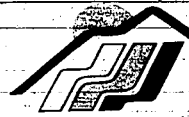
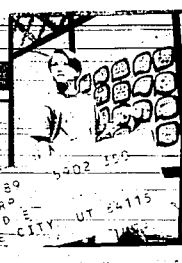

Jury finds North guilty on 3 charges

United States vs. Oliver North

Acquittal returned on 9 other counts in 1st Iran-Contra trial

WASHINGTON — Oliver L. North, the Marine at the shadow center of the Reagan administration's secret effort to fund the Nicaraguan Contras, was acquitted Thursday of altering and shredding documents and of two other charges in the Iran-Contra affair.
He was acquitted on nine other counts. North said he would appeal the jury's decision. 'We're absolutely confident of the final outcome. As a Marine I was taught to fight and fight hard for as long as it takes to prevail.'
We will continue this battle... and we will be fully vindicated, he told reporters in a statement at his lawyer's office. He did not take questions.
The retired Marine lieutenant colonel, who faces up to 10 years in prison on the convictions, listened to the verdict without any show of emotion. Jurors said he was guilty of illegally changing and destroying documents, accepting an illegal gratuity — a \$13,800 home security system — and one count of aiding and abetting in an obstruction of Congress.
One juror said the 12 days of deliberations had included 'a lot of bickering and arguing' and that the conviction votes came Thursday after a fellow juror offered a strong prayer.
North had admitted in court that he misled members of Congress about his Iran-Contra activities.
but said he had done so at the direction of superiors.
He was acquitted of five other charges of lying to Congress, obstructing Congress, of two counts of lying to the FBI and of obstructing Justice.

Verdict gave both sides something

WASHINGTON — The verdict in Oliver L. North's Iran-Contra trial gave both sides credible claims to partial victory in the grueling battle for the jury's votes.
You can't say at this juncture that either side walked away with their trophy intact, said Washington attorney Lawrence Barcozza.
Although North stands convicted of three felony charges, the jury acquitted him of all the charges that he lied to Congress — including an allegation that he falsely answered lawmakers' questions during a face-to-face meeting.
'There is something there for everyone,' said Washington attorney Benjamin Veniste, a former Watergate prosecutor.
Analysis
Veniste, a former Watergate prosecutor, said the verdict was a 'mixed blessing' for independent counsel Lawrence E. Walsh, arguing that North's lies to Congress cut to the heart of the democratic process by subverting the government's reliance on truth.
But jurors cleared the former presidential aide of the most serious charges, accepting the argument that he helped prepare false statements. Jurors also apparently accepted North's explanation that when he did participate in fabrications, it was on orders from superiors.
The jury's verdict on these counts was the worst defeat for Walsh, whose office has spent \$16 million investigating and prosecuting North and the other Iran-Contra defendants.
After dropping charges that North conspired to illegally divert U.S.-Iran arms-sale profits to the Nicaraguan rebels, Walsh was left with a case that North hid, changed and stole money.
Ben-Veniste noted that North was cleared of lies to Congress that allegedly took place while the Contra resupply operation was still secret but convicted him of destroying documents and aiding and abetting obstruction of a congressional inquiry once the affair was publicly known.

Bush denies taking any part in aid deal with Honduras

WASHINGTON — President Bush denied emphatically Thursday that he took part in any scheme to send U.S. aid for Honduran assistance to the Nicaraguan rebels, saying he wanted 'an end to needless, mindless speculation' about his role.
'The word of the president of the United States — George Bush — is, there was no quid pro quo,' he declared moments before a federal jury convicted fired White House aide Oliver North on three criminal charges in connection with the Iran-Contra affair.
Speaking at a meeting he had as vice president in the spring of 1985 with then-Honduran President Roberto Suazo Quesada, Bush said the records of the meeting demonstrate there was no quid pro quo.
Bush had said several times in recent weeks that he would await the conclusion of North's trial before considering a definitive comment on questions that have arisen in connection with that meeting.
But on Thursday standing alongside visiting Canadian Prime Minister Brian Mulroney, Bush seemed eager to talk about recently disclosed documents that placed him at a meeting with Suazo, in Honduras, at a time when internal Reagan administration memos suggested a plan to continue U.S. aid to Latin American countries to their willingness to help the Contra rebels.
The so-called 'findings of fact,' a 42-page document presented in the North trial in early April, suggested that Bush as vice president had played a role as an intermediary between Suazo and the country's assistance the Contras would be rewarded with expedited U.S. financial aid. However, the document did not say directly that Bush discussed the deal with Suazo.
It did say that Bush explained to the Hondurans that they were to receive a grant of more U.S. aid and that that statement was a part of the purported quid pro quo policy of the administration at that time.

Mapmaking Magellan spacecraft streaking on its way to Venus

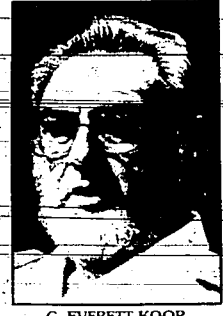

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — Atlantis' astronauts, safely in orbit Thursday after a cliff-hanger weather delay, sent the Magellan spacecraft streaking across the solar system on a \$550 million mapmaking mission to Venus.
The robot spacecraft, reviving an American planetary-science program dormant for a decade, slipped from the shuttle's cargo bay at 7:01 p.m. MDT and drifted into space.
'Magellan is deployed,' reported shuttle commander David Walker.
An hour later, after Atlantis moved a safe distance away, both stages of the spacecraft motor fired to start Magellan on a 456-day journey to Venus, 158 million miles away. It will travel 806 million miles, looping 11 times around the sun, before reaching and orbiting its target in August 1990.
While it's too early to tell about the major portion of Magellan's mission, we're pleased it's gone so well so far, Walker replied when told both stages had fired.
Mission specialists Mark Lee and Mary Cleve, operating remote controls inside the shuttle cabin, checked the health of the space probe before sending a signal that propelled it into its own orbit while Atlantis soared over the Pacific Ocean 600 miles southwest of Los Angeles.
'It's time to let Magellan spread its wings,' a spacecraft controller on the ground said in giving the astronauts the go-ahead to deploy the probe.
Magellan, the first planetary craft ever launched from a shuttle, is to map up to 90 percent of Venus' cloud-shrouded surface. Its high-resolution radar system is expected to produce images of objects as small as a football — 10 times the clarity of any previous pictures of the mysterious planet.
The release of Magellan, the main task of the four-day flight, came a little more than six hours after Atlantis thundered into orbit 167 miles high.
The launch was delayed 59 minutes by shifting clouds and winds that had threatened the second postponement in six days. When Atlantis finally left its pad, just five minutes remained in the midnight window dictated by the need to have the shuttle in the proper position to dispatch Magellan to Venus.

Activist surgeon general to leave in July

WASHINGTON — Surgeon General C. Everett Koop, the nation's most visible and activist surgeon general in the White House Thursday that he will leave his post July 13 and retire from government service Oct. 1.
Koop, en route to a meeting of the World Health Organization in Geneva, refused to speak with reporters, but sources close to him said that he is expected to continue to do essentially what he has been doing, but without government portfolio, including speaking out on AIDS issues and continuing his war against tobacco. He also plans to write his autobiography.
Koop was not asked by the Bush administration to remain beyond his scheduled term and would not do so even if asked, according to knowledgeable sources.
Koop's decision was not unexpected, although it came earlier than anticipated. He had informed President Bush in an Feb. 15 letter that he did not intend to serve his full term, which was scheduled to end in November.
Dr. James O. Mason, assistant secretary for health, is expected to name an acting surgeon general until a permanent successor is found. There was no immediate word of who would replace Koop, but a White House source said that Bush administration officials 'are looking for an anti-abortion person to fill that position. It's a litmus test. The president couldn't take the heat if the appointed anybody pro-choice. But Dr. Koop was anti-abortion and he took the job and turned out to be very, very fair.'
Health and Human Services Secretary Louis W. Sullivan Thursday granted Koop in a letter saying that he has been 'a voice of honesty, integrity, compassion and plain good sense.'
Traditionally, the surgeon general has been a figurehead, with few responsibilities other than to issue an annual report on smoking, which began in 1984 with the first major in-depth anti-smoking report.
But Koop, 72, who has held the post since November 1981, revolutionized the office with his vigorous crusade against smoking and his willingness to talk frankly about AIDS, often clashing with the Reagan administration in the process.
The country's top doctor has transformed the public debate on AIDS and angered fellow conservatives by advocating early AIDS sex education and the use of condoms to prevent the spread of the virus. He also urged compassion for people with AIDS, the majority of whom in the United States are homosexual men.

House, Senate pass \$1.2 trillion budgets

WASHINGTON — The House and Senate approved on Thursday a \$1.2 trillion budget agreement without a single budget-cutting amendment.
Each chamber rejected several attempts to overhaul their bills in fiscal 1990 spending.
The House approved its plan 263-157, after budget committee chairman Leon Panetta, D-Calif., called it 'the only choice for us to fulfill our budget responsibilities and avoid crisis.'
The Senate then passed its version, 68-31, after some minor tinkering and much grumbling that the deficit reduction in it was inadequate.
Both chambers on Thursday overwhelmingly rejected more ambitious proposals to 'freeze' government spending and cut further into the deficit.
The House also soundly defeated a proposal to cut red ink by taxing imported oil a day after the Senate went on record against a gasoline tax boost.
As laid out by the White House agreement, the budget claim to shrink the federal deficit to just below \$100 billion, as required by the Gramm-Rudman law.

Poindexter, Fernandez next to face trial

WASHINGTON (AP) — Now that Oliver North's Iran-Contra trial is over, independent counsel Lawrence E. Walsh can focus on trying the next major case, against North's former boss John M. Poindexter.

Poindexter, who was national security adviser to President Reagan, not only is charged with obstructing congressional inquiries into the Iran-Contra affair; he also faces the central conspiracy charge that was dropped against North when the Bush administration refused to disclose secret documents needed by the defense.

Because Poindexter, unlike North, had daily contact with Reagan, his trial could shed new light on how closely the former president might have been involved in the secret plans to sell arms to Iran and to keep the Contras going after official U.S. aid was banned.

The case against Poindexter is expected to go to trial in September.

Before then, a lower-ranking figure in the affair, former CIA agent Joseph E. Fernandez, is to go to trial July 10.

Fernandez has pleaded innocent to four charges that he lied and obstructed investigations by the presidential commission headed by former Sen. John Tower and by the CIA's inspector general.

"The former CIA station chief in Costa Rica is accused of lying about his role in setting up an

strip in Costa Rica as part of the Reagan administration's effort to help the Nicaraguan rebels at a time when official U.S. aid was banned.

As for Poindexter, Walsh has expressed determination to press forward against him with charges that were dropped against North: That the two men and arms dealers Albert Hakim and Richard V. Secord conspired to divert \$15 million in U.S.-Iran arms-sale profits to the Nicaraguan rebels.

The independent counsel told U.S. District Judge Aubrey E. Robinson Jr. that release of secret documents during North's trial — and softening of the intelligence agencies' opposition to further disclosures — may enable the prosecution to proceed with those charges against Poindexter.

Walsh also said that some of the most sensitive documents a judge ruled were needed in North's trial were not relevant to Poindexter's case.

Many of the documents the government kept out of North's trial dealt with covert operations to free U.S. hostages in the Middle East and other secret activities in Central America.

As a participant in covert operations, North per-

suaded U.S. District Judge Gerhard A. Gesell that he needed the material to help his defense. When it was kept secret, the conspiracy charges against North were dropped.

But Walsh is expected to argue that since Poindexter was not a participant in covert operations, he is not entitled to use the same documents to defend the charges that he was a participant in a conspiracy to defraud the U.S. government of arms-sale profits.

Since North testified that Poindexter knew of his role in the Iran-Contra affair, prosecutors may force the former National Security Council aide to testify against his former boss.

A judge could order North to testify against Poindexter on condition that his testimony not be used as evidence against him if he is granted a new trial by an appellate court.

Poindexter, 52, is also charged with obstructing 1986 investigations of the House and Senate intelligence committees into the Iran-Contra affair. The charges include allegations he helped prepare a false chronology of the U.S.-Iran arms deals and destroyed computerized files he kept at the NSC.

The seven charges against Poindexter carry five-year prison terms and \$250,000 fines.

After Poindexter's trial, Walsh's office plans to proceed with the charges against Hakim and Secord, also scheduled to be tried separately.

Conviction costs North his Marine pension

WASHINGTON (AP) — Oliver North lost his pension as a retired Marine officer when he was convicted Thursday and he won't get it back unless the conviction is overturned on appeal.

North, who retired as a lieutenant colonel in the Marine Corps with 20 years of active-duty service, has been drawing an annual military pension of roughly \$23,100 since leaving the corps almost a year ago.

At the time of his retirement, North said he was leaving the service in order to better prepare his defense against charges of misconduct stemming from the Iran-Contra affair.

North had been receiving his pension since he retired, said Army Lt. Col. Linda Moulin, a Pentagon spokeswoman.

But once the conviction becomes

legally effective — when the secretary of the Navy is formally notified of it and the paperwork is completed — North will lose his pension, she said.

"Once the conviction goes into effect, whatever time that is, he loses his pension. But I don't know exactly what time it takes effect, whether it's today or tomorrow, or whatever," she said.

If North wins on appeal, he will get the pension back and will be given pay retroactively, she said.

Under federal law, a retired officer's pension is not jeopardized by just any felony conviction. Rather, it depends upon the nature of the specific charge.

And according to Lt. Col. Fred Peck, a Marine Corps spokesman, only one of the charges on which North was convicted can result in loss of his pension — the charge of destroying NSC records.

Honduras documents new target

WASHINGTON (AP) — In a spinoff from the trial of Oliver North, the House Intelligence Committee on Thursday began investigating why Congress did not get White House documents on a secret deal with Honduras to aid the Nicaraguan Contras.

The committee's investigation is in response to a request from Rep. Lee Hamilton, D-Ind., who was chairman of the House committee that investigated the Iran-Contra affair in 1987. It is similar to an investigation being carried out by the Senate Intelligence Committee.

Documents that surfaced at the North trial show that President Reagan approved a deal in which the United States would expedite economic and military aid to Honduras in return for that country's continued help for the Contras, who were encamped just inside Honduras along the border with Nicaragua.

The documents, together with testimony during North's trial, suggest that senior officials up to and including Reagan and then vice president George Bush were more involved in the affair than the congressional committees knew.

The situation has been further clouded by administration confirmation that there was no quid pro quo deal with Honduras to aid the Contras, an action that would have been illegal at the time because of congressional prohibitions.

Bush himself repeated the assertion Thursday, giving reporters "the word of the president of the United States" that there was no quid pro quo and promising to turn over to Congress records of his 1986 meeting with the Honduran president.

Those assertions conflict directly with the documentary evidence, which shows there not only was such a plan but that it apparently was carried out.

The White House has offered to make available to Congress former White House counsel Arthur B. Culvahouse Jr., who oversaw the document search for the congressional Iran-Contra committee and gave assurances that all relevant documents had been provided.

At the same time, Rep. David Obey, D-Wis., said he would hold up U.S. aid to Central America until the Bush administration answers questions raised by the North trial documents.

"I do have an obligation to get these answers before we provide any additional assistance to the same countries," said Obey, chairman of the House Appropriations foreign operations subcommittee.

The North documents would seem to lead to some very troubling conclusions about the use of foreign aid to persuade and bribe governments to provide aid to the Contras at a time when providing aid to the Contras was against official American government policy," Obey said.

Court must remain impartial despite public pressure

The U.S. Supreme Court heard arguments last week that could lead to a reversal of the controversial *Moire vs. Wade* abortion decision. Though most oral arguments go unnoticed outside the legal community, these did not. Last month, hundreds of thousands of supporters of the decision marched in front of the Supreme Court building in Washington. The court has received thousands of letters daily on the issue and is being drawn into the political fray in a way that it has assiduously avoided in the recent past.

The judiciary is not like other political institutions. In the Federalist Papers, Alexander Hamilton characterized it as the least dangerous of the three branches — it possesses neither the power of the purse nor the power of the sword. The judiciary's power is largely one of persuasion, and it rests tenuously on another branch of government's opinion. The Supreme Court is above politics to give it the respect it demands as the final arbiter in a highly litigious society.

Though the court does consider election returns and cannot be removed from office by the public's will, such interest must not be overt. Otherwise, the judiciary cannot win support for decisions that apparently counter the public will. As one check on a tyrannical majority, the court must be able to promote minority rights while retaining majority approval. It is not an easy task. The process becomes unbalanced when advocates for various causes believe they can lobby the court.

Why has the Supreme Court become perceived as a largely political institution susceptible to public lobbying campaigns?

One answer lies in the court's involvement in social-policy issues that engender intense emotional reactions from the public. However, the court for several decades has been handling such issues, once left largely to the states.

Moire recently, the court has become a political football in presidential campaigns. Democratic candidates Walter F. Mondale and Michael S. Dukakis both used the issue of Supreme Court appointments and philosophy in their campaign rhetoric.

But the justices themselves have unwittingly contributed to the court's predicament, by voluntarily entering the political battlefield.

William J. Brennan Jr. stepped out of the judicial chambers a few years ago to engage Attorney General Edwin Meese III in a colloquy on interpreting the Constitution. Harry A. Blackmun entered the 1988 presidential campaign debate by protesting that a victory by George Bush would have negative effects on the judiciary.

William H. Rehnquist recently held a news conference, the first by a sitting chief justice not retiring. He supported pay raises for federal judges, an issue that has become a hot controversy over congressional pay.

Some justices, such as Thurgood M. Marshall and Blackmun, have used speeches and interviews to reveal the court's internal difficulties.

Though the justices may contend such behavior is within their First Amendment rights, the court must be prepared for the consequences. Justices who remove their robes occasionally do to political battle cannot expect their subsequent behavior on and off the bench to escape a new scrutiny.

Justices who attempt to humanize the court with books and speeches on life in the marble temple must be prepared for greater press and public attention to their personal lives and temperaments and an increased

tendency to encroach on decisions to those outside.

Interested parties in court cases will conclude that lobbying and pressure tactics are effective because the justices, like all politicians, can be swayed.

What happens when the one remaining body that is supposed to be aloof from such concerns is treated by press and public as just another political institution? How can decisions by such a body be treated with respect particularly by a public jaded by scandal in the other branches of national government?

Recently, the justices have even considered expanding their public visibility by becoming a regular feature on C-SPAN television. Last fall, three justices experimented with televised oral arguments. Television news men thereby get the visuals for a good story, but it is difficult to see how greater accessibility to TV will enhance public respect for the Supreme Court.

Advanced communications technology has drawn national government closer to the citizen. Today government is more accessible to the public than ever before. The Supreme Court, however, should resist the pull of greater democratization, for its own sake as well as the nation's.

Chinese demonstrations continue May 4th tradition

The student demonstrations that erupted last month after the death of Hu Yaobang, who had become a symbol of democracy, are in the Chinese tradition.

The first student demonstration in modern times occurred 70 years ago. Today, as in April, Beijing University students marched from their campus to Tian An Men Square to demonstrate against the government and demand "democracy and science." April's rally put less emphasis on an anti-Communist message, already supported, and more emphasis on demands for freedom of speech, rule of law, end of corruption and student-led, rather than party-led, organizations and publications.

The May 4th movement became a turning point in Chinese history, leading to the overthrow of the warlord government and rejection of Confucian ideology, which had dominated China for more than 2,000 years. It also challenged Confucianism's 1989 demonstration challenged Marxism-Leninism and the Commu-

nist Party that have dominated since 1949. Like the May 4th Movement, the April demonstration was well-spread, spreading to universities throughout China. The students were able to conduct their protests of more than 100,000, facing off against policemen and military men without any major incident, showing the degree of organizational skill that they must have learned from their party elders, the very people they have turned against.

Like their May 4th predecessors, the students, following the demonstration, formed classes and mobilized support to their cause from other groups — the middle class, workers and peasants. In modern times, student movements have only been successful when they have a kind of social support. There is evidence that members of the emerging small-scale entrepreneurial class that has been spawned by Deng Xi-

ang's economic reforms has helped the students morally and financially. Workers on fixed incomes who have been hurt by inflation also caused by the reforms, have joined the concerns are more economic than political.

The May 4th Movement was able to take place and expand because the warlord government was relatively weak. By contrast, the degree of government can act decisively if it wishes. It is ironic that one reason the party leaders purged Hu as the general secretary in January 1987 was because he had refused to repress the student demonstrations for democracy in December 1986. Yet the same leaders have showed restraint this time.

In part, the leadership is divided and uncertain about what to do. Accelerating inflation, blatant corruption of officials and their children and the people's general discontent have created a potentially explosive situation, which the leaders fear may erupt into chaos if they crack down.

Both the May 4, 1919, and April 1989 demonstrations occurred in a pluralistic intellectual atmosphere in which many ideas from abroad were vigorously and publicly debated. Many of the students' writers and intellectual elders had written about and openly advocated the democratic rights that the students demonstrated. In the two months preceding the April demonstration, nearly 100 of China's most prominent intellectuals had organized a petition to the government demanding the release of political prisoners and democratic rights. This was the first time since 1949 that intellectuals had organized publicly for political purposes.

An important difference, however, between the two movements, is that they took place in different contexts. The May 4th occurred two years after the Russian Revolution, when it appeared that the Bolsheviks with their Marxist-Leninist ideology had found a way to modernize a backward country quickly. Its model and ideology became the inspiration for many of

the participants of the May 4th Movement — among them Mao who were to establish the Chinese Communist Party and eventually lead it to power.

The participants in the April demonstration specifically reject that model and ideology as a failure and as inappropriate. The models today are the Western democratic systems and the idea of human rights as evolved in the West. However, just as the Chinese transformed Buddhism or Marxism-Leninism brought in from abroad, whatever they take from abroad today will be combined with aspects of their own tradition and society.

This year is also the 40th anniversary of the Chinese Communist revolution. Will 1989 mark a comparable turning point in Chinese history?

Investigate gas price increases

On Saturday, April 29, I spent a few hours in Twin Falls. I noticed that the price of gasoline was \$1.14.9 at most gas stations.

U.S. makes challenge to Soviets

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of State James A. Baker III challenged the Soviet Union on Thursday to fulfill Mikhail Gorbachev's promises of reform, saying the administration intends to test the application of Soviet "new thinking" again.

Baker's outline of U.S. policy toward the Soviet Union comes as it prepares to leave Monday on a five-day trip that includes his first Moscow meeting with Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev.

It also occurs during a crisis within the NATO alliance as the United States struggles with decisions on forging a strategy to deal with Gorbachev's troop reduction and arms control initiatives.

The secretary's remarks — the result of a long-awaited review of U.S. Soviet policy undertaken by the President's task force — were contained in a speech prepared for delivery to members of the Center for Strategic and International Studies, a Washington think tank.

While explaining such moves such as the withdrawal of troops from Afghanistan and the agreement banning all U.S. and Soviet intermediate-range nuclear missiles in Europe, Baker complained that Soviet behavior still does not square with the slogans of perestroika.

The secretary said the United States intends to build on the progress made in the human rights and arms control areas, in particular suggesting a site for the continuation of the strategic arms talks. The talks dealing with the most dangerous weapons in the U.S. and Soviet arsenal went into recess late last year.

But Baker said he intends to go to Moscow to broaden the U.S.-Soviet agenda, seeking to focus on regional conflicts; the proliferation of ballistic missiles and chemical weapons and other issues such as terrorism, the environment and drugs.

The secretary said it is too early to tell whether Gorbachev's "new thinking," known by the Russian name perestroika, will succeed or not.

And as Baker challenged the Soviets to do more, he offered no specific U.S. measures to encourage Soviet concessions.

Sanctions for chemical arms gain support

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Bush administration, reversing previous U.S. policy, said Thursday it would support legislation providing for sanctions against countries and companies that sell or use chemical weapons, provided the president is given discretion to implement such measures.

The decision, announced by Assistant Secretary of State Allen Holmes to the House Foreign Affairs Committee, was viewed as a desire to influence a handful of sanctions bills that appear to stand a good chance.

It also reflected the conciliatory tone adopted by the new administration toward Congress on foreign policy issues such as the agreement reached between the White House and Congress last month for aid to the Nicaraguan Contra rebels.

"We welcome the opportunity to work with Congress to strengthen our tools for combating CW chemical weapons proliferation," Holmes said. "In doing so, we accept in principle that some form of sanctions, if appropriately formulated, would give the administration an additional instrument against countries that use CW and companies that aid proliferation."

The president already has open to him sanctions he can invoke.

Iowa repair gauged

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Defense Department, in an assessment of damage on the battleship Iowa, said Thursday repairs would be required for \$15 million to \$20 million.

Dan Howard, the Pentagon's chief spokesman, said no decision had been made to proceed with repairs because the dollar estimate was sufficiently low that cost was unlikely to be a factor.

A more important question, Howard said, is likely to be whether the ship should be withdrawn from duty immediately without repairs, or allowed to proceed with routine deployment until its next regularly scheduled overhaul. Howard disclosed earlier this week that a team of Navy specialists had determined the materials and expertise were still available to make repairs.

Gap widens between richest, poorest cities

WASHINGTON (AP) — The gap between the nation's richest and poorest cities widened in 1987 as the poor Connecticut suburbs of New York stayed atop the per capita personal income list while Texas towns along the Mexican border remained last, the government reported Thursday.

In a report on 1987 personal income in the nation's 318 metropolitan regions, first place belonged to the Bridgeport-Stamford-Norwalk-Danbury area of Connecticut, with per capita income of \$26,316, the Commerce Department said.

Bringing up the rear was the McAllen-Edinburg-Mission area of Texas, with per capita income of \$7,001.

The first and last areas were the same as in 1986, but the gap between them grew as the 9.1 percent rate of per capita income growth in the Bridgeport area more than doubled the 4.2 percent pace in the McAllen region.

The per capita income gap between the two regions was \$19,315 in 1987, up from \$17,412 a year earlier.

For the nation as a whole, per capita income rose 6 percent in 1987 to \$16,484, according to the report by the department's Bureau of Economic Analysis.

The study showed income in America's cities advancing at an uneven pace — growing fastest in communities along the East Coast with slow-growth areas concentrated in the oil-producing states.

The fastest growth rate was recorded in the Visalia-Tulare-Porterville region of California, where per capita income rose 9.7 percent to \$12,968, a level still well below the national average.

At the other end of the scale, two regions registered declines in 1987: per capita income fell 1.4 percent in Flint, Mich., to \$14,723, and dropped 0.6 percent in Lafayette, La., to \$12,363.

Fear forces more cooperation by countries, says drug official

WASHINGTON (AP) — Foreign governments are increasing their cooperation in the war on drugs because they fear they could be wracked by drug-related violence, a federal drug official said Thursday.

Columbia has documented 3,245 drug-related murders in the past couple of years, including an attorney general, judges, prosecutors and journalists — who took positions against the drug traffickers, said David Westrate, the Drug Enforcement Administration's head of enforcement.

"The intimidation we're talking about is not just against judges and prosecutors or agents," he told reporters. "I think the whole structure of society is potentially at risk here."

Despite his assessment that "we are out of time on cocaine, we have flat run out of time," Westrate said international cooperation is "one of the few hopeful signs in the drug war."

He said the International Drug Enforcement Conference met last week for the seventh year in a row and officials involved with it are working hard — talking tough stuff — The Mexican government, which in the past had stymied investigations of drug trafficking as well as the 1985 slaying of DEA agent Enrique Camarena, got some praise from Westrate for "making good, solid progress."

A lot of people wonder why that is, he said. "My personal view of why that is that Mexico, as well as other nations, have convinced themselves they have the potential to be like Colombia in the violence and the intimidation of their established systems."

"I submit to you that the United States is not immune from that either," he said. "I think there's the same potential in the United States for violence against our officials in the judiciary and so on if this contin-

ues in the same direction that it's currently going."

The Mexican government's increased interest in cracking down on the drug traffickers stems from ceaseless efforts to curtail the flow of cocaine through the Bahamas, which has driven the flow to Mexico, he said.

Where all cocaine entering the United States used to come through the Caribbean to southern Florida, interdiction efforts there have resulted in one-third of it coming through Mexico, he said.

That has driven a marriage between the traditional Mexican trafficking groups and the Colombian trafficking groups, Westrate said.

He said one reflection of Mexican increased concern is the arrest April 9 of Miguel Angel Felix Gallardo, 43, that country's reputed drug kingpin, and seizure of his assets.

European countries are becoming more concerned about cocaine.

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Under perestroika, Soviets facing shortages of many goods

MOSCOW (AP) — In the town of Kimry, soap ridding began in April, limiting each man and woman to one bar of household soap and 1 1/2 pounds of bath soap in local shops. Not each week or month, but each year.

The residents of Ufa, a city of 1-million people in the Urals, are lounding up on salt and matches due to rumors of pending shortages.

Signs rationing went into effect in Moscow on May 1 for the first time since World War II, and even the Soviet minister of trade,

Kondrat Terekh, has been issued a card entitling him to 3.4 pounds of sugar per month and no more.

Those tales of consumer woe, and more, were cited in state-run newspapers Thursday, along with an unpublished complaint in the weekly Moscow News that the Soviet retail trade system, caught between President Mikhail S. Gorbachev's reforms and old iron-fisted bureaucratic habits, is literally breaking apart before our very eyes.

Far from causing store shelves to brim

with goods, Gorbachev's campaign for "perestroika," or economic and social renewal, coincides with shortages in the consumer sector nationwide, and some Soviets say the shortages, now in their fifth year, are the direct cause. Others blame bureaucrats hostile to Gorbachev and his reform drive.

"The feeling is such that under cover of the words 'the inescapable difficulties of perestroika,' shortages are being created deliberately to indoctrinate this: perestroika on the one hand brings glasnost, which you

can't put into tea, and on the other hand, a real worsening in the conditions of life," wrote Georgy Afanasyev in this week's Moscow News.

"In a word, they're telling us: choose either the old order, with tea and sugar, or perestroika and just boiled water with glasnost," Afanasyev said. He opted for water and glasnost, saying the Kremlin's openness policy was a precondition for manufacturing enough tea, sugar and everything else to meet demand.

In a speech last week to the Communist

Party's policy-making Central Committee, Gorbachev acknowledged his reforms had failed to improve the average citizen's economic lot, and admitted what most shoppers already know from bitter experience: Shortages of consumer goods are not shrinking under perestroika, but growing.

"The food problem is far from solved," Gorbachev said on April 25. "The housing problem is acute. There is a dearth of consumer goods in the shops. The list of shortages is growing."

Riot police stop rally by workers

MASAN, South Korea (AP) — Thousands of riot police blocked an anti-government rally Thursday, the day after six of their comrades were killed and the president threatened to use emergency powers against violent protest.

About 8,000 riot officers moved into the downtown area of this strike-bound port, arresting 433 workers and students to thwart a rally called by labor groups to denounce President Roh Tae-won's government.

Police armed with shields and clubs guarded factories and patrolled streets, dispersing onlookers and keeping the area clear. Officials said 800 people tried to reach the rally at Masan, 185 miles southeast of Seoul, were turned back at roadblocks.

About 50 students held a brief protest in the heart of Masan, chanting slogans, but fled when riot squads arrived. An estimated 4,000 workers who could not get to the rally site conducted peaceful demonstrations at their plants.

"How can we march for our rights when there are so many police?" one dissident leader said, on condition of anonymity.

In Seoul, a 24-year-old union leader at a garment factory doused himself with kerosene and set himself afire to protest poor working conditions, news reports said. He was in critical condition and a fellow worker whose clothing, accidentally caught fire, also was hospitalized, the reports said.

Many riot officers in Masan wore black mourning ribbons for the comrades killed Wednesday in nearby Pusan, South Korea's second-largest city, when police raided a college trying to rescue five police officers being held hostage.

The officers were climbing a barricade when radical students set it afire, police said. The hostages were freed later.

Korean vessels avert seizure

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — South Korean navy ships on Thursday foiled an apparent North Korean attempt to seize a South Korean fishing boat near the western sea border, the Defense Ministry said.

A North Korean naval craft tried to seize the 23-ton Samjin-ho operating in the area, the ministry said.

The North Korean ship retreated to the north when South Korean navy ships chased it, the ministry said.

North Korea has seized South Korean fishing boats near the western sea border, but returned most of them.

North Korea's Korean Central News Agency accused South Korea of sending a warship into North Korean waters off the west coast, but said it fled south when a North Korean patrol boat arrived at the scene.

Report says Israeli troops broke rules

JERUSALEM (AP) — Israeli troops violated regulations and engaged in excessive use of fire in a raid on a West Bank village last month that left five Palestinians dead, according to an army investigation released Thursday.

The report calls for a police inquiry to determine if criminal charges should be filed against seven paramilitary Border Police involved in the incident in the village of Nahalin near Bethlehem, said army spokesman Lt. Col. Raanan Givon.

It also recommends that two Border Police commanders and one army commander be transferred from the occupied territories.

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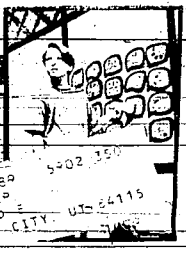


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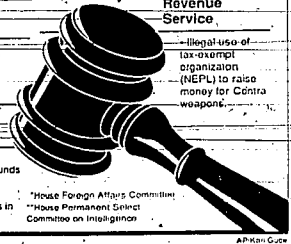

WASHINGTON — Oliver L. North, the Marine at the shadowy center of the Reagan administration's secret effort to arm the Nicaraguan Contras, was acquitted Thursday of altering and shredding documents and of two other charges in the Iran-Contra affair.

He was acquitted on nine other counts.

North said he would appeal the jury's decision. "We're absolutely confident of the outcome. As a Marine, I was taught to fight and fight hard for as long as it takes to prevail."

"We will continue this battle... and we will be fully vindicated," he told reporters in a statement at the lawyer's office. He did not take questions.

The retired Marine lieutenant colonel, who faces up to 10 years in prison on the convictions, listened to the verdict without any show of emotion. Jurors said he was guilty of illegally changing and destroying documents, accepting an illegal gratuity — a \$13,800 home security system — and one count of aiding and abetting in an obstruction of Congress.

One juror said the 12 days of deliberations had included a lot of hickering and arguing, and that the conviction votes came Thursday

after a fellow juror offered a strong prayer. North had admitted in court that he misled members of Congress about his Iran-Contra activities.

But said he had done so at the direction of superiors.

He was acquitted of five other charges of lying to or obstructing Congress, of two counts of lying to the Attorney General, Edwin Meese III, and obstructing Meese's inquiry into the affair, of converting traveler's checks to his own use and of conspiring to defraud the Internal Revenue Service by using a tax-exempt foundation to raise funds.

Bush denies taking any part in aid deal with Honduras

WASHINGTON — President Bush denied emphatically Thursday that he took part in any scheme to swap U.S. aid for Honduran assistance to the Nicaraguan rebels, saying he "wanted an end to needless, mindless speculation" about his role.

"The word of the president of the United States — George Bush — is, there was no quid pro quo," he declared moments before a federal jury convicted him. White House aide Oliver North on three criminal charges in connection with the Iran-Contra affair.

Speaking of a meeting he had as vice president in the spring of 1985 with then-Honduran President Roberto Suazo, Bush said, "The records of the meeting demonstrate there was no quid pro quo."

Bush had said several times in recent weeks that he would wait the conclusion of North's trial before commenting on a definitive comment on questions that have arisen in connection with that meeting.

But on Thursday, standing alongside visiting Canadian Prime Minister Brian Mulroney, Bush seemed eager to talk about recently disclosed documents that placed him at a meeting with Suazo, in Honduras, at a time when internal Reagan administration memos suggested a plan to link continuing U.S. aid to Latin American countries to their willingness to help the Contra rebels.

The so-called "findings of fact," a 42-page document presented in the North trial in early April, suggested that Bush as vice president had played a role as an intermediary in assuring Suazo that the country's assistance to the Contras would be rewarded with expedited U.S. financial aid. However, the document did not say directly that Bush discussed the deal with Suazo.

"It did say that Bush explained to the Hondurans that they were to receive a great deal more U.S. aid and that that statement was a part of the purported quid pro quo policy of the administration at that time."

Mapmaking Magellan spacecraft streaking on its way to Venus

at 7:01 p.m. MDT and drifted into space.

"Magellan is deployed," reported shuttle commander David Walker.

An-hour later, Atlantis moved a safe distance away, both stages of a spacecraft motor fired to start Magellan on a 456-day journey to Venus, 258 million miles away. It will travel 806 million miles, looping 11 times around the sun, before reaching and orbiting its target in August 1990.

"While it's too early to tell about the major portion of Magellan's mission, we're pleased it's gone so well so far," Walker replied when told both stages had fired.

Mission specialists Mark Lee and Mary Cleaver, operating remote controls inside the probe cabin, checked the health of the spacecraft before sending a signal that spring-ejected it into its own orbit while Atlantis soared over the Pacific Ocean 600 miles southwest of Los Angeles.

"It's time to let Magellan spread its wings," a spacecraft controller on the ground said in congratulating the astronauts the go-ahead to deploy the probe.

Magellan, the first planetary craft ever launched from a shuttle, is to map up to 90 percent of Venus' cloud-shrouded surface. Its high-resolution radar system is expected to produce images of objects as small as a football field — 10 times the clarity of any previous pictures of the mysterious planet.

The release of Magellan, the main task of the four-day flight, came a little more than six hours after Atlantis thundered into orbit 184 miles high.

The launch was delayed 59 minutes by shifting clouds and winds that had threatened the second post-ponement in six days. When Atlantis finally left its pad, just five minutes remained in the launch window dictated by the need to have the shuttle in the proper position to dispatch Magellan to Venus.

Koop's decision was not unexpected, although some critics had anticipated. He had informed President Bush in a Feb. 15 letter that he did not intend to serve his full term, which was scheduled to end in November.

Dr. James O. Mason, assistant secretary for health, is expected to name an acting surgeon general until a permanent successor is found.

There was no immediate word about who would replace Koop, but a White House source said that Bush administration officials are looking for an anti-abortion person to fill that position. It's a litmus test. The president couldn't take the heat if he appointed anybody pro-choice. But Dr. Koop was anti-abortion and he took the job and turned out to be very, very fair."

Health and Human Services Secretary Louis W. Sullivan Thursday praised Koop in a letter, saying that he has been "a voice of honesty, integrity, compassion and plain good sense."

Traditionally, the surgeon general has been a figurehead, with few responsibilities other than to issue an annual report on smoking, which began in 1964 with the first major indictment against cigarettes.

"But Koop, 72, who has held the post since November 1981, revolutionized the office with his vigorous crusade against smoking and his willingness to talk frankly about AIDS, often clashing with the Reagan administration in the process."

As the country's top doctor, he transformed the public debate on AIDS and angered fellow conservatives by advocating early AIDS' seriation and the use of condoms to prevent the spread of the virus. He also urged compassion for people with AIDS, the majority of whom in the United States are homosexual men.

House, Senate pass \$1.2 trillion budgets

WASHINGTON — The House and Senate approved on Thursday \$1.2 trillion budgets which uphold President Bush's budget-cutting program without raising spending or significantly cutting taxes.

Each chamber rejected several attempts to overturn the spending policy in fiscal 1990 and then ratified the package strongly in their final votes.

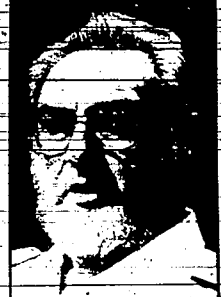
The House approved its plan 268-167, after budget committee chairmen Leon Bantam, D-Ill., and Dan Rostenkowski, D-Ill., said it was the only choice for us to fulfill our budget responsibilities and avoid crisis.

The Senate then passed the version, 68-31, after some minor tinkering and much grumbling that the deficit reduction in it was inadequate.

Both chambers on Thursday overwhelmingly rejected more ambitious proposals to "freeze" government spending and cut further into the deficit.

The House also soundly defeated a proposal to cut red ink by taxing imported oil, a day after the Senate went on record against a gasoline tax boost.

As laid out by the White House agreement, the budgets claim to be the only choice for us to fulfill our budget responsibilities and avoid crisis, as required by the Gramm-Rudman law.

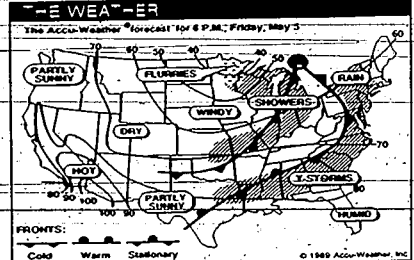

Poindexter, Fernandez next to face trial

WASHINGTON (AP) — Now that Oliver North's Iran-Contra trial is over, independent counsel Lawrence E. Walsh can focus on trying the next major case, against North's former boss John M. Poindexter.

Poindexter, who was national security adviser to President Reagan, not only is charged with obstructing congressional inquiries into the Iran-Contra affair, he also faces the central conspiracy counts that were dropped against North, when the Bush administration refused to disclose secret documents needed by the defense.

Because Poindexter, unlike North, had daily contact with Reagan, his trial could shed new light on how closely the former president might have been involved in the secret plans to sell arms to Iran, and to keep the Contra-going after official U.S. aid was banned.

The case against Poindexter is expected to go to trial in September.

Before then, a lower-ranking figure in the affair, former CIA agent Joseph F. Fernandez, is to go to trial July 10.

Fernandez has pleaded innocent to four charges that he lied and obstructed investigations by the presidential commission headed by former Sen. John Tower and by the CIA's inspector general.

The former CIA station chief in Costa Rica is accused of lying about his role in setting up an

shipment in Costa Rica as part of the Reagan administration's effort to help the Nicaraguan rebels at a time when official U.S. aid was banned.

As for Poindexter, Walsh has expressed determination to press forward against him with charges that were dropped against North: That the two men and arms dealers Albert Hakim and Richard V. Secord conspired to divert \$15 million in U.S. arms-sale profits to the Nicaraguan rebels.

The independent counsel told U.S. District Judge Aubrey E. Robinson Jr. that release of secret documents during North's trial — and a softening of the intelligence agencies' opposition to proceed with those charges against Poindexter — Walsh also said that some of the most sensitive documents a judge ruled were needed in North's trial were not relevant to Poindexter's case.

Many of the documents the government kept out of North's trial dealt with covert operations to free U.S. hostages in the Middle East and other secret activities in Central America.

As a participant in covert operations, North per-

suaded U.S. District Judge Gerhard A. Gesell that he needed the material to help his defense. When it was kept secret, the conspiracy charges against North were dropped.

But Walsh is expected to argue that since Poindexter was not a participant in covert operations, he is not entitled to use the same documents to defend the charges that he was a participant in a conspiracy to defraud the U.S. government of arms-sale profits.

Since North testified that Poindexter knew of his role in the Iran-Contra affair, prosecutors may force the former National Security Council aide to testify against his former boss.

A judge could order North to testify against Poindexter on condition that his testimony not be used as evidence against him if he is granted a new trial by an appellate court.

Poindexter, 52, is also charged with obstructing 1985 investigations of the House and Senate intelligence committees into the Iran-Contra affair. The charges include allegations he helped prepare a false chronology of the U.S. Iran arms deals and destroyed computerized files he kept at the NSC.

The severest charges against Poindexter each carry five-year prison terms and \$250,000 fines.

After Poindexter's trial, Walsh's office plans to proceed with the charges against Hakim and Secord, also scheduled to be tried separately.

Conviction costs North his Marine pension

WASHINGTON (AP) — Oliver North lost his pension as a retired Marine officer when he was convicted Thursday and he won't get it back unless the verdict is overturned on appeal, a Pentagon spokeswoman said.

North, who retired as a lieutenant colonel in the Marine Corps with 20 years of active-duty service, has been drawing an annual military pension of roughly \$23,100 since leaving the corps almost a year ago.

At the time of his retirement, North said he was leaving the service in order to better prepare his defense against charges of misconduct stemming from the Iran-Contra affair.

North had been receiving his pension since he retired, said Army Lt. Col. Linda Dumoulin, a Pentagon spokeswoman.

But once the conviction becomes

legally effective — when the secretary of the Navy is formally notified of it and the paperwork is completed — North will lose his pension, she said.

Once the conviction goes into effect, whatever time that is, he loses his retired pay. I don't know exactly what time it takes effect, whether it's today or tomorrow, or whatever," she said.

If North wins on appeal, he will get the pension back and will be given pay retroactively, she said.

Under federal law, a retired officer's pension is not jeopardized by just any felony conviction. Rather, it depends upon "the nature of the specific charge."

And according to Lt. Col. Fred Peck, a Marine Corps spokesman, only one of the charges on which North was convicted can result in loss of his pension — the charge of destroying NSC records.

Honduras documents new target

WASHINGTON (AP) — In a spin-off from the trial of Oliver North, the House Intelligence Committee on Thursday began investigating why Congress did not get White House documents on a secret deal with Honduras to aid the Nicaraguan Contras.

The committee's investigation is in response to a request from Rep. Lee Hamilton, D-Ind., who was chairman of the House committee that investigated the Iran-Contra affair in 1987. It is similar to an investigation being carried out by the Senate Intelligence Committee.

Documents that surfaced at the North trial show that President Reagan approved a deal in which the United States would expedite economic and military aid to Honduras in return for that country's continued help for the Contras, who were encamped just inside Honduras along the border with Nicaragua.

The documents, together with testimony during North's trial, suggest that senior officials up to and including Reagan, and then vice president George Bush were more involved in the affair than the congressional committees knew.

The situation has been further clouded by administration contentions that there was no quid pro quo deal with Honduras to aid the Contras, an action that would have been illegal at the time because of congressional prohibitions.

Bush himself repeated the assertion Thursday, giving reporters "the word of the president of the United States" that there was no quid pro quo and promising to turn over to Congress records of his 1985 meeting with the Honduran president.

These assertions conflict directly with the documentary evidence, which shows there not only was such a plan but that it apparently was carried out.

The White House has offered to make available to Congress former White House counsel Arthur B. Culvahouse Jr., who overaw "the agreement," search for the congressional Iran-Contra committees and gave assurances that all relevant documents had been provided.

At the same time, Rep. David Obey, D-Wis., said he would hold up U.S. aid to Central America until the Bush administration answers questions raised by the North trial documents.

"I do have an obligation to get those answers before we provide any additional assistance to the same countries," said Obey, chairman of the House Appropriations foreign operations subcommittee.

The North documents would seem to lend to some very troubling conclusions about the use of foreign aid to persuade aid recipients to provide foreign aid to the Contras at a time when providing aid to the Contras was against official American government policy, Obey said.

Court must remain impartial despite public pressure

The U.S. Supreme Court heard arguments last week on the constitutionality of the controversial *Roe v. Wade* abortion decision. Though most oral arguments go unnoticed outside the legal community, these did not. Last month, hundreds of thousands of supporters of the decision marched in front of the Supreme Court building in Washington. The court has received thousands of letters daily on the issue and is being drawn into the political fray in a way that it has assiduously avoided in the past.

The judiciary is not like other political institutions. In the Federalist Papers, Alexander Hamilton characterized it as the least dangerous of the three branches — it possesses neither the power of the purse nor the power of the sword. The judiciary's power is largely one of persuasion, and it rests tenuously on another court, the court of public opinion. The public must believe that the Supreme Court is above politics to give it the respect it demands as the final arbiter in a highly litigious society.

Though the court does consider election returns and cannot be far removed from the public's will, such interest must not be overblown. Otherwise, the judiciary cannot win support for decisions that apparently court the public will. As one check on a tyrannical majority, the court must be able to promote minority rights while retaining majority approval. It is not an easy task. The process becomes unbalanced when advocates for various causes believe they can lobby the court.

Why has the Supreme Court become perceived as a largely political institution susceptible to public lobbying campaigns? One answer lies in the court's involvement in social-policy issues that engender intense emotional reactions from the public. However, the court for several decades has been handling such issues, once led largely to the states.

More recently, the court has become a political football in presidential campaigns. Democratic candidates Walter F. Mondale and Michael Dukakis both used the issue of Supreme Court appointments and philosophy in their campaign rhetoric.

But the justices themselves have unwittingly contributed to the court's predicament, by voluntarily entering the political battlefield.

William J. Brennan Jr. stepped out of the judicial chambers a few years ago to engage Attorney General Edwin Meese III in a colloquy on interpreting the Constitution. Harry A. Blackmun entered the 1988 presidential campaign debate by predicting that a victory by George Bush would have negative effects on the judiciary.

William H. Rehnquist recently held a news conference, the first by a sitting chief justice not retiring. He supported pay raises for federal judges in the wake of a bitter public controversy over congressional pay.

Some justices, such as Thurgood P. Marshall and Blackmun, have used speeches and interviews to reveal the court's internal difficulties.

Though the justices may contend such behavior is within their First Amendment rights, the court must be prepared for the consequences. Justices who remove their robes occasionally to do political battle cannot expect their subsequent behavior on and off the bench to escape a new scrutiny.

Justices who attempt to humanize the court with books and speeches on life in the marble temple must be prepared for greater press and public attention to their personal lives and temperaments and an increased

tendency to ascribe court decisions to these causes.

Interested parties in court cases will continue that lobbying and pressure tactics are effective because the justices, like all politicians, can be swayed.

What happens when the one remaining body that is supposed to be aloof from such concerns is treated by press and public as just another political institution? How can decisions by such a body be treated with respect, particularly by a public jaded by scandal in the other branches of national government?

Recently, the justices have even considered expanding their public visibility by becoming a regular feature on C-SPAN television. Last fall, three justices experimented with televising oral arguments. Television news may thereby get the visuals for a good story but it is difficult to see how greater accessibility to TV will enhance public respect for the Supreme Court.

Advanced communications technology has drawn national government closer to the citizen. Today government is more accessible to the public than ever before. The Supreme Court, however, should resist the pull of greater democratization, for its own sake as well as the nation's.

Chinese demonstrations continue May 4th tradition

The student demonstrations that erupted last month in China are a symbol of democracy, are in the Chinese tradition.

The first student demonstration in modern times occurred 70 years ago Thursday. Then, as in April, 1989, the students gathered in front of their campus to Tian An Men Square to demonstrate against the government and demand democracy and science. April's rally put less emphasis on science, which the government already supports, and more emphasis on demands for freedom of speech, rule of law, and of corruption and organizations and publications.

The May 4th movement became a turning point in Chinese history. It marked the overthrow of the warlord government and rejection of Confucian ideology, which had dominated China for more than 2,000 years. Whereas the May 4th Movement challenged Confucianism, the 1949 Communist revolution challenged Marxism-Leninism and the Commu-

nist Party that have dominated since 1949. Like the May 4th Movement, the April demonstration was well-organized, starting in Beijing and spreading to universities throughout China. That the students were able to conduct their protests of more than 100,000, facing off against policemen and military men without any major incident, shows the degree of organizational skill that they must have learned from their party elders, the very people they have turned against.

Like their May 4th predecessors, the students, following the demonstration, have boycotted classes and mobilized support to their cause from other groups — the middle class, workers and peasants. In modern times, student movements have been successful when they have gained wider social support. There is evidence that members of the emerging middle-class entrepreneurial class that has been spawned by Deng Xi-

ning's economic reforms has helped the students morally and financially. Workers on fixed incomes who have been hurt by inflation, also caused by the reforms, have joined in the demonstrations, though their concerns are more economic than political.

The May 4th Movement was able to take place and expand because the warlord government was relatively weak. By contrast, China's current government can act decisively if it wishes. It is ironic that one reason the party leaders purged Hu as the general secretary in January 1987 was because he had refused to support the student demonstrations for democracy in December 1986. Yet the same leaders have shown restraint this time.

In part, the leadership is divided and uncertain about what to do. Accelerating inflation, blatant corruption of officials and their children and the people's general discontent have created a potentially explosive situation, which the leaders fear may erupt into chaos if they crack down.

The memory of repression and anarchy of the Cultural Revolution, in which these leaders were among the victims, also is a limiting factor. Perhaps most important, unlike the regimes of the warlords, Deng Xiaoping and Mao Tse-tung, the Chinese regime has been reluctant to use violence to suppress political demonstrations.

An anti-war restraint is China's concern with its image in the outside world. During the Cultural Revolution, China did not care about its image abroad. But today it does because it wants foreign capital, technology and help with its modernization. It also cares about its image in the communist world, in which it sees itself in competition with the Soviet Union in developing the most effective model for reform. Although China has stressed economic rather than political reform, it too has accepted the need for the latter. A bloody repression of students demanding democracy at the time Mikhail S. Gorbachev's visit is imminent could be embarrassing.

Both the May 4, 1919, and April 1989 demonstrations occurred in a pluralistic intellectual atmosphere in which many ideas from abroad were vigorously and publicly debated. Many of the students' teachers and intellectual elders had written about and openly advocated the democratic rights for which the students demonstrated. In the two months preceding the April demonstration, nearly 100 of China's most prominent intellectuals had organized a petition to the government demanding the release of political prisoners and democratic reforms. This was the first time since 1949 that intellectuals had organized publicly for political purposes.

An important difference, however, between the two movements, is that they took place in different contexts. The May 4th occurred two years after the Russian Revolution, when it appeared that the Bolsheviks with their Marxist-Leninist ideology had found a way to modernize a backward country quickly. Its model and ideology became the inspiration for many of the participants of the May 4th Movement — among them Mao — who were to establish the Chinese Communist Party and eventually lead it to power.

The participants in the April demonstration specifically reject that model and ideology as a failure and the idea of human rights as evolved in the West. However just as the Chinese transformed Buddhism or Marxism-Leninism brought in from abroad, whatever they take from abroad today will be combined with aspects of their own tradition and society.

This year is also the 40th anniversary of the Chinese Communist revolution. Will 1989 mark a comparable turning point in Chinese history?

U.S. makes challenge to Soviets

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of State James A. Baker III challenged the Soviet Union on Thursday to fulfill Mikhail Gorbachev's promise of reform, saying the administration intends "to test the application of Soviet new thinking" again and again.

Baker's outline of U.S. policy toward the Soviet Union comes as he prepares to leave Monday on a five-day trip that includes his first Moscow meeting with Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev.

It also occurs during a crisis within the NATO alliance as the United States is struggling with its ability to fund a strategy to deal with Gorbachev's troop reduction and arms control initiatives.

The secretary's remarks — the result of a long-awaited review of U.S. Soviet policy undertaken since President Ronald Reagan's office more than three months ago — were contained in a speech prepared for delivery to members of the Center for Strategic and International Studies, a Washington think tank.

While applauding such moves such as the withdrawal of troops from Afghanistan and the agreement banning all U.S. and Soviet intermediate-range nuclear missiles in Europe, Baker complained that Soviet behavior still does not square with the slogans of perestroika.

The secretary said the United States intends to build on the progress made in the human rights and arms control arenas, in particular suggesting a date for the continuation of the strategic arms talks. "The talks dealing with the most dangerous weapons in the U.S. and Soviet arsenal went into recess late last year.

Sanctions for chemical arms gain support

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Bush administration reversing previous U.S. policy, said Thursday, it would support legislation providing for sanctions against countries and companies that sell or use chemical weapons provided the president is given discretion to implement such measures.

The decision, announced by Assistant Secretary of State Allen Holmes to the House Foreign Affairs Committee, was viewed as a desire to influence a handful of senators, but that appears to stand a good chance.

It also reflected the conciliatory tone adopted by the new administration toward Congress on foreign policy issues such as the agreement reached between the White House and Congress last month for aid to the Nicaraguan Contra rebels.

"We welcome the opportunity to work with Congress to strengthen our tools for combating CW (chemical weapons) proliferation," Holmes said. "In doing so, we accept the principle that some form of sanctions, if appropriately formulated, would give the administration an additional instrument against countries that use CW and companies that aid proliferation."

Iowa repair gauged

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Defense Department, in an assessment of damage on the battleship Iowa, said Thursday that the Navy believes the damaged gun turret can be repaired for \$15 million to \$20 million.

Dan Howard, the Pentagon's chief spokesman, said no decision had yet been made to proceed with repairs but that the dollar estimate was sufficiently low that cost was unlikely to be a more important question.

Howard said it is likely to be whether the ship should be withdrawn from duty immediately, for repairs, or allowed to proceed with routine maintenance until its next regularly scheduled overhaul. Howard disclosed earlier this week that a team of Navy specialists had determined the materials and expertise were still available to make repairs.

Gap widens between richest, poorest cities

WASHINGTON (AP) — The gap between the nation's richest and poorest cities widened in 1987 as the post-Connecticut suburbs of New York state atop the per capita personal income list while Texas towns along the Mexican border remained last, the government reported Thursday.

In a report on 1987 personal income in the nation's 318 metropolitan regions, first place belonged to the Bridgeport-Stamford-Norwalk-Danbury area of Connecticut, with per capita income of \$26,316; the Commerce Department said.

Bringing up the rear was the McAllen-Edinburg-Mission area of Texas, with per capita income of \$7,001.

The first and last areas were the same as in 1986, but the gap between them grew as the 9.1 percent rate of per capita income growth in the Bridgeport area more than doubled the 4.2 percent pace in the McAllen region.

The per capita income gap between the two regions was \$19,316 in 1987, up from \$17,412 a year earlier.

For the nation as a whole, per capita income rose 6 percent in 1987 to \$15,484, according to the report by the department's Bureau of Economic Analysis.

The study showed income in America's cities advancing at an uneven pace — growing fastest in communities along the East Coast with slow-growth areas concentrated in the oil-producing states.

The fastest growth rate was recorded in the Visalia-Tulare-Porterville region of California, where per capita income rose 9.7 percent to \$12,968, a level still well below the national average.

At the other end of the scale, two regions registered declines in 1987 — per capita income fell 1.4 percent in Flint, Mich., to \$14,723, and dropped 0.6 percent in Lafayette, La., to \$12,363.

Fear forces more cooperation by countries, says drug official

WASHINGTON (AP) — Foreign governments are increasing their cooperation in the war on drugs because they fear they could become wracked by drug-related violence, as Colombia has been in recent years, a federal drug official said Thursday.

Colombia has documented 3,245 drug-related murders in the past couple of years, including an attorney general, judges, prosecutors and journalists who took positions against the drug traffickers, said David Westrate, the Drug Enforcement Administration's head of enforcement.

"The intimidation we're talking about is not just against judges and prosecutors or against," he told reporters. "I think the whole structure of society is potentially at risk here."

Despite his assessment that war are out of time on cocaine we have flat run out of time," Westrate said international cooperation is one of the few hopeful signs in the drug war.

He said the International Drug Enforcement Conference met last week for the seventh year in a row and officials involved with it are working hard... talking tough stuff.

"The Mexican government, which in the past had stymied investigations of drug trafficking, as well as the 1985 slaying of DEA agent Enrique Camarena, got some praise from Westrate for 'making good' on progress."

"A lot of people wonder why that is," he said. "My personal view of why that is is that Mexico, as well as other nations, have convinced themselves they have the potential to be like Colombia in the violence and the intimidation of their established systems."

"I submit to you that the United States is not immune from that either," he said. "I think there's the same potential in the United States for violence against our officials in the judiciary and so on if this contin-

ues in the same direction that it's currently going."

The Mexican government increased interest in cracking down on the drug traffickers since their successful efforts to curtail the flow of cocaine through the Bahamas, which has driven the flow to Mexico, he said.

Where all cocaine entering the United States used to come through the Caribbean to southern Florida, interdiction efforts there have resulted in one-third of it coming through Mexico, he said.

"That has driven a marriage between the traditional Mexican trafficking groups and the Colombian trafficking groups," Westrate said.

He said one reflection of Mexico's increased concern is its arrest April 8 of Miguel Angel Felix Galardo, 43, that country's reputed drug kingpin, and seizure of his assets.

Under perestroika, Soviets facing shortages of many goods

MOSCOW (AP) — In the town of Kimry, soap rationing began in April, limiting each man and woman to one bar of household soap and 1 1/2 pounds of bath soap in local shops. Not each week or month, but each year.

The residents of Ufa, a city of 1 million people in the Urals, are longing upon all-night matches due to rumors of pending shortages.

Sugar rationing went into effect in Moscow on May 1 for the first time since World War II, and even the Soviet minister of trade,

Kondrat Terekh, has been issued a card entitling him to 4.4 pounds of sugar per month and no more.

Those tales of consumer woe, and more, were cited in state-run newspapers Thursday, along with an anguished complaint in the weekly Moscow News that the Soviet retail trade system, caught between President Mikhail S. Gorbachev's reforms and old iron-fisted bureaucratic habits, is literally breaking apart before our very eyes.

Far from causing store shelves to brim

with goods, Gorbachev's campaign for perestroika, or economic and social renewal, coincides with shortages in the consumer sector nationwide, and some years are the direct cause. Others blame bureaucrats hostile to Gorbachev and his reform drive.

The feeling is such that under cover of the words "the insuperable difficulties of perestroika," shortages are being created deliberately to indoctrinate this perestroika on the one hand brings glasnost, which you

can't put into tea, and on the other hand, a real worsening in the conditions of life," wrote Georgy Afanasyev in this week's Moscow News.

In a word, they're telling us: choose either the old order, with tea and sugar, or perestroika and just boiled water with glasnost. Afanasyev said. He opted for water and glasnost, saying the Kremlin's openness policy was a precondition for manufacturing enough "tea, sugar and everything else" to meet demand.

In a speech last week to the Communist

Party's policy-making Central Committee, Gorbachev acknowledged his reforms had failed to improve the average citizen's economic lot, and admitted what most shoppers already know from bitter experience: Shortages of consumer goods are not shrinking under perestroika, but

growing.

"The food problem is far from solved," Gorbachev said on April 25. "The housing problem is acute. There is a dearth of consumer goods in the shops. The list of shortages is growing."

Riot police stop rally by workers

MASAN, South Korea (AP) — Thousands of riot police blocked an anti-government rally Thursday, the day after six of their comrades were killed and the president threatened to use emergency powers against violent protest.

About 8,000 riot officers moved into the downtown area of this strike-bound port, arresting 433 workers and students to thwart a rally called by labor groups to denounce President Roh Tae-woon's government.

Police armed with shields and clubs guarded factories and patrolled streets, dispersing onlookers and keeping the area clear. Officials said 800 people tried to reach the rally at Masan, 160 miles southeast of Seoul, were turned back at roadblocks.

About 50 students held a brief protest in the heart of Masan, chanting slogans, but fled when riot squads arrived. An estimated 4,000 workers who could not get to the rally site conducted peaceful demonstrations at their plants.

"How can we march for our rights when there are so many police?" one dissident leader said, on condition of anonymity.

In Seoul, a 24-year-old union leader at a garment factory doused himself with kerosene and set himself afire to protest poor working conditions, news reports said. He was in critical condition and a fellow worker whose clothing accidentally caught fire also was hospitalized, the reports said.

Many riot officers in Masan wore black mourning ribbons for the comrades killed Wednesday in nearby Pusan, South Korea's second-largest city, when police raided a college trying to rescue five police officers being held hostage.

The officers were climbing a barricade when radical students set it afire, police said. The hostages were freed later.

Korean vessels avert seizure

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — South Korean navy ships on Thursday foiled an apparent North Korean attempt to seize a South Korean fishing boat near the western sea border, the Defense Ministry said.

A North Korean naval craft tried to seize the 23-ton Sunjin-ho operating in the area, the ministry said.

The North Korean ship retreated to the north when South Korean navy ships chased it, the ministry said.

North Korea has seized South Korean fishing boats near the western sea border, but returned most of them.

North Korea's Korean Central News Agency accused South Korea of sending a warship into North Korean waters off the west coast, but said it fled south when a North Korean patrol boat arrived at the scene.

Report says Israeli troops broke rules

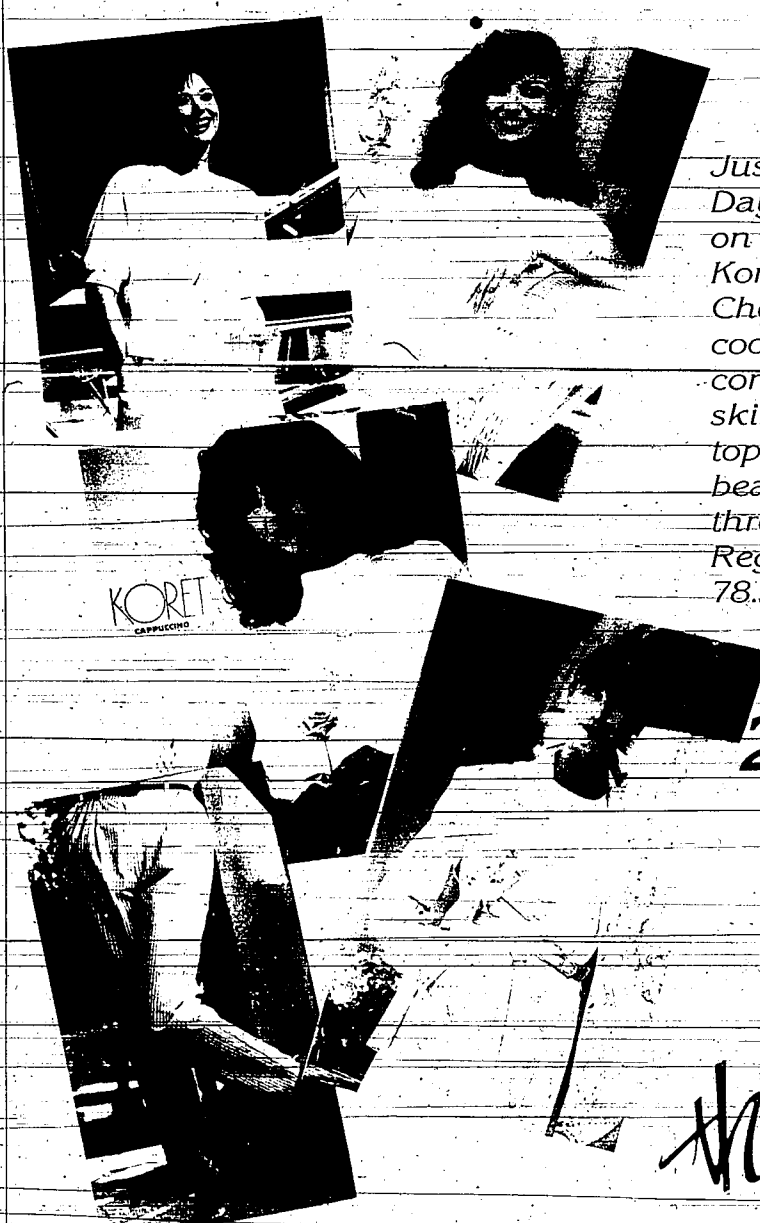
JERUSALEM (AP) — Israeli troops violated regulations and engaged in "excessive use of force" in a raid on a West Bank village last month that left five Palestinians dead, according to an army investigation released Thursday.

The report calls for a police inquiry to determine if criminal charges should be filed against reservists involved in the incident in the village of Nabalin near Bethlehem, said army spokesman Lt. Col. Ranan Ghislin.

It also recommends that two Border Police commanders and one army commander be transferred from the occupied territories.

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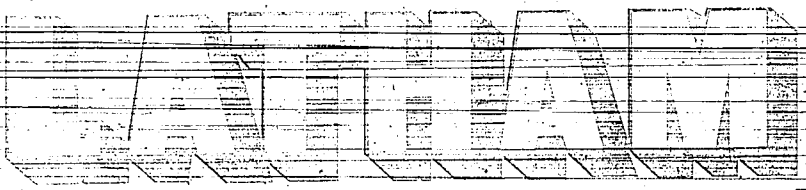

Forest Service will burn off debris with incendiary balls

TWIN FALLS — The U.S. Forest Service plans to drop flaming ping-pong balls to burn off 300 acres of logging debris this spring.

The Twin Falls District plans to burn about 250 acres to reduce fire hazard in the forest and to prepare forest-soil for new trees. Burn area are Eagle Springs, Waterfall Hollow, Bear Flat and Coal Pit.

The Burley District plans to burn about 50 acres in the Erie, Summit area. The projects will start as soon as weather permits.

The balls — not actually ping-pong balls, but similar plastic spheres — are filled with a chemical and a catalyst injected as they are dropped from a helicopter. The timed chemical reaction in the balls causes them to catch fire when they reach the ground.

The Twin Falls and Burley districts annually burn between 400 and 700 acres of logging debris.

Idaho Power asks to rebuild powerhouse at Swan Falls

BOISE — Idaho Power Co. has asked the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission for permission to rebuild the Swan Falls powerhouse and increase its operating capacity from 12 to 25 megawatts.

Swan Falls was the first power plant ever put into operation on the Snake River, Idaho Power said. It was built in 1901 by a predecessor company, Trade Dollar Consolidated Mining Co., to provide electricity for mining in the Silver City area.

FERC authorized the expansion when it renewed the power plant's license in 1982, but the company asked to have the upgrade delayed until closer to the time the additional energy was needed.

Idaho Power said recent studies indicated the structure should be rebuilt before long to maintain safety and operational standards. The upgrading will require no changes in the operation of the project or its reservoir.

Survey of teachers suggests discrimination, irregularities

TWIN FALLS — The results of a teachers union survey about discrimination and improper hiring practices are in, and Magic Valley school districts didn't pass with flying colors.

"Teachers do perceive there is a problem," said Terry Gilbert, Idaho Education Association Region IV Director.

The IEA, which sent surveys during February and March to 1,600 teachers, released some of the results of the 300 completed surveys Thursday.

Gilbert stressed that the IEA does not consider the survey scientific. He described

it as a "gathering of perceptions."

The survey asked teachers whether they had ever been discriminated against due to age, sex, religion, handicap, race, color or religion.

It also asked specific questions about school officials' discouraging IEA membership, and whether the teacher was aware of any irregularities in the hiring and promoting of personnel.

Although he said several "patterns" emerged from the survey, Twin Falls was the only district named specifically in the release.

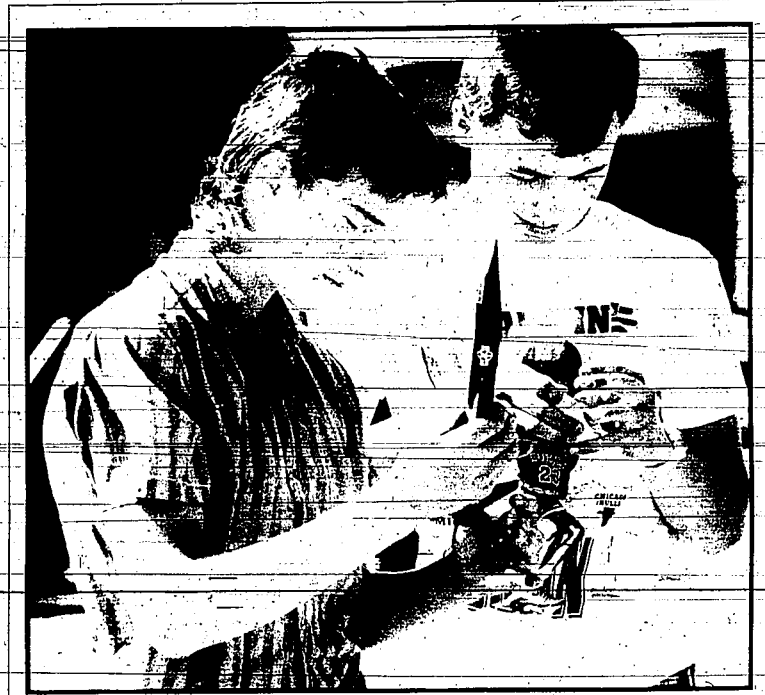
"We reported earlier that teachers perceive the Twin Falls District is actively discouraging teachers from joining the Association," something the survey bore out, Gilbert said.

He also said that he believes the problem is occurring "not at the building level but at central administration."

"I am not aware of anyone actually doing that," said Superintendent Earl Snow. "And I don't believe that's true because I don't think we care one way or another."

"In the recruiting process, I know that's not true," said Keith Farnsworth, the district personnel director. "That's a misconception on somebody's part because in the interview process we do not discourage

Blaine promoter denies securities fraud charges

HAILEY — A Blaine County oil and gas drilling promoter said there is no substance to a civil lawsuit filed against him and his business by Idaho's Department of Finance.

The suit, filed this week in 6th District Court in Hailey, alleges Lawrence W. McGary, Ketchum-based Shama Resources Limited Partnership and Ketchum-based Maranatha Management Corp. violated several sections of the Idaho Securities Law. McGary is general partner of Shama and president of Maranatha.

The suit, filed on behalf of the state Securities Bureau, claims the defendants engaged in stock and limited-partnership offerings without proper registration and lured investors in Idaho, Texas and Florida allegedly invested \$4 million.

Court papers also allege McGary, his partnership and corporation attempted to force limited partnership interests on creditors in exchange for the debts owed them by Shama.

The Department of Finance claims the defendants made fraudulent statements about shareholders and investors in a private offering memorandum. The lawsuit also claims the defendants misrepresented the financial condition of Shama.

McGary said he has not seen the court papers and has been advised by his lawyer not to discuss specific allegations with the press.

But McGary did say he contacted the state Securities Bureau approximately 10 days ago, after he learned his business was

Bank: Mushroom farm 'disastrous'

HAILEY — By the time Idaho First National Bank decided to put Bliss Valley Foods into default, the gourmet mushroom farm was a "disastrous company," the bank's Blue Lakes branch manager told jurors Thursday.

"They were pretty much upside-down," Bill Babcock said.

But Babcock testified later that he didn't tell investors that the farm was already in default when they questioned him over a second guarantee the bank asked them to sign.

He also said the mushroom farm did not ask prior to Oct. 15, 1985, to draw on its line of credit to fund the crucial second phase, which Thomas Walker Jr. and Robert Erkins, partners in the farm, and investors

have said was crucial to the farm's success.

"They have argued that the bank's failure to fund that second phase was the key reason the farm failed, but haven't specified when they asked for more money."

The lengthy, hotly-contested lawsuit pits Idaho First against 72 prominent Magic Valley residents who invested in the mushroom farm.

The investors' attorney Jack Gjording, asked Babcock about a conversation he had with three of the farm's investors in the fall of 1985, after the default notice had been sent. The bank was asking investors to sign an additional guarantee.

"Did you tell them about the default when they were sitting in your office?" asked Gjording.

"No, I didn't," Babcock said.

Idaho First, now named West One Bank, filed a foreclosure notice on Bliss Valley

Foods in March 1987. The bank claimed the farm did not keep \$750,000 in required working capital as part of a loan agreement. The loan was issued through Babcock's Blue Lakes branch.

Supreme Court hears Jerome case

TWIN FALLS — A Jerome inventor's lawyer pleaded with the state Supreme Court Thursday to allow his client's lawsuit against Motorola Communications and Electronics Inc. to go to court.

Actually, Michael J. Dahmer's case has already been before a few judges, and that's part of the problem. It's tangled in legal court systems for nearly three years, said Roger Dusberger, an Illinois-based lawyer who was one of the three attorneys representing Motorola on Thursday.

In arguing against Dahmer's appeal, Dusberger said the inventor's lawyer's delay in prosecuting their own case has been "excessive and inexcusable. Kent won't have to pay legal fees

BOISE — Arlo Kent of Twin Falls won his legal battle to avoid paying \$145,000 in legal fees for his 1987 attempt to stop construction of the Twin Falls County jail.

The Idaho Court of Appeals ruled unanimously on Thursday that because Judge Daniel McCall did not rule that Kent acted in bad faith in the lawsuit, legal fees cannot be awarded.

Kent, sued County Clerk Richard Pence and Prosecutor K. Ellen Baxter in 1987. This suit alleged that Pence committed or allowed numerous violations of Idaho election laws in a bid to force Pence to finance the jail, and that Baxter prosecutor wrongfully refused to force the clerk to comply with the laws.

He requested \$53,000 in damages; court records show the suit delayed the jail's construction for several months.

Commission: Prepare for chemical accidents

TWIN FALLS — Most Idaho communities are not prepared to deal with a serious chemical accident, according to an Idaho Emergency Response Commission staff member.

In December 1984 the accidental release of methyl isocyanide from a Union Carbide plant in Bhopal, India killed 3,000 people and injured more than 250,000.

A similar incident at a Union Carbide plant in the United States, though no one was injured, opened the eyes of the U.S. Congress and public interest groups. Jimmie Records said Thursday at an information meeting on new federal hazardous chemical regulations.

Chemical accidents are local incidents, have local impact and are handled by local police and firefighters.

"How ready are we on a local level to deal with this?" she asked.

In an effort to help states and communities deal with chemical accidents, Congress passed some important amendments to the Superfund Act — known as Superfund Amendments and Reauthorization Act, or SARA.

Records called Title III of SARA the "penalty of federal law." This section of the new regulations, passed in October 1986, deals with the right of communities to know what hazards exist in their communities.

The regulations require public access to information on hazardous chemicals stored, manufactured or used in the community.

The act also called for establishment of state emergency planning commissions and local emergency planning committees. These emergency response groups have been built on old civil defense organizations and emphasize community involvement and

cooperation.

The goal of the Idaho Emergency Response Commission and the SARA-III regulations is to save lives. Records said the commission hopes to prepare the state and communities to deal safely with chemical emergencies.

Most communities in Idaho are involved to one degree or another with hazardous materials in the form of agricultural chemicals. But while the risk levels are high in most communities, response levels are low, she said.

The new regulations can help reduce the risk levels and improve the response level. But that will require government and business cooperation. The heart of that cooperation is the section of the regulations dealing with requirements to report the use, manufacture or storage of hazardous chemicals.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency

Airport commission revises contract for owners of hangar

HAYLEY - Owners of a large hangar at Friedman Memorial Airport have a new long-term contract with the price substantially lower than the current average leasing fees.

With just barely a quorum of the 11 Blaine County Airport commis-

sioners present, the board voted 4-1 to draw up a new contract for Blue Sky Inc., owners of the large blue hangar on the west side of the airport.

Blue Sky, in the 15th year of a 20-year non-renewable lease, requested a new contract because the corporation was making sizeable and expensive improvements to the structure.

Airport Commissioner Sven McCoy said the commission's contract subcommittee was split 3-2 in recommending a new contract be established for 20 years with 10-year renewable terms. Under contention was the question of what rate to apply.

The commission agreed on 35 cents per square foot, up from the current

rate of 25 cents per square foot. This was used partly because the commission in past years set 35 cents as the lowest acceptable bid for leased land at the airport, McCoy said. He said the rate provided economic advantage for the airport, to rewrite the contract now at 35 cents rather than wait until the lease expires in five years and rewrite it then.

Commissioner Tom Blanchard argued against the proposal, saying leases signed since 1981 average out to be 48 cents per square foot.

"Thirty-five cents doesn't reflect that figure at all or the value of the property," Blanchard said, recommending 40 cents per square foot would be more equitable.

McCoy said the contract subcommittee is working to establish a rate structure for hangar leases. The commission currently has no formal method for establishing price.

In other airport business, McCoy's Hayley Chamber of Commerce President John Carsin resigned his position from the 12-member advisory panel to help update the airport's master plan and feasibility study for relocating the airport.

McCoy said that accepting Carson's suggestion to appoint Hayley businessman Jack Basso to fill the vacancy, the commission moved to advertise for new names to be considered amongst the original candidates not chosen for the panel.

"The commission met in executive session to discuss personnel matters," Chairman Rupert House said after the meeting. The commission discussed whether to keep assistant airport manager position and evaluated the performance of the current assistant manager, Randy Petrovick.

House said nothing was decided during the executive session, but the commission was scheduled to meet with Petrovick in a late date.

"The commission unanimously approved to include subcontractor Frank Vetsch on the commission's liability policy for all non-negligent acts he is responsible for while representing various navigational aids at the airport," Airport attorney Barry Lubavicki said the potential risk of exposure was very low.

Farnsworth restated his earlier assertion that a job applicant can ask about whether a union exists in the district, but said that district officials would never point an interviewee away from the I.O. In recruiting practices, that's a no-no," Farnsworth said. Gilbert said there's more than normal tension between administrators and the association.

"It goes beyond what I understand is the situation in the rest of the state," Gilbert said.

The Twin Falls complaint, however, did not receive the most com-

ments, Gilbert said. "I think the most pronounced perception that came back to us related to the coaching situation."

Apparently, Magic Valley teachers believe that female candidates vying for a teacher position often lose out to male competitors because the men are more qualified for coaching positions, even though female candidates may be better qualified academically, Gilbert said.

"The teachers believe the districts may be emphasizing sports too much," Gilbert said.

"Further, there is a perception that positions are not advertised openly or fairly, especially regarding in-district transfers," he added.

Gilbert said teachers also perceive discrimination and improper questions about religion during interviewing.

Gilbert said all school districts, teachers and Idaho teachers' union will receive an Idaho Human Rights Commission brochure about pre-employment discrimination pitfalls.

And specific districts will be contacted about perceived problems.

The TFEA will survey teachers again next fall to see whether the questionable district practices stop.

"We believe our survey of teachers next year will show that districts are much more careful in their hiring practices," Gilbert concluded.

awarded legal fees to the county officers. Kent, a diesel mechanic and former legislative candidate, argued his own appeal before the Court of Appeals in December.

In a decision written by Judge Donald Burnett, the appeals court ruled that the law suit involved 615A specifically allows legal fees only if the judge rules the claim was filed in bad faith.

The judge stated that he could not find Kent filed the claim in bad faith, although he ruled it was "without le-

gal basis" when he awarded legal fees.

However, the Court of Appeals said that particular section of law says no other law can be used to award legal fees.

In other Court of Appeals decisions announced Thursday:

The court upheld the conviction and five-year prison term ordered for Zane Jack Fields for petty theft and aggravated assault. The court ruled there was ample evidence to convict him of shoplifting an item from a Boise store, and pulling a gun on store employees who later tried to

stop him from leaving.

Overturned the conditional guilty plea entered by Virginia Valder, also known as Virginia Hale, in a Kootenai County drug case. The court ruled that because police questioned her without her attorney present, after she asked for a court-appointed attorney, all statements made during that interrogation must be thrown out.

Once a defendant has asked for an attorney in a criminal proceeding, the state has an affirmative obligation to have one present at every step of the court said.

HANSEN — The school district here has offered contracts to all tenured and non-tenured teachers. Letters of intent will be sent to teachers as soon as the paper work can be prepared. Superintendent Richard Smith said.

The board vote came after it met in closed session Monday to discuss teachers' performance.

Teachers and board members will meet at 8 p.m. Tuesday to begin negotiations for a new contract.

Teacher representative Galen Stimpson told the board teachers want the district to follow legislation passed during the last session recommending Idaho's schools established

a base salary of \$16,000. Hansen's current base salary is \$15,000, he said.

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H&W offers monitoring of private wells

POCATELLO (AP) — The Department of Health and Welfare has offered to monitor private wells near southeastern Idaho phosphate and chemical manufacturing sites proposed for inclusion on the nation's Superfund cleanup list.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency has proposed adding to the Superfund cleanup list 2,530 acres around the FMC Corp. and the J.R. Simplot Co. phosphate plants west of Pocatello. EPA also wants to add the 530-acre Monsanto Chemical Co. property and 158-acre Kerr-McGee Chemical Corp. operation in Soda Springs.

EPA officials said its own information and data from the companies indicate toxic wastes from the plants have entered the aquifer, posing a potential danger.

Health and Welfare Director Richard Donovan said his agency will monitor private drinking wells within three miles of the proposed Superfund sites, to see if there is any contamination.

"Given the anxiety that is often associated with a Superfund announce-

ment, common sense suggests the state should assist private well owners in these very unique circumstances," Donovan said.

An EPA release said although some action has been taken to prevent the release of more wastes, the contamination remains and poses a threat of potential danger to people nearby who rely on the groundwater for their drinking water supply.

Wells within three miles of the plants provide drinking water for 55,000 people and irrigation water for more than 2,100 acres. However, none of the contaminants are believed to exceed health standards for public or private water wells, the EPA said.

Simplot Plant Manager Rocky Gudwin said his firm is not accepting responsibility for the contamination, but it is willing to work with EPA to resolve any problems.

"We are concerned about being a good neighbor and as far as we know we have a state-of-the-art treatment system," he said. "We need to find out what the problem is and where it is coming from."

FMC Plant Manager Harvey Herbert said he didn't have enough information to comment on the proposal.

A 1984 study shows a leaking water clarifier and several unlined ponds have led to Monsanto's problems. The company has installed new lined ponds, but an EPA inspection showed heavy metals such as cadmium in the monitoring wells and water discharged from an on-site pond into Soda Creek. More than 3,000 people who live within three miles of Monsanto use well water.

Kent Lott, Monsanto's technical superintendent, said he thinks EPA's proposal is inappropriate because his company has taken steps to prevent future contamination and is conduct-

ing its own cleanup by using contaminated groundwater in its manufacturing process.

"Our main concern is that we do not have an impact on any of our employees or on the community, and we are monitoring to make sure that we have not," he said.

Waste from Kerr-McGee production of vanadium pentoxide has been stored in on-site ponds. The largest contain more than 12,000 cubic yards of liquids containing arsenic, copper and silver. Drinking water from the plant comes from a well located less than 400 feet from a contaminated well, the EPA said.

Sheriff adopts policy limiting undercover work as reporters

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — Kootenai County Sheriff Clegg is adopting a policy against his undercover officers posing as newspaper and broadcast reporters after anti-bias activists caught Capt. Tom Dickson using a media cover at a Seattle rally last month.

"We do understand the situation it puts you (reporters) in," Clegg said. "It would be stupid of me to say it will never happen again because rates are made to be broken, but it's not our intention to get information that way."

Dickson acknowledged he identified himself as a reporter for "The Daily Missoulian" in Montana on April 15 when approached by a member of the Seattle Non-Violent Action Group as he was filming participants in a rally to counter the neo-Nazi "skinhead" convention there in Kootenai County.

Clegg also confirmed that a month earlier two of his deputies posed as members of a CBS-News crew to videotape human rights protesters and neo-Nazis at a Napa, Calif., "skinhead" gathering. They were acting officially along with members of a Southern California law-enforcement agency Clegg declined to identify.

The Missoulian has filed its objections with Clegg over the April incident, and CBS News spokesman Tom Goodman in New York said Thursday the network was "deeply disturbed" by the March 4 incident in California and its attorney would be contacting Clegg soon.

"Such actions are extremely detrimental to the news-gathering process since they could compromise the credibility and even the safety of journalists covering news events," Goodman said.

CBS News accordingly strongly protests this incident and will seek assurances from appropriate law enforcement officials in Kootenai County that these actions will not be repeated.

Dickson said late Thursday the network would be given the same verbal assurances that Clegg has already provided, "that we're not going to use that type of undercover ruse to obtain information in the future."

Dave Hastings, a University of Washington oceanographer and member of the Seattle anti-racism group, said he confronted Dickson at the Seattle rally because the detective was extensively filming participants.

"He identified himself as a press person from the Missoulian," Hastings said. "We thought that was a little odd, because a newspaper person probably wouldn't be wearing a T-shirt and having a hat, and said this was important for his work as a newspaper reporter."

Hastings said Dickson did not look like a reporter, fearing that the clean-cut man in a T-shirt might be a neo-Nazi filming potential "hit" targets among the blacks and native Americans at the rally.

Student fees could increase slowly

BOISE (AP) — Talk at state Board of Education meetings of raising student fees is about as popular as bills increasing taxes in the Idaho Legislature.

It's a painful task either way. But the Board of Education is trying a new process to make it a little less painful. The goal is to produce what new board President George Alvarez calls "digestible increments" of student fee increases, instead of hard-to-swallow jumps in the cost of education.

It's not designed to build automatic fee increases, but rather to provide more steady, small hikes that might be easier for students to plan for.

Right now, University of Idaho is going through a rather painful process of raising student fees. It's painful because just a few months ago, student leaders were assured there appeared to be no need to raise fees for the next school year.

After the Board of Education met in Pocatello last month to divide \$115.5 million in state support between the colleges and universities, state officials reaffirmed plans for a fee increase up to \$25 per semester. That came despite an on-campus poll that produced 2-1 opposition to the increase in a very tight turnout.

This week, student protests continued on the Moscow campus.

However, a Board of Education staff study shows student costs at Idaho's four state-supported colleges and universities are much lower than comparable schools in the West.

Student fees at Boise State are \$1,065 per year and at Idaho State \$1,090. Comparable Western schools average \$1,322. Idaho's fees are \$1,048; the peer average is \$1,444. Lewis-Clark's fees are \$1,020 and comparable schools average \$1,216.

For nonresidents and graduates, there's more of a difference. Idaho's fees for graduates and nonresident students average \$3,048; at peer institutions it is \$4,220. Boise State, \$2,965, and ISU, \$2,900, are far less than comparable schools, \$3,672 per year.

Student fees also are paying less of the overall cost of an Idaho college education. The study said students covered 16.9 percent of the total cost in 1985; in fiscal year 1989 it's 13.6 percent.

Student fees as a percentage of the budget range from 11.7 percent at Idaho to 17.6 percent at Lewis-Clark.

Next month, at its Lewiston meeting in June, the Board of Education will give first consideration to a new

policy setting student fee increases on a consistent basis. It's scheduled to be adopted at the September meeting.

Board financial officer Ed Ciek said the goal is to provide a consistent framework for fee increases. By April, students will know what fees they face for the following school year. And even as early as one year before they go into effect, there will be some indication of the fee increases, because the colleges will have to figure them into the budgets they submit to the governor's office for the next year.

The proposed guidelines say total student fees should be no more than 10 percent above the peer group average of the previous year. By 1992, matriculation fees — theoretically the actual cost of instruction — should be at least 50 percent of the total student fee.

By March, the school presidents must give notice of any fee increase proposals, and public hearings must be held while students are on campus. The board will decide the fee increases by April, under the proposed guidelines.

Scores show Idaho schools doing well

BOISE (AP) — Despite bulging classrooms and low teacher salaries, more Idaho students graduate from high school and score better on college aptitude tests than the national average.

Idaho ranked ninth last year among 28 states where the American College Test is the dominant college entrance examination. The results were included in the U.S. Department of Education's annual report card on the nation's schools, which was released Wednesday.

Idaho also graduates more of its students than the U.S. average. It ranked 14th nationally in 1987, when 78.8 percent of state's high school seniors graduated. That's compared with a national average of 71.1 percent, the report said.

"We're getting a big bang for every buck spent in Idaho," August Hein, the state's deputy superintendent of public instruction, said of the findings. "And we're getting a big bang for the buck because we have top quality teachers who aren't making enough salary to leave."

Idaho students had a composite score of 19.3 on the ACT last year, up three-tenths of a point from 1987.

"We're pleased with the fact that the scores are up, considering that some states lost ground and some stayed the same," Hein said.

As for the graduation rate, we're ranked above average, but we should be. We don't have the pockets of poverty, the high unemployment rates and the ghetto-type neighborhoods that some states have to deal with. But I still think our graduation rate needs to improve.

Meanwhile, the average class size in Idaho increased from 20.3 in 1987 to 20.7 in 1988, falling from 40th to 18th national rank. It also lost ground in teacher salaries, dropping a notch to 14th in 1988. The state's teachers received an average salary of \$22,241 last year, compared with a national average of \$28,008.

INEL needs image boost, says expert

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — The Idaho Nuclear Safety Engineering Laboratory could improve public support by mixing its opponents to view operations at the federal nuclear research center, a public affairs consultant says.

"I think honesty and candor is called for," consultant Larry Merrett told the American Nuclear Society Wednesday night. "It dispans the opposition."

Merrett, a former top aide to Gov. Cecil Andrus, said centers like INEL are into the second generation of people who don't understand nuclear technology.

Regardless of what is done, he said, 10 to 20 percent of the population will not trust the site. "You shouldn't worry about the segment, and direct its attention to the remaining 80 percent of the people."

Hanford Nuclear Reservation was a casualty of declining public support, when citizens in Washington and Oregon turned on the site with vineyards, he said.

"Hanford will never be the same again," he said.

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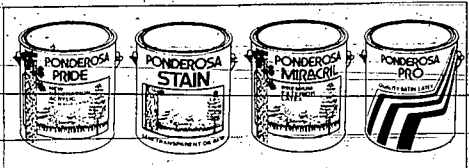

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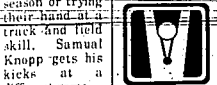
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Memorial 2nd-grader gets kicks from soccer

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Reds not worried about losing Rose

CINCINNATI (AP) — The Cincinnati Reds notified their fans that they had no backup plans for the possibility of losing their manager, Pete Rose, on Thursday.

"We don't feel any contingency plans are needed," General Manager Murray Cook said in a telephone interview from New York, where the Reds were playing the Mets.

A report on allegations of Rose's gambling will be submitted to Commissioner A. Bartlett Giamatti next week, baseball spokesman Rich Levin said.

The report is being prepared by John M. Dowd, the Washington lawyer leading the inquiry into Giamatti's special counsel.

Giamatti will deliberate the fate of Rose, accused by a former friend's lawyer of betting on baseball. There was no indication as to when Giamatti would make a decision.

Rose also is the target of a federal grand jury in Cincinnati looking into possible tax evasion regarding his memorabilia sales, other sports-related income and gambling, according to a source.

Rose could be suspended for a year by Giamatti if he's found to have bet on baseball games. He could be banned for life if he bet on Reds games.

Rose, weakened by bronchitis, was home in Cincinnati. He is expected to return to the team sometime this weekend, during a home series against Philadelphia, the ball club said.

Rose's lawyer, Reuben Katz, said he expects Rose to get a hearing before Giamatti on what the investigation uncovered before there is a ruling.

Cook said he expects the team will get into the world of Giamatti's decision before it is released.

"We've been advised that we would be apprised before anything official is done," he said. "I'm sure it's not going to be well in advance."

Cook denied a published report that former Pittsburgh and Atlanta manager Chuck Tanner approached the Reds about possibility managing.

"I've heard that rumor. We have not been approached by Chuck Tanner," Cook said.

Several people have inquired about jobs since the end of last season, but no one has asked about managing since the Rose investigation was announced March 20, Cook said.

"I've been approached by some people who want to have jobs," he said. "Hal Lanier called me this winter and said, 'Look, I'm available to work.' I can't say nobody's approached me, but that was back in the wintertime."

Cook also said that as far as he knows, no team records or personnel have been subpoenaed by the federal grand jury that began hearing witnesses Wednesday.

"The team just doesn't seem to be involved at all," he said.

The grand jury is looking into whether Rose accurately reported his sports-related income, and whether he correctly represented his winnings from gambling, according to a source with knowledge of the investigation.

Grand jury proceedings are secret, and federal officials have declined comment.

Paul Janszen, a friend of Rose now serving time for tax evasion, has told authorities he placed bets on behalf of Rose with a bookmaker named Ron Peters.

Court documents show that Peters told federal investigators that over a two-year period he took bets from Rose that may have exceeded \$1 million.

Easy Goer draws outside position

LOUISVILLE (AP) — Easy Goer, whom some compare with Secretariat, drew the No. 14 post position today — the far outside spot in the main gate — for his first major test of greatness Saturday against 16 other colts in the Kentucky Derby.

Easy Goer, who will be ridden by Pat Day, was made in 3-5 early favorite, coupled in the betting with stablemate Ave Inspiring.

An auxiliary gate will be used for the 15th and 16th post positions, occupied by 50-1 outsiders Wind Splitter and Northern Wolf.

Easy Goer's trainer, Shug McGaughey, said he could live with the draw.

"I'm not going to worry about it," McGaughey said. "If I picked out, it wouldn't be 14, but all I didn't want was No. 1 or the auxiliary gate."

Easy Goer went through his final pre-Derby workout today in 47 1/8 seconds for a half-mile, then galloped out in a startlingly quick 59.35 for five eighths.

After the workout, television cameras caught McGaughey hawking out exercise rider David Carroll for letting Easy Goer chase after another horse for the second time this week.

"How could you go out there two times during Derby week and hook

up with another horse? McGaughey asked him. "You didn't know what you were doing."

By comparison, Secretariat's final workout in 1973 was 58.25 for five eighths. Sunday Silence, the second favorite at 3-1, worked out in 46.35 for the half and galloped out in 1:01.35 for five furlongs.

Later, McGaughey did not seem as worried about the quick gallop at the end of Easy Goer's workout.

"I was just irritated because things didn't go perfect," McGaughey said. "It's no big deal."

"That's what he does. We're used to it. Remember, he blew out for the Gotham in 46-1.5," he said. "I didn't take anything out of him. I think he's feeling good."

"You know, I think horses get wise to things, and I think he knows something is going to happen."

The field, in position order, was: Clever Previor, Don Pettinger, Flying Continental, Corey Romero, Western Playboy, Randy Romero, Hawkster, Marco Castaneda, Sly Tom, Chris Andley, Houston, Laffit Pincay, Danial, Larry Snyder, Faultless Ensign, Gary de Carin, Triple Buck, Jose Santos, Sunday Silence, Pat Valenzuela, Irish Actor, Don Hovard, Notation, Herb McCauley,

Ave Inspiring, Craig Perret, Easy Goer, Day, Wind Splitter, Donnie Miller, and Northern Wolf, Jo Jo Ladder.

Each starter will carry 126 pounds, and if all start, the purse will be \$759,200, with \$584,200 to the winner.

The D. Wayne Lukas-trained entry of Houston and Sly Tom, and Harvey Yamer's Western Playboy were listed as the 3-1 third favorites.

Charlie Whittingham, who trains Sunday Silence, said his horse was perfect. "Everything all winter is coming in order, Whittingham said. "I guess Shug's horse is coming up perfect, too."

He said Sunday Silence's No. 10 post position was fine. "In fact, anywhere in the main gate is good."

"Racing luck will play its part in the race — not just good luck, but also the absence of bad luck."

"If Easy Goer is lucky enough to run his race Saturday, they will have a hard time beating him," McGaughey said. "I'm not saying they can't beat him, but they'll have a hard time."

Only a month ago, experts predicted a low as 10 in the Derby because of Easy Goer's big victories in the Swale, Gotham and Wood this year following his 2-year-

old championship campaign. But before the withdrawal of Majesty's Imp, the probable field actually grew to 17, three short of the maximum.

"There's somebody out there drinking coffee and reading the Racing Form and saying, 'There's three spots still open. Let's go.' It could be somebody who just won their matron race."

The last time there was an odds-on favorite, it was Spectacular Bid in 1979, and the field was 10.

"It's like the Super Bowl," Lukas said. "Imagine what would happen if the Super Bowl said anybody who wants to can play. An awful lot of people would show up. They wouldn't win, but they'd show up."

While many have compared Easy Goer with Secretariat, McGaughey still believes the 1973 Triple Crown winner was the best colt he has ever seen.

"He was a 2-year-old champion. He was fast. He was a good 3-year-old. He won the Triple Crown. He could race the classic distances, and later on, he was able to carry weight and win," McGaughey said. "He was very versatile."

Day also stops just short of declaring Easy Goer the next Secretariat.

Soviet hockey forward defects to play in NHL

MOSCOW (AP) — Alexander Mogilyny, a 20-year-old forward regarded as an up-and-coming star on the Soviet National Team, defected to the West, apparently to play in the National Hockey League, Soviet and Swedish media reported, Thursday.

Mogilyny is the first Soviet player to defect. A former National Team member, Sergei Prishin, signed with the Calgary Flames in March after the NHL and the Soviet Hockey Federation reached an agreement allowing him to come to North America.

Spokesmen for the NHL and the Buffalo Sabres, who hold Mogilyny's rights, said they knew nothing of the report.

A Sabres spokesman said general manager Gerry Meehan left town Wednesday and did not say where he was.

Mogilyny did not show up at Stockholm airport when the Soviets left for Moscow. The Soviets claimed the world championship Saturday by beating Canada and beat Sweden Monday to finish second.

There was no immediate word on Mogilyny's defection by the NHL. In Stockholm, Soviet sources indicated in an interview with PTT, a Swedish news agency, that Mogilyny did not intend to seek political asylum in Sweden, but was heading to the United States to join an NHL team.

It is unclear what affect the defection will have on relations between the NHL and the Soviets. Fourteen of teams are scheduled to tour the NHL next season and the Washington Capitals are slated to play the Soviet Union in September.

The owner of the hotel where the team stayed during the world championships contacted Soviet newspapers in Stockholm at the airport and said that he had received an anonymous phone call informing him of Mogilyny's defection.

Mogilyny is a member of the Soviet Central Red Army team. Served a prison term for espionage during this season after a fight in a Soviet game against the Spartak team.

The newspaper reported that Mogilyny had been contacted by the NHL and the Sabres after the game. He was offered a contract to play in the world championship by the Soviet Sports Commission.

Mogilyny was voted the best player in the tournament.

world's best junior player by NHL scouts in a poll organized by The Hockey News, told the Aftonbladet newspaper that he was not aiming for a military career.

"I don't want to become an officer," he was quoted as saying in Aftonbladet. "I want to do something else with my life."

Viktor Tikhonov, the coach of the National Team, blasted Mogilyny.

"This incident soured our joyful homecoming after winning the championships," Tikhonov told Tass, the Soviet news agency, adding that he believed Mogilyny was lured by the promise of a big NHL contract.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE BOBBY WOLFF

The play of today's hand looks too easy for any careful study - a good warning. These are the types of hands that trip the average player. South ruffs the third spade and has little trouble visualizing an easy over-trick. Obviously it's time to draw the trumps. How should he play the suit?
 If he leads a careless low trump to dummy's king and a low trump back to the queen, West's discard will give him a headache. If he concedes a trump to East, the defenders get four winners, and if he tries to run dummy's diamonds, it gets even worse.
 South makes his game if he guards against the 4-1 break. (Anybody can play this hand well if trump's are 3-2.) Instead of leading a trump to dummy's king at trick four, South should first cash his ace and queen of trumps. If trump's break, all is well. Dummy's king draws the last trump, and it tricks go into the till. However, when West discards on the second trump, South must start dummy's diamonds. East can ruff or not, but all he gets is one trump trick and two spades - dummy's trump king prevents East from isolating dummy's diamonds.

Kids teaching kids

Lecturers share common ground with young visitors

"How many of you know who Indiana Jones is?" The 14-year-old lecturer asked her class of 33 Lincoln Elementary School sixth graders. The hands popped up quickly.

"Imagine you are Indiana Jones ... preparing to enter a hot, humid forest ... you've been looking for this Mayan city for a year ... with people on your trail."

The story went on, punctuated by the sixth graders' murmurs of "All Right and 'Neat," as Kathy Friedemann, a Robert Stein sixth grader, skillfully led her audience through the Herrett Museum's Mayan exhibit.

"I hit on the idea of using Indiana Jones after my first lecture didn't go that well," said Friedemann, during a break in the action. "I used it last week; and the kids really listened, while the teachers smiled, so I knew it was working."

This is Friedemann's first year in the museum's student lecture program. Someday, she wants to be an archaeologist/anthropologist.

"We have 60 kids, ranging in age from 9 to 17, serving as student lecturers for our exhibits this year," said Jim Woods, the museum's director who trains the young people during an eight-week session of eight classes prior to the opening of each new exhibit.

"It's working great, and it's a wonderful concept — kids teaching kids."

Woods added that most of the student lecturers are recruited either by word of mouth or through the school system's GT (gifted and talented) program.

"When we are really busy like we are now, with up to eight shows a week, each student lecturer does a show every other week or so," he said.

On the day of Lincoln School's visit, a team of three student lecturers worked with the class. Virginia Garber, a sophomore at Twin Falls High School who has been lecturing since fourth grade, was playing the role of Girl 7. Quetzal, a young Mayan art student, Chris Fry, an O'Leary seventh grader and three-year veteran of the program, was Boy 4. Vulture, in charge of explaining astronomy and architecture to the sixth graders. All three lecturers

wore Mayan exhibit T-shirts, complete with ancient Indian designs. They had spent weeks prior over research materials and studying the subject of Mayan with Woods, who critiques their performances during each lecture. The young lecturers say they are eager to learn more.

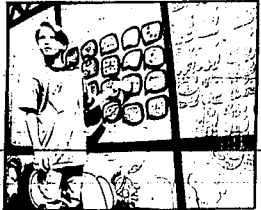
"This is an excellent program," said Rosalee Dingwall, a sixth grade teacher at Lincoln who, herself, has a son in the student lecture program. "The students share ideas, further their public speaking skills, and gain a great deal of knowledge."

Dingwall noted that the Mayan exhibit meshes perfectly with the sixth grade history materials on Central and South American early civilizations, the major focus of which is dated around 500 A.D.

The Mayan exhibit, themed "Days, Numbers, and the Forever Design," according to Woods, is structured to help visitors appreciate the culture of the ancient civilization — their calendaring, their number systems — and their incorporation of design and thought into their overall picture of reality. Children who enter the exhibit first, happen upon a floor-to-ceiling model of an elaborately carved Mayan coffin lid. Next to it is a colorful mural depicting a baby being received by his name.

"How would you like to go back in time now, into a time tunnel?" the children are asked. The positive response is always predictable.

As the children are led into a dim room with music and special lighting effects,

Star protection — it's more than bodyguards

HOLLYWOOD — In December, 1942, 27-year-old Frank Sinatra stood on stage at New York's Paramount Theater, embraced his microphone, and fixed his blue eyes on the

babysitters in the front row and crooned, sending his audience of teen-aged girls into a shrieking, hair-tearing swoon.

That was the birth of superstar.

And as Gavin de Becker sees it, it was the advent of the age of celebrities as targets.

His clients' past and present include Elizabeth Taylor, Richard Burton, Cher, Robert Redford, Dolly Parton, Jane Fonda, Joan Rivers, Victoria Principal, Brooke Shields, Olivia Newton-John, Tina Turner and John Travolta.

But de Becker is not a bodyguard, nor does he simply provide that service. He does not wish to be even remotely identified with that trade, which he dismisses as work for rent-

High-tech security for the famous now means computer schedules, personality profiles, psychology

a-hulls and overweight, one-time rock 'n' roll maddo.

Instead, de Becker and his staff of 31 offer a unique refinement in the celebrity security business, using state-of-the-art computers and psychological profiling to help protect clients, some of whom pay as much as \$475,000 a year for the peace of mind.

His special approach also has allowed de Becker to obtain a rare glimpse into the troubled minds of the sometimes harmless but often twisted individuals who focus attention on themselves by sending "inappropriate" messages to his celebrity clients.

Along with the Secret Service and the Capitol Police, who guard members of Congress, Gavin de Becker Inc. of Los Angeles has the

best-kept, centralized files of threatening communications in the country," says Dr. Park Dietz of Newport Beach, Calif., prosecution psychiatrist at the trial of John Hinckley, President Reagan's would-be assassin.

De Becker's business "is a counterpart of what we do in the FBI," to protect government figures, says agent Robert Restler of the Behavioral Sciences Unit of the FBI Academy. "It's Quantico." "Unfortunately, we do not live in safe times. His type of business really fills a void. The government cannot protect everyone."

And former Los Angeles County Sheriff Peter Pichler says "Gavin is one of the best. ... He has been very helpful to us (and) I have recommended him to many people."

De Becker will discuss cases but won't name names; a partial list of his 100-plus clients, most of whom live in California but some of whom are in New York, Washington, D.C., and Nashville, the country's music capital, was gleaned from other sources.

"Sinatra and Sylvester Stallone are not clients," he says, adding that almost every other top Hollywood star is.

To many celebrities are magnets, and the crazed, some of whom have come to California from as far away as South Arabia, believing they have been directed by a deity, have been undertaken by hired wire or attack dogs. Some have taken telephone company jobs to gain access to unlisted numbers. They use special signs and signals for themselves in such everyday objects as license plates.

They have mailed de Becker's clients a dead coyote, dead fish, blood, hair, teeth, human and animal fecal matter and bullets. Typically, though, they begin

There was a consumer, for example, who targeted a corporate executive, convinced that the company's toothpaste had caused his

voice to change. There was a woman who turned to a toll-free 800 number to seek revenge at the corporate board level, blaming a cake mix as culprit. She had put her cake in the oven and her child's hair fell out.

De Becker's printouts show his company has profiled 5,400 people, all but about 1,000 of them in still active cases; the company in its research has compiled 200,000 pieces of communication, a library of sorts that experts like Dietz, a forensic psychiatrist and professor on leave of law and psychiatry at University of Virginia, have begun to study.

The threats are sorted by de Becker into three categories: R-1s are fans whose craziness poses no danger to a celebrity, for example, the man who insisted a star inform a network television audience of his kidnapping by Martians; R-2s are individuals considered a serious threat and requiring monitoring. R-3s, roughly 40 percent of de Becker's current cases, are individuals who have threatened and are seeking an encounter with a celebrity.

"Last year, 25 percent of the R-3s actually showed up, though the number of celebrity attacks that succeeded is quite low," de Becker says. "But the incidence of near attacks and severe safety hazards is much higher" than ever, he adds, noting that at any given time, a major media figure might have 50 or 60 (threats) that are very bad. It's just astounding.

And though the media widely publicize incidents involving threats and attacks against celebrities, corporate VIPs and other high-visibility people, psychiatrists Dietz notes, "The press never learns about the vast majority of threats against the prominent."

For example, a recently reported blitz of threatening letters to actor Michael J. Fox (de Becker client) by a female fan upset by the actor's recent marriage was "perfectly normal," abnormal behavior, Dietz says. "There are thousands of people right now in Los Angeles writing threatening letters."

Dietz is directing a three-year Department of Justice study on violence against public figures; de Becker is consulting. Dietz has studied 500 crank letters; half from de Becker's files, and found that the writers sent to targets, in order of frequency: a photo of themselves, poetry, and photos of other people or objects, among them a dog and a deodorant ad.

Those who target public figures most often fancy themselves celebrity spouses-to-be; others think they're a celebrity's child. Though 2 percent in his study threatened movies, the thing most craved was contact with the celebrity — a personal reply, at the very least, marriage, at the very most (15-

Dietz says he has found "more cases of erotomania (an obsession with a nonexistent love relationship) in Gavin's files than have been reported in the entire world psychiatric literature."

In his experience, de Becker says, the kinds of productions in which a celebrity star can play a role in the type of threats they receive, with scientific precision — how scary, attractive to crazy people at the age of greatest dangerousness, 28 to 32.

A male sci-fi film viewer contacted a female celebrity with urgent news: "He and my client were the only people in the world who had a particular blood type that would allow them to mate and save the world," de Becker says. The man was "very dedicated" to getting to the star and was convinced they were being kept apart by Vulcans.

Violent people also are attracted to actors who portray violent people, says Dietz, who notes Hinckley did not see "Taxi Driver" 16 times because he was a pacifist; he was thinking about assassinations before he ever saw it. "But it did him no good to keep watching," he says.

Some material de Becker sees is the stuff of probably harmless flights of fancy — "I'm sorry I cannot accept an offer to appear in a film with you." Then, he says, there is "the person who is setting the table every night with a place for my-

client. Those aren't so funny."

Overall, it is mental disorder, not criminal intent, that motivates the vast majority of those who post the sick mail. And though they may be mentally ill, they are not fools, de Becker says. "The people we have under assessment are smarter than the general population. At least these people write letters."

After receiving the crank correspondence from clients, de Becker and his staff tap into their computer bank to identify and locate the source and learn if or when those troubled individuals might visit Los Angeles.

Offenders usually help on that score. "Most people write (using) their real names," says de Becker, who considers the author profile an essential step in evaluating his threat.

Is there a criminal history? A history of mental illness? If the writer is under psychiatric care, a psychiatrist is notified. If the writer is in a mental hospital, the institution might be advised to detain him.

Because of quirks in the law, many of those who send crank correspondence may not have violated any laws. One of de Becker's tasks is to differentiate between intimidation and threats.

Intimidation, he says, is a sneaky tactic — "the man who says he is Jesus and will cause Mount St. Helens to erupt again," if a chosen star does not act as demanded. "My favorite kind of threat — we know he can't deliver," he says.

A real threat, he explains, is unconditional: "Get your affairs in order. I'm going to kill you on Thursday. Those we get. Those are real."

To de Becker, the rise in disturbed fans has meant increasing revenues. Top-of-the-line clients pay \$175,000 a year for his services, which in addition to threat analysis pays for around-the-clock protection with trimmings, including an armored car and escorts for tours. "A very common figure is \$225,000," he says.

That gets you 24-hour coverage. Every 60 days, clients on retainer also receive advisories with dates and sites they should be concerned about.

Bloom County

Prize-winning comic strip will be no more after Aug. 6

The Washington Post — Berke Breathed, who drew the only penguin to have a crush on Diane Sawyer, announced he will discontinue "Bloom County," his Pulitzer-winning comic strip, effective Aug. 6.

The announcement was made by the Washington Post Writers Group, which syndicates the strip. The daily and Sunday comic will be ended, but Breathed will start a new Sunday-only strip a month later, the announcement said.

"A good comic strip is no more eternal than a ripe melon," Breathed said in a statement released by the Writers Group, which will also syndicate the new

strip. "The ugly truth is that in most cases, comics age less gracefully than their creators. 'Bloom County' is retiring before the stretch marks show."

"Bloom County" began syndication as a daily-only comic strip in December 1980, and was an immediate hit. It now has nearly 800 daily and college

newspaper clients, and is considered one of most successful cartoon strips in the country, ranked in popularity with "Peanuts," "Garfield" (Breathed favorite) and "Doonesbury" (which went on hiatus from January 1985 to September 1984 and returned intact). Another popular comic strip, Gary Larson's "The Far Side," has been suspended since

last fall and is expected to resume in about a year.

Breathed, 31, won the Pulitzer Prize for distinguished cartooning in 1987. Six collections of his strips have been published by Little, Brown and Co., with more than 4 million copies sold, according to the Writers Group. Breathed lives in Englewood, Colo., with his wife Judy Boyman, a wildlife photographer.

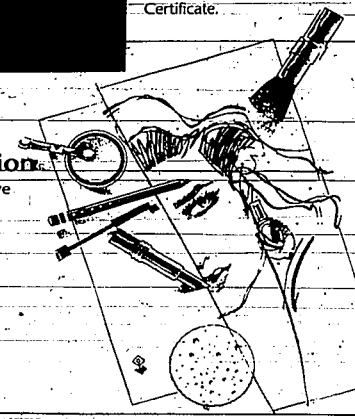

'Last Temptation of Christ' to be available on video

released on home video on June 29 at \$89.95. There were immediate indications that a protest is brewing. The theatrical release of the movie, whose unorthodox depiction of Christ was denounced as blasphemous by some Christians,

prompted protests and, in a few cases, violence. Some video retailers fear similar reprisals from activist fundamentalists. A spokesman for a national chain, asking that his name not be used, said six of his stores in the Los Angeles area have received petitions from church groups stating that, if the stores stock the movie, they will be boycotted. He said that stores in two other chains have received similar petitions.

MCA's decision to release the film came as a surprise because there had been industry rumors late last year that the company was trying to sell the home-video rights to another distributor.

Officials at MCA declined to comment on their home video plans, news of which appeared this week at the tail end of an MCA press release about its July video releases, which include "Talk Radio" and "The Cottons." One source, however, indicated that the company would not be promoting or advertising the cassette.

A spot check of stores in Bible Belt areas of the United States found that retailers either did not want to discuss the release or were not planning to stock it. All conducted in those areas preferred to remain anonymous.

A few other retailers, though, did

comment, without specifying anonymity. Lou Berg of Houston's Audio-Video Plus said that his stores would carry the film.

"It's a First Amendment issue," he said. "Retailers shouldn't bow to this kind of censorship. We'll carry it and see what happens."

Berg added, however, that he would not advertise the video.

Harvey Dossick, director of purchasing for the world-wide West Coast Video chain, agreed that advertising was not wise. "That's just asking for trouble," he said.

Dossick said that he planned to order "Last Temptation" fairly heavily for the chain — as if it were a B+ or an A title. He added that stores, particularly in heavily fundamentalist regions, would make their own decisions about stocking the title.

The movie grossed a modest \$8 million, not much considering all the furor over the portrayal of Christ as an uncertain savior who considers giving up his holy work and who hallucinates about making love while dying on the cross.

"People were soared off by the boycotts and the protests," Dossick said. "They were all waiting to see it on home video. There's a big market for this movie. If stores stock it, people will rent it — many just out of curiosity."

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ABC yanks tabloid specials; producers stunned by action

NEW YORK — ABC, which cited lack of advertising as why it yanked a scheduled special on "Crimes of Passion" status, dropped another special on Wednesday. That left a co-producer of both stumped.

"I'm in a state of shock," said Loren Arbus, co-executive producer of both "Crimes of Passion 2" and "Scandals II." The second show, hosted by Robert Culp, was scheduled to air Saturday night in the same time slot that "Crimes of Passion 2" was to have run last Saturday.

But now "Scandals II" is off the schedule too, said ABC spokesman Tom Mackin. Neither he nor other network officials would immediately provide an explanation for the decision.

ABC said earlier that it had dropped "Crimes of Passion 2" at the last minute because "there was no paid advertising" for it. One executive attributed advertiser reluctance to increased sensitivity to "programs of this nature."

Senior advertising executives contacted Wednesday said they had never before heard of a network pulling a show for lack of advertising.

And several said that ABC's explanation did not ring true.

"I don't think it would be totally true," said Richard J. Kostyra, executive vice president at J. Walter Thompson USA. "I think the interpretation might be that no advertiser showed up willing to pay the price ABC wanted to sell at."

"I'm sure there were a few advertisers, but probably willing to pay so little that ABC said, 'Let's not air it.'"

"I think they yanked it because they didn't like the show," said Paul Schulman, a media buyer and president of Paul Schulman Co.

Both specials, sequels of similar shows that aired with commercials last fall, featured reenactments of real-life stories. "Scandals II" featured stories about director Peter Bogdanovich's marriage to the younger sister of Dorothy Stratten and about people who pose as baby photographers and kidnap the subjects. "Crimes of Passion 2," hosted by Bruce Dern, contained stories about a teen killing and a love affair between a stepmother and stepson.

Both programs were to have aired during the current ratings "sweeps" that are crucial to local stations in setting their advertising rates.

Some executives said that sponsors are particularly wary now because of protests by some groups and individuals who believe television has begun to go beyond the boundaries of good taste and decency.

One such group is Christian Leaders for Responsible Television, which is monitoring the three networks during the ratings sweeps this month, taking notes on both material that they consider offensive and the advertisers of those shows. A sponsor boycott may be launched in June, the group says.

In a phone interview Wednesday, the group's executive director, Rev. Donald Wildmon, a fundamentalist minister in Tupelo, Miss., said that his organization had not made any specific complaints about "Crimes of Passion 2" but said that there is "no question that advertisers are more concerned now. ... They know we have a monitoring period and they

do not want to be identified with these programs. ..."

Meanwhile, Terry Rakolta, the Michigan woman who captured attention recently with her letter to the Federal Communications Commission opposing advertisers for Fox Broadcasting's "Married With Children," announced in Washington Wednesday that she had formed an organization called Americans for Responsible Television.

"Our emphasis ... will be to promote private, voluntary efforts by the advertisers and the networks to raise the standards on network television," she said.

Betsy Frank, a senior vice president at Saatchi & Saatchi Advertising, agreed that there is advertiser awareness of the monitoring program of Wildmon and "I think there's no doubt that advertiser sensitivities are probably much higher than they've been in the past."

But Schulman downplayed Wildmon's influence, saying his company's clients have guidelines for their show sponsorship, and "we have not varied one iota from our guidelines. Rev. Wildmon or no."

"There are clients who are every concerned about environment" — the kinds of shows they sponsor — "and they would not have touched 'Crimes of Passion 2' with a 10-foot pole. But we also have other clients who would have been happy to get the ratings exposure in 'Crimes of Passion 2'."

When interviewed Wednesday, Wildmon, who is the daughter of former ABC chairman Leonard Goldenson, said ABC had not yet notified her that it will not air "Scandals II" as scheduled Saturday.

In a conference-call interview from Los Angeles, she and her co-executive producers of "Crimes of Passion II," Harvey and Howard Swerdloff-Ross, said they were mystified why ABC dropped that show.

Arbus said that 18 national advertisers — among them American Airlines, Listerine, Burger King and Roloids — sponsored the first "Crimes of Passion" last October and got no gripes from viewers.

"I'm sure she believed ABC's statement that no sponsors could be found for the sequel; she replied, 'I don't know whether we believe that or not. I do know that there's no reason that advertisers should not be in this at all.'"

When interviewed, I would ask, Swerdloff-Ross said, "is whether we are going to return to 35 years ago, when the advertisers controlled this medium?" And, she asked, referring to the lack of advertisers ABC cited, "Is this (absence of advertisers) a form of censorship that no one is willing to acknowledge?"

If advertisers again take over the medium, she said, "we will end up with bland, bland television."

Horvath, who said he was a "60 Minutes" producer from 1963 to 1979, called the "Crimes of Passion 2" show "high quality television," one that ABC's program practices and legal departments had thoroughly checked and approved.

"We've had to answer more questions about fact that I ever had to in my career as a journalist on '60 Minutes,'" he said.

A sampling of other Hollywood producers Wednesday turned up none who were outraged by advertisers' reaction to "Crimes of Passion II" — and a few even applauded it.

Broadway's Tony faces troubled times

NEW YORK (AP) — Suppose they gave the Tony Awards and nobody won?

After the worst season for Broadway musicals in years, the 1989 Tony nominations will be announced Monday and the possible contenders for top musical honors include only six shows. They are "Jerome Robbins' Broadway," "Black and Blue," "Chu Chem" and "Starmites," as well as such already-closed flops as "Legs Diamond," "Carrie" and "Welcome to the Club."

"Jerome Robbins' Broadway" would seem to be a shoo-in for a best musical nomination as well as the leading contender for the top prize, which carries a lot of clout at the box office.

The Robbins musical, a collection of numbers from such shows as "West Side Story," "Gypsy," "Fiddler on the Roof" and other hits, may not need the boost as much as the other musicals still running. It's already doing near capacity business and has a healthy advance.

"Chu Chem," billed as the first Chinese-Jewish musical, has been limping along at the box office, despite an extensive television ad campaign by its producer and composer Mitch Leigh — "Black and Blue," a celebration of blues singing and tap dancing, has done better business, although it has not approached the sell-out status of the Robbins show.

"Starmites" is another iffy proposition. The space-age, comic-strip musical was panned by major critics, except for a favorable review in "The New York Times."

The picture is brighter for the best

play category which has several respectable candidates for nominations. The heavy favorite is Wendy Wasserstein's "The Heidi Chronicles," which already has captured the Pulitzer Prize as well as the Outer Critics Circle Award.

Other likely candidates include "Shirley Valentine," Willy Russell's one-woman play starring Pauline Collins; "Lend Me a Tenor," a farce by Ken Ludwig; "Ghetto," by Joshua Sobel; and two plays that have already closed, "Eastern Standard," by Richard Greenberg, and Michael Weller's "Spools of War."

Bill Irwin's "Largely New York," a comedy with no dialogue, might also be a possibility for best play, although the Tony administration committee has not yet ruled if it will be eligible.

There will be also an absence of big names in the acting category categories. Only one possibility, Mikhail Baryshnikov, who plays Kafka's tormented "clerk" in "Metamorphosis," has superstar status. Best acting nominations could go to Philip Bosco and Victor Garber of "Lend Me a Tenor," Bill Irwin in "Largely New York" and Peter Friedman of "The Heidi Chronicles." And if they want a name recognized by television audiences, the committee could nominate Ed Asner of "Barney."

The competition for best actress may be the most lively. Likely candidates include Pauline Collins of

For best actress in a musical, the nominating committee could reach back to Betty Buckley as the demented mother in long-gone "Carrie," Marilyn Sokol, the angry wife in "Welcome to the Club" or the trio of ladies — Ruth Brown, Linda Hopkins and Carrie Smith — who star in "Black and Blue."

To save embarrassment, several musical categories might be eliminated. During the 1984-85 season — the year the industry dropped the category — there were no nominations for best actor and actress in a musical as well as for choreography.

The awards show will be broadcast Sunday June 4 on CBS-TV with Angela Lansbury serving as host for the third straight year.

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'Field of Dreams' — going bonkers over baseball again

WASHINGTON — 'Field of Dreams,' a ghostly baseball story, couldn't have a better setting than an Iowa cornfield. Shuckles, eggs in the narrative world. The characters wax ever poetic over the glories of bat, glove and ball. 'This is the myth of peanuts and Cracker Jack, but play as next to God, and Shoeless Joe Jackson as archangel.



Like 'Eight Men Out,' this movie springs from the Black Sox scandal of 1919, the year the Chicago White Sox threw the World Series to the Cincinnati Reds. And the baseball commissioner threw eight White Sox out of the game. Shoeless Joe, one of them, maintained that he was innocent and went off to get fat and play under an assumed name in the minor league.

'Eight Men Out' used the soiled Sox to underscore the modern decline of the movie. The bally 'Field of Dreams' redeems Joe Jackson in the afterlife. Joe (Ray Liotta), like Casper, a friendly spirit who haunts the present-day baseball diamond that Ray Kinsella (Kevin Costner) creates in his cornfield. Ray, a '60s flower child turned farmer, builds the ballpark after hearing 'The Voice.' 'Build it and he will come.' The

Voice kind of mumbles. 'Build what and who will come?' asks his spunky, supportive wife Annie (Amy Madigan), who first thinks he's having an acid flashback. 'He didn't say,' says Ray. 'Don't you hate when that happens?' says Annie. Their adorable daughter Karin (Gabby Hoffmann), waned on baseball, never doubts her daddy.

To the American Gothic locals, however, this is a family of flakes. Pickups line the highway as the townsfolk come on over to observe Ray round off the pitcher's mound, pour the lines of lime, mount floodlights and bleachers. Time passes — we are reminded of Noah awaiting the rains — when out of the corn comes Shoeless Joe. 'Daddy, Daddy!' says Karin.

'Is this Heaven?' asks Joe. 'No, it's Iowa,' says Ray. Meanwhile, as you might well imagine, the Kinsellas are unable to pay the mortgage, having plowed under a portion of their crop and spent all their savings to fund Ray's obsession. Then Ray's faith is again tested. Comes the rumble from thin air: 'Ease his pain.' Say what?

By now we're beginning to wonder where in the world this story is going: what the point who's on first? We were expecting fast and then writer-director Phil Alden Robinson throws a gold-dust rebellion. And boom, next thing you know, Ray's left Annie to fend off bankruptcy alone while he drives to Boston to meet with famous author Terence Mann (J.D. Salinger) in W.P. Kinsella's 'Shoeless Joe,' the novel that inspired the movie. Terence (James Earl Jones), the voice of the '60s and Ray's favorite novelist, is disillusioned and no longer writes. At first, Terence refuses to join Ray at a ball game; then, miraculously, the cantankerous writer begins to hear 'The Voice' and gets caught up in 'The Dreams.' And it's off to keep other appointments with destiny: to fulfill the bubblegum-card wishes and let Frank Capra out of the limbo. Everything from time travel to melodrama figures in this whimsically daff story, a romanticization that tries your patience even as your tears duct well. It is, after all, hard to resist the notion that America's pastime is God's game of chance: The Lord is my umpire.

baseball as the meaning of life. The novelist, in Dan's Vader's base profound, declares, 'The one constant through all the years has been baseball. It reminds us of all that once was good...'

And so on. Women get this way about jacks.

Poet, pointless and baseball worship aside, the movie is easy to get along with. Costner is a likable lead, as plausibly with his ghosts as Jimmy Stewart with Harvey. When Shoeless Joe arrives for the first time, Costner's face lights up like the sun on a brand-new tractor. A worldly-wise catcher in 'Bull Durham,' here he appears from the pitcher's mound, as purely innocent as a big-eyed cow. And likewise Amy Madigan is no groupie in a garb-belt. She's an understanding foil for Costner's daff disciple. 'Field of Dreams' is no 'Bull Durham.' It doesn't strike out, but it does foul a few off the bleachers.

THE DREAM TEAM (PG 13)
Howard Zieff's new comedy is so clearly derived from the movie 'One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest,' that you might begin to wonder when Jack Nicholson will show up. The amiably slick farce stars Michael Keaton, Christopher Lloyd, and Peter Boyle as a

caricatures of the '60s. The weakest role, though he has a great comic waddle, running along helplessly behind them like a chafed turk. **DISORGANIZED CRIME (R)**. Pleasant but needlessly drawn-out caper comedy in which an ill-assorted bunch of crooks (Fred Glynn, Ruben Blades, Lou Diamond Phillips, William Russ) attempt to rob a bank in a small Montana town, despite their leader (Corbin Bernsen) being chased by a pair of New Jersey cops (sense-stealers Ed O'Neill and Dan Rowick). Written and directed by Jim Kouf, who also wrote 'Skakoun.'

HEATHERS (R). A film that thanks itself as 'black comedy,' certainly some of the targets in Daniel Waters' script are overdue for a zinger or two: school cliques, unctuous teachers, parents who won't be parents, etc. Unfortunately, director Michael Lehmann's point of view is swivel-moued. He doesn't have the courage of his conviction.

LEAN ON ME (PG-13). Ballroom and baseball-bat-wielding educator Joe Clark is played by Morgan Freeman, possibly the most formidable actor on the American scene. And he will give thoughtful audiences their thorniest problems with 'Lean on Me.' When director John Avildsen turns up the heat, it's thrilling. But glossed over by the film maker are some of the real statistics of Clark's administration and the fact that he has very nearly created more problems than he has solved.

LEVIATHAN (R). It's 'The Rain Man (R)'. Because we have had dozens of buddy films about journeys of discovery, we can plot the scenario of this one like a road map. The special qualities of one will work on the other to change him, or perhaps both of them. Dustin Hoffman makes his autistic savant character hypothetically interesting and sometimes terribly funny. Tom Cruise gives his looniest, most authoritative performance since 'Risky Business' and it can be said unblushingly that he holds his own with the masterly Hoffman.

SAY ANYTHING (PG-13). Trust Cameron Crowe, writer of 'Fast Times at Ridgemont High,' to dig among the slat heaps of an almost-mind-out genre — the teenage movie — and come up with one of the nicest of the species, a film of

stays on a grassed, slick tracks right to the end. Instead of building toward a comic paroxysm, it turns into a polyethylene grenade, made to explode Barbie dolls.

SPEED ZONE (PG). Hell on wheels. Yes, this is unofficially 'Cannonball III,' and, amazingly, director Jim Drake manages to do a worse job than Hal Needham did on the first two lemons. In this shameless exercise in celebrity mortgage-paying, formerly funny 'SCTV' alumni John Candy, Eugene Levy and Joe Flaherty — who ought to have their licenses suspended — race across what is ostensibly America but is really a particularly ugly section of Canada.

UNDER THE BOARDWALK (R). The first half of Fritz Kiersch's surfing comedy offers an amusing, fairly free-wheeling look at the shallow-water teen culture it portrays. But eventually it settles down to focus on a trite romance involving nose-stare-crossed lovers from different sides of the tracks. The jets are all here, and wherefore art thou, Romeo? On a 10-foot swell, dude.

WINTER PEOPLE (PG-13). Ted Kotcheff's 'The Winter People' has so many arresting characters and facets that when it begins to go completely haywire it is like watching someone you have

become rather fond of come unglued. What in heaven's name attracted Kurt Russell to a role where he could be upstaged by a 10-year-old, by an imitation-Rainmaker or by a raving backwoods madman? Kelly McGillis makes a heroic Callie Wright, although the notion of her wild unbridled passion for a baby's ruthless father seems to fall a little short, say, Cathy's for Heathcliff.

warth, insight, humor and surprising originality. Crowe's first direction is not perfect, but when it is good, which is very often, John Cusack is on screen, it is a living joy.

SHE'S OUT OF CONTROL (PG). The main trouble with 'She's Out of Control' is that it is never out of control. A widowed general manager (Tony Danza) at a failing rock radio station goes bonkers when his 15-year-old daughter

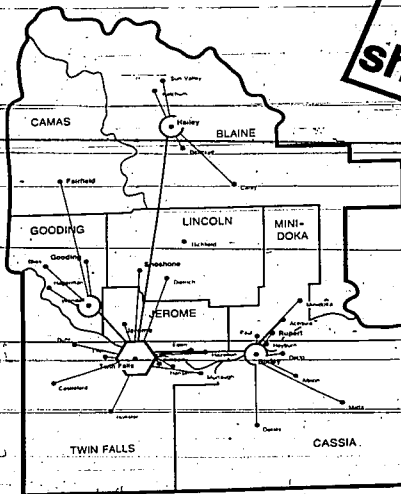
"No County shall be liable for out-of-district tuition unless the Board of County Commissioners of the County has first verified to the Junior College in writing the fact that the student is a resident of the County".

and

"A resident student is any student whose parents are court appointed guardians are domiciled in the Junior College district and provide more than fifty percent (50%) of his support".

A completed Certificate of Residency is required from all out-of-district students. If certification is not received the student will be required to pay the fee normally charged to the County. A new certificate must be obtained each year that you attend the College of Southern Idaho.

The Certificate of Residency blanks are available from the College Business Office, counseling offices, and most County Commissioner's offices. Each out-of-district student should obtain Certification from their County Commission.

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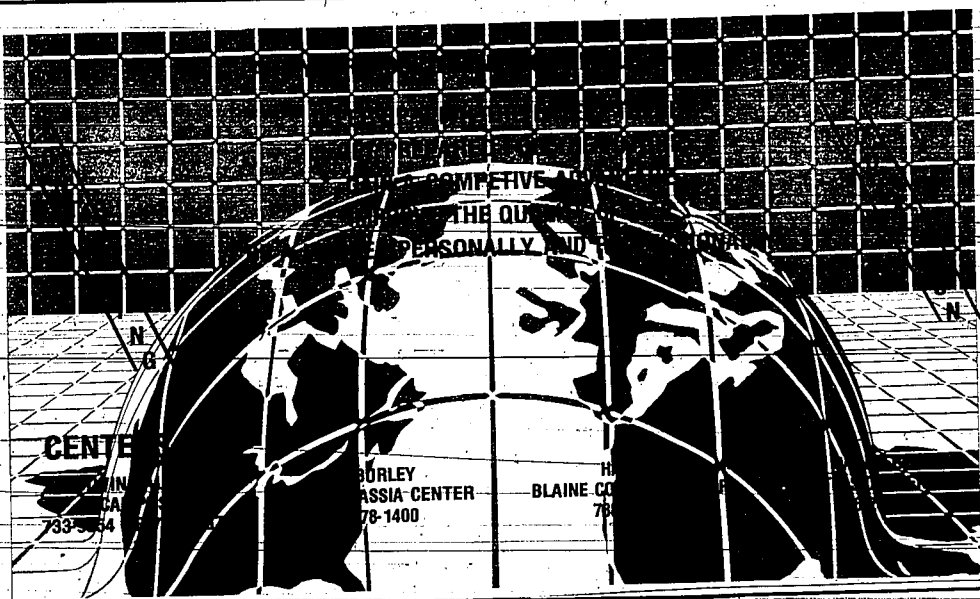

Auschwitz is ghastly scene for final 12 hours of 'War and Remembrance'

By BOB REMINGTON

Despite an underlying thread of soap opera and its almost cartoon portrayal of historical figures, "War and Remembrance" had several things going for it when it blew across TV screens last fall: Its submarine warfare scenes were the most realistic since "Das Boot," and its uncompromising depictions of Nazi death camp horror were frighteningly real.

When the remaining 12 hours come to ABC this week, from Sunday, May 7, through Wednesday, May 10, and concluding Sunday, May 14, viewers can expect more of the same. Put up with the rocky relationship between neurotic Rhoda (Polly Bergen) and her unfaithful husband Pug (Robert Mitchum), and eventually you'll get to the meat of "War and Remembrance" — graphic re-enactments of the Holocaust filmed in and around barracks and crematoriums painfully reconstructed on the actual site of the infamous Nazi death camps at Auschwitz and Birkenau.

"The key reason for me doing this whole thing was the Holocaust," says producer-director Dan Curtis. "It is the greatest horror ever perpetrated upon human beings. This kind of horror I really felt had to be shown."

"The reason we shot at Auschwitz was because I knew the audience, when they sat down to look at this, they would know that's where it actually happened, and that would bring

to it a reality that no set possibly could."

The first 18 hours of "War and Remembrance" ended last November with Natalie Henry (Jane Seymour) and her uncle, Aaron Jastrow (Sir John Gielgud), confined to a "paradise ghetto" at Theresienstadt in Czechoslovakia, a camp established as a Nazi propaganda ploy with operas, lectures and concerts. In Part II, Natalie and Aaron are sent from Theresienstadt to Auschwitz, scenes which Gielgud and Seymour said were among the most demanding of their careers.

"The first bit that we did at Auschwitz," it was minus 26 degrees," said Seymour. "And for the sake of authenticity, I wore just the shift that the prisoners wore. There was nowhere warm for me to stand. I got a cold, which developed into bronchitis, and eventually I got what they call walking pneumonia. I purposely lost weight for the Auschwitz scene. I wanted to really look drawn. So I foolishly starved myself—I got the desired effect, and unfortunately it didn't do any, you know, wonderful things for my health."

Gielgud concurs that the filming at Auschwitz was demanding, "not only physically, but also mentally. "It was a terrible experience, really. The

feeling you were in the actual place where it happened was fearfully depressing. It was an extraordinary experience, and it seemed so terrible that one should be doing a mock-up of something so basically frightful."

Despite outstanding performances by Gielgud and Seymour, ratings weren't exactly encouraging for the first 18 hours of "War and Remembrance" — possibly because the magnitude of the series seemed daunting to viewers. Curtis, however, hopes he achieves one thing — a realistic depiction of the Holocaust.

"I was afraid of failing," he says. "If I failed it wouldn't have done anything, but destroy me, because I will have felt that I have let down the millions of people that died. I think they deserve to have the story told, and I only pray to God that I've come close to accomplishing what I wanted to do."

NBC to take 'Quantum Leap' with new series

HOLLYWOOD — "I said: 'I'm going to pitch an idea that's going to scare the hell out of you,'" writer-producer Don Bellisario recalled, reminiscing about a many-months-ago meeting with NBC Entertainment President Brandon Tartikoff, who wanted him to create a new TV series for the network.

"And then, I pitched 'Quantum Leap.'"

Bellisario succeeded in scaring Tartikoff — who has been burned in the past with such science-fiction series as "V," "Something Is Out There" and "Misfits of Science" — but not enough to keep him from encouraging Bellisario to go forward with "Quantum Leap," a fantasy series that makes its debut Sunday night. Its regular time slot will be Friday nights.

Describing "Quantum Leap" is not easy, even for those involved.

Star Dean Cain, an Academy Award nominee for "Married to the Mob," compares it to the hit film "Back to the Future." Co-star Scott Bakula, who previously had the lead in the CBS comedy "Eisenhower and Lutz," likens it to "Heaven Can Wait," with an element of Walter Mitty thrown in.

Bellisario quickly points out what "Quantum Leap" is not.

"People look at the press releases and say, 'It's another Don Bellisario action show,'" said the producer, whose credits include "Magnum, P.I.," "Airwolf" and the short-lived "Tales of the Gold Monkey."

"The pilot has action, and there is adventure, but it's not action-adven-

ture," Bellisario continued during an interview here. "I didn't want to do another cop show, another adventure-with-helicopter-type adventure show. It's a drama, but it really has comedy and heart."

He also is unwilling to call the show science fiction, despite its strong fantasy element.

So what is it? "Quantum Leap" exactly, anyway?

This comedy-drama-but-not-action-adventure-even-though-it-has-action-and-adventure show is set in the mid 1990s and concerns a time travel experiment that goes awry. Young scientist Sam Beckett (Bakula) becomes trapped between 1956 and the present — roughly the span of his own lifetime — and bounces from decade to decade, always finding himself in the body of someone else. He and his scientific colleague, Albert (Stockwell), try to figure out how to get Beckett back to the future.

To the viewing audience, Beckett appears as Beckett. His new face — the one everyone around him sees — is only visible in a mirror. Beckett also loses most of his memory after making the leap. "He has a real case of jet lag, is what it amounts to," Bellisario said.

There is another catch: Wherever Beckett goes, he must do something to correct some mistake made in the past before moving on to another time and place. He does not rescue major political figures from assassination or prevent the Vietnam war, Bellisario said; Beckett's tasks are

NBC's bionic heroes take 1st

NEW YORK (AP) — NBC's bionic heroes defeated some other people's heroes on ABC and CBS to win the first Sunday movie showdown of the May ratings sweep.

"Bionic Showdown: The Return of the Six Million Dollar Man and the Bionic Woman-II" ranked 11th for the week, with a Nielsen rating of 17.6 and a 28 share.

ABC's "My Name is Bill W.," about the founder of Alcoholics Anonymous, had a 16-2 and 24 and ranked 24th. Part one of CBS' two-part "Guts & Glory: The Rise and Fall of Oliver North" came in third Sunday with a 14.0 and a 23 share to rank 31st.

The rating is a percentage of the nation's 9.4 million homes with television. The share is a percentage of sets actually in use.

A repeat of ABC's "Roseanne" was the highest-rated show of the week, edging a new episode of NBC's "The Cosby Show." "Cosby" had a slightly lower rating but a higher share, apparently because of daylight-saving time when there are fewer viewers at 8 p.m. EDT compared with 9 p.m. when

"Roseanne" airs. The top-10 shows-of-the-week were: "Roseanne," ABC; "Cosby," NBC; "Cheers," NBC; "A Different World," NBC; "Murder, She Wrote," CBS; "Golden Girls," NBC; "D&D John," NBC; "L.A. Law," NBC; "The Wonder Years," ABC, and "Empty Nest," ABC.

NBC won the week ending April 30, its 45th in a row, with an average rating of 13.7 to CBS' 11.7 and ABC's 11.4. The week included five days of the May sweep, one of four month-long periods a year when local stations' ratings are measured.

The "CBS Evening News" pulled into a tie with "ABC World News Tonight" in the news ratings. Each had a 9.8 rating and 21 share. "NBC Nightly News" had an 8.7 rating and 19 share.

The lowest-rated prime-time shows of the week were: "Dream Street," "West 57th," "Hard Time on Planet Earth," "Moonlighting," "A Man Called Hawk," "Over the Edge," "Living Large," "Jim Henson," "Heart and Soul" and "Code One."

'Crimes II' pulled after advertisers show no interest

NEW YORK (AP) — ABC pulled a program dealing with crimes of passion after advertisers showed no interest in the show, which included re-enactments of violent crimes, the network announced Tuesday.

"Crimes of Passion II" was replaced Saturday night by "Livin' Large" and "Heart and Soul," two 1988 comedy pilots that did not make ABC's program schedule.

Advertisers have begun to shun explicit programming in response to protest, by viewers. Their decision not to back "Crimes of Passion II" did not appear related to ratings, since an earlier episode of the show aired last October and did well.

The first "Crimes of Passion" garnered a 13.2 rating and 23 share in the Wednesday time period now occupied by "China Beach." By comparison, "China Beach" had a 12.2 rating and 21 share last week. The rating is a percentage of the nation's 90.4 million households with television. The share is a percentage of sets in use.

Advertisers pulled out of NBC's Geraldo Rivera special on devil worship earlier this season and others backed off from NBC's satirical "Saturday Night Live." A Michigan woman's campaign against Fox's raunchy "Married ... With Children" received publicity earlier this year. Fox says the relatively high-rated show remains sold out, nonetheless.

NBC News undergoes major restructuring for more efficiency

NEW YORK (AP) — NBC News has undergone a "major restructuring" aimed at increasing efficiency, NBC News President Michael Gartner announced Wednesday.

Miami bureau chief Donald Browne has been named executive news director, overseeing all bureaus, correspondents and producers and coordinating coverage for all NBC News programs. Browne will report jointly to Gartner and senior vice presidents Joe Angotti in New York and Timothy Iversen in Washington.

NBC News spokeswoman Peggy Hubble said the changes do not affect anchor Tom Brokaw, who remains managing editor of "NBC

Nightly News."

In a statement, Gartner said the aim of the restructuring was elimination of duplication of effort that will "make life easier for correspondents and producers in the field and producers and writers on the programs."

Gartner also gave "Today" show director George Paul additional duties overseeing the on-air look of all NBC News programs.

Bob Keyes, director of news planning, was named director of news operations and will serve as Gartner's special assistant.

"NBC Nightly News" has been in third place in the news ratings for more than a year, and NBC remains the only network with no prime-time news programming.
