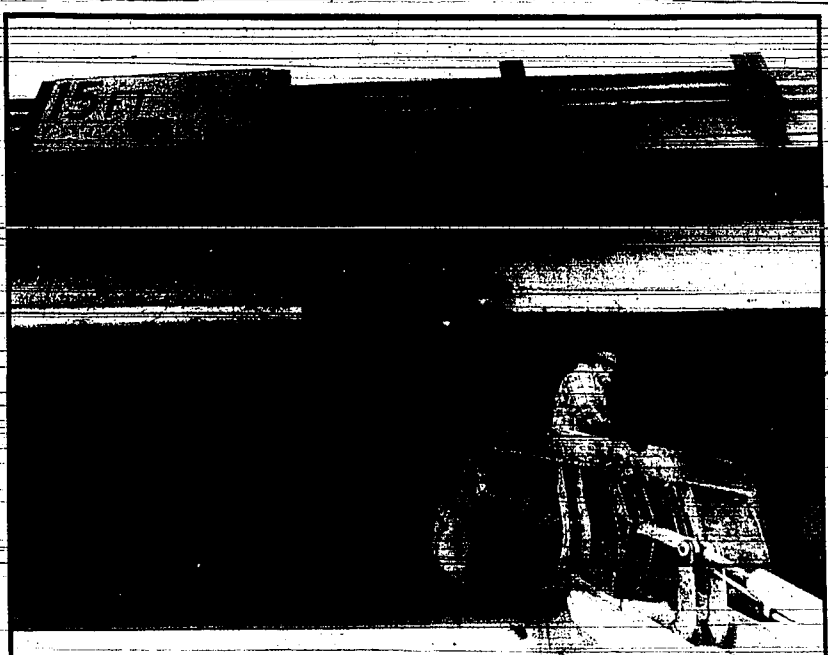

Backhoe bangs into I-84 overpasses

TWIN FALLS — A truck hauling a backhoe scraped the undercarriage of two overpasses north of here Thursday, causing about \$500,000 in damage and the closure of one interstate lane.

"It was kind of funny because I was telling my wife just before that I hope we get it through there," said Tracy Irish, the truck's driver. "Then it hit and I said, 'Oh no, I was only kidding.'"

No one was injured in the accident, which occurred at 12:40 p.m. on U.S. Highway 30, Idaho State Police said. Irish, heading south in a flatbed 18-wheeler hauling hay and a backhoe, struck both U.S. Interstate 84 overpasses, sever-

ing support cables and knocking off chunks of concrete. Idaho Transportation Department officials estimated that repairs will take between \$400,000 and \$500,000.

"You're looking at three months easy — at least, minimum," said Jon Schierman, district maintenance engineer.

Meanwhile, authorities plan to close I-84's right-hand westbound lane, which passes over the section most damaged by the impact.

I-84 crosses Highway 30 with a pair of overpasses. The backhoe cut tension cables in three of the westbound overpass' six ribs, said ISP Capt. Robert Blumhagen. The eastbound overpass sustained only minimal damage.

Traffic under the overpasses should not be affected, authorities said.

Police cited Irish, 24, of Jackpot, for driving an overheight vehicle. Both overpasses permit southbound vehicles up to 15 feet, 11 inches in height.

Irish, who was hauling the backhoe from Bellevue to Jackpot, said he had driven the same rig under the I-84 overpasses twice before.

On Thursday, however, the backhoe's boom scraped both overpasses, causing the backhoe to fall off the truck's bed about 100 yards beyond the second overpass.

"It jarr'd pretty good," Irish said. "It was more noisy than anything."

Irish pulled his rig over, got out and drove the upright back onto the highway.

Police closed one of the highway's southbound lanes for a couple of hours while IFD employees cleared the wreckage.

Hawkins Co. owners to file for bankruptcy

Business reorganization under Chapter 11 company's intent

TWIN FALLS — Hawkins Co. Ltd. owners plan to file for bankruptcy today, according to Robert Blass, one of the owners.

The Filer bean warehouse company will file for Chapter 11 business reorganization with the federal bankruptcy court in Boise.

Hawkins Co. has been under state control since Nov. 22 when the owners' warehouse license was suspended after inventory shortages were discovered.

"Fast are not going down the road 'fast enough,'" Blass said. "We need to take advantage of the high bean market."

"The federal court can make decisions and move faster than the state can," he said.

"For the farmers concerned, we're better off to go into Chapter 11," he said. "The farmers will have a lot of say in this yet. Their welfare is our No. 1 goal."

Under state law, commodity growers with secured liens come before creditors in the payout line. Whether the growers' priority lien status would change under federal bankruptcy law is undetermined, Peterson said. Their status, however, is more likely to be challenged there, he added.

The growers association steering committee is discussing whether to take separate legal action of its own. A growers' meeting should be held within a week to gather input, Peterson said.

"I think it helps us," was attorney Lloyd Walker's reaction. He is representing several growers in a suit against Hawkins asking a state court to declare the growers the legal owners of the beans and to return the beans to them.

Walker's clients plan to petition the federal bankruptcy court to do the same thing.

"We're maintaining that the beans are not part of the assets of the estate," he said. "They belong to the growers. They have no business in the bankruptcy."

If the bankruptcy court agrees, the case would be returned to state court to sort out the distribution issues, he said.

12 charges could still confront North

WASHINGTON — The narrow case that Independent Counsel Lawrence Walsh has carved out against Oliver North targets the cover-up of the Iran-Contra money diversion and contains the charges even Walsh's critics thought were most likely to succeed.

But the former White House aide would no longer be charged with a direct crime for diverting money from Iranian arms sales to the Nicaraguan Contras.

Walsh proposal Thursday to skirt a raging dispute over what classified documents can be introduced by defense and prosecution by dropping charges of conspiracy and theft of government property. Those were the only remaining counts which charged a crime in diverting the money.

But if U.S. District Judge Gerhard Gesell accepts Walsh's motion, North would still face 12 charges.

Analysis

Those 12 carry a cumulative, maximum penalty of 60 years in prison and \$3 million in fines, although federal judges simply do not sentence first offenders to consecutive, maximum penalties in all counts which produce guilty verdicts.

Nine of these counts charge North with trying to prevent discovery of his activities on behalf of the Contras, including misleading Congress and Attorney General Edwin Meese and shredding and altering government documents.

The three other counts charge North with accepting a gratuity, converting money to personal use and scheming to defraud the Treasury of tax revenue.

Of the nine cover-up-based counts, four relate directly to concealing the diversion of arms sale money.

It is these four that longtime government prose-

cutors, speaking privately, always thought were Walsh's strongest charges.

From the outset, Walsh confronted some legal problems. The Boland amendment barring aid to the Contras did not carry its own criminal penalties; some had argued it did not apply to the National Security Council where North worked.

The conspiracy charge that Walsh fashioned to embrace the entire diversion effort was by no means unprecedented but it was an aggressive use of the law to deal with these legal problems. Even former top Justice Department officials were more comfortable with the theft of government property charge which was based on the diversion of the arms sale money.

But Walsh's allies and critics alike were most impressed with four cover-up charges based on North's actions after the sale of U.S. built missiles to Iran was disclosed in early November 1986.

These counts charge North with obstructing

Boise boom forecast based on size, college

BOISE — Boise's status as a medium-sized state capital with a college should cause it to grow phenomenally in the next few years, according to projections by Washington, D.C., marketing firm

MRB Associates predicts Boise will have those attributes which are hot spots for growth across the nation, with Olympia, Wash., tagged as the nation's fastest-growing area outside Florida.

The company cited Boise and Madison, Wis., as examples of medium-size cities likely to grow.

"The word on Boise is getting around quite a bit," said Don Keirn, the city's economic development director.

Keirn said he expects Boise's booming economy to level-off as other major construction projects on tap for growth across the nation optimistic that it will continue to grow.

"I'm hopeful we're building a

In this garden, muskrat love is as rare as the plants

FRAMINGHAM, Mass. — In what may be the ultimate no-win battle among environmentalists, a wildflower preserve has been killing muskrats that eat its rare flora, drawing the wrath of animal rights activists.

The muskrat is a very common animal, and some of the plants we grow are uncommon. David R. Longland, director of the preserve, said Thursday. "We have to manage for the best overall conservation, and

sometimes that favors plants over animals."

But the Framingham Humane Society contends there ought to be a little more muskrat love at the 45-acre Garden in the Woods preserve. It says that trapping muskrats merely encourages the remaining ones to reproduce faster, providing little more than a quick fix to the delicate problem of balance between flora and fauna.

The society also maintains the underwire Conibeat traps, which break the muskrats' necks, pose a danger to humans

and pets. It is lobbying for a ban on these traps in Longland's view.

These are dangerous things. They don't belong in a civilized urban environment, said society member Mary Anne Wyatt.

Garden in the Woods was founded in 1931 and has been owned by the 3,400-member New England Wildflower Society since 1965. An island of calm in the middle of Framingham, it contains 1,400 plant species in a natural setting interwoven with three miles of

Longland, 37, said Garden in the Woods has been trapping muskrats for at least five years, catching an average of one a year in its Jilly pond. He said the preserve uses the spring-loaded, underwire Conibeat traps because they snap the animals' necks, killing them instantly.

Longland said Garden in the Woods decided to trap the muskrats because they are voracious eaters of aquatic vegetation. Left unchecked, he said, the furry, web-footed rodents threatened to wipe out some of the

colorful and unusual species — the white pickered wood. Blue iris, horkens and pink pygmy water lilies — that attract 20,000 visitors to the preserve each year.

Carol A. Marchione, president of the humane society, said Garden in the Woods should switch to using box traps, which capture muskrats alive for relocating.

But Longland said the preserve has already tried that — as well as chemical repellants, lining the banks of the Jilly pond with stones, and covering rare plants with wire mesh.

Mayor threatened with recall petition

AMERICAN FALLS, (AP) — Fire Chief Bill Edmonds has threatened to start a recall petition against Mayor Mert Ferguson over the mayor's refusal to transport him without a probationary period.

Edmonds' resignation was conditioned on 30 days probation Wednesday night during a heated meeting with Ferguson, attended by dozens of American Falls residents supporting the fire chief.

Originally, Ferguson said he would like to appoint Edmonds for a 90-day probationary period because he felt "changes should be made in Bill, and fully cooperate with all other departments."

But Edmonds agreed that option, saying he did not want to create more problems and he had done nothing wrong.

Ferguson said he would reevaluate Edmonds' status at the city council's next regular meeting on Feb. 1.

"You're on probation as fast as I can start a recall petition," Edmonds told Ferguson.

Larry Jackson receives appointment

BOISE (AP) — Larry Jackson, a central figure in a controversy last year that may have cost a key legislator his job, has been appointed to the Idaho Industrial Commission by Gov. Cecil Andrus.

"He has the ability and we have a need," said Andrus, in announcing the appointment on Thursday.

The full-time job pays a base of \$47,040 per year and is scheduled to go to \$49,392 on July 1, tied to an increase in pay for state district judges.

The three-member commission already has one Democrat and one Republican, and Andrus could have selected a Democrat for the job, but said he wanted to get the best person possible.

"Larry Jackson was an outstanding member of the Idaho Legislature in the 1970s," the governor said. "I think his professional background in the insurance industry and in state government provides the type of experience the commission needs."

Judge moves to senior status

BOISE (AP) — U.S. District Judge Marion Callister, 67, will move to senior judge status on June 6, which means Idaho will be getting a new federal judge.

Jerry Clapp, U.S. District Court clerk, said Thursday Callister will move to senior-judge status, with a reduced calendar of activity, but will continue to hear cases.

"That will leave Idaho with only one nonsenior district judge, Harold Ryan. A new judge will be appointed by the president upon the recommendation of the state's senior senator, James McClure."

Idaho's 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals position also has been vacant since the death of J. Blaine Anderson, meaning the state has two federal judgeships to fill.

Debate raises questions about recall

LEWISTON (AP) — A legal debate about a petition to recall city council members in the Latah County community of Troy has raised questions about the successful recall of nearly the entire Lewiston City Council.

Five council members were listed on a single petition to get the Lewiston recall effort off the ground last fall. But the Troy residents fighting the sale of the town's city park to the U.S. Postal Service were told Tuesday by the city clerk that individual petitions for each member are required.

Five Lewiston council members, including Mayor Marion Shinn, were recalled after residents were angered by a zoning decision that allowed commercial encroachment on a neighborhood.

Man pleads guilty to killing woman

ST. ANTHONY (AP) — A 37-year-old man has pleaded guilty to killing an Ohio woman last summer, saying her death "bothered me a little bit" although he was unconcerned about other slayings he said he committed.

Thomas Steven Wilson pleaded guilty in 7th District Court after an hour-long hearing. He will be sentenced Feb. 21 for kidnapping, rape and first-degree murder in the death of Christine Warnick, 36, Powell, Ohio.

Commission predicts jump in sales revenues

BOISE (AP) — The state Tax Commission Thursday predicted sales and personal income tax revenues in the next budget year will jump a nearly 5 percent, an apparent acknowledgment that Idaho has finally broken free of the devastating recession of the early 1980s.



Tax Policy Administrator Dan John said the healthy increases in the two top taxes for the year that begins next July will be offset by a 13 percent decline in corporate tax receipts. That is due to an expiration of the phase in of quarterly payments by corporate taxpayers, ending a two-year acceleration of receipts.

But he told the Legislature's Joint Revenue Projection Committee that even with that offset, revenues from taxes that finance more than 80 percent of general state spending will be up over \$20 million from the current year, which should end with a surplus of \$25 million, based on estimates given the panel by other state agencies.

Finance Lydia Justice said she told the committee on Wednesday her office would earn over \$14 million on state investments this year, nearly double the amount expected, and more than \$17 million in the new budget year.

Insurance Director Anthony Fajano reported on Thursday the industry he oversees has experienced 6 percent growth and that should mean over \$26 million in premium taxes this year and nearly \$30 million in the new spending year.

Coupled with rough estimates for minor state revenue producers, the figures given to the committee so far indicate state lawmakers could have

about \$736 million in revenues — plus the \$25 million surplus funds — to underwrite state operations in the 1990 budget year.

That available revenue would compare to estimated spending in the current budget year of just under \$700 million once all the state's obligations are financed.

The administration forecast on which Gov. Cecil Andrus will base his new spending blueprint will not be released until after Andrus delivers his budget message to lawmakers next Wednesday.

John's projections followed more generalized forecasts of various industry experts, who told the panel that Idaho's economy will keep expanding during the next two years but more slowly than the explosive growth recorded in 1988.

Those experts predicted employment would continue expanding at rates of 1.6 percent to 2 percent in the coming two years while personal income statewide should rise about 6

percent a year with wages and salaries increasing nearly 4 percent to exceed \$6 billion for the first time.

The Tax Commission said sales tax receipts during the current budget year should be up a dramatic 8.5 percent, the same general estimate made by Idaho Retailers Association Director Tim Brennan, while income tax receipts should rise over a percent.

"Even the bankers are optimistic," said Sen. Ralph Lacy, D-Pocatello, a member of the House-Senate panel. "And when you get one of them to be optimistic, the recovery's got to be here."

The 14-member committee will use the forecasts presented to it this week along with the administration's projection to estimate the amount of revenue the Legislature will have for the 1990 budget, and that estimate will guide the legislative deliberations on spending during the next three months.

Improperly loaded car caused train derailment

SODA SPRINGS (AP) — A 21-car derailment of a Union Pacific freight train in northern Bear Lake County apparently was caused by an improperly loaded hopper car, a railroad spokesman said.

Bogey terrain delayed cleanup efforts, but crews planned to have the southeastern Idaho rail line reopened Thursday afternoon, Union Pacific spokesman Joe Thibodeau said Thursday from Omaha, Neb.

Rail traffic in the area was rerouted south through Ogden, Utah, because of the derailment. It occurred 10 miles southeast of Soda Springs about 1 p.m. Wednesday on a 92-car train en route from Pocatello to North Platte, Neb.

No injuries were reported, but damage was estimated at more than \$500,000.

Thibodeau said a hopper car carrying talc on the eastbound train apparently was loaded too heavily on one end. That caused a wheel to jump the track on a curve.

The train was carrying a variety of freight, including a chemical used to make fertilizer. The chemical did not spill.

Thibodeau said no Amtrak trains or routes were affected by the accident.

Although the cause of the derailment has been identified as an unbalanced car, the train's engineers still will have to undergo drug testing, Thibodeau said.

evaluated Thursday at St. Luke's Regional Medical Center. Cornwall said he probably would remain at the hospital at least until the weekend.




Only active opposition will discourage Idaho racism

I want to answer Higerman's racist public defense of the accusation that racism exists in Higerman.

Racism and prejudices of many kinds exist in all towns and cities. Unless you personally or collectively do something to eradicate it, you are guilty of it.

We lived in Higerman for a year, about 1985. We are an interracial couple with a 13-year-old, who was eight at the time. My husband has a 28-year-old son who lived with us a while. He ran into a lot of racism when he would go to the tavern to shoot pool with a couple of friends.

You might say that it's understandable that he'd run into it at a bar, but let's not forget that those same men in the bar have sons in the school whose fathers are teaching them racism and prejudices.

I don't want my happy, confident daughter to grow up to be a victim of prejudice at such a young age, or any age. But at age eight she might have gone into a state of depression and inferiority. It's not worth taking the chance, so we chose to teach her at home until high school.

Many schools are now teaching what the truth is. Prejudices do exist in our society. These schools teach young people, who are discriminated against, how to deal with it. They also teach all students how to eradicate

it, rather than deny it exists.

I am not talking about people prejudiced toward the black race, but all types, Indians, Mexicans, Iranians, Libyans, Hindus and Muslims and the list goes on and on. How many of you in Higerman are prejudiced toward homosexuals? How many of you would go as far as to beat one up, or not allow an AIDS victim into your school?

This is ignorance, lack of teaching and knowing the facts. It is to be eradicated. Learn the truth about AIDS. Admit the truth about promiscuity and eradicate it wherever it exists.

Sometimes Christian churches need to work on themselves more than anyone. Let me explain. We had a restaurant while in Higerman. The people of the church that our landlord attended patronized our restaurant often.

We had a disagreement with our landlord and 99 percent of the church members suddenly quit coming to the restaurant.

We must not be led so easily by the opinions of others. We need to be strong leaders of the truth among our fellow church members and even our pastors. We should put God first before our own beliefs or those of our

pastor. God will always give us the absolute truth when we're in doubt.

If Higerman and other towns want to be known as non-racist, then work toward making racism to help teachers and students.

Teach that prejudices do actually exist, but can be eradicated. You could work toward inviting varied minorities of all races and creeds to your communities, since many of you came from larger integrated communities.

There are many Mexican people in your communities already. Make sure they are being treated fairly. In our schools, we overlook our students with white history and literature. Shouldn't we be teaching Mexican history, too, so a young Mexican girl can feel good about her ancestry?

Shouldn't we be teaching literature from all the races so our students don't grow up to believe that Shakespeare and Charles Dickens were the greatest literature artists?

We've run into discrimination in every town we've lived in, from Mississippi to Nebraska, from Arizona to Oregon and Washington. We've been turned away from motels and apartments with the lie that they were full or rented.

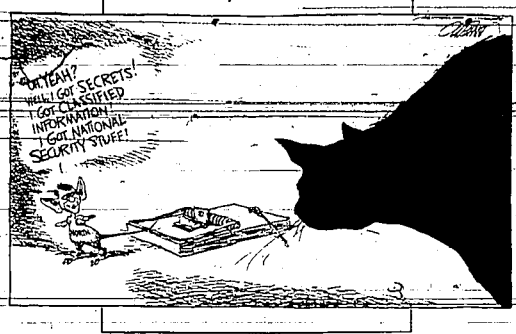
Once when my husband was refused a cook job the way he was informed that the job had been filled, I went in and was given the cook's job.

One of our major complaints, is that when we go out to restaurants to eat, the homes almost always seats us in the farthest corner where we cannot be observed. Yet, we pay the same prices.

We have had numerous problems leasing decent buildings for the purpose of operating a

restaurant. So you see, it's not just in the taverns, or with one lone family. Despite these hardships, we're very glad we chose to live our lives together.

Teacher autonomy is as important as accountability

I wish to offer some thoughts to our Legislators about education as they enter the 50th Legislative session.

The Times-News reports that the buswork this year among legislative circles is "accountability." In other words, legislators and the public wish to see results for their educational dollars.

Enough, but one should not ignore the results that Idaho educators have been producing for years — consistently, faithfully, even as the state commitment to Idaho's public schools has been declining.

If we are going to talk "accountability," we should also talk "autonomy." By autonomy, I mean giving the practitioner — classroom teachers and principals — the time, resources and authority to make grassroots decisions about what is best for kids.

Few contemporary educational reformers

have asked the practitioners about ways to improve education. Instead, the search for a cure for educational ills has been a search for a seagoat. And, guess what, teachers — who have little authority over educational policies or resources — have received the blame.

The reasoning goes like this: teachers lack motivation, so in merit pay or career ladders (teachers' lack skill, so impose Madeline Hunter's "Science of Teaching").

Teachers lack intelligence, so impose high certification standards and competency tests. Too many teachers are deadwood, so attack "tenure" and require stringent evaluations.

In Idaho, state mandates were imposed to

cure perceived educational ills by requiring "more" and "higher," — more required credits, more attendance, higher grades. The result was to help teachers and students achieve "more" and "higher" were generally not forthcoming, however.

The overall effect of "reform" has been top-down and has expanded school bureaucracy, but has not helped learners learn or teachers teach.

Perhaps Theodore Sizer, an influential voice in education, hit the proverbial nail on the head when he wrote, "It is astonishing that so few critics challenge the system. In an absolute sense, the learning exhibited by even a 'successful' student after over twelve thousand hours in classrooms is strikingly limited. When one considers the energy, commitment, and quality of so many of the people working in the schools, one must place

the blame elsewhere. The people are better than the structure. Therefore, the structure must be fixed."

Archiving the structure allows teachers little or no role in designing staff development and inservice programs, setting promotion and retention policies; deciding school budgets, or selecting teachers or administrators.

The new and more promising vision being discussed nationwide in and out of educational circles is less top-down regulation and more decentralization. In his book, A Place Called School: Prospects for the Future, John Goodlad calls for "a genuine decentralization of authority and responsibility to the local school within a framework designed to assure school-to-school equity and a measure of accountability."

Schools must become more self-directing, says Goodlad, arguing that parents, too,

must play a more significant role in decision making.

David Keatts, chairman and chief executive officer of the Aeross Corporation wrote recently, "From a business perspective the education system presents an alarming picture. It is one in which too little is expected of too many, results are sacrificed to bureaucratic convenience, and professionalism — particularly teacher professionalism — is discouraged. The system is not just failing a large number of students — those who drop out or fail to make satisfactory academic progress; it is failing dedicated teachers as well."

The next time you hear the word "accountability," please ask about "autonomy."

Other counties do contribute to CSI

In a recent editorial you addressed the outcome of the CSI Board election and what the future held in store for the board members.

I felt that the majority of what you said had considerable merit, but there is one omission of your editorial, you made a couple of statements that not only rubbed me the wrong way, but appeared to lack a foundation based on fact.

Your statement that "With its outreach centers and programs, CSI clearly serves a valley-wide community. At this point, in effect, the other counties in the valley are free-loading on Twin Falls and Jerome taxpayers."

Speaking not only as a resident of one of those "other counties," but also as the County Clerk that handles the voter paymaster for CSI, it is an exception to the exaggerated misconception portrayed by your term — "free-loading."

Last year, 1987-88, the billings to just Minidoka County totaled over \$107,000. That is hardly what I would call "free-loading," and I would expect the other five counties also paid their share of tuition to CSI.

The tuition amount paid by the county attempts to equalize the amount paid by the out-of-district student with the tuition paid by a Twin Falls resident. And it is true that some of the in-district students are also taxpayers which means that they are paying an additional amount toward the support of the college.

The present involvement of the state to protect the beans from being confiscated is proper. For the state, lawyers, at the Direct Security Bank, to assume control of the selling of the beans, will only dilute the net income received by the growers.

I propose that all growers, faced with the price of the beans since they will bring the same price, and probably none of the beans in the warehouse positively identifiable as our own, and receive a pro-rata share of the remaining beans, or funds received, with seed beans paid extra.

There have been competitive offers from several dealers to handle the selling of the beans. Let our beans be handled by the most desirable dealer at the lowest cost to the growers. I suggest that the state act only as a watchdog, verifying the ownership, and dispersal of the funds on a fair basis, without any charges passed onto the growers.

I further suggest that as a good will gesture the Hawkins creditors and bankers endorse this plan and allow beans to be processed, without delay.

To follow the present course, growers will be eaten alive with bureaucratic dealing and lawyer fees. The above could be handled without further erosion of value and the beans processed during this high price season.

U.S. banks still face losses to Third World

WASHINGTON (AP) — Although loans to Third World countries won't cause U.S. banks to fail, the banks will still need to absorb billions of dollars in losses, the House Banking Committee was told Thursday.

The major money center banks responsible for 85 percent of the outstanding loans to the six biggest Third World borrowers should double the reserves they set aside to cover their exposure, said Kenneth Pinkes, a vice-president of Moody's credit rating service.

The debtor countries, which have borne a significant share of adjustment costs, appear less willing to continue the rescheduling process, Pinkes said.

"More importantly," he said, "as the possibility of a major financial crisis appears less likely, the priority of the U.S. government seems to have shifted from the need to help the major money center banks to the need to maintain political stability in Latin America."

The major banks, which saw their credit rating plummet after the Third World debt crisis appeared in 1982, have set aside reserves equal to about 25 percent of their exposure to cover losses on the loans in the past two years.

But they haven't written the loans off and are still trying to collect in-

terest or swap them for equity shares in companies in the lesser developed countries.

Prices in the secondary market and the magnitude of the single-risk exposures suggest a reserve level of at least 50 percent, Pinkes said. "If the loans are only worth 40 cents on the dollar, ultimately the accounting is going to have to catch up with that."

Federal banking regulators acknowledged the exposure of the nine money center banks is still too large, but said they no longer face the danger of failing if the borrowers default.

L. William Seidman, chairman of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp., said most of the regional banks have put the LDC (Less Developed Countries) debt problem behind them.

Manuel H. Johnson, vice chairman of the Federal Reserve Board, said U.S. bank exposure to the 15 major Third World debtors declined by \$8.6 billion between July 1987 and the same month last year to \$16 billion.

Meanwhile, the debt servicing capacity of the six largest borrowers — Argentina, Brazil, Chile, Mexico, the Philippines and Venezuela — well exceeds the 40 percent value the secondary market is now putting on the loans, Seidman said.

Carlucci approves base closing plan

WASHINGTON (AP) — Defense Secretary Frank C. Carlucci approved a plan Thursday to close dozens of military bases around the country, calling it a "unique opportunity" to save money and saying it was endorsed by military leaders.

"We just have to move ahead and do this," Carlucci said. "We have not closed a base since 1978. And I think that fact speaks for itself. We need to step up to the plate here."

Carlucci appeared at a special Pentagon briefing to announce he had approved the recommendations of a government commission, created by Congress last year, that selected individual bases for closure.

Almost three dozen would be closed outright, and more than 100 others would be affected in some way.

Cranston wants check on charges

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Senate chairman on Thursday asked President-elect Bush to direct the FBI to investigate a newspaper's allegations that a Bush Cabinet nominee served in a GOP unit "ridicled" by former Nazi collaborators.

A California paper, the Oakland Tribune, raised questions in an editorial Dec. 28 about Edward Derwinski, Bush's choice to be the first head of the newly created Department of Veterans Affairs.

Through a spokesman, Derwinski said the charges amounted to "guilt by association."

Sen. Alan Cranston, D-Calif., who will preside over the Senate Veterans Affairs Committee's confirmation hearings on Derwinski's nomination, asked Bush in a letter to direct the FBI to look into the editorial charges in the course of "its customary background investigation."

Revenge attempt cause of '87 crash

WASHINGTON (AP) — The National Transportation Safety Board ruled in a final report Thursday that the 1987 crash of a Pacific Southwest Airlines jet was caused by a gunman seeking revenge on a former supervisor.

PSA Flight 1771 crashed Dec. 7, 1987, about 175 miles northwest of Los Angeles, killing all 43 people aboard including a former USAir.com. employee who apparently had opened fire with a revolver during the flight.

The safety board said a note written by the man, David Burke, threatened his former supervisor, who also was aboard the flight. The note was found in the wreckage as were the revolver and six spent cartridges.

Accused claim U.S. conducting war

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. (AP) — Six men accused of funneling mercenaries and supplies to the Contra rebels argued before a judge Thursday they are innocent of Neutrality Act charges because the United States was waging war with Nicaragua.

U.S. District Judge Norman Roettger, who also heard testimony on the so-called "at peace" issue Dec. 2 as part of a defense motion to dismiss the indictment, said he expected to decide the matter within days.

Thursday's first defense witness was former top CIA analyst David MacMichael, who testified that during his 1981-83 tenure the agency organized and directed the Contras against Nicaragua's leftist Sandinista government.

"I would say they (the CIA) had a military mission," MacMichael said. "Not only combat, but support, supplies, transportation."

French TV journalists to face court

NEW YORK (AP) — Two French television journalists charged with trying to ship fake bombs to Paris to test Kennedy International Airport's security will be prosecuted, a federal official said Thursday.

U.S. Attorney Andrew Maloney vowed to prosecute Alain Chailou and Bruce Frankel, who are employed in New York by the French television station TF1.

Chailou, the station's New York bureau chief, and Frankel, a producer, were charged with "willfully and maliciously" conspiring to violate the federal Air Safety Act. The charge carries a maximum five-year sentence upon conviction.

Whale-rescue honors passed out

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan's commerce secretary and the Soviet ambassador spoke glowingly of cooperation between the two nations Thursday as honors were handed out to people who helped in the whale rescue off the coast of Alaska last October.

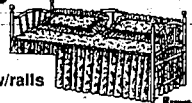

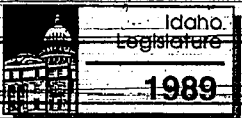
School consolidation may become Legislature issue

TWIN FALLS — If the Meridian School District were to divide itself into 23 smaller districts — each still larger than the Castleford or Hansen school districts — taxpayers theoretically would reward it with an extra \$2.9 million a year.

“We’re about ready to go to the state Board of Education and deconsolidate,” said Meridian Superintendent Norman Hallett.

Hallett, whose Boise-area district has about 13,000 students, spearheaded a school funding report done by a coalition of 18 large districts, including Twin Falls. While the report has not been made public yet, the message is apparent: Administrators of large



schools will be asking the state whether small school districts are justified in spending more money per student.

That report is one argument that school consolidation or some reworking of the state funding formula — making it less favorable to small schools — may be an issue in the 1989 Legislature.

Another sign is the legislative report of the state Department of Education’s finance ad-

Twin Falls superintendent advisory committee. It recommends that high schools with fewer than a state-set minimum number of students justify their existence as remote and necessary or lose state funding.

“And a third is the interest shown by last year’s Legislature. Both the House and the Senate passed consolidation planning measures, although neither bill made it through

the opposite chamber. State Superintendent Jerry Evans responded by appointing a committee to study consolidation proposals, should the Legislature want them this year.”

At the heart of the consolidation debate is a state law that assumes it costs more to educate a child at a small school than a large school.

Consequently, while Twin Falls had \$1,585 to spend per child last year, Castleford had \$2,315, based on state Department of Education figures. “I’m more concerned about equitable funding than consolidation,” said Twin Falls School District Superintendent Carl Snow. “But that’s one way to get it.”

The thinking of the finance committee was similar.

“What the finance committee said was

“since we know small schools cost more, let’s have closer scrutiny,” said Department of Education spokeswoman Emily Hight. “The finance committee is not trying to shove this down their throat.”

Elementary schools are already required to have 10 students or prove they are remote and necessary, and all four of the schools that small in the state successfully applied for re-mo status this year and were funded.

The committee is proposing the same rule for secondary education, but requiring that high schools have at least 60 students enrolled, and combined junior-highs and high schools have at least 80 schools to escape scrutiny.

However, Superintendent of Public Education

TV show to look at creationism

TWIN FALLS — Two 10-minute segments featuring the local origins of the controversy will be part of a public television documentary next month.

The “Nova” program, which is scheduled to appear on or around Feb. 21, looks at the legal history of the creationism controversy and asks scholars and teachers where they think “it will now go next,” said Thomas Lucas, the episode’s co-producer.

One Twin Falls segment will appear at the beginning of the show, the other near the end.

“My sense is that it contains some very interesting ideas, and that it will be both entertaining and provocative,” he said.

“Nova” is a regular Public Broadcasting System program that focuses on science-related issues. Lucas and his partner contract to do documentaries for the show.

The crew came to Twin Falls in May of 1988. It shot footage including scenes of Phil Garrish, the Vera G. O’Leary Junior High School science teacher who sparked the local controversy, during a class field trip to the Craters of the Moon National Monument.

County officials scramble for space in jail

TWIN FALLS — It’s an unusual phenomenon for Twin Falls County people trying to get into jail. Not your typical jailbirds either, but respectable, even outstanding citizens such as Sheriff Jim Munn.

With the thieves and drunken drivers expected to move into the county’s new jail by early February, and with recent office space a rare commodity in county buildings, an interdepartmental scramble for the old jail space on the courthouse’s fourth floor is on.

“We desperately need a training room, a locker room and an arms storage room,” said Sheriff Jim Munn, one of several would-be tenants.

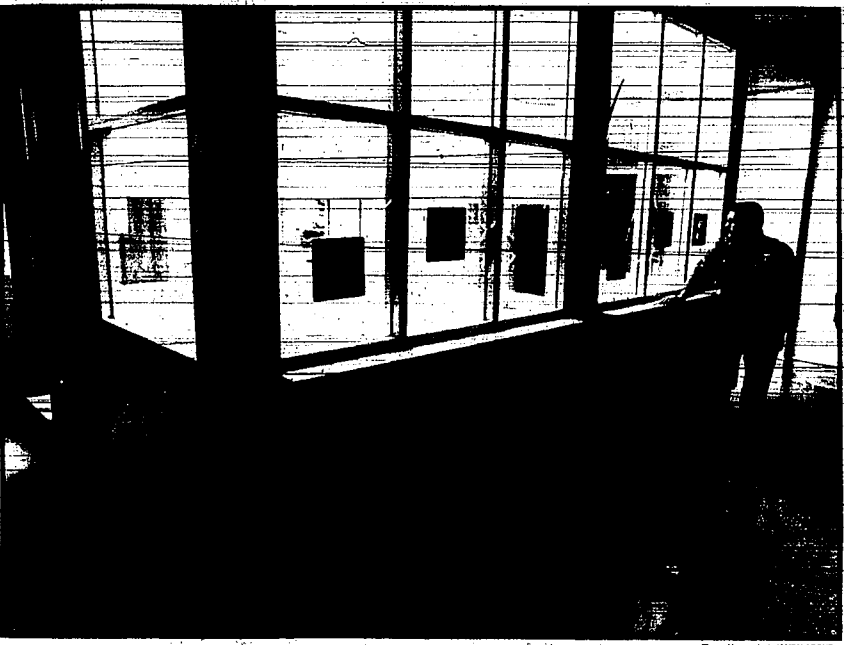
“To get the rooms, Munn will have to compete with judges, attorneys, historians and other county officials jammed into tiny rooms throughout the county’s small empire.

“We have some staff crammed into the clerk’s office,” said Judge Daniel Hurlbutt, 5th District Court trial administrator. “I’m willing to sit down with county commissioners and discuss any space opening.”

It has been two years since he has discussed the issue with commissioners of a judicial committee, Hurlbutt said.

He said it is unlikely the court clerk’s office would benefit by moving from the judicial annex to the courthouse next door, because clerks move in and out of courtrooms several times a day. But department spaces being used for different functions in the judicial annex could be moved to the courthouse, freeing space for the clerk’s office.

Commissioner study Felton said the law library in the annex is squeezed into a room that leaves little research space. Putting the books in cells and putting research desks in other cells would require extensive remodeling, which commissioners want to avoid, Felton said.

“We talked about giving part of the area to the Historic Preservation Commission and the Historical Society,” she said. “They don’t have any space of their own.”

Russ Lively, chairman of the Twin Falls County Historic Preservation Commission, said the group has

valuable maps, historical documents and survey information strewn all over the county at commission member’s homes and businesses.

“We don’t really have a home for the commission,” Lively said. “If we had the little boy’s cell in the corner

we’d be OK.”

“No remodeling would be necessary, he said.

“All this information belongs to the county people,” Lively said. “It’s important that it be made available to them.”

Munn said sheriff’s department

Deadline set for canal companies to accept license

TWIN FALLS — Local canal companies have until Jan. 14 to decide whether to accept conditions of a federal license for the Miller Dam hydroelectric project, a canal company executive said Thursday.

Jack Eakin, manager of the Twin Falls Canal Co., said company officials are studying the 68-page document to make sure its various provisions are acceptable.

“We have to feel entirely comfortable with it,” he said.

The Twin Falls Canal Co. and

Northeast Canal Co. have been trying since 1984 to win approval for building a hydroelectric generating plant to help pay for rehabilitating the dam, situated on the Snake River east of Murtaugh.

Safety studies indicate the 85-year-old dam is vulnerable to earthquake damage, but canal officials have been reluctant to lay rehabilitation costs at the feet of local irrigators. Sales of hydro power to Idaho Power Co. would relieve that burden.

Eakin, in a speech to the Twin Falls Kiwanis Club and an interview afterward, said if the companies don’t appeal by Jan. 14, the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission will consider it accepted, he said.

He declined to say what conditions in the license might lead to an appeal. He stressed that canal officials are taking pains with reviewing the document because of its many provisions and its long-term importance.

“You have to live with that for 80 years,” Eakin said.

Assuming no appeal is filed, the project to upgrade and strengthen the dam will begin this fall and be finished by spring of 1991, Eakin said.

Although the canal companies already have signed a “letter of intent” to sell Idaho Power the electricity from the proposed project, they are negotiating a more detailed agreement, he said.

Residents in Mini-Cassia work to establish area rescue mission

BURLEY — Some Mini-Cassia residents want to establish the area’s first rescue mission.

The Rev. Vince Frank of Paul and Bill Williams, a Rupert optometrist, and others are interested in providing a mission offering food, clothing, shelter and spiritual counseling for homeless people, transients, alcoholics and anyone else needing temporary shelter.

The group hopes to lease a building at the corner of Main and Overland, diagonally across from the Burley Theatre, but needs a fire code variance from the City Council.

Council members decided Tuesday to delay a decision after City Attorney Bill Parsons said he hadn’t had time to adequately review the laws concerning the type of variance requested, although members indicated support for the project and arranged to meet Williams at the building on Monday morning for a tour.

The variance is necessary because the building has a mezzanine floor with a ceiling six inches lower than the minimum fire code requirement.

Williams told the council the mission would be operated by the Paul Congregational Church, the Burley Episcopal Church, the Burley Episcopal Church and other interested citizens.

The only similar service in the area is Burley’s Lighthouse of Love Fellowship, which offers evening meals seven days a week and rooms occasionally.

The rescue mission would have six to eight apartments already on the second floor of the building for families needing shelter, a dorm room in the main floor for single men, a kitchen and chapel area.

Interdenominational spiritual offerings would be a vital part of the mission, Williams said Wednesday. “We’ll be involved in providing food,

clothing and shelter but we want to provide for their spiritual needs too,” Williams said.

The Mini-Cassia area has a number of church groups and individuals that could band together to help the rescue mission be successful, Williams said. “We’d like to be a cooperative effort of not necessarily one group but of all the people interested,” Williams said.

Pastor Eddie Madden of the Lighthouse of Love Fellowship, who said his facility struggles to offer just meals, despite help from a few church groups, likes the idea and wants to help. “A joint effort like that would take all the burden off,” he said. “We’ve always desired to see that.”

Madden said his facility served 15,000 evening meals last year. “There’s really a need for that mission in this town,” he said. “There are many people who come through here that all they have is a pack on their back and they’re sleeping outside.”

Council members looked over drawings of how the building would be used. The sponsors would install all other equipment required by the fire code, including firewalls, fire alarms and extinguishers, Williams said.

If the council approves the variance, Williams said the group hopes to lease the building. “I’ll see if we find out whether we’re going to be successful, whether the Lord wants us to stay in this endeavor.”

Plans are to file for non-profit status, form a board of directors and begin soliciting support funds. The group wants to avoid government funds because of the strings usually attached, Williams said.

Williams told the council the group plans to check with the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare about requirements for operating a kitchen but wants the variance issue resolved first.

Other council business, Parsons recommended the council reject a claim by Walton’s Underground Systems for payment on the 16th Street project. There has been some question as to whether the work was done correctly and Parsons also found mathematical errors totalling \$3,500 on the claim. The council rejected the

Engineer questions cancer rate claims by anti-nuclear activist

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — National cancer-surveys contradict claims by an anti-nuclear activist that cancer rates are higher among neighbors of the Idaho-National Engineering Laboratory, says an engineer at the U.S. Department of Energy site.

And the questionable methods used by Boise State University sociologist Michael Blain in his 1984 paper comparing cancer rates in Idaho to surrounding states, Blain said, "are essentially invalid."

Blain's study said that 11 cancer deaths were reported between 1950 and 1980 in the county, when only 4.8 should have been expected.

Brown said even a valid statistical study could show an elevated cancer rate in such a sparsely populated county, since the background level of cancer is higher. Clark County's current official population is 700.

But Brown said Blain and his colleague, Dr. Carl Johnson, miscalculated their figures and changed

mathematical methods in a way that skewed the results even more. A closer look at the reported Clark County cancer deaths makes Blain's conclusion between the cancer and the INEL even more questionable, he said.

One case of stomach cancer reported was in 1954 in a 73-year-old woman. Because of the long latency period between radiation exposure and cancer, Blain could not connect a link, Brown said.

Two of the three brain cancers Blain used were in 3- and 4-year-old girls in 1950 and 1951, before radiation releases from the INEL.

Blain's study said stomach and intestinal cancer rates were elevated. But Brown said had these been higher than normal because of radiation, leukemia and breast cancer rates, they usually are the most common types of cancer resulting from radiation exposure.

Crawford is wanted in Garden City of #1989 gun theft warrant, Sheriff's records show.

2,000 lose power temporarily in 2 separate incidents

TWIN FALLS — Almost 2,000 customers temporarily lost their power Thursday evening when power lines fell or slapped together, Idaho Power Co. officials said.

Two separate power outages occurred around 7:30 p.m., said Dile Monson, Idaho Power electrical superintendent.

Approximately 1,400 customers in Kimberly and eastern Twin Falls lost their power for between six and 11 minutes when wind slapped two power lines together, Monson said. Earlier, a downed line knocked out power to approximately 500 customers for at least 43 minutes.

Change in contractors at nuclear plant 'aggravates' long delay, officials say

AIKEN, S.C. (AP) — The change in contractors at the Savannah River Plant is "aggravating" the already long delay in restarting the plant's nuclear reactors, according to a Department of Energy official.

"The engineering continuity is being lost as the Du Pont Co. prepares to turn over operations at SRP on April 1 to Westinghouse Savannah River Co., said Richard W. Starostek, the DOE's deputy assistant secretary for safety, health and quality assurance.

"There's a lot of turmoil that is natural when you have a change in management," Starostek told the Aiken Standard. The sprawling facility near Aiken produces tritium for nuclear bombs.

Meanwhile, DOE officials also said Wednesday they expect Congress to approve the plant's \$3.6 billion cost to \$300 million toward building the

new military production reactors. The request is the first by the DOE's New Production Reactor office, and is part of a proposed \$6.6 billion project to build reactors at SRP and the Idaho-National Engineering Laboratory.

The DOE would rely primarily on the SRP reactor to supply perishable tritium gas for U.S. nuclear weapons in the next century. The smaller Idaho reactor would serve as backup.

Ronald W. Cochran, acting director of the NPRE office, said he is confident Congress will approve the funding.

"I don't think the funding this year will be a major issue," he said. "The total cost of the project is going to be the real issue."

er NPRE is expected to start in 1991 or 1992, providing thousands of construction and engineering jobs for the Aiken area.

Cochran said the defense officials are concerned about current delays at SRP because of the plant's major role in the military project.

The DOE's Starostek, who previously helped oversee commercial nuclear power for some 12 years as a member of the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission, said that only aggressive, clearly defined management that deal with equipment problems that inevitably develop with all nuclear reactors.

While praising Westinghouse's qualifications, he said he is frustrated with how long it's taking to complete earthquake-resistance improvements and other work at SRP's contractors.

Legislator to introduce bill to give college status to technical school

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — An eastern Idaho legislator says he will introduce a bill in the 1989 Legislature to give college status to the Eastern Idaho Vocational-Technical School.

Rep. John Sessions, R-Driggs, said Wednesday that his proposal would allow the Idaho Falls school to apply for more private grants and would enhance the local economy.

"There's a lot of benefits to be a college, rather than just a school," he said.

Sessions' bill would change the name of the 19-year-old school to Eastern Idaho Technical College. The name change is the recommendation of the EIVTS advisory council, which endorsed the change at its Dec. 12 meeting. Sessions is a member of the council.

While the school would be renamed, the bill would not change its role, Sessions said.

The law that created EIVTS in

1969 established it as a post-secondary vocational school that offers vocational and technical training courses authorized by the state Board of Education.

The board in recent years has broadened training at EIVTS to include two-year associate degree programs. EIVTS now offers 12 associate degree programs in fields such as child care, word processing and automotive mechanics.

EIVTS director John Christoffersen said his only concern with Sessions' legislation would be if the school's mission is changed as a result.

"I'm really pretty comfortable with what we do," Christoffersen said. "If the name is changed, I hope the implications it brings with it is not that the mission is expanded to any great extent."

Members of EIVTS advisory council have discussed a name change for

several years, but only when Idaho Falls Mayor Tom Campbell broached the idea in April did the proposal begin building momentum.

Campbell said Wednesday he still supports a name change. EIVTS as a college would reflect better on Idaho Falls and attract more business and industry, he said.

"Every industry that looks at Idaho Falls wants to know what educational opportunities we have here and the possibilities of a trained workforce, he said. "They want employees trained in a vocational establishment so they can work in their companies and the better quality establishment there is and the better image it has, the better attractiveness there is to industry."

Sessions said he plans to meet with eastern Idaho legislators during the early weeks of the 1989 Legislature to drum up support for the initiative.

City may move ahead with display plans

POCATELLO (AP) — Pocatello's Fort Hall Replica Commission has urged the city to move ahead as quickly as possible with plans to acquire a small Wyoming tourist village for display in upper Ross Park.

"There's no way the city, the Bancock County Historical Society and other groups can do this on their own," said Howard Tuttle, chairman of the citizens' committee.

Last month, members of the Bancock County Centennial Commission unveiled plans to purchase the so-called western town, including 23 wooden structures, for about

\$16,000. It was built by an Evanston, Wyo., businessman in the late 1970s. It was built by a member of the Fort Hall Replica Commission.

"Despite what some may have heard, this is not a miniature village," she said. "The buildings are full-sized and finished on the inside."

The entire village covers about an acre. The 10-by-16-foot wooden structures were built on skids and electrically wired. The buildings include replicas of a saloon, sheriff's office, lively stable and dance hall.

Ms. Dilweg said the buildings

could be rented to vendors to sell crafts and other merchandise in Ross Park, which is the site of the Fort Hall Replica and the proposed site of the new Bancock County Historical Museum.

However, purchasing and moving the buildings to Pocatello hinges on whether the centennial commission approves a \$25,000 donation from a local business, Ms. Dilweg said.

The deal also depends on Mayor Dick Finlayson and the Pocatello City Council giving permission to locate the buildings in Ross Park.

ment or restroom.

"We do not have any space for storage, lockers and training in the building whatsoever," he said.

Edton said commissioners could use part of the \$50,000 maintenance fund and part of the \$65,000 capital outlay fund for remodeling the roughly 3,500 square feet on the fourth floor.

To improve the building's appearance, Edton said commissioners will see whether they can take down the unsightly fire escape from outside the fourth floor to the ground and punch out a section of the floor to restore visible access on the third floor to the building's skylight.

AIKEN, S.C. (AP) — The change in contractors at the Savannah River Plant is "aggravating" the already long delay in restarting the plant's nuclear reactors, according to a Department of Energy official.

The engineering community is being misled by the Dept. of Energy's attempt to turn over operations of SRP on April 1 to Westinghouse Savannah River Co., said Richard W. Starostek, the DOE's deputy assistant secretary for safety, health and quality assurance.

Meanwhile, DOE officials also said Wednesday they expect Congress to approve their planned request for up to \$300 million toward building the

Idaho Environmental Council. "On a qualitative basis, no qualified researcher, and certainly not the National Cancer Institute, would say there is a cancer problem," he said.

Legislator to introduce bill to give college status to technical school

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — An eastern Idaho legislator says he will introduce a bill in the 1990 Legislature to give college status to the Eastern Idaho Vocational-Technical School.

Rep. John Sessions, R-Driggs, said Wednesday that his proposal would allow the Idaho Falls school to apply for more private grants and would enhance the local economy.

"There's a lot of benefits to be a college, rather than just a school," he said.

Sections of the bill would change the name of the 19-year-old school to Eastern Idaho Technical College. The name follows the recommendation of the EVITS advisory council, which endorsed the change at its Dec. 12 meeting. Sessions is a member of the council.

While the school would be renamed, the bill would not change its role. Sessions said.

1969 established it as a post-secondary vocational school that offers vocational and technical training courses authorized by the state Board of Education.

The board in recent years has broadened training at EVITS to include two-year associate degree programs. EVITS now offers 12 associate degree programs in fields such as child care, word processing and auto electrical mechanics.

EVITS Director John Christoffersen said his only concern with Sessions' legislation would be if the school's mission is changed as a result.

"I'm really pretty comfortable with what we do," Christoffersen said. "If the name is changed, I hope the implications it brings with it is not that the mission is expanded to any great extent."

Members of EVITS advisory council have discussed a name change for

several years, but only when Idaho Falls Mayor Tom Campbell broached the idea in April did the proposal begin building momentum.

Campbell said Wednesday he still supports a name change. EVITS as a college would reflect better on Idaho Falls and attract more business and industry, he said.

"Every industry that looks at Idaho Falls wants to know what educational opportunities we have here and the possibilities of a trained workforce," he said. "They want employees trained in a vocational establishment so they can work in their company, and the better quality establishment there is and the better image it has, the better attractiveness there is to industry."

Sessions said he plans to meet with eastern Idaho legislators during the early weeks of the 1990 Legislature to drum up support for the initiative.

City may move ahead with display plans

POCATELLO (AP) — Pocatello's Port Hall Replica Commission has urged the city to move ahead as quickly as possible with plans to acquire a small Wyoming town village for display in upper Ross Park.

"There's no way the city, the Banrock County Historical Society and others can lose a deal like this," said Howard Dutton, chairman of the citizens' committee.

Last month, members of the Banrock County Centennial Commission unveiled plans to purchase the scaled-down western town, including 23 wooden structures, for about

\$16,000. It was built by an Evanston, Wyo., businessman in the late 1890s.

Joan Dilweg, a member of the Port Hall Replica Commission, said she has heard this is not a miniature village, she said. "The buildings are full-sized and finished on the inside."

The entire village covers about an acre. The 10-by-16-foot wooden structures were built on skids and electrically wired. The buildings include replicas of a saloon, sheriff's office, stable and a hotel.

Ms. Dilweg said the buildings could be rented to vendors to sell crafts and other merchandise in Ross Park, which is the site of the Port Hall Replica and the proposed site of the new Banrock County Historical Museum.

However, purchasing and moving the buildings to Pocatello hinges on whether the centennial commission receives a \$25,000 donation from a local business, Ms. Dilweg said.

The deal also depends on Mayor Dick Finlayson and the Pocatello City Council giving permission to locate the buildings in Ross Park.

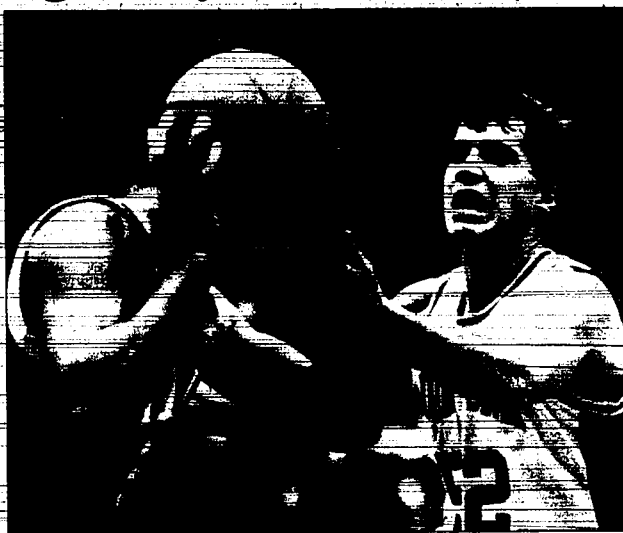

U.S., Israel reportedly training attack forces

LONDON — The United States and Israel are training a force of Libyan dissidents to overthrow Col. Muammar Qadhafi, it was reported Thursday.

The operation is well-advanced and is already putting pressure on Libyan and pro-Tripoli groups operating out of Sudan's lawless western region of Darfur, where fighting has broken out in recent days, the respected newsletter Africa Confidential reported.

The substantial Contra force of Libyans has been trained in Chad, Cameroon, Gabon, the Central African Republic and the United States, it said.

The London-based newsletter on African affairs, published every two weeks, gave no attribution for the detailed report, which was printed before U.S. F-14 fighters shot down

two Libyan MiG-23s over the Mediterranean on Wednesday.

The report did not detail how the force planned to overthrow Qadhafi, but said it was operating under the command of the National Front for the Salvation of Libya, which is committed to ousting the Libyan leader.

Led by Col. Abdoulgassim Khalifa Haftar, the front's main force is based at Ouadi-Doum in northern Chad, a stronghold of Libyan troops until the Chadian army ousted them in 1987, it said.

The force has millions of dollars in Libyan equipment captured by the Chadian army and controlled by the U.S. Central Intelligence Agency, the newsletter said.

A Lebanese trader in Douala, Cameroon, said he organized the purchase and supply of hardware, it said.

Pentagon releases video tape of U.S.-Libyan dogfight

WASHINGTON — A Navy cockpit tape shows a confrontation between U.S. and Libyan jet fighters of fierce only flashes of video images but provides in audio the drama of American aviators being unexpectedly caught up in combat.

The tape, released late Thursday at the Pentagon, also supports the assertions of administration officials that the two Navy F-14s repeatedly tried to maneuver away from two chasing Libyan MiG-23s, the pilot of the lead F-14 can be heard counting each time he tries to head away, only to have the "bogies jink back into us."

Although the quality is not good, the tape concludes with a dramatic rush of pictures at the end of the dogfight — when the last Libyan MiG is suddenly within visual range.



This picture, taken from a U.S. F-14, shows a Libyan fighter with missiles under the wings.

The tape shows the F-14 struggling to line up in a firing position behind the MiG-23, finally succeeding in getting a tone alert for his Sidewinder missile that allows him to fire.

Pentagon officials, after unveiling the cockpit tape, announced they were also releasing a still picture taken from the video tape to "prove the Libyan MiG-23 Flogger jets were armed," Lt. Jim Wood, a Navy spokesman, said.

U.S. jets followed guidelines

WASHINGTON — The American F-14s that shot down two Libyan MiG-23 fighters were operating under guidelines that say U.S. forces can open fire only when threatened, administration officials said.

Defense Secretary Frank Carlucci, discussing the incident with reporters Wednesday, said the F-14s from the aircraft carrier USS John F. Kennedy, fired in self-defense and were operating under "normal peace-time rules of engagement."

"Such rules are never publicly disclosed, except in general terms."

They were the subject of controversy after an Iraqi jet fired at the USS Stark in the Persian Gulf May 17, 1987, killing 37 U.S. sailors, and after the USS Vincennes shot down an Iranian commercial airliner last July 3, killing 290 passengers and crewmembers.

For forces in the Persian Gulf, the rules were tightened after the Stark started to give commanders in the field "more freedom to exercise com-

mand authority" and decide when to fire, said Lt. Jim Wood, a Navy spokesman.

But the ships ad planes accompanying the Kennedy were operating under more or less the same rules as they would have been before the Stark or Vincennes incident, said Wood.

"There is a basic premise that the officer in charge must defend his ship at all cost," Wood said.

"In wartime, that means that anything not identified as a friend is an enemy. In peacetime, anything that is not identified as an enemy is a friend," he said.

The peacetime rules of engagement enable our forces to adequately defend themselves when there is danger of hostility.

The judgment of when to fire, he said, is left to the judgment of the on-scene commanders, "in this case the pilot of the lead F-14."

"If you are a pilot leading a flight of aircraft and felt there was imminent danger of being attacked, you don't need to wait to be fired on," said Wood.

African dance comes to Twin Falls

The Children's Theatre Company of Minneapolis, the 17th largest professional theater company in the country, will make its first appearance in Twin Falls Saturday night with a performance of crackling fire, pulsing drums and dances whose bosom from behind mysterious masks.

"This is the first time many of the people of Twin Falls have been given the opportunity to see this kind of performance," says Ruby Petersen, College of Southern Idaho course developer. Saturday's performance, in CSI's Fine Arts Auditorium, is sponsored by the college's continuing education department in cooperation with the Magic Valley Arts Council and KMTV.

The Children's Theatre Company, which actually features adult dancers, performs before an annual audience of more than 250,000 people in a multi-million dollar Minneapolis complex that was custom designed and built for the company in 1974.

In Twin Falls, the company will perform "Rumpelstiltskin and Kaluli: Two African Tales," adapted by Timothy Mason and directed by

Richard D. Thorson. These two parables about greed are woven into one original work and will be told through African dance and music, along with the ancient African language of Swahili (interpreted by a narrator).

Petersen says the stories are designed to enthrall young audiences with brilliantly costumed, essential creatures and easy-to-follow storylines. Older children and teens will enjoy the beat and vigor of the African dance and the humorous character development, she adds, and adults will appreciate the affirmation of basic human values.

"Rumpelstiltskin, a familiar German fairytale, is the story of a magical little man who helps to save a young woman's life by spinning straw into gold. But he eventually demands great ransom from her.

"Kaluli, a lesser known parable, finds its origins in the Shona people of Africa. It's the story of a swaggering rabbit who tries to bray and bully his way through life.

Petersen says music for the performance will be percussive in style, complete with five differently pitched log drums and marimbas. Bells strapped to the performers' ankles will also punctuate the music.

Juanita Brooks had courage to battle church leadership

Book tells story of Mormon historian

TWIN FALLS — Because of Juanita Brooks, the collective Mormon mind may be more liberal and more at peace than it might otherwise be. That's the claim the author makes for his biography of the woman historian who forced the LDS Church leadership to admit its part in the controversial Mountain Meadow massacre.

This event, which Brooks believed had long been a blot on her church's history, occurred in southern Utah where about 100 emigrants on route to California were slaughtered by white men and Indians in September 1857.

The Brooks biography is not the easiest reading, but Peterson, an English professor at Ogden's Weber State College, basically succeeds in showing how Brooks' efforts forced church leaders to come to terms with long suppressed facts. He also demonstrates how Brooks offers support to loyal Mormons who disagreed with official thinking on other matters.

Descriptions of Brooks' professional efforts in researching pioneer diaries and publishing her many books are intertwined with often-mundane details of her domestic life. The many references to endless friends and relatives are sometimes confusing and irrelevant to the reader. But this chaotic combination of narrative, her extended family and friends, while determined pecking on her typewriter was exactly how Juanita Brooks lived.

It would have been difficult for Brooks' biographer to separate her private and increasingly public life, since the biography is based primarily on family diaries and a wealth of private letters to family and colleagues.

The impressive thing about Brooks is that despite her sheltered background and many years of mothering a large family, she was nevertheless able to carve out an impressive career.

In addition to her many published historical articles and books, Brooks was a sought-after guest speaker throughout Utah and also served on the State Historical Society's Board of Control.

Although never officially ex-communicated by the church hierarchy, Brooks was ostracized by many church members, and even some of her siblings, for her forthrightness and courage in writing "The Mountain Meadow Massacre." That book, finally published in November 1950

by Stanford University Press after being rejected by several other firms, is extraordinary, Peterson says.

"The style is simple and muted, as if she had been loath to express her terrifying message... Yet her book is extraordinary because with utter integrity it gave shape to an electrifying drama. It was more than history; it was tragedy."

Peterson also writes that the undepicted details of the long-hushed-over massacre are that the

grants alone, arrived too late.

John D. Lee, who was not present at the original meeting of the high council, was sent to direct the Indians, who besieged the train for several days while Mormon militia gathered nearby.

On Sept. 11, 1857, Lee reportedly bore the emigrants from their fortification with a promise of safe conduct to Cedar City. After they had surrendered their arms and marched clear of their wagons, it is said that Mormon militiamen shot the men while Indians slaughtered women and older children.

The only survivors were 17 small children considered too young to kill tales, Peterson writes.

Brooks included contradictory accusations over who gave the fatal order from witnesses whose scattered accounts she had gathered.

She took no sides in this dispute but insists, despite the participation of Indians, that "the final responsibility must rest squarely upon the Mormons, William H. Dame as commander, and those under him."

Although she cleared Brigham Young of ordering the slaughter, she accused him of complicity in sheltering the participants for many years. She also blamed him for the eventual scapegoating of Lee.

Lee was exiled to barren wasteland, excommunicated from the church without a hearing and finally executed after a second trial.

The historian evokes sympathy for Lee in her best-known book, pleading his generosity to his neighbors and service to his church.

She saw the massacre not only as a tragedy for the victims, but also for the perpetrator and his admirer men who perpetrated it.

Brooks received much moral and financial support for producing "Mountain Meadow Massacre" from descendants of John D. Lee who were anxious to clear their patriarch's name.

The book was widely acclaimed in reviews in the San Francisco Examiner, the Oregonian in Portland and the New York Herald Tribune Book Review.

Although Brooks concentrated on Utah history, she had brief contacts with Idaho, including extended negotiations with Myrtle Friedman, Halley, over writing a history of Jews in Idaho. After much contention, Brooks finally withdrew from that project.

The Mormon woman historian, whose courage stands in telling the truth about the Mountain Meadow massacre brought her national acclaim, is still alive.

Now age 91, Brooks is in a nursing home and no longer coherent, according to Leonard Arrington, former Twin Falls resident, now a well-known historian in Utah.

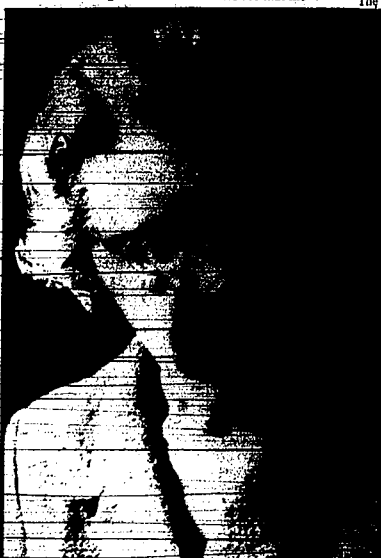


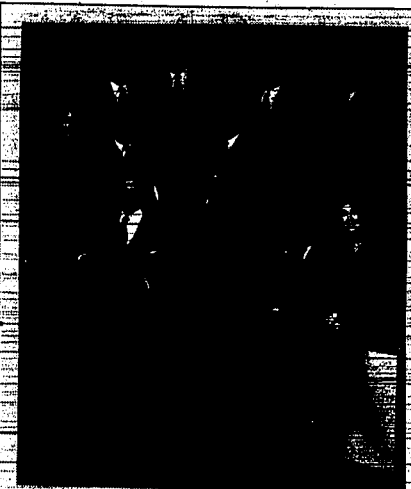

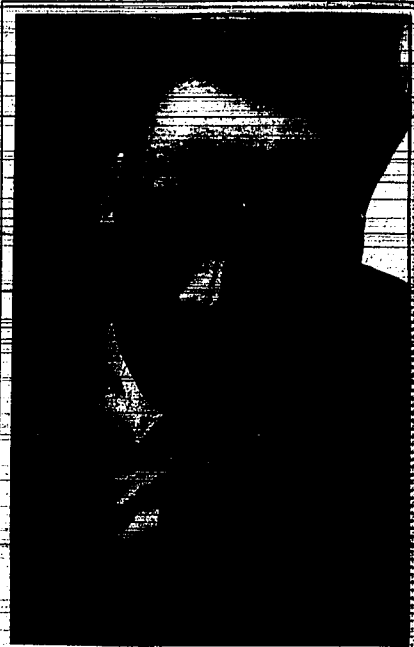
can encourage today's youth to read."

"Running on Emphy," the '60s radicalism-of-the-run drama from Lorimar, was nominated for best picture drama, best actress-drama (Christine Lahti), best supporting actor (Ricky Phoenix), best director (Sidney Lumet) and best screenplay (Nancy Porter).

In television, "L.A. Law's" seven nominations placed it far ahead of its nearest competitor, ABC's mammoth miniseries "War and Remembrance," which got four nominations, and six other shows, with three nominations each.

"L.A. Law" was topped for best actress-drama, best actress-drama (for Susan Dey and Jill Eikenberry), best actor-drama (for Corbin Bernsen and Harry Hamlin), best supporting actress (Susan Rutan) and best supporting actor (Larry Drake).

(The top acting awards are divided between drama and comedy-musicals, but supporting actor and actress nominations straddle both those categories and the TV movie series (all as well.)

Nominated along with "Running on Emphy" for best dramatic movie were "The Accidental Tourist," "A Cry in the Dark," "Gorillas in the Mist," "The Adventures of Dian Fossey," "Mississippi Burning," "Rain Man" and "The Unbearable Lightness of Being."

In addition to "Working Girl," the nominees for best musical by comedy were "Big," "A Fish Called Wanda," "Midnight Run" and "Who Framed Roger Rabbit."

In the TV competition, the best drama series nominees, in addition to "L.A. Law," were "Beauty and the Beast," "Murder, She Wrote," "Thirtysomething" and "Wiseguy."

The nominees in the TV comedy category were "Cheers," "The Golden Girls," "Murphy Brown," "Roseanne" and "The Wonder Years."

The Cecil B. DeMille award as previously announced, will be given to actress Doris Day, star of such films as "The Pajama Game," "The Man Who Knew Too Much" and "Pillow Talk" and the television program "The Doris Day Show." Recent DeMille award recipients include Clint Eastwood, Anthony Quinn and Barbara Stanwyck.

Composed of 79 writers who cover entertainment on a fairly-regular basis, the Hollywood Foreign Press Association initiated the Golden Globes in 1944. Last year's big Golden Globe winners were "The Last Emperor," with four trophies, and "Moonstruck" and "L.A. Law" with two statues apiece.

The awards ceremony will be carried by Ted Turner's SuperStation TBS Jan. 28 and then will be re-broadcast Jan. 29.

'Naked Gun' uses bad puns, slapstick to satirize police shows

The following are capsule reviews of some of the films playing locally in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

THE NAKED GUN (PG-13)—Zucker, Abrahamson, and Zucker, creators of the daffy TV police show satire, "Police Squad," return to the scene of the crime, adding more crudelty, slapstick, more non-sequiturs,

more stone-faced Leslie Nielsen quips, more inside TV couch potato gag, more bad puns and more of that tall guy whose head was not camera range. There is a joke every 20 seconds or so, some of them dumb, but enough work to keep things pretty hilarious. Written by Zucker, Abrahamson and Zucker, and directed by David Zucker alone, with Nielsen, Ricardo Montalban and Reggie Jackson (as a hypnotized zombie assassin).

COCON (THE RETURN) (G)—The best kind of sequel, combining the charm, imagination, humor and originality of "Cocoon" with even more poignance while continuing the story in new directions. With Don Ameche, Willard Brimley, Courteney Cox, Hume Cronyn, Jack Gifford, Steve Guttenberg, Barret Oliver, Maureen Stapleton, Elaine Stritch, Gwen Verdon, Tahnee Welch.

DIRTY ROTTEN SCOUNDRELS (PG) A resurrection of an old and not very funny vehicle for Marion Brando and David Niven (the 1964 "Bedtime Story"), its greatest assets are its glorious look (courtesy of Michael Ballhaus' exceptional camera work) and Michael Caine. However, there is one problem with director Frank Oz and the picture's layers of writers have not quite solved: Steve Martin's character is a snake. Martin does him deliciously, but life to him is one, long ruthless scam, and something about that finally begins to lose its wonderfulness.

THE LAND BEFORE TIME Began (G)—This animation feature stars Littlefoot, a baby Brontosaurus, who will lose his mother and must find his way without her to the Great

Valley, or starve. Director Don Bluth has gone to the trouble of giving very little children a sort of primer of dinosaur lore. It is nice that the Lucas Spielberg forces, who are the film's executive producers, are behind the idea of overcoming differences and pulling together—that the Stegosaurus can lie down with the Pterodactyl, so to speak. But do dinosaurs really lend themselves to outsize-cutesiness?

MY STEPMOTHER IS AN ALIEN (PG-13) Wild and wacky yet surprisingly touching romantic comedy in which widowed scientist Dan Aykroyd is bewitched by a beauty (Kim Basinger) from another planet. With Jon Lovitz, Alyson Hannigan.

OLIVER & COMPANY (G) Although it has virtually nothing to do with Dickens, Disney's new animated feature inspired by "Oliver Twist" is a bright, upbeat comedy that offers virtually ideal fare for family holiday viewing. The hip tone and broader, more cartoon-style animation puts the film in the tradition of "The Jungle Book" rather than "Pinocchio." Betty Midler, Chooch Marin and Billy Joel offer outstanding vocal performances as a smooty poodle, a half-crazed chihuahua and a street-smart mongrel. Teen-agers who usually reject animation as "kid stuff" will enjoy the rock songs and hip characters.

RAIN MAN (R) Because we've had dozens of buddy films about journey of discovery, we can plot the scenario of this one like a road map: The special qualities of one will work on

the other to change him, or perhaps both of them. Dustin Hoffman makes his autistic savant character hypnotically interesting and sometimes torridly funny. "Don't give him the love," says most authoritative performers since "Risky Business" and it can be said unblushingly that he holds his own with the masterly Hoffman.

SCROOGED (R) Dickens' "A Christmas Carol" transposed to modern times and to the cutthroat world of network television. Actually, it is not a bad notion for a satirical comedy and this one begins well, but then veers entirely out of hand. Scrooge is now Bill Murray's Frank Cross, the youngest network president in the history of television, the dumbest and probably the nastiest.

TEQUILA SUNRISE (R) Written with writer-director Robert Towne's trademark artifice, nicely acted and gorgeously pretty, this lovingly foolish enterprise finally blows away into slick unsubstantiality. It still provides a nice outing for its three stars (Mel Gibson, Kurt Russell and Michelle Pfeiffer), shaped a little like those '40s movies when best pals Clark Gable and Henry Fonda both fell for the same beautiful girl.

TWINS (PG) This may be the ultimate High Concept movie. It is composed in exclamation points: Arnold Schwarzenegger and Danny DeVito as twins! Separated at birth after a genetic experiment that made Arnold a superhero and left Danny a scuzzball! Romancing two gorgeous sisters! Spilled out in identical outfits! Pursued cross-country by crazed criminal! Do you think you do anything with all of that? Call director

Ivan Reitman, and his two teams of screenwriters—immediately, they haven't a clue. Millions on millions will undoubtedly attend this overblown, super-slick, one gag comedy. They may even laugh, but it really has to offer are its charming co-stars, that identical-suits routine and one impish anti-Rambo visual gag. As for the rest, the posters are funnier.

In 1988 movies, macho gave way to cute

HOLLYWOOD Maybe George Bush didn't see it coming. Maybe America is already a kinder, gentler nation.

During 1988, cute was in, macho out at theaters throughout the United States. Disney drew an animated rabbit so silly and impossibly adorable that he hopped his way into the heart of the screen's crustiest detective, and made "Who Framed Roger Rabbit" the No. 1 film of the year.

In 1987, Eddie Murphy reigned at the box office with a big smile and lots of car crashes. "Beverly Hills Cop II" was one of the top-grossing films of the year. In 1988, Murphy reigned at the box office with a big smile and lots of romance. "Coming to America" was the second-highest-grossing release of the year.

Box-offered audiences—a kid who gets his wish to become a grown-up, and then decides there's no place like home. "Big" became the surprise hit of the summer and elevated Tom Hanks to the status of a major star. It was also the third-highest-grossing film of the year.

The ghosts in the sleeper spring-hit "Beetlejuice" were so soft-hearted they did not know how to frighten away the inhabitants of their own house. Even child-killer Freddy Krueger's horror was tamer, and wittier. In his fourth installment of "A Nightmare on Elm Street," which dominated the early-fall box office.

The year started with a spillover of cute from 1987. Disney-Touchstone's "Three Men and a Cradle," released in

late 1987, continued to draw crowds well into 1988. All told, the film starring Tom Selleck, Steve Guttenberg, Ted Danson, and, yes, a baby, has grossed nearly \$168 million.

The year ended with top gun Tom Cruise leaving his F-14 on the ground to drive his autistic brother, the "Rain Man," across the country. Together, Cruise and co-star Dustin Hoffman have overtaken a host of holiday comedies. "Rain Man" was the top-grossing film in the nation over New Year's weekend.

This year, Hollywood studios will continue to release films short on wittiness and long on comedy and romance. "The sequel to "Lethal Weapon" will be lighter and more comedic than originally conceived, and serious comic-book fans fear that even "Batman" will offer too many laughs.

John Krier, president of Exhibitor Relations, said that the 10 highest-grossing releases of 1988, through New Year's weekend, were:

1. "Who Framed Roger Rabbit" (\$160 million).
2. "Coming to America" (\$128 million).
3. "Big" (\$112 million).
4. "Crocodile Dundee II" (\$109 million).
5. "Die Hard" (\$80 million).
6. "Cocktail" (\$77 million).
7. "Beetlejuice" (\$73 million).
8. "A Fish Called Wanda" (\$66 million).
9. "Willow" (\$56 million).
10. "Twins" (\$55 million).

Following close behind were "Scrooged" (\$55 million), "Rambo III" (\$54 million), "Bull Durham" (\$50 million), "Nightmare on Elm Street 4" (\$49 million) and "Colors" (\$46 million).

Three films that actually opened in 1987 were among the top-grossing pictures during the early part of 1988: "Good Morning, Vietnam" (\$123 million in 1988 alone, according to Daily Variety), "Three Men and a Cradle" (\$84 million in 1988), and "Moonstruck" (\$79 million in 1988).

While the biggest openings of 1987 and 1988 had much in common, there was a notable drop in the popularity of raw action films last year. Total box-office receipts on action-adventure films were down 19 percent over the previous year, with 26 films grossing a total of \$283 million, according to figures compiled by Entertainment Data Inc., which provides box-office information to Hollywood studios.

There was some disappointment in the action-adventure category, said Mara M. Balsbaugh, an entertainment industry analyst with the investment firm Smith Barney Harris Upham & Co. "Very few of these worked, with the limited exception of 'Die Hard.' That film, starring Bruce Willis, grossed nearly \$80 million and ranked fifth among the year's releases.

"Rambo III" was the 12th highest-grossing picture of the year, but measured against expectations ("Rambo II" grossed nearly three times as much) and its production costs (more than \$60 million), it proved a major disappointment in interest for Sylvester Stallone.

In Star's "Red Heat," pairing Arnold Schwarzenegger with James Belushi, and Paramount's "The Presidio," with Sean Connery and Mark Harmon, both fizzled at the summer box office, as did a host of other action pictures with less recognizable stars: Universals' "Midnight Run" buddy cops-and-bad-guys movie starring Robert De Niro and Charles Hallahan, did \$37 million. Not bad, nothing to write home about.

Veronica Hamel, Ben Cross fall in love in World War II miniseries

Ben Cross is best known to American audiences as Harold Abrahams, the intense Oxford scholar and Olympic runner in the Academy Award-winning movie "Chariots of Fire" (1981). This week, he moves from ivy-covered walls to a Nazi concentration camp in NBC's "Twist of Fate" (airing Sunday, Jan. 8, and Monday, Jan. 9). Cross plays an SS officer who has plastic surgery to disguise himself as a Jew in order to escape possible future prosecution. Instead, he lands in a concentration camp during the closing days of the war and, ironically, becomes one of the founders of Israel after the war. Veronica Hamel, Bruce Greenwood and John Glover co-star.

"Apart from singing and dancing, I get to do everything in this movie," says Cross. "I get to use guns, fight, fall in love and age."

Cross is quick to add, however, that he didn't take the role just for the chance to fire a pistol.

"It's obviously a lot of macho nonsense, but I enjoyed it," he admits. "However, that's not why I took the role. I took it because I hadn't really seen anything about someone during the time of the Nazis who stood by and did nothing, who couldn't be characterized. It was fascinating. There's something amazing about a Nazi who takes on the identity of a Jew. And it was important — and a real challenge — to make him warmer as the story develops, so the love story made sense."

Cross, whose other credits include the miniseries "The Plains Traders of Thika" and "The Far Pavilions," also

felt a personal involvement with the story. "I read the book and researched the psychology of it, of course," he says. "My father died as a result of the Second World War, so I'm not out of touch with that whole period."

But Cross keeps coming back to how much he enjoyed doing an action role. "I haven't enjoyed working on a film this much for a long, long time," he says. "It was like Rambo with a sword. Harrison Ford with combat boots. And I loved meeting Veronica Hamel."

He pauses. Good Lord, that sounds so... Hollywood," he says in horror. "However, if the opposite were true, I might not say it outright, but I would certainly try to... suggest it to you."

Cross knows that his visibility with American audiences isn't that great. "A lot of good things happened to me because of 'Chariots of Fire,'" he says. "And I thank the gods. Obviously, I would like to make more movies. If I could work in mainstream movies, I would."

Although Cross was a member of England's Royal Shakespeare Company, he's not one of those actors who claims that stage work is the only true acting. "I don't enjoy doing the-

ater," he says. "Do it when a script is too good to turn down comes along."

TV movies also have their pitfalls. "You don't have time for take 10," he explains. "Basically, it's like shooting the rehearsal."

Where Cross draws the line, however, is at doing a TV series. "Doing a series is being a nine-to-five," he says. "If I wanted to work in a factory, I'd go and produce cars."

A: Scott Alan Thorson, 31, lived in Liberace's Las Vegas home and worked as his bodyguard and servant until Lee's death last year of AIDS-related complications. When Liberace dismissed him from his staff, Thorson sued the flamboyant entertainer for pallimony. The suit got nowhere, which is just about where Thorson is right now. He pleaded guilty to a robbery charge in July and was sentenced to three years probation. Thorson is best known for his book about his allegedly homosexual love life with Liberace.

Q: It's been reported that Art Buchwald is suing a movie studio, claiming that Eddie Murphy's recent film, "Coming to America," was lifted from a Buchwald story. Isn't this theme — a royal visiting a foreign country and falling in love with a commoner — a Hollywood chestnut? — N.C.

A: Ironically, way back in 1924, Paramount — the studio that filmed "Coming to America" — produced "The King on Main Street," in which Adolphe Menjou was a dashing European sovereign who comes to America and finds romance. Other variations: "The King and the Chorus Girl" (1937) featured a European prince who falls for a cute chorine, and 20 years later there was "The Prince and the Showgirl" with Laurence Olivier and Marilyn Monroe. Of course, the granddaddy of this genre is the Rom-

berg operetta, "The Student Prince," about a royal heir falling in love with a barmaid. However, Buchwald's script undoubtedly involved more than the theme of a prince falling in love with a commoner.

Q: Robert De Niro put on a lot of weight to do the "Raging Bull" film

about Jake LaMotta. Do other actors go to such extremes? — C.B.

A: More often than you might think, Shirley MacLaine put on 20 pounds for her piano teacher role in "Madame Sousatzka," Burt Reynolds added 30 pounds to look the part of an aging safecracker in "Breaking In," Sylvia Miles went up 20 pounds for her marriage-broker role in "Crossing Delancey," Dennis Quaid zoomed up 35 pounds for his "Everybody's All-American," and Danny Aiello, who was positively sylphlike as Cher's suitor in "Moonstruck," packed on the pounds to portray a paunchy police chief in the soon-due "The January Man." On the other hand, Marlon Brando reportedly shed considerable poundage for his forthcoming film, "A Dry White Season."

Q: I was stunned to hear that TV's Marla Gibbs wants to give up acting in favor of a singing career. Say it ain't so. — B.G.

A: Marla has probably had the longest consecutive TV run-of-any performer. After her first appearance as a guest on "The Jeffersons," she

quickly developed her wisecracking character of Florence Johnston into a 13-season staple of the highly popular series. She's now starring in a fourth season of "227" on NBC. Off-camera, Marla is well-known as a first-rate jazz vocalist and owns a nightclub in Los Angeles. She loves singing but knows that TV is her professional bread and butter.

Q: After seeing Peter O'Toole in "High Spirits" with Daryl Hannah, we became curious about the raffish actor. Is he married or living with anyone? — D.L.

A: O'Toole is single now. He claims his love life is a blank and that he's going through a restful period of celibacy. His main interest these days is his six-year-old son, Lorcan, over whom he's been having a custody fight with the child's mother.

Q: We really like Andrew McCarthy, the young actor who's a certified member of Hollywood's "brat pack." Is he as cocky and self-confident as he seems to be onscreen? — P.D.

A: In person, the 25-year-old McCarthy is less impressive. As he'll be the first to admit, he comes across as something of a jerk. Instead of the nice, sensitive guys he plays in flicks like "St. Elmo's Fire," "Pretty in Pink" and "Mannequin," Andy claims his friends tell him, "Why don't you just be onscreen the real jerk you are?" Actually, McCarthy is surpris-

A Martinez can't believe his luck playing a lead in 'Santa Barbara'

In the upcoming Soap Opera Digest Awards (Jan. 16, NBC) readers have nominated "Santa Barbara's" A Martinez for Outstanding Hero and, along with Marcy Walker, for Favorite Super Couple.

Playing bumbling detective Cruz Castillo, Martinez sets Hollywood stereotype casting on its ear. He's not a second banana either. His character is the male lead in the afternoon soap.

Martinez can't believe it isn't a dream. Conditioned to supporting parts, and praying only for steady work at best, A was stunned when he was nominated for an Emmy last spring. In September, Martinez took a week to promote "Santa Barbara" in Paris, where the soap has a 52 share in the evening. While in the City of Lights, the actor slipped off to visit the Louvre Museum and Versailles, confident that he wouldn't be recognized.

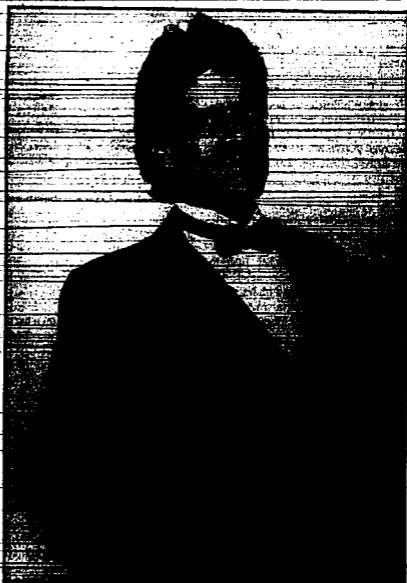
The actor was mobbed. A is not used to being singled out and gushed over. His fans in the United States are enthusiastic but not quite like the French.

The next day he received the Medal of Paris from Mayor Jacques Chirac and it was a special thrill. Martinez admits he's new at this game of celebrity. Why has sophisticated Paris gone wild over "Santa Barbara" and hero Castillo?

"I don't know," A replies. "The French have this fantasy about California, and anything connected with the place. They like Castillo, because to them, he's a very romantic guy. They don't care if he doesn't solve crimes. In fact, our audience here and in most of Europe is very forgiving. Cruz's mistakes in judgment are part of his charm."

Martinez knows he has one of the best roles in "Santa Barbara," but he looked down his nose when he was first offered the part. A had only seen a soap a few times and something told him to avoid the stuff.

"I was wrong, of course," he admits. "This show has changed my life, lifting my career beyond my wildest

dreams. Thanks to our producer Jill Farron Phelps, actors are allowed to have ideas. Sometimes we make mistakes, but our changes usually work. Jill wants our ideas, and is willing to gamble. That's why this is the best stage in town to work."

With the emergence of James Edward Olmos in "Miami Vice," Jimmy Smits in "L.A. Law" and Martinez in the afternoon, the struggling Latino acting community can't quite believe its turn of luck. Many more are joining the acting force.

"It's tougher now," says A. "Ten

years ago there were only a few of us competing for a smattering of parts. I wasn't trained at UCLA. I had to learn on the job. Now I have technique, discipline, and best of all, exposure. I still think I will wake up some morning and find it's all been a dream."

Writers' strike dominated TV year

NEW YORK — Yes, it was a pretty bad year for television. It started out promisingly enough, though. Remember back in January, when CBS anchorman Dan Rather and Vice President George Bush had a shouting match on the "CBS Evening News"? What pathos! What excitement!

But by year's end, the presidential election seemed to be as much a victim of a writers' strike as the networks' prime-time schedule, and only a chair-hurling brawl on Geraldo Rivera's syndicated talk show ignited TV passions.

Here are just a few fascinating highlights of television's year:

CBS finished the television season in last place in the Nielsen ratings for the first time ever, confounding TV columnists who had to get the concepts of "last" and "first" into the same sentence.

The Writers Guild of America went on strike, crippling network preparation of fabulous, innovative new shows for the 1988-89 season. More importantly, "Haw" celebrated its 20th anniversary, while dwindling viewership for ABC's multimillion-dollar "Dolly" prompted network executives to contemplate the imponderable universe.

The networks moved lock, stock and makeup artists to Moscow for a newsless summit between President Reagan and Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev. Viewers were enthralled

by the final episode of "St. Elsewhere," which revealed the entire series to have been imagined by an autistic child.

NBC News launched a series of summer documentaries, no doubt inspired by Edward R. Murrow, beginning with the riveting "Of Macho and Men," an examination of male striptease artist as metaphor for our troubled times.

Floor-fights that might have made the political conventions such boffo programming dissipated in the waning days of the decade-long primaries. The network news divisions nevertheless moved lock, stock and catering trucks to Atlanta in July for coverage of the Democrats, then whined about the lack of street riots that made the 1968 version such a ratings bonanza. CBS courageously marched on, however, and used the setting as an opportunity for Dan Rather and Walter Cronkite to announce to reporters that they really do like each other, honest.

By August, network audiences were plummeting — no, not in Nielsen ratings, but literally diving for remote control devices. The writers' strike ended, but the networks revealed that the fabulous, innovative new shows planned for the 1988-89 season would be delayed, and, meanwhile, the networks would be forced — against their will, of course — to air mediocre swill.

Two talk show guests revealed they hoaxed Oprah Winfrey, Sally Jessy Raphael and Geraldo Rivera by pos-

ing as a phony sex surrogate and a middle-aged virgin, prompting producers to decry the disservice to a public desperately in need of accurate information on sexual deviations.

GTG Entertainment launched its ballyhooed "USA Today: The Television Show" and set a new standard for out-of-whack hype-versus-quality ratios.

In September, even the Summer Olympics on NBC could not match CBS and ABC's heart-pounding race to see who could get the first made-for-TV movie about Liberace on the air.

In October, CBS premiered the Mary-Tyler Moore and Dick Van Dyke shows, "Annie McGuire" and "The Van Dyke Show," bringing tears to the eyes of television critics who mistily recalled "Life with Lucy."

Geraldo Rivera got two hours of NBC prime time for "Devil Worship: Exposing Satan's Underground," landed near the top of the Nielsen ratings, then complained about lack of praise from network executives who were busy ducking torch-bearing mobs of appalled TV critics.

In November, after weeks of informing an already bored-witless populace that George Bush had a virtually insurmountable lead over Michael Dukakis in the presidential campaign, the networks rushed to be first on election night to announce the astonishing fact that Bush had won the election. NBC mentioned it an hour later and was castigated for keeping hot news from a breathless public.

"War and Remembrance" premiered to an audience made up, apparently, of exhausted viewers dozing in recliners who were unable to change the channel. Rivera, the most prolific TV newsmaker of 1988, presided over a chair-swinging melee by neo-Nazis on his talk show that at least woke up his studio audience who set records for grabbing coats and rushing to exits.

PBS series examines trouble within U.S. banking industry

HOLLYWOOD — Not since the Depression era have Americans seen so much serious trouble within their banking industry. Record numbers of banks failed in 1987 and again in 1988. The savings and loan industry is plagued by so many brain-dead institutions and such inept regulation that an infusion of tax dollars is almost inevitable.

The reasons behind this turmoil are not solely economic. Rather, a complex set of factors spawned by deregulation and the inextricable linking of world economies has unleashed a torrent of change and thrown the industry into virtual chaos.

The difficulties in dealing with these changes and their profound effect on our lives are often lost in the headlines and evening newscasts about bank failures and savings and loan bailouts.

'Gary Collins' Hour Magazine' suffers mid-season cancellation

HOLLYWOOD — "When you have had your fill of TV's tabloid talk shows — Geraldo's satan worshipers, Oprah's weight loss, Phil's transvestites — it is nice to know that you can escape to the common sense tranquility of 'Hour Magazine' and its affable host Gary Collins."

So began the letter from Collins' publicity agent Dec. 7.

Although the show had recently undergone a bit of a face lift, including a title change to "Gary Collins' Hour Magazine" to give it a more personal touch, the publicist added that there was no change in the show's core objective: to consistently inform and entertain without forcing kids to leave the room and without anyone shouting at you.

Eight days later in a midseason surprise, comparisons would no longer matter. After 8½ years, Group W Productions told Collins that "Hour" was being taken off the air. The last show is Jan. 20.

From a high of 154 stations across the nation in mid-1986, the program had dropped to 104 stations. "Stations were focusing on different program forms," Group W President Derk Zimmerman explained, "and, frankly, that's not compatible with Gary's style.... Gary Collins is a terrific guy, always has been, still is."

The clear implication was that Zimmerman was talking about program forms so successfully marketed by Phil Donahue, Oprah Winfrey and Geraldo Rivera.

The irony is that until he got canceled, Collins and his show hardly got noticed. No one, after all, would ever toss a chair in the air on his "Hour" and break his nose.

Collins apparently lost out by being too nice. To some viewers his "tranquility" translated into dull. As TV Guide sniped last spring, "This is the TV talk show that poses the burning question: If host Gary Collins were any more low-key, would he still register a pulse?"

It is, of course, precisely that kind

of blandness that works so well for the 50-year-old picture-book-handsome Collins as master of ceremonies on the "Miss America Pageant" and on the annual National March of Dimes telethon co-hosted with Mary Ann Mobley, his wife of 21 years, who was Miss America 1959.

To Collins, who has no apologies for his "soft, service information" show, the real irony is that his last week on the air is all about tabloid TV, and that he was told of the show's demise while taping shows on that theme. Another change "Hour" producers had instituted to keep up with its competitors was having assorted "theme weeks."

"I don't think there was any question in anyone's mind how the changes in the marketplace and the format out there had rendered a program like ours, which was extremely innovative in a sense when we started, kind of old news," Collins said recently.

He laughed as he recalled the coincidence of the tabloid theme. "It seems that the viewing public and producers of those programs have tapped into this insatiable desire for stronger formats, stronger issues, stronger confrontations, a stronger

examination of subject matter and reality subject matter. And that was never 'Hour Magazine.'

"So, times change," Collins continued affably, "and you have to look way back in the woods to not see that the trend's coming."

And what does he think of this trend? "I'm fascinated with some of the

stuff. I cringe a little at some of the subject matter.... I won't give you any specifics, but I have a reaction as a human being that 'Gee, that was a little far. That was a little too close to the bone.'"

Collins gave the impression of choosing each word with the same care he gives to his appearance. Not a color, pattern or sandy hair flecked with gray was out of place. He insisted that he is neither angered nor worried about the cancellation, but "excited" about the "opportunities." He had "some great meetings" with unnamed producers that very morning. Besides, he is the kind of guy who "always sees the glass as half-full and never half-empty."

About the only note of wistfulness cropped up when Collins noted that "Hour's" ratings in November had gone up a full Nielsen point, meaning 900,000 more viewers. "So we really felt we were on the upswing," he said.

Asked why he didn't do anything to accommodate the trend, Collins replied simply and without rancor: "Because our show was never that kind of (tabloid) show, nor am I that type of host."

"Each host has had a very individual personality and that's what separates him from the rest of the crowd," Collins went on. Asked to define himself as a host, Collins said without hint of a boast that he was "inquisitive, sensitive, caring, likable, non-confrontational."

"I don't think all television has to be on that hard edge," Collins added. "The thing that's always separated what I do has been the confrontational element. You always knew when you watched our show, it wasn't there. That's basically not a part of

my character.

With Collins, there is the decided sense that what you see is really who he is. He said he was spending the Christmas and New Year's holidays with Mary Ann's grandmother and family in Mississippi. "For so many years the family came out here for the holidays, but her grandmother is 96. Unfortunately, she's one of those seniors who has retained everything from the neck up but the body has failed. I'm not quite sure which is worse..."

The Collinses' next stop will be Africa to see friends they met while filming the 1974 TV series "Born Free," and other friends from their work in World Vision, the Christian relief agency. "Mary Ann went to Cambodia and I went to Ethiopia for them..."

Although Collins, the son of an auto parts dealer, was born and raised in Los Angeles, he identifies himself as Midwestern and readily points out that "Hour" fared better in the middle of the country than in places like New York and Los Angeles.

"Johnny Carson is probably my all-time favorite (TV host) in the sense I feel more close to that type. My family's from the Midwest, he's Midwest. My family's from Ft. Dodge, Iowa," he said with obvious pride. "I was the first one to be born outside Iowa."

Collins discovered acting in the Army, where his service included a stint as announcer and disc jockey for Armed Forces Radio. Already in Europe, he got a role in "Cleopatra" starring Elizabeth Taylor and Richard Burton. After parts in several more movies made overseas, he went to New York and did some work in theater. In 1965 Collins landed his first starring TV series, "The Wackiest Ship in the Army."

He welcomed the transition from acting to TV hosting. It gave him and Mary Ann a chance for "regular hours" and a more stable home life — and his wife won the option of pursuing her own acting career. In the past, she had always followed him on the road.

Collins declined to rate the likes of Oprah, Phil and Geraldo. They each have a "different style" and he does not want to talk about that either. "I respect 'em all for what they're doing. They're obviously doing a bang-up job."

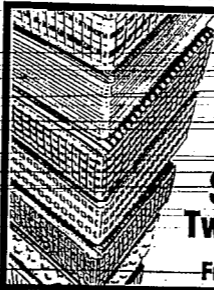

Karen Carpenter story is top show of week

NEW YORK (AP) — CBS' fact-based movie about the life and death of singer Karen Carpenter was the top-rated show of New Year's week, breaking CBS' own record for highest-rated movie so far this season.

NBC set a record, too, racking up its longest winning streak in the Nielsen, 16 weeks in a row. But for the first time in a long time, NBC was shut out of the top five in the Nielsen rankings.

"The Karen Carpenter Story," which ran New Year's night, got a rating of 26.3 and a 41 share, the highest rating for a TV movie this season. It bested CBS' "A Very Brady Christmas" which two weeks ago had a 25.1 rating and 39 share.

Each rating-point equals 904,000 homes with television. The share is a percentage of sets-in-use during the show's time period.

Thanks to a boost from Sunday's NFL playoff game between Minnesota and San Francisco, CBS' Sunday night lineup, including a post-game

show, made the top four spots in the Nielsen rankings.

The top 10 shows were: "The Karen Carpenter Story," "Murder, She Wrote," "60 Minutes," "NFL Playoff Post-Game Show," ABC's "Roseanna," NBC's "The Cosby Show" and "Cheers," ABC's

"Who's the Boss?" and NBC's "A Different World" and "Unsolved Mysteries."

The performance by its Sunday lineup gave CBS an edge over ABC for second place on the week ending Jan. 1, with an average rating of 12.3 to 12.2. NBC won with a 13.6.

CBS' "Quiet Victory: The Charlie Wedemeyer Story," another fact-based movie about a football coach who battled Lou Gehrig's Disease, also scored well and ranked 18th.

"The CBS Evening News" rounded out a good-news week for the network by maintaining its narrow lead in the news race. CBS had a 12.1 rating and a 22 share. "ABC World News Tonight" had an 11.4 and 21. "NBC Nightly News" had an 11.2 and 21.

TV viewers confused when 5 stations switch

MIAMI (AP) — Television viewers are ready with remote control channel changers and "TV Guides" to find their favorite shows as five stations in south Florida switch network affiliations Sunday and a sixth makes its debut.

"This is about as confused as a market can get," said Allen Shuklan, a CBS television vice president of programming sent from New York to run Miami's WCIX, an independent station becoming a CBS affiliate.

The swaps have created enough mind-boggling situations to fill a made-for-television movie.

For instance, standing amid the holiday decorations in the lobby of television station WTVJ, a CBS network affiliate since 1949, is a life-size cardboard cutout of Bill Cosby, the star of NBC's programming lineup.

Meanwhile, WPEC, an ABC affiliate, has rented billboards promoting Bob Newhart, a CBS star.

Just before the opening sequence of "LA Law," the popular NBC show beginning at 10 p.m. Thursday, Miami station WSVN urges viewers to start watching the news — at 10 p.m.

Confused? Just stay tuned.

Industry veterans say this Sunday's network swaps are the biggest affiliation switch in history.

"It's absolutely incredible," said

Robert Ware, vice president and general manager of Palm Beach Gardens station WPBF, which goes on the air Sunday morning.

The changes in the Miami metropolitan television area, the nation's 14th largest with 1.26 million homes with televisions, and West Palm Beach, the 50th largest with 490,100 TV households, affects more than the millions of viewers.

The two large stations keeping the same network affiliations are trying to capitalize on viewer confusion; independents are planning improved programming to lure channel-switching viewers; and cable companies are adding stations to make sure their subscribers have all of the networks.

Making the new TV picture even fuzzier is the signal delivery problem for the new Miami CBS affiliate WCIX and the overlap of the two markets.

Miami television station WPLG, keeping its ABC affiliation, may pick up viewers in Palm Beach County where it can be viewed in many homes, for example, while West Palm Beach's WPEC, changing from ABC to CBS, is stepping up the battle for the 522,000 TV households in Broward County. Broward lies between Palm Beach and Dade counties and is counted as part of the Miami market.

Q: I enjoy watching Brian Wimmer on ABC's "China Beach." What can you tell me about him?

He was asked to test and wound up with a small role in that film. Wimmer, born in Provo, Utah, likes to ski and windsurf in his spare time.

Q: I know that TV series go from commercial TV to cable ("The Days and Nights of Molly Dodd"), but is the reverse true? Will we see Home Box Office movies on regular TV?

A: As a rule, most made-for-cable movies, particularly those on HBO, wind up going directly to videocassette for rental purposes. On the other hand, some series ("It's Garry Shandling's Show," "Bizarre," "Family Double Dare") and some specials ("MTV Video Awards" plus various

comedy and concert shows) do wind up going to commercial TV with increasing frequency. In general, however, the trend continues to be from network to cable rather than the other way around, given cable's need for programming and its inability to generate the large volume of shows found on the commercial networks or PBS.

Q: Whose voice is used for the computer in "Star Trek: The Next Generation"? It sounds like Majel Barrett.

A: That's because it is Barrett, who as "Star Trek" fans know, was nurse Christine Chapel in the original series and Mrs. Gene Roddenberry in real life.
