Fear of clash cancels Jerome anti-racism rally

JEROME — A student anti-racism rally planned for next week by a Jerome teacher has been canceled due to fear of confrontation with white supremacists.

"I refuse to subject these kids to any potential danger," said Dick Jordan, the high school biology teacher who organized the event.

Meanwhile, two black college students who had been invited to speak at the rally said Thursday that Jerome has a reputation

among blacks for being racially prejudiced. Jordan has said one of the rally's purposes was to help repair that reputation, earned after an Aryan Nations cross-burning in Jerome made national television.

Jordan said he canceled the rally after school officials said the event could not be held on school grounds and city law enforcement officials warned him of possible counter-demonstrations.

School officials said permitting the rally

could force them to open their gates to white supremacists. The School Board apparently has a policy forbidding gatherings on school grounds and has turned down an Aryan Nations request to use the grounds in the past.

Moving the rally to the city park could endanger the students, Jordan said, especially if a counter-demonstration were staged.

He said law enforcement officials told him there would be a potential for danger.

"Anytime you get two groups of people with two different views, there is the possibility of conflict," said Jerome Police Chief Greg Will.

Mito Alonzo, chief deputy of the Jerome

County Sheriff's Department, confirmed that John Miller, a member of the Aryan Nations, had visited the department to inquire about the rally. But he said Miller, the Jerome farmer who donated his field for the 1986 cross-burning, only asked about whether the rally was going to happen.

"He has not made any threats of any kind. He was just asking about having the rally downtown," Alonzo said.

Miller could not be reached at his home Thursday evening for comment.

"This thing has mushroomed way beyond what I'd anticipated; and it only proves my

original assertion that there is a problem here," Jordan said.

Although the rally has been canceled, Jordan said he still hopes to plan some sort of black awareness activity. The rally was to have been held on Tuesday's anniversary of Martin Luther King Jr.'s death, partly because Idaho does not recognize King's birthday as a holiday.

Corey Warner and David Henderson, two black College of Southern Idaho black basketball players who had been asked to speak at the rally, said they were trying to talk Jordan into having the rally in Twin Falls or another location.

McClure affirms support for weapon plant

TWIN FALLS — U.S. Sen. James McClure affirmed his support for an Idaho nuclear weapon production plant in a series of public meetings in the Magic Valley this week.

Every review that has been made supports the need for plutonium, McClure said.

A series of meetings with U.S. Department of Energy officials, including closed meetings dealing with classified information, has led him to believe the department's claim that the country needs a new source of plutonium by 1995, he said.

The need issue has been "probed, pushed and dissected," McClure said. "The issue has been as thoroughly probed as possible."

One source of that plutonium would be the Special Isotope Separation project — proposed by the department to be built at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory — which would refine weapons plutonium from stockpiles of raw plutonium at the Hanford Nuclear Reservation in Washington.

He said the dangers to environmental safety and public health from activities at INEL have been over stated, and that risks associated with the nuclear production are "acceptable."

He also supports cleanup of wastes buried at INEL and other weapons production plants around the country. But it should progress in an orderly manner.

"We must identify the requirements of each plant, and then assign priorities to the most urgent needs," he said. He cautioned patience and care regarding the buried plutonium-contaminated waste buried before 1970 at INEL. It must be removed, but not before the department figures out how to do it safely. For the present, he said, "it doesn't pose a threat to public health."

Many of the questions and challenges to the Idaho Republican senator in the Twin Falls town meeting Thursday evening echoed remarks at a Rupert town meeting.

Members of FOCUS, an environmental activist group, rallied in Rupert Wednesday and attended the town meeting that evening. They oppose the new production reactor and the SIS and said the

Exxon fires tanker captain after probe finds he was drunk

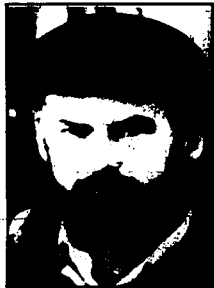
VALDEZ, Alaska — The captain of the oil tanker Exxon Valdez was fired Thursday following a federal investigation that determined he was legally drunk around the time his ship ran aground, causing the nation's worst oil spill.

The National Transportation Safety Board said Capt. Joseph Hazelwood, who had turned over command of the Exxon Valdez to an unqualified third mate before the accident, had a blood-alcohol level of .061 when he was tested nine hours later.

That exceeds the standard of intoxication under federal law for operating a commercial vessel at sea, which is .04 percent, according to William Woady, who headed a four-member NTSB team investigating the tanker accident.

Shortly after the NTSB announcement, Exxon Shipping Co. announced it was firing Hazelwood, who has been convicted twice of drunken driving.

"I do have permission to confirm that Capt. Hazelwood has been released from the company as an Exxon spokesman. I'm really not in a position to make any further comment," he said that to his knowledge no other member of the ship's crew had been fired.

Maximum criminal penalties for operating a ship while intoxicated include a \$5,000 fine and up to a year in jail, Coast Guard authorities said. In addition, violators face the loss of their seaman's license and up to \$1,000 in civil penalties.

The NTSB investigation found no indications of drinking by the third mate who was piloting the ship without certification when it ran aground.

Court gets record amount of abortion case advice

WASHINGTON — The Supreme Court is receiving what appears to be a record amount of unsolicited advice as it considers a request to overturn or limit its 1973 decision legalizing abortion.

The period we are entering will not, said Kate Michelman, executive director of the National Abortion Rights Action League.

The justices will hear arguments April 26 in a Missouri case that has become the most-watched battleground in the continuing political fight over abortion.

Missouri and the Bush administration, among others, are urging the court to use the case to reverse or severely limit Roe vs. Wade, the 16-year-old ruling that said women have a constitutional right to seek abortions.

A decision is expected by July.

The court has received 47 friend-of-the-court briefs, including one submitted on behalf of the administration, that support Missouri's appeal.

The filing deadline for similar briefs in support

of those who successfully challenged a Missouri abortion law was midnight Thursday. Lawyers for pro-choice groups said they anticipated that 20 or more briefs would be delivered or mailed to the court by the deadline.

"As far as we are able to determine, the largest number has been 58," said court spokeswoman Kathy Arberg.

She said 58 so-called amicus briefs were filed in Regents of University of California vs. Bakke, the case in which the court in 1978 first upheld the concept of affirmative action.

U.S. asks Soviets to alter policy course

WASHINGTON — The Bush administration on Thursday stepped up its appeal to the Soviet Union to change course in Central America, urging the Soviets to take steps to further peace in Nicaragua and halt the flow of arms to the region.

In remarks by Secretary of State James A. Baker III and by spokesmen at the White House and State Department, the administration signaled that the upcoming visit to Cuba by Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev would be a good opportunity for the Soviets to indicate a new direction.

"We are looking for signs of new thinking," Baker said in a speech in Atlanta. "The Soviet Union now has an opportunity to demonstrate it in Central America."

White House press secretary Marlin Fitzwater said Gorbachev has been made aware "in the past and recently" of President Bush's thinking that the Soviets should stop shipping arms to the region, or use their influence to push Nicaragua's ruling Sandinistas to abide by regional peace accords and make democratic reforms.

Fitzwater, when asked what the United States might be willing to do for the Soviets in return, told reporters the administration sees Soviet performance in the region as "interrelated" with other aspects of U.S.-Soviet relations.

While stating he could not discuss specific diplomatic overtures, Fitzwater said, "The president has made his views known on this issue. We would like to see the Soviet Union take steps to alter its policy course."

Intimate survey of Americans' sex lives stirs up political storm

WASHINGTON — The federal government wants to ask 2,300 Americans when they last had sex, what they did and whether their partner was a man or a woman.

That's not all. Scientists want to know many other intimate details of respondents' sexual lives.

Scientists and public health experts recognize these are sensitive matters, but they say the information they would gain would paint a comprehensive picture of Americans' sexual behavior essential to the fight against AIDS, the lethal disease spread by sexual contact.

Such answers also would help health experts plan better strategies to combat other sexually transmitted diseases and unwanted pregnancies, the experts say.

Still, said one critic, "Mom and Pop America just aren't going to answer these questions."

Charles F. Turner, the director of the AIDS research committee at the National Research Council, an arm of the National Academy of Sciences, defended the need for the survey.

To understand the course of the AIDS epidemic, you have to understand the patterns of sexual behavior in the population, he said. "At present, we do not have the basic information that's essential for understanding those behaviors."

"We're in the same position as a pilot trying to fly the plane with the radar turned off, which is to say you can't land the plane with just your eyes, but you'd do a lot better if you had more information."

The survey attempts to gather information on virtually all aspects of sexual behavior, including how people chose their sexual partners and practices, such as anal sex, a high-risk activity for AIDS transmission, and oral sex, one of the most common ways in which other sexually transmitted diseases are spread.

The survey aims to more accurately estimate the number of gay men, one of the population groups at greatest risk of contracting acquired immune deficiency syndrome, and how many of them also have sex with women.

The proposed \$2.1 million survey, a precursor to one of 20,000 people expected to cost \$15 million, has broad support in the scientific and public health communities.

But the project also has brewed a political firestorm among critics who say the government already has enough information about the AIDS epidemic and has no business snooping in the bedrooms of American citizens.

The battle between science and politics is being played out in the Office of Management and Budget, a White House agency that must approve all government-sponsored surveys.

Survey supporters say a recent OMB decision to delay consideration of the proposal was a bad omen.

The agency is being overly responsive to political pressures and affecting the direction of science as a direct result, said William Bailey, AIDS policy officer of the American Psychological Association.

"Science doesn't operate well in a politically charged environment," he said. "Science has to be allowed the freedom for inquiry."

Legislature ducks a final ethics vote

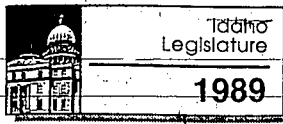
BOISE (AP) — The 1989 Idaho Legislature adjourned without taking a final vote on legislation setting new ethical standards for officeholders, including themselves.

But they haven't seen the last of the issue. Within hours of adjournment of the Centennial session in its 80th day, Jones said he will press conflict of interest laws again next session.

"We may break it up," Jones said Thursday, at a news conference. Separate bills might be introduced to bar self-dealing by office-holders and governing conflicts of interest. That would deal with the objections from some lawmakers that the two subjects should be in separate bills.

The Senate approved a large bill dealing with self-dealing, conflicts of interest and setting up ethics panels for legislators to use in determining if they should declare a conflict of interest on certain issues.

The House Judiciary, Rules and Administration Committee decided it was too broad and backed major surgery on the measure. When it got back to the Senate, Democrats decided it was so weak as to be useless, and they blocked a final vote



before the session adjourned for the year. Statehouse sources also said there was a likelihood the governor would have vetoed the measure if it had passed.

Jones said he would try again next session on ethics bills, but if he doesn't get anywhere again, "I might hang it up. It is getting very frustrating."

Gov. Cecil Andrus fared well in the session, winning approval for most of his economic proposals. But for the third straight session, the Legislature declined to repeal the investment tax credit, although the administration didn't push it very hard this year.

Of the numerous proposals handled by the House tax committee, the administration repeller of the investment credit was the only legislation

that wasn't either printed or returned to the sponsor. Revenue and Taxation Chairman Rep. Steve Antone, R-Rupert, said throughout the session he would not take action on the proposal unless the administration pushed for it, and no one did.

All pending legislation died when the Senate adjourned shortly after 8 p.m. Wednesday night. But conflict of interest won't be the only subject resurrected when the 1990 session opens.

Both House and Senate worked much of the session on open records legislation, designed to cope with the increasing trend of state agencies to bar public access to records considered confidential or sensitive. There was no agreement on the best approach, and three open records bills died in the House State Affairs Committee at adjournment.

"Access to public records will be very definitely one of the first bills we debate next year," said State Affairs Chairman Rep. Pam Bengson, R-Boise. "That will be one of the very first things."

The Legislature passed a resolution authorizing an interim study on the subject.

Court delays execution of Rhoades

BOISE (AP) — The execution of Paul Ezra Rhoades for murdering an Idaho Falls teacher two years ago has been postponed indefinitely by the Idaho Supreme Court.

The court on Thursday issued a brief order staying Rhoades' scheduled April 24 execution so he can pursue his direct appeal.

District Judge Larry Boyle earlier this month rejected Rhoades' petition for post-conviction relief. Rhoades also has been convicted

and sentenced to death for the slaying of a Bingham County convenience clerk, and to life imprisonment for a third killing, in Bonneville County. Those convictions also are under appeal.

Rhoades' first death sentence was March 24, 1988. His direct appeal to the Supreme Court was put on hold while he pursued a bid to get Boyle to order a new trial or overturn the conviction and death sentence.

College blocks demonstration against skinheads

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — Organizers of the planned April 22 counterdemonstration against the Rev. Richard Butler's Aryan Youth skinhead conference have been denied use of the North Idaho College campus.

Clarence Haight, dean of vocational education and acting NIC president, said organizers did not follow procedures in requesting permission to stage the event. Officials also were concerned about security problems.

"This could attract problems," Haight said. "It's being termed an anti-skinhead march, and we don't want to tempt confrontation."

He also said the request, by the Citizens for Nonviolent Action Against Racism, was filed late. The request also said the organizers were working with a campus organization called the Mozambique Support Network, but Haight said that group's adviser was unaware of the affiliation.

Lisa Anderson, one of the gathering's organizers, called the college's decision "blatantly inconsistent" with past decisions. She said on-campus civil rights events ranging from a Martin Luther King Day ceremony to a human rights celebration have taken place with

NIC officials' blessing.

"They are definitely picking sides," Ms. Anderson said of the college's campus events committee, which rejected the request on Tuesday. "They are choosing for the people of Coeur d'Alene how to go forward with civil rights."

The citizens group had asked for use of the college grounds and the Bonner Room in the Student Union Building for various panel discussions and gatherings after the march.

Groups from as far away as

Seattle and Utah are expected to participate in the march, a seven-mile walk up the U.S. Highway 95 bike path toward the Aryan Nations compound, where Butler plans a conference for racist youths known as "skinheads," named for their close-cropped hair.

Anderson said organizers are looking for another place to hold their meetings, and they have not given up on the college.

Group members have been at odds with other organizations, including the Kootenai County Task Force on

Human Relations, as civil rights activists wrestle with the dilemma of dealing with Butler's plans.

On one side are people who believe counterdemonstrations only draw attention to racist groups, giving them the publicity they seek. Others, such as the citizens group, believe if racism is ignored it will be allowed to quietly grow.

King speaks against racism

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Even people who are not the targets of racism, violence and hatred must stand up against it, despite the threat of harm or ridicule, says Martin Luther King III, son of the slain civil rights activist.

King, 31, was in Idaho Falls Thursday for the third annual "Cultural Awareness Day," sponsored by the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

He told reporters at a news conference on Wednesday that whites in particular must speak out for equal rights because members of minority groups are not taken

seriously on the issue.

"Racism is still very much a part of our society," King said. "I don't think there are more people becoming racists, but I think a growing number of people are being misguided."

Referring to the Aryan Nations and skinheads, two racially-motivated movements, King said, "We have to suppress that immediately."

He called for strong ethnic study programs to teach children about the history of minority groups like Blacks, Indians, Asian-Americans and Hispanics.

But most of all, the Fulton County, Ga., commissioner said, "we have to take a stand against racism that may not be popular in some environments."

Woodland reveals candidacy

POCATELLO (AP) — Sixth District Judge William Woodland of Pocatello is among jurists under consideration to become a federal judge.

Woodland has applied for a seat on the U.S. District Court for Idaho and for the Idaho vacancy on the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals, he confirmed Wednesday.

Woodland's name was not on a partial list of eight candidates for the positions released last week by the office of Sen. James McClure, R-Idaho. But Tod Neuenchwander, the senator's administrative assistant, said not all the applicants had indicated they wanted their names made public.

McClure spokesman H.D. Palmer said Thursday that the senator's office had not released the names of candidates for the judgeships.

Woodland, 48, said he has been informed by McClure's office that his name has been submitted to the U.S. Department of Justice for consideration to become a federal district judge or appellate judge.

"I expect to hear from Department of Justice officials at any time. I was contacted by the senator's office on March 17 and told that my name was on the final 'short list' of candidates," said Woodland, who was appointed a magistrate in 1978 and became a district judge in 1983.

The federal district court position in Idaho will become vacant in June when U.S. District Judge Marion Callister assumes senior judge status and begins handling a reduced case load. The vacancy on the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals resulted from the death last year of Judge Blaine Anderson.

Court upholds lewd conduct conviction

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Supreme Court has upheld the lewd conduct conviction of an Ada County man, based in part on an interview with a 2½-year-old victim.

In a 3-2 decision released Thursday, the Supreme Court upheld District Judge Gerald Schroeder's decision to allow a pediatrician to testify about statements made to him by the girl.

Robert L. Giles was convicted of two counts of lewd conduct with children under the age of 16. Giles was charged jointly with Laura Lee Wright, who was also convicted of sex crimes jointly committed against her two daughters. They were 5½ and 2½ at the time of the crimes.

The younger girl was judged incapable of testifying at a trial, and testimony from Dr. John Jambura, a pediatrician with experience in child abuse cases, was admitted based on what the girl told him.

Justice Robert Bakes wrote the majority decision, supported by Chief Justice Allan Shepard and Justice Byron Johnson. Justice Robert Huntley concurred in the result, conviction, but said the doctor's testimony should not have been admitted.

Women deserve the right to their own moral choices

If you think women are active moral agents with their own free will and are able to make their own life choices, the following is written for you.

Following his Inauguration on Jan. 23, Bush assured 67,000 anti-choice protesters: "I think the Supreme Court's decision in Roe vs. Wade was wrong and should be overturned. I think America needs a human life amendment... I promise the President hears you now and stands with you in a cause that will be won."

In fact, the Reagan-packed Supreme Court will have just that opportunity, perhaps as early as July, when it rules on Webster vs. Reproductive Health Services.

This case involves a Missouri law that defines human life as beginning at conception. The law, ruled unconstitutional in 1988 by the U.S. Court of Appeals, bans public employees or public medical facilities from abortion activities, even when the procedure is paid for by private funds. In the past 16 years, the high court

invoked Roe vs. Wade to strike down similar legislation. That was before Reagan justices took their seats on the high bench.

Bush's administration wants abortion legislation returned to the states, where historically individual rights have never fared well. We pro-choice folks know too well what that means for us in Idaho.

What can we do about it? Recent polls have shown that 64 percent of voters, men and women, in the United States believe a woman has the right to an abortion.

It is imperative for those of us who are among this number to speak up now so that the president and the Supreme Court justices hear our voices.

The anti-choice forces are presently grabbing the headlines, media time and space stretching their minority numbers to the limits.

In Washington, D.C. on April 9, an

estimated 200,000 women and men will march for Women's Equality/Women's Lives.

Few from Idaho will be in this march, but we can let George Bush know by letters, telegrams and phone calls that we support it. In so doing, we will be sending a message to the Supreme Court too.

In the U.S. Congress the Reproduction Health Equity Act (House Bill 857) has been introduced. This law would restore full federal funding for abortion services for women who use public health services. RHEA provides that care, assistance or benefits for services related to abortion shall be provided in the same way as any other pregnancy-related health care service. It is significant that some 44 million people receive federally funded health care services.

Although we are battling zero with our congressional representatives in Washington, we can let Bush know we are in support of the RHEA.

Last, but by no means least, is the issue of the abortifacient RU 486, an abortion-inducing drug developed by a French pharmaceutical company.

RU 486 is presently distributed in France and China with markets soon to open in other European countries. It is predicted that it will be widely distributed in third world countries.

Researchers are discovering that RU 486 has a number of potential medical uses other than as an abortifacient.

It has been discovered that anti-progestones like RU 486 could be effective in treating certain breast cancers and in reversing endometriosis, the third leading cause of infertility in the U.S.

Progesterone, a hormone that causes water retention, has been associated with conditions as diverse as premenstrual syndrome and glaucoma, caused by high fluid pressure behind the eye.

The drug, which dilates the cervix, could

be used to facilitate prolonged labor, which in turn could eliminate the need for some Caesarean sections.

Because of its use as an abortifacient, however, Bush has named the National Institutes of Health from conducting clinical tests on its other medical uses.

The NIH is responsible directly to the president. It is necessary for us to tell the president that we want the NIH to begin other use-testing of RU 486 immediately.

So what can we do? We can let the president know we support the April 9 Women's March, we want Roe vs. Wade upheld, we support the Reproduction Health Equity Act and we want the National Institutes of Health to begin testing RU 486 for all its other medical uses.

F&G is doing a competent job of dealing with challenge

I have read the letters written by Bob Burks, and others — and their emotional outbursts against Fish and Game — in recent weeks with growing ire.

The letter from Gary Peak is the only one I have seen written with an accurate presentation of the facts and a calm, intelligent statement of his preference.

Contrary to what Burks, the Shoemakers, Molyneux and others would have the public believe, Fish and Game did not make proposals at the recent public hearings that ignored the bait fishing enthusiasts.

The following information was taken directly from the sheet that was handed out at the public hearings (copies available at F and G Office, Jerome).

Individuals were asked to mark one of four preferences listed on the information sheet which were:

- No. 1 — No action. Regulations would remain as is. No gear restrictions.

- No. 2 — All three sections, from Bellevue north — artificial flies and lures, single barbless hooks. (Although this excludes bait fishing, it is not limited to fly fishing. Fish and Game's regulations' definition of flies and lures include: devices made entirely of rubber, wood, metal, glass or plastic with hook or hooks attached — like in little rubber worms?)

- No. 3 — Sections one and two from Hailey north — artificial flies and lures, single barbless hooks.

Section three — between Hailey and Bellevue — no gear restrictions.

- No. 4 — Other — personal comments.

Any reasonably intelligent person can see that options one through three include one no-gear restriction, one artificial-gear only, and one that offers both.

Number four allows your input made up entirely from your individual bias. I fail to understand where all of the comments are coming from that state that Fish and Game is only proposing fly fishing.

The object of a public hearing is to present different options to the public and to receive their input prior to setting regulations. If an individual chooses to pick only those facts that suit his fancy in his emotional outbursts to the public, that is certainly his right.

I believe balanced communications to the questioning party are more satisfactory.

Burks has also made other statements recently that bear addressing. It is becoming a favorite pastime of some to criticize Fish and Game for willfully spending taxpayers' money.

Many seem to ignore the repeated explanations this spring of the sources of Fish and Game dollars.

The department operates on a dedicated fund — receiving no money from the state general fund.

This means no tax dollars. Their income is derived from hunting, trapping and fishing fees, federal programs that collect money from manufacturers of sporting goods, a tiny amount from their publications, civil penalties and donations and grants from other agencies.

Not only does Fish and Game receive no money from the general fund — no tax dollars — the interest that accumulates from their income is taken from the department and put in the general fund.

It is apparently being ignored by

the powers-that-be that the federal government has threatened to withhold its support — about 22 percent of the department's yearly budget — if this interest money is not given back to Fish and Game.

As a raptor rehabilitator, I feel there are predators besides man that contribute to a sound ecology. I am becoming very tired of the cries about the pheasant problem, the predators and the ignorance of the department in addressing problems.

I was raised on a farm west of Wendell. I remember the lush ditch

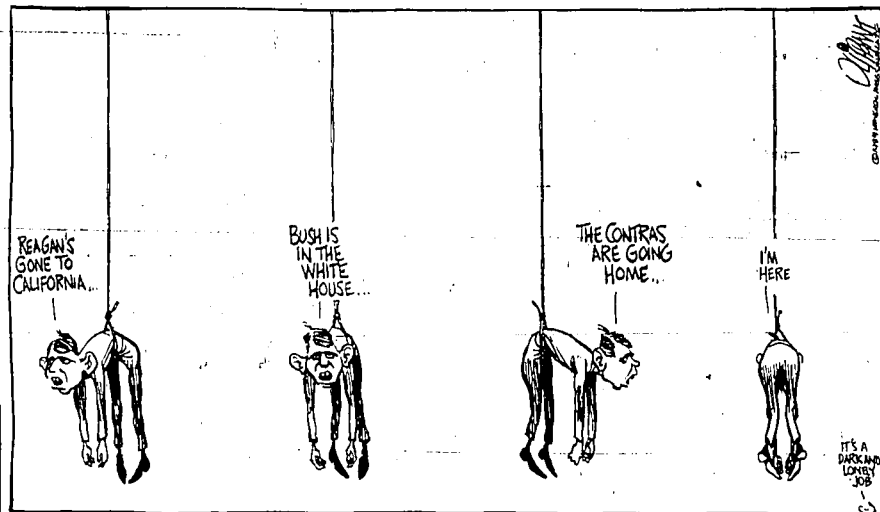
banks and borrow pits surrounding our farm and all of the others. We pastured our horses on the ditch banks surrounding the fields. If a horse was pastured today on those same ditch banks, it would starve to death. Would you blame that on Fish and Game also?

I think it is time we as individuals, and the Idaho state legislators, and the children antics that occur every legislative session when determining budgets and regulations for the Fish and Game department. The past two years some legislators have

admitted to introducing legislation, they did not intend to pass, that would have been very detrimental to the department only to get the attention of the department.

I respect Jerry Conley for his commitment to wildlife. If that is not the Fish and Game director's job, what is?

Airport security furor erupts anew

LONDON (AP) — A new furor over airport security broke out Thursday after the discovery that a British Airways jet flew with an explosive aboard for at least two weeks because police on a bomb-detection drill forgot to remove it.

The gelignite was tucked in a seat pocket in economy class of the Boeing 747, news reports said Wednesday night. Authorities would not say when the gelignite was put on the plane.

The incident was particularly embarrassing to British officials trying to tighten security following the Dec. 21 bombing of Pan Am Flight 103 over Lockerbie, Scotland.

The chairman of British Airways, Lord King, said the explosives worked their way through the upholstery and that a cleaner found them Monday after the jet returned to Heathrow Airport from Toronto.

Police Inspector Andrew Nielson said the gelignite weighed less than a pound and was four inches long and less than an inch wide.

Bush to meet crash victims' families

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush will meet Monday with four family members of Americans killed when Pan Am Flight 103 exploded over Lockerbie, Scotland, the White House said Thursday.

Bush will "hear their concerns," said Martin Fitzwater, the White House press secretary. The families are planning a memorial service that afternoon in Lafayette Park, across the street from the White House, he said.

Fitzwater did not identify the four who will meet with Bush.

The plane went down Dec. 21, killing all 259 people aboard and another 11 on the ground.

Virginia tops in federal spending

WASHINGTON (AP) — Virginia, home to major naval and Marine bases and several suburbs of the nation's capital, topped all states in per capita federal spending last year, the Census Bureau reported Thursday.

The federal government spent \$5,953.71 per resident in Virginia in 1988, moving it past Alaska to claim the top ranking.

Idaho was 24th, at \$3,410.25.

Witness surprised by North memo

WASHINGTON (AP) — The last prosecution witness in Oliver North's trial told Thursday of mistaking "Joe, that can't be" under his breath when he saw the first evidence that Iranian arms sales profits had gone to help the Nicaraguan Contras.

John Richardson had been sent, along with Assistant Attorney General Bradford Reynolds, to search North's office in the White House complex on Nov. 22, 1986 to clear up conflicts about shipments of U.S. arms to Iran.

That paragraph described using \$12 million in "residual funds" from the sales "to purchase critically needed supplies" for the guerrillas fighting the Nicaraguan government.

Three days after they found the document, then-President Reagan and Meese announced at a news conference that they had uncovered the money diversion. Earlier that month Reagan had admitted that weapons had been sold to Iran in a failed attempt to free American hostages held in Lebanon.

Regulators take over 9 more S&Ls

WASHINGTON (AP) — Federal regulators took over nine more savings and loan associations in six states on Thursday, bringing the total under government control to 175 in 28 states.

The institutions — in Alabama, Georgia, North Carolina, Ohio, Virginia and Wisconsin — had assets totaling \$3.5 billion at the end of 1988. The largest of the nine, Broadview Savings Bank of Cleveland, had \$1.8 billion in assets.

In a section-by-section analysis of amendments to President Bush's S&L plan, the Treasury Department said the agency that would be created to handle failed institutions will "consider the effect of transactions on property values in local real estate markets and on local banking markets."

Legislators from states such as Texas and Colorado, where much of the repossessed real estate is located, are looking for a guarantee that the government won't sell off the real estate too quickly.

Mortality rate drops despite smokers

ATLANTA (AP) — The overall U.S. death rate dropped by 8 percent over seven years, but federal health researchers said Thursday that mortality rates from smoking-related lung disease keep increasing as those diseases kill smokers from decades ago.

The decline, the CDC said, is partially due to decreases in the death rates from coronary heart disease — the nation's leading cause of death, accounting for about 593,000 fatalities a year — and stroke, which kills 125,000 people a year.

The mortality rate from heart disease fell 18 percent to 227 per 100,000 in 1986, while the rate from stroke dropped 26 percent, to 56 per 100,000.

Man falls just short of sailing record

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — A Frenchman's exhausting effort to beat a month-old New York-to-San Francisco sailing speed record fell just a few agonizing hours short on Thursday after an 80-day, 14,000-mile journey.

A tired and bloody Philippe Monnet steered his battered trimaran toward the Golden Gate, three days after he threw his food overboard to lighten his boat's load and squeeze out another knot.

Alaska alcohol stories win Pulitzer for public service

NEW YORK (AP) — The Anchorage Daily News won the 1989 Pulitzer Prize for public service Thursday for a series on alcoholism and suicide among native Alaskans. The Philadelphia Inquirer and Chicago Tribune each won two prizes.

The public service award "will give us a chance to reiterate the point of the stories done in the first place; we've got a serious problem up here," said Pat Dougherty, city editor of the Daily News. The newspaper also won the public service award in 1976 for a series on the Teamsters union in Alaska.

Donald L. Barlett and James B. Steele of the Inquirer won the national reporting prize for a 15-month investigation of provisions in the Tax Reform Act of 1986 that gave special tax breaks to many politically connected individuals and businesses.

The Pulitzer Board said the series aroused so much public indignation that Congress rejected such breaks.

The Inquirer's David Zuchino won in feature writing for his series "Being Black in South Africa," described as "richly compelling" by the judges.

The Pulitzer Board had switched his entry from the international reporting category to features.

It was the 16th Pulitzer in 14 years for the Inquirer and the second such prize for Barlett and Steele, who won in 1975 for reporting on the Internal Revenue Service. Steele said doing the series on tax breaks "was almost like a treasure hunt. We got one break after another. They came slow. But they were there."

The Chicago Tribune's winners were Clarence Page in the commentary category, for his columns on local and national affairs, and Lois Wille for editorial writing.

The Anchorage paper's 10-day, 44-story series found that alcoholism is rampant in rural Alaska and the suicide rate for Eskimos and Indians is four times the national rate. The series also detailed high rates of child abuse and other domestic violence.

The stories attributed such problems to a lack of job opportunities and a clash of cultures between native Alaskans and others.

The Louisville (Ky.) Courier-Journal was awarded the prize for general news for coverage of a church bus crash that claimed 27 lives and its examination of the accident's cause. "I think our pride and jubilation has to be tempered somewhat by the fact that matter we covered," Publisher George Gill told staff members.

The Courier-Journal's entry was not one of the finalists recommended by the jury to the board. The board asked for the names of additional nominees and chose the Courier-Journal story from that group, said Robert Christopher, board secretary.

Bill Dedman of the Atlanta Journal-Constitution won the Pulitzer for investigative reporting for "The Color of Money," an investigation of alleged racial discrimination by the city's lending institutions. After the series, a consortium of banks announced programs for lending at least \$67 million at low interest, especially in black neighborhoods.

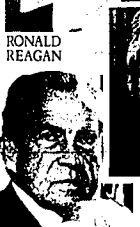

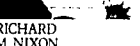

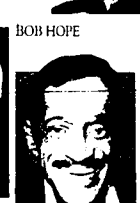

Cheney may ask for more base closings

WASHINGTON (AP) — Defense Secretary Dick Cheney said Thursday he might ask Congress to close more military bases as a money-saving move in efforts "to try to create a leaner, more efficient" structure for America's armed forces.

Cheney, in his first lengthy Pentagon interview since taking office March 17, said a base-closing initiative undertaken last year by the Reagan administration was "a hell of an idea" but "obviously a first-time effort."

"We may well want to go further and start again, he said.

While I understand the problems that some of my former colleagues in Congress face — individual situations in their districts — I just have to believe that there are opportunities for economies in reviewing a base structure that has been basically unchanged for 50 or 60 years," said the former congressman from Wyoming.

"I'm not ready to make an announcement today," he continued.

"But I think if you're going to look at finding ways to maintain the nation's defenses with less money then I have no choice as secretary but to look for ways to save money. And one of those ways is to close bases that aren't necessary, to consolidate operations and to try to create a leaner, more efficient infrastructure for our military forces."

Cheney also said it was much too premature to discuss the withdrawal of American troops from Europe, given the absence of progress in conventional arms control talks with the Warsaw Pact. In addition, he said he wanted to do everything possible to provide military support to authorities fighting the drug trade.

Commissioners clear final hospital budget

TWIN FALLS — County commissioners Thursday signed the resolution officially amending the county hospital's 1989 budget, allowing construction of a cancer treatment center to move ahead.

"We've crossed all our T's and dotted all our I's," said Chairman Marvin Hempleman.

"It's signed, sealed and delivered, and with any kind of luck that'll be the last of it," added Commissioner Jim Fraley.

The resolution, which was approved by the commissioners March 24, still could be appealed by opponents of the amendment.

Jaggers appeal in works

TWIN FALLS — The attorney for 18-year-old confessed murderer Jesse Ray Jaggers says he hasn't decided exactly what issues he will appeal.

"We haven't narrowed the issues down — Jesse's just instructed me to file an appeal," said James Meservy, the teen-ager's attorney. "I suppose he's looking at something other than a fixed 25-year bottom."

Jaggers recently filed a notice that he plans to appeal a 25-year-to-life prison term handed down by 5th District Judge Daniel Meehl. When Jaggers' appeal plans were initially reported a week ago, Meservy was in northern Idaho on another case and unavailable for comment.

Jaggers pleaded guilty in September to first-degree murder and robbery in the death and attempted rape of Virginia Westergren, 79.

'Legal' newspaper at issue

RUPERT — A suit filed Thursday in 8th District Court asks Judge J. William Hart to determine which of three newspapers should carry Minidoka County's legal advertising.

County Prosecutor Charles Creason Jr. said he decided to ask for a declaratory judgment after he discovered none of the three papers serving the area meets all the state requirements to be the county's "legal" newspaper.

The law says the paper must be published in the county and must have been there for at least 72 months, Creason said. The Time-News and South Idaho Press both are printed outside the county, and the weekly News-Journal began publication last year.

"It appears to me it's so obscure the county is at risk unless we get a legal determination," Creason said.

Creason said he looked into the matter after News-Journal Publisher Dean Wilson asked county commissioners to put the legal ads — now in The South Idaho Press — in his newspaper.

Sheriff investigates gunfire

JEROME — Sheriff's deputies are investigating a Thursday morning gunfire incident northeast of Jerome.

George Carl, 24, of Jerome, was arrested and released without bail, said Mito Alonzo, chief deputy of the Jerome County sheriff's department.

Alonzo said Carl was booked for possession of paraphernalia. A shotgun was fired into the floor of a house during a domestic dispute, Alonzo said.

Police were called out at 2:30 a.m. and stayed on the scene until about 4:30 a.m., he said.

Reporter shares Pulitzer

ANCHORAGE — Former Times-News reporter Hal Bernton is sharing a Pulitzer Prize won by the Anchorage Daily News.

Bernton, formerly an environmental reporter for The Times-News, contributed two articles to the series "A People in Peril," which won the Daily News the coveted 1989 Pulitzer Prize for public service.

The 10-day series outlined the serious alcohol and suicide problem among native Alaskans. The project was the result of a investigation carried out by almost everyone on the newspaper's staff.

Weather delays KBSU

TWIN FALLS — Magic Valley will have to wait a little longer to tune into KBSU, Boise State University's public radio network.

KBSU announced plans to extend its signal into the Magic Valley by April 1. But bad weather has delayed installation of a new transmitter on the Jerome Butte, said James Paluzzi, KBSU general manager.

"We'll be there as soon as water dries around the construction site," he said.

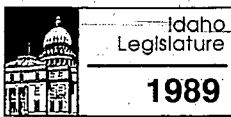
Once the transmitter is in place, listeners from as far east as Hazelton and as far west as Hagerman should be able to tune into KBSU at 91.7 on the FM dial. The network airs classical and jazz music along with news and informational programming from 5 a.m. to 2 a.m. weekdays and around the clock on weekends.

The Boise station is the first to become the first public radio station in the valley last July when KRUC began broadcasting its signal into the area. KRUC is a 50.1 MHz station from Ricks College, weekdays from 5 a.m. until midnight, and on weekends from 6 a.m. until midnight.

Officials from both stations say differences in programming is not what Magic Valley's want to be confused with the same public radio shows.

Legislature smiles on Magic Valley education

BOISE — With a \$52 million surplus to spread around this session, the Legislature passed out plenty of goodies, and the Magic Valley got its share.

Thursday, local lawmakers cleaned out their desks and packed up their triumphs, taking home money for education and social projects, and protection for farmers and the environment.

To the College of Southern Idaho goes

\$2 million for the second phase of a proposed development center — provided lawmakers are correct in their budget projections. Classrooms will be built to accommodate students in the popular

agriculture management program, and laboratories will be built to ease the squeeze in the physical science programs.

Twin Falls will also see a satellite public television station. The \$230,000 station will be used to transmit a clear, 1,000-watt signal through most of the Magic Valley.

But while the building projects may be the most noticeable results of the session initially, lawmakers are saying that the most lasting benefits to the state may be some of the precedent-setting legislation

passed in the areas of education and the environment.

Schools get fund windfalls

School children were the big winners this year. The governor may not have liked the funding source — one-time, rather than on-going money — and the Idaho Education Association may not have liked provisions for teacher pay. But few could quarrel with the numbers.

The state will be sending checks

SIS foes give Stallings lots to reconsider

TWIN FALLS — A weapons project proposed for Idaho will be the first step in moving the government's troubled Colorado plant to the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory, an opponent of the project told his congressman Thursday.

At a breakfast meeting with Rep. Richard Stallings, members of Voters Organized To Educate on INEL challenged the Idaho congressman's support for the Special Isotope Separation project — a laser-driven plutonium refinery proposed by the federal Energy Department.

"Support for SIS is invitation to move Rocky Flats to Idaho," said VOTE member Dr. Peter Rickards. He suggested the Energy Department has misled the congressman on SIS, which would produce plutonium for nuclear weapons.

Stallings, who has been visiting the Magic Valley during the congressional Easter break, maintains his support for the project is directly tied to an equal financial commitment to cleanup of stored waste at INEL.

That sentiment was echoed by Mark Stubbs, VOTE member and Twin Falls County Republican chairman. He said he is not swayed by the testimony of experts the Energy Department uses to sell its project. Now that the department wants something from Idaho, he said, the state has gained a bargaining chip by threatening to block the project the department wants to build here.

"If the project is threatened, we can get a smidgen of what we want," Stubbs said. And what Idaho wants is cleanup of radioactive waste buried above the Snake River Aquifer.

If the project is stopped, Idaho may lose any chance it has for forcing the department to clean up radioactive and chemical wastes dumped willy-nilly in shallow pits and trenches at INEL, Stallings said. The best way to

Craters road may hamper national park status

TWIN FALLS — Proponents of a national park at Craters of the Moon have formed a task force to work out differences on the proposal, U.S. Rep. Richard Stallings said Thursday.

But one feature of the plan could significantly hamper its chances, Sen. James McClure said.

A meeting in Burley included grazing and environmental interest groups as well as members of the Craters of the Moon Development Committee. The differences between the factions were minor, Stallings said.

The groups will work out a formal proposal including boundaries and official language to turn the national monument into a national park that would expand to include most of the Craters lava field, the Wapi and Kings Bowl lava fields and Big Southern and Cedar buttes.

The proposal also includes a road to connect the three sections of the proposed park. The road would run from the Minico area to Arco. Some of the supporters of the proposal support it to get the road built, "but that's not my position," Stallings said.

Sen. James McClure told a crowd of Minicassia residents Wednesday evening the road idea could hamper national park chances.

A National Park Service report on the site states the greatest threat to the future of the area is increased transportation through it, McClure said at a Rupert town meeting.

Also, existing roads might actually have to be closed, he added.

McClure said farmers and ranchers should be aware that boundaries of the park likely would have to extend beyond the lava flows, thus taking away rangeland from grazing.

"Grazing is not permitted in a National Park," he said.

The only reason to build the park would be to protect the unique features of the Great Rift Zone, which the Park Service has recognized as a one-of-a-kind volcanic landmark, Stallings said.

Some supporters of the project support it for the increased tourism it would bring. Tourism, however, is only a valid reason for a national park if there is something to protect, Stallings said.

"There is something to protect," he said. The Park Service's recommended scientific reserve designation was a recognition that the area is worth protecting.

Some Park Service personnel retain a "no new parks" mentality held over from the Reagan administration. Park Service Director William Mott Jr., however, assured Stallings he would support whatever decision Congress makes on the Craters of the Moon.

Stallings rated the national parks in general as above average in quality. Most problems, he said, stem from the impact of large numbers of tourists.

Dick believes in growth

BELLEVUE — Jumping in the race for

the Bellevue City Council, Steven L. Dick has no experience as a public official, but does have experience as a public employee.

Dick, 34, has been the supervisor of the Haley Street Department for three and one-half years, a position he says gives him valued experience in dealing with problems courtside face.

A Bellevue resident for 14 years, Dick decided to run for the position while working with the Bellevue council to put in a wastewater treatment system, which the city hopes to fund the system through a local bond issue and federal grants.

Bellevue's lack of a city-wide system has hurt business growth, Dick said, adding that some businesses have decided against locating in the town when they found out about the cost of installing

septic tanks.

The location of the plant — a controversial issue — should be in a place so that sewer tanks won't have to be moved or enlarged 10 to 20 years from now if the city grows, Dick said.

In another matter, Dick said Bellevue needs planning and zoning regulations that allow for mobile home parks in some areas and prohibit them in others. Now, mobile homes are scattered through the town.

Dick also said the current council is doing the job with cleaning up the city and implementing a recently passed Main Street park ordinance.

Dick said his experience working with another municipality would help him better serve Bellevue. He said once the sewer system is installed, he will make

sure the city streets were repaired properly.

Dick also said as councilman he will listen to people's complaints, sort through the good and the bad, and take them to the council to try to get them solved.

He served as a volunteer firefighter for the Wood River Rural Fire Department, followed by a one-year stint as rural fire chief.

5 Western states draw up water, power projects pact

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Water and power users from five western states have announced a proposal to use non-federal funds in the construction of water projects that could amount to \$2.2 billion over the next 40 years.

If the proposal is approved by Congress, the projects could be built in Utah, Colorado, Wyoming, New Mexico and Arizona.

First in line would be the \$300 million irrigation and drainage (I&D) system of the Central Utah Project's

Bonneville Unit. The I&D system would move water from Strawberry Reservoir to farmers in Juab County and the Sevier River basin.

Utahns would be required to pay 20 percent of the construction costs and all of the environmental mitigation costs. Revenue from the sale of hydroelectric power produced at federally owned dams in the upper Colorado River basin would pay the rest.

"I think it's an excellent deal, a very responsible and reasonable way

to develop water projects in the West," Don Christiansen, manager of the Central Utah Water Conservancy District, said Wednesday.

He believes there's a "very good chance" of winning congressional support for the funding plan if western states will work together for its passage.

Raising \$2.2 billion for water development would require an immediate 60 percent increase in the price of power from the federal dams. Another 5 percent increase

would be tacked on top to finance an environmental mitigation program for the upper Colorado River basin.

"It would have a real big impact on all the public power users," said Ted Rampton, manager of federal water and power issues for the Intermountain Consumer Power Association.

He said power users are willing to pay the higher electric costs if in

return they receive the 40-year contract to power produced by the federal dams. Their current contracts guarantee access to the federal hydroelectric power for only 15 years.

The plans call for the expenditure of about \$365 million over 40 years on environmental mitigation measures in the upper basin. This money would come from both water and

power users. It has not been decided who would control this money and decide where it is spent. The \$365 million would be in addition to environmental protection monies spent on individual projects.

Rep. Wayne Owens, D-Utah, said last week that any agreement negotiated by the water and power groups "deserves careful study."

insure cleanup is to make support for new projects contingent on cleanup, he said.

Without waste cleanup and the Waste Isolation Pilot Plant, a proposed New Mexico waste repository, Stallings said, he would not support the SIS. He gives credit for increased Energy Department cleanup budgets to the kind of public opinion expressed in the Magic Valley.

VOTE has asked that SIS be delayed until four questions are answered in writing: a timetable for cleanup; a budget to meet that

timetable; status of cleanup technology; and an inventory of low-level, transuranic and high-level waste now awaiting disposal.

"I think every one of those issues will be resolved," Stallings said. The questions, however, are complex and have no simple answers, he said. Though — the questions — are unanswered, Stallings said he is confident the department will live up to its commitment to cleanup.

"DOE lost a considerable amount of credibility because they didn't tell the truth. They didn't tell you the truth. They didn't tell Congress the truth," Stallings told VOTE members.

With increased public attention focused on the department, with increased oversight and with a new energy secretary, the department may be forced to establish some credibility, he said. The department is working on waste cleanup solutions, whereas in the past the problems were ignored, he said.

Stallings called the new Energy Secretary Ret. Admiral James Watkins a bright, capable man committed to cleaning up nuclear weapons plants around the country. "Watkins is a breath of fresh air," he said.

system. Forbis said federal funding should pay for part of the project.

Forbis said he's running because he wants to be involved in city government and to give people a choice of leadership.

Another important issue is local housing, Forbis said. He said some people have second thoughts about the property owners' rights to put mobile homes on lots within the city limits. Mobile homes provide affordable homes for some people he said, but suggested that the town needs designated areas for them.

In a similar vein, Forbis said he would continue the efforts the city has made to "clean up" Bellevue by eliminating junk-filled lots and enforcing a recently passed ordinance which requires Main Street business owners to remove old cars and junk from in front of their businesses.

Forbis said all things considered, he is running for the alderman position because he hopes to bring more action and concern to the council.

Although Forbis has had no experience holding a public office before, he does have more than 27 years of service in the United States Navy, retiring as a senior chief in 1970.

After his Navy retirement, he moved to Bellevue, buying Resort Electric in 1975. He has owned and operated the electrical contracting business ever since.

Ivie knows city government

BELLEVUE — After a two-year departure from city politics, Mike Ivie decided to throw his hat in the ring again in the race for a City Council seat here.

Ivie, 67, has been in Bellevue city government since 1978 when he was chairman of the city's planning and zoning commission. He also was a council member and mayor in 1987.

Ivie was raised in the Bradford area west of town and has lived in Bellevue for 41 years, a fact he says is a substantial qualification for representing Bellevue residents on the council.

"People know me, if they want me, they'll vote for me," Ivie said.

Ivie said his experience in road construction and water systems will benefit the council and said he would work toward keeping city streets in good condition.

Ivie agrees with other candidates that a sewer project is the most critical issue facing Bellevue residents. Ivie said he thought the city could survive if a bond for the sewer system did not pass, but eventually the Environmental Protection Agency would start "nodding their finger" at Bellevue and require a system be installed.

Ivie also said the lack of a sewer system has hurt the local business climate.

In regard to an ordinance passed in December which requires Main Street businesses to keep their property free of old cars and debris, Ivie said he thought a lot more could be done on the city's part to enforce the ordinance but was hesitant to discuss specifics. "I don't want to get involved in it right now," Ivie said. "I'll get it, I will," he said, adding that the ordinance is in place and it is up to the present government to enforce it.

Ivie throws his support to council member Ron Reese who is running for mayor against incumbent Wayne Douthett and whose strong personality some contend is dividing the council and town. "Bellevue has always been a real close city," Ivie said. "They've always pulled together, but we are becoming divided and I'd like to see us get rid of the conflict," he said.

Ivie is a World War II veteran and before his retirement, he raised beefsteak for a time, but now raises only a few to help him keep busy.

Saksa takes responsibility

BELLEVUE — Brian Saksa, 34, a craftsman who runs a woodworking shop, decided it was time to take some responsibility for his community so he decided to run for

a City Council seat.

A primary issue facing Bellevue is growth, Saksa said. The town needs to more clearly define its future goals and needs a disciplined city government to monitor growth, he said.

"Most people moved away from big cities for a reason, and it wasn't to establish another big city," he said.

"I think what we all want is to maintain and be happy with our simple life," Saksa said.

Saksa agreed with the other candidates that the proposed sewer project is a critical issue for city residents. He is concerned, however, that elderly residents may not be able to shoulder their share of the bond debt. "An extra \$30-\$45 a month could hurt somebody," he said.

Saksa also said the city's no-junk ordinances were well-meaning, but said it was an "insult" for the city to tell someone to clean up their property. "You have to clean up your own house before you tell somebody else to clean theirs," Saksa said.

Saksa wants better organization and a more businesslike approach to city government. He also would like more cooperation within Bellevue, saying small towns often are divisive. "People are quick to take sides," Saksa said.

Saksa, 37, has lived in the Wood River Valley for 14 years, the last three of which have been in Bellevue. For 10 years he has worked in his business, Saksa Cabinet Design, making custom cabinet, furniture and other wood products.

Before settling down in the Wood River Valley, Saksa said he traveled to many parts of the world, living in Europe and Asia.

Wright runs on experience

BELLEVUE — Dennis Wright, 46, is the only incumbent running for City Council here.

Wright has served on the council since June 1988 after his interim appointment to fill a vacancy. This was not his first experience with public office, however.

While living in Alma, Colo., in the 1970s, Wright was a councilman for seven years and mayor for one. He resigned in 1981 to return to Idaho and work in Gooding.

Wright said he is running because it is "imperative" some continuity be established with both city personnel and council members. Two-thirds of the council will be inexperienced members if he should lose, he said.

His experience can help with upgrading efforts to prepare for new growth in the city, Wright said. He supports the proposed sewer system because the town is unprepared for growth's impact on the water system.

A waste-water treatment program is the most critical issue facing Bellevue, he said. Since federal grant money for such projects will be eliminated in October, Wright said he hopes Bellevue residents approve a planned \$1 billion bond issue now, while grants are still available, rather than having to fund the system entirely locally sometime in the future.

The location of the treatment plant — a controversial topic — should "minimize the impact on the number of people affected by it and attempt to find the choice which has the least resistance," Wright said.

Wright also supports the re-election of Mayor Wayne Douthett, who is being opposed by Ronald Reese, and reiterating the need for continuity in city government. Douthett had done an outstanding job, working many hours for the city, he said.

Wright disagrees that some Bellevue residents are willingly disregarding the Main Street cleanup ordinance, saying that winter snows may have prevented some people from moving items.

Wright holds a two-year accounting degree from the Twin Falls Business College and a bachelor's degree in business from Utah State University. He served two years in Vietnam with the Peace Corps and two years in the Army in India.

Born and raised in Bellevue, Wright returned in 1986 and is the office manager for Glendale Construction Co.

Power coalition uses 'open access' proviso

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A coalition of 29 municipal and public power systems will be among the first groups using a federal order requiring Utah Power & Light to make excess transmission line capacity available to others.

The "open access" requirement included in the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission's order allowing UP&L's merger with Pacific Power & Light worries many industry observers.

For years, private investor-owned power companies have fought "open access," fearing they would find themselves competing for their own customers as transmission lines are opened to outside producers offering reduced-rate power.

Officials from the merged companies, however, say acceptance of the FERC mandate doesn't necessarily open the flood gates to "open access."

John Serfustini, a spokesman for UP&L, said the order affects only excess capacity and has time limitations. He said UP&L has traditionally

sold access to its excess transmission capacity.

Our people took a look at it when FERC made it a part of the conditions for merger and determined that it is something we can live with," Serfustini said.

Serfustini said these seeking access will have to possess firm contracts, will have to specify how much power is involved, where the power will be picked up and delivered, and the time limitations involved.

A minor cost effect is expected since FERC will have some say in the rate charged for transmitting the power. Officials from PacifiCorp, the parent company of the merged utilities, estimate anticipated savings from the merger will be reduced by about \$1 million annually.

Officials say that loss is more than offset by the \$50 million in operating savings the two companies expect to share this year and the \$160 million savings anticipated over the next five

years. Officials also say that since the order involves firm contracts and wholesale suppliers, not users, the effect will be further reduced.

Serfustini said it is unlikely the order will have a major effect on future mergers. He said merging has been the trend for years in the power industry, and UP&L itself is the product of more than 100 small mergers. He said that trend is not likely to change.

"It (merging) is a process that has never stopped but has slowed for various reasons," Serfustini said. "This one (UP&L and PP&L) is big and that is what is attracting the attention."

Serfustini acknowledged that the merged company's monopoly on transmission lines in the merger area prompted the FERC concern over "open access."

He said the company does not share that concern.

Health club voluntarily closes

REXBURG (AP) — Owners of the Rexburg Racquetball and Health Center have decided to shut down the facility after almost 10 years of operation, putting an estimated 30 full- and part-time employees out of work.

The club's owners met Monday and decided to close down the health club on Friday. The decision was announced to employees Tuesday, said Gordon Thatcher, one of the center's six owners.

"We just got where we couldn't put more money into it," Thatcher said. The owners have subsidized the operation with \$125,000 of their own money just since January 1988, he

said. "We closed ourselves down," Thatcher said. "We are not in default. We are current with the bank."

The club has failed to turn a profit since it opened in November 1979. Thatcher said, forcing the owners to subsidize it "some years more than others."

Thatcher's partners are Evan Meyers of Sugar City and Golden Linford, Ray Rigby, Rich Andrus and Jerry Rigby of Rexburg.

Thatcher said members resisted efforts by the owners to make the operation profitable.

Osmonds return to offer testimony

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Singer Mario Osmond returned to testify Thursday in the trial of Gary Sheets, charged with 34 federal counts of fraud and theft stemming from his dealings in the now-defunct CPS Financial Services.

Osmond and her brother, Merrill Osmond, who had testified earlier in the trial, were recalled as rebuttal witnesses as Sheets' defense attorneys appeared to near the end of their case.

Ms. Osmond testified in February that Sheets took \$30,000 from her pension plan on June 18, 1986, and invested it in his working fund program. Almost all investors in Sheets' Working Fund I and II lost their money, prosecutors say.

She said she was not aware at the time that the money was removed from the pension account. Two weeks later, when she was performing in Bloomington, Minn., Sheets sent

her a withdrawal slip and loose papers with instructions to sign, but not take the papers and send them back to him immediately, Ms. Osmond said.

When she returned to the witness stand Thursday, Ms. Osmond confirmed under cross-examination by defense lawyer David Bjrd that she met with Sheets in early June 1986 during a Syracuse, N.Y., television

"He gave me the idea he was a bishop and somebody I could trust," she said. "I was very vulnerable."

At the time, Ms. Osmond said, she had been going through a divorce and Sheets said he would take care of her financially.

"He was going to come in and evaluate my financial situation... to set up a budget and work through this mess that had been created," she said of an early meeting with Sheets in Orem.

At another point, she said, "I had a certain amount of money left to my name that he took."

Women claim UI discrimination

MOSCOW (AP) — Charging that discrimination against women at the University of Idaho appears to be a campuswide, four female employees have filed formal discrimination complaints against the university.

Betsy Thomas, Tiajuana Cochran, Innam Fenton and Diane Milhollin said Wednesday they each have filed formal complaints of sex discrimination and salary inequity with the Idaho Human Rights Commission, and together have filed a class-action complaint with the U.S. Department of Labor alleging discrimination and salary inequity.

The women said they have heard from a number of other women on campus with the same concerns

since filing their complaints.

"We've all received telephone calls," said Thomas, who heads the UI Women's Center and has worked at the UI for four years.

Cochran was the school's minority students adviser until she recently became director of cooperative education. "She has worked at the UI for five and a half years."

Milhollin is coordinator of disabled student services and drug and alcohol-abuse programs and has worked at the UI since 1977. Fenton, director of the Early Childhood Learning Center, currently is on leave from the university. She has worked at the UI for nine years.

Workers discover 115-year-old Bible

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — Digging through odds and ends at the Kootenai County Courthouse, employees have discovered a 115-year-old Bible and a scrawled summary of the first jury trial ever held there, in 1926.

The trial summary was written in pencil on a board, which a construction worker found in the bottom of a desk in a courtroom being remodeled.

The board is signed by "L.L. Hills,

deputy," who listed everyone involved in the trial that found two men guilty of first-degree burglary.

The judge in the case was Charles L. Heitman, the prosecutor was E.H. Berg, the defendants were C.E. Bishop and Bob Fay, and the attorney for the defendants was W.B. McFarland. The case ended on Dec. 22, 1926.

averaging about 10 percent larger to Magic Valley schools next year. For the Twin Falls School District, that means \$877,626 more of state money. It also means voters may not be asked to pass a levy for additional operating money.

At least in theory, Twin Falls and all schools will get money to raise employee salaries 5 percent and another 2 percent increase in general operating expenses, both totaling \$877,626.

That's typical. What is not are the specifications and accountability tied to the rest of the money.

The public school funding bill has some of the most dramatic innovations of the last 50 years," said Sen. Laird Noh, R-Kimberly.

Beyond the standard 7 1/2 percent increase, districts will be required to submit plans for most of the rest of the money to the state Department of Education. The department will be doing out the money for smaller classrooms, special programs, expanded curriculums, books and equipment.

In addition, districts are being told to raise all teacher salaries to at least \$16,000. If money is left over, they can spend it for special pay programs. Twin Falls, for example, could use it to start a bonus salary program for its best teachers.

Other education issues not tied to the spending program had difficulty winning approval. Any sort of mandatory school consolidation proposal was soundly defeated. Large schools, such as Twin Falls, did not get the education formula readjusted to their advantage. And a plan to allow parents to send their children to any district they wanted, tuition-free, was also shot down.

The College of Southern Idaho also fared well. It and the state's other junior college won a 9 1/2 percent funding increase. The appropriation includes money set aside for maintenance and library books.

INEL oversight to begin

The Magic Valley can turn to a new watchdog over the purity of its water supply next year.

After several years with no state monitoring of the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory, the Legislature has approved a broad plan bearing little resemblance to the collection and testing of water samples a few years ago.

The state will spend \$193,000 to start an oversight program for the federal nuclear facility, which sits on the upstream end of the Magic Valley's supply of drinking and irrigation water.

Step 1 is hiring an administrator who will bypass layers of

bureaucracy to report directly to the governor. The administrator will be charged with developing plans for a complete program, including analyzing monitoring done by other agencies, overseeing cleanup, negotiating agreements with the Department of Energy and analyzing new projects for potential problems.

A second measure, ending years of controversy, will give the state additional protection of its water.

The Legislature gave the force of law to a compromise water quality agreement worked out between Gov. Cecil Andrus and environmental and industry groups to protect streams from "non-point" pollution from farming, mining and timbering.

The Legislature gave itself the authority to declare streams outstanding resource waters where further development would be prohibited.

Indemnity fund set up

Farmers also fared well.

The valley should be spared the sort of economic problems caused by the collapse of the Hawkins bean warehouse. A bill setting up a warehouse indemnity fund, a mandatory insurance measure against warehouse failures, passed. So did a bill requiring more financial information before the state licenses warehouses.

New licensing requirements were passed for farmers who apply chemicals through their irrigation systems — a move to protect the groundwater. And water rights were loosened in critical groundwater areas if a management district is in place.

A bill limiting the liability of canal companies for flood damage failed to make it out of committee, as did a proposal to strip the Idaho Crop Improvement Association of certification authority.

But it was noticed. The association, successfully sued last year for certifying diseased seed, leading to closer scrutiny of the group and the University of Idaho, which contracts with the group.

Social programs buoyed

Two struggling local programs were assured easier financial futures by the 1989 Legislature.

The Magic Valley Teen Parent

Consortium's high school will get about \$30,000 more from the state next year to educate school-age parents who might otherwise become high school dropouts.

The Magic Valley Guardian ad Litem program will get a portion of \$150,000 in state money in exchange for helping other areas of the state set up similar programs. The group organizes volunteers to offer support and friendship to neglected and abused children who need an advocate in the state Health and Welfare system or in the courts.

The Twin Falls-based program had threatened to disband if stable financing could not be found.

There is a physical limitation that affects the entire football program and impacts on his capacity to perform as head football coach, especially on the field. The problem does have an impact on the coaching staff and the team.

Jerome teams could win dual titles

Editor's note: This is a season preview of the Magic Valley's Class A-1 and A-2 high school track teams. The A-3 season preview will be published in Monday's Times-News.

Jerome's boys' track team collected coach Tim Dunne's eighth state Class A-2 championship last spring and the Tiger girls, who have long been state contenders. Prospects are mounting that the Tigers will make it a sweep this time.

Across the river, it may be the Twin Falls High School boys who present the stronger challenge this spring than the Bruin girls, who have long been state contenders. But neither appears to have the key individuals and depth to compete with Highland in Region III this year.

This year's team has 40-plus candidates whose potential is "unassessable" at this time," said Twin Falls girls coach Jerry Kleinkopf. "There are only seven seniors and only two are of proven experience and quality."

Class A-1 Twin Falls

The watershed event for the Twin Falls High girls' team was the graduation last spring of Jennifer Hannah, for four years the state's dominant high school distance runner on the A-1 level. Hannah has been the

anchor of the Bruins' recent success, including a state championship in 1987 and a second-place finish last year. "Our big problem is inexperience," said Kleinkopf. "It's going to take a considerable length of time to sort everyone out and find what they can do best. We will need quality help in all areas: sprints, distance, jumps, weights and hurdles."

Kleinkopf will rebuild his program around Molly Wallace, a senior sprinter and relay specialist who finished fifth at state in the 400-meter dash last spring in a time of 1 minute, 19 seconds, and Lisa Pocock, a senior hurdler and relay runner who ended up fourth at state in the 300-meter hurdles with a time of 47.71.

Also returning are Chris Mueller, a junior who went to state in the long jump, triple jump and 100-meter dash as a sophomore, and Tina Martinez, a junior who qualified in the long jump a year ago.

What other limited experience the Bruin girls have in the sprints, where junior Tonya Brown and senior Brenda Cheyney ran on the varsity last season, and in the distance events, where seniors Robin McLinn and Susan Schubert are returning regulars.

Brown, Cheyney, Martinez, Mueller, Pocock and Wallace should make the Bruins respectable in the relays, depending how fast sophomores Brooke Hall and Stacey Butler develop.

The real problem areas are the weights, where sophomore Amy Blankenship, a 35-foot shot-putter, will be Kleinkopf's main hope, and in distance, which has been

Twin Falls' traditional strength.

On the boys' side, the cycle is on the upswing, with experience returning in the sprints, distance, jumps, hurdles and weights and the potential of very strong relay teams in the 400, 800 and 1,600 meters.

"Our basic strength is that we have a hard-working group of athletes," said coach Duane Stands. "We're a young team, but we should get stronger with experience."

Ron Marsh, a senior who has personal bests of 11.2 seconds, 23.0 seconds and 51 seconds, respectively, in the 100, 200 and 400, is back to lead a sprint corps that includes quarter-mile Alan Heck, a junior who has a PR of 52.0. Heck will probably anchor the half-mile relay team that includes junior Forest Ward and seniors Paul McLinn and Steve McLaughlin and run on the mile relay team that includes sophomores Terry Thueson and Jared Alexander and is anchored by Marsh.

McLaughlin may anchor the 400 relay team that includes Ward and juniors Jeremy Amen and Mitch Wright.

Thueson, who ran both the high and intermediate hurdles as a freshman last year, will return along with sophomore Matt Fuller and junior Ryan Bailey, an IM specialist.

Seniors Jeff Dadds and John Conover, both three-year veterans, will lead the sprint corps in the 800 and the 1,600.

Bruins' Herd shuts out Meridian on just 4 hits

TWIN FALLS — Twin Falls High School junior right-hander Brady Herd went largely to the curbside Thursday afternoon in shutting out the Meridian Warriors 3-0 in a non-conference baseball matchup.

Herd, who fanned the side in the top of the seventh to nail down his four-hit shutout, got home run support from Jody Bryant, who cracked his third round-tripper of the season in the third inning.

The win runs Twin Falls' record to 7-2 on the season, the Bruins returning to the Frontier Field diamond at 1 p.m. today to take on the Borah Lions. Basically the same two teams collided for the state Class A-1 championship last spring.

Thursday's loss was just the second in 10 games for the Warriors and avenged a 9-7 Bruin loss to Meridian two weeks ago.

"It wasn't a very exciting game," smiled Twin Falls coach Bill Ingram. "Just the kind of game I really enjoy."

That was because his Bruins scored in the bottom of the first inning and Meridian only once had more than one base runner on at a time.

Brad threw a great game today, said Ingram of Herd, a transfer from Buhl. "I think he used a lot of curveballs, more than usual, but it got the job done."

Herd's gem allowed only one Warrior to advance as far as third base. That came in the second when losing pitcher John Kluskadal collected a one-out single and moved to third on an error before Herd got the side out. Mike Hampton led off the third with a double but

died there as the next three men went out quickly. A walk and stolen base advanced Kluskadal as far as second in the fourth and Greg Turpin singled and stole second in the sixth, all to no avail. The Bruin defense backed Herd with a double play in the fifth.

Meanwhile, Bobby Jenco started Twin Falls' offense off in the first with a walk and moved up to Boomer Walker's hit and an error. He rode in on Matt Rasmussen's fly to right field.

While Ingram would have liked to have seen a little more offense from the Bruins — they had six hits — he liked other portions of the game a lot.

"I think we played a little better defensively than we last two out in the field, too," he added wryly, referring to a three-error 11-run inning that handed Capital an 11-9 victory Tuesday.

Barry Sanders plans to join NFL

OKLAHOMA CITY — Heisman Trophy winner Barry Sanders notified the NFL Thursday that he is turning pro, setting up a possible test of the league's restrictions against drafting underclassmen.

We have received a request from Barry Sanders for special eligibility in the draft, NFL spokesman Joe Browne said in New York.

In Stillwater, Oklahoma State athletic director Myron Boderick confirmed the junior running back's decision after Sanders scheduled a news conference in Denver Saturday.

"He's through. We are declaring him ineligible for 1989," Boderick said. "We're 100 percent behind him and we'll be watching him as he develops as a pro. He's a great kid and has done a great job for us."

What likely figured in Sanders' decision is Oklahoma State's probation for recruiting violations. The NCAA banned the university from bowl games for three years and from television appearances for two.

Sanders' status with the NFL, however, is not clear.

A true junior, he is ineligible for

either the regular or supplemental drafts without a special exemption from Commissioner Pete Rozelle. Browne said Rozelle has granted about six of those exemptions a year for the past 20 years, mostly to players who were never drafted.

The most recent was last year when Pitts Craig Heyward was allowed to enter the draft with a year of eligibility remaining and was taken in the first round by New Orleans. In Heyward's case and others, Rozelle has cited the possibility that if he turned down the request, it might be challenged in court.

Rozelle declined to comment during last week's NFL owners meeting on Sanders' status, but Browne said Thursday.

His application will be reviewed by the office and while there is no timetable for a decision, the decision will be made by Commissioner Rozelle prior to the April 23 regular draft.

Other NFL sources, however, have indicated the league is more inclined to go to court now to test its rules against drafting underclassmen.

A Pro football source told The Associated Press that Sanders will be represented by David Ware, an Atlanta-based agent.

Changing traditional approaches to music



Longtime Filer piano teacher Georgia Blastock now uses electronics in her teachings

Piano teacher uses digital keyboards to expand sound range of students

FILER — Electronics is changing oldtime traditional approaches in piano teaching.

Digital keyboards, which could be called computerized pianos, with sound module, sequencer and a computer disk operating system, allow her students to "do what a complete orchestra can do," says Georgia Blastock, longtime piano teacher at Filer.

She believes she is the first private piano teacher in this area to have this electronic equipment, which she purchased late last year.

Nearly 90 percent of music heard on television is synthesized, she says, with parts, called tracks, written for many different instruments. Her students can record one track, then play the recording back while playing another part on the piano, thus adding another track.

"They love to record one track on top of another," Blastock says. Pianists also can decide which instrumental part they want to emphasize or mute, control speed and tones, all by touching or turning the right knobs.

"It exposes them to a whole range of sounds, from jazz to concertos," she says.

Some imitation of other instruments long has been possible through stops on organs, which most piano students never touch, and for some years on modern synthesizers.

But until development of the latest state-of-the-art electronic, electronic music suffered from poor sound quality and lack of expressiveness.

So it was not widely embraced by traditional music teachers and too expensive.

Blastock, who describes herself as a "dyed-in-the-wool" private teacher, also was skeptical, but she was so impressed when she heard the electronic keyboards demonstrated at the Music Teachers Association national convention last

spring that she decided to purchase two instruments.

She says two recent technological developments have sparked a "burst of interest" in electronic music.

The synthesizer sound is now much warmer and more aesthetic with touch-sensitive keyboards. The other development is a design specification that allows synthesizers and computers to work in combination.

While Blastock says initially it would seem that one needs less mu-

one individual using the electronic instrument. The student plays the primo or top part, harmonizing with the recorded secondo part.

Such uses enhance the teaching of musical skills once obtained entirely through the time-honored, one-to-one approach and traditional, repetitive drill, Blastock says.

"Integration is the key to an effective response to new technological developments," she says.

Earphones, which allow two students to practice at adjoining instruments, also helps in this integration. One with earphones works on with a disk she has designed to increase technical skills, while the other is taught in traditional manner by Blastock to perfect performing skills.

Another electronic marvel the Filer teacher has is a "tap" machine, designed especially for colleges and private teachers. The student listens to recorded music, then taps the accompanying rhythmic patterns from a printed book. Depending upon her proficiency, the student is then referred to an easier or more difficult exercise.

"This machine provides the experience and motivation to develop that internal sense of rhythm that is necessary for good musical performance," Blastock says.

But, the teacher laughingly says that "after all the lofty talk (and potential learning use) what most of my kids want to do with the digital keyboard is play along with recordings of catchy tunes like Five Foot Two and Eyes of Blue."

Blastock sees the growing use of electronic instruments as opening up a whole new world of thinking about what you can do.

They also have great potential for community use to provide full sound accompaniment when live musicians are not available.

She used her new equipment to "put together something" for musical background for the local production of "Amahl" and the "Night Visitor" in Twin Falls last Christmas.

sical skills when using electronics, she firmly believes the new equipment opens many effective new avenues for personalized music instruction.

She records and makes disks of musical exercises suited to individual students, to teach scales, chord knowledge and ear-training. On the latter, the recorded exercise plays, then the student repeats it. If the student does not play the notes correctly the instrument beeps.

Many multiple music software programs now are available commercially, she says.

Teaching rhythm or correct time also is more effective with the new computerized instruments. Students can play manually along with the identical recorded music. If they fail to hold a half note long enough, or skip over a rest, they will immediately be aware of it.

"You can sit and talk about correct time forever and they won't listen," the music teacher says. But playing it with the correct version on the digital keyboard seems to impress them.

Equality returns to this year's Oscars

HOLLYWOOD — Well, it turned out to be "Rain Man's" evening, but not until the last few minutes, and if there was a message in Wednesday night's Academy Awards results, it is that parity has returned to Hollywood.

For two-thirds of the show, the academy voters seemed determined to give an award to every film nominated. As it was, 10 movies split 17 awards, the most winners for one year in this decade.

The major awards made the fastcasters look smart and the academy predictable. "Rain Man" did win the grand prize (and three other big ones) and "Mississippi Burning," with just one O-scar for cinematography, did get punished for its highly publicized historical muddling.

But gone, for a refreshing change, was the slate voting that has turned many recent Academy Awards ceremonies into one-note evenings that kept some deserving people out of the Oscar resale market.

"Rain Man," its director Barry Levinson, Hoffman and the screenwriters (the two of several who worked on it) may have fulfilled their favorite roles, there were no sure bets elsewhere, and people looking for early patterns had to throw away the form.

The final score shows "Rain Man" with four Oscars and "Dangerous Liaisons" and "Who Framed Roger Rabbit" with three each. But there were seven other films with one award each.

Whether the spread represents a

change in voting habits, or an absence of a film to rally around, it made for a great show and in some cases, the awards helped right some wrongs in the nominations process.

"Who Framed Roger Rabbit" won three of the four awards for which it was nominated, which may save the academy some embarrassment for neglecting the one 1988 film sure to be regarded as a classic.

The good news for observers of voter psychology were the awards given to films that were not box-office hits. The voters tend to favor those films that are both of substance and commercially successful (thus: "Rain Man"), and whether they even bother to see the other nominees is often questioned.

This year, several winners came from films that failed to ring up big numbers at the box office: Jodie Foster as best actress from "The Accused," Geena Davis as best supporting actress from "The Accidental Tourist."

More surprising were the awards given to "Bird" and "The Milagro Beanfield War," films that divided critics and sent moviegoers off to the video store looking for alternatives.

Both films were flawed, but the sound editing done for "Bird," which seamlessly blended old jazz recordings with fresh studio cuts done by contemporary musicians, was brilliant and deserved the award its four-man sound team won.

'Fletch Lives' is top Hollywood money maker for week

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — "Fletch Lives," starring Chevy Chase as an investigative reporter prying into the private life of a TV evangelist, was Hollywood's top money maker over the Easter weekend with \$5.6 million in ticket sales.

Movies aimed at youngsters on spring break dominated the Top 10 list, notably the re-released Disney film "The Rescuers" in second place with revenues of \$3.1 million.

The only serious films in the weekend lineup were the Oscar-winning movie "Rain Man," in third place with \$3 million, followed closely by "Lean on Me," based on New Jersey's baseball bat-wielding educator Joe Clark, with \$2.9 million.

"Miami Vice" TV star Don Johnson's latest big screen venture "Dead Bang" made its debut in fifth place with a \$2.8 million-gross, while "Leviathan," with Richard Crenna in an underwater variation of "Alien," was sixth with \$2.7 million.

Actress Shelley Long and her new movie "Troop Beverly Hills" placed seventh in its first week of release with a \$2.3 million gross.

In eighth place was the romantic

comedy "Chances Are," featuring "Moonlighting" TV star Cybill Shepherd, and ninth went to the teen comedy "Bill and Ted's Excellent Adventure."

Adventure movie may be worst nightmare

The following are capsule reviews of some of the films now playing in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

BILL & TED'S EXCELLENT ADVENTURE (PG). This is Allan Bloom's worst nightmare, and possibly yours, too. It is an all-out celebration of the closing of the American mind, with two high school doofuses (Keanu Reeves and Alex Winter) borrowing a time machine to kidnap great figures of past centuries for a history report. Look for two of the low points of American teen-age cinema in one movie: Joan of Arc leads an aerobics class, and Abraham Lincoln tells an assembly of school kids to Party on, dudes! This witless fiasco could be more imbecilic or less excellent — dudes.

THE BURBS (PG). Grimly unfunny comedy about three suburban husbands (Tom Hanks, Bruce Dern and Rick Ducommun) who behave like little boys when a Munsterlike family moves in a ramshackle Victorian house on their cul-de-sac. Big letdown for fans of Hanks, freshly Oscar nominated for Big. With Carrie Fisher, Corey Feldman.

DANGEROUS LIAISONS (R). As the book "Les Liaisons Dangereuses" outraged and scandalized the French in the late 18th century,

this delt movie has kept every shred of its ability to shock in the late 1980s. Screenwriter Christopher Hampton, with director Stephen Frears, has made a glidingly cinematic version of his own successful play, taken from the 1792 novel by Choderlos de Laclos. Stars John Malkovich, Glenn Close and Michelle Pfeiffer.

FLETCH LIVES (PG). This limp effort from coasting director Michael Ritchie is the ultimate comedy of condescension. As a wisecracking investigative reporter, Chevy Chase delivers non-stop punchlines at the expense of the fools who surround him (He makes David Letterman look like Mother Teresa). And what better place in this sequel for Fletch to go and be superior than the Deep South? The characters verbal daggers can be funny in small doses, but after a while you just want to smack him.

HER ALIBI (PG). This mystery is certainly elegant looking, but 15 minutes into the action the thrill is gone and director Bruce Beresford seems to have no clue as to how to find it. Tom Selleck plays a mystery writer who has hit a writing block, so he hits a few real courtrooms, looking for inspiration. Czech-born actress-model Paulina Porizkova plays a Ro-

manian mystery woman and before you can say jurisprudence, Selleck has lied gracefully, providing Porizkova with an alibi at her murder trial.

LEAN ON ME (PG-13). Bullhorn-and-baseball bat-wielding educator Joe Clark is played by Morgan Freeman, possibly the most formidable actor on the American scene. And he will give thoughtful audiences their thorniest problems with Lean on Me. When director John Avildsen turns up the heat, it is thrilling. But glossed over by the film makers are some of the real statistics of Clark's administration and the fact that he has very nearly created more problems than he has solved.

LEVIATHAN (R). It's The Alien set beneath the sea instead of outer space and not nearly as sophisticated. But it's occasionally scary, looks good and moves well under George Cosmatos vigorous direction. Peter Weller, Richard Crenna.

RAIN MAN (R). Because we have had dozens of buddy films about journeys of discovery, we can plot the scenario of this one like a road map: The special qualities of one will work on the other to change him, or perhaps both of them. Dustin Hoffman makes his autistic savant character hypnotically interesting and sometimes terribly funny. Tom Cruise gives his loosest, most authoritative performance since Risky Business and it

can be said unblushingly that he holds his own with the mastery Hoffman.

SKIN DEEP (R). Blake Edwards' latest has a couple of the funniest moments he ever devised, it has John Ritter's easy-to-take charm, but this tale of a rich and famous compulsive womanizer and hard drinker on the skids ends up living up to its title all too closely.

WORKING GIRL (R). For those who missed the special Melanie Griffith blend of moxie and down-to-earth sensuality in "Something Wild" and "Stormy Monday," this is a chance to meet her in the very best of company: romantically entangled with Harrison Ford, directed by Mike Nichols and in a savagely funny screenplay by Kevin Wade. It is a working-Cinderella story in which Griffith plays a more-than-bright Staten Islander with a fierce yen to climb out of the secretarial pool at their Wall Street brokerage job. With Sigourney Weaver, Joan Cusack, Alec Baldwin and Olympia Dukakis.

'1969' gives personal view of impact of Vietnam War

HOLLYWOOD — There is an awkwardness, an aura of self-consciousness, about "1969" that is finally more of a plus than a minus. It reflects writer-director Ernest Thompson's sincere and determined attempt to grapple — in a deeply personal and autobiographical way — with the impact of the Vietnam War upon his generation. The film also seems to represent Thompson's effort to deny, if not exactly shatter, the Norman Rockwellian image of his play "On Golden Pond."

In his directorial debut he aims to show the contradictory emotions that the war provoked in Middle American families — the families that are sworn to uphold Mom, apple pie and the flag and are idealized in commercials. Thompson has by no means freed himself from manipulative sentimentality, but by the film's finish its unabashed heart-tugging is well-earned.

For an older generation, "1969" may seem late in the game and overly familiar. But the film is aimed at those 18- or 19-year-olds, just past high school graduation — the same age as Thompson in 1969. The film is a reminder that an entire post-Vietnam generation, one that never experienced the anguish of the period first-hand, is now on the brink of coming of age.

A voice-over tells us that in this idyllic Maryland town, "the 60s" may seem late in the game and overly familiar. But when they arrive in fictional Culloch County they hit hard. Kiefer Sutherland's Scott and Robert Downey Jr.'s Ralph, best pals from childhood, are heading home from college for summer vacation just as Scott's older brother Alden (Christopher Wynne, incisive in a brief appearance) is shipping out to Vietnam as a Marine.

The clash that has always existed between the brothers flares up and acquires new dimension and meaning when Scott expresses his anti-war sentiments, enraging his World War II hero father (Bruce Dern) even

more than his brother. It propels Ralph and Scott into a meandering hippie summer odyssey. Thompson suggests the schizoid atmosphere of the era, the opening of the generation gap between parents and children as younger people found themselves closing ranks in growing opposition to the war.

Downey may have top billing, but Sutherland is the strength and center of the film. His Scott is an intelligent boy, shy with girls and likable despite his outspoken and occasional insensitive views. Downey's Ralph is more the fun-lover, but, on the verge of flunking out of college, he faces the prospect of being drafted.

Wynona Ryder is Ralph's intense younger sister, whose anti-war

speech as high-school valedictorian shocks and appalls her audience. It takes a while for the older generation to acquire dimension, but Dern and Mariette Hartley (as Scott's mother) eventually come into focus and are quite affecting.

"1969" (MPAA-rated R for language, some nudity) may be uneasy and too treacly in its tone, but it is nonetheless the work of a film maker who knows where he's going and who builds to a climax of intense emotional impact. You could wish for more detachment and a less direct pitch to the heart, but you come away touched by the film.

Organ recital planned for Sunday

TWIN FALLS — A "goodbye" and "hello" organ recital will be held at 4 p.m. Sunday, April 2, at the College of Southern Idaho Fine Arts Auditorium.

It will be the farewell appearance for Helen Connolly, who has taught organ, piano and cello at CSI since 1978, and the inaugural recital for the new college Allen Digital Computer Organ.

Connolly will leave Twin Falls this summer.

Her husband, Guy, has been transferred to Denver with the U.S. Department of Agriculture. She has not only taught at the college, but served as piano accompanist at faculty recitals and accompanied the college choir and some students. Helen Connolly has been organist at the Twin Falls United Methodist Church for 12 years. She has presented solo organ recitals at the Buhl, Rimber and Twin Falls United Methodist

churches. In 1984, she performed a tripartite recital on organ, piano and cello at Boise State University.

She is the principal cellist in the Magic Valley Symphony, with whom she appeared as organ soloist in 1987, performing the Gullmark Organ Symphony Number One. A two-manual Allen Digital Organ was used for this performance. Helen Connolly attended the University of Montana and has a B.A. degree from Boise State University. She earned an A.A. degree in library science at CSI and was employed in the college library from 1976 to 1981. She is a member of the American Guild of Organists and the Organ Historical Society.

The new Allen Digital Computer Organ has three manuals, keyboard, full 32-note pedal board, 52 speaking stops, additional stops available on computer cards, a 12-key

transposer and 19 speakers which are placed in three groups — one in each side balcony and one set on stage.

Helen Connolly said this electronic instrument comes as close as possible to duplicating the sound of a real pipe organ. Since it is electronic, it does not need to be tuned as would a real pipe organ. It is easily moved about on the stage for concert use.

The organ is used for teaching students, accompanying the college choir, the Magic Valley Chorale and Magic Valley Symphony and is a fine solo recital instrument, she said.

The college previously had no concert organ and rented an instrument for concert and recital use.

The concert will include an organ demonstration by Douglas Lemmon from Dunkley Music in Boise.

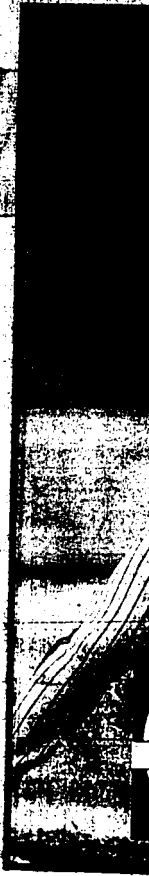

The Boys of Summer take the field in Major League baseball's opener

The grass is manicured, the mound is packed, the chalk is down, and it's April 3. "So what?" you ask. It's only the most important day of the year for major-league baseball fans: Opening Day. The following Saturday, on April 8, NBC airs its first "Game of the Week" with either the Los Angeles Dodgers vs. the Atlanta Braves or the Pittsburgh Pirates vs. the Chicago Cubs.

Opening day marks the last chance to make predictions — and to pooh-pooh those of your friends — about how the divisional races will shake out.

NATIONAL LEAGUE EAST: All eyes are on the New York Mets. They have it all — great pitching, solid hitting and bench strength. They also have two names that make the rest of the National League's collective heart flutter — Dwight Gooden and Darryl Strawberry. The good Dr. K should be up to form, and Straw continues to be one of the most feared hitters on the planet.

The St. Louis Cardinals should give the Mets a good run — literally. Vince Coleman, Willie McGee, Orzle Smith and co. led the majors last year with 254 steals. And if the Redbirds' pitching staff is healthy, watch out, Mets!

The Pittsburgh Pirates gave the Mets a scare last year, finishing second. But they didn't do anything in the off-season to improve them-

selves. Still, if they start strong they could be a contender.

NATIONAL LEAGUE WEST: When will the Cincinnati Reds finally win the division? After finishing second four years in a row, the team that Pete Rose built should do it this time around. The Reds are loaded with starting pitching, power and speed, and have a real talent in outfielder Eric Davis.

The San Diego Padres snuck up on everybody last year. Still improving, the Pads added powerhouse Jack Clark to their lineup. And don't count the world champion Los Angeles Dodgers out. They have a lot of heart, not to mention \$7.9 million pitcher Orel Hershiser. Newly acquired infielders Willie Randolph and Eddie Murray should be real bonuses.

AMERICAN LEAGUE WEST: The Oakland Athletics were clearly the best team in baseball last year, even though they bowed to the Dodgers in the World Series. The one-two punch of MVP Jose Canseco and Mark McGwire is intimidating enough, but the A's also have the best pitching staff in the league — Dave Stewart, Storm Davis, Bob Welch and Curt Young, not to mention bullpen ace Dennis Eckersley.

The Minnesota Twins are tough,

too, but they lack the depth and consistency of the A's. Centerfielder Kirby Puckett is becoming a real superstar (.356, 234 hits, 121 RBIs and a league-leading 450 putouts last year).

AMERICAN LEAGUE EAST: The race in the AL East is almost too close to call, but it's time to go out on a limb and pick the New York Yankees. Consistently loaded with talent, the Yanks have always managed to self-destruct in recent seasons. But you can't argue with a lineup that boasts Don Mattingly, Dave Winfield and Ricky Henderson. The acquisition of Steve Sax could ice it.

The Toronto Blue Jays should have a good year, and could take the crown. Their lineup is balanced, with a strong pitching staff and an infield that features Fred McGriff and Kelly Gruber, two of the best young players in the league.

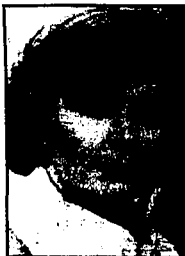

Trebek's life always in Jeopardy

WASHINGTON — What would you do with a guy who could be equally conversant on the global impact of the thinning of the Amazon forest, the dumping of chlorofluorocarbons into the atmosphere, and the condition of male-female relationships?

Make him president? Nah, too easy. Give him his own sex therapy talk show? Get out of here. Make him the host of America's toughest game show? Yeah, that's the ticket.

Alex Trebek is the kind of guy who knows how many state capitals have five letters in their name (three) and what kind of wine goes best with fish (white).

In other words, don't wager that Trebek, the host of "Jeopardy!," America's favorite nightly syndicated skull session, is just window-dressing because he is a game-show host. You would lose your money.

"There's a stereotypical image which is unfair, because a lot of my friends who are game show hosts are bright guys. Some of them are very concerned about matters that are not in the mainstream of our concerns. Bob Barker (host of 'The Price Is Right') is very strung against the abuse to animals. He's against furs and has been advocating spaying and neutering your dogs and cats for years," said Trebek, during a recent interview here.

"Unfortunately, because the games are simplistic in many cases, a lot of the viewers seem to think that the host must therefore be a simplistic, shallow type of individual who's only interested in dealing with people on a very superficial level and dealing with people who are going to jump up and down and scream and rant and rave and carry on. That isn't always the case.

"I'm fortunate because with 'Jeopardy!,' for instance, it's a more serious game and it is perceived as such. It's a difficult game so that people automatically think that I'm much brighter than I am. I'm really a yo-yo, but I fake it so beautifully."

If that is true, Trebek has been fooling 25 million folks worldwide for the last five years and 1,000-plus tapings of "Jeopardy!," which, for the uninitiated, is the show that gives you the answers and requires you to come up with the correct

questions (And please be sure that your response is in the form of a question).

Trebek, a native Canadian who is hosting the third incarnation of the popular quiz show over its 25-year existence, says that the reason for its popularity (second among all syndicated programs to "Wheel of Fortune") is no mystery and in playing the game, you learn something about yourself and others.

"People like taking tests and you can't watch 'Jeopardy!' just as a spectator," Trebek said. "You watch it as a participant, so you're going to get involved. And if somebody else is in the room at the same time, you bet you're going to get involved. At some point, a person next to you is going to shout out a question and be correct, and you'll say, 'Uh-oh. I'm in a game.'"

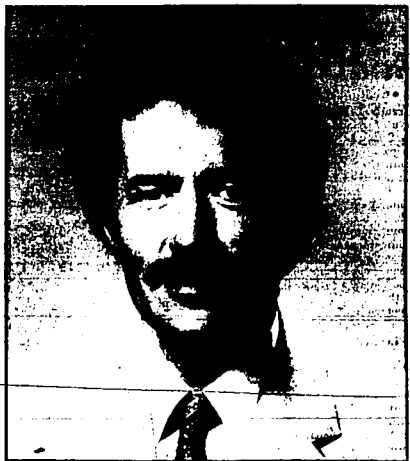
By his own admission, hosting "Jeopardy!" is a snap for Trebek, 48, especially since he gave up producing the show this year to take over the reins of the revival of "Concentration."

Because he does not have to choose the material for all the clues needed for each show, all Trebek has to do is come in on taping day and preside over the five shows that are recorded in each session.

Trebek said that the material on this year's shows is a bit easier than in the past, to his slight chagrin, but the viewers are happy and the contestants are winning more (an average of over \$10,000 per show).

"I'd probably want to have it a little tougher, but there is much to be said for that slightly easier approach which can involve more people and give them a more positive feeling about themselves rather than have them miss more of them," he said.

Trebek appeared in Washington recently to publicize the upcoming first National Geographic geography bee, a competition modeled after the annual national spelling bee and sponsored by the magazine for fourth through eighth graders.

TV's 'new realities' are making executive positions less satisfying

HOLLYWOOD — Kim Le Masters calls it "the civilian equivalent of war."

Fred Silverman calls it "a constant merry-go-round."

Tony Thomopoulos calls it "a terrific opportunity for anyone to have."

Brandon Stoddard just called it quits.

The unexpected resignation of the ABC Entertainment president Tuesday served to put the spotlight on one of the most powerful yet pressure-packed jobs in the entertainment industry — the television networks' chief programmers, whose responsibility it is to try to satisfy not only their medium's insatiable appetite for thousands of hours of television shows a year but also their bosses' constant hunger for bigger ratings and even bigger profits.

But is the job itself satisfying? Stoddard, ultimately, decided no.

While acknowledging that "it's been a joy and a privilege in the last 19 years as a broadcaster to put television shows on the air—that hundreds of millions of people have enjoyed and learned from," the 51-year-old executive concluded that along with the power came too much frustration and aggravation. In short, he said, "it's just no fun anymore."

Stoddard, who has been at ABC since 1970 and will remain there as president of its in-house production division, said that the job is more difficult now than ever before because of the "new realities" of network television, in which audiences and profits are harder to come by as the competition for cable TV, independent stations and videocassette recorders increases.

Past and present programming chiefs agree.

"Now exactly what he's talking about," said Kim LeMasters, president of CBS Entertainment for the past year. "There are days when it looks so dark and gloomy that it's not fun to even get out of bed."

And Brandon Tartikoff, president of NBC Entertainment since 1981, admitted Wednesday that "if you catch me on the wrong Tuesday in

February, I'd complain far worse than Brandon Stoddard did in the press about how hard these jobs are. It does get to you. But the thing that gets you into your car early in the morning is some of the shows you work on and some of the people you get to work with."

With all this complaining, it is hard to believe that Martin Starger, who was head of programming at ABC from 1969-1975, recalls that he did not feel that way at all. "I never thought of it as horrendous. Not at all. It was very exciting for me. I have to say I had fun," he said Wednesday.

Starger was quick to admit, however, that his tenure "was a little different in those days than it is now. I don't know if it was worse. But it was a different world in the sense that in the '70s there were three networks in competition with one another and you programmed only against your two competitors. Cable was still in its infancy, and videocassette was a phrase that no one used at that time. Now, the competition is a lot more than two networks."

Another difference, Starger noted, is the fact that as an executive he probably had more autonomy than his counterparts today (when it is reported that even CBS Inc. president Laurence Tisch sometimes overrules his executives on programming decisions).

"The people I worked for rarely interfered with the programming department's recommendations," recalled Starger, now president of Marstar Productions. "Sure, there were the usual problems with budgets and money. But never autonomy."

In addition, the programming departments themselves were smaller and less bureaucratic. "They were very vital, very exciting places to work, with one-third and one-fourth the executives that networks have now," said Starger, whose staff included Barry Diller (now chairman of Fox Inc.) and Michael Eisner (now chairman of Disney). "I think that's part of the frustration."

Another change has been the increasing attention that the news media has paid to television and its

top entertainment executives.

Fame has its price, LeMasters noted. Now, instead of journalists simply reporting that a CBS or ABC program failed, "we hear that it was Kim LeMasters' dumb idea, or Brandon Stoddard's dumb idea — and that does wear and tear on you."

"The job is more identified with the person, or the personality of the guy who runs the entertainment division," he said. "The irony of ironies is that, although we who run the division may want to think we are the Il Duce, we all work off committees. But people can be quite vicious, and if you have any sensitivity at all, it plays on you."

"The worst thing about the job is that it never ends. You solve one problem and three more take its place," lamented Fred Silverman, who was head of programming for CBS from 1970 to 1975 and then president of ABC Entertainment from 1975 to 1978. "You're living to work instead of working to live."

Silverman recalled with horror those days of the constantly ringing phone and the constantly filled appointment calendar. "Once," he said, "I was flying on a plane to somewhere, and a (program) supplier bought a seat on the flight so he could sit next to me and sell a show."

Given all this, the burn-out factor associated with the job is considered high by most standards. LeMasters, for instance, said that while he wants to "savor this for awhile," he knows that in three years' time he will be looking in the mirror "to see if the psychological damage is too great, or can I stand some more and go on from there."

Tartikoff, for his part, admitted that being programming chief is "like relationships — you fall in and out of love."

So what keeps him going? "I think that what you've got to have motivating you at all times are two things. One, you've got to have a love for the medium of TV. And, two, you've got to have some sort of vision that you're hoping to accomplish, and if you accomplish that vision, you're leaving it a better place."

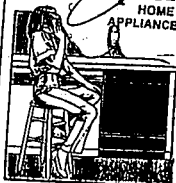

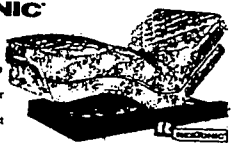

ABC taps 'obvious newcomer' Iger to head entertainment

HOLLYWOOD — Breaking with
a long tradition of promoting from
within the creative department,
Capital Cities-ABC Inc. named Robert
Iger from the network's business
affairs side as its new entertain-
ment president Thursday. Immedi-
ately, the 38-year-old former execu-
tive vice president of the ABC Tele-
vision Network Group declared, "I
do not come in with a program
strategy."

In an interview from his New
York office, the one-time manager of
"ABC's Wide World of Sports" ac-
knowledgeed that while his expertise
lies in the "day-to-day workings of
the network," he is "an obvious
newcomer" to the process of prime-
time programming.

"I come to this job clearly with a
great degree of inexperience in the
entertainment field," he said. "I
have a lot to learn."

He disputed speculation that
Capital Cities-ABC management
was stressing bottom line considera-
tions over creative experience and
working relationships with the Hol-
lywood community in its top pro-
gramming executive. "I do not come
in with any game plan having to be
handed to me by the management
of the company," he stressed.

And he indicated that his unfam-
iliarity with entertainment pro-
gramming would help give him a
sense of independence in his new
position. "If there's one thing that I
bring to this job, in terms of my
point of view, it's that I'm my own
person. And if people are wise,
they'll wait to judge me when they
see me."

Iger said that he had asked Stod-
dard, now president of ABC's in-
house production division, to stay
on through the process of choosing
the fall schedule "so he can bring
into it his knowledge and experi-
ence," Iger declared. "It's a very de-
licate time. And the important thing
to emphasize is I will not disrupt
the process one bit. Of course,
there's a natural disruption caused
by the change. But I'm going to do
whatever I can to reduce that."

But Iger also made it clear that
he, and not Stoddard, would be
mapping out the new season's line-
up. Asked if Stoddard would bear
the responsibility for the schedule,
Iger replied curtly: "I did not say
that."

Marcy Carsey, executive producer
of ABC's hit show "Roseanne," pre-
dicted that Stoddard would be
working closely with Iger in coming
weeks.
