Bankers halt skid of dollar

WASHINGTON — The United States and its major economic allies successfully intervened Thursday to halt a slide in the value of the dollar, but economists predicted that the Federal Reserve will be forced to boost U.S. interest rates in a further defense of the beleaguered U.S. greenback.

The coordinated intervention in the currency markets by the United States, Japan, West Germany, England, France, Italy and Canada was the most widespread dollar rescue effort since last April when the markets were stampeded into a dollar "sell-off" following a bad monthly trade report.

Despite the success of Thursday's rescue effort, many traders foresaw renewed selling pressure in the months ahead because of fears that President-elect George Bush and the new Congress will be unable to reach agreement on ways to trim the budget deficit.

Investors are concerned that the enlarged Democratic majorities in Congress and Bush's tough no-tax stance guarantee further budgetary gridlock.

For this reason, many economists predicted the Federal Reserve will be forced to raise rates higher in the United States. Some analysts said they would not rule out an increase in the discount rate, the interest

Up to 400 rivers may be protected

WASHINGTON — Federal agencies probably will recommend 250 to 400 rivers for protection in the nation's Wild and Scenic River System, according to a conservation group which said Thursday that "things are looking up" with the accession of a fisherman to the White House.

The Forest Service has identified 500 rivers in its 123 national forests that are eligible for protection and expects "that at a minimum 200 will be included," said Kevin Coyle of American Rivers, who said he was also speaking for George Leonard, associate chief of the Forest Service.

Frank Snell, chief of the recreation, wilderness and cultural resources division of the Bureau of Land Management, said his agency

Andrus stands by nuclear waste ban

BOISE — Department of Energy officials urged Gov. Cecil Andrus at a meeting Thursday to relent from his ban on shipments of nuclear waste into Idaho.

But Andrus said he told the officials Idaho will not allow the shipments until the federal government opens a nuclear waste storage facility in New Mexico, or comes up with some other storage or disposal plan.

"They could not or would not give me a date" when DOE will start administrative action to clear the way for use of the Waste Isolation Pilot Project near Carlsbad, N.M., Andrus told a news conference.

"We had a friendly discussion, but there is no change in Idaho's position whatsoever," he said.

Nuclear waste from other states has been stored for years in Idaho at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

WIPP in New Mexico was scheduled to open this year, but DOE announced recently the opening was postponed indefinitely. Shortly after, Andrus ordered a ban on shipments of nuclear waste into the state, mainly from the Rocky Flats weapons plant in Colorado.

One railroad car of waste was kept on a railroad siding at Blackfoot for several days before it was returned to Colorado.

Don Ofte, manager of the Idaho Operations Office of DOE; Troy Wade, acting assistant secretary for weapons programs and Anson Franklin, assistant secretary for governmental relations, met with

Andrus to discuss the shipments on Thursday.

A day earlier, Colorado Gov. Roy Romer warned two of the same DOE officials that they must find a way of disposing of waste from the Rocky Flats facility or he will shut the operation down. Rocky Flats is operated by Rockwell International for DOE. It manufactures plutonium triggers for nuclear warheads, and employs about 5,000 workers.

Andrus said he was willing to meet with Romer, New Mexico Gov. Gary Carruthers and DOE, but only if the agency has a solution to offer.

"Let them come to us with a solid proposal and we'll listen," Andrus said.

Andrus said it would take about six months for the Department of Energy to seek administrative with-

drawal of New Mexico land to clear the way for WIPP to open.

He said DOE keeps wasting time, because it is evident the agency has no clear plan.

"They have no idea in their mind what they are going to do," he said.

A meeting was scheduled in Salt Lake City on Wednesday between the three governors and DOE officials, but it was postponed so Carruthers could participate in a transition team meeting in Washington.

Andrus acknowledged some of the delay by DOE in solving the problem was because of the transition to a new administration. But he said one of the best things that could happen to the president-elect would be to have the problem resolved before he took office.

Cold turkey

Americans exchange smokes for snacks, 'adoption' during 12th annual Smokeout

Millions of smokers on Thursday swapped their cigarettes for apples and gum, went cold turkey for free turkey sandwiches and tossed their tobacco into bonfires as part of the 12th annual Great American Smokeout.

Newborns in several hospitals wore "I'm a Born Non-Smoker" city workers in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, sported pins and stickers that said, "Kiss Me, I Don't Smoke," and non-smokers joined "adopt-a-smoker" programs to help smokers through a smokeless day.

The American Cancer Society estimates nearly 40 percent of the nation's 50-million smokers tried to quit for the day. About one-third, or 2 million people, will kick the habit permanently, said Paul Rosenberg, a cancer society spokesman in New York.

"My grandkids keep telling me it's time to quit smoking," said Pat Zielke, mayor of La Crosse, Wis., and a pack-a-day smoker for 40 years. He quit smoking for the day and was "adopted" by a cancer society volunteer.

Actor and former smoker Larry Hagman, star of the television show "Dallas," said the smokeout was the day to just quit lighting up.

"The key to quitting for good is just quitting. There's no tapering off, you just have to go cold-turkey," said Hagman, who is honorary chairman of the observance.

In New York, the cast and crew of Off-Broadway's "Steel Magnolias" went cold turkey.

"It's going to curl some of their hair," teased non-smoker Bobby Grayson, hair designer for the play, which is set in a beauty parlor.

Smokers traded their cigarettes for apples in several cities, including New York, Newark, Conn., and Philadelphia. Non-smokers got apples, too, along with a "Good for you."

Some hard-core New Yorkers eyed the apples suspiciously. Others took them to wives, boyfriends or co-workers who smoke. Some, like Sino Perratore, threw their cigarettes into a waste basket at Rockefeller Plaza.

In Hammond, La., pharmacist Don Fellows Jr. burned four cartons of cigarettes, four boxes of cigars and several boxes of chewing tobacco in a hibachi outside his store.

The burning tobacco was all he had left after deciding several months ago to stop ordering the products and to burn what was left.

"I thought I would make a statement; maybe someone would stop and think and stop smoking cigarettes before it was too late," Fellows said.

A chain of three pharmacies planned a similar tobacco bonfire in Austin, Texas.

In Little Rock, Ark., a 5-foot-tall smoking cigarette was put out with fire extinguishers.

Kentucky leads nation in deaths from smoking

ATLANTA — On the day of the Great American Smokeout, a government report released Thursday shows Kentucky with the nation's highest smoking-related death rate.

Utah has the lowest.

Kentucky reported 176 smoking-related deaths for every 100,000 residents in 1985, the U.S. Centers for Disease Control reported. Utah reported just 45 smoking-related deaths for every 100,000 people over the

course of the year.

Nationwide, smoking killed 314,574 Americans that year.

The report showed Idaho with 959 smoking deaths in 1985 or 961 per 100,000 population.

The worst states, after Kentucky, were West Virginia, with 172 smoking-related deaths per 100,000 people in 1985; Arkansas, 164; Rhode Island, 164; and Florida, 161.

Best on the list, after Utah: Alaska, 54; Hawaii, 77; New Mexico, 85; and Colorado, 94.

Boardinghouse landlady denies killing for checks

SACRAMENTO, Calif. — A landlady suspected of killing seven elderly tenants at her boardinghouse to collect their Social Security money said Thursday she had cashed some checks but was no killer.

Dorothea Montalvo Puente, who vanished Saturday after police unearthed the first body buried in her yard, was arraigned Thursday but did not enter a plea.

Clad in an orange jail jumpsuit, Puente listened quietly as the charge of "one murder count was read and nodded her head to indicate she wanted a public defender to represent her.

Assistant District Attorney Dan Kintzer said additional murder charges and special circumstances would be filed. Special circum-

stances mean the penalty upon conviction could be death or life in prison without possibility of parole.

The case was continued until Dec. 15 and she was ordered held in jail without bail.

Puente, 59, was arrested at a downtown Los Angeles motel late Wednesday after a pensioner she had approached in a bar became suspicious.

Assistant public defenders Kevin Clymo and Peter Vlautin, surrounded by dozens of reporters outside the courtroom, questioned the propriety of an interview Puente gave KCRA-TV while the jet leashed by the station was taking her and police back to Sacramento early Thursday.

"I have not killed anyone. I told you that. I have not killed anyone. The checks I cashed, yes," Puente told KCRA-TV reporter Mike

Boyd.

Boyd said he didn't ask specific questions about the murders, but "only talked with Puente about general subjects. She also told Boyd, 'I used to be a very good person at one time.'"

"It's unheard of that a law enforcement agency would team up with a news organization to transport a person to jail," Vlautin said.

Puente was put on the jet with detectives and the television crew with "no opportunity to talk to anybody who had her interests in mind," Clymo said. "At this time, I do not believe she was given an opportunity to talk to a lawyer (before the flight)."

"Our client denies killing anybody. The true facts will come out in the courtroom," said Vlautin. "The Sacramento Police Department has enlisted the aid of the media to create a

circus atmosphere."

Police Chief John Kearns said he did not learn about the jet arrangements until Thursday morning.

The matronly ex-convict walked away from her boarding house Saturday morning, after the first body was unearthed by officers.

At that time, police said they didn't have enough evidence to detain her. But after the other bodies were discovered, a murder warrant was issued for Puente and a search launched in California, Nevada and Mexico.

Police Chief John Kearns said she apparently went to West Sacramento on Saturday, then took a cab to Stockton, where she boarded a bus for Los Angeles "and has probably been there since that time."

Puente was arrested after CBS television

Judge rejects offers for PTL
COLUMBIA, S.C. (AP) — A U.S. Bankruptcy judge on Thursday rejected two offers for the PTL ministry, ordered bidding to "start from scratch" and said he'd liquidate the evangelical empire if the sale is not completed by Dec. 13.
 "It's either then or nothing," Judge Rufus Reynolds said.
 The judge directed PTL bankruptcy trustee M.C. "Red" Benton to draft guidelines for prospective buyers that incorporate certain conditions he previously set forth.
 The auction Thursday between two Canadian businessmen was expected to close the books on the ministry that Jim and Tammy Baker built before a sex-and-money scandal forced it to seek Chapter 11 bankruptcy protection. Bidding in the

December auction will begin at \$50 million to \$60 million, Benton said, adding he expected one or two more bidders to appear.
Iceland bodybuilder Miss World
LONDON (AP) — An 18-year-old bodybuilder from Iceland won the 38th Miss World beauty contest Thursday.
 Linda Petrusdottir, a 5-foot-7 blonde hotel receptionist, received the \$54,000 prize after a panel of judges selected her from among 84 contestants.
 The first runner-up was Miss Republic of Korea, 22-year-old Yoon-He Choi from Seoul, South Korea. She received a \$3,000 prize.
 — Miss United Kingdom, 17-year-old Kirsty Robertson, was third and received \$1,000.

The new Miss World, who also holds the Miss Iceland title, is a bodybuilder who swims and plays the organ. She said traveling is her life's ambition.
\$10 million in cocaine seized
SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico (AP) — Police on Thursday said they arrested three Dominicans and a Puerto Rican for trying to smuggle \$10 million worth of cocaine from the Dominican Republic.
 Members of a special anti-narcotics squad, the Rapid Action Force, seized a 36-foot luxury yacht containing 138 pounds of cocaine Wednesday night two miles off the western coast of Puerto Rico, said police spokesman Tony Santia-

 was studying another 60 to 80 rivers on its lands. He did not say how many were expected to be recommended for protection.
 Leonard's flight was delayed and he could not be at a news conference sponsored by American Rivers, a conservation group chiefly interested in preserving free-flowing rivers.

The Wild and Scenic River System was established by Congress 20 years ago to preserve free-flowing rivers from damming, development along their banks or other harm. So far only 119 segments totaling 9,200 miles have been protected; of which 44 rivers and 1,428 miles in Oregon were mandated by a bill passed by Congress and signed by President Reagan last month.
 The 9,200 miles are only 0.2 percent of the total U.S. river system. W. Kent Olson, president of American Rivers, said the group estimates that 17 percent of the total has been dammed. "We are quite hopeful that the Wild and Scenic System will quadruple over the next 10 years," he said.
 In President-elect George Bush and Secretary of State-designate James Baker: "We have a fisherman as president and a fisherman as secretary of state and things are looking up," Olson said.

Stewart L. Udall, interior secretary for President Kennedy and Johnson, said he was preparing an open letter to Bush that would say, among other things, "If you are looking for things that don't cost a lot of money, the wild rivers system is certainly a candidate."
 In 1982 the National Park Service identified 1,524 river segments totaling 62,000 miles as worthy of study to see if they met the congressionally-criteria of having "outstandingly remarkable" features. Olson said it might take 50 years to bring that many under protection.

For some years the service has been studying the idea of a "river park," protecting a river along its entire length.
 Deputy Director Denis Galvin said the idea was still being considered for a handful — two or three; rivers but the service had not been able to "put together the right factors to make the proposal acceptable" to all jurisdictions along the lengths of the candidates.
 He identified only one candidate, the Buffalo River in Arkansas.
 While rivers are being studied, the Forest Service and the Bureau of Land Management impose a quarter-mile buffer zone on each bank, where timbering, stock-watering and similar activities are banned.

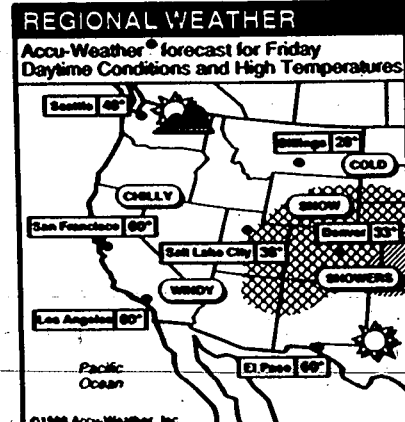
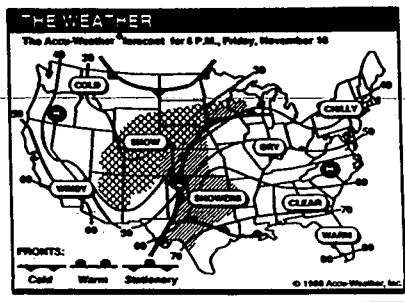

 the Fed charges to make loans to member banks.
 A boost in the discount rate is the most dramatic signal the Fed can send of its intention of driving interest rates higher.
 Higher interest rates make dollar-denominated investments more attractive to foreigners and help relieve the pressure to sell off such assets. Higher interest rates also dampen inflationary pressures brought on by a weaker currency.
 Intervention is the process by which the Federal Reserve or other countries' central banks buy and sell currencies in an attempt to influence the market price.
 The intervention Thursday was begun by the Bank of Japan, which started buying dollars after the U.S. currency fell to near 40-year lows in trading in Tokyo.
 After the initial purchases by the Bank of Japan, currency traders reported that the central banks of the major European allies of the United States bought dollars, followed by buying by the U.S. central bank.

The concerted dollar-buying helped to push the U.S. currency up to 122.70 yen by midday in New York trading. It had closed at 121.52 yen in Tokyo, down 2.02 yen from Wednesday's close of 123.54 yen.

 told Los Angeles police that a viewer called to report meeting her in a downtown bar. She had given the man the name and room number of the motel where she was staying, and police arrested her there a few minutes later.
 "The suspect had struck up a conversation with a male subject in a bar. They had been talking about Social Security," Kearns said. The two went to her nearby motel room and "during the time he was talking to her, he realized it was the murder suspect he had seen on television."
 "She was real cool, real calm. It looked like she almost expected it," Sgt. Paul Von Lutzwang said.
 The man, Charles Willguess, 67, said he became suspicious after Puentes, who called herself Donna Johnson, quizzed him about his Social Security benefits.
 "She seemed so nice and sincere. She really was very believable," Willguess said. "She told me she needed her shoe fixed, and if I knew where I could get that done. That's how our conversation got started."
 Willguess, who receives Social Security and other disability benefits because of two strokes and other ailments, said Puentes asked him where he got his money and then suggested that they share an apartment.
 "She made a whole lot of talk about these checks," Willguess said. "I kept looking at the woman. Something just didn't seem right. I felt like I had seen her before," Willguess added, explaining why he called the television network.
 Los Angeles police searched the motel room but found only three dresses, said Detective Jim Turner.
 The arrest warrant charges Puentes only with the murder of Alvaro Montoya, 52, a tenant missing from her boardinghouse, but police Sgt. Bob Burns earlier called Puentes a suspect in the killing of all seven people buried in her yard. None of the seven have been positively identified.
 The disappearance of Montoya, a mentally disabled transient, led to a counselor with Volunteers of America to contact police, leading to the diggings.

 of the lottery jobs be part of the classified or merit system, Jones said.
 The governor will appoint five Lottery Commission members, who will receive \$38 per day plus expenses for meetings. The governor also will appoint a full-time lottery director, but the director's salary will be set by the commission so Andrus must appoint the commissioners first, Jones said.
 No more than three members of the Lottery Commission can be from the same political party, Jones said.
 One of the first things that must be done is the hiring of a director of lottery, Jones said.
 The legislation authorizes a \$1 million line of credit for lottery start-up costs. It is to be repaid within 18 months at 10 percent interest. Jones said it might not be enough, but did

n't know what would happen if the lottery couldn't start showing a profit within the first \$1 million of spending.
 He said every lottery vendor must go through a background check; employees must be screened; equipment and supplies must be purchased and there will be the expense of advertising and promotion, office space and full-time employees.
 "They're going to have to immediately determine what kind of game they want to run," Jones said. There has been much talk in the state that Idaho is too small to run its own lottery, and the state would be better off joining in a multi-state operation with neighboring states.
 Jones said an "overall game plan" should be adopted quickly, so everyone will know what has to be done to launch the lottery.

Litany of opposition to NPR in Idaho continues during hearings

BOISE (AP) — The litany of opposition continued Thursday to the U.S. Department of Energy's proposal to build a nuclear weapons materials reactor complex at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

Only a handful of the more than 120 people who testified at Boise "soping" hearings Wednesday and Thursday supported locating a proposed New Production Reactor at the eastern Idaho facility.

The \$3.6 billion NPR would produce tritium, a relatively quickly deteriorating hydrogen isotope that officials contend must be replenished periodically in the nation's stockpile of nuclear warheads.

"We have problems in this country that we need to address, but instead we 'make bombs,' said Deaneh Messenger, a Boise student and mother. 'I'd like to propose that we spend more money on people and less money on death.'

But a few people said as long as the Energy Department's studies show the NPR can be built and operated safely at the INEL, it should be built there.

Garth Cates of Boise, executive manager of the Idaho chapter of the National Electrical Contractors Association, said the outcome of the department's draft environmental impact statement was crucial.

"How it will turn out, I can't tell," he said. "But I hope it is favorable for construction of the NPR at the INEL. The positive effects of this undertaking would be tremendous."

The Boise hearings were the third in a series being conducted in 13 cities in Idaho, Washington, Oregon, South Carolina and Georgia.

Most of the testimony at the Twin Falls hearing was in opposition to the NPR, and most at the Idaho Falls hearing supported it.

A draft environmental impact statement is expected to be ready in a year to 18 months.

Besides the INEL, the Department of En-

ergy also has proposed building a second NPR, with a different type of reactor technology, at the Savannah River plant in South Carolina.

Jeanette Gorman of Boise said the money spent on nuclear arms production would be far better used to help people with disabilities and others in need.

The focus of the nation's research effort is "sick, and I think the production of tritium for nuclear warheads is also sick," Mrs. Gorman said.

Alan Leisk, a labor relations consultant from Boise, said his 25 years experience working with unions and management at the

INEL, and the facility's record of safety and productivity, have convinced him it would be an "ideal site" to build the NPR.

But Tom Alibrandi, an author and local radio talk-show host, said the Department of Energy has a long history of covering up its problems and lying about the safety and health risks of its facilities.

He cited evidence of radioactive releases from the Hanford Reservation in Washington and the Fernald plant in Ohio.

"Money to you means more than integrity, or peace, or love, or the power of life as we know it," Alibrandi said. "Make no mistake about it, our government is out of control."

Poor forest management draws fishery loss blame

WASHINGTON — Poor management of Idaho's national forests has caused multi-million dollar damages to valuable fisheries, conservationists said this week.

A report published by the Wilderness Society this week charges the U.S. Forest Service with aggravating the dangerous erosion of forest land by harvesting timber and building roads on sensitive watershed areas.

"Idaho's national forests are prime fish habitat for many important species, such as salmon and various cold-water trout," said H. Michael Anderson, one of the conservationists who compiled the report.

But erosion has polluted the ponds and streams that support Idaho's cold-water fish. Runoff from forested areas settles into spawning beds, choking unhatched fish and their habitat.

The report charges that the Forest Service has ignored state erosion control standards, including storm management in forest areas.

"We felt that it's as misleading as the devil," said Grey Reynolds, the U.S. Forest Service director of watershed, or erosion, management.

"We're the leader in water quality

management," he said. "Most of the research that's done on water management is done by the Forest Service."

Although the report claims that forests across the Pacific Northwest have been damaged by poor forest service management practices, Idaho's forests have suffered the most, Wilderness Society spokesmen said today.

The South Fork Salmon River in Payette National Forest has suffered \$100 million in long-term losses, Anderson said. Water preserves in Clearwater and Nez Perce forests have also been badly affected.

Reynolds said there has been no new timber harvesting on affected areas in the Payette forest. "If we can't manage the land to prevent erosion, we're not going to harvest," he said.

A forest management plan backed by Sen. James McClure, R-Idaho, provides \$8 million in appropriation funds to reduce the sediment-related pollution of the Payette forest's rivers.

But the erosion question is a thorny one, environmentalists say. "Idaho has probably the largest amount of highly erodible land of any state in the northwest," Anderson said.

Reagan signs bill blocking Snake dams

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan signed legislation Thursday prohibiting the construction of hydroelectric dams on stretches of the Snake and Salmon Rivers in Idaho.

In Idaho, the bill will affect 33 miles of the Snake River north of Hells Canyon and 112 miles of the Salmon River upstream from its confluence with the Snake.

Some stretches of the two rivers already are protected from dam-building because they are part of the Wild and Scenic Rivers System, and sponsors of the bill sought to extend this protection to the additional stretches even though they had not been design-

ated part of the system.

The measure also was designed to prohibit the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission from granting a license for a hydroelectric facility on Lake Tobaocsee in Georgia without approval of the governing body of Bibb County.

The president said part of the bill was unconstitutional because it would have given local authorities power to perform "significant authority" pursuant to federal law. As a result, he said, he was signing the bill with the understanding that it simply forbids the licensing of hydroelectric dams on the lake.

Juvenile jail to open Dec. 1

ST. ANTHONY (AP) — A juvenile detention facility in St. Anthony will be ready to take inmates Dec. 1, and area administrators are ironing out the details for the program.

Bonneville County workers met Thursday with officials at the Youth Services Center, which will operate a wing to house the young offenders. The facility will accept juvenile inmates from about 15 eastern Idaho counties. A federal law requires that juvenile inmates be kept out of sight

and sound from adult inmates by Dec. 8.

Counties will receive a monthly bill from the YSC based on a charge of \$79 per day for inmates sent to the jail.

Bonneville County's juvenile inmate load varies, but it generally averages 23 per day, Commissioner Cliff Long said.

Eastern Idaho counties have been sending juveniles to the Fremont County Jail.

Island Park plant receives OK

ASHTON (AP) — The Federal Energy Regulatory Commission has issued a license for Fall River Rural Electric Cooperative to build a hydroelectric generating plant at Island Park Dam.

The license was announced Thursday, clearing the way for the Ashton cooperative to build a 4.8-megawatt generating plant at the dam.

FERC acknowledged in the license report that its action on the proposed plant could represent a conflict with the state's water plan. The Idaho Water Resources Board and state political leaders contend the state has sovereignty over decisions affecting development and use of its water resources. The board opposes any attempt by federal agen-


cies to usurp the state's role.

In this case, the state did not object to the Island Park development, the FERC report said.

Fall River has spent nearly eight years developing the proposal for the Island Park project.

Hodel reopens controversial E. Idaho road

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Interior Secretary Donald Hodel has overturned a lower ruling and has reopened the controversial Egin-Hamer road in eastern Idaho.

Area farmers and ranchers want the 8.5-mile gravel road as an easier route to market. Local sportsmen and the Shoshone-Bannock Tribes maintain opening the road in winter will disrupt valuable elk range.

In response to a request from the tribes and local outdoorsmen, the Interior Board of Land Appeals ordered the road closed in November. But in a letter dated Nov. 8, Hodel reversed the decision.

Hodel told the appeals board unless there is a total lack of evidence to support Bureau of Land Management action approving the road, it should stay open pending consideration of any appeal.

The BLM removed barriers to the road Wednesday, and opened the road across Fremont and Jefferson counties to traffic until Dec. 1.

Economic policy formation may shift back to Bush

WASHINGTON — The financial markets have wasted no time in reminding President-elect George Bush that during the eight-year term of his predecessor, the balance of power in economic policy-making has been shifting away from Washington.

Ronald Reagan didn't have much luck with his early plans to turn over major federal programs and assets to the private sector. But the president may have succeeded, unintentionally, in "privatizing" at least one major government function — the making of national economic policy. Curiously, that shift of power seems to have helped, rather than hurt, the economy over which Reagan presided.

His successor may not be so lucky. All presidents in the modern era have, of course, found their fiscal and monetary tools blunted by the recalcitrance of consumers, companies or foreign powers. But in the Reagan era, with its peculiar blend of loose fiscal policy and tight money, the private markets seem to have usurped an unusual measure of control — and used it, by and large, to good effect.

Last year, for example, Wall Street economist Edward Hyman advanced the idea that the bond market, not the Federal Reserve, now calls the tune for the economy. Bond traders — remembering the costly lessons of the '70s, when high inflation drove effective bond yields into the negative range — are constantly on the alert. At the first sign of overheating, the traders unload holdings, driving bond prices down and interest rates up. If sluggishness is in the air, a quick bond rally cuts interest rates and provides needed stimulus.

The accumulation of several trillion dollars of public and private debt in this country, and the now-close links with foreign debt markets, mean that bondholders can exert more immediate and sensitive countervailing pressure than the once mighty Fed.

Of course, the Federal Reserve Board is still very powerful. Fast action by the Fed helped reverse the direction of the economy at the bottom of the 1982 recession, and kept the economy out of decline after the October 1987 crash.

Moreover, as Brookings Institution economist George Perry points out, the bond market in essence is simply anticipating the central bank's likely response to signs of an economic up- or downturn. You might take

that to mean that the bond market would have to invent the Fed if it did not already exist, if only to provide the rationale for the market's own policy-setting reactions.

Hyman sees no cause for concern in this shift. In a C.J. Lawrence-Morgan Grenfell advisory report last March, he pointed out that the volatility of bond markets has an important stabilizing effect. "The bond market's fear of inflation is very strong. As a result, bond yields rise very sharply as soon as

an economic upturn starts, thereby preventing a 'boom.' Consequently a 'bust' is also prevented." So sensitive have the bond markets become, Hyman avers, that it even is possible that "we may never experience a recession."

Other private market factors also combined to help the Reagan administration beat the odds against the success of its economic policy. Competition from high-quality, low-cost foreign goods, for example, put pressure on U.S. companies to cut costs — and that, in turn, reduced the inflationary response to the administration's free-spending fiscal policies. Better inventory control

techniques reduced one likely source of recessionary pressure.

Some credit, of course, due to public policy. President Carter left his successor the delayed benefits of his deregulation of oil prices and transportation and his choice as Fed chairman of Paul A. Volcker, whose tight-fisted monetary policy finally tamed inflation.

And the Reagan administration gave private markets important assists. The president's firing of the striking air traffic controllers, for example, sent a strong signal for wage moderation; his personal popularity made it easier for the Fed to ride out the

double-digit unemployment of the 1982 recession; and his reaffirmation of U.S. power helped attract the foreign capital needed to sustain huge budget deficits without triggering the soaring inflation and interest rates that conventional economics predicted.

Even when the huge trade deficits finally drove the dollar sharply down, didn't materialize, for reasons that owe much to the new strength and flexibility in the market-places.

So you might say that private markets and good fortune have conspired to protect the Reagan administration — and the country — from its mishandling of economic affairs. Can George Bush hope for a similar dispensation?

The financial markets, having helped to put him in office, have already signaled some lack of respect for the president-elect. Still, economist Perry points out, that's not necessarily bad as long as things don't get out of hand. Another 15 percent or so decline in the dollar seems to be needed for any further progress against the still huge trade deficit: If Bush gets it out of the way early in his term, he might be able to coast through on the strength of consumer demand buoyed by steady, if modest, gains in income and employment.

But stopping the dollar at the right spot — and keeping its decline from translating into a job in inflation, more likely now that foreign profit margins have been squeezed — may not be easy. The Fed might want to tighten up to keep inflation in check. But remember that volatile bond market, more jittery than ever as massive leveraging increases the vulnerability of U.S. companies to rising interest rates.

Bond holders aren't sentimental, Kenichi Ohmae of McKinsey & Co.'s Tokyo office points out. Foreign bond holders, as well as those in the United States, might start moving their money abroad in a big way, battering the dollar and pushing interest rates up. That could trigger a recession. A president might want to fight that with a little extra federal spending — except that the budget deficit is already so big as to scare those powerful financial markets.

It's enough to make a president wish that the reins of economic policy were back in public hands.

DOE should take responsibility for promoting safety

WASHINGTON — During the past several weeks, our nation's nuclear weapons complex has been subjected to an avalanche of negative attention.

But the safety problems that have emerged are, for the most part, not new. Investigations by congressional committees and the General Accounting Office have been pointing them out for years. Apparently, no one was listening.

Two factors seem to be responsible for this dramatic increase in attention. Both touch on lessons this nation must learn if it is serious about reforming its weapons production process and avoiding similar crises in the future.

One factor involves the operating status of our production facilities; the other, the Department of Energy's new public candor.

Several vital facilities for the nuclear weapons production process are now shut down, and, as a result, the United States can't produce tritium, an important component of nuclear weapons.

For years, Department of Energy officials and their contractors ignored, minimized and even covered up problems. They worried that production would be impeded if resources

were diverted from production to safety and environmental corrective actions.

Ironically, this production-first, safety-second mind set ultimately has undermined our production capacity and national security — the very things DOE officials and contractors were attempting to avoid.

What we must learn from this is that national security and safety are not mutually exclusive. National security is dependent upon our weapons production capability, and our weapons production capability is dependent upon safe and reliable facility operations.

I and a number of my colleagues recently wrote President Reagan, urging him to take steps to restore public confidence in our production program, ensure protection of plant workers and local communities and secure our nuclear weapons production capability.

We called upon the Advisory Committee on Nuclear Facility Safety to verify that, before a restart of the nuclear reactors, the DOE's safety upgrade program at the Savannah

River Plant ensures adequate protection for public health and safety.

The department has announced its intention to restart production at Savannah River before the end of this year. Can it implement the safety improvements by then? I don't know. Congress doesn't know; the president doesn't know and the Department of Energy doesn't know.

But the real issue is not what deadlines the department sets, but what its priorities are. If the department makes a good-faith effort to allow as much time for safety improvements as possible without threatening the national security, it will show that its priorities are becoming more balanced.

If, however, it uses a claim of national security to once again pull a veil of secrecy around its operations and avoids making hard choices on safety, the credibility of its production program will be further damaged, and its manufacturing reliability will continue to be suspect.

Public attention also has focused on this issue because the Department of Energy, engaging in its own version of glasnost, has for the first time admitted the breadth and seri-

ousness of problems at its facilities.

It also has promised to improve conditions. And while that promise is commendable, we must recognize that DOE is reacting to crises rather than preventing them.

The troubles at Savannah River and Rocky Flats are symptoms of deeper problems within the production system. Hearings and reports of congressional committees indicate that the DOE has relinquished its authority and operational control of its facilities to its contractors.

Its field and operations offices lack the technical expertise and the willingness to direct and oversee activities at their facilities. Contractors contend that they are directed by DOE guidelines. However, the department currently exempts them from liability and accountability and even goes to court to shield them.

In many instances, contractors with poor environmental and safety records continue to be financially rewarded. In such a system, no one is responsible, and no one is accountable. This is anarchy.

DOE must make fundamental changes. Major management restructuring is needed.

The department needs the technical expertise to control and oversee its own facilities. Furthermore, it must ensure that responsibility and accountability for environmental and safety issues are institutionalized and not dependent on the dedication of a few individuals.

These are key issues, and until they are resolved, the safety and reliability of our nation's nuclear weapons production process will continue to be at risk.

That is why, in our letter to the president, my colleagues and I asked that he direct the DOE to develop, within 90 days, a plan to put it back in control of its facilities, establish clear lines of authority and communication and firmly identify who is responsible for safety and health activities.

In short, DOE's top management must seize control of the situation and enforce the attitude that environmental, safety and health are as much a part of their mission as production.

proud of their legislators, and I would like to personally thank Rep. Doug Jones of District 23 for acting as co-chairman and Rep. Ron Black of District 23, and Sen. Laird Noh of District 23 for all the homework and preparation that went into their decisions.

DOE botched up NPR hearings

The passage of time hasn't helped. My hope is that in sharing this letter with you, it will be cathartic for me and an eye opener for others.

My husband and I signed up (before the cutoff date) to speak at the NPR Scoping hearings held in Twin Falls last week. We signed up to speak on Thursday, the first day of the two day hearing. Thursday was convenient for us due to our work schedules.

A couple of days before the hearing Mr. Peter Dirksen, Department of Energy representative from Idaho Falls, called me. He informed me that due to the large number of

people who signed up to speak, my husband and I were rescheduled from Thursday to Friday afternoon and were to be the 38th and 47th speakers of that session.

He told me not to worry if we could not get there on time because when they got to the end of the scheduled speakers they would go over the list again, so everyone would have an opportunity to speak.

My work schedule would not allow me to attend the afternoon session but I hoped to attend Friday evening. My husband, however, took time off work and went to testify at 1:30 Friday afternoon. He found the door closed and a note on the door stating that the hearings closed at 11 a.m. that morning. The reason? — lack of speakers. The sign advised him that if he wished to testify he would have to go to the Pocatello hearings.

These hearings are planned and conducted by the DOE. This particular hearing was mismanaged.

Was this really mismanagement or a subtle manipulation to keep anti-NPR numbers low?

Was this situation legal? If it was legal, it certainly was not ethical.

The reputation of the DOE has sunk lower and lower in the last few years. It's a huge dragon whose head doesn't know what its tail is doing.

If the DOE cannot even handle a small public hearing in Twin Falls, then don't speak to me of building and managing a huge and very dangerous project in Idaho, or for that matter, anywhere else.

I've got your number, DOE, and it scares me to death!

Scientists criticize 'Stealth' bomber

Knight-Ridder Service

WASHINGTON — On the eve of its public unveiling, critics of the Pentagon's B-2 "Stealth" bomber said Thursday that the new plane won't be able to accomplish its key mission of hunting down Soviet mobile missile launchers and could cost up to \$850 million each, three times more than the new B-1 bomber.

Officials of the Federation of American Scientists and the Union of Concerned Scientists told reporters that the B-2, slated to be seen in public for the first time next Tuesday, should be scrapped and replaced with cheaper cruise missiles.

"The Stealth budget has reportedly assumed 'Star Wars' proportions.... Congress should ask some hard

questions about the Stealth's mission and effectiveness before it approves full-scale production," said Charles Mozfort, Washington director of the Union of Concerned Scientists.

John Pike, the Federation of American Scientists' associate director for space policy, said the 132 B-2 bombers, to be built by Northrop Corp. between 1989 and 1997, could cost \$110 billion to produce.

That works out to \$850 million for each plane — slightly less than the \$950 million per plane the B-2 would cost if it were built entirely of gold, at its current price of \$424 per ounce, he said.

"The Stealth bomber is not simply going to be a gold-plated weapon but will cost as much as if it were made of solid gold," Pike said.

Police find missing car with 4 bodies

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (AP) — A car belonging to four young adults missing since Saturday was found in a river Thursday with four bodies in it, police and witnesses said.

Identities of the victims were not immediately released and the cause of the deaths was not immediately apparent.

The car approached an open swing bridge and went into the water over a concrete barrier blocking the road, way, said Lt. James Sorrentino, a city spokesman. Others said the bridge, which swings from side to side, had been in an open position for several years.

Police divers at the scene said they had found four bodies in the car. Sorrentino refused to confirm that.

The discovery came four days after

three women and one man, ages 19 and 20, all of East Lyme, disappeared after drinking illegally at a bar near Yale University early Sunday morning, said state police Detective Andrew Trudelle.

The missing adults were: Jill Sawyer, 19, a student at the University of Rhode Island; Christy Stevens, 19, a student at Mohegan Community College in Norwich; Michael Gallo, 20, a student at Southern Connecticut; and Laura La-groterria, 19.

Reagan softens stance on subsidies

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan, seeking to give new impetus to international trade negotiations, announced Thursday he is dropping a demand that other countries join the United States in phasing out agricultural subsidies by the year 2000.

An eventual elimination of government interventions into farm markets remains the American goal, Reagan said in a speech to the U.S. Chamber of Commerce.

But he acknowledged that talks under the auspices of the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade

have bogged down, at least in part, because of the U.S. demand for a fixed deadline for getting governments out of the business of subsidizing their agricultural economies.

Reagan failed, at the seven-nation economic summit in Toronto at the end of May, to persuade principal U.S. trade partners to endorse such a timetable, which has been criticized heatedly by the European Economic Community and Japan.

On Tuesday, U.S. Trade Representative Clayton Yentter announced a new U.S. proposal to be taken up at the mid-term review of the Uruguay

Round of talks under GATT. The proposal called for a freeze on all farm price supports, subsidies and trade barriers in the next two years, but made no mention of an end-of-century deadline for phasing subsidies out.

Noting the coming mid-term review in Montreal, the president said, "You might say that in Montreal, we'll be ready to talk turkey, and wheat and sorghum and whatever."

"We have been told that the truck of agricultural trade talks is stuck in the potholes of rigid timetables and food security," he added.

U.S. bishops decry persecution in U.S.S.R.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The nation's Roman Catholic bishops said Thursday the U.S. government could help fight "sustained and comprehensive" religious persecution in the Soviet bloc by linking that issue to others the Soviets care about.

In a lengthy document, the bishops detailed what they saw as religious intolerance and discrimination in the nations of Eastern Europe, but they also suggested the time may be right to win improvement.

State reliance on federal aid at 20-year low

WASHINGTON (AP) — State and local government reliance on federal aid last year sank to its lowest level in more than 20 years, the Census Bureau said Thursday.

From a high of 18.7 cents per dollar of state and local government revenue in 1978, the federal contribution withered to 13.6 cents in 1987. It was the lowest since 1966, when Lyndon Johnson was gearing up the Great Society programs and the federal contribution was 13.5 cents per dollar.

Total federal aid actually has risen throughout the period — from \$70 billion in 1978 to \$113 billion in 1986 to \$115 billion in 1987. But it is increasing at a slower rate than other state and local government revenues.

While the federal contribution grew at an average of 5.7 percent a year from 1978 to 1987, the amount raised by state and local taxes grew an average of 8.5 percent a year.

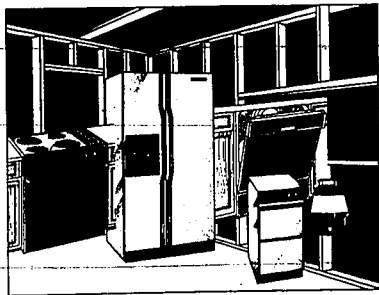

Bush picks Sununu as staff chief, Atwater to direct GOP

WASHINGTON (AP) — President-elect George Bush on Thursday named New Hampshire Gov. John Sununu as White House chief of staff and tapped wily campaign strategist Lee Atwater as chairman of the Republican National Committee.

Bush's selection of Sununu as his top White House adviser prompted the resignation, effective in January, of long-time aide Craig Fuller, who said he had told Bush he was "eager" for the job.

Bush said he would like Fuller, co-chairman of the transition team and his chief of staff since 1985, to consider a role in his administration but that he chose Sununu because he was the "right man for the job."

"John Sununu has the background and experience necessary to work not only with his former colleagues in the nation's statehouses but also to build a constructive relationship with the U.S. Congress," he said.

Sununu, the first Washington outsider to be named by Bush, will bring "a refreshing new perspective" to the job, the president-elect said.

Atwater will succeed Frank Fahrenkopf Jr., who announced months ago that he would relinquish the GOP chairmanship at the end of President Reagan's term and return to Nevada to practice law.

Bush said Atwater's function will be "winning elections." While Republicans have won the presidency in five of the last six elections, they have been less successful at the congressional level, where Democrats hold comfortable majorities.

"I'm a nuts-and-bolts politician," Atwater said. "I will be extremely campaign oriented."

Bush made the announcements after meeting over breakfast with British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher and his customary weekly lunch with Reagan.

Both Sununu and Atwater share reputations as adept players of political hardball.

Atwater is considered a master of negative campaigning, and was an architect of the strategy that helped Bush wipe out a 17-point poll lead by Democrat Michael Dukakis and

romp to a 40-state victory in the presidential race.

Sununu, 49, an engineer by training and a former Tufts University professor, has no previous experience in Washington. He has a reputation for being a quick study, highly intelligent and assertive. Some also regard him as arrogant and abrasive, traits that could hurt him in working with Congress.

Sununu made light of that reputation Thursday.

"I'm a pussycat," Sununu said. "Let me tell you about Washington. Certainly I have a lot to learn in regard to the details. I think I'm a quick learner. I consider a great number of congressmen to be close friends, both Democratic and Republican."

Jewish lobbyists have criticized the New Hampshire governor for being the only governor to refuse to endorse a proclamation attacking a 1975 U.N. resolution that equated Zionism with racism.

"I'm very sensitive to that issue," said Sununu.

TB outbreak threatens 250

ENTERPRISE, Miss. (AP) — At least 250 students in the Enterprise School District should receive preventive medication for tuberculosis because of their contact with a senior who has the respiratory disease, officials said.

Dr. Margaret Morrison, state health officer for the east Mississippi area, said the disease may have spread because the unidentified student, who is hospitalized, had attended school for some time before he sought medical treatment.

Morrison said the faculty and all 800 students in the rural district's two schools were tested for TB.

FCC opens phone nets

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Federal Communications Commission took a major step Thursday toward making advanced telephone services such as voice mail and computer gateways available on a wide scale to average consumers.

The commission's action moves toward opening the phone networks so that connections and circuits will be available on an equal basis to competing companies that want to provide advanced phone services.

Competition, the commission says, will result in lower prices and more choices for consumers, as long as the Bell companies are not allowed to use their control of the local phone networks to put competitors at a disadvantage.

Open Network Architecture, as the plan is called, "will pass along to average residential consumers the ability to patronize the fruits of the information age," said FCC Chairman Dennis R. Patrick.

The three sitting commissioners voted unanimously to approve the Bell companies' plans in substantial part but to require revisions in specified areas, in part to ensure greater uniformity among their separate plans. The FCC also approved American Telephone & Telegraph Co.'s plan in total.

Many of the enhanced services dealt with in the plans are already available on a limited scale.

Fatal fumigation nets firm big fine

ROANOKE, Va. (AP) — A federal judge fined Orkin Exterminating Co. \$500,000 for a fumigation that killed a couple, and he said safety practices at the nation's biggest pest-control service were "teary" in their laxity.

Judge James Turk convicted Orkin in August of failing to monitor the air before letting Hubert and Freida Watson back into their Galax home in 1986.

Turk on Wednesday imposed the maximum fine but said Orkin will have to pay only \$350,000 if it stays out of trouble during two years of corporate probation.

Turk also said officers of the company must perform 2,000 hours of community service. The corporation was the only defendant in the case.

"It's nothing short of scary the way the company was handling its business," he said.

Relatives of the victims declined comment as they left the courtroom.

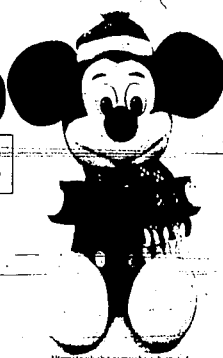

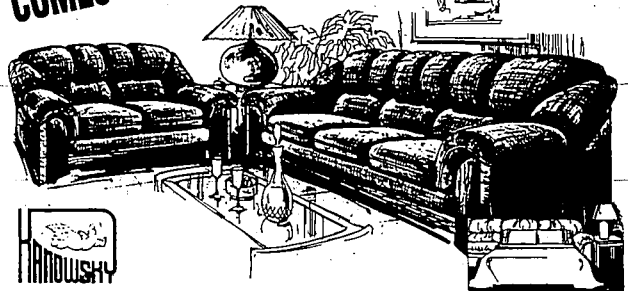

After 10 years, charred poles only trace of Jonestown remaining

GEORGETOWN, Guyana (AP) — Three charred poles rising from a thicket are all that remain of the jungle pavilion where the Rev. Jim Jones led more than 900 Americans to their death in a macabre ritual 10 years ago.

The Jonestown suicide-massacre still haunts this impoverished land of 780,000 on the northern coast of South America, and its image abroad may be permanently tainted by one of history's most bizarre disasters.

Once you leave the shores of Guyana, that's the first thing you have to face," said Alice Thomas, an editor for the independent newspaper "Starbrook News." Guyana and Jonestown go together.

Many Guyanese regard Jones' San Fran-

cisco-based Peoples Temple as an American aberration that had nothing to do with Guyana other than its location. Successive governments have disassociated themselves from the affair.

"It's really hard for us to explain what motivated 900 Americans to take their lives," said Patrick Denny, a government spokesman. "If the media didn't show any interest, we wouldn't have remembered that it was 10 years" since the tragedy.

But Capt. Gerry Gouviea, 32, clearly recalls the carnage wrought by Jones on Nov. 18, 1978, when the cult leader urged his disciples to drink grape-flavored punch laced with "potassium cyanide." Most were poisoned, some forcibly. Some were shot by security guards.

In all, 913 people, including Jones, died. He was found with a bullet wound in the head. It is not known whether he was shot or committed suicide.

A second lieutenant in Guyana's air force at the time, Gouviea went in a few days later to help recover bodies for burial in the United States. Most lay at the roofed pavilion where Jones held communal meetings and twice-monthly suicide drills known as "White Nights."

"The magnitude of the thing was so great that you were hoping it was going to just rewind (like a video) and everybody was going to get up and everything was going to be all right," Gouviea said.

"I remember looking at the children and feeling pity and wondering who were the adults who did this thing."

The massacre occurred hours after Rep. Leo Ryan, D-Calif., three newsmen and a Temple defector were shot to death in an ambush at nearby Port Kaituma airstrip. Eleven people, including Richard Dwyer, a U.S. diplomat in Guyana, were wounded.

Ryan had flown to Guyana to investigate reports that Jones was abusing his followers. Jonestown ranged over 300 acres carved from dense tropical rain forest 140 miles from Georgetown, the capital. Dozens of cottages, workshops and dormitories sat in tidy rows.

Pursuing the ideals of socialism and racial

harmony, Jones and his 900 or so disciples — 70 percent of them black, 25 percent white and the rest mulatto, Hispanic, American Indian and Asian — cultivated a citrus grove and vegetable garden, raised chickens and pigs, made their own shoes, educated their children, and cared for the old and sick.

Now, Jonestown has all but vanished, stripped by villagers and consumed by a fire a few years ago.

Larry Layton, the only Temple member charged in connection with Ryan's killing, was sentenced to life imprisonment in 1987. He was convicted by a federal court in San Francisco of conspiracy, aiding and abetting in Ryan's death, and attempted murder in the wounding of Dwyer.

Estonians declare right to veto laws

MOSCOW (AP) — The Kremlin on Thursday summoned the leaders of Estonia to Moscow and expressed serious doubt about the constitutionality of the tiny Baltic republic's unprecedented challenge to its authority.

Residents of a second-Baltic-republic, Lithuania, gathered outside their parliament building with banners and flags, and watched on live television as their legislators convened a session at which they will debate a similar challenge.

The Estonian Supreme Soviet, or parliament, on Wednesday overwhelmingly passed a constitutional amendment requiring Estonian approval of any new Soviet law.

The legislators also approved a "declaration of sovereignty" that declares the republic's independence in all areas except defense and foreign affairs.

The Estonian parliament's action, under the banner of President Mikhail S. Gorbachev's reform effort, nevertheless was a challenge to Kremlin authority that threatened to spread to other areas and a sign of Gorbachev's continuing serious problems with rising ethnic feelings.

Walesa to debate trade union official on TV

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — Solidarity leader Lech Walesa has agreed to a Nov. 30 nationally televised debate with the chairman of the official All-Poland Alliance of Trade Unions, the official media reported Thursday.

A Solidarity spokesman later confirmed that the date was acceptable to Walesa, but the banned union considered the arrangements tentative.

In another development, 51 people

ended a hunger strike in the southern city of Katowice after winning the reinstatement of the last of about 100 miners dismissed in August for striking. The decision clears away one of the major obstacles blocking promised talks between authorities and the opposition.

Alfred Kiedowicz, a member of the ruling Poliburo in addition to being leader of the official union alliance

known by its Polish initials OPZZ, had challenged Walesa to a debate Tuesday in the Communist Party daily Trybuna Ludu.

Polish radio announced the debate should take place after the evening news Nov. 30. The state-run news agency PAP later carried an identical report.

Walesa on Tuesday agreed in principle for a televised debate on union

issues.

It would be Walesa's first appearance on state TV since 1983, when he challenged then-Deputy Prime Minister Mieczyslaw P. Rakowski during a televised speech at the Lenin Shipyard in Gdansk. Rakowski became Poland's prime minister in September.

Attempts to reach Walesa for comment were not successful. His wife said he was not at his Gdansk home.

Bhutto's populist party defeats right wing in Pakistani elections

KARACHI, Pakistan (AP) — Benazir Bhutto's populist party defeated the right wing in the first free election since a coup ousted her father 11 years ago, and she expressed confidence Thursday that she can form a majority coalition.

Bhutto said her Pakistan People's Party "has emerged as the largest single party" in the National Assembly as a result of Wednesday's parliamentary election.

Given consultations with different groups and independent people, we are confident that we can get a sim-

ple majority," the 35-year-old politician declared after arriving in this southern city for coalition talks. She would be the first woman to lead a Moslem nation.

Her party captured 92 seats in the 237-member assembly, compared with 55 for the nine-party conservative Islamic Democratic Alliance. The alliance includes supporters of Gen. Mohammed Zia ul-Haq, the military president, killed in a plane crash three months ago.

Independents and minor parties got 57 seats.

South, North Korea progress toward parliamentary talks

PANMUNJOM, Korea (AP) — Officials from South Korea and North Korea held progress Thursday in efforts to hold parliamentary talks on peace measures on the peninsula, including a declaration of non-aggression.

The progress raised hopes that the rival states would be able to begin major political negotiations next year.

"There was big progress today and I myself was surprised (at it)," chief South Korean delegate Park Joon-kyu said after the meeting at this

truce village of Panmunjom, 35 miles north of Seoul.

Park's North Korean counterpart, Chon Kum Chol, also noted the progress and said, "The meeting achieved progress, and I hope we will be able to come to a complete agree-

ment before the end of this year."

Park, heading the five-member South Korean team, said the two sides could solve all pending issues, including an agenda, when they meet for a seventh round of talks at this village Dec. 15.

The progress came as a surprise because all past talks on the subject ended in deadlock with neither side willing to make major concessions. The last meeting here on Oct. 13 broke up over basic and procedural matters.

The meeting Thursday was the sixth session since mid-August on trying to set the terms for full-scale talks between the two nations' parliaments on non-aggression, economic and humanitarian negotiations.

Israelis wound 27 Palestinians

JERUSALEM (AP) — Israeli soldiers wounded at least 27 Palestinians during street battles in the occupied lands Thursday, including a 9-year-old boy and 14-year-old girl who were in critical condition, hospital officials reported.

The army eased curfews and other restrictions imposed in an effort to curtail violence and celebration connected with Tuesday's proclamation by the PLO of an independent Palestinian state.

More than 7,000 Palestinians have been wounded since the uprising against Israeli occupation began nearly a year ago in the West Bank and Gaza Strip, which Israel captured from Jordan and Egypt in 1967. Eleven Israelis and at least 313 Palestinians have been killed.

Hospital officials reported at least four people seriously wounded in confrontations.

U.N. sends food to refugees
ROME (AP) — The U.N. Food and Agriculture Organization said Thursday that it would send \$25 million in food to refugees in Algeria, Pakistan, Sudan and Tanzania.

The largest part, a shipment worth \$19 million, was to go to refugees of the Afghanistan conflict who are in Pakistan.

The rest was to be divided among 176,600 Ethiopian, Chadian and Ugandan refugees in Sudan, 10,500 refugees from Mozambique in Tanzania, and 80,000 refugees in Algeria.

The anti-war ballad of the Vietnam era tells of the 41-year-old songwriter's Thanksgiving Day arrest for littering.

The song has been updated with Guthrie's comments on historical

events since the 1965 arrest that kept him out of the draft because of his conviction on the littering charge, said Sharon Palma, manager of Guthrie's label Rising Son Records.

"The funniest is that he hints at the coincidence that the only things that are 18 minutes and 20 seconds long are the song and the erased Nixon tapes," Palma said Thursday from the folk singer's studio in this small Berkshire Hills town.

'Kudzu' creator looks at issues in strip

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Doug Marlette, Pulitzer Prize-winning editorial cartoonist and creator of the comic strip "Kudzu," says he doesn't set out to include politics in the strip.

"But I like looking at the bigger issues confronting our society," he said Wednesday at a book-signing to promote his book, "I Am Not a Televangelist."

"I'm less interested in the daily ebb and flow than in the life and death

issues, and that may shade over into the political," said Marlette, editorial cartoonist for the Atlanta Constitution.

In "Kudzu," the bumbling Rev. Will B. Dunn just ran for president. Marlette said other "Kudzu" characters will appear more frequently now that the campaign is over.

Radio personality sued by 2 Canadians

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Radio and TV personality Gary Owens, who went into diabetic shock while behind the wheel of his car and struck another vehicle, is being sued by two Canadians injured in the crash.

The Superior Court suit filed Monday seeks \$50,000 in damages.

Owens collided with a vehicle Sept. 16 being driven by Norman Page of Montreal.

The suit contends Page and his passenger, Kimberly Campbell, suffered permanent disabilities, said Page's attorney, William Rehwald.

Page suffered a broken leg and Ms. Campbell suffered a broken shoulder, Rehwald said.

Owens is probably best-known to national TV audiences as the "Laugh-In" announcer who cupped his hands to his ear and put "beautiful downtown Burbank" on the map.

Koo Stark plans suit against newspaper

LONDON (AP) — A lawyer representing American actress Koo Stark, a former girlfriend of Prince Andrew, said Thursday she plans to proceed with a libel case against London's Daily Mirror.

It will be the second legal action taken by Miss Stark, 32, against publisher Robert Maxwell's newspapers.

Earlier this month, Miss Stark was awarded \$549,000 libel damages in the High Court from the Sunday People newspaper over a story that she had an affair with the prince after her marriage.

"So far as we are aware, an action will take place in the High Court on Monday," said Miss Stark's lawyer, Keith Schilling.

Miss Stark said the allegations about a continuing relationship with the prince were published in December 1985 when she was having marital problems, and dashed her hopes of reconciling with her husband, Timothy Jeffries.

Lawsuit against singer Billy Idol settled

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — A \$765,000 lawsuit against rock singer Billy Idol was settled out of court for an undisclosed sum.

Five people filed the circuit court lawsuit following a May 13, 1987, rock concert at Portland Memorial Coliseum during which fans rushed the stage after Idol said, "I feel lonely

up here."

The remark prompted a disturbance as fans rushed a barricade and knocked a number of people to the ground.

The plaintiffs said they were sitting in seats in front when Idol made his remark and the crowd behind them surged forward. As a result, the plaintiffs alleged, they sustained various physical injuries and emotional distress.

Hospital Board makes no decision concerning buildings

TWIN FALLS — The county Hospital Board has not decided the fate of four old buildings on the hospital grounds, newly released minutes of two meetings held last week indicate.

"No decision to tear the buildings down has been made," said John Bingham, Magic Valley Regional Medical Center administrator.

He said that the board, which consists

of volunteers from the community, has been discussing the hospital's future needs for about a year.

"Health care is shifting to the outpatient market," Bingham said, "and the board's concern was, is the hospital physically positioned to go into the outpatient market?"

Described as "tentative," a proposed master site plan presented to the Hospital Board at its Nov. 7 meeting depicts a "medical office building" where four old buildings now stand: the old hospital

structure, which has already been condemned; a building next to it that houses the Magic Valley Teen Parent program; a building that contains the county's planning and zoning offices; and a maintenance shop building.

The plan was not approved by the board.

"It was further moved that administration discuss with medical staff the feasibility of a medical office building on the campus for consideration by the board and that further research be conducted

on the feasibility of utilizing and preserving the old nurses home building as outlined in the county commissioners' letter of November 7, 1988," the minutes say.

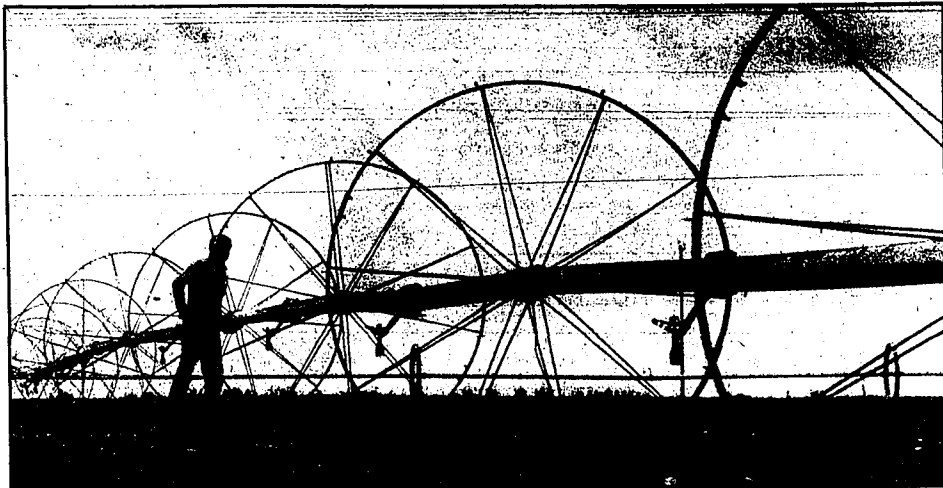
The minutes were released Thursday.

The site plan prompted a letter from Twin Falls County commissioners requesting that the building once used to house nurses be preserved and that the hospital provide substitute facilities for county offices that would be forced to

move. In August, the board approved a \$121,000 contract with the architecture firm Earl Swenson Associates of Nashville, Tenn., through the Hospital Corporation of America, to study access to service, parking and traffic flow.

The board requested that its executive committee, the elected officers of the Hospital Board, work with the architects on a master site plan.

Bingham said the proposed building could house medical offices or physicians offices.

Judge considers motion to make suit class action

SALT LAKE CITY — A federal judge is considering a move that could add more than 150 plaintiffs to a lawsuit against Amalgamated Sugar Co. over a 1986 pension-plan manipulation.

Federal District Judge J. Thomas Green has under advisement a motion by four retirees who sued the company one year ago. The four men, including one from Twin Falls, have asked Green to declare their lawsuit a class action.

If the judge agrees, plaintiffs attorneys say they will gain access to records they need to prove Amalgamated improperly took money from a pension plan.

Amalgamated and its owner, Texas businessman Harold Simmons, have opposed the motion.

"They fought it," said Claudia Berry, one of the Salt Lake attorneys handling the suit for the retirees. "I guess I shouldn't have been surprised — they've fought everything so far."

Berry said the judge asked for more information after a recent hearing. She turned the information in early this week, and a clerk in Green's office said the judge hadn't decided on the motion Thursday.

"That's probably the only way we can get all the information on all these employees," Berry said. As a general rule, parties to a lawsuit can only discover through pre-trial motions information specifically dealing with other parties.

Higginson: Water rights claims progressing well

TWIN FALLS — The state already has received about one-tenth of the water rights claims it expects in the Snake River Basin Adjudication.

"It's proceeding very well," said R. Keith Higginson, director of Idaho's Department of Water Resources, speaking at a Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce leadership seminar Thursday.

The state has received 16,383

claims in the adjudication that will involve 38 of Idaho's 44 counties and more than 140,000 water rights claims.

In Twin Falls County, 33,475 notices to file claims have been sent out in two batches. The filing deadlines are Dec. 22 for the first mailing and Jan. 11 for the second. Help is available to complete the claim by contacting the local Water Resources office. Higginson advised making an appointment to avoid standing in long lines that have plagued most of

files processing the claims.

The department also is proposing workshops to help people 50 at a time instead of one on one in a busy office, Higginson said.

The adjudication, probably the largest water rights adjudication anywhere, is an important part of the historic Swan Falls agreement, Higginson said. The agreement between Idaho Power Co. and the state of Idaho grew out of a lawsuit by power company ratepayers.

The ratepayers filed suit in 1977

claiming the company was not protecting its water rights for power generation by failing to protect upstream developments that could reduce the flow at Swan Falls Dam. Idaho Power has an established right to 8,400 cubic feet of water per second at the Swan Falls Dam.

During most years the flow is more than 8,400 cfs except during July and August, Higginson said. During a dry year, the flow can be

Advisory panel to identify library needs

TWIN FALLS — A 32-member library panel could recommend expansion at the present site, renovation of a donated downtown building or construction of a new building.

Or it could suggest that the city be content with the space it has and do nothing, said Library Director Arlan Call at a Thursday meeting of the city's Library Expansion Advisory Panel.

The panel will identify, compare and evaluate alternatives for meeting future library needs.

"We need to go out in the community and talk and listen and talk and listen," said board member Dennis Voorhees. "I think we can get a good idea of what this community wants."

Panel members were given an overview of the library's growth history, its goals in serving the public and possible plans to meet the goals.

Anne Miles, library board member, said through use analysis and primary surveys, the library has identified its four primary roles: a popular materials library, an independent learning center, a reference library and a pre-schoolers center.

Voorhees said the panel will use as a guideline a 97-page report completed this year by Library Planning Associates Inc., which analyzed library space requirements and rated by desirability the options for meeting those requirements.

"The library has reached a point where its facility, built in 1939 and added onto in 1973-74, is seriously limiting its options for growth," LPA said in the report that took six months to complete and cost \$5,600.

The consulting group recommended that the city double its current size by building a new 40,600-square-foot library northeast of town, at a cost of up to \$4 million.

"We don't take that as the last word," Call said.

But much of the information in the LPA report should be carefully considered, he said.

Another important factor is that in 1984 the city purchased the old Reformed Church of Twin Falls chapel for \$108,000 for parking and future expansion of the library, said David Mead, a former board member now on the advisory panel.

Drug traffic suspects free on bail

GOODING — A pair of drug traffic suspects are free on bail after each posted \$10,000 in cash.

A Jan. 13 preliminary hearing date has been set for James Ginella, 29, and Teresa Lee, 27. They were charged with drug possession after police found what they suspect to be \$61,000 worth of crack cocaine in the pair's 1966 Ford pickup.

Ginella and Lee have hired Stephen R. McCaughey, a Salt Lake City attorney, and J. Dee May of Twin Falls for their defense. They posted bail Thursday and are free until the hearing.

According to law enforcement officers, Ginella was driving east on U.S. Interstate 84 near Tuttle when police officers stopped him on a routine traffic stop. The Idaho State Police officers notified narcotics officers who obtained a search warrant for the pickup.

Officials found about one pound of what they believe to be crack cocaine inside a luggage case. If the substance is crack, or smoking cocaine, it would be worth about \$61,000.

Ginella and Lee were charged with possession of cocaine with the intent to sell. Ginella was also charged with driving without a license and failing to carry proof of liability insurance.

BLM grants right-of-way for power line

SHOSHONE — A new right-of-way for the Silver-Hailey power line has been granted by the Bureau of Land Management. The BLM approved a proposal by Idaho Power to amend a section of the 138-kilovolt transmission line right-of-way. The original right-of-way ran along the southern base of the hills north of Picabo and east of Silver Creek.

The new location "is east of the original route, primarily along the north slope of the hills below the ridge line," said Steve Ellis, BLM monument resource area manager. The line will be visually screened from most of the Silver Creek valley area except where it climbs over the hills near North Queen's Crown.

To avoid impact on soils and wildlife, the BLM will limit road building associated with the project and will require the construction team in a crucial winter range. Construction methods will use a helicopter in some areas to reduce impact on soil.

The new right-of-way avoids golden eagle and American kestrel nesting areas, and the line's design will minimize raptor electrocution.

Eyrie Summit timber sale on market

TWIN FALLS — The Forest Service reports the Eyrie Summit timber sale is on the market again.

Because of a defaulted timber contract, the 29-acre Eyrie Summit site is up for sale again. Located within Sections 15 and 16, about 3.3 miles east of Sublett, this sale contains about 234,000 board feet of Douglas fir.

Prospective bidders may contact the district ranger, Burley Ranger District or the forest supervisor, Sawtooth National Forest in Twin Falls for information and maps of the sale area.

Sharkeys listed in stable condition

TWIN FALLS — A Twin Falls couple injured Saturday in a plane accident near Arizona's Grand Canyon was listed in stable condition Thursday, hospital officials said.

Jim Wilson Sharkey, 43, and his 37-year-old wife, Connie Jo Sharkey, were in the intermediate care unit at Flagstaff Regional Medical Center, said Community Relations Director Laurin Bosse.

"They're just very banged up," Bosse said. "But their conditions are stable, which is a very good sign. They're continuing to progress well."

The Sharkeys both suffered facial cuts and fractured ankles, Bosse said.

The couple, on their way back to Twin Falls from Oklahoma City, survived a forced landing of their light plane north of the Grand Canyon Saturday. They were spotted Sunday morning by a Civil Air Patrol searcher and were evacuated to the Flagstaff hospital.

Buhl council hears economic update

BUHL - The Buhl City Council got an update Monday on the recently established economic development program for the city.
 George Shannon, director of the project, told the council a 50-page report has been developed listing the strengths and weaknesses of various aspects of Buhl, including schools, public safety, water system, traffic and businesses.
 Shannon cited some facts from the audit about senior citizens. He said that 50 seniors moved out of Buhl last year for reasons other than economic. Many were widows and widowers who lived alone in big houses that they no longer needed, he said. But a lack of housing to fit their needs forced them to move elsewhere, Shannon said.
 Shannon said that the complete audit should show the age spread of the community and the needs of different age groups. He suggested keeping track of young people who move out of the area to urge them to return if employment opportunities develop.
 He also told the council encour-

aging existing businesses to expand makes better economic sense than trying to bring in a large business. Numerous small businesses can be better than having to rely on one large business, he said.
 Looking at Jerome and the impact of losing an big business like Tupperware, Shannon said.
 Shannon told the council it needs to decide on priorities for encouraging the economic health of the city.
 In other action:
 - The council will wait until a future meeting to consider adopting a new building code, based on the 1988 Uniform Building Code.
 - Police Chief Les Cochran said he will check on certain areas around town to see if warrant street lights. Public Works Director Gary Winn told the council some residents have requested lights be installed.
 Residents thanked Idaho Power Co. for the installation of lights at the end of 14th Street near the tennis courts and baseball park, at no charge.
 - Voted to study further the bids for fuel for city vehicles and air packs for firemen.

 considerably less than 8,400 cfs. Well development upstream from Swan Falls since the late 1940s has a potential to reduce the flow at the dam.
 The suit claimed that if the power company did not protect its water rights it would have to purchase power from an alternative source that could increase rates.
 As a result, Idaho Power issued a blanket protest to all upstream development. The Water Resources Department then issued a moratorium on further permits.
 In the agreement worked out with the state, the adjudication phase of the protest of establishing just what water was being diverted and how much.
 Higginson explained why owners of domestic wells must file even

though such wells don't require Idaho state permits: In order to include water rights of federal lands within the state, the process must include all water rights in the entire Snake River Basin, he said.
 At this date, the federal government insists the domestic and stock wells be included, Higginson said. If the government has a change of heart, those who already have filed will have their filing fees refunded, he said.
 The small wells could add as many as 90,000 to 95,000 potential claims, Higginson said.
 During the past summer the Water Master of Water District 1 had to shut off all water rights with a priority date later than 1882. The water right at Milner Dam, which supplies water to much of the Magic Valley, is

about 1900. The canal companies had to rely on stored water not affected by the shut-off order to supply water through the irrigation season.
 Idaho's prior appropriation water doctrine of first-in-time, first-in-right, which is common in arid Western states, can be traced to old English mining laws, Higginson said. The priority date is the date the water was first put to use or the date an application was filed.
 Some water rights of federal reservations in Idaho are senior to the rights of irrigation farmers and power companies. The Fort Hall Indian Reservation, for instance, has a priority date of 1852, the date the reservation was established.
 A Supreme Court decision held that creation of a reservation, such as the Fort Hall reservation, implied

the water rights to fulfill the purpose for which the land was set aside. The reservation was established with the idea that the Indians would become farmers.
 The exact amount has not been established, but the law requires enough water for "practically irrigable acres," or the acreage that could economically be served with water for irrigation.
 Negotiations between the Water Resources Department and the U.S. government are not completed. Other federal lands, including Bureau of Land Management and Forest Service lands, also are included in this negotiation.
 The adjudication is expected to cost \$25 million to \$30 million and should take 10 years to complete, Higginson said.

 "From what he (Judge Green) said, I think he's going to do it," Berry said. "But he was a little vague."
 The two sides have agreed that 158 people were affected by a 1988 decision to divide one of the sugar company's pension plans. One of the original four plaintiffs, Jack R. Holland, lives in Twin Falls.
 Most of those employees probably live in Ogden and Twin Falls, Berry said. Amalgamated's sugar beet processing plant in Twin Falls and Paul employ about 800 people during its processing season.
 The lawsuit stemmed from a complicated 1986 transaction by Amalgamated that netted the company \$4.4 million. Called a spinoff-termination in financial terms, Amalgamated split one of its pension plans, bought annuities to provide benefits to retired employees, and pocketed the excess money.
 Amalgamated continued making contributions and requiring currently working employees to make contributions to one part of the plan, the part that remained active. Retired employees were told the insurance company would continue paying guaranteed retirement payments.
 When Amalgamated split the plan between employees and retirees, about \$12.8 million was left in the plan, and \$8.4 million was required to pay off the retirees. The extra \$4.4 million went to the company.
 Amalgamated says the move is sanctioned by federal law, and the plaintiffs are suing the wrong people. But the retirees say the pension plan required the company to divide excess money between the company and its retirees if the plan was ever terminated.
 They're asking the court to declare Amalgamated's move illegal, force the sugar company to return the excess money to the plan, award punitive damages and prohibit the company from making similar moves in the future.
 The Times-News was unable to reach Amalgamated's attorneys Thursday.

Market continues slump

NEW YORK (AP) — Blue-chip stocks staged a modest rally Thursday, but the rest of the market remained in a slump.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrials, which had fallen nearly 89 points over the past six sessions, recovered 13.87 to 2,022.45.

In contrast, declining issues outnumbered advances by about 4 to 3 in nationwide trading of New York Stock Exchange-listed stocks, with 635 up, 844 down and 436 unchanged.

Volume on the floor of the Big Board came to 141.28 million shares, down from 163.71 million in the previous session. Nationwide, consolidated volume in NYSE-listed issues, including trades in those stocks on regional exchanges and in the over-the-counter market, totaled 164.67 million shares.

Analysts said buying of blue chips was encouraged by word that central banks around the world were moving to support the dollar in foreign exchange.

The dollar, which has fallen sharply in recent days, hovered around

Conspiracy theory 'ludicrous', WPPSS employee testifies

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) — A Washington Public Power Supply System employee said Thursday it was "ludicrous" to think a conspiracy to commit securities fraud could exist among the thousands of people involved in selling WPPSS municipal bonds and building two nuclear power plants.

Hansen "Hank" Kosmata testified in the federal court trial that the Washington state Supreme Court was to blame for the WPPSS 1983 default of \$2.25 billion in bonds for the plants.

Kosmata, the WPPSS liaison with 88 public utility districts involved in building the two plants, answered cross-examination questions from James Hagan, an attorney for Blyth Eastman Faine-Webber Inc.

Blyth Eastman is one of three company defendants in the suit brought by a class of more than 24,000 bondholders.

Hagan asked Kosmata if he saw any evidence of the bondholder plaintiffs' assertions that the defendants, utilities, WPPSS or its other consultants conspired to lie and hide information that might have discouraged investors of WPPSS bonds.

"I saw no such evidence," Kosmata said. "The possibility of committing conspiracy with this many people in such a public environment is ludicrous."

Asked what he thought a motive might have been, he replied, "That's what baffles me. I can't imagine what the motive would be, who would gain."

WPPSS defaulted on the bonds after it abandoned the two unfinished plants in 1982.

Kosmata blamed the default, the largest in the municipal bond market, on the Washington state Supreme Court's June 1983 ruling that the utilities didn't have authority to sign the contracts committing them to building the plants.

Without the ability to enforce the contracts, "the source of (bond) payments had been denied," he said.

"The Supreme Court of the state of Washington committed what I believe was the true fraud in this case," he said.

U.S. District Judge William Browning, who is presiding over the case, later struck that comment from the record at the plaintiff's re-

quest because Kosmata "is not an expert in what constitutes fraud," he said.

Kosmata revealed that he bought \$10,000 worth of WPPSS bonds in March 1981, the last issue for the two plants.

"I would not have bought those bonds if I thought those (utilities) did not have the authority to pay me back," he said.

Hagan sought to prove that the troubles WPPSS was having with financing and building the plants were extensively covered in newspapers. He read articles from several Washington newspapers that told of labor strikes, budget increases and difficulties with bond sales.

"The problems were repeatedly, continually and without end reported in the press when

other events went unnoticed," Kosmata said.

Blyth Eastman was the former WPPSS financial adviser. The other defendants are United Engineers & Constructors Inc. and Ebasco Services Inc., engineering firms responsible for designing the plants.

United Engineers attorney, Ralph Wellington began his cross-examination of Kosmata in the afternoon, focusing on the processes of approving the budgets and devising the bond-sale documents called official statements.

Kosmata said the engineering firms were involved in those processes only in providing cost and schedule estimates.

The trial was recessed for Thanksgiving week and was scheduled to resume in the afternoon Nov. 28.

Legislators end tour on train

LEWISTON (AP) — Idaho's legislators wound up a tour of north Idaho by stepping back 30 years into a luxurious past on a Union Pacific Railroad passenger train.

But the lawmakers also were confronted with an up-to-date dilemma facing the state's 44 counties.

Two vintage-1950s Union Pacific passenger cars, a heating car and an executive car were pulled along the Clearwater River Wednesday from Lewiston to Kootenai.

The cars, used by Jimmy Carter in his 1976 presidential campaign, represented the first passenger train to roll along the Camas Prairie Railroad tracks since 1955. The four-day legislative tour was sponsored by the North Idaho Chamber of Commerce.

The cars were brought from Union Pacific's base in Omaha. The rest of the fleet was sold to Mexico's nationalized railroads three years ago.

Once lawmakers continued by bus to Grangeville and Cottonwood, the train cars were filled with school children from Kootenai, Kamiah, Orofino and Lewiston. Each group of children then rode a different segment of the line.

Elsewhere, a comedy of errors occurred when Sen. Lynn Tomlinaga, R-Rupert, and newly elected Republican Rep. John Byrnes from southeastern Idaho and his wife, Nancy, were accidentally locked in a cell at the Idaho Correctional Institution expansion project at Orofino.

Hansen council asked about officer's firing

In other business, Gary Bohm, of the Hansen Volunteer Fire Department, said he's having trouble getting people for the force. Bohm said that he had contacted all of the Hansen men who had quit the fire department in the past and none would return.

He attributes some of the disinterest to the fact that many people work outside of Hansen.

Bohm told the council about the most recent fire in Hansen which pointed out the problem of not having anyone in town immediately available.

Someone called the new 911 number. The 911 operator then phoned the Kimberly Fire Department and attempted to phone Hansen City Hall, which was closed for lunch. A Hansen resident heard the report on the scanner and notified the department and Urie.

Urie said that Bohm should concentrate on getting people who work in Hansen to be on the force.

Also at the meeting, it was announced that the city is working on setting up a class for all Hansen residents on an evacuation plan for the town. The date will be announced when it is set.

"Jay Conkin plays basketball with a lot of heart and a lot of ability," said coach Larry Messick of Shoshone's eighth grade point guard.

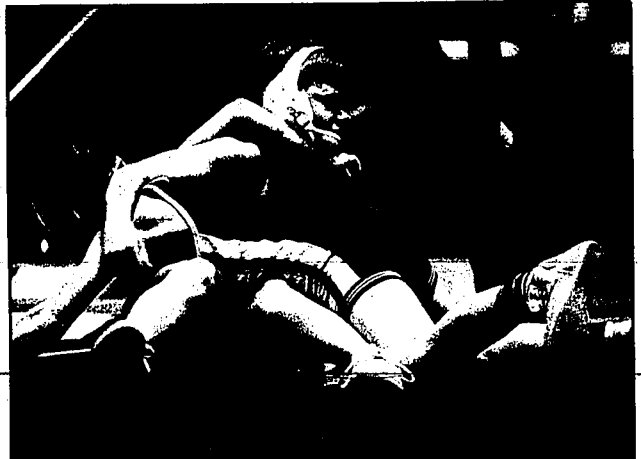

10th Tipoff Classic opens college season

SPRINGFIELD, Mass. (AP) — The 10th Tipoff Classic is the same matchup as the first and there's a lot more in common for the two games than just that.

Top-ranked Duke and Kentucky play in the traditional opener for the college basketball season at Springfield, Mass., on Saturday. The first was played on Nov. 17, 1979 when the game was instituted as a fundraiser for the Basketball Hall of Fame, which is located in this New England town where the sport was invented.

The inaugural game was a rematch of the 1978 national championship game, in which Kentucky beat the Blue Devils 94-88. The Tipoff Classic went overtime before Duke beat the Wildcats 82-78. Ironically, Kentucky's season ended as it had begun — the Blue Devils edged Kentucky 55-54 in the NCAA Tournament.

Kentucky, minus all the major players from the 1978 championship team except guard Kyle Macy, fell to 19-12 in 1979, and ended the season with a

first-round NIT loss to Clemson.

Things will be even rougher for Kentucky and coach Eddie Sutton this weekend in New England.

The Wildcats have lost seven of the top eight scorers from last year's 27-8 team that lost in the regional semifinals to Villanova.

Rex Chapman left after his sophomore year for the NBA, five seniors graduated and sophomore Eric Manuel is being withheld from competition pending completion of an investigation into allegations of possible cheating on a college entrance examination.

That is one of a number of allegations hanging over one of the most storied programs in college basketball history. The NCAA investigation continues as Kentucky faces a tough opening game in what has to be considered a tough season.

"Only four of my players in this game will be

playing their first college game," Sutton said Wednesday. "The guys back from last year's team totalled about 600 minutes of playing time. That means this will be a very young, inexperienced team facing one of the premier clubs in all of college basketball."

Sutton said he expects to start 6-foot-11 senior Mike Scott, who played 73 minutes last season; 6-10 sophomore LeRon Ellis, the vet of the squad at 386 minutes; 6-7 sophomore Reggie Hanson, 83; 6-5 junior Derrick Miller, 84, and 6-7 freshman Chris Mills.

"Mills will be out of position and he's not real comfortable at the point," Sutton said.

Mills, subject of one of the main points of the NCAA investigation — concerning the alleged mailing of cash to a recruit — is playing at point guard because Sean Sutton, the coach's son, suffered a broken jaw during a scrimmage and will be lost for two months while recovering from surgery.

Ramsay calls it quits after frustrating start

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Frustrated by the worst start in a 37-year coaching career and seeing no prospect for a change, Jack Ramsay decided it was time to resign as coach of the Indiana Pacers.

Ramsay has coached more NBA games than any man in history and is the league's second winningest coach. He was in his 21st season and his third as the Pacers' coach.

"I've been in tough times before.

But, I never started a season losing seven games. Ramsay told a news conference Thursday night after returning from Phoenix where he told his players of his decision before the club left for tonight's game with the Los Angeles Clippers. "That eats at you."

Losing and his inability to get the Pacers to play to his satisfaction led to his decision, Ramsay said, adding that he did not think he would take another coaching job.

"I've always felt that I've done my work because I like it. I thoroughly have enjoyed my coaching career but at this time it's no longer fun for me and I'm not getting the satisfaction that I want to get from my work," the 63-year-old said.

"I'd listen to opportunities (in bas-

ketball) but I don't think it will be in coaching."

Ramsay has coached a record 1,847 NBA games.

"Whatever problems there might be, it's still the coach's job to have the team win," Ramsay said.

Ramsay discussed the club's worst start since it entered the NBA in 1976 with club president Donnie Walsh in Phoenix after it lost 123-104 to the Suns.

Gilder, Mahaffey tie in 2nd round

KAPALUA, Hawaii (AP) — Bob Gilder birdied his last four holes Thursday on his way to a 64 that tied him with John Mahaffey for the second-round lead in the \$600,000 Kapalua International Golf Tournament.

"I didn't want to let Mahaffey run away with it, but I sure didn't expect to birdie that many holes coming in," Gilder said after finishing in near-darkness.

"I don't think I've ever birdied that many in a row at the finish," added Gilder, who played his back nine in 30 and one-putted the last 10 holes he played on the Kapalua Bay course.

Gilder, who has yet to make a bogey, and Mahaffey, who also shot a 64, each completed 36 holes in 129-15 under par and two shots better than the tournament record of 131 set by Andy Bean last year.

"It was kind of a fun day to play for a change," said Mahaffey, the 1978 PGA champion whose last victory came in the 1986 Tournament

Players Championship. "I haven't putted this well in quite a while," said Mahaffey, who holed out five times from 12-15 feet.

Mahaffey and Gilder were four strokes in front of first-round leader Bill Glasson, who had a 69 and was alone in third at 133.

Corey Pavin was next at 134 after his second straight 67 and Jodie Mudd, with a 65, was another stroke back at 135.

The group at 136 included Bob Lohr, Mark O'Meara, Mac O'Grady, Dave Rummells and Steve Pate. O'Grady and Lohr had 67s, while O'Meara and Rummells shot 68s and Pate had a 70.

Mark Calcavecchia, who has finished second and third in his last two starts, also shot a 64 that left him at 137.

Calcavecchia chipped in for an eagle-3 on the first hole, then birdied the next five to go seven under.

Barbershop celebrates 50th anniversary

TWIN FALLS — Burt Hulsh is an insurance agent by trade, but most of his spare time is spent singing barbershop.

Hulsh began singing in a barbershop quartet 26 years ago, when he answered a newspaper advertisement for people who like to sing. When he moved from Idaho Falls to Twin Falls in 1966, there was no local barbershop quartet. So he organized one.

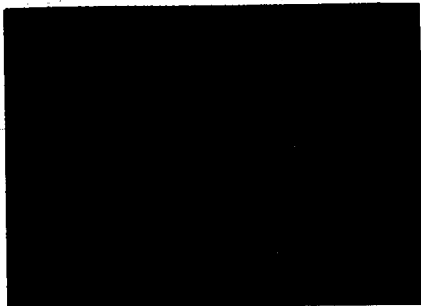
Tonight and Saturday night, that group, the Magichords of Magic Valley, will present their annual fall show at the College of Southern Idaho. The show, themed "Heritage of Harmony," will celebrate the 50th anniversary of the Society for the Preservation and Encouragement of Barbershop Quartet Singing in America.

Hulsh, who sings lead/melody with the Magichords, served a term as international president of the Society 1981. He looks back on the experience as a great year during which he made many friendships. He was gone 38 weekends that year doing his barbershop duties. Hulsh still travels many weekends, acting as emcee for barbershop shows across the country and teaching barbershop clinics for newly elected officers.

Hulsh explains that the barbershop singing society is a highly organized group, comprised of 16 districts in the United States and Canada. "Not everyone understands who we really are," says Hulsh, noting that some people think the group is a bunch of barbers who sing.

"Once, at a convention in Colorado Springs, a hotel van driver, upon hearing about my barbershop affiliation, told me he was a model railroad," says Hulsh. "Then he proceeded to tell me that he heard the best oil for his locomotives is that oil you guys use in your clippers."

The Magichords won't be cutting anyone's hair at CSI this weekend. They will, however, be presenting a show, under the direction of Mike Fisher. Their show sketches the history of barbershop singing from its earliest roots through the founding of the Society and on to the present. There will be 17 barbershop standards in the show, as well as a new 11-minute medley of old songs de-

In addition to various local and visiting barbershop groups, four senior trumpeters from Buhl High School will be featured in the show.

signed to weave social and historical events affecting the barbershop art form during the past 100 years into the show.

The featured guest quartet for this year's show is Easy Street, a Seattle group that won the Evergreen-District 1987 championship. In addition, the Common Taters, a local quartet, will perform several humorous numbers, along with a symbolic quartet, the Bogus Bills from Boise. Other local quartets, such as Chapter Four, Valley Edition and a special double quartet will also perform.

There are 50 men from throughout the Magic Valley in this year's Magichords group, says show chairman Ed Waldapfel. He adds that some members of the group got involved by coming to a barbershop show, singing a few songs and getting hooked on the music.

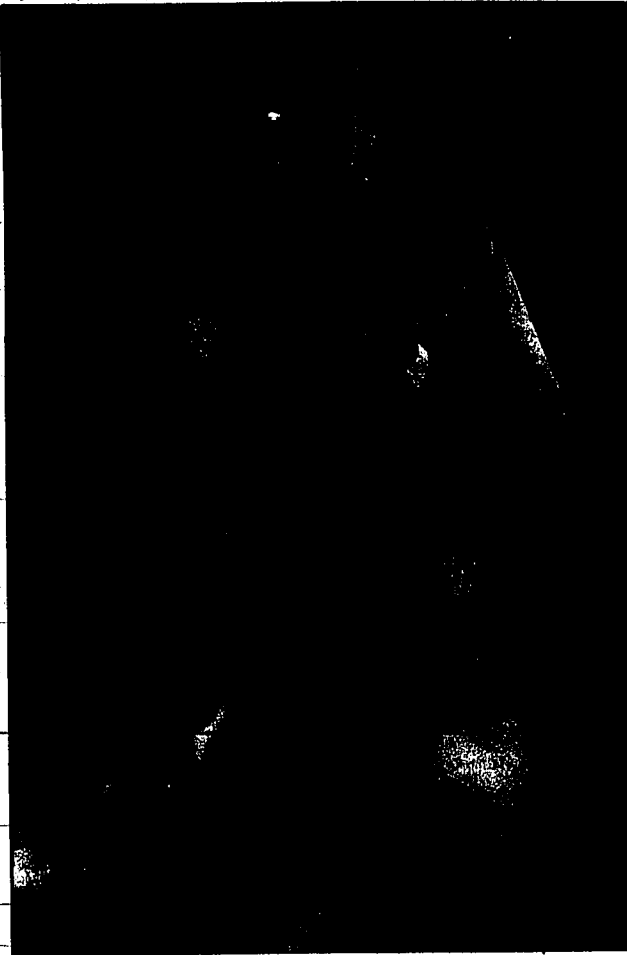
The group meets weekly. Group

activities include traveling to district competitions, singing for nursing homes and care centers, and presenting programs at shopping malls. There are also social events, like fresh peach or strawberry feeds and banquets.

"Regardless of how you feel about it, anything like political issues, for example, it is all behind you when you sing," says Waldapfel.

Money to fund the travel and uniforms for the Magichords is raised through the annual show and also by selling later pigs (sausages poked through potatoes) at the Twin Falls County Fair. The group donates a sizeable amount of money to various charities, such as the Institute of Logopedics, based in Kansas, which serves multi-handicapped children from across the country. Each year, notes Hulsh, barbershoppers donate

Event to feature Idaho artists

Junior Club hosts art show and auction

Auction night will get under way at the Holiday Inn on Blue Lakes Boulevard North with a silent auction and art preview from 6 to 8 p.m. The auction itself will begin promptly at 8 p.m. and will feature only original Idaho art. Some prints will be

offered during the silent auction.

This year's featured artist, nationally-known John Horejs, has six pieces of his newest work in the show, according to Maria Larson of Larson Arts. Larson and her husband, Larry, were in charge of lining up artists for this year's show. Larson says she is particularly excited about the show because of the work done to upgrade the auction and provide the best artwork possible. At this year's auction, a minimum bid will be placed on each piece of artwork offered for sale. "We are interested in showcasing local talent and in raising money for the Junior Club," Larson says. She adds that many artists have agreed to place some of their best work in the auction because of the new minimum bid rule.

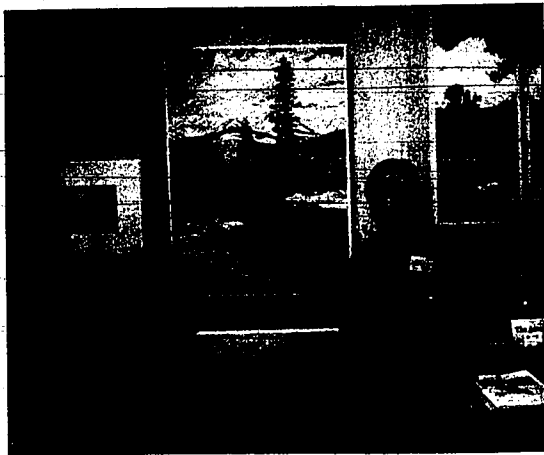
Proceeds from this year's auction will benefit the Teenage Parent Education Project, the Twin Falls City Park Playground and Young Authors, says Debbie Corn, Junior Club publicity chairman. Corn says that the 30-year-old service organization has raised as much as \$10,000 during past auctions.

A look at the entire past year's work reveals that the Junior Club raised \$17,991 for the community and put in 3,706 hours of volunteer work. Junior Club members Jan Stubbs and Betty Jo Quigley are serving as co-chairmen for this year's auction.

Those who attend the art auction will be treated to live chamber music, a no-host bar and complimentary hors d'oeuvres. Professional auctioneer Jim Messersmith will preside over the auction itself. Advance tickets for the evening cost \$3.50 and may be obtained from Larson Arts, the Made in Idaho store at Magic Valley Mall, or any member of the Junior Club. Cost for tickets purchased at the door is \$5.

This year's auction will feature 35 pieces of art, ranging in base price from \$50 to \$3,000. Artists,

'Sesame Street' still going strong

Loretta Long was working as a teacher in New York City, hosting a local television show and hoping for a career in acting when she auditioned for the role of Susan on a television experiment called "Sesame Street" two decades ago. She got the role and has been one of three on-camera cast members — the others are Bob McGrath and Big Bird (Caroll Spinney) — to have gone the distance with the phenomenally successful PBS series.

Last Monday that Children's Television Workshop production that some call the most important children's show in the history of television began its 20th year.

Behind it are some 2,500 episodes and dozens of awards, all of which began with Joan Ganz Cooney's 1968 study of youngsters whose learning opportunities were limited because of poverty.

"Sesame Street" has proved that children are responsive to quick, memorable messages — a proven advertising technique — and can absorb more through television than anyone first imagined. Along the way, researchers found that even very young children can learn from and enjoy plots.

This 20th season begins with a new introduction, filmed partly in Washington, and features the honoree of Luis and Maria, who were married on the show last year.

In the spring episodes will focus on Maria's pregnancy and the birth of their child in May. Like all "Sesame Street" endeavors, this one has been thoroughly researched. In addition, Sonia Mansano (Maria), with a new baby at home, is helping to write those installments.

"We're dealing with questions a child has," said executive producer Dale Gribble. "We sort of open the door but hopefully don't take over what really is a parent's role. At one point Maria and Luis go to the doctor's office, and she has a sonogram. We try to look at it from a child's point of view. Then hopefully children can go to their parents with any other questions."

"Big Bird will ask the questions that a 5-year-old will have. The next season we will gradually work into an older child — bathing, changing diapers, sibling rivalries."

"Big Bird" will not only become curious about the new baby, but he will also get an alter ego, Blue Bird, a superhero who sets off on blue

Movie studios release thinner-than-usual Christmas fare

Adorable dinosaur kids and cats and dogs in a new twist on Charles Dickens will usher in the holiday season this week at the start of a Christmas movie mini-marathon that also will bring a more updated Dickens favorite and a return of those beloved film-and-theater fossils from "Cocoon."

Every movie season seems to begin earlier and earlier in this video-madened-era. Summer comes well before Memorial Day, and Christmas is celebrated in cinemas before Thanksgiving turkeys are roasted. This leads to some confusion, as films expected to run through the start of the new year open on the same date as releases expected to exit first-run screens after a week or two.

Friday brings the pair of animated features, both in the Disney tradition. The Don Bluth-Steven Spielberg-George Lucas "Land Before Time" might be considered a cuddlier version of Walt Disney's pictorialization of Igor Stravinsky's "Rite of Spring." And "Oliver & Company" is the Disney feline-canine version of

"Oliver Twist." Some of the other films opening Friday may or may not last through December.

"Fresh Horses," pairing former teen queen Molly Ringwald and Andrew McCarthy, is expected to fade in the stretch. There are also queue marks on "Without a Clue," the Sherlock Holmes comedy pairing Michael Caine as an actor playing detective and Ben Kingsley as the brainy Dr. Watson, and "High Spirits," a haunted-hotel comedy with Peter O'Toole as the proprietor and Daryl Hannah and Steve Guttenberg as lovers, spectral and corporeal.

Neither Guttenberg nor Caine, two of filmdom's busiest guys, need worry about not being represented in the hearts and minds of moviegoers at Christmastide if "Without a Clue" disappears and "High Spirits" evaporates. Guttenberg also pops up Nov. 23 in "Cocoon II: The Return," along with most of the original stars. Caine teams with Steve Martin in "Dirty Rotten Scoundrels," coming Dec. 14. The comic star who has been called "the laziest man in Hollywood" also is working again, and his new film, opening Nov. 23, could well become the hottest of the Hollywood

pictures. "Scrooged" casts Bill Murray — in his first leading film role since "Ghostbusters" — as a nasty network executive.

Among other major stars represented in the relatively slim calendar of holiday releases are Harrison Ford, who co-stars with Sigourney Weaver and Melanie Griffith in "Working Girl," and Mel Gibson, who pairs up with Michelle Pfeiffer in "Tequila Sunrise." Dustin Hoffman and Tom Cruise play brothers in "Rain Man," and Arnold Schwarzenegger and Danny DeVito take on the title roles in "Twins."

Comedy zings in this holiday season, with "The Naked Gun," from the makers of "Airplane!," and "My Stepmother Is an Alien," with Dan Aykroyd and Kim Basinger, also scheduled for wide release. With only 15 releases, including the two animated features, which probably will be playing only daytimes after the first few weeks, exhibitor demand may pay for some of the prestige films now planned for only limited release in December.

Among the films expected to open in only a few big markets are "Beaches," pairing Bette Midler and Bar-

bara Hershey; "Mississippi Burning," with Gene Hackman and Willem Dafoe; and "The Accidental Tourist," pairing William Hurt and Kathleen Turner for the first time since "Body Heat." Those films — Gerry Marshall's study of female friendship, Alan Parker's drama of the FBI hunt for the killers of three murdered civil rights workers in 1964 and Laurence Kasdan's version of Anne Tyler's novel — show the new work by some of the industry's leading directors.

The only first-rate movie minds represented in the wide holiday releases are Mike Nichols ("Working Girl"), Barry Levinson ("Rainman") and Robert Towne ("Tequila Sunrise.")

The thinness of the holiday lineup already has been cited by Variety, the show business trade paper. The film business is unpredictable, so it is impossible to say what caused the paucity of wide holiday releases. But a number of planned releases apparently fell short of expectations or were not completed on time.

"Gorillas in the Mist," "The Last Temptation of Christ" and "Bird" were intended as Christmas releases but opened during the fall instead. Terry Gilliam's \$40 million "The Adventures of Baron Munchausen" and Luis Puenzo's "Old Gringo," with Jane Fonda and Gregory Peck, also were set for December release but

were pushed back. Gilliam's version although it is opening in Germany Dec. 8, and Columbia Pictures is vague on "Old Gringo."

1986 picture in which a crusty retired Air Force colonel (Louis Gossett Jr., in a parody of his Oscar-winning performance in "An Officer and a Gentleman") came to the aid of an

18-year-old who commandeers an F-16 fighter to rescue his father, a jet-fighter pilot, who had been shot down and taken prisoner in a fictional Middle Eastern country (read Libya).

As before, there is lots of aerial warfare razzle-dazzle, and once again the bad guys are some unspecified Arabs. But this time, director Sidney J. Furie and co-writer Kevin Elders have avoided the ugly jingoism and sheer foolishness of the first film and come up with a punchy, fast-moving action flick. Those Arabs are on the verge of being able to launch a nuclear missile, precipitating the formation of an unprecedented joint U.S.-Soviet effort to mount a preemptive attack from a secret base in Israel. (The film claims to be the first Canadian-Israeli co-production.) You guessed it, Gossett's Chappy, who had been shunted off to an air museum, is ordered to head up the American contingent.

Furie and Elders have some broad fun with a bunch of mavericks expected to get into the spirit of flight with their Soviet counterparts. Our key pilot (Mark Humphrey) is a cocky guy while the Russian is a sultry woman (Sharon H. Brandon); they are mutually attracted, but romance will have to be put on hold.

'Feds' is unconvincing 'buddy' movie

The following are capsule reviews of some of the films playing locally in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

FEDS (PG-13). It starts out as a feminist "Police Academy," then turns into an FBI school version of "The Paper Chase," then begins swerving wildly between low high jinks and feeble quasi-naturalism. For spice, there are dull bank robberies and listless car crashes. Trapped in the middle are Rebecca De Mornay and Mary Gross, doing the Bill Murray and Dan Aykroyd parts in a lame buddy-buddy comedy with an unconvincing sex change. De Mornay and Gross are both good; pray they get a movie next time around.

ALIEN NATION (R). An attempt to freshen up the formula cop-buddy picture with a futuristic allegory about the evils of discrimination is too thin to be effective. James Caan stars as a seasoned cop with some Archie Bunker attitudes directed toward humanoids from another planet who serve as symbols of any of the racial or ethnic minorities. Mandy Patinkin plays the first "Newcomer" — i.e., humanoid — to make detective and winds up as Caan's partner. Standard fare despite gimmicky. With Terence Stamp.

CHILD'S PLAY (R). Jolting, high-style thriller of the supernatural

from "Fright Night's" Tom Holland about a little boy (Alex Vincent) and his increasingly eerie talking robot-like doll. However, absolutely not for kids. Catherine Hicks and Chris Sarandon star.

GORILLAS IN THE MIST (PG-13). With a sense of beauty and wonderment, this most unusual and challenging of African adventure films illuminates an extraordinary and unprecedented communication between a human being and the world's largest primates, the endangered mountain gorillas of East Africa. Under Michael Apted's caring and judicious direction Sigourney Weaver is absolutely stunning as the heroic and controversial primatologist, Dian Fossey. With Bryan Brown, Julie Harris.

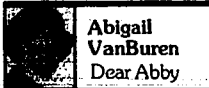

high-action adventures that Big Bird himself imagines.

Singer said that "Sesame Street" will encourage its viewers to create their own stories and will also expand its science curriculum through the curiosity of a new little-girl puppet named Ruby.

This year celebrity guests will include Lily Tomlin, Tracey Ullman, Jamie Lee Curtis, Billy Joel, James Galway, Kathleen Turner, Rhea Perlman, Susan St. James and Susan Sarandon. Tracey, Kathleen and Susan all have children in this age group and actually asked to do the show," said Singer, "and Billy Joel is going to bring his daughter."

But as it has for two decades, "Sesame Street" will continue to star its proven stalwarts, Susan (Loretta Long) and her husband Gordon (Roscoe Orman), Bob (Bob McGrath), Big Bird, Oscar the Grouch and others whose familiar names and faces — both human and Muppet — are synonymous with the series.

Jim Henson, father of the Muppets, was aboard at the beginning as Ernie and on a limited basis still is, along with Muppeteers Frank Oz (Cookie, Bert and Grover), Jerry Nelson (Count von Count) and Richard Hunt. (Caroll Spinney does both Big Bird and Oscar the Grouch.) Grammy-winning music director Joe Raposo took a break and re-

turned to the series. Lisa Simon, who first baby-sat children for the woman who cast the child actors, is now a producer-director. Josh Selig, one of those tots, finished college and came back as a writer, Singer said.

"We still approach the show as an experiment," said Singer, who was an associate producer during the first season. "We're still changing. Initially, they took on just what they felt children could manage and then more and more."

"Children are capable of learning more, and the show itself is more complex. This year we're doing plotline shows for six or seven pieces. We've heard that children start watching earlier."

"Our initial target audience was 3- to 5-year-olds, but we've expanded it to 2-to-5-year-olds. I think a child gets different things out of a show at different ages. And then we've also upgraded and expanded our curriculum in order to help the 5-year-olds make the transition to school."

During that time the character of Susan has been paired with three "husbands," all named Gordon — Matt Robinson (whose daughter Holly appears on Fox's "21 Jump Street"), Hal Miller and Roscoe Orman. That hasn't bothered the preschoolers who watch "Sesame

Street," Long said. "They only remember whichever one was the husband at the time," she said.

Susan has also evolved during the two decades. She began as a housewife and was given a career — she's a visiting nurse — and an adopted son, Miles, played by Orman's own son, who will be 4 next month.

Miles was added to the cast at Spinney's suggestion when the tot was 10 months old, Long said, but the show's writers "ster clear of having him call me 'Mommy' so that he won't expect his real mother, Sharon, to show up."

Loretta Long, who grew up on a farm in Michigan, created her own background for Susan. "I made her from the Midwest," she said. "I (Susan) was talking to the character Maria about careers, and I said when I was going to school, I really think I would have liked to be a doctor."

But Susan became a nurse instead, Long said, largely because "in the '60s it was important that a black woman and a black man did not outflank each other." Gordon is a teacher.

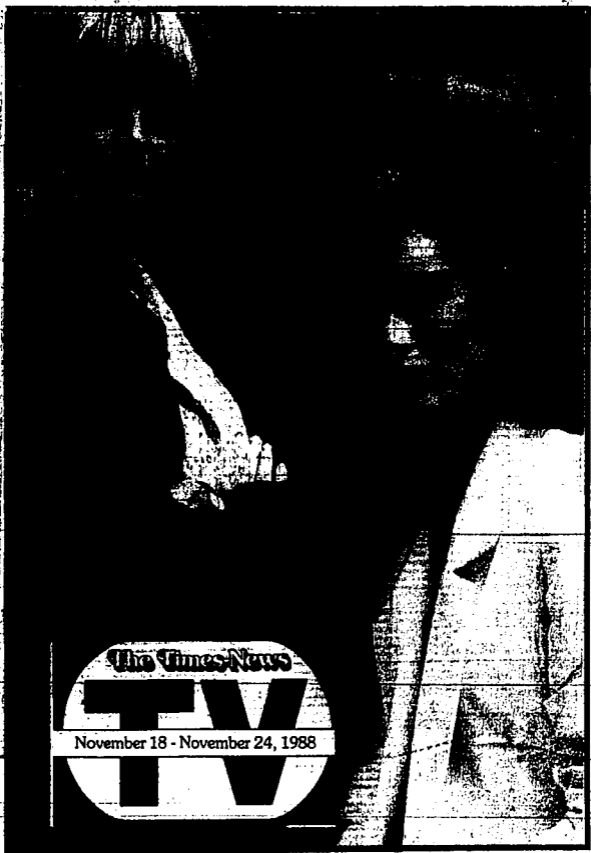

Producer takes chance on Shields in starring role of detective movie

By LYNN HOOGENBOOM

When Jay Bernstein talked Brooks Shields and Twiggy into appearing in the "The Diamond Trap," which airs Sunday, Nov. 20 on CBS, he figured executives at Columbia Pictures and CBS would be delighted. He figured wrong.

"I had a lot of problems, because people didn't want to give Brooke a chance," says Bernstein, who produced the light hearted detective romp. "Columbia was concerned that she would be such a movie star. They said, 'She'll hold up production.' I said, 'I'll tell you what. I'm used to gambling, and I feel she's the right one for this role.' I put up a portion of my fee in escrow against her departure."

"Can you believe that?" asks Bernstein with some exasperation. "I got Shields to do the movie, and instead of erecting a monument and saying, 'Gee, you got Brooke Shields in her dramatic debut as an adult,' I had to put my money in escrow."

In "The Diamond Trap," the 23-year-old Shields plays a 26-year-old gallery employee who may or may not be involved in a \$12 million jewel heist. Howard Hesseman plays the New York City detective who stumbles onto a lead in the case, Twiggy plays an unconventional Scotland Yard detective, and Ed Marinaro plays Hesseman's partner.

"This movie is not 'Gone with the Wind,' and Brooke's not going to win an Emmy," says Bernstein. "But she's going to show you that she's a capable actress who can play an adult role. And I think that Twiggy is

going to have a whole big career here, because she comes off like dynamite. See, no one's seen her unless they go to Broadway (where she starred in 'My One and Only'). This is the first time for her to be seen by millions, and I would say she probably has the best part in the movie."

One reason Bernstein was so set on those two female leads is that he knew his movie would be receiving some stiff competition from the other networks. (It will square off against part five of "War and Remembrance" and the highly publicized Vanessa White movie "The Goddess of Love.")

"If I came up with just Howard Hesseman and Ed Marinaro, as good as they are, and a pretty good script, I'd get killed. That's why I fought so hard to get both Brooke and Twiggy. It's like the sizzle and the steak. The steak is the script that it took three years to pull together. Howard Hesseman's a fine actor and he's fresh to play a cop. But that's the steak. The sizzle was to get Brooke Shields and Twiggy."

One other reason Bernstein may have fought so hard is that Shields reminds him of a former client — Farrah Fawcett. Bernstein guided

Fawcett's early career, when she went from unknown to international phenomenon on "Charlie's Angels." "Nobody wanted to give Farrah a chance," he recalls.

He brings Fawcett up once again when he's asked whether Shields can make the transition from teen to adult roles. "She can, because she's like Farrah," he says. "Farrah's acting in 'Somebody Killed Her Husband' or 'Charlie's Angels' certainly wasn't at the level it was when she was allowed to go on and had the opportunity to do 'The Burning Bed.' People grow as time goes on, particularly if they care about what they do. As Brooke gets more and more opportunities — and I hope this will be the first of many — she'll be able to become a very fine actress. She has all the instincts. It just takes practice and the opportunity to do it. I think this will start her on her way."

It had been five years since he last worked in soaps and that was a conscious choice. However, he says he's more than happy to be back in daytime, where he can keep his acting muscles in good shape.

From his high school days, there

was never any doubt that Tom would one day seek his fame and fortune as an actor. After his third semester at Columbia University in New York City, Tom left college to actively look for work as an actor. He held a variety of jobs like so many other actors and attended classes with the renowned Harold Clurman. It was Clurman who advised his student that an actor should take any and every acting job that comes his way, be it off-off-off Broadway or a bit part in a low budgeted film. Clurman said that only then can an actor improve his craft. The teacher also calculated that it took most talented actors about 15 years before they are really good.

It didn't take Tom that long before he landed the leading role of Danny Zuko in a touring company of "Grease" and ended up playing it on Broadway. The soaps followed after more stage work.

Being back on daytime required some adjustments for the actor. One

thing he had to get used to was being recognized by fans in the street. Tom and his wife Amy recently traveled to North Carolina to attend a wedding and there was as much interest in him in church as there was for the bride.

One of Tom's favorite incidents regarding fans occurred at a baseball game at Yankee Stadium. A woman popcorn vendor stopped Tom and asked him how long his contract was for on the soap. With all the sophistication of a network programmer, the popcorn lady said she was very happy to hear that Tom had a three-year contract because that meant he would be around for awhile.

ABC starts mini-series; NBC still wins week

NEW YORK (AP) — The first episode of "War and Remembrance," the opening salvo from ABC's big gun in the November ratings war, placed fourth in the weekly Nielsens, not good enough to prevent NBC from winning the week.

The No. 1 show of the week was a one-hour episode of NBC's "The Cosby Show" in which Cliff and Clair became grandparents. It had a 30.3 rating and a 47 share, the highest-rated "Cosby" since last March.

NBC dominated the top 10 and won the week ending Nov. 12 with an average, prime-time rating of 15.6. ABC was second with 14.0 and CBS third with 11.5.

Each rating point equals 904,000 homes with television. The share is a percentage of sets in use.

"War and Remembrance" opened Sunday with a 21.8 rating and a 31 share. The national rating, released Tuesday, was lower than the 17-city overnights available Monday. The first installment's rating reportedly met ABC's guarantee to sponsors, but the network was somewhat disappointed since ratings for multi-epi-

sode miniseries often start and finish at a high but sag in the middle.

The miniseries is a sequel to "The Winds of War," which opened in 1983 with a rating of 39.1 and a 53 share.

"War and Remembrance" runs 18 hours in seven parts, but the story doesn't conclude until sometime next year when ABC is scheduled to run the rest of the 32-hour World War II saga.

Because of delays in its other programming due to the writers' strike, ABC rushed the first part of the miniseries to air this month, one of four ratings "sweeps" periods each year when network affiliate ratings are measured. Originally the entire 32 hours was to have run in 1989.

The 10 top-rated shows of the week were: "The Cosby Show," "Cheers" and "Golden Girls," NBC; "War and Remembrance," ABC; "60 Minutes," CBS; "Growing Pains," ABC; "Empty Nest," "L.A. Law" and "Dear John," all NBC.

The theatrical film "Back to the Future," which NBC ran against "War and Remembrance" on Sunday, placed 11th.

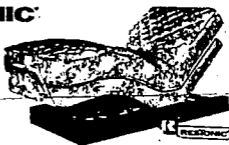

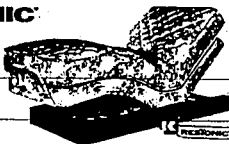

Cosby agrees to keep show another season

NEW YORK (AP) — NBC can have a sigh of relief — Bill Cosby has agreed to keep his top-rated "The Cosby Show" on the network for another season.

The show, which premiered in 1984, turned Thursday night into a ratings blockbuster for NBC and made the network, which had never previously won a season, into the No. 1 network four years in a row.

NBC Entertainment President Brandon Tartikoff said he was "ecstatic" about the announcement.

"The Cosby Show" has been the symbol of success and quality at NBC for the past five years, Tartikoff said. "Knowing that it will return for the 1989-90 season allows an entire company to sleep better at night."

Cosby had always said he would only do the show for five seasons, which would have made this season its last on the air.

"I will work even harder to ensure that people get what I consider to be quality," Cosby said in a statement released Thursday.

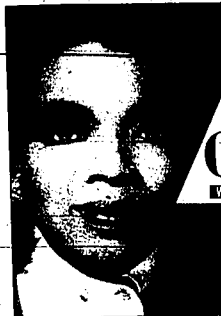

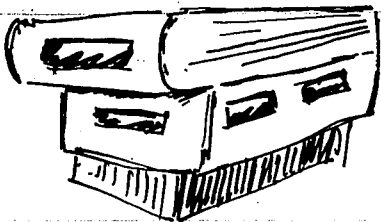
