Twin Falls porn measure falls to judge's decision

TWIN FALLS — A judge struck down the city's adult-entertainment ordinance Friday, declaring it unconstitutional and thereby allowing a disputed adult bookstore to remain in business.

"It can only be concluded that the predominant motive of the city ... was the suppression of constitutionally protected speech," ruled 6th District Judge Daniel Hurlbutt. "The facts of this case, and statements of city councilmen at the public hearing on the ordinance betray their intent."

Hurlbutt's ruling came in a city lawsuit against Visions West Book Club, which the city tried to close because the store admittedly violated an ordinance the council had passed last year.

Stitch by stitch, thread by thread,

Hurlbutt unraveled the ordinance in a 20-page opinion, concluding that the ordinance failed by a long shot to meet standards set by the U.S. Supreme Court in a case from Renton, Wash.

The Supreme Court upheld Renton's ordinance, deciding the city can regulate the location of adult movie theaters because of the need to control the "secondary effects" of such businesses. But Twin Falls simply wrote an ordinance similar to Renton's without following the procedure the high court had mandated, Hurlbutt ruled.

Hurlbutt's ruling means the city can't use its ordinance to close the store, but City Attorney Fritz Wonderlich said the city will try again using a state zoning law.

Ed Frachiseur, attorney for the store that opened in November near the Singing Bridge, was unavailable for comment.

Identity of the store's owners has never been publicly revealed.

The judge said statements by council members revealed their desire to keep adult-entertainment businesses out of town, not just limit where they can locate. As an example, Hurlbutt quoted Councilman Jim Vickers, who said, "It's easier to keep them out than to push them out."

In addition to deciding the city wanted to suppress protected speech, Hurlbutt ruled the ordinance was unconstitutional because the city didn't consider any formal studies of pornography's effects on neighborhoods before writing the ordinance. The city must, at the least, conduct studies and apply them to Twin Falls before passing the ordinance, Hurlbutt said.

Halfway through his opinion, he focused on the city's requirement that any adult-entertainment business be located

Families travel long distances seeking missing

MATAMOROS, Mexico — Families who traveled hundreds of miles from across Mexico viewed mutilated corpses on Friday to learn whether their missing loved ones were among the 13 victims of a cult's human sacrifices.

"From all over the country, families have been coming here. They're still coming," said Hector Olivera Garcia, an employee of a funeral home, El Rosario, where seven bodies were taken after being dug up at a ranch west of this border city.

Authorities found 12 bodies buried there Tuesday and forced one of the five suspects in custody to dig up the 13th victim on Thursday. Investigators have used bulldozers and other heavy equipment to excavate more of the ranch, but did not find any more bodies, said Juan Benitez Ayala, chief of the Mexican Federal Judicial Police in Matamoros.

The suspects told police they killed 14 people because they believed it would protect them from

Beating tax deadline pain takes ingenuity

WASHINGTON — Doughnuts and coffee, pizza and headache tablets will be available here and there when procrastinating Americans, unable to put it off any longer, take those dreaded federal tax forms to post offices for mailing by midnight Monday.

Taxpayers seeking a sporting change will find it in Virginia and Texas, where special postal facilities to accept tax mail will be added attractions at some baseball fields.

For most Americans, tax returns must be postmarked by midnight Monday. Late users, officials expect a crush at post offices.

In a bid to make the best of the situation, a choice of refreshments, provided by local broadcasters, will be offered to taxpayers in Salt Lake City.

Doughnuts will be available at the main post office there thanks to KDAB, while KJZZ will offer pizza at the downtown station and KKAT will provide refreshments at the West Valley station, according to postal officials.

Radio WIBA will include headache tablets in its offer of coffee and doughnuts for late mailers at the Madison, Wis., Main Post Office.

Headache powders will be provided along with coffee by KSSN at the Little Rock, Ark., general mail facility in North Little Rock.

In Boise, Idaho, KJZN Radio will provide coffee and doughnuts at the Main Post Office.

Volunteer IRS officials will be available to answer questions at postal facilities across the nation including Austin, Texas; Minneapolis; Bluefield, W. Va.; Anchorage, Alaska; and Philadelphia.

Governor balks at apologizing

BOISE — Political confrontation is a poor way to build a working relationship, Gov. Cecil Andrus says.

With that, the governor on Friday declined to apologize to the Idaho Cattle Association for refusing to allow its executive vice president to attend a meeting with the ICA on Wednesday.

Later Friday, the governor was confronted by state Sen. Rachel Gilbert, R-Boise, who demanded that Andrus apologize for his "rude and arrogant" refusal to let ICA's Gary Glenn attend the meeting.

Ms. Gilbert, who says she is considering a run for governor against Andrus next year, waited in Andrus' office until he finished a meeting with the Idaho Apple Commission. Then she accused Andrus, saying,

"This building, this office belong to the people. You were rude and arrogant when you forced him (Glenn) out."

She also distributed a news release, saying in part: "Cecil Andrus doesn't own that office. He's merely the current occupant, the caretaker of the office and perhaps for not much longer."

Andrus acknowledged that he and Ms. Gilbert, a conservative Republican, have their differences, and that she has declared an interest in running against him.

"You've probably made your point with these folks (news crews notified of the confrontation) but that doesn't alter my position with that one individual (Glenn)," Andrus said.

Idaho Cattle Association President Tom Shaw sent Andrus a letter demanding an apology because Andrus

wouldn't let Glenn attend the governor's meeting with Shaw and other ICA officials two days earlier.

But a spokesman for the governor said Shaw and another ICA official were warned a month ago that Glenn would not be welcome at the meeting.

Shaw, Glenn and about 20 of the 24 board members of the ICA gathered at Andrus' office Wednesday to discuss issues of interest to the state's \$600-million per-year livestock industry.

But Andrus refused to let Glenn come into his office with the others, calling him the ICA's "hired gun" and a "politician" who was doing nothing more than stirring up publicity.

Glenn and about half the directors left Andrus' office and Shaw and other directors went into a half-hour meeting.

Budget plan could trim deficit

WASHINGTON — President Bush and congressional leaders Friday announced a showpiece budget compromise to reduce the 1990 federal deficit to under \$100 billion without raising taxes.

But the pact puts off most hard decisions and Democratic leaders suggested it could open the way to tax increases next year.

Bush, flanked by top lawmakers at a White House ceremony, boasted they had accomplished "the first such agreement reached ahead of schedule and not framed in the context of a crisis." He called it a "first manageable step" in the deficit-fighting journey.

The plan would enable Bush to say he is holding to his "no new taxes"

campaign pledge, while trimming the budget deficit to \$99.4 billion, just within the \$100 billion target set by the Gramm-Rudman budget-balancing law.

Under the agreement, Bush would be forced to accept lower defense spending and more spending for domestic programs than he initially sought. In exchange, congressional leaders pledged to abide by Bush's anti-tax stance — at least for one year.

But even as the accord was announced, key participants conceded that it was only a skeleton that fell short of spelling out where specific programs should be cut to accomplish the savings it trumpeted.

Major elements of the agreement include:

- Total deficit reductions of about

\$28 billion for the fiscal year that begins next Oct. 1. The projected 1990 deficit of \$99.4 billion compare to a 1989 deficit estimated by the administration at \$163.3 billion.

• Defense outlays of \$299.2 billion, down from \$300.6 billion proposed by Bush in his Feb. 9 budget message to Congress.

• A level of discretionary domestic spending of \$181.3 billion, up from the \$175.9 billion proposed by Bush, and spending in social programs in which benefits to individuals are mandated by law of \$556.4 billion, up from Bush's proposal for \$531.4 billion.

• A decision to adhere, without specifying in what manner, to Bush's call for \$5.3 billion in new tax revenue without enacting what the president considers a tax increase.

Massage parlor worker lands in court

TWIN FALLS — An undercover police officer is accusing an employee of Lee's Oriental Massage of offering him more than a rubdown.

Yong Cha Tubert, 49, of Sacramento, Calif., pleaded innocent to a misdemeanor charge of prostitution Friday in 6th District Magistrate Court. She was being held in lieu of \$500 bail at the Twin Falls County jail Friday afternoon.

Twin Falls city police have been investigating Lee's after receiving complaints alleging sex was being sold at the Blue Lakes Boulevard North business, according to a court affidavit of Detective Ronald Axtman.

The department sent Axtman, wired with a radio transmitter, to visit the business Thursday morning. He paid \$50 for a massage that another woman named Su Kin, who called herself "Tina," said would last an hour, according to the detective's statement.

Tubert, who called herself "Connie," massaged him for about 30 minutes, Axtman said. But then she offered a "special massage" for another \$50 and touched him suggestively, the affidavit alleges. After she took off some of her clothing, Axtman arrested her, according to his statement.

Friday in court, Tubert said in broken English that she was in Twin Falls for a couple of weeks to visit her mother. She was planning to return to Sacramento

"In effect, the city has implied that it will preserve the integrity of neighborhoods fortunate enough to be within residential zones, but leave neighborhoods in other zones open to the deleterious impact of adult entertainment businesses," Hurlbutt wrote.

The council passed the ordinance in June 1988. It prohibited adult businesses within 500 feet of other such businesses, within 2,500 feet of any church, school, restaurant or movie theater or within 500 feet of any open space or residentially zoned area.

"The Twin Falls ordinance reviewed here represents a significant test of the First Amendment freedoms," Hurlbutt wrote.

But the Twin Falls ordinance was a broad prohibition instead of a "narrowly prescribed set of rules," the judge wrote.

State, federal officials criticize Exxon sharply

VALDEZ, Alaska (AP) — State and federal officials unleashed a fresh barrage of criticism against Exxon on Friday, blasting it for "entirely inadequate" efforts to clean up spilled crude oil and declaring, "This is a war."

Dennis Kelso, commissioner of the Department of Environmental Conservation, said his department has

been left on standby three weeks after the 10.1 million-gallon spill. Officials are awaiting Exxon's plan to clean 30,000 shore sites.

"No plan has been submitted," Kelso said. "I do not think there is a written plan."

Gov. Steve Copper and Coast Guard Commandant Paul Yost returned to survey the hundreds of

miles of twisting, oily coastline. Yost set a Saturday deadline for Exxon to produce a cleanup plan for the spill, which officials said was not breaking up as fast as they had hoped.

Authorities said they probably would have to use high-pressure hot water spray to clean many beaches, a controversial technique because it kills organisms on and beneath the surface of the beach.

Shooting rampage leaves 5 dead

GLENN ELLEN, Calif. (AP) — A jealous winner went on a shooting rampage Friday and killed five people, including a woman believed to be his wife, then fled with his three young daughters, authorities said.

Police helicopters searched the lush region of vineyards and wineries in California's wine country and authorities issued an all-points bulletin for Remon Salcido, 28.

Investigators found the bodies of a woman, believed to be Salcido's mother-in-law, and two girls dead at the home of his in-laws and found another woman, believed to be his wife, dead at Salcido's home.

The fifth victim was shot to death near the Grand Cru Winery, where Salcido worked.

Salcido, 28, was believed to be armed with several weapons, Michaelson said.

Anti-nuclear protests end in arrests

LAS VEGAS (AP) — Anti-nuclear protesters tried to block traffic in and out of the Nevada Test Site on Friday, and 65 people were arrested on misdemeanor nuisance charges when they failed to move from the site's main road.

Forty others were arrested on trespass charges during the night.

Friday's arrests bring to 452 the number of citations issued since the annual "Reclaim the Test Site" protest began April 7 and ending Sunday.

Energy Department spokesman Jim Boyer said 400 protesters showed up near the gates to the site Thursday night and 200 of them sat down on the main road and blocked buses and cars carrying workers to and from the secret desert site.

Sunken Soviet sub on test mission

MOSCOW (AP) — A Soviet nuclear-powered submarine was testing deep sea dives and conducting scientific experiments when it caught fire and sank off Norway, Tass said Friday.

The official news agency said investigators have come up with four probable causes of April 7 disaster, which killed 42 of the 69 sailors aboard, but it did not list them. It also said a decision on whether to salvage the submarine could take months.

In Oslo, Norwegian experts said the sub's nuclear reactors and weapons are apparently intact in the vessel on the ocean floor.

Eight water samples collected near the sunken vessel, 5,000 feet beneath the ocean surface, detected no radiation leakage, said Norway's National Institute of Radiation Protection.

Tass said the submarine was an experimental vessel that was testing deep dives and unusual maneuvers, which was testing deep dives and unusual maneuvers.

learned the pair have friends in the Chicago area.

"We think they might be coming this way," said Illinois State Police Master Sgt. Clifford Mann, who added that Constanza, known as the cult's "godfather," and Ms. Aldeite, his "witch," had not yet been seen.

Constanza has homes in Miami and Mexico City.

The pall cast by the discovery of the gruesome human sacrifices remained most evident at the funeral homes in Matamoros.

More than 60 people came in search of missing relatives, Olvera Garcia said.

meeting with Andrus. On Friday, the association made public a letter it sent to Andrus demanding an apology for what it called "a slap in the face" to the Idaho livestock industry.

"Regardless of your intentions, your behavior and comments let the board with the impression that you are not sympathetic to the interests of the cattle industry," said the letter signed by Shaw, who is a Caldwell rancher.

Shaw said he and the other cattlemen were especially offended by what he said was a remark by the governor that livestock bills would have a hard time escaping his veto as long as Glenn is working as the cattlemen's chief spokesman.

"As governor, you could in fact abuse the power entrusted to your office to make good such a threat. However, we consider it irresponsible and a violation of public trust to threaten to veto — solely because of a personal grudge — unenacted future legislation which could very well benefit this state's citizens and its economy," said

Shaw.

Andrus has declined to respond directly to the cattlemen. However, Press Secretary Marc Johnson said on March 13, Andrus met with Shaw and ICA president-elect Bert Brackett of Rogerson.

Johnson said they agreed to have the entire Cattle Association board attend an April meeting with Andrus. But Johnson said Andrus said because of his past dealings with Glenn, he felt it would not be productive to have Glenn attend the session, and Glenn was not invited.

Andrus repeated that statement to Ms. Gilbert on Friday, saying he felt it would be a waste of time to try to deal with Glenn, and he didn't have the time to waste.

Shaw said the governor told them in March he didn't want to work with Glenn, and they said he didn't have to, but they would like Andrus to work with cattlemen on industry problems.

"There was no deal ever struck that Glenn would not attend the meeting on Wednesday with Andrus, said Shaw.

The governor and Shaw both said they discussed the Fish and Game Department, a herd district bill vetoed by Andrus, wilderness issues and the need for more industry promotion.

But Shaw said in a news release Friday the governor's behavior on Wednesday threatens future relationships unless Andrus apologizes.

Andrus said in his response that he has a good working relationship with all other commodity groups in Idaho, and wants one with cattlemen.

However, I do not believe that the confrontational political approach practiced by your executive director contributes to building a good working relationship," Andrus said.

"I have always believed that productive, working relationships are built on the basis of trust and honesty and not on the basis of confrontational politics," he said.

And as an example Friday afternoon, Andrus pointed to the first person out of the Apple Communion meeting. He was Dick Symms, Caldwell fruit grower and brother of Republican Sen. Steve Symms.

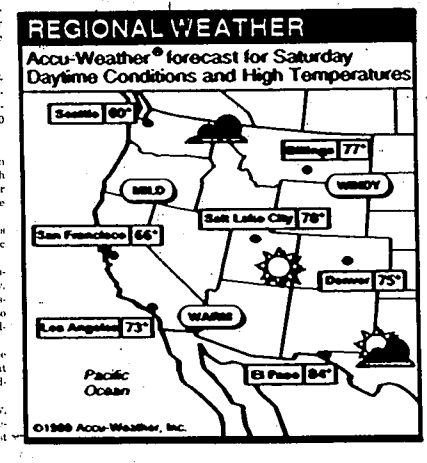
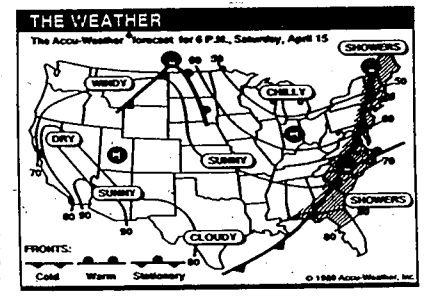

Jim Jones praises Salvation Army

TWIN FALLS - State officials can't solve Idaho's social problems without the help of volunteers, Attorney General Jim Jones said at a Salvation Army Advisory Board dinner Friday.

The 1989 Legislature approved several bills designed to help abused children, aid victims and get juvenile offenders back on track. But volunteers will be needed to help with those programs, he said.

More foster parents and court guardians will be needed as courts pursue child abuse, he said. And a reform of the juvenile justice system should be supplemented with volunteers willing to work with youth, he said.

"We need volunteers from people in the community to keep them out of a life of crime," Jones said.

Sheriff investigates sack containing explosives

JEROME - Sheriff's officials here are continuing to investigate a sack of unstable explosives found at a dairy about two miles north of the city but Sheriff Larry Gold said he's not prepared to call it a bomb.

Gold and sheriff's deputies found two sticks of dynamite with blasting caps and seven-foot fuses inside a garbage bag Wednesday when they were serving papers to take possession of some personal property of Oscar Hernandez, including dairy cattle and equipment.

While checking one of the outbuildings, they noticed a green garbage bag lying on the floor blocking their way to steps, Gold said. "I would say it wasn't a bomb," Gold said. "There's nothing to lead me to believe at this point that it was intended to injure people."

He said, however, the condition of the explosives was "unusual, because in most cases dynamite is not stored with a blasting cap and fuse attached to it."

Tracie O'Gorman improves Friday to good condition

OMAHA, Neb. - Liver transplant patient Tracie O'Gorman was listed in good condition Friday at the University of Nebraska Medical Center.

"She's been steadily improving," said Monica Foster, medical center spokeswoman.

Foster said O'Gorman, a 19-year-old Twin Falls woman, is only one step away from being released and becoming an outpatient. She will, however, have to remain close to the hospital a few weeks for daily treatment and check-ups.

First Magic Valley rancher stakes deprecation claim

ALMO - Cassin County rancher Harold Durfee is asking the state for \$2,000 after hungry deer, ruined 14 acres of alfalfa seed and damaged fences.

Durfee, of Almo, is the 10th rancher in the state and the first in the Magic Valley to file a deprecation claim with the state auditor. The 1989 Legislature appropriated \$500,000 to cover damage to farms from wildlife between July 1 of last year and next June 1.

American Red Cross now accepts donors to age 71

TWIN FALLS - The American Red Cross is welcoming back some-blood donors it turned away in the past.

The organization has begun accepting donations from people up to age 71, five years older than in the past.

"This rather arbitrary age cut-off was for the good of the donor," said Dr. Ted Walters, regional medical director.

But because Americans are remaining healthy longer, loyal donors were unnecessarily turned away, he said.

The next area blood drawing will be Monday in Rupert. The next Twin Falls blood drawing is scheduled May 8 and 9.

M-K awarded the contract to rehabilitate Milner Dam

BOISE (AP) - Morrison Knudsen Corp. has been awarded a \$3 million contract for rehabilitation of the Milner Dam and powerhouse on the Snake River.

Officials of the Boise-based engineering company said the work will start immediately on the project, financed by Idaho Power Co. and the Twin Falls and Northside canal companies, which co-own the facility 25 miles east of Twin Falls.

Renovation work should be completed in 1992.

attorney and general partner in the Bliss Valley Foods mushroom project Thomas Walker Jr. was standing in line for dinner at the local Pizza Hut when Fred Surbaugh and Ken Porter, two local doctors, walked in.

They told him they and other investors in the farm had called an emergency meeting at Canyon Springs Inn.

Walker said he went to the meeting and found an "icy atmosphere." Most of the investors were there, Walker said. But Robert Erkins, the farm's other major partner, wasn't, Walker said.

Walker said he was put on the "hot seat" at the meeting with questions about Erkins and the management of the mushroom farm. "These were my friends and I was uncomfortable," Walker said.

Walker's testimony in court this week ties together several versions of why Erkins was relieved of "major" management responsibilities in July 1985 at a gourmet mushroom farm near Bliss.

Idaho First National Bank is suing Bliss Valley Foods, claiming it defaulted on loan

payments for its mushroom farm project. Erkins and Walker, who began the farm, counter-sued, claiming the bank forced the operation into default.

Much of the testimony in the first two weeks of the trial has centered on the year 1985, when a new manager was brought in, the million dollar operation was reorganized and the project began to go sour.

Throughout that year, when Kamal Hyder was hired as general manager, working relations between him and Erkins were strained. Relations between Erkins and Walker also were frayed, according to testimony.

Erkins said in earlier testimony Hyder was hired as general manager of the operation in January 1985 after the bank refused to approve himself as general manager because of his age.

Walker's testimony this week included accounts of numerous letters and memos between Hyder, Walker and Erkins.

Some of the letters written by Hyder criticized Erkins for his management.

Symposium downplays nuclear risk from INEL

IDAHO FALLS - Hopes for future energy supplies in this country are being developed in Eastern Idaho.

But along with those hopes are some old fears of environmental radioactive contamination - mostly unfounded, participants of the 31st annual Idaho Academy of Science Symposium were told Friday.

A reactor is being developed by Argonne National Laboratory at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory that would extend current energy resources 1,000 years, said Bob Seidell of Argonne.

The reactor is an integral fast reactor (IIR) relies on designed and natural characteristics for "inherently safe" operation, he said. If overheated the nuclear fuel would expand and slow the rate of the reactor's nuclear reaction.

The reactor also is able to make use of the energy in uranium and reaction by-products that in ordinary reactors would be removed and disposed of as waste.

The one serious flaw, however, is the fact that the reactor is cooled with liquid sodium, a metal. Sodium reacts violently with water. A recent reactor accident in the Soviet Union was caused by a sodium explosion.

Extra precaution and contingencies have been applied to the Argonne reactor to prevent the introduction of water into the cooling sodium. The sodium transfers heat from the reactor to pipes, in which water is turned to steam to produce electricity.

As an extra precaution, the sodium can be dumped outside the reactor if a leak develops and water gets into the sodium pipes. The sodium would be spread on the ground and an explosion could be prevented, Seidell said.

Despite improvements in reactor safety and waste-disposal techniques at INEL, many people still are apprehensive about

Irrigation water will flow soon

TWIN FALLS - No water shortage in the Magic Valley this year. Most area canal companies and irrigation districts have set delivery dates for their water and report sufficient supplies for the entire growing season.

The Northside Canal Co. in Jerome began filling its system last Monday and will begin delivering this Monday, a later than normal start-up date.

"We're a week behind at least," said Manager Ted Diehl. "We don't have too many orders now, just the sugar beet people."

March's above-average moisture cut the need for early water, but these current windy days will increase demand soon, he said.

Northside's water supply "looks pretty good," Diehl said. No shortage this year.

The American Falls Reservoir District No. 2 will turn its water on Friday and should be able to start delivering on April 20, said Dick Oneida, the manager.

"We're going to be in pretty fair shape, probably a little better than last year," he said.

The district has enough water that it should be able to deliver 100 percent of the full season's water.

There was water in the Gooding Milner Canal last week. The Twin Falls Canal Co. diverted some of its water there after a

Minidoka official denies building for detention center

RUPERT - A juvenile detention facility won't be located in the old American Legion building in Rupert, stated Minidoka County Prosecuting Attorney Charles Creason Jr. in a letter to Rupert City Attorney Don Chisholm on Friday.

Minidoka County commissioners and the sheriff's department have been looking for

some time now for juvenile facilities that meet federal regulations. They thought they had one with the old house, most recently used as a Senior's Citizen Center, sitting diagonally across from the Minidoka County Courthouse.

Plans for the facility, however, met with strong resistance from the neighbors around the building. City and county officials had a few public meetings on the idea, which drew large crowds.

The Rupert Zoning Commission was expected to decide next week whether the facility would meet zoning regulations.

The county still believes the building would be the ideal place for the juvenile detention center but it will not go against public sentiment, Commissioner Clarence Bellam said.

Bellam said the Rupert City Council referring the matter to the planning

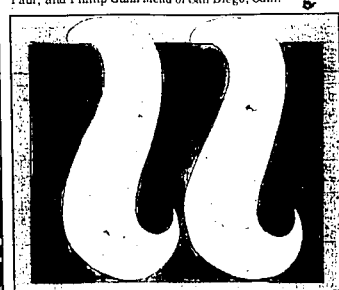
County residents can see all the local entries in a display planned for the next few weeks. Details will be announced.

The second-place design was submitted by Mary

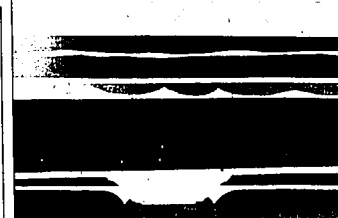
Elizabeth Jones of Filer. She used wavelike shapes to represent falls against a blue background.

Judge to rule on opposition to nursing home screenings

BOISE (AP) — After hearing almost 90 minutes of additional arguments, U.S. District Judge Marion Callister announced he will rule as soon as possible on an attempt to block a federal program requiring patients to be screened for mental illness or retribution before admission to nursing homes.

The hearing Friday before Callister was the third this year on the Idaho Health Care Association and Idaho Hospital Association lawsuit seeking a permanent injunction against the program, which was implemented nationwide on Jan. 1.

Callister refused to block its implementation in Idaho in an order issued Dec. 28, but allowed nursing home operators to screen patients within 15 days after admission. That order remains in effect.

A federal judge in Texas granted an injunction against the program Feb. 21 until the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services issues rules and regulations as required by law. The American Health Care Association, the parent organization of the Idaho group, also filed suit against the requirements in U.S. District Court in Washington, D.C., this week.

The program calls for basic "Level 1" screening of prospective nursing home patients before admission to determine whether they may be mentally ill or retarded. If there are indications of a problem, a more comprehensive "Level 2" screening is required to determine the patient's

Depredation claims go over \$275,000

BOISE (AP) — The claims filed by landowners for wildlife depredation damage last winter have passed the \$275,000 mark.

State Auditor J.D. Williams on Friday received four more claims, bringing to 10 the number claiming damage to crops, fences or equipment from deer, elk and antelope. The deadline for filing claims for the last six months of 1988 is May 1.

The four newest claims covered most of southern Idaho.

Williams said Ralph Yates, Pollock, asked \$3,150. Lila Downey, Cambridge, asked \$15,500. Lane Moss, Driggs, asked \$400 and Harold Durfee, Almo, filed a claim for \$2,000.

need for "active treatment" and other forms of care that might not be available in a nursing home.

But nursing home operators contend the requirements are vague and that implementing the program will create a backlog of patients in hospitals waiting to get into nursing

homes. In the meantime, the suit contends, the nursing homes will lose revenue and hospitals will be forced to keep patients with no real prospect of being reimbursed for their extra expenses.

"It's created a lot of confusion, a lot of hardship, for no good reason," said Donald Lojek, a Boise attorney representing the Idaho Health Care Association.

He said Health and Human Services and the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare had no regulations in place on Jan. 1 to provide guidance on how to conduct the pre-admission screening. The state adopted rules on Jan. 6, but Lojek said they were based only on draft implementing instructions from Health and Human Services that did nothing to clear up operators' confusion.

"They are built on a foundation of sand," he said. "The state regulations

receive Medicaid or Medicare reimbursement for the care of the majority of patients. He urged Callister to issue a declaratory judgment that the program is unconstitutional and an "unprecedented interference" with the contract rights of health care providers.

But Michael DeAngelo, deputy attorney general for Health and Welfare, said the state is mandated to carry out the program by Health and Human Services, which in turn was required to implement it by Congress.

And since Health and Welfare receives more than two-thirds of the Medicaid and Medicaid funding it distributes to health care providers from the federal government, DeAngelo said, "the state has very little choice as to whether it should or should not implement this particular program."

Resolutions face court test

BOISE (AP) — Attorney General Jim Jones says it may take a court decision to determine whether the Idaho Legislature can use resolutions — bypassing the governor — to repeal rules and regulations adopted by state agencies.

The 1989 session tried it, ignoring advice from the attorney general two years ago that the process probably was unconstitutional. If the Legislature wanted to repeal an agency rule or regulation, it should do it through the regular method of passing a bill, Jones said in the 1987 advisory.

Even armed with that advice, Jones said Friday afternoon in a letter to Health and Welfare Director Rich Donovan, the Legislature passed a resolution repealing a rule

on sewage systems.

"It is clear, therefore, that there is a major disagreement between the legislative branch of government and the executive branch regarding this issue," Jones said.

"Because of the respect that must be accorded a coordinate branch of government, it is my belief that this matter should now be resolved by the judicial branch of government," he advised.

Donovan earlier asked Jones whether his 1987 opinion still holds, and the 1989 Legislature's action was improper.

In the last days of the 1989 session, the Legislature "approved a resolution rejecting sewage disposal regulations adopted by the Board of Health and Welfare about 3½ years ago."

Man backs truck over wife at packing plant

MOORE (AP) — A 55-year-old woman has died of injuries she suffered when a truck driven by her husband ran over her at the Hi-Alta Packing Plant.

Authorities said Lila Shaffer of Moore had just finished weighing her husband's potato truck on the plant's scale Wednesday afternoon when she walked behind the truck to the north end of the building and was hit as the vehicle backed up.

'Peacekeepers' to help officials oversee march against racism

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — Law enforcement officials in Kootenai County will have some help ensuring next week's march against white-supremacist activity is non-violent.

Lisa Anderson of Coeur d'Alene, organizer of the April 22 march and head of Citizens for Nonviolent Action Against Racism, said Thursday that the group has recruited "peacekeepers" trained in non-violent tactics to keep marchers in line.

The group hopes to prevent incidents that could lead to confrontations with police or counter-demonstrators, she said.

Ms. Anderson said 30 peacekeepers have been recruited, and marchers will be asked to follow a non-violent code of behavior prohibiting verbal abuse, drug or alcohol use and the carrying of weapons or items that could be construed as weapons.

The "Walk for Racial Equality"

will coincide with a gathering of racist "skinheads" at the Rev. Richard Butler's Aryan Nations Church compound north of Hayden Lake. Butler has said he will instruct people attending his conference to avoid mingling with marchers.

Ms. Anderson said she expects 800 to 2,000 marchers from throughout the Northwest and elsewhere.

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Jones: Court won't completely overturn legal abortion ruling

REXBURG (AP) — Republican Attorney General Jim Jones is not expecting the U.S. Supreme Court to completely overturn its 1973 decision legalizing abortion.

But after joining attorneys general from other states in backing Missouri's bid to regain state authority to ban the controversial procedure, Jones says he does expect the court to grant states increase regulatory power.

At stake in Idaho, he told the Ricks College Young Republicans on Thursday, is the time frame for abortions and at what point they must be performed in hospitals. Currently, an abortion in Idaho after the 13th week of pregnancy must be done in a hospital.

The Supreme Court is scheduled to hear arguments on a Missouri case later this month.

Should the high court return full authority over abortion to the states, Idaho's current law calls for immediately making the procedure illegal and imposing prison sentences on doctors and women

involved in abortions.

An attempt to at least remove those prison terms failed in the state Legislature last month. Some lawmakers pushed to change the state law now for fear the Supreme Court decision could come before next winter's session opens and the mandatory prison sentences would be on the books until then.

Jones predicted that whatever new discretion the Supreme Court gives states in the Missouri case will be quickly adopted by state lawmakers.

On another matter, Jones said the dramatically higher prices Idahoans are paying for gasoline do not appear to be out of line.

With prices up six cents as 20 cents a gallon in the last few weeks to around \$1.09 for regular and unleaded around the state, Jones said the major reason was increased charges by the major oil companies.

A California attorney has filed a suit against Exxon, charging negligence in creating the spill.

Jones: Wants to suppress victims' names

BOISE (AP) — Attorney General Jim Jones says he plans to try again with a proposal to forbid publication of the names or identifying matter about victims of sexual abuse.

It was one of several measures the attorney general will present to the Legislature, he said in a speech Friday to the Idaho Victim Rights Forum here.

He said Idaho's criminal justice system has moved from where it was "callous and unresponsive" five years ago to the rights and needs of victims of crimes, to a much improved response to those needs.

Jones tried unsuccessfully in the 1988 Legislative session for a law forbidding the disclosure of victims of rape and similar sex crimes.

He said he will ask the next

session to reconsider its refusal to impose mandatory minimum prison terms on child abusers and drug dealers, even if it means the state must build more maximum security prison space.

"We need to construct additional maximum security prison space in order to keep child molesters, drug pushers and violent criminals behind bars for longer periods of time," Jones said. "That will cost money, but crime statistics show that longer terms of incarceration for serious offenders is cost-effective in the long run."

He said he will try again on a proposal to provide counseling benefits to family members of sex abuse, and murder victims through the victims' compensation fund.

Jones said he also will propose a new law allowing prospective

employers to ask for any history of sex abuse, if the person will have responsibility for supervising children.

The attorney general also he may ask the U.S. Supreme Court to declare that the Idaho Supreme Court misinterpreted its ruling banning the use of victim impact statements in capital cases.

The Idaho court ruled against the use of such a statement in the sentencing of Jaimit Charboneau in a Jerome County case and ordered resentencing on that and other grounds.

"It is no reason why the survivors of a murder victim should not have the right to advise the court how the crime has affected them and state their views as to what the appropriate punishment should be," Jones said.

Official rules death accidental

POCAATELLO (AP) — A pathologist said Friday a Fort Hall Indian Reservation resident missing since late February died of natural or accidental causes.

"There were no injuries to indicate otherwise," Dr. Charles Garrison of Pocatello said based on the autopsy he conducted on the body of Theodora Nevada, 21.

Ms. Nevada's body was found in the Hiline Canal near Pocatello on Monday, and criminal investigator Clem Hidalgo of the Fort Hall Police said an investigation was initiated just as it is in the case of every death on the reservation.

Fugitive waives extradition

BOISE (AP) — A former Nampa bank employee could be returned to Idaho next week to face embezzlement charges, authorities said Friday.

Steven Francis, 31, was arrested Thursday in Fort Lauderdale, Fla., and charged under a federal complaint, FBI Special Agent T.C. Brock said.

Francis is accused of embezzling about \$90,000 from the Treasure Valley Bank in Nampa, where he was vice president of the real estate division.

Brock said Francis had been living in Fort Lauderdale for about two months since disappearing from Nampa.

Soviet Georgia removes leaders in charge when protesters died

MOSCOW (AP) — Soviet Georgia's leaders removed the republic's Communist Party chief and premier Friday, five days after troops dispersed protesters in a bloody melee that killed 19 people. The KGB chief was named party leader.

"Nobody and nothing can justify the deaths of innocent people," said Foreign Minister Eduard A. Shevardnadze, the former party chief in the southern republic who was dispatched to his homeland after Sunday's bloodshed, in a speech to the local party plenum that made the leadership changes.

Communist Party First Secretary Dzumber I. Patisashvili, who had accepted responsibility for the tragedy, had his resignation accepted unanimously by the party's Central Committee after "heated discussion," said Foreign Ministry spokesman Genady I. Gerasimov.

Givi G. Gumbaridze, who has been

Georgia's KGB chief for two months, was elected to replace Patisashvili. Gumbaridze, 45, previously served as party leader in Tbilisi, Georgia's capital city of 1.2 million people.

Premier Zurab Chkheidze also was removed at a separate meeting of Georgia's Presidium; or top government body, the official Tass news agency reported from Tbilisi. Nadari Chitanava, a Central Committee secretary, was named the new head of the republic's government, Tass said.

Georgia's president, Givi Charkezaya, also offered to resign, and the matter will be considered at the next session of Georgia's Supreme Soviet parliament, which is empowered to remove him, Tass said.

Tass quoted Shevardnadze as saying the lessons from the incident were "difficult and bitter," adding that the events were "detrimental" to President Mikhail S. Gorbachev's reform policies.

Gerasimov, speaking at a Moscow briefing, did not give a reason for the shakeup in Georgia but earlier said leaders there had accepted responsibility for ordering the troops to clear a square of pro-independence demonstrators. At least 19 people were killed by official count.

The republic's Communist Party newspaper Zarya Vostoka, in an editorial carried in part by Tass, placed part of the blame for the bloodshed on Georgia's party leaders, saying they couldn't escape responsibility "when a political decision taken by the leadership was carried out, unfortunately, in such a way that it led to heavy moral, ethical and human losses."

However, Zhorab Lomidze, deputy director of the official Georgian news agency Gruzinform, said by telephone from Tbilisi that the officials were replaced "because they did not maintain order in the city."

Tanks unsettle Baltic residents

MOSCOW (AP) — Tanks and armored vehicles rumbled through three restive cities in the Baltics this week, frightening residents already shaken by a fatal clash between the military and demonstrators in Soviet Georgia, activists and journalists said Friday.

Military officials said it was only a training exercise, and the heavy armor did nothing more threatening than drive around. But the timing frightened and infuriated residents of Riga, Tallinn and Tartu, journalists said.

In addition, "a monstrous number of troops" appeared Monday and

Tuesday in Tashkent, the capital of Uzbekistan in Soviet Central Asia, following a nationalist meeting Sunday, according to Moscow activist Viktor Rezunov. There were no tanks and no curfew, he added.

Residents of downtown Riga, the capital of Latvia, woke up Monday to the thunder of tank treads on the cobblestones, said Alex Grigoriev, editor of the Popular Front newspaper Atmuda, or Awakening. They looked out their windows to find 10-30 tanks and other armored vehicles rolling down the street at full speed, with guns aimed both forward and sideways — at them, Grigoriev said.

"There was panic and indignation," he said. "It was seen as a provocation and an effort to exert pressure."

Ivar Keizers, a secretary of the Latvian Communist Party, appeared on television in Riga on Thursday to join the public complaints and deny military claims that local officials had been warned about the maneuvers, said Mikhail Bonden, correspondent for unofficial journal Express-Khronika. Five tanks were seen Thursday on the streets of Tartu, Estonia's university city, shortly before a large student demonstration against military service, said Tartu resident Petr Vikhalein.

Israelis wound over 20 during protests

JERUSALEM (AP) — Army gunfire Friday wounded more than 20 Palestinians in the occupied lands, including a 3-year-old girl, during protests of the bloody raid by border police in the village of Nahalin, Arab hospital officials said.

The army said a 14-year-Palestinian died of a bullet wound in the head sustained last week during clashes with troops in the West Bank town of Jenin, an army spokeswoman said.

In Jerusalem, police bused residents of the occupied West Bank and Gaza Strip from entering the Al Aqsa Mosque, Islam's third holiest site.

The army launched an investigation Friday into the raid before dawn Thursday at Nahalin in which at least five Palestinians were killed, the national Iim news agency reported.

In Geneva, the Red Cross said six Arabs were killed in the West Bank village near Bethlehem and accused Israeli paramilitary border police of firing "without discrimination and without restraint."

Also on Friday, territorial officials said 13 guerrillas have been killed in battles with security forces.

Afghan convoy moves past blockade

KABUL, Afghanistan (AP) — A convoy bringing food and fuel to Kabul broke through a guerrilla blockade Friday, with Afghan soldiers and helicopter gunships providing cover as the trucks rolled down the Salang Highway.

The government said another major highway was reopened Friday, allowing trucks to carry supplies to Jalalabad, which has been under rebel fire for more than five weeks.

Fighting continued on the Salang Highway for nearly two hours, and thick, black smoke billowed from the mountains a few miles away. The highway, a vital supply route leading into the deprived capital, was closed a week ago by Muslim guerrillas who are hoping to starve the city into surrender.

Guerrillas have time to leave Namibia

WINDHOEK, Namibia (AP) — U.N. officials and Namibia's South African-appointed administrator extended to April 21 the deadline for 900 black nationalist guerrillas to withdraw to Angola to salvage an independence plan.

"A prolonged stalemate in the affected areas is in no one's interest," said a joint statement.

Tanzanians face hunger after floods

DAR ES SALAAM, Tanzania (AP) — Heavy rains turned roads to mud, cutting food supplies to 7,000 villagers in southern Tanzania for three weeks, a newspaper reported Friday.

"The Uthuru said 12,000 tons of corn could not be transported to millers in Iringa, 240 miles southwest of the Indian Ocean port of Dar-es-Salaam. The newspaper said villagers were buying corn on the black market.

U.N. prepares to assist 70,000 Somali refugees

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — U.N. agencies are preparing a \$40 million program to assist 70,000 Somalis displaced from their homes by war, officials said Friday.

U.N. agencies have been asked to submit a report on the program to the office of Undersecretary-General Abdulrahim Farah by April 24, said agency officials, speaking on condition of anonymity.

Somalia has a population of 5.3 million and is one of the poorest nations in the world.

The government of President Mohammed Siad Barre has been battling a rebellion by the Somali National Movement for seven years in the north of the country.

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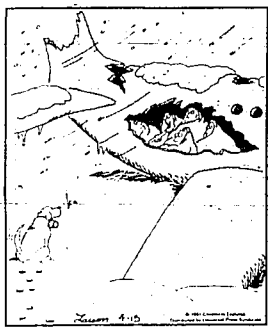
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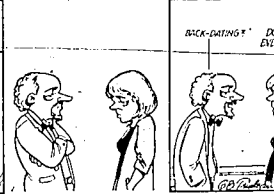
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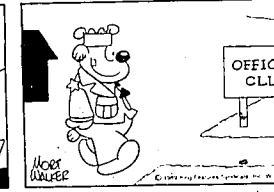
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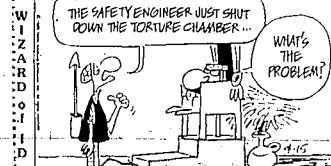
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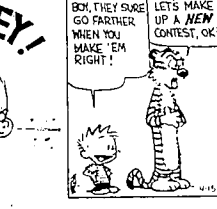
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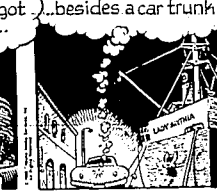
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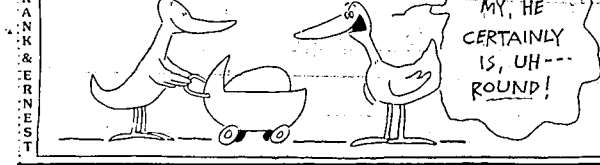
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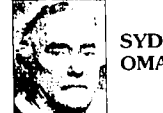

Ms. Ryan won the jackpot in a Florida lottery Sept. 3, 1988. All she wants in return for her donation, Morris said, is to be kept informed how the cat project is going.

Critics have complained the show focuses on sex rather than nursing and casts the nursing profession in a bad light.

Bio alleges Kennedy amphetamine use

NEW YORK (AP) — The first excerpts of an unauthorized biography of Jacqueline Kennedy Onassis will be published Monday.

The weekly Star, a supermarket tabloid, paid \$60,000 for five parts it

will run on consecutive Mondays from "A Woman Called Jackie," by C. David Heymann.

The Star reported in its April 18 edition that the excerpts will include disclosures about amphetamine use by President John F. Kennedy and his wife, and a phone call by Marilyn Monroe to Mrs. Kennedy at the White House.

Book sales will begin May 2. The New York Daily News, Cosmopolitan, New Woman and McCall's have second serialization rights, USA Today reported.

Mrs. Kennedy's spokeswoman, Nancy Tuckerman, said Friday that Mrs. Kennedy had no comment.

Letters bring speculation of royal divorce

LONDON (AP) — Letters to Princess Anne from a handsome aide have raised speculation of a royal divorce — an occurrence that has wrought constitutional upheavals and brought heartbreak to Queen Elizabeth II's family.

Whether Anne's 15-year marriage to Capt. Mark Phillips is really on the rocks or is simply one of those long-distance unions not unusual in the British upper classes remains open to question.

The queen's only daughter and Phillips, a commander and former army captain who runs equestrian centers, lead virtually separate lives. They were apart for more than half the time last year. They have two children — Peter, 11, and Zara, 7.

News of the mysterious collection of letters to Anne, 38, from Royal Navy Cmdr. Timothy Laurence, a 34-year-old bachelor and equerry at Buckingham Palace, gave new life to rumors which began in 1981 that her marriage is in trouble.

The four stolen letters were delivered last week to a mass circulation newspaper, the Sun, which did not publish them. Police are investigating the theft.

With panting headlines, the tabloid press said Anne and Laurence are in love.

As usual, the principal characters said little or nothing.

Anne carried on with a punishing schedule of routine royal engagements. Phillips, 40, went off to Spain to see about setting up a riding center there, and Laurence dropped out of sight.

Anne is only seventh in line to the throne — behind her brothers Charles, Andrew and Edward, two young nephews and a baby niece — so her divorce would hardly bring a constitutional crisis.

It was not always so. Divorce has hung over the throne since the six-times married Henry

VIII broke with the Roman Catholic Church in 1534 because the Vatican would not annul his marriage to Catherine of Aragon.

Each succeeding monarch is titular head of the Church of England, which frowns on divorce.

Anne's great-uncle, Edward VIII, gave up the throne to marry a twice-divorced American, Wallis Simpson. In a celebrated broadcast on Dec. 11, 1936, he told the nation he could not go on as king without the support of the woman he loved.

As the Duke and Duchess of Windsor, the couple lived in exile, mainly in Paris. He died in 1972 and she in 1986.

In the next generation, the queen's only sister, Princess Margaret, gave up the man she loved because he was divorced. He was Royal Air Force Group Capt. Peter Townsend.

The young princess, then aged 25, told the nation that, "mindful of the church's teaching that Christian marriage is indissoluble; conscious of my duty to the Commonwealth, I have resolved to put these considerations before any others."

Townsend, a dashing Battle of Britain pilot and former aide to Margaret's father, George VI, moved to Belgium where he married again happily.

Margaret has never seemed to find happiness.

In 1969 she married Tony Armstrong-Jones, a talented photogra-

pher and designer who was created Earl of Snowdon.

The Snowdons, who have two children, were divorced in 1978. He has remarried; she has not.

Despite changed attitudes in a country where one in three marriages ends in divorce, some royal commentators speculate that Anne will choose to stay married to Phillips while leading a separate life.

Richard Kay, royal correspondent for London's Daily Mail, argued that another royal divorce would "erode further the concept that the royal family are somehow different from the rest of us."

In the 1970s, Princess Margaret had a widely publicized relationship with a London socialite 17 years her junior, Roddy Llewellyn. Newspapers regularly photographed them heading off on Caribbean vacations.

But, generally, discretion is the key for the modern royals.

In contrast, Queen Victoria's heir, Edward VII, was noted most for his famous mistresses: actress Lillie Langtry; social siren Daisy Brooke who became Countess of Warwick; and Scottish baronet's daughter Alice Keppel.

He came to the throne in 1901 and continued seeing Mrs. Keppel until he died in 1910.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE™ BOBBY WOLFF

"If you trap the moment before it's ripe, The tears of repentance you'll, certainly wipe; But if once you let the ripe moment pass, You can never wipe off the tears of woe."

Today's interesting game provides a lesson in the futility of taking a premature and useless discard. The hand was dealt in a Swiss team event at the ACBL Fall Championships.

At the first table, both of dummy's high hearts were cashed, South discarding a low diamond. The trump finesse won and the trump ace was cashed before South started clubs. West followed high-low to show an even number, and East held off his ace until the third round. Then he cashed his high trump and exited with a heart, leaving South in deep trouble. Without an escape, South had to cash the two diamonds, sending the game one down.

When Jim Musumeci of Athens, Ga., played the spade game, he saw the advantages of leaving a heart honor in dummy. And at trick two, he took the trump finesse. After cashing the spade ace, he started the hearts, and East held off until the third round, as before.

Note the difference. East cashed his high spade but had no safe exit in hearts. (Dummy would score the high heart and high club.) So East was forced to lead a diamond.

West's diamond five was ducked to dummy, with good results. Since the diamond return dropped East's king to establish the jack in dummy.

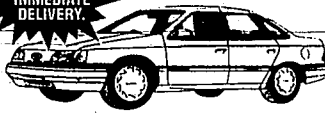

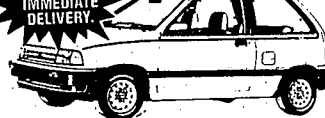
