## Bill's death sentence ends consolidation threat to 6 schools

BOISE - Facing certain slaughter,

a bill targeting the state's tiniest
high schools for possible closure was
sent back to committee Friday to die

The Senate action ends the threat
of forced consolidation or closure this
legislative session for six Magic Valley high schools.

"We will not make another attempt, said Senate Education Chairman Jerry Thorne, R. Nampa. The
people have spoken.

Some senators said they received
as many as 30 letters objecting to
school consolidation.

The state now puts no minimum
-limit on how many students must attend a high school for it to receive operating money of about \$250,000 a
year. And that's how most senators
said they wanted the law to remain.
Opponents to consolidation dominated the Senate debate Friday, arguing the-benefits of small schools
and the value of local control.

"For small twons, it's like kicking
people when they are down to take
away their schools, said Sen. John
Peavey, D-Carey.

minimum size limits of 60 students

## Public disclosure bills may wait for study

BOISE '(AP) — Three competing bills, each to a degree—guaranteeing—public—access—to—public-records, have been approved for printing and introduction by the House State Affairs Committee.

The measures are the latest developments in three-years of negotiations over how state laws—should be deen, for public inspection. But legislative support appeared to be pointing toward post-poining action in flavor of a legislative study committee after the session adjourns.

After a long hearing Friday on all three measures, Rep. Dean Hangenson, R-Cocur d'Alene, led a move to reject them all in favor of the study committee.

"It's obvious that what we have heard today shows there is enough difference of opinion that we can't pass any of them," he said. Hagenson said it would be a waste of a couple thousand dollars to print bills which have no chance of passing. That motion failed on a 10-8 count and the committee then voted to print all three measures.

Witnesses said since a 1984 Idahe, Supreme Court decision, there has been much controversy over which records should be open to public inspection.

Closed records would include criminal investigation records, certain business trade secrets, banking records required by federal area to be closed and other records closed because of federal regulations.

Restricted records, could include some law enforcement. records, "deliberative. documents" of, agencies, Tax Copmission records, personal information, and litigation.

The state agency bill would make it expensive mad difficult to obtain some information, by allowing agencies to make full charges for such things as copying, staff time and computer expense.

Marilyn Shuler, director of the Idaho Husen Rights Commission, said her agency needs protection for its records: If too much information was put out or complaints, the asid, "In the end, people would choose not to use our process."

May denied a request by Idaho First National Bank that counterclaims filed by three parties he dropped. The claims were filed by investors of Bliss Valley Foeds, the farm's owners, Bob and Bernardine Erkins, and former Twin Falls attorney Thomas G. Walker. Among the claims were that Idaho First breached a contract to lend funds, interfered with Bliss Valley Foods' ability to do business and volated a fruit. May's decision means the counterclaims stand and can be part of the trial, which is scheduled to begin Marcy 21 in Halley's 5th District Court and is expected to last six to eight weeks. May will decide later on a request for summary judgement on a counterclaim of racketeering on the part of Idaho First.

In arguing for the summary judgement, Idaho First's attorneys brought up a similar case decided in December 1988 by the Idaho Supreme Court.

May said that case did not control this case as Idaho First attorneys had argued. Idaho First in early 1987 sued the Erkinses and other investors begause the company defaulted on about \$2.2 million in real estate loans. The suit spurred a complicated series of charges and counter charges.

#### Cost of asbestos removal would be major burden

TWIN FALLS — Fearing that the county could get, shackled with high asbestos removal-costs, commissioners have become the second local government agency to snub its nose at the old Bon Marche building.

It think it's a white elephant as far as we're concerned, said-County Commissioner Maryin Hempleman. It's probably a dead issue because of the asbestos situation.

The Hood family of New Jersey, who own the 40,000-square-foot building, first offered it to the city last year, and after city officials turned them down they recently offered it to the county.

Hempleman said the offer was attractive, but the risk of having to pay an unpredictable asbestos removal bill on top of an estimated \$350,000 renovation cost made it untenable.

When "commissioners' inspected the building tyo weeks ago they saw asbestos wrapped around basement pipes. Hempleman said. What remains hidden behind walls and tiles is even scarier, he said.

Local representatives of the building's owners told commissioners this week they don't know how much asbestos is in the building and will not help clean any of it

bestos is in the building and will not help clean any of it up.

Their position is they're willing to give a valuable asset, said Twin Falls attorney Harry Turner, who represents the owners. It would seem like the county should be willing to accept that responsibility.

The county is looking for a location to house six offices that may be displaced if the building they are in next to the hospital is demolished, Hempleman said.

He said although hospital board members have decided not to demolish the county office building, the building would be close to the entrance of the proposed hospital addition and it is likely that it would eventually have to be torn down.

TWIN FALLS - When employers and employees work together to tackle child-care needs, it's a win-win situation for both parties, say an Idaho Power Co. official and a county hospital administrator.

Idaho Power saved about \$86,000 last year through a child-care plan which stores a certain portion of an employee's paycheck in a tax-free account, said Will Anderson, the power company's employee benefits administrator

Employees who utilize the special child-care plan can save as much as \$435 in taxes for every \$1,000 of their annual salary, he said.

Pepinal Modical Center fight the nationwide nursing
shortage. It's also been credited with reducing a 40 percent turnour rate and has probably boosted employee

tificates.

Nelson, questioned at a Senate Judiciary immigration subcommittee hearing, told the panel's chairman, Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D.Mass., that Justice Department auditors found that the 23,000 citizenship cer-

tificates were missing from the Immigration and Naturalization Service's Minmi regional office.

Nelson said he was unaware of the finding until he read the audit, which was ordered as part of a management review by Attorney General Dick Thornburgh.

The audit did raise serious questions which are being reviewed now at the highest levels of the departs ment, said David Runkel, a spokesman for Thernburgh who re-

fused to comment on its specific findings.

The "audit was done at the direc-tion of the attorney general because of questions that had been raised about the service," Runkel said.

The Washington Post-reported in Friday editions that the Justice Department auditors found serious instances of mismanagement, including the episode involving the lost citizenship certificates.




