

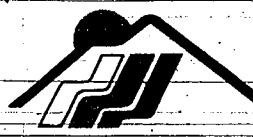

Dukakis pins hopes on 'second look' by voters

Michael Dukakis asserted Thursday that voters by the millions are giving his underdog campaign "a very strong second look" in the waning days of the race for the White House.
George Bush said Democrats were "grossly unfair" to say his advertising is tinged with racism.
"You're looking at a man who was out front for civil rights and I will be again," the vice president said in a network television interview. He defended running mate Dan Quayle on the same score and said any political wounds would heal quickly after the election.
Dukakis combined an attack on the Reagan-Bush administration's record on drugs with ritual declarations that the political tide was turning in his favor. "His administration has cut deals with foreign drug runners. I'm

Soviets' favorite can't run for 3rd term

MOSCOW — The Soviets have a clear favorite in next week's U.S. presidential election.
Unfortunately for them, his name is Ronald Reagan, and the Constitution won't let him run again.
As George Bush and Michael Dukakis make their last campaign swings before Tuesday's election, Soviets are waxing nostalgic about the outgoing eight-year tenant in the White House who once called their country an "evil empire" and joked about bombing it into oblivion.
They are also looking ahead to a Bush victory, although without apparent relish.
"To be quite frank, I can't say I've personally been carried away by the statements of either Bush or Dukakis when they spoke of Soviet-American relations," Nikolai V.

Shishin, a spokesman for the Communist Party Central Committee, told a news briefing Thursday. "I think it's President Reagan who gave the best statement a few days ago."
Reagan, once caricatured by the party daily Pravda as a missile-toting cowboy, now is portrayed as a reliable bargaining partner who sat down with President Mikhail S. Gorbachev and negotiated a nuclear missile treaty.
The public opinion polls in the White House campaign continued to provide encouragement for Bush.
Dukakis was trying desperately to reverse

poll deficits in several large Electoral College battlegrounds at once. He ventured unexpectedly into New Jersey, crooning a la Bruce Springsteen, "I was born to run and born to win." But Bush, Reggan, Quayle, and Co. were pouring it on in Ohio, where private polls continued to show a solid Republican edge.
ABC said its survey of North Carolina — once Dukakis' strongest hope for a Southern success — gave the vice president an 11-point edge. Dukakis held a four-point margin in a New York survey.
Bush and Dukakis were spending millions on campaign-closing television and radio commercials, and both the Democratic and Republican parties previewed a spate of advertisements designed to maximize party support.
Dukakis is also ad featuring one of the most memorable television moments of the

Snow dusts higher peaks as rain falls

TWIN FALLS — Umbrella sales are up. Lunchtime recess got cut short. And there's snow in the hills — nine to 10 inches near Galena Summit, according to U.S. Forest Service reports.
"Most high peaks probably got a good dusting of snow," said Larry Holt, of the Boise National Weather Service office.
Four to five inches of snow fell on the top of Mount Baldy Thursday, according to the Forest Service, with one to two inches falling just north of Ketchum as rains dampened the lower elevations for the second day in a row.
Holt said the rain and snow are due to a frontal system that's causing a series of air disturbances, producing precipitation across the state.
General Forecaster Orville Robertson, however, said much more rain will be needed before it affects the drought.
No runoff will be seen as a result of the rains, said Holt, because the soil is so dry. But having the rain before the snow will help keep snow on the ground by providing a solid, frozen base, he added.
A Forest Service weather station in the South Hills reported .55 inch of rain by Thursday evening, while the National Weather Service's office near Kimberly measured .43 inch falling between midday Wednesday and midday Thursday.
Some Twin Falls schools called pupils in early from recess as the weather conditions worsened in the middle of the day, and department stores reported that quite a few umbrellas crossed their counters.
Rain-drenched leaves fell from trees; paving roads with their fall colors. And there were more

Oxygen-starved bacteria gobble PCBs

WASHINGTON — Oxygen-starved bacteria working in sediment beneath the Hudson River are transforming toxic PCB compounds into less dangerous forms, raising hopes of a significant easing of a major PCB cleanup problem nationwide, researchers said Thursday.
"The resulting types of PCBs do not accumulate in living tissue, a government scientist said.
"The researchers from Michigan State University said their results with anaerobic or oxygen-free bacteria could mean that not every contaminated sediment would have to be cleaned up, and cleanups that do proceed might be much less risky than people have assumed.

"If it is true, it could have enormous significance," said Richard D. Morgenstern, head of the Office of Policy Analysis in the Environmental Protection Agency.
Sally Valdiz Cogliani, an EPA ecologist and sediment specialist, said the discovery showed promise, but she was more restrained than Morgenstern. "Probably most situations are not anaerobic. I'd wonder about its general applicability," she said.
PCBs are a common toxic waste problem. In some of the better-known cases, they have contaminated harbor sediments at New Bedford, Mass., and Waukegan, Ill.
Millions of pounds of PCBs were used from 1929 to 1977. The nation's utilities are faced with the task of draining them from transformers by the early 1990s.

Swift action by FERC on Milner Dam rehabilitation wins Stallings' thanks

TWIN FALLS — Rep. Richard Stallings, D-Idaho, thanked the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission Wednesday for swift action on a proposed rehabilitation of Milner Dam.
"In view of the high risk of dam failure and the economic significance of the Milner project to the region, it is imperative that the Commission take action on the license

application prior to completion of the final environmental impact statement," Stallings said. The 2nd District congressman made the comments at a meeting on additional environmental assessment of four proposed local Snake River projects.
Recent safety studies indicate that the 65-year-old dam is vulnerable to damage from an earthquake. Local canyon companies have been trying since 1981 to get a permit to build a hydroelectric generating plant at the

dam to help pay for the needed dam rehabilitation.
"I share the grave concerns of Idaho water users and state officials that have been raised about the dam's safety and the devastating impact a failure would have on the irrigation systems below the dam that serve the farm-based economy in the region," Stallings said. "It is a risk Idaho cannot afford to take."

USDA wants to focus inspections on problem packing plants

WASHINGTON — The Agriculture Department proposed Thursday to reduce inspections of meat and poultry processing plants with consistently good health records in order to concentrate on problem plants.
Under the new program, which could begin as early as next May, the department also plans to cut its inspection force in half from 2,200 to 1,100 over four years, for annual savings estimated at \$27 million.
Rather than send inspectors to every plant

with the same frequency, as now occurs, the department plans to rely on a plant's quality control records and inspectors' unannounced visits to determine the frequency of future visits.
"The proposed changes would strengthen the (Agriculture Department's) inspection in the 6,300 plants that process meat and poultry by focusing inspection efforts where they are needed most," said Lester Crawford, administrator of the department's Food Safety and Inspection Service.
But critics were skeptical that meat plants

can be trusted to operate under the honor system, citing as an example the \$4.3 million fine levied by the Labor Department against meatpacker John Morrell & Co. last week for multiple workplace safety violations and large fines against IBP Inc., a meatpacker accused of not reporting employee injuries.
Thomas Devine of the Government Accountability Project, an organization that has aided dissident federal meat inspectors, said, "The thrust of the new program is to

switch from inspectors looking at food to inspectors looking at paperwork. But what happens if the industry takes advantage of the new honor system?"
Crawford said a plant's records are reliable indicators of its compliance with health standards and that the department has new legal authority to crack down more effectively against problem plants.
"The new program will not affect the continuous inspection of slaughtering plants, which kill about 120 million head of livestock and 4.8 billion birds each year.
Experts say statistical sampling and scientific tests, rather than traditional visual inspection, are necessary to detect modern hazards such as microbiological and chemical contamination.
Given the sophistication of the plants' own quality-control systems and technology needed to detect problems, the National Academy of Sciences recommended in 1985 that the department target problem plants. Congress gave the agency authority to make the change in 1986.

Idaho wilderness bill

McClure sees no compromise

BOISE (AP) — Sen. James McClure, R-Idaho, said there is no indication opponents to an Idaho wilderness bill he developed last year with Democrat Gov. Cecil Andrus are willing to compromise to keep the plan alive.

He agreed Thursday with Andrus' assessment that it would be futile to continue working for congressional approval of legislation doomed by opponents' intransigence.

"We're not just going to keep on trying indefinitely to pass something that has no political support," McClure told reporters in Boise.

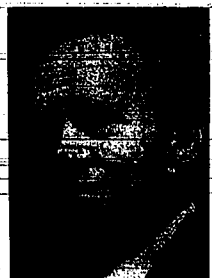
Andrus said Tuesday that he hoped there was life left in the wilderness plan, but that he would not "waste my time" fighting for a

bill that is "dead on arrival" at the next Congress.

However, McClure said he still intends to reintroduce the wilderness bill when Congress reconvenes in January. It got a late start in the 100th Congress and died without action amid opposition even from within the Idaho delegation.

Rep. Larry Craig, R-Idaho, said Wednesday night during a debate with 1st District Democrat challenger Jeanne Givena that "There would have to be some changes before Idahoans ... can support that bill."

McClure said he had discussed the issue with Craig and would welcome his amendments. "He may win some, he may lose some," the senator said.

PUC cuts in-state long-distance rates

BOISE (AP) — In a delayed announcement, the Public Utilities Commission has cut the charge on in-state long-distance calls that partially subsidizes high-cost rural telephone service.

The 20 percent reduction in the per-minute charge, effective Tuesday, was authorized after the commission determined the so-called Universal Service Fund did not need as much money as originally thought.

The commission approved the reduction on Monday but released the information by mail, delaying the announcement two days.

The charge, originally set at a half-cent a minute, was cut to four-tenths of a cent.

Unchanged were the three-cent-a-month charge on residential service bills and the seven-cent-a-month charge for business service.

AT&T and MCI long-distance ser-

vice companies petitioned the commission to reconsider the in-state long-distance charge, maintaining the original fund budget of \$1.8 million was more than necessary.

"A review of the funding authorized to date and the applications for distributions currently on file with the commission leads us to conclude that the original funding target can be reduced some without impairing the ability of the fund to meet its present or future obligations," the commission said.

The fund was created to replace a pool financed by all the telephone companies operating in the state. That pool was used to keep rural telephone rates at affordable levels so participation in the statewide telephone system could be maintained at a high level.

In connection with operation of the new fund, the commission has or-

dered seven private communication companies buying access to local telephone exchanges to file their plans to comply with the state's new telephone deregulation law.

That law requires those companies to pay regulatory fees, furnish their price lists and collect and remit Universal Service Fund surcharges.

Board wants surplus used for prison

BOISE (AP) — A state board wants the Legislature to make the first bond payment of \$2.3 million for the new state prison out of an expected surplus in the budget.

The Permanent Building Fund Council on Thursday voted to ask the next Legislature to make a supplemental appropriation for the first payment on the maximum security prison now under construction.

That motion, approved at a council meeting at the Statehouse, would sidestep at least temporarily the tougher question of whether the state should get deeper into bond debt to finance construction or if it should continue with attempts at pay-as-you-go financing.

This year state agencies want \$55 million in new construction. The Permanent Building Fund has \$11.7 million. The Division of Public Works operating budget, \$978,400; \$4.7 million for preventive maintenance and \$1.2 million for asbestos abatement leaves only \$4.7 million for new construction.

The Board of Education has proposed a nine-project, six-school list of \$42 million worth of construction to be financed by long-term bonds. Bond payments would take \$4.4 million per year.

The council already is paying \$1.1 million per year for bonds covering a major renovation of the state school for the Deaf and Blind at Coalinga. If the Permanent Building Fund is

Prison to increase funds for security

BOISE (AP) — The Department of Corrections will spend \$44,000 to beef up security at the riot-damaged Cellblock 9 at the Idaho State Penitentiary. Corrections Director Al Murphy called it "buying time" for guards in the case of inmate disturbances.

"It's a \$29,000 psychological barrier and buying some time," he told the Permanent Building Fund Council on Thursday. The board approved spending \$29,000 from contingency funds for \$44,000 worth of improvements, with \$16,000 credit for materials already on hand.

Inmates rioted at the close custody Cellblock 9 on Sept. 25. Guards were forced to flee through an escape hatch and before correctional officers regained control more than three hours later, inmates heavily damaged the building.

used to cover bond payments, there will be nothing for year-to-year construction, members said.

Board Chairman Bob Peyton, Pocatello, said, "It isn't up to the Permanent Building Fund Council to

commit the state to 20 years of bond payments. It is up to the Legislature."

"The Permanent Building Fund is the only pork barrel the Legislature has," said Rep. Kathleen Gurnsey-Roise, board member and also co-chairman of the Legislature's budget committee. She indicated the Legislature might not be willing to give up all control over discretionary spending.

If the Legislature could predict the future, it might be easier to make construction decisions, Mrs. Gurnsey said. "If we have inflation, we would be smart to go out and build buildings and retire the (bond) debt," she said. "There is a demonstrated need."

But she said she did not believe the state should expect to pay for the prison bonds out of general revenue, and the payments should come from the Permanent Building Fund.

On the council's recommended list for construction next year is \$2.6 million to help pay for a new library at Lewis-Clark State College. Other priority items are \$500,000 for improvements to the statewide public broadcast network; \$150,000 for the Department of Lands to buy a McCall site; \$41,000 for a Parks and Recreation office addition at Boise; \$35,000 for Department of Administration communication improvements; and \$258,000 for a new Department of Lands office at Kamiah.

Mountain River Hospital is up for sale again

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Mountain River Hospital in Idaho Falls is for sale again.

The private psychiatric center has seen a whirlwind of management changes since it opened in June 1986. It has had three different owners, a half-dozen administrators and a high rate of employee turnover.

The current owner, Hospital Corp. of America, is negotiating to sell the hospital to HealthTrust, which owns 51 percent of Eastern Idaho Regional Medical Center in Idaho Falls, said David Beardsley, interim administrator.

HealthTrust is a company formed by ex-HCA employees.

Despite the changes, Beardsley said the hospital is fulfilling its mission to the community and has expanded staff and services. Mountain River offers inpatient short-term psychiatric and chemical dependency care.

Beardsley acknowledged that the ownership changes have been stressful for employees because they are uncertain of job security.

Council votes to upgrade firing range

BOISE (AP) — A citizens' advisory council has voted to support the Idaho Army National Guard's proposal to upgrade its firing range in the Snake River Birds of Prey Area.

But one member of the panel that helps guide the Bureau of Land Management's Boise District wants a lot more information about the environmental impact before the tanks roll in.

"The council voted 7 to 1 Wednesday to approve the Guard's right-of-way application."

Brian Shafer, the lone dissenter, said studies should be performed before the Guard expands its operations, or at least a firm commitment should be obtained from Congress that the funds will be delivered.

"As we found out in our tour (Tuesday), there's a very serious lack of knowledge as to what's happening out there," said council member Andy Anderson of Boise.

The BLM has tentatively planned studies at a cost of about \$2.6 million.

Jane Leeson, spokeswoman for the Wilderness Society in Boise, said she and other environmentalists may sue BLM to block progress on the right-of-way application if the agency fails to demand the study funding.

Lottery amendment fraught with loopholes

For the second time, Idahoans will go to the polls Tuesday to decide whether the state should sponsor a lottery.

Our opposition to the proposal is stronger today than then; recent revelations about the potential enormous legal loopholes in the proposed amendment, as well as developing problems in other states convince us further that Idaho should not join the list of lottery states.

Indeed, there is a growing list of states which now wish they had not gotten into a business which is fraught with problems, outright corruption and a host of negative social consequences.

To us, there are several compelling reasons why the proposal on the Nov. 8 ballot should be defeated. Here are three:

—Casino, Indian reservation and "charitable" gambling. The lottery amendment is poorly drafted. Competent legal authorities think it would allow forms of gambling well beyond the simple lottery which the Legislature intended.

—Funding levels. Idaho has too small a population for a sustained lottery; it will not generate enough revenue to do the state any good, and by taking money out of the normal purchasing stream, it will actually lower state income receipts on which our education system depends.

—Social costs. Excessive gambling is a social disease, with social consequences, just as are alcoholism and drug abuse. A broad gambling system in Idaho will cost us all deeply, in lost wages, poor productivity, dysfunctional families and lost human potential.

We think many Idahoans acknowledge these and other points, but we also doubt the issue will turn on them directly. Idahoans seem fixed in their divisions on the subject. We might characterize the two groups as follows:

On the pro-lottery side are many western and northern Idahoans who have had more contact with lottery games in Washington and Oregon; a lobby of game manufacturers and agencies which hope to profit from the Idaho game if it is established; and a sizable number of libertarians who simply don't want the state to have any say over what they see as an essentially private issue.

The pro-lottery forces also seem to include a fair number of people who are against any perceived involvement by organized religions in public life. To some, this is a morality and religion issue, in which the Mormon Church and other faiths have lined up against the lottery and whose members are providing much of the funding to defeat it. To some on the pro-side, that is reason enough to vote yes.

It is undoubtedly true that the anti-lottery forces have some strong support from among religious groups. We do not find that, in itself, objectionable.

But on the same side of the issue are a large group of the

state's political leaders, including many moderate Republicans, many of the state's major newspapers, a fair number of state educators who know the lottery will not result in any educational windfall; and probably some nearby gambling interests which presumably think they would be hurt by the competition a lottery might bring.

Some of these divisions have been with the state since territorial days, but as with other broad social questions, the issue has brought together parties who are not normally comrades.

To us, that reflects the strength of the arguments against the lottery proposal. We have listened to the arguments, pro and con, for several years now. We remain convinced that the proposal on the Nov. 8 ballot is one which should be defeated.

Stallings votes 'right' for 2nd district

Four years ago, when Richard Stallings pulled out a "landslide" victory over convicted felon George Hansen, many of the Hansen Hard Core mumbled that the affable Democrat and college professor from Rexburg wouldn't see a second term.

Today, Stallings seems headed to a convincing victory for his third term again as inept a Republican opponent as he has yet to face.

Republican Dane Watkins has flailed at Stallings all fall, but on point after point, he has been either confused or simply wrong.

Watkins has repeatedly taken a narrow and even mean-spirited role in the race and has driven away many responsible members of his own party.

This is not to say Stallings could not have been effectively challenged. Despite a trend in American politics which gives enormous advantages to the incumbent, Stallings is still a Democrat in a highly-conservative Republican district.

What's more, he has been a pretty consistent Democrat at that, particularly on national issues. Like many in Congress, he tends to be on the Speaker of the House' side when the routine votes are counted.

This drift to left is something Stallings will have to be conscious of in the term ahead. Idahoans don't particularly mind their Democrats to play a little liberal politics, but if it gets to be a habit, watch out, Richard.

Stallings is aware of the vulnerability and it has made him a stickler—when it comes to maintaining good contacts in the sprawling Second Congressional District.

He has developed a reputation for being effective and efficient on constituent relations.

And when it comes to issues of importance in the region, he is careful to vote "right." He has been a strong supporter of farm programs, and has helped on issues like the Swan Falls water issue, the Hagerman-Fossil-Beds, and on the Idaho-National Engineering Laboratory, although he has not been the "cheerleader" Watkins wants to be.

This year, we find little to fault Stallings on beyond what we think is his too-close association with the national Democratic Party.

On balance, we think Stallings has performed well, if not perfectly. He is light-years beyond Hansen and Watkins in terms of knowledge and district responsiveness.

We think he deserves re-election to a third term.

Ron Black has earned another term in Boise

In 1986, Ron Black, then a Twin Falls daycare center-owner, challenged incumbent Donna Scott for Republican nomination for one of Twin Falls County's House seats.

He defeated her decisively by a campaign which emphasized his more moderate positions in education funding and economic development.

In his first term, Black voted as he said he would. He supported expanded funding for schools and for the Department of Commerce.

That is reason enough, in our view, to return him to Boise for another term. But Black has other strengths as well. He has shown himself to be a responsive listener to his constituents—he participates actively on public issues.

That is not to say he is perfect. He can sometimes get too close to a subject in which he has a direct interest, as when he came to his son's defense over a skateboard ramp in Twin Falls, and when he attacked Idaho State University for its course offerings in the Magic Valley.

In both instances, he was probably correct on the issue, but his personal involvement hurt his effectiveness in both instances.

Black's opponent is Democrat Sally Gulick, a barber and farmer, who ran for the Legislature in 1986. This time, Gulick has attacked Black in personal terms, criticizing him for attempting to find work in middle management. That attack seems unfair to us.

In our view, Black has done a reasonably competent job in his first term and deserves another stint in Boise.

(4) That all but the most vital paper work be eliminated. Abolishing the useless paper work would make it feasible for one superintendent to manage seven or eight schools. This, in itself would be a tremendous saving with greater efficiency.
We have many fine teachers in both our local and State educational systems. The reason the children are being short changed is due, in part, to the presence of tenure.

Tenure in any private business is almost a certain guarantee of inefficiency, waste or bankruptcy.
Tenure is not unlike a farmer who hires up a fine race horse to a balky jackass. Attitude may be accomplished, but very little. We should permit our fine teachers to start to the upper limits of their ability and not be shackled by a shirker and drag through the mire of apathy. Do as my group of the top corporations in this world do. Pay on performance. When this is accomplished, the finished product will be something we all will be proud of.
We must have action and soon, lest the albatross consumes the golden goose.

U.S. security to George Bush is running up the deficit

In a radio talk, I discussed our nation's economy and security with Idaho Sen. Steve Symms. Senator Symms used the labels conservative and liberal freely.
Everyday Vice-President Bush repeats how he is the nation's security. Bush's "conservative" position ensures America's future, while "liberal" Michael Dukakis would destroy our security.
On Oct. 26, in United States "conservative" Senator, Steve Symms, participated in a radio talk show. John Sandy will promote interests of Idahoans in Boise

It seems rather ironic that almost 6 months after the Governor's veto of Water Quality legislation (House Bill 652) that a negotiated settlement between the resource industries and the Environmental community has been signed. H.B. 652 dealt with controlling the sedimentation pollution (anti-degradation) in our rivers and streams by using the best management practices for timber, agriculture, and mining.
The resource industries have been for some time using best management practices and H.B. 652 seemed to be the most logical and practical method of controlling sedimentation

pollution within Idaho. H.B. 652 would have: 1) provided identification of proposed site-specific water quality impacts; 2) opportunity for the public review processes; and 3) documentation that lowering water quality is necessary to accommodate reasonable development in the area in which the specific waters are located.
H.B. 652 would have proved for annual reviews of new resource activities (on State and Federal land. If a BMP (best management practices) needed to be changed in the timber

industry it would go through the Land Board, an Ag BMP would go through the Soil Conservation Service, and a mining BMP would go through the Land Board and Federal mining regulations. Also, the legislation would have provided more funding for water monitoring across the state.
Yet, the environmental community, both in-state and out-of-state interest felt that House Bill 652 did not protect Idaho's streams and rivers for fisheries habitat. They urged the governor to veto H.B. 652 and for him and his staff to come up with another method which would satisfy their

concerns.
The September agreement between the resource industries and the environmental community basically calls for three things: 1) The use of best management practices for controlling degradation of Idaho's streams and rivers; 2) Biennial reviews of the six river basins on resource activities would be held on new activities done in the state; 3) an extensive water monitoring program to be funded by the state legislature. The most important change between the negotiated settlement and H.B. 652 is that if there is a dispute on BMP's, their Governor's Office will rule on the

best BMP's which should have preference in a new activity.
The new agreement actually provides less protection of Idaho's water quality than H.B. 652. State, Federal and private ownership of lands would only have to follow voluntary suggestions made by the environmental community. It seems rather ironic that the Governor and the environmental groups signed the agreement when the protection afforded is less than what the Legislature provided. The Governor and the 14 Democratic Senators, including Governor Peavey, who supported the Governor's veto should be explaining why they are not protecting Idaho's water quality? It also brings to mind why the environmental community went along with the agreement when they were so much against H.B. 652 and Best Management Practices?
I urge the voters of District 22 to take a hard look at John Sandy. John will fight for your interests in Boise and will not be a puppet of Governor Andrus.

I am especially concerned about this because most lottery tickets are sold in grocery stores.

From the grocer's perspective, the real lottery losers aren't people whose numbers don't pay off. The real losers are the wives and children who need the healthy food lottery ticket money could have purchased. I would

much rather see parents buy a sack of Idaho apples or potatoes to feed themselves and the kids than to spend limited resources on a million-to-one shot at pie in the sky.

Several supermarket chains in California and Florida have stopped selling lottery tickets. They don't want to be part of the cycle of despair that deprives families of the nutrition they need and that forces them to turn to the government when the cupboard is bare. I don't want to be part of that cycle either, and that's why I'm voting NO on HJR-3.

In California state aid to public schools has actually decreased since the lottery

Bush gains with men by his portrayal of 'soft' campaign rival



Michael Dukakis may be a victim of macho issue appeal

Import car dealers back Stallings, Hecht, Wallop

WASHINGTON (AP) — An import car dealers group is pouring more than \$1 million into four Republican Senate races in the final weeks of the campaign, and Democrats complained Thursday that in one case the spending is illegal.

The Auto Dealers and Drivers Free Trade political action committee, based in Jamaica, N.Y., is making heavy independent investments for ads in the re-election bids of Sens. Chic Hecht in Nevada and Malcolm Wallop in Wyoming, and is backing GOP candidates in open seats in Florida and Mississippi, according to documents filed with the Federal Election Commission.

Frank Glacken, the PAC's executive director, said the group also is supporting two House Democratic re-election bids — \$45,000 for Rep. Richard Stallings of Idaho and \$85,000 for Rep. David Skaggs of Colorado.

money is buying a last-minute blitz of television advertising that includes positive spots for Hecht and an attack on Bryan. The group also paid for a 630,000-piece mass mailing for Hecht in the past week.

\$84,800 to support Wallop's re-election bid in Wyoming, including positive TV spots that began on Tuesday and a 150,000-piece mass mailing.

Bob Chlopak, executive director of the Democratic Senatorial Campaign Committee, called it the biggest effort by a single group to influence Senate elections since 1992, when NCPAC — the National Conservative Political Action Committee — spent \$1 million against six Democratic incumbents.

Their last-minute communications blitz is sufficient to be decisive, Chlopak said at a news conference.

Such interest groups are limited by law to giving \$5,000 directly to a candidate in each primary or general election. But there is no ceiling for independent expenditures — those made on a candidate's behalf without coordination or consultation.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Polls indicate men like George Bush better than Michael Dukakis, a gender gap that analysts say Bush has successfully reinforced by depicting the Democrat as soft on crime and defense.

Much has been made of the other gender gap — the one that finds women favoring Democrats over Republican presidential candidates — but polling data also shows that men have a distinct set of standards by which they measure the two candidates.

Houston-based Republican pollster Lance Tarrance said Bush struck a chord among male voters with television advertisements that attacked Dukakis.

"Men tend to be far more concerned with preserving the status quo. Men also can be appealed to on so-called macho issues, such things as national defense and the crime issues," Tarrance said.

The attacks seem to have driven home with male voters, because "They make a stronger decision on who they don't want ... women make a stronger decision of who they do want," Tarrance said.

He said men also were suspicious of Dukakis because they sensed "there was more to Dukakis than he was letting us know," and they did not know what that something was. In addition, Bush tapped into a male penchant for a more structured analysis of things that made them lean away from what they saw as a lack of national experience on the part of Dukakis.

"Experience really counts strongly with men," Tarrance said.

The very fact that Bush put Dukakis on the defensive for weeks and thus was able to set the agenda for the campaign gave him status as a strong leader, a factor which also attracted men, said Ethel Klein, associate professor of political science at Columbia University.

"Men really don't think he's strong," she said of Dukakis. "Every time Michael Dukakis has had a chance to define himself, he's let Bush define him." She cited Dukakis' now-famous tank ride, following a drumbeat of soft-on-defense attacks from Bush.

Klein said Bush "put the Democrats in a me-too position. He's been on the offensive all along," and that was a strong message that men liked.

In recent polls both men and women favor Bush over Dukakis, but the margin for men is greater.

The latest ABC News-Washington Post poll showed Bush preferred by 56 percent of men, 40 percent of women. The most recent CBS News-New York Times survey put Bush's advantage among men at 56-39.

Pollster Louis Harris said men seem to be drawn to Bush in large part because he is the only alternative to Dukakis, whom Bush has succeeded in portraying negatively.

"What Bush did was to make it reactive against Dukakis, because Bush doesn't have the same inspirational qualities that Ronald Reagan has. Reagan was able to inspire men. Now men are able to react against Dukakis," said Harris.

Political analyst William Schneider, however, contended that the male penchant for Bush is really just

a reflection of a pattern that has emerged for several years now.

"It has to do with the image of the parties," and the role of government in people's lives, he said.

"Women support a protective government," identified with the

Democrats, while men agree more with the Republican push to shrink government, he said.

"It has very little to do with Bush and Dukakis and a great deal to do with the direction the parties have moved in."

Ruling due in language case

MIAMI (AP) — Federal appellate judges heard arguments Thursday on whether a ballot initiative aimed at making English Florida's official language violates federal voting rights law because petitions were not circulated in Spanish.

The three-judge panel, which took the case on an expedited basis, is expected to rule before Tuesday's vote on the state constitutional amendment.

On Wednesday, the Justice Department joined opponents of the initiative, filing a legal brief in support of their efforts to block Amendment 11. Justice Department spokesman

Mark R. Weaver said it is the first official English measure in which the department has intervened.

The federal brief called the petitions an integral part of the electoral process and therefore covered by the Voting Rights Act, which requires they be circulated in Spanish in Florida's six heavily Hispanic counties.

Shultz to attend opening of OAS

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of State George P. Shultz will attend the opening session of the annual Organization of American States foreign-ministers meeting Nov. 14 in El Salvador, the State Department announced Thursday.

Spokesman Charles Redman said Shultz will address the meeting and will meet informally with other foreign ministers. He will fly to El Salvador and return to Washington on the same day.

Iranian indicted for arms violation

COLUMBIA, S.C. (AP) — A federal grand jury has indicted an Iranian national on charges he tried to ship a component of a U.S. missile system to Iran, officials said.

Alli Baza Mousavi, who was fired from his job as a Rock Hill city engineer after his Oct. 19 arrest, was indicted Wednesday on three counts that include trying to mail the part, conspiracy and making false statements on an application for a passport.

Yousefi, 45, is being held without bond. He is accused of trying to export a cathode assembly for a Klystron Tube, part of the tracking and targeting system of the Hawk missile.

U.S. Customs officials said it was believed the package was destined for Iran because the part could only fit Hawk missiles sold to Iran before the fall of the shah in 1980.

U.S. says Soviets escalate fighting

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Soviets have fired SS-1 Scud missiles on Afghan rebels in an escalation of the war in Afghanistan, the State Department said Thursday.

The attack, involving six to eight missiles, was carried out in the Nangarhar region near the border with Pakistan, spokesman Charles E. Redman said. He gave no estimate of the damage or of casualties.

Repeating an earlier warning, Redman said: "If the introduction of this weaponry is an attempt to intimidate Pakistan, then Moscow should know that Pakistan enjoys our full support. The use of this weapon represents a further escalation in the level of violence."

The spokesman said U.S. diplomats in Moscow had registered their concern at the Soviet foreign ministry and Deputy Secretary of State John C. Whitehead complained Wednesday to Soviet Ambassador Yuri V. Dubinin.

Export licensing system shown off

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Commerce Department, demonstrating its new computerized system for export licensing, said Thursday it wants to help Japan, West Germany and other allies develop similar technology for keeping strategic goods from flowing to communist nations.

Commerce Undersecretary Paul Freedenberg said "The Japanese have lagged on this but now they're interested," and that almost all other major allies had inquired as well about the advanced licensing system.

Their decisions also go into the computer, so that U.S. Customs officials can easily find out if a particular shipment has been licensed and can be shipped, whether or not they have the actual paperwork in hand.

Freedenberg said \$90 to \$100 billion worth of U.S. exports each year are strategic goods subject to licensing, out of total exports of \$220 billion.

U.S. weighs options over Soviets' radar

WASHINGTON (AP) — Soviet refusal to destroy a disputed Siberian radar facility is prompting the Reagan administration to consider expanding strategic weapons programs, U.S. officials said Thursday.

Among the steps being weighed are reversing the planned dismantling of three Poseidon nuclear submarines, deploying a limited ballistic missile defense and speeding up the testing of space weapons, said the officials, who spoke only on condition of anonymity.

They said a decision was expected within two weeks. "The jury is still out," an official said.

In the meantime, William F. Burns, director of

the U.S. Arms Control and Disarmament Agency, plans to begin briefing members of Congress on Friday on failure to resolve the dispute with the Soviets.

Acting on a request from the White House last summer, the options were prepared by the Pentagon and are being circulated to the State Department, the arms control agency and other U.S. offices for their recommendations.

On Wednesday, U.S. and Soviet technical experts in Geneva discussed the radar installation at Krasnoyarsk, Siberia, and a Soviet proposal to construct a space institute there.

The U.S. group, headed by Burns, had no objection to the idea of an institute but said the Krasnoyarsk facility had to be dismantled. After the Soviet refusal.

State Department spokesman Charles E. Redman said the United States may take "appropriate and proportionate responses" or declare Krasnoyarsk a "material breach" of the 1972 Anti-Ballistic Missile Treaty.

That would be a first step toward abrogating the arms control accord.

"Unfortunately, the Soviet experts did not have any new proposal," Redman said Wednesday in giving an account of the session.

Pentagon expands medical care

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Pentagon, hoping to contain the cost of its health insurance plan for dependents and retirees, has approved 21 projects aimed at expanding the capacity of military hospitals to handle such patients.

The approvals, given by Assistant Defense Secretary William Mayer, will allow Army and Air Force hospitals in 12 states to expand facilities or hire additional nurses and other staff to provide more surgical, obstetric, gynecology, cardiac and psychiatric services.

Similar Navy projects are now under consideration.

The Pentagon estimates the new projects will cost the two services \$14.6 million, but that the Defense Department will still save \$13.9 million compared with the cost of paying civilian hospitals to treat the patients under the Civilian Health and Medical Program of the Uniformed Services, an insurance program.

Military hospitals are required to serve dependents and retirees on a space-available basis, giving first priority to men and women on active duty.

"It's a natural diminution of power, energy, things of that kind, and the realization that now people are coming up who will take the spotlight. You have to step aside for them."

They were released in 1986 by Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev,

and the recent announcement that Sakharov would be allowed to travel to the United States was seen as another sign of Gorbachev's easing of restrictions on human rights.

Sakharov's trip is to promote the newly formed International Foundation for the Survival and Development of Humanity, the first private foundation allowed to operate with full legal status in the Soviet Union.

Pageant resident David Marmel said he had not seen the survey, adding that they were used in the past to find out types of products used by contestants for the product-marketing purposes of pageant sponsors.

Marmel said the women were not obliged to answer the questions.

The three contestants also complained Tuesday about the use of bikinis, saying the skimpy attire was degrading for a pageant featuring mothers and professional

women.

"How is it going to look for my fellow workers to see me baring and grinding in a bikini on national television? It's demeaning," said Mrs. Gambile, a marketing director for an engineering firm.

Only single-piece suits were used in state contests leading to the national pageant, she said.

Jennifer Kline, 21, of Minnesota, won the pageant that ended Sunday and was televised Tuesday by ABC.

Ideologies clash in Stallings, Watkins battle

Stallings touts 2-term record

TWIN FALLS — In 1978 Democrat Richard Stallings couldn't get elected to the statehouse.

In 1983 he came in third for the Democratic presidential nomination. Three surprise votes from Minnesota pro-lifers leap-frogged him ahead of Democratic contenders who had spent millions, including Gary Hart, Joseph Biden and Richard Gephardt.

It was a heady experience for a history professor from Rexburg.

He's fond of telling voters that, if he wins this election, he finally will have won as many elections as he has lost. And he will have set a record: No Democrat has yet been

elected to three terms in the conservative 2nd District, according to the Idaho Blue Book.

In 1984 he beat GOP Rep. George Hansen by only 170 votes. He was seen as such an easy target two years ago that six Republican challengers lined up to run against him.

But he has solidified his position since then. Republicans had a difficult time recruiting someone to run against him this year. Only an unknown housewife and Republican Dane Watkins, who had come in fourth in the 1984 Republican primary, came forward.

Watkins' strategy has been to link Stallings with liberal Eastern Democrats, stressing that Stallings has voted with Democratic House Speaker Jim Wright 74 percent of the time.

The liberal Americans for Democratic Action found Stallings to be the most liberal member of the

state's congressional delegation in its most recent report. But the group still didn't like him. Stallings was among the most conservative of Democrats, both in the West and nationwide, the group found.

Stallings has differed with the rest of the Idaho delegation over Contra aid. He voted for \$30.8 million for food and medical supplies, but he opposed Reagan's package that included \$3.6 million for weapons.

The vote against military aid may not have been "politically unwise, but it was morally correct," he said.

Watkins hopes for GOP rout

TWIN FALLS — For 2nd Congressional District candidate Dane Watkins, the issue is Richard Stallings.

He's been running since May on the fact that Stallings is a Democrat in a heavily Republican district. Watkins, a Republican, believes the

nation's ills will not be cured until conservative Republicans control Congress.

To Watkins, Stallings is responsible for the sins of all Democrats, and the sins are plentiful.

Even when the tactic has backfired, Watkins remains undaunted.

In a radio commercial aired repeatedly this fall, the announcer said Democrat presidential candidate Dukakis supports abortion on demand. "That's where Mike Dukakis and Richard Stallings stand."

But Stallings received the endorsement of National Right to Life and won three surprise votes for the Democratic presidential nomination because of his anti-abortion stands.

The same commercial linked Stallings with gun control, but the National Rifle Association later endorsed him.

In September Watkins told Boise State University students that Stallings had killed the Special Iso-

lope Separator project by agreeing to a compromise with a fellow congressman who wanted to cut start-up funding.

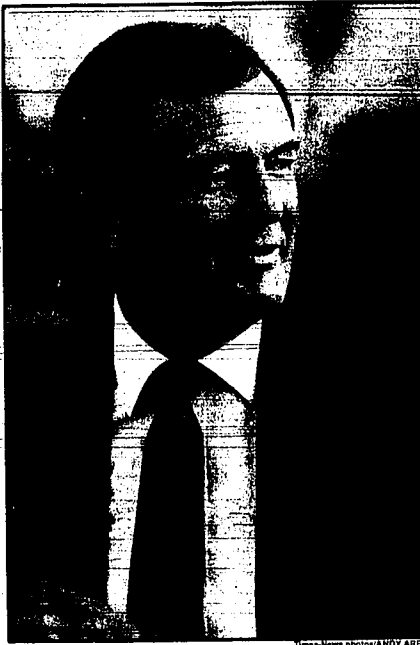
But an aide for Idaho's two Republican senators said Stallings actually helped rescue the project through his compromise.

"I don't have any qualms about saying that I've been embarrassed by some of (Watkins') campaign tactics," says Twin Falls County Republican Chairman Mark Stubbs. "There are some definite issues there he could have addressed, but by making an emotional appeal I think he offended a lot of voters."

What's important is that he would vote right in Washington, say fellow Republicans.

Stallings cancels out (Republican Congressman) Larry Craig, Stubbs says. "Do voters want a conservative Republican who is going to vote with Larry Craig and against the majori-

Bramwell runs as Libertarian with few illusions

TWIN FALLS — Donovan Bramwell dabbled in both the left and Republican conservatism before finding his political niche.

At the 1980 Eastern Idaho Fair he picked up some Libertarian Party literature, and a convert was born.

He's running for the 2nd District congressional seat this year not because he expects to win, but to promote the principles of the Libertarian Party.

"I wanted a chance to speak out about the issues that are ignored or neglected by the major parties," he says.

"We need to make government a lot smaller," he says. And he means business. He would

cut fully two-thirds of the duties of federal government.

For starters, he would get rid of half the military budget. The United States does not need to subsidize other countries with forces in Europe, Japan and the Persian Gulf, he says.

What it does need is enough strength to protect Americans in America from foreign invasions.

Domestic programs would be the responsibility of churches and private charities, he says. All subsidies for business and agriculture would be abandoned.

"A free and unregulated market, although it would have risks, in the long run would provide a more prosperous farm economy," he says. He acknowledges that his plan to repeal and not replace the 1985 Farm Bill would cause chaos, but "years of chaos are better than the

years of stagnation we've had in the past."

Cutting programs would mean the nation could cut taxes, starting with income taxes.

"As a Libertarian, I'm against all taxes," he says. "But the first thing to get rid of is the most offensive. You cannot fill out the IRS forms without relinquishing your First Amendment right to privacy and Fifth Amendment protection against self-incrimination."

Unfortunately, he does not expect to see taxes abolished in his lifetime, he says.

He also wants to send the Federal Reserve Act of 1913 the way of the Internal Revenue Service.

"We need to replace the Federal Reserve system with a decentralized system that uses gold and silver money," he says. "No one

Review of rape case seems to point to improper jury selection process

TWIN FALLS — The nitty-gritty art of jury selection may breathe new life into a rape case that ended one year ago when a Twin Falls man was sentenced to at least 15 years in prison.

The Idaho Supreme Court on Thursday heard Marvin D. Hedger's attorney argue that a judge improperly kept a woman on a panel of prospective jurors even though her former husband had been convicted of rape and she had subsequently joined a victims' rights group. That and other errors in the trial were prejudicial enough to justify a new trial, argued Twin Falls County Public Defender Michael J. Wood.

"She indicated she wouldn't want a person of her emotional content on a jury," said Wood, who had to use one of his 10 peremptory challenges to keep the woman off the final panel. "I would have exercised another peremptory challenge if I had another."

The five members of the Idaho Supreme Court, in Twin Falls this week to hear local appeals, quizzed Wood and Deputy Attorney General Michael Henderson repeatedly on the topic. Thursday's oral arguments came one year and a

day after Hedger was sentenced to between 15 and 30 years in prison and a \$5,000 fine on the rape conviction.

Fifth District Judge Daniel Hurlbutt's decision not to disqualify the woman is "the part of the case I'm most concerned about," said Justice Byron Johnson. Hurlbutt's decision came during the first stage of jury selection, when attorneys challenge jurors for specific reasons, such as prejudice.

During the second round both attorneys can disqualify a limited number of jurors without stating a reason. Such disqualification are called peremptory challenges.

A jury convicted the 40-year-old Hedger of rape, second-degree kidnapping, robbery and aggravated assault after a four-day trial in October 1987.

The trial was a battle of conflicting versions of what happened June 9, 1987. Hedger's former wife said he raped her and forced her at knifepoint to drive to Jackpot in the early morning darkness.

Hedger, however, said he and his wife made love after she let him into her house. She wanted to drive to Jackpot, and they talked about getting back together, he testified.

The jury didn't buy Hedger's story. But Wood is trying to convince the Supreme Court's members

the trial was unfair and prejudicial.

Jury selection isn't the only issue Wood is appealing in the case, but the five justices showed the most interest in that argument.

The justices usually assign criminal appeals to the three-member Idaho Court of Appeals. The weren't disappointed they kept the Hedger case.

"This is one of the better-argued cases of this nature this court has seen," said Chief Justice Allan G. Shepard.

The errors accumulated from the trial's first day, Wood argued.

First, Hurlbutt refused to disqualify the potential juror. She said her ex-husband had been convicted of raping another woman 15 years earlier. Emotionally distraught, she didn't file for divorce for six months and eventually joined a victims' rights group. But when questioned in Hurlbutt's chambers, she said she thought she could be fair.

The woman didn't serve on the jury, but because she made it through the first two rounds of selection procedure, Wood had to exercise one of his 10 peremptory challenges to keep the woman off the panel.

During the victim's testimony, Hurlbutt didn't allow Wood to introduce a transcript of a pre-trial

Minert changes jobs; moves out of state

BOISE — A deputy attorney general who sparked local controversy by plea-bargaining a police commander's drunken driving charge has moved to Pennsylvania.

David Minert was hired by the Pennsylvania National Guard, said Idaho Attorney General Jim Jones.

Minert was assigned to prosecute Jim Kistler, a Twin Falls Department of Public Safety commander, after local prosecutors decided they might face a conflict of interest.

Minert reduced the charge to inattentive driving and said at first the bargain was struck partly because Kistler is a police officer whose career would be affected by a drunken driving conviction. Later, he retracted that statement, calling it a "mistake-

ment."

He said the decision actually was made because of doubts about whether he could win a drunken driving conviction.

Kistler was fined \$75 and put on probation. He remains in his city police job.

Several readers complained of special treatment in letters to The Times-News, and local attorneys, a state's criminalist and prosecutors said the case should have gone to trial and may have resulted in a guilty verdict.

Minert had worked with the Idaho attorney general's office for two years, Jones said. His last day was Friday.

Jones declined to comment whether Minert's departure was based on the Kistler case controversy and said Minert was job hunting before he prosecuted the case.

NTSB: Plane crash was pilot error

HAILEY — A plane crash that killed three Boise people last fall near Hailey was the result of pilot error, according to the National Transportation Safety Board.

The report found pilot Lynn Hoppe misjudged the rate of climb needed to fly out of the steep Wood River Valley on the night of Sept. 18, 1987. The crash killed Hoppe, 44, a Boise police officer; KTVB reporter Mary E. Shore, 29; and KTVB photographer Daniel T. Sullivan, 29.

They were returning from a news assignment when they struck a hill near Hailey.

Hoppe also did not maintain sufficient speed to climb out of the valley, the board ruled. Factors that contributed to the accident were pilot over-confidence and darkness, the NTSB stated.

EPA will look at Sunbeam discharge

STANLEY — The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency will have a hearing on a pollutant discharge permit the agency granted the proposed Sunbeam Gold Mine.

No hearing date has been set.

The proposed open-pit mine is about 30 miles from Stanley on Jordan Creek, in the historic gold mining area of the Yankee Fork of the Salmon River drainage.

The hearings were requested by the National Wildlife Federation, the Idaho Wildlife Federation and the Idaho Natural Resources Legal Foundation Inc.

In separate actions, the environmental groups protested the EPA's July 29 granting of a National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System permit. The groups argued that the EPA does not have authority under the Clean Water Act to issue the permit.

The EPA maintains it has the authority based on an April 1986 agreement between the EPA and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers concerning discharge of solid waste into waterways.

Official questions court's authority

DECLIO — The chairman of the Senate Health and Welfare Committee is questioning the authority of the Idaho Supreme Court to set new state guidelines for child support.

"We can't relinquish the powers of the legislative branch if this is a function of the Legislature," said Sen. Denton Darrington, R-Declio, who has asked Attorney General Jim Jones for a formal legal opinion on the authority of the high court to implement such guidelines.

Darrington said the new guidelines were needed but he believes the power to make substantive rather than procedural changes in regulations rests with the Legislature, not the courts.

At issue is the recommendation of a 13-member court-appointed committee that child support orders in child custody cases be based on a sliding percentage of the noncustodial parent's income, based on the number of children involved.

A Friday hearing in Boise was set on the guidelines required as part of a 1984 federal mandate that states adopt uniform child support standards.

Specifically, they require support for one child at 17 percent of the noncustodial parent's income, 25 percent for two children, 29 percent for three children, 31 percent for four and 34 percent for five or more.

The committee elected to recommend support as a percentage of gross income of the noncustodial parent because that method is as fair as other proposals and is easier to apply," the panel said in its report.

In setting the specific levels, the panel said it "tries to spare the standard of living of the children from bearing the economic brunt of the divorce."

But attorney Donald Chisholm of

Burley has come out strongly against the committee's proposal not only because he believes the high court has overstepped its authority but because he sees the support formula unrealistic in some cases.

"The committee's choice of gross income as the standard by which to measure support shows laziness on the part of the committee or that the committee is out of touch with economic reality," Chisholm said.

People in various lines of work may have the same gross incomes, he pointed out, but a payroll employee with fringe benefits will have a significantly higher net income than a self-employed person who has to pay his own health insurance, rent, workman's compensation and social security.

He also maintained using the flat percentages against all incomes could lead to ridiculously high support rates for children whose noncustodial parent makes a substantial amount of money.

In those cases, Chisholm said, child support effectively becomes a disguised form of alimony, and the state has "discredited alimony pretty much for at least 20 years, ... and it should not be resurrected under the guidelines."

He claimed the guidelines place undue importance on simplicity and not enough on justice.

But the court-appointed committee of magistrates and attorneys specializing in child support matters said it tested various kinds of support guidelines using by a half dozen states on actual case facts and each resulted in "comparable" support amounts, especially in middle income ranges.

The high court will use the information from Boise hearing along with submitted written comments in determining whether the guidelines should be adopted.

Borlase, driving a 1982 Ford pickup, was southbound when his truck went across both lanes of traffic, going off the highway's northbound lane. Silver said: Chollet, driving a northbound 1984 Pontiac four-door, saw the pickup cutting across the highway and tried to avoid collision by going off the road.

The two vehicles hit head-on and Borlase's pickup flipped over. Silver said, Borlase was thrown from the truck.

Silver said citations are pending in connection with the accident, which is still under investigation.

Professor says geologists shouldn't pick hazardous waste dump sites

DENVER (AP) — Geologists are being asked to help determine the feasibility of sites for hazardous waste dumps, but they lack the training and technology to make those judgments, a geology professor said Thursday.

Richard G. Craig of the Kent State University Geology Department spoke about the problem Thursday in an interview prior to his presentation of a paper on the subject at the Geological Society of America's centennial conference in Denver.

The knowledge and technology available are insufficient to predict the geological future 10,000 years from now, Craig said.

"We don't have classes in predicting the future," he said. Geologists learn "the present is the key to the future. Nothing is said about the future."

The job of "seer" becomes more difficult when the tremendous effect

man has had on the earth and its atmosphere is considered, he said, adding, "We also have to know how nuclear waste is impacted by the greenhouse effect."

Hazardous waste dumping grounds are few, and cooperation among states remains tenuous.

A proposed repository site at Yucca Mountain in Nevada would be useful for the dumping of plutonium waste from Rocky Flats nuclear weapons plant north of Golden, Craig said.

However, that dump won't be operational for at least 20 years.

"Has anybody checked Watkins' voting record in the state Senate for 16 years as former Idaho House Speaker T.W. Stivers of Twin Falls. He supports issues that this community would support and anyone would support. He opposes those that anyone would oppose, and his voting record is impeccable.

During those years in the state-house, Watkins worked to create incentives for gasoline production, to start investment tax credits for business expansion and to repeal Idaho's endorsement of the Equal Rights Amendment, according to a campaign press release.

He also sponsored Idaho's resolution calling for a balanced budget amendment to the U.S. Constitution.

But Watkins is better known in the Magic Valley as the senator who, as chairman of the committee that considers tax proposals, boosted off the a bill he drafted in the trunk of his car, preventing its consideration. The incident still prompts jokes, but supporters say it has been overblown.

"There isn't a committee chairman in the House or the Senate who doesn't know how to put a bill in the trunk of his car figuratively speaking if he wants to," Stubs says in Watkins' defense. "Because Watkins happened to make an issue out of it and put it in the trunk of his car, then all of a sudden that's the reason to vote against him?"

Watkins is definitely the underdog in the race. His own polls show him trailing, but gaining when his stands are explained, he says. A Times-News poll showed him behind Stallings, 21, in the Magic Valley last month.

But Watkins has spent the past month working doggedly at the type of campaigning he does well. A large, affable man, he has shaken hundreds of hands in the 2nd District and repeated the phrase key to his campaign: "Dad, Watkins won't give away our land and water."

He says the Stallings would be giving the federal government control of Idaho water through the Swan Falls Agreement.

Republicans argue that inst-

minute language tacked onto the ratification agreement calling for environmental studies would have given the federal government authority to dictate minimum stream flows. Stallings says a number of agencies already can conduct studies with or without the language — which in any case was removed in the agreement.

Watkins has blasted Stallings for co-sponsoring the American Heritage Trust Act, which Watkins says would force Idaho property owners to sell land to the government and even to private environmental groups such as the Sierra Club.

Stallings says the act, which was not considered before Congress adjourned, would do nothing of the kind. He says it would use offshore oil taxes to expand an existing public recreation program, primarily in state and local recreation development.

Watkins takes stands on issues besides Stallings' record, even though he usually turns the conversation back to discussing Stallings. He has to prove to voters that a change in the 2nd District is needed, says campaign worker Phil Spinnelli.

Watkins' platform includes:

- Supporting the Special Isotope Separator to refine plutonium for weapons at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.
- Although the project has met opposition in the Magic Valley, which shares the other end of the Snake River aquifer with INEL, he says the public will accept the project when it understands how safe it is.

The project is important to maintain a nuclear deterrent, to improve technology and to bring hundreds of jobs to his native Idaho Falls, he says.

He criticizes Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus' ban on shipments of nuclear waste to Idaho until the permanent storage site promised in 1973 is ready.

"My approach would have been to sit down with INEL Manager Don Ofle and not carry on in the newspaper. A little negotiation goes a long way."

Vietnam returns remains of 23 MIAs

HANOI, Vietnam (AP) — Vietnam said that it handed over to a U.S. military delegation Thursday the remains of 23 U.S. soldiers listed as missing in action during the Vietnam war.

During a ceremony at the airport here, Vietnamese authorities also said Hanoi had informed U.S. officials that a joint U.S.-Vietnamese mission searching MIA remains could continue past its deadline at the end of October.

Vietnamese searchers found 21 of the 23 sets of remains, and the other two were recovered by a joint mission between Sept. 25 and Oct. 5 in the Hanoi region, said Major Dan K. Trout, liaison officer with the U.S. team responsible for repatriating the remains.

The remains will be sent to the Joint Casualty Research Center in Honolulu, Hawaii, to be identified, a U.S. military source said.

At the same time, the U.S. team returned to the Vietnamese the remains of eight people that the Hawaii center determined not to be those of U.S. soldiers. The Vietnamese said they gave the remains to the Americans thinking they may have belonged to U.S. soldiers.

Americans to revise their criminal laws

MOSCOW (AP) — Soviet criminal law will be revised by the end of the year and then there will be no basis to speak about political prisoners, Foreign Ministry spokesman Gennadiy I. Gerasimov said Thursday.

He would not state clearly, however, if all laws used to prosecute people for their political beliefs would be repealed.

Nor would he say whether all current political prisoners will be freed. West German Chancellor Helmut Kohl said last week Soviet officials told him in his meetings in Moscow that all political prisoners would be freed by the end of the year.

"There was nothing new in discussions with the West German chancellor on that issue in Moscow," Gerasimov said.

France increases AIDS spending

PARIS (AP) — France will triple its budget for AIDS research and quadruple spending on education aimed at preventing spread of the disease, the government said Thursday.

Health Minister Claude Evin announced the program after a Cabinet meeting, and said the government intends to "mobilize every French man and woman" in the fight.

"AIDS should no longer be considered a disease that only concerns what are called 'marginal' populations," Evin was quoted as saying in the daily Le Monde. "In three years, AIDS will cause more deaths in France than traffic accidents."

China tightens economic controls

BEIJING (AP) — Communist Party General Secretary Zhao Ziyang told foreign businessmen that China's economic reforms erred in giving too much power to local governments rather than to local enterprises, sources said Thursday.

Zhao also said in a meeting Wednesday with 80 participants in an international business forum that there will be a slowdown in new contracts with foreign companies as China imposes austerity measures to cool off its overheated economy.

The sources, who attended the meeting, said Zhao emphasized the tightening of economic controls, to last at least two years, will have no effect on China's long-term commitment to reform.

Experts defuse World War II bomb

FRANKFURT, West Germany (AP) — Workers digging a subway tunnel unearthed a U.S. World War II bomb beneath the Frankfurt Zoo, forcing the popular site to be closed as experts disarmed the device, officials said Thursday.

The 1,100-pound bomb had two functional detonators and was defused at the site by demolition experts, Hesse state officials said.

It was found Wednesday night 19 feet underground by workers constructing a new subway tunnel beneath the zoo, the statement said.

After the bomb was defused, it was removed by crane and taken away for destruction, the officials said.

Hungary sends 'skinheads' to jail

BUDAPEST, Hungary (AP) — Fifteen "skinheads" were sentenced Thursday to stiff jail terms for a racial attack on 10 Cuban workers at a streetcar stop in Budapest, a newspaper reported.

A youth identified as Andras Dudas, ringleader of the attack after a punk rock concert April 24, received three years, four months in strict-regime prisons on charges of "grievous bodily harm and racist incitement against foreign workers," the newspaper Esti Hirlap said.

Six of his associates received jail terms ranging between 2 1/2 and 3 1/2 years on similar charges, the newspaper said.

Afghan war heats up again

ISLAMABAD, Pakistan (AP) — Pakistan said it shot down an intruding Afghan warplane Thursday inside its borders, and Afghanistan said Pakistani jet fighters downed two aircraft in Afghan territory.

Western diplomats also reported Thursday that communist forces fired six missiles at Afghan guerrillas near the border.

The stepped-up activity in the 10-year-old Afghan war follows Wednesday's capture by guerrillas of a key Afghan frontier post and the introduction by Soviet forces of new long-range missiles.

Neither Afghanistan's Soviet-backed government or Pakistan acknowledged the other's claims of border air battles, but both lodged official protests. It was not clear whether they were reporting on the same attacks.

The Pakistani government said a U.S.-built Pakistani F-16 shot down a Soviet-made Su-22 fighter-bomber Thursday morning when two Su-22s penetrated 10 miles into Pakistan's North-West Frontier province.

The Pakistani government said an Afghan pilot was captured and was being questioned. Pakistan television showed film of the wreckage near the village of Thal, about 160 miles west of Islamabad.

However, Afghanistan's official Radio Kabul later said Pakistani F-16s shot down an Afghan reconnaissance jet in the morning and a training jet in the afternoon.

Foreign mercenaries try coup in Maldives

COLOMBO, Sri Lanka (AP) — Foreign mercenaries tried to take over the Maldives and Indian paratroopers flew to the Indian Ocean archipelago Thursday night to aid the embattled president, Maumoon Abdul Gayoom.

Diplomats in Colombo said the hired attackers were thought to be Tamils from Sri Lanka, about 500 miles northeast of the string of coral islands known for fishing and glistering tourist beaches.

A senior Sri Lankan military official said former President Ibrahim Nasir of the Maldives was behind the attempt to overthrow Gayoom, who succeeded Ibrahim in 1978 and was re-elected to a third five-year term Sept. 23.

At least 12 people were killed and 22 wounded, a senior Sri Lankan official said. Residents reached in Male, the Maldivian capital of 56,000 people, said shooting continued through the day into the night.

Indian and U.S. diplomats in Colombo said Gayoom was safe in Male but were not more specific.

About 150 raiders apparently came ashore from fishing trawlers before dawn and attacked the military headquarters next to the presidential palace.

Diplomats in Colombo and New Delhi said Gayoom's troops were in general control of Male but the attackers held the radio and television stations

and the Islamic College. A pair of large military aircraft thought to be Indian troop transports landed at the Maldivian airport on Hulule Island, next to Male Island, and reports from Male indicated the shooting died down afterward, two diplomats in Colombo reported.

One relayed reports that the mercenaries had inflicted heavy damage on government buildings, with grenades and gunfire.

Mohammad Ali, the Sri Lankan ambassador to the Maldives, said by telephone he heard two airplanes land on Hulule at about 9 p.m. (9 a.m. MST), but knew nothing about them.

Solidarity gets Thatcher nod in Poland

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — Hundreds of Solidarity supporters shouted to British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher as she honored a martyred priest Thursday that they represent the real Poland.

"Here is Poland! Here is Poland!" the crowd chanted as Mrs. Thatcher walked into the churchyard of St. Stanislaw Koska Church to lay a wreath on the grave of the Rev. Jerzy Popieluszko, a murdered pro-Solidarity priest.

"Solidarity! Independence!" and "Lech Walesa!" the throng shouted.

The visit to the banned union's Warsaw bastion, on the second day of an official visit, marked the British leader's most open demonstration of sympathy with government opponents. Immediately afterwards, Mrs. Thatcher began her first meeting with Poland's Communist Party chief, Gen. Wojciech Jaruzelski.

In remarks prepared for delivery at an evening banquet with Jaruzelski, Mrs. Thatcher said if he deals with Solidarity, Western financial assistance to Poland would follow.

"Freedom and responsibility go hand in hand. Those who seek the one must be prepared to offer the other. That is why it is so vital that there should be real dialogue with representatives of all sections of society, including Solidarity," Mrs. Thatcher said.

Shamir resists coalition efforts to trade West Bank for peace

JERUSALEM (AP) — Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir refused demands by possible coalition partners Thursday to annex the occupied lands and expel Palestinians from them, but he supports more Jewish settlements, an aide said.

The United States considers such settlements in the West Bank and Gaza Strip an obstacle to peace between Israel and its Arab neighbors.

Violence continued in the occupied territories, where a rebellion that began Dec. 8, 1987, has cost the lives of 10 Israelis and more than 300 Palestinians. Israeli soldiers blew up four houses Thursday and nine Palestinians were reported wounded by army gunfire.

Sources in the Labor Party said Foreign Minister Shimon Peres might be dumped as leader after the center-left party's poor showing in Tuesday's general election.

Critics say the Labor campaign focused too closely on the leader's personality and his support for an international conference on Middle East peace, an Arab demand that stirs controversy in Israel.

Shamir's right-wing Likud bloc, which has been in a tenuous "national unity" coalition with Labor since indecisive 1984 elections, opposes a conference and wants to retain all the lands captured in the 1967 war. Peres has expressed willingness to trade some land for peace.

Korean students, police clash

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — Thousands of students demanding the arrest of former President Chun Doo-hwan clashed with riot police Thursday in one of the worst street protests in recent months.

President Roh Tae-woo, on an overseas trip, said he was not troubled and hoped political turmoil in his country would end in the not-too-distant future.

"I am not much worried about the student protests. Their complaints will eventually disappear in a huge melting furnace of democratic political reforms," Roh told reporters aboard a plane which took him to Malaysia, Australia, Indonesia and Brunei.

Police said more than 20,000 students from 80 colleges took part in anti-Chun campus rallies or street

protests in Seoul and a dozen provincial cities on Thursday, national students' day. They accused the former president of corruption and violating human rights.

About 50 students were arrested, mostly in Seoul, said police. They gave no injury figures, but said some youths and policemen suffered cuts and burns.

In Seoul, about 5,000 students threw firebombs at 9,000 riot police who blocked their march to Chun's house in a residential district.

Police in armored vans retaliated by firing barrages of tear gas.

S&Ls face catastrophic losses

HONOLULU (AP) — The deposit insurance system was never intended to cover the catastrophic losses now being generated by the nation's savings and loan institutions, the top federal S&L regulator said Thursday.

Mr. Danny Hall, chairman of the Federal Home Loan Bank Board, said that when Congress set up deposit insurance in the wake of the Depression, it intended to cover only a "normal" level of losses.

However, current losses, aggravated by a severe recession in the oil-dependent Southwest, are anything but normal. Wall noted in a speech at the closing session of the U.S. League of Savings Institutions' annual convention.

The industry pays for deposit insurance through premium fees. Now that the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corp., or FSIC, faces a \$45 billion problem, Congress has been preparing to debate a taxpayer bailout.

Wall said Congress never intended for insurance premiums paid by S&Ls to cover catastrophic losses. If it had, he said, it would have fol-

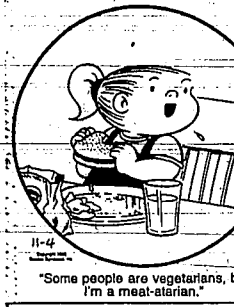

Today's South had his excuses ready when he lost today's game. His dramatic line of play did have its chances. A less flamboyant line would have proved more fruitful.

The defenders took the first two spades. East shifted lustily to a trump. A club shift would have worked out better.

South won in his own hand and led the diamond jack for a losing finesse. There was no way to avoid the loss of another trick, and the game went one down.

"I've covered my diamond jack, I would have gone for an elimination play," explained South. "After stripping the diamonds and pulling the last trump, I would have played the ace and a club, hoping to find any doubt on her. In that case, whichever defender would have been employed."

That was a nice way to play the hand had West been marked with the diamond king. Since the odds favored the king to be with East (the might have switched to clubs with K-Q), a simple finesse against East's diamond king would win.

After the trump switch by East, South should draw trumps and lead a low diamond from dummy. If East wins, South enjoys two discards on dummy's ace and queen. If East ducks, the diamond king is ruffed away and South scores 10 tricks anyway.

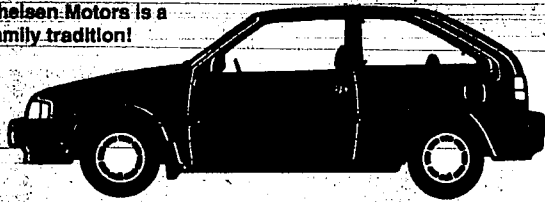

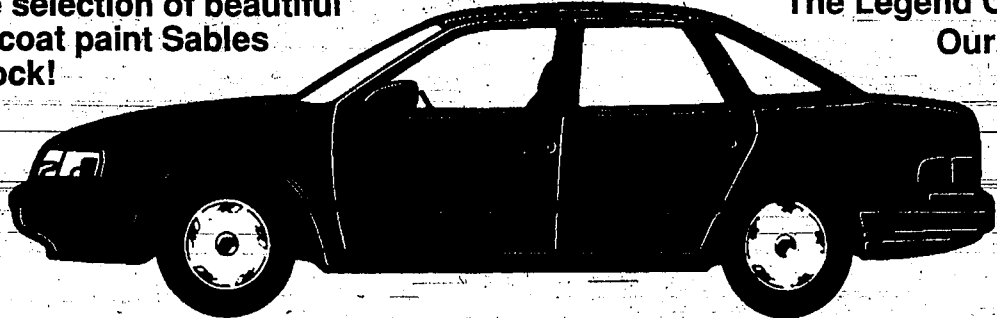

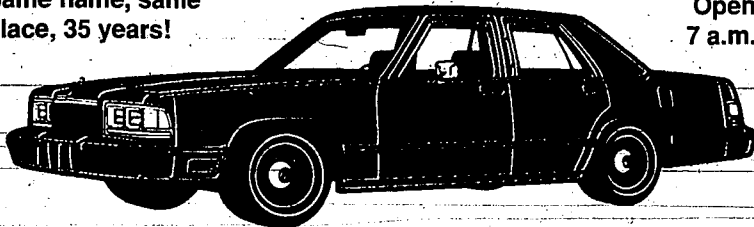

Photographer captures images - inside and out

TWIN FALLS — Doug Bobb knows about making images — inside and out.

Forty hours a week, from 8 a.m. Saturday until midnight on Sunday, Bobb takes pictures of elbows, ankles and other assorted body parts as an X-ray technician at Magic Valley Regional Medical Center. He says he prefers this grueling week-end shift because it frees him on weekdays for his real calling — color photography.

With a wave of a hand over a stack of his expansive 16- by 20-inch landscapes and offbeat portraits, Bobb admits, "This is becoming an addiction."

On Wednesday, an exhibit featuring Bobb's works opened at the College of Southern Idaho's Sunspot Gallery. The photographs will remain on display through Dec. 8. The gallery is located on the second floor of the Taylor Administration Building with viewing hours from 8 a.m. until 8 p.m. weekdays.

Bobb first picked up a camera in 1970 when he enrolled in a black and white photography course at Colorado's Rocky Mountain College. But he says he really didn't start taking pictures seriously until six years ago.

Now he is serious about making photography his business, right down

to his plaid shirt and skinny gray tie. Bobb's most recent assignments include a poster for RoseCreek Wines and an annual report for Twin Falls Bank and Trust.

This year Bobb won first and second place awards for his scenic photography of Idaho.

Other than one class, he says he learned about photography the old fashioned way — through trial and error.

"I look at my bad pictures more than I do the good pictures," Bobb says. "That way I get an idea of what I've done wrong."

A pile of rejects was all Bobb had left to show this week at his in-home studio. The best have been tapped for the Sunspot exhibit and others are on sale at Venzon Jewelry and Idaho Arts in Twin Falls. But Bobb's photographic vision is apparent even in the reject prints.

While he says he prefers portraits and other studio work, the most compelling photos in his so-called reject pile and in the current exhibit are his landscapes.

A landscape photo Bobb titles "Let There Be Light," shows a stormy sky the color of a purple bruise, bisected by a jagged bolt of lightning. The tip of the lightning bolt brushes the top of a lipstick red tent. At first, Bobb says he thought the surreal purple sky was a result of faulty film or processing, but he says the tent came

out its true color. "So I assumed that's how it really was."

If there's anything Bobb hates, it's a "god-awful blue sky." He says that stormy days hold a particular mystery for him and he often hikes miles into the wilderness braving inclement weather to get that one outstanding shot. "I push the film as hard as I can," he says. "I shoot anywhere from 300 to 500 frames."

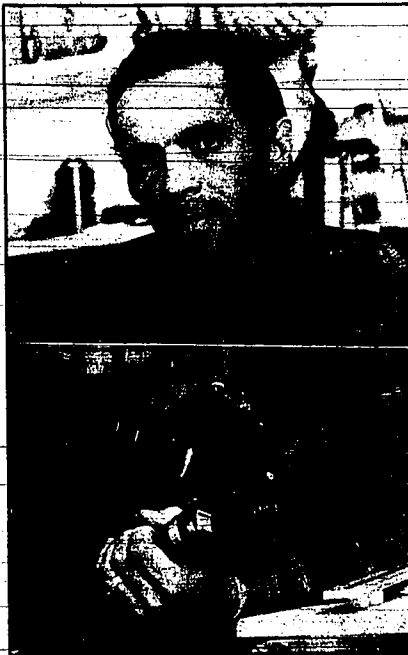
Most of Bobb's outdoor scenes depict Idaho or other recognizable western locales. A trip to Utah's Bruneau Sand Dunes yielded several interesting shots that are included in the Sunspot exhibit.

"Blow Wind Blow," captures a mo-

ment when the sun had cast its glow like a golden cape over the pointed top of a sand dune. Other Bruneau Sand Dunes landscapes capture the shapes and textures cast by shadows and shifting sands.

"Composition and light is what makes an average into a great picture," Bobb says. Bobb is scheduled to teach a class at CSI this spring for avid outdoorspeople who want to learn how to take better pictures.

Someday Bobb hopes his reputation as a professional photographer will allow him to give up his X-ray weekends. Until then he says he's "just another starving artist."

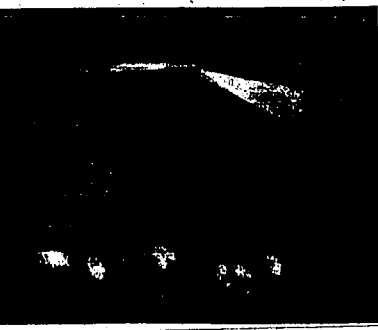

Writers gather for reading at bookstore

Imagine a room full of nearly 50 people, a bookstore in downtown Pocatello. The crowd is composed of writers and spectators from Magic Valley and southeast Idaho. The store is the Walnut and the Carpenter. Present are former Twin Falls residents, Will and Vales Petersen. The writers gathered there recently to read their work.

Those not involved with writing and publishing often wonder at writers reading their own works. After all, don't writers write stories, poems and books to be read rather than heard?

The answer is yes — for the most part. But since the act of writing is difficult (contrary to popular opinion which assumes that art is easy because writers seem to "enjoy" it so much), and since it takes place in relative isolation, (some corner of the world where a writer holes up with a pad and pen, or stares blankly at a computer screen) gatherings of this nature can fill a need for community. There is always excellent surrounding a reading, especially when the authors exhibit both cultural and stylistic diversity. And that's what characterizes the writers of south central Idaho. No two of them sound alike, whether story writer, novelist, or poet. This group of artists also tends to support and encourage each other. No one is inclined to join the "school of Idaho poets" in the areas of style, imagery, form, etc.

Two examples of these differences can be seen in the work of Edson Fichter and Bruce Embree. Fichter's newly published work "PARSIMERON" is also illustrated by Jim. He moved from Iowa in 1949 to teach at Idaho State University. From 1956 to 1962, he studied the reproductive success of the pronghorn

for the Idaho Department of Fish and Game. His study area was the upper valley of the Pahsimero River, hence the title of his book. Here is an example of Fichter's clean pure imagery.

*Underbrush is intimate with earth
With cricket son
Of pungency
Of dead leaves
After rain,
With Twilight smoke
Before the sun goes down.
Its roots in dust
Of silenced stars,
There is a place
For underbrush.*

Bruce Embree demonstrates a working class perspective in his work which is remarkable for both its downhome imagery and precise timing:

*APRIL 25
Road is full of holes I try to miss
on the way to Inkom or Pocatello
Water is almost over the road as
the sun goes down
and has dropped three feet by
morning
coming up a little higher every afternoon
Geese and ducks, even storks and cranes
are nesting or just hanging out
down the river or Marsh Creek
Deer that lived or walked back
up high
later this year
the snow was up to the top wire
The Mormons are tilling their gardens*


plowing fields with tractors big as a bank

*Calves are born before the grass
Hay trucks make two trips a day
How can the snow pile up when it's going sideways
instead of down?
I get up at 6:30 in the morning
and drink coffee.
Then she goes to work and I fumble
around for eight hours
at times accomplishing little
She gets home and we fix dinner
lay around until eleven
This seems right
and requires no silly questions.*

Now most of us have sat through uncomfortable meals with sensitive non-agricultural friends as things like artificial insemination, mastitis, dilation of cows' teats, etc. have been discussed. We've laughed as these friends' eyes widen and they either blush or pale depending upon the intensity of graphic detail. We rednecks are used to sitting on one side of the fence laughing at some city slicker's expense. But what makes a redneck blush?

Jan Galvan, the mystery man of the evening, rumored to be an 'ex-priest, stretched the audience's patience by reading from a particularly sexually graphic novel. His allotted seven minutes stretched painfully to 40. More sensitive members of the audience sat quietly, as if attending just one more boring sermon. Will Peterson, proprietor, peered the floor at the back of the store, surely this writer or would stop any minute now... while we Twin Falls rednecks in the back row, desperately in need of paper bags in which to breathe, blushed.

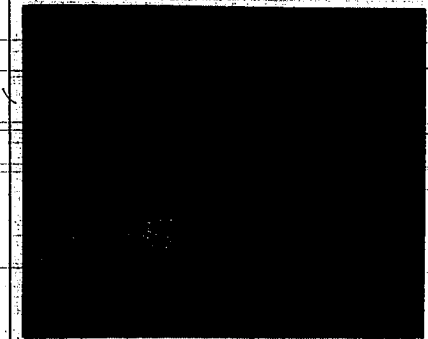

Film ratings system gets mixed reviews from Hollywood

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — The film ratings system, which at its inception gave a G to "Dracula Has Risen From the Grave," turned 20 years old Tuesday to mixed reviews from Hollywood insiders and outsiders.

No groups denouncing what they see as a penchant by the film industry for sex, violence and drugs, the Motion Picture Association of America's ratings system is inadequate.

To many filmmakers, an X rating, or even a family-oriented G, means box-office poison, and obtaining a PG-13 or an R has become imperative, the equivalent of a mass-marketing seal of approval.

To Gene Siskel, film critic for the Chicago Tribune, "The R-rated category is now so widespread, and covers so many emotions and physical acts that I don't know how valuable it is to parents."

But to Jack Valenti, who has overseen the rating system for two decades as the association's president and chief executive officer, the film code has achieved at least one feat.

"I think just the act of surviving itself a minor triumph," Valenti said in a recent interview.

The ratings, however, have gotten less than rave reviews from Thomas E. Radecki, chairman of the National Coalition on Television Violence.

"It's a system designed to placate the public," Radecki said, "and to prevent a public rating system from coming into existence."

Radecki conceded that the code is better than none, but argued the ratings are "why we have so much more violent and sexually degrading films than we did when the rating system was started."

Radecki would prefer a ratings system with specific guidelines, something like the 1934 code that prohibited "passion that stimulates the baser emotions" and "lustful kissing."

He contends that rating guidelines should forbid the use of alcohol or drugs in PG-rated movies.

But Valenti, who dismisses Radecki's group as "right-wing zealots," said he's rejected pleas to

designate a variety of things depicted in films as taboo, including sex, violence, drug use, smoking and even animal cruelty.

"Pretty soon we would put such baggage on this rating system it would collapse," Valenti said.

The principal guideline governing board members, Valenti said, is: "If your dad to meet with the parents of Wichita, Falls, Texas, tomorrow, do you believe they would first want you to rate this picture to be fair and reasonable?"

Valenti also disputed arguments the ratings have somehow encouraged Hollywood sex and violence. He said the ratings are a mirror of society's values and that the association surveys moviegoers' attitudes toward the code each year to measure its success.

"Over the last decade, 65 percent to 73 (percent) of all parents with children under 13 say it's 'very useful to fairly useful' in helping them determine which movies their children see, Valenti said, and 20 to 23 percent find it not useful at all."

"Now by political standards that's a landslide," he added.

The board's nine members "are neither gods nor fools," Valenti said. "They're just people who like movies, and they're parents—and they're intelligent."

Valenti hires the board's chairman, and together they select the eight other members.

The board's costs are underwritten by a fee each filmmaker must pay in submitting the movie to be rated. Appeals are possible only to a 22-member board comprising theater owners, independent producers and distributors and major producers and distributors.

The first film rated by the board was "Dracula Has Risen From the Grave," which got a G rating, said Barbara Dixon, an association spokeswoman in Washington, D.C.

Soon, "Midnight Cowboy," which starred Dustin Hoffman and Jon Voight, was given an X but still managed to win the Oscar for Best Picture of 1969.

Altogether, the association has

rated 8,460 films, Valenti said. He said no more than 100 of them have created any controversy, citing disputes over ratings assigned such films as "Angel Heart," "Cruising" and 1983's "Scarface."

Of the total, Dixon said, 11.1 percent were G-rated; 33.4 percent were PG; 3.4 percent were PG-13 (a category instituted in 1984); 47.8 percent were R-rated and 4.3 percent were X-rated.

The Stage Band has been directed by Larry Curtis of the CSI Music Department for 19 years. Admission to the concert is a \$1 donation to the CSI music scholarship fund.

 as I've ever heard," he says. "When they're talking to each other it sounds like they're talking to each other. They don't act as much as just are."

Acting is easier than directing, says Miller. "The director's primary job is to take all the parts and make it into a living portrait of whatever it is you're trying to portray. The director ultimately is in charge of all artistic elements of the play," he says. "If the play is bad, then it's the director's fault. And if the play is good, then the actors get the credit." One of his biggest challenges is costuming and color coordination because Miller is color blind. He overcomes the problem by having an intellectual concept of colors. Others tell him what colors they're using and he tells them if he thinks it is right.

"I do (get) an incredible amount of stress as a director," says Miller. However he says acting isn't as stressful because if something goes wrong he knows he can fix it.

"But as the director if something goes wrong during a performance, immediately know how I would fix it, so I'm back there telepathically beaming it to my actors and if they don't catch my telepathy or go into shock, well then I'm chewing carpet in the back of the room and gnashing my teeth, rending my garments, because it's just driving me nuts."

Although he used to watch every performance, these days he says, "I have to be pacing back and forth someplace else."

"Everytime I do it (direct) I wonder why I do it. I'll probably have a stroke," he says.

"Chapter II" is "as close to as complete range of emotions as Neil Simon has ever done," says Miller. Most of the time Simon's characters are either funny or real sad. But Miller says this play has a lot more paths, a lot more human emotion. "We have happy. We have sad. We have depressed. We have angry," he says.

The play deals with the loss of a loved one and the struggle to regain happiness with a new love. Some of the scenes are very stressful for the audience, he says, while others give them a chance to relax.

The cast includes Adrian Dean, Judy Gray and Chad Miller, all of Twin Falls, and Kathleen Flores of Kimberly.

Miller says he tells his actors not to act but to just "be" that person.

"I don't really teach acting. I just give them (actors) names for things they've already known. Once they lose their inhibitions and aren't afraid to share what's inside of them with the audience, then it becomes real. If they try to put on a mask... then everybody knows it's a mask."

If he could say something to the audience before the play what would he say? "I would say, 'Everyone is here, before you watch this play, call the waiter over and order a drink for that table right back there in the corner (his table).'"

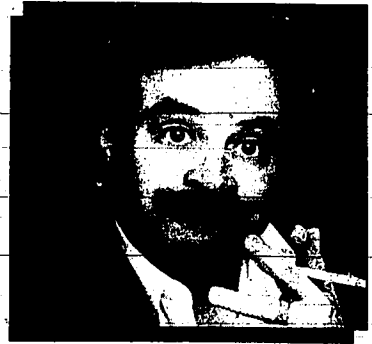

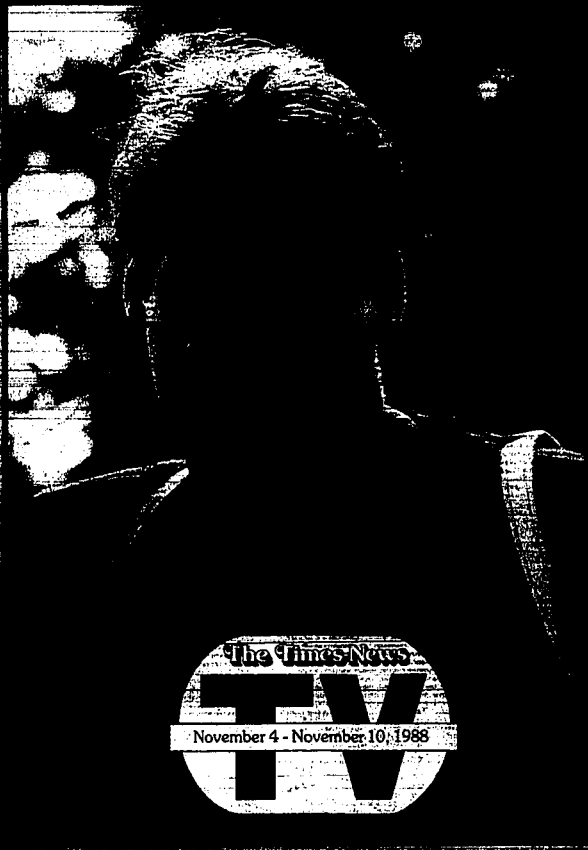

Reeve stars in NBC miniseries — Page 2

Christopher Reeve gets chance to play role in story in loves

"I did this role because I love the story."

This is a stock interview quote from Hollywood actors trying to promote their latest TV or movie role. It's usually the perfect cover for the actor's real motivation for taking the role — because his manager made him, because he hasn't worked in years, or because he had to pay off his alimony.

But coming from Christopher Reeve, who plays Major John Dodge in the two-part NBC miniseries "The Great Escape II: The Untold Story" (airing Sunday and Monday, Nov. 6 and 7), the line rings with sincerity. No one, it seems, knows more about the real-life World War II incident or the original 1963 movie, than Reeve. (And would Superman lie?)

Reeve first saw the Steve McQueen movie version of "The Great Escape" at the age of 11, and estimates that he has since "seen it at least 15 times." The story details a massive 1944 escape from a German POW camp by 75 Allied soldiers, led by Dodge. Reeve raves that after seeing the movie for the first time while he was growing up in Massachusetts he "became fascinated by the act of escape. I read the book on which the original movie was based. Then I read 'Bridge Over the River Kwai.' I read 'Stalag 17.' So by the time I got

to this material, it was really an old friend.

Reeve has mostly done movies since he first broke through as a star in "Superman" a decade ago. Since then, he has done three sequels, and tried to overcome stereotyping by doing more versatile roles in such movies as "Deathtrap" (1982), "The Bostonians" (1984) and last year's "Switching Channels." Save for a co-starring role in the CBS movie remake of "Anna Karenina" two seasons ago, this is Reeve's first television "dramatic" work. Coming back to TV to do "The Great Escape," Reeve good-naturedly shrugs, "Is really no big deal at all. My only reason is I love the story."

"The story really is the star here," he reiterates. "It's not really an actor's movie. It's a very clear struggle, and you know who to root for. There's something very appealing about the humor and the courage of the men who could have sat the war out waiting for the next shipment from the Red Cross or playing softball in the compound, but they didn't. I admire that." Dodge's fellow escapees are played by Anthony Denison ("Crime Story"), Judd Hirsch ("Dear John") and Charles Haid ("Hill Street Blues"). Michael Nader (of "Dynas-

ty") plays a sadistic Nazi official who ultimately determines their fate — and whom Dodge tracks down long after the war is over.

Doing the miniseries also gave Reeve the opportunity to fully research the entire life of John Dodge, an American who became a British citizen after service in World War I. During the interview, Reeve excitedly spent 20 minutes detailing Dodge's long, involved life story. A cousin of Winston Churchill, Dodge "was a 19th-century adventurer in the 20th century. He was a man of nobility and privilege who threw it all away in search of adventure. I admire that. He was intrepid, fearless, charming, educated — an incredible person. Actually there's a lot that happened beyond the few years covered in (the miniseries). I'm looking into whether there's a movie in this man's life story. Someone should make 'The John Dodge Story.' I hope it's me."

On The Cover Christopher Reeve plays Major John Dodge in "The Great Escape II: The Untold Story." It airs Sunday and Monday, Nov. 6 and 7, on NBC.

Diane McBain juggles careers to play politician's wife on soap

The lady looks so familiar. What gives her away are those cheekbones and those eyes. No question: it's Diane McBain.

Flashback to the '60s -- '77 Sunset Strip, "Surfside Six," "Gheyenne." When pert Diane McBain was part of the Warner Bros. stable, she was a kid from nearby Glendale High School following in the footsteps of many others, including Debbie Reynolds. She went to class as a contract player and learned the acting game on camera. She would go from "Maverick" to playing Richard Burton's granddaughter in "The Ice Palace," Elvis Presley singing to her in "Spinout." The studio dubbed her "Top Star of Tomorrow" for the Motion Picture Exhibitors.

Flash forward to 1988 -- "General Hospital." Diane McBain plays Claire Howard, who gives her husband, Gregory Howard (Alan Feinstein), a winning politician, the cold shoulder. Gregory prefers Bobbie to the selfish Claire, who is more enamored of society than of her children or her husband. But now that Gregory holds office, sneaking around with Bobbie is going to be tricky ... and divorce is a no-no. Claire and Gregory must continue faking it.

What's ahead for Claire? Possibly illness. Anything to torment Gregory.

What prompted Diane to resume her career? "General Hospital" called her last spring with two parts in mind. "Diane focused on Claire Howard; the other character went into the ash can.

Working for producer Wes Kenney on "General Hospital" has been sweet indeed. Although she was ignored for a while because she took a few years off have and care for her baby, McBain is back.

Grateful to be working again, the actress must bow to power. If you drop out for a while, the town's knuckleheads figure the public has forgotten. The assumption is "out of sight, out of mind ... for good." What utter nonsense! But that's the system. People don't return phone calls or offer

any support. When a door is closed, that's it! How did the closed door open? Through a friend, "General Hospital's" casting director, Marvin Page. Diane is grateful to him for not losing faith.

Going back to work has meant giving up her psychology major at Antioch University in Los Angeles. She is just short of obtaining her bachelor's degree, which will have to be postponed, along with a master's degree. It has also forced her to drop out of a writer's class at UCLA for a while.

But Diane refuses to forgo her job as a counselor at Response, a haven for victims of violent crimes. McBain works a few nights a week counselling, listening, and imparting support and confidence.

"I think I can juggle three careers," says Diane. "But I've learned a valuable lesson: No more dropping out, not in this town."

There's sad news for "Ryan's Hope" fans. After winning 17 Daytime Emmy Awards in its 13½ years on TV, the soap will end its run as of January 13, 1989.

The half-hour show has been ranked at the bottom of the rating barrel for some time, and ABC finally decided to throw in the towel. Jo Anne Emmerich, vice president of daytime programs at ABC, issued the following statement: "We are very proud of 'Ryan's Hope' and it will be sorely missed on our schedule. 'Ryan's Hope' has not been rejected by its audience, but has simply been unavailable to viewers because of a continued diminishing of station clearances. Without sufficient stations to carry it, the program has become a victim of audience erosion." That's a long-winded way of saying the ratings were poor and the show was canceled.

Kate Jackson tries to go legit with TV series 'Baby Boom'

GLENDAL, Calif. — It was easy to track down Kate Jackson following a recent day on the set of "Baby Boom," the new NBC series that begins airing Wednesday night. A path of wet footprints connected the shooting site — the indoor swimming pool of a YMCA here — to her trailer in the parking lot.

Jackson had just taken a dive, fully clothed, into the pool for a scene in which her character, corporate executive J.C. Wiatt, becomes frantic when she believes that her child is lost underwater in a toddler's swimming class.

As in the movie on which the series is based (which starred Diane Keaton), Wiatt — a driven, successful Harvard grad — has become a mother by surprise when a long-lost relative died and left her a baby named Elizabeth.

With a hairdresser noisily blowing her straight brown hair dry as she sat in tall director's chair, Jackson eagerly badgered those in her trailer for a review of the scene.

"Why does everyone say, 'Oh — it was good?' she demanded, mimicking the lukewarm praise of her unwilling critics. "Maybe (in post-production) they could slow it down a little — I mean, not slow motion, but enough so they can really see it. Otherwise, the audience will react the same way. It's over before they even notice it."

With "Baby Boom," Jackson is plunging not only into swimming pools but also back into series television. It is her fifth — she played a ghost on "Dark Shadows" in the early 1970s and went on to star in "The Rookies," "Charlie's Angels" and "Scarecrow and Mrs. King" — but it is the first in which she has had the spotlight to herself.

Her preoccupation with the swimming pool shot reflects her general concern about the public's reaction to the series — and her — because she thinks "Baby Boom" is a step up after

years of being associated with purely escapist entertainment.

"I have had TV work that has gotten attention before, and I think that I have been good in things before," Jackson said. "But I think this is probably the most solid thing artistically — and I feel free to use that word when I'm speaking of this project, because it's an artistic endeavor as well as a commercial one."

In fact, the 40-year-old actress said, "I really think this is going to open other doors. I've never really been ready for a movie career, and quite frankly I didn't know if it was ever going to happen. But it only made sense for me to do another series if it was a unique project. This might be the best role I've ever had."

Wasn't Jackson offered other good projects after "Scarecrow and Mrs. King" left the air in 1987? "If I was, you'd have seen me in 'em," she said.

During press conferences about "Baby Boom" last summer, Jackson said, she was challenged by reporters who thought that audiences might not be able to relate to the parenting problems of a wealthy business executive who could afford a nanny and the best education available for her child. Jackson disagrees.

"What we're really trying to do is

show pieces of her that are representative of every man, woman and child in the audience," she said. "There is a universality, an Everyman quality that I think everybody can identify with. A lot of men can relate to this, because a lot of men are also coming home and parenting the children."

In the process of doing "Charlie's Angels" and "Scarecrow," Jackson earned a reputation for being a terror to work with. When she quit "Charlie's Angels" in 1979, it was reported that her contract was not renewed both because she did not want to do the part anymore and had "generated friction" on the set.

But her reputation has been greatly exaggerated, Jackson maintained.

"I have temperament — I don't have temper," she said. "I don't know that I'm so much a difficult person as a person who really cares. I'm sure I have been difficult for some people to work with, but I think some of them weren't trying very hard, and frustrated me to the point at which I forgot my people skills."

"I want it to be good, and in this case ('Baby Boom'), so does everybody else. I have been in situations in which people didn't care, and that's a very tough position to be in, day in and day out. I am not a perfection freak, I have seen that that is a destructive thing. But I do expect a lot of myself and everybody else."

Jackson did not specify which of her former series she was speaking of, but added: "It's an awful early morning and an awful long day to be doing something that everybody doesn't care enough about to put their noses to the grindstone and make it work — and then sluff it all off on me and say: 'Well — twinkle! Smile and show those teeth and make it work.'"

Jackson is not good at smiling for business reasons. When not working, she prefers to flee Hollywood for her home in Aspen, Colo. "I really have trouble with Los Angeles; it's not an easy place for me," she said. "I'm like a fish out of water here. I don't enjoy the party scene, I never have."

Special on satanism lands in top 10 ratings

NEW YORK (AP) — It was roundly thrashed by critics as tasteless titillation, but Geraldo Rivera's special "Devil Worship: Exposing Satan's Underground" conjured up top 10 ratings for NBC in the weekly Nielsens.

The special, with its 21.9 rating and 33 share, helped NBC to an unaccustomed win on Tuesday night, which usually belongs to ABC, though ABC put "Roseanne" in the top 10, too.

Each rating point represents 904,000 homes with televisions. The share is a percentage of sets in use.

The week ending Oct. 30 saw a lot of season premieres. The opener of NBC's "Cheers" ranked No. 2. "The Cosby Show," already into new episodes, was the top-rated show of the week with a rating of 26.2 and a 43 share.

The rest of the top 10 were: "A Different World" NBC, "60 Minutes" CBS, "Devil Worship" NBC, "Monday Night Football" ABC, "Golden Girls" NBC, "Roseanne" and "Growing Pains" ABC, and "Dear John," a new Thursday night sitcom on NBC.

NBC won the week with an average rating of 16.4. ABC was second with 13.7 and CBS third with 12.8, according to the A.C. Nielsen Co.

Big names Mary Tyler Moore and Dick Van Dyke fared poorly in their new comedies on CBS. Miss Moore's "Annie McGuire" had a 9.7 rating and 15 share and ranked 57th, barely above "The Van Dyke Show," in the certain-doom bottom 10, 63rd out of 68 rankings with a 9.0 and 14.

NBC's "Tattinger's," a romance-adventure series, premiered Wednesday without blockbuster ratings, only a 25 share, but it won its time period and tied for 26th in the rankings.

that the studio decided not to release it? — C.J.

A: Jane is currently filming a romantic film tentatively titled "Letters," co-starring Robert De Niro. The movie you're referring to is "Old Gringo," which Jane describes as a "small, difficult" film. Difficult to make it certainly was, considering that Fonda's original co-star, Burt Lancaster, was replaced by Gregory Peck. Columbia Pictures originally hoped to open it this Christmas, but now has decided to hold off until next year. People at the studio who've seen unedited portions of the flick, Jane says, are very enthusiastic.

Q: We've heard there is a bitter feud going on between Sir Laurence Olivier and his younger son. Any idea what caused the trouble? — G.F.

A: I seriously doubt there is any trouble. Richard Olivier, 26, is directing his 81-year-old father in a new movie, "Divided We Stand." The film also stars Joan Plowright, who is Richard's mother and Sir Laurence's wife. Father and son have always been close, and Richard learned his trade by going on location with his dad from the time he was a teen-ager.

Q: What's the scoop on the new-

lyweds Lee Radziwill and Herb Ross. Will they live in L.A. or in her fancy apartment in Manhattan? Do you know where the two met originally? — J.J.

A: Radziwill and Ross are the new "in" couple in Hollywood and are building a home there. In the meantime, they're spending weekends in a friend's elegant guest house in the Santa Ynez valley. The two met last spring at a gala thrown by designer Giorgio Armani and were "steadies" almost instantly.

Q: Is it true that Ann-Margret's longtime husband is virtually on his deathbed? — M.V.

A: Ann-Margret's husband and manager is Roger Smith, who once gained a moderate amount of attention as an actor in the old "77 Sunset Strip" series on TV. A while back, the 55-year-old Smith was stricken with myasthenia gravis, a muscular disease that generally affects the muscles of the face, tongue and neck. For a while he was in bad shape, but he's a lot better now, according to my Hollywood spy, who was with Smith at a Hollywood fashion show recently. Smith looked great and took much pleasure in dispelling rumors of his grave condition.

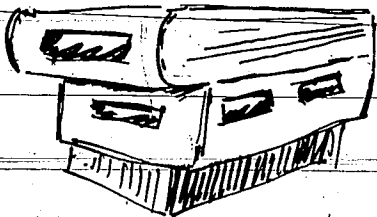

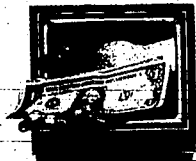
