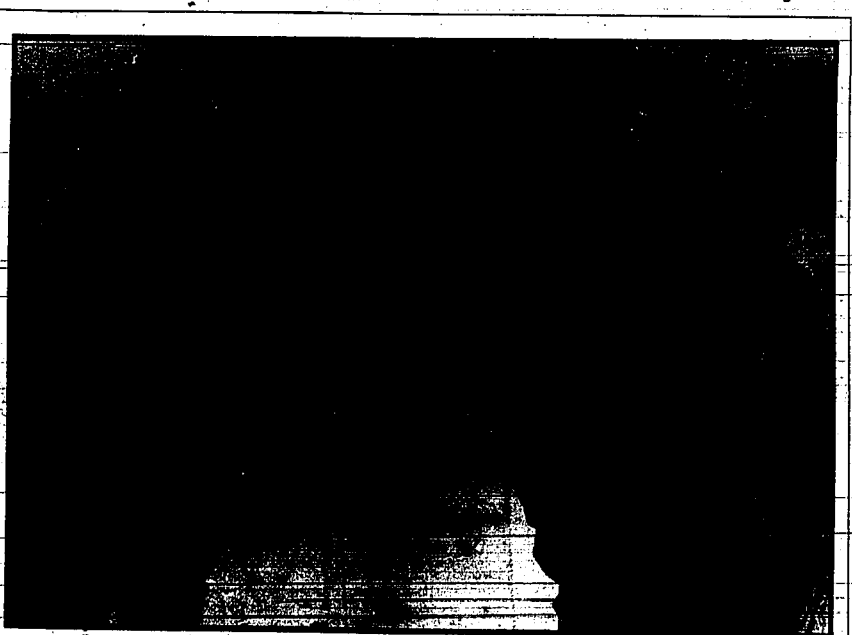
### Ribbon cutting, tour on Saturday

TWIN FALLS — Like a TV director piecing together a pro football game for broadcast, the central figure in the new county jail will be surrounded by television screens and panels of multicolored buttons that he must manipulate with rapid precision.

TWIN FALLS — A ribbon-cutting ceremony for the new \$3.4 million jail will be at 10 a.m. Saturday. The public is invited and can tour the jail during an open house from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Sunday.

## America gets a D minus for the way it teaches mathematics

WASHINGTON — The United States is a hands-down loser when it comes to mathematics education and needs major reforms, including voluntary national standards, to upgrade math achievement, says a report released Thursday.

Thursday's report reflects the consensus of 70 teachers, administrators, researchers, executives, parents and government officials who spent three years studying math education from kindergarten through graduate school.

The group said that teachers should be moderators, not lecturers and that students should take math every year they are in school. The authors point to two approaches they say won't work: "The 'back to basics' movement, favored by those who think of math as an anchor in a sea of change. It isn't sufficient to simply do better on traditional programs," Shirley Hill, chairman of the Mathematical Sciences Education Board, told a news conference.

"The 'top-down' Japanese approach of enforcing a national, grade-by-grade curriculum. While nations adopting such an approach 'have beaten us hands-down,' the report said, the technique would be impractical in the United States.

The report says that "new math" was imposed from the top down and fell flat because teachers and parents were not involved in the process. The council suggests, instead, what it calls an augmented grassroots approach — voluntary, flexible standards with a broad base of public support.



# Evans urges ed funding on Legislature

Superintendent hopes Idaho's economic recovery will benefit the schools

BOISE (AP) — Declaring his optimism about Idaho's future, state Schools Superintendent Jerry Evans on Thursday urged legislative budget writers to underwrite a long-term commitment to educational excellence with the windfall from the state's economic expansion.



"We have not had the luxury in Idaho to think beyond the minimum," Evans told the Joint Finance Appropriations Committee. "This year the improvements in Idaho's economy give us a chance to look at our needs rather than just what it takes to get by."

A day earlier, Evans met behind closed doors with the Senate Republican majority to outline his state public school aid plan, and GOP Caucus Chairman Lynn Tominga, R-Rupert, said there were indications of support for exceeding the \$393.5 million package proposed by Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus.

Evans, backed by a coalition of education interests, is calling for state aid, when adjusted to reflect various differences with Andrus, of about \$407 million, up \$61 million from this year's allocation.

Some Republican leaders, well

aware of their negative public perception because of past battles over the politically sensitive issue of education support, have said they are committed to allocating more to public and higher education than the governor has proposed.

The prospects for achieving that goal seemed to brighten this week as well when the latest report on tax receipts showed revenues running at higher levels than expected under projections that were dramatically increased just two weeks ago to reflect the economic boom.

Through the first six months of the current budget year, tax collections were \$2.2 million higher than the new estimates, that had already been increased more than \$40 million from the original projections made a year ago.

Evans presentation to the budget panel only mirrored those of the previous three days when the Board of Education and the presidents of the four state colleges all pressed for higher support levels than Andrus proposed, hoping to cash in on the anticipated legislative largesse.

Emphasizing to the committee the low standing Idaho has in national rankings on various measures of education support, Evans tried to make his case for infusions of cash into general education improvements, school construction and maintenance, teacher salaries and upgraded teaching standards.

Bringing teacher salaries up to the national average will cost \$68 million, and taking care of the building maintenance and construction backlog would cost over \$200 million.

"In this committee, as in so many other places, nearly everything boils down to money," Evans said.

But he also warned that the Legislature should not approve a major hike in state aid to begin achieving those goals if it only plans to repeat the performance of 1988, when it followed another major financial boost with several years of inadequate support.

"What we need is a commitment to steady and sustainable improvements," he said.

Some members complained that the Republican majority had taken more than its fair share of public criticism for the record \$34 million in

property tax override increases approved in the past year after passage of what Democrats claimed was a woefully inadequate state aid budget.

Rep. Mack Naibaur, R-Pau, repeated the contention that no matter how much the state spent on schools, all the property tax levies would not be wiped out, Evans agreed.

"If you were to give us every dime we ask for today, there would still be some school districts that would have overrides," Evans said. "It's a fact some of our districts have grown so dependent on override levies that no matter how much you put in this budget, they won't go away."

But Evans also objected to the public education system being labeled a bottomless pit, contending past state aid packages have done little to improve the state's dismal national ranking in various measuring categories.

"It is hard to feel like a bottomless pit when you are pretty much already at the bottom," he maintained.

The committee also quizzed a panel of school officials, who backed the superintendent's proposal. They said higher salaries were needed to retain quality teachers and new programs were needed to handle the drop-out problem and deal with evolving social ills.

"We have to take a look at some alternative educational opportunities," Nampa Superintendent Stephenson Youngerman said.

Williams, whose appointment will be official until he is sworn in by the Idaho Senate, is a member of the state Water Resources Board, the former mayor of Prunty and the unsuccessful Democratic nominee in 1982 for attorney general.

Senate State Affairs Chairman Mark Ritter, R-Rexburg, said Thursday he would expedite the confirmation process.

The name Williams had become such a fixture on the statewide ballot for auditor that in his last campaign the Republicans put up little-known Bingham County Commissioner Richard Williams, who gave the incumbent one of the closest races of his career because of what many politicians said was the name confusion.

## Childers proposes biannual school district trustees vote

BOISE (AP) — If Rep. Phil Childers, R-Boise, has his way, there will be only one school election every two years, and all school district trustees will be elected to four-year terms.

That is one way Idaho could boost the turnout at school trustee elections, Childers told the House State Affairs Committee. Turnout often falls as low as 5 percent of the eligible voters, he said, which may be caused by the frequency of such elections and the dates on which they are held.

The bill was approved for printing and introduction.

Childers said he would support a

proposal from Gov. Cecil Andrus consolidating elections, but until that measure surfaces, he will try to accomplish election law changes one at a time.

The Childers bill says school districts will hold trustee elections only on the date of primary elections, which are every two years. Trustees now serve terms of one or three years, but Childers' proposal changes that to four years for everyone.

Although there will be problems working out the mechanics, he said it can be done. "It can be done; it is just a question of whether we want to do it," he said Wednesday.

## No room for juvenile offenders

POCATELLO (AP) — Two youths arrested Wednesday night were placed under home arrest after officials were told there was no room available at the Youth Services Center in St. Anthony.

Bannock County officials said one youth stole a car Wednesday night and was apprehended and charged. The sheriff's office wanted to send him to St. Anthony, but was told the regional detention center's 12 beds were full.

Bannock County juvenile officer Lorin Nielson said there was a second case Wednesday night involving another youth charged with multiple car thefts.

There were few options again where he could be placed, so home arrest was ordered. Juvenile Judge Dan McDougall said he felt home arrest was the best option for the second youth anyway, but he is concerned there were no beds available at the St. Anthony facility.

## Sheriff pursues Hatcher with arrest documents

BLACKFOOT (AP) — Documents on a fugitive Tuscarora Indian, have been turned over to officials on the Shoshone-Bannock Tribes' reservation in eastern Idaho following indications he may not be eligible for sanctuary there.

Bannock County Sheriff S.R. Gameson said he turned both a certified copy of the birth certificate for Eddie Hatcher, 31, and a teletype copy of a North Carolina arrest warrant for Hatcher over to Bureau of Indian Affairs officials at Fort Hall on Thursday.

Hatcher, facing 14 counts of second-degree kidnapping in last February's armed takeover of a Lumberton, N.C., newspaper, has been living at Fort Hall while fighting extradition.

Reservation authorities have said North Carolina will have to prove to a tribal judge's satisfaction that Hatcher will receive a fair trial in that state before extradition will be allowed.

Gameson said he had received numerous phone calls Thursday, asking who he planned to do about the warrant, including one saying I'm mustering my forces to attack the

reservation.

"I'm doing no such thing," he said. "It's not even my jurisdiction. I'm going to turn all the papers I've received over to the proper authorities on the reservation and let them take it from there."

The reservation covers parts of four eastern Idaho counties including Bannock, but the main community of Fort Hall is in Bingham County.

Hatcher's birth certificate lists his name as John Edward Clark and his race as white, officials said. He has said he took his maternal grandfather's last name of Hatcher after the man died several years ago.

His claim to be an Indian has been questioned several times during the year since his armed takeover of the newspaper. But his sister, Ginger Clark, said the family has had an official genealogy report done "that shows that Eddie's part Indian."

If Hatcher did not qualify as an Indian, civil authorities would have the power to arrest him on the reservation, officials said. But Hatcher's attorney Jack Ross said Hatcher is part Tuscarora Indian, and "he does not think a birth certificate is conclusive proof."

# GAO finds S&L regulators overcommitted tax funds

WASHINGTON (AP) — The General Accounting Office said Thursday that savings and loan regulators are heading for a cash crunch after having spent or promised to spend \$26 billion more than they will take in over the next decade.

The GAO, an auditing and investigative agency for Congress, told the House Budget Committee that the government insurance fund for S&Ls "has made financial commitments that on a preliminary basis appear to exceed by about \$26 billion its expected cash flows over the next 10 years."

That does not include the approximately \$35 billion more regulators will have to spend to close 350 institutions which are insolvent but still open, said Charles A. Bowsher, head of the GAO.

Earlier in the hearing, the top S&L regulator, Federal Home Loan Bank Board Chairman M. Danny Wall, said the insurance fund is not overcommitted, although he acknowledged it would be "very soon" if it continued rescuing and closing failed S&Ls.

Wall said the bank board resolved a post-Depression record of about 205 insolvent S&Ls at a cost of \$22.5 billion. The estimate is calculated on

a "present value" basis, as if the money were spent "all at once." However, in reality, the money is spent over time to fulfill various loan guarantees and to pay off promissory notes.

Bowsher said the 1988 deals, including 18 additional cases where regulators pumped money into an institution without disposing of it, will cost \$60 billion over 10 years, \$26 billion more than regulators will have available.

The disclosure caused a furor among some committee members, including Rep. Harold Rogers, R-Ky., who accused the bank board of

"writing checks on the taxpayer without limit."

Bowsher agreed that no one agency should have that kind of authority, but he warned that the commitments are legal and that if Congress does not make good on them, "you have a potential crisis on your hands."

"The people out there, the depositors, would start to get worried," he said.

"The fact is, one way or another, the American taxpayer will have to bear this burden," said Rep. Leon Panetta, D-Calif., chairman of the committee.

Wall, although maintaining his agency was not overcommitted, said unless Congress acts quickly to earmark more money toward the crisis his agency may have to leave hundreds of insolvent institutions open.

"The legislative failure to provide additional resources in a timely fashion could place the bank board in a position where there is no other option but to cease case resolutions," he said.

"The chief problem with such an approach," he continued, "is that it would permit weak institutions to continue to deteriorate and would ultimately increase the cost of resolution."

The committee spent the first hours of an all-day hearing wrangling over how much will be required.

## House leaders may impose restrictions on pay raises

WASHINGTON (AP) — House Democratic and Republican leaders have tentatively worked out a package that would impose significant financial restrictions on House members in return for a 50 percent pay raise, leadership sources said Thursday.

The sources, speaking only on condition they not be identified, are still working out the specifics. But they said the package, to be introduced soon after the raise becomes law on Feb. 8, would include:

- An end to the honoraria system, which allows rank-and-file House members to keep up to \$28,850 of the money they earn from speeches, articles and other appearances.

- Abolition of the "grandfather" system in campaign financing. This has allowed 190 House members, in office as Jan. 8, 1980, to stockpile more than \$39 million in campaign money for their personal use.

- Restrictions, probably time limitations, on travel for speaking engagements and other appearances. This would prevent members from getting long vacations at resorts from special interests, who invited them to speak for free.

- Restrictions on non-honoraria outside income.

House Majority Whip Tony Coelho, D-Calif., has said that the House would not vote on the proposed pay raise, thereby allowing it to become law.

Recommended by former President Reagan, the increase would boost rank-and-file lawmakers' salaries from \$9,500 to \$135,000. Top executive branch political appointees and federal judges also would receive 50 percent pay increases.

Senate leaders have committed themselves to scheduling a vote before the deadline, which is certain to reject the raise. The vote would be meaningless, however, since both houses must reject the proposal to stop it.

House opponents of the raise said Thursday they can't stop the increase and are now focusing on long-range efforts to roll it back and to change the system of automatic salary hikes.

The House could propose the package as a rule change, a maneuver that would permit quick approval. But this would only apply to House members.

The Senate could then be in the embarrassing position of having both the pay raise and the honoraria system, which allows senators to keep up to \$35,800.

It was unclear how senators would tackle that dilemma.

A House leadership source said: "The idea of the package is to bar honoraria in a comprehensive and tough way, to get at all the issues which revolve around payment of money to members."

## Group criticizes fuel-economy change

WASHINGTON (AP) — A private advocacy group said Thursday the government has decided to set the fuel-economy standard for 1990 cars at 26.5 miles per gallon rather than at a higher level originally set by law.

The Center for Auto Safety, an organization often at odds with the auto industry and its regulators, disclosed the fuel economy figure in a letter urging President Bush to intervene in the department's decision on the corporate average fuel economy standard.

Neither the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration nor the Transportation Department would confirm or deny the report.

Clarence Ditlow, the center's di-

rector, said in the letter that if Bush stepped in to reverse the decision it would "reduce gasoline use by 100 million gallons each year and carbon dioxide emissions by 1 million tons."

The fuel-economy law was adopted in 1975 to reduce gasoline consumption at a time of rapidly rising oil prices and requires automakers to design the mix of vehicles in their fleets so that the average meets or better the fuel-consumption standard.

The law set a goal of 27.5 mpg beginning in 1985. However, the law also allowed the government to reduce that if the higher level would harm the automakers or if it was technologically difficult to attain.

# Gunman wounds 4 at school

WASHINGTON (AP) — A gunman opened fire on a crowd of students outside a District of Columbia high school Thursday, wounding four, police said. The incident apparently erupted because of a dispute earlier in the day.

At least two of the injured students were members of the basketball team at the school in an affluent section of Northwest Washington.

One witness said the man "knew where he wanted to shoot; and then he just started shooting at random." Police said the assailant seemed to have targeted the students involved.

There were no immediate arrests, but authorities were said to be searching for two or three men.

The shooting "seemed to be the result of an altercation that had taken place earlier in the day," said Capt. Robert L. Gales of the District of Columbia police.

School system spokesman Charles Seigel said two "outsiders" entered Wilson High School about noon and were involved in a "verbal altercation" with students. The students agreed to a fight after school, Seigel said, and were on their way to the site when the shooting occurred.

When asked if any of the victims knew the assailant, Gales said, "I think some of the victims know who was involved."

The shootings at Wilson High School occurred about 2:30 p.m., minutes after the students were dismissed for the day. None of the injuries was thought to be life-threatening, although police said at least one of the students was seriously injured.

## Liberal group urges slower deficit reduction

WASHINGTON (AP) — A group of liberals in and out of Congress urged President Bush Thursday to go slow in reducing the budget deficit and abandon the Reagan administration's "obsession" with the Star Wars program of space-based missile defense.

The Democracy Project, a self-described progressive research group based in New York, outlined its views at a news conference at which officers of the project were joined by Democratic members of Congress.

"The risks of reducing the deficit too quickly are at

least as serious as the risks of doing nothing at all," said James Galbraith, a professor of economics at the University of Texas and a former director of the Joint Economic Committee of Congress.

Any "precipitous" balancing of the federal budget, the group said in its report, would run the risk of triggering a recession.

Paul Warnke, head of the Arms Control and Disarmament Agency in the Carter administration, spoke for that organization on foreign policy.

## Debate rages over housing for singles living together

DENVER (AP) — A hearing on a zoning change that would let unmarried couples live in neighborhoods they had previously been excluded from has stirred impassioned debate on both sides.

The Denver City Council has scheduled a public hearing and debate for Monday night on a proposed zoning law change that would allow two unrelated adults to live in single family residences, even in areas with the exclusive "R-0" zoning.

Although there are believed to be hundreds of violators, two people who are not related may not live legally in the restrictive R-0 zones, covering 6 percent of the city's single-family homes.

Neighborhoods across the city have been peppered with leaflets by residents who say the zoning change will destroy the quality of life by bringing in more people to formerly quiet neighborhoods and hurting property values.

Many real estate agents on the other hand, say the zoning change would not hurt property values and might in some cases help them.

It will improve the marketability of some homes, said Bob Egan, a broker with ReMax Cherry Creek, by making more people eligible to buy homes in single-family areas.

Carol Hill, a broker with Coldwell Banker, said she didn't think it would affect property values. The board opted against taking a stand.

## FTC blasts soup ads by Campbell

WASHINGTON (AP) — Campbell Soup Co. was deceptive in advertising its soups as good for the heart without disclosing their high sodium content, the Federal Trade Commission charged today.

The company said it stands behind the ads in question, which are no longer running, and will contest the commission's charge.

The FTC complaint said Campbell did not have substantiation for its claim that most of its soups "make a positive contribution to a diet that reduces the risk of heart disease."

The commission is seeking an order from an administrative law judge that would forbid Campbell from asserting that soups containing more than 600 milligrams of sodium per eight-ounce serving are good for the heart without also stating the sodium content of the soup.

Campbell makes 70 different kinds of condensed soup, plus two different low-sodium lines. The commission staff declined to discuss what it knows about the sodium content of all the regular varieties, but an inspection of six at a supermarket showed sodium levels ranging from 710 milligrams for chicken vegetable to 910 milligrams for turkey noodle.

# Tower tells Senate committee of money made as consultant

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senate committees, working Thursday to fill vacancies at President Bush's Cabinet table, examined one nominee's relationships to defense contractors, heard another defend Bush's "flexible freeze" budget plan and got suggestions from a third on how he will manage America's open spaces.

As the process unfolded, former Republican Sen. John Tower of Texas told the Senate Armed Services Committee the \$763,777 he made as a defense consultant over the past three years will not influence his actions if he is confirmed as Bush's secretary of defense.

The energy panel voted to endorse the Lujan nomination and sent it to the full Senate where a vote is expected next Wednesday.

Tower, a former Armed Services Committee chairman, told that panel Congress should slow down the "revolving door" through which some top defense officials pass on the way to high-paying civilian jobs in the defense industry.

Pentagon officials should be barred, Tower said, "from profiting unfairly, unethical, or illegally or inordinately" if they move between Pentagon and industry jobs.

Tower had little to offer on how, in a period of increasingly tight budgets, he would act to shape such major procurement programs as those for the Strategic Defense Initiative, the MX and Midgeman missiles, special operation forces or the goal of building a 600-ship navy.

"Nothing is sacred," Tower said, adding that specific decisions must await the conclusion of a review ordered by Bush.

Senators opened the session with a detailed review of Tower's relations with defense contractors since 1986, when he ended a 24-year Senate career that included a 1981-84 stint as Armed Services chairman.

He said he cut all financial ties to

the defense industry on Dec. 1, one day after learning he was under serious consideration for the defense post.

He said he did not "stand to gain from the prosperity of any former associate."

But Tower was told by chairman Sam Nunn, D-Ga., that his situation did pose difficulty in that he had been involved with as many as seven major defense contractors, all of whom play roles in military procurement.

# Bush looks for ways to avoid ethics problems

WASHINGTON (AP) — Some of President Bush's former campaign aides, moving through the revolving door between government service and private business, are setting up shop hoping to benefit from their ties to the new administration.

Their moves came at a time when Bush has sought to focus attention on ethics for his current staff and when there have been calls for stricter laws covering post-government employment.

Ethics became a major issue in the Reagan presidency when more than 100 members of his administration at various times were accused of unethical or improper behavior.

Bush, early in his presidency, has been stressing ethics and promising to press for laws that clarify codes of conduct and "protect public interest."

"I support what he is doing ... I

think it is great," said Sheila Tate, Bush's campaign spokeswoman. Mrs. Tate, Nancy Reagan's former press secretary, plans to work in public relations but would not identify her new employer until the deal is final.

Bush's insistence on tightening standards is positive because "there are plenty of people in Washington who don't want to be painted with a broad brush," Mrs. Tate said.

Like others in the Bush campaign and in the transition office, Mrs. Tate is not subject to the government's post-employment laws, according to Jane Ley, an attorney with the Office of Government Ethics.

One of the laws imposes a cooling-off period in which senior employees of an agency who enter the private sector are barred from contacting officials of that agency for a year, except for social affairs. There is also a

lifetime ban that prohibits all executive branch officials from lobbying on any issue in which they had a "personal and substantial" involvement while in government.

Thursday, Bush told federal executives they will be expected "simply to know right from wrong, to avoid the appearance of what is wrong."

Defense Secretary-designate John Tower told a Senate committee on Thursday that Congress should strengthen revolving-door laws to prevent officials from profiting unfairly, unethically, or illegally or inordinately if they move between Pentagon and industry jobs.

Sen. Strom Thurmond, R-S.C., introduced legislation — similar to that voted by Reagan last fall — that would require that revolving-door legislation apply to members of Congress and their staffs.

# Economist defends 'flexible freeze'

WASHINGTON (AP) — Michael Boskin, author of President Bush's "flexible freeze" approach to balancing the budget without increasing taxes, defended the proposal Thursday and said defense and health care are two areas where he believes cuts can be made.

Boskin, nominated to be Bush's chief economic adviser, said the president would provide specific details on how the flexible freeze will work when he unveils his budget recommendations during an address to a joint session of Congress on Feb. 9.

During the presidential campaign, the flexible freeze became Bush's all-purpose answer to queries on how he planned to increase spending for a variety of domestic programs while still lowering the budget deficit without an increase in taxes.

The flexible freeze would limit the growth in overall federal spending to the rate of inflation. Any programs allowed to grow at a faster pace would require offsetting cuts in other areas.

While Bush mentioned several areas where he would increase spending, he never specified where the cuts would be made. Boskin, 43, who was Bush's principal economic adviser during the campaign, was pressed during his confirmation hearing Thursday before the Senate Banking Committee to point out areas where Bush would recommend cuts.

"If there are no new taxes, that means there will have to be some massive cuts in the federal budget," said Sen. Larry Pressler, R-S.D., who repeatedly asked Boskin to specify "three or four areas" where spending reductions should be made.

Boskin emphasized that Bush had not made any final decisions on the budget, but he said he would personally favor reducing the rate of growth in the defense budget and the government's health care costs.

President Reagan's \$1.16 trillion budget for the fiscal year, which begins next Oct. 1, did propose \$5 billion in

cuts in Medicare and Medicaid. However, it protected defense buildup, recommending that defense spending be authorized to rise 2 percent above the rate of inflation.

Boskin's comments appeared to support the widely held expectation that Bush will seek cuts in defense to pay for increased spending in domestic programs to fulfill his campaign promise.

Boskin, 43, received widespread praise during his confirmation hearings from senators who said Bush had made an excellent choice in picking the highly-regarded Stanford University economist to lead the three-member Council of Economic Advisers.

On other subjects, Boskin said: "Social Security benefits will not be touched in the Bush budget. Boskin has been a long-time proponent of changes in Social Security and other middle-class benefit programs, calling them "welfare for the wealthy." But in answering questions from senators, Boskin said, "President Bush has made it clear that Social Security cuts are off the table and I don't advocate any cuts."

The Bush budget will accept the basic economic growth projections on which the Reagan budget was based. Critics have charged that the administration's growth, interest rate and inflation forecasts are too optimistic and the economy's actual performance will make it impossible to meet the deficit goals. The budget budget projects a 1990 budget deficit of \$92.5 billion, below the \$100 billion target established by the Gramm-Rudman deficit reduction law.

The president remains committed to his pledge not to increase taxes. Boskin said the proposal being considered to raise revenues to deal with the savings and loan crisis by imposing a fee on depositors at S&Ls and other financial institutions could be considered a user fee imposed on depositors for the protection they receive from having the Federal government insure their savings.

# Lujan wants environment, development

WASHINGTON (AP) — Manuel Lujan, President Bush's choice for interior secretary, told senators Thursday he is "committed to protecting and enhancing" the nation's natural resources, but said that doesn't preclude some development.

"We can do both. We do not have to choose between them," declared Lujan, whose Senate confirmation is expected without major controversy.

Lujan, who spent 20 years representing New Mexico as a congressman, received a warm reception from both Democrats and Republicans on the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee, which is expected to send his name to Senate floor for a vote, probably next week.

One of two Hispanics selected by Bush for his Cabinet, Lujan reminded the committee he is a westerner who grew up "where reverence for the beauty and the sanctity of our land was instilled in me from the earliest days of my youth."

Lujan's childhood was spent on land that is now an Indian reserva-

tion, said the 60-year-old former congressman. As interior secretary he would oversee the Bureau of Indian Affairs and, in response to a question, said he would be personally involved if he heard of any native Americans being treated insensitively.

But Lujan's nomination has received only lukewarm endorsement from most environmental and conservation groups, who complain that in 20 years in Congress he voted against environmental interests on a number of occasions.

Some of those votes have raised signals... that you are not sympathetic to environmental legislation," said Sen. Mark Hatfield, R-Ore., citing specifically Lujan's vote against legislation, sponsored by Hatfield, which expanded wilderness areas.

Lujan defended his record on environmental and conservation matters and said he and Bush "are committed to protecting and enhancing the nation's natural resources, as well as proceeding with their environmental-

ly sound development."

Noting that some of these issues are highly controversial, Lujan said, "We all need to lower our voices so that we can hear each other."

"Development of our most promising domestic resources is called for because continued development is essential to the national security and economic well being of the United States," he said.

"At the same time, we will oppose development in those environmentally sensitive areas where the risk of damage is great," he continued.

Environmental groups have raised concern about the possibility of oil and drilling on the vast Arctic National Wildlife Refuge in northeastern Alaska and have noted that Lujan sponsored legislation in the last Congress that would have allowed such drilling.

Sen. Timothy Wirth, D-Colo., noted that "the lines are already being drawn" on the question of whether oil companies should be allowed on the Alaska refuge.

# Bundy interview triggers arguments as ashes go to Cascades

## Tape by serial killer describes slayings in Colorado, Utah, investigators disclose

VAIL, Colo. (AP) — Serial killer Ted Bundy made a tape recording in private shortly before his execution Tuesday that describes murders in Colorado and Utah, two law enforcement investigators said Thursday.

Vail police detective Mike Lindvall and Mike Fischer of the Garfield County district attorney's office told reporters at a news conference that they have not yet heard the tape, but they expected to receive a copy by late Thursday.

The Florida governor's office says there is information on that tape about the disappearance of a Grand Junction woman and about several Utah cases, Fischer said.

Fischer said Bundy apparently made the tape after his last lockdown before his execution early Tuesday morning, and they said they had no other details about the tape's contents.

The investigators, who interviewed Bundy in his death-row jail cell in Florida last Saturday and Sunday, said Bundy had told them at the end of the Sunday interview that he would try to supply more information about the disappearance of Denise Lynn Oliverson of Grand Junction.

Oliverson, 24, vanished while bicy-

cling on April 6, 1975, and is believed to be one of three Bundy murder victims in Colorado. Her body never has been found.

Bundy last weekend confessed to murdering Caryn Campbell, 24, of Dearborn, Mich., on Jan. 12, 1975, who was killed while vacationing in Aspen, and Julie Cunningham, 26, a Vail ski shop employee who disappeared on March 15, 1975, and whose body has not been found.

Bundy was suspected of two other Colorado murders — Melanie Suzanne Cooley, 18, of Nederland, who vanished on April 15, 1975, and Shelley K. Robertson, 24, of Denver, who disappeared on June 30, 1975.

But Fischer and Lindvall said Thursday they doubt that Bundy killed those two women, because he never provided any information about those cases.

Bundy long had been suspected in the death of Oliverson, and Lindvall and Fischer said Thursday Bundy told them enough about the case to convince them he killed her.

Fischer said Bundy told them he abducted and buried Oliverson on the same trip on which he buried Cunningham, whom he had killed several weeks earlier.

Lindvall said that during their interview of Bundy on Sunday, he had gone into extensive detail about how he murdered and buried Cunningham. He said Bundy provided investigators with enough information that he believes they will be able to locate her body.

Other experts agree.

"After-the-fact explanations often become justifications. It is sort of like removing responsibility," said Jim Breiling, a psychologist in the anti-social and violent behavior branch of the National Institute of

Tallahassee, Fla. (AP) — As officials prepare to carry out Ted Bundy's death wish that his ashes be scattered over Washington state's Cascade Mountains, psychologists argued about a final interview in which the condemned Bundy said pornography led him to a lifetime of violence.

Dr. Emanuel Tanay, a Detroit psychiatrist who interviewed Bundy before his trial for the murders of two Florida State University coeds, said the claim was just one more of Bundy's manipulations.

"Pornography doesn't have the power to cause the severe deformity of personality that he had," Tanay said in an interview published Thursday in The Orlando Sentinel.

Bundy was executed Tuesday for the February 1978 rape and murder of a 12-year-old Lake City girl. He also had been sentenced to die for the murders of the two students. In his final days, he confessed to killing 23 women, and investigators believe he may be responsible for dozens more.

It would be typical for a psychopath like Bundy to try to blame his murders on something believable, according to crime psychologist Dan Lutz, one of the country's foremost experts on pornography.

"People like Ted are well-known for their savvy," said Lutz, a professor at the University of California at Santa Barbara. "They have no regard for social convention and will lie whenever possible. He picked a subject like pornography, which is very believable, to blame for his behavior."

Dr. Alfred Coolday, a psychiatric consultant to the criminal division of Los Angeles County Superior Court and a professor at the University of Southern California, said he thought Bundy's last interview was a denial of what he had done.

"This last speech was his attempt to rationalize his behavior rather than accept the enormity of what he had done," Coolday said.

Mental Health in Bethesda, Md. Bundy made his pornography claim to James Dobson, a California psychologist and radio talk-show host who served on former Attorney General Edwin Meese's anti-pornography commission. The commission blamed violent pornography for the rise in violent sex crimes.

In a videotaped interview the day before his Tuesday execution, Bundy said his adolescent obsession with pornography later led him to violent pornography and eventually triggered his killing spree.

But Tanay, who has been an expert witness in the cases of many serial killers, said Bundy's attraction to violent pornography was not the cause of his behavior, but rather a reflection of his demented personality.

"Whatever he was like, it was laid down as a young boy before he was old enough to set eyes on pornography," he said. "Whatever would attract him to pornography would attract him to his other behavior. It's one more ramification of his twisted mind, if you will."

In many instances, sexual sadists may be drawn to violent pornographic magazines the same way a camper may be attracted to outdoor magazines, said Breiling.

"Typically, people use them (pornography) after they have established their interest," he said. "You don't read a magazine or book unless you are interested."

Dr. Alfred Coolday, a psychiatric consultant to the criminal division of Los Angeles County Superior Court and a professor at the University of Southern California, said he thought Bundy's last interview was a denial of what he had done.

"This last speech was his attempt to rationalize his behavior rather than accept the enormity of what he had done," Coolday said.

Just hours before his execution, Bundy signed a will that requested his ashes be scattered over the Cascade Mountains, where the bodies of at least four of his victims were found.

The will also gives his civil attorney, Diana Weiner of Sarasota, control over his remains, personal property and assets, including mail sent to him at prison.

Bundy's personal possessions included boxes of legal papers, letters, envelopes and stamps, books, magazines, a radio, an electric razor, after-shave lotion, thermal underwear, toiletries, a wedding ring, gold chains and a cross.

In a will left with authorities at Florida State Prison near Starke, Bundy apparently made other gifts of personal property in a separate document that was not released. He requested that all of his furniture, household furnishings, clothing, jewelry and other effects go to Weiner for distribution to various family members and friends as she sees fit.

Bundy directed prison authorities to turn over all of the possessions at the prison to Weiner. She is also to receive any mail delivered to the prison after his death.

Weiner has been visiting Bundy for about two years.

Carole Boone, a Gainesville woman whom Bundy has described as his wife, has not visited him since 1966. Her son James Boone was among those who visited Bundy the night before he died.

In his will, Bundy did not name Carole Boone or the child she says was conceived during a death row visit. But he did include a paragraph that appears to supersede any joint will he may have made with her. In that clause, Bundy says she "may amend her will at any time, regardless of any interest she may receive under this will."

## Nuclear plant tries new chairs to cut down sleeping on job

DELTA, Pa. (AP) — The troubled Peach Bottom nuclear plant will use everything from less comfortable chairs to a new shift rotation to prevent a recurrence of control room operators sleeping on duty, officials said Thursday.

About 60 reporters were handed hardhats, goggles and tiny radiation monitors as Philadelphia Electric Co., operator of the dormant plant on the Susquehanna River, conducted its first media tour of the facility.

The utility is trying to convince the Nuclear Regulatory Commission that things have changed since the NRC ordered the two Peach Bottom reactors shut down in March 1987 because of widespread sleeping and horseplay on the job by control room workers.

The problems resulted in a \$1.25 million fine, largest in NRC history. Operator negligence was so pervasive that the commission also levied fines ranging from \$500 to \$1,000 against 33 current and

former workers for "sleeping and/or inattention to duty."

To combat the catnaps, plant officials said they have replaced comfortable, high-backed chairs with low-backed models.

Shift rotations have been changed so that operators work a week of days, followed by a week of an afternoon-evening shift, and then work the overnight. The rotation, which includes days off, used to go in the reverse order.

### Release anticipated for British in Beirut

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Radio and press reports Thursday said the release of two British hostages might be imminent and British Ambassador Allan Ramsay crossed into Moslem west Beirut.

After Ramsay's return to the British Embassy, in the Christian sector of the divided capital, an embassy official said, "We have no additional information."

Asked whether a hostage release was expected, he said, "All I can tell you is that we're not on alert. The official spoke on condition of anonymity."

Earlier, when asked by telephone if his trip was linked to the press reports, Ramsay said from the British consular office in the Moslem sector: "I often come to west Beirut and there's nothing significant in my current visit."

An embassy spokesman had said the purpose of Ramsay's journey was to check the reports.

The British Embassy and Ramsay's residence are in east Beirut. Most hostages are believed held in west Beirut's Shiite Moslem slums. The reports said kidnapped

British journalist John McCarthy and teacher Brian Keenan, who has Irish and British citizenship, could be freed within days.

Patrick McCabe, who is Ireland's ambassador to Lebanon but is based in Iraq, said he would fly to Beirut immediately to investigate.

McCarthy and Keenan are among 15 foreigners missing in Lebanon, who include two more Britons and nine Americans. Heilongjiang is Terry A. Anderson, chief Middle East correspondent of The Associated Press, who was abducted March 15, 1985.

One of the other Britons is Terry Waite, a Church of England envoy who disappeared Jan. 20, 1987, after leaving his west Beirut hotel to negotiate with people holding American hostages.

Most of the foreigners are believed to be captives of Shiite extremists loyal to Iran, but no faction has claimed to hold Waite or McCarthy and Keenan, who were seized in April 1986.

Reports of the possible release came from the Voice of Lebanon, a Christian radio station.

### Afghans deny 'volunteering' young men

KABUL, Afghanistan (AP) — The army displayed its "volunteers" Thursday — solemn teen-agers and men in their late 30s — in answer to charges of dragging young men from their homes to fight guerrillas as Soviet soldiers withdraw.

"They are all volunteers. We've had 266 coming here in the past three days," said Col. Abdul Ghani, who commands one of nine training centers on the capital's outskirts.

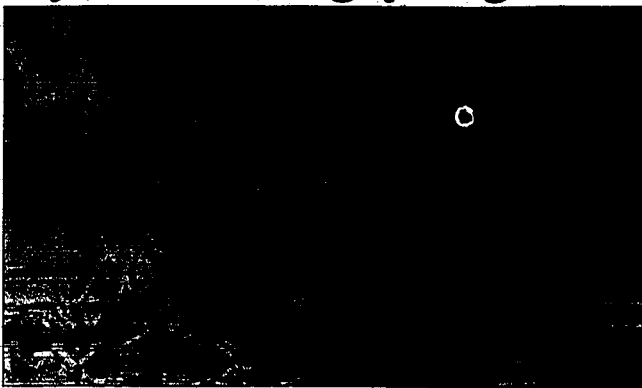
"There may be some places where there are people who had to join, but here they all came because they want to defend the country," he told Western reporters visiting the center.

Afghanistan's conscript army desperately needs recruits now that the Kremlin is giving up on a military commitment that lasted almost a decade.

Two years of army service is compulsory, but thousands of Afghans have deserted during 11 years of war with Moslem guerrillas. Many more young men have fled the country either to avoid conscription or to join the insurgents.

Western diplomats say Afghan battalions are one-third under strength and say they have reports of men being taken away by force.

One said scores were taken during house-to-house searches in Kabul's

Shah Darak district, flown to Kandahar in the south and given uniforms. The city is riddled by guerrillas, who control the countryside.

Diplomats report similar raids in the other parts of the city.

Guerrillas began fighting after a communist coup in April 1978. Soviets arrived in December 1979 and reached an estimated strength of 115,000 by the time a U.N.-mediated agreement was signed last April.

They began pulling out May 15. Half had left by Aug. 15, and the rest are to be gone by Feb. 15, leaving the Afghan army with a last-ditch battle to save the Soviet-sponsored government.

### Soviet cats finicky over sausages

MOSCOW (AP) — Angry meat packers are suing a newspaper for an article that said their sausage was so bad that even cats can't stomach it, but editors said they turned to a furry, four-legged jury that proved their point.

Twenty-four sausage experts don't eat it at all; five only eat high quality sausage or out of extreme hunger. Only one, the 2-month-old kitten Mura, you can say actually sits down to the sausage, the weekly Literaturnaya Gazeta said in announcing the feline findings.

The dispute started with the literary weekly's story on June 15 titled "The Cat Doesn't Bow..." and was brought up recently in the Dzerzhinsky regional people's court.

In a complaint signed by Yu. M. Luzhkov, chairman of the Moscow agroindustrial complex, officials demanded a retraction of the newspaper's report that producers were breaking the law by putting protein additives in the sausage, known in Russian as "kolbasa."

Because of a shortage of meat in many Soviet stores, finding good quality sausage has become a fixation for many people. A cartoon in an October edition of the satire magazine Krokodil showed a line of shoppers standing outside a theater, not to buy tickets, but to buy the sausage for sale in the theater's buffet.

The case also shows that the more aggressive style of reporting by the Soviet press under President Mikhail S. Gorbachev's encouragement of greater openness is likely to get it into occasional legal trouble. The Tass news agency said this week a court had dismissed a lawsuit against a film producer by a biochemical plant near Leningrad that objected to his documentary about pollution.

Literaturnaya Gazeta reported about its dispute with the sausage manufacturers in an article in this week's edition titled, "May the Cats Judge Us." It gave no indication that the case had gone any further than the initial complaint.

It said that using the permission of state quality control officials to add protein additives, the factories were grinding up the skin and bones of cattle and throwing them into the sausage.

Animal blood, protein paste, blood plasma, starch, flour and emulsions of protein and fat also were part of the gray, unappetizing mixtures churned out by the factories, Literaturnaya Gazeta said.

"Blocks of frozen meat weren't unfrozen or washed before being chopped and were happily thrown in with knots of wool and even the trademarks of the factories that produced these blocks. Nails, sand and glass have fallen into the sausage," it said.

To judge the validity of its first story, the newspaper said it sought out the Pauna Cat Lovers' Club in the Dzerzhinsky region, where it is being sued.

Boris Berenshtein fed some sausage to Kuzya, his two-year-old cat, but Kuzya didn't find any joy in it. Just the opposite, he gave a look like a person saying, "What's that for? What did I do that was so bad, master?"

It said another cat, Gavril, tests the sausage for the whole family of Maria Klyueva. If Gavril eats it, the whole family will. If she turns up her nose, so does the family.

# U.S. places North Korean military forces at over 1 million

WASHINGTON — The United States has raised its estimate of North Korea's military forces to more than 1 million troops on active duty.

That is about one of every 20 inhabitants and by far the largest army of any nation its size, according to official sources.

The new figure, more than 1,000,000, is higher than the previous U.S. estimate, which was agreed upon recently by the Central Intelligence Agency, Defense Intelligence Agency and other parts of the U.S. intelligence community after months of intense scrutiny and debate.

Officials attributed the big increase partly to a steady buildup of Pyongyang's ground forces this decade, and partly to improved methods of estimation. The United States now estimates North Korea ground forces at 830,000, up from 750,000 last November. Adding its air and naval units brings the North Korean total to more than 1 million in a nation of only 21 million people.

The reported increase, at a time when other communist armies are being reduced, may have serious repercussions in Northeast Asia and adversely affect South Korea. President Roh Tae Woo's peace offensive with the North, which some of his rear military opposes, South Korean military forces are estimated at 630,000 troops.

U.S. officials say they are not alarmed by what they call a steady, evolutionary North Korean buildup on the heavily armed and bitterly divided Korean peninsula; one of the world's most dangerous potential flashpoints for decades.

"The biggest question is why," said a Defense Department official. Deployment of North Korean military forces closer to South Korea since 1983-84 has significantly reduced the

arming time for an attack, the official said. But invasion by the North against very strong South Korean defenses backed by 43,000 nuclear-armed U.S. troops — which neither

which was officially passed to U.S. diplomats in Beijing Dec. 6.

The North Korea proposal called for three-way talks among the United States, North Korea, and South

Moscow nor Beijing is believed to favor — has long been considered unlikely.

The results of the U.S. reassessment became known as U.S. diplomats had a rare face-to-face meeting with North Korean diplomats Tuesday to discuss their nations' policies.

U.S. sources said the unannounced meeting took place in Beijing with the assistance of the Chinese government, which acts as message-bearer between Washington and Pyongyang. The purpose of the meeting was to pass along the U.S. reply to a Nov. 7 North Korean peace proposal,

According to the new U.S. troop assessment, North Korea now has the fifth-largest regular armed force in the world, behind the Soviet Union, China, the United States and India, all countries of vastly greater size. Pyongyang's estimated armed force of 1 million are roughly twice as large as those of France or West Germany and three times as large as those of Britain; all of which are more than twice as populous as North Korea.

North Korea announced in 1987 that it was reducing its military forces by 100,000 troops and taking 150,000 troops out of the frontline near the demilitarized zone between North and South Korea. U.S. officials said they did not detect any reduction, but that a substantial number of troops were temporary construction jobs, including such civil projects as a huge new sports complex in Pyongyang.

Increases in North Korean forces run counter to the worldwide easing

of military tensions, recent massive reductions in Chinese armed forces and the large-scale reductions promised by Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev in Soviet forces in the Far East and Europe. North Korea, which borders on both China and the Soviet Union, has been a sensitive issue between the two communist giants, who plan a summit meeting to repair their relations in the first half of this year.

The Soviet Union, now North Korea's main military supplier, supports Pyongyang's modernization program with high-performance aircraft, air-defense missiles and other equipment. Washington officials said. The United States has repeatedly, and so far fruitlessly, urged Moscow to reduce this aid.

North Korea in recent years has permitted Soviet military overflights of its territory, port calls by the Soviet fleet and other military cooperation.

**Another S. African departs cabinet**  
JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — A Cabinet minister Thursday became the third member of the governing National Party to quit Parliament this week after being linked to fraud or financial misconduct.

Manpower Minister Pietie du Plessis, a Cabinet member since 1980, said he resigned because of controversy surrounding his personal life and in the interest of the government and the National Party.

Newspapers across the political spectrum, including those supporting the National Party, said the action was believed related to a probe of property transactions involving du Plessis' department that may have benefitted his son.

On Wednesday, Leon de Beer, the National Party's member of Parliament for the Johannesburg district of Hillbrow, resigned. De Beer was convicted last year of electoral fraud and faces two years in jail if his appeal fails.

Also resigning this week was Poot de Pooters, Parliament member from East London. An inquiry commission has recommended prosecutors consider charging him with fraud and perjury in connection with efforts to smuggle an Italian drug financier into one of South Africa's black townships.

**Thieves steal half ton of shark fins**  
HONG KONG (AP) — Thieves feeding a market voracious for exotic food stole more than 1,000 pounds of shark fins, an ingredient in a popular soup, authorities said Thursday.

The fins, worth about \$84,000, were stolen from The Shu Kee Seafood Store in Hong Kong, said a police spokesman.

A bowl of shark's fin soup, which some believe can help preserve youth, can cost up to \$35.

In August, thieves took 156 pounds of bird's nests worth \$134,000. The nests, which are made from the saliva of swallows, are considered a health food particularly favored by the elderly.

**Sinhalese kill 45 in election violence**  
COLOMBO, Sri Lanka (AP) — Militant Sinhalese killed at least 45 people in pre-election violence, and the government ordered troops on alert Thursday to protect political rallies, officials said.

The Defense Ministry warned militiamen against "subversive plans to intimidate people, promote clashes between political parties, and disrupt the Feb. 4 Sri Lanka independence day celebrations."

"Troops went on alert nationwide to protect political party campaigning for parliamentary elections Feb. 15, officials said on condition of anonymity.

A separatist war waged by ethnic Tamils in northern and eastern Sri Lanka has prompted the Sinhalese backlash. Tamils make up 18 percent of the population of this island nation off the southern tip of India.

Officials said shortly after President Ranasinghe Premadasa took office Jan. 2 that India had begun withdrawing troops it dispatched in 1987 to try to disarm Tamil insurgents.

**Italian court says banker murdered**  
ROME (AP) — A Milan court has concluded that banker Roberto Calvi, whose body was found hanging from a London bridge in 1982 after his Banco Ambrosiano collapsed, was murdered, newspapers reported Thursday.

A coroner's jury in London in June 1983 left unresolved the question of whether Calvi hanged himself, perhaps driven to suicide by his inability to account for \$1.4 billion in loans and interest, or whether he was murdered to bury him from talking about a financial scandal reaching into the Vatican.

Calvi was popularly known as "God's banker" because of his close ties with the Vatican.

The action in the Milan civil court was brought by Calvi's widow, Clara, who is trying to collect on a \$3 million life insurance policy.

Calvi was insured by Assicurazioni Generali, Italy's largest insurance company. A spokesman, Armando Zimolo, said the policy ruled out payment in case of suicide. The company may appeal today's decision.

**Poles rush to save for state lottery**  
WARSAW, Poland (AP) — State bankers are resorting to a lottery to convince Poles to save their money rather than emptying stores of what little there is to buy.

Savers are responding enthusiastically, jamming bank counters to pledge they will keep 50,000 zlotys — about a month's salary — on deposit for six to nine months in order to be eligible for winning cash prizes.

"Free seem to care much about the lottery's anti-inflation goal of 'freezing hot money,'" as one banking director put it, or whether their accounts will bolster the zloty in a beleaguered economy where almost every meaningful transaction is carried out in another nation's currency, the U.S. dollar.

"Pensions are so low, I could help myself with the money," said one retired office clerk 10th in line at the state PKO bank in Warsaw.

They don't seem concerned the zlotys they put into the bank will have less value when withdrawn, due to inflation. Instead, they dream of pocketing the prizes and putting the money toward cars, apartments or educations abroad.

The top prize of 50 million zlotys is worth \$88,000 at the official exchange rate or \$15,000 at the more relevant black market price.

"It is a good thing for the economy — let them have it — and a good thing for me — I might win," said another retired clerk waiting at the bank.

## Arab, Palestinian latest victims of violence in Israeli territories

TEL AVIV, Israel — An Arab suspected of collaborating with Israeli forces was killed, and a Palestinian was shot dead by Israeli troops in continuing violence in the occupied territories, police said Thursday.

Meanwhile, Israeli authorities at Akrabe on the

West Bank bulldozed four houses of Palestinians accused of throwing gasoline bombs or attacking soldiers.

Police said a Palestinian man was killed when Israeli troops opened fire on a crowd of attackers near the demilitarized zone between West Bank and Gaza Strip.

Other Palestinians were injured.

They said a 28-year-old Palestinian was killed

Thursday at Gaza in the occupied Gaza Strip, probably by Palestinians who suspected him of collaborating with Israeli forces.

Arab sources said six Palestinians were shot or wounded in clashes with Israeli troops in other parts of the Gaza Strip.

Military authorities said about a dozen Palestinians were arrested at Akrabe.

"A lot of you parents may have children who are just getting their driver's license," one script says. "Do them a favor — and yourself,

too. Tell them to be especially careful at highway railroad crossings."

## Maestro Muti enjoys TV coverage of concert

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Maestro Riccardo Muti's dream night for the Philadelphia Orchestra came true when a television station pre-empted network fare and moved a crew and co-hosts into the Academy of Music.

Muti and the musicians brought Beethoven's Symphony No. 4 to life in a special two-hour "Come And Meet The Music" concert carried live Wednesday night on KYW-TV.

"The effort," he said afterward, was a "complete success" no matter what the viewer ratings turned out to be. He found a way to reach from the Academy stage right into the home and he liked it.

"It was a good audience ... a good audience," he said, referring both to those in the hall and those who tuned in.

"You need television because when you play a concert hall, you can only reach two to three thousand people. You can reach many more with television, and that's important."

## Publisher of 'Glasnost' receives top award

PARIS (AP) — The 1989 Golden Pen of Freedom Award has been given to Sergei Goryunov, founding editor and publisher of the indepen-

dent Soviet magazine Glasnost, the International Federation of Newspaper Publishers said Thursday.

The Paris-based federation applauded Goryunov's dedication to freedom of expression, but said it was concerned that Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev had denounced him as a "parasite."

Goryunov, 47, was hailed as a "brave man whose treatment has shown how much the attitudes of the Soviet authorities to the press — newly evidenced in the draft of a severely restrictive press law — must change if the widely proclaimed policy of glasnost is ever to become other than a propagandist's mockery," said the statement issued after a meeting of the 30-member federation board in Zurich.

Gorbachev has made glasnost, or the opening of Soviet society, a hallmark of his rule.

Goryunov's wife, who is visiting Paris, said the award was "wonderful and a tribute to all he has tried to do."

Goryunov will be invited to receive his award at the 42nd World Congress of Newspaper Publishers being organized by the federation in New Orleans, Louisiana, June 11-14.

The Golden Pen is awarded annually by the federation, which strives to defend and promote press freedom and the economic independence of news publishers as an essential condition for freedom.

## Sanders thinks woman will be news anchor

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — A woman will become a full-time network weeknight television news anchor within the next decade, according to the first woman to work in such a job — albeit temporarily.

"I wouldn't want to predict what year," said Marlene Sanders, who made TV history in 1964 when she sat in on NBC for an ailing Ron Cochran.

Ms. Sanders, age 68, the same as Dan Rather" will be in October, spoke this week to the local chapter of American Women in Radio and Television.

When women anchors break the weeknight network sex barrier, "depends on how women do in the country at large," said Ms. Sanders, co-author with Marcia Rock of "Waiting for Prime Time: The Women of Television News."

"When we see more women in high places, it will filter down to the networks," she said.

After a decade as an Emmy-winning correspondent for CBS News, she fell victim to a wave of network cuts in 1987, turning down an offer to work nights and weekends for CBS Radio.

"I wasn't fired, exactly," she said. "I decided to take my chances in the outside world."

## Scobee's widow to marry

WASHINGTON (AP) — June Scobee, widow of Challenger space shuttle pilot Dick Scobee, is engaged to marry an Army general in June and will step down as chairman of the Challenger Center for Space Science Education, an aide said Thursday.

Mrs. Scobee, 46, will marry Lt. Gen. Don Rodgers, commander of the Global Army Information Systems Command at Fort Huachuca, Ariz., according to Lisa Turner, director of public and media relations for the Challenger center in Houston.

The two met last Easter at a Sun-

rise service at Arlington National Cemetery, where Mrs. Scobee had gone to visit the grave of her husband, who died with the six other astronauts in the Jan. 28, 1986, explosion of the space shuttle.

Rodgers, 54, is a widower. They did not see each other for five months after that initial meeting, but then began dating and now have set June 3 as their wedding date.

Mrs. Scobee has spearheaded efforts to raise \$30 million to finance several centers around the country to teach children and teachers about space. It is halfway toward that goal, with \$5 million raised privately and \$10 million recently appropriated by Congress, Ms. Turner said.

Mrs. Scobee will remain on the Challenger center's advisory board after her two-year term as chairman expires March 16, Ms. Turner said.

Mrs. Scobee has two grown children, Kathie, 27, a media consultant in College Station, Texas, and Rich, 26, an Air Force pilot flying F-16s in West Germany.

## Heart attack hospitalizes TV kids' comic Pinky Lee

PEORIA, Ill. (AP) — Pinky Lee, the baggy-pants vaudeville comic who starred in a children's TV show in the 1950s, was listed in serious but stable condition today after suffering a heart attack backstage during a musical.

Lee was resting comfortably and is expected to remain hospitalized for up to 14 days, said St. Francis Medical Center spokeswoman Theresa Staley.

Lee was stricken during a performance of "Sugar Babies" at the Peoria Civic Center Theater. His age was not immediately available.

The former burlesque comic, born Pincus Left, starred in "The Pinky Lee Show" on NBC in 1960 and 1964-66.

Wearing a rolled-brim hat and a loud checked coat, he danced, told stories and introduced himself by singing, "Hello, it's me. My name is Pinky Lee."

## Man dies stuck in garbage can

ROCHESTER, N.Y. (AP) — A 73-year-old man was found dead in a garbage can on his front porch, where police believe he had been stuck for three days.

Robert Hamm waved to a mailman and a newspaper carrier while in the trash can earlier this week but may have been too weak to alert them that he was stuck, police said Wednesday.

"I would imagine he was probably trying to signal something, but his expression, or whatever, wasn't enough to get them to do anything about it," Sgt. R.J. Liepins said. "They all feel very bad."

The 11-year-old newspaper carrier, who had waved him to Hamm on Monday, discovered him on Wednesday.

Hamm apparently fell backward into the standard-size metal trash can on his enclosed porch and couldn't get out, Liepins said. He was found in the can up to his armpits, with his legs sticking out.

# Legislators oppose request for INEL monitors

**BOISE** — Six more monitors for the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory? Oversight, said some members of the House Environmental Affairs Committee Thursday. Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus has called for spending \$205,000 for six new full-time state employees to establish a monitoring program at INEL. But after INEL Deputy Manager Bob Tiller explained current practice at the site to the House committee, several members said they saw no reason for a

state program or at least a program as the governor proposed. "It hasn't been demonstrated to me as a necessary expenditure," said Rep. Bob Schaffer, R-Nampa. "The governor likes to spend money." "I guess I recognize all of the efforts already being made," said Rep. Stan Hawkins, R-Teton. "That 'Magic Valley people's' not recognizing that is why they're fearful." Department of Energy contractors monitor the site as well as the Radiological and Environmental Sciences Laboratory, the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration,

the U.S. Geological Survey, the DOE Environmental Survey and, with money recently provided by DOE, Idaho State University. "With all this monitoring of our operations, no one has yet found any inaccuracies in our data," Tiller said. Adding state monitoring to that list would be welcomed, he said. "It would re-establish credibility and possibly head off the sort of political pressures that have slowed development at the Hanford Nuclear Reservation in Washington," he said. It would speed up the process of obtaining permits for new projects, which the state

is, by its own admission, handling far too slowly now. And it would help the INEL defend claims that it has created no health hazards, he said. "We want to demonstrate integrity and credibility," Tiller said. "We need desperately to do that." "I'm sorry you good people at INEL have been so negatively affected by some media," he said. "I'd like to check, I would suggest that if you want to get the word out on what is going on down there, you should perhaps buy a newspaper." Sen. Laird Noh, R-Kimberly, who is leading

Senate work on oversight of INEL, has questioned whether any of the monitoring now being done is independent. "The state monitoring effort needs to start by hiring a capable leader to report directly to the governor," he said earlier this week. "The coordinator should be given the responsibility of renegotiating the contractual relationships between the state, INEL and Idaho State University," he said. Technical staff are also needed to issue permits and do technical monitoring of INEL operations," he said. Idaho now has more high-

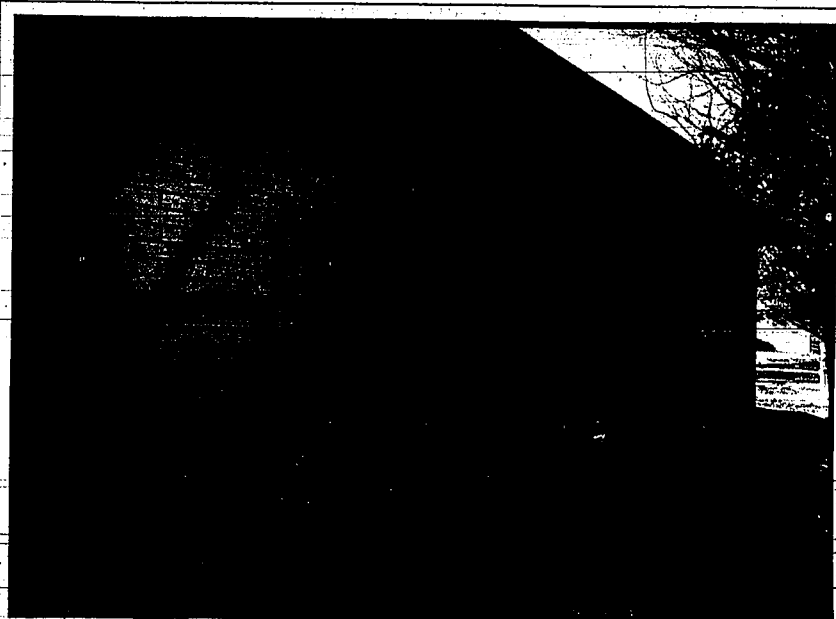

## Satanic graffiti disturbing

**TWIN FALLS** — Spray-painted satanic symbols on a new Pierce Street house have aroused the ire of a tranquil neighborhood. "I really feel quite terrible that that kind of thing would happen, that kind of vandalism," said David Moore, who lives at 469 Pierce St. The house, at 430 Pierce Street, is the retirement home of Jim and Doris Palmer, who have been living in southern Utah. Though the Palmers sometimes have stayed in a motor home next to the house during its construction, they often travel out of town. "Every time we leave, something goes kaput," said Jim Palmer. "Somebody shot their windows out in December, and sometime Jan. 16 or Jan. 17, according to police reports, the symbols were painted on the

white brick on their one-story house. The Palmers returned from Utah Tuesday to find trios of 6's (the biblical "mark of the beast") painted on two walls, some upside-down crosses and the words "dead dogs," all in red paint. Although "crosses are symbols used by satanic cults," Palmer said he doesn't believe the graffiti has any satanic significance. The house's builder doesn't either. "I think it was done by somebody who was aware of what they symbolized, instead of somebody trying to curse somebody," said Kelly Hill. Also upset about the deed is Rick Fish, the Palmers' back-door neighbor, who is embroiled in a property dispute with the Palmers. "It's ugly—in the sense of visually ugly, and ugly in the sense of who did it," Fish said. Rick and Jennifer Fish recently filed a District Court lawsuit against the Palmers and the couple who sold them the land, Edward and Jen-

nie Smith. The Fishes claim they own part of the lot the Palmers paid for, and they have maintained the disputed land for a number of years. Rick Fish said he doesn't have a clue who painted the symbols on Palmer's house. Hill said he isn't sure how to clean the walls of the nearly completed house. "Neither one of the techniques I know of are sure-fire," Hill said. "I don't know exactly what we'll do." Palmer's neighbors aren't sure what to think about strange goings-on at the neighborhood's first new house in several years. "We feel badly that that kind of incident sets a tone for a new neighbor," said Arlan Call, 462 Pierce St. "We hope that all of the neighbors are very supportive of them, giving the situation." "It's just a heck of a welcome to the neighborhood," Moore said.

## Sentencing hearing for Jaggers begins

**TWIN FALLS** — Suffering from mild to moderate retardation, Jesse Ray Jaggers could be rehabilitated without going to prison, a Boise psychologist testified Thursday. Ironically, the defense psychologist testified just after Jaggers' lawyer, James Meservy, tried to delete from an investigator's report one of Jaggers' comments to a presentence investigator. "I am very good at fooling doctors," is what Jaggers said, according to 6th District Judge Daniel Meehl. Meservy was concerned that Meehl would take Jaggers' statement to heart and discount testimony from a psychologist and two psychiatrists scheduled to testify in Jaggers' sentencing hearing. The first of two days in the hearing started Thursday with Thurber's testimony. Jaggers, handcuffed and dressed in a red, short-sleeved shirt, listened intently to Thurber's testimony. He leaned over to talk to Meservy once.

Westgren's son, Knute, attended the hearing with four family friends. "Ginnie was like family to us," said Mary Ashenbrenner. Jaggers, the confessed killer of 79-year-old Virginia Westgren, is afflicted by a borderline personality disorder, said Boise psychologist Steven Thurber. The 18-year-old Jaggers' diminished mental functions could be caused by an organic brain problem, like a lesion or lack of proper blood flow, Thurber said. Even though Thurber says Jaggers could re-enter society without a prison term, it's certain he will spend some time in prison. Jaggers pleaded guilty to first-degree murder and robbery in Westgren's May 13 slaying. First-degree murder carries a minimum sentence of 10 years in prison. Robbery has a minimum sentence of five years. Both charges carry a maximum of life in prison. Thurber's 2½ hours of testimony Thursday provided a quiet start to two days of hearings over Jaggers' Meservy once.

## Idaho Power could return from Maine

**TWIN FALLS** After three-quarters of a century as a Maine corporation, Idaho Power Co. is considering moving its incorporation to Idaho. "It's fairly obvious what's going on," said Idaho Public Utilities Commissioner Perry Swisher. "They're setting up their company to avoid holding company status to proceed with their transmission line." The move would position the company to deal with a changing industry, Idaho Power spokesman Larry Taylor said. It would let the company operate with less restriction and more efficiency. Idaho Power is planning to build a power transmission line from its Midpoint Substation near Shoshone to Nevada to improve access to southwestern energy markets. Sierra Pacific Power Co.'s recent

announcement of plans to build a 1,600-megawatt power plant at Thousand Springs in Nevada would make Idaho Power's transmission line more attractive, Swisher said. An agreement between Idaho Power and Sierra Pacific would give Sierra Pacific 20 percent of the lines capacity. If the transmission line and other proposed projects such as the Milner Dam power project are not allowed into the utility's ratebase, they would be operated as subsidiaries of Idaho Power. If a company does most of its business in a state other than its state of incorporation, operating a subsidiary would make it a utility holding company. So long as it is incorporated in Maine, operating a subsidiary would make Idaho Power a utility holding company and subject to the Public Utilities Holding Company Act of 1935. • See IDAHO POWER on Page B2

## Cameron says Gold doesn't want him to stay in department

**JEROME** — Darryl Cameron says he resigned from the Jerome County Sheriff's Department because he doesn't believe new Sheriff Larry Gold wants him working there. Gold says he doesn't understand why Cameron feels that way. "It was with surprise and regret that I accepted Darryl's resignation," said Gold, his opponent in the close race last year for the sheriff's job. Cameron resigned his job on Sunday, effective that day. "Normally I give two weeks notice when I resign, but under the circumstances, I didn't give any notice this time,"

Cameron said. Cameron, who spent two years with the sheriff's department, also served as Jerome police chief for five years. Currently, he is making plans to take refresher police courses at The College of Southern Idaho. "And I have my application in several places," he said. Cameron noted that he has only seven years to go on his state retirement. "This wasn't a forced thing," he said of his resignation, "but I want to spend those seven years working in a job that is pleasant to work in." Then he added, "I could see there were going to be lots of problems, and I didn't want to be a part of it." Gold said he has 17 employees at the pre-

sent time, with the Cameron position being the only vacancy. Only one other deputy has left since Gold took office earlier this month. That man accepted another position because he decided he didn't want to be a jailer, Gold noted. "I am pleased with the way things are going right now," he said, "and I think employee morale is high." "He (Gold) is from the big city, and he won't do some things the way we do," said Cameron. "I understand that." "Darryl is a nice man, and I wish him the best," said Gold. "I simply wanted him to conform to POST (Police Officer Standards Training) requirements, and I know that new shoes can pinch." Cameron said Gold has been unhappy with

some of his work. "I've been called in to discuss individual cases that haven't worked out right," he said. He declined to comment on specifics, but Gold didn't. "I did nothing negative with regard to treating him any differently," Gold said of Cameron. "I have called him into my office two times, and both times I spoke to him about releasing confidential information to people who didn't need it." Cameron also objected to some of the questions on the application forms sheriff department employees are being required to fill out. "When you're asked for your credit card numbers, I feel that is too personal," Cameron said. Gold said he needs the information to keep

administrative files up to date. "In Cameron's personnel file, there is nothing except a form stating who should be notified in case of emergency and a health record," said Gold. "Maybe the people here have known Darryl all his life, but, if a lawsuit should ever be filed against the county, I would be asked what I did to check my employees' backgrounds." Cameron said he also objected to a section of the new application form which he says requires people to agree to work at the will of the sheriff and allows Gold to fire people without just cause. Gold said the item is a consent waiver and allows him to fire people without justification. • See CAMERON on Page B3

## Lecturer: Pornography shouldn't be protected

**TWIN FALLS** — The First Amendment was never intended to protect today's rampant pornography, a visiting evangelical lecturer says. As proof, John Eidsmoe cited the Messer Commission's report that stated pornography had become more graphic in the past 20 years. "Pornography today is different even from when I was a little kid," he said. Eidsmoe further contends that pornography can be linked to crime. "Statistics show that half of all rapists use soft-core porn to arouse themselves before the activity," he said. "Pornography was what triggered the Bundy's addiction to crime." Pornography is one of various subjects Ei-

demos, a Tulsa, Okla., lawyer, lecturer and author, will discuss with Magic Valley residents this weekend. Eidsmoe, an ordained Lutheran Brethren minister, divides his time among lecturing on law, teaching at two seminaries and practicing on the road. In an interview Thursday, he contended that abortion should be illegal, that sex education classes promote promiscuity and that school-based health clinics are a scheme developed by pro-choice activists. He also talked about creationism, an issue involving O'Leary Junior High School teacher Phil Gerrish, who invited Eidsmoe to the area. "All creationists are asking for is balanced treatment," Eidsmoe said. "It seems to me the creationists are taking a much more open-minded approach than the evolutionists." He said evolutionists are trying to throw

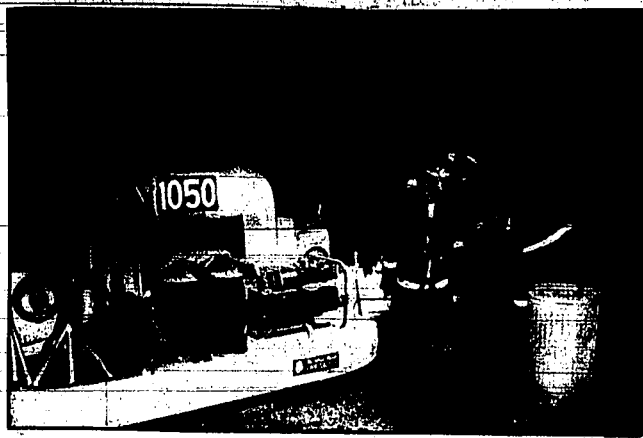
creationism out of the schools completely. Abortion should be illegal, Eidsmoe said, because "the government's stamp of approval gives women the feeling that abortion must not be immoral." He said numbers of abortions skyrocketed after the famous Supreme Court Roe vs. Wade decision legalizing abortion. And he dismissed pro-choice arguments that pregnant women will return to back-alley abortions. "Laws do act as deterrents to activities," he said. Eidsmoe said abortionists should be treated the same as murderers because human life begins at conception. He had no proposal, however, on how to enforce an abortion ban or what the punishments should be. "I'm still open to suggestions," he said. Eidsmoe condemned sex education classes

and school-based health clinics. He said sex ed programs start children thinking about things much earlier than they would if left on their own. Children have a natural modesty about sexuality, Eidsmoe said. But discussion during sex ed class destroys that natural modesty and in the long run increases promiscuity. Eidsmoe firmly believes sex outside of marriage is wrong, and he doesn't see why schools can't teach such morals. "You can teach kids in school that murder is wrong and that stealing is wrong," he said. "So why not teach them that sex is wrong?" School-based health clinics are a pro-choice idea and in some cases such clinics may offer to transport young women to and from their abortion appointments, Eidsmoe said. ## Arson suspected as fire station burns; firemen caught outside

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — Volunteer firemen had to bring equipment from home Wednesday night when a fire broke out in their fire station — they couldn't get inside to their equipment.

Two men were arrested later for investigation into the arson of the Mica-Kidd Island Fire Association garage to hide a burglary.

Kootenai County deputies identified the two as Mark Didrick Draper,

21, and Scott James Bigger, 22, both of Harrison. They were arrested near Rathdrum about 90 minutes after the fire was reported.

Gary Fox, a director of the fire association, said he and other volunteers were dispatched to the scene by another fire district after a passerby spotted smoke and flames coming from the garage.

"We had no way to get in to use our equipment, so we had to fight our way in," Fox said. Kootenai County

units arrived shortly after and doused the fire.

He said it appeared the building had been burglarized and someone started a fire using a can of fuel.

No damage estimate was available Thursday. Don Sausser, the fire association's secretary-treasurer, said the building — was constructed in 1981 with volunteer labor for \$12,000.

"This was built with volunteer work and it's going to have to be built again that way," Fox said.

## Arco mine gears up for summer

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — A new gold mining company operating near Arco plans to get into full production this summer.

Bema Gold Corp. officials say the mine, operated by its subsidiary, Idaho Gold Corp., will begin year-round gold and silver mining at the Champagne Mine west of Arco in June.

The mine is expected to employ 60-60 miners when it's in full operation, said Barry Rayment, Idaho Gold president.

Rayment said the mining firm is hiring local workers and taking work applications at its Arco office.

When gold production starts up at the mine on the Lava Creek Property, it will be the company's first commercial, producing gold field, said Clive T. Johnson, president of Bema Gold, based in Vancouver, British

Columbia. Idaho Gold is continuing tests and exploration while seeking permits. Production can begin when the permits are approved, which the company expects to be in April.

Sandy Buschar, Bema Gold spokesman, said the mine is expected to produce 450,000 tons of ore with a yield of 17,600 ounces of gold this year, using heap leach production.

A sodium cyanide solution is applied to the ore. After it drains through, the ore is shipped to a smelter, where gold and silver are extracted.

In its tests, three-tenths of a pound of cyanide has been used per ton of ore.

Estimated production cost is \$150 per ounce of gold, which has been selling for about \$407 an ounce.

At full production, the Champagne Mine is expected to produce 19,000 ounces of gold equivalent per year, Buschar said.

Capital cost for the project is \$1.5 million, with a payback expected in three months, she said.

The company has identified an oxide ore body of 2.5 million tons of mineable gold reserves, and expects to find another 2 million tons.

Bema Gold was formed in September, when three mining companies, Amir Mines, Normline Resources and Bema International Resources, merged. Bema Gold owns an 86 percent share in Idaho Gold, the operating company formed last year by Amir, Normline and Glamis Gold.

Idaho Gold purchased the Lava Creek Property from Glamis Gold last year.

## Lottery program must conduct itself openly, urges Shelledy

BOISE (AP) — Idaho Lottery Commissioner Jay Shelledy has urged his fellow commissioners to keep the state lottery program as open as possible to avoid any public perception of secrecy or conflict of interest.

"We've got to be a model of openness or we're going to have a lot of suspicion out there," Shelledy said Thursday at the commission's second meeting ever and its first at its new suite of offices along the Boise River Greenbelt.

His comments came as the five-member panel considered draft lottery rules and regulations, as well as proposed changes drafted by Deputy Attorney General Pat Kole to lottery statutes adopted by the 1988 Legislature.

Kole said he expects to see a proposed conflict of interest law for all public officials in Idaho presented to legislators next week. But the conflict of interest provisions in the draft lottery rules and regulations are even more stringent, he said.

They include a requirement that

lottery commissioners and employees certify that they own no stock or other interest in companies that sell lottery equipment to the state, as well as restrictions against commissioners, employees, vendors or anyone in their households buying lottery tickets or claiming prizes.

Specific exceptions would be allowed, such as for the testing of the lottery's security systems. But in general, the rules are aimed at protecting the "security, honesty and integrity" of the lottery.

Shelledy, who publishes the Moscow (Idahonian) newspaper, said he was concerned with a provision of the draft rules prohibiting lottery commissioners, employees or members of their households from "soliciting or receiving, directly or indirectly, a gift of any kind from any person who might reasonably be expected to receive a benefit from the Idaho State Lottery."

The prohibition on accepting "meals, lodging, transportation or any other form of benefit, however

insignificant," would effectively forbid any social activity with local retailers who sell lottery tickets, Shelledy said. After discussion, the commissioners agreed to have Kole draft new language setting a "de minimus" acceptable gift from retailers, of \$100 or possibly \$50.

The commission approved the draft rules and regulations and a number of primarily housekeeping proposals for change in the lottery statute. The rules and regulations will be finalized and promulgated for public comment, then put in effect. Kole said they will expire at the conclusion of the 1990 session of the Legislature, unless lawmakers decide to grant them permanent approval.

The proposed statute changes will be presented to the House State Affairs Committee for consideration. The only change that drew any real comment from commissioners was in the section outlining what information lottery ticket retailers must provide to receive state certification.

## No parole for jailhouse lawyer

BOISE (AP) — Controversial jailhouse lawyer Walter "Bud" Balla has lost his bid to be freed from the Idaho State Penitentiary, under parole supervision, even sooner than his August release date.

The Idaho Commission for Pardons and Pardon on Thursday rejected Balla's request to be eased into the civilian population after more than 20 years behind bars.

"We felt like he was kind of manipulating the system a little bit," said commission Chairman Del Ray Holm. "We felt that with the press here, he was kind of making a grandstand play."

In 1984, Balla led an inmate lawsuit that resulted in a landmark federal court victory. The court ordered the state to relieve crowding and upgrade living conditions for prisoners.

With his complete release set for Aug. 29, Balla said he recently has felt the need to straighten out his life. He said he feared he might not be able to cope with life on the outside without some kind of help.

"I feel I need some supervision, and I would feel more comfortable with supervision so if I ran amok, I would have someone to fall back on," Balla said. "I'm walking out of here one way or the other in August. But if I walk out of here on my own ... guys panic."

Balla also said his life has changed direction since he was contacted by Tom Trusky, an English professor at

Boise State University. Trusky recently asked Balla to contribute an article on prison reform to a compilation of essays marking Idaho's statehood centennial.

"For years I sat here with bitter resentment hate; it controlled me," Balla said. "But the opportunity offered by Trusky 'just caused me to have a complete turnaround in my thinking. I can make a difference."

Stu Holm said even if Balla's request for supervised release had been granted it would have been two or three months before he actually left prison. That would have left only four or five months before the supervision ended.

"He's been in here a long time, and the adjustment won't be easy," Holm said. "But he'd be a real burden to the parole officers downtown with this short time."

**Utah polygamists draw terms in prison**

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A judge Thursday sentenced three polygamist clan members to varying terms of up to 15 years behind bars for the shooting death of a state corrections officer, penalties to be served after lengthier federal prison terms.

Third District Judge Michael Murphy sentenced clan leader Addam Swapp and brother-in-law John Timothy Singer to one to 15 years for manslaughter and Swapp's brother, Jonathan, to a year in jail for negligent homicide.

The sentences were pronounced two days before the first anniversary of a shootout at the clan's Marion farm that ended a 13-day siege by lawmen. It left state Corrections Lt. Fred House dead and Addam Swapp seriously wounded.

"Defendants' failure to accept responsibility for the consequences of their acts places society at continued risk," Murphy said. "These defendants acted as anarchists, and this court has been presented with no credible information that, if given the opportunity, they would not again engage in anarchism and armed conflict."

Singer and the Swapp brothers had been charged with second-degree murder in House's death, but an eight-member jury convicted the trio of lesser charges on Dec. 22 in Coalville after deliberating 3 1/2 days.

They had been scheduled for sentencing a week before, but Murphy heard arguments and requested briefs on a defense motion to have the state penalties for Addam Swapp and Singer served concurrently with the federal prison terms. But Murphy refused, saying the state sentences and federal terms should be served consecutively, the total not to exceed 30 years.

Last May, the three and clan matriarch Vickie Singer, the mother of John Timothy and Addam Swapp's two wives, were convicted of federal violations in the bombing and standoff.

In September, U.S. District Judge Bruce Jenkins sentenced Addam Swapp to 15 years, John Timothy Singer and Jonathan Swapp to 10 years and Vickie Singer to five years imprisonment for these crimes.

Federal prosecutors contend a recent U.S.

Supreme Court decision upholding mandatory federal sentencing guidelines means the four should be sentenced to federal terms three to 41 months longer than Jenkins ordered.

Defense attorneys had argued that state law prohibits aggregate minimum sentences of more than 12 years, including the federal terms. However, Murphy ruled the law does not limit the court's discretion in imposing consecutive sentences.

Moreover, he said the Board of Pardons would have a say in setting the amount of time served by Singer and Addam Swapp at Utah State Prison.

The tense standoff between the clan and 100 law enforcement officers began after Addam Swapp bombed a nearby Mormon chapel. Authorities did not storm the compound for fear of harming the nine children who were inside with six adults.

House and another police dog handler had joined an FBI hostage rescue team in an attempt to arrest the Swapp brothers. He was directing his reluctant dog toward the pair when he was shot.

**Nevada ranch workers face horse killing charges**

RENO, Nev. (AP) — Five ranch workers were charged Wednesday in the slayings of more than 40 wild horses and burros, in a continuing federal investigation into the killings of at least 10 times that many animals.

The workers are charged with violating the Wild and Free Roaming Horse and Burro Act, a misdemeanor punishable by one year in prison and a fine of \$2,000, said Assistant U.S. Attorney Will Mattly.

A federal grand jury returned indictments Tuesday naming David Morabael and Shannon Brennan of Lovelock, Eugene John Thacker of Winnemucca and David Thacker and Ronald Emory Hage of Cosgrove, Mattly said.

The indictments were handed up Tuesday, sealed under a judge's order so the defendants would not know they had been charged until they were in custody.

Mattly said all but Hage were in custody and Hage was expected to surrender. The four in custody were held under \$50,000 bail.

Morehead is charged with seven counts of killing a wild horse or burro from May 15 through June 1983 and one count of selling a mustang and a burro to a livestock yard last February.

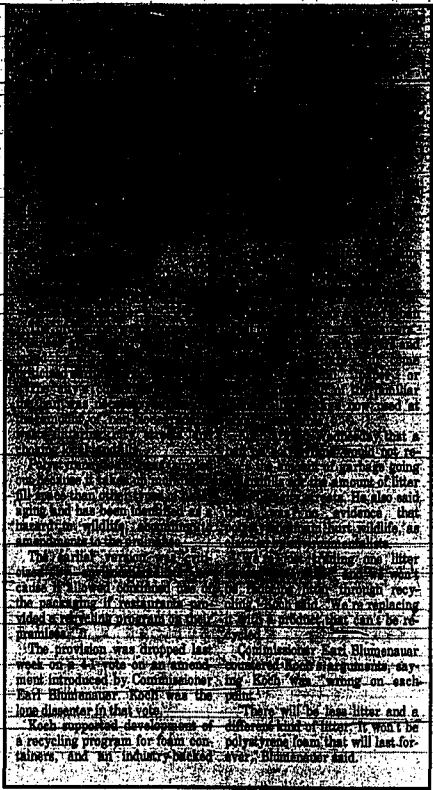

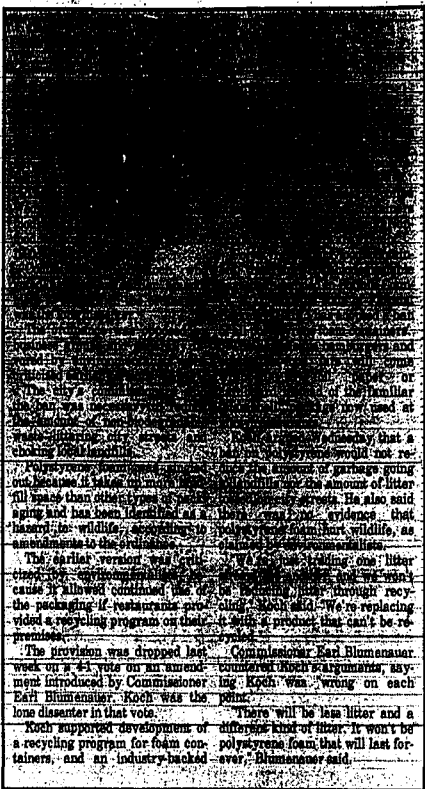

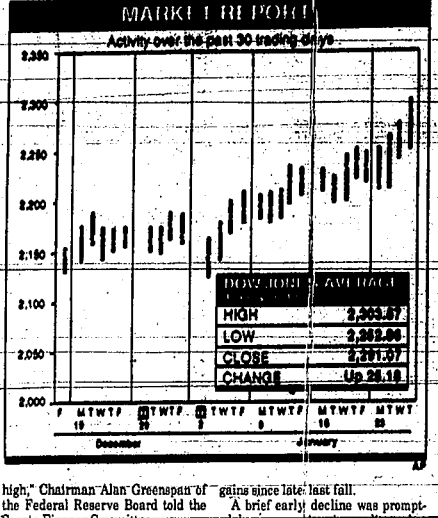
SEC asks Congress for tougher penalties

WASHINGTON — The Securities and Exchange Commission has sent Congress a package of legislative proposals that would impose stiffer monetary sanctions against violators of securities law.

The SEC package, which was approved by the five-member commission last week in a series of private meetings, noted that the proposed civil monetary penalties should not be applicable to issuers, but that it should be imposed or sought only where the violation resulted in an improper benefit to shareholders.

NEW YORK — The stock market swept ahead Thursday in an advance that carried the Dow Jones average near 2,300 for the first time since the crash of 1987.



Big-name computer and technology issues were especially strong. Digital Equipment Corp. advanced 2 1/4 to 114 1/4. The stock traded as low as 91 1/4 in December before the company's latest quarterly earnings announcement, which came in above expectations.

NEW YORK — American Telephone & Telegraph Co. on Thursday reported the first annual loss in its 104-year history, the result of a huge write-off to streamline for long-distance phone wars.

The historic loss was no surprise to shareholders — AT&T forecast it last month — but it nevertheless signaled the growing urgency of competition in the long-distance phone business.

FRUITLAND, Idaho — Treasure Valley Bank stockholders have approved a \$2 million merger offer from a Pittsburgh-based holding company.

The bank, which has a loan portfolio heavily represented by farm loans, closed branches in Horseshoe Bend and Idaho City in 1987.

## Go where many seek solitude

You can call it 'cross country' or 'Nordic' — skinny skis begin to come out of the closet

There are no lift lines. No downhill teenage bombers threatening your life and limb. Instead, you spend your Saturday in snowy solitude. The only other living being you may encounter is a solitary elk foraging for food. To those familiar with the sport, it's "Nordic" skiing. To the rest of us, it's "cross-

country." Up until the last few years, Nordic skiing has taken a backseat to its more publicized downhill or "alpine" cousin. But now, this once obscure sport has come into its own, with swarms of followers.

If you've visited a sporting goods store recently, you may have noticed that Nordic skiing has become an industry unto itself.

Annie Vanderbilt, administrator for the Sun Valley Cross Country Ski Association,

says interest in cross country skiing in the Wood River Valley has quadrupled in the last three years. The ski association was formed by local businesses six years ago to promote the sport.

Vanderbilt says many cross country fans are converts from previous downhill days, and some merely supplement their downhill sport with skinny skis. Other people, who are beginning to ski for the first time, are taking

to the trails rather than in lift lines. "Downhill skiing has become so stressful, even on great snow days," says Mary Jones, who runs the ski shop at Galena Lodge, a touring center north of Ketchum. Once an avid downhill skier, Jones skied more than 100 days a year while she worked and lived in Utah. Now she still skis almost every day, but it's cross country, not downhill.

"(With downhill) you fight to get up on the mountain, fight with the lift lines, and fight to make those first fresh tracks in the snow...it's like rush-hour traffic or living in New York City."

But with Nordic skiing, Jones says you have all the fun of skiing, without the stress. Although you still have to pay to ski on certain groomed tracks, none of the fees compare to Baldy's \$33 per day price tag. And on skinny skis, there's still plenty of free snow to be found.

The cost of Nordic equipment is substantially less than downhill. A complete beginner package — skis, boots, poles and bindings starts at around \$150. Clothing is basic — some warm pants, a sweater and jacket, hat and gloves and you're ready.

Probably the best reason people are

## Nordic overnight trail facilities increase

As cross country skiing has increased in popularity, so has the number of facilities. Many country enthusiasts can enjoy the sport at an overnight resort or simply take advantage of a publicly maintained trail on the side of a mountain.

Annie Vanderbilt, administrator for the Sun Valley Cross Country Ski Association, says there are basically three categories of trail systems in the Wood River Valley: overnight resorts, privately owned and public lands that are groomed by the Forest Service with the maintenance bill paid by the

Sawtooth Valley. Buserback Ranch is the only destination Nordic resort in the area.

Members of groomed trails include the Sawtooth and Baldy Mountains, which are in public lands. Other trails are privately owned.

A day rate of \$135 per person, including three meals, ski lessons and equipment rental, is available at the Buserback Ranch for \$120. A ski

pass for the day is \$10.50. For Idaho residents, a 25 percent discount is in effect during the months of January and April.

Down the road from Buserback Ranch toward Ketchum is another mountain, Galena Lodge. Galena is billed as a touring center. That means there are no overnight accommodations.

Aside from the groomed trail system, that offers everything from expert to novice runs, ranging through a mountain setting, a skier can enjoy lunch or dinner in the beautifully remodeled lodge.

Other Nordic touring centers in the Wood River Valley include Big Wood Nordic, Sun Valley and

# 'Mississippi Burning' tries to recreate dawn of civil rights upheaval in South

violence and over-the-top melodrama, the relative discretion of the scene — far less than the grisly reality of the three murders, especially Chaney's — is a blessing.

'Mississippi Burning' is most powerful achievement is its creation of time and place, done so pungently that the screen never seems free of the threat of danger.

Ultimately it makes the film a shattering experience, particularly for audiences too young to remember the period, or for those of us who

know it, like Vietnam, only from our television screen, from newspapers or from books. Parker makes sure you did not have to have been in Deep County to absorb its mood, like someone making a rag, it permeates

every frame of his film.

He captures Mississippi up close and off-guard: its faces, aggrieved, resentful, brimming with hate or blandly, chillingly cheerful. A big-bellied, genial sheriff, who asks FBI agents Anderson and Ward if they are from the "Federal Bureau of Integration." He shows the far-reaching, disastrous effects of an FBI agent's misguided act: Walking to the "Colored" section of a restaurant and speaking to one of the men eating there. And there are flashes of the undeniable charm of the South as well, a waitress answering a question about the food in her fly-specked jacket says, "We're not full for nuthin', sugar," pitching her reply between friendliness and innuendo.

Against this real freeze of place and character, screenwriter Chris Gerolamo ("Miles From Home") has concocted a painfully ordinary good-cop, bad-cop scenario. This time they are FBI agents, sent with express orders to solve these disappearances.

They are played — exquisitely — by Gene Hackman as Southern ex-sheriff Anderson and Willem Dafoe, as his by-the-books but experienced superior, Ward.

Wrangling continually, representing the opposite poles of pragmatism and idealism, Hackman and Dafoe dig and probe and cross-question trying to get a toehold on the truth. And stirred up by their presence, the KKK's cross burnings and firebombings are redoubled.

Hackman's tactics are also at the heart of the film's wrong turn. Parker has said that "Mississippi Burning" is not about the civil rights movement, but that is palaver. It allows Parker and the film's marketing department free rein: To have the film be given the respect due to the memories of the three murdered civil rights workers while the other hand they cry fiction on the other hand, and invent when they please.

The argument that film need not be perfectly congruent with facts, that it can have room to soar free, to deal in symbols and metaphors is certainly reasonable. And in that respect, "Mississippi Burning" is an achievement: It has not exaggerated the horror of that time, when Mississippi was, in effect, a terrorist state; its laws and its bigotry welded together, seemingly permanently.

However, the victories that are at the heart of "Mississippi Burning" were not won by razor-wielding red-neck FBI agents with their hearts in the right places; to suggest that they were is simplistic and insulting to the hundreds of Southern blacks who clung to non-violence in the face of assault. Those young people, the very ones who created the civil rights movement, are absent from the film, whose only black Mississippians are victims, hymn-singers and noble children.

In the ways of Hollywood, "Mississippi Burning" will probably stand as the film on this subject. In spite of its moralizing omissions, the story is unlikely to be done again. What we have to be grateful for is the film's cumulative power, its use of the soaring songs of the time, its catalog of faces, its fire-lit vision of a hell.

HOLLYWOOD — Alan Parker's "Mississippi Burning" does exactly what he wants it to do. It moves us back 24 years to the brave and dangerous dawnings of civil rights activism in Mississippi, the most entrenched segregationist state in the South.

It is fiction patterned on tragic fact, the murder of three young civil rights workers, two white Northerners, Andrew Goodman and Michael Schwerner, and one Southern black, James Chaney, outside Philadelphia, Miss., in 1964.

It is this nighttime killing with which Parker opens his film, point-blank, an excruciating scene, because an entire audience knows its outcome and can only endure anxiously until it is over. And if, after "Midnight Express" or "Angel Heart," you know Parker's flair for

## Midler, Hershey star in 'Beaches'

The following are reviews of some of the films playing locally in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

**BEACHES (PG-13)** This adaptation of the novel by Iris Rainer Dart is supposed to be the story of an abiding friendship between two very different women. Bette Midler is inevitable casting for the novel's C.C. Bloom and there is everything right with the idea of Barbara Hershey as C.C.'s friend. But the movie is missing what the book had reams of: heart, connective tissue, sense, sensibilities, a good ear and a bad mouth.

**DEEPSTAR SIX (R)** Dull, routine undersea action-adventure in which 11 people are trapped in a secret undersea naval base and menaced by an improbable-looking monster. With Nancy Everhard, Greg Evigan, Miguel Ferrer.

**THE LAND BEFORE TIME BEGAN (G)** This animation features stars Littlefoot, a baby Bronxaurus, who will lose his mother

and must find his way without her to the Great Valley, or starve. Director Don Bluth has gone to the trouble of giving very little children a sort of primer of dinosaur lore. It is nice that the Lucas-Spielberg forces are behind the idea of overcoming differences and pulling together — that the Stegosaurus can lie down with the Pterodactyl. But do dinosaurs lend themselves cuteness?

**RAIN MAN (R)** Because we have had dozens of buddy films about journeys of discovery, we can plot the scenario of this one like a road map. The special qualities of one will work on the other to change him, or perhaps both of them. Dustin Hoffman makes his autistic savant character hypocritically interesting and sometimes terribly funny. Tom Cruise gives his looniest, most authoritative performance since "Risky Business" and it can be said that he holds his own with Hoffman.

**TWINS (PG)** This may be the ultimate High Concept movie. It is composed in exclamation points. Arnold Schwarzenegger and Danny DeVito as twins separated at birth after a

genetic experiment that made Arnold a superhero and left Danny a scuzzball! Romancing two gorgeous sisters! Spiffed out in identical suits! Pursued cross-country by crazed criminals! You think you can do anything with all of that? Call director Ivan Reitman and his two teams of screenwriters immediately; they haven't a clue. Millions on millions will undoubtedly attend this overblown, super-slick, one gag comedy. They may even laugh. But all it really has to offer are six charming co-stars, that identical-suits routine and one impenetrable visual gag.

**WORKING GIRL (R)** For those who missed the special Melanie Griffith blend of moxie and down-to-earth sensuality in "Something Wild" and "Stormy Monday," this is a chance to meet her in the very best of company: romantically entangled with Harrison Ford, directed by Mike Nichols and in a savagely funny screenplay by Kevin Wade. It is a working-Cinderella story in which Griffith plays a more-than-bright Staten Islander with a fierce yen to climb out of the secretarial pool.

# Denver approves 'polar bear tax'

**DENVER (AP)** — The polar bears at the Denver Zoo helped sell voters on a penny-per-ounce sales tax for cultural institutions that is turning metro area residents into some of the nation's top supporters of the arts and sciences.

The "polar bear tax" — so called because campaigners used a drawing of a zoo bear to promote it, in order to defuse talk that the arts are elitist — sailed to victory in the Nov. 8 election with 75 percent of the vote in the six-county Denver region.

The nine-member Cultural Arts District board, which will spend the tax revenues, was selected this month and will soon send out its first grants.

Consultant Floyd Ciruli, who oversaw the campaign for the tax and continues to advise the board, says the 0.1 percent sales tax is unprecedented both in the amount of money it raises and the range of organizations it helps.

He hopes it will change Denver's sense of itself from "cow town" to "culture town" and ensure a healthy financial future for organizations that have seen their federal and city support ebb in this era of tight budgets.

Every cultural organization in the area is eligible to receive funds from the new tax, from mainstays like the symphony orchestra, which last year had a brush-with-near-bankruptcy, to the most esoteric dance and theater groups.

The tax breaks down to a little more than \$6 per person annually, more than any other community

pays per person in local tax money for culture, according to Ciruli.

Denver arts patrons got the idea for the tax from St. Louis, where a property tax helps fund a few of the city's largest cultural institutions.

San Francisco draws from a lodging tax to help some of its major facilities. But Denver's tax is drawn from the whole metro area and finances many more institutions.

Lawmakers rejected the idea of a culture tax in 1986 because of squabbling in the arts community, said Greg Geisler, who heads the city of Denver's Cultural Affairs Commission. Local cultural and government officials then hammered out the existing plan, he said. "Some things for everyone," he said. "The Legislature endorsed it last year, then the voters gave final approval in November."

In the long-run, the health of the large institutions is directly tied to the overall health of the whole arts community," Geisler said.

The largest chunk of tax revenues — about \$3.5 million — is earmarked for four big-budget institutions: the Natural History Museum, the

Denver Art Museum, the zoo and the Denver Botanic Gardens.

A second chunk — about \$3.3 million — will go to a grant agency in the Denver Center for the Performing Arts, the Denver Symphony Orchestra and the Denver Ballet. The remaining money, about 10 percent of the total, will go back to the six counties to be distributed to small groups.

There was little organized opposition to the cultural facilities tax, but some critics said it taxed everybody to pay for "elitist" programs attended by the wealthy.

To counter that criticism, backers turned to the popular zoo and its polar bears, stressing that cultural facilities are used by a wide variety of people and they help foster tourism.

# Human element of its stories allows 'Hunter' to be more than cop show

By WENDY WALLACE

"I know 'Hunter' has changed the way the network looks at Saturday night," says Fred Dryer, who plays Sgt. Rick Hunter on the NBC Saturday-night series. "Literally, the show came to the top of the ratings from the bottom through hard work and allowing it to find its audience."

'Hunter' will mark its 100th episode on Saturday, Feb. 4, by opening a special three-part episode, "City Under Siege." In the three-part, which continues on consecutive Saturdays, Feb. 11 and 18, Hunter and partner, Sgt. Dee Dee McCall (Stephanie Kramer) track down a pair of killers through a Los Angeles suburb where a crime wave threatens to tear the community apart.

"That I'd like to for the viewers to think of 'Hunter' as a modern-day 'Dragnet,'" adds Dryer. "It's what police work is to the '80s, as 'Dragnet' was to the '50s."

Fo' Dryer, the success of the series is due to a combination of good story lines, and the strong chemistry be-

tween Hunter, a no-nonsense plain-clothes detective who tries to make a difference in an indifferent world, and McCall, his equally tough-minded partner. The two share a special relationship — one based on trust, respect, humor and mutual admiration. Watching its emerging nuances is one reason viewers keep tuning in.

"Our audience tunes in to see what Hunter and McCall are doing," says Dryer. "They want stories that they can read into, because they want that involvement. And I think the involvement Hunter has with McCall is an important part of the series."

"Hunter is easy to run away with," he adds. "He has become more dimensional as the years go on because of the writing. Through the years, I also have gained a greater understanding of where Hunter should be and what his work involves. He's loyal to his work, and he does what he has to do all within the confines that go on in police work. He has his enemies, but he's still a human being."

Dryer is particularly proud of how the show deals with the human element. "If you're going to show a police story, you have to show some caring about human beings," he says. "We are consumed with the human element, and that's what people care

about. There's nothing more exciting than two truths coming together."

Dryer, born in Lawndale, Calif., is a graduate of San Diego State, where his outstanding play on the football field led to a 13-year career as a defensive end for the New York Giants and Los Angeles Rams. After his football career ended, Dryer became an actor. His early credits include the television movies "The Kid From Nowhere" and "Starmaker," and the films "Cannonball Run II" and "Death Before Dishonor."

He has nothing but kind words for Kramer, his "Hunter" co-star.

"I wouldn't work on any television show — or anything, for that matter — if I had to work with someone who was tough to be with," he says. "You couldn't pay me enough to do it. And I'm happy to work and have worked with someone as wonderful as Stephanie. She's not only beautiful; she's also involved."

On the Cover Fred Dryer plays Sgt. Rick Hunter and Stephanie Kramer is his partner, Sgt. Dee Dee McCall, on 'Hunter.' It airs Saturday on NBC.

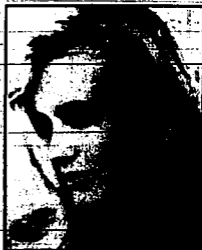

# Hammer enjoys his 'Guiding Light' part and 5 years of steady work

Charles Jay Hammer (everyone calls him Jay) wasn't sure he even wanted to be an actor when he found himself studying with the famed teacher Sanford Meisner at New York City's Neighborhood Playhouse School of the Theatre some 20 years ago. Circumstances had led the young Californian to New York and the world of aspiring actors and actresses.

One day, after completing a scene in which he gave his all as only a 21-year-old student actor could, Mr. Meisner took a long pause and then said that in about 20 years, Jay could become a good actor.

Although Jay has been working as an actor for many years now, he feels that Mr. Meisner's calculations may have been correct.

"I now know what Meisner was talking about," he says. "It had nothing to do with working as an actor or achieving some success. It was more, much more."

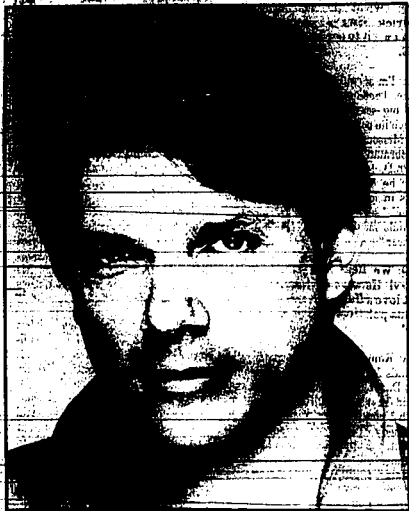
Jay has been playing Fletcher Reade on "Guiding Light" for close to five years and loves his character. He feels that if you keep an interest alive in your character on a soap, the audience will also stay interested.

"Fletcher is the most interesting character I have ever played. He's a person. He can be cranky, somewhat of a chauvinist (sometimes unintentionally), mean, good, funny but always real."

It's ironic that Fletcher has provided Jay with the longest job he has ever had. Actually, the role was supposed to be a short-term one. At the time, Jay was working as a writer on "Guiding Light" and they needed an actor to play Fletcher for just a few days. Those few days stretched into five years.

Jay says he tries to invest Fletcher with some of the style of James Cagney. In creating his character, Jay was also inspired by Alan Alda's Hawkeye and James Garner's Rockford, both of whom are bardonic and pragmatic and, admittedly, cowards.

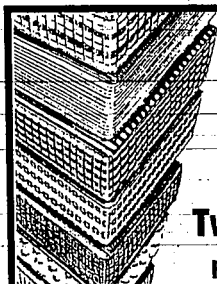

# CBS uses stars of 'Murphy Brown,' 'Designing Women' in ratings war

HOLLYWOOD — If CBS is ever to emerge from the ratings swamp that currently engulfs its prime-time schedule, one of its first steps will be on the solid footing provided by the Monday night hour filled with the rookie hit "Murphy Brown" and battle-scarred veteran "Designing Women."

So, it is not that surprising that the network took time out in the scheduled of the critics, who usually see brand new, never-before-seen shows, movies and mini-series when they gather here, to push these two sitcoms.

The "Designing Women" production company hosted a Southern-oriented party on the lawn in front of the studio whose main building is the original facade of Tara from "Gone With the Wind." CBS had the cast and crew from "Murphy Brown," including star Candice Bergen, for a breakfast and press conference.

"Designing Women" had such an on-again, off-again existence on CBS' schedule that it is only now, in its third year, becoming established with the audience it deserves. A 20-minute compilation of scenes from the show demonstrated its humor and topicality.

Part of its success this year is due to the fact that it is now preceded by "Murphy Brown" instead of "The Bob Newhart Show."

"I feel a lot better about that," Annie Potts, who plays Mary Jo on "Designing Women," said. "I'm not sure that the people who appreciated Mr. Newhart are the same people who would appreciate what we are doing. But I think that the people who appreciate what Candy Bergen is doing are those people."

"You know, watching that tape of scenes from the show reminded me of just how good it is," Potts said. "Sometimes that's easy to forget, working on it every day."

"Designing Women" is virtually the personal statement of creator Linda Bloodworth Thomasen, who has written almost every episode. Her strong feminist philosophy usually emerges from the mouth of the character of Julia Sugarbaker,

played by Dixie Carter. "What's funny about that is that we really come from different poles politically," Carter said. "I mean, I think people should say the Pledge of Allegiance and should say the Lord's Prayer and things like that. Sometimes I have a hard time with the lines I'm given to say."

"Linda and I both think that people should be good, that they should treat everyone nice and do right," Carter said. "We just have different ways of getting there."

Candice Bergen suffers no such schism between herself and the character of Murphy Brown, a hard-driven, sometimes hard-to-take, television reporter on a "60 Minutes" type show.

"I love Murphy," Bergen said. "She's a character with incredible heart, with dynamism and with a real ability at what she does. I love people who are in charge of their lives, who are totally engaged in their lives and don't squander it, who just pitch themselves headlong into things, whether it's their lives or their work."

"And Murphy certainly does that. She does it for a price, and I think that price may be higher as she gets older."

"But, more than anything, I love the edge of her. I love the fact that it's as witty an edge as it is, that it's not directed at people of noble character, that usually it's directed at people who deserve it. And if it isn't, then it's retracted in some form. She doesn't like to apologize much, but usually she circumvents it somehow."

"I love playing her. My husband [director Louis Malle] says it's had an influence on the way I drive. It's the first time I've ever seen him hold onto the handle and put his foot on the floor braking when I've been driving."

"I insist that I've always driven that way, but he says, 'What happened to you? You're driving like a commando. This character is really taking you over.'"

Diane English, the show's creator, worries more about the network taking over the character.

"They're always kind of knocking us out about the edges," she said of the network's response to Murphy's

character. "We resist just taking all the stuffing out of Murphy. People don't realize they're asking you to do that, but when you add up all the requests, that's really what it comes down to."

"For instance, we like to bring Murphy out of the elevator with an attitude in the morning. Sometimes I think we've gone a little too far with it, and that's been a cause of concern," English said.

"But we do always try to give her a moment of vulnerability, because she is that, too. And to me, if you redeem a character in the end, you can get away with just about anything. I think we always do that because we do love Murphy."

English, who had her troubles with CBS over the treatment of her previous shows, "Foley Square" and "My Sister Sam," basically praised the network for its support of "Murphy Brown," though she did say that they would come up with things like research showing that she should stop doing Indira Gandhi jokes because most people did not understand them.

"It's frightening, but those aren't the people who are going to watch our show anyway," she said. "But there's always this fear that you're not going to appeal to the lowest common denominator."

And she agreed that she probably would not be having as much trouble with Murphy's edge if the lead character was a male.

"I think people don't feel that women are allowed to have an edge like that," she said. "But I think we've earned the right to be jerks as much as anybody else. And the audience is accepting her tremendously, as the ratings prove. So I'm glad to see that people admire her, they warm up to her. We must be doing something right."

# 'Secret Intelligence' traces CIA, FBI growth

LOS ANGELES (AP) — CIA agents, as depicted in the new public television series "Secret Intelligence," could remind you of wealthy in-laws — you might curse their existence, but they can come in handy in tough times.

Carried on most Public Broadcasting Service stations, the four-part "Secret Intelligence" series chronicles the four-decade growth of American espionage outfits. This critical history concludes that U.S. intelligence agencies have come to be omnipotent giants, both "protecting" democracy and, at times, undermining it.

"In most matters of espionage, 'the normal rules of combat do not apply,' series host Bill Kurtis says in his narration. "The only rule is, win." That philosophy, not surprisingly, can lead to tangles.

Specifically, to save us from communism, "Secret Intelligence" says, J. Edgar Hoover's FBI borrowed techniques mastered by the Soviet secret police. To encourage his brand of leadership in Nicaragua, Lt. Col. Oliver North allegedly lied to the U.S. Congress and secretly diverted money to the Contras.

Using these and other case stud-

ies, "Secret Intelligence" aims to illustrate the fundamental clash between an open, honest government and the increasingly forceful role covert intelligence plays in arms control, fighting terrorism and maintaining world peace.

But who's a terrorist? Who defines world peace? Who is there to protect us from America's "secret warriors"? Who will watch the watchers? These are just some of the questions "Secret Intelligence" attempts to answer.

"It is more difficult to run secret operations in a society in which the Congress supervises what's going on," former CIA Director William Colby says in the program, "but that's the cost of having the kind of constitutional government we have, and in my view it's well worth it."

While clearly not a now dilemma, the issue grows more timely with the presidential inauguration of a former CIA director, George Bush, and the impending start of North's trial, scheduled for Jan. 31.

"Secret Intelligence" unfolds in weekly chapters, with each of the four segments addressing a specific intelligence concern. The show alternates between intelligence victories — the achievements of code

breakers is especially prominent — and espionage shortcomings.

The first episode, "The Only Rule Is Win," looks at the origins of the FBI and the CIA, focusing on the collapse of intelligence analysis before the bombing of Pearl Harbor and, in contrast, the win-at-all-costs tactics used by U.S. government-trained operatives in Burma.

"Intervention," the second installment, examines the worldwide emergence of the CIA as a secret army after World War II. The hour documents the CIA's orchestration of coups in Iran and Guatemala.

Part three, "Learning to Say No," inspects the scandals and failed efforts — the Bay of Pigs, assassination attempts, the counterintelligence program in Vietnam — that plagued intelligence operations in the 1960s and '70s.

The final episode, "The Enterprise," traces the roots of the Iran-Contra arms-for-hostages scandal and FBI harassment of U.S. citizens who opposed the Reagan administration's foreign policy.

"Our intention here is not to do an expose," series executive producer Blaine Baggett said at a recent news conference about the show. "We don't have the time, the resources or the money."

# New Mexico teen builds film career

LOS ANGELES (AP) — For a teen-ager who attends high school in New Mexico, Neil Patrick Harris has a rather impressive film career.

He co-starred with Whoopi Goldberg in "Clara's Heart" and was in the TV movie "Too Good To Be True," with Lonnie Anderson and Patrick Duffy.

This Sunday, he co-stars with Bernard Hughes, Robert Prosky and Sada Thompson in "Home Fires Burning," a Hallmark Hall of Fame presentation on CBS.

He plays Lonnie Tibbetts in this drama set in a small Southern town at the end of World War II. Hughes is his grandfather, Jake Tibbetts, Ms. Thompson is his grandmother and Prosky plays Jake's best friend.

"My father's been in the war since I was a child," Harris said of his role. "He's coming home. I live with my grandfather, who's got a large grudge against my father. My mother was killed, and Jake blames my father for the accident. I've lived with my grandparents most of my life, and I have to straighten out things between Jake and my father."

Harris was in Los Angeles with his parents, who are lawyers in Albuquerque, to promote the show and interview for new projects.

They recently moved there from Ruidoso, N.M.

Unlike a lot of 16-year-olds, Harris is completely at ease with people, articulate and seemingly never at a loss for words.

He described Lonnie as a "quiet, intelligent boy."

"His Grandpa's almost his best friend," he said. "He's close with his family, but confused with his mother gone and his father in the war. It affects him greatly. He's curious, he gets into trouble. He's pretty much a normal kid."

"Home Fires Burning" was filmed on location in Crawfordville, Ga.

"It was interesting because of the accents, the food and the culture," he said. "I've been on location four times, and each time I had a different guardian. I think once was enough for each of them. So far it's been my mother, father, grandma and my brother Brian, who's 18."

His first professional job was in an episode of the syndicated comedy series "Throb." He was also in a movie called "Purple People Eater" with Ned Beatty and Shelley Long.

"It all began when I was 5 or 6 and living in Ruidoso," he said. "My folks took me to see the national road show of 'Annie.' I fell in love

with it. I bought the soundtrack album and the music book. I was going to be Annie. All I needed was a wig."

"I've always loved to watch plays. Whenever I'm in L.A. I go to the book stores to buy scripts of the latest plays. I love plays. I was John Darling in 'Peter Pan' in Albuquerque. I like the spontaneity of a play. If you mess up, you have to cover up. And you always mess up and you cover up and you get applause every night."

As much as he wants to do a play, Harris recently turned down an opportunity to play Jack, of Jack and the Beanstalk, in the road show of "Into the Woods." The voice required was too low for his range and it would have kept him away from home for six months.

"I think I want to keep acting," he said. "It tickles my fancy. I'd like to try it as an adult. I'm such a ham. All the attention is great."

He's also turning down TV series offers until after he completes high school. He's now a sophomore at LaCueva High School in Albuquerque.

"I missed the first month of school," he said. "My teachers have been very understanding. My classmates have been wonderful, too."

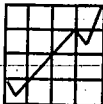
