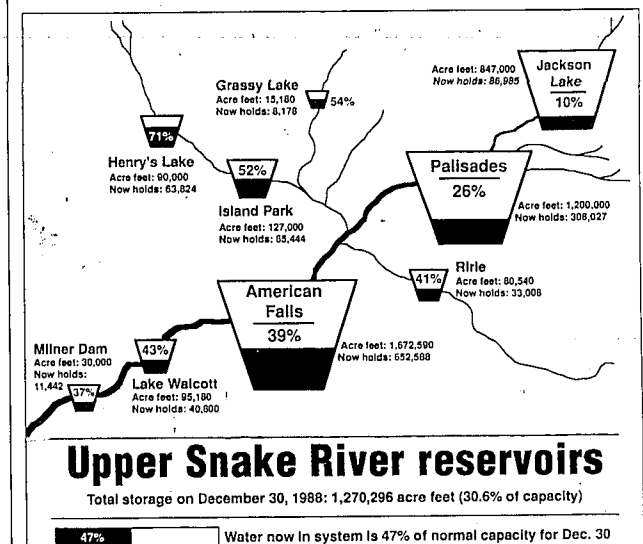

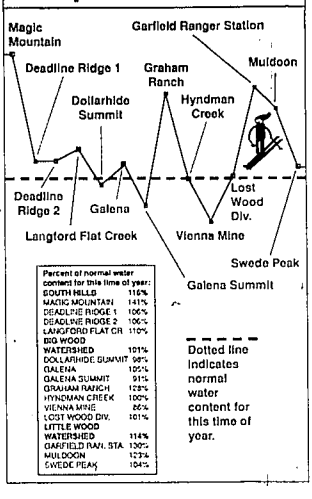

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**PUC postpones phone rate increase**

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Public Utilities Commission has postponed a telephone rate increase for US West Communications customers scheduled for Sunday at the company's request.

The PUC had authorized an increase of between 57 cents and 67 cents per month for residential customers and between \$1.41 and \$1.65 per month for business customers.

But last week, US West proposed to give up the increase and other charges for three years, if the commission drops an investigation into the company's earnings.

Without passing on the merits of the company's proposal, the commission said it would postpone the increase to avoid rate fluctuations. A ruling on the application is not expected for several weeks.

**Idaho may join Arizona in appeal**

BOISE (AP) — Believing the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals may have exceeded its authority, state Attorney General Jim Jones says Idaho may join Arizona in its appeal of the circuit's ruling voiding that state's death penalty.

"It is a troublesome decision," Jones said Friday. "I'm really upset."

But Jones said it would probably be early next week before he decides whether to enter the case as a friend of the court when Arizona Attorney General Bob Corbin carries out his pledge to appeal last week's 7-4 decision to the U.S. Supreme Court.

The appellate court, a target of strong words from Idaho law enforcement officials because of the roadblock to executions they maintain it has created, overturned the death sentence of John Harvey Adamson by declaring Arizona's capital punishment law unconstitutional.

Adamson had been convicted and sentenced to death for the 1976 car-bomb murder of Arizona Republican investigative reporter Don Bolles.

**BPA may sell access to power line**

BOISE (AP) — The Bonneville Power Administration may sell access to a new 1,600-megawatt West Coast transmission line it wants to build.

Under a proposal unveiled Thursday, BPA would let Northwest investor-owned utilities and public generating companies buy up to 725 megawatts of access in the line to California.

The Portland-based public power agency already has three transmission links with California, two alternating-current lines and a direct-current line. It is planning to build a third AC line.

Thomas Blankenship, BPA's Boise district manager, said several congressmen have asked the agency to explore access sales because they could be used to reduce the cost of BPA's involvement in the line.

If the line is constructed, BPA's share would be \$204 million of the projected \$211 million price tag. Sale of 725 megawatts of access could raise more than \$180 million.

**Company cancels dam study permit**

LEWISTON (AP) — A permit to study two dam sites on the Snake River near Asotin has been terminated at the request of the company that wanted to conduct the studies.

The action by Asotin Hydro Co. comes about one

month after passage of a federal law banning construction of dams between Asotin and Hells Canyon Dam, but that is not the reason a company official gave for terminating the study permit.

"When we first looked at it, our understanding was that it would be significantly less controversial, but it turned out we were wrong," said Jason James, operations manager for the Greenwich-based Consolidated Hydro Co., Asotin Hydro's parent company.

**Cable TV sues over tax assessment**

LEWISTON (AP) — TCI Cablevision of Lewiston has filed an appeal in 2nd District Court seeking an \$18.7 million reduction in its 1988 property tax valuation.

Because of a change in assessment methods, the company's valuation rose from a total of about \$1.1 million in 1987 to \$19.5 million this year. The company wants the valuation reduced to \$733,282.

That amount is the company's estimate of its value based on an approach that considers the cost of tangible property minus depreciation. The higher amount is the result of a method that considers income, expenses and the value of the company on the open market.

In the appeal filed Thursday, the company charged that the valuation by the Nez Perce county assessor's office is "grossly excessive and unsupported" and was not made according to recognized appraisal methods.

**State sets deadline for greenbelt**

BOISE (AP) — After months of haggling, Idaho Attorney General Jim Jones has notified Fireman's Fund Mortgage Corp. that it has until Jan. 11 to begin work on a stretch of the Boise River Greenbelt path or face the possibility of court action.

In a letter to the corporation's attorney Dale Higer, released Friday, Jones said his review of the documents on the state's lease of land for the Plantation Golf Course shows Fireman's Fund clearly has the obligation to build the path or offer an acceptable settlement in lieu of construction.

"The state has suffered significant loss in the failure of the timely completion of the public trail along the Plantation development site," Jones wrote, "and it intends to seek specific performance of Fireman's Fund's obligation or compensation for its loss if performance is not rendered."

The letter followed more than a year of negotiations between the state Land Board and Fireman's Fund over a decade-old agreement that in return for the leased land the Plantation developer would build the path along the river.

**Justice official named police chief**

BOISE (AP) — An official with the U.S. Justice Department has been named Boise's new chief of police, Mayor Dirk Kempthorne says.

James J. Carvino, a 34-year law enforcement veteran, is currently deputy director at the Office of Liaison Services in Washington, D.C.

Prior to the federal post, Carvino was head of the United States Capital Police Department, where he managed 1,227 officers and 30 civilian security aides. Carvino replaces former police Chief Jim Montgomery, who resigned to become sheriff of King County, Wash. Carvino will start Feb. 15.

# New Board of Corrections members avoid quick fix

BOISE (AP) — The newest members of the state Board of Corrections want to get their feet on the ground before taking any stands on the future direction Idaho's prison system should take.

But in finding out how the system works, newly-appointed board member Philip Presnell says, "we'll no doubt find some problem areas, and our job is to fix those problems."

Presnell, 65, a semi-retired Lewiston accountant and former chairman of the Nez Perce County Republican Party, and Nicholas Miller, 38, a Boise attorney who has been serving as chairman of the District 21 Democratic Legislative Committee, were appointed to the board by Gov. Cecil Andrus on Friday.

Miller, who will resign his political party post next week, succeeds board Chairman Bob Anderson of Post Falls, whose term expires on Sunday. Presnell takes the seat held

by the late L. James Koutnik of Twin Falls, who died of a heart attack earlier this month.

"Both of these men bring to the Board of Corrections a determination to see that Idaho's corrections system is managed in a highly professional and responsible manner," Andrus said in announcing the appointments.

"Both have professional backgrounds and personal integrity that will strengthen the Department of Corrections," the governor said.

Miller, the brother of Public Utilities Commission President Joe Dean Miller, will serve a six-year term through 1994 while Presnell will finish the final four years of Koutnik's term. Both appointments are subject to confirmation by the state Senate.

The term of the other board member, Wendell Miller of Idaho Falls, runs until 1991.

"I guess I'm willing to learn a lot,"

Miller said. "I don't have any particular agenda or background in the correctional system. ... The board just has to conduct its affairs in a business-like manner."

The board has been at the center of some controversy in recent weeks because of its ouster of Corrections Director Al Murphy after he authorized release of some prison inmates to halfway houses to ease overcrowding. The board kept Murphy's departure secret for several weeks.

"It appears to me we've had, at least in the eyes of the citizens of the state, considerable amount of controversy and problems here, and I would hope that could be smoothed out," Presnell said.

Andrus said Anderson has indicated he would be willing to serve in another state government capacity in the near future.

# Jones favors state water rights

BOISE (AP) — The Conference of Western Attorneys General is urging Interior Secretary-designate Manuel Lujan to formally recognize the primacy of state laws on water rights.

The federal government "should comply with applicable state laws and regulations and defer to state agencies and forums with jurisdiction over questions of state title to and public rights in navigable waters absent specific statutory language to the contrary," Idaho Attorney General Jim Jones, the conference chairman, said in a letter and position paper to Lujan.

The conference also asked that Lujan meet with it during its March session in Washington, D.C., to discuss water law and other western issues in more detail.

"So many public lands and water issues depend upon a balanced view of federalism by those in charge of policy making in the Interior Department," Jones said on Friday. "What

we're trying to tell the administration, particularly the secretary-designate, is that we all have concerns that hinge around federalism."

In the letter and position paper, Jones specifically cited attempts by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission during the Reagan administration to erode traditional state primacy on water rights despite Reagan's 1987 order that federal agencies recognize state sovereignty.

The conference said the federal government should adhere to "basic federalism principles" when asserting reserved water rights on federal lands.

In that vein, the conference said, the government should ensure that its negotiators in water rights matters be empowered to make a final agreement and that the government provide money both for states and Indian tribes to conduct water rights negotiation studies.

# Pocatello begins street fee refund

POCATELLO (AP) — Rebuffed by the state Supreme Court, Pocatello city officials have started the machinery to refund more than \$1 million in its controversial street maintenance fee collected illegally over the past two years.

But with the city still needing huge infusions of cash to repair its deteriorating network of streets, officials will be suggesting that even though the fee has been declared unconstitutional the money collected so far be left in city coffers.

City leaders said Friday that some 14,000 letters will be mailed to residents advising them of Thursday's

**Gem court remands towing lawsuit back to magistrate court**

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Court of Appeals has remanded back to magistrate court a suit by a couple that a tow truck driver wrongfully towed away their vehicle, which later was stolen.

Larry and Freda Wiseman left their pickup at a truck stop in Post Falls while they were doing some long-haul trucking. A man portraying himself as Larry Wiseman telephoned tow truck operator David Schaffer and asked him to tow the Wiseman's truck to the yard of a local welding shop.

The person on the phone told Schaffer there was \$30 on the survivor of the truck for the towing charge. Sometime later, the pickup was stolen.

The Wisemans filed the action, alleging trespass or conversion, and negligence on Schaffer's part. Schaffer called two tow truck operators as witnesses, who testified that towing away a truck following a telephone call only was common practice.

On appeal, the Wisemans contended that 1st District Magistrate Peter Hutchinson abused his discretion by permitting the witnesses and the jury verdict was not supported by the evidence.

The appellate court found the magistrate jury's ruling regarding conversion — that Schaffer had wrongfully exerted his control over another person's property — did apply, and should be vacated.

Those letters will advise residents they can request a refund of their fee payments by check, ask that those payments be credited to future water and sewer bills or voluntarily contribute the payments to the city for future street maintenance.

The fee, described by the courts as an "innovative if not revolutionary" way to raise \$600,000 a year, was imposed after city voters in 1986 defeated a huge property tax hike to finance street repairs. It was the second time in four years property owners rejected a tax hike for the street program.

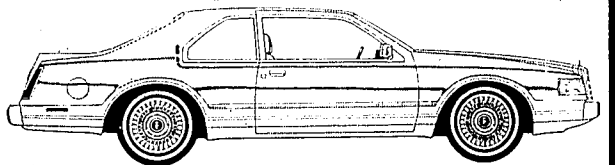
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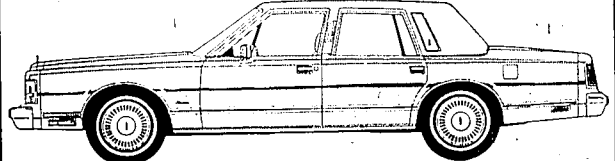
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## Court, advisory panel ponder Hawkins dilemma

TWIN FALLS — Decisions involving the troubled Hawkins Co. Ltd. bean warehouse are due early next week from the state Department of Agriculture and the 5th District Court.

Dick Rush, Agriculture Department director, meets Tuesday morning with an advisory committee to discuss various proposals for milling and marketing the beans stored in the Filer warehouse, whether turning the

beans into money would change the growers' legal standing, and whether the company should be put into receivership.

Rush created the committee to help him decide how best to divide the assets from the warehouse, which was seized by the state in November after inventory shortages were discovered.

The committee includes a representative for Hawkins; one for its primary lender, First Security Bank; one for its largest lien holder, Klein Brothers; and three for the growers.

Another decision involving Hawkins also should be made early next week in 5th District Court in Twin Falls.

A judge will decide whether a lawsuit filed against Hawkins by several growers should be a class action. The growers' attorney, Lloyd Walker, said he expects the court to agree with the class-action request.

If so, every grower with a claim to beans at Hawkins will be included as a plaintiff unless he specifically declines.

The growers' suit asks the court to give them undisputed legal title to the beans, and

to divide the beans among growers in several subclasses: growers with 1988 beans, growers with beans from previous years, and growers with certified seed beans.

The seed beans shouldn't cause confusion because warehouses isolate them in separate boxes for each grower. Dividing the 1988 beans from other years, however, is more controversial.

Because most of the 1988 bean inventories are complete, growers who have only 1988 beans naturally don't want to divide them with growers who claim beans from past

years that are missing.

On the other hand, growers who deposited beans in previous years are more likely to want the beans considered one big pot and divided among everyone based on each grower's percentage of the whole.

Lawyers representing some of the growers met Thursday to try to reach agreement on the disbursement issue and other items. But all they agreed on was that "it will be difficult to agree on anything," said Harry DeHuan, one of the attorneys.

## Commissioners swear in hospital board members

TWIN FALLS — In a brief and simple ceremony, the county commissioners swore in three new hospital board members Friday morning.

Ray Strolberg, Jim Herrett and Don Siplon will replace Robert Valentine, Ferris Freestone and Dave Munna as Magic Valley Regional Medical Center Hospital Board members. The three retiring members have served the maximum years possible; board members are appointed by the county commissioners and can serve only two three-year terms.

"I think they are knowledgeable and enthusiastic," County Commissioner Judy Felton said of the appointees.

The commissioners praised the new appointees' geographical diversity — Strolberg is active in Kimberly, Herrett in Filer and Siplon resides in Twin Falls — and said they were chosen on the basis of their community service records, their familiarity with the area and the commissioners' belief that they will be dedicated members.

"Each one has been involved in different boards and on different committees and I think they will each bring in different and new thoughts to the board," Commissioner-elect Norma Blass said.

The current commissioners invited Blass to participate in the selection process because she will be working with the new board members.

Commissioner Marvin Hempleman said the decision was difficult. The 12-name list of possible candidates and the commissioners had suggestions of their own as well.

"We worked with the names we had and we think these people represent a good cross-section," Hempleman said.

Strolberg, of Dadds-Strolberg Insurance Agency Inc. in Kimberly, said he decided quickly after contacted by the commissioners, but that he "checked things out quite thoroughly" to ensure he would have the time.

"I'm active in service organizations and I think it's important to work for the community you are part of," he said.

## Scolding letter brought Siplon to panel's notice

TWIN FALLS — One of the new hospital board members appointed Friday came to the attention of the county commissioners through a cordial but somewhat scolding letter sent in late November to individual hospital board members and the county commissioners.

The Twin Falls Veterans Health Commission authored the Nov. 23 letter after taking a survey regarding health care in the Magic Valley. Don Siplon, newly appointed hospital board member, is the commission's chairman.

The group was formed in February 1987 as a result of concerns raised in the community about the future of health care, Siplon said.

The group is made up of representatives from four local veterans groups — American Legion, Twin Falls Post No. 7, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Twin Falls Post No. 2163, Vietnam Veterans of America, Twin Falls Chapter 222; and Disabled

American Veterans, Twin Falls Stradley Chapter 5 — and it meets as needed to address health care issues.

"Our investigation has led us to the conclusion that the board is conducting its business in a way which may be perceived as neither credible nor fair by many citizens in our community," the letter states.

It lists a number of recent incidents and reads: "These, and other perceived problems, lead us to the conclusion that the board may have conducted itself more like a private corporation board of directors than that of a public agency which is serving a vitally concerned citizenry."

The letter goes on to say that the commission appreciates "the public spirit and personal sacrifice which each of the board members brings to the community through his or her service."

"We intend no personal criticism of any such member. We, instead, bring our concern to you of policies perceived to have been misinterpreted or perhaps initiated without sufficient

## Symposium will investigate nuclear waste

TWIN FALLS — Frustrated with what some members see as misleading and exaggerated information about nuclear waste, the Idaho Academy of Science is inviting critics to its annual April symposium.

However, local activists and the scientists may not be able to agree upon a format.

The academy wants scientific papers presented that "specifically identify the hazards" and "explain the technical bases for the conclusions," academy President Philip Anderson said.

Twin Falls physician—and activist—Peter Rickards said he is planning a paper on "The Politics of the Science of Clean-Up" but has not submitted a proposal yet.

However, the organization has already rejected a proposal by Liz Paul, Ketchum spokeswoman.

for the Snake River Alliance, to discuss with scientists what non-military research interests them.

"They want scientific reports," Paul said. "We are not a scientific organization. We are a public education organization. We can read books and

collect information but we cannot do a scientific paper on migration in the aquifer."

"To date we have been unable to get any such critics to submit papers, which tends to confirm the prevailing belief in the scientific community that the negative reports have no technical bases," Anderson said.

Instead of addressing the scientific community, critics of the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory, where Anderson works, have used news reports, letters to the editor and public hearings such as forums to suggest nuclear waste poses a serious threat to the health and safety of Idaho residents, Anderson said.

"The reports either 'greatly exaggerate the published scientific data about the behavior and toxicity of such materials' or 'do not correlate with

HARARE, Zimbabwe (AP) — Alec Smith, son of former Rhodesian prime minister Ian Smith, is hoping to raise more than \$250,000 for starving children in a nation his father battled.

The younger Smith has organized a "Goal Against Hunger" soccer match between European champion PSV Eindhoven and Racing Club of Argentina, Latin America's current Super Cup winners. The Jan. 15

match will be the first of a series of fund-raising soccer matches the 39-year-old Smith is planning to battle hunger in Mozambique. The money raised will buy food to be distributed through charities already working in Mozambique, including Save the Children, World Vision, Christian Care and the Zimbabwe Mozambique Friendship Association.

Ian Smith led white-ruled Rhodesian during a bloody seven-year bush war that led to the independence of black-ruled Zimbabwe in 1980. Zimbabwean guerrilla bases in Mozambique were frequently attacked by Rhodesian troops.

The younger Smith, who joined the Moral Rearmament Movement in Switzerland in 1979, returned to independent Zimbabwe to serve as a Presbyterian chaplain in a national army led by former guerrilla foes of his father.

TACOMA, Wash. (AP) — Hollis Day gave his daughter an extra warm hug the last morning of her Christmas visit and told her he would watch her 2-year-old hand-dipped son, Dylan, while she packed for the trip home.

The 75-year-old man then drove off with his only grandson, leaving a note that said only: "Gramps and Dylan have gone bye-bye together."

On Thursday, two days later, Hollis Day and his grandson were found shot to death in a locked vehicle on a wooded, family-owned land 50 miles away, Sheriff Bill Logan said. The gun was near the bodies. Both were shot in the head.

"At this point, the evidence ap-

pears consistent with a homicide-suicide theory," Logan said. Autopsies were scheduled for Friday.

Debbie Day said she had realized a few hours after her father left with Dylan that he may have been saying goodbye forever. "He told me what a wonderful girl and mother I was," she said of the exchange Tuesday.

Ms. Day, 40, said she called police a few hours after her father left.

"It's hard to believe he would hurt anybody, much less his grandson, but he'd written me a number of letters, talking about dreams he'd had about flying with Dylan into the hereafter," Ms. Day said.

# 3-year-old saves mom

SHREVEPORT, La. (AP) — A 3-year-old boy, using the telephone for the first time, saved his bleeding mother's life by calling the operator and asking her to reach his father at work.

The doctors said if he had laid there much longer I wouldn't be here today," Liz Pendleton, 29, said Friday from her hospital room.

Mrs. Pendleton said she felt sick Tuesday and woke up early Wednesday in severe pain and unable to move, hemorrhaging from a ruptured filipian tube.

She called to her son, Jason, who was sleeping on the couch near the telephone and told him he would have to get help.

"He told me, 'Oh, Mommy, you can just wait until tomorrow to go to the doctor,'" Mrs. Pendleton said. "He just couldn't sit it."

She convinced him she needed help right away, and he followed her instructions. She made an "O" with her thumb and forefinger and explained where the button for the operator was on the telephone dial.

"Tell her your mama's very sick," she told Jason.

Then Jason told the operator that his daddy worked at Arka Gas in the computer room. Mrs. Pendleton told

Jason the phone number and spelled their last name and he repeated it to the operator, she said.

When the operator got Randy Pendleton, 33, on the line, Jason said: "Daddy, mama's very sick. You're going to have to come home."

Pendleton called for an ambulance and rushed home. Mrs. Pendleton was taken to Schumpert Medical Center where she had emergency surgery. Doctors said she had lost three pints of blood and was near death.

Mrs. Pendleton said Jason had never used the telephone before but handled the situation like a veteran caller.

"He never got nervous. I was trying not to get him upset. He took it like a pro," his mother said proudly.

Now, Jason's enjoying the attention that comes with heroism.

# Real sword used by mistake injures actor in Samurai film

TOKYO (AP) — An actor filming a samurai drama was seriously injured in a battle scene when a real sword was substituted accidentally for a fake one, police said Friday.

Yukio Kato was slashed in the neck during the filming of the traditional Japanese movie on Monday, said Hiroshima Prefectural Police.

Kato, 34, was unconscious and in serious condition at Okayama University Hospital, the police said.

The real sword was to be used later in the film during a close-up scene, according to a report by Kyodo News

Service. A fake sword that was to have been used in the battle scene was in poor condition, and the director of the movie, Shintaro Katsu, ordered the crew to replace it with another. Kyodo said.

It said the real sword was used for an extended period of time in the filming before the injury occurred.

Police said they seized the sword and the rolls of film containing the battle scene and were questioning the movie crew.

**Ex-hostages celebrate Christmas**

PARIS (AP) — Two French girls held hostage for 13 months celebrated a belated Christmas on Friday with a party thrown by their home town.

But public rejoicing was tempered with suggestions that Libyan leader Col. Muammar Gadhafi used the children to boost his image. "This is the end of a nightmare," Pascal Bettle, father of 7-year-old Marie-Laure and 6-year-old Virginie, told hundreds of people gathered in the public square of Ollioules in southern France. "This is happiness."

The girls, held by an extremist Palestinian group, were handed over to French officials Thursday in the Libyan capital of Tripoli, six days after Gadhafi called for their release.

The children's mother, Jacqueline Valente, five Belgians and a baby sister born in captivity, remained in the hands of Abu Nidal's Fatah-Revolutionary Group, backed by Libya. The group, suspected in numerous cases of terrorism, accused them of spying for Israel.

**Food protests continue in Sudan**

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) — Anti-government protesters took to the streets of Khartoum and other cities in Sudan for a fourth day Friday despite government concessions on food price increases. At least two were reported killed.

A Western diplomat reported rumors of an imminent coup attempt in Sudan and said the East African country remained paralyzed by a general strike. Communications were still disrupted.

Khartoum Commissioner Fatih Abdoun, the capital's head of government, told The Associated Press that "an unidentified gunman opened fire on demonstrators" outside Cabinet offices on Thursday, killing two and wounding 28.

**Israelis kill 2 in Gaza Strip raid**

JERUSALEM (AP) — Troops raided a Gaza Strip hideout and killed two Palestinians who tried to flee, and a third Arab was killed Friday when soldiers fired at stone-throwing worshippers after Moslem prayers, the army said.

At least 10 Palestinians were wounded in clashes with Israeli troops in the Gaza Strip, Arab hospital officials said. An army spokesman confirmed four wounded.

Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir plans to launch a peace initiative within two months and will seek Egypt's help in finding Palestinian negotiators who are not tied to the PLO, said Shamir aide Avi Pazner.

**Afghan soldiers announce cease-fire**

ISLAMABAD, Pakistan (AP) — Soldiers of the pro-Soviet Afghan government will cease firing on U.S.-backed Moslem guerrillas next week and will refrain from attacks as long as the insurgents do, Afghan Premier Najib said Friday.

But a guerrilla spokesman in Islamabad said the insurgents would keep fighting in the 10-year war, rendering the truce meaningless.

All sections and divisions of the republic's military forces have been given an order to observe a cease-fire from Jan. 1 in conditions in which the opposite side will refrain from direct attack, the official Soviet news agency Tass quoted Najib as saying on Afghan television.

Afghan government radio said Moslem insurgents will be given four days to accept the truce. If they refuse, government troops will start shooting again, said Radio Kabul, monitored in Islamabad.

**Yugoslav leaders quit**

BEIGRADE, Yugoslavia (AP) — The government resigned Friday in reaction to mounting criticism of its handling of an economic crisis, the first to do so since the communists took power after World War II.

The move, a sign of the liberalization creeping into Yugoslavia's one-party system, represented a further break with the legacy of President Josip Broz Tito, founder of communist Yugoslavia and its undisputed leader until his death in 1980.

Premier Branko Mikulic told Parliament he and the entire 31-member Cabinet stepped down because legislators refused Wednesday to pass an economic law needed to ensure continued support from the International Monetary Fund.

Mikulic, a 65-year-old economist and Tito ally who took office in May 1986, was seen as a hardliner in the ruling Communist Party. His resignation indicated that reform-oriented forces eager to adopt Western-style changes are gaining the upper hand in a protracted political struggle.

Few Yugoslavs, however, expected Mikulic's resignation to bring any immediate solutions to an economic crisis that has reduced living standards by 50 percent since 1980.

Foreign debt stands at \$21 billion, unemployment at 15 percent and inflation at around 250 percent — three times what it was when Mikulic took office.

**Racial conflict spreads in China**

NANKING, China (AP) — Racial conflict between African and Chinese students was reported in another city Friday, and more than 60 Africans were sequestered in a dormitory to protest allegations by authorities that they have AIDS.

The incident at the Zhejiang Agriculture University in Hangzhou took place against the backdrop of continued anti-black demonstrations in Nanking, where Chinese students are demanding that African students involved in a Christmas Eve brawl be punished.

Martin Ayuk, a student from Cameroon, said the problems in Hangzhou, 143 miles southeast of Nanking, began Dec. 23 when a university operate started telling all incoming Chinese callers to the foreign students' dormitory that all African students were infected with AIDS.

African students asked the university for an explanation but were not satisfied by a meeting with a university official.

MOSCOW (AP) — A Kremlin commission overseeing earthquake relief efforts sharply criticized food suppliers in Armenia, saying their lack of vigilance has led to rumors of unfair food distribution, Tass reported Friday.

In another report, Tass said Defense Minister Dmitri T. Yazov called for an improved civil defense system to react to disasters like the Dec. 7 earthquake.

The official news agency, in a report from the Armenian capital of Yerevan, said the Politburo commission led by Yuri Balatin warned that officials responsible for poorly organized food supplies to devastated Armenia would be held responsible.

"The work style of a number of officials is limited to commands. They do not actually have the situation in hand and do not make spot checks to exercise control at local level," Tass said.

**Soviets convict official of bribery**

*Trial sends no-corruption message to all leaders*

MOSCOW (AP) — The son-in-law of former President Leonid I. Brezhnev was convicted Friday of taking nearly \$145,000 in bribes, but he was spared the firing squad and sentenced to 12 years in a labor camp.

The nearly four-month trial of Yuri Churbanov and eight of his cronies focused on sensational allegations of wrongdoing stretching all the way to the Kremlin's former first family. It also sent an important political message that under President Mikhail S. Gorbachev, no one is above the law.

Churbanov, 52, served as first deputy Soviet interior minister, which put him in the ranks of the few officials in charge of the nation's police, for two years before Brezhnev died in 1982. He continued in the job until 1983 and was arrested in January 1987.

Army Maj. Gen. Mikhail Marov,

the judge in the military tribunal hearing the case, said Churbanov was guilty of "abuse of office committed systematically, with selfish motivations, inflicting substantial harm."

Under Gorbachev, Brezhnev has been harshly criticized for fostering corruption and economic and cultural stagnation during his 18-year rule. On Thursday, the Kremlin took another swipe at Brezhnev by ordering that a plaque be removed from his former home and that factories and schools be stripped of his name.

Churbanov married Brezhnev's daughter, Galina, in 1971 and was accused of using his family ties to advance his career and extort bribes.

Churbanov, sporting neatly combed jet black hair and wearing a red turtleneck sweater, stood throughout Marov's 3½-hour review of the charges and sentencing. He stared

calmly at the judge and two lay assessors in the neo-classical Soviet Supreme Court building a few blocks from the Kremlin. A guard of the Interior Ministry he once helped supervise stood facing him a few feet away.

He paid little attention to the dozens of cameras focused on him, or to the 150 spectators, and did not break his composure as the sentence was read. When Marov asked whether he understood the verdict or needed anything, he replied simply: "No."

Churbanov originally faced the death penalty on charges he accepted bribes of more than \$1.1 million.

But the military tribunal threw out some of the charges and reduced the amount of bribes Churbanov was accused of taking to about \$145,000. The court also convicted Churbanov of siphoning more than \$16,000 in interior

**Terrorists spawn 'arms race'**

LONDON (AP) — Air terrorism has spawned a grisly "arms race" between the security establishment and the ever-increasing sophistication of the terrorist arsenal.

As bomb-detection machinery has grown more refined, explosives have become easier to conceal. As one security gap closes, terrorists find another.

Because of lack of personnel and the expense of operating X-ray equipment, "we are always at least two steps behind the terrorists," Brian Orzell of the British flight engineers' union said Friday, eight days after a bomb blew up Pan Am Flight 103 over Scotland, killing all 259 people aboard and leaving 11 on the ground missing and presumed dead.

But other experts say the quest for terrorist-proof air travel has reached an outer limit beyond which it will become prohibitively expensive or make flying unbearably uncomfortable.

When air terrorism became a problem in the late 1960s, authorities responded by transforming airports

into fortresses.

It now is routine for all passengers to go through metal detectors while their hand luggage is X-rayed. Airlines especially at risk, such as Israel's El Al, search all luggage by hand. At Belfast airports, the Irish terrorist threat makes it necessary to frisk not just the passengers but everyone else coming into the terminal.

Airlines insist that each piece of luggage match its passenger, assuming that no bomber would travel aboard the targeted plane. So terrorists have resorted to duping unwitting passengers into carrying explosives onto planes. Passengers are regularly warned to accept no baggage they haven't packed themselves.

The search for suspicious objects has become much harder with the advent of plastic explosives that give off virtually no detectable odor. They are malleable enough to be shaped into a souvenir or rolled wafers-thin to fit inside a suitcase lining. Detonators now are small enough to fit into

a suitcase lock.

Moreover, the age of the metal-free handgun is looming. According to David Kyd, spokesman for the International Air Transport Association in Geneva, such a gun has been developed in Austria and will be extremely hard to detect on X-ray screens.

"The sophistication and miniaturization of explosives has become quite worrisome," Kyd said in an interview.

According to David Lee, mount of the respected journal *Flight International*, "It's an arms race."

Bombs can be connected to barometric detonators that respond to altitude changes.

**Czechs offer bomb experts to help in Pan Am inquiry**

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia (AP) — Czechoslovakia on Friday offered to send experts to help identify explosives that blew up Pan Am Flight 103 following reports a Czech-manufactured explosive may have been used.

A Foreign Ministry statement categorically denied that Czechoslovakia ever provided explosives to terrorists.

British authorities said Wednesday that the residue of explosives recovered from the debris of the Boeing 747 that crashed in Lockerbie, Scotland, on Dec. 21, was "consistent with the use of a high-performance plastic explosive."

That led to speculation the bomb may have been made of Semtex, an orange-colored plastic explosive manufactured in Czechoslovakia.

Terrorism experts and U.S. State Department officials have said that Syria and Libya obtained Semtex from Czechoslovakia and passed it on to surrogate terrorist groups. "Czechoslovakia categorically denies that it condones categorically all acts, forms and methods of terrorism and that it complies consistently with the appropriate international commitments," said the Foreign Ministry statement, carried by the state news agency CTK.

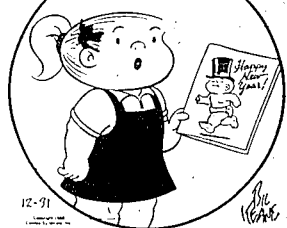
