# Burma's legislature plans free elections

RANGOON, Burma — Parliament on Sunday yielded to weeks of massive nationwide protests and approved holding the first multiparty elections since 1960.

The legislature appointed a group of elders to supervise the polling and set a target date for about three months from Saturday, when President Maung Maung announced the ruling Burma Socialist Program Party would relinquish its 26-year memoply on power.

— Despite—government—encessions, opposition leaders continued to press for an interim government to cope with Burna's growing chaos, and demonstrations continued in the capital.

Maung Maung issued a stern warning to demonstrators, who have taken to the streets by the millions since spring in their light for democracy.

People are now fed up with this lawlessness and are expecting the government to take effective action," Maung Said. "I therefore warn those responsible for the lawlessness to cease such activities." In some areas of Burma, he said, students and Buddhist manks were setting up with local grown weter.

'It is essential to remove them immediately," he said.

He called on demonstrators to get back to work and on civil servants to reactivate the stalled-machinery of government. In addition, he attacked the recent formation of a rival government by former Prime Minister U Nu.

The debates, scheduled for Sept. The George Sept. The Winston-Salem, N.C., and Oct. 13 or 14 in Los Angeles, each will last 90 minutes and feature one moderator and a panel of three questioners, said Lorraine Voles, a spokeswoman for the Democratic nominee.

# Prison population reaches record levels

WASHINGTON — The federal and state prison population grew by 4 percent in the first six months of 1988 to a record 604,824 inmates, with female prisoners increasing at a far higher rate than males, the federal Bureau of Justice Statistics as id Stunday.

The Justice Department agency said the six month increase of 23,240 prisoners would require adding 900 new prison beds every week.

Lawrence Greenfeld, bureau director of correc-

tional statistics, attributed the increase partly to stricter parole supervision, with a higher number of parole violators being returned to prison, and a required use of mandatory minimum sentences for crepeat drug offenses and other serious crimes. The gain in female prisoners reflects a trend toward more frequent drug convictions among women than men, Greenfeld said.

He said the six-month increase in all federal and state prisoners fit the pattern of similar growth in the past two or three years, resulting from revised sentencing guidelines by the states.

The largest percentage increases from Jan. 1 through June 30 occurred in Rhode Island, which reported 17.9 percent more inmates; the District of Columbia had 13.6 percent more, and New Hampshire, 12.8 percent, the bureau said.
California accounted for 22 percent of the nationwide growth in the prison population and housed nearly 12 percent of all federal and state prisoners, the report said.
Another record reported by the bureau was the number of prisoners with sentences of more than one year.—237 per 100.000 U.S. residents.



(AP) — Snow dusted parts of Yellowstone National Park on Sunday, giving firefighters a break in their battle against forest fires and people evacuated from park headquarters and several towns returned home.

Federal officials said they would double the number of soldiers sent to battle the fires that have charred more than a third of the 2.2 million-acre park.

# Bush reportedly changes domestic policies

WASHINGTON — Republican presidential nominee George Bush is preparing to launch a set of domestic-policy initiatives on parental leave and the minimum wage in an effort to steal some thunder from congressional Democrats who have been championing these issues, high-level campaign sources saw.

At a meeting Wednesday at his home with top advisers, including campaign chairman James A. Baker III and chief of staff Craig L. Fuller, the vice

Baker III and chief of staff Craig L. Fuller, the vice president gave his staff the green light to work out details of both proposals, which may be unveiled as soon as this week, the sources said.

Both proposals—increasing the minimum wage with a 'training differential' for youth rand encouraging businesses to allow parents paid or unpsid leave from their jobs for child care—represent shifts from President Reagan's domestic policies of the last seven years, which Bush supported.

Campaign aides said the new proposals also

# Textile protectionism will have to fight another day

Returning to Congress after a three-week break, Northwest senators last week had to roll up their sleeves find get down to business in a hurry.

They led a losing battle against a bill to protect the American textile industry from foreign competition by imposing quotas on imports of clothing, cloth and shoes. On Friday, the Senate passed a measure to light protection, 57-32.

Sen Brock Adams, D-Wash, and others quickly dubbed the measure the "back-to-school tax," although any price hikes for students shoes and socks wouldn't occur? or months. But the bill could cost the Treasury \$346 million next year in lower tariffs.

Adams' state handles more than \$1 billion in trade with China, is home to clothing importers Union Bay and Britania and the headquarters for large exporters Boeing and Weyerhacuser. Adams was one of only a

This is as much a Democratic leadership issue as it is a trade issue, said Peter Friedman, a lobbysts for athletic shee importers Rebok and Avia, a Rebok subsidiary based in Oregon. They're playing to certain union vates in states that have lost textile and footwar jobs, he said. In the 1980s, employment has shrounk by 370,000 to 2 million, although partly because of automation.

Despite the bill's passage, the final showdown on the issue won't come until a vote to override an expected veto by President Reagan.

One big reason why a veto might be upheld is that inexpensive clothing, cloth and shoes with such labels as "Made in Taiwan' have become as popular as Japanese cars. Americans buy more than half their clothing and more than 80 percent of their shoes from abroad. Making up the largest single item in

the trade deficit - \$25 billion or 16 percent last year - textile imports are seen as threatening the future of the U.S. textile industry the way Toyotas once menaced Detroit.

The bill's supporters, including Northwest sheep grodyers and woolen mills, want import quotas, like the 'voluntary' quotas on car exports that Japan has followed since 1981. Under the bill, imports would be frozen at 1987 volume and allowed to grow 1 percent a year. An earlier bill would have cut imports. Another change attempts to soothe farmers' fear of retaliation by offering textile quota increase; to quanties that boest their purchases of U.S. agricultural products. But that failed to persuade many farm groups or farm-state senators, like Idaho's Jim McClure and Steve Symms, to-drop their opposition.



gO as high as 1,532 DHAKA, Bangladesh (AP)— Flood waters began to recede Sunday and the government said it has received \$236 million in aid to fight the destruction and disease caused by the worst floods in memory.

Thousands of lives were threatened by diarrhen caused by drinking water contaminated with sewage and garbage-washed-up-by-raging-floodwaters, health officials asid. More than 200,000 people have contracted the disease and at least-123 have died from it, said the officials, who spoke on condition of anonymity. The disease kills by dehydration.



Behind the locked chain gate, equipped with a buzzer for visitors, is the American National Detention Center for juveniles. Located a few miles east of Jerome, the facility—commonly known as the derome Juvenile Detention Center — recently has entered a transition stage.
The center, like other private juvenile Detention facilities in Idaho, could soon have to meet a new set of requirements of the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare.
The state Board of Health and Welfare will meet the coming week to consider adopting a package of rules and regulations directed at ensuring private juvenile facilities can properly attend to detained youths.

If the rules are adopted, juvenile facilities will have 20 days in which to comply, although delays are possible, said Perry Ackerman, social services coordinator for Health and Welfare officials after Health and Welfare officials after Health and Welfare officials after Health and Welfare officials

The Morrows plan their facility to be a treatment center as well as detention center for juveniles. It would be built on 10 acres of land the

Morrows own adjacent to the now-abandoned state tuberculosis hospital. The Morrows' land includes a 1917 college building that would have

to be removed.

Morrow envisions full-time psychologists and

social workers at the Gooding center, working under up-to-date programs accredited by the American Correction Association, Only 25 beds at the center would be detention beds, he noted, while the other 25 beds would be diagnostic beds. Morrow said he is excited about the involvement of Earl Dunlap, of Louisville, Ky., the current president of the National Detention Association, who has said he will help set up the center's programs and has said he may be interested in taking the administrator post.

The Morrows would run the business end of the operation.

The four pleaded guilty under a plea bargain gargement Wednesday to charges they planned bombings, robberies and other crimes to further their white aupremacist cause.

The murder charge was included in the original 16-count indictment against the four, but was deleted by federal prosecutors.



# THE ACES ON BRIDGE BOBBY WOLFF

"Nothing is more admirable than the fortitude with which million-aires tolerate the disadvantages of their wealth."

All declarers start out as million-aires in today's deal. However, only those who manage their wealth wisely end up taking 10 trieks. Dummy's heart jack loses, to East's queen and East accurately returns a trump. What is South's plan?

If he wins his trump ace to lead another heart in a futile try for a heart ruff, East wins and leads an-other trump. South wins and tries the diamonds. Three rounds of dia-monds take care of one heart loser

the diamonds. Three rounds of diamonds take care of one heart loser but the hand collapses. West ruffs the diamond with his high trump and cashes a fourth heart to beat the game by one trick.

A much better line of play is to duck East's trump return at trick two. This paralyres the defenders, since they cannot cash hearts and remove dummy's trump at the same time. If West returns a trump. South wins, draws the last trump and claims the remaining tricks. If west leads hearts. East wins his cac het dummy's remaining trump puts the brakes on defensive hopes in that quit.

When you have an unavoidable trump loser, often it's best to lose it immediately so that you can retain control of the suit.

TWIN FALLS — The line-up of home-testing devices on your pharmacist's shelf is evidence that self-acre has gone high-tech. Not too many years ago, the consumer's trust in self-diagnosis rest-ed on the thermometer. Oral or rectal, the cold glass tube (if used and read accurately) would tell of any significant change in body temperature: a clue that something is wrong.

Today, our ability to monitor our health — even diagnose our ils—has improved dramatically, giving us an even greater role and responsibility for our own health. Diabetes testing

About 40 years ago, urinalysis became a widely used home-test procedure for persons with disbetes. Resgent strips indicated the amount of sugar or ketones in urine sample, thus enabling diabetics to monitor their own blood sugar.

Now home urinalysis is a "thing of the past," says Tim Clezie, pharmacist at K-Mart, Twin Falls. In the past decade, persons with disbetes have come to rely on whole blood testing methods, using "chem strips" with or without a blood gluesse monitor machine. Using either method of blood testing produces results that are far more accurate than urinalysis, providing nearly instant measurements of blood sugar levels.



Be careful of products that claim to offer a "cure."
Since federal law prohibits use of the FDA's name

The term 'natural ingredients' should not be given too much importance. The term often is abused and definition of 'natural' is clusive.



Do you know the difference between overweight and obese? If you don't, you have company Many doctors and health professionals incorrectly use the terms inter-changeably. But what is the difference? And what difference does it make?

Technically speaking, "overweight" refers to an excess of body weight for Technically speaking, overveing refers to an excess of body weight for height, according to some standards, such as the Metropolitan Life Insurance—tables—that—for decades—have a body harameter. "Obe-




