Swan Falls legislation under fire

BOISE — State laws implementing the landmark Swan Falls water rights agreement have deprived Idaho Power Co. ratepayers of their constitutional right to due process, says an attorney in a class-action case challenging the statutes.

Boise attorney Brock Seinger told the Idaho Supreme Court on Thursday that client Harold Miles and other Idaho Power customers will be forced to pay an additional rate of \$14 million a year, forever, as a result of the 1985 Swan Falls legislation.

The high court heard arguments on a rehearing of Miles' appeal from 4th District Judge Deborah Ball's rejection of his lawsuit against Idaho Power, the state, the Idaho Public Utilities Commission, the Idaho Water Resource Board and a number of state officials.

The Supreme Court previously ruled the Swan Falls legislation constitutional, but it agreed to reconsider.

Seinger said provisions of laws stemming from the 1984 settlement that subordinated Idaho Power's water rights in the Snake River to the state made future rate increases inevitable and undermined regulatory efforts by reducing the utility's hydroelectric generating potential.

"Nobody in this government should be able to force me to pay anything unless it's the market, taxes or reasonable rates," Seinger said.

Jesse Walters, the chief judge of the Idaho Court of Appeals who was sat in on Thursday's hearing in place of Justice Robert Huntley, agreed that the action "might be unconstitutional, because it binds the Legislature, or prevents it, from considering in the future whether these rates are fair, just and reasonable."

But Deputy Attorney General John McMahon said the Swan Falls agreement and resulting

Hospital, critics plead cases

Overflow turnout at CSI for hearing on \$6.9 million budget amendment

TWIN FALLS — Testimony admonishing a group of citizens who have challenged the hospital's \$6.9 million budget amendment received applause Thursday evening during a public hearing on the county hospital's amendment.

"If we start arguing and bickering over points of law, then we are condemning those people (cancer victims) to death — there's no two ways about it," said Dr. Gerhard Hoffman, a Magic Valley Regional Medical

Center radiologist.

Dr. Bernard Bodmer, another hospital radiologist called the Idaho Citizens Network a "dissident group of citizens" and yet another physician said it was a "travesty" to be "sitting around going through the motions" of a public hearing.

"To the doctor who does not like dissidents, this country was founded on that principle," shot back Kathy Sursely, community organizer for the local ICN chapter, which has been the budget amendment's most vocal opponent.

"It's very important the public has a

chance to scrutinize the county hospital, she said. "There's nothing wrong with taking a look at things, and there's nothing wrong with having a public hearing."

In a room too small for the turnout, the hospital and its critics took to the podium to plead their cases

before the county commissioners. The commissioners said in an earlier interview that they will not make a decision until after the hearing, but would spend the next few days going over testimony and consulting with their legal counsel.

After the hospital's almost two-hour presentation, which included testimony from eight doctors, the general public was allowed to comment. By 9 p.m., more than 15 people still waited to speak.

The public hearing is one more step in the hospital's fight to get a budget amendment approved so projects such as a cancer treatment center can continue on schedule.

In the past, the hospital has not budgeted for capital improvement projects or equipment purchases. This came to light after \$17 million in hospital reserve funds became public this past fall. The budget amendment is an attempt to fix the mistake, a mistake hospital officials say was unintentional. They attribute the budgeting error to the county's budget forms, which they say have no space for listing reserve funds.

Hospital officials base their argument for approval on a clause in the state laws that says an emergency can be declared for "the immediate preservation or order of public health."

"If the county commissioners can see in the Idaho codes to deem the cancer treatment center an emergency," Sursely said, "then one must also deem an emergency the need for health care for the low-income and include a provision to set aside part of the \$19 million to charitable care."

"Cancer affects everybody, every family. It may not come today or tomorrow. But it's going to come," said Dr. Paul Workman.

Bodmer questioned the purpose of the "dissidents" and asked if they were merely trying to punish the hospital for its budgeting mistakes. "Very few of us are perfect," he said.

Testimony supporting the budget amendment urged county commissioners to approve the amendment because cancer does constitute an emergency to its victims.

Personal stories of cancer victims abound.

Apples safe for Americans to eat, government agencies say

WASHINGTON — Seeking to stem a panic over public health, the federal government Thursday formally declared that it is safe for Americans to eat apples — and urged parents and school officials to restore the fruit to the diet of small children.

The declaration, issued by top officials of the Environmental Protection Agency, the Food and Drug Administration and the Department of Agriculture, officially discounted a report charging that apples treated with the chemical Alar pose a risk to children's health.

No more fresh apples for Twin Falls students

TWIN FALLS — Twin Falls students will find no fresh apples on their lunch trays for the rest of this school year.

"I just want to make sure it's safe," said Susan Gelling, the Twin Falls School District's lunch supervisor. "And I don't want parents to worry."

The report by the New York-based Natural Resources Defense Council lacked "scientific validity," the federal officials said. They pledged to work together to reassure the American

public that apples are safe. The government statement, presented at a hastily called Senate hearing on the issue, came after scores of school districts pulled ap-

ples and apple products from lunch menus this week and stores reported declines in apple purchases.

FDA Commissioner Frank Young, who this week blocked imports of

Chilean fruit after two cyanide-tainted grapes were found in a shipment, asserted that no similar action is warranted for apples treated with Alar, which is used to promote ripen-

ing in some apples.

"As you've seen, if there is a problem, FDA will squarely address it," Young said. "If there is not a problem, FDA will squarely say that there is none."

Some senators joined in decrying what Sen. Dan Coats, R-Ind., called the "hysteria and half-truths" spawned by the report, issued nearly three weeks ago by the Natural Resources Defense Council, an environmental group. But others legislators and witnesses made it clear that they share in the widespread concern about the substance.

Public works package appears to be dead

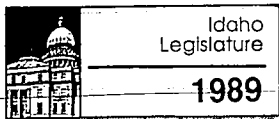

BOISE — Top Republican legislative leaders said Thursday that chances for a major public works construction package have all but evaporated in the face of mounting concern over severe financial problems facing them in the 1990 election-year session.

After discussing the overall budget situation for 40 minutes with Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus, Speaker Tom Boyd of Genesee and Senate President Pro Tem Michael Crapo of Idaho Falls said only a tax increase would produce the kind of money needed to finance a new building program.

"And the prospect of raising taxes on a scale of one to 10 is about one," Boyd said. "Following that session and subsequent meetings with other lawmakers, consideration of public works projects by the Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee, originally scheduled for today, was delayed until sometime next week.

"I've always thought we should get some of these other budget bills out of the way so we can



see where we are before we get back into that," Senate Finance Chairman Atwell Parry, R-Melba, said.

Crapo agreed with Boyd that this session's level of spending for the 1990 budget year that begins July 1 will require a reserve of about \$18 million to balance the 1991 budget without a tax increase.

That plan depleted a one-time \$52 million surplus with much of that nonrecurring revenue underwriting continuing state obligations that must be financed in the 1991 budget to be drafted just prior to next year's election.

Meanwhile, chances for wrapping up the 1989 legislative session by Easter dimmed as Senate

Democrats refused to expedite a final vote on the key \$115.5 million higher education support package. Senate GOP leaders hoped to get that House-passed bill down to Andrus quickly along with the \$394.3 million public school budget that cleared the Legislature Wednesday in hopes of accelerating action on the remaining bills in both houses.

But Democratic Floor Leader Bruce Sweeney of Lewiston said the minority wanted to slow the process down to gain consideration of bills it believes important.

Boyd also admitted that friction has risen between the chambers, and that was bogging down action as well.

"There are some animosities brewing, and we're working on them," said Boyd, who still believed the session could be adjourned by the end of next week.

The leadership position on the need for a reserve will likely set up a battle between lawmakers who supported a rejected budget-busting \$20 million college construction package and those worried

IRS will work away at processing returns

WASHINGTON — The Internal Revenue Service, under heavy fire for often answering taxpayers' questions incorrectly, will not slow its processing of tax refunds despite scattered personnel and supply shortages caused by the budget crunch, acting Commissioner Michael Murphy said Thursday.

"We have a management problem trying to conserve resources. ... We are looking for about \$50 million to continue present levels of operations for the next six months, Murphy told the House Ways and Means oversight subcommittee. But the IRS will not

let the problem slow returns processing, reduce services to taxpayers or deter the agency's enforcement efforts, he vowed.

"On another problem, Murphy appeared to confirm reports that the IRS has had a policy of sometimes not telling taxpayers when they neglect to take credit for taxes withheld from their paychecks. That would result in an overpayment of taxes."

Until last December, Murphy told Rep. Harold Ford, D-Tenn., some credits "were not being paid at one stage of the agency's review of tax returns and it is possible that taxpayers did not get the refund they were entitled to."

Bomb plot warnings sent out

LONDON — The Transport Department said it issued two warnings of a bomb plot in the month before Pan Am Flight 103 blew up over Scotland, but the airline said Thursday it never received the first warning and the second arrived weeks late, by mail.

The Times of London reported Thursday night that police know the bomber's identity and will disclose details next week. But officials denied reports in a British tabloid that a suspect was arrested.

Transport Secretary Paul Channon said the second warning, two days before the Dec. 21 crash, was "of no importance whatsoever," because the

U.S. Federal Aviation Administration already issued its own warning to U.S. carriers about the threat.

Members of the opposition Labor Party accused the government of a cover-up and demanded an investigation. The Transport Department issued its statement Wednesday night after a newspaper report of the warnings.

The warnings issued by the British government Nov. 22 and Dec. 19, just two days before the disaster that killed 270 people, spoke of a bomb hidden in a radio-cassette player, the Transport Department said.

Police say they established that the explosives were in a radio-cassette player played in a suitcase stowed in the jumbo jet's hold.

Pan Am said the Transport De-

partment's Dec. 19 memo did not reach it until Jan. 17 and that it never received the Nov. 22 warning. In New York, company spokeswoman Pamela Hanlon acknowledged Pan Am did receive the FAA warning Nov. 18 and as a result "put into place some heightened security procedures," but she declined to elaborate.

Flight 103 originated in Frankfurt, changing to a Boeing 747 in London. It blew up over Lockerbie, Scotland, killing all 259 people aboard and 11 on the ground.

A photostat of the Dec. 19 warning published by the Daily Mirror showed it addressed to "All U.K. airlines (and EI, Air India, U.S. airlines, South African Airways)."

Feds take over more failed S&Ls

WASHINGTON (AP) — Federal regulators on Thursday announced the takeover of 47 more failed savings and loan institutions while President Bush urged Congress to act more swiftly on his rescue plan for the industry.

The takeovers bring the number of institutions under the control of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. to 165 in 25 states. In the latest action, the agency took over 16 institutions in Texas, 10 in Illinois, nine each in Louisiana and Florida and three in Oklahoma. Their assets totaled \$6.8 billion.

The FDIC, which regulates commercial banks, is going into the sickest S&Ls with the goal of minimizing losses while the administration waits for Congress to appropriate the money to shut them down or sell them. The agency plans to take over an additional 60 institutions or so within the next month.

Meanwhile, Bush, in a luncheon speech in Houston, prodded Congress to move quickly on his plan.

American charged with espionage

FRANKFURT, West-Germany (AP) — An American soldier who vanished for 11 days has been charged with giving East German officials U.S. plans for defending the border against a Soviet beach assault, the Army said Thursday.

A U.S. military statement said the East Germans notified U.S. authorities that Spec. 4 Michael A. Peri had made contact with them. Peri disappeared from

his unit near the East German border Feb. 21, taking a portable computer with him.

The 21-year-old soldier from Laguna Niguel, Calif., turned himself in 11 days later after a search that left American military officials baffled.

In Washington, Pentagon sources said privately the East German government was quietly asked for help in locating Peri soon after his disappearance because, one said, "we had no idea if he was a defector, had been hurt or whatever."

Skipper's wife gives up teaching job

SAN DIEGO (AP) — The wife of the USS Vincennes skipper agreed Thursday to quit teaching at a private school because her narrow escape from a bomb attack prompted fears that students could be exposed to terrorist acts.

Parents worried that their children at the exclusive La Jolla Country Day School might be endangered if Sharon Rogers returned to teach her fourth-grade class, and they told their concerns to administrators.

"To ensure the safety of the children, the confidence of the parents, and the integrity of the educational environment of La Jolla Country Day School, Mrs. Rogers and the school have reached the mutual decision that she will not be returning to the campus," headmaster Tim Burns said in a statement.

The school was the target of a bomb scare on Tuesday. Police searched the grounds and found nothing. Extra precautions have been taken at the campus, including daily searches of classrooms.

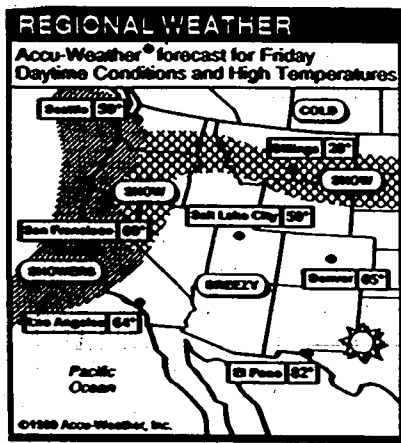
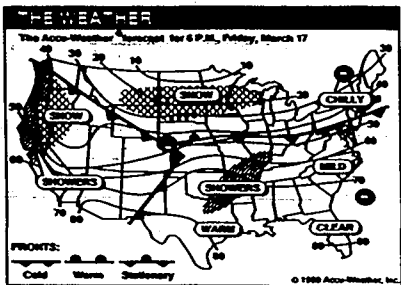
Summary:

Twin Falls City economic development director David McAlindin suffered from cancer for six years ago. For several months, he was treated during the day and vomited three hours each night.

"To this day I can't imagine what it would have been like to not be able to go home every night," McAlindin said. "It is not a time of life when you want to be or should be alone."

Jill Chestnut, who runs the hospital's breast cancer testing program, told of a three-year-old girl and her siblings who never got to know their

mother because the mother died of cancer — and they could not travel to Boise to spend time with her.

She also related the story of a woman who was moving herself and her husband to Boise where he could get cancer treatment — they were going to live in a trailer for two months.

Pam Dowd told of her own mastectomy and her daughter's illness, and how important it was to have family close by in both instances.

Surely began her testimony by drawing attention to the audience and the number of hospital employees present.

During his testimony, one physician asked for a show of hands of hospital employees — at least two-thirds of the audience raised its hands.

Gary Thietten, owner of Idaho Home Health and Hospice, went on the record as supporting the budget amendment.

"This is an emergency," he said. "If it is the desire of those here tonight, and if it is in the best interest of this community — and I believe it is — then I trust you will approve this budget amendment so that our cancer treatment center can be constructed."

legislation provided a number of advantages to all Idaho citizens, including utility ratepayers.

The establishment of a minimum streamflow at Idaho Power's Swan Falls Dam might have reduced the amount of water available to the company for hydropower production, McMahon said.

But in turn, he said, it established public interest criteria for water rights allocations, set up a state water marketing system, provided protection for family farms and ensured future development in southern Idaho would not be held up by Idaho Power's control of water in the Snake River.

The Legislature passed a package

of 12 different bills, and the benefits of that in many cases accrue to the ratepayers," McMahon said.

"I have the greatest respect for Mr. Miles, personally, and Mr. Seingsma. They're here at great personal sacrifice," he said. "But what will all come out of is plucking one part of one bill out of a very large legislative package."

about heading off an election-year tax hike.

Andrus declined to go as far as the two Republican leaders. But while he supported the campus public works plan even though he did not propose that spending, the governor also placed balancing the existing budgets as the top priority.

"I would like to build these buildings as well as anyone would, and I'm sure they would too," Andrus said as the closed-door session ended. "But there's quite a gap in the revenue picture for 1990 and 1991. First things come first. You've got to have a balanced budget."

While cuts may still be made in

the current 1990 legislative spending blueprint, the savings politically possible there along with a modest \$7 million surplus that already exists and the chances for some limited revenue increase will barely meet that reserve requirement, Boyd acknowledged.

He indicated the only real chance for development of a building package — also being called a surplus eliminator — will be if the state gains another revenue windfall this spring like the one that began building the last surplus a year ago.

There wouldn't be enough money over the figures we have to have to trigger an eliminator until next January," Boyd said.

Crapo acknowledged the financial

situation was still fluid and that not every lawmaker agreed with the position he and Boyd were taking.

"There's still going to be a fight," Crapo said. "But if we're right about the figures, it's going to be very critical to have money held in a rainy day fund to protect against the budget."

The only real issue to be decided immediately is how to handle the \$52 million College of Technology building at Boise State University, the Andrus-backed project that many lawmakers blamed for spawning the frenzy for passage of a major building package.

Boyd predicted the state would probably agree to finance the \$500,000 bond payment due on that facility next fall.

"What's a mother to do?" asked actress Meryl Streep, testifying in her role as head of Mothers and Others for Pesticide Limits.

Given the conflicting reports, she testified, consumers lose confidence in products and citizens lose confidence in government. As parents, she said ruefully, "we lose it completely."

At the confrontational hearing, Streep and others urged that Alar's manufacturer, the Unyrol Chemical

Co., immediately pull the product off the market so that consumers can be sure all apples are safe.

But a company executive refused. "This is a truly remarkable product," said Unyrol Vice President James A. Whyte Jr., "and it is a safe product."

Alar contains the chemical daminozide, known to cause cancer. The EPA has said that it plans to ban the use of the chemical — which is used to promote ripening in an esti-

mated 5 percent to 10 percent of the U.S. apple crop — by June 1990 because of preliminary tests showing that it causes cancer in mice.

The agency has the power to ban the chemical outright, as environmentalists and some legislators have urged. But the government officials testified that the amount of the chemical present in apples is too small to pose a health risk, and that no action is justified until a scientific study is completed.

Idaho lawmakers to oppose 55 mph speed bill

Andrus supports continued focus on child abuse

WASHINGTON — Idaho lawmakers are expected to oppose a new bill introduced Thursday that would force states to roll back the speed limit on rural highways to 55 to 65 miles per hour or risk losing some federal highway construction funds.

Democratic Rep. Richard Stallings, who actively supported 1987 legislation to raise the speed limit, is also expected to fight the bill, introduced by New Jersey Sen. Frank Lautenberg (D) and Rep. Frank Pallone (D). "The bills, which carry penalties for states that do not adopt the lower limits of up to 10 percent of their federal highway construction funds, has won the backing of both the American Trucking Association and the International Association of Chiefs of Police. At a news conference Thursday, the New

Jersey lawmakers referred to a January study released by the Transportation Department, showing a dramatic increase in traffic fatalities and injuries in states with a 65 mph speed limit. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration study, highway deaths in 1987 rose 18 percent in states with the higher standard, while those that kept the limit at 55 mph showed an overall increase of 7 percent. "The evidence is clear," Lautenberg said. "Speed kills." New Jersey is among 10 eastern states that

have kept the speed limit at 55 mph on all highways since the measure was passed. In Idaho, the number of traffic fatalities were identical for the years preceding and following the jump in the speed limit: 31 people died in highway accidents. "We don't really see any startling change," said David Amick, a traffic safety specialist at Idaho's office of highway safety. Officials at the Federal Highway Administration said the report should not be taken as conclusive proof that higher speed limits cause more road deaths.

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho House has completed action on a package of "child-abuse bills," but the topic hasn't been laid to rest. "The House on Wednesday passed nine bills on child abuse and sent them to Gov. Cecil Andrus. Andrus, meanwhile, continued to criticize the House — for refusing to approve mandatory sentencing laws for adults who abuse children. Nine other House-approved bills went to the Senate. Deb Krum, a Boise State University student, said on Monday that Andrus will sign a proclamation on child abuse. She organized an earlier statewide series of rallies in favor of tough child abuse bills, and said another one is planned at the Statehouse on Monday. "We are dedicating this protest to the children who have lost their lives as a result of child abuse and to the children who will fall victim, until we deal in full measure with this crime," said Ms. Krum. "We are urging workers to spend their noon hour both in protest, but more importantly in honor of the children who are surviving under circumstances that will bring emotional holocaust and devastation into their lives," she said in a news release.

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Bomb plot warnings sent out

LONDON — The Transport Department says it issued two warnings of a bomb plot in the month before Pan Am Flight 103 flew over Scotland, but the airline said Thursday it never received the first warning—and the second arrived "weeks" later, by mail.

The Times of London reported Thursday night that police knew the bomber's identity and will disclose details next week. But officials denied reports in a British tabloid that a suspect was arrested.
Transport Secretary Paul Channon said the second warning, two days before the Dec. 21 crash, was "of no importance whatsoever," because the

U.S. Federal Aviation Administration already issued its own warning to U.S. carriers about the threat.
Members of the opposition Labour Party accused the government of a cover-up and demanded an investigation. The Transport Department issued its statement Wednesday night after a newspaper report of the warnings.

The warnings issued by the British government Nov. 22 and Dec. 19, just two days before the disaster that killed 270 people, spoke of a bomb hidden in a radio-cassette player, the Transport Department said.

"Police say they established that the explosives were in a radio-cassette player placed in a suitcase stowed in the jumbo jets hold," Pan Am said the Transport De-

partment's Dec. 19 memo did not reach it until Jan. 17 and that it never received the Nov. 22 warning. In New York, company spokeswoman Pamela Hanson acknowledged Pan Am did receive the FAA warning Nov. 18 and as a result "put into place some heightened security procedures," but she declined to elaborate.

Flight 103 originated in Frankfurt, changing to a Boeing 747 in London. It blew up over Lockerbie, Scotland, killing all 259 people aboard and 11 on the ground.

A photostat of the Dec. 19 warning published by the Daily Mirror showed it addressed to "All U.K. airlines (and El Al, Air India, U.S. airlines, and South African Airways)."

Feds take over more failed S&Ls

WASHINGTON (AP) — Federal regulators on Thursday announced the takeover of 47 more failed savings and loan institutions while President Bush urged Congress to act more swiftly on his rescue plan for the industry.

The takersover bring the number of institutions under the control of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. to 165 in 25 states. In the latest action, the agency took over 16 institutions in Texas, 10 in Illinois, nine each in Louisiana and Florida and three in Oklahoma. Their assets totaled \$6.8 billion.

The FDIC, which regulates commercial banks, is going into the sickest S&Ls with the goal of minimizing losses while the administration waits for Congress to appropriate the money to shut them down or sell them. The agency plans to take over an additional 60 institutions or so within the next month.

Meanwhile, Bush, in a luncheon speech in Houston, prodded Congress to move quickly on his plan.

American charged with espionage

FRANKFURT, West Germany (AP) — An American soldier who vanished for 11 days has been charged with giving East German officials U.S. plans for defending the border against a Soviet bloc assault, the Army said Thursday.

A U.S. military statement said the East Germans notified U.S. authorities that Spec. 4 Michael A. Peri had made contact with them. Peri disappeared from

his unit near the East German border Feb. 21, taking a portable computer with him.

The 21-year-old soldier from Laguna Niguel, Calif., turned himself in 11 days later after a search that left American military officials baffled.

In Washington, Pentagon sources said privately the East German government was quietly asked for help in locating Peri soon after his disappearance because, one said, "we had no idea if he was a defector, had been hurt or whatever."

Skipper's wife gives up teaching job

SAN DIEGO (AP) — The wife of the USS Vincennes skipper agreed Thursday to quit teaching at a private school because her narrow escape from a bomb attack prompted fears that students could be exposed to terrorist acts.

Parents worried that their children at the exclusive La Jolla Country Day School might be endangered if Sharon Rogers returned to teach her fourth-grade class, and they told their concerns to administrators.

"To ensure the safety of the children, the confidence of the parents, and the integrity of the educational environment of La Jolla Country Day School, Mrs. Rogers and the school have reached the mutual decision that she will not be returning to the campus," headmaster Tim Burns said in a statement.

The school was the target of a bomb scare on Tuesday. Police searched the grounds and found nothing. Extra precautions have been taken at the campus, including daily searches of classrooms.

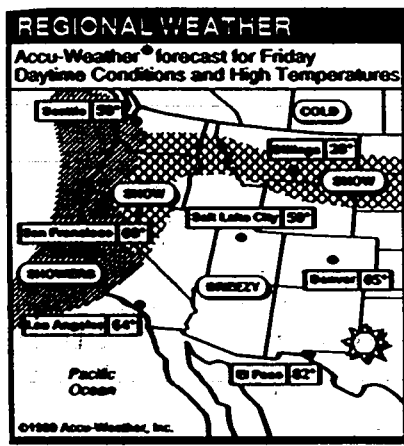
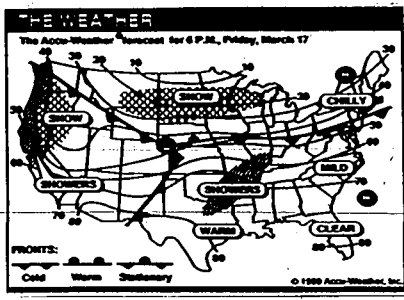

Twin Falls City economic development director David McAlindin suffered from cancer four to six years ago. For several months, he was treated during the day and vomited three hours each night.

Pam Dowd told of her own mastectomy and her daughter's illness, and how important it was to have family close by in both instances.

"What's a mother to do?" asked actress Meryl Streep, tasked in her role as head of Mothers and Others for Pesticide Limits.

Given the conflicting reports, she testified, consumers lose confidence in products and citizens lose confidence in government. "As parents," she said ruefully, "we lose it completely."

At the confrontational hearing, Streep and others urged that Alar's manufacturer, the Oregon Chemical

Co., immediately pull the product off the market so that consumers can be sure all apples are safe.

But a company executive refused. "This is a truly remarkable product," said Unroyal Vice President James A. Whyte Jr., "and it is a safe product."

Alar contains the chemical daminozide, known to cause cancer. The EPA has said that it plans to ban the use of the chemical, which is used to promote ripening in an esti-

mated 5 percent to 10 percent of the U.S. apple crop — by June 1990 because of preliminary tests showing that it causes cancer in mice.

The agency has the power to ban the chemical outright, as environmentalists and some legislators have urged. But the government officials testified that the amount of the chemical present in apples is too small to pose a health risk, and that no action is justified until a scientific study is completed.

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Idaho lawmakers to oppose 55 mph speed bill

Andrus supports continued focus on child abuse

WASHINGTON — Idaho lawmakers are expected to oppose a new bill introduced Thursday that would force states to roll back the speed limit on rural highways from 65 to 55 miles per hour or risk losing some federal highway construction funds.

"That's almost federal blackmail when you withhold funds like that," said David Fish, a spokesman for Republican Rep. Larry Craig. "I don't think that's anything that Larry Craig

would support."

Democratic Rep. Richard Stallings, who actively supported 1987 legislation to raise the speed limit, is also expected to fight the bill, introduced by New Jersey Sen. Frank Lautenberg (D) and Rep. Frank Pallone (D).

The bills, which carry penalties for states that do not adopt the lower limits of up to 10 percent of their federal highway construction funds, has won the backing of both the American Trucking Association and the International Association of Chiefs of Police.

At a news conference Thursday, the New

Jersey lawmakers referred to a January study released by the Transportation Department, showing a dramatic increase in traffic fatalities and injuries in states with a 65 mph speed limit.

According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration study, highway deaths in 1987 rose 18 percent in states with the higher standard, while those that kept the limit at 55 mph showed an overall increase of 7 percent.

"The evidence is clear," Lautenberg said. "Speed kills."

New Jersey is among 10 eastern states that

have kept the speed limit at 55 mph on all highways since the measure was passed.

In Idaho, the number of traffic fatalities were identical for the years preceding and following the jump in the speed limit: 31 people died in highway accidents.

"We don't really see any startling change," said David Amick, a traffic safety specialist at Idaho's office of highway safety.

Officials at the Federal Highway Administration said the report should not be taken as conclusive proof that higher speed limits cause more road deaths.

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho House has completed action on a package of child-abuse bills, but the topic hasn't been laid to rest.

The House on Wednesday passed nine bills on child abuse and sent them to Gov. Cecil Andrus. Andrus, meanwhile, continued to criticize the House for refusing to approve mandatory sentencing laws for adults who abuse children.

Nine other House-approved bills went to the Senate.

Deb Krum, a Boise State University student, said on Monday that Andrus will sign a proclamation on child abuse.

She organized an earlier statewide series of rallies in favor of tough child abuse bills, and said another one is planned at the Statehouse on Monday.

"We are dedicating this protest to the children who have lost their lives as a result of child abuse and to the children who will fall victim, until we deal in full measure with this crime," said Ms. Krum.

"We are urging workers to spend their noon hour both in protest, but more importantly in honor of the children who are surviving under circumstances that will bring emotional holocaust and devastation into their lives," she said in a news release.

Banning assault weapons isn't easy

Recent tragedies involving the AK-47 assault rifle have given rise to a number of efforts at the state level to ban or at least put severe limits on that particular style of weapon. Now the federal government has acted by putting a temporary ban on the importation of AK-47s. Is all this activity justified?

Increasingly, police departments across the nation face dangerous situations where they're outgunned, literally staring down the barrel of a weapon expressly designed to take a life.

No self-respecting outdoorsman, hunter or National Rifle Association member wants these senseless incidents to continue. But the sanctity, preciousness and frail beauty found in every human life are exactly why our forefathers thought the Second Amendment was a necessary evil.

I am not a member of the NRA. I have no interest in the organization and view many of its tactics and policies with skepticism. In fact, if I weren't for the three years I've spent writing on outdoor subjects, I probably would view the assault rifle with the same universal contempt felt for the sawed-off shotgun.

The AK-47 is almost useless to a hunter. The intimidating number of rounds held in that "banana clip" does little more than add weight, expense and a macho image to the weapon. Most of the time hunters are lucky to get off one or two shots at their quarry, not 20 or 30 at a time. Add an unmanageably short barrel, put it in the shaking hands of a weekend sportsman, and even targets at point-blank range start to feel pretty safe.

So why all the controversy? Why not get rid of another adult toy? A glimpse at history tells us why.

The exact same thing that makes the shotgun ideal for bird, rabbit and small-game hunting also makes it perfect for crime. Because it throws

hundreds of tiny pellets with each blast, someone who might not have time to take aim could find it very useful. Unfortunately, bank robbers wanted it a little more useful in close quarters, so they began shortening the barrel by sawing off the end.

As a result, in 1938 the Federal Firearms Act was passed into law. It prohibits the possession of a "sawed off." The law is enforceable, especially since a shotgun is easily defined and simply measuring the barrel determines compliance.

Unfortunately, making a sawed-off is still common criminal practice today. The nightly news is flooded with pictures of bank robberies that are usually taking place in front of a home-cut version.

Defining an assault weapon is not as simple as defining a shotgun. For example, the AK-47 alone is made in practically every industrialized Communist nation and as a result, comes in at least as many configurations. Add different-length clips, barrels, folding stocks, and things get pretty complicated.

Outlawing a certain caliber won't work, simply because there are a number of legitimate sporting rifles produced in the same size. Moreover, factories can retrofit very quickly. Barrel length is an impossible indicator, especially since such aesthetically pleasing rifles as the Winchester 30-30 (the lever-action saddle gun that "won the West") have always come in several lengths.

Limit the number of bullets allowed in a weapon at any one time, and you've got to consider handguns. Many police departments are allowing their officers to use semi-automatics, most of which hold at least nine rounds. The extremely popular Ruger .22 caliber rifle (a semi-automatic viewed by almost everyone as an ideal learner's rifle), comes in several versions, all of

which hold more than nine rounds. When the city of Oak Park, Ill., enacted a ban on handguns in 1981, it was a direct result of a shooting that took place in a Chicago courtroom on Oct. 21, 1983. In that incident, Oak Park resident James Plazter was killed, along with Judge Henry Gentz.

Today, only police are allowed to carry and own handguns in Oak Park. Ironically, the ordinance wouldn't have saved anyone's life, since the man who did the killing was a Chicago policeman on disability. He shot them with his service revolver. Taking assault weapons away from such law-abiding citizens as you and me won't stop the violence, just as it didn't stop bank robberies by sawed-off shotguns.

In the tiny countries of Switzerland and Israel, each citizen is required to own and train with fully automatic rifles and pistols. Per capita, they have many more weapons, but much less violent crime and murder — and practically no gun crime. Obviously, the availability of a weapon has little to do with the solution.

So what's the solution to a growing assault-weapons "population"?

As Americans, we have a history, a right and a responsibility to question the government. Our Founders were most concerned with the freedom of the individual. As a result the right to bear arms was included in the Constitution with little debate.

But concern for the safety, security and welfare of an innocent generation of young people must weigh heavily on our conscience as well. Perhaps it's time to limit the number of assault weapons in the country and register each owner. We did this with fully automatic firearms years ago, and they have hardly been a factor in crime since then.

Airport renovation will be a positive step

The Twin Falls Airport Board, is on the right flight path in its plans to remodel and renovate the Twin Falls Airport to make it both more convenient and attractive.

Anyone who has travelled around the country recognizes the inadequacies of the present facility.

It is a hodge-podge of space, designed for an era when flight was in its infancy and airplane travel meant hitching a ride with the Red Baron.

Reasonable efforts have made over the years to improve the facility, but the ending of large-jet service into Twin Falls and the advent of multiple flights by smaller planes has changed the basic flow of people in the building.

The development of Friedman Field at Hailey and the beginning of more Horizon Air flights directly into that location mean that Twin Falls is not likely to pull away much more direct Sun Valley traffic, except when adverse flying conditions dictate a diversion to Twin Falls.

All of this has been pushed along by airline deregulation. When Pacific Airlines pulled out of Twin Falls several years ago, there was a lot of concern that service to our small city would deteriorate.

That has not happened. Twin Falls is now served by both Horizon and SkyWest, a Delta affiliate, and service has improved with the addition of larger planes on some flights. Boardings have stabilized, and with the larger planes, may well increase, if the airlines keep the cost down.

Improving the terminal building would enhance these positive trends and help reverse negative ones. Improved "people routing" to make better use of boarding gates, relocating car rental and concession areas and providing modern seating and waiting areas are all improvements which make sense.

There should be a reasonable split, in our view, between costs of these improvements which should rightfully be borne by the airlines, concessioners and car rental companies and those which should be borne at public expense.

Neither group should pick up all of them, since there are obvious benefits all around.

The precise division of costs is best determined when the specifics of remodeling and renovation are known. But that issue aside, we think the Airport Board is right as rain to go forward with its planning.

"It is definitely time," consulting engineer Lillian Howman told the board this week, "to make our terminal look presentable." Indeed it is.

Tax, duty not the same thing

A sales tax within a state is just that — a tax on an article sold. However, a sales tax on an item that crosses state lines becomes a duty whether it be imposed upon exportation or importation.

The Constitution forbids any state from laying such a tax, except for the purpose and inspection or with the consent of Congress. Congress may permit any state to collect such taxes; but if Congress maintains control and power of revision of that tax, it is permitting it to do so.

Though Congress may permit this, all such taxes are to go to and shall be for the

Use of the Treasury of the United States," (Article I, Section 10, paragraph 2) Not only do we find this principle here but again in Article I, Section 9, paragraph 5, "No tax or Duty, shall be laid on Articles exported from any State."

Congress might circumvent one of these but only by due process, possibly in this manner:

1) Permit the states to collect the tax;
2) All such tax goes to the U.S. Treasury;
3) An accounting kept, and then, whether monthly, quarterly, semi-annually, or annually, an amount equal to that owing each state be appropriated to it. The taxes must first go to the U.S.

An amendment could be drawn and passed stating that clause, or one to clarify that state sales taxes are not a duty and therefore federal.

But with all of this, the single and direct meaning of Section 9 has not been touched — no tax on articles, from any State. This statement is not qualified by stating that the tax is levied by the exporting state and a buyers in another or by the state whose citizens are the purchasers of goods from another. The interpretation can be both ways.

This is only my opinion. It is not necessarily opposed to The Times-News editor's viewpoint of raising revenue. But it does question his "checkersness" and the action of Congress at this point. His opinion is based on the cases of the U.S. Supreme Court: decisions from Brown v. Maryland in 1827, under Chief Justice Marshall; to the sale tax case of Welton vs. Missouri in 1891; to the present.

All even Congress, must look at this foundation of the Constitution.

Challenge awaits Cheney at Defense Department



Dick Cheney prepares for expected move to Defense

WASHINGTON — Dick Cheney, the Wyoming congressman about to become secretary of defense, is tackling one of the most difficult management jobs in government with only an outsider's knowledge of modern weapons and with the extra weight of a late start.

"All the problems are compounded" for Cheney, says Caspar W. Weinberger, who served almost seven years in the job.

"Two months have gone by, a great many trains are leaving the station and they all have to be caught at once," Weinberger said in an interview Thursday.

"He's a fine choice and he will be very good. But he faces a very

daunting task."

Other officials still inside the Pentagon, who asked not to be named, say it's possible for a congressman to jump into the huge military bureaucracy and shine.

For example, one said, Melvin Laird did well in the Nixon administration. And Cheney, who like Laird held a leadership post among House Republicans, is no stranger to most of the big issues.

But Cheney is about to leap from running a Capitol Hill office with few employees to becoming the boss of 3.1 million people. And he is doing so with little time to select key assistants and aides.

The first important job he'll face is trimming the fiscal 1990 budget. And he's never played that peculiar brand of Pentagon politics.

"Dick Cheney is about to walk into this job right when it's time to play referee among four services that are attacking each other in hopes of saving their own budget," said one official.

President Bush already has ordered the Pentagon to slash about \$6.4 billion from its fiscal 1990 budget proposal "and now it's dog-eat-cat time," the source said.

Weinberger recalled such military budget fights, saying, "Everybody has recommendations of their own—

their own hopes and needs—and there's never enough for everybody. ...It will be very, very tough" for Cheney.

To make matters worse, the congressman doesn't have the detailed military-program knowledge possessed by Bush's first choice for the job, John Tower.

Tower, a former chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee, was widely known for his exhaustive knowledge of such details.

Cheney, by contrast, after being lauded for his honor and integrity, was approved Thursday by the Armed Services Committee and is expected to clear the full Senate without opposition Friday.

One Pentagon official said anyone who sets his mind to it can learn what weapons the nation depends on, how they work, how they're produced and how much they cost.

"But that takes time, and Cheney doesn't have any," he said.

As if setting budget priorities were not enough, Cheney also will have only about a month to help Bush make broad decisions that will affect national security for years to come.

For example, the administration must decide whether the United States needs a mobile nuclear missile to deter Soviet attack and, if so, what type and how large it should be. The administration also must decide how fast it will attempt to build B-2 stealth bombers—a

decision with huge financial implications.

Other pending decisions include how vigorously to develop a "Star Wars" anti-missile defense system, whether to continue supporting a Navy built around 15 aircraft carriers, whether military manpower should be cut, what goals to aim for in negotiating a nuclear arms treaty with the Soviet Union, and how to walk the tightrope of safeguarding Europe while

negotiating reductions to conventional arms.

"He's going to have to do about 14 or 15 things at once," says Weinberger, who was sworn in as secretary of defense just one day after Ronald Reagan began his presidency.

"It's a too bad he lost these months."

Armed Services panel OKs Cheney; Senate to begin

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate Armed Services Committee on Thursday unanimously approved Defense Secretary-designate Dick Cheney, sending the nomination to an expected easy Senate confirmation on Friday.

The 20-0 vote was in marked contrast to last month's defeat of former Texas Sen. John Tower in which the committee decided 11-9 along party lines against the nomination.

President Bush, during a question-and-answer session in Houston, said he was "very pleased" at the panel's action. But he reiterated his criticism of the tone of the Senate debate that led to Tower's rejection.

Tower, he said, had been "tried by perception and rumor. That is not the American way."

After the raucous debate over Tower, the committee moved with lightning speed on Cheney, a six-term Wyoming congressman who

won wide popularity among his colleagues on Capitol Hill as House minority whip; the second-ranking Republican leadership post in the chamber.

The committee praised Cheney's high standards of personal conduct and integrity, saying they "would help to restore public confidence in the integrity of defense management" at the Pentagon.

McFarlane tells of Contra arms delivery

WASHINGTON (AP) — The jury in Oliver North's trial was told Thursday of a daring plan, said to have been approved by then-President Reagan, that involved an air-drop of recoilless rifles to help the Nicaraguan Contras sink arms-carrying ships.

Whether the air drop was ever attempted was not brought out in the fifth and last day of questioning North's former White House boss, Robert C. McFarlane. After he left the stand, the jury was dismissed until Monday.

McFarlane said that although he had pleaded guilty to four misdemeanor counts of withholding information from Congress he felt he should not have been charged.

"I felt quite passionately about the fact that I had not willfully lied to people," he said. But he added that "it was quite clear I withheld information" and "I had to accept the consequences of what I had done."

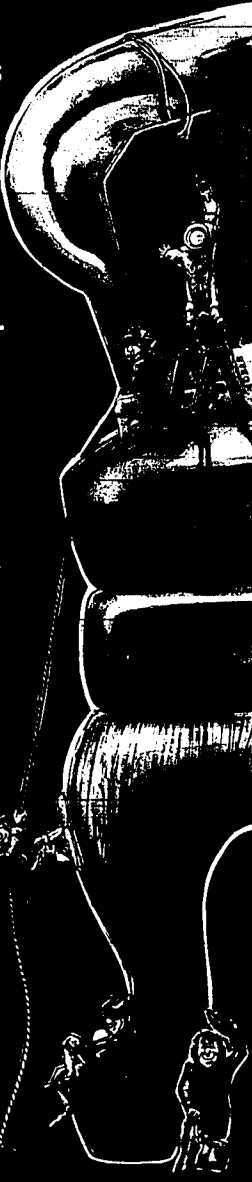
Prosecutor John Kiker, referring to papers introduced while McFarlane was on the stand, said, "What those documents show is that during the period of the Boland Amendment you and the NSC did a lot of things to aid the military activities of the Contras."

"Yes," said McFarlane.

FAA toughens rules on airport guns

WASHINGTON (AP) — A passenger who tries to take a gun through an airport screening point, even unwittingly, could be fined at least \$1,000 under a newly toughened Federal Aviation Administration policy, a spokesman said Thursday.

If the weapon is loaded or there is an attempt to conceal it, fines could range up to \$10,000, said spokesman Fred Farrar.

Previously, FAA regional authorities could pursue smaller fines against first-time offenders or issue warnings, Farrar said.

Under the new order, a penalty of \$1,000 would be sought in civil court if the firearm was unloaded and ammunition was not accessible to the passenger. This would be increased to \$2,000 if ammunition was found.

The fine could be \$2,500 for a loaded firearm and from \$5,000 to \$10,000 if there was an attempt to conceal even an unloaded weapon. If a gun was used along with a threat, the civil penalty could be at least \$10,000 in addition to any punishment that might result from criminal prosecution.

The FAA said 2,773 firearms were detected in airports last year, leading to 1,493 arrests. Farrar said he could not immediately determine how many of the cases had led to successful prosecutions or the size of fines imposed.

Senate to vote on whistle-blower bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate moved Thursday toward expected approval of a whistle-blower bill to increase job protection for federal workers exposing waste, fraud and abuse. A similar measure was vetoed last year by then-President Reagan.

"This bill will help all of us who want to protect the taxpayers' pockets from being picked by wasteful administration," declared Sen. Carl Levin, D-Mich., the chief sponsor.

Senate approval by a wide margin was expected, with prospects good in the House where action could come as early as Tuesday.

The bill would set up an independent special counsel's office to protect federal employees, including whistle-blowers. Currently the office is part of the Merit Systems Protection Board, which enforces the civil service laws.

The bill would make it easier for federal employees to prove that their firing or demotion came in retaliation for whistle-blowing. It also would provide more guarantees of confidentiality.

3 Unisys divisions won't be bidding

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Navy on Thursday suspended three units of Unisys Corp. from bidding on or receiving federal contracts in the latest action stemming from an investigation of alleged defense contract fraud.

The Navy said it was suspending the bidding rights of the Shipboard and Ground Systems Group, the Computer Systems Division and the Communications Systems Division of Unisys, "to protect the government's interests."

Unisys is a computer giant created by the 1986 merger of Sperry Corp. and Burroughs Corp. All three units suspended Thursday were once part of Sperry.

According to latest statistics, Unisys is the nation's 15th largest defense contractor, having received \$1.4 billion in work in fiscal 1988. The Navy's suspension, however, applies to any contract with a federal agency and not just military contracts.

PLO welcomes Baker comments

WASHINGTON (AP) — An official of the PLO on Thursday welcomed what he said were encouraging signs of a new williness by the United States to meet Palestinian demands for a Middle East settlement.

Nabil Shaath, an adviser to Palestine Liberation Organization leader Yasser Arafat, cited remarks made this week by Secretary of State James A. Baker III and other developments.

The last three days show a lot of progress — small progress, but important, significant progress. Many people are so skeptical they are not even willing to see that progress.

"The future is going to come up with all kinds of surprises for all of us — happy surprises," Shaath told reporters at the National Press Club.

U.S. says hackers did little damage

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. government has tentatively concluded that a spy ring of West German computer hackers did not gain access to the types of secrets that would jeopardize America's national security, the Pentagon said Thursday.

Dan Howard, the Defense Department's chief spokesman, said he was not at liberty to discuss the specific computer networks the German hackers penetrated, what they learned in the process and what they passed on to the Warsaw Pact.

But, in breaking two weeks of official silence, Howard said the Defense Department no longer viewed the case as a serious threat to military security.

Based on the information that we have thus far, and this is not complete ... our best judgment is that the computer hackers did not penetrate secure programs," Howard said.

The initial review of evidence assembled by American and West German authorities suggests the spy ring never gained access to the computer systems that contain classified secrets, he continued.

Bush criticizes Anderson's kidnappers

WASHINGTON (AP) — Terry Anderson began his fifth year as a hostage in Lebanon Thursday with the Bush administration calling his detention a "criminal act which serves no cause" and joining his relatives and fellow journalists in demanding his release.

"Enough is enough ... This cannot continue," Peggy Say, Anderson's sister, told a ceremony attended by members of Congress, Anderson's colleagues and relatives of the hostages. Her brother, she said, is "tired of being caged like an animal."

"Our hearts cry out in protest" over Anderson's plight, said Louis D. Boccardi, president of The Associated Press, Anderson's employer.

"It's time for those holding Terry Anderson to release him and to end the unconscionable suffering of an innocent man. Each of us in our own special way should mark this day with contemplation and prayer for Terry's release," Boccardi said in a statement transmitted to The AP's staff.

President Bush, through his spokesman, expressed sympathy for Anderson's family and for those of the eight other American hostages held in Lebanon as State Department officials said they "have not forgotten the hostages."

"The president certainly is concerned about the hostages," said Martin Fitzwater, Bush's spokesman who was in Houston with the president.

Bush: 'More going on than meets the eye'

HOUSTON (AP) — President Bush on Thursday moved to deflect criticism that his administration is off to a slow start, declaring "more is going on than meets the eye."

"In his first trip back to his adopted home state since the inauguration, Bush said he was grappling with 'ticking time bombs that we need to defuse without delay. And we're doing just that.'"

He mentioned the savings and loan industry, burgeoning debt in the Third World and drug abuse in the United States.

Bush said in a luncheon speech that his administration was working on "an American agenda for the long term."

In the speech and a question-and-answer session that followed, Bush also:

—Called on Congress to move more quickly on his plan to shore up troubled savings and loans, saying "there's no excuse for delay."

—Declared himself "very pleased" that the Senate Armed Services Committee had voted approval of his new defense secretary nominee, Rep. Dick Cheney, but also complained anew that his rejected first choice, former Texas Sen. John Tower, was "tried by perception and rumor. That is not the American way."

—Firmly restated his opposition to Democratic-backed efforts to raise the minimum wage to \$4.65 an hour,

saying his own plan for a maximum \$4.25 wage with a lower "training wage" was "my first and last offer."

—Said in regard to the emotional issue of restrictions on semiautomatic weapons, "I do want to find a solution to the so-called AK-47 assault weapon problem — one that protects the rights of the legitimate sportsman but also protects the lives of our police officers who are laying their lives on the line."

Bush spokesman Marlin Fitzwater said the president supports the action Wednesday of Colt Industries to suspend sales to the public of its AR-47 semiautomatic rifle, the civilian version of the military M-16.

"He thinks it's a reasonable move on our part," Fitzwater said.

On Tuesday, the administration announced it would suspend the import of most foreign-made semiautomatic rifles.

In addition to saying he was pursuing his agenda at his own speed, Bush said Thursday he was not going to be forced into moving more quickly in dealings with the Soviet Union.

He said recent changes in the Soviet Union "are profound."

"But we're facing a challenge. We've got to figure it out. We've got to measure Soviet intentions and then move," he said.

On another foreign policy issue, Fitzwater said Bush had decided in principle to go ahead with a proposed

joint venture with the Japanese for the production in Japan of a new version of the F-16 fighter.

However, the spokesman said that Bush must still decide on safeguards to prevent the loss of sensitive technology and that a final decision may not come until next week.

Bush told his audience at the Forum Club in Houston, "I've come

home to Texas to tell you we're hard at work in Washington — and we're making progress."

Later, he was traveling to Colorado Springs, Colo., to address the Junior Achievement National Business Leadership Conference.

Before leaving on his two-day western trip, Bush talked to the Discovery shuttle astronauts.

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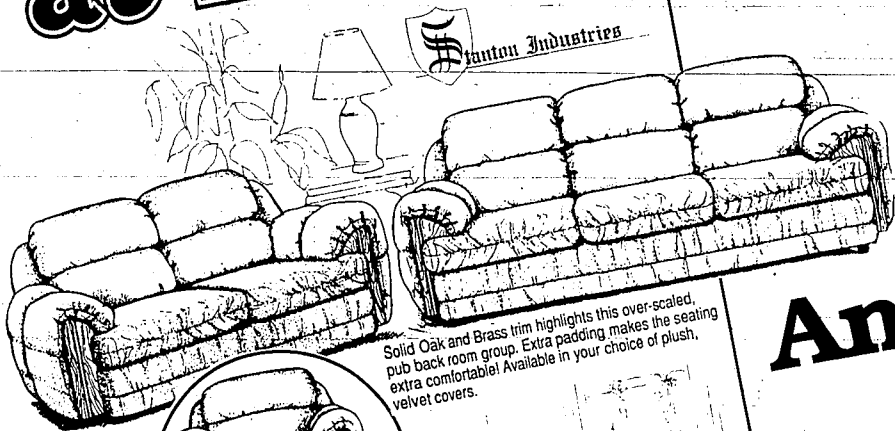
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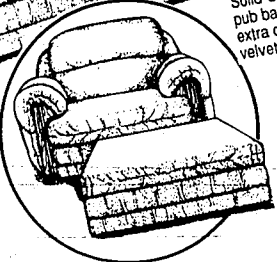
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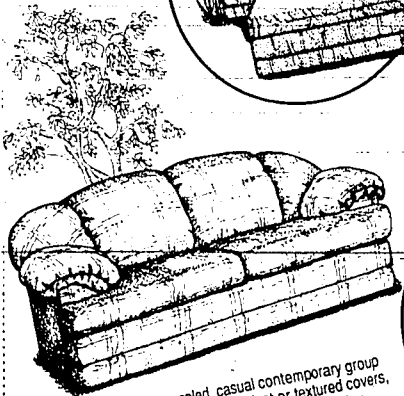
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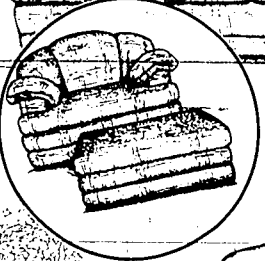
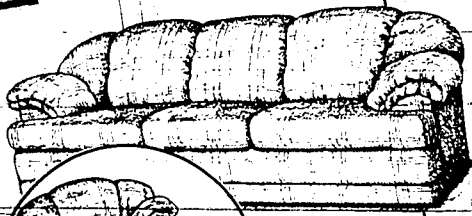
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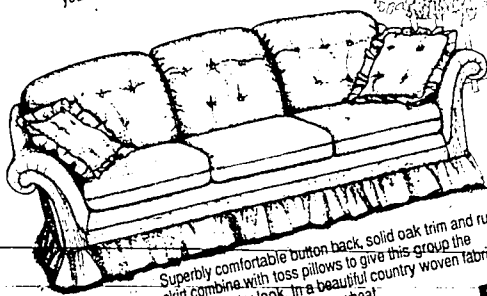


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Spring showers delay early jump on planting season

TWIN FALLS - Spring showers have delayed planting for some Idaho farmers. In the Magic Valley, farmers are moving a little slower than usual, said Bob Vodraskar, Twin Falls County Extension agent. Some years, people start dropping in peas and spring grains around March 15, and sugar beets follow quickly, he said. But this year, the wet weather has prevented a lot of farmers from even getting their field preparation work done.

"It's wetter than it has been the last two years, but it's probably close to normal," he said. "I imagine farmers are champing at the bit to get out there," Vodraskar said. But few are complaining after last year's drought. "I don't see a whole lot of frowns out there in the farming community," said Tim McGreevy, director of the Idaho Barley Commission. "Last year was a very serious year. We drew the reservoir levels real low." Reservoir levels remain slightly below average despite above-average rainfall across much of the state. But, "People are pretty hopeful irrigation levels will be up to

near normal," McGreevy said. Darrell Holz, Canyon County extension agent, said farmers last year began working in the fields as early as February. "Typically, we don't get into the fields until March. If they don't get into the field by the first of April, they'll be getting kind of itchy," he said. Idaho's winter wheat crop is faring better than in other states. "We've had adequate snow cover in this state," McGreevy said. "As far as winter wheat is concerned, we're not in too bad of shape." But farmers in eastern Oregon and

eastern Washington were not as lucky. Strong winds and bitter cold hit the winter wheat crops there particularly hard. Scott Duff, executive assistant of the Oregon Wheat Growers League, said 3,000 to 4,000 acres of winter wheat in Sherman County and perhaps more in Gilliam and Wasco counties were killed by subzero temperatures and lack of a protective snow cover. Now the focus of crop protection is turning toward the Russian wheat aphid, a tiny green insect that attacks cereal crops. The aphid, which invaded Idaho two years ago,

forced many farmers to spray their fields last year to protect their winter wheat crop. University of Idaho scientists plan to survey fields in the next few weeks for aphid infestations. Last year, the aphid population died off in March but came back even stronger in April. Scientists are hoping the aphid will not multiply in such high numbers that they migrate out of winter wheat into spring wheat, since farmers who plant early in April will find the insecticide they spray they will be inactive by mid-May.

Kimberly weather station faces possible closure

TWIN FALLS - The Kimberly Weather Station is slated once again for closure as part of a National Weather Service modernization program announced Wednesday. It would take an act of Congress to save the station. But then, Congress has saved it before. "They've been trying to close this station for a long time," said Bill Galkin, director of the Kimberly station. It has survived through the efforts of local people who have made congressmen see the importance of the local forecasts, particularly to the agricultural sector, he said.

Congressman Richard Stallings has been involved in maintaining the Kimberly station in the past, and he probably will take the same position now, said Charles Barnes, Stallings' Twin Falls office director. The modernization plan would install radar equipment at the Boise and Pocatello stations and close the Kimberly and Lewiston stations sometime after 1991. Patrons of the Kimberly station would get their information from the Boise station. "We'll do a better job of forecasting than we do right now," said Richard Hutcheon, acting regional director in Salt Lake City.

The radar stations would be supplemented by automated weather stations that would gather and electronically transfer data 24 hours a day to the manned stations. The automated stations which will be particularly useful at night, Hutcheon said. These changes in Idaho are part of a plan that officials say will streamline the agency by eliminating more than 100 local offices and reducing the staff by 800 - but producing improved forecasts. The weather service will go from nearly about 250 local offices to just 115 when the changeover is completed about 1995, said Albert W. Friday, the weather service director. At the same time, the modernization program will reduce the agency's staff from 4,700 people to about 3,900, he said.

No local stations will be closed, however, until the weather service assures itself that its ability to provide forecasts and warnings in the affected areas will not be reduced, Friday said. The weather service is depending on new technology to help provide improved forecasts with fewer offices and people, he said. Major components of the new system will be: "The Next Generation Weather Radar, which will provide much more detailed analysis of storms than current radars, which were installed in the 1960s." "The Automated Surface Observing System, which

will replace many of the current weather service offices with computerized stations that continually measure temperature, humidity, rainfall, cloud height, winds, visibility and other factors. These stations will send data now collected by people to central offices for use in writing forecasts. "A supercomputer to be installed at the National Meteorological Center in Camp Springs, Md., which will provide detailed weather forecasts twice a day to local weather service offices, which can then use those forecasts to develop their local forecasts." "The Advance Weather Interactive Processing System, an upgraded computer forecasting system to be installed in all 115 weather forecast offices to be kept open." Friday said that the automated data collection and processing system will first be installed in Kansas, Oklahoma, Nebraska and Colorado and will be expanded to the remainder of the country gradually once it is proven effective. Each office will be staffed by 20 to 25 people, Friday said. He said the elimination of approximately 800 jobs is expected to be done through normal attrition. Friday said at the press conference that the list of the 115 communities expected to have offices when the changeover is completed would be provided to reporters. However, National Weather Service spokesmen later said that the Commerce Department had fixed that plan and the list would not be made public.

Teen mother group looks for new home

TWIN FALLS - Faced with almost certain eviction, the Teen Parent Program's leadership has decided to form a citizens committee to look for a new home for the alternate school. "So far the public has been very supportive of the program, and we anticipate positive responses from the public in helping us find a new place," said Karen Farley, the program's director. The program this year will graduate 10 young women who are either pregnant or already mothers, bringing the program's alumnae count to a dozen. The program helps the young women, who otherwise would have dropped out of school, earn their high school diploma. It also provides some job and child-care training. The program is housed in an old hospital building next door to Magic Valley Regional Medical Center. The Hospital Board has voted to demolish the county-owned brick building to make room for a proposed cancer treatment center. Farley said the program would appreciate any suggestions for a possible site, but she noted that the program's rental money is limited. "We need either a donation of

a building or a very low-rent facility," she said. "Someone might consider it a tax write-off," Farley said. Several options have been suggested already, but none have panned out. If the county commissioners end up acquiring a new office facility larger than the county needs, Farley said, the program might be able to use part of the excess, since the program's students are considered likely candidates for the county's indigent care program, especially those who are pregnant and would not otherwise get prenatal care or training. "We'd really like to know by June where we're going to be," Farley said. "Wherever we go we'll probably have to do some kind of minor repairs and remodeling, and it would be nice to have the summer to do that." Farley said a large house would be ideal for the program. She said the program's supervising consortium concluded the program needs to remain as near to Twin Falls as possible and stressed that the students do their own cleaning and maintenance. The program needs space for about 40 students and 25 children - child care is provided for students' children. • See SCHOOL on Page B2

Rupert receives \$360,000 state block grant

BOISE - Rupert, Lincoln County and King Hill are among 22 Idaho cities and counties to receive community development block grants awarded Thursday. The state awarded almost \$3.2 million in grants, administered by the Idaho Department of Commerce, to improve infrastructure and public facilities.

The largest of the Magic Valley grants - \$360,000 - goes to Rupert to help improve its wastewater treatment system, which has already received \$1.061 million for a total project cost of about \$1.42 million. "We've been trying for this particular grant for three years now," Rupert Public Works Director Eric Peterson said. Rupert occasionally has had to dump partially treated sewage in the

Snake River due to the limited capacity of its plant. The improvements will "eliminate that need," Peterson said. The new grant funds will pay for new equipment at the plant to improve the efficiency of the treatment process and slightly increase the plant's capacity. Peterson said. The \$1.061 million will pay for more pumps to increase efficiency, some additional pipes and more

sprinkler systems at farms that receive the town's treated sewage. The project should be completed this year, Peterson said. The Lincoln County Housing Authority received \$23,500 to roof and paint the outside of a number of low-to moderate-income homes for the handicapped and the elderly. The housing authority operates 18 apartments in Shoshone and eight in Richfield, all which will receive the • See GRANTS on Page B2

United Way lists alleged embezzlement losses

TWIN FALLS - About \$9,700 is missing from United Way coffers, according to documents filed in an embezzlement case against a former employee. But the lawyer for the former employee, Paula Bivens of Filer, says Bivens denies any guilt. "She denies taking any of it," Twin Falls attorney Jay Sudweeks said Thursday. United Way listed losses of \$9,600 in cash and checks, \$90 in coins, \$419 in penalties to the Internal Revenue Service "due to the loss of an issued check," and \$2,000 for an audit due to the

alleged embezzlement. Twin Falls County prosecutors, however, have charged Bivens with stealing only \$3,240. Kathy Williams, United Way executive director, outlined the organization's alleged losses on a victim's rights form filed recently in Bivens' court file. Victims have the right in Idaho to ask the court to notify them of hearings and also to list alleged losses so judges can order restitution after conviction. Sudweeks, although he hasn't seen Williams' document, said the document doesn't prove United Way suffered that great a loss. "Bivens worked for about five months last year as a secretary and bookkeeper for United Way of

Magic Valley. She is charged with four counts of forgery and two counts of grand theft, all stemming from alleged alterations of checks. Williams didn't return phone calls Thursday, but United Way spokesman Fritz Wondrich said he thought Williams' estimate "is close to the organization's loss." Filing the form is part of a process by which the United Way is working to prove its losses to its insurance company, Wondrich said. Bivens is charged with altering two of her paychecks to add \$100 to each, leading to two forgery charges. Prosecutors also charged her with pasting opaque labels over endorsements on

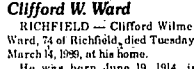

Avalanche hazard diminishes with cold

TWIN FALLS — The return of colder temperatures to the Sawtooth National Forest this week has helped reduce the avalanche hazard.

With the forecast of continued below-normal temperatures and snow showers over the next few days, the danger is expected to remain low at all elevations, according to the U.S. Forest Service. However, since conditions change quickly, back-country travelers should check the 24-hour information number at the Ketchum Ranger District before venturing over roads or designated trails. This number, 208-622-8027, is updated at 7:30 a.m. daily with current avalanche hazard rating, weather forecast and snow conditions.

The Ketchum Ranger District has closed the Warm Springs Road at the upper end of lower Board Ranch. This annual closure is aimed at

reducing road damage during wet weather.

Six to eight inches of new snow has fallen on the Sawtooth National Recreation Area over the past few days, improving slope and trail conditions for skiing and snowmobiling. There is one foot of base in Stanley with a 5-foot base on Banner Summit. Snow depths on the Sawtooth National Recreation Area range from 60 inches on top of Galena Summit to 33 inches at North Fork.

Sun Valley Co. reports 70 inches on top of Mount Baldy, with 57 inches at mid-level. Soldier-Mountain-Ski Area is at 60-inch base.

The Twin Falls Ranger District reports a snow depth of 50 inches at Rock Creek Guard Station. Magic Mountain Ski Resort has 70 inches of snow on top with 61 inches at the lodge. Pomerelle Ski Area has

received eight inches of new snow, bringing the top base to 114 inches.

At Craters of the Moon, meanwhile, wintry conditions still prevail. The two to three feet of snow covering the monument is expected to last for another month, said Superintendent Bob Scott of the National Park Service.

"The loop road and the trails are not expected to be opened until late April," he said.

For now, only cross-country skiers can travel into the area. Skiing is best early in the morning when temperatures are still low.

"If temperatures continue to warm up over the next couple of weeks, skiing conditions will quickly deteriorate," Scott said.

Skiers are advised to call 208-527-3257 for updated information on the craters area.

INEL official bemoans public relations

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Years of groundwater research at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory have uncovered only very small waste discharges, but officials still battle a credibility problem on water quality, an INEL hydrologist says. "These issues have been addressed time and time again," said Jack Barracough, a scientific specialist with EG&G Idaho Inc. and a former research project chief for the U.S. Geological Survey at the INEL. "It's a triumph of science and a failure of public relations."

Barracough said Wednesday that there has been a "workmanlike effort" to collect, analyze and report water quality data at the site dating back to the early days of the U.S. Department of Energy nuclear facility.

"The research has been objective, Barracough said. For example, a 1976 study of underground waste

storage predicted there could be waste migration from the area. While that conclusion was "very unpopular," he said, it showed the honesty and the objectivity of the research.

The INEL's research on water quality is available, but there remains a public perception that the data is a "whitewash," and opponents of INEL defense projects may try to force waste unnecessary waste cleanup to divert money from weapons projects, Barracough said.

But as well-monitored as the INEL is, he said he could see the value of independent oversight. "If it can change public perception, it's worth the money."

The existing INEL research shows very low groundwater contamination levels, with some areas showing a decrease.

"We don't want to pollute any more than we have, and fortunately

everything is looking better," Barracough said.

In 1982, a tritium reading of 3,400 picocuries per milliliter — slightly above the drinking water standards of the time — was found at one INEL well. The level there has since dropped to 4.7 picocuries per milliliter, well below the current drinking water standard of 20 picocuries per milliliter, Barracough said.

INEL wells south of U.S. Highway 20 have turned up no tritium readings above 6 picocuries per milliliter.

Tritium discharges from INEL facilities, like the Naval Reactors Facility, have decreased, he said. Tritium also decays fairly rapidly, and water moves slowly through the huge Snake River Plain Aquifer.

By the year 2000, tritium readings may extend to three miles south of the INEL's boundaries.

USFS employee wants firefighter stamp

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — A U.S. Forest Service employee in Coeur d'Alene is trying to get the U.S. Postal Service to publish a stamp honoring the men and women who fight wildfires.

Dennis Bergem, a former firefighter who now works in timber stand management in the Fernan

Ranger District, said he began the project last summer after a friend died fighting a fire in Montana.

Although his idea has received endorsements from Sen. James McClure, R-Idaho, and forest and natural resource officials in Northwest states, Bergem said Wednesday that he has yet to get the

attention of postal officials.

"He said he might have a chance of getting the Postal Service to move more quickly in accepting the 25-cent stamp if people write letters in support of the idea."

"What I'm looking for right now is support for the idea from people," he said.

The Idaho Economic Advisory Council reviewed grant applications earlier this week and made recommendations. The council is a six-member advisory board to the Department of Commerce, appointed by the governor.

Watchdog group accuses Air Force of hiding plans

WASHINGTON (AP) — The watchdog group Downwinders has obtained a document it says suggests the Air Force may not have been totally open with Utah officials about plans for an "electronic combat range" in the western desert.

Downwinders spokesman Steve Erickson says the 84-page, unclassified document dated April 1988 indicates the range would be larger than previously thought and that its presence would involve more traffic at Hill Air Force Base.

He said the document also indicates there would be a substantial increase in supersonic night flights and some

testing of live ordnance.

Erickson claims the document supports the Downwinder view that the Air Force is "trying to railroad its plans through without consideration of what the public wants, and its studies are designed only to justify decisions it has already made."

Bud Scruggs, chief of staff for Gov. Norm Bangert, said the state has not yet seen the report and is concerned about the Air Force's commitment to involve the state and citizens in every step of deciding whether to build the project.

"We expect the Air Force to be a good citizen and to comply with our

commitments. If not, we want to know why," he said.

Erickson said Downwinders had sought information about the range, which would simulate the heavy concentration of electromagnetic signals during battle, by a request made under the Freedom of Information Act.

However, he said, the Air Force had not yet supplied the information and the group obtained the document from "a man who didn't say how he got it, and I didn't ask."

The Desert News made a Freedom of Information Act request last November for similar documents. The Air Force said in January it had complied fully,

but the newspaper never received the detailed information obtained by Downwinders.

Lt. Col. Thomas J. Bartol, who handles FOI requests and is director of the programs and environmental division at Norton Air Force Base, Calif., said the document hadn't been released because it still was in draft form.

"We normally don't release them until they are in final form," he said. "Many changes occur during the draft process."

Erickson, however, contends the document is "an accurate reflection of current planning" and justifies the proposed action at the Utah Test and Training Range as "the best alternative."

"How can the public be involved in the process if it doesn't know what criteria has been used to select Utah as the site, and exactly what is planned and where," he said.

Bartol said the Air Force would respond within days to the Downwinders' claim that the service is not being as open with its plans as it should.

According to the document, 23 sites were considered for the electronic battlefield and eight were named as finalists. Of the other sites, three are in Nevada, two in California and each in New Mexico and Florida.



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Rebels run over Idaho

BOISE — Moses Scurry growled and the University of Idaho Vandals flinched.

Nevada-Las Vegas unleashed a voracious defense and decisive rebounding power Thursday and pulled away from the Big Sky Conference champion Vandals 68-55 in front of 12,241 Pavilion basketball fans in the opening round of the NCAA West Regional tournament.

"They just don't let you have anything cheap," lamented Kermit Davis, Idaho's 29-year-old first-year head coach. "They make it tough on you."

Tough, as in 38 percent field goal shooting by the Vandals. Nevada-Las Vegas, which raced into sports prominence as the Runnin' Rebels, beats you with defense.

"We started off very cold and tentatively," said UNLV coach Larry Hankman, who as is his habit could barely stand to watch as Idaho bogged to a 14-8 lead. "I thought our defense kept us in the game until we got something going offensively."

Scurry is the animated power forward whose emergence as a starter has been the key to Nevada-Las Vegas' mounting momentum. His 14 rebounds and 10 points on the inside — to say nothing of his primal screams when he descended to the floor with a rebound — crumpled Idaho.

Scurry, asked why he hollers, said "it's a little intimidation for the other guys. They know the next time not to come near me."

UNLV's interior trio of Scurry, David Butler and George Ackles was more than the Vandals could handle. Only post Riley Smith, with 20 points on 9-for-13 shooting and six rebounds, was much of a presence for the Vandals.

"We got the ball in where we usu-

ally make baskets," Davis said. "But now you've got a 6-10 guy on your back. I think their size and athleticism denied us some baskets we would ordinarily get."

Forward James Fitch did manage 14 points for Idaho, but nine of them came in the last five minutes and six seconds after the Rebels' win was secure.

"They're very physical inside with Moses and Scurry, Butler and Ackles, and they're great athletes," Idaho's Smith said.

Until the last third of the first half, Idaho played the only kind of game that could beat Vegas — a relatively slow offensive tempo with an exceptional rebounding effort and care of the basketball.

"Really, the game unfolded the way we wanted to get it," Davis said.

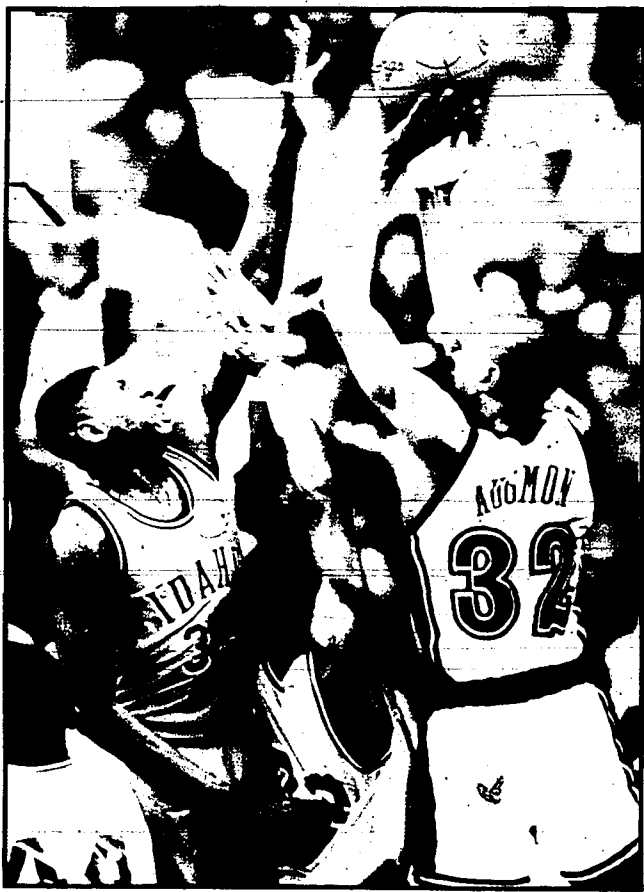
Rebels' guard Greg Anthony said, "We were frustrating ourselves with the tempo of the game because we were not pressing the issue."

Soon, though, UNLV's Olympian forward Stacey Augmon, vaulted for defense, started asserting his offense.

He hit 12 of his 17 points in the last 4:42 of the first half as the Rebels shot from a four-point deficit to a five-point advantage.

Idaho finished the season with a 25-6 record, while 15th-ranked UNLV advances to meet the winner of Thursday's late Memphis State-DePaul game in the second round here Saturday.

STILLWATER, Okla. — If Boise State University basketball coach Bobby Dye is whistling in the dark, maybe he's whistling "I'll Take Manhattan."

"There are 64 teams in the NCAA tournament, and by Sunday there will only be 16 left," explained Dye on the eve of his team's first-round game against Oklahoma State in the

National Invitation Tournament. "If we win Friday — and it will be tough — we have a chance to play one and maybe two games at home. If we win those games, we'll be in New York."

New York is the site of the NIT semifinals and finals.

Dye, of course, was trying to put the best face on the Broncos' narrow miss of the NCAA tournament, which came in the wake of a homecourt tussle to Idaho in the Big Sky Conference championship game last Saturday.

But the Vandals were dispatched by Nevada-Las Vegas in the first round of the NCAA tournament in Boise Thursday, leaving the possibility that Dye indeed may have the last laugh.

Tipoff time is 6:30 p.m. MST. Boise TV station KTVB, channels 7 and 38 in the Magic Valley, will broadcast it live.

"It's like an overtime game," said Dye. "You go into the last few minutes expecting to win, and when the other team ties it, you let down. You

have to get yourself back up in the overtime."

All of which may or may not make a difference against Oklahoma State, the fourth-best team in the Big Eight Conference, which is absolutely lethal in Gallagher-Iba Arena and absolutely terrible away from it.

"I think every game is different," shrugged Oklahoma State coach Leonard Hamilton, who booted his leading scorer, forward Richard Dumas, earlier this week when Dumas

entered a substance abuse program. "You never need to be taking your opponent for granted because you are playing at home. This team is very well tested and we need to give them all the respect we give to teams playing in the Big Eight."

The Cowboys are 14-for-15 in Stillwater this season and 2-for-13 away from it.

"We've got as tough an assignment as anybody in the NIT does," said

It doesn't take a fortune to find art, experts say

SUN VALLEY — Good news. You don't have to have a fortune sitting in your bank account in order to collect fine art.

And what you do collect doesn't have to be a Matisse, a Jasper Johns or a Richard Diebenkorn. What's important, is that you love it.

That was the advice offered by a panel of six experts in the art world, experts who in some form or another have ties to Idaho, a state that has not yet been recognized as a great art center of the country, but which may be carving a niche one gallery, one artist at a time. In fact, a list of 100 prominent art collectors in the United States published in this month's issue of *Arts and Antiques* magazine reports that 10 of these

collectors reside in Sun Valley or have some association with the area.

A well-attended art symposium on "Alternative Values in Art Collecting," sponsored by the Sun Valley Center for the Arts and Humanities last week generated a wide range of reasons to collect art, least important of which was to collect art as an investment for the possibility of financial gain.

"If you approach the collection of art because you really love it, sometimes it turns into a monetary windfall," said Henry Hopkins, an Idaho native who is the former director of the San Francisco Museum of Modern Art and current director of the Fred R. Weisman Foundation in Los Angeles. However, Hopkins is quick to add, "that maybe it won't provide that windfall you're hoping for."

While it is often difficult for young people to collect art because the expense is too great, Hopkins said there are still ways to acquire fine works.

But he cautions not to spend more on art than you can afford to spend on a luxury.

He also advises not to buy art for the "name," but to buy art because you like it. "There's art to be bought for \$50 as well as \$5 million," he said.

Glenn Janss, Sun Valley art collector and moderator of the symposium, encouraged people to begin collecting at whatever level they can afford, urging them to use their eyes, their own intuition, and to buy what they really fall in love with. Prints are a good choice, she said, and many fall within the \$200-\$300 price range.

Among the many reasons for collecting art, other than for investment purposes, are for the aesthetic value or pure enjoyment for a piece, to decorate a home, to give the owner image or status, or to provide mental stimulation, personal satisfaction, perhaps a historical perspective or even for the novelty of an art piece, Janss said.

So what is the difference between decorating your home with artwork and collecting art? Doesn't the artwork grace the walls whichever way you look at them?

Dennis O'Leary, director of the Boise Art Museum summed it up this way, "Decoration fills a vertical void and a collection fills a spiritual void."

O'Leary also emphasized the role of his museum in collecting and preserving the legacy of Idaho artists.

He encourages collectors to take a look around them at the really fine artists Idaho has to offer before they look elsewhere to purchase art.

Art dealer Denis Ochi, who recently opened an art gallery in Warm Springs, said having a piece of art around you for awhile will help establish a "visual literacy which will give you something back and will enrich your life." That's what collecting art is really all about, he said.

Indian artifact specialist Paul Raczka agrees. He said an alternative value in collecting art is experienced when the owner makes emotional contact with a piece.

"You appreciate it. You love it. You couldn't care less what your friends think about it. It reaches out and grabs you," Raczka said. "And art, above all, is beauty."

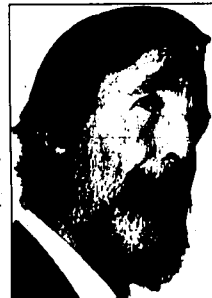
Underground environmental hero Edward Abbey, 62, dies

Edward Abbey, the irreverent writer and impassioned environmentalist whose popular books perpetuated their author's dream of seeing "the whole American West made into a wilderness," has died in Tucson, Ariz.

The man dubbed "the Thoreau of the American West" by "Lonesome Dove" author Larry McMurtry died Tuesday at his home at age 62 of internal bleeding "caused by a circulatory disorder," said Jack Macrae, a friend who also is editor-in-chief of Henry Holt and Co., Abbey's publisher.

Abbey recently had completed a draft of "Hayduke Lives," a sequel to his best-known book, "The Monkey Wrench Gang," which told of a group of environmentalists plotting to blow up Arizona's Glen Canyon Dam.

Hundreds of thousands of paperback copies of "The Monkey Wrench Gang" were sold after its

publication in 1976, making Abbey a sort of underground hero to the environmental movement.

His writings have been credited by founders of Earth First!, a hard-line environmental group, with providing the underpinnings of their philosophy.

"Hayduke Lives" would be the one-time park ranger's, firefighter's and political radical's 20th book.

The renegade outdoorsman, who once said there was nothing wrong with throwing beer cans out car windows since paved roads were abominations and unworthy of respect, had grown to hate the survey stakes, aircraft and golf courses that marred his once pristine desert landscape.

Anthologists refer to him as "irascible," "cantankerous," "iconoclastic and crusty."

Abbey himself resisted simple

Ed Abbey is dead.

He was one of the few writers involved in environmental pursuits who would listen to this redneck as she bounced philosophies around trying to understand and reconcile positions and paranoia when it appeared that her life-style in the rural west was threatened.

Ed was patient and encouraged the best in me as a writer and editor. His criticism of "The Redneck Review," my baby, was valued and continues to be assimilated into the magazine's goals. "Redneck" is not an environmental political publication, but a literary magazine, devoted to artistic works and critical assessments of same. Ed taught me that seemingly opposing sides very often seek the same ends, that ability to listen is the most valuable asset and talent a writer/editor can possess.

I believe Edward Abbey was a compassionate man entrenched with a violent love of these fragile remarkable western American spaces. His works have

become classics within his lifetime: "Desert Solitaire," a warm and musical account of his years as a National Park ranger in Arches National Monument; "The Monkey Wrench Gang," a novel advocating environmental sabotage, which maintains it is man's duty to protect his home by whatever means are necessary.

Two of Abbey's novels have become movies: "Lonely are the Brave" and "Fire on the Mountain." His numerous essays indicate both a refined craftsmanship and good sense that cuts through singular allegiances in which various interest groups have sought to pigeonhole him.

He was a friend. I have important memories centering around a vivid correspondence, of my threatening to run him through a calf chute in a letter-to-the-editor exchange in Northern Lights magazine. I recall with pleasure our meeting at the Western Literature Association in Durango, Colo., in 1987, when he yelled across the hotel cafe, "So you're the one!" and gave me an affectionate hug. And I recall a picnic up a canyon near Moab, Utah, with him and Clarke and their kids and mine. The kids playing in the red dirt, Clarke settling the new baby. Ed cooking burgers, the deep sandstone canyon walls surrounding us. Edward Abbey country.

I will miss him. The ornery desert rat is dead; long live the desert!

Nurses dislike image portrayed in new show Foreign film fest continues

BOSTON — "Nightingales," a new television show on the private lives of student nurses, is an "offensive tale about little sex kittens" running around in their underwear, according to some angry real-life nurses.

"Why don't they just go ahead and do a show about lingerie models instead," Carol Grimaldi, spokeswoman for the American Nurses Association, said Tuesday.

The Kansas City-based organization is encouraging nurses to write to NBC to protest the show and is distributing a list of the show's advertisers to its 186,000 members in efforts to widen the campaign, Grimaldi said.

"We do not want this type of image on TV. You're reducing nurses to a bunch of sluts," said Dorothy Lunewski, an instructor at Framingham

Union Hospital School of Nursing.

Local nurses contacted by The Times-News this week were less caustic in their criticism. Some said "Nightingales" is okay as far as entertainment goes, but few agree the show offers a realistic portrayal of nurses or nursing.

"Nightingales is a form of entertainment to appeal to television watchers who like excitement," said Mary Jane Draney, a critical care nurse at Magic Valley Regional Medical Center and an instructor in associate degree nursing program at the College of Southern Idaho. Draney said the most damaging thing about the show is its "shallow approach." She said she worries about public perceptions, especially at a time when nursing shortages have reached crisis proportions.

"I don't think the show explores the depth of character or depth of responsibility that's required to be a nurse today," Draney said. "Nursing is a

passionate, caring, involved field that goes far beyond entertainment."

Debi Bradley, a registered nurse at MVRMC, called the show "unrealistic" and "probably outdated."

Nurses have been upset with their small-screen portrayals before, including "China Beach," a story of Vietnam nurses, but reaction to "Nightingales" far outweighs previous rages, said Lynette Aznarburton, spokeswoman for the Massachusetts Nursing Association.

The show, produced by "Charlie's Angels" creator Aaron Spelling, is his first offering on NBC since his longtime contract with ABC expired. It has broadcast at 9 p.m. MST on Wednesdays and has performed well against its competition of CBS' "Wiseguy," and ABC's "China Beach." Last week, it was pre-empted by a news special.

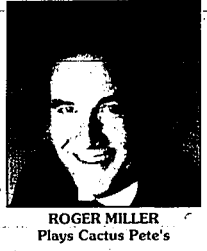

Supporters press for James Brown's early release

COLUMBIA, S.C. (AP) - While inmates James Brown works with a prison choir, the voices of supporters trying to win early release for the "Godfather of Soul" ring loud across the country.

Jesse Jackson urges compassion for Brown, who is serving a six-year prison sentence for trying to run over two police officers during a two-state chase last fall.

New York activist Al Sharpton vows nationwide rallies on May 3 - Brown's 56th birthday - to draw attention to the soul singer's plight; while a record by Los Angeles songwriter-producer team proclaims: "Free James Brown, the man has too much soul."

The fight to free the soul singer even went galactic this week when NASA's Mission Control in Houston awakened the space shuttle Discovery's five astronauts with shouts of "I Feel Good" from Brown's smash 1960s hit, "I Got You (I Feel Good)."

"In a strange way, I think the fact that James Brown is now in outer space... simply heightens the case to a global awareness," Jackson said in a telephone interview this week from Los Angeles.

But the campaign to free Brown has not persuaded South Carolina corrections officials to move up Brown's parole eligibility date from May 12, 1991.

In fact, one of Brown's attorneys fears such attention will only hurt "The Hardest Working Man in Show Business" when he appears in state court in Aiken at a probation revocation hearing Friday.

"Any kind of publicity hurts Mr. Brown with regard to his criminal trouble," defense attorney Billy Weeks said. "It might help his record albums but it hurts him in court. It puts pressure on the judge to be a little bit harsher."

Corrections officials requested the hearing after Brown allegedly tested positive for marijuana and PCP in December. Brown was put on probation after his conviction last July for resisting arrest and carrying a pistol; random drug testing is one probation provision.

He has been incarcerated at the State Park Correctional Institute near Columbia since Dec. 29 after a conviction stemming from an unrelated wild car chase with authorities from South Carolina and Georgia on Sept. 2. Tests showed Brown had PCP in his system when he was arrested.

Brown also is scheduled to appear in court in North Augusta in mid-April on a charge of driving under the influence.

The soul singer works as a kitchen aide at the state prison helping to serve and prepare meals for 150 inmates. In his spare time, he sings with the choir and composes on a laptop keyboard, said state Department of Corrections spokesman Francis Archibald.

Brown did not respond to a letter from The Associated Press requesting an interview.

As the singer's legal odyssey unfolds, supporters try to win his freedom, with little success. Brown himself rejected a suggestion that he take a work-release job with the music department at Allen University in Columbia.

"He respectfully declined and thanked us for helping him," said state Sen. Kay Patterson. "His feeling was that reporters would hound him... and he doesn't want that."

Still, Brown's supporters will not be silenced.

Los Angeles record producer Ron Deutschendorf and songwriter Robert Lusson cut a single, "Free James Brown," last month, citing the singer as an influence in their careers.

"We feel that not only the people of this country but James would be better served if he was put in a rehabilitation center, instead of another person being supported in prison by the state," Deutschendorf said in a telephone interview.

In February, Jackson met with Brown in Columbia and appeared before the state parole board on Brown's behalf on March 8.

"There is concern because he means a lot to others," Jackson said. "Obviously... James has some problems. We want to help him work through those problems so he won't repeat the same offense."

Sharpton said he will organize rallies in Columbia, New York, Atlanta, Miami, Chicago and Los Angeles on Brown's birthday "to protest his unjust imprisonment."

Despite his legal problems, Brown's career is hardly faltering. An album he recorded in December with Aretha Franklin before his conviction is to be released in the coming weeks. Cinemax is broadcasting on cable television Brown's November concert tour in Italy.

And Brown's album, "I'm Real," released in August, is selling well, said Johnny Musso, president of Scotti Brothers, Brown's Santa Monica, Calif., record label.

"We don't think this (Brown's conviction) has hurt him at all," Musso said.

Peck to accept lifetime achievement award

He's still in touch with Scout, he still remembers the time John Huston tried to kill him for laughs and he's the latest recipient of the American Film Institute Life Achievement Award.

Gregory Peck, Oscar winner for his portrayal of Atticus Finch in "To Kill A Mockingbird," four-time nominee for other work and accomplished film executive, receives the AFI award Tuesday night on NBC, amid a bounty of film clips of his work and the personal plaques befitting one of Hollywood's last exponents of dignity.

"This is, I suppose, the most prestigious of the many awards," said Peck at a Los Angeles press conference. "And one has to accept a thing like this certainly with a good deal of humility. And in my case, with a good deal of surprise."

Peck, who received Oscar nominations for his work in "Keys of the Kingdom," "The Yearling," "Gentleman's Agreement" and "Twelve O'Clock High," and was an executive behind the camera as well as such movies as "Pork Chop Hill," "The Big Country" and "The Guns of Navarone," need not be surprised.

The film that has probably lingered longest with most movie and Peck fans is "Mockingbird," the 1962 adaptation of Harper Lee's novel, in which Peck plays a Southern lawyer who defends a black man accused of rape.

It has lingered with Peck, too. He's still in touch with the former Mary Badham, who played his daughter Scout. "She lives outside of Richmond, Virginia," said Peck. "She

has a farm and a nice husband and a couple of kids. And we keep in touch. I talked to her not long ago, always on holidays, and see her now and then."

Some critics thought Peck wasn't right for the role of Ahab in the Huston version of Herman Melville's "Moby Dick." But for Peck it was a highly memorable film, bringing to mind the time Huston, who got a charge out of challenging actors, left Peck lashed to the side of the fake rubber Moby, bobbing and rolling behind a tow launch in the Irish Sea.

"Huston controlled the rotor mechanism," recalled Peck. "And he was alongside in a camera boat. And there was one time when I really thought he was going to do me in. I think I was underwater maybe a minute. But it seemed like 10 minutes."

Rexburg Folk Dance Festival to go on without founder Smith

REXBURG (AP) - The Rexburg International Folk Dance Festival will go on this summer, but without the support of its founder, Bob Smith of Rexburg.

Smith said he has withdrawn his support from the event and resigned as special director of the Rexburg Chamber of Commerce because of philosophical differences with the chamber's festival committee.

He objects to the committee's decision to withdraw its invitation to host the annual world conference of the International Organization of Folk Art (known as IOV, for its German name) in 1990.

IOV officials had already accepted the invitation; signed by community leaders, the chamber president and the festival committee chairman Randy Schwendiman.

Schwendiman said the chamber was not in a position to take on the dance festival and the IOV conference, which would have been going on at the same time.

"We didn't feel like we had the financial resources or the housing to host both," he said.

There were also concerns about a report that the IOV had \$50,000 in unpaid debts left after its conference was held in Greece last year.

Smith, an executive board member of the IOV's world council, said the debts belonged to the organization that sponsored the conference, not the IOV, and that the same town has invited the IOV back for a future meeting.

The break came after more than two years of disagreement with the festival committee, Smith said. After

the first festival was held in the summer of 1986, Smith said he received a letter from the chamber thanking him for his efforts and notifying him his services as chairman would no longer be needed.

"If you can't even have peace and friendship within your committee, how can you maintain it in the other levels of the event?" Smith said.

The main purpose of the dance festival should be foster peace, he said. Economic benefits to the community "will come as a byproduct."

Schwendiman said the committee is still working enthusiastically on the 1989 festival.

summations, even those calling him environmentalist or naturalist. "If a label is required," he once wrote, "say that I am one who loves the unfenced country."

Despite the fact that he found himself "getting more radical as I get older," as he told the Los Angeles Times last year, he was not without a sense of humor.

Two years ago Outside magazine asked Abbey for an almanac of the high and low points of the 1975-85 decade.

Under "Low Point" he wrote: "Beef ranchers in Montana and Wyoming harvest 155 'troublesome' grizzlies."

The "High Point" read: "Grizzlies in Montana and Wyoming harvest 22 'troublesome' tourists."

In "One Life at a Time Please" he offered essays guaranteed to offend everyone he touched. Cattlemen were "nothing more than Western parasites." Recent arrivals to the West were "instant rednecks."

But Abbey represented far more than the wise-cracking one-time farm boy he was.

In a review of "Desert Solitaire," Pulitzer Prize-winning author Edwin Way Teale noted that Abbey's work as a park ranger had brought him to the wilderness before the invasion of the parked trailers, their windows blue tinged at night while the inmates, instead of watching the desert stars, watch TV and listen to the canned laughter of Hollywood.

He called Abbey "a voice crying in the wilderness, for the wilderness." Abbey was born on a small farm in

Appalachia and after a stint in the Army hitchhiked West in 1946. He studied English and philosophy at the University of New Mexico and turned to writing while supporting himself at odd jobs.

He worked off and on for both the National Park Service and the Forest Service, as a road inspector, auto assembly-line worker and ditch digger.

"I pondered survey stakes before I ever got the notion to pull them out," he told The Times in 1988.

Although he became a champion of the outdoors, he was not one to rhapsodize its qualities.

He faulted writers "gushing about finding God in every bush."

"I sat on a rock in New Mexico once," he said, "trying to have a vision. The only vision I had was of baked chicken."

Abbey's most recent novel, "The Fool's Progress" was published late last year. His other books included "Good News," a futuristic novel about life in America; "The Journey Home," "Down the River," "Beyond the Wall" and "Abbey's Road."

For years he had lived in the Sonora desert in a modest home with a chain-link fence enclosing a stand of palms.

His writing studio stood out back, ringed by the toys that were testament to the children who lived there (he and his wife had two, and he had three from four previous marriages.)

Known not at all for his religious beliefs, he wrote what could only be called an invocation in his "Desert

Solitaire," a 1968 book he said was inspired by "two seamless perfect seasons" with the Arches Park Service in Utah.

"May your trails be crooked, winding, lonesome, dangerous, leading to the most amazing view."

"May your rivers ... meander through pastoral valleys tinkling with bells, past temples and castles and poets' towers into a dark primeval forest where tigers belch and monkeys howl."

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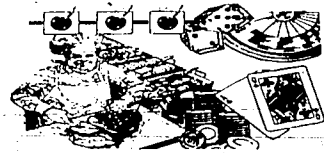
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'Verses' publisher allows book excerpt

WASHINGTON (AP) — The publisher of Salman Rushdie's "The Satanic Verses" agreed Wednesday to allow newspapers to publish up to 750 words of the novel in an attempt to let readers judge the controversy that has touched off Muslim vows of vengeance against the author.

The American Society of Newspaper Editors had suggested that the publisher, Viking Penguin Inc., make more of the book available for publication.

Normally, publishers permit the publication of no more than 300 words from a copyrighted work, usually in a book review.

But Viking agreed that up to 750 words could be published by newspapers as long as they give a proper copyright and credit notice and on the additional condition that the material always be put into proper context as to the overall meaning of the novel, according to an announcement by Viking and ASNE.

The passages were selected by ASNE.

ASNE President John Seigenthaler, publisher of the Nashville Tennessean and editorial director of USA Today, said: "We approached Viking with the idea that 750 words would give editors an opportunity to present passages of the book in the space of an op-ed column. After extensive discussions, they have concurred."

Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini, the spiritual leader of Iran, said last

month that Rushdie's book insulted Moslems and said Moslems everywhere should seek out and kill the author for committing unforgiving sins against the religion.

Rushdie, a Briton who was born a Moslem, went into hiding, and Khomeini's action touched off a worldwide reaction.

It has been denounced throughout the West as a threat to freedom of expression and a violation of the rules of civility.

An excerpt from the controversial 'Satanic Verses'

WASHINGTON (AP) — Here an excerpt from "The Satanic Verses," written by Salman Rushdie, that was released Wednesday for newspaper publication under an agreement between the publisher, Viking Penguin Inc., and the American Society of Newspaper Editors.

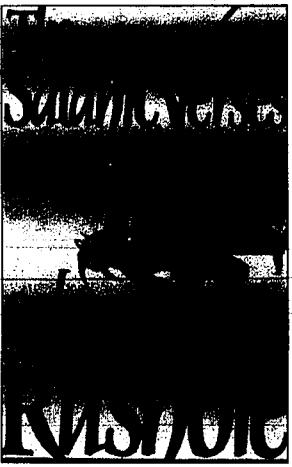
The passage selected by ASNE and is copyrighted by Viking Penguin. The material before the quoted passage is commentary by ASNE.

Much of the controversy about "The Satanic Verses" relates to the contention by Muslim groups that the author is questioning the validity of Muhammad's revelations.

In one key passage, a scribe (whose name, like the author's, is Salman) confides to a pagan poet, Bani, some details of a dream that has ruined Salman's faith. To understand the meaning of the dream, the reader needs to identify other names the scribe refers to: Mahound is the prophet Muhammad, Gibrel is the Archangel Gabriel, and Shaitan is Satan.

The following is an excerpt from the passage that appears on pages 367 and 368 of "The Satanic Verses":

"One night the Persian scribe had a dream in which he was hovering above the figure of Mahound at the Prophet's cave on Mount Come. At first Salman took this to be no more than a nostalgic reverie of the old days in Jahilia, but then it struck him that his point of view, in the dream, had been that of the archangel, and at that moment the memory of the incident of the Satanic verses came back to him as vividly as if the thing had happened the previous day. 'Maybe I hadn't dreamed of myself as Gibrel,' Salman recounted. 'Maybe I was Shaitan.' The realization of this



possibility gave him his diabolic idea. After that, when he sat at the Prophet's feet, writing down rules rules rules, he began, surreptitiously, to change things.

"Little things at first. If Mahound recited a

verse in which God was described as all-hearing, all-knowing, I would write, all-knowing, all-wise. Here's the point: Mahound did not notice the alterations. So there I was, actually writing the book, or rewriting, anyway, polluting the word of God with my own profane language. But, good heavens, if my poor words could not be distinguished from the Revelation by God's own Messenger, then what did that mean? What did that say about the divine quality of the divine poetry? Look, I swear, I was shaken to my soul. It's one thing to be a smart bastard and have half-suspicions about funny business, but it's quite another thing to find out that you're right. Listen: I changed my life for that man. I left my country, crossed the world, settled among people who thought me a slimy foreign coward for saving their, who never appreciated what I, but never mind that. The truth is that what I expected when I made that first tiny change, all-wise instead of all-hearing — what I wanted — was to read it back to the Prophet, and he's say, 'What's the matter with you, Salman, are you going deaf? And I'd say, 'Oops, O God, bit of a slip, how could I, and correct myself. But it didn't happen; and now I was writing the Revelation and nobody was noticing, and I didn't have the courage to own up. I was scared silly, I can tell you. Also: I was sadder than I have ever been. So I had to go on doing it. Maybe he's just missed out once, I thought, anybody can make a mistake. So the next time I changed a bigger thing. He said Christian, I wrote down Jew. He'd notice that, surely, how could he not? But when I read him the chapter he nodded and thanked me politely, and I went out of his tent with tears in my eyes...

Newest theme-park ride really shakes up Hollywood-goers

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — In a town where a mortuary is a top tourist draw and the curious pay to visit sites of celebrity suicides, a new theme-park ride celebrating a catastrophic California earthquake fits right in.

Never mind that the earthquake simulated in "The Big One," which opens Saturday at Universal Studios Hollywood, could kill 14,000 people; seriously injure up to 55,000 others

and cause \$17 billion in property damage.

"It's an entertainment attraction, not a sociology experiment," said Sidney Shenberg, president and chief operating officer of MCA Inc., the theme park's parent company. "I think this is fun. ... We don't think this is in bad taste, or we wouldn't have done it."

Like the popular tours at Forest

Lawn Memorial Park and the celebrity suicide and murder junket run by the local Grave Line Tours, the Universal Studios earthquake attraction is inherently married to the loss of life.

The ride has been touted as "the scariest thing to hit California since 1906" when a quake struck San Francisco and killed 2,000. "Mother Nature's fiercest demonstration of her

power," another promotional teaser read.

Advertising for the disaster attraction includes a billboard in Whittier, just a few blocks from several buildings leveled by a 5.9-magnitude quake and a 5.3-magnitude aftershock in October 1987. Eight deaths were blamed on that quake, as were 200 injuries and \$358 million in damage.

Academy Awards should have dramatic impact on video sales

The impact of Academy Award wins and nominations on box-office performance is often immediate and dramatic.

During the weeks after the announcement of Oscar nominations, grosses of nominated films that are still playing in theaters usually escalate. An Oscar triumph in a major category invariably boosts attendance too.

But in home video, the effects — tougher to measure because of the industry's general secretiveness about revenues — are usually less clear-cut and rarely dramatic.

What Oscar recognition primarily does, home video executives agree, is heighten awareness of a title, for both consumers and retailers.

"After all the publicity, retailers are more likely to order more copies of that title because they perceive it as more attractive to renters," said Eric Doctorow, senior vice president at Paramount, which is releasing "The Accused" — featuring best-actress nominee Jody Foster — in early May.

A prime example of the Oscar benefits on home video is CBS-Fox's "Wall Street," for which Michael Douglas won the best-actor Oscar last year. CBS-Fox marketing vice president Bruce Pfander calculates that the movie, released in July on home video, sold about 15 percent better to retailers than it otherwise would have because of the publicity surrounding the Oscar.

But Harvey Dessick, director of purchasing for the West Coast Video



chain, insisted that Oscars can't turn a movie with modest rental appeal into a blockbuster.

"Some of these Oscar-winners are long, slow, arty movies," he said. "People who like comedies, action-adventure movies and plain entertain-

ments aren't going to suddenly change their tastes and rent this kind of movie — Oscars or not. Oscars can be a boost but they won't change certain people's tastes."

Warner's "Stand and Deliver," featuring best-actor nominee Edward James Olmos, has been available on home video for several months. Judging from the Billboard magazine rental charts, where it's still hovering near the bottom of the Top 40, the Oscar nomination hasn't helped much.

On the other hand, Dessick said, Oscar nominations for actors "may help rentals of some of the nominees' other movies. Like best-actor contender Dustin Hoffman, for instance. All the nomination hype inspires people to rent some of his other movies."

How much the Oscar helps in the home video market can be difficult to determine because many of the nominated films are released late in the year and generally don't show up on cassette until six months later. That is the case this year with all five best-picture nominees, which won't be on home video until at least late spring — well after the March 29 Academy Award ceremonies.

Even when it's possible with films that were released earlier in the year, however, video companies, which have to set release dates months in advance, don't allow potential Oscar recognition to dictate when to put out a movie.

For instance, MCA's "Gorillas in the Mist," featuring best-actress nominee Sigourney Weaver, is due out April 13, 15 days after the ceremonies.

Sigourney Weaver could hold only Oscar surprise

HOLLYWOOD — A nationwide poll of film critics in the matter of the Academy Awards, just published by Premiere magazine, produced some surprising results, as that it should be a nice year for "Rain Man." The surprise was that Sigourney Weaver was voted the nominee to beat in both the best actress and best supporting actress categories.

While actors have won in both categories in separate years, and there have been a handful of double nominees, including Jessica Lange and Teresa Wright, this would probably be the first double-acting win in the same year.

You will get no predictions here. The acting categories, and the supporting category in particular, are often mischievously difficult to call because there is always such an abundance of fine work.

To choose among Glenn Close, Jodie Foster, Melanie Griffin, Meryl Streep and Weaver, or among Weaver

and Joan Cusak, Geena Davis, Frances McDormand and Michelle Pfeiffer in the supporting category calls for a Ouija board and a consulting psychic.

'Day of Reckoning' is an intriguing mystery

There are coincidental echoes of "Running on Empty" in John Katzenbach's "Day of Reckoning" (G.P. Putnam's Sons; \$19.95, 368 pp.). Two '60s radicals, who fled undetected from a botched bank robbery in which two of their pals died, are not on the lam from the FBI as in the movie but have settled into upper middle-class yuppie heaven in Massachusetts. He is a banker, she makes a bundle selling real estate.

Back into their lives bursts the leader of their revolutionary cell, a ferocious woman code-named Tanya (who was also Patty Hearst's underground name, as the characters note). Tanya's resentments have been sharpened by 18 years of hard time in prison. She never rattled on the

couple but never forgave them either. Now, accompanied by a feckless but lethal pair of sidekicks, one from the old days, she kidnaps the couple's young son and his grandfather and begins a taunting game of extortion.

Katzenbach, who launched his career with "In the Heat of the Summer," a Miami-set cat-and-mouse struggle between a reporter and a killer, does not probe deeply into any of the characters or the past. (The couple appear to have been dilettantes who got in over their heads). But the scenes in captivity between the boy and his grandfather are strongly appealing, and the story rushes to a spectacular finale.

By a curious congruence, several of the month's mysteries center on

archeology in one guise or another. The best of the lot is probably "Black Sand" by William J. Cavanaugh (Crown; \$18.95, 339 pp.). Cavanaugh also wrote the best-selling "One Police Plaza." The black sand of the title was used by the ancient Greeks to preserve manuscripts, in particular an annotated copy of the Iliad owned by Alexander the Great.

The manuscript of, indeed, it exists, it is a perfect Hitchcock MacGuffin for all purposes: quarry is central to a plot involving smuggled antiquities of inestimable value.

The book is an expert police procedural set mostly in New York and involving the cooperation of a Greek-American NYPD detective named Teddy Lucas and an Athens detec-

tive, Andreas Vassos, whose wife and child were killed by the smugglers and who has come to Manhattan on a mixed mission of detection and revenge. The real villains are highly placed but not beyond reach.

"Curses" by Aaron Elkins (Mysterious Press, \$15.95, 240 pp.) places archeology where it belongs, at the site of a dig, this one in Yucatan. Elkins' sleuth, a physical anthropologist named Gideon Oliver who finds clues in skeletons, almost becomes one when a Mayan tomb collapses.

What we have here is either an ancient curse or present evil rooted in greed. Only one guess per customer. The trail is again an ancient document, a codex or manuscript setting forth age-old Mayan beliefs.

Preservationists race to save classic movies from age

NEW YORK — "Gone With the Wind" looks better than ever. "Lawrence of Arabia" is a feast for the eyes. The new print of "Casablanca" has hardly a scratch.

But the release of these Academy Award-winning classics has overshadowed the fact that thousands of old films are in need of restoration or are damaged beyond repair.

Curators from the nation's four major preservation centers agree that quick and comprehensive action is needed. They also see another problem emerging over the next few years: the fading of color films.

The original negative of "Stagecoach," the 1939 John Ford Western that made John Wayne a star, no longer exists, and only inferior copies are available. The same is true of the 1937 Cary Grant-Irene Dunne comedy, "The Awful Truth," which earned an Oscar for director Leo McCarey. And the master of "Double Indemnity," Billy Wilder's 1944 landmark film noir, is incomplete. It was nominated for best picture but lost to another McCarey production, "Going My Way."

Until 1950, movies were printed on nitrate stock, a highly flammable material that decomposes almost instantly, and without proper care can disintegrate within a few years. But when the negatives are transferred to acetate, known as "safety stock," they can have a shelf life of 100 years or more if kept under climate-controlled conditions.

"I think with over 110 million feet of nitrate film held in the nation's archives that are either unique

copies or the best surviving ones, we are very close to confronting a crisis," said Robert Rosen, director of UCLA's Film and Television Archives. "All of this material, unless it's copied, is going to be gone."

Peter Williamson, preservation officer at the Museum of Modern Art in New York, cited other major problems: "We need additional funding because our funding levels have ba-

sically been frozen at a fixed dollar amount for the last 10 years," he said. "Also, the laboratory capacity to correctly duplicate for preservation has undergone a dramatic shrinking. Fifteen years ago there were at least 20 dozen laboratories, now we're down to six or seven."

"Switching from one stock to the other costs the preservation centers 40-60 cents per foot, double the rate

of 10 years ago. Meanwhile, federal funding has stayed at \$500,000 during that time. And with the government operating under a large budget deficit, the prospects for increased revenues in the near future are dim.

"I'm going to shoot for the same kind of funding that I had this year," said Rep. Sidney Yates, D-Ill., a major supporter of film preservation and a member of the House subcom-

mittee on Interior and Related Agencies.

"I don't think there's a possibility of getting a real major increase of funding for any program under the current fiscal climate. If perhaps we can get an inflation recognition (an increase at the rate of inflation), we will have been doing pretty well."

But even with financial assistance, curators see another problem emerging over the next few years: the fading of color films. According to Paul Spehr, the assistant chief of the Library of Congress' Motion Picture, Broadcasting and Recorded Sound Division, the negatives for early color films have a shelf life of 30-40 years and can be extended by cold storage.

Since color first had widespread use in the '50s, many original negatives are now ready to be transferred to the current, more durable stock.

"Most of the colors fade very badly," Spehr said. "We're at the point now where it's beginning to see a crunch."

Moving pictures first became popular at the turn of the century when people poured into nickelodeons, and for 5 cents could watch images flicker by. By the '20s, such stars as Charlie Chaplin and Mary Pickford had helped make motion pictures a major industry. But no one thought those movies were worth saving.

According to Williamson, less than one-third of all silent movies remain. The films of actress Theda Bara, a major star from the silent era, have

almost completely vanished.

"We have 12 to 15 million feet of nitrate and only about a third of that is preserved," said Ed Stratmann, the assistant curator in charge of preservation at the George Eastman House in Rochester, N.Y. "Time is running out for it."

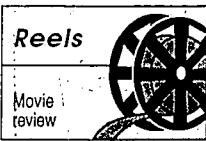

'Three Fugitives' has its funny moments

The following are capsule reviews of some of the films playing in the Motion Picture Ratings are by the Magic Picture Association of America and opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.



THREE FUGITIVES (PG-13). Nick Nolte and Martin Short have some funny moments as an inebriated and ill-matched team of bank robbers, but in his American directorial debut, France's prolific comedy specialist, Francis Veber shows that in working in English he is capable of the same overly broad and vulgar strokes that marred the various American adaptations of his French pictures. With Sarah Rowland Doroff as Short's troubled little daughter, James Earl Jones, Kenneth McMillan.

BILL & TED'S EXCELLENT ADVENTURE (PG). This is Allan Bloom's worst nightmare, and possibly yours, too. It is an all-out celebration of the closing of the American mind, with two high school doofuses (Keanu Reeves and Alex Winter) borrowing a time machine to kidnap great figures of past centuries for a history report. Look for two of the low points of American

teen-age cinema in one movie: Joan of Arc leads an aerobics class, and Abraham Lincoln tells an assembly of school kids to "Party on, dudes!" This witless-fiasco couldn't be more imbecilic or less excellent... dodes!

THE BURBS (PG). Grimly unfunny comedy about three suburban husbands (Tom Hanks, Bruce Dern and Rick Ducommun) who behave like little boys in a ramshackle Victorian house on their cul-de-sac. Big letdown for fans of Hanks, freshly Oscar nominated for "Big." With Carrie Fisher, Corey Feldman.

HER ALIBI (PG). This mystery is certainly elegant looking, but 15 minutes into the action the thrill is gone and director Bruce Beresford seems to have no clue as to how to find it. Tom Selleck plays a mystery writer who has hit a writing block, so he hits a few real courtrooms, looking for inspiration. Catch-born actress-model Paulina Porizkova plays a "Romanian" mystery woman and before you can say jurisprudence, Selleck has lied gracefully, providing Porizkova with an alibi at her murder trial.

RAIN MAN (R). Because we have had dozens of buddy films about journeys of discovery, we can plot the scenario of this one like a road map: The special qualities of one will work on the other to change him, or perhaps both of them. Dustin Hoffman makes his autistic savant character hypothetically interesting and sometimes terribly funny. Tom Cruise gives his loofest, most au-

thoritative performance since "Risky Business" and it can be said as boldly that he holds his own with the mastery of Hoffman.

SKIN DEEP (R). Blake Edwards' latest has a couple of the funniest moments he ever devised, it has John Ritter's easy-to-take charm, but this tale of a rich and famous compulsive womanizer and hard drinks on the skids ends up living up to its title all too loudly.

TWINS (PG). This may be the ultimate High Concept movie. It is composed in exclamation points. Arnold Schwarzenegger and Danny DeVito

as twins! Separated at birth after a genetic experiment that made Arnold a superman and left Danny a scuzzball! Romancing two gorgeous sisters! Spiffed out in identical suits! Pursued cross-country by crazed criminals! You think you can do anything with all of that? Call director Ivan Reitman and his two teams of screenwriters immediately; they haven't a clue. Millions on millions will undoubtedly attend this overblown, super-slick, one gag comedy. They may even laugh. But all it really has to offer are its charming co-stars.

Stock market climbs

NEW YORK — The stock market climbed to a six-week high Thursday, propelled by new evidence of a slackening in economic growth.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrial climbed 30.17 to 2,940.71, its highest close since it stood at 2,943.21 on Feb. 8. The day before that the average hit a post-crash high of 2,947.14.

Advancing issues outnumbered declines by about 9 to 5 in nationwide trading of New York Stock Exchange-listed stocks, with 939 up, 523 down and 501 unchanged.

Volume on the floor of the Big Board reached 196.01 million shares, up from 167.07 million in the previous session. Nationwide, consolidated volume in NYSE-listed issues, including trades in those stocks on regional exchanges and in the over-the-counter market, totaled 237.08 million shares.

The Federal Reserve reported

that industrial production was unchanged in February from the month before.

A separate government report showed a decline of 0.2 percentage points, to 84.3 percent, in capacity utilization of production facilities.

Analysts said those figures were read by some traders as evidence of an easing in the strains the economy was exerting on inflation and interest rates.

That provided some hope for signs of improvement in Friday's impending report on the producer price index for February. A 1 percent increase during January unsettled the stock market.

A complication occurs Friday, when the last trading occurs in a series of stock-index options and futures.

Oprah Winfrey stars in, produces landmark miniseries about blacks

"It has been referred to as a landmark piece of television," says Donna Deitch, director of "The Women of Brewster Place," an ABC miniseries airing Sunday, March 19, and Monday, March 20. The soft-spoken Deitch backs up her assertion with facts. "This is the interwoven lives of several women. It's a landmark because it's a first for black women. They are all in lead roles, and it's their story."

The miniseries, based on Gloria Naylor's 1980 novel, tells the painful stories of women who live in the same tenement of an unspecified northern city, in the early 1960s. Oprah Winfrey, the TV talk-show hostess and an Academy Award nominee for her performance in "The Color Purple" (1985), has co-produced the miniseries. She also plays Mattie Michael, the woman who binds the characters together.

Although Deitch stresses that "Brewster Place" is an ensemble piece, Mattie's tragic life story takes up almost all of part one of the miniseries. She's a single mother of a son who bankrupts her when he grows up to be a criminal, thus forcing her to move to the Brewster Place tenement. In this ensemble, one actress turns out to be more equal than the others.

"That's actually the way Naylor wrote it," reminds Deitch, and indeed the teleplay's script follows the novel nearly line by line.

When Mattie arrives in Brewster Place to live with her foster daughter Ciel (Lynn Whitfield), she finds herself among a group of women who have lived lives almost as tragic as her own: Mattie movingly nurses Ciel back to sanity after the accidental death of her baby daughter and admonishes earthy Etta May (Jackee), a woman who loves fast times and fast men. A neighbor, Cora Lee (Phyllis Yvonne Stickney), is a single mother of eight children. As she tells Mattie, "I can't stand not having a new baby around to love."

Each of the women has her back up against the ghetto wall. Even Kiswana Browne (Robin Givens), a college student who chooses to move to Brewster Place to organize a tenants association and live among what she calls "my people," isn't happy. When Kiswana's upper-middle-class mother (Cicely Tyson) visits her daughter, she berates her for changing her given name, Melanie, to the African Kiswana, thus denying her parents' accomplishments. And

the whole neighborhood, especially a cranky gossip named Miss Sophie (Olivia Brown), scorns two lesbians, Lorraine (Loretta McKee) and Theresa (Paula Kelly) who have moved in. They, too, are destined for tragedy.

Deitch says she was chosen to direct "Brewster Place" because of her work directing the critically acclaimed film "Desert Hearts" (1987), a lesbian love story.

"Like that movie, this is a relationship piece," she says. "Mattie finds out after all the pain and sorrow that there's a certain power and pride that evolves when women work together and help one another and care for each other. It happens that way in the story, and it happened that way in the making of the miniseries."

Bill to reduce TV violence introduced

WASHINGTON (AP) — Legislation designed to help curb violence on television was introduced in Congress Tuesday by Sen. Paul Simon and Rep. Dan Glickman, who said there was overwhelming evidence of a link between excessive TV violence and children's behavior.

The bill, which is identical to a measure that Simon, D-Ill., and Glickman, D-Kan., offered unsuccessfully last year, would grant a three-year antitrust exemption to the television industry so networks, local stations, the cable industry and producers could move in concert to formulate voluntary guide-

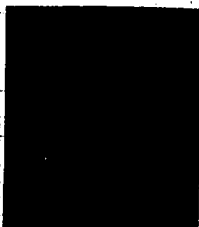

Trent Bushey still lives at YMCA despite role on 'All My Children'

Trent Bushey (pronounced Boo-shay) arrived for his interview literally on the trot. The young actor (he plays David Rampal in "All My Children") runs all the time. That's how he gets around New York City.

"Buses and taxis take too long in traffic," he said, "so I run. I also run in Central Park but that's for exercise. The running I do to get from place to place is for the sake of expedience."

'Golden Greats' preserves music history of rock 'n' roll's early years

There was a time when Michael Jackson was just the lead singer for his brothers and not the mysterious superstar he is today. The year was 1970, and it marked the first time the Jackson 5 appeared on Dick Clark's "American Bandstand," singing "ABC," one of the group's first No. 1 hits for the Motown label.

That moment in pop music history was virtually lost to the public until last year, when it was broadcast on "Dick Clark's Golden Greats," a nationally syndicated television program that combines vintage performances by rock 'n' roll stars with today's more stylized MTV-style videos.

"We did not have (that) tape," recalled Jeff Kopp, co-producer of "Golden Greats" during a recent telephone interview. "Motown had a copy of it on a videotape format that is not in existence anymore. Sony had a machine and we set it up. ... We turned it on, heard the sound but there was no picture. Some guy came in, hit the machine and suddenly there was Michael Jackson."

Watching the 12-year old Michael Jackson strut his stuff while his older brothers provided back-up, a viewer can see some of the familiar spins and dance steps that today are known to millions around the world.

Kopp also found the 1962 film that is believed to be the earliest recorded public performance by the Beach Boys singing their first hit, "Surfin' Safari." What is rare about the film is that rhythm guitarist Al Jardine was not yet performing with the band.

The idea for putting together "Golden Greats" came about when Clark was preparing "American Bandstand's" 30th anniversary show in 1981 and he realized that he had more than 20,000 performances of top rock 'n' roll artists on film or videotape, Kopp said. "Dick sat down and said, 'There's got to be a way to take these once-in-a-lifetime performances and make a show out of them.'"

But before that could happen, Kopp said, the same difficulties in

putting together the "American Bandstand" show would have to be faced again — taking films and kinescopes of old television shows and transferring them all to videotape for easier cataloging and editing. There would also be the legal requirement to get permission from musicians or their representatives and music licensing agencies in order to broadcast the performances.

The archives have been developing for the past three years, said Kopp, who started with Dick Clark Productions six years ago as a runner in the office after graduating from the University of Southern California film school. The production company uses its own film-to-tape transfer system. Everything is being matched with a computer filing system, making it possible to make the materials available to other production companies, he said.

With so much material to go through, where did Kopp begin?

"You start with the really big name stuff, the Chuck Berrys, Bill Haleys, and work backward from there," Kopp explained. "You go with the stuff with the most (historic) value. It's a very subjective thing. The older the artist, the tougher it is to find."

While researching the more historic material, which Kopp said is ongoing, there is the practical requirement for developing each "Golden Great" program.

"The shows are set up real simply. Dick and I sat down to figure out how to do it every week by having a unique theme (because) you need to have something to unify the show," he said.

Thus themes like "Teen Idols" feature Rick Springfield, Bobby Sherman and the Osmonds; "Motown Muscle" highlights performances by Marvin Gaye, Smokey Robinson and The Temptations; and "Dance Music" features a program with both Chubby Checker doing "The Twist" and The Village People performing disco tunes.

This weekend's program features a "duos" theme. The duos featured include Sonny and Cher, the Everly Brothers, Peaches and Herb and the Righteous Brothers.

"You have to represent each de-

cade of rock, from the '50s to the '80s," Kopp said, "so kids of today who may not be into Bill Haley, but who are into the Beastie Boys, will watch."

One of Kopp's biggest finds came after a call from a 40-year veteran of the film industry. Someone was cleaning up and found a bunch of film containers. Inside were a collection of performances from 1964 to 1969 of the Everly Brothers, Otis Redding, Buffalo Springfield and Pink Floyd.

"One was a clip from when (vocalist) Syd Barrett was in the group (Pink Floyd)," Kopp said. "For some reason, only he knows, he decided not to lip sync (the song). You hear the music, but nobody appears to be singing."

Kopp said that Clark has film or videotape on just about everyone, except Elvis Presley and the Beatles, explaining that the King and Fab Four never appeared on "American Bandstand."

"They were so huge that they could command enormous fees (to perform). 'Bandstand' has always paid (musicians' union) scale for appearances," he said. "Film and video of them is out there, but the clearances are even more difficult (than usual). Take all the normal problems and multiply them by a thousand."

TV censors working but standards loosen in competitive marketplace

When the 1988-89 television season — better known as the year of trash TV — finally comes to a close, many viewers will undoubtedly be asking the same questions.

What happened to our standards? And where have all the censors gone?

Matthew Margo, CBS vice president of program practices, has a ready answer — at least to what happened to the censors.

"The reports of our death have been greatly exaggerated," he says, borrowing a page from Mark Twain and maintaining, as did his counterparts in recent telephone interviews, that the networks still have program standards and censors actively involved in judging the acceptability of programming.

It is indeed true that all three networks, contrary to popular opinion, still have censors. (The program and standards departments are reportedly about half as large, however, thanks to cutbacks during the last couple of years.) But there can be no whitewashing this television year, one in which the networks appeared to follow the most instincts of cable and syndication.

Indisputably held to a higher standard — based on their pervasive reach, their free, over-the-air access and a long-term relationship with the American viewer — the networks are being scrutinized and criticized with a fervor perhaps exceeding their offenses.

Yet, how far can too far be when NBC, the No. 1 network and former paradigm of quality, runs a gory, Geraldo Rivera prime-time special on Satanism and the miniseries "Favorite Son," in which the most memorable scene involves leading lady Linda Koslowski's slow striptease and a game of mutual bondage?

How many series like NBC's "Nightingales," which, with the sound off, looks more like the changing room in ladies' lingerie than a show about nursing, can we expect?

Will the star of CBS' "Wings," a tiring of a low-life's double life, slyly raise a finger to

scratch his eye, should we take note of which finger he uses?

How much frank sexual talk is for our own good and how much is for the benefit of network ratings? Do we want, for example, sitcoms like "Roseanne" telling our daughters about their periods before we do? With the combined Big 3 share of the prime-time audience shrinking, and cable TV, home video and independent programming far more explicit, the networks are responding in kind.

It's one thing for such syndicated programs as "A Current Affair" and "Inside Edition" to bring viewers the most vile stories and lurid details from American life; for Morton Downey Jr. and Geraldo to incite TV riots; for independents to run uncensored R-rated movies; and for HBO to issue a soft-porn video covering every fleshy inch of Sports Illustrated's swimsuit issue.

But it's something else entirely when the networks go the same route.

"We can never afford to become a clone or surrogate to cable," says CBS's Margo.

Still, he notes, the boundaries of taste have advanced this year.

"It's obviously a more intensely competitive marketplace, and the options for viewers have proliferated," he says. "It would be duplicitous to suggest that CBS is not responding to the marketplace."

"Networks have always responded," agrees Alfred R. Schneider, ABC's vice president of policy and standards. "They respond to themselves, they're responding to cable. ... As the table gets larger and more offerings placed upon it, there's obviously reaching for diversity, innovation and change."

But Alan Gerson, NBC vice president of program standards, says he's not sure what all the fuss has been about this year.

"People are reacting to television as if things are happening for the first time when that really isn't so," he says. "Television this year isn't much different than it was overall last year." (It should be noted that NBC has reorganized its program

and standards department.) Schneider, for the most part, agrees, mentioning the furor he encountered a decade ago over the controversial sitcom "Soap."

"I think there has been a change in terms of certain representation as to sexuality," he says, referring to an episode of "thirtysomething" in which Hope (Mel Harris) fumbles comically with a diaphragm. "But that has been a trend that has been continuing since the AIDS problem came to light. There is less of an exploration of promiscuity and more of responsibility, but that brings with it the use of condoms or, in 'thirtysomething,' the use of a diaphragm."

Pointing to the 5-month-long writers' strike, which "put production pressure on the whole system of television," NBC's Gerson allows that some decisions were made to go ahead with programs on his network that "we might not have done or might have done differently."

Still, he says, the perception that the networks have abandoned their sense of decency in the name of ratings has been largely manufactured by the press.

"People have spent a lot of time criticizing the Geraldo (Satanism) special," he explains, noting that Rivera's syndicated version of the same topic contained far more blood and guts, making the NBC special a tribute to network standards."

lines on TV violence.

"It's time for the television industry to forge a partnership with America's families to scale back the atmosphere of violence that is erupting in our communities, on our Main Streets, even in our schoolyards," Simon said.

He said that while a one-to-one link had not been established between TV violence and violent behavior in America, "study after study has shown a connection between television violence and negative and aggressive behavior. The evidence that televised violence contributes to aggressive and destructive behavior is now nothing short of overwhelming."

He pointed to resolutions on the subject passed by the American Psychological Association, the American Psychiatric Association and the American Medical Association.

Last year's bill, like another one in 1986, passed the Senate, but died in the House. However, Simon said he felt the bill's chances were better this year. His office said the bill had 34 co-sponsors in the House and

seven in the Senate, including Sen. Howard Metzenbaum, D-Ohio, the chairman of the Senate antitrust subcommittee, and Sen. Strom Thurmond, the panel's ranking Republican.

The American Civil Liberties Union immediately challenged the bill, calling it a "Trojan horse" that could open the door for eventual government censorship of TV.

"There is nothing voluntary about guidelines which emerge from a regulated industry after Congress has instructed it about specific programming it finds objectionable," ACLU legislative counsel Barry Lynn said.

A spokeswoman for the National Association of Broadcasters, Susan Kraus, said, "Even this minimal approach does raise First Amendment concerns. Can it ever be truly voluntary when you have the government breathing down your neck?"

She said that although the government "can insulate the industry from antitrust actions, it cannot insulate us from being sued on First Amendment grounds."

NBC takes top ranking for 38th time

NEW YORK (AP) — ABC's re-vamping of its Tuesday schedule out-rated NBC's Thursday lineup, put "Roseanne" in the No. 1 spot and added the new comedy "Anything But Love" to the top 10.

NBC nevertheless won its 38th week in a row, tying its own record for longest winning streak, with some help from a high-rated Monday night movie, "Those She Left Behind." The story of a husband (Gary Cole) whose wife dies, leaving him to care for a newborn, ranked third for the week and was the highest-rated Monday movie since "The Burning Bed" in October 1984, NBC said.

"Anything But Love," a half-hour comedy about '80s romance starring Jamie Lee Curtis and Richard Lewis, was this season's highest-rated premiere since "Roseanne." "The Wonder Years," recently moved to Tuesday, also landed in the top 10 for ABC.

NBC won the week ending March 12 with an average prime-time rating of 16.0, according to the A.C. Nielsen Co. ABC had a 12.3 and CBS 12.1. NBC leads in the season-to-date averages with a 16.1, ABC is second with 12.8 and CBS third with 12.6.

"Roseanne" had once before edged "The Cosby Show" for first place — "Cosby" came in second, but that was a repeat. Last week, each show attracted a 40 share, but "Roseanne" had a rating of 27.7 to "Cosby's" 25.3. NBC said "Cosby" was affected by basketball playoffs carried on some independent stations Thursday night. It was the highest-rated "Roseanne" episode yet.

Each rating point represents 904,000 households with televisions. The share is a percentage of sets in use.

Pat Sajak uses a smile meter to judge success

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Pat Sajak says he judges the success of his new late-night talk show not by the ratings but by the happy faces of CBS big shots.

"You can drive yourself crazy looking at the ratings numbers every day and comparing yourself to everyone else," said Sajak. "I mainly go by the CBS executives. If they smile and stay out of our way, I know things are going well."

CBS executives have a lot to smile about. "The Pat Sajak Show" made its debut Jan. 9, and things are going very well.

Sajak, of course, is not giving Johnny Carson of NBC's "Tonight Show" anything to worry about and probably never will. But that's not the point, and never was. The biggest fallacy about late-night programming is the assumption that you're failing miserably if you're not beating Carson, or at least breathing down his neck.

The bugbear Sajak had to overcome was previous late-night programming on CBS, a hodgepodge of original shows, reruns and movies. Not only were CBS ratings trailing far behind Carson and ABC's "Nightline," but many affiliate stations were also dumping the shows to run their own.

The rating for the CBS late-night shows in December was 3.3, while Carson had 5.5 and "Nightline" 4.9. In its debut week, Sajak outdistanced all the competition. Part of that was due to curiosity.

After two months, Sajak's ratings have leveled off and the show now runs behind Carson by at least two ratings points. In the last ratings week, Carson had a rating of 5.7, "Nightline" 5.3 and Sajak 3.4. In the February sweeps, Carson got a 5.6 rating, Sajak 3.5.

The good news is that the ratings are ahead of the previous late-night programming.

"I feel very good about where we are now," Sajak said in a telephone interview. "I don't want to sound self-satisfied or smug, but I like the

look of the show. We're going through an evolutionary process. We don't have meetings and say let's change this or that. But a year down the road we can look at our shows and say they're different.

"As for the ratings, I really don't keep up with them. They go up, they go down. After the first few weeks to make sure people were watching, I stopped checking. We're just out to improve what CBS had in this time slot before. We're starting a talk show from scratch. We're not taking viewers away from Johnny Carson, but we are attracting people who previously haven't been watching network late-night shows."

Meanwhile, Carson renewed his contract with NBC for another year. "I'm having a ball," Carson told NBC Entertainment President Brandon Tartikoff. It will be Carson's 28th year as host of "The Tonight Show."

Sajak said he is not trying to break new ground. "I've said many times we're out to do a strong, traditional talk show," he said. "I don't think there's anything we should be doing that we're not doing. We've tried some things that haven't worked, like asking people in the audience about their worst date. But our out-of-studio stuff has worked great."

The Sajak show is seen on 195 stations. Some defecting CBS stations have returned to the fold, but a few, like Detroit and Atlanta, do not carry the show. In those cities, the Sajak show is broadcast by independent stations. Sajak has 95 percent of the CBS stations, while Carson has 99 percent of the NBC stations.

Sajak still goes to NBC on week-ends to tape "Wheel of Fortune," but he said he has not run into Carson. Both Carson and David Letterman, whose NBC late-night show is against the last half-hour of "The Pat Sajak Show," wished Sajak well when he launched his show.
