New adult bookstore kindles interest of city and customers

TWIN FALLS — A new adult bookstore in Twin Falls has kindled the interest of the city attorney and concern from anti-obscenity activists — but support from customers and the building's owner.

In the general sense, it's kind of a slap in the face," said Fred Brodin, who belonged to a group that sued an adult bookstore last year. But, he added, "it's not surprising, either."

"I am against having obscenity," said Phil Gerrish, another group member. "It's against the law."

City attorney Fritz Wonderlich said the city is investigating the bookstore for possible violations of a new, anti-pornography zoning ordinance.

Visions West Book Club has

opened in a building at 711 Shoshone St. S., near the Singing Bridge. It features adult magazines, videos, sexual paraphernalia and books. It is advertising to buy used men's magazines.

Wonderlich said the store may violate a recent zoning ordinance limiting where adult entertainment stores can be located. The city will take court action if it decides the store's wares are primarily sexually oriented, he said.

"We'd go to court and file for an injunction over the use of that property," he said.

Twin Falls resident Everett L. Jewell, who owns the building and surrounding land, said he's unconcerned about the bookstore and possible zoning violations.

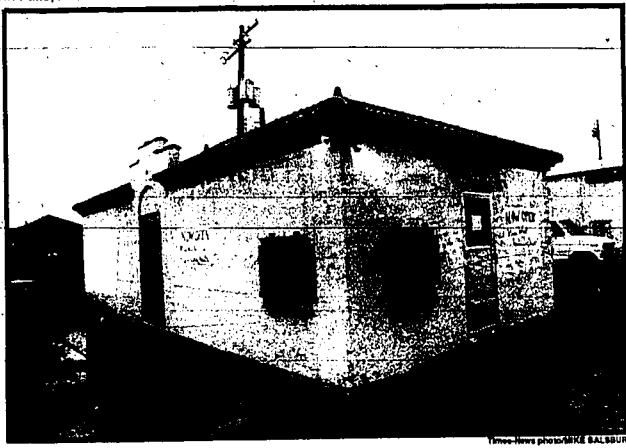
"If they are in violation, I don't know anything about it," Jewell said.

Jewell refused to divulge who rents the building.

Visions West has applied for a building permit to add "booths" to the building. Those permits list the name Lyle MacNichols and the same name Jerome phone number used by Peter Gregory, the man alleged to be the manager of the Front Page Book Store in a lawsuit filed last year.

Brodin, Gerrish, and 13 other people calling themselves Determined Citizens Against Pornography last year sued the Front Page under an Idaho moral nuisance statute. They wanted the store closed, its inventory confiscated and all rent money paid to its landlords disgorged to the state. That suit died after the Front Page closed its doors and the parties resolved arguments over attorneys' fees.

Bush may cut billions in Medicare funds

WASHINGTON — The Bush administration will back substantial Medicare cuts of \$3.5 billion to \$5 billion for fiscal 1990 as part of an initial effort to cut the federal deficit, some Bush advisers and budget experts predicted Thursday.

They said any suggested cuts, at least at first, are unlikely to involve drastic changes or major

restructuring of the \$90 billion program, although such proposals may come later.

More likely, according to experts consulted by Bush transition aides, initial cuts would be based on the Reagan administration's fiscal 1990 budget proposals being prepared for submission to Congress.

Bush may favor somewhat bigger or somewhat smaller cuts in some items than President Rea-

gan will propose or a slightly different configuration, but he'll be in the same ballpark, the aides and experts said.

Depending on how details are worked out, the 1990 cuts could mean savings of as much as \$15 billion a year by fiscal 1993. (All such savings, in the budget world, are measured not by comparing them with what is being spent today, but by com-

Nursing home study warns of drug abuse

Many older Americans living in nursing homes receive excessively potent psychoactive drugs, according to a new study exploring what some experts say is an epidemic of over-medication within the country's expanding elderly population.

The researchers at Harvard Medical School found that mind-altering drugs are being used as "chemical restraints" in short-staffed facilities, and that medication practices have failed to keep up with advances in geriatric medicine.

For example, more than half of the nursing-home residents in the

study regularly received psychoactive drugs, such as sedatives and anti-depressants. One quarter received anti-psychotic drugs, even though only 15 percent had been diagnosed psychotic.

"My concern is that people are having their minds blunted in a way that probably does diminish their ca-

capacity to appreciate life," said Dr. Jerry Avorn, a co-author of the paper published Friday in the Journal of the American Medical Association.

The drugs found to be widely used include the anti-depressant amitriptyline, or Elavil, considered

Conservationists battle timber industry

WASHINGTON — Conservationists and timber industry officials are at loggerheads once again as the Forest Service considers changes in its appeals process.

The timber industry is pushing for the changes, arguing that the current lengthy appeals process is slowing the state's economy. They have accused environmentalists of using the appeals pro-

cess to block the development of millions of acres of national forest land.

But environmentalists want to keep the process just the way it is, describing it as open and fair.

The Forest Service proposal has received strong support from Idaho Reps. Richard Stallings, D-Rexburg, and Larry Craig, R-Midvale.

(Public lands) are being yo-yoed in the court system," Craig said in an interview this week. "We

need some public policy in this area... (conservationists) want to tie up nine million acres of land. That locks my state up."

The proposed reforms are designed to ease pressures on the Forest Service, which has seen the number of public appeals triple over the past three or four years, officials say.

(The Forest Service) hasn't tripled staff to deal with that," said Larry Hill, a Forest Service staff member. • See CONSERVE on Page A2

Ice may have caused recent B-1B crash

WASHINGTON — The B-1B bomber that crashed at Ellsworth Air Force Base in South Dakota on Nov. 17 may have been downed by excessive ice on its wings, according to a senior Pentagon official who said the \$280 million bomber was neither designed nor equipped with wing de-icers.

The bomber crashed at about 10:40 p.m. while making a landing approach in bad weather. Its crew of four ejected moments after the aircraft struck a utility pole and careened into the ground, shattering and burning on impact. It was the second bomber to crash in less than two weeks and the third crash of the controversial aircraft in 14 months. The crew survived the crash.

According to this official, who discussed the crash with the Chicago Tribune only on the ground he would not be identified, a key factor may have been the build-up of ice on the wings that could have made control

during landing impossible.

Maj. Joseph Saxton, an Ellsworth spokesman, said "Light rime icing was forecast for 3,000 to 16,000 feet for the period of the flight." Rime is a type of granular ice formed only from undercooled fog or cloud.

Saxton declined to comment further about whether ice was a factor in the crash. The circumstances surrounding the accident are being investigated by the Air Force Investigating Board, and they will determine its cause," he said.

The B-1B, designed to strike at the heart of the Soviet Union with nuclear and conventional bombs and missiles, has been plagued by problems since becoming operational in 1986.

A Rockwell International spokesman, Mike Mathews, confirmed that unlike civilian aircraft, the B-1B is not equipped with wing de-icers. Rockwell said the prime contractor. "Our wind tunnel tests showed it didn't need them for normal cold weather operations," Mathews said.

Chernobyl eyewitness recalls nuke accident

KIEV, U.S.S.R. — It was 1:24 on a cool April morning when Sergei Gazin heard a loud bang and saw most of the instruments on the control panel before him stop working.

The room shook around him and plaster and dust started to fall from the ceiling.

"That was the moment when I realized that we faced the worst possible situation," said Gazin, recalling the night more than two years ago that changed his life and the lives of thousands of others forever.

Gazin was among the handful of experts who conducted the experiment on the fourth reactor unit of the Chernobyl atomic power station that went awry and caused the world's worst nuclear accident.

Gazin, now 30, lives in a tiny apartment on the edge of Kiev 80 miles from Chernobyl. In the first interview given by one of those running the ill-fated Unit 4 on the morning of April 25, 1986, he described the events inside the reactor.

"I had spent my entire day preparing the steps for the experiment and decided to stay on to help with it," he said in a deliberate voice.

The idea was to simulate a situation where the backup cooling sys-

tem had to be engaged. Residual power from the turbine generators was to power the backup system and we wanted to see how long these generators could supply the system.

The idea was to simulate the worst possible accident," he said.

The last step was to separate the generators from the power supply. ... The steam was cut off and it was left to run on inertia."

All went well at first, he explained, but after one minute, Gazin heard a bang.

"At first I thought it was a hydraulic problem, but when I heard the second sound about three seconds later I knew it was an explosion."

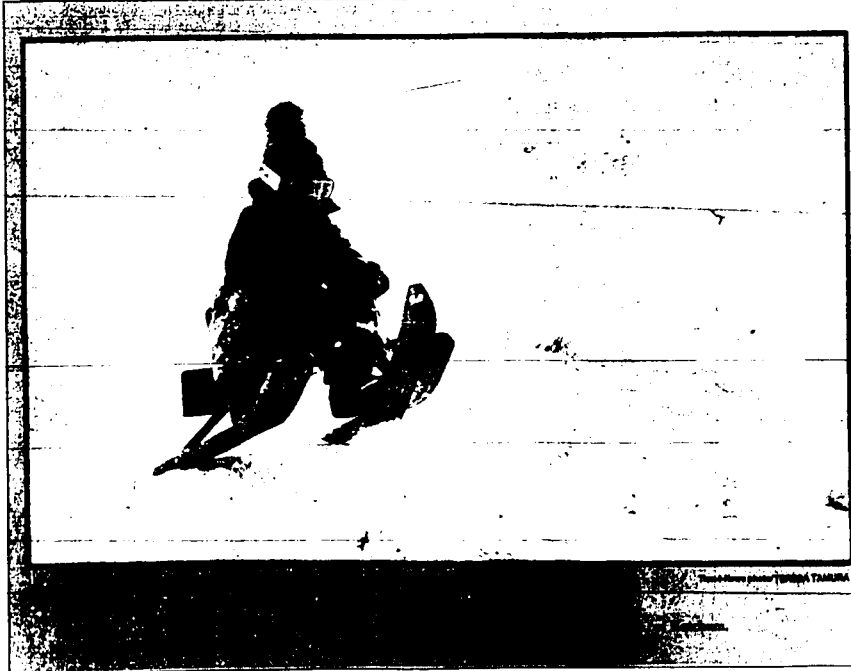
The major portion of our monitoring equipment was lost and the pumping system stopped. There was no water in the cooling system."

As a result, the reactor began to generate enormous heat, pipes burst and the water began spreading the nuclear material throughout the building," he said.

Gazin said that fires started to break out in various parts of the unit, and the bursting pipes sent scalding hot steam spraying everywhere.

"We tried to get to the water supply controls in order to try to force

Pioneer 6 to pass closer to earth

The elder statesman among orbiting spacecraft will jog past Earth Saturday, passing closer than it has since it was launched 23 years ago, and the maneuver will forever change its course.

It won't be all that close — 1.16 million miles — but that is close enough to set the venerable craft on a course that will lengthen its year by six days. From that point on, it will take 317 days for Pioneer 6 to orbit the sun.

The change in course will result from the Earth's gravitational pull. Although the 140-pound spacecraft will come no closer than five times the distance to the moon, the Earth's pull will be strong enough to tug the

craft closer to the planet's own orbit, which is farther out from the sun than Pioneer 6 has been traveling. That, in turn, will add 6 million miles to the satellite's orbit around the sun.

Pioneer 6 is one of those durable little mechanical birds built in Redondo Beach, Calif., by TRW Space & Technology Group that seem to go on forever. Long past its life expectancy, Pioneer 6 — along with three sister probes operated by NASA's Ames Research Center in Mountain View, Calif. — has sent back enough information on the sun to force scientists to change many of their earlier conclusions.

The satellites were designed to study the sun's atmosphere, called the heliosphere, and the solar wind. Be-

undesirable for the elderly because it affects certain nervous system activities and is highly sedating. The researchers said "softer and safer" anti-depressants are preferable; they did not specify which.

Other drugs widely used were the tranquilizers flurazepam, diazepam and chloriazepoxide, also known as Dalmane, Valium and Librium. Again, the researchers said newer, shorter-acting drugs in that class are preferable for elderly people.

They also found that anti-psychotic drugs were used to control volatile or aggressive behavior. The researchers said past studies have identified serious side effects from anti-psychotics in the elderly, and there is no proof that such drugs benefit non-psychotic patients.

Tranquilizers, anti-depressants and anti-psychotics have been linked to a wide range of toxic effects in the elderly, including confusion, over-se-

dition, constipation, incontinence, restlessness, shaking and difficulty with memory. What's important to recognize is that these subtle forms of impairment, when grafted onto an elderly patient, can have profound and sometimes devastating consequences, Dr. Gideon Bosker, a specialist in drug-prescribing in the elderly, commented this week.

The researchers, headed by Dr. Mark Beers, studied the medical records of 850 residents in 12 Massachusetts nursing homes during one month. The homes, so-called intermediate-care facilities, are believed to be representative of others nationwide.

Intermediate-care facilities, in contrast to skilled nursing facilities, do not necessarily require that licensed nurses care for residents. Officials say a majority of all nursing homes fall into that category. About 1.5 million Americans now live in

nursing homes. In the study, the researchers found that nearly two-thirds of the residents had prescriptions for one or more psychoactive medications. Because many of the prescriptions were to be used "as needed," 63 percent actually used psychoactive drugs on five or more days during the month studied.

One-third of all the patients had orders written for anti-psychotic medications, primarily Haldol. Forty percent of all patients were prescribed sedative-hypnotics, and 28 percent used them. Fourteen percent used anti-depressants on at least five days.

Especially alarming were the choices of drugs within each class, the researchers said. Repeatedly, they found physicians had prescribed powerful, long-acting drugs where safer, preferable alternatives were available.

paring them with what would be spent if current law remains in effect and if increases were made to account for inflation and population change.)

The new administration's intention to look at Medicare as a major source of budget savings was signaled Tuesday by Richard G. Darman in statements shortly after President-elect George Bush selected him as Office of Management and Budget director.

However, even incremental cuts in the \$3.5 billion-to-\$5 billion range would be difficult to get through Congress because the American Hospital Association, the Federation of American Health Systems, medical groups and spokesmen for the aged fear some of the cuts could hurt their members or reduce the quality of medical care.

AHA Vice President Jack Owen said that new cuts in payments to hospitals in the long run would affect access to care and technology. You're going to see more hospitals closing.

John Rother of the American Association of Retired Persons said any proposals to increase cost-sharing by beneficiaries, to cut benefits or to reduce eligibility "harms those the program is designed to protect."

Among proposals expected to be backed in some form by the Bush administration are the following, which are now being considered by the Reagan administration for its fiscal 1990 budget:

• Hold the increase in the amounts Medicare pays hospitals to compensate for inflation down to 2 percent, a point less than the expected 5.7 percent rise in the costs of things hospitals buy.

This would save almost \$1 billion in fiscal 1990 compared with what would be spent if a full 5.7 percent increase were granted. If the same formula were used for the next five years, it would reduce Medicare payments to hospitals over five years by more than \$16 billion, according to some estimates. A total freeze on the increases could save even more.

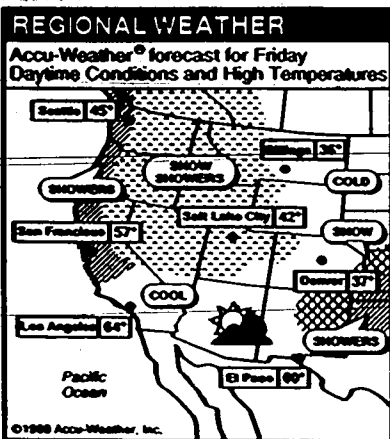
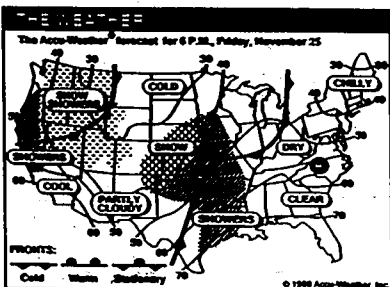
• Keep the "Part B premium," the premium that Medicare recipients pay for the doctor-insurance part of the program, high enough to pay 25 percent of basic program costs, instead of letting it slip to a lower share in 1990, as permitted under current law. (The Treasury pays the other 75 percent.) This could save about \$400 million in 1990.

In 1989, the monthly premium for all recipients will be \$31.90 a month plus a supplemental premium, based on income, for higher-income elderly. Raising the premium enough to cover 28 percent or 29 percent of the Part B cost would up the savings to \$1 billion.

• Cut the direct and indirect subsidies that Medicare pays to hospitals for various teaching and intern costs.

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water into the reactor unit, but it was impossible to get into the room because it was already blocked by streams of hot steam.

He rushed to the generator room and found it flooded, with steam starting to pour out.

All this happened in less than five minutes, he explained, and it was becoming clear to all of the frantically working experts that control had been lost.

They spent the night in a special underground bunker near Unit 1.

Just after dawn they emerged from the bunker and, after a short time inside the main administration building, were placed in "hot" buses to be taken away from the facility.

"It was then when I saw the building that I first understood how dangerous it was and the scale of the accident," he said. "There was no roof left on the control hall. There was no fire, but there was some blackening of the superstructure."

Two-and-a-half years later, Gazin is uncertain about the effects the radiation has had on him. He is under constant medical supervision and frequently feels tired.

"We have to trust the doctors," he said. "I am not too optimistic about the future."

Gerrish and Brodin said they hadn't heard enough about the new store's contents to decide whether its materials were obscene.

A customer at the store defended its existence.

"We need three more of them," said Bill Leedom of Twin Falls, who was shopping in Visions West this week. "They don't drag people in here."

Leedom said he drove to Pocatello's Front Page outlet after the Front Page moved out of Twin Falls early this year.

"It's just like a bar," Leedom said. "If you don't want to go, you don't have to."

"It's not what I would call my cup of tea, but there are other people who like it," Jewell said.

"All I'm saying, to each his own," Jewell said. "If that's the kind of business those folks want to run, then more power to them. They're doing no more harm than a drunk driver driving the street or someone blowing smoke in your face."

In the wake of the Front Page lawsuit, the city passed this summer an ordinance forbidding adult entertainment stores within 2,500 feet of schools, restaurants and churches and 500 feet from residential areas, city parks and other adult stores. Visions West is within a couple of blocks of the Depot Grill restaurant.

The zoning ordinance would allow adult entertainment stores in the Magic Valley Mall area and in a few locations on Kimberly Road.

assistant for systems operations. "It's a tremendous burden." The new rules will be announced in January, Hill said.

Under existing policy, interest groups can appeal decisions made by Forest Service officials on two levels. If a first appeal is turned down by a regional forest ranger, a second appeal can be made to a higher official.

Decisions subject to appeal include long-range comprehensive land management plans, which designate forest areas for a variety of uses, ranging from recreation to timber. Specific on-site plans, such as a single timber sale or road-building proposal, can also be challenged.

An appeal lodged under the current system can take from nine months to several years to process. But under the Forest Service pro-

posal drafted last May, appeals would be subject to a streamlined, one-level review.

Local timber mills are suffering as a result of delays caused by lengthy appeals, congressional and timber industry spokesmen said. Every Idaho national forest plan, which lays out how each forest will be developed, is now under appeal.

"It's putting a crunch on the timber supply," said Stallings' legislative assistant, Cary Jones. "We're facing a real supply problem...local mills are saying, 'You're taking too much time in the appeals process, you're going to put us out of business.'"

"The existing process works," Wilderness Society official Jay Watson said. "It's fair and open...it's time-consuming sometimes, but it works."

Environmental groups say that the new rules will discourage the public from appealing bad decisions. They argue that the elimination of deadline extensions on appeal dates, along with other changes, will make it more difficult to give forest and environmental issues a fair hearing.

"It's not only environmentalists who use the appeals process," Watson said, listing timber, state fish and game, state attorneys, sportsmen — a wide range of interest groups — among those who appeal Forest Service decisions.

But timber industry spokesmen charge environmentalists with using the appeals process to stall needed timber sales. Concerned by those

complaints, Stallings was among those who pushed for a House subcommittee hearing last September that endorsed the proposed changes.

"It's become too complicated a process," Stallings aide Jones said. "It takes way too much time. But Congressman Stallings didn't want to pat blame on any particular group. The process will still be open to all affected users."

Craig readily blames conservation groups. "They just want to shut down operations on public land," he said.

"Idaho makes its living off public lands," Craig said. "I don't want to see our state become another Appalachia. Idaho is a proud, growing state."

One of the major battlegrounds in the controversy is the Clearwater National Forest in northwest Idaho. Timber sales there have been appealed by environmental groups, which charge in some instances that necessary environmental standards have not been met by Forest Service plans.

The Potlatch mill east of Lewiston will depend on mad less forest areas in the Clearwater for much of its timber in the future, said Intermountain Forest Industry Association spokesman Joe Henson.

The appeals process may jeopardize future timber sales at Potlatch and smaller northwestern mills, which also depend on the Clearwater, Henson said.

Eastern Idaho mills are also concerned about possible timber shortages, Cary said.



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Utah infant who underwent heart transplant in fair condition

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The condition of a Utah baby who underwent a heart transplant Nov. 12 has been upgraded from critical to fair at Loma Linda University Medical Center.

Whitney Ray Petersen had been on a ventilator since the operation, but on Wednesday was breathing on his own, said his father, Daymon Petersen of Murray.

Cynthia Petersen said her son's slow recovery had worried her until Tuesday.

"We were worried because one (transplant) baby was off the critical list in 18 hours, and another one was off in three days. The problem was that he had a lot of stuff in his

lungs, and they weren't getting any better. But doctors could tell from his X-rays Monday that he had improved," she said.

Whitney also had the stitches in his chest removed.

"He looks really good. He only had eight sutures. In a couple of years you won't even be able to tell he had it done," Mrs. Petersen said.

Meanwhile, about 20 Utah friends of the Petersen family have organized a fund-raising activity to help with the \$150,000 to \$200,000 cost of Whitney's care. The group will be making and delivering pizzas, which they will sell for \$6.50 to \$8 each.

"We are asking people who would

like to contribute to call Holladay Health Care, where Cindy used to work, and get in touch with one of the people there who are helping on this project," said Roger Larsen, one of the Petersens' friends.

Volunteers will be taking orders for pizzas, which they will make and deliver Dec. 10. The pizzas will be unshredded.

Whitney Petersen was the 23rd child under 6 months of age to undergo a heart transplant at Loma Linda University Medical Center. The baby was born with a heart defect that was detected 21 months before he was born. He was 21 weeks old when his heart was transplanted.

U.S. decision against Soviets, holidays angers peace group

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A peace group has protested a U.S. Department of Defense decision that prohibits Soviet inspectors from spending Thanksgiving and the Christmas holidays at Utahns' homes.

Rosemary A. Holt, president of Women Concerned About Nuclear War, said the rules "thwart the development of better relations between our two countries and encourage the old mentality that we need to have an enemy."

The group had asked the On-Site Inspection Agency to allow Soviet inspectors living in Utah to spend Thanksgiving at the home of University of Utah law professor Ed Firmage.

But the Defense Department said the Soviets may visit public places, including schools and churches, but not accept invitations to private homes.

"As citizens of Utah, we believe that we have a very special opportunity to implement and support the INF Treaty," said Ms. Holt. "Part of that opportunity includes extending friendship to the Soviet inspectors who now live in our community, far from their own homes and families."

A Defense Department spokesman said the decision forbidding Soviet in-

spectors from spending time in Utah homes came about for security purposes.

"It's not a good idea, from a security aspect, to provide security for the Soviets if they're going to individual homes," said the spokesman who spoke on condition that his name not be used.

"But we'll allow the Soviets to visit public places, such as churches, schools or just about any civic organization you can think of," he said.

"We're simply saying 'No' to requests that the Soviets visit individual homes. There's just too many requests to consider, and it makes guaranteeing their safety too difficult."

"I'm underwhelmed with such reasoning," said Firmage. "How is it any less difficult to ensure security in a public building that has many offices and entrances than it is for a private home?"

"The hope of any legalistic agreement such as the Intermediate Nuclear Forces Treaty is that the number of nuclear weapons will be lessened," he said. "But there's also the hope that relations between our peo-

ple will be improved. Even a more sweeping treaty is still not nearly as important as basic trust and fellowship between people."

The Defense Department spokesman said the Soviet inspectors would be served a turkey dinner by a linguist and were being encouraged to take advantage of activities going on during the holidays, such as the America's Pro Cup ski races in Park City.

Under terms of the INF Treaty, Soviet inspectors may not travel outside a 31-mile radius of Heratules, and they must be escorted at all times by American guards.

The same conditions apply to American inspectors living in the Soviet Union.

Ms. Holt said her group will contact OSIA director Brig. Gen. Roland Lajoie in Washington D.C. to protest the ban.

"This new policy isolates, denies and prevents the Soviets and the people of Utah from developing a more realistic, humane concept of one another," she said. Firmage said he will ask the Soviets be allowed to celebrate Christmas in his home.

Judge forbids file disclosure in polygamy case

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A federal judge has prohibited disclosure of a wide variety of filings in a dissident property rights suit against leaders of their polygamous community.

U.S. District Chief Judge Bruce S. Jenkins approved the secrecy order Wednesday covering "interrogatory answers, responses to requests for admission, deposition transcripts and exhibits, pleadings, motions, affidavits" and briefs that summarize any other confidential information.

Thirty-five plaintiffs filed suit last year against the United Effort Plan, the towns Hildale, Utah, and Colorado City, Ariz., and leaders of the polygamous group which dominates the area.

The plaintiffs claim the trust has been used to control them. They allege they have been threatened with eviction from property they donated to, and which is now owned by the organization.

Under the order, documents are considered confidential if one of the lawyers, in good faith, stamps it confi-

dential, believing it contains "a trade secret or other confidential research, development or commercial information" or that disclosure "to the press will cause harm sufficient to warrant a protective order" under federal law.

Any of the litigants wanting to disclose a stamped item to the press must give 15 days notice to the lawyers, identifying what is to be released, the names and address of the reporter and the purpose of the disclosure.

The lawyers can designate passages they want kept secret after that time by underlining them.

"It is agreed that tapes of religious services shall, in no event, be made available to the press," the order said.

"If this matter reaches the trial stage, whatever goes on in the courtroom is ordinarily open to everyone," said the judge. "That is to say, we engage in public trial."

Before signing the order, Jenkins said the lawyers were "suggesting this helps you handle what is essentially a private dispute in a public forum."

Prison: Hofmann overdose was suicide attempt

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Confessed killer Mark W. Hofmann's Sept. 15 drug overdose was an attempt to take his own life, prison investigators concluded.

Hofmann will not talk about the attempt, but prison officials said they have no reason to believe the documents forged is still suicidal.

The Utah Department of Corrections released a statement Wednesday at the conclusion of its investigation into Hofmann's overdose of anti-depressant drugs.

A sufficient number of the tricyclic sedatives were purchased from other prisoners to have caused Hofmann's death. But toxicologists were unable to determine how many of the pills

he took, the statement said.

Hofmann's suicide attempt occurred about one month after his wife filed for divorce, but his attorney said the filing had been expected by Hofmann.

Earlier, authorities said they had found that letters by Hofmann had contained coded information about documents examiner George Throckmorton and two Board of Pardons members who at the beginning of the year had said Hofmann would spend the rest of his life in prison.

On Sept. 15, Hofmann's cell mate returned to his cell to find the confessed bomber comatose. He was rushed to University Hospital in critical condition and treated for an over-

dose. In addition, he suffered tissue damage to his right arm, apparently caused by laying lying on top of it for a long time.

Twelve days after the incident, Hofmann returned to the Utah State Prison.

Hofmann is now under normal surveillance at the prison. "We have no evidence to indicate he is suicidal," said spokesman Juan Benavidez.

Benavidez said Hofmann was not undergoing counseling or psychiatric care.

After a plea bargain, Hofmann admitted to killing two people with pipe bombs to prevent disclosure of his document forgeries.

WSU to begin exchange program with Soviets

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President Samuel Smith and Victor V. Gorchakov, president of Far Eastern State University in Vladivostok, announced the signing at the Pullman campus.

"We're in the very final stages of working out the details of our exchange program. This is an historic agreement," Smith said.

"The process of perestroika has touched many areas of Soviet society,

but especially education," Gorchakov said through an interpreter. "To move the process forward as quickly as possible and with quality, we have turned to other countries for ideas. We have been thinking for several years about how to develop a relationship between our university and the United States.

"Economic restructuring is going on in Russia. We want to participate in world trade on the Pacific Rim, and want to learn ideas and culture related to that effort," Gorchakov said.

The agreement signals the first exchange program with a U.S. universi-

ty for Far Eastern. It is the leading Soviet university on the Pacific Rim, with 10 colleges, 9,000 students and 700 faculty members.

"The new program is expected to involve exchanges of faculty, graduate and undergraduate students in such areas as the sciences, political science and communication. The first exchanges are expected to begin in 1990.

Vladivostok is a city of 600,000 residents located on the Sea of Japan, due west of Hokkaido, the northern island of Japan.

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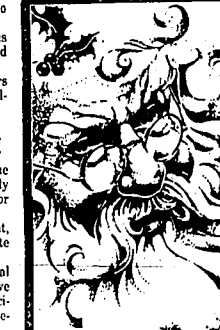
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Cost of B-2 program is no laughing matter

Almost a decade after plans for its development first became known, the latest weapon system in the U.S. strategic arsenal, the B-2, or stealth bomber, has had its coming-out party. While remaining largely mum about how the unusual plane works and what its supposed capabilities are, the Air Force and Northrop Corp., its developer, have not hesitated to praise it as a marvel of advanced engineering and technology. For now, Americans will have to take that claim on faith.

What elicits the greatest awe and wonder at the moment is the B-2 program's cost. The General Accounting Office estimates that if the Air Force buys all 132 B-2s that it wants, and given the usual cost overruns, each stealth will carry a price of \$450 million to \$500 million.

That is a staggering sum of money, and the arguments that have only begun about whether the bomber program is worth its costs are certain to continue for years to come. In a refrain that has been heard about virtually every new strategic weapon developed over the last 35 years or more, supporters of the new bomber say that if the B-2 helps to deter nuclear war, it is worth every penny of its cost.

To be sure. But the question that critics ask over and over remains relevant: Are there no cheaper and equally effective weapons to preserve the peace? Each B-2 will cost up to 80 percent more than the \$280 million B-1B bomber. All this for a plane that has so far literally never left the ground.

Are what have become the world's most expensive and complicated weapons also the most desirable weapons to possess? Do they make an indispensable contribution to protecting national security?

If a single bomber costs \$500 million in 1988, what will a single bomber of the next generation of technological progress cost?

What other things could be bought for the \$68.5 billion that the B-2 program will cost, or even the \$28 billion so far spent on the B-1B; that would contribute tangibly to making the nation stronger and safer?

The joke a few years ago was that the time was coming when the entire defense budget would pay for only a single weapon. It doesn't look much like a joke anymore.

No justification for teaching creationism

In discussing the issue of what should be taught in science classes (TN 11/09/88 article "Creationism guidelines draw fire"), Mr. Gerrish was quoted as saying that evolution "should not be given more weight than other theories."

This is an interesting statement. The "Origin of Species" was published in 1859. Within one or two decades after its publication, evolution had become firmly entrenched in biological thought.

For more than a century tens of thousands of scientists have accepted evolution as a great fundamental theory of biology. As of 1988, the historical existence of evolution is viewed as fact by almost all biologists. Evolution has reached this status because of what now amounts to mountains of supporting evidence.

What then are these "other theories" that they should merit equal time with evolution which is widely accepted as fact? What is the status of these "other theories"?

If evolution is to be taught as a "mere theory" that must compete with alternative explanations that are not testable, and that have no scientific foundation, then is it not also logical to insist that astrology be taught as an alternate theory of psychology, extrasensory perception as a theory of physiology, and alchemy as a theory of chemistry?

Mr. Gerrish is also quoted as saying "debate about differing theories of how the world evolved is ongoing in the scientific community and should be brought into the classroom."

The scientists involved in these debates are guilty. Guilty that is, of doing science.

In evolutionary biology, as is the case in many areas of science, there is ongoing debate and in fact it has sometimes been fairly intense. However, the debate is not about the historical reality of evolution.

The debate is about the details and mode of evolution, i.e. the mechanics of speciation, the relative importance of natural selection and ge-

netic drift, and such things as punctuated equilibrium, etc. Such debate is what science is all about.

Let me be misunderstood, it is not my intent to impugn the motives of Mr. Gerrish, nor is it my desire that he and I should become antagonists. He has developed the skills of a good teacher for which he has my respect and admiration.

The guidelines for the Twin Falls School District reportedly contain the statements: "Evidence supporting any origin theory should be documented as having a scientific basis" and "Information which is considered to be a religious tenet should not be presented."

At first glance these statements might appear to provide the intended controls.

However, as one who has studied the creationist movement for several years, my question is this: what test is to be applied? Against what standards are we to measure? What qualifies as a "scientific basis"? The Institute for Creation Research has published a public school version of their creationism text which supposedly teaches creationism without teaching religious doctrine. Does their twisted version of science qualify as "scientific basis"?

Unless the wording is made to be fairly explicit, the intent of the guidelines can be easily subverted. Unfortunately, the intent may be subtly subverted regardless of the guidelines merely as a result of the tone of presentation, or as a result of casual omissions of evidence.

The business of science teachers is to teach science. It is not the teaching of every conceivable theory that can be cooked up.

Inheritance of acquired characteristics still stands as a theory of inheritance (and until recently it was a part of the "scientific" dogma of the Soviet Union), but it is a discredited theory, and science teachers are under no obligation to

include it in their courses. Neither are they obliged to teach the Ptolemaic theory of the solar system, or the theory that the earth is flat, even though there is a Flat Earth Society that holds this belief.

Science teachers are obliged to teach science as it is currently understood by the community of practicing scientists in the field. Certainly this simple statement qualifies to serve as the basis for the guidelines for the Twin Falls School District.

The students should be challenged to discover why scientists hold the beliefs they do. Evolutionary theory is based upon evidence, although you probably wouldn't know it from the way it is normally taught in the public schools. The students should be taught about these evidences which have persuaded the scientific community.

I also think it is important that teachers approach students' religious beliefs with respect and sensitivity. And certainly it is appropriate to inform the students that many scientists, including evolutionary biologists, are devoutly religious.

Indeed, there is a false dichotomy with regard to science and religion. This is a dichotomy which is taught by the creationists because it fits their restricted view.

There is no justification for teaching creationism in the science classroom.

However, I wonder how it would be taught if it were to be allowed or even mandated.

Would it be subjected to the same critical analysis that is brought to bear on evolution and the rest of science?

Would the creationists be willing to accept a science text that instead of merely presenting the evidence for evolution went so far as to expose the inconsistencies and absurdities of the creationist theories?

Ideas exchange is fire priority

The environmental issues confronting the livestock operator of today cause me great concern. Protection of riparian zones, encroachment of big game into our crops, and 60-40 percent conifers are only a few of the recent problems that make me feel the livestock operator should head the endangered species list.

In as much as most of the management decisions are political rather than environmental, I feel it imperative to express my opinions and hope it will do some good.

Prior to 1905, when the U.S. Forest Service was established, nature took care of the forest. Lightning fires burned themselves out, cleaning the forests of debris, insects and disease. Even the Indians recognized the importance of fire and made a practice of burning out areas during certain times of the year.

Prior to 1934, when the Bureau of Land Management began managing rangelands, fires were either allowed to burn or were put out through community fire fighting. Fire created good, palatable grass and browse for wildlife and livestock and maintained timber stands in a vigorous condition. All of this with no cost to the taxpayer.

When the government took over and changed management, the wildlands were over-protected. Fires were declared evil and immediately put out. This practice, through the years, has led to a huge buildup of excessive fuels and created a breeding ground for forest insects and disease.

The huge catastrophic fires we have recently experienced in the western states are directly attributable to this huge buildup of fuels and rampant insect infestations in our forests.

Now it is a major catastrophe when fire strikes. In most cases there are no permanent fire lines or fuel breaks, nothing to backfire from. It is no one's fault except for the over-protection management of the forest and BLM lands from the Washington office.

Management philosophies need to be changed. Adequate numbers of livestock and wildlife need to be maintained on the range in order to prevent a large carryover of grass and browse.

This would greatly reduce our

wildfire problem. In areas where over-protection has built up rank grass and brush, control burning at the proper time of year should be used. This will increase the palatability of the forage and provide much better distribution of grazing animals, consequently relieving the grazing pressure on the riparian zones.

The recent philosophy of letting fires burn in wilderness and back country areas is ill-conceived. Control burning, under the right conditions, is a good management tool, but the burning of a 100-year accumulation of fuel under wild-fire conditions is extremely harmful to watersheds.

We should put permanent fire lines in our forests from which we can backfire. No forest area should be over 30,000 to 40,000 acres without a fire line around that will cause the wild fire to come back to the ground.

We should hire a permanent crew of fire fighters who know all types of fire fighting, and who fight fires with their heads and not sheer brute strength like we are doing now.

When these fire fighters are not fighting fire, they can be building fire trails, etc. Back in the 1930s and 1940s we had the Civilian Conservation Corps doing this. It should be done again. Some of these fire trails could be cut by the public wood cutters if the area was marked out.

Fire fighting is a professional job and you only really learn it by doing the actual work. I have fought fire as a boy and I did a lot of control burning in my business.

Control burning is a great tool when used right. It is economical, provides a lot of management benefits to our wildlands, and is invaluable in the training of professional firemen to combat wildfire.

The environmental issues facing us today are many and there are no cut and dried answers to the problems. An exchange of ideas is imperative as political decisions are made to solve ecological problems.

Euthanasia: Murder or mercy killing?

BOSTON-It is certain that Peter Rosier wouldn't be on trial today if he hadn't been on television two years ago. If he hadn't told all of Fort Myers, Fla., that, "I administered something to terminate her life."

His wife Patricia, after all, a woman whose lung cancer had spread to her other organs, had told everyone that she intended to commit suicide. Indeed she planned her death as a final elaborate production.

Perhaps it was a dramatic attempt to control, or shape, or choose the terms of her death. Perhaps it was an attempt to win some perverse victory over her cancer. Either way, Patricia Rosier, 43, picked the date, the time, even the wine for her last meal. She picked out the pills and she swallowed them.

Death, however, didn't play the accommodating role that had been scripted for it. While the Rosier children slept in the next room, the deep coma induced by 20 Seconal pills began to lighten. Her husband Peter, a pathologist, went downstairs searching for morphine. And then, as he said a year later, he "administered something."

The irony is that if Dr. Rosier told the truth on television it was not the whole truth. The morphine he administered wasn't the immediate cause of his wife's death. Patricia's stepfather would testify to that after being granted immunity.

At the scene of this botched attempt, Vincent Delman feared that she would become, in his words, "a vegetable," and he put his hand over his stepdaughter's mouth and nose. So it was that Patricia Rosier began by attempting suicide and her stepfather finished the job. But it is, nevertheless, her husband who is on trial for murder, for attempted murder, for conspiracy to commit murder.

In its simplest terms, the case asks whether Dr. Rosier is guilty of these crimes. But in more complicated terms, the case asks us to think about the moral difference between assisting

suicide and committing murder. The one thing everyone agrees upon is that Patricia Rosier was determined to end her own life ahead of the horrors she read into her cancer prognosis.

The law today allows—if that is the right word—people to commit suicide. But what happens when someone who is terminally ill and utterly rational needs help to carry out the wish to die?

That is not an idle question. All over this country, husbands and wives, AIDS victims and lovers, friends and parents and children have made pacts to help each other "along the way."

But if we provide the pills—or for that matter the bullets or the morphine shot—they request, are we just the errand-runner, the legs for these wishes? Or are we the active accomplices in their death?

Our refusal to help means, for example, that only those people healthy enough to get a prescription themselves can choose their own death.

Our inability to help means that many will die alone. But our agreement to put pills on a night stand or in a mouth could mean that complicity in death is justified because someone asks for it.

The Rosier case is a particularly strange one. When Patricia Rosier's suicide attempt began to fail, her panicky husband had already been drawn into the drama. Caught up in the power of her last wishes, he felt compelled to fulfill them. Her stepfather, standing over the woman in a coma, said to himself, "Enough is enough."

Was Dr. Rosier morally right when he admin-

istered the morphine? Would it have been morally right to allow his wife, who had chosen suicide, to end up in a coma? I am not at all sure.

Is he, on the other hand, a murderer, even an attempted murderer in the way we understand that term? That I can answer with certainty: no. No, because he hadn't begun this death. No, because he didn't complete it.

The saddest part of this story is that Patricia Rosier decided to commit suicide in the first place, to secure a gentle death.

"It is," worries Dan Callahan, an ethicist at the Hastings Center, "an increasing terror of medical progress" that lurks behind many such a choice among the ill. "People feel the only way they can regain self-control is to have available the possibility of suicide."

The fear of unnecessary pain and the fear of losing control to a technological death have changed the nature of many last wishes.

So, the most telling part of the Patricia Rosier story is not the one played out on television or in the courtroom. It's the tale of a woman who finally believed that suicide was more merciful than medicine.

Iran-Contra case is reopened

MIAMI — The Iran-Contra special prosecutor and a U.S. Senate committee have reopened investigations into possible improprieties and intentional illegal military aid to Nicaraguan Contra rebels.

Investigators are focusing on whether the Reagan administration deliberately stalled the investigation that began in Miami in January 1986 to cover up the Oliver North network and the administration's role, according to current and former prosecutors in the U.S. Attorney's Office in Miami and other lawyers familiar with the investigation.

An investigation of improprieties involving former U.S. Attorney General Edwin Meese III and former U.S. Attorney Leon Kellner was opened last year but was not pursued when substantial evidence of irregularities was not found. Previous allegations centered around suspicions that the Justice Department had ordered that the investigation be slowed down.

In June, however, the original prosecutor in the Contra gun-running and arms sales case that began in January 1986 went to the independent counsel in Washington with new information he had discovered that could indicate otherwise.

The prosecutor, former Assistant U.S. Attorney Jeffrey Feldman, confirmed Wednesday that he also testified last month at closed-door hearings of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, which is looking into the way the Contra investigation that started in Miami was handled.

"I did this because it was my ethical responsibility to report any perceived ethical or legal violation that may have occurred while the case was under review by the Justice Department and the supervisors at the U.S. Attorney's Office," Feldman said Wednesday.

He declined to disclose exactly what he has told investigators from either the committee or the independent counsel, saying that "it would be improper to go into any more detail than that because it could jeopardize the independent counsel's investigation."

A spokesman for the independent counsel in Washington declined to comment on the investigation, but U.S. Attorney Dexter Lehtinen in Miami confirmed that this month a team of investigators from the independent counsel asked to interview people who were in office when the Contra inquiry was under way.

"They didn't talk to me, they talked to people who were here (during the Contra investigation)," Lehtinen said. "I mean, I guess they talked to people. I never followed it up. When they ask, we give."

Lehtinen, who took over the post of U.S. attorney in the Southern District of Florida after Kellner left in June, said that he has forwarded documents relating to the investigation because he was asked to do so by the independent counsel.

California attorney general warns insurers

LOS ANGELES — Attorney General John Van de Kamp, reacting to the turmoil in California's auto insurance market, warned insurers Wednesday he will prosecute them if they espire to stop selling insurance.

Van de Kamp said he had no hard evidence of such activity, but cautioned, "Current federal law forbids

companies from conspiring to boycott, coerce or intimidate."

He noted that 67 companies, representing more than three-quarters of all auto insurance policies in the state, have stopped selling insurance, threatened to stop selling or have stopped selling policies and then later returned to doing business in California since voters approved rate-cutting Proposition 103 on Nov. 8.

Also, by Wednesday 11 companies, controlling 40 percent of the auto insurance business in the state, had asked the state's insurance commissioner for relief from Proposition 103's rate cuts.

However, a spokesman for the insurance industry saw Van de Kamp's action as a cynical manipulation.

Church not responsible for suicide, court rules

SAN FRANCISCO — In the first ruling of its kind in California, the state Supreme Court decided Wednesday that a church cannot be held legally responsible for the suicide of a depressed man who received its clergy's counseling.

The decision is significant because the case was so emotionally charged and because it was the first case of alleged clergy malpractice, or negligence by religious counselors, to reach the court.

Representatives of every Protestant denomination had filed court documents supporting the position of Grace Community Church of the Valley in Sun Valley, according to a church attorney.

The ruling came as the result of a lawsuit filed by Walter and Maria Nally, the parents of a 24-year-old South-

ern California man who killed himself, using a shotgun, in April 1979.

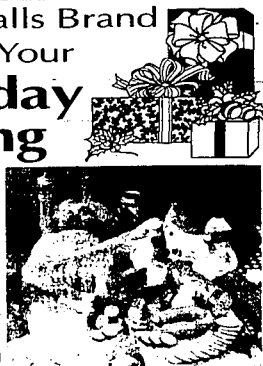
The Nallys sued Grace Community Church — the largest Protestant church in Los Angeles County with 10,000 members — for \$1 million, contending that pastors of church who counseled their son, Kenneth, for several years knew he was suicidal and should have sent him to a psychiatrist.

The couple also alleged in their suit that the church's method of counseling, which allegedly stressed sin and guilt, deepened their son's depression and helped cause his death.

The court strongly disagreed. "Neither the Legislature nor the courts have ever imposed a legal obligation on persons to take affirmative steps to prevent the suicide of one who is not under the care of a physician in a hospital," Chief Justice Malcolm Lucas.

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Chances for pardon of North are fading

WASHINGTON — The unusual minut within the top ranks of government over a possible pardon for retired Marine Lt. Col. Oliver L. North in the Iran-Contra case is continuing into the holiday weekend, indicating that his chances may be fading but are not yet lost.

President Reagan's staff appears to be intensifying efforts to discourage press speculation about a pardon, yet it still will not say finally or flatly that a pardon has been ruled out.

Reagan himself has repeatedly implied that he believes that the case should be allowed to run its course in court — a view that President-elect George Bush also has expressed.

But Reagan, it is understood, has not yet arrived at a firm opinion, which could explain why a pardon remains possible even if less likely.

High-level officials at the Department of Justice remain deeply troubled about some of the constitutional implications of the criminal case against North, but the officials insist that they are not involved with the question of a pardon, which could end the case altogether. All inquiries to Justice officials, in fact, are referred to the White House, with the suggestion that only the president's views count.

What now seems increasingly likely is that the issue will simply continue, unsettled, for the next several weeks as Reagan's term winds down and the North case progresses toward a trial, starting perhaps in late January.

When the trial draws nearer, it is expected that the issue will come to the fore again, all but forcing Reagan to make a final decision in his last days in office.

There seems real doubt, among key officials here, that the question will be left over for Bush to answer.

The speculation about a pardon by Reagan has persisted and even grown this week, in part because of a series of comments by Reagan's chief spokesman, Marlin Fitzwater. It had been standard for Fitzwater to respond to press questions by saying that the president wanted the courts to deal with the case first.

He gave that response again this week, but Monday, Fitzwater told reporters accompanying the president on a trip to California: "I maintain that no one knows what the president's thinking on this is." That tended to suggest that the question was, indeed, still open.

And later that day, when asked whether he was nearing a decision on a pardon, Reagan replied: "No, no. And I don't think it would be any time to make such a decision while it's still before the courts."

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Optimism up in Sun Valley

KETCHUM — With Bald Mountain heading into its second day of a new ski season, the mood in Sun Valley is cautiously optimistic.

Mother Nature has dumped at least 33 inches of snow on top of the area's primary skiing mountain — likely as much as the mountain had at anytime last year.

"We had a lot of skiers up there," said Dick Andersen, night manager at Sun Valley. Despite some minor problems with the new high-speed lifts, "it was maybe the best Thanksgiving I've ever seen," he said.

Locals hope the snowfall signals a return to the banner years of the early 1980s and will help them forget the previous two years. Early indications are that business will increase this year in Sun Valley.

But the past two years began with early snowfalls, too, so residents are approaching this season warily.

"We're just a little gun-shy after the last two years," said Henry Taylor, owner of the Tynelton Lodge in Ketchum and the Airport Inn in Hatley.

Sun Valley's big year was the 1981-82 season when a plentiful snowfall resulted in 476,322 skier days compared with about 319,000 in the 1986-87 season and a dismal 258,061 skiers last year.

The past two years averaged 34 percent fewer skier days than the average of the previous five years.

Such drops in skier days has a direct impact on the Sun Valley economy.

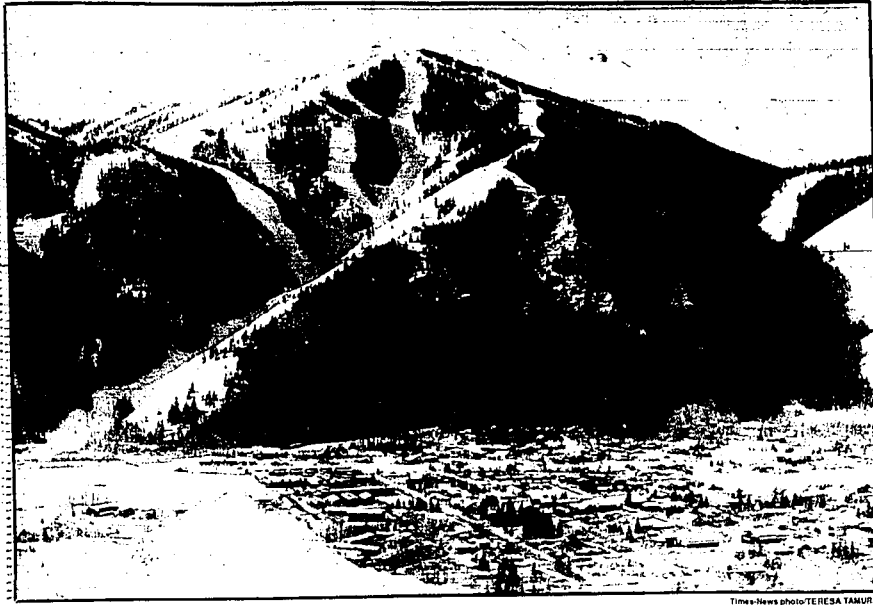
"We went from 1,500 plus cords of wood per winter season in the pre-drought years to less than a thousand cords per season the last two years," Terry Roth, co-owner of Pioneer Wood Service in Hatley, said.

Darley deFabry, president of the Snug Co., a major Sun Valley ski accessory retailer, said his company's business declined by as much as 20 percent the last two years.

Duffy Witmer, owner of the Pioneer Cafe, a popular dinner restaurant, especially with locals, said business was down 5-10 percent.

The only way to describe the last two years was that we were hanging on by our toenails," said Kathryn Olson, owner of Resort Reservations.

Investment gives area hope for future

POMERELLE — A \$750,000 investment by Pomerelle ski resort owners has not only brought smiles to the faces of skiers, but it has the business community looking forward to a shot in the arm.

Woody and Sandy Anderson, owners of the winter recreation area, had their new triple chair lift in operation Thursday. It replaces a double chair built about 20 years ago to serve the major portion of their mountain.

"It just was perfect for Thanksgiving," Jody Anderson said. With four inches of new snow and still snowing, it was one of the best Thanksgivings at Pomerelle, she said. The resort had "a much larger crowd" than expected for the holiday.

The new lift with a current capacity of 1,200 skiers per hour will about double the skier delivery capabilities of the resort, Anderson says. More important, the lift can be used during severe weather because its upper terminal and unloading ramp are several hundred feet below the location of its predecessor.

This will keep the skiers in the shelter of the tree line and away from the bare windswept upper reaches of Mt. Harrison. "We will be able to operate this lift even in winter storms and in strong winds," Anderson said.

The new lift, which carries three skiers per chair, replaces the double chair. It is 4,400 feet long. However, both terminals have been relocated,

ed, the lower one with loading area closer to the lodge.

The resort still has the shorter double chair for beginner and low intermediate runs.

Part of the credit for the new facility goes to last year's record season at Pomerelle, Sandy Anderson said.

"Even though we did not open for the season until Dec. 4, and missed the Thanksgiving holiday business, we set an all-time record for skier days," she said.

Blessed with an abundance of snow when some resorts were unable to open, Pomerelle attracted skiers from throughout southern Idaho and parts of northern Utah and other states.

Business leaders in the Burley area are happy with the expansion.

Bill Schafer, Burley Chamber of Commerce executive director, said most Burley and Rupert-area

businesses benefit from skiing.

"It isn't just the ski shop, but it brings a lot of dollars into our community from other counties and states, during winter's sometimes slow business months. The service stations, cafes, automobile repair shops — and the list goes on — all get a boost in sales," Schafer said.

"Last year we had a lot of skiers coming into our town because we had about the earliest and best skiing around. Those outside dollars help a lot," he said.

Burley Mayor Ken Fronk agrees. He noted that most people from southern Idaho and other states traveling to Pomerelle to through Burley.

"This means lots of business for us," Fronk said. "They stop here for food, gasoline, lodging and even ski clothes and equipment. If we have a slow period it's January through March. Last year traffic was heavy in those months and motel and other business was up."

One of Burley's major motels, The Burley Inn, had a busy winter last year, hosting skiers from many regions. Manager Brad Naisbitt said skiing brings in business during a slow period for such establishments.

"We were planning some remodeling during the off-season but we had too many people in the motel to get started," he said.

Anderson has long contended that the growth of the ski industry begins with the smaller resorts. He purchased Pomerelle in 1973 and has contin-

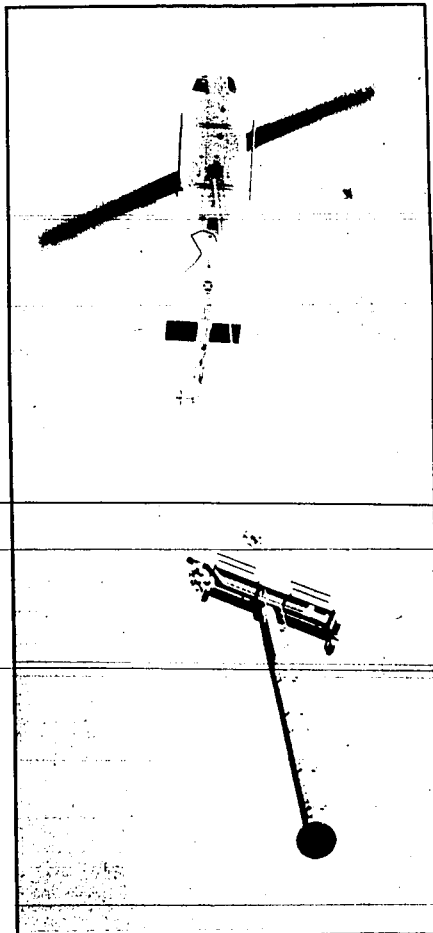

Pomerelle improved, but roads still bad

BURLEY — In the past 15 years the Pomerelle ski area has added two chair lifts, expanded the day lodge and increased ski runs, but the last 7.1 miles of road to the area remains unchanged.

The gravel road is a steep two-lane with hairpin turns that winds its way up into the Albion Mountains. In the summer, sections have a rough washboard surface. In the winter, the sharp turns can be hazardous to anyone not familiar with driving on snow.

The road also is used by winter snowmobilers and cross-country skiers and in summer is a route to the forest area, which includes summer homes, camping, fishing, hunting and the scenic Lake Cleveland.

The road is a well-traveled route that many say could be paved.

Chamber of Commerce Manager Bill Schafer and Mayor Ken Fronk, both of Burley, and both skiers, say community support for the road is strong but so far not successful.

The problem is concisely put by Cassia County Commissioner Norman Dayley. "Everybody wants a good road into the area but nobody has the money," Dayley said.

The road lies within the Albion Highway District, which doesn't have the funds for a major project. So the Burley District and Cassia County combine efforts to maintain the road in winter and summer. Cassia County alone contributes \$15,000 annually to maintenance, Dayley said.

But the district and county don't have the money to pave it.

Woody Anderson, owner of

Pomerelle, said a long-standing agreement of sorts calls for paving the road through a cooperative program. Sawtooth National Forest Ranger Jerry Green said the agreement was reached in about 1963, long before he came to the area.

At that time the Forest Service agreed with the county and highway districts that it would build the grade for the road and then turn it over to the county and highway districts for maintenance and paving when financially feasible.

But it has never been financially feasible for the agencies to go ahead, Green said.

Dayley said the only way he feels the road could be paved would be to float a bond issue. It would be a very costly project, he said.

He said it was originally believed that federal or state funds would be

available but that hasn't proven to be true.

Recently some agencies have reactivated their effort and are exploring additional possibilities.

Paul Matthews of the Burley Area Development Commission says he hopes the project can be tied in with other recreational areas, such as the historic Cassia City of Rocks, and possibly with some beneficial use of the old Albion college campus.

Anderson, who just added a \$750,000 triple chair lift at Pomerelle, says the area's potential is being held up by the poor road.

"There are a lot of other things I could do here for both winter and summer recreation, but not as long as my customers have to drive the present road conditions," Anderson said.

Near-record rainfall washes away nightmares of drought

TWIN FALLS — Fears of continued drought are washing away with the near-record November rainfall.

"But the weather bringing drought relief also is bringing hazardous conditions for Thanksgiving holiday travelers.

"There's snow in all directions," said Bill Galkin of the National Weather Service in Kimberly. Magic Valley travelers should be prepared for wintertime driving conditions," he said.

Every driver should carry sand, chains, a shovel and a blanket, Galkin suggested. And don't let the gas tank run low.

The current storm is expected to last through Thanksgiving Day with a possible let-up Friday. Another storm is close on the heels of this one, however, Galkin said.

November precipitation so far this year is about 2.1 inches, creeping up on the November record of 2.27 inches, Galkin said. And

it's still snowing.

The turbulent weather is typical of seasonal transition periods at winter's start and close, Galkin said.

If drivers are lamenting the stormy weather, other folks are rejoicing in the rain and snow that are replenishing soil moisture on Magic Valley farms and providing excellent conditions at local ski areas.

Though not a guaranteed end to the drought, the gentle soaking rain is welcomed by Magic Valley farmers as it replenishes soil moisture, said Jack Eakin, manager of Twin Falls Canal Co.

"We've got a lot of making up to do," he said. After two years of drought and the driest October on record, the rainfall soaking the ground and snow in higher elevations this month have brought hopes of an end to the drought. But the answer won't be in until next spring when the irrigation season starts again.

The immediate beneficiaries of the nasty weather are the local ski areas.

Pomerelle reports excellent ski conditions with 12 inches of new snow from Tuesday afternoon to Wednesday afternoon.

"As of Wednesday, Pomerelle had a base of 63 inches at the top of the mountain and 47 inches at the bottom. And it was still snowing hard."

The new triple chair will be initiated today as Thanksgiving skiers hit the new snow.

Sun Valley load-tested its new high-speed quad lifts Monday and Tuesday.

"They came through with flying colors," said Shannon Besoyan, Sun Valley spokeswoman.

The \$7 million lifts are designed to eliminate lift lines that reach epic proportions during the height of the ski season. The longest lift rides now will take less than 10 minutes. They used to be 20 to 30 minutes.

Two of the three new lifts, which have four chairs abreast, the Greyhawk and the Challenger, will open at 9 a.m. today. A third lift will open when there's enough snow on the runs' serves.

Wednesday afternoon, Sun Valley reported 91 inches of new snow on a base of 33 inches of packed powder.

Soldier Mountain will open at 10 a.m. today with almost three feet of untouched snow. It was snowing off and on with 34 inches at the bottom and 40 inches on top.

Conditions were described as the best opening in years.

Soldier Mountain also will run a bus starting Friday. It will leave the Blue Lakes Mall at 7:30 a.m., Lincoln Plaza in Jerome at 8:30 and W Food market in Wendell at 8:20 and Gooding Junior High at 8:30.

It will run today and Saturday this week-end. Normally it will run Saturday and Sunday.

Magic Mountain is scheduled to open Dec. 16. The Forest Service reports more than two feet of snow at the Diamondfield Jack Winter Sports Area in the South Hills. Nordic trails will be groomed beginning after the Thanksgiving weekend.

Galena Lodge has more than 37 kilometers of cross country ski trails. Snowmaking conditions are excellent on the Albion and Sublett Divisions, according to the Forest Service.

Snow tires, chains or four-wheel drives are recommended on many Forest Service roads. High winds at higher elevations and warm temperatures, however, mean unstable snow-pack conditions. Drivers are advised that road and snow conditions can change in a matter of a few hours.

The American Automobile Association reports the average price Thanksgiving travelers will pay for gasoline in Idaho is \$1.09 per gallon. Self-serve averages across the state are 99.8 cents for regular, \$1.02 for unleaded, \$1.16 for super-unleaded and \$1.02 for diesel, according to an AAA survey.

AAA estimated that 24.4 million Americans will be braving the weather to travel 100 miles or more this Thanksgiving week-end, an increase of about 7 percent over last year.

AIDS treatment looks successful

DALLAS — Researchers have created a biochemical imposter that gains entrance to cells infected with the AIDS virus and kills them without harming the normal cells.

The treatment — tested only in a laboratory dish so far — is 1,000 times more toxic to infected cells than uninfected cells, said Ellen Vitetta, director of the cancer immunology program at the University of Texas Southwestern Medical Center at Dallas.

Vitetta and colleagues created the new treatment by linking a portion of a genetically engineered version of a protein found on normal cells.

While the treatment probably would carry little risk, scientists must answer a number of questions in the laboratory before they can determine whether it could be effective in humans, Vitetta said.

"You can probably inject people tomorrow without any problem, but it would be wasteful," Vitetta said. "Within a year ... we will know whether we should try this in humans."

If the treatment could kill infected cells in humans as well as it does in a laboratory dish, it might be possible to delay or prevent the onset of AIDS, Vitetta said.

Other potential AIDS treatments kill normal cells as well as infected cells, she said.

Vitetta and Southwestern colleagues Mark Till, Victor Ghetie and Jonathan Uhr reported on the new treatment in the Friday issue of the journal Science.

They collaborated with researchers from Genentech, a California biotechnology company that makes the genetically engineered protein used in the new hybrid.

The protein, called CD4, is normally on the surface of some disease-fighting white blood cells. CD4 acts as a sort of gatekeeper for the human immunodeficiency virus — or HIV — which causes AIDS.

The key to the cure is a sugary protein, called glycoprotein 120, found on the outer surface of HIV itself and on cells infected with HIV. To gain entrance to a normal cell, a glycoprotein 120 molecule on HIV or HIV-infected cells attaches to a CD4 protein.

Genentech scientists have been studying the genetically engineered version of CD4 to see whether it could act as a decoy to HIV in search of cells to infect. The Southwestern scientists took that research a step further, linking Genentech's CD4

with a component of ricin, a powerful poison derived from castor beans.

To HIV or an HIV-infected cell, anything with a CD4 protein on its surface looks like a healthy cell just waiting to be invaded. But when an HIV-infected cell attaches itself to the new CD4-ricin hybrid, it becomes the victim, rather than the victor.

Vitetta and Uhr have used a similar approach in treating a type of cancer called B-cell lymphomas. They linked ricin with an antibody that seeks out cancerous cells. Currently, they are conducting the first phase of human tests of this treatment in cancer patients in Dallas and London.

In the Sept. 22 issue of the journal Nature, Vijay Chaudhary and co-workers at the National Cancer Institute reported linking HIV-infected cells in a laboratory dish with a similar approach but using a different poison. "I think ricin should be equally effective," Chaudhary said.

The Senior Connection offers a variety of programs for senior citizens such as an information and referral service, classes to explain Medicare benefits, educational courses, an emergency response program called Lifeline and a walking club. Home health and hospice services and free blood pressure and breast screening are also available.

According to a press release, the awards, sponsored by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, recognize health care innovations that will serve as national models.

"We're proud of our Senior Connection Program," said Sue Summers, the hospital's director of marketing and community relations. "We just wrote down what we had done."

Caution, however, doesn't seem to be governing Sun Valley's skiing customers. Despite ski rates rising to \$33 from \$30 this year, customers are booking skiing vacations at a rate that has the Wood River Valley tourist industry thinking of those boom years of the early 1980s.

"We're close to booking out our available accommodations through February," said Dee Smith of Sun Valley Area Reservations, another booking service.

Margaret Youdall of Horizon Air echoes Smith's words. "Our advanced

bookings indicate a record breaking season," Youdall said. "We're even making reservations for the so-called soft times in early December and January. To prepare for the rush we're hiring new people."

Horizon bookings are up 20 percent over last year, Reservation Manager Dana Russel said.

Olsen said calls to Resort Reservations for places to rent during August through November are up eight times over the same period last year.

Factors other than the encouraging November snowfall may explain the heightened activity.

Sun Valley Co., now entering its 52nd year, has added three new high-speed quad chairlifts, while adding

40 acres of contoured runs on Bald Mountain. The new chairlifts, which carry four skiers at one time, reach the top in just 8 1/2 minutes, traveling at 1000 feet per minute. Conceivably, an expert, well-conditioned skier could muster 80,000 vertical feet of skiing in a single day.

Shannon Besoyan, of Sun Valley Co., said people calling about reservations have asked about the new lifts.

Others have another idea about why interest is up this year.

"I can feel it," deFabry, Snug Co.'s president, said. "Skiers haven't skied enough the last two years, and there's a pent-up demand out there."

"I see the little areas with a sound future," Anderson. "We produce the skiers that do not only return again and again to our own slopes, but we produce the skiers who go on to support the large resorts across the country."

Anderson said. "If I didn't have a lot of faith in our industry, I would not have built a triple chair this year."

The electric drive on the new Pomerelle lift can be increased to carry 1,800 skiers per hour. The lift has

a 940-foot vertical rise. A down-hill loading feature allows people to ride to the top in summer or winter to view the valley below Mt. Harrison. Anderson said he is planning to cut additional ski runs to the east of the lift and to increase summer recreational uses at Pomerelle.

During winter months the resort employs 88 full or part time people. Sandy Anderson says the staff is made up of farmers and others who are involved with summer season work in the local area.

"We are able to take advantage of

this available work force and at the same time provide these people with an income in what is otherwise a slow time for them," she said.

While the Andersons live in Salt Lake City, they have a winter head-quarters in Albion. The Andersons daughter Jody Anderson is resort manager. The resort opened for the season last Friday.

KENNEBUNKPORT, Maine — Like millions of other Americans, Barbara Bush cooked the turkey and George Bush carved it as the president-elect indulged himself in a quiet and restful Thanksgiving.

Bush, his wife and two long-time employees shared one of their smallest Thanksgiving gatherings in memory. An aide explained that the Bush's five children and 10 grandchildren, after the long grind of the campaign, were scattered at various locations spending time with other family members.

At his family compound here, Bush spent a couple of hours in his office reading through material prepared by his transition team, and he also placed a number of "happy Thanksgiving calls" to supporters, an aide said.

He ventured off his compound, situated on a dramatic oceanfront spit of land known as Walker's Point, only once — to take a 2-mile, 20-minute jog through the woods.

Acting playful with reporters, Bush plowed directly into a gaggle of cameras as he ran, panting "gotta go straight."

During the morning, Mrs. Bush slipped and fell on the grounds of the compound while greeting crewmen from a Coast Guard cutter that is stationed off the point as a security precaution. She said that she caught her heel in her pants cuff and stumbled. An aide said that she was not injured.

Joining the Bushes for their quiet Thanksgiving dinner were Don Rhodes, an employee of Bush's Capitol Hill staff, and Paula Rendan, the family's longtime housekeeper. The menu was purely traditional, with dressing, green beans, sweet potatoes, gravy and blueberry pie.

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Rights group accuses Guatemala of numerous violations

MIAMI — Guatemalan government forces are responsible for a serious increase in human rights abuses, including "hundreds of political killings, disappearances and attempted assassinations" since the start of 1983, according to a leading human rights organization.

In a report to be released Friday, the New York-based Americas Watch said that from Jan. 1 to Sept. 30, at least 621 people have died in politically related assassinations in the Central American nation, most of

them at the hands of government military and security forces.

The figures indicate a rate of killing considerably lower than that attributed to the government during the 20-year period ending in 1986 when an estimated 100,000 Guatemalans were killed and another 38,000 "disappeared." However, Americas Watch said that the current "available statistics indicated a significant increase in disappearances and killings attributable to government forces in 1987-88, compared with the two previous years."

For instance, the U.N. Commis-

sion on Human Rights reported at the end of 1987 that a minimum of 122 people in Guatemala had been killed or had disappeared at the hands of government agents between January 1986 and October 1987.

Americas Watch, a nonpartisan group with a reputation among Western journalists for integrity and careful research, also noted that, given the difficulty in compiling reliable statistics, the real total of abuses so far this year could be consider-

ably higher.

The earlier human rights violations came at a time when Guatemala was faced with a serious guerrilla movement. The military dictatorship that ruled the country in the 20 years starting in 1968 employed a "total war" concept that not only destroyed the insurrection but led to international condemnation and a halt to nearly all American military aid.

The situation improved temporarily in January 1966, according to the report, when Vinicio Cerezo Arvalo, a long-time Christian Democratic politician and foe of the military regime, was sworn in as the nation's first democratically-elected president since 1970.

"Yet," the Americas Watch report says, "more than halfway through President Cerezo's five-year term, there has been little improvement in Guatemala's human rights record; the military has coded no authority

to civilians in rural areas; and rights violators among the military have not been brought to justice."

The report attributes Cerezo's inability to curb the human rights abuses to his concern over losing office in a military coup, an assessment generally shared by foreign reporters covering Guatemala.

What little independent authority the president held appeared to have been effectively removed last May by senior army officers.

Lebanon discovers toxic waste dumping

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Ravaged by civil war for 13 years, Lebanon now has been hit by the dumping of poisonous chemical waste from Western Europe.

At least 2,400 tons of Italian chemical waste, which Lebanese officials said was toxic and dangerous, were discovered last May in the mountains of Kesrouan province in the Christian heartland about 20 miles north of Beirut.

That discovery forced the cancellation of another shipment of 30,000 tons of Italian waste destined for Lebanon, Justice Ministry sources reported.

The incident is one of several that have recently surfaced in African, Middle Eastern and Latin American countries where Western Europe has loaded its industrial waste, often passed off as innocent material, because of the high cost of toxic-waste disposal at home.

Amid an outcry for tighter controls, several countries have blocked ships carrying toxic waste from entering their harbors, leaving the vessels to roam the seas looking for a place to unload their hazardous cargoes.

Lebanon's leftist newspapers and radio stations accused the Lebanese forces, the Christians' main militia,

of allowing the industrial waste to be brought into the country through the port they control in Beirut harbor.

They claim the militia was paid \$10 million to dump the waste and alleged there was an "Israeli connection."

Lebanon has numerous ports run by Moslem and Christian militias along its Mediterranean coast through which they ship in goods and weapons.

Sri Lanka extends state of emergency

COLOMBO, Sri Lanka — Sri Lanka's Parliament Thursday voted to extend for another month a state of emergency to curb violence that has claimed the lives of 436 people in the past 30 days.

In separate incidents Thursday, Sinhalese rebels killed 10 people in southern Sri Lanka, police said.

Minister of Parliamentary Affairs Vincent Perera told Parliament, which met Thursday under tight security precautions, that 112 of the dead in the past 30 days were "political murders" committed by Sinhalese rebels in the south.

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Criticism of Mitterrand surges only months after his re-election

PARIS — President Francois Mitterrand, elevated to the heights of near-religious popularity by a commanding re-election six months ago, has suddenly encountered a wave of complaints against the way he governs France.

The criticism of Mitterrand's reign, sometimes distant rule has seemed particularly sharp against the broad support, even devotion, that he inspired on taking office for a second seven-year term last May. Mitterrand, 72, appeared so unshakable then that a popular French puppet show depicted him as a frog named "Ged."

"One is not God with impunity," Serge July, editor of the Paris newspaper Liberation, ironically wrote in a comment this week on Mitterrand's new problems.

A well-informed political scientist said that, despite Mitterrand's good poll ratings, criticism of him has been bubbling for some time among intellectuals, journalists and politicians, including the president's own Socialist Party, but has only now spilled over into public attacks. The same lack of clear ideology that helped make Mitterrand's election campaign a success, he explained, has begun to look six months later like lack of direction in the government.

"Even on the left, (criticism of)

Mitterrand is no longer taboo," July wrote. "The hour of transgression has arrived, and it's booming."

Complaints against Mitterrand personally have centered chiefly on his regal style at the Elysee presidential palace. But critics also have charged that his government, under Prime Minister Michel Rocard, fails to provide leadership and inspiration and that his foreign policy fails to guarantee France its rightful place in the world.

The conservative news magazine

Le Point took personal criticism furthest this week with a cover showing Mitterrand dressed as a bewigged 18th-century monarch under the headline: "Mitterrand, The King and His Court."

In a series of articles complaining mainly about the president's helicopter-borne forays to visit friends and fine restaurants, Le Point also became the first establishment French publication to raise the delicate subject of Mitterrand's trips to Venice.

Paris dinner gossip has long held that Mitterrand has a woman friend in Venice. But heretofore the subject was unmentionable in the respectable Paris press, which generally considers private lives off-limits. Breaking that traditional understanding between press and politician by allusion, Le Point reported Mitterrand moved up a Cabinet meeting last July "to spend a few days in the City of the Doges for highly private reasons."

Poking fun at presidential foibles has long been a French sport, particularly since Charles de Gaulle rewrote the constitution to give the president extensive power. Mitterrand's predecessor, Valery Giscard d'Estaing, frequently fell victim to such criticism in his final years in power as his popularity plummeted.

Mitterrand, although unpopular politically in the mid-1980s, previously had been spared such personal at-

tacks, in part because his political outlook often coincided with that of France's intellectual and journalistic opinion-makers. Moreover, his unqualified electoral triumph earlier this year offered temporary immunization.

But two recent books — "Open Letter to the Mitterrand Generation" by Thierry Pfister, a former Socialist official, and "Campaign Landscapes" by Philippe Alexandre, a radio commentator — painted acid portraits of the president as a monarch surrounded by sycophantic courtiers. Once the ice was broken, Le Point's cover story seemed an inevitable next step.

"Beyond the recurrent nature of the monarchy theme in the Fifth Republic; heightened in Mitterrand's case by his re-election, this phenomenon translates a deleterious political climate," July declared.

Rocard, the prime minister, has wrestled this fall with an unglamorous series of strikes by nurses, subway and bus operators, teachers, pharmacists, postal workers and Air France employees. French political commentators said most of the strikers came out of the Socialist Party's electorate, but believed that the officials they had chosen last spring let them down for the sake of preventing inflation.

Even Rocard's allies have complained that he seems to be governing like a manager, without setting

out an inspiring overall design capable of generating public enthusiasm. Rocard's reputation as a pragmatist and problem-solver was hailed as his major quality when Mitterrand chose him in May.

Rocard's major success as prime minister, an agreement on the disputed status of New Caledonia, was only tepidly endorsed by French voters in a Nov. 8 referendum. Politically more important, the vote produced a historically high 62 percent abstention rate.

Laurent Fabius, Parliament speaker and a fellow Socialist, said in a much-noticed newspaper interview that Rocard's government lacks "an overall vision" and needs to devise a "grand design" if Mitterrand's party is to continue inspiring loyalty.

In foreign policy, Mitterrand has sought through a number of initiatives to give France a major role in world affairs. Presidential aides said soon after his re-election that Mitterrand, reinforced by his experience, would have a particularly active foreign policy in European and East-West affairs.

But Giscard d'Estaing, who now presides over the parliamentary Foreign Affairs Commission, charged last month that Mitterrand has failed to seize the initiative in these areas, leaving France without sufficient presence on the world stage.

Giscard d'Estaing spoke soon after Mitterrand addressed the U.N. General Assembly and proposed a special conference on chemical weapons — two days after President Reagan proposed the same thing. The conference is scheduled for January in Paris, but France's proposal looked like a response to Reagan, French officials acknowledged.

Mitterrand also has sought to expand French policy toward the Soviet Union and Eastern Europe. After receiving Hungarian leader Karoly Grosz last week, Mitterrand has scheduled trips to the Soviet Union this week, Czechoslovakia next month and Bulgaria in January.

"This is part of a new phase in our Eastern Europe policy, which is a policy of increased presence, of increased contacts," Hubert Vedrine, Mitterrand's chief foreign-policy adviser and spokesman, said at a briefing Tuesday.

But French commentators said Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev, by deciding to visit Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher on his way to Washington, has already signaled his preference for the British leader, rather than Mitterrand, as a spokesman for Europe.

Vedrine responded that Mitterrand has no impression that he has been slighted by Gorbachev's itinerary. These contacts are a good thing for everyone, in all directions, he added.



Iraq, Iran exchange first groups of prisoners

BAGHDAD, Iraq — Iraq and Iran Thursday exchanged the first group of 1,589 sick and wounded prisoners of war but Baghdad accused Tehran of violating the agreement.

Iran released 49 Iraqi soldiers and three officers instead of the agreed 115 prisoners, Iraq said. Baghdad in

return freed 19 Iranians instead of 41.

According to Iraqi officials, Iran at the last moment informed the Red Cross, which is supervising the exchange, that 15 Iraqi prisoners refused to return home.

The Iranians also said a further 17 Iraqi prisoners were found to be in

good health and eight others would have to be re-examined by medical teams.

More than 10, from the first scheduled group, would be released at a later date for reasons not given. Three of the Iraqis due to freed had died and the identity of three others had not been thoroughly checked, Tehran said.

Anti-Mormon feeling revives among Orthodox Jews in Israel

JERUSALEM (AP) — Spray-painted slogans reading "AIDS Mormons" and "Mormons Go Home" sometimes greet students walking to class at the Mormon study center on the biblical Mount of Olives.

The graffiti signals a renewal of anti-Mormon sentiment in Jerusalem, especially among Orthodox Jews who fear the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints is conducting missionary work at its \$15 million facility.

Mormon officials deny the charge. But Orthodox leaders vow to use the political muscle their parties gained in this month's national elections to remove the Mormons from the Holy Land.

"We want them to leave and now we have room to do something about it," said Rabbi Menachem Porush, whose Agudat Israel Party won five seats in the Knesset, or parliament. "The Mormons are very dangerous. They have made it unsafe for Jews."

Porush contends the Mormons are trying "to systematically convert young Jews" in violation of a lease agreement that forbids missionary activities at the Jerusalem Center for Near Eastern Studies.

He said Orthodox leaders want the Israeli government to buy the Mormon center and convert it into a religious high school for Jews.

"We would be more than happy to buy it from them," Porush said. "We will pay any price."

Martin Hickman, the center's director, said the seven-story marble and limestone building "is not for sale."

He added that he expects the government to honor the Mormons' 49-year lease on the property despite the growing influence of Orthodox parties.

"We realize there are certain groups that wish we weren't here," Hickman said in an interview. "But we respect the integrity of the government of Israel, which has made a commitment that we intend to keep."

Construction of the center began in 1984 after lengthy negotiations between the Israeli government and the Mormon-operated Brigham Young University in Utah, which runs the center. Approval was given only after the Mormons pledged not to proselytize.

The Mormon Church, with headquarters in Salt Lake City, Utah, has some 6,500 congregations worldwide with more than 3 million members. Since its completion in January, the center has been supervised by a five-member committee of three Israeli government officials and two Mormon representatives.

Haim Klugman, the Justice Ministry director-general who serves as committee chairman, said there is no evidence the Mormons have violated their agreement.

"We are here to deal with every complaint, but we have had none," Klugman said.

Klugman said the center's nine faculty members and 105 students are well aware of the conditions of the lease and are careful not to do or say anything that could be misinterpreted as missionary work.

"Some people think we're here to convert their Jewish state to a Mormon state," said David Daines, 23, of Provo, Utah. A junior at Brigham Young University, Daines is a student at the Jerusalem center.

"I came here to study and to learn, not to proselytize," Daines insisted. He said he ignored the graffiti.

Students take courses for a four-month program that includes Middle East history, archeology and Bible studies.

Vandals prove their worth up front

MOSCOW — The line on the University of Idaho's football team is that it's what's up front that counts. It has been a near-perfect season for Keith Gilbertson and Vandals. Idaho turned a setback — in the form of a 28-17 loss to Montana Sept. 24 — into opportunity. Opportunity to show Big Sky Conference followers the kind of stuff of which championship teams are made. The kind of stuff needed to win on the road in Reno and Boise.

When all is said and done in 1988, the Vandals will most likely be known as one of the most well-given offenses in BSC history, but Idaho since the Dennis Erickson days, has been known for offense. This year, things have been a little different.

The running game behind Bruce Harris, Damon Daniels and Devon Pearce have proved as deadly as the passing attack and the latter, with All-American quarterback John Friesz, has proved as formidable as ever.

Ask any of them why they look so very good out on the field, the answer is short and sweet — the offensive line.

Probably the best Vandal offensive front ever. Funny how quality offensive lines correlate with things like 9-1 records (Idaho's best ever), conference titles and No. 1 national rankings. The Vandal O-line has given Friesz more time to pass, Harris, Daniels and Pearce wider holes to run through. The O-line has simply allowed Idaho more room to win.

Much of the credit for Idaho's strength and depth at the offensive line positions has to be attributed to Gilbertson and his recruiting team. They attracted the likes of potential All-Americans Todd Neu and Greg Hale to the Palouse region. It's essentially the same starting line that started for Idaho four years ago.

And although Idaho will lose seniors Hale and center Mark Schlereth to graduation this season, there's a host of sophomore and junior replacements prepped to step in and do the job.

"I'm almost three (players) deep in every position," said Idaho offensive line coach Dan Cozzetto.

The Vandal offense has become accustomed to using as many as seven different linemen in the course of a game, enabling the starters to stay fresh and the younger players the much needed experience necessary to compete in this conference.

Overtime, a team's offensive line is often the deciding factor in a game being decided, but on one glance at the Vandal offensive numbers and one realizes just how effective the Idaho O-line has been. Friesz hasn't the numbers he had a year ago, but he's sharing the spotlight with three talented running backs. Still, the junior quarterback is averaging 287.4 yards a game passing, a completion percentage

of .554. The running game is averaging just over 153 yards a game, 4.15 average gain per down. Idaho is depending less and less on the big play and more per more on controlled extended drives.

It would be difficult to find any other team with the state of the Vandal O-line, with Cozzetto and Idaho offensive coordinator Bill Diedrick have said there's room for improvement.

"They've (the line) made great strides to possibly becoming the best line (in the BSC), Cozzetto said, but added that there have been inconsistencies. "Over the course of the season, we haven't been consistent with our ball blocking . . . we could run the ball better."

"I believe, collectively, this is the best offensive line we've had at id-

aho," Diedrick said, but added that it "consistency-wise, I don't think it is. I would go a step further and say that about our offense in general."

But numbers don't lie. "When you are leading the league in passing, you must be doing something right," Diedrick added.

Idaho is averaging 442.8 yards a game in total offense. Hale, a 6-foot, 3-inch, 283-pound senior from Renton, Wash., was first-team All-Big Sky last season, redefined the consistency problem as a form of a lack of the sense of urgency.

"I think basically one of the reasons why there's been a lack of consistency is because, maybe, a lack of concentration," Hale said. "You have so many guys who are such veterans that I think, day in and day out, when you practice so many practices

and play for so many years, it's hard to get up, for practice everyday, and for games sometimes, not necessarily . . . not necessarily, we're usually ready to go some game time."

"I think sometimes mentally, we don't have that sense of urgency," he added. "I think a lot of the time, we don't address that issue very well."

That issue is probably the most important of all. There is a significant difference in the general state of mind between offensive and defensive linemen. The former is the defender and the latter an aggressor.

Offensive linemen are cut from a different cloth according to Hale. "I think an offensive guy is more of a controlled type of person," Hale said. "More of thinker. You've got to be aggressive, you've got play with some aggressiveness, but it's more of a

thinking position. You have to go and execute the sign (play), whereas the defense, you more of an aggressor, more of a reactor. Offense you have to use your mind more . . . it takes a different mentality."

Consistency problems aside, Idaho has a job to do in the Kibbe Dome Saturday. Defeat Montana in the first round of the Division I-AA last Saturday. When the Vandals lost to the Grizzlies in Missoula, the offense amassed a season-high 604 yards in the total offense, nearly 200 on that on the ground ground.

The area that supposedly is the weakest as far as offensive blocking is concerned, if their September performance is indicative of how potent the Vandal offense really is, then the Grizzly defense will have their paws full.

Soviet subs may keep Stealth out of Washington

The Associated Press

WASHINGTON — The threat of a missile attack launched from a Soviet submarine off the coast has most likely eliminated the possibility of basing Stealth bombers at Fairchild Air Force Base, a Washington state lawmaker said Friday.

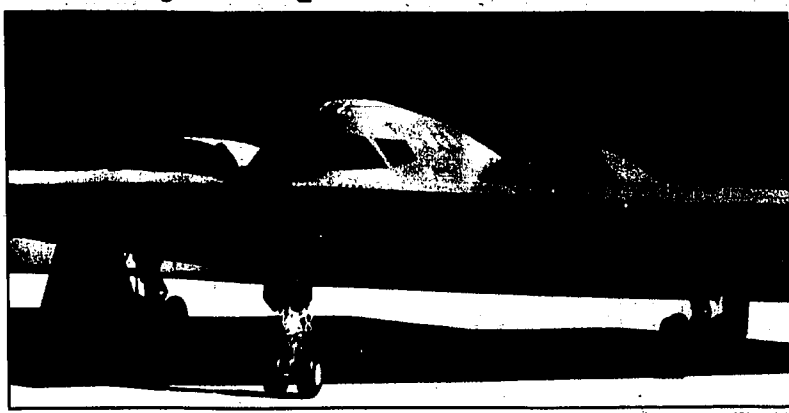
Democratic Rep. Norm Dicks made the comment a day after returning from Palmdale, Calif., where the black and gray, boomerang shaped B-2 was publicly displayed for the first time after 10 years of secret development.

Dicks, who serves on a key defense subcommittee, said even though the bombers may not be based in Washington, the Stealth program already is providing an economic boost to the state.

The Boeing Co., one of three major subcontractors on the Stealth project, has about 8,700 employees working on the B-2 in the Puget Sound area, or about one out of every 10 of its workers in Washington state.

"These aren't research and development jobs, they are actually working on production of parts for the Stealth," said Dicks.

The Air Force plans to build 132 of

the bombers at an estimated cost of \$68.5 billion, or about \$500 million each.

The wing-shaped planes are de-

signed to avoid detection by radar and drop nuclear bombs on targets far behind enemy lines.

Present plans call for the first 30

or so to be based in western Missouri at Whiteman Air Force Base, which is scheduled to undergo an estimated

\$500 million in updating before the

first B-2s go into service in the early 1990s.

"Generally they are looking at the middle of the country because of sur-

vivability considerations," said Dicks. "That may well rule out Fairchild."

Dicks said the Air Force fears a missile launched from a Soviet submarine could take out a B-2 base too close to the coast before the bombers could take off.

"Every minute will count in getting the planes up," said Dicks, who is about to become the No. 2 ranking Democrat on the House's defense appropriations subcommittee.

Dicks said even though the Navy believes it can accurately pinpoint the positions of Soviet subs, the submarines have a "considerable capability" to knock out an Air Force base close to the coast.

The same threat may also eliminate Fairchild as a possible base for the B-1 bomber, Dicks said.

Fairchild is a Strategic Air Command base for B-52s armed with cruise missiles and is located just west of Spokane.

Dicks said he was well aware of charges from B-2 critics that the plane is too expensive. "But I think it is worth it."

"It may well come under scrutiny in these tough budget times, but I anticipate Congress will fund it though at a slower rate than previously planned," he said.

Idahoan makes his own Stealth

HILL AIR FORCE BASE, Utah — An Idaho man says he piloted his homemade flying wing aircraft into Hill Air Force Base in 1987 in what apparently was an unofficial test of advanced flying qualities possessed by the plane — similar in appearance to the new B-2 Stealth bomber.

Gilbert E. Davis of Boise said the shape and construction of his aircraft, if not its 35-foot wingspan, is similar to the B-2 put unveiled Tuesday by Northrop Corp. in California.

"Each essentially is two swept wings with a bulge in the middle for a cockpit. Both use composite structural materials where most airplanes are made of metals, although the multimillion-dollar bomber's synthetics certainly are more exotic than Davis' plastic foam and fiberglass.

To a lesser extent, Davis' airplane resembles a picture of the F-117A Stealth fighter the Air Force has flown secretly at night in Nevada since 1983, but announced just two weeks ago.

Stealth technology is supposed to help aircraft avoid detection by radar, allowing them to slip through enemy defenses. Just how the Stealth bomber and fighter are built to achieve this remains a secret of the Pentagon.

But Davis said space-age composite materials like carbon fiber reflect less radar than metal, and a flying wing's slim, smooth profile further reduces bouncing signals.

"The flying wing is hard to detect on radar," he said in a telephone interview.

Stealth is not what Davis had in mind when he designed and built his recreational machine as a prototype for a larger version he plans to sell in kit form. However, that apparently is what was tested at Hill a year after the plane was first propelled into flight by a snowmobile engine in 1986.

Hill spokesman Len Barry did not know the exact reason for the June 1987 test, but said, "Apparently, it did occur."

Davis had been invited to speak about his flying wing at the annual convention of the Utah Pilots Association, which had a dinner in the base officers club on June 5, 1987. He said then-Maj. Gen. Robert P. McCoy, since promoted to the Air Force Logistics Command in Ohio, had let it be known he would be in the control tower at 8 a.m. that day.

Davis said the word came down that the base commander wanted him to fly the radar approach.

Although they were not told why, both Davis and his brother, Ross Davis of Murray, felt the only sensible reason was to see how the flying wing would appear on radar.

The brothers approached from the north. Ross Davis, a former Army helicopter pilot, flew a metal, conventionally designed propeller airplane with a radio-transponder emitting signals to help show its position.

"They did see me," Ross Davis said. "About 50 feet off his right wing, Gilbert Davis knifed through the air in his thin, fiberglass-skinned machine, which lacked a transponder."

As they descended toward the runway, Gilbert Davis said, Air Force F-

16 jet fighters waited to take off. "We were just getting the royal treatment," he said.

Mission accomplished, the brothers flew by the tower and returned to Ogden Municipal Airport.

That night at the dinner, Gilbert Davis said, he asked McCoy about the results of the test. He said the general was like a seasoned poker player.

"You don't know what he's got in his hand," he said. "I couldn't find out what they saw or didn't see."

His brother implied he did learn something of what appeared on the radar.

However, he said, "They didn't say anything officially."

Barry said the flying wing "did look a little smaller than the other craft," but he was not sure what the Air Force gained from the test.

The Northrop Corp. asked for and was provided a videotape of his 950-pound craft in action, Davis said. Although the contractor did not tell him, he said he heard it was viewed by Northrop employees at the facility producing the B-2.

Trying to take off in July 1987 from an unfamiliar runway in Burley, Davis' engine lost power and he ditched his flying wing in the Snake River.

Unhurt, he said the craft has been pieced together and is almost ready to fly again.

Davis also said he is working on his revised version for kit sales.

It will seat two in a 40-foot wingspan and be pushed by a substantially more powerful aircraft engine.

Stealth Bomber unveiled

Stealth bomber comes out of the shadows

The U.S. Air Force has revealed its new super-secret stealth intercontinental bomber, the B-2. Shaped like a flying wing, the four-engined bomber is built with non-metallic materials that do not reflect radar beams and is intended to be virtually invisible to enemy radar. The U.S. Air Force has ordered 132 B-2s, at an estimated cost of \$50 billion.

MISSION: To penetrate unobscured into enemy territory to help deliver a crippling retaliatory nuclear strike.

MATERIAL: Carbon fiber materials, as strong as steel, do not reflect radar waves. Other materials such as fiber-reinforced graphite, or glass fibers embedded in plastic may also be used.

POSSIBLE WING STRUCTURE: Could include a series of thumb-like hexagonal honeycomb tubes. Any radar waves that enter past the non-radar-reflective wing material are deflected into a zig-zag pattern and absorbed.

HOW RADAR WORKS: Radar sends out a beam of radio waves. As the waves strike an object they are reflected like echoes back to the radar.

RADAR CROSS SECTION (RCS): Does stealth work? A modern military radar might be able to detect a plane with an RCS of one square meter at a distance of 230 miles. Therefore, if the plane was flying at the same speed as a B-2, there would be about 40 seconds of warning before it was past the radar station. However, the B-2 is estimated to have an RCS of only 1 square millimeter, making it virtually invisible. B-2 bomber: RCS 100 sq. m. B-1 bomber: RCS 10 sq. m. B-1B bomber: RCS 1 sq. m. B-2 bomber: Est. RCS 1 sq. mm.

PAINT: Special coatings also help reduce radar reflections. Paint will not absorb radar waves, but spreads it evenly over the whole surface, diffusing the signal.

SHAPE: Reducing the size of the Radar Cross Section (RCS) was the main factor in determining the shape of the B-2.

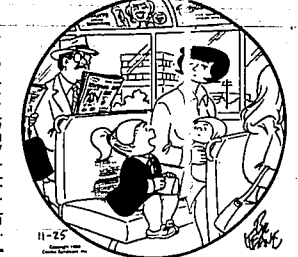

THE ACES ON BRIDGE

BOBBY WOLFF

"It is best to do things systematically, since we are only human, and disorder is our worst enemy."

"Which way do you finesse for a missing queen?" asked a disconsolate South.

"I always play for the queen to live over the jack," was the quick answer. But that was not the real reason for choosing the winning play.

South ruffed the third spade and led a trump to dummy's king and back to his 10 for a losing finesse. West exited with a trump and South was destined for a minus score. He went two down, losing two club tricks, two spades and the trump queen.

Playing for the trump queen to live over the jack would have made the game. But that's not the reason South should finesse against West. The legitimate reason is that South needs two dummy entries to finesse twice in clubs. Therefore, he cannot use dummy's trump king as an entry to try a trump finesse against East.

After ruffing the third spade, South leads his trump nine and lets it ride when West doesn't cover. When it wins, South avoids a trump loser and uses dummy's trump king as an entry for a club finesse. Later the diamond king serves as an entry for another club finesse, and the defenders get only three tricks.

What if East had held the trump queen? A trump to dummy's king and a winning finesse against East would not have produced a game. The defenders would have gotten two spades and two clubs for one down.

Jack of many faces entertains children

TWIN FALLS — We are eating dinner when our 8-year-old daughter makes an announcement:

"Jack sure has a good sense of humor," she says.

"Jack who?" I ask.

"You know," she says impatiently.

"Jack."

"Oh! It finally registers."

"That Jack."

Jack as in Prelutsky, Jack as in the man who serenaded my daughter and more than 75 other children and adults at the Twin Falls Public Library earlier in the week.

They, too, probably came away with the feeling that they now know this man on a first name basis.

Annie-Laurie Burton, children's librarian, says she is excited to have an author of Prelutsky's caliber in town.

"It brings literature alive for the

children," she says. "It takes it off the written page and makes it a living experience."

Prelutsky, a poet whose books include "The New Kid on the Block" and "Ride a Purple Pelican," was approached two years ago about the possibility of coming to Idaho by Judi Baxter, owner of Judi's Bookstore in Twin Falls. "Kids in a community like ours have just as much of a right to be exposed to authors of this kind as kids in the big city," says Baxter, who sponsored the visit.

Prelutsky, author of more than three dozen books, says that since he hadn't done anything official in Idaho yet ("I had a girlfriend in Boise once") he put Twin Falls on his itinerary.

"It never occurred to me that I'd end up doing this sort of thing when I started writing," says Prelutsky. "I thought writing was going to be very private. I was a very private, quiet, shy person, so writing seemed the

ideal thing to do." In his pre-published years, Prelutsky worked as a furniture mover.

He also worked as a cab driver, bus-boy, photographer, potter and folksinger. He sang with several

opera companies and choruses and appeared, as an actor, in "Fiddler on the Roof."

"Things didn't work out the way I intended. I've become more of a public person now. I'm in at least as much demand as a speaker as a writer, which is kind of befuddling. But I do it and I like it," he says.

At the Twin Falls library the children are ushered downstairs as they arrive. They wait for Prelutsky in the children's section of the basement. Parents are diverted upstairs. Because of fire code restrictions, the number of people who can assemble at one time in the basement is restricted.

"What do you mean I can't go down and listen to him?" asks a mother in wide-eyed disbelief. "I don't know who loves him more — me or the kids."

The parents are eventually allowed downstairs.

Prelutsky says he writes for adults in the form of children books.

"I don't really differentiate between adult books and children's books, except that adult's books are for adults only and children's books are for everybody. Children's books have to be good because they can't depend on sex and violence — you actually have to have something in there."

So far he's only written poetry for children. He's planning on writing both fiction and verse for adults in the next two years, he says.

"I'm not the most disciplined writer or you'll ever talk to. I could never be a newspaper reporter or columnist because you have to produce regularly, and I'm an irregular sort of person. I go for months sometimes without writing at all, then I'll write maybe five minutes a day, then maybe I'll write 10 minutes a day, and maybe I won't write at all for a while. And then I'll write 16 hours a day for a few months and do nothing

Art galleries kick off winter season

KETCHUM — The mountains have turned to white, but the art galleries throughout town are filled with the vibrant colors of fresh new exhibits to

kick off the winter gallery season. Everyone is welcome to attend artists' receptions and open houses which will be held tonight from 6 p.m. to 9 p.m.

The Knowland Gallery, at 271 First Avenue North — across the street and

two doors south of the Ketchum post office, is presenting "Women of Wealth, Women of Beauty" in conjunction with the Pawel Raczka Galleries. Native American antiques made by and for women will be featured.

This country's leading expert on Northern Plains Indian art, Raczka has assembled numerous unique items for this show, including a complete woman's riding saddle with martingale, saddle drapes, horse hair rope and quilt, two exceptionally detailed floral contour beadwork bags, and brightly painted porfiches (painted rawhide envelopes used for objects to be then packed on horse).

Next door at the River Run Gallery, "Color" is the theme of exhibits by featured painters Jean Richardson, Sari Staggs and Nancy Tuttle May, and paper artist Carolyn Dahl.

Richardson's work features loosely depicted, horses, riders and Indian dancers. Staggs has created a new body of work especially for this show — a departure from her regular Southwestern imagery.

May is making her Western debut with this show, introducing her current non-objective format combinations of acrylics, watercolors, pastel and gold leaf. Dahl's work includes vessels of handmade paper which have been created by layering richly colored tissue.

The Friesen Gallery of Fine Art, located two doors north of the post office, will present the art of Albert Dreher. Dreher paints contemporary Southwestern landscapes in an oily wash medium, characterized by soft defined images. The gallery is also planning to display Dreher's work at their second gallery location in the Greyhawk Center in Warm Springs Village.

Bruschovsky Galleries, at the corner of 6th Street and Leadville Avenue, will feature the works of Montana artist Buckeye Blake. Blake has created notably detailed and accurate

bronzes of the Western frontier, and his paintings are in major collections such as the National Cowboy Hall of Fame and the C.M. Russell Museum.

The Oye Gallery, at 380 Leadville Avenue, exclusively features the work of artist Joseph Kinnebrew. He has collaborated with the Great American Log Company to create a log bed that will be on display. New paintings, table linens, apparel and luggage will also be shown.

The Toneri Art Gallery, across from Louie's at 131 Leadville Avenue, will feature a colorful array of watercolors by Idaho artist Lynn Turner. Along with her vivid wildlife and floral pieces, Turner has created new landscapes combining her realistic and abstract styles. Also included in this show is the gallery's selection of unique handblown glass, perfume bottles, atomizers, vases and jewelry by Roland Art Glass.

The Anne Reed Gallery, in the Walnut Avenue Mall at 620 Sun Valley Road, will present an exhibition of new work by noted California artist, Harry Fonseca.

Fonseca has been inspired by the coyote, a popular figure of American Indian myths. Also included in this show will be contemporary jewelry, sculpture, glass and clay with works by local artists Debbie Edgers, Anita de Castro, Don King and Michael Zapponi.

Across the Walnut Avenue Mall at the Sun Valley Center Gallery, two Idaho artists will be featured — David Airhart and David Boersig. Airhart, a Boise artist, is also the owner and manager of the Art Attack Gallery. He uses a unique burnished palette-knife technique to create compelling landscapes familiar to Idahoans.

From the study of classic realism to the actuality of full-blown abstraction comes Ketchum artist Boersig.

Fred Astaire dances again in restored tape

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The tape was so old it had outlived the machinery to play it. But through digital wizardry, the magic of Fred Astaire's dancing will again enchant television audiences, 30 years after his first TV appearance.

That first special, "An Evening With Fred Astaire," co-starring dance partner Barrie Chase, was first televised Oct. 17, 1958, on NBC. It won nine Emmy awards. Astaire died in June 1987 at age 88.

The Disney Channel is bringing back that show, along with two other specials, seven Astaire movies and two documentaries in a cable-TV tribute called "Hats Off to Fred Astaire" that spans 5 1/2 weeks.

The Disney Channel will air the special this Sunday, to be followed by "Another Evening with Fred Astaire" from 1959 on Dec. 18 and "Astaire Time" from 1960 on Jan. 8, 1989. In the Magic Valley, the Disney Channel airs on channel 14.

Putting that first show together combined elements of a detective drama and a science documentary.

This was probably the oldest color videotape still in existence," said Robert Rosen director of the UCLA Film and Television Archive. The tape was good; the problem was the equipment to run it no longer existed. We had to track down a technician who had worked on the original equipment.

We had a copy of the specifications, and we used that to build a machine to play the tape. We were then able to transfer the show onto state-of-the-art digital equipment. The picture looks better today than it did 30 years ago.

Rosen and his technical adviser, Ed Reitan, showed the results of 18 months of work at a luncheon attended by Astaire's widow, Robin Chase; musical director David Rose; choreographer Hermes Pan, and producer Bud Yorkin.

The first images on the TV screens were dark and murky. Next, he showed how the tape had been restored for a revival on public television. The picture looked like an overexposed photograph. Finally, he showed the special as it will be broadcast on cable. The picture was crisp and clear, and the colors were bright and sharply defined. It could have been taped yesterday.

"There's nothing like it," said Chase, "but it's also very sad. It's a little too soon to look at it after Fred's passing. I'm pleased with what UCLA did. I laugh at the thought of my son seeing his mom as she used to be. I have a sad and nostalgic feeling of the emotion I felt when I was doing this."

Asked about Astaire's dancing, she replied, "I don't think what Fred had is definable. It's something that touches all generations. You could use a lot of platitudes, which Fred would hate. Fred was a man who would out to do his job as well as he could and he had that special magic. He had the grace of an animal. He never made an awkward move."

For the special, musical director Rose assembled an orchestra with 18 strings to create a more graceful sound compatible with Astaire's dancing.

"Usually for a variety show you'd have 10 strings," he said. "I didn't want the brass to predominate. It takes 50 violins to equal the volume of one trumpet in a concert hall."

Rose said Astaire was "a perfectionist, but there was no ego. He didn't try to run the show. A lot of big stars are perfectionists, but they do it in a mean way."

Rosen said the Astaire show was chosen for restoration because "our strategy was to restore a program the audiences would fall in love with. That way they would appreciate the need to preserve these old programs."

He said the UCLA Archive is second only to the Library of Congress in the number of old motion picture films and television shows it has.

Ginger Rogers, Astaire's dance partner in four of the films to be shown, will introduce the motion pictures. - They started with beatboxes and simple, rhyming "raps" about drugs, crime and bragging about the "jeffest dj" on the block.
- This year, more than 10 million rap albums will be sold. Teen-agers have become millionaires. Record companies drool. The music grows.

- "Aside from the money, now there's the message," says Tyrone Williams, the 30-year-old chairman of the Warner Bros. rap label, Cold Chillin' records.
- A native of the New York rap scene, Williams is a rap bard. After more than 15 years as a rapper, manager and now record executive, he has become a walking history book.
- Rap was almost like a war. The first rappers gave their lives so that Run DMC could wear gold (chains). Now there are the new breeds who are trying to say something. Everybody has their own message.
- With DJ Jazzy Jeff and the Fresh Prince (Jeff Townes and Will Smith) leading the way, party rap has overtaken the raucous mid-town flagellations of Run DMC and the Beastie Boys.

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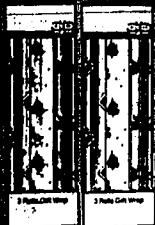
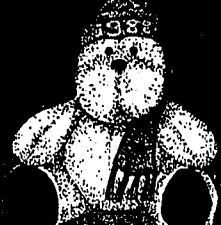
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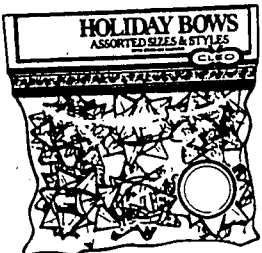
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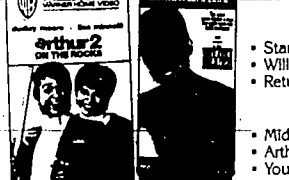


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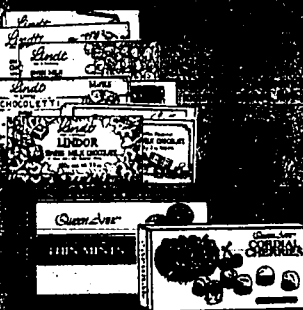
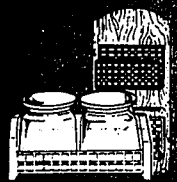
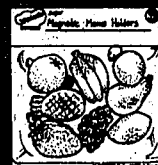


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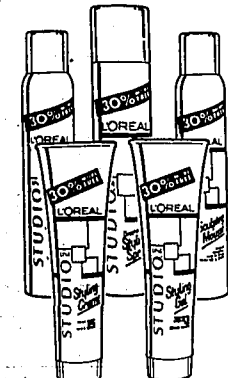
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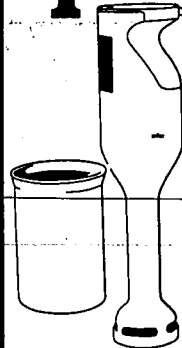
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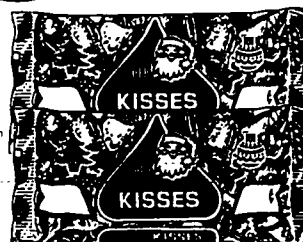
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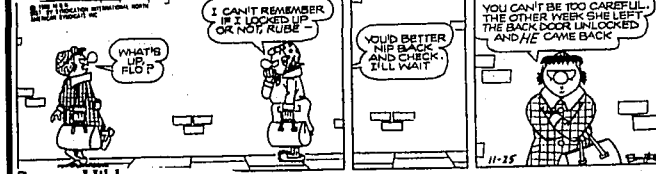
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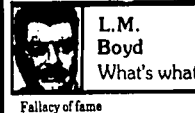

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Despite slow beginning 'Without a clue' not without laughs

"Without a Clue" doesn't begin too promisingly. The film drags along for more than half an hour without a trace of a laugh. At about this time, however, a dog appears, a Doberman, and while the canine has no lines, he does give the film a few yucks, and from there on, the new PG-rated comedy, a parody of the Sherlock Holmes stories, isn't bad. Conan Doyle, however, might not approve, nor will devoted Sherlock Holmes fans. Of course, this sort of thing has happened before. Only last year, we saw a play in which Watson hated Holmes so much that he tried to murder him.

In the new film, Watson does not want to kill the man, but he doesn't have that much patience with him. That is because this Sherlock

Holmes is really a second-rate actor who has been persuaded to pose as the detective Watson has created in the books he has written. The actor, Reginald Kincaid, serves as a beard for Watson. It is Watson who really solves all the crimes. Holmes (Kincaid) could not reason his way out of a closet.

Michael Caine plays Holmes-Kincaid, and Ben Kingsley ("Gandhi") is Dr. Watson, who sends Kincaid on his way when the actor begins to believe all the things that have been written about him.

Watson wants to stand on his own. He will sell new stories in which the hero is "The Crime Doctor." It sounds good to him, but no one else will buy it, so Watson is forced to re-

store the impostor to his former standing. Reunited, they journey to the lake district where they find rooms at a boarding house. That is where the dog lives, and he doesn't like Holmes.

Caine has a good time with the role of the actor-detective, and Kingsley is amusingly irate as Watson. Jeffrey Jones is Inspector Lestrade, and Lysette Anthony is Leslie, daughter of a man who has disappeared.

Peter Cook is Watson's publisher, and Nigel Davenport is the chancellor of the executor who wants

Holmes to help him. Someone is counterfeiting five-pound notes with plates that were stolen from the Royal Mint. Naturally, Moriarty (Paul Freeman) is behind all that, and the decisive confrontation takes place in a warehouse where the actor, now in his element, duels with Holmes' arch-enemy.

The climactic action takes place in very dim lighting, and that doesn't exactly help. The laughs, however, continue, and if the film is not cause enough to leave your home on a wintry night, it does have its mirthful moments.

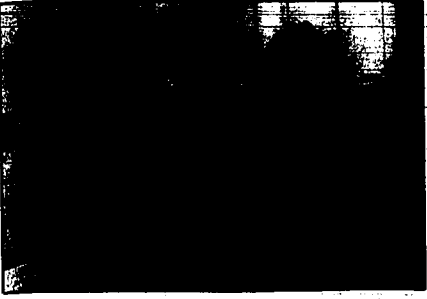

Gauche gags in 'High Spirits' may blind audience

HOLLYWOOD — One might not be able to tell from "High Spirits," but Irish writer-director Neil Jordan is one of the world's most brilliant young film makers. He is equally at ease in the realms of the fantastic ("The Company of Wolves"), a gritty-poetic Graham Greene realism ("Mona Lisa") and the crisscrossing borderland between the two.

This latest movie is likely to strike audiences, and even Jordan admirers, as a big, crass spectacular gone madly wrong; an overloud, frenetic try at a "Beetlejuice"-style scare comedy, full of gauche gags, contrived romance and screaming actors. This perception may blind people to "High Spirits" merits: the cunning cross-cultural satire, the magic, splendor and spectral lyricism beating at this movie's divided heart.

Irish-American emigre who wants to transplant the castle to Malibu, Calif. The forerunner's daughter, Sharon (Beverly D'Angelo), married to a charming nebbish, Jack (perhaps inevitably, Steve Guttenberg) is one of the customers on the unraveling of Plunkett's haunts. The others include a yowling parapsychologist (Martin Ferrero), his flaky wife (Connie

Booth, of "Fawcily Towers") and a kitten-voiced sexpot (Jennifer Tilly), her eye on a hapless Catholic novice (Peter Gallagher).

Jordan's turn of the screwball here is that the castle is actually haunted by a troubled 200-years-dead couple (Daryl Hannah and Liam Neeson), trapped in a nightly re-enactment of their murderous nuptials.

In classic farce parsing, the ghostly couple pair off with the live one and the real ghosts overwhelm the phony ones. In symbolic terms, the virility of Irish legendry overwhelm an

Americanized attempt to counterfeit or spirit them away. In the end, both cultures, and the living and the dead, ravish each other and wind up dancing in the drafty, daft castle hallways.

But in the movie, the opposite seems to happen. The American big-movie sex comedy conventions overwhelm Jordan's liberating poetry, his wild lyricism.

"High Spirits" seems off-kilter. It begins on too high a decibel, too spirited a pace.

Jordan sets his film in the Irish countryside, in a storybook castle on a lofty hillside, where an impoverished lord, Peter Plunkett (Peter O'Toole) desperately tries to save his bankrupt patrimony by converting his castle into a ghostly theme park with banquets on pulleys and servants under sheets.

Plunkett is being dunned by an

else but write. I have no formula, I have no schedule, no regimen. It's whatever is right at the time. I will say that I always have a notebook with me and I'm a compulsive note-taker. Whenever I see anything interesting or hear anything unusual I do write it down. So even when I'm not formally working on a poem or book, I'm always doing background material, getting the ideas down.
Black-striped suspenders hold Prutsky's corduroy trousers in place. A shirt, white beard, salt-and-pepper hair and deep red shirt give the poet a holiday look.
Prutsky begins to sing his poem, "My Mother Says I'm Sickening." The children titter.
"Did you know if you squeeze a hot dog just right it will shoot across the room?" he asks them.
Prutsky says the greatest accom-

plishment he will admit to is making children laugh.
"I'm getting children involved and enthusiastic about something, namely poetry, which, when I was growing up, was considered anathema — which was as palatable as liver. I'm much more popular with kids now than when I was a kid.
He says his philosophy is simple, eat all you want and then take an antacid. There's no sense taking life too seriously. Why would I want to do that? Life's too short. If I were going to be serious I would have been a politician, not a poet.
Beneath the humor, though, lurks a darker side. It surfaces in "The Headless Horseman Rides 'Til Night" and "Nightmares — Poems to Trouble your Sleep." Both books are full of poems destined to thrill young readers.
Is this elfin-looking man with the sleepy, dreamer's eyes as interested in scaring children as making them

laugh?
"You betcha," Prutsky says. "I think that's important. They need to know that there's that side to life. And if they can deal with the boggy man when they're 10, they'll have less trouble with the lean officer at their bank when they're 40. I mean, I think we have to recognize all the sides of human nature and not over-protect our children. I think it's important that they know that those things are out there, but that they also know that they're not real."
After Prutsky's performance, the audience moves upstairs for refreshments. Children and adults, cookies and cider in hand, line up to get Prutsky's graceful, illegible autograph.
"A belch from a boy in-line gives Prutsky occasion to look up from his work.
"That was terrific," he says with a smile, searching the line for the creator. "I salute you."

New CBS series 'Almost Grown' adds 60's rock-and-roll to story

When we attended college in the late Precambrian Era, a favorite study-evasion technique was to sit around somebody's dorm room and listen to records. Inevitably, someone would preface a tune (a sad one, of course) by saying, "I love this song. I feel like it's about my life." The rest of us would sit back and sneer with pity at some dweeb so pathetic that his entire existence could be reduced to less than three minutes on a band of plastic.

Well, look what "American Graffiti" hath wrought. Movies like "The Big Chill" have incorporated rock standards as essential parts of their story lines. On TV, the beat goes on with such shows as "China Beach," "The Wonder Years," and now, most strikingly, CBS's "Almost Grown." (It premieres as a two-hour movie on Sunday, Nov. 27, before airing in its regular time slot on Monday, Nov. 28.) In this story of a tumultuous relationship — from courtship to marriage and beyond — what's on the soundtrack sometimes supercedes the action on the screen.

In the course of the two-hour Sunday premiere, you'll hear "Today I Met the Boy I'm Gonna Marry," "Santa Catalina," "Night Train," "Papa's Got a Brand New Bag," "Do You Love Me?," "Sea of Love," "The Wind Cries Mary" and other blasts from the past. If you're too young to remember or too old to have cared,

"Almost Grown" tracks like a very long shaggy dog story that ends with "you had to be there."

"Rock 'n' roll is a really important part of the show," admits Timothy Daly, who plays "Almost Grown" hero Norman Foley. "I think it's become an important force in the world. In the '60s, it started to become an accepted and interesting art form. And now it's American classical music."

"Where were you in '62?" asked the ads for "American Graffiti." "Almost Grown" has high-school kids making out in a car as the radio broadcasts the latest developments in the Cuban Missile Crisis. Our memories revolve more around perfecting our duck-and-cover move and memorizing the most direct route to the bomb shelter in the school cafeteria.

"Almost Grown" then shifts to the late-'60s, when collegian Norman and his girlfriend Suzie Long (played by Eve Gordon) keep on rockin', experiment with alternative lifestyles and hammer out their relationship with such thought-provoking exchanges as "I don't know what you want." "You. Me. Nobody else. I guess." Well, hey, groovy. I guess.

And then it's on to the present, and those crazy kids are, if anything, even more confused about their lives.

So what are we to make of "Almost Grown"? It's a series designed to appeal to this most self-referential (and self-reverential) of generations. If you don't remember the music, you won't get what all the fuss is about. Maybe those guys should have paid closer attention to the lyrics of the Chambers Brothers' "Time Has Come Today," which plays a central part in one portion of the premiere. "Now the time has come/There are other things to realize."

But maybe we're missing the whole point. Maybe they'd refer us to something a college girlfriend once told us when we tried to explain the earth-shattering importance of a Procol Harum song.

"Shut-up-and dance," she said.

On the Cover Timothy Daly and Eve Gordon star in "Almost Grown," a new CBS series that has a special two-hour preview on Sunday, Nov. 27 and starts to air regularly on Monday, Nov. 28.

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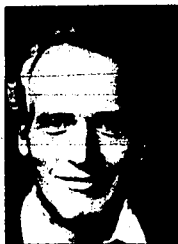
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'Salad war' continues for Newman

that well with the critics of the day. In addition, the two stars clashed constantly. Mae said later, "That picture was a mistake from the word 'Shoot!' She also confided to a friend, "To tell you the truth, I felt Bill Fields had no class. I really didn't care for him."

Q: I've heard that Paul McCartney is an incredibly strict father, particularly with his teen-aged daughter, whom he practically never lets out of the house. — S.L.

A: That isn't so. But that doesn't mean Paul isn't a fairly strict father. One of the reasons he moved to the country was to raise his family away from the big-city London environment. Last summer (1987) his daughter Stella, then 16, was permitted to go to Paris to work for the famous French designer Christian Lacroix, who has always been a big Beatles fan.

Q: I know that the last Warren Beatty movie "Ishtar" was a dismal failure and that Beatty has done nothing since. Do you think he's quietly quitting the movie business, or have the movie moguls dropped him? — S.L.

A: Beatty is a movie mogul, so there's hardly any way he could be dropped. But he does take his time choosing projects. Right now he's trying to get his hands on the rights to "Lilly," Peter Feibleman's just-published biography of Lillian Hellman. Rumor has it he already knows who he'd like to cast in the title role: Katharine Hepburn.

Q: With all the fanfare going on about celebrating the 50th anniversary of "Gone With the Wind," how come we never hear from Olivia de Havilland? Isn't she the only star of that movie who's still alive? — D.L.

A: Olivia, who lives mostly in Paris, likes to keep a low profile. She claims she may show up for some festivities, but she has already turned down the Los Angeles County Museum's salute scheduled for next February 11.

Q: I caught up with two movies on TV in which Grace Kelly's

mother was played by the same actress, Jessie Royce Landis — "The Swan" and "To Catch a Thief" — which to me is a remarkable coincidence. Are there any other examples of this?

A: Sure enough. Martha Scott was cast as Charlton Heston's mother in not one but two biblical epics, "The Ten Commandments" and "Ben Hur." A more current oddity involves Jessica Lange and the talented Ann Wedgeworth. In "Sweet Dreams," the film bio of country singer Patsy Cline, Lange plays Cline and Wedgeworth plays her mother; and in "Far North," the quirkily-touching new film written and directed by Sam Shepard (who happens to be Jessica's boyfriend), Wedgeworth again plays the mother of Lange's character.

Q: Wasn't the late Richard Burton an alcoholic for much of his life? — L.M.

A: Yes. According to Graham Jenkins, the actor's younger brother, in his book "Richard Burton, My Brother," Burton not only was an alcoholic, but smoked 100 cigarettes a day. "When he died," Jenkins told me, "(Burton's) liver was three times the size of an ordinary human being's." When the actor was desperately trying to stay on the wagon, some of his so-called friends would lace his coffee with cognac. Some friends, says Jenkins.

Q: Some time ago, actress Patricia Neal, who almost died of a

stroke, wrote her autobiography. Now I've heard that her daughter, Tessa Dahl, has written hers. How does Tessa treat her mother and father (writer Roald Dahl, Neal's ex-husband) in her book? — L.T.

A: Tessa has written a novel, although there is much talk about how much is fiction and how much is fact. In the book, the narrator describes her mortification at having to feed her mother, a gibbering wreck who was once a beautiful and famous movie star. The father in the novel is depicted as a cold, cruel man who barely tolerates his second daughter, constantly comparing her to her older sister who died. In real life, Tessa is the second daughter of Neal and Dahl, and her older sister, Olivia, died in childhood.

Q: What's this about the sudden appearance of a "lost" movie starring Rossano Brazzi and Valli, two of my favorite Italian imports of the 1940s? What's the movie about? Are these exciting stars still on the scene? — M.P.

A: The film is "We the Living," a romantic epic produced 46 years ago. It was banned by Mussolini's government because of its controversial content and was presumed lost. Based on a novel by Ayn Rand (of "The Fountainhead"), this huge production, set in Revolutionary Russia, has recently been unearthed and restored. The drama features luminous performances by the then 21-year-old

Soap opera 'Santa Barbara' tries unusual ways to startle audience

You can't accuse this year's Emmy-winning soap "Santa Barbara" of resting on its laurels. Producer Jill Farren Phelps will try almost anything to amuse, excite and sometimes startle viewers.

Enter transvestite Bunny Tagliatti. Bunny was actually an experiment that was supposed to last about a month, just long enough to find out whether the character would shock or scare off viewers. What happened, though, was that Joe Marinelli's version of Bunny gave "Santa Barbara" a comic touch that viewers found interesting.

"Bunny is a street kid," says Joe. "He's really likable, but I wouldn't advise anyone messing with him. He can be edgy and explode. Bunny admires women, and his feminine side is developing so he can't resist women's clothes. Actually, he's a lot of fun to play."

One afternoon he had to choose between a stage performance and a championship wrestling match. He chose the stage. When the curtain fell, Joe realized he still had time to make the gym if he hurried. He stripped down to his leotards and walked out

"The English culture and superb training made me feel intelligent. I returned to California to pursue my career because it was just beginning culturally."

Joe's supportive family is delighted with his success and enjoy his "Santa Barbara" drag-show. Straight Joe is on his way, and his parents and brothers are behind him all the way.

Barbara Walters plans to air 50th special

It was Dec. 14, 1976, when "The Barbara Walters Specials" premiered inauspiciously with Walters asking President-elect Jimmy Carter to "be wise with us ... be good to us."

"I took such a terrible ribbing," she recalled. "I got creamed for that — for every part of that first special," Walters said.

But she and the show survived the ribbing, and here she is, some 50 specials and 12 years later, pulling them all together in a two-hour show of highlights and reflections.

"The 50th Barbara Walters Special" (Tuesday on ABC) reminds us of just how many prominent people we have seen through Walters' eyes. This time she takes the opportunity to reflect on the shows — which ones generated the most mail, which ones she regrets, who had the ritziest houses.

"The most beautiful home, I think, is Farrah Fawcett's," she recalled, mentioning a room that had everything in it from a full kitchen to couches. "You could spend your whole life in that room."

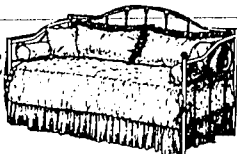

beauty Alida Valli, who went on to score in Hollywood in such hits as Hitchcock's "The Paradine Case" and "The Third Man," and Rossano Brazzi, of "South Pacific" and "Three Coins in the Fountain." Both stars live in Italy and see each other socially.

Q: What was the bad spell that Donna McKechnie, the dancer who was so great in "A Chorus Line," went through? An article mentioned that her life had fallen apart but didn't elaborate. — D.P.

A: The bad time began with the breakup of her marriage to Michael Bennett, the creator and director of "A Chorus Line." Donna and Michael had been friends for 15 years, but their marriage lasted less than a year. He died of AIDS in 1987. McKechnie had to leave the musical due to a back injury, and then she developed a crippling form of rheumatoid arthritis. She spent four years battling her way back to physical and mental health. Now in her 40s, she has a new boyfriend (a Canadian Mountie), and is starring in the London revival of "Can Can."

Q: Claus von Bulow recently authorized an auction of household possessions from the homes he shared with his wife, Sunny. Will he also share in her estate when she dies? — J.K.

A: Von Bulow, who twice successfully defended himself against charges that he attempted to murder his wife, got 50 percent of the auction proceeds but will inherit nothing from his comatose wife's \$50 million estate when she dies. His two stepchildren, Alexander and Ala Auersperg, also sued on the same grounds but settled out of court when von Bulow agreed to waive his rights to the estate. As a result of the settlement, Sunny and von Bulow's daughter, Cosima, was reinstated as an heir and will share her mother's estate with her half-brother and half-sister.

Q: Debbie Reynolds, plugging her autobiography on TV, seemed very charming, yet over the years we've always heard she was difficult and temperamental. Which is the real Debbie? — D.D.

A: Word is that on her current book tour she's been terrific: smart, cooper-

ative and funny. In between interviews she kicks off her shoes and entertains everyone with wicked imitations of Dr. Ruth and Zsa Zsa. I hear she'd like to retire, and she probably will after she finishes an upcoming road company tour of her movie hit, "The Unsinkable Molly Brown."

Q: Cassandra Peterson, the sexy-funny cross between Cher, Mae West and Morticia, was great in the recent movie "Elvira: Mistress of the Dark." Is it true she once suffered burns across her body? Her slinky outfits are so revealing I can't imagine any portion of her that the camera didn't see. — B.H.

A: Cassandra was involved in a freak kitchen mishap as a child and was badly burned. When I interviewed her on the set of "Elvira," I noticed that her costume, revealing as it was, concealed some still visible scars around her throat, which were cleverly hidden from the camera.

'War and Remembrance' not living up to expectations

LOS ANGELES (AP) — ABC's 30-hour series "War and Remembrance" is not living up to forecasts that it would dominate the Nielsen ratings, trailing regular series for the week ending Nov. 20.

Three NBC comedies took the top spots and NBC won the week. One episode of "War and Remembrance" made the Top 10, placing 10th.

The first 18 hours of the World War II epic based on Herman Wouk's book was widely acclaimed by critics, but fell in the A.C. Nielsen Co. ratings after its opening night. The first episode was in fourth place the week before.

"War and Remembrance" is the sequel to "The Winds of War," which got a 38.6 rating and a 53 share over 18 hours in 1983. The final 12 hours of "War and Remembrance" is not expected to be telecast until May.

ABC won't comment on the ratings until the final episode of the first 18 hours is telecast this week, according to Bob Wright, a vice president for public relations.

The fate of "War and Remembrance" does not bode well for longer miniseries. The miniseries cost \$104 million to make, and even prior to the disappointing ratings ABC had forecast a loss of \$20 million.

NBC, although it had predicted victory for "War and Remembrance," won the week by counterprogramming and with vigorous promotion campaign against the ABC miniseries. ABC placed second for the week.

The three NBC comedy shows at the top of the ratings were "The Cosby Show," "A Different World" and "The Golden Girls."

"Our calculated plan of youth-oriented counterprogramming, coupled with aggressive and creative promotion, had the absolute right effect with the viewing audience," said Brandon Tartikoff, president of NBC Entertainment. "I'm happy NBC has kept its prime-time win streak alive in the heart of the November sweeps."

ABC reportedly told its advertisers the first 18 hours of "War and Remembrance" would get an average rating of 20.2.

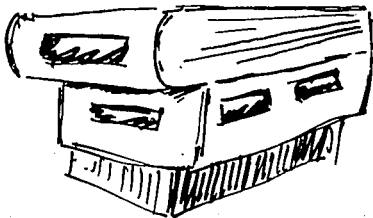

It's not like this is a way station or this is a stop along the way. I feel like if I died tomorrow I will have achieved what I think a lot of people would be happy to achieve in life, which is to get to do what they want to do."

Unquestionably, however, there are those nights when Letterman appears out of sorts, impatient and just plain cranky — as if he had done one show too many.

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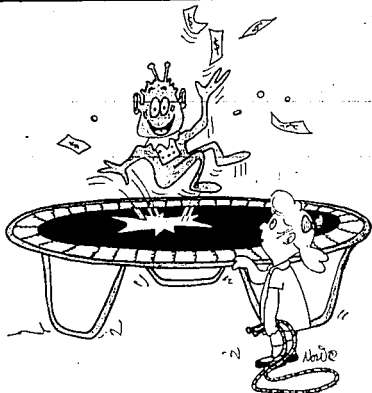
