## House drug bill could face constitutional tests

WASHINGTON — The House on Thursday passed election year anti-drug legislation that would severely punish recreational users and murderers alike, but it could face constitutional tests if enacted into law. The 375-30 vote is not the final word on Congress' latest effort to respond to Americans' fears over drug abuse. The Senate still must consider its own anti-drug legislation, and a conference will likely be needed to reconcile competing versions. Despite constitutional concerns, even by sponsors, the tug of election-year politics was so strong that House members appeared willing to enact the toughest possible bill and let

the courts decide the legal questions later. The bill received support from 207 Democrats and 168 Republicans, while all 30 votes against the legislation came from Democrats, virtually all of them liberals. The legislation pursues many avenues of combating illegal drugs, and would authorize the addition of more than \$2 billion in spending to the nation's current \$3.9 billion anti-drug effort. The amount could be a factor if overall spending levels force across-the-board, automatic budget cuts. This bill is distinguished from past anti-drug legislation by its so-called "user accountability" provisions — measures that say even the smallest amount of drug use or possession will not be tolerated.

Drug users would be subject to \$10,000 civil penalties per violation for mere possession; would be ineligible for student loans, public housing and other federal benefits; and would face loss of their right to drive, if states enforce license suspension programs to obtain more federal highway money. For those who kill during a drug-related crime, the legislation contains legal procedures designed to permit use of the federal death penalty. But the legislation does not ignore education, treatment, and rehabilitation for drug abusers, authorizing more money to the states for such programs. Federal and local law enforcement agencies would receive more money.

"We took a lot of provisions of dubious constitutionality," said Rep. William J. Hughes, D-N.J., and chairman of the House Judiciary subcommittee on crime. Hughes said he hoped lawmakers could "clean up" some of the language in a House-Senate conference. The Democratic floor manager, Rep. Charles Rangel, D-N.Y., said that while the bill is flawed, "at least all of us can go home" and say, "We responded to our constituents and the nation. We have made some effort to address the problem as Republicans and Democrats and we have set our labels behind us." President Reagan, asked upon arrival in Houston whether he was pleased by the passage of the bill, smiled and said, "Yes."

Rep. Don Edwards, D-Calif., chairman of the House civil rights subcommittee, expressed liberals' concerns that lawmakers wanted a drug bill so badly that they attacked the Constitution along with illegal narcotics. "If this bill becomes law, Americans will be less free," he said. "I doubt whether any of the amendments adopted over the past several weeks will make any difference in the so-called war on drugs." "But I do know they will cut back on the freedoms of the American people. Drug legislation plus election year posturing equals an assault on the Constitution," Edwards said. ## Gem wheat prices reach 5-year peak

BOISE — Idaho wheat prices continued to surge in August, hitting their highest level in over five years. And while drought has significantly reduced national wheat production, halving the spring wheat harvest from a year ago, the Agriculture Department forecast the Idaho wheat crop at 78.4 million bushels. That was down from last year's record crop, but it would still be the eighth best harvest, ever for the state's number-two cash crop, providing producers with the quantities of grain needed to take advantage of spiraling prices. In other markets, drought conditions kept pushing prices higher for alfalfa hay and dried beans, and potato prices continued their slow recovery while the cattle market seemed to show some new strength after slumping over the summer. Preliminary government estimates put wheat prices in Idaho last month at an average of \$3.67 a bushel, up another four cents from July and nearly \$1.40 higher than a year ago.

It was the highest monthly average price for wheat since the market stood at \$3.75 in June 1983. The outlook for Idaho's spring wheat harvest improved from August to September as government analysts boosted their projection by more than a million bushels to 24.7 million. That was down just 3 percent from last year as harvested acreage was slashed to its second lowest total in 15 years due to participation in government land-idling programs. The average yield for spring wheat was put at 65 bushels an acre, the fifth highest on record. Barley prices remained above \$2.50 a bushel although they slipped eight cents from the August average, and while total production has dropped to an estimated 55.3 million bushels, mainly due to significant participation in land-idling programs, the average yield of 65 bushels an acre would be the fourth best ever. The dried bean market picked up ground for the seventh straight month to break the \$24-a-hundred. • See PRICES on Page A2

## Soviets propose cuts in long-range weapons

WASHINGTON — With the Reagan administration's time running out, Soviet General Secretary Mikhail S. Gorbachev sought Thursday to give new momentum to arms control efforts by presenting the United States with a broad range of proposals to sharply reduce long-range nuclear weapons. Although senior U.S. officials have virtually abandoned hopes for cut-backs in missiles, bombers and submarines of 30 percent to 50 percent as part of a new treaty, Gorbachev sent Foreign Minister Eduard A. Shevardnadze here with suggestions for clearing two of the main roadblocks. In addition, Gorbachev proposed in

advance of Shevardnadze's visit that the two sides agree to adopt interim limits on the warheads that could be carried by U.S. and Soviet long-range missiles, a U.S. official said. These would include a maximum of 10 warheads on American MX and Minuteman III missiles, 8 warheads on the submarine-launched Poseidon and 10 warheads on the SS20 and SS16 missiles, said the official, who spoke on condition of anonymity. The limitations were set as goals by the two sides at the Reagan-Gorbachev summit meeting here last December. While the United States was willing to discuss the proposal, it would want to make certain that any agreement could be monitored effectively.

## Study shows student science proficiency low

A national report card on science education shows a majority of 9-, 13- and 17-year-olds have not had strong enough training in science to do well in college. Despite five years of raised standards, improved teacher training and expanded research into science teaching, "average science proficiency across the grades remains distressingly low," according to the findings issued in Washington Thursday. The study found that only 7 percent of the 17-year-olds

appeared ready for college-level science courses. Between 1969 and 1986, performance of all three age groups on science tests showed declines, followed by slight improvement, which was not yet balanced the drop. Based on assessment testing in 1986, the Science Report Card found a gender gap between males and females with boys doing better in chemistry, earth and space sciences and particularly in physics. Approximately one-half of the 17-year-old males but only one-third of the females demon-

strated the ability to analyze scientific procedures and data," said Ina V.S. Mullis, deputy director of the Nation's Report Card and a co-author of the science study. The study also found a serious gap between the performance of white students and of blacks and Hispanics. In 1986, according to the report card, 13-year-old blacks and Hispanics did not do as well as 9-year-old whites. Nearly half the 13-year-olds lack an understanding of the basic elements of science, according to. • See SCIENCE on Page A2

## Minimum wage filibuster goes on

WASHINGTON — Senate Democrats failed Thursday to break a Republican filibuster of a bill clouded in presidential politics to raise the \$3.35 an hour minimum wage for the first time since 1981. On a 63-43 vote — seven short of the 60 needed — the Senate refused to limit to 30 more hours debate on legislation by Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., to raise the wage floor to \$3.75 in January, \$4.15 in 1990 and \$4.55 in 1991. "It's only clear that there is a deliberate attempt to stall action on this bill," said Majority Leader Robert C. Byrd, D-W.Va., who called the Republican tactics a filibuster. Sen. Orrin Hatch, R-Utah, the leader of the Republican opposition to any increase in the minimum wage that does not include a submini-

mum wage for new hires, said the issue needs extended debate. "I know a little bit about filibustering and I've certainly led my share around here," Hatch said. "But I only lead them on very, very important issues where we really have to have extended debate or what I would call extended educational dialogue. This particular bill needs a lot of that." Hatch a week ago introduced the first Republican amendment in the debate — a 90-day, 80 percent subminimum wage applicable to all new hires. As a parliamentary tactic, Kennedy immediately offered a substitute amendment slightly expanding a currently allowed but little used 85 percent subminimum wage for full-time students who work no more than 20 hours a week. Since then, there have been no votes in five days of debate.

Under the Senate's rules, approval of Kennedy's substitute would effectively kill what Republicans call a subminimum training wage that President Reagan and Vice President George Bush have coupled to their approval of any increase in the \$3.35 wage floor. "We're not going to get a fair hearing on the training wage because the labor leaders don't want it," said Senate Republican Leader Bob Dole of Kansas. "It's not the Republicans versus the Democrats; it's the Republicans versus the labor leaders. They're telling us we can take this or leave it; we're not going to play that game." Byrd scheduled a second cloture vote for Friday in an effort to break the logjam amid indications that some of the support for the filibuster may be waning. "We may not be successful tomorrow, but we're going to try," Dole said.

## Wright denies leaking secret CIA activity info

WASHINGTON — Trying to mute White House criticism and a Republican call for congressional investigations, House Speaker Jim Wright Thursday vehemently denied leaking classified information about the CIA's activities in Nicaragua. Wright refused to back off his disclosure Tuesday that the CIA has sponsored and organized protests to provoke the leftist Nicaraguan government. But he told reporters that his statement was based on public testimony and news accounts — not secret documents or briefings. "I didn't say anything that was revealed to me as classified information," Wright, D-Texas, said. Asked about criticism from Reagan and top administration officials, Wright responded, "They didn't dispute the truth of what I said, did they?"

Nicaraguan President Daniel Ortega and critics of the Reagan administration have long suspected that the CIA may have been behind continuing anti-government protests in Nicaragua. Wright said Tuesday that there had been "clear testimony from CIA people" that they had "deliberately done things to provoke overreaction on the part of the Marxist-led government in Nicaragua." It marked the first time a U.S. official appeared to have proof of the covert activity. Since then, Wright has offered no detailed evidence or recent documentation to back his claim and the administration has refused to confirm or deny the report. House and Senate Republicans moved to deflect attention from the White House's overt. • See WRIGHT on Page A2

# Rhetoric sharpens as initial Dukakis-Bush debate draws near

Republican George Bush touted his endorsement by Michael Dukakis' hometown police union Thursday, prompting Dukakis to air offends and accuse his rival of "assault and battery on the truth."

"What George Bush is doing in the truth in this campaign is a crime," the Democratic presidential nominee said in perhaps his strongest attack on Bush to date. His administration has waged not a war on crime, but a war on crime programs."

The sharp rhetoric came three days before Dukakis and Bush were to face each other in the first of their two nationally televised debates — confrontations that both sides considered crucial.

The bipartisan commission on de-

bates announced Thursday that Jim Lehrer of public television's MacNeil/Lehrer Newshour would be moderator Sunday in Winston-Salem, N.C., and panelists would be Peter Jennings of ABC News, Anne Groh of the Orlando Sentinel and John Mashek of the Atlanta Constitution.

And an NBC News-Wall Street Journal poll released Thursday showed Bush and Dukakis essentially tied, with Bush's 45-41 lead softened by a 2-point margin of error. The lead for Bush was lower than the 47-40 recorded for Bush last month, and the survey of 2,630 likely voters found he had lost support among Reagan Democrats, going from 35 percent to 25 percent.

Furthermore, Sen. Dan Quayle was a bad choice to be Bush's running mate.

In other aides said their campaign will spend a modern record on television advertising. The campaign plans to spend 60 percent of its \$54 million budget — or \$32.4 million — on television ads.

Bush chief of staff Craig Fuller said Bush complained to a high-level Pentagon official about drug-money laundering during a visit five years ago. But Fuller said Bush did not discuss it with Panama strongman Gen. Manuel Antonio Noriega.

He commented on a British television documentary quoting a former senior aide to Noriega as saying Bush had complained to Noriega about money laundering. That assertion is the counter to Bush's contention that the Reagan administration took action against Noriega as soon as it

learned of alleged drug activity. Meanwhile, President Reagan was back on the campaign trail for his vice president in Texas, scolding "born-again George Pattons" who say they support a strong national defense. It was an apparent reference to Dukakis, who spent last week sounding hawkish as he laid out his defense policies and rode in a modern M-1 tank.

Reagan spoke to students at Baylor University in Waco, then was joined by Bush at a big fund-raising dinner in Houston.

Bush also stressed defense issues and hinted that the administration was on the verge of unveiling a new strategy for the defense of Europe with conventional weaponry. Without offering specifics, Bush said that what he called the "Com-

petitive Strategies Initiative" would be "based on the idea of putting our strengths against our competitor's weaknesses." Dukakis has offered what a "conventional defense initiative" to emphasize the Reagan administration's focus on Star Wars.

Bush traveled to Boston to pick up the endorsement of the Boston Police Patrolman's Association, a 1,500 member union.

"I'm the one in this race who wants to strengthen law enforcement," declared Bush. "My opponent is strongly out of the American mainstream on issues such as fighting crime."

law enforcement needs than would the Massachusetts governor. Robert T. Guiney, president of the association, called Dukakis' no position of police. He cited Dukakis' opposition to the death penalty, his support for a former program granting work release for convicted felons, and Dukakis' failure to attend funerals for three police officers recently.

The visit was Bush's second to Boston as the Republican presidential nominee. Earlier this month he denounced Dukakis for failing to clean up pollution in Boston Harbor.

weight level for the first time in seven years. Drought, however, cut the estimated average yield to 1,750 pounds, the third lowest level of the decade, and coupled with reduced acreage the total state harvest will fall under 200 million pounds for only the second time in 15 years. Potato prices picked up 40 cents a

hundredweight to pull within a dime of \$4 a hundredweight, a level the market has not seen for a year. The drought pushed alfalfa hay up another \$6 a ton to \$72, the highest price in two years, and ranchers, who need that hay for supplemental feed, found beef prices beginning to recover from a summer slide. Beef market indexes were rela-

tively small over the month, but calf prices pushed back up over \$80 a hundredweight after losing \$14 a hundredweight between March and July. Lamb producers continued to suffer, however, as their market dropped another \$3 to fall to \$55.10 a hundredweight, the lowest monthly average in more than four years.

## U.S. denies charge

WASHINGTON (AP) — The State Department on Thursday denied charges that the administration blocked visas for most Nicaraguan officials who had wanted to attend the U.N. General Assembly starting next week, but Nicaraguan President Daniel Ortega canceled his trip because of visa problems. State Department spokesman Charles Redman had said earlier Thursday that U.S. officials normally require 15 working days for processing Nicaraguan visa applications but that the Sandinista officials made the request on Sept. 13 for a Sept. 24 arrival in New York.

Language that would permit admission of illegally seized evidence in federal cases if officers acted in the "good faith belief" they were acting lawfully. The death penalty provision, commenting, if current practice in the states is any guide, that power will be exercised in a racially discriminatory manner. The language also includes a minimum 20-year sentence. The denial of federal assistance to "the poor and the addicted" by making ineligible for student loans, public housing and other benefits for law drug convictions. Veterans' benefits could be denied for drug distribution conviction that resulted in a one-year prison term; and retirement, welfare, health and disability assistance of all types would be eliminated. The civil penalties of \$10,000 per violation for any possession of illegal

drugs, which would require only "clear and convincing" proof rather than the "beyond a reasonable doubt" standard in criminal cases. The provision lacks "the procedural protections guaranteed by the Bill of Rights," Edwards said. The bill originally included a seven-day waiting period for handgun purchases, but the provision was stricken after a lobbying battle in which the National Rifle Association bested a coalition of gun control and law enforcement groups. The House substituted a requirement for the Justice Department to develop a program that would allow gun dealers to identify convicted felons trying to buy handguns. The bill also includes innovations. For the first time, there would be strict controls over the manufacture, distribution, import and export of chemicals used by clandestine laboratories to make illegal drugs.

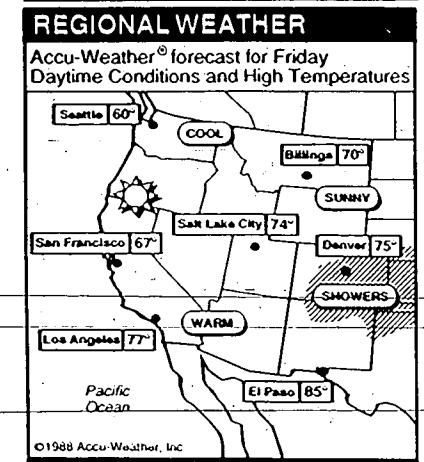
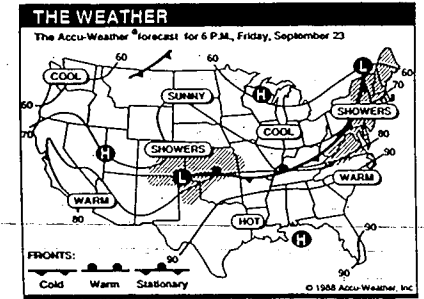

These findings, while nearly 20 percent of the 17-year-olds cannot interpret data from simple tables or draw conclusions from the outcome of experiments, among other shortcomings virtually unchanged for almost a decade, said Archie LaPointe, executive director of the National Assessment of Educational Progress, which produces the report cards as part of a congressional mandate. These findings are additional evidence that American students are falling behind, the report said. The second international science assessment revealed that students from the United States — particularly students completing high school — are among the lowest achievers of all participating countries, said the report. Further, advanced U.S. high school students ranked last in biology and did more poorly than those from most countries in chemistry and physics, the international report said. Part of the reason, the report card said, is the relatively small amount of time spent on science in the classroom and on homework.

activities in Nicaragua to the speaker's remarks. At his briefing Thursday, Wright said CIA activities in Nicaragua have been documented in news stories. He said he learned in August 1987 that elements of the United States government became involved in destabilizing or fomenting disruptions to provide an excuse for withdrawing from the peace process in Nicaragua. That seemed to me to be intolerably two-faced and I said so to our officials. House Republican leaders, frustrated by attempts to win more U.S. military aid for the Contras, quickly seized the opportunity to criticize Wright. They called for investigations by both the intelligence and ethics committees, which polices non-disclosure rules for members. Sen. William Cohen, R-Maine, vice chairman of the Senate Intelligence Committee and a sponsor of legislation to tighten legislative control of the CIA's secret activities, said Wright owes his colleagues and the American people an explanation. The clear implication... is that the speaker's statement could only have been derived from classified information in the possession of the House Intelligence Committee, Cohen said. But House Democrats countered with their own charges, insisting the spotlight should be on Reagan's policies, not Wright's remarks. The issue is overthrowing governments and going into the lands of this Constitution and not living up to the democratic standards which this body represents, Rep. David Bonior, D-Mich., told the House. Rep. Ronald Coleman, D-Texas, called for a House Intelligence Committee investigation of the CIA's secret activities in Nicaragua. The Republicans are trying to divert media and public attention from what Reagan did by blaming the speaker for what has been reported in Nicaragua, Coleman said. The real issue here is whether Ronald Reagan was breaking the law again in Nicaragua.

**Man charged in August murder, rape**

**ST. ANTHONY (AP)** — A convicted robber has been charged with the August kidnap, rape and murder of an Ohio woman in eastern Idaho.

Thomas Steven Wilson, 36, of Massachusetts, was scheduled for arraignment Friday on charges of first-degree murder, first-degree kidnapping and rape in connection with the slaying of Christine Warnick, 36, of Powell, Ohio.

Wilson, whom authorities said was also known as James Palladino, Vincent Dobeblie and Vincent Martinelli, was being held in the Payette County Jail in southwestern Idaho pending his transfer to the eastern part of the state.

The murder warrant was issued by Fremont County Magistrate Jerry Reynolds after Wilson was sentenced on Wednesday to 60 years in the Idaho State Prison for a series of burglaries and robberies in southwestern Idaho.

**U of I search methods are questioned**

**MOSCOW (AP)** — Some members of a committee seeking a successor to University of Idaho President Richard Gibb have questioned the state Board of Education's emphasis on hiring a "team player."

Committee members met Wednesday in Moscow for a briefing on their role in finding a successor for Gibb, 59, who will retire next June to return to teaching.

The term "team player" is used in published advertisements for the president's position at the University of Idaho, as well as on the applicant evaluation form to be used by the committee.

But some committee members said Wednesday there is an argument to be made for the president being a strong advocate for the Moscow school and its programs.

**McCall schools to meet NASA leaders**

**MCCALL (AP)** — McCall-Donnelly School District students and parents will get to meet with a National Aeronautics and Space Administration official next week as their superintendent heads to Florida to watch the long-awaited launch of the space shuttle Discovery.

Greg Vogt, a NASA aerospace educational specialist based at Oklahoma State University, said his visit is NASA's way of thanking the McCall-Donnelly district for all the time elementary school teacher Barbara Morgan has to spend away from home in the Teachers in Space program.

Mrs. Morgan was the alternate to Christa McAuliffe, the New Hampshire high school teacher who died in the January 1986 explosion of the space shuttle Challenger.

"We want to show people we care about them," Vogt said. "We take something special from them and we wanted to give something back."

**Mountain Home recall vote set for Oct. 13**

**MOUNTAIN HOME (AP)** — A recall vote for three Mountain Home school trustees will go ahead as scheduled Oct. 13 after a judge's decision not to block the election pending an appeal.

Kenneth Nyman, attorney for trustees Dwain Mooso, David Humphreys and Mary Fran Aguire, said Wednesday that 4th District Judge George Carey decided there was no need to put the election on hold.

Nyman had asked that Carey rule on his appeal before the election.

"There is no overriding reason to prevent the voters from exercising their franchise at this time," Carey wrote in his decision. "If it later appears the election was permitted to proceed erroneously, the error then may be cured."

It's now possible an election could be held and later deemed null and void by Carey if he upholds the ap-

peal after Oct. 13, Nyman said.

Nyman said the only way the election could be postponed would be if Carey reconsiders the decision in light of a recent ruling in Moscow.

Second District Judge John Bengston ruled last week that Idaho law for recalling school board members is unconstitutional because it requires petitioners to state specific reasons for wanting to remove officials. The ruling stems from a nine-day teachers' strike in Moscow last fall.

Meanwhile, 4th District Judge Cathy Naugle ruled in July that the statute was constitutional when she authorized the Mountain Home recall election.

"I'm asking Judge Carey to take a look at the Moscow decision, but it's getting so late," Nyman said. "Unless Judge Carey tries to resolve the inconsistency, the election will go forward."

Two separate recall efforts resulted from last May's 12-day Mountain Home teachers' strike. One faction believes the school board members were too easy on the striking teachers and another contends the trustees failed to negotiate with teachers in good faith.

## Could Bush, having changed tactics, be political messiah?

George Bush overcame Michael Dukakis' huge lead in the polls by listening to his critics, concluding they were correct and changing his behavior accordingly.

Ever since Bush locked up the GOP nomination, conservative activists have been urging him to define his vision for America, to draw a sharp ideological distinction between Dukakis and himself, to give the troops something to fight for. Since 1964, no clearly liberal Democrat has received more than 43 percent of the vote in a national election.

Yet for months, Bush played on Dukakis' turf. He seemed to be saying, "Hey, I'm a liberal, too." He literally saluted Jesse Jackson. He visited day-care centers. He floated the names of half the remaining liberal Republicans in the universe as potential running mates.

Meanwhile, he allowed Dukakis to paint himself as a centrist, a pragmatic problem-solver. Dukakis may have been a member of the American Civil Liberties Union for 35 years and a liberal even by the standards of the most liberal state in the nation, but

his image, like that of many American immigrants, was more children than the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Some conservative activists were planning to sit out the election; others suggested that it might be better to lose the election than have Bush in the White House. In the polls, Bush was losing, badly.

The crucial moment may have come when Dukakis declared in his acceptance speech: "This election isn't about ideology. It's about competence." At that point, even the moderates advising Bush realized that the conservatives were right — that Dukakis wins unless the election is about ideology.

Shortly before the Republican National Convention, Bush turned things around:

"His operatives drew up a platform that was, like the 1984 platform, a statement of principles dear to the heart of longtime Reaganites.

•Prime time at the podium was given to the likes of Jack Kemp, Jeanne Kirkpatrick and Pat Robertson. Even liberal speakers such as Gov. Tom Keane of New Jersey were made to sound like conservatives.

•Bush selected a running mate fully acceptable to conservatives on ideological grounds.

•Bush's acceptance speech — his long-awaited definition of his vision for America — could have been delivered, with few changes, by Reagan himself.

Conservatives were galvanized by

the new approach on issues ranging from Star Wars and gun control to the Pledge of Allegiance. Suddenly, they saw the prospect of another classic left-right confrontation, and suddenly Bush was their man.

Some commentators called Bush's message "Reaganism with a human face," conservatism with its edges softened. They are wrong. Instead of moderating the conservative message, Bush sharpened it.

Making polluters pay for their damage to the environment or treating bigots and influence peddlers with the

scorn they deserve — these ideas are not a repudiation of conservatism, but an elaboration of it. When the vice president says that prosperity brings with it a personal responsibility to care for the unfortunate, or that we must prove our unwavering support for women who have unwanted pregnancies even as we work to save their unborn children, he is taking conservatism to its next stage: as a moral force.

After all the years he spent hanging around with moderate Republicans, the kind who believe that political dif-

ferences are more of style than substance, is it possible that George Bush will usher in an era of conservatism around the world, that he will be the revolutionary Ronald Reagan never was?

Reagan as a John the Baptist, with Bush as the political messiah? Even skeptics like me can hope.

How can he claim that he will vote for the farmers' interests and say that he is running on his good record in the Idaho Senate. He certainly wasn't for the farmers and ranchers of Idaho. I think we should keep Richard Stallings in Congress. He is a proven friend of farmers.

**Racial riot unavoidable, leader says**

SHREVEPORT, La. (AP) — Decades of racism and black unemployment made it inevitable that Shreveport would see an outbreak of violence like this week's rock-throwing and arson after the killing of a black man, a civil-rights leader says.

"Shreveport's been dodging the bullet for 25 years," said Larry English of the local NAACP chapter.

The violence Tuesday and Wednesday nights, set off when a white woman shot a black man, was confined to a few blocks in Cedar Grove, a mostly residential neighborhood of modest houses and small businesses about six miles from downtown.

Police spokeswoman Cindy Chadwick said no problems were reported in Cedar Grove after dozens of heavily armed Special Response Team officers left the area early Thursday.

Police took down roadblocks that sealed off the area for about four hours Wednesday night, but Chadwick said beefed up patrols were ready to seal off the area again if violence resumed.

Black leaders said another factor was anger over the killing of a black teen-ager by a white teen-ager at a restaurant last month.

**Ex-Mexican officer guilty of murder**

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A former Mexican policeman was found guilty Thursday of the 1985 kidnap and torture murder of a U.S. drug agent, a slaying he once described to an undercover officer as "a mistake."

Raul Lopez Alvarez, 28, was convicted of killing Drug Enforcement Administration agent Enrique Camarena and his pilot, Alfredo Zavala Avelar.

Rene Verdugo-Urquidez, 36, an admitted drug trafficker, also is charged with Camarena's murder; and Jesus Felix Gutierrez, 38, is charged with helping drug baron Rafael Caro Quintero escape from Mexico after masterminding Camarena's murder.

**Leaders blame fares on deregulation**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Members of a Senate committee on Thursday faulted airline deregulation for raising airfares for many Americans and leaving some cities dominated by carriers that control local air service.

But Transportation Secretary Jim Burnley told the Senate Commerce Committee that even though "the airline industry has its flaws," nearly 10 years of deregulation has benefited most travelers.

"Overall the airline industry has become much more competitive as to price and service as a result of economic deregulation," Burnley told the legislators.

Burnley cited statistics showing that since 1978, domestic air traffic has grown from 275 million passengers to more than 450 million, while average fares have declined 13 percent, adjusted for inflation.

**Corporate non-taxpayers decreased**

WASHINGTON (AP) — The number of giant profitable corporations that legally paid no federal income tax was cut by more than half last year, according to a new study, but backers of the landmark 1986 tax overhaul said Thursday the figure may never drop to zero.

Sixteen of 250 profitable companies surveyed by Citizens for Tax Justice were able to wipe out their entire federal liability, down from 40 in 1986 and 72 in 1982, according to Citizens for Tax Justice, a Washington-based research group funded by unions, churches and social groups. Some of the 16 disputed the report.

Citizens for Tax Justice said most of the change was caused by the sweeping law enacted in 1986, which reduced or removed several individual and corporate deductions and credits while cutting tax rates.

**Man goes on shooting spree; kills 4, self**

CHICAGO (AP) — A man with a grudge shot and killed two people Thursday at a school for troubled boys, where he killed two more people, including a police officer, before being shot dead himself, police said.

Two people were wounded, including a second police officer, authorities said.

The rampage began when a heavily armed man fatally shot two workers at the Comet Auto Parts store, police Commander James Maurer said.

"It appears to be somebody who has a grudge," the commander said. "We have plenty of witnesses."

One store worker died with a pen in one hand and a telephone in the other as he took an order, Maurer said.

After leaving the store, the gunman "wound up in the school," Maurer said. "He shot two police officers and two others."

"We had a shootout," said Thelma Catto, a payroll clerk at the Montefiore School, a public school for about 135 troubled youngsters. "Right now my office is a pool of blood."

Ms. Catto said she heard shots and ducked under her desk. One school employee, whom she

would only describe as a custodian, was shot and came into her office.

The Rev. C. Ferguson, who lives near the school, said he saw the gunman after he left the auto parts store and headed toward the school.

"He said, 'Get out of the way, don't nobody move,'" Ferguson said.

The two police officers who were shot at the school were assigned to the Police Department youth division and were at the school "on a routine stop," said Maurer.

Maurer said the gunman apparently lived across the street from the school in a dilapidated house.

**Reagan calls shuttle crew heroes before new launch**

HOUSTON (AP) — Seven days before the U.S. hopes to return to manned space flight, President Reagan lauded the "seven heroes" of the Challenger on Thursday and pledged, "You can delay our long trek to greatness, but you cannot halt it."

Returning to the scene of one of his most emotional times as president, Reagan told workers at the Johnson Space Center.

"Soon the world will be watching as five brave Americans lift off from Earth. America is going to space again — and we are going there to stay."

Two days after the Challenger blew apart on Jan. 28, 1986, little more than a minute after liftoff, Reagan went to the Johnson Space Center to console the relatives and friends of the seven crew members who died.

America's "worst" space tragedy shook the nation and threw the space program into disarray.

In a speech prepared for delivery to NASA employees a week before Discovery's blast-off, Reagan said, "Our early settlers knew great risks and made great sacrifices, but with their sacrifices, they moved the frontier forward and built a great nation."

"Neither can we stand still, nor be content and we are not afraid," Reagan said. "Ill fortunes can slow us down, but it cannot stop us."

Reagan's itinerary at the sprawling space center with more than 8,000 employees included a greeting to the five Discovery crewmen: commander Frederick Hawk, co-pilot Richard Covey and mission specialists John Lounge, George "Pinky" Nelson and David Hilmer.

**Bush to spend \$32 million on ads**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Vice President George Bush's plan to spend a record amount on TV advertising continues a trend toward presidential campaign budgets dominated by paid media expenditures, political analysts said Thursday.

Four years ago, Democratic nominee Walter Mondale spent more than \$20 million on media and President Reagan spent about \$25 million.

This fall, Vice President George Bush expects to mount a \$32 million-plus TV blitz. That is at least 60 percent of the combined \$54 million that the candidate and his national party

can spend directly.

Mark Garman, a spokesman for Massachusetts Gov. Michael Dukakis, the Democratic nominee, said Dukakis would be competitive on the airwaves.

Both are relying on their parties to raise tens of millions of dollars in unrestricted "soft money" for political activities at the state and national levels.

# Lebanon's army commander to head new military government

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Lebanon's army commander will be the prime minister of a six-man military government, President Amin Gemayel said in a decree issued in the last minutes of his presidency Thursday.

Gemayel's stunning choice of a military Cabinet, led by army commander Gen. Michel Aoun, came after

civilian Moslems refused to take part in an interim Cabinet headed by a Maronite Catholic premier.

Gemayel, 45, had to name a transition government because the deeply divided Parliament failed to choose a new president Thursday. The constitution bars Gemayel from seeking another presidential term.

Earlier Gemayel was trying to

form a civilian government under business tycoon Pierre Helou, 60, a Maronite Catholic who is a Parliament deputy.

The shift to a military Cabinet appeared aimed at heading off the formation of two governments, one Christian and one Moslem, that would have further cemented the sectarian cantons that have formed dur-

ing a 13-year civil war that has left more than 150,000 dead.

The decrees appointing the Cabinet members, who represent the six main sects in Lebanon, came five minutes before Gemayel's presidency expired at midnight (5 p.m. EDT).

Also Thursday, Moslems and Christians clashed around the dividing Green Line, and three top com-

manders of Amal, the main Shiite Moslem militia, were assassinated.

Aoun, the Maronite army commander, and his five ministers will continue serving as the army's Supreme Defense Council, which controls Lebanon's military. The decrees, ef-

fective immediately, also named Aoun as defense and information minister.

"I leave the presidency today worried and filled with anxiety," Gemayel told the nation in a televised farewell address.

## Briefly

### Iran begins mine-clearing operation

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP) — The Iranian navy began mine-clearing operations in the Persian Gulf on Thursday, Iran's official news agency reported as Iran marked the eighth anniversary of Iraq's invasion.

The Islamic Republic News Agency, monitored in Nicosia, quoted the unidentified commander of Iran's naval mine sweepers as saying that helicopters and frogmen also were involved in the mine-clearing.

When Iran's naval commander, Rear Adm. Mohammad-Hussein Malekzadeh, announced last week that his forces would begin mine-clearing operations, a U.S. official said that was "tantamount to admitting that they laid the mines" during the 8-year-old war.

Iran has never admitted it laid mines in the waterway's shipping lane, but said it did so in its coastal waters for defense. But Tehran boasted last year that it could sow mines "like seeds" in the gulf.

U.S. Navy officers estimate that as many as 200 mines, mainly contact-type devices moored to the seabed, are still in the gulf. Most are believed to be in shallow waters of the Iraqi coast in the northern end of the gulf.

### Soviets send troops to end dispute

MOSCOW (AP) — Tanks and troops rolled Thursday into two Soviet republics where protesters attacked a prosecutor's office, rallied by the thousands and staged strikes in an escalating ethnic dispute.

Authorities imposed a curfew in Stepanakert, the main city of the Nagorno-Karabakh region, the center of the dispute between Armenians and Azerbaijanis.

Armenians who want the area to secede from Azerbaijan and be annexed by Armenia attacked the prosecutor's office, Radio Moscow said.

"There are soldiers on every street, at every crossroad, checking passports, and personal cars," said a man who answered the telephone at the state radio and television office, Gostelradio, in Stepanakert.

In Yerevan, capital of the Armenian republic and close to the Turkish border, thousands rallied Thursday night despite presence by police and soldiers, resident Vahagen Popoyan said.

### Opposition demands end of arrests

RANGOON, Burma (AP) — Opposition leaders demanded Thursday that government troops stop arresting pro-democracy Buddhist monks and students after military ruler Gen. Saw Maung pledged to hold elections as soon as peace is restored.

The capital was quiet for the third day since troops ruthlessly suppressed protests against the military coup that Saw Maung led Sunday.

Saw Maung, who became prime minister Wednesday, is the third new leader in two months of chaos and bloodshed. Like the two government heads before him, he is closely associated with Ne Win, who seized power in 1962.

Ne Win resigned in late July after widespread protests against 26 years of authoritarian rule that plunged resource-rich Burma into poverty. His successor, Sein Lwin, lasted for 17 days of massive street protests. The next ruler, President Maung Maung, was a civilian but was seen as close to the military.

### Palestinian youth march through city

NABLUS, Israeli-Occupied West Bank — They marched in broad daylight through the West Bank's largest city Thursday, about 200 masked and uniformed Palestinian youths armed with hatchets, swords and sharpened barbecue skewers.

Old men and young women out shopping erupted into cheers and applause as the "shock troops" of the Palestinian uprising against Israel marched past with a sloppy military cadence, carrying Palestine Liberation Organization flags and posters of Yasser Arafat.

Israeli troops arrived and squeezed off bursts of automatic fire but made slow headway against a hail of rocks thrown by the youths until the last of them had escaped. Nablus hospitals reported that eight Arabs were wounded by army gunfire during the melee.

## Canada to compensate internees

TORONTO (AP) — The government apologized Thursday to Japanese-Canadian and ordered \$236 million in compensation for relocating and forcing thousands into internment camps during World War II.

"No amount of money can right the wrong, undo the harm and heal the wounds," Prime Minister Brian Mulroney said in announcing the program at the House of Commons in Ottawa. "But it is symbolic of our determination to address this issue, not only in the moral sense, but also in a tangible way."

About 12,000 of the 22,000 Japanese interned or relocated at the outset of World War II survive and are eligible for \$17,220 each.

In addition to a compensation program that could cost up to \$206 million, money also was set aside for Japanese-Canadian community programs and to establish a Canadian Race Relations Foundation.

Art Miki, president of the National Association of Japanese Canadians, said the agreement represents "an historic day for Canadians of Japanese ancestry who have been struggling so long to resolve the injustices of the 1940s."

In the hysteria that followed the 1941 Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor, Japanese-Canadians were denounced as enemies, lost their homes and possessions and were forced into internment and labor camps.

The sanctions were worse than those against Japanese-Americans and lasted five years longer, until 1949.

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


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
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
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
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
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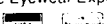
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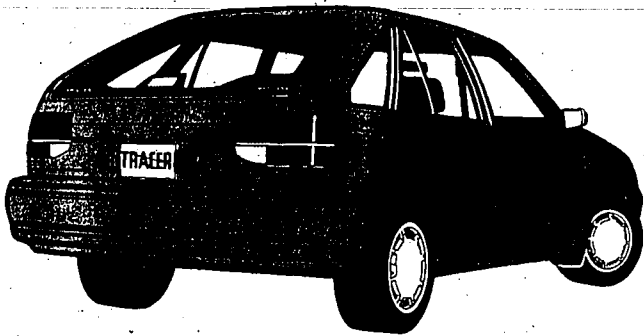
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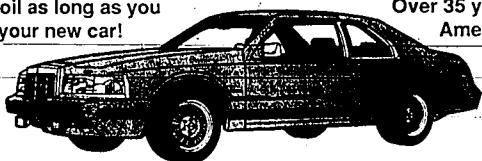
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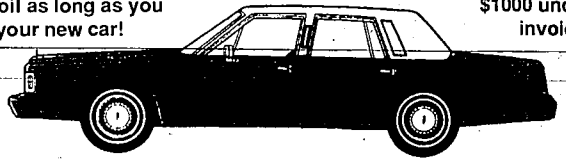
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# Redskins sign Soda Springs' David Archer

er and 1987 world champion, charged over the 100-meter high hurdles in 12.69 seconds, an Olympic record, in the first of seven events making up the heptathlon.

Besides the women's marathon, other track and field medal events Friday included men's 20-kilometer walk and men's shot put.

After six days of Games, the medal standings looked like this: Soviet Union 29 medals, 15 gold; East Germany 20, 6 gold; United States 13, 5 gold.

The U.S. men's basketball team, scheduled to play China on Friday, revealed Friday that both J.R. Reid and Stacey Augmon sustained minor foot injuries against Brazil on Wednesday.

Coach John Thompson said either could play, but "it would not be smart to play them." The U.S. team already has clinched a berth in the medal round.

Biondi won the 100-meter freestyle for his fourth medal, and he is almost certain to win three more. Evans, slack-jawed and shaking her head when she saw the clock, cut a huge 1.6 seconds from her own world record in the 400-meter freestyle.

"I couldn't believe it," she said. "I was just amazed."

Amazing was an apt adjective, too, for the conduct of South Korean boxing officials, who attacked a referee and punched him after a close decision and against one of their boxers. Five Koreans, including a coach and a trainer, were banned from the Games for their part in the debacle.

Through it all, the Korean boxer, Byun Jong-il, sat in defiance in his corner. In fact, he sat there for 67 minutes while boxing went on in the other of two rings at the Chamshil Students' Gymnasium, and then they turned the lights out.

Byun, yet another disappointment for a team falling far short of expectations, was suspended indefinitely from international competition.

The golds by Biondi and Evans, and a silver by Chris Jacobs in Biondi's event, gave a needed lift to a team considered one of the best in the world, yet a winner of only five of a possible 27 medals in nine events before Thursday.

"I told Chris, 'Good luck,'" Biondi said. "We both wanted to do our best times. Along with Janet, we felt we could boost the team."

Biondi, of Moraga, Calif., had a time of 48.63, missing his own world record by .21 seconds but breaking the Olympic mark of 49.04 he set earlier in qualifying heats. With four medals, he is on track to become the summer man to win seven medals in a Second Olympics. Mark Spitz won seven if 1972, all gold.

Jacobs, of Livingston, N.J., was second in 49.08.

Evans, of Placentia, Calif., who also won the 400 individual medley, won the 400 freestyle in 4:03.85. Her old world mark was 4:05.45.

Heike Friedrich of East Germany, who won the silver in 4:05.94, was just as amazed about the time as Evans.

"I didn't think Janet was capable of producing a time like that," she said. "I can't swim a 4:03."

In fact, no man swam that fast in the Olympics until 1972.

She still has one more event, the 800 freestyle, and she owns the world record in that, too.

EDEN — In the crazy-quit that is the Canyon Conference football race, tonight's Wendell-Valley game could well be the piece that solves the rest of the puzzle.

Valley, 3-1 overall and 1-1 in league games, will host the Trojans and 1-0, here at 7:30 p.m. The Trojans are one of three unbeaten teams in the league — Glenns Ferry and Ellier are the others — but they've played one less league game than the other six teams in the conference. Valley, which has lost only to Gooding this year, has pretty much dominated its other foes.

For starters, the winner of tonight's game will probably become the most serious challenger to league-leading Glenns Ferry, which blew away Gooding 32-13 last weekend. Wendell,

which closes out its season with three of its last four games at home, will play the Pilots in Glenns Ferry on Oct. 14. Valley will visit the week before.

The problem for the Wendell, which has been hit early by a rash of injuries, has been establishing offensive consistency. The Trojans, who scored 25 points in their season-opener against Shoshone, were shut out by Parma two weeks ago.

Wendell's offense had success last week under junior quarterback Robert Lessly, who threw three touchdown passes against Kimberly. The Trojans have several quick receivers, led by tight end Trent Sparks, a 6-foot, 1-inch, 165-pound junior. The

## running game centers around Duane Packer, a 6-1, 185-pound senior who is also the leader of the Trojans' defense, and Terry Jasper, a 6-0, 170-pound junior transfer from Jordan Valley, Ore.

## Uncertainty leads to retreat by stocks

**NEW YORK (AP)** — Stock prices gave ground Thursday in selling apparently prompted by impatience over the market's recent sluggish performance.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrial stocks down more than 18 points at its midday close, followed with a 10.49 loss to 2,980.01.

Declining issues outnumbered advances by about 8 to 5 in nationwide trading of New York Stock Exchange-listed stocks, with 556 up, 861 down and 518 unchanged.

Volume on the floor of the Big Board came to 150.67 million shares, up from 127.40 million Wednesday, when activity was curtailed somewhat by the observance of the Jewish holiday Yom Kippur.

Nationwide, consolidated volume in NYSE-listed issues, including trades

in those stocks on regional exchanges and in the over-the-counter market, totaled 177.06 million shares.

Analysts said the market's uninspired behavior of late apparently convinced some investors that stocks were unable to break out of the trading range in which they have fluctuated for several months now.

Some prominent analysts and policymakers, including Chairman Alan Greenspan of the Federal Reserve Board, have been warning of the dangers of revived inflation.

Yet the price of gold, a primary gauge of inflationary expectations, has fallen below \$400 an ounce this week for the first time in more than a year and a half.

Similarly, brokers say, there is widespread confusion and uncertainty among investors about pros-

pects for continued economic growth in 1989 under a new administration whose makeup and policies are not yet known.

Among actively traded blue chips, International Business Machines dropped 1/4 to 112; American Express to 27 3/4; Ford Motor 1/4 to 49 1/4; Exxon 7/8 to 44 1/4; and American Telephone & Telegraph 1/4 to 26 1/4.

Middle South Utilities, also among the volume leaders, rose 3/4 to 14 1/4, trading at a new 52-week high. The company said it will consider more transactions like a sale-leaseback deal it announced earlier this week involving one of its nuclear power plants.

Such transactions would stand to improve the company's prospects for restoring its dividend.

Coleman Co. rose 3/8 to 39 1/4. Analysts said news of the death of the

company's chairman prompted investors to conclude that it might become a takeover candidate.

Rebeck International, which reported a higher order backlog than a year ago, rose 1/4 to 11 1/4 in active trading.

JEROME — Potatoes may be important to Idaho residents, but that doesn't exempt the state's potato industry from trouble.

Some Jerome residents are concerned about a possible disposal lagoon for a potato processing plant being built in the South Lincoln Industrial Park.

The Western Idaho Potato Processing plant has applied to Jerome County for a special-use permit to build a disposal lagoon on the plant's 10-acre site. The lagoon would be split into two of one acre each.

"I'm not trying to cause trouble," Jerome resident Dave Burgess said. "I'm just concerned about the terrible odor from potato wastes and about industrial expansion with no consideration for living conditions."

Burgess lives about a mile from the park. "We need dairies and industries," he said, referring to similar concerns about a nearby dairy. "But how much benefit could be de-

received from a cesspool environment?" Burgess, along with several other area residents, plans to attend a public hearing at 1:30 p.m. Monday, at the courthouse, when the county commissioners are scheduled to consider Western's request.

A major concern of residents, many of whom live near the potato plant, is that the sewer system recently installed at the new industrial park may be insufficient to take care of wastes from the park's plants.

Jerome Public Works Director Lanny Sloan said it was difficult for the city to know the total possible amount of waste from the park when the sewer system was planned.

"When the city decided to request some grant money to do the Elm Street sewer we didn't know how much of a Charlie Marshall was going to use for his potato plant," Sloan said. He said the sewer was enlarged when the plant began construction.

Sloan said the term "sewer lagoon," which he acknowledged draws negative images, does not apply in the Western plant case.

"Wastewater, in this instance, would be filtered when it comes from the plant; and it would be put into the holding pond to be aerated," Sloan said. "This is a preliminary treatment used in sewer systems, and the quality of the water in the pond would be about the same quality as irrigation water."

County Commissioner George Andrus said plans are to clean the water so it can be reused in the plant.

Dick McKee, who lives about 1,000 feet from the new plant, is not so sure. "I lived here when the old starch plant was here and this will be no different as far as I can tell," McKee said.

McKee's neighbor Al Blamires, who lives only 300 yards from the plant, agrees.

"The odor from the settling ponds of that starch factory was extremely terrible at times," he said. "We don't want something like that to happen again."

Blamires and McKee say they will attend Monday's hearing in part to ask why the sewers at the new industrial park were not con-

structed on a large enough scale to handle wastes from the potato plant.

"When you are developing an industrial park, you have to make some assumptions as to the type of industry that will be there," Gary Burkett, water quality engineer for the state's Division of Environmental Quality, said. "It is common to get some surprises and have to make some modifications."

Burkett said the sewer lines in the park and the city's treatment plant are sufficient for sewage generated by workers but any water used in industrial processes would have to be carefully managed.

He noted that when the sewer facilities were constructed there was no way to know what to expect.

Mike McMasters, water quality field supervisor for the Division of Environmental Quality, said he has met with the potato plant people several times to discuss proposals.

"In a situation like this, everything depends upon how a lagoon would be designed,

constructed and operated," McMasters said, responding to the concern of Jerome residents that the lagoon might deter businesses from locating in the park due to foul odors.

"Developers have to comply with state requirements, and this sort of thing can be done without creating a problem," he said.

County Commissioner Veronica Lierman said she'll withhold comment until after the hearing. "The commissioners likely won't make the decision at the hearing, she said.

"We have received very few calls about the matter and have received no petitions," she said. Sloan said at a series of related hearings held over the past two years there has been no controversy.

Burgess is upset at the afternoon time set for the hearing. The time should be rescheduled for the evening so that daytime workers can attend, he said.

He said that petitions placed around town asking the time to be changed have been disappearing.

## Dairy remains open while judge studies validity of ordinance

JEROME — A 600-cow dairy near Jerome that ignited a firestorm of protest from neighbors will continue operating a while longer.

Fifth District Judge Daniel Meehl recently ordered a lawsuit against Jerome County delayed until he decides whether the county's zoning ordinances are valid. Neighbors sued the county last year after losing the battle against the dairy in front of the county commission. They say the dairy violates the county's ordinances prohibiting dairy structures within 1,000 feet of homes.

Meehl's decision shifts the fight about the dairy's location, originally fought over whether the county acted properly in approving it, to a battle over whether the county's dairy zoning ordinances are valid.

Neighbors say they are bothered by dust, flies, potential ground water pollution and loss of value in their homes.

"The economic loss is just mind-boggling," said Martha Martin, who lives near the dairy.

Meehl earlier indicated he may order the dairy closed after hearing arguments in the neighbors' suit. But he has decided to rule first on a companion case filed by Jerome County to determine whether its own ordinances are invalid.

Ruling on the validity of the zoning ordinance dispute will in essence de-

termine all disputes" in the neighbors' lawsuit, Meehl said in a written order.

Meehl said in his order he faces one issue in the suit: whether he should order Jerome County to enforce the 1,000-foot ordinance.

The dispute began last year when Kenneth Vanderham, an Ontario, Calif., dairyman, applied for a special-use permit to build a dairy approximately three miles southwest of Jerome. Jerome County commissioners approved the permit, even though their own zoning commission recommended denial.

Several neighbors, including some in the Leisure Acres subdivision, sued the county over its action. In April, Jerome County Prosecutor John Hogan agreed to send the matter back to the zoning commission for further hearings.

The zoning commission then recommended approval, but the commissioners tabled the matter. They filed a request with Meehl to determine whether its ordinances are valid, raising questions as to whether certain amendments applying to dairies were advertised properly.

Since then, the county has also proposed zoning amendments to ease the process dairies must go through to get a permit.

Even though Meehl ordered Vanderham not to put cows on his 80-acre location until lawsuits are resolved, Vanderham built his dairy and is milking cows there.

## Stallings urges FERC to issue Milner license

TWIN FALLS — Rep. Richard Stallings, D-Idaho, has urged the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission to push through the Milner Dam power license.

In a letter dated Wednesday, Stallings said the "special situation and realities" of the Milner project create a need to amend the Draft Environmental Impact Statement completed in November to expedite the project.

"The Milner Project is of vital importance to the people of the Magic

Valley who depend on the Snake River and Agriculture for their livelihood," he said.

Stallings noted in his letter that FERC is considering treating the Milner project as part of a package that also includes the Twin Falls, Star Falls and Auger Falls projects. Bunching Milner with these others could result in a delay up to 18 months, Stallings said.

"Such a delay is unacceptable," he said.

In 1984 the Twin Falls and North Side canal companies applied for an

## Twin Falls schools struggle with lack of speech therapists

TWIN FALLS — Paltry salaries and huge caseloads have driven speech therapists out of Idaho, forcing the Twin Falls School District to patch handicap programs with uncertified workers and a private consulting firm.

Despite a nationwide search for speech therapists, the district has been unable to replace three qualified communication disorder specialists who left this year, said Keith Farnsworth, district personnel director.

The state requires that those positions be filled by people with master's degrees in speech pathology.

Instead, the district has hired two people with bachelor's degrees in speech pathology and two teachers' aides. It has also contracted with Magic Valley Speech & Hearing Clinic of Jerome to consult about 10 hours a week, said William Feusahrens, district director of support services.

"It's a stopgap measure," Feusahrens said. "It's the only way can provide the service this year."

The district applied Monday for a one-year letter of authorization from the state Professional Standards Commission to allow the two communication disorder specialists to operate legally. No decision has been made yet, said Michael Frand, supervisor of the state teacher certification board.

Three qualified speech pathologists are preferred over the present staff arrangement, but children are still getting adequate care, Feusahrens said.

"For the most part we have met the needs (of children)," he said.

"It's the best alternative to no service at all, but not by much," said Tom Longhurst, president of Idaho Speech and Hearing Association.

Longhurst, who is also chairman of the Department of Speech Pathology and Audiology at Idaho State University, said someone with a bachelor's degree has about 10 percent of the training he needs to care for children with the diversity of needs

## Ketchum to vote on continuing tax

KETCHUM — The local sales tax here won't be going up but the City Council has decided to see if residents want to continue the current tax for 10 years.

The council passed a resolution this week placing on a Nov. 8 ballot the city's 1 percent local tax on retail sales, which increases the total tax on these items to 6 percent. But the council decided against setting the tax at 2 percent.

Council members earlier this month discussed raising the tax but opinions changed in the past two weeks.

Councilman Bill Vanderbilt, an initial supporter of the increase, said public opinion seems to run against an increase. "I've talked to a lot of people, and for several reasons I think it's not a good thing to push for 2 percent right now," Vanderbilt said.

The council should first draw up a plan of just how the additional mon-

ey will be used, he said. "I don't want to raise the tax just to raise the tax," Vanderbilt said.

The current option tax on retail sales, will expire in November 1989. It was instituted five years ago. The council decided Monday the tax has worked so well that it would give voters the chance to extend it to 10 years.

Among the projects that would benefit from the option tax include lighting and paving of existing public parking areas, acquiring new parking areas, expanding the public transportation system, completing more bike path connectors and beautifying the city with street lights, landscaping and more signs.

Not all council members agree these items should be financed through the option tax.

Councilman Tom Held said many of these items benefit only select groups. An improved parking lot, for example, might mostly benefit adjacent businesses. "Some of these items should be

listed as a local improvement districts because some of the people live in residential areas and maybe aren't operating businesses that would benefit from these improvements," Held said.

The option tax has been in effect for the past four years and has generated about \$2.5 million to the city's budget.

Retail sales contribute about 73 percent of that total with the current 1 percent tax. Hotel, motels, condos and liquor sales are taxed an additional 2 percent above the state sales tax of 5 percent and contribute 6, 7 and 14 percent, respectively.

Retail sales currently exempt from the option tax include the sale of automobiles, groceries and materials purchased by contractors, although the latter item will probably be removed from exempt status.

A public hearing was held before the council voted on the resolution precluding the special election.

# Grand jury indicts 8 on drug charges

**HAILEY** — Eight of 11 people wanted for delivery of cocaine have been indicted by a grand jury impaneled by the 5th District Court. Two others suspected of the felony violation remain at large and one individual will not have to stand trial.

The largest amount involved was two ounces, Blaine County Prosecuting Attorney Ned Williamson said.

Williamson said the indictments came after a nine-month investigation by the Blaine County Task Force, the Drug Enforcement Agency, the Internal Revenue Service, the FBI and the state

Department of Law Enforcement.

The 16-member grand jury, seldom used in Blaine County, was impaneled Sept. 6 and 7. Unlike a trial jury that determines the guilt or innocence of the accused, a grand jury decides if evidence is sufficient to bring charges, Williamson said. In effect, the grand jury replaces the need for individual preliminary hearings.

Arrests were made Sept. 8 and 9. One witness testified on all cases.

The Wood River Valley residents that were arrested and the bond amounts are: Teresa Feneon, 23, \$20,000; Roxanne Martin, 31, \$15,000; John Walsh, 49, \$25,000; Eric Koons, age unknown, who is serving time in the Jerome

County Jail for unrelated matters; Greg Mitchell, 27, \$2,500; Kim Gross, 28, \$2,500; and Pam Harris, \$2,500; and Michael Beach, 30, \$20,000.

One unidentified individual will not stand trial because the grand jury found there was not sufficient evidence to bring charges, Williamson said.

He said all indictments were for delivery of cocaine, but involved different time periods and different quantities of the drug. He said the amounts of cocaine involved ranged from a maximum of two ounces, or 56 grams, to a minimum of one-half ounce. Street values for these amounts were not known.

As a result of the arrests, several vehicles were confiscated.

found in schools: "They are untrained to do the job," Longhurst said. "We never intend for bachelors' degree-level students to go to work professionally."

Fuchsahrens said the scarcity of qualified speech therapists in Idaho is a symptom of a poorly funded education system.

School districts statewide have had to hire about 10 therapists with bachelor's degrees because of the shortage of qualified applicants, Longhurst said.

Idaho schools cannot compete with private businesses, the state Department of Health and Welfare and other states, Fuchsahrens said.

Starting salaries in surrounding states can be as much as \$5,000 more than Idaho, and pay is higher than that in the private sector, Longhurst said.

He said around 20 speech pathologists graduate yearly from ISU at the master's level, which would be plenty to fill all openings in the state, but they are going where they get higher pay.

Another drawback in Idaho is the extremely high ratio of therapists to students, Longhurst said.

The state reimburses districts for the salary of one therapist for every 2,000 students regardless of how many handicapped children are in the district.

A more manageable ratio would be closer to 1,000 to one, Fuchsahrens said.

Although the district has 6,800

students it only qualifies for state funding for three positions, or a ratio of one therapist for every 2,266 students. The district helps 180 handicapped students.

There is a direct link between non-performance at school and truancy and delinquency, he said.

"We're setting children up for academic and social problems," Longhurst said.

Cheri Suter, speech and language pathologist who will consult with the school, said the new arrangement is the best available but still not a good situation.

Suter said she will have to sit in on evaluation sessions with the children because the temporary workers "do not have enough education to make diagnostic and therapeutic decisions."

She said she will utilize therapy, including language stimulation therapy, for the aides and communication specialists to follow.

Mitchener said her business is swamped with children whose parents are not satisfied with the care they get at school.

Fuchsahrens said other reasons therapists leave the district is because they get married or want to move closer to home.

The district is trying to lure into the profession local students who want to make the Twin Falls area their permanent home, Farnsworth said.

Even if the new district staff arrangement is approved by the state board, the district will have to come up with a different program by next year, Fuchsahrens said.

"Next year we want to hire three new speech pathologists," he said. "I'm not very optimistic at all."

Vawser said two girls, each about 12 years old, were cooking when a grease fire ignited.

The mobile home, which had two additions, was engulfed in flames by the time firefighters arrived. Vawser said the home was totaled, although no monetary estimate of the damage has yet been made.

The fire was confined primarily to the home's east end, but the west end and the two additions suffered severe heat and smoke damage, Vawser said.

**Forest service lifts fire restrictions**

TWIN FALLS — Fire restrictions on national forests in the intermountain region were lifted Thursday, according to Ed Waldappel, Forest Service public information officer.

However, the fire danger is still high, with frost causing leaves to fall, adding potential fuel to fires. "We still want to caution people to be careful. Fire danger still exists," Waldappel said. "We're not out of the woods yet."

Restrictions had been in effect since July 29, prohibiting campfires outside of developed recreational sites, chain saw use, off-road vehicle activity between 1 p.m. and 1 a.m., and smoking outside vehicles or buildings.

studies for electricity generation. Dirkmatt did not quote a number, but others, including local environmental groups, have estimated \$12 billion.

The reactor would produce about 135 megawatts of electric power.

The smaller size makes the reactor easier to control, he said. The term "high-temperature" refers to the capacity of the reactor to withstand high temperatures, Dirkmatt said. The graphite core would be able to withstand up to 5,000 degrees Fahrenheit and the fuel up to 3,500 degrees Fahrenheit, he said.

Heat from the reactor is removed by helium circulated around the graphite core where the controlled nuclear reaction takes place. Helium is an inert gas and does not become radioactive, Dirkmatt said. If the gas escapes it will present little threat to the environment and the reactor itself would heat up, causing the nuclear reaction in the core to slow and eventually stop, he said.

The reactor would be housed in an underground silo, and in an accident heat would be conducted through the silo to the ground.

This type of reactor, which produces enough heat to produce steam for generating electricity, is easy to convert to commercial use, Dirkmatt said.

"Just remove the target," he said, referring to the substance inserted into the reactor to produce the desired product. In this case, lithium is inserted to produce tritium, Dirkmatt said.

The reactor also can be used to produce plutonium by inserting uranium-238. But the conversion process would take six months to a year, Dirkmatt said. It cannot do both simultaneously.

he just under 50 megawatts, which is about the residential use in Twin Falls, said Dile Monson, Idaho Power's local electrical supervisor. The Twin Falls generating plant capacity is about 10 megawatts, and the Shoshone Falls plant capacity is about 12.5 megawatts, Monson said.

Water diverted at the dam irrigates 470,000 acres. The irrigation water right dates back to 1900, but the water right for power is only 11 years old. Therefore no irrigation water can be diverted to generate power, and in low water years no power would be generated, Eakin said.

Power would come only from water over and above what is needed for irrigation, he said.

Opponents of the canal companies' proposal say it would reduce recreation uses, such as kayaking and fishing downstream from the dam. They support an FERC alternative that would place a power turbine in the dam itself.

Rehabilitation to bring the dam into accordance with modern dam safety standards would cost \$7 million to \$12 million. Power revenue from the \$39 million hydroelectric project would keep farmers from having to bear the entire cost of dam repairs in higher water costs.

The canal companies propose to put a turbine 1.6 miles downstream from the dam. Water would be diverted into an irrigation canal and routed to a pond at the canyon rim. The water then would flow through a pipe over the canyon rim and down to the powerhouse 150 below at river level, said Jack Eakin, manager of the Twin Falls Canal Co.

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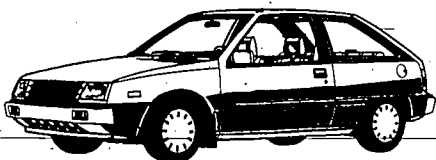
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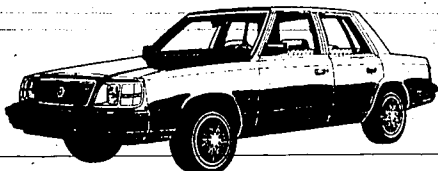
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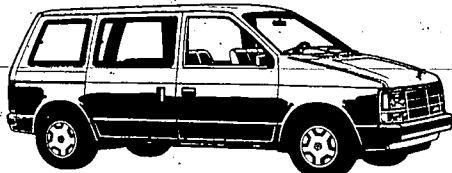

## Local boy makes good — music, that is

TWIN FALLS — Doug McClure is a talented young cellist, but the former Jerome resident is the first to admit he's had some unusual advantages.

"How many parents would fly their child to San Francisco for lessons each month for four years?" McClure says.

The founder and manager of the Franciscan Chamber Players of San Francisco, McClure will bring his quartet to Twin Falls for a return engagement Oct. 1.

Quartet members include Doug Beilman, first violinist; Maki Ishii, second-violinist, and Tim Barnes, violist, with McClure playing cello. The group played here in the spring of 1987, receiving a warm reception and many invitations to return.

But this is the first time since then that McClure has been able to schedule an Idaho trip. He says his quartet, now in its fourth year, has kept a full schedule.

McClure admits he "went out on a limb" to start the group. He and Beilman had played together in Boston when both were students at the New England Conservatory, where McClure earned his bachelor's degree in 1985.

Then both young men moved West to continue graduate study at the San Francisco Conservatory where all the quartet members were then students. McClure received a master's degree in cello performance in 1987. He says the quartet members had played together, but not as chamber players.

When he has time, McClure also plays in the San Francisco Opera and Ballet orchestras and will tour with the opera group in October.

However, McClure says he has always had a vision of starting a professional quartet. And, even though he's aware there are many fine string quartets in the U.S., he pursued his vision because he says his three fellow players are exceptional.

McClure's faith in their ability — certainly enhanced by his own talent, which he modestly downplays — has been well rewarded.

From a humble beginning of contacting San Francisco churches sponsoring concert series, the quartet began playing in many of the small college auditoriums that proliferate in the Bay Area.

As their reputation grew, their performances increased and McClure has been able to meet his payroll regularly. He handles all scheduling and business details in addi-

tion to several hours of daily practice with his colleagues. "I really don't mind the extra work," says McClure, a pleasant, serious young man who is obviously dedicated to his music. "I enjoy the challenge of finding new places to perform."

The Franciscan Players have given an outdoor concert at Yosemite Park, performed at Napa Valley wineries, some of which have small concert halls, and appeared at "quite a few resorts," the manager says.

This past summer the quartet members were artists-in-residence at the "Summer Music Monterey" part of the Back festival at nearby Carmel, Calif.

The quartet had an "exceptionally fortunate" experience about a year ago when the musicians were confronted by secret service men as they were getting their instruments out of their cases prior to a concert at the

Palace of the Legion of Honor. "They were told King Juan Carlos of Spain and his queen were in attendance. The royal pair liked what they heard so much that they even took pictures of the musicians."

McClure has had other "exceptionally fortunate" assists in his musical career since he started taking cello lessons years ago with the late Helen Coiner in Twin Falls. He still remembers her as "nicest lady" he has ever met. "She was one of those rare teachers who made you want to come to lessons," he says.

McClure also got unusual encouragement and help from his parents, Dr. and Mrs. Richard McClure. His father, a radiologist in Burley who has a farm south of Jerome, is an accomplished organist who is now guest soloist with the Magic Valley Symphony.

### Plan on attending

The Franciscan Chamber Players, featuring former Jerome resident Doug McClure, will perform Oct. 1 at 8 p.m. in the College of Southern Idaho's Fine Arts Auditorium. The program will include Samuel Barber's "Adagio for Strings" and a Haydn string quartet.

When Doug was young, his parents invited a vocal quartet from Los Angeles to perform on the lawn of their country home for three consecutive summers.

Doug, the second of four children, remembers sitting up chairs, moving the piano and his father's organ out onto a grand stage.

These outdoor evening concerts, still remembered by area music lovers as a glimpse of now long-forgotten gracious living, were inspiring to Doug.

"— They encouraged me to keep going (with my cello)," he says.

Like many parents of young musicians, the McClures saw that their son attended outstanding summer music camps before he graduated from Twin Falls High School in 1981.

But the event which probably propelled him into his musical career came about when an outstanding cellist from San Francisco played a concert at the College of Southern Idaho.

The McClures had never met David Kadarouch, principal cellist with the San Francisco Opera and San Francisco Ballet Orchestras. But that didn't stop Dr. McClure from taking Doug, then a ninth grader, back stage after the CSI concert to meet him.

"Dad—asked him if he'd consider coming to Twin Falls for a week and give me daily lessons," McClure says. Kadarouch agreed.

For six to eight hours a day, young Doug studied in his parents' home under the man he describes as "the best cellist on the West Coast."

"What an opportunity. He was so patient with me," McClure remembers.

At the end of the week when "things were going better, but I was getting tired," McClure says his father sprang a novel idea.

He asked Kadarouch if he would continue giving his son lessons if the boy would come to San Francisco each month.

The teacher was so impressed he not only agreed but would accept no payment.

So for four years, McClure and his cello flew to San Francisco monthly.

Their relationship developed into a personal one and McClure says he has reaped many benefits from his association with his mentor.

## Olympic commercials set records for intrusion

HOLLYWOOD — The Seoul Olympics: Who is selling what? You are watching a relentless marketing of products, programs and people during the 179-hour marathon that NBC pretentiously titles "Games of the XXIV Olympiad." A colleague's perceptive 11-year-old son suggests a more accurate name:

"Games of the XXIV Commercials."

Twenty-four about every five minutes. Or so it seems as you see Olympic coverage fragmented by a dizzying barrage of 30-second spots that each cost advertisers a reported \$320,000 to place in prime time. And that assault does not include the commercials that are not labeled.

On the rosy side, some of the Olympic-tailored spots are so creative, poetic and startlingly beautiful that watching them, even repeatedly, is a pleasure. The best:

"Kodak's filmy look at child athletes performing to music in slow motion as someone sings, 'I see your true colors shining through....'"

"American Express' lump-in-the-throat vignette about an elderly equestrian trainer who gets an unexpected chance to join his young rider in Seoul."

"Visa's artful — if idealized — contrast of ancient and modern Seoul ("Today the wall is gone, and the world is welcome....")"

They — along with McDonald's endearingly funny moments from serious nations as future Olympians — epitomize film making and propaganda as art. And Joe Piscopo's sniffling British pop for Life magazine's "Pity" — shuffleboard has been eliminated from the Olympic games — is not too shabby either.

However, these are merely the striking exceptions. Credit NBC with refraining from jingoism and false hyping of United States athletes, even though the network has a large stake in the Seoul medal count. Despite knowing there is a link between sustained viewer interest and how well the Americans perform, NBC has not

unitedly plugged U.S. Olympians.

Otherwise, however, the Olympic telecast's Parade of Nations may be exceeded in length only by its Parade of Commercials — labeled and otherwise — the majority very wearing. In exploiting the enormous audience avail-

able to them via the Olympics, NBC is taking no prisoners.

Examples:

"Endless promos for NBC and its new series. By far the most grating of these is Ray Combs introducing himself — again and again and again — as the host of the new syndicated 'Family Feud.' Knowing that ABC engaged in the same practice during the 1984 Summer Olympics does not diminish the displeasure this time."

"Newscasts to promote the Olympics. This unholy practice surely comes under the unlabeled-commercial category."

"What other tag applies when NBC has Tom Brokaw stand in front of the main stadium while anchoring the 'Nightly News' from Seoul?"

And what other explanation is there for leading Monday's 'Nightly News' not with major events of the day, but with stories about Olympics diving and boxing?"

Greg Louganis' quest for gold medals is surely interesting, but somewhat less significant than emotion-battered Burma's quest for survival.

"News anchors who are deployed in Seoul merely to showcase them in front of the Olympic-size audience."

That is also why Brokaw is there, anchoring the news, doing news cut-ins and even voice-overs for some Olympic features. And if you were not impressed by those repeated promos showing Brokaw going "face-to-face" with world leaders, there he was on "The Nightly News" — "face-to-face" with the South Korean president in frequent "two shots" that equated the anchorman with the man he was interviewing.

"The exposure given other NBC stars via the Games. Much of this is unavoidable, and surely no one would dispute that Bryant Gumbel has done a superb job as NBC's Olympics host. And Bob Costas has done a nice, too, too."

But the exposure can only enhance the "Today" program that Gumbel co-hosts with Jane Pauley. Another benefactor may be the new late-night talk show that Costas will resume hosting on NBC after the Olympics.

Meanwhile, athletes are inevitably marketed, too. Just as tiny, toothy Mary Lou Retton became the signature of the 1984 Olympics, so are Louganis and sprinter Florence Griffith-Joyner destined to emerge from these Games as superstars with rich futures beyond athletics.

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# 'Stealing Home' lacks a central message

The following are capsule reviews of some of the films playing locally in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

**STEALING HOME (PG-13)** With its convoluted structure and soft-jazz ECM-style score, this might pass for a Hollywood art film. But it is soggy with borrowed nostalgia. It treats the identity crises of a failed minor-league baseball player (Mark Harmon) as if he were a suffering artist and his ex-babysitter (Jodie Foster) as if she were Truffaut's Catherine. The ultimate philosophical point in this rich-ricd reverie seems no deeper than "Grab for the gusto" or maybe "Play ball!" It's no surprise that co-writer-directors Steven Kampmann and Will Aldis went on to write "Back to School" and "The Catch 22."

**BETRAYED (R)** Director Costa-Gavras has always been drawn to incendiary political subjects, but in "Betrayed," which is about the white supremacist movement in the American heartland, he has apparently trusted the instincts of his American screenwriter and co-producer Joe Eszterhas ("I.S.T.," "Flashdance"). The result is a loosening of the trademark Costa-Gavras tension. Debra Winger is radiantly warm, smart and, against all odds, believable. Tom Berenger does the best he can with an even harder role — the decent American with two young children to raise who has completely swallowed the line of the crackpot right.

**THE BLOB (R)** An insatiable glob of seemingly extraterrestrial gunk slithers around a small ski town — populated with the usual assortment of sex-mad teen-agers, incredulous police and stereotyped provincial boobs — finally driving the heroine to the sewers and anti-hero to last-minute nobility. The 1958 "Blob" has an undeserved reputation as a horror classic; this one improves on it, somewhat, by adding a subversive political subtext and outstandingly graphic special effects, though the discombobulations and ingestions, mostly played for laughs, get juvenile and unpleasant.

**BULL DURHAM (R)** What we have here is sweet and sexy comedy set around a rat-poor minor-league baseball team, the Durham Bulls; and in it, writer-director Ron Shelton shows himself as the diamond's best friend. He has packed his offbeat love story with a handful of resonant characters, shows off a rosy knowledgeability in these fiercely funny baseball scenes. He knows firsthand the jargon, the fears, the acrid smell of these miserable locker rooms and touring buses, and he makes sure we listen up and breathe deeply. Whether you believe Shelton's lusty, uninhibited love story is another matter, but it's seductively easy to

want to, with the warmth and brightness that Susan Sarandon and Kevin Costner bring to their roles.

**COCKTAIL (R)** Tom Cruise plays Brian Flanagan, whose dreams of high-powered jobs in advertising, banking, stockbroking or what-have-you are shattered by his lack of higher education. He settles, finally, for bartending in Manhattan, under the wing of Douglas Coughlin (the magnetic Bryan Brown). Cruise even gets his own bartending solo: juggling bottles, tossing ice and cocktail shakers behind his back, doing tidy little spins and discreet foot movements, all the while twinkling, twinkling, twinkling until his dimples must haveached. Unfortunately, none of the film makers, including director Roger Donaldson and writer Heywood Gould, seemed to notice that Flanagan, climber-user-apologist extraordinaire, lacked a little something as the hero of the piece.

**DIE HARD (R)** Archtypal big-

deal Hollywood exploitation, technically breathtaking yet disgusting and silly, Bruce Willis, however, is terrific as a witty New York cop conducting a one-man war against a bunch of terrorists who have taken over a Los Angeles office tower. With Reginald VelJohnson, Bonnie Bedelia and Alan Rickman.

**HOT TO TROT (PG)** What is the worst movie idea we can dream up? How about a randy talking-horse movie called "Hot to Trot" — with Bob Goldthwait as a stockbroker, Dabney Coleman as his buck-toothed stepfather, Burgess Meredith as a horse's — uh — voice? Too late: they have already made it. And it is a movie to make nineties whinny, audiences gag and horses hang their heads. Mr. Ed and Francis, though

should be living at this hour. High Concept Land had need of three. **MOON OVER PARADOR (PG-13)** Paul Mazursky is a film maker with such an affable, charming personality that he keeps you entertained even when the movie isn't quite working, which is the case here. Richard Dreyfuss as a journeyman actor impersonating a dead South American dictator, Sonin Braga as his scrumptious duxy, Raul Julia as the ice-eyed police head and Jonathan Winters (an inspired choice) as a CIA agent: All that should make a fine mad political farce. But Mazursky lets the politics overpower the farce; his third act gets too loose. Even so, Dreyfuss, as the dictator, wields a mean banana and Julia has the best psycho laugh this side of Peter Lorre.

**A NIGHTMARE ON ELM**

**STREET 4: THE DREAM-MAS-TER (R)** By far the best in the series about the ghoulish child-killer Freddy Krueger (Robert Englund) who seems invincible. It is a superior horror picture that balances wit and gore as it mirrors the anxieties of the teenage audience for which it is intended. Newcomers Lisa Wilcox and Danny Hassel star.

**WHO FRAMED ROGER RABBIT (PG)** Dense, satisfying, feverishly inventive and a technical mar-

vel. "Who Framed Roger Rabbit" has Robert Zemeckis ("Back to the Future") as its director and Richard Williams, an Academy Award winner for "A Christmas Carol" (1972), as director of animation, under the joined banners of Disney's Touchstone and Steven Spielberg's Amblin companies. All hands and the artists involved may have created a film that no one sees just once. But — animation aside — the treasure of the piece is Bob Hoskins' pungent, visceral and comic performance.

# 'Monday Night Football' shows staying power through 18 seasons

It was 18 years ago last week that "Monday Night Football" made its debut on ABC. The first game, for those of you have forgotten, was played on Sept. 21, 1970, between the Cleveland Browns and the New York Jets. The Jets, of course, lost. As Voltaire wrote, the more things change, the more they stay the same. This week, on Sept. 26, the Los Angeles Raiders face stellar quarterback John Elway and the Denver Broncos.

Like any institution, "Monday Night Football" has managed to change without changing. Dandy Don and Howard the Shrii are gone. From the best-known trio to inhabit the "Monday Night" booth, only Frank Gifford remains. Coming into last season, many questioned the staying power of the program. After all, the Gifford-Al Michaels and Gifford-Michaels-Joe Namath experiments had been ghastly.

Enter Dan Dierdorf, ex-all-pro lineman and sharp-tongued wiseguy. Zing! The program recovered much of its shine. In spite of the rancorous strike, which reduced ABC's "Monday Night" season to a mere 12 games, the ratings were reasonably good (18.6), with some 52 million viewers watching.

What has made "Monday Night Football" such an institution is hard to say. Certainly, the network was willing to take risks in its presenta-

tion of the game itself, using more cameras, going to the three-man broadcast team, narrowing the focus to personalize the players, using more graphics. Not all of these innovations are an unalloyed joy. We can probably thank the ABC crew's use of hand-held sideline camera for the endless litany of "Hi, Mom! We're No. 1!" without which no football telecast is complete. And sometimes the graphics obfuscated more than they elucidated.

However, there is no denying that "Monday Night Football" was something special in its golden era. Whether you loved or hated Howard Cosell, Don Meredith and Frank Gifford, they were a unique presence. And Chet Forte's pictures were easily the best you could see during the regular season. It helped, of course, that he could commit as many cameras to the "Monday Night" game as the other networks might use to cover a playoff contest.

Something else that made "Monday Night Football" special was the rivalries it helped to feed. Everybody in the NFL likes to beat Al Davis and the Raiders, until recently the league's baddest bad guys, but it was especially fun to try it on Mondays.

Raider quarterbacks like Ken Stabler and Jim Plunkett seemed to save their most dramatic comeback performances for Mondays, and the Raiders' Monday-night record (25-5-1) is the best of any NFL franchise.

Last year, however, the team fell on harder times than "Monday Night Football," registering a 5-10 record. The Raiders who will line up against Denver on Sept. 26 are a different team than the ones who played in 1987. Not better, just different. The acquisition of quarterback Jay Schroeder from the Washington Redskins will have to help the offense, but the defense, once fearsome, is beginning to show signs of age. Is the Raiders' Monday magic gone? Or can they find the missing spark, as the show itself did last year? Taking a leaf from ABC's playbook, they could start by adding a couple of 'linemen of Dan Dierdorf's caliber

# Soap opera 'One Life to Live' lands on top of the latest daytime ratings

In a recent daytime ratings report, the highest-rated soap was "One Life to Live" (No. 1 among all daytime shows, including game shows and other daytime entries) and the lowest was "Ryan's Hope" (at the bottom of the heap at number 24).

The other daytime soaps were ranked as follows among all daytime shows:

2. "General Hospital"
3. "The Young and the Restless"
4. "Days of Our Lives"
5. "All My Children"
6. "As the World Turns"
8. "Guiding Light"

This prompted us to conduct our own survey as to what the daytime soap fans are watching. We were curious to compare the published ratings with our own findings. Our survey was completely unscientific, of course. We merely stopped people on the street, asked a number of friends who were soap viewers and persuaded a few high school teachers to take a poll among their soap-watching students.

Our results do not coincide with the ratings at all. The most popular soap in our arbitrary survey was, "All My Children," with "As The World Turns" a close second. "Ryan's Hope" was in the middle of the list and "Another World" was the least watched soap. "Santa Barbara" and "Loving" also did better in our survey than in the published ratings.

Fans of "All My Children" said they preferred this soap because there's always something going on that doesn't take forever to come to a conclusion. They also cited Susan Lucci as a main lure for watching the show (too bad these fans weren't voting at the Daytime Emmys).

Fans of "As the World Turns" couldn't say enough about the whole cast. "World Turners" felt that this is probably the best soap cast currently on the air. As a critic, I'm inclined to

agree. "As the World Turns" has a nice mix of young, middle-aged and older actors. Many of the other soaps seem to be locked into the image of beautiful young people, and in some cases the acting on these shows leaves something to be desired.

It is a credit to "As the World Turns" that the first criterion in casting is to fill each role with the best available actor. Certainly there are some very attractive players in ATWT, but the emphasis seems to be on acting ability rather than on a square-jawed profile or a flowing blond mane.

# NBC to launch Consumer News and Business Channel on cable

NEW YORK — It does not sound particularly jazzy, but one may hear murmurs of "Gentlemen, start your cables" in February, when NBC begins its most ambitious venture yet in cable programming.

That is when the company will launch CNBC, or Consumer News and Business Channel, a 24-hour-a-day, seven-day-a-week service that will offer financial news on weekdays and sports attractions on weekends.

CNBC will face the seven-year-old Financial News Network in a key test of whether today's cable market, even though thriving, can support two major, similar, advertiser-supported program services.

FNN's feisty president, David Meister, thinks not. He further thinks that his service, which he says now reaches 32 million homes and plans to expand its operating hours next month, will prevail, partly because it is so established. CNBC will have 9½ million initially.

Cable executives will not be the only ones watching keenly to see what happens. So will executives of NBC's 200-plus affiliated stations, some of whom view CNBC as a competitor. Others say NBC needs it to remain financially strong.

NBC has been wading into cable for the past several years. Rebuffed three years ago in a bid to buy 51 percent and editorial control of Ted Turner's Cable News Network, the company signed on in 1986 as a partner — with the Hearst Corp. and rival ABC — in the 24-hour Arts & Entertainment Cable Network, which says it currently reaches 36 million homes.

Earlier this year, with NBC president Robert C. Wright leading a corporate charge in a search for new sources of revenue, NBC took its first step into cable production by agreeing to make a comedy series, "Good Morning, Miss Bliss," for the Disney Channel.

Then NBC leased the Tempo Television cable channel to form CNBC.

Michael L. Eskridge, president of CNBC, declines to disclose how much it will cost to start, staff and run his new operation. But he says the service will need to reach more than 30 million homes to break even.

CNBC's arrival comes at a time when NBC, owned by cost-conscious General Electric, has quietly and steadily cut staff for two years. But those axed by NBC probably should not look at CNBC with hopes of a new full-time job.

Generally speaking, "we won't have our own staff of production people," Eskridge said shortly before leaving for South Korea in his second job as executive vice president of NBC's Olympics telecast unit. "We'll put together groups of free-lance people from time to time. We'll hire other people to do productions for us."

While CNBC will be a separate company, NBC has said it will be "backed by the resources of NBC News" for its weekday reports and "draw on the experience and talent of NBC Sports" for its weekend sports package.

"We'll take advantage, to the extent we can, of NBC News people on an irregular basis," Eskridge says.

For example, he says, Mike Jensen, NBC News' business reporter, may contribute reports, but not on a regular basis "because it would conflict with his current schedule."

As for the weekend sports programming, "we hope to be able to use some recognizable people from NBC Sports," he says. "But we haven't made any arrangements yet."

The new kid on the cable block has a formidable rival in FNN, which after a shaky first four years has been profitable since 1986 and now has a staff of 200.

Although FNN chief Meister says his operation's coming expansion is mainly to broaden its appeal and is not in response to CNBC, FNN nonetheless will up its daily 14-hour business-news offerings to 18 hours on Oct. 31, and will add features about personal finance and major business figures.

FNN, whose midweek-weekend SCORE service of sports information and events will ultimately move to a 2 p.m.-midnight EDT schedule on Saturdays and Sundays, also is putting \$40 million into new facilities, including new studios here and in Los Angeles.

NBC's major push into cable this year makes it the second major network actively in the game. CBS is not playing right now.

That network, whose 1981 cultural cable effort died a year later after critical cheers and little ad revenue, does not plan a return to cable, says CBS spokesman George Schweitzer.

But this is not necessarily forever, he adds: "Right now, we're concentrating on increasing our TV stations."

"We're concentrating on our core business of over-the-air broadcasting, and developing our programming."

ABC, the first in cable, arrived in 1980 and has stayed. Besides its stake in Arts & Entertainment, it owns 80 percent of the all-sports, 24-hour ESPN network, which by some estimates earned nearly \$80 million last year, and one-third of Lifetime.

Herb Granath, president of Capital Cities-ABC Video Enterprises, Inc., will not say how much ESPN or ABC's two other cable ventures are making. But all are profitable, he says, and ABC "has the objective of expanding" with new projects.

"But it's not that easy anymore," he adds. "Startups are very difficult, and buying into existing cable networks is an expensive hobby."

What about network affiliates' fears or grumbles about cable competition when in their networks are involved?

"I remember the network affiliate meeting (in 1980) when we announced that we were going to get into some cable programming, Granath says.

There has been relatively little fuming since, he adds, even with ESPN, now in the second year of a three-year National Football League contract giving it rights to 13 regular-season games and sharing of the Superbowl.

## 'Place-holders' help fill fall void

NEW YORK (AP) — Some of the new shows on the networks' fall schedule aren't so new, but they'll do the job until late October and November when the real fall schedule kicks in.

Because of the four-month writers strike, the networks made commitments to some series that were "strike-proof" as well as others that weren't really all that good but looked better because at least they were written.

Two ABC "place-holders" are old series being re-shot from the original scripts.

"Mission Impossible" premieres Oct. 23 and will fill in for "A Fine Romance," an ambitious international romantic comedy, filmed in Europe, that won't get on the air until January. Peter Graves returns in the role he created in the late '60s, but the rest of the cast is new. One of them is Phil Morris, son of Greg Morris, a main character on the original show. The series is being shot in Australia.

ABC is also reviving "Police Story," which will premiere Oct. 29. The original, created by Joseph Wambaugh, ran in the 1970s and was one of the best police dramas television has ever seen. An anthology series, it is filling in for "The ABC Mystery Movie," a ro-

tating movie series that will include a rejuvenated "Columbo," starring Peter Falk, that is delayed until January.

CBS has already begun running the sitcoms "The Cavanaughs," which will be replaced when "Coming of Age" comes in Oct. 31, and "First Impressions," which was to have been a mid-season replacement, but fills in for "Raising-Miranda," which premieres Nov. 5.

Some of the interim programming will never get on the air because once the strike was settled, some new shows were delayed by only a few weeks. NBC has kept an option for instance on "The Hardy Boys," but doesn't plan to do more than a movie or so instead of the series.

CBS bought but has yet to give an air date to "Jake's Journey," a funny, Monty Python-esque fantasy-comedy in which an American teen-ager takes up with an medieval knight, played by Monty Python's Graham Chapman. Also yet to get an air date from CBS is "Dolphin Bay," a family drama set around a scientist studying dolphins in Australia. Shades of "Flipper."

Some other "reality-based" fillers: CBS has "High Risk," a magazine-type show that features reports on

people with dangerous jobs or hobbies. It will be replaced Nov. 29 by "TV 101," a back-to-school drama about kids learning to make a television newscast.

Beginning Oct. 29, ABC has "Trackdown," another "America's Most Wanted"-type show. In this one, viewers watch police bring in parole violators. It fills in for the George Segal crime drama "Murphy's Law," which makes its debut Dec. 3.

CBS is offering an entertainment series, "Live! Dick Clark Presents," which has already premiered and runs until Oct. 26 when the sitcoms "The Van Dyke Show" and the as-yet untitled new Mary Tyler Moore show premiere.

Strike-proof shows that seem to have made the schedule without caveat are NBC's "Unsolved Mysteries," a weekly magazine series based on the highly successful specials of last season, and ABC's "Incredible Sunday," a rejuvenation of "That's Incredible!"

## 'Almost Grown' trades on nostalgia

NEW YORK (AP) — In the concluding scene in the pilot of CBS' "Almost Grown," Norm and Suzie sit in a car listening to a rock station on the radio. They have changed in the 20-odd years since they met, but the music has not.

"Those same three chords," Norm says. "It's good to know there's something you can count on."

"Almost Grown" is an ambitious history of a marriage, set against that nebulous force that formed a generation who came of age in the '60s and '70s — rock 'n' roll.

The show inevitably will be compared to ABC's "thirtysomething," since it deals with a couple in their 30s and the foibles of the New Age 1980s and is designed to appeal to baby boomers.

But it's a unique, engaging show that deserves a look on its own merit. Timothy Daly and Eve Gordon star as Norman and Suzie. Each episode intends to flash back from the present

to the pre-Beatles 1960s, when Norm and Suzie were in high school, and-or 1971-ish, when they were college revolutionaries.

All three phases are equally evocative, and Daly and Gordon manage to play the couple convincingly from high school to impending middle age.

The two-hour pilot, premiering Nov. 27, begins with Norm finding Suzie in a store's shoe department, wearing a white wedding gown. It flashes back to their meeting in high school, when Norm was the goody-goody best friend of Suzie's brother Joey (Albert Macklin) and Suzie was a wild child, hanging out with Angelo, the hood. She develops a crush on Norm and hears "Today I Met the Boy I'm Gonna Marry" on the radio.

By 1971, they are living together at college. He's a disc jockey on the university radio station, she's an aspiring documentary filmmaker out to change the world. They spout free love, but become jealous. Suzie walks out after

getting the message via The Chambers Brothers' "Time Has Come Today."

Cut to the '80s. Two children later, she is a technical filmmaker working in a medical lab. He is a program director at a radio station. They are divorced, and Suzie is about to get married again, to a saintly, globe-trotting doctor who performs cosmetic surgery on victims of disasters.

By the end of the pilot, we come full circle and learn why Suzie was trying on shoes in a wedding dress.

The writing could be punched up, but with its realistic references, like a 1971 remark about the hallucinogen psilocybin, and offbeat touches, such as a Satanist butler in 1988, "Almost Grown" could develop a following.

## 'Knightwatch' tries film noir

NEW YORK (AP) — In ABC's new drama "Knightwatch," it's hard to tell who the good guys are.

That seems to be the point of the premiere of this murky film noir about a Guardian Angels-type group whose members aspire to defend citizens on the mean streets of New York, but who occasionally go over the bounds of accepted law enforcement practices — as when one of them throws a suspect off a building.

Eventually it becomes apparent that the Knights are indeed the good guys, even if they are struggling a bit in their search for a meaningful value system amid the squalor of their

ghetto neighborhood.

In the premiere episode, a hero emerges: handsome Calvin (Dan Franklin), a good-as-gold, blue-collar kid who wants to follow in his late father's public-service footsteps.

Calvin becomes the focal point of the group's moral dilemma when he cops to the cops that his partner, John, threw a would-be rapist off a roof. The rest of the Knights shun him, and after wrestling with his conscience, he discards his Knights jacket.

To deal with his angst, Calvin rides his motorcycle to a soundtrack of rock music.
