TWIN FALLS — Citing "changes blowing in the wind," executives of Twin Falls Bank & Trust Thursday announced the sale of the locally owned bank to a Utah holding company.

First Security Corp., based in Salt Lake City and parent company of First Security Bank of Idaho, will purchase Twin Falls Bank & Trust for approximately \$29 million cash, said Curtis H. Eaton, president of Twin Falls Bank and Trust Co.

With 18,000 shares outstanding, the Twin Falls bank's approximately 270 shareholders will receive \$1.61 per share.

The sale is subject to the approval of shareholders and government regulatory agencies. James E. Phelps, chairman and chief executive officer for First Security Bank of Idaho, said he expects approval within four months.

First Security Corp., which reports \$5.2 billion in assets, operates 161 banks in Idaho, Utah and Wyoming.

The Twin Falls Bank & Trust acquisition will boost the number of First Security branches in the Magic Valley to 12.

"There are changes blowing in the wind nationally," said Curtis T. Eaton, Twin Falls Bank & Trust chairman and chief executive officer, and father of Curtis H. Eaton, during a press conference Thursday.

Reading slowly from a prepared statement, Eaton cited an industry shift away from locally owned financial institutions. "Recently one of our competitive institutions changed its name with an apparent focus on regionalism rather than just Idaho," he said. "We foresee advantages to our customer, employees and community to be on the train when it pulls from the station rather than try to catch it at full speed."

Question: If I have borrowed money from Twin Falls Bank & Trust, will the bank's sale affect my loan?

Answer: "Absolutely not," says Curtis H. Eaton, bank president, "in no respect whatsoever."

Q: Will my savings account at the Bank & Trust be affected?

A: "Your savings account is absolutely secure by a capital position of the Bank & Trust which is not quite double of what is required by regulatory authorities," Eaton says. "In addition, it is insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp."

Q: Will I have to have to order new checks?

A: "Your checking account will be the same for the foreseeable future," says Eaton. "You can use checks, deposit slips that you now have. There will be no change until you are notified, which will be months away from now."

Q: What will happen to people who work for the two banks?

A: They'll continue in their present jobs, Eaton says, "indefinitely into the future."

Idahoans' income soars during 1988

WASHINGTON — Per capita income in Idaho in 1988 performed beyond the expectations of government analysts, bolstering optimism over the strength of the state's economic resurgence.

The Commerce Department reported Thursday that per capita income for the state — the amount of income attributed to each man, woman and child — rose 6.7 percent from 1987 — an increase exceeded by only 13 other states.

The hike in the income figure to \$12,657 last year was nearly \$100 higher than state economists had projected last January, pushing the state's standing nationally up three notches from 1987 to 42nd. Idaho's per capita income ranking in 1986, the year before the current economic recovery began, had slipped to 46th.

The state's performance also may have begun reversing the widening

gap between Idaho and national per capita income, which rose 6.2 percent. The state figure for 1988 was up nearly a half point to 77 percent of the national amount of \$16,444. That marked only the second time since 1980, when Idaho per capita income stood at nearly 87 percent of the national level, that there was a marked rise in ratio of the state's figure to the national amount.

Idaho's income continued running behind that of all the bordering states except Utah, but the 6.7 percent increase from the previous year was exceeded only by Wyoming at 7.9 percent and Oregon at 6.9 percent. The state's percentage boost was also higher than the average hikes for all regions of the nation except on the East Coast.

Navy seeks cause of turret blast

WASHINGTON — The bodies of 47 sailors killed in the gun explosion on the Iowa arrived in the United States on Thursday as the Navy tried to figure out what caused the battleship's turret to blow up.

None of the guns in the No. 2 turret had been fired before the explosion killed the seamen, Navy officials said. They discarded a theory that the blast had been sparked by red-hot debris left in the gun's breech by earlier rounds. The Navy organized a board of inquiry and placed a moratorium on firing 16-inch guns, found only on the Iowa and its three sister battleships, the New Jersey, the

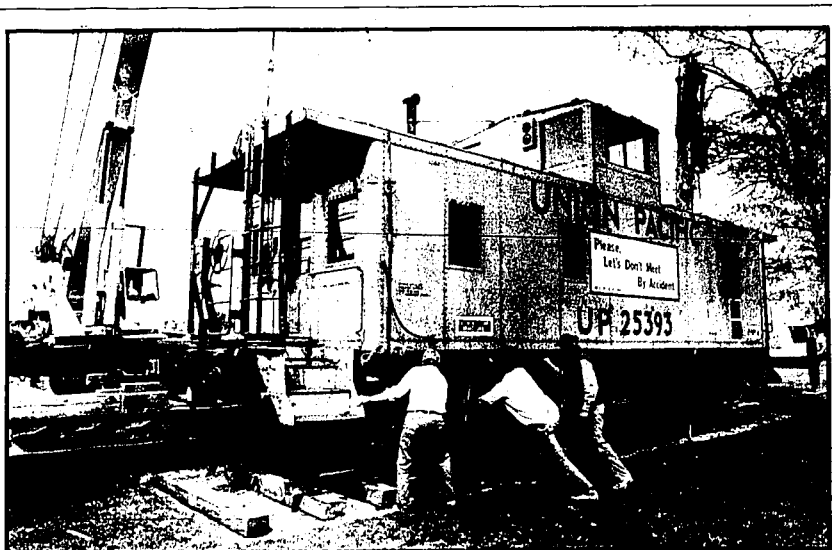
Wisconsin and the Missouri.

The Iowa was headed back to its home port at Norfolk, Va., while the bodies of the dead were flown to the military mortuary at Dover Air Force Base in Delaware and families of the battleship's 1,600 crewmen waited to learn whether their relatives were among the dead.

At the White House, chief of staff John Sununu announced President Bush will attend a memorial service Monday for the victims in Norfolk. He said the president had heard of the service and told his staff "if it could be fitted in, he wanted to be there ... wants to be a part."

Hunts came close to cornering silver market

WASHINGTON — A silver-buying binge by Nelson Bunker and William Herbert Hunt came within weeks of cornering the world's silver bullion market, the U.S. government argues in previously secret documents.

But attorneys for the Hunts say the silver shopping spree was nothing out of the ordinary for the sons of legendary Texas oilman H.H. Hunt. "H.H. Hunt was a wildcatter" who "raised his sons with a wildcatter's philosophy, which involved risk-taking and rapid decision-making," according to the now unsealed documents filed by the brothers' attorneys.

In 1987 filings with the Commodity Futures Trading Commission, the attorneys said the brothers' investment stemmed from their preference for

investing in hard assets as a hedge against inflation and monetary uncertainty. And, they said, it was natural for the Hunts to invest "on a relatively large scale in light of their substantial wealth."

In a previously sealed submission by the CFTC to an administrative law judge, the agency contends that had the scheme by the Hunts and others not collapsed, "by the end of May 1980, they could have owned virtually the entire available world supply of deliverable, 999 silver bullion."

Many documents in the case have been sealed from the public view since 1985 at the Hunts' request; the stack is now more than 5 feet tall. The filings in the quasi-judicial proceeding were released by the agency this week in response to a Freedom of Information Act request by The Associated Press.

The CFTC has accused the brothers, heirs to one of the world's greatest fortunes, of rigging the price of silver futures between fall 1979 and March 27, 1980. That day came to be known as "Silver Thursday" as prices crashed to \$10 an ounce from a one-time high of more than \$50 an ounce.

Thousands of investors, who had purchased silver on credit, lost billions of dollars when they were forced to sell it to pay their debts. The Hunts themselves lost an estimated \$1.3 billion.

Big asteroid misses Earth on March pass; it'll return in October

WASHINGTON — An asteroid big enough to wipe out cities whizzed past the Earth last month before astronomers even knew it was there.

That shows how hard it is to forecast a natural disaster from space, a NASA scientist said Thursday.

The mountain-sized asteroid flashed by the Earth at a speed of 46,000 miles an hour and was not even detected until days after it had become only a receding point of light, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration announced.

Astronomers reported that the object missed the Earth by only a half million miles — about twice the distance between the Earth and moon. In cosmic terms, this is considered a "close call."

Had it hit the Earth, said Bevan French, a scientist in NASA's solar system exploration division, the asteroid would have created a crater the size of the District of Columbia and spread destruction for 100 miles in all directions. Other effects would be felt thousands of miles away, he said.

"The object would be making the equivalent of 40 billion tons of TNT," said French. "That would be equal to about 40,000 hydro-

gen bombs all going off at the same time."

French said that 1989FC is in an orbit that crosses the orbits of Earth, Mars and Venus. He said the asteroid is moving away from the sun now, but will pass within 20 million miles of the Earth early in October.

Experts now are tracking the asteroid to gain a more refined estimate of its orbit. French said 1989FC passed close enough to the Earth for its orbit to be affected by the planet's gravitational influence. Scientists will have to take this into account when calculating the asteroid's new orbit.

Henry Holt, a retired U.S. Geological Survey

scientist now working on a NASA-funded project to detect and track asteroids that cross the Earth's orbit, found the asteroid in photographs taken almost a week after it had flown past.

French said the fact that the asteroid, called 1989FC, was not seen earlier comes as no surprise.

"An asteroid that was heading right for you would look just like another small fixed star and might be very difficult to detect until it was too late to do anything about it," he said.

There have been several federally funded studies to determine how to protect the Earth

from being bombed by outer space rocks, but little else has been done, said French.

"Your best bet would be to identify these several hundred or thousand Earth crossers (asteroids) and calculate their orbit," he said. "Then you would know when you are in danger."

State education panel favors increases in student fees

POCATELLO (AP) — At three of the four state-supported colleges and universities, student fees and charges are going up.

But at the University of Idaho, where a student referendum voted 2-1 against a fee increase proposal, the increase may be much smaller than originally planned.

After a long discussion on the need to give the Moscow school more money to work on accreditation problems, the Board of Education voted unanimously Thursday to start hearings on boosting student fees.

President Richard Gibb proposed raising the matriculation fee by up to \$25 per semester; the per credit-hour charge for part-time students by \$5 and graduate and professional fees by \$10 per semester.

Also, Gibb recommended boosting out-of-state tuition at Idaho, now \$1,000 per semester, by \$100, twice the original proposal.

Only Lewis-Clark State College isn't asking the Board of Education to increase student costs for the next school year.

University of Idaho officials

acknowledged there was some opposition on campus to fee increases.

Financial Vice President Joe Geiger said school officials told students that they might drop the proposal if overwhelming student opposition was demonstrated.

An advisory ballot saw about 13 percent of the eligible students turn out, voting 824-436 against an increase in student fees. "Overwhelming opposition was not demonstrated" to a level which would have caused Idaho to drop the proposal, he said.

Board member Diane Bilyeu asked Gibb what he would consider overwhelming opposition. Gibb said if at least half the eligible students voted, and two-thirds to three-quarters voted against fee increases, he would consider that overwhelming opposition.

"What I find important is that 85 percent of the students didn't find it

important enough to vote," Gibb said.

He said the school figures it needs an extra \$1 million to meet critical needs. "These problems won't wait until January of 1990. We need something now," he said.

Boise State University plans an increase of \$10 per semester, with \$8 of the increase to pay for more computer facilities. School officials said since BSU now requires all graduates to be computer literate, present computer facilities are not adequate.

BSU said it expected to generate an extra \$157,000 per year through the increase. The school also will add \$1 per credit-hour for part-time students for the extra computers.

Boise State students already face a \$15 per semester facilities fee increase approved earlier.

Idaho State also plans a \$15 increase in the facilities fee, the amount charged students to pay for

buildings. ISU also plans to charge \$7 more per semester to pay for intercollegiate athletics, an extra \$10 for student union operations and \$5 for a new telephone-computer registration system.

Overall, the increases would push the per-semester resident student fees at Boise State to \$555, at Idaho State to \$545, at Idaho up to \$549 and Lewis Clark would remain at \$520.

Nonresident tuition adds \$560 per

semester at three schools and it would move to \$1,100 at Idaho. There also are extra fees for such things as graduate school, law school, pharmacy and medical and veterinary programs.

The ISU fee increases were the only ones receiving final approval. Idaho officials said they planned immediate "hearings" on their increases, while students still are on campus.

Island Park Villager stops publishing

REXBURG (AP) — Porter Publications Inc. of Rexburg has suspended publication of the Island Park Villager newspaper and consolidated the offices of the Fremont County Herald-Chronicle.

The Villager was established in 1970 as a seasonal newspaper for the Island Park area of northern Fremont County. Two years ago, Porter Publications began publishing the Villager year-round on a weekly basis.

Subscribers will receive the Fremont Herald-Chronicle for the remaining period of their Villager subscriptions, Lords said.

Questionable bill sponsor speaks out

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — The author of the state Legislature's legally questionable attempt to override Health and Welfare Department regulations on septic tank installation says he was not trying to "slap anyone down."

Rep. Stan Hawkins, R-Ucon, told the board his only motive was to allow Bonneville County contractors to continue installing "deep-pit" septic tanks in rural areas not connected to a sewer system.

The attorney general has advised lawmakers that unless the state constitution is changed they have no power to void administrative regulations issued under proper legal authority. But after approval of Hawkins proposal last month, Attorney General Jim Jones said it appears the state Supreme Court will have to make the final decision.

Panel updates parole hearing rules

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Commission on Pardons and Parole has scrapped an outdated method of determining when a convicted felon is entitled to an initial parole hearing in favor of one that more closely follows sentencing laws.

Olivia Craven West, the commission's executive director, said Wednesday that commissioners voted unanimously to adopt the policy change immediately.

State judges have been pressing for the revision for more than a year, contending the parole board was not in compliance with Idaho's Unified Sentencing Act, adopted by the Legislature in 1987.

Symms to support log export ban

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Steve Symms, R-Idaho, has agreed to support legislation to ban the foreign export of raw logs, putting Idaho's Senate delegation firmly behind measures sponsored by Sen. Bob Packwood, R-Ore.

Symms had withheld his support for the proposals, fearing the legislation might be viewed as a panacea to a supply shortage of logs for Northwest sawmills.

—Packwood's legislation would impose a permanent ban on the exportation of logs cut from federal land. Such a ban has been extended annually since 1973, but the current law provides a grandfather exemption for logging operations that were exporting timber from private sources while obtaining logs from federal lands for their own mills prior to 1973.

Man gets 20 years for kidnap, rape

SPOKANE (AP) — A north Idaho meatcutter was sentenced to 20 years in prison for kidnapping and raping a 10-year-old Spokane girl as she walked to school last December.

Superior Court Judge Kathleen O'Connor handed Albert Brooks, 43, of Rathdrum, more than double the maximum of the standard sentencing range for the crimes.

Brooks had pleaded guilty in March to first-degree kidnapping and first-degree rape.

Dioxin exposure worries workers at Potlatch plant

LEWISTON (AP) — Airborne foam from the wastewater treatment pond at the Potlatch Corp. pulp and paper mill in Lewiston has some employees worried about possible exposure to dioxin.

That toxic substance, a byproduct of the bleaching process used in paper mills, has been linked to cancer in laboratory animals.

The wastewater pond at Potlatch is where effluent from mill operations is treated for a second time before being released into the Snake and Clearwater rivers.

Wednesday's warm weather and light winds caused foam on the pond to dry and float through the air, said one Potlatch worker who asked not to be identified.

"It was thick out here today. It looked like brown snow," he said, adding that complaints have been submitted to the company about flying foam in recent years.

He said concerns have been heightened by a recent industry-wide study by the Environmental Protection Agency showing the level of dioxin in Potlatch effluent is three times the median level.

Danforth Bodine, senior technical advisor for the EPA in Seattle, said two tests of Potlatch's effluent averaged 75 parts per quadrillion of dioxin. The average of about 80 mills studied to date is about 24 ppq, he said.

F&G warned tanker move could devastate fish runs

MOSCOW (AP) — The salmon and steelhead runs Idaho has spent years trying to revive could be devastated by Exxon's plan to move the oil tanker that broke open off Alaska to Portland for final repairs, the state Fish and Game Commission was warned Thursday.

"There's just too much risk in it all," Fish and Game Field Operations Chief Jerry Mallet told commissioners.

After patching the Exxon Valdez near the site of last month's 10 million-barrel oil spill in Prince William Sound, federal officials said Exxon plans to bring the tanker to Portland for final drydock repairs right about the same time as the spring anadromous fish migration.

Mallet said there was no guarantee oil would not continue leaking from the ruptured tanker, causing some of the same environmental damage to migratory fish runs on the Columbia, Willamette and Snake rivers that the spill has caused to fisheries off Alaska.

The problem would be aggravated by the chemicals, or dispersants, that would be released in the rivers to handle any residual oil flowing

from the tanker.

"Our information is that when they clean the tanks of oil, it's difficult to get everything out," Mallet said. "There could be leakage."

Salmon and steelhead smolts will be swimming downstream between the mid-May and mid-June, the time when the ship move to Portland, and Mallet said the chemical dispersants could alter their "imprinting," the ability to remember what water they originated from so they can return upstream to spawning beds in the future.

Even in parts per billion, the dispersants could damage their imprinting," Mallet said. "The chemicals do have environmental dangers of themselves."

Commission Chairman Keith Carlson of Lewiston said Gov. Cecil Andrus would be appraised of the danger when he meets with the commission in Moscow on Friday.

Wildlife agencies, Indian tribal leaders and officials of the states in the Pacific Northwest are considering demanding movement of the damaged tanker to Portland after the spring fish migration is over.

Lawmakers settle 'equity' funding


POCATELLO (AP) — A state legislator, school presidents and a member of the Idaho Board of Education say they hope they have heard the last of "equity" when it comes to funding the state's colleges and universities.

The board voted Thursday to divide \$140 million in state funding, including \$115.5 million from the general fund, between the University of Idaho, Idaho State, Lewis-Clark State and Boise State.

About the only item of discussion was "equity" funding for Boise State and Lewis-Clark, and those involved said they hoped it doesn't come up again.

"It may not divide you folks, and it may not divide the colleges and universities as much as divides the Legislature," said Rep. Mack Neibaur, R-Paul, vice chairman of the Legislature's budget committee.

He said the demands for "equity" have caused much bitterness and divisions between the colleges, and it must be stopped.

They may be members of the Idaho Myomassology Association also. All of these associations screen their members, and you can be more certain that they practice ethical therapeutic massage. As a client you can look for diplomas for completion of training; 150-500 hours of training is quite common in the United States. Above all, use your vision. The office should be clean and professional, a massage table with adequate draping using a large towel or sheet should be provided, the client's privacy should be insured at all times and the massage practitioner should be dressed in professional attire. Appropriate business hours is another clue to the professionalism of the massage establishment.

Massage is a good aid in reducing stress and increasing circulation; it should not be associated with prostitution.

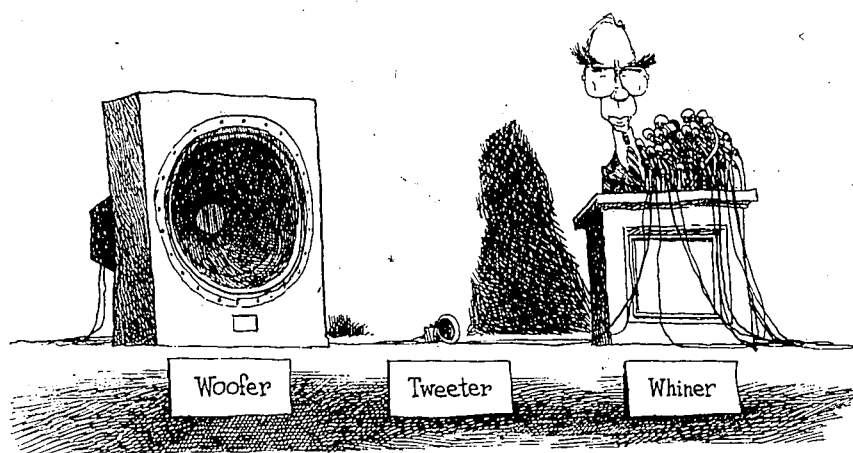

Ranchers get a free lunch

As a lifelong sportsman and conservationist, I've witnessed many attacks by greedy, special interests on Idaho's outdoors resources. But the recent hijacking by cattlemen and certain legislators of \$500,000 from the sportsmen's license fees is the worst I've ever seen. The money will be doled out to ranchers who claim damage from wildlife, mostly big game. This constitutes gross unfairness for several reasons.

First, by law, and in fact, Idaho's wildlife belongs to all its citizens, not just sportsmen. Therefore all of Idaho's citizens have responsibility for any damage done; money should therefore come from the state's General Fund which is funded by the taxes of sportsmen and non-sportsmen alike.

Secondly, all Idahoans benefit economically, and merchants and business far more than sportsmen, from hunting and fishing, which constitutes the major portion of Idaho's third-largest industry, recreation/tourism. All beneficiaries should share in the liability.

Third, in most cases, especially this drought year, ranchers are responsible for actually causing the depredation. Fish and Game biologists reported overgrazing of public lands by ranchers' domestic livestock as the worst in memory in every region of Idaho except the Panhandle.

Fish and Game commissioners described it as "appalling" at their meeting in October 1988 and predicted severe problems. Elk and deer were forced onto ranchers' land or starved to death. Ranchers, guilty of this outrage, must absorb any depredation losses as a cost of doing business.

Ranchers also caused depredation by developing land on traditional big game winter ranges and migration routes. In Montana, the state Supreme Court ruled that the state cannot be held liable for depredation in such areas. The same should be the case in Idaho.

The equitable solution of the depredation conflict is for ranchers to take responsibility for their own foolish, self-destructive actions and pay for their own mistakes like the rest of us businessmen. I suggest they consider a depredation insurance fund, into which all ranchers pay, with compensation to be determined by a Depredation Insurance Commission.

It's time ranchers stop picking the pockets of sportsmen for a free lunch and either become self-sufficient or get out of business. For I am no longer willing to let them and the legislature convert my license fees into welfare checks.

Rocky Mountain region now last in per capita income scale

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Rocky Mountain region for the first time replaced the Southeast at the bottom of the nation's per capita income scale last year, as its income growth was held back by weakness in oil and gas exploration, the government reported Thursday.

Per capita personal income in the Rocky Mountain states averaged \$14,282 last year, 13 percent below the national average of \$16,444. New England, meanwhile, claimed the top spot for the fifth straight year, with income of \$20,013, 22 percent above the national average.

It was the widest gap since 1969 between the highest and lowest regions, based on per capita income as a percent of the U.S. average, the Commerce Department reported. It also continued the pattern of the na-

tion's six-year-old economic expansion, in which per capita income has grown faster than average in the high-income regions and has advanced slower than average in low-income regions.

"The high-income states are still moving further away, above the U.S. average, and the lower-income states are moving further away, below the average," said Rudolph DePass, a Commerce Department analyst.

On a state-by-state basis, Connecticut claimed the top spot for the third straight year in 1988, with average per capita income of \$22,761, while Mississippi remained in the basement with average income of \$10,992.

Mississippi has been last in every year for which the Commerce Department has records, stretching back to 1929, except for 1933, when South Dakota briefly bumped it

out of the cellar.

Last year was the first time the Southeast, with average income of \$14,331, did not rank last among the eight regions. Income growth in the Southeast matched the national average last year of 6.2 percent, while its replacement on the bottom rung, the Rocky Mountain states, saw income grow by 5.4 percent.

When the national figures are adjusted for inflation, average per capita income grew 2 percent last year, up from the 1.4 percent in 1987.

DePass said the gap between high- and low-income areas has widened even as income growth slows down in high-income states and accelerates elsewhere.

For example, per capita income in New England grew 7.8 in 1988, down from 8.2 percent in 1987. At the same time, last year's 3.4

pace of growth in the Rocky Mountain states was up from 3.6 percent in 1987.

The Commerce Department said growth in the Rocky Mountain states and in the Southwest, where per capita income of \$14,365 was up 5.2 percent in 1988, was held back by slow oil and gas exploration.

Income growth advanced even more slowly in the Plains states, where per capita income of \$15,495 advanced just 4.6 percent, reflecting the weak farm economy.

The growth of per capita income in New England and the Middle Atlantic regions, meanwhile, was bolstered by rapidly expanding service and construction payrolls, combined with below-average population growth.

Among the top-ranking states, Connecticut was followed by New Jersey, with per capita income of \$21,882; Massachusetts, \$20,701; Alaska, \$19,514; and Maryland, \$19,314.

The District of Columbia would have ranked third if it had been ranked along with the states; with per capita income of \$21,667 last year.

At the other end of the list, Mississippi was followed by West Virginia, \$11,658; Utah, \$12,013; Arkansas, \$12,172; Louisiana, \$12,193; and South Dakota, \$12,475.

South Dakota and North Dakota were the only states in which per capita income fell last year, dropping 0.6 percent in the former and 1.9 percent in the latter to \$12,720.

The Iowa Chaplains break news of deaths to families

NORFOLK, Va. (AP) — Teams of Navy chaplains and officers went from father and mother to wife to sister or brother Thursday, 47 times over, to break the news about who was killed aboard the USS Iowa.

"It's the hardest thing we do," said Cmdr. Doug Palmer, acting base chaplain for the sprawling Norfolk Naval Base that is home port for the stricken battleship.

"I've done it many times and I'll never get used to it," said Palmer, who supervised 52 chaplains called into duty Wednesday after a powerful explosion ripped through a gun turret on the Iowa during training exercises near Puerto Rico.

Navy policy is for each family that loses someone on sea duty to be visited by a chaplain and a Navy officer who offer assistance and counseling.

Jack E. Thompson Sr. was told about the death of his 22-year-old son, Jack Jr., by Navy representatives in Greenville, Tenn., where the young man had been a star football tackle in high school.

"He came to me after he graduated from high school and said, 'Daddy, I'd only go to college to play ball,'" Thompson recalled. "I told him if that's the only reason, he should go to the Navy. That makes me feel a little bad."

"He enjoyed the travel. He'd been everywhere."

Critics say guns are outmoded, hazardous

NEW YORK (AP) — The 16-inch guns on the USS Iowa, which can lob a shell the weight of a Volkswagen 20 miles, have an outdated design that is unfit in the nuclear missile age, critics said Thursday.

"They're old-fashioned and inherently dangerous. They all ought to be eliminated," said retired Rear Adm. Eugene LaRoque of the Center for Defense Information. "I don't know what more it takes to get people to recognize this ancient technology is no longer appropriate on warships."

But the Navy defended the 16-inch gun, the mightiest in use on any ocean, after an explosion killed 47 sailors Wednesday aboard the battleship Iowa while a turret crew loaded gunpowder for target practice.

"This gun... remains the finest naval gun in the world. It was the pinnacle of gun design art, and it is still a front-line system," said Capt. Larry Seagist, commander of the Iowa until last May.

The main criticism is that the big gun requires gunpowder packed in silk bags to fire 16-inch-diameter shells from its 62-foot-long barrel. It works like the breech-loaded guns that roared during the Civil War: A shell is placed into a barrel and then charged with gunpowder in a separate package.

In the Iowa's case, 660 pounds of powder — six 110-pound bags — is needed to fire a projectile weighing up to 2,700 pounds at a speed of 2,500 feet per second. An electric spark ignites the powder.

Wright complains of foot-dragging

WASHINGTON (AP) — House Speaker Jim Wright accused the ethics committee of dragging its feet on the allegations against him Thursday, while the Republican leader who brought the charges in the first place suggested Democrats will try to nudge Wright aside before his case can reach the full House.

"I would be very surprised if the senior members of the Democratic leadership don't try to talk the speaker into stepping down before going through the agony of a public defense, public cross examination,"

said Rep. Newt Gingrich of Georgia, the GOP whip.

Gingrich said he still believes that Rep. Thomas Foley of Washington, now the majority leader, will be speaker before the end of June.

Meanwhile, published reports indicated that a Texas oil deal which brought a huge profit to Wright last year involved businessmen with an interest in a \$3 billion Air Force jet trainer program now being studied by Congress.

On Capitol Hill, Wright said "we've met all the requirements" to move to

the next phase of the case, in which the Texas Democrat wants to confront his accusers personally and try to knock down the 69 formal allegations issued by the ethics committee on Monday. The speaker particularly blamed special outside counsel Richard J. Phelan for what he termed the delay: "I'm puzzled as to why he is dragging his feet."

Shoreham nuclear plant gains full-power license

ROCKVILLE, Md. (AP) — The Nuclear Regulatory Commission awarded a full-power operating license to the controversial Shoreham nuclear power plant Thursday in a gesture that may ultimately prove symbolic.

The commission voted 4-0 to grant the license, capping years of hearings that produced reams of testimony and cost millions of dollars.

The Long Island Lighting Co., which owns the 809-megawatt reactor, has agreed not to bring the plant up to full power pending a vote by shareholders to scrap the \$5.5 billion plant.

The vote, which must occur on or before June 15, will make or break a deal under which LILCO would sell Shoreham to New York state for \$1 in exchange for a decade of annual rate increases. The state would then oversee the decommissioning and dismantling of the plant that was touted as the solution to Long Island's energy shortages.

Shoreham becomes the first U.S. nuclear plant to be licensed on the basis of a utility-formulated emergency plan, rather than one created by the state and local governments.

Bush says his 'conscience is clear' on Iran-Contra affair

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush said Thursday "my conscience is clear" about the Iran-Contra affair and that Congress should deal with Ronald Reagan's lawyers — not him — about sensitive White House documents that lawmakers say were withheld from them.

Bush said he would "offer full cooperation to any request made of this administration" for information. However, he said that documents from the Reagan White House were in "the control and custody" of the Federal Archives. A White House spokesman, asked about the president's promise of cooperation, said he did not know specifically what the pledge might mean.

Talking with a small group of reporters, Bush expressed confidence that Reagan

administration attorneys had been cooperative in supplying Congress with the information it wanted.

Members of the congressional committees which investigated the Iran-Contra episode "have complained they did not see politically sensitive documents that have turned up the trial of fired White House aide Oliver North."

The material has raised new questions about Bush's involvement, while vice president, in the Reagan administration's secret campaign to help the Contra rebels in Nicaragua.

Bush discussed the Iran-Contra affair and other matters during a 22-minute interview with nine reporters, sitting outside the Oval Office on the Colonnade next to the Rose Garden.

Defending his administration

against charges that it's off to a slow start, Bush noted he has reached agreement with Congress on a blueprint for the budget, had drafted plans on Third World debt and the savings and loan industry and had conducted a round of Middle East diplomacy.

"So I think that we're moving reasonably well," Bush said.

He said he does not think in terms of his administration's first 100 days — a landmark he reaches next week — because "we didn't come in here throwing the fascists out to try to do something, correct all the ills of the world in 100 days."

On other matters, Bush:

— Said he was very pleased at the reaction of the stock market to his budget deal with Congress, saying the recent rise on Wall Street has

been "very heartening." However, he said, "I'm not heartened by the interest rates."

— Declared that selective drug testing for federal employees "is very important, and nobody will change my mind on that one."

He sidestepped questions about whether he agreed with Attorney General Richard Thornburgh's suggestion in a Baltimore Sun interview that drug testing for public housing applicants "ought to be considered."

— Said he wished there was "some dramatic plan" that could win agreement to stop the violence in Lebanon. The problem — the short-run of it — how you stop this firing, the shelling, how you get factions to stop warring — has certainly in recent times defied solution. But we can't give up on it."

Bush added, "We don't have great influence in Lebanon with the factions that are fighting."

— Said he has not made any decision on new restrictions against semiautomatic weapons. Likewise, he said he has not made a decision about how to modernize the strategic nuclear arsenal or funding levels for the Star Wars missile defense program.

On the Iran-Contra affair, Bush refused to discuss his role in the Reagan administration as an emissary to Honduras to offer reassurances of expedited U.S. aid. Documents introduced in North's trial indicated that aid was in return for support of the Nicaraguan rebels.

However, the president said, "I might have something to say on it after the completion of North's trial."

EPA urges schools to test for radon levels

WASHINGTON (AP) — Preliminary tests suggest unhealthy levels of radon exist in schools across the country, the Environmental Protection Agency said Thursday in urging every school to test for the odorless, cancer-causing gas.

Based on measurements taken in 3,000 schoolrooms in 16 states, it appears that elevated levels of radon gas can be found in schools throughout the United States, EPA

Administrator William K. Reilly told a luncheon at the National Press Club.

The EPA said that 54 percent of the 130 schools tested in 41 communities had at least one room in which radon levels were found to exceed 4 picocuries per liter of air, indicating a need for additional tests and, likely, corrective action.

EPA spokeswoman Martha Casey said that no list of schools was available but that affected state

authorities and school officials have been told of the test results.

There is no federal law requiring tests for the radioactive gas, although the EPA by law is required to conduct sample tests nationwide in homes and schools to determine potential health threats. The preliminary findings from the 16 states came from two-day tests in rooms — normally occupied by students, teachers and school staff, Ms. Casey said.

The latest EPA tests, although preliminary, indicate that unhealthy radon levels in schools are at least as widespread as in residences, although the agency emphasized that the levels may range widely from school to school and even among rooms in the same school.

The EPA said that of the 3,000 schoolrooms tested, 19 percent had levels of 4 picocuries or more and 3 percent had levels of at least 20

picocuries.

The agency gave this breakdown of states with schoolrooms having radon levels of at least 20 picocuries: Tennessee, 77 rooms; Washington, 14; New Mexico, 7; Maine, 2, and Montana, 1.

The highest level was found in a schoolroom in Tennessee in which 136 picocuries per liter were detected, an exposure similar to that found in uranium mines.

Schools with unusually high levels — ranging from 25 to 98 picocuries per liter of air in a single schoolroom — were Washington (98 picocuries), Montana (51), New Mexico (41) and Maine (25).

The other states in which schools were tested, in addition to those four and Tennessee, were Nevada, Wyoming, Colorado, North Dakota, Kansas, Minnesota, Missouri, Illinois, Indiana, Georgia and New Jersey.

Abortion activists inundate Thornburgh with letters

WASHINGTON (AP) — Abortion rights activists dumped some 200,000 letters at the Justice Department on Thursday urging Attorney General Dick Thornburgh to drop his attempt to have the Supreme Court's landmark 1973 decision legalizing abortion overturned.

"This has for the last 15 years been a legal struggle," ACLU executive director Ira Glasser said at a news conference outside the department where he was surrounded by the mailbags. "It has now become a political struggle."

The campaign to persuade the court not to reverse the 1973 Roe vs. Wade decision concerns a Missouri case known as Webster vs. Reproductive Health Services. The Justice Department, which requested and received permission to file a brief in the case, has asked the court not only to uphold a restrictive Missouri abortion law but also to uphold the 1973 decision.

The letters to Thornburgh are among the many public expressions on both sides of the issue. The National Right to Life Committee plans to run four-page inserts in newspapers around the country starting next Tuesday. More than 200,000 pro-choice demonstrators marched on Washington on April 9. And Americans in record numbers have been writing and telephoning the Supreme Court, which hears arguments in the Webster case on April 26.

However, a court spokeswoman, Toni House, said earlier this week.

"While people have a right to write to the court, I hope they do not expect that the enunciation of their opinion will have any effect on the justices."

Dave Runkel, Thornburgh's spokesman, said the department would accept the letters, although he doubted they would change the anti-abortion views held by Thornburgh and President Bush.

Rep. Pat Schroeder, D-Colo., who helped Glasser and actor Ed Asner unload the mailbags from a pickup truck, said the Justice Department should not be party to the arguments against a woman's right to have an abortion.

"Traditionally, the federal government has been leading the charge for constitutional rights," she said. "... To see them stepping backward and snuffing that torch is very distressing."

Mrs. Schroeder said the letter she has been "one of the most phenomenal responses anyone has seen."

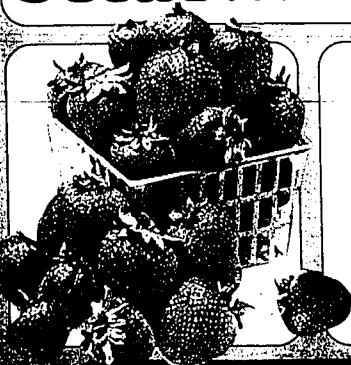

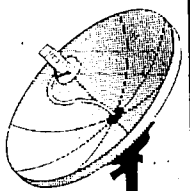

Police arrest 8 for marking 100th anniversary of Hitler's birth

BRAUNAU, Austria (AP) — Riot troops ringed the house where Adolf Hitler was born and police said they arrested eight people Thursday for marking the 100th anniversary of the dictator's birth with Nazi slogans and stiff-armed salutes.

Hundreds of police swarmed this city of 17,000 people to prevent a repeat of the 1979 clashes between neo-Nazis and leftists that marked Hitler's 90th birthday. No serious incidents were reported.

Across the border in West Germany, foreigners closed their stores and kept children out of schools because of fears of neo-Nazi violence. Several members of anti-Nazi vigilante groups were arrested for carrying weapons.

Security was heaviest here, at the two-story yellow house where Hitler was born on April 20, 1889. The house, a former inn now used as a day-care center for handicapped children, was sealed off with metal barriers

and manned by dozens of police and special riot squads with dogs.

About 50 to 100 onlookers stood nearby. Nearly all shops along the street were closed, some barricaded with wooden boards.

Police said unspecified numbers of people were being turned back at the border by West German or Austrian police.

A police spokesman said two Austrians, three Italians, two West Germans and an American were arrested

and face fines of up to \$2,300 for their public behavior.

The Italians, one Austrian and the American gave the Nazi salute, said a police official who did not give his name. One West German was arrested after he shouted Nazi slogans and spat at reporters. Police said he was carrying a large knife.

Another West German also shouted anti-Semitic slogans, including "Jew, go and rot!" and "This will be a

national holiday in 100 years' time!"

Officials did not identify those arrested. They were charged with misdemeanors.

On Wednesday, four Americans, an Irishman and a West German were ordered by police to change their black boots and brown shirts, garb reminiscent of Nazi uniforms, police said.

"Judging by what could have happened today, I am happy with the security measures taken," Braunau

Mayor Gerhard Skiba said.

Skiba defended an anti-fascist memorial he ordered put up in front of the "Hitler House" two weeks ago.

"I did not ask the city council, because I knew that the (right-wing) Freedom party and part of the (conservative) Austrian People's party were against it," he said.

The memorial is made of granite from the quarry once worked by prisoners at the nearby Nazi concentration camp of Mauthausen.

Landslides kill 5 in Soviet-Georgia

MOSCOW (AP) — Landslides and flooding struck the mountainous area of Abkhazia in Soviet Georgia this week, killing five people and leaving another 47 missing and feared dead, state TV said Thursday.

About 13,000 people are threatened by flooding rivers, snowmelt and mudslides aggravated by earth tremors, the news program "Vremya" said. Already, 800 families have been evacuated, it said, and 3,000 others are due to leave in the near future.

The news show said 52 people were caught in a landslide on Mount Salgan Wednesday which buried four houses and a bus. It said five bodies have been recovered and rescuers are searching for the missing 47.

The Tass news agency had a slightly different version. It said a mudslide blocked the River Charukh, flooding four homes and a bus in the village of Tashlani. The news agency said three people died and four were rescued, but more than 45 others may have been trapped.

Officials want halt to gunfire by Israelis

JERUSALEM (AP) — U.N. relief officials Thursday demanded that Israel stop using gunfire to quell Palestinian protests, and Moslem clerics urged Palestinians to defy Israeli restrictions on worship at Jerusalem's Al Aqsa Mosque.

In the Gaza Strip, at least 16 Palestinians were reported wounded in stone-throwing clashes with troops.

The U.N. Relief and Works Agency, which aids Palestinian refugees, said 13 Palestinians, six of them younger than 15, were shot to death by Israeli troops in the past week.

"We deplore this loss of life and call for a halt to the use of lethal force against civilians, young and old," the agency said in a statement issued in Vienna and distributed in Jerusalem.

An army spokeswoman defended the troops, saying "they do everything in their power to avoid deaths." She said every Palestinian death is being investigated by a senior officer.

Mourners riot at boy's funeral in Jordan

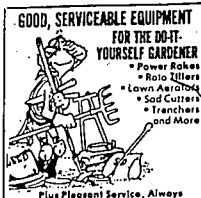
MAZAR, Jordan (AP) — Mourners rioted Thursday at the funeral of a boy killed during protests of government price increases, and one man died when police opened fire, residents said.

Another report said a policeman also was slain.

Rioters pelted police with stones and burned several buildings, including the house of a Mazar official accused by residents of killing the boy, witnesses said.

Violent demonstrations were reported Thursday in several other villages in southern Sudan. The latest killing raised the death toll to at least eight in three days of unrest.

One knowledgeable official, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said one policeman died and another was injured in the Mazar rioting.

Dollar's slide weakens market

NEW YORK — Stock prices retreated Thursday as an unexpected increase in West German interest rates put the dollar under pressure in foreign exchange.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrials, which had risen 90.91 points over the four previous sessions, dropped 9.53 to 2,737.38.

Declining issues outnumbered advances by about 7 to 5 in nationwide trading of New York Stock Exchange-listed stocks, with 599 up, 852 down and 177 unchanged.

Volume on the floor of the Big Board came to 175.97 million shares, down from 191.51 million in the previous session. Nationwide, consolidated volume in NYSE-listed issues, including trades in those stocks on

regional exchanges and in the over-the-counter market, totaled 208.04 million shares.

Prices rose at the outset, but abruptly reversed course after West Germany's central bank announced increases in its official interest rates.

The dollar fell in foreign exchange, and U.S. open-market interest rates headed higher.

It had been a morning of mixed emotions for the chairman and chief executive officer of Twin Falls Bank & Trust. Eaton and other bank officials had been negotiating the sale of the locally held bank with First Security Corp. since fall. Yet the announcement of the impending sale ends an era for the Eaton family as well as for Twin Falls.

"We like to think about it in logical terms, but to say there's no emotion in it would be a mistake," said Eaton's son, Curtis H. Eaton, president of the Bank & Trust.

Twin Falls Bank & Trust dates back almost as far as the town.

On June 1, 1905, W.S. McCormick started W.S. McCormick Co., Bankers of Salt Lake City, with a \$5,000 investment entered in florid handwriting on the bank's original ledger.

Three-and-a-half years later, on Oct. 1, 1908, McCormick's investment had grown to \$100,000, and the bank was incorporated under the name of the Twin Falls Bank & Trust Co. McCormick retained half of the

stock. The remaining shares were held by prominent Magic Valley businessmen, including I.B. Perrine, H.O. Milner, M.M. Murtaugh, A. McPherson and J. McMillan. The original bank was located on Main

Avenue, in a tiny building that now houses The Leatherman.

In 1908, Twin Falls Bank & Trust purchased the south corner of Main Avenue and Shoshone Street and announced grandiose plans for a neoclassic stone building supported by Doric columns.

The building was completed in 1910. For the past eight decades it has served as headquarters for the town's homegrown bank.

McCormick was followed by J.S. Russell, who became the bank's president in 1919. In 1932, Robert Blastock was named president.

The name Eaton entered the bank in 1916, when the late Harry Eaton, the father of Curtis T., was hired as a bookkeeper. He would be named president in 1955.

Before 1931, there were three banks in Twin Falls. After the Depression, the Bank & Trust became the sole survivor.

In a 1983 Times-News interview, Curtis T.

Eaton said that difficult time created indelible impressions. "As a consequence, I think this gives an aura of conservatism that might not otherwise be prevalent," he said.

Curtis T. joined his father at the bank in 1957, after he had logged 17 years as a farmer and rancher, experience that proved helpful for a leader of a lending institution catering to farmers.

"The bank started out primarily as an agricultural bank and lending institution and we consider ourselves still to be that by virtue of the fact that whatever we do in the Magic Valley is certainly well-based on what happens to agriculture," Eaton said during the 1983 interview.

The bank opened its first branch office in 1951 and has since added three additional branches in Twin Falls, Kimberly and Buhl. In 1963 Eaton was named to the bank's

Customers and employees offer their reactions

TWIN FALLS - For many people, learning that Twin Falls Bank & Trust is being sold was like hearing of the death of a friend.

Surprise, shock, concern and sorrow were common reactions Thursday.

"I hate to see it. I really do," said bank customer Doug Burks Sr., owner of Burks Tractor and The Bearing House.

"It's just different doing business with a chain bank than with a local bank," he said. "You've got to be careful when you get big like all of them are becoming. The loan decisions get so far from the community, they don't understand the local situation anymore," he said.

The bank has always shown commitment to agricultural lending, he said.

"Let's hope it doesn't change. Let's hope they retain their strong lending officers because they've got some good people down there," Burks said.

Bank President Curtis H. Eaton said he would accept both congratulations and condolences.

"We feel both. We feel very excited and also nostalgic," he said.

Bank & Trust employees were dazed by the news that their bank had been sold to First Security Corp. Most did not know about the sale until Thursday when it was announced publicly, and they didn't want to discuss their employment prospects.

A number of customers reacted immediately Thursday by moving their accounts from the Bank & Trust to Key Bank. Said Kevin Guthrie, vice president of Key Bank, said Key Bank went through the

Mushroom trial continues with some heated exchanges

HAILEY - Twin Falls doctor Fred Surbaugh told jurors Thursday he blamed Idaho First National Bank for the failure of a mushroom farm project and that Bill Babcock, Twin Falls' branch manager, pressured him into signing additional guarantees late in 1985.

In a heated exchange with Idaho First attorney Walt Bithell during cross-examination, Surbaugh jumped up from the stand and drew an impromptu chart showing that the success of the business depended on completion of the second phase of the project, which he said the bank refused to finance.

"The bank told us, 'No further discussion,'" said Surbaugh; a Twin Falls orthopedic surgeon.

The second phase would have provided additional growing room, which Robert Erkins and Thomas Walker, who began the

farm, have testified would have allowed production to increase, enabling the business to pay back its loan from Idaho First.

Idaho First is suing Bliss Valley Foods, claiming it defaulted on loan payments. Erkins and Walker countered, claiming the bank forced the operation into default.

Surbaugh, one of 12 investors, or limited guarantors, told the jury that by summer 1985 the problems at the mushroom farm were being solved and production was on the rise.

Surbaugh said in a deposition that he invested in the farm because of "greed. I thought I'd make a lot of money."

The farm was three months behind schedule, Surbaugh told jurors Thursday, but this was partly due to Idaho First's delay in finalizing the loan in 1984, which caused construction delays.

After those delays, Babcock tried to get the Boise office to approve a restructuring of

Valley may see 100 new jobs

TWIN FALLS - A high-tech manufacturer that eventually would employ 100 workers wants to build a factory in Twin Falls, an official says.

Joe Herring, executive director of Region 4 Development Association, said the building project is contingent on the company's ability to get loans from the association and a bank.

The association's board of directors will vote Wednesday on whether to grant the loan, he said. Herring declined to name the company before the vote.

The association would finance 40 percent to 50 percent of the company's needs through a low-interest, fixed-rate loan. A bank, which he also declined to name, would finance the rest, he said.

He said he expects the bank will also decide by next week whether to lend the money.

Herring would not give many details about the company, which he said was once based in Nevada. He declined to say how

much the loans would be for.

The company would hire locally and pay medium-range wages of between \$5 and \$7 an hour.

"They're on the cutting edge of new technology," Herring said.

He said after the company established a market it would hire around 100 workers within two years, he said.

"I think it's a good deal," Herring said. "I think the community could benefit from it."

Herring said the association is also considering giving loans to two other businesses, including an agricultural processing plant in Buhl that would hire about 23 part-time employees.

The association's board of directors will decide next week whether to lend money to the two companies, he said.

Different banks would help finance the other companies' projects, Herring said. In such case, the banks would hold first position on the collateral, which means if a company fails, the bank would have first claim on assets.

Local teacher predicted cold fusion 6 years ago

RICHFIELD - In January 1983, a former math and science teacher told a group of scientists and engineers in Washington, D.C., that "desktop" fusion was possible.

Gary Kissler presented a paper titled "Language and Research" that explained his mathematical system of predicting cold fusion - fusion that uses non-radioactive materials - and detailed how to use it to achieve safe nuclear power.

"The process is apparently so simple I am surprised that no one has done it yet," Kissler wrote. He asked for funds to try some experiments.

The "scientific community" listened politely, certain its time was being wasted on an impossible idea. In the end, no one was willing to finance this ridiculous theory from a Shoshone and Richfield teacher in Idaho who didn't even have a doctorate.

Last month, two researchers in Utah announced they had achieved cold fusion. While the jury is still out on whether fusion is what occurred in the University of Utah lab, news of the experiment has drawn worldwide attention.

Kissler, 49, a contractor who lives on a small dairy farm near Richfield, reacted to the news philosophically.

"I'm not making any claim to the process," he said. "They did it. What I'm just saying is that my mathematical system predicted it over six years before they did it, and I think that's impressive enough."

Kissler said he discovered the mathematical system showing cold fusion is possible while doing unrelated calculations.

the loan which the bank refused, Surbaugh said. "I think the bank was materially at fault for failure of the business," Surbaugh said.

Surbaugh's testimony also focused on two guarantees he had signed. He signed the first early in 1985, which said that if the business failed, he could be liable for up to three times his original investment of \$83,000.

Surbaugh said he was skeptical before he signed and had numerous conversations with Babcock regarding who was at risk in the venture.

Surbaugh said Babcock told him that if the business failed, liability would first fall on Erkins' White Arrow Ranch, then on Walker and Erkins and finally on the limited guarantors.

"From these discussions, I got the idea it was a very remote chance they would come to the limited guarantors," Surbaugh said.

According to Surbaugh's testimony, the bank required all the guarantors to sign an additional guarantee in September 1985. Surbaugh said his wife refused to sign it, but Babcock told him no more funds would be issued unless it

was signed. Reluctantly, Surbaugh signed the guarantee.

Late Tuesday afternoon, Dr. Mark Grefenson, of Twin Falls, another limited guarantor, testified he was asked to sign the same guarantee and when he questioned it, Babcock said, "I don't know what all the fuss is about, you are on the hook anyway."

Both physicians said they were wary of signing the additional guarantee but nonetheless signed it.

Surbaugh's testimony begins to complete the picture of what role the "limited guarantors" played in the Bliss Valley restaurant venture.

The limited guarantors are 12 local investors in the project. Initially, they were limited partners with little day-to-day involvement. Erkins and Walker and General Manager Kamal Hyder were making most of the decisions.

After Hyder sent Walker a letter, dated May 31, 1985, things changed. Surbaugh testified Thursday that he was shocked when he read the letter. "It struck terror in my heart," he laughed.

Surbaugh said until then he thought the problems at Bliss Valley were manageable.

The managerial crisis came to a head June 28, 1985, at a meeting at Canyon Springs Inn. The investors replaced Erkins and Walker. The investors replaced Erkins as top manager of the operation, incorporated the project, and Surbaugh and several other investors were named to the new board of directors.

More than a year earlier, Surbaugh met at Walker's house, ate fried oyster mushrooms and listened to Erkins promote the project, according to depositions. Walker said he offered the project to his "best clients."

Surbaugh then took a leading role in the business. By later that year, he testified, the growing system was proving successful and more growing space was needed for the business.

Under cross-examination, Bithell asked Surbaugh if they ever went to the Idaho First to formally ask to continue drawing on its \$2.9 million line of credit for the second phase.

Surbaugh said it was his understanding that the bank would only give money to cover operating expenses and interest on the bank note. "It is more complicated than that," Surbaugh said. "I could see no purpose in borrowing money to pay interest and principle on the loan."

Surbaugh is the fourth witness to be called in this trial. About 100 witnesses are listed on the court's list. Indications are the trial will last between the eight weeks at first estimated.

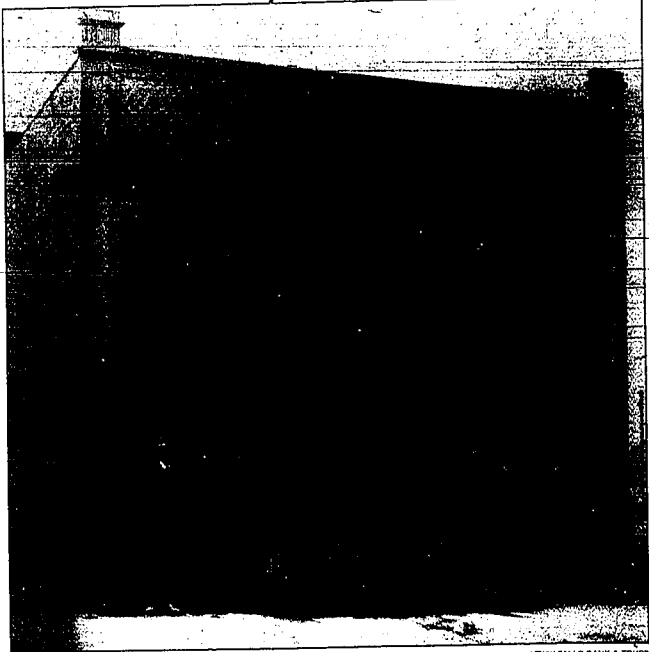

some thing last year when it bought out Idaho Bank & Trust, he said.

Twin Falls Bank & Trust has been a tough competitor that has had the hometown advantage over the other banks. Now the competition will be more even, Guthrie said.

The realization that First Federal Savings and Loan of Twin Falls is the city's sole remaining locally based financial institution has not escaped its president, Rick Allen. "I've been thinking about that all day," he said. He hopes to attract people who believe local ownership is important.

The sale may be good for First Federal, but whether it is good for the community remains to be seen, he said.

"Twin Falls Bank & Trust has always been a leader in community events more than any bank based elsewhere ever could be, he said.

"When I think of the Bank & Trust I think of community involvement," he said. The bank's philosophy could be that its lending business could not be improved without improving the community, Allen said.

"They went hand in hand," he said.

Without wanting to sell anyone else short, he said, the Bank & Trust's management style will be missed.

Farmers who have banked with and borrowed from the Bank & Trust for decades were worried that loans will be treated differently and

lending philosophies changed.

Absolutely not, Eaton said.

"I can say emphatically and without reservation the agricultural lending will not diminish and may even increase," he said.

Twin Falls Bank & Trust has long been on a list of the top 100 agricultural lenders in the nation for years, he said. First Security is even higher on the same list, he said.

The business community taken by surprise, said Sue Jones, director of the downtown Business Improvement District. "People are waiting to see what happens, if things are going to change."

"They have been so good to the business community and to the BID. You can't imagine a big bank doing the same thing."

"Your change has to change when your corporate headquarters is in Salt Lake City."

"I feel very comfortable with the merger," said BID President Emory Petersen, a Bank & Trust customer who owns Petersen's Western Wear.

The Bank wouldn't do anything that would hurt its customers or the community, he said. "I'm sure they will continue to be community-oriented and supportive of downtown."

Kent Zuck, executive director of the Greater Twin Falls Area

Chamber of Commerce, agreed.

"I don't see any negative impact at all, even though we've always thought of Twin Falls Bank & Trust as our local bank," he said.

"It could cost a job or two, there's no doubt about that," he said.

"People will say they hate to see the hometown bank go. That's a natural reaction. But the needs of the community will be met."

After the sale by First Security Corp. is approved by stockholders and regulatory agencies, Twin Falls Bank & Trust will be no more.

Filer schools begin drug abuse intervention program

FILER — Filer schools have joined other Magic Valley schools in establishing a drug abuse intervention program.

School Board members heard the first reading of the new policy Tuesday from High School Principal Bob McGrew.

McGrew told the board a "core team" has been formed to assess and monitor students who exhibit signs of drug abuse, including alcohol. Team members have been trained through the Impact program, one of a number of substance abuse programs offered and funded through the state Department of Education.

Several other Magic Valley schools have attended the training and have established similar programs.

The new policy does not force students and parents to seek help, McGrew said. However, out-

of-school intervention and treatment is available to students with chemical dependency. Students may request help from core team members or may be referred by teachers or peers.

The core team will evaluate referrals and make recommendations to a student's parents.

The new policy differs from the district's current policy, which simply calls for the board to suspend students found with or under the influence of drugs or alcohol.

Students who are found in violation of laws regarding use or possession of drugs or alcohol on school grounds are still subject to applicable laws and penalties but now can seek help through an established program.

Filer's Future Problem Solvers, part of the district's program for gifted students, will be in Boise today to compete for a trip to Michigan.

Three teams of critical thinkers include elementary, junior high and high school students.

The students analyze and write solutions to

problems. The three teams recently ranked high in competition. Coordinator Vicki Leach said the program teaches the kids to think creatively, learn research techniques and write well.

In other business:

• Eighth grade students will be receiving a pre-registration packet soon. The material will present descriptions of required and elective classes available at the high school.

• Several coach/pegs positions will be available next year. Positions available include: junior varsity football and girls JV basketball, varsity wrestling, middle school wrestling and football. Other vacancies on the district include one secondary life sciences teacher, third-grade teacher at the Hollister school and a music teacher.

• The School Board approved spending \$5,000 for a lawnmower. The existing mower will be moved to Hollister Elementary School and the new mower will be used at the Filer schools.

Peer counselors help students as they also help themselves

TWIN FALLS — A peer counselor at Twin Falls High School logs in an average of three or four "clients" a day.

With about 30 such "Natural Helpers" on campus, that's more than 90 contacts with kids each day, or 450 each week.

"The program has helped a great deal," Andrea Kadlec, a 17-year-old senior and peer counselor, said Thursday.

A spinoff from Project Impact, a program to identify and help kids with drug or alcohol abuse problems, Natural Helpers began 2½ months ago.

Kadlec and another peer counselor, Aaron Swafford, 17, a junior, explained the program Thursday to the Twin Falls Kiwanis Club, which donated the \$2,400 to start the program in the high school.

The students in the program are listeners, an ear for the student who has no one else to talk to or for the teen who does not want to talk with an adult.

"Most of the people we help have the same problems," Kadlec said.

She listed common problems peer counselors hear about: teen pregnancy; family relationships;

chemical dependency or fear a friend may be heading for a drug problem; and kids coming back from drug treatment programs and having a hard time adjusting to their new drug-free life-style.

Getting good grades and relationships with friends also made Kadlec's list.

"Natural Helpers is an extremely positive approach," said Marcia Lanting, the district's substance abuse coordinator.

When asked whether peer counselors had a problem overcoming the "naïve" label, Swafford said the 30 are "respected and looked up to."

He said confidentiality is emphasized and that names are never revealed unless a student specifically asks for his or her name to be "put into the system."

The 30 current Natural Helpers were trained during a weekend retreat in January. Lanting said she hopes to train students each year, because the more students, the more effective the program.

The training program taught the helpers to pick up on body language and motions, Kadlec said, so they could recognize emotional distress.

"There's a lot more going on inside of people than I thought," she said.

Hansen School Board OKs 'Exploring the Arts' program

Bellevue reaffirms sewer design company

BELLEVUE — Forsgren Associates of Pocatello will remain the engineering firm to design the city proposed sewer system.

Forsgren had been the original City Council choice in March, but irregularities in the selection meant the job would have to be rebid if the city wanted to use state block grants for the project.

The two leading candidates for the engineering project — a combined bid

from JUB Engineers of Twin Falls and Sawtooth Engineering of Ketchum, and Forsgren — were again presented to the council by the six-member screening committee, this time using correct process.

The council unanimously voted for the Pocatello firm. "We were even more in favor of Forsgren this time," Mayor Wayne Douthitt said.

However, the two council members who had voted for JUB/Sawtooth during the first bid process — Dale Ewerson and Ron Reese — did not attend Tuesday's

meeting.

In other matters, the council decided to postpone a decision on who to hire as a new city marshal.

The council interviewed only one candidate, Nelson Olds, April 13. "We haven't finished checking all of Olds' references as yet, but hope to make a decision in the next few days," Douthitt said.

The city currently has no law enforcement protection, with the sheriff's department responding only to emergencies.

He discovered a pattern in his figures.

"I found you don't have to go to the radioactive materials to get energy," he said. "The stable ones, the common ones, would also do it."

In his paper, Kissler wrote, "Looking at the elements with this alternate technical language, it becomes apparent that we picked the unstable elements such as uranium and plutonium to look for usable energy because they were easy to see, not because they were the best for it. By 1992, I am predicting we will have safe, practical stable element nuclear power."

In late February B. Stanley Pons, of the U of U, and Martin Fleischmann, of Southampton University in Britain, said they achieved a sustained nuclear fusion reaction with equipment available in any college laboratory.

The scientists are protecting their patent positions by retaining some of the details of their work. But they have said they applied electricity to a coil of platinum and a rod of palladium, all immersed in a beaker of deuterium, and the deuterium and palladium atoms fused, producing heat.

Kissler said he's not sure fusion occurred in the Utah lab, and he can only guess what the two researchers discovered. But the scientists did use methods he outlined mathematically in his paper, and energy was

released.

He suggested the experiments may have caused a heavy isotope to deteriorate into a slightly lighter one, converting the lost mass into energy.

Although he was unable to get funding, Kissler continued his work in developing a mathematical language to describe the more complex things observed in the universe.

"It doesn't cost much money to be a mathematician," he said.

Since 1983, Kissler, has continued to work part-time on his mathematical language for predicting cold fusion and has had "interesting results" in his limited experiments. "My work since then has indicated that it is possible to have desktop transmutation, changing one element into another," he said in his latest prediction.

But Kissler said during his 18 years of work on cold nuclear energy with stable elements he's been unable to interest even one doctorate-level scientist to discuss the project.

In science, the highly educated are skeptical of unproven ideas, Kissler said.

"They are extremely sure of what is possible and what is not possible," he said. "Look at the hard time they're giving Pons and Fleischmann, and they have their results all confirmed by universities all over the world, even in Russia."

Another problem, Kissler said, is that top university researchers are not interested in talking to anyone except their academic peers. "The scientific community is rather a closed system unless you have a Ph.D. or a lot of money," he said.

Kissler, who has a bachelor's degree in physical science from the University of Idaho, acknowledged that most major scientific discoveries do come from the large universities and high-paid research. Still, he said, the system should allow a wider field of people to discuss projects with the top experts and get feedback from them. Through discussions like that, flaws in new theories might be found.

"I would like to be heard, to have somebody listen to me," Kissler said.

Short-haul phone tolls will receive separate attention

BOISE (AP) — State regulators have decided to establish a separate case to consider possible deregulation of US West's short-haul toll rates between nearby communities.

Proponents of deregulation fear that unless the Public Utilities Commission has jurisdiction over those rates, the cost of calls between many nearby communities — many of them in the Magic Valley — could skyrocket.

At a prehearing conference Thursday, the PUC decided to detach the issue from other unresolved issues surrounding deregulation of most US West services on April 1.

Still to be resolved is whether it is appropriate for the phone company to include regulated and unregulated services in the same marketing package.

Idaho Board of Education approves raise for Dye

POCATELLO (AP) — Boise State head basketball coach Bobby Dye, who led Boise State to its third straight postseason tournament appearance last season, has been rewarded with a \$11,384 per year raise.

The Idaho Board of Education, meeting in Pocatello Thursday, approved raising Dye to \$65,520 per year from \$54,136, after coaching the Broncos to a third straight 20-victory season.

Dye assistant George Barrios went from \$28,322 to \$33,530 and assistant Rich Rider went from \$39,985 to \$42,016.

Basketball player for ISU questions scholarship denial

POCATELLO (AP) — An Idaho State University basketball player is challenging the school's refusal to renew scholarship, claiming it would hinder his pursuit of a college degree. Daron Allemen, a fourth-year junior from Laramie, Wyo., will take his case to the university's 20-member scholarship committee over Bengal Coach Jim Boutin's claim "the player failed to meet his obligations, 'academic, and otherwise.'"

"All I want is a neutral ear to hear my side of this," said Allemen, who has primarily been in a reserve role for the three seasons.

F&G increases catch-and-release along Big Wood

MOSCOW — The state Fish and Game Commission has ignored staff recommendations and approved catch-and-release regulations for generous stretches of the Big Wood River and nearby Silver Creek.

On a 3-2 vote Thursday, Commissioner Norm Guth of Salmon won approval for his proposal for catch-and-release fishing all the way from the North Fork area north of Ketchum 20 miles south to the Deer Creek Bridge near Hailey. Currently, only the top five miles of that stretch is under catch-and-release.

A slot limit of two fish per day, none between 12 and 16 inches, was imposed on the reach of the Big Wood from the bridge 28 miles downstream to Magic Reservoir.

The commission also approved the extension of a catch-and-release regulation on the world famous Silver Creek downstream from the current catch-and-release stretch through the Nature Conservancy five miles to the "Point of Rocks" landmark south of U.S. 93. That plan was a mile longer than the recommendation from the Fish and Game Department staff.

On the Big Wood, the staff had recommended a complex set of regulations that shifted the existing catch-and-release stretch downstream from its current location. Much of the river above Magic Reservoir would have remained under general regulations.

"I think it's all too complicated and we'll get into trouble trying to enforce it," Guth, an outfitter, said in rejecting the staff plan. Biologist Russ Thuroow said the proposals came as a result of a two-year study that took into account public opinion. The recommendations were intended to allow both fly fishermen and bait anglers a chance at large fish with the habitat itself, not artificial regulation, generally controlling trout abundance.

Doug Brearey of the Friends of the Wood River applauded the commission's decision for the expanded catch-and-release regulation even though he had backed a slightly more comprehensive plan.

Commissioner Fred Christensen of Nampa said those supporting more catch-and-release area had spent thousands of dollars improving the stream through land acquisition and habitat improvements while opponents made no similar effort.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE

BOBBY WOLFF

"The human race is a race of cowards, and I am not only marching in that procession but carrying a banner."

— Mark Twain.

It pays to be an intelligent coward in the play of today's game. Instead of marching blindly toward either minor-suit finesse, South chooses to finesse in the suit that leaves an escape route.

South captures East's heart king with his ace and counts his sure winners. Three spades, two hearts and the club ace account for six winners. Where does he look for three more?

If South finesesses in the more solid suit, he leads the club jack and loses to East's king. East knocks out South's heart queen and waits patiently with his diamond ace to collect one down.

Obviously South should finesse in the other minor suit first. Why? If the diamond finesse fails (East wins the queen), South can later fall back on the club finesse in hopes of winning nine tricks. Clearly two chances are better than one.

In today's example the diamond finesse works (East wins the ace), and now South doesn't need the club finesse. He repeats the diamond finesse and wins nine tricks via three spades, two hearts, three diamonds and one club.

Veteran advocate says he was set up on show
Los Angeles Times

HOLLYWOOD — Michael Stevenson, a cab driver-printer-clerk, is a near-fanatical advocate of veterans' welfare, by his own account. He has been waging a one-man war against an East Coast appliance store chain that uses combat footage in its TV spots — in Stevenson's view denigrating soldiers who died in action. So when Ed Glavin, an associate producer on "The Morton Downey Jr. Show," called to invite Stevenson to appear, he was "thrilled to death."

When show time came, however, Stevenson was surprised to find a lawyer on stage attacking his position, and Downey tossing in his own put-downs. It was after the taping that Stevenson, from Tverton, R.I. (pop. 13,526), really got upset. Backstage, next to a fax machine, he found a copy of a letter producer Glavin had sent to the combative lawyer. Under a letterhead bearing Downey's trademark Big Mouth, the letter reads, in part:

"Tonight's guest (on the 'Mad as Hell' segment), Michael Stevenson, is an Army veteran (actually Navy), who is mad as hell at an advertising firm using real war footage to sell VCRs and TVs."

"I want you to interrupt and say who cares, it's no big deal ... the guy is a real dimwit ... he shouldn't be too hard to make a fool of ..."

Stevenson has consulted an attorney, claiming that the Downey show "misrepresented" its intentions and deliberately set him up.

Drive-in operas: The wave of the future?

OSLO, Norway — The Norwegian National Opera wants to reach a wider audience, so it's staging "The Barber of Seville" as a drive-in movie, where motorists can too for the tenor and feast on burgers and fries 'til the fat lady sings.

"We were inspired by American drive-in movies," said opera spokesman Terje Baskerud. "It started as a wild idea, but we're going to try it."

The state opera hopes to convert downtown Oslo's Youngstorget open market into a drive-in for 200-300 cars with a live broadcast on a giant TV screen of its Sept. 23 premiere of "The Barber of Seville," Baskerud said in an interview.

"We are arranging with local restaurants to serve food on trays that hang from car windows, hopefully by waitresses on roller skates," he said.

There won't be tinny in-car speakers typical of U.S. drive-in movies, "but the music will be so loud that I don't think anyone in the area will have trouble hearing the performance," he said. They also hope to set up a 24-square-yard screen.

Police, merchants and officials are in-

trigued by the notion of marrying 19th century opera to 1980s Americans, but Oslo residents are skeptical, he said.

"Unfortunately, we first announced it on April 1 on local radio. Everyone thought it was an April Fool's joke," he said. Norwegians are wary of April 1 news because of the media's penchant for tricking them.

The state opera hopes the drive-in will be free, although its budget will not cover the costly performance without sponsors.

"We haven't worked out all the details

yet," said Petter Martin Tanberg of the Drammen, advertising agency Andersen and Holter, which was hired by the opera to handle sponsors and technical details.

"It's hard to say how much it will cost," he said, and response from sponsors has yet to be measured. "Of course, opera is a favorable thing for businesses to be associated with."

People think opera is a grim forum for tales of murder and betrayal, Baskerud said. "We want them to see that 'The Barber of Seville' is not a serious piece. It's lively and funny," he said.

The opera's 200 regular performances a year, held in a cramped former movie theater, already average 90 percent bookings.

Madrigals to perform spring concert

TWIN FALLS — A Madrigal soloist strolls into a grade-school audience, kneels and sings to a little girl.

The child quietly blushes, while her little friends giggle with delight.

On another song, "Snap To It," the group's 20 singers dance and harmonize in a lively acappella style, snapping and clapping to make everyone rock.

Then the dozen band members join in and "Johnny B. Goode" sounds as hot as ever. Signing illustrates the gentle song, "Love in Any Language."

"I could go on and on to you about the Madrigals," says Dr. Art Franz, a fan of the Twin Falls High School singing group. "I think they are one of the finest young people organizations they have at the high school. I think they do a fantastic job. I just can't rave enough about them."

Franz traveled with the Madrigals in recent years to Toronto, Canada, and Seattle, Wash., where the group performed at international Kiwanis meetings.

This month, the Madrigals traveled to Ontario, Ore., where they won first place in the Treasure Valley Jazz Festival.

Director Richard Smuck says some 80 students auditioned for 10 openings with the Madrigals last fall. Those trying to win a coveted place with the group are judged on singing ability, stage presence and attitude.

The pop ensemble, now in its 21st year, visits schools and civic groups to perform 40 to 50 times a year.

"We really consider ourselves a service organization to the community," Smuck says.

The annual show at the College of Southern Idaho, being presented Thursday, is the Madrigal's only fund-raiser, he says. Money generated by the fund-raiser is spent on sound and musical equipment.

"The rest of the time, we do all these performances for free."

The Madrigals practice on their own time and are totally dedicated to the group, Franz says.

Audience for networks at all-time low

NEW YORK — There was good news and bad news for the major TV networks this week. Most of the good was for NBC, which chalked up its fourth consecutive prime-time victory in the so-called "official" season that ended Sunday. It finished first in all 30 weeks and beat second-place ABC by a 24 percent margin, the largest since CBS' victory over NBC in 1957.

The bad news was for all three networks. In a strike-crippled season, their combined share of the prime-time audience was the lowest in history — averaging 68 percent, or about 3 percent below last season.

Network officials attributed the drop both to last year's 22-week writers' strike, which delayed production of new and returning series, and the continuing invasion of cable, now in 54.6 percent of the nation's TV households.

But they sought to project a "best-

worst-is-over" outlook in discussing two separate sets of ratings for the completed season. CBS was the most optimistic, even though that once-dominant network was third in the ratings for the second straight season, by a narrow margin.

CBS research vice president David Poltrack forecast heavy promotion next fall to lure viewers back.

"We're going to have to bang the drums loudly, probably a little bit more loudly than we have in the past," he said.

In the final returns for this season, released Tuesday by the A.C. Nielsen Co., NBC calculated a traditional 30-week season. The network, least affected by the strike because it had the Summer Olympics and World Series telecasts, said it averaged a 16 rating. ABC averaged a 12.9 and CBS a 12.6.

CBS and ABC's ratings were for what they considered a strike-short-

ened, 25-week season that didn't start until Oct. 24, when more than 50 percent of all network programming was first-run, as it would be in a normal season.

The outcome wasn't much different. CBS estimates gave NBC a 15.7 rating, ABC a 12.9 and CBS a 12.7. Each ratings point represents 904,000 homes.

NBC research vice president Gerald Jaffe said he didn't want to plant over NBC's victory, but this season was truly historic. We really did dominate."

The domination, which showed 13 NBC shows among the nation's 20 favorites, was led by "The Cosby Show," the top-rated series for the fourth consecutive season. No other network has finished first in all 30 weeks of the season since CBS did it in 1963-64; overall, NBC has now won or tied for first for 43 weeks in a row and is four away from the all-time record.

Virtually all of CBS' 29 pilots now being considered are designed to work in that time period, he said, and if those chosen for series succeed there, "the domino effect of it will be dramatic."

Poltrack also predicted big things for CBS' much-publicized "Murphy Brown," even though that nookie sitcom was 32nd in the Nielsen's for regularly scheduled series this season.

got their statistics. On those same occasions, you may rejoice in the fact that your children are grown and are well beyond all this.

In large part, "She's Out of Control" amuses, but you wouldn't want to take small children to see the PG-rated film. Some parents will, though, who do will get what they deserve.

The first is wearing thick-lensed glasses and braces when her father goes on a business trip. 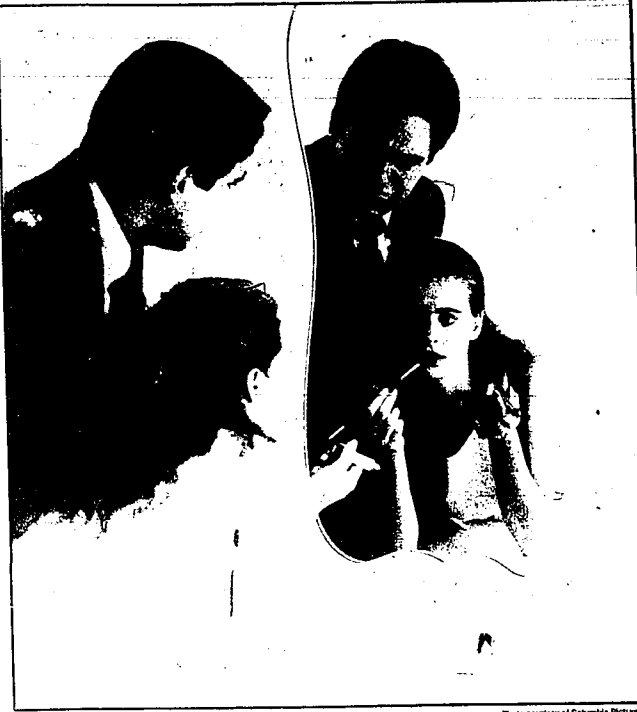

'Dangerous Liaisons' has ability to shock

The following are capsule reviews and a parental rating guide of some of the films now playing in the Magic Valley. As a guide for family viewing, the Los Angeles Times indicates areas of content (theme, language, sex, violence) that may be inappropriate for the very young or impressionable. Motion Picture Association of America or Los Angeles Times ratings are in parentheses.

DANGEROUS LIAISONS (R). As the book "Les Liaisons Dangereuses" outraged and scandalized the French in the late 18th century, this deft movie has kept every shred of its ability to shock in the late 1980s. Screenwriter Christopher Hampton, with director Stephen Frears, has made a plidgling cinematic version of his own successful play, taken from the 1792 novel by Choderlos de Laclos. Stars John Malkovich, Glenn Close and Michelle Pfeiffer.

DEAD BANG (R). In John Frankenheimer's "Dead Bang," Don Johnson, playing a scruffy Los Angeles cop but on the trail of a fascist underground group, has a squeeze-up, desperate look. The story is a weird unjelled mixture of fact and fancy, fiction and formula.

DEAD CALM (R). Cracking-good thrillers are harder to find these days, possibly because the audiences for them seem to have gotten more demanding. Into this void sails

"Dead Calm," a spare, smart, seductive piece of real movie making with (almost) every loophole covered, a superlative cast (Sinné, Nicole Kidman, Billy Zane) and enough tension to keep us all hyperventilating for hours. Directed by "Newsfront's" crackjack Philip Noice.

DISORGANIZED CRIME (R). Pleasant but needlessly drawn-out caper comedy in which an ill-assorted bunch of crooks (Fred Gwynne, Ruben Blades, Lou Diamond Phillips, William Russ) attempt to rob a bank in a small Montana town, despite their leader (Corbin Bernsen) being chased by a pair of New Jersey cops (scene-stealers Ed O'Neill and Dan Roebuck). Written and directed by Jim Kouf, who also wrote "Scout.".

JACKNIFE (R). In its straightforward realistic style, obvious theatrical roots and in its subject, the lingering trauma of Vietnam on its combat veterans, "Jackknife" is better suited to TV, but it benefits from a starry big-screen cast: Robert De Niro, Ed Harris and Kathy Baker. Adapted by Stephen Metcalfe from his play, "Strange Snow," and directed by David Jones.

LEVIATHAN (R). It's "The Alien"

set beneath the sea instead of outer space — and not nearly as sophisticated. But it's occasionally scary, looks good and moves well under George Cosmatos' vigorous direction. Peter Weller, Richard Crenna.

MAJOR LEAGUE (R). David Ward's amiable, amusing baseball comedy, which turns upon the fact that the Cleveland Indians haven't won a pennant since 1954 — and which affords enjoyable, ingratiating performances from Tom Berenger, Charlie Sheen, Corbin Bernsen, James Gammon and numerous others. A modest winner about a bunch of supposed losers.

RAIN MAN (R). Because we have had dozens of buddy films about journeys of discovery, we can plot the scenario of this one like a road map: The special qualities of one will work on the other to change him, or perhaps both of them. Dustin Hoffman makes his autistic savant character hypnotically interesting and sometimes terribly funny. Tom Cruise gives his loquacious, most authoritative performance since "Risky Business" and it can be said unblushingly that he holds his own with the masterly Hoffman.

SAY ANYTHING (PG-13). Trust Cameron Crowe, writer of "Fast Times at Ridgemont High," to dig

among the slag heaps of an almost mined-out genre — the teen-age movie — and come up with one of the nicest of the species, a film of warmth, insight, humor and surprising originality. Crowe's first direction is not perfect, but when it is good, which is every moment John Cusack is on screen, it is a living joy.

TROOP BEVERLY HILLS (PG). Director Jeff Kanew is good at grotesque stage business, and he has encouraged Shelley Long into a symphony of dizzy ditz-shit. Long is an actress who can't throw away a line — though this is one case where she should have thrown away the whole script. But she gets points for sheer, daffy energy and rampaging pulchritude.

Creator Jim Henson is betting the Muppets can make TV comeback

Most observers have written off the variety show, noting that it seems to have gone the way of the hustle, the mood ring and other '70s phenomena. But the Muppets are something else entirely.

True, "The Jim Henson Hour" (airing Fridays on NBC) is no ordinary variety show. It was created by Jim Henson, the man responsible for Bert, Ernie, Miss Piggy and the rest of the spongy, witty creatures collectively known as the Muppets. In the late '70s, "The Muppet Show" was one of the most popular shows in the world, attracting adult viewers who were nearly as fanatic as their children, spawning millions of dollars worth of merchandise and a generation who sprinkled their speech with French phrases, a la Miss Piggy. Will that snout and those eyes hold America captive again?

Henson thinks they will. The show uses familiar characters, such as Kermit the Frog and Miss Piggy, along with new inventions, such as a computer-generated figure and a half-human, half-robot creature. It also incorporates guest stars, comedy skits, music and the critically ac-

claimed "Storyteller" series. This Emmy-winning series offers a creative rendering of old folk tales narrated by John Hurt.

"There's something universal about puppets; they transcend any boundaries of race, age and so on," says Henson, explaining why the Muppets are so popular. If you have any doubts, Henson says he still receives 500-600 fan letters a week from people singing the praises of various Muppets. "Every once in a while, kids will suggest an idea for a show, but we haven't used one — yet," he says thoughtfully.

Henson, who serves as host in addition to being executive producer of the show, rhapsodizes about some of the sequences on the new series. "I particularly enjoyed some of the specials we did for it," he says. "I liked the show we did about the rain forest; there's a beautiful background, lovely music, and we focus on this little endangered species of tree frog. This is my favorite episode at the moment, since I'm working on it."

Other favorites include a segment titled "Dog City." "That one was about crime; it featured dogs in the 1940s," Henson explains.

Mostly, he says, "I like breaking

new ground. Of course, sometimes that's more successful than others.

"We're aiming this show at the family," he continues. "I love this because it gives us the opportunity to do different things. It's really a collaborative effort among the whole staff, right down to the names of the characters. I like it when we do something we haven't done before."

Perhaps that explains the enormous appeal of the Muppets. In "The Muppet Show," Henson consistently created the characters with ingenuity and humor and invested them with wit and all-too-human foibles. This touch was also evident in ventures aimed mainly at younger children, such as "Fraggle Rock" and "The Muppet Babies," which combined the same brand of sweetness and biting humor.

If "The Jim Henson Hour" retains that same brand of wit and charm, this variety show may have a fighting chance.

Jane Elliot sharpens claws again

This winter Jane Elliot, who played Anjelica on "Days of Our Lives," kept hearing rumors that "General Hospital" wanted her back again to play the awful Tracy Quartermain. When GH's Wes Kenney phoned her in late January, she knew the rumors were true.

"My two years on 'Days' were very happy ones," Jane Elliot admits. "But I couldn't resist stepping into Tracy Quartermain's shoes again after nine years. What goes around comes around."

Originally, Tracy Quartermain came out of the heads of writer Doug Marland and boss Gloria Monty. Gloria saw the Quartermain family as TV's version of "The Little Foxes," a fine collection of greedy, conniving, low-life rich folk. Tracy was so bitchy that fans harassed Jane Elliot in public.

"It was very upsetting to me," Jane recalls. "In airports, in stores, everywhere, people lit into me. I became confused. Was I a good actress, or a real bitch?"

Not to worry — the lady hasn't changed any. She's busy protecting her son Ned to cut him in on the family loot, and worrying over Edward Quartermain's will after his plane went down in the Atlantic.

"Pat Falken Smith did most of the writing on Tracy in the beginning," Jane continued. "Then Pat moved on, but we have writers who were around at the time."

"That's what Jane likes about 'General Hospital' — its consistency."

"Writers are still here, and so are many actors after a decade. It's like coming home."

Best of all, Jane Elliot's return as Tracy Quartermain represents a victory of will and perseverance.

Twenty-five years ago Jane Elliot made the TV rounds as a young, aspiring actress. In those days, the pretty, sexy types became leads, so Jane, whose beauty is more than skin deep, settled for character parts playing woebegones, sisters and villains. Prime time parts were few and far between. Jane took stock. She needed to act, and daytime soaps were the place for that. Jane auditioned for the role of an Italian doctor named Gina Dante on "General Hospital" — and didn't get

it. But Gloria Monty and Doug Marland created Tracy for her.

After the two-year run on GH, Jane went to "Guiding Light" for a spell, then to "All My Children."

"I had a grand part as Cory Todd on 'Guiding Light,' but no one paid any attention," Jane discloses. "On 'All My Children' I was part of an event, and when that ran out, we had nothing."

Between the two soaps, Jane faced unemployment and a choice. Should she give it up?

"How do you know when to quit?" the actress asks. "I hate to say it, but most of the actresses I started out with aren't working now. I always had the idea my time would come when I was older. And there I was — divorced, a single mom with a baby son."

Jane considers herself a very fortunate actress. She signed a pay check from "Days of Our Lives" one week, and collected a "General Hospital" check the next week. That

seldom happens in Hollywood and Jane knows it.

Watch Jane as Tracy, a dazzling snake who has come home to stir up the nest.

I'm told that for playing the fiendish Joker in the upcoming "Batman" flick, Nicholson took home an estimated \$11 million, plus a percentage of the profits.

Coalition plans to fight syndicated TV market

WASHINGTON (AP) — A coalition of television producers, unions and station owners says it will fight any attempt by ABC, CBS and NBC to re-enter and dominate the lucrative syndicated TV market the networks were forced to leave in 1983.

The Motion Picture Association of America on Tuesday announced that a 207-member coalition would stand in the way of the networks if they attempt to "gut" the so-called financial interest and syndication rule.

MPAA President Jack Valenti said the coalition was putting the networks on notice that "we will not lag or hesitate to defend the rule and hold it in place."

A 1983 consent decree between the networks and the Justice Department forced the networks out of the syndication business. That agreement expires in 1990, and the networks and producers have been negotiating to try to reach a new accord without further government intervention.

But the talks have reached an impasse, the Coalition to Preserve the Financial Interest and Syndication Rules said.

Independent producers say they owe their very existences to the 1983 decree, under which the networks were allowed to keep the pro-

grams they broadcast for four years and then return them to producers for sale to independent TV stations and network affiliates.

Hit programs such as "The Cosby Show" and "Miami Vice" can make many millions of dollars in this syndication market.

Unlike before, the networks were barred from holding any financial interest in programs they license from outside producers. But the networks take all advertising revenues from a program's network run.

The program producers, on the other hand, are paid a licensing fee by the networks — typically \$1 million to \$1.5 million for an hourlong program — that usually doesn't meet the total costs of the production.

But the producers can profit enormously in syndication with a hit show.

"The rule is working," the coalition said. "The number of independent TV stations has grown; so has the number and quality of producers creating programming for network and syndicated exhibition. ... Meanwhile, the three major networks remain profitable and dominant."

CBS News and Home Box Office win Peabody Awards

ATHENS, Ga. (AP) — CBS News and Home Box Office each won two George Foster Peabody Awards for distinguished broadcasting in 1988, the University of Georgia announced Friday.

CBS won for installments of its "48 Hours" and "60 Minutes" magazine programs, and HBO was honored for programs about Vietnam and AIDS.

ABC's dramatic series "thirtysomething" and NBC's made-for-television movie "The Murder of Mary Phagan" also were among the 29 winners of the annual awards, announced Friday by the university's College of Journalism and Mass Communications.

Other winners included two foreign entries, from the BBC and the BBC's African service. Three individuals were cited for personal achievement: ABC sportscaster Jim McKay, Don Hewitt of CBS News

and publisher Walter Annenberg.

The Peabody Awards, often called the "Pulitzer Prizes of broadcast journalism," will be presented May 22 at a luncheon in New York. The 1988 winners were chosen from a record 826 entries from radio stations, television stations and networks from the United States and foreign nations.

The advisory board that chose the winners included two former network chairmen, two television critics, two broadcasting magazine executives, a former presidential assistant, communications executives and lawyers.

The University of Georgia has administered the awards since they were first presented in 1940.

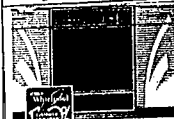

NBC wins its fourth straight season

LOS ANGELES (AP) — NBC captured its fourth straight television season Tuesday, winning by the largest margin in 32 years with a little help from "The Cosby Show," "Cheers," "A Different World" and "The Golden Girls."

NBC won all 30 weeks of the September to April season, the first time any network has done so since 1963-64, and claimed three of the four most popular series, according to A.C. Nielsen Co. end-of-the-year ratings.

The network's margin of victory, 24 percent, was the second-largest in Nielsen history, the network said. For the 1956-1957 season, CBS had a 25.6 rating, 27 percent higher than NBC.

"It's something we're all very proud of," Robert Wright, NBC's president and chief executive officer, said in a luncheon address before television producers. Wright praised Brandon Tartikoff, president of the network's entertainment division.

"Without his relentless efforts, I can honestly say from my vantage point we certainly would never have gotten from the depths to the peaks which we enjoy so much today," Wright said.

Nevertheless, overall ratings continued to be stagnant, and NBC's mark tied for the lowest-winning rating ever.

Boosted by its working-class situation comedy "Roseanne," the season's highest-rated new series and No. 2 overall, ABC finished in second place. CBS, saddled by the aging serials "Dallas," tied for No. 30, "Knots Landing," tied for 28th, and "Falcon Crest," tied at No. 54, came in last among the three networks for the second year in a row.

But both ABC and CBS disputed NBC's calculations from Nielsen

data, claiming the television season didn't really begin until Oct. 24. Although both networks reported the same order of finish, their numbers depicted NBC's victory in less overwhelming terms.

Based on NBC's figures, the network had a yearly rating of 16.0, followed by ABC with a rating of 12.9 and a CBS with 12.6. A rating measures the percentage of the nation's 90.4 million TV homes, with one rating point equivalent to 904,000 households with televisions.

Led by No. 1 hit "The Cosby Show" and the situation comedies "A Different World," "Cheers," "The Golden Girls" and "ALF," NBC won Monday, Thursday and Saturday nights, and finished second Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Sundays. The network had 13 of the top 20 programs.

The ratings for the week of April 10 had NBC as the winner with a 14.5 rating, followed by CBS with 12.7 and ABC with 12.1.

The start of the just-concluded season was thrown into chaos by last year's five-month Writers Guild of America strike, which delayed the debut of almost every series. It also forced the networks to generate "writer-proof" programs such as news specials and new productions of old scripts from series like "Mission: Impossible."

NBC escaped the brunt of the strike because it broadcast the 1988 Summer Olympics and the World Series, well-watched sports specials that were not affected by the labor dispute.

"What the writers' strike did is hurt the new product," said David Poltrack, CBS' senior vice president of planning and research. "The strike had an impact. It was not an even impact. It helps the established competition."

The strike also boosted the performance of the Fox Broadcasting Corp., Poltrack said. "It was during the strike period that 'Married With Children' and 'America's Most Wanted' started to produce big numbers," he said.

At the same time, NBC came under attack from dozens of television critics who believed the network had made a turn to the tawdry.

Among the targets in Tartikoff's schedule were the racy miniseries "Favorite Son," the lurid movie "Full Exposure" and Geraldo Rivera's "documentary" on devil worship.

The season's most-watched miniseries was CBS' "Lonesome Dove," the adaptation of novelist Larry McMurtry's account of a cattle drive. In second was ABC's "Women of Brewster Place," starring Oprah Winfrey, and NBC's "Brotherhood of the Rose." "War and Remembrance," ABC's \$100 million epic miniseries, finished in fourth.

Alan Wurtzel, ABC's senior vice president of marketing and research services, said his network was encouraged by its strong showing on Friday and Tuesday nights, the latter anchored by "Roseanne."

"Right now, we begin six weeks of new season schedule meetings," Wurtzel said. "I think the solid Tuesday night is really a significant benefit to us."

NBC has now won 43 ratings weeks in a row, and is just four weeks away from erasing CBS' all-time consecutive win record. NBC last lost a week in the ratings in June 1988.

Another achievement during the season was the capture of the top three spots by one production firm, the Carver-Werner Co.

Smithsonian TV exhibit draws child 'Lassie' star

WASHINGTON (AP) — Jon Provost, child star of the "Lassie" television show of three decades ago, will soon start filming a new version of the long-popular TV series for broadcast next fall, playing an uncle of the dog's young masters.

Now 39 and a real estate agent in Santa Rosa, Calif., Provost was a surprise visitor at the preview Tuesday of a new exhibition celebrating 50 years of American television. The yearlong show opens today at the Smithsonian Institution's National Museum of American History.

Touring the exhibit of 200 artifacts and more than 100 photographs tracing the history of U.S. television, Provost paused for a nostalgic look at the costume he wore as Timmy in the original "Lassie" series.

Provost had made a gift to the Smithsonian of the red-checked sports shirt, blue jeans and black-topped tennis shoes he wore on the show from 1957 until 1964. The actor was 7 years old when he began filming the series, and quit the show when he was 14.

"It really was a thrill to be asked to donate them to the Smithsonian," he said.

Provost said he will play an uncle on the new syndicated "Lassie" show, which will star Dee Wallace Stone and her real-life husband, Christopher Stone, as the parents.

The new TV family's pet collie will be the eighth generation descendant of the original Lassie, he said.

Last week, during preliminary filming in Los Angeles with the full cast, Provost said "it really brought back memories" to make friends with the new Lassie. "We definitely will be building a relationship. I think," he said.

The museum exhibit, underwritten by the consumer electronics group of the Electronic Industries Association, traces the history of American television from its inauguration at the New York World's Fair in April 1939.

President Franklin D. Roosevelt's speech at the opening ceremonies was broadcast to about 200 TV receivers in metropolitan New York, marking the start of regular television service in the United States.

Highlights of the show include the RCA television receiver, encased in Lucite, which was displayed at the World's Fair and other early TV sets.

Memorabilia on display include Archie Bunker's wing chair from "All In The Family," the pith helmet worn by Marlin Perkins, host of the "Wild Kingdom" show, J.R. Ewing's cowboy hat from "Dallas," the Howdy Doody marionette, the leather jacket that Henry Winkler wore as the Fonx on "Happy Days" and a stainless steel coffee pot used on the soap opera, "The Guiding Light."

Smithsonian TV exhibit draws child 'Lassie' star

WASHINGTON (AP) — Jon Provost, child star of the "Lassie" television show of three decades ago, will soon start filming a new version of the long-popular TV series for broadcast next fall, playing an uncle of the dog's young masters.

Now 39 and a real estate agent in Santa Rosa, Calif., Provost was a surprise visitor at the preview Tuesday of a new exhibition celebrating 50 years of American television. The yearlong show opens today at the Smithsonian Institution's National Museum of American History.

Touring the exhibit of 200 artifacts and more than 100 photographs tracing the history of U.S. television, Provost paused for a nostalgic look at the costume he wore as Timmy in the original "Lassie" series.

Provost had made a gift to the Smithsonian of the red-checkered sports shirt, blue jeans and black-topped tennis shoes he wore on the show from 1957 until 1964. The actor was 7 years old when he began filming the series, and quit the show when he was 14.

"It really was a thrill to be asked to donate them to the Smithsonian," he said.

Provost said he will play an uncle on the new syndicated "Lassie" show, which will star Dee Wallace Stone and her real-life husband, Christopher Stone, as the parents.

The new TV family's pet collie will be the eighth generation descendant of the original Lassie, he said.

Last week, during preliminary filming in Los Angeles with the full cast, Provost said "it really brought back memories" to make friends with the new Lassie. "We definitely will be building a relationship, I think," he said.

The museum exhibit, underwritten by the consumer electronics group of the Electronic Industries Association, traces the history of American television from its inauguration at the New York World's Fair in April 1939.

President Franklin D. Roosevelt's speech at the opening ceremonies was broadcast to about 200 TV receivers in metropolitan New York, marking the start of regular television service in the United States.

Highlights of the show include the RCA television receiver, encased in Lucite, which was displayed at the World's Fair and other early TV sets.

Memorabilia on display include Archie Bunker's wing chair from "All In The Family," the pith helmet worn by Marlin Perkins, host of the "Wild Kingdom" show, J.R. Ewing's cowboy hat from "Dallas," the Howdy Doody marionette, the leather jacket that Henry Winkler wore as the Fonzy on "Happy Days" and a stainless steel coffee pot used on the soap opera, "The Guiding Light."

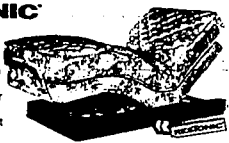
