Base pay battle line hardening

Kennedy, backers ignore Bush veto vow, go for \$4.55

WASHINGTON — Senate sponsors of legislation to raise the minimum wage ignored President Bush's veto threat Thursday and pressed ahead with a plan to boost the hourly base wage to \$4.55 — 30 cents more than Bush has said he would agree to.

The bill's sponsor, Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., won vital Southern Democratic support by agreeing to cut the final target of his bill from \$4.65 an hour to \$4.55 and add a provision allowing workers to be paid a subminimum wage for their first two months in the job market.

These changes are likely to be offered by Southern Democratic senators today. The agreement appears to give Kennedy more than enough votes to win passage of his plan, although a final vote likely will not come until next week. The changes also would bring the bill essentially in line with a House-passed measure.

However, the Senate amendment providing for a subminimum, as it stood when the Senate recessed for the night Thursday, would provide employers with some leeway in paying the lower wage. If that remains the case, the bill still would need to go back to the House for approval or to conference committee for compromise before it could be sent to the White House.

The Democrats moved hours after Bush vowed again to veto any attempt to raise the hourly minimum wage above \$4.25 and restored his insistence on a six-month training wage, three times the Democratic proposal.

Kennedy said Bush's support for some increase was a welcome change after the Reagan administration's dogged opposition to any boost. But another Democrat chastised Bush for refusing to compromise further.

"Over 14 million of our nation's lowest paid workers have patiently awaited our action," Kennedy said in the opening debate on the bill. "They should wait no longer."

The minimum wage has been \$3.35 since 1981. Bush served notice shortly before the Senate took up the measure that he would not back down.

The president met with GOP lawmakers and, according to House Minority Leader Bob Michel, R-Ill., "made it abundantly clear there will be absolutely no flexibility, not one penny, not one deviation from his position on the minimum wage."

The House-passed bill allows a subminimum to be paid to new hires for two months but only if it was their first job. The Kennedy language allows the subminimum to be paid to any worker in their first 90 days in the job market.

Idaho gas prices rocket upward

Alaskan-oil spill behind 11-cent leap

TWIN FALLS — Although gasoline prices have risen faster than the space shuttle in the past week, it may be wise to fill up now anyway, because some distributors say prices are going to get worse — and a shortage is even possible.

All over town, gas has increased 11 cents a gallon in four days. Regular and unleaded gas went from 94 cents a gallon on Monday to 99 cents on Tuesday to \$1.05 on Thursday.

"When you go over \$1 a gallon it's like putting an 'out of order' sign out here, People rebel," said Jim Lynch, who owns two Mr. Gas stations on Blue Lakes Boulevard and other stations in Burley and Paul.

Customers at Lynch's station at Blue Lakes and Heyburn Avenue Thursday were riled about the prices.

"I hate 'em," Bob Peace said. He didn't buy any gas. "I'm going to wait for the price to go down."

"It's funny how prices can fluctuate 25 percent in one week," he said. The oil industry's behavior should be investigated, he suggested.

Terry Inman was quick to note that gas prices had changed from two to three figures overnight.

"We were complaining about the prices when we drove in here," she said.

She attributes the increase to the huge Alaska oil spill. Higher prices, however, won't make her drive less, she said.

Twin Falls station managers said business was normal Thursday in spite of the 6 cent overnight increase.

"I was surprised because I thought everyone had already filled up," said Doris Reed, manager of the #1 station on Washington Street. She had thought the 5 cent jump earlier in the week would have triggered people to fill up then.

#1 was selling regular and unleaded gas for \$1.04 per gallon.

While most station managers expressed uncertainty about the next direction prices will take, Lynch's wholesale suppliers gave him a discouraging prognosis.

"You can't see nothing yet," they told him. Expect gas to go up another 9 to 12 cents in the next few months and remain there through the summer, they said.

"It's not us; it's the suppliers," Lynch said in defense of retail stations.

Oil from tanker spill penetrates national park

VALDEZ, Alaska — The nation's worst oil spill penetrated a national park on Thursday as state officials pushed the Coast Guard to take control of the much-maligned cleanup from Exxon.

On the East Coast, the captain of the tanker that leaked the oil was freed after his bail was reduced from \$1 million to \$25,000. The judge said the former skipper, Joseph Hazelwood of Huntington, N.Y., was unlikely to flee.

The spill of 10.1 million gallons of crude oil

has killed thousands of animals in the wildlife-rich Prince William Sound, and resulted in millions of dollars in losses to fishermen.

The first oil was spotted Thursday in the Kenai Fjords National Park, a rocky, remote refuge southwest of Valdez, a park spokesman said, but favorable winds were still keeping the heavy crude offshore.

An airborne spotter was seeing an oil sheen up on some of the rocks and seeing staining on the rocks," spokesman John Quinley said.

Gov. Steve Copwer said Exxon's cleanup

has been to slow and asked Coast Guard Rear Adm. Edward Nelson Jr. to take control. The governor said Nelson agreed, but the Coast Guard said no formal decision had been made.

In Valdez, Rep. George Miller, D-Calif., called the effectiveness of Exxon's cleanup "almost nil." He said the spill has temporarily scuttled the oil industry's chances for winning Congressional approval for exploration in an Alaskan wilderness area.

Miller, head of the congressional subcommittee overseeing oil exploration in Alaska, called for federal takeover of the cleanup.

In Washington, White House Press Secretary Martin Flanagan said President Bush may order the military to help in the long-term cleanup of the spill. But the administration underscored its opposition to a takeover of the operation.

Exxon Chairman L.G. Rawl issued a second apology for the spill, caused when the tanker Exxon Valdez struck a reef outside the normal shipping channel, but said the company's response to the accident was "immediate and thorough."

Ueberroth, partners to buy Eastern

NEW YORK — A group led by former baseball commissioner Peter V. Ueberroth agreed Thursday to buy strike-crippled Eastern Air Lines, and a union spokesman said he was cautiously optimistic the deal would end the month-old walkout.

The \$464 million agreement would give employees a 30 percent share in the company in exchange for wage concessions.

The sale by Eastern's parent, Texas-Air Corp., is subject to approval by U.S. Bankruptcy Court and Eastern's creditors. Eastern also must reach new work agreements with its striking unions by

midnight Tuesday, under terms of the sale.

"Under this agreement, Eastern can be back flying in very short order," said Texas-Air Chairman Frank Lorenzo, who has been the target of bitter personal attacks from union members.

About 600 striking Machinists jammed a union hall in Miami, where Eastern is based, cheering and chanting, "Take us out to the ball game!" and "Hey, hey! Ho, ho! Lorenzo! Go to go!" after hearing of the sale.

Eastern has been virtually paralyzed since March 4 by the Machinists' strike, which has drawn the support of pilots and flight attendants.

Latest fusion-in-a-jar experiments fizzle

BOSTON — At least one independent attempt to produce nuclear fusion in a jar of water has fizzled so far, diminishing hopes raised two weeks ago of an amazing and limitless source of power, scientists said Thursday.

"We are very skeptical," said chemist Mark S. Wrighton of Massachusetts Institute of Technology. "We've done the experiment now for 10 days, and we don't see anything exceptional."

Wrighton began his experiment March 27, four days after a researcher at the University of Utah and a colleague from England announced a breakthrough in fusion. However, Wrighton said his work does not conclusively prove their approach is worthless.

"If nuclear fusion occurs, it is at a very low level and our detectors aren't sensitive enough, or it takes longer than 10 days, or it doesn't work," Wrighton said.

The fusion feat was announced at a news conference by B. Stanley Pons of Utah and Martin Fleis-

chmann of the University of Southampton in England. They claimed to have achieved nuclear fusion at room temperature with equipment available in any college laboratory.

If true, their discovery could eventually lead to widespread use of nuclear fusion as a major source of electricity, a goal of scientists for decades. It would mean a virtually unlimited supply of cheap, clean fuel.

The University of Utah researchers said their apparatus produced four times as much energy as it consumed.

Wrighton said he obtained details of the technique from other scientists at the University of Utah. Late last week, he and several other research groups around the country received copies of the team's scientific paper, which he said confirmed that he had been doing the experiment just as they had.

"We see no physical basis at the moment for

thinking that nuclear fusion is going to occur," Wrighton said. "And we certainly have no evidence that there's a big effect, one that would have technological consequences in the near term."

However, University of Utah spokeswoman Pamela Fogle noted that the team believes the reaction can take 10 days to three weeks to occur. She said Pons was not immediately available to comment further.

The Utah researchers' paper has been published in the Netherlands in the Journal of Electroanalytical Chemistry.

"We realize that the results reported here raise more questions than they provide answers and that much further work is required on this topic," they wrote.

Scientists at several institutions are trying to confirm the group's results. In fact, Wrighton said, some of the experiments began even before the University of Utah news conference as word of their findings leaked out.

"We understand through the grapevine that the groups going that long haven't seen any confirmation of the essential claims, either," he said.

Jury finds 3 inmates guilty of rioting

BOISE (AP) — Three Idaho State Penitentiary inmates have been found guilty of rioting charges, while four others have been acquitted. After deliberating more than 10 hours Wednesday, the 4th District Court jury found inmates Gregory Anderson, 26; Darrell Clarke, 21; and William Dunn, 26, guilty of trashing a cell block at the prison south of Boise last fall. But the jury found insufficient evidence to convict Robert Hamer, 23; Merle Lamere, 25; Jerry Brazzell, 37; and Michael Werlinger, 31. "I don't really understand the verdict," said Amil Myshin, Ada County deputy public defender. "It's confusing. I don't know what kind of message it sends." The jury simply sorted out those they felt were more culpable," said attorney Ellison Matthews, who represented Lamere. Defense attorneys had argued that some of the inmates took part in the Sept. 25 disturbance out of fear for their own safety. Judge D. Duff McKee set sentencing for May 4. The guilty trio faces a maximum of 25 additional years in prison. Inmates Jon Sjogren and Jackie Hendrix pleaded guilty to rioting charges earlier. Anderson also was convicted of assaulting a correctional officer. The riot was sparked after inmates in a day room objected to a prisoner being hauled off for drinking contraband homemade liquor. Rioters held the cell block for about 3 1/2 hours, setting fire to the control room, breaking windows and smashing holes in endblock walls. During the melee, accused murderer Richard Holmes was stabbed to death inside his cell. Inmate Rodney "Shorty" Aranza is charged with his murder.

Teen faces manslaughter charges

CALDWELL (AP) — Misdemeanor vehicular manslaughter charges have been filed against a 16-year-old Nampa girl involved in a March 24 accident which resulted in the death of a motorcyclist. Julie Ann Vaughn pleaded innocent in a court appearance this week, said Deputy Canyon County Prosecutor Chuck Saar. The complaint alleges the girl drove her car into the path of a motorcycle driven by Roger Russo, 43, Nampa, early March 24 at a Nampa intersection. Russo, who was not wearing a helmet, was thrown from the cycle and died the next day of head injuries.

Court upholds drug conviction

BOISE (AP) — The drug conviction in an Idaho Falls case has been upheld by the Idaho Court of Appeals, although two of the three justices criticized the use of an "anticipatory" search warrant. Ronald Allen Wright entered a conditional guilty plea to possession of a controlled substance and received a suspended three-year sentence. He argued that a search warrant, issued in anticipation that he would return to Idaho Falls with a quantity of illegal drugs from Boise, was improper. The Court of Appeals on Thursday upheld the order denying suppression of evidence, although justices Donald Burnett and Roger Swanstrom both said an "anticipatory" warrant, before a crime was committed, was wrong. But the justices said a recent U.S. Supreme Court "good faith" ruling in such searches validates the evidence which was seized.

Idaho Falls competes for malt plant

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Idaho Falls is only one of several communities in three states competing for a \$50 million Anheuser-Busch barley malting plant, but city officials are getting everything lined up in case they land the economic development plum. Idaho Falls is competing with other cities in Idaho, Utah and Montana for a plant which would employ 44 people and have an annual payroll of about \$2 million. The environmental review record prepared for the project shows the plant's annual property taxes would be about \$1 million. The proposed Idaho Falls site is south of town on the Yellowstone highway. The environmental review is the latest step the city has taken to prepare for the plant. Since the review resulted in a finding of "no significant impact" on the environment, the city will not prepare a formal environmental impact statement, said City Planner Rod Gilchrist. The city has also requested a \$455,800 Idaho Community Development block grant for a water line to the plant site. Idaho Falls will not get the grant if Anheuser-Busch decides on another location.

Jury clears county of discrimination

LEWISTON (AP) — A jury has cleared Nez Perce County officials of sexual-discrimination charges in a lawsuit brought by the Idaho Human Rights Commission. The six-member jury, which included two women, found that the county did not fail to rehire Suzanne Maxon as a mow operator because of her sex. Maxon, then a student at Washington State University, worked in the summer of 1985 as a mow operator for the county. She tried to get the same job the next summer, but she was not hired because of her sex, the Idaho Human Rights Commission contended in the suit. The commission had sought lost wages for Maxon, \$1,000 in punitive damages, and a court order requiring the county to implement an equal-opportunity personnel policy.

Farmers' claims for wildlife damage begin

BOISE (AP) — The state of Idaho now is accepting claims from Idaho ranchers and farmers for damages caused by wildlife last winter. But state Auditor J.D. Williams, who will be auditing the claims for the Board of Examiners, acknowledges there are a lot of unanswered questions about the process. "The board will have to decide that," he said Thursday. The Legislature approved \$500,000 to pay for damage caused by marauding wildlife last winter. But some estimates put the damages much higher. Rep. JoAnn Wood, R-Rigby, who led the battle to get compensation for ranchers, said seven ranchers in the Howe area suffered \$210,000 damages. After two years of drought and a

hard winter, ranchers reported huge numbers of wild animals coming into their property and eating hay, using forage, destroying fences and damaging equipment. The Board of Examiners is made up of Gov. Cecil Andrus, Secretary of State Pete Conrath and Attorney General Jim Jones. Williams said about the first question the board will have to decide is how the claims will be paid, either on a first-come, first-paid basis or on a proportionate basis with all valid claims getting at least partial reimbursement. The legislation says only that claims for damage between July 1 and the end of 1988 will be paid before claims covering damage between Jan. 1 and June 1 of this year. Losses will be paid "to the extent possible," Williams said it's entirely possible that all the money will be used to pay 1988 claims, leaving nothing for 1989 claims. May 1, less than four weeks away, is the deadline for filing claims for 1988 damage. Claims for 1989 damage must be filed by June 1, Williams said. The forms were available for the first time Thursday, and Williams said Cephus already has sent out 14. The forms are based on paperwork used for tort claims against the state, he said. The forms warn that it is a felony to submit a false claim, and Williams said other state laws make it a crime to intentionally mislead the state auditor. * Each claim must present information on the circumstances of the loss and must include a notarized statement from "an impartial person" verifying the damage. Williams said he would consider forage part of crops and thus covered by the legislation. Williams acknowledged there's a possibility of neighbors collaborating to inflate claims but said, "We hope people will deal in good faith." Claims will be sent to the Fish and Game Department, and field officers will attempt to verify the damages. Williams said the process shouldn't take more than a week or 10 days. Then they will be presented to the Board of Examiners for payment. It may require a special meeting of the board, which normally meets just once a month, just before the State Land Board meeting.

Attorney: State distorted securities case

BOISE (AP) — The attorney for two California companies accused by the Idaho Finance Department of state securities violations claims Idaho officials have distorted the resolution of that case. "The Finance Department's publicity on the settlement was grossly inaccurate, obviously biased and apparently published for the purpose of self-aggrandizement," Attorney Jack Whitley charged. In a series of actions over the past several months, the department obtained court orders barring Wind River Mining Project of Antioch, Calif., Youngquist Mine Development of Garden Valley, Calif., and their principle officers from further violations of state securities laws. They were also ordered to pay a \$5,000 fine for past violations of laws requiring registration of securities and licensing of brokers. In the judgment, the companies and their officers neither admitted nor denied other department claims involving fraudulent practices. The charges centered on the companies offer to sell "dirt" from its Washington state mine, which they claimed contained 2 million ounces of gold; at discount prices for future delivery to the investors. Whitley said he advised the companies to settle the Idaho case in the stipulated agreement solely for financial reasons. A similar suit filed under California law was dismissed, he said, but only after the businessmen shelled out more than \$35,000 in outside attorneys fees. The department, in detailing the court judgment, said 4th District Judge Robert Rowett ordered the defendants to refund \$40,000 plus interest to seven Idaho investors in the scheme. But the actual court order, Whitley pointed out, said only that the Idaho investors must be offered a refund plus interest within three months. Whitley said those offers will be sent by certified mail in the next few days. "However," he added, "this is nothing new since my client's policy has always been to provide any unhappy purchaser with a refund."

Whitley said the mill at the Wind River mine has just been completed and will start processing ore soon with the some 1,400 investors outside Idaho beginning to receive their orders after that. With gold deliveries about to begin, Whitley claimed the state was intimidating Idaho investors to take the refund offer and lose the financial gain they possibly could have had just so department officials could "boast about how they saved their constituents."

HB362 (Judiciary, Rules and Administration) — Requires state and local governmental units to report to the Attorney General on the disposition of each child sexual abuse case they handle.

SB110 (Finance) — Allocates \$6.9 million for 1990 operations of the Idaho National Guard.

SB109 (Finance) — Allocates \$0.2 million for 1990 operations of the regulatory agencies system.

SB107 (Finance) — Allocates \$8.1 million for 1990 operations of the regulatory agencies system.

SB102 (Finance) — Allocates \$13,000 for 1990 operations of the state treasurer.

SB126 (Judiciary and Rules) — Allows friendly visit to state with a child abuse victim during evidentiary hearings.

SB126 (Judiciary and Rules) — Allows testing for AIDS without consent if the person is unconscious or unable to give consent.

SB125 (Judiciary and Rules) — Redefines residency for the purpose of indigent medical care.

SB119 (Agriculture) — Revamps the state's agricultural commodity tier law.

SB117 (Transportation) — Requires titles for off-road vehicles.

SB172 (Resources and Environment) — Prohibits dumping of marine sewage in Idaho waters.

SB162 (Human Resources) — Defines intoxication for the purpose of worker's compensation benefits.

SB145 (State Affairs) — Authorizes the state Land Board to sell the vacant governor's residence.

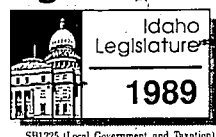
SB117 (Resources and Environment) — Allows combining of subdivided lands within an irrigation district for assessment purposes.

Legal system suffers from lengthy appeals

L. James Koutnik, the crusty Twin Falls radio raconteur who late in life wrangled an appointment to the Idaho Corrections Board, once said that the contact with the criminal justice system had caused him to change his mind about the death penalty in capital cases.

He used to think the penalty should be swift, sure and by a method befitting the killer's own act in taking the victim's life.

But, Koutnik said, he had changed his mind from watching the years of delay and long expenses which often result from death sentence appeals.

A death sentence in a capital case was so likely to drag on indefinitely that it made more sense, he thought, to give the defendant a life sentence in prison and be done with it.

We would guess that Koutnik's view reflects a broadly-held cynicism among many citizens who watch murder case after murder case move like slow molasses through trial, appeal, then back to the courts, then to appeal, and on and on.

No wonder politicians are sometimes moved to sarcasm, like former House Speaker T.W. Stivers who once said he opposed lethal injection as a form of execution because it was a "mere slap on the wrist."

The latest event which has brought these issues into focus again is the Idaho Supreme Court decision this week to uphold the death penalty for convicted Jeromá murderer Jaimi Charboneau.

Given the well-explored facts of this case, we think the court reached the right decision in upholding the legality of the death penalty. But we would have preferred it to go on and affirm Charboneau's sentence specifically.

Essentially, the court ruled, a judicial sentence, as opposed to one given by a jury, does not violate any of Charboneau's rights.

But the court nonetheless sent the case back to Fifth District Judge Philip Becker on other grounds: That means Charboneau will have to be sentenced again, although there is a good chance the outcome will be the same.

We are also pleased to see the newest court member, Justice Byron Johnson, join with the majority in upholding the sentence. Johnson, appointed last year by Gov. Cecil Andrus, was widely seen as giving a more "liberal" tilt to the court on issues like this one. But Johnson took the lead on this case, writing the majority opinion in the case.

No one wants to see defendants stripped of their rights to a fair trial; the American criminal justice system is the model for the civilized world in this regard.

But only the most callous can be unconcerned with the continuing twists and turns which cases like this take, in which appeals and the attorney costs mount.

In a case like this, in which Charboneau is being defended by appointed counsel, Greg Fuller and Jim Meservy, the costs fall directly on Jerome County property taxpayers, who can ill afford them.

It is a fair question, as Jerome County officials have implied, as to why Fuller and Meservy should be get public money in defense of an individual who many think should be executed forthwith. The logic of that is simply lost to many people.

The answer is that all citizens are entitled to a defense, regardless of their ability to pay. But is there no reasonable limit to this?

The taxpayers citizens of Jerome County did not choose to have Charboneau murder his victim in the county. Why should they bear the whole cost? Why should they, as one commissioner put it, be forced to pay for this case "until the bitter end"?

It is easy to dismiss such questions as mere public resentment for the inequity of life by which the vast majority who live decent and upstanding lives must pay the social costs of those who don't.

But when a case like Charboneau's drags on and on, the public's level of cynicism is surely going to rise, particularly when the citizen feels there is little he can do to change the situation.

The state has a responsibility, it seems to us, to both spread such cases along to their conclusions and to spread the costs.

Clearly, the criminal law must protect both the rights of the society and the rights of the defendant.

But when many people feel, rightly or wrongly, that the scale has been tipped in favor of one or the other, respect for and confidence in the law will inevitably diminish.

Fusion news has been exaggerated

Most of the news media seem to have uncritically swallowed the exciting news out of Utah about fusion on a table top.

In light of the laws of nature, it is probably worth putting the matter straight.

It is possible for two deuterium (heavy hydrogen) nuclei to undergo fusion with the release of a good chunk of energy, about a 50th of what is released in the more familiar nuclear fission. The sun gets its energy from similar processes.

To do so on Earth, on an economic scale, has been an objective of programs in most of the industrialized nations for many decades. But progress has been slow, the prospects for ultimate success uncertain and the programs costly.

The reason for the problems is that deuterium nuclei are electrically charged. They repel each other and heroic measures are necessary to bring them close enough to permit fusion. We mortals cannot change those facts; we can only strive to work through them.

Given the mysteries of quantum mechanics, however, there is always a certain level of fusion that occurs even with the ordinary deuterium molecule, which undergoes what is called spontaneous fusion every so often. The problem is that "every so often" means about once every X years, where X is a number so large, followed by 63 zeroes, that it is far, far longer than the age of the universe.

So there is no rule against "it" happening, but we shouldn't hold our collective breaths waiting. People have been seeking ways to speed up this so-called cold fusion process, and there have even been some good ideas that failed. It is not an empty dream.

Did the Utah team achieve cold fusion? No. Most scientists have responded to this question front the media with diffidence: We know so little. Of course we have learned to be cautious, but the answer in the case of the reports out of Utah should have been unambiguous, if only to cut off

the kind of wishful thinking with which the country is now awash.

"The fusion process produces energetic radiation (that's where the energy comes from), and half the time an energetic neutron (a familiar subatomic particle).

If the Utah scientists had really produced cold fusion at any substantial level, they would have been bathed in a deadly beam of neutrons that fried them to a crisp.

If they had produced as much as a watt of power through fusion, there would have been over a trillion neutrons per second, which would be lethal in a very short time.

That they lived to hold their press conference is clear and unambiguous proof that they did not produce any noticeable amount of power through cold fusion.

Why do we care? Because the provision of adequate energy sources for the future is a major responsibility of the scientific community, and it is not made easier when cheap and easy solutions to hard problems find their way into the body politic.

When the Department of Energy goes to the Congress for support for the real (and expensive) fusion program, they will have extra trouble because there will be those who really believe there are easy answers. There may be, but these are not the ones. Such distractions impair our will to attack the hard jobs. Of course we dream of breakthroughs, that's what dreams are for, but then we wake up.

Spontaneous fusion is possible. It happens naturally, though at an excruciatingly slow rate. It is not a new idea. Anything that can speed up that rate by about 10 factors of a million would be wonderful.

There was a great idea a couple of decades ago that the process could be speeded up by the necessary amount by using moons, another kind of

short-lived subatomic particle that can only be made in an accelerator (though muons are the prime ingredients of the cosmic rays that rain on us from the skies). That idea barely worked, and there are reputable people still trying to improve it.

What the moon does is to attract both of the deuterium nuclei and bring them together to distances less than a 100th of normal — and that makes a big difference.

There are technical reasons why it did not quite work, but the principle was sound. Anything short of bringing the nuclei much closer together won't work, and in particular, atomic processes such as embedding them in a metallic matrix don't even come close.

That isn't to say that it is impossible to speed up the spontaneous fusion process — the closer the nuclei, the faster it goes — but only that there is too far to go.

The media have confused the possibility of enhancing spontaneous fusion, which is real, with the possibility of enhancing it enough to provide sensible amounts of energy on a table top, which is not. This is not just a matter of factors of two, but of one followed by 60 or 70 zeroes.

Enhanced fusion per se shouldn't bother us, and should be hailed as a marvelous discovery and a beautiful demonstration of the laws of nature, provided the discovery stands the test of peer scrutiny.

Sufficiently enhanced cold fusion to make useful amounts of energy in ordinary matter, without the discovery of a new subatomic particle like the muon, would mean that all we know about the science of electrons, deuterons and solids is completely wrong, not just slightly wrong. Of course it could happen, but if I were a bookie, I would happily make book on that.

Congress starts amending S&L bailout bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congress, under the cloud of \$2.4 billion in fresh deposit withdrawals from the nation's savings and loan institutions, began amending President Bush's bailout bill Thursday.

Members immediately got into a dispute over reopening some of last year's deals that provided \$38 billion to the industry.

On a bipartisan vote, the House Banking subcommittee on financial institutions moved immediately to deny Bush some of the controls he had sought over officials running the government's deposit insurance program.

The subcommittee also amended Bush's proposal by transferring regulatory oversight of state-chartered but federally insured S&Ls from the Federal Home Loan Bank Board to the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp.

Bush in February proposed transferring authority over federally chartered thrifts from the Bank Board to the FDIC, which regulates commercial banks.

But the committee rejected an amendment by Democratic Rep. Richard Lehman to allow 31 of the nation's largest thrifts, many of them in his home state of California, to become banks and escape future insurance liability for the costs of the S&L bailout.

The panel also balked temporarily at an effort by Rep. Doug Barnard Jr., D-Ga., to prevent the government from recovering some of the billions of dollars in long-term aid it committed last year, to buyers of 179 insolvent thrifts.

Subcommittee members also questioned the leg-

itimacy of many of last year's bailouts, saying the bank board had committed billions of dollars. Congress had not authorized it to spend.

Banking Committee Chairman Henry B. Gonzalez, D-Texas, said some of those deals were with multimillionaires who put up little or none of their own money.

In one December transaction, government aid exceeded the nearly \$6 billion combined costs of the 1970s bailouts of New York City and the Lockheed Corp. and the 1980 bailout of Chrysler Corp., according to auditors.

Barnard, in the face of strong opposition, temporarily withdrew his amendment to prevent the government from seeking to recover from building companies some of the subsidies the FSLIC had promised to S&L purchasers.

Winning lottery ticket sold in Oregon

DES MOINES, Iowa (AP) — The winning ticket for the \$10 million Loto America jackpot was sold at a store in Scappoose, Ore. officials of the Multi-State Lottery Association said Thursday.

Sue Blust, Loto America drawing manager, said the winning ticket was sold at P&G Thriftway at Shunook Plaza in Scappoose. She said the holder of the winning ticket had not come forward.

The jackpot was the first claimed in Oregon since the game began in February 1988. Tickets also are sold in Iowa, Kansas, Missouri, Rhode Island, West Virginia and Washington, D.C.

The association, which operates the Iowa-based game, said a check of its computers disclosed that only one ticket matched all six numbers drawn Wednesday night: 2, 8, 16, 20, 42 and 52.

Tomsen to serve as envoy to rebels

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush, bowing to congressional pressure, has chosen Peter Tomsen as a special envoy to the Afghan rebels battling the Soviet-backed regime in Kabul, administration sources said Thursday.

Tomsen, the deputy chief of the U.S. Embassy in Beijing, has not formally been selected, but sources who spoke on condition they not be identified by name confirmed he was the choice of Bush and Secretary of State James A. Baker III.

The move stops short of offering formal recognition of the Afghan government-in-exile, but it is seen as a means of broadening U.S. influence among the long-feuding rebel factions and curbing Pakistan's clout.

Southern California sweating it out

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The mercury hit 100 and kept on going Thursday as Southern California sweated out the third day of a record heat wave that sent thousands to the beaches and demand for electricity soaring.

Downtown Los Angeles, which peaked at 105 degrees Wednesday, reached 100 by noon Thursday, breaking the date's record of 91 set in 1932 and tied in 1962. San Diego sweltered at 96, seven notches above the 1939 mark. Palm Springs reached 102.

High pressure over the West squished warm air out of the interior toward the coast, beating back sea breezes and turning even the usually balmy beaches into a furnace for thousands who rushed there instead of work.

Southern California Edison said power demand to run air conditioners would beat the April record of 14,282 megawatts, set Wednesday. The Los Angeles Department of Water and Power, the other big local supplier of electricity, projected an April record demand of 4,700 megawatts by 4 p.m.

Mob boss, 7 others draw life terms

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — A Common Pleas Court judge ruled Thursday that mob boss Nicodemo "Little Nicky" Scarfo and seven associates must be sentenced to life in prison instead of death for killing a gangster.

Judge Eugene Clarke took the decision away from the jury on grounds that prosecutors failed to show sufficient aggravating circumstances for a death sentence to be imposed.

Because only a jury can impose a death sentence, the eight men convicted in the 1985 slaying of Frank "Frankie Flowers" D'Alfonso will automatically be sentenced to life in prison.

Feds take over 38 savings firms

WASHINGTON (AP) — Federal regulators took over 38 more savings and loan associations in eight states Thursday, bringing the total under government control to 215 in 31 states.

The institutions — in California, Colorado, Iowa, Illinois, Kansas, Missouri, Mississippi and Texas — were the latest to be taken over in a program being administered by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp.

In announcing the latest takeovers, the FDIC emphasized that the institutions will remain open as usual.

Lawsuit settlement leaves town broke

HASTINGS, Fla. (AP) — This potato-farming community of about 600 is facing insolvency after being ordered to pay \$50,000 to settle a decade-old lawsuit by a pool-hall owner arrested for opening on a Sunday.

Town Attorney Winston Jacobo told the Town Council it has been ordered to pay by 4 p.m. Tuesday or the council members will be held in contempt of court.

Jacobo told council members they have about \$65,000 available but also have unrelated bills totaling \$31,000.

"If you vote to pay it the settlement, you vote to make the town insolvent," Jacobo said. "We don't have the money to pay."

Bush tentatively favors Shamir election plan

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush gave qualified support Thursday to Israeli Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir's idea for elections among Palestinian Arabs on the West Bank and Gaza. The president emphasized that Israel eventually must give up the occupied lands.

Bush said he told Shamir "we do not support an independent Palestinian state, nor Israeli sovereignty over or permanent occupation of the West Bank and Gaza," which Israel won in the 1967 Six-Day War.

By mentioning Israeli "sovereignty," Bush went a step beyond his statement Monday that Israel must end the "occupation" of the seized territory.

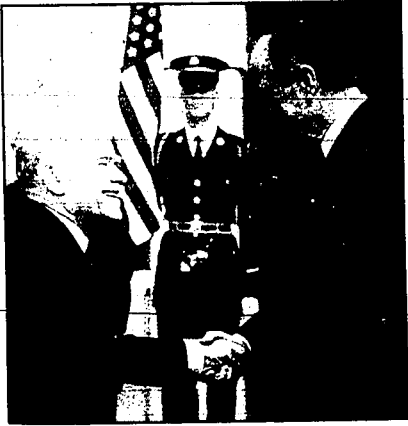
Bush, standing alongside Shamir and reporting on their talks, said he was confident an "acceptable formula" could be produced for holding elections in the West Bank and Gaza.

Shamir's election proposal is the centerpiece of his government's effort to resolve the conflict in the West Bank and Gaza, torn by more than 15 months of Palestinian revolt.

The election would determine the makeup of a Palestinian delegation to negotiate with Israel for "an interim period of self-governing administration," Shamir said. That would be followed by negotiations for a permanent agreement, he said.

Shamir's proposal is regarded as a potential opening rather than any breakthrough in the long search for Middle East peace.

"We're engaged in a step-by-step

process. This is a beginning of a process," said a senior U.S. official, briefing reporters on condition of anonymity.

After winding up their formal talks at the White House, Bush and Shamir met two hours later to visit the Air and Space Museum, the capital's most popular tourist attraction. Bush and Shamir joined with the crowds to view exhibits and to watch the film, "To Fly," a colorful account of aviation history.

On Monday, Bush had taken vis-

iting Egyptian President Hosni Mubarak to a baseball game.

The administration emphasized that Shamir's election proposal is far from any final form. "Everybody recognizes that more needs to be done in order to develop those principles and put more meat on the bones," said the senior U.S. official.

Shamir said Israel would need the cooperation of the Palestinians in devising the electoral process.

Statement indicates Bush involved as intermediary North says he followed orders

WASHINGTON (AP) — Oliver North firmly defended his Iran-Contra role Thursday from the witness stand at his criminal trial, declaring he was merely a Marine following White House orders. "I was not stepping in, I was brought in," he said.

North was stopped before he could respond to his lawyer's suggestion that then-President Reagan had designated him for the role. Asked directly who told him to secretly help the Nicaraguan rebels, North named former National Security Adviser Robert McFarlane. McFarlane's then-deputy, John Poindexter, and the late CIA Director William Casey.

North's testimony came shortly after his lawyers read the jury a lengthy statement — agreed to by prosecutors — that said George Bush had played a role as intermediary in Reagan's secret effort to aid the Nicaraguan rebels after Congress banned official U.S. help.

As "rupture" developments replaced the sometimes-languid pace of the trial, now in its seventh week, the jury heard that Bush personally told the president of Honduras in 1985 that extra aid was being funneled to his country. In earlier testi-

mony, McFarlane had said that the aid was part of a secret agreement calling for Honduras to help the Contras.

At the White House, press secretary Marlif Fitzwater said, "We can't say anything. It would be a part of the case."

North, who faces 12 felony charges including lying or misleading Congress and then-Attorney General Edwin Meese III about his efforts to help the Contras, testified that he had been ordered by his superiors to keep silent about his role in keeping the rebels going after the cutoff of official aid.

"I was told not to tell anybody," North said. "I was particularly admonished" to keep secret "that another country was providing millions of dollars to help the Contras."

That was an apparent reference to Saudi Arabia, which supplied some \$32 million in aid to the Contras, beginning in mid-1984.

North described himself as an order-obeying Marine who had planned to return to Camp Lejeune to command a battalion when top officials in the Reagan administration enlisted him to run the secret Contra

operation in 1984. "Was there a time when you were stepping in" to help the Contras? asked North lawyer Brendan Sullivan.

"I was not stepping in; I was brought in," North replied.

Sullivan asked whether North "understood" that Reagan had designated him as the Contras' new provider. Prosecutor John Kecker objected; U.S. District Judge Gerhard A. Gesell sustained the objection and North didn't answer.

On point after point, North said he had permission of superiors. For Project Democracy as the help to the Contras was known, he said he had the approval of McFarlane, Poindexter and Casey. The orders to keep secret the contributions from other countries came from the president, Casey and McFarlane, he said.

"I never made a single trip down there or a single contact," North said of his frequent visits to Central America, "without the permission, the express permission, of Admiral Poindexter or McFarlane or usually without the concurrence of Director Casey."

Abortion advocates converge for Washington demonstration

WASHINGTON (AP) — With the Bush administration pushing the Supreme Court to overturn its landmark abortion decision, abortion rights advocates are converging on the nation's capital this weekend for what they expect will be their largest demonstration.

They believe the stakes are higher than any time since the court's 1973 decision legalizing abortion and are determined to pick up the gauntlet Bush has thrown down.

"We have been silent far too long," said Kate Michelman, executive director of the National Abortion Rights Action League.

Tens of thousands of students from 500 college campuses are coming, mothers are bringing their daughters and granddaughters, a delegation from Capitol Hill will be there and dozens of celebrities are flying in from Hollywood for the Sunday march, organizers say.

The goal is to make the weekend a turning point in the national abortion debate. Organizers feel that anti-abortion advocates have so far

carried the day by focusing the question on when life begins. Instead, they feel the issue is whether the government should intervene in what they believe should be a private decision.

"Nobody likes abortion. It's a difficult choice and there are a lot of issues that women have to weigh when faced with a crisis pregnancy," Michelman said. "Women don't have abortions they want, they have abortions they need."

Organizers are reluctant to predict how many will turn out for the demonstration, but they expect the number will be far larger than the 90,000 who gathered for a March 1986 pro-abortion rally in Washington.

At least one anti-abortion group plans to mount a counterdemonstration of up to 300 people on the day of the march.

The engine revving the weekend's events is the Supreme Court and its pending decision on a Missouri case that could reverse or severely limit the high court's 1973 Roe vs. Wade

decision that legalized abortion. Oral arguments in the case are scheduled for later this month.

The Reagan administration also pushed to overturn Roe vs. Wade and failed. But since the issue last came before the court, two new justices have been seated and Justice Lewis Powell, a key defender of the 1973 decision, has retired.

Of the newcomers, Justice Anthony Scalia is thought to favor overturning or curtailing the decision. Justice Antonin Kennedy's views on the ruling are not known, but some observers think there may now be a one-vote majority for changing the law.

"Women have felt abortion always would be legal, but now that it's clear there's a clear and present danger, they're responding," said Eleanor Smeal, president of the Fund for the Feminist Majority.

The message of the march is directed at the nine justices who will decide the case, and who organizers say are not immune to public opinion.

Marcos charges suspended

NEW YORK (AP) — Federal prosecutors agreed Thursday to temporarily sever former Philippine President Ferdinand E. Marcos from a racketeering case because he is too ill to stand trial for the foreseeable future.

In a letter to the judge presiding over the case against the deposed ruler, his wife and several co-defendants, prosecutors acknowledged that Marcos's health has deteriorated since a medical examination by a government doctor last fall.

Based upon Mr. Marcos' repeated bouts of pneumonia and his susceptibility to other infections since January 1985, the government is no longer able to represent to the court that Mr. Marcos is now able to stand trial, Assistant U.S. Attorney Debra Livingston wrote U.S. District Judge John F. Keenan.

Marcos, 71, is in guarded condition in Hawaii at St. Francis Medical Center, where he has been confined

since Jan. 15 for treatment of heart and respiratory problems.

The government's action does not mean it is dropping the case against Marcos, only that the case against his wife, Imelda, and others will go forward without him for now.

Ms. Livingston's letter asked the judge to place the charges against Marcos "in suspense," in case Marcos recovers and the government seeks to reinstate his case with the others.

Marcos was examined during the weekend by Francis Weld, a court-appointed physician from New York, who examined Marcos last October and determined that he was fit to travel to New York.

But according to Ms. Livingston's letter, after his latest examination Weld "has concluded that Marcos' recent infections since his latest hospitalization have resulted in a deterioration in his overall health."

Grant helps vets with treatment

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) — Until now, the federal veterans who came here to be treated for post-traumatic stress disorder were likely to encounter another kind of stress — figuring out how to pay for living expenses during their seven-week stay.

That's about to change.

The Mid-Rio Grande chapter of the American Red Cross has been awarded more than \$100,000 to help veterans and their families from New Mexico, Arizona and parts of Texas pay rent and food costs while they are treated at an outpatient clinic at the Veterans Administration Medical Center here.

The Red Cross hopes to serve about 70 veterans and their families during the one-year project, said Margorie Waters, the Red Cross chapter's administrator of emergency services and disaster programs.

"I want it to be the tip of the iceberg kind of thing, where it could be increased," said Mrs. Waters, who hopes the grant will be renewed.

"We can reach them and help them into this treatment program that they would not be able to take part in if they had to worry about paying the rent or that basic kind of thing," she said.

Botha says he'll leave post

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — President P.W. Botha, South Africa's strong-willed leader since 1978, on Thursday announced his intention to retire after elections to be held by September.

His party had made clear it wanted a new president.

Botha, whose grip on power began to loosen after a stroke in January, told Parliament that an early general election will be held on an unspecified date within the next five months.

Botha, 73, did not state explicitly that he would retire, but he said the outgoing president would hand over the official seal to a new president following the elections.

The new president is expected to be Education Minister F.W. de Klerk, who succeeded Botha as leader of the National Party on Feb. 2. Many Nationalists view de Klerk as more flexible than Botha and more capable of breaking the country's black-white political stalemate.

Botha has presided over the country's worst racial unrest and deepest international isolation but also its most ambitious race reforms and foreign policy initiatives, including plans for the independence of Namibia.

Botha said he would dissolve Parliament in May and then set a date for the election. The voting is expected to take place between July 24 and Sept. 6.

Solidarity ban to end promptly

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — A government minister said Thursday the seven-year ban on Solidarity would be lifted immediately, and Lech Walesa urged supporters to put their "political victory" into action by organizing nationwide.

"The process of legalization of Solidarity should be completed between April 15 and April 20," said Sports Minister Aleksander Kwasniewski, a chief negotiator for the communist government in two months of talks with the opposition that concluded Wednesday in a broad accord.

Kwasniewski said the Sejm, or parliament, would meet Friday to enact the agreements on trade union freedoms, economic reforms and political changes, including creation of the first freely elected legislative body in the East bloc.

Walesa, looking relaxed at a news conference after a grueling week of negotiations, outlined the tasks his independent trade union faces. But he warned the agreement could lead to disaster if Poland failed to take advantage of the changes.

"The most important task for today is to write applications immediately all over the country to provincial governors and city mayors so we get the technical possibility to organize as soon as possible," Walesa said.

The agreement allows Solidarity to organize on a national, regional and local level.

Walesa appeared unconcerned by the apparent lack of reaction by Poles to the restoration of the Soviet bloc's first independent trade union, which claimed 10 million members and ignited that nation's spirit during its 16-month legal existence before being crushed under martial law in December 1981.

Independence strikers' goal

MOSCOW (AP) — Scores of Georgian nationalists demanding independence for their southern republic are on a hunger strike in front of government buildings in the capital of Tbilisi, an activist said Thursday. Giorgi Chanturia, chairman of a group calling itself the National Democratic Party of Georgia, said in a telephone interview that 158 Georgians began a hunger strike Tuesday and plan to continue it until April 14, the anniversary of a demonstration for ethnic rights in 1978.

Chanturia said the fast had been scheduled to begin April 14, but started early because nationalist leaders feared ethnic tensions would give the authorities an excuse to impose a curfew and martial law.

Overlooked provision could allow other inmates to challenge death sentences

Charboneau ruling invites appeals

JEROME - Though the Idaho Supreme Court has upheld the death penalty in a Jerome County decision, one part of that decision could bring on an onslaught of requests for new sentencing hearings for Idaho's death-row inmates.

"Except for a few people, I think most of them are in a position because of the Supreme Court's ruling to request a resentencing, and they will get it," said Greg Fuller, lawyer for convicted Jerome-murderer Jaime Charboneau.

The five justices ruled unanimously Tuesday that a procedure many district judges used to decide death sentences was improper. This key part of the decision - overlooked in initial reports - took up a mere two pages in a 77-page decision.

The decision upheld Charboneau's murder conviction but ordered another sentencing hearing for him. Charboneau, 49, was convicted in 1985 of murdering his ex-wife,

Marilyn Arbaugh of Jerome.

The decision's impact could be costly and time-consuming, says Lynn Thomas, Idaho's solicitor general. He said each death-row inmate could petition for another sentencing hearing at the District Court level, starting over the appeals process.

"I'm sure they will," Thomas said. "If they did it, it would be a very lengthy process. It could add on years to each case."

The ruling revolves around a missing "s" and the use of the word "any" in a statute. Judges are required to weigh the bad and good factors of a crime and a criminal before deciding on a death sentence. In legal parlance, the factors are called "aggravating" and "mitigating" factors.

After conducting a limited study, Fuller contended that nine of 15 death-penalty sentences were decided improperly. He argued, and the court agreed, that the judge must weigh all the good factors together against each bad factor alone before deciding whether to sentence a "murderer" to death.

In the nine decisions Fuller says were wrong, the sentencing judge apparently weighed all the bad factors against all the good factors.

Fourteen convicted murderers are on death row in Idaho, a state that hasn't executed a murderer since the 1950s.

Thomas is frustrated at what he calls an attempt by the courts to cripple the state's death penalty statute - a law he drafted.

"If you wanted to undermine the death penalty, that's the way you would do it," Thomas said. "You wouldn't admit to the public that you are trying to wipe out the death penalty in Idaho. You would simply find little things wrong in each case."

Fuller responded: "I cannot in any way believe that Lynn can criticize the interpretation of the very words he drafted when they have no other meaning. That is the most ludicrous thing I can imagine."

The judges, Thomas said, have "come out with what looks like a major action to uphold and further the aims of the state sentencing law, but at the same time they

throw in this new hook. You can't lay the responsibility for that at the doorstep of anybody but the courts."

But exactly how new sentencing hearings will proceed is up in the air. Fuller said he's uncertain whether witnesses from long ago will have to testify again or whether judges can simply rely on evidence already presented.

What he is certain about is that he simply uncovered an oversight.

"I've been working on Charboneau for two years, and I didn't see it until the very end," he said.

Thomas, meanwhile, said he's considering appealing the decision. He also wants a change in the judiciary.

"You can't lay the responsibility for that at the doorstep of anybody but the courts," he said.

Fuller contends the law needs to be changed.

"It must be changed by the Legislature, and soon," he said. "As it's happening right now, we're having chaos. We simply cannot tolerate chaos."

Blass, husband file under Chapter 11

The Blasses filed their request this week under Chapter 11 of the bankruptcy code - meaning they are unable to pay their debts but would like to over time.

The first creditors' meeting is scheduled for 1 p.m. May 8 at the Jerome County Courthouse.

The Blasses are directors of Hawkins Co. Ltd., a Filer bean warehouse that was seized by the state. Dec. 8. A final inventory found the warehouse's inventory 37 percent short.

The Blasses are the second of three couples who are directors of the troubled warehouse to file for bankruptcy. Jerry A. and Jeraline Hawkins filed Feb. 10, according to the bankruptcy court.

Jerry Hawkins also managed the warehouse.

The loss of funds killed the marketing deal and hindered any chances for expansion, which was essential to repaying the bank loan, he said.

The testimony came during the second and third day of a trial in which Idaho First is suing Bliss Valley, claiming it defaulted on loan payments. Bliss Valley filed a counterclaim, contending the bank forced the farm out of business.

Erkins was on the witness stand for two full days of testimony. Idaho First attorney Walt Bithell is expected to cross-examine Erkins today.

Erkins also told jurors that despite keeping all interest and principle payments current in 1985, Idaho First sent a letter stating the loan to the farm was in default.

Idaho First said it foreclosed on Bliss Valley because the farm did not keep a working capital balance of \$750,000. Erkins said, "We were not maintaining the bal-

City official says outlook promising

In the first quarter this year, the city's economic development office received inquiries from 20 companies. And at least eight businesses are serious about opening or expanding here, said Davo McAlindin, the city's economic development director.

"I have been really pleased with the activity," he said.

An unnamed plastic-injection-molding company is negotiating to buy the Van Auker Building in the city's industrial park.

And a custom seat-covering company is negotiating to lease the Scott/Polar Building.

Other businesses giving serious looks to the city are an onion processing company, a California-based Mexican foods company, a small mining-equipment manufacturer and the ZCMI retail chain.

Chevron aids Hansen cleanup

HANSEN - Across the sea of foot-deep mud that was once her lawn, Marty Arnold gazed toward her gazebo - likely ruined - an island in the muck.

From the back porch came the scratch and splash sound of day laborers scooping up a slimy layer of mud. Inside rose the faint smell of soggy upholstery and water-logged wood.

Her words moments later: "Everyone at Chevron has been lovely and cooperative."

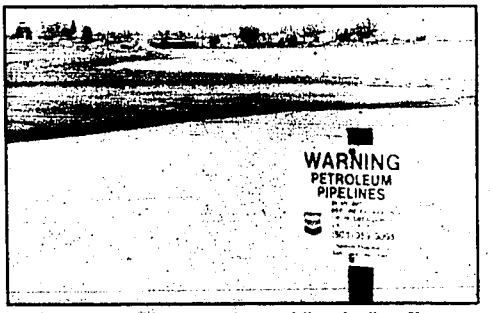
Chevron Pipeline Co. isn't admitting responsibility for the Wednesday morning flood that covered a Hansen neighborhood with as much as eight feet of water.

But the company has promised that everything ruined by the flood will be repaired or replaced. Chevron has hired cleaning companies and an insurance adjuster. It's offered motel rooms, restaurant meals and moved in portable out-houses to flood homes.

"It's much cheaper to resolve it this way than in a lawsuit," said Chris Sorensen, supervisor of Chevron's Boise district.

The company is also thinking of the public relations disaster faced by Exxon Shipping Co. That company has been criticized not only for a 10-million-gallon oil spill in Prince William Sound, but for failing to begin an immediate cleanup.

"We're trying to be the opposite,"

Sorensen said. "If anyone has a problem we want to hear about it. Typically, when you hear people screaming they get no respect it's when they think nobody is listening."

Once the residents of the southeast Hansen neighborhood are living in their homes again, Chevron attorneys will be working on the details of who's at fault and who ultimately picks up the bill.

Water apparently seeped along a recently replaced Chevron pipeline crossing

under an irrigation canal a mile southeast of town. The wet bank collapsed, releasing waves of water to roll toward the neighborhood.

Chevron officials are telling area residents that the work was done to canal company specifications and that engineers tested completion of the replaced canal banks. Twin Falls Canal Co. officials are not commenting and weren't helping with the cleanup Thursday.

New safety director to tackle familiar problems

TWIN FALLS - Having bagged a bear with bow and arrow on his first bow hunt last year, the city's new public safety director does not shy away from new challenges.

"Paul Du Fresno (pronounced doo-FRANE), 41, of Gladstone, Mich., said he is enthusiastic about the prospect of taking over a public safety department that is seven times the size of the one he has guided the past five years.

Gladstone, a town of 4,500 in northern Michigan, employs a full-time staff of 14 officers cross-trained as police and firefighters. Twin Falls employs 92 in its fire and police divisions.

Wayne Hickla, police chief of Escanaba, a town near Gladstone, said Du Fresno has a good understanding of

management practices and should have no problem making the transition to a larger department.

"He took a very backward department that hadn't kept up with the times and brought it to one that is pretty up-to-date," Hickla said.

He said Du Fresno is articulate and knowledgeable.

"He's contributed a great deal to a number of joint inter-agency efforts," Hickla said.

One of the biggest challenges facing Du Fresno, as well as all other city department heads, will be maintaining and improving services with shrinking revenue, City Manager Tom Courtney has said.

Du Fresno has learned to tap state and federal government funding sources for special programs and equipment, Courtney said.

"Out of necessity, I had to develop skills along those lines," he said.

In one case, Du Fresno was influential in setting up a six-county drug-enforcement task force which qualified for federal grant money for four years, longer than any similarly funded federal project in Michigan, he said.

When he comes to Twin Falls, Du Fresno said, he will develop ties with state and federal officials, that could lead to grant money. With that groundwork done, Twin Falls will be first in line for getting funding as new programs are introduced, Du Fresno said.

Maintaining services while revenue falls to keep pace with inflation has required innovative leadership from Du Fresno, said Gladstone City Manager Howard Keeton. Keeton said in Du Fresno, Gladstone had a better director than small towns typically are able to get.

"I think he'll have a better opportunity to use his skills in a larger place," Keeton said. "He'll do a good job in

Research causes fusion frenzy

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Announcement last month that University of Utah researchers had produced nuclear fusion has triggered worldwide efforts to confirm their findings and seal the price of palladium — a key metal used on the experiment — soaring.

For example, Thursday's edition of the British journal Nature lists numerous laboratories in the United States that are trying to duplicate the findings of U of U chemistry professor B. Stanley Pons and a British colleague, Martin Fleischmann of the University of Southampton.

On Thursday, researchers from one of those labs — Los Alamos National Laboratory — met with Pons to discuss his research, the Desert News reported.

Pons and Fleischmann announced March 23 they had achieved controlled nuclear fusion — the power source of the sun and the hydrogen bomb — in a simple table-top experiment conceived during a hike in the mountains and first tested in Pons' own kitchen.

Meanwhile, palladium, tiny rods of which were used in the experiment, has been generating interest of its own on the commodities market, where it had risen well above the \$160 per troy ounce level by mid-week, up \$1.50 in Wednesday's trading alone.

Nature also noted that efforts to confirm the Pons-Fleischmann experiment extended beyond American borders.

Professor Noboru Koyama of the

Tokyo University of Agriculture and Chemistry will try to duplicate the experiment with the Japan Atomic Energy Research Institute, the journal reported.

British teams from the University of Birmingham and the Rutherford Appleton Laboratory and the UK Atomic Energy Authority at Harwell also are trying to duplicate it.

Two Hungarian scientists claim to have obtained the same results as Fleischmann and Pons, but no details of their experiment are available.

In Italy, the Ettore Majorana Centre for Scientific Culture has announced a world conference for April 12 in Eric 'to discuss the cold-fusion experiment' being held in Italy.

Several European countries, the Soviet Union and the United States are reportedly about to launch a 10-year, \$1 billion project to study the viability of fusion by inertial confinement using X-ray lasers.

Closer to home, Utah legislators will meet Friday in special session to consider allocating \$5 million to develop and commercialize fusion research.

However, a memo from the State Board of Regents asking for the appropriation stresses that the funds be used only upon scientific confirmation of the initial findings.

Gov. Norm Bangert's calling of the special session is not without its critics. The Tax Limitation Coalition of Utah feels the session is premature, and should await publication of the research.

Indeed, the U of U has been criticized itself for appearing to have rushed the purported breakthrough before reporters at a news conference prior to its publication in scientific publications. Nature's editors and others have said the approach was unorthodox.

Nature reportedly is considering publishing the findings. However, at least one publication will detail the research, school officials say, noting that Journal of Electroanalytical Chemistry has it scheduled for its May edition.

U of U President Chase Peterson defends the decision to announce the fusion findings at the March 23 news conference, saying school officials decided on that tact to avoid the leak of inaccurate information and to protect foreign patent rights.

However, on Wednesday, Pons told academic audiences in Indiana that normal scientific reporting channels were avoided partly due to fear that other scientists might be injured from accidental explosions while trying to duplicate the experiment.

He said that in at least one experiment, the heat produced by the experiment threatened to 'run away' — a term used to describe an uncontrollable reaction.

Pons also said in their excitement, he and Fleischmann have "talked too much," and because of the heat was so simple, people were beginning to attempt it without being aware of its dangers.

Father: Church, schools ignore problems

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Public schools and Utah's predominant Mormon Church too often ignore the seriousness of teen-age drug abuse in the state, the father of a teen-age alcoholic has told a citizens' task force.

Both the father and his 16-year-old son testified before the Utah Citizens Council on Alcoholic Beverage Control on condition they not be identified.

At a Wednesday meeting of the council, the two stood together, telling how their "model family" in a model community" was torn apart by the son's addiction while school and church officials looked the other way.

"I'm \$30,000 in debt and I have absolutely no idea how I'm going to pay that off," said the father, a former teacher in his 40s and now a businessman.

The son, who he started abusing drugs at age 12 and turned to crime to support his habit, is undergoing costly rehabilitation.

"If he slips, I don't know what I'm going to do," the father said. "I don't have the resources to put him back in."

The father, identifying himself as a member of the high-priest quorum in his Mormon stake, said his church turned a deaf ear when he sought help.

"They would cringe when I started to talk about problems at home," he said. "They didn't want to hear it."

The high expectations of Mormon families and social pressures in Utah aggravated the problem, he said.

"I was heavily into denial (at first)," the father said. "I live in Zion. Why shouldn't my home be happy and free of problems?"

He also blamed schools for perpetuating drug and alcohol abuse by ignoring it, and both father and son

said "getting high" in school is routine.

"There are drug deals in the classroom and kids are getting high in the halls," the father said.

He said teachers are to blame. "Until you get people who care about the scumballs in the world, the problem will continue and it will get worse," the father added.

The son said some of his teachers knew he was high and did nothing. They didn't care, he said, as long as he was on time and didn't disrupt the class.

He said he had little problem buying alcohol, even from state-run liquor stores, where he used false identification.

The son said he got into the wrong crowd at school and started on drugs to be accepted. Soon, he turned to stealing from his family, friends and strangers, selling items as large as stolen motorcycles.

Symms wants EPA, Potato Council to meet

WASHINGTON (AP) — In an effort to ease recent tensions, Sen. Steve Symms, R-Idaho, said he has asked Environmental Protection Agency Administrator William K. Reilly to meet with representatives of the National Potato Council.

"As you know, the performance of the Environmental Protection Agency on recent issues affecting the agricultural sector has been less than sterling," Symms said in a letter to Reilly on Wednesday. "An opportunity is coming up for you to recover some of the agency's lost good-will."

The potato industry was rocked recently by a story leaked to The New York Times based on new research methodology indicating a possible health hazard to infants and children from eating potatoes or bananas treated with the systemic insecticide aldicarb.

About a week earlier, the Natural Resources Defense Council raised questions about the use of the chemical Alar on apples. The EPA was criticized for not providing clear direction to growers on the chemical's use. "The EPA is raising havoc in the farm community. Leaks, innuendoes, half-truths and lack of leadership have caused panic in consumers and confusion in the industry," Symms said in a news release Thursday. "I hope Bill Reilly takes my advice and meets with the Potato Council."

Members of the council will be in Washington, D.C., next Wednesday to discuss a number of issues with members of Congress and the Bush administration. Symms said one of their highest priorities will be to meet with Reilly.

Panel OKs more INEL project funds

WASHINGTON (AP) — A House subcommittee has approved increased funding for two research programs at Idaho's National Engineering Laboratory.

Rep. Richard Stallings, D-Idaho, said the subcommittee on energy research and development approved an extra \$20 million to Argonne National Laboratory for continued work on its Integral Fast Reactor program.

The Department of Energy requested \$6.1 million but Stallings said that would have brought the project's major research to a halt.

The committee also approved an amendment for \$5 million for a national engineering research initiative.

Stallings said an association of universities, national laboratories and industry has been established to help the country better meet its in-

dustrial competitiveness and technology transfer needs.

"The recent public debate over new weapons projects, including the SIS and NPR projects, has included a call for more non-defense activities at INEL," he said. "I have heard that message and believe that the Idaho laboratory must maintain a diverse and balanced mix of research and development activities."

Flood

Local sentiment seems to be with Chevron. Ellis Arnold, Marty's husband, said he couldn't see how Chevron could be faulted for following canal company instructions.

Most of the landowners with flooded homes have not talked to a lawyer. They'll wait to see what kind of an offer Chevron makes before considering legal action, several said. The battle may come over whether houses are replaced, said Ellis Arnold, who questioned whether his house was salvageable based on his background in the construction business.

"I think they're (Chevron) honest," he said. "I think they're making a good effort. I know they've got to protect themselves. But I've spent a lifetime buying that house." "I say take a bulldozer and be done with it," said Lee Radmull, 78, who's lived in her house for 38 years. "Nothing is salvageable. It stinks and it's never going to be livable."

Zoe Ann Ramsey, who's in the business of cleaning up flooded houses as co-owner of Service Cleaners, was also skeptical about whether the

houses could be refurbished. "We'll hose out the houses and deodorize them. Then we'll see if they are salvageable. If it were my home, I would want it bulldozed."

But claims adjuster Glead Hirshi said he hadn't seen anything yet to indicate that houses couldn't be repaired.

Work would be extensive. Warped floors would have to be ripped out and walls filled with soggy insulation replaced. However, the ground probably was not wet long enough to allow the houses to settle and damage foundations, he said.

The final decisions on replacing homes and mobile homes may rest upon whether repairing them would cost more than their market value, he said. Most of the seven damaged homes are small.

The flood's mayhem also meant backed-up sewage lines across town, ruined cars and a motorhome, damaged lawns at otherwise undamaged homes, topsail washed from fields and the temporary closure of the South Hill school.

In the lowest houses in the neighborhood, lifetime accumulations of

possessions were destroyed as water filled basements and then climbed as high as four feet up first-story walls. The Raymond Higgins family spent Thursday inventorying their house — bottle of hand lotion by tube of lipstick — for the insurance adjuster.

Sorenson predicts that the homeowners may come out ahead when the company has made good its promise to put their homes back in order. New carpets would be laid in repaired houses and appliances with silt-clogged motors will be replaced.

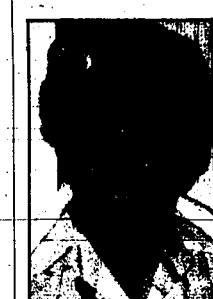
"That's not much consolation to Jeanne Fisher, who lost family genealogy records and books that once belonged to her mother.

For Marty Ellis, the flood will leave its mark with damaged family photos and the sight of a beloved Akita washed up from a pet cemetery she keeps.

Karla Higgins, eight months pregnant, found the handmade crib quilts and other baby items she had collected soaked with oil from the furnace.

"We're pretty much numb," said Darlene Higgins. "You kind of have a smile or cry. There's just no darn thing you can do about it."

In addition, a national retail chain is looking at the area, and Caldwell Development Corp. is considering opening a retail mini-mall on Blue Lakes Boulevard, McAllister said.

The expansions include Universal Frozen Foods and Independent Meat. Universal's proposed expansion of its frozen potato product production

is awaiting mid-April approval by the company's board of directors. If approved, it will mean a bigger economic boom to the area than Spears Manufacturing's reopening of the Tupperware plant, McAllister said.

Independent Meat, recently received approval for a Community Development Block Grant to pay for a hook-up to the city's water system.

Its present water source is a well. With the increased water capacity, the meat packer plans to expand with new products and as many as 20 additional workers, he said.

Of the 20 first-quarter inquiries, three were retail, three were service, five were manufacturing and nine were agriculture-related.

Erkins said. "That was the criteria for default."

Bliss Valley attorney Sydelite Pittas asked Erkins if the interest and principal payments had been kept current. Erkins said they were current to the best of his knowledge.

The foreclosure letter came after several failed attempts to draw on its line of credit for the second phase of the farm project, Erkins said.

The expansion was crucial because it would have added 12 additional growing rooms for the exotic oyster mushrooms, bringing the total growing space to 40,000 square feet, Erkins said. "We needed 40,000 square feet of growing room to pay off the loan," he testified.

The expansion was part of the original business plan submitted to the bank for the loan, he said.

Erkins said the bank refused a request in June 1985 for expansion funds. "We were told that we would not receive any additional money over and beyond basic needs-like payroll and operating expenses," Erkins said.

Erkins also told the jury the bank

refused funds for a marketing deal the farm had with a major food distributor.

"We had already been approved by a major food chain to be in their distribution of the entire U.S.," Erkins said.

The breakdown of the deal had a "chilling effect" on the farm's incentive to produce mushrooms, Erkins said.

Erkins also said that he and Thomas Walker, the other major partner in the farm, had personally paid interest payment to the bank in 1985. Erkins said that he had personally loaned about \$550,000 to the project.

Filer agrees to lease city water

"I will be happy to omit names," he said.
A Department of Corrections study presented to the Legislature this year showed adults convicted of sex crimes against children served an average of 20 months in jail, but adults convicted of raping adults served an average of nearly five years.
Jones said the Legislature's failure

to approve mandatory minimum sentences for child molesters was one disappointment in what was otherwise a good session for his proposals.
The main sticking point with legislators, he said, was that mandatory minimum sentences would put further stress on already crowded prison corridors. He added that mandatory sentencing could mean that other criminals would get an earlier release than desired.

That's not an ideal situation, but the gravity of the situation requires that," Jones said.
Earlier this week, 1st District Judge James Judd slapped a Spokane man with a 20-year prison term for sexual molestation of young girls. But he added a 180-day rider, giving him the right to grant probation to Roger Pelletier, 40, after evaluation.

Spokane activists ease stance

SPOKANE (AP) — Spokane citizen groups on Thursday agreed to drop their challenge to a planned Boeing plant in exchange for a promise of additional environmental information and a public forum.

The four groups had asked Spokane County to require a full environmental impact statement on construction of the planned fabrication plant, an action that angered some public officials and business groups. The county had earlier refused the \$20 million project and its 350 jobs.

Under the agreement reached Thursday, the Seattle-based aerospace company agreed to publish additional information on emissions of air pollutants and to hold a public forum, tentatively scheduled for early May.

In exchange, the groups agreed to withdraw their March 21 environmental appeals of a county building

department decision that an impact statement was not necessary for the project.

It is important to Boeing that all Spokane citizens have an opportunity to discuss their concerns with us," said Phil Kelly, project manager for Boeing's Spokane operations.

"We've got answers to a lot of our questions, and they're going to give us answers to more as they develop them," said Carl Messer, chairman of Citizens for Clean Air.
"Our beef never has been with Boeing," he said. "Our problem was with the county tried to slip this thing through without public information."
Messer denied the compromise was reached because of criticism by government and business leaders.

The planned plant west of Spokane will manufacture fiberglass ducts and plastic floor panels for Boeing airplanes.

Leaders of the four citizens groups said they did not oppose Boeing's location, but had concerns about potential air pollution and other problems stemming from chemicals used in the manufacturing process.

"It became apparent that Boeing was forthcoming, frank and candid in addressing our concerns," representatives of the citizens groups said in a news release. "It was also clear that a great deal of planning and forethought had been devoted to addressing potential environmental impacts."

Spokane attorney Dennis Clayton acted as a neutral third party in resolving the dispute.

Kraft plans to phase out cheese plant

POCATELLO (AP) — Kraft Foods has announced it will phase out its Pocatello bulk cheese processing plant, eliminating between 400 and 500 jobs in the southeastern Idaho city.

Company officials said Thursday afternoon that certain production lines would be phased out starting later this month, with complete shutdown planned by October of 1990.

Chuck Woolley, Kraft vice president of production, said at a news conference that the company would offer employees jobs at its future, Chief plant, as well as relocation benefits, if they want to transfer. Those choosing not to transfer will receive separation benefits, Woolley said.

Kraft, based in Glenview, Ill., has operated the Pocatello plant for 11

years and currently is completing a \$400,000 wastewater treatment upgrade. Sen. Steve Symms, R-Idaho, said company officials assured him Tuesday that they would complete the upgrade before vacating the facility.

Symms said he contacted Orson Swindle, director of the Economic Development Administration, which will work to ease the impact.

Asbestos removal scaled down

BOISE (AP) — The \$1,259,000 worth of asbestos removal projects at state buildings planned for this year will be scaled down to \$1 million, because that's how much the Idaho Legislature appropriated.

The Permanent Building Fund Council on Thursday approved a \$1 million state of projects, \$259,000 less than the board recommended to the Legislature.

Public Works Director Anne G. Barker told the council some projects were deleted because they cannot be

partially funded or are not ready to proceed. She said the staff also took into consideration the expense of workers in buildings where there is an asbestos problem.

Asbestos has been determined to be a cancer-causing substance. It was commonly used for years as an insulating material. The state is removing asbestos from its buildings.

Projects which will be funded in the state fiscal year starting July 1 include Boise State University, various buildings, \$50,000; Idaho State

University, heating plant, \$150,000; University of Idaho, power plant, \$417,800; Lewis Clark State College, day care-education building, \$22,000; North Idaho College, \$10,000 for survey of abatement needs and State Laboratory, pipes, \$47,000.

Also, Idaho State School and Hospital, laundry building, \$145,000; State Hospital-North, administration building, \$91,000 and State Youth Services Center, Yellowstone Cottage, \$86,000.

Portland dope seizures surge

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — Seizures of marijuana in Portland this year already have surpassed the value of marijuana seized during all of 1988, prompting one investigator to call Oregon the "Columbia" of marijuana.
"As far as marijuana, Oregon is to the rest of the United States what Columbia is to the United States in terms of cocaine," said Capt. Robert G. Brooks, commander of the Portland Police Bureau's Drug and Vice Division.

Brooks said much of the marijuana is exported, and the increasing value of the seizures reflects a highly profitable marijuana trade that is accelerating in Oregon.

He noted that the prices for other drugs such as cocaine and methamphetamine are dropping while marijuana prices have remained fairly stable.

Brooks said marijuana sells for \$2,000 to \$2,500 per pound in Oregon, with the value of marijuana plants ranging from \$300 for "starter" plants to \$3,000 for mature marijuana standing 6 feet high or more.

Brooks said marijuana growers are moving indoors due to increasing police pressure on outdoor operations, particularly in sparsely populated and remote areas of southern Oregon.

The smart grower is indoors using high-tech methods, getting incredibly high potency and high-yield crops," Brooks said. "It's become kind of a science."

He said selective plant breeding and growing methods have led to marijuana that is up to 15 times more potent than the marijuana smoked by Americans in the 1960s.

Fields of indoor growing operations in Portland during the first three months of 1989 netted 5,412 marijuana plants valued at more than \$3 million, Brooks said.

GOP pours cash into Wyoming

WASHINGTON — The Republican Party has begun to pour cash and top-level talent into an April 25 special congressional election in Wyoming in the wake of two defeats that signaled potentially dangerous weaknesses in the GOP's highly vaunted national party machinery.

"We have to stop the hemorrhaging," said Edward J. Rollins, co-chairman of the National Republican Congressional Committee in voicing concern that a defeat in Wyoming, after losses in congressional contests in Alabama Tuesday and Indiana last week, could severely undermine the GOP drive to make House gains in 1990.

Rollins has dispatched R. Maje Nuttle, the NRCC's executive director, and Sam Dawson, the committee's field director, to take charge of the campaign of Craig Thomas, the Republican candidate seeking to fill the Wyoming House seat vacated by Defense Secretary Dick Cheney.

In addition, Rollins plans to have President Bush send a personal appeal to major GOP donors, including the 247 members of "Team 100," the group of

donors who channeled \$100,000 or more each to the 1988 presidential campaign. They will be asked to give \$1,000 each to Thomas — the maximum allowed under federal law — and to ask their friends to donate similar amounts.

"We have to raise \$200,000 to \$300,000 in out-of-state money real quick," Rollins said. "We've got to throw everything at it."

Rollins' decision to pull out the stops follows two events: the Republican defeat in what was seen as a solid GOP Indiana district that Vice President Dan Quayle represented from 1977 to 1981, and the swamping of the GOP candidate in Tuesday's special election in Alabama that was viewed in part as a test of the GOP drive for political realignment in the South.

Rollins said that if the GOP loses in strongly Republican Wyoming after the setbacks in Indiana and Alabama, it will be much more difficult to recruit good candidates and to raise money for 1990. "If you lose the first three, you are just treading water for the rest of the time," he said.

Copper mine reopens as prices turn upward

MCGALL (AP)—Rebounding copper prices have prompted a Salt Lake City-based company to reopen the idled Copper Cliffs mines near Hells Canyon Gorge in Adams County, and two Panhandle-based mining companies plan expansion of operations in Central Idaho.

Bruce Whitehead, spokesman for Alta Gold-Silver King Mines Inc. and Pacific Silver Corp., said the company expects to produce 600 tons of ore a day for milling at the Copper Cliffs site, shut down in 1981 because of plummeting market prices. It produced 15 million pounds of copper during the decade it was in operation.

The company estimated it would make \$1 million in profit in extracting 3 million pounds of copper from the deposit over the next two years. Some 700,000 pounds of copper have already been pre-sold to protect the operators from any potential drop in prices.

Hiring of the 30 workers for the \$500,000 annual payroll has begun, Whitehead said, but no date has been set for resuming operations.

Whitehead said the company is

also investigating deposits at the Iron Dyke mine 20 miles away, and if testing shows they would be profitable that mine would be brought into operation in the near future.

To the southeast, Cœur d'Alene Mines wants to expand gold mining operations at Thunder Mountain on the Payette National Forest, and Hecla Mining Co. is proposing construction of a processing plant at its Yellow Pine gold mine near Stibnite.

Rich Riching of Cœur d'Alene Mines said the company wants to enter a new ore-body in the Lightning Peak area to pick up work after the Sunnyside mine runs out in 1991. The Sunnyside mine, employing over 100 workers, has produced about 70,000 ounces of gold since it was opened in 1988.

Hecla spokeswoman Vicki Kok said that company began considering construction of its own processing plant after an agreement with Pioneer Metals Corp. of Vancouver, Wash., to process Yellow Pine ore at the Pioneer plant unraveled. Pioneer, the third gold-mining concern in the district, has reduced the amount of Yellow Pine ore it originally agreed to handle.

Probe into church blaze slowed by state's cuts

SPOKANE (AP) — Okanogan County Sheriff Jim Weed says staff reductions in the state fire marshal's office have caused delays in arson investigations, including an Omak church that has been previously struck by fires of suspicious origin.

Acting state Fire Marshal Ronald Brown agreed, saying the 50 percent reduction in staff since 1980 has caused even greater cuts in productivity.

In 1980, the state fire marshal's office was under the Insurance Commissioner and had eight investigators who probed 1,200 fires of suspicious origin. Last year, two years after being moved to the Department of Community Development, only four investigators remained, probing 294 fires.

"So there's an awful lot of arson out there that's not being investigated," said Brown from his Olympia office. "When they cut our staff by 50 percent, our productivity was cut to one-fourth because we spend all our time driving now."

Two full-time fire investigators,

based at Ynkima and Spokane, are responsible for probing all suspicious fires in Eastern Washington.

Because another investigator was on vacation and there were suspicious fires in two other cities, it took Don Bolin, deputy state fire marshal from Spokane, 30 hours to arrive at the scene of the Omak Free Methodist Church.

The cause of the \$750,000 church fire remained undetermined this morning. However, Omak Fire Chief Cal Bowling said the latest fire does not appear to be arson.

The state has allowed this fire investigation unit to become an orphan of state government," said Sheriff Weed. "Fire delays in investigating fires leave cold trails in the hunts for suspects," Weed said.

"It's an impossible task for them to cover all of Eastern Washington," he said.

The state's larger cities have their own fire investigators. But smaller cities rely on the expertise of the state fire marshal's office in investigating suspicious fires.

Boise cook enters guilty plea

BOISE (AP) — John Wallace Hooper pleaded guilty Wednesday to voluntary manslaughter in a slaying case that earlier had resulted in a mistrial.

Hooper, a 48-year-old Boise cook, had been charged with first-degree murder in the Sept. 10 shooting death of his roommate.

A second murder trial was called off Wednesday after Hooper accepted a plea-bargain offer from Ada

County prosecutors. Deputy Public Defender Anil Myshin said his client had rejected an earlier offer to plead guilty to second-degree murder.

Instead of a possible death sentence, Hooper now faces a maximum 30-year prison term for manslaughter and the use of a firearm in the commission of a felony.

Fourth District Judge Gerald Schroeder, who accepted the plea bargain, set sentencing for May 15.

Olympics to let pro basketball players compete

MUNICH, West Germany — International basketball preparat Thursday to open the Olympics to professional players, a move a top American official said would "guarantee" the United States the gold medal in 1992.

With the defending Olympic-champion Soviet Union proposing some limits and NBA players giving a lukewarm response to the chance of going for gold in Barcelona, officials of FIBA, the international basketball federation, said they were confident the plan would be adopted.

"I am quite sure it will pass," said Boris Stankovic, the secretary general of FIBA, who has pushed for opening the Games and all other federation-sponsored tournaments to players from professional leagues around the world.

secretary general of FIBA, who has pushed for opening the Games and all other federation-sponsored tournaments to players from professional leagues around the world.

FIBA's ruling council voted to recommend that the measure be adopted at Friday's special session, and whatever decision is taken will be in effect for the next Olympics. The International Olympic Committee leaves eligibility decisions to each sport.

Dave Gavitt, president of the USA Amateur Basketball Federation, said he supported the move but was not sure how his federation would vote, with 74 nations participating.

"Personally, I feel hypocrisy exists that can't be defended. But at the same time I have to do what is best for USA Basketball, and that includes colleges, junior colleges, and amateur clubs, and they are not jumping for joy over this," he said.

But Gavitt, who also is commissioner of the Big East Conference, acknowledged the incredible edge allowing basketball professionals in the Olympics would give the Americans.

"If we have this for '92, then I guarantee we're going to win the gold medal," the former Providence College coach said.

Trevino takes 1-shot Masters lead

AUGUSTA, Ga. — Lee Trevino, stalking the green jacket that has eluded him for two decades, coaxed a 5-under-par 67 from gusty winds and took a 1-shot lead Thursday in the opening round of the 53rd Masters.

"Not had for an old cripple," the 49-year-old Trevino said as he swaggered away from the 18th green at the Augusta National Golf Club, a course he once vowed he never would play again.

Three times in the 1970s, he declined an invitation to this elite event. As late as last year, he said "I hope to God they don't send me an invitation. I don't want to be here." He still refuses to use the locker room, changing his shoes in the parking lot.

"I'm consistent; nothing has changed," Trevino responded when asked if the best round he ever shot at the Masters had altered his attitude about the course or the tournament.

The bogey-free effort, which left him one stroke behind former British Open champion Nick Faldo of England, came as a complete surprise, Trevino said.

"I certainly didn't expect to play this well," said Trevino, who hasn't played a full schedule in seven seasons and became the oldest man ever to lead this tournament.

But it was no surprise to his peers. "The only surprise is that he hasn't done it before," said Tom Kite.

"I'm pulling for him," Tom Watson said. "He can play well anywhere. Lee wants to win this tournament."

"I think it would be fabulous if Lee could play well and go on and win it," Jack Nicklaus said.

Trevino agreed.

"It would mean a lot. It would mean filling out the Grand Slam," said Trevino, who has won golf's other three major events — the U.S. and British Opens and the PGA — twice each. Only Gene Sarazen, Ben Hogan, Gary Player and Nicklaus have won them all.

FBI reopens hunt for lost memorabilia

LAS VEGAS — The FBI has reopened an investigation into the disappearance of more than \$7 million in sports memorabilia, including a 1927 New York Yankees World Series ring and a \$30,000 Hickok Belt that Pete Rose won as the outstanding professional athlete in 1975.

FBI spokesman Tom Nicodemus said Thursday the case was reopened in February after about \$10,000 worth of the memorabilia turned up in New York.

"Based on that, it was obvious there was interstate transportation of the memorabilia," Nicodemus said.

The memorabilia was the collection of Dennis Walker, a 43-year-old Oregon con man whose decomposed body was found July 5, 1987, in a motel room on the Las Vegas Strip.

The cause of Walker's death was never found.

At the time of Walker's death, the FBI in Portland, Ore., was investigating allegations that Walker had used a pyramid scheme to bilk investors throughout the west of funds to obtain expensive sports memorabilia.

Walker's name was mentioned in Sports Illustrated this week by another collector who said he had been told that Walker bought the bat Rose used to break Ty Cobb's all-time hit record. The magazine said Walker had purchased various memorabilia from Rose, including the Hickok Belt.

Nicodemus said Walker's collection included memorabilia from several different sports, including jerseys worn by famous basketball and football players.

Nicodemus stressed that the probe had nothing to do with Rose or any of the former players, but simply involved an effort to track down the collection.

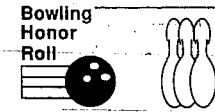

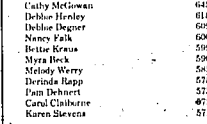

Dear Mr. Wolff:
We play six deals a rubber. During the fifth deal, we discovered that one of the decks had only 48 cards. We understand the fifth deal is null and void. What about the other deals?

ANSWER: The Jump raise promises 15-18 support points and is highly invitational but non-forcing.

ANSWER: Law 79 of the Rubber Bridge Code states: "Scores recorded for deals played with an incorrect pack are not subject to change by reason of discovery of the imperfection after the cards have been mixed together."

Dear Mr. Wolff:
When may a player make a pre-emptive bid? Some say it can be made only on the opening bid, others only on the first bid made by that player. Please clarify.

ANSWER: A pre-emptive bid, including jump overcalls, jump raises, etc., may be made at any turn of any player. A player who has passed can also pre-empt, either in his own suit (rare), as a pre-emptive jump of partner's overcall, or after partner opens and next hand makes a takeout double.

Dear Mr. Wolff:
Partner opens one diamond and I

respond one spade with a minimum. If partner jumps to three spades, is this a forcing bid?

ANSWER: The Jump raise promises 15-18 support points and is highly invitational but non-forcing.

Dear Mr. Wolff:
Is it considered unethical to stare at the backs of an opponent's cards in an effort to gain information about his hand? It's not an attempt to look through them, just to get clues regarding distribution.

ANSWER: This practice is against the rules, specifically prohibited in the Proprieties Section of the Laws.

Dear Mr. Wolff:
At rubber bridge, when the cards played to the current trick are mixed on the table, is it proper to ask which card belongs to whom?

ANSWER: Yes. The laws authorize any player to inquire about which card any player has played to the current trick -- but only the current trick.

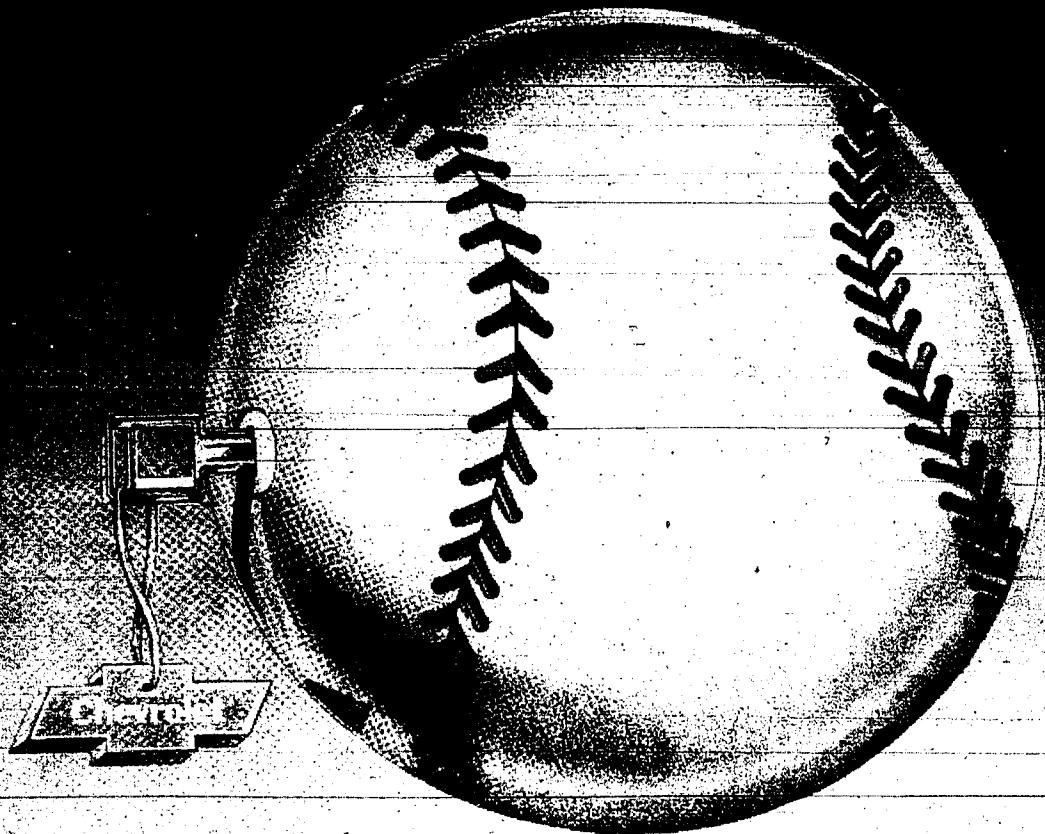

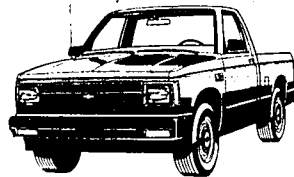

THE ACES ON BRIDGE BOBBY WOLFF

"It isn't that they can't see the solution. It is that they can't see the problem." — G.K. Chesterton.

Most East players have an automatic play when West leads a fourth-best heart. Third hand high is the obvious answer and that leads to a successful game for South.

Against the no-trump game, East puts up his heart queen and South wins his king. The club king goes to East's ace, and East's heart nine is ducked to dummy's 10, giving South a second heart winner. (West's duck is correct to keep the heart suit alive.) Without further ado, South then claims his nine tricks to make his game (three spades, two hearts, one diamond and three clubs).

Is there any way to beat the game? Yes, but East must make a well-reasoned play. The rule of 11 tells East that South has two cards higher than West's six. The bidding and his own high-card holding tell him that South must have at least one high heart honor. Therefore, it cannot be right to play the queen, expecting to find West with both the ace and the king of hearts.

A more logical play is aimed at neutralizing the power of dummy's heart 10. At trick one, East inserts the heart nine, which loses to South's jack. When East wins his club ace, he returns the heart queen to blot out the 10 in dummy. Give East the J-9-5 of hearts instead of the Q-9-5, and all would find the correct play. With Q-9-5, the combination is different but the principle remains the same.

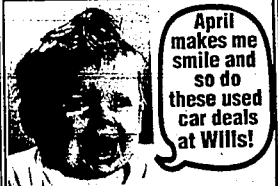

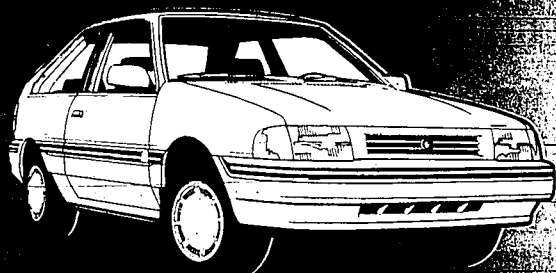
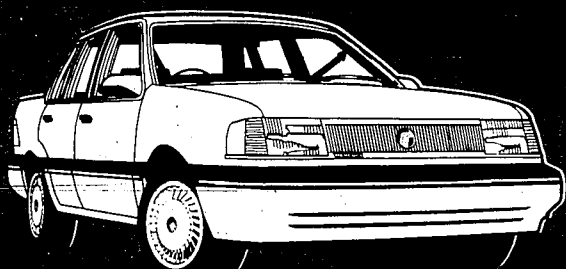

You will see Ray Bolger (the Scarecrow) singing "If I Only Had a Brain"; the original Tin Man, Buddy Ebsen — who became allergic to his makeup and was replaced by Jack Haley two weeks into shooting — singing "If I Only Had a Heart"; over a montage of stills of him in costume; and Ebsen juggling with Bolger, Judy Garland, Bert Lahr and in a dance sequence.

Rick Nelson is subject of book

HOLLYWOOD — Rick Nelson — who went to rock 'n' roll heaven on New Year's Eve 1985 — will be the subject of "Teen Idol: The Rick Nelson Story" (tentative title), a bio to hit book-stores next year. "It will be sensitive — not sensationalized," said author Philip Bashe, who stressed that the hardcover book — from Simon & Schuster — "will not be an investigative attack."

Said Bashe: "I'll be telling the story of a man who was unappreciated as a seminal rock 'n' roll artist. At the time he peaked, no one in rock 'n' roll was being taken seriously."

Bashe, who has interviewed about 132 people who knew and worked with Rick — and "I'm still not done," said his tome will clarify the events leading to Nelson's death.

"Everyone seems to think that Rick Nelson died of drugs. What he died of was a plane crash, caused by a faulty gasoline heater."

The wit of President Reagan is pulling in more laughs from his new video, "Stand-up Reagan," than it did during his two hitches at the White House.

Less than two weeks after its release, the original run of 30,000 was gone and J2 Communications is trying to rush more copies to the marketplace.

"This thing has just gone bonkers," said J2 spokesman David Bowers last week. "In the past hour I've had calls from Spain, BBC and Vogue magazine. The networks, newspapers and stations from around the country are all inquiring about it."

The video, a 38-minute potpourri of Reagan's lighter moments in office, features a warm and affable

Republican — running for office in the 'days when the Democrats controlled the region. The candidate had a hard time attracting a crowd. One day, when he had a small group together at a farm, he quickly looked for some sort of platform from which to talk to the people.

He found a mound of what Bees tried for 35 years to get Harry S. Truman to call fertilizer and delivered his words from there, says Reagan. "It was the first time a Republican spoke from a Democratic platform."

Jokes about the Soviet Union abound: There's one about the Rus-

ian — who asks, "Have we really achieved... full communism?" The second replies, "Not yet. Things are going to get a lot worse."

And there's the one about the American, Polish and Russian dogs. The American dog says, "I just bark a lot. Then someone will bring me some meat." The Polish dog asks, "What's meat?" The Russian dog asks, "What's bark?"

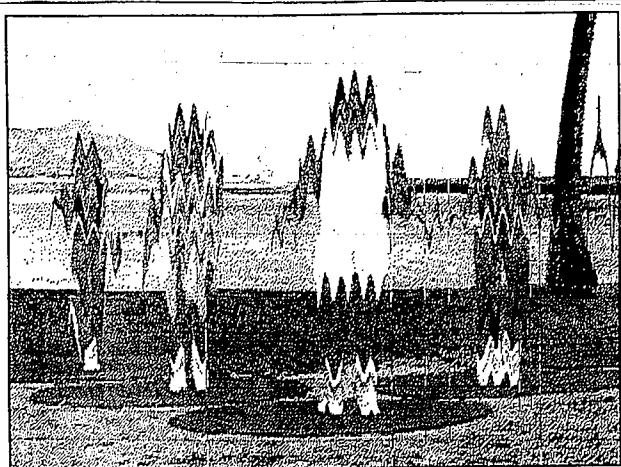

CSI art professor to show work

College of Southern Idaho art professor Wesley Wada is presenting a show of computer-digitized video works at the Sunspot Gallery.

More than 50 images from two large works are presented at the gallery, located on the second floor of the Taylor Administration Building on the CSI campus. The exhibition runs through May 12.

Wada, who has taught at the CSI Art Department since 1978, is currently working with the computer as a creative tool.

One of the large works in the show is "Den of Delights." The piece compiles 54 scanned and deconstructed images from an 18-hour television video. Wada has self-published a limited edition book of the work, which is nearly sold out.

The creative controls of a video scanner and a common VCR give Wada the ability to create what he calls "rubber photographs." Images can be stretched and pulled, creating entirely new visions.

"A scanner is a basic computer graphics tool," notes Wada. "A video scanner takes images from videotape and changes them into forms that can be

kicked around in a computer. Most of the imagery you get is electronic garbage. You need a finely honed editorial sense to zero in on anything promising."

Wada has tried to keep the equipment simple. The video digitizer is a simple, inexpensive device, and the works are printed in long strips on a regular dot-matrix computer printer.

"This is the basic box camera for the computer artist," says Wada. "The game becomes what an artist can do with this simple equipment."

Wada is a native of Denver, Colo. and received his Master of Fine Arts degree from the University of Denver. His work has appeared at the Denver Art Museum, the Boise Art Museum and the New Photographics showcase in central Washington state, among others.

The Sunspot Gallery exhibition is free, and viewing hours are 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Velcro and zippers help actors make quick changes for scenes

NEW YORK (AP) — If one had to sum up the quick-change artistry of "Jerome Robbins' Broadway" in one word, that word might be — Velcro.

The way Velcro opens and closes at a touch helps make it possible for two dressers to whip actor Jason Alexander through a 10-second costume change. That's all the time it takes for him to turn from an ancient Roman in "A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum" into a 1912 dandy for "High Button Shoes."

One of the secrets of how Alexander, who has the lead role of The Set-ter, can change so fast is that his high-button shoes don't button. To save time, they're rigged with zippers.

"I think the audience loves quick changes. It's like magic to them," said Barbara Matera, owner of Barbara Matera Ltd., the shop that made the costumes.

Velcro, a fabric with a surface of ginging pile, is "a very big word in our vocabulary," said the show's supervising costume designer, Joseph Aulisio.

With nearly 400 costumes in the show and with a cast of 51 performers and 11 understudies doing production numbers from 11 musicals, there are lots of magical quick changes every night. In fact there are

so many of them that sometimes the entire cast is backstage whipping clothes off and on, he said. Twenty dressers help.

Because the critically-acclaimed show is a pastiche of old Broadway musicals that Robbins has either directed or choreographed or both, there's enough variety to send a costume maker reaching for a headache powder.

The musicals are as disparate as "The King and I," set in Siam in the 1860s, and "West Side Story," set in Manhattan in the '50s.

Matera recently talked about some of the quick-change tricks besides Velcro and zippers she and Aulisio employ to help the singers and dancers assume identities from 11 different times and places.

One trick is to dress the cast members in layers that peel off to reveal the costume for the next number. But for dancers, it's not too comfortable to perform under bright lights as well as layers of fabric.

Another "behind-the-seams" secret is to line clothes with a slippery fabric so they slide easily on and off.

And some belts aren't what they appear to be on stage. They're not sewed through belt loops, but thrown right onto the pants. If a costume consists of various parts you

have to sort of bash them all together," Matera said.

Barbara Matera Ltd. has about 30 employees most of the time, but has given work to as many as 100 people at one time when there's a lot to do.

While the company was costumeing "Jerome Robbins' Broadway," it also did a full-length version of "Swan Lake" for the American Ballet Theater, and the road company version of "Anything Goes" and "Into the Woods."

The setup for one "Starlight" character incorporated a strobe light which the actor could flash by bringing together his forefinger and thumb. The back of the glove was made of rubber to protect him from shock.

Costume work is seasonal and year-round jobs are few. The New York Theatrical Sourcebook lists 53 costume craftsmen and 20 costume shops in Manhattan and Brooklyn. However, only four or five of the shops are highly regarded mainstays.

Such as Carrie Robbins, master teacher of costuming at New York University, and a free-lance costume designer.

Most costume shop employees or drapers or a designer's assistant, tailor or finisher, and do not make much money. If they land a full-time job they make about \$18,000-\$26,000.

Assassination game stirs controversy

WASHINGTON — British entrepreneur Jack Jaffe might have called his board game Save the Prime Minister. Or he might have called it Off the Queen.

But he didn't.

"It wouldn't have seemed relevant," said the Glasgow-born inventor of Save the President, a playful turn on assassination that has just gone on sale at FAO Schwarz.

"The threat to the American president is much more serious than the threat to the prime minister, only because there are so many crazies in this country."

Jaffe, who considered naming his creation Shoot the President before cooler heads prevailed, has spent the past six weeks stateside promoting the game, which involves agents of the Soviet Union and the United States vying to kill or protect the president, depending on their nationality, as he motorcades from the White House to the Capitol to be inaugurated.

"How awful," White House Deputy Press Secretary Alice Glen said yesterday. "I'd rather play Trivial Pursuit or Pictionary."

"Probably at this point, without seeing the board game, it's premature to make any intelligent comment one way or the other," said Secret Service agent Richard Adams, who nevertheless added, "You've piqued my curiosity."

Jan McDermott, a senior buyer for the legendary toy emporium, said

FAO Schwarz decided to market Save the President at its Fifth Avenue flagship store in Manhattan and a Washington outlet called Game Boutique after learning that it had established itself in just about every leading toy and game operation in England as well as in Europe. We were impressed."

McDermott added: "When we had initially run into this game way back four years ago at the American Toy Fair, we were a little skeptical in view of the Washington scene at the time and what had recently taken place — a delicate reference to John W. Hinckley Jr.'s attempt on the life of President Reagan. 'We're known as trend setters in the toy business, but we're always very, very sensitive to anything that might be, quote, off-color.'"

Not as sensitive, apparently, as Wayne Schmitzberger, the editor of Games magazine.

Schmitzberger, whose magazine boasts a circulation of 700,000, declined to print a review of the game

because of "my queasy feeling about it."

"Maybe it's just a personal thing," he added, "but having lived through the '60s and '70s, I felt it was subject matter that would be distasteful to a lot of people... I felt this was a little bit over the edge of the line."

The game retails for \$30 and, with the exception of wooden dice, is composed entirely of cardboard pieces representing a map of Washington, the president and agents for the CIA, FBI and National Security Agency, as well as for the KGB and other Soviet assets. It accommodates from two to six players who assume the roles of Soviets and Americans. The Soviets must first wound the president before killing him, and a successful shot is determined by proximity to the target and a roll of the dice. Players gain points for capturing enemy agents, and lose points for wounding innocent bystanders. No one knows who has been playing for six months until the game is over — a built-in surprise ending, according to Jaffe.

Videos released to help golfers' game

In the spring, thoughts of golfers everywhere turn to a better game and lower scores. Here are some video releases designed to improve your own play or just offer some of golf's history and nostalgic moments.

At the top are "The 1988 U.S. Open Championship" (VIDE, 60 mins., \$29.95) and "Golf's Greatest Moments" (Vestron, 77 mins., \$29.98). No video of a major golf championship packs the drama of the 1988 Open with Curtis Strange and Nick Faldo going shot for shot in the fourth round and then into the 18-hole playoff. Jim McKay's crisp narrative enhances the cassette.

"The Greatest Moments" tape sweeps over the 100 years of American golf and includes super moments such as Francis Ouimet's stunning

win over Harry Vardon and Ted Ray in 1913, the grand slam of Bobby Jones, the only player ever to be honored with two ticker-tape parades in New York City; Gene Sarazen's double eagle in the 1935 Masters; Ben Hogan's fabled comeback; Arnold Palmer's four triumphs in the Masters; Ken Venturi's dramatic win in the Open at 25 years ago; and Jack Nicklaus's 20th major title in the 1986 Masters.

Faldo has also come up with an instructional tape, "Nick Faldo's Golf Course" (Vestron, 60 mins., \$29.98), a private lesson that's helpful and easy to digest. "For a change of pace, there's 'Chi Chi's Bag of Tricks'" (CBS-Fox, 60 mins., \$49.95), with Chi Chi Rodriguez performing all the funnies in his bag.

Fox Hills Video has a new approach to instructional tapes, with

"The Master System to Better Golf" series. It consists of two volumes (seven tapes) by big-name pros on parts of the game. nearly forest because it is enchanted. One day the merchant is shipwrecked near the enchanted forest and is rescued by the Beast. As the merchant leaves the forest to go home, he picks a rose for his daughter. The Beast thinks he's stealing the flowers and tells him that the only way to survive now is to have a daughter come back and take his place in the forest.

The merchant goes home with the intent of returning himself later to give up his life. But his daughter, upon hearing the story, leaves early the next morning to take her father's place.

The daughter learns over time that the "Beast" is not really a beast after all. She is allowed to visit her home, but stays one day longer than she is supposed to and returns to the forest to find the "Beast" near death. He changes into a handsome prince when she promises to marry him.

Of course, they live happily ever after.

"The difference between my story and the originals is that there are a number of other elements, a number of other relationships that are established between 'Beauty' and her sister," says Steel, who is finishing up his doctorate in theatre at the University of Utah. He says that in traditional versions, "Beauty's" charm was mostly physical.

"My emphasis has been on the internal aspects of beauty," says Steel. "My intent with the production is to show how every one of us has both elements in us — both beauty and bestial qualities."

He has even added a director's note to the play's printed program: "It is hoped that this production of 'Beauty and the Beast' will help us all to perceive the beauty and tame the beast in each of us," he writes.

Steel, who grew up in Twin Falls

and is an alumni of CSI's drama department, says that though "Beauty and the Beast" is geared toward children, it is a family drama. While the story line is kept concrete and concise for children, there are elements of abstraction for adults, such as the development of relationships between the characters. He says he feels it is a mistake to make much of a distinction between children and adult theatre.

"As far as the visual elements are concerned, children's theater in general tends toward brighter, bolder, more straightforward elements than in adult theatre," says Steel. "But I don't think that that necessarily makes it different from adult theatre, because these elements also exist there. Sometimes we tend to condescend to young people and say that we have to modify or talk down to them. I don't like that stigma that children's theater has."

Steel says contemporary playwrights are beginning to move away from the slapstick entertainment which was a tradition in children's theatre for many years.

"Now we're starting to tell stories and to give messages and to evoke an emotional response from young people," he says.

Mannen, one of Steel's former teachers, says he is excited to have the Young People's Theatre performing at CSI. He cites a recent American Theatre Association study which rates the University of Utah's Children's Theatre Department as number one in the United States. He says Steel is the most prominent graduate student in that department.

Mannen thinks the performance will be "a real treat for the community" because of the quality of the production.

Lawyer teaches Soviets the art of dealing movies to Hollywood

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. — The working title might be "To Russia With Net Profit."

The production? Teaching Soviet film makers and lawyers the art of the Hollywood deal — including the occasional double-cross.

Above the line, below the line, break-even point, pickups, backend deals, indie deals, union contracts — the whole arcane business, with its jargon, is about to be dissected for the Soviets by a top entertainment lawyer, Eric Weissmann.

He will be on location in Moscow next week to present five full days of instruction — a development that attests to Soviet leader Gorbachev's power of positive "perestroika."

Weissmann, whose Beverly Hills firm represents Warner Bros., NBC and CBS, specializes in representation of film directors. Among his clients are such well-known directors as Alan J. Pakula, Hal Needham, Paul Mazursky, Mark Rydell and Gene Wilder.

So, how did the lawyer get invited for the Soviet project?

It seems that he had started on the groundwork for more American movie making in the Soviet Union, when the Soviet government asked him to teach its people the ways of the capitalists in Tinseltown. He agreed.

Now the 55-year-old Weissmann says he is a bit apprehensive — even

though he has lectured annually at Harvard and Boalt law schools and film symposiums, and has taught courses in Los Angeles on film and the law.

One of his major concerns is the daunting task of covering the Byzantine ways of the movie industry in just one week's time.

Another is the task of portraying Hollywood to "people who live on the moon" as far as any real concept of the place is concerned.

"How," Weissmann demands, "do I explain the millions of dollars that a Dustin Hoffman or a Sylvester Stallone makes, which is more than it costs them (the Soviets) to make a whole movie?"

He even frets that his jokes will be lost in translation.

But with the prospect of a widening opportunity for American film makers to shoot in the Soviet Union with government help (which can extend even to the loan of its armed forces) he is taking his task to heart.

"What I hope to achieve," Weissmann said in an interview in his office, "is an interchange." It will not just be one-way lecturing but an opportunity on both sides to compare procedures in the United States with those in the Soviet Union, he explained.

"They need to know how to do business in America, and we need to know how they do business there."

One major difference, Weissmann asserts, is that movie makers in the

Soviet Union "seem scrupulously honest" about contracts, while we are "not." Elaborating, the lawyer said:

"We break contracts, sue and get sued. They don't. They really abide by them — which is why it is very hard to get a contract (with them)."

As things stand, the Soviets make only flat-price deals, because they don't have the concept of various types of royalties deals on gross receipts or on profits.

To do business with Hollywood, Weissmann said, the Soviets need to learn to recognize red flags — no pun intended.

He added that the primary danger signs in the maze of Hollywood contractual relationships are the many confusing ways in which Hollywood studios define profits and the unique style of making business decisions.

Although the two things are not directly related, Weissmann said he came by the Soviet invitation as a result of recently starting to represent a Soviet film conglomerate, Soyuzkinoexport, in the United States.

"They are going to be very active in establishing an identity here (in Hollywood)," Weissmann said.

Nowadays, Soviet film makers are independent and self-sufficient, and "you can deal with them individually" without going through a central government agency, according to the lawyer.

The result is that Mozart actually found himself in the process of writing his own requiem mass. It was to be his last and greatest work.

The chorus rehearsing to perform this work is comprised of 90 singers from throughout the Magic Valley. The Magic Valley Chamber Orchestra will provide accompaniment. Both groups are under the direction of Carson Wong, with Phyllis Van Nest serving as rehearsal accompanist for the chorale.

Osmond Productions plans Ogden celebration

OGDEN, Utah (AP) — Neither city nor company officials will say what Alan Osmond Productions is contemplating during a 90-day development period, but Mayor L. Clifford Goff says it won't be a train wreck.

"Forget all about the train wreck," he said. "It's no longer part of our vocabulary. It's not even a memory."

Last November, Goff and the council talked about the possibility of staging the First Annual Great American Train Crash on Labor Day as an event to draw national attention to the city. The idea has since wilted under public pressure. Goff said it never was a serious project anyway.

Goff said Osmond hasn't "nailed down exactly what kind of celebration" is being developed, except that it will involve events in the downtown area, Weber State College, Union Station and around railroad tracks with a theme "tied to the city's railroad past."

The celebration will resemble Osmond's American Freedom Festival held each year in Provo on the Fourth of July. "That has become one of the biggest things in the West. It's a humberger," Goff said.

"The city has allocated \$10,000 to Osmond's organization to develop the production, and we anticipate getting back oodles in ticketed items alone," Goff said.

"That, coupled with the spending of visitors to see whatever Osmond comes up with, brings the possibility of a host of millions of dollars to the local economy, he said.

Marilyn Toome, Osmond's executive assistant and a producer who is overseeing the Ogden proposal, would only say: "We're in a 90-day development period now studying the feasibility of different concepts. To say anything else would be premature."

The company's contract with the city sets an April 23 deadline for delivering a proposal and a feasibility study to the city.

"The big question is when we're going to do it and how we're going to do it, not what we're going to do," Goff said.

Labor Day is still a possibility for the date of the celebration, although not May, as it likely is connected with events planned by Union Station for commemoration of the May 10, 1869, driving of the golden spike, Goff said.

Getty museum picks up Renoir at London auction for \$17.7 million

LOS ANGELES — The J. Paul Getty Museum landed the prime work in a \$65.6 million auction of artworks from the British Rail Pension Fund on Tuesday night at Sotheby's London. The Malibu, Calif., museum paid \$17.7 million for "La Promenade," an 1870 oil by French Impressionist Pierre-Auguste Renoir.

The price soared past the estimated value of \$7.5 million and more than doubled Renoir's record of \$8.8 million, set last May for a painting called "Motherhood or Woman Walking with her Child."

"We are overjoyed to have the picture. It is one of Renoir's most delightful works, and it comes from a great moment in the history of painting," museum director John Walsh said in a prepared statement. Walsh was traveling and could not be reached for further comment.

London dealer Richard Day bid for the Getty at the auction and declined to release the name of his client at the sale, but the museum announced the news Wednesday morning.

vation treatment at the museum, according to Getty press officer Lori Starr. A British law, requiring a six-month delay for an export license of works of art and designed to stem the loss of British treasures to foreign countries, will not apply to the Renoir because it has been in the country fewer than 50 years, Starr said.

"It's a beautiful painting and a great acquisition. Although it is terri-

bly expensive, I think it is a relatively good value. Some of us expected that it might go for much more," said Philip Consbee, curator of European paintings and sculpture at the Los Angeles County Museum of Art.

"I think it fits very well into the Getty's collection of late 19th century pictures. It is the finest Impressionist work in their collection so far," Consbee said.

Unflattering biography of Cary Grant hits bookstores

NEW YORK (AP) — A scathing portrait of the late Cary Grant hit bookstores under the title, "The Lonely Heart."



CARY GRANT Biography is not 'fan book'

The book's title is taken from one of the actor's 72 feature films, "None But the Lonely Heart," but another Grant movie might provide a more appropriate title: "The Awful Truth."
 Written by Charles Higham, author of biographies on Marlon Brando and Katharine Hepburn, and Roy Moseley who has written about Merle Oberon and Rex Harrison, "The Lonely Heart" talks about the star's numerous homosexual affairs, stormy marriages and battles on film sets with directors and fellow actors.
 The book alleges that Grant, whose real name was Archibald Leach, was born out of wedlock to a Jewish woman, secretly acted as an agent for several Hollywood stars and worked for British Intelligence during World War II. "The Lonely Heart" also repeats the story of his admitted use of LSD.
 Even the book's index provides unflattering coverage. A quick check under "Grant, Cary" lists headlines for the following: "as liar," "his nose," "stinginess," "showing his face" and

"faked suicide attempt." Under the heading "homosexuality," the book urges readers to "see also bisexuality or."

Grant, whose movies include "His Girl Friday," "I'll Catch a Thief" (North by Northwest) and "Gunga Din," died in 1986 at the age of 82.

Despite the trashy Grant receives, the authors do praise his acting skills and present many fond reminiscences from old friends. "Cary Grant, despite his many very human failings, did his best to be a good and decent man," the authors conclude in a preface.
 "It really is not a marvellous book," Higham said in an interview. "Nor is it a fan book. I try to balance everything. I see my biographies of stars as a continuing serial history told through biography. I suppose people will look back on this age and say, 'What were they like?' Who were these people?"
 Moseley and Higham draw on interviews with several dozen people for "The Lonely Heart," including

Hephurn, who co-starred with Grant in four films, Marlene Dietrich and Virginia Cherrill, the actor's first wife.

Grant's life is shown beginning with his birth in Bristol, England, in 1904, up to the very last hours before his fatal stroke.

The young Archibald Leach quickly displayed exceptional athletic ability and was just in his mid-teens when he joined the Pender troupe, a traveling company of acrobats. In the early 1930s, Leach headed for Hollywood, where he had a contract with Paramount Pictures, and quickly was renamed "Cary Grant." The first name derived from Cary Lockwood, a character he played in a stage show. The last name was chosen by studio publicists.
 Rumors of Grant's homosexual relations surfaced quickly. Higham recalled a conversation he had in the '60s with Dietrich, who starred in "Blonde Venus," one of Grant's first films:

"One night we were at dinner and I asked her about 'Blonde Venus' and whether she had had any off-screen relationship with Cary Grant. She responded, 'Oh no, that was out of the question because he was homosexual.' It was simply a given, it was understood to be the case."
 In 1932, Grant met Cherrill, an actress who portrayed the blind girl in Charlie Chaplin's classic "City Lights," and married her in 1934. By all accounts, they were an unhappy couple with Grant given to furious temper tantrums and even physical violence. They were divorced the following year, and Grant would marry four more times, and had one child, Jennifer, with the actress Dyan Cannon, his fourth wife.
 By 1937, Grant's work in "Topper" and "The Awful Truth" had made him one of Hollywood's most popular leading men. His good looks, litigating accent and quick wit were the perfect ingredients for light, romantic comedies. Grant would go on to ap-

pear opposite some of the world's most beautiful actresses, including Grace Kelly, Ingrid Bergman and Sophia Loren. He was still a major box-office draw when he retired in 1966.
 But while his screen image was carefree and charming, Higham and Moseley write that he was privately tormented by conflicting sexual desires and insecurity over his success.
 "On the screen there is no more relaxed, more dapper, seemingly more cool," Higham said. "But this was achieved at considerably more cost. It interests me that some people would rather not know this."
 Higham said curiosity was his main reason for doing the book.
 "I got to know him on a very superficial level," the author said. "I found him very interesting but very elusive. I hoped the book would be a solution to a mystery. I saw him as a puzzling mystery under whom many others flew."

Post office honors baseball greats with stamp set

The Washington Post Service calls its "Stamp Hall of Fame" as only surprising.
 On June 10, Lou Gehrig, the "Iron Horse" of the New York Yankees and a superstar by almost every standard, will become only the fourth baseball player to be honored on a U.S. stamp. In ceremonies celebrating the 50th anniversary of the Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown, N.Y., the service will dedicate a 25-cent stamp to the man whose record of playing in 2130 consecutive games still stands.
 Gehrig will follow his Yankee teammate Babe Ruth, Brooklyn Dodger Jackie Robinson and Pittsburgh Pirate Roberto Clemente as the only major league stars to have been pictured on the 71 sports-related stamps issued by the Postal Service. Most of the stamps have celebrated sporting events, such as the Olympics, rather than the accomplishments of individual athletes.

Gehrig, who played for the Yankees for almost 14 years, was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 1939 in a ceremony that also saw the release of the first U.S. stamp honoring the sport, a 3-cent commemorative marking baseball's centennial. Since then four other baseball stamps have been issued, including a 1938 6-cent commemorative that cited professional baseball's centennial.

Recognizing the void in celebrating the game's greats, sales-minded Granada recently issued an 81-stamp set honoring current and former American baseball players. There is no question that sports stamps are

extremely popular and that baseball, like American music, is one of our country's most popular exports.

In both instances, however, foreign countries — especially those catering to young American collectors — have beaten the U.S. Postal Service to the printing presses with stamps honoring these subjects. Yet these are the very aspects of American culture that Frank said he would like to portray on stamps, capitalizing on the goodwill they generate for America.
 The Gehrig stamp, a vertical commemorative, shows two views of the Yankee first baseman: a close-up of him in Yankee pin stripe and

Shirley MacLaine has the last laugh on critics

NEW YORK — Shirley MacLaine has one of the great laughs of our time — just try keeping a straight face when she collapses into one of her giggly ruffaws. And nothing seems to amuse her more than being Shirley MacLaine.

"Oh yeah, oh yeah, I have a great time," MacLaine inhales, catching her breath after laughing her way through a story about undergoing psychic surgery in Las Vegas, Nev. And with a new video and new book out on her favorite subject — her own well-documented spiritual quest — MacLaine may have the last laugh yet.

"I think I'm growing feathers on my back," MacLaine says, explaining how she reacts to "hurtful" things detractors say about her very public inner journey. "It's like water rolling off a duck's back."

For all her levity, the author and actress is dead serious about her two latest spiritual projects. Her new book, her sixth, is "Going Within: A Guide for Inner Transformation"

(Bantam, \$18.95). Her first video is "Shirley MacLaine's Inner Workout" (Vestron Video, \$29.98), a New Age self-help tape in which the star demonstrates how to relieve stress by meditating and "aligning" the seven chakras, seven "systems of energy" located along the spinal column.

"My basic intention is to bring all of this down to earth and make it much more pragmatic," she says of the video, which has already raised a skeptical eyebrow or two.

MacLaine has been inviting readers along for a mystical ride into the

world of reincarnation, UFOs and introspection since 1983 when she published her third book, "Out on a Limb." She also starred as herself in the 1987 ABC miniseries based on the book.

Two more best-sellers about her

spiritual pursuits and past lives followed: "Dancing in the Light" and "It's All in the Playing." Then there were the MacLaine-led spiritual seminars that played to thousands of faithful across the country.

The video is an outgrowth of the seminars, which MacLaine has abandoned.

"I didn't like the feeling of developing a following," she says. MacLaine, whose black jacket and skirt flatter her dancer's figure, (MacLaine, 54, has shed the extra pounds she put on for her last film role, the eccentric piano teacher in "Madame Sousatzka.")

"The video throws the responsibility back in their laps," she says. "It reinforces the idea of 'their being; their own teacher, their own guru. I don't want to be anybody's guru."

What MacLaine does enjoy is "sharing" — and in her latest book she shares her meditative techniques, her experiments with crystals, her belief in the unification of the universe, her meeting with fellow best-selling author and physicist Stephen W. Hawking. ("A love, love,

lovely person, one of the most important people I've ever met"), and her experiences with psychic surgery, in which a Filipino "psyche surgeon" plunged his hands (sans anesthesia or scalpel) into her abdomen to remove "negative energy clots."

"Nothing's too far out for me," MacLaine cheerfully admits, although she confesses she was terribly afraid of psychic surgery at first. "I don't want anyone messing with my body."

Most of all she seems to enjoy sharing the new Shirley MacLaine, the kinder, gentler soul who has emerged since she embarked on her spiritual journey of love and self-discovery some 12 years ago. Longtime friends, she says, find her changed.

"They say I'm becoming more tolerant," she says, erupting into gales of laughter. "You know I could be tough in my professionalism before and in my sort of relentless pursuit of the truth. It could be very tough about it."

Is this the same Shirley MacLaine who once slapped a gossip columnist for printing lies about her? These days she would be more like

to pick up the telephone and calmly discuss things, she says. On the other hand, she's not just calling David Letterman an obscene name in an on-air fit.

"But you know, even when I did it I knew it would grab headlines," MacLaine admits of the slapping incident when she was a young actress.

MacLaine admits to reverting to her old cranky self when she hasn't made time to meditate and "align" herself first thing in the morning, and she says that's a real challenge on a busy movie set.

In May, MacLaine will begin filming "Directed by the Light," written and written for Welshman Chris Manger, in which she plays a former circus performer who creates a fake miracle that transforms a town. And although contracts haven't been signed yet, MacLaine is expected to play the movie-star mother in Mike Nichols' version of Currie Fisher's semi-autobiographical novel, "Postcards From the Edge," later this year.

She is under contract for two more books.

Snow White actress gains popularity

SAN DIEGO — When Eileen Bowman was a child at St. Martin's Catholic grade school in San Diego, she was teasingly called "Snow White" because her hair was so fair and her brown hair so dark.

Since being introduced as Snow White to a worldwide television audience on last week's Academy Awards telecast, an appearance being kept alive by a lawsuit filed by Walt Disney Co. against the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences, Bowman said that she has learned to like the nickname.

Bowman refuses to discuss the legal brouhaha that started when the Oscars show producer, Allan Carr, decided to use a Snow White image that Disney lawyers claim was fashioned after the studio's trademarked character. But, at a welcome-home party Saturday in San Diego, Bowman's older sister, Bernadette, composed a song that contained what she called the seeds of the quarrel.

To tales of audience laughter in the packed nightclub, Bernadette sang,

"Disney's suing
But because her little knees were weaving,

"Interviewers calling on the phone to bend her ear,
"My pride is showing, my sisterly love overflowing,

"But next time Enie please wear your skirt cut down to here,

The irony of the suit, says Eileen's sisters and friends is that Disney executives, couldn't have found a more in-character Snow White than Eileen if they'd done the casting themselves. She doesn't smoke, drink, swear or even go to very many movies.

"I think there are too many things in the movies we don't need to see," Eileen said, adding that she had never seen an Academy Awards show before performing in the one last week.

Bowman said that she's looking forward to receiving her check for the Snow White performance, but was not told how much it would be for. And she never asked.

Bernadette says that her sister's greatest eccentricity is keeping a load of change at the bottom of her purse to have when approached for handouts on the street.

Eileen said that although she hated being called Snow White as a child, she took the name to heart. She collected Snow White memorabilia and played the character as a teen-ager at the San Diego Junior Theatre. Still, friends say she had to talk her into dropping out of a Youth for Christ chorus to try out for the role of Snow White in "Beach Blanket Babylon," a musical revue at the Santa's Hotel in Las Vegas, Nev.

After winning the part, the play's director-composer Steve Silver asked her to audition for the 10-minute Academy Awards show opening that he was designing for producer Allan Carr.

In that audition, Bowman, a 22-year-old novice with only nine months of experience singing show tunes at the Abbey Restaurant, won out over Pia Zadora, Lorna Luft, Ellen Green and Lucie Arnaz.

Was she nervous?
"At rehearsals, I felt so nervous. I thought I was really going to be sick," she said, adding that her greatest fear was having to appear during her number and shake their huffs.

TV producers ready to unveil pilots

HOLLYWOOD — Prime-time animation with a "Roger Rabbit" flair, nutty supernatural comedies harking back to "I Dream of Jeannie" and "Bewitched," a blue-collar romance and a studious avoidance of last season's reality-television blitz stand out among the trends in the varied crop of pilots being developed for the 1989-90 TV season.

Also popular among the series candidates for next fall's prime-time season — unveiled this week by the three networks and Fox Broadcasting in their annual meetings with advertisers — are:

• Vehicles for established stars such as Rodney Dangerfield, Jackie Mason and Alan Alda.

• Adaptations of hit feature films ("Adventures in Babysitting," "Coming to America" and "Married to the Mob").

• Numerous variations on "The Somebody Show," featuring either hip young comics ("Julie Brown: The Show," "The Laurie Anderson Show," "The Dave Thomas Show") or TV veterans ("The Ann Jillian Show," "The Barbara Eden Show," "The Ed Begley Jr. Project," "The Gregory Harrison Show").

• And, despite the failure of the nostalgic drama "Almost Grown," which tracked the coming-of-age, marriage and divorce of a couple through the 1960s, '70s and '80s by triggering their memories with pop music hits, there seems to be some nostalgic coming-of-age yet to come.

as NBC considers "When We Were Young," a drama about eight young adults from a small Northern California town "set against the social and historical backdrop of the turbulent '60s."

A couple of the networks have their own private development agendas.

CBS comedy executive Tim Flack pledged that his network will continue to aggressively go after the best and most innovative comedy Hollywood has to offer, in hopes of someday conjuring up at least one 8 p.m. hit.

And NBC's chastened entertainment chief, Brandon Tartikoff — still reeling from critical blows dealt him for introducing Gerardo Rivera to the NBC schedule in a special on Satanism and for pandering to sleaze and sensationalism with movies such as "Full Exposure: The Sex Tapes Scandal" — vowed to respond to viewer complaints. "It's a fruitless enterprise to keep on pushing the boundaries of good taste but when people are saying, 'hey, we can't watch TV with our kids anymore,'" he said.

The effort to revive prime-time animation might well fit into Tartikoff's renewed investment in family television. Tartikoff and others believe, might prove as successful with children and adults as the prime-time cartoons of the 1960s, such as "The Flintstones."

Tartikoff said that animation can blend both sophisticated adult humor with the sight-gags and slapstick hu-

mor that kids enjoy to create "The Rocky and Bullwinkle" of the 1990s.

NBC has one such series in development: "Holed Town," from Ralph Bakshi, which centers on three "cine buddies" and their "dog's eye" view of the world. It also has commissioned a special that will blend animation and live action a la "Who Framed Roger Rabbit" called "The Jackie Bison Show," focusing on Jackie, an animated bison who is also a TV star, and the human guest stars on his show.

Fox Broadcasting also may venture into the expensive business of blending live action and animation on a weekly basis with "Hollywood Dog," a pilot about "a mutt in the city of stars and dreams."

In the same vein, CBS has "The People Next Door" from Wes Craven, about a cartoonist whose imaginary characters come alive and interact with real people.

Along with animated characters, the pilot slate — at least for CBS and NBC — is stuffed with ghosts, witches and folks from outer space. Of the three networks, CBS seems to be the farthest out; their comedy projects include "Mars: Base One," a

comedy written by Dan Aykroyd about a space colony of earthlings on Mars; "Shivers," about a single father who moves his family into a house already occupied by three ghosts; and the hour dramas "Nick Knight," about a homicide detective who is also a vampire, and "Outpost," about a colony of humans on the remote planet of Learus.

NBC is developing "A Little Bit Strange," probably TV's first predominantly black witch, warlock and psychic family comedy. A pretty widow finds herself with an unusual breed of children when she marries a warlock, and her mother-in-law is a psychic.

NBC also is at work on a drama called "Blessed," set in the South-west, about a mysterious young girl who gave birth to a baby boy and disappeared; the boy grows up to discover he has supernatural powers.

CBS "Married to the Mob" looks at a blue-collar suburban family in which Dad is a "low-level mobster," while its "Mulberry Street," in the style of "Moonstruck," will explore the relationships of "a tightly knit, extended Italian family that live in the same Little Italy apartment."

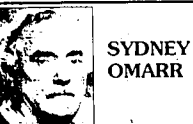

'The Dream Team' is outrageous comedy worth seeing

The best comedy film offering engaging characters enmeshed in out-

landish yet believable situations. "The Dream Team" succeeds on all counts. It is this year's "Big," an outrageous, ultimately endearing

comedy. Like much of today's comedy, "The Dream Team" is liable to offend segments of society: mental,

health experts, black gospel churches, New York City police. But then, you can't please every-

survive — and to solve the murder. Jon Connolly and David Louckin fashioned a script that is ingenious in its unraveling, and Howard Zieff's direction keeps the action at a furious and hilarious pace. One scene in a hospital corridor had this reviewer laughing aloud hours afterward.

Michael Keaton, a revelation in "Beetlejuice," is perfect as the hot-

tempered ringlord of the night-marish team. Christopher Lloyd ("Back to the Future," "Who Framed Roger Rabbit") offers another of his rare characterizations. Boyle and Furst score in their individual ways. Lorraine Bracco provides welcome feminism as Keaton's onetime girlfriend.

The Universal Picture was produced by Christopher W. Knight. The rating is PG-13, probably for language and adult situations. Running time: 113 minutes.

'Lean on Me' director is happy with results

John G. Avildsen, director of "Lean on Me," is happy with the way the film is going at the box office, but he would be a lot happier if it were playing to a wider audience.

"It's regrettable, but the film has been perceived as a black movie, and the whites are not going to see it, not in sizable number," he said.

"Lean on Me" is the story of Joe Clark, the controversial principal who took over Eastside High in Paterson, N.J., expelled all the trouble-makers, raised the scholastic standing of the school and bruised a lot of feelings along the way.

Critics have asked about those students he expelled. Clark took the easy way out, they said. Those misfits became the responsibility of the community at large. Clark didn't solve the problem by getting rid of

them. Why didn't he keep them in school and try to do something with them?

"They were a destructive force," said Avildsen. "I think Clark had to do what he did. The place is pristine now. The students are doing much better than they were. I know that some of the things Clark did were questionable, but he has gotten results, and you can't deny that."

"We did the film there, and it looked like 1982. It looked like 'Little House on the Prairie.' The kids were all well-dressed and well-behaved. It had been described as a 'cauldron of violence.'"

"Yes, he was hard with his co-workers, but he felt that if they weren't doing their best, they should leave. To him, they were dead wood. If some of the teachers had to go, it was a small price to pay. It was a dreadful situation. There was no

funding, mediocrity was being tolerated and the kids were not being equipped for the job market."

Clark was very recently in the news again. He had apparently allowed a dance team to perform at the school. The "male" participants wore little more than G strings, and the community was questioning Clark's judgment once more.

"It's a shame that he is getting publicity again, for this," said Avildsen. "All this takes from the man and the things he has done at the school. People are discussing the 'dancing' rather than the real issue. Clark has given those kids hope and pride, things they never had before he became principal. He taught those kids to stand up."

"He sees black education as a form of genocide. He wants equality in education, and as he says in the film, there is nobody to blame but the stu-

dents themselves. He's done some very good things at that school. He feels passionate about education. He is an alarmist."

Avildsen, who directed the first "Rocky" film, said he did not know if there would be a sequel to "Lean on Me." "We'll have to stay tuned. We'll have to see what he does," he said. "We can't write a script. No one would believe it."

If he does do a sequel, it won't be something new to him. Avildsen has done three "Karate Kid" movies. He just finished the third. It is scheduled to open nationally June 23. If the third is successful, he'll do a fourth.

"Sure, why not?" he said. "I like the people, and I like the sentiment of the stories. They have uplift, have a positive effect—and are very encouraging. They are inspiring to the kids. I like the producers, and I like the stars. It has been a good experience."

'Chances are' is likable movie

The following are capsule reviews and a parental guide of some of the films now playing in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

CHANCES ARE (PG). This comedy about reincarnation — with Robert Downey Jr. as the eternal return of Cybill Shepherd's long-dead husband, is winsomely likable, something like a fuzzy department store penguin or bear — and director Emile Ardolino ("Dirty Dancing") gives it that soft, smooth, upscale sheen. Downey suggests he could be sensation if the script weren't so squeaky-cut. But the new spiritualist aura and '40s Hollywood heavenly fantasy clichés don't mix with the story's political parables: a Camelot reversion where the '60s cohabit with the '80s. The setup is excellent, the delivery snick. The spirit of Hollywood's old idealistic fantasy romance comedies remains buried.

COUSINS (PG-13). Director Joel Schumacher's remake of the 1975 "Cousin, Cousine" has a palpable glow when Isabella Rossellini in on the screen, radiating charm and a pure inviolable honesty. It's an aura that spills over to include co-star Danson in its warmth. The rest is bustling, prettified, thoroughly bogus but intermittently entertaining.

DANGEROUS LIAISONS (R). As the book "Les Liaisons Dangereuses" outraged and scandalized the French in the late 18th century, this movie has kept every shred of its ability to shock in the late 1980s. Screenwriter Christopher Hampton, with director Stephen Frears, has made a glidingly cinematic version of his own successful play, taken from the 1729 novel by Choderlos de Laclos. Stars John Malkovich, Glenn Close and Michelle Pfeiffer.

FLECH LIVES (PG). This limp effort from coasting director Michael Ritchie is the ultimate comedy of condescension. As a wise-cracking investigative reporter, Chevy Chase delivers non-stop

punchlines at the expense of the fools who surround him (He makes David Letterman look like Mother Teresa). And what better place in this quest for Fletch to go and be superior than the Deep South? The character's verbal daggers can be funny in small doses, but after a while you just want to smack him.

LEAN ON ME (PG-13). Bullhorn-and-baseball-bat-wielding educator Joe Clark is played by Morgan Freeman, possibly the most formidable actor on the American scene. And he will give thoughtful audiences their thorniest problems with "Lean on Me." When director John Avildsen turns up the heat, it is thrilling. But glossed over by the film makers are some of the real statistics of Clark's administration and the fact that he has very nearly created more problems than he has solved.

LEVIATHAN (R). It's "The Alien" set beneath the sea instead of outer space — and not nearly as sophisticated. But it's occasionally scary, looks good and moves well under George Cosmatos' vigorous direc-

tion. Peter Weller, Richard Crenna, RAIN MAN (R). Because we have had dozens of buddy films about journeys of discovery, we can plot the scenario of this one like a road map: The special qualities of one will work on the other to change him, or perhaps both of them. Dustin Hoffman makes his autistic savant character hypocritically interesting and sometimes terribly funny. Tom Cruise gives his loosest, most authoritative performance since "Risky Business" and it can be said unblinking that he holds his own with the mastery Hoffman.

BILL & TED'S EXCELLENT ADVENTURE (PG). This is Allan Bloom's worst nightmare, and possibly yours, too. It is an all-out celebration of the closing of the American mind, with two high school doofuses (Keanu Reeves and Alex Winter) borrowing a time machine to kidnap great figures of past centuries for a history report. Look for two of the low points of American teen-age cinema in one movie: Joan of Arc leads an aerobics class, and Abraham Lincoln tells an assembly of school kids to "Party on, dudes!" This witless fiasco couldn't be more imbecilic or less excellent...dudes.

Marlee Matlin's 'Bridge to Silence' actually a bridge away from silence

For Marlee Matlin, the CBS movie "Bridge to Silence," which airs Sunday, April 9, is actually a bridge away from silence.

Matlin, who is hearing-impaired, won a Best Actress Oscar in 1986 for her silent performance in "Children of a Lesser God." She first spoke professionally as a presenter at last year's Academy Awards. "Bridge to Silence" marks the first time she has spoken in a role.

She plays a hearing-impaired woman with a 4-year-old daughter (played by Lisa Warner). After an auto accident that kills her husband and leaves her with life-complicating injuries, her mother (Lee Remick) tries to take custody of the child. But Matlin's character resists.

Encouraged by a loving family friend (Michael O'Keefe), she joins the Theatre of the Deaf and attempts to recover from her accident, get over her husband's death and reconcile with her mother.

"The movie is mainly a conflict between the mother and the daughter," says Josef Sommer, who plays the Matlin character's father. "The mother doesn't want to acknowledge her daughter's handicap, but at the same time she doesn't want her deaf daughter left with responsibility for a 4-year-old child. Since my character sides with the daughter, I'm sort of stuck in the middle."

While the stars of the movie all speak, many of supporting actors (including some from the Theatre of the

Deaf) are hearing-impaired and unable to speak. On the set, speaking and impaired actors communicated by means of translators. Many of the actors who speak, including Sommer, also learned sign language.

"It was fun, what little I learned of it," he says. "At times it was quite strange. I remember the first time we all got together, when the producers had a sort of party. There were 30 or 40 people in the room, and there was almost no sound. But everyone was having a wonderful time."

In essence, Sommer says, the cast's shared experience as actors overshadowed their differences. "It was really no different than working with a French company, a European company," he says. "It's just a language difference. And one of the nice things is discovering all these people you like so much who just happen to speak another language."

Since completing "Bridge to Silence," Sommer has taken a break from TV movies to perform on stage. This month, he is at the Yale Repertory Theater in Connecticut, where he and two other actors are playing the lead role in a new play about baseball great Ty Cobb. "The three of

us play Cobb at three different ages," he explains. "We're all on stage at once, though."

Cobb, one of the original members of Baseball's Hall of Fame, was known as a fiercely competitive player and an outspoken racist. The new play, by Lee Blessing, who wrote the recent Broadway hit "A Walk in the Woods," presents Cobb as representative of early 20th-century America.

"It's about how Cobb fits into the U.S. during the period," Sommer says. "His relationships are shown to be parallel to the relationships of the whole country. In the whole issue of racism in baseball, for instance, Cobb insisted that he was just part of the society as it was at that time."

"Not an easy human being by any means," Sommer adds. "But a fascinating character."

Newest soap opera 'Generations' focuses on role of strong women

Rock-ribbed matriarchs set the tone as the new soap "Generations" begins to unfold.

One look at Lynn Hamilton, who plays Vivian Potter, a former housekeeper and now head of the Marshall clan, and you know Vivian has been through the fire.

Her daughter Ruth (Joan Pringle) is of the same mold. Ruth's husband, Henry, listens to her, and so do her kids.

Across town, lawyer Rebecca Whitmore (Pat Crowley) rules her family with understanding, a seasoned fighter surprised by her own tenacity.

Three ladies tough to emulate and good to have in your corner.

But where's the spice? Goodness may be a virtue unto itself but it can't be counted on to raise ratings. So, making a late entrance, is sexy, sultry Jonelle Allen, who plays Doreen, a singer who married old black money in the person of Martin Jackson (Rick Fitts).

The show's mannequin, judging by her wardrobe, Doreen spells trouble. She's going to be the re-

sident bitch, the devil in skirts, itching for scrapes, irked because marrying Jackson hasn't satisfied her other ambitions. When "Generations" calls for sparks, Jonelle Allen will probably be on camera — the outsider, the spoiler, the Chicago firecracker.

Jonelle stayed in town and settled down with her husband in Laguna Beach, alternating between movies and TV guest spots. When Sussman called about Doreen,

Jonelle was in rehearsal for a play, "Burning Beaches."

This February, Jonelle was spending her days at NBC, her nights on stage. She's been on stage since the age of five, having made her debut with Helen Hayes in "The Wisteria Trees." Breaking through with a vengeance in Joe Papp's production of Shakespeare's "Two Gentlemen of Verona," Jonelle collected all the awards in town except the Tony.

Showbiz is in her blood. "My uncle, Honi Coles, taught me how to tap," she says proudly, "and he's the very best."

With Oprah Winfrey riding high, "Coming to America," raking in millions at the box office, and "Generations" making a splash in the afternoon, Jonelle feels a change in the weather: "It's nice to see ethnicity paying off," she says.

C-SPAN, 'America's Town Hall,' marks first 10 years on television

Brian Lamb sits at a round table with three Washington journalists and fields calls, without comment, from C-SPAN viewers. He's no Morton Downey Jr., nor does he want to be.

To most of the callers, he is simply "Brian." Brian, who has given them a live call-in forum since October 1980. Brian, who went to London for Queen Elizabeth II's speech to the opening of Parliament last November. Brian, who interviews civic leaders for C-SPAN's "American Profiles" series.

Most don't realize that Lamb, 47, is also chief executive officer and

founder of C-SPAN. And as he marks 10 years for the service he likes to call "America's town hall," he is making plans to expand the town-hall agenda.

Already, he holds the National Press Foundation's 1988 Sol Taishoff Award for Excellence in Broadcast Journalism, for C-SPAN's election coverage.

"I love what I do," he said from his corner office at C-SPAN's headquarters. "And I do like to get things done. Sitting at a desk drives me crazy. There are so many opportunities. If you love to learn, it's frustrating when you know there are so many opportunities for them to learn..."

"Them" refers to potential viewers in 42 million homes nationwide — with nearly 400,000 newcomers a month.

What C-SPAN viewers have been offered is gavel-to-gavel coverage of the House of Representatives for 10 years and the Senate for three, with live hearings (about 2,000 hours a year, C-SPAN's biggest staple) and another 1,000 hours a year of live call-in shows. One, after the first vice presidential debate, drew 219,000 attempted call-ins and brought inquiries from awed telephone-company supervisors.

The menu has included National Press Club speeches and coverage

Q: Steve Allen is such a bright guy and has led a fascinating

life. Does he plan to write about himself soon? — L.H.

A: Allen has written about himself in the past and plans to continue writing. He and wife Jayne Meadows were recently in New York talking to major publishers. The subject: a book they will co-write about their 36-year marriage. Given Steve's wit and great writing ability, the drama of his recent bout with colon cancer, and the usual marital ups and downs, the book should be a fascinating read.

Q: Any idea how much Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev is paid? — S.L.

A: Gorbachev earns the equivalent of about \$695 a week, which is a lot less than President Bush's weekly salary of about \$1,800. But Gorbachev does have a lot of perks, such as a handsome dacha in the country and all the caviar he can eat.

Q: An article about "The Wizard of Oz" said that MGM's original choice of an actress to play Dorothy wasn't Judy Garland, but Shirley Temple. How come

Shirley didn't get the role? — R.L.

A: Louis B. Mayer, Metro's chief honcho, was so fascinated with Shirley Temple that he agreed to lend Jean Harlow and Clark Gable, two of his studio's biggest contract stars, to the rival Fox studios in exchange for Shirley's services. But when Harlow's untimely death cancelled the swap, Judy Garland got the part, and the rest is history.

Q: Is actor Gary Busey, who sustained severe head injuries in a motorcycle accident, virtually a paraplegic as a result? — A.R.

A: Busey, thrown from a motorcycle while not wearing his protective helmet, was seriously injured and required brain surgery, which naturally caused great concern. But almost miraculously, he not only survived but, after a long period of rehabilitation, is in pretty good shape and looks a lot leaner these days. "I'm now 25 pounds lighter," Gary said. "I call it the Harley Davidson diet, and I don't recommend it."

'Oscars' top ratings

LOS ANGELES (AP) — ABC's coverage of the 61st Academy Awards captured half the TV audience and first place in the Nielsen ratings for the week ended April 1.

However, NBC handily won the week for the 41st straight time despite the Oscar ceremony's 29.8 rating and 50 share, the highest for the show since 1984. An estimated 75 million people watched all or some of the presentation of the Oscars.

NBC's "The Cosby Show" was in second place ahead of third-place "Roseanne," the new ABC comedy that had been first for the past three weeks. NBC's "Cheers," in fifth place, got its highest rating of the season.

NBC took five of the Top 10, including the Sunday Night Movie presentation of "The Hillside Strangers," which was sixth. ABC had three and CBS two.

The A.C. Nielsen Co. said NBC won the week with a rating of 15.8, extending the network's record for its longest winning streak. ABC was second with 14.4 and CBS was third with 12.4.

For the season to date, NBC leads with 15.8, ABC is second with 12.9 and CBS is third with 12.7. Each ratings point represents 904,000 households with television. The share is a percentage of sets in use.

The NBC drama "Quantum Leap" was in 55th place for its premiere.

ABC's "Moonlighting," newly moved to Sunday with new episodes, was in 70th place. It was the fourth lowest rated network show of the week.

The new ABC comedy "Anything But Love" finished in 19th place, but has been steadily dropping in the ratings since its premiere. It completes its six-week spring tryout next week and will be replaced by "Have Faith," a comedy about four Catholic priests in a Chicago parish.

Fox Broadcasting's "Married ... With Children" was its highest-rated show, finishing in a three-way tie for 59th place. Fox's "America's Most Wanted" was in 62nd place.

The five lowest-ranked network shows were NBC's "Nightingales," ABC's "Moonlighting," ABC's "HeartBeat," ABC's "Great Circuses of the World" and ABC's "Men."

Among the news shows, "The CBS Evening News" was first with a rating of 10.6. ABC was second with 10.4 and NBC was third with 9.4.

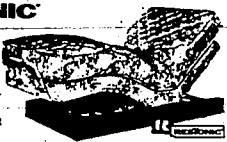

'Dallas' filming draws comments in Moscow

MOSCOW — The director waved his arms and yelled futilely for quiet on Red Square. Then, cameras rolling, J.R. and Bobby pressed two Soviets for details about a shady international oil deal.

"What is this Amerikanaki film about?" loudly asked one passing tourist from the Central Asian republic of Kazakhstan who didn't understand the director's admiration in English. Told it was a popular television series about love, lust and money, she nodded knowingly, although she had never heard of the Ewings, Southfork or even Texas.

"Dallas" made its first appearance in Moscow this week to film an episode, and it was a meeting of vastly different cultures and lifestyles that seemed to leave both sides more than a little confused.

The self-conscious, Texas-style extravagance that the "Dallas" characters displayed just a few feet from the Kremlin walls and Lenin's tomb drew stares of awe from many Soviet passers-by.

"We come waltzing in here in our cowboy hats and mink coats and we don't exactly melt into their society," acknowledged Patrick Duffy, who plays Bobby Ewing on the long-running CBS series.

Alexander Potapov, a well-known Soviet actor who has a bit part in the "Dallas" episode, had never heard of the show. He made it clear that this encounter had left him none the wiser. "It seems to be about noble and honest people," he said.

Potapov said he enjoyed appearing in the show, even though he and the Americans shared no common

language. "There are legends about Hollywood, so it's nice to have a chance to experience this," he said.

The "Dallas" stars stayed in Moscow at the Sovietskaya Hotel, ornately furnished and favored for state guests in V.I. Lenin's time, but today without elevator or room service.

Home videos: 'Mystic Pizza' is a slice of life

"Mystic Pizza" (Virgin Vision, VHS-Beta, \$89.95. Rated R)

The three young women who serve up "Mystic Pizza" at a small restaurant in the coastal Connecticut town of Mystic are real charmers.

One (Annabeth Gish) is naive and serious and headed to Yale University; her sister (Julia Roberts) is sexy and independent and terrified she has nothing to look forward to; and their feisty friend (Lili Taylor) is determined to break out of her working-class mold.

"Mystic Pizza" is a slice of their lives, spiced with romance that thrills, amuses and sometimes disappoints the women. But the best scenes are in the pizza parlor presided over by a cook (Conchata Ferrell) who refuses to divulge the secret of her sauce.

Their town, populated by working-class people who make a living from the fishing industry, and by the Connecticut upper class, is beautifully photographed.

The three women give excellent performances. Vincent Phillip

D'Onofrio is very good as the young man who wants to marry Taylor. But the plot is too predictable, and the feel a little too sappy. Still, "Mystic Pizza" would make a fine accompaniment to a neighborhood pie with all the works and an evening at home.

"Big Business" (Touchstone, VHS-Beta, \$89.95. Rated PG)

What happens when a dithering nurse switches twin infants by mistake? A match more bizarre than Shakespeare's "A Comedy of Errors."

Bette Midler and Lily Tomlin play dual roles in this comedy hit from the Disney factory.

The Shelton sisters, Sadie and Rose, are born in a West Virginia town whose key industry is a quilting business. They arrive at the same time when the wife of a company employee gives birth to her twins. Their names? Sadie and Rose, of course.

Years later, Sadie (Midler) Shelton is the lizard sharp head of a multinational that wants to sell the West Virginia firm, Hollowmade.

doing without having our every creature comfort met," Duffy said.

TV feature leads police to the arrest of fugitive

Miami television station WTVJ had done a feature story on the carnival that aired on NBC's affiliate news feed this week. WVVA-TV in Bluefield aired the story on Tuesday's 11 p.m. newscast.

Kast was pictured for three seconds during the 1½-minute feature, neighbors recognized him and told

the girl's mother. She reviewed videotapes of the newscast at the station the next day.

"That's him. That's him," she said.

WVVA contacted the Greenbrier County sheriff's office, which contacted Miami police.

Kast was arrested Friday and an extradition hearing was scheduled for Monday.

of political caucuses, speeches, rallies and conventions, as well as state races and gubernatorial campaigns. Some 14 million Europeans in 22 countries stayed abreast of America's 1988 election via Worldnet global satellite television.

And true to C-SPAN's code, none of it is edited.

Even today, when Lamb fields telephone calls, he rarely reveals his own views. "We have a principle here of not being involved. When you've promised your audience 10 years ago that you won't be involved, it's never even a problem."

"One of things I've learned is that people in this country get mad if television performers give their opinions and make fun of things. ... There's a smugness among a lot of people who do television who think they're better than the rest, who look down their noses at the world."

"They've got all the answers, and they're the insiders. A lot of people have been very successful at selling that. Some have become successful by being very controversial."

"I've always felt one of the reasons this place has been a success is because there's a market for this lack of smugness."

On the other hand, he will compliment the 700 or so journalists who have participated in his roundtables, saying that "it's been a great education for the people of the United States, to find that journalists don't have horns."

C-SPAN began in 1977 with Lamb's proposal to a meeting of 40 cable television operators that they

fund satellite service for a bit of public affairs each week.

Two, Robert Rosencrans and Ken Gunter, were particularly enthusiastic. Rosencrans became C-SPAN's first board chairman; Gunter, who worried that cable was viewed as a "smut peddler," helped persuade Congress of cable's potential.

Expectations for C-SPAN were low, said Lamb, when the House began its experiment with telecasting on March 19, 1979. What happened on the House floor didn't always make exciting prime-time fare, as critics pointed out, but by April 3, the congressmen had decided to continue.

"America will not always be excited by what they see and hear, nor necessarily agree with what we do or say here," said Rep. Tom Downey, D-N.Y., that day, "but they will have an opportunity to view first hand the activities of the House of Representatives."

Telecasting was carried out then, as now, by House technicians and equipment. Coverage was available to any network, but only C-SPAN decided on gavel-to-gavel coverage without commentary or editing. (Even now, C-SPAN says that on average, a 9-second sound bite on broadcast news comes from an average 23-minute speech that C-SPAN carries in full.) C-SPAN went to 24-hour programming in 1982.

In 1986 C-SPAN II was born to cover the Senate and began 24-hour programming two years ago. That service is free to any of the 3,174 cable operators who carry C-SPAN; 575 of them do.

Two months ago Lamb started C-SPAN Audio Service, a tribute to the medium he loves best — radio. "I started loving radio when my mother wouldn't let me keep the radio on when I went to sleep," he recalled.

 At 11, he made a crystal-set radio with an ear plug so he could hear the local radio station while in bed. "Radio is still my first love," he said. "Always will be."

At 15, he did a 5-minute, thrice-weekly radio show for his high school in Lafayette, Ind. Summers and during his senior year, he worked at the local radio station, then did an "American Bandstand"-type program for a local TV station while he attended Purdue University. (Today Purdue keeps C-SPAN's archives, which are available to professors and students.)

In 1964 Lamb became a Navy officer, assigned to answer press queries for the Defense Department. He also spent two years as one of 25 social aides at the Lyndon Johnson White House (another was Charles Robb), "one of those periods where you just watched — a fascinating experience," he recalled.

Later Lamb worked for United Press International's radio service, then as a senatorial press secretary. For three years, he worked for the Nixon Administration's Office of Telecommunications Policy, grappling with problems related to the launching of a communications satellite in 1974.
