

# Bakker facing fraud charges

CHARLOTTE, N.C. - PTL founder Jim Bakker,

CHARLOTTE, N.C. — PTL founder Jim Bakker, forced to quit his multimillion-dollar television ministry after admitting a sexual encounter with a church secretary, was indicted Moiday along with three former aides on charges of fraud and tax evasion. A federal grand jury charged Bakker, 48, and former aide Richard Dortch, 57, in a 21-count indictment with mail fraud, wire fraud and conspiring to defraud the public through the sale of lifetime partnerships in the ministry's Heritage Village theme-park in Fort-Mill-SC, south of Charlotte.

If convicted, they could face up to five years in prison and \$250,000 fines on each count.

Bakker's wife, Tammy, also a target of the grand jury, was not indicted.

There is no statement being made right now, said a man who wouldn't give his name at Jim and Tammy Ministries; the Bakkers' new organization, in Pineville, N.C.

# Deaths at nursing home lead to murder charges

WALKER, Mich. (AP) -- Two former nurse's aides were arraigned on murder charges Monday in the death of patients at a nursing home where eight people died suspiciously, aues snid

Both women worked at the Alpine Butt women worked at the Apple Manor Nursing Home when the pa-tients died, Police Chief Walter Sprenger said. Officials originally believed the patients died of natural causes.

Catherine May Wood, 26 of Grand "Catherine May Wood, 25 of Crand Rapids, who worked at the home in this Grand Rapids suburb from 1985 until October, was charged with two counts of murder in the deaths last year of two terminally ill patients, a 98-year-old-woman and a 60-year-old

Gwendolyn Gail Graham, 25, who worked at the home from 1986 to 1987 and now lives in Texas, faced one

charge of murder in the death of the 98-year-old woman. Autopsies after the two bodies were exhaunted failed to determine the cause of the two deaths, authori-ties said. Six other deaths at the runrising home last year are-also un-der investigation, authorities said.





supports are on the hit list of every politician and budget analyst searching for ways to meet budget-deficit targets in the next few years. A staff study of Vice President George Bush's Testible freeze by the House Ways and Means Committee shows actual spending reductions to 1994 only for farm-price supports and a catchall catogory called oftler."

The budget director talks of getting some savings out of farm-price supports; Rep. Leon E. Panetta, D. Calif., suggests reducing target prices for farm products to cut the budget. Farm supports seem like an easy mark.

Those statements made more sense a year or two ago than now.
Low farm prices arising from crop surpluses raised farm-program spending to \$17.7 billion, \$25.8 billion spending to \$17.7 billion, \$25.8 billi and \$22.4 billion for the 1985 to 1987

and S2.2 billion for the 1985 to 1987

fiscal years, respectively.

But the 1988 drought reduced spending to S13 billion last fiscal year and to around S11 billion for 1989, providing a deficit-reduction windfall of at least S15 billion over two fiscal years. Short-crops generated net sales instead of purchases o surplus stocks and lower per-bushel subsidies arising from higher farm prices.

We cannot count on the drought to continue or to spread to other countries, even though that may happen.
In fact, with increased acreage being John Schnittker

planted to crops, a return to average or normal yields in 1989 may sudden-ly bust the budget in 1990. The gov-

in carrying out its commitment to
support prices; prices may fall by 25

billions of dollars.
This process is already under way.
Cotton and rice surpluses are back

the same boat a 'year or two from
now, if good U.S. crops are not offset
by harvest disasters abroad. Dr.
Robert Thompson of Purdue University, a former AgricultureDepartment official, told the National Economic Commission, in effect, not to
worry: "It is reasonable to expectthe cost of the programs to stabilize
in the early 1990s in the range of \$113 billion per year."
This thission is likely to be shattered within a year or two by a \$20

1986-87 fire-sale levels, but not neces based levels. That would keep defi-ciency payments low. If it threatens export-volume, we should operate our export-subsidy programs as ac-tively as necessary to meet our ex-

port targets.

We need to ask ourselves: Why i a major commercial sector like ago cation as Social Security, Medicare and Medicaid? And we need to do something about it.

Bolsters relations with Castro

Bolsters relations with Castro cut his opponents and bolster his own image, Castro saw a larger geopolitical significance in the invitation.

The fact that he was sitting in the same gallery with other heads of state, and a galaxy of other dignitaries, including U.S. Secretary of State George Shultz, was both a recognition of his nation and a symbol of triumph, he said.

The U.S. strategy of isolating? Cuba has failed, he said at a weekend news conference. We never came to an inaugaration before because they didn't invite us. 'But-now Ecuador and Mexico have invited us. U.S. policy is a 'total' wreck, and 'Cuba's position is being vindented by Latin America. Thirty years have gone by and we're still here."

Castros forces overthrew the dictatorship of Fulgencio Batista almost exactly attrycars ago, on dan 1, 1859.

Tronically, one of Castros patrons when he was organizing his revolution here was Lazaro Cardenas, Canahaemoes father.

Lazaro Cardenas, a former president, a leftist and a power in Mexican politics, got Castro out of trubble, when ho was imprisoned while training his little band of revolutionaries near Mexico City.

Castro was treated like a conquering hero from the mement he arrived at Mexico City sairport Wednesday. Salinas made sure to introduce the attending heads of state during his inaugural address. Thursday and Castro got by far the biggest ovation. By that time Cardenas supporters already had walked out.

Social well-being in a modern state is not identified with paternalism that supplants effort or inhibits character, Salinas said.

Castro, by contrast, summed up a long, news, conference, statement on the evils of capitalism by saving. Socialism cannot be built with capitalist tools.
