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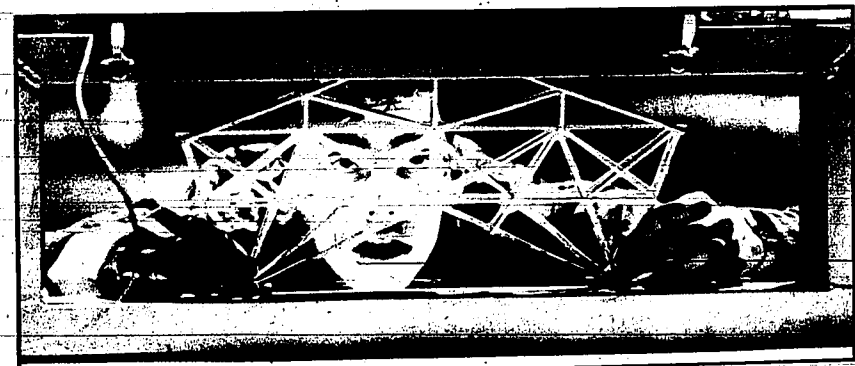

Bendorf's bridge proves best of lot

JEROME — Anyone who needs a bridge built should call Becky Bendorf — in about five years, after she finishes high school and college.

Bendorf, a Bliss High School junior, placed first Thursday in a regional bridge-building contest sponsored by the University of Idaho College of Engineering.

She entered a simple, flexible bridge relying on a series of triangular braces. Under intense pressure from a hydraulic press, the structure bent in several places and finally popped rather than collapsed — at a measurement of 226.5 pounds per square inch.

Thursday's event at Jerome High School was part of a statewide contest honoring the Idaho Centennial. Organizers will name an overall winner Monday, said university spokesman Matt Racki.

"The statewide winner will receive a year's tuition at the U of I," Racki explained. The top three winners at each of five regional contests will receive \$250, \$100 and \$50 prizes.

"I'm not usually into building

bridges, but this is wonderful," said Bendorf, who hopes to major in secondary education at the U of I.

Sixty-nine Magic Valley juniors and seniors from seven schools built bridges for the competition. Jerome physics teacher Tom Coupe said his students have worked on their bridges for about two months.

"One reason I built my bridge is because I had to," said senior Asa Larsson, whose bridge buckled at 94.5 PSI. "It was either that or write a report on nuclear waste."

Still, Larsson expressed surprise that the project turned out to be so much fun.

"I made triangles everywhere on my bridge," she said. "I guess you

should calculate the angles, too, but I didn't."

Each student was given a kit containing 12 3-inch pieces of one-eighth-inch balsam wood, 10 feet of nylon line, a piece of 1/4-inch plywood for the deck, two base blocks and a tube of glue. They were told to build bridges 6 inches high and 16 inches long.

"We didn't restrict them as to where they could get advice," said Richard Nielsen, a U of I civil engineering instructor. "But the students had to design their bridges by themselves."

Nielsen judged the bridges with the help of a hydraulic press that crushed each bridge at five points.

"At most of the locations around the state, the bridges are averaging around 200 PSI," he said. "An extremely good bridge would be around 300 PSI, which would probably be in the neighborhood of 750 pounds of force."

The second-place winner in the Magic Valley was Jerome senior Neil Fox, with a 184.5 PSI. Third place went to Jerome senior Raymond Robinson, with 162.5 PSI. All winners remain tentatively placed until final scores are tallied by the U of I.

Idaho bans use of Alar on apples

BOISE — Idaho became the first state Thursday to ban the use of its apple-crop of the ripening agent Alar, a chemical suspected of causing cancer.

Although apple growers say they're not convinced there's anything wrong with Alar, they said to protect the reputation of their product, they will not use it.

"In order to remove any confusion or concern on the part of the public I am moving immediately to comply with the request of the Idaho Apple Commission and the Idaho Horticultural Society to restrict the usage of Alar in Idaho," said Gov. Cecil Andrus.

"Even though there is no conclusive evidence of the health risk associated with Alar, the continuing controversy is threatening our world-class product," Andrus said. "That is simply unacceptable."

Spokesmen for Idaho's \$26 million apple industry estimated growers have lost more than \$1 million this season because consumers are concerned about the health risks of Alar. Idaho produces about 3 million bushels per year, mainly in the southwestern counties of Canyon, Gem and Washington. Some apples also are grown in the Magic Valley area.

The 1988 crop brought \$25.6 million.

Andrus said the Apple Commission asked him to restrict the use of Alar by signing an emergency order requiring anyone who has Alar to report to the Department of Agriculture the amount on hand.

A permit must be obtained before it can be used, and growers marketing any apples treated with Alar must notify the state.

State Agriculture Director Richard Rush said it amounted to a

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Surge in fuel prices drives inflation up

WASHINGTON — The largest one-month jump in gasoline prices since the government began keeping track in the 1950s sent the overall inflation rate for consumers soaring 0.7 percent in April, the sharpest advance in more than two years, the government said Thursday.

The Labor Department said gasoline prices skyrocketed 11.4 percent in April, following substantial gains of 2.1 percent in March and 1.7 percent in February.

"Financial markets, noting the heavy influence of the energy price gains, which are not expected to repeat in the coming months, shrugged off the bad news. The Dow Jones industrial stock average slipped 5 points in the first half hour of trading but then quickly recovered. The overall April increase, if it continued for 12 months, would amount to an annual inflation rate of 8.1 percent. It was the sharpest climb since an identical 0.7 percent gain in January 1987.

For the first four months of 1989, inflation was running at an annual rate of 6.6 percent, half again the 4.4 percent rate posted for both 1988 and 1987.

The Bush administration, which is hoping inflation will moderate and allow the Federal Reserve Board to push down interest rates, read the report favorably.

Energy accounted for about 60 percent of the April advance. The previous monthly record for gasoline was 7.4 percent, hit in January 1987 and March 1984.

The department noted, however, that although gasoline prices have zoomed upward 16.7 percent this year, they were still 17.7 percent below their peak in March 1988 during the OPEC oil crisis.

The 5.1 percent advance for all energy costs also set a record and followed a 1.1 percent rise in March.

Ruling in abortion case generates speculation

WASHINGTON — The Supreme Court on Thursday disposed of a Florida case that sparked some unusual judicial acts and widespread speculation about Justice Anthony M. Kennedy's views on abortion.

All in all, the case may be far less consequential outside the Sunshine State than some claimed.

Nevertheless, the case illustrated vividly how potentially explosive any abortion-related dispute has become as the nation awaits a Supreme Court ruling on the fate of Roe vs. Wade, its 1973 decision legalizing abortion.

The court is being asked in a Missouri case to overturn or curtail Roe vs. Wade, which said women have a

constitutional right to end their pregnancies. A decision is expected by late June.

Into this mix was thrown the case of T.W., a 15-year-old Florida girl who earlier this month sought a state judge's permission to have an abortion.

In its action Thursday, the U.S. Supreme Court cleared the way for unmarried women under 18 to obtain abortions without getting the consent required by Florida law. But within hours, the state was back before the Florida Supreme Court asking it to either expedite a review of the 1988 law or allow its enforcement until the state justices

China leaders seek end to 6-day protest

BEIJING — Communist Party chief Zhao Ziyang and Premier Li Peng visited student hunger strikers before dawn Friday, urging their "good intentions" but urging them to end their six-day protest.

The students said they would end their fast only when the government agrees to their demands for negotiations. They said they believed no progress would occur until Chinese leader Deng Xiaoping steps down.

On Thursday, nearly a million people poured into central Beijing, demanding Deng's resignation and expressing support for the 3,000 students who are fasting for democratic reform.

On Friday morning, thousands began flocking again to the square in support of the students. Showers had turned Tiananmen Square into a squalid cesspool's camp, with students lying on dirty blankets across wet plastic sheets.

"Ziyang, dialogue, Ziyang, dialogue," the students chanted when they first saw Zhao at 4:45 a.m.

"You have good intentions," the party general secretary was quoted by the official Xinhua news agency as saying.

Xinhua said students cheered and clapped when Zhao and Li made their unscheduled appearances.

But students said they were disappointed with the visit.

Governor sticks with deadline for waste shipments into Idaho

BOISE — Frustrated by another failure of the federal government to keep its word, Gov. Cecil Andrus on Thursday stood by his Sept. 1 deadline for ending radioactive waste shipments to Idaho for temporary storage.

"We have been misled for the last time," Andrus said in the face of a new delay in the scheduled opening of the nation's first permanent dump for nuclear waste from federal weapons production plants.

"They must know that Idaho is no longer the nation's nuclear waste safety valve," the

governor declared. "That role is now available for someone else to assume."

A day earlier, Energy Secretary James Watkins advised the Senate Armed Services Committee that the Environmental Protection Agency was so far behind in meeting some environmental requirements that Waste Isolation Pilot Plant near Carlsbad, N.M., will not open as promised in September.

"He gave me no new target date for opening the underground repository, saying it could have been accepted that kind of waste this year."

But after talking with both Andrus and Idaho Sen. James McClure late Thursday, Watkins issued another statement, saying the problems causing the delay involved only hazardous, but not radioactive, waste and waste that contains both hazardous and radioactive components.

He said the government still planned to begin shipping so-called transuranic waste, which contains only low-level radioactive material, to the plant beginning in September. Idaho has been accepting that kind of waste this year.

The department expects to ship

transuranic waste to the WIPP facility when it opens in September and will comply with the previous governor's agreements," Watkins said in his latest statement.

Andrus, who has been in regular contact with Bush administration officials on the issue, had received repeated assurances from Watkins and others. The last just three weeks ago, that the repository was on schedule and would open as planned.

"Apparently, that is no longer the case," he said. "I can't say there is any reason to believe what they tell me."

Environmental activists of the Snake Riv-

er Alliance indicated little surprise at the new delay in opening a facility whose safety they have repeatedly questioned.

It was the third time in six years that the government has broken a promise to begin removing more than 2.2 million cubic feet of radioactive waste from the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory, where it has accumulated in above-ground storage over the last quarter century. Most of that waste was generated at the Rocky Flats nuclear weapons plant in Colorado.

Navy finds fraud, waste at base

BAVVIEW (AP) — U.S. Navy investigators have substantiated part of a list of allegations of fraud, waste, abuse and mismanagement in the Seawolf attack submarine program at the Navy's acoustic research base on Lake Pend Oreille, officials disclosed.

"What this concerns is a very sensitive, security-shrouded military device that has been, by some employees' estimations, mismanaged from the standpoint of security breaches, general inefficiencies, lack of concern for quality tests, and cost overruns," Rep. Larry Craig, R-Idaho, said Wednesday.

Craig and Sen. Steve Symms, R-Idaho, were approached last fall by a group of employees of Tracor Applied Sciences engineering division at the Bavierow base. An eight-month investigation into their complaints and allegations appears to be nearing completion, congressional aides said.

Rear Adm. M.E. Chang of the Naval Inspector General's office said in a Jan. 30 letter to Symms that the investigation had substantiated several of the allegations.

School vandalism reaches \$10,000

ABERDEEN (AP) — Officers say the damage could be up to \$10,000 in a weekend vandalism spree at Aberdeen High School.

Just five months ago, work was finished on a \$2 million renovation at the school.

Investigating officers said after the damage was discovered Sunday morning, two juveniles were arrested and stolen property was recovered.

Officers said the two male juveniles entered through windows of the home economics room around midnight Saturday, and vandalized several rooms. They poured paint over three computer components, dumped books, put paint on the doors and walls, and destroyed the intercom system.

Judge dismisses civil rights charges

BOISE (AP) — A judge has dismissed charges that Boise School District officials conspired to violate a 16-year-old student's civil rights after she made allegations of sexual abuse.

Fourth District Judge Robert Newhouse, acting on a standing defense motion, ordered the cause of action dropped Wednesday after hearing the bulk of plaintiff Greta Hosner's case on these issues.

"I carefully waited until I heard these witnesses," Newhouse said in an interview. "The facts as presented didn't constitute sufficient cause to go to the jury."

Newhouse's action leaves seven remaining civil charges, with Hosner accusing district officials and social studies teacher John Keith Carlson of negligence. The teacher, a bachelor, also is accused of battery and intentional infliction of emotional distress.

During the 12-day-old civil trial, Hosner's attorney, Breck Seiminger of Boise, has sought to prove the former Boise High School student was denied rights to due process and protection of liberties by the district's decision not to report the allegations to outside authorities.

Senators protest trade barriers

WASHINGTON (AP) — Idaho's two senators have joined 11 colleagues in calling on President Bush to move against Japanese trade barriers to U.S. wood products sales.

In a letter to the president, they urged Bush to invoke provisions of the 1988 trade bill that would result in retaliatory trade sanctions if the Japanese refuse to negotiate an agreement.

The specific provision would focus trade negotiations "on those foreign trade barriers that, if eliminated, would result in a large increase in U.S. exports."

"We believe the Japanese forest products barriers certainly fit that description," the senators wrote.

A recent U.S. Commerce Department report indicated trade practices including high tariffs, subsidies and discriminatory standards are being used by Japan to protect its mills from U.S. imports.

5 Indian tribes launch coalition

FORT HALL (AP) — Following up on their successful defense of cigarette and sales tax exemptions during the 1989 Legislature, Idaho's five Indian tribes have formed a new political coalition.

The Alliance of Idaho Tribes was launched Wednesday in Fort Hall. The Alliance of Idaho Tribes Executive Committee Chairman Allen V. Pinkham was named interim chairman.

Besides the Lapwai-based Nez Perce, the alliance includes the Coeur d'Alene Tribe of Plummer, the Kootenai Tribe of Bonners Ferry, the Shoshone Paiute tribes of Duck Valley and the Shoshone-Bannock tribes of Fort Hall.

Former state representative and congressional candidate Jeanne Givens of Coeur d'Alene said the tribes began working together effectively during this year's legislative session, and the alliance is an extension of that unity.

Mall, bowling alley go to auction

POCAHELLO (AP) — Loan officials said the 15-year-old foreclosures, one by the Small Business Administration, is putting the Pocatello Mall and Moonlight Lanes on the auction block.

The two buildings will be auctioned by the U.S. Marshall's office on June 8.

SIS funding shift may jeopardize project

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — A House panel has narrowly approved an \$11 million funding shift for Special Isotope Separation project, which a legislator says could indicate problems when it comes time to fund the full project.

The Special Isotope Separation project is planned by the Department of Energy for the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory in eastern Idaho. Action this week shifts \$6 million from construction of the plutonium-producing facility into further environmental testing, along

with \$6 million from other sources. A panel on DOE defense nuclear facilities voted 8-6 Tuesday to recommend the shift, but it wants an outside review of environmental documents before crucial SIS tests begin in California.

Rep. Albert Bustamante, D-Texas, a persistent critic of the SIS, said Thursday in a telephone interview "the vote signals 'heavy concern' over DOE activities and management."

He said it indicates that the project may face trouble in the appropriations process. "DOE officials know that they have a real job to before them," Bustamante said.

The DOE requested the \$11 million shift for project research at Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory in California. Livermore is studying SIS laser technology to prepare for construction at INEL. The DOE hopes to run plutonium tests on the Livermore lasers this fall.

But environmental review at Livermore has come under fire in the last month. In April, the Natural Resources Defense Council said it would sue the DOE, claiming the Energy Department should complete an environmental impact statement on the Livermore research. An EIS was completed on proposed project

operations in Idaho. Rep. Pete Stark, D-Calif., whose district includes the Livermore site, urged the House panel to oppose SIS until it is studied further.

"This is the first time I've heard that something can be potentially hazardous in Idaho and completely safe in California," he said in a prepared statement. "It is probable that the Livermore SIS is even more dangerous than the proposed Idaho facility."

Afterward, he gave mixed reviews to the plan for independent study.

"While I think the Department of Energy should complete an environmental impact statement, (Tuesday's) action goes a long way toward safeguarding our community," he said.

Educators blast proposal for teacher certification

LEWISTON (AP) — Educators at a public hearing blasted a controversial proposal to provide a shortcut for teacher certification in Idaho, calling it offensive to the teaching profession.

Instead of making it easier to become a secondary school teacher, critics of the proposal said, state officials should provide better training for current and prospective teachers.

"As I read the proposal here, I don't see anything about it that would make our profession better," said Shirley Ringo, a Moscow School District teacher.

Wednesday night's hearing at Lewis-Clark State College was the first of six scheduled throughout the state by the Idaho Professional Standards Commission.

Current rules for teacher certification require only a bachelor's degree in education from an accredited college of education. But the proposal under consideration would allow alternate certification after only nine credit hours of instruction at an accredited college of education.

After that, a training plan would be developed and the teacher's progress would be monitored for two years by a mentor teacher, an administrator in the local school district, a college representative and a representative of the Idaho Office of Teacher Education and Certification.

Another six to nine credits of coursework would be required after the training period's first year. But work as a student teacher would not be required, which would mean someone could start teaching full time without classroom experience.

Supporters say the move would attract talented professional people in needed subjects such as math and science.

While only 11 people attended Wednesday's hearing, they had plenty of criticism for the proposal. "This proposal assumes anyone can teach if he has knowledge, and I think that's wrong," said Earl Triggstad, a teacher in the Lewiston School District.

Michael Friend, a Professional Standards Commission staff member, said a commission task force will meet June 26 in Boise to review testimony from the hearings. Findings will be presented July 19-20 to the full commission, and a report will be submitted to the Idaho Board of Education by Aug. 15.

Jury convicts Nampa man of murder

CALDWELL (AP) — A 3rd District Court jury deliberated less than an hour Thursday before convicting David Card, 29, of two counts of first-degree murder.

Card, Nampa, was charged with killing Eugene Morey, 41, and his wife, Shirley, 40, last June 6 in front of a Nampa convenience store as they were sitting in a car rolling newspapers for delivery.

The case went to the jury in the fourth day of a trial before District Judge Jim Doollittle.

Doollittle did not set an immediate date for a sentencing hearing at which the "most violent" aggravating factors before deciding on a penalty. It can be only life imprisonment or the death penalty.

His mother, Helen Sullivan, testified Wednesday that ever since suffering a serious head injury in a traffic accident 12 years ago, David Card has heard voices.

Don't condemn Jim Wright on rule misinterpretation

Politics makes strange bedfellows, for what else can explain that the constitutional scholars of the New Right and Jim Wright share a common vision?

For eight years, Reagan administration legal pundits beseeched the federal courts to interpret the Constitution by reference to the "original intent" of its framers. Since James Madison and Alexander Hamilton are not around to be asked, the administration said, courts should pore over the Federalist Papers to divine what the framers intended in 1789 about modern constitutional issues like electronic surveillance and pornography videotapes.

Questions of doctrine's intent have come up in the investigation of House Speaker Jim Wright, D-Texas, by the House ethics committee. He has been accused of several violations of House rules governing standards of conduct. The issue that has captured the most public attention relates to Wright's book "Reflections of a Public Man."

"House rules limit the amount any member may earn in income from House more than 30 percent of his or her congressional salary. Earned income is income received for personal services, such as making speeches. It is distinguished from unearned income, which includes dividends, interest, rents, inheritances and the like, and which House rules do not limit. But House rules exempt from the 30 percent limit on outside earned

income royalties earned from books and other copyrighted products, such as songs. According to Rep. David Obey, D-Wis., that exclusion of royalties was complete, total, comprehensive, blanket, and every other term you can think of. In this matter, Obey's Madison and Hamilton rolled into one, since he wrote the rule and chaired the commission that proposed the rule to the House. And he is still alive.

Richard Philbin, the special counsel investigating Wright has, however, persuaded the ethics committee, preliminarily at least, to take the position that the copyright royalty exclusion is not a blanket exemption. Forget what the words say, goes the special counsel's refrain, and consider what the House must have intended. The special counsel points to three aspects of the legislative history as evidence of that intent.

But one need never even get to legislative history to know that Obey is right and the special counsel is wrong. The Supreme Court's official position on statutory construction is simple: If it looks like a duck, then it's a duck. Specifically, one must presume that the ordinary meaning of (statutory) language accurately expresses the legislative purpose. "Further, the

Supreme Court has decreed that "when words are free from doubt they must be taken as the final expression of the legislative intent, and are not to be added to or subtracted from by considerations drawn ... from any extraneous source."

The copyright royalty exclusion is a duck, and the committee should have looked beyond the House rules' plain language that excludes such royalties from the definition of earned income.

The term "outside earned income" means, with respect to a Member, wages, salaries, professional fees, honorariums, and other amounts (other than copyright royalties) received or to be received as compensation for personal services. Now, that may well be a lousy rule, and perhaps the committee should propose that the copyright royalty exclusion be narrowed. The special counsel has done a fine job of describing some of the potential problems created by a blanket exemption, and for that he can be commended. Wright's publisher sold his book in bulk to various groups and individuals, and as a result, that has been no secret for years. The speaker disclosed the royalty income on public disclosure forms, reported it to the Internal Revenue Service and paid taxes on it.

Perhaps there should be no exemption for royalties from bulk sales, or no exemption for royalties when the books are purchased

in connection with a speech. That, however, is not what the rule says. The special counsel is convinced that the copyright exclusion is not what it says, and that the legislative history confirms that. He is wrong on both counts.

The special counsel relies on three things as support for his reinterpretation of rules: "Advisory Opinion 13, adopted by the ethics committee a year after the outside income rule was passed by the House. The

advisory opinion relates to attempts to mischaracterize earned income (which is not limited) as unearned income (which is not limited) to divert whether copyright royalties (which everyone agrees are earned income) are exempt from the 30 percent earned income limit. Donald Terry, the ethics committee attorney who wrote the advisory opinion, says flatly: The advisory opinion had nothing to do with copyright royalties and does not support the special counsel's reinterpretation of the rule. As you may have guessed, the special counsel has not even bothered to speak with Terry, who still works in the House.

Proposed language submitted by a Washington law firm for possible inclusion in Advisory Opinion 13. The language does support the special counsel's interpretation. However, that language was tossed into the wastebasket by the ethics committee staff at the time. It was not included in the advisory opinion.

"Senate consideration of a similar royalty exclusion proposal. The special counsel is confident that the Senate's hearings and debates about a Senate earned-income rule were relied on by the ethics commission when it wrote the House's copyright rule in fact exclusion. That theory is manifestly absurd. That the ethics commission assumed its final report before the Senate's discussions even began. Even if the Senate's deliberations had predated the Obey commission's final report, they tend to support to the special counsel's interpretation of the House rule. The Senate passed a blanket royalty exclusion just like the House. But then it rejected its entire outside earned-income rule before it ever went into effect.

Perhaps reasonable persons can differ over what the House's copyright royalty exclusion means. But it is not reasonable, indeed, it is outrageous, that the special counsel, in the course of his \$1.6 million investigation, never even bothered to speak to the author of the rule and the author of the House's final report. If the committee passes judgment without hearing from the framers, that will be the Speaker of the House, not just the rule, that has been framed.

Democracy profits as China's student dissension spreads

NANJING, China — For a while it looked as if the democracy movement at Nanjing University would fizzle out.

While university students in Beijing led marches and demonstrations on Tian An Men Square in the movement of 1989, the student protest in Nanjing was effectively broken up by the police.

The situation here, however, has changed dramatically. On Tuesday, students took over the Nanjing University public address system at 7 a.m. and demanded a boycott in support of the hunger striking students. The hunger strike, which was taking place during the visit of Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev. As four students placed a poster featuring the words of the Chinese national anthem — "All who do not wish to be slaves, stand up! Stand up! Build a new Great Wall with our flesh and blood" — plainclothes policemen took photos and demanded their names. On Wednesday, 20,000 to 30,000 students marched up and down the streets of Nanjing waving banners and shouting pro-democracy slogans.

Like their counterparts in Beijing, the Nanjing students are demanding freedom of speech, freedom of the press and the formation of an autonomous student union, elected by the students themselves. Their message, without directly saying so, is that they want freedom from Communist-Party controls.

Nanjing students support the Beijing students' hunger strike and urge that the government permanently guarantee the absolute immunity of any students involved in the protest. A small group has set at the main gates of Nanjing

University, forming the Chinese character for "democracy" and blocking traffic. They want the government to enter a dialogue with the new independent student union by Saturday, a date that is significant for two reasons: It marks the founding of Nanjing University and also the 1931 action by Chiang Kai-shek's troops to withdraw more than 30 students were killed and several hundred others wounded during a protest against the weak-kneed Kuomintang defense policy toward the Japanese.

This week's protest is well-organized, the marches are well-controlled and great effort is being made to prevent the outbreak of violence. Students are now signing their names and room numbers on posters. The departments and groups within the university are making specific demands. More than 100 professors have signed a poster declaring their support for the student boycott of classes and in support of scholars in Beijing. Additionally, Nanjing journalists have put up their own poster saying, "We cannot write what we say with our own pens, or say what we want with our own mouths."

Rumors of a strike by 70,000 Beijing steel workers were denied on the government-controlled television. The reason in fact is a strike but that the number of workers involved is probably less than 70,000. It is quite evident that students do have popular support — the one force the People's Republic truly fears — as people from all walks of Chinese society are watching the

demonstrations and donating money to the student cause.

The government no longer attempts to denounce the student democracy movement as being controlled by a small faction of radical, "destructive elements." Instead, it confirms the good intentions of the students but does not recognize the legitimacy or patriotism of the pro-democracy movement. At the same time, it has adopted a policy of "time will tell." In order to install the government's own idea of "democracy," Li Peiyang, a member of the Politburo and minister of education who has met with Beijing student leaders, argues that China needs stability, self-

restraint, and, most of all, order.

The best possible scenario would be for one of China's aging leaders to resign and accept responsibility for the lack of political reforms, and for the government to begin new initiatives. The second best possibility would be for the government to accept the legitimacy of an independent student union as a gradualist approach to long-term reforms. A more likely approach would be a continued dialogue with the students, yet not granting official recognition. The last possibility is a curfew, or worse, the iron fist of repression.

So far the pro-democracy movement has remained non-violent, its use of class boycotts and hunger strikes representing new phenomena in Chinese society. If the movement continues to gain, if China becomes truly threatened by the strikes, the current climate of toleration could turn toward a crackdown, particularly if the students begin to formulate concrete alternatives to the present political and economic system.

Yet if the momentum and non-violent pressures can be kept up, the pro-democracy movement also could make some substantial gains to the surprise of many. The government acceptance of an independent student union going beyond a mere

dialogue would represent a start, a step toward resolving the situation in a manner beyond anyone's expectation. While thrilled by the response, student leaders also are keeping a wary eye on news reports from around the country, fearful of a crackdown.

Whatever happens, though, the student know that this protest has made a moment when democracy in China became possible, and they will do all they can for that goal.

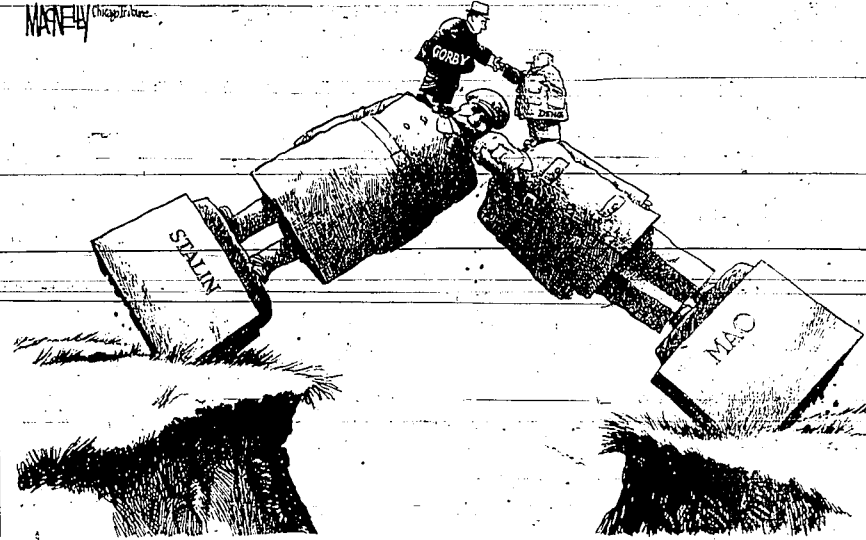

Shareholders confront Exxon chairman

PARSHIPANY, N.J. (AP) — Dissident Exxon Corp. shareholders dragged their chairman through a 4-hour, 20-minute annual meeting on Thursday, challenging him to explain the company's actions in the nation's worst oil spill.

Outside, about 250 demonstrators gathered peacefully, listening to speeches by ecologist Barry

Commoner and others. Three dozen police officers kept them from the entrance of the suburban hotel 35 miles west of New York City where the meeting was held.

Exxon Chairman Lawrence G. Rawl rejected one suggestion that he resign from the biggest American oil company and another suggestion that he put his Exxon shares into a special fund for ensuring oil tanker safety.

"Management has to take responsibility," said shareholder Dorothy Brave Edinburg. "Some heads have to fall."

Some shareholders came for the excitement of potential confrontation between environmentalists and company management. In fact, the questioning was tough but orderly.

Outside the meeting, Commoner, a former presidential candidate, told the crowd that the spill points out what he called U.S. overreliance on fossil fuels.

"As we've said before, the board and all of our employees are profoundly sorry about the impact this major accident has had on the natural environment and the people who live and work in the region," Rawl told about 2,000 shareholders and others.

"The accident itself cannot be undone," he said.

"In time when the job is done I'm confident that it will be evident to every fair-minded person that our employees met this major challenge with a high level of determination and professionalism."

"We're determined to show through deeds that we really care about the environment and wildlife," Rawl said.

Rawl showed a 15-minute film prepared by Exxon on the March 24 spill by the Exxon Valdez in Alaska's Prince William Sound.

During a prolonged question-and-answer session afterward, Rawl rejected a suggestion that he resign, made by Ed Rothschild of the activist group Citizen Action.

"The answer is, no, I won't," Rawl said to a mixture of applause and boos. He said his resignation would distract the company at a critical time.

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Wright faces steady erosion of support with Democrats; talk of dignified resignation

WASHINGTON (AP) — House Speaker Jim Wright faced a steady erosion of support Thursday among the Democrats who elected him, as even his supporters talked about finding a dignified way for him to step down.

Wright himself pinned his hopes on a televised public hearing next week, gambling that it would give his lawyers a chance to eliminate the major charges against him.

"I think we're going to be successful in these motions. I have every confidence," Wright said, making a brief appearance before television cameras to pronounce himself "delighted" that the House ethics committee had scheduled a hearing for Tuesday.

Wright's supporters agreed that the motions may be make-or-break time for the Texas Democrat, who is charged with 59 violations of House rules. But others in the Democratic caucus were saying openly that regardless of any legal rulings, Wright's political battle already is lost.

"It's time for a leadership change," Rep. Phil Sharp, D-Ind., said after a meeting of all seven Indiana Democratic House members on Wednesday. Wright, he said, has become too preoccupied with his ethics battle to provide adequate leadership on legislation.

The ethics committee, after a 2 1/2-hour meeting, announced that it would hold a six-hour televised hearing on Tuesday to let Wright's lawyers argue why the panel should drop the most serious charges against the speaker: that he evaded limits on outside income through bulk sales of his book, and that he accepted \$145,000 in gifts from a business partner with a direct interest in legislation.

"We welcome the opportunity for our case — and we believe it is very, very strong — to be heard before the public," Wright said.

Wright himself will not appear at the hearing, but his legal team will argue that the ethics committee has stretched House rules in charging their client with wrongdoing.

Ethics committee special outside counsel Richard J. Phelan will argue the committee's position, and the ethics panel could rule on the issue sometime next week. "Phelan's position is very well founded," said committee chairman Julian Dixon, D-Calif.

The ethics panel also voted to release to Wright's lawyers three documents on which their interpretations are partially based. But it denied the speaker access to advisory opinions on ethical questions which the panel has given other House members, saying that to release them "would violate confidentiality the members receiving the opinions expect."

FAA to demand airlines service old Boeing jets

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Federal Aviation Administration said Thursday it will order airlines to strengthen and replace parts on aging Boeing jetliners — at a cost of millions of dollars — but would give the airlines four years to finish the work.

With the average age of U.S. jetliners climbing to nearly 13 years, the FAA issued a series of "airworthiness directives" altering the government's approach to ensuring the safety of older airliners.

The agency said it hoped to make the orders final by late summer.

For affected planes, parts of the fuselage, wings, doors, the tail assembly, landing gear and engine struts will have to be strengthened or replaced as planes age.

The FAA said its orders will initially apply to 115 Boeing 727s, 737s and 747s and would require work costing \$142 million.

More planes will be affected as they age. An industry group estimated that needed modifications eventually would cost U.S. and foreign airlines \$800 million and affect 1,300 planes now in service.

Airlines will give up to four years to make the required modifications on each plane.

"Due to the magnitude of the modification program, FAA anticipates that the work will be staggered over a period of time and generally coordinated with other scheduled maintenance," the agency said.

Reagan on Rushmore? His fans think so

WASHINGTON (AP) — Some admirers, convinced Ronald Reagan's place in history will be monumental, think the place for a monument to him is amid the greats on Mount Rushmore.

But Tom Griffith, executive secretary of the Mount Rushmore Society in Rapid City, S.D., suggests they have rocks in their heads.

"Why fool with a masterpiece?" asks Griffith. "Would you paint another figure next to the Mona Lisa?"

The idea of adding Reagan to Mount Rushmore was advanced in 1984 by Frank Palrenkopf, Jr., then Republican national chairman. But its current champion is R. Emmett Tyrrell, Jr., editor of the American Spectator, a monthly conservative review. He says Reagan earned a place on the mountaintop, beside Washington, Jefferson, Lincoln and Theodore Roosevelt, because "he brought peace and prosperity to a country riven by fear."

He sounds half serious — and half not-serious — but he says he did raise the idea with Reagan over dinner last July.

Reagan "smiled," he said. "Ever since word got out, Tyrrell said, he has been dogged by 'the maniacs in favor and the maniacs against.'"

Out of ecological consideration, he said, he'd be willing to cast a concrete Reagan nose and chin and an ear or two and helicopter them in, keeping blasting on the mountain to a minimum.

Also promoting the idea is Young Americans for Freedom, which sent out an add-Reagan-to-Rushmore ballot in 23,000 fund-raising letters. The results will be counted in June, said Tom Lizardo, YAF executive director, and if the response is "an enthusiastic go-for-it, YAF may petition the Interior Department."

"It won't happen," says Griffith, whose organization raised the original \$1 million required for 300 workmen to dynamite and drill the visages of the four presidents into a granite

cliff in the Black Hills of South Dakota between 1927 and 1934.

The faces are the largest carved figures anywhere. Washington's is as high as a five-story building, bigger than any sphinx in Egypt.

"The simple fact is there is no more suitable rock to carve anyone at Mount Rushmore," Griffith said.

Tyrrell argues that surely Reagan could be tucked in on Washington's right side, or between Roosevelt and Lincoln.

As for the cost, he'd have the people of South Dakota handle that.

Cells reacting to toxins may make matters worse

WASHINGTON (AP) — Confronted with a relatively common toxin, certain cells designed to protect the body can overreach and may even make things worse, a Colorado researcher reported Thursday.

Poisons produced by a bacteria blamed for many cases of food poisoning and toxic shock syndrome can cause a massive reaction by the body's T-cells, causing them to flood the body with potent chemicals, explained Dr. Philippa Marrack of the Howard Hughes Medical Institute in Denver.

She is part of a team of researchers who reported their findings in the journal Science, published by the American Association for the Advancement of Science. Normally T-cells help protect the body by reproducing and issuing chemicals to attack invading organisms.

Under ordinary circumstances, such as the flu, a complex series of five receptors is activated to set off the T-cells, meaning that only about

one cell in 10,000 to 100,000 may react to the invader, Dr. Marrack explained in a telephone interview.

The coupling mechanism is much simpler with staphylococcus aureus, a bacteria that is associated with toxic shock syndrome, many cases of food poisoning and some other human and animal diseases, she reported.

In this case, only one of the five receptors has to be stimulated to cause the T-cells to respond, Dr. Marrack said.

"The toxins might activate as many as one-third of the body's one trillion T-cells almost simultaneously," she explained.

This massive triggering of T-cells causes them to multiply rapidly and discharge potent chemicals. In such quantities these chemicals can make the individual ill or even cause death, she reported.

"These chemicals, and not the toxin, probably produce the symptoms of food poisoning and toxic shock syndrome," she said in a statement released by the institute.

Law enforcement expert explains Satanism, cults

TWIN FALLS - Yes, it's here, but we don't know how widespread Satan worship is.

That's the message a Boise detective gave to a group of fellow policemen and other law enforcement personnel Thursday.

"There is a substantial segment, a minority segment, of society that is involved in this sort of stuff," Detective Bob

Muck said. Muck spoke for more than two hours about Satanism, witchcraft and ritual crimes - an investigative area still in the "embryo stage."

"That's a stage fraught with law enforcement skepticism and the perils of the wrong response."

"There is a danger of overreaction - probably worse than not reacting at all," Muck said.

Witchcraft practitioners and devil worshippers form a society so secret and

bizarre that many investigators don't believe stories they are told. He said he was afraid that his audience would react at the annual conference of the Idaho Criminal Justice Council.

"If we had a whole day for me to build my case, I think you'd believe it's at least a possibility it's going on," he said. "The bottom line is we believe there are children all across the nation who are being butchered by these pervers."

Several signs of Satanism surface

occasionally. In the Boise area, Muck said he's inspected 18 worship sites.

Look for white robes, knives, chalices, talismans or symbols, he told the police officers in his audience, but be skeptical of graffiti.

Public graffiti often is the product of children playing around. The super-secret, serious cults are often controlled by successful citizens "who you'd think would be too intelligent to buy into this stuff," he

Now Canyon Motors Inc. is seeking relief in court.

This week the Twin Falls dealership filed suit in 5th District Court against Blair &

Co., a Boise-based accounting firm. Court papers filed on behalf of Canyon Motors accuse Blair & Co. of intentionally misrepresenting its Instant Tax Refund Program.

Landen R. Blair, president of Blair & Co., said he has not seen the court papers yet so could not comment on specifics of the suit. But he said his company was satisfied with the tax program, especially since it was the first year electronic filing was offered in Idaho.

"We have a lot of happy taxpayers out there," he said. "We feel very excited and are planning on expanding the program."

Lowell Lytle, president of Canyon Motors, referred questions about the suit to his lawyer, Gary D. Slette, who was out of town on Thursday. But papers Slette filed on behalf of Canyon Motors claim customers were not happy at all.

In November, Canyon Motors paid Blair & Co. \$17,900 for a five-year contract, during which time the accounting firm

agreed to offer electronic tax-filing services in the car dealer's offices.

Canyon Motors claims in Blair & Co. promised that taxpayers who took advantage of the computer-assisted filing service could return to the dealership in 24 to 48 hours to claim their refund checks. The car dealership was supposed to benefit because potential customers would visit the Canyon Motors showroom twice, court

Most valley teachers get pay below

Gem average

TWIN FALLS - No Magic Valley school district except Blaine County pays its teachers at or above the state average, according to an Idaho Education Association study released Thursday, just as most districts are beginning or still negotiating teacher salaries.

"What is especially sobering is to realize that 40 percent of Magic Valley school districts (nine districts of 21) rank in the lowest quarter of all average salaries paid in the state," said Terry Gilbert, IEA Region IV director.

Hagerman, Dietrich, Marthaugh, Bliss, Richfield, Kimberly, Glenns Ferry, Hansen and Three Creek were ranked 100th or lower in the 113-district study, which is based on 1986 figures.

"The figures show that the average salary for an Idaho teacher in 1986 was \$22,918."

"What we're talking about is an ingrained attitude," Gilbert said. "... With some districts, there seems to be the mentality that teachers are like farm help, that they are rather itinerant and easily replaceable. And they think that low salaries will have no effect on education."

Gilbert said the timing on the release of the study's results during teacher negotiations was planned.

"We're at the table and we want to put our thumb in the back of both teachers and school boards so they are more aware of salary levels," he said.

School officials, however, say they give teachers as much money as they can, but that this study doesn't take into account cost-of-living differences from district to district and the fact that districts with higher property values end up with more money to spend.

"I think one of the reasons is the tax base," said Filer School District Superintendent Dave Tenzer. "Our teachers get the best we can pay them given the revenues we bring in."

For instance, Blaine County, listed as eighth in property value on the Education Department's tally of districts, was ranked 21st out of 113 in teacher salaries.

"One can rationalize low salaries, but it's an awful lot," Gilbert said in response to the tax base explanation. "Blaine County has made the commitment to give teachers a good salary."

Gilbert said the district's School Board and teachers have an open relationship that he'd like to see more of around the valley.

"As superintendents, we realize teacher salaries are lower and that it's in our best interest to keep people and reward them," said Richard Bauser, Kimberly superintendent and president of the area's superintendent's association.

"We feel we need to get teacher salaries up, but our hands are tied... I think each

"It's all for a worthwhile project," the Twin Falls woman said.

Petersen said she started selling poppies in 1938. She had joined the American Legion Auxiliary a few years before because her brother had served

in World War I. Her son later served in World War II.

She sells about \$200 worth of poppies a year.

"I'm a pretty good sales lady," she said.

The poppy symbolizes the sacrifice of soldiers who died in battle. WWI veterans remembered the wild poppies that lined French battlefields strewn with dead soldiers.

Disabled veterans hand craft the flowers and attach a different message to each one.

Petersen said because of the program the auxiliary has been able to purchase wheelchairs, hospital beds and other health-care equipment that it loans out to people for free.

Expert witness criticizes bank loan practices

HAILEY - An expert witness testifying on behalf of Bliss Valley Foods told jurors Thursday that Idaho First National Bank had "extreme" deviations from standard banking practices and that the bank preordained the demise of the mushroom farm.

William Sarsfield told jurors that adverse federal banking regulators' reports in 1985 and 1986 were evidence of serious financial conditions at the bank. "The financial condition was of serious concern to the board and management as of the end of 1986," he said.

He also said the bank contributed to the demise of the Bliss Valley mushroom venture by its failure to restructure the loan in May 1985, as requested by the farm.

Sarsfield has spent his career with financial institutions and was with the Office of the Comptroller and Currency, federal bank regulators. Most of the banks at which Sarsfield has been employed were substantially smaller than Idaho First, testimony showed.

He said he researched bank documents for about 100 hours to prepare for the trial and is receiving about \$18,000 for his services.

Adverse OCC reports have become a focus of this case which pits Idaho First.

Group pursues funds for youth ranch, shelter

FAIRFIELD - When Vicki LaTulippe looks toward the hills north of Fairfield, she envisions a cluster of buses sheltering children who now have no stable home environments.

The Eagle woman, her husband, Steve, and a group of Camas County residents are raising money for the proposed Bundy Youth Ranch to provide Christian-based care for as many as 32 children.

The board of directors has been meeting for a year and has raised donations of about \$10,000 for the non-profit ranch, LaTulippe says. The group wants to raise \$20,000 more for a down payment on 1,700 acres owned by LaTulippe's uncle, Melvin Fletcher, about five miles north of town before building the first house will begin. An auction is planned at 9 a.m. Saturday at the Idaho State Fairgrounds.

The ranch would accept youngsters up to age 18 who are discipline problems or unwanted by their parents. But unlike the Idaho Youth Ranch in Mindoco County, it

Former death-row inmate makes plea for overhaul of criminal justice system

OGDEN, Utah (AP) — A man who spent 12 years on a Texas' death row for a murder he didn't commit says the nation's system of justice must be overhauled because mistakes are made and innocent people can pay the cost.

However, Randall Adams told a sparse audience at Weber State College that he still believes capital punishment is appropriate in some cases.

Adams and his Houston attorney, Randy Shaffer, both said the only thing that saved Adams from a lethal injection was the public outcry that followed a film about his case titled "The Thin Blue Line."

Adams was convicted and sentenced to death for the 1976 shooting death of Dallas Police Officer Robert Wood. His death sentence was overturned earlier this year when evidence revealed that witnesses lied during the trial and prosecutors had intentionally suppressed evidence.

"You can't believe that something like this happened in America," Shaffer said. "What is frightening about this is that it can happen to anybody."

Shaffer said that after Woods was gunned down on a dark street on a Thanksgiving weekend, police were determined to solve the crime and obtain a capital conviction.

Dan Harris, a juvenile at the time, allegedly told friends and Dallas police that he had killed the officer. Shaffer explained, but that police decided to finger Adams for the murder because they couldn't get a death sentence against Harris because of his age.

Shaffer said he believes prosecutors refused to charge Harris with the murder because they would not admit they had made a mistake, but that charging him now would be a waste of time because he already is on death row in Texas for a 1985 murder.

Adams said that at one time, he had faith in the judicial system and believed that after a fair arrest he would be found innocent at trial.

But he said that once trial got under way, he realized he was in trouble when he heard witnesses lie.

Adams described death row, where he counted the days until his life would end, as an unpleasant experience.

"You begin to take a very long look at your life, at yourself," he said.

now West One, against Bliss Valley Foods. A gourmet mushroom farm located near Bliss, Idaho first filed foreclosure action against Bliss Valley in March 1987 which in turn spurred a countersuit claiming the bank forced the farm out of business.

Sarsfield said the bank deviated from standard banking practice in dealings with the 290-million-line-of-credit to Bliss Valley. Recounting some key events in the loan history, Bliss Valley attorney Ed McCabe

asked Sarsfield to rate bank actions on a scale of "slight" to "extreme" deviations.

The initial structure of the loan was an "extreme" deviation because the criteria of the loan was impossible to meet, Sarsfield said.

Idaho First Bank made its April 1985 loan payment, denying Bliss Valley's request that it be delayed, was an extreme deviation, he said.

"The May 20, 1985, request?" McCabe asked.

"The May request gave the bank a chance to restructure," Sarsfield said. "By not doing that they preordained the default and the demise of the company."

Under cross-examination by bank Attorney Peter Houtsma, Sarsfield said he has deviated from "standard banking procedure" during his 27-year banking career.

Sarsfield also said he was aware of the bank's "loose" handling of interest and principal payments had ceased as of fall 1986.

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Warden speaks on inmate crowding

TWIN FALLS (AP) — Warden A.J. Arave says he's hearing a lot about the need for mandatory minimum sentencing, but he wants to know where to put this new influx of prisoners.

Arave, who supervises the maximum security prison at Boise, said he is hard-pressed to deal with the prison population already on hand. He doesn't anticipate the opening of \$30 million worth of prison facilities at Orofino and Boise, a total of nearly 350 beds, is going to solve the problem for long.

Arave spoke at a panel Wednesday at the Criminal Justice Council conference.

While praising cooperation in

arresting, prosecuting and sentencing of criminals, Arave said a good job will be done by everyone else down the line doesn't solve his problem.

He said the state must come up with some solid rehabilitation programs for inmates because there are few now. The state also lacks a good substance abuse rehabilitation program, Arave said.

Arave had praise for cooperation he received last September when a riot erupted in one of the prison cell blocks. Ada County, Boise Police and state troopers worked as a team to defuse the situation.

"When there is a crisis, everyone pulls together," Arave said.

He recalled another incident when multi-agency cooperation was vital. It involved the escape of Claude Dallas, convicted of the killing of two state fish and game wardens.

Arave said he had two teeth marks in places that can't be seen, over that escape, but he can't recall a case where he received more cooperation.

He also shakes his head over the decision of an Ada County jury that Dallas was innocent of escape, after he was recaptured and put on trial.

"I still can't understand how that jury came in with the verdict of 'not guilty of escape,'" the warden said. "Believe me, he was definitely missing."

one would give more money if it were there. We have teacher salaries on our conscience and we worked all winter to get the Legislature to give us bigger appropriations."

Bauscher also noted that the cost of living has an impact on salaries. He said that Blaine County School District Superintendent Phil Homer agreed that his teachers get paid about the same as other teachers when their cost of living is figured.

Bauscher also pointed out that Kimberly offers its teachers a good set of fringe benefits and provide its teachers with educational opportunities paid for by the district.

Using 1988-89 figures, Gilbert said

that Magic Valley schools are competitive in regard to beginning salaries, even though beginning salaries are not low overall, but that salary levels "top out significantly lower than average top salaries statewide."

"In other words," he said, "a teacher here starts out pretty much on par with the rest of the state but goes nowhere faster than most."

Environmentalists lose battle over spotted owl habitat

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — Environmentalists lost a major court battle Thursday when a federal judge lifted a ban on logging vast tracts of old-growth forests administered by the U.S. government.

U.S. District Judge Helen Fry granted a summary judgment Thursday in favor of the Bureau of Land Management and lifted a

preliminary injunction that had prohibited the logging of old-growth forests within 2.1 miles of spotted owl habitats.

Pending any further appeals by the environmentalists, the BLM said the ruling clears the way for sale of 337 million board feet of old-growth timber in western Oregon that has been tied up in legal challenges since last summer.

The lawsuit was filed against the federal agency by the Portland Audubon Society and other environmental groups. They had contended that the BLM's timber management plans failed to adequately protect old-growth forests, where the rare northern spotted owl lives and hunts.

The owl has been proposed for listing as a threatened species.

papers as set.

Blair & Co. set up its computer operation Canyon Motors in January, and the car dealership is starting an advertising campaign offering taxpayers 48-hour refunds.

Instead, court papers allege, taxpayers who returned to Canyon Motors 48-hours after filing did not receive their refunds. According to Canyon Motors, the checks actually took between five and seven days to

arrive. Asked about the delays, Blair said it was his understanding that taxpayers got their refund when we said they would get it."

But Canyon Motors' lawsuit claims the "delay by Blair & Co. in achieving the promised result prompted vigorous vocal criticism of Canyon Motors by participating taxpayers as well as accusations of false advertising."

Instead of being an inducement for tax customers to purchase

automobiles, Canyon Motors asserts, the program generated more ill than claims. In fact, Canyon Motors said no new cars were sold to any of the tax program participants, and only two or three used cars were sold as a result of the program.

In addition to reimbursement on the contract fee, advertising costs, telephone expenses and attorney's fees, Canyon Motors is asking for at least \$50,000 in damages for loss of business reputation.

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Cattlemen prepare for public lands battle

BOISE (AP) — Cattlemen from throughout the Northwest gathered here Thursday to map strategies in the battle over public lands.

During the daylong Northwest Federal Lands Conference, a plethora of panelists urged about 300 ranchers to find common ground with other public-land users to maintain the principle of "multiple use" and thwart the efforts of environmental extremists and wilderness advocates. Speakers offered advice on dealing with federal agencies; lawmakers and the media.

In a videotape, Sen. Steve Symms, R-Idaho, called on conference participants to take the offensive in opposing what he called the "no-use lobby."

"It's high time that the men and

women whose lives are affected daily by the federal land management policies get together and seized the initiative. You can no longer afford to simply react to every charge made by those whose only goal is to wipe out every trace of human productivity from the landscape," he said.

Symms was to be the conference speaker, but he said scheduling conflicts kept him in Washington. Sponsors of the conference included the Idaho Cattle Association, the Idaho Farm Bureau, the Multiple Use Land Alliance and the Center for the Defense of Free Enterprise.

The session was in part a response to efforts by some environmentalists to ban cattle grazing on federal lands. Wayne Hage, a Nevada rancher and

chairman of the Northwest Federal Lands Conference, said the issue boils down to protection of property rights.

Hage said ranchers' grazing permits are not privileges that can be revoked at the whim of bureaucrats, but private property entitled to due process and just compensation protection.

"Public land is a misnomer," he said. Instead, much federal land is split-estate—land with ownership shared by the government and those who hold grazing, water, mineral, improvement and other rights.

The U.S. Supreme Court has recognized grazing rights as property rights, but Hage said he hopes the controversial National Rangeland Grazing System Act will reinforce that. The measure would

designate certain federal lands as "grazing areas," where other activities would be permitted only if they don't conflict with grazing.

Hage acknowledged that the real purpose of the bill, which has drawn howls of protest from environmentalists, is to focus attention on the economic importance of ranching and the plight of cattlemen.

"The Western rancher faces a fight for his survival," he said. "The livestock industry on federal lands has been given an ultimatum by environmentalists. That ultimatum is, very simply, 'We are going to destroy you.'"

The Northwest Federal Lands Conference was established last fall. The group met on a similar conference in Las Vegas, Nev., in

'Stand and Deliver' teacher speaks out

OREM, Utah (AP) — The teacher whose devotion to teaching math was portrayed in the film "Stand and Deliver" says he is successful because "I teach with heart and my soul—not my mouth."

Jaime Escalante, whose efforts helped win national recognition for his students, won a standing ovation Wednesday following a speech at Utah Valley Community College.

While teaching at James A. Garfield High School in east Los Angeles, Escalante prodded his students to consistently earn high scores on the national Advanced Placement calculus test, and win the school top-10 rankings nationwide over the past several years.

Escalante still teaches in east Los Angeles but has transferred to a community college.

"I believe in what I'm doing," he told about 600 UVCC students packed into the Student Center Ballroom. "I teach with my heart and my soul, not my mouth."

Teachers "must be able to motivate students by directing their dreams and helping them realize how important education is," he said. They also must be able to instill "desire," or "ganas," in Spanish, to learn.

"I make them believe in themselves," he said, crediting

his students rather than himself for their educational achievements.

Escalante, a Bolivian native who immigrated to the United States in 1961, said educational success must be preceded by sacrifice and hard work by students—accomplished by constant encouragement from teachers.

However, he said, students opt for the easy educational path, taking only minimal science and mathematics classes.

As a result, half of U.S. high school seniors graduate ill-prepared for today's high-tech world. They shy away from math, which Escalante said is the language of the future.

But he said schools alone cannot bear the responsibility for educating youth.

"We need the help of the parents," Escalante said.

Control at home, which includes limits on television, is essential, he said.

"Successful people make lots of mistakes—and they learn from them. You can do it. The only thing you need is gas," he said.

While students are in school is the time for them to "make good on their dreams and stand and deliver," he said.

West German arrestee sought for alleged forgeries

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — A West German arrested here in March after a routine traffic stop was wanted in several other cities for alleged documents forgery, authorities said.

Investigators believe Otto Paul Uthgenannt, 63, entered the United States in 1985 and since then has traveled mainly in the Southwest. He allegedly set up shop in various cities, forging checks and other documents, and then moved on, officers said.

Police in Phoenix, Ariz.; Groves and Abilene, Texas; and Las Vegas, Nev., as well as the U.S. State Department and the Idaho Department of Law Enforcement, are investigating Uthgenannt.

According to a report by Interpol, the international police agency,

Uthgenannt was once expelled from Austria and Switzerland for fraud and document forgery. The man has an extensive criminal history, dating back to his teen years, said Idaho State Police Cpl. Jay Kosminski.

Kosminski arrested Uthgenannt for a traffic infraction the night of March 22. A search of his car turned up several alleged phony documents, including U.S. and West German passports bearing the man's photograph; dozens of checkbooks; and a color photocopier, rotary stamps and photography equipment allegedly used to produce the documents, police said.

Uthgenannt was booked into the Kootenai County Jail for fictitious display of license plates.

Officers later discovered a

Phoenix arrest warrant charging one of Uthgenannt's alleged aliases, Harry Matlin, with cashing more than \$17,000 worth of forged checks off a credit card account.

Uthgenannt, who was being held on \$300,000 bond on the Arizona complaint alleging fraudulent schemes and artifices, has refused to waive extradition. Idaho authorities were awaiting an Arizona governor's warrant, due Tuesday, that would speed up the proceedings.

However, Uthgenannt's attorney, Everett D. Hoffmeister, said he plans to ask the court to release his client on grounds he is being detained illegally once the Arizona warrant arrives.

Meanwhile, Abilene Police Detective Danny Wade said a

warrant was issued this week charging Uthgenannt with forging more than \$5,000 worth of checks from the Abilene Christian University.

"We thought somebody named David Swanson did it," Wade said. "But the officers in Idaho tell us that was just one of the names he used."

Las Vegas and Groves, Texas, police departments are also preparing warrants for the man, investigators said.

In Seattle, special agent Tom Caven of the U.S. State Department said he is investigating Uthgenannt for fraud against the U.S. government and plans to present a report to the U.S. Attorneys Office in Boise.

Yellowstone visitors enjoy park's spring regeneration

YELLOWSTONE NATIONAL PARK, Wyo. (AP) — Many of the first visitors to Yellowstone National Park this spring are quickly finding out that the crown jewel of the park system was only slightly tarnished by 1988's fires.

While the tourists vividly remember the flames they saw on television, they didn't expect to find Yellowstone as alive with new growth as it is this spring, according to Ranger Thomas Huntington.

"I've found out that the media blew the fires out of proportion," he said Thursday. "Visitors are pleasantly surprised to find that the park is still here, healthy and, that in the long term, it may benefit."

Questions about the forest fires that blackened almost half of the 2.2 million-acre park are being fired at park rangers along with the standard queries.

"The questions about the fires are the most interesting," said Phillip Harmon, who greets tourists at West Yellowstone, Mont., where some 400 to 600 cars pass daily. "Most of them just want to know how much of the park was affected."

Harmon said most of the questions he hears have to do with exactly how much of Yellowstone was burned in

the fires that began in June and continued into late fall.

"Most people are positive about it," he said. "I haven't had any animal questions. But some are a little more specific. When I have time, I explain some things."

Huntington, who is based at Madison Junction, which was home to one of the largest fire camps, said many of the questions concern how the flames affected Yellowstone's wildlife.

"I tell them it will be very positive, in the long run," he said.

No signs of the fire camp remain at Madison Junction, about 16 miles north of Old Faithful, but many tourists remember the flames they saw on television, Huntington said.

Harmon said once he shares the figures with visitors, and passes on that biologists expect a natural "rebirth" throughout the park, most tourists are pleased with the comments.

"About 80 percent of the comments I have heard have been positive," he said. "That is what we like to hear."

Some tourists, however, are angry, Harmon said. "One man said he would devote all his energy and resources to getting (Park Superintendent Robert Barbee) fired. But that is unusual."

Anheuser-Busch plans Idaho Falls processing plant

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — An Anheuser-Busch Inc. subsidiary will build its \$60 million malt processing plant in Idaho Falls — an economic development plum that brings about 40 jobs; a \$2 million payroll and \$1 million in annual property taxes.

Officials of Anheuser-Busch subsidiary Busch Agricultural Resources and Gov. Cecil Andrus announced Thursday that the plant will be located in Idaho Falls. Sites in Utah, Billings, Mont., and Chubbuck, a Pocatello suburb, had been under consideration.

Andrus announced that Idaho Falls will receive a \$440,000

community development block grant to make a water system improvements to accommodate the plant. The city said it would use the money for a water line to the plant.

"This is a size investment of our community development dollars because it will lead to new jobs and the opportunity for agricultural processing of Idaho grains, a very important industry," said Andrus.

The plant, being built on a 250-acre site on the city's south side, should be completed by 1991.

"After months of evaluation, we believe the Idaho Falls site best

satisfies our requirements," said Anheuser-Busch Vice President Raymond Goff. It's the company's third-malt plant, and will supply western breweries. The other malt plants are in Wisconsin and Minnesota.

Earlier this month, U.S. Sen. Max Baucus, D-Mont., said August A. Busch III indicated to him last March that the plant would probably be built in Idaho Falls.

"The competition for this facility has been intense," Andrus said. "But I am delighted that once again Idaho has been able to compete for and win a major economic development

victory."

The plant will process 8 million bushels of malt barley annually, shipping 40 rail cars of product from Idaho Falls each week. Barley will be purchased from farmers in Idaho and surrounding states.

City officials took several steps to make Idaho Falls attractive to Anheuser-Busch. Land acquisition is pending before the City Council.

During the construction, about 50 workers will be employed.

Start-up of the plant's elevator system is scheduled to begin in the latter half of 1990, with making and kilning to follow in spring 1991.

Investigator blames timber sales delays on USFS procedures

WASHINGTON (AP) — A federal investigator said Thursday that delays in timber sales in Montana and northern Idaho stem from problems with U.S. Forest Service environmental analyses, not the appeals process.

In testimony before the Senate Agriculture subcommittee on conservation and forestry, John Harman of the General Accounting Office said appeals and delays are increasing.

"Consistent with our findings for earlier years, these fiscal year 1988 delays were not due to the appeals process itself," said Harman. "Rather they were due to underlying problems with Forest Service environmental analyses that did not meet all the requirements."

He said the Forest Service is making improvements in its procedures.

"It is also making use of negotiated settlements with appellants in conjunction with recent

changes in appeals regulations," he said, adding, however, that problems with delayed sales and missed targets would continue this year and beyond because of insufficient inventory.

The GAO, an investigative arm of Congress, reviewed 1988 timber sales in Forest Service Region 1 — Montana, North Dakota, northern Idaho and northwestern South Dakota. It found that about 6 percent of the timber sale volume was appealed and 1 percent of the sales of the total volume was delayed by appeals.

"By delayed by appeal, we mean that the appeals were not resolved in time for the timber to be offered in the year it was originally planned to be sold, or the appeals were found to have no merit," said Harman.

"In about a third of the cases in which the appeals were found to have no merit, the Forest Service contributed to the delays because it did not issue environmental analyses

until the same fiscal year as the planned sales," he said.

He said the Forest Service had trouble responding to the increasing number of complex environmental issues raised in appeals. And other factors contributing to the timber sale problem included reductions in the region's funding and staffing, forest fires and the absence of wilderness legislation.

But the cause of the delayed sales in 98 percent of the cases covered in the GAO review was Forest Service environmental analysis problems, Harman said.

Decisions by the court and Forest Service Chief F. Dale Robertson

required additional environmental analyses by foresters to prepare for sales.

Because of the additional work, the environmental preparation could not be done in time to offer sales as planned, depleting the number of sales the region had to offer.

"I could no longer substitute other sales when a delay occurred in processing an appeal," he said.

The region normally keeps a two-year supply of prepared timber sales with completed environmental analyses. By January of this year, sale reserves had dropped by more than one year's supply.

China summit ends on note of good will Gorbachev makes unusual personal revelations during Soviet published interview

BEIJING (AP) — President Mikhail S. Gorbachev of the Soviet Union completed a visit to China on Thursday that opened a new era of good will after three decades of estrangement between the two great communist powers.

A joint communique issued when he left Shanghai for home said Gorbachev's meetings with Deng Xiaoping and other Chinese leaders "symbolized the normalization of relations between the two countries."

China and the Soviet Union split 50 years ago over who should lead the communist world and remained at odds because of border disputes, conflicting strategic interests, Soviet military intervention in Afghanistan and the Vietnam invasion of Cambodia.

Gorbachev's four-day visit, which both sides described as historic, occurred in the shadow of a huge pro-democracy upheaval in which up to 1 million protesters took over the streets of central Beijing.

To keep him away from the demonstrators, scheduled events were moved to other locations.

Tass, the official Soviet news agency, issued a report after Gorbachev's departure saying Chinese police had "lost control" of the crowds occupying Tiananmen Square and main streets leading into it.

The official Chinese agency Xinhua said Gorbachev, in conversation with Vice Premier Wu Xueqian before leaving, "wished the current situation in China to be eased and settled."

In several speeches, the Kremlin leader said social unrest experienced by the Soviet Union and other communist nations was a natural consequence of more liberal policies. He said democratization was crucial to the success of economic reform.

In the joint communique, the two nations announced restoration of contracts between their Communist parties and elevated talks to longstanding border disputes to the foreign minister level. They pledged "to take measure to

cut down the military forces in the areas along the Sino-Soviet boundary to a minimum level commensurate with the normal, good-neighborly relations between the two countries."

While in Beijing, Gorbachev pressed complete demilitarization of the 4,300-mile frontier, now guarded by about 600,000 Soviet and 1 million Chinese soldiers.

BEIRUT, Lebanon — An argument over subsidized flour ended in shelling that killed one civilian and wounded five Thursday in a Palestinian refugee camp on the outskirts of Sidon in south Lebanon, police reported.

Police in the ancient port 25 miles south of Beirut said 155 mm shells were fired from positions manned by the South Lebanon Army militia in nearby Zayin and landed at the edge of the Ein el-Hilweh camp.

Koreans protest in thousands against president, U.S. troops

KWANGJU, South Korea (AP) — Tens of thousands of protesters in 11 cities burned effigies of President Roh Tae-woo and called for the expulsion of U.S. troops Thursday, the anniversary of a bloody 1980 uprising.

At least 100,000 protesters and supporters rallied in Kwangju to denounce Roh and the United States for suppressing the uprising in the provincial capital that left 192 dead.

They burned effigies representing Roh and other senior army generals. Protesters beat drums and chanted "Punish Roh Tae-woo!" "Yankee go home!" and "Drive out the Yankee imperialists!"

Earlier Thursday, 20,000 people visited the cemetery outside Kwangju where many of those killed in the nine-day uprising are buried. Mourners prayed and bowed before the graves as funeral music played over loudspeakers and students beat drums.

In Seoul and nine other cities, thousands joined marches, protests and religious services. About 40,000 students turned out for rallies at 87 campuses nationwide, news reports said.

"Roh Tae-woo must step down for suppressing 'Kwangju and all democratic movements,' dissident leader Oh Chung-il told the cheering crowd in Kwangju, 170 miles southwest of Seoul.

Opposition leader Kim Dae-jung said in a message read to cheering crowds that right-wing forces were plotting to impose authoritarian rule in South Korea again.

Palestinians feel military crackdown

JERUSALEM (AP) — The military announced a new crackdown Thursday restricting Palestinian access to Israel and providing an economic-weapon officials hope will help persuade Arabs to abandon their violent revolt.

The army will issue special permits allowing some of the 700,000 Gaza Strip residents into Israel, and may expand the measure to 1 million

Palestinians on the occupied West Bank, military officials said.

Defense Minister Yitzhak Rabin indicated leniency of the uprising will be denied permits.

Leftist lawmakers warned the restrictions could stir new violence, and some employers feared they could have a negative impact on Israel's economy.

In the occupied territories, troops killed two young Arabs.

Caracas strike protests austerity

CARACAS, Venezuela (AP) — Shops and banks were closed Thursday and labor activists rained the streets to enforce a 12-hour strike to protest government austerity measures.

At a McDonald's restaurant, fistfights broke out between labor and management.

The strike was the first in 31 years of democracy in Venezuela. The strike organizer, the Venezuela Confederation of Workers, claimed it paralyzed the nation.

But Interior Minister Alejandro Izaguirre appeared on television to declare that "the country is completely normal."

In "downtown" Caracas, strike supporters surrounded a McDonald's, breaking windows and forcing the restaurant to close.

"Close it down! Down with the foreigners!" shouted about 200 members of the "Venezuelan Worker's Federation," dissuasive brigades dispatched to roam the streets and enforce the work stoppage.

Lithuania, Estonia try independence test

MOSCOW (AP) — The parliaments of the Baltic republics of Lithuania and Estonia passed laws Thursday granting them far more independence than Moscow authorities want to allow.

In Lithuania, the Supreme Soviet also declared the tiny republic "sovereign," an official in Lithuania's Foreign Ministry said.

Both republics approved laws giving them control over, virtually all industry on their territories and declaring them the sole masters of their natural resources.

Latvia, the third Baltic republic, is considering similar measures.

Lithuania's law includes provisions for printing its own money and for printing its own private property.

The laws fly in the face of recommendations from a Moscow commission.

MOSCOW (AP) — Mikhail S. Gorbachev said in a unique interview-published Thursday that he earns the equivalent of \$22,800 a year and loves to walk in the woods, but spends his days working except for "several hours" of sleep.

Gorbachev did not make any startling revelations about himself in answered questions from a Communist Party publication, but he provided some details to satisfy Soviets who clamor for personal information about their leader.

That kind of information has been kept strictly secret by previous leaders, but Gorbachev, 59, gradually has been breaking down the barrier with his policy of "glasnost," or greater openness.

"I try to use my rare rest hours to their fullest," he added. "My interests are varied: reading literature, the theater, music, film. My favorite form of rest is walking in the forest. But I have to admit: I manage to do it less and less."

Gorbachev said his schedule is a strain not only on himself but on his family, and he said he valued the support of his wife, Raisa, as well as that of his daughter, Irina, and her husband, Anatoly, who are doctors.

Gorbachev has two granddaughters, Ksenia and Anastasia.

Like any other member of the ruling Communist Party Politburo,

Gorbachev said he receives a salary of 1,200 rubles (about \$1,900) a month. Candidate members of the Politburo receive 100 rubles (\$160), he said.

His salary is about five times the monthly wage of the average Soviet industrial worker.

Gorbachev said all the money he has received for his book "Perestroika and New Thinking," which has been published in almost 100 countries in almost 2 million copies, went to the party budget or to several favorite charities.

Among them he named the funds to help victims of earthquakes in Armenia and Tadjikistan, the Soviet Culture Fund of which Mrs. Gorbachev is a board member, and for construction of a new children's park in Moscow.

Speaking about the technology that keeps him in touch with the Kremlin when he is traveling, Gorbachev said he first learned about the Dec. 7 Armenian earthquake that killed 25,000 people in a telephone call he received from Moscow while on a ferry boat in New York harbor. He was in New York for a U.S.-Soviet summit meeting.

Gorbachev has an apartment in Moscow, believed to be in the Lenin Hills area, and a country house provided by the Soviet government.

"I'm not any member-of-my family has ever owned a country house anywhere," Gorbachev said.

Gorbachev emphasized his rural roots and said he was proud of his father Sergei's service in World War II. His father was wounded in Czechoslovakia during the war, he said.

Great glass

Glassblower creates unique designs

KETCHUM — With Bob Dylan's song, "Blowing in the Wind" as fitting background music, glassblower Craig Zweifel begins the four-hour process of making a perfume bottle.

Inside his studio on Magic Mountain Road, between Ketchum and Hailey, three firing ovens roar, producing the 2,400 degrees of heat needed to keep the glass molten. While Zweifel heats, shapes, then reheats one bottle at the end of a five-foot-long "blowpipe," his assistant dips a second pipe into a oven of molten glass, emerging with a blob the size of a child's fist. It will take shape and form under Zweifel's methodical craftsmanship.

Craig's wife, Annie, a goldsmith by trade, waits in the back room with another assistant, taking the newly blown products through a series of grinders and polishers until they're ready for a set of graders and polishers.

"This is where the boring work's done," she says.

Except for the music and oven gauges, the scene could be set just about any time in the last 21 centuries. Glassblowing has changed little.

History doesn't record its beginnings, but Syrians were seen blowing glass in the century before Christ's birth. Once the Romans acquired the technique, blown glass became common throughout the Roman Empire and eventually became part of Western culture.

Zweifel stumbled into glassblowing while in college. "I was a senior in college and thought I should round

out my education by taking an art course," Zweifel says. The class was ceramics, and it included a brief unit on glassblowing.

"Once I got into it, I just knew — this was for me," Zweifel says. "I guess what I like most is the immediacy. When you're working with glass, you can't just walk away from it. You stay until you're finished."

He quickly changed his major to art, took graduate courses at the University of California at Los Angeles, opened a studio for ceramics and glass in Englewood, Calif., then another in Jackson Hole, Wyo.

When a teaching offer came from the Sun Valley Center for the Arts, Zweifel moved his family to the Wood

'Roe vs. Wade' easily wins in Monday ratings

NEW YORK — Despite criticism from anti-abortion groups, NBC's "Roe vs. Wade" was fully sponsored and easily won Monday's ratings — but with a smaller audience than the network had projected, ratings figures showed Tuesday.

To NBC's surprise, the majority of viewers called in New York City and in Burbank, Calif., during Monday's broad-

cast favored the two-hour program, with a total of 39.1 approving it and 77 protesting it, a network spokesman said.

"People are much more apt to complain, so that is a surprise," said the spokesman, Curt Block.

Nevertheless, NBC's film about a Texas woman's court fight that led to the landmark 1973 Supreme Court decision legalizing abortion "will lose money," Block said. He had no immediate estimate on how

much NBC would lose.

"Roe vs. Wade" averaged a 17 rating and attracted 27 percent of the available audience, meaning it was seen in about 15.4 million homes.

Its network competition — four sitcoms on CBS and an episode of "B.L. Stryker" on ABC — ended in a virtual tie — about a 2.2 rating for each. Each ratings point represents 904,000 homes.

NBC's ratings for its two-hour movie

were below the 19.5 rating and 31 percent share of audience that the network had projected. That will result, one source estimated, in about a \$1 million loss for NBC, either because of reduced rates that NBC had to offer some sponsors of the show or because of "make-goods" — free time on other shows that NBC will have to give certain "Roe vs. Wade" advertisers.

In an interview last Friday, NBC president

"The Gambler," an earlier Rogers hit song, was expanded into three highly successful television movies.

"It's the most unique piece of music I've heard in 20 years," Rogers said of "Planet Texas." "It may be a new genre. It has to do with space and time travel, but it's also a Western. These alien cowboys pick me up and take me to a planet called Texas."

"We may do this as a movie for NBC, but we're also toying with the idea of trying to attract a Steven Spielberg or George Lucas and making it a feature film. It's such

an unusual concept and offers the same limitless possibilities that 'The Gambler' did.

"It's easy to find projects," said Rogers. "It's hard to find projects that allow you to do things that are unique and have no comparisons. If I do any kind of acting my acting is something unique people get caught up in it and are less apt to scrutinize my work."

"This is uncharted territory. There's nothing to compare it to. My own philosophy has been that if you give us a little success we'll make it a big deal. We did that with 'Lucille' and we did it with 'The Gambler.' This can be a whole new career move."

He said "Planet Texas" was

brought to his attention after Parks was turned down for a record contract by Capitol Records.

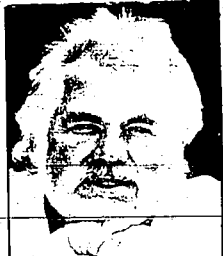
"I was offered this terrific song and recorded it," he said. "Then Capitol signed Parks to a contract. The only bad news is that he has his own album coming out and I won't get his new songs. This kid can sing. But it worked out good for me. He never could have gotten a \$600,000 video deal."

Rogers had just flown to Los Angeles that morning from his 1,200-acre farm near Athens, Ga. He talked about the special before going to NBC for an appearance on "The Tonight Show." Afterward, he planned to give a concert at a private party in Palm Desert, then fly back to Georgia.

He and his wife, Marianne, and his son, Christopher, 7, moved to the farm two years ago. But, with his own private jet, he makes regular jaunts for concerts, commercials, movies, charity appearances and to look after his many investments. He's building his own 18-hole golf course on the farm.

"I may sell the whole thing," he said. "I'm basically a builder. The fun is creating it, not living in it. I've overbuilt every house I've had. It keeps me creatively busy."

Plans for Rogers' syndicated talk show have been pushed back to 1990. His manager, Ken Krutzen, believes that by then, viewer and advertiser rebellion against so-called

HOLLYWOOD — Two actors from the canceled series "Nightingales" are charging that NBC's decision to ax the controversial show was prompted by pressure from advertisers and special-interest groups and said it was a dangerous precedent.
"I'm personally sorry to see my character, Nurse Rita, go down the drain before I ever got a chance to explore her," said cast member Fran Bennett. "But I'll work again; I'll get another job. It's the larger ramifications I'm worried about — that's what hits me in my soul."
"It's much more than the show; it's 'What kind of a country are we moving into?' I don't think we should give up our right to do what we want to do."
Barry Newman, who portrayed hospital chief of staff Garrett Braden, said he believes both NBC and the show's sponsors "caved in" to pressure groups. "It reminds me of the McCarthy era," he said. "It is a very scary time with these people (special interest groups) who are suddenly controlling what goes on the air."
NBC officials declined to comment on the actors' remarks or on their reasons for not renewing the four-month-old series for next season, despite the fact that it frequently won its Wednesday night time period.

"Nightingales," a mid-season entry from Aaron Spelling Productions about a group of student nurses, was criticized following its January premiere by nursing organizations and others for presenting an image of nurses as bungling bimboes. Critics objected to the show's focus on lingerie, aerobic, sex-related story tellers, etc. — encounters in hospital linen closets rather than the nuts-and-bolts of nursing education and hospital life. Several advertisers dropped out of the show.

Spelling declined to comment. Newman, who previously starred in the sex-and-citizenship on the part of NBC's corporate owner, General Electric, for the cancellation of "Nightingales."
"He also attacked Spelling and NBC for agreeing to change the show."

Sell outs mean \$170,000 in profits for 'Phantom'

LOS ANGELES — Are scalpers the only people making fortunes on "Phantom of the Opera" tickets?
Not exactly. Every sell-out week at the Ahmanson Theatre here, where the show opens May 31, will mean \$170,000 more in profits for producers Cameron Mackintosh and the Really Useful Theatre Company. Mackintosh is the 42-year-old British producer who already helped turn both "Cats" and "Les Misérables" into musical gold mines.
Los Angeles is but one outpost of the Mackintosh empire. In just two years, "Les Misérables" — four U.S. companies have already returned \$18.5 million profit on receipts of \$140 million; according to general manager Alan Wassser, that profit number goes up \$600,000 every week. The production now playing the Shubert Theatre here not only paid back its \$4.5 million investment in 22 weeks but already has made an additional \$2.2 million in profits.
Given the substantially higher production costs of "Phantom" in Los Angeles, its pay-back is a bit higher. "Phantom's" Broadway production was expensive enough, at \$8-million, but the Ahmanson production came in \$500,000 higher. Wassser pegs the additional costs on such things as inflation and the price of flying in and housing the staging experts who duplicated the Broadway set, costumes and such.
But the 2,045-seat Ahmanson will rake in a lot more money than Broadway's 1,652-seat Majestic Theatre. While broad-avenue costs in both cities run about \$400,000 a week, sell-out grosses of \$658,000 a week at the Majestic are "considerably less" than the Ahmanson's \$94,855. So instead of taking 60 weeks to recoup its investment as it did on Broadway, the Los Angeles production is expected to recoup its money in 40 to 45 weeks.

By that time "Phantom" companies will be traversing the globe much as "Les Misérables" companies have. Already playing in Vienna, Austria, and Tokyo (besides New York and London), "Phantom" is set to open in Toronto this fall, and then in Stockholm either later this year or early next year. A traveling U.S. company is expected to open next year as well.

Garrison Keillor will return to U.S. radio

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Garrison Keillor, whose "Prairie Home Companion" stories about mythical Lake Wobegon warmed radio audiences for 13 years, said Thursday he's returning to the U.S. airwaves after a two-year absence.
His "American Radio Company of the Air" is to be produced by Minnesota Public Radio, will feature sketches, monologues and a variety of American music.
Lake Wobegon will be back in the new show, Keillor said at a news conference Thursday. But he warned that the "town that time forgot" has undergone changes.
"Times have been hard back there, as they have been all across the Mid-

west," Keillor said. "It's hard to make them into humor."
"The program will be performed before theater audiences in New York, St. Paul, Minn., and other cities in a 12-show series to be broadcast live on Saturday nights starting Sept. 30.
Keillor, who is in San Francisco for a public radio conference, said the show will have the music of Fats Waller, Aaron Copland, sea shanties, hymns and ballads that the great things that an American ought to hear at least twice."
The folksy humorist and best-selling author stunned fans two years ago when he called an end to his American Public Radio program

with an estimated 4 to 5 million listeners in order to "resume the life of a shy person."
Despite estimates of a huge audience, Keillor calculated he has about 13,000 true fans while others "talk about butter milk biscuits and the 'Home on the Prairie' show."
When he abandoned Sheila the Christian Jungle Girl, Norwegian backhoe farmers and other inhabitants of his mythical hometown, Lake Wobegon, he said he wanted to flee the frustrations of fame, including nosy reporters.
Standing on stage with his hands plunged in the pockets of a gray plaid suit and slowing chewing gum,

River Valley.
He set up shop in the old Sun Valley sewer plant building, with its treacherous cinder block construction. When the Janing family sold Sun Valley to Earl Holding, the Art Center took a new direction and Zweifel set up a studio next to his house. Nine years later he's still there.
"The bulk of Zweifel's business is outside the state — about 85 percent — most of that on the East Coast. The glass is then meticulously to New York where he keeps a "truck full of samples," to hit the trade shows and major marketing centers.
"It's a problem, but Annie and I love it here. Besides, East Coast humidity, combined with the heat from these ovens, would make conditions unbearable," he says.
Modern science allows Zweifel to use calipers for precise measurements and compressed air to begin the blowing process when the glass is thickest. But only the artist's

breath and a practiced eye can turn out the finished product.
Zweifel puffs the end of a blowpipe into clear molten glass and twists it, like he's rolling honey on the end of a spoon. He takes only what he needs.
The glass is then roughly shaped with a small, bowl-like mould or wadded, clear newspaper held in Zweifel's hand.
With his mouth to the pipe, Zweifel blows air through it and into the glass, refining the shape. He rolls the pipe back and forth to etch the glass' surface, pulling it back into the oven to keep it pliable.
The glass, which is really a super-cooled liquid, is molded into the design Zweifel wants.
"If you foul something up, there's no reason to get aggravated. . . just begin again," he says. "It's a very malleable media, but you soon find out that a liquid becomes a solid — fast."
Zweifel has been blowing glass for more than 18 years, but would readily admit that though two pieces might resemble one another, each perfume bottle, each vase, each Christmas ornament, is unique.
And his handmade delicacies do not come cheap.
A single, Christmas ornament, painstakingly designed and created, runs \$30.
The best of Zweifel's items range from \$30 to \$300.
"The highest-cost-of-his-craft is \$600."

Robert C. Wright, who earlier owed to air the show unless necessary, said that the network could lose \$1 million or more on the broadcast. Anti-abortion groups had called the film pro-abortion and urged advertisers not to buy commercial time.
Despite warnings of boycotts by such groups, all 28 of the 30-second commercials that NBC was offering on Monday's broadcast were purchased, the network said.
But the network had to reduce its rates late last week to bring in replacement sponsors for those who had dropped out. NBC declined to say how much the discount was. One advertising source said that the average rate of \$100,000 for a 30-second slot had been cut by NBC to \$60,000 or \$50,000 for the late arrivals.
Sponsors of Monday's show included the Alamo car rental company, Airwick, English Leather, men's cologne, Palidant, Murphy's Oil of Saus, Suzuki, Lady Speed Stick deodorant, X-14 The Cleaner, Vagisil cream and powder, Olympus cameras and Doxatrim and Acetamin diet pills.
There also were four ads for new films — two for "Field of Dreams" and one each for "Indiana Jones and the Last Crusade" and "See No Evil, Hear No Evil."
The leadoff ad Monday was one for Maxwell House coffee. Maxwell House also had a second ad at the end of the show.
The company is owned by General Foods, a major TV advertiser that had made clear its determination to stay in "Roe vs. Wade" well before the show aired.
The movie did not violate General Foods' guidelines for sponsorship and thus the company had no reason to pull out, said spokesman Cliff Sessions.
"We found the movie to be a responsible, high-quality dramatization of a landmark legal case, and one that didn't take sides," he said in an interview.
But another major sponsor, Procter & Gamble Co., which, like others, bought time last year on NBC's Monday movie slot before "Roe vs. Wade" was announced and scheduled, dropped out of Monday's broadcast. The company did not withdraw because of fear of boycotts but because of "our corporate programming policy of avoiding anything controversial," said spokeswoman Kelly Gillespie.

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Richard Thomas tries to escape John-Boy image with new roles

HARTFORD, CT — "It's ironic," said an admirer of Richard Thomas at the Hartford Stage Company, "that if he lives to be 100, the headline on the obit will be 'John-Boy Dies at 100.'"

Indeed it seems ironic but true. The relatively few seasons Richard Thomas spent as John-Boy on "The Waltons" are indelible. The identification remains upon him so strongly that passers-by in Connecticut still call out, "Hey, John-Boy!" with great affection — when they see him. His friend is probably right about the headline, too.

The larger irony is that John-Boy was a far cry from Thomas' earlier life and is still removed in time and tone from his subsequent life. Last week he concluded a towering,

tour de force performance in the Hartford Stage Company's production of Henrik Ibsen's almost never seen "Peer Gynt," which Ibsen himself said he wrote in 1867 to be read but not performed. The Hartford does not perform it. The Hartford does on successive nights or as a matinee-plus-evening marathon on Saturday and Sunday, with a total running time of more than five hours.

"Appalling, isn't it?" Thomas asked cheerfully over a cup of tea before the Sunday matinee a week ago. He thinks it may be the longest role this side of Ibsen's own "Emperor and Galilean."

Critics from around the country have come to see Thomas and the production, and the majority of the reviews have been rhapsodic. Mel Gussow of "The New York Times

called it "a virtuoso accomplishment" and added that Thomas "validates his position as one of America's leading classical actors."

Thomas' passage from John-Boy to Peer Gynt ought to come as no surprise: He was, as he says, raised in backstage if not born backstage. His parents were both ballet dancers with the Ballet Russe, Ballet Theatre and Alicia Alonso's company in Havana. They later formed the New York School of Ballet. His mother, who danced as Barbara Falls, his father, also Richard Thomas, still teaches and came to see "Peer Gynt."

I actually grew up in an apartment on the 15th floor of a building in New York," Thomas said. "He appeared in 'summer stock' before he was 7, in productions of 'Anything Goes' and 'Damn Yankees' at Sacca-

daga, N.Y.

He commuted to California to do episodic television. "In those days, they would fly you out and back to do a role. I can't see them doing it any more." Thomas didn't intend to stay in Hollywood even when he came out to do "The Waltons." "We were set for 13 weeks and I was going to wait and see what happened."

What happened is, of course, part of television history. The show was a big hit. Thomas met his wife, Alma, a Los Angeles native, and bought a house. They have a son and triplet daughters. Some well-known orange juice commercials have provided nest eggs for the children.

"The Waltons" was an experience that Thomas remains very proud of — "I loved doing it," he says. "You had 11 actors who basically got along very well. A day doesn't go by I don't think

about Will Geer. He had such a gusto for work, as he used to call it. Ellen Geer is still part of our family."

"He tries to do one or two television films a year to make it economically feasible for him to do stage work. He is doing 'Peer Gynt' for \$500 a week, which is probably a 40th of what he earned for an episode of 'The Waltons.'"

But, he says, "Acting is a muscle, and if you don't use it you lose it."

Keeping the muscle toned, he does a phenomenal amount of work in the theater: the re-opening production of "The Merchant of Venice" at the Pasadena (Calif.) Playhouse, "The Seagull" at Circle Repertory in New York, three summers at the Williamstown (Mass.) Theatre Festival, doing Shaw's "The Devil's Disciple," and other productions.

The others inducted at the Hall of Fame's 20th annual ceremony were lyricists Lee Adams and the late Eddie DeLange and the team of Leslie Briceuse and Anthony Newley. Quincy Jones received the lifetime achievement award.

Pepico received the patron of the arts award and a film of its musical commercials was shown.

A variety of singers provided entertainment during the three-and-a-half hour show, which was taped for broadcast on CBS, probably the second week in June.

Cannes Film Festival attracts a variety of filmmakers

CANNES, France (AP) — The Toxic Avenger cavorts on the beach, while in a theater nearby critics weigh the latest entry in the International Film Festival.

It is part of the incongruous reality that is Cannes, where movies like "Video Demons Do Psycho Town" or "The Toxic Avenger: Part II" are promoted alongside those competing for the coveted Golden Palm award.

The world's most prestigious showplace for film also is the industry's biggest marketplace for movies in the official selection may die an artsy death while those shown in backstreet theaters go on to blockbuster success.

"It's the first encounter of the first degree. The life and death of a motion picture is decided here," said Menahem Golan, a leading independent-Hollywood producer-director in town for the 42nd annual festival.

Thousands of producers, film makers and distributors from around the world set up shop for two weeks each year in Cannes. They hawk their wares in the basement of the Palais des Festivals, in hotel suites or, for those able to pay for an aloof but powerful presence, on yachts anchored in the Mediterranean.

Having a suite at the Carlton for doing business "is like having box seats to a Mets game," said Rob Alt, a major international sales director for Trama, Inc., a small New York-based company that is becoming a major force in the exploitation film genre.

Trama is the creator of the Toxic Avenger, a former 98-pound nerd named Melvin from Tromaville, N.J., who was transformed by chemical waste into a deformed and hulking hero.

In the first five days of the 13-day festival, Trama, which buys, sells and distributes movies, did about \$300,000 in business. Trama President Lloyd Kaufman said he expected to close about \$2 million in deals by the festival's end May 23.

"Cannes is known for being a fairly conservative, artistic festival," said Alt. "All the better for Trama, he added. "They make films. We make movies."

Golan said that in less than a week, he closed more than \$20 million in deals — pre-sales on 20-film packages to countries like Spain, Australia, Greece, Belgium, the Netherlands, Portugal and Peru. He inaugurated his company, 21st Century, with the first announced deal in the marketplace, worth "multimillions." The market first sprang up around the festival 29 years ago, and organizers say it has grown into the world's largest.

There are no official figures on transactions. Film critic Roger Ebert says in his book about Cannes, "Two Weeks in the Midday Sun," that he once came across a man who sold movies by the pound.

Golan co-founded Cannon Films with his cousin, Yoram Globus, and produced an eclectic combination of high profile movies and schlock.

Blackfoot couple remembers past with nickelodeon collection

BLACKFOOT (AP) — When Martin and Wilma Mangum get the urge to put another nickel in the nickelodeon, all they have to do is step around the corner from their living quarters into the store they operate near U.S. Highway 91 north of Blackfoot.

That's where they keep what Mrs. Mangum calls the most extensive collection of the antique music machines west of the Mississippi. Some are player pianos that once provided background and "mood music" for silent movies.

Some played to the accompaniment of clinking ice in glasses of bathtub gin and bootleg whiskey in Prohibition-era speakeasies and others provided entertainment for weary miners from Alaska to California. A couple of the machines, one playing 1880s music on a metal disc, are the only ones of their kind still around, Mrs. Mangum said.

The machines line one side of the large store that was built in the 1950s as a square dance barn. As the music plays, one can almost see ghostly revelers drinking and dancing to the raucous tunes.

"We've spent 30 years collecting them during our travels around the country," Mrs. Mangum said. "Some we read about in antique magazines, and others we learned of by word of mouth." But whenever she heard of one that interested us, we started tracking it down. If it turned out to be unusual enough, we ended up bringing it home, regardless of how

long it took us."

Their first exposure to nickelodeons came while visiting friends in Texas. The machine they saw piqued their interest, but their collection didn't start until sometime later when she bought a small machine as a birthday present for her husband, Mrs. Mangum said.

One of her favorites was found in a wool warehouse in Rawlins, Wyo. It has an art glass front, and its paper roll plays a speakies arrangement featuring piano, a canary, a triangle, flute, violin, castanets and mandolin.

The Mangums found out the machine was purchased in 1907 from a Seeburg dealer in Salt Lake City by the owner of a bar in Scofield, Utah, a coal mining town. It played throughout the Prohibition, but when the owner died, it was relegated to the wool warehouse owned by his son.

"It took us two years to talk him into selling it," Mrs. Mangum said.

Another, called a Violone Double Virtuoso, manufactured by Mills Novelty Co. in Chicago, is made of a piano keyboard and two self-playing violins. In its heyday, it was billed as "one of the greatest musical achievements in the world."

"But it's just like a violin," Mangum grumbled as he adjusted the tuning knobs. "Always out of tune."

It was Mangum who got the newly purchased machines repaired and running again, but his work was slowed by cancer. Many of the 150 nickelodeons in the collection still are

not working.

That includes what the Mangums consider one of their luckiest finds, a large marching band used in dance halls. It features saxophone, accordion, three different kinds of drums, piano, and organ.

"It has a hole in the bellows, but now that Martin's back on his feet, we'll soon have it running again," Mrs. Mangum said.

Although the Mangums' nickelodeon collection is not widely known locally, word of it reached the ears of officials at the Smithsonian Institution in Washington, D.C.

"They asked us to donate our collection, but they wanted to store it in a basement until they got a display area built," Wilma said. "We didn't want to have it sit for years where nobody could see it, and we thought Idahoans might never get to see it."

Sharing the store with the nickelodeons is the source of a widely all colors and sizes that attract buyers from all over the country.

The store is open only the first seven days of each month, a routine the couple started after Mangum was stricken with cancer.

"We spent most of our time in Arizona where Martin was taking treatment," Wilma said. "But we found out that I could jump on a plane and come home, open the store for seven days and still make money since most of our income is from mail-order heads. It worked out so well we decided to keep it that way."

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Sequels may be hot ticket for summer

How's this for "high-concept" film-making? A hideously disfigured maniac wearing a hockey mask runs around terrorizing innocent victims. After a much bloodied, the maniac is finally subdued. Until, of course, the sequel.

Paramount Pictures has used this formula not just once or twice, but seven times since 1980. And after selling more than \$190 million in tickets to its gore-thrillers, the movie company predictably will soon release "Friday the 13th: Part VIII."

It's going to be that kind of summer at the neighborhood multiplex, with sequels of all kinds abounding. Starting the week of Memorial-Day weekend — the traditional beginning of Hollywood's summer season — the new box-office hits are expected to be those based on old box-office hits.

In addition to "Friday," Paramount is also releasing the sure-fire hit "Indiana Jones and the Last Crusade," starring Harrison Ford and Sean Connery, and "Star Trek V: The Final Frontier" — Columbia — has "Ghostbusters II" and "Karate Kid III"; MGM will offer another James Bond sequel and Warner Bros. will release "Lethal Weapon II," a follow-up to the cop movie that featured Mel Gibson and Danny Glover.

And this doesn't count the sequel-like films coming this summer based on such comic-strip characters as Batman and Brenda Starr, and Natasha and Boris from the Rocky and Bullwinkle cartoons.

In all, Hollywood will be relying heavily on the tried-and-true to help it meet last summer's record total of \$1.7 billion in tickets sold.

Sequels are rarely liked by critics, but they are beloved by producers and — generally — applauded by moviegoers. As a business proposition, a sequel to a successful movie is as close to a sure thing as it gets in Hollywood. Since their characters and plots are instantly familiar to audiences, they can easily be advertised in 30-second TV spots, reducing some of the risks inherent in selling a new movie.

Familiarity is an especially important ingredient during the summer months, when younger and less sophisticated ticket-buyers are out in force and when the competition is usually keener. A sequel's brand awareness helps draw people to the theater on the first weekend of its release, a critical period during which filmmakers seek as much favorable word of mouth as possible.

"A movie isn't like wine," said Barry London, Paramount's marketing chief. "It doesn't get better with age." Sequels also generally are less expensive to produce and market than an original film.

"The sets are already there, the costumes are already there from the original," said Douglas Gomery, a University of Maryland communications professor who studies the industry. "The only cost that really goes up is the stars' cost. You can't make 'Star Trek' without William Shatner."

The ultimate instance of cost-savings on a sequel may have been the production of "The Four Musketeers" during the 1970s. The movie was actually assembled from footage shot in 1988 Brussels competition, who now lives in Vienna, is more relaxed than Ashkenazy's and also more tender.

William Morris loses movie stars

HOLLYWOOD — The William Morris Agency had plenty to celebrate at its twin 50th anniversary parties in Los Angeles and New York last month. Healthy profits. A booming TV division. A roster of literary clients that includes an ex-president and top government officials as well as some of the biggest names in books.

Several months earlier, William Morris had lost Steve Guttenberg, star of the "Police Academy" series as well as the 1987 blockbuster "Three Men and a Cradle." Other departures in the past year include Anne Archer, Patrick Dempsey, Denver Washington, Denny Glover, Eric Roberts and Howie Mandel.

But when it comes to its stature in the movie community, there wasn't much cause to break out champagne: One year after the oldest and largest agency in the talent business lured superagent Sam Mengers out of retirement to invigorate its weakened movie department, William Morris continues to lose important stars.

The most recent emigre was Kevin Costner, who transferred his allegiance to the Creative Artists Agency this spring, just as his widely acclaimed baseball fantasy film, "Field of Dreams," was about to hit the nation's theaters. Costner, who also starred in last summer's hit movie, "Bull Durham," was lured away by CAA president Michael Uytendaele shortly after his former agent, J.J. Harris, decided she would leave William Morris to join a start-up competitor, Inter-Talent, according to sources close to the actor.

While actors invariably have personal reasons for switching agencies, industry sources close to some of these stars say that William Morris has lost much of its aura of power, a key ingredient in convincing actors that the agency can deliver the big money and attractive parts they want. "They're out there, being aggressive," said a representative of one of the agency's recently left clients. "It's not surprising, since they're the only agency in CAA that has been the most frequent destination for stars leaving William Morris over the past several years."

Both Mengers and the top management of William Morris, including president Norman Brokaw, refused to be interviewed for this story, despite repeated requests. But one source close to William Morris said that its management is pleased with Mengers, and noted that she is on target with the agency's internal plans.

Schumann's piano music is personal, filled with fantasy

The piano music of Schumann is the most difficult in the repertoire. I am not talking about the capacity to play loud and fast nor about necessity of producing a beautiful pianissimo or a finely drawn legato phrase. If these qualities were sufficient, then there would be as many first-rate interpretations of Schumann as there are of Chopin and Liszt, and there are not.

It is Schumann who is the most Romantic of the three, although the composers are closely related. They were born within a year of each other (Schumann and Chopin in 1810 and Liszt in 1811) and their music makes up the backbone of the great Romantic piano literature.

Chopin thought of himself in 18th-century terms, and his otherwise personal music is characterized by that century's virtues of lucidity and symmetry. While Liszt could be as daring as Schumann, he was too much of the showman and marketeer to permit himself to let his music veer off toward incomprehensibility.

The phrases of Schumann are invariably irregular, in contrast to his great contemporaries. His musical ideas are also so personal that they are difficult to analyze and understand, harder still to articulate with conviction. Some of his works — the "F sharp Minor Sonata," the "Humoresque" and the "Davidsbündler-Variazionen" — far exceed in emotional unpredictability. Even such relatively accessible masterpieces as the "Carnaval" are marked by an insane kind of asymmetry. Compare the episodes in the latter to those of Liszt's "Pieces at an Exhibition," which took the Schumann piece as its inspiration. In Mussorgsky's work, the various episodes have approximately the same length; the 21 vignettes of "Carnaval" take from four to 40 seconds to almost four minutes.

Schumann's life ended in an insane asylum at the age of 46, and most of his composition before he was 30, but in his great keyboard music one is never far from madness. To play this music — by turns lyrical, fantastical and dramatic — one has to have a sufficient sense of fantasy to descend to the depths, and enough disciplined artistry to make sense of the train.

Among the younger generation of pianists, Schumann was particularly well served by the late Yuri Egorov, who died last spring at the age of 33. The young Russian was one of the great naturals — with a beautiful sound, an effortless command of a long sense of line — and he played Schumann with insight. Two recent recordings bring back what are among the finest Schumann performances ever recorded. A Globe compact disc contains his 1979 performance of "Fantasy." It is filled with atmosphere in its opening and closing movements and, in its second, with the kind of sovereign command that makes light of technical problems that have kept pianists in anguish since the work was composed. A budget-priced re-

lense contains the "Kreisleriana" and the "Major and F-sharp Minor" Novelles. There are other great performers of the "Kreisleriana." More than even Alfred Corti, Vladimir Ashkenazy and Wilhelm Kempff, however, Egorov leaves the listener with a sense of having shared a hypnotic, haunted dream.

Jean-Bernard Pommier is a pianist who plays with cultivation and control comparable to Egorov's, and who deserves to be better-known. But the Frenchman, who plays Mozart so superbly, doesn't have the hallucinatory imagination to make "Carnaval" and "Kreisleriana" genuinely convincing. These performances (on the Adda label) lack the sensual fantasy necessary in these ultra-Romantic works.

A superb performance of "Carnaval" distinguishes one of two London discs from Ashkenazy. He plays the work in a manner that recalls the great 1929 recording by Rachmaninoff. The tempo is significant, the tempos are considerably faster than one is accustomed to today, and the power in climaxes is astonishing. This disc contains a less interesting performance of the "Humoresque" while the recording was better and fine performances of the march-like "Major and tocatina-like D Major" Novelles. The pianist's second disc contains the "Waldszenen," "Kinderszenen" and "F sharp Minor Sonata." The "Kinderszenen" take the sense of playfulness and capture that it needs. The "Waldszenen" is better and the sonata is really extraordinary. This is one of Schumann's most difficult

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Selling records still difficult for Iglesias

MIAMI (AP) — With more than 115 million records sold worldwide and his 76th album due in the stores over the next several days, selling records is still tough for superstar Julio Iglesias.

Prefers stage to recording studio

"It's the worst thing in life to sell records," the 45-year-old performer said in a recent interview. "On stage, you can be better. But ... once the record is in the shops, there's no way to get it back."

"Raices," Spanish for roots, is his latest album, out this month. He and model Brooke Shields recently finished filming a 45-minute music video in Miami based on one of the album's songs. The album will be released in Spanish, French, Italian and Portuguese, but it will be an American sound, Iglesias said.

"It's very lively in a way, but in another way it's completely different in the way we use instruments," he said. "I love very much this album — I hope."

Even after Iglesias has sold 115 million records — a number comparable to Michael Jackson, and Bruce Springsteen — he wonders whether he can keep up the pace in record sales. But he has doubts about his success — both in America and overseas.

"Success in life is illogical. There

intensive rehabilitation, including exercising his injured fingers with a guitar his family gave him.

He vowed to his mother that he would sing at a Spanish song festival, and Iglesias kept his vow in 1968. His singing career was launched.

Another challenge was learning English — at 38 years old. "In all the Latino roots of language — like Italian and Spanish, I found my music much more natural," Iglesias said. "What's happened in English, for example, is that the phrasing is completely different."

Iglesias has recorded only 30 songs in English, but some have been hits, such as duets with such artists as Stevie Wonder, Willie Nelson and Diana Ross. The native of Madrid has recorded 150 songs in Spanish, 74 in French, 60 in Italian, 45 in Portuguese and 30 in German.

His black hair slicked straight back and wearing all white, Iglesias said a third all-English album may be recorded sometime this summer.

"It takes two years for me to do an English album correctly," he said. "It takes too much stress out

of my life to do an English album. And I love to sing in English."

Iglesias, who is divorced and a father of two sons and a daughter, lives in Indian Creek Village on a private island near Miami Beach. He is part owner of the Miami Heat, the rookie pro basketball team.

He did one worldwide tour last year, and is planning another.

As for his success with the tour — that will be determined by the outbreak of goose bumps.

"I always said in a concert of two hours, if you are able for five minutes to put people in goose bumps, some people will never forget you."

Some haven't.

Iglesias has it all now: His personal life is balanced, and he has all the money he needs. His only doubts are surviving as an artist whose ballads can move an audience.

"There's a moment in your life when you don't need the money. It's not a question of making you ... richer than you already are. That's over in my life," Iglesias said. "I don't need anything else than success, than lights, than surviving as an artist."

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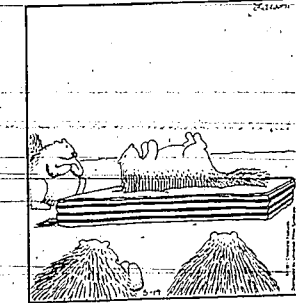

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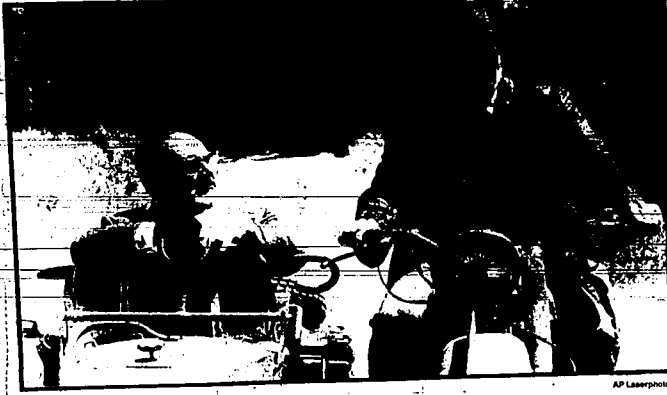
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3rd 'Indiana Jones' movie should not be missed

What can you say about a movie that is as fine-tuned as an Indianapolis 500 race car and travels at the same speed? You could play the cynic and say it is an outrageous exercise in audience manipulation. Or you could say that it is a thrilling exercise in pure cinema. Why not the latter?

"Indiana Jones and the Temple of Doom" is a movie to be enjoyed, not critiqued. After botching "Indiana Jones and the Last Crusade," George Lucas and Steven Spielberg have poured trains, horses, tanks, Nazis (including Hitler himself), a father-son relationship, the Holy Grail and their own limitless imaginations into the third of the Indiana Jones sagas.

There is even a bit of romance with a gorgeous spy, but Lucas and Spielberg have a low tolerance for icky love stuff.

"The Last Crusade" is a meaningful title, since the filmmakers insist

it will be Indiana's final appearance. Too bad, because the new film contains a magnificent piece of casting: Sean Connery as Professor Henry Jones Sr.

Connery and Harrison Ford as father and son elevate the film from a mindless Saturday-serial exercise to a sometimes touching study of human relationships. The two actors are simply terrific together.

"The Last Crusade" begins with a prologue showing the teenage Indiana (River Phoenix) in an adventure in the American West: it's breathtaking, though it bears little relevance except to show the hero's early daring and the neglect by his father.

It's impossible to encapsulate the rest of the plot. The censeless action travels from the Midwest to Italy, Austria, Germany and the Middle East. The climax at the ancient city of Petra in Jordan is the

only letdown. The cataclysm in a hidden cavern has been done before, and by Lucas and Spielberg.

"The Last Crusade" borders on the camp, with such lines as "Ah, Venice!" and "Nazis! I hate these guys!" But then you realize that the heat of the film is a good-natured spoof, as well as an appreciation, of those action films that enthralled us all as children.

The rest of the cast is highly supportive, especially Denholm Elliott as the professorial companion of the Joneses, and John Rhys-Davies as the Arab fixer. Alison Doody is luscious as the blond spy, and all of the villains are properly nasty.

Lucas wrote the story with Menno Meyjes and served as executive producer with Frank Marshall. Jeffrey Boam did the screenplay and Robert Watts produced. The Paramount Picture is rated PG-13, with perhaps too much action for the very young (and snakes and rats for the squeamish). Running time: 127 minutes.

'Criminal Law' is routine, obvious movie

The following are reviews and ratings of some of the movies playing in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and the Los Angeles Times. Opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

CRIMINAL LAW (R). Gary Oldman is electrifying as a brash Boston attorney who successfully defends rich aristocrat Kevin Bacon on a murder charge only to become convinced he's a budding serial rapist-murderer. Unfortunately, the film itself is routine and obvious.

DEAD CALM (R). Cracking-good thrillers are harder to find these days, possibly because the audiences for them seem to have gotten more demanding. Into this void sails "Dead Calm," a spare, smart, seductive piece of real movie making with (almost) every loophole covered: a superlative cast (Sam Neill, Nicole Kidman, Billy Zane) and enough tension to keep us all hyperventilating for hours.

DISORGANIZED CRIME (R). Pleasant, but needlessly drawn-out caper comedy in which an ill-assorted bunch of crooks (Fred Gwynne, Ruben Blades, Lou Diamond Phillips, William Russ) attempt to rob a bank in a small Montana town, despite their leader (Corbin Bernsen) being chased by a riot of New Jersey cops (scene-stealers Ed O'Neill and Dan Rieck). Written and directed by Jim Kouf, who also wrote "Stakeout."

THE DREAM TEAM (PG-13). Howard Zieff's new comedy is so clearly derived from the movie "One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest" that you might begin to wonder when Jack Nicholson will show up. When it finally slick farce stars Mitchell Keaton, Christopher Lloyd and Peter Boyle as a caravansously funny trio with Stephen Farber playing the weakest role, although he has a

great comic waddle, running along helplessly behind them like a chafed turtle.

FIELD OF DREAMS (PG). A movie about crazy dreams and impossible reunions, "Field of Dreams" presents baseball as a kind of national sacrament, an instrument of heavenly reconciliation between the generations — with Kevin Costner as an ex-campus radical and Iowa farmer who receives heavenly instructions to construct a diamond in his cornfield and await some mysterious visitations. It is probably as heartfelt a movie as any major studio has given us recently, but the heartland setting is a little too underpopulated, and the political conflicts avoided or softened. The movie doesn't quite reach the magical, Capra-esque fusion of fable and fantasy it wants.

K-9 (PG-13). A routine cops-and-robbers plot gets a fresh spin when James Belushi, playing a headstrong San Diego narcotics detective gets a smart, unpredictable German shepherd (Jerry Lee) for his new partner. With Mel Harris.

LEAN ON ME (PG-13). Bullhorn-and-baseball-bat-wielding educator Joe Clark is played by Morgan Freeman, possibly the most formidable actor on the American scene. And he will give thoughtful audiences their thinnest problems with "Lean on Me." When director John Avildsen turns up the heat, it is thrilling. But glossed over by the film makers are some of the real statistics of Clark's administration and the fact that he has very nearly created more problems than he has solved.

RAIN MAN (R). When writer-director Douglas Bry Stewart sticks to his bright college debaters his film is engaging, but it becomes more disturbing than surely Stewart

had intended when the subject of the big debate is abortion. However, Kirk Cameron, Jami Gertz, Tim Quill as the see debaters and Roy Scheider as their professor-couch are terrific.

LOVERBOY (PG-13). Patrick Dempsey plays a disingenuous college boy who, instead of working for \$4.80 an hour delivering pizzas on his summer vacation, makes \$200 an at-a-safe sex to every unhappily married woman in greater Los Angeles. A good many talents crashed and burned on this project, most notably John Micklin Silver, the credited director.

MAJOR LEAGUE (R). David Ward's amiable, amusing baseball comedy, which turns upon the fact that the Cleveland Indians haven't won a pennant since 1954 — and which affords enjoyable, ingratiating performances from Tom Berenger, Charlie Sheen, Corbin Bernsen, James Gammon and numerous others. A modest winner about a bunch of supposed losers.

PET SEMATARY (R). Director Marty Lambert and Stephen King, in adapting his own novel, have created a piece of Americana at its most Gothic, a depiction of a normal family made vulnerable by the eternal yearning to cheat death. A numbing, chilling vision, and not to everyone's taste: for sure, Dale Midkiff, Fred Gwynne and Dennis Crosby star.

RAIN MAN (R). Because we have had dozens of buddy films about journeys of discovery, we can plot the scenario of this one like a road

map: The special qualities of one will work on the other to change him, or perhaps both of them. Dustin Hoffman makes his autistic savant character hypocritically interesting and sometimes terribly funny. Tom Cruise gives his looser, most authoritative performance since "Risky Business" and it can be said unblushingly that he holds his own with the masterly Hoffman.

RED SCORPION (R). Numbskull live-action comic book designed to show off Dolph Lundgren as a superhero, a Soviet assassin dispatched to an Angolaike African nation to help put down a rebellion but predictably switching sides.

SAY ANYTHING (PG-13). Trust Cameron Crowe, writer of "Fast Times at Ridgemont High," to dig among the slag heaps of an almost mined-out genre — the teen-age movie — and come up with one of the nicest of the species, a film of warmth, insight, humor and surprise.

SHE'S OUT OF CONTROL (PG). The main trouble with "She's Out of Control" is that it is never out of control. A widowed general manager (Tony Danza) at a failing rock radio station goes bonkers when his 15-year-old daughter starts dating. And the whole movie stays on greased, slick tracks right to the end. Instead of building toward a comic paroxysm, it turns into a polystyrene grenade, made to explode Barbie dolls.

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'Pet Sematary' is the top draw for 2nd straight week

HOLLYWOOD RAPID. "Pet Sematary," the horror movie based on Stephen King's novel, stayed alive as the nation's top box-office draw for the second straight week with earnings of more than \$8.3 million, according to figures released Monday.

In second place was the debut of "K-9," with \$7.4 million in gross ticket sales. "K-9" stars Jim Belushi as a narcotics detective teamed with a hot-shot German shepherd as a partner.

The baseball movie "Major League" was in third place with \$4.1 million.

In fourth place was the debut of "Criminal Law," starring Gary Oldman as a criminal defense attorney who gets caught in a gross ticket haul, then has second thoughts. The movie earned \$2.6 million.

"Dream Team" from Universal was in fifth place with \$2.3 million, just ahead of "Say Anything," which also earned \$2.3 million.

Oscar-winning "Rain Man" remained in the Top Ten list with seventh place with \$1.7 million in earnings. "Loverboy," starring Patrick Dempsey as a college kid who delivers more than just pizza, made a weak first showing in eighth place with \$1.6 million.

"Field of Dreams" earned \$1.5 million for ninth place, while "She's Out of Control" was No. 10 with \$1.3 million.

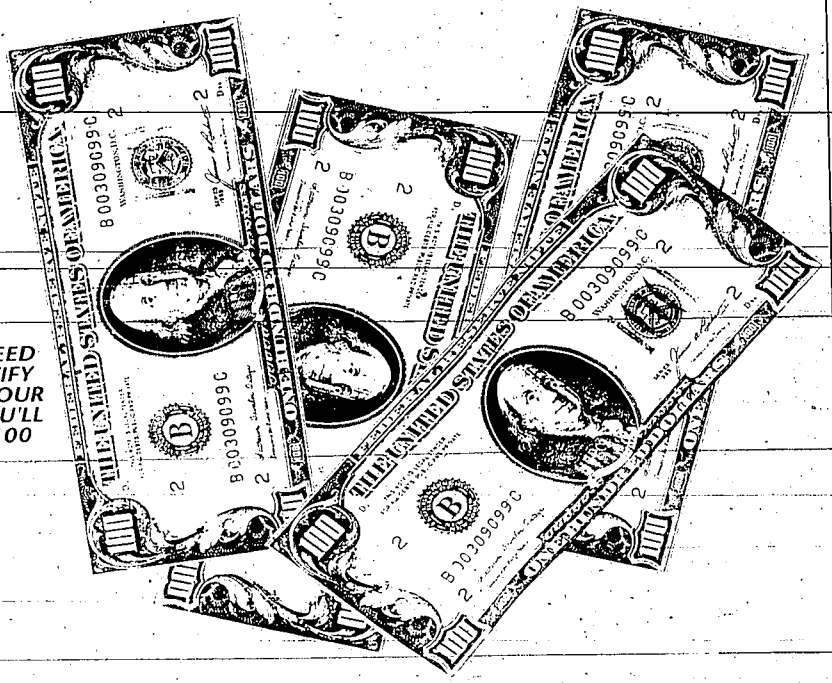

ST. GEORGE, Utah — A solo homer by Mark Roberts of Dixie College in the bottom of the 11th inning put the College of Southern Idaho's string of six straight Region 18 junior college baseball titles in serious jeopardy Thursday afternoon.

But a grand slam home run against Ricks College in the eighth inning of the second game by Wally Edwards kept the Eagles alive for another day in this four-team, national-qualifying tourney.

Roberts finally settled a nearly four-hour marathon 7-6 with his towering blast — but only after CSI blew a three-run lead against the tournament favorites one batter away from success.

The Eagles then rebounded at the expense of Ricks 9-7 after trailing most of the first eight innings.

The Region 18 winner travels to Helper, Utah, Monday and Tuesday for a best-of-three Northwest District finals series against Otero Community College of La Junta, Colo., for a berth in the National Junior College Athletic Association World Series in Grand Junction, Colo., a week from Saturday.

“I really don't know who will pitch tomorrow,” said CSI coach Jim Walker. “It could be any one of several, including some of those who pitched today.”

Walker said Thursday's action was as frustrating as the rest of CSI's 24-19 season, noting that first game was right on par. We had it won, then found a way to lose it. We tried to do the same things in the ninth inning of the second game.

Junior right-hander Chris Smith was cruising along with a one-hitter through five innings, but Capital came up with four hits and two runs in the sixth to squeeze past Twin Falls 2-1 and send the Bruins to the consolation bracket of the tournament.

Twin Falls, now 26-8, will face Blackfoot, a 7-3 loser to Couer d'Alene in another first-round game on Thursday, tonight at 6 p.m. at Caldwell's Simplot Stadium. If the Bruins beat Blackfoot, they will play for the consolation trophy Saturday afternoon.

The game was close, as most expected, with a pair of the winningest teams and a pair of the winningest pitchers in the state facing off in the first round.

Smith mowed down the Eagles in the first two innings while his counterpart, David Young, did the same.

“It was a great pitching performance by both pitchers,” said Capital coach Gerry Harvey, who's senior right-hander tossed a one-hitter at the Bruins.

The trainer thinks the soreness was caused by a shoe nail that was too close to the soft tissue of the foot.

Dr. Alex Harthill, a veterinarian, feels the colt suffered a stone bruise on the hoof. The colt will wear a bar shoe for a workout Thursday and the race.

"Perfect," Whittingham said of the gallop. "His ears were pricking, and he was happy doing it."

Sunday Silence was supposed to

have a workout Wednesday, but didn't because of the sloppy track. He will work a half-mile Thursday, Whittingham said.

"I think it's a two-horse race," Whittingham said of the 1.36-mile Preakness.

The other horse is Easy Goer, who finished second in the 1 1/4-mile Derby as the favorite.

Trainer Shug McGaughey feels Easy Goer will be the favorite Saturday because he's an Eastern horse.

He added, however, "I think Sunday Silence should be the favorite. We ran against him one time and he beat us."

The Derby was raced on a muddy track, but the track is expected to be fast for the Preakness. The weather is supposed to be good Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

McGaughey says Easy Goer just couldn't handle the mud at Churchill Downs.

"It's going to be a fast track Saturday," he said. "Maybe we'll be second best again, but at least I'll know how we stand."

McGaughey also plans to enter Awe Inspiring, who was third in the

UI volunteers for drug testing

MOSCOW (AP) — In an effort to polish its tarnished football image, the University of Idaho volunteered for the NCAA's drug-testing program.

Twenty-four Vandals, selected at random by the NCAA from Idaho's spring roster, underwent drug testing in late April. The school did not release the players' names.

Urine samples were sent to one of three laboratories — Indianapolis, UCLIA or Toropio. The NCAA did not say which lab was processing Idaho's tests.

Idaho Athletic Director Gary Hunter could get the results by the end of this week.

"Our public image, when I came in, was not as good as it should be,"

said first-year Idaho Head Coach John L. Smith, who witnessed Idaho's woes as the defensive coordinator at neighboring Washington State University.

"We've been making every effort to change that image."

Two players on the two-time defending Big Sky Conference championship team — senior offensive lineman Greg Hale and sophomore defensive end Jim Routsos — tested positive for steroid use before Idaho's Division I-AA playoff semifinal game last year.

Both were ineligible to play in the Vandals' 38-7 loss to Furman.

"We hope there isn't a problem," Hunter said. "But without testing, you don't know for sure."

Idaho's program suffered another setback when four Vandals were found guilty of stealing a mountain bike from the Washington State campus in August.

"This (Moscow) is a fishbowl," Smith said. "Everything is magnified. I don't know if our kids realize the role models that they are. It's time to act our age and do what should be done."

Smith said Idaho's decision to participate in the drug-testing program was not simply a public relations ploy.

"I've always believed that if someone is on steroids, or any sort of drug, we need to get them help," he said. "That's the main concern, not disciplining the individual."

Veterans assume lead at LPGA

MASON, Ohio (AP) — Veterans Sandra Haynie and Pat Bradley stole the spotlight Thursday in the first round of the LPGA Championship.

Haynie, 45, and Bradley, 38, shot 5-under-par 67 to share a one-stroke lead over near-winners Susie Rodman, an alternate to the 144-player field, and Elaine Crosby.

Patty Sheehan, Ayako Okamoto, Jane Geddes, Deb Richard and Betty King were at 69 after the round over the Jack Nicklaus Golf Center.

Haynie, inducted into the LPGA Hall of Fame in 1977, has won 42 tournaments — including four majors — but none since 1982.

She held a 150-yard 5-iron on her final hole for an eagle-3 to pull into a

tie for the lead with Bradley.

Despite winning the LPGA Championship in both 1985 and 1974, she said she has accepted being overlooked as a pre-tournament favorite.

"I've been around long enough I let my record speak for itself," Haynie said. "It's just human nature to talk about the recent champions, winners and money-winners. I don't let things bother me."

"Unfortunately, this sport is 'What have you done lately.' Having just taken some time off, I'm just trying to play well."

Bradley, seeking her sixth major championship, also finished her round with fireworks.

She rolled in a 40-foot birdie putt on her closing hole that she termed

"a cross-country snake that slithered in."

"The way the golf course is set up, I did not have 67 in mind when I started the day," said Bradley, who has won 23 tour titles. "I was thinking two or three under would be great. But I got a bonus on the last hole with that putt."

"This is just the first hurdle of a very long race," she said. "But it's always nice to have a strong start to any tournament, whether it's a major championship or not."

Future of NBA lottery uncertain

NEW YORK — The future of the NBA Draft Lottery is as uncertain as which college player will be picked No. 1.

The lottery, which because of expansion will have nine teams Sunday after four years with seven participants, will balloon to 11 teams in 1990. Some league officials not completely sold on the lottery concept to begin with, believe more consideration should be given to the weakest teams.

A committee is expected at next fall's league meetings to recommend changes that would make the lottery similar to the NFL's supplemental draft in which the best teams have fewer chances to win.

Bob Ferry, general manager of the Washington Bullets, who had the best record among this season's non-playoff teams, said he would favor a change even though it would hurt his team if such a plan were implemented this year.

"I've always thought the lottery should be weighted in favor of weaker teams," said Ferry, who could choose his son Danny if Washington gets one of the top three picks Sunday.

General Manager Norm Sonju of the Dallas Mavericks, who will choose eighth or ninth in the June 27 draft if they don't get the first, second or third pick in the lottery,

agreed with Ferry.

"I think most people would agree that we don't really belong in a lottery with Miami, which won 15 games while we won 108 the previous two years," Sonju said. "I criticized the lottery at it with the seventh team wound up with the worst record. The next year, we modified the pick where the worst team got no worse than fourth, so that was fairer."

"This year, the top four or five are so evenly matched that even if Miami doesn't get one, two or three, they might get a very good one. Eight three would be a bonus because that or nine would be fine because that's where we should be anyway," based on our (38-44) record."

While there is no consensus among the lottery teams concerning the No. 1 pick, they generally agree on a group that will be drafted quickly.

"We don't know what order the five or six top kids will go, but since we are not worse than fourth, we can't really lose," said Stu Inman, Miami's player personnel director. "The kids seem to separate themselves mentally, if not physically, before the draft, so we'll be interviewing after we know what spot we have."

Inman predicted that Duke's Ferry, Glenn Rice of Michigan, Louisville's Pervis Ellison, Arizona's Scott Elliott, Oklahoma's Stacey King and J.R. Reid of North Carolina will be among the top seven draft-

ed, but the order will depend on team need.

Three of the four previous lotteries had a clear No. 1 prize — Patrick Ewing of New York in 1985, David Robinson of San Antonio in 1987 and Danny Manning of the Los Angeles Clippers. This year's version is similar to 1986, when Philadelphia won the lottery but traded the pick on draft day to Cleveland, which selected Brad Daugherty.

In Washington, Dallas and Miami in the 1989 lottery, which will be televised by CBS at halftime of a 1 p.m. EDT playoff game, are Sacramento, San Antonio, the Clippers, Indiana, Charlotte and Chicago. The Bulls took New Jersey's spot in the lottery by acquiring the Nets' first-round pick in a trade for Orlando Woolridge in 1986.

"Since the No. 1 pick will not be looked upon as a franchise-saver and all the lottery teams lack experience, a pre-draft trade is more likely than usual."

General Manager Donnie Walsh of Indiana, which will be in its fourth lottery in five years, said he likes Ferry and Ewing, but if I don't have Rick Smiths at center, I'd have to look closely at Stacey King.

"I think the last few years have shown that the winner of the lottery might not get the best player," Walsh said, pointing out that the last three Rookies of the Year were drafted fourth, 18th and fifth.

Flames try not to think of '86

Oldest NFL starter will retire

WASHINGTON (AP) — Defensive tackle Dave Butz of the Washington Redskins, the oldest starting player in the NFL, announced his retirement Thursday.

"It was a good long association with the Redskins, who have always treated me in a very nice way. Many people play in the league and never make the playoffs. I have been fortunate to play in three Super Bowls."

Butz, 38, played in 26 NFL games — starting in 189. At the end of the last season, only Tampa Bay quarterback Joe Ferguson was older than Butz.

"When I think of Dave, I think of all the great plays he's made for us over the year," said Coach Joe Gibbs.

"I think of him coming out of the hospital two years ago to play against the New York Jets. He made one of the biggest plays in the game, and then he checked back into the hospital afterward. You start remembering all kinds of gutsy performances such as that one. Dave was a real Redskin."

The defensive tackle's retirement had been rumored for months. He did not participate in the team's minicamp last week. Butz had another year remaining on his two-year contract that would bring him \$550,000 this season. The team, however, concurred over his off-season work habits, had asked the veteran to take a pay cut and stay in the Washington area during the off-season so his workouts could be monitored.

Butz was drafted out of Purdue and played two seasons for the former St. Louis Cardinals before signing with Washington as a veteran free agent in 1976. The Redskins gave two first-round draft choices and a second-round pick to St. Louis in what still is considered to be one of the largest compensation deals in NFL history.

Coach George Allen said at the time, "A player with his potential does not come along very often. He is still a prospect, but one worth the chance."

Butz finished his career with 69 1/2 sacks — second in team history. He had 91 tackles in 1986, but only 50 in the strike-shortened 1987 season and last year had 59, ninth on the team when he was used only on running situations.

During the minicamp, the team said plans were made to move Danny Grant from right tackle to Butz's left tackle position and insert Deon Hamel in the starting lineup to fill the hole.

Hamel, a special teams standout,

started eight games in both 1985 and 1986.

During Butz's tenure, the Redskins made it to the playoffs six times, winning four division titles, three NFC titles and two Super Bowls.

Bobby Beathard, who is leaving at the end of the month as general manager, said Butz will be missed. "You don't find many players like Dave. He's been very reliable, and he's been one of the big reasons our running defense has done so consistently well."

THE ACES ON BRIDGE

"When men are ruled by fear, they strive to prevent the victory that will abate it." — Alan Paton

"You can't win," lamented today's South. "If I don't draw trump, I risk a ruff. And if I do draw trump, the ruff-side splits 4-2. He didn't see the way to cut his cake and have it too." South took his club ace and rattled off all five trump tricks. The defenders discarded comfortably and accurately. South started the diamonds. He cashed his king and queen and then led the jack with hope. Unfortunately, when West didn't follow suit, South had no choice. Whatever he did, the defenders had four winners and the game had to go to one down.

A much better plan is to draw two rounds of trumps with the ace and jack and then play three rounds of diamonds with little fear of an enemy ruff. Had an opponent ruffed, it would have cost an extra under-trick, but the game was unmakeable in any event. And if the diamonds were 3-3, the game was never in jeopardy.

The payoff comes when the diamonds are 4-2, and the defender with the four-diamond also holds the third trump. As in today's layout, South can then cash his K-Q-J of diamonds safely and then lead a trump to dummy's queen to collect a fourth diamond winner with dummy's ace.

'I Know My First Name Is Steven' shows plight of kidnap victim, family

Last year, more than 1.5 million children were classified as "missing." The figure sounds huge, but it is accurate. The number includes runaways, estranged parents "stealing a child," kidnappings and children that just disappear, never to be found.

As a parent, imagine your horror when one-day your child doesn't come home from school. You call the police, the FBI, you search — no child. That is the story of "I Know My First Name Is Steven," a four-hour miniseries airing Monday and Tuesday, May 22 and 23, on NBC.

It's the true story of Steven Staynor and his family. In 1972, at the age of 7, Steven was kidnapped by a man named Ken Parnell and became the subject of an exhaustive, but fruitless search. Seven years later, he escaped his captor, along with another boy, and was reunited with his family.

"Steven actually said, 'I know my first name is Steven,' when he turned up at the police station," says Cindy Pickett, who plays Steven's mother, Kay Staynor. Pickett is best-known for her role as Dr. Carol Novino on "St. Elsewhere." John Ashton plays her husband, and Corin "Corky" Nemec stars as Steven.

"Steven was brainwashed. Parnell picked him up off the street and told Steven he was a preacher looking for his parent's house," says Pickett.

"Then he told Steven that his parents didn't want him, that they couldn't afford to raise him, that they already had three other children. It was so sad."

Early in his captivity, Steven did try to escape. Then he settled in as Parnell's "son." That is, until Parnell brought home another little boy. One day when Steven got home from school, he heard Parnell tell the boy the same things Parnell told him seven years earlier. That's when he decided to escape.

Pickett says a big part of the story was the readjustment Steven and his family had to make. "Parnell never disciplined Steven, and when Steven came home, he was expected to live within the family rules," explains Pickett. "Though he tried, he couldn't do it, and he moved out when he was 16."

Working hard together, Steven and his parents did finally reach an understanding and began to communicate. At one point, says Pickett, Steven gives a wonderful speech to his mother, "I'm like a Vietnam vet who has finally returned," he said.

Pickett had the opportunity to meet the real Steven Staynor on the set. She says he is a charming man. "I don't know how someone who has

gone through something like that can talk about it like he does," she says. "He is a very sweet man."

Pickett believes the justice system is not tough enough when dealing with crimes of this nature. "Parnell only served 3 and a half years; he's out today. I can't believe it," she says vehemently. "The laws in this country don't deal with it too well. Guys who do wrong on Wall Street served more time than this. It's hard to understand."

But Pickett emphasizes that "I Know My First Name Is Steven" is the story of a family, not an indictment of the justice system. "We hope this increases people's awareness more than anything," she says. "Steven was lucky enough to return to his family, but he is one of the few. Many children who are victims of these kidnappings never return."

James DePaiva introduces a touch of danger on 'One Life to Live'

James DePaiva is one of the most popular male stars in "One Life to Live." He plays Max Holden, and if you've been watching ABC recently, you've probably come across the sexy promo for the daytime show in which Max and Megan are featured. DePaiva left the show after two years but returned before the furor over his departure had died down.

The fans, especially the women, have always found Max fascinating and a little dangerous — for soaps, that's a winning combination. DePaiva describes Max as a little bit of a villain.

"Max is a liar and a manipulator. He's a wheeler-dealer who will finance things to get his way. He's a rascal and that's what I liked about him right from the start."

DePaiva feels that you can be a good actor but, in soaps, the part

has to fit a particular groove if you are to make an impression. Anti-heroes are probably the best parts in soaps, because there is always the chance for redemption; at least for a while.

When James was around 11, he found that he liked performing. Because his dad was a musician, he started playing the guitar and gravitated towards music with a strong indication that he might end up as a musician himself. However, his more practical dad got him a job in a music store (James was 15½ at the time) so he could learn to be a brass instrument repair man. James admits he wasn't all that happy about the arrangement but he did the best he could and even joined his brother playing in bands — by this time James was a good electric bass player.

In the meantime, James's interest in theater grew and he became

one of the leading players in a theater company connected with a community college near his California hometown of Livermore. After eight years of working in bands, doing some theater and still keeping his part-time job at the music store, James felt it was time to see whether he could make it as a full-time actor.

After more community theater appearances and classes, James got an agent and headed for Hollywood. He got a small job on "General Hospital" and other TV shows. Then came the call-to-test-for-the-part of Max Holden. James decided to do the audition his particular way, which was distinctive enough to get him the role.

In his third year as Max, James wants to get rid of some of the rough spots of his character and take a few chances as an actor. Although the handsome, muscular actor can easily fit the label of "soap hunk," he doesn't really like that tag. James prefers to think of himself as a leading man with the instincts of a character actor.

NBC manages to sell all ad spots for controversial 'Roe vs. Wade'

NEW YORK — NBC cut its advertising rate to sell all the commercial time available for "Roe vs. Wade," its made-for-TV movie on the case that legalized abortion, and will probably lose money on the show, the network said Monday.

NBC reduced its normal advertising rate in the past four or five days to find remaining sponsors for the two-hour, \$4 million movie airing Monday night, said network spokesman Curt Block.

"Roe vs. Wade," which tells the story of the U.S. Supreme Court case that legalized abortion, drew criticism from the National Right To Life Committee and the American Family Association based in Tupelo, Miss.

Both groups said the movie took a pro-abortion stance, and urged advertisers to refuse to buy time on the program or pushed for affiliates not to air it.

But NBC President Robert Wright told the 100 biggest national advertisers earlier this month that the film presented a balanced view of the issue and that he intended to air it even if there were no paying advertisers.

The movie cost NBC about \$4 million to produce.

Block declined Monday to say how many of the 14 minutes of commercial time available were sold at a discount, and would not say how deep the discounts were. He said the movie will probably lose money, but would not be specific.

The going rate for a 30-second

commercial during the movie's 9-11 p.m. EDT time period is about \$180,000, said industry sources speaking on condition of anonymity. Block declined to comment on that figure.

Networks rarely have to cut prices for commercials in prime time. If a network fails to find paying sponsors, it often fills the time with public service announcements, run for free.

Block said "Roe vs. Wade" will be pre-empted by only one of NBC's, 208 affiliate stations: WDAF-TV in Kansas City, Mo., which was committed to running a baseball telecast. Kansas City area residents will be able to watch the movie on UHF station KZKC.

The uproar over "Roe vs. Wade" is the latest over a series of programs that triggered protests in the past several months from individuals or groups that found the shows morally objectionable and have called for advertiser boycotts.

The shows have included NBC's "Saturday Night Live" comedy show and Fox Television's situation comedy, "Married... with Children."

ABC recently pulled "Crimes of Passion II," which recreated brutal crimes, because it couldn't sell any advertising for the show.

"Roe vs. Wade" stars Holly Hunter as a character based on Norma McCorvey, the then-anonymous "Jane Roe" plaintiff who sued Dallas District Attorney Henry Wade in an abortion case that went to the Supreme Court.

The movie is about the pro-choice advocates who prevailed in the high court's 1973 decision, but sympathetically portrays the prosecutors who argued the other side.

In its effort to gain advertising support for the movie, NBC took the unusual step of allowing advertisers to screen the movie before deciding whether to sponsor it.

Block said some advertisers who had made season-long commitments to sponsoring Monday night movies withdrew, but other advertisers emerged. He declined to identify them.

"It may be the advertising bargain of the year for some advertisers," he said.

NBC tops all-time Nielsens

NEW YORK (AP) — NBC broke CBS' 26-year-old record of 46 weeks in a row atop the ratings, ranking up the top 11 shows of the week.

NBC, completing its fourth season on the No. 1 network, won its 47th week with an average, prime-time rating of 16.7, according to the A.C. Nielsen Co.

ABC, burdened by a lackluster finish for its big miniseries "War and Remembrance," had an 11.8, CBS an 11.3.

A special one-hour finale of the NBC sitcom "Family Ties" was the top-rated show of the week ending May 14 with a 20.8 rating and 35 share. It was on opposite the final episode of ABC's "Moonlighting," which ranked 70th, third from the bottom.

The rest of the top 10 were all NBC's: "Golden Girls," "The Cosby Show," "Top Gun," "Jackie Special," "Cheers," "In the Heat of the Night," "Unsolved Mysteries," "L.A. Law" and "Hunter." NBC's Sunday movie, "Ferris Bueller's Day Off," ranked 11th. NBC said the last time a network had the top 11 shows was 1979, when ABC had the miniseries "Roots II."

Each rating point equals 904,000 households with television. The share is a percentage of sets in use.

CBS won 46 weeks in a row in the 1962-63 season, when "The Tonight Show Starring Johnny Carson" premiered, the New York Mets lost 120 games in their first season, Marilyn Monroe died of a drug overdose, and there was no such thing as VCRs, personal computers, the Super Bowl, remote control or People magazine.

The five-part conclusion of ABC's "War and Remembrance" built its audience each night, but after Sunday night's conclusion, which ranked 18th, it wound up with an average rating of 14.8 and a 23. The first 17½ hours of the "Winds of War" sequel ran in November and had an average rating of 18.6 and a 29 share.

The 10 lowest-rated shows of the week were: "Jesse Hawkes," "Murder by Moonlight," "Week 57th," "Hard Time on Planet Earth," "North and South, Book Two, Part One," "Kareem Abdul Jabbar," "Incredible Sunday," "Moonlighting," "A Man Called Hawk" and "The Jim Henson Hour."

In the news ratings, ABC's World News Tonight won the week with an average rating of 10.2 and a 21 share.

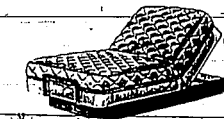

Letterman, Gumbel end feud in on-air banter, handshake

NEW YORK (AP)—"Today" co-host Bryant Gumbel, showing a bit of trepidation, made his first appearance Thursday on the turf-of-late-night talk-show host David Letterman since the two began feuding four years ago.

Gumbel's unannounced visit to NBC's "Late Night with David Letterman" came at the top of the show as Letterman was reading the night's customary top-10 list — this one of questions asked prospective NBC employees.

Number 7 in the countdown list was, "Any problem car-pooling with Bryant?" Number 4 was, "Want to join squad doing inventory of Bryant Gumbel's suits?" whereupon bandleader Paul Shaffer complained that Letterman should lay off Gumbel, because "he might get mad."

Letterman said he would prove Gumbel could take a joke, went to a studio door and brought Gumbel into the studio — after Gumbel hesitated and pointed at the floor: "This studio?" he said. "Is this the line of doubt?"

Gumbel read the rest of the list, including No. 2, "You wouldn't leak a guy's memo, would you?" a reference to the now-infamous memo Gumbel wrote to the "Today" producer complaining about most of his colleagues on the show.

Letterman noted how long it had been since Gumbel had been on the show. "What, did you change your phone?" he asked.

"I get lost," said Gumbel. The two shook hands and Gumbel left. "I told you he wasn't upset," Letterman told Shaffer.

"You two are the Jagger-Richards of television," observed Shaffer, referring to the rocky relationship of ex-Rolling Stones Mick Jagger and Keith Richards.

The Gumbel-Letterman patchup apparently is genuine. A spokesman for the show said during an afternoon run-through, the two tossed a football and were "very amiable."

Their feud began when Letterman interrupted a live, prime-time "Today" special by shouting from a window. Gumbel said the stunt was unprofessional.

Letterman said Gumbel had no sense of humor, and besides, he had the "Today" producer's permission for the practical joke.
