## South wind brings record high of 70

TWIN FALLS — Southwest winds brought record-setting warm air to the Magic Valley Thursday.

The high temperature was 70 degrees, breaking the 1916 record of 67 degrees, which had been tied in 1953. Thursday was the warmest day since Nov. 1 when the mercury climbed to 73.

Breaking Friday's record of 77 degrees, however, is not likely, said Al Fogleman, meteorologist with KMYT. The normal high this time of year is about 50 degrees in Twin Falls.

The warm weather also has brought avalanche hazards to the Sawtooth National Forest. Avalanche hazards are high to extreme from Fairfield to Hiley and north to Stanley. Hazards also are high in the South Hills.

Wet, heavy snow on top of dry snow has caused numerous slides and brought avalanche dangers to low and high elevations, said Barbara Todd of the Sawtooth National Forest's Twin Falls office.

The Forest Service warns people to avoid back-country travel and encourages people to stay on roads and established trails in snow areas. The avalanche information message in Ketchum is updated every day. Snowmobiles and cross country skiers are urged to call the 24-hour number — 622-8027.

A stationary high pressure area off the Oregon coast has brought warm air out of the mid-Pacific through Nevada into the Magic Valley. The high pressure area is expected to remain stationary through the weekend.

Some minor disturbances will bring a threat of light rain showers through the weekend. The outlook includes showers and temperatures in the 50s and 60s with lows in the mid-30s to 40s and slightly cooler by Sunday.

Even with only a trace of precipitation during the past 24 hours, Twin Falls already has logged almost twice the normal rainfall for March. The total so far is 1.45 inches. The normal is 0.76 inch for the entire month.

The outlook for the next six to 10 days is for warmer and wetter weather, according to the National Weather Service in Boise.

## Senate rejects Tower, 53-47, for defense job

WASHINGTON — The Senate on Thursday rejected the nomination of John Tower as defense secretary, 53-47, handing President Bush a major defeat in his first high-stakes showdown with the Democratic-controlled Congress.

Bush said he would act swiftly to submit a replacement candidate to the Senate, but had no timetable for making a decision. White House officials began the process of reviewing other possible nominees almost immediately.

Names most frequently mentioned in White House speculation as a replacement candidate included Sen. John Warner, R-Va., the ranking GOP member of the Senate Armed Services Committee, and a former secretary of the Navy, Sen. William

Cohen, R-Maine, a member of the committee; former Defense Secretary Donald Rumsfeld, and former Rep. Jack Edwards, R-Ala.

The Senate has made its determination, Bush said. "I respect its role in doing so but disagree with the outcome."

Bush said Tower should have received the recompense of a grateful nation, but instead his "lot" in past weeks has been a cruel ordeal. For this, I am truly sorry for both him and his family.

Tower's nomination was scuttled by concerns about his drinking habits, coupled with senatorial unhappiness that he left his government post as arms negotiator and quickly began earning hundreds of thousands of dollars as a defense industry consultant.

Report offers restructuring plan

## Ease federal control to improve schools

WASHINGTON — School districts would have a freer hand with federal dollars and the president would lead an offensive to improve math and science performance under a restructuring plan proposed Thursday by an influential education group.

The blueprint from the National Center on Education and the Economy also proposes extensive day care and early childhood education and recommends second chances for adult workers who are functionally illiterate or lack adequate job skills.

"To Secure Our Future: The Federal Role in Education" comes three years after the group, then known as the Carnegie Forum on Education and the Economy, released "A Nation Prepared: Teachers for the 21st Century," a well-received plan to upgrade the teaching profession.

Apple Computer president John Sculley chairs the center board and New York Gov. Mario Cuomo is the honorary chairman. Other board members include former North Carolina Gov. Jim Hunt, former Labor Secretary Ray Marshall and pollster Lou Harris.

Sculley, speaking to a news conference by telephone hookup, said the report has been presented to President Bush, White House chief of staff John Sununu and Education Secretary Lauro Cavazos.

He said he did not know whether any of the proposals would be included in an education bill now being drafted at the White House, but said Bush was "extremely interested in what we had to say" and "we do believe we have the president's ear in terms of how important it is for him to come out early in his term for massive education reform."

Center president Marc Tucker said at a news conference that the latest report envisions "a whole new inter-governmental partnership" that doesn't necessarily involve more money.

"First, go for quality," the report says. "Second, reward success in producing quality. Third... let the people on the firing line figure out how to get the job done and get rid of as much of the bureaucracy as possible."

The report's major proposal is patterned on the process that produced the nation's new welfare law. That law reflects many of the solutions developed by states during several years of experimentation when they were allowed to transfer federal money from existing programs to their own innovative projects, unencumbered by many rules, regulations and red tape.

The center recommends a very large experiment that would provide the information needed for a general redrafting of the basic federal programs later.

School districts could design initiatives to improve student performance.

## Senate passes 16-year-old legal driving age

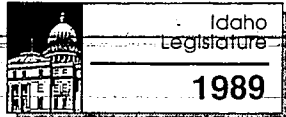
BOISE — Over repeated objections of a minority of rural lawmakers, the Idaho Senate has approved legislation effectively raising the state's legal driving age from 14 to 16.

The 29-13 vote on Thursday sending the measure to the House for final action marked the second straight year the Senate has backed ending Idaho's distinction of being among just three states allowing generally unrestricted driving privileges to teens under 16.

"Fourteen and 15-year-olds are killing themselves and other people on our highways, and it's time we do something about it," said Senate Education Chairman Jerry Thorne, R-Nampa.

In recognition of the political atmosphere surrounding the proposition, sponsor Rod Beck, R-Boise, agreed earlier to including a limited exemption that would allow 14- and 15-year-olds with driver's education to obtain special driving permits.

The permits would allow the young drivers to



get to and from work and school, if no public transportation is available.

Similar less restrictive legislation that passed the Senate last year narrowly failed in the House, and backers in the Senate had to fight off a second attempt on Thursday to derail the bill before winning its passage.

Beck and his supporters, citing severe accidents in Ada County over the past year involving drivers under 16, emphasized statistics they said showed 14- and 15-year-old drivers make up only 1.5 percent of Idaho's drivers but account for nearly twice that percentage of injury accidents.

They also argued that pressures on young teens to have and maintain their own cars cause many

to find jobs and ignore school work, leading to high drop-out rates.

"The statistics, the preponderance of the evidence is overwhelming," Beck said. "These 14- and 15-year-old children are not mature enough, not physically big enough."

But critics, claiming the accident problem was limited to the state's few urban areas, claimed the bill imposed hardships on rural families, whose teen-agers need transportation to school and other activities long distances from their homes.

They disputed the claims about drop-out rates, pointing to the state law that requires children to attend school until at least 16, and Sen. Denton Darrington, R-Deer, suggested parents supported the bill to get them off the hook with their children who want to begin driving at 14.

"We're just simply usurping parental responsibility," Darrington said. "Let's let the parents make the decision."

Others maintained the exemption had a loophole that would allow urban teens to obtain a driving permit while rural teens could not.

## Apparent elopement ends in fatal crash

ALAMO, Nev. — A Magic Valley couple apparently eloping to Las Vegas were killed along with a friend when the van they were in collided head-on with a tractor-trailer truck, a family member said.

Jolene Westlake, 26, of Twin Falls; her fiancée, Tony Shockey, 33, of Hansen, and Stephanie Doy, 30, of Twin Falls, were killed on State Highway 316 about 7:30 p.m. Tuesday near Alamo, Nev., about 150 miles north of Las Vegas, said K. Denton, Westlake's mother.

Although families of the three victims have been contacted and funeral arrangements are under way for Doy, no positive identification had been made Thursday, said Deputy Doug Lamoreaux, of the sheriff's department in Lincoln County, Nev.

Denton said she sent a photograph to the sheriff's office that she hoped would arrive by 10 a.m. Thursday

# McClure blasts Demo 'tyranny of majority' in backing Tower

WASHINGTON — Hours before John Tower's nomination for defense secretary was defeated on the Senate floor Thursday, Sen. James McClure, R-Idaho, declared his support for the former Texas senator and accused his Democratic colleagues of exerting a "tyranny of the majority."

"True patriotism hates injustice," the Idaho Republican said. "This is not the Senate's finest hour."

McClure remained publicly silent throughout the increasingly acrimonious debate over the Tower nomination, which polarized the Senate after the Armed Services Committee op-

posed the candidacy along straight party lines. "I have not spoken before because I wanted to listen to the debate, and I have listened to almost all of it," McClure said. "We know what the real issue is: it's a struggle for power, a struggle between a Democratic majority and a Republican president."

After reading the confidential FBI reports on Tower, McClure said he found allegations of alcohol abuse and womanizing to be unfounded. He also discounted charges that the former Armed Services Committee chairman had overly close ties with defense contractors.

"I have read every word of the FBI report," McClure said. "I am aware, I think, of all the many allegations

that have been made against our former colleague. Most important, I have known John Tower for the past twenty years, and I have come to one conclusion: there is nothing there."

McClure said despite Tower's admission to heavy drinking during the 1970s, he had never seen the Texan drunk. "What that proves is even then, John Tower never let alcohol get in the way of carrying out his duties," McClure said.

Praising Tower's expertise on matters of national security, McClure offered consolation in the form of a quotation from British WWII Field Marshal Bernard Montgomery: "War is a very rough game, but I think politics is worse."

Tower also received a telephone call from Bush, who expressed his disappointment with the outcome, Feltner said.

Tower, according to Sen. Pete Wilson, R-Calif., had been willing to step aside to allow Bush to select another nominee. "He offered to withdraw more than once to the president and the president would have none of it," Wilson said.

The Senate rendered its verdict in an atmosphere of unusual formality. Vice President Dan Quayle presided over the session, practically all senators remained in their chairs during the roll call, and the gallery was packed with spectators.

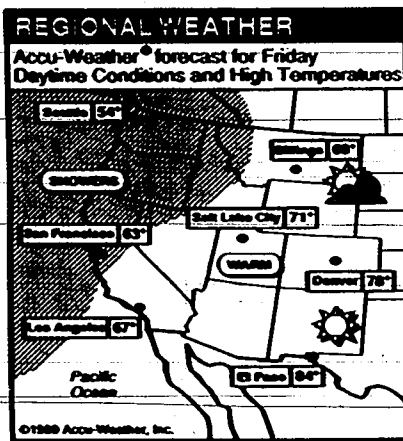

### Soviet attache sent home as spy

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Soviet military attache was ordered home Thursday after the FBI caught him receiving sensitive information on how the U.S. government protects computer secrets, a spokesman said.

Col. Yuri Nikolayevich Pakhtusov, 35, was asked to leave after a six-month FBI investigation led to his arrest Wednesday night, just a day after Secretary of State James A. Baker III and Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard Shevardnadze met in Vienna.

The Soviet Embassy issued a statement saying the expulsion order "could be only qualified as a deliberate provocation against a Soviet diplomatic official."

State Department press officer Dennis Harter said the Soviet Embassy was informed that Pakhtusov was being expelled for "engaging in activities incompatible with his diplomatic status."

He was described by the U.S. source as a significant catch because he is a member of the Red Army's GRU intelligence arm.

### Nuclear cleanup gets high priority

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush on Thursday vowed to "waste no time" starting a massive cleanup of tons of radioactive waste and widespread soil contamination from the Energy Department's 12-state nuclear weapons complex.

At a swearing-in ceremony for Energy Secretary James D. Watkins, the president said the department's top priority is modernizing the weapons plants, which have badly deteriorated and, in some cases, been forced to shut down.

"I have called on you, Bush, to hold an audience of several hundred Energy Department employees. He added that the environmental cleanup also was impor-

tant. "These problems developed over time and they'll be fully solved only over time, but we'll waste no time getting started on fixing these problems," Bush said.

The weapons complex — including nuclear reactors, processing, manufacturing and assembly plants and laboratories — build and test the Pentagon's nuclear arsenal, which is a vital element in the nation's defense strategy.

The department in the waning days of the Reagan administration issued a broad-brush plan for spending \$81 billion over the next 21 years to modernize and begin cleaning up the weapons complex. Bush has not explicitly endorsed the plan.

Watkins said his main goal was to instill a new, more responsible attitude in Energy Department workers that would lead to sounder practices in the nuclear field.

### North griped about 'asinine' queries

WASHINGTON (AP) — A witness testified Thursday that Oliver North was irritated about having to answer "asinine questions" from Congress — the first direct testimony that North drafted a letter denying he helped the Nicaraguan Contras.

The letter, dated Oct. 7, 1985, is at the heart of one of the criminal charges against North. He is accused of having said falsely that he did not use his influence to get supplies to the Nicaraguan resistance.

Also, during a day when three witnesses testified against North, the former National Security Council aide's lawyer tried to show that fund-raiser Carl Channell had changed his story on a damaging conversation in which Channell quotes North as not caring about lying to Congress or going to jail.

## New measure includes some abuse points

BOISE — The House committee which killed two get-tough child abuse measures Tuesday night has approved a new bill which the sponsor says will include some of the best elements of the failed legislation.

But Rep. Jim Hansen, D-Boise, saying it didn't include mandatory jail or prison for adults who sexually abuse children, voted against the new measure.

However, the Judiciary, Rules and Administration, with Hansen dissenting, approved the new bill and sent it directly to the House floor for a vote.

Sponsor Rep. Celia Gould, R-Buhl, said the key element of the new proposal requires judges to order evaluations of sex offenders to determine the best way to handle them. It also imposes a minimum of 10 years probation.

The measure also deals with a crime victim compensation account to make it clear that the defendant will not have access to the funds. It also makes it clear that payments for services will be made to providers, not directly to the victim in most cases.

"I think this is a good step," said Rep. Jerry Deckard, R-Eagle.

# Legislators grumble over Zinser's pay

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Board of Education's decision to hire Elisabeth Zinser as president of the University of Idaho at \$115,000 a year has received mixed reviews from the state's lawmakers.

While some legislators were philosophical about the salary level, which is substantially higher than salaries of presidents of the state's other public universities, House Democratic



Leader James Stoicheff of Sandpoint blasted the decision Wednesday on the House floor.

Zinser, 48, was hired Tuesday at \$115,000 a year, \$15,000 of which will come from the UI Foundation. Current UI President Richard Gibb, who is leaving the job to return to teaching, earns \$82,000.

Stoicheff said he was approached last week by the board's executive director, Rayburn Barton, on the topic of the salary for the new UI president.

# Bill on teacher negotiations goes to House

BOISE (AP) — Legislators on the House Education Committee differ on the impact of legislation allowing teachers to hire professional negotiators in contract talks.

The committee voted Thursday to send the measure to the full House for a vote. That isn't expected to come until next week.

The bill in effect allows either side to use negotiators. Current law only allows school boards to use professionals. Teachers can invite Idaho Education Association staff in to help only if the board approves.

Rep. Jim Hansen, D-Boise, said the measure will ease contract talks and likely produce quicker agreements. But opponents argued it would boost the cost of negotiations and is a step toward unionism.

# Committee approves property tax boost

BOISE (AP) — Throughout the current legislative session, the House Revenue and Taxation Committee has been under siege from county officials who complain they can't fund necessary services because of property tax limits.

On Thursday, the panel tried a new approach to the problem.

At the request of Rep. Stan Hawkins, R-Ucon, the committee vot-

ed to print and introduce legislation which would allow nine counties to increase property taxes.

The biggest beneficiary would be Bannock County, which could increase property taxes \$102,098. Fremont could go up \$36,803 and Shoshone \$33,739. Lesser amounts would be available in Benewah, Boundary, Camas, Franklin and Lewis counties.

"It's a way to take some of the pressure off, but I still prefer repeal of the 5 percent limit," said Rep. Gary Robbins, R-Dietrich. He said he objected to "piecemealing" tax changes. "Someday I hope we will have the courage to do what is right. This is a very short-range solution. We'll have the counties back in a couple of years on their hands and knees looking for more help," Robbins said.

# Stallings pushes silver legislation

WASHINGTON (AP) — A silver imports bill sponsored by Rep. Richard Stallings, D-Idaho, made its second appearance in Congress Friday, to the applause of northern Idaho mining executives and Idaho Gov. Cecil Andrus.

The measure would establish a \$7.50 floor price for silver by levying a tax on imports below that price.

- For example, if Peruvian miners sold silver to users in the United States at \$5.80 per ounce, the silver would be hit with a \$1.70-per-ounce tax at the border. If the silver came in at \$7 per ounce, it would be taxed 50 cents.
- "Prices continue to languish at approximately \$6.75 an ounce, a price significantly less than the cost of production," Stallings said during remarks on the House floor.
- He argued that the United States already provides trade protection for a number of other commodities, ranging from sugar to timber, and called on Congress to provide a "level playing field" for domestic silver producers.
- Only imports in excess of 1980 levels would be taxed.
- Andrus, who had requested that Stallings introduce the legislation, praised him for the measure and said it would eliminate the competitive advantage foreign-subsidized producers have over Idaho miners.
- "Our miners can compete on the world market if the playing field is level, but they cannot compete with subsidized producers in Canada, Mexico, Peru and Third World countries that sell silver at any price."
- These countries will subsidize power, transportation of the mineral itself, and our producers simply cannot meet that kind of unfair competition," Andrus said. "I think a floor price is a fair way to do it, because if the world price goes above that price, there's no tax on the imports."

# Illness still mystery

POCATELLO (AP) — Hygienists for a Nampa consulting firm have discounted the possibility that a copying machine in Pocatello's municipal building is the primary cause of recurring employee illnesses.

But Industrial Hygiene Resources said Thursday that the copier might be a source of contamination, along with other equipment in the building and an imbalance in the ventilation system.

"At this point, it's much too early to speculate on what may or may not be contributing to employee illness," hygienist Dean Schurger said. "We may not have a complete answer for at least another two weeks, maybe longer."

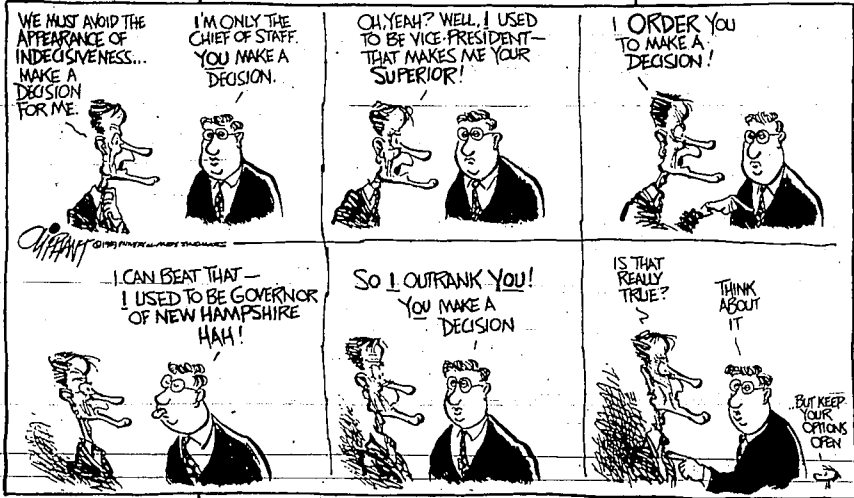
### Proposed city pool fees are reasonable

For the most part, the proposed admission fees at the new Twin Falls city pool strike us as essentially reasonable, despite the fact that they are double what it used to cost to swim at the old Harmon Park pool before it closed in 1983.

The new fee proposal will seem too high to some. Daily fees of \$1 to \$2 daily for youngsters from age 12 and adults will not be easy for every person to come up with.

But nonetheless, we think the overall fee structure is a fair one, for several reasons:

- First, the doubling of the fees from six years ago is a reasonable increase, considering both inflation and the fact that the old fees were probably too low at that time.
- Also, we should recall that failure to collect an adequate fee was one of the reasons that repairs on the Harmon Park pool were delayed until it was too late to save the facility.
- Some of the new money should go into an adequate maintenance and operations fund so that this does not happen to us in the future.
- Second, user fees for facilities like a city pool are a reasonable way for the city to maintain adequate operations money for the facility.
- This allows a city to offer a service for the pleasure of all without having the cost fall directly on one class of taxpayer, such as the property owner.
- A case can be made that city services should be open to all without charge, but in these days of tight budgets, we see nothing wrong with charging appropriate fees to those who actually use the facilities.
- Third, the fee structure includes a number of sharp discounts for people who want to use the pool numerous times. A 20-pass coupon book costs just \$15 for a child under 12; \$22.50 for young people 13 to 17; and \$30 for adults. Those are not unreasonable fees for use of a new pool.
- Fourth, we think the council should think about somewhat higher fees for non-Twin Falls residents.
- This may be essential, given the attraction which a new pool is likely to generate. It doesn't seem fair to us that Twin Falls residents should have to give up space to the likely hordes of out-of-town teenagers who will use the pool at the proposed prices.
- There is another place where the fees, in our view, are too low. That is the \$30 charged for a season pass for Swim Club members, who will be frequent users of the pool and for whom time will be set aside in the daily schedule.
- Given the high level of use their use, we think the cost to club members should be at least double the \$30 proposed season fee. That would bring it to the \$60 season pass for adults.
- But beyond that change, we think the proposed fee structure seems essentially fair.
- The council, of course, should give a public cost accounting for the facility annually. Then, if adjustments need to be made up or down, the community will be able to judge their worth.



### Politics equals heavyweight wrestling

Have you heard the awful news? Professional wrestling is fake, as in phony, ersatz and not real. We, or at least some of us, have been tricked. The razzlin' cars admitted it when they recently told New Jersey legislators that their "sport" was simply "entertainment" and not a "bona fide athletic contest."

The World Wrestling Federation made this colossal admission to free its enterprise of regulations that apply to boxing and similar dangerous endeavors.

Sad to say, fellow Hulk-a-manjias, our heroes and villains are simply an illusion, and have been since Haystack Calhoun was still down on the farm. Before we get too depressed over this jarring revelation, we should realize that illusion is as American as fast food.

We thrive on illusion. We couldn't do without a daily dose of glowing unreality from the boob tube. Remember Ronald Reagan? The man who was going to give us lower taxes, more bombs and (abracadabra!!!) a balanced budget?

Well, we loved him, even after it became clear that the rabbit wasn't coming out of the hat.

The timing of the wrestling confession was especially apt because Reagan's successor is simultaneously grappling with the reality of high office. When asked about violent crime

And as much as we Americans apparently tolerate being deceived, remember that we will be the ones to pay as political reality reasserts itself in drips and drabs. In politics, we are all in the ring and it still hurts when a big phony falls over us.

### Marcos continues attempt to manipulate public opinion

In an effort to avoid federal prosecution, former Philippine dictator Ferdinand Marcos and his associates are involved in a well-orchestrated campaign to give the perception that he is sick and near death and thus unable to travel to New York to face arraignment.

The campaign is meant to gain the sympathy of the American and Filipino publics — and not necessarily in that order. Marcos hopes to persuade the Filipino people that his health on Earth is about to run out, thereby putting pressure on the government of Corason Aquino to relent and let him come home.

And that would open the way for him to escape federal prosecution. He would lobby Washington for permission to leave his exile in Hawaii. The State Department would probably be willing to give its approval if the Aquino government, the real party of interest in the federal criminal cases against him,

Tom Laguatan said he was welcome to return.

While the Philippine government has no medical evidence to dispute the claims of Marcos or his doctors, it would be wise for everyone to remember that the ousted dictator and his wife Imelda are masters at creating perceptions.

Both are great stage performers. In the past, when he wanted to give the impression of being in great health, Marcos would have himself videotaped lifting weights. Imelda Marcos can do an impression of crying Madonna, rosary and all, that would make a Hollywood director proud.

Yet Marcos' health has often taken turns for the worse, particularly when it was convenient for him to be so disposed. Thus when Benigno S. Aquino Jr. was assassinated,

Marcos persuaded many that he was so gravely ill that he could not possibly have given the order to kill the opposition leader.

Marcos, 71, has been diagnosed as having pneumonia. But even if he is near death, does this mean he should be allowed to return to the Philippines?

Let the present situation of the Filipino people answer that question. The country is \$28 billion in debt. There is a legacy of institutionalized graft and corruption in government. Thousands of Filipinos have left the country for menial jobs abroad, separated from families and subject to abuse, alienation and loneliness. For those who remain, 70 percent live in conditions of mass poverty and suffer the attendant evils of crime, disease and ignorance. It is not uncommon to see Filipino children digging through heaps of stinking garbage to find discarded scraps of food.

But the suffering is not limited just to those consigned to a life of impoverishment. The families of murdered opponents also bear the pain of the Marcos years. Torture victims carry the emotional and physical scars of their ordeal.

Yet today Marcos remains unrepentant. Despite overwhelming evidence to the contrary, he continues to deny stealing billions of dollars from the Filipino people. He continues with his efforts to destabilize the present Philippine government, even after coup attempts that he helped finance failed. He still has tremendous resources at his command and uses them to influence the Philippine media or to buy the favors of corruptible civilian and military officials.

To the dismay of so many, some of Marcos' worst murderers and torturers have remained uncharged or acquitted — some even have been appointed to high office — all be-

cause of his influence and resources. If he can create so many problems from outside the Philippines, it is unimaginable what he can do if he is allowed to return. The national security and interest of the Philippines must prevail above any of Marcos' reasons to return.

As the Filipino people continue their difficult journey toward true democracy, it is well for them to look down the road through which they have passed.

Toppling a terrible dictatorship by facing tanks and guns with prayers and roars and courage was a tremendous milestone in this journey and will always be something that Filipinos can truly point to with pride. But the journey must continue. Marcos cannot be allowed to stand in the way.

**Opposes gun control bills**

What would you do if an agent for the Department of the Treasury, Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms, came to your door one day and demanded that you turn over to the department all your firearms that function in a semi-automatic mode, like the Remington M-1100, Browning Auto-5, Browning 22LR Semi Auto, Colt Government 45 ACP, and all other semi-automatic firearms? Or be charged with a federal felony for owning same — and that's no joke either, and don't for one second assume that it cannot happen!

In the U.S. Congress right now there are two bills pending that, if enacted, within 30 days all such firearms under the law will have to be surrendered to "authorities," and the penalty can be up to six months in jail and a very large fine.

This legislation represents the first "confiscatory prohibition" of sporting rifles and shot-

guns ever proposed on a federal level. In the U.S. House of Representatives bill H.R. 869 proposed by Rep. Howard Berman would make mere possession of a semi-automatic rifle or shotgun and handgun a federal felony and would prohibit the transfer of those firearms effective immediately upon enactment of the bill.

In the U.S. Senate bill S.368 sponsored by Sen. Howard Metzenbaum would place currently owned semi-automatic firearms under the highly restrictive requirements of the National Firearms Act (Title 11), which means that all semi-automatic firearms would have to be registered. Title 11 restrictions are a wish-list for the anti-gun prohibitionists, which includes federal background checks, registration, restrictions on transportation, fingerprinting and sign-off by local law enforcement.

Bill S. 369 would outlaw the Remington Model 4 rifle, Ruger 1022 rifle, Remington

742, all Smith and Wesson semi-automatic handguns, all Beretta pistols and countless others, all because they have a fixed magazine extending 10 rounds.

The bill also empowers the Secretary of the Treasury to ban any of these firearms he wishes that might be deemed substantially identical.

Now, as firearms owners, if you want to live under that kind of restrictions, then all you need to do is to sit by with your head in the sand and let it happen, and believe you me, it will if we as gun owners don't do something about it; and that would be get on the phone, call a (202)224-3121 voicing your opinion, or write a short letter to Senate Office Building, Washington, D.C. 20510 and U.S. House of Representatives, Washington, D.C. 20515. It's essential that you do so and now! Time is important.

# NATO, Warsaw Pact launch dual talks

—VIENNA, Austria (AP) — NATO and the Warsaw Pact on Thursday opened talks aimed at reducing conventional arms in Europe and building trust among the continent's nations.

Arms reduction proposals presented by each military bloc at the negotiations underlined the differences between the sides, particularly over air and naval forces and tactical nuclear weapons.

But the top Soviet negotiator, Oleg Grinevsky, said the problems were not insoluble, and he early held hope of an initial agreement by the year 1990s.

Chief U.S. negotiator Steven J. Ledogar said the negotiations were off to a good start but that NATO did not want to set a time frame for possible

agreements. "We are not really that far apart," Ledogar said.

Two sets of talks are being held in Vienna's majestic Hofburg palace — one between the 16 NATO and seven Warsaw Pact nations on conventional armed forces in Europe, and one on building trust among the 35 nations that signed the 1975 Helsinki Act.

In Washington, President Bush heralded the start of the talks, saying "Today marks the beginning of a process of great importance for the people of Europe, the United States and Canada and for all who share the hope of a safer and more secure Europe."

He said the negotiations on conventional forces

"offer a new opportunity to redress the imbalance in military forces which strongly favors the Warsaw pact."

On the talks on improving East-West relations, he said: "Our aim is to lift the veil of secrecy from certain military activities and forces, and thus contribute to a more stable Europe."

Outlining the Warsaw Pact's stance on conventional arms, Grinevsky proposed deep cuts by 1994 in troop numbers, tanks, artillery and other land weapons and combat aircraft.

He gave no numbers, but said both blocs should eliminate any imbalances and then trim to 10 percent to 15 percent below their present lowest levels.

## Tourists in Tibet given boot

BEIJING (AP) — Foreign Chinese troops of atrocities tourists were expelled from Lhasa on Thursday, and Chinese troops began rounding up Tibetans in the city and hauling them away in trucks, a Tibetan woman said.

China said four more people had died after suffering injuries earlier this week in the Tibetan capital during bloody protests of Chinese communist rule in the remote mountain region.

The report brought the official death toll to 16. Western travelers have quoted Tibetans as saying that many more have died. Most Tibetans reportedly put the figure at between 20 and 30.

Some Western tourists accused Chinese have been allowed to remain, but foreign tourists, estimated at 140, were ordered to leave by Thursday — the eve of the 30th anniversary of a rebellion in Tibet. Western travelers who arrived in Chengdu on a flight from Lhasa said Tibetans had feared mass arrests. One group on the flight issued a statement they said would be sent to the United Nations and the Dalai Lama, Tibet's spiritual leader who fled China after the 1959 uprising.

## Vatican tells Americans to get tough

VATICAN CITY (AP) — The Vatican's chief theologian urged American bishops to be "martyrs" in defending Roman Catholic teaching and to impose their authority on dissenters, officials said Thursday.

Several of the 35 U.S. bishops attending a special conference responded that compromise and dialogue are necessary in the American church in areas other than major matters of faith.

Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger said some bishops had let dissenting theologians usurp their authority, "leading to a growing insecurity and disorientation" among the faithful.

On some issues, "it's necessary to risk being unpopular, because of the truth," said Ratzinger, the head of the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, in remarks released Thursday. "Those who announce the Gospel must also be martyrs, in the most profound sense of the word."

His address Wednesday night was seen as the keynote of the four-day closed meeting between the Vatican and the bishops Pope John Paul II summoned to discuss the state of American church, which has 52 million members.

John Paul, who is attending the conference, has criticized the tendency of many U.S. Catholics to disregard church teaching or birth control, divorce and some other matters.

Ratzinger spoke of theological experts who, "through the mass media, risk being unpopular, because of the truth," said Ratzinger, the head of the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, in remarks released Thursday. "Those who announce the Gospel must also be martyrs, in the most profound sense of the word."

In recent years, he said, many bishops have felt pressure to be managers rather than preachers.

"The bishops have fully adapted themselves to this regulative model, little defending their magisterial authority" over that of theologians, he said.

He criticized those who think the spirit of free inquiry, not church teaching, should prevail on theological issues.

Archbishop John Roach of Minneapolis-St. Paul and other American prelates responded with a defense of compromise and debate on church teaching.

## Poles to elect new senate in free voting

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — Government and opposition negotiators announced agreement Thursday on free elections to a newly created senate, in what could be the first democratic national elections in the communist bloc.

In addition to the elections to the new senate, the sides agreed to two-stage elections to the existing Sejm, or parliament, in which opposition candidates would be free to run for at least 35 percent of the seats.

Poliburo member Janusz Reykowski said anyone could run for the senate who is nominated by an existing political or social group, or who gathered 5,000 signatures.

Opposition negotiators said the number of signatures required was still an item for discussion for a working team from the negotiations that have brought together Poland's powerful independent forces — including the Solidarity trade union — and communist leaders to reshape the nation's economic and political future.

In addition to a new chamber of parliament, the two sides agreed in principle to establish a president who would be elected by a majority of both chambers of parliament.

The powers of the president must still be discussed, but in general the idea is to combine in one person all those powers now held by the Council of State. In addition, he would be given the right to dissolve parliament and call new elections.

There has been speculation that a presidency would be filled by Communist Party First Secretary Gen. Wojciech Jaruzelski.

## House rejects bill increasing large-school funds

**BOISE** - Last any question remained that Idaho legislators support small schools, the House used its entire Thursday session to kill a bill that would have given large high schools such as Twin Falls' more state dollars.

A few of the state's tiniest schools also would have received more money. But funds for them and for large schools would have come at the expense of the majority of the state's secondary schools, which are fairly small, rural and - some think - getting an unfair amount of money per pupil.

"If I were from a large school I would like the bill," said Rep. Frances Field, R-Grandview. "If I were from a small school, I would be apprehensive this was the feast before the slaughter. If I were from the 74 other schools

I would not be excited."  
The proposal was brought to the Legislature by a coalition of large school districts, armed with a University of Idaho study they commissioned, that showed that the state's tiniest and largest secondary schools are inadequately funded.  
The tiniest need more because they are so costly to run, the largest because the state has underestimated their needs and has given them substantially less money per pupil than smaller schools, supporters said. In the middle are 74 high schools - those enrolling

between 200 and 750 students - that are receiving more money than they need to operate efficiently, the large districts contended.

Between those legislators who didn't want to see the 74 schools get less money and those who said they wouldn't vote for a bill they didn't understand, the bill failed 92-32.

Supporters argued that small schools were not getting less money, because next year's proposed education budget increase would be enough to give all schools at least a 7.2 percent increase in state funding, even with the proposed change in the funding formula.

"All we are doing is changing the way state money is distributed in a small way," said Rep. Doug Jones, R-Filer, who was assigned by the House Education Committee to carry the bill. "What we are really talking about is an adjustment of less than 1 percent."

Large high schools would still receive less money per pupil than high schools in the 74

districts that would not benefit from the bill, he said.

Under the proposal, which would have been phased in over three years, Twin Falls would have received a \$48,555 bonus the first year. Castletford would have received \$4,817 and Murtaugh would have received \$19,762.

But the bill would have penalized Buhl, Filer, Kimberly and Hansen secondary schools between \$16,601 and \$23,680 each. Even so, their total appropriations would have been bigger than this year's.

Other Magic Valley schools that would have benefited included those in Camas County, Cassia County, Jerome, Minidoka County, Dietrich, Richfield, Hagerman and Bliss. However, the smallest schools would have needed to prove they were remote and necessary to receive the bonus.

If legislators agreed upon one thing in the debate, it was that the school funding formula

is complicated. Legislators on both sides of the issue called for a comprehensive study of the school funding formula.

"That there are problems is a given if you set up an economic model and plug reality into it," said Rep. Jim Hansen, D-Boise. But the state can start correcting inequities without waiting for a complete study, he said.

The state Department of Education opposed the bill, saying no changes should be made until a study is done.

## Agency plans to conduct Rock Creek fish census

**TWIN FALLS** - Surveys of fish in Rock Creek show conservation efforts are paying off in an increasing resident population.  
The state Division of Environmental Quality plans another fish survey next week and is looking for volunteers to help scoop up and examine fish at eight locations on Rock Creek.

"The fish get a pretty thorough physical," said Rich Morrison, research analyst with the division. The surveys are a sort of report card on the Rock Creek Project, which is aimed at cleaning up the stream and improving fish habitat.

Fish are caught at various locations on the creek by "electrofishing." Current from two electrodes placed in the water stuns the fish, and they float to the surface. They are picked up and placed in buckets of fresh water, and within minutes they begin flopping and splashing in their temporary prisons.

The fish are counted, weighed and measured, and a few are kept for pesticide analysis to see whether agricultural chemicals are getting into the fish people may catch and eat.

The state has done six surveys - the first in 1981 and annually since 1984. The first showed no resident fish population, only those fish planted in the stream. Surveys since 1984 show that a fish population has become established in the creek. This growing population indicates water quality is improving.

People interested in volunteering for next week's fish survey should contact Rich Morrison at the Division of Environmental Quality, 963 Blue Lakes Blvd., Suite 1, or call 734-9520.

Volunteers will need chest waders (hip waders will do in some places), a sack lunch for the all-day survey and some spare, dry clothing. Volunteers will gather Monday through Thursday between 7:30 and 8 a.m. at the Blue Lakes office.

The Rock Creek Project includes a conservation tillage program, which calls for minimum soil disturbance on farms in the area the creek drains. It also includes other improved farming methods that will reduce erosion and agricultural runoff.

The surveys are an important part of the project because they help researchers evaluate water quality.

## County kills move to hire Hine

**TWIN FALLS** - A woman convicted 18 months ago of embezzling from the county sheriff's department almost made it back onto the courthouse's payroll.

Charlene Hine, 44, was given a one-week tryout as a secretary in the public defender's office, ending Wednesday. Public Defender Michael Wood said he was considering her for the position full-time until county commissioners squashed that idea.

"She's sort of uniquely qualified," Wood said. "She knows the courts and the criminal justice system - she has worked for lawyers in this community for about 20 years."

But Wood's attempt to move the experienced legal secretary into his office, probably the best criminal law office in town, was quickly squashed.

Commissioners Norma Blass, Jim Freley and Marvin Hempleman wrote to Wood to tell him they wouldn't approve hiring Hine. The

letter gave no reasons, and the commissioners declined to elaborate in interviews Thursday. Although Hine denied stealing money from the prisoner work-release funds, a jury convicted her September 1987 of three counts of grand theft for stealing \$552.

Fifth District Judge George Granata first sentenced Hine to five years in prison but later reduced his sentence after she served time at a Boise work center designed to evaluate her potential for rehabilitation.

Granata reduced the charge to three years' probation, a term that started in March 1988. Wood said he hadn't hired Hine permanently, but had brought her into the office for a one-week tryout. After all, Wood said, he constantly argues to judges that his clients deserve a second chance.

He noted that his staff members don't handle money. "We won't even take cigarette money to the jail," he said.

"There are always people who think a felony conviction should be fatal," Wood said. But, "I didn't expect the severity of the reaction I got."

**TWIN FALLS** - On the same day South Carolina's senior senator told Congress there was no local opposition to a New Production Reactor in his state, Greenpeace opened an office there.

### Neibaur bill on teacher contracts dies

**BOISE** - A bill sponsored by Rep. Mack Neibaur, R-Paul, will not be voted on by the full House floor after failing to win the backing of the House Education Committee.

Although many committee members like the idea of abolishing continuing contracts, some are still unhappy with the wording of the bill. Although superintendents can be awarded three-year contracts and principals are also eligible for some extended contracts, teachers would have to reapply for their jobs every year under the bill.

The proposal would not have affected teachers who have already been granted continuing contracts.

Neibaur presented the bill as an accountability measure. Reapplying for their jobs would give teachers incentives for continuing to do their best, he said. It would also give school boards more incentive for paying teachers well if they had more freedom to weed out ineffective teachers, he said.

### Woman pleads guilty in fraud suit

**TWIN FALLS** - A Kimberly defendant has admitted guilt in a \$625,000 securities-fraud lawsuit.

Helen Rith Savage, as part of her admission, has agreed not to illegally sell stocks or other securities. Last October, the Idaho Department of Finance sued her, a corporation she controlled and two other area residents, alleging stock fraud.

Savage stipulated admission of guilt and prohibition against future stock activities doesn't mention restitution.

The department's lawsuit is a civil, not criminal, action. Savage admitted selling stock in a company called AFM Agriculture Finance Management Ltd., which supposedly would obtain cut-rate prices on materials and above-market prices for crops.

Savage admitted making misrepresentations and omissions to investors, which violates the state's securities laws. At least 21 Idaho residents invested \$625,000 in AFM, the department said.

The lawsuit continues against two other defendants, Gary Nebeker and Louise Ward, both of Murtaugh.

### Sunbeam mine waits on dispute

**STANLEY (AP)** - Development of the proposed Sunbeam gold mine in the Yankee Fork of the Salmon River drainage is awaiting resolution of an environmental dispute over a discharge permit.

The proposed mine, located on Jordan Creek about 30 miles northeast of Stanley, is owned by CoCa Minerals Inc. of Denver. Officials at the mine, which is expected to create 80 to 90 new jobs once production begins, originally predicted it would start up this spring.

But that timetable has been set back indefinitely by environmental concerns centering on spent ore disposal and destruction of a four-acre wetland area, project manager Robert Benbow said Tuesday.

"We intend to do some exploration this summer," Benbow said. "But, that's really about all we're going to have going this summer."

The National Wildlife Federation and the Idaho Natural Resources Legal Foundation's are appealing the Environmental Protection Agency's issuance of a pollutant discharge permit.

Sunbeam has joined in the appeal process in support of the EPA.

EPA Administrative Law Judge Spencer T. Niffen recently granted the federal agency a 60-day extension, until May 1, to file a brief supporting its motion for summary determination of the appeal. All responses to that motion must be made by June 2.

In the meantime, EPA Administrator William Reilly is reviewing the agency's earlier denial of an evidentiary hearing request on two of the eight issues raised by the Wildlife Federation and the Idaho Natural Resources Legal Foundation.

The EPA denied a hearing to dispute the size of the Pinyon

## Commission puts together citizen panel for airport

**HAILEY** - A dozen people were chosen to participate on a citizens advisory committee to help update the master plan for Friedman Memorial Airport.

The Blaine County Airport Commission selected 12 people from the Wood River Valley area Tuesday to help a consultant update the master plan and conduct a feasibility study for relocating the airport.

The committee represents a cross section of the public interest and includes Brad Siemer, Mike Penrose, Wally Huffman, George Bagley of Horizon Airlines, Dick Penton, Wayne Werner, Claude Ballard, Luke Whalen, Carol Bashita, John Carson, Pete Kramer and Bill Elttrier.

Airport Manager Paschal-Drake said the contract with the master plan consultant, who most likely will be Coffman Associates, the company which formulated the previous master plan, is being firming up now. The group will meet with them once they begin the study.

The group is appointed according to Federal Aviation Administration directive to aid in voicing community concerns over noise, safety, environmental, economic and other issues regarding airport operations.

In other matters, another committee is continuing to develop recommendations on ways to reduce aircraft noise at the airport.

Committee Chairman Bill Miller said the six-member committee met Jan. 24 and Feb. 22.

The list of more than 12 recommendations was not finalized, but concerned mostly establishing noise restric-

lion, they still trying to build new production facilities," Lowe said. "Every dollar that's spent on production is a dollar robbed from cleanup."

Lowe works on Greenpeace's nuclear program in South Carolina to promote cleanup of the department's Savannah River Plant and prevent construction of a New Production Reactor there. He was in Idaho to speak on nuclear issues and promote Greenpeace's disarmament policy.

The federal Energy Department proposes to build new reactors at its Savannah River Plant

in South Carolina and at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory. The reactors would produce tritium, a radioactive hydrogen isotope used in nuclear weapons.

The gas decays at about 5.3 percent per year and must be replaced periodically in nuclear weapons to keep them ready for use. Low suggests three alternatives for the nuclear weapons program: Buy tritium from foreign producers, produce new tritium in reactors or recycle tritium from other weapons.

Recycling tritium, however, would reduce the weapons inventory. Government officials and

legislators say the weapons must be maintained to maintain the nation's nuclear deterrent.

Lowe said recycling the tritium would reduce the stockpile from the present more than 20,000 weapons to 15,000 over 50 years. That number is more than enough to deter a rational aggressor, while no amount of weapons would deter an irrational aggressor, he said.

The nation's only current source of tritium is the Savannah River Plant, but the reactors

that produce the gas are shut down because of safety problems — problems that Lowe attributes to a lingering "Cold War mentality," a legacy of the 1950s when the reactors were built.

Lowe said the Energy Department's operation at the Savannah River Plant, like INEL, sits atop a regional water supply — the Tuscaloosa Aquifer.

"Their safety record amounts to the number of times they can use the word safety," he said.

Witness: Jet started slide

CHALLIS (AP) — A witness said a low-flying jet, which appeared to be military, triggered a rockslide Tuesday south of Challis that sent rocks and boulders cascading onto Idaho Highway 75.

A boulder eight feet in diameter landed in the middle of the highway, and another tore through the east wall of a shop building adjacent to Walt and Karen Taylor's log home.

A third boulder took out a nearby power line, breaking the power pole in half about 10 feet off the ground, and a hail of smaller rocks showered down on the rural residential area.

controlling soil erosion and protecting stream banks have reduced the amount of sediments in the stream. Those sediments cover and fill the gravel spawning beds that fish need to reproduce. The sediment also chokes aquatic insects that the fish feed on.

Bacteria that break down organic material from animal wastes and fertilizer use oxygen dissolved in the water. When the stream is overloaded with such nutrients, dissolved oxygen drops below what fish need to survive.

The large adult fish found in re-

cent surveys indicate habitat and water quality have improved enough to sustain a year-round population. The large adult fish spawn in the creek if they can find clean gravel beds, Morrison said.

"We still have a way to go," he said. The stream has been overloaded with sediments and nutrients from many years of pollution.

Three species of trout thrive in the cleaner waters of the creek, Morrison said. German browns seem to be adaptable to the creek and are doing best in the three. One 11-pounder recently was caught there.

Richardson rainbow trout, which need pristine water and spawning

gravel, are surviving in the creek, indicating improved water quality. In the upper reaches of the creek, brook trout are making a comeback.

Another important part of the Rock Creek Project is public involvement, Morrison said. He encourages people of all ages to help out with next week's survey. Not only will they be helping the effort to improve the stream, but they will in all likelihood learn a lot, he said. They also help raise public awareness about the condition of the stream.

"The more public involvement the better," he said. "I'll put 'em all to work."

## Jerome skateboarders want ramp

**JEROME** - Jerome's young skateboarding enthusiasts have asked the city to build them a ramp.

We are asking for your help on behalf of these fine young people who like skateboarding, Junior High School Principal Craig Ainsworth told the City Council Tuesday. We want to come to you before it becomes a crime.

Ainsworth attended the meeting along with several of his students, one of whom sported a "Skateboarding Is Not A Crime" T-shirt. The council asked the students to gather additional materials and agreed to consult with legal and insurance agents on the matter.

Some area residents have expressed concern about the students skateboarding where people are walking, Ainsworth said. He suggested constructing an area, possibly adjacent to the city swimming pool, where a ramp could be fenced in and controlled.

The students said many ramps are now being made of metal because of weather problems with plywood. They estimated that a ramp measuring 16 feet in width,

10 feet in height, and 32 feet in length would cost about \$2,000.

The council discussed running a shuttle service, estimated to cost \$10 a day, to the swimming pool at the old Tupperware plant if the city is given the pool when the final purchase of the plant is complete.

Council members also discussed whether or not they could afford to operate two pools. Councilman Rocky Jackson plans to set up a meeting on the issue, though he says it will be difficult to make decisions until more is known about operating costs at the pool on South Lincoln.

Jackson added that he has been looking into ways to cut costs at the city pool, which is in need of extensive repairs; and he thinks the pool could possibly be put back into operation for \$10,000.

In other action: Mayor Ralph Peters reported that he is still looking into ways to obtain the right of way at the South Lincoln-Industrial-Park.

This would be a necessary step, he noted, before the city could receive additional grant money to expand the park facilities. We are not dead yet, said Peters, adding that some papers concerning the Utah-chese plant's plan to locate in the

park should be delivered later this week.

Council decided to seek bids on city fuel purchases and to specify the intention to make key card purchases for lead free fuel and to request delivery on diesel and regular fuel.

Council voted to place stop signs at North and South Alder at the intersection of West E and South Alder after receiving complaints that the intersection is a traffic hazard.

The city passed Resolution 689, allowing the use of key card purchases of fuel for city business by city department heads or by city employees with the consent of department heads.

Public Works Director Larry Sloan asked council to consider setting a fee for inspection and maintenance of backflow prevention devices, now being installed at various locations in the city. He said some areas charge \$35 for the initial inspection and an additional \$35 a year for maintenance checks. The checks are necessary, according to Sloan, to make sure hazardous materials do not enter the city's water lines. Peters asked Sloan to bring more information to the next council meeting.

## Ketchum residents ask for marketing of Sun Valley area, increased parking

**KETCHUM** - The City Council should be concerned more with limited parking space in town and increasing the marketing of the Sun Valley area than it apparently is, a number of residents told the council this week.

More than 40 people attended the council meeting to comment on the council's "priority list," which ranks 36 city projects and the estimated costs.

The council will use the comments in its budgeting decisions.

The low priority given to parking and chamber marketing drew the most criticism. You keep eliminating parking and don't provide the area with any new parking, said John Nycum, assistant manager of Chateau Drug. He suggested acquiring two lots where the "Torso" boutique sits and building a two- or three-story parking garage.

Erecting directional signs in the Ketchum area was the top priority. The lowest priority is building a new museum. Acquiring land for additional downtown parking ranked 20th,

while Chamber of Commerce marketing ranked 28th.

New planter boxes and street furniture valued at \$1.35 million ranked 15th.

Sheri Hodge said Laguna Beach, Calif., where she used to live, neglected to address parking problems when it was affordable and now people have to be bused into the city. In 50 years people will ask why the city fathers didn't address this problem, Hodge said.

The concern over more park-and-ride spaces for the skiers sparked debate also. Mayor Larry Young said the council has talked with Sun Valley Co. about building and funding more park-and-ride lots. Park and ride lots ranked 10th and 11th on the list.

In the continuing comparison to other resort towns, some said the Colorado resorts of Vail and Aspen have far superior parking and downtown walking areas, and far more aggressive marketing plans.

Richard Fenton said that marketing has to be a priority to continue the momentum that has started this year. Referring to the new quad lifts,

Fenton said "we won't benefit every year from a \$7 million improvement from the company, a \$500,000 Sun Valley marketing effort and a good snow year."

Not everyone agreed with the pro-growth philosophy. It is morally wrong to spend tax dollars to pursue tourists, Edward Scott said.

In other council business:

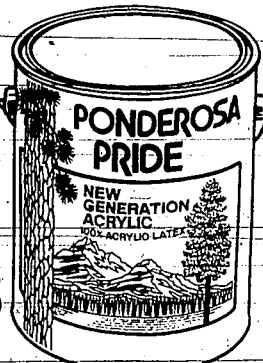
The council approved a zoning change for the property across the creek from the Creekside complex at Warm Springs. Instead of two single family homes, two duplexes will be built. Members of the audience voiced concern over developing the two parcels.

A plan for building several new sidewalks around Ketchum's downtown was unveiled. An ordinance is now being formulated for the project.

The council approved a request for \$1,500 from Chamber of Commerce representative Wendy Jaquet to fund a survey on the quality of life in the Sun Valley area.

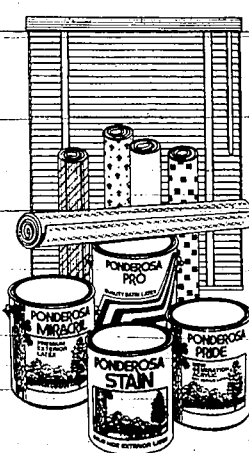

## Weber, Montana win BSC openers

BOISE — Junior guard Michael Ostlund gave Weber State the lead on a 3-point shot with 2:21 left and hit five straight free throws in the final 1:18 to spark the Wildcats over Nevada-Reno 69-61 in the opening round of the Big Sky Conference postseason tournament Thursday night.

Rico Washington scored 20 points for Weber, which will take on Boise State in the semifinals Friday night. Washington, held to eight points in the second half, took a pass on the baseline and kicked the ball out to Ostlund for the key 3-pointer that put the Wildcats ahead to stay.

Earlier, Montana nipped Montana State 87-84 in overtime to set up tonight's semifinals in the Boise State Pavilion. Second-seeded University of Idaho will meet Montana at 7:07 p.m. with top-ranked BSU testing Weber State at 9:07 p.m.

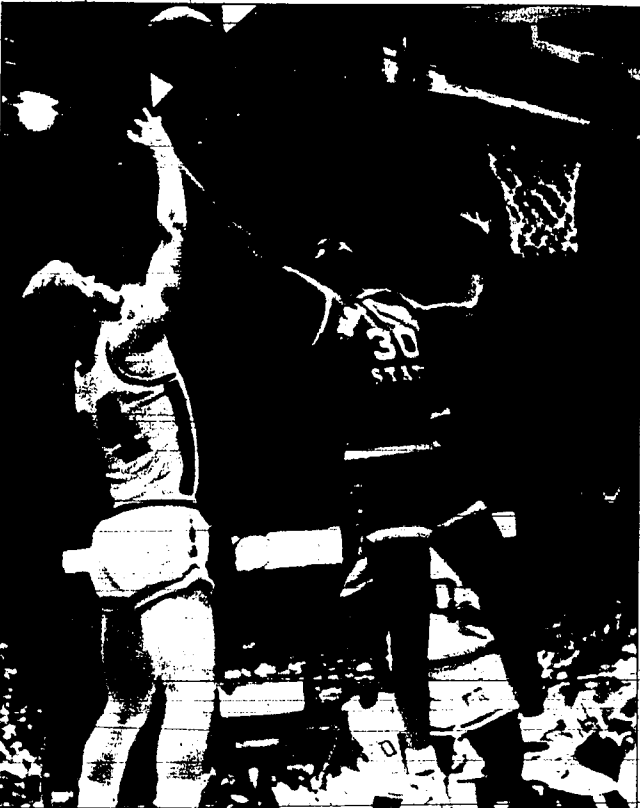
The Wolf Pack played without the Big Sky's leading scorer, guard Darryl Owens, who was suspended before the tournament for disciplinary reasons, and starting forward Jon Butler, who has monoconiosis. But despite the absence of two starters who average a combined 32 points per game, UNI jumped on the Wildcats early and took a 16-7 lead.

Weber clawed back and led 36-35 at halftime as Washington, who finished slightly behind Owens in the conference scoring race, scored 22 points.

A barrage of 3-point shots pulled Reno back after Weber stretched its margin to 41-35.

Wayne Tinkle, Montana's 6-foot-10 senior center, scored 28 points, but missed the front end of a one-and-one with 27 seconds left in overtime. That was a last-shot opportunity to the Bobcats, who had trailed Montana leads of 15 and 11 points in the second half, but freshman Todd Dickson's 3-point attempt fell short.

Montana State took its first lead since the game's opening minutes when Ron McCrary scored on an offensive rebound to put the Bobcats ahead 73-72 with 1:58 remaining.

## CSI takes on Northland

TWIN FALLS — When College of Southern Idaho tips it off against Northland Pioneer for a trip to the national finals tonight, CSI Coach Fred Trenkle doesn't know exactly what to expect.

"This is one of those games you go into on a lot of hearsay and not a lot of fact. For instance, I understand Northland is averaging 91 points a game for the year but they had one 70 in their regional final. Does that mean that Northland or Eastern Arizona took the tempo down," Trenkle said.

"We are told they have some excellent athletes with the intimidator in the middle and two good forwards including one power forward. Their guards are reported to be very adequate. But we know very little about their individual capabilities and preferences, and what kind of depth they have."

"In a case like this, you just prepare for anything and rely on the things that got you there. That's what we'll do and just hope it is enough," the coach said.

The game tips off at 7:30 p.m. with the doors opening at 5 p.m. The winners will travel to Hutchinson, Kans., where they will play in the first game of national tournament Monday night Tuesday against Hagerstown, Md., which won its bi-regional Wednesday night.

Athletic Director Karl Kleinkopf said 350 reserved seats will go on sale at the ticket office at 5 p.m. He said those were held under an agreement with Region 1 to meet any demands from Arizona or Northland Pioneer.

There is even any tradition for Trenkle to fall back on. He can't dredge up a game film from a year or two ago to get an idea because Northland Pioneer didn't have a basketball team last year, although the school is 15 years old.

The Golden Eagles — yep, this is a battle of Eagles — have just this last year's sophomores on their roster but apparently only two of them start.

The usual starting five is headed by 6-2 guard Eric Abbott and 6-0 guard Bobby Odum, Freshman David Cruise, 6-3, is the small forward and Derrick Jefferson, 6-5 from Detroit, is the power forward. The middle man is 7-foot Alex Boyevo, a freshman from Lagos, Nigeria.

But if one considers Trenkle has some pre-game problems, consider

Northland's Coach Brian Crowder.

He will be 800 miles from home and playing on the No. 1-ranked team in the nation's home floor, where it hasn't lost in something like 80 straight outings.

"Of course, Trenkle provides the most basic scouting report on CSI of all when he notes 'we will be out there pushing the ball, running a good offense and playing the full 90 feet for 40 minutes. I don't think it is bragging to say that only teams that had extreme talent and are well coached and poised have given us a lot of trouble. If they match us, then we're in trouble."

Trenkle said one of the more pleasing aspects of the past three weeks has been the continued improvement in the team's intensity level.

"You keep waiting for your team to reach new plateaus," he said. "I felt we definitely saw it in practice the final two weeks of the season and we played well. Then they turned it up a notch last week before regional and I think again they played very well, especially in the championship game against a very good Dixie team. And I think we're seeing it up another level this week. We simply couldn't practice any harder than we did Monday and Tuesday — although I felt that way earlier, too."

Northland appears to have the ingredients for a tough game, Trenkle continues. They have the big center, the power forwards and some ball handlers and shooters. Their record is something like 23-11 but they went into their regional seeded No. 6 and came out No. 1. They beat everyone in their conference at least once during the year. I don't think lucky teams win regional tournaments. It takes three straight nights of luck."

For the first time on this bi-regional, three officials will be used. The only other time that occurred was this winter when weather conditions conspired to bring three to the gymnasium.

A good crowd is expected but whether it will be a sellout is another question.

Earlier in the week, Crowder said he doubted a big crowd would intimidate his Golden Eagles much.

"We don't play in front of 3,700 like you do. Our gymnasium holds about 1,600 and we usually pull from 12 to 15 hundred for each game. We have probably the best crowds in the conference so we are used to some noise," he said.

## Fish & Game OKs Oakley walleye planting

MCCALL — Oakley Reservoir in Cassia County could become synonymous with walleye fishing, after the Idaho Fish and Game Commission's decision to introduce the species there.

Meeting Thursday in McCall, the commission approved planting of the large member of the perch family in Oakley Reservoir this spring, along with spot-tailed shiners as a forage fish for the predatory walleye.

Al Van Vooren, resident fisheries manager for the Idaho Department of Fish and Game, said walleye pike are known for their excellent taste and can grow as large as 15 pounds. The state

record was a 13-pound 5-ounce walleye caught in July 1987 in Salmon Falls Reservoir.

Salmon Falls Reservoir and Oneida Reservoir are the only other two habitats in Idaho where walleye have been introduced.

Idaho management plans call for introducing the species only in closed-water systems, specifically on natural river systems that could link water up with the irrigation ditches. Oakley Reservoir is on Goose Creek and the natural bed of that stream has been eliminated through agricultural and urban development for years.

"For instance, the Goose Creek bed basically would flow runoff water through Skaggs Furniture

Store in Burley. It would empty into Snake River behind the No. 2 green at the Burley Municipal Golf course.

The creek bed became extraneous when the irrigation demand was greater than the amount of water the drainage could provide. Like Salmon Falls reservoir, Oakley has spilled only once in the past 70 years.

Walleye prey on trout to some extent, but Oakley Reservoir was considered a safe place to introduce the species because there is little danger of the fish escaping to other waters, Van Vooren said.

"We may have to stock catchable trout, but we can have walleye without eliminating the trout at Oakley," he said.

## Some big league owners ask for expansion delay

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. — Commissioner Peter Ueberroth said Thursday that some major league owners have requested that the expansion process be delayed.

In recent weeks, both Ueberroth and incoming commissioner A. Bartlett Giamatti have said there was a timetable for expansion targeted for the early 1990s. Cities that have expressed interest include Tampa, Fla.; Denver; Washington and Buffalo, N.Y.

"I think Bart has it in hand. He's talking about a timetable in the 90s — early 90s — is talking about the possibility of two teams in the National League as a first step," said Ueberroth, who is presiding over his final meet-

ings as he prepares to leave office March 31. Ueberroth said he was not disappointed that expansion did not occur during his time in office.

"I guess I would be disappointed if by the next labor negotiations there is no real commitment," he said.

When asked if any owners had asked him to back off expansion, Ueberroth said, "Yes, I don't know why it was their opinion."

The commissioner declined to identify the owners who asked for the expansion process to be delayed or when the training camp last week, Major League Baseball Players Association executive director Don Fehr said the owners weren't interested in expansion.

"The owners have never been interested in expansion. The nonsense you hear that they are is just that — nonsense," Fehr said. "There is a great baseball tradition in Florida and there probably should be two teams here, but they can't figure out a way to put a team anywhere in the state. Why is that? The reason is if you put a team in (Tampa Bay, owner Jerry Reinsdorf) can't export money from Chicago by threatening to move the White Sox."

Ueberroth said, "Don is a good guy but I certainly don't agree with him on that."

Owners and representatives of the 26 major league teams gathered at a Florida resort to discuss revenue projections, strategies for a possible lockout next spring or strike next sum-

mer, the sales of the Texas Rangers and Baltimore Orioles and the new national television contracts.

The American League Thursday again rejected the proposed sale of the Rangers to Edward Gaylor. Eddie Chiles, who currently owns two-thirds of the team, said he was abandoning attempts to transfer majority ownership to Gaylor, who owns 33 percent of the franchise.

Ueberroth said he would like major negotiations on the Rangers' sale underway by March 31. But Gaylor, even though he was rejected, has the right to block any sale.

"There's a lot of mind-changing going on (in Texas)," Ueberroth said. "I frankly have to take a deep breath. There are still some independent actions I can take."

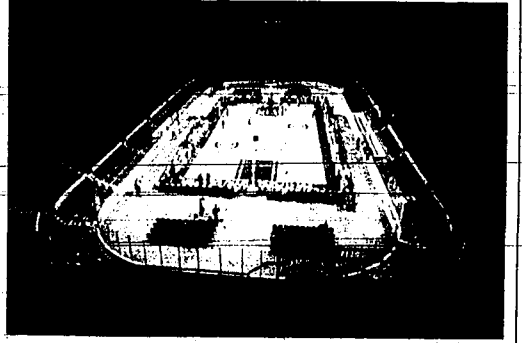
Unfortunately, they were all outside the locked coliseum doors. Not a soul in the crowd was allowed to enter the coliseum because of the measles quarantine.

# Pocatello native returns to track after racing tragedy five months ago

ARCADIA, Calif. (AP) — Pocatello native Robbie Davis, the stellar jockey who considered quitting after riding the horse that ran over and killed a fellow rider, returned to racing Wednesday after taking nearly five months off.

"It really felt good, kind of super being back here and starting riding so soon," Davis said after riding his two mounts to fourth- and third-place finishes at Santa Anita.

Davis was riding the horse that ran over Mike Venezia in Belmont Park accident last Oct. 13.

He was so traumatized by the fatality that he would not return to the track and considered retirement.

Davis has won 1,357 races and his mounts have earned more than \$37 million.

"We got here five days ago, and all of a sudden I was in the jockeys' room with silks on and butterflies in my stomach. I kind of wish I hadn't taken them off," Davis said.

His return proved less than auspicious as Hickory Crest, a 4-year-old filly, finished fourth in a field of nine in the fifth race. Davis lost his whip late in the \$32,000 race for fillies and mares.

The second tracer was a vetter after the first one when I rode so bad," said Davis, whose wife and three youngsters were on hand for his return.

"I relaxed and got the cobwebs out. I started to get my hands back. They were heavy, but coming back."

In his only previous visit to Santa Anita, he won the 1986 Santa Ana Handicap aboard Vidogem.

"This was the first thoroughbred track I ever saw, and I always dreamed I would ride here," Davis said. "In 1981, I worked in Victor-

ville breaking colts for Jerry Fanning and came out and saw Santa

Anita."

trained by Bobby Frankel, who pre-

viously had Davis riding some of his

horses in the East.

## Traders await employment news

NEW YORK — The stock market drifted to a small loss Thursday while Wall Street kept a vigil for Friday's monthly report on the employment situation.  
The Dow Jones average of 30 industrials dropped 4.11 points to 2,291.43. Declining issues slightly outnumbered advances in nationwide trading of New York Stock Exchange-listed stocks, with 675 up, 764 down and 511 unchanged.

Volume on the floor of the Big Board came to 143.16 million shares, down from 167.62 million on the previous session. Nationwide, including volume in NYSE-listed issues, including volume in those stocks on regional exchanges and in the over-the-counter market, totaled 175.5 million shares.  
The market rose on Wednesday amid hopes that the employment statistics for February would show a slowing of economic growth.

Such a development could be read as a positive portent for the inflation outlook and a possible easing of upward pressure on interest rates.  
However, if the figures come in with an unpleasant surprise, analysts said, the market could suffer a letdown.

## Artists-in-residence bring magic to students

### Actress teaches children how to express themselves openly

TWIN FALLS — Patti Dobrowolski gives the kind of tests kids like — no grades and lots of applause.

A recent "test" by Dobrowolski, a performing arts artist-in-residence at Sawtooth Elementary, was in improvisation.

"You're ants and you're all going toward the anthill in the center of the room," Dobrowolski instructs fourth graders in Jan Alexander's class.

After furious ant-like crawling toward the center of the room which culminates in gales of laughter, Dobrowolski tells the children to applaud themselves.

"You guys were great, really good," she says.

Besides learning improvisation these "students," and others at Sawtooth, will also be exposed to pantomime. Some will develop character monologues and perform them. Some will write and perform their own scripts.

Dobrowolski's presence in a Twin Falls classroom is made possible by an artist-in-residency program supported by the National Endowment of the Arts, the Idaho Commission on the Arts and at Sawtooth Elementary, by the school's Parent-Teacher Organization.

Schools select their artist-in-residence from a list supplied by the state commission. Artists make the list by submitting a portfolio of their work and answering several essay questions. The visiting artists are paid for their time and are also provided with a temporary studio.

While the students benefit the

most from their artist-in-residence, the public benefits too as the artist's visit usually includes an open house or public performance. At Sawtooth, third-graders will perform plays they wrote on Thursday at 6:30 p.m. Sixth-graders will present their plays on March 17 at 7 p.m. The public is invited.

Her work with the children is not just for fun

Dobrowolski. "My goal is to expose them to the art forms and help them and show them there are many ways to express themselves and be creative. I just want them to feel confident about getting up in front of a group and feel good about art and the creation of it."

Dobrowolski, 31, knows a lot about the creation and performance of the art of theater. After nine years of writing, producing and performing in theater, this spring the Seattle, Wash., resident will perform on Broadway. She will act in "Largely New York," a production that has progressed from the Seattle Repertory Theatre to the Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C., and now to New York City.

She loves her work and says "when she grows up" she ultimately hopes to go into film. Along the way, Dobrowolski shares her experience with children and adults.

Teaching art is an important part of growing up, she says. "It's important to expose them (children) to different art forms so they can make choices about what they want to do — it rounds you out as a person because art is very personal. It allows you to develop a personal relationship with yourself, your inner self."

## Artist manages to entice kids who hated art to delve into craft with confident exuberance

TWIN FALLS — Dressed in blue jeans overalls and red high-top tennis shoes, Oregon artist Susan Schulz smiles widely and asks a group of Lincoln Elementary second graders to describe a poster.

A barrage of wide-eyed faces and squirming, waving hands bombard the 42-year-old artist.

"You hang it on your wall," explains one youngster.

"It's a picture of a unicorn," says another student shyly.

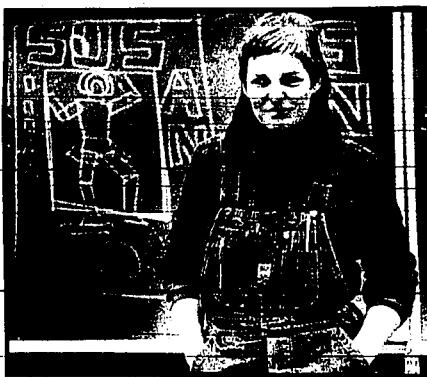
"A poster combines a word with a picture," Schulz tells Linda Smith's second-grade class. And that's what were going to make today.

The room buzzes with excited whispers.

Schulz will spend the next hour helping the kids create individualized posters. Four pieces of construction paper, Elmer's glue, scissors and their own imaginations are all Schulz will let the kids use.

As Lincoln's artist-in-residence, Schulz, only in town for one month, spends two hours each week with Smith's class.

Working at least once with each class and eight times with all second grade and fifth grade classes, Schulz has helped fill the school's hallways with self-portraits and collages,

action — drawings, watercolor paintings and posters.

Thanks to the school's Parent Teacher Association, the National Endowment for the Arts and the Idaho Commission on the Arts, this is the fourth year Lincoln has had an artist in residence. School officials discovered Schulz last year when she was in Twin Falls as Sawtooth

Elementary School's artist-in-residence.

In the past, Fritz the Clown, a puppeteer and a dance instructor, have visited Lincoln.

"The thing about the program that's so good is that the kids are doing things they normally would not do in the classroom," says Ted Popplewell, Lincoln principal. "And

it really brings out talent." Fritz the Clown had even the shyest students up on stage performing.

"Can you imagine sixth grade boys dancing on stage? It happened," Popplewell says.

In Smith's room, kids cut and paste with expressions of concentration glued on their own faces.

A poster of Mickey Mouse with pop-out arms earns as much praise from Schulz as a half-finished job that needs more work.

"The kids love her," says Smith as she watches from the back of the room. "And you can tell she's worked with kids and likes them."

In fact, it's the kids that has kept Schulz coming back to the artist-in-residence program each year. She's been involved with the program for about 10 years.

"I love kids," Schulz says. "I want them to do better and I want them all to have a positive experience with art."

One of Schulz's favorite memories of her work with kids through the artist-in-residence program is something one student told her just last year.

"Before you came, I hated art," the child told Schulz. "Now I love art."

## Edwards shows for Idaho folks

TWIN FALLS — Two wolves pursue an elk through a barren landscape.

A grim scene, promising the banal gore all too common in wildlife art?

Not quite — the second wolf has just fallen on his nose, and the artist, Dan Edwards, just could be the Norman Rockwell of wildlife art.

The wolf sculpture, called "Overanxious Pursuit," is one of Edwards' personal favorites. While he scoffs at the suggestion that he is a wildlife Rockwell, Edwards' "Overanxious Pursuit" combines humor with taut suspense and minimal gore, and epitomizes his artistic style.

Most of the sculptor's works tell stories that he has heard or seen while out hunting or fishing. It's his love of the outdoors that three years ago lured Edwards from the furniture business he ran with his father to the more difficult life of an artist.

"I didn't know any better," he explains with a quick smile.

A Bicentennial Eagle and a six-piece commission from the Idaho Centennial committee later, Edwards is not about to have second thoughts.

But it hasn't been quite that easy, says Edwards who

must support his wife and three kids from his art.

"I have to keep going," he says, but he adds that the pressure, while regrettable, is no greater than in any other profession.

The rewards, on the other hand, seem much greater. Edwards is an avid sportsman, and so enjoys the time he must spend in the wilderness just looking — his naturalistic bronze and pewter figures of animals and Western scenes require much direct observation.

Although he will be exhibiting his work in a two-man show this weekend at the Canyon Springs Inn, Edwards says he intends just three or four shows a year, all in Idaho.

For the most part his sculptures are sold by catalogs and shops through the California company "Legends." Some may also be seen at the Idaho Heritage Museum.

Edwards usually creates three or four new works a year. In his busiest year, though, he managed 25.

He has received commissions from the U.S. Bicentennial and, more recently, from the Idaho Centennial Commission, for whom Edwards has cast six life-size figures: a gold miner, an Indian, a cattleman, a lumberjack, a farmer and an elk. These Idaho Centennial figures, in addition to other sculptures, will be on display tonight from 6 to 9 p.m., Saturday from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. and Sunday from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m.

# 'Cowboy Junkies' enjoy American success

TORONTO (AP) — The words like ethereal, despairing, melancholy and dolorous that mark reviews of the Cowboy Junkies tip off right away that this is not your average pop group.

So, learning that vocalist Margo Timmins' apartment on one of Toronto's trendiest streets is unmarked and hidden away behind some offices should not come as a surprise.

"That's the way I like it," she says with a bit of a grimace when told the address for the scheduled interview was made for her.

"The publicity machine of the pop music industry is gearing up to promote one of its unluckiest recent hits, the Cowboy Junkies' "The Trinity Session" recorded in one day in November 1987 at the Church of

Her 29-year-old brother, Michael, and his childhood friend Alan Anton came back to Toronto after stints performing to little acclaim for a few years in New York and England. They started rehearsing in the garage of Timmins' younger brother, Pete, then brought him into the band to play drums. Margo joined to do vocals.

But not only didn't she see herself as a singer, she also was concerned that a band with too many family relationships could cause strains.

"It's worked out really well. Mike and I really work well together," she said.

Settled in for a conversation with Emmylou Harris' new record playing in the background, she said, "It's an honor for me to sing his songs."

The band has been together since 1985 but publicity swelled last year after RCA released "The Trinity Session" in the United States and enthusiastic reviews started appearing.

The Los Angeles Times' critics poll found it the best pop album of 1988, beating out U2, Tracy Chapman and Prince. Times' critic Robert Hilburn called them "mesmerizing."

pieces for the Idaho Centennial next year.

Edwards says he and Barsness wanted an opportunity to show their work locally, especially pieces that haven't been displayed in this area before.

"I have a lot of admiration for Dan and his work," says Edwards. "We're always wanting each other's work. I guess that's why we ended up together. We have an appreciation for each other's ability, and that makes kind of a nice team."

Both say coming up with different ways to market their work is part of the challenge of being an artist.

"It's always exposure that an artist seeks because that's when you sell your work," says Edwards, who has been working full time as an artist since 1983.

"When people appreciate your work is when they've had a chance to view it. Of course they can't do that very well when it's home on your wall or on your hearth or whatever. So it's always our intent to bring the exposure to make people aware of who you are and what you're doing. Then, of course, we always offer it for sale. That's the purpose, I guess."

Edwards was recently commissioned by the Federal Bicentennial Commission to create a commemorative eagle to celebrate the 200th anniversary of the United States Constitution.

He sculpted an eagle landing on Early American flags, with a drum

and a scroll that says "We the People" and titled it "Articles of Freedom."

The bicentennial eagles, which sell for \$389 each, were cast in bronze and pewter and are being marketed worldwide. The United States Army purchased many of the sculptures and have given them to several foreign heads of state.

"The fun part is creating your art," says Edwards. "Then the difficult part comes in actually marketing. We all have our little methods — through art shows and different professional organizations. You get exposure and you show whenever possible."

He says artistic ability does not necessarily imply business acumen.

"Unfortunately, there are a lot of very talented artists that are not very good business people. It's nothing derogatory against them but not all of us can be good at marketing and good at business and also have the artistic ability. Of course, I don't know that I'm any different. I work hard at it, at trying to market. But it is a necessary evil if you plan to make a living out of your art."

Barsness, a 38-year-old Filer artist whose oils and pastels have brought him local and national attention, has focused recently on upgrading his marketing skills.

"Marketing, in a way, is almost a full-time job," he says with a sigh.

Barsness shows and enters competitions around the country. His portraits, still lifes, and

landscapes are also shown at the Trails West art gallery in Ketchum.

Barsness says he's been reading some books on marketing lately.

"I think the first thing I'm going to do is get some brochures made," he says. "They're fairly expensive, about \$1,200 to do a nice brochure. But those are pretty good sales tools to send out to new galleries that you're interested in."

Barsness says he also owns a frame business which supplements his income as an artist.

"I would have to say that's my bread and butter right now. I haven't really made the move to go full time into art, but with my frame business, it gives me about half my time to paint. That's pretty good. Most artists supplement their income from either teaching or something. There are some that (paint) full time, but you have to get into several larger galleries and start moving a lot of work first," he says.

Ron Hicks, owner of Canyonside Gallery in Twin Falls, advises local artists to market their work in many different ways and places.

"To make it small or big, you have to leave the area," says Hicks. An artist can live in Magic Valley, he says, but to make a living, he or she must be willing to sell their product elsewhere too.

He explains further, "When times are good and people have disposable income as well as an inclination and interest toward aesthetic things, then the marketing is easier."

# CDs turn table on record sales

The Beach Boys are being phased out of the record business. So are Rod Stewart, Frank Sinatra, Bob Seger, and Willie Nelson. Music produced by these artists and dozens of others probably will still be around years from now, but much of it won't be on conventional long-playing vinyl records. The companies that own the rights to many of the world's most popular

recording artists are re-releasing their old music on compact disc only. The disappearance of old Beach Boy records says much about the rapid rise of the CD, and the LP's equally rapid decline. Widely available only since 1982, CDs have replaced vinyl records with such startling speed that records have been pushed toward extinction faster than many observers thought possible. The trend has been helped

along by the growth of cassette tapes, which have become the medium of choice for those who don't own a CD player.

"Records are going to be like the Nehru jacket—pretty soon," said Howard Applebaum, vice president of Kemp Mill Records, a Beltsville, Md.-based retailer. "Consumers aren't going to have a choice if they want to buy an LP."

Compact discs outsold record albums for the first time during the first six months of last year, according to the Recording Industry Association of America. During that period, the most recent period for which figures are available, slightly more than \$1 billion in CDs were sold, a 47 percent increase over the first half of 1987. By contrast, LP sales shriveled to \$302.7 million, a 23 percent decrease.

As a result of that growth, CD sales now account for about 40 percent of the U.S. market and are growing fast. That is all the more remarkable at a time when only 13 percent of all U.S. homes have a CD player compared with 90 percent with a turntable or other audio player.

Continued from Page D1 children to art allows them to have the experience of creativity that will help them feel whole in some way. The fact that drama is an immediate gratification tool with the immediate feedback performers get helps children feel good about themselves, she says. Dobrowski's learning sessions with elementary students begin with warm-ups — exercises to relax the body — a necessary skill for performers. She tells the children it's important to warm up their body just as they would warm up a car. "An actor is like anybody. If you're a race car driver you have a tool that you use — it's your car. If you're a baseball player you have a tool — it's a bat. In acting you have one tool — it's your body," Dobrowski says.

movie of all time" is "It's a Wonderful Life," with James Stewart. "It's what I try to model my work after. I really want it to be that inspirational and have that same kind of feeling. I really want to get people in a poignant moment so they can think about themselves in a new light."

Films and theater are wonderful media to get messages across, she says. "That's why I do what I do. I feel that it's important to talk about goodness, and kindness and things like that, but not in such a sappy way, but so that people really get it. I think we are living in a time of turmoil for a lot of people. They need to be uplifted through humor and that's my job. So that's why I'm here for these kids."

Some of Dobrowski's own works for children include "Morphic Convergence," a story about kids who attend a fictional "School for the Angelic" and are stirred up by a dissatisfied devil. She has also written a script for adult audiences titled "In Transit." It's a collaboration which was performed on a city bus "in transit."

Dobrowski stresses that the scripts the children write must have a "message to the world...and it will deal with issues that are real-life situations for them."

As a case in point, one class is doing a play where the students become parents and the parents become students. "It's an opportunity for them to learn how to understand other people and that's all acting really. It's just trying to be real in a different role," she says.

Dobrowski was raised in Los Angeles, Calif. She says her parents have been supportive of her career, adding that they have "helped me out through hard times." Although she didn't become actively involved in theater arts until college, her family often bought the soundtrack of favorite movies and memorized and acted out the stories as she grew up. "I cannot listen to 'The Music Man' to this day without crying. I know every word," she says.

# Independent booksellers find their niche despite efforts by big chains

For the nation's independent bookstores, "The Satanic Verses" may turn out to be something of a godsend.

When Iran's Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini called for the execution of Salman Rushdie, alleging that his now-infamous novel had defamed Islam's holiest figures, Politics & Prose in Northwest Washington refused to be bullied. It put together a window display that showcased the novel and books from around the world that had been banned or suppressed, including works by Mark Twain, Sigmund Freud, African writer Wole Soyinka and dissident Czechoslovak playwright Vaclav Havel.

According to Mary Ann Brownlow, who came up with the idea, the Politics & Prose display was a reaction to the attempts by Khomeini and Moslem groups to intimidate booksellers and anyone distributing the book. "The point is that we be allowed to be offensive," she said.

Meanwhile, at outlets of the nation's largest chains, Waldenbooks and B. Dalton-Barnes & Noble, employees were ordered to yank copies of the Rushdie novel from shelves — for safety's sake, according to chain officials worried about violent attacks.

In the city's streets, B. Dalton has backed down on its original decision. But the difference in initial responses has once again highlighted for the public, for the industry and for the booksellers themselves the importance of the independents — a species thought not long ago to have been facing extinction because of the growth of bookselling chains, especially discounters such as Crown Books Corp.

"It was a prediction that was widely echoed in the late 1970s and early 1980s," said Ginger Curwen, director of publications for the American Booksellers Association, a major trade group. "The economy had gone to seed, and there were

also enormous pressures from (the high cost of freight problems.)"

Despite the chains' growth, particularly in the last few years, the nation's independent booksellers have more than held their own. "You're seeing a resurgence of the independents," Curwen said.

"They're doing surprisingly well," said Larry Carpenter, senior vice president of sales and marketing at Ingram Book Co. of Nashville, the country's largest book distributor. "The worst feeling an independent can have is when they know a chain is going in down the street from them. But a year later, they're surprised to see their own resilience."

The growth of the chains, particularly the rapid expansion of discounters such as Landover, Md.-based Crown Books, actually has helped many of the smaller players in the industry — by forcing independents to operate their stores more like businesses and less like personal libraries, according to industry executives and bookstore owners.

Booksellers do between \$1 billion and \$6.5 billion in business annually, according to industry estimates, and the big chains — Waldenbooks, B. Dalton-Barnes & Noble and Crown — account for between 30 percent and 45 percent of that total. Those figures do not include college textbooks and mail-order book clubs.

The Big Three are formidable competitors. Waldenbooks, a subsidiary of K mart Corp., operates 1,217 stores and has estimated sales of \$800 million. B. Dalton-Barnes & Noble, with 1,250 stores, has estimated sales of \$950 million. Crown Books, which is controlled by Washington's Haft family, operates 225 stores nationwide — including 55 in the Washington metropolitan area — and had sales last year of \$181 million.

By comparison, there are about 9,000 independent stores whose primary business is selling books, according to industry estimates. Washington — one of the nation's

leading book markets — is a particularly strong area for independents like Politics & Prose, Chapters Literary Bookstore, Sidney Kramer Books and Olsson's Books & Records. The chains also do very well here, with Crown dominating the local bookselling business.

Local residents spent an estimated \$24 million on books, magazines and newspapers last year, or \$82.50 per person. That means they buy fewer publications than counterparts in San Francisco (\$65.14), but are easily more bookish than residents in Chicago-Seattle, New York-Boston and Los Angeles, according to Urban Decision Systems Inc., a Los Angeles-based demographics research company. The national average was \$49.91.

Independents have been able to cash in on strong markets here and elsewhere by carrying a greater

variety of titles than the national chains, and by having sales personnel who often are better educated and more knowledgeable than their counterparts in chain bookstores — or, for that matter, than their customers.

Moreover, many of the independent stores have carved niches for themselves by specializing in categories that include everything from the fast-growing children's books to mystery novels to New Age literature to self-help titles. Within these specialized categories, the stores can carry a more complete selection than the more general competition.

On average, chain bookstores carry between 12,000 to 20,000 titles, while independents commonly carry many more — usually between 30,000 to 40,000 titles per store, according to industry executives.

# 'Skin Deep' proves long on glamour, short on substance

HOLLYWOOD — Blake Edwards' "Skin Deep" has a couple of the funniest moments Edwards ever devised; it has John Ritter's easy-to-take charm, but it ends up living up to its title far too closely.

Ritter's Zach has it all. He is a Pulitzer Prize-winning playwright, a novelist and screenwriter. He has a



bright, attractive wife (crisply played by Alyson Reed), who is a TV newscaster, a profession that in the

movies defines the successful contemporary woman. He lives the Southern California lifestyle at its most sybaritic. You have the feeling that this is a man who has not stepped outside Beverly Hills and Malibu for years, except possibly to escape to other equally luxe locales; by the end of the film you are left feeling that this may be true of Edwards as well.

The film opens with a hilarious

double whammy that starts Zach spinning out of control even before the laughter starts fading. From then on it is a downhill slide for Zach. Already plagued by writer's block, he gives in to compulsive womanizing, followed by incipient alcoholism and eventual impotence.

"Skin Deep" is a film of moments, some of which are terrific, others considerably less so. The glamour girls, with their great sheafs of shining hair, are interchangeable, but there are nice turns by Vincent Gardenia as Zach's barkeep pal and by Nina Foch as his chic mother-in-law, perhaps the only woman in the world who has never been charmed by him. There is real sweetness and humor in Raye Holitt's body builder, and once again Edwards proves himself one of the few American film makers able, or willing, to present a gay couple (in this instance played distinctively by Peter Donat and Don Gordon) without a fuss.

As adept as Edwards is at using humor to set off Zach's self-destructiveness, to capture the dark undertow of high living, he ends up letting Zach off the hook shamelessly. It is as if Edwards said to himself: "The poor guy has suffered long enough, and, besides, we're running out of time."

Never has a happy ending been so thoroughly unearned. For all his charm, honesty and intelligence — you have no trouble understanding his appeal to a wide variety of women — Zach does nothing to help himself as he gives in to epic self-

indulgence. Then in his turnaround, we are given the impression that stopping drinking and turning out a

best seller are snaps for Zach (That his wife would even consider taking him back after his progressively outrageous behavior is also confounding).

In short, "Skin Deep" is a male sex fantasy that says that if you are sufficiently rich, famous and good-looking, you can go into the most self-destructive of tailspins and still land on your feet without any real

effort. It is chilling to imagine "Skin Deep" (rated R for sex and language, adult situations) without Ritter, who, through sheer dint of his own likability, never quite loses our sympathy for Zach. (This admittedly may not be true for some women in the audience: NOW is unlikely to choose the film for a benefit premiere.) Ritter and Edwards clearly have a strong rapport and plan to work together again. Perhaps the next time will rate a "10."

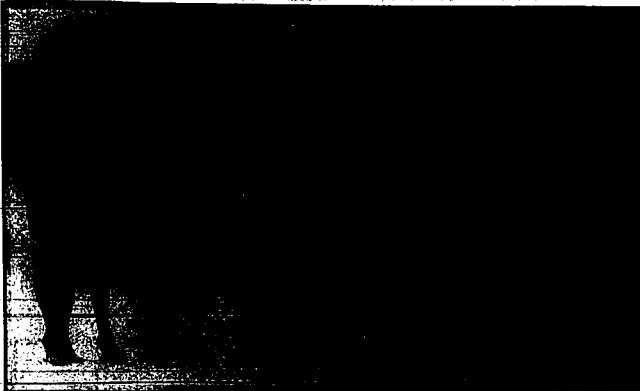

## William Hurt shines tenderly in 'Accidental Tourist' role

The following are capsule reviews of some of the films playing in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

**ACCIDENTAL TOURIST (PG).** This transposition by director, co-writer Lawrence Kasdan of Anne Tyler's warm and singular novel, bristles with eccentric, memorable characters, part of whose fun for us comes in measuring just how close they are to the faces in our bathroom mirror each morning. It contains a performance by William Hurt as so finely observed and so tenderly acted that it borders on the preternatural. Also stars Kathleen Turner and Geena Davis.

**BILL & TED'S EXCELLENT ADVENTURE (PG).** This is Allan Bloom's worst nightmare, and possibly yours, too. It is an all-out celebration of the closing of the American mind, with two high school doofuses (Keanu Reeves and Alex Winter) borrowing a time machine to kidnap great figures of past centuries for a history report. Look for two of the low points of American teen-age cinema in one movie: Joan of Arc leads an aerobics class, and Abraham Lincoln tells an assembly of school kids to "Party on, dudes!" This witless fiasco couldn't be more imbecilic or less excellent...dudes.

**THE 'BURBS (PG).** Grimly unfunny comedy about three suburban husbands (Tom Hanks, Bruce Dern and Rick Ducommun) who behave like little boys when a Munsterlike family moves in a ramshackle Victorian house on their cul-de-sac. Big letdown for fans of Hanks, freshly Oscar nominated for "Big." With Carrie Fisher, Corey Feldman.

**HER ALIBI (PG).** This mystery is certainly elegant looking, but 15

minutes into the action the thrill is gone and director Bruce Beresford seems to have no clue as to how to find it. Tom Selleck plays a mystery writer who has hit a writing block, so he hits a few real courtrooms, looking for inspiration.

**RAIN MAN (R).** Because we have had dozens of buddy films about journeys of discovery, we can plot the scenario of this one like a road map. The special qualities of one will work on the other to change him, or perhaps both of them. Dustin Hoffman makes his autistic savant character hypnotically interesting and sometimes terribly funny.

In the working-class "Roseanne" household, the kitchen is a mess and macaroni and cheese is fine dining. Hubby Dan (John Goodman) is usually between drywalling jobs, and cynical mom makes no secret of the fact that the kids get on her nerves.

Barr, however, doesn't see her somewhat acerbic character as spiteful.

"I think of her as just a really nice woman with an edge," she says, "not a mean woman who is nice sometimes. She just tries to cut through the B.S."

In an interview, it is obvious that what you see on TV is basically what you get in person. Barr's real life is similar to the one depicted on her show, including three kids — Jessica, 13; Jennifer, 12; and James, 10 — and husband Bill Pentland, a former motel night desk clerk.

"I'm pretty close to how I am on TV," says the 35-year-old former stand-up comic. "Our family is just about telling jokes and trying to have fun. My kids don't clean. They don't do nothing. They wear and all that. They're real kids."

Reality is something Barr says has been missing from TV, and her aim for the series was to bring it back.

"TV generally portrays women as dumb and all that. And perfect looking. I can't stand that, either. It doesn't seem real to me when I watch TV, especially the moms. They're just so dumb."

Barr, who proudly tips the scales at 230 pounds, also wants to give average viewers a TV show without beautiful people, so they can feel good about themselves in the face of today's youth-conscious mass media.

"You know, maybe we spend too much time watching TV and start thinking that TV is real and our lives aren't," says Barr.

Old familiar faces come into focus on "General Hospital" this Wednesday (March 16). From out of the blue, Susan Brown (Gail Baldwin) returns for three guest appearances as Gail argues with Leslie Charleson's Monica over the arrival of Tracy (Jane Elliot, another "Hospital" alumnus, fresh from her role as Angelica in "Days of Our Lives").

Tracy's reappearance has the Quartermaines in a spin, expecting only trouble from the lady who wants to protect young Ned, an innocent in Port Charles' world of sharks.

Veteran soap stars Brown, Charleson and Elliot hand over the mantle to Louisville's Kurt Robin McKinney. Kurt is finding his way among the hospital corridors as the handsome computer expert, Ned Ashton.

# TV series for classroom use has enraged some groups of educators

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. — Paid pitches for jeans, a candy bar and dandruff shampoo were mixed in with a fast-paced menu of current events Monday as Channel One, the televised news show for teen-agers, had its first school day.

The paid advertising on the show, which is produced by Knoxville-based Whittle Communications LP, has enraged some education groups who want Big Business barred from making sales pitches to students inside the classroom.

The fourth 30-second commercial was a public service announcement for the Partnership for a Drug-Free America.

Students, teachers and parents who witnessed Channel One's debut at Central High expressed few reservations about the ads.

"It's fine with me," said Shelley Bible, a 14-year-old freshman. "You

get more pressure from other students than you do from the commercials."

Toi McCane, a 17-year-old senior, said the commercials "are just the same thing you get on the news at night."

The 12-minute program included two minutes of commercials.

Whittle Communications is a media concern that has developed magazines and posters that can be used by advertisers to reach narrowly defined audiences, such as people in doctors' waiting rooms.

Channel One is Whittle Communications' first venture into television, and groups such as the National Parent-Teacher Association and the National Association of Secondary School Principals are opposing sending commercials into school along with the news show.

"They are trying to make it a part of every school day, and this medium has a much stronger impact than any other," said Tari Marshall, a

spokeswoman for the National Education Association.

Christopher Whittle, the company chairman, said schools can't afford the equipment and level of programming he is providing as part of the Channel One project.

The company has provided one of the six test schools with about \$50,000 worth of television monitors, video recording equipment and a satellite dish on which they can receive the daily show.

In addition to Central, the show debuted Monday at Billerica Memorial High School in Billerica, Mass.; Mumford High School in Detroit; Gahr High School in Cerritos, Calif.; and Eisenhower Middle School in Kansas City, Kan.

The sixth test school, Withrow High School in Cincinnati, was closed Monday by bad weather.

If the test proves successful, Whittle hopes to expand it nationally to as many as 8,000 schools in the fall of 1990.

In exchange for the equipment, the schools agree to run the news show once each school day.

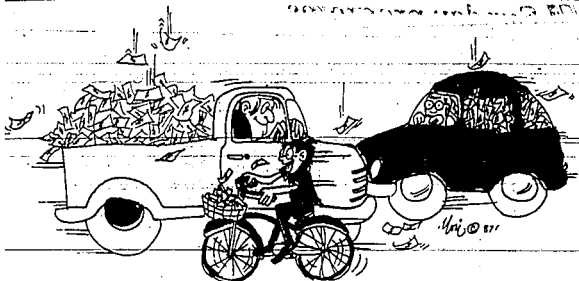

## LeMay enjoys first top billing

**Q: What can you tell me about John D. LeMay, who plays Ryan Dallon on the syndicated series, "Friday the 13th"?**

**A:** LeMay, born in Minnesota and raised in Normal, Ill., began doing stage work for a summer troupe before going on to Illinois State University where he spent his senior year as an intern at the Theatre Building in Chicago. Moving to Los Angeles a couple of years ago, he landed a role in the film "Couch Trip," and then appeared on episodes of TV's "Highway to Heaven," "My Sister Sam," "The Twilight Zone," "The Facts of Life" and "Remington Steele." "Friday the 13th" is LeMay's first starring role on television.

**Q: Why wasn't William Katt on the last "Perry Mason" TV movie? Has he left the film series?**

**A:** Yes, Katt has left to pursue a movie career. He has been replaced by William R. Moses in the role of Ken Malansky, Perry Mason's new assistant, who will co-star in the next movie, "The Case of the Musical Murder." If Moses looks familiar, it's because he appeared as a client of Mason's in "The Case of the Lethal Lesson," shown Feb. 12. The producers obviously liked what they saw and signed him up as a cast regular.

**Q: How long did "Gidget" and "The Green Hornet" run on television?**

**A:** The original TV "Gidget," starring Sally Field, ran on ABC for one season (1965-66). "The Green Hornet," with Van Williams and Bruce Lee, was added to the ABC schedule after the initial popularity of "Batman," and ran for one season (1966-67).

**Q: Will there be any more "Davy Crockett" episodes on NBC7 Will it ever become a weekly series?**

**A:** There are two episodes of the series yet to be shown; expect to see them sometime during the May ratings sweeps. As to whether "Crockett" will become a weekly show, that wouldn't be likely based on its ratings, which thus far have been low on "The Magical World of Disney" opposite the sturdy "60 Minutes."

**Q: Are there any sequels planned to the film "Babycakes" on CBS?**

**A:** The film was produced solely as a TV movie, not a pilot for a series. Because its ratings were fair (13.1 rating and 22 share, losing to "In the Heat of the Night" but tying "Moonlighting"), that could prompt a network executive to consider a sequel.

## Pepsi drops Madonna ad

NEW YORK (AP) - Pepsi-Cola Co. canceled plans to run a two-minute commercial with pop star Madonna on MTV after the cable network started airing the singer's controversial new music video, a source close to Pepsi said today.

The Pepsi ad with Madonna, which was dubbed "Make a Wish" and included an abbreviated version of her new song, "Like a Prayer," debuted Thursday on television shows in 40 countries.

The next day, MTV began running a separate music video that heralded the launch of the singer's new song.

The video shows Madonna in a black alip, dancing among burning crosses and seeking refuge in a church where she kisses a statue of a saint who comes to life.

In Italy, the conservative Catholic group Famiglia Domani has charged that the video is blasphemous.

Pepsi had planned to run the two-minute ad last weekend on MTV, but withheld it while the video is running, according to the

source who spoke on condition he not be identified.

The source said the change in plans was motivated by a desire to avoid competing for attention with the video and not by worries about the controversy that could be stirred by the video.

Carole Robinson, a spokeswoman for MTV, said the network has received no complaints about the video, which has been running since Friday.

Liz Rosenberg, a spokesman for Warner Brothers Records, Madonna's record label, said the record company had received no complaints about the video.

A state-run television network in Italy delayed its plans to carry the video last weekend after Famiglia Domani objected to it. But Rosenberg said the network has since reviewed the video and plans to begin airing it soon.

Tod MacKenzie, a spokesman for Pepsi, declined to comment on whether the Pepsi ad was withdrawn from MTV but said the company had not changed its overall ad campaign plans.

## Recent Medicare changes mean increased taxes for seniors

WASHINGTON—While President Reagan's signing of the Medicare Catastrophic Loss Protection Act last July will provide additional health coverage, it also will mean more in taxes for the approximately 32 million Medicare enrollees. The increased benefits will be funded by a surtax levied against all "Medicare-eligible" individuals whose tax liability exceeds \$150. Generally, this means anyone who is 65 or older and entitled to receive Medicare benefits—whether or not they actually receive or apply for them. Called a "sup-

By 1993, the premium will nearly double (see chart). The new surtax is based on the actual income tax paid, not one's taxable income.
