## Discovery puts U.S. back into space

### Manned station next step

WASHINGTON — The United States and 11 allied countries signed an agreement Thursday to build a \$23 billion permanently manned space station designed to serve as a stepping-stone for human exploration of the solar system.

The facility, known as Space Station Freedom, will be designed, developed, operated and used by all of the partners, which include nine European allies, Japan and Canada, in addition to the United States.

The United States is providing \$16 billion to the program and the other partners are contributing more than \$7 billion. The agreement was formalized at a State Department signing ceremony at which Secretary of State George P. Shultz presided. Officials said it was a coincidence that the agreement was signed on the same day that the Discovery space shuttle was launched at Cape Canaveral, Fla.

Richard-Smith, a State Department scientist, told reporters the project is "clearly the world's largest ever international venture and certainly one of the most complex."

Margaret Finarelli, an official of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, said the European countries, all members of the European Space Agency, will contribute \$4.2 billion to the project, Japan \$2 billion and Canada \$1 billion.

Twenty-two shuttle flights over a period of three years will be required to place in Earth orbit all the hardware for the station. Construction will be completed in the first quarter of 1993 although the facility will be permanently inhabited from late 1996 on, according to current plans.

A State Department summary of the program said a manned space station is needed to lay the groundwork for a colony on the moon or a manned mission to Mars.

The station will be used to study the effects of prolonged weightlessness on humans and to create a life support system for long space voyages.

The project will comprise a combination of permanently manned, man-tended and unmanned elements.

Flight goes well despite few hitches

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — Space shuttle Discovery carried the American flag back into orbit Thursday after a 32-month absence, its five astronauts riding a 700-foot tail of flame from rockets meticulously redesigned after the Challenger disaster.

"Everyone certainly stood tall today," said Kennedy Space Center director Forrest S. McCartney as Discovery settled into orbit, 184 miles above Earth. Although the flight was going well, a cooling system problem raised the temperature in the cabin to an uncomfortable 87 degrees and Mission Control advised the astronauts to drink at least eight ounces of water every hour.

Six hours after liftoff the crew accomplished the main mission of its flight, release of a \$100-million satellite that will give NASA nearly constant communication with future shuttle missions.

Discovery's was the first shuttle launch since January 1986, when the Challenger explosion — with its toll of seven lives — shocked the nation and froze the manned space program in its tracks.

"We sure appreciate your all getting us up in orbit the way we should be," Discovery's commander, Navy Capt. Frederick Hauck, told Mission Control. "We're looking forward to the next four days — we have a lot to do and we're going to have a lot of fun doing it."

Liftoff was the first and most important milestone, but more was at stake than simply getting into space. The 21-year grounding of the shuttle fleet set back the nation's satellite delivery capability, and release of the communications satellite was the No. 1 task of the mission.

On their fifth turn around Earth, mission specialist John Lounge flipped switches that released NASA's giant Tracking and Data Relay Satellite from Discovery's cargo bay.

But the most difficult part was getting the giant satellite, with its antennas spanning 50 feet, to its duty station 22,300 miles high. Right on time, triggered by an automatic timer, an attached rocket fired and

The trip was paid for through fund-raisers by the girls and donations.

"They viewed the launch from an area reserved for National Aeronautics and Space Administration employees thanks to Vince Thomas, a NASA technician who met the girls while visiting Rupert earlier this year.

All five said the power of the launch impressed them.

"It was really loud," Pippa said. "It was like the roar of thunder." The launch "vibrated the ground," she said.

Julie and Danielle said the launch was much different from what they had seen on television.

"When you watch it on TV it seems kinda mechanical," Julie said.

"On television it's closer but when you're here you can feel it," Danielle said.

For some, knowledge of the Challenger disaster was hard to ignore.

"I had my fingers crossed," Julie said. "I was just thinking whether it was going to blow or if it wouldn't blow up," Misty said.

"Danielle, when asked what she was thinking during the launch, said, 'I felt like it's a once in a lifetime experience.'

The girls and leaders will visit Epcot Center, Disney World and Spaceport, Kennedy Space Center's visitor's center, before they fly to Salt Lake City and drive to Rupert late Monday.

## UN peacekeepers receive Nobel award

OSLO, Norway — Soldiers on the front lines of the United Nations' 40-year quest for peace won the 1988 Nobel Peace Prize on Thursday for steadfast duty in the cross fire of the world's conflicts.

The Nobel Committee said the U.N. peacekeeping troops built greater faith in the United Nations, which "has come to play a more central part in world affairs."

U.N. leaders praised the award but appealed again for the release of a U.S. Marine kidnapped while serving with U.N. peacekeepers in Lebanon.

The award could bolster new U.N. peacemaking efforts to oversee shaky truce agreements in the Persian Gulf and Afghanistan.

In Jerusalem, peacekeepers broke open bottles of champagne to celebrate the prestigious award as the word was passed by radio from outpost to outpost. Five of the seven peacekeeping forces are in the Middle East.

guards a crossing point between Greek and Turkish sectors of Nicosia, the capital of Cyprus.

Nearly 10,000 peacekeepers from more than 30 countries serve under the U.N. flag. Peacekeepers most recently were dispatched to Iran and Iraq under a cease-fire negotiated in the countries' 8-year-long war.

"There is great joy," said Timor Goskel, spokesman for the U.N. Interim Force in Lebanon. He spoke from UNIFIL headquarters in Naqoura, Lebanon.

The citation from the Nobel Committee, made up of five Norwegians, said the troops showed the world's determination to settle disputes peacefully. It said they "made a decisive contribution toward the initiation of actual peace negotiations."

Some peacekeepers carry light arms, but they can fire only in self-defense. The United Nations says 783 peacekeepers have lost their lives since 1948.

Lt. Col. William R. Higgins, who headed the 76-member U.N. supervision group in south Lebanon, is among nine American hostages in Lebanon. Higgins, 43, was seized Feb. 17,

## Thomas says lottery will lead to casinos

BOISE — One of Idaho's most prominent lawyers, Eugene Thomas of Boise, says he believes the lottery proposal before Idaho voters in November will open the door wide open to casino-type gambling.

"I think the people are being misled" about the true intent of the proposed constitutional amendment, Thomas said Thursday at a news conference. "I feel I have an obligation to speak up."

Thomas is the head of a large Boise law firm and former president of the American Bar Association. He said he is not affiliated with Consider, an anti-lottery organization, and is not a member of any church organization or group against the lottery.

Earlier in the week, Attorney General Jim Jones, whose office reviewed the lottery proposal when it went to the Legislature, made a similar announcement.

Idaho voters in 1986 overwhelmingly approved a lottery initiative, but it was blocked by lawsuits. Voters in November will decide a proposal to remove a flat ban on state lotteries from the Idaho Constitution.

The Legislature already has approved laws allowing a state lottery to go into operation if voters approve the amendment. Included is a \$1 million line of credit to start the lottery.

Thomas said the lottery legislation was badly drawn and is misleading.

"This is one of the worst legal proposals ever put to the people of Idaho during my lifetime," said Thomas. He called it "an open door" policy toward casino gambling.

But Larry LaRocco, chairman of Idahoans for the Lottery, said Thomas is doing people a disservice by coming forth almost two years after the lottery question was decided, raising new objections.

"He's doing a disservice to the 60 percent of the people who voted for the lottery in 1986 by waiting two years to make this announcement," said LaRocco.

"I regret that he did not testify at the hearings before the Legislature when the constitutional amendment" was receiving full and complete testi-

## Farmers' prices up sharply in September

WASHINGTON — Prices farmers got for raw products in September rose 0.7 percent from August, including the highest wheat prices in almost seven years, the Agriculture Department said Thursday.

But the rise from August to September was the smallest monthly increase since the drought began cutting 1988 harvest prospects and triggered rising prices last spring.

After holding steady during most of the winter, the USDA index rose 3.1 percent from April to May, followed by 2.2 percent in June, 2.9 percent in July and 2.1 percent in August.

Mostly as a result of the drought and searing

heat during the spring and summer, U.S. grain production is expected to be down 31 percent from last year's harvest.

The department's Agricultural Statistics Board said in its preliminary report that higher prices for grapefruit, milk and wheat contributed most to the September increase. Lower prices for hogs, oranges and broiler chickens partly offset the rise in other commodities.

The September prices averaged 12 percent higher than a year earlier. Prices of some major commodities are based on mid-month averages and then are revised the following month when additional information is available.

The mid-September prices for corn, soybeans and wheat were higher than the respective aver-

ages for the month of August," the report said. "The all-wheat price was at the highest level since November of 1981."

But the report added that "hog prices dropped off sharply" from August and continued well below the high prices sustained during the last half of 1986 and in most of 1987.

Prices of most animals as a group dropped 1.8 percent from August and averaged 3.5 percent below the level of September 1987.

Dairy products climbed 3.3 percent from the August price average, overall, but still lagged a year earlier by 3.8 percent, the report said. Milk prices paid to farmers were up 40 cents per 100 pounds from August but were 50 cents below the year-ago

# Candidates praise space shot, then resume long-distance fight

George Bush and Michael Dukakis chorused praise for America's triumphant return to space on Thursday, then resumed their sparring in a long-distance campaign fight over Social Security, the environment and political etiquette.

Bush accused Dukakis of demagoguery on Social Security, saying his Democratic rival supported a move to curtail cost-of-living benefits in 1985 — the very step that the vice president has been criticized for by the Democrats.

Dukakis acknowledged Thursday night that at a National Governors' Association meeting in 1985, he first voted to drop Social Security from a list of programs to be covered by a proposed one-year freeze in cost-of-living increases. Dukakis said he lent his support for the overall freeze after the attempt to protect Social Security increases was voted down.

The Massachusetts governor said in Illinois that he cast the vote "as a general expression of my concern for the deficit, but I made it very clear that I was opposed to cutting cost-of-living increases for Social Security recipients."

"There were a great many of us (governors) who opposed any cut in Social Security, but we at least wanted to give the administration a mes-

sage that we were concerned about the deficit," he said.

Dukakis stood with actor and environmentalist Robert Redford at his side as he attacked Bush as a man whom polluters should love. Calling George Bush an environmentalist like the enflaming Dan Quayle, a statesman, the Democrat said in a two-sided attack against both members of the Republican ticket.

Bush came to the youthful Quayle's defense and then got off a double-edged attack of his own when he scoffed at Dukakis' claims of being tough on crime. "If you believe that, he's got some bottled water from Boston Harbor he'd like to sell you," the vice president said in a crack about Massachusetts' own pollution problems.

Quayle was in Washington getting ready for next Wednesday's national television debate with Democratic vice presidential candidate Lloyd Bentsen.

Bentsen campaigned in Tennessee, where he had hoped to watch the launch of the space shuttle with a group of schoolchildren. The Texas senator left before the delayed blast-off, but said later, "It was a spectacular takeoff. OK, Russians, we're back."

Politicians now to task in the glow of favorable news, and for Dukakis and Bush — as for Bentsen — the

successful launch of the shuttle Discovery more than two and a half years after the Challenger disaster was irresistible.

Bush had concluded his speech to a campaign crowd in St. Charles, Mo., when he learned from aides the shuttle had been launched. He returned to the platform to tell cheering supporters, "We're going to keep the edge in space. We're back. America's back."

Bush said he hoped to attend the shuttle landing next week in California. Asked at a news conference if he would invite Dukakis to share the moment with him, the vice president said, "That would be making a political event of it — the two of us. I certainly have no plans to do that, gracious though it may be."

Dukakis offered similarly upbeat sentiments about the shuttle in New Jersey, opening his speech on the environment by saying it was a "very successful morning. As all of you know, the space launch was successful. We're very proud of the astronauts."

Dukakis collected endorsements from several environmental groups and from sure-fire crowd pleaser Redford at his side as he criticized the environmental record compiled by the Reagan administration and pledged to step up the pace of toxic waste cleanup.

### Mistrial ruling ends Rowan case

WASHINGTON (AP) — A judge on Thursday declared a mistrial in the weapons-possession case of syndicated columnist Carl T. Rowan after the jury reported it was hopelessly deadlocked.

Earlier in the day, Judge Arthur L. Burnett of District of Columbia Superior Court had re-read his instructions to the jury after the 12-member panel said it was unable to reach a verdict.

Rowan has been charged with using an unregistered handgun and ammunition to wound a loan-shed insider in the backyard of his home last June. He faced a maximum penalty of two years in prison and a \$2,000 fine if convicted.

### Brazilian police capture hijacker

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil (AP) — Police shot and captured an armed hijacker as he tried to board a getaway plane with a hostage in central Brazil Thursday, ending an ordeal that left one person dead and four injured, officials said.

The rest of the passengers and crew of VASP Flight 375 were released unharmed.

Authorities said the hijacker killed the airliner's pilot and wounded three other crew members. They described the hijacker as mentally disturbed.

Federal Police Chief Romeu Tuma told reporters in Goiania, 850 miles northwest of Rio de Janeiro, that the hijacker survived his bullet wounds.

## Commuter airlines turn in licenses

WASHINGTON (AP) — A federal safety investigation of the commuter airline industry has uncovered management problems and, in nearly a dozen cases, the falsification of maintenance and operational records, the Federal Aviation Administration said Thursday.

The agency said that one commuter airline voluntarily surrendered its operating certificate after being inspected and another may be forced to halt operations. Eight others air carriers singled out for inspection gave up their certificates before the inspections could begin, although in at least one case, the airline denied its action was related to the probe.

The FAA investigation, which began last March, covered about 20 percent of the commuter airline industry. The agency is expected to is-

sue a report on its findings by December.

FAA officials said Thursday that 35 commuter airlines were singled out and inspected. One of the carriers, Air New Orleans, voluntarily surrendered its commuter certificate after the inspection, the agency said.

Seven other airlines turned in their operating certificates as commuter carriers voluntarily before the FAA inspections could get under way, according to FAA spokesman Fred Farnas.

The FAA identified the seven airlines as Arctic Circle Air, AvAir, Dade Helicopter Jet, Exec Express, South Pacific Island Airways, Texas National Air and Grand Canyon Airlines.

A sightseeing aircraft belonging to Grand Canyon Airlines collided with

a helicopter over the Grand Canyon in June 1985, killing 25 people. It was not immediately clear whether Grand Canyon's surrender of its commuter certificate affects its sightseeing operation.

At least three of the carriers — AvAir, Dade Helicopter Jet and South Pacific Island — already had been under Chapter 11 bankruptcy proceedings, according to the FAA.

Glenn Schaub, president of AvAir, said in a telephone interview from Raleigh, N.C., that AvAir surrendered its certificate to the FAA in June, but he said the action had "absolutely nothing" to do with the impending FAA inspection of the airline.

"We had so'd the flight operations portion of the company ... and didn't need the certificate anymore," Schaub said.

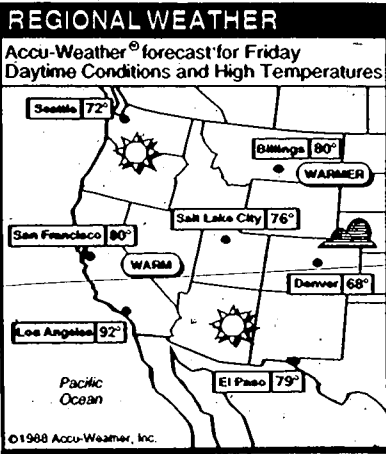
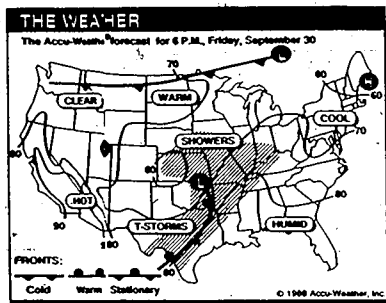

The satellite began its six-hour journey. Once there, another burn after midnight was to circularize its orbit so it would remain over the same spot on Earth for years to come.

The satellite is a twin of the craft that was destroyed aboard Challenger.

In Washington, President Reagan praised the Discovery launch, saying the shuttle was "headed into orbit and America is back in space." He saluted the bravery of the crew and added, "We ask God to bless this important voyage."

Launch, at 9:37 a.m. MDT, came

only after NASA waived weather guidelines to allow for flight through some lighter-than-usual Florida winds. The 98-minute delay simply heightened the tension as NASA unveiled a spaceship that underwent more than 400 modifications since the Challenger flight.

Just how well the Discovery's booster rockets performed in their new design awaited detailed analysis. But J.R. Thompson, who directed the work from the Marshall Space Flight Center in Alabama said, "From everything I see, everything looks great."

Hauk's veteran flight crew con-

sisted of Air Force Col. Richard Covey, Marine Lt. Col. David C. Hillmers; George D. "Pinky" Nelson, and Louie. Landing was scheduled for Monday at Edwards Air Force Base in California.

The astronauts had said all along they were treating the mission as a test mission — a "shakedown flight," in the words of Covey — and they quickly ran into first-flight problems.

A water evaporator that provides cooling to the ship during the climb to space and return to Earth was partly clogged with ice. And a device that provides electrical power to move an orbital steering engine was not working.

mony from concerned citizens, LaRocca said.

"If he had volunteered his legal expertise at that point, pro-lottery advocates would not be faced with this type of charge."

LaRocca said he and other lottery advocates "would like to go on the record to say pro-lottery advocates are absolutely against casino-type gambling. Groups such as mine have been formed to follow through with the wishes of 60 percent of the people from the 1985 votes."

"Attempting to associate the lottery with gambling interests is a phony issue and Idahoans recognize it as such," LaRocca said.

Thomas said a provision in the

amendment allows charitable organizations to conduct games of chance. He said that would allow almost any organization, even those not based in Idaho, to apply for a gambling license and conduct casino-type gambling.

The amendment says such games of chance must be operated under applicable state law, but Thomas said he did not think the Idaho Legislature could be trusted to restrict such operations.

If the amendment passes, he said, "gambling influences will find a way to sell the proposition" in Idaho.

He said he would expect gambling interests could be expected to lobby the Legislature and come up with big financial contributions.

He noted that two-thirds of the members of both House and Senate voted to put the lottery proposition before the voters.

"It is not a Legislature we should rely upon to get gambling out of the state," he said.

He said better alternatives to the current lottery proposal were before the 1986 Legislature, but they did not pass.

Randy Furniss, director of the anti-gambling consumer organization, said as of Thursday it had about 10,000 volunteers working against the lottery and \$150,000 in contributions. He said Consider's advertising campaign will be stepped up in the next few weeks.

level. The department's all-crops price index for September was up 3 percent from August and averaged 32 percent more than a year ago. Soybeans, at \$8.42 per bushel, were up 9 cents from August, and wheat averaged \$3.82 per bushel, up 21 cents.

Prices of fruit, as an overall average, were up 3.9 percent from August and 2.2 percent from a year ago, the report said. Commercial vegetables were up 4.1 percent from August, averaging 20 percent more than in September 1987.

The report said: Cattle averaged \$66 per 100 pounds of live weight nationally, up from \$65.90 in August and \$63.70 reported for September 1987. Those are averages for all types of cattle sold as beef.

Hogs averaged \$40.30 per 100 pounds, compared with \$44.70 in August and \$44.30 a year earlier.

Corn, at \$2.71 a bushel, was up from \$2.65 in August and the average of \$1.49 per bushel a year earlier.

Wheat prices at the farm, according to preliminary figures, averaged \$3.82 per bushel, compared with \$3.61 in August and \$2.64 a year earlier.

Soybeans were \$8.42 per bushel, compared with \$8.33 in August and \$5.02 a year earlier.

Eggs were 63.8 cents per dozen, compared with 58.1 cents in August and 58.2 cents a year earlier.

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## Prison officials finally allow viewing of riot area

BOISE (AP) — A calendar on the wall of heavily damaged Unit 9 at the Idaho State Penitentiary bears red-ink slashes through every day of the month up to Sunday, Sept. 25 — when rampaging inmates held the unit for three-and-a-half hours and killed Richard Holmes of Tampa.

After keeping the damage in the close-security unit behind closed doors since Sunday night, prison officials Thursday allowed two reporters, a photographer and a TV cameraman to survey the damage.

Cell 48, where Holmes was stabbed to death apparently for informing to police in the Denise Williams murder case, was draped with black plastic to prevent any disturbance to the crime scene.

Holmes, 35, was charged with aiding and abetting in the killing of Ms. Williams last September in the Cwythe County desert. But court records indicating Holmes had directed police to her body may have led to his murder. Maxwell Hoffman has been charged with first-degree murder in her death. Ronald Wages has pleaded guilty to the same crime.

There was no mistaking the fury of the assault at the heart of the 15-year-old cell block, which still resembled a battleground Thursday.

A bonfire had been set in a metal-walled office, where blackened office furniture lay sprawled in a deep pile of ash. White paint blistered from the walls.

"We were in here five hours after this was over and, boy, was it hot," said Warden Dave Paskett, who led the hour-long tour. Virtually every piece of glass in sight was smashed. Dozens of holes were punched in walls and ceilings.

Some 26 inmates already have been returned to "C" tier, the least damaged of Unit 9's three, cell-lined spokes.

Corrections Director Al Murphy said he expects to place the remaining 50 back in their cells in about two weeks.

Sunday's riot erupted after two unarmed guards told inmates to turn over homemade fruit-peel liquor, known as "squawkie."

## Inquest for Arco fatal shooting by police chief is set for Oct. 7

ARCO (AP) — A coroner's inquest into the fatal shooting of a Howe man by Arco's chief of police has been scheduled for Oct. 7, Butte County Coroner C.W. Bud Marvel has announced.

"We're just trying to determine if the officer was justified in doing what he did," Marvel said Thursday.

At least six witnesses "and probably more" will be called to testify, he said.

Police Chief Joe Whilden shot and killed Gerald John Mitchell, 51, after Mitchell wrestled Whilden to the floor of the Butte County Sheriff's Office during a fight with law officers, authorities said.

Mitchell and his wife, Kathleen "Kit" Mitchell, had been arguing when Mrs. Mitchell went into the office to seek help, authorities said. Butte County Sheriff Darrell Richards has said that Mitchell was

not armed.

Marvel said he, Richards and county Prosecuting Attorney William Carlson were in the process of choosing the inquest's six-person jury, which will be questioned by Carlson.

Whilden, 46, has not returned to work since the incident. The two-man police department is being run by Of-

ficer Kenneth Havlichak, authorities said. Inquest jurists issue written verdicts identifying a victim and stating when, where and how a person died.

If the jury believes the death stemmed from a criminal act, it must say so and name the person jurors believe to be responsible for the death.

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## Group talks of steps to prevent Yellowstone repeat

WASHINGTON (AP) — An interagency review committee probably will recommend steps in Yellowstone National Park to prevent the century-long buildup of dead trees that made this summer's fires so destructive, Interior Secretary Donald P. Hodel said Thursday.

And the chief ranger of the National Park Service said controlled burning hasn't been done before in Yellowstone because the predominant species there, lodgepole pine, is almost impossible to burn under control.

Hodel told two Senate subcommittees that he and Agriculture Secretary Richard Lyng on Monday named members of a panel of experts to make recommendations for changes in firefighting policies by Dec. 15. The panel was instructed to consult other experts in universities, state governments and other places outside the federal establishment.

Lyng's department controls the Forest Service, the agency with the dominant role in fighting most fires on government land. Hodel's department is in charge of the National

Park Service, which runs Yellowstone.

"I would expect them to come back with a recommended means of trying to reduce the fuel. I don't think anybody can tell me what that will be," Hodel told the agriculture, nutrition and forest subcommittee of the Agriculture Committee and the public lands and parks subcommittee of the Energy and Natural Resources Committee.

The hearing was called to ventilate complaints of Western senators that the "let it burn" policy of the Park Service in effect since 1972 had led to a disaster for the park.

Although siberian pines have employed controlled burns to regenerate the land, they had never been used in Yellowstone despite the buildup of dead trees from almost a century of trying to put out every fire.

Walt Dabney, the chief ranger, said, "The only time that material (lodgepole pine) will burn successfully is when it's very dry" and there are winds to move the fire

along.

"To light a fire when it's dry and windy, you're in the same situation we were in this year. It's very hard to control," he testified.

Dale Robertson, chief of the Forest Service, said his agency would plant new trees where needed, but William Penn Matt, director of the Park Service, said Yellowstone plantings would be limited to native grasses and wildflowers along the roads and along trout streams if necessary to hold back erosion from bare ground.

Lodgepole pine needs fire to burst cones and throw seeds on the ground. Seed counts, Matt said, show 50,000 per acre — more than one per square foot — where the hottest fires burned and up to a million per acre elsewhere.

"We don't need seeds," Matt said.

In mid-July, the park service decided to fight all the fires in Yellowstone — some of which had entered from Forest Service land outside the park. Hodel confirmed the decision during a visit there July 22.

## Pocatello gasoline prices drop after Jones promises inquiry

POCATELLO (AP) — Just days after Attorney General Jim Jones promised motorists an inquiry, gasoline retailers in the Pocatello area have started reducing the pump prices.

But the dealers said Thursday that the price reductions of a couple of cents a gallon were prompted by cuts in wholesale prices that reflected a drop in refinery costs.

"It has nothing to do with Jim Jones," said the owner of Big Bear Chevron, who asked that his name not be used. "We have nothing to be afraid of. Jim Jones doesn't scare us a bit."

On Monday, Jones said the rising price of gasoline to an unusually high level in the Pocatello area over the past two months was of some concern, especially since prices normally drop after the Labor Day weekend.

Motorists have complained because

gasoline had been selling for nearly \$1.06 a gallon in Pocatello when it was generally under \$1 in surrounding communities.

But by mid-week, the retail price of gasoline in Pocatello had dropped by 2 cents a gallon.

Jones has made similar investigative threats in southwestern Idaho, and they have also been followed by a drop in fuel prices. Five years ago, Jones also won price-fixing cases against several Pocatello gasoline dealers.

"We had already made our adjustments before he made those comments," said a Pocatello Creek Self Serv spokesman, who also did not provide his name.

"But anytime the attorney general makes a comment like that, of course, it's going to have an impact," he said.

## Oneida prosecutor quits over low budget

MALAD CITY (AP) — Oneida County Prosecutor David Evans has resigned, citing an unrealistically low budget from county commissioners.

But commissioners said they have been forced to approve one of the tightest budgets in history and cannot allocate more to the office.

The commission set the budget for the part-time prosecutor's office at \$15,000 for the new year, over \$3,800

lower than Evans had asked for. Evans said he could no longer subsidize the office's operations out of the overhead from his private practice.

Pocatello attorney Randy Kline has been hired to take over the county prosecuting work beginning next week.

Evans maintained Oneida County has one of the lowest law enforcement budgets in the state.

## Bonneville County pays debt for Rhoads prosecution costs

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Ten months after deciding to go into debt, Bonneville County has made the last payment on the loan it obtained to finance prosecution of convicted triple-murderer Paul Ezra Rhoads.

The county delivered a check for nearly \$77,000 to Idaho First National Bank on Thursday to retire the warrants it issued last November in the Rhoads case.

Because Rhoads was indigent, Bonneville County paid all costs for both prosecution and defense. Rhoads was found guilty in January of first-degree murder and other crimes in the death of Idaho Falls teacher Susan Michelbacher and he pleaded guilty in the death of convenience store clerk Nolan Haddon. He has also been convicted in Bingham County of murdering Blackfoot convenience store clerk Stacy Baldwin.

He has received three death sen-

tences and five terms of life imprisonment.


The county spent \$157,000 on the case from arrest through trial, and has spent \$2,775 thus far on the appeal process. State Corrections Board member L. James Knutnik has said it costs more to press a death penalty case through appeals than it would for the state to imprison a felon for his natural life.

The county had been financing the case out of its contingency fund until expenses began to snowball last fall when the trial date drew near.

Defense attorneys have been paid \$50,000 by the county and a special deputy prosecutor got \$14,000. Jury expenses were \$10,000.

Other expenses included \$1,300 for a fingerprint expert, \$3,100 for a psychiatric expert, \$5,900 for a forensics expert and nearly \$6,000 for special investigators.

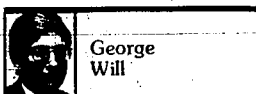
## Triumph of pharmacology must be kept clear of all sports

WASHINGTON — Sport is play, but play has a serious side. Competition can be elevating for participants and spectators. Thus the integrity of sport is a civic concern. And it is important to say precisely why what Ben Johnson did was wrong.

Runners at the highest levels of competition comprise a small community. They know all that is possible regarding enhancement of performance. And they know what is permissible. Johnson used steroids surreptitiously and in defiance of clear rules that are constantly reiterated. However, Johnson and many others involved in the intense pursuit of competitive edge may not really understand the reasons for the rules he broke.

Legs have 40 percent of the body's muscle mass. Steroids build muscle mass as well as hasten healing. Johnson's legs exploded him to victory by a margin of 1/100ths of a second. Did steroids make the difference? Hard to say. What has to be said is why using substances constitutes cheating.

When judging a performance-enhancing technique or technology, the crucial criterion

is: Does it improve performance without devaluing it. Begin by considering precisely the value drained away by cheating, then decide if use of steroids constitutes cheating.

Bartlett Giampatti, baseball's next commissioner, is the designated metaphysician of American sport. Last year, he flexed his mental muscles regarding disciplinary action against a pitcher who was caught using sandpaper to scuff balls, thereby giving pitches more pronounced movements.

Giampatti noted that most disciplinary cases involve impulsive violence, which is less morally grave than cheating. Such acts of violence, although intolerable, spring from the nature of physical contests between aggressive competitors. Such violence is a reprehensible extension

of the physical exertion that is integral to the contest. Rules try to contain, not expunge, violent effort.

But cheating derives not from excessive, impulsive zeal in the heat of competition. Rather it is a cold, covert attempt to alter conditions of competition. As Giampatti puts it, cheating has no organic origin in the act of playing and cheating devalues any contest designed to declare a winner among participants playing under identical rules and conditions. Toward cheating, the proper policy is zero tolerance.

Now, advances in training and sports medicine (medicine broadly defined, which reaches beyond prevention or treatment of injuries) make problematic the idea, central to sport, of competitors competing on an even footing. Nowadays there can be significant inequalities regarding techniques of training and nutrition.

Intensity in training should be rewarded with success in competition. But intense training should involve enhancing one's powers by methods (e.g., weight training) or materials (eat your spinach) that enhance the body's normal

functioning. It is one thing to take vitamins, another thing to take a drug that facilitates abnormal growth (or makes a competitor abnormally aggressive).

An athlete steps over the line separating legitimate from illegitimate preparation for competition when he seeks advantage from radical intrusions into his body. A radical intrusion is one that does not enhance normal functioning but rather causes the body to behave abnormally. Illegitimate interventions cause an athlete to perform not unusually well—every athlete's aim—but unnaturally well.

Steroids are dangerous to the user's health. Even if an athlete is willing to run the risk, his competitors should not have to run it in order to compete. That is a sufficient reason for proscribing them. But even if steroids and other performance-enhancing drugs were risk-free, there would still be sufficient reasons for cleansing sport of them.

Drugs that make sport exotic make it less exemplary. Sport becomes less of a shared activity. It becomes less a drama of people per-

forming well than a spectacle of bodies chemically propelled.

Athletes who seek a competitive edge through chemical advantage do not just over-value winning; they misunderstand why winning is properly valued. It is properly valued as the reward for, and evidence of, praiseworthy attributes. They include the lonely submission to an exacting training regimen, and the mental mastery of pressure, pain and exhaustion.

In short, sport is valued not only because it builds character but because it puts on display, and crowns with glory, for the elevation of spectators as well as participants, attributes we associate with good character. Good character, not good chemistry.

A society's recreation is charged with moral significance. Sport would be debased, and with it a society that takes sport seriously, if sport did not strictly forbid things that blur the distinction between the triumph of character and the triumph of pharmacology.

## Rigidity rooted in political process Yellowstone's problem

The fires that burned more than 1 million acres of Yellowstone Park and the surrounding region this summer have led Secretary of the Interior Donald Hodel to begin a formal review of the "let-it-burn" component of the park's natural regulation policy.

Whether the policy will remain intact depends on how much political power the environmental groups that support it are able to muster in the next administration.

But the problem with the management of Yellowstone is not the natural regulation policy per se. It is the rigidity stemming from the political process. As a public agency, the Park Service bows to the political winds. Right now, high government officials are testing the winds to see how they can pacify both the major environmental and conservation groups that favor natural regulation and outraged citizens living near the Yellowstone region whose lives and businesses have suffered from the fires.

The fires have vindicated the views of Montana writer Alton Chase. In his 1986 book, "Playing God in Yellowstone," he castigated natural regulation, winning the enmity of environmental leaders who pressured the Park Service to institute it nearly two decades ago. According to Chase, the Park Service interpretation of natural regulation excluded controlled burns to clean out woodland underbrush, dead wood and fallen leaves. The political pressure from Washington led to a rigid application of the policy. No local flexibility was permitted. As a consequence, the fires that started this summer had so much fuel that they burst out of control.

Chase further argued that the policy has led to deterioration of the park's vegetation and

wildlife habitat. Because natural regulation prohibits the culling of animal herds, it has allowed some species — namely, elk and buffalo — to overgraze the range. This has halted regrowth of vegetation such as willow and aspen, in turn contributing to the loss of the beaver. Yellowstone's image as nature's paradise is a myth, Chase says.

Chase believes that Yellowstone's vulnerability — shown to all the world in bright oranges and reds — stems from the power of park officials to overrule the wisdom of science. If scientists were in charge of the park, he claims, they would be willing to take the management steps required to restore the park to its glory as a rich habitat for wildlife.

But there is no reason to believe that scientists serving a political agency could, or legally should, ignore politics. Moreover, scientific approaches differ. Which would be deemed acceptable for running the park and who would decide?

The real problem that plagues publicly owned treasures is not a lack of science but an excess of politics. Park Service officials must nurture the support of special interests who will help them with Congress at budget time. In this case, the special interests are the powerful environmental organizations such as the National Audubon Society and the National Parks and Conservation Association. As long as politics rules, such groups will set policy, and this policy is applied regardless of what on-site managers think ought to be done.

Politics created the tinderbox in Yellowstone. For years, park managers suppressed all fires. In 1972, the policy changed, and natural (that is, lightning-caused) fires were allowed to burn. Accidental man-made fires were put out. Yet, incidentally to strictly follow the new policy, the park management did little, if any, controlled burning. The result was

the conflagration of 1988. Solving the problem must begin with new institutions insulated from politics to manage some of our parks.

One example is The Nature Conservancy. It is a conservation organization with private contributions in excess of \$70 million a year and landholdings totaling nearly 3 million acres. (Yellowstone is 2 million acres.)

The Conservancy's goal is similar to one of the Park Service's goals: to preserve rare habitat. But it accepts to a much smaller degree another goal: that of permitting visitors.

Unlike park officials, moreover, Conservancy caretakers are free to respond to changing situations with new ideas as they see fit. If deer populations on preserves controlled by the Wisconsin Nature Conservancy grow beyond the capacity of the range, managers issue one-time hunting permits to cull the herds. If the grizzly bear habitat needs reintroduction of natural food sources, Nature Conservancy managers will plant native species such as chokecherries. The Park Service, more constrained by rigid policies set in Washington, is less able to make even such limited moves.

The Conservancy could itself manage the back country part of, say, Yellowstone. The fewer visitors here would concur with its goals.

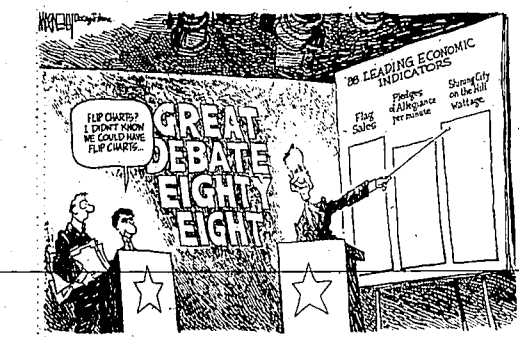
Another approach would be to manage a

portion of the park through a park endowment board, an idea proposed by our colleague Richard Stroup. Under Stroup's proposal, a portion of a park would be independently operated and financed by proceeds from entrance and special activity fees. Members of the board would be selected by Congress, chosen because they are recognized as experts committed to park values.

They would differ from current management in that they would have a clear single commitment: to protect wildlife habitat.

Visiting, which the Park Service welcomes, could be limited to minimize disturbance to the area. The board would be free to set conditions for visitation. That could include open recreation for a fee or special activities such as nature tours and funded research projects. According to the limited available data, visitors to our national parks are far richer than the average taxpayer and park fees are normally a tiny part of the total cost of a visit. As Yellowstone's policies are reviewed in the months ahead, innovative ideas like these should be high on the agenda. Perhaps the fiery summer of 1988 will spark other creative ideas.

# NASA expresses joy, relief

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — Thirty-two months of anxiety and frustration burst into exuberance and relief — as the space shuttle Discovery roared away Thursday and broke through a cloud of doubt over space workers across the country.

"This is a very, very special mission to us all," said John Kallenbach, an 18-year NASA employee who watched at Johnson Space Center in Houston as a senior advance system specialist for Lockheed Corp. "There was probably more apprehension and excitement in this one. This one had to fly."

"Relief — absolute relief. It feels so good," Kallenbach exulted. John Hotz, who covered the early days of the U.S. space program for Aviation Week & Space Technology magazine and later served on the presidential commission that investigated the Challenger disaster, said: "This is about as emotional a flight as I ever witnessed."

"I didn't cheer, I yelled. I'm still trying to get everything under control," Hotz said.

J.B. Thompson, director of the Marshall Space Center, broke out a foot-long Royal Jamaica cigar to celebrate. Inside the Kennedy Space Center

control room, he said, there was a progression of smiles, thumbs-up signs, cheers and finally, a roar, as the Discovery passed each of its initial post-launch tests.

Outside the neighboring Vehicle Assembly Building here, hundreds

of workers left their stations inside to whoop and cheer along with the launch that allowed them to again look ahead for a more stable space program than the revisions, layoffs, firings and uncertainty that followed the Jan. 28, 1986, Challenger explosion.

# Small crowds watch Discovery

TITUSVILLE, Fla. (AP) — Flags waved, cameras clicked and tents flowed as a smaller-than-expected crowd of about 250,000 people along Florida's Space Coast cheered the shuttle Discovery liftoff late Thursday morning.

"Oh my gosh, it was great," said 11-year-old Tommy Mathis of Detroit. "It was neat watching ... it just looked like a ball of fire at first going up. And it went into a cloud halfway up."

"As soon as it went out, it was beautiful," he said.

Patricia Mathis, 33, his mother, said tears just streamed down her face.

"I thought the most intense part was when they realized they were past that Challenger stage. Challenger blew up 73 seconds after launch on Jan. 28, 1986, killing its seven astronauts."

The crowds turned out to be far smaller than the 1 million authorities had been advised to prepare for. Mitch Varnes, a spokesman for Kennedy Space Center, said reports of the large crowds may have kept some away.

But those who risked traffic jams and launch delays, seemed more than satisfied they came.

"There's an awful lot of people that this means a whole bunch to that it didn't mean a thing two years ago," said Robert Zsolczai, a butcher from Miami who has seen 16 shuttle launches. He arrived Wednesday night but said he had a hard time settling to sleep in his van, which was decorated with signs wishing NASA and the Discovery crew good luck.

"Every 20 minutes you've got to look at it (the shuttle), make sure it's there and all that," he said before launch. "And I'm not the only one."

There's a lot of them that do that with binoculars. They sit here all night. They know it's there but you've got to keep reassuring yourself."

Many people were sleeping in cars parked along side U.S. 1 as the sun rose Thursday. Lines grew long at restaurants at gas stations and restaurants after they woke up.

By midmorning, traffic in Titusville had slowed to a trickle as attention turned eastward, toward the shuttle, which could be seen across

Indian River. Mette-Mari Walden, 23, of Larvik, Norway, prolonged her stay in the United States to see Discovery's launch. "It will probably be something I'll have a memory of for the rest of my life," she said. Woody Poynter, 32, of Sacramento, Calif., flew into Orlando Wednesday, where he was unable to find a car to rent. The cab driver who picked him up at the airport, however, offered to drive him to Titusville when he came with his family.

# Soviets reveal their space shuttle

MOSCOW (AP) — The Soviet Union released the first photos of its secret space shuttle Thursday in a move that appeared timed to steal some of the thunder from the launch of Discovery.

Photos of the Soviet craft, which looks just like the American shuttle, moved on the wires of the official Tass news agency at about the time the Discovery was scheduled to blast off from Cape Canaveral.

Along with the photos of the Soviet craft, the agency transmitted a brief dispatch on the American launch.

The Soviet shuttle previously was not shown to the Soviet or foreign public, although some Western reconnaissance photographs of the craft or mockup versions have been taken.

The Tass photos showed the Soviet spacecraft against a twilight sky, with its black-tipped white wings and fuselage. The letters "CCCP" — Russian for U.S.S.R. — were written in red on one wing.

State-run Soviet television did not broadcast the Discovery launch live, but showed only a film clip of the American craft sitting on the launch pad in darkness. An announcer read a report on the blastoff during a regularly scheduled newscast a few minutes later.

The evening television news program Vremya, which is watched by millions of Soviets, showed still pictures of the Soviet shuttle as its third item and said ground tests of its equipment were completed. It showed film of the Discovery launch about 20 minutes later.

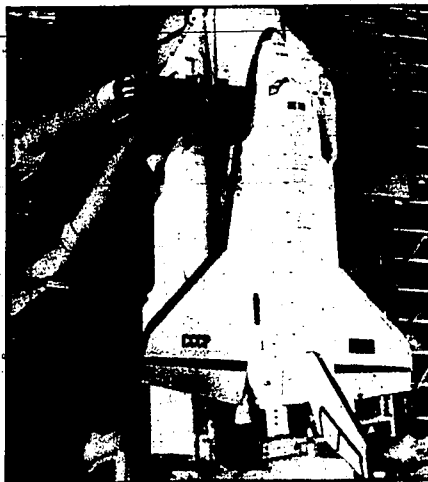
Radio Moscow's international newscast also juxtaposed reports about the U.S. takeoff with updates on the Soviet space station Mir — meaning both Earth and Peace — with three cosmonauts aboard.

Despite repeated comments by Soviet officials that their shuttle has a distinct design and capabilities, the Tass photographs indicated it was quite similar to the American version. The Soviet shuttle, under development since at least 1982, has delta-shaped wings like its American counterpart, and is mated to its booster rocket, the Energia, in a similar way as the American craft.

Mir was pictured in front of the huge Energia booster, which can carry payloads of up to 100 tons — much more than the American shuttle.

In the photos, the booster and shuttle stood upright on a tarmac, apparently at the Baikonur Cosmodrome in Soviet Central Asia, but it was not clear if it was stationed at a launchpad.

Soviet officials have said their shuttle will be launched by the end of 1988, but have not given an exact date. They have acknowledged technical problems are causing delays.



Soviets released this photo just before Discovery's launch

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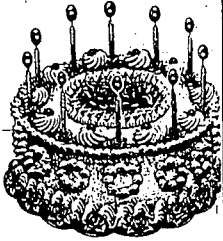
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# 2nd child dies from S.C. shooting; students return to classes

**GREENWOOD, S.C. (AP)**—A second little girl died Thursday of wounds received in a gunman's rampage at an elementary school and her classmates returned to school to find police guarding the grounds and teachers ready to help them through the tragedy.

Tequila Thomas, 8, a third-grader at Oakland Elementary School, died about 12:30 p.m., never having regained consciousness since she arrived at Self Memorial Hospital after the shooting three days earlier, said hospital spokesman Dan Draynon.

Oakland Principal Eleanor Rice said the parents of the school's 600 students seem to

have had most of their fears calmed since James Wilson opened fire Monday, reportedly focusing on children who cried.

In a newspaper story Thursday, Wilson said he was sorry about what happened and said he was patterning his actions in part on a Chicago-area woman's rampage in May.

Pupils, many with parents, returned to school Thursday to find the grounds edged with police officers. At least one child still wore a sling on her arm from a wound she received in the shooting.

Mrs. Rice said staff members met with counselors Wednesday to learn how to help

their pupils deal with the shootings.

"We've not had any calls suggesting students didn't want to come," the principal said. "Some of our students have some fears, and we're going to work through that."

"Certainly, anything of this magnitude, it's going to take some time to recover."

Leah Holmes, 8, her arm in a sling from a gunshot wound, shook her head emphatically and said "Nope," when asked Thursday morning if she was scared to go back to school. But other children and parents arriving at the school were less sure.

"We're a little nervous, but it's just been a

shock primarily," said Alan Maxwell, as he walked his daughter Katy to school. Katy said she didn't hear the gunshots but remembers a teacher coming into her classroom and telling everyone to duck under their desks.

Teachers took children on tours of the building Thursday, including the cafeteria where much of the shooting took place, to satisfy children's curiosity, schools Superintendent Robert Watson said.

"There were a variety of different activities in the classroom where they allowed the children to act out some of their feelings," Watson said.

"Several teachers felt they saw a lot of anger... a lot of getting feelings out about the killer," he said.

"Our absentee rate today was a little bit above normal," he said. Forty-three children were out, including those who were sick, he said.

Wilson, 19, of Greenwood is being held on two murder charges and undergoing psychological testing at the State Hospital in Columbia. Police and witnesses said he walked calmly through the school Monday morning, shooting two teachers and nine pupils before surrendering.

## Welfare bill easily gets Senate vote

**WASHINGTON (AP)**—The Senate gave a near unanimous stamp of approval Thursday to the first major welfare overhaul in more than half a century, seeking to turn the system into a gate of opportunity rather than a long-term trap.

"For the first time in its half-century existence, the U.S. Senate has moved to an entire redefinition and overhaul of what we've come to know as our welfare system," said Sen. Daniel Patrick Moynihan, D-N.Y., the leader of the effort.

The vote on the final version of the Family Welfare Reform Act was 96-1, with Sen. Jesse Helms, R-N.C., the lone opponent. The bill was headed for House approval Friday and from there to the White House, where President Reagan has expressed satisfaction with it.

The hard-won bipartisan compromise, the result of a summer of ceaseless negotiations, centers on a large-scale work, education and training program to be aimed primarily at welfare mothers. Support services such as child care would be available to program participants and those moving into low-wage jobs.

Moynihan said that under the revamped system, welfare will no longer be a permanent or extended condition. Instead, he said, the new system will stress work, child support and last-resort cash supplements while encouraging the needy to get the education and training needed to avert long-term dependence.

## Navy head says new ships will use electricity

**WASHINGTON (AP)**—The Navy's top admiral has decided America's next class of warship is going to rely on electricity for propulsion.

Adm. Carlisle A.H. Trost, in a speech delivered at a classified symposium, announced to industry officials the Navy no longer would just dabble in researching "integrated electric drive propulsion" but instead would embrace it as the power plant of the future to replace diesel, gas turbine or nuclear propulsion.

In view of its many well-known advantages, I am declaring that integrated electric drive, with its associated cluster of technologies, will be the method of propulsion for the next class of surface battle force combatants," said Trost, the chief of naval operations.

With electric drive, a warship would use a conventional engine to power a generator, which in turn would produce electricity for a motor that would turn the propeller shaft. That, in turn, would eliminate the need for reduction gears and other mechanical engine machinery, Trost said.

## Younger teachers don't plan to stick to job, survey says

**WASHINGTON (AP)**—More young teachers are planning to change careers, despite an increase in job satisfaction in the profession as a whole, according to a national survey released today.

The 1988 Survey of the American Teacher found that 34 percent of teachers with less than five years experience said they planned to leave teaching, up from 19 percent in 1985.

Planned defections from teaching were especially common among black and Hispanic teachers, the survey said. Forty-one percent of all minority group teachers polled said they were likely to leave teaching in the next five years, compared with only 25 percent of all non-minority teachers.

The planned defections among younger teachers came despite an overall increase in job satisfaction among teachers, the survey reported. Fifty percent of those surveyed said they were satisfied overall with their jobs, up from 40 percent in 1985.

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# Nicaragua shoots at plane it says violated air space

Accuses U.S. ally of increasing tensions, possibility of confrontation

MANAGUA, Nicaragua (AP) — Government troops fired artillery and rockets at Honduran military aircraft that violated Nicaraguan airspace near the border, an official newspaper reported Thursday.

Barricada, the newspaper of the ruling Sandinista party, said the Honduran aircraft were not hit.

It accused Honduras of escalating tensions between the two countries by flying over Nicaraguan territory.

Barricada said a helicopter gunship and an F-5 plane from the Honduran air force and a twin-engine plane without identification recently flew over the border towns of Santo Tomas del Nance, San Pedro de Potrero Grande and Somojito. It did not say when the incident took place.

The report quoted Maj. Leonel Martinez, military commander for the Nicaragua provinces of Chinandega and Leon, as saying Sandinista army troops fired on the intruders with artillery and rockets but failed to hit them.

Barricada said the incident heightened the possibility of a military confrontation between Honduras and Nicaragua.

Leftist Nicaragua and Honduras, a U.S. ally, have been at odds for years over the U.S.-backed Nicaraguan rebels known as Contras. The Contras have long used Honduran territory to launch attacks

on Nicaragua and for training, supply and base camps.

Since the end of overt U.S. military aid last February and a truce that began in March, the bulk of the Contra force has been holed up in camps inside Honduras near the border.

But Nicaraguan officials have reported a series of border incidents, including incursions or attempted incursions.

Martinez said the navy sank six Honduran boats trying to enter Nicaraguan waters in the Gulf of Fonseca on Aug. 20. The gulf divides Honduras, Nicaragua and El Salvador. He said a Sandinista army officer, Lt. Pablo Blanco Torres, died in the incident.

Barricada said armed U.S. vessels are common in the gulf.

The newspaper quoted another regional military commander, Col. Carlos Brenes, as saying Contras have tried to cross into Nicaragua near the town of Palo Grande in Chinandega province.

Brenes said the Hondurans have increased their troop strength in the area, reinforcing the 101st Infantry Brigade and an armored regiment. He said the Sandinista army has not responded with any unusual military mobilization.

# Soviets say support of rebels could slow troop withdrawal in Afghanistan

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — The Soviet Union warned again Thursday that Pakistan's support for rebels in Afghanistan could have unpredictable consequences.

"We don't want to be specific," said Gennady Gerasimov, the Soviet Foreign Ministry spokesman. But he left open the possibility that the withdrawal of Soviet troops might be suspended.

The Soviet spokesman said Pakistan armed the Afghan guerrillas and was allowing at least two training camps to operate on its territory for about 3,400 fighters.

He said Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard A. Shevardnadze registered "our dissatisfaction with the activities of the control mechanism" at a meeting here Wednesday night.

The session also was attended by Secretary of State George P. Shultz, the foreign ministers of Britain, China and France, and Secretary-General Javier Perez de Cuellar. Shevardnadze left early Thursday for Moscow to attend a major Communist Party meeting.

"We directed the attention of the ministers and the Secretary-General

to the flagrant violations of Pakistan and said the consequences may be unpredictable," Gerasimov told reporters at the United Nations.

Gerasimov said 2,500 Afghan fighters were in training near Islamabad, the Pakistani capital, and 900 others at a base near the Afghan border.



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# Nobel Peace Prize gives U.N. new respect for its missions

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — The United Nations, scorned for years as too weak and politicized to forge peace, is on a comeback and enjoying new respectability for its peacemaking successes in Afghanistan and the Persian Gulf.

Its renaissance and its expanding role in the international arena were crowned on Thursday with the award of the Nobel Peace Prize for 40 years of peacekeeping.

For nearly eight years, Washington rebuked the U.N., accusing it of anti-Western bias and bureaucracy and punished it with a crippling withholding of U.S. dues.

But for the past six months, the United Nations has been on a roll, totting up success after success in conflict resolution, with more to come.

The award to the 10,000 soldiers in the U.N. peacekeeping forces is the latest praise lavished on the world body.

U.N. achievements include an Iran-Iraq cease-fire; an agreement on Afghanistan; peace plans for southern Africa, Western Sahara and Cambodia, and arranging talks between Greek and Turkish Cypriots.

And this week, the Reagan administration made up with the United Nations, praising its work, paying some long overdue debts and promising to pay up everything owed eventually.

The belated, limited U.S. donation will help, but not solve U.N. funding problems or finance the shopping list of new peacekeeping forces, observers, election monitors and other peacemakers being envisioned.

President Reagan conceded Monday in his seventh and final address to the General Assembly that "yes, the United Nations is a better place than it was eight years ago, but so, too, is the world ..."

# 25 feared dead in India flood evacuation

JALANDHAR, India (AP) — A boat evacuating residents from a flooded village in the northern state of Punjab capsized Thursday and 25 people on board were missing, an army spokesman said.

The boat overturned in strong currents near the village of Talwandi Butain, said the spokesman, who cannot be identified under briefing rules.

The government says at least 282 people have died in flash floods that have hit villages in Punjab and the neighboring states of Haryana, Hi-

machal Pradesh and Jammu-Kashmir since Sept. 21.

Indian newspapers put the death toll at 350.

Hundreds of people remained marooned in villages and towns in the central state of Punjab. The government feared the stagnant muddy water could cause outbreaks of diarrhea and cholera.

At least 1,500 villages in Punjab were under water. At least 70,000 people have been evacuated from the villages in boats and helicopters, officials have said.

# A year after quake, Whittier continues process of rebuilding

WHITTIER, Calif. (AP) — A year after the brunt of a violent earthquake hit this quiet Los Angeles suburb, vacant lots gape, many shops remain boarded up and homes are still undergoing repairs.

Business operators and homeowners complain about the difficulty of getting loans to rebuild, and at the same time, earthquake repairs have generated business for some.

The quake struck at 7:42 a.m. Oct. 1, 1987, unleashed by a fault lurking 46,000 feet beneath Whittier Narrows, a flood control area 10 miles east of downtown Los Angeles. Measuring 5.9 on the Richter scale, the

shock spread scattered damage across more than 100 square miles. But the greatest concentration of destruction was just to the south of the epicenter in the quaint Uptown business district of Whittier, former President Richard Nixon's boyhood home, and surrounding neighborhoods.

Brick stores collapsed, windows showered sidewalks and roofs fell in. Walls split, and street lights and merchandise crashed to the ground.

The tremor and a 5.3-magnitude aftershock three days later caused \$358 million in damage throughout metropolitan Los Angeles, killed eight people and injured 200.

There were no deaths and few injuries among Whittier's 71,000 residents, but damage was severe enough to ensure that recovery will be a long process.

"It's going to take an estimated 10 to 20 years before the majority of the areas are rebuilt," said Sunny Morkus, city emergency services coordinator and director of personnel.

The town's structural damage amounted to \$71 million. In all, 4,762 buildings were damaged, including 80 businesses and more than 300 residential units that had to be shuttered

because they were hazardous.

About 36 of those 300 residences were razed and more may be, Morkus said. Thirty of the businesses have been demolished and others are awaiting the wrecker's ball, including a supermarket, a theater and multi-story department store.

"We're concerned about leaving them there, because we are in earthquake country," he said.

Throughout Uptown, signs posted on empty lots and fences give addresses for relocated businesses, offer to lease, or announce "Rebuilding At This Site." Atop one shattered

building, a stopped clock declares: "Time To Invest."

There's a lot of frustration, said Mimi Campion, 24, working behind a counter in a temporary trailer where the family business, Uptown Mail & Parcel Services, reopened a month after the quake shattered its store.

"We're way down. The only big period we had was Christmas, but even that was down 30 percent," he said.

The trailer is among a dozen that the city allowed to be set up in parking lots. Some are vacant now, but it will be months before they all are empty.

## No queen pageant for BYU

PROVO, Utah (AP) — Student leaders at Brigham Young University say they will let stand their decision to ban the traditional homecoming queen pageant at the Mormon Church-owned school.

BYU Student Association President Mark Crockett reaffirmed the decision following a recent review.

"We don't pretend it's as though everyone wholeheartedly supports the decision," he said. "Student opinion seems to be fairly mixed, but more and more seem to be supporting it."

Student leaders originally decided to cancel the pageant because they said it does not fulfill the desired goals of representing positive values and serving as a role model.

The original decision brought an outcry from students and alumni, and student leaders decided to review their decision and take informal student surveys.

University administrators also reviewed the proposal, but gave approval for students to make the final decision.

Although the pageant will no longer be a university tradition, a new program has been developed under which two male and two female students will be selected each year to represent the university.

The selections will be based on scholarship, leadership, talent and response to impromptu questions. Students who win that competition will be assigned to speak to youth groups in the area, will serve as hosts for university guests and will help plan campus activities.

The competition is scheduled for Nov. 19. Right now, student leaders are calling the contest "Students of the Y," but are taking suggestions for other possible names.

The Miss BYU pageant has been a tradition for more than 40 years. The queen was chosen on the basis of talent, overall appearance and a personal interview. No swimsuit competition was included.

## Error spoils study of tiny solar objects

NEW YORK (AP) — A clerical error marred a key calculation in a study suggesting that unseen comet-like objects are traveling near Earth's orbit, says a scientist who admits, "I blew it."

But the objects may still exist, said Thomas Donahue of the University of Michigan at Ann Arbor.

Donahue was one of three authors who published the study last December in the British journal Nature.

They suggested the small objects, called "cometesimals," may strike Earth every 80 years, and may be responsible for many craters on the moon.

The cometesimals, ranging in diameter from a few yards to a few tens of yards, may also be building blocks of ordinary comets, the researchers wrote. But the objects may not throw off much dust, making them hard to spot from Earth, they said.

The work was based on what appeared to be a higher amount of hydrogen atoms between the orbital paths of Earth and Mars than could be attributed to known causes. Cometesimals were proposed as a possible source.

In today's issue of Nature, however, University of Arizona researchers said their re-analysis of the same data from the Voyager 2 spacecraft, showed no inexplicable excess of hydrogen atoms.

In a telephone interview, Donahue said the mistake in the original paper occurred because a student misread a number from a table of data. That caused a crucial calculation to underestimate the amount of hydrogen that a theory predicted would be found in outer space.

The underestimate created the gap that was explained by the cometesimal proposal.

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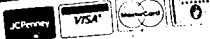
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## Complaints bring no action in polling places

TWIN FALLS — After a heated exchange Thursday in County Commission chambers over polling places for precincts 6 and 18, the commissioners did what they earlier said they would do this year about the complaints — nothing.

"If we changed that election place today, we would get a larger group here after the election" protesting the change so close to the general election, Commissioner Judy Felton said.

About 20 people protested Thursday the commissioners' refusal to change precincts 6 and 18 polling places to more convenient locations and when commissioners again refused to change them they vowed to start a petition drive.

Precinct 18's polling place was changed before the 1986 election to the courthouse from the county building next to the hospital because that building was not accessible to the handicapped, County Clerk Dick Pence said.

Precinct 6 was changed early this year to the Church of the Brethren, 461 Piler Ave. W. from the Disabled American Veterans building, 459 Shoup Ave. after commissioners received a notice from DAV officials that their insurance would not cover the polling booth, Felton said.

She said she interpreted that to mean that the DAV no longer wanted their building to be used for elections.

The 45-minute hearing occasionally became heated as protesters accused the commissioners of backing out on promises and ignoring legiti-

mate complaints. Felton showed the strain of the hearing when her voice cracked and she became teary-eyed.

Protesters claimed their interest was not a political ploy to give Democrats exposure before the election, but several of them were Democratic candidates or Democratic party officers.

Joe Gulick, Democratic candidate for District 23, House seat B, said earlier pleas made to commissioners before this year's primaries were answered with a promise to change the polling places this year, but nothing has come of it.

"It is a burden for the elderly to travel when they could walk to the elections before," Gulick said.

He said a handicapped woman said she lives close to the DAV building and could walk there, but it was difficult for her to put her walker in a car and go to the Church of the Brethren.

Ulahwi, Democratic leader of precinct 6, said several people in the precinct have complained that they were unable to get to the primary this year because they didn't know where to go or it was too far to walk.

Ileen Adams, 269 Harrison Ave., said commissioners held the meeting just for show without any intention of changing the polling places.

"This was meant to smooth us over," Adams said.

She said the commissioner's decision to move precinct 6's polling place without finding out the DAV's intentions was a matter of "people in here not being competent enough to take the time to check it."

## Authorities issue warrant for Dietrich man

JEROME — Authorities have issued an arrest warrant for a Dietrich man in connection with the alleged abduction Wednesday of his estranged wife and their five children.

The family had not been located by Thursday despite circulation of a nationwide attempt-to-locate bulletin, said Deanie Moore, sergeant with the Jerome County Sheriff's Department.

Marian Hansen, 31, and her five children, aged 3 months to 7 years, were in a 1986 Plymouth Voyager being driven by Hansen's sister, Rexene Boyd, when it was forced from Interstate 84 around 12:30 p.m., Boyd told authorities. Two pickups, one driven by Hansen's estranged husband, Thayne, drove in front and beside Boyd's van, forcing it to stop roughly 25

miles east of Jerome, according to sheriff's reports.

Boyd told authorities that Thayne Hansen then forced his wife and children into his pickup. No weapon was used, according to sheriff's reports.

"Apparently he took hold of one girl's arm, or something," Moore said.

An arrest warrant was issued Thursday morning for Hansen on charges of aggravated battery and aggravated assault, Moore said. Hansen was driving a maroon 1977 Chevrolet pickup with Utah license plate NH5033.

Boyd, of Kearns, Utah, told authorities that the other pickup was driven by Thayne Hansen's father, Dwayne, 50. The truck was identified as a red and white 1983 Chevrolet with Idaho license plate 1T2417.

Jerome County Sheriff Elza Hall said authorities also have not located the second truck or Dwayne Hansen.

Boyd told authorities she was driving the family to the Primary Children's Medical Center in Salt Lake City to get treatment for the 3 1/2-month-old infant, Samuel. The baby who weighed only eight or nine pounds, was apparently having trouble keeping down food.

"We're searching Jerome County and doing everything we can do," Hall said. "We don't know if they went to Oregon or to Washington or to the hospital in Utah."

Officials at the Primary Children's Medical Center said the infant had not been admitted to the hospital by Thursday afternoon.

Hall said Thayne Hansen apparently "didn't believe in doctors a lot, and he didn't want the kids taken to the hospital."

## Republicans answer Lancaster's attacks on commissioners

TWIN FALLS — Democratic candidate Tom Lancaster's attacks on the Twin Falls County commissioners have been answered by Republicans with allegations of sloppy management.

"If he is going to accuse county commissioners' of keeping lax work schedules, then he too must answer questions of impropriety," said Mark Stubbs, county Republican chairman.

Lancaster, who is running for the seat being vacated by Commissioner Judy Felton, recently told The Times-News that a record of commissioner's work hours showed that they were not in the office as much as they should be. All three commissioners are Republicans.

Stubbs, counter-punching this week, cited a contract the Filer Highway District awarded for construction of two metal storage buildings in 1986. Lancaster is chairman of the district board.

The contract was given twice to bidders who presented higher bids than a third construction company, which eventually sold the district. In the first instance, J&M Construction Co. of Filer was awarded the contract, but that contract was canceled because the company lacked the required state license.

"I should have done my homework," Lancaster conceded.

It's an important issue, but the contract then was awarded to a Buhl company. The third company — whose \$22,226 bid was \$3,000 lower than J&M's bid and \$191 lower

than the Buhl company's — then sued the district for \$4,000.

Lancaster said state law requires government entities to choose the lowest responsible bidder, and the third company was not considered responsible.

The district eventually paid a \$1,500 settlement, Lancaster said.

"It was the cheapest way out — to settle," he said.

Lancaster said he rejected the third company's bid because he called the company's references and received unfavorable comments. The three commissioners voted "unanimously in each of the bid awards," he said.

Although he admitted Jack Q. Miller, owner of J&M, is a good friend whom he has known since both were in school, Lancaster said their friendship had nothing to do with the decision.

"The decision was based on his ability to do the job," he said.

J&M had built part of an office earlier and Lancaster said the job was well done.

He also said he knew J&M would not give a deceptively low bid and then hike it later by claiming unexpected difficulties with construction.

"I felt like J&M was a good builder that we knew would do the job just like we wanted," Lancaster said. He had doubts about both of the other two companies, he said.

"As it turned out, I was wrong," and the Buhl company did a good job, he said.

Stubbs said officials must avoid

## Local Demos call for INEL cleanup vote

TWIN FALLS — Eight local Democratic candidates believe cleaning up the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory site is important enough to call a special legislative session to put an advisory vote on the November ballot.

"We have to bring it to the attention, not just of the people, but the elected officials — the senators and representatives," said Alvie Johnson, running for House seat 23D in Twin Falls County.

In a letter signed Thursday, the candidates and two central committee officers asked fellow Democrat Gov. Cecil Andrus to call the Legislature together to approve funding for putting the issue on the ballot.

They suggest the ballot measure

read: "The people of Idaho demand that the federal government keep the promise it made 17 years ago to clean up the two million cubic feet of toxic waste buried at INEL before more projects such as the SIS plutonium weapons plant and the NFR tritium weapons plant are brought to Idaho."

The former Atomic Energy Commission agreed to clean up all federal nuclear sites 17 years ago, the Democrats said. SIS stands for the Special Isotope Separator, a proposed project that uses laser technology to separate plutonium for weapons from nuclear waste. The New Production Reactor, an experimental reactor, would produce tritium used to trigger nuclear weapons.

The federal government needs to clean up the waste already at the site before starting new projects there, said Virginia Ash, a candidate for

House seat 23C.

"We think it's the most serious threat to Idaho there ever has been and ever will be," Ash said. "I think it's important to make a statement."

Activist Peter Rickards, a guest speaker at the Democrats' Wednesday Central Committee meeting, proposed the Democrats send the letter. Republicans and Democrats should put party differences aside on this issue, he said. He has also asked Republican Sen. Laird Noh, and Rep. Ron Black for GOP backing, but received no answer.

A vote could be held after the Legislature convenes in January, but waiting would add to the cost, Rickards said. He estimated the cost of a special election this winter at \$400,000, probably more than a special legislative session.

"We're asking for a lot, but this is

America. Anything can happen here," Rickards said with a grin.

Democratic candidates signing the letter were Ash; Johnson; Walt Mueller, Senate 23B candidate; Sally Miller Gulick, House 23A candidate; Joe Gulick, House 23B candidate; William Chisholm, Senate District 23 candidate; Tom Lancaster, County Commission District 1 candidate; and Day Equisuiza, County Commission District 3 candidate.

Rosemary Barta, vice chairman of the Twin Falls County Democratic Central Committee, and Arlo Kent, secretary, also signed the letter.

The INEL, which sits above the same aquifer that supplies most of the drinking water in the Magic Valley, has contaminated the ground beneath the site with radioactive plutonium and toxic organic chemicals.

## 'Common defense' is highest priority, Watkins says in TV interview

TWIN FALLS — Neither tax increases nor savings are needed to balance the federal budget within two years if the economy continues growing, Republican congressional candidate Dane Watkins said in a TV interview that will be broadcast tonight.

"People don't know this, but you can balance the federal budget in two years if you just set the appropriations at the current level and then come back with the growth in the economy," Watkins said on a King Video's public affairs program. "We've had \$400 billion of new revenue in the last four, five, six, seven

years since Reagan has been in office from a growing economy, not from increased taxes.

The \$2 trillion federal debt has doubled since Reagan took office. Watkins blamed that on a Democrat-controlled House that he said doesn't want to balance the budget.

"People don't think it can be done, but you have to get people back there who think it can be done and that's Dane Watkins," he said. "Richard Stallings will bring in a balanced budget."

Watkins, the Democratic incumbent whom Watson is opposing in the 2nd District race, has said he supports spending cuts in all programs, including from both military and entitlement programs, to whittle the federal deficit. Entitlement programs

include Medicare, Social Security and veterans benefits.

Watkins said the nation's highest priority is to maintain a "common defense." But he would look at defense spending, along with entitlement spending, and other programs.

"I'm not saying we have to cut," he said. "I'm saying look at the increase and maybe hold back that increase — not cut, just hold back that increase."

National Engineering Laboratory, which sits above the aquifer most of the Magic Valley uses for irrigation and drinking water.

"I've been told there hasn't been any traceable amount of anything that's a detriment to our environment that's ever left the site boundaries," he said.

"These wastes are going down to New Mexico," he said. "There is nothing permanent at the site. It's being a good neighbor."

Removal of two million cubic feet of highly buried radioactive waste to New Mexico is expected to begin in 1991. The ground is also contaminated with a seeping plume of radioac-

tive tritium and the INEL can still dump waste water down its injection well during emergencies.

Asked whether he would support a Superfund cleanup of the site, Watkins said his answer would depend on the cost of the project.

"It would be something I would like to study," he said. "I would like to see the figures first and see what would be done."

Cleanup of all buried wastes would cost an estimated \$2 billion, but INEL scientists are also studying cheaper alternatives that would stabilize the leaking barrels and boxes of waste without removal.

The Channel 10 program aired live Wednesday and will be rebroadcast at 7 tonight.

## Authorities charge Jerome man

TWIN FALLS — Authorities have charged a Jerome man with vehicular manslaughter by junction with the death Saturday of Twin Falls resident Lee Finas from a car accident.

The felony charge, which carries a maximum sentence of \$7,000 in fines and/or seven years imprisonment, was filed Wednesday against Darrell Sweet, 55. Authorities allege that Sweet was driving with faulty brakes when his 1964 Chevrolet pickup brandished a pickup driven by Jones' brother, Arlis, 73.

The accident occurred around 4:25 p.m. at the intersection of County Road 2700 East and Idaho Highway 74. Sheriff's deputies allege Sweet was driving between 30 and 40 mph on the county road and ran a stop sign at the intersection.

Jones, 83, was pronounced dead almost two hours later at the Magic Valley Regional Medical Center. Jones' brother was treated and released from the same hospital.

Authorities allege in court records that Sweet exhibited gross negligence but no malice by driving with bad brakes. Sweet, who was not injured, was cited initially for a safety equipment violation.

## Burley man charged in battery

BURLEY — A Burley man was charged with aggravated battery on a law enforcement officer following a scuffle with sheriff's deputies Thursday morning.

Fredy Alfredo Lopez, 26, was in custody in lieu of \$5,000 bail, according to Cassia County Magistrate Court officials.

Authorities allege in sheriff's reports that Lopez produced a knife during a struggle with two deputies at Lopez' home. Deputies were able to take the knife away, only to have an unidentified teen-ager pick it up and run away.

Neither the knife nor the teen-ager had been found by Thursday afternoon.

Nobody was injured during the ruckus, which occurred around 12:45 a.m., according to sheriff's officials.

Deputies went to the house after Lopez's mother reported a fight at the house, according to reports. When they arrived, Lopez's mother asked them to arrest her son on a charge of disorderly conduct.

Sheriff's reports allege Lopez was uncooperative and pushed one of the deputies. The other deputy then grabbed Lopez around the legs, and the three wrestled on the ground.

# LDS leaders, members gather for 158th general conference

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Unseasonably mild autumn weather greeted thousands of Mormon Church leaders and members gathering for the faith's 158th Semiannual General Conference Saturday and Sunday.

President Ezra Taft Benson was expected to keynote the two-day conference Saturday morning at the first of four general sessions, and to fill a vacancy in the church's Quorum of the Twelve Apostles.

The Twelve is an advisory body to the governing three-member First Presidency of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, headed by the 89-year-old Benson, a former U.S. agriculture secretary.

The vacancy was created May 20 at the death of age 90 of Marion G. Romney, the quorum's president. He was replaced by the next-most senior member of the Twelve, Howard W. Hunter, next in line to be church president.

Vacancies in the all-male hierarchy usually are filled during the general conferences held on the first week-ends of April and October. The conference, which includes a Saturday night session for priesthood members, is held in the 6,000-seat Tabernacle on Temple Square, but hundreds of thousands more will view the sessions live on television and over the church's satellite network.

The latter reaches more than 2,000 church centers in the United States, Canada and Puerto Rico.

General sessions are scheduled at 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. MDT Saturday and Sunday, and the priesthood session is at 6 p.m. Saturday.

Conference speakers will include Benson's two counselors in the First Presidency, Gordon B. Hinckley and Thomas S. Monson, members of the Twelve and other general authorities.

In recent years conference sessions have been broadcast over the Western TV satellite in English, Spanish and French. However, technological advances have made it possible to increase the number of languages carried on the satellite signal to 12.

Church units or members in North America and Hawaii can now receive conference broadcasts in nine other languages: German, Tongan, Samoan, Portuguese, Laotian, Cambodian, Hmong, Vietnamese and Korean.

The church has 6.5 million members. William J. Alder, meteorologist in charge of the National Weather Service in Salt Lake, predicted clear skies and temperatures around 80 degrees over the weekend.

More than half the conferences in the past 100 years have been accompanied by wet weather, he said.

# Tapes show public utilities falsely projected energy needs

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) — Public utilities falsely projected their energy needs for the first few years of two Washington nuclear power plants' operation in order to protect their rights to the energy, according to tapes played at a federal securities fraud trial Thursday.

Taped meetings of utilities representatives were played in the federal trial brought by more than 24,000 holders of \$2.25 billion in Washington Public Power Supply System municipal bonds.

Attorneys for the bondholders and Chemical Bank of New York, a trustee for bondholders, allege that the bonds were fraudulently sold.

"They maintain the defendants — 88 public utility districts, two engineering firms and a financial company — conspired to lie and withhold information in documents used to sell the bonds."

WPPSS defaulted on the bonds in 1983 and the profits were never completed.

The tapes were introduced during the fifth day of testimony by Harlan R. Hank Kosmata, the WPPSS liaison with the utilities.

One of the tapes was recorded at the Oct. 25, 1979 meeting of the participants committee, which made decisions about the projects for the utilities.

The committee was discussing its agreements with Pacific Northwest industries that agreed to buy any surplus energy generated by the plants.

In a complicated report that was to show how much surplus would be produced in the early years of the plants' operations, forecasts were not included because they would have shown a growing surplus.

Instead, only the single figure of anticipated need was put in the report, it was revealed on the tape. In each of the three previous years, that figure matched the anticipated output of the plants.

The 87 utilities involved in the industry agreements (Tacoma declined to sign on) actually wanted to keep all the output in case they needed it. The agreement said the surplus would not be retrievable once it was assigned to the industries.

"If you want the resource, you play around with your forecasts," David Piper, manager of the Pacific Northwest Generating Co., was heard saying on the tape.

"That's essentially what you've been doing" for each of the three reports, replied Jim Sengraves, an engineer with R.W. Beck, the WPPSS consulting engineer on the projects.

Neither company is a defendant in the suit. An industry representative was heard saying that the companies getting the surplus energy had known about the omissions and had seen the forecasts.

Bondholders' attorneys have said the recordings contain discussions that certain information not be included in the public minutes of the meetings and that an investment-rating agency representative should not be told about concerns that plants would be scrapped.

Testimony was scheduled to resume Monday. The 17-member jury was expected to listen to tapes for four or five more days.

# Givens accuses Craig of betraying constituents

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — Congressman Larry Craig's vote against a recent education appropriation runs counter to most of the U.S. House and his constituents, said his challenger, Jeanne Givens of Coeur d'Alene.

Craig was one of 60 House members to vote against the legislation.

"Even a majority of Republicans voted to fund education," the Democratic state representative said Thursday. Craig is "out of step with the desire of most people in Idaho to develop better schools."

She said Craig has voted against support for a variety of educational issues, including student loans and the general funding of aid to states for local school districts.

"In Larry Craig's world, school children would have little space or money for reading, writing or even eating," Givens said the Midvale Republican's record on education is very different from her own.

## Strong rally breaks market's staterate

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market put together a broad rally Thursday, showing signs of life after the stalemate of the past few weeks.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrial stocks climbed 37.78 to 2,119.31, its highest close since it stood at 2,119.31 on Aug. 6.

Advancing issues outnumbered declines by about 5 to 2 in nationwide trading of New York Stock Exchange-listed stocks, with 1,065 up, 412 down and 478 unchanged.

Volume on the floor of the Big Board stepped up to 155.79 million shares from 113.72 million in the previous session. Nationwide, consolidated volume in NYSE-listed issues, including trades in those stocks on regional exchanges and in the over-the-counter market, totaled 181.29 million shares.

Analysts said there was no simple development in the news to explain the rally.

However, they said, it appeared some traders were bidding for stocks simply because the market hasn't sold off lately despite a long list of worries and uncertainties.

Among those problems are the approaching first anniversary of Black Monday on Oct. 19, which is pre-

sumed to be casting a pall over the market.

In addition, investors are said to be reluctant to commit themselves before they can get a clearer idea of where government economic policy is headed after the election of a new president.

Nevertheless, brokers said many managers at some investing institutions seemed interested in adding stocks to their portfolios before they make reports to their clients for the third quarter, which ends with Friday's session.

Though analysts acknowledged that the connection might seem far-

fetched, they also suggested that investors' spirits got a lift from the successful launch of the space shuttle Discovery.

Gainers in the blue-chip sector included Coca-Cola, up 3/4 at 44 1/2; International Business Machines, up 1/2 at 115 1/2; General Electric, up 1/2 at 43 1/2; and Philip Morris, up 1/2 at 97 1/2.

Fischbach Corp. jumped 7/8 to 20 1/2. A group of investors said it was making a \$25-a-share offer for the company.



## Basketball loss inspires volleyball team to win

SEOUL, South Korea — The U.S. men's volleyball team, incited to victory by America's loss in basketball, moved one step away from another gold Friday at the Summer Olympics, where Flo Jo and Jackie are gold medalists-in-law again.

The undefeated U.S. men, led by the spiking and blocking of Bob Ctvrtlik, scored an easy 15-3, 15-5, 15-11 victory over Brazil in a rematch of the gold-medal volleyball game four years ago in Los Angeles.

"Most of us used to play basketball, and we felt really horrible for them when they lost to the Soviets," Ctvrtlik said. "We didn't want that to happen to us."

The U.S. men will meet either the Soviet Union or Argentina in the volleyball final Sunday afternoon. The Soviet Union beat Yugoslavia 76-63 for the basketball title Friday, giving the Soviets their 100th medal of the Games.

On Thursday, Florence Griffith Joyner fulfilled predictions of "some- unbelievable," breaking the 200-meter world record twice in two hours.

Two world records, two gold medals and I'm not finished," Flo Jo said.

She and record-smashing sister-in-law Jackie Joyner-Kersey highlighted a day at the Games that belonged to the women. The U.S. team won the basketball gold medal that the men couldn't, and yet another tennis title was left to be decided by Steffi Graf and Gabriela Sabatini.

The United States' can-do boxers, meanwhile, had Americans wondering: Can this be Montreal all over again?

This was called America's worst Olympic boxing team — no names, no flash, no chance. But U.S. boxers already are assured of eight medals — one more than they won in '76 — and they'll be going for six golds this weekend, one more than Montreal.

"Almost everybody said this team was not going to do well," Coach Ken Adams said. "We showed everyone up."

Especially Riddick Bowe, the New York super heavyweight. He took two standing 8-counts and nearly didn't make it through the first round, but he stormed back for a unanimous decision over the Soviet Union's heavyweight champion.

In the 14th day of the Games, the medal count looked like this: Soviet Union 100 total, 42 gold; East Germany 85 total, 33 gold; and the United States 63 total, 23 gold.

On Friday, Tracie Ruiz-Confurto of Bothell, Wash., a gold medalist four years ago, won the silver in solo synchronized swimming behind Carolyn Waldo, who gave Canada its only gold medal since sprinter Ben Johnson was stripped for steroids.

The heavily favored U.S. men's 1,600-meter "golly" team was the fastest by more than three seconds over Kenya in qualifying Friday. The American men, who have won the race 12 of the 16-times it been contested so far, had a time of 3:02.16.

America added to its gold count Thursday in freestyle wrestling when

unbelievable," adding: "She's been training since Nov. 1 just to meet the East German, and this is her day."

It was, but she had to share it with Al's sister, who even is called the best woman athlete ever.

Joyner-Kersey broke her own world record when she won the heptathlon last Saturday, and her long jump of 24 feet, 3 1/2 inches broke an Olympic mark of 10 1/4 she set in 1984.

Drechsler won the silver with 23-81/4, and the bronze went to Galina Christakova of the Soviet Union at 23-4.

Mary Slaney, who trips over the very word Olympics, qualified for Saturday's 1,500 meters. America's best middle-distance runner for a decade but never an Olympic medalist, Slaney finished 10th after leading most of the way in the 3,000.

At least, she didn't fall in the 1,600 qualifying — like she did when she tangled with Zola Budd in the '84 L.A. Games — but she came close. Trapped as the pack began to overtake her, Slaney had to fall back.

## Sommer fails to qualify

SEOUL, South Korea — Former Buhl resident Coleen Riensstra Sommer failed Thursday to qualify for the finals in the women's high jump at the Olympic Games.

Sommer, who now lives in Chandler, Ariz., leaped 6 feet, 11 inches before going out at 6-2 1/2. All 12 of the qualifiers for today's final, including American Louise Ritter, jumped 6-3 1/2.

Sommer's personal best is 6-6 3/4, an American indoor record.

John Smith of Del City, Okla., out-punted Stephan Sarkissian of the Soviet Union 4-0 in the 136.5-pound division, and Kenny Monday of Tulsa, Okla., moved into the gold medal match against world champion Adlan Varner of the Soviet Union in the 163-pound division.

Monday beat Pekka Rauhala of Finland 7-0 to make the final.

Two British athletes, meanwhile, tested positive for drugs, the British Olympic Committee confirmed Friday. They came from track and field and judo, but the committee said their names will not be released until the International Olympic Committee completes its hearing procedures, perhaps by Saturday.

Eight athletes, including 100-meter world record-holder Ben Johnson of Canada, have been kicked out of the Games so far for drugs.

At the track, it was a bad day for East German Heike Drechsler, beaten first in the long jump by Joyner-Kersey, whose brother Al is married to Griffith Joyner, then in the 200 by Flo Jo herself. In the process, Griffith Joyner also broke the 200 world record Drechsler shared with another East German, Marita Koch.

"It was a tough day," Drechsler said. "I gave my best, but these two are very strong athletes."

Griffith Joyner is the first American woman to hold a 200-meter world record since Wilma Rudolph in 1960 and the first since Rudolph to win both the 100 and 200 at the same Olympics. The old mark of 21.71 was first set by Koch nine years ago.

Griffith Joyner, her long hair flowing behind her like the contrails of a jet, broke the record in the semifinals, running 21.56.

Then, in the final, she sped to a time of 21.34, lowering the mark for the second time in two hours, and adding the 200 to the 100 gold she won last Sunday.

And she could get more, with two relays still on the schedule.

"I know I can run much faster," she said. "I felt very relaxed. That's the key."

Grace Jackson of Jamaica won the silver in 21.72, eight meters behind Griffith Joyner, and Drechsler was third in 21.95.

Before the race, Al Joyner had predicted his wife would do "something

The Idaho High School Activities Association seems to be getting a little more ahead of itself all the time — and this year could be the all-time worst.

Although the association continually calls for more money, more corporate sponsors and pays back less to participating teams on the state tournament level, it does very little to reduce the demand for money.

And a great amount of its expenditure doesn't occur.

Take for instance this year. If you son or daughter is going to participate in three sports, he or she began training on Aug. 10 for football, cross country and girls' volleyball.

Now take that through the winter seasons of

um, the permanent site of the state high school meet, is deemed the only thing worthy of Idaho's three classification state finals.

Now Boise State University is participating as it normally does in this situation. The usual state track weekend BSU is hosting Washington State in a dual track meet-and that can't be moved to Thursday. The following week, BSU is hosting the vaunted Big Sky Conference championships. So that means only the Memorial Day weekend is available. That's why its oft-times referred to as University of California at Boise in state athletic circles.

There was an invitation from Twin Falls and Jerome to alleviate this situation with Twin Falls hosting the Class A-1 and A-3 and

Jerome the A-2. But since only the BSU track is deemed worthy, only it can be used.

There also is the matter that Idaho's state finals are one of the best-paying in the nation. We've heard in the top five. And so money becomes important again.

But let us consider the second point of that. Last year at Boise, the IHSA reportedly spent \$500 for helium-filled balloons that it let fly during the "opening ceremonies." That covers a lot of tickets.

Additionally, if money is a consideration why doesn't the association allow the request of its coaches to run the meet concurrently, that is, A-3, A-2, A-1 boys' 100-meter dash, A-3, A-2, A-1

Try Memorial Day weekend.

This means high schools will have athletes going for all but about 70 days of the year and that, dear hearts, is ridiculous.

# Camas County-Richfield game matches up 2 long-time rivals

## Prep game of the week

**Fairfield** — In the past five years it has been the Sawtooth Conference's most enduring football rivalry, and the second meeting of the season here this afternoon between Camas County and Richfield should only add to that tradition.

Both teams are 4-1 for the season, both a 3-1 in Sawtooth games. The only real difference is that Camas opened the season a month ago in Richfield with 28-14 victory over the Tigers, and the Tigers — obviously — would like to return the favor on the Musers' turf.

Kickoff time is 4 p.m. today for the game that will determine, at least temporarily, the leader in the eight-man league and the frontrunner for one of the conference's two berths in the state eight-playoff playoffs. Richfield, which is ranked second in the latest Associated Press eight-man ratings, and Camas, which was ranked second as recently as two weeks ago, are in a three-way tie with North Gem, which complicated things with a 34-22 victory over the Musers in Bancroft two weeks ago.

Richfield, in turn, owns an 16-14 victory over North Gem.

In years past, victories like that might have been decisive for the Sawtooth championship, but under new league ground rules this year, each member plays each other team twice. That raises the possibility that Richfield, Camas and North Gem could all end the season 1-1 against the other two teams.

The Musers would like to head off that possibility by doing to Richfield precisely what they did to the Tigers a month ago — keeping quarterback Spencer King from getting together with running back Laine King, who already has caught 22 passes for 247 yards this season and has scored six touchdowns. The Musers have been effective against the pass this year, using in large part to senior safety Aric Frustenson (nine unassisted tackles, 41 assisted tackles) and junior linebacker Jerry Dillard (13 unassisted tackles, 49 assisted tackles). Camas returned six starters on defense from last year's team, and it helps that it has a pass rush triggered by 6-foot, 4-inch, 185-pound senior guard Kit Barron.

Offensively, Camas has been able to mix the run and the pass effectively. Quarterback Frustenson has completed 42 of 65 passes this season for 394 yards, six interceptions and two touchdowns, while Barron, Dillard, Jasper Funkhouser and Frustenson have each contributed at least 100 yards rushing — Barron leads the pack with 280 yards. Barron has five touchdowns this season, three receiving and two rushing, and Dillard has five all on the ground.

Richfield started slowly on both offense and defense, due largely to the loss to injury of all-state lineman Casey Riley. But although Spencer King has gradually warmed his hip arm as expected — he has completed 37 of 87 passes for 464 yards, four interceptions and two touchdowns — the emergence of senior running back Ray Stein has kicked first-year coach Shawn Nilsson's offense into overdrive. Through five games, Stein had 459 yards rushing in 84 attempts and had scored two touchdowns.

Defensively, there are four starters back from last year, and so far the standouts have been defensive end Rob Appell and safeties Stein and Spencer King.

Their job will be to keep the Musers from making their ball-control offense dominate the game. With the exception of the loss to North Gem, Camas this season has managed to maintain a sizable edge in time of possession over all its opponents.

## Up With People!

### Tour spelled relief for Twin Falls man

TWIN FALLS — Two years ago Steve Ellis was a 20-year-old business management major at the University of Idaho.

"I got tired of studying, so I thought I'd do something fun for awhile," says Ellis, who took an extended school break.

For the next 12 months, instead of studying Ellis worked 16 to 18 hour days, averaging only one and a half days off per month during the year. He logged more than 40,000 miles traveling with 100 other young adults throughout the United States, Scandinavia and the Soviet Union. He made hundreds of new friends. He sang. He danced. He ate Finnish pizza, Russian caviar and horse tongue.

And he paid \$7,300 — plus personal expenses — to do it all.

So how do you spell RELIEF from college life? One way you spell it is in the form of an international, nonprofit, nonreligious, upbeat, energetic, educational, theatrical company called Up With People. Their goal, they say, is to encourage understanding among nations through a program of intercultural education, musical performance and public service.

A cast of Up With People will be performing in Twin Falls in the O'Leary Junior High School gymnasium Monday at 7:30 p.m.

The first half of the two-hour show, "Time for the Music," takes the audience on a "world tour" through popular and traditional songs with dances and costumes from all parts of the world.

The second half of the performance features contemporary music. One number traces the roots of rock'n roll from the 1950s to the present.

"For the most part it's rock'n roll, contemporary music," says Ellis, who played in the same show last year. "It's entertainment for the whole family. There's a clown routine for children."

Ellis says the 18- to 25-year-old men and women taking the 12-month musical sabbatical each year are chosen not for their musical ability, but for their personality. Roughly 9,000 young people apply annually for the 550 spots available in Up With People's four touring casts.

"Music is not a requirement, nor is dance or anything. The criteria is basically a good personality that can deal with people and be subject to a lot of changing environments. For the most part they're just looking for the type of person who can get along with people. Anyone can be taught to sing and dance," says Ellis. "It's odd, it really is. You'll be surprised at the caliber of people you get."

Ellis himself, with no heavy-duty previous experience, sang in the production, including a few solos. He also danced a little.

"Everyone participates fully," he says. That means everyone

## Humanities polls sport opposite outlooks

**HOLLYWOOD** — A few months ago the Louis Harris polling organization reported that Americans were working more and being leisurely less. The 1,500 adults surveyed said that they were taking in fewer cultural events because they had less time and, to some extent, less loose change.

"We were treated like royalty while we were there," says Ellis.

"We felt that they were bugged because one night we were going to have a little party with some of the other members," says Ellis. "We had a balcony and we were going to invite everyone over to come out on the balcony. The next day we went back to our room and the balcony door — the handle was gone and the door, they'd come in and welded it shut."

Then we caught on and we'd say things like it was awful cold that night and they would bring us blankets the next day. We had no really big secrets to tell them. We just had a good time with it."

A vacation to Florida — you would pay a lot to stay for three weeks. We get to stay in a least 80 different cities on two continents. There's no way your \$7,600 would cover that if you didn't go with Up With People."

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# 'Spellbinder' heads into pointless hell

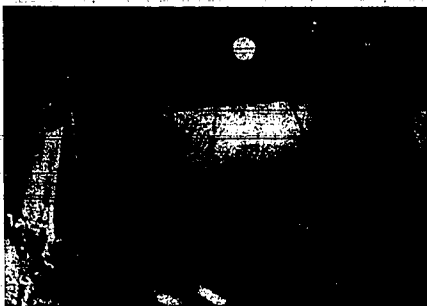

HOLLYWOOD — In "Spellbinder," as in "Fatal Attraction," quick sex leaves you with the devil to pay. Loose women represent fatality; they are Lucifer's minions.

It is an interesting switch on a common underground delusion of the '70s: the idea that night and the orgy were the roads to salvation. Now, when Kelly Preston as Miranda, a timber young temptress-in-distress, begins eyeing yuppie lawyer Jeff Mills (Timothy Daly) up and down, right after they meet, you can sense the psychic caldrons bubbling and hissing.

This poor hapless beagle-eyed legal simp, with his predilection for Los Angeles contemporary art and soft jazz. Doesn't he know when he has it good? Doesn't he know enough not to drag strange ladies with no address and no brassiere back to his place — especially when they have puzzling hot hands and a boyfriend (Anthony Crivello) who flashes knives, levitates cars and glowers like Dracula at a Van Halen concert?

Unfortunately, Preston looks like the kind of woman who, consciously or not, could drive a person to the

devil. Sexuality oozes out of her like butter crumpling through hot toast.

In this film's opening seduction scene — the best thing it has to offer — director Janet Greek shows that assignments can benefit from a woman's touch. Greek makes you hang on the pauses. She is good at capturing the edgy maneuvers; the would-be seducer clinging to his would-be cool; the calculated touches and erotic ebb

and flow. Then the plot begins, creeping into place, and the characters and the movie go to hell in short order.

— There are nasty looks for Miranda from Jeff's secretary; meaningful ones from his basketball buddy (Rick Rossovich). There are covens and corpses and satanic symbols — and Jeff's answering machine begins to sound as if it had crossed connections

to the Cave of the Winds. Obviously, this infernal triangle will reap no bliss, especially because the winter solstice and its Mephistophelean revels are fast approaching.

The devil finds work for idle hands. Can't he dream up something for scriptwriter Tracey Torne? This flashy satanic cult movie — Aleister Crowley in Calvin Kleins — is less sophisticated than Val Lewton's "The Seventh Victim" of 45 years ago.

There are some good things: the neat cyclical structure, Greek's and Preston's knack for eroticism, Audra ("Three's Company") Lindley's fierce performance as a mad-eyed, scornful old witch, and the genuinely spell-binding cinematography of horror expert Adam Greenberg ("The Terminator," "Near Dark").

But the surprise ending of "Spellbinder" (MPAA-rated R for sex, nudity, language and violence) should be no surprise; one crucial performance tips it off almost immediately.

And there is also an absurd kung fu interlude, dotty survivalist jokes and enough satanic ceremonies to keep you worrying about the goats and the virgins.

Hell, in this case, hath no fury, and often no point either.

# 'Betrayed' loosens trademark tension

The following are capsule reviews of some of the films playing locally in the Magic Valley. The ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

**BETRAYED (R).** Director Costa-Gavras has always been drawn to incendiary political subjects, but in "Betrayed," which is about the white supremacist movement in the American heartland, he has apparently trusted the instincts of his American screenwriter and co-producer Joe Eszterhas ("F.I.S.T.," "Flashdance"). The result is a loosening of the trademark Costa-Gavras tension. Debra Winger is radiantly warm, smart and, against all odds, believable. Tom Berenger does the best he can with an even harder role — the decent American with two young children to raise who has completely swallowed the line of the crackpot right.

**COCKTAIL (R).** Tom Cruise plays Brian Flanagan, whose dreams of high-powered jobs in advertising, banking, stockbroking or what-have-you are shattered by his lack of higher education. He settles, finally, for bartending in Manhattan, under the wing of Douglas Couglin (the magnetic Bryan Brown). Cruise even gets his own bartending solo: juggling bottles, tossing ice and cocktail shakers behind his back, doing tidy little spins and discreet foot movements, all the while twinkling, twinkling, twinkling until his dimples must have ached. Unfortunately, none of the film makers, including director Roger Donaldson and writer Heywood Gould, seemed to notice that Flanagan, climber-user-apologist extraordinaire, lacked a little something as the hero of the piece.

**DEAD RINGERS (R).** Announcing David Cronenberg's full maturity as a major director, "Dead Ringers" creates a devoted symbiotic pair of twins, the reclusive Beverly and rakehell Elliott Mantle, gynecologists and spiraling drug addicts. Jeremy Irons plays the two with throwaway brilliance and Genevieve Bujold splendidly plays the actress who cracks the Mantles' delicate balancing act. Although it has far less gore than any previous Cronenberg film, its very subject and its almost David Lynchlike intensity make it nothing for the weak-hearted.

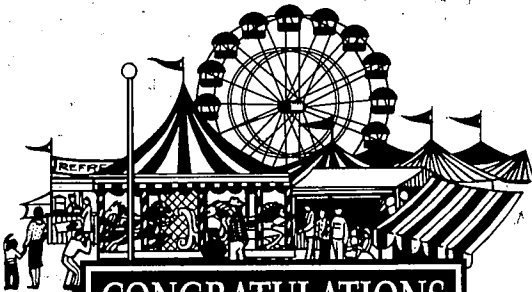
**A NIGHTMARE ON ELM STREET 4: THE DREAM MASTER (R).** By far the best in the series about the ghoulish child-killer Freddy Krueger (Robert Englund) who seems invincible. It is a superior horror picture that balances wit and gore as it mirrors the anxieties of the teen-age audience for which it is in-

tended. Newcomers Lisa Wilcox and Danny Hassel star.

**TUCKER: THE MAN AND HIS DREAM (PG).** Director Francis Coppola gathers you inside this glorious, warming movie about Preston Thomas Tucker (played by Jeff Bridges whose raucous energy never grows cloying) who came out of World War II with the dream of a revolutionary car. Its innovations challenged Detroit, which effectively put him out of business. But the spectacle of Tucker brought low by the Detroit Big Three is not director Coppola's point; it is that he made his dream real; this is a film for rainbows-riders, happy-enders, cockeyed optimists. In addition to Bridges' bravura

playing there is Martin Landau's meticulously shaded Abe Karatz and a brilliant cameo by Dean Stockwell as Howard Hughes.

**YOUNG GUNS (R).** As a new version of the "Billy the Kid" legend, it pales beside some of its predecessors — like the Penn and Peckinpaw versions. But this new Western, a kind of teen-movie "Seven Samurai," has some slick, smoky vigor. Emilio Estevez is remarkable as a notably psychopathic Billy; Kiefer Sutherland, Lou Diamond Phillips and Charlie Sheen make a fine ensemble. But the movie's other intentions — its paeon to teen camaraderie in the face of universal corruption and to sappy young love in the jaws of death — do not always jibe.

How dare they judge the suitability of a family based on the age of one of its members! I wonder how many excellent homes have been denied a pet because of this stupid policy.

I would like your thoughts on this, Abby.

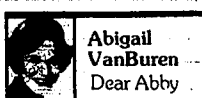

**DEAR BURNED:** I called the Oakland SPCA and spoke with the director, Gary Templin, a kind and gentle man. He said, "Yes, that is our policy. Let me explain. Most 3-year-olds regard a small puppy as a 'toy' — they pick it up by its tail, pull its ears and handle it as though it were a stuffed animal. Children that age are not necessarily 'mean'; they simply don't know any better. A 6-month-old puppy can usually fend for itself and poses few problems with a 3-year-old."

"But there's another issue," Templin said. "Because these dogs are unwanted to begin with, the SPCA makes every effort to place them in homes where they will not be a problem, because if a dog is returned to us as a 'problem dog,' we cannot place it in another home — we have to kill it."

So, Burned Betty, I hope you now understand why your friend wasn't given that 7-week-old puppy.

The policy makes sense to me, and I enthusiastically applaud Oakland's SPCA for carefully inquiring about

The latest word was that the show would open with Mary's character, Arnie McGuire, already married to Nick McGuire, now to be played by Denis Arndt. Arndt, whose stage credits include Shakespeare festivals in Oregon and New York, apparently is a newcomer to situation comedy.

This shaky start does not bode well for Miss Moore, who has failed twice on television since "The Mary Tyler Moore Show" ended 11 years ago.

When a husband and a former lover are both trying to do a lady in, viewers can't help rooting for the intended victim. The lady in question is the rich, young and beautiful Kelly Capwell Conrad of "Santa Barbara," who also happens to be strong, straightforward, unspoiled by her look and quite unlike the pampered generation running around the show's fancy Montecito these days.

Originally, Robin Wright played Kelly until she was poisoned by her husband's mother last June. 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# Experts give candidates mostly good marks for their debate efforts

**HOLLYWOOD** — At the end there were about as many shadings of opinion about the television performances of debaters George Bush and Michael Dukakis as there had been questions lobbed at them.

Did Dukakis warm up enough? Did Bush step on lines too much? Or

was the 90-minute affair — to use the coinage that entered the political vocabulary Sunday night, courtesy of ABC's Peter Jennings — essentially "passionless?"

So writer Richard Goodwin watching at home in Concord, Mass. — 28 years ago he had served as an aide to Sen. John F. Kennedy in the campaign against Vice President Richard Nixon — "it was a little bit like listening to a debate between the presidents of Apple and IBM over the comparative merits of their operating systems."

There was a lot of talk about "values," Goodwin said, but no sense of what those values really are from either the Republican vice president or the Democratic Massachusetts governor.

Dukakis was more "fluent" and "in command of his subject matter," Goodwin noted, but Bush "came across as warmer, and that's also the truth about the guy, and I know both of them."

Columbia University President Michael Govern, who four years ago advised Walter Mondale in debates against President Reagan, said Dukakis "appeared as a caring human being" particularly in his answers on medical care and the homeless, but added that twice mentioning the 11-year-old Houston boy, whose father won't let him play baseball because the family doesn't have medical insurance, was one mention too many.

To Rep. Richard B. Cheney, R-Wyo., who had been President-Ford's chief of staff, there were "no major gaffes on either side" and "no milestones or watershed for the campaign." The debate, he said, "tended to reinforce the

loyalty of their partisans."

Cheney particularly liked Bush's remark that he would be "willing to take all the blame" on the Iran-Contra affair if he could get half the credit for "all the good things" in the world since he and President Reagan came into office. Cheney added that Dukakis, who had "a good closing statement," came across as "articulate obviously and bright," but hurt himself by calling Vice President Bush "George." The repeated reference sounded arrogant, Cheney said.

However, Kathleen Hall Jamieson, professor of communications at the University of Texas and author of a new book on presidential debates, said the Massachusetts governor scored points with the use of Bush's first name because it made the contenders sound like equals.

Disputing the bipartisan assessment of several previous presidential-debate advisers, Jamieson contended that Bush hurt himself with the "cumulative effect" of several miss-statements: pulling back from calling Panamanian strongman Manuel Noriega "governor"; mixing up Mid-etman and MX missiles; referring, toward the end of the debate, to the "three people on our ticket."

She added that Bush, despite his ability to poke fun at himself with his "it's Christmas line," may have damaged himself when he said in obvious reference to his opponent: "Wouldn't it be nice to be perfect; wouldn't it be nice to be an iceman" who never makes mistakes?

"Either that was a quick comeback to a mistake, or an indictment of Michael Dukakis as being cold and aloof," Jamieson said, adding after a pause: "But then the American people may see it as a cheap shot."

Jamieson said Dukakis damaged himself by ducking the American Civil Liberties Union question and talking instead about the Pledge of Allegiance, as well as by wandering in his answer about specific federal programs he would cut. She thought that Bush was weakest in defense of vice presidential choice Dan Quayle.

The professor graded Dukakis well on marshaling statistics and specifics, and in telling of anecdotes. "He establishes himself at least as competent and experienced as George Bush. He doesn't need to show he's more experienced. If he shows he's Bush's equal, he wins." As for Bush, he loses points as the debate progresses, Jamieson said. "His pitch begins to increase, his sentence structure is more meandering, he's moving his arms in a way that does not suggest control or confidence."

Dukakis' gestures did not score well either. "He's eliminated the school-marmish pointing gesture" and substituted it with one that "looks like he's pulling weights up from his waist."

In the war of one-liners, most thought the debate a standoff between Bush's line comparing the clarity of Dukakis' answer to Boston Harbor and Dukakis' line suggesting Bush was the Joe Isuzu of American politics.

On the apparel front, with Bush and Dukakis each wearing gray suits, white shirts and red ties, there was little controversy. Bill Wilson, who was Kennedy's television adviser, would have eschewed Bush's striped tie (too glaring) and Dukakis' polka dots; he prefers "solid." Myles Martel, Reagan's communications adviser in 1980, thought the "texture" in Dukakis' suit conveyed a certain measure of warmth.

"They both looked OK," noted Jimmy Carter's media adviser Gerald Rafshoon. "Bush didn't look as chilly as he has before, and Dukakis looks presidential."

With the lines between style and substance often merging, Rafshoon added that he thought "Dukakis was able to cross the plausibility threshold — he could be seen as a possible president. Next to Bush he gained stature. But he didn't do what he needed to do, bring back Bush's negatives. He didn't aggressively put in minds of people that Bush is weak."

By some accounts the real debate winner was the debate panel.
