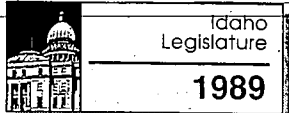

Neibaur urges caution in use of surplus

The Associated Press... BOISE — As pressure appeared to mount for pieces of the state's huge revenue surplus, two top Republicans urged their colleagues Thursday to refuse to spend any of the one-time cash on continuing government programs.



House Appropriations Chairman Kathleen Gurnsey of Boise and vice chairman Mack Neibaur of Paul both said the surplus estimated at over \$40 million should be used only for nonrecurring expenses like building construction and repair, equipment purchases and paying off one-time bills.

as a committee are dedicated to not spending more in on-going programs than the revenue projection shows, and that is \$748.8 million. Andrus said several weeks ago that he also opposed using money from the one-time surplus windfall to underwrite continuing state programs. But with his revenue estimate at only \$740.2 million for the year that begins July 1, he was forced to tap the surplus for about \$10 million to cover continuing state expenses as well as proposed part of the \$12 million business investment tax credit.

Bush set to take presidential oath today

Los Angeles Times... WASHINGTON — With the eight years of the Ronald Reagan presidency at an end, George Bush, in a solemn and celebratory rite as old as the Republic, becomes the 41st president of the United States today.

House were blocked off and elaborate plans were completed for the transfer of power at the stroke of noon — 10 a.m. MDT — Bush evinced the optimism that so marked Reagan's tenure. "I really feel this: Our best days are yet to come," Bush told a group of youthful supporters.

Bush and his wife plan to arrive at the White House shortly before 10:30 a.m. to have coffee in the Blue Room with President Reagan and his wife, Nancy, and with Vice President-elect Dan Quayle and his wife, Marilyn. From there, Reagan and Bush are to ride together to Capitol Hill. Reagan, who will be a spectator at the swearing-in of his successor, is scheduled to leave the Capitol 45 minutes later by helicopter, head for Andrews Air Force Base and depart for Los Angeles International Airport and his new home in the posh Bel-Air neighborhood.

FBI probes fraud in futures trading

CHICAGO (AP) — Trading records of the Chicago Board of Trade and Chicago Mercantile Exchange were subpoenaed Thursday in an FBI probe of alleged widespread fraud at the nation's two biggest futures exchanges.

The U.S. attorney's office subpoenaed all trading records dating to Jan. 1, 1983, Mercantile spokesman Andrew Yemma said.

Similar records were subpoenaed at the Board of Trade and the Board of Trade Clearing Corporation, said spokesman Raymond Carmichael, adding that executives "must and will" comply with the request.

FBI agents posed as traders in the probe focusing on 50 to 100 brokers, traders and executives at the Merc and Board of Trade, the Chicago Tribune reported Thursday, citing unidentified sources.

In Chicago, FBI spokeswoman Diane Rivers and Assistant U.S. Attorney Daniel Gillogly in Chicago would neither confirm nor deny such an investigation was under way.

In Washington, however, law enforcement officials who spoke on condition of anonymity, confirmed the Justice Department was investigating allegations of fraud at the two exchanges.

"I think that has always been an option," he said. "I can't think of any reason why that wouldn't be. His employment has always been adequate, if not exemplary."

But Qualls said that when he met with Courtney in August, he asked what would happen if he rejected early retirement. The answer, Qualls said, was that he would have to consider the other option, "which he took to mean termination."

"I don't know how you can take it any other way," Qualls said.

Courtney complained of Qualls' educational credentials, his management skills and his negative attitude to suggestions, Qualls said.

"There were times when I haven't agreed with him, and there were times when he was right," Qualls said. "I believe I'm more an authoritarian type of manager than he'd like to see, but I think in police work that's often the kind of management you need."

Qualls said he was particularly surprised by Courtney's actions because the public apparently approved of the job Qualls was doing.

In a 1987 random mail survey, 86 percent of the respondents said the police division was doing an excellent or good job, and that number shot up to 93 percent for the fire division.

In public, Courtney and council members have also been generous in their praise of both Qualls and the department.

"I don't mind retiring, it might even be a good deal, but I hated to be forced out when the public seemed to be satisfied," Qualls said. "I feel that's who we're working for."

Courtney agreed that the public has few problems with the current state of the public safety department.

But, he added, "I think the issue is really one of where we want to go in the future—rather than where we have been in the past."

Looking into that future, Courtney said the department needs to develop a long-term planning capacity and that it must become proficient with data-processing equipment in identifying and reacting to trends.

Also, in view of the fact that public safety costs are increasing while rel-

ative revenues are decreasing, he said the department "needs to create a work environment that places a very high value on creativity and innovation."

Lastly, Courtney said he would like to see more delegation and communication "where issues are dealt with in an open and honest manner."

In a memo, Courtney told Qualls that he didn't think Qualls had the ability or education to take the department where Courtney wanted it to go.

That contrasts sharply with the opinion of Mack Richardson, director of the Idaho Department of Law Enforcement. When he was with the Secret Service in Boise during the 1970s, Richardson worked closely with Qualls.

"I can tell you this, Tim in my estimation—and in the estimation of other law enforcement officials—was one of the top, if not the top, people in the field. He was always concerned about having the latest information in criminal investigation."

"I feel it's erroneous to question the man's education and ability, because he's got it."

Nellis returned Tuesday to the gravel bank, which had crumbled revealing more bones. He could see with some faith.

Loretta Burkhardt called the Herrett Museum early Wednesday morning. Later that morning a group of archeologists descended on the gravel bank.

"They told me it was the most exciting find they had seen," Burkhardt said.

"People have lived in Idaho for 12,000 years and this is one of them," archeologist Green said.

Green decided the bones should be removed as quickly as possible before they were damaged by further collapse of the gravel bank. During the day the sun thawed the gravel causing the bank to cave in, Green said.

The Idaho State Historical Society will consult the Shoshone-Bannocks to determine what will happen to the remains. Idaho law requires that Indian tribes be notified about the discovery of unmarked graves.

Paul, spokeswoman for the group. "We've been anticipating this for over two years," Paul said. "The Record of Decision doesn't change the fact that this nation doesn't need any more weapon-grade plutonium."

Paul said the Snake River Alliance remains committed to fighting the project that she calls "unnecessary and wasteful."

"It will never come to pass," she vowed.

The SIS will process plutonium stockpiled at the Hanford Nuclear Reservation. It will not produce any new plutonium.

The project will use a process known as the Atomic Vapor Laser Isotope Separator, which uses a high-powered laser to remove specific isotopes of plutonium.

Dr. LaMar Tregu, manager of the SIS project, explains the process as similar to sorting potatoes. As potatoes pass by on a belt, all the unwanted No. 2s and No. 3s are picked out so only the desired No. 1s remain.

The SIS uses the finely tuned light of a laser to change the electric charge of the unwanted plutonium isotopes Pu-238, Pu-240 and Pu-241. These charged particles are then attracted to a charged plate and removed, leaving the desired plutonium-239.

"We need to either fix the buildings or sell them," he said.

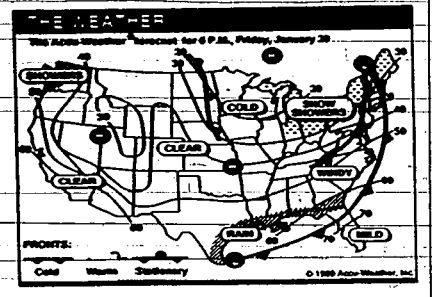

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Legislators: Lessen required bond vote

BOISE (AP) — Legislators from opposite corners of the state say the super-majority needed to pass bond elections allows a small minority to thwart the wishes of the majority.

Year after year we go along and do nothing to allow school districts to provide facilities for our school children," said Rep. L. Ed Brown, R-Pocatello.



He was among members of the House State Affairs Committee supporting legislation proposed by Rep. Dean Haugenson, R-Coeur d'Alene. It would amend the constitution to reduce the two-thirds majority needed for approval of any general obligation bond to 60 percent.

The committee voted Thursday to print and introduce the legislation, on a 12-7 vote. Opposition came mainly from the rural areas, most of the farmer-ranchers on the panel.

Although the change would apply to any bond issue, for cities, counties, school districts or any other taxing district, the discussion centered on school bond elections.

Haugenson said the Coeur d'Alene District has been unable to muster enough votes in recent years to pass badly needed school bonds. In the district, only 28 percent of the families have school-age children, which makes it almost impossible to muster a 66 percent vote in favor of a bond

issue, he said.

The two-thirds supermajority requirement is built into the Idaho Constitution, but Haugenson said the same document requires the state to provide a uniform school system.

"I believe we are open to court challenges if we do not provide opportunities to districts to provide adequate facilities," he said. "The present system is less than uniform."

He passed out a sheet showing that to raise an extra \$100,000 for a school district, the owner of a \$100,000 home in Boise pays \$2.70 per year in property tax. In the Bonanza District at Idaho Falls, it costs \$23.90; at Mountain Home the bill is \$35.40; Moscow patrons pay \$26.90 and residents of Blaine County pay \$8.90.

Haugenson said the Coeur d'Alene has failed on many recent attempts to pass a school bond. The last didn't even get a simple majority, he said, but that probably was because it was for \$27 million.

Supreme Court upholds loan assumption agreement

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Supreme Court has agreed with a district judge who refused to invalidate a loan assumption agreement in a lawsuit which could have involved more than 400 borrowers.

Instead, the court ruled 3-1 Thursday to sustain a ruling by 4th District Judge Duff McKee. McKee ruled an Ada County mortgage agreement was valid, and previous court decisions on "due on demand" mortgages did not apply.

Included in the ruling was McKee's refusal to certify the lawsuit by a Boise couple as a class action lawsuit which would have involved 424 other borrowers.

Albert and Sharon Bruno assumed a loan taken out by another couple with First Federal Savings and Loan Association of Boise, now United First Federal Savings and Loan Association.

Instead of 9 percent, and to pay an assumption fee. The couple made payments for three years, then sued, claiming the higher interest and assumption requirement were improper under the earlier decision.

In a 1984 decision, the Supreme Court held that "due on demand" clauses in home mortgages were unenforceable, unless the higher rates and other penalties new borrowers were forced to pay were related to a higher risk assumed by the lender.

Judge wants more time with flood loan dispute

POCATELLO (AP) — A federal judge says he needs more time to sort out the legal aspects of the decade-old controversy between the federal government and the city of Rexburg over a disaster loan following the Teton Dam disaster.

U.S. District Judge Marion Callister has taken under advisement both the city's request that he review the Federal Emergency Management Agency's refusal to cancel the loan and the government's demand that the city be ordered to pay up.

The city received the \$260,000 loan within months of the Teton Dam's collapse—in 1976—to compensate for property tax base lost to the flood. The loan was to be forgiven if the city's operating revenues for the three years after the flood were less than in the year before.

City officials claimed that was the case and asked that the loan be forgiven in 1979, and they renewed that request in both 1982 and 1985.

But the government refused to forgive the loan after repeated reviews because it contended the revenue losses cited by the city were the result of accounting maneuvers and money transfers within overall city operations.

Justice Department attorney Douglas Hughes also pointed out to Callister that a 1976 change in state property tax law resulted in a reduction in the city's tax levy. He also contended the city filed its appeal of the agency denial too late to make it valid.

But deputy city attorney J.D. Hancock said the city did not file the appeal until 1987 because it was not until then that it was notified by the Bureau of Reclamation, the owner of the failed dam, that it would not repay the loan.

SB1041 (Local Government and Taxation) — Repeals automatic tax-exempt status of property owned by fraternal organizations and sets requirements for qualifying the exemption.

SB1042 (Local Government and Taxation) — Repeals county license tax laws.

SB1043 (Education) — Changes legal references to mill levies in school district budgeting laws to tax levies.

SB1044 (Education) — Shifts responsibility for approving school transportation contracts from the Board of Education to the Superintendent of Public Instruction.

SB1045 (Education) — Raises the minimum age for obtaining a motor vehicle license from 14 to 15.

SB1046 (Education) — Gives the Superintendent of Public Instruction authority to appoint Department of Education employees.

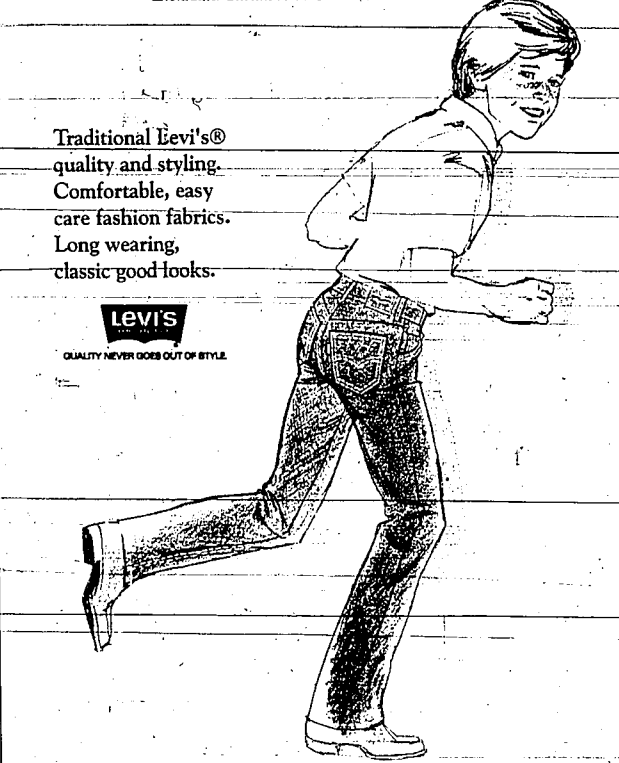
SB1047 (Education) — Repeals needless language in school district levy laws.

SB1048 (Education) — Requires that by 1991 all money earned from state lands be deposited directly into the appropriate permanent endowment fund rather than into specific income funds.

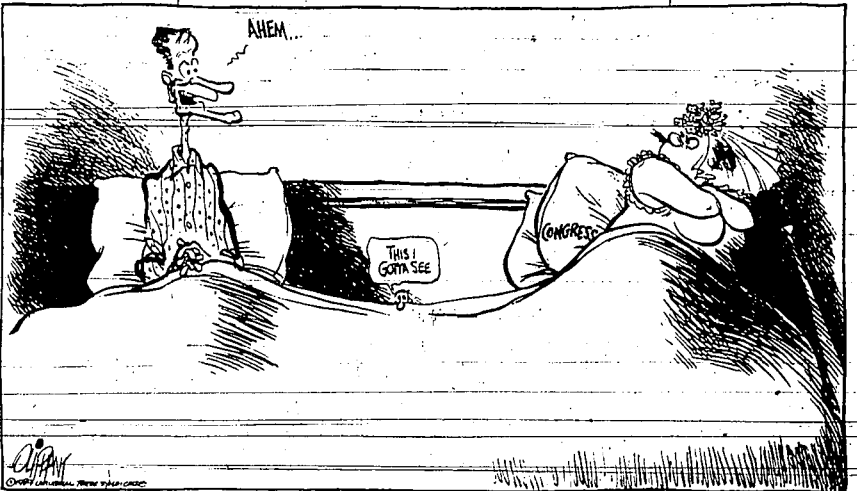
I somewhat agree with your concern over Congress and their inability to control costs. But you must keep in mind the basis of this country was set up on teamwork from all levels of government.

Combining hospitals not an option

This letter is written in response to an article in the South Idaho Press on Jan. 3, 1989.

In this article Mr. Packer states that he is disappointed that the Minidoka County commissioners do not share his enthusiasm for consolidation of our two hospitals and gives the impression that he is in the dark as to why they do not. There are some clear reasons, namely: 1. prudence; 2. health care; and 3. responsible decision making.

As everyone knows agriculture is our main industry. Lately, there have been some lean years. Last year there was an improvement in our general circumstance, but it will be a while before we are totally healed. Our hospital, in spite of the times, has been operating in the black. We are proud and we should be of that. However, this is not the time for us to be embarking on a new building project — alone or in conjunction with anyone. Coming to that conclusion is called prudence.

The second thing to be considered is health care. As long ago as when the present hospitals in our counties were being built the experts in the national health care department sounded a warning saying that some of our less populated areas (western states, in particular) were being overbuilt and the result would be their eventual closure. Time has proved that to be the case. Look about, American Falls, Ashton, Challis and St. Anthony's hospitals are closed.

When a county undertakes the building of this kind of facility costs must be considered. From a layman's view these can be categorized as follows: 1. structure, 2. maintenance, 3. staffing and 4. patients. When the price becomes too high in some or all categories the closure occurs. Taxpayers still

have the debt of the structure and are hard pressed to find a use for the now vacated building.

Physicians that have become specialists in fields such as urology, cardiology, neurology, oncology and others, locate in the higher populated cities out of necessity so they can draw from the immediate area and from the surrounding communities. For example, Boise has 100,000 inhabitants in the city itself, plus the county and the nearby towns. Our entire Mini-Cassia area has about 40,000, from which to draw.

Medical technology is going forward by leaps and bounds. It is also expensive. And, it quickly becomes obsolete. Having access to these places is wonderful and we have it. Let us accommodate the places where the specialists are and the equipment for diagnosis and treatment can be used most efficiently so that the advances in technology can be more affordable to all of us. We should not attempt to be competitive in all these areas. Distance is not the problem it once was. Twin Falls is 45 miles away, Pocatello is 70 miles, Boise is 150.

We must remember that most of the illnesses can be taken care of right here. Disorders that require special care are in the lesser numbers.

Let us determine what is needed to provide adequate health care and if we are meeting that requirement. This is a check list for Minidoka County:

- Need — Do we have it?
 1. Physicians — Medical & Surgical — 1, yes
 2. Hospital with emergency service x-ray department; ICU laboratory; medical-surgical extended

care; respiratory unit; — 2, yes (The structure is in fine shape)

3. Access to special treatment centers — 3, yes. (The network is in place)

4. Means to get to these centers — 4, yes, a air lift, b. ambulance, c. private carrier.

5. Staffing, nurses and other personnel — 5, yes, as well as any. There is a nationwide shortage of nurses and it is a challenge that is faced and met everyday.

6. County health nurse — 6, yes

7. County school nurse — 7, yes

Thirdly: responsible decision making. In defense of our commissioners I take issue with the remark about the "preconceived ideas" of our commissioners. They are our elected officials and our voice. They are accountable to us. It is the responsibility of the constituents to be informed of impending activities as best they can and to let the commissioners know how they feel about them. All of us must be vigilant, thoughtful and very careful in sorting through the rhetoric so that our judgments and decisions are made intelligently and independently.

In summary it remains that the upgrading of Cassia Memorial is an internal affair in which Minidoka County should not, deliberately or inadvertently, become entangled.

Consolidation is not an option. It is not in the best interest of Minidoka County. Merging, in this instance, means assistance.

And, yes, the community is best served by acting independently. To suggest otherwise is an attempt to set up a smoke screen.

Reagan expresses regret over hostages

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan said Thursday he was frustrated over his inability to free Americans held hostage in Lebanon and conceded, a day before leaving office, "We don't know where they are."

Even to the end of his presidency, Reagan said, officials were continuing to explore "quietly and privately" how to win freedom for the nine Americans. "There hasn't been a moment that this isn't on our minds," he said.

"We know that any overt attempt at rescue, even if we did have a hint of a clue about their whereabouts, could run the risk of their assassination or execution before we could get them out," he said.

Reagan also said in the wide-ranging interview that:

• He continues to believe U.S. arms sales to Iranian elements in 1985 and 1986 did not constitute an attempt to trade arms for the hostages, held by pro-Iranian Lebanese kidnappers. Viewing the sale as an attempted swap amounted, he said, to "a total media distortion."

• He still feels former White House aides Oliver L. North and John M. Poindexter will be found innocent of criminal wrongdoing in connection with the arms deal. He seemed to rule out granting pardons for either man before leaving office at noon Friday, saying that to do so would "leave them forever after with that guilt hanging over them."

• He has high confidence in George

Bush's ability to handle U.S.-Soviet relations.

As to the hostages, Reagan said their situation did not parallel that of the 52 Americans freed from captivi-

ty the day he took office, Jan. 20, 1981, after 444 days as prisoners in Iran.

During the 1980 campaign against Jimmy Carter, Reagan criticized the president for being unable to win their release. Reagan had criticized Carter's handling of the hostage-taking at the U.S. Embassy in Tehran as "too sluggish" and had said on Jan. 7, 1980: "I believe it's appropriate to suggest that anything that has been done by the administration so far, could have, should have, been done in the first hour."

In Thursday's interview, Reagan declined to take back the criticism. "We were facing two very different situations," he said, noting that in the earlier situation, more than 50 people had been taken prisoner in the embassy and had been kidnapped by the government of Iran.

On the other hand, he said, the Americans held in Lebanon were kidnapped individually by terrorists.

Nine Americans are prisoners. Associated Press chief Middle East correspondent Terry Anderson has been held the longest, since March 16, 1985.

On the question of U.S. dealings with Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev, Reagan said he thought Bush would move forward on the issue of reducing the superpower stockpiles of long-range nuclear weapons, but that caution should be used.

"I think we have to realize that in these negotiations ... they're not just based on what someone says. They're based on deeds. And I think that George (Bush) will be very prepared there, based on what the deeds are."

Bush helps lawmaker keep her feet at speech

WASHINGTON (AP) — It was that moment—everybody worries about—you're walking down the aisle at a wedding, or climbing the steps to get your diploma and you trip.

For Rep. Lynn Martin, R-Ill., it came Thursday as she escorted President-elect Bush up steps onto a stage at the District of Columbia Armory before several thousand cheering teenagers.

The Illinois congresswoman, who was emceeing the inaugural youth

event, stumbled as she reached the top of the stairs.

Only a quick hand from Bush and Stephen M. Studdert, the inaugural executive director, kept her from hitting the deck.

For Bush, the stumble could not pass unnoticed.

"About the dramatic entrance by my friend Lynn Martin ... she will do anything to upstage the president-elect of the United States—shameless!" he said wryly.

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Senate group OKs Baker for Bush post

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate Foreign Relations Committee, in a strong show of bipartisan support, voted 19-0 Thursday to recommend the Senate confirm James A. Baker III as secretary of state.

The Senate is expected to approve the Baker nomination, possibly unanimously, in a roll call vote Wednesday.

Baker, 58, who served President Reagan as White House chief of staff and secretary of the Treasury, is one of President-elect George Bush's closest friends and managed his 1980 and 1988 presidential campaigns.

In two days of testimony this week, he displayed a comprehensive grasp of foreign policy issues, issuing a strong call for more bipartisanship as the keystone to success.

He said this especially was true in Central America, where wrangling between the Reagan White House and Congress led, Baker said, to stalemate and a distinct lack of success in dealing with Nicaragua's leftist Sandinista government.

Quayle says he is ready to go to work

WASHINGTON (AP) — Vice President-elect Dan Quayle on Thursday borrowed a line from Winston Churchill about surviving an attack in what seemed to be a reference to the controversy over his nomination last year.

Winston Churchill once said that there's nothing more exhilarating than to be shot at without result, Quayle told a group gathered in the lobby of the National Museum of American History.

"Here we are, ready to go, to do the work that you and the people of America said they wanted us to do," he told costumed members of the U.S. Army Old Guard Fife and Drum Corps.

The remarks seemed to refer to the GOP's November victory despite the campaign uproar over Quayle's experience, military record and other matters.

He spent the afternoon shaking hands with thousands of "our best friends" at the museum. An estimated 13,000 supporters paid \$20 each to see Quayle, his wife, Marilyn.

U.S. oil firms resume business with Libya

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan authorized American oil companies on Thursday to resume doing business in Libya in a bid to head off the potential nationalization of their huge investment in that country.

The move also is designed to put an end to what a White House statement called the "significant windfall profits" Libya has reaped since the administration imposed the ban on the U.S. operations there in 1986.

In the absence of the American firms, Libyans have been working the U.S. oil fields and keeping the income.

The White House and the State Department, both said that Reagan's decision does not constitute any softening of U.S. sanctions against Libya.

These include a trade embargo and a freeze on Libyan assets in the United States. State Department spokesman Charles Redman said these restrictions will prevent the oil companies from sending any goods between the United States and Libya.

The announcement, which came on Reagan's last full day in office, seemed designed to spare the Bush administration a similar decision.

Message interrupts Marcos hearing

NEW YORK (AP) — A hearing on whether Ferdinand Marcos is too sick to stand trial on racketeering charges was interrupted Thursday with word that the deposed Philippine president had suffered a collapsed lung.

Prosecutors were cross-examining a doctor who had testified that Marcos was a "dying man," too ill to be brought to trial, when an FBI agent entered and handed a note to a prosecutor with word on the 71-year-old former president.

After conferring with lawyers in his chambers, U.S. District Judge John Keenan announced that Marcos' left lung collapsed that morning and that he was returned to the intensive care unit at St. Francis Medical Center in Honolulu, where he has been since Sunday with pneumonia and bronchial asthma.

In Honolulu, St. Francis spokeswoman Norma Kop confirmed that Marcos had suffered a collapsed lung and was in guarded condition. She gave no details.

Boeing reviewing 757 wiring designs

SEATTLE (AP) — Boeing Co. says it is reviewing design, testing and maintenance to make it "physically impossible" to make wiring errors like those found in seven Boeing 757s.

The Federal Aviation Administration last week ordered checks on all 757s after learning of faulty wiring in the cargo hold fire extinguishing systems in a Royal Brunei jet and a similar problem in a Delta Airlines plane.

Faulty wiring has been found in five more 757s since the inspections were ordered.

Investigators said some of the crossed wires would have caused the wrong extinguisher to work in the event of a cargo hold fire; other mistakes would have indicated a fire to the pilot without activating a sprinkler.

Barry appears before grand jury

WASHINGTON (AP) — Mayor Marion Barry Jr. appeared in court under subpoena Thursday before a federal grand jury investigating his ties to a suspected drug dealer.

Barry told reporters he had done nothing wrong and was not the target of the probe.

"I'm not in trouble," Barry said at an impromptu news conference as he headed into the grand jury's meeting room in the federal courthouse. "The public sometimes has the impression that going before a grand jury means that someone is guilty... but it only means they are investigating. That's the American way."

Kenneth Mundy, Barry's attorney, said he has received assurances that Barry is not a target of the probe. Federal officials were not available to comment on Mundy's comment.

Fifth of men have gay experiences

WASHINGTON (AP) — At least 20 percent of American adult men have had one or more homosexual experiences, and a minimum of 3.3 percent have such contacts with some frequency, according to a study by the National Research Council.

The study, an analysis of data collected by questionnaires in 1970 and in a 1988 national survey, suggests that the minimum number of American men who have had at least one homosexual experience is lower than the estimates compiled 40 years ago by famed sex researcher Alfred Kinsey.

But Charles F. Turner, an NRC scientist who co-authored the new study in the magazine Science, said the current estimates are the lowest possible number and that there is not enough data to establish a true number, which would be higher.

Judge turns down appeal by Bundy

LAKE CITY, Fla. (AP) — A circuit judge Thursday turned down efforts to block next week's scheduled execution of multiple-murderer Ted Bundy.

Columbia County Circuit Judge John Peach denied all three claims in Bundy's appeal, filed in this North Florida city where Bundy abducted his last victim. The judge also turned down Bundy's request for a stay of execution.

Barring court relief, Bundy is to die at 7 a.m. Tuesday in the Florida State Prison electric chair.

Consumer price increase steady for '88

WASHINGTON (AP) — The rate of increase in consumer prices held steady in 1988 at 4.4 percent, the government said Thursday, but many economists are warning that inflation could accelerate moderately this year.

Although the rise in the Labor Department's Consumer Price Index last year was identical to the 1987 gain, the reasons were very different.

The summer drought pushed food prices up by 5.2 percent in 1988, compared with 3.5 percent a year earlier. Last year's gain was the steepest since 1980. Consumers got a break on energy costs, which rose a scant 0.5 percent, compared with 8.2 percent in 1987.

The inflation rate excluding the volatile food and energy categories — a compilation many economists say is a better gauge of underlying inflationary pressure — rose 4.2 percent in 1988 to 4.7 percent last year.

"The core inflation is ticking up," said Samuel D. Kahan, an economist with Kleinwort Benson Government Securities Inc. in Chicago. "I would not treat last year's number as something very calming."

Nevertheless, 1988 ended on a moderate note, with 0.3 percent increases in both November and December.

Last month's advance left the price index at 120.6 percent of its 1982-84 base, meaning that a hypothetical selection of goods costing \$100 during the base period would have cost \$120.50 in December, 20

prices building on a fundamental level," said William Dunkelberg, dean of business at Temple University in Philadelphia.

Unemployment in December matched a 14-year low while use of

Hot weather pushed poultry and egg prices up 17.9 percent and 16.6 percent, respectively. On the other hand, beef and pork prices fell or rose only slightly during the second half of the year as farmers sent more animals to slaughter to reduce the need for feed made more expensive by the drought. For the year, beef was up 5.6 percent; pork was down 3.1 percent. Fruit and vegetable prices rose 6.2 percent; cereals and baked goods, 6.4 percent, and dairy products, 4.4 percent.

Fuel oil prices jumped 2.8 percent in December after falling for six consecutive months. Despite the December advance, the price was 6.3 percent below that of a year earlier. Electricity charges rose 1.1 percent for the year, while natural gas was unchanged. Gasoline prices were 1.1 percent lower than a year ago.

In other areas, housing costs rose 4.0 percent. Price increases for new and used cars were a moderate 2.1 percent and 3.4 percent, respectively. However, the costs of auto insurance and automobile financing took steep jumps of 8.4 percent and 8.3 percent, respectively.

The cost of medical care, up 6.9 percent, also rose faster than the general inflation rate last year. Tobacco prices posted one of the steepest rises of any subcategory, up 9.4 percent.

The Labor Department also reported that Americans' average weekly earnings, after adjusting for inflation, decreased 0.4 percent in December after falling 0.5 percent a month earlier.

Average weekly earnings last month were \$29.61, 3.8 percent higher than a year ago but still not high enough to keep up with inflation.

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Botha promotes ally

CAPE TOWN, South Africa (AP) — President P.W. Botha, hospitalized with a stroke that has weakened an arm and leg, on Thursday named a Cabinet minister and long-time political ally as acting president.

Constitutional Development Minister Chris Heunis, the senior-ranking Cabinet member, vowed at his swearing-in ceremony to adhere to Botha's policies.

"Everything is normal and under control," Heunis said later. "No government functions will be interrupted."

Heunis, 61, served as acting president for several days last year while Botha visited Europe. He will remain in his new post until Botha either returns to office or decides to retire, at which point the Cabinet would elect a new president.

Botha, who turned 73 last week, suffered the stroke at his home Wednesday and was taken to a military hospital in the Cape Town suburb of Wynberg.

Botha's office and hospital officials said the president was in stable condition Thursday. Doctors said his left arm and left leg were weakened by the stroke, but his facial muscles and speaking ability were not affected.

The president was able to sit up and drink tea, doctors said.

New sub may be record-setter

TOKYO (AP) — A Japanese company on Thursday launched a deep-sea research submersible capable of diving to a world-record depth of 21,225 feet, according to a government official.

The Shinkai 6500 was christened and launched in Kobe, in western Japan, by the Mitsubishi Heavy Industries Ltd., said an official of the Science and Technology Agency.

Its final cost is expected to be \$6 million, according to the official, who spoke on condition of anonymity. He said it measures 31 feet by 9 feet by 10 1/2 feet, and it weighs 25 tons.

It can dive deeper than similar submersibles of the United States, France and the Soviet Union, which have a depth of about 19,685 feet, he said.

Amin: Out of Africa

HABARE, Zimbabwe (AP) — Former Ugandan dictator Idi Amin, who was treated as a pariah and put under virtual house arrest during a two-week trip to Africa, apparently was headed back to his exile home in Saudi Arabia on Thursday.

Amin, 68, Saudi Arabia duty this month and officials there reportedly said he had shown their hospitality and would not be allowed to return.

But reliable sources said Thursday that Moroccan King Hassan II persuaded Saudi Arabia to allow Amin to return to his villa refuge in Jiddah.

The sources in the Zairean capital of Kinshasa said he left that city Wednesday aboard a flight for Saudi Arabia, where he lived since his overthrow in 1979.

Officials in Zaire would not confirm Amin's departure, and there was no word from Saudi authorities that he had landed there.

The 11-year-old Amin, who ruled Uganda to 1979, often was hailed by many Africans as the "champion of the underdog."

But the burly 6-foot-3 former heavyweight boxing champion, whose alleged hand in widespread atrocities earned him the epithets "Butcher of Kampala" and "Black Hitler," was shunned during his trip to Africa. Uganda requested his extradition to face murder charges.

Amin arrived in Zaire on a false Zairean passport Jan. 3, and officials there kept him under virtual house arrest.

Power squeeze grips China

BEIJING (AP) — Coal-rich Shaanxi province is running out of the fossil fuel that keeps its power plants running.

Luxury hotels in Beijing have been told to cut energy use by 30 percent during peak hours, and factories are being forced to shut down assembly lines to ease power shortages.

Across China, millions of workers are idled and homes are darkened every day as the nation's surging demand for energy far outstrips its ability to generate power.

The problem is made worse by an inefficient transportation system, antiquated machinery, delays in construction of new facilities and unreasonably low energy rates.

The People's Daily said Wednesday that Shaanxi's seven power stations, which supply more than half the electricity in northwestern China, are down to reserves of only 80,000 tons of coal.

Soviet troops to take missiles with them, Shevardnadze says

VIENNA, Austria (AP) — The 50,000 Soviet troops being pulled out of Eastern Europe will take the nuclear missiles and other arms under their control with them, the Soviet foreign minister said Thursday.

A NATO spokesman welcomed the announcement by Foreign Minister Eduard Shevardnadze as "encouraging." U.S. arms negotiator Stephen Ledogar said the speech was "very upbeat, very positive," but warned against "reading more into the statement than the Kremlin intended."

Shevardnadze's speech came on the final day of a gathering that produced a 35-nation human-rights accord. Shevardnadze said the agreement was the product of a changing relationship between East and West.

The Vienna meeting has shaken up the Iron Curtain, weakened its rusty hinges, made new breaches in it and hastened its corrosion," he said, referring to the East-West division as Winston Churchill described it 40 years ago.

"Truth must be visible," Shevardnadze said in promising that the Kremlin would publish before the end of the month a timetable for troop removal.

Shevardnadze said the troops departing Eastern Europe will take with them "all their organic armaments, including tactical nuclear systems."

He also said the Soviet Union has stopped modernizing its short-range nuclear weapons and called on the United States to follow suit.

Those arms are tactical missiles with a range of less than 312 miles.

The Soviet Union and the United States signed an accord more than a year ago to eliminate all intermediate-range nuclear forces and are negotiating deep cuts in strategic arms.

U.S. Secretary of State George P. Shultz said last month that Soviet troop withdrawal would reduce the Warsaw Pact's edge in divisions in Europe only to 291-1 from 299. NATO estimates Soviet forces in Europe at 2.2 million.

"The Center for Defense Information, a private research group, estimated the Soviets have 1,400 land-based short-range nuclear missiles in Europe. It said the missiles, all mobile, are 600 Scuds, 660 SS-21s and 140 Frogs.

Ledogar, the U.S. ambassador to arms talks that are to start in March, said modernization is an option the United States would like to keep until NATO and the Soviet-led Warsaw Pact have an equal number of troops, tanks and other non-nuclear forces.

NATO will wait to see significance of cutbacks

BRUSSELS, Belgium (AP) — NATO would welcome a unilateral reduction in the Soviet Union's short-range nuclear missiles in Eastern Europe, an official of the Western military alliance said Thursday.

Robin Stafford, a spokesman for the North Atlantic Treaty Organization, said, however, the allies had to wait until the cuts were implemented to determine their significance.

"In any event," he said, "Soviet superiority seems certain for some time."

Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard Shevardnadze told the final session of a 35-nation conference in Vienna that Moscow will withdraw some of its nuclear missiles from Eastern Europe. The missiles, he said, will be pulled out along with troops who control them.

"If this signals that in this field... the Soviets are now beginning to realize that their potential far exceeds legitimate requirements, we can only find such steps encouraging," Stafford said.

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — Polish leader Gen. Wojciech Jaruzelski on Thursday disclosed the government plan for legalizing Solidarity, saying conditions to re-instate the banned union can be negotiated if it agrees to respect the law.

Hundreds riot in Ecuador for 3rd day

GUAYAQUIL, Ecuador (AP) — Riot police dispersed hundreds of students on Thursday, police said, in the third straight day of demonstrations that have left four policemen wounded and a pregnant woman dead.

More than 200 university students rallied in several groups in downtown Guayaquil, 180 miles southwest of Quito, before they were quickly dispersed by authorities Thursday without violence, police said.

Rafael Guerrero, governor of surrounding Guayas Province, said members of the Marxist Democratic Popular Movement and of the populist Rodolfoista Party were instigating the protests to destabilize the nation's new center-left government.

Rodolfoista chief Abelardo Bucaram, a fiery and outspoken populist, lost to left-leaning Rodrigo Borja in last year's presidential elections, which frequently erupted in personal criticism and name calling.

Borja, head of the Democratic Left party, imposed unpopular austerity measures shortly after taking office in August to combat Ecuador's economic problems, including a decade-high inflation figure last year of 85.7 percent.

Police drive back Czech protesters

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia (AP) — Riot police beat protesters with clubs Thursday and formed human cordons to drive 2,000 people from Wenceslas Square, where activists demanding more human rights have rallied for five straight days.

More than seven protesters were beaten badly, and at least 10 were dragged away by police during a melee that broke out after authorities shouted through loudspeakers that the rally was unauthorized.

It was the most violent clash between protesters and police since the gatherings began Sunday.

The crowd had been chanting slogans demanding broader freedoms in the communist-ruled nation, but those slogans changed to "Gestapo, Gestapo!" when the baton-wielding wave of riot police swept through, lashing out indiscriminately.

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
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Settlement ends 13-year controversy

Envirotech settles with city for \$3.1 million

TWIN FALLS - After 13 years, the air has finally cleared around the city's messy sewer plant lawsuit, and Twin Falls taxpayers will pocket \$3.1 million.

Envirotech Corp., which supplied the city with pollution-control equipment for its one-troubled wastewater treatment plant, settled out of court with the city Thursday just days before it was set to return to U.S. District Court in Boise for a new trial.

The city had won a judgment against the

company and two others from a federal court jury in 1984. Envirotech appealed the outcome while the other defendants paid the judgments against them. The city also appealed a portion of the judge's ruling that limited the city's recovery against Envirotech to the purchase price of the equipment.

Under the contract with the city, Envirotech was supposed to repair the equipment or refund the money and remove the equipment if it failed to meet the city's specifications. But the city also wanted to recover other costs it incurred in dealing with the faulty equipment.

The U.S. 9th Circuit Court of Appeals in San Francisco agreed with the city in a Dec. 15, 1986, ruling, and sent the case back to federal District Court.

The case began in 1976 when Twin Falls' new treatment plant failed to meet Environmental Protection Agency standards, and the federal agency sued the city.

The city then filed suit in March 1978 against Envirotech, and the manufacturers, engineers and other companies responsible for building the substandard treatment plant.

The other defendants paid a total of \$1.12

million in judgments against them. Envirotech was ordered by the District Court to pay \$2,109 million, but it appealed instead.

The Circuit Court rejected the appeal, and sent the case back to District Court, where a trial was scheduled to begin Monday.

The city's attorneys from Hopworth, Nungester, Feltner & Tezama had attended several settlement meetings with Envirotech's attorney over the past year, but no agreement was reached.

In the settlement Thursday, Envirotech has agreed to pay the city \$2,676,000. Six months ago, acting on a Circuit Court order,

the company paid the city's attorneys' fees totaling \$416,000 from the 1978 trial.

Envirotech's total payment to the city is just under \$3.1 million.

The city will recover a total of \$4.2 million from all the parties involved, and that brings it to an end, said John Hohnhorst, the city's attorney.

The real winners are the taxpayers and ratepayers who had to bear the burden of the treatment plant repairs, Hohnhorst said.

The settlement money will go back into the wastewater treatment plant fund, he said.

City reports '85 embezzlement

TWIN FALLS - A recently fired city employee was the second finance department worker within four years to be axed for allegedly embezzling public money, officials acknowledged Thursday.

The first embezzlement investigation was not publicized, however, and its findings never went to the county prosecutor for the filing of criminal charges, said City Manager Tom Courtney.

The Times-News learned of the previous embezzlement this week.

"I don't know that I can tell you why it wasn't made public," Courtney said. "The employee that was involved is no longer employed with the city and full restitution was made."

City Councilman Gale Kleinkopf, who was on the council in 1985, said its members decided "that restitution had been made, and we were done with it. It was a council decision not to (pursue charges)."

In comparing the actions taken then with those taken in the most recent investigation, Kleinkopf said he prefers the latter.

"I think it's important that that's discouraged in any way possible. Even though it may also happen in private industry, it's just a different kind of crime with public funds."

"In retrospect, I would say we were probably in error in the first case," Courtney said the issue was being blown out of proportion.

"While it certainly doesn't look very good, I feel we have good financial controls and we have a good accounting system," he said.

"We are in as good a financial condition as anyone in the state."

The two areas where we did have problems concerned relatively small amounts of money, and we did need to make changes there."

The change that was made in 1985 was elimination of the account from which the money was taken, Courtney said. The clerk, who later repaid the money, told city officials she viewed it as borrowing money, which obviously she was not entitled to do, Courtney said.

Courtney said the woman clerk, whose name he would not identify, was fired in August 1985 for allegedly embezzling about \$800 from a petty-cash account. Public Safety Director Tim Qualls said his department investigated the matter, but no charges were filed.

Twin Falls County Prosecutor K. Ellen Baxter said the investigation's findings were never passed along to her office.

In the wake of revelations last week that up to \$7,000 was stolen from a water hookup deposit fund, City Councilman Rick Carr said that while it is common practice to muffle such matters in the private sector, the case should be forwarded to the prosecutor's office when public funds are involved. Prosecutors expect to review the latest investigation's findings today.

Courtney, however, defended city officials' 1985 actions, although he would not specify why they acted as they did.

"I don't know that we have a responsibility to have a news conference to tell everyone that we have a problem," he said. "Certainly I don't think we should try to hide it, but I don't think we need to is-

sue press releases any more than any other business."

Councilman Gale Kleinkopf, who was on the council in 1985, said its members decided "that restitution had been made, and we were done with it. It was a council decision not to (pursue charges)."

Audit confirms missing funds

TWIN FALLS - A city employee for 18 months topped at will into a water deposit fund taking \$7,134 in all, according to the city finance director and an independent audit.

"It was controlled by one person," said Finance Director Rick Thompson on Thursday.

City officials requested the independent audit last week after a city employee - whom officials have not named - reportedly admitted taking money.

The audit, completed Thursday by Seamounts, Bancroft, Smith & Cook, P.C., shows a string of deposits that were late, missing or smaller than records showed they should have been.

"There was no guideline when it should be deposited," Thompson said. He added that no one was cross-checking a cashier who alone checked whether deposits and receipts totals matched.

"It should have been done more often," Thompson said. "That's one of the things that is in place now."

He said several employees had keys to City Hall and knew the combination for the Finance Department's safe.

Police also completed their embezzlement investigation Thursday and plan to turn their report over to the county prosecutor's office today, said City Attorney Fritz Wonderlich.

Wonderlich said one utilities

service employee was fired two weeks ago after admitting to taking money. No charges have been filed, said County Prosecutor K. Ellen Baxter.

"I have not seen one lick of this report," Baxter said. "I would prefer to see the investigation proceed, reports filed and charges filed before it gets in the newspaper."

The first discrepancy between receipts and cash deposited was \$150 in September 1986. The next month \$25 more was deposited than receipts.

The audit, starting in November 1986, deposits were made later in each successive month until no deposit was made for September 1987's \$2,000 in receipts.

The process began again, and in January 1988 no money was deposited after \$1,275 in water deposits were paid.

From then until the end of 1988, discrepancies of as much as \$550 occurred every month between receipt totals and deposits.

In February it was a little more obvious as far as what was going on," Thompson said.

In order to prevent embezzlement in the future, Thompson has written several new guidelines governing how cash can be handled and who has access to the buildings.

All locks in City Hall and safe combinations were changed and access to the safes limited to three people, Thompson said.

Legislators: Corps should act responsibly at Crystal Springs

BOISE - If the Army Corps of Engineers won't play the state's game at a Hagerman Valley tank, the state may find operating the corps' fish hatchery inconvenient, two Magic Valley senators say.

At issue is rejuvenation of the once-clear Crystal Springs Lake. The flow of fresh water into the lake has been diminished by diversions for a private and a corps fish hatchery, and the waters have been muddied with fish waste from the private hatchery.

In December, the state department of water resources agreed to let the corps increase its Crystal Springs water rights from 125 cubic feet per second to 175 cfs if certain conditions were met. But the corps has withdrawn its application, saying it couldn't live with the state's restrictions.

The state basically would have required unused water to be allowed to flow into Crystal Springs Lake and a

nearby natural drainage that state officials described as a wasteway now.

The corps pipes water from Crystal Springs on the north side of the Snake River to its steelhead hatchery on the south. The state said diverting water and then pouring it unused into the river is an unauthorized diversion of water and should be stopped immediately.

The corps would not be allowed to divert water after the steelhead were released each year, and at times of the year when less water was needed to sustain the fish, the unused water would have to be diverted to the lake and a "smaller amount" to the drainage.

That would require the corps to build a system to get water from its collection system to Crystal Springs Lake, where at least a portion of the water originally drained.

Corps project manager Joe McMichael, in Walla Walla, Wash., said the entire decision was "too restrictive and not worth the problems

that would be created."

But Sen. Laird Noh, R-Kimberly, and Sen. John Peavey, D-Carey, still want to see the corps improve its water-management practices to allow more water to flow into Crystal Springs Lake.

The federal government pays the state to run the steelhead hatchery on the Snake River. The senators, both of whom serve on the Senate Resources and Environment Committee, said they would consider withholding the state Fish and Game Department's \$529,300 appropriation for the hatchery if the corps does not act responsibly.

"We don't want to disrupt the raising of steelhead," Peavey said. "But it's incredible to me an effort to enhance the environment wasn't put together more carefully to enhance the environment of the Hagerman Valley."

More than 345,000 pounds per year of steelhead are grown at the Magic Valley hatchery to compensate

Tourism tax clears 1st hurdle

BOISE - A proposed half-cent entertainment tax passed its first obstacle Thursday when the House Commerce, Industry and Tourism Committee gave hesitant approval to a bill printed for discussion.

The tax could raise an additional \$2 million annually for tourism promotions by collecting a penny per \$2 on services that tourists use - restaurant meals, deli take-outs, movie admissions, state park campsites, movie admissions and car rentals, among others.

The bill is likely to see plenty of revision before - and if it reaches the floor of the House. Most committee members, including Magic Valley Reps. Gary Robbins, Ralph Peters

and Tom Morrison, said they were going ahead with printing mostly for the sake of discussion.

The legislators, while supporting the need for more tourism funding, questioned if the tax was practical or fair.

The proposal also lacked the unanimous support of the industries that would collect the tax: Innkeepers, who now collect a 2 cent room tax, liked it. Retailers didn't.

"Tax bills should be as administratively practical and efficient as possible," said Tim Brennan, president of the Idaho Retailers Association. "I can tell you it's going to be chaos in the grocery store and chaos in (state tax) audits if this passes."

Retailers would be required to collect the half-cent tax on delicatessen food or any other ready-to-eat food

prepared on site.

That means a frozen pizza would not be taxed, but one heated up in a Circle K microwave would be, he said. The law could be interpreted to mean bakery bread is taxed, while other bread is not, he said.

"I have not seen anyone from the private sector except the innkeepers support this," he said.

He hid legislators for considering a tax increase in the face of state surpluses.

Supermarket take-out food must be included in the tax if restaurant food is, said David Hand, executive director of the Idaho Innkeepers Association, and a representative of the Idaho Tourism Task Force.

Thirty years ago consumers spent only 15 or 20 percent of their food

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Council approves 6 miles of trails

SUN VALLEY — Sun Valley's bike path system is one step closer to completion after the City Council Tuesday gave the OK to six more miles of trails.

Dick Fosbury of Galena Engineering, which has been responsible for the bike path system so far, presented the council a \$114,000 contract for six more miles of trails. The council approved that contract.

"These six miles are a continuation of the bike path system approved last year in a special bond that allocated \$1.2 million for the project.
The system grew out of safety concerns, Sun Valley Planning and Zoning Administrator Oliver Dibble said. The city was trying to find a way to take the bikers off the street," Dibble said.

"We're never going to get all the bikers off the road," he said. "But we'll get some, and the joggers and walkers, and that's a long way to wards safety."

Several segments of the bike path have already been completed. This new contract will complete segments from Highway 75 to the Sunrise Subdivision, from Dollar Road to city limits. Also, the plan will complete paths from the Sun Valley Lodge to Boundary Creek and the Snowbrush pedestrian bridge near the community school.

The pedestrian bridge has sparked some concern from nearby residents. One of those residents, Peter Caron, presented a petition to the council opposing construction of the bridge.

"The petition was concerned about increased traffic in the area. It also stated that vandalism might increase and it could create a problem if parents started to drive down that road to drop their children off at the community school. The petition has about 15 signatures.

Dick Fosbury does not think the bridge will create more traffic in the area. "That's an appropriate concern," he said. "But during the public

hearings last year the community school promised to keep that from happening."

The bike path system is separate from the Blaine County Recreation District trail system, funded by a \$1.7 million bond passed last August. Fosbury said eventually the two systems will meet. "In a resort area like this, it will be a great system for the community," Fosbury said.

In other matters, Doug Clement, a spokesman for the Lane Ranch developers, said they would donate a parcel of land on the subdivision to be used in conjunction with the Bureau of Land Management as a wildlife preserve.

"If someone wants to give us land, let's take a look at it," Councilman Sean McCoy said. "But I would hate to see preliminary plat approval based on that."

The Lane Ranch subdivision has sparked local controversy and is still waiting approval by the planning and zoning committee.

Parsons is going to speak to Idaho legislators to see if legislation can be passed to allow a city to publish an intent to vacate, thereby eliminating the need for contacting individuals.

Hansen officials consider Kimberly's proposal of consolidation

HANSEN — School Board members will meet with Hansen administrators for a work session Thursday to discuss the issue of consolidation with Kimberly.

The session, set for 1 p.m. at the high school, will include discussion of a proposal from the Kimberly District to consolidate.

If the board decides to go ahead, we need to have a town meeting by the end of this month," Board Chairman Bill Allen said earlier this week.

In other matters, the board heard about a winter fun day planned in February and the school's asbestos plan. Hansen schools were approached

last winter by the Kimberly School Board with a proposal to consolidate the two districts. The proposal called for building a middle school and gym complex in Kimberly on land that was being considered for purchase. school is free of asbestos.

The Idaho Innkeepers Association sees the tax as a way to spread the cost of travel promotions to all businesses that benefit from tourism trade. Although the 2 cent bed tax would be dropped, income from the tax would still increase from \$1.88 million to \$3.5 million or \$4 million. Most of the additional money would

be spent for state promotions, rather than regional promotions.

"We're not creating a tax, we're spreading it out," said Twin Falls Rep. Lee Barnes, who serves on the committee.

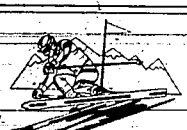

Experience gives Jerome star edge

JEROME — If there is a resident expert on South-Central Idaho Conference girls' basketball and the Class A-2 schools that make up District 4, it has to be Jerome High School senior Janyce Anderson.

"Yeah, I know most of the girls (from the other four teams in the league), says Anderson, a 5-foot, 9-inch senior forward who has led Jerome to its best start in a decade. "There are advantages and disadvantages playing against people that you know so well."

The teams of the SCIC, being a close-knit lot, see a lot of each other. But Anderson has more first-hand knowledge than most seniors in the conference. She played for part of her freshman year and half of her sophomore season at Wood River High School before transferring at the semester to Jerome.

In fact, Anderson has packed an amazing amount of basketball into five seasons since she took up the sport as an eighth-grader at Wood River Junior High School. She has played for five different coaches, including two at Jerome High.

"She's had a lot of adjustments to make in the years I've been watching her play, and she's developed into very good basketball player," says Burley coach Gordon Kerbs. "She's just a great athlete. She has a lot of athletic ability and she's very competitive. There's a lot of raw talent there."

(Burley and Mountain Home are members of the SCIC along with Jerome, Buhl and Wood River, but the Bobcats and Tigers do not compete with the other three teams in the postseason state-qualifying tournament.)

"She really has progressed since her first year," says Jerome coach Ken Wright. "She's gone from a system in which she was expected to try to score all the time to one in which she has to go to the boards hard, play defense and shoot from the outside. She's become a more complete player."

Anderson, Wright adds, has also undergone a change of attitude. "She missed all but the tail end of last season with academic problems, but you know she came back and has become a better player than ever," he says. "Her grades are up, she has a positive outlook and she's providing a lot of leadership."

"It amazes me that she has come back so strong," says Kerbs. "There are not many athletes who can sit out most of their junior year and do that."

Anderson has become the catalyst for a remarkable turnaround in Jerome High's girls' basketball fortunes. The Tigers finished 9-14 last season and haven't been to the state A-2 tournament for eight years.

This season, Jerome won its first nine games and will go into the last week of the regular season with an 11-6 record, a one-game lead on Buhl in the District 4 standings and a real shot at making the state A-2 tournament at the College of Southern Idaho in Twin Falls next month. "Our girls' cross country and track

teams have always done well, but our volleyball and girls' basketball teams haven't done that great," she says. "This year everybody is excited about basketball. It's a lot of fun."

Anderson is averaging 16.5 points and 9.9 rebounds a game, and as the Tigers' star she sees her share of double-teaming and box-and-one defenses.

But she insists it's her teammates that are in large part responsible for her big senior season — and Jerome's.

"When you play on a team with Liz Gilbert (Jerome's 5-9 sophomore forward) — and our guards, teams can't concentrate as much on you," Kerbs notes that when Anderson plays well, the Tigers do too.

"She just killed us the other night (43-39 victory that won the SCIC tie-for-Burley Wednesday night)," says Kerbs. "She got 21. The first time we played them we held her to four points and beat them 61-24."

Anderson has increased her effectiveness by becoming a more versatile player, according to her coach. "We've tried to create a more patient offense, which was not what she was used to," says Wright. "She looks for her opportunities, has developed her outside shot and has become a much better defensive player."

"The biggest difference this year is confidence," she says. "I'm playing with a lot more confidence and so is everybody else on this team. The coach has a lot of confidence in us this year."

"Of course, it helps to know the territory. The teams we play might say, 'well, she dribbles with this hand, so defense her this way,'" Anderson says. "But I know them too, so sometimes I'm able to help my teammates out with what to expect."

Her prediction for her fourth straight District 4 A-2 basketball tournament against seven-time defending district champion Buhl? "Oh, it will be tough," says Anderson, who has seen more district tournaments than any of the three head coaches in the A-2 district. "We've always played them tough, but this year we want to beat them. This year we want to play in the state tournament."

TWIN FALLS — If there is \$6 in the family budget for basketball this season, this probably would be the weekend to use it.

It is the first time in two years two national-ranked teams will meet on the local floor when the college of Southern Idaho men host Utah Valley Saturday night but that will come only after Salt Lake Community College, rated by Coach Fred Trenkle as "definitely having top-20 talent," tests his Golden Eagles tonight.

IDLE THOUGHTS

Because unburned fuel in the exhaust is burned off in the catalytic converter, a car that idles for too long has an increased risk of fire. This may happen as a result of the catalytic converter becoming overly hot. At the very least, over-idling increases engine wear and spark-plug fouling. The smart start consists of a one-minute idle, followed by driving at slow- or-than-average speed until the engine warms up. In the event that the engine is slow to reach normal operating temperature, the cooling system's thermostat should be checked. A car that runs cold is subject to excessive engine wear and lowered efficiency.

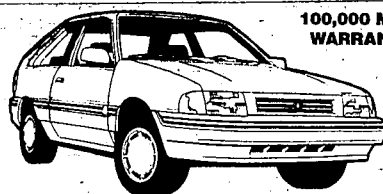

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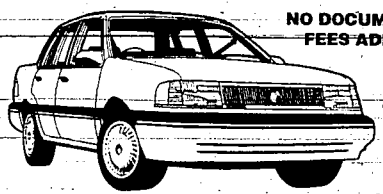

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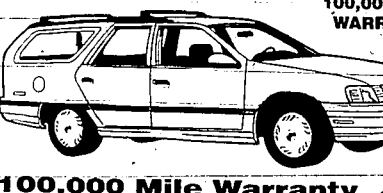

'Redneck Review' gains wider audience

TWIN FALLS — It started with a couple of friends in Fairfield. It's now run from a large, white house in the homes of cowboys and scholars, and semi-annually takes up about a quarter of an inch more space on the shelves of several major American university libraries.

It's the "Redneck Review of Literature." This 80-page collection of fiction, poetry, essays and book reviews is also known in advertisements as the "West's Only Magazine of Contemporary Western Literature, Publishing the Finest New and Established Writers of Our Time."

The 14-year-old periodical, published by Penelope Reedy, recently

received a \$3000 grant from the Idaho Humanities Council to supplement the production of its spring 1990 "Born in Idaho" Centennial issue. The grant will pay four scholars to write critical essays on the works and lives of Idaho native writers Vardis Fisher, Ezra Pound and David Lane Wright.

"I'm really looking for Idaho writers," says Reedy, who started the publication in 1976 and has kept it in circulation through good times and bad.

"All the creative works within the magazine are going to be by people born in Idaho. That's the criteria. The books we review will be books published in Idaho. And the scholars will discuss writers that were born in Idaho."

She says the idea of just who are "Idaho" writers is an interesting concept. "Ezra Pound, for instance, was born in Hanley, but only lived there for 18 months of his life. He left when he was 18 months old. Does that make him an Idaho writer?"

Reedy has had her own work published in publications ranging from "Basic Magazine" and "Western American Literature" to "The New York Times Book Review." She wrote reviews of off-Broadway plays for a show business publication and did some bulletin inserts for the Lutheran Church in America. Yet one of the reasons she started editing and publishing "The Redneck Review" was because she was frustrated in finding no market for the things she really wanted to write.

"I've always been a writer and some friends of mine got together and thought we'd spend the winter teaching ourselves what we could teach ourselves," and practice and share things and submit things to publications to see what we could learn," she says. "At the end of the

first winter doing that we decided to publish something — and it just kept going from there.

The Review's first issue was a tabloid of essays and journalistic

pieces concentrating on water issues in the Camas Prairie. It was published by Reedy and two friends. During the next years people came and went until the publication almost

fizzled out. Reedy found she was the only one left interested in publishing the review annually.

Since that time, the magazine has grown to the present subscriber list

of 150 dedicated readers. The rest of the copies of the 400 magazines that are now printed twice a year are sold at bookstores nationwide. Reedy

You may not become a star, but these tapes will help

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — Harold "Happy" Traum can help you learn to play a musical instrument without being "teared" about practicing. And you don't even have to leave home.

Traum and his wife run a mail-order business known as Homegun Tapes. They produce audio and video tapes of instructional music lessons featuring top musicians as instructors.

In 20 years of business, they've sold hundreds of thousands of such tapes to aspiring

musicians around the world.

"We've sent tapes to just about any country you can name: Malaysia, lots of African countries, Japan. And we get letters from people in Poland, Czechoslovakia and the Soviet Union who say they can't send money. They send us items in exchange like a crystal vase," Traum said.

Each of the 60- and 90-minute tapes feature one of the 50 musicians who are teachers.

The Who's John Entwistle teaches electric bass. Chet Atkins teaches country guitar. Livingston Taylor teaches acoustic guitar and Clarence "Gatemouth" Brown teaches blues guitar. For blues harmonica, the

teacher is John Sebastian, formerly of the Lovin' Spoonful.

Other lessons teach fiddle, banjo, mandolin, autoharp, dulcimer, flute, keyboard and synthesizer. Altogether, more than 400 tapes have been done.

Tapes are categorized according to level: beginning, easy intermediate, intermediate and advanced intermediate. Most audio tapes are \$12.95, or \$65 for a series of six. Video tapes, added about seven years ago, cost \$49.95 and \$59.95.

There's just about every kind of music imaginable, with one exception.

"We're not interested in heavy metal," the

50-year-old Traum said during a visit to Nashville for a taping session. The Traums live in Woodstock, N.Y.

Traum, who teaches guitar and banjo himself on the tapes, says learning to play this way has several benefits.

"You can't get personal lessons from these people: They are the best in the world," he said. "You can rewind and play as much as you want. They don't get mad at you if you don't practice."

"Lots of adults don't like to go to a teacher because of a bad childhood experience or maybe their schedule doesn't permit it. This way, you can come home from work or get

up in the morning and put a tape on.

"It does not have the personal contact that a human teacher has, so I would say that people should take lessons from a real teacher as well if they can. But these tapes are the closest you can get to that. We try hard to make these personal. Our name suggests that."

He says the tapes also are a bargain because one hour of personal music instruction could range anywhere from \$15 to \$50.

"Any one-hour video gives the average student five or six lessons and several weeks or even months of practicing," Traum says.

Hall of Fame inductees celebrate

NEW YORK — This year's five inductees into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame — Dion, Otis Redding, the Rolling Stones, the Temptations and Stevie Wonder — are a gathering of the soulful side of the '60s.

Formal induction ceremonies took place Wednesday night at the Waldorf-Astoria, where the three previous induction banquets have been

held.

An exuberant Dion exclaimed, "I got in! I got in! This is a major moment for me. I'm conscious and breathing and right here with you and enjoying every minute."

Dion said music to him was a way to "share my feelings, love, hates, thoughts, perceptions. It is a way of connecting."

Pete Townsend, who presented the award to the Rolling Stones, said the

Stones had "influenced his own British band, The Who."

"The Stones were at rock band to

begin with: The Who became a rock band partly because of the Stones," Townsend said.

He dismissed suggestions that the Stones are outdated.

"I think the debate between Mick (Jagger) and Keith (Richards) is the same debate we're (The Who) having — are we capable of doing anything new of consequence? Whether the Stones do anything new doesn't matter to me. They have a fantastic collection of stuff."

David Ruffin, former lead singer with the Temptations, said he will always consider himself a part of the group.

"That's something I'm very proud of — to have been a part of the group and I always will be," Ruffin said.

Right now, the 20 artists or groups named to the Hall of Fame since 1966 are honorees without a home — ground has not yet been broken for the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame archives and museum in Cleveland, scheduled to open in 1992.

To be inducted, artists must have recorded more than 25 years ago. All of this year's fourth honored group had records released before Jan. 1, 1964. They were elected by more than 150 performers, producers, writers, record executives and

broadcasters for their contributions to, or influence on, the course of rock 'n' roll.

The Rolling Stones' induction include the original five members, Jagger, Richards, the late Brian Jones, Bill Wyman and Charlie Watts, plus Mick Taylor who replaced Jones; Ron Wood who replaced Taylor and the late pianist-arranger Ian Stewart, who made an important contribution to the group's sound. At the beginning, the Stones were immersed in "raunchy" American blues and rhythm 'n' blues.

The group went on to record songs by Jagger and Richards and had major hits including "Satisfaction," "Jumpin' Jack Flash," "Street Fighting Man" and "Honky Tonk Women." They have been hailed as the world's greatest rock 'n' roll band.

The soul group the Temptations have original members Otis Williams, Melvin Franklin, Eddie Kendricks, the late Paul Williams and David Ruffin inducted, plus Dennis Edwards, who replaced Ruffin in 1968. Later replacements are not included. The Temps' major breakthrough was in 1963 with "My Girl." Later hits include "Cloud 9" and "Papa Was a Rolling Stone."

Stevie Wonder was born Stelveland Morris Hardaway on May 13, 1950, in Detroit. His first record, "Fingertips, Part 2," became a hit when he was just 13. Wonder, who was born blind, has written one imaginative piece of music after another in his soulful, pop and experimental concept albums. He opened for the Stones on

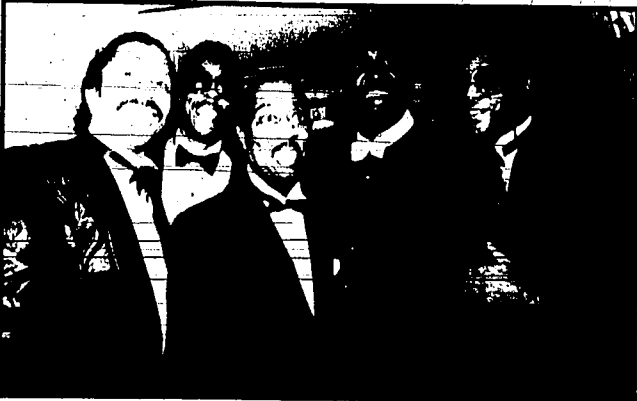

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Utah offers rich material to comic

SALT LAKE CITY — Janine Gardner has found that in the competitive world of stand-up humor, where success is judged in LPs, or laughs per minute, Utah is "a bottomless pit for good comedy material."

A Utahn since the age of nine, Gardner says that being raised Catholic in a predominantly Mormon state has given her a peculiar perspective she plays for laughs in clubs from Amarillo to Cedar Rapids.

A sample: "Growing up in Utah, I was always grateful to be raised as a Catholic rather than a Mormon because at least I could have a cigarette between pregnancies."
 A 1972 graduate of Hillcrest High School in Salt Lake City, Gardner has worked her way through the wilderness of 10-minute warmup spots for main acts to the top of the marquee in dozens of cities.

Gardner, 34, says she resists the temptation to turn her act into an anti-Utah diatribe, partly because her audiences are not as familiar with the state's idiosyncrasies, but also because she is a loyal Utahn.

"Utah and the Mormons have

treated me very well," Gardner says. "I never forget that and I try to stay away from the cheap shots. And hey, I'm from the state, too."
 "If the Mormon Church comes in for some gentle ribbing, Gardner's own religion also absorbs a few of her jabs.

Like Barr, however, Gardner has her sights set on television and believes her road-hopping strategy will get her there.

"I want to come up slow and steady. I realize my state of readiness must be just right, but TV is where I want to be," Gardner said. "My career is moving a lot faster than I thought it would. Eventually I would like to have my own television show and make as much money as humanly possible."

Like many humorists, Gardner credits a chaotic childhood for the emotional grit that shapes her material.

"Most comedians who create their own material are usually coming

from some dysfunctional background which gives them a special twist to their insight," Gardner said. While many of the best comedians work out their demons by getting other people to laugh at them, Gardner points out that the same demons drive many of her peers to drug and alcohol abuse.

"If you're looking for zonked-out comedians, they are not too hard to find," said Gardner, whose comedic credentials include a turbulent childhood adoption.

"When I found comedy, I felt like I was finally home. All the things I was punished for in my life are being paid for now," she said. "Comedy comes from the ability to look at painful things and use them to make people laugh."

"Comics have a responsibility to tell the truth and they are the only artists who do tell the truth. Everything I do up there is representative of who I am," she said.

Gardner says that offering her insight in comic form is the most important part of what she does, not the laughter and applause it sometimes brings.

"I like recognition and response, but I don't need it on. For some of the guys, the response is a fix that they crave," she says.

 says 60 percent of her readership is in Idaho, the rest from outside the state. Perusers include farmers, professors, writers, publishers — "People who like to read," she says.

Reedy was attending a meeting of the Idaho Commission of the Arts in Coeur d'Alene 10 years ago when the present name of the magazine came to her. "I sort of played around with them," she says of the titles up until that time. The review had been called, at various times, "The Gams," "Side Road" and "Guns and Grammar."

But at the commission meeting, Reedy says people seemed to want to copy what other states were doing and there was a feeling expressed that Idaho needed to be "as good as somewhere else."

"One of the places the magazine has mushroomed to is the rare books department at the University of Wisconsin in Madison. It's one of about 10 universities to subscribe to 'The Redneck Review.'"
 Susan Ehler, an assistant in the

rare books department at the University of Wisconsin, says the "Redneck" is categorized as an "ephemeral," meaning it's small with a very select readership.

Issues of the "Redneck" are not allowed to circulate, but are kept in vaults and brought out for people to use in the library. The value of small publications, she says, is that they might introduce unknown authors who could someday become great American writers.

"We want to preserve these things for the future," says Ehler. "Who's to say right now who's going to be famous in the future? So we try to save them all within the scope of the collection."

William Studebaker, assistant professor of English at the College of Southern Idaho, author, poet and regular contributor to "The Redneck Review," says the "Redneck" gives writers an outlet for their writing.

"Penny's very generous about who she will publish," he says. "She provides an opportunity and I think she has the kind of readership that's important to me in what I have to say."

Studebaker says the periodical is eclectic in that it tends to promote diverse rural and agrarian perspectives built around life in the western United States.

"She has good contributors," says Studebaker. Edward Abbey, King Stanford, Harold Windham — people like that. It's certainly worth picking up and reading."

Whether planned or unintentional, a default turns that lender into a donor. Everyone should regard a loan—even to a friend or relative—as a business transaction, and treat it accordingly.

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Hall of Famers' discs available

Four of the five artists or groups inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame are well represented on compact disc.

There are nearly three dozen Rolling Stones albums in CD, including numerous greatest hits packages, according to the January issue of the Schvann CD catalog. Similarly, Schwann reports that there are 17 CD albums by the Temptations and 19 by Stevie Wonder.

While Otis Redding fans have a right to bemoan the absence in CD of the late soul singer's classic live albums (especially "Live in Europe"), there is an excellent 60-song Redding anthology on Nig shelves.

The artist who is most under-represented is Dion DiMucci, whose late '60s and early '70s hits were some of the most marvelously convincing expressions of youthful romanticism and desire ever recorded. Schwann shows that the only domestic CD is "Dion's Greatest Hits" on Columbia — a 10-song package that includes only seven of the New Yorker's 14 Top 20 singles.

Still, the situation is less of an embarrassment than last year when the only Atlantic Records CD devoted to the Drifters (one of the five 1988 inductees) featured just the post-1968 work of the outstanding R&B vocal group.

Atlantic, incidentally, has just corrected that oversight by issuing two highly recommended Drifters albums in CD — one ("Let the Boogie Woogie in") is devoted to the gritty 1963-68 works featuring singer Clyde McPhatter, the other to the lush 1969-65 recordings. Both albums are two-disc, 40-song collections.

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Charge it!

'The January Man' — short on logic, long on charm

HOLLYWOOD — A singular quirkiness has been the engaging quality of "The January Man" writer, John Patrick Shanley: characters like Nicolas Cage's in "Moonstruck," who lost one hand because of love — well, love and not paying attention to a bread-slicing machine — or the assortment of Bronx poets and psychopaths in "Five Corners." There is a very fresh quality to Shanley's work, a wild lyric hand with character and dialogue that makes his pairing with Irish-born director Pat O'Connor all the more understandable (Thus far O'Connor has made a mad triad of films: the distinguished "Cal," the delicate introspection of "A Month in the Country" and the truly loony "Stars and Bars"). Unfortunately, this same unpredictability is what makes "The January Man" charming and exasperating at the same time.

Its characters are the Manhattanites whose speech patterns intrigue Shanley so, from an intrepid, utterly unorthodox ex-detective, Nick Starkey (Kevin Kline), to a Tammany-style mayor (Rod Steiger), with an aureole of white hair and a vindictive police commissioner (Harvey Keitel).

In proper Shanley cat's-cradle style, Keitel is also Kline's brother, and Keitel's now-wife, Susan Saran-



Kevin Kline and Mary Elizabeth Mastrantonio star as determined police detective and daughter of the mayor, was the flame who fed Kline's home fires only a few short years before. And to thicken the plot, it is the mayor's 23-year-old daughter, Mary Elizabeth Mastrantonio, who begins an impetuous affair with Kline just as this romantic thriller opens. Some years earlier, Kline was



banished from his slot as the police department's great intuitive master sleuth to the New York Fire Department on trumped-up allegations of graft. It turns out to be dirty family doings.

However, the amiable Kline is faced as contentedly into the life of a firefighter as he had into the life of a detective — perhaps more so. Putting out fires and saving children seems a little more straightforward to him than dealing with the twisted mentalities of the world of homicide.

But what the serial killings of 11 young women over as many months, from somewhere comes the cry to bring hero-fighter Kline back as special investigator on the case. It is a move made over the reverberating protests of precinct Capt. Danny Aiello. However, it comes at the following of mayor Steiger, and as any actor can tell you, it is a losing battle to get into a screaming contest with Rod Steiger, "The Last Hurrah" himself.

O'Connor and Shanley give generous texture to Kline's character, to his friendship with Ed-the-artist (the

charismatic Alan Rickman, "Die Hard" s' turnin' villain), to the torch that Kline still carries for Sarandon and to the setup for his immediate hot-shot romance with Mastrantonio. Yet, enticing as all this is, it wrecks havoc with the movie's crime-thriller format, which requires that we at least pretend to believe Kline's method in fathoming the killer's madness.

Kline begins with the probable theory that the killer has used prime numbers as the dates of each of his previous 11 murders, and thus will strike on a predictable January date. As the unflappable Ed turns into a wizardly sidekick, Kline goes into three-dimensional computer imaging and side trips to the planetarium to flesh out his diagram of his quarry's mental processes. It makes us mesmerized by the workings of this psychopath's mind and frustrates us mightily when we learn as little as we do about him at the movie's end.

Kline's leaps of intuition might put even Sherlock Holmes' eyelids at half-staff in disbelief. And if those leaps bother you, don't even think about the jumps in behavior that Sarandon's biting, mink-swathed matron must make during the course of the film (rated R for language and brief nudity). It is a tasty but hors d'oeuvre-size role for Sarandon, making her character the second one we leave wanting to know more about.

"The January Man" is nothing to seek out if you want airtight logic. What it offers is charm, blather, the dazzle of writing and performance that wears thin well before the final, credibility-straining quarter. Kline, Mastrantonio, Sarandon and Rickman carry their charm most effectively; although the Kline-Mastrantonio affair begins precariously, it is amplified in a way to sweep you away, too. But you know what county you're in when one of the young under-detectives calls Kline "a shamus"; it is far closer to Gloucestria than the County of New York.

'Cocoon: The Return' proves sequels can keep imagination of the original

hip characters. **RAIN MAN (R).** Because we have had dozens of luddy films about journeys of discovery, we can plot the scenario of this one like a road map: The special qualities of one will work on the other to change him, or perhaps, both of them...Dustin Hoffman makes his autistic savant character hypnotically interesting and sometimes terribly funny. Tom Cruise gives his looses, most authoritative performance since "Risky Business" and it can be said that he holds his own with the masterly Hoff-

Super Bowl XXIII promises most evenly matched teams in long time

When NBC's Dick Enberg and Merlin Olsen take to the airwaves to broadcast Super Bowl XXIII from Joe Robbie Stadium in Miami, on Sunday, Jan. 22, they will describe the climactic event of a season that has seen the efforts to achieve parity in the NFL come to fruition.

At the end of this season, one of the most competitive in recent memory, the playoff picture was not solidified until the final game had been decided. And for the first time since the advent of the Super Bowl, neither team from last year's championship even qualified for post-season play. It was a fitting commemoration for the 20th anniversary of Joe Namath's confident boast that the upstart AFL's underdog New York Jets would beat the potent, established Baltimore Colts. He guaranteed it; then he came across.

That 1969 victory at the Orange Bowl in Miami signified the breaking of a grip that the old guard had held on the pro game. Over the course of the next two decades, the pro football establishment was turned on its collective ear. Emerging to take the place of the old Chicago Bears, Cleveland Browns, Green Bay Packers, Washington Redskins and New York Giants — the traditional elite — were the Pittsburgh Steelers, Oakland Raiders, Miami Dolphins and Dallas Cowboys. This infusion of new blood was primarily responsible for

boosting the NFL to new, previously unthought-of heights of popularity. And today, the league continues to experience this ongoing cycle of renewal.

As the 1988 season came to an end, neither the Steelers, Raiders, Dolphins nor Cowboys were even in the playoffs, let alone serious Super Bowl contenders. Indeed, Pittsburgh, Miami and Dallas finished dead last in their respective divisions, each with winning percentages well below .500. They, in turn, have been replaced by some resurgent old-guard franchises, as well as several new faces such as the Buffalo Bills, Cincinnati Bengals, Houston Oilers and Philadelphia Eagles.

This process has been helped along by several factors: The quasi-professional nature of collegiate football produces players whose skills have been developed to a professional level before they are ever drafted. The NFL draft system, in turn, is geared to deliver these highly skilled impact players to the teams most in need of their talents. And, perhaps most importantly, the league's policy of competitive scheduling saddles each season's most successful teams with the toughest schedules the fol-

lowing year. This combination virtually assures that the dynastic reigns of past champions are never to be repeated.

Oddy, while this new parity has been reflected in the heightened level of competition during the regular season and in the appearance of one-time also-rans in postseason play, it has yet to become apparent in the Super Bowl. In fact, each of the past five Super Bowls has been nothing short of a blowout, with the closest game being the New York Giants' 19-point victory over the Denver Broncos two years ago.

If Broadway Joe were still in the business of making predictions (and making good on them), maybe he could guarantee the 100 million or so fans around the world who will tune in to the game a Super Bowl that will really live up to its name. That would make the anniversary of the Jets' landmark win complete.

Besides playing a reluctant scientist in a comedy/sci-fi flick, "Time Trackers," Wil is planning occasional nightclub appearances.

Trained in music, drama and classical ballet in her native land, Nina spent time abroad as her father moved from post to post — New York, Egypt, Rome and finally Latin America. Hollywood was always Nina's coveted post. "The Young and the Restless" is an ideal training ground for Nina; and one that keeps her not too far away from Costa Rica and her family.

Norway comes to Hollywood, and

the cheekbones pay off again. Nina is enjoying the current storyline as the beautiful, emotionally immature architect faces a moral dilemma. At the moment, husband George holds the trump card, but Nina has the fans on her side.

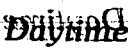

Q: Isn't TV loudmouth Morton Downey Jr. going through a really nasty divorce? — J.W.

A: Downey sued his wife, Ann, for divorce a while back, claiming she was moody and given to jealous "rages." She countersued just before Christmas, calling their 10-year marriage an emotional ordeal and accus-

ing Downey of having an affair with another woman. The TV talker responded that he began seeing other women only after separating from his wife five months ago. "We are going to get down to the Tyson-Givons game, are we?" asks Downey. "Well, I'm good at it."

Q: I read that Laura Dern, the talented young actress who shines in "Haunted Summer," the new movie about a meeting between Kents, Shelley and other literary greats, is related to Cary Grant. I know that Bruce Dern is her father and Diane Ladd her mother, but where does Cary Grant fit in? — G.H.

A: He doesn't. A: The rarer the animal, the higher the price. If you wanted to rent a zebra, it would cost around \$2,000 a day, a camel \$1,300. Dogs, depending on what tricks they can do, start at a daily rate of \$500 and on up.

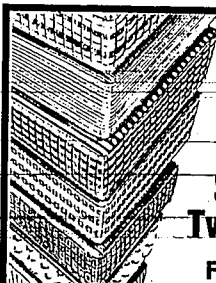



Sajak tries to make transition to talk show

LOS ANGELES — Pat Sajak has hit CBS like a cool breeze in the midst of the doldrums. The debut of his late-night talk show this week has proven that making the "Wheel of Fortune" host into a couch jockey was the right move.

Sajak has come across as friendly and funny. He doesn't have an aggressive act, like Joan Rivers or, to a lesser extent, Arsenio Hall. Sajak is able to be what you have to be if you are going to survive the exposure of daily television — himself.

The result has been an impressive and, so far, popular show that is good news for a network that needs some.

"The Pat Sajak Show" is also almost aggressively traditional with its opening monologue, its desk and couch, its coffee mugs and pencils. In an interview here, Sajak had no apologies for his resemblances to his talk brethren.

"We borrowed from everybody," Sajak said of coming up with the format for his show. "That's a grand tradition in television. David Letterman borrowed from Steve Allen and Johnny Carson borrowed from Jack Benny.

"It's an evolutionary process and, as I've said many times, we set out to do a talk show in the completely traditional manner. We weren't out to break new ground.

"We thought about trying different things, but basically when you plan a talk show, you end up deciding whether to have a chair or a couch. We talked about little things, like putting the guests on the other side of the

host, but it looked dyslexic or something.

"And I'll tell you what, it really doesn't matter what your set looks like if people don't like what's going on. Johnny Carson could have been doing his show from a bench in the park and it would still be a success."

Sajak said that he did not mind at all those who have said that his show looks like so many other talk shows.

"Any comparison to successful shows is flattering," he said. "I'd rather that they say we look like Johnny Carson or Jack Parr than that we look like crap."

CBS first approached Sajak about a talk show two years ago and he was signed a year ago. Though he spent that time putting together a staff and getting a set built, Sajak said that there was really little that could be done beyond deciding those crucial couch-vs.-chair questions.

"Sure, you can talk about the set, but you really can't do much until the show hits the air," he said. "Everything else is evolutionary because you really don't know where all these things are going to go."

Sajak said that he is no comedian in that, unlike so many hosts of talk shows, he has never been a professional stand-up. He doesn't write his own monologues and, indeed, if his monologue had not improved during three practice shows last month, he was planning to go without that opening.

He is certainly not as skilled as Carson or Letterman in his comic delivery, but he is more than competent. Ironically, it is CBS' ratings troubles

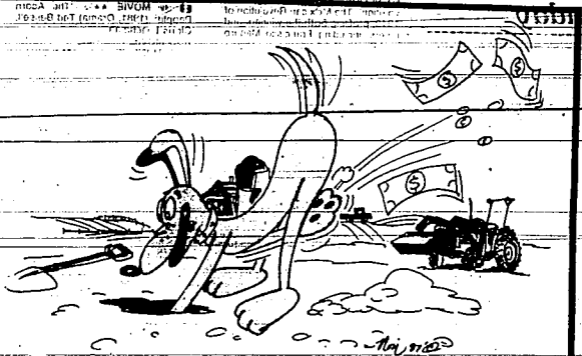

HOLLYWOOD — Harry Perkins is a menace.

At least that is the view of the rigid Establishment — America's CIA, conservative elements of the British media and bureaucracy and the highest echelons of Perkins' own government — which sees in this newly elected prime minister a monstrous threat who shows "alarming signs of turning into a major statesman."

They are terrified because Perkins is a strong-willed reformer, a Laborite outsider and third-generation steelworker determined to sweep away musty ways and fulfill the campaign pledges he made to the British electorate that overwhelmingly elected him over his Tory opponent — presumably Margaret Thatcher. Not merely distrusted because of a revolutionary agenda that includes dismantling nuclear weapons and ridding British soil of U.S. military bases, he is also targeted for destruction.

It is the 1990s, a very appropriate setting for "A Very British Coup."

Here's a promise: You'll find nothing better on television than this rousing, provocative political thriller from Britain, airing on PBS in two parts Sunday and Monday under the Masterpiece Theatre banner.

It's smashing.
You'll also find no more exhilarat-

ing performance than Ray McAnally's as Perkins. An actor of infinite surprises who keeps you intrigued by appearing always to withhold a little something, McAnally's work both as Perkins and that endearing cad Rick Pym of last fall's "A Perfect Spy" on PBS affirms his lofty ranking among character actors. He's a whopper.

The protagonist McAnally plays here is a tough, pragmatic, charming, slippery, TV-smart populist of a politician who initially seems caught off guard by the crippling problems he faces in office and the depth of the conspiracy to undermine him. He's not a man to be underestimated, however, even though the clandestine conspirators opposing him include a powerful media lord a la Rupert Murdoch and Britain's closest ally, the Americans.

Infused by John Keane's tense, dizzying music, Mick Jackson's electrifying direction creates somber tones of mystery and foreboding. He does more than place you on the perilous political high wire with Perkins. He also puts you inside the minds of the loathing plotters who consider Perkins intolerably radical.

"We have to protect the freedoms our ancestors bequeathed to us," sniffs Sir Percy Browne (wonderfully played by Alan MacNaughtan), the government's shadowy, thin-lipped, elegantly malevolent intelligence chief, a dangerous extension of those

enduring government types who become calcified to their jobs and tradition.

A sort of silky J. Edgar Hoover, Browne and his smarmy, goose-necked assistant have at their disposal vast computerized files on everyone and the latest in electronic bugging and spying technology that allows them to track virtually every move the prime minister makes.

Less fiction than reasonable conjecture, "A Very British Coup" is that endangered television species — something to chew on. The notion that, in various degrees, even democracies include secret governments within governments that operate beyond view and without public mandate is chillingly real, reinforced by such contemporary U.S. history as the Watergate and Iran-Contra scandals.

Adapted by Alan Plater from a Chris Mullin novel, "A Very British Coup" presents a particularly terrifying scenario by seeming to place a head of state in the lethal grip of not only his political enemies but also his own subordinates. The story's plot twists, dark alleys and hairpin curves all encourage a feeling of uneasiness.

Always slow to back formidable, potentially controversial stories about Washington politics, American television has offered nothing comparable to "A Very British Coup," which aired on Britain's bold Channel Four network.

that have helped Sajak in that they have given him ammunition for many of his jokes.

Sajak said that Thursday he was talking to CBS Chairman Laurence Tisch who encouraged him to go ahead and "take his shots at the network as long as they were getting laughs.

"CBS was in first place for something like 25 years and they got a bit arrogant over that time," Sajak said. "When they started having the ratings troubles, they really didn't have a sense of humor about it.

"Look, it's not a secret that the network has had its problems. It's been in the papers. And I think if I can kid about it, it will help the network's image," he said, noting that Carson used to mine NBC's ratings problems regularly when his network was in third place.

Sajak got very good ratings numbers in his debut and, though there has been some dropoff, has done more than respectable since, beating Carson in the big cities while trailing slightly when the national numbers come in.

That should help Sajak in his major battle with the network's affiliates,

getting them to carry the 90-minute show in the first place. Sajak does get much better clearance than the previous CBS late-night offerings, reaching almost 95 percent of the United States. But half of the network's affiliates start him at midnight, reducing the potential audience.

CBS should be patient with Sajak. He has got the stuff to be a long-running host of this kind of show and Carson, who is in his mid-60s, is not going to be around forever. In less than a week, Sajak has shown himself to be the logical inheritor of his mantle.

"I'm not counting on Johnny retiring," Sajak said. "He might be around two years, five years or 10 years. In the meanwhile, we're not going to do anything that different, we're not going to do the show in Latin or something.

"I just like to think that I have my own personality that I bring to the show. It's the only one I know and so far it's been pretty good to me."

NBC tops Niensens for week

NEW YORK (AP) — Things got back to relative normal in the weekly Nielsen's last week: There were no football playoffs, and NBC won big.

Several NBC shows recorded their highest ratings from the A.C. Nielsen Co. so far this season, last week: "Cheers," "A Different World," "Midnight Caller" and "In the Heat of the Night."

The top-rated show of the week was NBC's "The Cosby Show," whose 29.8 rating was its highest of the season, except for an earlier special one-hour episode.

The rest of the top 10 were: "A Different World," NBC; "Cheers," NBC; "Roseanne," ABC; "Who's the Boss?" ABC; "The Golden Girls," NBC; "Murder, She Wrote," CBS; "60 Minutes," CBS; "L.A. Law," NBC; and "Dear John," NBC.

NBC won the week with an average prime-time rating of 16.1. ABC was second with a 13.0 and CBS had a 12.6. That made it a very average week, since after 17 weeks of the official television season — delayed on CBS and ABC because of the writers strike — NBC had a 15.8, ABC a 13.0 and CBS 12.2.

NBC continued to trail in the news race, though. The "CBS Evening News" won with a 12.1 and 21 share. "ABC World News Tonight" had an 11.4 and 19 share. "NBC Nightly News" had a 10.9 and 19 share.

Each rating point represents 904,000 homes with televisions. The share is a percentage of sets in use.

CBS' comedies "Murphy Brown" and "Designing Women" did well, tying for 18th.

The lowest-rated network shows of the week were: "Mission Impossible," "Incredible Sunday," "Tattinger's," "A Fine Mess," "West 57th," "HeartBeat," "Knightwatch," "TV 101" and "Murphy's Law."

Fox's "Married ... With Children" scored an impressive 10.3 rating and 15 share and tied with CBS' "Paradise" at 59th out of 61 rankings.

Stage set for 'news' battle

NEW YORK (AP) — In this corner "USA Today: The Television Show," fast on its feet, but dragging the baggage from its inauspicious debut in September.

In the other corner is the plodding "Inside Edition," a knockoff of Fox's "A Current Affair" that King World hopes will knock "USA Today" out of the ring.

The decisive round between the two syndicated shows is expected during the February sweeps when local ratings are measured.

"USA Today: The Television Show" barely survived the November sweeps and has suffered station defections and time changes, sometimes in favor of the new "Inside Edition" and the old "A Current Affair."

"USA Today: The Television Show" premiered last fall after months of hype and a \$40 million investment by the Gannett Co. in partnership with Grant Tinker. The producers promised state-of-the-art graphics and a format that would change the face of television news. In retrospect, there was no way the show could live up to expectations — but it wasn't expected to be so bad, either.

If this were the show that had premiered in September, it still wouldn't have lived up to the build-up, but reviews would not have been nearly so negative.

But those negative reviews did hit newstands, and King World, the successful syndicator of "Wheel of For-

tune," "The Oprah Winfrey Show" and "Jeopardy!" soon thereafter announced it was gunning for "USA Today: The Television Show" with "Inside Edition," to premiere in January.

"USA Today: The Television Show" had proven there was a market for a syndicated newsmagazine. It had sold in 95 percent of the country weeks before a single show was produced, thanks to the cast behind the scenes — former NBC Chairman Tinker, Gannett, and former NBC "Today" show executive producer Steve Friedman.

When the show fell flat, King World figured to step in and pick up the market.

But GTG stuck by the show, hired Jim Bellows as new executive producer and announced a massive re-promotion — at a cost of \$4 million — to herald the re-created program.

"USA Today: The Television Show" is far from the the sure thing it once seemed. "Inside Edition" has been picked up as a midseason replacement in markets covering 71 percent of the country.

The Kings enlisted the producers of "A Current Affair" and hired well-known TV personality David Frost as host.

But "Inside Edition" wasn't exactly impressive in its premiere, either. In comparison to "USA Today: The Television Show," the set looked like community-access cable.

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
