## Andrus eases ban on waste shipments

BOISE — His purpose met, Idaho Gov. Cecil Andrus has relaxed his ban on shipments of nuclear waste bound for storage at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

waste in the interest of national security. Andrus said two boxcars a month of transuranic waste would be allowed into the state but only from the U.S. Department of Energy's Rocky Flats nuclear weapons plant in Colorado, and only for the next six months.

"We have not thrown the borders open, and we will not," Andrus said.

Andrus has given the Energy Department until Sept. 1 to either open a permanent waste repository near Carlsbad, N.M., known as the Waste Isolation Pilot Plant or WIPP, or find someplace else to store its

waste. By then, he said, if they have not come up with a solution, he would once again close the state's borders.

Meanwhile the ban has allowed the governor to negotiate a commitment and money for waste cleanup at INEL, Andrus said.

"I got everything out of them I could," he said.

Since he imposed the ban, the DOE has agreed to conduct a health study of residents around the INEL, increase the amount of money requested for cleaning up buried waste at the eastern Idaho site and begin an administrative land withdrawal action to

pave the way for opening the WIPP facility.

Once the Department of Energy opens WIPP or finds somewhere else to store its waste, the governor's lever to force the department to clean up wastes already stored and buried at INEL would be weakened.

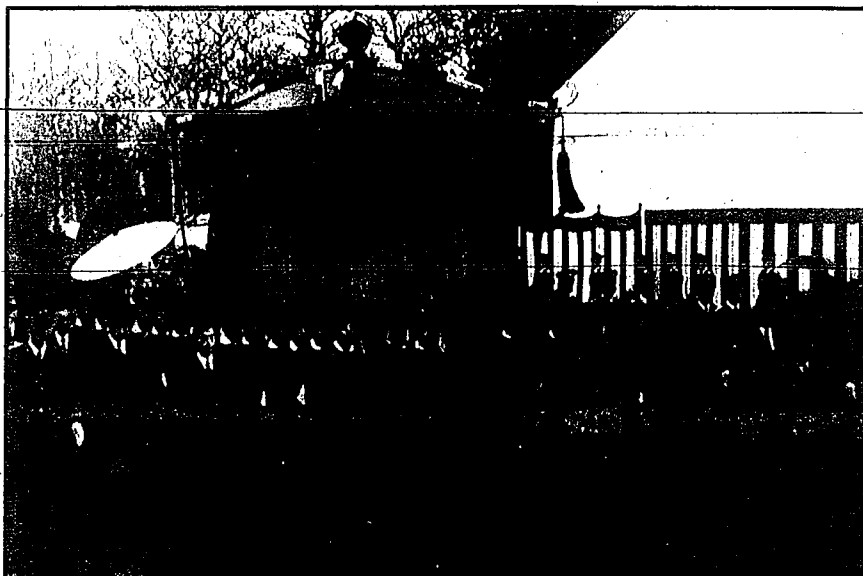
"That was why I had to negotiate for the cleanup money up front," he said.

Opening the state to some waste relieves the immediate pressure to shut down Rocky Flats. The governor agreed that the department was not likely to allow the shutdown of that plant, which makes plutonium triggers for nuclear weapons.

The Energy Department would be more likely to sue Idaho to reopen the state's borders or to find someplace else to put the waste. Either of those options, both politically unpopular, would take time, possibly much longer than the six-month hiatus in the waste ban, Andrus said.

The six months of shipping half the waste produced at Rocky Flats to Idaho would allow the plant to operate until October before its storage capacity would be reached. At the plant's current rate it would be full by mid-March. Even closed, Rocky Flats would generate

## Japan, world bid Hirohito final farewell

TOKYO — The largest gathering of world leaders in modern times joined Japan on Friday in a final farewell to Hirohito, the emperor-god who was made mortal by a disastrous war and died in January after a reign of 62 years.

The capital, a sprawling metropolis of 12 million people, came to a standstill as 32,000 police mounted a massive security operation to protect foreign leaders, including President Bush.

A black hearse carrying the emperor's lace-draped coffin drove at 6 mph through central Tokyo along a four-mile route from the moated Imperial Palace to the funeral site at Shinjuku Imperial Garden.

Police said about 210,000 lined the streets for

the funeral motorcade. After the body arrived at the funeral site, 41 pallbearers clad in black robes carried the one-ton coffin litter about 250 yards to the funeral hall in the garden.

About 225 marchers took part in the procession to the garden. Members of the royal family, including Hirohito's son and the new emperor, Akihito, carried umbrellas in the streaming rain and wind.

Trailing the coffin, a chamberlain dressed in white carried a platter with a pair of white shoes that tradition says the deceased monarch will wear to heaven. Flutes, pipes and an occasional drum beat sounded a plaintive tune as the procession entered the ceremonial grounds.

About 10,000 people filled the two huge tents

built at the garden for the funeral.

Officials overrode protocol to give Bush a front-row seat, even though tradition would have put him toward the back because of his short time in office.

Japanese officials say participation by 163 nations makes this the largest gathering of international leaders in modern history.

About 400 demonstrators from three leftist groups gathered peacefully at a park in west-central Tokyo, carrying banners denouncing the funeral and branding Hirohito a "war criminal" for his role as titular leader during World War II.

Some people cried as the motorcade passed while others held their palms together in prayer.

"Japan is weeping for the late emperor," a 32-year-old businessman told a reporter.

## Senate panel rejects Tower for defense slot

WASHINGTON — The Senate Armed Services Committee on Thursday night dealt a crippling blow to the nomination of former committee chairman John G. Tower as secretary of defense, voting 11 to 9 along straight party lines to recommend that the Senate reject his nomination.

The committee's rejection of Tower put the nomination, in serious jeopardy and handed President Bush his first major defeat on Capitol Hill. It also was an embarrassing rebuff to the proud former Texas senator who headed the panel from 1981 to 1984.

As the committee met into the night in a packed hearing room, senator after senator gave lengthy explanations for their votes, with Democrats largely agreeing with an assessment earlier in the day by Sen. Richard G. Shelby, D-Ala., that Tower was "criminally beyond repair" by endless allegations that could not be effectively refuted. Republicans countered that the allegations were not proven.

In Tokyo, senior officials traveling with Bush called the Tower situation a "fiasco" and seemed stunned that it had deteriorated so quickly into committee defeat. They said that the president had "no alternative" but to fight for his confirmation on the floor of the full Senate, since a withdrawal would be seen as a critical sign of weakness in the first few weeks of the administration.

The officials said that Bush had not spoken to Tower, and they were uncertain as to his intentions following the committee vote. But they speculated that Tower would remain committed to fighting for the nomination.

## PUC approves hike in Idaho Power rates

BOISE — Idaho Public Utilities Commission has approved an agreement that allows Idaho Power to raise its rates 5.1 percent but prevents the utility from seeking increases for three years.

The commission on Wednesday approved a temporary rate increase that went into effect Feb. 1 while the commission considered the agreement. The increase has raised the average Idaho Power customer's rates by \$2.87, for homes that use 1,250 kilowatt-hours per month.

The utility cannot seek another general rate increase at least until Jan. 1, 1992, though it may raise rates to reflect unexpected increases in expenses. The agreement, however, still is open to appeal and must

be approved by the state Supreme Court.

In January, Idaho Power Co. signed the agreement with the PUC staff and major power users after a decision by the Idaho Supreme Court allowed an immediate 8.8 percent increase that now will not take effect.

The commission asked the court to reconsider its decision because the court's opinion questions the commission's "fact-finding authority," commission spokesman Gary Richardson said.

The agreement approved Wednesday hinges on Idaho Power withdrawing its appeal in the Supreme Court case, and the Supreme Court directing that the opinion not be used as a precedent.

"I want to bury (the opinion) wherever they put hazardous waste material," he said.

## Committee approves tax flexibility measures

BOISE — Help may be on the way for Idaho's local government, hard-pressed to provide required services because of limits on taxing authority.

The House Revenue and Taxation Committee on Thursday approved two bills to give local government more taxing flexibility.

Both measures still have to clear the House, and face an even-tougher battle getting through a Senate which has rejected related proposals for years.

At the heart of both proposals was a decade-old law limiting property tax increases at the local level to 5 percent from one budget to the next. Sentiment appeared to be growing in the committee for outright repeal of that limit, although it hasn't been presented yet this session.

Legislation sponsored by Rep. Golden Linford, R-Rexburg, allows cities and counties to ask voters for an exemption from the 5 percent limit. It would require 55 percent approval from the voters, and would be in effect only for four years.

## Price tag on larger library set at \$13.30 or \$22.05 per year

TWIN FALLS — A bigger library would cost an upper-medium-range homeowner either \$13.30 or \$22.05 a year in property taxes, depending on whether an addition or a whole new library is built, a report says.

That hypothetical price tag was presented to the city's Library Expansion Advisory Panel Thursday by Mike Myers, chairman of the panel's cost analysis committee.

The cost analysis committee, Myers said,

The lower figure is an estimate of what the owner of a \$60,000 home would pay for a 20,000-square-foot addition to the library. That's based on a \$1.7 million, 15-year bond issue at 7 percent interest.

The higher figure would help pay for a \$2.9 million, 40,000-square-foot new library at a different location.

The 21-member panel will decide March 7 which expansion project it will recommend to the Library Board of Trustees and the City Council.

Library Board Chairman Dennis Voorhes

has said most people prefer an addition at the current site across from City Park.

Taxes for the 15-year year bond issue at 7 percent interest would be 38 cents per \$1,000 of assessed property value, Myers said. Taxes could vary depending on the length of the bond issue and the interest rate.

Cost committee members compiled the information from sources that included banks and construction companies. They also examined previous library expansion reports and what other regional libraries cost to build.

The two project cost estimates were based on an "average-quality" construction rate of \$60 per square foot, Myers said.

Some \$246,700 in federal grant money that the city is in line to receive for the project was not factored into cost estimates and would likely reduce taxes, Myers said.

Charles Bolles, director of the Idaho State Library, said final approval of the grant will come within about six weeks.

From that point, the city must make significant efforts toward matching the funds by July 1, 1990, to remain qualified to receive

it, Bolles said.

The committee said general obligation bonds are the best way to finance the project. Voters would have to approve a bond issue.

The committee also figured a library expansion at the existing site would raise operating costs by about \$16,257 a year. Operating expenses for a new building would likely be less, but no estimate was given.

A breakdown of the costs of building the addition would include:

# Navy captain guilty

SUBIC NAVAL BASE, Philippines (AP) — A military jury found U.S. Navy Capt. Alexander Italian guilty on Friday of dereliction of duty for failing to help a boatload of Vietnamese refugees who later resorted to cannibalism to survive.

It acquitted him of ordering one refugee shaken off ropes as he tried to climb aboard the warship.

Balian, a highly decorated Vietnam War veteran, could receive confinement for three months and forfeiture of two-thirds of his pay for three months.

The jury of six Navy captains deliberated nearly six hours Thursday and today before returning a verdict.

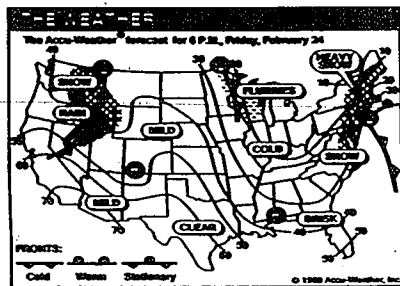

Commissioner Perry Swisher said. He said the opinion, in which the court in effect acted as a super-utilities commission, "would do damage to the way this commission works."

Idaho Power spokesman Larry Taylor said. "We're just pleased that they have approved it, and we hope this is the end of it."

The agreement still would allow for special rate increases for unanticipated jumps in the utility's expenses. Taylor said Idaho Power did not expect further substantial rate increases.

But Gary Sandusky, executive director of the Idaho Citizens Network, said the network still intends to fight the agreement in court.

"The agreement is not in the interests of the consumers at all," he said. "Idaho Power's policies concerning low- and moderate-income people are regressive."

But he said he may want to write a concurring opinion when the commission issues its written order.

The settlement is expected to yield about \$25 million a year in rate increases to Idaho Power. The PUC staff believes the company could only prove it is entitled to roughly \$17 million more in annual rate increases because of a dramatic drop in the company's surplus power sales to other utilities.

Miller said he wondered whether it makes sense to allow Idaho Power to collect an estimated \$6 million to \$10 million a year more than what appears to be justified in order "to make the option go away."

After the commission issues a written order approving the agreement, there will be a 21-day period for the public to petition the commission to reconsider the agreement.

# Andrus noncommittal on budget Jacobson trial may split in two

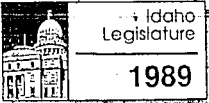
BOISE (AP) — Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus muted his criticism of the proposed 1990 spending plans for public and higher education Thursday, suggesting modifications will be made to the politically sensitive bills before they reach his desk.

"I don't think you've seen any final numbers," the chief executive said. "Everything's pretty fluid right now."

Meanwhile, budget writers added to their financial problems by increasing the Legislature's operating budget by another \$650,000 and diverting \$600,000 more for legislative computerization.

That was the total request of Republican legislative leaders, pushing the annual legislative appropriation to over \$3.2 billion and further eroding the revenue base.

Then only moments later, the committee's GOP majority rejected the governor's request for \$25,000 to hire a child care resource coordinator to work with private businesses, groups



and individuals on child-care issues. Critics claimed the money could be better spent hiring more social workers.

The panel did approve the governor's request for a secretary, a proposal that was killed at the end of the 1988 session in what many viewed as a parting partisan shot at Andrus by former Senate Republican President Tom James Kisch.

The governor also won endorsement for a personal attorney in his office. It was a request he made after being at odds the past two years on many legal issues with Republican Attorney General Jim Jones, who has indicated some interest in challeng-

ing Andrus in 1990.

Legislative leaders were still discussing their budget options after the Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee approved an unprecedented \$30.5 million increase in 1990 state aid to higher education. The bill effectively wiped out a surplus once estimated at over \$50 million and created the prospect of red ink in a year officials hoped to have a reserve.

The higher education bill endorsed by a bipartisan majority on the Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee provided basic continuing state support for the four schools of \$112.9 million, below the Andrus recommendation and only marginally above the amount needed to maintain operations at the present level.

But the scheme pushed support over the governor's \$114.3 million by adding \$3.3 million in one-time money from the surplus for research, work-study and resolution of past inequities.

SANDPOINT (AP) — Two brothers accused of murder in the Jan. 12 slaying of U.S. Forest Service agent and former Twin Falls resident Brent Jacobson may be tried separately, but it's unclear which judge will preside over the trials.

Last Friday, 2nd District Judge George Reinhardt of Grangeville issued an order separating the trials of James K. and Joseph E. Pratt.

But on Thursday, defense attorney Jonathan Cottrell, who represents James Pratt, said he had filed a motion Wednesday to disqualify Reinhardt from the trial.

Cottrell declined to comment on his reasons for the motion, and Grangeville court officials said they had not yet received the request.

The Pratts each are charged with 18 felonies in connection with an alleged robbery and burglary attempt Jan. 11 at a Sandpoint residence. The two surrendered to law enforcement officials Jan. 12 after a 22-hour manhunt, which ended shortly after Jacobson's death in a shootout near Dover.

Both-Pratts pleaded innocent to the charges Feb. 7 before 1st District Judge James Michael. He ordered

the cases consolidated and set a trial date for May 9.

However, Michael was disqualified from hearing the case Feb. 13 by Bruce Greene, the defense attorney for Joseph Pratt. Reinhardt was assigned to the case by 1st District administrative Judge Gary Haman, and he separated the brothers' cases last Friday.

Court officials said Reinhardt scheduled James Pratt's trial for May 9, and Joseph Pratt's trial for June 19. Both trials currently are scheduled to take place in Sandpoint.

## Legislative log

**Signed By Governor**

HB12 (Agricultural Affairs) — Increases livestock disease control fee.

HB13 (Agricultural Affairs) — Includes trichomoniasis to list of reportable livestock diseases.

HB17 (Revenue and Taxation) — Adopts fifteen editions of Internal Revenue Code as Idaho tax law; increases personal exemptions from \$1,900 per dependent to \$2,000 for 1989 tax year and thereafter.

SB1017 (Judiciary and Rules) — Clarifies amount of fines imposed under the crime victim compensation statutes, and provides for when fines or reimbursement to victims may be waived.

HB145 (Education) — Requires amended school district budgets to be submitted to the state school superintendent rather than the Board of Education.

HB127 (Education) — Replaces the term mills with the proper percentage figures in state law.

**Legislative Action Completed**

HBMS (Transportation and Defense) — Asks the federal government for special financial to upgrade north-south primary highways like U.S. 95 as links between east-west interstate highways.

**Introduced In House**

HB110 (Agricultural Affairs) — Memorial to governor and other officials arguing that federal land-use plans be environmentally sound and allow industries and communities of this state to invest.

HR22 (Environmental Affairs) — Authorizes and directs Legislative Council to appoint committee to study the feasibility of better managing costs of the Snake River water adjudication.

HB302 (Local Government) — Provides that all fixture, mineral and timber filings be filed in secretary of state's office to provide for continuing of financing statements after July 1, 1989.

HB303 (Environmental Affairs) — Provides that both House and Senate must approve application to appropriate a minimum stream flow of the unappropriated waters of any stream before it becomes effective.

HB304 (Health and Welfare) — Deletes expiration date for completion of necessary repairs in property rental rate facilities relating to freestanding skilled and intermediate care facilities.

HB305 (Health and Welfare) — Re-

quires disability insurance contracts to contain provision giving insured right to assign insurance benefits to hospitals or health care providers.

HB306 (Health and Welfare) — Provides that court shall conduct a hearing regarding the future status of a child every 18 months until adoption or placement if termination of parental rights has been granted.

HB307 (Health and Welfare) — Adds half-cent to state cigarette tax, stipulates that \$500,000 additional will be transferred to Cancer Control Account.

HB308 (Health and Welfare) — Provides that an insured has free choice of domicile.

HB309 (Health and Welfare) — Provides that Department of Health and Welfare may promulgate rules and regulations for administrative reviews and hearings on permanency planning for children in custody of the department.

HB310 (Health and Welfare) — Provides that court jurisdiction over child whose parental relationship has been terminated will not end if guardianship or custody of child is placed with Department of Health and Welfare.

HB311 (Health and Welfare) — Creates special legislative committee to review all aspects of the health care delivery system.

HB312 (Agricultural Affairs) — Revises duties of persons and agencies to control noxious weeds.

HB313 (Agricultural Affairs) — Prohibits county commissions from adopting animal control ordinances regarding livestock in counties where a herd district exists.

HB314 (Agricultural Affairs) — Provides that a lien may attach whether purchase of agricultural product uses it to increase the value of product or whether he uses it to maintain the current status, health or value of his agricultural product.

HB315 (Agricultural Affairs) — Provides additional definitions as to what qualifies as agricultural pests.

HB316 (Agricultural Affairs) — Provides that applicant for a bonded warehouseman's license must furnish certain financial statements.

HB317 (Agricultural Affairs) — Provides that an applicant for a bonded warehouseman's license must furnish certain financial statements and meet certain net worth requirements.

HB318 (Transportation and Defense) — Allows Transportation Board to authorize individuals to issue citations for removing motor vehicle violations.

HB319 (Revenue and Taxation) — Applies state cigarette and sales taxes to sales on Indian reservations.

**Introduced In Senate**

SCR117 (State Affairs) — Recognizes the special relationship between Idaho and Washington and British Columbia.

SCR118 (State Affairs) — Allows erection of historic murals in the Capitol.

SB1265 (Finance) — Makes emergency 1989 budget allocation to the Agriculture Department.

SB1266 (State Affairs) — Outlines the plan for an independent state monitoring scheme at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

SB1267 (Judiciary and Rules) — Requires scrap dealers to keep property records.

### 'County justice fund' deserves rapid defeat

Well, now, wonder of wonders. The prisoners are barely filling at the new bars in the spanking new Twin Falls County Jail when, lo and behold, our farsighted county commission chairman is crying that without the ability to tax us more, officials won't have enough money to keep the facility open beyond the current fiscal year.

Have you noticed the pattern to these events? First, we get a year or two of public officials crying about how cramped for space this or that agency is and how they just can't go on this way.

So, step two emerges, which is the passage of a bond issue to build a new facility. This stage sometimes involves a false start or two and sometimes a "no" vote or two by the people. But eventually, most pass and the money is drawn from the property taxpayers to build the structure.

Then, we get to step three, which is that there isn't enough staff or maintenance money to maintain the newly-constructed facility without another tax increase.

Step three is where we are today, folks, with the Twin Falls County Jail.

Last week, County Commission Chairman Marvin Hempleman bemoaned how the new facility was going to increase county maintenance costs and that the jail would have to close without a new tax increase.

But we don't recall hearing Hempleman or the other commissioners giving much thought to the operations costs when they were pushing for construction of the new jail.

So now, county officials have a plan, which they are trotting up to Boise to get our legislators to approve.

The idea is to get legislative approval for a "county justice fund," which, if passed, would allow county officials to levy property taxes above current limits to pay for criminal justice costs.

If passed, a separate fund would be created to include jail operations, juvenile detention, sheriff operations, prosecutors and courts. It would be outside the property tax limits, meaning county officials could budget what they think the needs are, then assess the amount directly on property taxpayers, without restrictions.

The result will be millions of dollars of taxes levied at the local level, folks, without any say-so by the people who will pay them.

If any plan this year in Boise deserves a swift burial, this "county justice" plan should get it.

The proposal, in effect, is a blank check for judges, prosecutors, sheriffs, county clerks and county commissioners to raid the pockets of the property taxpayer to get more money for their operations and to hire more staff.

In Twin Falls County, for example, the fact is that crime has increased very little in recent years.

But the costs of criminal justice are skyrocketing. Why? Because of the incessant demands, chiefly from county officials like Prosecutor K. Ellen Baxter and Judge Daniel Hurlbutt, for more deputy prosecutors, more secretaries, more bailiffs and security personnel. Now, Commission Chairman Hempleman has apparently joined the chorus.

Legislators in the House Revenue and Taxation Committee voted last week to let the proposal die, but it has been revived on a subcommittee vote with local Representative Gary Robbins voting "yes" and Celia Gould voting "no." We think Gould has the right position here.

The Legislature should consider a law which would require funding to be provided when additional duties are placed on counties. That would be fair.

But creating a "carte blanche" fund for local criminal justice officials is not the way to go.

It will only cost us a lot of money with little to show but local empire building. The legislators should turn this one down, flat.

### Tower too close to 'defense culture'

—Why reject John Tower for secretary of defense if President Bush values him so dearly? Why not accept Tower's pledges that he is, at 63, a reformer and man in his life style, ready to carry out policy and procurement reforms quite at odds with his record as a U.S. senator of 25 years?

It is written in the 50th Federalist that "if men were angels, no government would be necessary." That could be read to mean that if men were angels, there would be no need for a Senate check — under the advice-and-consent clause — on the nominees of presidents.

It is the constitutional duty of the Senate to stand in the middle of the road when the president sends a really bad nomination down Pennsylvania Avenue.

There must be certain boundaries of propriety and not just simple legality, when it comes to nominations to high office. Nevertheless, the personal life of a nominee is relevant to a confirmation if, and only if, there is a pattern of behavior or a set of habits that cast doubt on his ability to carry out the responsibilities of the job.

A history of alcoholism becomes a relevant consideration, therefore, and has been raised by Sen. Sam Nunn, D-Ga., and others.

Yet there are other important considerations. Certainly Tower's great knowledge of defense issues and weapon systems is an important qualification. But, in a time of a severe budget crunch and defense contracting scandals, is it as important as management skills? Intangible qualities like discriminating judgment, probity, discretion and detachment must be weighed.

Every secretary of defense since 1961 — Robert McNamara, Clark Clifford, Melvin Laird, James Schlesinger, Donald Rumsfeld, Harold Brown, Caspar Weinberger and Frank Carlucci — has brought different skills and experiences to the job.

Yet there is one notable common thread in their backgrounds: Every one of them represented a greater detachment from the "defense culture" — a more independent perspective — than the current nominee.

Tower has critically referred to the "culture of the building" (the Pentagon) and said that it has to be changed.

The Senate should beware of conversions on the road to Damascus. Tower's entire record over three decades indicates that he is part of the problem, and not the solution.

I refer to his membership on the Senate Armed Services Committee, representing one of the largest defense-contractor constituencies (Texas). It is not too much of an exaggeration to say that he seldom met a weapon system that he didn't like.

While chairman of the committee in 1983 and 1984, he stonewalled attempts to reorganize the Pentagon and was identified with parochial service interests. It is a joke to describe him as a champion of weapons-procurement reform in these years.

In 1985-86 Tower chaired our delegation at the strategic-arms-reduction talks in Geneva, then turned around in 1986-88 to advise defense contractors on the possible effect of arms-control agreements on their business.

It has been well documented that Tower lobbied — for fees in the range of \$1 million — for several major defense contractors like LTV Aerospace, Martin Marietta, Rockwell International, Textron and British Aerospace.

Tower told his confirmation hearing that he or his staff analyzed for the "senior management" of Martin Marietta the implications of START talks for "future product development" (like the Strate-

gic Defense Initiative or the MX and Midgetman missiles). For Rockwell he provided "senior management" with his views on the future of the B-1 strategic bomber, and his staff analyzed the implications of arms negotiations on the future of SDI and the mobile Midgetman.

While insisting to the committee that "I gave value" to corporate clients, Tower denied giving "enlightened" advice on probable outcomes of the arms-control negotiations.

Yet Tower was in a unique position to provide such time-sensitive advice to his corporate clients on highly secret negotiations involving the nation's strategic arsenal. Major cuts in the overall aggregate of bombers and missiles were being discussed in Geneva, in addition to a ban on mobile intercontinental ballistic missiles.

Did he advise as to whether a proposal banning all mobile missiles was just a negotiating ploy? What actions did the contractors take in regard to adjusting their plans to focus on weapon systems likely to survive the cut in Geneva? It defies credibility to argue that Tower did not provide enlightened advice bearing on management decisions.

During the presidential campaign, Nunn and Sen. John Warner, R-Va., put the candidates of both parties on notice that public confidence in Defense Department nominees was absolutely essential: "It is imperative that nominees should have and should be seen to have the public interest as their only goal. Actions which call into question this commitment are unacceptable." What example will be rewarded if Tower is confirmed? To be an interesting character is not sufficient reason to be secretary of defense.

**Calero says money given North was to help gain hostages' release**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Nicaraguan rebel leader Adolfo Calero testified Thursday in Oliver North's criminal trial that he hadn't expected North to make personal use of any of the \$20,000 Calero gave him to help free American hostages in Lebanon.

"I had absolute trust in what Colonel North was doing so I was not intent in demanding an accounting" for the money, Calero said. "He said that he had an accounting. We talked about getting it, but I guess I never got around to it."

Prosecutor John Kecker asked Calero if he expected North, who is charged with taking \$4,300 of the money, to spend any of it on himself.

No, said Calero.

Calero, one of the top leaders of the Nicaraguan rebels, known as Contras, testified that he gave North the funds in traveler's checks after the White House aide mentioned the need to help rescue Americans held hostage.

The money came from a Miami bank account that had received \$32 million in deposits in eight months after Calero gave North the account number, he testified.

The money began flowing in, he said, in June 1984, soon after official United States financial support for the Nicaraguan guerrillas stopped.

"I informed Colonel North of everything I did," Calero said. "He was

the one who listened to all our lamentations, to all our problems."

Calero, who was president of the Nicaraguan Democratic Force — FDN — was the second prosecution witness at North's trial.

The leadoff witness, Rep. Lee Hamilton, D-Ind., testified he had not known at the time about Reagan administration solicitations of help for the Contras from other countries in return for increased U.S. military and economic aid.

Hamilton said he didn't know then that Secretary of State George P. Shultz asked an Asian country to provide communications equipment to the Contras because the rebels' devices were antiquated.

**Congress cost \$458 million**

WASHINGTON (AP) — The price tag on electing the 101st Congress is in: \$458 million.

Democrats account for most of that, having raised more, spent more and picked up more from special interests than the Republicans.

One result, aside from the ballot box, is that Republicans are beginning to portray themselves as populists; some even want reforms in the way elections are financed.

Democrats say the figures, released Thursday by the Federal Election Commission, show that they know how to be friends with corporations.

In the Senate, Democratic can-

didates got almost \$219 million from political action committees, or PACS, while Republicans received \$21.5 million.

The differences were far more pronounced in the House, where the Democrats' control is more tenuous. House Democratic candidates received more than \$68.9 million while Republicans got over half that amount, \$34.9 million.

"All of the Democrats' expressions of concerns about the Republicans being the party of moneyed interests are shown up by these figures to be absolutely false," said John Buckley, a spokesman for the National Republican Congressional Committee.

**Sullivan wins OK of panel**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Dr. Louis Sullivan, nominated as President Bush's first black Cabinet secretary, won overwhelming support Thursday from a Senate Finance Committee that showed no interest in prolonging controversy over his abortion views.

The panel voted 17-0 to recommend to the full Senate Sullivan's confirmation to be secretary of health and human services.

The vote came after a two-hour hearing in which both Republicans and Democrats spent less time on abortion than on his apparent sacrifice of \$30,000 to take the job.

**'Through with Chew' day set for Saturday**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Health experts on Thursday urged an estimated 12 million Americans, including 3 million young people, to take a "Through with Chew" pledge Saturday and abandon their use of snuff and chewing tobacco.

The campaign is aimed especially at youngsters, mostly boys, who have turned in increasing numbers to smokeless tobacco products in the false belief they represent a safer alternative to cigarettes, according to organizers.

The "Through with Chew Day," following seminars on the dangers of

smokeless tobacco at schools across the nation, marks the fifth anniversary of the death of Stan Marsee, a star high school athlete from Ada, Okla. Marsee died at age 19 after a tortuous battle against mouth, neck and brain cancers. He had used chewing tobacco and snuff since he was 12.

At a press briefing, American League President Bobby Brown, himself a physician, joined Marsee's mother, Betty Ann, and a panel of cancer surgeons to announce the new campaign. Brown noted that an estimated 40 to 50 percent of major league ball players use chewing tobacco

and vowed renewed efforts to discourage, though not ban, the practice.

Brown announced the establishment of a group called Athletes Through With Chew, to be headed by Texas Rangers pitcher Nolan Ryan. "Nolan has never used tobacco, and that is the kind of role model young people should have," he said.

Brown said he hoped the overall educational campaign, sponsored by the Academy of Otolaryngology — Head and Neck Surgery, would sway young people to abandon smokeless tobacco products.

# Gore reveals North Pole fears of environmental time bomb

WASHINGTON (AP) — An environmental time bomb is ticking away miles above the North Pole as chemicals there threaten to damage the Earth's protective ozone layer, Sen. Albert Gore Jr. said Thursday.

"Stated as simply as possible, this is one of the most serious environmental threats our planet faces," Gore, D-Tenn., said at a hearing during which a team of scientists reported on a just-completed study of the arctic atmosphere.

Dr. Adrian Tuck, of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, said that while no direct evidence of arctic ozone damage was found, scientists were surprised at the extent to which conditions in that area show the potential for such damage.

These threatening changes in the

arctic atmosphere "present a virtual time bomb," Gore commented at a hearing of the Senate Commerce subcommittee on science, technology and space.

The North Pole study was conducted in an effort to determine if that portion of the world has an "ozone hole" similar to that detected over the South Pole in recent winters.

Scientists are concerned about the seasonal depletion of ozone in the air eight to 10 miles above the Earth's surface because it is that layer that protects the planet from harmful ultraviolet radiation from the sun. A 1 percent depletion of ozone worldwide could lead to a 2 percent increase in skin cancer among fair-skinned people, said Dr. Robert T. Watson of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

In addition, more ultraviolet radiation could damage plants and other life forms, including the plankton, krill and other ocean life so vital to feed larger fish and animals, he said.

Determining the extent of damage will not be easy, since little research has been done and the NOAA budget for such studies was cut annually under the Reagan Administration, said Sen. John F. Kerry, D-Mass.

Watson said scientists turned their attention to the north because most people live in the northern hemisphere and an ozone loss in that area could have even more significant effects than in the south.

The Antarctic ozone loss has been measured at as much as 50 percent in the southern winter, although the ozone is renewed in summer as more air flows into that region.

# House group won't OK Medicare cut

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House Ways and Means Committee gave notice Thursday it won't approve the \$5 billion Medicare reduction requested by President Bush or take action on his proposal to cut the tax rate on capital gains.

"While the committee will work diligently in this area, it is not reasonable to expect ... the level of reductions proposed by the administration in the Medicare program for fiscal year 1990," the committee said in a report submitted to House budget writers.

"The cost of Medicare has been soaring as the elderly population increases and medical fees grow faster than the general rate of inflation. Without restraints, the program would grow from \$84.5 billion this

year to \$97.5 billion next year, according to White House estimates.

In an effort to contain costs, Bush in his \$1.16 trillion budget proposed holding Medicare spending to \$92.5 billion next year by imposing limits on payments to hospitals and doctors who treat Medicare patients and by cutting back the program's extra payments to teaching hospitals.

"If these modest reforms are adopted, the increase in Medicare payments between 1989 and 1990 will be reduced by \$5 billion," the budget said.

However, the Ways and Means Committee, which has jurisdiction over taxes and entitlement programs, said in its report that it was not reasonable to expect either providers or recipients of Medicare to absorb those reductions, which would total

\$23.5 billion over three years.

The committee, which approved the report by voice vote, also included the oft-stated position of its chairman, Rep. Dan Rostenkowski, D-Ill., that there was no plan to modify income tax laws this year.

The committee continues to insist that no fundamental change should be made to the Tax Reform Act of 1986," the report said.

Bush has proposed cutting the tax rate on capital gains about in half to 15 percent.

The president contends the government would actually take in more money at the lower rate because of increased economic activity, but Democrats and many economists say the proposal would be a revenue loser and a giveaway to the rich.

# Army recruits down for 1st time in 8 years

WASHINGTON (AP) — Army recruiters last fall failed for the first time in eight years to meet their enlistment quotas and the other three services are showing similar signs of distress, the Pentagon said Thursday.

The Defense Department, in releasing figures for the October-December quarter, quoted its top manpower official as saying the shortfall, if it persisted, could jeopardize one of the Pentagon's biggest success stories of recent years.

# Doctor says Marcos has lost will to live

HONOLULU (AP) — Ferdinand Marcos, the self-described "prisoner of paradise" who vowed to fight to return to the Philippines, isn't fighting any more, not even for his life, his doctors say.

Sunday is the third anniversary of the deposed president's arrival in exile and he probably will mark the occasion from his hospital bed, where he has spent most of 1989.

"It's very hard, to describe why a patient is so lethargic, why they don't move around in bed or try to stand," said Dr. George Drager, a lung specialist who has treated the 71-year-old Marcos in the six weeks he has been at St. Francis Medical Center in his latest hospitalization.

"It's almost as though he's lost his will to live. He's trying, but he's not fighting like he used to," he said.

# Cold air threatens South's citrus crop

# Beirut group vows revenge on Rushdie

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Pro-Iranian kidnappers of three Americans issued a statement Thursday vowing revenge on author Salman Rushdie and his publishers for insulting Islam, but did not threaten harm to the captives.

The kidnappers, who call themselves Islamic Jihad for the Liberation of Palestine, made the threat in an Arabic-language statement delivered to a Western news agency with a photograph of hostages Alan

Steen, Robert Polhill and Jesse Turner.

They pledged "revenge on all those who took part in strong and ferocious campaigns against Islam ... all institutions and organizations that insulted in one way or another the prophet Mohammed and his family through Rushdie's novel 'The Satanic Verses'."

Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini, Iran's 88-year-old Shiite Moslem patriarch, has ordered his followers to

kill Rushdie.

Steen, Polhill and Turner, kidnapped Jan. 24, 1987, from the campus of Beirut University College, were shown from the knees up seated on what appeared to be a bed, looking directly into the camera.

Polhill's left arm and hand were thinner than in a picture released 14 months ago and his left sleeve was pulled up to the elbow, showing what might be a deformity, but he was smiling.

Turner, 42, sat on Polhill's left clad in a striped sweater and dark trousers. Steen, 49, was on Turner's left in a dark track suit.

Steen, who is from Boston, taught journalism at the college. Polhill, 54, of New York, was assistant professor of business and Turner, of Boise, Idaho, taught mathematics and computer science.

They and six other Americans are among the 15 Western hostages in Lebanon.

# 'Verses' author reviews novelist's newest book

LONDON (AP) — Salman Rushdie has been in hiding for 10 days under a death sentence from the Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini, but he has fulfilled at least one literary commitment: a review of fellow novelist Philip Roth's autobiography.

In the review for the weekly Observer newspaper, Rushdie is said to hint at a feeling of kinship with the American Jewish author, whose portrayals of his fellow Jews got him into trouble.

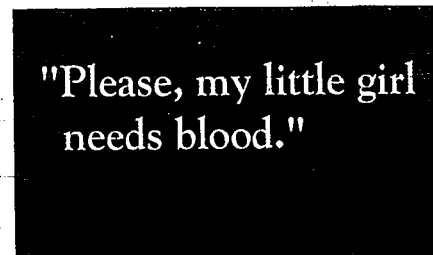
In the course of reviewing Roth, who himself had a period when he was vilified by the Jews, he (Rushdie) says he found Roth was not just

speaking to him but for him," Blake Morrison—the literary editor who commissioned the article, told The Associated Press Thursday.

Roth was attacked in the 1960s for his irreverent, painfully personal descriptions of Jewish life, especially in his novel 'Portnoy's Complaint.'

Rushdie, born a Moslem in India, has been deemed by Khomeini to be a blasphemer for what he wrote in his novel, 'The Satanic Verses' about the prophet Mohammed and the Koran, the Moslem holy book.

The book Rushdie reviewed is 'The Facts,' an autobiography in which Roth responds to his Jewish critics.

# Shevardnadze insists Israel must meet PLO

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) — Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard Shevardnadze said Thursday that Israel must agree to talk with the PLO and accept an international peace conference as the price of renewing diplomatic relations.

PLO chief Yasser Arafat said the Soviets are providing him an indirect channel to the Israelis through increased contacts set up this week in Cairo.

Shevardnadze met separately with Arafat and Israeli Foreign Minister Moshe Arens in Cairo on Wednesday. He flew to Baghdad on Thursday.

On arrival in the Iraqi capital, he told reporters. The prospects of a solution to the Middle East look good and more realistic ... because of the PLO's peace overtures.

Shevardnadze planned to visit Iran after Iraq and then head home, and Iran's Islamic Republic News Agency reported that Shevardnadze will be granted a rare audience with Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini during the visit. The report was monitored in Cyprus.

In a speech to politicians in Cairo, Shevardnadze said: "We would like the government of Israel to know that once it opts for the conference and agrees to a dialogue with the Palestine Liberation Organization, our two countries could take yet another step toward re-establishing full diplomatic relations."

The beginning of the conference would be a starting point for resumed relations," he said. Relations were severed after the 1967 Middle East war.

# Czech media attack activist; authorities lean on dissidents

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia (AP) — State media on Thursday attacked playwright and human rights activist Vaclav Havel and authorities filed charges against three activist groups in a harsh crackdown on dissent.

The Charter 77 human rights group issued a statement calling for citizens to oppose "the lies and injustice ... around all of us." Former Communist Party chief Alexander Dubcek was quoted as calling for the release of Havel and all political prisoners.

Also on Thursday, thousands of people attended a rally in a Prague square marking the 41st anniversary of the ruling communists' 1948 takeover.

The charges against Charter 77 secretaries Vlasta Chramostova and Lubise Silhanova and spokesman Jozef Hradilak were issued Wednesday, the same day a Prague court sentenced two activist groups to nine months and one year in jail.

Ms. Chramostova and Ms. Silhanova were charged with "approving a crime and attacking state organs, charges that carry a maximum jail sentence of one year, said fellow activist Petr Uhl.

Hradilak was charged with "criticism, punishable by up to five years in jail. The charges against Ms. Chramostova and Ms. Silhanova were based on open letters they wrote Jan. 16 supporting a banned demonstration the day before and condemning the police violence used to break it up.



## CSI slated for 9.5% increase

BOISE — Thursday was a second good day for the College of Southern Idaho, with the Joint Finance and Appropriations Committee recommending a 9 1/2 percent budget increase for the state's two junior colleges.

"It's really good news for us," said CSI President Gerald Meyerhoefer.

The increase follows a recommendation Wednesday that \$2 million be given to CSI to build proposed physical science laboratories and classrooms for the agriculture management program.

Under the general budget recommendation, CSI and North Idaho College would split \$6,688,400,

up from \$6,107,300 this year. The increase includes a 3 percent general operating increase, a 5 percent wage increase and \$232,200 for the two schools' libraries and for maintenance.

CSI would receive \$49,000 of the library money, which would likely be spent to meet the increasing costs of periodicals and to buy more books, Meyerhoefer said. The college would also receive \$95,100 of the maintenance money. Those appropriations are to help meet state Board of Education maintenance and library standards.

The total junior college operating appropriation is slightly smaller than the one proposed by the governor. Unlike his, however, it includes no one-time money. If approved, the \$6.7 million figure would stand as the following year's base.

Meyerhoefer testified before the appropriations

committee earlier in the session that state funding was failing to keep pace with dramatic increases in student enrollment.

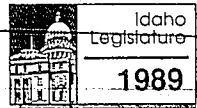
In the past seven years, money from student fees had jumped 156 percent and property taxes to support the college have increased 112 percent. Yet the state has increased funding slightly less than 18 percent. The college receives about 40 percent of its funding from the state.

Meyerhoefer said that the proposed increase, coupled with larger property tax collections expected from economic improvements, will leave the college in good financial shape.

The figures, approved by the committee 13-9, were suggested by Rep. Mack Neibaur, R-Paul. The appropriation still needs House and Senate approval and the governor's signature.

## Senate stands against abortion

BOISE — The state Senate has overwhelmingly authorized Idaho's entry into the U.S. Supreme Court case on abortion on the side of those seeking reversal of the 1973 decision legalizing abortion.

Two Magic Valley Republicans joined the seven Democrats voting against the resolution authorizing Attorney General Jim Jones to file a brief on behalf of the state of Missouri, which wants the ruling overturned.

Both Sen. Laird Noh, R-Kimberly, and Sen. Joyce McRoberts, R-Twin Falls, questioned the sincerity of the resolution.

"I think this is more an exercise in politics than a real effort to focus on appropriate abortion policy," Noh said.

It was the first major legislative debate on the abortion issue in Idaho in years. The focus was less on overturning Roe vs. Wade than on the existing state law. It would reinstate Idaho's century-old ban on abortions except where the mother's life is threatened if the court decision is reversed.

Idaho law would punish mothers with a mandatory one-to-five-year prison sentence and punish those who perform abortions with mandatory two-to-five-year sentences.

Sen. John Peavay, D-Carey, who also opposed the resolution in the 33-9 vote, said, "No one is more against abortion than I. I think it's a very, very poor choice."

But the Legislature should not work to get Roe vs. Wade repealed until it considers alternatives to current state law, he said. Both Democrats and Republicans say bills to change state abortion law are being prepared.

Peavay moved to send the resolution back to committee but the motion failed 27-15.

Sen. Skip Smyser, R-Parma, who sponsored the resolution, said the state should have the "power to protect the lives of the unborn."

But Noh, after the Senate vote, disputed the state's rights argument.

"I'm not sure when you're focusing on such a fundamental human right as when life begins, I'm not sure life begins any different time in Missouri than in Nova Scotia," he said.

"I'm naturally repelled by issues that are more political than substantive," he said. "It takes up a great deal of Senate time and creates divisiveness for nothing."

Smyser called allegations that the resolution was a political move "utter nonsense." But the attorney did not rule out the possibility that he may consider running for higher office.

Both Noh and McRoberts said their votes should not be interpreted as necessarily pro-choice.

"I'm not pro-choice," McRoberts said. "Abortion is not for birth control. However, she does not want Roe vs. Wade overturned, she said. Abortion should be legal in cases of rape, incest or health problems," she said. She'd also hate to see a return to the days of illegal, backstreet abortions when women were "butchered," she said.

The resolution will be sent to the floor for final action.

## Local mom is Mother of the Year

TWIN FALLS — Idaho's Mother of the Year has handled some tough cookies in her time — and not just the chocolate chip kind.

Over the past 35 years Martha Mead not only has raised six kids; she also spent 24 years on a probation officer.

Mead, 57, learned of her new title Thursday morning. The distinction makes her one of 50 mothers nationwide who will compete for national honors at Coeur d'Alene this May.

"I was honored," Mead said. "Yet, more than that, I felt like it was a real responsibility to try on the state level to promote the ideals of this organization and to live up to its philosophy."

Mead said she was competing with two other mothers nominated by state members of the organization, American Mothers Inc. of New York.

All organization members are former winners or nominees for state mothers of the year.

"I think she's absolutely marvelous," said Helen Henderson of Filer, a former Idaho Mother of the Year. "She has really done herself proud. We're

just thrilled with her and her family."

To rise to the top of Idaho's motherhood, Mead had to convince the organization her six children, aged 24 to 35, were examples of good upbringing because of their character and achievements. She had to forward a resume with civic and religious activities and had to write an essay on her child-rearing philosophy.

Mead won't be able to rest on her laurels as Idaho's 1989 mother. The organization requires its honorees to sponsor a project, usually a training program for young mothers, Henderson said.

The First Presbyterian Church, where Mead directs the children's choir and sings in the adult choir, sponsored her. Mead also is a member of the Magic Valley Arts Council and was one of the founders of the Dilettantes.

Mead now teaches singing in her home.

Her husband, David Mead, is a Twin Falls banker.

American Mothers is dedicated to supporting law enforcement, discouraging drinking, fighting the sale of narcotics, stopping the sale of pornography at newsstands, encouraging positive programs for youth and encouraging attendance at religious institutions, Henderson said.

## Burley council looks for way around code

BURLEY — The City Council here illegally granted a variance for a proposed rescue mission, City Attorney Bill Parsons told the council this week.

Some local residents want to establish a mission in an old building on the corner of Main and Oakley, but the building has a mezzanine floor with a ceiling less than the 6 feet 7 inches required by the city building code.

The council voted 3-2 earlier this month to grant a variance to the code.

Parsons, who was absent from that meeting, told the council Tuesday it does not have the authority to change the Uniform Building Code as adopted by the city. It can grant variances on zoning matters, he said.

Parsons said the council would need to pass an ordinance changing the building code. The council asked Building Inspector Keith Bryan to make a recommendation at the March 6 meeting.

Bryan later said he hasn't been able to find out why the height might be the height designated. "I called the International Conference on Building Officials, and they couldn't tell me," he said. He said he doubts the city can ignore the building code.

"I don't know how I can get around that," Bryan said.

Bryan said he is checking to see if a grandfather clause exists to get around the height restrictions. He will also meet with Parsons so the council can have his recommendation before the next meeting.

Councilmen Leonard King and David Gibbons voted against the variance because they were concerned the ceiling may not be strong enough to support the sleeping ward planned for the second floor.

Bryan said alteration plans for the building should eliminate that danger. "I don't have a problem with that because they're going to put partitions under it," he said. According to Bryan, those partitions will give the floor any extra stability it might need.

## USFS wants bridge east of Ketchum

KETCHUM — The only way across Warm Springs Creek is a ford that is impassable during high water.

The U.S. Forest Service wants to put up a bridge across the creek to give hikers, bikers and horseback riders access to Red Warrior Canyon about 13 miles east of Ketchum. The Ketchum Ranger District has started an environmental analysis of the proposal.

"The purpose of doing an (environmental analysis) is to help us make the decision about what type of bridge, if any, should be constructed," Ketchum District Ranger Alan Pinkerton said in a news release. "In addition, the decision must be made as to what road or motorized device, if any, should be implemented if the bridge is constructed."

The Forest Service is soliciting public comments until March 13. A discussion paper with details on

the proposal is available at Ketchum and Twin Falls Forest Service offices. The paper outlines issues identified to date. The Forest Service wants to know whether these issues are valid and complete.

"Some of the objectives we are considering for this bridge center around providing access to the Deer Creek-Warm Springs trail system for foot, two-wheeled/motorized, mountain bike and horse users," Pinkerton said. "We would like to provide a trailhead and parking facility and, if possible, make that facility suitable for use by horse users that are disabled."

The bridge would replace an old bridge built during the Civilian Conservation Corps era but removed about 15 years ago.

Money for the bridge would come from the Forest Service and the state's Off-Highway Vehicle Fund.

A decision on the bridge is expected during April.

# Hansen nears decision on consolidation

HANSEN — Residents here may know by mid-March if their school district will consolidate with Kimberly or if local building plans are in their future.

School Board member Kenny Johnson said the board will consider the comments gathered Monday during a public forum on the issue and decide which course to follow.

"We'll let it lie for a couple of weeks, if no comment, we can decide," Johnson said.

Discussion during the forum included the town's aging high school and junior high school building, which some residents argued is a reason to consolidate. "People are aware that if we don't consolidate, we're looking at a building program," Johnson said.

Hansen residents remain divided over the issue of consolidation with Kimberly.

In a straw vote near the end of the forum, Board Chairman Bill Allen counted 13 votes in favor and 17 against consolidation. Many residents attending the forum did not vote.

About 59 people attended the meeting at the high school to discuss the issue. Kimberly last year proposed building a new middle school for students in sixth through eighth grades and a new sports complex in Kimberly. All junior and high school students would attend school in Kimberly. Hansen elementary students would continue to at-

tend school in Hansen.

Those opposing consolidation cited tax increases, removing schools from their town and the loss of a small-school atmosphere as reasons.

Those favoring said the move would increase educational opportunities for students and be economically the best choice.

The proposal offers some increased educational opportunities for Hansen, but increased costs too, Allen told the crowd.

Students in a consolidated school would enjoy a greater number of classes, Superintendent Richard Smith said.

The cost to taxpayers, however, would increase, he added. Smith estimated the building of middle school and sports complex to house 450 students to be about \$3 million. At that rate, residents in both cities would pay about \$49 per \$10,000 property value.

Kimberly residents would pay additional costs for their existing levies and override bonds, or a total of \$85 for every \$10,000. Hansen residents would pay a smaller amount due to smaller levies, or a total of \$50 per \$10,000.

Smith further estimated costs to Hansen residents for their own building program to be \$1 million-\$1.5 million. Taxes for a \$1 million bond will cost about \$69 per \$10,000 and \$78 per \$10,000 for the \$1.5 million bond.

Kimberly Superintendent Richard Bauscher, who attended the forum, said later he disagreed with the figures. Kimberly will not ask patrons for

a \$2.9 million bond to build a middle school and sports complex. Without the construction of its sports complex, costs associated with construction would be less than those presented.

A sports complex in Kimberly would be discussed if the economy turns around, Bauscher said.

One Hansen resident said she opposes consolidation because property taxes would go up due to Kimberly. She also feared that removal of the middle and high schools would cause Hansen to "with-er and die."

Much of the opposition concerned locating the middle school in Kimberly. Some residents suggested building it between the two towns.

Sever and fire regulations would prevent that, Smith said. Kimberly has already purchased land for the middle school, with or without consolidation.

Hansen proponents of consolidation argued that the merger would increase the "quality of education."

Louis Espinosa said he has two kids in Kimberly and two in Hansen attending school. "If I had to grade, Hansen would lose out," he said.

Other residents echoed Espinosa's sentiments as to quality of education. Many people attending the meeting have sent their kids to Kimberly seeking better education.

Hansen resident Jim Wright said that the two schools are experiencing "de facto" consolidation.

# Heyburn may limit soliciting

HEYBURN — Heyburn City Council this week continued to discuss a proposed change possibly limiting door-to-door soliciting but made no decision.

The city has a Green River Ordinance which prohibits selling in the city limits and was found unconstitutional recently by courts in Pocatello and Idaho Falls. So Heyburn is looking at whether to change or discard it.

Mayor Harold Hurst asked if the ordinance or an alternate version is necessary. He suggested people who do not want salesmen coming to their door can put up a "no-soliciting" sign.

But Councilman John Billett said people shouldn't be required to put up a sign. "I don't want dogs in my yard, but I don't put a sign up to say that," Billett said.

Police Chief Robert Vasquez said Heyburn doesn't have problems with the solicitors, probably because of the ordinance.

The council discussed a new ordinance that would require solicitors to register at City Hall and possibly pay a license fee.

In other business, the council passed a resolution allowing Hurst to discuss hiring CH2M-Hill, an engineering firm, to study what the city needs to upgrade its sewer system.

Heyburn's system currently has no major problems but needs to be enlarged soon due to new regulations, City Superintendent Al Hedge said.

The firm will do extensive testing and inspecting to develop a master plan for the city.

Hurst said the city may get grant money to help pay for the estimated \$19,000 cost for the plan. He said the city share of the expense would probably be about \$12,000. CH2M-Hill will give the city its final report in November.

Councilman Nile Bohon told the council the Heyburn school had a curtain torn in the gym during a city basketball practice and will have to pay part of the replacement cost. The city had not received a bill and Bohon did not know how much the cost would be.

# Murtaugh board bans smoking anywhere on school grounds

MURTAUGH — There's no smoking in the boys' room at Murtaugh School — or in the teachers' lounge either. In fact, there's no smoking anywhere on school grounds.

The Murtaugh School Board has banned smoking in all areas of the district's schools, including the teachers' lounge.

English teacher and Librarian Julie Pence and Student-Body President Craig Nebeker appeared before the board to recommend that smoking be banned on the grounds, saying it is a health hazard and, for teachers, a bad example to students.

Frederick DiazGrandanos, district superintendent, said after the meeting that students have never been allowed to smoke on campus and that the incidence of teachers who smoked was extremely low.

"We have been sort of thinking of the idea for almost two years," DiazGrandanos said. "The board passed it with practically no discussion."

In other matters, the board is considering suspending school during the county fair next fall. School was held during the fair in 1988, but DiazGrandanos said there was a 14 to 30 percent decline in attendance because so many students were involved in 4-H and fair activities.

Prices for hot lunches will probably go up next fall. Murtaugh lunch prices range from 60 to 80 cents, the lowest prices in the Magic Valley, according to DiazGrandanos, and one of the lowest in the state.

The board also set a standard policy for bad checks written to the lunch program. From now on, returned checks will cost the writer \$10, and if two checks are returned from the same person, lunches can be purchased on a cash only basis.

Murtaugh schools were accredited again this year with a commendation for good progress towards correcting the curriculum deficiencies of last year. While accreditation was granted last year, it was recommended that the staff be increased, the curriculum be updated and some improvements be made to the school grounds.

# Unemployment tax may undergo change

Kerns admitted the state Department of Employment assured him the formula would not endanger the integrity of the fund, even during the worst recession. But he said that because the new plan contemplates rising tax rates during hard times pressure would be intense on lawmakers to counter the new formula.



Manager Dallas Green went from mildly annoyed to very angry as All-Star left fielder Rickey Henderson remained absent from the club's spring training camp on Thursday.

"It ticks me off — one more day," Green said after Henderson missed the second straight full-squad workout.

According to agent Richmond Bry, Henderson was traveling from his Oakland, Calif., home and will be in camp on Friday. The labor agree-

ment does not require players to report until March 1.

"Rickey Henderson is not going to run the Yankees" in 1989, Dallas Green is, the manager said. Green, named last October to replace Lou Piniella, spent the winter stressing team play.

"I don't know if he's smart enough to know what he's really doing, whether it's spiteful or he just doesn't understand what's going on," Green said.

Henderson has never participated in the Yankees' first full-squad workout since he was acquired by the club from Oakland five years ago.

Henderson broke Lou Brock's single-season stolen base record in 1982 with 130 steals and has led the American League in thefts eight of his nine full major league seasons. He is regarded as one of the premier leadoff hitters in baseball history, but Green suggested he is not tapping all of his ability.

"I know Rickey Henderson is a good baseball player. He has a chance to be an outstanding baseball player if he does what he is supposed to do for 162 games."

## KEEPING A HIGH PROFILE

Unless a driver is specifically interested in a car's handling through curves, he has little reason to switch to low-profile tires. Such tires have an aspect ratio lower than seventy. (This is a percentage of a tire's height to its width). Low profile tires contact with the road less than conventional tires, but it is wider. This wide footprint provides the car with better cornering ability and more responsive steering. However, unless a car is designed for wide-profile tires, it may have less straight-line stability when fitted with them. Because low-profile tires have shorter sidewalls, they do not ride as well as more narrow tires. They also have a propensity for finding bumps, and are more susceptible to damage from potholes. Switching to a low-profile tire involves complicated choices.

HINT: The aspect ratio of a tire is represented by the two-digit number following the slash mark on the string of numbers on the sidewall.

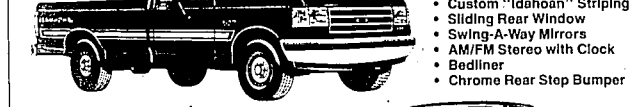

the players. It's so discouraging and disruptive to our basketball players."

Rose said any talk of him coming to Kentucky was news to him.

"I have not talked to any official at the University of Kentucky," Rose said Thursday in East Rutherford, N.J., where the Nets hosted the Los Angeles Clippers Thursday. "It's unfortunate that rumors of this magnitude begin and once they start to unravel, you can't do anything about it."

Eddie Sutton has the job at Kentucky and he is the coach. All of the speculation has come about because of the NCAA allegations. I don't even know what the allegations deal with.

Sutton started the College of Southern Idaho basketball program in 1966 and coached at CSI for three years.

Sutton, who has one year remaining on his contract, said he wants to remain as coach because, "I think the majority of people in the commonwealth want Eddie Sutton as coach. ... Now if the fans didn't want me, that would be something different."

The Wildcats ended a six-game losing streak Wednesday night by defeating Tennessee 76-71 to improve their record to 12-14.

"We're in the horrendous six-game losing streak is over," Sutton said. "I've never experienced that before. The players have never experi-

enced that before."

Sutton and some of his players learned of the report that Rose would replace him from television.

"Everyone was surprised and shocked about it," he said.

The Dispatch, in a copyright story, quoted a source close to the Kentucky program as saying "Sutton is going to be told he's gone in 10 days to two weeks. The new coach is picked and it's Rose. He's (C.M.) Newton's choice for the job."

Newton will become athletic director at Kentucky on April 1, replacing Cliff Hagan, who resigned last year. Newton refused to discuss the Kentucky coaching situation with The Dispatch.

"I'm not AD there until April 1," said Newton, who is coach at Vanderbilt.

"I am the head coach at the University of Kentucky," Sutton said. "That's what my contract says. Until they tell me differently, that's what I'm going to do."

Sutton said he met with interim Athletic Director Joe Burch earlier this week and "he told me I was the basketball coach at the University of Kentucky through this year."

Asked if the remaining year on his contract was mortgaged, Sutton said, "That was never discussed."

He added that he had "no knowledge of the newspaper report being true at all. I've been told I'm the basketball coach at the University of Kentucky."

Two Kentucky officials said that no decision has been made on the coaching position.

"I'm not going to answer that stuff," Burch said. "It's just pure speculation and rumor."

Bernie Vanderheide, a UK spokesman, said, "As far as I'm concerned, there's no basis to that report."

The Dispatch said its source had spoken on condition of anonymity.

Rose told the Dispatch that he was one of four or five people interviewed for the Kentucky job when Sutton accepted it in 1985. So when Sutton was acquainted with the situation in Kentucky," Rose said. "Basically that's all I'm going to say."

Rose was coach at Purdue from 1978-80. His team was third in the NCAA tournament in 1980 and runner-up in the National Invitation tournament in 1979.

He has also coached at Transylvania University in Lexington and North Carolina-Charlotte.

Rumors have circulated about Sutton's job since the NCAA levied 18 allegations of wrongdoing against UK's

basketball program, including improper recruiting and charges that a player cheated on his college entrance exam.

On Sunday, The Courier-Journal reported that Kentucky's response to the allegations indicated Sutton may have wanted a high school basketball coach to give false and misleading information to the NCAA about the transportation of Kentucky basketball players Eric Manuel and Sean Sutton to a college entrance exam in Lexington in June 1987.

The allegation concerning Sutton was not part of the NCAA's 18 allegations against the program, and Sutton has denied any improper conduct.

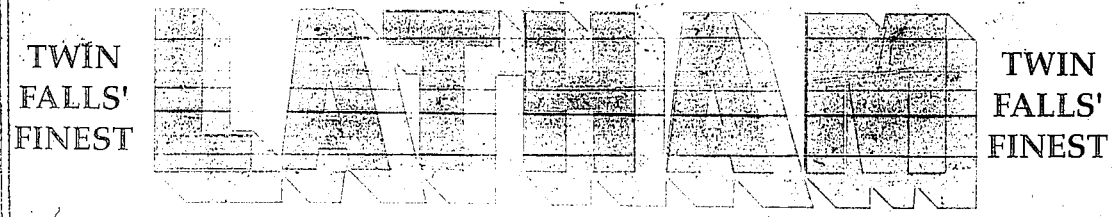

## THE ACES ON BRIDGE BOBBY WOLFF

"Whoever rises above those who once pleased themselves with equality will have many malevolent gazers at his triumphance."  
— Samuel Johnson.

Those who fail in today's game can take consolation in the fact that they have lots of company. Those who succeed know they have risen above many of their fellow players.

West leads the spade queen. East encourages with the nine and South holds up. The defenders continue spades, and South wins the third round. How should South proceed? Many would cash the high diamonds, hoping to put pressure on the defense. When that fails, they fall back on dummy's club suit. Declarer cashes the king, overtakes the jack in dummy and plays a third high club to try to split the suit. When clubs prove to be 4-2, South gets only eight tricks and the game falls one short.

Cashing three diamond winners is not the worst play, but it might produce problems if diamonds prove to be 5-2. The true crime is in trying to bring in the clubs instead of relying on the better percentage play in hearts.

Although South has six sure tricks in the minors to go with two major-suit aces, his best chance lies in sacrificing a club winner to develop two more heart winners, which requires finding one or both of the heart honors with East (75 percent). After winning his spade ace, South should lead his club king to dummy's ace and pass dummy's heart eight to West's queen. Later South crosses to dummy's club queen and pushes the heart 10 through East, collecting nine tricks.

## Theater of Shakespeare's day emerges

**LONDON (AP)** — Actor Ian McKellen Thursday into a large muddy hole clambered and cried out. To think that the voice of William Shakespeare echoed from these stones.

Around him, archaeologists scraped at the foundations of the newly discovered Rose Theater on Bankside, where the Bard made his London debut as an actor in 1592.

The puzzles of the centuries are being answered here — we are finding out who the Elizabethan theater really looked like. It was all guesswork until now because when Oliver Cromwell closed the theaters in 1642 they vanished into the mud, McKellen said in an interview.

Duckboards lead to the site at Rose Alley, which commemorates the name of the theater nearly 400 years after it was demolished. Traffic crossing the Thames river thunders along Southwark Bridge, where passers-by idle to stare at the diggers below.

McKellen was joined by 17 other Shakespearean actors and actresses supporting efforts to preserve the remains of the Rose, summoned by Roger Rees, who had the title role in the London and Broadway versions of "Nicholas Nickleby."

"When I heard about it, I couldn't believe that the site of the first commercial theater in central London had been found," Rees said.

The troupe saw the chalk foundations six feet below the modern surface, collapsed walls and the presumed site of the sloping pit beyond which may still be the stage, buried under tons of soil.

The dig has found thousands of hazelnut shells — the Elizabethans' popcorn — and clay pipes, one with a bowl as small as an acorn.

"That comes from the 1580 level when tobacco was in its first years of import to England and very expensive," said archaeologist Patricia Price.

"We also found these bits of pottery, this wig curler, this stem of a glass goblet, bones of sheep and masses of oyster shells," she said, displaying a box. "There were no dustbin men (garbagemen) then and all the rubbish was buried."

Museum of London experts who located and uncovered the remains after an office building was torn down two months ago, said Thursday they had only until the end of next week to dig before quitting the site to allow the construction of a new building to go on.

But after meeting with developers Imry Merchant Securities, Harvey Sheldon, the museum's archae-

ological officer for Greater London, said some time had been gained.

"The new building will go ahead but we will have an extension to evaluate the site to see what best can be done," he said.

"Perhaps some of the remains can be preserved. Scholars from abroad are coming to London to see how the discovery matches the argument that has gone on for generations: were the theaters round or many-sided," Sheldon said.

The Rose was thought to have been octagonal in shape but the dig suggests it had 16 or 18 sides, or was elliptical, a design never hinted at in contemporary maps or descriptions.

Bankside contains the sites of three other historic theaters of the Elizabethan and early Stuart times, the Globe, the Swan and the Hope, all close together near the

Rose.

American actor-producer Sam Wanamaker, who is reconstructing the Globe as a Shakespeare performance and study center, joined the preservation campaign.

In a letter from Los Angeles published Thursday in The Independent newspaper, Wanamaker urged the whole of Bankside be protected as a heritage area and not built over.

He called the Rose find the "20th century's most important discovery regarding the cradle of the great Elizabethan theater."

Suzanne Bertish, who has acted in the Globe and with the Royal Shakespeare Company, said as she surveyed the site: "I think we are in danger of being very negligent about our great artistic tradition if this is not preserved."

# William Hurt's 'Accidental Tourist' role is part of a personal odyssey

NEW YORK — It seemed, at first glance, a classic miscasting: William Hurt, slim and blond and sexy and intense, playing Macon Leary, the timid, middle-aged, repressed and cautious protagonist of "The Accidental Tourist." Anne Tyler's novel about love and grief and the conflict between habit and change.

But Hurt makes his character believable, from the moment Macon, bowed down by pain and the weight of his unrequited love, appears on the screen. Hurt shaved his hairline and thinned his hair to help create the illusion of beaten-down middle age, and employed his formidable skills to bring credibility to the role. But it is clear in talking to the 38-year-old actor that the character is more than a product of his technical alchemy. Macon Leary casts a long light on the personal odyssey of William Hurt.

"I generally try to think of what it is I want to express and then find a way of expressing it," Hurt says, while explaining why he took the part when it was offered to him by director Lawrence Kasdan. "Then you take the best thing that you get offered. You can only sit on the frustration of wanting to express something for so long."

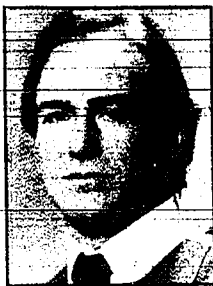
What appealed to Hurt was the condition of Macon Leary's soul: "His grief is inaccessible to him," he says. "And that's a big subject in my life. I've been getting around to facing up to some stuff — events way back — that I hadn't got around to facing. It comes slow. I think of it as being one of the biggest problems that all of us face. That some of us think that the pursuit of happiness means that you can't have a bad mood, or that you get these mundane chapter headings — 'oh, it's a downer' — as if it wasn't part of life to face up to this stuff, the fear, the anger and grief which is part of everybody's life. Because if you don't face up to it you can't be happy. You can't feel joy."

"The Accidental Tourist," nominated last week for an Academy Award for "Best Picture," opens in Twin Falls tonight.

In an interview prior to the film's release, Hurt can be the verbal equivalent of the Bermuda Triangle; reporters have been known to disappear inside the twisting syntax of his abstractions, never to be seen again. He is aware of the challenge he poses. "I didn't study interviews," he says half-apologetically, half-arrogantly. "I studied acting."

But illuminating the complex sentence structures and the metaphorical high dives are the same intelligence and intensity that make Hurt so magnetic a presence on the screen. The ideas fuel a restless search — to find a way to stay true to his own high standards, while at the same time surrendering to the possibility of a personal peace. He walks the tightrope he has set for himself with a wary and willful grace.

The man in the interview is sometimes elusive. The man in the movies is easier to track. As an actor he has taken more risks than any other actor, changing with a chameleon's courage from role to role, eschewing the slick glamour his good looks might have made easy:

from the duped, desire-driven lawyer of "Body Heat" to his Academy Award-winning performance as the tortured homosexual window dresser, Molina in "Kiss of the Spider Woman," to the blandly successful anchorman of "Broadcast News." The plays in which he has performed have been equally varied, ranging from "Hamlet" to "Hurlburly." Together the roles he has chosen have established Hurt as one of the most fascinating and challenging actors of his generation.

Hurt sits back in a chair in his publicist's office here, a pack of Marlboros at the ready, dressed in a brightly patterned sweater whose boyish cheerfulness contrasts with the earnest pale face and thoughtful eyes. He is not fond of this situation, but he plunges in gamely and in earnest, trying always for the big picture. The ideas tend to follow one another in helter-skelter fashion and from time to time, Hurt loses his studied self-consciousness in flashes of a mercurial enthusiasm that leave him looking suddenly pleased and amazed.

It is the philosophical search that interests Bill Hurt, the painful puzzle questions, that lead him each time to the movies he makes. "So many things were right about this film," he says of "The Accidental Tourist."

we've come to a point now where we have a fundamental understanding. We had actually had a time before he even offered me the movie when we got together and were just sort of surprised at how so many of the things we were talking about as being most interesting to us in those days were so similar — looking for gentler ways, realer ways, taking a look at the notions of dependency in our lives, the way we can be addicted to each other, to habit, to moving faster to achieve this horizon which is always the same distance away. That there is the frantic requirement to be loved, to accept ourselves as enough — it gets misplaced and perverted and we try to go faster and faster and faster until we just burn."

Hurt found his vessel in Macon Leary, the reticent writer of paperback guides for business travelers who want to experience as little of the countries they're visiting as possible. The death of his son Ethan in a random act of meaningless violence has exposed a deep and unimagined crevice in his marriage to his placidly middle-class wife, Sarah (played by Kathleen Turner). A creature of habit, distrustful of the gorgeous accident of chance, Leary is destined to sleep through his fate. It takes the vulgar, nervous, badly dressed dog trainer, Moriel (Geena Davis), to

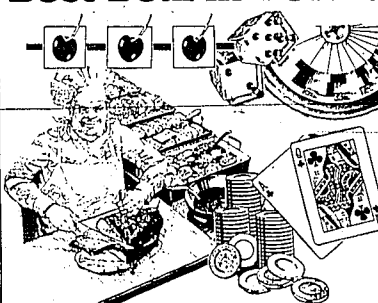
awaken him again to the transforming wonder of love.

Like the character he plays, Hurt has been through something of a transformation. He has not acted since he finished "Accidental Tourist" last April. "There's been a lot of changes in my life in the last couple years," he says hesitantly. "A lot of big ones, really wonderful ones. There's been a facing up to some stuff in my life."

The process began when Hurt stopped drinking two years ago, a decision he is hesitant to talk about — to become "Mr. AA," he says, "would be the worst thing in the world for my sobriety." But the decision did set in motion a complex machinery of change.

He has come a long way from the angry, brooding star who used an alcohol-fueled despair and distrust to fend off the world and create a persona of the lonely, embattled artist. "It's been a long comeback," he says. "Things were pretty dark for me. But I have a faith now, and it saves my day. I was angry with God for a long time, because I was unhappy with me. I hadn't learned to make the distinction between God and my parents. But there's a peace now. In the end I got sick and tired of being sick and tired."

(No wonder our diplomatic service is in shambles.)

Also encouraging is the news that Feldon, who steered clear of "The Nude Bomb" ("She was smart," says Adams), is enthusiastic about "Get Smart, Again!"

"When Leonard called me, I was a little concerned that I might be asked to play someone that I played all those years ago, and I was an absolutely different person," she says. "But when I saw the script, I was thrilled, because time has gone by. Our twins are in college, and 99 is writing her memoirs."

The marriage has prospered, and Max and 99 are now a long-term couple rather than newbies.

"They seem very tender with each other," says Feldon.

There is only one thing, in fact, that the years haven't changed. "We're very fortunate that the CIA — and all our intelligence agencies — are the same bumblers today that they were then," says Stern.

Looking for a colorful romantic figure, "Santa Barbara" writers fooled everyone with their choice, Frank Runyeon's Father Michael Donnelly.

A cop who accidentally shot a kid before joining the priesthood, Michael is a highly sexual fellow who has never loved a woman. But he lives to protect women, after having seen his mother abused by his dad, Dr. Arthur Donnelly.

Deeply torn by religious problems, Michael ignores little temptations like slipping into bed with a woman (most soap writers find this a favorite conflict for priests). The priest was involved with Julia over the murder of Dr. Mark McCormick, and the fans wanted more.

Mail piled in. A priest, of all people, has a soap audience involved. Frank Runyeon admits Julia is only a passing fancy. "Michael has never loved a woman yet, he has only enjoyed them sexually (before his vows). In a few weeks, a figure from his past surfaces to test him again. Time will tell whether he will be able to love women, or just protect them, something he learned long ago watching his hated father."

At the moment, Michael considers leaving the priesthood, seeking signals from God about his calling, wondering if he will be more effective outside the church.

The priest has taken Celeste, the hooker, under his wing, slowly stripping away self-protective layers, urging Celeste to work at the clinic helping others. Father Michael and Celeste talk of their pasts.

Will they ever be released from their sins?

The show's writers offered an easy out, but actor Runyeon, fresh from a screenwriting class, ignored that and said "No."

# Producer Shapiro hopes to avoid tabloid TV label in 'Fatal Passions'

HOLLYWOOD — Like today's tabloid television hits "America's Most Wanted" and "Unsolved Mysteries," Arnold Shapiro's newest documentary, "Fatal Passions," involves the re-enactment of lurid crimes — in this case, the murder or attempted murder of six people by family members or loved ones.

But producer Shapiro and some others in the documentary film-making business believe that such re-enactment of events and other dramatic means of presenting facts do not necessarily define a project as "tabloid television."

"I would hate to see advertisers or programmers reject all reality programming because they perceive it as trash or tabloid TV," said Shapiro. "That's like rejecting all feature films because some of them are 'B' movies. You don't reject 'Out of Africa' because of 'Beach Ball Bikini,' or whatever it's called."

Shapiro, producer of the Oscar and Emmy-winning 1979 documentary "Scared Straight" and winner of 11 other Emmys for other TV documentaries, is somewhat annoyed to find himself talking about tabloid TV these days. But a program with a title like "Fatal Passions" almost begs to be tossed into the same bag as today's "trash TV" offerings.

Indeed, the original title of the documentary, "Crimes of Passion," had to be changed because of TV's tabloid glut. That title was chosen because the program is the second installment of Shapiro's series exploring violent crimes. The first was "Crimes of Violence," about violent attacks perpetrated by strangers. The "Crimes of Passion" title, however, already had been snapped up by ABC last fall for several reality-based specials the network picked up to fill holes in its schedule caused by last summer's 154-day Writers Guild of America strike.

Shapiro said he was satisfied with the "Fatal Passions" title, however, because one of the documentary's stories mirrors the movie "Fatal Attraction," in which a woman has a brief affair with a married man and then becomes obsessed with him.

Even "Fatal Passions" host Patty Duke has fallen victim, sort of, to tabloid overdose. According to a publicist for the show, Duke canceled all of her scheduled press interviews to promote "Fatal Passions" because so many journalists wanted to talk to her about the ethics of tabloid TV, rather than exploring Duke's own past as an abused child or her desire to help others avoid family violence.

"She wasn't expecting to be categorized in that area; that isn't what the show is," Shapiro offered as explanation for Duke's reticence. "She's not the creator of the show. She doesn't feel comfortable" discussing the matter.

Shapiro feels comfortable discussing tabloid TV — but only to make clear that he thinks the label belongs to somebody else.

"I'm not doing anything different now than I have done over my 25 years of producing reality television, and that's to do meaningful, attention-getting documentaries and other types of reality programming," he said. "Right now, it's almost like we're on a railroad track — we're going down a tabloid tunnel, and we're going to come out on the other side."

Shapiro said his show does not head down that track, despite its focus on lurid crimes and their re-enactment. "I don't think that re-enactment and 'tabloid' go hand-in-hand," Shapiro said.

"Think about doing a documentary about events that have already happened," he said, "and think about the choices you have: talking heads, news footage if it's available, still photos. Or you have reconstruction of events. You do as much as you can with the first three, and you supplement when necessary."

In the past, documentary makers labeled all dramatizations as such, but most film makers have dropped that convention, Shapiro said.

The dramatized portions of "Fatal Passions" were shot in black and white to differentiate them from the rest of the film, he said, adding that in recent months even that much differentiation has been scrapped by most documentarians. "I'm a little out of date," Shapiro said.

Harrison Engle, a documentary film maker and president of the International Documentary Association, agreed that there existed a trend among documentarians to dispense with cautionary labels and experiment with "a wider palette of techniques," but he said he believed that TV's highly dramatic reality shows — not all of which are documentaries, anyway — represented a trend that had filtered into the commercial mainstream from independent documentary makers, rather than vice versa.

Engle's own recent documentary "The Indomitable Teddy Roosevelt" mixed re-enactments with archival footage. "Whether it's good or bad really depends on the film maker," he said.

Engle said the current trend toward highly stylized documentary fare may represent a reaction to the network television documentaries of the 1960s and 1970s, which were more news and public-affairs programs than historical examinations. But he still cautions film makers to make the line between reality and fantasy perfectly clear to the viewer.

"I do personally think that the film maker's responsibility to audiences goes beyond 'Let the buyer beware,'" he said.

Michael Renov, an associate professor of University of Southern California's school of cinema and television, disputes both how widespread the use of re-enactments is and its inspiration. Though occasional documentary film makers have done successful work blending re-enactment with existing film, he said, television's increasingly dramatic presentation of documentary material has yet to filter down to independent film makers.

"To me, it's on the ludicrous side to say that documentary changes with any rapidity," he said. "We're not talking about TV's sensational subject matter — the main body of documentary work in this country is the product of a lot of time, effort and fund-raising, non-profit efforts."

Renov added that most traditional documentary makers remain wary of compromising historical accuracy for dramatic effect.

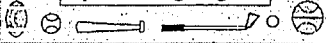

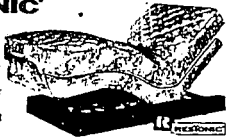

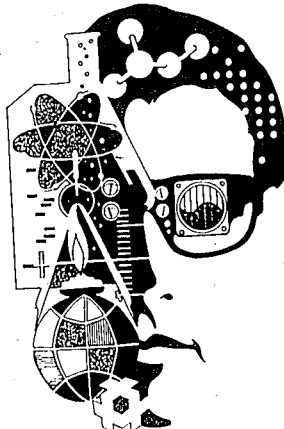

—Commercials starring John Madden.

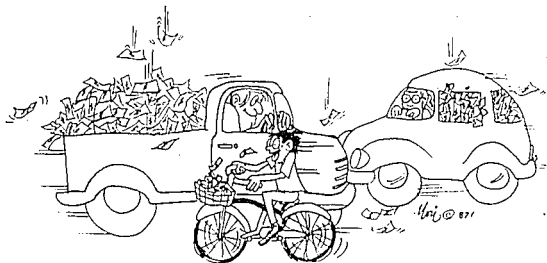
