# Kemp choice for HUD secretary

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush will name one-time rival Rep. Jack Kemp of New York as secretary of housing and urban development and was poised to make a decision on former Sen. John Tower as defense secretary, sources said Thursday.

Sources close to both Kemp and the vice president said Kemp had accepted the job after meeting with Bush on Wednesday and that the HUD announcement could come either today or Monday.

Meanwhile, Tower was tentatively to take over Bush today. A final decision on Tower is expected to be made by the end of the week.

Kemp had backed for housing vouchers for the poor and allowing

the vice president on Thursday.

Transition officials, who spoke on the condition of anonymity, said the lengthy background check did not uncover any problems that would hurt Tower's chances for Senate confirmation.

Kemp, 53, a former professional football quarterback who has championed conservative causes, was a distant also-ran in the Republican primaries last winter. He was an original sponsor of the 1981 tax-cut legislation later endorsed by President Reagan and is an ardent advocate of free enterprise and government deregulation.

Kemp has backed for housing vouchers for the poor and allowing

tenants of public housing to purchase their units at low cost as part of his urban redevelopment proposals.

Meanwhile, Bush moved closer to filling two other Cabinet appointments, transition sources said.

Bush met privately with Dr. Louis Sullivan, a black medical school chief and contender for secretary of health and human services, and was on the verge of naming Samuel Skinner as secretary of transportation, according to the sources.

Gary MacDougal, a Chicago business executive and Bush transition adviser, also has emerged as a top candidate for secretary of labor, sources said.

and berated his guests and callers.

Some of Koutnik's renowned guests over the years included civil-rights activist Eldridge Cleaver, Jody Powell, press secretary for President Jimmy Carter; a Playboy centerfold; and Lawrence Peter, author of the "Peter Principle."

Koutnik's main criterion for guests was that "they not be boring." Even without a guest, he was entertained enough with his sidekick, Karla the sound engineer, trying to

keep him in line.

"The show was done live, so salty remarks, whether by Koutnik or his guests, flouted over the airwaves with the rest of the banter."

Radio talk shows are in vogue now, Hartgen said. "In a bigger market I think he would have been enormously successful."

He was the son of a Nampa railroad employee who was active in unions and Democratic Party politics. Koutnik, though, was an active Republican.

But he said himself that he was no demagogue, an opinion shared by his many varied friends.

In a Times-News interview several years ago, he said when he first came to Twin Falls he "may have attended a couple of Young Democrats meetings."

"Around here," he said laughing, "that's like going to a Communist cell meeting. These things come back to haunt you 30 years later."

for 20 years, said, "I've said it before so I guess I can say it in his absence: He was a man who was not always right, but he was seldom in doubt. He had an opinion about everything."

"I'm going to miss him as a friend and as an adversary. We didn't always agree, but we were always able to hammer things out. Whether or not you agreed with the man, he forced you to think."

He was a leader in real estate organizations, the Elks, the Masons, Rotary Club, Toastmasters and the Chamber.

He had two sons, Gary of Twin Falls and Brett Michael of Smyrna, Ga. He had one granddaughter and two grandsons.

In many ways, L. James Koutnik was the same way poet Robert Frost described himself: "He had a lover's quarrel with the world."

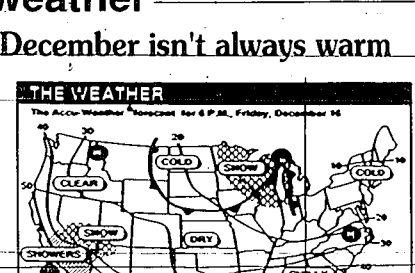
## Sunshine in December isn't always warm

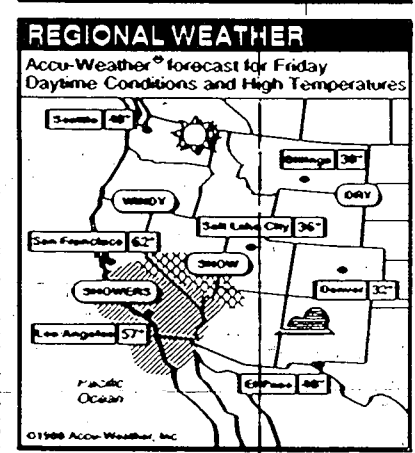

Interior and Agriculture agencies should make sure that fire management plans conform to departmental policies, that employees understand the policies, that everybody is using a common vocabulary and that agencies have agreed beforehand what to do if fires threaten to move across administrative boundaries, the report said.

There were conflicts in Yellowstone because of different understandings of so-called "light on the land" techniques — for example, whether that phrase permitted use of bulldozers.

In a sentence that did not appear in the summary, the report said, "No prescribed natural fires are to be allowed until fire management plans meet these standards."

In the departments' jargon, there are two kinds of "prescribed" fires — the kind humans set deliberately for land management purposes and the kind nature sets, which are called "prescribed natural fires."

According to the report, some fire management plans did not spell out the conditions under which natural fires would be allowed to burn, did not consider values at risk outside of parks and wilderness and the number of fires that can be managed at one time, and "cumulative effects of drought."

Officials have said they were lulled into a false sense of security last summer because May and June had higher-than-normal rainfall in Yellowstone.

Dennis Galvin, deputy director of the park service, said his agency had had the report for 24 hours, and would be submitting comments to the two secretaries like everybody else.

"I don't see it as a magic shield," Galvin said. "It's clear we'll do more around developed areas" in deliberately set fires to clear firebreaks or other techniques. The recommendation that there be more regional coordination seems to me a sound one. Fire... is really no respecter of administrative boundaries," he said.

In smaller hospitals, mortality rates may seem exaggerated, Haines said. "Nearly half of Idaho's hospitals are have fewer than 50 beds, she said. If only two patients are diagnosed with a disease but both of them die, that translates as a 100 percent death rate, according to Haines.

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# Gem schools sign up for geography bee

BLACKFOOT (AP) — Which continent contains no countries? Where is the rainiest spot in the 48 contiguous states? What natural hazard causes the most damage in Colorado and Switzerland? What type of fencing ended the open range in the West?

If your child has trouble answering some of these questions so do thousands of other American youth. That fact was recently revealed by a Gallup Poll commissioned by the National Geographic Society. American students 18-24 scored poorly in comparison to youths from nine countries.

"For a long time, we've been aware of a lack of knowledge among students and adults," says Barbara Hand, public relations specialist with the National Geographic Society, Washington, D.C. "But Americans came in last in the poll, even behind third world countries."

The results prompted the society to devise and sponsor a bee for students in grades 4 through 8. To date, 25 percent of all schools invited to participate have signed up. Some 129 Idaho schools are signed up, says George Gates, associate professor of education at Idaho State University and Idaho's National Geography Bee liaison. More are expected to register by the deadline Tuesday.

Schools ready to participate include 13 in southeast Idaho, 16 in the Snake River Valley, 15 in the Magic Valley, 21 in the Boise area and 12 in the Coeur d'Alene area.

The decline in performance is attributed to combining geography and social studies into one curriculum. "It used to be everyone took geography classes," Ms. Hand says. "Now

most states have merged the two with geography getting lost in the curriculum."

Beginning the week of Jan. 9, students will compete against classmates by answering questions with one word or a short phrase.

"The bee's focus encompasses not only places in the world, but also the many cultures and people that inhabit our globe. It's not just old memorization about the various products a country produces," Ms. Hand says.

Winners from each class will compete in all-school competition. In the final stage of local competition, each school winner takes a written test to be mailed to the society for review.

Winners from the states and territories will travel to the society's headquarters in Washington D.C. May 18-19.

The first place winner will receive

a \$25,000 college scholarship and \$1,000 in maps and materials for their school. Second place is a \$15,000 scholarship and \$750 in materials. Third place is a \$10,000 scholarship and \$500 in educational materials.

"Our hope is that more students and teachers will get excited about learning and teaching geography," Ms. Hand says. "People were hesitant at first about the bee, but we're thrilled with the number of schools that are participating."

Blackfoot School District 55 Superintendent Daniel Schartz became interested in the competition when his daughter took a sample test.

## Boise OKs agreement over geothermal heat

BOISE (AP) — The city of Boise and the Warm Springs Water District have reached an agreement that at least temporarily heads off a lawsuit over the rights to use an underground pool of geothermal water.

As a result, 200 homes along Boise's Warm Springs Avenue will be guaranteed enough natural hot water to heat their homes this winter.

Boise Public Works director Bill Ansell said Wednesday that a \$16,000 link between the two systems will be built at city expense as a backup water supply for Warm Springs.

The district has claimed that the city's system has depleted the geothermal aquifer since it began pumping in 1983 to heat Boise City Hall and other large buildings.

Boise previously offered to sell water to the Warm Springs district because of the pressure problem, but the district declined.

Concern about the dropping geothermal water level prompted the state Department of Water Resources to restrict further development of the aquifer.

## Kerr-McGee plant undergoes 30% expansion

SODA SPRINGS (AP) — Kerr-McGee Chemical Corp.'s vanadium extraction plant near here is undergoing a 30 percent expansion that will boost production capacity to 4.3 million pounds per year.

The project, started last September, is expected to be completed next September and will allow the plant to process an additional one million pounds of vanadium pentoxide. It's used in the manufacture of ferrovanadium and vanadium aluminum — steel and titanium alloys.

Corporate officials decline to disclose project cost. Plant Manager Robert Griffin estimates 10 more employees will be hired. Kerr-McGee currently employs 52 company and contractor personnel.

The plant has been operating across from Monsanto's much larger elemental phosphorus complex since 1983, recovering vanadium byproduct from waste slag generated by Monsanto's three massive electric furnaces. Vanadium is used to bond metals.

## ISU students to pay \$12 health fee

POCATELLO (AP) — Starting next month, Idaho State University students will pay \$12 per semester more for student health insurance, thanks to a new federal law.

But ISU officials don't think the increase will force the estimated 1,550 students who now own policies to drop coverage. As part of the Civil Rights Restoration Act passed by Congress in March, the university is forced to offer full maternity benefits to students.

Brigham Young University and Ricks College in Rexburg, operated by the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, have filed for exemp-

tions from the law. They claim that providing maternity care for single women would violate religious beliefs of the LDS Church.

The current policy pays no more than \$1,000 for deliveries. Under the new plan, the student would pay a \$100 deductible, then the policy would cover 80 percent of the cost of a delivery up to \$10,000.

Nolan Hoffer, student president, said he doesn't believe the increase in premiums—from \$112 to \$124 per semester—will discourage students from buying insurance.

"If it goes up the following semester, it might," said Hoffer. "But

not this semester. I don't think it (the hike) is significant."

About 27 percent of ISU students buy the health insurance. Many students are covered by their parents' policies. But Ruth Anne LeFevre, ISU student health insurance coordinator, estimates at least 300 students have no insurance at all.

The federal legislation requires that student health insurance programs treat pregnancies the same as any illness. Any university that does not comply with the law could have all federal funds cut off.

In wake of the new requirements, some universities and colleges have dropped their insurance programs. Educators and some insurance company officials estimate premiums could rise from 16 percent to 25 percent to cover the cost of expanding coverage.

Gary MacDougal, a Chicago business executive and Bush transition adviser, also has emerged as a top candidate for secretary of labor, sources said.

and berated his guests and callers.

On "Party Line" he was a "gadfly" and "no-holds barred," said Hartgen, who was on the show many times.

"He stated things in fairly bald terms, and he didn't have any hesitation about cutting off the kooks when they got out of hand."

He often raised subjects that were uncomfortable, and he never missed a trick. When something became a public issue, he got it on his show. He would rattle it in.

Hartgen added, "It was his personality that made his show the talk of the valley. It was the L. James spark and his irascible nature."

The show had superb ratings. Some of Koutnik's renowned guests over the years included civil-rights activist Eldridge Cleaver; Jody Powell, press secretary for President Jimmy Carter; a Playboy centerfold; and Lawrence Peter, author of the "Peter Principle."

Koutnik's main criterion for guests was that "they not be boring." Even without a guest, he was entertainment enough with his sidekick, Karla the sound engineer, trying to

keep him in line.

The show was done live, so salty remarks, whether by Koutnik or his guests, floated over the "airwaves" with the rest of the biter.

Radio talk shows are in vogue now, Hartgen said. "In a bigger market I think he would have been enormously successful."

He was the son of a Nampa railroad employe who was active in unions and Democratic Party politics. Koutnik, though, was an active Republican.

But he said himself that he was no demagogue, an opinion shared by his many varied friends.

In a Times-News interview several years ago, he said when he first came to Twin Falls he "may have attended a couple of Young Democrats meetings."

"Around here," he said, laughing, "that's like going to a Communist cell meeting. These things come back to haunt you 30 years later."

for 20 years, said, "I've said it before so I guess I can say it in his absence: He was a man who was not always right, but he was seldom in doubt. He had an opinion about everything."

"I'm going to miss him as a friend and as an adversary. We didn't always agree, but we were always able to hammer things out. Whether or not you agreed with the man, he forced you to think."

His first name was Louis, named for his father, but the only part of it he liked was the L. He was born in 1921 in Fort Dodge, Iowa, and was raised in Nampa. He attended the College of Idaho and graduated from the University of Idaho with a business degree. He was an Air Force pilot in World War II, flying bombing missions over Japan. He was shot down once and received a Purple Heart and the Distinguished Flying Cross.

He married Ruby Laverne Davis in 1944. He moved to Twin Falls in 1948.

In addition to his talk show, he owned Coldwell Banker Western Realty with his long-time friend Donna Buch. He was active in the Air Force Reserve, and recently retired as a lieutenant colonel. He was a leader in real estate organizations, the Elks, the Masons, Rotary Club, Toastmasters and the Chamber.

He had two sons, Gary of Twin Falls and Brett Michael of Smyrna, Ga. He had one granddaughter and two grandsons.

In many ways, L. James Koutnik was the same way poet Robert Frost described himself: "He had a lover's quarrel with the world."

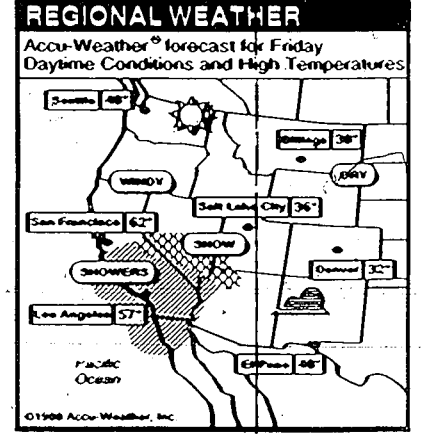
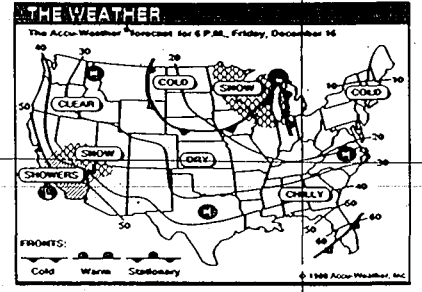

Interior and Agriculture agencies should make sure that fire management plans conform to departmental policies, that employees understand the policies, that everybody is using a common vocabulary and that agencies have agreed beforehand what to do if fires threaten to move across administrative boundaries, the report said.

There were conflicts in Yellowstone because of different understandings of so-called "light on the land" techniques — for example, whether that phrase permitted use of bulldozers.

In a sentence that did not appear in the summary, the report said, "No prescribed natural fires are to be allowed until fire management plans meet these standards."

In the departments' jargon, there are two kinds of "prescribed" fires — the kind humans set deliberately for land management purposes and the kind nature sets, which are called "prescribed natural fires."

According to the report, some fire management plans did not spell out the conditions under which natural fires would be allowed to burn, did not consider "values at risk outside of parks and wilderness and the number of fires that can be managed at one time," and "cumulative effects of drought."

Officials have said they were lured into a false sense of security last summer because May and June had higher-than-normal rainfall in Yellowstone.

Denis Galvin, deputy director of the park service, said his agency had had the report for 24 hours, and would be submitting comments to the two secretaries like everybody else.

the expected death rates among Medicare patients, and 75 of them have exceeded expected death rates for two years in a row, Roper said.

California and Texas were the only states to have more than 25 hospitals that exceeded the expected death rates. New York state has 11 above the expected limits, nine of them in New York City.

The New England region had the

fewest hospitals above the expected death rate with only three, including a Connecticut hospice where patients go to die.

Many less populated states had no hospitals exceeding the expected death rate. Those included Vermont, New Hampshire, Rhode Island, Maine, South Dakota, Montana and Iowa. By contrast, Puerto Rico had 10 hospitals above the expected death rate.

the Idaho Hospital Association.

"This just tells you mortality, it doesn't measure quality, and for that reason it is not as useful as it could be," Haines said.

In smaller hospitals, mortality rates may seem exaggerated, Haines said. Nearly half of Idaho's hospitals are fewer than 50 beds, she said. If only two patients are diagnosed with a disease but both of them die, that translates as a 100 percent death rate, according to Haines.

"If you had a sample size of a hundred or a thousand patients, the chances that a number of patients might survive is higher," Haines said.

Another aspect of the report that many hospital administrators criticized was the inclusion of deaths that occurred within 30 days of the patient's discharge from the hospital, regardless of cause of death.

For example, if a discharged cardiac patient was killed in an accident within 30 days, his death would be included in mortality figures for heart disease.

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# Gem schools sign up for geography bee

BLACKFOOT (AP) — Which continent contains no countries? Where is the rainiest spot in the 48 contiguous states? What natural hazard causes the most damage in Colorado and Switzerland? What type of fencing ended the open range in the West? If your child has trouble answering some of these questions so do thousands of other American youth that fact was recently revealed by a Gallup Poll commissioned by the National Geographic Society. American students 18-24 scored poorly in comparison to youths from nine countries. —For a long time, we've been aware of a lack of knowledge among students and adults," says Barbara Hand, public relations specialist with the National Geographic Society, Washington, D.C. "But Americans came in last in the poll, even

behind third world countries." The results prompted the society to devise and sponsor a bee for students in grades 4 through 8. To date, 25 percent of all schools invited to participate have signed up. Some 129 Idaho schools are signed up, says George Kates, associate professor of education at Idaho State University and Idaho's National Geography Bee liaison. More are expected to register by the deadline Tuesday. Schools ready to participate include 13 in southeast Idaho, 16 in the Snake River Valley, 15 in the Magic Valley, 21 in the Boise area and 12 in the Coeur d'Alene area. The decline in performance is attributed to combining geography and social studies into one curriculum. "It used to be everyone took geography classes," Ms. Hand says. "Now

most states have merged the two with geography getting lost in the curriculum. Beginning the week of Jan. 9, students will compete against classmates by answering questions with one word or a short phrase. "The bee's focus encompasses not only places in the world, but also the many cultures and people that inhabit our globe. It's not just dull memorization about the various products a country produces," Ms. Hand says. Winners from each class will compete in all-school competition. In the final stage of local competition, each school winner takes a written test to be mailed to the society for review. Winners from the states and territories will travel to the society's headquarters in Washington, D.C. May 18-19. The first place winner will receive

a \$25,000 college scholarship and \$1,000 in maps and materials for their school. Second place is a \$15,000 scholarship and \$750 in materials. Third place is a \$10,000 scholarship and \$500 in educational materials. "Our hope is that more students and teachers will get excited about learning and teaching geography," Ms. Hand says. "People were hesitant at first about the bee, but we've been thrilled with the number of schools that are participating." Blackfoot School District 55 Superintendent Daniel Schartz became interested in the competition when his daughter took a sample test.

## Kerr-McGee plant undergoes 30% expansion

SODA SPRINGS (AP) — Corporate officials decline to disclose project cost. Plant Manager Robert Griffin estimates 10 more employees will be hired. Kerr-McGee currently employs 52 company and contractor personnel. The plant, started last September, is expected to be completed next September and will allow the plant to process an additional one million pounds of vanadium pentoxide. It's used in the manufacture of ferrovanadium and vanadium aluminum — steel and titanium alloys. Vanadium is used to bond metals.

## ISU students to pay \$12 health fee

POCATELLO (AP) — Starting next month, Idaho State University students will pay \$12 per semester more for student health insurance, thanks to a new federal law. But ISU officials don't think the increase will force the estimated 1,550 students who now own policies to drop coverage. As part of the Civil Rights Restoration Act passed by Congress in March, the university is forced to offer full maternity benefits to students. Brigham Young University and Ricks College in Rexburg, operated by the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, have filed for exemp-

tions from the law. They claim that providing maternity care for single women would violate religious beliefs of the LDS Church. The current policy pays no more than \$1,000 for deliveries. Under the new plan, the student would pay a \$100 deductible, then the policy would cover 80 percent of the cost of a delivery up to \$10,000. Nolan Hoffer, student president, said he doesn't believe the increase in premium—from \$112 to \$124 per semester will discourage students from buying insurance. "If it goes up the following semester, it might," said Hoffer. "But

not this semester. I don't think it (the hike) is significant." About 27 percent of ISU students buy the health insurance. Many students are covered by their parents' policies. But Ruth Anne LeFevre, ISU student health insurance coordinator, estimates at least 300 students have no insurance at all. The federal legislation requires that student health insurance programs treat pregnancies the same as any illness. Any university that does not comply with the law could have all federal funds cut off. In wake of the new requirements, some universities and colleges have dropped their insurance programs. Educators and some insurance company officials estimate premiums could rise from 16 percent to 25 percent to cover the cost of expanding coverage.

## Boise OKs agreement over geothermal heat

BOISE (AP) — The city of Boise and the Warm Springs Water District have reached an agreement that at least temporarily heads off a lawsuit over the rights to use an underground pool of geothermal water. As a result, 300 homes along Boise's Warm Springs Avenue will be guaranteed enough natural hot water to heat their homes this winter. Boise Public Works director Bill Ansell said Wednesday that a \$16,000 link between the two systems will be built at city expense as a backup water supply for Warm Springs. The district has claimed that the city's system has depleted the geothermal aquifer since it began pumping in 1983 to heat Boise City Hall and other large buildings. Boise previously offered to sell water to the Warm Springs district because of the pressure problem, but the district declined. Concern about the dropping geothermal water level prompted the state Department of Water Resources to restrict further development of the aquifer.

## Make haste slowly with Gorbachev's plans

WASHINGTON — Western military strategists for years have labored under a common fear. Peering through a glass darkly, they have envisioned a Soviet blitzkrieg launched across the central front of Western Europe, severely challenging the West's resolve and ability to resist successfully.

A far different invasion scenario was presented to the world last week by Mikhail Gorbachev, affectionately dubbed "Big Red" by New Yorkers. He came to the United Nations, saw Lady Liberty and compared, not only prime time, but the hearts of millions the world over. He spoke in grand terms — unity in diversity, "freedom of choice," the bell of conflict tolling for all — earning him plaudits as a bold, courageous visionary.

Critics grouched that much of his speech was public relations gabflog. How generous of him to offer to convert his violation of the ABM Treaty (the Krasnoyarsk radar) into a peace-loving space observation facility and to forgive Third World debts to America. What gall to try to salvage half a victory in Afghanistan after suffering total defeat. And ...

But Gorbachev's announcement that the Soviet Union would reduce its men under arms by 500,000 and cut six tank divisions in Eastern Europe along with 50,000 troops cannot be dismissed so easily. Of course, the Soviet economy is in shambles, and, yes, the size of its military forces and weight of defense expenditures threaten to pull it down like an aging beast into the primordial ooze (assuming the West remains strong). Nevertheless, Gorbachev's unilateral decision, provided deeds follow words, struck many as being genuine and generous. Pressure is now being generated for President-elect George Bush to reciprocate

with a comparable proposal to keep the peace train rolling.

How should the West respond? Two dictums come to mind: seize the day, and make haste slowly.

Gorbachev correctly stated that the history of superpower relations has been one of missed opportunities. Time and again, we have turned away from chances to limit the expansion of nuclear arsenals. Suspicious of each other's motives and expectant of scientific breakthroughs, we opted instead to climb technology's ladder to higher levels of terror.

Gorbachev has presented an opportunity to seize his initiative and use it as a lever to produce a less threatening, more stable and positive relationship. But while grateful for a unilateral step long overdue, we must remain guarded as well.

First, we must resist the temptation to make a reciprocal gesture in the form of troop and equipment cuts in Europe at this time. Assuming that the Soviet action will reduce its conventional force advantage in Europe from a 3-to-1 ratio (a Rand Corporation study shows the disparity in some categories is as much as 5 to 1) to a 2½-to-1 or 2-to-1 preponderance, it would be the height of folly for the West to respond with cuts that would push the advantage back up to, say, 3 to 1 at only slightly reduced force levels.

Second, we must ask:  
•What tanks will be eliminated?  
•Will they be destroyed or simply removed, so they might return another day?  
•How will these reductions be verified and monitored?  
•Must our satellites' eyes — already strained from all-night reading — be called upon to do even

more?  
•What precisely does Gorbachev mean by "reconfigured forces for defensive sufficiency"?

Third, while we welcome Gorbachev's announcement of unilateral reductions, we should demand an open and accurate exchange of data pertaining to force structure, equipment and material before negotiating further reductions. One can find as many different "authoritative" estimates of force ratios as there are strategic study institutes on this planet. It is imperative that the Soviet Union, under its policy of glasnost, be as eager to disclose its military capabilities as it is to display its internal disorders and economic afflictions.

NATO cannot hope to achieve

equal numerical levels with Soviet and Warsaw Pact forces (nor should it), but it is essential that we have an accurate base-line count before we negotiate reductions that will produce a level of parity, or rough equivalence, necessary for "defensive sufficiency" on both sides.

Fourth, West European public opinion may demand that NATO display a measure of reciprocal good faith before negotiations resume. It is futile to protest that we unilaterally removed 2,400 battlefield nuclear weapons from NATO soil in the past decade and received not a hand-clap in the United Nations or an honorable mention in Pravda. Ironically, while the West is being urged to do something, Gorbachev will have produced important dividends for the

Warsaw Pact if we do nothing. A failure to follow through with the need to upgrade and modernize NATO forces will undermine the credibility of its deterrent. If pressure from the Bush administration must be forthcoming, we must be sure they serve the West's security interests, not the East's.

Finally, we must remain mindful that decisions in Moscow are not cut in granite. Today's promises may be tomorrow's rewritten history. The only major Soviet leader who has escaped the recriminations of his successors has been Lenin. Tanks and troops can return to pact countries to maintain domestic order or military readiness and intimidation. But what is done in NATO could well be irreversible. Once we agree to conven-

tional force reductions, it will prove nearly impossible to reintroduce those forces short of a major provocation — a rescue that by definition would come too late.

It is clear that Mikhail Gorbachev has presented to the world a much more benign vision of Soviet intentions in Europe. It is always possible, of course, that his vision may be mere fiction than fact. But it is also clear that the West will need imagination of even greater scope than that found in fiction to cope with it.

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## Nursing shortage makes hospital visit inconvenient

CHICAGO — How can the American health care industry manage to spend \$500 billion a year — 11 percent of the gross national product — yet shortage nurses, the heart of the whole system?

How can hospitals manage to find enough money to buy the most advanced and expensive new equipment and charge patients \$500 to \$600 a day just for a bed, yet still pay nurses so little there is a dangerous nationwide shortage?  
Why aren't hospitals and nursing homes standing up for nurses and insisting on fair pay, even in the face of cost-cutting efforts by Medicare, Medicaid, health insurance companies and other payers? How can they stay in business if the shortage of nurses gets worse, as it likely will?  
The rapidly growing scarcity of nurses is already so pervasive that some hospitals have had to shut emergency rooms and intensive care units and postpone elective surgery, according to a report issued this week by a federal government commission. It says 11.3 percent of nursing jobs are now unfilled, up from 4.1 percent five years ago.

The shortfall in nurses will be even higher in coming years. An aging population and those with AIDS will need more health care. With hospitals required by Medicare and Medicaid rules and insurance carriers to push patients out faster, those who remain are sicker and must have more complicated care. Many hospitals have cut back on nurses' aides and practical nurses, pushing more work onto registered nurses. Several universities have closed their nursing schools, citing a lack of applicants.  
The problem, primarily, is money. A nursing degree requires a hard four years of scientifically grounded education. Nurses must often work difficult hours, bear life-and-death responsibilities, live with high levels of stress, risk burnout, handle complicated technological equipment without error and try not to lose their sense of caring.

Measured in these terms, nurses are grossly underpaid. Starting salaries have improved some and are now close to those of other professionals. But increases for experience are small, and after a few years on the job nurses are being paid substantially less than others with equivalent education and responsibility.  
The reason, basically, is historic, classic sex bias. Teaching and nursing used to be two professions easily accessible to bright young women who wanted a career. Historically, any field where women predominate tends to be undervalued and underpaid.  
This has been slow to change, although professional unions, strikes and concerns about school reform have pushed teachers' pay up faster than that of any other occupational group in the 1980s.  
Now that women have free choice of almost every profession, nursing must become more competitive financially if it is to recruit enough people with the requisite abilities. There is no alternative to a rapid escalation in salary scale. Long-term career op-

portunities must also be improved.  
Nursing is a prime example of why so many women are pushing more use of pay equity principles to remedy historic discrimination in salaries. Any kind of pay equity scale makes the case for upgrading nurses salaries undeniably clear.  
There are lots of excuses for not paying nurses more. Government agencies, health insurance companies, employers and HMOs are all pressuring hospitals to reduce the uncontrolled escalation in their costs. Medicare and Medicaid programs have tightened their reimbursement policies. Hospitals get stuck with having to provide free care for many patients without financial resources. A growing number of hospitals are bankrupt and closing.  
Even so, America's \$500 billion health care pot still has plenty of money for doctors, drug companies, marketing programs, manufacturers of medical products and technology, researchers, hospitals and financial experts.  
Because the federal government spends about 29 percent of all health care money —

\$142 billion last year — the commission called for Congress to grant a one-time increase in Medicare hospital rates to go for improving nurses' salaries. It also urged more federal financial aid to nursing students and more decision-making roles for nurses. All of these proposals would help, but won't be enough without a permanent upgrading of pay scales and a restructuring of responsibilities.  
The most frequent argument against pay equity plans is that the marketplace will automatically correct imbalances, as inadequately paid people shift into other fields and a dearth of workers forces wages up.  
The acute shortage of nurses is already obvious. So until the marketplace finally pushes wages up or pay equity programs are put into place, it might be prudent not to get sick and risk the consequences of the nursing shortage in person.

### Recall the Hundredth Monkey

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## Jim Bakker faces bond of \$50,000

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP) — A federal magistrate Thursday set a \$50,000 bond for PTL founder Jim Bakker and three former aides, who are accused of supporting lavish lifestyles by bilking \$4 million from his TV ministry's flock.

Bakker, 48, arrived at the federal courthouse in a white Cadillac, smiling and waving to reporters, and said after the 30-minute hearing that he was innocent. His wife, Tammy, did not accompany him.

"I am not guilty of these charges and I'm looking forward to due process taking place. If I get a fair trial, we can win this case," he said.

U.S. Magistrate Paul Taylor continued an arraignment for Bakker and co-defendant Richard Dortch

until Jan. 17, when both men will enter pleas and a trial date will be set. An unsecured bond of \$50,000 was set for Bakker, Dortch and two other former PTL employees under indictment.

Taylor also ordered Bakker to remain in South Carolina and in the court's western North Carolina district. Dortch was restricted to North Carolina and Florida, where he lives.

Bakker got some good news in court: Assistant U.S. Attorney Jerry Miller said no additional charges were planned against Bakker and Dortch.

Bakker, Dortch, and brothers David Taggart and James Taggart were indicted Dec. 5.

## After wounding 3, man lets hostage go

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — A postal worker who shot and wounded three people and held his girlfriend hostage for almost 13 hours was coerced into surrendering Thursday by an old acquaintance — the police chief.

"I just tried to appeal to him as a father," Warren Woodfork said. "I'm glad it worked. I'm not a trained hostage negotiator."

Warren Murphy, 39, gave himself up in the main New Orleans post office shortly after 9 a.m. and released his hostage, 29-year-old Carol Smith.

unharmed, said police spokeswoman Carmine Menchel.

Murphy was to be arraigned later Thursday. Authorities did not immediately announce the charges he faced.

The three people hit by birdshot from Murphy's gun during the siege, which began about 8:30 p.m. Wednesday, were not critically injured, authorities said.

Woodfork, negotiated with Murphy for about two hours, said he knew the gunman because their sons had played football together.

## Book about Quayle: House bored him

WASHINGTON (AP) — Dan Quayle was so bored in the House of Representatives that he missed committee meetings to play golf or work out, earning the nickname of "wet head" because he was always coming out of the gym, according to a new book on the vice president-elect.

However, the book, by political scientist Richard F. Fenno Jr., says Quayle quickly matured when he moved to the Senate in 1980 and risked alienating the Republican administration to engineer passage of an important bipartisan job training bill.

The freshman Republican senator was so irritated at roadblocks to the bill thrown up by the Labor Department and then-Secretary Raymond Donovan that he referred to them as "the bastards," the book says.

"The Making of a Senator: Dan Quayle" is a six-year study by Fenno of Quayle's political career and his chief legislative accomplishment, the

Job Training Partnership Act of 1982. It is published by Congressional Quarterly.

Quayle's office said there would be no comment on the book.

The senator told the author he was "very bored in the House," where he missed meetings and votes, and would "sneak off to play golf or work out, one unidentified associate is quoted as saying."

"People called him 'wet head' because he was always coming out of the (House) gym," the associate said.

"It's an awful job — especially being a Republican there. You can't get anything done," Quayle said.

But when he was elected to the Senate in 1980, as Republicans captured the majority there, Quayle was able to get a Labor and Human Resources subcommittee chairmanship and drew the task of drafting legislation to replace the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act.

## Carlucci kills military health fee

WASHINGTON (AP) — Defense Secretary Frank C. Carlucci has scuttled a proposal by White House budget officials to charge military dependents and retirees a user fee for health care, Pentagon sources said Thursday.

The sources, who spoke on condition they not be named, said Carlucci had intervened personally with officials at the Office of Management and Budget and made clear his opposition to the idea.

Carlucci's decision to kill the fee proposal is seen as a victory for military dependents and retirees, who have long opposed the idea.

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# 100-mph winds batter California, Utah

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Howling winds clocked at up to 102 mph battered Northern California on Thursday.

They claimed at least one life, overturning trucks, toppling trees and cutting power to more than 200,000 customers.

The winds littered scenic Northern California with downed power lines, branches and trash, and authorities closed dangerous highways and issued travel warnings.

The San Francisco Bay waterfront was ravaged by the winds, which tore yachts adrift, sank several and sent waves up to 10 feet high slamming into seawalls. A 60-foot floating dock at San Francisco's Pier 43 sank.

"We've had lots of trees knocked down, power outages and phone problems," said Dan Nicholas of Sonoma County Emergency Services in Santa Rosa, north of San Francisco. "Some homes have been damaged to the point where the people had to be evacuated and put up in motels overnight."

Three-year-old Oli Asghar died Thursday in a Berkeley apartment fire sparked by a candle used because of a wind-caused power outage. His parents and three brothers and sisters were left homeless, fire officials said.

Some 302,000 Pacific Gas & Electric Co. customers throughout Northern California were left in the dark

by the winds, said officials for the utility whose repair crews worked through the night.

"This is definitely ... one of the largest outages because of the velocity of the winds," said PG&E spokesman Ron Rutkowski.

The winds were caused by the

strong flow of air from a high pressure system over British Columbia to a low pressure center in Southern California and Nevada, said National Weather Service meteorologist Randy Hartley.

In northern Utah, the same 'upper air' weather system brought gusting

winds up to 115 mph to northern Utah, said meteorologist Bill Alder. Winds there felled power lines, toppled tractor-trailer trucks, delayed mail deliveries, closed schools and fanned several brush fires early Thursday.

Utah Power & Light Co. crews worked into the afternoon to restore electricity at the sites of scattered outages throughout a four-county area.

EP&L spokesman Dave Mead said he had no firm estimate on the number of people left without electricity, but said "you certainly would be safe saying several thousand."

In California, power lines strewn across heavily traveled Lakeville Highway near Petaluma, about 40 miles north of San Francisco, forced authorities to close it overnight. Two private planes at the Petaluma airport apparently were damaged by the winds, said Nicholas.

About 3,000 Navy personnel aboard the USS Carl Vinson, returning from a six-month deployment to the Western Pacific, Indian Ocean and North Arabian Sea, had their holiday port call delayed several hours because of the winds.

Winds clocked at more than 50 mph howled around San Francisco Bay waterfronts, and the Coast Guard was kept busy retrieving small boats torn from their moorings. Sausalito police said a tugboat sank early Thursday.

# Last cruise missile, hauler cut in half

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) — The last of 43 ground-launched cruise missiles currently scheduled for destruction under the Intermediate-Range Nuclear Forces Treaty was eliminated Thursday at Davis-Monthan Air Force Base.

Capt. Mark Besch, an Air Force spokesman, said the last missile and sixth and final transporter, erector launcher slated to be cut in half occurred during the morning, with the inspection by a 13-member Soviet team officially over at 9:15 a.m.

# GAO claims NORAD computers late, won't work

WASHINGTON — The Pentagon plans to replace its aging computer communications system inside Colorado's Cheyenne Mountain — the nerve center designed to warn of an attack on North America — with new equipment that is over budget, late, and will not work, the General Accounting Office reported Thursday.

Moving ahead with the \$281 million purchase presents "a very high risk to overall communications for Cheyenne Mountain," the GAO said. Cheyenne Mountain, formally known as the North American Aerospace Defense Command, is a U.S.

Canadian control station designed to detect and alert leaders of both nations of an attack.

The proposed system has "unstable software" that has prevented Air Force officials from issuing commands through the system, and which engineers have been unable to fix, the agency said.

"The problem could recur at any time, causing loss of communications," the GAO said. "A failure of this nature during actual operations could seriously affect the Air Force's ability to satisfy mission requirements during a crisis."

Nearly all of the data collected by the Air Force's network of sensors and satel-

ites about a missile or aircraft attack is funneled to Washington and Ottawa through the Cheyenne Mountain Air Force Station.

The computer communications system also serves as the internal link among the complex's 1,400 workers.

Air Force officials had no immediate comment on the report.

The GAO said the system has missed by 29 minutes a requirement to restart within two minutes of a power outage. The system's prime contractor is General Telephone and Electronics Inc.

The system's wiring is incompatible with other Cheyenne Mountain electron-

**Doctors plan study of AIDS; cite rising heterosexual cases**

NEWARK, N.J. (AP) — Doctors warning of a second wave of AIDS cases began a major new study of drug-free heterosexuals Thursday to determine why the usually low-risk group is showing rising susceptibility to the fatal disease.

"Unfortunately, we see women and children as the newest wave of victims," said researcher James Oleske. "The spread to women and children is a trend that is probably going to continue into the next decade."

The National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases said the \$2.8 million, five-year study is being conducted among 2,000 heterosexuals in Paterson, Newark and Jersey City, N.J., and Brooklyn, N.Y.

Oleske of the University of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey will serve on the study team, and said scientists hope to learn enough to stem a new AIDS

epidemic. The first wave of AIDS cases primarily affected gay and bisexual men and intravenous drug

users. Dr. Anthony S. Fauci, director of the institute, said the four cities were selected for the study because of their high concentration of HIV-infected drug users, a potential source of HIV infection in heterosexuals.

HIV, or human immunodeficiency virus, causes AIDS.

In New Jersey, 65 percent of AIDS cases involve heterosexuals, while about 70 percent of the AIDS cases nationally involve gay and bisexual men, said Dr. Stanley H. Weiss, a UMDNJ scientist who is heading the study.

Weiss said about 8 percent of the heterosexual cases in New Jersey have no apparent risk factor for the AIDS virus other than heterosexual activity, while only about 4 percent of the adult AIDS cases nationally can be traced to heterosexual contact.

**Alcohol-related auto fatalities decline**

ATLANTA (AP) — Although more than 23,000 people were killed in alcohol-related traffic accidents last year, the proportion of fatal crashes involving alcohol dropped over five years, officials said Thursday.

In 1987, 23,620 people were killed in the United States in motor vehicle crashes in which alcohol was involved, or 51 percent of all 43,386 U.S. traffic fatalities, the national Centers for Disease Control reported. That compares with 25,165 killed in 1982 in alcohol-related crashes, or 57 percent of the 43,945 traffic fatalities that year.

The proportion of alcohol-related traffic fatalities may have fallen, the CDC said, because of three factors: increased public awareness of the problem; enactment of more stringent laws and increased enforcement, and laws that raised the drinking age to 21 in all states.

Conversely, the deaths in the most strongly alcohol-related accidents —

those in which at least one party tested above 0.10 on a blood-alcohol test — declined from 20,356, or 46 percent, in 1982 to 18,529, or 40 percent, in 1987, according to statistics from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

Although exact figures were not presented, the CDC noted that the proportion of drivers intoxicated at the time of a fatal crash fell 17 percent from 1982-87, and the proportion of teenage drunken drivers involved in fatal crashes fell 34 percent. CDC, in its weekly report, noted that alcohol-related traffic accidents last year robbed victims of more than 780,000 years of "potential life."

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**Genes may help treat cancer**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Experiments in two California laboratories suggest that genetically engineered cells may offer promise for suppressing the growth of some cancers and for correcting brain disorders such as Alzheimer's disease.

The studies, in two different laboratories at the University of California, San Diego, involved the use of cells that were genetically altered and then injected or grafted into laboratory animals, according to reports published Friday.

In a study of cancer, Wen-Hwa Lee, a professor of pathology at UCSD, said a cancer-suppressing gene was inserted into the altered genetic pattern of a retrovirus, a type of virus that controls the genetic pattern of a normal cell.

The retrovirus carrying the cancer-suppressing retinoblastoma gene, or RB, was then transplanted into cancer cells.

To serve as a comparison, another type of gene, called luciferase, or LUX, was processed in the same way.

Lee said both types of altered cancer cells then were injected into nude mice, a type of laboratory rodent that lacks an immune system and is highly susceptible to developing cancer. Each of seven mice received both kinds of the altered cells, one type in each rear flank, he said.

After a month, said Lee, the flanks injected with the LUX-infected cells developed tumors. No tumors, however, grew on the flanks that received the RB-infected cells.

Lee said it appears that the virus carrying the cancer-suppressing gene is able to prevent the formation of malignant cells. It suggests that this technique could be used to genetically convert malignant tumor cells, which grow very rapidly, to cells that grow normally, he said.

"After the tumor cell received this virus," said Lee, "the tumor cell would lose its malignancy. Therefore, it would stop growing, or phase into a normal cell."

He said this holds promise for development within five years of a novel strategy for the treatment of malignancy.

Lee said cells receiving the RB gene would be blocked permanently from turning into cancer and that the virus carrying the gene could contribute to this tumor suppression to other cells.

He said the technique theoretically could work in treatment of breast, bone and lung cancer.

**UN wants Mideast peace conference**

GENEVA (AP) — The U.N. General Assembly passed a resolution Thursday, with only the United States and Israel opposed, calling for an international Middle East peace conference and U.N. supervision of Israeli-occupied Arab lands.

It acted at the end of a three-day debate on Palestinian questions, which was moved from New York to Geneva after the United States denied PLO chairman Yasser Arafat a visa. The vote was 138-2 with Canada and Costa Rica abstaining and Iran not participating.

Libya and Syria voted yes with reservations, declaring they did not recognize Israel, which was mentioned in the resolution.

An international conference should be convened under U.N. auspices "with the participation of all parties to the conflict, including the Palestine Liberation Organization, on an equal footing," the resolution said, and the Security Council should establish a preparatory committee.

Ambassador Vernon A. Walters had said in the debate Wednesday that the United States would oppose such a resolution.

"An international conference may be useful insofar as it helps to launch and support direct negotiations, but a conference must not preempt or substitute for the direct negotiations" between Israel and the Palestinians and Arab nations, Walters said.

The resolution "affirms" that one principle for achieving peace is "the withdrawal of Israel from the Palestinian territory occupied since 1967, including Jerusalem, and the other occupied Arab territories."

It notes the expressed desire and endeavors to place the Palestinian territory occupied since 1967, including Jerusalem, under the supervision of the United Nations for a limited period, as part of the peace process.

An uprising against Israeli rule began Dec. 8, 1987, among the 1.5 million Palestinians in the occupied West Bank and Gaza Strip. Thirteen Israelis and more than 320 Palestinians have been killed.

A separate resolution passed Thursday "acknowledges the proclamation of the State of Palestine by the Palestine National Council," which acts as the PLO legislature, Nov. 15 in Algiers.

It says the designation "Palestine Liberation Organization" will be changed to "Palestine" in the U.N. system but the change would not constitute U.N. recognition of a Palestinian state. The PLO has observer status at the United Nations and is invited to participate in Middle-East debates.

Israel and the United States also opposed the second resolution, which passed 104-2 with 36 abstentions.

Joseph Petrone, U.S. ambassador to the United Nations in Geneva, told the assembly the resolutions "are unhelpful and inconsistent with the search for peace." In a statement explaining the U.S. vote, Petrone described U.N. supervision in the occupied territories as "impractical and unrealistic."

**Crews prepare to clear, raze quake-wrecked city**

SPITAK, U.S.S.R. (AP) — Foreign relief workers said Thursday they were giving up hope of finding more survivors of the Armenian earthquake, and crews prepared to evacuate the last residents of this hard-hit town and raze it.

Nouradine Norig, Kritkorian, the first secretary of Spitzak's Communist Party, said in an interview that crews would take measures to prevent infectious diseases and begin razing the city on Sunday.

About 15,000 of Spitzak's 25,000 people died in the Dec. 7 quake that destroyed most of city, he said.

Altogether, the quake killed 55,000 people in Soviet Armenia and left 500,000 of the area's 700,000 people homeless.

Foreign relief experts and Soviet officials said hope was fading to find more survivors, and the Tass news agency said searchers had found only one person alive in the past 21 hours. That person was found in Spitzak, it said.

Voices and other signs of life in the ruins of destroyed cities dropped off sharply after Monday night, when temperatures plummeted to below freezing, Julia Tait, director of the U.S. Foreign Disaster Assistance office said at a Moscow news conference.

The hope of finding any more (survivors) ended," she said.

Green military vans with mounted speakers toured the muddy streets asking people to leave. Most women and children already were gone.

**Youths steal Vatican payroll**

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Two youths on motorbikes blocked a Vatican car near St. Peter's Square on Thursday, smashed the back window and made off with a payroll of nearly \$300,000 in cash and checks, police reported.

The car had just picked up the money at the Vatican bank inside the walls of the tiny city-state and was delivering it to the Congregation

for the Eastern Church to pay salaries, police said.

The robbery occurred near the entrance to the congregation's headquarters on Via della Conciliazione, 100 yards from St. Peter's Square.

The Eastern Church congregation supervises rites, discipline and officials of Eastern rite churches around the world.

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# Radical Palestinians say killing will go on, call Arafat traitor

NICOSIA, Cyprus — The American decision to talk with the PLO is the biggest step toward Middle East peace in a decade, but radical Palestinians called Yasser Arafat a traitor Thursday and said the bloodshed will continue.

Arafat's renunciation of terrorism and recognition of Israel's right to exist, coupled with the U.S. response after years of shunning the Palestine

Liberation Organization, is the most dramatic development since Egypt signed a peace treaty with Israel in 1979.

His move could be the turning point in the 40 years of Arab-Israeli conflict, but it also is the PLO chairman's greatest gamble and could explode in his face.

Such radical Palestinian factions as the Abu Nidal group may launch a new wave of terrorism intended to wreck the initiative. Militants within the PLO have stayed their hands for the moment, but many feel Arafat made too many concessions.

The Popular Front for Liberation of Palestine, a Marxist group that reconciled with Arafat last year after a four-year estrangement, accused him of "capitulation."

Its leader, George Habbash, said in

a statement sent to The Associated Press in Nicosia from Damascus, Syria, that it welcomed the U.S. decision but felt Washington acted only to "end the diplomatic isolation that followed its refusal to grant Chairman Yasser Arafat a visa to go to New York."

"Therefore, we urge our masses to keep up the struggle to force Israel and the United States to recognize the state of Palestine and all legitimate Palestinian rights," he said. "After the United States refused

Arafat a visa to address the U.N. General Assembly in New York, the assembly moved its session to Geneva.

Saeed Mousa, who leads a Syrian-based breakaway faction called Fatah-Uprising, said Arafat was "a traitor ... for his surrenderist concessions to the United States and the Israeli enemy."

A Mousa spokesman accused the PLO chairman later of paying "an exorbitant price, the recognition of Israel, for this American decision"

and declared: "Arafat is not able to fulfill his commitments, especially his commitment to give up the armed struggle against Israel."

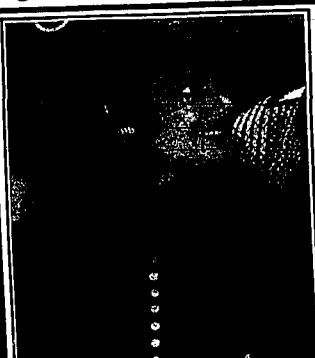
Mousa and other dissidents left the PLO in 1988 in a Syrian-supported mutiny.

Ahmed Jibril of the Popular Front for the Liberation of Palestine-General Command, also backed by Syria, said in Damascus: "Arafat has recognized (Israel) and offered four-fifths of the Palestinian land to the Jewish state."

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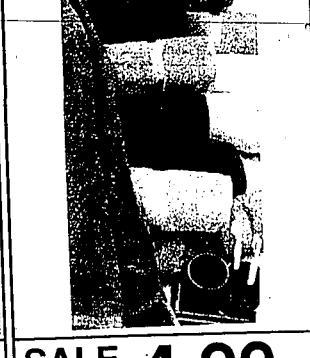
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# Soviet army gets chief of staff, 49

MOSCOW (AP) — The Soviet Union announced Thursday the appointment of Col. Gen. Mikhail A. Moiseyev as the new chief of staff, the Red Army's first leader from a generation too young to have served in World War II.

Moiseyev, 49, replaces Marshal Sergei F. Akhromeyev whose retirement was announced by Soviet officials in New York Dec. 7, the day President Mikhail S. Gorbachev told the U.N. he would unilaterally exit the Soviet military.

That caused speculation the 65-year-old Akhromeyev was resigning in protest, which Soviet officials have denied.

Moiseyev's appointment was announced in the Defense Ministry newspaper Red Star. The story was the first public announcement in the Soviet Union of Akhromeyev's retirement.

The appointment of a relatively young general as chief of staff over several more senior officers appeared to signal Gorbachev's determination to bring new faces into the military leadership.

It also marks the passing of the genera-

tion that took part in the Soviet victory over Nazi Germany in World War II. That triumph remains an important source of pride for the Soviet military and the country as a whole.

Moiseyev's previous post was as Red Army commander in the Far East.

Western diplomatic sources in Moscow said little is known about Moiseyev, who now becomes a first deputy defense minister and the No. 2 leader under Defense Minister Dmitri T. Yazov.

One source said Moiseyev was promoted to his present rank in November 1987. "It may suggest to some of the old-timers that it's time to hang it up," said the source, who spoke on condition he not be identified.

Moiseyev's areas of military expertise were not known, and the diplomatic source said it was likely that since he has been serving in the Far East, "the people on the general staff who will work for him don't know him either."

It was not known whether Moiseyev was a protégé of Yazov, but Yazov also

acted as commander of the heavily fortified Far East district before being named defense minister in May 1987.

Yazov is known as a strong proponent of reforms in the Soviet military in line with Gorbachev's effort to restructure Soviet society. Akhromeyev was one of the officials Gorbachev passed over when Yazov was named defense minister.

Red Star said Akhromeyev was being transferred to another job. In his announcement of Akhromeyev's retirement last week, the Foreign Ministry spokesman, Genady I. Gerasimov, said he would remain an adviser to Gorbachev.

Deputy Foreign Minister Viktor Karpov said at a news conference Thursday that Akhromeyev's retirement "is in no way connected with the Soviet troop reductions announced by Mikhail Gorbachev at the United Nations."

Born into a working class family in 1939, Moiseyev joined the Soviet army in 1958 and graduated from the Frunze Military Academy and the military academy of the armed forces' general staff.

# USSR to admit Korean airline

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — The Soviet Union will soon allow Korea's national airline to send commercial jets through Soviet airspace and make refueling stops in Moscow, a newspaper reported Thursday.

The newspaper, Hankook Ilbo, said Cho Chung-kun, president of Korean Air, will visit Moscow later this month to work out details of the agreement.

KAL neither confirmed nor denied the report. The Soviet Union, which has no diplomatic relations with South Korea, temporarily allowed KAL planes to fly over its territory to transport European and African athletes to the 1988 Summer Olympics in Seoul this fall.

Officials of the two countries have been negotiating ever since to extend the decision, but the Soviet Union — which is closely allied with Seoul's archrival, North Korea — has been reluctant to do so, the paper said.

The proposed agreement would save KAL flights two to four hours on routes to Paris and Frankfurt, the newspaper said.

# Attacks on children scare Tokyo parents

TOKYO (AP) — Police found the naked body of a 4-year-old girl in a campground near Tokyo on Thursday, the first confirmed death in a series of crimes against children that have traumatized the city's suburbs.

A 7-year-old girl and another 4-year-old remain missing in Saitama prefecture west of Tokyo in a series of disappearances that began in August.

Six times since October, children at play have been stabbed by strangers in Saitama and in Chiba prefecture, east of the capital. None of the stabbing victims, ranging in age from 2 to 4, was fatally injured.

Police said they are treating the incidents as cases of sexual perversion.

The stabbings and abductions of toddlers by unidentified stalkers have caused panic in the normally placid suburbs. In a country that prides itself on a low crime rate, the crimes also have attracted the nation's attention.

"I never thought a thing like this could happen here," a housewife told the Japan Broadcasting Corp. the night before Erika Namba's naked body was found in a campground 20 miles from her home. "We moved

here because we thought this would be a good place to raise children."

Police searched the campground after officials there reported finding articles of clothing with Erika's name on them.

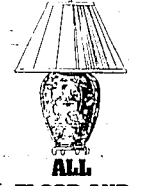

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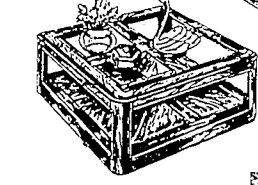
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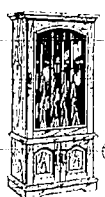
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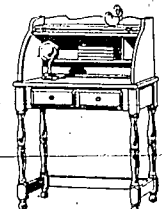
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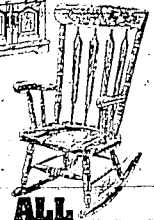
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## New Mexico waste facility faces problems

TWIN FALLS — A permanent nuclear waste repository in New Mexico, seen by some as Idaho's savior from nuclear waste problems, has some problems of its own.

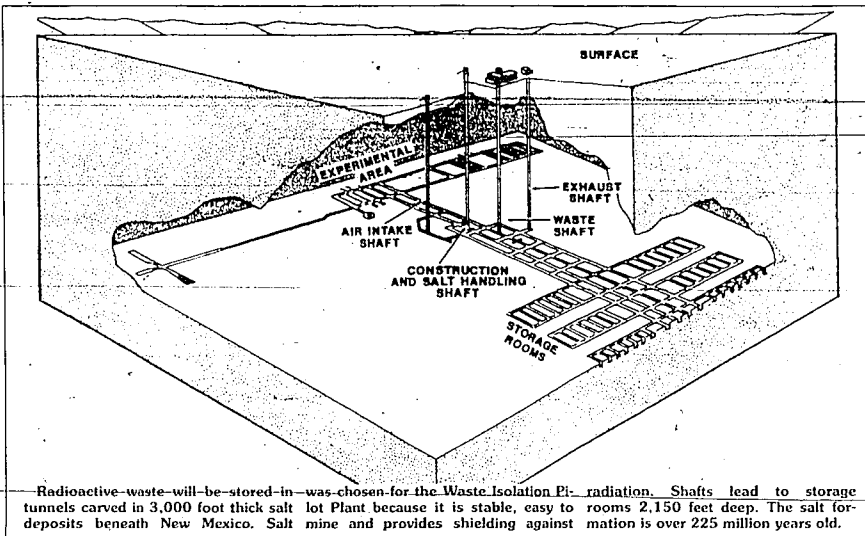
Those problems include reservations among New Mexico scientists, fierce opposition from environmentalists and the prospect that the Waste Isolation Pilot Plant (WIPP) will have to hang out a "no-vacancy" sign as soon as it opens.

DOE's handling of WIPP appears to be setting the stage for yet another DOE disaster, says an article written by Richard Johnson, of New Mexico's Concerned Citizens for Nuclear Safety. "WIPP is not ready to begin receiving nuclear waste shipments, and may never be."

New Mexicans are alarmed by (the U.S. Department of Energy's) abysmal safety record, subsequent cover-ups and history of broken promises to the citizens of this country, Johnson wrote.

Gov. Cecil D. Andrus is to meet in Salt Lake City today with the Energy Department officials and governors of Colorado and New Mexico to discuss the opening of the department's Waste Isolation Pilot Plant near Carlsbad, N.M.

Two months ago Andrus slapped a ban on shipments of transuranic waste into Idaho for "temporary" storage at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory until the Energy

Department made good on its promises of 30 years to move the waste out of Idaho to a permanent disposal site.

Transuranic waste is waste con-

taminated with long-lived radioactive elements heavier than uranium — primarily plutonium, one of the most toxic substances known.

The waste is made up of tools, me-

chanical parts, containers and protective clothing — the everyday items used in the manufacture of nuclear weapons parts.

In 1970, a decision by the federal

government that transuranic waste should be handled more carefully than short-lived low-level waste led to the development of the permanent deep geological repository in New

Mexico.

Most of the waste that is destined for this repository is of low radioactivity. The 55-gallon drums used for storage provide sufficient shielding. Some of the waste, however, is so radioactive that it must be handled using remote control devices.

The repository's Oct. 1 opening was indefinitely delayed by concerns over the environmental safety and questions about the casks that will transport the waste to New Mexico.

A site study by Earth Technology Corp. of Golden, Colo., confirmed the presence of a pressurized brine reservoir — 2,000 pounds per square inch — under 40 percent of the WIPP site.

The Energy Department has estimated that during the first 100 years of storage 1,000 gallons of brine will seep into each of the rooms mined out of Permian Basin salt deposits 2,150 feet below the ground.

The independent Scientists Review Panel, composed mostly of University of New Mexico scientists, estimates that as much as 100,000 gallons of brine could seep into each storage room. The brine could quickly rust through the barrels and create a radioactive slurry.

One of the reasons salt was chosen for the repository was its plastic quality that enables it to heal fractures and fill voids. Within a few decades the salt will move into the voids created by the storage rooms, and water contained in the salt will

## Psychologist testifies on 3rd day of Idaho Power Co. trial

HALEY — On the evening of Sept. 21, 1987, Joseph and Cheri Clement were sitting in their living room when Joe heard an explosion. He went to his deck and saw smoke coming from the Idaho Power substation by their home.

He ran to the substation, climbed over a fence and saw his younger son, Joey, yelling, "Patrick is dead."

Joseph gathered Joey in his arms while 15 feet in front of him his son Patrick burned before his eyes.

Dan Hamilton, a Ketchum psychologist,

testified Thursday in Blaine County District court that this incident has left Joseph Clement with suicidal tendencies. Of all family members, he has been the hardest hit, Hamilton said.

The testimony came during the third day of a trial in which the Clements are suing Idaho Power Co. for an unspecified amount, claiming negligence by the company.

Patrick, age 5, was killed when he and his brother, 7 at the time, climbed under a chain-linked fence and Patrick climbed onto the substation equipment.

The site includes two fences, an outside fence and a grounded inner fence that surrounds the substation equipment.

Clements' attorney R. Keith Roark is arguing that the gates and the fences were unsafe and had insufficient warning signs. The property prior to the accident had only one warning sign and a gate in the inner fence was open, Roark said.

Roark showed the court a photograph of the outer fence that showed a gap under the locked gate through which the boys allegedly gained entrance to the inner fence.

Idaho Power safety manuals specify that fences around substations should be on the same horizontal plane.

Idaho Power employee Curtis Stewart testified that the company had no formal policy to inspect the fences.

Since the accident, more warning signs have been posted at the site and a formal inspection checklist has been developed by Idaho Power, Stewart said.

In testimony Wednesday, Idaho Power District Manager William Sikes, who pried Patrick's body off the substation equipment, said that "was the worst experience of his life."

Then just think how Joe and Cheri must feel," Roark responded.

Joseph Clement still suffers from flashbacks, recurring nightmares, insomnia and shows suicidal tendencies, Hamilton, the psychologist, testified.

Idaho Power attorney James Risch asked

Hamilton under cross examination if there were any psychological or mental certainty that Clements would commit suicide.

Hamilton pondered the question for a time before answering, "If Joe could not come to grips with the situation and the marriage were to fall apart I would say he would have a greater than 50 percent chance."

Hamilton said that he had not seen any psychological progress in Clement since he started working with him Feb. 5, and that he would need at least another year of continued therapy.

Hamilton described Cheri Clement as "coping" and "playing the mother role," but

## Otter issues lottery warnings

TWIN FALLS — If not handled carefully the state lottery could become a financial flop, Lt. Gov. Butch Otter said.

"I'm concerned if we don't treat this lottery question with the respect that it is due we could lose some money," Otter told Optimist Club members on Thursday.

He also said Idahoans concentrating on promoting what they do best — agriculture — has resulted in a lower unemployment rate and higher state bond ratings during Otter's 1½ years in office.

Otter said of the million people living in Idaho, about 500,000 will be eligible to buy tickets, based on an anticipated minimum age of 21. Only about half of those will participate in the lottery, Otter said.

Otter suggested the state join forces with Oregon to have a joint lottery because Idaho would not produce enough revenue to handle the expenses involved.

He said Idaho should contract with Oregon for a two-year period. Oregon could deduct expenses and a premium for handling Idaho tickets, leaving Idaho about 35 cents in profit, Otter said. If 200,000 tickets were sold weekly, the state would take in about \$70,000.

Otherwise, the state would be using its \$200,000 pot to compete with Oregon's multi-million-dollar pots, Otter said.

"Who in Weiser or Payette is going to buy a dollar ticket on a \$200,000 pot when all they have to do is drive a couple miles to Oregon and buy a ticket on a multi-million dollar pot," Otter said.

He said if Idaho administrators its own lottery it will be faced with some of the same problems Montana has.

"When they adopted their lottery it ran successfully for a year and

when the novelty wore off people quit buying," he said. "It's now cutting into the mabele."

On another topic, Otter said the state's economy is on the upturn.

"Basically what has happened in the last year and a half is that we've started to feel good about ourselves," Otter said. "One of the results has been that we have gotten back to the fundamentals."

Otter said he was reluctant to take credit for the improving economy except insofar as he has helped businessmen improve their attitude.

Since January 1987, 14,000 new jobs have been created and the unemployment rate has fallen to 4 from 8 percent. The year before he took office, the state had to deal with a \$17 million deficit. The 50th legislative session will begin with a \$45 million surplus, he said. Bond ratings have gone from BB to AAA during that time, he said.

Before he took office, optimism was low partly because of the national economy and the declining value of the dollar compared to other currencies. Mistaken ventures into unfamiliar business territory also contributed to a gloomy mood.

"We tried to do a lot of things that we simply didn't have the education, sophistication, financial or operational background to do," Otter said.

He said 46 percent of Idaho's economy is agriculturally based, much of it in potatoes. Part of the recent economic successes have come as people learned to promote Idaho's image to their benefit.

"If we're that well known for potatoes why shouldn't we use that potato to piggy back a lot of other products," Otter said. "The next time we sell a potato to somebody we should ask them where in hell are they going to get the other

## Gerrish adjusts teaching of his origins of life unit

TWIN FALLS — Science teacher Phil Gerrish says he has changed the way he teaches his origins of life unit at O'Leary Junior High. And school officials say checks built into the system will assure that the district's new origins of life policy and guidelines will be followed from now on.

Gerrish said that this year he did not mention creationists or teach creationism but used an "intelligent design versus natural cause" focus in his class and that those are the two categories under which origins of life theories fall. He just finished teaching his three-week long origins of life unit.

The lessons Gerrish presented to students last fall included discussion about creationism that sparked a year-long debate when the parents of a seventh-grade student sent a letter

to school administrators requesting clarification of the district's policy toward teaching creationism.

The School Board adopted an origins of life policy in the spring and approved a set of guidelines during Tuesday's board meeting.

Gerrish said his class spent about 30 minutes last year discussing creationism. "And I used words such as 'creationist' freely," he said in an interview Wednesday afternoon.

Gerrish said his new method teaches cause and effect relationships in origins of life theories, and that it will be up to the student to further investigate areas of interest.

He said that intellectual design does not necessarily imply a supreme being or "God," but includes theories such as panspermia — the theory that alien beings bring the earth as an assembly station, leaving

## Campaign finances show cost of candidates' efforts

TWIN FALLS — Final campaign "financial" reports show a "feverish" last-ditch battle for exposure between Democrat John Peavey and Republican John Sandy for District 22 Senate seat A.

Sandy won the election by the slimmest margin among Senate and House races in the Magic Valley, where Republicans swept 18 races. He spent \$5,310 on advertising between Oct. 31 and Nov. 3, while his opponent spent \$7,934 on his campaign in the last few days of the Nov. 8 election.

All House and Senate candidates in the Magic Valley have filed their final financial campaign reports with the state except Democrats Sally Gulick, who lost to Ron Block for District 23 House seat A, Joe Gulick, who lost to Celia Gould for District 23 House seat B, and Gene Sullivan, who lost to Tom Morrison for Dis-

trict 24 House seat A.

Penny-Yaurea, administrative secretary at the secretary of state's office, said the three have been mailed notices of filing. She said although the state could fine them as much as \$5 a day for each day reports are not filed after the Dec. 8 deadline, officials are more concerned about compliance.

"Candidates already had filed reports for campaign contributions received before Oct. 23. The following are highlights of final reports filed for the three weeks that followed:

Peavey reported contributions of \$5,728 during the reporting period. The 23 contributions during this period included \$600 from Lawyers Inc. voted for Idaho, \$750 from Mary Brooks, \$1,000 from Peggy Park and \$500 from the Idaho State Central Democratic Committee. Total contributions for the year were \$26,066, with \$5,310 unpaid.

# Idahoans endorse Bush's choice of Yeutter for agriculture chief

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15 — Clayton Yeutter, President-elect George Bush's choice for agriculture secretary, won a hearty endorsement from Idaho's congressional delegation.

Yeutter, who Bush tapped for agriculture secretary at a press conference last Wednesday, was praised for his tough stance against foreign farm subsidies. Yeutter, the U.S. trade representative, has fought hard against foreign subsidies since he was appointed to the post in 1985.

"We need to reduce farm subsidies bilaterally to get agriculture in this country back on the right track," said Sen. Steve Symms (R-Idaho).

Both Symms and Sen. James Mc-

Clure (R-Idaho) expect Yeutter to lead the way in promoting Idaho's export market.

"One thing we're trying to push, is to get the Agriculture Department to take steps to more export enhancement," said McClure's press secretary, H.D. Palmer.

Yeutter was praised by Rep. Larry Craig (R-Idaho) both for his position on exports and for his personal style. If he is approved for the agriculture post, Yeutter will aggressively push for trade policies that benefit the state, Craig said.

"I don't believe that people should be diverted by his open, friendly approach," Craig said. "He's a very strong, very firm man." Craig said that he was looking forward to working with Yeutter on the reauthorization of the Farm Bill in the next session of Congress.

But a spokeswoman for Rep. Richard Stallings (D-Idaho), expressed some reservations about Yeutter. His opposition to farm subsidies could be bad news for sugar beet farmers dependent on the sugar program, said spokeswoman Melodie Rydahl. The sugar program restricts cheap sugar imports from the Caribbean.

"(Yeutter) could potentially alienate some of the agricultural community by his hard-line stance on the trade issue," Rydahl said.

Bush affirmed his support for the sugar program on a visit to Twin Falls last May, which reassures other members of the delegation. They believe Yeutter, if approved by Congress, would also back the program.

## Jerome escapees remain at large

JEROME — Two escaped felons remained at large Thursday as sheriff's officials ran down a number of dead-end leads.

The Jerome County Sheriff's Office received six or seven telephone calls from people who believed they had seen the escapees, Sgt. Deanne Moore said. Deputies chased those leads until around 2:30 a.m. but were unable to confirm any of the sightings.

"You don't know what's fiction or not," Moore said. "You just don't know."

Jerry Leroy Holton, 21, of Jerome,

and Javier DeLeon, 21, of Twin Falls, escaped late Tuesday night from the Jerome County Jail after prying open a recreation room door. Arrest warrants have been issued for both men, charging them with escape, a felony.

DeLeon had been convicted in Twin Falls of selling drugs. Holton, in jail on an alleged probation violation, was awaiting trial on a charge of threatening a man with a knife. A second charge of stealing a pickup was also pending against Holton, who was convicted of two counts of grand theft in 1986.

## Blaine jury indicts publisher Wolford

BOISE (AP) — Publisher David Wolford, 50, has been indicted by a Blaine County grand jury on eight felony counts of state income tax evasion, the Department of Revenue and Taxation says.

Deputy Attorney General Larry Dunn said Wolford, publisher of CommTek, Inc., was charged with tax evasion for 1978 through 1985. CommTek publishes magazines for home satellite users.

It started in Hailey in 1979, moved to Boise in 1985, and Wolford relocated to Virginia earlier this year, Dunn said. Company sales moved from \$163,000 in 1980 to more than \$11 million in 1981, according to published reports.

Dunn said the indictments allege that Wolford, while living full-time in Idaho, filed a nonresident Idaho tax return for 1978, no returns for 1979-84 and a part-time Idaho resident return for 1985.

Maximum penalties for the offenses is five years in prison and \$10,000 fine on each count, Dunn said.

## Crews work to defuse train

FLAGSTAFF, Ariz. (AP) — Crews tapped into the explosive liquid aboard toppled tank cars Thursday, and a railroad spokesman extended the hope that about 300 displaced residents could return to their homes by early Friday.

If the area where 26 freight cars derailed Wednesday is considered safe by then, Interstate 40 will be reopened to traffic over the 60-mile stretch between Flagstaff and Winslow, Santa Fe Railroad Co. spokesman Michael Martin said.

The highway, which links Barstow, Calif., with Raleigh, N.C., has been closed for all but a few hours since the cars took a 40-mile tumble off rails 10 miles east of here about 1:35 a.m. Wednesday.

Authorities also cleared the area of the Cosmimo Estates, about 800

yards from the tracks, Wednesday morning after learning that the derailed cars included six carrying liquid petroleum gas.

The subdivision included an estimated 100 residences.

Martin said the crash tore up nearly 4,000 feet of track. However, those repairs, the righting of the derailed cars, the return of the excavated and reopening 1-40 all depended on pumping out the contents of the 30,000-gallon tankers, he said.

Investigators found three LPG-filled cars leaking and two others damaged following the derailment, with a sixth possibly damaged, Martin said.

He said emergency crews began about 3:30 a.m. Thursday piping the liquid from the most severely damaged car.

# Jonathan Swapp admits firing 3 rounds; denies intent to hit

COALVILLE, Utah (AP) — A polygamist clan member on Thursday admitted firing three rounds during a shootout with police, but said he was only trying to stop officers from killing his wounded brother.

Jonathan Swapp testified he fired force officers' heads down, and wasn't trying to hit anyone.

"The intent in my mind was to stop my brother from being shot again," Swapp said.

Meantime, family friend Carla Foster was issued a misdemeanor citation charging her with illegally carrying a concealed weapon after she unwittingly brought a gun to the proceedings, officers said.

Foster, 36, had handed her purse to a deputy stationed at a metal detector and informed him the gun was inside. She later explained to officers that she had left her purse in her car during the morning session and had retrieved it after lunch, forgetting

that the weapon was inside, said Detective Sgt. Robert Berry.

The explanation satisfied the officers, but 3rd District Judge Michael Murphy barred Foster from the courtroom for the remainder of the trial, and she was ordered to appear Tuesday in 3rd Circuit Court, Berry said.

Swapp, 21, and his brother Addam, 27, were among seven witnesses called by defense attorneys before they rested their case Thursday in the second-degree murder trial of the Swapp brothers and John Timothy Singer, 22.

The trio is charged with the death of state Corrections Lt. Fred House. House was fatally wounded Jan. 28 while directing a reluctant police dog toward the Swapp brothers during an arrest attempt on the clan's compound at Marion.

The shootout ended a 13-day siege that began after Addam Swapp bombed a nearby Mormon chapel.

Defense attorneys concede the wheelchair-bound Singer fired the fatal bullet, but Singer says he was aiming at the dogs, not House.

A tear-eyed Jonathan Swapp said he fired in the direction of officers after hearing Addam Swapp cry, "I'm shot. I'm a dead man," after being wounded in the chest and arm.

He also testified that clan members were unable to sleep and clan matriarch Vickie Singer felt chest and tooth pain as a result of loud, piercing noises and bright lights officers directed at the farmhouse during the siege.

"It kept me awake. It was very loud. It kind of drove you crazy; if you listened to it for several hours, it would really bother you," he said.

Swapp said he and the other adults tried to shield the children with earplugs and pillows around their heads. He said Vickie Singer was tormented most by the sound.

ing a form of life behind.

Assistant Superintendent Keith Tolzin said he doesn't know if this type of lesson would be acceptable under the guidelines because he is not familiar with the details of Gerrish's lessons.

"If he says at the beginning that this is a theory that exists that some people believe, then that's okay, it doesn't create a problem," Tolzin said.

Principals are responsible for day-to-day curriculum in a particular school and Tolzin said they meet regularly with teachers to discuss lesson plans.

Tolzin said that Gerrish uses lesson plans but that it was not the intent of the committee appointed to write the guidelines to look at Gerrish's plans from last fall.

"What's happened happened. That's in the past," Tolzin said. "The guidelines say this is what it will be from now on."

Gerrish said the controversy has made him much more aware of the

evidence behind the theory of evolution and other theories. He said he has learned a lot about the origins of a life controversy that exists within the scientific community and said that he thinks the unit was presented much more honestly this year than last.

"My teaching has changed somewhat," Gerrish said. "Now I am teaching evolution as a theory, exposing its flaws, which all theories have, and teaching about the other theories as well."

"Any valid interpretation of evidence should be reported in the science classroom. That's the bottom line. I believe as a public employee that I need to report those interpretations to the students," Gerrish said.

Gerrish said that the textbooks have remained dogmatic in teaching the theory of evolution. He said that they do not include the scientific information and arguments that show doubt in the theory of evolution.

"That's the whole reason this thing is blown out of proportion. The theo-

ry of evolution has gone through without rebuttal, and that's the job of scientists," he said.

Gerrish said that even evolutionists have written papers and arguments pointing out the downfalls of the theory of evolution.

Tolzin said he has seen no textbooks that delve into theories other than evolution but that many authors are writing about questions concerning the evolution theory.

"Textbooks are just like newspapers or magazines," Tolzin said. "The authors write to an audience."

He said that textbooks and textbook companies are not perfect, but that he thinks they are responsible.

And he said there is nothing wrong with teachers supplementing textbooks, that kids wouldn't get a well-rounded education without teacher input.

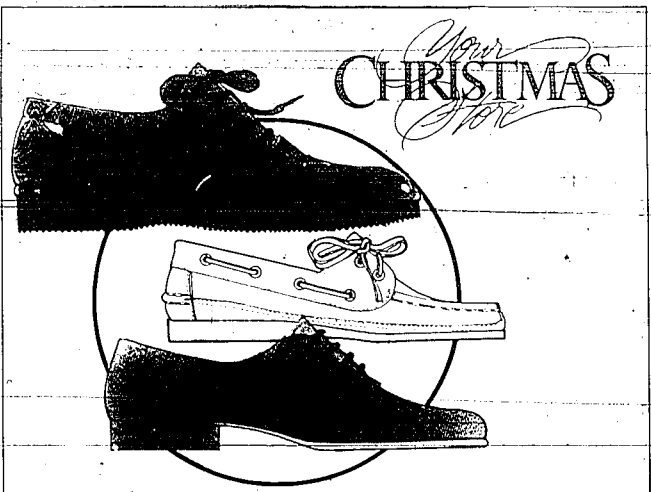
"It's a pretty detailed subject. Science and religion are all mixed up. My interest in the classroom is to honestly report the scientific evidence for origins," Gerrish said.

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# Feds clear Craig of campaign accusation

WASHINGTON (AP) — Republican Congressman Larry Craig has been cleared of any violation of federal elections laws in connection with a fund-raising letter during this year's successful campaign against Democrat Jeanne Givens.

The Federal Election Commission unanimously rejected the complaint, filed against Craig by state Democratic Party Chairman Conley Ward. The Nov. 15 decision was publicly released by the commission this week.

"As far as we're concerned, the matter is closed," a commission spokeswoman said Thursday.

The commission said it could find no reason to hold Craig in violation of the federal law prohibiting use of opponent's campaign finance reports

for commercial purposes. Craig swamped the two-term state legislator, winning his fifth two-year term with 66 percent of the vote.

Ward had accused Craig of using Mrs. Givens' list of contributors to raise money for his own campaign in violation of that federal statute.

"The pages of the Givens' report in question showed political contributions from local action committees, or PACs, of women's organizations and labor unions.

Stop one page was a note from a Craig campaign aide addressed to "Larry," saying "the eastern liberal PACs are contributing to her. We need to monitor and step up our fund raising efforts."

But the commission endorsed the

report of its associate general counsel, Lois Lerner, who said Craig did not violate any election laws.

"Rather than besieging public spirited donors listed on the FEC reports with pleas for money," she said, Craig and his campaign "intended primarily to provide the public with information about which PACs were funding the opponent and to enlighten the voters about the opponent's political views."

Ms. Lerner also cited a previous commission advisory opinion stating that the sole purpose of the restriction on the use of opponents' campaign reports was to protect contributor lists from being used for commercial purposes, not informational purposes.

# Stallings spent \$400,000 to defeat Dane Watkins

BOISE (AP) — Rep. Richard Stallings, who won a lopsided victory over Republican Dane Watkins in Idaho's 2nd District congressional race, spent more than \$400,000 on the election.

Campaign finance reports filed with the secretary of state's office at Boise show Stallings spent \$402,254 for the year and \$83,661 for the period Oct. 20-Nov. 28. He listed unpaid bills of \$1,084 and a balance of \$3,137.

Watkins, the former state senator, spent less than half as much. He spent \$169,134 for the campaign with unpaid debts of about \$35,000, including \$28,500 in personal loans.

Stallings spent about \$75,000 two years ago when he defeated Idaho Falls broadcaster Mel Richardson to win his second term.

Stallings won his third straight term, 127,556-68,226 over Watkins. Libertarian Donovan

Bramwell attracted 5,703 votes.

Stallings reported contributions of \$33,187 in the latest period, split almost evenly between individual contributions and those from political action committees.

For the year, Stallings said he received \$165,150 from individuals, \$14,754 from political committees and more than \$208,000 from political action committees.

# Rexburg mayor thinks flood has helped the city

REXBURG (AP) — The Teton Dam flood 12 years ago made it possible for Rexburg to make improvements it could not have afforded otherwise, and they will allow the community to grow without taxing facilities, Mayor John Porter says.

"The flood really helped us," Porter said Wednesday in a "state of the city" report to the Chamber of Commerce.

City water and sewer systems were upgraded with flood recovery money and are designed to serve 25,000 people. Rexburg's population is about 11,000, with up to 6,000 stu-

dents attending Ricks College.

The city has aggressively pursued state and federal grants to make other improvements, the mayor said.

After the flood, the city used federal flood funds to help build a storm sewer system, water storage for 3.25 million gallons, extended sewer and water lines into new areas, improved city streets, constructed seven off-street parking lots in the downtown area and improved roads.

The city received one of the last federal grants to pay 95 percent of a project's cost, Porter said. The city used the \$2 million grant to upgrade

the city's sewer treatment plant.

But the city must do what it can to help the businesses that are here, he said. The city has established a revolving fund to loan money to businesses that will provide more jobs.

The city received a \$1 million grant to set up the fund and loaned the money to the Rexburg Nursing Home. As the loan is repaid with interest, the money will be available

for more loans.

Porter put in a plug for continued membership in the East-Central Idaho Planning and Development Association, a private organization that has assisted the city in applying for grant funds. Madison County recently decided to drop out.

Porter said the city will pay the county's dues to insure the association's office remains in Rexburg.

# Panel favors incentives to advance consolidation

LEWISTON (AP) — A task force on public school consolidation will recommend to the Idaho Legislature that incentives rather than coercion be used to convince small school districts to consolidate, members of that panel say.

Larry Manly, superintendent of the Caldwell School District, said a final draft of the committee's recommendations is on its way to members. It will be presented to lawmakers when the 1993 legislative session convenes next month.

The 20-member panel of legislators, school administrators, patrons and others conducted three meetings and a conference call in developing its recommendations, Manly said.

The committee was set up by state Superintendent of Public Instruction Jerry Evans. Among other things, it asked to define what constitutes a small high school. But Manly said members never reached a consensus and will make no recommendation on that issue.

Among recommendations included in the final draft is that school districts that consolidate continue to receive state funding at their previous level for seven years.

Another call for the state to fund any feasibility study conducted on consolidating individual school districts.

Such studies now are funded locally.

A third recommendation would require the state Department of Education to pay the interest on any bond issue made to finance remodeling or construction of facilities needed to allow consolidation of high schools.

The committee also recommended that any bonded indebtedness of a school district that consolidates remain its own separate responsibility after consolidation.

The task force was an offshoot of the Public School Finance Advisory Committee, appointed by Evans three years ago, said Robert Dutton, finance and administration chief in the Department of Education.

Its purpose was to devise some kind of process that would allow school districts to improve programs and be more efficient financially, and that would take into account local input," Dutton said.

Another subcommittee has recommended high schools with fewer than 60 students or combined junior-senior highs with fewer than 80 students not receive state funding unless they can convince the state Board of Education they are part of a "remote and necessary" school district.

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## City manager quits

LEWISTON (AP) — City Manager Robert Knabel has resigned to accept the job of city manager in Galesburg, Ill., amid continuing turmoil in Lewiston's government.

Knabel, 38, who has been city manager for two years, said Wednesday that he will make \$58,000 a year in Galesburg. He currently earns \$50,000.

Sixty-days notice of resignation was required under Knabel's contract with the city, but he said he would meet with the City Council next week to discuss how much longer he would stay on.

"I think it's a shame he is leaving," said former councilwoman Marlene Schaefer, who was recalled along with four other council members last month.

"I feel he is probably one of the better city managers the city of Lewiston has ever had," she said.

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# Centennial plates raise money

HELENA (AP) — The sale of commemorative license plates has become a major fund-raiser for the six states preparing to celebrate their 100th birthdays, according to centennial officials.

In a regional meeting at the Capitol here Wednesday, centennial organizers from Montana, Idaho, Wyoming, Washington and the Dakotas swapped progress reports of preparations for their respective celebrations. Wyoming and Idaho's centennial year is 1900; the rest celebrate next year.

Marty Peterson, vice chairman of the Idaho Centennial Commission, said 96,000 sets of the special plates have been sold in his state and each provided the centennial with \$25.

Sales have been brisk, he said.

# Gibb's aides face changes in duties

MOSCOW (AP) — University of Idaho President Richard Gibb's top four administrators may lose their current jobs when Gibb returns July 1, but three of them have guaranteed positions somewhere in the university.

Academic Vice President Thomas Bell, Financial Vice President Joseph Geiger and Terry Armstrong, Gibb's executive assistant, said Wednesday that they have tenured faculty positions at the Moscow school.

But Philip (Flip) Kleffner, acting vice president for development and university relations, has no such safety net.

"Any president has a right to make choices," Kleffner said of his chances of staying on at the UI. "I would expect, though, that he would like to have some continuity and keep things going for a while."

Before taking his current post, Kleffner was the university's alumni director.

Geiger, Armstrong and Bell said

Mary Ellen Tumasy, Wyoming's centennial director, reported license plate sales of 3,000 this year and predicted more interest as 1990 nears.

In Montana, more than \$615,000 of the \$779,000 raised so far has come from the sale of centennial plates.

Although he's worked in administration at the university and in the public school system for 30 years, Bell said returning to the classroom would be "challenging and appropriate."

# Gov. Romer not optimistic about DOE waste solutions

DENVER (AP) — Gov. Roy Romer said he is not optimistic there will be any immediate solution to the radioactive waste storage problem at Rocky Flats when he meets with Department of Energy officials on Friday in Salt Lake City.

But he does hope the department will at least "put some alternate solutions on the table."

Romer is to meet with Joseph Salgado, No. 2 man at the Department of Energy, Troy Wade, acting assistant secretary for defense programs, and Bruce Twining of the DOE's Albuquerque operations office.

New Mexico Gov. Garry Carruthers and Idaho Gov. Cecil Andrus also are scheduled to attend the 9 a.m. to noon meeting at the Marriott Hotel near Temple Square.

Romer asked for the meeting in November, but Carruthers was unable to attend and it was rescheduled for this month.

At issue are boxcars of radioactive waste which are sitting on a railroad siding at the Rocky Flats plant northwest of Denver. The plant man-

ufactures plutonium triggers for nuclear weapons.

Romer has since rejected plans to expand the storage capacity for radioactive waste at the plant.

His rejection was in response to the return of a railroad car containing low-level radioactive waste to Rocky Flats.

The armored boxcar was returned because Andrus blamed the temporary storage in his state of new shipments containing radioactive wastes. The Idaho governor rejected the shipment in protest of the DOE's failure to open a permanent waste storage facility in New Mexico.

Romer has told the DOE that Rocky Flats, which is operated by Lockheed International for the department, will reach its storage capacity next March or April, and if a waste dump is not opened in New Mexico by that time he will have no choice but to order work stopped at Rocky Flats.

If they don't have a solution, they are going to have to close it by failing to act," he told reporters on

Thursday.

"I'm not trying to get into a John Wayne-macho. It's me against the feds' position," he said.

He added that it's not a "states' rights" issue. Rather, the issue "is one of safety."

Romer said he has a spot-picked-in Colorado where Colorado's share of the waste can be stored, but other western governors have to accept their share of the waste from the federally operated plant.

He would not, he said, allow a 90-day extension for keeping the waste beyond the capacity point.

"Not here in the Denver area," he said. "I do not want a de facto dump here. That's why I've kept that storage in those boxcars. There were seven boxcars on the siding and enough waste to fill about 17, officials reported."

Romer ordered the boxcars disconnected to lessen the chance of an accident.

"We have to get it done," Romer said of the storage decision.

# Dan Quayle apologizes to Sen. Hatch for book

WASHINGTON (AP) — Vice President-elect Dan Quayle has called Sen. Orrin Hatch to apologize for some unfavorable characterizations of the Utah Republican in just-released book about the Indiana senator, a Hatch aide says.

The Making of a Senator: Dan Quayle was released Tuesday by Congressional Quarterly Press. It is written by University of Rochester political scientist Richard F. Fenno Jr. and focuses on Quayle's role in the job Training Partnership Act of 1982.

In the book, Fenno said Quayle told him that "Hatch is completely disorganized" as then-chairman of the Senate Labor and Human Resources Committee, so Quayle worked with Sen. Edward Kennedy to write a bipartisan job training bill.

Quayle reportedly ignored Reagan administration requests, backed by Hatch, to allow the administration to frame its own bill.

Fenno writes that Quayle said of Hatch at the time, "I can't deal with him. I had to go around him. I asked him to join me, but that's not his conception — joining. He wants to be the leader."

He thinks it should be his bill. Well, it's my bill. I did all the work on it. I told him, 'Maybe you can get away with this with somebody else, but not me.' Hatch doesn't accomplish anything," Quayle was quoted as saying.

Quayle chaired the labor subcommittee that passed his bill unanimously to Hatch's full committee for review. The book said that a heated meeting between Quayle and Hatch about timing of full committee action ended with Hatch walking out of the room.

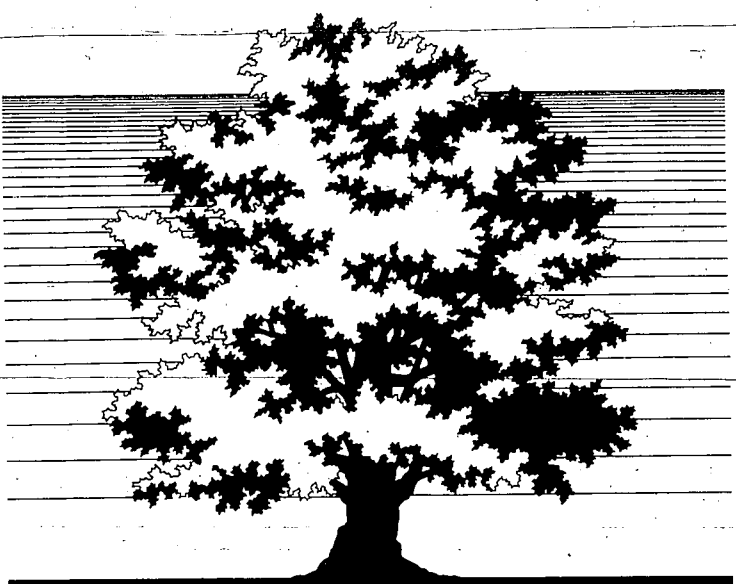
Jeanne Lopatto, Hatch's assistant press secretary, said Quayle called Hatch on Monday before the book

was released to apologize for his comments. "I think Sen. Hatch is a bit amused by it," she said.

"The comments were apparently made years ago in a fit of anger," Lopatto added.

She said that Hatch and Quayle now have a good working relationship, and have cooperated on several bills.

"Sen. Hatch looks forward very much to working with Vice President Quayle," she said, adding that no bad blood exists.

**NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP)** — Country singer Johnny Cash is scheduled to undergo open heart surgery Monday, joining close friend Waylon Jennings, who is recovering from a similar procedure at the same hospital.

Cash, 56, was admitted Wednesday to Baptist Hospital after tests were performed, doctors said.

Reba Hancock, Cash's sister, said the tests showed there may be a blockage.

"John had no chest pain," she said. "He was just experiencing a few problems, and went in for some tests."

### Oldest Italian dies at 109

**LUPAZZANO, Italy (AP)** — Giovanni Ferzini, described as the oldest man in Italy, died of bronchitis, his family said Thursday. He was 109.

He died Wednesday in a village south of Parma, the family said.

Ferzini, who was born July 23, 1879, left his village only once, and that was when he was an infantryman in World War I.

After the war he returned to the Lupazzano, married and fathered 13 sons. Seven of his sons survived him.

Ferzini was a farmer and an avid hunter who continued to walk the fields and shoot at game until age 93. He used to say that he missed the old times, when the air was clean and there was plenty of game.

### Dog owners unhappy with quarantine

**STOCKHOLM, Sweden (AP)** — The owners of dogs sent to Soviet Armenia to help rescue earthquake victims are angry because the animals will be placed in quarantine for four months when they return, news reports said Thursday.

"I have a dog at home. If the two dogs are apart for four months, they won't be able to work as a team when they get back together again," Nils Karlsson, who sent one dog to Armenia, told the national news agency TT.

"Completely scandalous," Agneta Eriksson was quoted as saying from Leningrad, U.S.S.R., where her dog Rafli was searching for victims.

The 16 animals, all volunteered for service by their owners, are credited with finding 14 people so far in the rubble of the devastated Soviet cities.

Sweden's animal quarantine laws are among the strictest in Europe.

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### Mexican author wins humanitarian award

**PARIS (AP)** — Mexican author Octavio Paz, 74, was awarded the De Tequeville Prize by the Institute of France on Thursday.

The award and a cash prize of \$17,000 are given for work reflecting humanitarian ideals.

Paz is the author of a reflecting works from poetry and prose to essays and plays, often exploring the difference between Western and Oriental concepts of creation.

### Garson forgets lines at dedication ceremony

**DALLAS (AP)** — Academy Award-winning actress Greer Garson says the groundbreaking ceremony for a new hospital unit was interrupted by laughter because "I forgot my lines."

The ceremony was Wednesday for the Fogelson Education Unit, named in honor of her late husband, at Presbyterian Hospital.

Garson and her husband, Col. E. E. "Buddy" Fogelson, a Dallas oilman, lawyer and rancher, donated a \$1 million challenge grant to help in construction of the unit.

Fogelson died in 1987 at the age of 87 after a lengthy battle with Parkinson's disease.

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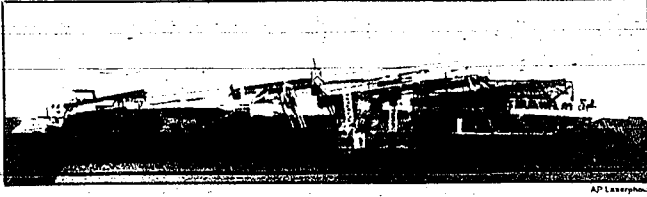
# Proposed monument evokes nausea, not pride

LOS ANGELES (AP) — It may be "Clouds of Steel" but it looks like something that fell over. No, it looks like one of those contraptions in a gravel quarry. No, it's an industrial pier. No, it's art. No, it's ...

Whatever it is, the design that won a competition for a proposed multimillion-dollar West Coast Gateway monument leaves few observers undecided about whether it would be a majestic answer to the Statue of Liberty or a monstrous mishmash.

The Gateway would be "scattering of structures shaped as squares, cones and rectangles, containing museums, theaters, gardens and aquariums, built over a downtown stretch of the Hollywood Freeway to honor the city as the nation's center of modern immigration."

The design by Hani Rashid of New

"Brace yourself," radio station KNX editor noted. "Its creators call it the West Coast Gateway, L.A.'s answer to the Statue of Liberty, a

vative concepts celebrating the ethnic diversity of the nation, the cultural roots of the community that has been enriched by that diversity, and the need to bring into the Civic Center an exciting focal point that bears witness to this heritage as well as the vitality of contemporary life," the Times said.

"Clouds of Steel" was selected by a jury from 150 entries in a competition initiated by Mayor Tom Bradley. The mayor has not made any comment on the choice since it was announced Dec. 6.

Nick Patsouras, chairman of the Gateway project, on Wednesday agreed that the mayor should leave such matters to his cultural affairs commissioners and he criticized two City Council members who had negative reactions.

"How can you express an opinion on such a fundamental vision from a copy of a picture without seeing the model, without talking with the

artist to see his vision?" Patsouras said.

But the furor shows that people are taking it seriously and as a debate over the future of Los Angeles, he said. "It's a project that entails passion. ... Every place I go people are discussing it."

The structure would cost \$33 million but that does not include other costs such as leasing airspace over the freeway from the state Department of Transportation. Patsouras had no estimates for any of the other costs.

The committee will begin seeking funding from private donors at the beginning of the new year, he said. He hopes to have plans, permits and construction on the first of four phases under way in 1 1/2 to two years.

Critics have pointedly noted that the designers are from New York.

The suburban papers called it a "meaningless pile of scrap" and suggested that funding for the "praying

# Judge rules state may retain creche but must display disclaimer

FRANKFORT, Ky. (AP) — A large creche the state erected in front of the Capitol can remain despite objections that it amounts to state sponsorship of religion, a federal judge ruled Wednesday.

But the state was ordered to meet several conditions by week's end or remove the barn-like structure with its manger and animal statues. U.S. District Judge William O. Bertelsman said the state must come up with private funding and post a large disclaimer stating that it is not endorsing any religion.

The American Civil Liberties Union had sought to force the state to remove the creche, which is without figurines of the infant Jesus and other humans. Its request for an in-

junction was turned down. Suzy Post, director of the Kentucky ACLU, said from her Louisville office that she had not read the opinion.

"What we would have liked obviously is for the thing to be taken down right now. ... On the other hand, what the judge has done is separate religion that there has to be a separation between church and state," she said.

Bertelsman's first condition was that "all past and future expenditures of public funds ... be defrayed by private contributions."

State officials have said that materials for the landscaped creche cost about \$1,200, but that did not include salaries of the state workers who erected it.

Kevin Hable, a lawyer for Gov. Wallace Wilkinson, said he believed the state already had been offered enough money to recover what had been spent on the creche to date and to pay for its continued maintenance.

Bertelsman's second condition was that the state erect a prominent disclaimer, readable by anyone passing in a car.

He dictated this wording: This display was not constructed with public funds and does not constitute

an endorsement by the commonwealth of any religion or religious doctrine.

He also ordered the state to post a public notice that the area around the creche is a "public forum ... available to all responsible citizens and civic and religious groups for holiday ceremonies, pageants or displays."

Finally, Bertelsman said the state must adopt a policy on the creche's use.

— Pat Abell, another of Wilkinson's lawyers, said he believed Bertels-

man's conditions were "just and equitable" and that he would recommend the state accept them.

Attorneys for Wilkinson contended the creche was only part of a general Christmas display, a reminder of the holiday's religious significance and, therefore, constitutional.

The 30-foot state Christmas tree was about 100 yards behind the creche.


Elsewhere on the Capitol grounds, trees and lampposts have been decorated with lights, ribbons and holly.

And the state's large floral clock behind the Capitol was decorated as a huge snowflake.

But the ACLU said the creche was "the dominant structure," the first thing a visitor would see and had "the primary effect of sponsoring ... religion."

The creche, although without traditional human figurines for legal reasons, was staffed on some nights by members of area churches as a living nativity scene.

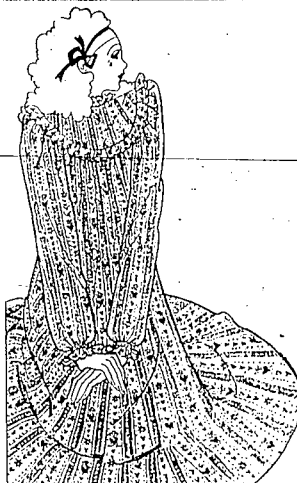

## Erick Newman: Still outplaying his taller foes

MORAGA, Calif. — Impact players in the West Coast Athletic Conference — the home of Loyola Marymount — typically shoot first and ask questions later.

So what is former College of Southern Idaho center Erick Newman, all 6-feet, 4-inches, and 190 pounds of him, doing ranked No. 7 in the WCAC in offensive rebounding and No. 2 in shooting percentage?

Erick is used to playing against bigger players, said Lynn Nance, his coach at St. Mary's College. "He and the rest of our players have been outsized, and that's going to be the case all year. He's a fundamentally solid defensive player and he understands how to play a bigger opponent."

Newman, a senior who played on CSI's National Junior-College Athletic Association championship team two years ago, set a school record for field goal percentage at St. Mary's last season, led the Gaels in rebounding (6.5 boards a game) and finished second (13.0 points) in scoring average. The team wound up 19-9 and missed a postseason berth, probably because three other WCAC teams went to the NCAA or the NIT.

This year, St. Mary's is off to a 6-0 start pending a game against Idaho State in Pocatello tonight. Although Gaels' forward Robert Haugen, who was on a number of preseason All-America lists, is a big reason why Newman is off to a strong start. In six games, he is averaging 13.3 points and 5.2 rebounds, is shooting 70.7 percent from the field, has 29 assists and 20 steals.

"I feel like I'm off to a better start this year," said Newman. "When I came in here from Southern Idaho, I didn't do much conditioning. I had the attitude that I could walk right

in and be ready. I got by last season, but my endurance wasn't what it should have been. So this summer, I ran, lifted weights and came in physically ready to play. I've noticed a lot of difference in how I feel physically this season."

Newman is technically a power forward in the Gaels' scheme of things, but in reality his role is much the same as it was at CSI. He typically draws the biggest, strongest opponent and the assignment of neutralizing him.

"There are a lot of similarities between what we did at Idaho and what we do here defensively," said Newman. "Coach Nance's philosophy is the same as Coach (Fred) Trenkle's: good defense becomes good offense."

"Offensively, it's not the same," Newman continued. "At Idaho, we went up and down the floor a little more. Here, it's more complex, a little more patient. It took a little time for me to adjust."

In fact, the Gaels run and gun less than most WCAC teams, which places a premium on controlling the boards as a way of moderating the tempo. Much of that assignment falls to Newman.

"Marymount averaged 110 points a game last year and scored 164 points in one game," said Newman. "It's not only that you have to stop them from scoring, but you have to handle their pressure defense that causes the turnovers."

"From our standpoint, the most important things Erick does are playing decent defense and giving us some solid rebounding," said Nance. "But he's quick enough to play against smaller players and selective enough that he is a high-percentage shooter."

Newman's shooting touch — for a

## Thousands of teen athletes may be taking steroids

CHICAGO — As many as half a million teenage boys may be using anabolic steroids to improve their appearance or athletic performance, despite possible dangerous side effects, a researcher said Thursday.

"We're talking about potentially abusive behavior that has to be addressed directly, or we may have individuals who grow up and suffer adverse health consequences," said W.E. Buckley, assistant professor of health education at Pennsylvania State University.

In a survey of 3,403 senior boys at 46 public and private high schools nationwide in the fall of 1987, 225 boys, or 6.6 percent of those responding, said they had used steroids,

Buckley and associates reported in Friday's Journal of the American Medical Association.

Although the research wasn't based on a random sample of the nation's high schools, the study suggested that 250,000 to 500,000 adolescents are using or have used steroids.

"I didn't have any idea it would be this high," Buckley said, calling his study the first of its scope in the nation.

Androgenic anabolic steroids are synthetic derivatives of male hormones some athletes take to help build up their muscles. Doctors have reported in recent years that steroids have been linked to serious side effects, such as mood-swings, severe acne, baldness, temporary sterility, abnormal liver function, high blood

pressure, cardiovascular disease and possibly cancer of the liver and testes.

While nearly half the boys in the study using steroids said they did so to improve athletic performance, 26.7 percent said they popped them or injected them for the muscular appearance the drugs can help produce.

"It's the new-age, body beautiful, fitness people out there as well who are using anabolic steroids," Buckley said in a telephone interview.

About 10 percent said they used steroids to treat sports-related injuries and 7.1 percent cited social reasons, such as peer pressure.

The study also showed that about one in five seniors claiming to take steroids said they got the drugs from a doctor, pharmacist or veterinarian,

and 38.9 percent said they first took the drugs at age 15 or younger.

The study called for starting education to head off steroid use as early as junior high school, noting that 35 percent of those who said they used steroids did not participate in school sports.

Societal attitudes must be changed to get young people to avoid the quick fix they think steroids can provide, Buckley said.

"You have to change the values. We're ones putting all the emphasis on sports. We're the ones putting all the emphasis on appearance."

Focus on steroid use intensified after the Summer Olympics, where Canadian sprinter Ben Johnson was stripped of his gold medal in the 100-

meter dash when it was determined he had used the anabolic steroid Stanozolol.

Parents looking for steroid use should watch for unusually fast muscle growth, mood swings, or flare-ups of acne in their children, Buckley said.

Most studies on the long-term effects of steroids have involved people using them legally for other ailments, so further study of the drugs' effects — particularly on healthy, growing adolescents — is needed, Buckley added.

In the short term, steroids reduce sperm production, Buckley said. Some studies indicate steroid use can stop natural growth of bones, meaning they could make young steroid users shorter than they would have been over time.

## Steroids come from black market Drug is a version of testosterone

Most of the dangerous, muscle-building steroids used in the United States are obtained through the black market and less often from doctors prescribing the drug illegally, experts say.

"Some of the drugs are manufactured in the United States, but most of them are smuggled into the country from places such as Mexico, where they are available over the counter."

"There are some little home labs where they're importing the drug and then printing up phony labels," Dr. Bob Goldman, chairman

of the Amateur Athletic Union's medical committee, said Thursday. He said fake steroids from East Germany, Italy and France "are really hot now" among young users.

Drugs also come into the country with "athletes who travel overseas and come back to the states with suitcases filled," Goldman said.

In terms of getting it from a physician, "that's dropping off a lot because of litigation and changes in the repercussions," Goldman said. While penalties have gotten stiffer in the United States for trafficking steroids, doctors also are more aware of dangerous possible side effects, such as liver cancer and heart disease.

NEW YORK — Anabolic steroids, the substance taken to help build muscle, are manufactured versions of a male sex hormone called testosterone.

In children and teen-agers, steroids can make bones stop growing prematurely and prevent a child from reaching normal height, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration warned last year.

Health authorities also say steroids can cause breast enlargement in men, along with testicle shrinkage, impotence and enlarged prostate. In women, steroids have been linked

to deepened voice, beard growth, baldness and breast diminution.

Steroid users of either gender may also show liver disorders and "roid rage," which is increased aggression and antisocial behavior. A study of steroid-taking athletes published earlier this year found mental problems ranging from deep depression to impulsive buying sprees and outbursts of violent rage.

Anabolic steroids are different from anti-inflammatory steroids, which are commonly used in medicine. Anabolic steroids also have some medically approved uses, such as treating certain types of anemia.

smuggling ring in which he was involved was responsible for up to 70 percent of the drug in the United States.

"I get them as young as 12, 13, 14 and 15," Goldman said. "That's the new group we see coming in strong. What do they watch

### SPOILED BY THE RIDE

It used to be that only race cars featured spoilers. As more racing technology is incorporated into the design of passenger cars, however, spoilers are showing up with much more frequency. These air-cutting devices do more than add to a car's good looks. They actually improve its aerodynamic efficiency by reducing the vehicle's coefficient of drag. That is to say that the front spoiler moves oncoming air around the vehicle smoothly to prevent under car turbulence. The rear spoiler improves the efficiency and location of suction and turbulence in an effort to stabilize the ride. The result is improved fuel efficiency by an average of two percent, and a superior ride. This makes spoilers worth looking into as an option if they are not already provided.

## Drama group hooks kids on books

43 area children will present 'Best Pageant'

The play rehearsal is fast-paced and controlled. "That's going to be 10,000 times louder, please," says the director. "OK, let's slow down and try that again ... More emotion: You're ready to pull your hair out ... I'm hearing 'whatuf', not 'what it'."

The actors respond quickly, precisely — amazing, considering that they range in age from 3 to 14.

Hooked on Books — Live! is a new children's drama group, assembled just last month under the sponsorship of Judi Baxter, owner of Judi's Bookstore. The group is rehearsing almost daily, preparing to present its first play, 'The Best Christmas Pageant Ever,' as a part of this year's downtown holiday festivities.

"I've been dreaming about this for a long time now," said Baxter, as she pointed toward her cast of 43 children, all of whom were required to audition for parts. "I think productions like this can literally bring books alive for children." Baxter added that she plans to make Hooked on Books — Live! an ongoing drama group in the city. And she would like to encourage even more children to be involved in the two plays a year that she plans to produce.

"The Best Christmas Pageant Ever," a play based on the popular Barbara Robinson book, is a humorous and sentimental story of the rough and tumble Herdman kids who have never heard of the Christmas story, but who crash the auditions of a church Christmas pageant and end up as its cast. As the play progresses, the Christmas story takes on new meaning for everyone involved.

"It's my all-time favorite book," said Baxter, who admitted that she sometimes cries when she reads the script.

Baxter has a college degree in elementary education with a minor in drama. She said she feels that both young actors and their audiences gain much by doing plays from children's books. "I think it's important for kids to have an outlet like this," she said. "It's a good use of their time."

She added that she first began making definite plans for the new drama group after she directed

Baxter is quick to note that her group will not, in any way, be competing with the JUMP Company. The JUMP Company is phenomenal," she said. "But my group is not musically based, so kids who have no musical background, talent, or desire can perform in these plays."

The Business Improvement District is providing some advertising for the play.

"When I heard that the Festival of Trees would be downtown this year, I approached the BID with the idea of coming up with other activities for the rest of the month of December," said Baxter, who explained that one of her ulterior motives is to convince people of the need to use one of the empty downtown buildings as a civic center.

Still, that idea will have to wait a while. Right now, all of Baxter's spare time is spent rehearsing 43 eager children. "Jodi Geren is an absolute natural (Imogene)," said Baxter, referring to the casting she had to do for the Christmas play. "And David Christensen's Ralph Herdman is developing very nicely, as is the character of Alice (played by Erin Miciak, who is only 8 years old)."

In fact, Baxter said that the only downside of this whole event is the fact that there are so many talented kids in the community. "The play was extremely difficult to cast because there were any number of children who could have played any of the parts," she said.

The community will have the chance to see all of this firsthand, at the old Bon Marche Building today through Sunday. "This play is such a wonderful family event," said Baxter. "I expect a great turnout for it."

## Nintendo popularity grows as video game debate continues

"Our club is called the NES Masters. We know right off who our Power Player is. His name is 'Ace Ebb'." He writes to Nintendo all the time telling him his accomplishments on games. His hobbies are playing Nintendo games, period. He has no pets; instead he plays Nintendo all day! He beat Metroid in three days, Tyson in five, saved Zelda in three days, and finished Super Mario Bros. in five — NES Masters.

Is that what you're going to get after you dutifully spend a hundred bucks on more (almost certainly more) on the year's hottest toy: the Nintendo Entertainment System?

Is your child, too, liable to end up a video game addict of the first order, fit to be celebrated only in Nintendo Power magazine — another 'Ace Ebb'?

Well, you'd hardly be the only parent taking the risk in order to please the kid. The Nintendo system, in its various hardware configurations, has been the No. 1 toy in the United States for more than a year, the trade journal Toy and Hobby World reports.

According to Nintendo, 12 percent of American homes have the systems, which include a control deck that plugs into a TV set or color monitor,

hand-held push pad controllers, a Zapper light gun, software for the more than 90 games in its library, and other peripherals. Nintendo has projected \$1.7 billion in sales for its own products and those of its licensees for 1988. And the American home video game marketplace has grown more than 100 percent in the last year, according to the company.

The systems are selling twice as well this year as last, confirms Sean McGowan, a toy industry analyst with New York stock-brokerage house Bais, Zorn, Gerard Inc.

Nintendo is not the only home video game manufacturer in the market, but it is by far the most popular. McGowan puts its market share at 75 percent to 80 percent; Nintendo puts it at 83 percent. Sega and Atari share the rest of the sales. Nintendo's vast popularity is due to the company's challenging fantasy and sports games, excellent graphics and superior marketing.

And so there are millions of boys — video games appeal far more to males than to females, and Nintendo cites as its traditional market boys 8 to 15 years old — creating a vast demand for Nintendo systems, game cartridges, accessories and publications.

In the Japanese corporation's American headquarters in Redmond, **•See NINTENDO on Page D2**

 Wash., there are 110 full-time "game counselors" and customer-service representatives who answer more than 100,000 calls and 14,000 letters per week from players seeking assistance with game questions.  
 Although video games are not new — the first wave of these systems hit big in the early 1980s with Atari and ColecoVision — their effects on children are still a matter of debate. Researchers and writers on the topic have found much to love and loathe. Proponents cite the games as useful teaching tools; critics say that the games may encourage violent behavior, are too expensive for some families and can be addictive.  
 "Generally, research has confirmed that there are positive cognitive effects (from playing video games)," says Patricia Marks Greenfield, a professor of psychology at the University of California at Los Angeles.  
 Greenfield, author of "Mind and Media: The Effects of Television, Video Games and Computers" (Harvard University Press, \$25), concludes that children can truly benefit from playing video games. The interactive quality of both video games and computers force children to actively create stimuli and information, not merely consume them, she writes.  
 Improved eye-hand coordination is often cited as a primary benefit of video game play. Critics often note that such coordination can be developed in other ways, such as sewing, but Greenfield disputes the proposition that video games are merely sense-motor games of eye-hand coordination and that they are, therefore, mindless.  
 "First, she says, such skills are important in themselves and in developing other skills. And, she writes, "There is much more to the games than eye-hand coordination. In fact, not only are they complex, they incorporate types of complexity that are impossible — with conventional games. The games call on players to figure out the action by observation, forcing children to use inductive skills to be successful, she says.  
 Also, players must take in information from several sources simultaneously. She writes that learning to play such a game brings out "important skills such as flexibility and orientation toward independent achievement. But, she notes, such transfer from the games to other domains cannot be taken for granted; it

is far from automatic."  
 Geoffrey R. and Elizabeth Loftus, professors of psychology at the University of Washington and authors of "Mind at Play: The Psychology of Video Games" (Basic Books, \$14.95), say that familiarity with video games makes children more comfortable with computers and spurs interest in learning to understand and program them. By their nature, video games provide motivation, they write; also, they have built-in levels of challenge. But they believe that the main argument to be made in favor of video games is their educational potential for helping children with difficulties in math or reading — not the intent of the commercial games that kids clamor for.  
 But whether children derive much benefit from playing the commonly available, popular games "remains an open question," Geoffrey Loftus says. More research needs to be done.  
 But what else could children be learning from video games? Many games can be considered violent. Players shoot at, blow up or otherwise destroy opponents and obstacles to score points. Some games require a gun accessory, which the player points at the screen to kill off bad guys, or ducks.  
 "I just don't like the violent action games," Greenfield says. "I would not hesitate to censor the games."  
 Violent games are just playing into all these risky, negative impulses kids have," says Dr. Alvin Poussant, an associate professor of psychiatry at Harvard University Medical School. In his view, video violence is just a new presentation of the messages that we give children, particularly boys, about the acceptability of violence.  
 "The companies will argue with you to death on this, saying there's no proof. Yet, on the other hand, there seems to be a continuum in the exposure and level of violence," Poussant says.  
 Dr. Victor Strasburger, a member of the American Academy of Pediatrics Communications Committee, agrees. "Certainly those video games that are aggressive in nature are not good for the child. That's about the understated electronic war toys. The idea of shooting things, I think, has gone too far."  
 The cost of video games is also a concern for many families. With game cartridges ranging from about \$25 to more than \$50 each, and the

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# Moonlighting: Will they, can they ... bring back the fun?

**HOLLYWOOD** — At first, the clever conundrum on "Moonlighting" was: Will they or won't they? As in *Do It, Get It On or, as David Addison used to say to Maddie Hayes, "Boink."*

Now, the consummate question is: Can they or can't they?

As in whether the Blue Moon detectives can rekindle their romance with viewers and keep the TV series alive in the Nielsen ratings this season. And do it without the services of the show's creator, executive producer and heart, mind and soul, Glenn Gordon Caron.

Consider, for a moment, the situation after last season's debacle (including one misguided plot twist in which a very-pregnant Maddie married some wimpy stranger she met on a train instead of David).

Critics who just two years ago were praising "Moonlighting's" spirited spunk seemed ready to pull the plug on its life-support system because of too ineredulous a story line and too many repeats of repeats. Even ABC Entertainment President Brandon Stoddard feared "Moonlighting" had lost its pulse and reportedly considered canceling it.

Add in the complications of Cybill Shepherd's twins, Bruce Willis' overexposed career and tabloid headlines about everyone's off-screen shenanigans — "Glenn Hates Cybill," "Cybill Hates Glenn," "Bruce Hates Cybill," "Cybill Hates Bruce," "Is Farruh Far Behind?" —

and suddenly that idiotic dream device used by Dallas to wipe out a bad year starts looking smarter and smarter.

It is not enough that "Moonlighting" is proceeding on budget and on schedule so far this season (16 or 17 new episodes are planned). Or that the stars are getting along swimmingly: "We are having a wonderful time on the set," Shepherd reports. "Everything seems to be going very well."

Producers know that to win back viewers and critics alike they must return to the comedic formula — and away from last season's emotional black hole — at least made the series a hit in the first place.

"We want the show to be fun again," says day Daniel, Caron's co-executive producer who took over full stewardship this season. "From show No. 2 forward, we're really back to David and Maddie dealing with cases again and dealing with each other in a little more lighthearted way than they were able to with the baby and everything else."

"The only problem is that 'Moonlighting' has never been a formula show. And that distinction points to the creative dilemma in which TV's innovators often find themselves: How to take risks on a popular show without risking alienating that show's loyal following."

"It's a tightrope. There's no question about it," Daniels says. "An audience likes to feel comfortable with a show, and along with the comfort sometimes comes pre-

dictability, and along with predictability ultimately comes boredom. So we've always taken surprise over comfort. But at times it's made our audience very uncomfortable."

Creative consultant Roger Director, formerly the show's chief writer, agrees that "people seem to have this conception that last year was a huge head-on collision where we messed up. But I see it as a laudable achievement given the fact that we had to build a whole story line around some very physical realities because of Cybill's pregnancy."

"Plus, Glenn's credo was that if you're not getting the characters in trouble, then you're not doing an interesting show."

What Caron did not bargain for, it seems, was that he would get him-

self in trouble as well.

The official version says that Caron voluntarily left the show last spring to pursue full time his fledgling career as a feature film director ("Clean and Sober"). But other sources say that Caron was pushed out by the network because of all the turmoil.

Both Caron and ABC refused comment on the circumstances surrounding his departure. But sources say that a long-brewing conflict between Caron and Shepherd, who returned to the show last January after her twins were born three months earlier, reached such a crescendo that the entire spring shooting schedule was jeopardized.

One calculation shows that the actress was working only 2½ hours

a day and costing the production \$9 million in delays. "First, there were creative differences about her character," says one source. "Then there was the frustration of not being able to get her out of her trailer."

Shepherd denies this account, maintaining that when she returned from maternity leave, she worked a full day, from 7 a.m. to 6 p.m. The 2½-hour figure is inaccurate, she says, because it does not account for makeup, hair, lighting and set changes. The only time she was in her trailer, she says, was when she was nursing.

Problems escalated to the point that ABC's Stoddard threatened to cancel "Moonlighting" altogether unless the producers could tell him where they were going with the show both in terms of budget and content.

Caron will say only that "I take full responsibility" for last season's plot derailments, including the notion that Maddie would get pregnant without knowing who the father was and the decision to place her in a quickie marriage.

In spite of complaints from viewers about last season, "Moonlighting's" ratings did not slide dramatically. After ending the 1986-1987 season in ninth place with an average audience of about 19.5 million households a week, the series only dropped to 12th last season with about 16.2 million homes a week.

More devastating was the sudden critical assault. After making the

cover of Newsweek within a year of its mid-season debut, "Moonlighting" found itself standing in the shadows while "Thirtysomething" looked in the limelight as the media's darling of the moment.

"The frustrating thing is that, like cultural figures and political candidates, we build them up and inevitably take them apart piece by piece," Egle says. "It didn't matter what we were going to do. Because we were getting so much adulation and praise, somebody had to write the newspaper story that the bloom is off the rose over at 'Moonlighting.'"

This season, because of budget constraints, there will not be any attention-grabbing, dollar-gobbling episodes like the full-costumed Shakespearean remake or the Stanley Dohen-directed musical number. But Daniels notes that episode No. 2 features a hot-air balloon chase "which I think is going to be fun," and that plans are under way for a sealed-down show that pays homage to '50s-style horror movies tentatively titled "Attack of the 50-Foot Maddie."

Both Willis and Shepherd have another year left on their contract after this, and ABC executives publicly say that they hope to get at least another season out of "Moonlighting."

Caron predicts the show "can last as long as the creative people at its center care. If they begin to lose interest, then the show can't last."

## Give someone a book - one they'll want to read

A friend told me the other day that he was two-thirds of the way through Stephen W. Hawking's "A Brief History of Time."

"That's a GUB, you know," I said smartly.

"A GUB?"

"One of the Great Unread Books of Our Time."

Can it be that nobody is reading a book that has been at or near the top of the non-fiction best-seller list for six months? That is the claim made in a recent New York magazine story that tried to explain why books with intellectual themes, such as Hawking's attempts at a unified theory of the universe, have been such big hits the last two years.

People buy them, the article postulated, but nobody gets through them. Some people don't even open them.

Unless you have a friend like mine (who has to be home by 8 to watch "The Mind" on PBS and who will finish every last word of "A Brief History of Time" if it kills him), you may at this very moment be wondering which best-sellers the book lover in your life might actually read.

And so, with an eye toward readability (and a nod to literary merit), we offer a guide to some current and recent fiction and non-fiction that we think your friends will finish — and maybe even enjoy.

**FICTION**

"Anything for Billy," by Larry McMurtry, Simon and Schuster, \$18.95.

It does not have the sweep and scope of McMurtry's epic "Lonesome Dove," but "Anything for Billy" is a delight. Billy is Billy the Kid; the narrator is one Ben Sippy, a dime novelist with a soft spot for the Kid. With its kooky cast of characters and winsome style, "Anything for Billy" transports you to a wildly imagined Wild West.

"Breathing Lessons," by Anne Tyler, Knopf, \$18.95.

Baltimore's Anne Tyler is back with an unusual portrait of a 28-year marriage, told on a hot summer's day as Maggie and Ira drive to the fune-

rial of Maggie's best friend's husband.

"Tracks," by Louise Erdrich; Henry Holt, \$18.95.

Met with wide-spread acclaim, Erdrich's latest novel prefigures in time "Love Medicine" and "The Beet Queen," which are part of the same cycle. Erdrich's strong characters are members of a North Dakota Indian tribe, pushed to the brink of their endurance by the struggle to keep what is left of their lands.

"The Queen of the Damned," by Anne Rice; Knopf, \$18.95.

The Hartford Courant reviewer called the third in Rice's Vampire Chronicles "compelling reading" and applauded Rice for her skill in making the life of our day's Jesse James fierce more. Zerelda Samuel.

"Last Notes From Home," by Fredrick Exley; Random House, \$18.95.

It took him 20 years to complete his trilogy about a protagonist who shares his name — but who is not, Exley insists, an autobiographical character — but it was worth the wait.

"Love in the Time of Cholera," by Gabriel Garcia Marquez; Knopf, \$18.95.

Our critic called Marquez's novel about "life, love, old age and death" a "masterpiece." It charts the 51-year love of a man for a woman who rejected him in his youth.

"The Twenty-Seventh City," by Jonathan Franzen; Farrar, Straus & Giroux, \$19.95.

One critic called Franzen's fat volume a "bustling and audacious first novel." In his fictional St. Louis, the corrupt police chief, originally from Bombay, tries to take over the city through terrorist tactics.

**NON-FICTION**

"The First Salute," by Barbara W.

Tuchman; Alfred A. Knopf, \$22.95.

With her novelistic prose, Tuchman brings history vibrantly alive. In "The First Salute," the historian "casts a cold, unerring eye on Great Britain's botched handling of the American Revolution," the Courant reviewer said.

"Gracie: A Love Story," by George Burns; G.P. Putnam's Sons, \$16.95.

Best-selling author George Burns tells a very personal story about his late wife, Gracie Allen, "the woman who was smart enough to become the dumbest woman in show business."

"The Facts," by Philip Roth; Farrar, Straus & Giroux, \$17.95.

Just when you think you know all about Roth, his alter-ego Nathan Zuckerman tells you in an epilogue to more or less discount everything you have just read. An intriguing, if quizzical, autobiography.

"Borrowed Time: An AIDS Memoir," by Paul Monette; Harcourt Brace Jovanovich, \$18.95.

Novelist and screenwriter Paul Monette's heartbreaking but very human account of his lover's doomed battle with AIDS.

"The Ragman's Son," by Kirk Douglas; Simon and Schuster, \$21.95.

Issur Danielovitch was the son of a rag collector before he made it to the pinnacle in Hollywood. Movie-star exploits told with verve.

"Golda: Golda Meir, the Romantic Years," by Ralph G. Martin; Scribner, \$19.95.

The first of two volumes, this lively biography of the woman who was once prime minister of Israel portrays her as a youthful beauty who had affairs with many of the men who helped her build a country.

"Two-Part Invention: The Story of a Marriage," by Madeleine L'Engle; Farrar, Straus & Giroux, \$18.95.

Madeleine L'Engle conveys with dignity, humor and pathos the joys of her 40-year marriage to actor Hugh Franklin and her grief.

## Boxed sets of compact discs make a perfect holiday gift

Gift-giving was easy in the early days of compact discs. Consumers were just starting their collections and eager for almost any album by a favorite artist.

Now that CDs have been around a few years, however, many consumers have sizable collections, which makes it increasingly difficult to find just the right gift item. That is why some industry insiders believe that there will be a rise in the number of CD boxed sets.

Pete Howard, publisher of the ICE newsletter, said that Columbia Records' success with Bob Dylan's "Biograph" box in 1986 and PolyGram's success with Eric Clapton's "Crossroads" box earlier this year alerted companies to the potential of these sets.

"I think the field is wide open," he said. "There are a lot of artists who have a 20th or 25th anniversary coming up and would be ideal subjects."

Sensing a market for special packages, Capitol

Records has issued "CD Gift Sets" spotlighting Frank Sinatra, Nat King Cole, the Beach Boys, Pink Floyd and the Band. Unlike the "Biograph" concept — which features a retrospective of an artist's career plus an illustrated booklet outlining the artist's history — the Capitol packages simply offer four regular albums by the artists at a budget price.

The Band "Gift Set," for instance, includes "Music From Big Pink," "The Band," "Cahoots" and an abridged version of "Rock of Ages." Where the four CDs would cost around \$45 if bought separately, the set goes for approximately \$37.

Along more traditional "Biograph" lines are three-disc Chuck Berry and two-disc Willie Dixon sets from MCA and a four-disc Miles Davis set from Columbia. The MCA packages retail for about \$39 and \$25 respectively, while the Davis box sells for around \$37.

ICE's Howard said that PolyGram is already at work on sets by the Bee Gees and the Allman Brothers for next year, while MCA is thinking of Elton John and Who sets.

## Tax proposed to fund public broadcasting

**HOLLYWOOD** — In an effort to free public broadcasting from improper political and commercial influences, a private study group is proposing that federal appropriations to America's non-commercial radio and television stations be replaced with a 2 percent tax on all factory sales of consumer electronic products and certain communications equipment.

The group also is calling for the elimination of the Corporation for Public Broadcasting, the non-profit agency that has funneled congressional appropriations to the public radio and TV systems for the past 20 years.

The creation of a 2 percent tax would generate, according to the group's projections, more than \$600 million annually.

# Part in 'Rain Man' not easy for Hoffman

NEW YORK (AP) — Dustin Hoffman shuddered. The screening room projector flickered with "rushes" of his first day's work in "Rain Man." Fighting off nausea, Hoffman knew his portrayal of an autistic man stank.

"It was death," Hoffman recalled in an interview with The Associated Press. "It was the worst work I had ever done. ... I said, 'I can't do it.'" Defeated, the Academy Award-winning actor suggested the producers try Richard Dreyfuss instead.

Hoffman, whose past triumphs include playing a woman in "Tootsie," was stunned by the part of Raymond Babbitt, a middle-aged autistic savant.

In "Rain Man," opening today in Twin Falls, the long-institutionalized Raymond is largely incapable of basic human emotions and speech, but gifted with superior mathematical and memorization skills.

It's not an easy part. Having researched autism so intensively he was buried in documents and video-cassettes, Hoffman, 51, had to dump his notes and observations in his dressing room and, well, act. No plot contrivances offered shelter.

As Hoffman tells it, all he could manage at first was a mish-mash of his past work, mixing bits of the timid, near-sighted prisoner Louis in 1973's "Papillon" and the sickly Ratzo Rizzo in "Midnight Cowboy" from 1969.

Then, three weeks into filming, Hoffman and co-star Tom Cruise were driving down a bleak highway near tiny Cogar, Okla. The temperature, over 100 degrees, was matched by the humidity. In a sweat-soaked improvisation, Hoffman started talking about how much Raymond missed his Hanes underwear. And he just wouldn't stop.

With those cotton briefs, Hoffman figured it all out.

"It looked like to me that you could have talked about your underwear forever," Hoffman said director Barry Levinson told him. "And I suddenly realized that yes, this character is in the now, and he is nowhere if he's not in the now."

was playing off myself because I know something about obsession and I'm comfortable being obsessive. The rest of it just took care of itself."

"Rain Man" survived not only Hoffman's panic but also a year of screenplay revisions, the replacement of three directors, the scriptwriters' strike and the meddlings of various entertainment industry know-it-alls. It emerges as a modest exploration of greed, communication and familial understanding.

"I basically wanted to get it down to a conflict between two people on the road," Levinson said. "More and more of what we see in the movies are mechanical plots. We pump them up instead of saying, 'Let's just deal with the people.'"

## Oliver & Company provides ideal family holiday viewing

The following are capsule reviews of some of the films playing locally in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

**OLIVER & COMPANY (G).** Although it has virtually nothing to do with Dickens, Disney's new animated feature inspired by "Oliver Twist" is a bright, upbeat comedy that offers virtually ideal fare for family holiday viewing. The hip tone and broader, more cartoon-style animation puts the film in the tradition of "The Jungle Book," rather than "Pinocchio." Bette Midler, Cheech Marin and Billy Joel offer outstanding vocal performances as a snooty poodle, a half-crazed chihuahua and a street-smart mongrel. Teen-agers who usually reject animation as "kid stuff" will enjoy the rock songs and hip characters.

**DIRTY ROTTEN SCOUNDRELS (PG).** A resurrection of an old and not very funny vehicle for Marlon Brando and David Niven (the 1964 "Bedtime Story"), its greatest assets are its glorious look (courtesy of Michael Ballhaus' exceptional camera work) and Michael Caine. However, there is one problem that director Frank Oz and the picture's layers of writers have not quite solved: Steve Martin's character is a snake. Martin does him deliciously, but life to him is one, long ruthless scam, and something about that finally begins to lose its wonderfulness.

**THE LAND BEFORE TIME BEGAN (G).** This animation feature stars Littlefoot, a baby Brontosaurus, who will lose his mother and must find his way without her to the Great Valley, or starve. Director Don Bluth has gone to the trouble of giving very little children a sort of primer of dinosaur lore. It is nice that the Lucas-Spielberg forces, who are the film's executive producers, are behind the idea of overcoming differences and pulling together — that the Stegosaurus can lie down with the Pterodactyl, so to speak. But do dinosaurs really lend themselves to outside-cuteness?

**THE NAKED GUN (PG-13).** Zucker, Abrahams and Zucker, creators of the daffy TV police show satire, "Police Squad," return to the scene of the crime, offering more cruel slapstick, more non sequiturs, more stone-faced Leslie Nielsen quips, more inside-TV couch potato eggs, more bad puns and more of that tall guy whose head was not in camera range. There is a joke every 20 seconds or so; some of them thud, but enough work to keep things pretty hilarious. Written by Zucker, Abrahams and Zucker, and directed by David Zucker alone; with Nielsen, Ricardo Montalban and Reggie Jackson

**RAIN MAN (R).** A humorous, heartwarming look at an autistic savant (Dustin Hoffman) who, after inheriting \$3 million, travels across America with his unscrupulous, greedy brother (Tom Cruise).

**SCROOGED (R).** Dickens' "A Christmas Carol" transposed to modern times and to the cutthroat world of network television. Actually, it is not a bad notion for a satire comedy and this one begins well, but then veers entirely out of hand. Scrooge is now Bill Murray's Frank Cross, the youngest network president in the history of television, the dumbest and probably the nastiest.

**TEQUILA SUNRISE (R).** Written with writer-director Robert Towne's trademark artfulness, nicely acted and gorgeously pretty, this loving-foolish enterprise finally blows away into slick unsubstantiated. It still provides a nice outing for its three stars (Mel Gibson, Kurt Russell and Michelle Pfeiffer), shaped a little like those '40s movies when best pals Clark Gable and Henry Fonda both fell for the same beautiful dame.

**TWINS (PG).** This may be the ultimate High Concept movie. It is composed in exclamation points. Arnold Schwarzenegger and Danny DeVito as twins! Separated at birth after a genetic experiment that made Arnold a superhero and left Danny a scuzzball! Romancing two gorgeous sisters! Spilled out in identical suits! Pursued cross-country by crazed criminals! You think you can do anything with all of that? Call director Ivan Reitman and his two teams of screenwriters immediately; they haven't a clue.

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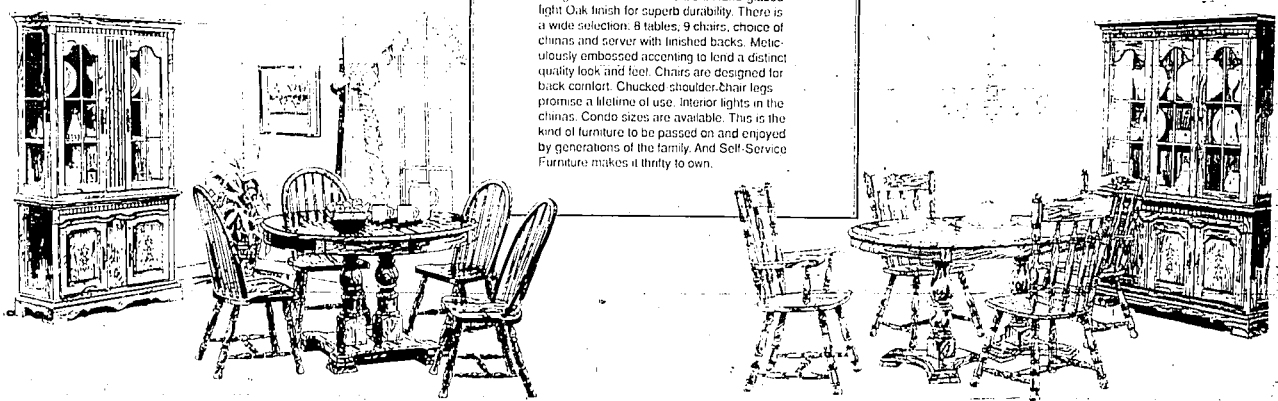

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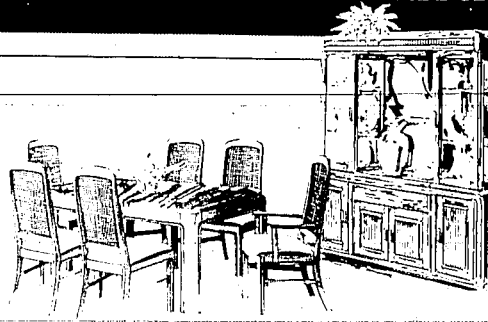

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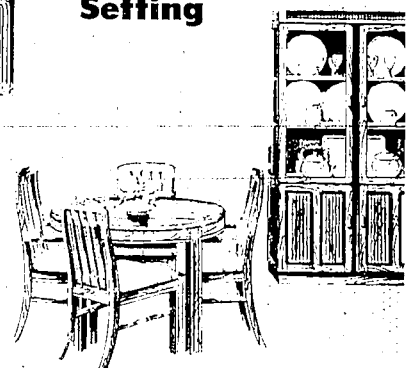

# Katarina Witt, Brian Orser take ice in Brian Boitano's ABC special

"I'm dead," says Brian Boitano, when he phones from Toronto during what sounds like the only free 45 minutes of his entire day. "I've been on a mad rush. We just came back from East Germany, and it was 24 hours for us to travel back. Then today my visa wasn't ready for Japan, so I spent two hours in the Japanese consulate. I just ran back and hopped on the phone right now."

The reason the Olympic gold medal-winning skater is so busy is that he has been spending the past month and a half filming an ABC special, "Brian Boitano: Canvas of Ice" (airing Monday, Dec. 19). It will feature special segments with two other skaters who dominated the 1988 Winter Olympics along with him: Katarina Witt, the striking two-time Olympic gold-medal winner from East Germany, and Brian Orser, the lithe, quick-footed Canadian who took the men's silver medal.

The reason he was in East Germany, in fact, was to film the segments with Witt, and he still sounds ecstatic that they were able to pull them off. "It wasn't trouble with Katarina," he says. "Katarina verbally told me she wanted to do it really badly. It was trouble with the timetable. And the government — getting permission from them. I still can't believe we got the stuff filmed and it's so good."

## CBS team rearranged

WASHINGTON — CBS News president David Burke reshuffled the Washington correspondent deck Tuesday, restoring Lesley Stahl to the White House beat and assigning Bob Schieffer to Capitol Hill.

Perhaps the biggest surprise was the reassignment of Phil Jones, after 12 years for CBS on Capitol Hill, to be national correspondent, a beat with considerably less airtime potential.

Bill Plante, who has been senior White House correspondent since August 1986, becomes State Department correspondent and will continue as anchor of "CBS Sunday Night News"

And the reason he was in Toronto when he called us was that earlier that day he had just finished filming a segment with Orser, whom he battled for the gold in one of the most intense showdowns in the entire 1988 Olympics.

"People at the Olympics couldn't believe that we were friends," Boitano says. "But the fact is that we sat next to each other in the dressing room that night in Calgary, and we talked about it a lot on the World Figure Skating Tour afterwards. No one can understand what we were going through that exact night except Brian and I. And that's a bonding that no one else in my life will have with me."

Boitano is also aware that had Orser not had a slight falling out on one of his landings the decision could have gone the other way. "I really don't believe there's a person who's the best in the world at something," he says. "I believe that they have given nights that they are best or they're potentially best. But there can never be the best of anything."

Matching strides with Witt and Orser is a stiff challenge for any skater, but it wasn't his most difficult task on the special. He also had to

skate by himself among the glaciers in Alaska.

"I think I have a new threshold of cold," he says with a laugh. "It was 15 below, and I had on just a button-down shirt and skating pants. After every take when they said, 'Cut,' I'd have seven people jumping on me with blankets."

Boitano's aim now is to be as good a professional as he was an amateur. But there's one challenge he's not up to — repeating the program that won him the gold medal. "I'll never do it again," he says. "People would only be disappointed, including myself. If I made one mistake, they would go, 'Oh, shoot. He made a mistake. He didn't make a mistake in Calgary.' And I would kill myself."

On the Cover Olympic gold medalist Brian Boitano, considered the best technician and athlete in the sport of figure skating, will be showing what he can do on the ice in his ABC special "Brian Boitano: Canvas of Ice." It airs Monday, Dec. 19.

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# Richard Attenborough receives permission to do film on Chaplin

# Passion for acting gives Dennehy enough energy to play three roles

Elizabeth Dennehy is usually three people each day. No, she doesn't suffer from multiple personalities syndrome. She is merely an actress (personality No. 1) playing the part of Blake in "Guiding Light" by day (No. 2) and that of Donna (No. 3) at night in the off-Broadway smash hit "Tony n' Tina's Wedding."

This schedule would probably send most people to a rest home, but Elizabeth, who absolutely loves to act, is brimming with energy.

Some would say that the pretty blonde actress got into the profession as a legacy from her famous father, the brilliant actor Brian Dennehy, and of course, they would be partly right. However, after listening to Elizabeth pour out her passion for acting, one would expect her to have found her way to center stage even if her father drove a truck for a living.

"People have come up to me during the reception to say, 'Aren't you on "Guiding Light"?' and I reply 'Yeah, don't I wish.' It's so much fun and the audience loves it."

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## 'Nova' show misses medical mark

HOLLYWOOD — Grappling with an issue that has confounded medical experts for decades, "Nova" focuses on the dilemma of changing the way physicians are trained in an episode titled "Can We Make a Better Doctor?" It airs Tuesday night on PBS.

The question is one of the most worthwhile in the growing realization that the United States lacks a rational national health policy. Unfortunately, the show, produced by station WGBH in Boston, is more of a video press release for Harvard Medical School than probing journalism.

"Nova" reports on a Harvard experiment called the "New Pathway," in

which the structure of the four-year medical-school curriculum has been changed. In place of the first two years being devoted to instruction in basic science, Harvard rushes students into clinical experiences — examining and diagnosing real patients — almost as soon as they arrive.

Whether that will work is a question that preoccupies a great deal of the American medical education system today. But in its reportorial approach, "Nova" portrays something that seems like medical students playing doctor.

Dr. Daniel Tosteson, the school's dean and principle force behind the new curriculum, is never interviewed in the hourlong program.

## Group cites broadcast for strides for women

WASHINGTON (AP) — The National Commission on Working Women on Tuesday honored the broadcast industry for making the 1980s "a decade of progress for women on television."

"Our report shows progress in the treatment of women (on television) over the past ten years and because of that, the networks get a pat on the back," said Sally Streenland, who wrote a study released by the commission entitled "Ten Years in Prime Time: An Analysis of the Image of Women on Entertainment Television, 1979-1988."

The report, citing the expansion and diversification of female characters in prime-time television, examined the portrayal of women and compared the fictional panorama with the profile of real-life women during the decade.

"The 1980s mark a decade of progress for women on television. Their portrayals have become more diverse and, for the most part, more true-to-life," the report concluded.

The commission also presented three new "Milestone" awards to people who "have made outstanding contributions to advancing the role of women through the media." The re-

cipients were ABC News senior correspondent Carole Simpson; "Cagney & Lacey" TV series actresses Sharon Gless and Tyné Daly and executive producer Barney Rosenzweig, and National Public Radio.

The study's examination of the 25 top Nielsen rated-shows from 1979 to the 1988 fall season revealed that as the percentage of working mothers increased in the workplace, so did their percentage in TV portrayals.

The study showed that 60 percent of TV's female characters worked in 1979. Three-quarters of the TV women were single, 10 percent were single mothers and 5 percent were married mothers.

By 1987, 75 percent of the women Americans watched "on television worked; one-fourth were single, 15 percent single mothers and 20 percent married mothers, according to the report.

Meanwhile, 1987 population statistics from the U.S. Census Bureau showed 56 percent of all women were in the labor force; 25 percent have never been married, 30 percent are married working mothers, 10 percent are single mothers and 25 percent are homemakers.

## Arctic wolf film features fascinating footage

NEW YORK (AP) — Arctic wolves live far from humans and have never been hunted, so they don't know enough to run from someone with a gun — or a camera.

Wildlife photographer Jim Brandenburg and wolf biologist David Mech took advantage of the wolves' tolerance and occasional curiosity during two years of observing them from a camp on Ellesmere Island, Canada, less than 500 miles from the North Pole.

The result was some rare and amazingly closeup footage of arctic wolves for Brandenburg's National Geographic Explorer film, "White Wolf," premiering this Sunday on SuperStation TBS.

Ellesmere Island is barren, so there was no way to hide from the wolves. But the scruffy, white-coated critter-were merely curious about Brandenburg and Mech's tents and cameras and four-wheel motorcycles.

Their remote location kept the wolves safe from persecution by humans who in other areas of North America kill them for attacking domestic stock and sometimes just for sport.

Wolves live under something of a monarchy, and the king and queen are the alpha male and female. At one point, the alpha female, nicknamed "Mom," came close enough to Mech that he could toss her bits of his sandwich. She also allowed the men to come within a few feet of her frisky pups.

Though the wolves are magnificent to watch, not that much new information is revealed by the film. Anyone who has read Farley Mowat's best-selling "Never Cry Wolf," or just seen the Disney film adaptation, already knows wolves are not the slathering, indiscriminate killers of lore, but highly intelligent creatures with a well-developed social structure.

## CBS shuffles to improve ratings

**HOLLYWOOD** — Third-rated CBS moved Tuesday to remedy its ailing prime-time schedule, canceling two new fall series, "The Van Dyke Show" and "Raising Miranda," and earmarking two other newcomers — "Dirty Dancing" and "Annie McGuire" — for indefinite hiatus.

The network also said that it had pulled the plug on the detective series "Simon and Simon" after seven years. The low-rated show, which stars Jameson Parker and Gerald McRaney as a pair of sleuthing brothers, will leave the air following its Dec. 31 broadcast, although two other completed episodes will be shown later.

"I wish CBS had waited until after Christmas (to announce the terminations)," lamented Sam Bobrick, co-executive producer of "The Van Dyke Show." "I guess this way they don't have to give anyone a present."

Tuesday's schedule changes came

the same day that the A.C. Nielsen Co. released last week's ratings, which contained what CBS confirmed were the worst prime-time numbers it had ever received during a regular TV season. The network's programming attracted an average of only 17 percent of the audience last week, compared to 24 percent for NBC and 21 percent for ABC. CBS Entertainment President Kim LeMasters and executive vice president Barbara Corday were unavailable for comment.

Taking over for "Raising Miranda" and "Dirty Dancing" Saturday nights, CBS said, will be "Dolphin Cove," starring Frank Converse as an American dolphin researcher working in Australia. It will debut Jan. 21. And the Smothers Brothers' variety show will return from Jan. 28 to Feb. 18 to replacing "Simon and Simon" in its Saturday block.

Meanwhile, CBS on Jan. 4 will move the low-rated newcomer "TV 101" into the Wednesday night slot

being vacated by "The Van Dyke Show" and "Annie McGuire." "Tour of Duty" will open its second season Jan. 3 in "TV 101's" current time slot, Tuesday nights.

"Annie McGuire," starring Mary Tyler Moore, will continue running Wednesdays through Dec. 28. A network spokesman said that a new time slot for Moore's show is "under discussion."

CBS has not ordered any new "Annie McGuire" episodes beyond the original 12, the show's producers confirmed; the Dec. 28 airing will be the show's eighth episode.

"Annie McGuire" executive producers Elliot Shoenman and Paul Wellf said that they hoped the network will bring back the show in a more nurturing time slot, with a more comparable lead-in than "The Van Dyke Show."

"We're trying to do a show that tells different kinds of stories, comic short stories," Shoenman said Tuesday.

## New NBC series lacks sense

The new NBC series "Midnight Caller" is one of the season's most stylish arrivals, even if it lacks a lot of sense. And controversy over Tuesday night's episode is likely to solidify its status as this year's "Wiseguy."

The plot, reportedly modified following picketing of on-location filming locations in San Francisco two months ago, involves a man alleged to be intentionally spreading the AIDS virus and whose victims include "Nighthawk" talk show host Jack

Killian's (Gary Cole) former girlfriend (guest Kay Lenz).

Former cop Killian takes to the airwaves seeking to locate the man and also to educate listeners about the AIDS threat.

But a group called ACT-UP, the AIDS Coalition to Unleash Power, has disseminated flyers and letters to TV writers protesting the airing of the show as something that "plays into the public's darkest, ill-founded fears about AIDS transmission and further pumps up an already highly charged atmosphere of national AIDS hysteria."

# Mary Tyler Moore continues to have cheery outlook despite bad ratings

STUDIO CITY, Calif. — Mary Tyler Moore shucked off the heavy coat she wore for the wintry scene just completed and settled into a canvas chair off-camera. She looked as happy as a cheerleader whose team had just scored the game-winning touchdown.

She probably had no right to look so cheerful. Her new CBS show, "Annie McGuire," was off to a ghostly start, attracting less than 10 percent of the viewing audience each week and inspiring some to suggest that the millions of fans who made her a TV superstar have deserted her.

"I don't think it has anything to do with fans at all," she said. "I think it's a good show. If CBS stands behind it and gives it a better time period, it will find an audience."

That still may happen, even though CBS Tuesday announced that "Annie McGuire" would be taken off the schedule after the Dec. 28 show. Executive producers Paul Wolf and Elliot Shoenman said Tuesday that the show will be given a new time period later in the season and that production will continue for at least four more episodes.

Moore hopes that CBS entertainment chief Kim LeMasters will stick by her show and give it a later time slot when it returns. In its present 8:30 p.m. Wednesday time period, it has been one of the lowest rated shows of the season. Last week it finished last, 73rd out of 73 shows.

Meanwhile, CBS on Tuesday canceled the equally low-rated newcomer, "The Van Dyke Show," which was the lead-in to "Annie McGuire" at 8 p.m. (The network also canceled "Dirty Dancing," "Simon and Simon" and "Raising Miranda" and moved "TV101" from Tuesday at 8 to Wednesday at 8, replacing Van Dyke and Moore's shows effective Jan. 4.)

Ironically, "Annie McGuire" had picked up the support of many TV critics since the premiere episode shown to them was junked and a new, much improved one went on the air in October.

In an interview before the news of the schedule changes, Moore said, "It has to have time to find its own com-



fortable corner and develop the people who reside there. That's where the audience has to work with us, to give us time to become familiar and maybe make some statements they haven't heard before."

Anybody who believes that Moore is just doing "Annie McGuire" to fulfill some kind of obligation to the ailing network that made her a star is dead wrong. She believes in the show and is ready to defend it against all comers.

It doesn't take much exposure to Moore and her "Annie McGuire" company to realize this is a special project to her, a leap of faith in her own ability to take on new challenges and a gamble that her audience will understand what she's doing and, ultimately, applaud her for it.

From the start, Moore wanted to break away from the successful formula of the original CBS "Mary Tyler Moore Show," one of TV's great commercial hits and considered by many to be the all-time great TV sitcom. Her last attempt at a CBS sitcom, the 1985-86 "Mary," stuck too close to that formula and failed.

This time Moore vowed to play a much more realistic 1980s character, a woman her own age (50) with a husband and children. She wanted to film it like a movie, without a live audience or a laugh track.

She wanted it to be a comedy, but she no longer wanted to play the normal "straight man" in a bunch of zany characters. Instead, she wanted the comedy tempered with serious moments that would test her abilities as a dramatic actress.

# NBC's 'Night Court' tops Nielsen ratings

NEW YORK (AP) — A repeat of "Night Court" visiting its old time period was the highest-rated prime-time show in the Nielsen ratings last week as NBC's Thursday comedies held a reunion at the top of the rankings.

Some of the shine appeared to be off ABC's "Moonlighting." Its season premiere ranked 13th, compared to last season's premiere at fifth. "thirtysomething" followed in its season premiere and ranked 29th.

NBC's entire Thursday night lineup made the top 10. "Night Court," "The Cosby Show," "Cheers" and "A Different World" ranked 1, 2, 3, 4. "L.A. Law" was ninth.

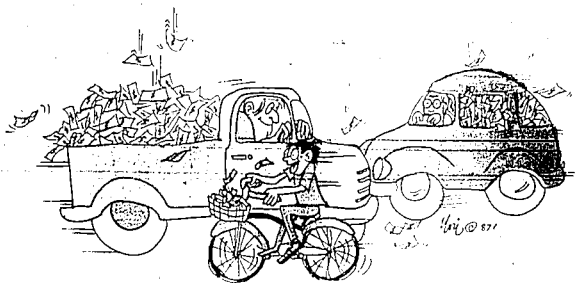
The rest of the top 10 were: "Golden Girls," NBC; "Roseanne," ABC; "60 Minutes," CBS; "Who's the Boss?" ABC; "L.A. Law," NBC; and "Empty Nest," NBC.

NBC has moved "Night Court" to Wednesday. "Dear John," a new show, went into the "Night Court" slot on Thursday, but has frequently failed to make the top 10.

NBC's network premiere of the theatrical film "Spies Like Us" landed in 17th place, besting "Roots: The Gift" on ABC on Sunday. "Roots" ranked 25th.

NBC won the week ending Dec. 11, its 25th in a row, with an average, prime-time rating of 15.1. ABC had a 13.2, and CBS 10.7.

CBS tried to get a bigger sampling for its new comedy "Murphy Brown," running it with the season premiere of "Kate & Allie" on Sunday night. The special "Murphy" ranked 32nd, only slightly higher than the regularly scheduled episode on Monday at 37th.



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
