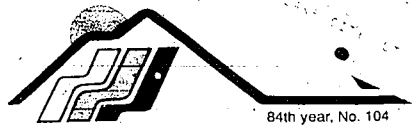

Congress approves non-military Contra aid

WASHINGTON — Congress overwhelmingly approved on Thursday a compromise \$49.7 million package of non-military aid for the Nicaragua Contras...

The Senate completed congressional action on the measure, approving the aid package on an 89-9 roll call vote.

The House earlier endorsed the plan, 309-110. Voting yes were 152 Democrats and 157 Republicans. Voting no were 99 Democrats

and 11 Republicans. The congressional action represents an effort to declare a truce in the bitter, years-old fight between the White House and Congress over aid to the Contras...

This bill tries to set in motion a united, single-voice policy, said House Speaker Jim Wright of Texas moments before the chamber voted.

It ends military involvement and covert efforts to overthrow governments in our

hemisphere," Wright said.

At the same time, he added, "It says to Nicaragua that we are very earnest about you fulfilling these commitments that you made to internal democratization."

In the Senate, supporters of the bipartisan agreement voted down a series of amendments aimed at altering or scuttling a plan they said has the potential to usher in an era of cooperative branches of government on Central American policy.

If this accord is circumvented or exploited, it would be an enormous blow to the chances

for bipartisan cooperation in a broad range of areas, said Sen. Patrick Leahy, D-Vt., Democratic floor manager of the Contra-aid package.

Sen. Mark Hatfield, R-Wash., who has voted against all other proposals to aid the Contras, said he decided to vote for the compromise plan after concluding that simply abandoning them because they have become a political embarrassment would be as immoral as the policy we were pursuing.

But Sen. Jesse Helms, R-N.C., one of the Senate's strongest supporters of the Contras, called the Bush administration's plan "little

more than beans and band-aids."

"My administration ... sought the least common denominator," Helms said. "This is not a bipartisan accord. It is an accord that suited the other side."

In the Senate, voting against the measure were Sens. Brock Adams, D-Wash.; Bill Bradley, D-N.J.; Dan Coats, R-Ind.; Alan Cranston, D-Calif.; Charles Grassley, R-Iowa; Tom Harkin, D-Iowa; Jesse Helms, R-N.C.; Arlen Specter, R-Pa.; and Malcolm Wallop, R-Wyo. Not voting were Sens. Albert Gore Jr., D-Tenn. and David Durenberger, R-Minn.

Universal Frozen Foods directors approve project

TWIN FALLS — Universal Frozen Foods' board of directors in Milwaukee unanimously approved the planned \$18 million, 150-job expansion of its Twin Falls potato-processing plant Thursday.

"Officially we're very pleased, but unofficially it's a lot of work," said Mike Johnston, the Twin Falls plant operations manager.

A ground-breaking ceremony probably will be held in early May, he said.

Local Universal employees aren't celebrating, Johnston said, because the vote only makes formal what was already expected.

"The scope of the project and the time-frame are still the same," he said.

City officials, on the other hand, are "ecstatic," said Dave McAlindin, the city's economic development director. "It's going to benefit so many people — local farmers, new employees, spin-off business. It's a tremendous boost to the local economy."

"Fantastic," said Mayor Doug Vollmer. "This is one of those that is always in the back of your mind."

"It's a good project for the community," said City Manager Tom Courtney.

Universal is recognized as a good employer with stable production and growing international markets, he said.

The expansion will increase Universal's production capability by 25 percent, letting the plant process between 160 million and 210 million pounds of potatoes a year.

Johnston, as he has done in the past, declined to specify what frozen potato product will be produced, in what volume or at what wholesale value.

The \$2 million building expansion will extend off the north side of the plant. More than \$16 million worth of high-tech equipment will be installed.

The expanded production will require 150 new full-time jobs with an annual payroll of \$3 million. The company will begin hiring in September, and the project should come on-line early next year.

The speedy start-up schedule means the city will have to hustle to keep up with the infrastructure plans it has agreed to, particularly the \$2.5 million city sewage pretreatment facility needed to handle Universal's increase in waste water.

Construction of the waste treatment facility, being funded with property taxes paid by Universal, will begin this summer, Courtney said. The sewage plant should be finished in early March.

"Universal will bring their system on-line in stages," he said. The present system will be able to handle the initial extra.

Some changes in the street arrangement surrounding Universal also will go forward. The city will vacate Russet Street — basically turning it over to Universal — and will develop a new access to the Victory housing subdivision west of the plant.

Right now the residential traffic is competing with Universal trucks that have to use the public street to maneuver around the plant, Courtney said.

Fusion sparks rush for profits

NEW YORK — Universities are racing to cash in on cold nuclear fusion with a haste that shows how scholarly research often is tinged by big business.

A broad patent on cold nuclear fusion could be worth billions of dollars if the invention turns out to provide a new way of producing cheap, clean and abundant energy.

But the lure of money inhibits exploration of cold fusion claims as leading researchers withhold information in order to protect their

patent positions, lawyers and scholars said Thursday.

There is absolutely no doubt in my mind that once you dangle out that pot of gold called a patent, it causes people to publish less and disclose less," Donald Chisum, a patent expert at the University of Washington, said this week.

Scientists trying to test the cold fusion claims announced at a news conference last month have been stymied because the two researchers have withheld important details of their work.

The University of Utah applied for

three patents even before the March 23 news conference featuring its own B. Stanley Pons and his co-inventor, Martin Fleischman of the University of Southampton in England.

Massachusetts Institute of Technology said this week it has applied for patents on work done by a researcher, Peter Hagelstein.

Brigham Young University plans to apply for patents as well, although mainly to establish the credibility of its researcher, Steven Jones, rather than to make money, spokesman Paul Richards said.

Cult heads sought; 13th body found

MATAMOROS, Mexico — One of the suspects in a cult of human sacrifice pointed out the grave of a 13th body on Thursday and police ordered him to dig it up, huddling him as he reeled from the heat and the stench.

"You'll do it with your hands if you have to," one officer told Sergio Martinez after the suspect was handed a pick and shovel.

Martinez, 22, had been taken back to a ranch near Matamoros, where a dozen bodies were unearthed Tuesday. He and other suspects have told authorities there were 14 bodies

buried on the ranch.

In a dramatic public confession Wednesday, some of the five suspects in custody said victims were put to death in rituals that were intended to provide a "magical shield" for members of a drug-smuggling ring.

Under the gaze of police on Thursday, Martinez went to work digging up the new grave and quickly revealed the body of a man in his 30s. Martinez said the man had been buried about four months ago.

So far, the only victim to be identified was Mark Kilroy, a 21-year-old University of Texas pre-medical student who was kidnapped on the

streets of Matamoros last month during spring break.

The suspects have said they killed at the demand of Adolfo de Jesus Constanzo, whom they called "godfather." They said Constanzo, 26, and Sara Maria Aldrete, 24, called the "witch," believed human sacrifices gave the members of cult protection from harm.

Cameron County Sheriff's Lt. George Cavito said that Constanzo, a Cuban who has contacts in Miami, was last seen Tuesday over the border in Brownsville, Texas.

WASHINGTON — Just across Pennsylvania Avenue from the White House, in a windowless room at the Office of Management and Budget, you can hear — if you know how to listen for it — the anguished gnashing of millions of Americans grinding their teeth.

Welcome to a little-known corner of Washington, where real people can have their say. It is in this room that the government keeps letters from Americans who have just filed their tax returns — weary, beaten-down people straining to hold onto civility, who simply had to tell somebody in Washington how it feels.

"Dear Sirs, I may not be as polite as usual," began Constance M. Williams of Grantham, N.H., "since I am also suffering with the migrating headaches which has been stimulated by filling out your insufferable forms."

Soviet advisers shot down U.S. aircraft

MOSCOW — Soviet military advisers helped their North Vietnamese allies shoot down American airplanes with missiles during the Vietnam War, the Soviet Defense Ministry newspaper reported Thursday.

Red Star carried a series of reminiscences that were believed to be the first direct admission that Soviet military advisers engaged in combat in the war.

The newspaper's disclosures were typical of the greater openness by the Soviet military under President Mikhail S. Gorbachev. But they brought a jarring note at a time when improved superpower relations have improved more sympathetic coverage of the United States by state-run media.

Red Star said it was printing the reminiscences in response to requests from readers.

"With three missiles, we brought down four planes," said Sgt. N. Kolesnik, recalling a July night in 1965 when the troops he was advising set up an anti-aircraft battery near a ruined town that American pilots used for target practice.

"All of us worked well," Kolesnik said, naming fellow Soviets he called

the targeting officer, the computation commander, the operator and other soldiers at "the firing stations." Later, Kolesnik said, the Vietnamese the Soviets were training set up wooden decoys of missiles. After bombing the decoys to no avail, the departing American planes ran into the enemy field of fire and three Skyhawks were downed, Kolesnik said.

The Soviets began training Vietnamese rocket troops in spring of 1965, Gen. Maj. G. Belov told Red Star.

The soldiers' recollections mainly concerned training Vietnamese to battle with Zenith missiles and the work to keep technologically ahead of the Americans.

The U.S. forces changed their schedule of air sorties after the Soviets arrived, according to excerpts from the diary of Col. G. Lyubinsky. Previously they had flown on a regular schedule with breaks and predictable days off.

But after the Soviet specialists arrived, "they realized that they had to take the rocket forces seriously," Lyubinsky wrote.

Col. V. Fyodorov recalled that in 1966, when a Vietnamese division

Wright launches defense against charges

WASHINGTON (AP) — With his position as the nation's highest elected Democrat in jeopardy, House Speaker Jim Wright mounted an emotional defense Thursday against serious ethics charges and declared he would "fight to the last ounce of conviction and energy that I possess."

Flanked by members of his leadership team and Texas colleagues, Wright's voice choked with emotion as he defended his wife, Betty, against the charge that her \$18,000-a-year salary from a Fort Worth business partner amounts to an improper gift.

He said his wife was "a good decent, caring, thoroughly honorable person and he would 'damn well' fight to protect her honor and integrity from any challenge from any source whatsoever."

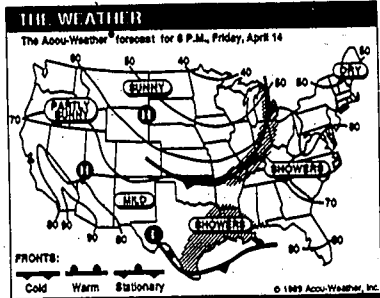

"I was running a battle independently, already without the participation of our specialists," it brought down an American plane and the captured pilot refused to believe that the Vietnamese had acted on their own.

Jury finds 2 guilty of fraud charges

ALEXANDRIA, Va. (AP) — Two former executives of a California defense contractor were convicted of conspiracy and wire fraud Thursday in the first trial arising from the Pentagon corruption scandal.

A federal court jury deliberated nearly 36 hours over four days before returning guilty verdicts against George Kaub and Eugene Sullivan, former vice presidents of Teledyne Electronics of Newbury Park, Calif.

Each was convicted on one count of conspiracy. Kaub was found guilty on five counts of wire fraud and two counts of filing false statements. Sullivan was convicted on three counts of wire fraud.

Bush pushes education 'deregulation'

UNION, N.J. (AP) — President Bush proposed a "partial deregulation of education" Thursday, saying schools in poorer communities would be given more flexibility in how they may spend government money.

Aides said Bush's proposal, an expansion of the package he announced last week, would result in the elimination of burdensome federal regulations.

Bush, speaking at an education conference at Union High School, sought to build public support for his education package while renewing his argument that more money from the government will not necessarily improve educational performance.

"We need to rely less on the collective wallet and more on our collective will," he said.

Anti-clot drug wins inventors' prize

WASHINGTON (AP) — Researchers who developed a drug to dissolve blood clots in heart attack victims were honored Thursday as Inventors of the Year for 1988.

David V. Goeddel, William J. Kohn, Diane Pennica and Gordon A. Vlahos, researchers for Genentech Inc. of South San Francisco, Calif., shared the honor presented annually by the Intellectual Property Owners Foundation, which represents holders of patents, copyrights and trademarks.

The team developed the drug known as t-PA — human tissue plasminogen activator. It is used to help dissolve blood-clots immediately following heart attacks.

Probe obstruction charge examined

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Iran-Contra independent counsel is investigating allegations that Reagan administration officials obstructed a Senate investigation into links between the Nicaraguan Contras and drug traffickers. Sen. John Kerry, D-Mass., said Thursday.

Kerry, who directed the investigation, said several people who testified before his Foreign Relations subcommittee informed him they were interviewed by investigators for independent counsel Lawrence Walsh.

A former Justice Department official and the former U.S. attorney in Miami both told The Associated Press they were interviewed by Walsh's investigators. Both denied any wrongdoing.

'Fall guy' North ends his defense at trial

WASHINGTON (AP) — Oliver North concluded his defense Thursday after six grueling days on the witness stand, testifying he felt he had become the fall guy in the Iran-Contra affair when he heard himself described at a White House news conference as "the only one who knew what was going on."

Attorney Brendan Sullivan later rested his case. A few rebuttal witnesses will be called today by the prosecution.

U.S. District Judge Gerhard A. Gesell said the case should go to the jury next Thursday after two days of closing arguments and final instructions.

During four days of tough cross-examination, North denied prosecution contentions that he lied about his Iran-Contra efforts and personally profited from some of them. He said he had explicit authorization from his superiors — and he assumed, from President Reagan — for his actions and didn't take a dime; he wasn't entitled to.

He testified Thursday that two days before the Nov. 25, 1986, press conference, in which Reagan and Attorney General Edwin Meese III took part, North had been interviewed for four hours by Meese and aides.

He is accused of lying during that

interview. But he testified he told them readily about "the secret within the secret" — that profits from arms sales to Iran had been funneled to the guerrillas fighting the leftist government of Nicaragua. Therefore, he said, he was shocked to learn that he might be the target of a criminal investigation.

What he heard as he watched the press conference on television, North said, "was inconsistent with what I told the attorney general two days before." Meese said North's boss, John Poindexter, had known of the money diversion but hadn't approved it — when, in fact, he had.

North testified, "It was very clear to me that this was part of pointing the finger at Ollie North. He was 'the only one who knew what was going on' — which, I must say, is the way it was supposed to be." North's firing and Poindexter's resignation as Reagan's national security adviser were announced by Meese that day.

Both at the trial, which began Jan. 31, and at congressional hearings nearly two years ago, North said he had assumed while he was directing covert aid to the Contras that he would have to take the rap if word got out about the help, which was being provided at a time that official U.S. aid was banned.

Prosecutor John Kekor's final

questioning of North concerned two letters he wrote in December 1986 to a contractor who had installed a \$13,800 security system at North's home. The letters were backdated to make it appear North had intended to pay for the system, which had been paid for by retired Maj. Gen. Richard Secord, whom North had recruited to run the Contra supply effort. The letters are the basis for one charge, that North accepted an illegal gratuity.

North was still in the Marine

Corps, he said, and didn't want to fabricate the letters at work because he didn't want the Marines involved in "that type of cover-up." Therefore, he testified, he went to a catalog store to write the letters on display typewriters.

Another of the 12 charges against North is that he obstructed a presidential inquiry by lying to Meese and by altering, destroying, concealing and removing documents from the National Security Council office where he worked.

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Flight 103 bomb-toters identified

WASHINGTON (AP) — Federal investigators have identified a handful of passengers who unwittingly may have brought aboard the bomb that blew up Pan Am Flight 103 over Scotland in December, a Bush administration official said Thursday.

CBS reported Wednesday that suspicion had centered on a member of the Popular Front for the Liberation of Palestine-General Command who is a relative of Hafeez Dalkamoni. CBS said Dalkamoni reportedly set up the network that carried out the attack in which 270 people, including 189 Americans, perished.

An administration official knowledgeable about the investigation disputed the CBS account that investigators had concluded the passenger who carried the bomb aboard was Khalid Jaafar, a young American-Lebanese college student returning to Michigan from Frankfurt for the Christmas holidays.

Federal Bureau of Investigation agents have questioned Jaafar's parents at the family-run gas station in Detroit but the parents insist he was not involved.

The official said Jaafar was only one of several passengers suspected of unwittingly bringing the explosive aboard. "And no one in the Popular Front is talking," said the official, who spoke on condition of anonymity.


Another government source said the "chief theory" of investigators is that the bombing was the work of the Syrian-sponsored Popular Front for the Liberation of Palestine-General Command.

Investigators theorize that the group, headed by Ahmed Jabril, may have carried out the attack at the behest of Iran, said the source, who also spoke on condition of anonymity.

The group was identified Wednesday in a State Department terrorism report to Congress as having carried out numerous attacks that targeted against Israel and violently opposed to the Palestine Liberation Organization.

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

Oil spill reveals double standard

If you are playing a dangerous game, and you swear that it is safe, aren't you responsible if someone gets hurt?

If you make a gigantic mess, don't you have to clean it up?

If the Internal Revenue Service suspects you did not pay your taxes, aren't you subject to a painstaking audit?

In a capitalist system, isn't there supposed to be some connection between risk and reward?

One of the most sickening things about the oil spill off the Alaskan coast is what it says about the way the world really works.

It is another cynical lesson that the really big players don't have to play by the same rules that apply to the rest of Americans. In this case, a Titanic foul-up by a major oil company, those responsible will not really pay the price. American citizens will.

For starters, taxpayers and consumers will subsidize the cost of the whole murderous mess. Exxon's loss of more than 10 million gallons of oil from the Exxon Valdez can be fully written off corporate income taxes, as can all of the cleanup costs paid by the company. No wonder Exxon announced that cost was not object in attacking the spill. They aren't paying it.

Moreover, it is absolutely unclear who in the end is going to pick up the tab from the damages caused by the spill — Exxon, its insurers or the taxpayers. The rules on who is ultimately responsible in such disasters are extremely muddy and desperately need to be clarified. Congress, by setting up a welter of insurance funds, tried to socialize the risk so that no oil company would face bankruptcy in the event of something like the Valdez catastrophe.

But if the risk is socialized, the rewards of the deadly oil traffic remain firmly private. In the wake of the spill, the price of crude oil and products have skyrocketed — the largest single oil price increase in history. As a result, oil companies as a whole have made tens of millions of dollars on the disaster, to such an extent that industry insiders kid that Exxon slid onto that reef on purpose.

That may be a sick joke, but it points to the dangerous lack of accountability in this disaster.

Maybe the corporate mind would be more focused if responsible executives, right on up to the chairman, lost their jobs when something like this happens. The president of Japan Air Lines stepped down when one of his jets crashed. Lawrence Rawls, Exxon chief executive, is still there, drawing his generous salary. Conceivably, if he and others down the line who grew complacent and ultimately put a known alcoholic in charge of a tanker knew that their jobs were at stake, this accident might not have happened.

This spill might also prompt some

rethinking about oil company taxes. If the public bears most of the cost of the destruction of the environment and millions of Earth's creatures, then perhaps the public purse ought to enjoy more of the gain from the hazardous commerce in oil. In a free enterprise system, theoretically at least, there should be some connection between risk and reward.

That principle was reflected in the Windfall Profits Tax of 1980, which sought to capture the profits that domestic oil producers reaped when the price of domestic oil was deregulated and rose to the OPEC cartel price.

But did the companies overpay that tax as intended? The IRS believes that at least some of the producers operating in Alaska and California did not; that they significantly underpaid.

Last summer, the IRS issued a deficiency notice to Arco for \$1.2 billion for underpayment of taxes from 1980 to 1983 on windfall profits from the Alaskan North Slope. That figure does not include possible underpayments from 1983 to mid-1985, when prices fell below the windfall profits tax-base price, or underpayments by the other major producers.

Officials in California — in the controller's office, the state Lands Commission and in the City of Long Beach — and some industry analysts believe that the oil companies have avoided paying the windfall profits tax on oil produced in California as well. They suspect that was accomplished by means of a complicated system of underpricing crude oil when it was sold to the companies' refining subsidiaries. That had the effect of transferring the profits "downstream," so that they would be taxed at the then-corporate rate of 46 percent instead of at the much-higher windfall profits rate.

The issue is pending in several court cases in California, and the oil companies have spent tens of millions of dollars in legal fees challenging the complex charges. If the companies lose, they stand to pay plenty. Officials estimate that the damages to the state of California alone, in lost tax revenues and oil royalties, came to at least \$550 million between 1980 and 1985. The losses to the federal treasury could run into the billions, but so far the IRS has not aggressively pursued the case.

If Alaskan and California crude oil has systematically been priced below its fair market value, how can rational environmental decisions be made? If this oil is in fact more valuable than most pricing would indicate, then the government can and should have imposed tighter and more costly precautions on the ways the companies have been operating.

That and a few heads on the line might have spared us our current grief.

Tourism overrides ecology in parks

The 1988 Yellowstone fire stimulated greater interest in national parks management than any event in recent times. As towering flames raced through large areas of the park, public fears arose that Yellowstone's beauty, wildlife, tourist appeal and economic value were being sacrificed for a dubious scientific notion: that fire has a natural and essential role in preserving the ecology of our parks.

These differing perceptions reflect what has always been the central dilemma of national park management: Exactly what in a park should be preserved for future generations? Is it the scenery itself — the resplendent landscapes of forests and meadows, high mountains, wildflowers and spectacular animals?

Or is it each park's total natural system, including not just the biological and scenic superstars, but also the vast array of less dramatic species such as grasses and soil fungi? And now another consideration has entered the equation: Increasingly, the parks are viewed as biologically vital to the planet as a whole — as globally important in their way as the Amazon rainforest is in its way.

The majestic beauty of the national parks has always given the impression that scenery alone is what makes them worthwhile and deserving of protection. Indeed, scenic preservation was the major factor in establishing our first national parks — Yosemite in 1864 and Yellowstone in 1872.

In developing parks to give tourists access to the great scenic attractions, park managers sought to achieve visual harmony between new construction and the natural surroundings. They located many early hotels, museums and other facilities almost on top of major features, often building in a rustic architectural style using heavy logs and stone so that the structures appear to be part of the natural scenery. Landscape architects designed roadways and bridges to blend with natural surroundings.

Attuned to such visual factors, park developers showed almost no concern for biological processes. However, managers did oppose certain intrusions — railroads, dams and reservoirs. They protected large mammals and attractive birdlife. And except for tourist areas, the mountains and valleys were kept unscarred, the trees healthy, the flatlands lush with vegetation.

By the 1930s, as natural sciences advanced, the scenery, wildlife and natural objects referred to in the 1916 legislation were coming to be understood by scientists as parts of vast, interrelated ecological complexes. It became increasingly apparent that scientific research must be undertaken for effective park management. The natural history presented too many questions, too many unknowns.

By the 1960s, scientists inside and outside the National Park Service renewed George Wright's efforts to integrate science into park management. This time, the scientists sought a modern definition of the basic purpose of the large natural parks. Early in the '60s, a National Academy of Sciences study described the parks as a "system of interrelated plants, animals and habitat" and said they were to be regarded as "biological banks." As other landscapes in the country were being altered, the national parks were increasingly important as ecological remnants. More than ever, they required management based upon intensive scientific research to assure preservation of the ecological systems. Management chiefly preoccupied with maintaining scenery was not sufficient.

In 1963, a special advisory board chaired by University of California professor A. Starker Leopold, one of the premier biologists of his time, issued the most influential statement on park management since the 1916 act establishing the National Park Service. The Leopold Report emphasized the need for improved ecological management and advocated that each of the large natural parks should present a particular "scene" or "view" of primitive America. The biotic associations within each park, it said, should be "maintained, or where necessary recreated, as nearly as possible in the condition that prevailed when the area was first visited by the white man."

Even as environmental stress on the parks increases, they are assuming yet another vital scientific role. The critical worldwide reduction of biological diversity has brought sharper focus to the concept of national parks as biological laboratories and "gene pools." Although seriously altered in many respects, parks are still among the least disturbed natural areas. Therefore, scientists increasingly view the large natural parks as important to the biological health of the planet — reservoirs of genetic material and islands of naturalness provided

baseline information against which manipulated landscapes can be tested for irreversible change or loss of species.

Whether the increasing scientific importance of the parks will be supported by the public remains an open question. Scenery has long provided the primary inspiration for national parks and, through tourism, their primary economic justification. Despite the environmental movement of the 1960s and 1970s, facade management based largely on aesthetic considerations is still acceptable to many people. Pretty scenery creates an impression of biological health and provides such overwhelming satisfaction that the general public gives little more than cursory consideration to the parks' greater ecological complexities. Few visitors can recognize when certain animal populations are too great or too small, or whether trees and mammals (much less shrubs, grasses, and insects) are native or not. And even when human-caused ecological damage is explained to park visitors, the new conditions are often accepted as simply "another change in the scenery."

Thus, while provocative issues such as the Yellowstone fire or proposals to dam rivers in parks create intense public interest because they might affect tourism and the scenery, repeated calls for expanded, research programs (essential for sound ecological management) receive little attention or support outside the environmental community. That is a major reason why park research programs have never been fully realized, why the National Park Service has not been a leading practitioner of scientific management and why the parks continue to be biologically out of balance.

Today, when tourists go to Yellowstone, they will be confronted more than ever by the ecological story behind the facade. In a sense, the fire itself — by burning off some of the scenery — has revealed and clarified the regenerative processes of natural systems. But to what degree an increased ecological understanding might change people's attitudes is questionable. Scenery has challenged traditional views of park management for more than half a century, yet interest in the scenery — the national parks as pretty places to visit — continues to dwarf real concerns for the parks' ecological systems and the threats they face.

S. Korea arrests dissident, backers

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — The government arrested a dissident clergyman Thursday on the plane that brought him home from an illegal trip to North Korea and detained about 1,000 people who protested the action.

Intelligence agents boarded a commercial flight from Tokyo and arrested the Rev. Moon Il-hwan, 71, for violating security laws by visiting communist North Korea and discussing reunification with President Kim Il Sung.

Officials said Moon would be questioned by the Agency for National Security Planning, the main intelligence agency.

Walesa for president?

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — Solidarity leader Lech Walesa said Thursday he was being pressured to run for office, but would only want to seek the newly created office of president of Poland.

Also on Thursday, Solidarity filed an application to register as a trade union after a seven-year ban. The application at the Warsaw Regional Court follows the historic agreement reached April 5 by the opposition and communist authorities to restore the union's legal status and allow independent candidates to run for parliament in June.

Walesa said he expects Solidarity to be registered by Monday and added: "Delaying our activities doesn't serve us and doesn't serve Poland."

He said he was being pressured to run in the elections, which the communists Thursday set for June 4, with run-off voting on June 18.

Walesa said later in a telephone interview that he would not run either for the newly created 100-member senate, which will be the first freely elected legislative chamber, or the existing 40-member Sejm, where the opposition can run for 35 percent of the seats.

Walesa said he expects Solidarity to be registered by Monday and added: "Delaying our activities doesn't serve us and doesn't serve Poland."

Panel probes Georgia beating claim

MOSCOW (AP) — A commission is investigating whether soldiers used shovels to beat nationalist demonstrators in Soviet Georgia during a clash in which 19 people died, a government spokesman said Thursday.

In the Georgian capital of Tbilisi, scene of the Sunday confrontation, an estimated 2,000 people marched through the streets for the first funeral for one of the victims, psychiatrist Zia Djinjaradze, 42, according to a local human rights activist.

Pravda, the Communist Party dai-

ly reported Georgian activists have changed their tactics in the face of Soviet troops keeping order in Tbilisi, and are handing out handwritten leaflets to press for a general strike. But a Soviet official said all of Tbilisi's enterprises were working.

The Georgian Communist Party's ruling Politburo met Thursday, but details of the session were not immediately available. Local party chief Dzhamber I. Pattashvili offered to resign Tuesday after accepting responsibility for Sunday's events.

Foreign Ministry spokesman Genady I. Gerasimov told a news briefing in Moscow that a commission investigating charges of brutality in Tbilisi was probing whether soldiers who broke up the protest by independence forces were in possession of short metal shovels customarily used for digging trenches.

The troops were not supposed to have those shovels, Gerasimov said. However, Gerasimov justified the decision to clear the square of protesters.

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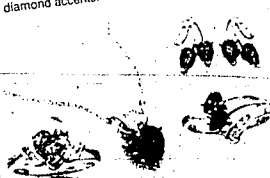

Judge kills charges against Dale Gilbert

Hart wrote. "Gilbert is and was an elected official of presumably good character."

Project tackles weeds

TWIN FALLS - Crested wheat grass is being introduced to the city's unsightly vacant lots to provide both form and function.

Not only are the weed-infested areas an eyesore, the owners incur considerable costs each year spraying or mowing down noxious weeds as the law requires.

But owners can reduce or eliminate those costs by establishing a stand of crested wheat grass or other cover crop

that crowds out the weeds, doesn't need watering and is a whole lot nicer to look at, said Bill Seoleyo, Twin Falls County weed inspector.

Seoleyo prepared a demonstration lot on Blake Street off Addison Avenue Thursday by killing the existing weeds. The cover grass will be seeded Monday or Tuesday.

The demonstration project is a joint venture by the city, the county and the Soil Conservation Service to promote economical, environmental and permanent

methods of controlling noxious weeds. Officials hope private landowners will see the benefits of wheat grass and follow suit.

The 17-acre former golf course behind the Weston Plaza Motel is one area that will be seeded this year, he said. The owner currently pays \$900 a year to keep the weeds under control.

Otter: Job figures hide low wages

TWIN FALLS - Idaho's rosy unemployment figures fail to tell the whole story. Lt. Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter said Thursday.

"There is one great soft spot in the state," he said during a noon speech to the Twin Falls Kiwanis Club. "It is not unemployment but underemployment. There are people all over the state who are qualified to work at \$15 an hour but are down at \$5 or \$7 an hour."

While the seasonally adjusted unemployment rate stands at 5.5 percent in the state, he estimated that underemployment may be as high as 25 percent.

"We're not moving forward as fast as we should," he said. "The private sector is not bringing in the sophisticated employer."

Generous education budgets approved by the 1989 Legislature should help attract employers who seek well-educated workers and are willing to pay good wages for them, he said. Lawmakers approved a \$38 million increase in the public schools budget and a \$115 million higher education appropriation.

Employment prospects are also being helped by what he sees as a new can-do attitude in the state during the three years he's been in office.

Ray: Science must get the word out

IDAHOO FALLS - The word on technology is not getting out to the public from the scientific community, said Dixy Lee Ray at the opening of the 31st annual Idaho Academy of Science symposium here Thursday.

"Our society today is based on knowledge," she said, not emotions, wishful thinking or hopes. "Technology has given the people of this country longer and healthier lives."

"With all the junk food and nuclear waste we still have a better country than most others in the world," Ray said. "It seems reasonable to expect the public to be grateful for the technology that has improved their lives."

She blames the media as well as the scientific community for the credibility gap between technology and the public.

People are bombarded by a "litany of doom and gloom" in newspapers, radio and television, she said. The problem, however, is that while people seem to believe those

opposing technology, no one seems to believe the scientists defending it.

The warnings that once came from the pulpit now come from alarmists who preach dire warnings of fire and brimstone and sulfurous fumes from modern industry.

Most people believe that cancer is caused by man-made chemicals irresponsibly produced by technology because "it's all they hear," she said.

Ray, former chairwoman of the U.S. Atomic Energy Commission and former governor of Washington State, told the auditorium full of scientists and engineers, "We must become informed about what those

who would destroy technology are up to."

She said that there is no scientific proof that global warming is caused by activities of man, or even that the 1 percent per year increase in atmospheric carbon dioxide is caused by burning of fossil fuels.

We don't know what causes dramatic climatic changes such as have occurred in the past, Ray said.

"It's time to look at this question with some sober common sense," she said. Scientists should approach warnings of global warming with the same skepticism they showed to room-temperature nuclear fusion recently revealed at the University of Utah.

Ray also said problems with chemical pesticides and nuclear energy have been misrepresented to the public.

"Nuclear medicine and agricultural chemicals have done more than anything else to improve people's lives in this country," she said.

Ray, who has a doctorate in marine biology from Stanford and 22 honorary doctorates, was the guest of honor at the three-day symposium.

Rupert mayor wants detention committee

RUPERT - The community here needs to join forces to find a solution for the county's need for a home for juveniles, Rupert Mayor Bill Whitton said.

Whitton said Thursday a citizens advisory committee should be formed and offered to help organize the group. The group should represent a cross-section of the town, including law enforcement people, city lead-

ers, representatives of the County Commission and some of the residents who object to the proposal.

The county has proposed locating the facility in a home in a Rupert residential area, prompting complaints from neighbors. About 100 people attended the Tuesday meeting of the Rupert Zoning Commission at City Hall, many to criticize the plan.

The commission delayed a decision, which could come as early as next week.

Whitton said an advisory committee

could help with this study. "It's a problem we all face," he said. "It isn't just the county. We're part of the county too."

The county is looking for juvenile facilities separate from the county jail to comply with federal mandates. "This isn't something to blame the county for, or blame the city for," Whitton said. ". . . and I think that somewhere down the line we have to figure out a solution to this problem. We can't bury our heads in the sand. . . . It won't go away on its own."

TWIN FALLS - The Library Expansion Advisory Panel concluded the first phase of its job Thursday, but many members became the first volunteers to sign up for the next phase - campaigning for a \$1.7 million bond issue to pay for the recommended expansion.

Library officials said a campaign crew of 100 will be needed to insure the panel's recommendation that the library's size be doubled becomes a reality.

But with more than half the population of Twin Falls, or 15,600 citizens, already library patrons, library officials say finding 100 shouldn't be a problem.

Library Director Arlan Call said he's already had a "dozen or so" calls.

Library Board member Anne Miles said the board plans to contact people who would be involved in the expansion panel but couldn't commit enough time. It also will

invite people who were nominated but not selected for Library Board positions.

In addition, about 15 panel members re-enlisted for the next phase, and one member handed Call a list of eight more names to ask.

The main body of volunteers will be divided into five committees, each with a specific task. Library Board Chairman Dennis Voorhees said volunteers probably will not be limited to the 100 listed as committee members; others will take up odd jobs as they come up.

Here's a list of the five committees and their duties:

- A "financial support committee" will solicit donations of both money and materials for such things as yards signs, postage and fliers.

- A "graphics and text committee" will be in charge of designing the signs, mailings, fliers, or other forms of advertising.

- A "media contacts committee" will be responsible for contacting the media and asking local businesses to dis-

play information.

- A "public presentations committee" will present information to service organizations and other groups. They could also organize and conduct public forums at the library.

- A "telephone and mailing committee" will be in charge of making sure people know about the referendum and calling people right before the voting day.

Tentatively, a leader from each of the committees, along with the Library Board and possibly library employees, will form a steering committee to oversee the campaign.

Call said the Library Board plans to have an architect and a financial adviser chosen by early May so they have at least six weeks to get dollar figures and a schematic design ready for the City Council.

Voorhees said the City Council probably will take up the issue at its June meeting. If the council approves, the bond election could be held in August.

Pratt cases now consolidated

SANDPOINT (AP)—The cases of two brothers accused of 18 felonies, including the murder of a U.S. Forest Service law enforcement officer, were consolidated Thursday in 1st District Court.

Bonifer County prosecutor Phil Robinson had asked Judge Watt Prather to combine the cases of James K. Pratt and Joseph Pratt, saying the brothers acted together in all the allegations.

They arrived at the Comeback Bay house together, they left together, Robinson said. The brothers were eventually found together, Robinson said. Defense attorneys, while saying it would be more practical for their

clients to have separate trials, raised no objections. No trial date has been set.

Prather is expected to rule later on a motion by defense attorney Jonathan Cottrell to dismiss charges of aggravated battery and attempted first-degree murder against James Pratt.

The charges against James Pratt stem from an Jan. 11 attack on Mark Palaniuk, one of nine people at the home of Lee Turner on Comeback Lane in Sagle. Both brothers are accused of burglarizing the home and attempting to take one person hostage before fleeing into the woods. Palaniuk received gunshot wounds

to the head and leg during a struggle at the house. Jonathan Cottrell, one of several dozen law enforcement officers called out to track the suspects, was killed in a shoot-out with two men about eight miles west of Dover. The Pratts surrendered at a Wreco Loop residence about an hour later.

In his motion for dismissal of the charges, Cottrell argued there is no evidence that James Pratt committed the offenses.

Prather said he will hear discussion on several motions in the case Thursday.

BPA resists accelerated repayment scheme proposed by administration

SALEM, Ore. (AP)—The head of the Bonneville Power Administration said Wednesday that the BPA must keep making full annual payments on its federal debt to protect itself from efforts to speed up the repayment schedule.

The Bush administration had proposed collecting \$550 million annually in increased payments on the BPA's debt to help reduce the federal budget deficit.

BPA Administrator Jim Jura said he was pleased by a report from Oregon Sen. Alrick Hatfield Tuesday that the proposal was dead for this year. Previous attempts by the Reagan administration to alter the repayment schedule also were killed by Congress.

The BPA estimates that speeding up payments to the federal treasury could drive up electricity rates 39 percent and perhaps as much as 61 percent in the Pacific Northwest and could cost the region 13,400 jobs.

Hatfield, the ranking Republican of the Senate Appropriations Committee, said the proposal never received serious consideration this year.

But Jura said the continuing debate over repayment of the BPA's debt underscores the need for the BPA to operate in a fiscally conservative and responsible manner.

The region's congressional delegation was emphasized that the BPA must make full annual payments on the federal debt in order for the senators and representatives to hold the line in budget negotiations on the repayment schedule, Jura said.

The BPA paid the federal treasury \$688 million last year, including \$383 million in interest and \$194 million in principal. The payment was the BPA's fifth straight full annual pay-

ment on its debt. The power marketing agency has instituted a number of cost-saving measures over the past several years to help hold the line on electricity rates and meet its debt obligation.

The agency operates a series of dams in the Northwest and markets the bulk of the hydroelectric power produced in the region.

In remarks to the council, Jura said the BPA was continuing its efforts to control costs in order to give it more flexibility in meeting regional energy needs.

He said the Northwest remains the nation's leader in efforts to conserve energy and that the BPA's conservation program has saved 400 megawatts of power, enough to serve a city two-thirds the size of Portland. The BPA currently spends \$85 million each year on conservation, he said.

"We're making every kilowatt count," Jura said.

Jura said a new 10-year agreement to spill water over four dams on the Columbia and Snake rivers to help enhance fish runs would have a positive impact on BPA planning.

The agreement, signed this week and endorsed Wednesday by the council, will keep the BPA out of costly litigation over protecting migrating fish, he said.

Jura said the council's leadership in bringing together state and federal fish and wildlife agencies, Indian tribes, utilities and the BPA on the spill agreement proved the value of regional cooperation in energy planning.

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers has agreed, for this year only, to allow more water to spill through Lower Monumental, Ice Harbor, John Day and The Dalles dams to aid mi-

grating salmon and steelhead. The corps, which operates the dams, has reserved judgment on whether it will go along with the 10-year plan in future years.

Without spills at the dams, fish are forced through the turbines and many are killed. Spilling the water instead of running it through the turbines is costly for the BPA, which otherwise could use the water to generate electricity for sale outside the Northwest.

The spill agreement is intended to serve the needs of the migrating fish until bypass networks are installed at the dams.

Also Wednesday, the council voted to draft a letter to the region's congressional delegation calling for action to curtail a driftnet fishery in the northern Pacific Ocean.

The council heard a presentation on the fishery by Guy Thornburgh of the Pacific Marine Fisheries Commission in Portland. Thornburgh said, fishing fleets from Taiwan, Japan and Korea use drift nets, allegedly intended to catch squid, to land thousands of salmon and steelhead otherwise bound for Northwest waters.

Thornburgh said the nets also capture tuna, sharks, and marine birds and mammals, including whales and porpoises.

He said the fleets deploy 20,000 miles of the nylon nets — enough to stretch across the United States a half-dozen times — every night.

Environmentalists say the incidental catch is destroying the variety of species in the ocean. Fishing interests in the Northwest say the expansion process of rebuilding regional salmon and steelhead stocks is being sidetracked by the drift net fishery.

HEYBURN - Heyburn this week officially received its \$32,512 grant for an engineering study of its wastewater treatment system.

Nile Bohon, councilman in charge of recreation, has had a few applications, but will discuss the hiring with a Paul city councilman before making the final decision. - Noted that the tennis court surface needs repairing or replacing and decided to check into replacing the backdrop at the baseball diamond.
- Put Councilman Nile Bohon in charge of working with the Minidoka County Centennial Commission to plan a boat parade as part of the Centennial celebration.

Discussion on INEL restrained

BOISE (AP) - There were no chants, no demonstrations and no new ground was broken during a fast-paced discussion on the future of the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory sponsored by a Boise television station.

Six panelists thrashed out the pros and cons of new weapons materials projects planned for the INEL Wednesday night in the first of a series of "town hall meetings" planned by KTUV Channel 7.

The U.S. Department of Energy wants to build the Special Isotope Separation project to refine plutonium and a New Production Reactor to make tritium at the sprawling nuclear and research reservation west of Idaho Falls.

With 2 million cubic feet of plutonium-contaminated waste buried at the INEL and 25,000 nuclear warheads in the nation's stockpile, "we simply do not need to add to our arsenal," said Liz Paul, executive director of the Snake River Alliance.

The nation is at a crossroads in its weapons factories and it's time to

start cleaning up the messes there, she said.

Tom Gesell, director of the INEL environmental laboratory, argued that equal priority has to be given to cleanup and production.

"We cannot afford not to (do both)," added Charles Gilmore, director of external affairs at INEL. He earlier said the Soviets have 12 reactors producing plutonium and tritium and the United States currently has none operating.

Mark Stubbs, Twin Falls County Republican chairman and a lawyer representing VOTE on INEL, said traditional methods of communication with elected officials are not working on the nuclear weapons issue.

Stubbs advocated using political leverage to push for a faster cleanup. "By that end, VOTE is asking for a delay in building the SIS,"

Jim Reed of Idaho Falls, executive director of Citizens for INEL, countered that it's "a terrible mistake" for VOTE to try to halt the national defense "hostage."

Government hearings last year on the SIS and the NFR were marked by demonstrations complete with chanting of slogans by project foes and supporters, and theatrical displays by witnesses.

No rendition or displays of support were heard Wednesday night from an audience of 78 in Stage II of the Morrison Center for the Performing Arts. Invited to represent all points of view, audience members first questions at the panelists along with the KTUV moderator.

The discussion was interspersed with news reports on the INEL and the projects, which are to modernize the Energy Department's beleaguered weapons materials complex.

"We have had a nuclear deterrent for the last 45 years which has kept this country 'out of World War III,'" said Gilmore.

"There's not enough morality" in the decision-making, countered the Rev. Thomas Faucher, pastor of Sacred Heart Catholic Church in Boise.

Work on 1990 census begins

TWIN FALLS - The next nationwide census is still a year away, but the U.S. Department of Commerce is already working to get its message out.

It's important for everyone to participate.

Census information is used to distribute \$38 billion in federal money annually, said census publicist Val Thomas, who visited Twin Falls this week. It will be used to draw up legislative districts, both for Congress

and the state Legislature. And private businesses use census data to locate manufacturing plants and retail stores and shape marketing strategies.

On April 1, 1990, the Census Bureau will mail questionnaires to every household in the United States. Census takers will only go door-to-door in the most remote areas.

Five out of six households will be asked to answer 14 questions providing such basic information as age, race and gender of household members. Other households will receive a

longer form with additional questions about income, ancestry, occupation, education and housing costs.

Nationwide, the Commerce Department will hire about 470,000 people and spend \$2.6 billion. While none of the three Idaho field offices will be in the Magic Valley, some local census workers will be hired here, Thomas said.

Census workers have already done a preliminary survey of area addresses and will check addresses again in August.

Castleford swears in new councilmember

"The council is very determined to clean up the city in commemoration of the state's upcoming Centennial by enforcing all ordinances that deal with cleaning up areas of the town," City Clerk Patsy Kinyon said.

All city lots are to be cleaned of weeds, grass and rubbish by June 1 of each year, according to city ordinance. The city can clean the lots of those who do not comply and charge the cost to the owners.

The council voted to provide gravel to the Castleford Future Farmers of

America for the group's community project. The FFA will replace the dirt in front Main Street businesses with gravel to reduce the dust problem in the city.

Also, in preparation for the state's Centennial, the FFA will place planters with flowers along Main Street.

In other business:

- The council decided to purchase a new Idaho flag for the city and, two firemen-training manuals to donate to the city's volunteer fire department.
- The council will check into new insurance companies to provide the city's insurance.
- City Council meetings will move to Tuesday nights until October. The next meeting will be at 8 p.m. on May 9.

Experts caution practical fusion is at least 20-30 years away

PITTSBURGH (AP) - Generating electricity by combining atoms in a fusion reaction may still be a generation or more away despite exciting new laboratory results, according to the U.S. leader in nuclear power.

Two top officials of Westinghouse Electric Corp. also say that if fusion ever reaches commercial use, it may pose significant radiation hazards although probably not as severe as those from splitting atoms in fission reactors.

"Fusion is not a piece of cake," said J. Robert Maxwell, manager of strategic programs for Westinghouse's energy business. "If this turns out to be successful, then we'll switch to fusion. Then we'll have to find the new demons and solve them."

Nonetheless, Maxwell and the company's top scientist said reports from the University of Utah, Georgia Tech and Texas A&M of what appears to be a cold fusion process may bring a tidal shift in energy production, but not anytime soon.

"As a rule of thumb, we'd say it's probably 20 to 30 years away," said Maxwell. "It's virtually a test tube experiment, a benchtop experiment."

Westinghouse has built or licensed its technology for about half the world's commercial nuclear reactors, or 177 units.

The three universities have not even demonstrated a theory of how the process works.

"They have developed an experiment which suggests there is a principle that can be demonstrated," Maxwell said. "Probably it is an advance... but it causes us some problems of its own that we have not explored."

Fusion could eliminate the problem of spent radioactive fuel that must be sealed indefinitely. But fusion may have to take place behind, heavy shielding to protect power plant employees, and it may irradiate power plant components to the point where they must be handled like radioactive scrap from today's fission plants, he said.

The Pittsburgh-based company signed an agreement Tuesday with the University of Utah for access to the research on condition the information remain under wraps.

Westinghouse will evaluate Utah's patent applications while searching for commercial applications for its fusion experiment, R. D. "Dee" Haun Jr., Westinghouse's chief scientist, said Wednesday in an interview.

"It's very tantalizing," said Haun, who describes himself as an enthusiastic skeptic about cold fusion.

Utah's chemistry department chairman, B. Stanley Pons, and his colleague, Martin Fleischmann of the University of Southampton, England, announced March 23 that they had replicated at room temperature the process that powers the sun and hydrogen bombs.

Amid great skepticism among scientists, Georgia Tech and Texas A&M said this week that their separate ex-

periments appear to confirm the work of Fleischmann and Pons.

They passed electricity through palladium while the metal was immersed in heavy water, which differs from regular water in that its hydrogen component has a heavier nucleus than the lone proton at the heart of a regular hydrogen atom.

"The heavy hydrogen atoms bond in pairs to form a bigger atom that releases energy in the form of speeding neutrons as it deteriorates, Haun said.

"Unfortunately, that's as far as classical explanations will get you," he said Wednesday in his Churchill office.

The experiments do not precisely fit existing fusion theories because far fewer energy-bearing neutrons are being detected than predicted, Haun said.

"But if this works like high-temperature fusion, it could generate a lot of neutrons, comparable to the number of neutrons in fission and those neutrons are going to activate the surroundings. So you'd have a waste disposal problem, a shielding problem," he said.

However, the neutrons detected in the lab experiments appear to be roughly 10 billion times fewer than commercial fission, Haun said.

A Westinghouse scientist began work March 24 trying to duplicate the Utah experiment. Results so far are inconclusive, he said.

Yellowstone symposium addresses fire policy, future of national park

LARAMIE, Wyo. (AP) - Ecology and politics shared the stage Thursday as participants in a symposium on the future of Yellowstone National Park rekindled the debate that was lit during the historic fires of 1988.

The fires that charred about 1 million acres of the first national park drew attention to the shortcomings of management plans in the park and surrounding national forests.

"The attention of the world conservation community is focused on the park," Yellowstone Superintendent Bob Barbee told thousands at the University of Wyoming conference.

His goal is to develop a more ambitious control of the ecosystem to oversee both the park and the forests.

Barbee said a commitment to innovative management practices have been the greatest accomplishment of the park and forest managers in the past 20 years.

He said the managers of the Greater Yellowstone area must concentrate on protecting the integrity of the area's natural resources, while maintaining the economic activities in the forests.

"These are easy things to say. They're hard things to achieve," Barbee said. "Our job is to cast a vote for posterity."

He noted that this week's conference may not offer any solutions but it will help move the discussion along. About 300 people from across the nation traveled to Wyoming to present research papers, participate in debate and listen to speakers.

Wyoming Gov. Mike Sullivan started the discussion on a political note. He said cooperation among state and federal agencies in managing and promoting Yellowstone is being sorely tested by a Bush administration proposal to fund last summer's firefighting efforts with the state's share of federal mineral royalties.

"Bluntly stated, this idea is feudalism and not federalism. Western states are not vassals on some vast medieval estate owned by absentee landlords in Washington, but this proposal would treat us as such," Sullivan said.

The governor said he has urged this "ill-conceived idea" be reconsidered.

"And I would hope that George Bush's vision of a kinder and gentler nation does not envision burning someone's backyard and then charging them for the privilege," he said.

Brian Stout, supervisor of the Bridger-Teton National Forest, agreed that state officials need to be more involved in planning the future of the Greater Yellowstone area.

He said the many different demands on the federal land in north-

western Wyoming make it tough to plan ahead.

It is the diversity of demands upon this that are creating the conflicts," Stout said. "Conflicts aren't going to go away because we aren't creating any more acres."

The forest supervisor said he does not agree with some groups that say the Yellowstone area should have one management plan. Currently there are many government mandates controlling the use of public land in the area.

Georgia researchers discover glitches in fusion verification

ATLANTA (AP) - Researchers at Georgia Tech said Thursday their experiment apparently confirming "cold" nuclear fusion may have been skewed by inaccuracies in a key piece of equipment.

The five-person team, in a joint statement released by the school, said they intended to work round-the-clock to determine if the equipment caused the experiment results to be in error.

"It's not as sure a thing as it was," senior researcher James Mahaffey said in an interview Thursday night. "It seemed like a sure thing. Now, I'm getting nervous."

The researchers announced Monday that a chemistry experiment detected the emission of subatomic neutron particles at room temperatures, a sure sign of fusion, when nuclei of one element were forced into another substance.

Normally, a nuclear fusion reaction requires extreme temperatures and pressures, fusion at low temperatures could mean a cheap, clean and nearly inexhaustible power source.

The experiment - and another announced Monday by researchers at Texas A&M University - appeared

to confirm a March 23 reaction obtained by B. Stanley Pons, a chemist at the University of Utah.

At the time, Pons said he had tried but failed to detect neutrons in his experiment and hailed the Georgia Tech results as "a real breakthrough." The announcements touched off a flurry of scientific comment worldwide.

But late Thursday, the Georgia Tech team announced that the Georgia Tech team had discovered the probe used to detect the emission of neutrons. The researchers said the probe may not be reliable at the low temperatures used in the experiment.

"We are concerned about the apparent temperature dependence of the neutron probe we are using," said a statement released by the team. "We have found unexpected temperature effects on the neutron counter at low counting rates."

Mahaffey said the probe - made of boron trifluoride - was also being used by scientists at Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory in Livermore, Calif. Those researchers also noticed false readings caused by heat.

"He noticed the count rate going up when he put his fist around it (the probe)," Mahaffey said. "Then they put a hair dryer on it - the count rate went up by a factor of 10."

He said he then put the Georgia Tech probe in a glass of hot water, and the count rate went up by a factor of two - when it should have measured only background neutron emissions.

Mahaffey said Tech researchers had started another experiment with strictly controlled temperatures and a new neutron detector to find out how much effect heat may have on the probe. Results may not be known for days, he said.

"No one has ever detected this type of problem before," Mahaffey said. "But no one has ever tried to count such low levels of neutrons before." University of Utah spokeswoman Pam Fogel said Pons was unavailable for comment late Thursday, but that he and other Utah scientists likely would encourage their counterparts at Georgia Tech to continue their research.

"We would be looking forward to any results they have that they will be more comfortable with," she said.

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Judge orders stay in death sentence

BOISE (AP) — A federal judge here has blocked next week's scheduled execution of a Canyon County slayer, in part because of a recent ruling in an Arizona murder case.

Donald Kenneth Fetterly, 32, Caldwell, was scheduled to be executed next Friday for a 1983 robbery-murder.

Thursday afternoon, U.S. District Judge Marion Callister granted a stay while he considers Fetterly's petition for habeas corpus on constitutional grounds.

The court has reviewed the entire record, and due to the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals recent decision in Adams versus Ricketts (the Arizona case) believes a stay of execution is in order so the court may consider the petition in more detail, the judge ordered.

Although it runs contrary to the latest U.S. Supreme Court finding, the 9th Circuit overturned the Arizona death sentence because it was imposed by a judge, not a jury.

Idaho has a similar law, requiring a judge to weigh aggravating and mitigating circumstances before deciding whether to impose the death penalty.

However, the latest Idaho Supreme Court rulings ignored the 9th Circuit ruling and cited the U.S. Supreme Court's approval in upholding Idaho's system of allowing a judge to decide death penalty cases.

Albert Ray Beam, 26, also has asked U.S. District Court in Boise for a stay of his execution, scheduled early next Friday, on similar grounds. Beam was ordered to die for the 1983 rape-murder of a 13-year-old Nampa girl.

Fetterly received a death sentence for the 1983 Canyon County slaying of Sterling Grammer, 45, Caldwell. He was convicted of breaking into Grammer's home, binding him with duct tape, robbing and then stabbing him to death. Accomplice Karla Windsor also was sentenced to death but the Idaho Supreme Court later commuted it to life imprisonment.

Idaho Solicitor General Lynn Thomas earlier filed "anticipatory briefs," before the petitions of habeas corpus were presented by Fetterly and Beam. They urged the federal judges in Boise not to grant a stay of execution, because the U.S. Supreme Court was likely to overturn the appeals court ruling.

Callister also ruled that Fetterly was entitled to file his appeal without paying the usual fees, and appointed Van Bishop of Nampa as his court-appointed attorney. Bishop has been representing Fetterly in his various appeals.

New system idles 45 Simplot workers

ABERDEEN (AP) — Installation of a system to remove defects from french fries has idled 45 employees at J.R. Simplot Co.'s potato processing plant in Aberdeen.

The plant was shut down in mid-March for three weeks and reopened Friday. It is the last of Simplot's potato facilities to get the \$1 million piece of equipment aimed at improving efficiency and product quality in the past five years, said plant manager Ben Strand.

"We require less people to trim the defects out of the potato. The machine does that for us," Strand said. "It's a system that's installed in french fry lines all over the world. We were at a competitive disadvantage because we didn't have this. It's as good a system as anyone's."

He said Simplot hopes to start up a new retail line at Aberdeen in about 45 days. That would allow the company to call back about 25 employees. "It's just a matter of time before we do that," Strand said.

UI students kill fee increase request

MOSCOW (AP) — University of Idaho students have voted almost 2 to 1 against a proposal for school administrators to ask the state Board of Education for a fee increase of up to \$30 per semester.

Out of more than 8,000 eligible students, just over 1,200 voted in a referendum Wednesday to oppose UI administrators' attempts to hold hearings on fee hikes. There were 820 votes against considering a fee increase and 436 supporting the idea.

"Something has to give somewhere," UI President Richard Gibb said Thursday. "Either we have to get more revenue in this case through student fees or we have to find the money from other program areas to address accreditation issues, or some combination."

Magistrate upholds closure of hearing

COEUR DALENE (AP) — A court magistrate has reaffirmed his decision not to release preliminary hearing records in a sexual-misconduct case against a Coeur d'Alene High School teacher.

First District Court Magistrate Eugene Marano said Wednesday that the record would remain closed because releasing the information might psychologically harm the victim and would jeopardize Larry Isitt's right to a fair trial.

Judge James Judd had ordered Marano to reconsider his decision after Cowles Publishing Co., which publishes daily newspapers in Spokane, Wash., objected in the closure of the preliminary hearing.

Isitt, 42, was charged March 7 with attempted statutory rape of a 17-year-old girl who was one of his students.

Symms pushes repeal of Section 89

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Steve Symms is pushing for the repeal of a section of the federal tax code he says discourages employers from offering health insurance and other benefits to their workers.

Section 89 of the Internal Revenue Code, part of the 1986 tax-reform package, requires employers to test certain payroll benefits annually to determine if they favor higher-paid workers over those making less money. But rather than deal with the complexity of complying with the law,

many employers have decided to offer no benefits, said the Idaho Republican.

Authorities identify body in canal

FORT HALL (AP) — A body found in the Hiline Canal near Pocatello on Monday has been identified as that of Theodora Nevada of the Fort Hall Indian Reservation, authorities said.

Clem Hidalgo, an investigator for the Fort Hall Police, said Thursday that an autopsy indicated the 21-year-old woman had been shot in the head. Officials were notified of Ms. Nevada's disappearance on Feb. 24.

Hidalgo would not say whether her death is being considered a homicide.

"We're treating it as a criminal investigation at this time," he said. "Until we can further determine the cause of death, I'd feel comfortable leaving it at that."

Coeur d'Alene school to close fountain

COEUR DALENE (AP) — Coeur d'Alene School District officials have announced they will shut down a high school drinking fountain they fear may have been built using leaded components.

Tom Vopat, the district's director of support services, said the fountain was built by one of three manufacturers listed by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency as using leaded components, which may result in high levels of lead in the water.

The EPA says Halsey Taylor, EBCO Manufacturing Co. and Sunroc Corp. have manufactured water tanks using leaded parts. Vopat said he still has not received written recommendations from the agency on the fountains and does not know when to expect them.

Salmon gets money for water system

BOISE (AP) — The city of Salmon will receive a loan of \$1.15 million and a \$322,000 grant from the Farmers Home Administration to upgrade its water treatment system.

The grant and loan will improve distribution and treatment for the 1,600-customer city water system, said Sen. James McClure, R-Idaho.

Last summer, state health officials recommended boiling Salmon's domestic water because of the possibility that an intestinal bacteria had entered the system. State officials gave the city three years to bring the system into compliance.

Man wounded in drive-by shooting

MOSCOW (AP) — A man in his mid-30s was wounded Wednesday night in an apparent robbery attempt at a car wash, police said.

Moscow Police Detective Jake Kershnik said the victim, whose name was not released, was listed in stable condition at Grifman Memorial Hospital in Moscow.

Details of the shooting were sketchy late Wednesday.

Kershnik said the victim was washing his car at the Mercer Car Wash at about 8:30 p.m. when another vehicle pulled in with two people. One of them shot the victim in the side. Police had no suspects Wednesday night, but were looking for an older model green Chevrolet.

Depredation claims climb to total of 6

BOISE (AP) — The number of claims against state funds for wildlife damage to farms last winter has climbed to six, but the average requested has fallen off considerably.

The Legislature appropriated \$500,000 to cover damage to farms from wildlife between July 1 of last year and next June 1. Damage in the last six months of 1988 will get first priority.

The first two claims were for more than \$250,000, but the last four combined seek less than \$5,000.

State Auditor J.D. Williams, who is processing the claims in his capacity as secretary to the Board of Examiners, said Thursday J.R. "Rich" Cornell, Boise, has asked for \$500, for fence damage at Mayfield in Elmore County caused by 300 head of elk.

Theo Smith, Preston, filed a claim for \$3,000 for loss of forage and damaged hay due to deer and elk.

E.W. Ward, Hamer, became the third Jefferson County farm rancher to file a claim. He seeks \$350 for lost forage.

Blaine Collett, Oreana, seeks \$2,000 in damages he said was caused by deer coming off desert range onto his property.

The largest claim, just under \$300,000, was filed by Randall and Luanwella Barney, Montevideo, for loss of hay at \$110 per ton.

Russell Mays, Howe, asked for \$121,480 for loss of hay at \$100 per ton, fence damage and loss of forage and equipment.

Williams said he is forwarding the claims to the Fish and Game Department for investigation as soon as he gets them.

The deadline for applying for payment for 1988 damage is May 1, and Williams said it might not be possible to get the claims investigated by the Fish and Game Department in time for consideration at the May Board of Examiners meeting.

The deadline for filing claims between Jan. 1 and June 1 of this year is June 1.

DOE plan to shift funds draws House opposition

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. Department of Energy wants to shift \$11 million to continue testing technology for the plutonium-refining Special Isotope Separation project, but one congressman has criticized the plan.

The DOE has requested the funding through two House subcommittees, saying the money is needed to continue SIS research at California's Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory. The tests would precede construction and operation of the plant at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

But Rep. Albert Bustamante, D-Texas, a past opponent of SIS, asked the House Armed Services Committee on Wednesday to withhold approval of the funding shift, which he said would cut \$2.4 million from waste cleanup and environmental budgets.

"There is plenty of evidence that the money could be used to address the environmental problems facing the production complex," Bustamante said in a letter to Armed Services Chairman Les Aspin, D-Wis. "This reprogramming only serves to perpetuate the public perception that DOE is insensitive to the environment."

But Phil Hamric, DOE-Idaho's SIS project manager, said the INEL would remain "well funded" on waste cleanup budgets.

Nearly half of the funding shift — \$5 million — would come from the

SIS construction budget. It would cut 1989 SIS construction spending from \$28 million to \$23 million.

Another \$2.4 million would come from a budget for a canined waste storage bin at the INEL. But Hamric said the storage bin was finished, properly and came in \$2.4 million under budget. The bin is the seventh unit built to handle radioactive waste processed at the Idaho Chemical Processing Plant.

Hamric expects tests on the SIS technology to continue for another nine months. The DOE hopes to complete research on time to begin major SIS construction in Idaho during the 1989-90 budget year.

DOE headquarters approved the funding shift in January, but it was held so it could be included in an omnibus reprogramming of the DOE budget, Hamric said.

"We're hoping that that gets approved this month," Hamric said.

Web tightens around Rose

On the afternoon of March 31, two special agents from the FBI and IRS met in a Franklin, Ohio, law office with Ron Peters, 37, a tavern owner who has been identified by his lawyer as the "principal bookmaker" for Cincinnati Reds Manager Pete Rose.

Federal authorities already had evidence that Peters had distributed cocaine, made a false statement on a tax return and failed to report \$80,000 in gambling and bookmaking earnings. Four days later, Peters would announce his intention to plead guilty to these charges. But on this afternoon, the FBI and IRS agents seemed less concerned with Peters than with Rose.

"The FBI and IRS are interested in Pete Rose's relationship to his cronies," said a source familiar with the meeting. "The government wants to know what information these cronies can provide about Pete Rose."

After questioning Peters, the FBI and IRS agents left the law office through the front door, unnoticed by a network TV camera crew outside. Not wanting to be filmed, Peters climbed out of a rear window, walked briskly to his car and sped off — safe from the 6 o'clock news.

Jury convicts agents of racketeering

CHICAGO — A federal court jury Thursday convicted sports agents Norby Walters and Lloyd Bloom of defrauding two universities by using cash to lure college athletes into signing improper contracts, and of threatening to harm clients at other schools if they tried to renege.

The jury deliberated 40 hours over six days before convicting Walters, 58, and Bloom, 29, both based in New York, on charges of racketeering, conspiracy, racketeering conspiracy and mail fraud.

They each face up to 65 years in prison and fines of up to \$1.25 million.

Bloom was in tears and Walters looked downcast as the verdicts were. Attorneys for both men promised to appeal the guilty verdicts.

"We'll take them in the next round," Walters said. "We'll be vindicated."

U.S. Attorney Anton Valukas called the trial a "war for both sides," but he said there was a message in the verdicts.

"I think the message is that the federal criminal laws apply across the board," Valukas said.

ISU signs 2 JC basketball players

Second-year ISU coach starts from scratch

Second in a series

Editor's note: This is the second in a three-part series profiling the spring prospects of Idaho's Big Sky Conference football teams.

POCATELLO — Idaho State University's football team, coming off an 0-11 season, started over this spring — probably a little more so than second-year coach Garth Hall had in mind.

Hall, who got the ISU job two days before Christmas in 1987 and thus missed out on the last recruiting season, brought in 11 junior college transfers and will add 13 freshmen in the fall to try to staunch the slide in a program that has lost 27 of its last 33 games and hasn't had a winning season since 1983.

Then earlier this week — three weeks into ISU's four-week spring drills — Hall's top assistant, Walt Criner, quit to take a high school coaching job in California.

"I'm sorry to see Walt leave," said Hall, who must search for a head assistant coach and a running backs coach. "It was a difficult decision for him and the timing is difficult for us."

Difficult indeed. Idaho State finished next-to-last in total offense and dead last total defense in the Big Sky Conference a year ago, so Hall threw all 24 positions up for grabs this spring and is still trying to sort out the consequences.

"We have to improve in every aspect of

our system. We don't have a lot of depth this spring, but we have some JC transfers coming in the fall."

If the season began tomorrow, Hall said he would start Jay Ferguson, a junior college transfer from Snow College, at center; senior Tyson Cole and 333-pound senior Dave Buchanan, a converted tackle, at guard, and JC transfer Brad Heidelberg, from California's Fullerton Community College, and sophomore Reed Payne, a transfer from the University of Idaho, at tackle. Cole and Buchanan are the only returning starters.

"In the offensive line, we've moved the players around because of depth, but it should solidify," said Hall. "The development of the entire team hinges on pass protection, and I'm confident we'll accomplish that."

Running back — This was Criner's specialty and the weakest spot in the Bengals' offense a year ago.

"This is a key area," said Hall. "Because of people new to the program and injuries, it was a disappointing area (last year). We have nine running backs in spring ball and we have room for six, so I expect some keen competition. We can't have a performance here like we had last year, which is why we moved Walt Criner to running backs coach (from the offensive line) to solidify the coaching."

The frontrunners at the moment are Chris Smith, a senior and a sometime starter last year who rushed for 218 yards and caught 12 passes for 122 yards; and

Pono Hussey, a transfer from Ricks College. Hussey had been held out of the first two weeks of workouts with a shoulder injury, but made a quick impression upon his return.

"Running back is the area with the most question marks and the area that has to come along and they're playing much better," said Hall.

Wide receiver and tight end — Twin Falls' Todd Jones and Jerome's Torrey Sheets accounted for 50 of ISU's 223 receptions last year and 71 of the Bengals'.

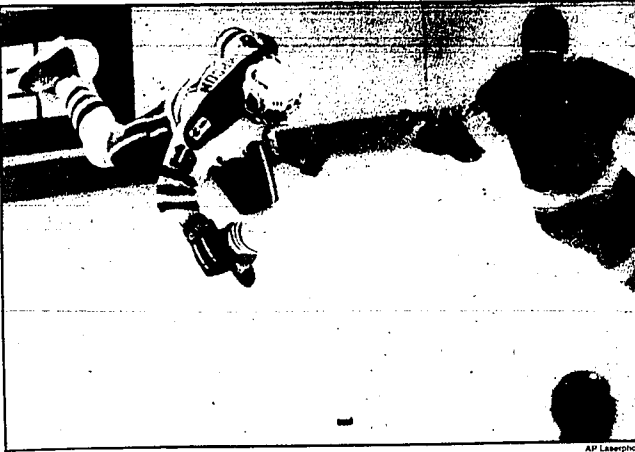

Mike Allison pulled the Kings into a 1-1 tie with a tremendous effort on a wraparound for his first goal of the

playoffs with 3:38 left in the second period.

Allison battled Gregg into the right corner, lost a glove while mucking for the puck and then, with Gregg clinging to him the whole time, worked around the net. Allison shot as he went down, beating Fuhr to the far side on Los Angeles' 16th shot of the game.

ASSESSING COOLANT

A change in seasons should prompt a check of a car's engine coolant. This procedure is easy to perform and should be done when the engine is shut off and cool. First, remove the radiator cap carefully and observe the condition of the fluid in the radiator. It should be clear and up to level. If it is muddied in appearance, it is beyond time to have it flushed and changed. With repeated cycles of heating and cooling, engine coolant changes to acid. In this state, continued use will lead to corrosion of the metal parts with which it comes in contact. Another way to assess the condition of antifreeze is to smell it. It should be sweet-smelling. An acid aroma indicates the need for replacement.

Now the baseball world is awaiting word on whether Pete Rose will be forced to make a re-entry word from the sport that has made him an American hero.

For several months, investigators from the IRS, FBI and Baseball Commissioner Bart Giamatti's office have been examining whether Rose — the all-time major-league hit leader — bet illegally on baseball and other sports and violated federal law by failing to declare income from gambling winnings, endorsement contracts and memorabilia sales.

In an affidavit unsealed in federal court in Cincinnati last week, an informant was quoted as saying that for an undisclosed period in 1987 a Cincinnati resident — identified as G-1 — wagered between \$2,000 and \$64,000 a week on unidentified sporting events. Two Ohio newspapers reported last week that G-1 was Pete Rose and that his bets were placed on major-league baseball games.

Baseball rules are clear: Any

league or club employee caught betting on the sport is suspended for one year. Anyone caught wagering on one's own team is banned for life. Although the rules do not address gambling on other sports, Giamatti likely would take a dim view of a club employee associating with a bookmaker.

Rose, whose stature grew to heroic proportions after he broke Ty Cobb's hit record in 1988, maintains his innocence. "Pete has told me, 'They have nothing on me whatsoever,'" Dave Rose, Pete's younger brother, said this week.

Although Pete Rose has acknowledged betting on horses and dogs, which is legal, he has denied wagering on sporting events, which is legal only in Nevada. But it is clear that he has at least wagered on football and basketball games, according to people close to him.

A business partner of Rose, former Reds bullpen catcher Gary Waits, told The Washington Post that Rose has spoken openly about his football and basketball betting.

Klimes, Hafer may be best young pair of bowlers in the entire state

Kelly Klimes and Preston Hafer claim they're just a couple of ordinary kids from Kimberly, but people from the bowling alleys across the state know that Klimes and Hafer are a special duo.

Both kids, like most bowlers their age, had lots of influence from their parents when they were urged at a young age to pick up a bowling ball and try to knock over some pins.

Klimes, the son of Raymond and Linda Klimes, has a lot of bowling background in his family. Both of his parents and his sister Krissy bowl and his mom works at the Bowldrome.

"I guess it was since I was about 4 or 5," said Klimes, when asked when he first picked up a bowling ball.

Since then, it's been a family affair when the Klimeses hit the alleys. It wasn't all that long ago when the Klimes clan was nominated by the Idaho Bowling Council as the Idaho Bowling Family of the Year.

While working at the Bowldrome, Linda is the coach of the youngsters during their time on the lanes.

senior — would be the starter at flanker if the Bengals season began tomorrow. But Hall brought in a number of candidates for the wideout positions, hoping to increase ISU's team speed.

The addition of junior college transfer Chris Schrade improves our speed, and, more importantly, our quickness," said Hall. "We expect a lot of him. He must learn our system quickly and take charge."

But as it stands now Schrade, a Highland High School graduate who spent the last two years at Ricks College, would play behind junior Joe Funk (13 catches, 212 yards) at split end.

At tight end, the apparent frontrunner is John Brown, a transfer from Snow College.

Quarterback — Junior Jason Whitmer and sophomore Joel Jund, a Twin Falls product, accounted for 2,516 yards passing last year, which was 82 percent of ISU's offensive production. But Hall was looking for improvement this spring, especially on ISU's 20 interceptions of last season.

"We must get more consistent play from our quarterbacks," he said. "Since they have a year in our program, they'll make strides. Jason Whitmer has worked hard this spring on getting the ball where it belongs. Last year his interceptions came when he threw into coverage. Joel Jund can come along substantially — much quicker than anticipated."

Defensive line — The inability to generate a pass rush consistently cost the Bengals 2,449 yards, 18 touchdowns and 11 losses last year.

The defensive line has played pretty well this spring, but we've lost some players — said Hall — "Junior defensive tackle Toben Moleka had back surgery and senior defensive tackle Rob Bunting had a leg injury and now has turf toe. Bunting guard Ivor Filaga (49 tackles, four sacks) and junior nose guard Jon Weeks (17 tackles) and the addition of sophomore Bruce Givens, who has been moved to tackle, give us four good people and Moleka would be five."

If the season began tomorrow, Hall would start Bunting and Givens at tackle and either Filaga or sophomore Tobe Smith at nose guard. Smith, the younger brother of University of Idaho defensive tackle Kord Smith, transferred from Moscow a year ago and red-shirted last season.

Manu and senior Donald Miller, who redshirted last season after transferring from Utah State, are projected at the inside linebacker position, while Mark Campbell, a junior transfer from Ricks, is penciled in at the outside position.

Secondary — Although the secondary was the strongest area of the Bengals' sputtering defense last year, Hall began the recruiting season in search of more depth.

Cornerback was one of our main recruiting concerns," he said. "It will be important to develop the secondary this spring. We have a lot of work to bring the secondary up to a winning level."

Senior Mike Marks, ISU's three-year starter at free safety, is the only full-time returnee, although senior strong safety Kirk Gerling-spilt time last year. Marks was the ISU's No. 3 tackler last year (92 tackles) and also returned punts.

At the moment, the leading candidates for cornerback are JC transfer Troy Koopman, from California's Los Angeles Valley Community College, and Terrill Johnson, a junior who transferred in from Sacramento, California's Citrus College and redshirted last season with an injury.

Kicking game — ISU's punting and placekicking were both shaky last fall, but Hall will go back to senior placekicker Matt Bombard, 7-for-11 in field goals in 1989.

"As always, we will emphasize special teams this spring," said Hall. "We will work on every phase of it. Redshirt (freshman) Alan Boling has to come on as our punter."

Magic Valley notes: Senior Roger Nebeker of Morthouse is one of seven candidates for the inside linebacker position, where he played a backup role last year. Sophomore Mark Conrad, a former Carey High School player and former ISU squad member, is one of the other hopefuls.

Jerome also won the 800-meter relay.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE BOBBY WOLFF

"Every man takes care that his neighbor shall not cheat him. But a dog does not when he begins to care that he does not cheat his neighbor. Then all goes well." - Emerson.

A player at the ACB Fall Champions asked me, "It is ethically correct for one player to draw inferences from an opponent's discomfort, why isn't it also ethical for that opponent to feign such discomfort?" This was the hand that brought on the question.

The lack of any long suit made the slam a stretch, but there were some chances. One declarer cashed four clubs, discarding a spade, and then cashed the ace and queen of hearts. Needing a spade trick regardless of whether else happened, South led a bold spade to the king, hoping to catch South there, taking the king and queen of diamonds and the king of hearts, giving East a discarding problem. Down to the spade A-9 and the diamond J-5, what should East discard on the heart king?

East's discomfort was obvious as he reluctantly parted with the spade nine. South continued by leading a spade, and dummy's A-9 of diamonds took the last two tricks.

My friend asked, "What if my last four cards were A-10-9 of spades and a singleton diamond jack? Would he have been art to show the one diamond discomfort?"

The answer is an emphatic "no," and the Laws are clear. A player may draw inferences, at his own variation in tempo. However, it is grossly improper to attempt to deliberately mislead an opponent by remark, gesture or tempo. (A typical example is to hesitate unduly before playing a singleton.)

Indian movie draws author's complaints

HOLLYWOOD — "Powwow Highway," the serio-comic film of a contemporary Cheyenne's quest to find his ancestral roots, has drawn some critical raves. But David Seals, who wrote the novel on which it is based, is complaining that the Warner Bros. release is "another Hollywood whitewash."

"It's not a bad movie," Seals said on the phone from South Dakota. "The cinematography is good and some of the acting is OK. But they took the magic out of it."

Seals, who said that he is descended from the Huron tribe, sold film rights to his unpublished novel in 1985 for \$10,000. (The film cost only \$3 million to make). He castigated director Jonathan Wacks for alleged insensitivities to American Indians, including shooting atop a sacred South Dakota butte.

Wacks said that the script was approved by a Cheyenne tribal chief and elder before shooting began and that the cast is primarily American Indian; Seals' wife and son both have roles.

Simmons works on musical

HOLLYWOOD — Filmmaker guru Richard Simmons is trying to put together a Broadway musical called "Lbs.," which would cast him as the son of an eccentric woman who inherits a fat farm. Twelve songs have already been written for the two-act show, including "The Last Supper" — a tribute to that final binge before serious dieting begins.

Simmons said that he has been working on the project for three years with writer Bruce Vilanch and songwriters Earl Brown and Artie Butler. The William Morris Agency is handling the business end, and Simmons hopes to begin casting in January.

"We four all have something in common: We love to eat and we've gone through periods where we would sell our mothers for a hot loaf of French bread," explained Simmons.

'Rosencrantz and Guildenstern are Dead'

Tony Mannen has been waiting 20 years to do the play "Rosencrantz and Guildenstern are Dead."

This month the assistant professor of speech and drama at the College of Southern Idaho will get his wish to direct the play, thanks to a cast of drama students who Mannen says are some of the best he has ever had.

"These are smart actors, talented actors. I've had one actor, maybe two actors a semester who have been good. But I haven't had the overall depth of talent in the acting pool I have this year," says Mannen.

Mannen also confesses with little coaxing that "Rosencrantz and Guildenstern is a show I'm doing for myself...I'm doing this because I want to."

The play will run Thursday, Friday and Saturday at 8:15 p.m. in theatre 119 in the Fine Arts building at CSI. Tickets can be purchased in advance or at the door; \$3 for adults and \$2 for students and senior citizens. Mannen advises drama enthusiasts to

get their tickets early, because the show will sell out quickly.

The play is wordy, with rapid fire, non-stop dialogue, says Mannen. It is also a difficult and challenging show to do.

The two main characters, Rosencrantz and Guildenstern, played by Derrick Hanson and Jamie Thorton, are characters out of William Shakespeare's "Hamlet."

Mannen cautions, however, that the play, is not Shakespeare. It was written by Tom Stoppard in the mid-sixties. The two characters are mentioned very briefly in Hamlet.

"Most people don't know they're mentioned in 'Hamlet,'" that's how insignificant they are," says Mannen.

He compares "Rosencrantz and Guildenstern are Dead" to "West Side Story." Although "West Side Story" is based on "Romeo and Juliet," it's certainly not

"Romeo and Juliet" just as "Rosencrantz and Guildenstern are Dead" is not "Hamlet."

Mannen calls the play absurd drama and says "Rosencrantz and Guildenstern" are simply ignorant messengers taking "Hamlet" to England.

"They don't know which way is north, which way is south, where east and west is, which way the wind is blowing for that matter. They are just there, they exist constantly," says Mannen.

The play takes "a little bit of thinking and generally I expect it will take the audience 10 to 15 minutes to catch up with what is being said," says Mannen.

The audience does not need to know the intricacies of "Hamlet" to enjoy the play, says Mannen.

For Mannen, the play concludes his 14th

year in the drama department at CSI.

Mannen says the drama productions are well supported by the community and have always been broken even financially "even though we work on a shoestring."

"The students seem to get better each year and the closeness of the drama department brings many students back to visit after they graduate," says Mannen.

Drama is a family situation, he says. "You spend more time, literally, with these people than you do with your family...it's like a little family unit that has the same arguments, the same fun, the same good times, the same bad times as most families do. You fight mostly with your family, but at the same time they're the ones you kill for."

Mannen says his role as teacher/director is that of a guide. "All I do is offer guidance. If they choose to take the guidance, fine. If they don't, they won't do a very good job."

Mannen says it is also important for him to read and understand people. "I'm very good at that. I'm a very gregarious person."

She adds that the group pledged \$1,000 to the Twin Falls County Child Protection Team, "but we hope to double that."

Also co-chair of the club is Jill Hanks.

The show includes complimentary desserts, coffee and punch. The numerous door prizes will be handcrafted and donated by members of Junior Club. Participating stores include: The Mode, The Paris, Roper's, Sellen's, Maurices, Petersen's Western Wear, Sports Country, Kathy's and Pro Fit. Hair and makeup will be by Escape. Valley Child Protection Team, also known as the Twin Falls County Child Protection Team.

The three styles of clothing to be shown will be sports, daytime and evening wear, says Johnson.

Physicians, social workers, police departments, Twin Falls County school districts, Guardian Ad Litem, Head Start and the South Central District Health Department volunteer their time to help evaluate child abuse issues.

They are frequently asked to provide talks and health fairs to help educate the public. The organization presently needs education materials, videos and a VCR-TV, which would be beneficial for the health fairs.

Two other projects that the Twin Falls County Child Protection Team assisted with were to provide shoes for a family in which only the adults had shoes and provide funds for an 18-year-old girl to receive therapy sessions with a psychologist who donated half of his services so the girl could double her sessions. This girl is in a foster home, and since she is 18 she is no longer eligible for state foster care assistance.

Henson muppets go prime time

On the walls of Kevin Clash's townhouse are pictures of him performing with Linda Ronstadt, Yo-Yo Ma and Jamie Lee Curtis. Every day in households across the country, millions of kids and plenty of their parents, are enchanted by Clash's skillful performance. Yet he remains about as anonymous as a quick credit roll by the end of a television show.

That is because Clash is a puppeteer. The kids who see his work and hear his voice on PBS every day don't see Clash, they see Elmo and hear the wide-eyed utterances of this wonderfully naive blue monster, or they see Heets the Owl and hear the gravelly voice of the leader of jazz band.

At 28, Clash is already a veteran in the fairly enclosed world of big-time puppetry. His work has been seen on national television for about a decade. But when you talk to this Catonsville, Md., resident, he still seems as wide-eyed as Elmo about all that has happened to him.

"Sometimes I'll be working on 'Sesame Street' and I'll think that here's this kid who grew up in Turner's Station who was inspired by these puppeteers right on the set working with them," Clash said. "It's

a dream come true."

Friday, Clash's work takes the long walk from early morning to prime time as he is one of the principal puppeteers for "The Jim Henson Hour," the new NBC spring trout show that debuts at 8 p.m. on NBC. That work fulfilled another ambition of Clash's, to be a full-scale member of Henson's Muppet company. Clash had worked with Henson on numerous occasions, including "Sesame Street" and a seven-month stint in London with the film "Labyrinth," but as Clash began his rise in the business just as Henson was moving from the Muppets to movies, he had never been able to really join that select group.

But this past fall and winter, Clash spent most of his time in Toronto making "The Jim Henson Hour." He has a couple of characters — Leon, a Nathan Detroit-like creature who is always trying to sell Kermit the Frog something, and Clifford, the learned and wise boss player in the band — and handles one of the backup singers in a group called The Extremes that makes periodic appearances.

"The Extremes are my favorite," Clash said. "They get back to what the Muppets are all about, just trying to do outrageous things. I mean they shoot in harmony. All you really

Little Jimmy Dickens performs tonight in Jerome

JEROME — A small guy famous for his giant voice, Grand Ole Opry star Little Jimmy Dickens describes himself as an energetic individualist.

"Is he like anyone else?"
"No ma'am," he replied in a polite nasal twang during a telephone interview. "I have my own style of country music and I have my own individual style of singing and performing."

This year, Dickens celebrates 50 years of performing in country music. The son of a West Virginia coal miner, Dickens found his heart in country music as a child, singing with his family and listening to "the Opry" on the radio at night.

"All my people played different musical instruments and sang," he said. "So I just had a great desire to do that even when I was in high school. I would enter every little amateur contest or talent contest that I could get into."

Dickens performed on radio 10 years and then joined the Grand Ole Opry in 1948, singing "Little, But I'm Loud," "A Sleepin' At the Foot of the Bed," "Take An Old Cold Fater and Wait," "Out Behind The Barn," "Country Boy" and "Wabash Cannon Ball," plus dozens of other songs that were hits for him.

Always humorous, Dickens became a regular on the popular television show, "Stars of the Grand Ole Opry," shown around the world. He was a regular on the Phillip Morris TV show before resigning to entertain abroad, which resulted in 13 trips to Europe and three trips to Southeast Asia.

Three times he went to Vietnam and entertained troops under fire. "Not too many entertainers went there," Dickens said. "There were stages in some areas, but I played a lot of remote areas where they weren't set up for entertainment at all... I'd just take a guitar and fly back in the jungle and work for 200 men or so."

During the spring of 1964, he became the first country music artist to tour completely around the world. Traveling to American military installations, the music show started in the Far East, went to Europe, and completely circled the globe in 90 days, Dickens said.

That same year, he won a place in the Pop Music spotlight with his recording of "The Bird of Paradise Fly Up Your Nose." This title was a phrase Johnny Carson was kicking around on "The Tonight Show," Dickens recalled. "A disc-jockey friend of mine picked it up and wrote a novelty song about it. It's just a crazy little thing."

Dickens continued his career, recording "We Could," "Life Turned Her That Way," "Ruggedy Ann" and "Preacher Man." At the Country Music Association Award Show in 1983, he was inducted by his peers into the "Country Music Hall of Fame."

Dickens is known to work more performance dates than any other artist on the Opry year after year. After 40 years of recording, Dickens said he has lost count of how

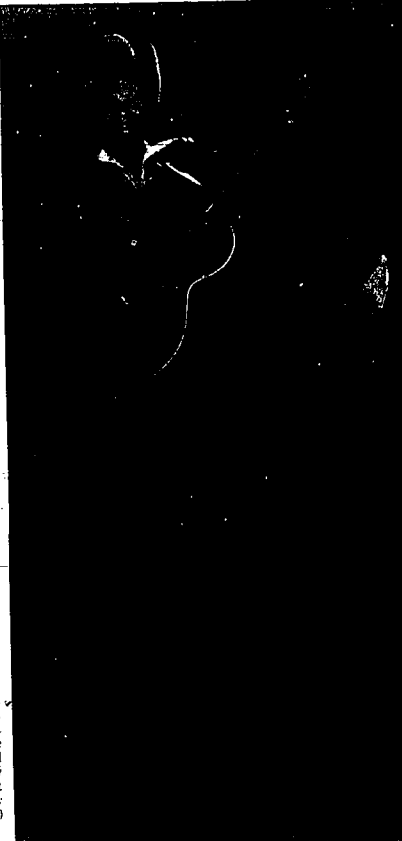

many records he has, although his albums number "in the hundreds."

On his current tour, Dickens has been from Newfoundland to the state of Washington. His four-man band, the same he's had for many years, includes a drummer, a guitarist, a bass player and a steel guitar player.

"It's a country band," Dickens said. "They stay up-to-date on all the current songs that are out, and of course I do all the old songs that I've been known for and the most successful records that I've had..."

We do ballads and old popular songs, and then we do some new things that we have." The routine has a dose of comedy, too, he said.

Kris Rushing, owner of Wood's Cafe, said Dickens' tour brings him into the northwest area and an open night was booked for Jerome. "It's not costing them a lot of money to stop here, so he can do it for a reasonable fee," Rushing said.

She described the artist as little, but dynamic. "He wears a big hat," Rushing said. "His guitar is almost as big as he is."

While the students are learning from him, he is learning from watching them, performance after performance. During each performance, he takes notes because the acting is a learning experience for the students. Occasionally, the performance is done so well he just watches and enjoys as with an outstanding sword fight in "Romeo and Juliet" in 1977.

The "Rosenbergs" and "Goldstern" cast of 11, will devote an average of 150 hours each in preparation for the performance.

Although the actors enjoy working together they wouldn't devote themselves to the production if it wasn't for the reward at the end — the applause, says Mannen.

"Everybody, everybody, whether they acknowledge it or not, every person in this world likes to be liked. Nobody likes to be hated. And this

applause is a way of people saying back to you, 'Oh, we like what you do.' The audience says it to you. It's strokes. Everybody likes to be stroked."

Two of Mannen's favorite productions at CSI are "Dial M for Murder," performed in 1977, and last year's "Of Mice and Men."

Although he would love to do nothing but Shakespeare, Mannen realizes audiences don't enjoy it as much as some of the other fare.

Mannen's worst show was "A Thing Called Julius Caesar," says Mannen. In that play, Mannen says he created a fine line in educational theater and cast everybody who tried out, including many who "had no business being in that show. It was terrible. It was disaster."

He says emphatically he will never, ever, ever, never, ever, ever, never, ever, ever, cast like that again. It's not fair to the audience and it's not fair to the cast members.

"It was a turkey. I mean the place still smells bad because of that show," he says although he acknowledges there were some individual performances that sparked him.

But Mannen is enthusiastic about the upcoming nine-man, two-woman play.

After 20 years of wanting to have the right actors for "Rosenbergs and Goldsterns are Dead," Mannen expects his "formula" to do well.

do is just shake the puppet.

"This whole thing was a different experience for me because almost all of my work had been for children, while this is aimed at an older audience."

Indeed, "The Jim Henson Hour" is about as sophisticated and inventive as television gets. It is really two half-hour shows, the first being something called Muppet TV, hosted by Kermit and an android friend, that takes place behind the scenes of a television studio of the future. Imagine "Mux Headroom" meets "The Muppet Show" and you've got some idea of what's going on.

There are songs; there are guest stars (comedian Louis Anderson Friday; there are whizz-bang electronic effects (wait until you see the opening); and there is the silly-but-sophisticated comedy working on all sorts of levels that is always present in Henson productions. Some of it hits, some of it misses, but it is all very interesting.

The show's second half is an episode of "The Storyteller," which Henson made in London. Four of those have already run on NBC. Henson uses state-of-the-art puppetry and special effects to tell classic tales of fantasy. A heavily made-up John Hurt is the title character. Sunday night's tale is "The Heartless Giant."

As anyone who has seen a previous "Storyteller" can testify, television just doesn't get much better.

The hour could have trouble finding its audience as it is a bit so sophisticated for kids (though they should enjoy the visual stimulation) while the puppetry label might keep adults from tuning in. But if you are interested in good television, check it out.

Clash gets excited when he talks of working on the show and the opportunity it gave him to spend long hours with the legends of his business. Some have fairly familiar names, like the Ernie and Bert duo of Henson and Frank Oz who has gone from Miss Piggy and Fozzie to directing "Dirty Harry Soundtracks." Others are known only to fans of puppetry, like Jerry Nelson, Bob Bergen and Richard Hunt.

But he also talks of the hard work that went along with trying to get the show off the ground. "I think we had the problems of any new series; our characters were trying to find their identities," Clash said.

"But I think there was also a problem because they so wanted to make sure they weren't doing another away from the basics. The longer we went on, the more comfortable we grew with each other and with the characters. And I think the last four episodes were great. But I think it takes any new series about a year to figure those things out."

A 1967 graduate of Twin Falls High School, Nutting is the son of Mr. and Mrs. W.R. Nutting, Twin Falls.

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Charlie Chaplin

English comedian never expected fame in United States

No one was more shocked than Charlie Chaplin himself by his Little Tramp character's meteoric rise to fame in the United States in 1915. Having arrived on a vaudeville tour just five years earlier, the shy and reserved former British music hall comedian confided: "I can't understand all this stuff. I am just a little mickel comedian trying to make people laugh. They act as though I were the king of England."

It was precisely because admission to Chaplin's films at nickelodeons across the country was so affordable — just a nickel — that the quiet little Englishman, born 100 years ago, on April 16, 1889, was so rapidly crowned America's King of Comedy. Viewed in retrospect, Chaplin's decision to concentrate on developing his own sentimental slapstick could not have come at a more opportune time for the World-War-I-weary world.

By the spring of 1915, he had created "The Tramp," his first bitter-sweet comedy with a signature ending in which — plucky and resilient after losing in love — his homeless comic hero waddles down life's highway, desolate and utterly alone.

That distinctive Chaplin touch of pathos coupled with the recurrent theme of going-it-alone stemmed from a deeply painful boyhood. By transforming his real-life experiences as a Cockney ragamuffin into his screen character, Chaplin was able to catapult from poverty to wealth and from obscurity to fame.

Homelessness — as pressing an issue in post-Dickensian England as it is in modern America — was integral to Chaplin's childhood and would become a haunting motif in his later feature films as well. Chaplin's father was an alcoholic who died

when Charlie was 12, and his mother became a chronic psychotic who was in and out of mental institutions. On a few rare but nightmarish occasions as a very young child, Chaplin was forced to sleep on the streets of London and to forage for food in garbage pails. He knew painfully, as well, what life was like in the orphanages and poorhouses of Edwardian London. Chaplin's fictional film character both drew upon and comically depicted those agonizing early encounters with urban dislocation.

Social scientists are finding that while many children subjected to severe stress become disturbed adults, others, such as Chaplin, turn out to be smart, resourceful, streetwise, superkids the psychological term to describe them is "invulnerables", who go on to lead high-achieving lives. Chaplin's first feature-length comedy and masterpiece, "The Kid" (1921), was a remarkable film in which the Little Tramp found, adopted and raised a lost child. While "The Kid" derived its immediate inspiration from 30-year-old Chaplin's personal bereavement (his first-born son had died a few days after birth, only 2½ weeks before Chaplin began shooting the film), its twin themes of emotional loss and homelessness resonated with contemporary social concerns.

And among intellectuals, Charlie's cinematic lost child spoke to a just generation. No movie-maker and no other movie (with the exception of D.W. Griffith's "Birth of a Nation") had done as much in one single stroke to earn instant recognition for the cinema as a legitimate art form. During the worldwide economic crisis of the 1930s, Chaplin attempted to place the grim problems of society into a comic perspective through the running satire commentary of "Modern Times."

Stationing his Little Tramp squarely in the middle of the mess by casting him as a black-sheep factory worker who was no more a conscien-

Did not understand his successful member in good standing of the organized masses than he was among those in the ruling classes, Chaplin poked good-natured fun at both sides. It was his next picture, "The Great Dictator" (1940), that got Chaplin into the political hot water that ultimately led to his being barred from the United States. While he was on a visit to England in 1952, his re-entry permit would be revoked as retribution for his so-called communist sympathies and dubious moral character. Abandoning traditional pantomime technique and his classic tramp character in order to play two talking parts — Adolf Hitler and a little Jewish barber — Chaplin spoke for the first time on film.

His closing speech, an artistically flawed but emotionally eloquent plea for concerted international intervention against Hitler's persecution of the Jews, instantly earned Chaplin a subpoena to appear before a hastily formed, isolationist, anti-war Senate subcommittee on war propaganda in September 1941.

And Chaplin's popular, financially successful film — which helped shape American public opinion in favor of the war — also helped earn him (in the files of the FBI), the quaint political epithet of "premature anti-fascist." (In the terminology of the day, it was a political euphemism for some-

one with strong left-wing leanings who was not officially a member of the Communist Party.) As the Napoleonic-era French diplomat Talleyrand remarked, "treason is a matter of dates." The backlash against Chaplin began gathering momentum in late 1942. Westbrook Pegler, a conserva-

tive journalist whose syndicated column ran in hundreds of newspapers, kicked off the campaign with two scathing diatribes. Equating Chaplin's activities in support of our military alliance with the Soviets as American Communist and therefore anti-American, he recommended his deportation.

Anniversary of Chaplin's 100th birthday to be celebrated

Few film stars were as internationally acclaimed as Charlie Chaplin, and the anniversary of his 100th birthday will be commemorated by those who still cherish his memory and his art with events around the world.

"Charlot's Year" has begun at the wine-growing village of Corsier-Sur-Vevey, Switzerland, as it prepares to honor the Little Tramp with a string of festivities.

"Charlot" is the name French-speaking fans gave the world-famous comedian, who died on Christmas Day in 1977, after spending a quarter of a century at Corsier. Festivities will officially begin in

Vevey, the Lake Geneva town just below hillside Corsier, on April 16, the day Chaplin was born in London in 1889.

Swiss President Jean-Pascal Delamuraz is scheduled to attend a ceremony naming a "Square Chaplin," which already features an almost lifesize statue of the Little Tramp, his movie character with the bowler hat, mustache and walking stick.

Chaplin, who was knighted by Queen Elizabeth II in 1975, and his wife, Oona, often strolled along the nearby lake after buying English-language newspapers. Most people did not recognize them.

Jean-Charles Kollras, a spokesman for the ceremony, said Sophia Loren is expected at the event. She starred

in Chaplin's last movie in 1967, "A Countess From Hong Kong." Kollras also said that Lady Oona is not in good health. She continues to reside at the Manor "De Ban, the 18th-century manor above Corsier that Chaplin purchased in 1953.

After the square-naming ceremony, some 1,000 people, mostly children, are to march in a festive parade from Vevey to Corsier, where more celebrations are to take place under a huge circus tent holding 2,500 people. The tent is set up on "Place Chaplin," a sprawling meadow between Corsier's 18th-century chateau and the village hall.

Meanwhile, in London, the Museum of the Moving Image will present "The Worlds of Charlie Chaplin," an

exhibit of photographs, documents and artifacts in honor of "Lambeth's Favorite Son." The National Film Theater is presenting a series of Chaplin's major works along with movies depicting world events at the time.

On his birthday, "City Lights" — the story of a tramp who befriends a millionaire and falls in love with a blind girl — will be shown at London's Dominion Theatre, the site of its original premiere in 1931. A live orchestra will perform Chaplin's own score for the silent movie.

In Hollywood, there will be a special screening and party at the Chaplin Stage of the former Charles Chaplin Studios. The Walk of Fame will

present a plaque to his son, Sydney, during a ceremony to rededicate Chaplin's star on Hollywood Boulevard.

The Museum of Modern Art in New York will present, "Chaplin: A Centennial Celebration," which includes a gallery exhibit and a two-week film retrospective.

In Frankfurt, Germany, the Old Opera House screened "The Circus" — a 1928 movie about a tramp who takes refuge from the police in a cir-

cus — and a retrospective of his work will be shown in Munich. An international conference will hold in Paris, during which Chaplin's daughter, Geraldine, will receive a decoration from the French Minister of Culture. NRK-Radio in Norway will have a 45-minute special, "Charlie Chaplin — The Clown Who Chastised," and a program consisting of his own soundtrack music.

Key Video will release the Charlie Chaplin Centennial Collection.

Hank Williams Jr. was thankful. George Strait was relieved.

Naomi and Wynonna Judd were almost embarrassed.

"We were over in makeup and almost missed the (awards announcement), a beaming Naomi said.

She and daughter Wynonna had won in the country duet category for the fifth straight year during the 24th annual Academy of Country Music Awards ceremony in Burbank.

"We just happened to walk out ... and hear them say ... 'the Judds,'" she said with the enthusiasm of a lottery winner.

Like most country music super-

stars, these singers may have so many awards that they need full-time accountants just to keep track of them.

Still, it was a thrill to receive another one (or two), they said during the nationally televised ceremony at a Disney Studios sound stage.

Taking over at the microphone, Wynonna said: "Everybody needs a pat on the back. You never get tired of being told that you are good at what you do."

Randy Owen — of the group Alabama, which was won 14 awards from the Academy of Country Music in the '80s, including an award Monday as entertainers of the

decade — fought back tears as he thanked his fans for their support.

In similar terms, Hank Williams Jr., who won entertainer of the year for the third straight time, said: "I'm a late bloomer, a survivor, a fighter, a contender. I can be a champion, but I'm nothing without all of you in this room and

all the fans out there."

George Strait probably has a busload of awards but has seen newcomer Randy Travis beat him out in several competitions in recent years. After being named singer of the year Monday, Strait joked about how it was getting embarrassing around the house because his 7-year-old son has been asking when he was going to come home with another trophy.

"Well," Strait told the television audience. "We we got one tonight, Bubba."

Of the numerous music awards shows, the country ones are generally the most relaxed. One reason is that the participants have such practice. Where major rock stars often attend only if the odds of their winning an award seem good, most of the country stars treat the shows like another day on their tour

schedule.

Many, like Hank Williams Jr., reveal a side of themselves that is often not seen on stage. For all his rowdy, macho image, Williams — son of the late country legend Hank Williams — seemed especially touched by his victories, which also included an award for best video.

"I'm not one of those who is going to get up there and blab and cry and tell you how happy I am and thank everybody in the world. That's not me," he said.

But he admitted that he had become choked up on stage when he was shown performing a song with his father, thanks to some special editing effects.

"When I started talking about that video I had to get off that stage because the man of steel just about lost it," he said.

K.T. Oslin performs in Boise tonight

BOISE — K.T. Oslin won two awards Monday at the 24th Academy of Country Music Awards show, one for album of the year and another for best female vocalist.

With white gloves, black heels and a hot pink suit with a knee-length skirt, she was also an emcee for the show.

Tonight she is performing in Boise with fellow stars Randy Travis and Tammy Wynette.

Oslin describes her songs as "old fashioned" and "not at all hip," according to promotional material.

"Her songs are not necessarily auto-biographical, but most of them are about women. I write something I feel is fun or poignant or painful about a certain type of woman," Oslin says.

"Writing songs is both joy and terror for me. When a new idea comes along, it's like being given a great toy; you turn and twist and flip it to find out all the new things it's capable of, then when it's over, the terror sets in. But then, with time, luck and a minor miracle, another new toy comes along."

As a child in Texas, Oslin wanted to sing but was too shy to get sounds out in front of people. In high school, she became interested in drama and then won a college scholarship in drama. This experience, she says, finally gave her the nerve to sing in public.

In 1962, she sang folk music in Houston and Los Angeles, recording an album that was never released. Back in Texas, she went

into musical comedy and toured with a Houston theater company. Next, Oslin joined a theater in New York and "survived on a chorus girl's pay," she recalls.

In 1978, Oslin was hired by Guy Clark as a back-up singer in Nashville. Meanwhile, she wrote songs and recorded demo tapes without much success.

"Then I ran away," she says. Returning to New York, Oslin worked on television commercials and advertising jingles. "But one day I woke up and said, do I wanna spend my life being the Fix-O-Dent lady on a roller coaster? ... I thought, I'm gonna die and the only thing I'll be remembered for is a 'hemorrhoid commercial. I knew I would have to give this single thing one more try."

Back in Nashville, Oslin put together a band and put on a bravura show for country music executives. A producer in the audience was impressed, signed her up and Oslin started turning out a steady string of hits. Her most popular songs include "80's Ladies," "I'll Always Come Back," "Younger Men," "Do Ya" and "Old Pictures."

The artist says she thanks Houston for her start, New York for her education and Nashville for listening and saying, "Yeah."

Now, at age 46, Kay Toinette Oslin appears to be one of the major new talents in country music. This "borderline fool" is finally crossing the border into national success.

Scandinavian pop sound of Roxette is similar to Abba, Europe and a-ha

Scandinavian pop is not exactly a novelty on the American charts — Abba, a-ha and Europe have seen to that — but even so, it is hard not to be at least a little surprised by the sound of Roxette. Although this Swedish duo came seemingly out of nowhere with its chart-topping single "The Look," Roxette's sound is anything but unfamiliar, whipping jangly guitar and Abba-esque vocals into a frothy, infectious dance-pop groove. That formula recurs throughout the group's American debut, "Look Sharp!" (EMI 7 91098), from "Dressed for Success," with its "Louie Louie" chorus, to the synthesizer-driven charm of "Dance Away," but the individual performances — particularly Marie Fredriksson's soulful approach to ballads — are what ultimately makes this album so addictive.

always winds up making other artists records sound like his own when he is involved, but not in the case of Wendy and Lisa. Even though these former Revolutionaries are by now two albums removed from his paisley domain, "Fruit at the Bottom" (Columbia CK 44341) sounds even more like a Prince album than the duo's debut.

Not that this is anything to complain about; songs like "Satisfaction" and the title tune gain considerably by upping the funk content, while "Lolly Lolly" boasts an engagingly childlike chorus strongly reminiscent of "Around the World in a Day."

Def beats and booger jokes aren't a common combination in rap music, much less the stuff of greatness, but in the case of De La Soul's "3 Feet High and Rising" (Tommy Boy TB

1019) they might as well be. Given the amount of information crammed into the 21 tracks of this concept album-cum-party record, even repeated listenings will not completely show what the De La Soulers are up to, yet somehow the album seems more interesting with each replay. Part of that may be pure craft — the sampling and scratching here suggests that De La Soul and producer Prince Paul understand rap's studio tricks as well as anyone this side of Hank Shockley — but it is the way their words bounce off those sounds that makes this album all but irresistible.

No matter how hard bands like R.E.M. and Gangalamal Diary try to redefine the sound of the New South, certain elements, from hillbilly banjos to bogie-style guitar riffs, remain instantly evocative of both the region and its way of life. Fortunately, there is always drivin' n' cryin' to keep those sounds current.

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'Troop Beverly Hills' falls flat

"Troop Beverly Hills" wants you to like it so much that you feel seedy for being unable to grant it so humble a request.

Conceived as a vehicle for Shelley Long, it gives the "Cheers"-refugee ample room to make herself a major movie star, or guarantee herself a career opening 7-Elevens and doing dinner theater in Oklahoma suburbs; it comes up pretty much a wash.

Long, playing a ditsy but good-hearted Beverly Hills divorcee, is abundantly charming; her great gift is her faint pomposity. She's one of those "good girls" who always got high grades and never got in trouble with the teacher and had a natural surmounting that compelled her to point out better ways of doing things whenever the possibility realized itself. That's her Diane Chambers, of course, from "Cheers," but that sense of self also undercuts her Phyllis Neffler here.

Phyllis, all legs and red hair, wants to do good; but she also wants to shop. She wants to shop a little bit more than she wants to do good. Well, nobody's perfect. Long continually gets laughs out of this shallow woman's vanities and delusions.

But beyond Long's performance, there's not much else in the film. As the story has it, Long, in a post-divorce depression, wants yet again to "get involved," this time by becoming a troop leader for the

"Wilderness Girls," an impersonation that cannot make the Campfire Girls too happy. But having been absorbed into the organization, she is quickly at loggerheads with Betty Thomas (of the great old "Hill Street Blues") as a para-military zealot in the organization.

Largely, the film follows Long's hunching but naive attempts not so much to adjust her charges to the mores of the Wilderness Girls, but to adjust the Wilderness Girls to her

charges. This can be amusing—for example, she requires her girls to earn merit badges in "Beverly Appraisal," "Shopping," and, in the case of a daughter of a Marcos clone, "Crushing the Revolution."

But far more often the movie dithers. The director, Jeff Kanew, tries for "satire" by making each of the girls in the troop a reflection of a Beverly Hills character. It's so flat it seems to have been filmed before Columbus. Then, too, he lets Thomas chew the scenery unallegedly, in a performance that is but one note until it seems to reach the power of a siren.

Worse, the film has no structure to sustain it; it meanders along, looking for comedy with increasing despair, finally coming apart in a silly cross-country race pitting the Beverly Hills troop against a "bad" troop of girls. It's that stale.

'Excellent Adventure' is a nightmare

The following are reviews of some of the films now playing in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America, opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

BILL & TED'S EXCELLENT ADVENTURE (PG). This is Allan Bloom's worst nightmare, and possibly yours, too. It is an all-out celebration of the closing of the American mind, with two high school doofuses (Keanu Reeves and Alex Winter) borrowing a time machine to kidnap great figures of past centuries for a history report.

Look for two of the low points of American teen-age cinema in one movie: Joan of Arc leads an nerdy class, and Abraham Lincoln tells an assembly of school kids to "Party on, dudes!"

DANGEROUS LIAISONS (R). As the book "Les Liaisons Dangereuses" outraged and scandalized the French in the late 18th century, this deft movie has kept every shred of its ability to shock. Screenwriter Christopher Hampton, with director Stephen Frears, has made a glidingly cinematic version of his own successful play, taken from the 1792 novel by Choderlos de Laclos.

DEAD CALM (R). In John Frankenheimer's "Dead Bang," Don Johnson, playing a scruffy Los Angeles cop hot on the trail of a fascist underground group, has a "squeezed-up, desperate" look. The story is a weird ungelid mixture of fact and fancy, fiction and formula.

DEAD CALM (R). Cracking-good thrillers are harder to find these days, possibly because the audiences for them seem to have gotten more demanding. Into this void sails "Dead Calm," a spare, smart,

seductive piece of real movie making with (almost) every loophole covered, a superlative cast (Sam Neill, Nicole Kidman, Billy Zane) and enough tension for us all.

FLETCH LIVES (PG). This limp effort from coasting director Michael Ritchie is the ultimate comedy of condescension. As a wisecracking investigative reporter, Chevy Chase delivers non-stop punchlines at the expense of the fools who surround him (He makes David Letterman

look like Mother Teresa). And what better place in this sequel for Fletch to go and be superior than the Deep South? The character's verbal daggers can be funny in small doses, but after a while you just want to smack him.

LEVIATHAN (R). It's "The Alien" set beneath the sea instead of outer space — and not nearly as sophisticated. But it's occasionally scary, looks good and moves well under George Cosmatos' vigorous direction.

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Cagney, Bogart movies to be re-released on home video

Good news for Cagney and Bogart fans! In June, MGM-UA Home Video is re-releasing eight excellent titles for only \$19.95 each.

They are: "Treasure of the Sierra Madre" (1948), "Key Largo" (1948), "The Maltese Falcon" (1941), "The Big Sleep" (1946), "Each Dawn I Die" (1939), "Public Enemy" (1931) and "The Roaring 'Twenties" (1939).

Originally produced by Warner Bros., these classics say probably more about the American mentality at mid-century than any collection of history books. Stark, dark, brooding and often cruel, they define that singularly turbulent era when America changed from an isolated, agrarian country into the world's mightiest superpower.

Directed by William Wellman, "Public Enemy" pits a gloriously defiant James Cagney against the rest of the world. Sure, he loses in the end, but he creates a new hero in the process. Yes, the hero is a ruthless, murdering gangster — but there is something refreshingly honest about him. After all, he is just pursuing the American dream.

In "Each Dawn I Die," Cagney unwillingly takes on the nation's penal system. Directed by William Keighley, this film demonstrated the urgent need for prison reform.

"The Roaring 'Twenties" pairs Cagney with Humphrey Bogart. Directed by Raoul Walsh, it's conceived on a grand scale. The film tells the story of three doughboys who survive the horrors of World War I only to find themselves scrambling for limited opportunities in the grim postwar economy.

Two of the buddies turn to crime. One becomes a district attorney. There is a great shoot-out at the end and Cagney has a wonderful dying scene on the steps of a church.

"Angels With Steps of Faith," directed by Michael Curtiz, teams Cagney, Bogart and the Bowery Boys. Not to mention Pat O'Brien and Ann Sheridan. Cagney plays gangster Rocky Sullivan, whose return to his old neighborhood threatens to undo all the good being done by his former best pal, Father Connelly. It may sound like formula, but this movie still packs a wallop.

"The Maltese Falcon," directed by John Huston, marked Bogart's transformation from studio heavy to leading man. And like Cagney's "Public Enemy," the razor-edged Sam Spade was a new kind of hero. Unsympathetic, unromantic and uncompromising, the Spade was the embodiment of the country's dark side, a side that would soon emerge as the nation's few headlong into 20th century's darkest hour.

Directed by Howard Hawks, "The

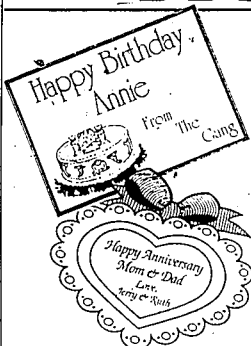
Big Sleep" pairs Bogart with Lauren Bacall. This time the setting is Florida and the villain is a vicious chump played by Edward G. Robinson.

"Treasure of the Sierra Madre" Cagney and Bogart stars for Best Picture and Best Supporting Actor. Bogart plays a memorable villain, the ultraparanoiac Fred C. Dobbs. Tim Holt, Bruce Bennett, Barton MacLaine and Alfonso Bedoya fill out the superb cast.

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Pierce Brosnan stars in the miniseries Sunday 'Around the World in 80 Days'

In "Around the World in 80 Days" (airing April 16, 17 and 18 on NBC), 19th-century English aristocrat Phileas-Fogg (Pierce Brosnan) bets his fortune that he can circumnavigate the globe in record time, and what ensues is a mad, mad, mad, mad whirl of ever-changing locales.

According to Julia Nickson, who plays Fogg's love interest, Indian Princess Aouda, the miniseries' 71-day-shooting schedule was a mad, mad, mad, mad whirl all of its own.

"It got to a point where I hardly knew where I was," she says, recounting an itinerary that took her from England to Macao to Hong Kong to Thailand to Yugoslavia. "All I knew was that when it was hot they put me in wool and when it was cold they put me in silk," she complains, albeit good-naturedly. But Nickson was already familiar with one of the locales, Singapore, where she grew up the child of a Chinese mother and English father. "We even filmed one scene on a river I had floated down as a child," she says.

What Nickson wasn't as familiar with was the 1956 Oscar-winning movie version of "Around the World in 80 Days," the first screen adaptation of Jules Verne's 1872 novel. "I think I saw it as a child and fell asleep during the second part," she says. When told her exotic ancestry makes her a more persuasive Indian

princess than American actress Shirley MacLaine, who played Aouda in the original movie, Nickson zings, "I don't know about that. Shirley was probably an Indian princess in an earlier life."

Nickson left Singapore at age 17 and attended college in Hawaii. She became a top model before turning to acting and made her acting breakthrough as Sylvester Stallone's co-star in "Rambo: First Blood Part II" (1986). She also had a co-starring role as Orianda Ramos in the 1988 NBC miniseries "Noble House," which starred Pierce Brosnan as Ian Dunross. "We weren't in scenes together then, so I got to know him much, much better this time," she says. "He's just charming. Actually he and my husband (David Soul, star of the NBC series "UNSUB") made a miniseries together years ago, "The Manions of America." I remember watching him (Brosnan), and my heart was speeding. He's sooo handsome," she croons.

"But there is something about Pierce that is very upright, so much so that he can appear stiff at times," says Nickson. "He's a little shy, especially with people he doesn't know. But Pierce has a very spontaneous sense of humor. I bought a dress with

a bolero jacket in Venice and I showed it to him, and he said, "Oh, did it shrink in the dryer?"

Brosnan has more than just a sharp tongue. "We had a scene in a lifeboat with Peter Ustinov. (The round actor plays Fix, a detective who believes Fogg has robbed the Bank of England and pursues him around the world.) Peter was always the first one in and the last out of the boat because it took him, um, a little longer than the rest of us. Pierce cut the boat's rope, and all of a sudden there was Peter drifting out to sea..."

Nickson says Brosnan was more gentle with her, giving her lots of help in totting her newborn daughter China (now 5 months old) from location to location. "I kept my eye on the baby," she says. "Pierce would be the one to find the airport, because I could never remember what city we were in..."

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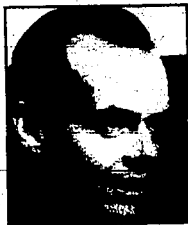
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Jack Nicholson makes lady's day

Looking for fun in the afternoon? 'General Hospital' is tapping it up

It's spring, time for a bit of fun in the afternoon. You'll find it on "General Hospital," where Broadway dancer Donn Simone experiments with a "tapercize class." Tapercize? That's the pairing of easy-aerobic exercises and tap steps. If the exercises bore you, zero in on Simone's graceful taps.

There is a problem, however. Simone doesn't appear daily or even weekly; "General Hospital" brings him in only now and then. But one look at the teacher and viewers want more. Shuffle those feet and remember Fred Astaire. See Gregory Hines cut loose in the movie "Taps" to understand why the folks at GH decided to play around with a tap-aerobics class.

Tap dancing is coming back, and even if you can't duplicate Simone's steps on the tube, you can tell that the teacher and his actor-pupils are enjoying themselves. In short, it's a pleasant respite from all that heavy plotting and deep emotion.

How long will the tapercize classes continue? No one knows for sure. They're playing it by ear, or foot.

Meanwhile, dancer Simone works occasionally on ABC stages in the afternoon and dances at night in the Escondido Lawrence Welk Theatre version of "George M." For over a year he starred in the national touring company of "Singin' In the Rain," in which he was doused nightly during the famous Gene Kelly rain-dance.

No wonder Donn jumped at the chance to dry off on "General Hospital," where he even gets to say a few lines. Simone is road-weary after four years of touring in "A Chorus Line," "Dreamgirls," "Singin' in the Rain" and "Angry Housewives."

In addition to his occasional spots on GH, Donn is set to play the role of Lou Clayton in the musical "Durante," which plans a year on the road before tackling Broadway and the New York theater critics.

After all those Broadway shows and time on the road, Donn thinks the future may be in TV. "Broadway musicals are just too expensive and the risks are too high," he said. "Critics levelled 'Singin' in the Rain' on Broadway, but we did very nicely out of town."

So, Morton Downey Jr.'s gonna zip it.

In a letter sent to stations carrying his nightly exercise in excess, the Sultan of Saliva promised to 86

the profanity and debate his guests rather than bait them — in other words, to re-invent himself as a kinder, gentler Murt Downey.

Yeah, right. And I'm Elvis Presley.

He's doing this, Downey says, because he is now entering the second phase of his television career. In the first stage, Downey screamed to get our attention. Now that he's got it, he's gonna get mellow on us. Like some afternoon muzak deejay, I suppose.

"We are dispensing with excessively harsh language. ... I will not use it, nor will I tolerate it from any guest," wrote Downey, who recently assaulted — both physically and verbally — an "Inside Edition" reporter who had the cheek to question him about a sleazy investment deal Downey participated in.

"It's time to disassociate ourselves from trash TV," Downey said in the letter. "We will redouble our efforts to break ground on the major issues ... while avoiding stunts that detract from our mission."

"Mission?" Did he really say "mission?"

But, don't jump to any conclusions, folks. Downey's not doing this, he says, because some major sponsors have instructed their agencies not to buy time on his show. Or because he's running fifth in a six-way ratings race in New York. Or because his outlet in Los Angeles decided to kill his show. Or because his national rating dropped 20 per cent in three months. Noooooooo, sir.

And I'm the Queen of England. One of the enjoyable perks of a entertainment writer's job is the chance you get every now and then to crow "I told you so."

Sixteen months ago, in the first lengthy profile of Morton Downey Jr. to appear in a New York daily newspaper, I predicted that audiences would grow weary of

Downey's puerile and predictable act within two years, just as they had rejected the noisy posturings of Joe Pyne — yet another finger-pointing, false-teeth-flaring, liberal-baiting TV carnival barker who was briefly famous 20 years ago.

Now, believe me, it doesn't take a genius to predict that Downey's well-publicized rise would culminate in an equally loud and tacky fall. On the contrary, Downey's descent from public-relations heaven was inevitable.

That is because Downey, like all businessmen who conduct their affairs on a day-to-day basis, is now paying the price for his lack of vision. Indeed, Downey's entire schtick, like Pyne's before him, is based on one of the oldest short-term telemarketing strategies around: To get high visibility, aim low.

Pander to prejudice. Appeal to those who would argue ad hominem. Sneer the helpless. Do a "Nightline" for mudslingers.

"The Morton Downey Jr. Show" has always been "The Revenge of the Herds," less a talk show than a scream show. With exacting premeditation, Downey's program is aimed at those who think "Donahue" is too intellectual, "Oprah" too personal. Hence, the preponderance of rowdy young men

in the audience. Hence, the early promotional spots for the show comparing Downey to Attila the Hun and Genghis Khan.

Hence, the show's limited shelf life.

This is because viewers will only put up with a self-aggrandizing, obnoxious, one-note extremist if they think he's for real. They want — no, demand — that the talk-show host in question actually has a position to articulate, other than contempt for his guests. That the host has thought about the issues at hand and means what he says. That he's an advocate for something — anything, really — other than himself. In other words, that he's more than a hyperventilating hypocrite.

And now, come's Downey's letter, a missive that doesn't merely expose him as that very thing; what's worse, it shows how craven and loathsome Downey really is.

Indeed, not since Richard Nixon talked about a mangy mutt and his wife's ugly coat has a public figure groveled in such a self-abasing fashion.

Morton's sorry for being so obnoxious. He's sorry for being so crass. He's sorry for being so rude.

Actually, he's just plain sorry.

So sorry, in fact, he's willing, even anxious, to do a total makeover. Let others worry that such a willingness betrays a genuine self-loathing. Not Morty.

The man with the angry false-teeth is now gonna gum us to death with blandness.

Yeah, right. Go home, Morty. Show's over. You're history.

In two more years, no one will even remember your name.

And viewers switching past channel 3, a blank, unused channel in Miami, also got a taste of Cuban government programming.

Some think the interference Saturday and Monday was intentional, a warning against the United States proceeding with plans for TV Marti, an alternative to Cuba's state-controlled media and the next step after the success of Radio Marti.

"The reason (Fidel) Castro may be doing this now is that the legislation to authorize TV Marti is going to be debated on the floor of the House this week," said Barbara Burris, an aide to Rep. Dante Fascell, D-Fla., chairman of the House Foreign Affairs Committee and a key backer of Radio and TV Marti.

"Rep. Fascell anticipated this and

has already cautioned the administration that they'd better be prepared for this type of action."

But it may instead have been a rare combination of technical difficulties and inopportune weather conditions, said Jay Newman, vice president and manager at CBS-owned WCIX.

His station experienced a power outage and briefly was off the air Monday night when the Cuban signal appeared.

"We believe it was a unique combination of circumstance, us going off the air, and of the weather being such that the signal from Cuba was able to bounce full-strength onto our frequency," Newman said.

Channel 3 carried a variety show, and the Cuban government's national news program Saturday.

Angel Pino, a spokesman for the Cuban Interests Section in Washington, would not confirm or deny the jamming was a warning from Cuba.

NCAA helps CBS' ratings

NEW YORK (AP) — A high-rated NCAA championship basketball game helped CBS come in second in last week's Nielsens, but didn't budge NBC from No. 1, even though ABC's "Roseanne" was the top-rated show of the week.

Last year, the NCAA championship game was enough to give CBS a first for the week. This year, the game had a somewhat lower rating, but was still in the top 10.

According to the A.C. Nielsen Co., the top-rated shows of the week were: "Roseanne" ABC, "The Cosby Show" NBC, "Cheers" NBC, "A Different World" NBC, "60 Minutes" CBS, "NCAA Championship — Michigan vs. Seton Hall" CBS, "Golden Girls" NBC, "Empty Nest" NBC, "L.A. Law" NBC and

"Murder, She Wrote" CBS.

"Roseanne" had the highest rating of the week, 23.3, but a lower share, 35, than "Cosby" with a 38. Each rating point represents 904,000 households with television. The share is a percentage of sets in use.

NBC said the "Cosby" rating was lower because of the switch to daylight-saving time affecting shows that are on at the beginning of prime-time when in many parts of the country it's still light outside. "Roseanne" is on an hour into prime-time.

ABC's "Columbo" did well, coming in 12th for the week. But the bad news for ABC is "Moonlighting," which went on hiatus earlier this year, then moved to

'Dream' is no-holds-barred take of the 20s age group

UNION CITY, N.J. (AP) — After leaving the crew to set up the next shot in the smoky nightclub, Mark Rosner walks purposefully up the street toward his office trailer.

He passes a woman with a glazed look in her eyes, rouge-smearred cheeks, frightful blond hair and snow-white fingernails.

Rosner shakes his head when she is out of earshot. "Extras never look as good as real people," he says with a sigh.

In the office, Rosner sinks into a corner to talk about "Dream Street," the series he is writing and directing for NBC. It premieres Thursday in a 90-minute special before moving to its regular hour-long time period on Fridays.

From the first twang of the guitar on "After Midnight" and the best opening credits since "Miami Vice," it's clear this is a different kind of television series.

Already dubbed variously "dirtysomething" or "twentysomething," a comparison with the hit ABC series

"thirtysomething" that comes from the same executive producers, Ed Zwick and Marshall Herskovitz, "Dream Street" is a no-holds-barred tale of 20s, when young people are hit with the realities of adulthood.

Dale Midkiff ("Elvis and Me") stars as Denis Debeau, who takes over the family refrigeration business after his father has a stroke, bypassing his anguished failure of an older brother, Harry (Peter Frechette). Thomas Calabro plays Denis' best friend, Joey Coltrera, who is joining his father's business, too — organized crime.

Rosner offers his own catchphrase for the show.

"I started calling it 'rock 'n' roll television,' because I don't want people to call it like 'blue-collar television. To me that sounds like real '50s, kitchen-sink, good-for-you television, and that's not it," he said. "The fact that the characters are working-class in the context in which the stories take place. To me, what it's really about is being in

CBS to make Steinberg series

NEW YORK — In an unusual deal, the executive producer of CBS' "West 57th" news series will produce a miniseries for the network's entertainment division about a much-publicized child-slaying case here, CBS officials said Friday.

But they emphasized that CBS News was not involved in producer Andrew Lack's work on the dramatization of Hedda Nussbaum's life, including her battered years with a disbarred lawyer, Joel Steinberg. Steinberg was convicted several weeks ago in the fatal beating of the couple's illegally adopted daughter, Lisa, aged 6.

The entertainment divisions of NBC and ABC also are interested in the case, in which trial testimony brought out stories of heavy drug use and beatings by Steinberg of both Nussbaum and the child.

The case received heavy local coverage when Steinberg and Nussbaum were arrested in 1987 (charges against her subsequently were dropped) and large portions of his trial late last year and this year aired live on local TV.

Steinberg, convicted of first-degree manslaughter, was sentenced to 8½- to 25-years in prison, and is appealing his conviction.

Lack will produce a two-part miniseries for CBS Entertainment under terms of a deal worked out by Nussbaum's lawyer, Barry Scheck, and Lack, who earlier had sought unsuccessfully to arrange an interview with Nussbaum for "West 57th." She has refused to give interviews to any news organization.

Cuban Foreign Ministry officials have suggested that if TV Marti goes into operation, their government might retaliate by beaming TV programs to the United States, even if the signal interfered with American stations.

The Reagan administration began considering TV Marti after seeing the success of Radio Marti, which broadcasts news, editorials and entertainment to Cuba under

the auspices of the Voice of America. Both are named after Cuban independence hero Jose Marti.

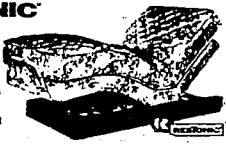
The TV Marti section of the annual House authorization bill is based on a Senate version passed last year that provided \$7.5 million for starting costs and a study to determine whether TV Marti is viable.

The study, released in January, endorsed TV Marti but cautioned that Castro's ability to retaliate be weighed closely before proceeding.

your 20s and trying to be a grownup for the first time, really.

"To me all the great rock 'n' roll is about that stuff. ... And also just because it moves real fast and it looks real hot and the energy is real high on this show, that handle seems to make sense to me."

The only thing missing from a rock 'n' roll show set in New Jersey is the Boss.

"No one mentions Bruce Springsteen. We don't use his music," Rosner said. "I think we owe him a debt in that the texture of the show and the kind of stories we tell are very much in the vein of the songs that he sings, but we're not ridin' on his contails or trying exploit him or anything like that."

"There's so much Springsteen on the page and on the screen, to have him on the soundtrack would be superfluous."

"Dream Street" derived from a network executive's suggestion for a show that was "youth, sexy, urban." Zwick and Herskovitz developed the idea, but "thirtysomething" was picked up in the meantime and "Dream Street" put on hold until Rosner took it over. He had met Zwick and Herskovitz at the American Film Institute when all three were aspiring film directors.

Herskovitz, in an interview in his office in Studio City, Calif., where he was overseeing "thirtysomething," said he and Zwick, who was off filming a movie, "could not possibly have considered doing the second show if we didn't have someone like Mark."

"Ed and I have been able to be very influential in a lot of the conceptual and creative elements of the show, but at the same time what we share with Mark is the idea of what it means to be a filmmaker. I don't tell him how to make his shots," Herskovitz said.

What "Dream Street" does have in common with "thirtysomething" is reliance on character more than plot. Joni Goldstein (Cecil Hoffman) is engaged to Joey, but only her cynical roommate, Kara (Christine Moore), realizes what kind of life she's in for. Denis, meanwhile, courts a reluctant elementary school teacher (Jo Anderson). His youngest brother (David Gray) runs wild, drinking and carousing. That this behavior meets with big brother's approval, at least in the pilot, is bound to raise some eyebrows.

Rosner, who is from Valley Stream, N.Y., said he was urged to consider other shooting locations, but insisted on filming "Dream Street" in New Jersey.

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
