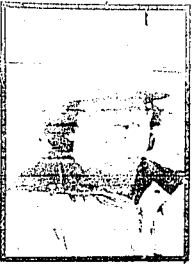

Closure order benefits Mountain Home base

BOISE — Idaho's Mountain Home Air Force Base may enjoy an increase in personnel and equipment in the next six years, while other bases around the country are closed or cut back, Air Force officials say.

The Commission on Base Realignment and Closure has called for shutting down or scaling back dozens of bases to save \$5.6 billion over 20 years.

George Air Force Base in California, one of the largest in the country, would close under the recommendations of the commission. As a result, tactical wings could be moved up to Mountain Home, said Capt. Steve Solomon, public relations officer at MHAFB.

The 37th Tactical Training Wing

and the 37th Tactical Fighter Wing could be brought to Idaho, including their F-4E and F-16 Wild Weasels jets, Solomon said Thursday.

The shift would enhance national operations by consolidating the California wings with the EF-111 air defense suppression aircraft.

In turn, part of Mountain Home's 368th Tactical Fighter Wing with F-111A planes would go to Cannon Air Force Base in New Mexico, he said.

While Mountain Home would lose 1,102 military personnel and 57 civilians, it would gain 2,561 military and 147 civilians.

The commission recommendations will go to Defense Secretary Frank

C. Carlucci, who will have until Jan. 15 to either accept or reject the idea.

If Carlucci approves the list, Congress will have 45 legislative days, starting March 1, to try to block it.

George Bush would have the right to veto that resolution, and his veto could be overridden by a two-thirds majority of both houses.

The Mountain Home facility has clearly been recognized as a major asset to the nation's military preparedness, Gov. Cecil Andrus said. The base has a major, positive economic impact on Idaho.

Andrus appointed a special task force this year to study ways to enhance the base's mission.

Sen. Steve Symms, R-Idaho, said he has supported such a plan as a

Commission wants 34 bases closed in cost-cutting effort

WASHINGTON — A government commission called Thursday for closing 34 military installations, including five major Air Force bases and the Army's second-largest base training site, in a recommendation that could send economic shock waves to communities across America.

In addition, the Commission on Base Realignment and Closure recommended closing 52 military housing units in 13 states that date back

to the construction of Nike missile bases in the 1950s, and partially closing five military facilities and changing the mission — and the manpower levels — at 54 other facilities.

The panel's recommendations appeared to have a good chance of taking effect. If Defense Secretary Frank C. Carlucci approves them, as expected, Congress would have to reject the whole list in order to save any of the facilities. And even such a resolution of disapproval could be vetoed by President-elect George

Bush after he moves into the White House on Jan. 20.

Carlucci, who has strongly supported the work of the bipartisan commission, has until Jan. 15 — five days before leaving office — to either accept or reject the entire list.

The first overhaul in 11 years of the nation's web of 3,800 military installations could save an estimated \$883 million a year without hindering the national security, said Abraham Ribicoff, a former Democratic senator from Connecticut and co-chair.

3 Wendell highway commissioners face charges over work, purchasing

GOODING — Criminal charges have been filed against the three members of the Wendell Highway District Board of Commissioners.

Dale Gilbert is charged with a misuse of public money by a public officer, a felony.

The charge alleges that Gilbert hired himself as an employee of the district and was paid a salary for working on a road crew. Gilbert earned \$169 in net wages for driving

a water truck this summer to keep the dust down on a county road being paved in front of his house, County Prosecutor Lynn Nelson alleges.

Public officials cannot hire or pay themselves, according to state law.

Gilbert and the other board members, Russell Rost and Loren Wert, were charged with omission of a duty, a misdemeanor.

These charges allege the three board members did not allow for bids to be taken on crack sealant,

which cost more than \$8,000. The district is required to advertise for bids on anything costing more than \$5,000. The contract was awarded Feb. 11, 1988.

Nelson filed the four charges Wednesday.

Gilbert, Rost and Wert are scheduled to be arraigned Jan. 10 in Gooding. At that time, a date for a preliminary hearing will be set for Gilbert. If Rost and Wert plead not

Airport security tightens; probe spreads

LONDON — Passengers traveling on U.S. airlines were questioned about their luggage and had their bags X-rayed Thursday in a security clampdown at British airports prompted by the bombing of Pan Am Flight 103.

The disclosure that plastic explosives blew up the Boeing 747 on Dec. 21, killing all 259 people and 11 on the ground, set off a worldwide hunt for the perpetrators.

The British foreign secretary called for the cooperation of governments in the Middle East, where Palestinian and Iranian extremists are key suspects.

President-elect George Bush said he would

"severely punish" the bombers if they were found.

At Britain's four airports that handle U.S. carriers, passengers fed their checked luggage through X-ray machines and were asked about who packed their bags, when they were packed, whether the bags had been out of their sight since, and whether strangers gave them parcels to carry.

The X-rayed suitcases were found in a tough plastic strip to prevent them from being opened between the check-in desks and the plane. Anything arousing suspicion was opened and searched by hand.

At Heathrow Airport's busy Terminal 3, used by U.S. carriers Pan Am and TWA, police patrolled with submachine guns issued to them after

1986 terrorist incidents in Europe.

"Sure there's a risk, but you've got more chance of getting killed on a street in New York," said Sam Fleischer, a Philadelphia college professor rushing to catch a TWA flight to New York.

He said he flew to London on vacation the day after the Pan Am crash into the Scottish village of Lockerbie, and "I was worried then." Gesturing to the X-ray machine, he said: "What worries me a lot too is that they didn't have all this then."

As he spoke, he drifted a few feet away from his bags and was promptly upbraided by ground staff for leaving them unattended.

On Wednesday, the Department of Transport ordered the four British airports handling U.S. carriers to step up security.

U.S. election, Soviet quake top '88 news

The U.S. presidential election and the earthquake that devastated Soviet Armenia, killing tens of thousands of people, were the top two news stories of 1988 in a year-end poll of Associated Press member newspaper editors and broadcasters.

The election story accumulated 1,412 points in the annual survey; the earthquake, 1,401.

It was a year in which U.S.-Soviet relations showed a warming trend, capped by President Mikhail S. Gorbachev's announcement of a substantial, unilateral cut in Soviet troop strength. The start of the Soviet withdrawal from

Afghanistan, the Reagan-Gorbachev summit in Moscow and the Soviet leader's continuing overhaul of the Soviet system, amid nationalist unrest in some Soviet republics, also made big news.

Ballots were returned by 106 Associated Press newspaper editors and 126 broadcasters who ranked the year's headline events, from No. 1 through No. 10. A first-place vote counted 10 points, a fifth-place vote one point.

The total of 222 votes was about 200 votes fewer than usual. Late-breaking events had required a revised ballot and second vote, making earlier highlights outdated.

Even so, the Dec. 21 crash of a Pan American Airways jumbo jet on a flight from London to New

York, which killed all 259 aboard and an estimated dozen on the ground, occurred too late to be included in the top-10 ranking.

The annual rankings are not conducted as a scientific poll but an informal survey, the collective view of people who deal with the news daily in a nation of diverse regional concerns.

The national election, leading the editors' ballots, was a race characterized by what analysts called "negative" campaigning, in which prepared TV ads often spoke for the candidates — Vice President George Bush and his running mate, Sen. Dan Quayle of Indiana, and the Democratic governor of Massachusetts, Michael Dukakis, and

Idaho holding line as nation grows

WASHINGTON — Population growth in the Midwest appears to be rebounding from a downturn earlier this decade, but Americans continue to favor the West as the place to live, the Census Bureau reported Thursday.

Parts of the South, especially Florida and Georgia, continued strong population growth, as did the Atlantic states of Delaware and Maryland, the bureau said.

Overall, the United States had a 3 percent increase in population from July 1, 1985 to July 1, 1988, the period measured in the latest estimates. The nation's total population as of July stood at 245.8 million.

During the last three years, California, the nation's largest state, recorded the biggest numerical increase of any state, 1.8 million, or 6.9 percent. Since 1981, California has gained 4.5 million residents, the Census data shows.

The population growth in Texas, on the other hand, slowed during the last part of the decade as the

oil industry was hit by an economic downturn. Although the state's population grew by 2.4 percent for the 1985-88 period, to 16.8 million, it dropped by 3,000 between July 1987 and July this year.

Seven states and the District of Columbia lost population during the three years: Iowa, North Dakota, Nebraska, West Virginia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Oklahoma, Montana, Idaho, Wyoming, and Alaska.

But the estimate of a population of 1 million for Idaho on July 1 this year was little changed from the same date in 1985. That figure was also listed as 1 million in the Census Bureau's report.

Although losses in 1985-1988 were estimated for Iowa, Nebraska, North Dakota, Montana, and Idaho, the 1988 data indicate that the declines may be slowing and several of these states may have grown in the past year," the Census Bureau said in a statement.

The 12 Midwestern states showed an overall 1.2 percent increase in population during that time, according to the report.

Japan's new justice minister resigns
 TOKYO (AP) — Japan's newly appointed justice minister resigned Friday amid a wave of criticism for accepting political donations from a company at the center of a major scandal.

I apologize deeply and resign from my post as justice minister, Takashi Hasegawa told a news conference.

Kyodo News Service said Prime Minister Noboru Takeshita accepted his resignation. Takeshita appointed Hasegawa only Tuesday to handle a probe of a stock-profiteering scandal involving influential politicians and business leaders.

Takeshita reshuffled his Cabinet Tuesday in a move to rid his administration of any links to the scandal involving the purchase of unlisted stocks by a select number of individuals.

Marcos returns to Honolulu hospital
 HONOLULU (AP) — Former Philippine President Ferdinand Marcos entered St. Francis Medical Center on Thursday for the second time in three weeks.

Marcos was brought to the hospital by ambulance but the reason for his return and reports on his condition were not available, said St. Francis spokeswoman Norma Kep.

Marcos, 71, returned to his Mukiki Heights residence Dec. 18 following a 9-day stay at St. Francis, where he was treated for congestive heart failure, his doctors said.

Eastern goes high-tech in checks
 MIAMI (AP) — Eastern Airlines, trying to counter a wave of negative publicity, said Thursday it will regularly use electrical current devices to detect the tiniest of gaps in the bodies of older Boeing 727s.

"We had an unfortunate incident and we are responding," said Joseph R. Leonard, executive vice president, referring to Monday's emergency landing of an Eastern Boeing 727 in Charleston, W.Va., with a 14-inch tear in its fuselage.

After the incident, in which two people suffered minor injuries, the airline visually inspected the 46 oldest of its 111 727s — those with 30,000 or more landings.

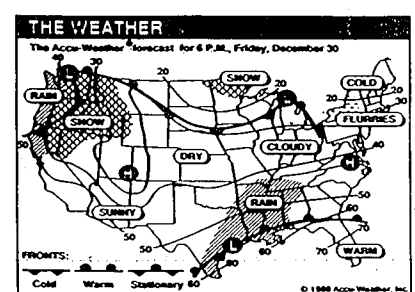

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Regulators sell Top 13 insolvent savings firms

WASHINGTON (AP) — Federal regulators, working against a year-end tax deadline, announced the sale of 13 more insolvent savings and bank institutions in Texas and Illinois Thursday.

The latest deals brought to 197 the number of insolvent S&Ls which have been dealt with by federal officials this year, a post-Depression record, far surpassing the 48 S&Ls closed in 1987.

The agreements Thursday were announced after the three-member Federal Home Loan Bank Board spent the day huddled behind closed doors reviewing offers.

None of the deals, eight insolvent Texas S&Ls were sold to Pacific USA Holdings Corp., a Texas subsidiary of a Taiwanese company, which agreed to invest \$37.5 million to purchase the S&Ls. The branches will be operated under the name Pacific Southwest Savings Bank F.S.B., headquartered in Corpus Christi.

The bank board agreed to provide \$56.2 million in government assistance to the purchasers.

Bush won 40 states and 236 electoral votes. Dukakis won 10 states and the District of Columbia, and 111 electoral votes. The popular vote was 51 percent to 46 percent in favor of Bush. The turnout was estimated at slightly more than 50 percent of the voting-age population, the lowest since 1921.

The Armenian earthquake — ranked second among 1988's news stories — occurred at 11:41 a.m. on Dec. 7 and, by seismic standards, was not an especially large shock. It registered 6.9 on the Richter scale as compared, for example, with Mexico City's 8.1 quake of 1985 and Alaska's 1964 quake of 8.5.

The U.S. drought, the No. 3 story, accumulated 1,099 points.

At 4 a.m. when America's farmers were just beginning to recover from the economic crisis of the early 1980s, along came the worst drought in a half-century, the worst since the dark dry days of the Dust Bowl.

Relief did not come until August — not from rain, which was too late in most areas, but from a \$1.9 billion drought aid bill that helped farmers who harvested less than 65 percent of normal production.

A tragedy in the Persian Gulf was judged the No. 4 news event, with 901 points.

At 10:54 a.m. on July 3, the U.S. warship Vincennes, under assault by Iranian gunboats in the Persian Gulf, mistook a civilian airliner on a routine flight for an attacking Iranian fighter plane and shot it down. All 290 people aboard the Iran Air plane perished.

America's re-entry into space earned fifth place in the year-end poll, with 872 points.

On the morning of Sept. 29, Discovery roared off and the astronauts returned to Earth four days later after a remarkably smooth flight during which they deployed a communications satellite.

Two months later a second shuttle, Atlantis, took off on a secret Defense

Department mission, another success, setting the stage for a planned seven-flight schedule in 1989.

Developments in the Midwest ranked in sixth place in 1988, with 641 points.

After years of maneuverings and hesitations, Yasser Arafat finally made it clear enough to satisfy a skeptical United States. The Palestine Liberation Organization, which he heads, accepts the existence of Israel and renounces all forms of terrorism.

The end of the Iran-Iraq War scored seventh in the voting, with 541 points. The nation's environment, in its broadest sense, ranked eighth in the voting, with 506 points.

The health of the planet, its winds, oceans, the land itself, did not fare well in 1988.

The "greenhouse effect" — the development of a blanket of carbon dioxide allowing heat to accumulate in the atmosphere — was at least partly blamed for the drought and other climatic changes. The use of aerosol containers was pouring a gas into the air that was blamed for a hole over the Antarctic in the atmospheric shield against cancer-causing ultraviolet rays — a warning, some scientists said, of disaster to come.

Gorbachev's Dec. 7 visit to the United Nations ranked ninth in the voting, with 504 points.

The Soviet leader started the world body, along with U.S. planners and diplomats, by announcing that the Soviet Union would, unilaterally, reduce its armed forces by 500,000 troops, along with tanks and other equipment.

One of the nation's worst sieges of forest fires ranked as the No. 10 news story, with 492 points.

The Baise Intergovernmental Fire Center, which keeps track of the nation's wildfires, said that through the exceptionally dry year more than 30,000 firefighters battled 72,000 blazes that charred more than 5 million acres in the United States, including 2.2 million acres in Alaska.

The \$800 million savings is minuscule when compared with the Pentagon's annual budget of \$30 billion.

The states hit hardest by the panel's recommendations were California, which would lose five major installations; and Illinois, which would lose two. The area of the nation faring best was the South, which wouldn't lose any major facilities.

The five Air Force bases recommended for closure include Chautau in Illinois; George, Mather and Norton in California; and Pease, in New Hampshire. Their missions would be shifted to other bases.

Also closed would be the Presidio, a major Army administrative base in San Francisco; and Fort Douglas in Utah, a facility built in 1982 to protect Pony Express riders from Indians. It has often been cited as a prime example of an unneeded base.

The five bases that would be partially shut down include Fort Dix, N.J., where 33,900 recruits underwent basic training in the year that ended Sept. 30. Only Fort Jackson, S.C., trains new recruits. Fort Dix would go on semi-active status at a loss of 4,086 military and civilian jobs.

Fifty-four other bases should be realigned, meaning they would either gain or lose personnel, the commission said.

Also closed would be part of Fort Meade, Md.; and the Philadelphia Naval Hospital.

Hearing set to study fire policy.

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — A hearing on fire policy in national forests following the West's massive blazes last summer has been scheduled in Idaho Falls on Feb. 8.

The meeting, one of 11 scheduled nationwide but the only Idaho hearing, follows a study released recently by the Interagency Policy Review Team. It was slated for 7:30 p.m. at the West Bank.

Politicians in the West have called for a review of the Forest Service's "let-burn" policy they claim allowed fires in Yellowstone National Park and the Idaho wilderness to burn hundreds of thousands of acres.

25 train cars derail near Pocatello

POCATELLO (AP) — Nearly half the cars on an eastbound freight train have derailed about 30 miles east of Pocatello.

Union Pacific Railroad spokesman Lee Thibodeau said 25 cars on a 56-car train from Seattle to Chicago derailed about 9:45 a.m. Thursday, near the Caribou County community of Dehile.

No injuries have been reported. While the obstacle has blocked trains as far west as Nampa, it has not affected Amtrak passenger traffic.

The cause of the derailment has not been announced.

Supremacist trial to be in Ada County

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — The trial of two accused white supremacists on state bombing charges will be held in Ada County, not Kootenai County, a judge has ruled.

First District Judge James Judd denied the request of attorneys for David Dorr and Edward Hawley to relocate the trial to Coeur d'Alene, where the September 1988 bombings occurred.

Judd wrote in his decision Wednesday "while the cost of holding trial in Ada County to the public is substantial, this court is charged with the duty to provide defendants with a fair trial before an impartial jury."

Judd will preside over the trial in Boise, scheduled for Jan. 23.

In October, Dorr, 37, was sentenced to 20 years in prison and Hawley, 25, received an eight-year term after they pleaded guilty to a multi-count federal indictment alleging racketeering, conspiracy, counterfeiting, bombing and other charges.

Dorr's wife, Deborah, 36, also received an eight-year term. Hawley's wife, Olive, 29, was given a suspended sentence and five years probation.

Court rules that street fee is a tax

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Supreme Court has upheld a ruling that a street fee charged by the city of Pocatello actually is a tax, and is not justified.

The city and People for a Progressive Pocatello, Inc., had appealed a summary judgment by 6th District Judge William Woodland that prohibited an ordinance establishing a fee to property owners or occupants for

street maintenance.

The Pocatello City Council held levy override elections for street improvements in 1982 and 1986, which were turned down by voters. Following the last rejection, the council enacted an ordinance imposing a street restoration and maintenance fee.

It was estimated to bring in up to \$600,000 a year. The ordinance allowed the city to seek judgment against those who refused to pay the fee, through a lien on any real property.

Jury finds 4 guilty in gold scheme

BOISE (AP) — After 31 hours of deliberation, a federal jury has found four Idahoans guilty in a bogus gold-mining scheme that bilked investors out of an estimated \$2.2 million.

Elijah Albert Boone, the man accused of masterminding the investment scheme, was found guilty Wednesday on 34 counts ranging from fraudulent sale of securities to income tax evasion.

Boone, 75, could face up to 215 years in prison and \$1.25 million in fines, said Assistant U.S. Attorney George Breitsmauer.

Also convicted on a variety of charges were Boone's wife, Delila, and his son, Jerry, all of Placerville, and Roger D. Swayze, formerly of Boise.

Official condemns BLM for action

BOISE (AP) — The president of the nation's largest conservation group has chided the Bureau of Land Management for allowing the Idaho Army National Guard to go ahead with facility improvements at the Snake River Birds of Prey Area.

The southwest Idaho natural area is home to the world's largest nesting population of eagles, falcons, owls and hawks, Jay Hair, president of the National Wildlife Federation, said Wednesday.

"By its own admission, the BLM has little idea what the total impact of these projects will be on the birds of prey and their environment," he said. "That's just too big a risk to take."

Hair charged that the BLM ignored the National Environmental Policy Act by failing to assess cumulative environmental impacts before allowing the Guard to upgrade the range.

IPEA wants more travel food diets

MOSCOW (AP) — The Idaho Public Employees Association contends that \$15 a day is not enough to properly feed state employees on business trips.

The IPEA represents 9,000 state workers, including classified positions at the state's universities. One of the group's lobbying goals in the upcoming legislative session is to increase the current \$15 per diem allotted to state employees.

Fifteen dollars is pretty low when you think about eating in a restaurant three times a day. IPEA Director Jerry Ressewege said. "It's possible if you go to McDonald's or Wendy's, but people would like to sit down and have a nice breakfast before working all day."

Court upholds dismissal of suit

BOISE (AP) — A possibly illegal prior search to corroborate a police informant's allegations was not enough to void the informant's initial claims and the formal search warrant they prompted, the Idaho Court of Appeals has ruled.

And a divided state Supreme Court on Thursday upheld the dismissal of a negligence suit against St. Luke's Regional Medical Center in Boise on grounds that the family suing the hospital failed to show that there were material facts in question that should be decided by a jury.

The appeals court, in reversing 1st District Judge R.G. Magnusson's order invalidating the search warrant against Robert Harrison of Bannock County, unanimously held that the information sheriff's deputies obtained during what Magnusson called an illegal search was not needed to establish probable

cause for allowing the search that yielded evidence of marijuana violations against Harrison.

Although judicial standards generally require an informant's tip to be corroborated independently for probable cause to be established, the court said that when corroboration is not available the other aspects of the information should be considered.

In the Harrison case, the appeals court said, the informant had personally seen marijuana plants growing in the shed at Harrison's home and had provided information to the post that had proven accurate in uncovering other marijuana-growing operations in the county.

The search warrant for the Harrison place was voided because other deputies were tipped off by their informant they made a nighttime visit to the home to corroborate the tip. Magnusson said that was illegal and without that corroboration the informant's tip could not be viewed as sufficient to justify a legal search.

The Supreme Court's majority opinion in the hospital case, written by Justice Robert Bakke, held that there was an evidence provided by the family of Thomas Sparks that the hospital staff had failed to follow the formal standards of care in the Sparks case or that any material fact in the case was disputed. Chief Justice Allan Shepard and Justice Pro Tem Joseph McFadden, sitting in for Justice Stephen Bestline, agreed.

Sparks was operated on at the hospital in January 1983 for injuries suffered during an automobile accident. The initial operation left him paralyzed. Then 10 days later, Sparks suffered permanent brain damage after being taken off a respirator and not put back on when his condition deteriorated to cardiac arrest.

The two surgeons involved in the case, S. Kirby Orme and Robert P. Barnes, received a settlement with the family, which then pressed its suit against the hospital and its staff.

Furnace could solve INEL's waste problems

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — A high-tech furnace that would turn radioactive and hazardous waste into stable glass slag could help solve the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory's buried waste problems.

The Plasma Centrifugal Reactor is scheduled for testing in May at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory's Butte, Mont. facility as a partial solution to the burgeoning radioactive waste in Idaho and the nation.

It is a joint project between the Department of Energy and Environmental Protection Agency, Idaho Gov. Cecil Andrus has closed the state to any more radioactive waste because of red tape stalling a permanent repository in New Mexico and concern about the existing waste reaching the Snake River Plain Aquifer.

If successful, a larger furnace could be built at INEL to handle the waste stored at the Radioactive Waste Management Complex.

throughout the DOE system," said Hunter Weiler, DOE Idaho environmental restoration program manager.

The furnace is heated to a temperature of 17,000 degrees Fahrenheit. A plasma torch conducts electricity through superheated gases.

Then it sends nearly a megawatt of electricity through the torch to the contaminated material. The radioactive waste, heavy metals and organic solvents are heated to 2,800 degrees.

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Interstate 84 closes in Eastern Oregon

SALEM, Ore. (AP) — The state Highway Division closed Interstate 84 just east of Pendleton Thursday afternoon, and is advising travelers to stay put or avoid the area until further notice.

Carol Mitchell, a division spokeswoman, said had weather forced highway crews to close the freeway at Milepost 216.

She said there were a number of minor accidents on the steep and frequently icy Ladd Canyon stretch of the freeway that prompted the closure.

Motels in La Grande, on the other side of the freeway closure, already were reported to be full, Mitchell added.

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Hagerman resents public slur

On Dec. 21, a Times-News article cited the city of Hagerman as a racist community. As a fifteen-year resident and president of the City Council, I take strong exception to that article.

I only hope that my anger has cooled enough to make a rational reply. Some emotional statements were made by the person who had initiated the article.

The facts were not carefully investigated before the slur was made public.

The Times-News investigator called on the phone to interview the mayor only hours before the article was printed. A more responsible report would have included these facts:

FACT: The majority of the people of the city of Hagerman and the immediate area did not know the child existed or where she lived.

FACT: The city authorities were

never advised of a problem.

FACT: School authorities were not advised of a classroom problem.

FACT: The parent has an established residence in Twin Falls and has moved children in and out of the Hagerman School system previously for reasons other than a racial incident.

FACT: The city of Hagerman has normally included other races, cultures and ethnic groups in no greater but certainly not fewer proportions than other rural communities in Southern Idaho and has been able to resolve the problems in the past to the satisfaction of all concerned.

A large part of the Hagerman residents are mature retired people.

Their exposure to the school is minimal and it is ludicrous to imagine that they would go out of their way to

attack a five year old child.

I am realistic enough to agree that children reflect their environment and that some racial prejudice could exist within some families, but this does not represent a general attitude in Hagerman.

A far greater percentage of the permanent Hagerman residents have spent their working years away from Idaho and have raised and educated their children in cities where integration has been well established and accepted.

I am proud of our city. We have made steady progress in so many areas that increase the quality of life in our community. I am also aware that our city is made up of individuals and that by diminishing any of the rights of one of these individuals, the stature of the whole is reduced.

I feel The Times-News owes the city of Hagerman, its schools and the surrounding area an apology for

printing a less than factual article.

The parent also has done us an enormous disservice by assuming that we could not or would not solve the problem if in fact a problem did exist.

The result of this hastily contrived bit of newspaperism I cannot bring myself to dignify it as journalism, published to satisfy the sensationalists, is that we all lose.

The paper loses because it now lacks credibility, the parent and child lose because they have not learned that facing a problem is the first step in solving it and our community loses because we have been denied the personal acquaintance of a five year old that would have touched and brightened our lives.

Freedom of expression isn't always popular

Unless it is careful, the city of Twin Falls could be maneuvered into a costly, no-win legal battle by a small group of would-be censors over an allegedly pornographic bookstore.

Across the country, court after court has held that, unless the material being sold is legally obscene, communities cannot bar its sale to adults.

The books and videos in question — although offensive to many — are not likely to meet that legal definition.

The reason is called freedom of expression, and although it is not always a popular freedom, it has plenty of philosophical and practical history.

But what the law says has not stopped a group which calls itself the Determined Citizens Against Pornography, whose first attack was to sue the landlords of the Front Page bookstore on Blue Lakes Blvd.

Then, when the store closed, they hung on in court until landlords Jay and Barbara Moyle were stuck with paying legal fees for a case they did nothing to bring about.

Last week, the Moyles filed suit against the group's members, claiming wrongful legal action and malicious harassment. The defendants are Fred and Joan Brodin, Ron Griff, Lynn and Carol Vanhooser, Phil and Jo Gerrish, Bill and Ana McDowell, Gary and Becky Hurt, Dawn and Duane Luchsinger, Lorraine Patton and Adriana Hoogland.

While this case has been going on, the group has prevailed on the city council to approve a blanket zoning ordinance which seems to effectively ban any adult bookstore in the city.

That ordinance has yet to be tested, but similar measures in other places have generally been held unconstitutional.

This is not to say the city cannot regulate the locations of businesses. It can. But if the ordinance has the effect of banning the businesses entirely, it likely will not be legal.

Upholding freedom of expression is not a position many people agree with when the material in question is offensive.

But if the ordinance is sustained, you can bet the bookstore will appeal. The end result will be a long, drawn-out court battle which will cost city taxpayers thousands of dollars.

Neither bookstore carries the kind of material we would want around our home. Nor would most Twin Falls citizens.

Nor do we condone the bookstore expanding its business to include so-called "viewing" booths; in other places, such establishments have been little more than fronts for illegal sexual acts. The city has a right — indeed a duty — to prohibit such activities in public places.

But if the business is limited to the sale of legal books and videos, we do not see how the city has a right to censor other people's right to buy this material if they wish.

As long as the material is legal, the community's best defense against its presence is in the marketplace.

Simply put, if people do not buy this trash, the businesses which offer it will fail. But that free market approach apparently doesn't satisfy our resident censors.

In the past, the city has resisted efforts to push it into dubious prosecution of material. Now, the city has passed an ordinance of doubtful constitutionality which is going to defend in court.

The moralists among us are, no doubt, pleased. But for the rest of us, this is an exercise which will be both costly and futile.

We think the time of the city council and of city attorney Fritz Wunderlich could be better spent than drafting zoning ordinances which are unlikely to be held lawful or to accomplish the desired goal.

As sharply divided socially, spiritually, and philosophically, how can we hope to bring about peace with anyone else? We must first all come to terms with ourselves and agree on what sort of nation and world we can realistically expect before we attempt to create it.

I appreciate the efforts of the millions of Americans who risked, and lost, their lives to defend our freedoms. But I think it's time to stop letting Second World War and Cold War mentalities guide our actions today.

Other prophets predate Jesus

If Jesus is the way, why waste your time with anyone else? This statement by Pastor Silvers in his commentary on the series "Who is Jesus?" (Times-News 12/23/88) deserves a response.

The belief among many Christians that Christ has no equal and that it is, therefore, a waste of time to investigate the history and teachings of other religions is unfortunate indeed.

Not only does it reflect a certain arrogance and narrow-mindedness but it contributes to religious intolerance especially toward non-Christian religions.

It cannot be denied, of course, that Jesus did claim that He was "the way, the truth and the life; no man comes to the Father, but by me" (John 14:6). Certainly such a claim should be taken seriously.

But had Pastor Silvers taken time to investigate a few other religions, he might have discovered that this claim is by no means unique to Jesus Christ.

As far back as 3500 B.C., an ancient Prophet made a similar claim which has been passed on through the Egyptian "Book of the Dead." "I come to you as yesterday, As prophet of the million years to be, for nations and for people still untold. I am the child who marcheth down the road of Yesterday, Today, and Tomorrow. I am the one, the only one, who goeth forever round His course through all horizons... Yea, I am He, and shall not die again..."

About 1500 B.C. Sri Krishna, a major prophet of Hinduism, declared the following: "Sorrow not. Come unto Me alone for shelter. From all thy sins I will deliver thee."

Around 600 B.C. Siddhartha Gautama, the Buddha, is purported to have said: "Hearken to Me, ye gods and men! Approach to behold Me. I am the Tathagata, the Lord, Who has no superior. Who appears in this world to save."

Both Muhammad (630 A.D.) and Baha'u'llah (1830 A.D.) made similar statements. In the Qur'an it is written: "This day have I (God) perfected your religion for you and completed My favor unto you, and have chosen for you as religion Al-Islam." In the Baha'i Holy Scriptures, we find the statement "...No man can obtain everlasting life, unless he embrace the truth of this inestimable, this wondrous, and sublime Revelation..."

Now what are we to make of these very similar claims? Should we take the position held by some members of each of the religions that only their Prophet is "the way" and all the others are false?

Obviously, if we are to make sense out of these claims, we must set aside the exclusivist position that only one Prophet is telling the truth. Not to do so would suggest that Jesus was an impostor because both Krishna and Buddha and even Moses made this claim long before Jesus was even born.

One possible way to resolve the paradox is to view all these religious founders as co-equals in an unfolding Spiritual Drama. That each is truly "the way, the truth and the life" during the phase of social and spiritual evolution to which His teachings are addressed.

Such a position does not in any way demean the exalted station of Jesus. It does, however, allow us to open our hearts and minds to the teachings of the other great Messengers of God and to thereby gain access to the wondrous gifts they have offered us for our own spiritual edification.

A wise man once said that we should "be aware of prejudice; light is good in whatsoever lamp it is burning. A rose is beautiful in whatsoever garden it may bloom. A star has the same radiance whether it shines from the East or from the West."

Apply this principle to the study of the world's great religions. Pastor Silvers, and I'm sure you'll discover that your time has not been wasted.

Soviets continue to buy U.S. grain

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Soviet Union continues to buy U.S. grain under a recently extended long-term agreement between the two countries, including a new deal for 420,000 metric tons of wheat at subsidized prices, the Agriculture Department said Thursday.

Christopher E. Goldthwait, acting general sales manager for the department's Foreign Agricultural Service, said the wheat was part of 2 million tons authorized Dec. 23 under the Export Enhancement Program, or EEP.

Goldthwait said the wheat is for shipment in January. Counting some wheat left over from previous EEP arrangements, the Soviets have about 1.6 million tons still available under the program.

The Soviet Union bought more than 9 million tons of wheat under EEP arrangements during the fifth year of the grain agreement. The pact expired Sept. 30 but was later extended for another year.

Bush promises to punish bombers

PINTALA, Ala. (AP) — President-elect Bush, expressing "horror" that a U.S. jetliner was downed by a bomb, said Thursday he would "seek hard and punish firmly" those responsible, if they can be found.

But Bush said it would be "imprudent" for him or other officials to discuss "what kind of action can be taken" to retaliate.

Bush, who has been sequestered at a 10,000-acre south Texas ranch hunting quail for three days, said he had no other information than what was in the "public domain" about the bomb that blew up a Pan American jetliner over Scotland last week. The crash killed 259 passengers and crew members and 11 people on the ground.

Panel advises on computer exports

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States should take a more focused and flexible approach to export controls on computers, especially since the existing curbs on many components and systems have become virtually unenforceable, a scientific advisory panel said Thursday.

It urged that the administration concentrate instead on striving — together with its NATO allies and Japan — to control leakage to the Soviet bloc of militarily valuable supercomputers and the most advanced computer manufacturing processes.

"The United States cannot afford to be complacent about its computer technology strengths or base export control decisions on an assumption of an inevitable lead," said the National Research Council report, prepared at the request of the State Department.

Gay midshipman sues Academy

WASHINGTON (AP) — A gay midshipman who says he was forced to resign from the Naval Academy, after admitting his homosexuality two months before his scheduled graduation, asked a federal court on Thursday to order his reinstatement.

Joseph C. Steffan, 24, of Moorhead, Minn., claimed in the suit filed in U.S. District Court that his "forced separation" from the academy violated his constitutional rights of free speech, due process and equal protection under the law.

Court limits fired employee rights

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The California Supreme Court, citing the need for "commercial stability," on Thursday limited the right of wrongfully fired employees to collect big damage awards.

The ruling by the conservative-dominated court moved away from the course the California judiciary has taken since 1980, when a court then controlled by liberals led the nation in restricting an employer's right to fire at will.

The court ruled 4-3 that a worker who is fired without good cause, in violation of a company's express or implied promise, can sue only for reinstatement and back pay, not for emotional distress and punitive damages.

Coast Guard rescues 4 seamen

BOSTON (AP) — Rescuers plucked four seamen from 25-foot swells in the stormy North Atlantic on Thursday, but one died and seven others were missing after their 25-foot container ship sank, the Coast Guard said.

The Lloyd Bermuda sank Wednesday night 160 miles south of Nantucket and 200 miles east of New Jersey, when its cargo shifted in weather that was "nothing short of horrendous," said Coast Guard spokesman Lt. Paul Wolf.

"The last of the crew to get off said they watched the ship sink," Wolf said.

Panel: 430 emergency shutdowns required

WASHINGTON (AP) — The nation's nuclear power plants reported nearly 3,000 mishaps and at least 430 emergency shutdowns in 1987, according to a report issued Thursday by Public Citizen's Critical Mass Energy Project.

The non-profit, research organization, a long-time critic of nuclear power, also said that in 1987 there was a record number of more than 104,000 incidents in which nuclear workers were exposed to measurable doses of radiation.

Also, it said, at least 492 violations of safety regulations occurred at nuclear power plants in 1987.

The group's annual report on nuclear power safety was based on Nuclear Regulatory Commission data compiled and analyzed by Public Citizen.

Joan Claybrook, president of Public Citizen, said in releasing the report: "Public attention has recently been focused on the poor safety conditions at the nation's nuclear weapons reactors."

However, in 1987, badly managed commercial nuclear plants daily threatened the safety of the public, particularly the 96 million Americans who live within 50 miles of a reactor," she said.

Public Citizen criticized the NRC for refusing to release key safety data such as "single-component failure" records and a listing of all emergency plant shutdowns.



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Final tally shows Bush took 53%

Final, official vote tallies from the Nov. 8 presidential election show Republican George H.W. Bush defeated Democrat Michael Dukakis by slightly more than 7 million votes of the more than 91.5 million cast in the 50 states and the District of Columbia.

The president-elect garnered 53.37 percent of the vote, while Dukakis got 45.67 percent. Minor party candidates received less than 1 percent of the votes.

A total of 91,585,872 votes were cast for candidates who were listed on the state ballots.

Bush's biggest percentage margin was in Utah, where Bush received 66.2 percent of the total vote, to 32.04 percent for Dukakis.

Dukakis' biggest vote margin was in New York, which he won by 267,000 votes of 6.4 million cast.

Palestinians consider a truce

JERUSALEM (AP) — Palestinians are raising the possibility of a conditional truce in their year-old uprising and are debating Israeli proposals for elections in the occupied West Bank and Gaza Strip.

Many, if not most, prominent Palestinians appear opposed to both ideas or attach conditions that Israel is unlikely to accept. But the fact that the proposals are receiving serious consideration — and the support of key Palestinian leaders — is seen as significant.

The debate is taking place in advance of Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir's expected unveiling of a plan for starting Arab-Israeli peace negotiations.

The Yediot Ahronot daily said Thursday Israel was planning to present new proposals to the Egyptian government this weekend. It said the plan involved initial talks in Cairo involving Israeli, Jordanian and Palestinian delegations.

Soviets update earthquake deaths

MOSCOW (AP) — Soviet officials on Thursday backed off their estimate that 55,000 people died in the Armenian earthquake, saying the recovery of bodies is nearly complete and the final toll will be half that.

The officials stressed it was still too early to establish a firm death toll for the Dec. 7 earthquake that devastated northwestern Armenia. But they said it is clear that initial estimates were too high.

"As of today, we still do not have a final number for the dead," said Yuri Hojamiyran, a deputy premier of the Armenian republic. "We do think that around 100-150 bodies are still to be extracted from the rubble."

Yuri Chaplygin, a spokesman for the Council of Ministers, the Soviet Cabinet, said 24,854 bodies had been recovered. On Wednesday, 37 corpses were found, he said.

Armenian official rejects mediation

MOSCOW (AP) — A top Armenian official on Thursday dismissed the mediation effort by human rights activist Andrei D. Sakharov in the bloody Caucasus ethnic dispute, saying authorities can settle the matter on their own.

"I think we have sufficient help and advice from the government and party on the Karabakh issue," said Yurghes Artunyan, a deputy premier of the Armenian republic, when asked if officials welcomed Sakharov's mission.

Sakharov, a 67-year-old physicist and Nobel Peace Prize winner, returned Monday from a trip to Armenia and the neighboring republic with which it is feuding, Azerbaijan. Armenians familiar with the mission said it was aimed at seeking a compromise in the 10-month-old rift over control of Nagorno-Karabakh.

Soviets eliminate disgraced names

MOSCOW (AP) — The Kremlin on Thursday ordered the names of disgraced leaders Leonid I. Brezhnev and Konstantin U. Chernenko wiped off their former homes, as well as every town, school and factory christened for them.

The decision announced by the Tass news agency signaled a further blow against the 18-year legacy of Brezhnev and an expansion to Chernenko of President Mikhail S. Gorbachev's campaign against the corruption and stagnation of their years in power.

Bhutto urges Asian arms reduction

ISLAMABAD, Pakistan (AP) — Prime Minister Be-

nazir Bhutto had her first meeting with Prime Minister Rajiv Gandhi of India on Thursday and urged her fellow South Asian leaders to spend less money on weapons and more on fighting disease and poverty.

Ms. Bhutto assumed the chairmanship of the South Asian Association for Regional Cooperation and opened the first session of the seven-nation summit, then met with the leader of the nation that has long been her country's bitter rival.

Less than a month after Pakistan's first free elections in 11 years propelled her into the prime minister's job and made her the first woman leader of a modern Muslim nation, Ms. Bhutto used the summit to call for a reassessment of priorities in the impoverished Asian subcontinent.

Sudan relief effort comes to an end

KAMPALA, Uganda (AP) — A two-month emergency relief airlift from Uganda to war-torn southern Sudan has ended after delivering 5,000 tons of supplies, a United Nations official said Thursday.

Arthur Heldbrook, U.N. World Food Program officer in charge of the airlift, said the operation ended Monday after two C-130 Hercules made 280 flights from the Ugandan town of Entebbe to Juba, the largest town in southern Sudan.

The operation began Oct. 26 after Kenyan truck drivers refused to drive into southern Sudan, where government troops have been fighting the rebel Sudan Peoples' Liberation Army. The drivers balked after a convoy hit land mines.

In September, the United Nations tried to ferry the food by the state-owned Uganda airlines, which also balked after rebel gunners shot at a Boeing 707 carrying food and passengers.

Korean talks suffer sharp setback

PANMUNJOM, Korea (AP) — Talks between South Korea and North Korea on easing tension suffered a sharp setback Thursday when North Korea demanded an end to U.S.-South Korean military exercises.

The five-member delegations of both sides agreed to meet again Feb. 10 at this truce village inside the Demilitarized Zone separating the two nations.

The three-hour meeting plunged into stalemate a few minutes after it opened when North Korea issued a new demand for an end to annual U.S.-South Korea "Team Spirit" exercises it says threaten its security.

The chief North Korean delegate, Chon Kum Chul, said this was a precondition for the parliamentary talks and other proposals for inter-Korean contacts.

"Team Spirit war exercises have created a state of quasi-war and affected South-North talks in progress. The exercises have been the biggest obstacle blocking the progress of dialogue," Chon said.

Group takes shooting responsibility

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — An underground group calling itself the Soldiers of Justice claimed responsibility for the attempted assassination of Saudi Arabia's consul in Karachi, Pakistan, it was reported Thursday.

Hussain Amri was shot in the neck on Tuesday. He was flown on to Saudi Arabia Wednesday and admitted to a hospital in Riyadh, the Saudi capital.

"Our heroic strugglers will chase all traitors and mercenaries until the word of truth and Islam prevails in the land of Palestine and elsewhere in the world," said a statement from the group published in Beirut newspapers.

Soviets

Scientists offer to make radar station center for ecology.

MOSCOW (AP) — Soviet scientists have recommended a Siberian radar station that the United States says violates the Antiballistic Missile Treaty be turned into an ecological center, Radio Moscow reported Thursday.

President Mikhail S. Gorbachev previously offered to turn over the giant, phased-array radar in Krasnoyarsk to a civilian agency, but the United States had rejected anything short of dismantling the station.

Disputes over the observance of the 1972 ABM Treaty are among the differences that have stymied superpower negotiations on a treaty to halve U.S. and Soviet arsenals of long-range, offensive nuclear weapons.

The Soviet Academy of Science suggested that the Krasnoyarsk radar center would make a good international ecological center because its equipment is capable of closely measuring atmospheric processes caused by air pollution, the official radio said.

On Sept. 27, Foreign Minister Eduard A. Shevardnadze said at the United Nations the radar should become part of an international space organization. He did not specifically say it would be dismantled. He also said U.S. radars in Greenland and Britain should be converted.

The Kremlin announced in October that it was giving the station, which is in central Siberia, to the Academy of Sciences, and Foreign Ministry spokesman Gennady I. Gerasimov said it would be turned over to international space study.

But the U.S. government said the move was unsatisfactory because it did not include the complete dismantling of the radar.

The United States says the plant violates provisions of the ABM treaty that specify that radar stations capable of giving advanced warnings of missile attacks may only be located on the periphery of U.S. or Soviet territory.



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2 young hostages return to France

PARIS (AP) — Two French girls held hostage in Lebanon for 13 months returned home Thursday night, six days after their captors — the Palestinian guerrilla group commanded by Abu Nidal — first promised them freedom.

Left behind in the hands of Fatah-Revolutionary Council were their mother, Jacqueline Valente; five Belgians also captured aboard the yacht Silec; and a baby sister born in captivity.

Marie-Laure Bettele, 7, and her 6-year-old sister, Virginie, landed at a military base in Istres, near Marseille, in a government plane with their father, Pascal Bettele, a spokeswoman for the Foreign Ministry said.

They came from the Libyan capital of Tripoli, where the girls were handed over to French officials.

Libyan leader Col. Muammar Gadhafi had called for the girls' release on Christmas Eve.

Chinese to punish 7 African students

NANKING, China (AP) — Chinese officials said Thursday they probably would punish at least seven African students for a brawl with Chinese workers, students and teachers who set off days of anti-black demonstrations.

They said no Chinese students would be punished for participating in the clash and subsequent demonstrations, or for seeking the rooms of some African students.

"We know who the Africans are that carried out the beating," said Yang Ruiju, president of Hehai University where the clash took place. "The African students did this in a planned way."

But the Chinese students "demonstrated out of anger. They didn't hurt anybody so none of them will be punished," Yang said in an interview.

About 140 African students remained in isolation.

Congressional leaders like base proposals

WASHINGTON (AP) — Leaders of the military committees in Congress said Thursday they like the base-closing recommendations made by a special commission and predicted the proposals will be accepted by Congress.

"I have a positive reaction," Sen. Sam Nunn, D-Ga., chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee, said at a news conference. "This process is a step forward. ... I would have liked to have seen more."

"This is a good start," said Virginia Sen. John Warner, a former Navy

secretary who is the ranking Republican on Nunn's committee. He said the commission's report "confirmed that there are inefficient aspects of our defense budget."

Both senators said they believe the panel's recommendations to close 86 installations and reduce or alter operations at 59 others will be accepted by Congress, which would face an all-or-nothing decision upon the report reaches Capitol Hill after a review by Defense Secretary Frank C. Carlucci.

My general feeling is this will be well received by the Congress," Nunn

said. "The odds are heavily in favor of this becoming the law of the land."

Warner told reporters he believes the recommendation will make it all the way through Congress, which created the commission this year to break the impasse that has prevented lawmakers from agreeing on any major closings since 1977.

Warner and Nunn said budget deficits require the Defense Department and Congress to look toward further base closings and consolidations to generate more economies

than the \$693 million a year the commission says its plan would save.

"I think this ought to be a continuous source of study by the new defense secretary," said Nunn, who wants overseas bases included in such a review. "w budget circumstances."

Rep. Bill Lowery, R-Calif., said his initial reaction to the plan was positive. Lowery is the ranking GOP member of the Appropriations subcommittee on military construction, which would have the initial House say on financing the closure plan.

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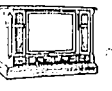
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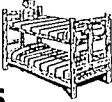
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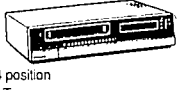
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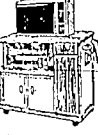
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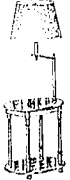
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Commodity groups attack crop indemnity plan

TWIN FALLS — A proposed indemnity program to protect farmers from losing their crops stored in warehouses is under fire from several commodity groups.

Next week, Idaho Agriculture Director Dick Rush will begin reviewing testimony from statewide hearings to decide whether to recommend the Legislature change the law to better protect farmers from warehouse bankruptcies.

Leaders of several state commodity organizations are recommending a number of changes to Rush.

As the law is written, a \$5 million state-administered fund would be established with

an assessment on commodities sales to licensed warehouses or dealers. The growers would pay the tax and the money would be used to reimburse those who are not paid for stored commodities when warehouses go bankrupt.

The Idaho Legislature approved the program, but a clause called for public hearings before starting the indemnity plan.

The Western Bean Dealers Association opposes the fund's entire concept.

"We don't feel comfortable about the whole thing. There's too many loopholes," said Gene Jagels, manager of Agri Sales in Twin Falls and president of the Western Bean Dealers.

Most southeastern Idaho granary managers contacted by the Department of Agriculture said they favor the idea because it offers protection to farmers, said Lane Jolliffe, Division of Agricultural Inspections administrator.

But Layne Rindlisbacher, president of the Farmers Grain Cooperative southeastern Idaho region, is an opponent. The Bancroft manager of 11 granaries said the program will leave financially sound granaries subsidizing those that go chasing rainbows by offering higher prices and then are not able to make payments.

He said Jagels agree that careful farmers who choose good warehouses should not be penalized by paying into the fund because of those who favor storing their grain in fly-by-night operations that may hold out the promise of higher payments.

Jolliffe said the state has had problems with commodity dealers, go-betweens who buy grain from farmers and sell to warehouses.

"I don't want to give anyone the idea that we don't have any reputable commodity dealers," he said, but added that because the dealers have no fixed locations, they can easily move to new locations in tough financial times, sometimes taking title to farmers' crops and leaving without paying.

Jagels believes untrustworthy "pickup and car phone" operations would proliferate under an indemnity fund because growers uncertain about dealing with them would be reassured that even if the dealer defaulted, the fund would be there to guarantee full pay-

ment.

The Idaho Grain Producers Association wants at least three changes in the existing language:

- The bond requirement on warehouses should be permanent. Under the existing law, warehouse bonds would not be required after two years in business. The Western Bean Dealers concur.
- Interest earned from the account should be reinvested in the indemnity account, but the state general fund, as the current language is being interpreted.
- A producers' referendum should be held to let them decide whether they want the new indemnity tax.

Motor home ills plague owner

TWIN FALLS — "Minnie Winnie," one of 8,800 Winnebago motor homes dubbed "lemon RV of the 1980s," is in the shop again.

While Winnie waits in a repair shop parking lot for yet another French-made part — this time it's a U-joint — her owner, Matt Smith, is not sitting idle.

Smith sent a letter last week to Idaho Attorney General Jim Jagels, asking Jones to file a class action suit against Winnebago Industries. Smith is one of hundreds of "angry, frustrated and disillusioned Winnebago owners" whose complaints have flooded the Center for Auto Safety, the Washington, D.C.-based national consumer group that fought Ford Motor Co. over explosion-prone Pinto gas tanks.

Winnebago's 1983-1986 LeSharo, Phasar and Centauri models are the vehicles of concern. The three models are small recreational vehicles with French engines and transmissions. According to the auto safety center, "at least one in two is a mechanical lemon and every one is an economic lemon with excess depreciation up to \$10,000 per vehicle."

The center gave the vehicles the title of "lemon RV of the 1980s."

Police ponder stolen loot; teenager flees

Buhl — While police from four departments swapped swiped goods here Thursday, one of their teen-age suspects allegedly stole a pickup and headed south, police said.

The 16-year-old from Buhl was arrested in Elko, Nev., around 1:30 p.m. by a Nevada Highway Patrol officer, said Buhl Police Chief Les Cochran. The youth will remain in the custody of Elko authorities pending his return to Buhl Sunday.

Authorities previously had questioned the youths but chose not to detain them pending the investigation's completion. They hope to wrap it up by the end of next week.

The 17-year-old remains with his parents, Cochran said.

Wayne Jones thinks state is setting a trap

TWIN FALLS — An avowed white supremacist and tax protester, convicted last month of violating state tax laws, now says state officials are trying to lure him into a repeat offense.

Wayne Jones was convicted by a Magistrate Court jury in November of two tax law violations: operating a retail business without a license and displaying a sign announcing he wouldn't collect sales tax.

He has appealed his misdemeanor conviction to District Court.

Since his appeal, he has resumed business at his glass store on Main Avenue North — though he says doing so may violate his probation.

Fifth District Magistrate Judge R. Michael Redman sentenced Jones Dec. 1 to one year's probation and a \$200 fine. One condition of Jones' probation was that Jones couldn't operate a business without required licenses.

Jones said he has applied for a permit

but hasn't received it yet. He said, however, that a state tax commission representative told him he could reopen his business while awaiting the permit's arrival.

"The court order says he can't do that," Jones said. "He gave me permission to go ahead and operate until the permit arrives."

Jones says the state is trying to get him to break the law.

"It's like telling you your check's in the mail," Jones said Thursday. "They're trying to get you to break the law."

County commissioners give MVRMC 30-day deadline

TWIN FALLS — In an effort to get the hospital's budget back on track as soon as possible, the county commissioners have given the hospital board's lawyer 30 days to respond to the county's concerns.

At issue is whether Magic Valley Regional Medical Center should have to abide by county budget laws that apply to every other county department and agency.

"We don't want this thing carried on until June," County Commissioner Marvin Hempleman said. "It needs to be done promptly. We shouldn't fiddle around."

In the past, the hospital has not reported excess funds or the projects those monies supported. Hospital records released this fall show the hospital has some \$17 million in reserve funds, including about \$7 million worth of bond guarantees which cannot be used for any other purpose.

Taylor said he thinks the 30-day deadline is reasonable but said he will request an ex-

tension if he runs into some unforeseen problems.

"I'll be working diligently," he said. Hempleman said he believes Taylor will come to the conclusion that the hospital must abide by county budget laws and that the budget will have to be amended and repaired.

He said he has spoken with a hospital official employed at a Bannock County hospital about a similar case there.

Apparently the hospital "took on" a nursing home and was forced to comply with county budget rules. A judge opened the hospital's budget to add the spent money into the report.

If Taylor's position is that the hospital is exempt from county budget requirements, the commissioners will enlist County Prosecutor K. Ellen Baxter to defend their side, Hempleman said last week.

The letter, drafted by Baxter and dated Dec. 25, also states that she and Taylor have agreed to meet again in early January to review the hospital's position on the matter.

USFS makes final payment
TWIN FALLS — The U.S. Forest Service played Santa Claus to four Magic Valley counties this year — to the tune of more than \$140,000.

The second and final installment of the Forest Service's annual payment to states was mailed out to Idaho counties just before Christmas.

Twin Falls County's share of the bounty for 1988 was \$10,063.50. Cassia County received \$42,414.93, Camas County got \$35,141.14, and Blaine County got \$33,225.65.

Each year, states with National Forest lands are paid 25 percent of Forest Service receipts from timber sales, grazing, mining and recreation in those forests.

The Forest Service sends out an interim payment of 75 percent of the estimated total in September. This year Idaho's interim payment was about \$6.5 million.

A final payment of \$3.8 million has been received by the state, bringing it up to \$10,344,477.91. Three states received higher payments — Oregon, California and Washington.

The money is split among counties with National Forest land depending on the size of the forest and its activities. It goes to county roads and schools.

Jerry Leroy Holton, 21, of Jerome, has been on the lam since Dec. 13, when he and fellow prisoner Javier DeLeon escaped after prying open a recreation room door.

DeLeon, 21, turned himself in Dec. 16.

Authorities have issued a nationwide attempt-to-locate bulletin on Holton, said Deanne Moore, sergeant with the Jerome County Sheriff's Office. Several people reported having seen Holton in the Jerome area, but none of those sightings were confirmed.

Man arrested on drug charge
JEROME — A Jerome man was arrested on drug charges Wednesday in a continuing investigation linking state and local authorities.

Mark Grammar, 32, was charged in Jerome County Magistrate Court with selling cocaine, said Merrill Kelley, regional supervisor with the Idaho Bureau of Narcotics. He was released without bond.

Authorities also searched Grammar's residence Wednesday afternoon and seized a small amount of narcotics, Kelley said.

The arrest stemmed from a joint investigation of the Jerome Police Department, the Jerome County Sheriff's Office, the Twin Falls Department of Public Safety and the narcotics bureau.

TWIN FALLS — A storage bin used to safeguard merchandise for a Twin Falls sporting goods store was reported burglarized Wednesday, authorities said.

An as-yet-undetermined number of ski boots and bicycles were stolen in the burglary, said Harold Jensen, chief deputy with the Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office. The owner, Claude's Sports in the Blue Lakes Mall, was completing its inventory of the storage site Thursday.

The burglary was discovered and reported Wednesday evening, Jensen said.

Montana governor commutes Keith's death sentence

HELENA, Mont. (AP) — Gov. Ted Schwenden today granted clemency to a condemned killer, David C. Keith, accepting a Board of Pardons recommendation to commute Keith's death sentence to life in prison without parole.

Schwenden, who leaves office next Monday, said his decision was based on his review of Keith's file, a meeting with Keith at the state prison Wednesday and a telephone conversation with the family of the victim, Harry Lee Shryock Jr. of Paloson.

Keith, 32, originally from Spokane, Wash., was scheduled to be by

lethal injection Jan. 20 and would have been the first inmate executed in Montana in more than 45 years.

The governor said he met with Keith for 30 to 45 minutes in an unannounced visit. "He certainly shows a deep sense of remorse," said Schwenden, a Democrat. "He is a very strong Christian."

When asked why he wanted to meet Keith before acting on the clemency request, Schwenden said, "Would you want to make a decision on whether a man lives or dies without looking him in the eyes?"

The governor was reluctant to dis-

miss the specific reasons for his decision, but said it was based on the statutory criteria in clemency cases — the social condition of the inmate and circumstances surrounding the crime.

In its recommendation for clemency, the Board of Pardons noted Keith is partially paralyzed and nearly blind from gunshot wounds, has undergone a legitimate religious conversion and may have shot his victim in reflex to being shot himself.

Granting clemency does not indicate he agrees with all of the board's reasons for favoring commutation of

the sentence, Schwenden added.

"All it means is that I concur with their recommendation," he said. "They used their set of criteria; I came to my conclusion independently."

He said his action does not alter his support for the death penalty in some cases.

"This does not suggest there are not instances where this governor would have rejected a recommendation for clemency," Schwenden said. "I still believe capital punishment is proper in some instances."

Schwenden's decision is the climax of a case that began almost five years ago, when Keith robbed a Missoula drug store and shot and killed Shryock seven hours later at a Paloson airport.

Shryock, 64, had exchanged himself for a 13-year-old boy whom Keith took hostage near St. Ignace while fleeing police.

The shooting of Shryock on Jan. 11, 1984, occurred momentarily after Keith was shot in the arm and abdomen with a rifle fired by a Lake County sheriff's deputy. Seconds later, Keith was shot in the head by another deputy armed with a pistol.

Against the advice of defense attorneys, Keith pleaded guilty in March 1985 to all charges against him, including deliberate homicide and aggravated kidnapping for the abduction and killing of Shryock. Keith was sentenced two weeks later to death on both counts and has

staunchly refused to allow court appeals of his death sentence.

He cited religious convictions as the reason for his stand, saying any appeal would be a form of denying his guilt.

The Montana Supreme Court, which automatically reviews all death sentences, threw out the death penalty for the homicide charge, but upheld it for aggravated kidnapping.

Keith was originally sentenced to die by lethal injection Dec. 1, but the Board of Pardons postponed the execution after agreeing to hear a clemency application filed on behalf of Keith by Maya Ashley, a Helena attorney.

The hearing was held Dec. 19 in Deer Lodge.

Coalition challenges USFS in court

COEUR-D'ALENE (AP) — A coalition of sportsmen and environmentalists has filed a federal lawsuit to force the U.S. Forest Service to end a "bureaucratic shell game" with its forest plans.

The forest plans, which were mandated by Congress in 1976, do not provide decisions on how to best use the forests, but instead encourage additional planning, John Osborn, coordinator of the Inland Empire Public Lands Council, said at a press conference Thursday in Coeur d'Alene.

Osborn and five others filed the suit in U.S. District Court in Missoula, Mont. They are asking the court to reaffirm that "decisions of substance" will be made in forest plans, he said.

The coalition contends the forest planning decisions may be made without public scrutiny. They want the suit to "tell the Forest Service to get back and basically quit playing games ... put the cards on the table," Osborn said.

He also asked television stations for equal time to counter what he called a timber industry media blitz portraying the industry as committed to sustainable forests. Donna Zapata, general manager at KREM-TV in Spokane, said such requests may be honored, but compliance is necessarily not required by law.

The coalition is also seeking an injunction against road building and logging in roadless areas, Osborn said. But he said conservationists would continue to work with the Forest Service to follow through with planned timber sales on a case-by-case basis.

The other groups in the coalition are the Idaho Environmental Council, the Idaho Conservation League, Idaho Sportsmen's Coalition, Idaho Wildlife Federation and the Northern Rockies Chapter of the Sierra Club.

The Forest Service began writing the forest plan for the Panhandle forests in 1979 and released it in 1987. In October of that year, outdoors groups and environmentalists appealed the plan and asked the Forest Service to stop road building and logging in roadless areas.

In August, the Forest Service denied the appeal, ruling that the agency does not have to decide the fate of roadless areas in the forest plan.

Osborn said earlier that the Forest Service's decision to rule on roadless issues on an area-by-area basis essentially was a "non-decision." Instead of dealing with one forest plan, hundreds of separate documents are considered, and the total impact on the economy, real estate, timber industry and outdoor recreation are never fully considered, he said.

Lawyer tackles Continental crash

WATERBURY, Conn. (AP) — A Connecticut lawyer is applying the innovative techniques used to settle litigation arising from the collapse of a building to settle suits stemming from a Colorado plane crash that killed 28 people.

Garrett M. Moore, a Waterbury lawyer who represented seven of the victims of the L'Ambiance Plaza disaster or their estates, has been named a special master with broad authority to effect settlements in cases arising from the Nov. 15, 1987, crash of Continental Flight 1713 at Stapleton International Airport in Denver.

He already has achieved agreements in about half the 82 suits brought by survivors or kin of those

who perished in the crash.

The goal is to reach agreements between the two defendant airlines and the litigants and to avoid protracted trials by following roughly the same formula used in the L'Ambiance Plaza case in Connecticut. In that action, one overall \$41 million settlement plan was accepted to end litigation.

Moore was named the special master by Chief U.S. District Judge Sherman G. Finesilver in Denver, who asked him to take on the case because of his L'Ambiance experience.

L'Ambiance was an apartment building under construction in Bradmore, when it collapsed on April 23, 1987, killing 28 workers.

Finesilver's order gave Moore "unrestricted power to meet" with anyone to reach settlements in all cases. Moore said he hopes to complete his task by March.

"The defendants don't have to accept my decisions, the plaintiffs don't have to accept my recommendations ... I have to persuade" them that it is "to their benefit to settle," Moore told the Waterbury American

newspaper in a story published Thursday.

The case involves a DC-9 twin engine jet carrying 82 people, including 77 passengers and five crew members, that was attempting to take off from Denver in a snowstorm. The plane was bound for Boise, Idaho. It was airborne for only a few seconds and then crashed.

National Transportation Safety Board investigators have said the crash was caused by the captain's failure to de-ice the aircraft after a takeoff delay.

The NTSB report said another contributing factor was the "absence of regulatory or management controls" which led to the pairing of two inexperienced pilots.

"There was a terrible storm," Moore recounted. "The pilot was supposed to have the wings de-iced every 20 minutes ... but there is evidence that the pilot went beyond 20 minutes ... The plane shifted and broke into three pieces."

"Whether the shift to the left was because of too much ice or overreaction of the pilot to the shift to the right no one knows," he said.

The big problems began just after 30,000 miles. First the transmission had to be replaced — to the tune of \$3,800, including transportation costs from Missoula, Mont., back to Twin. And it took three weeks to repair.

At 36,000 miles, the motor went out in Tonopah, Nev. Smith wrote in his letter to Jones. Down time was six months for that one.

Smith has also replaced the rear wheel bearings once and the front wheel bearings twice, and he wrote that he probably has spent at least \$10,000 on the sour RV, including motor and transportation costs.

Roy Raymond Ford-BMW, which sold Matt Smith his RV, has since discontinued the line. In his letter to the attorney general, Smith said Roy Raymond himself purchased a LaSharo — and purchased a new engine for it about 12,000 miles later.

Officials of Winnebago Industries could not be reached for comment. Repeated calls to two phone numbers listed for the company in Forest City, Iowa, yielded no answer.

In a Nov. 3 Wall Street Journal article, however, Frank Rotta, a Winnebago spokesman, acknowledged the company has had problems with the diesel engines it purchased from Renault. According to the Journal, Rotta said he did not want to com-

ment further due to "some litigation" over the matter with owners.

The auto safety center, begun by Ralph Nader in 1970, has four Idaho postmarked complaints in its thick Winnebago file. The group has asked some private lawyers to look into the possibility of taking the case to court.

"There are approximately 8,800 of the vehicles and that's normally too few for any one state to take action on," said Clarence M. Dilworth III, executive director of the consumer group. "But we feel it's terribly unjust for someone to spend \$36,000 and then have to spend the amounts we're seeing on repairs."

Cathy-King, an attorney with the state's consumer protection unit, said she has not seen Smith's letter so cannot comment directly. But she said the attorney general's office has limited resources, and complaints must involve a large number of residents or large amounts of money to earn a place on the priority list.

The consumer protection group has asked Winnebago Industries to set up a \$100 million fund to recall and replace the defective diesel engines, to reimburse customers for past repairs and other costs, to buy back or replace vehicles no longer wanted and to make up for depreciation.

A few hours later, an Elk-Rose gas station employee reported that a pickup driver had left without paying for about \$20 in gas, Cochran said.

A Nevada patrol officer located a pickup matching the description, then discovered that the truck had been reported stolen in Idaho, Cochran said. The officer pulled the vehicle over and arrested its 16-year-old driver.

Nevada authorities could charge the youth with misdemeanor theft and possession of stolen property, but Cochran said they probably will just ship him back to Idaho instead.

A state tax commission employee declined to release any information on Jones' permit status, citing confidentiality laws.

Jones, meanwhile, must pay \$50 for court transcripts or his appeal will be dismissed, court records show.

"We're handling that," Jones said Thursday. "Right now, that's neither here nor there."

Jones also faces a Jan. 31 felony trial on several charges of failing to collect sales tax on retail purchases.

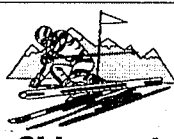
Illinois coach John Mackovic said that Smith "has great speed. He is an outstanding runner. At the end of the game, he was at his very best."

MERIDIAN — The Twin Falls Bruins will try to continue their early-season success against the Southern Idaho Conference here tonight when they visit Meridian for a non-conference boys' basketball game.

Tipoff time is 8 p.m. in the Meridian High gym.

The Bruins, 3-4 for the season, are 3-2 against SIC teams, including a pair of victories over fifth-ranked Boise, the Braves' only two losses of the season. One of Twin Falls' de-

feats came in overtime at the hands of second-ranked Borah: the other against fourth-rated Centennial, 81.

The Warriors are 4-3 for the year, including a loss to Boise Thursday night, but Meridian presents a substantial challenge to the Bruins' defense. The Warriors lead the SIC in scoring average, paced by 6-foot, 4-inch senior forward Travis Stuart (20.5 points per game) and 6-0 senior forward Scott Fletcher (13.8). First-year coach Dennis Kerfoot runs a passing offense, but the Warriors are capable of playing transition basket-

ball with 6-8 senior David Wallentine and 6-6 junior Bob Gwyn at the post.

Twin Falls hasn't played in his year since the fourth game of 1983-84 season. The Bruins lost that one 61-61, which was about the closest they have come to the Warriors in recent years. In fact, Twin Falls hasn't beaten Meridian in this decade, its twelfth almost 10 years ago — on Jan. 12, 1979 — when both teams were members of the old western division of the SIC.

For the Bruins, this game — and their matchup against Jerome in a

New gallery has 'namebrand' art

Future exhibits to feature Andy Warhol, Peter Max

KETCHUM — There's an old saying that goes: "You can't be too rich or too thin." Those living in the Wood River Valley might add: "Or have too many galleries."

The Donna Rose Galleries opened two weeks ago in the historic Golden Rule building on Main Street, joining more than 20 art galleries in the area.

Focusing on works by such contemporary artists as Andy Warhol, Peter Max, John Lennon and LeRoy Neiman, the first showing at the Donna Rose Galleries begins tonight, featuring 33 works by artist Fritz Scholder. Scholder's oils, monotypes, lithographs and etchings will be on display during an opening reception, complete with refreshments, from 5 to 9 p.m. The show runs through Jan. 31.

Co-owners Donna Rose and her mother Tina Fowler opened the art gallery and relocated the publishing office of their art trade magazine, "The Art Brokerage" from Las Vegas to Ketchum after Rose co-sponsored the Lennon exhibit at the Priesen Gallery of Fine Art last January.

"We just think it's the most beautiful place in the country, with the nicest people," Rose says of her decision to move to Sun Valley. However, in addition to the area's beauty, there were also other considerations justifying the relocation.

"We feel Sun Valley has the potential to be the Santa Fe of this area," Rose says, explaining that Santa Fe is unique because it is a small town of about 35,000 people, but it sports 120 art galleries and is populated by a lot of artistic, creative and ambitious people. Santa Fe has become one of the major art centers in the

United States, just behind New York, San Francisco and Chicago, she says.

"I feel Sun Valley has the same kind of energy going on here and we will see a lot more galleries in the future," Rose predicts.

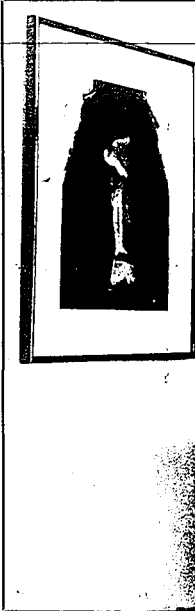

Rose and Fowler are not newcomers to the art world. The move was a year in the making, and has opened with fanfare.

For 10 years during the 1970s, Fowler owned and operated the Grand Gallery in the Las Vegas MGM Hotel. The duo then formed a company to broker and publish a trade magazine for art dealers to provide a search and source service for 2,500 galleries nationwide.

Rose is an art student herself, and has painted and studied under the tutelage of Fritz Scholder.

In addition to her knowledge of the art world, Rose exercises good business sense. She is making sure she knows the gallery before it opens. A welcoming banner has been spread across Ketchum's Main Street announcing the opening, advertisements have been placed in new issues of local telephone directories and magazines, as well as a news spot aired on the Wood River Valley's

local television Channel 13.

The fanfare is not without justification. Rose and Fowler have big plans for the gallery. Upcoming shows will feature original works by Andy Warhol, Ronnie Cutrone, Bill Gersh, Peter Max, Leroy Neiman, Bill Mack, Aldo Laonga, Eyvind Earle and John Lennon.

Other artists which will be regu-

larly featured include Mark King, Susan Ross, Frederick Hart, Bernice Jastrab-Hart, Alan Sznajder, Will Barnett, Sassone, Andrew Welch, Jiang, Ting, Erte and Rothe. The gallery also has original, limited edition jackets by Tony Alamo.

January will bring a Warhol-Cutrone exhibit to the gallery titled, "Last Chance." In February, Gersh

will be the featured artist with 40 oils, monotypes, sculptures and assemblages. Lennon's show is planned sometime this summer.

Rose and Fowler already have plans for expansion with the opening of two other galleries in the near future. A second gallery will be located in Jackson, Wyo, and another gallery is being sought at a third western resort location.

Television went down the tubes in '88

Television has always had quality-control problems, but 1988 was like a made-for-TV disaster film.

Nothing but nothing seemed to go right — beginning with the 5-month-long writers' strike that crippled the industry and the '88 fall-lineup, and ending with the whirling dervish of trash TV that promises to carry over into the new year.

So we dare not say that things couldn't possibly get worse, because the chances are good that they will.

Nevertheless, there were moments of hope to be found among the muck, so to avoid the rather tempting notion of writing off this year in toto, here are some meritorious as well as dubious achievement awards for 1988.

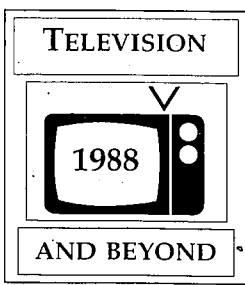
First, the bad news.

—The Talk is Really Cheap Award: Let's face it, it absolutely rained garbage this year. Morton Downey Jr. has the edge because he made the most noise for all the wrong reasons; turning talk shows into televised gang wars. Certainly there were plenty of worthy challengers when it came to

squandering costly air time for hours on end, but Downey's loud-mouth approach to broadcasting and public affairs hit a new and dangerous low. Of course, this award would not be possible without Downey's hootin' 'n' hollerin' brain-dead minions, known affectionately to Dawney watchers as "The Best." But where, we wonder, is the beauty?

—The Could-It-Be-Satan? Award: The winner? Who else but that devil Gerald Rivera? He won, as it were, by a nose. From his chair-chucking run-in with white supremacists who pounded his proboscis, to his truly revolting special on Satanism that NBC had the audacity to run, Rivera took several steps beyond his min-you-love-to-hate status. He was, in effect, a man possessed by the power of ratings, by the sound of his own voice and by the public's morbid interest in how low he can possibly go. In that respect, Rivera never disappointed us.

—The Gutter Ball Award: It seems that everywhere you turn these days you find trash TV. The archetypal worst offender here has got to be Fox's "A Current Affair," the show that gave us the Robert Chambers tape where the killer mocked his



crime for the cameras. "The Reporters," an "Affair" spinoff, came next on Fox Broadcasting, and there are several TV tabloids waiting in the wings.

—The Cruellest Cut of All Award: This one goes to CBS for its cancellation of "Frank's Place." As it has done with many shows, the network never really gave this

line "dramedy" the chance it deserved, shutting it from time slot to time slot where even the people who cared couldn't find it. We will not see its like again any time soon.

—The Commercial Failure Award: To Michael Dukakis, who never woke up to what George Bush and his staff knew all along: that a televised picture (in this case the revolving prison gate that served as a metaphor for Dukakis' prison-furlough program) is worth 10,000 stump speeches.

—The One Miniseries Too Many Award: To ABC's monumental but forgettable "War and Remembrance." While it was far from a disaster in the ratings, the first 18 hours were plodding enough to beg the question: "Who wants another 14 in May?" Executive producer Dan Curtis should be given credit for attempting to depict something approaching the unfaithful horror of the Holocaust, but his failure here may have been not knowing when to stop. Piles of bodies don't necessarily add up to a sense of humanity. This colossal project certainly didn't rate the media buildup and screen time it got. Expect a lot of hour-to-six-hour miniseries for the foreseeable future.

—The Get Real Award: If so-called reality programs such as NBC's "Unsolved Mysteries," Fox Broadcasting's "America's Most Wanted" and syndicated crime-fighting shows are what we have to look forward to, I vote for a return to fantasy land.

Now for the good news, what there is of it:

—The Prettiest Picture Award: The sight of the space shuttle Discovery lifting off to a safe start and successful conclusion was welcome indeed. Though it took the tragedy of the Challenger to bring the networks back to the launch pad, it was good to see them back where they belong.

—The Show of Shows Award: It's ABC, not NBC, that deserves much of the loudest applause for going the extra mile with such high-quality shows as "Thirtysomething," and "The Wonder Years," which shows that quality doesn't necessarily mean high-entertainment.

—The Real Election '88: PBS took first prize in a tortoise-and-the-hare competition with the networks with their coverage of Campaign '88. The Big 3 and CNN ran and

Future of television: More and more of the same

Television pictures are going to be bigger and better. That much is certain.

— But when viewers sit down in front of their 5- or 10-foot television screens five or 10 years from now, they will probably be asking themselves the same old question: Is there anything new to watch, something really different?

The answer, in all likelihood, will be no.

I can't envision a form of television programming that the viewers would like to have that they don't currently get on American television," says David Poltrac, CBS senior vice president of planning and

research.

Consider the list of specialized cable networks that have sprung up during the past several years.

There is the American Christian Television System, a multi-denominational religious network; CNN, the all-news network; ESPN, the all-sports network; FNN, the financial news network; The Disney Channel; The Fashion Channel; The Learning Channel; and MTV.

More recently, pay-per-view networks (such as Viewer's Choice) have emerged. Special-event programming such as professional wrestling and boxing has made pay-per-view a stand-out programming option of the future. Convenience is also one of its selling points when it comes to favorite new movie titles.

Rather than waiting in line at a video store for the hottest new video, viewers can order a private screening through their cable box.

Of course, no individual cable network has been able to attract the kind of audience needed to challenge the Big 3, but collectively, they have had a tremendous impact. With half of America hooked up to cable, giving many viewers several dozen channels to choose from, the way viewers watch — rather than what they watch — has changed the most.

"You're seeing, slowly but surely, broad-based general news and entertainment networks — basically shrinking down in size," says Lloyd Trufelman, a spokesman for the Cabletelevision Advertising Bureau in

New York.

That makes it easier, he says, for cable networks with small but stable audiences to survive, opening the door for ideas such as New York's Cablevision News 12, a regional version of CNN.

But Poltrac says that the average viewer with 30 channels to choose among is generally watching fewer than 10 on a regular basis.

And Trufelman admits that "one of the things that the cable industry is running up against is that there are more networks than cable systems can accommodate. Right now, there's really a bit of a bottleneck."

As a result, he says, it is not a good time to launch new networks, much less invest in original programming.

Cable, after all, is still in its infancy.

The chief concern of most cable networks in the recent past was just getting on the air, says Trufelman, and only recently has the focus shifted to putting new and different programs on the channels.

Unfortunately, as we have recently seen with the launching of Ted Turner's TNT cable network, even when a new cable channel comes on, it is primarily the same old stuff.

True, we may interact with our game shows, Poltrac says, and believe that we are standing on the 50-yard line of a New York Jets game because the picture is so sharp, but "we're going to be watching family-based situation comedies in 2070."

In fact, the trend in television programming will be more of the same — much more.

Mark Fratrik, director of financial and economic research at the National Association of Broadcasters in Washington, D.C., says, "I don't see the cable systems really doing that much different type of programming."

"My son watches cartoons on the USA Network, which is pretty much the same thing that's on the independent stations in Washington," Fratrik says. "Ted Turner has obviously invested a lot of money in TNT, and he has a wonderful film library, but how different is that from what's already on? I don't see the change."

Has the morality of music finally hit rock bottom?

Rock critics are not supposed to agree with the likes of Tipper Gore and Susan Baker, the "Washington Wives" who founded the Parents' Music Resource Center. Mrs. Gore and Mrs. Baker, remember, are the two "concerned mothers" whose every waking hour seems to be spent ferreting out dirty lyrics and recasting them to outraged congressional committee members.

Merely mention their names and you'll have most members of the rock establishment frothing indignantly, moaning about censorship and arguing for freedom of expression. After all, wasn't there something in the Constitution about the right to bite heads off bats (a heavy metal star Ozzy Osbourne once did in concert)?

Trouble is, Mrs. Gore and Mrs. Baker do have a point. As one who makes his living reviewing rock music, I'm aware of how often this music steps beyond the bounds of public decency. It's not a steady stream of vulgarity, and the vast majority of what I hear (which amounts to something more than 1,200 albums a year) wouldn't bother anybody, at least from an obscenity standpoint. But some records seem to go out of their way to offend, boasting not only dirty lyrics, but often unprintable titles — even unprintable band names.

Even so, I have doubts about the "voluntary measures" that Mrs. Gore and Mrs. Baker have urged in their push for a record ratings system. Part of that is just common sense; it's hard to have a name you wouldn't want to repeat in front of grandma, odds are it isn't a

good bet for little Jane or Johnny. Mostly, though, what bothers me is that Mrs. Gore and Mrs. Baker keep offering the Motion Picture Association of America's ratings system as an example, but you can't rate records the way you rate movies.

Why not? Because rating a movie is a fairly cut-and-dried matter. Sex, bad language, violence — it's either there, splashed across the screen in all its Technicolor glory, or it's not. And the ratings reflect that, with explicit, you-see-everything sexual activity getting an "X" rating, while milder nudity and more discreet lovemaking warrants only an "R" or "PG-13."

Records, though, are another problem. It's easy enough to red-flag records when they contain the sort of language not allowed on radio or television; indeed, most of the major labels do so already.

But that's not enough for Mrs. Gore and Mrs. Baker. Although they complain about recordings that "are violent or explicit," the mere fact that they're able to quote from the offending albums in family newspapers suggests that there's more to their beef than bad language.

Truth be told, what the Parents' Music Resource Center objects to is "offensive" ideas as much as offensive language, and that's the difference between watchdog groups and would-be censors. Sure, it bothers me to

hear hard rockers Guns N' Roses slur blacks, gays and immigrants in the song "One in a Million." Nor do I like listening to rapper Slick Rick urging his male listeners to "Treat Her Like a Prostitute." But would Mrs. Baker and Mrs. Gore suggest that "Rambo" be rated X because of its racism, or "Risky Business" be similarly branded for its sexism?

Obviously not. There's nothing wrong with a parent wanting help in determining what is or is not suitable entertainment for a

child, but there's only so much a warning label can or should do. If Baker and Gore think records bearing obscene language should be stickered, fine — I go along with that, and so does most of the record industry.

But singing about wanting sex for even having it is not the same thing as "sexually explicit" material, and any parent who thinks little Jane or Johnny is going to get naughty ideas by listening to Guns N' Roses had better hope the kids never tune in to the afternoon snags.

Pottrack at CBS says that the TV shows we will see in the future will reflect changes in society.

The networks, he says, have been forced by cable into what he calls "narrower-casting," which means they are zeroing in on the most desirable audiences.

"I think the biggest trend is that the baby boomers are aging. Pottrack says, 'and between now and 1995 will be approaching 50. Since the beginning of television, adults over 40 years old have watched significantly more television.'"

And with baby boomers, who have

controlled social trends since their college years, entering the most affluent stage of their careers, they will be advertisers' prime market.

So we can look forward, no doubt, to shows like "fortysomething" and "fiftysomething," or what Pottrack calls "empathetic programming."

He points to NBC's critically acclaimed but low-rated and now canceled "A Year in the Life" as a prime example of a show ahead of its time.

Many people think that ABC's "Max Headroom" was ahead of its time, too. As one TV critic said at the time, "ABC saw the future, and they canceled it."

So much for new forms.

'Scoundrels' provides witty trip to South of France

HOLLYWOOD — "Dirty Rotten Scoundrels" is a pleasant enough way to tour the South of France in December. Blithe, reasonably witty, with as many story twists as a Riviera roadway, its proudest assets are its glorious look (courtesy of Michael Ballhaus' exceptional camera work) and Michael Caine, his hair full of Diddy-Doo, his heart full of larceny.

As Lawrence Jamison, con man extraordinaire, Caine has turned the knack of refusing enormous cash gifts from anxious heiresses into an art form. It is all in the firmness with which this "deposed prince" turns them down — it seems to send them into a giving frenzy. Finally, and with a discretion bordering on the acquisitive, he allows them to force money, pearls, gambling chips or what-have-you on him, only for the widows and orphans of his stricken homeland, you understand.

It is the droll snap with which Caine executes those maneuvers that makes watching him such pleasure. Without it, this parade of lady charms could become enervating, even though their number includes Barbara Harris and Dana Ivey, both in quarter-carat size roles.

Caine, who has been top dog in his resort town of Beaumont-sur-Mer for decades, is deeply unamused when

Freddy Benson (Steve Martin), an American con artist lacking class, style, flair and a single clean shirt, announces his intention of crushing Caine's very back yard. The camaraderie of a shared profession does not apply here. This is warfare.

Blackmailed into it, Caine makes Martin into something like his own

image, in what becomes one of the picture's high points. It is a wordless sequence highlighting Martin's gift for physical comedy as he changes, gestures and all, from slob to suave before our eyes (and with a lovely version of "Puttin' on the Ritz" in the background).

This is the film at its classiest. A

step down from that are Martin's appearances as Caine's "special" brother, Ruprecht, a cross between Jerry Lewis at his most cross-eyed and slobbery, and something last seen in a mist with Sigourney Weaver.

There is also a bet. Whoever extracts \$50,000 from an unsuspecting mark next may stay in Beaumont-sur-Mer. Loser leaves. Next face on the scene is a naive Cleveland soap queen, played dexterously by Glenn Headly. The race is on.

At one point in their one-upmanship, Martin takes to a wheelchair, the victim of mental trauma, needing money enough to visit the one psychiatrist who could make those nimble feet dance again. Ferret-quick, Caine appears on the scene as that doctor himself, Dr. Emil Schaufhausen, to retain the upper hand. Caine's impeccable Prussian accent and hand gestures, and the inventiveness of these quick-senes, thrust and parry, move and countermove, are very funny indeed.

However, there is one problem that director Frank Oz and the picture's layers of writers — Dale Launer and the team of Stanley Shapiro and Paul Henning — have not quite solved: Freddy Benson is a thoroughgoing snake. Martin is hell deliciously; not even Dan Aykroyd can smarm up fake sincerity like Martin, ending money to visit his dying Gram Gram. But his Freddy has no redeeming features. Life to him is

one long, ruthless scam, and something about that finally begins to lose its wonderfulness.

"Scoundrels" is a resuscitation of an old and not very funny vehicle for Marlon Brando and David Niven, the 1964 "Bedtime Story," which was called in a review of its English debut "the most vulgar and embarrassing film of the year." It does make you wonder why one particular corpse is chosen from so many to be given the kiss of life.

In any case, "Scoundrels" is MPA-rated PG.

Ah well. You could watch Caine, whose ineffable cool never flags and whose character has both edge and humanity. (You could brood about why he says to Martin, "Let the best man win," if he is supposed to be such a stickler for things said and done properly, but that is only if you're feeling snarky.) You could cast a wry eye on Martin, to whom director Oz may have given a letter to Tom Meen. Or you could stare at the Riviera and those improbably luscious hotels, casinos, drawing rooms or terraces. It couldn't hurt.

'Land Before Time' has timely theme

The following are capsule reviews of some of the films playing locally in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

THE LAND BEFORE TIME BEGAN (G). This animation feature stars Littlefoot, a baby Brontosaurus, who will lose his mother and must find his way without her to the Great Valley, or starve. Director Dan Bluth has gone to the trouble of giving very little children a sort of primer of dinosaur lore. It is nice that the Lucas-Spielberg forces, who are the film's executive producers, are behind the idea of overcoming differences and pulling together — that the Stegosaurus can lie down with the Pterodactyl, so to speak. But do dinosaurs really lend themselves to ootie-couties?

MY STEPMOTHER IS AN ALIEN (PG-13). Wild and wacky yet surprisingly touching romantic comedy in which widowed scientist Dan Aykroyd is bewitched by a beauty (Kim Basinger) from another planet (With Jon Lovitz, Alyson Hannigan).

THE NAKED GUN (PG-13). Zucker, Abrahams and Zucker, creators of the daffy TV police show satire, "Police Squad," return to the scene of the crime, offering more cru-

el slapstick, more non sequiturs, more stone-faced Leslie Nielsen quips, more inside TV couch potato gags, more bad puns and more of that tail guy whose head was not in camera range. There is a joke every 20 seconds or so; some of them thud, but enough work to keep things pretty hilarious. Written by Zucker, Abrahams and Zucker, and directed by David Zucker alone, with Nielsen, Ricardo Montalban and Reggie Jackson as a hypnotized zombie assassin.

OLIVER & COMPANY (G). Although it has virtually nothing to do with Dickens, Disney's new animated feature inspired by "Oliver Twist" is a bright, upbeat comedy that offers virtually ideal fare for family holiday viewing. The hip tone and broader, more cartoon-style animation puts the film in the tradition of "The Jungle Book," rather than "Pinocchio." Bette Midler, Cheech Marin and Billy Joel offer outstanding vocal performances as a snooty poodle, a half-crazed chihuahua and a street-smart

mongrel. Teen-agers who usually reject animation as "kid stuff" will enjoy the rock songs and hip characters.

RAIN MAN (R). Because we have had dozens of buddy films about journeys of discovery, we can plot the scenario of this one like a road map: The special qualities of one will work on the other to change him, or perhaps both of them. Dustin Hoffman makes his autistic savant character hypnotically interesting and sometimes terribly funny. Tom Cruise gives his looser, most authoritative performance since "Risky Business" and it can be said unblushingly that he holds his own with the masterly Hoffman.

SCROOGED (R). Dickens' "A Christmas Carol" transposed to modern times and to the cutthroat world of network television. Actually, it is not a bad notion for a satire comedy veers entirely out of hand. Scrooge is now Bill Murray's Frank Cross, the youngest network president in the history of television, the dumbest and probably the nastiest.

TEQUILA SUNRISE (R). Written by writer-director Robert Towne's trademark artfulness, nicely acted and gorgeously pretty, this loving, foolish enterprise finally blows away into sick, unsubstantiated. It still provides a nice outing for its three

stars (Mel Gibson, Kurt Russell and Michelle Pfeiffer), shaped a little like these '40s movies when best pals Clark Gable and Henry Fonda both fell for the same beautiful dame.

TWINS (PG). This may be the ultimate High Concept movie. It is composed in exclamation points. Arnold Schwarzenegger and Danny DeVito as twins! Separated at birth after a genetic experiment that made Arnold a superhero and left Danny a sister! Spiffed out in identical suits! Pursued cross-country by crazed criminals! You think you can do anything with all of that? Call director Ivan Reitman and his two teams of screenwriters immediately; they haven't a clue. Millions on millions will undoubtedly attend this overblown, super-slick, one gag comedy. They may even laugh, but all it really has to offer are its charming co-stars, that identical-suits routine and one impish anti-Rambo visual gag. As for the rest: The posters are funnier.

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Feeling lonely? Rent a brooding video

What a strange culture we've inherited. Somewhere there is a great place called the Garden of Eden, but we can't live there because Adam and Eve ate an apple. No wonder people feel alienated.

The burden of original sin has always seemed to weigh more heavily on some folk than others. They're not hard to spot. Lonely exiles, they spend their lives on the outside looking in, strangers in a strange land.

Although we don't exactly envy them, we often find such characters irresistibly fascinating — particularly if we encounter them in fiction rather than in real life.

If you're in the mood to explore this phenomenon, zip up your black leather jacket, jump on the Harley, roar over to your local video store and rent a couple of the following movies:

"Paris, Texas" (CBS-Fox, 1984) is a poignant and disturbing tale of a man so shattered by the break-up of his marriage that he is reduced to a

mute, amnesiac wandering aimlessly in the desert. When he finally manages to regain a measure of sanity, he goes in search of his wife. What he finds isn't pleasant. Harry Dean Stanton turns in a moving performance as the husband who cannot accept his loss. Nastassia Kinski does an excellent piece of acting as the wife who will do anything to escape her husband.

It is a frightening little story that's worth sitting through, despite its peculiar pacing. Director Wim Wenders handles Sam Shepard's idiosyncratic screenplay well.

"E.T." (MCA, 1984) is another thoughtful little movie about coping with catastrophic loss. In this case, virtuoso actor John Lone plays a prehistoric man who is brought back to life after being discovered frozen in a block of ice. Lindsay Crouse and Timothy Hutton are the scientists who do a less than satisfactory job of easing him through the shock of his "rebirth." This unexpectedly moving

tale was directed by Fred Shepis. Don't expect a happy ending.

Nonetheless, Shepis's cold storage-ecce man seems happy as a clam compared to Laurence Olivier's Hamlet ("Paranoid, 1948). No matter how bad you think you've got it, you can be sure the ultraneurotic Prince of Denmark has it worse. The poor guy comes back from college to find his father dead, his mother remarried to his lecherous uncle and his girlfriend behaving weirdly. Then his dad's ghost shows up and tells him to kill his lousy uncle. The prince desperately needs some help, but they don't have shrinks back then, so the play ends with everybody getting stabbed or poisoned.

This screen version of Shakespeare's stage classic has been roundly criticized for the liberties Olivier took with the play, but it is still a great movie and an excellent examination of a basically decent guy who suddenly finds himself in a real mess with no apparent way out. Jean Simmons plays Ophelia in this production, which won Oscars for best picture and best actor.

Future students of American mythology will no doubt have much to say about the role of the motorcycle in establishing the credentials of the modern hero: here, "Two of the best motorcycle movies are 'The Wild One' (RCA-Columbia, 1954) and 'Easy Rider' (RCA-Columbia, 1969). The first was directed by Laslo Benedek and stars Marlon Brando and Lee Marvin. The quintessential biker epic, it set the standard for all that would follow. The second was directed by Dennis Hopper and reflects the complex, sometimes exuberant, sometimes sick-spirit of the 1960s. It stars Peter Fonda and Hopper as the riders and Jack Nicholson as a hozy small-town lawyer who befriends them. Both films appear dated and contrived, but both are worth watching.

Perhaps the ultimate outsider picture with the ultimate outsider hero is Nicholas Ray's "Rebel Without a Cause" (Warner, 1955). James Dean stars as the most famous juvenile delinquent of the century in this landmark movie — one of only three that he made before his early demise.

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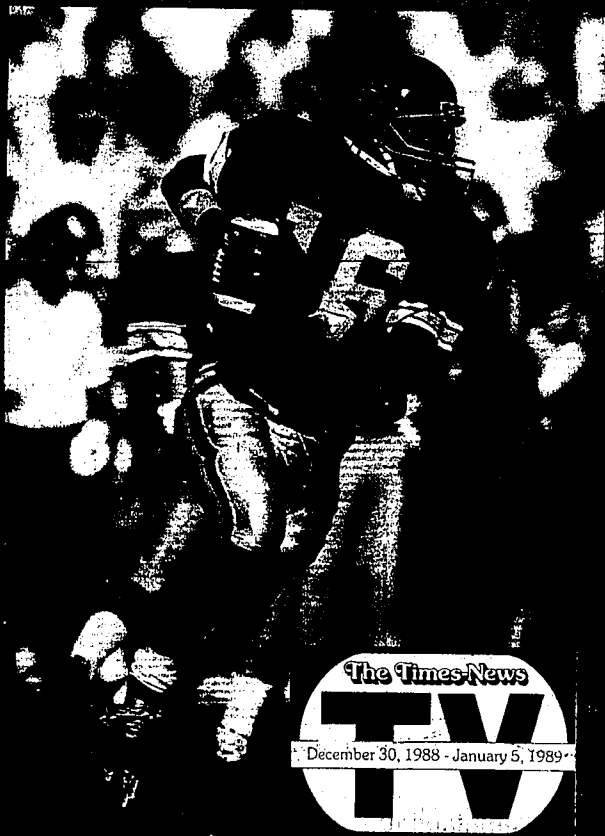

College football's finest square off in seven major bowl games Jan. 2

No Helmsman Trophy winner has been shut out of the big New Year's Day bowl games since 1980, when George Rogers won it playing for South Carolina. Until this year, that is. Oklahoma State's Barry Sanders closed out his extraordinary season against Wyoming on Dec. 30 in the Holiday Bowl. It's not that big a tragedy, though. Sanders is a junior and should be back next year. And with New Year's Day landing on a Sunday and the entire country enjoying a holiday the following Monday, all of this year's big bowl games are being played on Jan. 2.

In fact, the only bowl game played on New Year's Day this year is the Gator Bowl, which airs on cable's ESPN. Georgia and Michigan State, two run-oriented offenses, meet in that game.

On Jan. 2, the real action gets underway. USC's Rodney Peete, who finished second in the Heisman voting, will have an outstanding showcase for his final game: the Rose Bowl (ABC). In leading Southern Cal to a 9-2 record, Peete compiled a 61.5 percent completion record, hitting favorite target Eric Aflonter for eight touchdowns. The Trojans will be facing Michigan.

Troy Aikman, UCLA's fine signal caller, will take his last Bruin snap in Dallas at the Cotton Bowl (CBS), where he will be opposed by an op-

portunistic Arkansas team that led the nation in turnover margin. Ironically, Aikman could end up back in Dallas this fall; the Cowboys covet his strong arm and cool head.

Other Jan. 2 matchups pit Syracuse and LSU in the Hall of Fame Bowl (NBC), Clemson and Oklahoma in the Citrus Bowl (ABC), Auburn and Florida State in the Sugar Bowl (ABC) and Nebraska and Miami in the Orange Bowl (NBC). The last of these games is the most intriguing: Nebraska has the seventh-ranked defense in the nation and the seventh-ranked offense, while Miami has the second-ranked defense and 12th-ranked offense.

The most eagerly awaited game of the day, however, will be the Fiesta Bowl (NBC), which features a battle of the unbeaten: Notre Dame vs. West Virginia. This marks only the 13th time in bowl history that two undefeated, untied teams have met at season's end, but it is also the third time in as many years that such a battle royal has taken place.

Sixteen years ago, the Irish met Bear Bryant's Crimson Tide on New Year's Eve and defeated Bama 24-23 to win the mythical national championship. Coach Lou Holtz has a good

chance of duplicating that feat against a largely untested Mountaineer squad on Monday night. West Virginia's offense is fifth in the nation in yardage and second in scoring, but most West Virginia opponents have been weak sisters like East Carolina, while Notre Dame has played one of the toughest schedules in the country. The Mountaineers did beat Pitt 31-10 and Penn State 51-30, however. And when the Irish played those two teams, they won by less impressive scores of 30-20 and 21-3, respectively. Some Notre Dame boosters point to the team's "superior" bowl game experience (the Irish have been to five bowl games in the 1980s). But don't bank too heavily on that. West Virginia has been to six bowls in the same time period.

On the Cover USC's Rodney Peete, who finished second in the voting for the Heisman Trophy, will make his final college appearance in the Rose Bowl. It airs Monday, Jan. 2, on ABC. Seven major bowl games will be airing Jan. 2, spread over three major networks.

November. She has a daughter, Chloe, now 22 months old. Olivia, 40, said, "I realize I don't have much time left but I will be trying for another baby as quickly as possible." Q: It was harrowing to read that Gene Hackman and William Dafoe, along with members of the production company of "Mississippi Burning," the gripping movie about the aftermath of the murders of three civil rights workers in the '60s, were hassled by Southern police. A: It seems that several newspapers overdramatized the actual events. Here's what happened: When Alan Parker, the director of "Mississippi Burning," and Bob Colesberry, a producer of the film, were scouting locations in Canton, Miss., their behavior aroused the suspicion of the local sheriff, who detained them for questioning. An "incident" was averted, however, when the two men produced their Director's Guild membership cards to prove their identity. "Most fortunately," Parker said later, "the sheriff turned out to be far more affable than his counterparts of the past. Additionally, he was black, which certainly helped!"

Q: I've heard that although Raisa Gorbachev used an interpreter when she was in the U.S., she really understands English. What's the story? — B.H.

A: Rumors flew during the Gorbachevs' recent visit that Raisa, who everyone (except perhaps Nancy Reagan) agrees is an absolute charmer, is able to speak and understand English. Soviet officials have said she doesn't, but people noticed that she sometimes started answering questions before her interpreter finished translating them. Mrs. Gorbachev is known for her sharp intelligence; perhaps she likes to hear what we're saying about her as we think that she doesn't understand what we're say-

A: Frost married a duke's daughter and the couple now has three small sons. Starting in January, he will be doing a new TV magazine program. A new contract calls for 30 weeks in New York and 14 weeks in a London studio built to look like the one in New York.

A: "I think I'm at peace with myself," said Mrs. Bush when I chatted with her recently. "I don't think I've always been. I'm still feisty." At 63, Barbara Bush is one of her husband's best assets — frank, funny, and down-to-earth. Unlike Nancy Reagan,

A: Jamie Lee is the daughter of actor Tony Curtis and actress Janet Leigh. She was brought up in the Benedict Canyon area of Los Angeles, an area of countrified affluence. Robert Tyler becomes 'Loving' rebel who is looking for a better cause

He came into town and all the ladies bristled. He was the proverbial tall, dark and handsome stranger whose silences spoke volumes. Even his name, Trucker McKenzie, had a dangerous sound to it.

When ABC's "Loving" set out to cast the role of Trucker, they had to find an actor who would embody all the external qualities but also suggest a vulnerability under the facade of the stranger who attracted trouble and women like a magnet.

Along came Robert Tyler. He was working in the role of a stableman in CBS's "As the World Turns," but, feeling that the role didn't have much chance of surviving in the long run, Tyler sought other employment. He tested for the part in "Loving," and after some deliberation on the part of the casting people for that show, he became Trucker.

Robert is the middle child in a family in which Dad is a lawyer and Mom manages to keep everything on an even keel. His older brother is a musician and his younger sister works in a TV station. The Tylers lived in Stockton, Calif., then moved to Phoenix, Ariz., where Robert grew up.

Most of his creative interests in his early years were musical, like those of his brother — with whom, in fact, he played trumpet and keyboard in various local bands. But when it came time to choose a career, Robert opted for acting, which came as a bit of a surprise to his parents and siblings.

"My parents felt I was pursuing a tough path but they supported my decision to go to New York and see what I could do," the actor recalled.

Robert admits that it wasn't too long before he was appearing in showcase productions and then off-Broadway shows. During all this time, he was taking acting classes and enjoying his life as a working actor. Soaps gave him the independence to stop working at other jobs to pay the rent. "Loving" is his biggest break so far.

"I like being recognized in the street. I know some actors feel it's an imposition, but I like the feeling of

people watching you and connecting your face to the character in the soap. It may take a moment or two before they do, but you can see it coming."

As for his character of Trucker, Tyler doesn't see him as a bad guy. "Trucker is a rebel and certainly prone to trouble, but he's trying to straighten out his life and find a good woman, maybe Trisha Alden, to keep him on the right path."

Company to colorize TV classics

LOS ANGELES — Ever wonder how Beaver Cleaver looks in color? Stay tuned.

Like feature films before it, classic television shows are the latest black and white entertainments being "colorized."

"McHale's Navy," the situation comedy that ran on ABC-TV from 1962 to 1966, will be the first series remade by Colorization Inc. in Toronto, a subsidiary of Qintex Entertainment Inc.

Qintex, the Los Angeles-based entertainment division of an Australian media conglomerate that holds the rights to the comedy series, projects that 60 to 70 percent of the nation will be able to watch Ernest Borgnine, Joe Flynn and the other crew members of the P.T. 73 in living color by the fall 1989.

Qintex isn't stopping there. In addi-

tion to "McHale's Navy," the company is planning to color convert and syndicate other black and white classics such as "Leave it to Beaver," "The Munsters" and "Dennis the Menace."

Secaucus, N.J.-based WWOR-TV, has bought the 138 half-hour McHale's episodes. Farrell Meisel, the superstation's vice president of programming, believes color conversion may give many old quality shows new life in syndication.

"Many black and white series that don't have the kind of legs of an 'I Love Lucy' will be enhanced," he said. The company has not yet sold "McHale's Navy" in the Los Angeles area.

Qintex isn't the only company that believes there's gold in converting old black and white shows into color. Marina del Rey, Calif.-based Color Systems Technology Inc. bought the rights to 52 episodes of the 1952 CBS-TV series, "The Abbott and Cos-

tello Show," which it intends to colorize and sell in the United States and internationally within a year.

The company recently hired television industry veteran Robert B. Morin as chairman and chief executive of the entertainment division. His main charge is to secure the rights to old shows it can color convert and distribute.

The Directors Guild of America, a vocal critic of colorization of feature films, is not pleased by the news.

"Whether it's 'Citizen Kane' or 'McHale's Navy,' it's wrong to tamper with the product without the director's permission," said DGA spokesman Chuck Warn.

Others think there will be little criticism since television shows generally are not considered in the same league artistically with feature films.

"We're not dealing with a 'Casablanca' here," said WWOR's Meisel.

'Day by Day' star content to play meanest person

Julia Louis-Dreyfus has a problem — sort of. "I know this is going to sound very strange," she says. "But I have a very big head for my body. And I have these big eyes and this big smile and my gestures are broad. I'm very aware of that. Having a gigantic watermelon for a head might be a problem, so I constantly pull back."

Fact is, plenty of people are beginning to notice that Julia Louis-Dreyfus is big — in terms of comic wit and sassy satire, that is. Each week she proves just that while playing the chatty, self-absorbed yuppie stockbroker, Eileen Swift, on NBC's "Day by Day."

And that's not all. Almost weekly since the Gary David ("Family Ties") Goldberg sitcom — about a couple operating a day-care center — began last February, Louis-Dreyfus has stolen the show with her strident barbs.

"It's nice to be the bitchiest, meanest person on the show," she says. "Especially when you go on with 5-year-old children who couldn't be cuter. You can't lose."

It wasn't like that in the beginning, she admits. "I thought she'd sound too mean," says Louis-Dreyfus. "That delivering one-liners and barbs to chil-

dren wouldn't be funny."

Of course, that hasn't happened. In fact, her character has become an audience favorite and is applauded wildly at her every entrance.

"I think the audience can relate to her because Eileen is sort of everything had about the '80s and the me generation wrapped into one person," says Louis-Dreyfus. "And she says things everyone wishes they could say but doesn't."

For Louis-Dreyfus, however, being on a sitcom with an ensemble cast is something of a breeze. The 28-year-old actress honed her comedy at Northwestern University and then Chicago's improvisational Practical Theater Co., before landing on "Saturday Night Live," where she remained for three seasons before departing in 1985. Her memories of her "SNL" days are, to say the least, mixed.

"It was like listening to the Beatles as a kid and then being asked to join them," she recalls, laughing at the thought. "I was its audience. I was a huge fan and then one day I was plucked out of Northwestern and onto the show" — a show that at that point many regarded as tired.

"Bear with me while I call my psychologist," she jokes. "It was difficult."

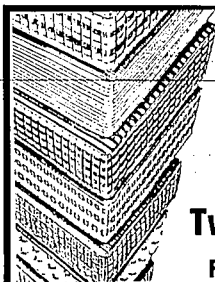

'Roseanne' tops Niensens

NEW YORK (AP) — "Roseanne" was Christmas week's top-rated show, marking the first time in four years that ABC had a regularly scheduled series in the Nov. 1 spot.

A first-run episode of "Roseanne," ABC's new hit comedy about a blue-collar family, beat a repeat of NBC's "The Cosby Show," which came in second.

The rest of the top 10 were: "Cheers," NBC; "Who's the Boss?" ABC; "Monday Night Football," ABC; "A Different World," NBC; "L.A. Law," NBC; "Matlock," NBC; "Night Court," NBC; and "In the Heat of the Night," NBC.

CBS's highest-rated shows of the week were "Designing Women" at 17th, followed by "Murphy Brown" at 18th.

The last time ABC had a No. 1 show that was a regularly scheduled series was Dec. 19, 1984, when "Dynasty" topped the A.C. Nielsen Co. ratings.

NBC racked up its 27th weekly win in a row and could win the rest of the season. The last time a network won an entire season was CBS in 1963-64. NBC came within a week of that 39-week record last season, but the World Series on ABC broke it.

If NBC does set a record, there will be an asterisk next to it, because the writers' strike delayed the other networks' fall lineups, while NBC began the season with the Summer Olympics. NBC also has the Super Bowl this year, usually the highest-rated show of the season.

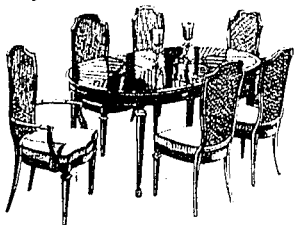
