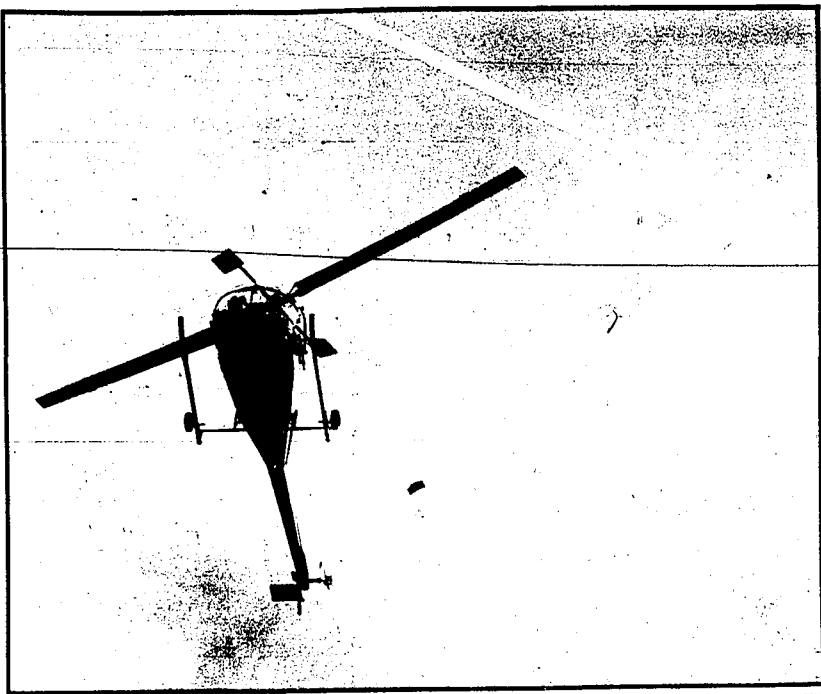

Egg-speriments make safe landings

TWIN FALLS — A duct tape-coated blimp spiraled to the ground while a purple teddy bear in a rainbow vest parachuted into a nearby field.

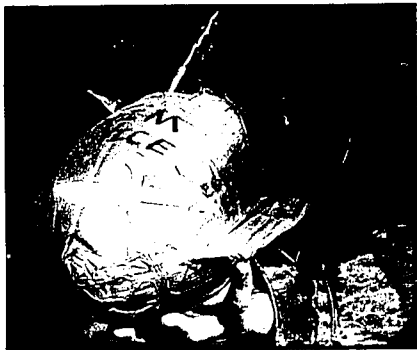
Their mission? To land without cracking their fragile cargo of raw eggs.

Of 150 egg-filled packages dropped from a helicopter hovering above O'Leary Junior High School's football field Thursday, only 19 failed.

Science Net — a districtwide group of science teachers — sponsored the "Eggsceptional Drop-off" as part of National Science and Technology Week. The three-phase event ended Thursday, leaving about half its original entries intact and ready for breakfast.

Jo Dodds, O'Leary earth science teacher and organizer of the drop-off, said she used the project to teach ninth-graders about space landings.

The project started with drops from each school's building. Sur-

vivors graduated to a 90-foot drop from a hook and ladder fire truck Wednesday.

Thursday, kids from around the

district lined the O'Leary football field's fence to watch their crack-proof packages plummet 500 feet to the ground.

It took Morningside first-grader Jennifer Ashley an entire carton of eggs to perfect her method, said her mother, Cathy Ashley. She finally found that foam padding worked best.

Most kids interviewed said they had used packing pellets or Styrofoam, paper towels or newspapers to protect their eggs. O'Leary ninth-grader Damon Durham surrounded his egg with popcorn.

Jeremy Kendrick went all out. The Sawtooth Elementary School sixth-grader, whose dad owns an audio shop, melted stereo packaging around his egg.

He said the project taught him about gravity and the science of breakage.

The 150 finalists' packages looked like bombs as they dropped pell-mell from the helicopter. High winds blew most off course, carrying some onto the bleachers and others into a farmer's field.

One, however, a heavy, duct tape-coated ice cream bucket, went into a nose dive and thudded to the ground. It sounded ominously like the beginnings of an omelet.

China leaders offer dialogue with students

BEIJING — In a dramatic concession to pro-democracy students, the Chinese government announced late Thursday that it is prepared to open a dialogue with student leaders to discuss their demands.

The announcement came after tens of thousands of student demonstrators marched through Beijing for more than 12 hours, sweeping past police lines and returning triumphantly to their campuses.

Communist Party authorities had warned that they would crush the march. Instead, China's leaders suffered the humiliation of a stunning

rebuke from the elite youth of the nation, supported by hundreds of thousands of cheering Beijing residents.

The students are demanding freedom of the press, better treatment of intellectuals and an attack on corruption.

Although the government's agreement to meet with student leaders seemed to be a significant concession, it contained conditions that could prove unacceptable to the protesters.

The official New China News Agency reported that the State Council, China's Cabinet, had entrusted the All-China and Beijing Municipal students' federations to forward the

Court withdraws rate case opinion

BOISE — The Idaho Supreme Court has withdrawn its controversial opinion overturning a state regulatory decision in an Idaho Power Co. rate increase case.

The high court's action, announced Thursday, came as a result of a settlement between the utility, the Public Utilities Commission and other interested parties that resolved the dispute over the amount of the rate hike.

Only the Idaho Neighbors Network refused to support the settlement, claiming it offered no significant improvement over the high court's original order.

The Supreme Court got involved in

the case after Idaho Power appealed the commission's 1986 decision to grant just a fraction of the \$66 million in higher rates the company sought.

Last December, the high court overturned the PUC ruling, granting Idaho Power a \$28.3 million increase in annual revenues. The decision rejected the regulatory ruling that Idaho Power should not have significantly earned from ratepayers a return on its equity from a coal-fired plant in Nevada.

In addition, however, the court majority included in the decision several statements that commission officials feared would severely infringe on the regulators authority to determine the

SAT slanted against women, group claims

WASHINGTON — The Scholastic Aptitude Test, which has been criticized as unfair to minorities and a poor predictor of college performance, came under fire again Thursday by a women's advocacy group that charged the test is biased against women.

Researcher Phyllis Rosser said she found that 21 of the 145 questions on the November 1987 version of the exam heavily favored men, while only two questions favored women.

Rosser, conducting research for the Center for Women Policy Studies, said men score better than women on verbal questions dealing with science, sports and war, while women outscore men when items deal with relationships, clothing or appearances. For example, women are better at correctly answering the analogy, "Love is to require as attack is to retaliate," while men are more likely to correctly answer, "Dividends is to stock as royalties is to writer."

On math, women score well on al-

Energy chief moves back start of tritium production for arms

WASHINGTON — Energy Secretary James D. Watkins said Thursday he has moved back the timetable for resuming production of a scarce gas needed to make nuclear warheads.

He assured Congress the delay would not weaken the national defense.

Watkins said he hoped to restart production at the Savannah River reactors, near Aiken, S.C., early in 1990. The three reactors, which have been plagued by safety and technical flaws, are the nation's only source of tritium, a perishable, radioactive gas that boosts the explosive power of warheads.

More retraining of reactor operators and a fuller assessment of other safety issues are needed before the plant can be allowed to resume operation, Watkins said.

Because of the attention I'm giv-

ing to safety, health and the environment, ... I have said unequivocally I will not allow them to be started this year" as previously planned, Watkins told reporters at a meeting in his office.

Shortly after the reactors were shut down for safety reasons last summer, the department said it could have them running again by late 1988. After that target was missed, the department told Congress it expected startup by late this year.

Watkins also disclosed in a meeting with reporters that he planned to announce a "new approach" to the Energy Department's controversial effort to build the nation's first permanent repository for high-level nuclear wastes in Nevada.

He said residents of the state may have been justified in feeling "they had a waste dump jammed down their throats" by federal officials who paid too little attention to local opinion. The \$30 billion Yucca Mountain

repository is officially scheduled to open in 2003, although Watkins' planned changes could put that date in doubt.

The Energy Department, which builds and tests nuclear weapons for the Pentagon, has been able to continue warhead production because it has a reserve of tritium.

The size of the tritium stockpile is classified, but the department told Congress earlier this year that supplies would be squeezed if the Savannah River reactors were not operating by the end of this year.

Many private groups that monitor the government weapons program have expressed doubt that tritium supplies are as tight as suggested by the Energy Department.

The initial suggestion that we faced a national security emergency is absurd," said Frances Close Hart, chairman of the Energy Research Foundation, a Columbia, S.C.-based environmental group that wants the Savannah River reactors closed.

After 200 years, Bounty's Bligh has a better image

LONDON — William Bligh, long portrayed as the villain of the mutiny on the H.M.S. Bounty, is regaining heroic stature as the 200th anniversary of the revolt led by Fletcher Christian is observed today.

The old view of Bligh as a bully is largely legend and I'm afraid that Hollywood, Charles Laughton, Trevor Howard, Clark Gable and Marlon Brando have a lot to do with it," said Baron Terence Lewin, a retired Royal Navy admiral.

Laughton and Howard played Bligh as a flogging villain in the "Mutiny on the Bounty" films of 1935 and 1962, in which Gable and then Brando portrayed Christian, the leader of the mutiny, as upright and virtuous.

"Bligh was abrasive but the mutiny was a flash-in-the-pan affair that might easily have never taken place if he had not upset Fletcher Christian the day before by accusing him of stealing his coconuts," Lewin said in an interview.

In fact, said Lewin, "Bligh was a great navigator, a brave commander in battle and a fine seaman who looked after the comfort and health of his sailors in an

age when going to sea could let you in for a pretty rough time."

The 68-year-old admiral, who won the Distinguished Service Cross for World War II high seas action, greeted visitors to a preview Thursday of an exhibition open through Oct. 1 at the National Maritime Museum in Greenwich, southeast London, to mark the 200th anniversary of the mutiny.

Anthony Hopkins, who reintepreted Bligh as sympathetic in the 1984 film, "The Bounty," opened the exhibition and said: "I think Bligh was a perfectionist who failed in human relations. But he was a great character whose strength and vision made history."

The museum show celebrates Bligh's long career, his heroism under the command of Adm. Horatio Nelson, his achievements as navigator with explorer Capt. James Cook and his feat of seamanship after being cast adrift from the Bounty, of which he was captain.

With 18 local crewmen, he sailed a 23-foot open boat 3,618 nautical miles in 47 days to Timor, Indonesia. A central exhibit is the Bounty's chronometer which the mutineers took to their Pitcairn Island refuge. Also displayed are blackened relics of wood, copper and iron sheathing from the Bounty.

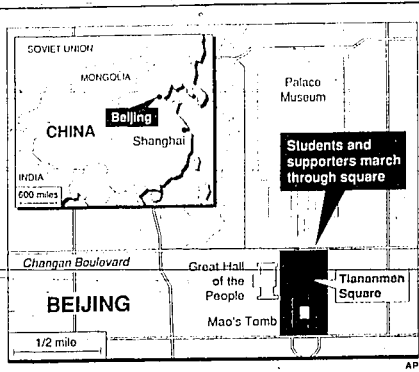

students' demands and sponsor talks with the appropriate authorities.

That appeared to mean that protest leaders could meet with government officials but that arrangements must be made through the official Communist Party-controlled student associations, which the demonstrators have rejected in recent days.

A procession of about 50,000 banner-carrying students from dozens of Beijing universities took part in Thursday's march. Accompanied by a roughly equal number of non-student supporters, they broke through a series of police lines along Beijing's main boulevard in the afternoon and sought the great gate to the Forbidden City that fronts on the northern end of Tian An Men Square.

At each line, the police yielded without violence, and the orderly and highly disciplined crowd chanted, "Thank you, policeman."

It was shortly before 5 p.m. when the crowd reached Tian An Men, trapping 16 truckloads of unarmed soldiers who had been circling the square in an attempt to bring the advancing procession to a halt.



way for them to drive away. Then thousands of supporters of the students ran onto the square, which until then had been sealed off by the police.

But the three-mile-long student procession, rather than occupying the square, continued to the east through the main part of the city.

Some youthful policemen, standing in groups along the side of the road after abandoning efforts to control the situation, returned the waves and smiles of many in the crowd. A few even raised their hands with two

fingers extended, returning the V-fingery sign made by some in the crowd.

The students maintained order throughout the march, with parade marshals linking hands at the sides of the column. The students eventually turned onto the three north-bound lanes of a major highway, and thousands of onlookers, many of them applauding or cheering, gathered on overpasses to watch them head triumphantly back to their campuses.

Quayle lauds Australia's efforts for defense

MELBOURNE, Australia (AP) — Vice President Dan Quayle celebrated strong U.S.-Australian relations Thursday and in particular praised Australia for its military defense efforts.

Quayle, on his second day in Australia, flew here from Canberra, where he told a press conference the United States would like to see its

friends in the Pacific pick up more of the tab for defense at a time when Washington is restraining its military budget. But he praised Australia for its efforts to enhance security.

He did mention one dispute between the two countries, over U.S. subsidies to wheat growers in an export enhancement program that the

Australians contend hurts their wheat sales in foreign markets. Quayle said he discussed the issue with Prime Minister Bob Hawke on Wednesday.

"Believe me, I've heard about our trade policy and export enhancement program ... in no uncertain terms not only from the prime minister but others," Quayle said.

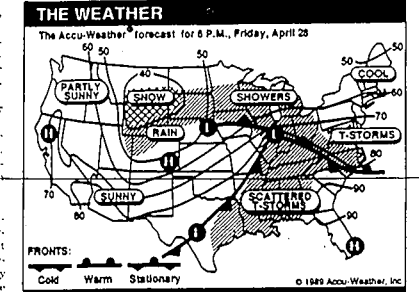

Detention brings Noriega criticism

WASHINGTON (AP) — The State Department criticizes the government of Gen. Manuel Antonio Noriega of Panama on Thursday for detaining an American reporter who allegedly passed a dollar that had anti-Noriega slogans on it.

Spokeswoman Margaret Tutwiler said Charles Lane, a Newsweek reporter based in El Salvador, was taken into custody Wednesday and held for several hours by the Panama Defense Forces. He was unharmed.

At the time there were any charges against Mr. Lane, Ms. Tutwiler said, calling the incident "a typical instance of an absence of political freedom and basic civil liberties in Panama."

She said the Panamanians staged a "deliberate effort to intimidate an Independent journalist in the context of a national election which Gen. Noriega would have the world believe will represent the free expression of the will of the people of Panama, its domestic opponents and those able to give a true picture of Noriega's regime to the world."

Presidential elections are scheduled in Panama for May 7.

House Demos want Gingrich probe

WASHINGTON (AP) — Four House Democrats on Thursday called for the appointment of an outside counsel to investigate allegations that Republican Whip Newt Gingrich violated House rules in his financial dealings.

Rep. Bill Alexander, D-Ark., filed a formal complaint with the House ethics committee earlier this month alleging 10 apparent rule violations in the formation and operation of a limited partnership set up to promote a 1984 book co-authored by Gingrich.

But Reps. Barney Frank of Massachusetts, Larry Smith of Florida, Pat Schroeder of Colorado and Albert Bustamante of Texas, are asking Democratic colleagues to support their letter to the ethics panel chairman, Rep. Julian Dixon, D-Calif., calling for an outside counsel.

In the letter to Dixon, the Democrats said such an appointment to investigate the charges against Gingrich would "preserve the integrity of the committee's consideration process from politicization and outside pressure."

Jury deliberates; North gives speech

WASHINGTON (AP) — While the jury continued deciding his fate Thursday, Oliver North turned his attention to a speech to an invitation-only audience in Ohio.

North, the former National Security Council aide being tried on 12 criminal charges stemming from the Iran-Contra affair, has made several speeches since the trial began on Jan. 31 at fees believed to be \$20,000-\$25,000 each.

Asked how much North was getting for Thursday night's speech at the Bankers Club in Cincinnati, club manager Brian Lassure said "that's confidential."

The legal bills of North, who has had at least three lawyers at the defense table and at times as many as five, are estimated at \$380,000 a month.

Reporters in Cincinnati were told there would be no press coverage of North's speech in Dublin, Ireland. The Bankers Club's 1,200 members principally are bankers, lawyers and businessmen and women.

The three men and nine women on North's jury, meanwhile, deliberated for the sixth day without any hint of where they stand. They sent no notes out of the room and made no requests of the judge.

They quit for the day shortly after 4 p.m., having worked on their verdict for 51 hours — a total 321 in the six days.

Earthquake felt in parts of 4 states

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — A moderate earthquake felt in four states Thursday was the strongest in the region since 1976, a U.S. Geological Survey spokesman said.

There were no reports of damage or injuries from the earthquake that measured 4.7 on the Richter scale of ground motion. It was centered in New Madrid, Mo., 10 miles north of Blytheville, Ark.

It was felt in Arkansas, Missouri, Kentucky and Tennessee, said Pat Jorgenson of the survey's National Earthquake Information Center in Golden, Colo.

The earthquake emanated from the New Madrid seismic zone, which was the center of a series of great earthquakes that rocked the area during the winter of 1811-12.

14 winning tickets picked in lottery

MIDDLETOWN, Pa. (AP) — Fourteen winning tickets were picked in the state's record \$115 million lottery jackpot, a computer analysis showed Thursday, and two winners quickly were claimed by a group of Ohio factory workers and a Pennsylvania family.

The big jackpot was totaled at \$115,579,980.14, about 30 minutes after 14 workers from a Windham, Ohio, brick factory arrived to claim a share of it, said Jim Scroggins, lottery executive director.

People from Washington, Pa., and East Windsor, N.J., also claimed to hold winning tickets, but did not arrive at lottery headquarters Thursday.

"I could believe it. I still don't," said brick worker Butch Shavers, 38, of Warren, Ohio.

Also arriving to claim a winning ticket were Alverto Handal, 65, of Portage, her son, Jim, 39, of Summer Hill, and her daughter, Nancy Williams, 34, of Fort Montgomery, N.Y.

Eastern's Lorenzo hanging tough

NEW YORK (AP) — As the strike gripping Eastern Airlines approaches the end of its second month, boss Frank Lorenzo is hanging tough.

After rejecting buyout proposals and producing his own plan to shrink the airline, Lorenzo seems to be playing a waiting game with striking employees, who after nearly two months on the picket lines may be under increasing pressure to find jobs again.

More pressure was added Thursday when Eastern announced a deal to lease 11 Boeing 727-200 planes to rival Pan American World Airways for \$26.6 million.

factors in rate cases upon which they base their rulings.

Because of those sections the PCC asked the high court to reconsider its opinion and negotiations began that resulted in the February settlement. Effective Feb. 1, the utility gained rate hikes that would boost annual revenues by \$26 million, about \$4 a month more for the average residential customer.

In return, the company agreed to drop the court case and seek no additional general rate increases before 1992.

The high court action fulfilled the first part of that pledge, but consumer activists maintain there is no real guarantee that Idaho Power will not seek additional rate hikes before 1992.

WASHINGTON — Some sky-watching satellites have been blinded as much as half the time by radiation leaking from nuclear reactors that power Soviet satellites, a fact U.S. officials knew for eight years, but concealed from much of the scientific community, according to the authors of a free report in today's issue of the journal Science.

As a result, large amounts of data that scientists thought were telling them something about the universe must be weeded out and discarded. Moreover, the continuing radiation problem may threaten information to be collected by some of the biggest space-science projects planned for the near future, according to Joel R. Primack of the University of California at Santa Cruz, author of one of five papers in Science detailing the astronomical disaster.

The threatened projects include the \$500,000 gamma ray observatory and the \$1 billion Hubble space telescope, the most expensive piece of equipment ever put in space and the first optical telescope to see to the edge of the universe, Primack said.

The problem is caused by the radar ocean reconnaissance satellites used by the Soviets to observe U.S. naval operations.

gebra and computation but poorly on geometry and problem-solving, Rosser said.

"We think the SAT is a defective product," said Leslie R. Wolfe, executive director of the Center for Women Policy Studies. The group called on the Educational Testing Service, which designs the test, to remove questions that favor one gender or balance them with items favoring the other.

Men consistently outscore women on the test, which is designed to predict a student's grades as a college freshman, but women earn higher grades both in high school and college, Rosser said. In 1988, men outscored women by an average of 56 points.

As a result of the gap, the group charged, women are less likely to win scholarships, gain entry to certain colleges and be admitted to programs for talented students.

For the SAT, said differences in male and female scores "reflect legitimate educational differences" in the two groups — high school boys are more likely to take advanced math classes, for example. She said the test's predictive validity is as high for women as it is for men.

Earlier this year, a federal judge ruled that New York state's use of the SAT to award scholarships discriminates against girls.

"After a careful review of the evidence," said Judge John M. Walker, "this court concludes that SAT scores capture a student's academic achievement no more than a student's yearbook photograph captures the full range of her experiences in high school."

Ricks graduates its centennial class

REXBURG (AP) — The demise in society of decency and integrity has intensified the need for young people to commit to lives "anchored in gospel principles," the Relief Society President of the Mormon Church has told Ricks College graduates.

"Disappearing standards of decency and lack of integrity surrounding us in society and in government," Barbara Winder told graduates on Thursday, mean they must "watch-for the times and places where integrity is required."

Some 1,500 students received associate degrees in ceremonies ending the year-long centennial celebration of the two-year college owned by the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints.

Idaho Gov. Cecil Andrus told the graduates that the education they have received is much less important than how they use their knowledge and experience.

Irrigators challenge power projects

BOISE (AP) — Two southwestern Idaho irrigation districts have challenged federal licensing of two private power-generating projects on the Boise River, claiming they threaten their own river water rights.

Attorneys for the Settlers' and Pioneer irrigation districts also raised the specter of exporting precious state resources in their bid to overturn, or get a piece of, hydro projects operated by five other districts making up the Boise River Board of Control.

At issue is the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission's approval of the Board of Control's hydro-generating plant at Lucky Peck Dam and its proposed facility upstream at Arrowrock Dam.

The opposing districts contended the board's 50-year contract to sell power from the Lucky Peck plant to the city of Seattle is invalid. Their attorneys argued that transferring the power generated by that plant out of state is not in the public interest and that no public hearings were held on the power-sale plan.

Idaho tax protesters bite the dust

LEWISTON (AP) — Idaho, which once had more than its share of tax protesters, no longer has that distinction, says the district director of the Internal Revenue Service.

Douglas Holm said Wednesday Idaho identified 1,000 tax protesters in 1985, far more than the national average. But thanks in part to vigorous enforcement by the IRS, the number has shrunk to no more than about 100, "and most of them don't owe any tax," he said.

Holm said part of the reason for the dramatic reduction in the number of tax protesters is the effectiveness of IRS enforcement, which has been vigorous.

"The courts have been very tough" and more than 50 percent of the protest leaders have been jailed, he said.

Board denies parole to arsonist

BOISE (AP) — A former Boise day care center operator convicted on seven counts of arson four years ago has been denied parole by the state Commission on Pardons and Parole.

Joyce Riblett, 35, was ordered to continue serving the 20-year indeterminate prison term she was given in 1985.

Commission Executive Director Olivia Cravens West said the panel remained concerned about Riblett's volatile history and the severity of her crimes.

Her next parole hearing was set for April 1991.

Riblett, serving her sentence at the state prison in Orofino, has had a history of mental illness.

Sen. Herb Carlson leaves hospital

BOISE (AP) — State Sen. Herb Carlson, R-Eagle, has been released from a Boise hospital after treatment for a heart attack.

Carlson, 70, was recuperating on Thursday following his release from St. Alphonsus Regional Medical Center, where he spent six days after complaining of chest pains on April 19 while he was working on his ranch.

Tree spiking prompts widespread ire

LEWISTON (AP) — U.S. Sen. James McClure and officials of the Sierra Club, Idaho Environmental Council and Idaho Wildlife Council have joined in condemning those responsible for tree-spiking on the Clearwater National Forest.

An Idaho Environmental Council leader said Wednesday conservation groups can be expected to contribute to a reward fund to help find the tree spikers.

"I simply don't understand people who are willing to threaten the life of another human being in order to get their way on public land management decisions," McClure said. "This latest incident of tree spiking just shows how deranged these people are and how arrogant they are in trying to push their own point of view."

Expert: Public opinion dooms pesticides

BLACKFOOT (AP) — Americans' concern about pesticides will result in the demise of many chemicals within 20 years, and higher food prices, Idaho's leading entomologist predicts.

The disappearance of organophosphates such as aldicarb will not be due to any danger they may pose to public health, but to the public's obsession with health, said Larry Sandvol, superintendent of the University of Idaho Research and Extension Center at Aberdeen.

"We're becoming a nation of almost neurotics when it comes to health," Sandvol said.

The leak of a faulty Environmental Protection Agency report to the press on aldicarb's

danger to children who eat potatoes or humans treated with the chemical has effectively killed the product, he told a Blackfoot service club.

Instead of using for his computer model the aldicarb residue level presently allowable, but not necessarily of consumption, Sandvol said, the EPA researcher used the maximum tolerance level of the chemical legally allowed in a plant by the EPA after application.

"In other words, his model showed that if all of the potatoes in the United States treated with aldicarb came to the table at the same time containing the maximum amount of the chemical, and if all of the school

children in the country ate the maximum amount raw, they might get sick. But that's a situation that's never going to happen," he said.

Sandvol said aldicarb is used on less than 50 percent of the nation's potatoes. By the time they're cooked, literally no trace of the chemical can be found, he said.

"But you can try and explain it all you want, and it won't do any good. Once it came out on national TV the damage was done. Aldicarb is dead in the water," he said.

Instead of educating Americans on the safety of pesticides on food, efforts should be directed at the price they will pay for fruits and vegetables when the chemicals are outlawed.

Chemicals, he said, have taken the place of huge amounts of human labor on American farms.

"Without them, we're going to see potato farms of 300 to 400 acres going back to 100 acres, and the farmer is going to charge more per sack for his crop."

Up to 90 percent of the chemicals are used not to increase production but to improve the cosmetic appearance of foods, Sandvol said.

"Without aldicarb, the potatoes will have brown holes through them made by the wireworms. If people would eat those potatoes anyway, or if they'd just take the worm out of a can of peas and eat them anyway instead of suing the company, we wouldn't need to use the chemicals."

OPEC responsible for gas price hike, says panel

POCATELLO (AP) — An Idaho Petroleum Council official says a cutback in production by the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries, not the Exxon oil spill in Alaska's Prince William Sound, is primarily responsible for gasoline prices soaring as much as 25 cents a gallon.

Prices in eastern Idaho on regular and unleaded gasoline were running 92.9 cents a gallon, but had jumped to \$1.179 by this week, a 26 percent increase.

Dave Mabe, executive director of

the council, said it has taken months for the full impact of an OPEC agreement last fall to hit motorists where it hurts — in their fuel tanks.

OPEC elected to put a cap on production and boosted prices.

The Exxon Valdez tanker spill, "a major tragedy that got a lot of press," has little to do with the big boost in Idaho's gas prices, he said.

Crude oil prices have risen from \$12.75 a barrel at the end of November to more than \$20 at the end of March, Mabe pointed out, stressing his organization does not

track retail gas prices.

The gasoline price increases have been the most dramatic since OPEC imposed oil embargos in the 1970s. Last Thursday, the benchmark price of a barrel of U.S. crude exploded by a record \$2.04 a barrel to finish at \$24.65 on the New York Mercantile Exchange.

That steep jump to the highest

level in three years was blamed on worries caused by a platform explosion on a North Sea oil rig that disrupted production of nearly 500,000 barrels of oil, or about 25 percent of the area's oil output.

About half the oil consumed in the U.S. is imported while the rest is produced domestically.

County group blames Gilbert for demise of important bills

POCATELLO (AP) — Several important bills for the Idaho Association of Counties died in the Legislature this year, and county officials blame Boise Sen. Rachel Gilbert, Republican chairman of the Local Government Committee.

Although association staff did see 29 of IAC's 41 proposed bills and resolutions pass, every one of the group's major proposals died in committee.

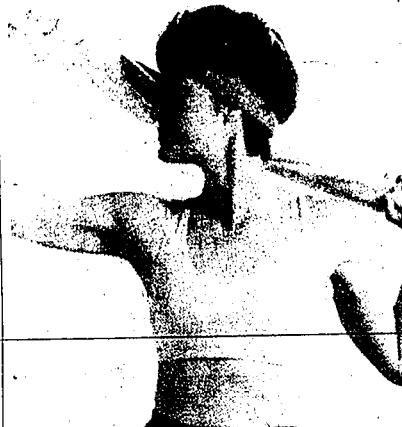
"We just couldn't get enough support on the major issues," Deputy Director Tony Pinelli said. A number of the 80 elected officials meeting in Pocatello this week said unless Ms. Gilbert is removed from the committee chair, the counties again will suffer from a lack of funds next year.

One important measure the IAC said Ms. Gilbert "bottlenecked" would have increased the counties levying authority. Local governments can raise budgets by 5 percent each year, but nine counties, including Bannock, have bumped into their statutory limit on levies for operations.

"We can't even continue to maintain an operation budget," Bannock County Commissioner Tom Katsilometes said. "With the 5 percent allowance, we weren't even keeping up with inflation. Without it, we're even further behind the eight ball," he added.

Sen. Gilbert did not even allow HB 371 to be read in her committee, county officials said.

The Times-News continues emphasis on local events

You can please some of the people some of the time, but not all of the people all of the time, no matter what the intent.

We had another example of that great lesson in human relations these past two weeks in our handling of articles and stories about young people and their achievements, specifically the young men and women who have been selected for Girls State and Boys State.

As a newspaper that serves the entire Magic Valley, The Times-News has long had a commitment to publishing short articles about such awards. The young people deserve that and we think the information is newsworthy for others too.

But photos have long been more difficult to handle. Uneven picture quality has often led to poor reproduction, and that has meant unhappy people, both the subjects of the photos and their parents. Also, with newspaper space at a premium, we just have not had the room to run them all.

But where to draw the line, and when? Clearly, we want to run as many as we can, but just as clearly, we can't run them all. How do you set a standard without some people saying we were being inconsistent? By what rationale would we accept pictures

of some young people, but not of others? This is what is known as a classic no-win situation, and I was reminded none-too-gently this week fielding the angry phone calls and a couple of letters from ladies whose daughters pictures hadn't run along with the news item naming Twin Falls Girls State delegates.

Some said we were favoring smaller towns in the valley at the expense of Twin Falls, because we had previously published photographs of Girls State delegates from a neighboring town.

Others said they had paid for the pictures and had a right to have them in the paper. Still others wanted to know why we had plenty of space for all the bad news, but couldn't carry every local picture submitted.

It is a common impression that, in small towns like Twin Falls, pettiness and favoritism dominate many social decisions. But that isn't the case with news items of this sort.

Our first job is to get news into the paper and to do that as efficiently as possible. News space is a limited commodity on any given day and there is little way to make a valid comparison from one to the next.

The "you did this for them" argument also has a hidden implication, that we are in some sort of conspiracy to slight this group or that; this town or that; this person or that.

Even if it could be done, the news business is far too complex and changing from day-to-day to allow for such manipulation.

Like most other businesses, for the most part, we're just trying to get as much as we can get done each day within the limits of the space, people and hours we have available.

Over the years, our so-called community news reporting has changed. Today, we run dozens of news items each week, including calendars, sports events, meetings, clubs, achievements in business, weddings and anniversaries, as well as personal accomplishments.

So here it is, folks, the definitive (for now at least) policy on youth news.

News items. We will continue to publish short news stories of young peoples' achievements. Some of these will appear in

our weekly Spotlight column, and others as separate news stories in the appropriate news section.

We'll make judgments on where to publish them as fairly as we can, and run them as close to the time they are submitted, space permitting.

The content of such items will necessarily vary, but we would expect most would deal with school or civic honors, organizations and, when appropriate, sports.

We would prefer that all items come in typed. They can be mailed to The Times-News at Box 548, Twin Falls, Idaho 83301, or brought to our office at 132 W. 3rd St. It's a good idea to include a name and phone number of the person submitting the item so that we can get more information if we need to. Sorry, but we can't take them over the phone.

Photos. We will consider photos when submitted with accompanying news stories, but we reserve the right to limit their use for space reasons or when, in our view, they will not reproduce. Fullframe, black and white pictures with sharp contrasts work best.

We also may resize any photo to fit available space. This means many will run in a half-column width.

We will not discriminate in news or photo use on the basis of location. A young person from Hansen ought to have just as much opportunity to be recognized for an accomplishment as someone from Twin Falls.

The argument of "you ran their picture, why not ours?" will be answered as reasonably as possible, but without guarantees. Since news space varies day-to-day, we will not get into debates over which photo ran larger, or which news items got better "play."

Basically, news decisions are made on a day-to-day basis. With photos, we'll try to publish the ones we can, in sizes which fit the space, and on the basis of whether they'll reproduce or not.

The Times-News remains a community newspaper, devoted to comprehensive and quality reporting of the people and events of this valley. In a very real sense, we are your newspaper. As such, we welcome your news, comments and yes, photos.

The poor suffer unfairly when we ration medical treatment

The American health-care system, the experts say, is going bust at a rapid rate. Efforts to contain our growing \$500 billion-plus tab through economic juggling and shifts to prepaid medical plans have failed.

The dilemma of how to pay for health care is forcing some public officials to think the unthinkable. Alameda County in Northern California and the state of Oregon recently announced plans to institute explicit rationing policies for health care.

But, before you applaud the realism, consider that these plans would ration access to health care only for the poor.

The medically indigent of Alameda County and those eligible for Medicaid in Oregon will be required by law to forgo lifesaving medical care. One generation's war on poverty is becoming another's war against the poor.

Officials in both Oregon and Alameda County note that the poor have always gotten less access to health care than the rich. That is true.

But our society's failure to meet the health-care needs of the poor hardly justifies a public policy that asks the poor to bear the burden of rationing as a matter of law.

Who concocted this blatantly unethical scheme? Incredibly, the inspiration for both the California and Oregon plans for pocketbook

triage comes in part from those in my line of work — medical ethicists.

A California bioethics consulting company is being paid by Alameda County and Oregon state officials to provide moral rationales for dropping the poor out of the health-care lifeboat. The consultants appear to be approaching their task with gusto.

"You have to draw the line somewhere," one moralist-for-hire said in a recent newspaper article about Alameda County's decision to begin rationing for the poor. "We'll provide all services to a diminishing segment of the population, and literally we'll throw the rest of the people overboard. We're thinning the soup and lengthening the line," he explained in language more appropriate to Scrooge than Jesus, Immanuel Kant, John Stuart Mill or Reinhold Niebuhr.

No hint is given of the theoretical position that would justify aiming all rationing efforts at the poor. But it is hard to think of a moral or religious ethic that holds that when a nation cannot pay its doctor bills, it is the poor and only the poor who should be denied the right to see a doctor.

It is hard to understand how any ethicist could become involved in a scheme so blatantly unfair as that of rationing necessary health care only for the poor. What is worse is that the same ethicists and the officials taking their advice, who are enthusiastically directing triage at the California and Oregon health-care lifeboats, are not asking whether it is really necessary in 1989 to institute the rationing of necessary medical care for anyone.

Before saying goodbye to the indigent, why aren't public officials

in Oregon and California thinking about reforming a malpractice system that adds tens of millions of dollars to state-financed health-care costs each year?

Before saying no to a bone marrow transplant for a 3-year-old whose mother is an oncologist, couldn't county and state legislators insist that every licensed hospital and physician be required by law to provide a fixed percentage of care for those who cannot pay?

Before creating laws that would send some of the poor to a premature demise, county and state officials ought to require private health insurers to charge subscribers an additional premium that could be used to supplement the pitifully small budgets of Medicaid and public hospitals. And would it not make some sense to insist on a luxury tax, which could be used to help meet the crucial health-care needs of the poor, from the rich who

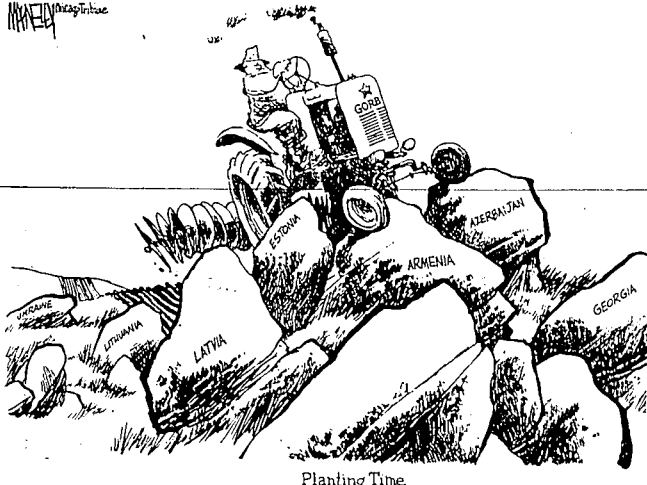
avail themselves of psychotherapy, vitamins, cosmetic surgery, diet clinics and stress-management seminars?

It is wrong to make the poor and only the poor bear the burden of rationing.

It is unethical to institute rationing of necessary health services for any group of Americans unless we have made every effort to be as efficient and as frugal as we can be in spending our health-care dollars.

At a time when some can indulge their wants by buying a face-lift, it seems extraordinarily hard for ethicists or legislators to argue convincingly that they have no other option but to condemn the poor to die for want of money.

Take care in printing letters

My comments are the result of people who, every once in awhile, have sent letters to The Times-News and managed to have them selected for publication; however, instead of submitting their letters under their real name, they choose to use a pseudonym. Rights march proved inspiring

Last Friday evening our family boarded a chartered bus in Jerome along with about 14 other people from the Wood River Valley and 30 folks from Boise to ride 12 hours. Our destination was the Coeur d'Alene Human Rights march.

We'd been making posters all week and were very excited about joining other marchers for the seven-mile walk to the town of Hayden.

When we arrived, we were met by a "peacekeeper," one of the organizers of the walk, who told us our children would have to go to child care.

Tensions were high, the townspeople were antsy. Police and the FBI were everywhere, and they didn't want children to be present should there be a confrontation with the "skinheads" and other Neo-Nazis who were in Hayden for Hitler's birthday celebration.

My children wanted to march. Nathan, 12, said, "We didn't ride the bus all night to go to child care." Nicholas, 9, agreed. We decided we would all stick together and take turns carrying two-year-old Natalie.

We joined the rally at 10 a.m. There were masses of people, young and old, all sizes, shapes and colors, carrying signs and raising their voices together in defense of the diversity of mankind.

There were also masses of people from the media. Altogether our family was interviewed six times by various radio, TV and news reporters.

We walked the seven miles under skies that couldn't decide whether to rain or shine. The line was impressive, winding along a bikepath, with a busy highway on one side and a lush forest with yellow wild flowers on the other.

One person counting heads counted over a thousand walkers, but there was an equal number of people cheering from the sidelines and from their cars.

At the end of the walk, we all gathered in a field of Kentucky bluegrass surrounded by a forest. Native American Indians were drumming.

The Guardian Angels were there, looking very young and serious in their red berets and combat garb. There were African Americans with stories about cross-burnings and threats from the KKK.

With sun, rain and hail appearing from different parts of the sky, we joined together, saying "Racism must stop! Equality for all!"

Above us a hawk soared in lazy circles. We talked with several older folks who said they had taken their children to Washington, D.C., to march against the Vietnam war and to the South to march for civil rights. They all stated that their children are still activists.

That gave me hope. That my children will never be content to let inequality go unchecked. That my children will be active in this country of ours where we must never take our civil and human rights for granted. SYLVIA GREEN Halley

Panel limits Wright's early personal appeal

WASHINGTON (AP) — The chairman of the House ethics committee said Thursday that House Speaker Jim Wright probably will not be allowed to make a personal appeal to the panel until he appears in his own defense at a disciplinary hearing expected to come next month.

Asked whether Wright's request to appear earlier had been settled, Rep. Julian Dixon, D-Calif., said: "No, there has not been an agreement reached."

Dixon said the disciplinary hearing would be open to the public, but noted that committee rules bar television coverage of that stage of the panel's work.

He also said the panel had moved to stand behind subpoenas issued for participants in a Texas gas deal that yielded huge profits for Wright, and he threatened contempt of Congress action if the witnesses fail to appear.

Dixon showed annoyance that he and Rep. John T. Myers of Indiana, the panel's senior Republican, were "stood up" when they went to interview the witnesses early this week in San Antonio, Texas.

Lawmakers oppose judicial pay raises

WASHINGTON (AP) — A bill to bar pay raises for senior federal judges who do no judicial work drew support Thursday from Democrats and Republicans in Congress who said voters are complaining.

At a House courts subcommittee hearing, U.S. Circuit Judge Frank Coffin testified that federal judges were still suffering from "the trauma of Black Tuesday Feb. 7" when a proposed 51 pay raise for them was defeated in Congress.

But Rep. Howard Coble, R-N.C., replied, "Many voters in my district do not regard it as Black Tuesday, and I'm one of them."

The Judicial Conference representing all federal judges has since formally requested a 30 percent pay raise for federal judges.

Coffin and two other leading federal judges told the subcommittee it would be unfair to deprive non-working senior judges of pay raises by, as Coffin put it, "suddenly changing the rules after a lifetime."

Bush continues drug harangue

MIAMI (AP) — Using the bully pulpit of the White House, President Bush urged parents and stockholders Thursday to demand that American companies "act responsibly" to prevent U.S. chemicals from being used to produce cocaine.

"No chemicals, no cocaine," Bush told an international drug enforcement conference attended by delegates from 30 nations.

Cocaine producers use ether, acetone, hydrochloric acid, a chemical known as MEK and other products to refine their drug from coca leaves.

"Few Americans are aware that illegally diverted barrels of dangerous chemicals — clearly

marked with U.S. corporate logos — are routinely sent in the jungles of Colombia," Bush said.

Although Bush referred in his speech to illegal diversions of chemicals, Justice Department spokesman David Runkel said U.S. companies currently are free to sell all their products to other countries.

As a result of last year's new drug law, however, federal regulations are being drafted that would require the companies to tell the Drug Enforcement Agency of the ultimate destination and use of export shipments of seven products that could be used in making cocaine, Runkel said. DEA would have 15 days to review the paperwork and

could stop shipments, he said. Runkel said chemical companies have filed a stack of objections four inches high to the rules, but that they were expected to be in place by May 15 anyway.

In Washington, the Chemical Manufacturers Association issued a statement saying the industry "is already at the front lines" in the war against drugs.

The association, which is made up of companies that manufacture industrial chemicals, said the industry supported passage of last year's anti-drug law. Even before the law was passed, the group said, the industry was already working with law enforcement officials.

Panel wants S&L owners to assume risk

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House Banking Committee moved Thursday to make savings and loan owners put nearly \$13 billion of their own money at risk "to protect taxpayers from future fiascos" as the price for a \$30 billion federal bailout.

The 51-member panel began acting on a Bush administration-endorsed effort that would make operators of the nation's 2,950 thrift institutions put up 50 percent more capital than a bill approved by the Senate last week.

"Without real capital — hard capital — the taxpayers have no protection," said the House Banking Committee chairman, Rep. Henry Gonzalez, D-Texas, as he opened

debate on a proposal to create a capital requirement of \$2.25 for each \$100 of an institution's loans.

Both President Bush and Treasury Secretary Nicholas Brady were calling members Thursday to urge their support for the toughened capital requirement.

"This is extraordinary," said Ken Gunther of the Independent Bankers Association, which with other bank trade organizations wants tougher capital requirements imposed on S&Ls, their biggest competitor. "I've never seen a presidential lobby on a banking bill reach into the committee level like this before."

The administration had praised the Senate's action.

Study finds 1 in five women receive help

WASHINGTON (AP) — More than one in five American women receive assistance from anti-poverty programs as many try to raise families on their own or cope with limited retirement benefits, the Census Bureau reported Thursday.

The bureau's study found fewer than one male in six, on the other hand, has received public assistance.

Women struggling to raise children without a husband present, and the preponderance of women in the older age groups, account for their greater need for benefits, said John M. McNeil of the bureau's Housing and Household Economic Statistics Division.

When marriages end in separation or divorce, women are more likely to have custody of the children, and those families more often fall into poverty status, McNeil said in a telephone interview.

In addition, he said, the number of single women raising families of their own is

increasing.


Overall, families headed by women with no husband present made up 6.9 percent of all households last year, up from 4.5 percent in 1970, according to other Census Bureau reports. As of 1987, the bureau said, 34.3 percent of families with a female householder fell below the poverty level, compared with 12.5 percent of those with a male householder with no wife and only 6 percent for married couples.

The report said 67.1 percent of people living in a female-headed household with no husband present throughout the study period received anti-poverty benefits.

The nation's older population is also predominantly female — with women living longer than men — and older women have a higher poverty rate than do males, McNeil added.

He said this may be because men tend to have better retirement benefits since they more likely held paying jobs than did their wives in years past.

Vietnam returns 21 sets of remains

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) — Vietnam on Thursday returned 21 sets of remains believed to be those of Americans killed in the Vietnam War, and U.S. sources said they expected talks soon on further repatriations of the dead.

Vietnam's Communist Party leader Nguyen Van Linh said the two countries were "cooperating fruitfully" to solve humanitarian issues arising from the long, bloody conflict.

A dispatch from the official Vietnam News Agency, monitored in Bangkok, said the remains were turned over to a representative of the Hawaii-based U.S. Joint Casualty Resolution Center, the military unit tasked with resolving the fates of more than 2,300 MIAs from the Indochina conflict.

According to a U.S. spokesman, a team from the center was to have picked up the remains in a ceremony at Hanoi airport, then take them to army laboratories in Honolulu for analysis.

West-Bank clashes kill 3, wound 74

USARIN, Occupied West Bank (AP) — Israeli soldiers shot and killed three Palestinians and wounded 74 others in widespread clashes Thursday in the occupied West Bank and Gaza Strip, Arab reports and hospital officials said.

The army reported only eight woundings and accused Palestinians of inflating the figure to gain sympathy.

The gunshot wounds reported by Palestinian hospitals brought to more than 225 the number reported injured in clashes with soldiers this week. The army has confirmed only 22.

In the West Bank, more than 100 teen-agers from Jewish settlements linked near the Palestinian village of Beit, where an Israeli soldier was killed a year ago, to symbolize their demand that the occupied lands be part of Israel.

Furor erupts over moving Lenin body

MOSCOW (AP) — A stage director has caused a furor reaching all the way to the Communist Party Central Committee by suggesting on live TV that Vladimir I. Lenin's body be removed from the mausoleum on Red Square and buried.

Lenin's mausoleum at the Kremlin Wall is visited by millions of Soviets every year, reflecting the reverence in which the Soviet founder still is held.

Two candidate members of the party's policy-making Central Committee, speaking at a meeting Tuesday, criticized the suggestion by Mark Zakharov, director of Moscow's Leninsky Komsomol Theater.

More contaminated baby foods found

Los Angeles Times

LONDON — Scores of mothers throughout much of the British Isles reported new incidents Thursday of baby food contaminated with glass and needles, as police stepped up their search for extortionists reportedly demanding a \$1.7 million to end the tampering.

Three infants were hospitalized after eating tainted food, but all were released after doctors determined that the children had not been harmed.

By Thursday evening there were reports of as many as 100 tampering incidents affecting baby foods manufactured by H.J. Heinz Co. Ltd., the British subsidiary of the American company, and Britain's Cow & Gate Ltd. Included were more than a dozen cases in Scotland, five in Northern Ireland, and two in the independent Republic of Ireland.

Cosmonauts land hard; space station unmanned

MOSCOW (AP) — The Soviet Union ended an era in its manned space program Thursday when three cosmonauts returned to Earth, leaving the Mir space station empty for the first time in more than two years.

A Soyuz TM-7 capsule carrying Alexander Volkov, Sergei Krikalev and Valery Polyakov landed about 90 miles northeast of Dzhezkazgan in Soviet Central Asia, Tass said.

The suspension of the Mir mission, the showpiece of the Soviet space program, comes one day before the United States plans to launch its Atlantis space shuttle with a crew of five.

Mir, designed for permanent occupancy, will remain empty until another rocket launch scheduled in August. Officials said the respite will save money at a time when the Soviet Union is struggling with a \$160 billion deficit.

Big haul of hashish

VENICE, Italy (AP) — Police seized 10 tons of pure hashish in two containers that were shipped to this Italian port city from Pakistan, officials said Thursday.

Police discovered the drugs after plant fibers were found sticking from a false bottom in one of the containers.

Students clash with riot police in Korea

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — About 1,000 striking workers and students clashed with riot police in Seoul and seven other cities Thursday, and dissidents planned weekend demonstrations in defiance of a government ban.

About 10,000 striking workers from 12 plants fought police with rocks and firebombs in the southeastern industrial city of Changwon, demanding the release of jailed strike leaders.

In the nearby port of Masan, about 3,000 workers also clashed with police, demanding pay increases and the "release of strike leaders. Protesters set fire to a governing office and threw rocks at several police posts.

About 1,000 students in the southern city of Kwangju clashed with police after a campus rally at which they burned effigies of President Bush and President Roh Tae-woo.

Police officials said two riot troopers had been seriously injured in Changwon, but they had no further details. It was not known immediately if there were any workers injured or arrested.

In Seoul, an estimated 4,500 students hurling rocks and firebombs battled police at three universities in support of striking workers and scheduled border talks between students of South and North Korea.

About 10,000 students at the state-run Seoul Na-

tional University boycotted classes and held an anti-government campus rally, denouncing alleged government suppression of labor movement.

"Down with Roh Tae-woo," students shouted, shouting clenched fists into the sky.

After the student rally, about 3,000 tried to march into the streets, hurling rocks and firebombs. Police fired tear gas to drive them back.

No injuries or arrests were reported.

Campus clashes were also reported in Anyang, Chunchon, Changju and Taegu. Student leaders said they will march to the border village of Panmunjom Friday.

Japan's ruling party rushes budget through

TOKYO (AP) — Japan's governing party broke with tradition, defied an opposition boycott and rushed the budget through a parliamentary committee Thursday, indicating Prime Minister Noboru Takeshita will leave office soon.

Also on Thursday, an advisory board recommended an overhaul of political fund-raising regulations to avoid the type of conflict of interest and influence-peddling charges that destroyed Takeshita's career.

A separate panel urged all lawmakers be banned from stock trading, make public disclosures of their assets and stop traditional gifts of money at funerals and weddings.

Under intense political pressure, Takeshita took responsibility Tuesday for a bribery and influence-peddling scandal and said he will resign after final passage of the budget.

That has prompted the governing Liberal Democrats to rush legislation through Parliament over an opposition boycott and despite Japan's traditional emphasis on consensus.

The party-dominated Budget Committee of the lower house rammed through approval of the budget in one minute Thursday, and party leaders are expected to push the issue through the full lower house on Friday.

That means Takeshita apparently will step down in May. The budget automatically goes into effect within

30 days of lower house approval if not rejected by the upper house. The governing Liberal Democrats have a majority in both houses.

Opposition party leaders denounced the rushed committee vote as an act of desperation.

"This outrage treads parliamentary democracy under foot and cannot be forgiven," said lawmaker Shun Oda of the Socialist Party, the leading opposition party.

The budget action "is the final act of political hari-kari for Takeshita," said political analyst and author Asao Yamaguchi. "He is offering himself as a sacrifice, but this will just increase the people's distrust of the Liberal Democrats."

The opposition has boycotted budget debate, demanding new parliamentary elections and a broad investigation of the scandal surrounding the purchase by business and political leaders of unlisted shares in a subsidiary of the Recruit Co.

Today is last filing day for school board

In the Twin Falls district, only one newcomer and two of the three incumbents up for re-election had returned their petitions by Thursday. Steve Tolman, Zone 4, and Ornette Sinclair, Zone 3, have filed. Sinclair is being challenged by Dr. Lyn Langford, a veterinarian. Lenore McNeas, Zone 1, has said she will run for re-election and has picked up a petition, but she has not yet filed it. Petitions are available at the district's administrative offices.

KBSU ready to broadcast signal to Magic Valley

TWIN FALLS — With a new 2,000-watt transmitter in place, KBSU is poised and ready to send radio signals into the Magic Valley. The Boise State University radio station, a member of the National Public Radio Network, will test its transmitter for about the next 10 days, said Jim Paluzzi, KBSU general manager. Listeners should be able to pick up KBSU's classical, jazz and rock music programming as well as public radio news and information shows nearly 24 hours a day during the testing period at 91.7 on the FM dial. After the testing is over, KBSU will broadcast at 91.7 FM from 5 a.m. until 2 a.m. weekdays and round the clock on weekends. Paluzzi said the station is interested in hearing about reception quality. Reception reports can be sent to: KBSU, 1310 University Drive, Boise, Idaho 83725. Every listener who sends a report will receive a complimentary program guide, Paluzzi said. KBSU becomes the second public radio station broadcasting into the valley, joining KRIC, which is broadcast from Ricks College at 98.3 FM.

Farming activity picks up steam after wet March

TWIN FALLS — Farming and ranching activity in Idaho is gaining ground after a wet March delayed field work and planting. Small-grain planting is more than 50 percent complete, except in the north where seeding is just getting under way. Alfalfa hay fields appear to be in good condition, according to the Idaho Agricultural Statistics Service. Winter wheat is rated in mostly fair to good condition. Snow mold was reported in the north and east. Calving and lambing are all but complete, and ranchers are moving their herds to spring and summer ranges. Most livestock are rated in good condition. Adequate supplies of hay and roughage are available to most operators.

Bureau of Land Management reopens all access roads

TWIN FALLS — All access roads temporarily closed this spring by the Bureau of Land Management have been reopened, the BLM announced. The roads have dried up considerably in recent weeks, easing driving conditions on the newly graded road system, Area Manager Ted Milesnick said. The district's road crew will grade and gravel roads the next couple of weeks, he said.

4-H horsemanship clinic is moved to CSI arena

TWIN FALLS — A free horsemanship clinic for 4-H Club members, originally planned to be held at Prescott's arena in Murtaugh, will be at the College of Southern Idaho's arena instead. The all-day event starts at 9 a.m. Saturday. It's sponsored by the American Junior Quarter Horse Association.

Health board chairman says state role needed in INEL

TWIN FALLS — A stronger state role in oversight of operations at Idaho National Engineering Laboratory is important, says the newly re-elected chairman of the state Board of Health and Welfare. David Mead, a Twin Falls banker, was re-elected during a recent meeting in Idaho Falls. He said a board tour of INEL impressed him with the caliber of personnel and quality of the work at the eastern Idaho site. "But we could see just how important it will be for the state to develop a stronger role in waste management and cleanup," he said.

Gooding County seeks judgment on cable tax

GOODING — Gooding County commissioners, who question the legality of dramatically boosting cable company taxes, are trying to prevent the state from doing just that. The commissioners have instructed Prosecuting Attorney Lynn Nelson to seek a 5th District Court restraining order to prevent the Idaho Tax Commission from changing King Videocable's assessment, which state officials have vowed to do. The county will also ask the court to make a declaratory judgment to resolve whether a state order in March to increase

the company's appraisal from \$110,000 to \$4 million is legal, said County Commissioner Bob Muffley. Nelson refused to comment and would not say when he intended to file the action. County commissioners, who contend the order is not legal, voted Wednesday to take the issue to court. "We have to do what we think is best for the county," Muffley said. "We still have some real basic problems with what they're trying to do." "If we were to comply as they say right now we would be in violation of several code sections," said County Clerk John Myers. Myers said among other things, the county

cannot change assessments later than the first Monday in December in the same year the taxes are due. If the county reassesses King Videocable and it is later determined that the new assessment is illegal, the county would then have to return the excess to the company. Just such a situation occurred in 1986 when the Union Pacific Railroad was excessively taxed for several years, Myers said. Gooding was court-ordered to give back to the railroad some tens of thousands of dollars over a three-year period, he said. "It was an expensive and time-consuming process," Myers said. "We don't want to

have to do it again unless it can be proven to be necessary." Last week, Tax Commission officials met with the Gooding County commissioners and tried to persuade them to comply with the order. "We had differences going in and we basically had the same differences going out," Muffley said. County commissioners failed to act on the state order within a 23-day appeal period. The Tax Commission sooner or later will see to it that county assessment rolls are changed and new bills are sent to cable companies, Larry Looney, Tax Commission chairman, has previously said.

Hearing is Monday for Hawkins case

TWIN FALLS — Should bean proceeds be used to pay attorney's fees? That is the next question to be resolved in the 4-month-old bankruptcy suit of Hawkins Co. Ltd., the Filer bean warehouse that closed in November. At 9:30 Monday morning, U.S. Bankruptcy Judge Alfred Hagan will hear arguments in Boise for and against paying Hawkins' attorneys — Nelson, Rosholt, Robertson, Tulman & Tucker of Twin Falls — about \$40,000 in "interim fees." The hearing "could lead to some fireworks," said Dick Greenwood, a Twin Falls lawyer representing some of the growers. "It appears they are asking to get paid out of the bean money and naturally some objections have been raised." "It's too soon to be dipping into the pot because we don't know whose beans they are yet," Greenwood said. A key issue is whether beans stored in the warehouse belong to the company — in which case sale proceeds can be used to pay lawyers and creditors — or belong to the farmers who stored them there. Loyd Walker, another Twin Falls lawyer representing growers, said he will soon be ready to ask the court to rule that the bean inventory belongs to the growers and should not be part of the bankruptcy pot. Hawkins' warehouse license was suspended by the state in November after a year-end audit revealed inventory shortages. The company's directors filed for bankruptcy

Heyburn council grants permit for veterinarian

HEYBURN — The city will soon have a veterinary clinic. The City Council Wednesday voted Wednesday to issue a special use permit to veterinarian Bill Fulcher for a clinic at 750 21st St. The location is not zoned for commercial, but the council decided to allow the use with certain restrictions. Fulcher is buying the property, which has a barn and corrals on it, and a residence. He plans to live in the house. Some council members were concerned about possible odor and noise problems. Fulcher said he would take steps to keep problems to a minimum, including: • Keeping dogs or small animals inside. • Immediately removing from the property animals that die. • Generally having no more than five or six large animals on the property at a time. • Keeping herds of calves in for vaccinations or dehorning for a few hours at the most. Zoning Administrator Paul Aston told the council residents within 300 feet of the prop-

erty were notified of the proposal by mail and did not return objections. City Attorney Steve Tufts will draw up the application with the conditions for Fulcher to sign Monday. Council members will stop by the office to look at the agreement before the signing. In other zoning matters, Couch Equipment Co. will soon ask to have a piece of property near the Interstate 84 and old Highway 30 interchange rezoned, Aston told the council. Investors have shown an interest in using the land to build a truck stop, but it is zoned residential. Aston said the property has also been classified as a subdivision with dedicated roadways, although none are developed. The city will have to vacate the roadways before it can be rezoned because the property has been subdivided. The county may have to be involved in the decision because the property is in the buffer zone outside Heyburn limits. • In other matters: • Councilwoman Bessie Hurless will check into establishing a zoning board for the city. The absence of one "takes away one step of appeal to citizens," said Aston, who recom-

Babcock testifies bank thought farm was producing mushrooms

HAILEY — Idaho First National Bank assumed a mushroom farm project was producing mushrooms in 1985 and that it was able to make loan repayments, bank manager Bill Babcock testified in court Thursday. Babcock was called to the stand by Ed McCabe, attorney for one of the originators of the farm. The testimony conflicted with earlier testimony by Thomas Walker Jr., co-originator of the project, that he had sent a letter to the bank stating the farm was behind schedule, not producing mushrooms, and asking the bank to delay the first repayment date and relieve the obligation that the project keep \$750,000 in working capital. Mushroom production became a critical issue in Thursday's testimony. According to business projections, everyone involved understood that loan repayments would hinge on the farm's

ability to sell its gourmet mushrooms.

McCabe, attorney for Robert Erkins, used almost 30 exhibits in attempts to show the bank knew the project was behind schedule in early 1985 due to a hard winter and wasn't selling as had been projected, and yet refused to change requirements on the original loan package, thus making repayment impossible. Idaho First National Bank, recently renamed West One Bank, foreclosed on a loan to the project in the fall of 1986, claiming the farm did not keep the working capital, as required. They

Noh: Community help needed for education reforms

TWIN FALLS — Education reforms won't occur without more citizen involvement, a Magic Valley senator says — especially reforms opposed by school administrators and teacher unions. Frustrated by lack of public support on educational issues, Sen. Laird Noh, R-Kimberly, has begun an effort to get more people involved. "I guess I really came today to ask for your help," Noh told the Twin Falls Rotary

Club Wednesday. He said he would like to see a broad-based group of citizens organize to monitor the State Board of Education, local school boards and other education decision makers. "I'm concerned that it's going to be a difficult task in Idaho to keep providing a public school system that produces students that can compete nationally and internationally," Noh told the Rotarians. What's needed is organization, Noh said in a telephone interview Thursday. He said people talk about needed changes but don't

organize themselves so they can make those changes happen. On the other hand, school administrators, teacher colleges, the Idaho Education Association and other interest groups are organized and effective, Noh said. The senator, vice chairman of the Senate's Education Committee, said his effort stems in part from a number of major policy issues that have been in the mill for the last two or three years. He said these issues have been "smoothed" by the various education organiza-

One of the more controversial issues, whether teacher pay should be based on merit, finally got through the Legislature this year, but with a "glitch," Noh said. The Legislature mandated that a certain category of money be spent on a career ladder or a merit pay schedule after using it to raise all teachers' yearly salaries to at least \$16,000. The hang-up, Noh said, is that many districts now say they need to raise everyone's salary if they're going to give lower-paid teachers a pay raise.

sued the farm in March 1987.

Erkins and Walker Jr. countered, claiming the bank forced the farm into default. The farm, called Bliss Valley Farms, shut down but has since reopened.

Babecek testified he made several trips to the farm to check on its progress.

McCabe asked him if he knew the farm was growing mushrooms.

"I was told by their budget they were going to have mushrooms," Babecek said. "I was relying on their information."

"The information I had said there would be mushrooms," he said at another point.

During Babecek's testimony, several inconsistencies emerged from previous testimony.

- Babecek testified that he did not know General Manager Kamal Hyder was going to write a memo critical of the project in May 1985. In earlier testimony, Walker said Hyder had written the memo at Babecek's suggestion. Hyder had a meeting with Babecek and Babecek said he better start covering himself.
- Walker testified that Babecek told jurors Thursday that he had no active role in running the operation and that he didn't like Hyder coming to him with com-

plaints. Walker and Erkins testified that Babecek had an active part in decisions pertaining to the venture.

- Babecek described as "overstated" Walker's and investor Fred Surbaugh's testimony of the social relationship between himself and Walker and the investors. "I played in golf league on Tuesday nights and spent some time with some couples, but that's it," Babecek said. Walker and Surbaugh, one of 12 investors in the project, testified that they had a long-standing social friendship with Babecek, which included frequent dinners and even European vacations.
- Babecek said he didn't recall any conversations with the investors in spring 1985 concerning management of the project. Surbaugh and Donnie McFadden, another investor, testified that Babecek was in close contact with them during this time.
- McCabe also brought out an inter-bank informational memo received by Babecek in 1985 regarding the quality of the bank's loan portfolio. "Did you relate this to the Bliss Valley venture?" McCabe asked.
- "No," answered Babecek.
- "Were you aware of concern by the bank of the quality of the loan portfolio?" asked McCabe.
- "1985 was a tough year for banks

in general," said Babecek. "But I wasn't aware of concern (with our bank)."

Babecek's testimony is expected to last at least until today, and possibly until Tuesday.

In other trial activity, Judge James May denied the bank's request to keep a document and certain line of questioning out of evidence.

In a motion Thursday, Idaho First requested that a bank document stamped with an order to destroy after reading and any questioning of such orders be disallowed as evidence in this case.

Yesterday Walker's attorney, Dick Greener, asked bank loan officer Bruce Summers if he had ever destroyed bank documents or had access to a paper shredder. Summers said he had read such documents but didn't know if the bank had a paper shredder.

Idaho First attorneys said Thursday there was only one such document and that it should be "confidential" because it was meant only as client/attorney correspondence.

McCabe countered and said, "There is a theme in this case that the bank practices deception. All of a sudden they've got one very embarrassing document they want to keep out."

Proposed 'Family Fly-In' has officials in Kootenai County raising concerns

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — A proposed "Family Fly-In" of some 10,000 aviation enthusiasts to Coeur d'Alene has run into some flak from Kootenai County officials.

Plans to mail 195,000 circulars inviting the pilots and families to town July 21-23 have been put on hold, said Gary Rincheart, organizer of the 3rd annual Family Fly-In Exposition.

"We would like to go further," Rincheart said. However, if the county doesn't want this event, we will accept that. If we don't have it resolved by May 5, we will pack our tent."

If Coeur d'Alene is not interested in the celebration, Rincheart said Caldwell, or Kalispell, Missoula and

West Yellowstone in Montana are expected to host it.

The event is being sponsored by the Federal Aviation Administration, which has contributed \$5,000 to the cause. Organizers also are seeking corporate sponsors such as, Apple Computers, Bell Helicopters and Canon in hopes of making the event self-supporting.

County officials expect about 1,000 airplanes and 10,000 aviation buffs to converge on the Coeur d'Alene Air Terminal and Silverwood theme park but said organizers were slow to answer county concerns.

Dave Bruce, Kootenai operations director, said a 22-point list of concerns sent to the Fly-In backers had

gone unanswered. But Rincheart said Wednesday that many of Bruce's questions would have been answered if he had stayed for all of a meeting with organizers.

The county's main concerns center on sanitation issues, fire protection and liability.

"I don't think it is going to take them that long to confirm these things," Commissioner Bob Hanksen said Wednesday. "There is a heck of a lot of liability out there and we are not about to stick our necks out."

Rincheart referred to the economic impact of such an event, pointing to state Department of Commerce estimates that families spend \$149 per day while on vacation.

He said though the IEA opposes merit pay, "the most productive teachers should get more than lazy, unproductive teachers."

He also said debate about upgrading the superintendent certification standards has never been resolved. And a legislative push to get better accounting for extracurricular activities has been stalled.

Another reform Noh would like to see is alternate teaching certification, which would allow outside pro-

fessionals to begin teaching at the secondary level without having first completed the education courses required for regular certification.

Alternate teaching certifications would allow a former Alameda Sugar Co. chemist, for instance, to teach secondary chemistry while picking up education credits in summer school, Noh said.

And it would allow college instructors, who do not need state certification, to move to high school teaching.

The Greater Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce has already begun working toward more citizen involvement, according to chamber director J. Kent Just.

He said the chamber plans to form an education committee next fall.

"It will be helpful and an oversight to the school district," Just said. "But it won't just be a pat-on-the-back committee."

Businesses are interested in quality education, he said, because they want quality employees.

Bancroft officials want flood-plain designation blocked by Congress

BANCROFT (AP) — Fearing land values will fall and economic development flag, local officials are seeking congressional support to block a federal flood plain designation for Bancroft.

"It's going to shut us down," Mayor Randy Kuger said after he and other officials met this week with Sen. Steve Symms. "We might as well pack up and leave."

A preliminary Federal Energy Management Agency study has recommended most of incorporated Bancroft be given a flood-plain designation because historically it has had flooding problems. In addition to other negative impacts, Kuger said that would force potential developers in the town of 500 to buy expensive flood insurance.

The designation would force the town board to adopt an ordinance requiring property owners to build structures above the flood zone. If the ordinance was not adopted, landowners could not obtain flood insurance, construction loans, federal financial assistance or disaster aid.

Leaders were especially concerned the designation will discourage companies from locating or expanding in the southeastern Idaho community.

"If they would ease off on the flood plain and flood insurance requirements, that would help us economically as a town," said Gerald Tolman,

owner of Bancroft Milling & Feed Co. Ruger said unusual weather conditions caused flooding in the past but severe floods are not likely to occur again because culverts and drainage ditches have been installed to divert runoff.

"I'm not saying we are completely flood-prone, but the impact should not be what it was in 1962-63," he said.

Heavy snow and rains, frozen ground and a rapid winter warmup combined to inundate parts of Bancroft with three to four feet of water a quarter century ago.

On another rural issue, Symms told farmers in nearby Soda Springs that he fears attempts will be made to ban foreign investment in American agriculture as the new Congress considers federal farm policy.

While he hopes current policy will generally be extended in the 1990 farm bill, Symms said he expects some senator to propose barring overseas investment and "that could be very devastating."

Although Americans may fear foreign investment, Symms said being bought out by an overseas investor could be the best thing that ever happened to a debt-ridden farmer.

Still, high market prices could shave \$1.1 billion from farm spending, he said.

Simplot Co. breaks off negotiations with PGI

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — The J.R. Simplot Co. has broken off contract negotiations with the Potato Growers of Idaho, who say the contract the processing company is adhering to is less than farmers made 15 years ago, said John Rooney, PGI director at Blackfoot.

Simplot has taken its 1989 contract offer directly to growers. Rooney on Thursday said no PGI member can sign a processing contract independently, which would be a violation of the membership agreement.

It is up to Simplot to initiate a new round of talks, Rooney said.

Rooney said Simplot's 1989 potato contract price of less than \$4 is lower than the price of 15 years ago. Spring

planting has just begun in eastern Idaho.

Simplot has gone out of state and settled a contract with growers in Malheur County, Ore., that comes closer to what Idaho farmers have been requesting, 23 cents higher on the average than was offered to PGI, Rooney said.

PGI is seeking a \$4.40 per hundredweight contract price this year, a half cent per pound increase on the raw product. The 1,200-member group has had no increase in its contract with Simplot for three years.

Growers are looking or a price hike to cover increased production costs, such as chemicals, power, fuel and seed.

Rigby man fined for employing alien not authorized to work

RIGBY (AP) — In the first penalty in Idaho under the new federal immigration laws, a Rigby man has been fined \$2,000 for employing an alien not authorized to work in the United States.

Lyle Taylor, owner of Taylor Produce Inc., originally was fined \$3,200 by the Immigration and Naturalization Service for hiring an unauthorized alien and for failure to file the proper forms with the INS, said Robin Henrie, an agency attorney in Helena, Mont.

The amount was reduced because

Taylor cooperated and agreed to never employ an illegal again, said Mary Mohrman, also of the INS in Montana. No other penalties were imposed on the business.

The fine is the first imposed in Idaho under the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986.

In the final agreement between the INS and Taylor, his company was ordered to stop hiring illegal workers. It also was charged with 11 violations of failing to properly prepare and update a form which establishes employment eligibility.

Hawks take Bucks in Game 1, 100-92

ATLANTA — A tough game at a slow pace, exactly what the Hawks didn't want and the Bucks sought. And still, it wasn't enough for Milwaukee.

Glenn Rivers said the Bucks controlled the tempo, but Atlanta still found a way to win, 100-92, in the opening game of the NBA playoffs.

"This game truly was a struggle, for us and them," Rivers said after joining Dominique Wilkins in scoring seven points each in the final 6:34. "It was a war. They slowed the game to their style and you can't count on them missing all those free throws. We got kind of lucky."

The Hawks took their 1-0 lead in the best-of-five series by maintaining their mastery of the Bucks this season — Atlanta beat Milwaukee in all six regular season meetings.

"Down the stretch we hit a lot of big shots," Atlanta coach Mike Fratello said. "We knew it was going to be a tough series. Both teams dug in down the stretch. That's the way the playoffs are."

Rivers broke a 79-79 tie by hitting a free throw with 6:34 remaining and referee Wally Hoenoy hit Bucks assistant coach Frank Hamilton with a technical foul before Rivers could shoot his second free throw.

Reggie Theus made the technical shot and Rivers then added his second free throw, giving the Hawks an 82-79 lead.

Drugs, street crime concern IOC for '92

BARCELONA, Spain — As it pursues the fight against drug use by athletes, the International Olympic Committee is warning of another danger, one that most city-dwellers can understand — street crime.

In closing four days of meetings in the host city for the 1992 Summer Games, IOC president Juan Antonio Samaranch announced Thursday new steps in the drug battle, including an agreement that will use a million-dollar mobile lab to conduct dope tests at both major meets and practice sessions will be made.

The danger of drugs in sports has become a recurring theme at IOC meetings, especially since last summer's Games, where Canadian sprint champion Ben Johnson tested positive for steroid use in the biggest drug scandal in Olympic history.

But a new matter of concern was voiced by Samaranch when he was asked at a news conference about security for the Barcelona Games.

Terrorism, a shadow over the Olympics since the deaths of nine Israeli athletes and coaches in a Palestinian attack at the 1972 Munich Games, was just part of the matter, the IOC president said.

"We know there are two major problems," Samaranch, a Barcelona native, said. "One is terrorism. This exists in Spain, as it does in other countries throughout the world. But we are convinced that the Spanish government will take all measures against it."

He pointed as an example to the 1982 soccer World Cup, staged in Spain without any terrorist incidents.

The other problem is on the streets, from the palm tree-lined boulevards uptown to the narrow alleys of the old Gothic section near the harbor, Samaranch continued.

"This problem is citizen safety — theft, robbery, mugging, et cetera," he said. "This is a problem that must be eradicated as quickly as possible. This

is important. It is very clearly linked to the image of the country when people come to see us."

Street crime in Spain was virtually nonexistent under the 36-year authoritarian regime of Gen. Francisco Franco. But since Franco's death and the transition to democracy more than a decade ago, new freedoms have been accompanied by new problems, including drug use, which authorities say is responsible for most of the street crime.

In 1988, Spain recorded 250 heroin overdose deaths among a population of 39 million, minuscule compared with the rate in big cities in other parts of world.

Statistics provided by COOB, the Barcelona Olympic Organizing Committee, showed 25 murders per million residents in 1987 and 21 murders per million residents in 1988 in a city of 1.7 million. Figures for other crimes were unavailable.

Merode said that the IOC had added a new section on hormones to its list of banned doping practices, even though tests to detect such measures were not foolproof. A similar move was made last year to make blood doping illegal, despite the continued absence of a 100-percent accurate test, he said.

The medical commission chairman also said that six athletes found with illegal substances in their systems at the Seoul Games were not identified as drug users or otherwise punished because the use was accidental or could not enhance performance. These were in addition to the 10 athletes, including Johnson, who were kicked out of the Seoul Games for drug use.

The IOC is studying ways to pare the size of the Games, which have grown to 23 sports and 10,000 athletes. Samaranch said the board agreed in principle to the first step in that cutting, tentatively dropping rhythmic gymnastics, which had been added in 1984.

The final decision will be made after hearing from Yur Tirot, president of the International Gymnastics Federation, in August, Samaranch said.

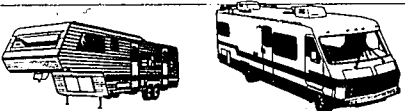

THE ACES ON BRIDGE BOBBY WOLFF

"I generally avoid temptation unless I can't resist it." - Mae West.

You can spot the caliber of an opponent's play by the way he times his finesses. A top player will always postpone taking any finesse until he has exhausted all reasonable alternatives.

A trump lead is usually not a good choice against a small slam, but in today's case, it was the exception that proves the rule: Without a trump lead, South can ruff two diamonds in dummy for an easy 12 tricks.

An impatient declarer wins the first trump in dummy, cashes the club ace, discarding a heart, and ruffs a low club. Two high diamonds are cashed, a diamond is ruffed in dummy and another club is ruffed. South draws trumps and tries the heart finesse. East wins and cashes his high diamond - one down.

Not a bad line of play, but the top player does better. He also wins the first trump in dummy and ruffs a small club without cashing the ace. Two high diamonds and a diamond ruff follow, and another low club is ruffed. Trumps are drawn and South then gets his extra chance before committing to a finesse. He leads his last diamond. Had West won, South would have been forced to fall back on the heart finesse. However, since East has the high diamond, East is forced to lead into one of dummy's A-Q combinations, giving South his 12th winner.

Nervous Wendell students try out for part in play

WENDELL — About 80 students gathered in the school cafeteria Monday, clamoring with excitement over who would win a part in "Beauty Lou and the Country Beast."

Two directors from the Missoula Children's Theatre, in residence in Wendell for one week, would select a cast of about 50, age 6 to 18, for a professional-style production of this lighthearted, musical love story.

Petite 10-year old Jennifer Koger took a break from dancing about with her friends.

"I'm so nervous," she said, brushing back her Jane Fonda haircut. "I'm scared I'm going to mess up and not make it."

The fourth grader said her acting experience thus far has been pretending to be Sleeping Beauty in her room at home.

"I'm pretty good at it," she said with confidence, tucking in her red blouse.

Director Jim Burke, tall and lanky with the strong stage presence of a seasoned performer, gave a friendly but stern word of advice to the would-be actors. Theater work requires commitment, he said. Rehearsals will be after school from 3:30 to 8 p.m. for one week and they would have to bring their dinners.

The shows will be on Saturday, he told them. Costumes will be provided. Directions must be followed exactly. Directors, he said, are not babysitters.

"We are looking for those with loud, expressive voices, with expressive bodies and the ability to follow directions. If you are rejected, don't take it personally. In the real acting world, unemployment is more than 90 percent."

Co-director Kelly Ray, whose most recent role was Mozart in a production of "Amadeus," asked the students to line up around the room according to height, tall to short. He instructed them to state their names and ages, one at a time.

"I see a lot of people apologizing for their existence," Ray told them after the first time around. "Don't apologize. Show us how good it is to be here. We're not going to do dental surgery on you. Now, let's try again."

At her turn, Jennifer lifted her arms and spoke boldly, then covered her face with a laugh.

The two-hour audition continued, with the students trying to sing, repeat a short dance step and dramatize a few lines. The youngest ones gave Shakespearean oinks for roles as "barnyard critters." A few talented actors were subtly eliminated because of their behavior problems or lack of attention.

Four buses hoveled like dogs for the role of "Fleabite Clyde," a solid group of "country folk" was selected and a few older boys volunteered to be assistant directors. More than 30 others had to be turned away.

Jennifer, who graded well, won the part of "Little Zoe," the youngest of Beauty Lou's sisters.

"She spoke right up immediately," director Ray said later. "She was smiling. She was looking me in the eye. And of course, she was as cute as a button. In theater, that always helps."

Since September, Ray and Burke have toured throughout the Northwest, producing "Beauty Lou and the Country Beast" with a different cast each week. In addition, they present theater workshops to students and teachers during the week of residen-

cy. Both men are in the play, setting acting examples for the children to emulate. On one song, they harmonize like oldtime troubadours, backed by Ray's one-man-band guitar.

Ramona Allen of the Wendell Community Arts Council, said she and the council are sponsoring this Montana production because it is an ideal experience and opportunity for the local youth.

"I was excited because it was a children's theater," she said, "and it was the kind of entertainment we were looking for here, especially since they could involve 50 children."

Rehearsals are lively, with plenty of funny comparisons instead of criticism.

"That's a great line and you're not projecting it," Ray told one girl. "I give you a juicy steak and you're treating it like a McDonald's burger."

"In others he said with great animation, "Sound smarter. Speed it up. Be more wisenheimers."

At rehearsal Tuesday, Jennifer was barefoot in a simple dress with a ribbon in her hair.

"We're powerful hungry," she said, giving her line a note of urgency.

But most of the time, she just sat quietly in a captive audience, watching others go through their parts.

Jennifer said she likes working with Kelly Ray because he is funny. "He's our father in the play," she said. "He looks like Danny DeVito."

With 20 years of acting experience in live theater, Ray knows how to give children a taste of the real world of acting.

"Theater isn't just a game," he said. "It's not sissies putting on makeup and dancing around. It's hard work. It's stressful. It's life and death, but it's the next thing

Lucille Ball played big role in shaping comedy

HOLLYWOOD — "Oh, Ricky..." How many times — and in how many languages — have TV viewers across the globe heard that line from Lucille Ball as the buggaboo wacky housewife in "I Love Lucy"?

So many times and in so many languages that Lucy was one of the most beloved and recognizable figures in the world when she died Wednesday at age 77.

There hasn't been a more enduring TV star or TV series. As Lucy Ricardo in the globally syndicated "I Love Lucy," Lucy remains, even after her death, a common denominator for nations, continents and hemispheres, doing in entertainment what others have not accomplished in professional diplomacy.

It's easy to overstep here. "I Love Lucy" has not ended the arms race or united traditional

enemies. Yet its famous musical theme — da da da da-da-da-da — signifies something special, a time out from the problems that divide peoples and a time in for the shared experience of TV viewing.

You might call it temporary peaceful coexistence in front of the small screen, with "I Love Lucy" becoming TV's version of neutral Switzerland.

With Lucy and her then-real-life husband Desi Arnaz as the Ricardos, and William Frawley and Vivian Vance as those prototypical sitcom neighbors the Mertzes, the 179 episodes of "I Love Lucy" continue as a universal language, burned into the memories of those who viewed the series when it was new, and then regenerated again and again through reruns and international distribution.

Lucy was a marvelously gifted clown for all seasons, whose popularity has always reflected

Friends, fans say goodbye

HOLLYWOOD — For baby boomers who watched her in reruns, for fellow comics who sought her counsel, for former presidents and television executives still in awe of her, Wednesday was the day to say it once more: "I Love Lucy."

Lucille Ball, 77, died unexpectedly at Cedars-Sinai Medical Center eight days after surgery to repair a ruptured aorta near her heart. She was recovering well, eating, taking small walks and, of course, joking.

But the aorta ruptured again in a different spot and Miss Ball died despite efforts by intensive care unit doctors and nurses at Cedars-Sinai Medical Center.

On Hollywood Boulevard's Walk of Fame,

flowers were placed on Miss Ball's star.

Gale Gordon, who worked with Miss Ball on three television series — "Here's Lucy," "The Lucy Show," and "Life With Lucy" — reflected on how many mourners Miss Ball had.

"I think my grief, although it is deep ... is nothing compared to the grief her family must feel, and in her case, the entire world," said Gordon, who was in Edmonton, Alberta.

"Oh, what a blow! What a shame! Damn!" lamented fellow comedian Dick Van Dyke. "She didn't deal in jokes. She dealt in human behavior. She was a great physical mime with all the instincts of a (Charlie) Chaplin."

Comedian George Burns, 93, said he shared the shock, and related her death in show business terms: "What can you do? When the guy

The more you think about Lucy as an icon, the more remarkable she becomes, for her esteem has grown and grown despite Lucy Ricardo being in many ways the flighty, manipulative, narrowly defined female of her time, a stereotype far outdistanced by today's woman.

That dated image seems transcended even now by Lucy's instinctive physical comedy in the tradition of Charlie Chaplin and Buster Keaton, the unself-conscious skills, the mugging and sight gags that set her apart from so many of her contemporaries and enhanced the good name of slapstick.

"I Love Lucy" had already been preceded by such TV comedy series as "The Goldbergs," "Amos 'n' Andy" and "The George Burns and Gracie Allen Show" when it premiered on

CBS Oct. 15, 1951, with an episode about the Ricardos and Mertzes having an adventurous evening at the Casbah.

But it was the sitcom, the style-setting, trend-setting grand dame that begat countless offspring — the overwhelming bulk of which were aimed to copy the form but not the results.

More than any other TV star and TV series, Lucy and "I Love Lucy" set the standard for situation comedy being not necessarily trifling, but at its best an art form as worthy of admiration as opera. And as a shaper of comedy on the nation's dominant stage, Lucy also played a significant role in the shaping of contemporary American humor.

"I Love Lucy" was important in other ways. It gave us, in Lucy, a beautiful star who bucked the tired old axiom that females did comedy only at the expense of losing their femininity. It also gave us, in the Cuban Aranz, TV's first identifiable

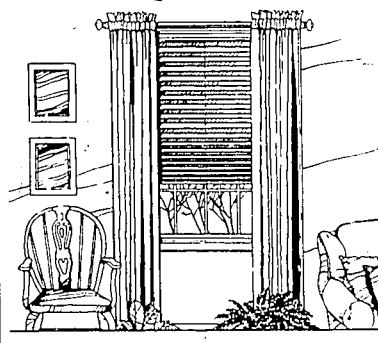

Nature program airs Sunday

TWIN FALLS— Death is reflected in the eye of a golden eagle as it surveys its domain, in the Snake River canyon.

Striking out of a clear blue sky, a peregrine falcon strikes its prey in a midair explosion of feathers. An osprey crashes into a lake to emerge dripping with a writhing fish bigger than the bird that carries it off.

The eagle, peregrine falcon—the fastest animal in the world—the osprey and other birds of prey, or raptors, are the stars in Nature's April premiere "Rulers of the Wind" at 6 p.m. (MST) Sunday.

The program features spectacular aerial acrobatics filmed partly in the Snake River Birds of Prey Area southeast of Boise. It explores the raptor's role in nature and its complex relationship with man throughout history.

Once revered as gods and later val-

ued by medieval nobility for their hunting prowess, raptors came to be seen as competitors for game and killers of livestock.

Though raptors rarely kill domestic stock, thousands upon thousands were slaughtered earlier in this century by paid professionals, ostensibly to protect livestock.

Raptors, however, help control small rodent populations and recycle nutrients by feeding on carrion. Environmental problems that may affect man often show up in the predators that share the top of the food chain with humans.

"Rulers of the Wind" also explores

the efforts of scientists and volunteers to study and protect these vital hunters of the sky.

The program takes a forthright look at the birds and their importance in the global ecological scheme. It is important for humans to realize the importance of these birds, not for the benefit man derives, but for the benefit of the birds themselves.

Though the endangered peregrine falcon has made a resurgence in some of the nation's cities, the single biggest threat to raptors is the loss of habitat to human development.

The program is hosted by George Page, the executive editor of the show. It is produced by WNET New York in association with the Nature Conservancy.

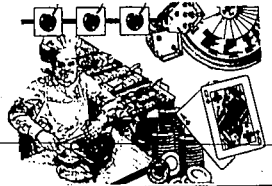
Theater group will present 'Our Town'

Arts on Tour and Foreign Film Festival will continue next year

TWIN FALLS— The Magic Valley Arts Council marked the completion of the first full year of the revitalized organization with a gala social evening Monday at Herrett Museum, complete with chamber music and elegant hors d'oeuvres.

Since the major activities this year, sponsorship with College of Southern Idaho and KMYT of the Arts on Tour Series and the Foreign Film Festival were successful, both projects will be continued next year.

The Foreign Film Festival netted a little more than \$600, according to Dr. Mark Grefenson, chairman. The council also stands to profit financially from the Arts on Tour series, although the season does not conclude until the May 22 Utah Symphony concert.

One of the reasons for the council's success as a viable group, in comparison to several previous attempts, is that the officers are not affiliated with any of the many local performing groups.

This is deliberate, said Dr. Allan Frost, who was re-elected president during the brief business meeting. Frost said he is aware all questions are not settled about the role the council should play and if its present major function as a presenting group is the most appropriate one.

Leaders of the long established performing groups see the council's role more as a coordinating unit, says Art Frantz, president of the Dilettantes of Magic Valley. The council's strongest role is to introduce more variety of performing

arts and thus increase patronage, says Alice Elwood, executive director. The bimonthly newsletter serves as a clearing house for all arts events, but depends upon cooperation of the participating groups to provide the information.

Plans also include promoting visual, literary and performing arts in the public schools, scheduling entertainment for Statchood Day and publishing a history of the arts in Magic Valley.

Other officers are Gary Babel, vice president; Donna Brizee, corresponding secretary; Rose Marie Doerr, recording secretary; Jeff Fox, Grefenson and Dan Hurlbut, members-at-large. Fox, who replaces Homer Pringle, Jerome, is the only new officer.

'Say Anything' is surprisingly original, funny teen movie

HOLLYWOOD — Trust Cameron Crowe, writer of "Fast Times at Ridgemore High," to dig among the slag heaps of an almost mined-out genre — the teen-age movie — and come up with one of the nicest of the

species, a film of warmth, insight, humor and surprising originality. "Say Anything," which marks writer Crowe's first direction, is not perfect, but when it is good, which is every moment John Cusack is on screen, it is a living joy. And when it is not so good — earthbound and not inventive enough — it still almost single-hand-

edly redeems the breed. Cusack's Lloyd Dobler is something special among his fellow 18- and 19-year-olds just graduating from high school. He is trustworthy, the one you would stick with being "keymaster" — the straight, stern, sober keeper of all car keys — at the graduation party blowout. He cares.

He is, in his own diffident way, cool. He doesn't just like girls; two of the nicest girls from his class (Lili Taylor and Amy Brooks) are his best friends and life advisers. And when Lloyd falls in love, as he has with the unattainable Diane Court, it is with the pure, single-minded grip of a stepping torque.

For some of these reasons but especially the last, Lloyd is not the sort of boy that a fiercely protective father such as nursing-home owner James Court (John Mahoney) might cotton to. Diane Court (Lone Skye), biochemistry major, valedictorian, winner of a scholarship that will take her to England in the fall, is a brain, a beauty and the light of her divorced father's life.

Lloyd lives in a crackerbox apartment with his abandoned-and-now-divorced sister (wonderful, real-life sister Joan Cusack) and her little boy. Then in an act of bravery bordering on the heroic, or the clinically insane, Lloyd asks Diane to their graduation-night party. And, in an exactly similar vein, she accepts.

It is as though Crowe really understood those hundreds of stories about models or actresses or spectacularly pretty woman who never went out during high school, simply because boys were afraid they were unapproachable.

Diane, groomed from infancy as a high achiever, also understands that she has been marked as a "prize." What she finds in Lloyd, during their first, hilarious, beautifully observed date, is a funny, tender, unquenchable optimism who is at the same time her passport to the real world.

To the astonishment of everyone, they begin dating, in sequences that are the heart and the high point of the movie. And, even considering the remarkably open and close-level of communication between father and

daughter, it becomes a relationship that he cannot understand.

Lloyd does not give adults the gib answers they want to hear about his own plans, for example, and he says, "I've even aided the military life that his career-Army father has in mind for him, he would like to become a champion kick-boxer, "the sport of the future." In the meantime, Lloyd knows emphatically that for a career he does not want to buy, sell or process anything. It is sentences like that that make Mr. Court's eyes get very wide indeed.

Crowe, working here for executive producer James L. Brooks and producer Polly Platt, has taken the time with character details that have become a hallmark of Brooks' other Gracie Films such as "Big." The shadings within Court's character, the over-possessive father, the nurturing owner of an immaculate nursing home, are exceptionally interesting.

What gives "The Graduate" its ticking bomb quality was that last shot that, clearly as "Rain Man," said "Uh oh." Crowe leaves that awful consideration out here, and we need it. Caper is needlessly drawn-out in comedy 'Disorganized Crime'

The following are capsule reviews of some of the films now playing in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and the Los Angeles Times. Opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

DISORGANIZED CRIME (R). Pleasant but needlessly drawn-out caper comedy in which an ill-assorted bunch of crooks (Fred Gwynne, Ruben Blades, Lou Diamond Phillips, William Russ) attempt to rob a bank in a small Montana town, despite their leader (Corbin Bernsen) being chased by a pair of New Jersey cops (scene-stealers Ed O'Neill and Dan Rooker). Written and directed by Jim Kauf, who also wrote "Stakeout."

THE DREAM TEAM (PG-13). Howard Zieff's new comedy is so clearly derived from the movie "One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest" that you might begin to wonder when Jack Nicholson will show up. This amiably slick farce stars Michael Keaton, Christopher Lloyd and Peter Boyle as a carnivorously funny trio with Stephen Furst playing the weakest role, although he has a great comic wad, running along helplessly behind them like a chafed turtle.

HEATHERS (R). A film that thinks of itself as black comedy; director Waters' script are awarded for a zinger or two: school cliques, unctuous teachers, parents who won't be parents, etc. Unfortunately, director Michael Lehmann's point of view is swivel-mounted: He doesn't have the courage of his cynicism.

LEAN ON ME (PG-13). Bullhorn-and-baseball-bat-wielding educator Joe Clark is played by Morgan Freeman, possibly the most formidable actor on the American scene. And he will give thoughtful audiences their theories problems with "Lean on

Me." When director John Avildsen turns up the heat, it is thrilling. But glossed over by the film makers are some of the real statistics of Clark's administration and the fact that he has very nearly created more problems than he has solved.

MAJOR LEAGUE (R). David Ward's amiable, amusing baseball comedy, which turns upon the fact that the Cleveland Indians haven't won a pennant since 1954 — and which affords enjoyable, ingratiating performances from Tom Berenger, Charlie Sheen, Corbin Bernsen, James Gammon and numerous others. A modest winner about a bunch of supposed losers.

RAIN MAN (R). Because we have had dozens of buddy films about journeys of discovery, we can plot the scenario of this one like a road map: The special qualities of one will work on the other to change him, or perhaps both of them. Dustin Hoffman makes his autistic savant character hypnotically interesting and sometimes terribly funny. Tom Cruise gives his looniest, most authoritative performance since "Risky Business" and it can be said unblushingly that he holds his own with the mastery Hoffman.

SHE'S OUT OF CONTROL (PG). The main trouble with "She's Out of Control" is that it is never out of control. A widowed general manager (Tony Danza) at a failing rock radio station goes bonkers when his 15-year-old daughter starts dating, and the whole movie stays on greased, slick tracks right to the end. Instead of building toward a comic paroxysm,

it turns into a polyethylene grenade, made to explode Barbie dolls.

SPEED ZONE (PG). Hell on wheels. Yes, this is unofficially "Cannonball III," and, amazingly, director Jim Drake manages to do a worse job than Hal Needham did on the first two lemons. In this shameless exercise in celebrity mortgage-paying, formerly funny "SCTV" alumni John Candy, Eugene Levy and Joe Flaherty — who ought to have their licenses suspended — race across what is ostensibly America but is really a particularly ugly section of Canada.

UNDER THE BOARDWALK (R). The first half of Fritz Kiersch's surfing comedy offers an amusing, fairly free-wheeling look at the shallow-water teen culture it portrays. But eventually it settles down to focus on a trite romance involving not-so-star-crossed lovers from different sides of the tracks. The jets are all here, and wherefore art thou, Romeo? On a 10-foot swell, duite.

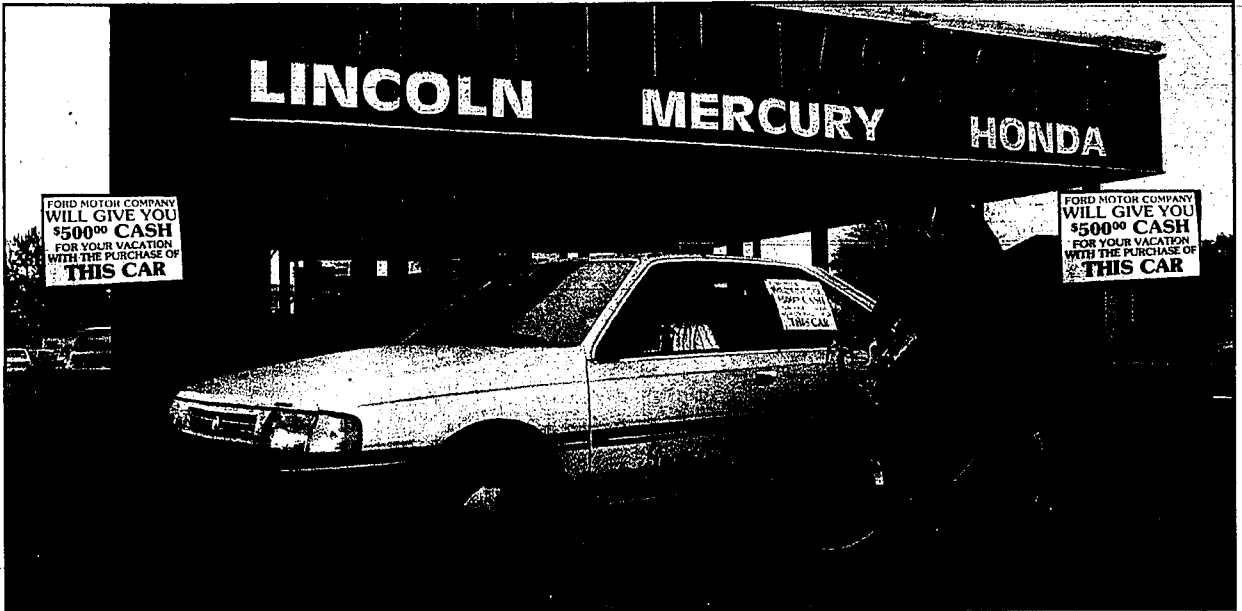

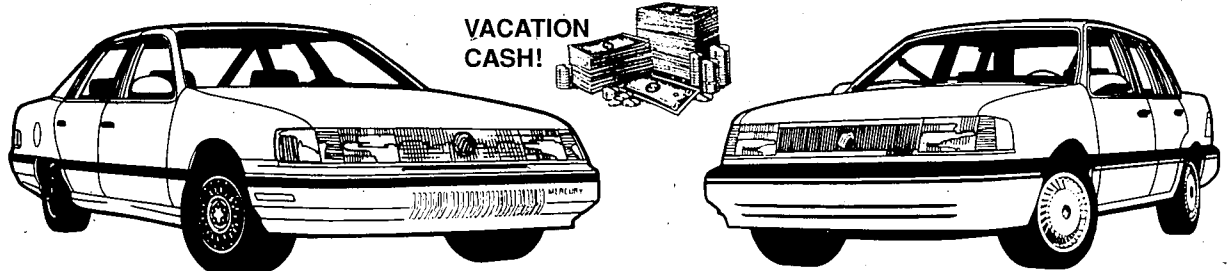

CBS airs miniseries 'Guts and Glory: The Rise and Fall of Oliver North'

By CONNIE PASSALACQUA

"I don't think people would be as interested in Fawn Hall if she had been an ugly woman," says actress Amy Stock-Poynton of the real-life figure she plays in CBS's "Guts and Glory: The Rise and Fall of Oliver North" (airing Sunday and Tuesday, April 30 and May 2). Blond and pretty herself, Stock-Poynton feels that things would have been very different for Oliver North's blond and pretty secretary if the media had simply focused on Hall's stenographic abilities.

Instead, Hall's dazzling looks became a stellar media image during the 1987 televised hearings. Hall's National Security Council boss, fanatically dedicated career Marine Oliver North (played in the miniseries by David Keith), had organized and overseen a covert action to finance the Nicaraguan Contra rebels with money diverted from selling arms to Iran. Both sides of this action were strictly illegal. On Nov. 26, 1986, as details of the operation began to leak out, President Reagan announced that he had not been fully informed on the nature of the operation and fired North — on television. During televised Congressional hearings the following summer, North testified that he believed all his activities had been authorized by his superiors.

"I really feel the higher-ups knew what North was doing," says Stock-Poynton. "They needed someone to blame, and it was North." Stock-Poynton says that before she got involved in the project she had no real opinions on the scandal. "But after reading the script, I felt very pro-Ollie, and so did David.

"David has a very strong personality, and he played (North) like he believed in him," she says. "Our director didn't believe in North. So the filming got kind of — well — interesting at times."

Luckily for Stock-Poynton, the role of Hall was somewhat more clear-cut. "Fawn was always very loyal, and especially loyal to North," Stock-Poynton says. "She was his right-hand man — she organized his office and his schedule. She was very close to him. I played her as being quite emotional — especially the scene in which she watches North being fired on television." Stock also believes there was never any romantic involvement between North and Hall. "He was very dedicated to and very much in love with his wife Betsy," she says. "That's a main theme in the miniseries."

Stock-Poynton has been dedicated since childhood to acting. "I was al-

ways acting in or writing plays," she says. Her professional entree into the business was doing commercials in Chicago. Then, using money she had earned winning the spokesmodel competition five times on "Star Search," she moved to Los Angeles. So far, she has starred in two soaps — daytime's "Days of Our Lives," as Britta, and nighttime's "Dallas," as Lisa Alden, two seasons ago. "She was Bobby Ewing's interim girlfriend," says Stock-Poynton. "That was enough for me. I like doing guest roles and moving onto the next thing."

Stock-Poynton regrets that she didn't have a chance to get to know the real Fawn Hall, although she once met her briefly in a Los Angeles restaurant. "She's out here in L.A. now trying to be an actress. She's being represented by the William Morris Agency. Who knows, maybe I'll run into her at an audition."

RADNOR, Pa. (AP) — Nazi hunter Simon Wiesenthal, who for years rejected Hollywood offers to do his story, says he signed with Home Box Office because his contract allowed him to consult on the script, draft by draft.

Wiesenthal also said, in an interview for the April 22 TV Guide magazine, that he was pleased by HBO's choice of Ben Kingsley to play him in the movie to be broadcast Sunday, called "Murderers Among Us: The Simon Wiesenthal Story."

The movie is based on Wiesenthal's 1967 book of the same title. Wiesenthal, credited with finding more than 1,100 war criminals, said producers were after him for years for the movie rights, but of-

fered deals that would have left him helpless if he felt the script diverged from the truth.

In 1984, executive producer Robert Cooper offered a contract that gave Wiesenthal no veto power, but required that he be consulted by the writers on each draft as they worked toward the final script.

"Now I am confident that the spirit of my story will be properly represented," Wiesenthal said.

Kingsley, who won a best-actor Oscar for the title role in "Ghandi," told the magazine he read three of Wiesenthal's books before meeting him in Vienna, Austria.

New Yorkers see new advanced TV signal

PRINCETON, N.J. (AP) — A New York television station broadcast a wide-screen advanced television signal to a news-hour audience Thursday on the 50th anniversary of television's debut at the 1939 New York World's Fair.

Viewers with regular televisions saw little or no difference in the signal, but it showed up as a bright wide picture on prototype sets at a research center in Princeton, about 50 miles southwest of Manhattan.

The broadcast by NBC's New York affiliate, WNBC-TV, was another milestone on the road toward a new generation of televisions for the 1990s that will have nearly the brightness and sharpness of magazine pictures.

The system, developed at the

David Sarnoff Research Center here, falls short of full-fledged high-definition television because it has to fit into the same narrow portion of the broadcast spectrum as the regular television signal does.

Engineers say full HDTV will require at least 50 percent more bandwidth than regular channels provide.

Those sets may not arrive until 1994 or 1995 and initially could cost \$3,000 to \$4,000, said James Tjetjen, president of the Sarnoff research center.

"Today's broadcast is to television what Kitty Hawk was to flight," said Michael J. Sherlock, NBC's president for operations and technical services.

At the end of April, KBLR in Las Vegas, Nev., is scheduled to begin testing a different system for enhancing the signal received by standard sets.

In addition, more highly advanced television signals have been transmitted over Channels 58 and 59 in Washington, D.C., which are low-powered and exclusively for research purposes.

NBC approaches CBS' weekly winning record

LOS ANGELES (AP) — NBC had six of the Top 10 shows and took first place again in the prime-time Nielsen ratings, bringing its consecutive weekly wins to 44, two weeks from tying CBS' all-time record of 46.

NBC had a cumulative rating of 13.3 with a 23 share for the week. CBS was second with an 11.8 rating and a 21 share, and ABC finished third with an 11.6 rating and a 20 share. ABC had three Top 10 shows while CBS had one.

Each rating point represents 904,000 households with televisions. The share is a percentage of sets in use.

ABC's "Roseanne" took first place for the week's ratings, followed by NBC's "The Cosby Show."

"Roseanne" served as a lead-in for the ABC premiere of the new series "Have Faith," with a spring debut at No. 3. The show is about three Roman Catholic priests and a missionary in a Chicago parish.

NBC's "A Different World" was in fourth place, followed by "Cheers," also on NBC; "The Wonder Years," ABC; "The Golden Girls," NBC; "60 Minutes," CBS; and NBC's "Empty Nest" and "Hunter" for ninth and 10th place, respectively.

NBC's "Nick and Hilary" made its debut at 18th place. The show is a half-hour retool of the failed hour-long "Tattinger's."

Made for television movie "Baywatch: Panic At Malibu Pier,"

about muscular Southern California lifeguards, was in 11th place for NBC. The show from former NBC chief Grant Tinker's production company is a contender for a fall series.

The ABC-TV movie "Peter Gunn," returning one of television's most popular detectives to the small screen, was in 21st place, while NBC's two-part miniseries "Around The World In 80 Days," starring Pierce Brosnan, took 30th and 31st places.

ABC's "World News Tonight" took first place for the week with a 10.0 rating, followed by "CBS Evening News" with 9.3 and "NBC Nightly News" with an 8.9 rating.

NBC is closing on the 46-week run that CBS had in first place for the Nielsen, achieved in the 1962-1963 season, when the CBS schedule included "The Andy Griffith Show," "The Beverly Hillbillies," "The Dick Van Dyke Show" and "Perry Mason."

Fox Network's "Married...With Children," recently under fire by groups critical of the show's portrayal of family life, was in 49th place and the network's highest-rated show for the week, followed by "America's Most Wanted," 58th and "21 Jump Street," in the 76th spot.

The five lowest-ranked network shows were ABC's "Incredible Sunday Special," in 72nd place.
