the additive was to have been announced, although the airlines had argued the additive's value was questionable and there were indications it could interfere with engine performance.

Eleven months later, after the government and chemical industry and spent millions of dollars on the research, the FAA abandoned the fuel additive idea because

the agency said the concept is not practical for day-to-day airline operation in the foreseeable future.

According to government figures, about 40 percent of the fatalities in potentially survivable airline crashes are caused by flames or the inhalation of toxic smoke.

Most of the 13 people killed in the crash Wednesday of Delta Flight 1141 as it was taking off from the Dallas-Fort Worth airport were believed to have died from the flames and smoke, according to investigators. It is believed that many more might have perished if the plane had not ripped apart in three places, allowing passengers to more rapidly escape.

Concern about the danger of fire after crashes has been raised by aviation safety experts for years. Research tests ways to reduce the threat gained momentum in 1977 after the fiery collision of two Boeing 747 jumbo jets on a fog-bound runway at Tenerife in the Canary Islands killed 563 people.

For six years after the Tenerife crash the FAA's focus was on developing a polymer called Avgard, which was supposed to prevent the misting of jet fuel and thereby prevent the fireball that often engulfs a jet

when fuel lines are severed in a crash.

The FAA estimated at one point that as many as 135 lives a year could be saved if the polymer were used as a fuel additive by all commercial airlines — a British company, Imperial Chemical Industries, invested more than \$15 million in developing Avgard prior to the ill-fated test in the California desert in 1984.

When fuel lines are severed or fuel tanks rupture in a crash, jet fuel often turns into a mist of small droplets that can readily explode into a fireball when exposed to heat or flames. The polymer was hoped to prevent the misting.

"There hasn't been any research done by the FAA on the anti-misting polymer" since the crash test in 1984, said agency spokeswoman JoAnn Sloane.

In recent years, the FAA has explored other methods aimed at reducing the danger of fuel fires after crashes and has taken actions to reduce the fire danger inside airline cabins.

Airlines have been required to install fire-blocking seat covers that allow passengers as much as 40 additional seconds to escape before being exposed to toxic fumes.

# Specialists want ban on tritium

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States and Soviet Union should halt production of a key component of nuclear weapons as a way of pacing cuts in their arsenals, according to a group of arms control specialists.

In an article to be published Friday in the journal Science, the group called for stopping further production of tritium, a hydrogen isotope that decays at a rate of 5.5 percent yearly. Tritium is a component of the modern, compact nuclear warheads deployed by the superpowers.

A nuclear weapons scientist from Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory, however, responded that the proposal poses numerous problems and could complicate U.S.-Soviet arms talks.

Advocating the "Tritium Factor" as a means of arms control were four specialists, headed by J. Carson Mark, associated with the Nuclear Control Institute, a Washington-based policy group.

Mark is former leader of the theoretical division at Los Alamos National Laboratory.

Mark contended that the 5.5 percent annual decay of tritium could serve as a "forcing function" to produce steady, verifiable reductions in the superpowers' nuclear arsenals. Such reductions would result in a comprehensive 50 percent cut in warheads by about 12 years after an agreement — the year 2001, if the cut-off were to begin now.

# Weekend deaths may exceed 420

CHICAGO (AP) — At least 420 people will die in traffic accidents during the three-day Labor Day weekend that traditionally marks the end of summer, experts said Thursday.

The National Safety Council estimates 420 to 520 people will die on the nation's roads during the long weekend, which for counting purposes begins Friday at 12 p.m. local time and ends at midnight Monday.

Last year, 411 people died during Labor Day weekend. The highest toll was logged in 1968, when 688 people were killed.

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# Workers in Poland end strike

**GDANSK, Poland (AP)** — Shipyard and steel workers ended strikes Thursday, and Lech Walesa urged others to halt Poland's worst labor turmoil in seven years now that the government has agreed to discuss Solidarity's future.

Walesa met with ranking officials Wednesday for the first time in six years and the government agreed to discuss the out-moded union and other issues. Restoring Solidarity's legal status was the main demand of the strikers.

Workers at the Stalowa Wola steel mill in southern Poland began leaving the plant at 7 p.m. after receiving a telephone appeal from Walesa and a message from the Roman Catholic episcopate, a strike committee spokeswoman said.

At least 3,000 strikers were in the Lenin shipyard, where Walesa works as an electrician, including workers from other yards in this Baltic port. They hoisted Solidarity banners as members of their strike committee led them out.

About 2,000 onlookers chanted, "Thank you, thank you," and "There is no freedom without Solidarity!" Strikers and the crowd outside joined in singing the national anthem just before the shipyard gates swung open.

More people lined the route to St. Brygidy's Church, a headquarters of sorts for the men of the shipyard where Walesa led a strike eight years ago that gave birth to Solidarity.

Poland's communist authorities recognized Solidarity in an agreement signed Aug. 31, 1980, but declared martial law in December 1981 to suppress the Soviet bloc and outlawed it the following year.

"In the packed church, Rev. Henryk Jankowski declared, 'In your wisdom, which you showed today you decided about suspending the protest, but it is only the end of the physical protest.' The strike goes on through dialogue."

# Crews locate plane wreckage

**ARTEAGA, Mexico (AP)** — Rescuers climbed to the wreckage of a commuter plane Thursday and found no survivors among the 20 people aboard when it slammed into the rugged mountains in the western Sierra Madre, a military official said.

Rain and cloudy weather from Hurricane Kristy delayed efforts to reach the wreckage of the twin-engine plane. Crews trudging up the rocky, forested mountain reached the site a day after the crash Wednesday morning.

"They have located the bodies," said Gen. Carmelo Teran, chief of staff of the 21st military zone. "They have found no survivors."

He added that searchers had been unable to count the bodies. Teran spoke by telephone from Morelia, capital of Michoacan.

The Brazilian-made plane belonging to the small Mexican airline Aerofederal disappeared after taking off from Uruapan.

## Burmese president resists pressure

**RANGOON, Burma (AP)** — President Maung Maung on Thursday refused to bow to massive protests demanding an interim government, but he said his government would proceed with plans that could end 26 years of one-party rule.

Tens of thousands of people staged pro-democracy demonstrations in the capital, but a rally called by striking government employees fizzled. A strike by airport workers grounded international flights.

Maung Maung, Burma's first civilian president since 1962, said in a speech on state-run radio and television that he called an emergency meeting of the ruling party for Sept. 12 to consider a referendum on ending single-party rule. An emergency Parliament session is scheduled for the next day in a process the government says could lead to a multiparty general election.

## Air show crash blamed on pilot error

**HELSINKI, Finland (AP)** — Pilot error apparently was to blame for the fatal crash of the Redigo prototype training jet at an air show in Belgium, the head of the investigating team said Thursday.

The state-owned Valmet corporation said it is determined to display the aircraft at this week's air show in Farnborough, England.

"I have found no evidence to support blaming the Redigo," said Seppo Hamalainen, who investigated Sunday's accident at Kleine Brogel. "It is likely that the crash was caused by human error," he said in a radio interview.

Pilot Ari Pippo, 44, died when the four-seater plane failed to come out of a spin.

## Korea kicks out suspected terrorist

**SEOUL, South Korea (AP)** — A French woman linked to terrorists who killed 12 people at the 1972 Olympics in Munich was deported soon after she arrived in South Korea, where the 1988 Olympics begin Sept. 17, officials said Thursday.

Officials at Kimpo International Airport said the 40-year-old woman was suspected of ties to the Black September terrorist group. Her name was not released.

The woman was deported to Tokyo, from where she had arrived Tuesday. The officials, speaking on condition of anonymity, refused to disclose other details, including when the woman was deported.

## Bomb kills 2 at hotel in Namibia

**WINDHOEK, South-West Africa (AP)** — A large bomb exploded Thursday evening in a downtown hotel frequented by blacks, setting the building ablaze and killing two people, police said. Fifteen others were injured, hospital officials said.

Ninety minutes after the blast a mine exploded at a railway line about a mile from the hotel, injuring two more people, said officials at the Windhoek State Hospital.

The blasts come on the day guerrillas of the South-West Africa People's Organization, or SWAPO, said they would begin observing a voluntary cease-fire in the territory, also known as Namibia.

## Thailand opposes reward for MIAs

**BANGKOK, Thailand (AP)** — A Foreign Ministry official said Thursday the government doesn't want a group of Americans to distribute a \$24 million reward for the return of missing U.S. servicemen because it might offend Thailand's communist neighbors.

The group said it was sponsoring seven Vietnam War veterans and relatives of servicemen missing in incidents who plan to return to Thailand in October and float on the Mekong River Vietnamese currency notes stamped with the reward offer.

"The government of Thailand is attempting to roadblock" the effort, the National Steering Committee for American War Veterans said in a telex this week to The Associated Press.

# U.S. begins removal of missiles

**FRANKFURT, West Germany (AP)** — Five years after West Europeans took to the streets in massive anti-missile protests, the United States on Thursday began removing its intermediate-range rockets in accordance with a superpower treaty signed last year.

A truck convoy hauled nine Pershing 2 missiles from a base near Stuttgart, and U.S. officials said they would remove the remaining 420 medium- and short-range missiles from Western Europe in the next 36 months.

"This is an important event in post-war history," West German government spokesman Friedhelm Oet told a news conference.

The stationing of the missiles had sparked huge protests in Western Europe, including a coordinated demonstration in several cities that drew hundreds of thousands of people in October 1983.

Deployment of the missiles began the following month.

But the anti-missile fervor waned, and by the time President Reagan and Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev signed their treaty banning intermediate-range nuclear missiles in December, only a handful of protesters was still active in

West Germany.

A group of anti-missile activists who came to witness the removal applauded as the 15 U.S. Army trucks carrying the missiles left the Heilbronn site in southern Germany, about 35 miles north of Stuttgart.

They held up a banner saying "Heilbronn, Never Again A Nuclear Powder Keg."

One 66-year-old woman who had taken part in dozens of protests said, "We have fought, trembled, sung and cried. We were arrested and taken off in buses. But we've always renewed our courage." She declined to give her name.

A rocket motor explosion at Heilbronn in January 1985 killed three U.S. soldiers and injured 16 others. West German news reports said the accident led then-Defense Minister Manfred Woerner to promise residents that Heilbronn would be the first site from which missiles would be removed.

U.S. Navy Cmdr. Gerry Ryan of European Command Headquarters in Stuttgart told The Associ-

ated Press, "It's the first time that U.S. intermediate-range missiles have been withdrawn in Europe."

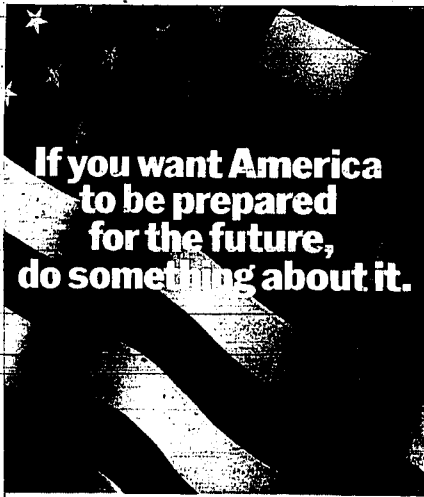
The remainder of the U.S. Army European-based, intermediate-range nuclear missiles are scheduled to be removed over a 36-month period," he added.

The Soviet Union began removing its missiles from Czechoslovakia and East Germany in February, before the U.S. Senate had ratified the treaty.

East Germany's official news agency ADN said in March that the Soviets had completed the removal of all 54 shorter-range SS-12 missiles, but said nothing about the 58 SS-23 missiles also covered by the treaty.

The official Czechoslovak news agency CTK reported in July that all of the 39 SS-12 shorter-range missiles based in that country had been removed in February and March.

Original NATO plans called for 520 intermediate-range nuclear missiles in five West European countries to counter the Soviet rockets pointed at the West.



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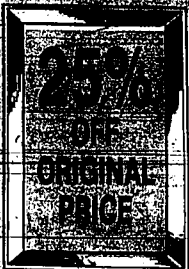
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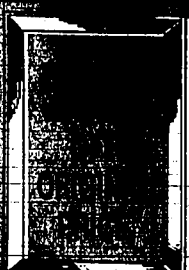
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## Watkins backers make light of Stallings in comic

TWIN FALLS — "Dane Watkins supporters took a page from the National Enquirer this week and published their own version of the scandal sheet."  
The Stallings Enquirer, paid for by Youth-for-Watkins-88, shows photos of Second District Congressman Richard Stallings and Democratic presidential candidate Michael Dukakis with the caption "Twins split at birth!! Hope to be reunited in Washington."  
It was distributed this week at the College of Southern Idaho and the three other colleges in Southern Idaho. Stallings, visiting Twin Falls Thursday, said the "revelations" in the two-

page handout, were untrue. He has criticized Watkins, his Republican challenger, for running a "sneak campaign."  
Dave Pearson, Watkins' campaign manager, said the flier has a humorous element, "and people who pick it up seem to like it."  
The flier accuses Stallings of opposing the proposed Special-Isotope Separator, voting for increased spending and higher taxes, supporting communists in Central America and voting to restrict personal freedom. It also reiterates an allegation that Stallings would turn control of the Snake River over to the federal government.  
"I'm not married to Dukakis' views" on all issues, Stallings said Thursday. In particular, he differs with the Democrat-

ic presidential nominee on moral issues, he said. While Dukakis is pro-choice on abortion, Stallings is not.  
Stallings also said he supports a moment of silence in public schools, during which students could pray.  
"I'm not for prayer. I'm not sure whose prayer you would use," he said.  
It's not unusual for a state delegation to differ with a president of the same party, he said. "I can look at a number of issues our delegation differed with Ronald Reagan," he said. "He tried for seven years to get rid of sugar supports."  
If Dukakis does not support state control of water, Stallings will not support him on that issue, he said.  
But "The Stallings Enquirer" was not entirely wrong in juxtaposing photos of

Stallings and Dukakis.  
Stallings says at this date in the campaign he thinks that Dukakis would have the edge as president in three areas.  
"I think Dukakis would be more effective in reducing the deficit than Bush," he said. Even if belt-tightening angered some of his constituents, they would be unlikely to shift their support, he said.  
"They have nowhere else to go."  
"Bush for the last eight years has said nothing as (the government) has continued to borrow and spend," Stallings said. "I realize as vice president he's locked in, but I have not heard a whisper."  
Dukakis also comes out ahead on trade policy, Stallings said. He supports

a stronger negotiating policy, with the secretary of commerce toughening trade laws with countries with unfavorable trade policies.  
"A strong executive attitude on trade may help," Stallings said. "Bush may be able to do it, but I haven't seen it yet."  
Dukakis would also be the stronger president on agriculture issues, he said.  
"Now the prevailing view (in the Reagan administration) is that you eliminate farm problems by eliminating farmers," he said.  
On the Enquirer's other points, Stallings said he is not anti-nuclear-nuclear.  
Pearson said that by allowing a vote to delay a decision on the project until after

## Treasurer explains dismissal of taxes

TWIN FALLS — Lack of communication and different accounting methods contributed to controversy over the cancellation of a county worker's back property taxes, according to a newly released nine-page letter.

In the letter, County Treasurer Bonnie Bruning explains her calculation of back property taxes on a house formerly owned by Sheri Mills of Twin Falls.

"This entire situation should teach all of us an important lesson," she wrote. With complete, written documentation of all terms and agreements, there need never be such "undue controversy" again, she concludes.

"I agree with her," Commission Chairwoman Judy Felton said Thursday. "I think the communication was poor, and I personally accept responsibility for the poor communication."

Felton said she didn't remember to take a cancellation notice to Bruning until after the treasurer had sent a notice to Mills that the taxes were not canceled.

Commissioners made an agreement with Mills early this year, while she was taking computer classes at the College of Southern Idaho, to cancel the taxes in return for computer work. The commissioners hired Mills full-time May 1.

Bruning disputed the commissioner's actions in June, saying Mills had overstated her bartered work hours. In addition, Bruning said because Mills had transferred ownership of her house to a real-estate agent before the commissioners canceled the taxes, the new owner should have been held responsible for

## Egusquiza to oppose Commissioner Fraley

TWIN FALLS — Democrats named a replacement candidate Thursday for Commissioner Jim Fraley's seat who says she would take the mediocrity out of the commissioner's office.

## Building committee eyes many requests

TWIN FALLS — A long shopping list and a thin billfold confronted the state's building committee Thursday.

State agencies have proposed \$100 million in projects for the state's 1990 budget — a budget that is likely to include only about \$12 million for new projects, maintenance and asbestos programs.

The list, which the Permanent Fund Advisory Council began considering at its meeting in Twin Falls, is only preliminary, stressed Anne Barker, Division of Public Works administrator. So far, the division has only asked agencies for cost estimates. The Department of Health and Welfare has not yet set priorities for its requests and the Board of Education has not approved requests from colleges and schools.

But the list isn't far removed from the draft list a year ago. Its totals for maintenance and asbestos were close to those on the current draft list, and new project requests were about \$10 million less.

This year's preliminary list includes about \$75 million for capital improvements, \$18 million for maintenance and almost \$7 million for asbestos abatement.

Asbestos, commonly used in insulation in years past, now is recognized as a cancer-causing agent, and many public buildings nationwide must be inspected and sometimes altered.

The College of Southern Idaho would like \$2,026,000 for its Southern Idaho Development Center.

The building would house University of Idaho, Idaho State University and economic development offices. In addition, it would incorporate plans for a satellite link with higher education statewide.

The college would also like \$130,000 in state maintenance money for outside lighting, parking lots, roofing, walkways, bleacher replacement, Expo Building insulation, handicapped access and other projects.

An additional \$20,000 could be used for asbestos abatement.

The Idaho State School for the Deaf and the Blind in Gooding is requesting \$51,200 for a maintenance building. It also would like \$150,900 in maintenance funds to use on tennis courts, basketball courts and other recreational playing surfaces, the all-weather track and asphalt repair.

The state is also committed to using a sizable chunk of its 1990 building fund budget to make a \$1,150,000 bond payment for renovation of the campus.

Between June 1985 and April 1986, \$9 million was spent overhauling the campus. The project included building cottage-style dormitories and both renovating old buildings in the education complex and building new ones.

Among other projects proposed for the Magic Valley are maintenance at local offices of state agencies, work at area parks and reroofing of the historic Stricker Ranch house south of Kimberly.

The draft list considered Thursday does not include long-range projects, said state Sen. Don Mackin, a building committee member. It only includes what state agencies would like accomplished in 1990.

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## Alternatives to lockup are sought Officials tackle juvenile detention problem

TWIN FALLS — County and state officials are looking for healthier and less-expensive alternatives to locking-up juvenile delinquents.

"We do not have enough choices for care for children with delinquency problems," said Anne McNewin, family and children's program manager for the Department of Health and Welfare.

The county now can either send a juvenile

offender to the American National Detention Center in Jerome or place him in a foster home, said County Commissioner Judy Felton.

The county should also be able to place a child in a shelter home, in a hospital for rehabilitation or at home with professional supervision, Felton said.

All but the hospital stay would be less expensive than the detention center, she said. Frequently youths commit crimes under the influence of drugs and need to be treated in hospitals, Felton said. The youths are now

taken to the Jerome detention center, she said.

John Devine, administrator of the detention center, said there are other children brought to his facility who should not be locked up.

"For some of the kids, the worst crime they're guilty of is having a lousy parent," he said. "Having dysfunctional parents is the root of a lot of their problems."

Fifth District Magistrate Judge Michael Redman said children guilty of status offenses

# Production of tritium should be halted, specialists argue

TWIN FALLS — The United States and the Soviet Union should halt production of tritium, a key nuclear weapons ingredient that could be manufactured at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory, as a means of pacifying arms control specialists. In an article to be published Friday in the journal Science, the four specialists advocate the "Tritium Factor" as a means of arms control.

The group of four specialists is headed

by J. Carson Mark, associated with the Nuclear Control Institute, a Washington-based policy group. Mark is former leader of the theoretical division at Los Alamos National Laboratory.

The Idaho National Engineering Laboratory is considered by the Department of Energy as a location for one of two proposed New Production Reactors (NPR), which would produce plutonium and tritium, key ingredients in nuclear weapons. Tritium, a radioactive isotope of hydrogen, has a half-life of 12 years.

The Snake River Alliance, a statewide environmental group opposed to the new installation at INEL, is preparing to

participate in the hearing process on the environmental impact statement for the NPR, said Mary Ann Hart, an Alliance spokeswoman in Boise.

The alliance is publicizing the upcoming public meetings in Idaho and trying to get people involved. The Snake River Alliance is opposed to the continued production of nuclear weapons. "We don't see a need for more nuclear weapons," Hart said. "It is more important to focus on cleaning up what is already there before building anything new." In response to Science article, a nuclear weapons scientist from Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory argued that the four scient-

ists' proposal poses numerous problems and could complicate U.S.-Soviet arms talks.

Mark contended that "the 5.5 percent annual decay of tritium could serve as a forcing function to produce steady, verifiable reductions in the superpowers nuclear arsenals. Such reductions would result in a comprehensive 50 percent cut in warheads by about 12 years after an agreement: the year 2001, if the cutoff were to begin now."

Mutual suspension of new tritium production, he wrote, would represent a shared commitment to keep reductions in nuclear armaments going at a steady

pace. Mark noted that such a halt also would allay safety concerns on both sides associated with continuing to operate their aging production reactors."

The P-Reactor at the Department of Energy's Savannah River Plant near Aiken, S.C., which produces both tritium and plutonium, was shut down last month after undergoing a sudden power surge while workers were attempting to restart the reactor. The plants' two other production reactors currently are also shut down, one for maintenance and the other due to safety concerns.

# Bush responds to NEA school issues questionnaire a year late

WASHINGTON — It's a year late, but the National Education Association said Thursday that Vice President George Bush has finally turned in the assignment it gave all the presidential candidates last summer: a detailed questionnaire about school issues.

"As a former classroom teacher, I never allowed students to hand in assignments a year late," said Terry Gilbert, Magic Valley administrator for the Idaho Education Association.

"If he responded, admittedly, a year late, 'Where was George?'"

he said. "He has had many concerns during this election year, including the desire to be the education president."

NEA President Mary Hatwood Futrell said, "I think he filled it out because he finally realizes the NEA is a powerful political entity in this country."

Futrell said 600,000 of her 1.9 million members are Republicans and "you just don't blow your nose or fan your hand at 600,000 votes."

"We have filed the NEA endorsement process to be a highly representative one," said Mcl. Rayborn, a sixth-grade teacher in Jerome and president of the Magic Valley region of the NEA.

"Approximately 8,000 educators who attended the NEA representative assembly will have an opportunity to vote on the endorsement of Bush or Dukakis."

Earlier, this week, Rayborn criticized Bush for failing to participate in the NEA's videotaped question and answer process in the spring of 1987 or in June 1988 despite repeated requests.

Thursday he said that while he was not sure Bush's answers to the NEA's questions now would convince teachers that Bush would be the education candidate, he believes the NEA has reservations about Dukakis also.

"It's not so much education as prison reform" that teachers are

concerned about with Dukakis, he said.

Futrell said she would make Bush's replies public after reading them. The responses also were not immediately available from the Bush campaign itself.

"We believe that the Pledge of Allegiance is very critical and very important as part of the whole effort to teach patriotism

in America. We do not believe that it should be mandated. You cannot mandate patriotism," Futrell told a news conference.

Bush has made a campaign issue of Dukakis' 1977 veto of the mandatory Pledge of Allegiance bill, which the state's highest court had advised him beforehand was unconstitutional. The legislature passed it over Dukakis' veto.

The Massachusetts law would penalize teachers who refuse to lead daily recitations of the pledge, but Futrell said it is not being enforced there or in other states with similar laws.

She said the pledge should not be mandatory.

"I have sometimes difficulty dealing with people who don't stand up to recite the pledge, Futrell said, but I respect their right not to do that. This is a democracy."

"The NEA has been camped in the corner of the Democrats in the past three elections, and it is expected to be there again Sept. 8 when it announces the results of a presidential preference poll of 8,400 union activists, including Richard Chilcote of Twin Falls, Melanie Hutchison of Filer and Lee Braegger of Cassia County. It fielded 300 delegates to the Democratic convention in Atlanta compared with about 25 at the GOP convention in New Orleans.

## Charges won't be filed in theft of truck

# Protest memorial draws reaction Woman, 65, holds off L.A. police for 3 days after a family quarrel

CONCORD, Calif. (AP) — A memorial service on Thursday, marking the anniversary of Sgt. Brian Willson's failed bid to halt a Navy munitions train, was marred by blaring horns, obscene chants and signs mocking Willson, who lost his legs when the train struck him.

"We came to protest these crazy people," said Jack Withrow, 65, of Sacramento, a World War II veteran and one of about 15 people who appeared at the Concord Naval Weapons Station to oppose the service.

He carried a sign which read, "You supply legs; we'll supply arms."

Willson, a 47-year-old Vietnam veteran who has become a martyr to the anti-war movement since he was injured last Sept. 1,

seemed more saddened than angry at the demonstrators.

"It's not going to stop people blocking the trains," he said. "If they want to murder people, I suggest they sign up and go to Central America and do it. Don't ask somebody else to do it."

The service took place on the tracks where Willson and others tried to halt the train as part of a protest opposing U.S. involvement in Central America. The others managed to scramble off the trucks, but Willson was hit.

The train, whose crew had been ordered not to stop to avoid allowing demonstrators to climb aboard, severed one leg and the other was amputated later.

Eight white crosses stood Thursday between the rails near where the tracks enter the base,

the target of daily demonstrations since Willson was injured. A rainbow of crepe paper rose near the chainlink fence which guards the area near the gate.

"I am celebrating personally having survived 365 days and I'm very thankful I'm alive and you're alive here today," Willson told the crowd of about 700 people gathered to mark the incident.

"I encourage all of us to continue asking, 'How much do we want peace?'"

During the service, trucks and cars passed with horns and radios blaring as passengers shouted obscene slogans in an effort to drown out the proceedings. Some passed out a package that included an organ donor card and a copy of a last will and testament.

LOS ANGELES (AP) — It took tear gas, a SWAT team, a battering ram and a electric stun gun Thursday to remove a 65-year-old woman from her home, where she had been holed up for three days, shooting at police and slightly wounding the chief's brother.

"I think they had to do this because the old lady had a gun. It's terrible," said neighbor Bang Lee looking at a gaping hole left in the neat house by the battering ram.

The woman, Barbara Maxson, had lived in the house on the city's south side for more than 20 years. She barricaded herself inside Monday afternoon after arguing with her daughter.

She began shouting when officers entered her house about 3 a.m. Thursday after firing tear gas inside, said police spokesman Lt. Fred Nixon.

She was found in a bathtub, clutching a pistol and holding a blanket over her head to block the tear gas fumes, Nixon said.

Officers shot her with a Taser stun gun, which shoots a dart that emits an electrical charge, temporarily disabling the person.

Nixon said. She was taken to Torrance Memorial Medical Center for psychiatric observation, he said.

The brother of Police Chief Daryl Gates, Capt. Stephen Gates, was treated at another hospital after a bullet grazed his head as he approached the house Wednesday to talk to Mrs. Maxson, Nixon said.

"It does underscore that when someone is armed and decides for whatever reasons to make an armed stand, their age and sex doesn't matter."

es — crimes only children can be tried for such as running away from home — should be housed in a shelter home.

"Secure detention often is very stressful," she said. "Children learn to be depressed and they learn anger."

She said the area needs to have either a shelter home for several youths or around 10 individual shelter homes around town.

"The reality is that we have some real limitations in foster home care," McNevin said.

Felton said the group will meet three more times and publicize its efforts in speeches to civic groups.

"Let the state, I have no objections to Ms. Mills getting an education and working to better her life for herself and her children," Bruning wrote. But she did object to Felton's statement that Mills' case is a "Cinderella story of success where someone picked themselves up by the bootstraps."

"If Ms. Mills is being cast as Cinderella and the commissioners' helping hand was them as her fairy godmother, then the confusion caused by the commissioners' decisions and their lack of communication with the treasurer, have made me appear to be the wicked stepmother. I consider this 'grossly unjust,'" Bruning

ing wrote.

A key point in the controversy is that the commissioners decided to forgive penalties and interest on Mills' back taxes when they canceled her taxes.

"This decision was not known by, or communicated to, the treasurer prior to my reading it in the newspaper," Bruning wrote.

"I also feel there was a breakdown in communication between the treasurer's office and our office, because when the treasurer had questions, we were not asked to clarify those questions," Felton said.

Mills and her brother, Robert Steven Parr, wrote a letter to The Times-News arguing the newspaper misinterpreted Bruning's information and "presented an undue controversy to the public."

But Bruning said Mills and Parr worked from a computer printout that apparently didn't include totals for 1984 taxes. When 1984 taxes, penalty and interest are added to the \$1,446 to

tal Mills and Parr used in their letter, only \$451 separates their total with Bruning's.

The controversy has left many victims. Commissioners say Mills honestly worked her way off the welfare rolls and has been unfairly criticized. Bruning says taxing districts haven't received the money they rightfully should have. And the commissioners' secretary has been suspended with pay, apparently for her alleged role in publicizing Bruning's letter.

Until Wednesday, Bruning said her nine-page letter, dated July 6, was intended to be confidential. But she provided a copy late Wednesday to The Times-News, saying she wanted to "take the mystery out of the whole thing."

She argued her calculations were accurate, as was the article printed by The Times-News.

On the Central America issue, Stallings voted for a Democratic-written \$30.8 million package to the Nicaraguan "Contra" rebels, which failed to pass the House. Unlike the Reagan administration proposal, the Democratic package contained no military aid to the rebels.

Though the Watkins campaign has also criticized Stallings for his support of a bill mandating federal approval of the Swan Falls Water Rights agreement, Stallings said that Republicans Sen. James McClure and Congressman Larry Craig also agreed to the bill.

Stallings said he didn't know what the fier meant by "votes to restrict personal freedom."

With a halt in tritium production, Mark said, expensive plans to upgrade and eventually replace these reactors could be set aside. "The production reactors of both sides would be placed on standby, ready to restart tritium production only if nuclear arms talks break down," he wrote.

Mark said an agreement to halt nuclear materials production could be verified by reconnaissance satellites monitoring heat-generated infrared radiation at the facilities.

"Any undeclared source of thermal radiation could be challenged as a potential clandestine facility and made subject to on-site inspection," he argued.

In a rebuttal published alongside Mark's proposal, W.G. Sutcliffe, a scientist with the evaluation and planning program at Lawrence Livermore, said that "any proposal to limit nuclear materials as a means of arms control is premature."

He contended that "asymmetries in nuclear materials production capabilities, design practices and delivery system capabilities could lead to disproportionate impacts on the U.S. and Soviet stockpiles, possibly leaving the U.S. in a vulnerable position."

"Proposing nuclear materials limits is fraught with great uncertainties about the comparability of effects on the two stockpiles and verification issues because of the unknowns about the Soviet stockpile and production capabilities," Sutcliffe said.

Noting that early nuclear

weapons "did not use tritium," he said that "as a result of the inevitable research efforts, new technology might circumvent or reduce the need for tritium in efficient modern warheads."

Co-writing the Mark article were Paul L. Leventhal, president of the Nuclear Central Institute; Milton M. Hoening, the institute's scientific director, and retired Rear Adm. Thomas D. Davies, former assistant director of the U.S. Arms Control and Disarmament Agency.

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# Limping Becker upset by obscure Australian at U.S. Open

NEW YORK — Boris Becker knew he shouldn't have gone out on the court with his bad leg, but he thought about Jimmy Connors' 1987 comeback at Wimbledon, with his bad wheels, and he thought he should at least give it a try.

He was right the first time. Becker was one of two top seeds to fall at the U.S. Open on Thursday, losing to Australia's Darren Cahill, 6-3, 6-3, 6-2. The other was women's fourth seed Pam Shriver, who is trying desperately to come out of a disaster of a summer. Shriver lost to the Soviet Union's Laila Meskhi, 4-6, 6-1, 6-4.

They weren't the only seeds to fall Thursday, as Brad Gilbert, the ninth seed, lost late in the afternoon to Peru's Jaime Yzaga, 1-6, 6-0, 6-4, 6-2. There were other close shaves on this eventful third day of play. Second

seed Mats Wilander needed five sets to dispatch Kevin Curren, 3-6, 6-3,

6-2, 3-6, 6-3. Andres Gomez, the 14th seed, also had to go to the maximum to beat Shuzo Matsuoka. Meanwhile, women's seventh seed Zina Garrison and 16th seed Larisa Savchenko both needed three sets to advance to the third round.

The pattern began Wednesday night, when men's top seed Ivan Lendl struggled to beat Amos Mansdorf, 6-2, 6-7 (7-3), 6-1, 5-7, 6-0, in a match that lasted almost four hours. Steff Graf, Martina Navratilova, Gabriela Sabatini and Stefan Edberg held truer to form, each posting easy victories to advance to the third round. But little else was normal Thursday.

With bad feet and playing against a solid serve-and-volleyer, Becker was no match for Cahill, who's won on clay this summer at Gstaad, made the semifinals on grass at the Queen's Tournament and on the hardcourts at Stratton Mountain (Vt.) and lost in

the quarterfinals in Washington. But Cahill remembered the Queen's tournament, where he lost to Becker in two sets, and a conversation the two had as they walked off court.

"I had picked (Pat) Cash to win Wimbledon and he got a bit uptight about that," Cahill said. "He said playing that match in the semifinals was like playing a first-round match, and that I wasn't a very good player." But Cahill knew that Becker was hurting, and Becker knew that Becker was hurting, and had been since the indoors in Indianapolis. And he hasn't come back nearly as quickly as he thought he would.

"(The problem) is coming from blisters to my old injury which wasn't as good as I was hoping it would be," Becker said. "But, people were asking me how my feet were after my first match and sometimes you just cannot tell the truth, even though I knew I already had an excuse for everybody in

case I should lose, so I said they were good. But they were already quite

bad. But what can you do? It's the U.S. Open. You go out and try your best."

Lon Tiriac, Becker's coach, said he didn't think Becker should have played in his condition, especially on the unforgiving hard courts.

"He's not a player like an Agassi who lies over the court," Tiriac said. "He is a man who stomps on the court."

As for Shriver, her demons have leaped out, haunting her and taunting her, in full view of everyone. Rarely has there ever been such a talented player less certain of herself, less steady, less confident than Shriver is now.

Thursday was her worst Open performance since 1979, when she lost to Julie Harrington in the first round. She's been trying to play through mononucleosis since Eastbourne in June, where she defaulted in the third round.

#### Shoshone, Dietrich among favorites in Magic Valley

It was an unusual year, 1987, when none of the Magic Valley high school volleyball teams brought home estate championship.

State champions have been the norm in the District 4, which has claimed nine state titles since volleyball began as an intercollegiate sport in Idaho 13 seasons ago.

Shoshone's third-place finish in the state Class A-4 tourney last fall was as close as a Magic Valley team got on a title last year, but it probably won't be this time. The Indians and next-door neighbor Dietrich are legitimate contenders for the state A-4 honors, as are Filer and Kimberly in A-3. In A-2, Wood River Coach David Neumann, whose teams won state championships in 1977 and 1978, may have his strongest team in years.

In A-1, Twin Falls will have to contend with a split schedule which is a by-product of the school's affiliation with the Boise-based Southern Idaho Conference and its membership, for postseason qualifying purposes, in A-1 Region III, which includes Pocatello, Highland, Burley and Minico.

For that reason, the Bruins will play most of the A-1 schools from Boise, but must beat the eastern Idaho schools to have a chance to go to state.

#### Independent

##### Twin Falls

The Bruins, 13-7 last season with a second-place finish in Region III, have had to fill the shoes of three top players this season because of graduation. Third-year coach Jerry Sivulich lost Dana Roberts, Kris Horner, and Rachael Carter and has only two returning starters this season.

But 5-foot, 8-inch outside hitters Molly Ames and Shelly Hart are back to take the top spots on the Bruin team. Newcomers Mynde Anderson, a 6-8 senior outside-hitter, and Chris Mueller, a 5-7 junior middle blocker, will also be starting.

"Our team is quick on defense and has good power in our hitters," says Sivulich. "But we don't have much height, we're inexperienced in that we have just three seniors and the junior playing as a team. We need to get to know how to play next to the new players."

Forget the preseason business about Centennial of Meridian being fairly small but very fast.

According to the Twin Falls scouting report, the Patriots, who will be making their first appearance ever in Bruin Stadium in Twin Falls at 7:30 p.m. today, size is their greatest attribute.

The game will be the first for Twin Falls in the Class A-1 Division I playoff pod that also includes Meridian, Nampa and the three Boise schools. Because the Bruins played in the

Gem State Conference last year, Twin Falls and Centennial have never met in football.

"Most of our staff went to the Highland-Centennial game Friday night and we were all pretty much of the opinion that Highland beat Centennial with speed while Centennial had the superior size," said Bruin Coach Jon Jund.

Twin Falls, making some defensive and one offensive change after bowing 33-30 to Jerome last week, might be as quick as the Patriots.

"This game just boils down to our ability to hold their running game — although they preferred to pass more

last week — and not get worn down by their size," Jund said. "If we can do those things, we all believe we have a shot at the Patriots."

Jund said the Centennial offensive line went 230 pounds at center, 193 and 207 at the guards and 245 and 230 at tackle.

"We suspect they tried to throw more last week because Highland, after it was 7-3, scored two very quick touchdowns and they were playing catchup the rest of the night. It appeared when they ran they went mostly with the option," Jund said.

Tom Auchampach runs the Patriot offense from quarterback and Jund

said "he is a typical junior quarterback in that he makes a mistake once in a while but it's obvious he has the tools and the talent. When they throw they seemed to be looking for Paul Frandsen most."

"Defensively they use the 4-3 and they have some of the best linebackers in the state," he continued. "We were particularly impressed with Brad Ferguson (6-1, 205) because he has good size and is very quick. My guess is that their defense is quicker than their offense."

Jund said the review of game film with Jerome wasn't the horror show he expected although the Bruins con-

sistently made stunt mistakes.

"When we stunted our juniors were going to the wrong place. So we'd have two in this hole and they'd be running another one. That's why the misdirection hurt us so badly, particularly in the first half. ### Lynn reports 10 minutes late, so he may miss World Series

DETROIT (AP) — Outfielder Fred Lynn, obtained by the Tigers from Baltimore for Detroit's pennant drive, is ineligible for postseason play because he reported 10 minutes after the midnight Aug. 31 deadline.

The Tigers obtained Lynn from the Baltimore Orioles for three minor league players to be named later in a deal closed between 7 and 8 p.m. EDT Wednesday. The club chartered a plane to fly Lynn from Ontario, Calif., International Airport to O'Hare Airport in Chicago, where the Tigers were playing the White Sox. Baltimore was in California.

Under Major League Rules 40 and 2, a player does not join his new team until he physically reports to the city of his new club.

"We tried as best we could," Lynn said Thursday before Detroit's game with the Milwaukee Brewers.

"Unfortunately, I was in Anaheim and the plane was at Ontario" about 25 miles away.

"But Southern California traffic at that time of the afternoon is pretty tough going. It was rush hour, and you can't get anywhere at that time without a helicopter."

The plane left the California airport on a flight expected to reach Chicago by midnight CDT. But the pilot could not contact the O'Hare tower until 12:10 a.m. CDT and did not land the plane until 12:30 a.m. CDT Thursday.

Lynn said the pilot began trying to make contact with the O'Hare tower about 11:40 p.m. CDT but was too far away. A Tigers spokesman, Greg Shea, said contacting the tower would have been sufficient, but Tim McCleary, director of waivers and records for the American League, declined to confirm or deny this.



## Wendell's the little town that could

### Community theater is alive and well thanks to civic-spirited volunteers

WENDELL — The little town of Wendell has accomplished what many larger cities still lack — a thriving performing arts center operated by a dedicated community arts council.

In Wendell, it seems, national trends are being reversed. As the videocassette recorder becomes a primary source of family entertainment, this community arts council has sponsored four live performances since 1987.

Ironically, the shows have been staged in the old Ace Theater, a 300-seat film theater, now known as the Wendell Community Arts Theater.

The first three events were all community productions drawing capacity crowds.

This summer the council, with the aid of \$1,500 in federal monies appropriated for rural communities, brought in the Side Street Strutters, a popular jazz group which performs regularly at Disneyland.

Ramona Allen, president of the board of the non-profit Wendell Arts Council, says she met the group last February when she attended the Northwest Booking Conference for the Arts in Portland.

"When I learned they were performing at a Scout jamboree at Island Park, it was much easier to get them," she says.

"Ticket sales still didn't completely cover expenses, but the concert, along with earlier local performances, helped fulfill the dual purpose of the arts council — to bring in live cultural events and to provide an opportunity for local children and adults to perform on stage.

The Side Street Strutters dedicated a special number "Dark Town Strutters Ball" to Verna Jones, who is now ill. She and her husband, Melvin, worked hard to help realize their dream of turning their former Ace Theater into a performing arts center, Allen says.

The couple paid for a stage to be built in front of the old motion picture screen and John Hall, local contractor, and his two sons donated their labor.

In the spirit of the old Mickey Rooney/Judy Garland classics, the community has taken up the chant: "Let's put on a show!" With the benefit of much support — from businesses to individuals and the Chambers of Commerce in both Wendell and Hagerman — new lighting was installed and

the "garage" behind the theater was remodeled to provide dressing and make-up rooms. The Wendell-Grange-Supply made a major contribution of materials, Allen says.

There already was one piano in the theater and the city of Wendell donated a second one.

"It's really neat to have the two pianos," Allen says.

She estimates that about \$1,500 has been contributed during the past two years from local residents, in addition to donated time and labor.

While "like all community groups, the Wendell Arts Council could use more 'bodies,'" Allen says the group has some enthusiastic backers.

During the Strutters concert, a Jerome patron who wants to remain anonymous was particularly impressed. His sizable donation was not only appreciated by the council but he also purchased the Strutters T-shirts so that the entertainers could give them to children in the audience.

The five member local arts council board is assisted by a four-member consulting board, Allen says, with about 75 people who are either supporters or members of the arts council.

A local production of the musical "Gentle Witch" is planned for October under the direction of Donetta Delgado. The play, a parody on witchcraft, calls for a cast of 50 people, Allen says.

In the previous productions participants have included not only Wendell residents but people from Jerome, Gooding and Hagerman. And the talent show this spring included a Kimberly entertainer.

Allen directed the initial performance, a musical play celebrating the Bicentennial of the U.S. constitution last summer. Roger and Merri Ann King directed a musical "Play It Smart — Stay Safe from Drugs," featuring more than 100 local children and 18 adults last fall and also the talent show this spring.

A future program is planned featuring Joe Sites, Wendell, who is national champion fiddler.

Allen says another "exciting aspect" of the community project is the participation of the churches and backing from the local Ministerial Association. They donate use of their facilities, loan risers for singers and churches have provided "choirs" and "children for plays.

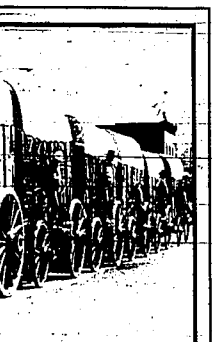

## Please touch this sculpture

**MINNEAPOLIS (AP)** - A sculpture garden where visitors touch, climb on and lie down in statues worth millions of dollars attracts those who rarely visit museums.  
The Minneapolis Sculpture Garden, being formally dedicated Saturday, is on 7 1/2 acres of downtown city parkland and is the largest urban sculpture garden in the country, city and museum officials say.  
It features a giant cherry in a spoon by Claes Oldenburg, and sculptures by other such masters as Isamu Noguchi and Henry Moore.

"I see children playing around and among the sculptures. They become active participants like you probably couldn't have in a museum," said David Fisher, superintendent of the Minneapolis Park and Recreation Board.  
The \$12.8 million joint project of Walker Art Center, the park board and the University of Minnesota's Landscape Architecture Laboratory provides hands-on experience for adults, too, with its 40-sculptures.  
Visitors, who have been allowed in during the two years the project has

been in development, can swing on a platform suspended from the large, steel-beam sculpture "Arborea" by Mark di Suvero, watching the beams overhead shift slowly from the motion of the swing.  
They can step into their backs in the aluminum human form that faces the sky and became part of Peter Shelton's "BLACKVAULT" in fossilstone.  
Or they can step inside Meg Webster's "Glen," a plant-filled earthen crater, and enjoy the scents and colors of perennial plants and wildflowers.  
"The interaction has been one of the bigger things that we've pulled off," Fisher said. "To watch the pure joy of some people in their interactions has been a real delight to me."  
The sculptures date from early in the century to the present, and range in style from classical realism to elemental abstraction. They were created by artists working in a variety of media, including bronze, stone and wood.

## TV begins campaign against drink, drive

The television industry plans to launch a campaign against drinking and driving, featuring not only public service advertisements but also — in an unusual move — occasional references in entertainment programs about the issue.

The project was developed by Jay Winston, an assistant dean at the Harvard School of Public Health and director of its Center for Health Communication, to help combat the public health issue of drinking and driving.

According to Winston, 13 studios have agreed to include some character dialogue relating to the issue, and the three major networks have agreed to create and air public service advertisements during the season between Thanksgiving and New Year's.

"I've asked them not for character development, not for an episode," said Winston, "but simply to lay in a line or two, so when a character is offered a drink, occasionally he will comfortably say, 'No thanks, I'm driving.'"

The idea, says Winston, is not to inundate viewers with constant references but to casually and occasionally communicate what the public is increasingly aware of — that drinking and driving is dangerous. "When it's embedded right into the narrative," Winston says, "you've got (the viewers') attention, they're identifying with the characters."

How the campaign will be played out in the upcoming television season is still unclear.

In the past, CBS, "producers have been encouraged where it is appropriate to create an awareness of substance abuse," said Ann Morfgan, CBS vice president for media relations, West Coast. Morfgan said that approach would continue.

"There aren't any hard and fast rules," she said. "This isn't an assembly line process where we're going to cookie cutter every show. It's up to the producers."

But some studios, perhaps prematurely, have been quite specific — at least in conversations with Winston. "One studio head committed that he would ask his producers and writers to write it in a minimum of two lines per show per season," Winston said, declining to identify the studio chief.

A number of studio spokesmen said yesterday that plans were not yet firm, and indicated that participation will be up to the individual producers.

"I never mandate to my producers," said Harris Kuleman, president of the television division of the 20th-Century Fox Film Corp. "However, I know that whenever possible they will put in whatever they can related to drinking and driving. All of them are vitally concerned with this. I would hope that when we had a scene in a tavern where everyone was drinking, someone would say, 'I'm the designated driver.'"

One of 20th Century Fox's most popular shows is NBC's

"L.A. Law." Asked about the plans of "L.A. Law," producer Steven Bochco, NBC publicist Brian Robinette said, "He doesn't necessarily respond to blanket endorsements... 'L.A. Law' has been responsible to social issues before. (Bochco) doesn't have to be told to do this in a certain way. He'll find a way to do it."

Marshall Herskovitz, executive producer of the Emmy-winning "thirtysomething," expressed mixed reactions to the campaign. "Our show is much more an observer of social behavior than a prescriber of social behavior," Herskovitz said. "I certainly hope if in the course of a story the issue came up of drinking and driving that we would handle the issue in a responsible fashion."

I'm certainly for designated drivers. But I don't think we're going to programmatically tell people what to do. I just don't think it's the role of the show."

# Rarest Elvis recording found

While Elvis Presley still hasn't been sighted outside the comics pages and the supermarket tabloids, his earliest recording apparently has.

Back in 1953, 18-year-old Elvis went into Sam Phillips' Memphis Recording Service to cut a vanity disc as a gift for his mother Gladys.

Paying \$4, he stepped into a tiny booth with his acoustic guitar and cut the Pied Pipers' "My Happiness" and the Ink Spots-Bob Lamb tune "That's When Your Heartaches Begin" on a single 10-inch acetate. Not long after, Elvis went back into a larger studio for Sun Records, and the rest is rock 'n' roll history. The acetate disappeared, and it

has long been considered not only the first Elvis recording, but the rarest.

Recently, though, it surfaced in the hands of airline pilot Ed Leek, one of Elvis' buddies at Humes High in Memphis. Leek had had it all along and only decided to sell it to fund his retirement from TWA. Sometime soon the acetate, which seems to be the genuine item according to several authoritative collectors' journals, will go to auction and could bring in as much as half a million dollars.

Meanwhile, the Million Dollar Quartet — Presley, Jerry Lee Lewis, Carl Perkins and Johnny Cash — is captured on a fascinating double album available through Britain's Charly Records. On Dec. 4, 1956, these four Sun artists jammed.

# Michael Tucker earns his 'L.A. Law' success

Michael Tucker has suffered worse setbacks than failing to win an Emmy.

Tucker — who today stars as the short, cuddly tax attorney Stuart Markowitz on NBC's hit series, "L.A. Law" — remembers that time as one of the most difficult in his life. He was a struggling actor with a baby to feed, a marriage on the rocks and hopelessly in love with a fellow performer.

"I was hired to play Feste the clown. He sings some songs. Now I'm not the world's greatest singer, but I have sung on a stage before. Some guy wrote a new score and didn't want me in the show. He told the director, 'If this guy sings, I'll pull the score.' The director... let me go."

"Needless to say it was a very difficult thing to go through," Tucker said recently during a telephone interview from his home in Los Angeles.

Times have changed for Tucker, 43, who in the last two years has come into his own as a leading man with not-so-leading-lady looks. He was nominated for an Emmy last year and then again this year as best actor in a drama series.

Tucker's wife, Jill Eikenberry, was also an Emmy contender, as best actress in a drama series for her work as activist attorney and Markowitz' wife Ann Kelsey on "L.A. Law." The seemingly mismatched pair have grown in the past two years into one of TV's hottest couples even though neither they nor the series fared any too well in Sunday night's Emmy

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# 'Cocktail' serves up strange melange of types

**HOLLYWOOD**—Arm wrestling and hamburger making have been exhausted as back-grounds for movies, so it was probably inevitable that bartending would be next. But nothing quite prepares one for the hamburger that "Cocktail" makes of an old and relatively honorable profession.

Tom Cruise plays Brian Flanagan, whose dreams of high-powered jobs in advertising, banking, stockbroking or what-have-you are shattered by his lack of anything beyond a high school diploma. He settles, finally, for bartending in Manhattan, under the wing of Douglas Couglin (the magnificent Bryan Brown). It leaves Flanagan's days free for business courses at City College, where he daydreams about the hot franchise that will become his ticket to shopping mall superstardom: a string of bars called Cocktails

In the meantime, Couglin passes on his own runcy tips on womankind, and the two men perfect their lusty act as liquor dynamic duo. Suddenly "Cocktail" becomes the "Saturday

Night Fever" of bartending. Cruise even gets his own bartending solo-juggling bottles, tossing ice and cocktail shakers behind his back, doing tidy little spins and discreet foot movements, all the while twinkling, twinkling, twinkling until his dimples must have ached.

The pairing of old-hand Brown and young-hand Cruise may have been meant to remind us of Cruise and Paul Newman; if so, think of this as "The Color of Counterfeit Money."

Unfortunately, none of the film makers, including director Roger Donaldson and writer Heywood Gould, seemed to notice that young Flanagan, climber-user-apologist extraordinaire, lacked a little something as the hero of the piece. Charm, alas, does not fill a moral vacuum, but the film never suggests that he is meant to be an anti-hero, a Sammy Click, a Duddy Kravitz. And setting him in a series of "fabulous" smoke-dense bars from Manhat-

tan to Jamaica, where alcohol and wall-to-wall casual sex are the prime ingredients, is hardly in the spirit of the '80s, to put it gently (No sympathy for Gould, who did the radical overhaul of his densely characterized, knowledgeable light novel himself).

Both men marry, or try to marry, for money. The satiny-smooth Couglin makes it first, marrying what is supposed to be a heavily moneyed New York lady (Kelly Lynch). To an untrained eye she may look like third from the end at Caesar's Palace, but who are we to question the dress code of the rich and famous? Flanagan

tries hard, throwing over a charming, impecunious young artist (Adrienne Barbeau) and a rich, slightly older and far more bossy Manhattanite (Lisa Ranes). Then the plot shifts to become a Cinderella story intertwined with soap opera with an overlay of the most egregious melodrama.

The barroom banter, written with a halfway good ear for contemporary patter, gives way to Flanagan, explaining some of his more on-fish behavior to his lady-love by saying that "If a guy lays down a dare, you gotta take it."

Brown, an actor with almost cast-iron charisma, somehow slides out of this one unscathed. Slurp and Cruise wrinkle and twinkle at one another endlessly. It will probably not harm her career, and his has little to do with acting at this point anyway.

"Cocktail" may seem a retreat for Donaldson, whose "No Way Out" had more than its share of sharp human touches and an al-

most tangible sensuality. Every director has to have one of these at one time or another.

## Costa-Gavras tackles America's white supremacists

The following are capsule reviews of films playing in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America, opinions by LATimes.

**BETRAYED (R).** Director Costa-Gavras has always been drawn to incendiary political subjects, but in "Betrayed," which is about the white supremacist movement in the American heartland, he has apparently trusted the instincts of his American screenwriter and co-producer Joe Eszterhas ("F.I.S.T.," "Flashdance"). The result is a loosening of the trademark Costa-Gavras tension. Debra Winger is radiantly warm, smart and against all odds, believable. Tom Berenger does the best he can with an even harder role — the decent American with two young children to raise who has completely swallowed the line of the crackpot right.

**BIG (PG).** Funny, warm, sophisticated and highly imaginative comedy-fantasy in which a 12-year-old boy's wish to be transformed into a man comes true. Then the 12-year-old with the body of a 30-year-old winds up vice president of development at a toy company...! Wonderful fun. With Tom Hanks, Elizabeth Perkins, John Heard, Robert Loggia, Jared Rushton and David Moscow.

**BULL DURHAM (R).** What we have here is sweet and sexy comedy set around a rat-poor minor-league baseball team, the Durham Bulls; and it is, writer-director Ron Shelton shows himself as the diamond's best friend. He has packed his offbeat love story with a handful of resonant characters, shows off a rowdy knowledgeability in these fiercely funny baseball scenes. He knows firsthand the jargon, the fears, the acrid smell of these miserable locker rooms and touring buses, and he knows sure we listen up and breathe deeply. Whether you believe Shelton's lusty, uninhibited love story is another matter, but it's seductively easy to want to, with the warmth and brightness that Susan Sarandon and Kevin Costner bring to their roles.

(PG). Discursive but almost as much fun as the first outing with that archetypal Australian bloke, played with such winning ease by Paul Hogan. This time out, Crocodile's lady (Linda Kozlowski), a New-York-reporter, is endangered by a Central American drug kingpin, sending the couple deep in hiding in the Australian bush. Nothing special as an action adventure but shrewdly effective as a projection of a mythical hero.

**DIE HARD (R).** Archetypal big deal Hollywood exploitation, technically-breathhtaking yet disgusting and silly. Bruce Willis, however, is terrific as a witty New York cop conducting a one-man war against a bunch of terrorists who have taken over a Los Angeles office tower. With Reginald VelJohnson, Bonnie Bedelia and Alan Rickman.

**A FISH CALLED WANDA (R).** Poor, sweet Archie (John Cusack) begins as a proper, neglected British paterfamilias and wakes up, under Wanda's (Robin Lee Curtis) spell, to find himself a man besotted, borrowing apartments for afternoon liaisons and waltzing about starkers, to Wanda's bemusement. Low comedy at high speed, it pretends to be a caper movie about a smooth London jewel heist and its infinitely complex aftermath. Actually, it is a smart farce about ingrained cultural differences, playing the clenched respectability of the Brits against the hearty spontaneity, some might call it vulgarity, of the Yanks.

**WHO FRAMED ROGER RABBIT (PG).** Dense, satisfy-

ing, feverishly inventive and a technical marvel—"Who Framed Roger Rabbit" has Robert Zemeckis ("Back to the Future") as its director and Richard Williams, an Academy Award

winner for "A Christmas Carol" (1972), as director of animation, under the joined banners of Disney's Touchstone and Steven Spielberg's Amblin companies. The artists involved may have created a film that no one sees just once.

**YOUNG GUNS (R).** As a new version of the "Billy the Kid" legend, it pales beside some of its predecessors — like the Penn and Peckinpah versions. But this new Western, a kind-of-teen-movie "Seven Samurai," has some slick vigor. Emilio Estevez is remarkable as a notably psy-

chopathic Billy; Kiefer Sutherland, Lou Diamond Phillips and Charlie Sheen make a fine ensemble. But the movie's other intentions do not always jibe.

# 'A Different World' to see changes in cast during upcoming season

This past season, "A Different World" might better have been called, "A Difficult World." The Thursday-night series, which sent Denise Huxtable (Lisa Bonet) of "The Cosby Show" away to college, maintained none of the calm that prevails at the end of a half-hour at the Huxtables'.

When NBC first screened the series' pilot episode for the press last summer, critics greeted it with derisive hoots. Shortly afterward, the show's producer, George E. Crosby, was replaced by former "Saturday Night Live" writer Anne Beatts, who made cast and concept changes right up until the series' late-September premiere. NBC aired a few other episodes before airing the much-maligned pilot, but the series still drew terrible reviews. Even so, it immediately placed second in the weekly ratings. Why was everyone watching a show that no one seemed to like? Because it was airing directly after "Cosby," perhaps the most powerful lead-in in TV history.

This spring, the press began to snipe about the acting ability of Bonet, who was often upstaged by supporting actors Kadeem Hardison

and Jasmine Guy. And amid rumors of friction between Beatts and Bonet, Beatts was replaced by the current producer, Debbie Allen, the star of the series "Fame" and the younger sister of "Cosby" co-star Phylicia Rashad.

The problems didn't end when the show shut down for hiatus: In May, Bonet posed without clothes for the cover of Rolling Stone magazine, and in a two-page centerfold, the photos, with no accompanying article, seemed to insult Bonet, her fans, the magazine's readers and "The Cosby Show"'s wholesome image. Later that month, it was revealed that Bonet and her husband, Lenny Kravitz, a.k.a. Romeo Blue, were expecting a baby. NBC announced that Bonet would leave "A Different World" temporarily. Then it announced that she would be written out of the series, although she could return at a later date. But this fall, she would return to "The Cosby Show."

Without Bonet, "A Different World" will be a different show.

"It was a difficult year," Jasmine Guy says. "Because we were such a baby show everybody was trying to find their niche. Now the characters are more solid."

With co-star Marisa Tomei also leaving the series, the show's writers are likely to emphasize the remaining cast members. Of them, Guy is the most likely star. Her Whitley Gilbert, a snooty Southern belle, is a charming comic character. And Guy's magnetism shows through Whitley's disdainful attitude.

"I'd like to see what makes Whitley tick," says Guy. "Why she's so mean, so insecure, why she has such a narrow view of the world."

After six years spent working intermittently as a dancer and singer in New York City ("I was living in Harlem for so long without any money," she says), the "Different World" role offered Guy security. Now it may offer her fame. After watching Bonet's struggles with the press, though, Guy is wary.

"Stardom is scary," she says. "Lisa gets so much publicity. After four years, I think I would O.D. on it. So much of her freedom is gone. I mean, if I need soap, I go to the drugstore. I've been thinking, what if I can't do this?"

That is what emerged in the lawsuit between Paul Newman and delicatessen owner Julius Gold, who claims he was promised a share of profits for his help in developing products. However, Newman's share is much smaller and the bulk of the profits has gone to charity.

among other places, and interviewing more than 800 people in the process. The book is scheduled for publication this spring and there already is a TV movie in the planning stage with Raquel Welch touted for the Jackie role!

**FUNNY-GIRL:** How many people know that Hedy Lamarr has always been something of a frustrated comedienne? Hedy's sole pure comedy, "My Favorite Spy," opposite Bob Hope, allowed her to exhibit a delightful flair for comedy, though her extraordinary beauty frequently got in the way during most of her Hollywood career. "I desperately wanted to get a chance at more light roles, but my studio bosses deemed that inconsistent with my image. Whenever they'd tell me they wanted me to play still another sexy siren, I'd respond, 'Please, can't I do another comedy? I'm basically a blue jeans girl, and not feeling very sultry today!'"

**Q:** We're always fascinated with the biographies of the performers printed in the program. Who writes these thumbnail notes? — S.F.

**A:** The biographical sketches are usually done by the performers, with an assist sometimes from the production's press department. These bios may range from long-winded resumes to several scant lines, depending on ego, and overall accomplishments. One of the most winning bios in recent memory appears in the programs of the musical revival of "Ain't Misbehavin'," and was furnished by its bubbly star, Nell Carter. It reads, modestly, "This space is usually used to tell you what I've done. Instead, I will tell you what I'm going to do: the best that I possibly can. Enjoy. Love, Nell."

**Q:** Can you give me a little info about Michelle Pfeiffer, who turns in such a terrific performance as the going-straight wife of a Mafia hood in the new movie comedy, "Married to the Mob"? She looks familiar, yet I can't quite place her. — B.G.

**A:** You've undoubtedly seen the dark-wigged Michelle, who is really a blonde, in such films as "Grease," "Scarface" (cast as another mob wife), "Into the Night," "Sweet Liberty," and "The Witches of Eastwick." For her role in "Married to the Mob," Michelle sports an exaggerated Long Island accent with roots in Brooklyn, a spirited vulnerability, scads of chewing-gum, and enough earrings and spike heels to stock a boutique.

**Q:** I was surprised to read that John Huston's father, the great actor Walter Huston, had changed the original family name. I always thought they were a proud family with roots back to the Emerald Isle. Do you know what the family name was before they dropped it? — C.T.

**A:** Walter Huston was born Walter Houghton, but modified his surname for marquee purposes. This was strictly a show business accommodation.

**Q:** I always thought young John Kennedy wanted to be an actor. How come he's chosen law school instead? — D.L.

**A:** Maybe his mother Jackie Onassis felt he lacked talent or perhaps she thought he'd make a better lawyer. At any rate, he's in his second year in a top law school and I hear has plans to be an entertainment industry lawyer, which is a nice compromise.

**Q:** Liza Minnelli always comes on like gangbusters, full of energy and brash good cheer. Is she like that in private as well? — Y.L.

**A:** Often the most outgoing performers onstage are the shyest and most inward-looking in private. As Liza will tell you in an unguarded moment, she's on the shy side. "It's easy to be effervescent and open with a crowd," says Liza. "But put me at a dinner party with eight people, and I clam up."

**ROBYN'S HANG-UP:** Years ago many stars donated clothes for a Hollywood museum of movie memorabilia. The museum never happened and the clothes were sold to the city of Los Angeles.

## Emmys ratings please Fox

NEW YORK (AP) — It was the second lowest-rated Emmys show ever, but it was the highest-rated show ever for the Fox Broadcasting Co., according to figures from A.C. Nielsen Co.

"The 40th Annual Emmy Awards" ranked 33rd among network shows with a rating of 10.4 and an 18 share. It came in third Sunday behind "Police Academy 2: First Assignment" on NBC and "Blood and Orchids, Part 1" on CBS, but that didn't concern Fox President Jamie Kellner.

"I'm very pleased to be the No. 3 network nationally," Kellner said. "I also think that we put a great show on."

"It was a turning point for the Emmys and a wonderful night for Fox. It's the first time we've ever over-delivered for advertisers, so it was good for them, too," Kellner said. He said Fox had guaranteed a 10.0 rating. The show rated 10.7 during prime time, from 8-11 p.m. EDT.

The show received praise for comic innovations supplied by this year's executive producer, Lorne Michaels, producer of NBC's "Saturday Night Live."

Last year's Emmys on Fox had a rating of 8.8. When NBC carried the Emmys in 1986, it got a rating of 23.7 and a 36 share.

This is the second year of Fox's three-year deal to carry the Emmys.

Otherwise, last week's programming was mostly reruns as the summer doldrums dragged on.

NBC's "The Cosby Show" was back in first place, followed by NBC's "A

Different World," "Cheers" and "Night Court," CBS' "60 Minutes" and "Murder, She Wrote," NBC's "Police Academy 2," "Golden Girls," "Amen," and "Hunter."

NBC won the week ending Aug. 22 with an average, prime-time rating of 12.2: CBS was second with a 9.7 and ABC had 8.9. But the three-network share of 56 percent was a rebound from the all-time low 47 during the week of the Republican National Convention.

Each rating point represents 886,000 households with televisions. The share is a percentage of sets in use.

The lowest-rated shows of the week were: "Tour of Duty," "West 57th," "Mad Avenue," "Blackie's Magic," "Supercarrier," "First Impressions," "Frank's Place," "Hothouse," "After Midnight," "George Stevens: A Filmmaker's Journey."

In the evening news race, "ABC World News Tonight" pulled into the lead with a 9.3 rating and 20 share. The "CBS Evening News" was second with a 9.0 and 20. "NBC Nightly News" remained in third with an 8.6 and 18 share.

But, she quickly adds, "I was never a pretty girl in school. I was always slightly crooked." Her knockout looks onscreen are due to "light, attitude and clothing," said Jamie Lee. "It's not me. It's really something else that's separate."

Q: I've just seen "Young Guns," and I thought Emilio Estevez was terrific as Billy the Kid. I was

wondering, was Estevez afraid to tackle a role that has been played so often before? - N.R.

A: Afraid, no. Careful, yes. Says Estevez, "I was fully aware that I'd be portraying a legendary character: William Bonney, a.k.a. Billy the Kid, has been the subject of about two dozen movies so far, as everything from a smooth Romeo to a grinning, sadistic fool. Through research, I tried to get a true fix on him, and think for the first time he's depicted authentically: a fast-thinking character who could be in complete control while exhibiting a sense of humor, though not always playing with a full deck."

## 'Group One Medical' may raise new ethical questions

HOLLYWOOD — Some people are going to think "Group One Medical" is the product of a sick mind.

The new syndicated series from MGM-UA Telecommunications sounds like TV voyeurism at its worst — real doctors, treating real patients with real medical problems, all for the viewing pleasure of a national audience.

At the very least, it seems like a conspicuous violation of a long-held, sacred trust of privacy between doctor and patient.

"This is an exploitative show," said Dr. Ronald Pion, one of the show's co-creators and its chief medical consult-

ant, during a recent interview on the set here.

"I don't think you can take real people and put them on television ... and not be considered exploiting their private lives," added Pion, who is clinical professor of obstetrics and gynecology at the University of California, Los Angeles. "My question would be, to what end and for what purpose?"

The purpose, said everyone involved with the show, is to disseminate information and to help viewers better understand and cope with medical problems (though a disclaimer at the start of the program recommends that viewers always consult with their doctors).

# 'Dynasty' will be cleaning up its act

NEW YORK (AP) — "Dynasty" isn't exactly turning into a bastion of high morality, but its new producer promises more meaningful relationships than affairs this season, and more ginger ale than gin-and-tonics.

David Paulsen, named executive producer of the show as it begins its ninth season, said he's betting that more realism, more action and some new characters will attract more viewers — even as the characters clean up their acts.

"I don't think people will be popping in and out of every bed," he said. "In the age of herpes and AIDS, it's irresponsible to have flagrant bed hopping and I don't think we ought to do it."

He promised that men and women would develop less ephemeral relationships, and there would be less smoking and drinking on "Dynasty."

"We're going to cut that down, because I just don't think it's healthy," Paulsen said, although he cautioned that any one show should not be used

as a barometer of societal changes.

Paulsen, who was in New York auditioning actors and actresses for the show, is no stranger to glamorous prime-time soaps. He spent five years writing or directing more than 50 episodes of "Dallas." He also was supervising producer of "Knots Landing" for one year.

"Dynasty" finished the 1987-88 television season ranked 37th out of 85 regularly scheduled series.

Although he is planning some new wrinkles for "Dynasty," Paulsen said some of the strengths of the past will be revived.

"We'll see the character of Blake (Carrington) be a driving force again. The character was allowed to weaken," he said.

Blake will "lead the charge" of men with stronger personalities, he said. "The women have always been the stronger force," he added.

Also, there will be more action in the episodes, and, he said, "we're going to tell a faster story."

One of the new characters will be a young detective, "a street guy somewhere between Serpico and Colombo," he said.

And although there will be plenty of elegant clothing, diamonds and fancy place settings, there will be more people from other walks of life, "people who even live without air conditioning," Paulsen said.

Thus, viewers will see more of what it is like when the rich encounter the poor, experiences projected from the typewriters of three new writers, two of whom were reporters until this year, he said.

The changes in the show are aimed at higher ratings. But he said the effort to clean up the lifestyles of his characters came from his desire to reflect changing values in America. And he insists that television shows can affect the way viewers live.

He recalled that once, in a scene of a television sitcom, a character in a car made passing mention of fastening seatbelts.

"For four or five days afterward, police departments noticed a distinct drop in fatalities and serious injuries," he said. "It was a very humbling experience that showed that although we're not out to preach, there are subtle things you can do."

## NBC airs Vincennes footage first

NEW YORK — Shortly after the Navy cruiser Vincennes mistakenly shot down an Iranian airliner over the Persian Gulf, NBC News staffers learned that a Navy documentary team had been taping footage aboard the ship at the time.

Ten days after the July 3 accident, in which all 290 persons aboard the plane were killed, NBC filed a request with the Pentagon for a copy of the Navy's video footage under provisions of the Freedom of Information Act.

The result: NBC aired Friday an excerpt from what the network's Washington bureau chief, Robert McFarland, said was a 34-minute tape of scenes shot aboard the Vincennes. The tape was released earlier that day by the Pentagon.

The excerpts, which an NBC spokesman said made up about 75 percent of a report that ran just over three minutes, showed dramatic scenes from the Vincennes' bridge

when the ship was under attack by Iranian gunboats and was firing back. It also showed the ship's launch of two missiles at what Vincennes officials thought — erroneously, as events proved — to be an attacking Iranian F-14 fighter.

The Navy tape did not show the airliner being hit. A Pentagon spokesman said that there had been no footage taken of that.

CBS was the second of the major networks to air excerpts from the tape Friday, showing them on the second of two "feeds" of the "CBS Evening News" that the network provides to affiliated stations each weeknight.

ABC only aired a brief scene from the tape on its regularly-scheduled "news brief" in prime time Friday, then later provided its affiliates a 3-minute excerpt for their late-evening local newscasts, a spokesman said.

NBC got the tape first because "it had its request in about a month ahead of everybody else," Pentagon spokesman Fred Hoffman said Monday. After NBC had it, he added, "we

made it available to all comers."

NBC's McFarland was asked if the Pentagon — which reviewed the tape as part of its investigation into the airliner's downing — had cut anything from the tape it provided NBC.

"We're not quite sure because we don't know what all they had," he said.

The Pentagon's Hoffman acknowledged that the tape was edited, but said that the only things cut "were a lot of dead spots" — passages showing nothing of importance — "and if anyone had asked us for the full tape, we would have given it to them."

Some senior Navy officers were uneasy, he added, about one segment in which a Vincennes crewman, mistakenly thinking that the ship's missiles had hit an attacking Iranian fighter, exultantly says, "That was a dead one."

But that was left in, Hoffman said. NBC's Freedom of Information Act request for the Vincennes tape was not the first request by a broadcast news organization for tape or film made by U.S. military personnel.

Each half-hour show will contain several unscripted, unrehearsed office visits concerning a variety of medical concerns. In a recent taping, for example, a young woman dressed in a hospital gown and complaining of lower back pain discusses her problem with one of the show's three starring doctors (two men, one woman) as a camera crew quietly records the discussion. There are no breaks and no retakes, and after a few moments, one senses that both doctor and patient have forgotten that this is a television show (After the taping, in fact, the doctor gives the woman an on-the-set prescription).

Still, some viewers, Pion said, will watch for less than educational reasons.

"Some will watch because they love to see people sicker than they are," Pion said. "Some will watch because they want to get free advice. Some of them will watch because they've got nothing else to do and they don't like what's on the other channel, and some are gonna watch because someone said, 'You ought to watch, there's this neat doctor on the program.'"

The "Group One" doctor most likely to get that kind of star treatment is Dr. Michael Gitter, a mustachioed cross between Tom Selleck and Den-

nis Weaver.

"I think (viewers) are going to be interested in the patients, the diseases and the doctors," Gitter said.

But the man with his finger on the pulse of the TV audience is Van Gordon Sauter, the controversial former president of CBS News and co-creator as well as co-executive producer of "Group One Medical."

Sauter said that the idea for such a show occurred to him not long ago in the middle of a speech he was giving to the American Medical Association.

Gazing out at the audience, his mind wandering, Sauter recalled thinking to himself, "My God, it's a room full of Judge Wapners!" (referring to the real-life judge of the popular courtroom series "The People's Court").

But despite the obvious pitfalls — a temptation by doctors and patients to play to the cameras and the possibility that viewers may take to self-diagnosis — "Group One Medical" is much more than one might fear it is quacked up to be.

It has, for example, the American Medical Association's seal of approval.

"The American Medical Association believes this new show will be a great source of information about health

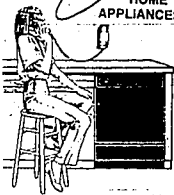

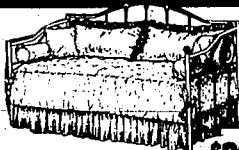

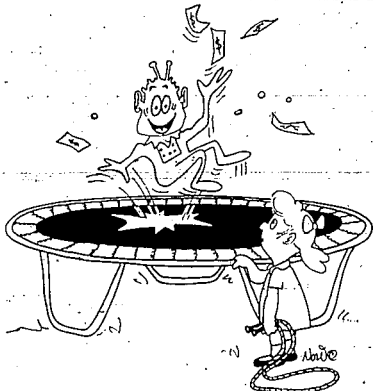

## Futuristic TV moves closer

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Federal Communications Commission moved closer Thursday to authorizing futuristic television systems with movie film picture clarity and sound equal to that of compact discs.

The commission made preliminary findings that will allow research to proceed on the system, which is not likely to begin in the United States until the mid-1990s.

The FCC also sought public comment on options for using the airwaves for so-called high definition TV — considered the biggest television advance since color programming.

The commission tentatively decided that:

— Existing broadcasters and stations are best equipped to bring the new system to viewers.

— Advanced television programs must be received on existing television sets — so current equipment wouldn't become obsolete.

— If an additional frequency space is needed, it should be found within existing VHF and UHF television bands. The FCC found that looking for frequencies outside those bands would delay the service, and noted that bands now suitable for the system are in use for other purposes.

The commission asked for comment on three possible plans on using the broadcast spectrum for advanced television, and on a number of other technical issues. There would be a 60-day comment period and 30 days for replies.

FCC Chairman Dennis R. Patrick and Commissioner Patricia Diaz Dennis supported the tentative plan in full. Commissioner James H. Quello

dissented, saying the commission acted prematurely.

Quello said the FCC based its preliminary findings on computer projections and should have waited until the technology was tested and developed.

But Patrick said the technology to improve picture resolution exists today, and the FCC should spur further research and development.

His view was supported by Ms. Dennis, who said: "Some urge us to move more slowly, to wait for more evidence before acting. That is tempting... But delay creates significant costs."

Although Patrick said the preliminary rulings would "put the U.S. in the forefront of the international quest for new TV technology," the Japanese have been working on an advanced system for two decades.

They plan to offer a preview with broadcasts of the summer Olympics to high definition TV sets in about 50 big-city department stores throughout Japan.

and health care for the American public," according to a statement from Dr. James Sammons, AMA executive vice president.

And, indeed, a show screened for critics included a wealth of statistics and background information relevant to each case.

Patients are referred to the series by their primary-care doctors (chiefly from the Los Angeles area), through local hospitals and by medical associations.

But what is in it for the patients, one wonders — especially because they are paid only \$200, which covers transportation and missed time at work.

Sandy Walk, 29, of Los Angeles, went to "Group One Medical" for a second opinion on her post-partum blues and some lingering pain from her episiotomy.

"I did have some qualms about it because (the producers) said they would have to do an exam and I said I

didn't want anyone else there but the doctor." Walk said in a recent telephone interview.

The physical examination was conducted off the air but Walk discussed her very personal problems in detail for the cameras.

"I almost didn't do this because it's such a sensitive topic. ... If I had broken a leg it would be no big deal," she added.

That, perhaps, is the hidden beauty of using real patients in the show (an earlier idea to use actors as patients was scratched).

After years of doing television, said Sauter, "I'm always amazed that, first of all, people will go on television, and secondly, if they do on television, how quickly they become oblivious to the presence of the cameras."

The "Group One Medical" production staff confirmed that they are looking for a certain type of patient — someone who, first and foremost, can communicate.

And though Walk, for example, found the advice from her "Group One Medical" doctor helpful as a second opinion (and more detailed than her own harried doctor's, she said), the idea is to leave the audience, as much as the patient, with an improved sense of health.

"If you're a patient and for whatever reason you decide to share your story with 'Group One Medical,' there's no doubt in your mind that you're coming to a studio, you're coming to a television show and this ain't walk-in medicine," Pion said. "Nobody's coming on the show for the promise of care."

With the increasing popularity of "reality-based" programming coupled with the public's interest in health and medicine, the program has hit potential.

Certain examinations and graphic procedures will, of course, be somewhat off limits as common sense and TV standards of taste dictate, but the dramatic opportunities seem limitless.

In one episode, for example, viewers watch a pregnant woman, worried

because she cannot feel her baby moving, having a sonogram (And, fortunately, find out the baby is fine).

In yet another; Gitter angers a patient when he tells the man that he should be tested for AIDS.

But "Group One Medical" will draw the line well before the point when a patient might die on the air.

That is a step back from NBC's highly praised but highly depressing medical documentary "Lifeline," which expired in 1978 after a couple of months in prime time. That show also focused on real-life doctors in different cities as they met medical emergencies.

Pion mentioned a man who appeared on "Group One," dying of leukemia, and "is quite certain his days are numbered. My sense of the man when he was on was, 'The guy's very inspirational. He's going like soap operas do — on a day-to-day basis.'"

But, he added, "I don't think anybody's going to die on this show" ("Lifeline," he said, was hospital-based and featured patients in need of emergency care, which this show will not.)

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
