Idaho could be Rocky Flats plant site

TWIN FALLS — Three months after Gov. Cecil Andrus banned radioactive waste shipments into Idaho from the Rocky Flats weapons plant, a government report suggests the state may get the whole plant.

Flats since the 1960s. When the Energy Department failed to open a permanent waste repository last October, Andrus banned further shipment to INEL. Andrus' press secretary, Mark Johnson, said the governor would not comment on the report until he had read it.

The report lists INEL, along with the Savannah River Plant in South Carolina and the Pantex Plant in Texas, as possible sites for relocating the Rocky Flats Plant from Colorado. The plant, near Denver, manufactures plutonium triggers for nuclear weapons, re-

locates and refines plutonium and performs other functions in the production of nuclear weapons. The report recommends relocation to improve overall efficiencies of plutonium handling and to reduce overhead costs by consolidation of these activities at an existing (Department of Energy) site. It also cites the increase in population of the surrounding area since the plant was located as motivation to move the plant. The plant recently was shut down because of safety concerns. It also has leaked radioactive materials into groundwater.

Relocation also would reduce risks associated with transporting plutonium and radioactive waste, the report says. The relocation is expected to be completed by (fiscal year) 2010, at a cost of \$3.4 billion, the report says. INEL has been a major defense program facility since 1953, recovering uranium from spent fuel from government reactors. The recovered uranium has been used as fuel in reactors producing nuclear weapons plutonium at the Savannah River Plant. The report recommends construction of a Special Isotope Separator at INEL. The project is a laser-driven plutonium refinery that will refine weapons grade plutonium from stocks of fuel-grade plutonium currently stored at the Hanford Nuclear Reservation. Operation of the SIS will ensure that plutonium requirements for the 10-year period beyond (fiscal year) 1995 can be met and will provide a long-term contingency capability, the report states. New facilities recommended by the report include New Production Reactors proposed for INEL and the Savannah River Plant. The reactors, one at Savannah River and four at

Nuclear cleanup, update price tag set at \$81 billion

WASHINGTON — President Reagan on Thursday recommended spending \$81 billion over 20 years to modernize the government's crippled nuclear arms factories and to begin cleaning up the nationwide trail of waste left by four decades of bomb-making. President-elect Bush said he did not know whether he would support the proposal, which was prepared by the Energy Department. The plan includes closing four nuclear materials plants, consolidating work at other facilities and building two reactors to make a radioactive gas vital to continued production of nuclear warheads. Reagan, in a report to Congress, said the blueprint "will enable the administration and the Congress to adopt a long-term approach to modernization rather than a piecemeal response to the problems within the

nuclear weapons complex." The cost of modernizing the aging weapons-making plants through the year 2010 would be at least \$52 billion, the report said. Cleanup costs over that period would total \$29 billion, although the report said environmental repairs would have to continue far beyond 2010. There are 17 major plants in 12 states. These figures are in addition to normal operating costs over the next 20 years which, combined with the modernizing and cleanup costs, would total \$244 billion. The report specifically recommended: Investing \$400 million to improve safety and technical operations at the Rocky Flats plutonium processing plant near Denver, Colo., and then spending \$6.1 billion to close down the plant and transfer its operations to other sites. Idahoans accept Bush pick

WASHINGTON — President-elect George Bush dashed the hopes of Idaho legislators Thursday when he named retired Adm. James Watkins as his choice for Secretary of Energy. Bush chose Watkins instead of Peter Johnson, former chief of the Bonneville Power Administration. In announcing his choice, Bush said he was committed to solving the problems that face the nation's aging nuclear storage and production facilities, and pledged his support for an energy policy that would both advance the national security and protect the environment. Speaking from his home in McCall, Johnson affirmed his "full and unqualified support" for Bush's choice. "This has been a difficult call for the vice president and his staff, and I respect their choice," he said. Watkins, the former Chief of Naval Operations and ex-Commander in Chief of the U.S. Pacific fleet, was described as a versatile and capable administrator. The retired admiral also headed President Reagan's special commission on AIDS. Bush cited Watkins' experience with the nuclear submarine program as strong qualification for the position of Energy secretary. The President-elect also named former Education Secretary William Bennett for the new Cabinet-level post of drug czar. Johnson was strongly backed by both Idaho Republican Sens. James McClure and Steven Symms, who praised his sound management of BPA during some difficult chapters in its history — most notably the Washington Public Power Supply System's default on bonds to build new nuclear power plants in the early 1980s.

Gem juvenile officials worried over verdict

RUPERT — Juvenile officials say they're worried that a jury verdict Thursday could jeopardize a juvenile system dependent on private organizations and individuals. Just after the stroke of midnight, a six-man, six-woman jury ruled in favor of a Mirdoka County couple whose house burned to the ground in 1983 at the hands of a trio of boys who had escaped from the Idaho Youth Ranch. "It could have a serious impact if people overreact to it," said Steve Woodworth, state social services coordinator for the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare youth rehabilitation programs. "It sure gets our attention about who we place and where we place them." After attorneys gathered in from the cold night, the court clerk announced the jury awarded \$116,500 to Jerald and Dixie Lee Schenk, who discovered the ruins of their house after returning from a camping trip in August 1983. A Youth Ranch official says he thinks the verdict could signal a dangerous trend.

"We didn't violate any law, we didn't violate any standard of performance and yet we're held liable for the kids under our care," said Corry Jones, vice president of the Youth Ranch. "The underlying question is, any person who wants to help troubled children takes that risk, even after they've complied with every rule and every standard and all." A lawyer for the Schenks says that's not the case. "The jury simply said if someone is negligent they have to pay for the resulting damages," said Stanley Cole, one of a trio of lawyers representing the Schenks. "If you take charge of a third person known to have dangerous propensities, you are responsible if you don't perform the duties of properly supervising that individual." The Schenks filed the lawsuit in 1985, charging the Idaho Youth Ranch, the Department of Health and Welfare and the three boys with negligence and gross negligence. The ranch is a private, not-for-profit corporation that contracts with the department for group care of juvenile

United Way fires part-time worker following audit

TWIN FALLS — The local United Way has fired a part-time employee accused of forging at least three checks and embezzling an undisclosed amount of cash, the organization's attorney said Thursday. Following the discovery of financial irregularities in late December, United Way board members ordered an internal audit and asked author-

ities to conduct a criminal investigation, said Pritz Winderlich, the agency's volunteer attorney. Winderlich did not specify the amount of money in question, but said it is less than \$10,000. The revelations of alleged wrongdoing began with discovery of a \$2,100 check, written to the United Way of Magic Valley Inc., that was altered to be made payable to the employee, Winderlich

said. A Boise bank refused to honor the check and sent it back to the employee's Twin Falls bank. Winderlich would not identify the woman employee, who worked less than six months as a secretary-bookkeeper. The employee is "additionally accused of increasing the dollar amount on two of her payroll checks," Winderlich said. Organization officials suspect that she also stole an undisclosed amount of cash.

Mother, son think Friday the 13th is a great day

LAYTON, Utah — Unlucky Friday the 13th, or lucky Friday the 13th, it all depends on your outlook. Peggy Aranda and her son Tyrone, both of Layton, think the day is just great. In fact, they regard it as one of their best. And it came up again this week. Peggy was born on Friday, Jan. 13, in England. A midwife came to her family's

home, 113 Sandy Lane, in the little community of East Derham, North Fork, and assisted her birth. Peggy grew up with some superstitions and some teasing about her birth date, but she mainly recalls only happy experiences associated with the day. She said about the best thing that happened to her on her birthday came 22 years after her own birth when she gave birth to Tyrone.

Not only was he born on Friday, Jan. 13, but he was born in the same home in which his mother had been born — yes, the one with the 113 address. Tyrone was delivered in the same bed as his mother. Not only that, but the same midwife delivered them both. Luck? Coincidence? Quirk of fate? No, it is sure, Tyrone said his mother definitely is the more superstitious of the two, but neither claims to put much credence in

good or bad luck — or in tales often associated with the superstitions. Peggy remembers a few of those tales. Her own mother passed on some traditional ones to her as a child. No walking under ladders. No shoes on the table. No open umbrellas in the house. If salt is spilled, toss a little over your left shoulder. "During any storm she always covered all the mirrors in the house," Peggy said of

her mother. Peggy isn't sure why her mother did all those things; they were just a part of life. Despite the old wives' tales, Peggy and Tyrone both like their birth date. Each year they and their spouses go out to dinner and celebrate. Well, two years they didn't. Tyrone was in the hospital those two years, but doesn't attribute that to Friday the 13th.

Stallings joins push to open WIPP

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — The Department of Energy and five Western congressmen are pushing to open by the end of the year an experimental repository for low-level nuclear waste in New Mexico.

But Rep. David Skaggs, D-Colo., warned Thursday that it may not be possible, and put the odds on opening the Waste Isolation Pilot Project by the end of the year at 60-60.

Skaggs joined Rep. Richard Stallings, D-Idaho, and New Mexico congressman Bill Richardson, Steve Schweitzer and Joe Skean on a four-day waste storage colloquy at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

The day before, they toured the WIPP site near Carlsbad, and later Thursday were scheduled to fly to the Rocky Flats defense plant in Colorado. Rocky Flats, near Denver,

produces much of the low-level waste that is now stored at the INEL on a temporary basis until the WIPP facility opens.

The congressional delegation arrived in Idaho Falls Wednesday night, for a round of meetings with Department of Energy officials.

Thursday morning, the congressmen were briefed on work at the Radioactive Waste Management Complex at INEL. They were taken to an area where radioactive waste in barrels and drums is stored above ground on asphalt pads.

Stallings said they did not have a chance to examine any of the millions of cubic feet of radioactive waste routinely buried at INEL for years before the practice was stopped in 1970. Environmentalists claim contamination from those

burials threatens the underground Snake River Aquifer.

One of the main obstacles to opening WIPP has been the failure of Congress to pass a land-withdrawal bill transferring WIPP to DOE.

Meanwhile, DOE has proceeded with an administrative land withdrawal process, said Troy Wade, assistant energy secretary for the defense program, and former INEL administrator. But Wade said the administrative process would take a minimum of six months and he said DOE will not transfer the land until Congress has been given an opportunity to pass a land withdrawal bill on its own.

DOE has completed preliminary paperwork and will file for administrative withdrawal next week, Wade said.

The Schenks asked for \$17 million in punitive damages.

The jury decided not to award punitive damages to the Schenks due to split pleadings from another of their lawyers, E. Lee Schlander, to "send a message" to the Youth Ranch to start supervising its charges better.

The jury would have to decide the ranch was guilty of gross negligence to award the punitive damages. Instead, they decided to award a little less to the Schenks than they actually suffered.

That left Jerald Schenk with mixed feelings.

"I don't think it reflected the full losses," Schenk said. Still, he said, "I was satisfied with how it came out."

The trial to a large extent hinged on a ruling by 6th District Judge J. William Hart. The jury was told that the ranch and department, if they take charge of a boy who they should know is likely to damage property,

must exercise reasonable care to prevent that damage from occurring.

The jury deliberated for nearly 10 hours before reaching its decision. At midnight, the calls went out to lawyers and court personnel that the verdict was ready.

The attorneys returned to the courthouse with ties loosened, nervously joking. They listened to the verdict, but showed little emotion.

"I knew going in that the jury was going to struggle with the fact that here's this family and they did have some uninsured losses," Jones said.

Later Thursday, juvenile officials said they would continue watching the case.

"I was afraid ... it would have a really chilling effect on foster parents," said William Abbott, the department's regional director. "But I'm always surprised at how folks are willing to take those risks."

The trial would have been more devastating if the jury awarded

punitive damages, Abbott said, although the department and private providers like the ranch and foster parents will have to wait and see how insurance companies react.

"There's ... probably a certainty that the Youth Ranch's insurance would increase," Abbott said.

Schenk's attorney Cole says those arguments are simply an attempt to influence the public.

"I don't think it has anything to do with foster homes," Cole said. "That's nothing more than a tactic by the defense to try to influence the jury to try to give the defense a favorable verdict as far as the ranch is concerned."

The legal principle that a person taking charge of a dangerous individual must properly supervise that person dates back to England, Cole said.

"What they're really asking the public to do is protect them from that exposure at the public's peril," he said.

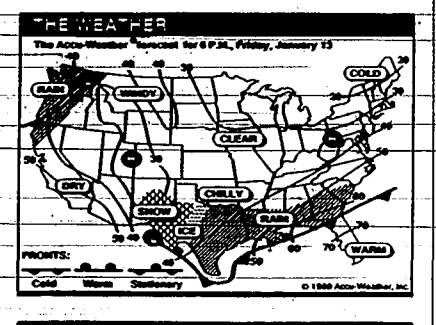

Summary: The National Weather Service says high pressure was the rule over Idaho Thursday, but a new storm system was moving the West Coast.

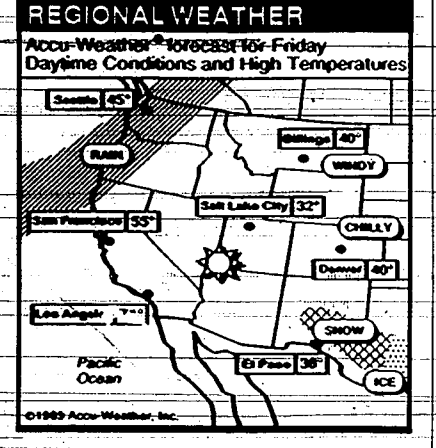

Mid-afternoon temperatures were coldest in the southeast. Idaho Falls had only reached 8 degrees and Malad 14. The north was hit hardest with readings in the mid 20s to low 40s. Upper 20s and lower 30s were common in the southwest. Lewiston was the warmest location with 42 degrees.

"As we investigated further, we discovered more and more problems," Wonderlich said.

Public Safety Director Tim Qualls said detectives are investigating allegations of forgery and embezzlement, but declined further comment.

Twin Falls County Prosecutor K. Ellen Baxter said police have contacted her office about the investigation, but no charges have been filed.

Three INEL employees had previously declined comment Thursday, saying all questions would have to be directed to Wonderlich.

Board members for the private, not-for-profit organization called a special meeting Dec. 28 to discuss the matter, Wonderlich said. A vote was taken to fire the employee, and Wonderlich contacted authorities soon thereafter.

derlich said. In addition to studying the organization's accounts, the auditors will be asked to recommend procedures for preventing future embezzlement.

"There were steps and procedures put in before," Wonderlich said, but that employee wasn't following them.

Wonderlich said he and other board members are "obviously concerned" about the investigation's effect on the public image of United Way, which relies on public donations.

"I think that the board is doing everything that they can do to prevent this from happening again — otherwise we wouldn't be going through the procedures audit and that type of thing," he said.

The allegations mark the third time this week that suspected embezzlement has made the news. Police are investigating the alleged embezzlement of up to \$7,000 in city funds by a city finance department employee, and a Filer woman was charged Wednesday with embezzling more than \$1,600 from the Twin Falls law firm of Paine & Pica.

Symms said he would support Watkins in the energy post, but a Symms spokesman said he was "disappointed" that Johnson was not Bush's choice.

"He would have been great for Idaho and great for the United States," said spokesman Bill Jarrell. "Symms thought Peter was the best qualified person in the country for that position."

Rep. Larry Craig, R-Idaho, also said he was disappointed that Johnson was not tapped for the post, but a spokesman for the congressman said that "he's excited to work with Admiral Watkins."

"We in Idaho are closely monitoring nuclear projects and the INEL," said David Fish, a spokesman for Craig. "They do offer wonderful benefits, but Congressman Craig wants to make sure that we can guarantee our safety and pay attention to any necessary clean up projects in Idaho and in the nation."

After Bush's announcement, Watkins outlined his own "most urgent" list for the incoming Energy secretary.

"His first priority must be to reestablish the credibility of the nuclear weapons complex, but in doing that it is my hope that he does not overlook the opportunities that exist in the department to begin improving our environment," Johnson said.

"That's more important in the long term than solving what to me is an operational problem in weapons production," he said, adding that he has no immediate plans to return to the energy sector.

"I'm reading libraries of background information and thinking strategy in many areas," Johnson said. "Now I'm just going to sit back and reflect and put my thoughts together. This has been an intense period and I need to sit back and do some reflecting."

Judge allows screening to proceed

BOISE (AP) — U.S. District Judge Marion Callister has rejected a move to block temporarily a federal program aimed at screening potential nursing home patients for mental illness or retardation. At a hearing Thursday in Boise, Callister denied a request to stop enforcement of the program while Idaho nursing home operators figure out how to comply with his requirement that patients receive initial screening within 15 days after admission. "I think the program is not unreasonable the way it's set up now," the judge said. The Idaho Health Care Association, the Idaho Hospital Association and several individual nursing homes filed suit last month challenging the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services program.

Officers keep looking for armed men

SANDPOINT (AP) — Bonner County sheriff's deputies and search dogs resumed their hunt Thursday for two armed men who fled a home Wednesday night after wounding one person in an apparent botched burglary. The men exchanged gunfire with deputies as they fled in an auto, then on foot, authorities said. Details were sketchy, but the sheriff's department said the incident began when deputies responded to a burglary alarm about 9:30 p.m. Wednesday at the home just outside Sandpoint. Authorities determined the intruders were still inside the house and ordered back up, according to reports. The men apparently briefly took three people in the home hostage. One of the hostages was shot, after which the intruders decided to attempt to flee, authorities said.

Council member charged with abuse

GARDEN CITY (AP) — A veteran member of the Garden City Council and local business man has been charged with two counts of child sexual abuse. William Claiborne, 59, was arraigned on the charges Thursday and released on \$5,000 bond. Authorities said he was arrested late Wednesday at his home on charges of having sexual relations with a 12-year-old girl at times between October and December 1988.

Travel council targets urban families

BOISE (AP) — A new advertising campaign by the Idaho Travel Council has targeted young urban families. The council on Wednesday unveiled five full-color ads contrasting Idaho's laid-back, lifestyle with the stress of big-city life. One ad headlined "Rush Hour" shows rafters paddling into white water, while another links "High Rise" with the peaks of the Sawtooth Mountains. The ads will appear next month in the regional editions of 20 magazines.

Developer will sue Boise agency

BOISE (AP) — The Reno, Nev., developer who sought to build a hotel in downtown Boise said Wednesday that he intends to sue the city's redevelopment agency for negotiating in bad faith. But Contek Inc. President Mike Nesser, whose 60-day exclusive contract with the Capital City Development Corp. was voided Tuesday, said he would sue the agency for bad faith if he receives compensation for the money he has already put into the project. CDC board member Brent Coles said the agency, which terminated the agreement saying it was disappointed with Contek's failure to interest Howard Johnson in the estimate \$16 million project, would not negotiate with Nesser. Nesser is crying over spilled milk, Coles said.

Foundation contributes to Greenbelt

BOISE (AP) — The Larry Barnes Charitable Foundation has donated \$77,000 to the city of Boise for construction on the Boise River Greenbelt. The money will pay for completion of a section of the Greenbelt between Municipal Park and Warm Springs Golf Course, said Boise Parks System Director Jack Cooper. The donation will also fund a path leading from Warm Springs Avenue through a proposed 23-acre park.

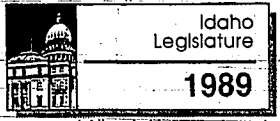
Extradition waived in child abuse case

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A woman accused with her husband of leaving their retarded and battered 7-year-old son at an Idaho rest stop last week waived extradition Thursday on a felony charge of child abandonment. Deborah Tuinman, 28, appeared before 3rd Circuit Judge Michael Hutchings, who dismissed a Utah charge of that of someone that would have held up her return to Idaho, said Deputy Salt Lake County Attorney Ralph Crockett. Her husband, Edward Donald Tuinman, 29, did not appear in court, and Crockett said he did not know if Tuinman also would waive extradition to Idaho on the same charge. Ada County Sheriff Vaughn Killen in Boise said he had not received official notification of the waiver, but said Mrs. Tuinman likely would be transported to Idaho within a few days. The Tuinmans' son, Eddy, was found by a truck driver at a rest stop on Interstate 84 east of Boise on Jan. 4. He was clad only in a T-shirt, and authorities said a medical examination revealed bruises, cigarette burns and old, healed fractures. Doctors said the boy, who weighed 44 pounds, was developmentally disabled and unable to speak. Mrs. Tuinman, clad in blue jail garb and handcuffed, appeared with public defender Mark Moffat, who said his client was voluntarily waiving the right to a removal hearing. Asked by the judge if she understood the implications of the waiver, Mrs. Tuinman replied, "Yes, your honor." Crockett said Idaho authorities would have 10 days in which to come and pick up Mrs. Tuinman from the Salt Lake County Jail, where she and her husband were being held without bail.

Give and take begins over state's budget

BOISE (AP) — Administration point men on Thursday began detailing Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus' ambitious 1990 budget blueprint as members of the Republican-majority raised questions about some of its components. Budget Director Chuck Moss reassured the budget-writing Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee that the \$7.634-billion spending plan was based on a solid financial foundation. Meantime, the administration's chief economist, Michael Ferguson, explained to the Joint Revenue-Projection Committee just how the governor arrived at his optimistic revenue forecast.



"We've looked at some revenue projections through 1991—we have not over-matched spending," Moss said. The focal point of the governor's proposed 9-percent hike in spending for the year beginning July 1 has been repeal of the \$12-million business investment tax credit with the money earmarked for school improvements. Leaders in the House, where such a bill must start, have given little chance to passage of the repeal, which would finance nearly a third of the unprecedented \$37.6-million increase Andrus has proposed in state aid to schools. The improvement money is in addition to a 7-percent hike in teacher salaries proposed by the

governor and follows legislative complaints that too much state aid goes for salaries and not enough for direct classroom improvements. State Schools Superintendent Jerry Evans wanted the fund to finance only non-pay-hike expenditures. Senate Finance Committee member Jerry Twigg, R-Blackfoot, raised the salary issue again with Moss, citing a statement by Andrus in his budget message that suggested a district could still use the improvement money for teacher pay if it wanted. "Although the possibility of improvement money going to salaries was mentioned last by the governor, Moss acknowledged that Andrus 'did not restrict that \$12 million in any manner. It is up to the local school district to decide.' The three classes of pay increases included in the governor's budget — 7 percent for teachers, 5.5 percent for college faculty and 4.5 percent for other state workers — drew some criticism from House Appropriations Chairman Kathleen

Gurnsey, R-Boise, who suggested the plan was inequitable. But administration budget analyst Larry Schlicht said the basic 4.5 percent pay hike was a scaled-back version of the recommendation from the Personnel Commission, whose salary analysis showed state workers on average were being paid about 7 percent less than their private sector counterparts. The additional 1-percent equity increase for college faculty was based on the commission's findings that faculty members are being paid about 8 percent less than their counterparts in other states, and the 2.5-percent equity boost for teachers was prompted by the commission finding that they were 20 percent behind national average pay. But Schlicht also acknowledged that under the governor's pay-line increase for state workers, nearly 1,200 employees would get no pay raise. He said 7,500 would get a 5-percent pay hike while the remaining 400 would get 10 percent.

A year ago, Andrus recommended a 4-percent across-the-board pay raise for state workers, but that plan was rejected by lawmakers because it would have distorted the state employee pay system, a system some critics claim has never worked properly anyway because the Legislature has never put enough money into it each year.

Andrus renominates Andrus Republicans

BOISE (AP) — Three of the four Republicans for Andrus' rejected state appointments by the GOP-controlled state Senate a year ago because they backed the Democratic governor have been resubmitted for confirmation to different offices. Former Republican gubernatorial candidate Larry Jackson, Betty Lou Donnelly of Boise, and Twin Falls businessman Marvin Aslett were among 40 appointments Gov. Cecil Andrus submitted to the Senate on Thursday. All the appointments have already taken office subject to Senate confirmation because they were named to their posts after lawmakers adjourned last spring. Jackson, who served four terms in the House and two as Appropriations Committee chairman,

was named to the Industrial Commission a month ago, a job that carries a \$47,000-a-year salary. He was appointed to the state Tax Commission in August 1987 but was ousted from that job within weeks after the 1988 legislative session convened. Then-Senate President Pro Tem James Risch led what partisans admitted was a retaliatory attack for Jackson's support of Andrus in the 1986 campaign. Republicans based their opposition to Jackson on grounds that historically the four-member Tax Commission has been politically split with two seats to each party. They claimed naming a nominal Republican like Jackson to one of the GOP seats denied the party its deserved representation. The same claim was made for Donnelly, who was named to the Judicial Council, and Aslett,

who was named to the Transportation Board. This time around, Andrus appointed Donnelly to the Building Authority and Aslett to the Racing Commission. The new Senate President Pro Tem, Michael Crapo of Idaho Falls, indicated several weeks ago there should be no controversy over the Jackson appointment this year, especially since Jackson would join a three-member Industrial Commission that has one Democrat and one Republican. In assigning the appointment for committee consideration on Thursday, the Senate leadership decided to bypass its policy that would normally have sent the appointment to the Commerce and Labor Committee and diverted Jackson's confirmation proceedings to the leadership-controlled State Affairs Committee.

Study: Consolidation requires incentives

BOISE (AP) — A task force study indicates "serious financial incentives will be needed if any Idaho school districts are to be encouraged to consolidate, Idaho Schools Superintendent Jerry Evans says. Evans, in an appearance before the House Education Committee Thursday, said he has prepared four possible consolidation incentives and will bring them before the Legislature if there is any interest. A 19-member task force last year studied the issue of whether Idaho's

115 school districts should consolidate for efficiency and improved classroom opportunities. It's a subject which has been much discussed with little action in recent sessions of the Legislature. Evans said the study committee itself had many arguments over consolidation, but concluded there would be little enthusiasm for it unless financial incentives were provided. Evans said he would propose that if two or more districts consolidate, each will continue to receive, for sev-

years, the same financial support they would have received if separate. But in response to a question from Rep. Ernest Hale, R-Burley, Evans said any districts which have consolidated before the law went into effect would not benefit from it. The school chief also proposed that for up to 15 years, the state should reimburse the interest on any bond with the district which authorized it.

Lottery statute allows too many secrets

Do you think the people of Idaho should be able to get public audits of the books of lottery operations? That contracts for "major procurements" by the state from lottery companies ought to be open to scrutiny? That the criminal history and judicial disciplinary actions for any lottery game retailer should be known?

Well, if you think Idaho's new lottery law provides for public scrutiny of such matters, you better read the statute. These items, and a few others, are specifically exempt from Idaho's open records law.

Peppered through the new law is one secrecy provision after another; the effect of which is to effectively hide key elements of the coming lottery operations from public scrutiny.

This may not look like a problem today. After all, the lottery legislation is hardly in place. It isn't always easy to envision a problem in an industry with which Idahoans have had limited experience.

But we will make a flat-out prediction that if so-called casino and "charitable" game gambling and Indian reservation bingo come to pass in Idaho, that there will be corruption and theft. That is the history of these kinds of activities in many other states and there is nothing in place so far to prevent it here.

The Idaho Legislature could remedy this situation. Tight controls of casino, charitable and reservation gambling are needed; indeed, an outright ban would be ideal. We think the people of Idaho voted to approve a simple lottery, not the spin-offs.

Beyond that, the Legislature should look closely at the law enacted last year and close the loopholes in public accountability which now exist.

There is no reason, in our view, that the audits of lottery companies should be exempt from public scrutiny. Nor is there any reason that the past criminal histories of game retailers should be closed.

To hide these things is to give the lottery industry an open door to conduct their business in a state with little, if any, curbs which the light of public accountability would bring.

Not everyone, of course, wants this kind of scrutiny. The lottery legislation had a lot of input last year from lottery industry lobbyists, one of whom, Brian Donesley of Boise, was elected to the state Senate this past fall. Any bets on where he will stand if others try to strengthen the accounting procedures in the bill?

But the whole Legislature is really at fault on this one, for both approving a bill which has enormous loopholes and for creating a climate by past actions in which if a special interest wants to seal up its records, it can do so.

Since an Idaho Supreme Court ruling several years ago, numerous Idaho agencies have gotten the Legislature to write privacy restrictions into the laws governing their records.

The trend has affected, for example, indigency proceedings of the Health and Welfare Department and pension records of the state retirement system. A new proposal this year would effectively seal all records involving sexual assaults.

In each case, the proponents of secrecy argue about the sensitive nature of the material and they often cite the prying presence of the media as a more serious danger, usually without specific examples.

But each closure of a record brings a price of public accountability. In the case of the lottery statute, the loopholes are large, indeed. Anyone who thinks those loopholes won't be used should think about the relationship between gambling and uncontrolled access to large amounts of money.

"For all of our best religious and spiritual traditions in the human family to carry the same supportive message: We are not alone in this struggle for the recreation of our own lives and the life of our community."

"It has long been written and known that those who choose to struggle for the life of the Earth and its beings are part of an ageless, pulsating membrane of light that is filled with the lives, hopes and beatific visions of all who have fought on—held on—loved well—and gone on before us."

"For this task is too magnificent to be carried by us alone; in our houses; in our meeting; in our organizations, in our generation, in our lifetime."

Now the grand and urgent challenge returns to us: Perhaps now, during this year in which our Earth has been singled out as an "endangered planet," we are prepared us never before to hear the authentic voice, to catch the perpetually developing vision, to join the endless searching way.

Hospital board lacks trustworthiness

I reviewed the Jan. 12 article "Board Chairman Seeks to Improve Hospital Image" and remain frustrated that County Hospital Board members and perhaps even the county commissioners have still failed to discover why "they" and not the community have placed themselves in a less-than-trustworthy position.

I couldn't agree more with the new hospital board chairman, Ben Katz, regarding the quality of health care in Twin Falls County.

Yes, we do have two fine community hospitals and a team of the best physicians one could find anywhere. And, yes we need to support them, encourage them and trust that they will treat us according to excellent standards of medical practice which include timely referrals to outside specialists and outside facilities when necessary.

But, when one discovers that the hospital administration, hospital board and county commissioners are less than forthcoming in their communications with the tax base of Twin Falls County, and in fact continue to portray that we are "dumb" while they are "smart," how can they expect our sincere support?

When they tell us they are going bankrupt, want to restructure to prevent going so and have 15-20 percent net profits per year and have stockpiled \$20 million without complying with Idaho county budget and county hospital law; then just two years after restructuring was turned down by

the voters they can pay cash for an expansion feasibility study and construct a beautiful new addition onto the east side of the hospital which includes a new main entrance, new admitting, new cancer treatment center (now double in size) and new X-ray technology called MRI; and they wonder why there is community distrust?

And, when one reads the board minutes, April 7, 1986, which state "That the hospital board approve the expansion of the home health department to include durable medical equipment and that an offer be made to purchase the durable medical equipment inventory of a local firm. Motion carried unanimously" and the Oct. 7, 1985, minutes which state "The executive committee approved the recommendation of the marketing committee to implement an outpatient pharmacy program."

Following explanation of the program and discussion it was moved and seconded that the outpatient pharmacy program be approved as outlined. Motion carried unanimously.

And when both the hospital and new board chairman refer that these board actions exist at their recent appearance on KMYT's Views, how do they expect our trust?

After all this, isn't it amazing that even I still

continue to turn my body over to them for deep anesthesia, major surgery, and a week's stay in the comfort of these squeaky-clean white sheets.

But I project that 1989 will be the year that the hospital board realizes its shortcomings. It will be a year that the board, with three new board members, finally realizes that the hospital's success and image depends on the integrity of their decisions and the impact of those decisions on the tax base.

They will think twice before implementing a new service already being provided by the tax base, and they may close down certain outpatient services that make little profit and were implemented long after private enterprise had already established a precedent of providing those services.

This new board will learn to weigh the goals and objectives of Hospital Corporation of America with the goals and objectives of the residents of Twin Falls County.

There will be fewer rush votes, fewer unannounced votes, and much, much more communication with the taxpayers of Twin Falls County.

And, I predict a good year for Twin Falls County health care. May God Bless as we work together.

High winds cause havoc in Southern California

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Santa Ana winds gusting to 100 mph destroyed a blimp, shut down an airport, toppled trucks, fanned a brush fire and cut power to thousands of customers in Southern California, officials said Thursday.

The Airships Inc. blimp, used by the Pepsi Cola Co. to promote a soft drink, was moored at Ontario International Airport when the desert winds struck Wednesday night, reducing it to tatters and leaving little more than its nose cone attached to an anchor pole.

Its gondola lay on its side about 30 yards away and the surrounding tarmac was littered with debris.

The 14,617-pound airship was the nation's largest, said Pepsi spokesman Todd McKenzie. His last appearance was at the Jan. 2 Rose Bowl in Pasadena.

"It was torn to shreds," said Beatrice Martinez, public relations secretary at the Ontario airport, about 40 miles east of Los Angeles.

The airport closed all runways because of blowing debris Wednesday evening, but the terminal reopened Thursday with limited operations. Airport manager Michael DiGirolamo said many airlines chose not to take off or land in the high winds.

"Passengers at the terminal" were "resigned to the fact they aren't going anywhere right away," he said.

The Santa Ana winds — also called "devil winds" — are spun off by high pressure over the interior of the country, picking up speed as they move from Southern California's deserts through mountain passes and roar down on adjacent communities.

At a large truck stop east of the airport, some 2,000 truck drivers and campers waited for the winds to die down, said Lance Davis, general manager of Truck Stops of America in Ontario. He said at midmorning that at least 700 trucks were parked outside the truck stop's three restau-

rants. The National Weather Service said the winds would fade Friday.

Elsewhere, a downed power line was blamed for a brush fire that charred 200 acres in Orange County, said county Fire Department Capt. Hugh Madlock.

The fire in Trabuco Canyon, about 45 miles southeast of Los Angeles, briefly threatened expensive homes before being surrounded by midnight. Madlock said the high winds aggravated the 200 firefighters' efforts.

Walsh content with North charges

WASHINGTON (AP) — Independent counsel Lawrence Walsh said Thursday he believes the remaining charges against Oliver L. North are so narrowly drawn that the former presidential aide can be tried without national security concerns becoming an issue.

The government's case no longer depends on proving that the proceeds of the Iranian arms sales constituted government property, or that by diverting those proceeds to the Contras, North embezzled them, Walsh said in a court filing.

Walsh outlined the prosecution's legal theory of the case against North in the event conspiracy and theft charges against the fired National Security Council aide are dropped, as expected.

The remaining charges, which focus largely on the cover-up of various aspects of the Iran-Contra affair, "are narrowly circumscribed" and "the classified information problems affecting the conspiracy and theft counts should no longer be at issue," Walsh said in the court filing.

Walsh's view differs sharply with that of North's attorney Brendan Sullivan. Last Thursday, Sullivan

said that "classified information pervades the remaining charges as well."

Walsh also said that the government need not establish North's motives for committing acts such as destroying and altering documents and misrepresenting his activities to Congress.

Walsh said North may attempt to bring classified information into the case by saying that he had covered up because superiors directed him to or because everything he did was "authorized and perfectly legal." In neither approach should North be permitted to bring up classified information, said Walsh.

On Monday, however, U.S. Dis-

trict Judge Gerhard Gesell said that while motive does not determine guilt or innocence under the law, North does have the right to show that the activities he sought to cover up were not illegal. North might then seek to bring in some of the same classified information that led to Walsh abandoning the conspiracy and theft charges.

"No doubt North's motives were mixed," said Walsh. "To cover up activities in support of the Contras which the Congress might protest, to cover up prior lies, to avoid political embarrassment to the administration or to avoid political embarrassment to the administration; or to avoid charges of illegality."

Marines pay tribute to Reagan

ANDREWS AIR FORCE BASE, Md. (AP) — The Pentagon summoned its four-star officers, the Marine Band and a 21-gun salute to stage an elaborate ceremony Thursday for a departing commander-in-chief, but kept the cost a military secret.

With Marines in camouflage battle dress standing by under the wing of an Air Force strategic bomber, President Reagan, the military commander-in-chief, received a farewell salute from the nation's armed forces and told the men and women in uniform: "You are America's pride."

At the ceremony in a new hangar built for the next Air Force One, the presidential aircraft, Reagan stood misty-eyed as the Marine Band, after playing the traditional Marine Hymn, followed with a rendition of "Auld Lang Syne."

The unusual review was to have been held outdoors and include flyovers of 17 aircraft from all the services plus the Coast Guard. It was forestalled by a chilly rain. The flyovers were called off.

The cost of the patriotic farewell was as elusive as a military secret. The Pentagon had said Wednesday that it could not estimate the cost "at this time" and would not count the expense of aircraft personnel in any event.

Since the fly-by is being conducted using normal operational flying training hours, no additional costs will be incurred by the services, the Pentagon said. "Funding of the salute will be absorbed by each of the services," it added.

First lady Nancy Reagan was also invited but stayed home because of

laryngitis that has dogged her since before she and the president returned from a California vacation on Jan. 5.

Reagan told the estimated 1,400 government officials, members of the armed services and other guests

that the first lady, "who unfortunately is ill and has no voice, tried to get up and get here and I sent her back to bed."

The 45-minute ceremony began with the firing of a 21-gun salute outside the hangar.

Officials arrest alleged nerve gas smuggler

NEWARK, N.J. (AP) — A Korean-American businessman was arrested Thursday in an alleged international conspiracy to buy nerve-gas bombs for exportation from the United States, possibly to Iran, officials said.

Juwhan Yun, 48, of Short Hills, was accused in a federal complaint of conspiring to violate the Arms Export Control Act by seeking to ship the nerve gas sarin, a highly toxic gas that attacks the central nervous system, quickly causing convulsions and death.

"It was a wide-ranging, trans-Atlantic conspiracy," said First U.S. Assistant Attorney Michael Chertoff.

The arrest came the same day the West German government reversed itself and said it suspected that West German companies helped build a Libyan plant that the United States believes is for manufacturing chemical weapons.

The turnaround followed the arrest Wednesday night of a Belgian shipper tied to the case and confirmation by Libya that West German firms aided the project. Libya says the plant is for producing medicine.

In the New Jersey case, Chertoff added that at one point in the dealings with Yun, the purported destination was Iran but that this had not been verified.

Yun negotiated with an undercover customs agent posing as an arms dealer to buy 500 quarter-ton bombs that use sarin, said Richard Mercier, special agent in charge of the U.S. Customs Service's office in Newark.

Mercier described the gas as a very rapid, odorless, colorless poison which can enter the body by inhalation, absorption or injection.

Yun was arrested after his wife dropped him off at U.S. Customs offices in Newark, where Yun believed he was to meet the undercover arms dealer, Mercier said.

City: Employee confesses theft; audit requested

TWIN FALLS - The city has requested an independent audit of a utilities service fund after a city employee admitted to taking money, city officials say.

City officials on Thursday asked Seamons, Bancroft, Smith & Cook, P.C., to audit the fund, which is missing as much as \$7,000. The accounting firm does the city's yearly audits. City Attorney Fritz Wonderlich said.

Finance Director Rick Thompson has also completed a set of "internal control" guidelines to be followed by city employees who

handle cash to discourage embezzling. Meaningful police are continuing their investigation, Wonderlich said. City Councilman Rick Carr has said that hundreds of \$25 water hookup deposits were siphoned from the utilities fund over a period as long as 18 months.

Wonderlich said one utilities service employee in an office of four workers was fired after admitting to taking money. No charges have been filed; and none will be until the audit that will begin next week is completed, Wonderlich said.

He declined to name the former employee while the investigation is continuing.

"We're not aware of any other person involved," Wonderlich said. Robert D. Thurston, the auditing firm's auditor that had nothing to do with this incident, Wonderlich said.

The guidelines are listed in a memorandum that says that all locks in City Hall and safe combinations were changed and access to the safes limited to three people.

New rules include:

- Utility deposits must be deposited in the bank the day after receiving them.
- Two employees must verify amounts of money deposited each day and initial deposit envelopes.
- The assistant treasurer will compare

weekly deposit statements with total deposits made during the week.

- Refunded deposits will be returned to customers by check instead of applying them to customer accounts.
- Employees will be trained in all facets of the front desk so they can be rotated on an unscheduled basis.

"I believe these internal control changes will strengthen the overall controls for cash handling and accountability," Thompson wrote in the memorandum.

Wonderlich said the proposed guidelines will be presented to the City Council for its approval.

City of Rocks gets facilities

BOISE - Although national funding remains uncertain, some progress is being made to help Oakley's Silent City of Rocks cope with an onslaught of users.

A \$60,000 National Park Service grant received last summer will pay for wells, restroom equipment and signs (this summer at the City of Rocks, state Parks and Recreation Department Director Yvonne Ferrell told Magic Valley legislators Thursday. The grant will also cover the costs of fencing rocks that still bear the names and dates of Oregon Trail pioneers who marked their passage with axle-grease on the sides of the towering rocks.

The state plans to station a ranger at the City of Rocks this summer to cope with problems park aides have lacked the expertise to handle. Climbing on rocks with axle-grease markings and off-road driving have been problems, Ferrell said.

The first \$35,000 of the grant was kept by the Park Service for an archaeological survey that should be finished in May.

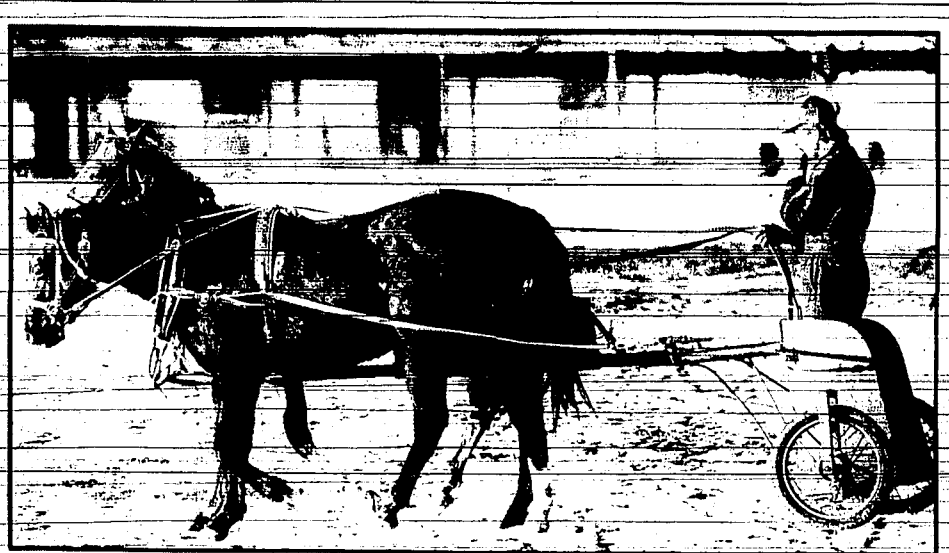
The state has contacted the owners of the six largest pieces of privately owned property within the 14,320-acre proposed reserve to arrange appraisals, Ferrell said. Five of them have agreed to allow the appraisals, although one of those has indicated he has no interest in selling.

The Nature Conservancy, a non-profit environmental group, has offered to purchase options on the land, which the National Park Service lacks the money to purchase.

No National Park Service officials were able to attend the legislative briefing, but Ferrell said they were working on hiring a staff person to work on the fossil bed and Oakley projects.

At the end of the last congressional session, federal leg-

Companies contend DWR should protect water rights

Canal companies want Water Resources Department to act

TWIN FALLS - It is the job of the state Department of Water Resources and its director to protect existing water rights, say three Magic Valley canal companies.

The Twin Falls Canal Co., the North Side Canal Co. and the American Falls Reservoir District last week withdrew petitions they had filed with the department to protect a 1900 water right.

"It seemed silly to continue with our fight on the dirt board, when it's something the director should do," said John Rosholt, attorney for the companies.

Petitions filed by the canal companies sought to enlarge Water District 1 to include groundwater users or to place a moratorium

on any new permits to pump groundwater.

The petitions were an effort by the companies to attract the attention of state water officials, Rosholt said. State law gives the department's director the power to do exactly what the petitions sought.

The petitions were filed when the companies perceived a threat to their water right, but the flows to which they are entitled have not diminished, Rosholt said. But when the companies realized that the state was about to begin issuing permits again after five-year moratorium mandated by the Swan-Falls Agreement, they became worried about "too" applications to pump groundwater.

Those applications sought to appropriate a total of 800 cubic feet per second of water in eastern Idaho from an area the companies believe feeds springs at American Falls.

Those springs make up a substantial portion of the company's water right.

Rosholt said the state needs to gather information about recharge rates of groundwater in eastern Idaho, upstream from Milner Dam, and it needs to determine if that water is, in fact, part of the flow that makes up the canal companies' water right.

"To have all the information available to do that in a system so vast is a tall order," said Glen Saxton, chief of the department's water allocation bureau.

"It is almost impossible to determine if a water right is being threatened without that information, Saxton said. The state does not have the information.

The law states: "... the director of the department of water resources shall also have the power, ... whenever it is determined that

any area has a groundwater supply which affects the flow of water in any stream or streams in an organized water district, to incorporate such area in said water district."

The director also may "suspend the issuance or further action on permits or applications as necessary to protect existing vested water rights ..."

The state constitution, however, says the right to appropriate unappropriated water shall not be denied.

The canal companies contend that there is no usable unappropriated water in the Upper Snake River system, Rosholt said. The state has reached the limit of its water resource, and there is a lot of competition for that resource, he said. But the canal companies have one of the oldest water rights on the eastern part of the Snake River. It is dated 1900.

Withdrawal of the petition has relieved some of the tension among eastern Idaho irrigators, said Richard Smith, Rexburg attorney, farmer and spokesman for a loose organization of irrigators potentially affected by the petitions.

Smith agreed with Rosholt that the petitions really weren't necessary, and that state law provides for the protection of vested water rights. The real issue is not a battle between upstream and downstream irrigators, but whether or not the canal companies' water right is actually threatened and how that threat is determined, Smith said.

The farmers are continuing their effort to organize in anticipation of the water rights issue resurfacing and to face other future problems, Smith said.

Chamber's Kent Just predicts growth

Hagerman debates larger impact area

HAGERMAN - Residents outside the city limits of Hagerman don't agree about the need to be under city control.

City, and county officials are proposing an increase of the Hagerman impact area and residents living there would come under city control.

About 70 people attended a Gooding County Planning and Zoning public hearing this week in Hagerman to discuss the issue.

Those favoring the expansion argued that extending the impact zone would help ensure control of growth occurring in the area. Those opposed said they didn't like the idea that they would be under city control but couldn't vote for council members because they would still be outside the city limits.

County Commissioner Bob Tapper said at least one more hearing, maybe two or three, will be held before the commissioners make a decision on the expansion.

Joyce Scanlon, administrator of the Gooding County Planning and Zoning Commission, said the next public hearing on this issue is tentatively set for 8 p.m. Jan. 25 at the Hagerman Senior Citizens Center.

This will also be the commission's regular monthly meeting, she said. Use of the senior center has not been confirmed.

Those favoring the expansion said city administration of additional land around Hagerman would provide necessary control over growth there.

Gene Loranger said the existing impact zone is too small. "A mile around Hagerman would not be unreasonable," he said. "Control should be closer to home." Loranger lives southwest of Hagerman near the site of a proposed open pit gravel mining operation recently denied by county officials.

Sigrid Veennendaal, a resident of the existing impact zone north of Hagerman, also favors expanding the impact area. Veennendaal said she is from California and has seen the consequences of uncontrolled growth.

The local fossil beds national monument will bring an influx of people, she predicted. "It's not going to happen overnight but as a city we need to be ready for it," Veennendaal said. "We would just like to see the town develop in some kind of a logical and cohesive way for everyone."

Others speaking for the expansion were Gordon Dahlgren, Richard Upiano, Ed Shokal, Jerry Veennendaal

Computer glitch fouls tax forms

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Tax Commission says a computer error was to blame for approximately 20,000 Idaho residents receiving non-resident state income tax forms in the mail last month.

The mistake will cost the agency \$6,000 to \$7,000 in additional postage to mail correct forms. But the commission expects to have enough resident returns on hand to avoid an extra printing.

Commission spokesman Steve Miller said the state's computer pro-

gram for printing mailing labels "got out of sync a little bit" when it was determining who should get resident forms and who should get the special forms for nonresident tax returns.

"We've had about a 100 phone calls from throughout the state from people who received the wrong forms," Miller said. "It's going to take us a few days to find out exactly how many residents received the wrong form, but it should not be any higher than 20,599."

If it does go higher, Miller said, the

commission will have to print additional resident forms, known as Form 40.

"It's definitely our problem but we think we have enough forms on hand to handle it," so the "only extra cost" will be the additional postage, he said.

The commission has corrected the computer glitch that caused the problem, but Miller said the nonresident tax forms mailed out by mistake cannot be recovered.

FERC denies hydro proposal

ELK RIVER (AP) — Federal authorities have revoked a Lewiston developer's application for a license to build a hydroelectric dam at Elk Creek Falls.

Unless Hy-Tech Inc. appeals the decision within 30 days, the controversial project is dead.

The Federal Energy Regulatory Commission now has tried twice to kill the 7-year-old licensing request from Richard Sigismonti, managing general partner of Hy-Tech.

FERC issued an initial application in August 1987 after Sigismonti claimed that a dam above northern Idaho's tallest waterfall would clash with the

surrounding recreational area.

But Sigismonti appealed, and his license application was reinstated by the agency in March 1988. In granting the appeal, federal authorities gave Hy-Tech six months to resolve a dispute with the Clearwater National Forest, which opposed the project.

Sigismonti was required to file an amendment to the license application by last Nov. 25, including changes in the project designed to appease the Forest Service.

"We did not do that," said Sharon Hyland, a FERC spokeswoman. "They filed some sort of letter on Dec. 2, but it was just a copy of an-

old letter they had filed back in October 1987."

The dismissal of the application is based on their failure to file by the deadline and it is not a decision whether the project would be inconsistent with the Elk Creek Falls Recreational Area, she said.

Fred Springer, director of hydroelectric project licensing for the commission, dismissed Hy-Tech's license application Monday. The company was until Feb. 8 to appeal the dismissal. "There are only two things we can do at this point: appeal it or abandon the project," said Dan Radakovich.

records show. An arrest warrant had been issued for Muncy, of Monticello, last week for the drug bust, got underway.

OGDEN, Utah — Steve Garrity provided a little showtime for the beleaguered Idaho State University Bengals late Thursday night, but his marquee value was tarnished by the Bengals' 85-77 Big-Sky Conference loss to Weber State.

Still, ISU coach Jim Boutin, whose Bengals have lost nine of their first 13 games and three in a row to start the conference season, found a little solace in Garrity's 30-point, five-rebound performance.

"We got the tremendous, incredible one-man performance out of Garrity," said Boutin. "We played with so much more confidence and so much more effort and that's the important thing — we're back."

But in the end, Weber found the Bengals' Achilles heel — rebounding — and came charging back just in time.

CSI men fall to North Idaho, 101-91

COEUR D'ALENE — Sophomore forward Kenny Johnson scored 35 points and teammate Mario Jackson added 19 here Thursday night as North Idaho College pined the first loss of the season on the College of Southern Idaho men's basketball team, 101-91.

The setback was the first in 17 games for the Eagles, ranked third by the National Junior College Athletic Association and 5-1 in Region 18. North Idaho improved to 16-3, 4-2.

"I thought we were ready to play this ballgame and we shot 55 percent in the first half," said CSI coach Fred Trenkle. "We worked so hard on the transition game, but things didn't go our way down the stretch."

The Cardinals shot a blistering 69 percent from the field in the first half, leading by as many as 21

points with 3 minutes and 20 seconds remaining. They held a 35-40 halftime lead, and didn't let CSI closer than six in the final 20 minutes.

"You give a guy 35 points, and they're going to beat you," said Trenkle of Johnson, a 6-foot, 1-inch guard from Anchorage, Alaska. "This is a guy who only averages 11."

After a shaky start, the Cardinals ripped through every defense CSI threw at them, taking their first 11-point lead with 12:35 left in the first half and expanding it thereafter.

"We never got into our transition game and defensively we couldn't stop their starters," said Trenkle.

CSI got the North Idaho advantage down to nine points twice in the final three minutes; but Jackson and Johnson combined for 11 points in that stretch to keep the Eagles at bay.

"We were about a half-step slow all night," said CSI assistant coach Steve Irons. "They just outplayed us."

The Eagles remained atop the northern division standings by one game over NIC and two games over Salt Lake Community College, pending a visit to Ricks Saturday night. The Vikings defeated Treasure Valley Community College, 87-86 in Rexburg Thursday.

"It felt so good to have the other seniors hugging you after all we've been through — the good times and the bad times," Warren said. "It's definitely the biggest win we've had."

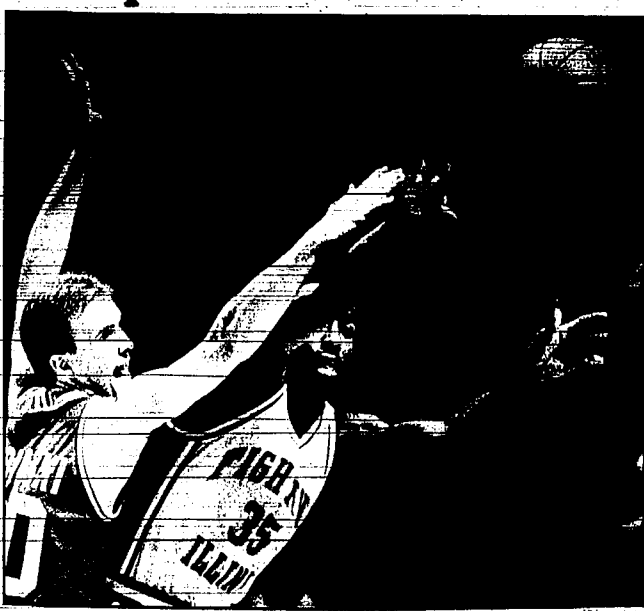

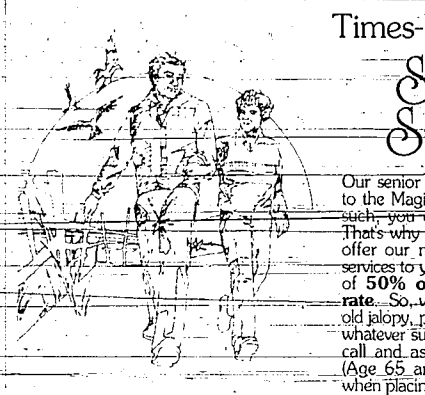

LONDON — Investigators got a first look at the engines from a crashed Boeing 737 on Thursday...

The engines from the British Midland Boeing 737-400 that crashed Sunday were removed from an embankment along a freeway near the town of Kegworth...

The plane, bound for Belfast, Northern Ireland, crashed while trying an emergency landing at the airport, killing 44 people and injuring 82.

Most of the wreckage will be reassembled at the Royal Aircraft Establishment at Farnborough...

The engines, however, will be taken to Paris for detailed inspection by the manufacturer following a preliminary inspection at East Midlands Airport...

We must await a full strip inspection of both engines. That's most important," Trimble said.

On Wednesday, the Civil Aviation Authority ordered British airlines using Boeing 737s and Airbus A320s equipped with the U.S.-French CFM56 engine to inspect the fire and vibration warning systems for "left-right sense."

Rescuers pull 6 men from quake's rubble

MOSCOW — Six men were rescued from the rubble of a nine-story apartment building in Leninakan 35 days after the Armenian earthquake buried them in a small, dark cellar stocked with canned goods...

Lordanian said, passing information from survivor Alkiaz Akopyan and Akopyan's sister, who met him as he emerged from the ruins.

The men were found Wednesday, weeks after authorities gave up searching for survivors of the Dec. 7 quake that killed 25,000 people in northwestern Armenia.

Authorities have been using "special equipment and dogs in order to be convinced there are not people alive — as they cleared the rubble," said Yevgeny Kutovoy, the charge d'affaires at the Soviet Embassy in Washington.

As the wreckage of the apartment house was being cleared, a ray of light pierced the collapsed room where the men were trapped, and they began to shout for help.

Rescuers last pulled a person alive from the wreckage Dec. 26, Tass said. Kutovoy said searches have found 24,920 bodies in the ruins of three cities and more than 100 villages in northwest Armenia.

Swiss woman quits post with cabinet

BERN, Switzerland — The country's first woman Cabinet member resigned Thursday after a prosecutor's report said she was "strongly suspected" of leaking confidential information to her husband about a drug inquiry.

The announcement by Justice Minister Elisabeth Kopp brings to a head this nation's biggest scandal in years, known as the "Lebanon Connection."

In her statement distributed by a staff member, Mrs. Kopp said she was stepping down in the "in the interest of a quick, unconditional and comprehensive investigation."

Mrs. Kopp acknowledged for the first time that "seven days" the telephone call (to my husband) was a mistake I regret," she said

keeping her post had become "humanly and politically" impossible.

Last month, she announced she would resign at the end of February.

Defense Minister Arnold Koller, who also serves as Mrs. Kopp's deputy, assumed the Justice minister's post as caretaker until Parliament approves her successor. It is expected to do so within several weeks.

Mrs. Kopp said Wednesday she did not believe she was guilty of wrongdoing.

A prosecutor's preliminary inquiry into the leak, whose results were published Wednesday, said Mrs. Kopp was "strongly suspected of violating an official secret in warning her husband to sever ties with a company under investigation in a

W. German firms now linked to plant

BONN, West Germany — The government suspects West German companies helped build a Libyan plant that may make chemical weapons, officials said Thursday, one week after asserting to evidence existed.

The embarrassing reversal followed the arrest Wednesday night of a Belgian shipper tied to the case and confirmation by Libya that West German firms aided the project.

The United States claims the plant is intended for the manufacture of chemical weapons and Libya says it is for producing medicine.

Foreign Minister Hans-Dietrich Genscher, who told reporters a week earlier there was no proof of West German complicity, said Thursday: "There are a number of indications that evidently point in this direction."

Official spokesmen at Ost's government press bureau refused to answer questions on the controversy over the plant at Rabta, south of Tripoli.

All Treiki, Libya's U.N. ambassador, said in an interview with CBS News earlier Thursday that West Germans "did help us, not only in this plant, in other plants also."

In Belgium, the Justice Ministry said Jozef Gedopt, head of Cross Link NV of Antwerp, was arrested Wednesday night and charged with forging shipping documents for goods delivered to Libya.

A spokesman for the West German Finance Ministry said Gedopt was arrested on the basis of information provided by West Germany. He said the information was found by investigators examining seized records of I.B.I. Engineering, a defunct Frankfurt company accused of involvement.

An intelligence source said one reason for Bonn's turnaround was that connections found in the past two weeks gave new weight to investigators already had.

Shamir goes to mourn, becomes hecklers' target

BRAKHA, Occupied West Bank — Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir went to mourn a slain Jewish settler Thursday and was shouted down by hecklers who said his government has done nothing to protect them from Palestinian attackers.

Elsewhere in the West Bank and Golan Strip, army troops shot and killed 11 Lebanese and Palestinian boys and wounded 21 other people in eight separate clashes, Arab reports said.

An 18-year-old man also was reported shot in the back by a settler.

Shamir went to a traditional service of mourning 30 days after the slaying of a Jewish farmer in the occupied West Bank settlement of Brakha, 1 1/2 miles south of Nablus.

"You are doing nothing!" the crowd chanted as Shamir tried to speak. Several people also held up placards criticizing him for failing to end the 13-month Palestinian uprising.

Shamir, you don't know you are founding a Palestinian state, read one sign. Another said: "Traitor, you betrayed your comrades."

Shamir warned the settlers that unless they end the great threat to Israel and said he considered the occupied West Bank part of Israel.

One thing only can hurt our ability to stand firm: quarrels among brothers or, worse, civil war among them," he said.

"This is where the Jewish people were born, here in the wide expanses of Judea and Samaria," he said.

Libya to return pilot's body

ROME — The Libyan government said it will hand over on Friday the body of a U.S. pilot killed in the 1986 raid on Tripoli, the North African country's official news agency reported.

The body, believed to be that of Capt. Paul Lorence, was to be given to a Vatican representative.

Vatican confirmed Thursday night that the Holy See agreed to act as an intermediary in the case "for humanitarian reasons."

The official Libyan agency JANA, monitored in London and Rome, did not identify the pilot. However, JANA reported on Dec. 21 that Libyan leader Muammar Gadhafi was offering to return the body of Lorence, 31, of San Francisco.

Navarro said the papal representative in Tripoli, Mons. Giovanni Martini, would accept the body. It would likely be brought to Rome and turned over to the U.S. Embassy, he said, adding that he did not know exactly when the transfer would take place.

Lorence and Fernando Ribas-Dominici, 33, of Utuado, Puerto Rico, were in an F-111 that disappeared during the April 15, 1986 raids on Tripoli and Benghazi.

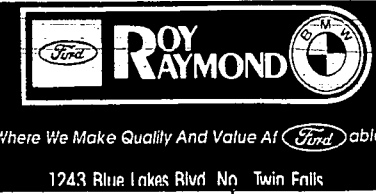
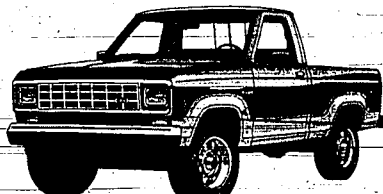

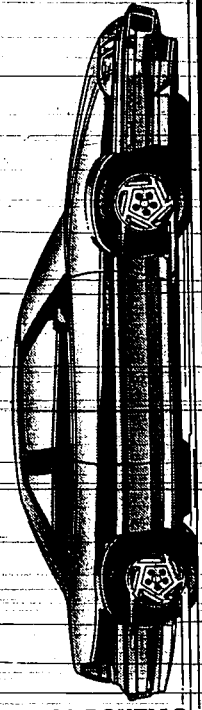

The Incurable Optimist takes every fitness in sight in his play of today's game. Failure does not weaken his optimism; he'll play the same way on the next deal unless he remembers it's Friday the 13th).
The I.O. wins the opening lead in dummy and leads a low trump, finessing when East follows low. (His play guards against K-Q-3 with East). West wins the trump queen and switches to a heart, East winning the queen when dummy ducks. Back comes a club for another losing finesse as West wins his king and leads another heart. One more finesse losses and the defenders close shop — there are no more finesses for South to take. Down one.

Four key cards proved to be offside, but there is a better way to play these cards. After winning West's diamond lead, South should lead a trump to his ace (playing for the odds-on 2-1 split). When the queen drops, South leaves the king at large and cashes two more diamonds. If he tries to finesse in hearts and clubs now he'll be no better off than before. Instead he cashes the ace of clubs and exits with the queen. Now, regardless of where the missing honors might lie, there is no way for the defenders to avoid an endplay. South will lose only a spade, a heart and a club, and he clinches 10 winners.

Traveling museum to make debut soon

Scenes of prehistoric Indians come to life with hands-on project

TWIN FALLS — A prehistoric Idaho Indian woman scrapes hair from an animal and fashions it into a leather pouch. Nearby, a group of male Indians prepares to spear a trapped mammoth. These scenes have been little more than one-dimensional textbook pictures.

Until now, the College of Southern Idaho's Herrett Museum, in cooperation with the Snake River Chapter of the Idaho Archaeology Society, will soon bring such scenes to life for area school children. The replicas of artifacts used by early Idaho inhabitants are almost complete, as is a corresponding teacher's manual and videotape. Soon, area teachers will be able to check the entire set out of the museum.

"This is the first time we have ever tried to take the museum to the classroom, and we are very excited about it," says Jim Woods, museum director. He adds that local instructors have always had trouble finding good material on prehistoric Idaho Indians. "What makes this series so valuable is that the entire project is a hands-on one."

Woods explains that the museum staff came up with the idea for a check-out system some time ago. But the idea really began to take shape when the local archaeological society decided to join in.

In 1983, the family of Richard R. Lee, who was a member of the archaeological society until his death, established a memorial fund to honor the man who once farmed and taught school in Gooding. Consequently, society members, cognizant of Lee's interest in educating young students, have provided the money and labor to produce the first project in what Woods hopes will be the beginning of an entire series.

The initial project consists of a 58-by-15-by-6-inch aluminum box containing replicas of early Idaho Indian artifacts. These "artifacts" are handmade by archaeological society members using authentic techniques and stone tools. A sewing kit in the box is complete with bone needle, sinew and awls. A multi-purpose tool set is outfitted with knives, scrapers and carving tools. There is also a Flintknapping kit, spears and tips and a spear thrower.

In addition to these replicas, the box contains a sealed vial of sample colorant (red ochre) made from ground iron oxide. There is a glue sample, too, made by mixing pine tree pitch with ash.

Everything in the box is fitted into compartments, so that the entire unit can be shipped easily or carried in a car trunk. The items in the box are made to be handled by children, with all sharp edges carefully ground down.

"Students don't have to look on page 80 of their textbooks to see any of these things," says Woods. They can just pass the items around the classroom.

The early Indian box comes equipped with a teacher's manual, featuring an inventory and detailed description of artifacts, photos of famous Idaho sites, maps, resource lists and stories of the wandering Ice Age hunters. In the back of the manual are 10 pages of laminated drawings that can be copied and used as coloring pages. The drawings come courtesy of local artist Gary Anderson, who researched the early Idaho Indian culture that extends back as far as 9,000 to 12,000 years.

"So many times, you find Indians in coloring books depicted in such inaccurate ways," says Woods. "They are shown doing things they didn't do with tools they didn't have."

The third element of the project, a 30-minute videotape, portrays individuals picking up the artifacts and talking about them and also depicts a re-enactment of groups of Indians working with the objects and preparing for a hunt. The entire series, titled "The Earliest People in Idaho," is designed for the fourth-grade level, the year when students begin studying Idaho history.

Woods is hearing enthusiastic comments about this project already. In fact, while society members were working on the Indian box, the Idaho Natural History Museum in Pocatello requested a duplicate. So, two boxes have now been made.

"I've been contacted by people from other agencies who are also interested in this project," says Woods, who hopes to follow up with the first box with a series of boxes on rocks and minerals, fossils and other facets of early Idaho history.

Still, Woods does admit that a lot of work and expense will be involved in his new undertaking. "The first box is valued at over \$3,000," he says of the project which was begun almost a year ago. "It may look simple, but it takes two full days just to make one spear thrower."

No matter, Woods feels that all of the hard work is worthwhile. This box will not be available to be checked out for several weeks," he says. "I've already had a number of teachers asking about it."

Baryshnikov dances in 2 ballets on PBS

NEW YORK (AP) — Mikhail Baryshnikov danced in George Balanchine's New York City Ballet for only one year a decade ago, but it made a lasting impression.

The superstar of ballet dances tonight on PBS in two ballets.

"Apollo" and "Who Cares," created by Balanchine, this century's master choreographer. The show airs in the Magic Valley at 8:30 p.m. on your PBS channel.

Baryshnikov dances "Balanchine" is the first offering in the 13th season of "Dance in America," presented by "Great Performances" on the Public Broadcasting Service.

Asked the most important thing he learned from Balanchine, the dancer said in a telephone interview, "I wish I could say he taught me how to choreograph. That would be the best thing."

"I learned from him a lot. He was a very extraordinary man and I had a lot of fun to be with him."

He says he doesn't have a favorite Balanchine ballet. "They're all pretty incredible."

"Apollo" was Balanchine's first of many collaborations with composer Igor Stravinsky. He created "Apollo" in 1928 and it is his earliest ballet that is still regularly danced.

Baryshnikov had danced "Apollo" under Balanchine's guidance. He did not dance for him in "Who Cares," which Balanchine created for the New York City Ballet in 1970.

was 18, Baryshnikov was acclaimed by the Soviet public and critics. He was the youngest star to receive the State Merit of the U.S.S.R. But he felt the need of "artistic freedom" to dance something beside the princes in such ballet staples as "Swan Lake" and "The Sleeping Beauty."

Ballerina Natalia Makarova, a frequent partner at the Kirov before she defected to the West during the 1970 tour, led Baryshnikov to American Ballet Theatre.

He had been with the ABT just long enough to be looking for still further challenges when Balanchine heard about his restlessness and invited him to join the New York City Ballet. Balanchine invited Baryshnikov to his apartment, the dancer recalls during the television program. "He opened the door. He said, 'You don't mind if I continue doing what I do?' I said, 'Sure.' He was ironing his shirts. And ... we started to talk."

Baryshnikov and the American Ballet Theatre ballerinas went to Denmark where the program was filmed. "I hope the audience will enjoy the program. What else can I say."

31st annual Grammy awards

Chapman, McFerrin lead nominations

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. (AP) — Singer-songwriter Tracy Chapman and vocal gymnast Bobby McFerrin led the field in nominations for the 31st annual Grammy awards Thursday with six for Miss Chapman and five for McFerrin.

Miss Chapman, whose debut album was a surprise hit in 1988, garnered nominations for best new artist, best album, best song and best record for "Fast Car," best female pop performance for the same song, and best contemporary folk recording for the entire album, named after herself.

McFerrin, whose "Don't Worry, Be Happy" was the first ever non-instrumental to reach No. 1 position on Billboard charts, received nominations for best song, record and male pop vocal performance for "Don't Worry, Be Happy" — plus an album nomination for "Simple Pleasures." McFerrin also received best male jazz vocal performance for the song "Brothers."

George Michael, whose smash album "Faith" sold more than 6 million copies and spawned six hits, received two nominations from the National Academy of Recording Arts and Sciences.

Other top nominees were Anita Baker with four and Sting and Steve Winwood with three each.

Nominatee for record of the year were "Don't Worry, Be Happy,"

"Fast Car," Miss Baker's "Giving You the Best That I Got," Michael Jackson's "Man in the Mirror" and Winwood's "Roll With It."

Nominatee for album of the year were Michael's "Faith," Sting's "Nothing Like the Sun," Winwood's "Roll With It," McFerrin's "Simple Pleasures" and Chapman's album.

Nominations for song of the year — a songwriters award — were for "Be Still My Beating Heart" by Sting, McFerrin's "Don't Worry, Be Happy," Miss Chapman's "Fast Car," "Giving You the Best That I Got," written by Miss Baker, Skip Scarborough and Randy Holland, and "Piano In The Dark" by Brenda Russell, Jeff Hall and Scott Cutler.

Music video makers bet on 'Moonwalker'

When Vestron's "The Making of Michael Jackson's Thriller" sold more than 500,000 units in the mid '80s — when the home-video industry was starting to boom — video companies started jumping on the music video bandwagon.

But the long-form music video — primarily just a compilation of the kind of promo clips made famous by MTV — never caught on. Now music videos are just a tiny segment of the home-video industry, which is dominated by major-movie rentals.

However, the long-form music video seems poised for another breakthrough.

"The leader of the new wave?" Jackson again.

His 94-minute "Moonwalker" (CBS Music Video Enterprises, \$24.98) — an eclectic anthology of related musical segments — was released Tuesday. It could help revive interest in the long-form music-video "Moonwalker," featuring songs from his "Bad" album, some new music and a version of the Beatles' "Come Together," was released as a movie this fall in many foreign countries.

"The Blob" (RCA-Columbia, \$89.95, R) is the 1988 remake of the so-so '80s original, less Steve McQueen and plus a whole lot more gore. Kevin Dillon, Shawnee Smith and Donovan Leitch (son of singer Donovan) star.

"Barney and the Backyard Gang" (Lyons, \$19.95) is the first in a musical series of tapes for children starring Sandy Duncan and dinosaur Barney.

Orbison, Crosby albums highlight releases

HOLLYWOOD — Roy Orbison's posthumous album and David Crosby's first solo LP since his much-publicized battle against drugs highlight an unusually busy January release schedule.

Record companies and retailers normally are too busy recovering from the hectic holiday sales period to get very involved in launching new campaigns in the early weeks of the new year.

But this month's lineup also includes new releases by such commercial or critically acclaimed figures as Bob Dylan, Debbie Gibson, Lou Reed, Emmylou Harris, The Replacements and Lyle Lovett.

Though Orbison was part of the recent "Traveling Wilburys" "superstar" album with Dylan, George Harrison and others, the upcoming album is the first studio collection of new material in a decade, from the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame member who died of a heart attack Dec. 6 in Nashville, Tenn.

Titled "Mystery Girl" and due in stores Jan. 31 from Virgin Records, the album will include several tracks in the ultra-dramatic style that was his '60s trademark — as well as some lighter, more upbeat efforts.

Orbison wrote or co-wrote most of the 10 tunes, but there are some outside contributions, including one song each from Bono Hewson and the Edge from U2 and Elvis Costello. The latter's "The Comedians" was already previewed in the cable TV special that Orbison did with Bruce Springsteen, Costello and others last year at the Cooxaton Grove in Los Angeles.

On the album, Orbison is joined by an all-star cast that includes Jeff Lynne, Tom Petty and the Heartbreakers, George Harrison, T Bone Burnett, guitarist Steve Cropper and drummer Jim Keltner.

Like Orbison, Crosby, too, is already on the sales charts, thanks to "American Dream," the album he recorded with Stephen Stills, Graham Nash and Neil Young.

However, "Oh Yes I Can" — also due Jan. 31 — is the first solo album from Crosby since his 1986 parole from a Texas prison, where he was serving a five-year sentence on drug and weapons charges.

Produced by Crosby, Craig Doerge and Stanley Johnston, the A&M album contains 11 songs, all but two written or co-written by Crosby. One of the exceptions is a customized version of "My Country 'Tis of Thee" that infuses some of the contemporary spirit of Woody Guthrie's "This

Land Is Your Land."

Other upcoming albums of special interest:

Lou Reed's "New York" — In his first album for Sire records, one of rock's most gifted and provocative songwriters delivers a topical, socially conscious work that speaks with both compassion and rage about victims and villains in a country that Reed suggests has lost much of its spirit and values. The album is due in stores Tuesday.

'Star Trek' goes to the final frontier in fifth movie of series

LOS ANGELES — Not so boldly going where it has successfully gone several times before, Paramount Pictures held a press conference recently to note the completion of principal photography on "Star Trek V: The Final Frontier." The setting was a soundstage on the Paramount lot, where the bridge for the latest incarnation of the U.S.S. Enterprise had

been built. "As 'Star Trek' theme music blared out from a series of overhead speakers, a curtain parted to reveal the familiar Enterprise crew — Kirk, Spock, Bones, McCoy, Scotty, Sulu, Chekhov and Uhura — standing around the massive control panel. Then, as press flashbulbs popped away, the crew raised glasses of champagne and toasted "a peaceful, non-polluting, enterprising New

Year." "We still don't know why 'Star Trek' is such a success," actor and "Star Trek V" director William Shatner (Capt. Kirk) said at a press conference following the photo opportunity. "It has to do with the cast, the plot, the basic idea behind the story, the action, the humor. There's something in the alchemy of what we do together, and no one really knows what it is."

"My feeling is what makes 'Star Trek' unique is it's family," producer Harve Bennett added. "These people have been beloved over 22 years (since the TV series debuted on NBC), they are friends and welcome in any living room."

No matter what the reasons behind "Star Trek's" success, there is no question that the program has developed into a cottage industry, with several highly lucrative offshoots. The original TV series continues to run in syndication around the world, and "Star Trek: The Next Generation," now in its second season, is the highest-rated syndicated drama on TV.

But the "Star Trek" phenomenon runs even deeper. The four "Star Trek" movies have grossed nearly \$350 million in the United States and Canada alone and are all proven hits on home video ("Star Trek IV" was the fourth-best-selling video of 1987, with 1.7 million units shipped).

More than 100 "Star Trek" novels have been published, and the average "Star Trek" paperback sells a healthy 150,000 to 300,000 copies.

The phenomenon is such that Paramount even has a separate "Star Trek" office set up to handle miscellaneous "Star Trek" business, as well as queries from fans. And if the attendance at the press conference is any indication, media interest in the Enterprise and its crew runs as high as ever.

"Star Trek V," which will be released in June, takes the crew of the Enterprise to Nimbus 3, a "border planet" in the neutral zone of outer

space, a once-gardenlike world that has become an ecological disaster. The plot of the new film involves an insurrection among the planet's workers, with the Enterprise crew becoming involved with the rebel leader played by British actor David Warner.

Sequel to 'Cocoon' is worth seeing

COCOON: THE RETURN (PG). The best kind of sequel, combining the charm, imagination, humor and originality of "Cocoon" with even more poignance while continuing the story in new directions. With Don Ameche, Wilford Brimley, Courtney Cox, Home Gurney, Jack Gilford, Steve Guttenberg, Barret Oliver, Maureen Stapleton, Elaine Strich, Gwen Verdon, Tahnee Welch.

DIRTY ROTTEN SCOUNDRELS (PG). A resuscitation of an old and not very funny vehicle for Marlon Brando and David Niven (the 1964 "Bedtime Story"), its greatest assets are its glorious look (courtesy of Michael Ballhaus' exceptional camera work) and Michael Caine. However, there is one problem that director Frank Oz and the picture's layers of writers have not quite solved: Steve Martin's character is a snake. Martin does him deliciously, but life to him is one, long ruthless scam, and something about that finally begins to lose its wonderfulness.

THE LAND BEFORE TIME BEGAN (G). This animation feature stars Littlefoot, a baby Brontosaurus, who will lose his mother and must find his way without her to the Great Valley, or starve. Director Don Bluth has gone to the trouble of giving very little children a sort of primer of dinosaurs lore. It is nice that the Lucas-Spielberg forces, who are the film's executive producers, are behind the idea of overcoming differences and pulling together — that the Stegosaurus can lie down with the

Pterodactyl, so to speak. But do dinosaurs really lend themselves to outside-cuteness?

THE NAKED GUN (PG-13). Zucker, Abrahams and Zucker, creators of the daily TV police show satire, "Police Squad," return to the scene of the crime, offering more cruel slapstick, more no sequiturs, more stone-faced Leslie Nielsen quips, more inside TV couch potato gags, more bad puns and more of that tall guy whose head was not in camera range. There is a joke every 20 seconds or so; some of them thud, but enough work to keep things pretty hilarious. Written by Zucker, Abrahams and Zucker, and directed by David Zucker alone, with Nielsen, Ricardo Montalban and Reggie Jackson (as a hypnotized zombie assassin).

OLIVER & COMPANY (G). Although it has virtually nothing to do with Dickens, Disney's new animated

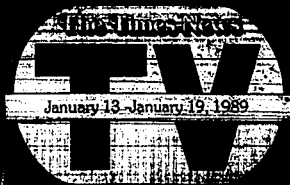

CBS movie shows man's struggle to overcome a miserable childhood

"Don't get mad," Robert Kennedy once said. "Get even."

That's what Richmond (Rich) Flowers Jr., whose story is told in the CBS movie "Unconquered" (Sunday, Jan. 15), decided to do. The Alabama native spent a miserable childhood being ridiculed by his schoolmates because of the supportive stance his father (played by Peter Coyote) a state senator and later the state attorney general, took toward civil rights. The young man vowed that one day he would get even. (His mother is played by Tess Harper.)

Instead of wasting his time fantasizing about the effects that thumb screws or stretching racks would have on his tormentors, however, he zeroed in on the one way he could hurt them the most — football.

"I think he found something in sports that he could really focus his own energies on, rather than having to worry about the problems his father's positions created," says Dermot Mulroney, who plays Rich Flowers in the CBS movie. "It also represented, at least in our story, independence and freedom, which is what the civil rights portion of the story is about, too."

Although he suffered from asthma,

Flowers devoted himself to athletics, becoming a track and football star in high school. When the college recruiters came around, Flowers spurned offers from the University of Alabama (then riding the longest winning streak in college football and coached by the legendary Bear Bryant). Instead, he opted for the University of Tennessee and vowed that he was going to come back and beat Alabama. He was as good as his word, leading his team to two upset victories over Alabama — the first of which broke the winning streak.

"I hope it comes across in the story how important football is to that culture," says the 25-year-old actor. "These fans were — and still are — rabidly in favor of their team. Beating them was like an epic event."

TV being TV, three actual games (two won by Tennessee, one by Alabama) are capsuled into one for the movie's climax.

"The game that's in the script is actually based on three separate games," says Mulroney, "so there was no real game that I could refer to for the entire role. I just watched football; that was my research."

Mulroney, whose football experience is confined to pickup games with his brothers, did most of the

football action himself. "It was awful fun getting suited up, which I'd never done," he says. "At the start of the game, the coach they hired was going, 'Yeah, yeah, right — an actor. We'll just put someone in for him.' But they didn't have to do that at all. There was just one shot where I'm hit in the chest with a helmet at top speed and sent flying backward. I let the other guy do that. But I did all the catching and running."

The movie juxtaposes the serious (civil rights and the misery of feeling like an outcast) with the trivial (football). What is it about sports that makes it take on such significance that Flowers was able to exact a fitting revenge by winning a little game?

"I have no idea," says Mulroney. "I wish I did. I'd clear up a lot of questions."

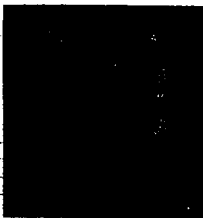

'One Life to Live's Shelly Burch thrives on contrasts in her career

Shelly Burch welcomes contrasts in her life. She feels they make you grow, both as an individual and as an artist.

How's this for contrasts? In "One Life to Live," Shelly plays Delila Garretson, a gorgeous, strong-willed woman who juggles a career as a dress designer and her family responsibilities. Shelly also is working on her nightclub act as well as appearing in showcases with such major New York acting groups as La Mama. And if that doesn't impress you, she is co-starring with Mario Van Peebles (TV's "Sonny Spoon") in the forthcoming movie "Identity Crisis," in which she plays—a crazy, deaf Amazon mud-wrestler who rides a Harley.

'Inside Edition' producers dress up tabloid television

NEW YORK — Once upon a time, television producers discovered reality.

And it was good.
And cheap.
Tawdry, actually, but financially attractive.

But the producers of "Inside Edition," the hottest new show in syndication, are dressing up tabloid television. They are calling it "the new face of reality" and America gets its first look Jan. 9.

In fact, you know the face. Only the name has changed.

King World's "Inside Edition" is the creation of Bob Young and John Tomlin, two former producers of Fox Television's "A Current Affair," the archetypal tabloid television show.

But "Inside Edition" will be presenting a somewhat more respectable face — starting with host David Frost.

During a recent interview at the show's studios here, Young, 46, said that "Inside Edition" will not get "lowdown-and-dirty"-like "A Current Affair," a show that has transformed dirt into something of an art form.

"We're not one of those screaming TV shows where we yell at the audience," Tomlin, 36, said. "We're not a professional-wrestling-type TV show. I believe one of the things we pioneered at 'A Current Affair' is a different way of approaching news stories as TV journalists."

Certainly the story list is familiar. A promotional tape of the show promises a story with "shocking revelations about the fortunes Elvis made and spent." But "the heart of the program," an announcer explains, summing up "Inside Edition" for potential buyers, "will be the personal stories of human drama, tragedy, humor and courage."

Some of those stories, like one about a little girl who underwent dramatic brain surgery, are good enough to tell themselves without the kind of appalling re-creations we have come to expect of so-called reality shows.

But other tabloid-TV stories, about murder, the sexual exploits of public figures, and standard National Enquirer rumor-mill fare, at least as they have been presented by shows such as "A Current Affair," have been almost universally reviled by critics. And those same pieces are sure to be on "Inside Edition" as well.

But Young, an abundantly energetic man with a newspaper background that includes stints on the Enquirer, Rupert Murdoch's London Sun and the New York Post, said, "We're not producing television for critics."

And he wanted to know, dropping the occasional epithet, "Who wrote the (expletive deleted) rules?"

What it all boils down to, he said, is this: "We're allowing people to experience the emotions of winning the lottery and going to jail.

"Do you want me to reduce it to sex?" he said, unsolicited. "If you start sex, you don't want to stop."

Tomlin, Young's Emmy Award-winning co-producer, put the program's goals in more poetic terms.

"We tell our stories like the great

storytellers would tell them. I think if Edgar Allan Poe and some of the great short-story writers were around today, this is the kind of stuff they'd be doing."

A major difference between "A Current Affair" and "Inside Edition" — which actually has a show "philosophy and grammar" stating that the program is not "quick and dirty trash TV... a tabloid, a program about issues... or three-headed babies" — is money.

"A Current Affair" is put together with a pretty small budget," said Young, speaking from experience. "It's fast, it's down and it's dirty. We spend a lot more time with stories. Our production standards are a lot higher."

And so is the budget. Young said that he has a whopping \$15 million at his disposal and that King World (the syndicators of "Wheel of Fortune") will spend another \$8 million to \$11 million on promotion. Investigative reporting will be a major facet of the program, he said.

Now, says Kazan, she's hoping to be cast as a mobster's wife — not mother — in "Married to the Mob," a TV pilot (and perhaps a series) based on the hit movie.

Q: Please settle a bet. I claim that Judy Garland's classic "The Wizard of Oz" movie is the only time this story has ever been filmed. But a friend swears it's been made previously; once with Shirley Temple. Who's right? — E.L.

A: Your friend, but only partly. A silent movie entitled "The Wizard of Oz" was filmed in 1925, but it was quite different from the MGM version made just 14 years later. Although Shirley Temple never appeared in a "Wizard" movie, she did star in "The Blue Bird," a heavy, futile attempt by Fox to cash in on MGM's huge success. Both "The Blue Bird" and "The Wizard of Oz" were about little girls on dreamlike odysseys, and both were in color with black-and-white prologues, but that's all they had in common.

Q: You mentioned in a recent column that Bruce Springsteen

was offered a lead in the movie version of "Evita." What about Sting, who has already done some acting and can certainly sing. Wouldn't he be great in a musical? — J.C.

A: Petula "Downtown" Clark would agree with you. She's written a musical, called "Glory," about a woman in West Virginia at the end of the Civil War who falls in love with a charming scoundrel. Clark wants Sting to play the lead role.

Q: Who is considered "the queen of radio deejays"? — Y.L.

A: That would be Alison Steele. In 1966, Steele, a successful model, was chosen by a major New York radio station to be a deejay for an all-female format. The idea failed, and Steele was the only woman who remained on the air. She became nationally known as "The Night Bird," and was the first woman to win Billboard's "Personality of the Year" award for radio.

Q: What is the television history of Lucille Ball?

A: "I Love Lucy," the original classic with Ball, Desi Arnaz, Vivian Vance and William Frawley, ran on CBS from 1951-57, usually at the top of the Nielsen ratings. A series of specials, "The Lucy-Desi Comedy Hour," followed from 1957-60. After taking a breather from TV for two years, the redhead returned with "The Lucy Show" (1962-68), with Vance and Gale Gordon, which evolved into "Here's Lucy" (1968-74), with Gordon and children Lucie and Desi. In addition

to occasional guest spots on specials and even rarer appearances on other performers' series, Ball was last seen in the short-lived ABC series, "Life With Lucy" in 1986.

Q: Does ABC have any plans to broadcast more "Battle of the Network Stars" programs?

A: Last summer, when the writers' strike threatened to doom prime-time programming, the networks went searching for "strike-proof" shows — those that did not need a script. One such search led ABC to reach back into recent history and order a single installment of the now-legendary "jiggle" show, "Battle of the Network Stars," the celebrity-athletic competition series that once adorned its schedule during the ratings sweeps months back in the 1970s and early 1980s. It had been three years since "Stars" was seen but, according to ABC, there are no plans to order more.

Q: Why is the Bay Bridge in San Francisco superimposed behind a Los Angeles police station in the intro to "Hooperman"?

A: Although the series is supposed to be set in San Francisco, only parts of the original pilot episode actually were filmed there. The John Ritter series, like most network entries, uses various Los Angeles locations for its outdoor sequences (interiors are filmed at the 20th Century Fox studios). That intro of the bridge and the police station was simply "something that captured the 'look' the producers wanted for their show," said a spokesman.

Networks loosen up to gain ratings lost to cable channels

NEW YORK — When George Carlin's comedy routine on the "seven dirty words" was broadcast by a radio station in 1978, it prompted a U.S. Supreme Court ruling on indecency.

A decade later, a character on the hit network sitcom "Designing Women" used a derivative of one of those words in describing another character who was obsessed with enlarging her bosom.

No, it isn't just imagination. Network standards are loosening up.

"The networks are being more lenient, and I think the reason is a five-letter word — C-A-B-L-E," said Harry Thomason, executive producer of "Designing Women."

Sexually explicit language and situations on network television have produced occasional complaints, but audiences are apparently rather blasé after being presented a variety of R-rated cable fare, not to mention videocassettes. A.C. Nielsen Co. estimates that 62.2 percent of U.S. homes with televisions also have a VCR.

The networks, faced with remote-control "grazing" cable options and videocassettes, are having to loosen up or lose viewers.

NBC, the No. 1 network, broadcast "Favorite Son," a political potboiler spiced-up with scenes of sexual bondage.

In an episode of ABC's "thirtysomething," a wife crawled around on the floor in search of a fumbled diaphragm.

Last season, "Saturday Night Live" executive producer Lorne Michaels complained about his battle with network censors over a sketch whose purpose was to see how often actors could say the word for the male sex organ on network TV. This season, the sketch got on the air.

"The average family in a major urban center can have access to 30-plus different television signals, not to mention home video, (where) they can see explicit language, full nudity and simulated sex in far more graphic and strong ways than you've ever seen on

network television," says Alan Gerson, NBC vice president for program marketing and administration.

He says networks are loosening standards, but carefully keeping back from the "cutting edge" of change.

"We're not changing first," Gerson said.

Do viewers mind?

"I get a lot of discussion on it, but really when you sit down and look at it and hear what's said, I don't really hear anybody complaining," said Art Chapman of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram, president of the Television Critics Association.

"The fact is," he said, "whether you like it or not, it does produce ratings, which means that people are watching it."

"There are three groups of viewers out there," said Dorothy Swanson, head of Virginia-based Viewers for Quality Television. "There's your group that would really like to see more (explicit material). They enjoy that. It's interesting, and it's entertaining, and it's fun. ...

"Then there's another group that are your prudes who really feel that there shouldn't be a single dirty word, no open-mouthed kissing, no bedroom scenes. Those people are going to always object, and they must be just screaming right about now.

"And then there's the group that just accepts it and keeps their eye on it and turns the dial if they don't like it."

When the radio station broadcast Carlin's "seven dirty words" routine — Carlin was explaining that there are seven words not allowed to be broadcast — a complaint to the Federal Communications Commission prompted a lawsuit that led to the Supreme Court ruling. The FCC does not get involved in network standards, but investigates complaints against the stations that it licenses.

A complaint about a network show would have to meet the FCC's definition of indecency before action would be taken. Indecency is described as "patently offensive as measured by contemporary community standards

for the broadcast medium."

For network censors, "community standards" apply to a global "village," where a "community" can be a time period or a demographic group. The changing expectations of television audiences have changed the stereotypical scissor-wielding censor into something of ad hoc sociologist.

"TV is a dynamic medium. It has to stay in touch with society. It has to grow as society grows and deal with subjects that are relevant to people's lives," said Matthew Margo, CBS vice president for program practices.

"I think the objective here is not to go too far. It's to be willing to grow, to be willing to take prudent risks, but never to do anything that's going to offend a significant portion of our viewing audience or advertisers or affiliates."

All three networks have cut back their standards and practices departments to save money, but insist nothing has gotten on the air that would not have before.

The cutbacks have, however, "increased the possibility of risk," said Alfred R. Schneider, ABC vice president for broadcast standards and practices, "because you don't have an overview and backup system that existed."

CBS and ABC have eliminated one level of censors and put a bigger workload on supervisors. NBC eliminated its standards and practices department completely, re-assigning most of its functions to the entertainment division, which may be akin to the fox guarding the henhouse.

ABC to air story of young AIDS patient on Monday

Ryan White's life took a strange turn in 1985: Not only was he diagnosed as having contracted AIDS through a blood transfusion for hemophilia, but he also became a community pariah and, unexpectedly, a media celebrity.

His struggle to attend public school in Kokomo, Ind., and his battle against fear and prejudice are told in "The Ryan White Story" Monday on ABC.

Kokomoans, said his mother, Jeanne White, probably won't like the film, but she says it's actually more than fair to them. "It doesn't make them look nearly as bad as they really were, not one-hundredth as much. It doesn't show the battle within the battle. It focuses on us dealing with AIDS, and all the things we've had to encounter.

"It was terrible," she recalled. "I look back now, and I still don't believe how we did it, how we managed. I don't believe I could cope with those people now. Back then you could say, 'You're wrong, you know you're wrong and so do I.' ... But we don't live that life anymore. I feel it bothers me more now, hearing people say things that are wrong about AIDS."

In Kokomo it was fearful parents who fought to keep Ryan out of school, she said, not so much the youngsters. "There were so many people against us and only a few for us, but nobody would speak out."

When the Whites decided to move to Cicero, Ind., they chose a house

only two doors from that of Jill Stewart, who was president of the student body at the school Ryan would attend, Hamilton Heights High School in nearby Arcadia. The daughter of a nurse, Stewart spearheaded an effort to educate White's future classmates about AIDS, to allay the fears that had run rife in Kokomo.

"I think they took it on like a great challenge," said Jeanne White. "I think they decided to say, 'Hey, we're going to step in and do something. We don't want this to happen to our school.' It was dealt with in totally the proper manner. There were still a few people who were against us, but there were so many for us."

Today Ryan White is 17, a slender, blond sophomore at Hamilton Heights the last year of school during the fight to attend classes in Kokomo. Jeanne White, who quit her job at a General Motors plant in Kokomo, returned to work in October but still takes her son to James Whitcomb Riley Children's Hospital in Indianapolis and accompanies him on trips.

Of her son's health, she said, "He's doing all right — he still has some problems. But he and his doctor are real close, and Dr. Kleinman's decisions have been good so far."

Of his unexpected celebrity status, she said, "I can't believe it's still going on. Four years in the media is a long time."

Ryan has appeared on television talk shows several times, testified at congressional hearings, sat beside Elton John during one of the musician's concerts and become friends with champion diver Greg Louganis.

He also made a "3-2-1 Contact" special for PBS, "I Have AIDS — A Teenager's Story," in which he talked about his disease with a classroom of elementary schoolers in Manhattan. "He likes to talk to kids better than adults," Jeanne White said. "Ryan's a kid like them. Adults don't seem to want to listen to a kid."

Ryan looks forward to graduating from high school on time and hopes to enroll at Indiana University, where basketball coach Bob Knight on at least one occasion invited the Whites to be his guest at Hoosier games. "Ryan thinks he's the greatest basketball coach who ever lived," said his mother. "I'm not approving everything he does, but he has really been nice to us."

Essentially, said Ryan's mother, "he just wants to be a normal kid."

In "The Ryan White Story" Ryan is played by Lukas Haas, whose portrayal of the wide-eyed Amish boy in "Witness" brought him critical acclaim. Judith Light plays Jeanne White, and George C. Scott the lawyer they hired. Andrea White, Ryan's 15-year-old sister and a national roller-skating champion, does her own skating in the film, Jeanne White said.

Ryan too has a small role, playing Chad, a boy he met during treatment for AIDS at Riley Hospital. "Chad never had a good outlook," recalled Jeanne White. The boy's death is mentioned — but not shown — in the film.

Did it bother Ryan to play the part of his friend who died?

Jeanne White said, "Ryan told me, 'Mom, it's just acting.'"

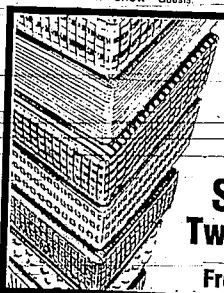

Koop tells smokers 'Just say no' on HBO

If Dr. C. Everett Koop had been around in biblical times, he would have been Isaiah. When have we ever had a public official so committed to saving sinful humankind from itself?

The surgeon general delivered his uncompromising and unarguably sensible message against tobacco in "Smoking: Everything You and Your Family Need to Know," a half-hour special on the HBO cable network Wednesday night (with repeats Thursday and Saturday and Jan. 17, 23 and 26). The program marks the 25th anniversary of the 1964 surgeon general's report that first linked smoking with lung cancer.

As in an earlier HBO show on AIDS, Koop responds frankly to questions about health risks of smoking,

breathing secondhand smoke, trying low-tar brands and other topics. Interposed segments present some stark statistics and the re-airing of some cigarette commercials from the days when they seemingly made up the bulk of television advertising — including an ad for Philip Morris brand promising that "you'll feel better" smoking that brand because, the ad said, it soothes a smoker's cough and sore throat.

The statistics are stunning. For instance, Koop says that every day the number of people in the United States who die from the results of smoking is the same as if two jumbo jets collided in mid-air "and not a single person walked away alive." One of every seven deaths in the nation can be traced to smoking, it is asserted.

Ryan's Hope ends after 13 year run

NEW YORK (AP) — After Maeve Ryan sings one last rendition of "Danny Boy," the long-running soap opera "Ryan's Hope" fades to black on Friday, leaving fans to wonder for eternity who is

Grace's father? ABC announced in October that it was canceling the daytime drama after 13½ years and 3,515 episodes.

After wrapping up most of the storylines, the final scene has Maeve (Helen Gallagher), joined by family and friends in Ryan's Bar, singing "Danny Boy" as she has traditionally on every St. Patrick's Day. This year, there will be no St. Patrick's Day for the Ryans.

"Yes, it is a tear-jerker," said Karen Reynolds, the publicist for the show who attended the taping of the final episode.

The final episode features the wedding of reporter Jack Fenelli (Michael Levin) and newspaper publisher Leigh Kirkland (Felicity LaFortune). Of the series' other continuing storylines, the only major one to be left hanging is the paternity of 4-year-old Grace Coleridge.

In the final scene, Pat Ryan (Malcolm Cromie), who suspects he might

be the child's father, asks Faith Coleridge (Karen Morris-Gowdy) who Grace's father is. Faith says she'll tell him after Maeve sings. Fans, like Pat Ryan, will never hear the answer.

ABC said it canceled the soap because too many affiliates chose to pre-empt the low-rated drama for noon newscasts.

"Ryan's Hope" has not been rejected by the audience, it has simply been unavailable to viewers," Jo Ann Emmerich, vice president of daytime programs for ABC Entertainment, said at the time. "Without sufficient stations to carry it, it has become a victim of audience erosion."

At its lowest ebb, the show was carried by only 75 percent of ABC's 200-plus affiliates. ABC said the show was being dropped instead of moved because the network did not have an appropriate timeslot for a half-hour drama.

The series has won 17 Daytime Emmys — including three for Helen Gallagher as Maeve — and 11 Writers Guild awards. It launched the careers of many well-known actors, including Corbin Bernsen, who stars on NBC's "L.A. Law," and Kate Mulgrew, star of ABC's "HeartBeat."

Dinosaur documentary is show for all ages

NEW YORK (AP) — Dinosaurs are a kiddie rage these days. There are dinosaur toys, books, T-shirts, games, party favors.

"The Great Dinosaur Hunt," tonight on PBS' "The Infinite Voyage" and next week in syndication, is not a kids' show, though some dinosaur-crazy youngsters might find it interesting.

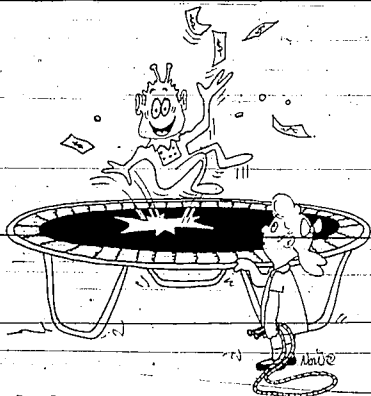
This fascinating documentary is taken up not with childish fantasies, but more adult considerations, such as the history of dinosaur study and present-day scientific methods that have produced remarkable new theories about the ex-critters.

The new theories, rather than drying out the subject, give new life to the dinosaurs of childhood imagination. According to various scientists, the vast array of dinosaur species were active hunters, aggressive fighters, nurturing mothers, sociable herd

members, scavengers and sophisticated communicators.

"Nature's special effects," they are called, by museum curator Robert Bakker, a Harvard Ph.D. scientist and author of "The Dinosaur Heresies," whose waist-length hair and a beard symbolize his maverick ideas. Bakker believes that, contrary to long-held popular and scientific belief, dinosaurs were not stupid, cold-blooded reptiles, but a unique, warm-blooded, active animal.

Bakker supported his theory by studying dinosaur tracks discovered in a riverbed near Glen Rose, Texas. By comparing the estimated height of the animal's leg with the distance between the tracks, Bakker concluded that it traveled at a brisk 8 mph or so, faster than a pack of wolves, not at the sluggish speed of a cold-blooded reptile lazily foraging for food.
