## House approves drug felony death sentences

WASHINGTON — The House approved amendments to an anti-drug bill Thursday that would permit federal death sentences for murderers in drug felonies and deny many federal benefits to anyone convicted of two narcotics offenses.

Those who use and profit from drugs. The death penalty amendment authored by Rep. George Gekas, R-Pa., passed 299-111 and the benefit denials — sponsored by Rep. Bill McCollum, R-Fla. — was approved 335-67. The provisions were attached to a bill that would add some \$2 billion to the nation's existing \$3.9 billion attack on illegal drugs.

Craig voted for the death penalty provision. The House was unable to finish the bill Thursday night, and is not expected to resume debate until next Wednesday. Before ending debate, the lawmakers voted 259-134 for an amendment that would permit introduction of illegally seized evidence in federal court if police acted in "good faith."

Benefits and other federal assistance. But they couldn't sway their colleagues, even by pointing out the amendment would prevent burial of Medal of Honor winners in Arlington National Cemetery. Battered death penalty opponents had argued that capital punishment wouldn't stop hardened drug killers from murdering someone.

Death sentence to anyone convicted of intentionally killing someone during a drug felony. The House also approved, 410-1, a measure providing for a mandatory life term for such killers. That language — opposed by Rep. George W. Crockett Jr., D-Mich. — was proposed by death penalty foes as an alternative, but those backing capital punishment refused to stop there.

## Yellowstone access cut to minimum

YELLOWSTONE NATIONAL PARK, Wyo. — All but a small section of Yellowstone National Park was closed to visitors Thursday, and fire managers began looking ahead to a potentially dangerous weekend. Just the park's west entrance, the 14-mile road from there to Madison Junction and an 8-mile section of road from the north entrance at Gardiner, Mont., to the Swan Lake flats was open, according to park spokesmen.

Most of the 2.2 million-acre park, which includes about 250 miles of roadway, was closed to ensure an open path for fire trucks and to protect tourists from roaring flames that have involved 732,500 acres.

# Rivals emphasize defense policy in Texas, Kentucky campaigning

Tentative agreement was reached Thursday on Sept. 25 as the date for the first of two presidential campaign debates between Democrat Michael Dukakis and Republican George Bush.

While top aides were working out details, the rival candidates were emphasizing defense policy during appearances in Texas and Kentucky. Dukakis told the American Legion that "a mountain of debt" built up during the Reagan administration was endangering national defense, while Bush, observing the fiery destruction of U.S. missiles to comply with a new treaty, hailed "the day we began to reverse the arms race."

The tentative debate agreement was announced by Dukakis campaign chairman Paul Bruntanis "who said the two candidates would meet on Sept. 25 at Wake Forest University in Winston-Salem, N.C. Bruntanis said the second presidential debate would be Oct. 13 or 14, depending on the baseball playoff schedule. The debates will be general in topic rather than having one on domestic and one on foreign and defense policy, said Mark Goodin, a Bush campaign spokesman. He said the second presidential debate would be held somewhere on the West Coast.

Vice presidential nominees Lloyd Bentsen and Dan Quayle will debate during the first week in October.

"We are still discussing format, staging and the length of the debates and we will continue to carry on those discussions," Bruntanis said after meeting with Bush's campaign chairman James A. Baker III.

NBC News president Michael Gartner announced, the network would not televise the first debate live because of its commitment to Olympic Games coverage. He said NBC would air a delayed tape of the debate after its Olympic broadcast.

Bush was in Longhorn Army Ammunition plant in Karnack, Texas, to join other U.S. and Soviet officials in witnessing the demolition of two Pershing missile engines.

He called the occasion "one of those unique moments in the career of man, a moment when the tides of history turned, that a new future dawned."

The engines were among about 850 weapons to be destroyed by the United States under the U.S.-Soviet treaty that eliminated medium-range missiles from Europe. The Soviets have destroyed several of their missiles.

Sheila Tate, Bush's campaign spokesman, said the vice president now favors an increase in the minimum wage, which has been \$3.35 an hour for the past eight years. In line with Reagan administration policy, Bush has opposed an increase in the past.

Tate did not say how much of an increase Bush would favor. Dukakis has made a call for a higher minimum wage a central theme of his campaign.

The nation's largest teachers' union announced its endorsement of Dukakis for president and called for an end to "eight years of teacher bashing," under the Reagan administration.

Mary Hatwood Furell, president of the 1.9 million member National Education Association, said the union "will mobilize at least 500,000 volunteers for the Dukakis campaign."

A new poll, done by Louis Harris & Associates for Business Week Magazine, said Bush had a 50 percent to 44 percent lead over Dukakis among likely voters. The survey of 1,299 people was taken Sept. 1 through Sept. 6 and had a margin of error of 3 percentage points, meaning the possibility exists that the two candidates will be in a dead heat.

# Crew knew Flight 1141 was in trouble

DALLAS (AP) — A transcript of cockpit conversation on Delta Flight 1141 reveals the crew knew their jetliner was in serious trouble about 21 seconds before it crashed Aug. 31 at Delta-Fort Worth International Airport, a newspaper reported Thursday.

The transcript of a tape shows that about nine seconds after an apparently normal takeoff, a cockpit alarm showed the Boeing 727 was not able to gather enough speed to stay aloft, the Dallas Times Herald reported.

The Salt Lake City-bound plane exploded and broke apart on impact, killing 13 of the 108 people on board.

Eleven seconds before impact, Capt. Larry Lon Davis exclaimed, "We're not gonna make it!" One of the final entries on the transcript appears to be a scream.

The unauthorized release of the transcript drew sharp criticism from John Mazor, spokesman for the Air Line Pilots Association in Washington, D.C., who warned, "It probably be some repercussions."

It will be months before investigators pinpoint the cause of the crash, but two primary suspects have emerged. They are wing flaps, de-

signed to give the plane lift, and engine problems during the flight. The transcript reveals that flight engineer Steven Judd and co-pilot Casey Kirkland went through a standard preparation checklist.

In the transcript, Kirkland told Judd that the flaps were extended in the correct position for normal take-off during the checklist less than a minute before the plane received permission for takeoff.

National Transportation Safety Board investigators said last week that the cockpit recording indicates there were two compressor stall,

seem a little noisy around midnight, and parking spaces may become precious for a while, but the fair "puts Filer on the map."

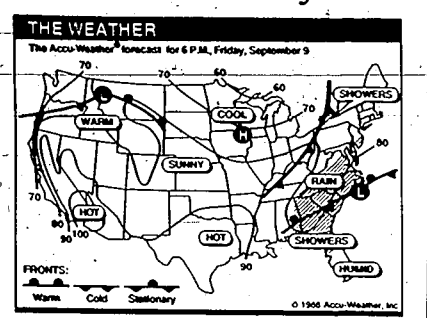
"We're proud to have the fair in Filer. We're proud to be a part of it," Fort said. And cooperation between the city and the fair management is better than ever.

fits for five years for anyone convicted of two or more drug-related offenses within a 10-year period, and denial for 10 years for persons convicted of drug distribution.

Heads of federal agencies could restore benefits for those who completed a drug rehabilitation program or were otherwise being rehabilitated.

Veterans benefits would be denied only to those convicted of drug distribution, retirement, welfare, health and disability benefits would be exempted from the penalty.

Rep. Charles B. Rangel, D-N.Y., who warned down version of the benefit denials failed 278-124, told the House that entire families in public housing could be thrown into the street if the head of household had two drug convictions.

While the Senate has yet to consider its own anti-drug bill, it already has expressed support for a capital punishment this year. A separate bill approving the death penalty against drug dealers and kingpins passed in June by a 65-29 margin.

In 1986, the Senate's refusal to support the death penalty in drug-related murders resulted in Congress eliminating the measure from an anti-drug bill that year. The House had inserted capital punishment in the 1986 bill by a vote of 526-112.

Off the House floor, members were pressured by gun-control advocates and opponents over a provision for a seven-day waiting period for handgun purchases. The language also includes an optional background check of the purchaser by law enforcement authorities.

The National Rifle Association is lobbying to remove the waiting period. The NRA also has been active trying to save it. Both sides have brought police officers to the Capitol to help in the lobbying effort.

formation officer Don Bollinger said. It also was at least two ridgelines away from private property at Yellow Pine last Thursday.

Immediately south of the Nez Perce forest, firefighters in the Payette National Forest installed pumps and hoses to protect the Taylor Ranch from the 30,000-acre Golden fire, burning near the confluence of the Main Salmon River and its Middle Fork, said Dave Olson, Payette spokesman.

Overall, the Payette was battling five crews of fire Thursday night, covering more than 100,000 acres, Fitzmons said.

He fire showered the town of Salmon with ash Wednesday as it made a 9-mile run toward the Main Salmon.

Fifty people were stationed at the private Root Ranch in the Chamberlain Basin while the Silver fire burned nearby. The 32,000-acre blaze destroyed two outfitters' camps Wednesday at the Cold Meadows Guard Station. Olson said a 20-person crew is working to douse hotspots around the airstrip there.

Olson advised hunters to stay out of the northeast corner of the Payette forest in the Church wilderness because of the possibility the fires could explode with continuing hot temperatures and wind.

Firefighters in the Clearwater National Forest to the north quickly contained the 50-acre White Creek fire Thursday that started the day before about 27 miles southeast of Orofino, Elaine Murphy of the forest superintendent's office said.

Crews also have contained about 10 percent of the 1,480-acre Joy West fire in the forest and worked to extend a fire line between two drainages. Fire information officer Mary Mumford said.

Blown by winds up to 30 mph, the 21,227-acre Battle Axe wilderness blaze crossed the Middle Fork of the Salmon River Wednesday, and is burning near Harrah's Middle Fork Lodge in central Idaho, Challis spokesman Jim James said.

James said most of the 150 people on the fire have been moved from their prior focus of operations at the Indian Creek Guard Station to Thomas Creek and the lodge.

# Slimmed down to 520, man comes out of home

HEMPSTEAD, N.Y. (AP) — Walter Hudson, who has slimmed down an estimated 680 pounds, lumbered out of his house Thursday and greeted the sunshine for the first time in 18 years.

"It feels good. I shouldn't have waited this long," said Hudson, showing off his new 520-pound physique. A year ago, his roughly 6-foot frame weighed about 1,200 pounds.

Wearing sunglasses to protect his eyes, Hudson walked through a widened doorway and onto a specially constructed, elevated concrete path. He sat on a concrete block with a vinyl cushion.

Hudson's fear that his legs would not support his weight kept him trapped in his house and confined mostly to his bed since he was 15 years old. He came to the world's attention last fall when became wedged in a doorway and had to be rescued by firefighters with saws.

Now, he said, he considers that frightening episode a blessing. It made him realize that something had to be done.

"I would have kept eating more and more," he said. "That fall saved my life. It was a gift from God."

He lost several hundred pounds under-Dick Gregory's diet regimen, but when the comedian-turned-nu-

tritionist wanted to bring him to his clinic in the Bahamas, Hudson balked — he didn't want to leave the house.

He pressed ahead with his own diet. Every other day, he consumes nothing but water. Other days, he drinks his own liquid diet formula, which he plans to market some day, and also occasionally has garlic, onion and apple cider.

In an average week, he loses three pounds. He hopes to reach 190 pounds.

"I got a lot to live for," he said. "I want to be a part of people, people who are overweight or on drugs."

He has been aided by a medical team led by Barbara Rosen, a psychologist specializing in eating disorders.

## Challis identifies body

CHALLIS (AP) — A body found Monday west of Challis, near Five-Mile Creek in the Yankee Fork of the Salmon River drainage, has been identified as that of Hank Stitt, 69, of Chicago.

Custer County Sheriff's dispatcher Jan Spiker said Thursday that preliminary autopsy results indicate Stitt died of a single gunshot wound to the head.

She said he may have been dead as long as a week before being discovered by a helicopter pilot Monday morning while flying under contract to the Challis National Forest.

The death remained under investigation, Spiker said. Custer County officials had difficulty identifying

Stitt's remains because no identification was found at first and a 1980 Dodge Omni hatchback parked nearby had no license plates or other ownership identification.

Spiker said a check of the vehicle's identification number indicated the car was registered to Copyright Inc., a Chicago-area company Stitt worked for. That clue tied in with a senior citizen's travel card that eventually was found bearing Stitt's name, social security number and date of birth.

Spiker said the final piece fell into place when the sheriff's office received a call from Chicago police saying they had received a missing person report on Stitt on Aug. 25.

## Officials to draft plan for water

MOSCOW (AP) — Washington and Idaho officials disagreed on the urgency, but state, county and city officials here have agreed on a major step toward protecting water quality and quantity on the Palouse.

Representatives from the Idaho Department of Water Resources, the Washington Department of Ecology and the Pullman-Moscow Groundwater Committee agreed Wednesday to draft a memorandum of understanding by the end of the year. With input and approval of the general public, eventually it will develop into a comprehensive groundwater management plan for the Palouse.

"I believe that you've got a problem," said George Krill from the Washington Department of Ecology. "But it's not an urgent problem."

"We used to point to the Moscow-Pullman basin as a place where water mining occurred and where something needed to be done," said Wayne Haas, of the Idaho water agency. "Perhaps, the situation is not

as bad as we thought it was. But even if you're not mining now, even at a 2 percent growth rate, you will be."

Officials of both states agreed that the time to develop a groundwater management plan is now.

"You should not wait until you get to a critical situation because then you might have to do things or the state might have to come in and do things you may not want," Haas said.

The Palouse committee was formed a year ago to address concerns about the groundwater supply on the Palouse. Recent studies have indicated residents are using water faster than the aquifer can replace it.

The committee is made up of representatives from Moscow and Pullman, Whitman and Latah counties, the University of Idaho and Washington State University.

The makeup of any future committee will be one of the things outlined in the memorandum of understand-

ing. Also outlined in that document will be boundaries for a groundwater management area and goals for a comprehensive groundwater management plan.

Officials from both Washington and Idaho emphasized the need for public comment and approval. The memorandum of understanding and the detailed "management" plan should be outlined at public hearings before being completed, they said.

"We can't put these things together in a dark room," said Ted Olson of the Washington DOE.

Neither state agency could promise any money to the committee. The committee already has \$15,000 raised by local groups.

The state officials praised the Palouse groups for taking the initiative in groundwater management.

## Board selects 3 towns for revitalization

DRIGGS (AP) — An regional economic revitalization project will provide assistance to the light manufacturing and tourism industries in three Idaho communities, officials say.

Teton County, Buhl and Lava Hot Springs were selected for the three-year East Idaho Rural Community Revitalization Project this week by the project's advisory board.

The selections were announced Wednesday in Driggs.

The Northwest Area Foundation of St. Paul, Minn., is sponsoring the project with a \$300,000 grant. Work

on the project is expected to begin immediately, said Robert Chambers, project coordinator.

The project is geared at helping each site develop economic revitalization plans, he said. Assistance will be provided by Idaho State University, East-Central Idaho Planning and Development Agency and economic development agencies.

The project's first year will consist of a planning phase. An inventory of businesses in the community and studies of economic trends will be conducted.

Information from the studies then

will be applied over the next two years. Economic revitalization projects will be put in place according to a priorities list.

As an example, Chambers said the project could include development of a recreational vehicle waste disposal station, a potentially important element in Teton County's tourism industry.

While ISU and other economic development officials will assist in the project, Chambers said residents will still "take charge of their own destiny."

## Stallings pushes waste disposal

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Richard Stallings, D-Idaho, continuing his push for permanent disposal of the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory's transuranic radioactive material, wants to speed up the opening of a new Waste Isolation Pilot Plant near Carlsbad, N.M.

Stallings told two House committees Thursday that he supports legislation withdrawing the New Mexico site from public land laws and transferring control of it to the U.S. Department of Energy.

"This withdrawal is necessary before the facility can become operational and begin accepting waste from Idaho and other federal sites," Stallings said in a news release.

In testimony before the Armed Services and Energy and Commerce committees, which are considering legislation affecting the opening of

the pilot plant, Stallings said Idahoans have grown impatient and weary of broken promises from the DOE concerning the removal of the stored INEL waste.

Most of the transuranic radioactive material comes from the department's Rocky Flats Plant in Colorado.

## KBSU receives OK to fund broadcast

CHALLIS (AP) — A proposal to broadcast National Public Radio to central Idaho over KBSU in Boise has been given the green light for federal financing, but hopes of having the signal on the air by Thanksgiving have been all but abandoned.

Tim McCartney, KBSU chief engineer, said the station received written notice Aug. 29 that a federal Public Telecommunications Facilities Program grant was awarded for the project by the U.S. Department of Commerce.

McCartney said the grants are awarded annually to help fund the construction of public facilities to broadcast public radio and television signals.

The grant will cover 75 percent of the project cost. KBSU will fund 25 percent of the cost of installing trans-

mitters near Stanley and Challis, while the Salmon Television Translator District in Salmon will kick in \$2,500 toward the cost of a translator in Salmon.

Each translator will cost about \$10,000, McCartney said, with the translator on Basin Butte near Stanley costing slightly more.

While supporters of the project are pleased that funding has been approved, they are worried that bureaucratic red tape could hold the project up beyond the grant's February 1990 deadline.

McCartney said the grant specifies that all permits and leases must be issued before any funds for the project will be released. Although permits for translators on Grouse Peak outside Challis and on Baldy Mountain outside of Salmon have been is-

sued, a third permit for the Basin Butte translator has not been issued.

As a result, McCartney said KBSU cannot begin ordering equipment or incurring expense on the project until the Basin Butte permit is issued.

Once equipment is ordered, he said, it may take up to four months before it's received.

## Libertarian joins race for 2nd District seat

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Donovan Bramwell doesn't expect to win Idaho's 2nd District congressional seat, but he does hope to draw some attention to the Libertarian Party's ideals and its presidential candidate.

Bramwell, 35, a Lewisville farmer, said Thursday he is challenging Democrat Rep. Richard Stallings and Republican nominee Diane Watkins for the congressional seat.

Bramwell said his late entry into the campaign could dash any hopes of winning. It was only last week that Libertarians were granted a place on Idaho's November ballot.

"I don't expect to win, but I hope this will be an opportunity to make a statement — a statement that needs to be made," he said. "I would encourage proper minority statement with me by voting for me."

The goal of the Libertarian Party and its presidential candidate, former Republican congressman Ron Paul of Texas, is to cut down the size of government and restore freedoms, Bramwell said.

By reducing the size, he said, the nation also can be relieved of a national debt that is approaching \$3 trillion. He blamed Congress for be-

ing "terribly irresponsible" with its spending.

"Democrats and Republicans talk about having no tax increases, but the Libertarians take the ax to the root of the problem," he said. "We would like to replace virtually all spending with programs funded and operated by churches and charitable organizations."

Government spending should be limited to national defense, the court system and interstate commerce, Bramwell said.

The highest priority for Libertarians is to abolish the Internal Revenue Service and eliminate the personal income tax.

"I'm not shy about saying what we like to do is create a tax-free society," he said.

Bramwell said his funds are limited, but hopes to make a couple of rounds through the sprawling 2nd District, covering all of eastern and most of southern Idaho, during the campaign.

"If I can finish a strong third, people will pay attention," he said. "You can't get anywhere if you don't start somewhere."

## Woman dies in collision

CALDWELL (AP) — A 79-year-old Caldwell woman has died after a car-truck collision at a rural Canyon County intersection.

Idaho State Police said Beulah Caine died in a Caldwell hospital Wednesday afternoon. An autopsy was scheduled to determine the cause of death.

Investigating officers said a car driven by Walter Caine, 85, Culbertson, Neb., was in collision with a semi-trailer truck operated by Ronald Mingo, 41, Hazelton, about 11:45 a.m. Wednesday. Caine was Beulah Caine's brother.

Investigation of the accident continues.

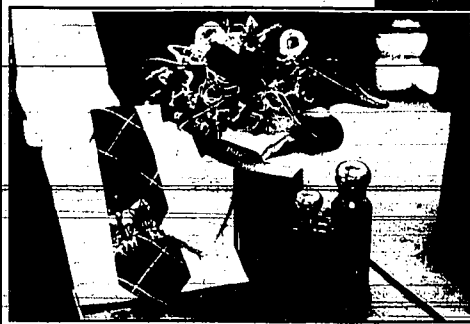

## Droughts focus attention on tightening world food supply

The drought that gripped the United States this summer is being compared to the Dust Bowl of the '30s — and with good reason. Reports in July that the Mississippi River had fallen to the lowest level since record keeping began more than a century ago are probably the most startling single measure of how dry the agricultural heartland was. With drought also reducing Canada's crop, the North American grain harvest this year will be down by at least one-fourth.

Preoccupied with our own crop shortfall, we have paid little attention to the drought afflicting the harvesting in China, the world's other major food-producing country. China Daily describes the drought in one province as the worst in 20 years, in another as the worst in a century.

Together, the droughts in North America and China will lead to the greatest drop ever in world carry-over stocks of grain — the amount in the bin when the new harvest begins — reducing them to an estimated 54 days of consumption. This would be lower even than the 57-day supply in 1972, when world grain prices doubled following a Soviet decision to offset a crop shortfall by importing grain.

Like the droughts of 1988, the 1972 Soviet wheat purchase was a triggering event that brought a tightening world food situation into sharp relief. Almost overnight the world's grain stocks were depleted. Even though the United States returned all of its idled cropland to production, four years passed before world

grain reserves were rebuilt and food-importing countries could again breathe easily.

Although not widely recognized at the time, part of the rapid growth in world grain output following the high grain prices of the mid-'70s was achieved by plowing highly erodible land and by drawing down water tables to irrigate. Farmers can overplow and overirrigate with impressive results in the short run, but for many the short run is drawing to a close.

The result has been a worldwide retrenchment in both cultivated and irrigated area. The U.S. Department of Agriculture is converting 40 million acres of highly erodible cropland (11 percent of total U.S. cropland) into grassland or woodland under the Conservation Reserve Program before it becomes wasteland. And a recent USDA study reports

that one-fourth of the 52 million acres of U.S.-irrigated cropland is being watered by lowering of water tables from six inches to four feet per year.

If the share of U.S. grain output that was produced with this unsustainable use of soil and water is subtracted from world output, the surplus grain stocks of the '80s disappear. If data were available to extend this calculation to the rest of the world, they would very likely show that sustainable world food output is now running below consumption.

The retrenchment in cropland and irrigation is now affecting production trends. Global grain output multiplied a phenomenal 2.6 times between 1950 and 1984, but since then growth has slowed markedly. In part, depressed prices are responsible. So, too, are limits imposed on farmers by soil and water resources. And for some farmers, the lack of new agricultural technologies is slowing output growth. The higher prices that are sure to ac-

company the reduced grain stocks will remove the first constraint, but the last two will remain.

The loss of momentum since 1984 is due in part to a diminishing backlog of new technology. Indeed, in some countries, the grain yields achieved by the better farmers are approaching those reached by scientists on experimental plots.

Unfortunately, there are no identifiable technologies waiting in the wings that will lead to the quantum jumps in world food output such as those associated with the spread of hybrid corn, the ninefold increase in fertilizer use between 1950 and 1984, the near tripling of irrigated area during the same period or the relatively recent rapid spread of the high-yielding wheats and rice in Third World countries.

And contrary to popular opinion, biotechnology is not a panacea that will end hunger. It is a timely addition to the scientist's tool kit, one that will speed the pace of agricultural research, but it does not promise any alternatives to the photosynthetic process that is the ultimate constraint on food production.

Once the nearly 50 million acres of crop land that are held out of production under U.S. farm commodity surplus management programs (roughly 2 percent of world crop land) are returned to production, rapid gains in world food output will not come easily. There are still many gains to be made in food produc-

tion on every continent, but whether they will come fast enough to keep up with the growth in demand remains to be seen.

Facing the '90s, the world's farmers are looking at an annual growth in world population that is projected to reach 91 million, up from roughly 70 million in 1970. If farmers had unlimited soil and water resources, they could easily meet these staggering increases in demand, but the reality is that they will be in the next decade with a crop-land base that is no longer expanding, a scarcity of fresh water and no major new technologies to help them boost output.

Future improvements in the world food situation depend heavily on reversing land degradation and braking population growth. Without a massive reordering of priorities that will restore soils and slow the population growth that is already outstripping food production in Africa and Latin America, food scarcity and higher food prices may well dominate the '90s.

Given the obvious difficulties in expanding food production as fast as population, pressure is shifting to population policy makers. In the world of the '90s and beyond, satisfactorily balancing the food-population equation may depend more on family planners than on farmers.

## Dukakis' deep difficulties derive from grating utterances

WASHINGTON — Michael Dukakis is as difficult to derive from the fact that he is saying little and is saying it gratingly.

Suddenly Democrats are looking at him squiggle-eyed, wondering what they have hitched their wagon to. What worries seasoned Democrats is how quickly Dukakis' lead was lost, and under such a light assault. Peter Hart's polling tells the story:

Among Southern whites, Bush's lead has gone from 14 points in July to 31 in early September. If that holds, Dukakis will get few Southern electoral votes. As long as it holds, Bush will not need to spend much time or money in the South — time and money being two great and scarce resources of any candidate.

Among Catholics, independents and white-collar and sales people, Dukakis' leads have become Bush leads. In California, Dukakis' lead has shrunk to three points. That means Dukakis is behind because on Election Day in California Republicans usually run four to six points better than the last poll. Republicans there are better at getting out their voters, including absentee voters. New Jersey is another state which, like California, has gone Republican ever since the 1964 anti-Goldwater landslide, and Dukakis is behind there by 10 points.

Rarely if ever has anyone done as much with as little as Bush did in August. He gave a good speech at the convention, but that is the least you should expect from a man in his third decade in public life, and who had weeks

to rehearse what was written for him by an accomplished writer.

Then Bush beat Dukakis about the head and shoulders with the Pledge of Allegiance and furloughs for killers. Then Bush pledged devotion to the future purity of Boston harbor, and — poof! — Dukakis' 17-point lead was gone.

Actually, the polls were moving against Dukakis before the Republican National Convention. The bounce Dukakis got from his convention was remarkably short-lived. Why?

In the last half of the primary season, Dukakis was, in the eyes of many Democratic voters, less Dukakis than Mr. Not Jesse Jackson. Furthermore, Dukakis' manner is not wearing well.

The staccato cadences of his clipped sentences suggest irritation. He seems impatient to rush to the end of whatever he is saying because he considers the subject too obvious to detain any clever person. His tone is at once annoyed and complacent, that of a self-satisfied scold.

His manner seems related to a frame of mind, and fundamental ideas. If, he says, the Reagan administration is a rotting fish, and if its foreign policy is not just mistaken but

"criminal," then the case for Dukakis is as self-evident as Dukakis' tone suggests.

Since the Republican convention, the campaign has resembled (in the words of a Democratic consultant) a tennis match in which only one side gets to serve. Now we will see if Dukakis can break Bush's service.

Dukakis cannot do so by harping on Iran-contra or Noriega. Any votes that will be won on those issues have long since been won. And if the election comes down to a question of foreign policy, Bush will win.

Assuming Dukakis can change the subject to domestic issues, then the race will be close, at least in terms of popular votes. The last two

elections between non-incumbents, 1960 and 1968, were close. Elections following land-slides (e.g., 1960, 1968, 1976) usually are. However, the Electoral College probably will function as it should, exaggerating the decisiveness of the national decision.

Such constructive distortion is the work of the state-by-state winner-take-all custom. (It is not a constitutional principle and Maine does not abide by it.)

In 1960, Kennedy beat Nixon on the popular vote 49.72 percent to 49.55, but 303 to 219 in electoral votes. In 1968, Nixon beat Humphrey 43.42 to 42.92, but won the electoral vote 301 to 191 (with George Wallace winning some). In 1976, Carter beat Ford 50.1 to 48, but won the

electoral vote 297 to 240.

Dukakis will be buried beneath an electoral-vote landslide unless he puts a populist and nationalist edge of passion on his economic message.

If he does, he will be accused (he already has been, a bit) of borrowing the themes of a former rival, Richard Gephardt, who would have been harder for Bush to handle.

But that accusation is more bearable than defeat, and borrowed passions are better than Dukakis' sole possession so far, his admiration of his own competence.

# Couple say baby was swapped at birth, sue for \$100 million

BALTIMORE (AP) — A couple who raised a girl until she died of a congenital heart ailment last month at age 9 have filed a \$100 million lawsuit claiming the child was swapped at birth for their own healthy baby.

In the lawsuit filed Wednesday, Ernest and Regina I. Twigg allege their child was put up for adoption nine years ago after hospital workers changed identifying bracelets and altered records so the adoptive couple could have a well baby. They hope to find their child and gain custody.

Tests on blood and tissue samples taken from Arlena Twigg before she died showed she was not related to either parent, said their attorney, Marvin Elin of Baltimore.

The lawsuit filed in U.S. District Court in Tampa, Fla., names Hardee Memorial Hospital in Wauchula, Fla., three physicians and a nurse, charging them with fraud or negligence, or both.

A woman who answered the telephone Thursday at the Twiggs' home in Langhorne, Pa., referred calls to Elin.

"We're totally devastated," Mrs. Twigg told The (Baltimore) Sun. "Our lives have turned into a nightmare. We've not only lost our Arlena ... but also where is our own daughter? We're very much interested in tracking down our own child."

The suit said after the baby was born the Twiggs originally were told she was healthy, but three days later were told she had congenital heart disease that could eventually prove fatal.

They didn't suspect the swap until May, when a routine test showed that

Arlena, who was facing heart surgery, had a blood type of B-positive. The Twiggs said their baby had been born with a blood type of O-positive and they also both have type O blood.

On the basis of the differing blood types, Elin said, it would be all but impossible for Arlena to be their child. Additional tests on Arlena's tissues conducted in July concluded the same thing, he said.

The Twiggs never told Arlena, who died in August, of their doubts about her parentage, Elin said. The couple have seven other children.

Efforts to reach the defendants — Dr. Ernest Palmer, a family doctor; Dr. William D. Black, an obstetrician; Dr. Adley Z. Sedoras, a pediatrician; and Dena E. Spieth, a nurse — were

unsuccessful Thursday.

Palmer told the Sun, "I certainly wouldn't switch babies on anyone, but I guess you can be sued by anyone." Harold Connely, hospital administrator, said he had no knowledge of the suit and was surprised by the allegations.

The suit said the unknown adoptive parents wanted a healthy baby, but it gave no reason for why the medical personnel might have gotten involved in switching two babies. Elin said some defendants may have been only negligent, but that at least one of them must have deliberately switched the two babies' bracelets.

Elin said Mrs. Twigg recalled a nurse telling her after her baby's birth that another woman who had delivered the same day intended to give her child up for adoption. Those were the only two girl babies in the ward at the time, he said.

Mrs. Twigg said she told a nurse shortly before leaving the hospital that the child she was nursing did not look like the same baby she had nursed earlier in her stay. The nurse dismissed the notion, Mrs. Twigg said.

"These people want their daughter," Elin said. "This isn't a matter of parents who have relinquished their child and later changed their minds. This is a matter of fraud."

Elin on Thursday asked the FBI to look into the possibility of criminal charges in the case and turned over results of genetic fingerprinting, tests that showed Arlena was not the Twiggs' natural child.

# NASA shoots for September shuttle launch

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) —

Discovery's astronauts donned orange pressure suits and threw switches in a successful practice countdown Thursday and NASA officials said they hope to launch the first space shuttle since the Challenger tragedy this month.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration plans to announce a launch date Wednesday, after a two-day flight-readiness review. Officials have been discussing a date from Sept. 26 to 29.

"We clearly demonstrated that we're ready to pick up the count for real; I hope that we will be able to do that by the end of the month," Kennedy Space Center Director Forrest S. McCartney told the launch team after the test.

"It certainly sets the stage for what we're about ready to do here in just a few weeks," launch director Bob Sieck added.

"The enthusiasm around here is obvious," McCartney said. "It seems to me like we've finally got it put back together."

He referred to the long recovery, with its many setbacks and milestones, from the Challenger explosion that killed seven astronauts on Jan. 28, 1986.

Thursday's practice countdown was the last of those major milestones—and it was completed with only a few minor communications glitches.

It began Wednesday and the five-man Discovery crew boarded the shuttle Thursday to participate in the final two hours, throwing switches, testing communications and monitoring systems, just as they will on launch day.

The commander is Navy Capt. Rick Hauck. The pilot is Air Force Lt. Col. Dick Corey and the mission specialists are George Nelson, Mike Lounge and Marine Maj. David Hilmer. All have flown on shuttle missions.

For the test, they wore bright orange pressure suits, the first time a crew has not worn comfortable flight coveralls since the fifth shuttle mission in 1982.

The pressure garments, which all shuttle crews will wear on launch and reentry, would be needed in case of trouble during an emergency landing attempt, and the astronauts had to bail out by blowing an explosive hatch, sliding down a telescoping pole to avoid hitting the wing and parachuting to Earth.

This system has been added since the Challenger explosion. It would not help in a Challenger-type accident, in which the shuttle blew up 73 seconds after liftoff.

The communications problems, in ground control, delayed some practice countdown activities and the test ended 34 minutes late. A computer stopped the count at six seconds before a mock liftoff, just as it would if there were an engine problem on an actual launch, giving the launch team experience in handling such a situation.

# Campaigns agree to 2 debates for Bush, Dukakis

WASHINGTON (AP) — The presidential campaigns of George Bush and Michael Dukakis have tentatively agreed on Sept. 25 for the first debate between the two candidates, a Dukakis aide said Thursday.

Both debates will be general in subject matter, in contrast to four years ago when the first was on domestic policy and the second covered defense and foreign policy, said Mark Goodin, Bush's campaign spokesman.

Paul Brontaus, chairman of the Dukakis campaign, said the two contenders will face each other in a televised debate at Wake Forest University in Winston-Salem, N.C.

Brontaus said their second debate would be either on Oct. 3 or 4, depending on the length of the American League baseball playoff series which will be televised in prime time.

The debate between vice presidential candidates Dan Quayle and Lloyd Bentsen is expected to be during the week of Oct. 3.

The two campaigns have not reached agreement on the location for the second presidential debate, and the vice presidential encounter, he said.

"We are still discussing format, staging and the length of the debates and we will continue to carry on those discussions," Brontaus said after meeting with Bush's campaign chairman James A. Baker III. "We believe we made good progress. This will be an opportunity for the American people to see presidential candidates debating face-to-face and man-to-man."

The Dukakis campaign wanted at least one more debate with the first to be on foreign policy and national security issues, but that was rejected by the Bush campaign.

Brontaus and Baker emphasized that nothing is finally settled until they have agreed on all aspects of the debates.

On Tuesday, after weeks of negotiations, the Dukakis campaign said it was willing to accept the Bush campaign's offer of two presidential debates as well as one encounter between Quayle and Bentsen.

The first debate will be sponsored by the National Commission on Presidential Debates, a group headed by the chairmen of the Republican and Democratic parties. The commission also was likely to end up as sponsor of the vice presidential debate.

The League of Women Voters will sponsor the second presidential debate. League president Nancy Neuman said. The league is pleased that it's now official that the American public will see at least one non-partisan debate this fall.

She urged the campaigns to include the league in discussions on format. Last spring, the league suggested 90-minute debates with a single moderator rather than a panel of reporters such as used in past presidential debates.

Meanwhile, NBC News president Michael Gartner issued a statement saying the network would not be able to televise the first debate live because it would conflict with its commitment to cover the Olympic Games.

# U.S., Soviets schedule superpower talks

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States and the Soviet Union have scheduled high-level talks to survey prospects for improving superpower relations and promoting arms control measures during President Reagan's twilight months in office, sources said Thursday.

The talks will be held Sept. 22-23 in Washington between Secretary of State George P. Shultz and Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard A. Shevardnadze and focus on arms control negotiations and the Red Army's withdrawal from Afghanistan, three U.S. officials told The Associated Press.

Negotiators in Geneva are meeting on proposals to sharply reduce long-range nuclear weapons and to limit weapons tests. They are also trying to set up East-West talks on cutbacks in conventional forces in Europe.

After their session, U.S. and Soviet experts will

meet in Washington in a joint effort to slow the proliferation of ballistic missiles in the Middle East and other areas of the world.

On Afghanistan, the United States has expressed satisfaction with the pace of the withdrawal of Soviet troops but is concerned about the continuing conflict between the Afghan government and U.S.-backed rebels and its spillover in neighboring Pakistan.

Surveying other regional problems, Shultz intends to question Shevardnadze about prospects for the withdrawal of Vietnamese forces from Cambodia and to review U.S.-led diplomatic efforts to work out a settlement in Angola and to promote independence for Namibia.

Shultz and Shevardnadze last met in May in Geneva to iron out implementation of the U.S.-Soviet treaty banning intermediate-range nuclear

weapons and then assisted President Reagan and General Secretary Mikhail S. Gorbachev at the Moscow summit at the end of the month.

Their sessions over the years on arms control paved the way for the historic weapons-ban treaty and an overall improvement in U.S.-Soviet relations.

Still, the officials, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said there was no indication Reagan would hold a fifth and final summit with Gorbachev before leaving office next January. Also, differences over monitoring several types of strategic nuclear weapons apparently still stand in the way of a new treaty.

Shultz and Shevardnadze may continue their talks in New York the week of Sept. 26, when both plan to attend the special session of the U.N. General Assembly.

# U.S. visit to Soviet nuclear sites yields hope

WASHINGTON (AP) — A first-ever visit to the Soviet Union by the chairman of the Nuclear Regulatory Commission yielded agreements that will "pave the way for significant U.S.-Soviet cooperation on sensitive nuclear power issues, NRC officials said Thursday.

The Aug. 19-31 trip by a delegation headed by NRC Chairman Lando W. Zech Jr. included an inspection tour of the Chernobyl reactor that exploded and burned in April 1986, killing 31 people and forcing evacuation of a large surrounding area in the Ukraine.

The American group also visited nuclear plants at Novovoronezh and Rovno, as well as a reactor fabrication facility near Leningrad.

Talks held in Moscow by the delegation involved the first meeting of a new U.S.-Soviet Joint Coordinating Committee for Civilian Nuclear Reactor Safety.

"Our discussions were very candid, very open and I would say very productive," Zech told reporters.

While the Americans and Soviets discussed differences in the design, construction and operation of nuclear

plants, he said, "it was clear to me ... that we have much more in common than we do differences."

Zech said both sides agreed that "if there is to be any future for nuclear power, we certainly must keep the

current plants operating safely."

"We laid the groundwork for a very hopeful, very positive exchange in the future," he said.

James M. Taylor, the NRC's deputy executive director for operations, said the joint coordinating committee had agreed on a year-long series of meetings, seminars and exchanges in both countries, including an exchange of nuclear power plant safety inspec-

tors.

"We hope that the exchange of inspectors will take place during the summer months next year," Taylor said.

He said the program also would involve sharing of technical data with the Soviets in several areas of key interest to the United States, among them:

—Radiation-caused embrittlement of reactor components and full-scale annealing of reactor vessels.  
—Studies of health and environmental effects in the wake of the Chernobyl disaster. "It's very important information, to predict and to understand the effects of radiation on health and the environment," Taylor said.

—Erosion and corrosion of nuclear plant piping.

Zech said that while it was clear from the U.S. group's on-site visits that the Soviets have undertaken numerous safety modifications since Chernobyl, "we did not make any overall safety assessment of their plants."

At Chernobyl, the delegation was able to go inside one layer of the con-

crete tomb built around the crippled reactor, to see the control room and view the fire-wracked core through a periscope. Zech said they were the first non-Soviets to go inside the tomb.

At all three nuclear plant sites visited, Zech said, "it seemed to me that the senior managers we met ... were businesslike and were safety-minded."

Robert Newlin, an agency spokesman, said the trip marked the first visit to the Soviet Union by a chairman of the NRC, which was established in 1974 as successor to the Atomic Energy Commission.

# Tropical storm stalls in Gulf

MIAMI (AP) — Tropical Storm Florence remained stalled in the southern Gulf of Mexico on Thursday, and forecasters said high-level winds were preventing it from strengthening as much as expected.

At 10 a.m. MDT, the National Hurricane Center reported Florence had 55 mph winds as it drifted slowly northward about 155 miles north of the Yucatan Peninsula. The storm center was near latitude 23.2 north and longitude 89.5 west.

Forecaster Jim Gross said air currents high above Florence were blowing the top off its thunderstorms, keeping winds from intensifying to the 74 mph level that would classify it as a hurricane.

"Right now its maintaining the status quo," Gross said. He added that because of weak steering currents, it was impossible to predict where the storm was headed.

"We're still looking at a threat, but we don't know what direction it is going to take," Gross said.

# Group calls attention to adult illiteracy

WASHINGTON (AP) — A coalition of educators reported Thursday that as many as 23 million adult Americans are illiterate, and said the next president "must draw national attention to this crisis."

"This is a national disgrace," said Dale Johnson, vice president of the International Reading Association. "Millions of Americans are locked out of good jobs, community participation and the democratic process because they lack adequate reading and writing skills."

Johnson spoke at a press conference prior to the National Adult Literacy Symposium, co-sponsored by his association and the American Newspaper Publishers Association.

He called for increased federal funding for literacy programs, establishment of a semi-governmental institute to promote reading skills, and

encouragement for state and local programs.

"Literacy is probably America's most solvable problem," said Peter Waite, executive director of Lubach Literacy Action, one of the academic groups which backs the reading association.

The array of possible solutions was the focus of an afternoon symposium sponsored by the newspaper publishers on National Newspaper Literacy Day.

That session featured assessments of 10 literacy programs from across the nation, ranging from Time Inc.'s "Time to read" to the Federal Prison System's efforts to help inmates read and write.

Arthur Ochs Sulzberger, publisher of The New York Times and chairman of the publishers association, was to preside over the session in

the ANPA's magazine, Presstime, he wrote that "illiteracy is bad for our communities, our states and our nation. It separates people. It locks them into poverty. It leads to a higher crime rate. It weakens the economy. It holds all of us back."

The day-long literacy meetings also included announcements of awards to the Gannett Foundation, Scripps Howard Foundation, key leaders of those two organizations, and to the Literacy Plan of Argentina.

The Argentina program was honored by the International Reading Association.

Scripps Howard was cited by the newspaper publishers, who singled out for special mention Jay Ambrose, who introduced a community-wide literacy campaign while he was editor of the El Paso Herald-Post in Texas.

# Officer gave a warning to skipper of Vincennes

WASHINGTON (AP) — Three minutes before he ordered missiles fired at the Iranian plane approaching his ship July 3, the skipper of the USS Vincennes acknowledged "with a wave of his hand" an officer's warning that it might be a commercial airliner, Navy investigators told Congress on Thursday.

The warning was called out by one of the officers in the confused combat information center of the sophisticated warship, but "other factors" prompted Capt. Will C. Rogers to order two missiles fired at the jet in the mistaken belief that it was an F-14 fighter, according to Rear Adm. William M. Fogarty.

Iran Air Flight 655, an A-300 Airbus, was destroyed and all 290 people aboard were killed.

Fogarty told the Senate Armed Services Committee that an unidentified officer standing behind Rogers called out "possible comm air (commercial aircraft), and Rogers acknowledged the warning with "a wave of his hand."

But Fogarty said Rogers was swayed by factors including its take-off from a military-civilian airfield, its failure to respond to warnings from the Vincennes, and the mistaken belief that it was outside a commercial air corridor and descending in altitude.

# Airlines report better on-time records

WASHINGTON (AP) — Despite heavy summer travel, major U.S. airlines reported that 75 percent of every July flight arrived on time during July, the Transportation Department said Thursday.

Two carriers serving the Sun Belt — America West and Southwest Airlines — had the best on-time performance, with more than 91 percent of their flights arriving on time.

Pan American World Airways had the worst arrival record among the 13 airlines monitored, with only 69.8 percent of its July flights arriving

within 15 minutes of schedule, the government's on-time standard. Pan Am also had the highest consumer complaint rate during August, the latest month for which those statistics were provided.

Overall, 81.5 percent of the more than 441,000 flights during July arrived within 15 minutes of schedule, slightly fewer than the 84.3 percent during June.

The Transportation Department began monitoring airline arrival rates last September amid growing complaints about flight delays and

poor service. Since then, the carriers' on-time performance has improved, although some of that is believed to be attributed to good weather.

The figures do not include delays caused by mechanical problems; but do include those that are due to poor weather. Airlines that have a concentration of flights in the Southwest have consistently performed well.

Delta Air Lines, which earlier struggled in on-time performance among the 13 carriers, posted the third best arrival rate in July with 86.1 percent of its flights on time.

## South Korea improved on rights, group says

LONDON (AP) — South Korea has made significant improvements in human rights as it prepares to host the Olympics, but the government still holds 600 political prisoners and tortures some of them, Amnesty International said Thursday.

The human rights group said in a report that some political prisoners were jailed after unfair trials but that torture has decreased.

Government sensitivity to world attention during the Sept. 17 to Oct. 2 Olympics may help improve the situation, but the Games do not guarantee changes, a representative of the London-based group said.

"The limits of freedom of expression have expanded ... the atmosphere is remarkably more free than before," Amnesty International researcher Françoise Vandale said at a briefing on the report, entitled "Detention of Prisoners of Conscience and Torture Con-

tinued."

The report said South Korea should release more political prisoners, end torture and ill-treatment of detainees, and change laws to allow peaceful expression of opposition to the government.

Major political changes since last summer have ushered in some improvements in human rights, the report noted.

The government of President Roh Tae-woo came to power after Roh, then chairman of the governing party, pledged democratic reforms, including release of political prisoners, in response to violent demonstrations in June 1987.

National Assembly elections in April gave the opposition a majority, a startling change for a country long ruled by a party with almost complete power.

The assembly is debating several changes in laws on national security and demonstrations.

## North Korean president calls for reunification

PYONGYANG, North Korea — North Korean President Kim Il Sung called here Thursday for the peaceful reunification of the Korean peninsula into a federal republic preserving the two Koreas' rival political and economic systems.

The 76-year-old leader said he would welcome a North-South summit in Pyongyang to discuss reunification on a confederal basis or the establishment of an inter-Korean committee to that end.

Kim made the proposal at a rally in a sports hall here on the eve of the 40th anniversary of the founding of the communist North and nine days before the capital, South hosts the Olympic Games.

He said the North and South should work toward the establishment of an inter-Korean committee

to seek reunification on a confederal basis allowing the North and South to retain their political and economic systems.

"The realistic method of settling the question of national reunification ... is to establish the Democratic Confederal Republic of Korea," Kim told some 20,000 cheering Koreans and members of delegations from 130 countries.

The proposed Korean confederal republic, first suggested by Kim in 1980, would have two autonomous states under a unified government, allowing the North and South to retain their systems.

Kim said South Korean leaders would be welcome here if they came with a sincere wish for reunification, which could be achieved only after the withdrawal of U.S. forces from South Korea and the signing of an inter-Korean non-aggression pact.

## Soviet commander admits fault in flight

MOSCOW (AP) — The commander of a Soviet space mission that nearly became marooned in space admitted Thursday he erred by improperly restarting a braking rocket during a failed landing maneuver.

Vietnam astronaut Vladimir Lyakhov and crewmate Abdul Abad Mohmand, the first Afghan in space, managed to land their Soyuz TM-5 capsule safely in Soviet Central Asia on Wednesday after 26 hours stranded in orbit.

Lyakhov told Soviet and Afghan journalists at Baikonur Space Center that it would be wrong to jump to conclusions on the cause for the problems that plagued the space mission and forced the landing to be postponed from Tuesday.

But Lyakhov added: "Errors were made by the

commander. I want to say there is fault."

His remarks were broadcast on the evening television news.

The government newspaper Izvestia had suggested Lyakhov should have taken manual control over recovery from a computer malfunctioning during the second of two landing attempts Tuesday.

Lyakhov, in remarks at the Baikonur news conference carried by the official news agency Tass, said an infrared sensor in the Soyuz guidance system malfunctioned during the first attempt to fire an engine that brakes the capsule so it can safely pass through the atmosphere.

"The computer was unable to judge whether the spacecraft was correctly oriented, and the engine was shut off," the cosmonaut said.

A second attempt was made later. The braking engine fired under automatic control but shut off. When the engine switched off for the second time, Lyakhov said, "I very much wanted to start the landing and I turned it on for a second time. Of course, in the back of my mind, I realized that turning on the engine would cause complications. I am not excusing myself. There was fault there."

The landing was put off until Wednesday.

Shortly after landing, Lyakhov said he and Mohmand had wanted to make a third attempt at landing Tuesday, but that the craft might have touched down outside Soviet territory. He said the crew preferred to wait until landing could be assured in its designated spot, in the Soviet republic of Kazakhstan.

## Brezhnev's son-in-law pleads guilty to abusing Soviet office

MOSCOW (AP) — Leonid Brezhnev's son-in-law pleaded guilty Thursday to abusing his office when he was deputy interior minister but told a military court he did not take bribes, a crime punishable by death.

On the fourth day of a trial so far devoted almost entirely to reading of 1,500 pages of corruption charges against Yuri Churbanov and eight co-defendants, Judge Mikhail Marov asked Churbanov if he understood the charges.

"Yes, they were understood," Churbanov replied, standing before the court. "I admit my guilt in receiving bribes."

Churbanov was accused of accepting cash, wines, cognac, exotic fruits and other gifts worth more than \$1

million while he was first deputy interior minister under Brezhnev, the Soviet leader from 1964 until his death in 1982.

Prosecutors contended the web of corruption stretched all the way to Churbanov's boss, the late Nikolai A. Shchelokov, who was a close friend of Brezhnev.

Court records confirmed earlier reports that Shchelokov committed suicide after investigators began examining his conduct as interior minister.

Under Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev, Brezhnev's years in power are now condemned officially as "years of stagnation" in which the economy slumped, mistakes were made in foreign policy, and corruption and cronyism prevailed.

## 1 million Burmese demonstrate

RANGOON, Burma (AP) — About 1 million people, including Catholics, intelligence officers and the blind, took to the streets Thursday to demand democracy and vigilantes beheaded three people who tried to poison protesters.

The state radio said security forces fired on a crowd of 500 looters in the suburbs of the capital, wounding 17. The radio also said seven corpses with stab wounds were found floating in Rangoon's Inya Lake.

A general strike closed the airport, protesting the United States and other embassies from evacuating diplomats' families.

A sea of people surged through the city. The demonstrators want to bring down the government of President Maung Maung and end 26 years

of one-party authoritarian rule.

More demonstrations were planned Friday, with some opposition groups hoping the strike could be sustained until the government gives into demands for a multi-party democracy. A newly formed union of bank employees said all Rangoon banks would be shut down Friday.

More than half a dozen embassies, including the British, planned to evacuate dependents as soon as possible. Diplomats said Japan, the Soviet Union and China sent out dependents and aid experts earlier.

Evacuations of foreign nationals were delayed because the strike at Rangoon Airport forced cancellation of all flights to Bangkok, Thailand. The American Embassy planned to start evacuating its 100 dependents.

## Pope to avoid South Africa on trip

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Pope John Paul II's latest trip to southern Africa will take him to an impoverished region of refugees and rebels, but he will pointedly avoid segregated South Africa, the region's economic powerhouse.

The pope leaves Saturday on his fourth trip to Africa and his 39th abroad. He will go to Zimbabwe, Botswana, Lesotho, Swaziland and Mozambique, countries that vehemently oppose South Africa but depend on it for economic survival.

South Africa dominates communications, trade, transportation and politics in southern Africa and its influence will be felt strongly during

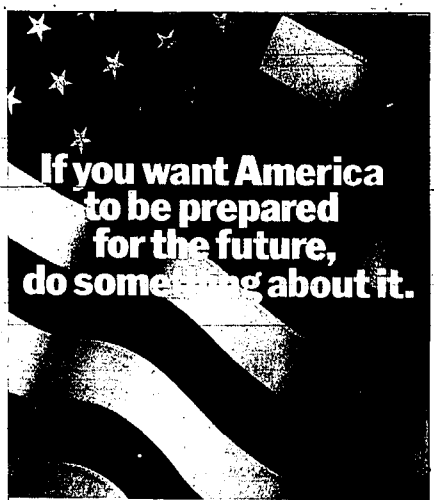
the pope's 10-day trip.

South African firms are supplying such items as transportation, food, water and health services, broadcasting and emergency equipment and even paper souveniers to be used on many of the pope's stops.

John Paul, 68, has been critical of South African apartheid throughout his nearly 10-year-long pontificate.

South Africa's 26 million blacks have no vote in national affairs. The 5 million whites control the economy and maintain separate districts.

Vatican spokesman — Joaquim Navarro said the pope has not refused to visit South Africa and he may visit in the future.

## Flood aid distribution slow in Bangladesh

DHAKA, Bangladesh (AP) — River levels were stable or receding Thursday and the Dhaka airport reopened so relief supplies can be flown in, but distribution of aid to flood victims was slow and the death toll continued climbing.

The government said 609 people have died in floods that began with the annual monsoon season in June, tapered off, then resumed in devastating fashion Aug. 27. Daily tallies by Dhaka newspapers total more than 1,300, which is considered more accurate.

Information Minister Mahbub Rahman said Thursday 510 people drowned, died of snake bites or were killed when their houses collapsed. The government health center reported 99 deaths from diarrhea caused by drinking polluted water that flooded three-quarters of the country's 55,000 square miles.

Health officials reported 135,577 known cases of diarrhea nationwide, an increase of 15,715 in the previous 24 hours, but that includes only areas in communication with Dhaka.

Officials say about one-quarter of

Bangladesh's 110,000 million people are homeless.

Many still are stranded on rooftops, in boats and on the rare patches of high ground in Bangladesh, most of which is a vast river delta. Water levels in flood areas range from a few inches to more than 10 feet.

More than two dozen people interviewed at random Thursday in relief camps, flooded buildings and on rooftops in Dhaka said they had no

purification tablets and were drinking water that could be dangerous.

"Most of us have fevers and headaches," said Lily, a 17-year-old seamstress camping at the Fair Fashion company factory with 10 co-workers. She said they paid 31 cents a day for five gallons of tap water.

Lily and co-worker 20-year-old Shamima, said they had heard of water purification tablets, but Lily said "No one has given us any and we don't have enough money to buy any."

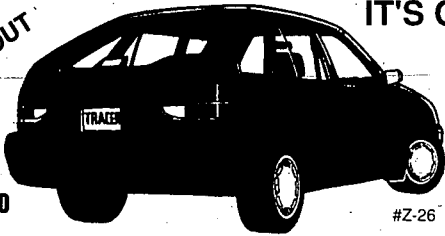

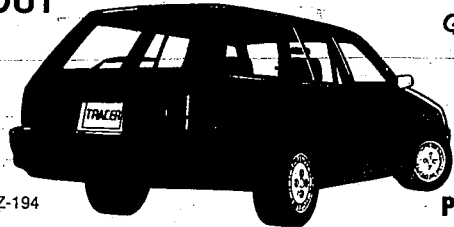

# Magic Mountain to open again after 2 years

TWIN FALLS — The Magic Mountain ski area, closed for the past two ski seasons, will reopen this winter under new management.

"All systems are go," Marty Jacobs of Kimberly said Thursday evening, minutes after receiving Forest Service approval to take over the dormant operation.

Jacobs, 32, a longtime ski area employee, said he and his wife, Sherrie, are negotiating to purchase the ski area's lodge and equipment from a partnership that recently repossessed the facilities.

Jacobs, jubilant over the news, predicted good times for skiers.

"We're gonna get lots of things going for them — we hope," he said.

To take over the ski area, the couple must purchase the physical facilities from the current owners as well as obtain a Forest Service permit to use the federal land on which the ski area lies.

The current owners are four partners who repossessed the property a month ago from the ski area's most recent operators, who had not opened it for the past two winters.

One of the four partners, Stan Detweiler of Twin Falls, expressed enthusiasm about Jacobs' venture.

"He knows the hill and he knows what it needs and he knows what its capacities are," Detweiler said.

Jacobs said he has worked at the ski area for about a decade, most recently as hill manager, in charge of maintaining the slopes and chair lifts and grooming the ski runs.

He and his wife plan to operate the ski area with about seven employees and "a lot of family support," he said. Several family members will help run the ski area, he said.

Jacobs said they are negotiating with Detweiler and his partners to purchase the lodge, the lifts and other equipment and supplies. The purchase price is unsettled, he said.

The popular Magic Mountain resort, on Rock Creek Road in the South Hills, was developed in the 1940s. Detweiler said he and his partners operated it for four years before selling it in about 1980 to another party, who in turn sold it to Gary Nebeker, Tim Howard and the late Ken Lee.

Nebeker, Howard and Lee were "not not able to fulfill the obligations of their permit," said Terry Fletcher, recreation specialist with the Forest Service. He would give no further details. Nebeker and Howard were unavailable for comment.

Jacobs said he already has begun cleanup and repair work at the resort. Before opening for business, the new owners must get the slopes into proper condition and make sure the lifts meet safety standards, he said.

Jacobs was told of the Forest Service's decision in a telephone call early Thursday evening and he said he was to meet with officials later that night to go over paperwork. Donald Oman, district ranger for the Twin Falls Ranger District, confirmed that the permit had been approved.

Other local ski areas operating on Forest Service permits, including Fomerle, Soldier Mountain and Sun Valley's Bald Mountain, still have valid permits, Fletcher said.

### Safety personnel are on alert at fair

FILER — The hustle and bustle of the Twin Falls County Fair and Rodeo inevitably creates a few bumps and bruises. That is when deputies and policemen, firemen and medical personnel step in.

The Twin Falls County Sheriff's Department, Filer City Police, the American Red Cross, Filer Fire Department and the Filer Quick Response Unit are all stationed throughout the grounds to help fair goers.

"It's our job to keep the peace and to make it a family affair," said Twin Falls County Sheriff Jim Munn.

Munn's department is coordinating about 35 officers this year, including deputies, reserve deputies and officers from other agencies, working to insure safety. They cover incidents ranging from routine thefts to lost children.

"Missing children consume most of our time. But we've never left anyone," Munn said. Identification tags for children are available at the police building north of the rodeo stadium to help children be reunited with their parents.

"The enormous crowds in such a small space present a problem," Munn said, but added that the fair sees relatively little crime and that crowd control occupies most of the department's time.

In addition to police affairs, other incidents arise that need immediate attention. The Sawtooth Chapter of the Red Cross has three first aid stations at the fair this year. Two permanent units are located at the 4-H Beef Barn and at the rodeo grandstands. The third unit is a trailer within the carnival area.

Nurses and volunteer first aid help will be on duty as long as people remain on the grounds. Last year, volunteers put in about 100 hours a week, Hammond said, adding she likes the assignment. "I like being out there," she said. "I can meet people I don't otherwise meet."

As many as 600 people have

In Twin Falls, the post office will be open from 7:30 a.m. to 6 p.m., Monday through Friday, and a contract station at the corner of Filer Avenue and Fillmore Street will be open Saturdays from 9:00 a.m. to noon.

Jerome's hours will be 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday, and 9:30 to 11:30 a.m. on Saturdays.

Kimberly's office will be open from 9 a.m. to 5:15 p.m., Monday through Friday.

Hansen's hours will be 8:30 a.m. to noon and 1 p.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday.

In Buhl, Wendell and Gooding, weekday hours will be from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Buhl's post office is not open on Saturdays. Wendell has Saturday hours from 9:30 to 10:30 and Gooding from 9:30 to 11:30.

### Jerome gets ready early for Christmas

JEROME — The Jerome City Council already was thinking about Christmas at Tuesday's meeting — to the tune of \$3,850.

In other action, the council discussed a couple of matters concerning the industrial park and voted to pay Union Pacific Railroad \$47,882 to build a spur into the park.

The council discussed purchasing new Christmas decorations for the downtown area. Council members unanimously approved the purchase of at least 10 four-foot lanterns that are mounted on poles. The cost will be \$3,850, or possibly \$3,273, because of a 15 percent discount for early orders.

Council members were asked by the Chamber of Commerce a few weeks ago to contribute to the project. Councilman Gerald Ostler then met with a representative from the Valley Decorating Co. and discussed decorations and costs.

Ostler said that the city probably would receive a 15 percent discount on the \$3,850 cost if it places an order by mid-September.

Councilmen Nathan Brooks and Rocky Jackson said the city should contribute to the project. "I think we can find that \$3,850 somewhere in the budget," City Clerk-Treasurer Marilyn Breggs said.

Brooks noted it would be good for the Chamber and other businesses and organizations to pay for some additional decorations once the initial group is purchased. "A few weeks down the road, if an organization wants to kick in another \$1,000, we could order more pole mounts," Ostler said.

Representatives from the Chamber attending the meeting agreed with the plan. They indicated that area merchants would be enthused about decorating their store fronts and said the Chamber might sponsor a Christmas lighting contest for residents.

Before the council voted, First Chief Jim Auslaire asked who would be responsible for maintaining the new lights. The general feeling was that the Chamber has bought all replacement bulbs and employed any necessary maintenance help in the past and would be willing to continue to do so.

In other action, the council heard reports of progress on Jerome's South Lincoln Industrial Park, now under construction. Public Works Director Lanny Sloan reported that construction on roadways for the park began earlier in the day.

The council approved paying a \$47,882 installation fee to Union Pacific Railroad Co. for installing 140 feet of rail and switching equipment into the industrial park. The money will come from bond grant funds the city received for the project.

The railroad company has agreed to give the Jerome Development Corp., developer of the project, \$30 for every \$500 profit the company makes during the next five years, Sloan said. The city may reinvest that money, he said.

Sloan also said the Bridon West Corderage Co., whose facility currently is being constructed at the park, should do enough business to guarantee some financial return of the Union Pacific money. "They should ship as much as Tupperware did," he said, referring to the factory that has been phasing its business down in recent months and is expected to shut completely Sept. 16.

Sloan said that Union Pacific has the option of closing down its rail line at its discretion. "They say they are

### Filer man leaves on 2nd Soviet trip

FILER — George Anthony of Filer will leave Saturday on his second trip in the last 13 months to the Soviet Union in hopes of setting up an exchange program for Filer High School students and their counterparts in the Soviet republic of Georgia.

Anthony, whose interest in the Soviet Union began in the early 1980s as a college student, said the time is ripe for such a program.

"Just in the past four years, their society has opened up considerably and we don't know how long this access to them will last, so we need to take advantage of the opportunity," he said.

Anthony will try to set up the program while attending a conference on U.S.-Soviet relations sponsored by the Chautauqua Institution, a center for arts, education, religion and recreation near Buffalo, N.Y.

To try to set up the program, he said he may have to take time away from the conference, which runs Sept. 19-23.

Anthony said he has a list of contacts he made during his first trip in October 1987. Also, top Soviet officials who could help with the program are scheduled to attend the conference, Anthony said.

He said he is not intimidated by the layers of bureaucracy he might encounter in trying to set up the program. "I will find the right person by just going through the process of talking with people and following their leads," Anthony said.

This trip will be a fact-finding mission. He said he'll have to wait until he talks with people there to know if an exchange program is possible. One possibility is plugging into an existing program, he said.

The Filer School Board last month told Anthony it is interested in participating in a program.

The Chautauqua conference will be in Georgia, in southwest Soviet Union. In contrast to Idaho, the mountains are higher and the plains

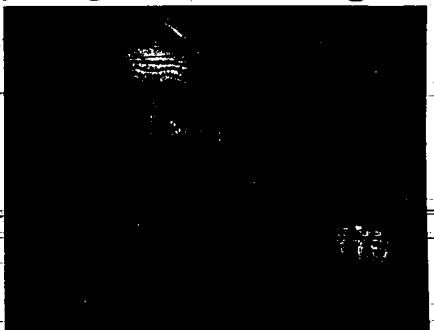

But Stallings, in a telephone interview, called Watkins' statement "nonsense."

"First of all, the study has not even been considered," Stallings said.

# Golden Rule argument OK, state court rules

BOISE (AP) — Use of the "golden rule" argument in jury trials is proper, the Idaho Supreme Court says, but not when it is used to encourage a jury to award more damages.

The court on Thursday unanimously upheld a 5th District Court jury decision and associated rulings by District Judge Ronald Bruce in a personal injury lawsuit brought by the survivors of Ed Lopez in a Cassia County case.

Jeffrey Langer was the driver of a car which struck and killed Eda Lopez, in 1981. In trial of a lawsuit that followed, the jury ruled Langer's father, Frank Langer, was not responsible for the accident, even though title of the vehicle was in his name.

The Supreme Court upheld Bruce's jury instructions on ownership of the vehicle, saying that Frank Langer

had no control or responsibility for the vehicle.

The Lopez appeal centered on a defense argument to the jury to find that Frank Langer acted reasonably when he signed over title to the car to Jeffrey, even though the title never was formally transferred.

The defense contended that was a "golden rule" argument, uniformly prohibited when it is used to inflame the jury and encourage the damage award.

It may be used by the defense to ask the jury to assess the reasonableness of a defendant's action, the Supreme Court said.

When such arguments merely appeal, in a moderate manner, to the jury's common sense by asking them to decide the reasonableness of a defendant's action, they will be allowed, the court said.

mission's minimum stream-flow recommendation at Milner Dam. Traditionally, Milner doesn't release water during irrigation season, a position recognized in the state's water plan.

Your water rights are being jeopardized," Watkins told the Optimists. "The first thing I'm going to do is repeal that language."

Watkins also accused Stallings of dodging debates and voting for higher taxes. Stallings said Watkins distorted his record on all those issues.

The Twin Falls Canal Co. has proposed a hydroelectric project at Milner Dam, mostly to finance construction of a replacement for the aging structure. FERC recommended a variety of minimum stream flows last year.

But the canal company, contesting those flows, persuaded FERC to hold new hearings in August. Manager Jack Eakin said FERC apparently ignored the state water plan when it recommended the minimum stream flows.

"I would guess that that was probably done without anybody hearing of Richard Stallings," Eakin said.

"That's kind of grasping, saying they listened to Stallings and that's why they put those things in there."

Meanwhile, Stallings said he's planning to help the canal company sell its project.

"I understand FERC is giving them some problems," Stallings said, "and I'm certainly going to write a very strong letter to FERC."

The two candidates have agreed on an Oct. 17 debate at Idaho State University. Watkins says he wants more.

"I've asked Stallings to meet me at any county courthouse," he said. "But Stallings said he's got five more weeks of work in Washington, D.C., before he can start campaigning, leaving three or four weeks, much of which is already committed, Stallings said."

"And frankly, I'm not sure what we'd debate at this point," Stallings added. "He has not argued about my agricultural policy, although he's said a couple times the federal government should get out of agriculture."

Watkins also challenged Stallings' vote on last year's federal government appropriations bill, which raised \$28

# Meese given Constitution award

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Former U.S. Attorney General Edwin Meese, whose financial dealings have come under scrutiny by government investigators, has been chosen the recipient of the "Defender of the Constitution" award presented by a Utah-based conservative group.

The National Center for Constitutional Studies, formerly the Freeman Institute, will give Meese the award at a \$125-a-plate dinner at the Salt Palace Sept. 17, said spokesman Glen Willardson.

Meese, who resigned earlier this summer, has come under government investigation concerning his

personal finances and other issues over the past five years. He was first investigated as a White House counselor in 1983.

However, Willardson said the organization feels good about selecting Meese, despite his legal troubles.

"He's been under fire recently, but he's done a lot of good over the past seven years in Washington," Willardson said. "He did have his critics, but many of them were mud-balls."

Scott Matheson Jr., a law professor at the University of Utah specializing in constitutional law, ques-

tioned the selection of Meese for the award.

"Any organization has the right to decide who receives its awards, but if I were giving it, I don't think I'd give it to Ed Meese," Matheson, the son of former Gov. Scott Matheson Sr., said Thursday. "I don't see the evidence that he fulfills the purpose of the award, which is to preserve the tenets of the Constitution."

The National Center was founded in 1971 as the Freeman Institute by Glenn Skousen, a former Brigham Young University and Salt Lake City police chief. Its stated purpose was to "save the U.S. Constitution

from socialism."

Its name was changed in 1984, but Skousen, 75 — a former aide to FBI Chief J. Edgar Hoover in the 1950s — still is chairman of the board.

"We picked Ed Meese because he did what he said he was going to do," Willardson said. "He left his mark on the legal system, on court reform, and his mark is a good one that will last a long time."

Willardson said the center expects about 800 people for the dinner and the same number for a \$10-a-plate prayer breakfast earlier. Actor-Golddon Jump is scheduled to appear at the breakfast.

# Leavitt attorney claims errors warrant repeal

POCATELLO (AP) — Errors by prosecutors and the trial judge warrant the Idaho Supreme Court striking down the 1985 first-degree murder conviction and death sentence of Richard Leavitt in the mutilation slaying of Danette Elg, a defense attorney says.

Bingham County Public Defender David Parmenter argued before the high court Wednesday in Pocatello that some blood sample evidence in Leavitt's case was not preserved by the state so the defense could test it.

Parmenter also argued that the trial judge, 7th District Judge H. Reynold George, improperly refused to allow some testimony favorable to Leavitt late in the trial, the prosecution failing to disclose some evidence favoring Leavitt, and George failed to

consider all mitigating factors in sentencing.

Leavitt, 29, was convicted of stabbing Ms. Elg to death in July 1984 at the woman's Blackfoot home. She was stabbed repeatedly and her reproductive organs removed through a hole cut in her lower back.

Parmenter did not represent Leavitt at the trial, but is handling

the appeals. Leavitt, who is on death row in the Idaho State Penitentiary, was not present at the proceedings.

Idaho Solicitor General Lynn Thomas argued Wednesday that some DNA blood sample evidence was sent to a forensic expert hired by the defense and that many other samples were too small to test or were totally destroyed in the initial test at state laboratories.

# Audit question goes to court

POCATELLO (AP) — The question of whether Idaho Bank and Trust Co. can sue a Utah firm for its financial audit statements of a failed bank has been taken under advisement by the Idaho Supreme Court.

KMG Main Hurdum and First Bancorp of Idaho, the former holding company of the defunct First Bank and Trust in Malad, are co-defendants in the case.

Two years ago, IB&T sued KMG Main Hurdum, contending the financial audits performed on First Bank and Trust caused it to lose money when it was unable to recover the majority of a \$848,000 loan made to First Bancorp five years ago.

The audits were the basis for IB&T approving the loan to enable the holding company to buy out minority stockholders.

been treated in one week; Red Cross officials said. Common problems are blisters, stomach aches, heat exhaustion, abrasions, road accidents and heart problems.

Less common, but more interesting, are the knife and gun wounds. "People got gun wounds when passing behind poorly protected shooting booths," Irene Basom, of the Red Cross, explained.

Hammond said he believes the

booths see less injuries every year. "I think people are becoming more safety conscious," he said.

For more serious injuries, the Rider Quick Response Unit is on hand to stabilize patients until ambulances from the Twin Falls hospital arrive.

"It's just fun helping people. And when people do get injured, it's nice to know you can be there to help them," Dave Nunez, president of Filer's QRU, said.

A unit also is available with a doc-

tor during all events at the rodeo arena. If a fire danger is also present, Filer Fire Department volunteers accompany the QRU's watch. Bruised ribs are the most common injury seen by the crew, but heat exhaustion, fights and animal bites are also covered.

Medical information will be available at the Red Cross booths on the more common medical problems and other possible problems. Red Cross chief Bill Chigrow said.

are lower," Anthony said. "It is one-third the size of Idaho, has a 5,000 year history, has much more rainfall and five times the population. The climate is Mediterranean, they do use some irrigation, raise some cattle, hay and citrus fruit."

A better spot for an exchange program might be from north of Georgia, between the Don and Volga rivers where the climate is more like that of Magic Valley.

"For Anthony, interest in the Soviet Union began early.

"After serving in the Air Force, and while attending college, I became interested in Russian literature and music and studied the language for two years. I became aware of a continuing factor, that being the existence of an aggressive nature of the USSR, and if we have to live with them, we'd better know as much as

we can about them," Anthony said.

He attended his first Chautauqua conference on U.S.-Soviet relations in August 1987 at the facilities in New York. Those attending included 240 Soviet leaders, entertainers and citizens.

The conference included some frank discussions about Soviet and American world policies, Anthony said.

Anthony's first trip to the Soviet Union was in October 1987, after he read about USSR-USA Bridges to Peace, an organization based on Vermont which fosters understanding between the two countries. "After reading about some of the changes that seemed to be occurring in the Soviet Union, I decided to take a look for myself," Anthony said.

The group tour lasted for a week, and Anthony arranged to stay an additional week. It was then he made

many of his preliminary contacts for this trip and an exchange program.

Shortly after he found about the Bridges to Peace group, a friend told him about the Chautauqua organization and some of the activities the group has sponsored to further U.S.-Soviet relations.

Chautauqua was founded in 1974 by a Methodist-Episcopal Bishop, as a summer school for Sunday school teachers. The school, located about 60 miles west of Buffalo, N.Y., became so successful that it became institutionalized.

In its first years, it expanded considerably to include cultural offerings and actually became the pioneer for what would later become adult education: The Chautauqua did not restrict itself to its original location, but came a "traveling cultural tent show," Anthony said.

not going to," he said. "But they will not put that in writing."

# Montanans save town from fire

POLEBRIDGE, Mont. (AP) — When Buck Kates saw the flames of a raging forest fire raining down on this remote northwestern Montana town Wednesday night, he thought it was all over.

But when the wind-driven flames had passed, the town's only businesses were still standing, thanks to Kates and others who braved a wall of fire to hose down the buildings.

"The way the fire was burning and the way it came over those trees, I didn't expect anything to be here," he said Thursday. "It looked like it was raining embers all over those trees. It hit and just bounced and the whole works went up."

The town of Polebridge, tucked into the forest on the west edge of Glacier National Park, has a general store — listed on the National Register of Historic Places — as well as a bar, restaurant and a dozen accompanying buildings.

Area residents were told Wednesday to evacuate as the Red Bench fire bore down on the tiny community.

But Kates and several others armed with a tanker truck stayed behind to save Polebridge while the fire devastated the surrounding forest and countryside.

"I seen what they were doing and I figured, hell, if they're going to stay, I will, too," he said. "You're too busy to get scared. I think everyone was a little bit paranoid about it."

Kates said the crew made two-mile runs to Hay Creek, filled the truck with water and then drove back to hose down the buildings. They didn't stop until their path to the creek was blocked by flames.

The historic Polebridge Mercantile was saved, as was the Great Northern Saloon and restaurant.

The 14,000-acre fire was burning Thursday in Glacier National Park, having jumped the North Fork of the Flathead River on Wednesday.

Dozens of cabins, homes and ranch buildings were destroyed north of Polebridge, authorities said.

The fire destroyed 10 buildings at

the Polebridge Ranger Station in the park, including a cache of firefighting supplies.

It also destroyed a bridge south of Polebridge, forcing firefighters to wade across the river. Firefighting equipment had to be taken across a bridge 20 miles to the south and driven up a dirt road.

# Polygamist clan's lawyer requests change of venue

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Three members of a polygamist clan charged with second-degree murder should not be tried in Summit County where a state corrections officer died in a January shootout and perhaps not in Utah at all, defense attorneys say.

Addam Swapp, Jonathan Swapp and John Timothy Singer were charged Wednesday in the Jan. 28 death of Lt. Fred House, who was killed during an exchange of gunfire that also wounded Addam Swapp.

The shootout ended a 13-day standoff at the clan's northern Utah farm. The Singer and Swapp families took refuge in the rural compound on Jan. 16, after the bombing of a Mormon chapel in nearby Marion.

Grant W.P. Morrison, who represented Addam Swapp in his recent federal trial on bomb and firearms charges, said that, assuming he is appointed to represent Swapp in state murder trial, he will ask for a change of venue.

Morrison said the change of venue would be requested because Addam Swapp "can't get a fair trial in Summit County or Wasatch County or any of the

neighboring counties up there."

People in those areas are "too close to the events," he said.

Defense lawyers also may consider asking to remove the trial from the state of Utah, Morrison said.

He said he planned to speak soon to Addam Swapp to see what he thinks about it.

Savage said the notoriety of the recent federal trial may make a change of venue more likely.

"We drew a very, very large jury panel in the federal case, from all over the state of Utah," he said. "Over half of those individuals were excluded immediately."

In Summit County, which was "more dramatically impacted by this entire episode," it's likely that the court would run into problems with the massive pre-trial publicity, Savage said.

Meantime, Summit County Attorney Bob Atkins said Wednesday he will drop three bombing-related state felony charges filed in January against Addam Swapp and Vickie Singer.

# First lady dedicates Phoenix lab

PHOENIX (AP) — A tearful Nancy Reagan dedicated a medical research laboratory Thursday in the name of her late parents, Dr. Loyal and Edith Davis.

The first lady cut a ribbon to dedicate the Dr. Loyal and Edith Davis Neurosurgical Research Laboratory in the basement of the Barrow Neurological Institute of St. Joseph's Hospital.

Later, at a luncheon in honor of the dedication, Mrs. Reagan choked up as she told the audience, "I hope that your research will contribute to the health and happiness of your patients and that would make my father and my mother very happy."

The Davises retired to Phoenix after Dr. Loyal Davis retired from his Chicago neurosurgical practice. Mrs. Reagan's adoptive father briefly

headed the Barrow institute during 1965 and 1966 while its director was ill.

"I can't believe the progress that's been made, the steps that have been made" since she used to watch her father's operations in Chicago, Mrs. Reagan said.

Also speaking at the luncheon was former Sen. Barry Goldwater, who called Davis "one of the greatest neurosurgeons, I guess, in this century in this country."

Goldwater said the research lab was "one of the greatest things that's ever happened to the U.S., not just

Arizona... People are coming from all over America to get their brains taken care of."

The five-year-old neurosurgical research lab was expanded and upgraded at a cost of \$60,000 to allow basic research to be performed.

She noted that the Barrow institute founder, Dr. John Gigen, and current Director Dr. Robert Spetzler had been her father's students at Northwestern University.

Davis died in Phoenix on Aug. 19, 1982, and Mrs. Davis died in Phoenix on Oct. 26, 1987.

# EG&G Idaho should have to arbitrate grievances, attorney tells state court

POCATELLO (AP) — EG&G Idaho Inc., a major contractor at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory, should be required to arbitrate grievances filed by its union workers, a labor attorney says.

Karen Yablonski-Toll of Denver, representing the Oil, Chemical and Atomic Workers Union Local 2-652, urged the Idaho Supreme Court in Pocatello Thursday to overturn a decision against the local by 7th District Judge H. Reynold George.

Ms. Yablonski-Toll argued that EG&G violated its labor agreement by assigning work to subcontractors under the guise of the Davis-Bacon

Act when the work could have been done by its own union employees.

The question now, she said, is whether OCAW's grievance should be decided by an arbitrator or a district court.

The union's original complaint, filed in July 1986, contends that work determined to be construction comes under the Davis-Bacon Act and must be subcontracted. EG&G makes an initial determination about the type of work and the final decision is up to the U.S. Department of Energy.

Joseph Burgess of Idaho Falls, representing EG&G, said the company

could not deal with the union's grievances because DOE ultimately decided which jobs should be contracted.

# Official says Coeur d'Alene should make own water plan

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — Local officials and residents, not regulators from Boise, should devise guidelines for protecting northern Idaho's Rathdrum Aquifer, an environmental official told legislators meeting in Coeur d'Alene.

Locally drafted plans could be reviewed by state officials to ensure they are compatible with similar plans over other parts of the aquifer, Ken Lustig, the Panhandle Health

District's environmental health director, said Thursday.

Lustig testified before the Legislative Council Committee on Ground Water Quality, an interim panel appointed by the 1988 Legislature.

Legislators are hearing testimony on recommendations on what legislation it should draft to protect the state's aquifers.

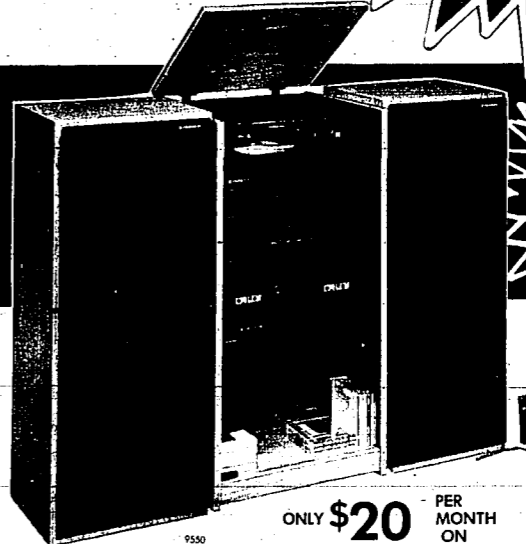

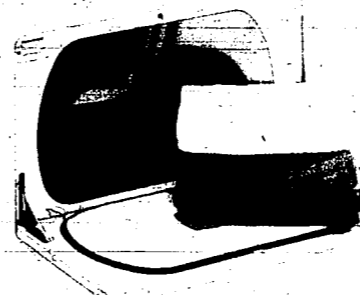

## BYU takes 47-6 ride over Texas

**PROVO, Utah (AP)** — Sean Covey passed for 323 yards and two touchdowns as Brigham Young ran away from No. 19 Texas 47-6 Thursday night, handing the Longhorns their third straight season-opening loss. Covey, playing without tailback Eric Metcalf, who sat out a one-game suspension mandated by the NCAA, was held to just two field goals.

Texas ran five plays inside the BYU 10-yard line late in the third quarter when the Longhorns trailed 20-6. But the ball went over to BYU after Scott Peterson knuckled down a fourth-down pass in the end zone.

BYU, which lost to Wyoming 24-14 last week, got scoring passes of 80 and 52 yards from Covey.

The Cougars also got a 70-yard interception return for a touchdown by Rodney Rice in the third quarter, a 20-yard scoring run by Fred Whittingham, a 20-yard scoring pass from backup quarterback Ty Detmer, a 17-yard scoring run by Eric Mortensen in the fourth quarter and field goals of 31 and 51 yards by Earl Kaufman.

Covey, a junior, gave the Cougars a 7-0 lead on their first snap from scrimmage when he found freshman wide receiver Bryce Doman all alone at midfield. From there, Doman scampered unscathed into the end zone to cap the Cougars' 11-second possession.

Covey also connected with Chuck Cutler on a 52-yard scoring pass in the second quarter. Cutler caught the ball on the right sideline and sidestepped defensive backs Stanley Richard and Fred Stomile before cutting left and racing for the end zone.

Cutler also scored on a pass from Detmer in the fourth quarter.

The Cougars allowed eight quarterback sacks last week, including one that gave resulted in a concussion for Covey, forcing him to the sidelines for half the game.

Thursday's other victor was Marlene Eddleman, currently second on the circuit. Eddleman ran a right and two lefts through the barrels nipping No. 6 Rachel Myllmaki by the narrowest of margins.

## Giamatti takes reins as baseball commissioner

**MONTREAL** — Angelo Bartlett Giamatti, the National League president, was named Thursday as baseball's next commissioner to succeed Peter Ueberroth, who will end his term nine months early to help the transition.

Giamatti was elected to a five-year term by unanimous vote of the 26 team owners at their quarterly meeting. Giamatti, 50, will become the game's seventh commissioner when he officially takes office April 1, 1989.

"My priorities are not too different than Peter Ueberroth's," Giamatti said. "My first priority as commissioner-elect will be finding the best possible resolution to baseball's labor relations problem."

Ueberroth, who often said he would be a one-term commissioner, led support for Giamatti and did not want the selection process to drag. Ueberroth made his recommendation at a morning meeting and owner-voted for Giamatti "without a lot of discussion," the commissioner said.

"It's obviously no surprise. While investigating the role, the action is today became very obvious," Ueberroth said. "He's the right man for the job."

Giamatti and NL owners met briefly Thursday to talk about a method of choosing a new NL presi-

dent. No names were discussed, although New York Mets general manager Frank Cashen has been mentioned previously.

Giamatti, president of Yale University for eight years, earned a reputation as "the dean of discipline" in two years as NL president. He suspended Pete Rose for 30 days this season after the Cincinnati manager bumped umpire Dave Pallone and refused to bend to criticism and pressure to lighten the sentence.

Last year, Giamatti suspended Kevin Gross for scuffing baseballs and Billy Hatcher for corking a bat, insisting that order was necessary and cheating was intolerable. Giamatti was also said to be the driving force behind this season's enforcement of balk rules, although he denies being the main proponent.

He is committed to "social justice" in baseball in areas of affirmative action and equal opportunity and is concerned about maintaining a good atmosphere at ballparks. He regards himself as "tepid" on expansion, whereas Ueberroth wanted it

soon and does not agree with two recent decisions by arbitrators that owners colluded to restrict the free-agent market.

Giamatti was discussed as a possible candidate for commissioner in 1983 during a 2-year search for Bowie Kuhn's successor. Giamatti had been rumored as Ueberroth's successor since being elected as NL president in June 1986 and taking office six months later. He denied, however, he left the Ivy League with the commissioner's job in mind.

Owners Bud Selig of Milwaukee and Fred Wilpon of the Mets, appointed by owners to examine the selection process, said many people in and out of baseball were mentioned as candidates. But none, including Giamatti, were interviewed.

"The more we talked, we truly believed he was best," Wilpon said. There were reports some American League owners did not want Giamatti, but Selig called that opposition "from the Lament Cranston mold."

"It was shadowy at best," Selig said. Selig jokingly said his only

reservation was that Giamatti had been longtime Boston Red Sox fan.

Some owners inquired whether Giamatti had a strong enough business background, perhaps Ueberroth's major asset, and those concerns were apparently assuaged.

Ueberroth was elected in March 1984, assumed the position on Oct. 1 and was to stay on through Dec. 31, 1989. Though Giamatti will now take office on April 1, it was agreed Ueberroth will work for six months with the new commissioner.

"I don't think I'm leaving early. To me, I'm leaving right," Ueberroth said. Ueberroth and the owners wanted to assure a smooth transition, something that has not gone well in the past. Ueberroth said "there were too many land mines and files couldn't be found" when he took office.

"I has never worked before in baseball," Selig said. "We wanted to affect an orderly change."

Giamatti said he does not plan any major personnel changes in the commissioner's office.

## Utah financier makes offer for UP&L

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Utah financier Ian Cumming has made a \$1.2 billion cash bid for majority interest in Utah Power & Light Co., an offer that is about \$600 million less than one accepted by the utility a year ago from Oregon-based PacifiCorp.

UP&L spokesman Dave Mead said the privately held utility, in the process of trying to get approval for a merger with PacifiCorp, has not responded to Cumming's offer. He said the company had no further comment.

Cumming, who lives in Salt Lake and is chairman of Leucadia National Corp., a New York-based holding company with sales of \$200 million in 1986, could not be reached for comment Thursday.

A woman who would only identify herself as "the cleaning lady" said Cumming was not expected home until Monday. His New York office said he was not in, and referred calls to a Salt Lake attorney, Stephen D. Swindle, said Cumming made the offer through a letter to UP&L directors in June. The lawyer confirmed the bid is a cash offer of \$30 per share for at least 67 percent of UP&L stock, totaling \$1.2 billion. Swindle said the offer would be "pre-nature to discuss" how the acquisition would be financed.

Cumming and Leucadia have expressed concern that a merger with PacifiCorp would not be in the best interest of the state or UP&L's customers and shareholders. Swindle said.

"UP&L has historically played an important role in the state and should remain a free-standing company, based in Salt Lake City, and not part of a regional power company," Swindle said.

Under terms of the PacifiCorp merger, UP&L would become a division of PacifiCorp and be part of an \$8 billion system serving seven Western states including Idaho.

Utility commissions in all those states, including Utah, have approved the merger, but it has since been stalled at the Federal Energy Regula-

tory Commission in Washington, D.C. A FERC administrative law judge has recommended the commission deny the merger because of its anti-competitive impacts.

UP&L's service area covers the eastern part of Idaho, extending into the Burley area.

In Portland, Ore., PacifiCorp spokesman Dolores Chenoweth

said the report of the Cumming offer caught her by surprise but that it should have no effect on the merger.

"We have an agreement with UP&L, and that merger agreement is in force," said Chenoweth. "We fully expect to receive approval from the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission to go ahead" with the merger.

East wins the first spade with his jack and switches to the diamond king. Declarer ducks in dummy (correct) and the diamond queen is won with dummy's ace. What happens if South takes the club finesse at this point?

The finesse wins, guaranteeing a ninth winner, but where should South look for one more? Since South has no hope at all in the minors, his only chance is with spades. South carefully leads his heart eight to dummy's jack to ruff a low spade with his nine. Next the trump 10 is led to dummy's king and the bubble breaks. East's discard reveals the 3-1 trump break, and dummy is out of entries regardless of what might develop in spades.

To make the game against the 3-1 trump division, South must use dummy's entries wisely instead of taking a club finesse after winning dummy's diamond ace. South should ruff a low spade. The heart ace is cashed and a second heart is led to dummy's jack to push the spade king through East. East is forced to cover and South ruffs to establish dummy's 10. The last trump is drawn by dummy's king, a minor-suit loser goes on dummy's good spade 10, and a patiently delayed club finesse lands the game.

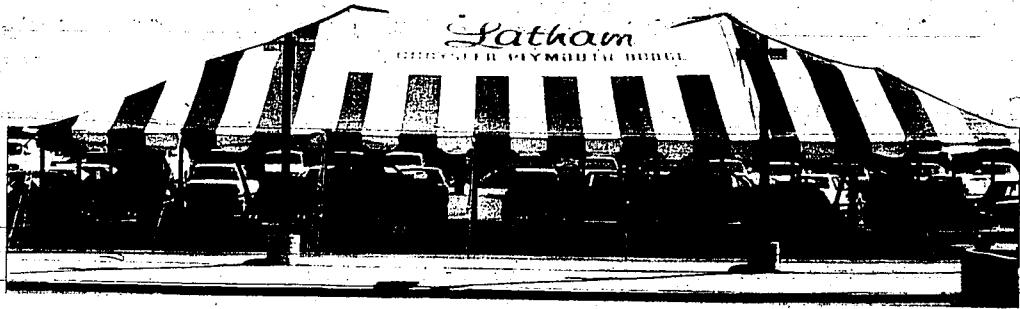

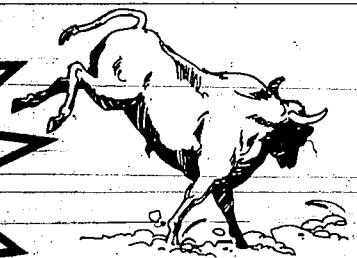

## Ernie Sites Jr. defies simple classification

WENDELL — The road has its pleasures. That most will never know. But tonight when I turn my lights down, How I'll hurt for you so. Thank you for calling me your darling. Been thinking about you most morning long. Your baby's fine but I miss you so. It seems so long counting the days returning home.

The Wendell native sings and plays mandolin, guitar, banjo and fiddle in an upbeat style. He is backed by a good selection of other accomplished musicians, including his brother Joe, who was named National Fiddling Champion at Weiser this year and in 1987. "You put a lot of yourself on the line when you do your own music," Sites says. "But it's been real encouraging to do my original music." "Idaho Winds," he says, shouldn't be classed as country-western, since that term makes some people stereotype the music as boring.

From his life on the road as a professional musician and a construction worker, Ernie Sites Jr. has written songs about rambling, missing loved ones and coming home. "I'm a ramblin' kind of guy," he says. Sites, 35, who has been known to take his wife and six children along with him. "There's no way you can play music and not have to go." Sites recently recorded 11 of his original songs on a cassette tape titled "Idaho Winds." Two of the songs on "Idaho Winds" are instrumentals and the others might be called western swing and ballads, plus a rock 'n' roll number. Sites co-wrote with his younger brother, Andrew, three-chord simple songs. The record, says Sites, is influenced mostly by early cowboy music and jazz. "I love the classic cowboy music," he says. "Sons of the Pioneers. I really have a good feel for that music.... I also like the swing jazz like Bob Wills did. I think a little bit of that flavor is in my album." During one of many trips to the annual fiddler's festival in Weiser, Sites met and picked tunes with Tiny Moore, a former member of Bob Wills' band. "I met him (Moore) a long time ago and was fascinated with his jazz mandolin," Sites recalls. "Another influence, he says, was Gene Loranger in Hagerman, a

But have you had time to look — really look — at the artwork entered this year in the Twin Falls County Fair? Everyone knows that farmers and country-type people keep long hours. ## Judging the art — a delicate balance

FILER — Joan Sargent, superintendent of the Art Building at the fair, says fair officials look for professionals to judge the annual art competition. "We've tried to get judges from outside our area and a different judge every year," says Sargent. John Tave, an associate professor of art at Boise State University, judged this year's painting and drawing entries. He's exhibited his own paintings, drawings and sculpture throughout the United States. An article about him is forthcoming in American Artist Magazine.

"I look for an understanding of basic skill first," says Tave, describing how he judges an entry. "Things

like perspective, light, shade, good drawing ability, good ability with color. And then, after that, I look for creativity, individuality and something unique in each work that sets it apart from the other paintings or drawings or works of art." John Sinclair, five times Professional Photographer of the Year in Idaho, judged the photography entries. As owner of a photography business in Boise, he does wedding and portrait work, as well as some photography of high-bred horses. Sinclair says he grades on impact, creativity, style, composition, print presentation and lighting. "I work with color and design and print quality," he says. "Then I try to determine if the photograph makes some kind of a statement that will prove or disprove interest."

## New books focus on Beatles

Tim Riley's "Tell Me Why: A Beatles Commentary" (subtitled "The Beatles — Album by Album, Song by Song, the Sixties and After") may be the most critical companion to last year's CD reissues and local writer Mark Lewisohn's recent "The Beatles Recording Sessions," a massive, detailed study that includes a studio-focused interview with Paul McCartney.

Riley's book is certainly a better, and easier, read than Wilfred Mellers' stuffy "Twilight of the Gods." Like Mellers' book, Riley's provides a song-by-song musical analysis, but weds it to pop sociology to answer his key questions: How are the Beatles' strong emotional effects achieved? Why is a given vocal delivery so penetrating? How does a guitar solo inflect a verse, a refrain, a transition? And above all, what does it all mean? # The 60s rage returns in music, fashion

By most accounts, it started five years ago with the release of "The Big Chill" — the film that introduced a whole new generation to Vietnam angst, free love and such '60s classics as "I Heard It Through the Grapevine" way before those dancing rainbows.

Other trend watchers point to New York fashion designer Stephen Sprouse's revival of neon-bright miniskirts in 1984 as a key influence.

Still other observers figure it was all those '60s reruns — "Leave It to Beaver," "The Twilight Zone" and

"The Munsters" to name a few — that kicked the phenomenon into high gear.

Though many wrote off such initial evidence of '60s fever as passing fads, the trend seems to be growing with each additional replay.

Three current major films are set in the '60s ("Good Morning, Vietnam," "Dirty Dancing" and "Hair-spray," the movie featuring teased hair, angel blouses, pegged pants and tab collars). Dozens of other films about the '60s are in the works, including at least three movies on the Woodstock concert of 1969.

Commodities from automobiles to

athletic shoes are being advertised on national television with '60s music and themes.

In the music world, there is serious talk of a Beatles reunion. And numerous pop stars of the decade — notably Roy Orbison (who was recently backed up by Bruce Springsteen) and Little Richard (who is doing commercials for McDonald's) — are in the midst of major comebacks.

Shorter skirts for women and longer hair for men are "de rigueur" for the chic throughout the world.

"Classic rock" radio stations are so prevalent throughout the United States (there are at least six in Los Angeles) that some radio programmers fear that new bands will be denied sufficient air time.

Why are people increasingly enamored of the '60s, the decade that is remembered for its ideals (love and peace) and its excesses (sex, drugs and violence) at home and abroad?

Why are marketing experts predicting the current rehash will last at least another year, probably culminating in the summer of 1989 with the anniversary of Woodstock?

In short, why can't we let go of the '60s?

To Wavy Gravy, a former member of Ken Kesey's Merry Pranksters and the man who exceeded the party for about half-a-million people at Woodstock, the answer to all those questions is simple: "The '60s are the '60s. These are the good old days."

And Gravy, who is still a member of the Berkeley, Calif.-based commune called the Hog Farm, is part of the cultural comeback. He recently appeared at New York City's old Fillmore East (renamed The Saint) in what was billed as a "Psychedelic Daze Revue" featuring Gravy, a psychedelic light show and a Country Joe concert. It was so successful that more evenings (with Abbie Hoffman and the rock group from Butterfly) were scheduled.

Author David Wallechinsky, who interviewed his classmates and others for his 1986 book, "Midterm Report, the Class of '65: Chronicle of an American Generation," suspects that the fascination with the '60s stems from the tumultuous events young people were forced to confront then.

"You had to experience one way or another. If you were a male, you had a choice to make regarding the Vietnam War," he says. "Both those who went to war and those who protested it thought they were doing something

to make the world a better place.... Part of the reason we can't let go of the '60s is that they brought to the surface a welter of feelings and visions and "intimations" which have been at war with each other ever since and have not been settled," says Todd Gitlin, a University of California, Berkeley, sociology professor and author of "The '60s, Years of Hope, Days of Rage." Therefore, talking about the '60s is an indirect way of talking about where we are now in the culture and politics.

In the meantime, some of the trappings, if not the substance of the era, are back in our closets. The new designers are knocking off the '60s, but when we did it, it was totally different," says New York designer Giorgio di Sant'Angelo, who — with creators such as the late Rudi Gernreich of Los Angeles, New York's Betsey Johnson and London's Mary Quant — was responsible for many of the unique styles of the decade.

Los Angeles designer Holly Harp, who opened a Sunset Strip boutique bearing her name in 1968 and was an immediate hit with many rock and film stars, says the clothes she now

manufactures for specialty stores and better department stores have much in common with those she made for her shop 20 years ago.

"The clothes are still fluid, romantic and hopefully reflect a certain amount of wit," says Harp, who was known for her "rich hippie" looks of fine fashioned lace, beads and matte jersey. "I'm not trying to do tasteful little uniforms. Being dressed in perfect taste is very aging."

Movie producer Linda Gottlieb, whose '60s dance movie "Dirty Dancing" is among the largest-grossing independent feature films ever made, says she is heartened by all the letters she gets from teen-aged fans of the movie.

"They write that they relate to the emotional aspects of the movie, things they had only dreamed of before," Gottlieb says. "These kids weren't even born until the '70s, but they see the '60s as a more simple, innocent and emotional time and they want more of that in their lives."

## A video really could save your life

NEW YORK — Tennis star Arthur Ashe knows the risks of high blood pressure and heart disease. He's undergone bypass surgery twice.

He shares his personal insights as host of "Living With High Blood Pressure," a new video on hypertension, the silent killer. Based on the book "Three Medical Experts Tell You What You Want to Know About High Blood Pressure," by Drs. Neil B. Shulman, Elijah Saunders and W. Dallas Hall, the video discusses what the disease is, risk factors such as heredity and lifestyle, medical examinations, medication and nutrition.

Written and distributed by Creative Street Inc., with a grant from G.D. Searle & Co., a pharmaceutical firm, the video follows three people to illustrate how daily routine affects blood pressure.

"One point was made evident to me during the shoot," said Dave Smith, who produced and wrote the video, "and that is the large number of people who have the disease. No matter where we were shooting, people would come up to us and say, 'Oh, I have the disease,' or tell us about someone in their family who has the disease."

The 60-minute video, available in VHS, retails for \$34.95 and can be obtained from Creative Street Inc., 3719 North Washington Blvd., Indianapolis, Ind., 46206.

Elsewhere in home video, Gary Burghoff, who endured himself to millions as Radar O'Reilly on the hit TV series "M.A.S.H.," stars in Premiere Home Video's "Video Guide to Stamp Collecting."

Burghoff, himself a collector, talks about the ins and outs of philately and shows close-ups of rare stamps. The video is designed for beginners as well as hobbyists and collectors who have been involved with stamps for a while.

The following are reviews of videos recently released:

Cinderella (Walt Disney Home Video; VHS-Beta, \$26.99; Rated G)  
Two things to watch for in "Cinderella," the 1950 animated classic by Walt Disney, are the mice and the bubbles.

The bubbles rise in the scene where Cinderella is scrubbing the floor in her stepmother's house. They are gorgeous soap bubbles, an artistic coup, shimmering, sailing and playing with light in ways that "outdo nature." That's just one of many reasons to sit back with your kids



and admire the work of 750 artists, writers and others who brought this 76-minute cartoon classic to life.

The mice — Jaq, Gus, Luke, Mert and the rest — just about steal the movie. The lovable rodents, you'll remember, are Cinderella's only friends, her relief from the cruelty of her stepmother and two stepisters and key allies in getting "Cinderella," as the mice affectionately call her, hitched with the handsome prince.

As for the stepmother and stepisters, the tip-off that they're bad is that in Disney's world, bad people have ugly noses. And the stepmother is a true hatchet face.

She's so mean, in fact, that some young children may find "Cinderella" disturbing, even with the happy endings.

The music is fine, though not peak Disney as in "Pinocchio" or "Mary Poppins." The best tune is "Bibbidi-Bobbidi-Boo," the jolly incantation sung by the Fairy Godmother as she waves her wand and transforms Cinderella into an enchantress.

Cinderella herself comes off more appealing than many adults may remember. She shows little flashes of humor and gumption, as when she jokes with the mice about the lousy singing voices of her stepisters.

It's hard to imagine anyone of any age not seeing something to like in this film.

End of the Line (Lorimar Home

Video; VHS-Beta, \$79.95; Rated PG)

A look at the cast of "End of the Line" leads one to expect off-beat fun, maybe even a sleeper gem. To some degree, Mary-Steenburgen, Holly Hunter, Bob Balaban, Wilford Brimley and their colleagues deliver.

But while "End of the Line," a 1988 movie directed by Jay Russell, is charming and quirky, it lacks depth and falls victim to helplessness in its tale of ordinary people who face adversity and become heroes.

For example, in a discussion between Leo (Levon Helm) and Haney (Brimley) about America and God, Leo asks, "Gives ya a bit of a chill, don't it?" Or, Haney says, "I always figured as long as there was a United States of America, there'd be a railroad in Arkansas as a man could work on."

Haney and Leo are Southland-Railroad Co. workers who set out to save their jobs and their small town by stealing a locomotive and taking it to Chicago to protest the parent corporation's plan to close the railroad yard.

The company's welcome for the thieves — a calculated bit of public relations — is funny, as is Balaban as the company's president.

The cast is great, especially Steenburgen, the film's executive producer who plays Leo's kooky, chain-smoking beautiful wife; and Hunter as Haney's daughter and the neglected wife of Kevin Bacon.

Consuming Passions (Virgin Vi-

sion; VHS-Beta, \$79.95; Rated R) Cannibalism isn't all that funny if you happen to be the entree, or if you're in the audience of "Consuming Passions."

It sounds as though it ought to be funny: an eager-beaver junior execu-

tive (Tyler Butterworth) accidentally dumps three workers into a vat of chocolate factory recently taken over by a cynical capitalist (Jonathan Pryce), and thereby makes the product taste ever so much better. He's seduced by one of the widows, a tan-go-dancing harpy (Vanessa Redgrave).

How could this miss, especially when it's based on a play by Terry Jones and Michael Palin of "Monty Python's Flying Circus"?

Like Jonathan Swift's "A Modest Proposal," this story about cannibalism makes a moral point about the way society treats the poor. Put people in chocolate and you get them off the dole queue, the capitalist says.

"Consuming Passions" doesn't belabor the political angle, but it doesn't develop much else.

Redgrave, who towers over Butterworth, has some funny turns as a woman who regards widowhood as simply an opportunity to change partners.

The funniest actor on the screen, though, is Prunella Scales (Bytely Family of "Fawlty Towers") in a small part as a demoted secretary who wears garish Carnaby Street clothes of the mod 1960s. However, she's given little to do except make ridiculous faces.

# Bob Hope quips have blasted 10 presidents, beginning with Hoover

**HOLLYWOOD** — Thirty-nine men have taken the oath as president of the United States, and Bob Hope, 85, has lampooned 10 of them. Here is a Hope sampler:

**On Herbert Hoover:** "... Isn't this some theater? I was just standing out in front watching the other acts when a lady rushed up to me and said, 'Pardon me, young man, can you help me find the rest room?' ... And I said, 'Yes, ma'am, it's just around the corner.' ... And she said, 'Don't give me any of that Hoover talk.'"

**On Franklin D. Roosevelt:** "I think I should apologize to our president for some of the things I've said on radio. Especially about Mrs. Roosevelt. Like when Churchill and Roosevelt were discussing campaign strategy, they talked about when to attack the enemy and how to keep Eleanor out of the cross-fire."

**On Harry Truman:** "Well, this campaign promises to be a hot battle. ... Truman has announced he's not going to leave the White House, and Dewey says he's moving in. That'll be a nice situation. ... I can just see the towels in the White House bathroom ... marked His and His."

**On Dwight Eisenhower:** "The world will benefit by our president playing golf. ... And the first time he played at Augusta we had a wonderful game. ... He got up on the first tee and took a terrific swing at the ball and missed it. Threw himself out of bounds. Took another full swing at the ball and missed it again. There were two little ants sitting on the ground. And the one ant looked at the other and said, 'Let's get up on the ball before this guy kills us.'"

**On John F. Kennedy:** "Have you heard about President Kennedy saying we should all drink milk? Milk! Maybe he's younger than we think, huh? Is he really Irish? The president served milk at a Cabinet meeting but it didn't turn out well. They spent a half-hour just burping each other."

**On Lyndon Johnson:** "President Johnson did-

n't shake hands. He'd pull on your ears."

**On Richard Nixon:** "Some conservatives feared Mr. Nixon lost his shirt in China, but that's not true. Kissinger found the ticket and he's going back for it."

**On Gerald Ford:** "I don't mind playing golf with Jerry Ford because you don't have to keep score. You just look back-along-the-fairways-and-count the wounded."

**On Jimmy Carter:** "It's great to be here in Washington. It looks beautiful this time of the year with all the peanut trees in bloom. And I'm really enjoying all the sights—here in Washington. Billy Carter took me over to see the Lincoln Memorial today. And we both looked at it for a few minutes and then he said, 'He sure was big, wasn't he?'"

**On Ronald Reagan:** "You have to realize what a kick it is to sit in the presidential box with Ronald Reagan. When we first walked into that box, there were only two chairs in there. One was marked No. 1 American. The other one, Washed-Up Actor, Boy, did we fight over those."

**MICHAEL DUKAKIS** Offers little comedy material Dukakis and Bush? "About a 2," Little says. Little, who does about 50 voices in his act, nonetheless plans to work up Dukakis and Bush impressions. Gene Perret, another of Bob Hope's troop of six writers, concedes that Bush and Dukakis "haven't evolved

as characters yet." But after writing jokes for Hope on the last five presidential races, he is not worried.

"When Carter emerged, no one knew who he was unless you were from Georgia. Then you found out about the skeletons in his closet."

"The Carters were such a diverse group: Miss Lillian, Billy, Amy talking about nuclear proliferation," Mills recalls.

Mills is a member of Bob Hope's beeper brigade. He does not leave home without a beeper on his belt because he is on call 24 hours in case Hope needs an emergency joke transfusion. Coming up with Bush and Dukakis material at this point is tougher than making Reagan jokes, he says, because there are not as many reference points.

"Everything you think of, you have to double-check and say, 'Does the public know about this?' The thing about humor, especially one-liners, is they have to make the association like that," Mills says, snapping his fingers.

Little figures he will get his best Bush and Dukakis material from the fall debates. He shaped his Reagan impression, he says, from the 1980 Carter-Reagan debate.



**GEORGE BUSH** Easy to poke fun at

It is axiomatic, Mills says, that as the campaign develops, so will Bush's and Dukakis' idiosyncrasies and then the jokes will fall into place.

"I wish we had a nickel for every jelly bean joke we've done in the last eight years. You grab onto something like that and you hit it every which way," Mills says.

For now, though, much of the material on Bush and Dukakis is necessarily superficial.

"You can't be ahead-of-the audience," Siller says.

How to lampoon a relatively unknown figure such as Dukakis?

"Sometimes you start with physical characteristics, like an editorial cartoonist does," Siller says. He ticks off the obvious Dukakis hooks: Greek background, bushy eyebrows, height.

Russell, who often displays his wit and his satirical songs on public television, is not a fan of superficial humor. "I'm a political satirist. My audience expects a little more than the Greek and the short and the eyebrows."

So what Dukakis hooks is he using?

"There aren't any now," he says with a laugh. "There's the Greek and the short and the eyebrows." Still, he admires the line from William Safire's column about Dukakis: "Beware of Greek's wearing links."

Russell is going after Dukakis' colorless image. In his act, Russell says: "Zorba the Clerk. He's called a technocrat. We may go from the Gipper to Mr. Goodwrench overnight. Well, there's a difference. Mr. Goodwrench raises your hood and says, 'I don't like the sound of that engine.' The Gipper slams the hood shut and says, 'See. Now you don't hear it anymore.'"

At the moment, Bush offers more diverse comedy targets, such as his struggle to escape Reagan's shadow. When Reagan made a seemingly lukewarm official endorsement of Bush, Johnny Carson was ready the next day. "Reagan said, 'Well, we

haven't had a president named George for a long time; maybe it's worth a try."

There are, of course, milder jokes. Mills came up with this one for Bob Hope: "Last week George Bush went to his manicurist and had them insert dirt under his fingernails."

But Russell says, "Wimp is over. He is sticking with political intrigue."

"I don't know if Bush was involved in Iran-Contra. I really don't know. For seven years, you know, we'd say a George Bush. You're only the vice president, they keep you out of things. He'd say, 'Oh no, I'm involved. Now we're saying, 'Aha, you were involved!' He's saying, 'Oh no, I was only the vice president.'"

Of all the presidential candidates this year, the most delicate jokes were lobbed toward Jesse Jackson.

"The problem with Jackson is ... whatever you said ... there would be an extra second while the audience subconsciously determined whether you'd said anything racist or not," Russell says.

Pat Paulsen, the sad-eyed humorist, says that several lines he wrote about Jackson for "The Smothers Brothers Comedy Hour" on CBS were cut out because they were considered "too harsh."

Despite the nerve that political humor often touches, it remains something of a cottage industry. There are far more editorial cartoonists (about 300) than famous entertainers who use political humor as a staple in their acts. The short list includes Carson, Hope, Russell and Mort Sahl, and there are some routines on "Saturday Night Live" and "Late Night With David Letterman."

Why so few?

"It's so damn expensive," Mills says.

Political humor, like bread, has a short shelf life and is best when it is made fresh every day. David Letterman has a dozen writers. Carson has 10 writers, and five of them work solely on Carson's monologue, scanning the news to come up with 60 jokes a day that he prunes down to 15 to 20 a night.

"A joke only has to last one or two days with Hope," Perret says. "We don't care if it's out of date next Tuesday because we've had fun with it this week. A lot of comedians can't afford to do that."

## Believe it or not, Cleveland is polka capital of America

CLEVELAND (AP) — Move over rock 'n' roll and make room for the polka.

While Cleveland has been named as future site for the Rock 'n' Roll Hall of Fame and Museum, enthusiasts here, including Mayor George Voinovich, are raising money for a polka hall of fame.

Why Cleveland? "The base is here, the music is here," said Tony Petkovsek, chairman of the committee organizing the museum. "Cleveland is the polka capital of America."

Polka King Frankie Yankovic, who in 1986 became the first polka artist to win a Grammy, lives here when he's not on tour with his band. He is one of an estimated 80,000 Slovenians living in Cleveland, more than anywhere else in the world outside Yugoslavia, said Petkovsek.

"Polkas have marked up a bit," Yankovic, 73, said last week from his hotel in New Orleans where he was playing polkas for the Fraternal Order of Eagles convention. "Now disc jockeys are playing it and teenagers are starting to try it. They can't really dance it but they and jump around and have a good time."

The National Cleveland-Style Polka Hall of Fame will be in the Euclid Civic Center, Petkovsek said it will document the evolution of Slovenian folk music into Cleveland-style polka.

Artifacts, recordings, button box accoutrements and items honoring individuals and hands will be on display, he said.

There is already a Polka Hall of Fame and Museum in Chicago — Yankovic was the first polka artist inducted there — but the Chicago museum's emphasis is on the Polish polka, said Yankovic, who has been touring the country for 57 years, entertaining crowds at county fairs, conventions and polka festivals.

Petkovsek said Cleveland's reputation as the polka capital and the emphasis on the Cleveland style are why the hall is being established here.

"Slovenian is more middle-of-the-road. Polish has more brass, more of a hop," Petkovsek said. "Bohemian has more brass, and German is more oompah-pah — they'll have tubas, baritone and trumpets. Slovenians will have an accordion, sax, drum, bass and perhaps a banjo and guitar."

Voinovich, a museum committee member, said he first danced the polka as a boy and later, as a member of the Ohio House of Representatives in 1967, introduced legislation designating Cleveland as world's capital.

"From a cultural, national standpoint, the polka has brought a tremendous amount of enjoyment to millions of Americans," Voinovich said.

# First the paper... now 'USA Today' goes to TV

Steve Friedman sat at his desk wielding a baseball bat. On the desk, among a few standard office items, were two baseballs, one dirty, one spotless. "People send them to me. They know I'm a fan," Friedman said. Along a wall, three Sony TV monitors flickered silently, one tuned to perpetual-news CNN.

"I worry about the news business," he said, waving the bat, a foot-and-a-half-long miniature with a Cubs logo, occasionally rapping it on the desk for emphasis. The location of news resources annoys him. "I worry about having 15,000 reporters cover a convention."

"And Reykjavik," he said, referring to coverage of the American-Soviet summit conference in the Icelandic capital. "There were 100 cameras focused on a house that never moved. I worry about the news business."

Steve Friedman wanders and worries a lot about the news business. And now, once again, he has a chance to do something about it.

Twenty-seven stories above Rosslyn, Va., in USA Today's Tower II, Friedman, a devotee of the perpetually poor Chicago Cubs, traded jibes with a member of his staff, a fan of the nouveau-riche New York Mets.

But the banter and Friedman's easy manner did not hide the fact that something serious was going on. A television show a year or so in the making was about to go on the air.

Some 20 floors below, technicians were putting final touches on a colorful, high-tech set that will be the visual home of USA Today's "Television Show," which will make its debut next week. Every piece of equipment carries the same brand name: State of the Art.

The new news program seems more easily described and defined by what it is not than by what it is. What it is, basically, is a video translation of Gannett's national newspaper, USA Today, the publication that serves up bite-sized news stories in fast-food fashion and fostered a book dubbed "McPaper."

The television show has been likened to, but differs from, the successful "Entertainment Tonight," though there is a kinship. And it should not remind anyone of local or national news news.

How, for instance, would USA treat the Italian stunt-team air disaster in West Germany? On the Mon-

day morning after the crash, Friedman was more sure of how he would not treat it. The stunning crash tape was playing on CNN as he talked.

"By the time we got on the air, the public would have seen that footage how many times?" he said. "But I prefer not to deal in the hysterical, but the general."

"Generally, if we can't do it differently from local news, differently from what Dan, Peter and Tom do, we won't do it. Generally on breaking stories, we'll do second-day stories on the first day."

Friedman comes to this task after

"And I'd be lying if I told you I didn't want a mix," he said. "I had five names in each of the categories" of the show, which correspond to the sections of the paper. Here's the team, which is indeed mixed, as Friedman wanted it, right down to their hair colors.

The front page, or USA, anchor is brunette Edie Magnus, 30, who came out of a radio and television background in hometown Cincinnati and had worked for ABC since 1985. Most recently she co-anchored World News This Morning.

Robin Young anchors the Life sec-

er by Jeremy Conway, who has served as art director on such diverse productions as "Angel Heart," "Crocodile Dundee II," and "Late Night With David Letterman."

Friedman credits the success of "Entertainment Tonight" for making "USA" possible, and there has been talk of the two shows' becoming rivals. "In my last job I knew my enemies," said Friedman. "In this one you do," given the variety of shows pitted against "USA" in local markets.

"Sports could have done a blow-by-blow account like a boxing match."

Walker's approach to Money has a personal as well as professional aspect.

"Ever since I first realized I was a poor black man in Washington, D.C., I realized money was important," said Walker.

"Son of a father who still drives a taxi in Washington and a mother who retired as a government clerk and now lives in California, Walker recalls a time in his childhood when being on welfare meant standing in line waiting for allotments of cheese and peanut butter.

Later, while reporting for the Washington Star, Walker worked weekends on a black public-affairs television program for the ABC affiliate in Baltimore. "That got me over that look of being stuck up when they put the camera on you for the first time," he said.

So when the Star folded and ABC looked for a transition from print to video was not as traumatic as it might have been. Now he finds himself involved in an enterprise he sees as a merger of his print and broadcast worlds.

And while much of his reporting has been in the area of politics, there have been enough financial, economic and business angles to his work that he feels comfortable anchoring Monday.

"I think I've spent my life preparing for this," he said. "This program will have exponentially greater resources than any other (network) newscast. There are 20 or 30 people in the Money section of the newspaper... The networks might have four people devoted to money matters."

Walker said he agreed with reporter-author William Greider that much of the country's financial reporting competes for the attention of

professionals in the field. "Which means," he said, "that most of us don't know what the hell's going on. Most of us are programmed to tune it out or turn it off."

He promises a simpler approach. "You'll never hear me use the term 'curve on any broadcast.'"

An early blow to "USA" came when WCBS-TV in New York decided to air it at 2 a.m. "If we succeed across the country, that will change," Walker said. "If we don't, it won't matter."

"USA" has 160 stations on board, 122 of them carrying it in prime-time access, or pre-prime time, slots.

a highly successful run with NBC's "Today" show. He became assistant producer of that show in 1977, producer in 1979 and executive producer in 1980.

The show rose with Friedman. It went from third to first among the morning network news and feature programs and won Friedman two Emmys. Bryant Gumbel moved to the show and became a star newsman on Friedman's watch.

"USA" is a production of GYG-Grant Tinker-Gannett, and Friedman is president of GTG East and executive producer of the new show.

Friedman expects to spend more than \$20 million a year putting on the program. A force of 165 people has been assembled to pull it together, including four anchors: Friedman calls his "second dream team." Team 1 is "Today's" Gumbel, Pauley, Scott and friends.

To join "Dream Team II," the "first thing you had to be was smart," said Friedman.

And there were specifics: You had to have network experience, had to be able to go out and report a story as well as present it in the studio and had to be in your 30s. "People in their 30s and 40s are the television generation," said Friedman. At 42, Friedman is the team coach, not a player.

The blond Long Islander is a former contributing correspondent for "NBC Nightly News" and "Today." She made the cut at 37. Her older brother is actor John Savage.

Sports anchor Bill Macatee, a 32-year-old Texan, was the youngest network sportscaster when he joined NBC in 1982. He anchored sports for "NBC News at Sunrise" and reported sports for the network's "Today" and "Sunday Today" shows.

Kenneth Walker anchors the Money section. Walker is a Washingtonian, cut his journalistic teeth on the Washington Star and has been a national and White House correspondent for ABC News. He is 47.

The team will work out of a studio that reportedly cost \$12 million to build. It features a row of three bigger-than-life-size, rear-projection video screens that will occasionally be a backdrop for reports. There's another bank of 24 computer-coordinated, home-size monitors. There's a robotic camera that can sweep the length of the room.

Lots of glitz. Lots of grit. The room had to be insulated from sound all around, from the rush of Rosslyn traffic to the roar of National Airport jets.

The studio was largely put together

"It proved that a news-oriented show could work through the marvel of same-day satellite transmission. 'Entertainment Tonight' does a good job," Friedman said. "Our show has more to offer in that it's not confined to entertainment."

The technical wizardry of USA is fine, Friedman said, "but you gotta have heart." Early run-thoughts of the show "were too cold, not people-oriented enough" and there's been an attempt to warm things up. Don't look for as much on-set schmoozing on "USA" as there is on "Today," but the chemistry is still important.

"If you don't have heart, you don't have heart," Friedman said. "And the heart comes from the people, the four anchors, not from the graphics."

"If you have people people like, people will forgive you the days you're not very good," he said. "I think Johnny Carson is actually better when he's dying."

It is not, of course, a premise he's anxious to test on his show. But viewers should look for variations as good ideas are embraced and bad ones dropped.

This is a completely different concept of story-telling, said Magnus. "We're not confined to the boilerplate presentation we see on the air... It will not be simply the day's news."

For instance, had "USA" been covering the Detroit airline crash, "we would have simply done the Cecilia Cichan story," said Magnus, referring to the disaster's sole survivor.

"There was also the thought, she said, that if they had covered the Dan Rather-George Bush confrontation, they might have spent the entire show on the subject. Her section would have described what happened. The Life section might have dealt with the preparation that goes into such an interview. Money would treat any financial consequences. And, she said, putting up her fist,

## Deseret News will not advertise 'Temptation'

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — The publisher of the Deseret News said last week the newspaper would not publish advertising for "The Last Temptation of Christ," the controversial new movie that has drawn criticism from religious leaders.

The paper is owned by The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, and its leaders have said the film does not depict the story of Jesus Christ and people should "shun those things that detract from the dignity and spirit of his divine mission."

Publisher Wm. James Mortimer said in a story published by the newspaper last Wednesday that "after very careful consideration, I have concluded that it is not appropriate for the Deseret News to be part of the advertising promotion of the new movie, 'The Last Temptation of

Christ."

"Information available to me about the content of the film indicates that it trivializes the message and mission of Jesus Christ. Those things of the demon Dely are best omitted from the Deseret News," he said.

Mortimer said the afternoon newspaper would not receive any proceeds from advertisements for the film carried by the city's morning paper, The Salt Lake Tribune, which is not owned by the church.

The two newspapers have a joint operating agreement in which some advertising revenues are shared. The standard exceptions are advertisements carried in the Tribune for tobacco and alcohol products. The Tribune's "Last Temptation" advertising would be treated the same way, Mortimer said.

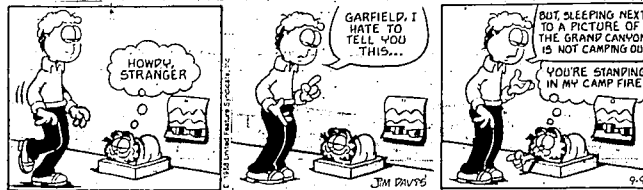

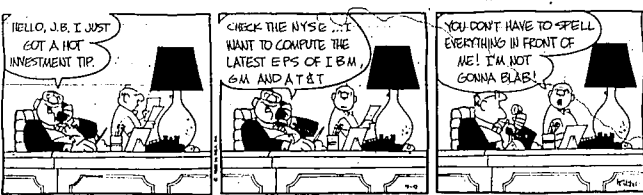

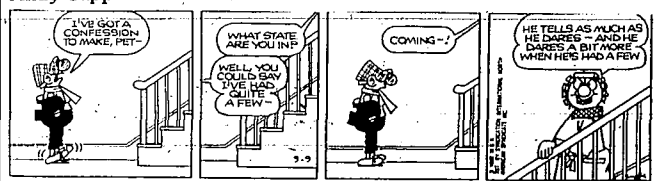

# 'Moon Over Parador' doesn't quite work

**HOLLYWOOD** — In Paul Mazursky's 'Moon Over Parador,' it seems like the director and actors have gotten hold of something really wonderful and then let part of it slip away, to swoop off parrotlike down the marble hallways of the dictator's palace in their mythical Parador.

Not that 'Moon' doesn't have lots of incidental pleasures and ripe, loony laughs. The movie is a comedy

about actors and politics, a satire in which power and illusion trip prettily over each other's feet. In it, Mazursky and co-writer Leon Capetanos imagine a struggling American actor suddenly thrust into South American dictatorship; journeyman Jack Noah (Richard Dreyfuss), a double for Parador's tyrant, Alphonse Simms (also Dreyfuss, in lifts).

Simms, a be-medaled macho libertine, dies of his own excesses in a limousine, in the arms of secret police chief Roberto Straussman (Raúl Julia). While the real tyrant hangs on a meat hook in the frozen beef locker, the imprisoned Noah — forcibly recruited by Straussman during Parador's carnival — is made to assume his ceremonial duties,

speeches, even his bedroom frolics with Simms' fiery peasant-born mistress, Madonna (Sonia Braga). Was power ever so meaningless? In Parador, the shots are called by Straussman, his shadowy cabal and a grumpy CIA chief in Bermuda shorts (Jonathan Winters — a truly inspired casting choice.) Mazursky has a devastating premise here. He is commenting not so much on Latin American politics — reduced in Pató Guzman's sumptuous comic opera design to a kind of banana daiquiri republic — as on the cult of political personality. And, tellingly, on the wholesale corruption of modern politics by TV, public relations and media experts.

Mazursky's actor-dictator is all image. He exists only for TV spots and ceremonial duties. When Noah-Simms appears on the tube, beaming in paternalistic delight to lead his people in mass aerobics, he is the ultimate modern politician; a mixture of Castro, Peron, Reagan, Jane Fonda and Richard Simmons. Noah-Simms' control is calibrated, like most politicians, on his mastery of the perfectly

timed, authoritative cliché. He interpolates the lyrics of 'The Impossible Dream' into a political speech and brings down the Parador plaza. The basic plot of 'Moon' comes from a 1939 Robert Florey-Bonnie 'The Magnificent Fraud,' in which Akim Tamiroff played the actor-turned-dictator. That is part of the problem: It is a B-movie idea that has to remain in a relatively fantastic world; otherwise, we cannot accept anachronisms like the apparent Paradorian language of Latin-accented English. Mazursky may sense this. He frames the movie in Jack's recollection to two fellow actors at the Public Theater, plants the idea that he is making it all up.

It is a typical Mazursky plot: an innocent traveling through a corrupt, glamorous, goad world. But the basic comic-paranoid thread — the hapless actor surrounded by maniacs, trapped in a palace in a role that is unraveling — gets snugged. The contemporary topical-political parallels get too obvious, characters get lost in the shuffle. Sometimes excessive political nudges — even as deftly executed as Dreyfuss' 'I can't hear you' Rea-

gan parody — muddy up the narrative line, pull us outside. The movie might have been better without those revolutions and masquerades. But Mazursky is a film maker with such a charming, humane personality and such sensitive comic skills, that he can keep you entertained even when his movie is not quite working. Certainly his cast could hardly be better: Winters, Polly Holliday, Fernando Rey, Sammy Davis Jr. (a wry self-parody), Braga, in her sexiest American movie performance, and Julia, who has the icy, dead eyes of a true fascist and the best psychotic laugh since Peter Lurie.

Dreyfuss is one of the quickest wits in American movies, and he juggles the two halves of the part delightfully. Watching 'Moon Over Parador' (MPAA rated: PG-13, for some sex and violence), we can instantly grasp the hollowness and danger of media theatrically dominating politics. Underneath the electric charisma — the ready smile, the flow of platitudes — there may be, as here, nothing, but another desperate actor, waiting for his lines, surrounded by bullies in the palace halls.

# 'Bambi' stands out as visual storytelling even after more than 45 years in release

The following are capsule reviews of some of the films playing locally in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

**BAMBI (G).** Based on Felix Salten's novel, Disney's 1942 animated feature about a young deer coming of age stands out as an example of visual storytelling. The film contains only 900 words of dialogue, yet touches on deeply felt emotions. Few scenes in animation or live action can match the poignancy of the death of Bambi's mother. In contrast, Thumper's gleeful escapades on the ice epitomize the freewheeling joy that can only be created in animation.

**BETRAYED (R).** Director Costa-Gavras has always been drawn to incendiary political subjects, but in 'Betrayed,' which is about the white supremacist movement in the American heartland, he has apparently trusted the instincts of his American screenwriter and co-producer Joe Eszterhas ('F.I.S.T.'). The result is a hoisting of the trademark Costa-Gavras tension. Debra Winger is radiantly warm, smart and against all odds, believable. Tom Berenger does the best he can with an even harder role — the decent American with two young children to raise who has completely swallowed the line of crackpot right.

**BIG (PG).** Funny, warm, sophisticated and highly imaginative comedy-fantasy in which a 12-year-old

boy's wish to be transformed into a man comes true. Then the 12-year-old with the body of a 30-year-old winds up vice president of development at a toy company. Wonderful fun. With Tom Hanks, Elizabeth Perkins, John Heard, Robert Loggia, Jared Rushton and David Moscow.

**BULL DURHAM (R).** What we have here is sweet and sexy comedy set around a real-prior minor-league baseball team, the Durham Bulls, and in it, writer-director Ron Shelton shows himself as the diamond's best friend. He has packed his oft-beat love story with a handful of resonant characters, shows off a rowdy knowledgeability in these fiercely funny baseball scenes. He knows firsthand the jargon, the fears, the weird smell of these miserable locker rooms and mungy buses, and he makes sure we understand and breathe deeply. Whether you believe Shelton's lusty, uninhibited love story is another matter; but it's seductively easy to want to, with the warmth and brightness that Susan Sarandon and Kevin Costner bring to their roles.

**COCKTAIL (R).** Tom Cruise plays Brian Flanagan, whose dreams of high-powered jobs in advertising,

banking, stockbroking or what-never are shattered by his lack of higher education. He settles, finally, for bartending in Manhattan, under the wing of Douglas Coughlin (the magnetic Brian Brown). Cruise even gets his own bartending solo: juggling bottles, tossing ice and cocktail shakers behind his back, doing tidy little spins and discreet foot movements, all the while twinkling, twinking, twinkling with his dimples must have ached. Unfortunately, none of the film makers, including director Roger Donaldson and writer Heywood Gould, seemed to notice that Flanagan, climber-up-apolitic extraordinaire, lacked a little something as the hero of the piece.

**DIE HARD (R).** Archtypical big-deal Hollywood exploitation, technically breathtaking yet disgusting and silly. Bruce Willis, however, is terrific as a witty New York cop conducting a one-man war against a bunch of terrorists who have taken over a Los Angeles office tower. With Reginald VelJohnson, Bonnie Bedelia and Alan Rickman.

**A NIGHTMARE ON ELM STREET 4: THE DREAM MASTER (R).** By far the best in the series about the ghoulish child-killer Freddy Krueger (Robert Englund) who seems invincible. It is a superior horror picture that balances wit and gore as it mirrors the anxieties of the

teen-age audience for which it is intended. Newcomers Lisa Wilcox and Danny Hassel star.

**WHO FRAMED ROGER RABBIT (PG).** Dense, satisfying, feverishly inventive and a technical marvel, 'Who Framed Roger Rabbit' has Robert Zemeckis ('Back to the Future') as its director and Richard Williams, an Academy Award winner for 'A Christmas Carol' (1972), as director of animation, under the joined banners of Disney's Touchstone and Steven Spielberg's Amblin companies. All hands and the artists involved may have created a film that no one sees just once. But — animation aside — the treasure of the piece

is Bob Hoskins' pungent, visceral comic performance.

**YOUNG GUNS (R).** As a new version of the 'Billy the Kid' legend, it pales beside some of its predecessors — like the Penn and Peckinpah versions. But this new Western, a kind of teen-movie 'Seven Samurai,' has some slick, smoky yuck. Emilio Estevez is remarkable as a notably psychopathic Billy; Kiefer Sutherland, Lou Diamond Phillips and Charlie Sheen make a fine ensemble. But the movie's other intentions — its paeon to teen camaraderie in the face of universal corruption and to sappy young love in the jaws of death — do not always jibe.

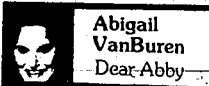

**DEAR EMILIE:** You would not believe the number of letters from readers who had also been hearing things and doubted their sanity. One man said he nearly went crazy because he heard bees buzzing continually in one ear — night and day. Another said he heard constant crackling

The constant sounds are due to a condition called "tinnitus," but the musical hallucinations are yet another matter. Read on:

**DEAR ABBY:** It was interesting seeing all the letters sent to you by people with musical hallucinations. The two cases I describe in my book, "The Man Who Mistook His

Wife for a Hat," were rather rare and special examples of musical epilepsy associated with damage to the brain. But musical hallucinations are relatively common, especially in older people, and though they should be checked out, nearly always turn out to be a nuisance, but not necessarily a sign of neurological disease.

# Coverage of Summer Olympics gets under way next Thursday

By BOB REMINGTON

The Summer Olympics begin this week from Seoul, South Korea, and watching them on TV could be an Olympian feat in itself.

Rights-holder NBC will air 179 and a half hours of coverage, beginning with an Olympic preview Thursday, Sept. 15, and the opening ceremonies on Friday, Sept. 16. The Games run for 17 days, ending Sunday, Oct. 2.

The Summer Games (held in the fall due to generally wet summer weather conditions in Korea) will mark the first East-West Summer Olympics confrontation since 1976, due to a U.S. boycott of Moscow in 1980 and an Eastern Bloc boycott of the Los Angeles Games in 1984.

The Games have been tailored to North American TV audiences (NBC's \$300 million rights payment was no doubt a factor), with many events being held in the morning in Seoul, so the Western Hemisphere can receive live TV evening airplay. Bryant Gumbel will host NBC's coverage.

Here's a viewer's guide to the Games, with predictions from experts:

## 'The Boys' is a comedy lacking humor

NEW YORK (AP) — A cast of curmudgeons sitting around in an old-style New York men's club that has just been forced to allow its first female member. This is gonna be good. No such luck.

Showtime's "The Boys," premiering Saturday, is a pilot for a possible series. Based on the first script, a lottery ticket has better odds.

The cast includes Jackie Gayle, Norman Fell, Michael Lerner, Lionel Stander and Norm Crosby. They would be fine, but "The Boys" quickly bogs down in laborious, strained dialogues that go on too long, dragging down the occasional funny line.

At one point, Stander remarks as one of his cohorts gazes out the win-

**TRACK AND FIELD:** In the speed events, the American team could come away with an all-time high medal count, predicts NBC track and field analyst Frank Shorter, who in 1972 became the first American in 64 years to win a gold medal in the marathon. Female sprinter Florence Griffith Joyner, or "Flo-Jo" as she is known in running circles, should be a major medal threat, as will Joe DeLoach and Carl Lewis for the men.

In the distance events, the American team is not expected to do as well. With the exception of Mary Decker Slaney, the United States has "no real prospects" in the long distances, says Shorter.

**GYMNASTICS:** Along with track, this is the glamour TV event. Unfortunately, the United States is entering Seoul in what is euphemistically known as a rebuilding year. Possible hopes for the United States, include Charles Lakes and Phoebe Mills, but the real powers are from the Eastern Bloc.

Soviet Dimitri Bilotzortchev should be a gold-medal contender despite a severe injury three years ago. The Soviets also have what NBC analyst Bart Conner calls "new wave gymnast" Valeri Lyukin, the first person to perform a triple back flip in the floor exercises.

Likely to emerge as the next Nadia Comaneci or Olga Korbut is Romani-

an gymnast Aurelia Dobre, says Conner.

**BASKETBALL:** The perennially strong men's team should win a medal, likely a gold. But the women have their work cut out for them. Several key players, such as Cheryl Miller, have had serious knee injuries, and the team must get through a tough first round without a loss if they hope to get into a probable gold medal matchup against the Soviets, says NBC analyst Nancy Lieberman-Cline.

**SWIMMING:** With the boycotts in 1980 and 1984, it's difficult to predict how the United States stands internationally, says NBC swimming analyst John Naber. The United States probably isn't as strong as it was during the Mark-Spitz heyday of the early '70s, but some names to watch include Matt Biondi, Janet Evans and Mary T. Meagher.

# Older roles are nothing new for Michael Palance of 'Ryan's Hope'

Michael Palance, who plays Rob Rowan in "Ryan's Hope," has always looked older than he is.

When playing football in junior high, a uniform that would fit him had to be obtained from the high school. When he started studying acting at age 15, his classmates were actors in their 20s and older, and no one suspected that Michael was not in their age group. He spent almost a year playing the recurring role of a high-school-senior named Kevin in "The Guiding Light" when he was just 16. Currently, on "Ryan's Hope," Michael is portraying a 23-year-old engaged in a hot flirtation with an older woman.

Michael takes it all in his stride. In fact, he likes exploring characters who are older than he is because it gives him the chance to accumulate experiences that may come in handy when he actually reaches his 20s. Somewhere along the way, he feels, his looks and his age will coincide, and he will be able to play many different roles.

"I didn't really get interested in acting until a friend of my mother's, whose son was doing some modeling, suggested I might try doing the same," Michael says. "When my mother asked me if I was interested, I thought it might be fun. However, I gravitated toward acting, and that's when I knew I had found what I wanted to do."

Michael started taking classes while attending high school. Naturally, his busy schedule called for some personal sacrifices — for instance, he had no time to hang out with his friends — but the teenager was committed.

"I learned a lot about responsibility early in my life. I looked upon the whole experience as a big challenge and I was determined to keep my grades up in school and do my best in acting class. It was tough at times but I made it."

Michael continues studying and has his sights on acting on the New

York stage in the near future.

"I came into acting butt-backward. By that I mean, I trained for the stage but, so far, I've done an educational film about crack, a TV pilot and the soaps. I'm really anxious to step out on stage soon."

Palance, by the way, is Michael's real name. He is not related to actor Jack Palance, whose name was originally Walter Palanuik.

As for playing a character five years older than he is on "Ryan's Hope," Michael likes the range this affords him. He also is grateful that he isn't stuck with playing a TV writer's concept of a teen-ager, noting that most teen-agers on soaps only approximate real life behavior. At least that seems to be the consensus among teen actors plying their trade on the daytime dramas.

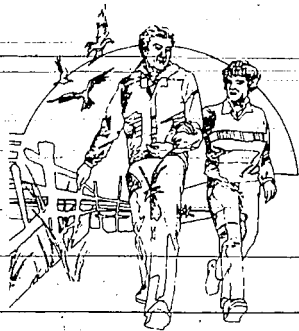

Q: An article about "The Phantom of the Opera" claims that Claude Rains's makeup for the 1943 movie version (that of a hideously deformed madman lurking beneath the stage of the Paris Opera) was the scariest. True? — C.P.

A: If anything, Lon Chaney's skeleton-like face was far more gruesome in the famous silent version film, with women-fainting-in-the-aisles-and-nurses-in-attendance. Claude Rains's personal touch was that he sported a hat incongruously perched atop his half-mask throughout much of the film. Michael Crawford, who plays the title role in the current Broadway musical, wears the half-mask but not the hat.

Q: A French friend writes that the hot romance between Olivier de Havilland's daughter, Gisele Galante, and that big European rock star, Johnny Hallyday, is over. I thought they were getting married this summer. — E.E.

A: The romance is still on, but the wedding is off for the moment. Gisele,

a journalist, had too many writing assignments and Hallyday had a tour scheduled and a French TV series starting next month, so they've delayed the nuptials for a while.

Q: Replaying Barbra Streisand's "The Broadway Album," I suddenly realized she sings some new lyrics for Stephen Sondheim's classic "Send in the Clowns." Is this possible? — B.D.

A: According to the forthcoming second edition of "Sondheim & Co.," written by Craig Zadan, Streisand persuaded Sondheim to rewrite three of his songs for the album, including "Send in the Clowns." 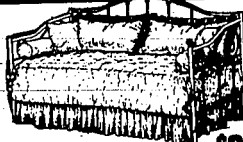

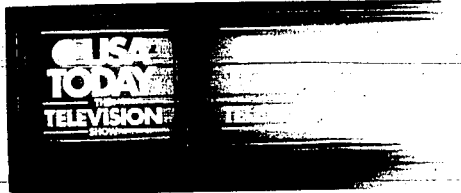

## NBC tops ratings once again

NEW YORK (AP) — ABC and CBS placed a few low-ranked comedies in the top 10 of the A.C. Nielsen Co. ratings, but NBC wound up winning the battle of the comedy reruns for the 11th straight week.

ABC's "Full House," airing two nights a week, came in sixth in the Nielsen ratings for its Tuesday night episode. The episode on Friday, the regular time period, was 40th in the ratings for the week ending Sept. 4.

CBS' "Designing Women" was also in the top 10, tying with two other shows at ninth.

But reruns of NBC's Thursday comedies "A Different World," "Cheers," "The Cosby Show" and "Night Court" were the four top-rated shows. NBC's "Golden Girls" was fifth.

The rest of the top 10 were "Full House," NBC's "L.A. Law" and "Amen," "Blood and Orchids," Part Two on CBS, "Designing

Women" and ABC's "Who's the Boss?"

NBC finished the week with an average, prime-time rating of 11.6. CBS had a 10.8, ABC a 9.3. The network averages for the season that began 50 weeks ago are: NBC 14.5, CBS 12.3 and ABC 12.1.

The "CBS Evening News" regained the lead in the news race with an average rating of 9.8 and a 21 share. "ABC World News Tonight" was second with a 9.4 and 20. "NBC Nightly News" was third with an 8.8 and 19.

The rating is a percentage of the nation's 88.6 million homes with televisions. The share is a percentage of sets in use.

The lowest-rated prime-time shows last week were: "Florida State Vs. Miami," "A Whole Lotta Fun," "Spenser: For Hire," "Not Quite Human, Part One," "Family Ties," "Half and Half," "Deadline," "Further Adventures," "First Impressions" and "Frank's Place."

dow, "You call this rain? In the '40s, THAT was rain." It would be funny if it just blew by, but Stander and Lerner engage in an unfunny follow-up discussion of whether rain is rain or what. Watching rain would be more entertaining.

Then there's the bit where the boys argue the question, Irving Berlin: dead or alive? It's funny — for about two minutes. It becomes virtually a subplot.

The club, pretty obviously based on The Friars Club, is called The Excalibur, so all the members are called "Sir So-and-So," including the one female member, played by Janet Carroll. Oh, hold onto your sides.

Steve Levitt, a kind of young Gene Wilder-type, plays Fell's son and provides the script device that allows the characters to be introduced to the audience. He wanders the club as aimlessly as the script does.

"The Boys" does prove one thing: even top producers, directors and writers — in this case, the creators of "It's Garry Shandling's Show" (not including Garry Shandling) — can ruin a seemingly fail-safe comedy premise.

### On the other hand

If you want to see some real comedy on Saturday, turn to HBO and catch Louie Anderson, that pudgy comic who looks like a cross between Garri-

son Keillor and Roger Ebert.

His style is gentle and his humor is never dirty or mean. But it takes guts to do this kind of comedy special. Unlike the other standups who clutter their cable shows with dumb sketches, Anderson just walks out onto the stage and trusts his act. Part of HBO's "On Location" series, Anderson performs at Chicago's Park West. The special also airs Sept. 14, 18, 23 and 29.

Like Jay Leno and others, Anderson does that kind of inclusive comedy that pokes fun at things all of us can relate to. Anderson is an excellent actor, so his bits turn into one-man sketches.

He can make airline peanuts into a full-blown routine. Or mankind's affection for its jumper cables. Or the plague of shopping mall strollers — "You just want to get to that store over there, and they have their whole life to be in front of you!"

Vacations — "You buy things on vacation you'd never buy otherwise: 'Look, honey. Fresh vegetables!' Other drivers. He blows them away, but only wishes 10 minutes of death on them."

Anderson concludes with a serious comic bit on nuclear war. Afterwards, there would still be standup comedy, but what would be

funny? He doesn't just make fun of war, he has a plan to end it — drop billions of Peanut M&Ms. You can't hold a gun and pick up candy.

## Jonathan Banks laid bare

**Q:** Could you give me some background on Jonathan Banks, who plays Vinnie's boss on "Wiseguy"?

**A:** Banks has appeared in 11 feature films, almost always as a villain. "Even when I was a little kid," he says, "I wanted to be the bad guy — a couple of times I have played a good guy, but it's hard for me to be a straight arrow." Those movie credits include "Beverly Hills Cop," "Stir Crazy," "48 HRS.," "Frances," "Krull" and "Other World." Banks has appeared on 51 television shows and, prior to "Wiseguy," was perhaps best known for portraying mobster Dutch Schultz on "The Gangster Chronicles." Born in Washington D.C., he went to Indiana University, and spent two years as a stage director in Australia and New Zealand.

**Q:** My two daughters and I were wondering about Luis and Maria of

"Sesame Street." Is their romance real — or only for the show?

**A:** Emilio Delgado and Sonia Manzano are actors and their on-camera relationship is just that. In fact, she is married. Incidentally, this "Sesame Street" story line has received more

viewer response and mail to Children's Television Workshop than anything else done on the program in years, from rice for the newlyweds to simple well wishes and even a few (very few) complaints from viewers who think "love" is not a proper theme for the PBS series.

**Q:** Are Rhea Perlman of "Cheers" and Ron Perlman of "Beauty and the Beast" related?

**A:** Publicists for both networks say that they are not related.

**Q:** I just started watching "Dynasty" last year. Will they show it from the beginning when it goes into syndication?

**A:** If the ABC serial goes into syndication, it no doubt will be shown in sequence from the first episode. However, that is a giant "if." "Dynasty" had one season in syndication a few years back and, like "Dallas," the ratings indicated that viewers were not interested in soap opera reruns (the network does not even carry "Dynasty" repeats during the summer). It was pulled after that one season of syndication and there are no plans to syndicate it domestically in the near future. On the other hand, it is a big hit in foreign syndication and is seen in more than 80 countries.
