



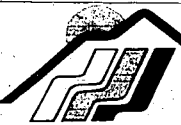

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House passes \$4.55 minimum wage bill

WASHINGTON — The House, defying threats of a presidential veto, voted Thursday to raise the federal minimum wage from \$3.35 an hour now to \$4.55 by late 1991.
That is 30 cents higher than President Bush has said he would accept.
Congressional leaders said the vote, 298-171, was likely to spur the Senate into approving an even higher minimum wage — possibly \$4.65 an hour, as Senate Democrats have proposed.
Nevertheless, the vote was substantially

short of the two-thirds majority that would be required to override a veto. And the House bill would allow a sub-minimum "training" wage — 85 percent of the prevailing minimum wage — only for a worker's first two months on a job, far less than the six months sought by Bush.
The president's position is firm ..., Bush spokesman Marlin Fitzwater said Thursday. "We're hanging tough."
Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., chairman of the Senate Labor and Human Resources Committee and chief Senate sponsor of the bill, held out the possibility that the Democrats might be open to further bargain-

ing.
He urged Bush to "refrain from further veto threats until he sees the shape of the bill that Congress finally sends him. This is an excellent opportunity for Congress and the administration to demonstrate that they can work together."
The \$4.55-an-hour figure voted by the House was billed as a bipartisan compromise. The House Education and Labor Committee originally had sought \$4.65 but agreed to a 10-cent reduction to halt defections by conservative Democrats.
The House rejected, 218-198, the administration's \$4.25-an-hour proposal. Before fi-

nally approving the bill, House members voted 240-179 to approve the \$4.55 figure.
On final passage, 226 Democrats and 22 Republicans voted for the measure, while 147 Republicans and 24 Democrats opposed it.
The dispute over how much to increase the federal minimum wage is mainly a political one. Economists say the economic impact of a higher minimum wage is likely to be modest because labor is already in such short supply that few jobs are still paying the federal minimum.
And in some states the state minimum wage law already provides for a higher wage

than the federal law. California's state minimum wage, for example, is \$4.25 an hour.
Nevertheless, the issue has become a major rallying point for Democrats and organized labor. The federal minimum wage has not been increased since 1981. President Reagan flatly opposed any boost at all, contending it would be inflationary.
Bush has insisted on including a so-called "training" wage for new workers on grounds that employers might cut back on hiring if they were forced to pay a higher minimum wage to inexperienced workers. He wants the training wage to be today's \$3.35-an-hour minimum.

Stallings flays EPA over leak

Idahoan says spud markets damaged by pesticide report

WASHINGTON — Rep. Richard Stallings blasted the Environmental Protection Agency Thursday for leaking its preliminary report on the pesticide aldicarb.
In a letter to EPA Administrator William Reilly, signed by fellow Idahoan Rep. Larry Craig and 26 House members from other farm states, Stallings slammed the agency for its "irresponsible" leak of the preliminary document.
"The staff who leaked the report should be fired," the usually mild-mannered Idaho Democrat wrote. "The EPA document is damaging potato markets when there is absolutely no evidence that the results of the internal memorandum are even accurate."
According to an EPA preliminary report leaked to the New York Times Tuesday, aldicarb, used on some potato and banana crops, has the potential to cause flu-like symptoms including nausea, headaches and blurred vision in children.
John Moore, EPA acting deputy administrator, confirmed those findings in a statement Wednesday, but stressed that the study was not complete and has yet to be subject to independent review.
"I see no basis for any undue concern, at this time, about eating bananas or potatoes," Moore said, adding that the preliminary study gave no indication that aldicarb poses "life-threatening health risks."
Stallings, who represents the largest potato growing state in the country, criticized Moore's statement as inadequate. The congressman demanded strong assurances "that potatoes are safe and that the public has no need for concern."
An EPA spokesman said that Moore had not had a chance to review the letter, and was not ready to comment. The agency's head, Reilly, could not be reached for comment.
A spokesman for Stallings said the leaked report "basically froze the potato market in the state. Farmers have begun protesting buyers with sworn affidavits that their potatoes

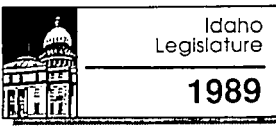

Stream quality compromise wins final OK

BOISE — Legislation implementing the compromise agreement protecting the quality of Idaho's streams has won final legislative approval over mining interest claims that it will jeopardize their multimillion-dollar Panhandle operations.
It is the culmination of several years of frustration and great expense to Idaho's industry to come up with a solution that is acceptable not only to all the interest groups but to the stringent standards of the Environmental Protection Agency, Senate Resource and Environment Chairman Laird Noh, R-Kimberly said.
The Senate unanimously approved the least controversial piece of the package, a bill making so-called best management practices approved by the state acceptable operational methods for preserving stream quality.
But the bill giving the Legislature authority to declare streams or stream segments outstanding



resource waters, which means no further development could take place, had to survive an attempt to modify it before passing overwhelmingly.
The bills, preceded by legislative adoption of a resolution outlining the provisions of last summer's negotiated compromise, were prompted by federal laws requiring action to protect water quality from nonpoint sources of pollution such as farming, mining and timbering.
A bipartisan majority of the Legislature approved an industry-backed water quality plan last year. But Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus vetoed it as falling short of providing the environmental

protection needed, and forced Senate Democrats who originally supported the bill to uphold his veto.
Following that, Andrus reconvened the environmental, sportsmen and industry interests to work out a compromise that was ultimately reached late last summer. That compromise, backed by the mining, timber, agriculture, sportsmen and conservation organizations, spawned the legislation that is contingent on dismissal of an environmentalists' suit to force imposition of tough water quality standards.
A whole lot of people have put a lot of effort into this, Sen. John Peavey, D-Carey. "Everybody's given some."
Despite the broad support for the plan, however, Panhandle mining interests pressed for what they called minor amendments that their opponents said could jeopardize acceptance of the plan by EPA. Mining spokesmen maintained the bill went much further in regulating resource industry practices.

Drive set to head off fight over remapping

BOISE — Saying it wants to head off what figures to be the most divisive legislative redistricting battle in state history, the Idaho League of Women Voters has announced a ballot initiative drive to establish a citizens reapportionment commission.
League President Joy Myers of Shelley said at a Statehouse news conference Thursday that an independent commission would be the best way to avoid undue expense and political bloodletting in 1992, when a constitutionally mandated reapportionment could mean cutting 21 to 36 of Idaho's 126 legislative seats.
Elinor Chehey of Boise, the league's voter service chairwoman, said eliminating fiefdom districts and multi-member counties will be an ugly job that should not be left to the political process.
"It's not just going to be making sausage, she said. "It's going to be making sausage with live piglets."
Myers said Idaho cannot afford to stick to the redistricting procedure it has used since the early 1960s.
Every reapportionment which has been drawn by the Legislature since that time has been challenged in court, at great expense, and has had to be rewritten.
The initiative calls for an unpaid seven-member commission, with three members each appointed by the majority and minority leadership of the Legislature and a chairman selected by the appointed members.
The commission would begin its work in April 1991, when new federal census figures on Idaho's 1990 population are made available. After a reapportionment plan is developed, it would be subject to public hearings and Idaho Supreme Court review before taking effect in 1992.
The signatures of 38,743 registered voters will be needed by July 1, 1990, to put the issue on that November's general election ballot. The number of signatures required is 10 percent of the total number of votes cast for governor in the last election.
Rev. Meredith of Boise, the league's initiative campaign chairwoman, said the group has been working to get bills establishing an appointment commission introduced during the past two legislative

U.S. plays down hijack warning

WASHINGTON — The White House on Thursday played down a U.S. warning about the possible hijacking of an American airliner in Europe, saying the bulletin was similar to many other terrorist alerts and travelers "should be confident that all reasonable precautions are being taken."
Airports in England, West Germany, Italy and Belgium stepped up security after receiving the warning issued by the Federal Aviation Administration. No additional precautions were reported in the Netherlands, Greece or Spain.
The Bush administration was clearly unhappy the warning had leaked out in a front-page newspaper story in London. Transportation Secretary Samuel K. Skinner called it a potentially serious compromise of intelligence-gathering activities and ordered an FAA

investigation of the disclosure.
Three Lebanese Palestinians were mentioned by name in the warning, according to the Daily Express. The bulletin said the three may be traveling on passports from Bahrain, Pakistan or North Yemen.
The FAA confirmed that it had issued a security bulletin to airports and carriers March 16 about the possibility of a hijacking of a U.S. airliner in Western Europe.
The warning did not mention any specific airline or airports that might be threatened, nor did it cite any time frame for the warning, the FAA said.
Disputing the Daily Express account, U.S. officials emphatically denied that the notice had been relayed to U.S. diplomats and military personnel abroad while being withheld from the public at large — as was the case with a warning prior to the bombing of Pan Am Flight 103.

Utahn, British professor claim nuclear fusion 'breakthrough'

SALT LAKE CITY — Scientists announced Thursday that they have achieved nuclear fusion at room temperature, a long-sought breakthrough that if confirmed by other scientific experiments could move the quest for nuclear power into an entirely new arena.
The scientists have produced an incredibly simple, table-top device that they say uses a small electric current to produce more energy than it takes to run the experiment. If

they are right, they have reached a goal that has eluded scores of other scientists who have had at their disposal major research reactors costing hundreds of millions of dollars.
The breakthrough means the world may someday rely on fusion for a clean, virtually inexhaustible source of energy, the University of Utah said in a press release announcing the dramatic development.
B. Stanley Pons, chairman of the department of chemistry at the University of Utah, and his former professor, Martin Fleischmann, profes-

sur of electro-chemistry at the University of Southampton, England, announced the results during a press conference on the university campus.
Their work follows a course that is so different from conventional wisdom in fusion research that many of the leaders in the field were not even familiar with it.
But several who were aware of the research said that it could not be dismissed. The two scientists have been working on the project for more than

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Health officials wary of home AIDS tests

WASHINGTON — Federal health officials Thursday said they remain skeptical about the "safety and accuracy" of new home testing kits for detecting the AIDS virus and said the government must be cautious before approving their sale.

Food and Drug Administration Commissioner Frank Young, testifying before a House subcommittee, said a final decision has not been made on the home testing method. The FDA has rebuffed company requests to market the kits and plans to hold a public hearing on the issue next month.

But some manufacturers charged the FDA was unfairly blocking their marketing efforts by refusing to review their license applications for the kits. They contended the home tests, by allowing maximum privacy, would encourage more people to be tested for the virus.

Young said the FDA is gathering more information on the kits and will ask company representatives to address the health agency's concerns at an April 6 meeting.

"Caution at this time is prudent," Young said before the House Small Business Committee's subcommittee on Regulations, Business Opportunities and Energy.

Young said federal officials fear at-home AIDS test results would be unreliable because the tests would be performed by untrained people and some people may not be able to follow the directions accurately. "Nothing can substitute for well-qualified individuals using... effective tests," he said.

Young said further problems could result when blood samples drawn with the kits were shipped to a laboratory for analysis. Delays in arrival of the sample and exposure to temperature extremes could affect the results, he said.

After sending off their blood sample, those test-

ed could call the lab about a week later, identify themselves with a special code number, and receive the results.

Critics of the at-home test said they were concerned that those testing positive would not receive proper counseling. "... Patients may quickly interpret positive results as a virtual death warrant," said Rep. Ron Wyden, D-Ore., the subcommittee chairman.

"For the hundreds of the untrained—the unscrupulous and the insensitive, home AIDS testing can inflict considerable human damage," Wyden said.

Elliot J. Millenson, president of Cross Industry Management of Rockville, Md., complained that the FDA has refused to review license applications for any company developing home testing kits.

"The concept of home-testing makes sense," Millenson said. "It is feasible to implement and the potential benefits appear to be far greater than potential risks."

five years, and they have spent \$100,000 of their own money on it.

"We thought the idea was so stupid that we decided to finance it ourselves," Fleischmann said.

Beginning in May, however, the two men will have the support of the U.S. Department of Energy, which said Thursday that it would fund their work for 18 months with a grant of \$329,000.

Pons and Fleischmann claim to have succeeded where so many others have failed by trying a totally different approach that involves a glass flask and an electrode.

"If it's true, it's wonderful," said Robert Coon, director of the Institute of Plasma and Fusion Research at the University of California, Los Angeles. He said, however, "it would be surprising" if the work is confirmed.

That is partly because the physics of fusion is believed to require the presence of extremely high temperatures — millions of degrees — before fusion can occur. The high temperature is necessary for positively charged atoms to have the energy to fuse together in a process that releases enormous amounts of heat.

Conventional wisdom also holds that the fuel for a fusion reaction must be extremely compressed, forcing hydrogen atoms close enough together for fusion to occur. In most major research projects, that is done by subjecting the fuel — in the form of a pellet or a dense gas — to either a strong magnetic field or intensely powerful lasers. That is done with huge instruments costing many millions of dollars.

Pons and Fleischmann used none of that, however. Their apparatus consists of a flask about the size and shape of a round-bottomed drinking glass with a fitted glass plug at the top. Inside the flask is a cylinder made out of the metal palladium, about six inches long, wrapped in a platinum coil, creating an electrode.

The flask is filled with 99.5 percent heavy water, which is water that looks like any other water but is made of one part oxygen and two

parts deuterium, a form of hydrogen that is about twice as heavy as ordinary hydrogen. Deuterium is the most common fuel for fusion experiments and is easily obtainable from sea water.

A six-volt, eight-volt current was applied to the apparatus, causing deuterium from the water to concentrate in the palladium. That, in turn, caused the closely-packed deuterium atoms to fuse together at room temperature.

"The deuterium is simply drawn from the heavy water into the metal rod and fused, with a considerable release of energy," Pons said. The energy released from the reaction is in the form of heat.

"That amount of heat" can only be accounted for by nuclear reactions, Pons said during the press conference.

The scientists first suspected that they were beginning to get a fusion reaction in their experiment "one day when we turned up the power and the electrode melted," Fleischmann said. "We've been running at much lower power since then."

So much heat from such a low energy source can only be explained by fusion, the scientists insisted.

Furthermore, the byproducts were what one would expect from fusion — neutrons and tritium.

Perhaps most significant of all, the researchers claim that they have run the device for periods as long as 100 hours and continued to produce more energy than it took to run the experiment. If confirmed, the results mean the two men have done something no one else in the world has been able to do, despite the investment of hundreds of millions of dollars: They have passed the "break-even" point at which more energy is produced than consumed.

The university decided to hold a press conference because the results were "so exciting that we were beginning to have a lot of rumors," according to Jim Brophy, the university's vice president for research. The scientists said their findings would be published in May.

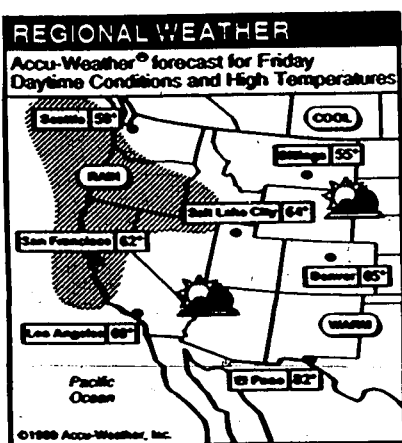
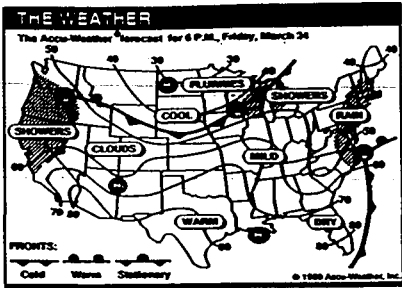

Bush, Congress cut deal on aid, Contra policies

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Bush administration and Congress reached agreement Thursday on a Central America policy statement that would renew aid to the U.S.-backed Contras rebels and establish the first broadly bipartisan approach to the region in years.

"There is a deal," said an administration official, speaking only on condition of anonymity.

"I think they've come together," said Rep. David Obey, D-Wis., of the sides that Secretary of State James A. Baker III has been seeking to unite behind a new policy for the past several weeks.

Baker and President Bush were expected to meet on the agreement this morning, then announce the new policy in an appearance with congressional leaders.

The statement expresses support for Central American peace efforts and democratic goals, calls for the ultimate reintegration of the Contras into Nicaraguan political life and calls for an end to regional hostilities.

While it mentioned no specific figure for continued aid to the rebels, money was to flow at the current rate of about \$4 million a month.

sessions, without success.

This year, the Senate State Affairs Committee refused even to approve introduction of a measure presented by Sen. Karl Brooks, D-Boise.

Mendallish said lawmakers still could approve creation of a commission during the 1990 session, but the league did not want to take any chances.

"If the Legislature can't even come to an agreement on establishing a commission, how can they be expected to successfully reapportion the state, especially in the necessary time frame?" she said.

A 1986 amendment to the Idaho Constitution requires that a new apportionment plan be in place by the spring of 1992.

That amendment stemmed from the 1982 fight in the Legislature and the Idaho Supreme Court over restricting based on the 1980 census.

The high court rejected a plan drawn by lawmakers that followed a

formula established in 1966, dividing the state into 35 legislative districts.

The justices said the plan violated the U.S. Constitution's one-man, one-vote requirement, as well as the state prohibition against splitting counties between legislative districts.

Instead, the court accepted a proposal developed by the group of Boise and northern Idaho residents who challenged the Legislature's plan. It increased the size of the Legislature from 105 to 126 members and created "fictitious districts," most of which cover areas of several counties and populations up to 175,000.

This time, the league contends a commission, such as those used in about a dozen other states, can help avoid a lengthy court battle by coming up with a bipartisan formula.

Merdenhall said the group hopes other organizations will join the initiative drive in time to put the issue before as many people in the state as possible.

Fawn Hall weeps on stand; praises North

WASHINGTON (AP) — A weeping Fawn Hall praised former boss Oliver North Thursday as an inspirational, tireless and selfless man and said their wholesale shredding of Iran-Contra documents was no big deal.

Alternately crying and spitting back sharp responses, Miss Hall twice appeared unable to go on with her testimony at North's trial, causing impromptu recesses. Her sympathies throughout were obviously with North, though she hardly ever looked at him.

"It's tough when people portray you as a witness for the prosecution when you are a witness for the truth," she said outside the courtroom. "Hopefully, the good guy will win."

She called North's firing by then-President Reagan on Nov. 26, 1986, unfair. "I was very upset," she recalled. "When I heard about it, I was very angry."

Miss Hall, who was North's secretary at the National Security Council for nearly four years, admitted that when attorney general's investigators were closing in on Nov. 21, 1986, she altered documents to soften recorded versions of North's involvement with the Nicaraguan Contras. She also said she helped him in what has been called "a shredding party" of Iran-Contra documents.

The former Marine lieutenant colonel is on trial on 12 charges, including destroying documents and lying to Congress about his activities. Miss Hall, like most of the 20 other prosecution witnesses to date, first obtained immunity from prosecution before agreeing to testify.

At one point Thursday, she became upset when prosecutor John Keiser confronted her with a transcript of "your words" in previous testimony. She had testified then that North may have directed her to shred some documents, but she said on Wednesday that North had given no such instructions.

When North lawyer Brendan Sullivan objected to the questioning, she continued to talk and U.S. District Judge Gerhard A. Gesell snapped:

"Please keep your mouth shut while I'm talking." Then he ruled that what she had said earlier was "entirely consistent" with her current testimony.

"Can I have a break?" she asked Gesell.

"What's your problem?" asked the judge. After Sullivan spoke up for her, Gesell said "certainly she can take a break."

Tears streamed down her face and she was clutching her stomach as she walked out of the courtroom.

The witness began to cry again at another point as she told Sullivan that she had met Colonel North, his wife, Betsy, and their four kids in Easter of 1983.

Man kills 2 women; escapes on foot
LOUVIERS, Colo. (AP) — A man believed to be armed with an automatic weapon today killed two women, one of them a hostage taken earlier, then sexually assaulted a third woman and fled a traffic accident on foot, authorities said.

An intensive manhunt was under way for the man in southern metropolitan Denver, an area where numerous creeks with grassy floodplains run amid housing subdivisions.

Helicopters helped police from three counties and the State Patrol look for the suspect, officials said.

Carl Lewis calls for steroid testing

WASHINGTON (AP) — Track superstar Carl Lewis said Thursday it was his "guess" that as many as 10 Olympic medals last summer went to athletes using anabolic steroids, and he urged random testing at all levels of sports competition.

"We want to elevate ourselves ethically to the point where everyone sacrifices ourselves to make the sport clean," the three-time Olympian and winner of six gold medals told a congressional subcommittee.

Lewis received a gold medal in the 100-meter dash at last summer's Olympics in South Korea after the first contestant to cross the finish line, Canada's Ben Johnson, tested positive for anabolic steroids, compounds that develop strength and speed but which are banned as dangerous drugs.

Group warns of resegregation

WASHINGTON (AP) — Schools are in danger of becoming segregated again as a result of rising Hispanic isolation in the West and outmoded integration plans in the South, the National School Boards Association said Thursday.

"The march to school integration is certainly not over, and school systems are finding no quick and easy solutions," James Oglesby, president-elect of the association, said in releasing a study of desegregation trends from 1968 to 1966.

At the national level, the study found black-white integration stable for the past two decades despite efforts to dismantle desegregation plans during the Reagan administration. At the same time, "Hispanics have been becoming steadily more isolated in virtually all parts of the country," it said.

Of most concern are trends toward increased segregation of blacks and Hispanics in regions where

they are most heavily concentrated — blacks in the South and Hispanics in the West, the study said.

Chilean grapes reappear in stores

WASHINGTON (AP) — Fresh Chilean grapes began moving back into U.S. stores Thursday after being deemed free from threatened cyanide poisoning. Industry leaders said consumers may initially see slightly higher prices.

Meanwhile, the Chilean government was working on a plan to compensate U.S. importers, wholesalers and retailers for at least part of their losses in having to dump large amounts of fruit, Chilean exporters said.

Losses to exporters and to U.S. fruit importers as a result of the cyanide scare are estimated at \$240 million, said Ronald S. Down, executive director of the Chilean Exporters Association.

Texas drops charges against Adams

DALLAS (AP) — Texas will not retry Randall Dale Adams for the 1976 slaying of a policeman, a prosecutor said Thursday, two days after Adams' court-ordered release from prison on grounds his first trial was unfair.

Dallas County District Attorney John Vance said the case has been dropped because there is not enough evidence to try Adams again.

Adams was convicted and sentenced to die in 1977 for the murder of Dallas police officer Robert Wood, a crime to which another man has virtually confessed. Adams once came within three days of his execution date.

Navy suspects Trident rocket nozzle

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Navy believes it obtained enough radio telemetry from this week's failed Trident 2 missile launch to determine the precise cause, but already suspects a fault in the rocket nozzle system of the first stage motor, the Pentagon's chief spokesman said Thursday.

Dan Howard, the spokesman, said a preliminary investigation suggests either an electrical or mechanical glitch in the part of the missile that swivels the rocket nozzles from side to side.

"And we do believe that we have the necessary data to be able to evaluate it and pinpoint the problem, even without the recovery of the vehicle," Howard said.

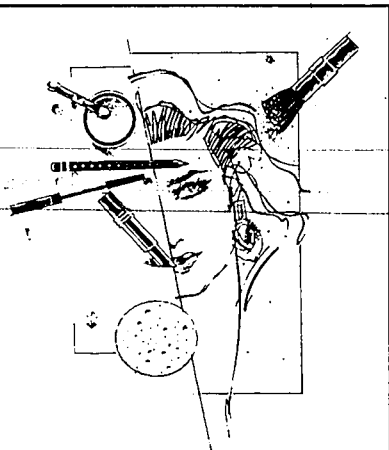
2 officials plead in Pentagon case

ALEXANDRIA, Va. (AP) — A Navy official and a major defense contractor pleaded guilty Thursday to charges in the "Ill Wind" Pentagon procurement case, with the Navy man admitting he took a bribe to provide inside information on a contract.

The contractor, Taladyna Industries Inc. agreed to pay more than \$4.3 million in penalties and to satisfy other claims in the case, saying a former employee who pleaded guilty earlier had entered into a corrupt and illegal arrangement with two other men who still face charges.

The suspended Navy official, Stuart E. Berlin, agreed to cooperate with prosecutors in the continuing investigation which has resulted in a dozen guilty pleas so far. He is to be sentenced June 2 and could face as long as 25 years in prison and fines of as much as \$750,000.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Joseph J. Aronica declined to comment when asked whether there would be more guilty pleas or how extensively Berlin's testimony might be used against other defendants.

Bill raising driving age deserves approval

For the second time in two years, the Idaho House is considering a bill to raise the state's driving age from 14 to 16.

Despite some valid arguments from young people about how early driving privileges increase their responsibility, we think the bill should be approved.

We say that knowing that we will not win any friends among seventh and eighth graders, many of whom are already looking forward to driving and the freedom from parents which it inevitably means.

And we also acknowledge that many young people are fully capable of physically handling a car.

Still, we don't think those reasons are enough to leave the driving age at 14.

There is a lot of evidence that, despite physical readiness, many young people lack the judgment and maturity to drive defensively and wisely.

Yes, they know how to make the car go. But they seem to have little appreciation for the laws of physics in which speed times weight results in force.

Hence, they do not "look ahead" and anticipate what could happen at this intersection, that curve. They do not ask themselves, what if a ball and child comes out from between those two parked cars?

This lack of anticipation thinking, combined with a general sense of their own immortality and a normal tendency to be susceptible to peer pressure thus can lead to tragic results.

The measure before the House allows 14-year-olds to drive to work or school if a need can be demonstrated and allows 15-year-olds to drive with a learner's permit if an adult is in the car.

Those strike us as reasonable allowances, provided they do not become huge loopholes through which every 14-year-old can drive.

Additionally, we would like to see the Legislature consider measures similar to Oregon proposals in which any violation of drugs and/or alcohol use by young person would result in an automatic driving prohibition until the age of 18.

If a young teenager knew he or she wouldn't be able to drive if they are caught with drugs or alcohol, that would go a long way, we suspect, to curb use.

Idaho is one of the few states in the country which still has a 14-year-old driving age. The current law is essentially a vestige of an earlier time in which young drivers were needed extensively in farm work or could venture out on less-congested highways and county roads.

But times have changed. Roads are more heavily travelled now, cars are more powerful, there is less need for agricultural use, and the evidence is clear about young people and accidents. Given all these factors, we think the law should be raised to 16.

Child abuse issue too politicized

With the emphasis placed on child abuse this session, one would think child advocate groups would be dancing in the streets. Unfortunately, with the governor in the lead, some groups have chosen instead to protest on the capital steps.

The first regular session of the Centennial Legislature has considered and passed more child-abuse legislation than any session in history. Among the 18 bills that will soon become law are:

1. Legislation to allow, at certain times, testimony by two-way closed-circuit TV.
2. Eliminating the statute of limitations (currently only one in murder cases) in child-abuse cases.
3. Legislation to allow victims and their families to immediate access of the Crime Victim's Compensation account for therapy.
4. My personal favorite, a guardian ad litem bill that will help ensure that the child victim has a volunteer bodyguard (advocate) to work with them through the court process and make sure they don't fall through the cracks when dealing with treatment and supervision provided by our social service agencies. In my mind, this bill goes further than any in breaking the child-abuse cycle.
5. Legislation that tracks what kinds of sentences judges are actual-

ly handing out and why. These are just a sampling of a tidy package that accomplished long-term goals in curbing child abuse rather than putting a band aid on a highly emotional issue.

The package was put together with the following goals in mind:

1. To make it easier for the prosecutor to build a strong case against the perpetrator.
 2. To make the court proceeding as easy as possible on the child victim.
 3. To provide for immediate counseling and care for the child victim.
 4. To give judges accurate and complete information through a pre-sentencing evaluation so they can set appropriate sentences.
- Through the hours and hours of often emotional testimony, we heard many cases of sexual molesters who never spent a day in jail.
- When the only witness is a 3-year-old victim, the prosecutor's job becomes almost impossible.
- The "quick fix" to this emotional and complex problem appeared to be mandatory minimum sentencing. But "quick-fixes" have very seldom solved much in this Legislature.
- It became obvious that the real necessity was a "tool box" for prosecu-

tors to build strong cases. No matter what the length of a mandatory minimum sentence, if you can't build a case, you won't get a sentence of any kind.

Another fallacy of mandatory minimum sentences, in this instance, is the message we send judges. Why set the guideline or norm of one year when currently low and lascivious conduct with a child carries a sentence of up to life?

Many of the experts tell us, in fact, a true pedophile cannot be treated. Isn't it better to have information available so those people can be identified and warehoused in the state penitentiary rather than sentenced to a year detention which included a work-release program?

In my mind, it became obvious that instead of interfering with the judicial process and painting every one of these complex cases with the same brush, that we, indeed, start to look at the heart of the problem.

I'm pleased that the House of Representatives, in a bipartisan effort, took this more reasonable approach. In light of outright threats by the governor, it was a bold move.

Here in the House, we try to remind each other at times that if the motivation is right and you're not looking for political expediency or

Walesa may run for office

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — Solidarity leader Lech Walesa said Thursday he would rather not run for a seat in Poland's new parliament, but he said he would if the people want him to.

He also said his banned independent union movement will look for answers "in the streets and by strikes" if no final agreement on forms is reached at historic talks between the opposition and Communist leaders.

Neither will Solidarity tolerate "tricks" by officials in implementing an accord, he said.

Walesa made the statements at a news conference in his home city of Gdansk and in a subsequent telephone interview with The Associated Press.

At the talks in Warsaw, negotiators continued to discuss economic and political topics separating the two sides.

Walesa's comments cast doubt on whether a final agreement could be signed April 3 as planned. He said he would need about a week to study the document, which could be hundreds of pages long.

15 die in clashes in east Beirut

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Syrian army gunners and allied Druse militiamen fought artillery duels with Christian army units Thursday, and police said 15 people were killed and 42 wounded.

Most of the casualties were civilians in Christian east Beirut, where "rockets sometimes landed at the rate of 40 a minute."

A police spokesman said the dead included an 80-year-old woman who was crossing the street in east Beirut's Saloumeh residential district. A Lebanese soldier also was wounded, police said.

The new casualties brought the toll to 81 killed and 263 wounded since fighting began March 8 between Gen. Michel Aoun, who commands the 20,000 Christians in the

Lebanese army, and the Druse militia led by Walid Jumblatt.

Other Moslem militias and the 22,000 Moslem soldiers led by Maj. Gen. Sami Khatib appear to have stayed out of the dispute. The fighting threatens Arab League efforts to mediate a political crisis that split the army on sectarian lines and created competing Christian and Moslem governments.

Aoun heads the Christian government in addition to commanding the army's Christian units.

More than 5,000 shells and rockets landed overnight in both sectors of the capital, in the Christian region to the north and east, and Druse-held territory to the southeast.

Residents of Aramoun, seven miles south of Beirut, said Syrian gunners

operated rocket launchers overnight from the hill on which the village sits. It was the first independent confirmation of Syrian involvement.

Aoun has accused Syria of firing on the 310-square-mile Christian region, where 1 million Christians live in a crescent-shaped enclave with the Mediterranean at their backs.

One witness in Aramoun said Syrian rocket launchers were "pouring fire all night at the Christian sector."

Syria has 40,000 soldiers in Lebanon and has become the country's main power broker during a 14-year civil war. Aoun has declared a "war of liberation" against the Syrian forces.

The thuds of exploding shells echoed across Beirut and the surrounding wooded mountains.

Pravda reports workers arming against crime

MOSCOW (AP) — Criminals are demanding protection money from new profit-making cooperatives, police can't stop them and the workers have begun arming themselves, Pravda reported Thursday.

Those who operate the semi-private cooperatives must choose between knuckling under or fighting back, the Communist Party newspaper said. It quoted a police chief as saying: "The population is arming it-

self."

"People are making guns and bombs right at work," said the chief, who was not identified. "And you know how they explain it? Self-defense."

The Interior Ministry acknowledges that new economic opportunities and social change introduced by President Mikhail S. Gorbachev have brought more crime.

Pravda said the murder rate rose

14 percent last year and armed robberies increased by more than 40 percent. Professional criminals are multiplying in a "renaissance of robber traditions," and organized crime benefits from the new atmosphere, it said.

The newspaper attributed almost 20,000 crimes in 1987-88 to 2,607 organized groups, of which 50 acted in "deep conspiracy" for more than three years.

Arafat calls U.S., PLO meeting 'positive'

TUNIS, Tunisia (AP) — Yasser Arafat said Thursday the second formal meeting between U.S. and PLO representatives was positive and reflected the desire of both sides to make the dialogue a success.

To a reporter who asked the smiling chairman of the Palestine Liberation Organization whether Wednesday's meeting was responsible for his good mood, Arafat replied: "Yes, exactly."

He described the content of the meeting between U.S. Ambassador Robert H. Pelletreau and Yasser Abed-Rabbo of the PLO executive committee as "positive and serious," but gave few details of the discussion.

"There is a mutual interest and intention to lead this dialogue to success," Arafat said.

Pelletreau and Abed-Rabbo met for 4 1/2 hours at the Tunisian government's

Dar el Maghrebria guest house, with two senior advisers present on each side. The ambassador would not talk about the meeting and referred all inquiries to the State Department.

Arafat said: "No one has the right to say what they asked of us or what we asked of them."

Did the Americans ask him to stop the 15-month-old uprising in the Israeli-occupied West Bank and Gaza Strip that has taken the lives of more than 400 Palestinians? No one presented such a request and no one can ask a people to stop resisting an occupation," he replied.

It was the second formal meeting since talks began in December, after Arafat publicly renounced terrorism and recognized Israel's right to exist. There was no indication whether a third meeting was scheduled, but the

PLO chief's mood suggested the dialogue will continue.

The fact that the agenda was loaded with a lot of subjects to be discussed shows clearly the importance given to it both by the U.S. administration and the PLO," he said. "Its importance is even greater if you take into consideration all the Israeli efforts to stop it."

Arafat reiterated his demand for an international peace conference on the Middle East with the participation of the nations involved, the PLO and the five permanent members of the U.N. Security Council: the United States, Soviet Union, China, Britain and France.

"This is the position announced by the Arab summits in Casablanca, Amman and Algiers and it is very similar and parallel to the European, Soviet, Chinese and non-aligned position on the same issue," he said.

Ex-Communist Party chief finds support in U.S.S.R

MOSCOW (AP) — "Spets! Spets! Spets! Spets!" Boris N. Yeltsin rapped at a gathering of 1,000 workers, using Russian slang to criticize the network supplying special food, consumer goods, cars and drivers to Communist Party officials.

His voice cracking from overuse, the former Communist Party boss of Moscow demanded the privileges be eliminated. "All of them have to go," Yeltsin said.

The workers applauded.

Days before Soviets vote in the first multicandidate elections, Yeltsin has become a lightning rod for people resentful of plenty for a privileged few and empty store shelves for the rest.

The election is Sunday, and Yeltsin is running against Yevgeny Brakov, director of the ZIL plant that manufactures the ultimate symbol of power and privilege: the shiny black ZIL limousine.

Yeltsin received a warm welcome when he criticized official privileges at the former Communist Party boss of Moscow's plan to Tuesday in his drive to capture in a popular election a seat representing all of Moscow.

It was Yeltsin's criticism of the party and warning that a cult was developing around President Mikhail S. Gorbachev that got him fired as Moscow party chief in November 1987.

Afghan guerrillas blow up bridge near Jalalabad

KABUL, Afghanistan (AP) — Guerrillas blew up a bridge on the only paved road to Jalalabad, the government said Thursday, disrupting supplies to the city they chose as their first major objective after the Soviet withdrawal.

A Foreign Ministry spokesman said three other roads, all unpaved and more circuitous, remained open to military convoys between Kabul and the strategic city 75 miles to the east near the Khyber Pass.

Mohammad Nabi Amami told reporters the bridge near Sarabi, about midway between the capital and Jalalabad, was destroyed Tuesday by explosives planted on the span. He said the bridge was one of about 100 on the paved highway.

Moslem insurgents based in Pakistan and supported by the United States launched their offensive around the eastern city March 6 but have not succeeded in dislodging government troops.

Israeli party leader backs peace plan

JERUSALEM (AP) — Labor Party leader Shimon Peres backed a Palestinian "entity" Thursday as a key to peace in the occupied lands, where hospital officials said soldiers killed 14-year-old and wounded 15 other people.

He said he would urge Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir, leader of the conservative Likud bloc, to accept the peace plan before the premier visits the United States next month. Peres is finance minister in the "national unity" coalition of Likud and his center-left party.

Newspaper reports said the plan calls for a Palestinian state in all but name, demilitarized and in confederation with Jordan and Israel. Peres denied recommending a separate state in the occupied West Bank and Gaza Strip, which Israel captured in the 1967 war.

Korean police guard against bombs

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — Police began arming themselves Thursday with semi-automatic rifles to guard against firebomb attacks by protesters demanding the ouster of President Roh Tae-woo.

The announcement of the measures prompted riots by thousands of students in six cities.

Police also put about 5,000 investigators of the 130,000-member force on alert and ordered them to arrest leftists, the newspaper Chosun Ilbo reported.

Senior government officials, who refused to be further identified, said police were being issued about 13,000 M-16 rifles after the government approved better weapons for police to help defend police posts and government facilities against mounting firebomb attacks.

Officials refuse new political parties

BEIJING (AP) — Officials said Thursday that the nation's eight so-called democratic political parties will continue to operate under communist guidance and that new parties will not be allowed.

On Tuesday, Communist Party authorities announced a plan to allow the eight parties to participate in the government. Yang Mingfu, who heads the Communist Party's office that deals with other parties, said the plan will be ready by June or July.

The parties will operate only under the leadership of the Communist Party, which has ruled China since 1949, he said.

The plan comes as a growing number of intellectuals are calling for more political freedom and appears to be an attempt by the Communist Party to silence

130 Vietnamese refugees drown

TOKYO (AP) — Vietnamese refugees said Thursday about 130 countrymen drowned two weeks ago when their overloaded 30-foot wooden boat capsized and sank near a Japanese tanker in the South China Sea.

Japanese authorities said first reports of the March 8 accident did not emerge until Monday, when 35 survivors of the accident on the high seas between Vietnam and Malaysia arrived in the port of Yokohama. News agencies in Malaysia said Thursday that floating bodies were sighted off Malaysia.

It was the latest reported accident involving the increasing number of Vietnamese fleeing political repression and economic hardship in the communist country. The refugees, known as boat people, risk piracy and disaster in hopes of achieving asylum and permanent resettlement outside Vietnam.

Surviving refugees said the boat collided with the 239,000-ton Nissei-Maru and sank, but the tanker's captain said he believed a wave capsized the boat.

New tower to be built in Italy

PAVIA, Italy (AP) — A new tower will be built to replace the 900-year-old structure that collapsed last week, authorities announced Thursday.

A request for the appropriation of funds had been filed to the government "to restore the symbol of this city," said Lionello Costanza Fattori, head of the regional office for protection of monuments.

Four people were killed and 15 were injured when the 235-foot tower collapsed March 17 onto a downtown square of this northern city.

City officials also announced they would inspect other medieval towers and monuments. A 501-year-old cathedral adjacent to the tower suffered substantial damage in the collapse.

Officials search for insecticide

CHERBOURG, France (AP) — Authorities searching the English Channel for a container of deadly insecticide detected an object on sonar, but it turned out to be a block of reinforced concrete, the navy said Thursday.

The container was lost when the Indonesian ship Perintis sank in a storm March 13 northwest of the Channel Islands. Ecologists say that if the container spills its six tons of toxic Lindane insecticide, it could cause an ecological disaster with dire consequences for the next 30 years.

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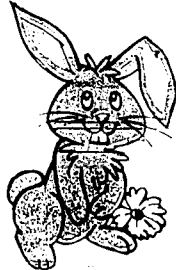
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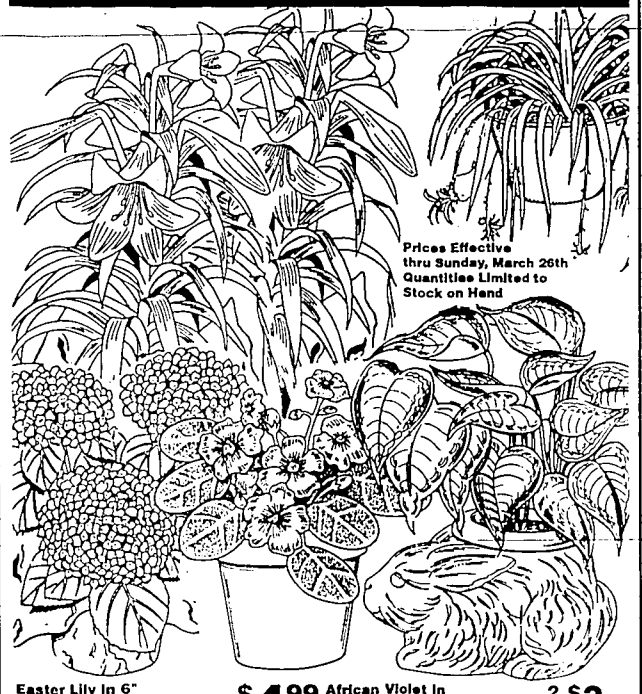
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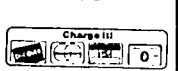


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Bill on housing ready for vote

Stivers argues Idaho Housing Agency subsidizes housing that's not low income

BOISE - Twin Falls businessman Tom Stivers, a former House speaker and trustee of the Idaho Housing Agency, has a message for the current House: Vote no on a bill to expand the Idaho Housing Agency's authority.

The bill, expected to receive a final vote today or Monday, would expand the bonding capacity of the agency from \$600 million to \$900 million and make other changes that the agency says are technicalities but that Stivers believes are substantial.

He's concerned that the bill would remove some checks on the agency and expand the amount of money allowed to be loaned, even though he believes the agency has already overstepped its mission to help low-income families buy homes.

"We're subsidizing housing that is not really low income anymore," Stivers says. He classifies the loans as subsidized because they are financed with tax-exempt bonds.

A one- or two-person family making up to \$31,500 in Jerome, Cassia, Lincoln or Gooding counties can qualify for a mortgage now at 8.4 percent interest on a house costing as much as \$68,000.

In Twin Falls County, the income



limit for households of one or two is \$27,100. The limit for a family of three or more is \$31,150.

Idaho Housing Agency spokeswoman Ann Lawless defends the income limits, saying they are lower than those allowed by the federal government. And the average person actually receiving loans has an income and buys a house far below the limits, she says.

During a 10-month period in Twin Falls County last year, the average family income of buyers in the program was \$22,500 and they purchased homes with an average price of \$36,712. Statewide the average family in the program had an income about \$1,000 greater than in Twin Falls, three family members, a household head aged 32 and took out mortgages averaging \$43,855.

"For people earning \$14,000, and \$15,000 no way can they buy a house," Lawless said. "It's a means to bring housing to lower income and younger people. We're serving people

Bub Gilliland hopes selling Idaho lottery tickets at his Twin Falls bait shop will bring in additional revenue

Local stores to sell lottery tickets

TWIN FALLS - Bub and Karen Gilliland plan to offer lottery tickets along with the nightcrawlers, Lindy rigs, Royal Coachman flies, and the other assorted goodies at Gilliland's Bait & Tackle store.

There is one of 18 locations in Twin Falls that have inquired about selling Idaho Lottery tickets.

"We believe in the lottery," Karen Gilliland said. "It will bring more traffic into our business."

Unlike his wife, Bub Gilliland doesn't think selling lottery tickets will help sell more bait or tackle. But the ticket sales themselves will provide additional revenue, he said.

Retail outlets will get a 5 percent commission on ticket sales.

The lottery has received 726 inquiries from Idaho retailers so far. It wants to have at least 1,000 ticket outlets throughout the state. Not

every interested business will qualify, but all those that do will be accepted. Lottery tickets should go on sale sometime this summer, Bill Applegate, lottery sales manager, said.

Thirty-three businesses in Twin Falls County have expressed interest, along with 11 in Minidoka County, 11 in Blaine County, 10 in Cassia County, seven in Jerome County, six in Gooding County and three each in Lincoln and Camas counties.

The more the merrier is Bub Gilliland's attitude.

"If they have just a few locations like in Ontario, Ore., where you wait in a line two blocks long to buy a ticket, you kind of lose interest in it," he said.

"From the retailer's perspective a lottery ticket is another product they can offer their customers and make a profit," said Bob Cooper, a lottery spokesman. It can increase their traffic and their opportunities to sell more of their other products, he said.

While virtually any kind of retail establish-

ment is acceptable for ticket sales, grocery stores, convenience stores and drug stores are most common, Cooper said.

"Places that sell a high volume of inexpensive goods and have a lot of people moving through are ideal," he said. "A high-fashion clothing store would probably not want to sell lottery tickets."

Circle K plans to sell the tickets. "Walmart is interested too. So is the Depot Grill."

Albertson's isn't sure.

"In all the other states we operate in with lotteries we do sell them, but we haven't made a decision about Idaho," said a spokeswoman for Albertson's Vice President Gary Michaels.

Each outlet that applies will go through background and credit checks to ensure credibility for both the customer and the lottery.

The lottery is looking for more qualified retailers to participate. Interested businesses can write to Applegate at Idaho Lottery, P.O. Box 6537, Boise, 83707-6537.

Gooding residents like 911, dislike cost

GOODING - Residents of Gooding County like the idea of a 911 emergency number system in their county but are concerned about how the costs will be divided up.

No one at a public forum Wednesday said they opposed the idea. Gooding County currently has seven different numbers for emergency services and officials from fire districts and law enforcement agencies said the system is inconvenient and confusing.

"It's a very must thing," Wendell ambulance driver Tom Young said. "We're going to have a lot of accidents in this area the next couple of years. They need to know what to call for emergencies. It's almost a nationwide system, except for this area."

Commissioner Don Morrow agreed. "It's a service I think they're going to mandate before long," Morrow said.

Considerable discussion arose, however, when Phil Ruebel, US West Communications, presented the costs for instituting the 911 system and suggested assessing the fees according to the length of telephone lines to the dispatch center in Gooding.

But this would mean much higher rates for cities other than Gooding so Gooding Mayor Gene Heller suggested basing the system on population.

The commissioners agreed to study the suggestion.

The commissioners have decided that the county will pay 50 percent of the total costs, with the remaining half collected from other entities, Commissioner Bob Muffley said.

In a related matter, the commissioners also will consider the same assessing system for county dispatch. Currently the county pays most of the bill, with Gooding and

Hagerman picking up some of the costs.

The commissioners expect to have a preliminary proposal for both ready by the middle of April.

Ruebel told the meeting the 911 installation fee would be \$2,474, with a monthly telephone line charge of \$634. The current monthly cost of maintaining seven phone lines running to the dispatcher's office is \$429, a difference of \$205.

An additional cost would be a computer, which would identify addresses and phone numbers of incoming calls. The commissioners are still looking into the various types of available equipment, but estimate that the cost will be about \$4,000.

Ruebel recommended assessing the charges on the length of telephone lines, which would mean Bliss, Hagerman and Wendell each would pay a monthly line charge of about \$200 and Gooding would be responsible for the remaining \$12-36.

"Why should Hagerman pay a different price than Gooding? Why not just split it four ways?" Young asked.

Heller suggested sharing the costs on the basis of population or number of phones. "I think everyone is willing to pay their own share," he said.

Muffley agreed that basing the costs upon population seemed equitable.

"We'll have another work session to determine how's the best way to do it," he said. "I think the population base would be the way to go. It'd be fair for everyone."

Muffley earlier suggested dividing the costs among the fire and police departments. "There are six taxing districts other than the county taxing district," he said. "So if this were divided up among the six taxing districts, it wouldn't be most cost for

Gooding rejects enforcement contract

HAGERMAN - City officials in Hagerman and the Gooding County commissioners disagree on the starting time of a joint contract for law enforcement protection.

The commissioners on Wednesday rejected an amended contract in which the city would have begun paying for protection this year.

Commissioner Bob Muffley Tuesday presented

the council with a contract that would have retroactive to Oct. 1, 1988. The contract for police protection from the county sheriff's department would be for \$16,000 a year.

The council members agreed to the contract but would not agree to the retroactive starting date. They said the city will pay \$8,000 for half a year from April 1, 1989 to October, 1989 and then decide if the contract will be renewed for a full year.

The city has not had a contract with the county for deputy service and so is not obligated to pay for

the last six months, Councilman Rolly Zollinger said.

The commissioners will present their original contract, written by County Prosecuting Attorney Lynn Nelson and Sheriff Robert Aja, to the council again April 4. Muffley said if the city rejects it and refuses to pay the additional \$8,000 retroactive to October of last year, the county will withdraw police protection from Hagerman.

The contract has traveled back and forth be-

Rupert council delays detention discussion

RUPERT - A public forum to discuss plans to establish a juvenile detention center in a city neighborhood has been set back a few days.

The City Council, following a presentation of the county's plans for the facility, this week rescheduled the meeting for 7 p.m. April 11 at the City Fire Hall.

City Attorney Don Chisholm presented the council with a letter from the county commissioners detailing the juvenile facility. The council re-

quested the letter at a meeting earlier this month in which about 50 people questioned the county's plans to put the facility in a neighborhood.

The county is considering establishing a detention facility in the old American Legion Hall, at 809 H St., to bring the county into line with federal statutes requiring that juveniles not be detained within sight nor sound of adult offenders. Violation of the statutes could result in the loss of federal funds.

Several attempts have been made in recent years to renovate the county's existing facilities but due to the physical layout of the jail those ef-

orts have resulted in further overcrowded conditions, the commissioners' letter stated.

Among the items listed in the commissioners' letter are:

Installation of a telephone and security system, 24-hour supervision by off-duty reserve and retired law enforcement and correctional officers, each manning an eight-hour shift.

Windows would not have bars and residents wouldn't be locked in.

Juveniles would be allowed to go to school, being transported by the public school bus system. The

Collision kills Burley woman

BURLEY - A Burley woman died Thursday of injuries caused when the car she was driving was hit from behind by a tractor-trailer rig, authorities say.

"We're watching her very closely," Reinhardt said.

A car driven by Swan was stopped at the intersection of 500 South and U.S. 27 at noon and was about to turn onto U.S. 27 when the semi crashed into the back of the car, propelling it 300 feet off the road, said Cassia County Sheriff's Lt. Jim Higgins.

It took about 45 minutes to extract the two from the car, Higgins said.

Other information, including the name

and medical condition of the semi's driver, was unavailable.

Bill extends water rights

BOISE - With a stroke of the governor's pen, farmers in critical groundwater areas will be extended the same grandfathered water rights as other Idaho farmers.

Thursday the House unanimously passed a bill pushed by Rep. Bruce Newcomb, R-Burley, addressing water rights in the two critical groundwater areas in Cassia County and those elsewhere in the state. The Senate had already passed the bill.

Farmers who have changed from flood irrigation to sprinkling can cultivate more land with the same amount of water. But because Idaho law ties water rights to land, the change has amounted to an illegal use of the water even though the same amount of water is being used more efficiently.

The Legislature had already legalized the expanded water use in areas other than critical groundwater areas.

Newcomb's bill extends grandfather

rights to those areas, thereby legalizing existing practices that previously were technically illegal. Farmers who took additional water through more wells or pumping are not included. The bill also includes requirements for critical groundwater organizations to make sure the water supply is not further depleted.

Without Newcomb's legislation, the state could face lawsuits from farmers in critical groundwater areas, and the Snake River adjudication would take much longer to complete, he has said.

The law will take effect as soon as the governor signs it.

The city has the plaque and a waist-high stone monument is planned.

Mike Magee, greenskeeper for the town, was granted permission to purchase grass seed from his budget. He plans to plant Dandy Ryx Grass on the baseball field, a new perennial

grass variety that is resistant to drought. The dark green grass doesn't hatch so is resistant to diseases, Magee said.

The price is \$1 per pound because it is an experimental seed.

Fire Chief Carl Marr reported that 10 Emergency Medical Technicians will complete training soon. Some of them will be available to help with ambulance calls. The county commissioners have decided that Jackpot

Heyburn holds power outage today

HEYBURN - The city of Heyburn will have a power outage today scheduled for four hours.

The Bonneville Power Administration will shut off power from 1-5 p.m. while it hooks the city to a portable transformer so technicians can work on the city's current transformer.

The outage may not last that long, however, Electric Department Supervisor Billy Despain said.

The BPA project is part of the agency's standard maintenance program, Mayor Herb Hursud said.

For other work, the transformer will be hooked up until May 10, so

city workers can overhaul Heyburn's substation, Hursud said.

In other action, Hursud said the federal government has said the city will receive a \$43,000 grant to study what is needed to upgrade the city's sewer system. Now the agency has the authority to issue bonds for up to \$600 million to finance its programs. It's asking the legislature to extend that limit to \$990 million.

Lawless says the agency is near its limit now. With the increased bonding authority it can continue making loans next year and sell bonds to finance housing over the next three years.

The advance money is necessary because the federal government has not authorized the program past the end of this year. However, Rep. Bruce Newcomb, R-

Burley, who voted for the agency bill in committee, says that the Federal Housing Act is due for an overhaul and the extra money should just tide the state over until new federal laws are in place.

Stivers' complaints that some people receiving loans are not low income have merit, Newcomb says. "They do get into moderate incomes," he says. "But look at the housing market today and the people who are excluded."

He is less concerned than Stivers that the proposed bill would remove some financial checks on the agency. "Fiscally the agency is very well

managed," Newcomb says.

Stivers is concerned that the state allows up to \$400 million of the debt to be secured by state sales tax. Agency officials and Newcomb counter that insurance and the limited amount of money actually secured by sales tax money lessens state risk.

Stivers also takes exception to lifting a state requirement that the agency receive permission of local housing authorities before financing low-income housing projects. In-house regulations would still require the county commissioners or city council to approve any project.

tween the city and the county for almost two years, with disagreements over patrolling times, the need for a resident officer and communication problems between city officials and deputies.

Council member Audrey Hoffman, also the city's police commissioner, said the sheriff's department has not talked with city officials during the last six months. The council unanimously passed her motion to pay for the contract with a changed starting date of April.

The commissioners rejected it be-

cause they say police service has been offered to Hagerman since October.

Muffley, a new commissioner this year, said Thursday the Hagerman City Council apparently had a verbal agreement with the commissioners last year.

"It is my understanding that they had agreed with the county commissioners to pay \$16,000 for an annual contract," Muffley said. The sheriff guaranteed that he had given the service and fulfilled the contract even though there was nothing in writing

at the time."

Muffley said that even though there has been a battle of negotiations, the sheriff's department has been abiding by the contract since October, even though no contract was ever signed.

Muffley explained that the county does not have to enforce any of the city's ordinances or traffic signs unless there is a contract. An incorporated city, he said, is liable for enforcement of local city laws. County patrol is only obligated to enforce state and county laws.

creasing water rates. Beginning April 1, residential rates for the first 2,000 gallons will rise \$5.00 to \$5.50. More than 2,000 gallons will be charged \$5 cents per 1,000.

Commercial rates will rise to \$9 from \$8 for the first 2,000, with larger amounts charges 80 cents per 1,000.

Temporary shut-off fees will be \$5 from 8 a.m.-5 p.m. and \$15 other times and holidays. Turn-off fees for non-payment will double to \$15 after hours and holidays. Turn-on fees for new users will be free during office hours but \$15 other times.

A special monthly rate of \$2 on

amounts more than 8,000 gallons will be charged on residential lawn sprinkling from April through October, using the hi-pressure system. Sprinkler rate applications can be made from 8 a.m.-5 p.m. at the city offices.

The council adopted the Uniform Building Code.

An ordinance was introduced which would change the electricity fees on energy used for farm irrigation pumps and for irrigation water. Interest would be charged on bills not paid by Dec. 1. Also, deposits for the following year would be levied in an amount equal to the delinquent bill of the previous season.

anybody. The possibilities of spreading out the costs by including them on individual tax statements or phone bills were dismissed as being too cumbersome.

The commissioners and others also discussed the division of county dispatch costs. The total annual figure for this service is \$63,297, including teletype expenses and wages and benefits for 412 employees.

The county currently pays most of the dispatch bill, although the cities of Gooding and Hagerman do contribute as part of their police contracts.

Wendell has not paid any costs for dispatch in this area, nor has the fire districts, nor has Bliss, Muffley said. "It's just been a totally inequitable situation and since we're working on the 911, we thought we'd make a clean sweep."

Steve Spence, of the Police Department, said that he had conducted a survey of 22 towns approximately the population of Gooding. Of those, he said, some save money collecting a set percentage of each community's budget, while others simply charged a flat fee.

Muffley again said that the county would foot 50 percent of the expenses, leaving the remaining half to be collected from other entities. He suggested perhaps billing the city governments, who could in turn seek recompense from the fire and police taxing districts. This arrangement would help with bookkeeping, he said.

Mail drugs law goes to Andrus

BOISE (AP) — A bill requiring Idaho state licensing of out-of-state mail order pharmacies is on its way to Gov. Cecil Andrus.

The Idaho House Wednesday, following the action last month of the state Senate, approved the measure 75-0.

The bill was prompted by the death last year of a Princeton, Idaho, woman, who received a misla-

beled prescription from a mail-order drug company.

"We can't imagine the kind of arrangement where a toxic substance would be side by side with every-day drugs, but we do," said Rep. James Lucas, R-Mosco.

The measure is similar to laws passed in Utah and California. Some 20 states now regulate pharmacies based outside their borders

that distribute drugs across state lines. Another 11 are contemplating similar laws.

Idaho officials first learned they lacked much authority over these mail-order companies last year when Iris Hemmelman, 70, of Princeton died after taking a prescription from a bottle labeled "prednisolone," an anti-inflammatory medication.

Committee wants older drivers

BOISE (AP) — Legislation to raise Idaho's driving age from 14 to 16 barely squeaked through the House Transportation Committee on Wednesday.

With Chairman John Seasons, R-Driggs, casting the tie-breaking vote, the committee sent the bill to the House floor for amendments. Specifically, the committee favored an amendment to change the bill's

effective date.

But Rep. Richard Adams, D-Grangeville, who opposed the bill, said, "I would assume that bill is open and fair game once it goes to the amending process."

Rubbing his hands together, Adams said, "I think I can make a good bill out of it."

The bill, which had passed the Senate on a 29-13 vote, would raise

the driving age, but would allow exemptions for 14- or 15-year-olds who need to drive for work or school. Parents and employers would have to certify that exemptions were needed, and they would apply only during the hours when the youngster is actually working or going to school. The bill also allows 15-year-olds to get learner's permits.

Idaho ratifies pay amendment

BOISE (AP) — Idaho has become the 26th state to ratify a proposed amendment to the U.S. Constitution preventing Congress from raising its own pay until an election has intervened.

The action was completed Thursday by a Legislature which allowed its pay to go up 5.5 percent this year in much the same process as Congress tried to use to raise salaries to \$135,000 earlier this year. But members of Congress eventually forced a vote which re-

jected the increases.

In Idaho, a citizen commission recommended raises from \$4,200 to about \$6,500 per year in salary, which went into effect Dec. 1, at the start of the legislative terms, and remained in effect unless the lawmakers voted to reject it.

At the deadline, legislative leaders decided to take no action, allowing the higher pay to remain.

It takes 38 states approving proposed amendments to ratify the U.S. Constitution. The Idaho

House voted 74-0 for the amendment on Thursday. The Senate approved it 38-2 earlier.

The proposal was put before Idaho voters in the last general election and approved overwhelmingly.

The House also voted 48-28 for a bill raising salaries for Idaho's seven top elected officials. It does not go into effect until January of 1991, after the next election, because the Idaho Constitution forbids raising pay for state officials during their term of office.

PUC takes on phone deregulation

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Public Utilities Commission has begun facing the stark realities of what Commissioner Perry Swisher called the "brave new world" of telephone deregulation.

The three-member commission conducted a public hearing Thursday on US West Communications' decision to shift some of its services out of the realm of PUC rate oversight, effective April 1.

Taking advantage of provisions of the Idaho Telecommunications Act of 1988, US West has elected to become the state's first local exchange company to deregulate all but its basic local phone service to residential and small business customers.

The Public Utilities Commission would retain authority to review the quality of the deregulated services, as well as their availability and the terms and conditions under which they are offered.

Spokesman Gary Richardson said the PUC will not have to issue an order enacting the deregulation, but that US West officials agreed the commission would retain jurisdiction over the "appropriateness" of shifting particular services away from rate regulation.

However, some PUC staff members urged the commission to set some specific conditions on US West's move to lift rate regulation from such services as long distance, WATS, local network access, custom calling and directory assistance.

Lynn Anderson, the commission's telecommunications section supervisor, said in prefiled testimony that he feared unless the PUC prohibited it, US West would be able to raise rates at will on more frequently made short-haul toll calls while it cuts rates on more distant toll calls.

"It is extremely important in the interest of public safety and convenience for the commission to protect communities which depend heavily on services and facilities in nearby communities from unreasonable toll rate increases," Anderson said. "Clearly the company's track record demonstrates a strong preference for higher short-haul toll rates."

He proposed a new method of determining rates for what amount to

"local" long-distance calls between certain communities no more than 30 miles apart. Extended Local Measured Service would combine elements of the current non-toll Extended Area Service and Local Measured Service rates, which included a flat access rate plus a usage charge.

Anderson recommended establishing 62 ELMS routes between such communities as Piler and Twin Falls, Patfield and Gooding, Lava Hot Springs and Bancroft, Arbon Valley and American Falls, Cambridge and Midvale and Emmett and Boise.

Beverly Barker, the PUC's consumer assistance director, recommended in prefiled testimony that the commission bar the company from selling "packages" of phone services containing both basic regulated service and unregulated options.

Radiation in water decreases

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — A radioactive isotope of iodine can still be detected in groundwater beneath the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory, but at much lower levels than eight years ago, according to a recent U.S. Geological Survey report.

Tests at the Idaho Chemical Processing Plant in 1986 revealed findings 129 contaminations of up to 3.6 picocuries per liter. That's above the 1 picocurie per liter maximum allowed for drinking water, but well below 1981 readings.

At that time, USGS crews found readings of up to 41 picocuries per liter beneath the U.S. Department of Energy nuclear site, USGS hydrologist Larry Mann said Wednesday.

Mann attributed the lower readings to the closure of an injection well that dumped wastewater directly into the Snake River Plain aquifer. Since February 1984, ICPP wastewater has been held in filtration ponds.

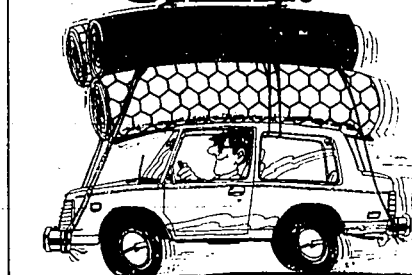
The Big Lost River also has helped recharge the aquifer and dilute the iodine. From 1977 to 1981, only 300 acre-feet of water from the river entered the aquifer at ICPP. From 1981 to 1986, the recharge was about 7,000 acre-feet, Mann said.

The plume of iodine-129 is growing, but very slowly, Mann said. Very low readings have been detected at the Central Facilities Area, south of ICPP.

At the south end of the Central Facilities Area, readings are about 0.1 picocuries per liter, which Mann said was "below any realistic reporting level."

The USGS probably will check for iodine-129 again in 1990 or 1991. While Mann expects the readings to continue to decrease, he said, "I think it'll still be detectable."

Seton Hall tops Indiana, 78-65

DENVER — Andrew Gaze accounted for four of Seton Hall's eight 3-point baskets, and the Pirates upended Indiana 78-65 Thursday night in NCAA tournament West Regional play.

Seton Hall, 29-6, advances to the regional final Saturday against the winner of the Arizona-Nevada-Las Vegas game.

The Pirates' superior rebounding and inside offense proved to be the difference against an Indiana team that had to be content with shooting

from the perimeter most of the night.

Hoosier guard Jay Edwards had 16 of his 18 points in the second half, helping rally Indiana from a 12-point deficit early in the second half to within 54-51 with 8:16 left. But Hillman could get no closer.

Seton Hall guard John Morton, who wound up as the Pirates' leading scorer with 17 points, hit six free throws down the stretch. After Edwards had cut the deficit to 65-56 on two free throws, Seton Hall's Gerald Greene countered with two free throws and Ramon Ramos hit a turnaround inside for a 64-56 advantage.

Joe Hillman's 3-pointer got the Hoosiers within 68-63 with 2:16 left, but two free throws by Ramos, a fast-break basket by Gaze and Morton's pair from the line made it 74-63.

Greene finished with 16 points, Ramos 15 and Ramos 12 for the winners.

At that point, fleet Lyle Hudelson drew a walk and quickly stole second. LBob Jenco then laced a shot up the middle to force the tie.

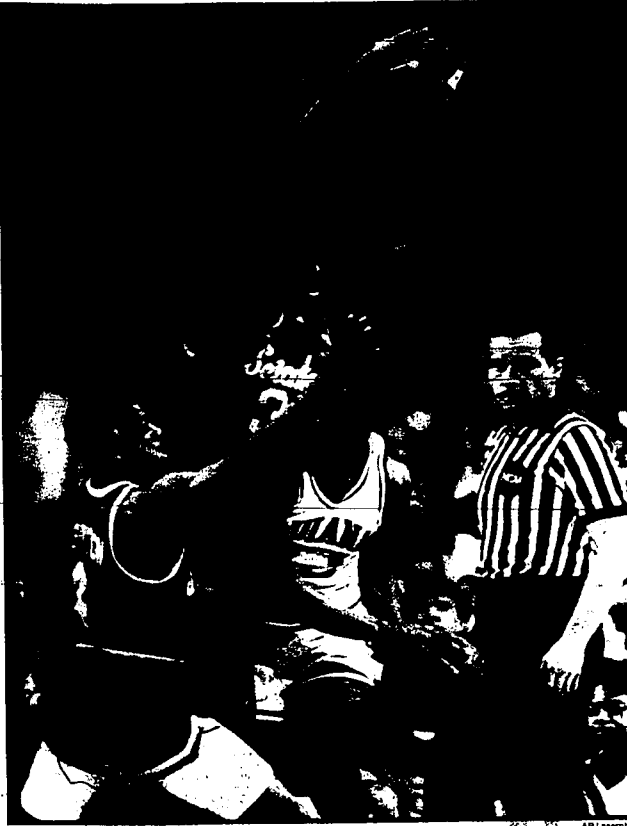

Top-seeded Georgetown will play fifth-seeded North Carolina State in the other semifinal. "We're not here just to play a basketball game," said Haskins, whose 11th-seeded Gophers are the lowest-seeded team still left in the tournament. "I know the papers have picked us to get beat by 10 to 15 points, but we're just out here for the game. We're here to win."

To win, the Gophers will have to neutralize Ferry, the

winner of the 1989 Naismith Award as the nation's top college player and the two-time ACC player of the year.

"The one thing I remember about him when I was with the Bullets was that he could shoot," Haskins said. "I'm not worried about his points. I'm more worried about his passing. It gets everyone involved. He's like having a third guard on the floor. He's an outstanding passer."

Ferry, the 6-foot-10, 230-pound senior, has handed out 357 assists this season, second on the team to point guard Quinn Snyder. Ferry has also averaged 22.4 points and 7.4 rebounds per game.

Haskins said the biggest threat Minnesota can accomplish against Ferry is to make him work hard on every possession.

"When a team is trying to take things away, I just try not to press," Ferry said. "I know we have other guys who can do things and I have to let them."

Duke and Minnesota are entering the Sweet 16 from different directions. This will be the Blue Devils fourth straight appearance in the regional semifinals. They've earned trips to the Final Four in two of the past three years on a road through East Rutherford.

The recently troubled Gophers, in their third season under Haskins, are making their first NCAA showing.

All-America center Stacey King scored 22 points for Oklahoma, but got only two in the first half and had trouble much of the night with Virginia's sagging defense.

"We as a team played together and stayed together during the whole game," said Richard Morgan, who scored 25 points and sparked a late Virginia run with a pair of 3-pointers. "I think we isolated certain guys at great times in the game."

If it wasn't Morgan hurting the Sooners, it was forward Bryant Smith, who scored 28. Or assist guard John Crotty, who had 14 points, or center point guard three turnovers. Or forward Brent Dabbs, who grabbed

a career-high 14 rebounds.

Dabbs helped the Cavaliers outrebound Oklahoma 38-26, including 17-9 on the offensive end. Virginia also outscored the Sooners 27-8 at the free throw line.

"We just got whipped tonight," said Coach Billy Tubbs, whose team became the first No. 1 seed to lose in the tournament.

Oklahoma, 30-6 and runner-up in last year's NCAA Tournament, took a 7-2 lead in the opening three minutes. But Virginia's strong offensive rebounding gave the Cavaliers several second chances in an 8-2 run that gave them a 10-9 lead.

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THE ACES ON BRIDGE BOBBY WOLFF

Dear Mr. Wolff: I open one no-trump and rebid two diamonds over partner's Stayman request. If he now bids four no-trump, is this Blackwood or is it a quantitative raise? What if my response had been in a major suit?

ANSWER: Visualize a dummy with length in both majors (5-5 or 5-4). Then assess how your hand fits with that dummy. Length in one or both of the majors is a plus. Five cards in one major and a singleton in the other will mis-evaluate your hand's great promise. K-Q combinations in the minor suits are of doubtful value. After the assessment, bid the full value of your visualized combined assets.

ANSWER: In either case, the jump should be considered a quantitative raise. To eliminate problems of this nature, your partnership should agree to use Gerber (four clubs) to ask for aces after an opening bid in no-trump.

Dear Mr. Wolff: Partner dealt and passed, and I bid two diamonds over my RHO's opening one spade. If partner bids two hearts, should I bid three hearts with this hand or four hearts?

Dear Mr. Wolff: My RHO deals and opens one club. After two passes, partner jumps to four hearts. RHO bids five clubs and both sides are vulnerable. Should I bid five hearts with this hand?

ANSWER: Three hearts is just about right. If game is on, trust partner to continue.

ANSWER: I would bid five hearts, it might be a cheap sacrifice, or it might be a phantom sacrifice (both sides go down). However, the arithmetic favors the bidders because bidding tends to avoid the large swings.

ANSWER: The a-priori probability of a 2-2 split is 40.7 percent.

Dear Mr. Wolff: If partner uses the Michaels convention (cue-bid of a minor opening to show both majors and typically 7-11 HCP), can you offer a simple way for me to evaluate my hand?

ANSWER: If there are four cards missing in the trump suit, what are the odds of my finding a 2-2 split?

"Modern man thinks he loses something - time - when he does not do things quickly; yet he does not know what to do with the time he gains - except kill it." - Erich Fromm.

Many dealers lose no time drawing Trumps in the play of today's game. They also make it easy for the defense to beat the game. At the first table in a Swiss-team event, declarer took dummy's heart ace, East following with the deuce. Trumps came next and East discarded his diamond eight to show partner where "his stuff" was. After that, South had no chance. As soon as West gained the lead, he switched to diamonds and the game went one down.

When George Gray of San Antonio, Texas, held the South cards, he saw little reason to draw trumps immediately. Instead he led dummy's club nine and passed it to West's 10. Perhaps West should have found the diamond switch anyway. However, he saw no harm in cashing at least one heart. Curtains: George ruffed, drew trumps and led his club king to ruff out West's ace. Then he discarded two of dummy's diamonds on his two high clubs, converting a sure, down one into an "easy" overtrick.

Dedicated group creates stained glass windows

JEROME — Don't tell members of the First Church of God in Jerome what can't be done.

With a "little lead, solder and ingenuity" they have created seven stained glass and agate windows for their church sanctuary depicting important biblical scenes.

After 14 months in the making, the windows were unveiled in a special Palm Sunday dedication this week. Church members originally anticipated it would take 2½ years. From the inception of the project the members have been overcoming odds.

Three commercial artists and numerous others in California and elsewhere told them a project involving stained glass and agate couldn't be done. Their attempts to get a stained glass craftsman to work with them failed also.

"So all the doors were shut, it turned out we had to do it all ourselves. And God did it. We didn't know how," says Harriet Weixel, who is married to the church's pastor.

Weixel, who ultimately designed the scenes, knows what she's talking about. She's had no previous experience in art or design and claims "they hardly let me draw in kindergarten."

Working from that background Weixel designed intricate scenes depicting The Creation, Noah and the Ark, The Ten Commandments, Christ's Birth, Jesus' Ministry, The Crucifixion and the Ascension.

The idea for the windows originated with Weixel and Opal Dethfels who contributed most of the agate. Dethfels and her late husband Otto had collected agate throughout their married life.

Weixel says Dethfels wanted to do something for the church with the

slices of agate.

"To encourage her I just said, 'Why don't we just make a great big window all the way across the front of the church.' And it was amazing, everyone just said, 'Yeah, let's try, let's do it.'"

Originally Weixel tried to design windows just using the agate pieces, then decided it would be better if it was combined with stained glass.

Twenty church members rallied to participate in the project. "Not a one of the crew had ever done any cutting of glass, and it takes years to perfect that. None of us were lapidarians who knew much about the rock, and there never was a technique of putting the two together," Weixel says.

"The group didn't even know what they were getting into," says Linda Gray, who became their advisor. "But they knew somehow they were going to do it," she adds.

A Jerome resident and owner of "Stained Glass Reflections," Gray says she was impressed with the enthusiasm and dedication of the group.

"Although it was a massive undertaking...I was really impressed from the very beginning because they arrived at our first meeting with ideas already in place, the oak screen...waiting for windows, and so it was really obvious to me that they were prepared and dedicated, which I think is half the battle," says Gray.

Using the knowledge gleaned from a six-week class taught by Gray, the group began the painstaking work of cutting and polishing the 717 pieces of agate used and combining those pieces with stained glass to make up the patterns for the windows.

Agate slices make up the border around five of the windows as well as for specific objects. For example, the tulips and turtle in the Creation are

a brown Brazilian agate, and an onyx represents the moon. White and grey moss agate is used for the tablets depicting the Ten Commandments.

Noah's ark is made mostly of a brown Brazilian agate with a wood grain, and the leaves of the olive branch are jade.

The crib of the Christ child was cut from a piece of petrified wood. The slab inside the tomb where Christ

laid is a white Montana agate, and a piece of white stained glass is used inside the tomb which appears to have an image representing angels.

The Rev. Elroy Weixel says the group chose to depict scenes which were familiar to most people and chose to do seven panels because, "They're a complete biblical number, a holy number."

The creation of the windows has

been inspiring for not only the window crew but also for the 75-member congregation. "It has done more to bond them together than anything that we have had happen," says Harriet Weixel.

Although many professional craftsmen doubted the success of the project, the crew never did. Problems arose, but everyone worked together to solve them, says Dethfels.

"Of course, you have to consider that our God was the beginning of it. You have to give a lot of credit there too...He guided us. I'm sure a lot of the problems that might have come up or did come up were solved more easily because we relied on the Lord," she says.

Perhaps the biggest catastrophe

Oscar forecast seems clear for 'Rain Man'

(Yawn.) (Umph.) Ah, oops, um, er. Oh, sorry, didn't see you. No, you didn't wake me. I just get this glazed, fish-like look on my face when I think about the 61st Academy Awards ceremony coming up

Wednesday night, which promises to be about as suspenseful as watching corn die on a hot Nebraska plain.

Almost certainly, Barry Levinson's "Rain Man" will walk away with the largest number of awards. It's exactly the kind of movie Hollywood loves, and it's got some terrific performances and some exquisite moments in it, and the people love it to the tune of \$125 million dollars. Moreover, it has an industry inner-circle subtext: It was a movie nobody could

figure out how to get made, that ate up producers and directors left and right, that became semi-notorious as the one that almost got away. Except it didn't get away because of the stubbornness of Dustin Hoffman and Tom Cruise, who, more than any director or studio, kept it alive. A second subtext: It may have almost single-handedly saved United Artists, the studio that was almost destroyed by the "Heaven's Gate" fiasco some years back, and has only clung to life as a part of MGM (with whom it shared a distribution network) and because it had the James Bond cash cow regularly squirting money into its otherwise depleted coffers.

So the real race will be for second place, between "Dangerous Liaisons" and "Accidental Tourist" and the fast-

fading "Mississippi Burning." One of those might come away with as many as three or four Oscars, which would be a major commercial boost to three films that haven't earned anywhere near \$100 million.

Here, not to milk the mock suspense too much, and to keep all of us from getting bored, are some semi-informed prognostications on the event, by category, best picture last.

Supporting actress

If past races are any indications, the nod will be toward Sigourney Weaver, for her role as the bitchy boss in "Working Girl," simply because every time an actress has been nominated in two categories, she wins the lesser; it happened in 1982 to Jessica Lange. But that "tradition" is less tradition than fluke. Also, Joan Cusack is nominated from the same film, tending to split the votes.

The real race here is between Frances McDormand for "Burning," Michelle Pfeiffer for "Dangerous Liaisons" and Geena Davis for "Accidental Tourist," the latter two showing how completely meaningless and completely political the category really is, since they were really starring roles. The winner should be Pfeiffer, not only for this film, in which she is truly great as the betrayed and destroyed Madame de Tourvel, but also for an increasingly impressive mainstream career, as exemplified in the

past four months not only by "Liaisons" but also by "Married to the Mob" and "Tequila Sunrise."

Supporting actor

Dicky, dicey, since none of the big, momentum-carrying pictures have entries. "Little Dorrit's" Alec Guinness may win because he is Alec Guinness and because "Little Dorrit" won the Los Angeles Film Critics' award as best picture of the year, for whatever reason, which means that some people may have actually seen the seven-hour adaptation of the Dickens novel. Dean Cainwell might get an award not so much for his performance in "Married to the Mob" but because, like pal Dennis Hopper, he floated away under the Sixties and at one point sold real estate in New Mexico. Now, He's Back, as they like to say in movie land.

Martin Landau ("Tucker: The Man and His Dream") has also staged a comeback, having had a minor career in movies (Steve McQueen knifed him in "Nevada Smith") and appearing in disguise on "Mission Impossible."

Finally, there's River Phoenix ("Running on Empty"), film him under "He's Almost Here." That leaves Kevin Kline, who, in "A Fish Called Wanda," certainly gave his best performance in films as the dauntless American robber, a Nietzschean man of the highest order. His zainness

makes the modestly whacky British film the best comedy of the year. Kline should win the Best Supporting Actor Oscar.

Best original screenplay

This should be a more competitive category than it will be. Two first-class original screenplays cropped up this year, first in Ron Shelton's grumpy tale to baseball and love, "Bull Durham," and in John Clee's "A Fish Called Wanda," which has to be a consistent come line as it contrasts British and American cultural absurdities. In a normal year, either of these could win, neither will.

Two other sure losers: Gary Ross and Anne Spielberg, Steven's sister, for the overrated "Big," and not just because no Spielberg has ever won an Academy award, and Naomi Foner for the wildly overrated "Running on Empty." The winner is ironic — of course it's Ronald Bass and Barry Morrow for "Rain Man" — because the formal script is probably the weakest of "Rain Man's" components, and one gets the feeling that the actors, and the benevolent guidance of script master Levinson, improvised their lines in most of the better scenes. More important, the humor has the scratchy, itchy Levinson feel, rather than the formal cadences of professional humor. And the film's

'Bagdad Cafe' is next in series

TWIN FALLS — Instead of watching the Academy Awards show Wednesday night, local film buffs may want to set their VCR's and go downtown to the Mall Cinema to watch "Bagdad Cafe."

The fourth offering in the Magic Valley Arts Council's foreign film series, "Bagdad Cafe" will be shown at 8 p.m. Wednesday. Tickets are \$6. The film is rated PG, parental guidance is suggested.

"Bagdad Cafe" is more of an international effort than strictly a foreign film. Shot in the California desert, the English-language film was made by Percy Adlon, a German director and stars Marianne Sägebrecht, a German actress.

The story is set in a ramshackle cafe that doesn't even have a working coffee machine. Sägebrecht arrives on the scene after abandoning her husband somewhere in the desert. She finds "a menagerie of wind-beaten, washed-up people" and decides to clean things up, according to John Hart, film reviewer for the Seattle Times.

"In the hands of almost anyone but Adlon and Sägebrecht, this slight fable might have seemed complacent, even maudlin," Hart writes. "But the visual style is so warmly eccentric, the characters so unapologetically off-center, that the conventional shape of the story rarely becomes a problem."

Hart's readers also gave the movie five stars. Based on an audience poll, "Bagdad Cafe" won the Golden State Needle award for best picture at last year's Seattle International Film Festival.

The last film in the series sponsored by Interstate Animation will be "Ginger and Fred," to be shown April 6.

State Legislature OKs special funding for cultural facilities

BOISE — Idaho's cultural facilities will get new life as the result of special funding to the Idaho Commission on the Arts.
The Idaho State Legislature earmarked \$160,000 for the construction or renovation of arts centers and galleries/museums and assigned administration of the funds to the Arts Commission.

There are specific conditions for funding and the timeline is relatively short. Applicant organizations must be not-for-profit and tax exempt under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code or a unit of an Idaho city or county government. Postmark deadline for applications is April 22. Grant monies will be allocated June 2 and 3 by the commission, and all

funds must be committed between June 15 and Dec. 15, 1989.

Academy Awards producer hopes to capture viewers with yesteryear

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. (AP) — Critics say the Academy Awards telecast is showing its age—Producer-Allan Carr says that's the way it should be.

In an attempt to keep the program's ratings from slipping, Carr will celebrate Oscar by reveling in its yesteryears.

"I'm restoring it, hopefully, to what it was in its glorious day," Carr said of Wednesday's broadcast of the 61st Annual Academy Awards from the Shrine Auditorium in Los Angeles. The program will be shown at 7 p.m. MST by ABC-TV.

Carr and scenic designer Ray Clausen will recreate a likeness of the Coconut Grove, the tropical nightclub where the Oscar dinner banquet was held in 1940. Famous movie couples will be seated at tables between the palm trees, and a bandstand will be on the stage.

"This is the ultimate variety show," Carr said. "It's also the ultimate awards show that all the other awards show copy. So I have to make this a return to Oscar—the way it was in the old days—because now you have the Tonys, the Grammys, the American Music Awards, the People's Choice Awards. ...

There's an awards show on every other week.

"The Oscars are supposed to be really glamorous and fun. It's the highest awards we give our royalty in this country. I'm going to shock people with glamour and humor."

Carr comes from a career filled with flamboyant spectacles. As the producer of the stage hit "La Cage aux folles" and the movies "Grease," "Giant," "Stop the Music" and "Where the Boys Are '84," his projects have rarely strayed from playfulness and overblown kitsch. He even held a black-tie dinner party in 1976 at the Lincoln Heights jail in a rundown section of East Los Angeles, to celebrate the opening of "Murder by Death," which starred the late author Truman Capote.

"Whether people like me or don't like me, or they like what I do or don't like what I do, they know that I love Hollywood and I'm a big enthusiast for Hollywood," Carr said.

"For the last four years, the orchestra has not been in the auditorium; they were at an ABC studio five miles away and the music was piped in. But this is going to be a Broadway show. I insisted that the orchestra comes back, Marvin Hamlisch will be in the pit conducting, and ramps have been put over the orchestra pit so the people can run up the aisles.

"I am producing, really, two things: A live show for the people who are there—like a Broadway opening night—and a television show which has a feeling of a Broadway opening night for the people at home."

There will be no single program host this year. Don Johnson and Melanie Griffith will present the first statuette, Cher and Michael Douglas will present the last, and dozens of other stars will manage everything in between.

Off-screen couples will be paired on-screen: Farrah Fawcett will appear with Ryan O'Neal; Goldie Hawn will be with Kurt Russell; and Demi Moore will be escorted by her husband, Bruce Willis.

"It's like 'Charlies of Fire.' It's like a relay race," Carr said. "The presenters pass the torch to the next person."

The telecast will honor awards-presenters as well as winners. When Stewart and Kim Novak appear to hand out a trophy, the audience will be shown a clip from their work together in 1958's "Vertigo."

biggest weakness is its wan and tentative ending, again a structural script flaw.

Best director

A most curious category. The first weirdness is the inclusion of Charles Crichton for "A Fish Called Wanda." Crichton is English and directed several of the classic British Ealing Studio comedies of the '50s, but he had pretty much dropped out of the business; it was writer-producer-star John Cleese who sponsored him, and it was widely understood at the time that Cleese was really "directing" the film, with the elderly Crichton along to lend moral support. So Crichton gets an Oscar nod, and Bob Zemeckis, who directed "Who Framed Roger Rabbit," gets nothing. Go figure.

The others are predictable: Martin Scorsese gets a nod for "Last Temptation of Christ," but really for enflaming the very uncool and safe energy of the religious right—and also for somehow getting the movie that nobody wanted to make, made. But he ain't winning any Oscars.

Alan Parker's "Mississippi Burning," after a big jolt of publicity and liberal-guilt-praise, has backslid under charges by the black community that it made heroes of scoundrels.

Alan Parker, who directed "Mississippi Burning" and Martin Scorsese, director of the controversial "The Last Temptation of Christ," each received two votes.

the indifferent FBI, and ignored the true heroes, the black civil rights workers who cracked the Old South. That will hurt Parker's chances mortally. Mike Nichols did good work in "Working Girl," but the movie came and went like a flash. That leave Barry Levinson, for "Rain Man," another problem picture whose problems Levinson solved but good. Levinson will win in a walk.

Best actress

Sigourney Weaver ("Gorillas in the Mist"), Melanie Griffith ("Working Girl") and Jodie Foster ("The Accused") are sure to be disappointed, almost a shame in the case of Foster, who managed something heretofore impossible: She brought dignity to the role that Hollywood has never gotten right, the working-class woman. But the winner has to be Glenn Close, completing her goody-goody total image shift of the last few years, dating from "Fatal Attraction." Close's spidery Mistress Merteuil, from "Dangerous Liaisons," is frosty, cruel and calculating, and waltzes graciously toward bitter self-destruction.

Best actor

Not as easy a category as it seems, though it really resolves itself into a two-man race. Tom Hanks ("Big"),

Max Von Sydow ("Pelle the Conqueror") and Edward James Olmos ("Stand and Deliver") can be completely discounted. Hanks because he's too young and the others because they are too un-Hollywood in marginal films. So it comes down to Gene Hackman as the country-smart FBI stud, Rupert Anderson, in "Mississippi Burning," or Dustin Hoffman as the autistic savant Raymond Babbitt in "Rain Man."

I'd hate to eat lunch on the difference between these two performers; each has a kind of eerie, once-in-a-lifetime brilliance. But in the end, I think extra-cinematic issues will prevail. Hackman, good as he is, is a mercenary; he just does the work (lots of it) and moves on, a complete pro. That's fine, but it means you get a lot more bad movies than good movies. Hoffman, on the other hand, sinks completely into the production process and tries to be a part of getting interesting films—like "Rain Man"—made. The winner will be Hoffman.

Best picture

Yawn. Is it that time already? OK, let's do the drill out of respect to the ritual. "The Accidental Tourist" won't win because it's too muted and provi-

sional and provides no big movie moments. "Dangerous Liaisons" won't win because it's too exotic and too cruel—it glorifies in human folly and depravity. Further, the Best Picture category is voted on by the whole Academy, which somewhat dilutes the edge the various branches bring to it. "Working Girl" won't win because... well, because there's no compelling reason that it should. "Mississippi Burning" won't win because the backlash has worn it down to a kernel. The envelope please, Morphus, before you claim me entirely. And the winner, for its excellence of course, and for its success, and for the stubbornness that went into getting it made, and most of all because it says the best things about Hollywood, is "Rain Man."

'Leviathan' is fast-paced movie with some scary moments

HOLLYWOOD — "Leviathan" is "Alien" under water. It is not nearly as sophisticated or as terrifying as the Ridley Scott film, but it looks good and moves fast. It is elementary fun with a couple of scary moments along the way.

Off the coast of Florida a crew of six men and two women are nearing the end of a 90-day stint 10,000 feet beneath the ocean's surface. Headquartered in Shack 7, a huge octagon of spun-molded steel, the crew dons cumbersome motorized suits to mine the ocean floor of precious metals for Trans-Oceanic, a multinational corporation represented via a TV monitor by an icy executive (Meg Foster), whose interest in profits rather than the welfare of her undersea employees is not exactly disguised.

Headed by a geologist (Peter Weller), the crew is already experiencing understandable cabin fever when it discovers the hulk of a huge Soviet ship. Sixpack (Daniel Stern), the least serious, most too crazy member of the crew, hides a flask of vodka he finds on the vessel, and shacks it later with one of the women (Lisa Eilbacher). Naturally, or unnat-

urally, as it turns out, a couple of slugs of the stuff produces the most horrifying results.

Written by David Peoples and Jeb Stuart from a story by Peoples, "Leviathan" (rated R for language, standard horror movie violence) is the old monster-of-the-deep movie slicked up to play as a cautionary tale about the perils of genetic engineering. Creature effects specialist Stan Winston and his studio have come up with the usual gelatinous monsters that mutate before our very eyes.

Playing against his "RoboCop" image, Weller comes on as the most hesitant and reluctant of leaders who, of

course, matures in crisis. Only Richard Crenna, as the crew's doctor, a scientist with a tragic incident in his past, has a role with any dimension to it. Other crew members are played capably by Amanda Pays, Ernie Hudson, Michael Carmine and Hector Elizondo.

Along with Crenna, resourceful cameraman Alex Thomson and production designer Ron Cobb, whose technically intricate settings are at once striking and convincingly functional, the film's strongest asset is the crisp, punchy direction of George P. Cosmatos. He is best known for his two Stallone blockbusters, "Rambo" and "Cobra," but more fondly remembered for the sly 1982 horror allegory "Of Unknown Origin," which also starred Weller.

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'Lean On Me' glosses over real problems

The following are capsule reviews of some of the films now playing in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

LEAN ON ME (PG-13). Bullhorn-and-baseball-bat-wielding educator Joe Clark is played by Morgan Freeman, possibly the most formidable actor on the American scene. And he will give thoughtful audiences their thorniest problems with "Lean on Me." When director John Avildsen turns up the heat, it is thrilling. But glossed over by the film makers are some of the real statistics of Clark's administration and the fact that he has very nearly created more problems than he has solved.

BEACHES (PG-13). This adaptation of the novel by Iris Rainer Dart is supposed to be the story of an abiding friendship between two very different women. Bette Midler is inevitable casting for the novel's C.C. Bloom and there is everything right with the idea of Barbara Hershey as C.C.'s friend. But the movie is missing what the book had reams of: heart, connective tissue, sense, sensibilities, a good ear and a bad mouth.

BILL & TED'S EXCELLENT ADVENTURE (PG). This is Allan Bloom's worst nightmare, and possibly yours, too. It is an all-out celebration of the closing of the American mind, with two high school doofuses

(Keanu Reeves and Alex Winter) borrowing a time machine to kidnap great figures of past centuries for a history report. Look for two of the low points of American teen-age cinema in one movie: Joan of Arc leads an aerobics class, and Abraham Lincoln tells an assembly of school kids to "Patty on, dudes!" This witless fiasco couldn't be more imbecilic or less excellent... duces.

THE BURBS (PG). Grimly un-funny comedy about three suburban husbands (Tom Hanks, Bruce Dern and Rick Ducommun) who behave like little boys in a ramshackle Victorian house on their cul-de-sac. Big letdown for fans of Hanks, freshly Oscar nominated for "Big." With Carrie Fisher, Corey Feldman.

CHANCES ARE (PG). This comedy about reincarnation — with Robert Downey Jr. as the eternal return of Cybill Shepherd's long-dead husband, is winsomely likable, something like a fuzzy department store Penguin or bear — and director Ernie Ardolino ("Dirty Dancin'") gives it that soft, smooth, upscale sheen. Downey suggests he could be sensational if the script weren't so squeaky-cutie. But the new spiritual aura and '40s Hollywood heavenly fantasy clichés don't mix with the story's political parable: a Camelot

revenue where the '60s cohabit with the '80s. The setup is excellent, the delivery lack. The spirit of Hollywood's old idealistic fantasy romance comedies remains buried.

HER ALIBI (PG). This mystery is certainly elegant looking, but 15 minutes into the action the thrill is gone and director Bruce Beresford seems to have no clue as to how to find it. Tom Selleck plays a mystery writer who has hit a writing block, so he hits a few real courtrooms, looking for inspiration. Czech-born actress-model Paulina Porizkova plays a "Romanian" mystery woman and before you can say jurisprudence, Selleck has lied gracefully, providing Porizkova with an alibi at her murder trial.

RAIN MAN (R). Because we have had dozens of buddy films about journeys of discovery, we can plot the scenario of this one like a road map: The special qualities of one will work on the other to change him, or perhaps both of them. Dustin Hoffman makes his autistic savant character hypnotically interesting and sometimes terribly funny. Tom Cruise gives his looser, most authoritative performance since "Risky Business" and it can be said unblushingly that he holds his own with the mastery Hoffman.

SKIN DEEP (R). Blake Edwards' latest has a couple of the funniest moments he ever devised, it has John Ritter's easy-to-look charm, but this tale of a rich and famous compulsive

womanizer and hard drinker on the skills ends up living up to its title all too closely.

TWINS (PG). This may be the ultimate High Concept movie. It is composed in exclamation points. Arnold Schwarzenegger and Danny DeVito as twins! Separated at birth after a genetic experiment that made Arnold a superhero and left Danny a scuzzball. Romanticizing two gorgeous sisters! Spiffed out in identical suits! Pursued cross-country by crazed criminals! You think you can do anything with all of that? Call director Ivan Reitman and his two teams of screenwriters immediately; they haven't a clue. Millions on millions will undoubtedly attend this overblown, super-slick, one gag comedy. They may even laugh. But all it really has to offer are its charming co-stars, that identical suits routine and one impish anti-Rambo visual gag. As for the rest: The posters are funnier.

WORKING GIRL (R). For those who missed the special Melanie Griffith blend of moxie and down-to-earth sensuality in "Something Wild" and "Stormy Monday," this is a chance to meet her in the very best of company: romantically entangled with Harrison Ford, directed by Mike Nichols and in a savagely funny screenplay by Kevin Wade. It is a working-Girldella story in which Griffith plays a more-than-bright Staten Islander with a fierce yen to climb out of the secretarial pool at their Wall Street brokerage job. With Sigourney Weaver, Joan Cusack, Alec Baldwin and Olympia Dukakis.

'Fletch Lives' tops box office charts

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — "Fletch Lives," with Chevy Chase reprising his role as a quick-change reporter, took first place in the nation's weekend box office, earning more than \$8 million for the first weekend of spring break.

Chase's comedy was followed by another debut movie aimed at the holiday crowd, the deep-sea horror story "Leviathan," which earned more than \$5 million.

In third place was "Lean On Me," the story of crusading and controversial inner-city high school principal Joe Clark, which earned more than \$3.6 million for its third week.

while "Rain Man," with eight Academy Award nominations, was in fifth place with \$2.8 million.

61st Academy Awards features more than the year's best movies

Too long, too boring, too pretentious. It's the same story every year. Despite widespread interest in "The 61st Annual Academy Awards Presentation," which airs Wednesday, March 29, on ABC, most pundits say it makes for dull TV.

Viewers don't seem to agree. They tune in to watch the stars as well as the proceedings — and hey, you never know when somebody might take their clothes off.

That's what happened on the broadcast in 1974, when a streaker ran across the stage as David Niven waffled about to present an award. The incident resulted in one of the best ad-libs ever when Niven commented about the man's "shortcomings."

Politics have also become part of Oscar legend. In 1973 Satchel Littlefeather, sent by Marlon Brando to accept his Oscar for "The Godfather," read a statement about the plight of the American Indian — just one of several times the Academy Awards have been used as a political platform. In 1977 Vanessa Redgrave denounced "Zionist hoodlums" in front of a TV audience of 300 million — resulting in boos from those in the auditorium and an impassioned retort from Paddy Chayefsky later on in the program. There have been emotional moments, too, such as in 1972, when 82-year-old Charlie Chaplin ended a 20-year exile from Hollywood by coming to the awards to accept an honorary Oscar.

Best Actress: Sigourney Weaver ("Gorillas in the Mist"), Glenn Close

("Dangerous Liaisons"), Jodie Foster ("The Accused"), Meryl Streep ("A Cry in the Dark") and Melanie Griffith ("Working Girl"). The winner should be either Glenn Close or Jodie Foster. We'll pick Close.

Best Director: Barry Levinson ("Rain Man"), Charles Crichton ("A Fish Called Wanda"), Martin Scorsese ("The Last Temptation of Christ"), Alan Parker ("Mississippi Burning") and Mike Nichols ("Working Girl"). Levinson will probably win, but we'll go with Scorsese for his daring.

So which two movies swept all four major awards?

"It Happened One Night" (1934) and "One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest" (1975).

New NBC drama 'Generations' explores black-white relationships

When it comes to innovations, the world of daytime soaps reacts a little like a middle-aged man — pretending to be bold with an occasional flourish, yet rigid in the face of sudden change.

Years ago, "Days of Our Lives" experimented with a black-white love affair but had to pull it off the air when fans became indignant. Of course, there have been black-white relationships and love affairs since then (the current Cliff-Angie dilemma in "All My Children" is one example), but for the most part, these have been subplots.

Such feeble forays in the past will be forgotten Monday, March 27, when NBC, with a giant publicity splurge, unveils a new soap titled "Generations."

The newest addition to the daytime dramas deals with a white family, the Whitmores, and a black family, the Marshalls. Blacks have been a part of daytime casting for some time, but never on this scale of equality. This is the first time in daytime drama that a black family gets equal time with a white one. NBC sees a chance to tap the large black audience, and they have made a programming decision that some will say is long overdue.

Just so fans won't get the wrong idea — that "Generations" is that unmentionable term, a "message" show — NBC has downplayed any undertones of racism that may appear in the plotting. "I only want to entertain," says creator Sally Sussman, who is also the soap's producer and head writer.

Sally's "bible" (the soap outline) deals with Rebecca Whitmore (played by Patricia Crowley), a successful Chicago attorney, and her three offspring, one of them a housewife with three youngsters of her own, another a former rock star, and the third a college student. Across town are the affluent Marshalls, a black family with a flourishing ice cream business. The Marshall clan is headed by matriarch Vivian Potter (played by Lynn Hamilton), who served as housekeeper and nanny for the Whitmores. Vivian's daughter Ruth

(Joan Pringle) is a scrapper who helps her husband, Henry Marshall (Toureaux Blaque), run the business and raise the kids (a lawyer, a housewife and a college student). Inner-city hopelessness is not a main issue in this soap, obviously.

Family ties begin with the two matriarchs and are reinforced at college where the kids connect. Thus, three generations share the bulk of the storytelling, with two, or at most three, stories going on per episode.

"I work on instincts," says Sally, the show's main force. "Once I have the characters in mind, I let them guide me. In daytime you have to work fast. You must learn to surrender your material, not keep it hidden away until it's just right."

The young Canadian-TV producer blossoms in the never-ending grind of soap writing. After schooling at the University of Southern California, Sally became a secretary, then wrote scripts for "The Facts of Life," and "Too Close for Comfort" before catching soap wiz Bill Bell's eye with her development project for

"The Young and the Restless." Five years of "Restless" writing led to the "Generations" idea which pleased NBC's Brian Frons over a year ago.

Once she got the green light from NBC, Sally sat down to write the show's bible.

"The most fun is writing the back story, making up the characters' pasts," Sally says. "Then you weave it in and out of the plotting. You have to be crazy to work this hard, but I love it."

It's too early, of course, to guess how "Generations" will fare in the ratings, but let's hear it for the Canadian and her Mexican co-producer and director Rudy Vejar, also from "The Young and the Restless." It's up to them to create a viable first effort in which blacks will share equality in story and casting.

Q: Do you know how Elliot Morris, the documentary film maker who made the

movie "The Thin Blue Line," came to do such a story? — R.E.

A: Morris came across his story quite by accident. He was doing a film on "Dr. Death," the nickname of a Dallas, Texas, psychiatrist with a legendary track record in predicting murderous character traits in convicts. One of the convicts Morris interviewed, who insisted he was innocent, led him to the amazing story of Randall Adams, who really was innocent of the murder for which he had been convicted and was serving a life sentence. Morris says he hopes never again to be involved in a case like this: "The next time somebody tells me they're innocent, I'm going to say I'm busy. I've been trapped by this story. It's taken control of my life."

Q: We loved Bernadette Peters's performance as the wistful hat designer in "Slaves of New York." We're familiar with her many record albums and TV appearances, but wonder why it took so long for her to make her movie debut. — B.W.

A: Where have you been? "Slaves of New York" is Bernadette's 11th feature film. Her previous movies include "The Longest Yard," "The Jerk" and "Pennies from Heaven," for which she received a Golden Globe Award. In addition, she starred on Broadway in the current musical "Into the Woods," and still tours with her effervescent nightclub act between assignments.

Dick Clark after 33 years as host

LOS ANGELES — Dick Clark, the rock 'n' roll Pied Piper whose "American Bandstand" introduced teen-agers to Stevie Wonder, The Jackson 5 and Madonna as well as the Bunny Hop, Twist and Jerk dance crazes, is hanging up his saddle shoes after 33 years.

Known to generations of youths as America's oldest teen-ager, the squeaky-clean packager of pop next month turns over the emcee chores of television's longest running variety program to David Hirsch.

"Like David, I was 26 when I started hosting Bandstand. After 33 years, I finally decided it was time to give someone else a chance," Clark, 59, said in a statement.

"I knew that this day would eventually come. I've been very fortunate to host Bandstand as long as I have," he continued. "American Bandstand" has always been like a fourth child to me — a child that has grown and matured."

Interview requests were declined. "He is trying to make it nice and quiet without hoopla," Clark spokesman Tom Stepanchak said Wednesday.

Hirsch takes over April 8 when the syndicated show moves to USA Network. The Detroit native, who lives in Los Angeles, also will continue to work for Clark's production company as a producer for "USA's CAMP MIDNITE," a late-night talk show on USA Network.

"I was completely flattered and honored to be asked to audition. I was extremely nervous," Hirsch said in quotes provided by Stepanchak. "When they told me I was the new host, I was speechless. It was a total shock."

Hirsch, who was unavailable for interviews Wednesday because of an unspecified family emergency, is a graduate of Michigan State University. He has worked with improvisational comedy groups, worked as a disc jockey in college and played drums in several bands to help pay his way through school.

Clark won't be retiring to his Malibu beach house to watch gulls and migrating whales. "American Bandstand" is only a small part of his production empire.

He continues as TV host of the "\$25,000 Pyramid" and "\$100,000 Pyramid" game shows, numerous

television movies and network specials. He is the producer of the annual American Music Awards, the Academy of Country Music Awards, the "New Year's Rockin' Eve" TV show and "TV's Bloopers and Practical Jokes."

"Bandstand," as it was first titled, debuted in September 1952 on WFIL-TV in Philadelphia with Bob Horn and Lee Stewart as hosts. Clark took over in 1958. He became the show's symbol as it won five Emmy awards and made him a multimillionaire.

On Aug. 5, 1957, "American Bandstand" moved to the ABC network, quickly becoming a national success. The first record spun on that show was "Whole Lotta Shakin' Goin' On" by Jerry Lee Lewis.

"The first record of the day was always a fast one. It got the kids moving," said Clark.

On his Thanksgiving show on Nov. 22, 1957, Clark introduced the singing duo Tom & Jerry, who sang "Hey Schoolgirl." The duet later recorded under their real names, Simon & Garfunkel.

Over the years, more than 65,000 records were played on "American Bandstand." The show has logged more than 10,000 musical guest appearances and more than 600,000 teen-agers have danced before television cameras.

Generations of teens saw the clean-cut, carefully-suited and

coiffed Clark preside over a studio full of equally clean-cut teens, dancing and posing for the cameras.

Clark, who never danced on the show, became the butt of jokes for maintaining his boyish looks, and once compared the burden to that of female sex symbols.

"They're constantly told how wonderful they look, but it gets to be a drag after a while, because someday the looks have gotta go," he said. "It would be nice to be allowed to age gracefully."

Off-screen, Clark has acknowledged he has a temper and is intolerant of mistakes by subordinates. But in his "Bandstand" persona, teens saw him as a friendly, hip father figure.

The show was a must for many performers. It provided the first national exposure for Madonna, the Beach Boys, Linda Ronstadt, James Brown, Neil Diamond, Bobby Darin, Tina Turner, Buddy Holly and The Doors.

Others making nationwide debuts on the show included Chubby Checker, Sonny & Cher, Barry Manilow, Prince, Pat Benatar, Sheena Easton, Cyndi Lauper, The Four Tops, Billy Idol, Gladys Knight & The Pips, Wham! and Bon Jovi.

"American Bandstand" also launched songs onto the best-seller charts and introduced America to such dances as the Twist, Swing, Jerk, Bunny Hop, Pogo, Hustle, Bus Stop and break dancing.

"We have a whole new programming department. I think we're the team to watch."

The new shows put a heavy emphasis on comedy and comedy-adventure.

The CBS presentation was held on the set of its hit comedy "Murphy Brown" at the Burbank Studios and some of that show's cast appeared for brief introductory skits with CBS executives.

"My goals for the new year are simple," said Barbara Corday, CBS executive vice president of prime time programming. "We're seriously back in the comedy business. We're looking at 18 comedy ideas for the new season. We're open to new ideas. We're not playing it safe."

Kim LeMasters, president of CBS Entertainment, said the network had put together a completely new creative team and "we're on the road to recovery."

Among the new shows being considered for the fall season are comedies based on the hit movies

"Adventures in Babysitting," "Coming to America" and "Married to the Mob."

One new show, called "Normal Life," is based on the lives of Dweezil and Moon Unit Zappa, the children of rock iconoclast Frank Zappa.

Dan Aykroyd introduced a new comedy he is producing called "Mars: Base One." "It's Duluth, Minn., transported to Mars," Aykroyd said. "Earth is the old country and on Mars the Russians are the hustlers and the capitalists."

William Katt plays an activist congressman in an adventure-drama called "Top of the Hill," created by Stephen Cannell. Cannell said he based the series on the life of Leo Ryan, the California congressman killed at the beginning of the Jonestown massacre.

Katt said: "In the pilot, I go to Colombia looking for a missing DEA (Drug Enforcement Administration) agent. One thing I like about this show is there are no clear winners. It's at best a compromise all down the line."

ABC's Brandon Stoddard quits

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Brandon Stoddard, president of ABC Entertainment, has resigned to head a new production company owned by Capital Cities-ABC Inc.

The network, which badly trails NBC in the A.C. Nielsen Co. ratings, said it did not yet have a successor for Stoddard as ABC's chief programmer.

Stoddard, who joined the network in 1970 and has helped move ABC out of the ratings cellar, will become president of the new untitled production unit, which will supply ABC with series, movies and miniseries. He has been head of ABC Entertainment since 1985.

Stoddard will keep his network responsibilities until a replacement is named, ABC said in a prepared statement.

"This is a great innovation for us," Thomas Murphy, chairman and chief executive of Capital Cities-ABC Inc., said of the new production enterprise. He called the production company part of "a plan which moves the network into the 1990s."

The new production operation will encompass the current ABC

Circle Films organization. "This is an idea that has always enticed me, one which I've been wanting to try for years," Stoddard said.

Among the shows that came to the ABC schedule during Stoddard's tenure were "Perfect Strangers," "The Wonder Years," "thirtysomething," "Hooperman" and "Roseanne," the most successful new show in the current season.

Under Stoddard's guidance, the network has passed CBS in the ratings race, although top-rated NBC still enjoys a comfortable lead over both ABC and CBS.

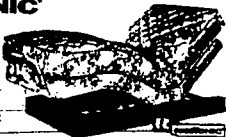

back," said Martin. "It's for children. Mothers today grew up with it and many are having parties to watch it."

Martin first played "Peter Pan" on Broadway in 1954. By then she was already the empress of the musical. She'd been a star since her show-stopping number, "My Heart Belongs to Daddy" in "Leave It to Me" in 1938. She was Nurse Nellie Forbush in "South Pacific" and Maria in "The Sound of Music."

But to a new generation she is probably better known as the real-life mother of Larry Hagman, who plays J.R. Ewing on CBS' "Dallas."

Her first NBC "Peter Pan" telecast was live in 1955, and she won an Emmy. She appeared live again in 1966. She made the taped version for a 1960 broadcast and it was telecast again in 1963, 1966 and 1973.

It also stars Cyril Ritchard as Capt. Hook and Mr. Darling, Maureen Bailey, Margalo Gillmore, Sandra Lee, Joe E. Marks, Jacqueline Mayo and Norman Shelley. Lynn Fontanne narrates.

"The last time I flew as 'Peter Pan' was in 1984 at Davies Symphony Hall in San Francisco," she said. "It was a benefit performance for the trauma center at San Francisco General Hospital. They saved our lives after the accident."

In a 1982 taxi-van accident, Martin, Janet Gaynor and Gaynor's husband, Paul Gardner, were severely injured, and Ben Washer, Martin's manager, was killed.

"I flew three stories high. I was 70 years old. I wore the original costume and flying harness. The auditorium was pitch black and they had laser lights. All you heard was the little voice of Tinker Bell. Then I was in a purple light flying through fairy dust."

Martin grew up in Weatherford, Texas, as the daughter of a prominent lawyer.

"I loved flying from an early age," she said. "My mother was a fabulous mother but she had a tough time with me. At the age of 5, I climbed on top of the garage and flew off. My mother came running out of the kitchen, screaming, 'What have you done now? I

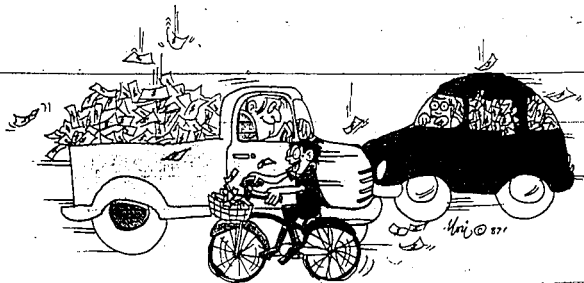
broke my collarbone. That stopped me from flying, but only for a while."

"She did get to see me in 'Leave It to Me.' I brought my little boy along. Nobody knew I was married, but I'd gotten married at 16 and had Larry when I was 17. My poor mother went through many phases with me."

Martin first dressed up as "Peter Pan" for a Hollywood costume party. Jean Arthur also came as "Peter Pan." Arthur played "Peter Pan" on Broadway with Boris Karloff while Martin was doing "South Pacific."

Sandy Duncan has also become famous for playing "Peter Pan."

"I want to see the show on Broadway," said Martin. "I'd never seen it before. I was asked to come on stage, and Sandy went off to one side."



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
