Hawkins State seizes warehouse; hopes to avoid bankruptcy

City takes legal steps against adult bookstore

TWIN FALLS — City officials have photographed and inventoried hundreds of magazines, videotapes and items of sexual paraphernalia at an adult bookstore after obtaining a temporary restraining order and injunction against the store.

The procedure, which is called "ex parte," was requested so that police could secure evidence before store owners had a chance to take away any of the materials, City Attorney Fritz Wandrich said.

The city is also asking for a civil penalty of \$300 a day for each day the store is operated illegally and for attorney's fees and other expenses. Wandrich said he plans to subpoena the materials inventoried by police, which Hurlbut will need to see in order to rule on the store's legality.

Reagan has warm words for Soviet leader at news conference

WASHINGTON — President Reagan proclaimed Thursday night that "extraordinary things have happened" to improve U.S.-Soviet relations since Mikhail Gorbachev took power in 1985 and even raised the hope that someday the two superpowers might become allies again.

"So the path remains open, and the pace of peace continues," Reagan declared, standing on the spot where one year ago he and Gorbachev signed a treaty banning intermediate missiles.

Reagan's warm words for Gorbachev at this, his 48th news conference, were in sharp contrast to his comments about the Soviets at his first press conference in 1981, when he said the Soviets would "lie ... cheat ... steal" to achieve their political goals.

But the high point of his eight years, Reagan said without hesitation, was turning a "disastrous economic situation" that he inherited into the longest peacetime economic expansion in history.

re calling with Gorbachev. "How did I say it?" the president declared, groping for words. But even while acknowledging that he approves of Gorbachev's sweeping new policies — including his proposal Wednesday to reduce Soviet troops by 500,000 — Reagan cautioned that the United States must "remain resolute and without illusion and ... we must especially maintain our military strength."

MOSCOW — Soviet authorities rushed military surgeons and tons of medical supplies Thursday into Armenia, rocked by an earthquake that officials said virtually destroyed several cities and killed tens of thousands of people.

Tragedy cuts short Gorbachev's triumphant visit

NEW YORK — Mikhail S. Gorbachev headed home Thursday from a tragedy-shortened but triumphant visit, expressing hopes that it would "open up good prospects for our two peoples" and the world.

The warm feelings were not lost on Gorbachev, who said the hospitality he experienced showed an "increasing friendliness and willingness to cooperate on the part of the Soviet people and the American people."

The earthquake destroyed two-thirds of Leninakan, Armenia's second-largest city with a population of 250,000 people, a TV correspondent said. Spitsak, a town of 16,000 about 45 miles away, was "practically erased from the face of the Earth," the correspondent said.

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U.S. helicopter crashes in Honduras; 5 Americans aboard die

TEGUIGUALPA, Honduras (AP) — A U.S. military helicopter participating in maneuvers crashed in northern Honduras on Thursday, killing all five Americans aboard, a U.S. Embassy official said.

Embassy spokesman Charles Barclay said the CH-47 Chinook helicopter crashed at 1 p.m. (noon MST) near La Ceiba, 233 miles north of Tegucigalpa.

Barclay refused to identify the victims until their relatives are notified.

He said the helicopter was based at Palmerola Air Base, 48 miles north of Tegucigalpa, the capital. Officials at Palmerola refused comment.

Barclay said U.S. military authorities were at the site investigating.

Missile downs spray aircraft

RABAT, Morocco (AP) — A missile attack downed a U.S. government locust-spraying plane over Mauritania on Thursday, and all five people aboard were presumed dead, officials said.

A second DC7, also from the U.S. Agency for International Development, was damaged by the anti-aircraft missiles but was able to fly on and land in Morocco, and no injuries were reported among those aboard.

Official sources in this North African country said that rebels of the Marxist Polisario Front may have attacked the planes.

The attack occurred as both four-engine propeller-driven DC-7s flew over a border area where nationalist rebels have waged a guerrilla war

against the Moroccan government to establish an independent Western Sahara.

The area where the plane was shot down is 650 miles southwest of Rabat, the Moroccan capital.

In Washington, AID spokesman Bart Kull said both planes were used for spraying locust swarms in Senegal, which borders Mauritania to the south.

Mauritania lies east of the Western Sahara, a former Spanish colony. Morocco annexed part of the Western Sahara in 1976 and the remaining territory three years later,

when Mauritania withdrew from it. Moroccan government officials said the two planes were fired upon while they were flying at 10,000 feet to 11,000 feet in an international navigation corridor over the northern Mauritania.

The five crew members of the downed aircraft, all of whom are American citizens, are presumed dead, an AID statement said.

Another AID spokesman in Washington, Jerry Lipson, said the five crew members in the downed plane were employees of T & G Aviation, not the federal government.

In addition to the debate over waste disposal, Congress has asked the department to prove that the project, producing weapons-grade plutonium from fuel-grade stocks at other federal reactors, is necessary and safe before it decides by March 1 whether to release the \$2 million budget for initial construction.

Ms. Bernell had not seen the document but doubted whether it could prove the need for more weapons-grade plutonium since the element decays very slowly and the nation cutting not increasing its nuclear arsenal.

The approval permits the state to take control of all agricultural commodities in the warehouses owned or operated by Hawkins and of all books, papers or other property used in the business.

The seizure also puts the state in control of the warehouse. Before Thursday, the only security over the warehouse's operations came from guards provided by First Security Bank.

On Monday, the state released a

preliminary physical inventory revealing a shortage of 89,776 sacks, about 32 percent of what Hawkins should have. About 29,000 of those sacks are in dispute, meaning growers' and Hawkins' records don't match.

That shortage could mean a \$2.7 million shortfall based on an average price of \$30 per hundred pounds of beans, according to court records filed Thursday.

The physical inventory was the

first step in an audit conducted by the state.

The state will now review books and reconcile differences, a process that could take three or more weeks, and state auditors say the inventory figures could change.

Hawkins directors called the state to the warehouse Nov. 22 when they discovered inventory discrepancies. The state suspended trading at the warehouse that day.

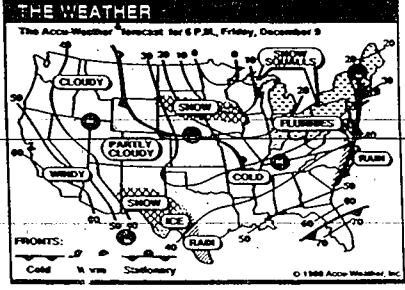

The suit states that defendants were notified that they were in violation of city and state laws 10 days before the suit was filed, as required by law, and they did not respond.

LaMar Orton, community development director, who inspected the store earlier said the store contains plastic-covered magazines whose covers are hidden except for titles such as "European Heat" and "Adult American Dreambook," uncovered magazines such as Playboy, videotapes with titles such as "Beverly Hills Sluts," and soft-cover books.

A sign on the building states, "If you are offended by explicit materials, do not enter."

Visions West has applied for a building permit to add "boudoir" to the building. This permits list the names Lyle MacNichols and the same Jerome phone number used by Peter Gregori, the man alleged to be the manager of the Front Page Book Store in a lawsuit filed last year.

The Determined Citizens Against Pornography last year sued to shut down the Front Page under an Idaho moral nuisance statute. That suit died after the Front Page closed its doors and the parties resolved arguments over attorneys' fees.

In the wake of the Front Page lawsuit, the city passed an ordinance this summer forbidding adult entertainment stores within 2,500 feet of schools, restaurants and churches and 500 feet from residential areas, city parks and other adult stores. Visions West is within a couple of blocks of the Depot Grill restaurant.

The zoning ordinance would allow adult entertainment stores in the Magic Valley Mall area and in a few locations on Kimberly Road.

The store's owners could not be located for comment.

Jewell, the building owner, previously has said he is unconcerned about the bookstore and possible zoning violations.

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Andrus expects answers from DOE at waste meeting

BOISE (AP) — When Idaho Gov. Cecil Andrus goes to a meeting in Salt Lake City next week on the disposal of waste from federal nuclear facilities, he expects the Department of Energy to bring some answers.

Such as a promise when the federal government can open a New Mexico underground storage facility near Carlsbad, the Waste Isolation Pilot Project.

"We expect the feds to bring the assurances when they will have the site available for the waste," he said.

Idaho has been used for storage of waste from federal installations such as the Rocky Flats weapons plant near Denver. In October, Andrus refused to allow the waste into the state for storage, saying the federal government had reneged on its promises to remove the material from Idaho.

The WIPP plant in New Mexico was scheduled to start receiving some of the waste late this year, but its opening has been postponed, while political and other roadblocks are resolved.

Andrus is scheduled to meet next Friday in Salt Lake City with Gov. Roy Romer of Colorado, New Mexico's Garrey Carruthers and a delegation of Department of Energy officials.

When asked what suggestions he would take to the meeting, Andrus said it will be up to DOE to produce answers before he will consider lifting his ban on the waste shipments.

"We need to understand what are creating (at federal nuclear plants) and what do we do with the waste," he said.

Earlier in the day, DOE produced an environmental impact statement on the proposed Special Isotope Separation project. It could bring a \$900 million contract to the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory in eastern Idaho, where the nuclear waste has been stored.

Andrus said he felt no pressure that he had to relent on his waste shipment ban to get the plant.

"I think they know me well enough that they should not try that approach," he said.

Andrus, leading the contingent of Idaho government leaders and businessmen, opened the state's first two overseas trade offices on the trip — one in Seoul and one at the World Trade Center in Taipei. The cost to the state will be about \$70,000 a year to operate those offices, but the governor said the payoff will be huge.

Andrus said he didn't want to indicate he has no confidence in INEL, but was trying to reassure Idahoans anxious about the site's environmental impact.

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State senator sets record for spending

BOISE (AP) — At least until the report from his opponent shows up, Boise Democrat Sen. Mike Burkett has set a record for spending on an Idaho legislative race, almost \$136,000.

Burkett, a political newcomer, defeated one of the Idaho Legislature's top Republicans, former Senate president pro tem James Risch.

The secretary of state's office said Risch's report hadn't been received by Thursday afternoon, but the race doubtless set an all-time record for spending. The reports were due or had to be postmarked by the close of business on Thursday.

Burkett won, 46,852-36,955, with Libertarian Jack Dalton trailing with 2,711 votes. The legislative district covers all of Ada County.

The previous spending record was set by Risch two years ago, \$102,000, as he beat Democrat Larry La Rocco, who spent \$67,000.

Risch said in an earlier interview he spent about the same as last time, which would mean the two candidates

spent nearly \$240,000 between them. Burkett's spending was more than fellow Democrat Jeanne Givens of Clear Lake spent in her unsuccessful bid for the 1st District congressional seat. She lost to Rep. Larry Craig, after spending about \$108,000.

Burkett, like Risch a Boise attorney, reported raising \$131,816, spending of \$129,386, a balance of \$2,233 and unpaid bills of \$5,532.

The political action arm of the Idaho Education Association contributed the most, \$22,712. And a Boise microchip manufacturing company, Micron Technology, gave Burkett \$10,000 in late October for a total of \$13,000 for the campaign.

He also received \$1,771 from Micron Chairman Joe Parkinson, and \$4,100 from the Democratic Senate Campaign Committee.

The latest report covered Oct. 25 through Nov. 18, and Burkett reported spending \$48,876 during that period.

Risch's earlier spending report showed he had just under \$90,000 prior to Oct. 25.

Other reports filed Thursday showed much of the money backing Idaho's state lottery amendment came in on the eve of the election last month or after the election.

Pacific Rim - Idaho trade solid

BOISE (AP) — Idaho's trade relations with the critical overseas market of the Pacific Rim were solidified in a 10-day mission that Gov. Cecil Andrus says catapulted Idaho to the status of a world trader.

"It's hard to put your finger on any one thing," the governor said Thursday after returning from the tour of South Korea, Taiwan and Hong Kong. "It's a feeling that we have of the relationship. It's a warmer, more comfortable relationship."

Andrus optimistic about legislature

BOISE (AP) — Gov. Cecil Andrus says he didn't hear much he would disagree with out of the Legislature's organizing session last week.

As they elected many new leaders for the 1989-90 sessions, Republican leaders said they hoped to put aside the political bickering that marked the 1988 session and try to solve the state's problems on a cooperative basis.

"I endorse and accept each one of them," said Andrus, of those GOP promises.

"We have the prospect of a very productive session," the governor told a news conference on Thursday, although he said "only time will tell" if that happens.

He also said he agrees with proposals from the Republican leaders for some sort of a "rainy day fund" or savings account for at least part of a budget surplus. But Andrus said that can come only after the state's legitimate needs are met, such as for new buildings projects at the colleges and universities and more prison space.

Legislator urges monitoring at INEL

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — To reassure Idahoans that the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory is environmentally safe, an eastern Idaho legislator says the state Division of Environment resume monitoring there.

Sen. John Hansen, R-Idaho Falls, said Wednesday that INEL has suffered from negative publicity surrounding other Department of Energy installations, and has been criticized around the state for ties to the defense industry.

He called for a "bold step" to assure Idaho residents that the federal installation is not contaminating the environment. He spoke to an Idaho Falls Rotary Club luncheon.

Hansen suggested additional funding and staff for the division and cre-

ation of a citizen advisory committee. He said that would be a resumption of responsibilities the state had several years ago.

Hansen said he didn't want to indicate he has no confidence in INEL, but was trying to reassure Idahoans anxious about the site's environmental impact.

A recent DOE report listed environmental problems at INEL because of contamination of the Snake River Plain Aquifer with heavy metals and other pollutants.

Also, two defense-related projects proposed for the INEL have drawn more opposition than support at state hearings. The projects are the Special Isotope Separation project and the New Production Reactor.

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The INEL is a state resource and the futures of both are tied together, Hansen said. To ensure the growth of both the INEL and Idaho, public support and confidence in the site are necessary.

If critics want rumors printed, they should do it

WASHINGTON — A few days before the election, I was called by an associate professor of law at a local university who asked: "What kind of proof does The Washington Post need to print a rumor?"

"The questioner, an avowed supporter of Democratic presidential candidate Michael Dukakis, was rather irate because this newspaper had not published a story about the so-called October surprise, a questionable tale of how in 1980 the Republican Party, thanks to George Bush and William J. Casey, was able to prevent Iran from releasing American hostages and thus helped elect Ronald Reagan and defeat then-president Jimmy Carter. I was reminded of that call while reading a recent column by Michael Kinsley that recalled the day about two weeks before the election when a rumor that The Post would publish some sexual revelation about George Bush drove the stock market down 40 points.

When it was announced that this newspaper did not have plans to produce such a story, the market bounced back 20 points, and "thousands of journalists exhaled with relief," according to Kinsley.

He attributed the general failure of the press to publish such stories to the "more stringent" rules we reporters are said to be applying vis-a-vis writing about politicians' sexual activities after the Gary Hart episode.

Kinsley argued that "more journalistic enterprise in running monkey business would be a healthy development" because politicians such as Bush have made their private lives a campaign issue. He also wrote that it was patronizing for reporters to deny voters "this information" — without saying what information he had in mind.

In the eight presidential campaigns that I have covered directly or indirectly as a reporter, there has never been a flood of telephone calls comparable to the ones I received this year where individuals — including other reporters — demanded to know why this newspaper refused to write about the above cited alleged incidents and a few others that supposedly represented questionable personal activities of Sen. Dan Quayle.

For five months earlier this year, Bob Woodward and I researched and reported on Bush's past and present wife's five-part series that was published in this newspaper last August and ran more than 20,000 words.

Prior to that we had written several stories outlining the details, as best we could determine, of Bush's role in the Iran-Contra affair.

Later, we continued working to present to The Post a readers relevant material about the vice president and his aides and wrote one story that led to the resignation of one of his top campaign advisers.

We heard many rumors about Bush before and during the time we were reporting for the series, and our inquiries included determining as best we could what was accurate, what was rumor and what was false. We printed only what we were satisfied was probably true.

More than a month before the election, a freelance writer called to say he had information about Bush's alleged personal life which he wanted to share with me. He then repeated an often-repeated rumor which we had checked into and were never able to confirm with any reliable source, although many had heard it as a rumor. Beyond that, Bush friends and associates, who had heard the same rumor, declared it to be untrue.

When asked what he had to support his allegation, the freelance writer said he had heard it from a trusted source who in turn had heard it from someone else who was close to an original source.

When told this was not enough to justify a Post story, he complained that we had too high a standard. He eventually published a

version of his story in a California weekly, and radio and television quickly picked it up, although it died just as fast.

He called again to question why The Post had not used his story and said he had developed further information to support his allegation and would publish it before the election. As far as I know he never did.

The Wall Street stock plunge, based on a false story that The Post was about to publish this same rumor, revived the matter again.

Two days before the election, amid a flurry of calls about the same story, a reporter from the Washington bureau of a major Midwest newspaper called me to say he was on to the same rumor, had read the California weekly, and he, too, wanted to share that information with me so that it would run in The Post. He had, however, only rumors and no facts, and as far as I know nothing appeared in his newspaper.

Another call during this period came from a columnist who is a close friend who wanted to know the rationale for The Post's publishing material about Hart's personal life but not about Bush's. The explanation, that we had probable facts in one case and only rumors in the other, seemed to satisfy him.

After the election, a good friend who is a

respected writer and editor warned me that "several journalism reviews" were looking into "The Post's failure to write about Bush's rumored private behavior and if this newspaper would be terribly embarrassed if years from now it turned out to be true.

Kinsley has provided an additional theme for that chorus, albeit in more sophisticated and entertaining manner, claiming that new standards have been applied since the Hart episode. The rules, as far as we are concerned, have never changed and of relevance remain the key factors. They were there with Hart; they were not with Bush and Quayle.

But there is one other point that ought to be made for journalists who appear to be dissatisfied with the performance on Bush. They have pencils, paper, telephones, typewriters or computers and outlets that publish their work.

Why don't they themselves go ahead and print what they believe about Bush or Quayle or anyone in politics, "this information" that Kinsley said is being denied voters, rather than spending so much time and space criticizing others who do not?

Gorbachev's perestroika affects U.S. interests

Soviet military reduction plans read something different into the personality, strength of Communist world leader

On the subject of Mikhail S. Gorbachev's "perestroika" in the Soviet military, the West has had one central question: "Where is the best?"

The Soviet president talked about restructuring his enormous military establishment with a new guiding principle — that of reasonably sufficient forces organized for defense rather than offense. Authorities in the West, quite correctly, wanted evidence.

On Wednesday Gorbachev dramatically furnished it. In his speech to the United Nations he said that he was making unilateral cuts of a kind not seen since the 1960s, when Nikita S. Khrushchev bucked his generals' plan to get himself boot out of office.

Certainly we must carefully monitor the progress of Gorbachev's military reductions. But if he can deliver, he has altered the political as well as the military landscape in Europe.

Gorbachev said that he would cut 500,000 men from the Soviet military, about 10 percent; and retire the associated equipment. Ten percent is a significant figure, but with more than 6 million men under arms it still leaves a military establishment more than twice the size of the 2.5 million for the United States.

Some of his more detailed plans are more promising. For one thing, his equipment-reduction plans represent even larger cuts. Overall, Gorbachev said, he will remove 10,000 tanks, 8,600 artillery pieces and 800 combat aircraft from Soviet inventories. That's a 18 percent of his tanks, 27 percent of his artillery and 18 percent of his total aircraft. Such cuts would be militarily significant.

His specific points about Eastern Europe may be more telling yet. He promised to remove — and disband — six Soviet tank divisions now stationed in East Germany, Czechoslovakia and Hungary. That's one-third of the total forces that would spread any attack. Beyond that, however, Gorbachev said that half his tank reductions — 5,000 — would come from Eastern Europe, making Warsaw Pact inventories roughly equivalent to North Atlantic Treaty Organization inventories in Central Europe.

That supports another promise that the Soviet president made: that he will restructure his forces in Eastern Europe to be "clearly defensive." Removal of tanks from the front left behind in Eastern Europe could reduce the offensive capability of those units. He also said that he would remove what he called assault landing troops and assault crossing units. Western experts translate that to mean the kind of troops necessary to seize key points deep in NATO territory and establish bridgeheads

across Western Europe's many rivers. Those are the key elements essential to a blitzkrieg offensive.

That's the military story of Gorbachev's speech. I want to emphasize again that none of it has happened yet. We'll have to confirm each element before we can safely incorporate it into our planning. But, for the moment, Gorbachev has stolen the march on NATO politically.

Eastern and Western blocs are about to enter conventional-arms-control talks. NATO's position had been that the Warsaw Pact had to reduce its large edge in men and weapons before talks could get serious.

By no means did the Soviet president go as far as NATO deems necessary in reducing the Warsaw Pact's edge in military forces. But if NATO merely demands more, it runs a political risk. If the alliance doesn't come up with something constructive of its own, and soon, the West will be politically vulnerable to the next Gorbachev negotiating position.

NATO needs to step back and define a safer, more stable European military balance for the next generation. Then the alliance should formulate an arms-control strategy that pursues it. It isn't enough to stand around waiting to see what the new man in the Kremlin will do next, particularly since it's very difficult to figure out what that might be.

Gorbachev's speech stood the conventional wisdom about the Soviet president on its head in a number of ways. First, until Wednesday, experts from Defense Secretary Frank C. Carlucci to Deputy CIA Director Robert M. Gates to the House Armed Services Committee to the International Institute for Strategic Studies all said that there was no evidence that Gorbachev had any effect on the military. If he pulls this off, that will change in a hurry.

For military perestroika to be taken seriously, these experts said, there should be some combination of reductions and restructuring. Bingo.

What this tells us about Gorbachev is still in doubt. He may well be much stronger than we thought. Maybe the Soviet economy is even worse than we thought, or perhaps the new man is an even greater risk-taker than we thought.

Whatever the final verdict on Mikhail Gorbachev, the speech tells us that we've got our hands full.

With a little help from Western friends, Gorbachev sets out to transform the Soviet economy into new strength

WASHINGTON — Mikhail Gorbachev, venture capitalist and chairperson of the Liberal Party of the Soviet Union, is offering the capitalist West an opportunity to participate in a leveraged buyout. The undertaking would buy the Soviet Union out of totalitarianism and associated expansionism.

He is, he intimates, weary of hearing that although the United States has a military-industrial complex, the Soviet Union is a military-industrial complex. He aims, he says, to change that, with a little help from his friends: the bankers and taxpayers of the West. By combining Soviet economic decline with Western anxiety about his supposed vulnerability, Gorbachev has produced a new source of Soviet strength. The decline is patent. The Soviet Union is the first industrial nation to suffer a peacetime decline in life expectancy; living standards are sinking toward a level like Burma's. Gorbachev's vulnerability may be only in Western eyes, but his leverage is Western hopefulness.

The hope is that he is launching the Soviet Union into a different kind of Glasnost Transition period. That phrase, once derided by the masses into purism. The hope is that it now describes an internal transformation that will mean pacific external relations. But there is little evidence of a transition to pluralism.

Given the record of seven decades of the Soviet regime, and given the socialization that produces the pool of people from which the politburo is drawn, it is prudent to suspect that there is circularity in the logic of Gorbachev's "liberality." It does seem that perestroika is whatever the Communist Party says it is and glasnost is freedom to criticize the critics of perestroika.

Gorbachev is attempting the Soviet Union's third "revolution from above." The first was Lenin's, in which a tiny cadre imposed a revolutionary regime on a nation spanning 11 time zones. (As late as the late 1940s some inattentive Mongolians first learned that in 1917 they had been ushered into a workers' paradise.) The second revolution from above was Stalin's freeze-draft industrialization, and the collectivization of agriculture irrigated with the blood of 20 million victims. Now Gorbachev wants trickle-down reform, but it can hardly trickle through the top crust of Soviet society.

In his U.N. address, Gorbachev said that the party is "the vanguard force of perestroika" and is "restructuring itself." That formulation affirms the traditional tenet of Soviet totalitarianism: The party is the vanguard, meaning tutor and leader, of the masses because it has a monopoly on insight.

Gorbachev governs a Third World nation possessing First World armed forces. He senses that modernity means, in the West, a permanent process of modernization. But there cannot be modernization without markets that allow price mechanisms to reward enterprise and allocate resources rationally.

There is a stark incompatibility between markets and the party. The party's raison d'être today is to serve as a command apparatus, transmitting commands that are Gorbachev's substitute for market impulses. The party is a neurological system too crude for anything but a primitive and stagnant society. But will the Soviet elite liquidate itself, forfeiting its perquisites for altruistic reasons—for the good of the masses. No elite ever has. And Gorbachev is not really asking it to.

A market mechanism means consumer sovereignty, and such sovereignty must have political reverberations. Markets mean the democratization, through broad dispersal, of choices that cumulatively determine society's shape. Markets mean the emancipation of choice from any "vanguard." Gorbachev's reforms are radically contrary to this.

Gorbachev is not trying to produce "Weimar Russia," meaning a flowering of diversity. Andrei Sakharov stresses that Gorbachev's draft constitution "never so much as mentions even the possibility of pluralism and has no constitutional provision for a multi-party system." Thus Gorbachev's biggest political consequence may occur in the United States under the governance of Gramm-Rudman-Gorbachev.

Gorbachev's rhetoric, now supplemented by a pruning of some outer reaches and marginal components of Soviet military superiority, may, in the austere fiscal environment of the post-Reagan era, produce a pull-meal, bipartisan U.S. retreat from defense spending. Thus Gorbachev may, without reversing Soviet economic decline, achieve a relative enhancement of Soviet military power, which is the sole source of its superpower status.

Gorbachev's decision to return home shows concern

NEW YORK — Mikhail S. Gorbachev's hurried return to his earthquake-stricken nation avoids the specter of pictures of the Soviet president on a lighthearted sightseeing tour while thousands of his countrymen lay dead.

"I have to be there," he said Thursday as he left the United States to fly directly home, bypassing scheduled visits to Cuba and Great Britain.

Foreign Minister Eduard A. Shevardnadze understood the point, saying, "Despite the fact that all necessary measures are being taken to overcome the extremely grave consequences of this disaster, Mikhail Gorbachev believes that when the people are suffering, he has to be there."

Gorbachev himself said the earthquake "was extremely severe and had extremely grave consequences... devastation and great loss of life. So I urgently have to return."

Although such decisions are reached in secrecy, it was apparent the remainder of Gorbachev's highly publicized New York stay, including

the opening of a Soviet trade show, a stroll through Central Park and a museum tour, would have contrasted sharply with the stark pictures of disaster at home.

And Gorbachev, whose nationally televised chats with constituents have set a new, modern style for a Soviet leader, could hardly ignore the situation. To do so would have been reminiscent of President Reagan's hesitation in 1983 to return to Washington from a California vacation after the Soviet shootdown of a Korean Air Lines passenger jet.

Gorbachev's decision also demonstrated his ability to respond quickly to events in a country he often complains is bound by its own bureaucracy.

Barely four hours before the president's decision was announced at a surprise late-night news conference Wednesday, chief Foreign Ministry spokesman Gennady I. Gerasimov had dismissed any suggestion Gorbachev might cut short his stay in New York.

Although the spokesman acknowledged the situation in the earthquake-ravaged Caucasus was serious and a small village has practically disappeared from the face of the Earth, he told reporters that relief efforts were being handled routinely by mobilization of the armed forces and physicians. He noted it was a natural disaster and gave no indication any presidential action was necessary or even under consideration.

Gorbachev at the time was attending a star-studded reception at the United Nations at the end of a day marked by his announcement of a dramatic, military force reduction. Earlier in the day, he had bid a friendly farewell to Reagan, his four-time summit partner, urged President-elect Bush not to delay the strengthening of U.S.-Soviet ties and toured New York for the first time.

A short time later, as other members of his entourage were going to bed, Gorbachev instructed his foreign minister to round up reporters for the announcement of his imminent return home.

The Caucasus calamity took on an added dimension because it struck a region that for months has been the scene of ethnic strife between Armenians and Azerbaijanis and more recent nationalist demonstrations in Shevardnadze's native Georgia.

The unrest, which has exploded

into fatal rioting in several Azerbaijani cities and sparked massive demonstrations and general strikes in Armenia, has prompted authorities to employ troops and tanks in the streets in some areas. Tens of thousands of refugees have fled their homes in fear.

But despite the military presence, Gorbachev's policy of glasnost, or openness, also has been evident in the region. Authorities have tolerated dissent and criticism they once would have crushed with brutal force.

Thornburgh to allow more Soviet emigres into U.S.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Attorney General Dick Thornburgh said Thursday he will expand his parole authority to allow up to 2,000 Soviet emigres to come to the United States each month; but a Jewish group said U.S. policy is still far too restrictive and unfair to the emigres.

Thornburgh's parole authority applies to Jewish emigres from Moscow as well as all Soviet emigres in Rome, Italy, who cannot be admitted to the United States under current constraints, the Justice Department said in a statement.

Thornburgh said he was taking the step, which he called an interim measure, "in response to a request" from Secretary of State George P. Shultz.

Thornburgh also ordered Immigration and Naturalization Service Commissioner Alan Nelson to temporarily

transfer a Russian-speaking INS officer to the U.S. Embassy in Moscow to handle refugee applications, rather than waiting until early January when the quarterly process normally begins.

Jewish organizations say 173 Soviet Jews have been denied refugee status by U.S. officials in Rome since September. The organizations also say a growing number of other Jews seeking visas from the U.S. Embassy in Moscow have been told to expect delays of a year or more.

The problem stems from the fact that the Reagan administration last summer stopped granting automatic political refugee status to Soviet Jews and other Soviet citizens.

Budget concerns are largely responsible for the change.

The State Department told the Hebrew Immigrant Aid Society that it

will have only about \$27 million available during fiscal 1989, enough to pay for transporting only 12,000 Soviet Jews, said Karl Zukerman, executive vice president of the Hebrew Immigrant Aid Society.

Resources are needed to move 30,000 Soviet Jews into the United States in the next 12 months, Zukerman said.

Since September, Soviet Jews have been leaving at the rate of 2,000 a month, a rate which U.S. officials expect will continue. Roughly 90 percent of them seek to resettle in the United States.

"By denying refugee status to Soviet Jews, it's prematurely sending a signal that the situation of Jews in the Soviet Union has so changed that they're not being persecuted, and that just isn't so," Zukerman said.

Zukerman said those rejected for refugee status are subjected to persecution that is "indistinguishable from those accepted" into the United States.

Zukerman said the government "has got to come up with more money than it is now coming up with" to bring Soviet Jews to this country, adding "they will have to more than double it."

He said the Jewish community is prepared to pick up a bigger share of the cost of bringing Soviet Jews to the United States, "but not essentially to have this kind of a load dumped on it."

Thornburgh also said he has asked "as part of a longer-term solution" that the Justice Department's Office of Legislative Affairs work with the State Department in developing a legislative proposal to resolve the problem.

Ex-astronaut presents flag to Gorbachev

NEW YORK (AP) — The last gift presented to Mikhail S. Gorbachev during his visit to New York was a Soviet flag that went to the moon in 1971 with the Apollo 16 mission.

The flag was handed to Gorbachev by former astronaut James B. Irwin just before the Soviet leader climbed the steps to his plane at Kennedy Airport on Thursday.

Irwin said he and his crewmates in the July 1971 moon flight, David R. Scott and Alfred Worden, had signed the flag, which was one of a number of flags carried by the moon-walkers.

"We carried it for you and for the people of the Soviet Union. And we visited the moon in peace for all mankind," Irwin told Gorbachev.

He also gave Gorbachev a coffee-table book, "The Home Planet," which contains photos from space and text by American and Soviet space travelers.

"I think you'll find it inspirational reading material for your flight back home," Irwin said.

Gorbachev shook his hand and tapped him on the shoulder.

Irwin said he had tried to give the flag to Gorbachev during a two-week visit last month to the Soviet Union but it could not be arranged.

Leader leaves; city grieves

NEW YORK (AP) — The sudden departure of Mikhail S. Gorbachev, eliminating a full day of Big Apple sightseeing, produced sympathy, sorrow and savings — and some sighs of relief — Thursday from those who missed out on the historic visit.

"The mood is very sad," said Elaine Fink, principal of the Manhattan elementary school that had been scheduled to play host to Raisa Gorbachev in the afternoon. "The children are very down that a terrible tragedy killed thousands of people, and that Mrs. Gorbachev will not get to see a school in the United States."

Her feelings were reflected at each planned stop by the Gorbachevs on their final day in Manhattan. The Soviet leader left New York a day early to rush home because of a massive earthquake that devastated Soviet Armenia.

In addition to the trip to P.S. 6 on the Upper East Side, Gorbachev and his wife had planned a short walk through Central Park.

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Trade officials work to strengthen 40-year free trade charter

MONTREAL (AP) — Trade officials grappled with the issue of farm policies again Thursday, trying to prevent that snag from derailing a move to strengthen and expand a 40-year-old charter on free trade.

Uruguay's Ricardo Zerbin, head of the trade negotiations committee, ordered another day of talks in hopes of breaking a U.S.-European stalemate over agriculture that could unravel agreements in other areas.

After an all-night session, negotiators agreed tentatively Thursday on faster, surer methods for settling trade disputes between nations and a

plan for freeing trade in services, among other things.

But some nations have threatened to withhold approval of the package unless there is an agreement to lower farm subsidies and barriers.

The United States is demanding a commitment by all nations to the eventual elimination of trade-distorting farm subsidies and barriers, while the European Economic Community says it is willing to cut, but not eliminate, such programs.

Developing nations have complained that the Americans and Europeans are holding the negotiations

hostage to their own private dispute.

The one-day extension ordered by Zerbin, head of the GATT Trade Negotiations Committee, was "a sign of optimism" because it indicated that extra time might produce agreement on remaining issues, GATT spokesman David Woods said.

I wouldn't be particularly optimistic (on agriculture), but where there's talk, there's hope, John McGregor, the British agriculture minister, said in a briefing.

The officials from 103 nations — including 90 trade ministers — are in Montreal to prod along the four-year

Uruguay Round of free-trade talks under the General Agreement "on Tariffs and Trade."

The GATT is both a charter and a Geneva-based organization formed after World War II to lower tariffs as a way of promoting world trade and economic growth.

These were some of the tentative accords reached on Thursday, subject to the ministers' approval.

Import tariffs on most goods would be cut by at least the 30 percent achieved in the last GATT round, which ended in 1979. The significance of tariff cuts has diminished

somewhat along with the rise in non-tariff barriers.

Trade in services would be liberalized, although developing nations would be allowed to give their service industries some kind of extra protection. Sectors to be covered would be decided by May 1989.

To speed up settlement of disputes, all GATT reports on disputes would have to be completed within 15 months unless the parties agreed to an extension.

The United States would be permitted to take trade retaliation outside the GATT rules even if a GATT proceeding on its complaint was under way.

Justice Brennan hospitalized

WASHINGTON (AP) — Supreme Court Justice William J. Brennan was hospitalized Thursday, suffering from pneumonia.

Brennan, 82, was taken to the Bethesda Naval Medical Center in suburban Maryland in the early afternoon after visiting a doctor at the U.S. Capitol, court spokeswoman Toni House said.

Justice Brennan was admitted with pneumonia, she said. "He is being treated with antibiotics, and doctors expect him to respond very well."

A statement read by House in response to a reporter's inquiry added, "His illness is not expected to affect his work except for the Monday, Dec. 12, session."

The court is scheduled to begin a four-week recess after issuing orders and possibly announcing decisions Monday.

House declined to answer other questions concerning the justice's health or his hospitalization.

AIDS mice accidentally killed in lab

WASHINGTON (AP) — The National Institutes of Health researcher who lost all but three of 130 mice that had been genetically altered to carry AIDS said Thursday he hopes their apparently accidental death will lead to less drastic guidelines for isolating such animals.

"Maybe that's the silver lining," said Dr. Malcolm Martin, a top virologist at the national Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases.

Citing the growing importance of animals in AIDS research, Martin said the accident underscores the difficulty researchers have with acquiring the large numbers of animals they need while at the same time operating under strict guidelines to keep the animals from escaping.

Martin, who headed the team that developed the unique strain of mice at the laboratory in nearby Bethesda, Md., said he got a telephone call at 5 a.m. Monday telling him most of the mice were dead.

By Wednesday, Martin and his assistant concluded that it was a readily simple accident — power was turned off in the building for several hours over the weekend for maintenance work.

As a result, the 30-foot-long glass and steel tube where the mice were housed under tight security lost ventilation and overheated.

Bush focuses on black supporters

WASHINGTON (AP) — President-elect Bush focused on his black supporters Thursday as one loyalist expressed disappointment that no black has been given a Cabinet job and complained there's not much left.

Bush, who took time off Wednesday from forming his new administration to meet with Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev in New York, was to meet late

Thursday with about 160 blacks who supported him in the campaign.

Spokeswoman Sheila Tate said Bush would be "soliciting the advice from black leaders on people to serve in all levels of government." On Friday, the vice president will meet with Benjamin Hooks, head of the NAACP.

Bush has pledged to include women and members of minority groups in top positions in his administration. However, one black businessman, Les Range of Jackson, Miss., said in advance of the meeting he was disappointed no blacks had been tapped so far.

"I want to make sure there are blacks in the Cabinet, Range said. "But the way things are shaping up, there's not much left."

Armenians in U.S. worry about quake

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The nation's largest Armenian community struggled today to learn the fate of relatives and friends caught up in the devastating earthquake in Soviet Armenia, but telephoning the area was impossible, spokesmen said.

"We can't reach Armenia," said Suren Bursalyan, editor of the Armenian biweekly Paros. "All of the phone lines are shut. Our only information is American television. It's really hard. We would like to know the extent of damage."

Wednesday's earthquake, measuring 6.9 on the Richter scale, according to the U.S. Geological Survey, virtually destroyed several cities and killed thousands of people, Soviet officials said.

Archbishop Dave Sarkissian of the Armenian Apostolic Church said the 250,000-member immigrant community in Southern California was "in a state of shock."

"They are in a state of grief and great pain. But a great relief operation is being organized by the community to help rebuild the cities," he said.

Sarkissian said he had been unable to uncover any information that he could pass on to his parishioners.

Former bank director charged

NEWARK, N.J. (AP) — A former director of the New York Federal Reserve Bank was charged Thursday with leaking confidential interest rate information to a securities brokerage.

Prosecutors said it was the first insider trading case involving government securities.

Robert A. Rough, 49, of Layton, received \$47,000 in interest-deferred loans from the now-defunct Bevil, Bresler & Schulman investment firm in exchange for the information, the indictment charged.

Rough allegedly relayed the information by telephone from his executive suite at the National Bank of Sussex County and once from the New York Fed's boardroom just after a meeting, prosecutors said at a news conference.

Bevil Bresler made millions in government securities trades based on Rough's advance word.

Reagans to undergo yearly exams

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan and his wife Nancy will undergo annual physical examinations and routine post-cancer-surgery tests at Bethesda Naval Medical Center on Friday, the White House announced Thursday.

Col. John Hutton, the presidential physician, said in a statement that neither has shown any recurrence of cancer.

Reagan, who turns 78 in February, had a two-inch cancerous polyp removed from his colon in July 1985. The 67-year-old first lady had her left breast removed in October 1987 after a cancerous tumor was detected.

Hutton said the couple's exams are scheduled to begin around 11:15 a.m. MST and conclude around 3 p.m. MST. They are slated to travel from the Maryland hospital to their weekend retreat at Camp David, Md., afterward.

Hutton's statement also included a plug for the importance of such routine examinations.

"The first lady continues to emphasize the importance of mammography (breast X-ray) for early detection of cancer of the breast. The mammogram remains the most essential diagnostic test for early detection of a malignancy. Both the president and the first lady have remained completely asymptomatic, with no clinical suggestion of recurrence," Hutton said.

The president faces a wider battery of exams than his wife.

Hutton's statement said Reagan will have a colonoscopy, a chest X-ray, a CAT scan, a cardiac stress test and a pulmonary function evaluation.

The first lady will have her second mammogram since undergoing the surgery.

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Group decries Reagan record on freedoms

WASHINGTON (AP) — A liberal organization that concerns itself with the First Amendment said Thursday that the Reagan administration turned a cold shoulder to the fundamental liberties guaranteed by our founders.

It said President-elect Bush is showing more sensitivity toward constitutional guarantees of freedom of speech and freedom of the press, and separation of church and state.

People for the American Way, which describes itself as the non-partisan constitutional liberties organization, issued a report that it says shows 241 cases in which the administration trampled on freedom of speech and freedom of the press, separation of church and state and other rights guaranteed by the Constitution.

The group cited a \$4.6-million federal grant to Pat Robertson's Christian Broadcasting Network, a White House aide's saying "I am quite directly around Ronald Reagan (gets snafu or gets out)" a 40 percent increase in classified information; the news blackout on the U.S. invasion of Grenada; and the attempt to induce reporters for two newspapers not to report various intelligence activities.

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A U.S. Air Force A-10 Thunderbolt II war plane slammed into this West German city street

6 die after U.S. Air Force war plane hits West German city apartments

REIMSCHNEID, West Germany (AP) — A U.S. Air Force warplane struck an apartment building and exploded in flames Thursday, killing six people, injuring dozens others and destroying homes for more than a block. "This looks like a war," said Johannes Rau, governor of North Rhine-Westphalia state, after touring the scene in central West Germany. The A-10 Thunderbolt II jet, designed to support ground forces and fight tanks, was carrying 1,000 rounds of 30mm training ammunition when it crashed, said U.S. Air Force spokesman Lt. Col. Ed Neunherz.

Witnesses said the plane flew low over a school and hit the top floor of an apartment building about 1:30 p.m. At least six multifamily homes then caught fire and burned. Opposition political parties called for a ban on low-level flights and sharp cuts in air exercises. Peter Wuerzbach, the second-ranked official in the Defense Ministry, said West German authorities were calling on their allies to halt low-level training missions until Christmas. West German Defense Minister Rupert Scholz cut short a visit to Washington because of the accident. A West German military

spokesman, Gen. Botho Engelin, said six bodies had been pulled from the smoldering wreckage. He said the dead included the pilot, but the U.S. Air Force said it could not immediately confirm the report. Rescuers said they feared the death toll could rise, although they emphasized they were uncertain how many people were killed. Between 40 to 50 people were injured, many of them seriously, said city spokesman Reinhard Fleischmann. "We haven't even reached the aircraft. It's still wedged into a burning house," he said.

Crash that killed 256 blamed on ice

HULL, Quebec — The "most probable" cause of the 1985 pre-Christmas crash that killed 256 Americans in Gander, Newfoundland, was the build-up of ice on the airplane's wing, a deeply divided Canadian Aviation Safety Board said in a report issued Thursday.

But in a strongly worded dissent, four of the board's nine members said ice could not be blamed and said the Air Arrow DC-8 suffered an on-board fire — possibly caused by a terrorist-planted bomb — before the plane lost power and crashed 100 seconds after takeoff.

The reports, issued four days before the third anniversary of the crash, resolved few of the perplexing questions that arose after the plane

carrying 245 U.S. Army personnel and a crew of eight suddenly plunged to the ground at 6:45 a.m. on Dec. 12, 1985. They were returning to Port Campbell, Ky., after a Middle East peacekeeping mission.

The rancorous split on the four-year old board developed, in part, because neither side could speak with any certainty as to the exact cause of the crash. Some board members complained they could not see certain evidence and that some eyewitnesses were not called to testify.

Consequently, the three-year investigation ended with a call from the board's minority to reopen the matter.

"This accident took place because there was an on-board fire," said dissenting board member Ross Stevenson, relying on eyewitness accounts

and evidence that suggested an explosion before the crash. "We think also there may have been detonations on the airplane."

"Through a public inquiry it's my opinion that we'll get to the bottom of this accident. At the current moment, I don't feel that we have," Stevenson said. But Kenneth Thorncroft, the chairman of the board who sided with the majority, said the weight of the evidence dismisses fires or bombs, despite a claim by the pro-Iranian terrorist group Islamic Jihad that it planted a bomb on the craft. The prime culprit, he said, appeared to be ice.

"We cannot state with absolute conviction that ice was the only cause, but it certainly is the most probable cause," Thorncroft said.

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Skier killed in avalanche

ZURICH, Switzerland (AP) — An avalanche reared down Mount Titlis in the Swiss Alps on Thursday, killing a skier at about the 7,500-foot level, rescuers said. Search teams using dogs needed 50 minutes to locate the woman, who was found alive but critically injured. She died shortly after a helicopter brought her to Lucerne main hospital, the Swiss Air Rescue Service said.

A two-hour search turned up no other victims. Avalanches killed 25 people in Switzerland last year, slightly below the average of the last 50 years.

Korean car production hits 1 million annually

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — South Korea's production of motor vehicles since the start of this year reached 1,000,660 as of Thursday, hitting 1 million annually for the first time, automakers reported. The tally is expected to reach 1.09 million vehicles by the year's end, compared with the previous annual record of 979,739 vehicles in 1987, they said.

A series of labor protests this year reduced car production by 200,000, but Korean automakers increased output in the latter half.

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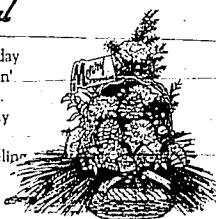
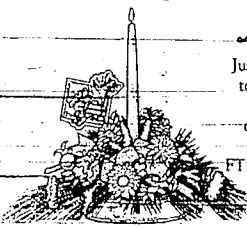
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NATO urges Kremlin to trim its forces on foreign stations

BRUSSELS, Belgium (AP) — NATO urged Moscow Thursday to go beyond the "positive contribution" of a unilateral cutback of 50,000 troops in Eastern Europe by negotiating a lower ceiling of Soviet forces on foreign soil.

Taking a cue from U.S. Secretary of State George P. Shultz, who briefed the 15 NATO foreign ministers on Mikhail S. Gorbachev's initiative, the allies declined to match the Soviet secretary's move with a voluntary reduction of their own.

Instead, NATO said it will propose to the nine-nation Warsaw Pact limits on the forces each country in each alliance can deploy. Talks on cutting the forces are expected early next year.

"No country should be able to dominate the continent by force of arms," the NATO statement said.

It suggested that no country should have more than a fixed figure — "such as 30 percent" — of all forces in Europe and called for a limit of about 12,000 tanks in any one country. The Soviets have 20,000 tanks in East Germany alone, NATO officials say.

Gorbachev, speaking Wednesday at the United Nations in New York, offered to cut forces over two years in East Germany, Czechoslovakia and Hungary.

The allies, instead of reciprocating, focused on the 24 manpower edge and 34 tank advantage they say the Soviets hold over NATO.

"The Soviet Union itself possesses more tanks and artillery than all the other members of the Warsaw Pact and the (NATO) alliance combined," the statement said.

"We hope that the new thinking in

the Soviet Union will open the way for mutual agreement on realistic, militarily significant and verifiable arrangements which enhance security at lower levels," it said.

British Foreign Secretary Sir Geoffrey Howe said, "We are proposing a dramatic change in the military situation in Europe, directed to very substantial reductions by about 50 percent to a balanced outcome."

He said NATO's aim was "to concentrate on the key offensive systems which are tanks, artillery and armored troop carriers."

The United States, which has about 35,000 troops in Western Europe, also would be affected by the proposed limits.

The NATO declaration was revised at the last moment to refer to the reductions Gorbachev announced Wednesday.

Guerrillas cool to offer

ISLAMABAD, Pakistan (AP) — Afghan guerrillas and their Pakistani backers reacted coolly Thursday to Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev's proposals for a cease-fire and arms cut in Afghanistan.

"A cease-fire in the presence of invading forces is meaningless in Afghanistan," said Abdul Rahim, spokesman of the powerful Jamiat-Islami guerrilla group.

Pakistan's official news agency quoted the country's U.S. ambassador, S. Shah Nawaz, as saying Gorbachev's speech Wednesday to the United Nations was "statesman-like" but that his Afghan proposals were unrealistic.

The agency also reported that an Afghan pilot landed his MIG-21 jet in Pakistan on Thursday and surrendered. A government official speaking on condition of anonymity said the plane landed at Miram Shah in North West Frontier

Province, 10 miles from the Afghan border.

There was no immediate response from Foreign Minister Sahabzad Yaqub Khan on Gorbachev's proposals. However, a ministry official who spoke on condition of anonymity said an end-of-hostilities was "not practical" because Afghan guerrillas were determined to fight to victory.

Gorbachev proposed a Jan. 1 cease-fire between Soviet-backed Afghan forces and the U.S.- and Pakistan-supported guerrillas, with both sides holding their ground.

He called for a mutual arms freeze on the same date and for an international conference to restore peace in the war-torn country.

Moscow agreed in a U.N.-mediated accord last spring to withdraw its troops from Afghanistan by Feb. 15, 1989. Half of the troops pulled out under the schedule.

Strike marks anniversary

GAZA CITY, Occupied Gaza Strip (AP) — Israeli soldiers killed a teenager by shooting him in the heart, and the 1.5 million Palestinians held a general strike in the occupied lands Thursday, the first anniversary of their uprising.

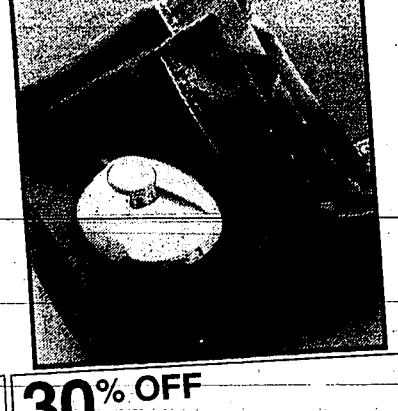
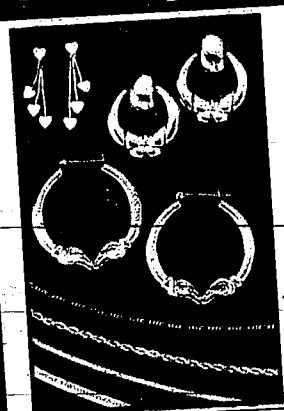
The death of Yussef Mohammed Shalh, 17, raised the number of Palestinians killed to at least 320 since the rebellion began Dec. 8, 1987, in the West Bank and Gaza Strip. More than 7,000 Palestinians have been wounded and 11 Israelis also have been slain.

An army spokesman said Shalh was shot in the heart when troops were stoned during a sweep in the West Bank village of Kafr Rai.

Soldiers also wounded a 22-year-old woman in the leg after meeting "violent resistance" from stone-throwing youths in Kafr Rai, said the spokesman, whose name cannot be revealed under army rules.

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Mayor's fiercest opponent: His brother

UNION POINT, Ga. (AP) — Fourteen votes were enough to re-elect the mayor over his fiercest opposition — his brother, in an 8-year City Council rewar.

Incumbent Ben Stewart won his fifth term as mayor in an election Wednesday in which 322 persons, or 41 percent of the east-central Georgia city's 778 voters, went to the polls.

Stewart defeated his brother, Bob Stewart, 168-154.

Both Stewarts said they were glad the race between them had come to an end.

"I'm relieved it's over. I'm sorry the situation developed in the first place," said the 39-year-old mayor.

"That's the way it goes. It was a close race," said Bob Stewart, 33, adding, "I didn't want it to happen. I'm glad things are over."

The Stewarts were the only candidates in the non-partisan race.

During the past few years, published reports said the rivalry between the Stewarts started out as a feud over the multimillion-dollar will of their father, the late John Ben Stewart, who served as mayor from 1967 to 1979. The father was killed in an automobile accident on Dec. 27, 1987.

Several months ago, Bob Stewart

said he filed a lawsuit against his brother concerning a partnership in a business venture.

"It has nothing to do with the will. Nobody's contesting the will that I know of," he said.

Bob Stewart said his brother, who lost a bid for a state House seat, told him he did not intend to seek re-election. Both were surprised to see each other when they showed up on the first day of qualifying for the \$100-a-month job.

"I wanted to be the one to replace

him," Bob said. "I didn't run a race against my brother. He ran against me. I announced first."

In 1980, Bob Stewart, at age 25, was the youngest Union Point council member ever to be elected.

Since he could not run for the mayor's office and a council post, Bob Stewart said his loss will mean devoting his energies into his insurance agency.

Ben Stewart, who is in the finance business, said his brother never asked him if he planned to run.

Boys fight for right to be cheerleaders

BURLINGTON, Conn. (AP) — Two boys have won spots on the cheerleading squad at a middle school, resolving a sex discrimination dispute that arose after school officials said tryouts were for girls only.

Three boys tried out last week for the Har-Bur Middle School team that will cheer at basketball games, but administrators told them the school had not planned for a coeducational squad.

Brett Jeans and his friend Sean Cole then called television stations and newspapers, which contacted school officials. By Monday, administrators relented

after consulting School Superintendent James Schmidt.

Of six boys at Wednesday's tryouts, two were chosen, said Schmidt, who would not identify them. One was among the first group of boys who tried out.

Jeans, 13, said he had a good reason for trying to break the gender barrier.

"I'm not that good at basketball," said Jeans, who spent the fall as player-manager of the soccer team. "I wanted to do something, so I decided to try out for the cheerleading squad."

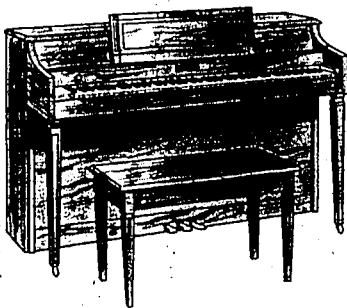
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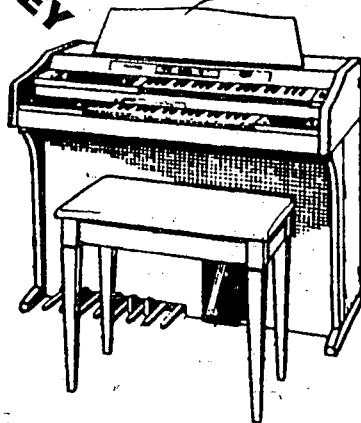
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Gynecologist faces charges over surgery

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — A gynecologist accused of performing experimental surgery on women for two decades without their knowledge was charged Thursday by the State Medical Board with gross immorality and other ethics violations.

Dr. James C. Burt has been accused of performing surgery allegedly to enhance women's sexual responsiveness. He was cited with violating several provisions of the Medical Practices Act in 78 instances involving 33 patients dating to March 1966, said Lauren Lubow, a spokeswoman for the 12-member board.

Ernl Moore, Burt's attorney, declined to comment on the charges, saying he had not received the board's citation. A woman who answered the telephone at Burt's office in Dayton, said Burt referred all questions to Moore.

Ms. Lubow said Burt, who was banned by the board from surgical practice in November, has 30 days to seek a public hearing. Failing to do so would permit the board to consider the allegations as having been proven," she said.

Burt faces possible penalties ranging from reprimand to revocation of his license.

The board said Burt conducted experimental surgeries that included circumcision, rotation of the vagina away from the bladder and internal genitalia, and extension of the vagina to align it with the clitoris, an external tissue that responds to sexual stimulation.

The surgeries in many cases resulted in complications, complaints of sexual dysfunction, infection, a necessity for corrective surgery, and chronic pain, the board said.

Burt, 67, attracted attention in October after a CBS-TV report detailed his surgical techniques.

That report and the medical board's citation also referred to Burt's 1976 book, "Surgery of Love," in which he admitted performing reconstructive surgery without his patients' knowledge.

In the book, he wrote, "one doesn't have to go into the complexity of sexuality with the patient and her partner; one merely does the operation of coital area reconstruction. ...

... many hundreds of these patients the patient had not been informed that the surgery more had been done to her than delivery and episiotomy and repair."

His written comments were cited as the basis for charges of gross immorality and grossly unprofessional conduct. He also was charged with failure to conform to minimal standards of care of similar practitioners; failure to employ acceptable scientific methods in selecting drugs for treatment of disease; and failure to use reasonable care discrimination in the administration of drugs.

He also was charged with selling, prescribing, giving away or administering drugs for other than legal and legitimate therapeutic purposes; and soliciting patients or publishing a false, fraudulent, deceptive or misleading statement.

Ms. Lubow said the board, which has been criticized for failing to take action against Burt earlier, acted quickly once it was notified of the allegations.

"I don't think back in 1975 that anybody was charging that the surgery that he was performing was in violation of the law, and that's really the question," she said.

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Dairy owner tries new slant to keep operation

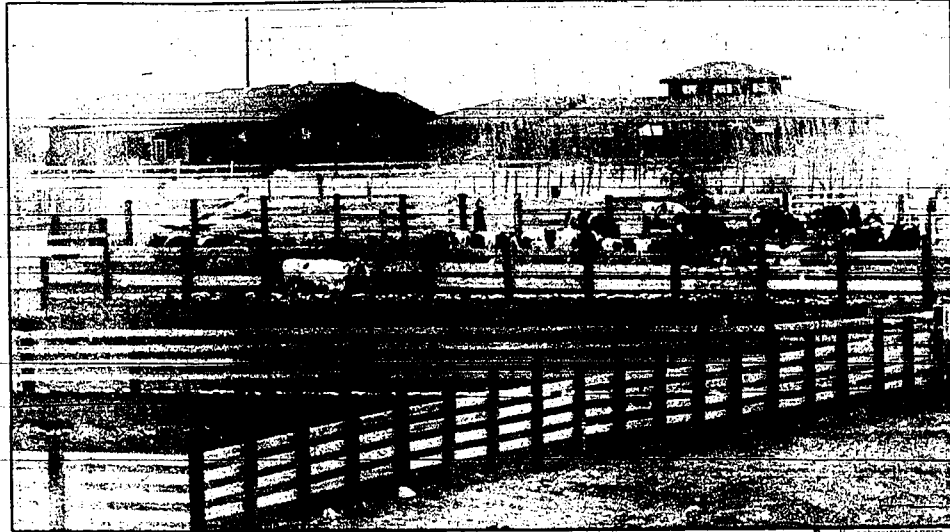

TWIN FALLS — A dairy owner is trying a new tack in his three-thwarted attempt to gain approval for the farm in an area zoned for urban growth.

Keith Jones is seeking to have a zoning ordinance changed to shift jurisdiction of property 16 acres or larger to Twin Falls County, whose rules are more lenient than the city's. The current ordinance says property of 20 acres or more automatically comes within county jurisdiction.

The proposal will be presented at a public hearing at the city's Planning and Zoning Commission in city chambers at 7 p.m. Tuesday. Jones owns 17 acres just north of the Low Line Canal on Blue Lakes Boulevard and has been leasing the property to Mike Vierstra, who has operated a 180-cow

dairy on the property since May. A city ordinance allows no more than 85 cows on a 17-acre farm. A farm is considered a feed lot or dairy when it has more than five animals per acre. The county has no such restriction.

LaMar Orton, community development director, said the land was used as a dairy with "grandfather" rights before Jones bought it, but the rights were lost because the land was not used as a dairy for over a year. The city has filed suit against the dairy alleging zoning and building code violations and asking the court to order Jones to stop operating a dairy. The suit asks the court to prevent Jones and Vierstra from adding improvements to the farm or bring more cows on the farm while the action is pending.

City Attorney Fritz Wonderlich said Jones' recent application will not affect the lawsuit. Jones said the proposal is reasonable because before 1979, properties over five acres fell into county jurisdiction.

Orton said the zoning commission will make a recommendation to the City Council. The council's decision, however, is not final. "The city can't do it unilaterally," Wonderlich said. "If the county doesn't agree, it isn't going to happen."

The county has already forwarded its disapproval of the amendment in a letter to the city, which states that it would be economically unfeasible to reduce the acreage limit.

"Some very dedicated people spent a significant amount of time holding public hearings, researching Idaho code, serving on special committees, and surveying surrounding counties to devise the Twin Falls County Comprehensive Plan," said the letter signed by all three commissioners and Lee Taylor, county planning and zoning administrator.

Jones' original attempt to have the zoning ordinance changed to allow dairies and feed lots by special-use permit was turned down by the Planning and Zoning Commission in September, the City Council in October and the Board of Appeals of the city's impact area in November. All of the decisions followed heated public hearings.

Orton said Jones can apply for zoning amendments as long as he wants to, as long as he does not request the same thing twice within a year.

Symms praises DOE

TWIN FALLS — Waste management "is key to nuclear weapons production, U.S. Sen. Steve Symms said Thursday. The Idaho Republican, in an interview at the Times-News, praised the U.S. Department of Energy's forthrightness in its Environmental Survey Preliminary Summary Report issued Tuesday.

"The only way to solve it is to lay all the facts on the table," Symms said, referring to the nuclear waste problems at Energy Department nuclear weapons plants across the country.

Energy Secretary John Herington, in a press release Wednesday, said of the report: "This is an important step in categorizing environmental problems in our defense complex. It will provide the department with the information necessary to allocate funds for environmental cleanup in a systematic and responsible manner."

Symms said he has faith that technology will provide solutions to waste problems. "We do have the technology to handle the waste problem. It is a political problem," he said. Symms also praised President-elect George Bush and his chief of staff-to-be, New Hampshire Gov. John Sununu, saying they are concerned with waste management in nuclear weapons production.

Hagerman decision raises taxes by nearly one-third

HAGERMAN — Clyde Clifford's city taxes went up 33 percent this year and he wonders why. Clifford and Lloyd Chick asked the Hagerman City Council Tuesday to explain the increase. "We were under the impression that we were stuck with a 5 percent increase," Clifford said.

Hagerman decided this year to pay for its liability insurance directly through current taxes, Council President Gloria Jazwick said. The payments — \$6,000 — were added to the 5 percent tax increase the council voted for this fiscal year.

Jazwick said the city decided to put the insurance on the tax rolls because current budgets don't have the necessary funds. Otherwise, she said, the amount would have to be financed and it would cost more. Existing funds not spent on insurance will be spent instead on street repair, City Clerk Karma Muhlitz said.

Muhlitz said the city just found out this year that the insurance can be put on the tax roll. Clifford asked why the entire amount was added on in one year. He later said the council should have phased in the increase or at least

given up the 5 percent increase this year. "I don't think they realized what they were doing," he said.

Clifford said his city property taxes went from \$109 to \$145. "It's really not that much of an increase, but it was more than it was supposed to be," he said.

Jazwick said the city has "scrapped and scratched" to get adequate funds. "I do that every day to make a living," Clifford said.

The city publishes the budget and has public hearings on it every year in September. Jazwick said, adding that public comment at that time is welcome.

Clifford said he didn't worry about the budget last September because he thought 5 percent was the maximum increase allowed.

The 5 percent increase was needed, she said, to keep up with social security payments.

City Superintendent Richard Scruggs reported that 17 intersections in Hagerman are without street lights and that 10 of those do not have poles. The city is planning to install more lights but no definite plans have been made.

The council paid \$2,700 for the city's annual audit report by Oakley and Jones of Gooding.

Disposal of buried waste at INEL depends on its type, condition

TWIN FALLS — What lies buried in yonder field? Swept under the carpet of the desert floor lies 18 years' accumulation of the garbage of nuclear weapons production.

According to a report released Tuesday by the U.S. Department of Energy, "the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory near Idaho Falls was one of the most contaminated sites in the weapon industry," said a New York Times article on the report. INEL officials, however, maintain "the INEL overall is one of the cleanest sites," said Thomas Gesell, manager of the radiological and environmental sciences laboratory at INEL. "We've said that before and we still say it."

Referring to the report, the Times article continued, "The Idaho weapon plant, which processes spent nuclear fuel from naval reactors and has built and operated 62 nuclear reac-

tor since it opened in 1949, had contaminated the vast Snake River Aquifer" below the 890-square-mile plant.

"We have already released information on the INEL portion of the report, so there were no surprises," Gesell said in a press release Wednesday.

From 1952 to 1970, the Energy Department dumped 2.2 million cubic feet of radioactive and hazardous chemical waste into shallow pits dug in the desert. The pits were then covered with dirt, sagebrush, wheatgrass and the antelope have since returned. The department has records of what was dumped into the pits, but it is not sure what condition the waste is in or just how best to clean it up. The department plans to dig up part of it in hopes of answering those questions.

Water district expansion requests could affect water rights

TWIN FALLS — About 2,800 recorded water rights in eastern Idaho could be affected by a water district expansion requested by three canal companies.

"We're not after current water rights," said John Rosholt, attorney for the canal companies, at a Wednesday meeting with the Idaho Department of Water Resources. Rather, the companies only want to protect their water rights, which they feel may be threatened by groundwater pumping in eastern Idaho, he said.

The Water Resources Department called the meeting alert people who may be affected by petitions filed by the Twin Falls Canal Co., the North Side Canal Co. and the American Falls Reservoir District. The petitions seek one of two things: • To enlarge Water District 1 — an associa-

tion of water users that includes the three companies and others — to include groundwater users.

• Or to place a moratorium on any new permits or increases in existing permits to pump groundwater.

The petitions are alternative, Rosholt said. If one is granted the other will be dropped, he said.

"It is important that the issues raised by these petitions are well-known to all those potentially affected," said Norman Young, administrator of the Water Resources Department.

It is the job of the department to protect senior water rights, but it is also its job to develop the resource in the best public interest, Young said.

The most important questions to be answered in the hearing is the extent of the effect groundwater pumping has on the flow in the Snake River.

The flows that supply part of the canal companies' water right are springs that dump about 2,700 cubic feet per second into the Snake River. That flow has been steady for the past 80 years, Rosholt said.

During the past two years the flow was reduced to about 1,400 cfs. The reduction was cause for concern for the canal companies. But whether this was a result of groundwater pumping or a natural occurrence is not known for sure, Young said. The department will try to determine what affects the flow in the river and how much.

Another fact to be determined is the exact number of water right holders and the amount of those rights. These facts, however, will come from the Snake River Plain Adjudication as claims in the entire area are regis-

tered, Young said. During short water years or during the dry part of the year, natural stream flow usually is not enough to supply junior water right holders. Instead of their water being shut off, however, they rely on stored water to irrigate crops through the season. That is not true for groundwater users.

The canal companies want to include groundwater use in Water District 1 to provide some control over pumping of groundwater. The companies say that continued unregulated pumping and new permits for wells threaten their Miller Dam water right, which dates from 1900.

Enlargement of the water district to include the groundwater in District 1 would subject diversion from wells to some regulation, which has not occurred in the past," said Keith Higginson, director of the Water Resources Department. This could mean curtailing pumping from wells in time of wa-

ter shortage, and may require annual assessments on water delivery payable to the water district.

Some other states manage groundwater and surface water together.

Because of the large number of potentially affected water users, Young encouraged people to consolidate their testimony rather than all coming as individuals.

To become a party to the formal hearing on the petition, a request to intervene must be filed with the director of the Water Resources Department at least 10 days before the scheduled hearing. A pre-hearing conference is scheduled at 9 a.m. Jan. 31 in the student union building at Idaho State University in Pocatello. This conference will determine and attempt to simplify the issues, set an agenda and procedure for the hearing and set the time, date and place of the formal hearing.

Judge appoints lawyer to settle air crash lawsuits

DENVER (AP) — In an unusual ruling, a federal judge on Thursday appointed a settlement mediator to try to resolve lawsuits resulting from the crash of Continental Airlines Flight 1713 in an effort to prevent lengthy trials.

Chief U.S. District Judge Sherman G. Finesilver surprised lawyers when he appointed Garrett M. Moore, a Waterbury, Conn., attorney, to negotiate with lawyers in an effort to settle

19 lawsuits pending as a result of the Nov. 15, 1987, crash that killed 26 people and injured 54. An additional 19 cases already have been resolved.

Finesilver gave Moore unrestricted power to meet with attorneys from 100 sides and ordered him to keep the negotiations confidential.

Finesilver said if the negotiations fail, the cases still may go to trial. In his ruling, Finesilver acknowledged that the procedure was unusual.

The settlement process ... has not been extensively used in air crash litigation. However, this method has been used by the court in large scale multi-party construction defect cases, copyright, patent and trade secrets, mining and natural resources and swine flu related litigation," the judge wrote.

Finesilver said a number of concerns affected his decision.

"The court is concerned with the emotions, peace of mind and well-being on the part of litigants. These humans and humans concerns warrant serious settlement discussions," he said.

place a child in one of the licensed foster homes immediately. The child could stay there up to 30 days.

A second part, emergency day care, would give parents who feel they are "totally out of control" a place to take their children, Verastrete said. She said this would give potentially abusive parents a break from their children.

The crisis care providers would be reimbursed whenever their services were utilized.

The grant also would pay for therapeutic treatment such as counseling for the children and offer parents some training as well.

"Abused and neglected children have special care needs that may not be available from regular foster parents and day-care centers. This grant will allow us to get help for a number of children who are really hurting," said Willard Abbott, regional director of the Department of Health and Welfare.

DWR sets minimum stream flows

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — The Department of Water Resources has established three minimum stream flows in the upper Snake River and Teton River drainages to preserve quality fish habitat.

They were requested in applications by the Idaho Water Resource Board and are subject to all prior water rights, officials said.

A year-round minimum stream flow of 141 cubic feet per second was established on Warm River, beginning at Warm River Springs and extending downstream approximately

nine miles to the confluence with the Henry Fork.

The Teton River decision established a minimum streamflow from the State Highway 33 bridge downstream to the confluence of Teton River and Birch Creek. The proposed decision called for a minimum streamflow of 106 cubic feet per second except where the Fall River Electric Cooperative diverts water from the river at the Felt dam site. There 20 to 50 cubic feet per second must remain in the river for fish passage.

TWIN FALLS — A Kimberly man was arrested Thursday on four charges stemming from separate traffic accidents about 35 minutes and 40 miles apart.

Delwyn Ravig, 59, was booked on charges of driving under the influence, driving with an expired driver's license, driving without insurance and not using a seat belt, Idaho State Police said. Other charges could be filed later by Twin Falls authorities, who investigated one of the accidents.

Around 3:11 p.m., Twin Falls police reported a hit-and-run accident at the intersection of Eastland Drive and Kimberly Road.

The license plate of the vehicle leaving the scene was recorded and given to authorities.

At 3:44 p.m., a second accident was reported on a U.S. Interstate 84 overpass about a mile east of the Heyburn interchange. One of the vehicles involved, a 1972 Volkswagen van, had the same license plate number as the vehicle that left the Twin Falls accident, state police said.

The van's driver, Ravig, was taken after the accident to the Minidoka Memorial Hospital, where he was arrested by state police. He was then taken to the Minidoka County Jail.

More than half the dumped waste was packed in cardboard boxes, Bohrer said. About 20 percent, or 200,000 gallons of chemical sludge, was in metal barrels, and the rest was in metal boxes and cement bales. "But the majority was in cardboard boxes, he said.

"We have absolutely no guarantee of any container integrity," Bohrer said.

Of most concern is 25,000 gallons of carbon tetrachloride, a volatile organic solvent. Volatile means the chemical readily changes to a vapor. The solvent is absorbed in a cut-liner-like material and stored in steel barrels, said Dr. Rasmussen, manager of the buried waste program at INEL.

"We believe those barrels are rusted away and gone," he said.

Carbon tetrachloride moves easily through the soil by "vapor transport," Rasmussen said. A pan of any volatile liquid can easily be smelled across the room, he explained. The same chemical, absorbed in cut-liner, still can be smelled, he said.

The carbon tetrachloride in the soil at INEL evaporates and moves in all directions away from an area of concentration of the chemical, according to the laws of physics.

It has now moved 500 feet down through the soil and fractured basalt below the waste site and has formed a layer of vapor just above the aquifer. The vapor is absorbed by the soil. It has been found at concentrations as high as 3 parts per billion in the aquifer.

One part per billion is comparable to adding one person to the population of China.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency standard for carbon tetrachloride in drinking water is five parts per billion.

Rasmussen said he didn't know whether radionuclides — radioactive atoms — move with the carbon tetrachloride. Radionuclides are thought to move with water, but their interaction with other substances is being studied, he said.

One such substance, for instance, is some heavy machine oil, the consistency of peanut butter. Engineers don't think it migrates through the soil, but they don't know how it interacts with radionuclides, Rasmussen said.

"Understanding what makes the radionuclides move is key to the management and final cleanup" of the buried waste, he said.

The Energy Department is in-

involved in a pilot-scale retrieval. Its intent is to try to confirm records, to determine the condition of the containers and to evaluate treatment methods, Bohrer said.

"We only want to do it once. We want to do it the best way. We want to do it the safest way," he said.

What the Energy Department does with the waste after the cleanup remains to be seen. The ultimate disposal depends on the kinds of waste found. There will not be room for it at the Waste Isolation Pilot Plant the Energy Department hopes to open in New Mexico next year, because transuranic waste already awaiting shipment will fill the site.

"That's an issue that has to be solved in the long term," Bohrer said. Plans call for "putting it in the best possible form for ultimate disposal," he said.

weapons production.

Switching from an injection well to percolation ponds to dispose of radioactive tritium at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory is an example of the Energy Department's concern for the health of Idaho citizens and the environment, Symms said.

Although the unfilled ponds do not prevent the tritium from reaching the aquifer, they slow the process.

Symms linked the importance of producing tritium and refining plutonium at INEL to the policies that resulted in Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev's announcement of a reduction in Soviet conventional armed forces.

"We're going to win the Cold War, Symms said.

The projects that made that possible must continue, Symms said.

"If you don't have waste management, those projects can't move forward," Symms said. He linked his support for the Special Isotope Separator and the New Production Reactor, which the Energy department would like to build at INEL, to the decisions of others that they are necessary.

In another development related to waste problems, another Idaho politician said Thursday he wants the state to take a closer look at INEL operations.

State Sen. Larry Anderson, R-Eden, said he wants to determine what authority the state has to monitor the Energy Department operation.

He wants state agencies to investigate what the law says about injection well monitoring, radioactive waste storage, access to the site by state health officials and radiation exposure to workers on the site.

"The state needs to know where it stands, he said, to position ourselves to write additional laws if we need to to protect the health and environment of the state."

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Metal detection expert disputes clan member's claim

COALVILLE, Utah (AP) — A metal detection expert testified Thursday that there was no physical evidence supporting a clan member's claim that he was aiming at attack dogs when a law officer was shot and killed during a siege-ending January fire-fight.

The testimony from Richard Graham, a retired FBI agent considered a specialist in metal detection systems, came in the fifth day of trial for clan patriarch Addam Swapp, his brother Jonathan Swapp and brother-in-law John Timothy Singer.

The three are charged with second-degree murder in the death of Corrections Lt. Fred House, killed during a Jan. 28 shootout that ended a 13-day standoff at the clan's north-

ern Utah farm begun after Addam Swapp bombed a Mormon chapel in nearby Marion on Jan. 16.

The defense has acknowledged that evidence may show the wheelchair-bound Singer fired the fatal bullet from his bedroom window, but contends he was shooting at the dogs and did not intend to harm any officers.

Earlier testimony showed that several bullet holes, at chest- and head-level, were found in a house where an FBI unit and House were posted during the shootout.

On Thursday, Graham said that in February he made several careful sweeps with a metal detector of the ground where the dogs were during the firefight but failed to turn

up any bullets in the snow or soil.

Graham said he first swept the snow at the site, then after a front-end loader had carefully removed the snow, searched the ground. As a precaution, another sweep was made of the snow removed by the loader.

"I found no ballistics evidence," he said.

Following morning testimony, 3rd District Judge Michael Murphy extended the jury to hear arguments from defense and prosecution attorneys on whether a videotape of the shootout and an audiotape of Singer's comments to law officers should be admitted.

Murphy said he would view the videotape at his home on Thursday night and would rule Friday morning on whether it and the audiotape would be admitted.

Earl Spafford, attorney for Jonathan Swapp, contends that the angry reacting from officers who had just learned of House's death reflects the attitude of law enforcement throughout the siege. He contends that actions by officers, including the use of loud noises and bright lights at night to prevent clan members from sleeping, escalated tension during the siege.

Prosecutors deny that is the case.

Earlier, Cathy Baker, a state forensic blood specialist, testified that samples of a blood-encrusted .30-caliber slug and a piece of House's shirt both showed traces of type O blood, the officer's type.

She also said a full magazine of .30-caliber bullets, an empty .30-caliber magazine

and several empty .30-caliber shell casings were found in Singer's bedroom.

Meantime, FBI Agent Donald Roberts testified he, too, was struck by a .30-caliber bullet at a police position about 150 yards behind the home where House was killed. However, Roberts said the slug bounced off his bullet-proof vest.

Baker said House also was wearing body armor, but the bullet entered his body just above an arm opening in the vest.

Former state medical examiner Edwin Sweeney, who conducted an autopsy on House within hours after he was killed, testified that the bullet pierced the officer's right side near the nipple and grazed the aorta before exiting his lower-left back.

Husband, landlady imprisoned woman in chains, police say

SPOKANE, Wash. (AP) — An Air Force sergeant and his landlady were released from custody Thursday and ordered to have no contact with the airman's wife, who authorities say was chained and mistreated inside a dilapidated trailer.

During a preliminary appearance in Spokane County District Court, Helen Allen, 42, and Sgt. Robert Anders, 30, were conditionally released without bond by Judge Richard F. Wrenn.

Mrs. Allen and Anders were booked into Spokane County Jail on Wednesday, accused of four counts each of unlawful imprisonment, a felony.

Wrenn ordered Mrs. Allen and Anders not to have any contact with Beverly Ragan, 22, who married Anders in May. The state Department of Social and Health Services said she has been placed in a foster home for adults.

Anders and Mrs. Allen were arrested nearly a month after Ms. Ragan walked a half-mile to a neighbor's house west of Spokane and

asked for help. She was bruised, emaciated and wrapped in about 20 feet of heavy chain padlocked to her waist and wrists when found Nov. 11, authorities said.

She told neighbors and sheriff's investigators that she had been chained inside a small, unheated trailer on the Allen property, with no toilet, and at times had been forced to rummage through trash bins for food.

Anders is assigned to the Civil Engineering Squadron at Fairchild Air Force Base, said sheriff's Lt. John Goldman.

Mrs. Ragan had been living at the mobile home of Mrs. Allen and her husband, Carl, for more than a year, and Anders moved in with the Allens after marrying Ms. Ragan.

Carl Allen has not been charged in the case.

Mrs. Ragan was allegedly chained or handcuffed for varying periods of time outside or in the trailer.

Sheriff's deputies and state social workers earlier this year had investigated allegations that Ms. Ragan was

being abused. No charges were filed because the woman did not file a complaint, DSHS and sheriff's department officials said.

About a month or two before Anders married Ms. Ragan, Anders allegedly showed her a list of "house rules" that detailed, among other things, when the woman would bathe, what she would wear and when she would have sex with him, authorities allege.

Mrs. Allen served two years on an extortion conviction in Kootenai County, Idaho, and was released in June 1982, court records show. She was accused of trying to extort thousands of dollars from an elderly man in return for photos of him with a teenage girl, said Merle Block, a former Kootenai County sheriff's detective who investigated the case.

In 1973, the Oregon Department of Human Resources took custody of Mrs. Allen's son, John Blair, now 25, after she was accused of abusing him, according to Blair and department spokeswoman Alice Galoway.

Computer shutdown cause unknown

OGDEN, Utah (AP) — For 3.7 seconds, a Weber State College computer that blasted off on a commercial rocket last month worked perfectly. Then a power failure of unknown cause shut it down.

Robert Twigg, director of the school's Center for Aerospace Technology, said even in the brief time it operated, the computer accomplished its tasks of measuring temperature, velocity and barometric pressure.

However, because of the power interruption, the computer failed to

switch on a Morton Thiokol experiment that was to run during the rocket's five-minute space flight.

Dean Lester, a Morton Thiokol associate chemist working on the experiment, said Thursday the company now is negotiating to take its project aboard a future space flight.

He said the experiment involves using a microgravity setting to suspend flake aluminum on a thin film to create a plastic-type material.

"The experiment is pretty basic, but has a lot of ramifications, and we

have every expectation that we can have a successful test next time it goes up," Lester said.

The student-assembled computer was carried into space aboard a rocket launched by E-Prime Aerospace Corp. of Titusville, Fla., on Nov. 17. The launch was the first commercial venture using Air Force facilities.

Following the five-minute flight to an altitude of 14,000 feet, the rocket's nose cone, which carried the WSC computer, jettisoned into the Atlantic Ocean, where it was recovered.

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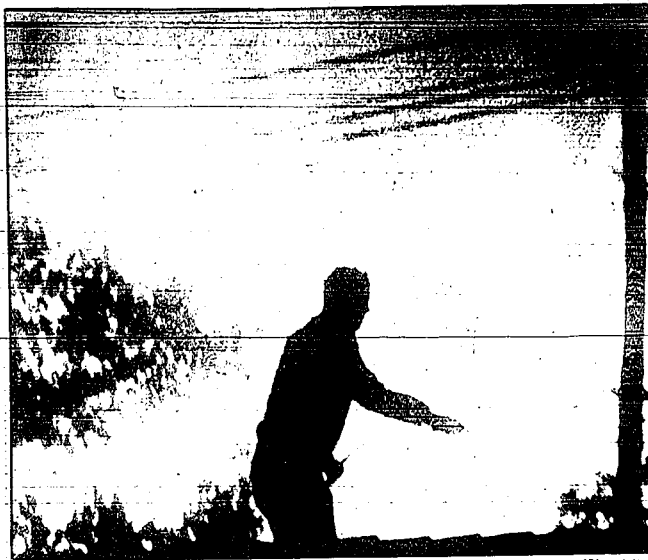

Wind-driven fire levels 25 homes

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The dreaded Santa Ana winds raked the region Thursday with gusts up to 80 mph that fanned fires destroying 25 homes, snapped power lines, toppled structures and damaged Rose Parade floats.

About two dozen homes and buildings also were damaged by the blazes but no serious injuries were reported, authorities said. Gusts toppled six trucks on highways to the east and cut power to more than 300,000 people.

"We lost everything — the house, the cars," said Dan Hanlon, 49, of La Verne, who fled with his wife. "We were lucky to get out. We had to drive through flames."

Generated by high pressure over Idaho and a low over Baja California, winds swept much of California and Nevada but were most destructive in the Los Angeles basin and to the east where they roar down from the desert through the mountain ranges and become known as the Santa Anas.

Strong winds also hit other parts of the state overnight. Gusts to 45 mph were recorded at Travis Air Force Base near Sacramento and parts of the San Francisco Bay region, the National Weather Service said.

In Yosemite National Park about 200 people were temporarily evacuated because of the threat of falling trees, said spokeswoman Kathy August. Gusts were clocked at 50 mph in parts of Yosemite Valley.

The high pressure system causing the winds was expected to continue

into next week, pumping more Santa Anas into Southern California, the National Weather Service said.

Fifteen homes burned up and five commercial buildings were damaged in Baldwin Park, 20 miles northeast of Los Angeles, when 75 mph gusts snapped power lines shortly after midnight and ignited a fire at Allan Paper Co.

"We saw sparks, showers of sparks, like rain," said Ruben Cabadas, 18, recounting his family's fight from their home as its ruins smoldered.

The blaze was contained at daybreak, said Inspector Chuck Gutierrez of the Los Angeles County Fire Department. There was no damage estimate.

Ten homes were destroyed and 15 damaged in La Verne, 30 miles east, by a fire believed caused by a downed power line, Gutierrez said. About 300 people were evacuated before the 150-acre blaze was contained.

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Drought not sign of warming

SAN FRANCISCO — Contradicting — alarming — reports earlier this year, climate experts have concluded that last summer's severe drought was not a sign of the dreaded greenhouse effect, but instead was caused by natural fluctuations in the atmosphere.

Because of the expectation among climatologists that the Earth soon will gradually warm, there was widespread speculation last summer that the hot, dry weather was a sign that global warming was here to stay.

But in speeches and interviews this week at a meeting of the American Geophysical Union, scientists said that while they continue to expect global warming, they don't

think the data from a single year can be considered proof of it.

"Public awareness is at the right level, but for the wrong reason," said Kevin Trenberth, a climate analyst at the National Center for Atmospheric Research in Colorado, on Wednesday. Trenberth reported last summer's drought resulted from complex year-to-year changes in Pacific Ocean water temperatures.

Other climate specialists continue to argue about exactly what happened in the drought of 1988, and about what they would accept as evidence that the greenhouse effect has been detected.

Some scientists, notably a NASA meteorologist who addressed Congress last spring, say the drought was evidence that the greenhouse ef-

fect had arrived.

Others, more cautious, say that it was at least typical of what we could expect increasingly often. But deep down, they're resigned to the inevitable, many say.

The scientific consensus is that if you increase greenhouse gases, the globe will warm up," said Tom Karl of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration. "The controversy right now," he said, is whether it will warm up 3 degrees or 8 degrees.

For more than a decade, climate scientists have been predicting that if civilization keeps spewing carbon dioxide, methane and other heat-absorbing gases into the atmosphere, the globe would warm up and its weather patterns would be permanently changed.

TV show brings murder clues

SEATTLE (AP) — Police investigating the nation's worst-known serial murder case reaped bushels of new clues as thousands of people called in tips during a nationwide television show on the Green River killings.

At least two callers claimed to be the person who has killed at least 40 young women in the Northwest since 1982, but police were unsure whether either call was authentic.

More than 6,000 calls were logged Wednesday, and phones continued ringing Thursday in response to the show about the Green River and other serial-murder cases, while investigators began placing the crime tips in order of priority.

"As I speak, we have received about 1,100 calls that we feel appear to be useful" for cases throughout the

country, King County Sheriff James Montgomery said Thursday.

"If we don't solve a couple of murders out of this I'll just be astounded," said Bob Evans, commander of the county's Green River Task Force.

An estimated 50 million people in the United States and Canada watched Wednesday night's two-hour show, which producers called the most ambitious "manhunt" TV project ever undertaken. It was syndicated to TV stations in 150 metropolitan markets by Lexington-Broadcasting of New York.

Police have made no arrests since finding the first victims in the Green River south of Seattle. The murderer is blamed for killing 40 women, most linked to prostitution and street life. Another eight missing women are

listed as potential victims.

Montgomery denied that the movie was a last-ditch effort to solve the murder case before further staff cuts are forced in the county task force, already pared to 13 from a one-time high of 40 people.

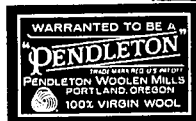
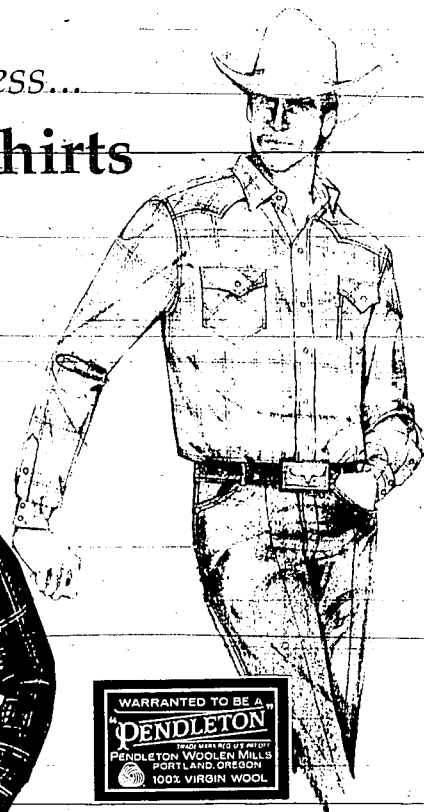
But he said authorities hope the movie approach, one which has probably never been tried before, will give investigators the crucial clue. A reward of \$100,000 has been offered for information leading to the killer's arrest.

There weren't, surprisingly, that many crank calls.

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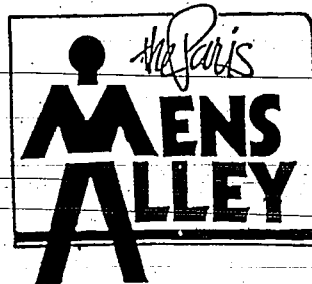

Backing for lottery came late

BOISE (AP) — Much of the money backing Idaho's state lottery amendment came in on the eve of the election last month or after the election, campaign finance reports show today.

Idahoans for the Lottery, one of two groups backing the lottery, reported receiving \$23,419 for the campaign, including \$11,394 after Oct. 24.

Daniel Bower, Atlanta, Ga., contributed \$2,500 to Idahoans for the Lottery on Nov. 2; the Southland Corp., Dallas, which operates 7-Eleven stores, sent \$2,500 on Nov. 7, the day before the election and Synch International, Inc., Reno, contributed \$3,000 on Nov. 17, nine days after the election, for a total contribution of \$5,000.

The largest contribution listed was \$4,000 from Scientific Games, Norcross, Ga., a company which supplies tickets and other items for lotteries. It contributed \$4,000 the day before

the election and for the campaign contributed \$7,000 to the pro lottery drive.

Most of Idahoans for the Lottery's spending after Oct. 24, \$7,000, went for polling, to a Massachusetts company. The group said it had \$1,770 left over.

Consider the coalition of churches and other organizations against the lottery, reported earlier in the week it collected \$621,000 and spent about \$590,000 in an unsuccessful effort to stop the lottery amendment.

Keeping Idaho Alive, another pro lottery organization, listed only \$35 in contributions for the latest period and \$2,014 overall. It reported only incidental expenses the last three weeks of the campaign and no advertising.

Two Republican state senators, one defeated and one a victor in the election, reported heavy campaign contributions and spending.

Sen. Rachel Gilbert, R-Boise, defeated Boise school principal Linda Clark in a runoff of a close 1986 race. Mrs. Gilbert reported receiving \$41,600 for the campaign and she spent all but \$774 of it. Ms. Clark's report wasn't received by this morning at the secretary of state's office.

Mrs. Gilbert reported receiving \$3,000 from United for Idaho, an industry lobby group, and \$1,100 from PAC-5, a conservative organization. Mrs. Gilbert showed \$8,645 in contributions between Oct. 24 and Nov. 24.

Terry Sversten of Cataldo, defeated by Sen. John Sticks, D-Coeur d'Alene, spent \$21,716 on the campaign, including \$10,571 after Oct. 24. He showed a balance of \$951. Sversten was chairman of the Senate Education Committee in recent sessions. United for Idaho gave Sversten \$2,750 for the campaign and six other GOP legislators contributed to his unsuccessful race.

Soil cleanup begins this spring

BOISE (AP) — Removal of lead contaminated topsoil from the yards of up to 100 homes in Idaho's Silver Valley will begin next spring as scheduled, and state officials are evaluating methods of effectively removing contaminated house dust as well.

The people are beginning to see some momentum, some light at the end of the tunnel, Sally Goodell said Thursday in briefing the state Health and Welfare Board on the federal Superfund clean-up of lead contamination from the now-idled Bunker Hill smelter in Kellogg.

State officials are finalizing clean-up engineering studies and assessments of the health risks, and while the work is running somewhat behind schedule, Ms. Goodell, the project manager, said it will still be completed within plenty of time for the initial soil removal to begin in late May or early June.

Although tests have shown that only a fraction of the yards in Kellogg, Smelterville and Gardner have

lead concentrations below the levels considered acceptable by the federal government, Ms. Goodell said the cleanup project will begin modestly with only 50 to 100 homes so any initial problems can be solved before the effort accelerates. She also said financing for the clean-up will limit the initial phases.

The state is also looking for a permanent storage site for the contaminated topsoil once it is removed. Ms. Goodell said soil taken from yards next summer would still probably be stored at a temporary site while final arrangements are made for the permanent facility.

She told the board the state is still in the process of negotiating with Gulf Resources & Chemical Corp., the owner of the smelter, to participate in financing the cleanup. But if a deal is not struck, the federal government will pick up the tab through its industry-financed Superfund.

A special task force will meet with Silver Valley residents next week to discuss the priority sites for the initial

phase of the topsoil removal.

"We will be looking for those areas where there are the most children and the highest risk," Ms. Goodell told the board.

Five years ago, while the smelter was still in full operation, tests on children in the area showed unprecedented levels of lead in their blood. Those levels have fallen, especially since the smelter was shut down in 1981, but tests last summer still showed lead content in children's blood at unacceptable levels.

While topsoil removal will eliminate much of the lead contamination, Ms. Goodell said, "House dust turns out to be a second significant source of lead contamination to the children."

No effective method of reducing that kind of contamination has been developed yet, she said, and a lead-contamination clean-up project in Canada recently found that house dust after contaminated topsoil was removed had lead contents four times as high as the topsoil itself.

Outfitters want new fire policy

GARDEN CITY (AP) — The Idaho Outfitters and Guides Association has approved a resolution calling for a more flexible fire policy in back-country areas and a policy that takes into account the impact of fires on tourism.

The unanimous vote came Wednesday at the close of the association's annual meeting, where big-game and river outfitters estimated they lost at least \$500,000 to wilderness fires last summer. Losses included canceled trips, closed hunting areas and burned camps.

Doug Tims, new association president, said the resolution would be presented to the U.S. Forest Service for its consideration in reviewing the fire policy, and to Idaho's congressional delegation.

Tax structure panel delays final report

LEWISTON (AP) — The chairman of Gov. Cecil Andrus' tax structure review panel, Lewiston attorney Philip Peterson, says the group will not release its findings until after its Dec. 19 meeting.

Peterson, a former University of Idaho law school dean and participant in the 12-member committee's recommendations even as a legislative interim committee has concluded no substantial changes are needed.

The legislative committee members presented their findings last week in Boise at the meeting of the Associated Taxpayers of Idaho.

But the governor's committee took a different approach than the legislators. It did not call in experts to testify because some of the top tax experts in Idaho al-

ready were on the committee. "I don't want to preempt the committee," said Peterson, who has helped craft much of Idaho's tax legislation. "We'll deliver it to him (Andrus) as soon as it's completed. I've been putting together a final draft, to be reviewed by the committee."

Formed last summer, the panel includes Richard Bennett of Hayden Lake, Boise State University economist Charles Skoro, Idaho Tax Commission Chairman Larry Looney, former Associated Taxpayers of Idaho President Russell Westerberg, Idaho AFL-CIO President Jim Harris, Boise lawyer Chase McDevitt, Boise stockbroker Louise Schneider, Boise certified public accountant Roger Martell and Idaho Legislative Council Director Myron Schlichte.

Autumn rain allows optimism, says BPA

SEATTLE (AP) — The Northwest is off to a good start for its "water year," but members of the Washington Public Utility Districts' Association should "continue to pray for rain," the chief of the Bonneville Power Administration said today.

BPA Administrator Jim Jura said the association's 52nd annual meeting has three concerns that could determine whether Bonneville will need to raise its electricity rates next year.

They are: — The water supply in 1989. Jura said he was "cautiously optimistic" about snowpack, which is critical to the hydroelectric production that is Bonneville's bread and butter.

He said precipitation for most of Bonneville's watershed areas in the Northwest was 150 percent of normal in November. He said November, December and January are the most critical months for snowfall that will eventually fill reservoirs behind Columbia River dams.

— BPA debt. "What are we going to do about cleaning up (BPA's) financial statement?" Jura asked approximately 100 PUD officials present. He said he was uneasy about Bonneville's debt load, now at \$14 billion, as Bonneville pays about \$1 billion a year in debt service.

While he wants to reduce the debt, he and members of the audience noted there was a fine line that must be walked, because many Northwest

public utilities are in communities experiencing economic hard times.

— Action by Congress. Noting Northwest electricity rates are relatively low, Jura said a Congress trying to cut the national deficit could try to the region and increase Bonneville's payments to the U.S. Treasury. Bonneville now pays about \$600 million annually to the Treasury on its \$9 billion federal debt, and Jura said congressmen might suggest increasing that by \$300 million.

The Reagan administration for years has proposed prying more money out of Bonneville, but those efforts have so far been beaten back.

Despite some continuing problems, Jura said the region's utilities have been united and many problems of the past several years have dissipated. He said a good illustration was settlements made by PUDs in the Washington Public Power Supply System's securities-fraud case.

Benson home is tax-exempt, board decides

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — The official home of Mormon Church President Ezra Taft Benson has been granted tax exemption by Salt Lake County's Board of Equalization on the basis of its ownership by the church.

The decision exempting the downtown Salt Lake condominium, valued at \$1.2 million, was based on new State Tax Commission guidelines issued earlier this year as part of a ruling involving a home in St. George occupied by the president of St. George Temple.

The board, comprising the three county commissioners, also exempted from property taxes another residence owned by the Church and occupied by a Salt Lake area mission president. Board members then ordered a review of previous decisions on tax exemptions for homes owned by religious organizations.

While Carl Lewis says he still enjoys running, he is beginning to consider life after track. 'I want to continue to motivate,' he says

PHOENIX — Most people have heard of Carl Lewis, but he remains a national enigma.

Is the real Carl Lewis the sphinx-like quadruple gold medalist of the 1984 Los Angeles Olympics or the autograph-signing double-gold medal winner of the 1988 Seoul Games?

During a nearly hour-long inter-

plished many things, his six gold medals — four in Los Angeles and two in Seoul — being at the top of the list. Lewis' four golds in L.A., where the Soviet Union and its allies boycotted, came a lot easier than his two in Seoul.

Last Oct. 1, Lewis did something that no other Olympic athlete has ever done: win back-to-back gold medals in the 100-meter dash. Three days prior to that Lewis had been soundly beaten in the actual race by Canadian Ben Johnson. Johnson not only defeated Lewis, he destroyed one of the best sprint furies ever assembled and did it in a world-record time.

"I felt satisfied and fulfilled with my race," said Lewis, who won the silver medal with a time of 9.92 seconds to Johnson's 9.79. "I felt I ran as good a race as I could have."

But on that first day of October, Ben Johnson's world crumbled. It was announced by the International Olympic Committee that Johnson had tested positive for stanozolol, an anabolic steroid, and was stripped of his medal and his world record.

"We've suspected for a few years that he was on them (steroids)," said Lewis. "The signs were there. Prior to 1984, Ben was very friendly and talked to everyone. By 1984, he wouldn't talk to anyone. His size also increased greatly during that time and that just doesn't happen."

After Johnson was stripped of his medal, Lewis, Briton Linford Christie and American Calvin Smith were scheduled to receive their new medals in a special ceremony in Seoul's Olympic Stadium.

"It's funny," said Lewis. "We were supposed to have a special ceremony but it never happened. We received

All-America team is named

Deion Sanders, Florida State's magnificent corner back, was named to the Associated Press 1988 All-America college football team Thursday for the second year in a row, along with Heisman Trophy winner Barry Sanders of Oklahoma State. They are related only by talent.

Despite missing two games in October, Deion Sanders intercepted five passes and returned two for touchdowns. He also led the nation in punt returns with a 15.24-yard average — 33 returns for 503 yards and a touchdown.

Barry Sanders' numbers were even more amazing. The 5-foot-8, 197-pound junior tailback capped his record-smashing season with his top effort — 332 yards against Texas Tech. It was his fourth 300-yard game of the season — no one else has ever had more than one in a career — and gave him 2,628 for the season, easily erasing the mark of 2,342 by Southern Cal's

Marcus Allen in 1981. Sanders' numerous records also included a single-season mark of 39 touchdowns.

How good is Sanders? He gained 75 yards without even playing. When Texas Tech reviewed the films of Oklahoma State's 45-42 victory in Tokyo on Sunday, it was decided that two swing passes on which Sanders gained 75 yards actually were backward passes and therefore counted as rushes, boosting his total from 257 to 332.

The All-America team also included defensive tackle Tracy Rucker of Auburn, winner of the Outland Trophy as the nation's best interior lineman, and Derrick Thomas of Alabama, who won the Butkus Award as the top linebacker.

Sanders is joined in the backfield by two other underclassmen — junior quarterback Steve Walsh of Miami and Texas A&M sophomore running back Darren Lewis, both of whom shattered records this season.

Eastern will also rely on 6-4 Paul Calvert, 6-3 Jim Long and 6-0 returning guard Dave Lavetter.

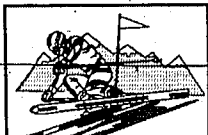

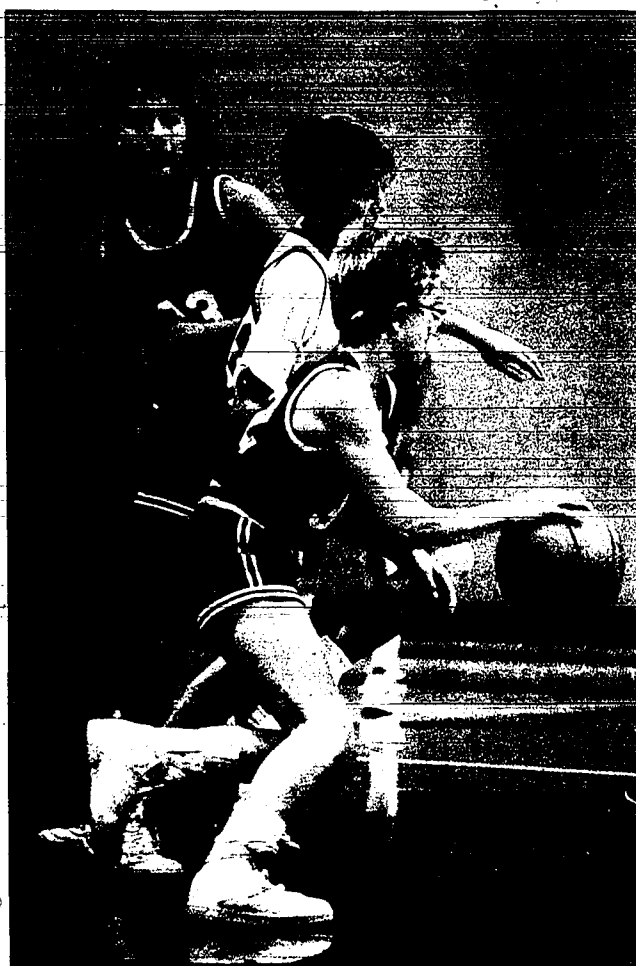

"He could do more for the sport than anybody to fight against drug use if he would just admit he took them and show how he cares and be selfish."

"The worst thing about the whole mess was that he threw it in our faces," Lewis continued. "Drugs created everything."

The other gold Lewis collected in Seoul was in the long jump. As in the 100, he became the only person to ever repeat as the Olympic champion of that event.

Although he has won every major long jump title available there is one thing that still eludes him: Bob

Beamon's world record of 29 feet, 2 1/2 inches.

"I haven't been focusing much on the long jump," said Lewis. "I only jumped six or seven times (meets) this year and only 17 times since '84. I think I can break the record and plan to focus more on the long jump this year."

Even without the Olympics, 1988 was a great year for Lewis, one of his most successful ever. He won the 100 and the long jump at the U.S. Olympic Trials, finished second in the 200, had the year's best long jump of 29.9, ran the year's fastest 100 meters of 9.92 seconds and recorded the second-best 200, a 19.79.

His American record at the trials in the 100 was his first outright record in that event. Last year he equaled Smith's mark of 9.93.

What was his key to his success this year?

"More time working on starts," he said. "In the past we would do only six to seven per week. This year we increased that number to 10. We wanted to be more consistent and found that six was not enough."

TWIN FALLS — For traditionalists among music lovers, Sunday's performance of Handel's "Messiah" by the Magic Valley Chorale may well be the highlight of the Christmas season.

No matter how often this most familiar oratorio is heard, the timeless words describing Christ's birth, earthly ministry and resurrection in lilting melodies and majestic harmony can prove a moving experience.

The Chorale will perform the "Messiah" at 3 p.m. Sunday in the College of Southern Idaho's Fine Arts Auditorium.

The chorus is directed by Carson Wong, and will be accompanied by the Magic Valley Chamber Orchestra. The group will perform selections from all three parts of the famous work.

Soloists are Alice M. Anderson, soprano; Linda Stevenson, alto, both from Twin Falls; Harold Shetler, bass, tenor, and Roger D. Vincent, bass.

Filer, bass. All four singers have performed in many church and community cultural events throughout the Magic Valley, including Dilettantes' and other dramatic/musical productions.

Anderson is a professor of fashion/home economics programs at CSI. Stevenson, who has been active in Lincoln County cultural groups, is choir director at the Twin Falls Church of the Brethren. GEORGE FRIDERIC HANDEL
1685-1759

Pre-concert entertainment will be provided by the Snake River Brass quintet who will play a medley of Christmas carols.

Biographers of George Frideric Handel say the composer, as well as his 18th century audiences, would be astounded to know how "Messiah" has come to overshadow all Handel's other great scores.

The composer rose to fame in his early years with operas that enjoyed great popularity in Italy, where a cultivated public was eager for this form of entertainment.

Handel, who assimilated two cultures beyond his native Germany, was a secular composer, according to Edmund White, writing for Time's "Great Men of Music" series. "Messiah" is the only strictly devotional work of his later years.

At the height of his popularity in Italy, Handel decided to go to England where the rising middle class failed to appreciate Italian opera.

The fortunes of the burly German composer, who Anglicized his name and learned English, rose and fell, particularly with the death of his devoted patrons, Queen Anne and King

George I.

It is ironic that "Messiah," justifiably referred to as a religious experience, probably would never have happened but for consistent failures of Handel's operas in England, thus forcing him to turn to English oratorio — and immortality.

Imbued with the operatic tradition, Handel intended his oratorios to be acted on stage with costumes and scenery. But the Bishop of London forbade the presentation of a biblical story on an opera stage.

So Handel told his singers to perform "in their own habits" and not to act their parts, but to stand still while singing.

Legend surrounds the writing of Handel's best known work in 1741, just after the doors had closed on his

final opera which was a dismal failure.

Working almost continuously with little food or rest, he completed and corrected the score — which takes three hours to perform in its entirety — in just 24 days.

His servant is reported to have said, "He just stares at me and doesn't see me."

With the music completed, Handel exclaimed, "I did think I saw all heaven before me and God himself was there." Then he fell into bed exhausted, as though in a coma, for 17 days.

Thinking Handel was dying, his frightened servant sent for a doctor, but before the medic could arrive, Handel revived and bellowed for food "wolfing half a ham washed

with endless tankards of beer."

The legend may have been embellished over the centuries, but historians agree that "Messiah" has fed the hungry, clothed the naked and freed people from debtor's prison more than any single musical production.

Although far from rich at the time, Handel used proceeds from the premiere performance April 13, 1742, in Dublin to purchase freedom for 142 persons incarcerated in Ireland's wretched debtor's prisons.

A few years after its Dublin success, "Messiah" benefit performances were inaugurated as a yearly event in London with Handel conducting, despite failing eyesight dimmed by cataracts.

Appropriately, Handel's last public appearance, eight days before his

death, was a performance of "Messiah."

Braun Brothers record favorite Christmas songs

TWIN FALLS — The newest recording by the Braun Brothers is a cheerful cassette tape of Christmas songs, sung by Billy Braun, Gary Braun, Muzzie Braun and Muzzie's four sons, also known as The Little Braun Brothers.

"Christmas in These Idaho Hills" has 10 holiday songs, including a cute medley of "My Two Front Teeth," "Up on the House Top" and "I Saw Mommy Kissing Santa Claus," sung by the little Brauns. The youngsters also harmonize well on "I'm Gettin' Nuttin' For Christmas."

Billy delivers "Silver Bells," "White Christmas," "Let it Snow" and "Winter Wonderland" in a simple, yet elegant style.

In the title song, Muzzie sings, "Christmas comes but once a year, a time for family and Christmas cheer."

The talented Braun Brothers, including Gary who sings harmony and makes the blues harp cry, have been a popular force in Idaho music for a decade.

Muzzie, along with his wife JoAnn and their four sons, lives in the heart of the country he writes and sings about. Thirty miles from Stanley, six miles up an isolated canyon in the Sawtooth Mountains, this family lives without electricity, telephone or indoor water.

Muzzie says this is a good environment for playing music because there are no distractions.

"Once we got up there and get settled in, we have more time to

spend on our music," he says. "We don't have television. We don't get good radio reception. So it kind of puts us all in a situation where we do play more music at home."

JoAnn says there is no practice schedule, but when Muzzie goes out to his "music shed," the boys usually tag along to sit around the wood-burning stove and yodel or harmonize on a few tunes with their dad.

"They can sing with him, but they don't feel like they have to," JoAnn says.

Since Muzzie travels with his family year-round, Cody, age 11, Willie, 10, "Little" Gary, 8, and Mickey, 7, get their schooling from their parents.

"We started out teaching one kid at the first grade level," Muzzie recalls. "By the time we figured out what the heck we were doing, we had all four

of them in school."

Muzzie says his own hand is the family's main source of income, and the kids play for fun rather than "in some dingy bar."

Last year, The Little Braun Brothers put on about 75 shows at county fairs, folk festivals, art councils, elementary schools, shopping malls, live radio broadcasts, conventions in Sun Valley and cowboy poetry gatherings.

"We have a pretty busy schedule," says JoAnn. "I think the kids learn things while they're on the road that is going to be as beneficial as book-learning."

At a recent performance in a Twin Falls mall, the little Brauns dressed in black cowboy hats, black western shirts with colored trim, colored scarves, jeans and high-top cowboy

boots. Along with their dad, they sang cuts from the new Christmas tape and a selection of cowboy songs.

"They like that old Sons of the Pioneers-type western music," says Muzzie.

"Next spring, he says, the youngsters may record their own album."

Billy Braun is a professional musician living in the Boise area. His trio, The Billy Braun Band, travels mostly in Idaho and is currently working on an album to be released next year.

Gary Braun lives in Pocatello and plays in a band called Cabin Fever.

As sons of a professional musician, the three Braun Brothers "always sang around the house" and were encouraged to play music, says Muzzie, a native of Twin Falls. The three boys played Beatles and Beach

Boys records, while their two sisters played The Limelights and The Four Freshmen.

"It always seemed to be male vocal groups," Muzzie says.

For the Christmas tape, the Braun brothers selected their favorite holiday songs. Then Muzzie went to the music shed and penned the title song.

Bisbee photos become postcards

TWIN FALLS — The Twin Falls Public Library Foundation is taking bits and pieces of the city's history and turning them into an investment in its future.

The Foundation, a non-profit support group independent of the library's board of directors, is selling notecards bearing historical photographs by Clarence Bisbee, an early day Twin Falls photographer.

The sepia-colored prints were selected from 227 photographs in the library's Bisbee collection. David Mead, president of the Library Foundation, says the collection is located in the library's Idaho Room and is open to the public.

"But this is the first time any of these historical photographs have been released in this form, as far as we know," Mead says.

The notecards and matching buff-colored linen

envelopes sell for \$4.50 plus tax for a set of six.

They can be purchased at the library, the English House, Judi's Bookstore, Larson Arts, the Country Gift Garden and the Made in Idaho shop.

Mead says the Foundation plans to use the proceeds to fund various library projects.

The Foundation has packaged two sets of six notecards, with different photos featured in each set. Captions on the back of each card describe the photograph — places, people and events, some of which exist now only in the memories of longtime residents.

Bisbee arrived in Twin Falls in 1906, shortly 10 months after the first tent was erected in the new town. Along with his wife, Jesse, he worked out of a downtown home studio.

His photographs chronicled a city's coming to life. Today they show that a lot has changed since then, especially transportation. Of the 12 photo cards, six provide a glimpse-of the trials and

tribulations of travel — from a Twin Falls-Jerome stagecoach picking its way down the north Blue Lakes grade in 1915, to the Twin Falls Electric Railroad, which operated from 1913 to 1916 between the townsite and Shoshone Falls.

The cards also give a glimpse of what hasn't changed. Bisbee's 1932 photograph of the Shoshone Falls shows more water roaring over the rock formations than many newcomers have seen, but the landscape has remained more or less the same.

The lava rock drinking fountain featured in the foreground of another photograph still remains in the City Park, but the domed, circular bandshell is only a memory.

Ruth Sawyer, also a Library Foundation member, says there are 2,000 notecard sets available and they will remain on sale until all are sold. "So, far we've had very positive response," she

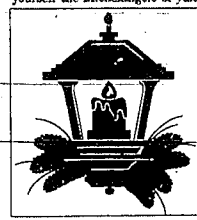

The 90-piece Magic Valley Chorale is about the size Handel used in his original performance of some 80 singers and instrumentalists. Other sources say the original score called for a modest choir of 26 boys voices, a string orchestra and single trumpet.

However, within two decades of his death "Messiah" performers had swollen to 600 and steadily increased to an all-time record in 1883 when

4,000 singers, backed by a 500-piece orchestra blared the "Divine thunder chorus" in London.

But no matter the number of participants or where it is performed, "Messiah" audiences everywhere always rise from their seats as Part 2 climaxes with the majestic "Hallelujah Chorus."

The custom originated 300 years with King George II, who stood to honor the power of Handel's magnificent vision of glory.

Expedient brought 5 talented musicians together as the odd 'Traveling Wilburys'

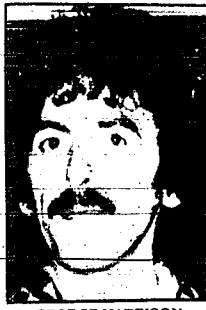
ALBANY, N.Y. — The true legend of the Traveling Wilburys began when George Harrison, or Nelson Wilbury needed to record an extra song at short notice and invited two of his dinner companions to lend their voices.

Nine days and 10 songs later, the result was one of those happy accidents that proves there's more to the music business than accountants and estates.

You won't find the names George Harrison, Bob Dylan, Roy Orbison, Tom Petty and Jeff Lynne on "Volume One," the debut album by the oddly-named Traveling Wilburys. But the dark glasses and pseudonyms can't hide those familiar talents. Orbison died at the age of 52 on Tuesday of a heart attack.

"We definitely didn't want to treat this like a supergroup," said Petty, or Charles T. Wilbury Jr. "I don't even like the term 'all that much.' But we were aware that it would be viewed as such. We look at the Wilburys as a completely other person as ourselves."

Harrison mentioned to Lynne and Orbison over dinner last spring that he needed a new B-side for a 12-inch

single release. The other two said they'd help him put together a song.

The former Beatle had to retrieve his guitar, which he'd left at Petty's California house during a visit a few days earlier, Petty said. The loud heartbreaker was also asked to join in on the record.

Since all the nearby studios were booked, the three amigos had to impose on another friend who had recording facilities in his house. Dylan said he'd be glad to offer his as-

stance. "We all sat around the grass at Bob's house and wrote this song called 'Handle With Care,'" Petty recalled. "When it was all done it sounded really good."

Much too good, they thought, for a B-side. So they kept on writing and recording.

"It was a very innocent thing, really," Petty said. "We were just kind of enjoying it and we were deep into it before we realized almost what we were doing."

That spontaneity, and a lot of humor, comes through on the record.

"Volume One" sounds like a group of friends, albeit extremely talented friends, enjoying themselves together. All five trade lead and backing vocals and strum guitars.

The results are a cross between Harrison's early '70s solo work and the electronic flourishes Lynne brought to the Electric Light Orchestra, Orbison's "Not Alone Any More" is in the vein—he's mined for a quarter-century and the three songs Dylan dominates are some of his best work in years.

The song "Dirty World" pokes fun at Prince with a series of sexual double entendres and the wickily-funny "Tweeter and the Monkey Man" is

littered with Bruce Springsteen references.

The record was a true collaboration, Petty said. On "Tweeter," for instance, he and Dylan wrote lyrics into a tape recorder then edited them into a story. Other Wilburys added the chorus, he said.

Credit a non-rocking, Prince Charles of Great Britain, with the name Traveling Wilburys, Petty said.

Harrison and Lynne performed at the Prince's Trust concert last year and were complimented by the host following the show, he said.

New Orbison album due in '89

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — A new album by rock 'n' roll pioneer Roy Orbison, who died Tuesday, is due out in early 1989.

"Mystery Girl" on Virgin Records will feature guest stars including U2, Elvis Costello, Albert Hammond, George Harrison, Steve Cropper, Tom Petty, Billy Bernetta and others.

Funeral services for Orbison, who died of a heart attack at age 52, remained incomplete Thursday. Arrangements were delayed because his wife was in Germany visiting relatives at the time of his death.

The singer had been scheduled to fly to Europe next week to film a second music video as a member of the Traveling Wilburys, a group that also includes Harrison, Petty, Bob Dylan and Jeff Lynne. Their

album "The Traveling Wilburys" is No. 8 on the charts.

Meanwhile, the singer's band members said this was Orbison's first full week off in more than six months.

"His last words to the band were, 'I'll see you in January. We'll get back together, learn some new songs and have a ball,'" said Michael Joyce, bass player.

"He'd really been working hard," Joyce said. "The crowds have been getting wilder and wilder. The crowd in Boston (last week) was shouting 'Roy, Roy, Roy' before he went on stage. There was a real momentum building."

David Briggs, a record producer and song publisher, recently finished producing two songs with Or-

bison for the forthcoming album.

"He was in great spirits, and he seemed to be in relatively good health," Briggs said. "We worked seven days a week, and he held up well after midnight." In fact, he held up a lot better than that.

In three decades of performing, Orbison was best known for his hits "Oh, Pretty Woman," "Only the Lonely" and "Cryin'."

Orbison spent Tuesday afternoon and evening playing with remote-control model airplanes, his hobby. He suffered the heart attack at his mother's house and died later at a hospital.

Orbison, who had open heart surgery in 1978, is survived by his wife Barbara; sons Wesley, 23, Roy Jr., 18, and Alexander, 12; his mother and a brother.

Experts conclude TV doesn't hurt children

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two psychologists say there is little scientific evidence to support the common belief that television has a negative influence on children's education.

In a government-funded review of research literature, the psychologists even came to the conclusion that homework done while watching television is no worse than homework done with the box turned off.

The surprising findings are contained in a paper, "The Impact on Children's Education: Influence on Cognitive Development," distributed by the U.S. Department of Education's Office of Educational Research and Improvement.

The authors, University of Massachusetts psychology professor Daniel R. Anderson and graduate student Patricia A. Collins, did not conduct original research or studies with children. They said the research literature behind many common assertions about television's impact on children is "sparse."

But their reading of the available studies led them to the conclusions: "There is no evidence that television has a mesmerizing effect on children's attention caused by color,

movement and visual changes."

"Contrary to popular assertions, children are cognitively active during television viewing and attempt to form a coherent, connected understanding of television programs."

"There is no evidence that children generally get overstimulated by television."

"Television viewing generally displaces not reading but movie attendance, radio listening, comic book reading and participation in organized sports."

"There is no evidence that homework done during television viewing is of lower quality than homework done in silence."

"There is little evidence to show that television viewing reduces children's attention span, and some indicating it may actually increase their ability to focus attention."

"There is no evidence that television makes children cognitively passive."

"There is some weak evidence that television availability reduces reading achievement," but if so, this "appears to occur during the early elementary school years and is probably temporary."

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Only special people can adopt 'special needs' children

New York lawyer writes Mickey Spillane-type crime novels

Anger is the motor in Andrew Vachas' brain.

It makes him get up at 5 a.m. every day and go to work in a world where there is "nothing I could make up that would be worse than what happens. Absolutely nothing."

Vachas is a New York lawyer who represents children, mostly in child molestation and abuse cases. He also has — spun — three — sandpaper-rough crime novels — "Blood," "Street" and the latest, "Blue Belle" — out of the sommy milieu where the good guys feel lucky if they don't wake up in the slammer.

His brutal portraits of New York's pimps, prostitutes, pedophiles, pornographers and psychopaths have earned him praise as a 1980s update on Dashiell Hammett and Raymond Chandler. One reviewer wrote that Vachas' fiction is so raw that it makes "Mickey Spillane's exploits read like the minutes of a Harvard Alumni meeting, class of 1920."

"Blue Belle" — with its plot about the hunt for a killer who has threatened a friend of Burke's, the anti-hero of all three novels — takes the characters through a putrid sub-world of snuff films, Times Square sex stores and multiple confrontations on dark city streets. It is on those streets that Burke sometimes makes out vigilante justice to child molesters, often assisted by other criminals.

Vachas — who "dresses better than I have to" for court appear-

ances — can look as if he just came up for air from a lower region where everybody is as tough as titanium and as watchful as guard dogs — of which he owns several. His black eye patch, black leather jacket, black sweat shirt and highly polished black boots — not to mention the tattoo of a tiny heart between thumb and forefinger of one hand — are a standard, almost hackneyed, uniform for passage to the underworld. The patch is real, covering an eye blinded in a dimly remembered youthful confrontation on the streets.

But unlike his literary predecessors, Vachas' books are as much manifestos against social pathology

as hard-boiled fiction. The violent mystery-thriller is his way of grabbing readers by the throat and shouting in their faces about the evils done to children, he says.

"I don't know how long they're going to let me in the living room, so I want to rearrange the furniture as radically as I can while I'm there," he says.

It takes only a few minutes for the 45-year-old lawyer to establish his relentless single-mindedness during an interview in Los Angeles. "What drives me is as real simple as one word: anger," he says. "I'm absolutely morally convinced in my mind and my heart that child abuse is a

greater cancer in this country than cocaine or communism."

He believes that child abuse manufactures sociopaths.

"We could literally head off a Charles Manson at the pass if we chose to do so," he maintains. "The people who scare us so much — the Ted Bundys, the Lawrence) Singletons — they're not biogenetic mutations," he adds, referring to the serial killer on death row in Florida and the controversial rapist-mutilator released from a California prison.

"The genetic dice didn't come down the table and say: 'This is what you're going to be.' We make our monsters," he declares. (In line with that theory, Vachas represented the fetus last July in a case in which a pregnant woman was ordered to give up her baby at birth because she had abused or neglected seven previous children.)

But don't get the impression that Vachas has a bleeding heart.

"I'm not a liberal," he says. "If you told me Ted Bundy was sexually tortured for years as a child, I wouldn't let him out of prison."

He is so accustomed to the loathsome that he speaks almost offhandedly of the despicable: "I just finished a case where they kept killing mice in front of the kid."

Once, even he was an innocent, says Vachas, who grew up in a tough Manhattan neighborhood.

"The idea of child sexual abuse was unknown to me — and I wasn't raised in a prep school — until I became an investigator for the public

health service. And my job was to track the chain of syphilitic infection and I kept finding children in the feeding chain. It was mind-boggling. ... I knew I was seeing the truth, and the truth just makes you angry beyond the imagination of anybody who's not seen it."

Vachas concedes that others might see him as monomaniacal. But he counters that "a man's entitled to his own experience and his own view of it. ... I don't claim to be a social critic. I'm not Raymond Chandler. I'm not writing about Los Angeles from the very rich to the very poor. I'm not doing that and I don't fancy myself as a writer. I don't pretend to be one."

He admits that revulsion is a frequent reaction to his fiction. "People do act sometimes like I've just brought this unspeakable filth into their lives." But he turns immediately combative, saying, "But anyone who says I'm making this stuff up should get a CAT scan."

Because he is frequently threatened, Vachas says that he has taken some precautions similar to his fictional hero Burke, who lives behind a screen of false identities, phony addresses and illicit credit cards.

"The last threat I recall is a man being led away to do a life sentence, turning to me in the courtroom, pointing his finger at me and saying, 'I have friends on the street,' — he says. "You don't have to be Sherlock Holmes to figure that one out. I get the usual phone calls. I get very,

very few written threats."

Over the years, Vachas says, he has been "hit in the face with a 2-by-4, my jaw's been broken twice, my nose three times."

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AIDS on TV mirrors, may distort reality

HOLLYWOOD — Kelly West is about to find out that she has just slept with a man who is infected with the AIDS virus. He bragged about cruising the leather bars in the Castro, West says, but "... but I thought he was only kidding."

West is a TV character dreamed up by the producers of NBC's "Midnight Caller." But in this case, critics of the show argue, the producers let their imaginations stray too far afield.

"I would venture to guess that no woman in San Francisco (the show's location) or any other major city, is as stupid as Kelly West," Patrick Muteaney, a TV writer active in Project Inform, a major clearinghouse of AIDS data, wrote to the show's producers. "Straight San Francisco women do not take any implication of male bisexuality as a joke."

In the 1980s, acquired immune de-

ficiency syndrome has been the subject of endless TV documentaries and specials, even movies-of-the-week and after-school specials. Now the disease is becoming routine entertainment fare in sitcoms, daytime soap operas and action series like "Midnight Caller."

"You're starting to see it more and more," says Rox Wyman, NBC's director of community affairs. "It's a perfect example of how TV reflects reality."

Television does reflect reality, but it can also distort it. Critics contend that the episode of "Midnight Caller," scheduled for broadcast Tuesday, is a case in point.

AIDS groups have protested the episode since they obtained a copy of the script several weeks ago. Lorimar, the show's producer, agreed to a number of changes in the script but announced this week that the show would air without further revision, a decision that prompted new

objections from the AIDS community in San Francisco, where the show is filmed.

Hob Singer, the show's executive producer, says that the episode presents "a message of responsibility and caring. ... It's everyone's responsibility; it's not just a gay disease; it's in the fabric of American life."

While generally applauding the portrayal of the disease on TV shows, AIDS activists and public health officials are raising some concerns.

In "Midnight Caller," a character named Mike Barnes — the devil-may-care charmer who sleeps with Kelly West — knowingly exposes his lovers to the AIDS virus. While there have been rare cases of reckless spreading of the disease, none has occurred in San Francisco's gay

community, where health officials have "enormous powers of restraint," including the authority to incarcerate someone like Barnes, said Tom Peters, associate director of the city's Public Health Department.

Critics contend that because Barnes is tracked down by the show's hero, a radio talk show host, the episode leaves viewers with the impression that only vigilante action and not law enforcement can stop him.

Moreover, critics of the episode argue that it is unrealistic to show Barnes successfully operating today in San Francisco's gay community, where safe sex has become so prevalent that the rate of new infections of the AIDS-causing virus, HIV, is approaching zero, according to studies by the city's Public Health Department and UC San Francisco.

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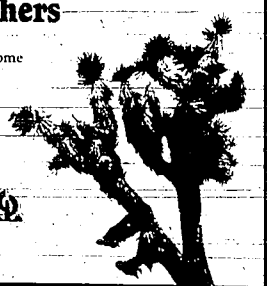
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Aykroyd, Basinger add sparkle to 'My Stepmother is an Alien'

HOLLYWOOD — "My Stepmother is an Alien" is a wild and wacky romantic comedy, rowdy and brash yet surprisingly tender. Dan Aykroyd and Kim Basinger match up like Laurel and Hardy: Big, bulky Aykroyd is the perfect comic foil for the sexy, madcap Basinger. Aykroyd is a workaholic scientist who taps into the energy generated by a thunder-and-lightning storm to send a radar signal that, unknown to him, zaps a planet in another galaxy, causing a gravity drain. The authorities on that planet dispatch Basinger post-haste, via flying saucer, to get their planet recharged within 24 hours.

Director Richard Benjamin and his four writers throw away this scientific mumbo jumbo just as soon as Basinger lands and heads for a party that Aykroyd is attending only at the insistence of his playboy brother (Jon Lovitz). Much of the film's humor derives from Basinger's hastily prepared backgrounding on humans and their ways.

But Basinger's Celeste is so alluring and amusing in her screwball, Cary Grant-like screwball antics that Aykroyd's long-winded Dr. Steve Mills, who has not had a date since March 1886, is swiftly smitten. So much so that by

the next morning Celeste and Steve are exchanging "I do's."

It is touching to watch Steve, who knows he is scarcely a Play-girl centerfold, falling head over heels in love with a creature as gorgeous as Celeste — just as it is to see Celeste gradually acquire humanity. Of course, we are told that life on her planet is boringly perfect, as it usually is in movie fantasy. Celeste therefore has a unique perspective on Steve, fully appreciating him as an unusually good and loving man.

It's too bad that Benjamin did not try for a lighter touch instead of the slam-bang, drive-home-the-yocks of "The Money Pit." To be sure, there are lots of special-effects gags, generated mainly by the odd creature that Celeste keeps in her magic purse as a kind of portable encyclopedia on humans. It is great fun to watch Celeste learning about kissing, pecking over Aykroyd's shoulder at a video history of the subject.

Even so, "My Stepmother Is an Alien" is solid, wide-appeal holiday fare. It makes the best use of Aykroyd's warm and proven talents in quite some time, and it does even more for Basinger, showing that she can be as funny and smart as she is sexy.

'Scrooged' satirizes Dickens but with heavy-handed skits

HOLLYWOOD — "Scrooged" is Dickens' "A Christmas Carol" transposed to modern times and to the zeitgeist world of network television. Actually it is not a bad notion for a satirical comedy and this one begins well, but then veers entirely out of hand; it is over-inflated as its own Ghost of Christmas Yet to Come and as funny as a mugging.

Scrooged is now Bill Murray's Frank Cross, the youngest network president in the history of television, the dumbest and probably the nastiest. In the film's high point, its opening few minutes, writers Mitch Glaser and Michael O'Donoghue have a lovely time previewing the Christmas lineup there at the IBC network, including "Bob Goulet's Cajun Christmas" and "The Night the Reindeer Died," at the hands of North Pole terrorists.

But the reecccceebly big show will be a live version of "A Christmas Carol," with Buddy Hackett as Scrooged and Mary Lou Retton, flip-flopping her way into the audience's heart as Tiny Tim.

The sheer, awful possibility of it all is what gives this skit its horrible fascination, but a skit is exactly what it is, the kind that Glaser and O'Donoghue hoped to merciless perfection on "Saturday Night Live." When you notice that the "Scroogettes," are actually the "Solid Gold" Dancers of beloved memory, you know that attention was being paid, all around (Wayne Finkelman did the costumes, some of the bandiest, funniest in years).

"Scrooged" is a mass of sharp, well-deserved paper cuts, beginning with the portrait of Murray, a televi-

sion mogul whose entire body of knowledge and references to life have come from the Golden Age of television, and worse. There is Robert Mitchum's Preston Rhineland, chairman of the network, who has insider information that cats and dogs are beginning to watch television. All he wants is to have characters sprinkled here and there, to take advantage of that information breakthrough: "A cop who dangles string." You know.

But these fifty details never expand into a smooth-moving whole; the laughs become sporadic, the undertone nastier and nastier. It botches out with a supposed moment of hilarity when Murray mistakes a man on fire for Richard Pryor, a scene made worse when you remember that Pryor and director Richard Donner once worked together, on "The Toy."

You will find a king's ransom of fine actors sprinkled throughout the movie: John Glover as a blond, suntanned breath of threat from the West Coast, poaching on Murray's territory; Michael J. Pollard and Anne Ramsey as denizens of a shelter for the homeless; the late John Houseman as the mellifluous program host; John Forsythe as what amounts to Marley's ghost. Wasted, all wasted, some of them under circumstances that make you squirm for them.

"Scrooged" also seems like a misreading of the qualities on which Murray built his career: the hipster's put-on, the pious mien of deep insincerity. Frank Cross is not insincere; he is really and truly a heartless, friendless, useless fleck of pond

scum. Wrong reading, guys. Because the framework of Dickens' original has not been altered, and Murray will have to convince us that his final regeneration is from the heart, things get even muddier. Now we have to believe Murray as earnest, sincere and completely reformed, while at any minute we expect him to roll his eyes upward and let us in on the gag.

Family special to be aired jointly in Soviet Union, United States

By EVAN LEVINE

Who has moved from running around the United Nations warbling "Doonaid," to starring in Broadway plays ("Social Security"), winning an Emmy ("Nobody's Child") and producing a revolutionary book and record for children ("Free to Be ... You and Me")? Why, it's That Girl!

That Woman, we should say. Long before actresses such as Cher were overcoming stereotyped images and emerging as respected actresses, Marlo Thomas was moving beyond her perky "That Girl!" sitcom stereotype. This week, she introduces her latest project: "Free to Be ... A Family," a sequel of sorts to the early 1970s "Free to Be ... You and Me" (ABC, Dec. 14). It places a special emphasis on the global family, focusing on the friendship between Soviet and American children.

"I was in Russia with Phil (husband Phil Donahue) when he shot his show there, and I suddenly got the idea for the project," says Thomas during a phone interview, in between trips to the editing room, where she was still working on the special. "I was thinking about these Russian kids, and I suddenly thought, 'Wouldn't it be great to do something really exciting, something different from the usual, ordinary kind of holiday special?'"

Out of that thought, the TV special

Chris Wallace moves to ABC

NEW YORK (AP) — NBC White House correspondent Chris Wallace is moving to ABC next month to help develop a new prime-time news program for the network on which he will be chief correspondent, ABC announced Tuesday.

Wallace had recently served as moderator of NBC's "Meet the Press." He is being replaced on that program by Garrick Utley, host of NBC's "Sunday Today," which is moving to Washington from New York.

Wallace's contract with NBC is up in January. ABC spokeswoman Jeanne Berg said ABC had reached an agreement with Wallace.

"Free to Be ... A Family" was born. "The response was kind of amazing," she admits. "The first time around, 16 years ago, hardly anyone wanted to do the project. Record companies weren't exactly breaking down our doors. This time, it was a little different."

This time, the special features Bon Jovi, Whoopi Goldberg, Robin Williams and Lily Tomlin. It's also the first time a prime-time special has been produced and aired jointly by broadcasters in both Russia and America.

"There are a lot of firsts," says Thomas. "One of the reasons I wanted to do this whole project (which also includes a book and a record album) was that many of the issues we deal with had never been touched before."

Thomas also wanted to break down the misconceptions that existed between Soviet and American children. "You wouldn't believe some of the things the kids thought," she says. "American kids thought that the KGB followed Russian kids home from school. The Russian kids thought the CIA was part of our lives, and that kids here could fire their teachers. The misconceptions were amazing."

So were the surprises. "I was surprised at how sophisticated their music is," she says. "I thought they'd still be doing the polka or that Russian dance where you fling your legs out. But their music was incredibly up to date. They also knew all about our music. They knew who Bon Jovi was, and they asked us, 'Which Russian rock stars do you like?' We couldn't name any."

In addition to music, both sets of children were interested in another topic: dating. "The Russian kids wanted to know all about kissing and where we went on dates," reports Thomas. "Kids on this end were also interested in family matters. One little girl said, 'Do you have divorce over there or do families stay together?' It was very touching."

Is there another "Free to Be" in the future? "I don't know," says Thomas with a laugh. "I'm not smart enough. I didn't even foresee this one."

distribution of the film, but failed. It's an R-rated movie, but definitely not X.

Q: John Lennon's murder seems to have affected all of the Beatles. Soon afterward, Ringo and his wife, Barbara Bach, signed themselves into a rehabilitation clinic, and one newspaper wrote that Ringo's drug and alcohol problems began when Lennon was killed. Is that possible? — D.J.

A: Ringo had problems long before John Lennon's death, and many insiders say they started when the Beatles were at the height of their fame. Ringo always felt he was the least talented of the group, and while the others were creating musical breakthroughs he was just a good drummer. Tony Barrow, who was the Beatles' press officer during their peak period, says, "Ringo was left out in the cold and only brought in when they needed permission."

Q: Do you think it's true that Jackie Collins, the author of best-selling novels, is delighted that her sister Joan, the actress, recently wrote a novel that has also become a best-seller? Seems to me that Joan, with a successful career of her own, shouldn't be poaching on her sister's territory. — D.D.

A: Never mind what you read in the papers: Jackie does resent Joan's moving into publishing. Fellow writer Judith Krantz put it succinctly: Stopping at by Jackie's table at an L.A. restaurant, Judith said to her, "If my sister wrote a book, I'd break her arm."

Q: There have been so many headlines about Tawana Brawley, the young girl who claimed she was kidnapped and raped. Will there be a book about the story? — A.L.

A: Yes. The first book to tell the inside story of the Brawley brouhaha is scheduled to be published by Harcourt Brace Jovanovich in April 1989. Written by the well-known television journalist Mike Taibbi, it's tentatively titled "Just Work the Story."

Q: I just read the Pulitzer Prize-winning play by David Mamet, "Glengarry Glen Ross," which I understand is being made into a film. How does anyone go about choosing actors for these demanding roles? — T.Q.

A: According to producer Jerry Tokofsky, who is readying a film version of "Glengarry," the kind of actors he'll be looking for to play Mamet's real-estate salesmen will not be "the kind of actor who can sell you the Brooklyn Bridge. I want the kind of actor who can sell you a condo in downtown Beirut and convince you you've bought a \$10-million co-op on Fifth Avenue."

A: Though "Alien Nation" is a science fiction thriller, the production team wanted to avoid the sci-fi movie standbys of ape-people, insect-people, lizard-people, etc. Since humans come in assorted shapes and sizes, the makeup creators decided that the same goes for aliens. Complex facial masks were developed to be worn by Mandy Patinkin, Terence Stamp and other leading characters. The most sophisticated of these, each designed with a specific expression for maximum realism, were shown-in-clos-ups. Each sculpted mask consisted of a padded skullcap on which were layered six foam latex pieces carefully glued to the actor's face to create flexibility of movement. In the final applications, skin tone and tufts of hair were added. Poor actors — it took four hours to do each performer.

Q: In a recent column you mentioned that Paul McCartney's daughter Stella spent last summer working in Paris for the French designer Christian Lacroix. We were struck by the fact that pictures of Paul's four children are never published. Is that deliberate? — G.O.

A: Very much so. Paul is deathly afraid of kidnapers and doesn't want the faces of his three daughters and young son to be well known. Since the 1980 murder of John Lennon, Paul has pulled a tight curtain around his family. His country farm is surrounded by electric fencing and protected by 24-hour video surveillance.

Locals clam up when anyone asks questions about the family. The polite, sympathetic to Paul's fears, have an emergency plan to seal off the nearby airport and all roads leading from the district in minutes.

Q: Is Hedy Lamarr, that legendary Hollywood sexpot, still alive? — W.B.

A: Yes, Hedy, born Hedwig Kiesler in Vienna in 1915, is one of the genuine luminaries of Hollywood's golden era. She made her mark in the 1940s with her appearance in a flick called "Ecstasy," which included a brief nude swimming scene. My Hollywood spies tell me with a straight face that Hedy has been turning down comeback offers for nearly two decades. Now, we hear, the 74-year-old actress will make a flick titled "Diamonds," in which she will sing onscreen for the first time.

Q: Is it true that the publication of pictures of Vanessa Williams posing nude with another woman ruined the former Miss America's chances for a movie career? — D.J.

A: Bite your tongue. Those infamous nude pictures did bring Vanessa what she terms "miles of bad road." But she's survived and prospered. Vanessa is a mother, a singer and an actress. At the moment her vocal career is taking off, and she's ecstatic that her first record album, "The Right Stuff," is climbing the sales charts.

The album's third song, "Dreaming," will soon be released as a single. Her good fortune is a lot more than Vanessa dared to dream about two years ago.

Q: What about the amazing Wallace family of writers? I haven't seen a new book from them recently. — R.L.

A: The Wallaces are certainly not resting on their laurels — each of them has at least one book in the works. Patriarch Irving has two sizzling page-turners due: "The Guest of Honor," about a U.S. president who falls in love with the head of another country, and "The Golden Room," about those celebrated lurid ladies, the Everleigh Sisters, who ran the poshest bordello in Chicago in the early 1900s. Son David Wallacehinsky recently returned from a stint as an NBC reporter at the Seoul Olympics, and his book, "The Complete Book of the Olympics," is a big seller. Irving's wife, Sylvia, is putting the finishing touches to another novel, "The City of Women," about L.A. Their daughter, Amy Wallace, has finished her first non-fiction tome, as yet untitled.

Q: I was intrigued by "A Cry in the Dark," the real-life drama of an Australian woman (played by Meryl Streep) whose baby was snatched from a campsite and killed, apparently by a wild dog called the dingo. Are these animals really vicious? — I.S.

A: Dingoes look cute but can be ter-

ribly dangerous. Aborigines have often reported dingoes making off with their babies. "People often think that dingoes are probably harmless, victims of fanciful stories," says Verity Lambert, the film's producer. "Apparently, they're unaware that these creatures eat live animals to survive, and infants and rabbits are indistinguishable to them."

Q: A profile of Angela Lansbury and her TV series, "Murder, She Wrote," claimed that the mystery-detective field was new to her. Hasn't she appeared in a movie mystery or two? — H.C.

A: Or three or four or more. Angela indeed had sleuthing experience long before her TV series. Her movie debut was in "Gaslight," a memorable thriller; and "Kind Lady," "Remains To Be Seen," and "Please Murder Me" were all variations on the chiller and whodunnit genres. Most significantly, Angela portrayed Agatha Christie's famed amateur private eye, Miss Marple, in "The Mirror Crack'd," a choice role which I assume was the inspiration for her choice as Jessica Fletcher in "Murder, She Wrote."

Q: As a deaf woman my idol is Marlee Matlin, the deaf actress who won an Oscar for her performance in "Children of a Lesser God." Does she have any new movies coming up? — F.L.

A: Marlee will make her TV debut in "Bridge to Silence" as a hearing impaired woman whose husband is killed in a tragic accident.

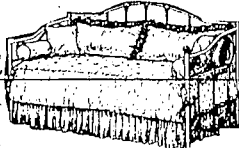

Cronkite: 50 years in journalism

NEW YORK — The occasion was a black-tie tribute to Walter Cronkite. He used part of it to take a whack at syndicated, sensationalist talk and feature programs in the category known as tabloid TV.

One should not be alarmed at change in TV, he said, but "I'm horrified at the proliferation of tabloid journalism" in TV and "rather horrified to see some of our network stations picking up this junk."

Still, "honest journalism will always win out," the former "CBS Evening News" anchorman said, praising his successor, Dan Rather, and anchors Tom Brokaw of NBC, Peter Jennings of ABC and Bernard Shaw of Cable News Network "because they are journalists...."

He seemed close to tears as he honored the memory of his late friend and CBS colleague, Burton Benjamin, who died this fall of a brain tumor. Benjamin's widow, Aline, sat at Cronkite's dinner table, watching and listening intently.

That is the way it was Monday, Dec. 5, as some 300 friends and colleagues of Cronkite gathered at a Museum of Broadcasting dinner saluting him and his 50 years in journalism, 38 of which have been spent at CBS News.

It was a night filled with praise, imtratural jesting and friendly barbs at and from Cronkite, 72, who in October signed a new CBS contract that allows him to do some outside news and entertainment work, save at rivals NBC and ABC.

No less than 14 speakers, orating in three shifts between dinner courses, hailed him. They included CBS founder William S. Paley, publishing tycoon Malcom Forbes, Lesley Stahl and TV's top quartet of network anchors.

Rather, who succeeded Cronkite at the "CBS Evening News" in 1982, took the formal approach, saying there isn't a journalist around who doesn't admire Cronkite's "courageous and brilliant on-going career...."

Two "60 Minutes" stars laced their praise with varied memories

of Life With Walter.

Mike Wallace recalled how, during the 1968 Democratic convention, he and his fellow CBS floor correspondents grumbled that anchorman Cronkite would not give them air time, kept talking and was a "mike hog."

Merely Safer spoke of the night in London when, as he and Cronkite rode about at 1 a.m. in an open Bentley, Cronkite did a memorable imitation of the Queen Mother.

Cronkite returned the friendly fire. "I was doing DeGaulle," he informed Safer. To Wallace, he said this: "Mike, the reason I kept the microphone is" — a pause — "that I knew more than you did."

Cronkite, who has interviewed every United States president since Harry S. Truman, got a letter of praise from the current one.

In the letter, read by Museum of Broadcasting chief Robert Batscha, President Reagan recalled and repeated what he had said to Cronkite when the veteran newsmen interviewed him in 1981:

"You're a pro."

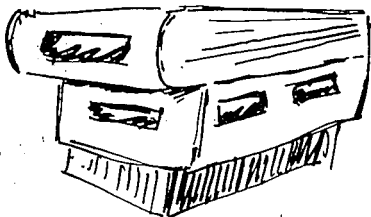

'CBS This Morning survives 1 long year

NEW YORK — It is official: "CBS This Morning," the latest in a long line of CBS efforts to compete at-noon with NBC's "Today" show and ABC's "Good Morning America," has lasted a year.

Co-anchors Harry Smith and Kathleen Sullivan are still there. So are weatherman-music reporter Mark McEwen, medical correspondent Bob Arnot, and executive producer David Corvo.

No one has quit, been fired, or written a nasty insider's book about the program. There are no rumors that the program will be taken off the air.

All this is remarkable because, like most previous CBS offerings at reveille, "CBS This Morning" is a distant third in the ratings.

"I really think it's the best of the three morning shows. ... I think they're on the right track," says Paul Raymon, general manager of CBS affiliate WAGA-TV in Atlanta.

For him to say that is something. He was so displeased with the program's low-rated predecessor last year that he dumped it and substituted his own home-grown morning show, a blend of local and syndicated fare.

The object of his ire: The short-lived, 90-minute "The Morning Show," which, with actress Mariette Hartley and Rolland Smith co-hosting, set out to find a new audience, one more attuned to entertainment than news. Unlike previous CBS morning shows, it was produced outside the news division.

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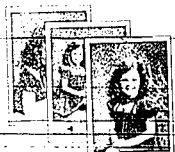

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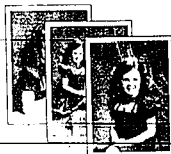
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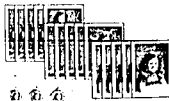

Producers blame ratings on time slots

HOLLYWOOD — Kevin Sullivan, executive producer of ABC's new series "Knightwatch," was thrilled last summer when the network told him that his program, a youth-appeal show about a group of hip young urban crime fighters, had been picked up for fall.

That thrill faded somewhat, Sullivan admits, when he discovered that ABC had scheduled "Knightwatch" in prime-time's deadliest time slot — opposite NBC's top-rated "Cosby Show" Thursdays nights.

"We made our debut (Nov. 10) against a (one-hour) Cosby special," Sullivan said in a recent telephone conversation. "We got creamed. I wanted to call up Bill and say, 'Yo — what are you doing to us?'"

"What are you doing to us?" might be an appropriate refrain for a number of this fall's new TV series, currently floundering in the ratings as they struggle to find an audience in the competitive first weeks of the television season.

Producers of these shows most often blame bad time slots for the poor ratings. Other explanations include competition from cable and videocassettes, production delays caused by last summer's 154-day Writers' Guild of America strike, inadequate promotion, the presidential elections, Olympic Games,

holiday specials and the fickle perversity of the American viewing public.

None has suggested this possibility: the show is bad.

Whatever the reason, some of this year's new shows are, like "Knightwatch," getting creamed in the ratings — and may face the axe soon if their numbers do not improve.

Included on the list: CBS' family Western "Paradise" (which ranks 55th among the 72 prime-time series that have aired on the three networks this season); NBC's "Tattler's," a sophisticated drama about a New York restaurateur created by the producers of "St. Elsewhere" (57); ABC's reality show "Incredible Sunday" (59); NBC's "Something Is Out There" (61); CBS' adaptation of the film "Dirty Dancing" (62); CBS' Mary Tyler Moore vehicle "Annie McGuire" (64); CBS' "The Van Dyke Show" (65); ABC's "Knightwatch" (70) and the CBS comedy "Raising Miranda," dead last in 72nd place.

Although all three networks are represented in the Bottom 10 of the season-to-date Nielsen ratings, a disproportionate number of those shows, not surprisingly, are on No. 3-network CBS. The network does not have enough big hits on the schedule to provide all the new shows with protected time slots.

Robert Ulrich of "Spenser: For Hire" plays the agent and Erik Estrada of "CHiPs" is on hand as Birney's former partner.

Ed Ames, who used to play Daniel Boone's sidekick, is cast as a sheriff in the Dec. 20 episode of

"In the Heat of the Night" on NBC. The story hinges on suspicions that Ames' character, a friend of the lawman played by Carroll O'Connor, may be brutalizing jail prisoners.

Suzanne Pleshette has joined the cast of "Nightingales," a mid-season series for NBC that focuses on a group of student nurses. She will play the nurses' director.
