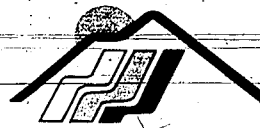

House passes landmarks protection bill

TWIN FALLS — The bill giving federal recognition to the Hagerman Fossil Beds and the Silent City of Rocks near Oakley passed Congress Thursday.

The House of Representatives voted 312 to 32 to approve the Arizona-Idaho Conservation Act. The act contains sections that establish the Hagerman National Monument and the Silent City of Rocks National Historic Preserve. Rep. Richard Stallings, D-2nd District, reported Thursday afternoon.

The City of Rocks and Hagerman Fossil Beds are an important part of Idaho's natural beauty and historic heritage," Stallings said in the House.

Because the house added an amendment to the act passed last week by the Senate, the bill went back to the Senate Thursday and was approved. The bill now goes to President Reagan to be signed.

Stallings praised the work of Sen. James McClure, R-Idaho, in developing the compromise language that

retains local control of water-rights. Disagreements about federal water rights in the state had held up the bill in the Senate.

The act requires the federal government apply to Idaho for any additional water rights like any other water user.

The City of Rocks National Historical Reserve will include about 14,320 acres, and will protect the unique scenery such as the 60-story stone pinnacles jutting up from the desert floor in the South Hills about 40 miles south of Burley.

Managing the City of Rocks will be a joint effort by local and state governments and the National Park Service.

The Hagerman National Monument will include 4,934 acres. Legislation protects the 310 registered fossil sites within the monument. It also transfers administration to the National Park Service from the Bureau of Land Management and allows the state to sell its 492 acres to the Park Service.

The legislation includes a \$2 million appropriation for the City of

Kissinger warns of Gorbachev charm

U.S. should utilize Soviet shortcomings in any negotiations, ex-secretary believes

TWIN FALLS — Don't be fooled by Mikhail Gorbachev's charm, former U.S. Secretary of State Henry Kissinger warned a Twin Falls audience Thursday.

Rather, the United States should use Soviet economic problems and turmoil in Eastern Europe to

win concessions from the Communist bloc and to enhance the United States' position as a world power.

"We cannot engage in another sentimental orgy," he said.

The Soviet general secretary is a product of a culture that may be difficult for Idahoans to comprehend, he said. It is a culture with a history of problems compounded by communism.

"One now reads what a nice man Gorbachev is, what an entertaining man," Kissinger told the audience of about 200 that packed the College of Southern Idaho's Fine Arts Auditorium.

"He's more fun than some of his predecessors," Kissinger joked. But Soviet statesmen were not put in this world to entertain, he said.

"Anyone who enters that competition (for general secretary) has a highly developed sense of power," he said. "Choir boys do not enter that type of competition."

"The Soviet system is run more like a feudal monarchy than a state," he said. "There is a species of spider in which the female eats the male after the act of procreation. ... The same thing is true in the Soviet Union."

General secretaries are elected by the Politburo from among its members. The chosen leader then purges the Politburo, he said.

"Why should Gorbachev treat us better than he treated the Politburo?"

Kissinger's talk, sponsored by the Greater Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce and CSI, drew repeated applause, appreciative laughter and a standing ovation.

Idahoans are a patriotic people, "close to their principles and close to the soil," he said. But they are also an isolated people.

"It's understandable here that you think our way of life is the way of everyone," he said in a brief press conference after his talk. "But those of you who have traveled abroad know this is unique. Gorbachev is trying to improve the economy, but it's far from seeing capitalism sweep the Soviet Union. We see a few changes and think they like being like nice, good Idaho citizens. They never have been and they are a long way

State board seeking \$41 million aid hike

SUGAR CITY, Idaho — Urging state lawmakers to work as friends to solve education problems, the Idaho Board of Education has endorsed a \$41.7 million increase in state aid to public schools in the next budget.

But after Thursday's unanimous endorsement of the proposed \$39.7 million state budget for the 1989-1990 public school year, Republican lawmakers quickly indicated that even under the best of circumstances that spending request will be reduced.

State Schools Superintendent Jerry Evans called the proposed 11.7 percent increase in state aid realistic, and Board Chairman Charles Grant of Rexburg urged the lawmakers to provide as much money as they possibly could for the educational system.

"I can't give you a guarantee that

more money will guarantee better quality in education," Grant admitted. "But I can guarantee that if you don't put more money in we will see deterioration in the quality of education."

The request, developed by a coalition of education leaders, was \$30 million higher than the budget proposal for the current year that GOP legislative leaders reduced dramatically last winter in an election-year bid to avoid a major tax hike.

Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus will not make his recommendation on school aid to lawmakers until next January, but based on past proportional state spending, the coalition recommendation would put total state spending for the budget year that begins next July at over \$763 million. The current state budget is about \$686 million.

Bush, Dukakis suspend verbal duels for time at charity dinner

Michael Dukakis compared George Bush's campaign to the Watergate scandal of Richard Nixon on Thursday, saying "truth was the first casualty" in both instances.

Bush received new police endorsements along with the badge of a slain officer in New York.

The Democratic governor and the Republican vice president dueling from a distance

on the campaign trail before sheathing their political swords and dining together at the annual, nonpartisan Alfred E. Smith charity dinner in Manhattan, sponsored by the Roman Catholic archdiocese of New York.

Dukakis, urged by supporters to get tough in the face of polls that show him trailing Bush, did just that during an appearance in New Haven, Conn.

"Truth was the first casualty in the Nixon White House and it was the first casualty in

the Bush campaign," Dukakis said. "Above all, the truth should matter a lot in a presidential campaign because as we learned in Watergate, it matters a lot in the Oval Office."

"I believe the American people value the truth in politics and I'm going to do everything I can to make sure truth wins and that we win on the Eighth of November," the Democratic nominee said.

Dukakis also made a point of drawing a

distinction with Bush on the emotionally charged subject of abortion.

George Bush wants the government to make one of the most personal choices a woman can make. ... I believe a choice that personal must be made by the woman herself.

In almost every speech he makes, Bush says he opposes almost all abortions while Dukakis does not.

At the Al Smith dinner, Dukakis spoke

first and got in a few jibes at Bush as well as some self-deprecating digs at himself.

He began by saying how pleased he to be at an event where "all thought of politics is banished and I can concentrate on what I do best — comedy."

Dukakis apologized for his wife's absence. "Kitty's in a hotel room in Dallas tonight," he said. "Maybe she qualifies as a Texan," a

Birthday song price \$12 million

NEWARK, N.J. — Blowing out the candles and making a wish may get you a rendition of "Happy Birthday to You," but you can't buy it for a song.

The duty is for sale for at least \$12 million, says the company that owns it.

Cooed by Marilyn Monroe to President John F. Kennedy, sung recently by 90,000 fans to Michael Jackson, and a staple of children's birthday parties for almost a century, the song that seems ageless while reminding us we aren't is on the block with the other musical holdings of Birchtree Ltd. of Princeton.

"The first six notes of 'Happy Birthday' are as recognizable as the first four notes in Beethoven's 'Fifth Symphony,'" said Gary Hanson of the Cleveland Orchestra. "Of course, 'Happy Birthday' is played a lot

more than Beethoven."

David Sengstack, chairman of Birchtree, said he can only guess what made the song so popular.

Translated into dozens of languages, the composition began as a classroom greeting in 1893 with Louisville, Ky., teacher Patty Smith Hill and her sister, Mildred J. Hill. The two kindergarten and Sunday school teachers wrote the song, with the lyrics "Good morning to you," as part of a book "Song Stories for the Sunday School."

Since then, it has become one of the three most popular songs in the English language along with "Auld Lang Syne" and "For He's a Jolly Good Fellow," according to the Guinness Book of World Records.

Birchtree says royalties will still be coming in until the year 2010, when the copyright expires. It brings in about \$1 million a year.

Marcos faces fraud indictment

WASHINGTON — The United States government plans to seek an indictment on Friday of deposed Philippine President Ferdinand Marcos on racketeering and fraud charges, federal sources familiar with a criminal investigation of Marcos said Thursday.

President Reagan, meanwhile, indicated he would step aside and not intervene to stop a Marcos indictment.

The charges would stem from a probe of allegations that Marcos stole enormous sums of money from the Philippines and then engaged in

a series of illegal transactions with the funds after fleeing to the United States.

Marcos' attorneys have been engaging in plea bargaining negotiations with the Justice Department and the decision to take the matter to a federal grand jury in New York to seek charges was made after the two sides failed to reach an accord by a deadline of 3 p.m. MDT Thursday, said the sources, speaking on condition of anonymity.

One source said Marcos' lawyers were banking at the government's demand that Marcos plead guilty to a charge of racketeering.

U.S. Attorney Rudolph Giuliani,

whose office has been investigating Marcos, declined to comment when asked by a reporter in New York about his plans.

In Honolulu, Marcos spokesman Gemmo Trinidad refused to comment on the report of impending indictment and when asked if Marcos knew, and what his reaction was, said:

"He's been talking to his lawyers, so he must know."

Of plea-bargaining discussions, Trinidad said that "It's been all over the papers," adding that "I didn't know about any deadline."

Trinidad said Marcos would issue a prepared statement later.



Ed board unveils building proposal

SUGAR CITY (AP) — The Idaho Board of Education has unveiled a legislative proposal members hope will funnel \$42 million into needed construction on the campuses of the state's colleges and universities.

"If this proposal isn't acceptable to the Legislature, then the board stands ready to discuss other methods of capital funding for these urgent needs," Board Chairman Charles Grant said Thursday.

Under the proposal, initiated at the board's last meeting in Boise, bonds would be issued for the construction capital and then be paid off over the next 20 years at about \$4.4 million annually.

A similar bonding was considered during the last legislative session, but it died after it became entangled in a dispute over whether it would force significant increases in student fees.

But Grant said that opposition or not some way must be found to underwrite construction projects or the quality of higher education in the state will continue to decline.

"The bottom line is that the projects are essential, and we have to get them done," Grant said.

Since being initiated in September, the Higher Education Capital Improvement Act of 1989 has drawn what Grant described as "favorable but guarded" legislative response.

"They want to know more about it," said Grant, acknowledging that only a small number of lawmakers have reacted to the proposal.

"They want to consult other legislators. They want to look at the ramifications," he said. "But we haven't had anyone say, 'No.'"

Grant said there seems to be an attitude that the state will take care of operational costs in the education system, but "then we get down to construction and we basically ignore those needs."

"Student space needs exist," he contended. "All you have to do is go on to the campuses and you will see that there needs to be a lot of repairs and maintenance work."

The bill would finance long-needed construction at the four state colleges in Boise, Moscow, Pocatello and Lewiston and the two junior colleges in Twin Falls and Coeur d'Alene.

The largest proposal is for \$11.7 million for work on the University of Idaho library.

Pre-parole release irks Andrus; board admits Murphy in error

BOISE (AP) — Gov. Cecil Andrus said Thursday he is "not satisfied" with the response to his angry questions about a program of releasing some prison inmates to Boise halfway houses before parole.

The Idaho Board of Correction suspended the program Wednesday pending further discussion, and it acknowledged Corrections director Al Murphy was wrong to start it without board approval. But board members said they would take no disciplinary action against Murphy.

Andrus said that was not good enough, especially in light of new information that a "pre-release" inmate sent to one of the halfway houses had a prior rape conviction.

"I'm not convinced yet that we have all the information that's necessary," the governor said.

He said he was upset that city officials apparently were not told that the Boise Stepping Stones Ministries and Salvation Army halfway houses were accepting inmates before parole.

"It's not fair to the city and it's not fair to those people in the community," Andrus said, adding that he would continue to pursue the matter. He would not elaborate and set no deadline for further action.

The Stepping Stones facility closed voluntarily on Wednesday after learning that a parolee housed there and a work-release inmate sent by the Department of Corrections were convicted sex offenders.

The program began in September without any public notice. When it

was disclosed over the weekend, Andrus and other officials expressed outrage.

Murphy told the Corrections Board at an emergency meeting Wednesday that he considered the halfway-house program justified by previous legislative action. But he apologized to board members if they misunderstood his intention to pursue it to help ease crowding in the prison system and reintegrate selected inmates to life in the community.

Murphy said Wednesday that a letter from the Legislature's Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee dated March 21, 1988, authorized his department to pay to house inmates at facilities other than county jails.

But state Sen. Atwell Parry, R-Melba, co-chairman of JFAC, said Thursday that he was "sure it was not the intent of the Legislature to allow halfway houses."

"Thirteen minimum-security and community release" inmates with up to four months left on their sentences were placed at Stepping Stone and the Salvation Army.

The six housed at Stepping Stone have been relocated to the prison system's Nampa Community Work Center. The status of the seven remaining at the Salvation Army will be reviewed at the Correction Board's Nov. 4 meeting.

Murphy said inmates picked for the program were "good, solid people, inmates who have a good, solid behavioral track record."

But Stepping Stone's Jane Forker-Thompson and Stepping Stone

board member Donald Burnett, an Idaho Court of Appeals justice, said the information provided by the Corrections Department did not reveal the rape conviction of one of the work-release inmates.

Murphy replied that Stepping Stone had received "100 percent of our information."

Officials blast lottery

BOISE (AP) — A state lottery would not provide the financial windfall claimed by backers of the Nov. 8 ballot measure, say current and former co-chairmen of the Legislature's budgeting and Finance-Appropriations Committee.

Sen. Atwell Parry, R-Melba, and former Republican senator David Little of Emmett said Thursday that the lottery is "an illusion being sold to the people with smoke and mirrors."

At a Boise news conference, they said money generated by a lottery would do little to help fund education, and language of the proposed constitutional amendment could lead to authorization of gambling far beyond what most people expect.

Parry said "had I known of all the problems associated with casino-type charitable gambling, I would not have voted to put the amendment on the ballot."

Little said the issue goes beyond morality or religion.

"It's just bad economics," he said. "I personally like to gamble from time to time, but I prefer to do my gambling in Nevada. We don't need to import any more crime and corruption."

In a prepared statement, Parry and Little said a lottery would provide no more than \$3 million a year to the school building fund, where half of the lottery receipts would be funneled.

That isn't even enough to build one high school, they said. It's not a drop in the bucket compared to the money spent by state and local districts annually.

Parry urged voters to reject the amendment and let legislators try again to develop a more restrictive lottery measure.

He defended Attorney General Jim Jones against critics who have said he should have raised concerns while the Legislature was considering the matter about the scope of gambling that would be allowed by the amendment.

"I was unaware of anyone asking the attorney general for a complete opinion," Parry said. "They don't come forward unless we ask."

Chattin sues county

BOISE (AP) — Western Idaho Fair Board President Amy Chattin has sued Ada County commissioners to keep her job and to get a damage award for what she contends was public ridicule and humiliation.

In a suit filed Monday in 4th District Court, Mrs. Chattin contends an undated letter of resignation — required by commissioners when she was appointed and used to demand her resignation last month — was illegal.

The suit names Commissioners Mike Johnson, Judy Peavey and Vern Bisterfeld.

"You and I have to follow the law, and I expect them to," Mrs. Chattin said Wednesday. "I just want a clarification. I just don't want them to think they can do this to other people."

Court gives Sivak 3rd death sentence

BOISE (AP) — Convicted killer Lacey Sivak was sentenced to death Thursday for the 1981 slaying of a gas station attendant, losing his bid to stay alive and serve the rest of his years behind bars.

Sivak, 29, sat silently through the 10-minute sentencing by 4th District Judge Robert Newhouse. He made no comment as marshals escorted him from the courtroom in chains.

"Society must be protected," Newhouse told him. "His peace should be made with his maker, not with this court."

It was the third time Newhouse ordered the execution of Sivak, convicted of first-degree murder in the killing of Dixie Wilson during an armed robbery.

It seems any voice the Pro Lottery gets is in letters to the editor because the Times News only prints articles about it. Montana has a lottery which they began 1 year ago. From an article in the Butte paper I found these following facts very interesting. "The lottery has done what it was supposed to do by funneling millions of dollars into public schools and employee retirement programs to provide tax relief for property owners. The \$8.4 million sent to counties for their schools was short of the \$10 million forecast....result of about \$1.5 million in one-time start up costs." "The states' first-ever lottery has been operated with one of the nations smallest staffs -35 people. If Montana can operate a lottery with 35 people, Idaho should be able to do likewise, or are Montanans more clever than Idahoans. I think not."

Lobbying bill suggests hypocrisy of House

The House obviously has no enthusiasm for the idea of holding its members to the same ethical standards that senior members of the executive branch must observe when they leave office.

Having had several months to produce a bill limiting lobbying by former lawmakers, the House reluctantly approved a last-minute bill that Congress might not have enough time to complete. The measure differs so substantially from the Senate's stronger version, which was passed six months ago, that the clock might run out on this Congress before all the differences can be reconciled. We suspect that is the hope, if not the plan. It casts the House in an unfavorable light.

The House bill is weaker than the Senate's, which was a rather modest proposal. The Senate bill would strengthen current laws governing lobbying by executive branch officials by restricting them from working as paid lobbyists for one year after leaving the government. The Senate bill would apply to any lobbying activity, as opposed to the current ethics law which merely bars officials from working to influence their own former agencies within a year of their departure. The bill would also respond to charges of a double standard by applying a similar standard to members of Congress and their senior aides.

In the House, Judiciary Chairman Peter Rodino made no attempt to hide his disdain for the bill. For months, he sat on a measure drafted by a Judiciary subcommittee, only allowing it out of his full committee at the end of last month. That measure restricts lobbying by members of Congress only in regard to the house in which they served, while the Senate bill restricts senators and representatives from lobbying in either chamber for a year after leaving. The House weighed in late and with a no-compromise position that could delay negotiations with the Senate.

This is a cynical approach. It is particularly hypocritical coming from a House led by Democrats who once gleefully pointed to Reagan administration "steals" a charge that was founded on convictions of former administration officials who violated the very lobbying ban that congressmen won't apply to themselves.

Some members of Congress say that such a bill is not needed. Rodino said he supports the bill only because this is a case where appearances dictated that the House take action. But the action taken by the House so far, given the possibility that time will run out, is not enough to dispel the appearance of a Congress that routinely exempts itself from laws that others must abide.

Campaign-commercialism confuses choice for many voters

When I think about it now, I realize I almost made a terrible mistake.

With Election Day just a few weeks away, I thought I was ready to vote.

Having sat through both presidential debates between Republican George Bush and Democrat Michael Dukakis, I had my mind made up. (Never mind who my choice was.)

I realized after watching paid political announcements from both candidates that I may have misjudged the men and the issues. You see, I've come to believe - perhaps through overexposure to television - that the networks are right. They're choosing the president, not us. Mass extinction evidence grows

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Researchers who contend the dinosaurs died because a comet or asteroid struck Earth 65 million years ago say they have found evidence—a similar catastrophe—caused the most recent mass extinction about 11 million years ago.

The findings indicate the impact of a large extraterrestrial body on the Earth could have caused extinctions of 25 percent of the species on the planet between 10 million and 17 million years ago, nuclear chemist Frank Alvarez of Lawrence Berkeley Laboratory said Thursday.

If the theory is confirmed, three mass extinctions—including one about 35 million years ago—will have been blamed on comets or asteroids by a team of researchers from the lab and the University of California's Berkeley and Santa Barbara campuses. The team was led by UC-Berkeley's Nobel laureate physicist Luis Alvarez, who died last month.

Other new studies bolster support for rival theories that blame mass extinctions on gigantic volcanic eruptions, on changes in sea level or on global climate changes unrelated to objects crashing into Earth.

The studies are being presented at a four-day conference, "Global Catastrophes in Earth History," which opened Thursday in Snowbird, Utah.

The theory that mass extinction could be caused by comet or asteroid impacts was first proposed in 1980 by Alvarez's team.

They found thin layers of the metallic element iridium deposited around the world in 66-million-year-old rocks, suggesting that a comet or asteroid striking Earth kicked up enough dust and triggered freezing smoky fires to block out sunlight, either freezing many species or destroying their food supplies.

Iridium is viewed as evidence of such impacts because it is far more common in extraterrestrial objects than in Earth rocks. The iridium layer could have been distributed as airborne dust.

Asaro said that suggests, but doesn't prove, that comet or asteroids also hit Earth and triggered extinctions at that time.

The researchers estimated the comet or asteroid would have vaporized about 1.8 miles across and would have vaporized in an explosion with 300 million times the power of atomic bomb that destroyed Hiroshima, Asaro said.

In 1982, Alvarez's team said iridium found in 37-million to 39-million-year-old rocks may have triggered a mass extinction of about 25 percent of species on Earth at that time. About two-thirds of all species died in the extinction 66 million years ago.

However, other studies support the theory that huge volcanic eruptions in India 66 million years ago blocked out sunlight and caused mass extinction.

A study by Florida State University scientists suggests "shocked" grains of quartz could have been produced by extremely explosive eruptions. A team of FSU and British scientists said volcanic ash found in Weddell Sea rocks suggests volcanoes caused the extinctions. Others say the grains were created by a comet smashing quartz rock.

In the new study, two deposits of iridium were found in 10-million to 12-million-year-old seafloor rocks some 6,200 miles apart: in the Weddell Sea near Antarctica and the Tasman Sea north of New Zealand.

Quake shakes New England

AUGUSTA, Maine (AP) — A moderate earthquake that rumbled through parts of Maine and New Hampshire today sounded like a sonic boom and shook buildings, but authorities reported no damage.

The tremor measured 4.0 on the Richter scale, said Walter Anderson, director of the Maine Geological Survey. He said that measurement was from the Weston Observatory in Weston, Mass. Other reports put the tremor at 3.9 on the Richter scale, according to the U.S. Geological Survey in Menlo Park, Calif.

The quake, which struck at 9:10 a.m., was believed to have been centered about five miles north east of Berlin in northeastern New Hampshire, Anderson said. But authorities said rumblings and booms were reported all the way from central New Hampshire to Yarmouth on the Maine coast.

"I thought it was a load of lumber falling," said Sandy Endicott, a secretary at P.H. Chadbourne & Co. Lumber yard in Bethel, west of here. George Nickerson, a maintenance supervisor at Chadbourne's, said the tremor "wiggled" the maintenance garage.

Leo Perron, 78, of Berlin, N.H., said, "It shook the whole house. Pictures on the wall, everything in it went flopping back and forth."

Perron said he has been through several earthquakes before, but this was the worst he had felt in 30 years.

"It felt like a sonic boom," said Bob Barbin, a reporter for radio station WMOV in Berlin.

Police in Berlin received more than 100 telephone calls after the quake.

The Richter scale is a measure of ground motion as recorded on seismographs.

Family receives award for MIA

PENSACOLA, Fla. (AP) — A federal judge on Thursday awarded \$632,000 to the family of a missing Vietnam War officer shot down in Laos, ruling the Air Force caused them severe emotional distress when it misidentified bone fragments as his remains in 1965.

Lt. Col. Thomas Hart III was shot down in December 1972 while navigating a gunship mission. After a U.S.-Laotian team searched the site in 1965, the Air Force told his wife, Anne Hart, that it had recovered her husband's remains.

She refused to accept the identification, which was based on small bone fragments, and battled the Air Force to win an independent evaluation. The probe found the fragments were insufficient to prove the identities of most of the crash victims, and Mrs. Hart successfully sued the government.

"She is pleased this case is going to serve as a precedent for the families of other Southeast Asia war veterans," said her attorney Fran Frick. "It will afford them some protection against the same thing happening to them."

Senior U.S. District Judge Winston Arnow had ruled in January that Mrs. Hart suffered from severe emotional distress, but had delayed the issue of damages until this month's trial.

On Thursday, he awarded Mrs. Hart, her daughter Gillian, both of Pensacola, and Col. Hart's mother, Vera Lee Hart, of Live Oak, a total of \$632,000, saying their distress "was attributed to government misconduct," Ms. Frick said.

Mrs. Hart was working Thursday as a volunteer at the local veterans facility, Ms. Frick said.

"This has never been a win-or-lose situation for her," the attorney said. "What the government has done has ruined her life. No amount of money is going to give her back what she's lost."

Hart was one of 16 people aboard the AC-130 gunship shot down over Laos. Two crewmen survived and were rescued, but Hart was listed as missing in action. Six years later the government changed his status to presumed dead.

It was not until 1965 that relations between the two countries warmed enough to allow a search of the site. Fifty thousand bone fragments and personal objects were brought to the military lab in Hawaii, and some were identified by the Air Force as Hart's.

Ms. Frick said the government may have hurried the identifications to reinforce the joint effort between Laos and the United States, the first cooperation between the two countries after the war.

Bush TV ads hit hard

WASHINGTON (AP) — An independent political committee on Thursday unveiled stark TV ads featuring first-person accounts involving a prisoner who was let out on furlough under a program supported by Massachusetts Gov. Michael Dukakis.

Meanwhile, pollster Lou Harris said Bush campaign ads attacking the furlough program and Dukakis' opposition to the death penalty have influenced more voters than anything else so far in the 1988 campaign.

In Washington, the Committee for the Presidency, a group backing Republican George Bush, said its ads would start Friday in three California areas and may later be used against Dukakis, the Democratic nominee, in other Western states.

One 30-second spot features Donna Cuomo, whose brother was murdered by Willie Horton. A second shows Cliff Barnes, whom Horton stabbed several months after failing to return from a weekend pass. Horton also raped Barnes' fiancée.

Both ads show Cuomo and Barnes in close-up shots, speaking in grim voices about the furlough program and saying people outside Massachusetts don't know enough about Dukakis or his record.

Bush's 9-point lead in the latest Harris poll was built mainly through his advertising, Harris said before an appearance in Rochester, N.Y.

"The Bush commercials have had an enormous impact. Really more than the debates, more than anything else, they have determined the set of the election until now," he said.

Use of hyperactive drug may be out of control

CHICAGO (AP) — At least 750,000 U.S. children are taking stimulant medications to curb their overactivity or inattentiveness, but researchers said Thursday it is not known how many are getting the drugs appropriately.

Medication treatment for hyperactive children in the United States has emerged from its minor treatment role in the 1950s to become dominant child-mental health intervention in the late 1980s, the researchers said.

"A national estimate of 750,000 youth receiving (stimulant) medication in 1987 can be viewed as a conservative one," they wrote in Friday's Journal of the American Medical Association.

For reasons unclear to scientists, drugs that otherwise are stimulants act on the central nervous system to calm hyperactive children, improve their attention spans and concentration and reduce impulsive, disruptive and aggressive behavior.

A furor has arisen over giving children stimulants such as Ritalin, Dexedrine and Cylert. They once were prescribed mainly to stem hyperactivity, but now also are given to non-hyperactive children who have trouble paying attention, the researchers said.

Both uses are appropriate if a youngster has a problem that meets the strict psychiatric definition of "hyperactivity" or "attention deficit," or a combination of the two, the researchers said.

Nabisco buyout causes flap

ATLANTA (AP) — Food and tobacco giant RJR Nabisco Inc. said Thursday some of its top executives were considering taking the company private in a leveraged buyout valued at nearly \$17 billion, which would be the largest corporate acquisition in history.

The company, known for products that include Camel and Winston cigarettes, Oreo cookies and Ritz crackers, announced a 10.9 percent increase in third-quarter income.

The announcement of the possible \$75-a-share offer — which came in the midst of takeover activity involving other big food companies — sent RJR Nabisco's stock price soaring, but it also left investment analysts puzzled about the purpose and price of the proposal.

RJR Nabisco said President F. Ross Johnson and Edward A. Horri-

gan Jr., chief executive of the company's tobacco business, had notified the firm they "intend to seek to develop, with a financial partner, a proposal to acquire RJR Nabisco in a leveraged buyout, merger transaction."

The company said the group was considering offering about \$75 in cash for each of the company's approximately 225 million common shares outstanding, making the proposal worth about \$16.88 billion.

Shearson Lehman Hutton Inc. said it was advising the management group and would provide equity and financing for the deal.

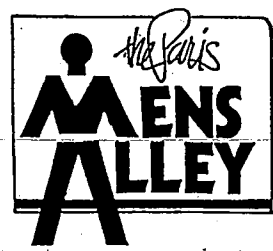

Reagan agrees troop withdrawal from South Korea a 'possibility'

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan said Thursday he sees the possibility that the United States could withdraw troops from South Korea in the near future.

"The president, entering a meeting with South Korean President Roh Tae-woo, was asked by a reporter if he could envision a time in the near future when the U.S. would be reducing its military presence."

Reagan: "That is a possibility, but it would not be one of us just withdrawing — it would be one of (being) no longer needed."

"The United States has long had about 42,000 troops stationed in South Korea under a mutual defense pact."

When asked if he detected any indications that the need for the troops

was lessening, Reagan replied, "I couldn't put my finger on some definite signs, but I can just say, seeing other areas of the world that tensions have lessened, if there's a possibility of that, yes, that should happen."

Asked whether he saw a greater prospect of this than when he took office eight years ago, Reagan said, "There have been a great many changes over eight years, and I think it's possible to see some things that we couldn't foresee then."

He said the U.S. role in relations between South and North Korea "is to be of any help we can."

Tensions on the Korean peninsula have been almost constant for more than 30 years, and Roh seeks accommodation with his country's communist-ruled neighbor to the North.

Roh proposed a summit meeting between the two Koreans in a speech Tuesday at the United Nations General Assembly. He called for both countries to meet with the United States, the Soviet Union, China and Japan to lay the groundwork for an era of peace and prosperity in northeast Asia.

The State Department welcomed Roh's "imaginative and constructive policy of reconciliation and accommodation" although it did not endorse any specific proposal.

On Wednesday, North Korea's deputy foreign minister, Kang Sok Ju, spoke to the General Assembly and proposed creating a new nation out of North and South Korea with a shared military command and a National Assembly with equal representation from both sides.

State Department spokesman Charles Redman said Wednesday the administration has no plans to remove North Korea from the list of countries that U.S. officials say engage in international terrorism.

He added that "North Korea's well-established track record of belligerence and state terror makes a very cautious approach to this issue necessary."

But Redman reaffirmed that the United States is reviewing its policy toward North Korea following the resumption of talks between the two Koreans at Panmunjom, and the show of North Korean restraint during the Seoul Olympics last month.

There had been concern that North Korea would attempt to disrupt the Olympics.

A State Department official who briefed reporters on Tuesday on condition of anonymity said the administration "will probably have an announcement" on policy changes toward North Korea in a few days.

FAA orders safety tests on aircraft

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Federal Aviation Administration today ordered immediate tests of takeoff alarm systems on nearly 1,800 Boeing 727 and Boeing 737 jetliners after finding "a significant number" of the alarms not working properly.

The takeoff alarms are a critical safety device because they warn pilots if they have improperly set instruments or control devices during takeoff.

The FAA told the airlines they must conduct the tests immediately and continue the checks every 200 flight hours to protect against possible failure.

Last year the failure of pilots to set their flaps properly led to the crash of a Northwest Airlines jet at Detroit, killing 156 people. Investigators also say a similar oversight remains a possibility in the crash of a Delta Air Lines Boeing 727 at Detroit last August in which 14 people were killed.

In neither case was there any evidence that the takeoff alarm sounded.

The Delta crash led to the FAA in September ordering airlines to check, as "purely a precautionary" step, the alarm systems on nearly 1,200 Boeing 727 aircraft.

The FAA said today those checks resulted in "a significant number of inoperative warning systems discovered" on the Boeing 727 aircraft. It said that in 35 cases, the warning alarm either failed altogether or operated improperly.

Of the 35 aircraft in which there were failures, 29 belonged to three airlines, said FAA spokesman Bob Buckhorn. He said he did not know the names of the airlines, but was trying to determine their identity.

Although the September tests covered only Boeing 727s, the FAA said in its new directive it was also including all Boeing 737 aircraft because their alarm systems are "similar" and subject to similar failures.

Shuttle engine to be replaced

WASHINGTON (AP) — One of the \$14 million engines that powered the space shuttle Discovery into orbit last month developed a small cooling-system leak and will be replaced for the ship's next flight in February, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration said Thursday.

Layers of nickel and copper, from which the engine's combustion chamber is fabricated, were found to have separated in one area, said Jerry Berg, a spokesman at NASA's Marshall Space Flight Center in Alabama. The leak resulted.

It is too early to tell whether the engine change will affect the flight schedule, he said.

The problem was found during a post-flight inspection Wednesday at the Kennedy Space Center in Florida. The engine will be removed and sent back to the manufacturer, the Rocketdyne Division of Rockwell International Corp., for repair.

"It's not possible to tell precisely when it happened," said Berg. Pressure tests were conducted before the flight and indicated the separation was not present.

Berg said the leak did not show up on any of the instruments that monitored Discovery's performance on the first flight since the Challenger accident in January 1986. "It only became apparent once we got into detailed inspection," he said.

Gorbachev reforms producing inflation

MOSCOW (AP) — President Mikhail S. Gorbachev's economic reforms have begun to produce the unexpected side-effect of inflation, a top government statistician said Thursday.

The official, Nikolai G. Belov, deputy director of the state committee on statistics, said his department hasn't yet figured out how to measure inflation and therefore doesn't know how serious it is. But he acknowledged that wages rose nearly twice as fast a real income, a clear indication of inflationary forces in the economy.

Soviet officials traditionally have contended that inflation did not exist in the Soviet Union, where wages and prices are controlled by central planners.

In other communist countries, including Yugoslavia, Poland and China, attempts to ease central controls on the economy and permit the establishment of a market pricing system have led to runaway inflation.

Fears of similar problems in the Soviet system may explain Gorbachev's hesitation in implementing price reform, which he has said is a critical element of his modernization program.

Belov, speaking to reporters at a briefing, said his department would begin calculating inflation next year. The closest he would come to of-

fering a figure Thursday was to say that while wages rose 6.7 percent in the first nine months of the year, "real income, including hidden price hikes, rose at little over half that rate, or 3.5 percent."

Prices are rising because some of the state enterprises suddenly ordered to make a profit have simply substituted expensive products for cheap ones, Belov said.

Economic reform has also brought 1 million layoffs in the first nine months of 1988, although he insisted all of those who lost their jobs received new ones or were retired on pension. The government says it does not permit unemployment.

Cooperatives were the lone item of unqualified success in the reform that some Western economists have predicted will bring the problems of capitalism long before bringing its benefits.

The private co-ops, where wages consist of shared profits, have created 700,000 new jobs in the 18 months since they were legalized, the figures showed. But in the critical area of food supplies, Belov acknowledged the Soviet Union is still a long way from being able to feed its people without substantial imports.

"The production of food cannot now meet the demands of the population," he said.

China pushes for stability

BEIJING (AP) — Officials launched a nationwide campaign to rally citizens behind new economic reforms, the Xinhua News Agency reported Thursday.

Officials of the Secretariat that conducts the daily affairs of the ruling Communist Party are meeting with provincial officials to try to "unify the nation's thinking and action."

Local officials, who have gained substantial autonomy over economic decision-making, largely have ignored government efforts to reduce the more than 20 percent inflation rate and widespread black market activity.

The new campaign indicates the leadership's determination to assert central control and enforce austerity measures.

Hu Qili, head of the Secretariat, told the meeting that the purpose of the drive was to make party officials and citizens "rally around" a program to restore economic order, Xinhua said.

Implementation of the reforms was delayed in order to allow prices to adjust to market forces.

Greeks join drug fight

PIRAEUS, Greece (AP) — The Union of Greek shipowners has signed an agreement with the U.S. Customs Service to participate in a crackdown on drug smuggling, the organization said Thursday.

Nearly 2,000 merchant vessels and their companies are enrolled.

AIDS spreads to remote lands

EXTAPA, Mexico (AP) — In the streets of Khartoum, capital of the desert African nation of Sudan, 7 percent of homeless children test positive for exposure to the AIDS virus.

In northern Thailand, the first positive AIDS tests popped up just this year.

In the jungles of Suriname, reachable only by air or boat, at least five members of a South American tribe are dying of AIDS.

Skiffs, trucks, family reunions and space rockets have all helped AIDS spread to some of Earth's most isolated populations, according to researchers, sociologists and health workers at the First International Symposium on Educa-

tion and Communication About AIDS being held here this week.

There are 40 million street children in the world, and we suddenly realized they're all at risk for AIDS because so many turn to prostitution," said Peter Dalglis, who founded Street Kids International and ran an AIDS testing program in the Sudan.

Dalglis, citing UNICEF figures for the number of homeless children in the world's largest cities, said the deadly disease entered the Sudan via truck drivers and Nile River steamers from central Africa, where AIDS incidence is high.

Poverty, guerrilla war, illiteracy, countryside empty of televisions or even radios, and lack of resources

combine to frustrate workers trying to reach isolated populations.

All the negative factors affect the jungles of southern Suriname, home to 35,000 Maroons descended from African slaves who escaped from colonial plantations.

Despite their seeming isolation, said Dr. Ruben del Prado, the space age helped ease the path of the AIDS virus when Maroon men traveled to French Guyana to work on roads and on buildings at the European Space Agency's launch facility at Kourou.

Acquired immune deficiency syndrome is transmitted through sexual contact, infected blood transfusions and the sharing of syringes.

Irish lose silence right as British crack down

LONDON (AP) — Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher's government announced Thursday it will abolish the right of suspects to remain silent under police interrogation, ending a centuries-old pillar of British jurisprudence.

The latest measure in Britain's crackdown on the Irish Republican Army provoked renewed outcries that historic civil liberties are crumbling in Britain and followed Wednesday's government ban on broadcast interviews with members of the outlawed IRA and 10 other militant groups in Northern Ireland.

In the House of Commons, the government put forward legislation — expected to take effect early next year — to end the right to silence in Northern Ireland, and said it also planned to introduce similar restrictions in England and Wales.

Members of terrorist organizations are being trained to refuse to respond to questions put by the police — and this technique is increasingly being adopted by those suspected of serious crimes, including racketeering, Northern Ireland Secretary Tom King said.

"Justice is being thwarted," he said.

At present, courts are not allowed to take into consideration that a suspect refused to answer police questions.

King said under the new law a judge will be able to draw from silences "whatever inferences appear proper."

This means a court can regard an accused's refusal to answer police as an indication of guilt.

King said the change will be aimed particularly at suspects who refuse to respond when arrested and then come up in court with a defense they could have put forward immediately, such as detailed alibis.

The new measure was virtually certain of passage in the 650-member Commons where Mrs. Thatcher's Conservatives have a huge 101-seat overall majority.

Opposition Labor Party deputy leader Roy Hattersley said the right to silence was "an essential element of a free society."

Under a historic 1966 ruling in the case of Miranda vs. Arizona, the U.S. Supreme Court said police must tell suspects before interrogating them that they have a right to remain silent, to confer with a lawyer before answering any questions, and to have a lawyer provided if they cannot afford to hire one.

Israeli politicians tangle over peace plans

JERUSALEM (AP) — Israel's two main political parties accused each other Thursday of trying to win votes by proposing peace plans no Arab would accept, and soldiers wounded 11 Palestinians in the occupied territories.

Young Palestinians wearing masks enforced strikes in two West Bank cities, Hebron and Nablus, to protest the deaths of five Arabs — two boys shot by soldiers and three teachers killed in a traffic accident

involving a truck from the Israeli prison service.

A spokesman for Yitzhak Shamir said the prime minister would consider building 53 new Jewish settlements in the occupied lands, where a Palestinian uprising began Dec. 8, if

his conservative Likud bloc wins the Nov. 1 election. Likud opposes withdrawal from the West Bank and Gaza Strip but supports a form of Palestinian autonomy.

Israel "buried" the seven soldiers killed Wednesday in Lebanon.

Soviets repair x-ray scope

MOSCOW (AP) — Two cosmonauts spent more than four hours outside the Mir orbital platform Thursday replacing a faulty component on an X-ray telescope, a task they failed to accomplish earlier this year, Tass reported.

Vladimir Titov and Musa Manarov used new tools recently brought to their space station by a Progress cargo rocket to remove a detector that had been developed by British and Dutch scientists for the telescope, the official news agency said.

Components of the unit melted because of exposure to cosmic radiation, Radio Moscow reported. Tass said Titov and Manarov replaced the part with an "upgraded detector" that would help prolong the life of the telescope.

On June 30, Titov and Manarov tried unsuccessfully to replace the damaged unit of the telescope.

Andrus' order strands waste

TWIN FALLS - Gov. Cecil Andrus' order Wednesday closing Idaho to further waste shipments has stranded four railroad cars at Rocky Flats and one in Pocatello.

Though the U.S. Department of Energy has agreed to stop shipments from the Rocky Flats nuclear weapons plant in Colorado, officials say they are not quite sure how to interpret Andrus' order.

The governor Wednesday notified Energy Secretary John Herrington by letter that Idaho would accept no more radioactive waste for storage at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory until the Department of Energy finds a solution to the permanent waste storage problem.

"They will not bring any more waste into this state until this waste storage problem is solved," Andrus told reporters Wednesday morning.

The order came following Andrus' visit to the Waste Isolation Pilot Project near Carlsbad, N.M.: Andrus wanted assurance of a firm schedule for removing the nearly 2.5 million cubic feet of radioactive waste already stored at INEL. The Energy Department has been telling Idaho for 30 years that the storage is temporary and the waste will be removed.

Now Andrus demands to know when it will happen.

Don Ote, the department's manager at INEL, said shipments to INEL from Rocky Flats, a Colorado site where plutonium triggers for nuclear weapons are made, will not resume until Herrington decides on exactly how the department will handle Andrus' ultimatum, the Associated Press reported Thursday.

Four railroad cars loaded with radioactive waste bound for INEL will stay in Colorado - for now.

Production at Rocky Flats continues to create waste, and cleanup projects there also are piling up waste. The site at Rocky Flats includes only about 90 days' worth of storage capacity, said Penny Phelps, DOE spokeswoman at INEL.

Department officials are not quite sure how to deal with another railroad car also loaded with Idaho-bound waste. The first casualty in the governor's war on waste, the box car waits in the rail yard at Pocatello. Ote said Thursday it had entered the state before the governor's announcement.

The Energy Department's uncertainty comes in part from the varied nature of shipments into Idaho, Phelps said. For example, the department is not sure whether the governor's ban includes spent fuel from Navy reactors.

Refining usable uranium from the Navy's spent fuel is the primary function of the Chemical-Processing Plant at INEL, Phelps said.

Forest Service reseeds burn

SOUTH HILLS - The U-Haul truck looked strangely out of place on the barren hilltop, 10 miles of bad road into the South Hills.

It waited, loaded with 7,800 pounds of native grass seed, for a helicopter hired by the U.S. Forest Service to spread the seed over an old burn.

The operation did not get off the ground as smoothly, as hoped. The project was "firmly in the grip of Murphy all day," said Ray Neiwert, Forest Service range conservationist.

Anything that could go wrong did, he said. The helicopter was delayed by a fire elsewhere. On the way to the site, the seed-spreading bucket fell off the truck, breaking its control

wire. When the helicopter finally arrived, two hours late, the bucket wouldn't function and had to be rewired.

But once all the kinks were worked out, the operation was finished in about two hours, Neiwert said.

The Bell Jet Ranger helicopter hooked onto a 245-pound aluminum bucket with about 450 pounds of seed and lifted off. A broadcast spreader, hanging below the ship and turned by a small electric motor, spread the seed over barren ground.

The aerial seeding project involved spreading about 13 pounds of seed per acre over about 650 acres of the 10,500-acre Herrington Fork fire of 1987. Most of the area has reseeded naturally, but in areas where the fire was particularly hot

it destroyed the crowns of grasses from which new growth sprouts.

The areas where grasses haven't reseeded naturally are vulnerable to erosion and are being reseeded to protect the watershed.

The benefit to livestock and wildlife is incidental, Neiwert said. Reseeding also will prevent the takeover of open areas by noxious weeds.

The seed mixture included smooth bromegrass, alfalfa, small burnet, orchardgrass, intermediate wheatgrass and crested wheatgrass.

Handfuls of bitterbrush seed were added to the mixture to include this important mule deer winter browse in the seeding.

FAA will reconsider Hailey control tower

HAILEY - Federal Aviation Administration officials will reconsider their previous decision against funding a control tower at Friedman Memorial Airport.

The decision followed meeting Wednesday in Hailey between the FAA, a representative of Sen. James McClure, and 150 Wood River Valley residents, pilots and public officials.

The meeting was called at the request of Sen. McClure who said he was concerned about the safety issues surrounding the airport and the contradictory information contained within the FAA's evaluation report completed this past May.

In a related matter, Bill Miller, of the Idaho Bureau of Aeronautics and a Blaine County Airport Commission member, announced the FAA has approved a private-use airport just south of Bellevue off Glendale Road.

But pilots using the Sluder Airport, on land owned by Doug Sluder, will operate on a different radio frequency than pilots using Friedman, creating a hazardous situation with traffic patterns in close proximity.

The FAA approval of the Sluder Airport in January of this year did not factor into the FAA's control tower decision in May. Temple Johnson, manager of the Air Traffic Division of the FAA's Seattle office, agreed to look into the effect of the two airports in the FAA's re-evaluation.

Johnson was on hand to answer questions and explain why the FAA decided an air traffic control tower was unwarranted for Friedman.

"Yes, Hailey is unique," Johnson

said. "Yes, a control tower would enhance safety to some degree, but it would not solve all the problems. We did not feel it would be in the best interest of the public and taxpayers to fund a control tower at the Hailey airport."

But he said later he will meet with the FAA executive board in the near future to re-evaluate the decision.

McClure asked for the meeting partly to clarify contradictory information obtained in the report analysis of Friedman. FAA Accident and Prevention Specialist Don Bennett conducted a three-week on-site study at Friedman in December, concluding a tower was needed to alleviate a few near misses he said he observed.

The final FAA decision, however,

Counterfeit checks hit Northwest, Idaho

TWIN FALLS - Authorities here have linked the recent circulation of counterfeit payroll checks to a Northwest crime spree that started in early October.

At least 11 counterfeit checks bearing the name of Universal Frozen Foods were cashed this week by grocery stores in Jerome, Buhl, Twin Falls, Burley and Rupert, said Tim Qualls, director of

the Twin Falls Department of Public Safety. Authorities do not know how much those stores lost, but the checks were for as much as \$242.

Washington merchants have lost as much as \$50,000 since Oct. 5 by cashing counterfeit payroll checks likewise carrying the names of local food-packing companies. Similar checks have also turned up in Oregon and California.

Police believe a gang of forgers moved through the Walla Walla, Wash., area during the first two weeks of October, then shifted to other Northwest

states. "I think it's over with here," Qualls said. "I think they're down the road. A man who's smart enough to print these up is smart enough not to hang around."

Qualls said that possibly 60 to 70 counterfeit checks have been cashed in the Northwest, all using the names of area food-packing companies. "In a town this size, that's your biggest industry," Qualls said.

Authorities say arson caused deadly fire

TWIN FALLS - Investigators have tagged arson as the cause of an Oct. 9 apartment fire, prompting them to treat the resident's death as a homicide.

Tim Qualls, city public safety director, said investigators found evidence that a propellant such as gasoline was used in the fire that killed Michael Miller, 31, of Twin Falls. The fire started in the kitchen of Miller's two-story apartment, one of seven in a townhouse complex at 412 Main Ave. N.

Miller's badly burned body was found sitting in a living-room chair, just a few feet from patio doors opening onto a second-floor balcony. Investigators have not been able to identify the

propellant that was used, Qualls said. A propellant can be any substance that helps start or spread a fire.

Qualls declined to comment on whether a suspect has been identified in the alleged homicide.

"We're at the point where they're hoping something breaks on it," he said. "It's a tough one."

Twin Falls County Prosecutor K. Ellen Baxter said she and one of her deputies have examined the fire site but have not screened any further evidence with an eye toward filing criminal charges. The investigation is being handled by detectives within the Twin Falls Department of Public Safety.

Authorities earlier concluded that Miller died of smoke inhalation. Dr. Charles Garrison, a Pocatello pathologist, performed the autopsy Oct. 10, the

day after Miller's body was found. From the outset, authorities have been investigating the possibility that Miller was killed or knocked unconscious and his apartment then set on fire.

The fire, which started in the early morning hours, caused approximately \$60,000 worth of damage to the apartment complex, owned by Pierce Roon of Boise and managed locally by Three M Property Management. Three apartments received severe flame or water damage.

The building has since been closed, according to a notice posted on the front door. Police evidence tape is still pasted across the building's back door. Miller, a Montana native who moved to Twin Falls in 1981, lived alone in Apartment 6. No one else was injured in the fire.

Kissinger criticizes Church

TWIN FALLS - Henry Kissinger offered some hope Thursday for Boise native Jim Turner, held hostage in Lebanon for two years.

In a Twin Falls news conference, the former secretary of state also assessed the late Idaho Sen. Frank Church's mark on the nation and found it wanting.

On the hostages, he said, "My instinct is the tide has turned... We are on the downhill slope."

"The hostages were released either by the end of the Reagan administration or more likely, at the start of the Bush," he said.

The Middle East needs support to rebuild its economy and provide it from more powerful neighbors, giving it some incentive to cooperate, if not with the United States, at least Europe, he said.

Kissinger said he supports the State Department's hostage policy. As painful as it is for families to hear, the only way to make progress against international terrorism is to give us the hostages, Kissinger said.

"We should listen to proposals," he said. "A person who is a hostage is a hostage as far as the government is concerned. Once we start negotiating, we show there is some price we are willing to pay." Then when hanging reaches a deadlock, the United States has lost its moral position.

Hostages were taken with the intent to humiliate the United States and was effective in creating a Catch 22, Kissinger said. If the hostages remained, the United States looked foolish. But if it paid a ransom, it looked weak.

On the subject of Church, he accused the Idaho senator of "practically wrecking" the Central Intelligence Agency when his Senate Intelligence Committee investigated the agency in 1976. At the time, Kissinger was secretary of state at the time.

"Church's inclusion of the intelligence system's covert operations was very parricidal," he said. "Why do covert operations... If they are not murderously difficult and inherently confused?"

The committee found "a few idiocies, but not abuse," he said. Because operations were difficult, it was not surprising that the profession attracted some oddballs, he said.

But by exposing the CIA as "a bunch of clowns," the United States' power and respect in the world was diminished, he said. "It was a disaster."

He criticized Republican presidential candidate George Bush for restoring the CIA's morale and making the agency effective again.

He said he had no problem with Church's performance as chairman of the Senate Committee on Foreign Relations.

Elvis Cain is person of the year

TWIN FALLS - A happy victim is how the 1988 Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce Person of the Year, Elvis Cain, describes himself.

"A victim because he never says no to a service project request, and happy because he enjoys them all so much."

Cain was honored before an estimated crowd of 700 at the Chamber Ambassadors' Success Breakfast Thursday at the College of Southern Idaho gym before Henry Kissinger's speech.

Joe Cilek Sr. and Buzz Langdon, who were nominated for the award, were both honored with a new tribute called the Lifetime Achievement Award. Both men died this year.

The Person of the Year Award was started in 1983 by the Ambassadors, the public relations arm of the chamber, when Curtis Eaton Sr. was selected. He has been followed by Sgt. Jim Milder in 1984, John Roper in 1985, Dr. Paul Miles in 1986 and Jack Muldoon in 1987.

Muldoon presented the award to

his successor, Cain.

Years ago, Cain's wife told him he had become a victim who couldn't say no. And while he admits he perhaps could do a better job if he weren't spread so thinly between so many volunteer projects, he always gives each one top priority in turn, and the satisfaction he receives makes him a happy victim, he said.

Cain was born in a sod house in the South Dakota prairie. He came to Twin Falls and opened his first store here in 1946 - Cain's Furniture and Appliance.

A heart attack and four major surgeries several years ago "made me stop, like it does a lot of people, and made me think what can I do for other people," Cain said.

He dedicated himself then to shut-ins. He tries to make 12 visits each week, and always leaves with a feeling of exhilaration, he said.

On top of all the volunteering, he said, Les Hazen, (the store manager), won't let me quit, so I have to keep working."

Cain is chair of the Chamber of Commerce's Retail Marketing and Membership Investment committees.

Agent testifies Swapp aimed rifle

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Polygamist clan leader Addam Swapp shouldered and pointed his rifle toward lawmen hidden in a house moments before a state corrections officer was killed by a rifle bullet, an FBI agent testified Thursday.

Agent Richard Intellini's testimony on the first day of a preliminary hearing for three club members charged in the officer's death, focused on the January shootout that ended a 19-day standoff with police at the group's Mormon farm.

The gunfire erupted from the clan's main log residence the morning of Jan. 28 as state Corrections Lt. Fred House stood in the doorway of another home on the compound and tried in vain to urge a police dog to subdue Swapp and his brother, Jonathan.

Intellini said House went to the front door and gave the dog a command, but the animal took only one step outside before going back in the house, which contained an FBI SWAT team.

"La. House silhouetted himself in the doorway, pushed the dog out the door and gave the dog another command," Intellini said.

When the dog barked, Addam

Swapp looked over his shoulder twice, the second time raising his rifle and pointing it toward the lawmen's house, Intellini said, adding that Jonathan Swapp started to slip his rifle off his shoulder.

That's when Intellini fired through a window, which shattered and obscured his view.

Third Circuit Judge Maurice Jones will decide after the hearing whether there is sufficient evidence to bind the trio over for trial on second-degree murder charges.

—**Adam-Swapp, 27, his brother Jonathan, 21, and John Timothy Swapp, 22, all have pleaded innocent.**

Much of the testimony Thursday duplicated that given during an earlier trial in federal court in which the three were convicted of a variety of charges related to the Jan. 16 bombing of a nearby Mormon chapel and the ensuing stalemate with 100 officers.

Evidence presented during the federal trial showed Singer fired the fatal bullet from a 30-caliber carbine while seated in his wheelchair at a bedroom window in the main residence.

Intellini said that after he fired, he heard several rounds hitting the

house and wood splintering.

"The next thing I recall is Agent (John) Butler saying, 'Fred's hit!'" observed Lt. House fall backwards into the wall and slide into a seated position."

Intellini said he asked House if he was okay and the officer merely groaned.

Butler testified that he, too, saw one of the two brothers raise a weapon and point it toward the house containing the agents just before Butler fired a shot.

"Additional rounds entered the house and it's at that time that I saw Fred House had been shot," Butler said. House was pulled into the kitchen, where officers performed first aid before he was evacuated by armored personnel carrier.

Butler said he saw someone lying in the snow, went up to him and saw it was a wounded Addam Swapp, who had been hit in the arm and chest. He said he rendered first aid before Swapp was evacuated.

When he returned to the agents' hideout, Butler said he saw numerous bullet holes in the door which were at head and chest level.

Authorities have asked UFF payroll checks until notified otherwise. The company's employees have been instructed to cash their checks only at banks.

The counterfeit UFF checks named a Washington bank as the account administrator, Qualls said. Counterfeit checks passed elsewhere also named Washington banks, which have rejected the checks when pre-

sented for payment.

Authorities describe the bogus checks as professional, high-quality counterfeits.

"On a deal like this, by the time victims know they've been hit the counterfeiters are down the road," Qualls said.

Bank officials say many checks were cashed on weekends so the stores could not call the bank to verify the account.

In some cases, false identification

was used to cash the check, police said. In other cases, merchants failed to ask for or record any identification.

Many of the checks passed in Washington carried the name Amerifresh, a Walla Walla onion-packing and shipping plant. Police said that in other areas of the Northwest, the counterfeiters are apparently operating under the names Applewood Farms, Apple Valley Fruit and Dobb's Packing.

Last day to register with registrars

TWIN FALLS — Today is the last day to register to vote with precinct registrars.

However, residents can register at their county clerk's office through Oct. 28.

Precinct registrars are private citizens authorized to sign up voters in their neighborhoods. Voters have their choice of registering with the precinct registrars or at their courthouses.

No identification or other records are necessary to register. Residents simply sign a document swearing that they have told the truth.

Registrants must live in their county for at least 30 days and turn 18 before the election. Residents who have moved since the last election should register again to change the precinct in which they vote.

For more registration information, voters should call the county clerk's office at their county courthouses.

Grant money benefits local groups

TWIN FALLS — Emergency food and shelter groups in Twin Falls County that qualify will get \$32,249 in federal money this year.

The Federal Emergency Management Agency gave

Each group must be non-profit, have an accounting system and conduct an annual audit; practice non-discrimination, be able to provide emergency food and shelter care and have a voluntary board.

declined funding for the tower based on several factors, including the fact Friedman did not meet FAA establishment criteria and had a cost/benefit ratio of less than half the required percentage.

Johnsson said he would be glad to build a tower here, but his office operates on limited resources for a sensitive area which includes 90 airports without control towers, 34 of which have more traffic than Friedman.

Most who spoke at the meeting favored a tower.

Governor Andrus is in support of a control tower at Hailey if it will in fact enhance the safety at Hailey airport.

Patrick Sullivan, executive assistant for McClure, said:

— Airport Manager and Hailey Mayor Paschal Drake said for years FAA specialists have told him a tower was needed "in the worst way." He also many airports not meeting FAA traffic factors have control towers by Congressional mandate.

Other supporters of a control tower included area and non-local pilots, residents, the city of Sun Valley, Hailey City Councilman Rick Davis and Horizon Airlines.

Those opposed were members of the citizen's group SAF-ETY, Inc., other residents and pilots.

SAF-ETY President Brad Seimer said the group opposed a tower because it is viewed as an expansionist move. Seimer quoted the FAA's report as stating a control tower would not have prevented any of the 13 accidents at Hailey.

In response to questions from the audience, Johnsson said a tower would serve to control traffic flow to reduce the chance of head-on, mid-air collisions, but the air traffic controller would play a role in that only as far as visual sight, approximately five miles.

Johnsson also laid rest ideas that with current design considerations a control tower could not be relocated in the event another airport was built in the future. Cost for a control tower would be \$3.5 million with another \$6.5 million to cover staffing and maintenance expenses over the next 20 years.

Johnson did confirm that air traffic controllers would abide by any airport ordinances restricting take-offs and landings.

Horizon Airlines Vice President George Bagley said his company supports a control tower but also moving the airport. Bagley went so far as to promise Horizon would pay for the moving of a tower, explaining that several of Horizon's 22 near misses this year occurred in Hailey, and a control tower would help reduce that possibility.

Resident Janet Hayes said she is concerned about the increase of air traffic over the northern approach.

Bagley refuted this concern, adding Horizon is currently trying to obtain approval to land their Dash 8s from the south with up to 18 knots of tailwind rather than the 10 knots which is now regulated.

the seed using a range drill, similar to farm planting, said Don Oman, Sawtooth National Forest forester.

But the drill, which puts the seed into the ground, works only on gentle ground. Much of the area to be seeded was rocky and steep, Oman said. The Forest Service decided it would be more economical and faster to reseed the whole area by air.

The helicopter and pilot Jim Reid,

hired by the Forest Service from Reeder Flying Service of Twin Falls, cost nearly \$18,000. The seed, at about \$3 per pound, came to more than \$10,000, Oman said.

The only thing lacking now is moisture. The Forest Service hopes a good snowfall will cover the seed till spring and provide moisture so it will sprout.

Commerce Department head emphasizes small communities

TWIN FALLS — The state's economic development program isn't geared exclusively for big cities, the man heading that program said Thursday.

"We're not here representing the state of Boise," said Jim Hawkins, director of the state Department of Commerce. "We're representing the state of Idaho. We want to put your minds at ease about that."

"There is a perception that the Department of Commerce economic development plan is only for the long-term development of the larger communities. That is false. It is a rural development plan for a rural state," he said.

Idaho's economic development agenda is

almost a year old, and the state's Department of Commerce is almost two years old. Thursday, local and state officials gathered in Twin Falls to discuss how the state's economic development effort is going.

"Idaho Works" is the theme of the state's development program, and it is working, Hawkins said.

The state's population is no longer dropping, and the unemployment rate has fallen from 6.7 percent when the department was formed to 4.2 percent today.

The department surveyed business site scouts across the country and found that Idaho doesn't have a bad image — it has no image at all.

Still, Idaho communities have a lot of assets in competing with those in other states,

Hawkins said:

- "We are a low-cost operating state."
- Utility rates are the lowest in the nation.

— Idaho has the best telecommunications system available. "Some people think we're still on the four-party system."

- Workers' compensation rates are low.
- Property taxes are low.
- Productivity is high.

Some of the problems in economic development include a lack of widespread commitment, competition among communities and lack of labor force preparation for changes when they do come, said Rick Parker, with the Agriculture Department at the College of Southern Idaho.

"You guys have a bad reputation if you want to know the truth — at least in my

area," Kathy Sursely of Buhl told the state economic development staff. "People don't like the concept of economic development because they think it means bringing in corporations from outside and changing the things that people like the way they are."

Officials agreed that as a popular but mistaken perception, real economic development comes little by little from small-business growth, they said.

Bill Schaeffer, director of the Burley Chamber of Commerce, said the state's development professionals should spend time visiting with local businesses periodically to learn how they are doing — whether they are struggling to survive or whether they are ready to expand and need financing.

Burt Holmes, a Hagerman motel owner, suggested putting up more signs to get

tourists off the interstate and onto back-road attractions.

Rick Ritter, the director of Project Enterprise, told about the program that helps fund fledgling businesses that add value to Idaho raw materials.

Parker discussed value-added agriculture, using the Moyle Mink Farms near Heyburn as an example. Instead of raising pelts and selling them, the Moyles are training local women the art of sewing mink coats in their homes and are marketing the finished product instead.

The Department of Commerce officials plan to use the comments and recommendations to improve their services to local economic expansion efforts.

BLM looks for council nominees

JEROME — Police business dominated this week's Jerome City Council meeting.

Work on the new police quarters in the Tower Building is on schedule, Councilman Donald Jacobson said. The council approved two related bills.

One, for \$1,740, went to G & L Electric for two emergency exit lights, outlets, switches and a telephone conduit. The other, for an estimated \$1,500, will be paid to Len's Heating and Air Conditioning for extension and ductwork for heating and air conditioning in the building. Jacobson said carpenters have completed the framing.

The police hope to be in the building by the end of October.

The council also approved a plan

whereby officers will not lose vacation days when there is a shortage of personnel in the department.

James Baker was hired to replace Jay Gardner, who will remain with the force as juvenile officer.

The council also gave Police Chief Gregory Will approval to send Mito Alonzo to instructor development school at the Post Academy in Boise. Alonzo is training as a firearms instructor for the force.

Mayor Ralph Peters named Jacobson the new police commissioner. Current commissioner, Councilman Gerald Ostler, will be the new sanitation commissioner.

In other business, The Senior Citizens asked for a work session with the council at 4:40 p.m. today to discuss applying for a block grant through the Idaho Department of Commerce to expand the Senior Citizens building. A public

hearing is set for Nov. 2.

Approval was granted to Sloan to put out bids on Nov. 15 for a pickup truck for the water department and a truck for the street department. Bills approved for work on the new South Lincoln Industrial Park were: Earthrock, Inc., \$24,201; Twin Falls Construction, \$59,627.67; BHM Engineers, \$21,790; and W Cubed, \$5,150.

A payment of \$376 to City Attorney Robert Williams for legal fees connected with the sale of property at the park was also approved. Sloan said the final gravel is now being laid at the site, and the final paving is being done, with the intention of finishing all such work by the end of October.

Council is planning to call a town meeting for Nov. 17 to discuss the needed repairs at the city swimming pool.

Fire Chief James Auclair noted

that the fire truck now being used most often is 13 years old. "Some time we need to look at buying a new truck, as we have said for the last 10 years," he said, adding that he will recommend yearly tuneups and testings in the meantime.

Council instructed Williams to prepare a resolution allowing all full-time city employees to receive a day

off for their birthdays. This will help employee morale since the city cannot provide raises this year, Public Works Director Lanny Sloan said.

The council also granted permission for all street department and some water department employees to trade the Veteran's Day holiday for Nov. 25, the day after Thanksgiving.



Game of the week Bruins need one-of-two to make state playoffs

BOISE — It's down to one-of-two for the Bruins in their quest to become the first Twin Falls High School team to gain the state football playoffs since 1982.

And the immediate problem at hand could be the toughest so far — the top-ranked Boise Braves Friday night at BSU Bronco Stadium — and the season ends the following week with the third-ranked Borah Lions in Twin Falls.

"I think what it boils down to is we have to beat Borah," says Coach Jon Jund, whose Bruins are ranked fourth by the Associated Press among Class A-1 Division I football teams. "Right now it appears that if Centennial beats Meridian, they'll be in because the teams go in on winning percentage. They could end up #2 and if we lose one of our last two, we'd be #3 and their percentage would be better."

The Bruins are 6-2 overall and 2-1 in their Division I playoff "pod." Boise is 6-1 and 4-1.

"I feel that if we can beat Boise, we would really enhance our chances of being selected to go," Jund said. "If we beat Boise and Borah, we're in period. That's the way we want to do it."

The Twin Falls-Boise game will be the second in a doubleheader starting at 6 p.m. Highland of Poentello plays Borah in the first game. The Twin Falls-Boise game probably will start between 8:30 and 9 p.m.

"Boise is a very big team across the offensive and defensive front," Jund said. "I figure if we can beat them we'll have to go right at them and it should become a slugfest. We've scouted Boise four times and always felt that the other teams have tried to throw over them rather than fight them in the trenches."

We're going to try. Defensively they go 275 pounds, 220, 220 and they're all seniors and then I think their defensive ends are their strength, especially Dave Williams (6-3, 185). So they may stuff us but we're going to try."

Jund said there is no doubt that Boise's linebackers and secondary will be the best the Bruins have seen thus far "as far as hitting goes. They'll really come up and tag you."

That linebacking corps is headed by senior Rob Angell, who has 87 tackles in seven games. "Offensively we'll go in hoping to force them into man coverage so they can't shift into our double set," Jund continued. "If we can, that should open up the short passing game."

Boise Coach Rich Gagnon, whose ballclub suffered its first loss of the season at the hands of Borah last weekend, figures to see a ballclub very much like his up #2 and if we lose one of our last two, we'd be #3 and their percentage would be better."

"They run the veer and so do we. They use the short passes and so do we. They're a ball-control type offense, and that's what we like to do," he said.

Gagnon said he's wary about getting into a shootout with Twin Falls.

"We can't have any turnovers," he said. "We've got to stay within our offensive game plan, move the ball and keep it out of their hands."

Gagnon expects the Bruins to use the run to set up the pass, and vice-versa. "We've got to contain the running game because they can move the football that way," he said. "But you also have to contain their passing game because they throw for a high completion percentage."

For Jund's part, his concern is Braves' quarterback Chris Hall, the son of Boise State head coach

Hershiser goes the distance; named MVP Dodgers clinch series

OAKLAND, Calif. — With another helping of Hershiser and a dash of destiny, the Los Angeles Dodgers defied all the odds and won the World Series.

Unbelievable! Orel Hershiser threw his second complete game in five days, a four-hitter, and pitched out of an eight-inning jam as the demoralized and depleted Dodgers beat the Oakland Athletics 5-2 Thursday night to wrap up the Series in five games.

It was one of the most dramatic turnarounds and biggest upsets in baseball history.

The A's were heavy favorites, picked by many to win in no more than five. The Dodgers did it instead.

The A's were the Bash Bunch, the heavy hitters, the winningest team in the majors and the second highest-scoring team. They hit only 177 in the Series, 28 of 158, and were out-homered by the Dodgers 5-2. Jose Canseco and Mark McGwire went a combined 2-for-6.

The Dodgers got just one at-bat from their big bat, Kirk Gibson, a game-winning pinch-hit homer in Game 1. But Mickey Hatcher and Mike Davis, who had just three homers between them during the regular season, each hit two-run home runs in the final game; Hatcher hit two for the Series.

"I think they just ran into us when we were pitching very well," said Hershiser, the Series' Most Valuable Player.

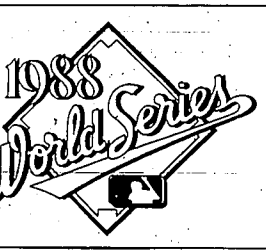
Hershiser was human enough to give up two runs for a change, but that was still not enough for the suddenly-mightless A's.

"There's one big explanation. Dodgers pitching shut us down," said A's manager Tony La Russa. "The story goes back 100 years: When you make quality pitches, no matter how good a hitter you are, you're not going to get hits."

Hershiser allowed just five earned runs in his final 101 innings, including a season-closing, all-time record 59 straight without allowing a run.

"I feel like I'm climbing a mountain every time I'm out there," Hershiser said. "It's very tough to pitch in the big leagues. It's a war out there."

Hershiser was the field marshal. The Dodgers, crippled by injuries



became the first team to win two championships in the 1980s, their last one coming in 1981. It also ended a streak in which 10 different clubs had won the last 10 Series.

Los Angeles, the most active team in the off-season, made the moves work. They rebounded from a 73-89 mark the last two years, the greatest improvement of any National League team to win the World Series.

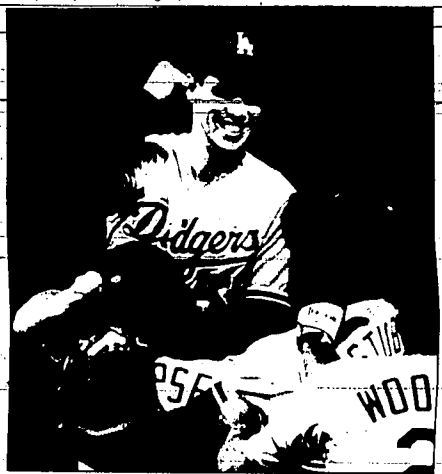
For two years, we suffered a great deal, and now the Dodgers are back on top," said Dodger manager Tom Lasorda. "They have to be an influence for everyone in the world. They showed you what you can do if you want something bad enough."

Hershiser struck out nine and walked four. He was toughest when it mattered most, twice getting Canseco with two runners on base.

Canseco grounded out to end the third with Oakland trailing 2-1. In the eighth, after Stan Javier's RBI single pulled the Athletics within 5-2, Hershiser walked Dave Henderson and brought Canseco to the plate as the potential tying run.

to Gibson, Mike Marshall, Mike Sotnick and John Tudor, weren't expected to stay in the same ballpark as the Athletics. Instead, the Dodgers blew the winningest team in the majors off the field. "You can't expect a whole lot of runs from the lineup we put out there," Hershiser said.

The homers by Hatcher and Davis made it 4-1 in the fourth inning, and that was plenty for Hershiser, who pitched Los Angeles into the Series with a shutout in Game 7 of the National League playoffs against the heavily favored New York Mets and then shut out Oakland in Game 2. It was the sixth World Series championship for the Dodgers, who

Glenns Ferry beats Filer, moves on to A-3 playoffs

FILER — An 82-yard drive in the final three minutes carried the embattled Glenns Ferry Pilots past the Filer Wildcats 14-7 and into a second-straight Canyon Conference championship Thursday and the attendant trip to the state A-3 football playoffs.

The whirlwind drive that covered six plays and 122 seconds was marshaled by senior quarterback Duncan Farris and rode the darting runs of Jon Hartway. After Hartway scored on a 15-yard dash with 1 minute and 34 seconds showing on the clock, a Farris-to-Steve Alderman conversion pass nailed down the victory.

The victory, which saw all the scoring come in the fourth quarter,

means that Glenns Ferry will entertain Sugar-Salem in the first round of the playoffs next week. Coach Bill Brock said the date and time have not yet been finalized.

While it was a difficult win for the Pilots, it was a heartbreaker for the Wildcats, who had overcame a wholesale loss of players to injuries in the past few weeks to put themselves in a position to be part of the final championship picture.

The Wildcats stayed in this game because of their defense, described by Coach Wade Quesnell as "probably our best of the year, but we couldn't hold them on that last drive."

The drama started building early in the fourth quarter when a Filer punt carried out to its own 47-yard line and Hartway immediately

BUHL — Throw out the last two months, insist both Jerome coach Greg Trenary and Buhl coach Keith Mitzner. This Class A-2 high school football season in the Magic Valley, like so many before it, boils down to the Tigers vs. the Indians tonight.

"We're looking for a tough game from a good football team," said first-year Jerome coach Greg Trenary, who says Tigers are 8-0 for the season and ranked No. 1 in the Associated Press. "Buhl can be very explosive with the pass and they have some good athletes."

This six-decade old classic, which will be renewed at 7:30 tonight at Bowers Field, has decided the Magic Valley's representative in the state A-2 playoffs for the past two years.

It will again tonight, although the Indians are mired in a three-game losing streak.

"We've lost four kids to injuries and we've struggled for the last few weeks," said Mitzner, whose ball-

club is 4-4 after winning four of its first five. "If we're going to have a chance to beat Jerome, we've got to cut down on our turnovers and be able to control the ball."

The opener of tonight's South-Central Idaho Conference championship game goes to the first round of the state A-2 playoffs in the Holt Arena in Pocatello next weekend against the winner of tonight's Marsh Valley-Preston game. The loser goes home.

"We have a lot of respect for Buhl," said Trenary. "They're a big, physical football team and they're going to be tough on both sides of the ball. They run basically the same defensive package as we do (4-4) and they run the veer very well. But we're used to that to — everybody else has played since Twin Falls has run that against us."

The big difference between the teams, Mitzner pointed out, is team speed.

"This is one of the fastest Jerome teams I've seen, and they've had

Valley pulls off 22-21 overtime win over Kimberly in squeaker

KIMBERLY — Valley's last hope for a possible playoff berth came down to one play and Viking Coach Rod Malone went back to the play that worked time and time again.

On fourth-and-four in overtime, Brian Hardy took the ball on a left sweep and ran it for the touchdown. After Bernard Mussmann added the extra point, Valley squeaked by Kimberly 22-21 in overtime in the Canyon Conference' regular-season finale for both teams.

"We had some luck running to the left side," said Malone. "And Hardy said he'd get it into the end zone."

The victory kept Valley, 7-2 overall and 4-2 in conference games, in the hunt for a postseason playoff berth. For that to happen, however, Wendell would have to defeat Gooding in Wendell tonight, which would

"Hardy got the call on fourth-and-goal, but coughed it up at the 1-yard line, but Mussmann fell on the ball in the end zone and after he added the extra point, Valley led 7-0."

The second quarter belonged to the Bulldogs.

Kimberly drove 60 yards in 10 plays capped off by a Brad McDonald toss to Brandon Ure. The extra point attempt was mishandled and the Bulldogs trailed 7-6. The big play

in that drive came on a McDonald-to-Ure pass on a fourth-and-eight situation. It was good for 20 yards and kept Kimberly's drive alive.

A Valley fake punt failed and Kimberly took two more minutes after they scored.

It took six plays and just two minutes for the Bulldogs to drive 43 yards as McDonald connected with Sam Wormsbaker and after the extra point kick was wide, Kimberly led at the half 12-7.

Valley's first possession in the second half soon turned to disaster when they fumbled at their own 35-yard line.

Wormsbaker took the ball on the next play and gained 10 yards. The Valley defense then got tough and Kimberly settled for a 37-yard field goal by Chris Chandler.

Valley needed to get on the board and the final scoring drive of the game started for the Vikings at their own 43-yard line.

"The big play on the drive came on a reverse around the left side with Hardy romping for 23 yards."

Seven plays later, Nathan Huetting ran the ball in from the 1-yard line and after David Black called his own number for the extra point and the game was tied.

Both teams had another chance to get on the board with Kimberly coming the closest, but an intercepted pass deep in Valley territory squelched the drive.

State prep volleyball championships open today

A field of 32 high schools, including seven Magic Valley qualifiers, open the 1988 Idaho state high school volleyball championships this morning at two separate yet closely situated sites in Idaho's panhandle.

Burley is representing Region III in the Class A-1 tournament that will begin at Post Falls High School this morning, while Wood River will represent District 4 in the state A-1 tourney at the same site.

Just 10 miles back down the road at North Idaho College in Coeur d'Alene, the A-3 and A-4 schools tip off their portion of the two-day event. Magic Valley representatives Filer and Gooding vie against the state's best in Class A-

3, while Shoshone, Dietrich and Oakley, among the smaller schools, will be shooting for honors.

Burley's Bobcats (19-6), whose Region III title was the school's first ever in Class A-1, can enjoy a slight advantage in height against Region II runner-up Borah (17-6) in the first round. Game time for that contest is 7 o'clock A.M. MDT this evening.

The outcome should provide Burley Coach Vic Jackman an inkling of how his charges are likely to fare against the rest of the field as Borah's Lions have already met a trio of tournament entrants, including both prospective second round opponents.

Borah split a pair of regular-season matches with Nampa, which finished third in its regional tournament, and fell to Coeur d'Alene, the

second-place team from Region I, in its only meeting with the Vikings. In addition, three of the six Lion losses came at the hands of Region II champion Meridian (22-1), which meets Idaho Falls at 3:30 MDT.

A win would pit the 'Cats against the Coeur d'Alene-Nampa survivor in Friday's 10 o'clock MDT finale. Conversely, a loss spells an 11:30 a.m. MDT Saturday loser-out clash against the CDA-Nampa loser.

"Being our first trip, we're just kind of feeling it out," said Jackman. "A win in the first round at state would really be a big boost. We're peaking at just the right time for it."

Defending state champion Sandpoint, 16-3 on the regular season, and 23-1 Madison, who meet at 2 p.m. MDT in the first match of the day, round out the field.

Coach Dave Neumann's Wood River Wolverines open at that same hour against District 3 A-2 runner-up Kuna (17-8). St. Maries (21-1), the perennial titleholder from District 1, follows against Bear Lake.

"We haven't seen Kuna play," said Neumann, whose netters finished third at state a year ago. "Interestingly enough, though, their coach is my only son's brother. So he's seen us a couple of times."

Preston, which humbled St. Maries' Lumberjacks for the 1987 crown, plays Bishop Kelly in one-loser-bracket contest and the Kelville Falcons (19-2) meet Lakeland's 14-5 Hawks in the other.

"They don't seem into the tournament so it's about as fair as it can be and I think all the

The Sawtooth Conference merry-go-round takes its final spin this afternoon, stopping to pick up a new football champion.

Maybe. Third-ranked North Gem, 5-2 and at the head of the Sawtooth standings with a 6-1 record, will visit Fairfield this afternoon for a 4 p.m. appointment with Camas County (6-2 and 2-1). If the Cowboys win, they will collect their second league championship in four years and a date in Holt Arena in Pocatello next weekend with top-ranked Garden Valley in the semifinals of the state eight-man playoffs.

Under that scenario, Richfield (6-2 and 5-2) would get the No. 2 berth to the playoffs from the Sawtooth Conference. The Tigers would then face a long road trip to second-ranked Highland of Craigmont next week.

Should the Musers beat the Cowboys today and if Richfield beats Rockland this afternoon, there would be a three-way tie for the league title

to be settled by a playoff sometime next week at a neutral site.

Or. Should Camas and Richfield both lose today, they would have to meet in a two-way playoff next week to decide who goes to state.

"I don't know what to think," said Camas coach Galer Colter. "I kind of think the No. 2 team in this conference is going to be in better shape than the No. 1."

Colter refers to the fact that Garden Valley hasn't been touched this season and beat North Gem 48-12 in the team's season opener.

That convoluted Sawtooth Conference playoff morass highlights the ninth weekend of the Magic Valley conference football season, one with a diminishing number of games.

River and Carey completed their seasons last weekend; Kimberly, Filer and perhaps Valley finished up Thursday night.

In the Gem State Conference, Minico (1-8 and 0-7) will attempt to

record its first league victory in the season tonight at 7:30 in Rupert against Madison of Rexburg (1-6 and 1-5). Across the river, windmill North Gem will wrap up its season with a 7:30 p.m. South-Central Idaho Conference contest against Mountain Home (2-6 and 1-1).

Declo (2-6) will step outside the Canyon Conference for its regular-season finale against winless Aberdeen at 7:30 p.m. in Declo.

In the Magic-Valley Conference, Raft River (4-4 and 4-2) will try to end its season on a winning note at 7:30 p.m. on the road in Mackay (4-4 and 3-3), while Castelford (4-4 and 2-4) will entertain Hogerman (1-7 and 0-6) at the same hour while Hansen (4-3 and 2-4) visits Shoshone (2-6 and 2-4).

The matchup in Fairfield could be an interesting one because, with the exception of North Gem's 16-14 loss to Richfield last month, the Musers have played the Cowboys tougher than any other Sawtooth Conference team.

"I thought we played them pretty well down there (in Bancroft)," said Colter. "We had a chance to win the game (North-Gem, finally prevailed 34-22), but we made a couple of mistakes that hurt us."

"Camas is going to be tough for a couple of reasons," said North Gem coach Frank Buzek, whose ballclub is coming off a 44-26 romp over Richfield last weekend. "First, it's a long road trip and it's always tough to win after a long bus ride. And secondly, Camas has some big kids, especially on defense, and some quickness."

The keys for Camas will be the lid on North Gem's senior running back Keith Greenwood, who has rushed for more than 1,100 yards in seven games, and working its way around a series of debilitating injuries. The Musers have lost both of their quarterbacks, Tyler Ballard and Eric Frestenson to injuries; and Tim Yore will get the call. And Jasper Funkhouser, Camas' No. 3 rusher, is just coming back from an injury and may be 100 percent.

But the Cowboys haven't seen much of Jerry Dillard, the Camas junior who rushed for almost 300 yards against Richfield three weeks ago and has a total of 658 yards in three games.

"If we stay away from turnovers and keep Greenwood from hurting us too much, I think we have a chance to beat them," said Colter.

Oakley, Devils collide for MVC championship

OAKLEY — Six games ago, tonight's Magic Valley Conference clash between Murtaugh and Oakley looked as if it would be a mismatch.

Now both the Red Devils and the Hornets are battling for the top spot in the conference plus an automatic home-field advantage in the playoffs when the two clubs meet here tonight.

Kickoff time is 7:30 p.m. The Hornets, 7-1 and ranked second by the Associated Press among Class A schools, holds a one game lead over the fifth-ranked Red Devils, 6-2. But a Murtaugh win tonight would event the two teams' conference marks at 6-1 and give the Red Devils the title by virtue of the head-to-head tiebreaker.

Murtaugh's only league loss came five weeks ago to Mackay.

Six games ago, Oakley was 2-1 and was sitting atop the conference standings while Murtaugh was 1-2 and wallowing in the conference cellar.

But now, the Red Devils have won their last five conference games in a row while holding their opponents in their last five games to an average of six points a contest.

On the other hand, Oakley has outscored its last five opponents 110-6 and they've shut out four teams this season including their latest victims, Hogerman and Castelford. In fact, no team has scored on the Oakley defense in the last 11 quarters of play.

"It'll be one defensive struggle," predicted Murtaugh Coach Ron Pease.

You have to go back to 1982, the

year the Red Devils won the state A-4 football championship, for the last time that Murtaugh beat the Hornets.

The Red Devils carried that day-16-0, but Oakley has won the last five contests, including two shutouts.

In the past 10 years, Murtaugh has managed to win four games including three in a row from 1978-1980, but this is another year.

"They're not a surprise to me," said Oakley Coach Don Tompkins. "I picked them to win the conference. Murtaugh will be our toughest opponent, bar none."

Both teams have a potent offense and a tough defense.

Oakley's senior quarterback Doug Pickett and senior running back Zane Milton, will keep the Murtaugh defensive line guessing.

Meanwhile, the Devils' quarterback Evan Nebeker and running back Shannon Widmier could mean a tough night for the Hornets.

It may be a showcase for the runners in the contest. Milton has rushed for almost 1,000 yards while Widmier has ran for just under 860 yards.

"We have to contend with the running game and the passing game, so we can't rely on one thing," said Tompkins. "If we're gonna have trouble with one, we may have trouble with the other."

Last week, Oakley had little trouble with Castelford playing 21-0, but Murtaugh, ranked fifth in this week's Associated Press football poll, struggled at home with Hogerman winning by just nine points.

"We should've been a much better ballclub. I think we were looking down the road," said Pease. "I was looking down the road a little too."

The winner tonight will host the District 3 champion in the state A-4 semifinals, while the loser makes the long trip to Moscow to take on the District 2 titlist.

High school association suspends Blackfoot coach

BLACKFOOT (AP) — Blackfoot High School will appeal the suspension of football coach Rick Lindblad for using an ineligible player in three games this season.

But because the appeal will not be heard until next week, Lindblad will not be available to guide the Broncos Friday night against Idaho Falls in a critical A-1 Division 2 matchup.

Lindblad was suspended for the final two games of this season and placed on probation for next year by the Idaho High School Activities Association's Sixth District Board of Control.

The board found that he had used sophomore kicker Dana Wright in games against Division 1 schools Bonneville, Pocatello and Highland after Wright had quarterbacked the junior varsity the day before each of those games. Association rules bar a player from participating in varsity and junior varsity games on consecutive days.

"It was not an easy decision to make," said Butte County Schools Superintendent Mike Ford, who headed the board committee that reviewed the case. "We do feel that we are doing it in the best

interests of the students at Blackfoot."

Blackfoot lost to the higher division Bonneville and Pocatello teams but defeated Highland to set its record at 5-2. The Broncos, ranked fourth in Division 2, need to win one of their final two games to earn a berth in the state championship field. After facing top-ranked Idaho Falls Friday, Blackfoot plays its final game against Rigby next week.

In addition to sanctioning Lindblad, the district board fined Blackfoot \$500 and placed its football program on probation through the end of the 1989 season. It restored Wright's eligibility. The probation will not affect the school's championship hopes.

Athletic Director Rich Woodfin said he advised Lindblad he was violating the eligibility rule after the team's Sept. 2 loss to Bonneville. "I was aware of the rule, and I met with the coach and told him it couldn't happen again," Woodfin said.

But Wright, after playing in junior varsity games, was again used in the Pocatello loss on Sept. 23 and the Highland victory two weeks later.

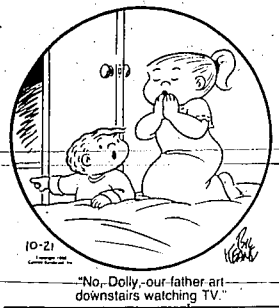

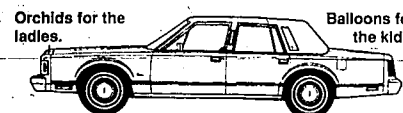

Drawing the superheros

Ketchum man follows dream

KETCHUM — Sitting back, watching autumn leaves fall outside the window into the waters of Trail Creek gives one a sense of undisturbed serenity. But an examination of the drawing board which faces that view reflects nothing of the sort.

Images of self-plotting corruptocrats of one sinister description or another leap from the pages with startling demeanor. Superheros — a swinging team of teenage mutants who are largely misunderstood by society — exert their superpowers in virtuous attempts to save the fearful ranks of mankind.

The action never stops as one battle yields to another. There is a shining light, however — good always prevails over evil.

This scene represents the contrast in the life of Ketchum resident Rick Leonard, who at 31, is playing out the dream he envisioned for himself when he was still a boy.

Leonardi is a comic book artist, one of Marvel Comics' most popular pencillers, drawing comic's best-selling X-Men, Spiderman, Cloak and Dagger and now a solo series on super-X-Men-hero, Colossus.

"I sometimes thought I'd like to be a Disney animator," Leonard says as he reflects on how he got started drawing comics.

The foundation of Leonard's career as a comic book artist began when he was 10 or 12 years old and an avid comic fan. He says he was not the kind of comic book fanatic who bought up every book available but rather, he was particular in his purchases, buying only books featuring his favorite pencilers.

The penciler is so much, or more so, the storyteller in a comic as the writer, Leonard says.

"Almost everybody is a real competent draftsman, but in terms

of the storytelling, that's where the real talent shines," he says. The process of putting together a comic book is a real team effort, beginning with the script, or plot, created by the writer. It tells only the physical action, but not how to accomplish it. From there, a penciler completes the story line by establishing the action, placing the scenery, the furniture, the props and the char-

acters themselves into the scene.

Leonardi likens what he does to that of a movie director, visualizing what each frame, or panel, of the sequence will look like.

"Continuity of sequence is of utmost importance, as is storytelling," Leonard says, adding that it what the editors drill into their artists from day one.

Once the penciler completes the drawings, they are shipped back to the writer to include the dialogue. An inker then shades in the figures, followed by a colorist who adds the final splashes of color.

The result is a 22-page comic book published once a month trying to capture the attention of the young, male adolescent market.

Terry Kavanagh, an editor at Marvel Comics in Manhattan, N.Y., says Marvel, the world's biggest comic book company, has a direct sales distribution volume of 200,000 issues monthly, plus a substantially higher amount if newsstand sales were included.

At \$1 an issue, that's nothing to laugh at. Leonard started with Marvel as a free-lancer in 1980 and until recently has worked as a fill-in artist, completing work other artists were not able to finish for one reason or another. Marvel employs 200 free-lancers to do writing, penciling and ink work.

Leonardi has now moved up to what Kavanagh calls "high profile" work. He is the main penciler on the popular eight-part Colossus series. This very political comic is a solo series featuring Colossus, a member of the X-Men and a Russian mutant — mutant is a buzzword for superpowered people who have gained their superpowers as a result of altered gene.

Leonardi is now working on the sixth issue of the series, and Kavanagh says there is also a graphic novel about Colossus in the making. While working at a sometimes

Idaho group seeks support for the arts

HAGERMAN — When Robin Bowler moved to the Hagerman valley seven years ago, it wasn't with the intention of becoming an active supporter of the arts in Idaho.

"Being raised in New York City and around there, I had a slightly snobbish attitude about what went on with the arts in this state," says the 63-year-old Bowler.

She says her "big city outlook" was challenged by the first concert of the Magic Valley Symphony she attended, which featured a visiting pianist.

"I'll tell you, the second half of that program was the most exciting thing I'd seen in years because that whole orchestra just lifted itself right up out of everything and gave a magnificent performance. And I was looking around at this thing, 'Is it this wonderful? This is what art's all about.'"

Bowler has since become vice chairman of Arts For Idaho, Inc., a state-wide arts advocacy group. Gov. Cecil Andrus declared October Arts For Idaho Month and in the spirit of that declaration, the organization is launching a statewide membership drive.

Bowler says Arts For Idaho's objective is to work with the state legislature to increase public funding of the arts and cultural development, including arts education in Idaho's public schools. In addition to lobbying, the group also evaluates existing legislation concerning the arts and helps to draft new legislation when necessary. Members are currently investigating legislation about artist's rights pertaining to the resale of art and art in public buildings.

"It's tremendously important to try to encourage and keep our artists in this state," says Bowler. "We lose a lot of them because there isn't enough of a market for them."

Bowler says she feels a strong arts community can have an economic impact on the state. "Your arts and cultural attractions are very important in attracting industries," she says. "They're also extremely important for our tourism industry."

In addition, she says, a strong arts environment might attract doctors and other professionals to rural areas in Idaho.

"If there aren't things available, they don't seem to want to come," says Bowler.

Mary Jane Kinney, Twin Falls resident and member of the governor-appointed Idaho Commission on the Arts, calls Arts For Idaho "a very important group."

Arts For Idaho was started by a former member of the state arts commission who felt there needed to be an advocacy group which talked to state legislators about funding the arts. Members of the Idaho Commission on the Arts are: P.O. Box 2898, Boise, Id. 83701.

tion on the Arts do not lobby because the group is funded by the state.

"Sometimes a citizen's group can do this better than we can," says Kinney. "When you're on the commission you don't want to do too much lobbying or that type of thing."

Bowler says Arts For Idaho is hoping to pick up 300 new members throughout the state by the end of the month. Advocates pay an annual membership fee, which comprises Arts For Idaho's entire annual budget. Members also need to be ready to do some talking on the phone.

"We're trying to set up a network system," says Bowler. "For instance, I know some people in Twin, and I'll call them and say, 'Hey, this is com-

ing up for vote. Will you call four or five of your friends and let your legislators know you would like them to support this? This, then, lets the legislators know that there are people who care, aside from just a little lobby group. Also, I think it's important that they know if their legislator is one who supports the arts or not."

Bowler says that she's become excited about the potential for development of the arts in Idaho.

"This is what art's about," says the Hagerman resident. "It's not the New York Philharmonic. It's not the Los Angeles Philharmonic. It's the things that are happening in small towns because people care. Those farmers and farmers' wives, and people who play instruments and drive 50 miles to practice in order to give three concerts a year. The people who come and bring their children who sit there quietly throughout the whole thing and are therefore being exposed to good music. I just think it's fantastic. It changed my whole outlook as to what this all means."

Arts for Idaho membership fees are \$15 for a regular membership, \$25 supporting member, \$50 contributing member, \$100 sustaining member and \$500 corporate member. 'Thirtysomething' producers try to keep momentum going

HOLLYWOOD — Ed Zwick and Marshall Herskovitz, creators and executive-producers of ABC's "thirtysomething," expected their show "to last for six episodes — and then die." Test audiences complained that the pilot was confusing, the dialogue was not interesting, the characters whined and nothing ever happened.

As a result, they never had time to design a master plan for where the series was headed following its debut in September 1987. "Last year, artistically, we were living from hand to mouth — it was a miracle we got the shows finished at all,"

Herskovitz said. Instead of dying quickly, however, "thirtysomething," an intimate study of the lives of a group of friends in the same age group as the producers (they are both 36), captured a respectable share of a demographically desirable audience during its first season. Most TV critics loved it — and even those who hated it devoted valuable column space to explaining their distaste in detail.

And then last Aug. 28 came an even bigger surprise: "thirtysomething" won the Emmy Award for outstanding drama series of the 1987-88 season.

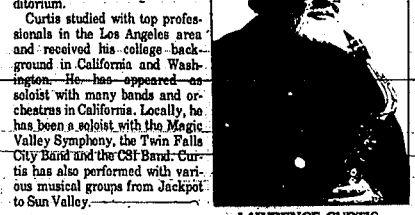

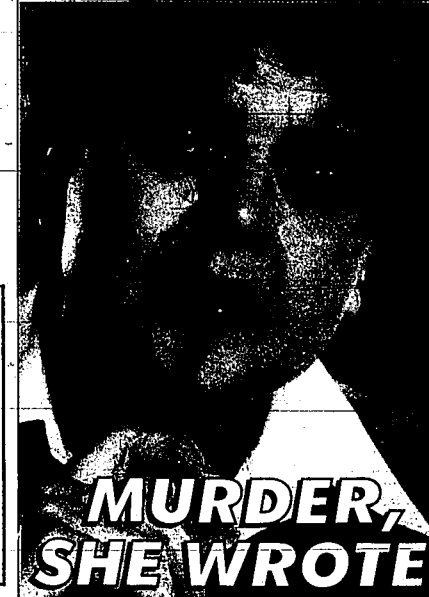

picture with a futuristic allegory about the evils of discrimination is too thin to be effective. James Caan stars as a seasoned cop with some Archie Bunker attitudes directed toward humanoids from another planet who serve as symbols of any of the racial or ethnic minorities. Mandy Patinkin plays the first 'Newcomer' — i.e., humanoid — to make detective and winds up as Caan's partner. Standard fare despite gimmickry. With Terence Stamp.

GORILLAS IN THE MIST (PG-13). With a sense of beauty and wonderment, this most unusual and challenging of African adventure films illuminates an extraordinary and unprecedented communication between a human being and the world's largest primates, the endangered mountain gorillas of East Africa. Under Michael Apted's caring and judicious direction Sigourney

Weaver is absolutely stunning as the heroic and controversial primatologist, Dian Fossey. With Bryan Brown, Julie Harris.

HEARTBREAK HOTEL (PG-13). Can you believe this? A movie in which a small town 1972 rock 'n' roller — worried about his Presley fan mom — kidnaps Elvis at gunpoint and sneers at him as a cultural relic; then persuades him, with little effort, to stick around. Date his mom; paint the house, redecorate all the rooms and sing with the band at the local high school talent show. This is not a fairytale. It is High Concept gone absolutely bonkers. Writer-director 'Chris' Columbus — may have to go some to live this one down — though, under the circumstances, David Keith, as Elvis, does pretty well (Unfortunately, he looks less like Elvis than David Keith in an Elvis wig).

'PUNCHLINE (R). Bold, sneaky and brilliant, 'Punchline' works its change-ups unmercifully. The cheesy arena that writer-director David Seltzer has picked is the acid, hostile world of stand-up comedy. Tom Hanks's range is enough to surprise even-lovers-of-Big. What might be overshadowed by the lights and darks of Hanks' character is the strength of Sally Field's performance, although her physical comedy is worthy of Lucille Ball.

YOUNG GUNS (R). As a new version of the 'Billy the Kid' legend, it pales beside some of its predecessors — like the Penn and Peckinpah versions. But this new Western, a kind of teen-movie 'Seven Samurai,' has some slick, snaky vigor. Emilio Estevez is remarkably good, a notably psychopathic Billy; Kiefer Sutherland, Lou Diamond Phillips and Charlie Sheen make a fine ensemble. But the movie's other intentions — its paeon to teen camaraderie in the face of universal corruption and to sappy young love in the jaws of death — do not always jibe.

ALIEN NATION (R). An attempt to freshen up the formula cop-buddy

'Crossing Delancey' is pleasing experience

HOLLYWOOD — From its first romantic encounter, as two pairs of eyes lock across a crowded room, to its last tremulous one, 'Crossing Delancey' is unqualified pleasure, bound on every side by love.

It is at once hip and romantic; wittily sophisticated and unabashedly affectionate; a love poem to all New York and a companion piece to director Joan Micklin Silver's 'Hester Street.'

Full of perfectly detailed performance, 'Crossing Delancey' brims with the same warm vision of family and community that made 'Moonstruck' such a joy.

Isabelle 'Izzy' Grossman (Amy Irving) is at the movie's center; bright, happy, successful, single for now and seemingly unfazed about it. The bookstore she manages is the diamond in the navel of Manhattan's literary body. The readings she programs keep her in close contact with virtually every contemporary author worth publishing.

The closest one, currently, is the Dutch-born, fully Americanized Anton Mace (Jerome Krabbe), who has a way with an across-the-room glance or a personal book inscription that would make any woman's heart stop.

Izzy may be even a touch smug about her influential job and her unretted life in an Upper West Side, rent-controlled ground-floor apartment.

However, catch her with her 'hubee' and you may forgive a lot (This singular grandmother is played

by Yiddish theater stalwart Reiz Bozyk in her first English-language role, and if Olympia Dukakis magic should strike again here, it would be entirely justified).

But when tweezing a stray whisker for her grandmother or taking her to her geriatric self-defense class — full of fearsome ladies of 70 and up absolutely panting for a crack at a purse snatcher — another Izzy emerges. This one is as solidly a part of Delancey Street's teeming Jewish community as Cher's Loretta Castorini was part of Brooklyn's solidly Italian neighborhood.

Her grandmother also sees another Izzy; unfortunately, what she sees is a beautiful young girl going absolutely to waste without a husband.

So, to Izzy's horror, her grandmother enlists Hannah the Matchmaker (Sylvia Miles) in the struggle. Enter Sam Posner (Peter Riegert), the 30-some pickle king of Delancey Street — unmarried, choosy, solidly rooted downtown but able to hold his own at one of Izzy's bookstore's late-night literary salons.

Is the Pickle Man too good to be real? Perhaps, but initially Izzy can only judge by snobbish standards just who does or does not fit in her life.

Riegert's Sam is one of the movie's anchors. It is easy to spot Krabbe's push-pull of danger-attraction for Izzy. Sam is a character about whom you have to keep revising your opinion. He will say things like 'tres hip.' On the other hand, he is also capable of the big, impulsive gesture — a quality worth its weight in gold.

Sam makes us revise what we think about Izzy as well, catching her in a condescending remark, squinting our eyes to wonder if the New York literary life is not really precious beyond belief.

What director Silver manages with this lovely screenplay that Susan Sandler has adapted from her own play is to keep the sophistication as keen as the sentiment is heartfelt.

Their view of the Manhattan single life is panoramic: the chic, slightly wistful women's faces at the Korean take-home salad bar; the horror of arty public-access-TV; the almost indulgent pleasure of a Saturday night home alone in the company of a

baseball game; the economics of single parenthood, 1980s style — if the baby is adorable enough, its modeling fees may just support mother and child.

As with her 'Chilly Scenes of Winter,' Silver is great at breathing that delicate cat's cradle of eroticism between two people right, at the brink of attraction — a state the Italians are fond of calling 'tensione.'

'Crossing Delancey' is absolutely loaded with tensione. It is also full of rice, wonderful pairs of performances, like unharried, perfect tennis doubles: Riegert and Irving, Krabbe and Irving, Irving and Bozyk, Bozyk and the outrageous Miles.

Irving seems finally to have shed little-girlhood on film to emerge as a delightfully skillful adult actress.

Movies about journalists available on videotape

Whenever I'm asked how I happened to wind up in journalism, I have to say it was because of all the newspaper movies I watched when I was a kid. Films like "30" with Jack Welch and "Deadline USA" with Humphrey Bogart.

It just so happens that these two titles are not available yet on videotape. But there are plenty of other movies featuring stories about intrepid journalists that you can rent at your local video store.

After a few of these maybe you will decide that you want to become an ink-stained wretch, too. At any rate, watching a few videos is a darn sight cheaper than going to journalism school and probably just as effective.

Here is a list of my favorites: "Foreign Correspondent" (Lightning Video 1940), "The Year of Living Dangerously" (MGM-UA 1983), "The Killing Fields" (Warner 1984), "All the President's Men" (Warner 1976), "His Girl Friday" (Lionel 1940) and

"The Harder They Fall" (RCA-Columbia 1956).

Directed by Alfred Hitchcock, "Foreign Correspondent" is a wonderful thriller starring Joel McCrea, Laraine Day and George Sanders with fine character actors like Edmund Gwenn and Eduardo Ciannelli in key supporting roles. It has a great fight scene on top of a hotel and one of the best special-effects sequences ever filmed, in which a passenger plane crashes into the sea and the water floods into the cockpit.

Peter Weir directed "The Year of Living Dangerously," a brilliant quasi-documentary about political intrigue in Indonesia starring Mel Gibson, Sigourney Weaver, Linda Hunt and Michael Murphy. You can practically smell the sweat oozing off Gibson and Weaver as they try to penetrate the mysteries of an alien culture wracked by violent change.

"The Killing Fields" is a tough, uncompromising movie about the escapades of former New York Times reporter Sydney Schanberg in Cambodia during the murderous reign of Pol Pot. Some 3 million souls were

slaughtered by the Khmer Rouge during its attempt to eradicate the Cambodian middle class and this film captures much of the violence, often to an excruciating degree. The winner of three Academy Awards, "The Killing Fields" was directed by Roland Joffe and stars Sam Waterston, Haing S. Ngor, Craig T. Nelson and John Malkovich.

"Nobody gets killed in 'All the President's Men' but President Nixon resigns anyway after he is implicated in probably the biggest scandal in U.S. history, the Watergate break-in. And who nails the president? Two Washington Post reporters named Bob Woodward and Carl Bernstein. Directed by Alan J. Pakula, it stars Robert Redford, Dustin Hoffman and Jason Roberts, who won an Oscar for his growing portrayal of Post editor Ben Bradlee.

"His Girl Friday" may be the best journalism movie ever made, if not the funniest. Directed by Howard Hawks, it stars Cary Grant, Rosalind Russell and Ralph Bellamy. They are supported by an army of

fine character actors such as Gene Lockhart, Clarence Kolb and Abner Biberman. A remake of the earlier "The Front Page" (Hollywood Home Theatre 1931), "His Girl Friday" was recently remade as "Switching Channels" (RCA-Columbia 1988). "Switching Channels" was directed by Ted Kotcheff and stars Burt Reynolds, Kathleen Turner and Christopher Reeve. The original material for all these incarnations (including a 1974 remake with Jack Lemmon and Walter Matthau) was a stage play by Ben Hecht and Charles MacArthur.

One more video worth checking out is "The Harder They Fall," a hard-boiled look at the underside of professional boxing. Directed by Mark Robson and written by Budd Schulberg, it stars Humphrey Bogart, Rod Steiger and Jay Sterling. Bogart plays a weary newspaperman-turned-publicist who discovers that he cannot turn off his conscience, even if there is a fast buck to be made. Based loosely on a true story, it pits an aging, bogey against a bunch of crooked fight promoters.

Disney finds copycat Mickeys in Soviet Union

MOSCOW (AP) — Roy Disney met Mickey Mouse in Moscow this week-end, but it was the wrong rodent.

"A bad copy," Disney said ruefully Monday, describing the costumed figure who has been enticing parents into ordering pictures of their children from a state photographer on the Arbat pedestrian mall.

Such counterfeiting is a big obstacle keeping Soviet children from enjoying the same Disney fantasies as their foreign counterparts.

A Soviet festival of Disney films is playing in Moscow but it won't expand beyond that until the counterfeiting issue is solved, said Disney, vice chairman of the company.

Disney films have not been shown in the Soviet Union since a lone appearance in a film festival 50 years ago, according to Soviet media. Yet, the company's cartoon characters are popular motifs for Soviet fashion. Unfortunately for Disney, none of the manufacturers has paid a penny

in royalties.

"We need to talk it out," Disney said. Soviet officials are aware that Disney requires protection of its intellectual property through copyrights or similar means, he added.

Disney would like to show its films, sell Mickey ears and publish its familiar books and music in the Soviet Union, he said. But Disney added that he expects no concrete deals on this visit, because the intellectual property issue must be set-

tled first.

Disney is discussing possible joint productions with the Soviet film agency, but this requires a story best filmed in the Soviet Union, Disney said.

Soviet officials said earlier they were discussing Disney involvement in building "Wonderland," a planned theme park.

In answer to a question, however, Disney said he doubted his company would ever build a Soviet version of Disneyland.

And he chose Ketchum. A native of New England and a graduate of New Hampshire's Dartmouth College, Leonardi arrived in Ketchum last year on Labor Day weekend, "almost exactly the same time the Ore Wagons were coming round the corner" on Main Street.

"I was looking for a place that had great skiing, but was near or part of

a town," Leonardi says, explaining he needs to be close to Federal Express and have access to a good telephone system to correspond with Marvel headquarters.

"Based on that, there's not that many places in the United States you can go — except Aspen, but who wants to live in Aspen?"

Although he earned an art degree from a Big Ten college, the education did not prepare him for work as a comic book penciler.

"The best training is to read comic books so you can get an idea what the business is all about and you can

see how important exaggeration and wild drama is," Leonardi says.

Working at home has its own special challenges. "It's too easy just to turn on the TV."

But, he has found watching and looking at movies helps him learn how to establish action, pacing and camera placement for the scenes.

Leonardi says he puts out an average of four pages a week and works up to 14 hours a day when deadlines loom, but those long hours are compensated by hitting the slopes to ski or jumping on his mountain bike to explore the area.

And even though the Sun Valley area has a wealth of fine artists, Leonardi says he simply does not have the time to partake in any creative arts other than his drawings.

"If I could walk into a studio space and hang things on the walls and splash paint around, maybe that would be a different story," he says.

For now, he is content to keep his pencil busy, envisioning and bringing to life the exploits of superpowered creatures from fantasy worlds far, far away.

pare for their Dec. 6 season debut (delayed because of the writers' strike), the producers now face a new dilemma: How does a TV show break the mold twice? Is it possible to be spontaneous on purpose? Can a series remain outside the mainstream after getting TV's Good Housekeeping Seal of Approval?

In short, will "thirtysomething" begin lustily to thrill itself with a capital T?

There are many ways in which the institutionalized success of a thing could be its artistic death knell," Zwick said, only half-jokingly, during a recent conversation at the show's headquarters here.

Even the word "thirtysomething" has been dragged into the American vernacular. Herskovitz cited a recent quote from Vice President George Bush: "There's a TV show that reminds me of what interest rates might be if the Democrats get in again — there will be inflation at a level which reminds me of a television show called 'thirtysomething.'"

"The idea that we have entered the currency of the political debate — that's pretty amusing," Herskovitz said.

Herskovitz and Zwick, who refer to the show's recently acquired "pati-

na of acceptance" as if it were the symptom of a fatal disease, acknowledge that success could spoil "thirtysomething" — if they let it. But they remain determined to stay true to their original goal, which was not to have one.

"Last year, the best thing that happened to us was we didn't have a template," Zwick said. "That really begins to speak to the heart of the way we want to approach this year. If we feel any obligation, it is to rededicate ourselves to trying new forms rather than trying to replicate that (first season) in some way simple because we were successful."

Zwick said that the cast and crew liked to describe the set of "thirtysomething" last year as a "laboratory" — a place for work-in-progress. "For all of us, that word was really important," he said. "That word not only carries with it the possibility of failure, but the probability of occasional failure."

Added Herskovitz: "If we made one promise to audiences, it is, ironically, that one week will differ from the next. We have to allow for failure, in some sense to invite it."

Zwick and Herskovitz fervently hope that second-year audiences, now familiar with the characters, will not get caught up in tracking plot points (such as whether the un-

happily married Nancy and Elliot will solve their problems), but instead will continue to appreciate the show as a character study.

"We're deeply interested in behavior but not as much in events," Zwick said. "We are more interested in what it (the show) is more deeply and profoundly about — the aspects of how people deal with each other."

The "thirtysomething" episode that was submitted for Emmy consideration, for example, dealt with the terminal illness of Michael's father (Ken Olin). The producers insisted that the network do nothing to advertise the story line before that show aired the first time.

"We had the opportunity" at that time to promote it as "the big show in which Michael's father gets cancer," Herskovitz said. "But we felt that that would be a mistake — because if we want each person in the audience to deeply enter Michael's feelings when he learns that his father has cancer, you can't know it before. We could have gotten a few extra ratings points out of it, but they wouldn't have experienced the show in that internal way."

The pair also believes that involving audiences in the characters' emotions requires a continuing experiment with new forms of storytelling.

Movie 'Pancho Barnes' describes life of colorful aviation pioneer

Florence "Pancho" Barnes was a former debutante who broke away from an unhappy marriage to pursue her dreams of flying. She went on to become one of the most colorful female pioneers of American aviation and earned the respect of the flyboys as a national racer, gunrunner and stunt pilot. On Tuesday, Oct. 25, Valerie Bertinelli portrays Barnes in the three-hour CBS movie "Pancho Barnes."

As a stunt pilot, Barnes battled movie maker-millionaire Howard Hughes over the poor treatment of her peers, and through her efforts, the first movie stunt pilot's association was started. During World War II, she trained young men to become pilots, and her ranch later became part of Edwards Air Force Base. Her friends included Gen. George S. Patton, humorist Will Rogers and test pilot Chuck Yeager.

It was Yeager's book, "Yeager: An Autobiography," that convinced Bertinelli that the role of Pancho Barnes was for her. "When the script for 'Pancho Barnes' was sent to me, I liked her a lot," says Bertinelli. "But I wasn't quite sure whether I could do it because I hadn't worked for some time. So I read Chuck Yeager's book, where he talked about Pancho, and I thought it was great what he said about her."

The movie also stars Ted Wass as charismatic stunt pilot Frank Clarke, whose larger-than-life presence proved irresistible to Barnes, and Sam Robards as Gene McKeandry, a loyal friend whose unspoken love for Barnes is eventually returned.

"Although I didn't know much about her at the start, what I had read about her, what I saw of her and how I perceived what she did convinced me to take the role," says Bertinelli. "Once I set my mind to it and got into the role, I began to enjoy myself. I started to relax and loved what I was doing. Pancho Barnes turned out to be a strong woman who did what she had to do."

Bertinelli, born in Wilmington, Del., starred as Barbara Cooper in the CBS series "One Day at a Time"

(1975-84). She followed that role with several TV movies and miniseries, including "The Princess and the Cabby," "Shattered Vows," "Rockabye," "Silent Witness" and "I'll Take Manhattan."

In "I'll Take Manhattan," in which she played an ambitious magazine publisher, Bertinelli's most difficult task was battling a lobster. In her role as Barnes, Bertinelli performed many of her own stunts.

"I didn't do all of my stunts, but I did a lot of them," she says. "I even came down to Texas early to practice. Every day I practiced until I got better. And sometimes, I couldn't believe some of the things I did."

"After a while, it had nothing to do with acting," she says. "It helped to build up my confidence. As I got better at riding a horse, I was doing more of the horse scenes. And going up in the air..."

"One time after I went up and came back, I said to the crew, 'Hey, I'm still alive!'"

Chris Templeton is role-model for disabled while starring on tv soap

On "The Young and the Restless," one of the most stable members of the attractive collection of schemers and dreamers is Carol Robbins, a polio victim with a leg brace. Carol is played by Chris Templeton, who is herself a polio victim.

The character of Carol can't do crazy things, like go off half-cocked and display periods of selfishness or craftiness. It just wouldn't play with Carol. So she often hovers on the fringes of the main plots, flashing that grand and cheery smile and becoming daytime TV's great role-model for the disabled.

To its credit, "The Young and the Restless" never overdid the disabled angle — Carol is shown going about her business without any emphasis on her disability. No one had to beat the drum and point. Handicapped viewers saw that, through Carol, they were included in the world of soaps.

In all honesty, however, the writers didn't exactly know what to do with the character of Carol Robbins. Last spring and summer, during the writers' strike, the plot turned to her disability. Since the regular writers weren't around, Chris Templeton was allowed to change Carol's lines and bring some insight into the life of a disabled person. When the strike ended, so did the disability angle.

Now Carol (Chris) has the spotlight again. She's about to marry photographer Skip Evans (played by Todd Curtis).

Graced with a lovely face and considerable zest, Chris has a slight limp, the result of a bout with polio as a baby. Chris is a TV soap pioneer of sorts for the disabled. For 10 years, she and the Media Access office have been plugging away trying to get the industry to include more disabled performers on screen as well as behind the cameras.

Although it's been a long and often discouraging road, the awareness has multiplied — and reached the point where a number of handicapped actors are getting jobs. Of course, there's still a long way to go.

Chris also works for the Fulfillment Foundation, a place where disabled kids and their parents learn to take pride in themselves and to learn skills instead of pulling back in self pity.

Chris realizes that a big part of her job as an actress is to be a visual example as well as a spokesperson. But there are times when she tires of talking only about her disability. Chris feels there are other sides to her, and other sides to life. She laughs when she says, "Thank God, we're all different."

Chris is a little bothered by the letters she receives from handicapped people asking advice on how to become an actor. Chris doesn't believe in lying and giving blind encouragement, so she tries to be as diplomatic as possible. But she has shown that it can be done. Best of all, she's on view in an afternoon soap for all to see.

Pauley settles in for long haul after 12 years on 'Today'

NEW YORK (AP) — Jane Pauley would like to put in her two cents' worth on the continuing feud between her "Today" show co-host Bryant Gumbel and "Late Night" host David Letterman.

The squabbling began three years ago when Letterman shouted out the window of 30 Rockefeller Center with a megaphone, interrupting an interview during a prime-time "Today" special.

Gumbel expressed outrage that Letterman would pull such a stunt. Letterman countered that he was invited to pull such a stunt by the then-executive producer of "Today," Steve Friedman. Letterman made Gumbel the butt of jokes on "Late Night." Gumbel huffily demanded apologies. More jokes. More huff.

Pauley complains that no one has ever asked her about the incident, when in fact it was she who was interviewing Don Johnson and Phillip Michael Thomas of "Miami Vice" when it occurred. Gumbel wasn't even involved.

"If anybody should have been mad at Letterman, it was ME," she said. "But I always have been — while I am devoted to Steve Friedman, Steve was the one who should have said, 'Hey, it was my idea.' He invited Letterman to do a stunt.

"His (Friedman's) idea was that it would be spontaneous, and it would make a great prime-time show. It would make an event that we would have to react to, and he was willing to take the chance. He was willing to risk me and Bryant humiliating ourselves, because we were not informed. If Bryant was angry with anybody, and he had a right to be, it was with the producers who were just going to let us sink or swim.

"So the beef he had with Letterman initially was fairly innocuous, I suppose. But then it's back and forth, Letterman on the air just made it worse," Pauley said. "Now it's a full-out blood feud.

"Bryant understands that I don't have to hate Dave Letterman. He does. I think that's probably fair to say. I don't know, maybe he doesn't use the word 'hate.' But it's fairly strong whatever he feels. And I'm sure Dave feels it, too. But Bryant does accept the fact that I can continue to like David Letterman, and we're cool."

All right, now that that's settled, back to the original purpose of the interview with Pauley, her 12th anniversary this month as co-host of "Today."

Speaking of Gumbel, Pauley spent the summer presuming, along with most everybody else, that her partner of six years was not returning to "Today" after his stint anchoring the prime-time Summer Olympics coverage from Seoul.

Pauley says she was "raised to expect the worst and prepare for the worst," so she thought Gumbel was gone.

"Nobody came and held my hand and said, 'Jane, it's looking grim for Bryant.' My sources of information were only what I saw and read, and

what seemed to be kind of long faces around here when the subject came up. So I went ahead — and I told Bryant this when we were in New Orleans (for the Republican convention) — that I had made peace with the fact that he was gone. I really had. I was really unhappy with the idea. And I was surprised and thrilled when he signed on again."

Gumbel has signed a new three-year contract. Pauley has four years left on her contract, but she isn't thinking of leaving.

"I intend to be here forever," she said. "I have a life-long lease here in this office. I reserve the right to re-evaluate that position on a regular basis, but for now, what would I want to change?"

"I am not interested in changing, just for the sake of changing," she said. "Besides, I don't see anybody in television with a better job than I have. There are a number of people, I was going to say many, but a number might be more appropriate, who are paid better than I am, more money, but it's a little foolish for me to — even that rings a little hollow."

World Series gives NBC winning week

NEW YORK (AP) — It was a battle of baseball games last week in the Nielsen; and even though it was an all-West Coast World Series, game two on NBC bested the final National League playoff on ABC and helped NBC to the win.

NBC, which suffered disappointing ratings for its Summer Olympics coverage, could have another disappointment with later games in the series if they don't capture the attention of both coasts. It would be better to have an East Coast team playing a West Coast team.

But the rating for game two, 22.9 with a 36 share, was up 5 percent over the rating for last year's game two in

the series between Minnesota and St. Louis. Game one of the world series and game six of the National League playoff also made the top 10.

"The Cosby Show" on NBC had a rating of 23.1 and a 38 share, lagging below its performances in previous years, but good enough for No. 1.

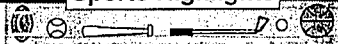

Senate passes curb of ads during kid's shows

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate sent to President Reagan on Wednesday a bill aimed at improving children's television by reimposing time limits on advertising during children's shows and requiring stations to carry an unspecified amount of informative programming.

The Senate approved the measure on a voice vote. The House had passed it June 8 on a vote of 328-78. At that time, the administration said the measure was "inappropriate, ill-advised and inimical to the spirit of the First Amendment," which guarantees free speech.

The bill would reimpose advertising limits abandoned by the Federal Communications Commission four years ago. The FCC had said commercials would be best regulated by the open marketplace.

Children's TV advocates who pressed for the bill said the FCC's philosophy of deregulation was harming children. They said that since 1984,

stations have increased advertising during children's shows and the quality of children's programming has deteriorated as toy manufacturers have become heavily involved in developing shows based on their products.

The bill would limit commercials in children's programs to 10½ minutes per hour on weekends and 12 minutes per hour on weekdays. Stations would have until Jan. 1, 1990, to comply with the advertising limits. The FCC would be authorized to modify the time standards after Jan. 1, 1993.

The measure also would require stations to "serve the educational and informational needs of children" in its overall programming and would require the FCC to evaluate those efforts every five years when a station applies for renewal of its license.

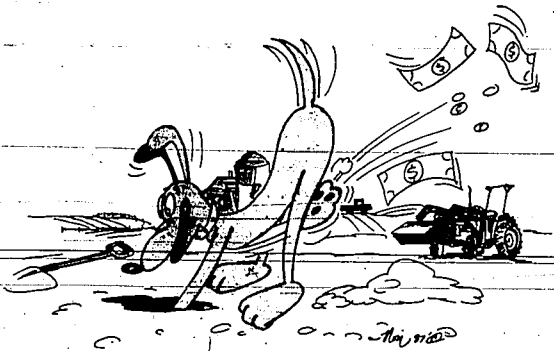

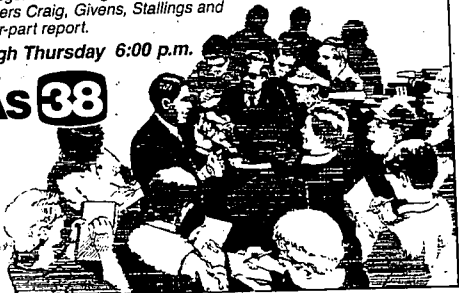

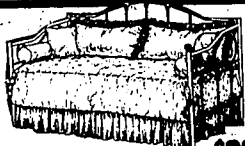

Jerry Lewis to guest star on 'Wiseguy'

NEW YORK (AP) - Jerry Lewis will play a clothing manufacturer who gets caught up in a crime scandal in the garment district in CBS' "Wiseguy" this season, executive producer Stephen J. Cannell said Monday.

That wasn't the only unusual bit of casting news Cannell had for reporters at a CBS news conference. The first villain of the season, a charismatic leader of a white supremacist sect, will be played by Tennessee attorney Fred Dalton Thompson, best known for his 1970s television appearances as real-life minority counsel on the Watergate Committee.

Thompson made his film debut in the movie "Marie," starring Sissy Spacek. Thompson played himself, the attorney for Marie Raghianti, the parole board chairwoman who blew the whistle on a pardons-for-money scheme. Dalton was later cast as the head of the CIA in the movie "No Way Out."

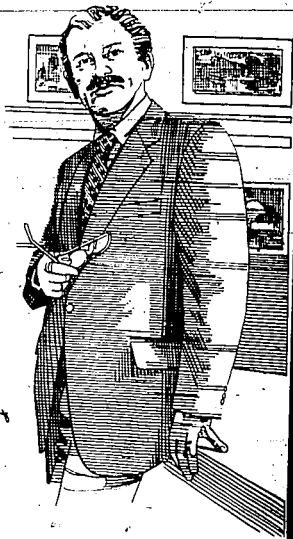
Thompson will star in a four-episode storyline. Lewis will guest star in the next set of episodes.

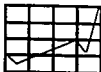
