Documents show massive INEL radiation release

TWIN FALLS — From 1957 to 1963, scientists at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory knowingly released into the atmosphere large amounts of a radioactive gas linked to thyroid cancer, according to government documents.

The radioactive releases resulted from an experimental project to "refine" nuclear materials for the military. Almost 6 million curies of radioactivity was released, including an estimated 2,800 curies in iodine-131, according to government documents.

By comparison, the 1979 nuclear accident at Three Mile Island near Harrisburg, Penn., released about 15 curies of radioactivity.

Because of the relatively primitive monitoring devices of the time, however, government estimates of the amount of iodine released may be inaccurate.

INEL officials intentionally released the radioactive clouds when winds would blow them toward the northeast, toward Mud Lake, Terreton and Montview and away from Idaho Falls and other more-populated areas to the east or the south, said John Horan, retired head of health physics at INEL.

Though the government maintained monitoring stations in those smaller communities, the general populace was not

informed of the possible contamination from radioactive iodine, Horan said.

Scientists counted on the 30 miles separating the processing plant from those communities to disperse and dilute the iodine, he said.

Releases also were timed after regular working hours when many of INEL employees had gone home, Horan said.

The Times-News assembled details of the radioactive releases from a 1977 environmental impact statement on waste management operations at INEL, from other INEL documents and from interviews with Horan and Cyril Slansky, the retired INEL chemist who headed the project at INEL's Idaho Chemical Processing Plant.

Radioactive iodine is of concern when it settles on plants and is eaten by animals, including dairy cows.

When cows eat tainted grass, the iodine becomes concentrated in their milk. When humans drink the milk, the iodine settles in their thyroid glands, where it is linked to thyroid cancer and hypothyroidism, which can lead to mental retardation.

After the releases, scientists monitored milk from nearby dairies for iodine content, Horan said.

"We never found any iodine activity from those releases," he said.

State cancer records show no statistical link between INEL releases and cancer rates.

The fuel-refining project that released the gases was known as RaLa, short for its product, "radioactive lanthanum."

The lanthanum, recovered in the RaLa process emits high-energy gamma radiation. It was to be used for an undisclosed military "special need," according to the 1977 impact statement.

"To recover lanthanum from nuclear fuel, the fuel must be processed soon after it is removed from a reactor. Processing this 'green fuel,' however, results in 'inordinate releases of airborne radioactive waste,'" the document says.

During RaLa's early runs, this waste went up a smokestack.

Peggy Exon resigns amid controversy

FAIRFIELD — Peggy Exon has taught her last class, she announced Thursday night — to the dismay of some Camas County parents and the relief of others.

Exon, honored by the governor in January as the sort of teacher the state needed more of, walked out of a hastily called closed School Board meeting Thursday night and tearfully told supporters she had resigned.

The controversy surrounding Exon and the School Board has split this small community, with some parents calling her the best teacher their children have ever had and others saying she humiliated and hurt their children.

She demanded that students work up to their capacity and could not settle for the "guidelines of mediocrity" given her by the board, she said.

But a handful of parents among the approximately 50 community members gathered at the school said

they objected to Exon's teaching methods.

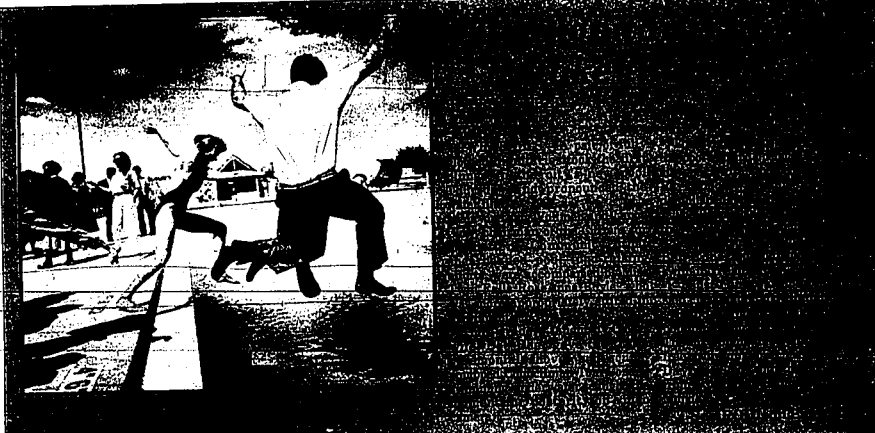
Judy Brookshire said she took her child out of the school system and began teaching her at home after hearing of the experience of one boy in Exon's combined third- and fourth-grade class this fall.

Matt Croner said Exon grabbed his son by the back of his neck during a conference at the first of the school year, despite a previous neck injury.

"How would you react when your once outgoing, positive, happy child starts coming home with low self-esteem, fear of going to school and an attitude of sheer emotional panic and frustration?" he wrote in a letter to the school newspaper, The Snowshoe, this week. "I don't feel it is right that my children should be yanked around by the hair, arms or neck if their work is not turned in on time or suffer the humiliation of having papers torn up in front of others because they are said to be 'no good.'"

Exon called Croner's allegations "no good."

Chinese hard-liners may squelch dissent

BEIJING — Political hard-liners under the leadership of Deng Xiaoping have marshaled an overwhelming concentration of troops in the outskirts of Beijing, far beyond anything needed simply to quell pro-democracy protests, diplomats said Thursday.

The buildup of force appeared aimed not simply at imposing martial law on the capital, in keeping with a still-unenforced declaration issued Saturday by Premier Li Peng, but rather at ensuring that no troops would dare support embattled Communist Party General Secretary Zhao Ziyang, the diplomats said.

The prospect of an impending victory for Deng, China's supreme leader, and Li in the nation's most serious political crisis for more than a decade sent a wave of terror

through the top levels of liberal intellectuals and civil servants associated with Zhao's reformist policies.

A source in Hong Kong close to Zhao's family passed word to the Los Angeles Times that Zhao might be arrested within the next few days and charged as a counterrevolutionary. Similar reports were carried in Hong Kong's Chinese-language press Thursday.

The Times source in Hong Kong also said Zhao's family was considering leaving Beijing. These reports could not be further confirmed, and they may have been spread in a last-ditch effort to line up political support for Zhao.

Tens of thousands of pro-democracy protesters took to the streets of Beijing on Thursday for a massive display of public sentiment demanding that Li and Deng step down.

Bolivian terrorists kill missionaries

LA PAZ, Bolivia — Two Mormon missionaries from Utah were gunned down and killed in La Paz, and leaving terrorists who claimed responsibility threatened a "war to the death" against "Yankee invaders."

Todd Ray Wilson, of Wellington, and Jeffrey Brent Ball, from Wanship, were returning to their home in a poor suburb late Wednesday when unidentified men shot them with machine guns. One of the victims died immediately, the other on the way to a hospital. Both were 29 years old.

The radical Zarate Wilka Armed Liberation Front claimed responsibility shortly after the shootings. It is the same group that last summer tried to kill former Secretary of State George Shultz when he was visiting La Paz.

"The violation of our sovereignty cannot go unpunished," the revolutionaries said in a statement. "The Yankee invaders who come to massacre our fellow

farmers are warned. ... We the poor have no other road than to rise up in arms.

"Our hatred is implacable and our war is to death."

The slain missionaries lived in a neighborhood around the corner from a church that was seriously damaged by a bomb explosion last year, local church president Stephen R. Wright said in an interview.

Two other bombs have been planted in the past nine months, he said. One damaged a church and another was discovered before it exploded.

"We are being targeted unfairly and inappropriately as being imperialists," Wright said. "We have been targeted because we have a high profile, our missionaries wear shirts and ties and we have nice churches."

Police say they have no suspects in the killings or bombings.

U.S. Embassy spokesman Mark Jacobs said American officials will work closely with Bolivian

Valley parents keep faith in mission

TWIN FALLS — Parents of three Magic Valley LDS missionaries in Bolivia say they are concerned about anti-American sentiment in that country, but they want their children to stay.

"I feel like they're doing the Lord's work and that they'll be all right," said a tearful Ann Egbert of Jerome, whose son Lon, 19, is in Mira Flores, a town on the outskirts of La Paz, the city where two fellow missionaries were gunned down.

"It doesn't mean they'll live," she said.

Carl Nelson of Twin Falls, whose

22-year-old daughter Shannon is in Santiago, also on the outskirts of La Paz, said he called LDS church headquarters in Salt Lake City Thursday and was told his daughter was safe.

"She's our oldest," Nelson said. "We're very concerned about her but we know she'll be taken care of."

Nelson, a church authority who oversees about 20,000 members in most of the Magic Valley, said all missionaries in Bolivia have been told to stay in their apartments for the time being.

Church headquarters is keeping contact with Bolivia on an hourly basis, Nelson said. Within the mission is a built-in network of

leadership that allows the Bolivian mission president, Stephen R. Wright, to oversee how missionaries are doing.

"It's a shock, I guess," he said.

DeAnn Heward of Burley, whose son Jason is in Cochabamba, about 200 miles south of La Paz, said her son has written that Bolivians are antagonistic toward Americans because of a recent crackdown on the lucrative drug trade.

She said during elections this month all the missionaries were told to stay in their apartments.

"It's always frightening when they go into another country," Heward said. "We're kind of curious to know

 "absurd, ridiculous."
 Another parent, Laurie Maxwell, said her son had been spanked in front of the class, compared unfavorably with another student and hit on top of his head with a fist. Her daughter had been shaken, and other children have been slapped and choked, she alleged.
 Not true, said Exon. The only incident that occurred was the public paddling of Maxwell's son, she said.
 "It was the last resort, absolutely," and took place with permission of elementary school Principal Jack Altomare and in his presence, she said.
 Maxwell's son and another boy failed to turn in science notebooks even though she worked with them at noon and after school and offered to let them come by her home for more help, Exon said.
 "I work with every child until the task is completed," she said. "I say you won't fail because I'll stay with you."
 Her students brought her nationwide honor last year when two of them brought home NASA awards for their work in her Young Astronauts program, which she started with \$200 of her own money and has kept alive with fund-raisers. She also coached students in history trivia contests and the Young

Authors competition.
 Her Iowa Basic Achievement Test scores also show the success of her teaching. In the fourth grade this year only one child, a transfer from a special education class last year, scored below the appropriate grade level of four years and seven months, and then only by one month. Her top student scored at seven years and five months.
 The lowest score in the third-grade class was at four years and four months level.
 But guidelines she was given shortly after she was placed on probation in April would have required mediocrity from her, she said.
 She was told to remember that a C may be all some children are capable of, and they should not be pushed to feel a C is failing. She was also told to remember that some children are content with a C or B, and that is not a reflection on the teacher.
 "Too much pushing creates resentment and a negative atmosphere, said the brief list of instructions. She was also told to give positive comments.
 Exon, 50, said she decided only Thursday night to resign.
 Wednesday, a fearful day for both Exon and her students, had been the last day of school.
 A 27-year classroom veteran, she

had taught the past three years in Fairfield.
 Thursday the board was prepared to decide on whether to renew Exon's contract for the coming school year, which would have given her tenure, said Chairman Jack Frostenon.
 But Exon spared the board the decision.
 Terry Gilbert, Idaho Education Association regional director, said when he and Exon were allowed into the meeting, he accused the board of keeping a secret dossier on her. She was not allowed to see or respond to complaints made during the three years she was at the district until she was placed on probation, he said.
 Exon's written evaluations showed no problems with her work. Although Altomare did mention during evaluations that there had been some complaints, he treated them lightly and gave her no names, she said.
 In a letter of resignation, she said she had "no desire to teach according to the guidelines given to me by the administration when I know the parents of the community want quality education for their children, not mediocrity."
 Exon, a Camas County native who had taught previously in Fairfield and Gooding, said she does not plan to teach again.
 "It's going to be hard to see the kids start back in the fall," she said.

 The process was operated on a small scale, and all gases passed through a device to "scrub" out much of the radioactive material, Slansky said.
 That early scrubber was inefficient, according to government documents. Later improvements reduced "undesirable" releases to the atmosphere, documents say.
 Radiation was monitored, but early devices could detect

radioactive gases such as iodine, krypton or tritium only when those gases were concentrated, as they would be during an accidental release. Therefore, releases could only be estimated.
 Better monitors were installed in 1960. Even so, a 1973 assessment of the stack-monitoring system by the Allied Chemical Corp. called for improvements including "the extension of its capability to include the detection and measurement of gaseous radioactive components."
 The government moved the RaLa project to Idaho from Oak Ridge, Tenn., because of concerns over the iodine releases connected with the process. The Oak Ridge plant was within five miles of the nearest state boundary, said Horn, who worked at the Tennessee facility during the early 1950s.
 INEL's chemical plant is about 30 miles from Mud Lake, Terrestrial-Montview, the nearest communities.

 Church officials said that an autopsy was conducted Thursday and bodies of the missionaries would be flown to Utah this weekend.
 Last year, the terrorists claimed responsibility for a bomb that exploded near vehicles carrying Shultz, his wife and delegates in La Paz for talks with government officials. No one was injured.

Justice Shepard suffers heart attack
 BOISE (AP) — Idaho Supreme Court Justice Allan Shepard was listed in critical condition in a Boise hospital Thursday night after suffering an apparent heart attack.
 St. Alphonsus Regional Medical Center said Shepard was under treatment in the cardiac care unit after being stricken earlier in the day.
 Shepard, 66, has had several heart attacks in the past, the most serious in 1987.
 Just last week, Shepard stepped down as chief justice in favor of Robert Bakke. But he said he planned to remain on the court and hear cases.

IRS rules farmers liable for gains
 WASHINGTON (AP) — The Internal Revenue Service says farmers may be liable for capital-gains taxes if part of a Farmers Home Administration loan is forgiven.
 The ruling, which was made public in a letter to members of Congress, is in line with the law affecting other taxpayers, which holds generally that forgiveness of a debt creates taxable income.
 "We are disappointed, but it's not something that was totally unexpected," Jim Sinner, an aide to Rep. Byron Dorgan, D-N.D., said Thursday. "What the IRS is saying basically is that where there is forgiveness of debt, there is going to be an income tax consequence."

L.A. teachers return to classroom
 LOS ANGELES (AP) — Striking teachers Thursday approved by acclamation a contract with a 24 percent pay raise over three years and more authority for instructors whose walkout crippled education for a half-million students.
 Teachers will return to the classroom Friday after an 11-day strike in the nation's second-largest school district.
 "Our children will have their teachers back," Board of Education member Julie Korenstein said after the board approved the pact in a 4 1/2-hour close-door meeting.

Lawmaker denies teen sex charges

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — Rep. Donald Lukens denied having sex with a teenage girl but did offer her mother a job during a telephone conversation secretly recorded by the FBI and police and played for the jury today.

On the tape played on the fourth day of Lukens' trial on charges of contributing to the delinquency or unruliness of a minor, Lukens told the girl's mother that her daughter had been calling and he asked that she stop.

If convicted of the misdemeanor, the 58-year-old Republican could be sentenced to six months in jail and fined \$1,000.

During the Nov. 11 conversation, Anna Coffman told the congressman that her 17-year-old daughter, Rosie, had confessed to

her that she had sex with Lukens on Nov. 6.

"She was there with Mercedes. What Mercedes and I did was private. Your daughter had nothing to do with it," Lukens replied, according to the tape.

Mercedes was the name used by Ms. Coffman's friend, Michelle Foster, then 19, who had invited Ms. Coffman to Lukens' apartment that night.

Lukens also asked Mrs. Coffman whether she was "still interested in the job." Mrs. Coffman testified earlier that Lukens made her a job offer during a meeting between at a Columbus fast-food restaurant earlier in the day.

San Bernardino pipeline explosion kills 2

SAN BERNARDINO, Calif. (AP) — A geyser of gasoline erupted from a ruptured pipeline Thursday and exploded into flame, engulfing the neighborhood where a runaway train earlier this month demolished a row of houses. At least two people were killed.

There was a "very good possibility" the 14-inch pipeline was damaged by the earlier train accident, said Ken Seal, manager of the Las Vegas office of the Calneve Pipeline Co.

At least 28 people were injured, three critically. Ten homes and 18 cars were destroyed and five homes were damaged in the blast that radiated so much heat that pets and garden corn stalks were singed two blocks away.

"It looks like a bomb went off over Duffy Street," City Attorney James Penman said at the scene, across the street from where the train destroyed six houses on May 12 and damaged five others.

"It's like a nightmare," said Delores Jones, whose house was destroyed by the fire. "I haven't slept since the train wreck. It's come back to haunt me."

A fountain of gasoline spouted above ground just before the explosion, said Paul Allaire, a city information officer. "It was up in the air — high pressure — like a geyser," he said.

A passing freight train may have ignited the spewing gasoline, said Southern Pacific spokesman Bob Taggart. Residents have complained that train wheels throw off sparks as they round a curve and say trainmen walk alongside afterward and spray down the tracks with small fires.

"A train passed through here just minutes before the explosion," Taggart said. "In fact, they looked back and saw it."

Flames roared 300 feet skyward, and thick, black smoke rose thousands of feet high after the 8:11 a.m. explosion from the ruptured 14-inch pipeline.

After the train wreck, Calneve had assured authorities the pipeline was examined and was safe.

"I don't know if every inch of the thing" was inspected, said Calneve representative David Andries.

"My windows started shattering," said June Chung, whose home in Rialto overlooks the scene from about a mile away. "The houses were on fire, the cars. One man ran out. He was in flames."

The ruptured pipeline is buried six feet deep near the spot where a Southern Pacific freight train derailed, killing two crew members and two boys in a home.

The pipeline carries gasoline, diesel and jet fuel from a tank farm in Colton, several miles from

the blaze site, to Southern Nevada, supplying the Las Vegas Valley with 90 percent of its fuel.

The flow of fuel through the pipeline was shut off when an automatic alarm signaled a drop in pressure, said Jed Robinson, Calneve general manager in San Bernardino. But fuel remaining in the shattered pipe continued to burn fiercely through much of the day.

Robinson said up to 12,000 gallons of gasoline burned. The neighborhood was evacuated for several days after the train jumped the track because of fears the pipeline might have been weakened. The city was assured the line was safe when it reopened several days ago, Penman said.

"Obviously, in this case, the experts were wrong. Calneve has got a lot of explaining to do," said Penman.

Probe focuses on homicide

WASHINGTON (AP) — Investigators probing the massive explosion that killed 47 sailors aboard the battleship Iowa last month are pursuing the possibility of a homicide involving two shipmates who had a falling out, officials said Thursday.

At the same time, the officials said they have ruled out one leading explanation for the explosion April 19 in a gun turret of the Iowa: that the gunpowder for the 16-inch cannon had been rendered unstable by improper storage last summer.

Pentagon chief spokesman Peter Williams said Thursday the Navy's inquiry had "a criminal investigation aspect to it" and that the Federal Bureau of Investigation was doing more than just helping the Navy sift through forensic evidence. But Williams declined further discussion of the criminal inquiries.

A Navy official said part of the inquiry is focusing on the relationship between the two Iowa shipmates. "Nothing conclusive has been found and the Navy might never demonstrate a cause."

Parents should talk more of sex

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government launched a campaign Thursday to encourage parents to talk more explicitly with their children about sex, saying their failure to do so has contributed to the AIDS epidemic.

"The parent who does not take time today to teach his or her child properly could end up later in a hospital room watching that child

die," said Dr. James O. Mason, assistant secretary of Health and Human Services.

Mason unveiled a \$1.5 million campaign, involving a new brochure and television advertisements, designed to spur family dialogues about sex and AIDS.

He said the program is taking a

somewhat different tack, stressing the advantages of sexual abstinence by youth, than earlier AIDS-prevention campaigns, which put more emphasis on the use of condoms as a "safe sex" option.

"Kids and condoms don't work awfully well," said Mason. "We've done studies and we find that they act on impulse, they don't plan ahead so a condom is there."

Study: More have knowledge of AIDS cause

ATLANTA (AP) — More and more Americans know people can get AIDS from sexual intercourse with an infected person but not from casual contact, a federal study released Thursday shows.

The study, based on about 3,500 interviews a month from August 1987 to August 1988 and conducted by the federal Centers for Disease Control's National Center for Health Statistics, indicates that Americans think they know more about AIDS than before and that they may be right.

But it may be years before the improvement shows up in a drop in reported new AIDS cases,

because some people can be infected with the AIDS virus for 10 years before symptoms appear, federal researchers say.

The CDC's Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report released Thursday in Atlanta said the overall gain in knowledge about acquired immune deficiency syndrome coincides with a national public awareness campaign.

It said the effect of one element of the campaign, the mailing of an AIDS fact brochure to most American households in May and June of 1988, is being analyzed.

U.S. moves to implement trade tariff law

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Bush administration has targeted trade barriers in Japan, Brazil and India as it moves to implement a controversial provision in the new U.S. trade law that potentially could lead to huge tariffs against some products, officials said Thursday.

Congressional and administration officials said the decision had been made to cite Japan for its refusal to buy U.S. made satellites and supercomputers, as well as its barriers on U.S. lumber products.

The 1988 Omnibus Trade Act requires the administration to issue

a sort of hit list identifying the trade barriers most harmful to American producers.

Once having done so, it has 18 months to negotiate the removal of the barriers. If the talks are unsuccessful, the government can levy tariffs of up to 100 percent against selected imports from an offending country.

Officials said that India would be cited for its restrictions on foreign investment and foreign insurance companies, while Brazil would be cited for its import licensing practices.

Embezzlers need tougher message

As regular as clockwork, The Times-News has been reporting the monthly or in some cases, weekly or daily discovery of yet another embezzlement in the Magic Valley.

A number of cases have been charged by Twin Falls County Prosecutor K. Ellen Baxter, but so far, not a single person has been convicted of the charge as filed.

Instead, either the cases have been plea-bargained or are still in negotiations.

Furthermore, of the cases receiving the most notoriety, not a single defendant has been sent to jail.

In short, the message to embezzlers in Twin Falls County is that the penalty for this form of theft is nothing more than a bit of notoriety in the daily newspaper, probation, maybe a fine, and a promise of restitution.

The last one, of course, is accompanied by a whiny appeal from the defendant about how sorry he or she is and how it would never happen again, etc., etc.

But the overall message is that you don't have to worry about jail time, embezzlers, because the criminal justice system will let you off.

Now of course, it will be argued, every case is different and that jail time is not an appropriate sentence in every case. But in no case is it appropriate? If that's so, why have jails at all?

In the past few months, at least eight instances of local embezzlement have come to light. Four involve government agencies, two involve civic organizations, and two involve private businesses. The amounts of money range from under \$50 to nearly \$16,000.

The circumstances of each case have been different, but in them all, the pattern is that of an employee or trusted worker giving in to the temptation and siphoning off funds which do not belong to her.

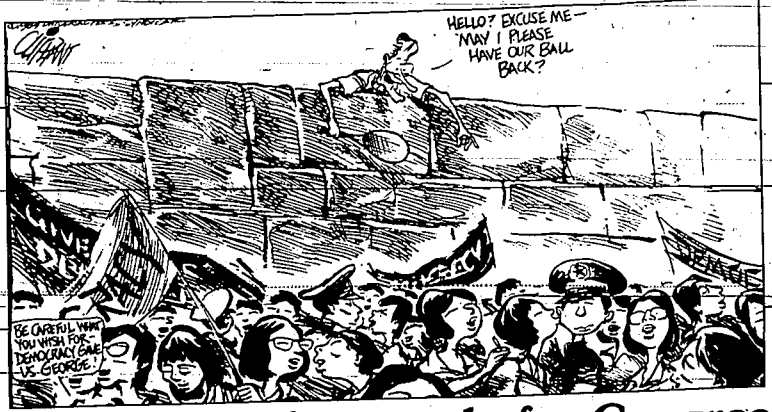
Interestingly, all but one of the cases involve women defendants. It is not usual, at least in this community, for women to be caught up as defendants in the criminal justice system. Could it be there is some reluctance to send a female defendant to jail?

Another pattern is that, so far as is known, the defendants do not have serious prior scrapes with the law.

But that does not warrant, in our view, the kid-gloves treatment they have received from the prosecutor and the criminal justice system.

We think the current spate of embezzlements need stronger attention than they are apparently getting. We sense that the community is watching to see how these cases go.

Some jail time, in our view, wouldn't be too harsh.



Natcher is good example for Congress

WASHINGTON — As Washington sinks into the swamp it once was, a spectacle of money and power gone haywire, Rep. William H. Natcher, D-Ky., stays his fastidious course.

Erect and immaculate in his starched white shirt and dark suit, the snow-haired gentleman from Bowling Green has been in the House almost 36 years.

At 79, he has never accepted a political contribution, never taken an honorarium for a speech and never missed a vote. Through 5 p.m. Wednesday, he had cast 15,967 of them.

Everyone knows that he is one of a kind, and so, before each new Congress, House leaders ask Natcher to speak to incoming freshmen. "I tell them there are lots of things in life that are right, sacred and good," Natcher said, "and one is to serve in the Congress and to say to those who want to spend this money on you, 'I'd appreciate it if you'd just keep your hands off me.'"

Most political action committees know to leave Natcher alone, but every now and then, somebody tries anyway, and he simply sends the checks back.

Last year, the grand total of his campaign expenses, all paid by Natcher, came to \$8,404.97 — mostly for gasoline to drive his sprawling, rural district. By contrast, the average House winner in 1988 spent \$358,992.

Another of Natcher's distinctions is that he runs the lowest-budget office in the House.

A study in self-reliance, he has no administrative assistant, no legislative director, no press secretary. He just has "five ladies," as he puts it, who help him handle office business.

He sends out one press release each year, which he writes himself, saying that once again he has not missed a vote.

er missed a day or a vote since he has been a member of Congress," reads the 1988 release. "He has cast 11,748 roll-call votes and 4,154 quorum calls, making a total of 15,902. ... Natcher admits that he has had a great many close calls, but so far has been fortunate enough to never miss a vote and after posting the 15,000 mark, has indicated he intends to try for another 15,000."

The Guinness Book of World Records lists Natcher's feat, and he acknowledges that he is now something of a hostage to this self-imposed standard.

He once went onto the floor with double pneumonia despite a doctor's order to go to the hospital. "Can't do it," he recalled thinking. "I'd miss 10 or 12 votes."

Then there was the time his wife was seriously ill in Bowling Green. Every night for two weeks, he caught a 7:20 flight to Nashville for an adjustment, and drove 64 miles to see her.

Every morning, he caught the 10:00 flight back, arriving in Washington in time for the opening vote.

"Deaths in the family, weather problems, transportation difficulties, sheer weariness did not stop him as he matched his remarkable feat," Rep. Sidney R. Yates, D-Ill., wrote of Natcher in a newsletter to his district.

There are those who chuckle at Natcher's slavish devotion to standards that, after all, don't amount to much in the larger scheme of Washington. They fault him for not using his seniority as a platform to speak out on the issues of the day. With a larger staff, with a press secretary, he could have been a voice, they say. Maybe even a speaker.

But Natcher is content to be the No. 2 member of the Appropriations Committee, responsible for 43 percent of the federal budget — health, human services, education and labor — and many of the programs that Americans associate with the most basic functions of government.

Besides, there is something to be said, particularly in these times, for one who sets standards higher than those required of him, and sticks to them.

This is why, when contentious bills are debated and the speaker comes to the floor, Natcher is often called upon to preside. A picture of fairness and parliamentary prowess, he generally gets a standing ovation from both sides of the aisle when he returns the gavel.

"He's a forceful presence — almost in a military way," said Rep. David R. Obey, D-Wis. "He taps the handle of the gavel, not the head. He does it very softly, and he'll just stand there and keep tapping until the House is silent."

So reverential is Natcher toward the House that he has faithfully kept a journal, which numbers 50 leather-bound volumes, of his years there. He also has written weekly to his children and grandchildren — more than 1,700 letters altogether — about the important workings of Washington as he sees them. And so Wednesday, as Washington was transfixed by the spectacle of House Speaker Jim Wright, D-Texas, facing possible ruin before the ethics committee, Natcher was on the House floor fighting for \$1.1 billion in supplemental appropriations for student loans, worker training and foster care.

"It's the most important matter before the House today," he said.

ICC chief quits over fight with Senate committee

WASHINGTON (AP) — The chairman of the Interstate Commerce Commission resigned today in tears Thursday, saying "the White House and I have concluded it was not in our interest to fight the Senate Commerce Committee."

Heather J. Gradison, a member of the commission since 1982 and its chairman since December 1985, offered no further explanation at a meeting attended by about 100 ICC employees. They applauded when she finished her brief statement.

Her five-year term was up last December but she has remained on the job. A source at the ICC who

declined to be identified said Democratic Sen. Ernest E. Hollings of South Carolina and J. James Exon of Nebraska have expressed strenuous opposition to her re-nomination.

"I think it's time to move on," said Mrs. Gradison, wife of Rep. Willis D. Gradison Jr., R-Ohio.

Insiders said the dispute with the Senate Commerce Committee goes back to last year when a bill to regulate the railroad industry was defeated 11-10 in the committee.

Mrs. Gradison is a strong advocate of deregulation.

"We have a different agency today than we had seven years ago," Mrs. Gradison said. "We have far fewer employees... We have a healthy rail industry, we have a competitive motor carrier industry."

The 100-year-old ICC has been a target of budget cutters.

Two years ago, the Senate transportation appropriations subcommittee slashed the commission's budget so sharply that all employees had to be put on a four-day work week for four months.

Hearing told air control overworked

WASHINGTON (AP) — The nation's air traffic control system suffers from overwork and low morale as it handles more planes with fewer fully qualified controllers than eight years ago, witnesses told a congressional hearing Thursday.

The controllers, who sit at screens across the country and guide airplanes to and from airports, express widespread discontent, said a General Accounting Office survey released at the hearing.

The survey included analysis by an independent consulting group, the Flight Safety Foundation, that said the system is safe but the margin of safety narrow.

"Morale is horrible, traffic

management is overworked, insensitive; we're overworked, understaffed and abused," said one unidentified controller who responded to the survey by the GAO, which is the investigative arm of Congress.

An air traffic control supervisor was quoted as saying there are busy hours at major hubs "when the system teeters on the brink of being unsafe."

The survey, titled "Serious Problems Continue to Trouble the Air-Traffic Control Work Force," was based on 5,098 questionnaires filled out last year by controllers and supervisors at the FAA's 84 largest facilities. Those responding

made up about one-third of the workforce.

A House Public Works and Transportation subcommittee released the report which indicated that 65 percent of controllers felt they handled too much traffic, 59 percent thought they are required to work too long without a break, and 43 percent said their morale was low.

The figures had changed little since a similar GAO survey in 1985. Both Democratic and Republican leaders of the investigations and oversight subcommittee said this indicated the Federal Aviation Administration has done little to improve conditions.

Economy up a moderate 4.3% in 1st 3 months

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. economy grew at a moderate 4.3 percent annual rate in the first three months of the year, the government said Thursday in a report which economists and the Bush administration saw as a sign the country's record peacetime expansion is continuing.

The Commerce Department's revision in the first-quarter gross national product to well below its original 5.5 percent estimate came amid worries that Federal Reserve efforts to stem inflation could move the economy into a recession.

But Commerce Secretary Robert Mosbacher said the report shows that "Fed policy over the past year appears to be succeeding in steering the economy to a more moderate, but sustainable, growth path."

Michael Boskin, chairman of President Bush's Council of Economic Advisers, said the report made him "confident the economy will continue (its) growth, inflation will be contained and the economy will remain solid."

Some private economists said flatly that the report rules out any recession for at least the remainder of the year.

A survey of economic forecasting experts conducted before the latest GNP release also discounted any recession in 1989.

"Not only is there no sign of a recession in sight," said Allen Sinai of the Boston Co., "but the question now is whether we will get a significant rebound in the second and third quarters."

Michael Evans of Evans Economics, Inc., agreed that "the

last chance for a recession this year has just evaporated."

"The economy is in amazingly good shape," he said. "There seems to be no signs of a serious slowdown."

Both the 4.3 percent growth rate and the earlier 5.5 percent estimate included the statistical effects of last year's drought on the farm sector — a factor that sector means the non-farm economy grew at only a 1.8 percent rate, compared with the

earlier estimate of 3.5 percent. This is the slowest quarterly non-farm GNP advance in more than two years.

Not all economists were encouraged by the report, however. Lawrence A. Hunter, deputy chief economist for the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, said the non-farm growth rate means "we have fallen through the Fed's target for a 'soft landing' and would be heading directly to a 'hard fall.'"

Ex-housing chief defends program

WASHINGTON (AP) — Former Housing Secretary Samuel Pierce on Thursday defended his handling of a subsidy program that an auditors report said favored well-connected Republicans.

Pierce said he did not suspend the program, as recommended by the auditors, because he believed changes to the program had alleviated many of its problems.

"The Department of Housing and Urban Development program provided indirect subsidies for rehabilitation of privately owned low-income housing projects. Jack Kemp, the current housing secretary, last month suspended awards under the program, pending further review."

The HUD inspector general said his audit found a pattern during the Reagan administration in which former department officials and other Republicans received a large share of project awards either as developers or as consultants to developers.

"Among those cited by the inspector general's report was former Interior Secretary James

Republicans and that he would like to see "how those affiliated with the Democratic Party benefited from this program."

"I think what you were trying to do was deflect some of the blame... making irresponsible statements that you can't back up," said Frank. It was Pierce's first public response to the inspector general's report, which claimed the program was riddled with "favoritism" and "misanagement."

Pierce, Reagan's sole black Cabinet member who remained at HUD throughout the eight years of the administration, denied that projects pushed by well-connected Republicans got any greater consideration than others.

Pierce said he had one meeting with Watt but "no promises were made to him."

He said he would have advised housing authorities and developers who hired consultants that they were wasting their money.

"There are other ways of getting to the people at HUD," Pierce said without elaborating.

Watt, who was reported receiving a \$300,000 consulting fee on a Maryland project.

Pierce drew an angry response from Rep. Barney Frank, D-Mass., when he told a House Government Operations subcommittee that the auditor's report focused on

Armitage drops from Army job running

WASHINGTON (AP) — Richard L. Armitage, a top Defense Department official throughout the Reagan administration and tapped by President Bush as the next secretary of the Army, has decided to leave government service, the Pentagon said Thursday.

Armitage, currently the assistant defense secretary for international security affairs, has asked that the president withdraw his name from consideration for Army secretary," said Peter Williams, the Pentagon's chief spokesman.

"Mr. Armitage also has asked to

be relieved of his current duties... effective June 5. Rich Armitage has been one of the mainstays of the Department of Defense since 1981... he will be greatly missed by his colleagues in the government."

Williams quoted Armitage as writing in his letter of resignation that he could "no longer accommodate the needs of my ever-growing family with the time and travel demands of public service."

"The Army needs full-time, dedicated leadership. I regret to say that I find myself, at present, after over eight years of 60-hour work

weeks, unable to face that challenge," Armitage wrote.

"Armitage has eight children and Williams said his family priorities "were certainly unassailable."

Williams had no information on whether Armitage already had found a new job in private industry. A secretary in Armitage's office said he was unavailable for comment, and would not be in the office the rest of the week.

The 43-year-old Armitage early this year had been slated to leave the Pentagon for an executive position at the State Department.

Scientists play host to students

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — As more than 500 scientists meeting in New Mexico debated their nuclear fusion claims, University of Utah researchers B. Stanley Pons and Martin Fleischmann played host to a less critical audience — 38 middle school students.

Pons and Fleischmann declined an invitation to the federal "Cold Fusion Phenomena" workshop in Santa Fe this week. Instead, they met Wednesday with the private school students from Rowland Hall-St. Mark's.

U chemists' laboratory, which in the behind-the-scenes battle to retain patent rights has been opened only to a selective number of scientists seeking to confirm the results of the Pons-Fleischmann experiment.

On March 23, Pons and his British colleague, Fleischmann, announced they had achieved room-temperature or "cold" fusion in a lab beaker utilizing rods of palladium inside electrically charged coils of platinum immersed in deuterium-rich heavy water.

Many researchers had duplicated the experiment with similar results, but proof

of fusion remains elusive.

On Wednesday, with test tubes bubbling in the background, the youths and lab teachers got a first-hand look at the lab where the discovery was purportedly made.

For Pons and Fleischmann, 2 1/2 hours with the curious children — which included an all-you-can-eat french fries and hamburger dinner — was a chance to heighten the students' interest in science.

Pons has committed to speaking to elementary school classes, as well.

Inventor of virus suspended

ITHACA, N.Y. (AP) — Cornell University has suspended the graduate student accused of writing a software virus last year that infected thousands of computers hooked up to a national network, his lawyer said today.

The New York Times reported today that Robert Tappan Morris, 23, was told he had violated the school's code of academic integrity.

His lawyer, Thomas Guidoboni, confirmed today that a letter to that effect had been sent to his client, but he would not comment further.

The virus entered the national computer network known as Internet in November and rapidly copied itself, "infecting" as many as 6,000 computers at universities, corporations and military installations.

The rogue program did not destroy data but forced operators to shut down many computers while they purged it. Morris' friends have quipped the first-year graduate student as saying he did not intend to create such a problem.

In a letter to Morris dated May 16, the dean of the graduate school and the university's Academic Integrity Hearing Board said Morris would be suspended until the 1990 fall semester.

Dean Alison P. Casarett said that if Morris wanted to reapply, the decision to readmit him would be made by the graduate school's computer science faculty.

Casarett said the decision to suspend Morris was an academic ruling and not tied to any criminal charges that Morris might face.

"Our process was entirely separate from anything legal authorities might have done," she said.

"Morris faces no criminal charges. A federal grand jury earlier this year forwarded its recommendations to the Justice Department, but the department has not taken any action."

A Cornell University commission in April said that Morris' action was "a juvenile act that ignored the clear potential consequences."

Lee Majors says he lost money in oil drilling

ENID, Okla. (AP) — Actor Lee Majors says he didn't hesitate to invest more than \$3 million in two oil patch businesses because he considered them a presidential and chief operating officer a friend.

Television's former "Six Million Dollar Man" now claims he lost \$1.5 million because of his investments in two Enid oil-drilling rig companies operated by Vaughn Good.

He appeared in court Wednesday to testify on a lawsuit that he and investor Ray Davis filed against Good and his wife, Laura. The two men are seeking \$3 million in actual damages plus unspecified punitive damages.

Radio show host McNellis dies

NEW YORK (AP) — Magi Newhouse, who was host of radio and television talk shows under the name of Maggi McNellis, died Wednesday of heart failure at her home in Manhattan. She was 71.

Ms. Newhouse also had been a cheerleader and began her career as a supper club singer. She moved to radio in 1963 as host of "The Maggi McNellis Show" and "Magi's Private Wire."

She also participated in "Leave It to the Girls," a radio show that offered women advice on romance and marriage. She later became host of a television version of the show and of "Magi's Magazine."

Her husband, Clyde M. Newhouse, an oil industry owner, died in 1986.

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Briefly**Khomeini gets out of hospital bed**

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP) — Iranian leader Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini got out of his hospital bed and sat in a chair Thursday, two days after undergoing surgery on his digestive tract, Tehran radio reported.

The medical team treating the 89-year-old revolutionary patriarch described his condition as very good and said he was progressing satisfactorily in his recovery, according to the radio report, which was monitored in Cyprus.

The internal bleeding that prompted the operation was under control and there has been no need to give Khomeini blood after the operation, the medical bulletin said.

Nicaragua expels 2 U.S. diplomats

MANAGUA, Nicaragua (AP) — Two U.S. diplomats have been expelled from Nicaragua for allegedly instigating wildcat strikes by teachers seeking higher pay, the government announced today.

Dionisio Marengo, spokesman for the ruling Sandinista party, identified the diplomats as Kathleen Williamson Barnum, the U.S. attaché for Central American labor affairs who is based in Honduras, and Joel Franklin Cassman, economic attaché at the U.S. Embassy in Nicaragua.

Marengo said the two officials "were expelled for interfering in the internal affairs of the country." He said they went around distributing money and exhorting the teachers to strike.

Panama opposition tours hospital

PANAMA CITY, Panama (AP) — Opposition leaders toured a hospital Thursday to the cheers of hundreds of patients, visitors and employees and said they will keep fighting until they win recognition of having won the election.

It was the fifth time the candidates defied a government ban on demonstrations, which is in effect until a visiting Organization of American States delegation returns in its report.

Opposition presidential candidate Guillermo Endara and his two running mates told OAS delegates Wednesday that they won the May 7 election and want their victory recognized and Panama's ruler, Gen. Manuel Antonio Noriega, ousted.

Israeli court acquits soldiers in death

JERUSALEM (AP) — A military court acquitted four soldiers of manslaughter Thursday in the beating of a Palestinian because medical evidence indicated he died of blows administered later by other soldiers.

All four were found guilty of brutality and will be sentenced June 15. Arab hospital officials said Israeli soldiers in the occupied Gaza Strip shot and killed an 18-year-old Palestinian and wounded at least 35 people on Thursday, including a 6-year-old boy. Two Palestinians were reported wounded in the West Bank.

London tab calls foul on libel award

LONDON (AP) — Making the racy tabloids pay large sums for libel to pals of royalty and other notables is one thing, but an award of nearly \$1 million to the Yorkshire Ripper's wife is a shocking comment, that things have gone too far.

"Whose justice is this?" the Daily Mirror — asked... on Thursday. "Preposterous," declared the Daily Express.

The 600,000-pound (\$942,000) award Wednesday to Sonia Sutcliffe was the largest ever made by a British jury. Her husband, Peter, is known as the Yorkshire Ripper for terrorizing northern England in 1975-80 with the murders of 13 women.

It was levied against Private Eye, a satirical magazine that has thrived on the notoriety of frequent libel cases. The 200,000-circulation magazine, which is partly owned by actor-comedian Peter Cook, has begun a fund-raising campaign to avoid bankruptcy.

Private Eye said in 1981 and 1983 that Mrs. Sutcliffe had sold her story to the Daily Mail for \$392,000 after carousing with the tabloid's reporters at a hotel. After she filed the libel action, Private Eye published two articles implying she knew about her husband's crimes.

In the trial, which began May 19, Private Eye admitted there was no deal with the Daily Mail but claimed the gist of its statements was true: that Mrs. Sutcliffe negotiated with newspapers and was prepared to capitalize on her husband's crimes.

Legal experts said the growth of libel awards would make newspapers reluctant to defend stories in court, for fear of high jury awards, and incline them to out-of-court settlements even on settlements that were true.

They and several national newspapers recommended changes in the libel laws, which allow juries to set damages without guidance from judges.

Plaintiffs in libel suits don't ask for a specific sum, preferring not to limit the jury.

"In England, you are now going down the American route, which would allow punitive damages," said Ross Harper, president of the Law Society of Scotland. In Scotland's judicial system, judges assess libel damages.

"Damages are there to compensate, not to punish," Harper said. "We could suffer from all the efficiencies and defects of the American system which allow punitive damages to come in. They are unfair, they are inconsistent."

Gorbachev easily wins Soviet presidency

MOSCOW (AP) — Mikhail S. Gorbachev was overwhelmingly elected president today by the country's new congress, winning more than 96 percent of the vote.

The sole candidate, Gorbachev received 212 of the 220 votes cast. Yuri A. Osipyan, chairman of the commission that counted the ballots, reported during nationally televised proceedings of Congress of People's Deputies. Eighty-seven deputies voted against the Communist Party chief, Osipyan said.

Gorbachev thus secured 96.6 percent of the votes cast by deputies in secret balloting, Osipyan said.

Earlier today the congress, the first competitively elected Soviet parliament, nominated Gorbachev as the sole candidate after rejecting demands he first report on his accomplishments and failures.

Maverick communist Boris N. Yeltsin withdrew his nomination bid.

A little-known Leningrad deputy, Alexander Obolensky, offered himself as an alternative to Gorbachev, but two-thirds of the 2,250-member Congress of People's Deputies rejected him.

Obolensky, who is not a member of the ruling Communist Party, said he knew he had little chance of winning the nomination but wanted to "set a precedent of an alternative."

Most Soviet deputies taking bus, living on \$24 a day

MOSCOW (AP) — Most of the deputies who have come to Moscow for the new Soviet parliament are traveling by bus, eating ordinary hotel food and must survive on about \$24 a day.

In an article reflecting sensitivity to the issue of privileges for the powerful, Pravda said rank-and-file representatives in the 2,250-member Congress of People's Deputies aren't getting special treatment, despite rumors to the contrary.

Citizens are concerned whether their representatives are "getting special food parcels, black Volga sedans, presents and special passes for the GUM central department store," the newspaper said Thursday.

The newspaper says and government officials, many of whom are members of the new Congress, President Mikhail S. Gorbachev and other

members of the ruling Politburo are entitled to chauffeured Zil limousines, country houses, access to special food packets, stores, medical care and other services not available to ordinary Soviets. Lesser officials may get smaller cars and somewhat limited special treatment. Many successful candidates for the congress, notably political maverick Boris N. Yeltsin, campaigned against special privileges for top officials.

S. African officer sentenced to death

Baltimore Sun
PRETORIA, South Africa — A Supreme Court judge Thursday sentenced to death a white ex-policeman who smilingly shot to death eight black civilians and wounded several others in random racial shooting spree in and near Pretoria last year.
 Judge Louis Harms said he could find no extenuating circumstances to spare **Barend Hendrik Strydom** from hanging. He said the killer showed "a cold-bloodedness that I have never before encountered or heard of."

Strydom, 23, had laughed at his victims as he stalked the sidewalks of **Howatsean, Pretoria, the South African capital, on the afternoon of November 15.** He killed six blacks — including an 80-year-old woman — and an Indian man and wounded 15 others before a black bystander distracted his attention and managed to disarm him.

Israeli soldiers shoot, kill Palestinian

JERUSALEM (AP) — Soldiers Thursday shot and killed a Palestinian in the occupied Gaza Strip, and Arab reports said 17 other Palestinians were injured in stone-throwing protests in the occupied territories.

The killing raised to 498 the number of Palestinians killed in the anti-Israeli uprising.
 Five soldiers were wounded in the clashes, Israel radio reported.

Also today, a military judge acquitted four soldiers of manslaughter and an army doctor of negligence in the beating death of a Palestinian man last summer. The four soldiers were convicted of a lesser charge of mistreating the detainee.

The focus of today's violence was the **Jabaliya refugee camp, a shantytown housing 33,000 refugees in the north of the Gaza Strip.**

Arab heads continue Lebanon arguing

CASABLANCA, Morocco (AP) — Arab leaders continued arguing heatedly Thursday about Syria, and differences over Syria's military presence there threatened to wreck the summit and further fragment the Arab world.

Iraq is insisting on a total withdrawal of all 50,000 Syrian troops in the war-plagued country. Syria, resisting pressure from its traditional foe, is refusing to pull out even from Beirut, where its soldiers and Christian Lebanese troops battled again Thursday.

Underlining the general frustration, Kuwait resigned Thursday from chairmanship of the league's six-nation committee on Lebanon.

Nakasone denies bribery involvement

TOKYO (AP) — Former Prime Minister Yasuhiro Nakasone denied involvement in the Recruit bribery scandal in long-awaited testimony before Parliament on Thursday, but he admitted he received donations from the company.

"I am totally innocent," Nakasone said under oath before the Budget Committee of the House of Representatives. "I regret such a scandal occurred when I was the head of the government. I deeply apologize for causing distrust in politics."

But Nakasone acknowledged publicly for the first time that since 1982 he received a total of \$322,000 in political donations from Recruit Co., an information and publishing conglomerate.

Bush, Kohl at impasse on eve of summit

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush departs today for a NATO summit clouded by discord over nuclear strategy and concerns that Moscow is driving a wedge in the Western alliance with politically appealing disarmament offers.

On the eve of his departure, Bush received a new message from West German Chancellor **Helmut Kohl**, who is pushing for superpower talks to slash arsenals of short-range nuclear missiles in Europe.

However, presidential spokesman **Marlin Fitzwater** said the two sides were still at an impasse.
 "The consultations are about where they have been," Fitzwater said. "The issue is still an open one ... but it has not been resolved at this point."

He said "time is running out" on chances to resolve the quarrel before the leaders of the 16 NATO countries meet in Brussels on Monday. Playing down the dispute, Fitzwater said, "We don't believe it will overwhelm or dominate the summit and it should not and will not be allowed to."

Bush's trip — his first to Europe as president — will take him to Italy, Belgium, West Germany and England.

The journey is an important step for Bush as he tries to establish himself as a world statesman and attempts to counter the success of Soviet Premier **Mikhail Gorbachev** in projecting himself as a peacemaker with a series of promises to cut military spending, arms and troops.

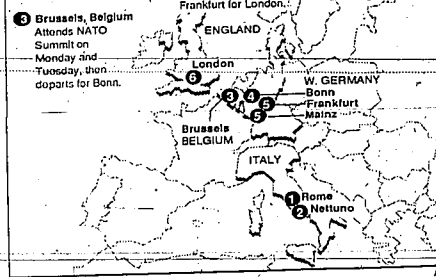
Coming on the heels of Ronald Reagan's series of five summits with Gorbachev and the signing of a major U.S.-Soviet arms agreement, "Bush is between a rock and a hard place," said University of Virginia political scientist **Larry Sabato**.

"The rock is Reagan and the hard place is Gorbachev. Between the two giants he's coming out on the short end," Sabato said.

Norm Ornstein, a political analyst at the American Enterprise Institute, said European leaders all

know Bush and regard him with "a sense of predictability and familiarity."

"At the same time, I don't think there's a sense of awe or a feeling we've got somebody in there who can keep up with Gorbachev," Ornstein said.

He said Bush "needs to show that the leader of the free world is going to be just that."

Before arriving in Brussels, Bush will spend two nights in Rome. He will meet with Italian leaders, have an audience with the Pope John Paul II and deliver an address previewing the NATO summit. The speech site is the American cemetery at Nettuno, the burial site of 7,850 men and 12 women who were killed in World War II.

He will go to Bonn after the summit for a two-day visit and then

stop in London before flying to his vacation home in Kennebunkport, Maine, on June 2.

The NATO summit was intended as an anniversary party toasting the strength of the Western Alliance and celebrating 40 years of peace in Europe.

However, the missile dispute with Bonn has marred the atmosphere. The rift was triggered by Germany's demand for the United States and the Soviet Union to begin negotiations soon to reduce and possibly eliminate nuclear missiles on both sides with a range of up to 300 miles.

Bush has opposed opening talks, saying he would not go along with any steps leading to the elimination of nuclear weapons in Europe. In a gesture of compromise, Bush agreed last week to the principle of

negotiations, but under conditions that would put off any talks for years.

The West German government also is resisting a joint U.S.-British effort to move into triple the range of **Lance** missiles to just below 300 miles. All U.S. and Soviet missiles with ranges between 300 and 3,000 miles were banned under a 1987 treaty.

The U.S.-built **Lances** now can hit targets from about 75 miles. Most of the 88 launchers, carrying about 700 single-warhead missiles, are based in West Germany.

"It's nothing new that a new president faces a test from Moscow," said **Burton Pines**, senior vice president and director of research at the Heritage Foundation. "The first test of Bush is not coming from Moscow. It's Bonn — which is testing the new president."

"It's going to be a crossroads summit," said **William J. Taylor**, vice president for political-military affairs at the Center for Strategic and International Studies.

"Our forecast for at least the last six years has been that by the late 1980s, NATO cohesion would be under serious challenge and there was a reasonable probability of the disintegration of NATO," he said.

Bush rejects that kind of scenario. "I have a feeling that there's been a lot of smoke and that we'll have a good summit," he said recently.

"This alliance is not going to fall apart. It is going to stay together and be strong," Bush said.

"The glue that has kept it together and has overcome all the divisive issues that always plague the alliance — it's always in trouble — the glue has been the threat of the Soviet Union," said a senior administration official, one of the top advisers to Bush.

"Well, you know, maybe that's not true anymore, and there's a growing perception that, hey, there isn't going to be an attack in Europe. So we need to infuse the alliance with some new unifier," added the official, speaking on condition of anonymity.

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
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
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

Ranchers, farmers to be contacted for ag survey

TWIN FALLS - Nearly 3,000 Idaho farmers and ranchers will be part of a national sample of 117,000 producers who will be contacted for the U.S. Department of Agriculture's annual June survey.

The information gathered from this major survey will be used to make state, regional and national estimates of acreage planted to major spring crops and indications of acres for harvest of winter wheat and hay, livestock inventories and other statistics.

"We are asking for cooperation of Idaho farmers and ranchers so we can ensure that our state is fully represented in the national sample," said Don Gerhardt, head of the Idaho Agricultural Statistics Service.

Teen mothers graduate

Girls say others' support helped them finish school

TWIN FALLS - Amid the cries of some of their own children, 12 young women graduated Thursday from the Magic Valley Teen Parent Program, an alternative high school in its second year of operation.

"Thank you for sticking with us throughout all this and for helping us prove that motherhood and education can go hand in hand," said 18-year-old Adella Gilbert Stauffer, one of the grads.

Stauffer's voiced cracked during her short speech, one of many emotional moments during a ceremony most of the girls thought they'd never be involved in.

"I wouldn't have gone back to normal school," Stauffer said after the ceremony. "I was disappointed in myself and in the school system."

The wife and mother said she missed many classes because of the nausea that often accompanies a pregnancy. School officials told her not to come back to school the same week she learned she was pregnant.

Even Twin Falls Assistant Superintendent Keith Tolzin had to pause and pull out his handkerchief during his address when he glanced at his daughter, Tara Tolzin, who was among the graduates.

"I hope that you remember these times," he told the grads after he had collected himself. "And I hope you help others who

Alternate teaching certificates under debate

TWIN FALLS - Educators call alternate teaching certificates "almost a step backwards," but legislators say it's one way to plug private industry's drain on experts, especially in math and science.

Alternate teaching certificates - a proposal that would allow experts in private industry to move to the classroom without fulfilling all the state certification requirements - were the center of debate Wednesday night during a Professional Standard Commissions hearing in Twin Falls.

"I think this is generally a good program that enjoys almost universal acceptance," said Sen. Laird Noh, R-Kimberly.

Noh, who helped initiate the project, said alternate certification is one way to begin filling the nation's critical science and math education needs.

He said too little emphasis is put on a teacher's overall ability and too much on

the method of teaching. A physics teacher, for instance, is required to have only six college credits of physics.

But Karen Freley, a Jerome school counselor who teaches education classes at the College of Southern Idaho, said when teachers fail, it's not because they don't know enough. It's because they can't communicate their knowledge to students, can't make a lesson plan or can't work with people she said.

Scott Jensen was incorporated in early January with Jack Scott and Ronald Jensen as co-owners. Neither Cook nor Herring would specify on the Region IV loan amount. Scott Jensen has also applied for expansion financing from a local bank, Cook said.

The Region IV board also voted to loan money to a longtime Magic Valley business - Winslow's Department Stores, based in Wendell.

Scott Jensen Industries, new to the Magic Valley since March, manufactures ozone generating machines. "The fact that they are here in Twin Falls is exciting," Joe Herring, Region IV executive director, said. "A high-tech company like this could easily be located in the Shiloh Valley."

Herring said ozone gas is one of the best known methods to purify water because it helps to break down viruses, bacteria, fungicides and other organic materials. Ozone is used increasingly in domestic water systems,

sewage treatment plants and cooling towers.

"The potential for a lot of jobs is real with this company," Herring said.

Scott Jensen currently employs seven people, office manager Frank Cook said. But the Region IV loan means the company can grow to 16 to 20 employees by the end of the year. "In three years we are looking at as many as 75 to 100 employees," Cook said.

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The Region IV board also voted to loan money to a longtime Magic Valley business - Winslow's Department Stores. Co-owners Everett and Irma Winslow requested the Region IV loan in order to help them with their expansion plans into the South Burley Shipping Center, Herring said.

Ore-Ida, PGI agree on contract

BURLEY - Potato Growers of Idaho members and Ore-Ida Foods Co. have agreed on a contract that comes within two cents per hundredweight of growers' demands.

The PGI members who grow for Ore-Ida voted 84 percent in favor of a \$4.38 contract offer Wednesday, said John Rooney, PGI executive director.

The growers have been asking for \$4.40 per hundredweight. They rejected a \$4.20 offer from Ore-Ida last week.

"It could be a turning point," Rooney added. "We'll just have to wait and see what happens with the other processors."

PGI, the major bargaining group for Idaho growers, is still talking with Universal Frozen Foods in Twin Falls, and other processors in Eastern Idaho.

The common concern expressed among the growers was that the contract should cover the cost of production, which has risen considerably this year, Rooney said. They also wanted the contract classifications of what constitutes bruised potatoes to be changed.

"Ore-Ida had come quite a ways," Rooney said. "The company made changes in the bruise-free language, but the growers would still like more."

Charges won't be filed over fist fight death

TWIN FALLS - Prosecutors won't file criminal charges over the fist fight death of a Twin Falls man despite pleas from the man's family in a letter to The Times-News.

Prosecutor K. Ellen Baxter announced Thursday that she won't pursue criminal charges over the death of Raymond Vorse. Police found Vorse in his South Park apartment in April.

The death resulted from a fist fight at a beer party with a companion, Rolando Trevino, Baxter said.

After onlookers broke up the fight, Vorse went home with "significant injuries to his face" but refused to seek medical care, Baxter said. He died early the next morning, she said.

Trevino acted in self-defense, Baxter said, and all witnesses agreed the fight involved only fists.

The investigation spurred a call from Jeff Stoker, retained by Sandy Rodriguez of Oroville, Calif., Baxter said in an interview Thursday.

Rodriguez also wrote a letter that was published in The Times-News. "I wonder if there will be a few people that notice their usual garbage man isn't there?" Rodriguez wrote.

Rodriguez suggested police would find the responsible person if they "would pressure"

Fire damages mall theater

TWIN FALLS - A fire in an overheated popcorn warmer damaged Main Avenue's Mall Cinema Thursday and prompted a noon-hour evacuation of every business on the block.

Firefighters arrived at about 12:40 p.m. and quickly extinguished the smoldering fire, which was sending acrid white smoke into the street as dozens of downtown employees and shoppers looked on.

Damage to the 67-year-old building did not appear serious, said owner Larry Roper. Repairs will begin immediately and the theater will reopen as soon as possible, he said.

The popcorn warmer probably had been left on since Wednesday night, said Phil Clough, fire commander. Roper said the warmer should have been turned off about 11 p.m. Wednesday.

Fire damage was limited to the theater lobby, but smoke went throughout the building, said Battalion Chief Jerry Hafer. No one was in the building, he said.

Dave Nelson, owner of Sav-Mor Drug Store across the street, called the fire department after "noticing" smoke coming through the theater's front door.

Police blocked Main Avenue between Second Street West and Shoshone Street and evacuated businesses on the north side of the

Heyburn plans to crack down on residents not paying bills

HEYBURN — The city will get tough with local residents who don't pay their electric bills.

Some bills are up to \$500, City Clerk D. Despain told the council Wednesday. "When bills are that high they usually are never paid. Mayor Harold Hurst said. Residents move away and are not heard from again.

Customers are billed at the beginning of every month and are given 10 days to pay. Delinquent customers are notified by a red tag through their door knob that if they do not pay in 24 hours, their power will be turned off.

But Despain says the city rarely turns off customers because most will come in and pay a little bit on their bill, but not usually enough to cover the current charge. She said those customers are continuing to get further behind every month.

"We have got to start turning off more houses," Hurst said.

Hurst and the council ordered the Electric Department to be more strict in enforcing the turn-off ordinance.

Delinquent bills cost the city more than the amount not paid because of the expense of sending people to hand the tags, Despain told the council.

"We hung 25 tags in the last three days," he said.

Councilman Nile Bohon expressed concern that people who cannot afford to pay a \$100 charge can "no way" pay the \$500 arrears. "We are doing these people a real disservice by letting them get that far behind."

Despain told the council the city can work out a payment schedule for those with real problems.

In other action:

- The council agreed to school Superintendent Al Hodge's plan to increase the safety of streets around the school, a matter of concern to the council for some time. The city will put in curbs and gutters around the school yard to prevent the area from getting muddy and encourage parking in areas not used. N Street will be widened, which will require one resident to move a fence and a tree that are in the roadway. The street will be widened this summer, but the curb and gutter cannot be done until next year because the pavement will need to settle.
- Dale Carlton, Vern Wahlquist and Pat Weimer have agreed to serve on the new city zoning committee, with Beattie Hurless recruited. They will meet with Zoning Administrator Paul Asken and the council to learn the codes and their responsibilities. Then they will probably meet quarterly or when there is a need.
- The council cancelled its June 28 meeting so council members can attend the Association of Idaho Cities convention.
- "First" street's fire district would like to improve its fire rating, hoping to bring it down to 5 from 6. That would mean about 16 percent reduction of fire insurance costs for residents. Hurst will work with Minidoka County Fire Chief Thayne Taylor on a plan that would allow the Fire Department to share some of the shop building used by the fire department to get that rating. Hurst will present that plan to the council when it is prepared.

"You can't assume that everyone with a master's degree will be a master teacher," she said. She said teaching is much more than just talking about something. Fraley, who is often called upon to observe teachers who are on probation, said she would rather see more emphasis on training teachers how to teach.

Dick Chilcote, a Twin Falls junior high teacher and president-elect of the Idaho Education Association, also opposed the proposal.

He said teachers felt the proposal may be an unhealthy shortcut to solving the teacher shortage. And he seconded Fraley's concern over lack of teaching skills of such experts.

"Methodology should not be placed

in the second-plant seat," Chilcote said.

The proposal would allow anyone with a bachelor's degree to earn a teaching certificate after a two-year mentor program that would resemble student-teaching.

The applicant would have to complete nine semester credit hours and a 30-hour district orientation before beginning the mentor program. During the two-year program, the participant would have to complete six to nine semester credit hours at a university or college.

Although Noh approved of the proposal overall, he had a few suggestions for the commission. He said perhaps the commission should only allow the expert to teach in the field of his bachelor's degree.

College wants to raise donations

LEWISTON (AP) — Lewis-Clark State College plans to spend \$56,500 of the \$269,300 in equity-funding it will receive in the coming budget year on an administrator to raise private donations.

Lewis-Clark President Lee Vickers said Wednesday that the new position of director of institutional advancement will more than pay for itself.

If you are going to compete for outside dollars, you need someone with that expertise to get your share of the dollars," Vickers said.

Martin Haley, director of development at a private elementary school near Boston, has been hired for the job. Haley formerly was director of development at New Hampshire College and director of corporate giving at Bentley College in Massachusetts.

Equity funding is additional money awarded to Boise State University and Lewis-Clark to make up for what the state Board of Education determined was past deficiencies in the their base budgets.

Boise State will get \$1.046 million in equity funds in the fiscal year starting July 1.

More than a year ago, Lewis-Clark officials said they planned to hire a director of institutional advancement from money generated by the college rather than from state tax dollars.

Vickers said the college's equity funding also will pay for part-time faculty salaries and sabbaticals, a faculty position in business, an Indian counselor, a position in the school's media center, salary increases for classified staff, library materials and a secretarial position in business.

Pocatello council wants air terminal

POCATELLO (AP) — A plan to buy Pocatello's air terminal by June 1 is being considered by members of the city council, who call it a bargain.

The purchase option has been offered by George Peterson and Dean Nielson, owners of the property who have been charging the city \$24,000 in annual payments since 1972.

The deal calls for the city to pay about \$458,000; \$233,652 for the remainder of the lease payments and \$225,000 to Peterson and Nielson, the contractors who built it.

Buying it may be the only way the city can obtain title to the property without going through a lengthy legal fight. Council President Dave Jones said.

Monthly payments would remain the same.

"Right now, Dean and George are motivated, and want to transfer title to the city for the terminal," Jones said. "Really, the best time to buy is when there is a willing seller and believe me, they're willing."

When the terminal was built, it was described as a lease-purchase agreement under which the city would gain title after 20 years. But the original transaction did not include that provision.

Pocatello moved into the terminal in 1972. Four years earlier, voters had rejected a bond issue to build a terminal to replace a small building in use since the 1940s.

Water supplier may lose business

EAGLE (AP) — State utility regulators have ordered owners of Eagle's largest water supplier to file several key documents or face the loss of their business.

The Idaho Public Utilities Commission wants Eagle Water Co., which serves the town, to complete a paperwork by July 28 on reinstatement of the company's charter, demonstration of financial ability to provide service, and case-ments for all physical plants.

"This is all being taken care of," stockholder Robert DeShazo said. Service complaints, and the company's lack of compliance with certain state requirements, led the PUC to investigate Eagle Water, PUC spokesman Gary Richardson said Wednesday.

"It is only natural that the investigation is a concern to us, but it doesn't come as a surprise," Eagle Mayor Steve Guerber said.

Concerns for the company's financial status and efficiency arose two years ago, Guerber said, and the city offered more than \$120,000 to purchase it. The company's stockholders rejected the offer.

Guerber said there have been complaints from customers that rates were going up and water pressure going down. "Maybe we dropped the issue too soon."

In addition, the Idaho Industrial Commission filed suit against the company March 7 for failure to pay workers' compensation insurance since March 1, 1986. The penalties total \$16,138.

Bogus Basin raises lift ticket prices

BOISE (AP) — Despite a strong 1988-89 season, Bogus Basin Ski Area has announced it will raise lift ticket prices for next winter by \$1 and season passes by \$15.

Only pre-school rates will be unchanged.

General Manager Terry Lofsvold blamed the hike on rising costs of labor, services, equipment, parts and supplies.

Operating expenses for the Bogus Basin Recreational Association next season are expected to exceed \$2.5 million, up 5.2 percent from last season, he said Wednesday.

"The rate increase will allow the association to operate the facility in the black and continue making incremental improvements over the years," Lofsvold says.

Bogus Basin was able to open two weeks earlier than normal last winter and had good snow most of the year. The non-profit ski area sold \$2.6 million worth of lift tickets and season passes last year, well above the \$1.76 million revenue earned the previous winter when Idaho was in the midst of a drought.

"We had a heck of a good snow year and great support from our skiers, and the earlier-than-normal opening encouraged the purchase of season passes," Lofsvold said. The resort north of Boise offered 141 days of skiing last season.

Former Hanford employee says safety problems still exist at plant

SEATTLE (AP) — A former Hanford worker who wrote critical reports about operation of the nuclear reservation says that safety problems still exist there.

But the U.S. Energy Department rejects the arguments put forth by Casey Raud, who said he wants to continue digging into problems at Hanford and other defense installations.

"I'll be back," Raud told a University of Washington seminar audience in Seattle Tuesday.

Raud, 33, was laid off in February 1988 after issuing reports about safety problems at the Plutonium Finishing Plant and the Plutonium-Uranium Extraction Plant on the reservation.

He said at the time he was harassed by his employer—Wasting House Hanford Co., because of his reports. The company denied it, but later reached a monetary settlement with Raud over his layoff, for an undisclosed sum.

Raud told the UW audience that some Hanford buildings, such as the Plutonium Finishing Plant, are built to withstand earthquakes of the magnitude known to have occurred in the Tri-Cities area.

Seismic studies were done before Raud hired on as a Hanford auditor and authorities have known for years that an earthquake could occur on the 570-square-mile reservation, he said.

If severe enough, he said, a quake could crack containers of plutonium and the roofs of wooden buildings and "there could be tremendous doses of radiation released" from buildings such as the Plutonium Finishing Plant because plutonium is stored there.

Contacted later, Hanford manager Mike Lawrence said Raud was wrong about the earthquake hazards.

Legislator says rationing of medical services may occur

POCATELLO (AP) — Rationing of medical services that may leave the elderly or terminally ill infants without care may become reality in Idaho within five years, a participant in a medical ethics discussion said.

"That dire possibility was raised by a panel gathered at Idaho State University Wednesday to discuss the role of community-based medical ethics committees.

The seminar culminated a series of nine community-based medical ethics workshops held in rural towns over the past year.

Rationing of medical services will probably occur within four to five years, said Maribeth Alder, assistant administrator at Pocatello Regional Medical Center. Certain guidelines will be set up, possibly looking at age, severity of an illness and future productivity, she said.

To a degree, rationing of medical services already takes place in that those who have money will receive service and those who have none go without, she said.

Dancers celebrate National Tap Day

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — A chorus line of shuffle-stopping tap dancers hoofed it across the Golden Gate Bridge on Thursday, celebrating National Tap Dance Day on the birthday of legendary tapper Bill "Bojangles" Robinson.

The wind and salty air threatened to blow off their hats as about 30 dancers shim-sham-shimmied across the span dodging befuddled joggers and bicyclists.

"I don't care if I'm overweight and pushing 40, I feel like a star," said tap dancer Debby Keleher, thrusting her arms out like Ethel Merman.

The BART escalator mechanic, who practices on broken subway escalators in her cowgirl costume, passed a gold-sequined "urch of tap" during the single-file relay watched by wide-eyed drivers.

Against a backdrop of San Francisco skyscrapers and a vast expanse of water below, the tappers made their way from Marin to the San Francisco side where they received a City Hall proclamation.

In Washington, Rep. John Conyers, D-Mich., got a resolution approved by the House declaring Thursday National Tap Dance Day.

Conyers, who admitted being a frustrated tap dancer soon to begin lessons, was playing host to celebrants in the nation's capital by the Tap America Project.

"Tap dancing is widely recognized as America's only original form of dance, yet for years it has been in danger of becoming a lost art," Conyers, said in a telephone interview.

He said Bojangles' former-dance partner, 65-year-old Lloyd Shroy, tried to tap on the House floor but was barred by the parliamentarian, who said it violated rules against demonstrations.

On the bridge, English tourist Joan Burke let out a whoop when the dancers assembled.

"Oh great. We saw '42nd Street,' the musical in London. Yes, it's super. This is a bonus," Burke said as her husband, Paul, snapped pictures of dancers from the group Rosie Radiator and the San Francisco Super-tappers.

The troupe, led by Rosie in her red flared skirt, white tuxedo vest, and sailor hat, is listed in the Guinness Book of World Records for longest tap dance for its 7.3-mile performance in 1987.

Seven tap dancers' with sandwich boards were barred from crossing the span by officials who feared written words would distract commuters on the six-lane bridge.

But everything was copacetic, as Bojangles used to say, for an "aerobitapper" with metal taps on her running shoes, and a tapping clown, who stomped their way across.

Tap, a rhythmic art that blends African dance with the Irish jig and lively English clog, originated among black dancers performing on street corners and in saloons.

Unlike ballet dancers, tap dancers hold their body limp like a rag doll and use the natural movements to belt out rhythms with their feet.

Tap greets such as Bill "Bojangles" Robinson, who died in 1949, and Howard "Sandman" Sims popularized the dance in musical extravaganzas of the 1930s and 40s.

"There is a happiness there when I tap dance," said hooper Marilyn Winston. "There are very few ways that comes out of my body. It's a natural happiness that comes out of me. I have to tap to live."

Brothel owner buys paper

BATTLE MOUNTAIN, Nev. (AP) — The weekly Battle Mountain Bugle is being sold this week to brothel owner Chuck Barrett, editor and co-owner Linda Robertson said Thursday.

Mrs. Robertson, who with her husband, David, ran the paper for the past four years, said Barrett had offered to buy the Bugle after it was offered for sale nearly a year ago. Other offers were made but weren't pursued.

The fact that he owns a brothel disturbs us somewhat, because we aren't in favor of brothels," Mrs. Robertson said. "But nobody else wanted to buy it. I haven't been in the best of health, and we wanted to bail out."

The cost of the paper, with a circulation of about 1,850, wasn't disclosed.

Barrett plans to hire Jerry Teague as editor. Teague, formerly ran the Humboldt Sun and "he's the same person I would have hired," Mrs. Robertson said.

Barrett owns several businesses in this northern Nevada town, including the Calico Club and Desert Club brothels, a bookstore and dress shop, and T-shirt print shop.

Brothels are legal in Nevada, under county option. The state's largest counties, Clark and Washoe, ban brothels, but many of the outlying counties permit them. Las Vegas is in Clark County and Reno is in Washoe.

Mechanical failure caused blast

MAGNA, Utah (AP) — A March 29 explosion that heavily damaged a \$15-million propellant-mixing building at Hercules' Bacchus Works probably was caused by a mechanical failure, the aerospace company says.

Bacchus General Manager Ruth L. Novak said an extensive, seven-week investigation provided no conclusive data because of the extensive damage the explosion caused.

However, the investigation team says evidence points to suspected mechanical problems involving failure of an infrared sensor. The sensor possibly broke and fell into the bowl during mixing, sparking a fire when it came in contact with the mixer blades.

To prevent a future incident, infrared detectors will be redesigned, Novak said. As an extra precaution, more extensive load-testing of mixer equipment will be conducted.

Jurors upset over school's actions

BOISE (AP) — Jurors who rejected claims in a civil suit that Boise High School teacher John Keith Carlton sexually abused a 16-year-old female student are not ending their involvement in the case.

Several will meet Friday with Boise school officials to demand an explanation of the district's handling of child sexual abuse allegations, said former juror Pam Clokey of Boise.

While Carlton was cleared of sexual abuse and negligence charges Tuesday, the district's alleged negligence was never considered. Several jurors said afterward that they were frustrated by a verdict form developed by the judge and lawyers that treated the district and Carlton as one defendant, rather than separately.

Since the jury found in favor of Carlton, 4th District Judge Robert Newhouse ruled there was no need for it to decide whether school administrators acted reasonably by not reporting the girl's allegations. "It doesn't strike me as fair," said Mrs. Clokey, one of three jurors who sided against Carlton. "It should have been two separate verdicts."

Investigation rules out wrongdoing

BOISE (AP) — Separate investigations have ruled out criminal wrongdoing as a cause of dissent this spring among students and faculty at Boise State University's Vocational-Technical School.

Legislative auditors and an independent panel of 10 looked into accusations of criminal misuse of funds, but concluded Wednesday that the problem actually was a lack of communication.

In March, 56 electronics students signed a petition calling for a legislative audit, citing possible criminal actions by the vo-tech school's administration.

Executive Vice President Larry Selland said instructor Doug Carlton and students would not accept administrators' answers to allegations raised by the petition, so "we went to an outside independent group, because of the level of mistrust."

The panel also investigated problems stemming from an off-campus program offered at Hewlett-Packard Co. in January.

Rubella continues to spread

LEWISTON (AP) — Thirty-four cases of rubella, also known as German measles, have been reported in Idaho since the disease was first confirmed in two University of Idaho students May 12.

Three cases were confirmed through laboratory tests, but not all cases have been tested, said Barbara Kirschner, an epidemiologist with the North Central District Health Department in Lewiston.

Rubella, also known as German measles or three-day measles, can cause severe birth defects if contracted during pregnancy.

Pregnant women who are not immunized and may come into contact with the disease have been asked by the health department to take special precautions. It normally is a mild illness characterized by a fever, rash, runny nose, cough and swollen lymph nodes.

Management didn't lead to bad water quality

BOISE (AP) — Idaho streams have moderate to high levels of fishery-killing sedimentation, but not because the best management practice regulations to protect water quality have been ineffective, a team of water quality and land management experts say.

An audit of 40 public and private logging operations adjacent to 44 streams in northern and central Idaho found general compliance with the best management practices, that are the cornerstone of the state's new water quality preservation program.

The Forest Practices Water Quality Audit found unacceptable compliance on 15 of the 40 operations checked, seven of them on nonindustrial private forests where the team determined there has been inadequate professional forestry involvement.

Of the 1,300 regulatory instances involved in all 40 projects, the audit found non-compliance in just 86 cases.

"When the rules were followed, the audit team judged the rules to be effective 99 percent of the time," the report said.

But at the same time, 35 of the 44 streams surveyed showed unacceptable levels of sedimentation, and it was "traced to causes which included roading and harvest projects conducted prior to the Forest Practices Act (of 1974), grazing and recreational vehicular traffic."

"The major factor was attributed to past road construction practices," the report said. "Many of the roads identified as currently causing stream sedimentation are still in use."

Andrus aide gets pledge of no more nuclear waste

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) — Federal officials are continuing to assure the state there will be no attempt to continue shipments of low-level nuclear-waste for temporary storage in Idaho beyond Gov. Cecil Andrus' Sept. 1 deadline for ending them.

"The Department of Energy again reiterated the same thing today," Andrus aide Marc Johnson said Thursday after another of the monthly meetings between DOE officials and representatives of the governors of Idaho, New Mexico and Colorado.

The meeting in Albuquerque was the first since Energy Secretary James Watkins told a congressional committee last week that he did not expect the Waste Isolation Pilot Plant in New Mexico to meet its September opening target.

The facility would be the nation's first permanent dump for the kind of low-level transuranic waste now being shipped from the Rocky Flats weapons plant in Colorado for temporary storage at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

Number of destructive fires, resulting deaths rises in 1988

BOISE (AP) — The number of destructive fires and their resulting death, injury and economic loss rose significantly in Idaho last year, and state Fire Marshal Leo Bright is calling for heightened public concern over the threat of fire to property and human life.

"Appallingly, the richest and most ecologically advanced nation in the world leads all the major industrialized countries in per capita deaths

and property loss from fire," Bright said in issuing the agency's annual report.

"We must overcome the indifference, which contributes substantially to the magnitude of the fire program in Idaho," he said.

According to the report, 2,058 fires in 1988 caused nearly \$19 million in losses, claiming the lives of 12 persons including a firefighter and injuring 92 more.

Market mixed amid new report

The New York Stock market stalled Thursday in a mixed response to the newest data on the state of the economy.

Tight inventories are more often than not a forerunner of strong economic activity, since they create a situation where new orders translate quickly into a need for production.

Among actively traded blue chips, Philip Morris rose 2 1/2% to 140 1/2; Eastman Kodak gained 1/4 to 44 1/4; General Electric dropped 7/8 to 52 1/4; and American Telephone & Telegraph was down 1/4 to 35 1/4.

Takeover rumors and speculation sparked active trading in such issues as MCI, up 2 1/4 to 23 1/4; and Stryker, up 1 1/4 to 47 1/4.

Del Webb Corp. rose 3/4 to 13 1/4 on word-of-mouth speculation of a planned offering of \$50 million in convertible debentures.

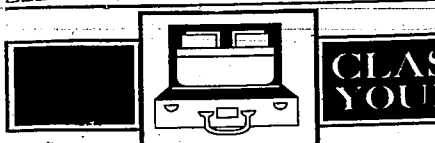

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THE ACES ON BRIDGE

BOBBY WOLFF

Simplicity is the most deceitful mistress that ever betrayed man.

Today's declarer reduced his problems to the simplest terms: "As long as trumps are 3-2, I'll make the game if the heart king is inside."

South won his diamond ace and played the ace and a second trump. East drew a third trump and led his last diamond for South to ruff.

South committed several blunders in his play. Very important was his mismanagement of the trump suit.

As a general rule, it is not a good idea to allow a defender to draw two of declarer's trumps at a cost of one trump for the defense.

In today's hand, leaving a master trump at large was a key element for winning the diamond ace.

South should duck a trump to East's jack. East returns a diamond, which South ruffs. (If East continues trumps, South can reach the same position.)

SOUTH: 8 7 6 5, 7 4 2, A, K Q 10 9.

Vulnerable: North-South. Dealer: West. The bidding: West North East South.

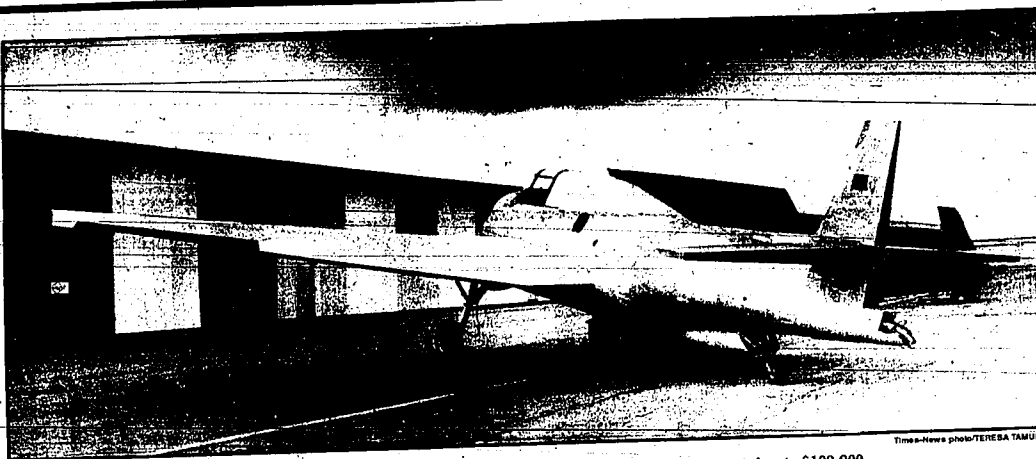

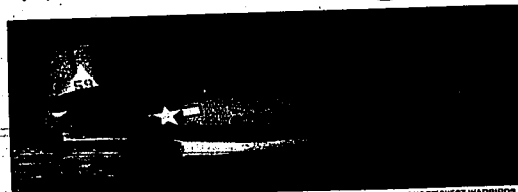

TWIN FALLS — It sits, silent and still, silver against the growing clouds cluttering the sky south of Twin Falls.

The World War II mouluk is out of place at the airport of a farming community of about 26,000 residents, enduring an alternate days rain, and then a glaring sun glinting off its wings and cockpit glass.

It deserves its rest. But somehow this TBM Avenger, a torpedo dive bomber that was used mostly in the Pacific theatre, didn't deserve to spend its latter years dive bombing farm fields with chemicals.

In 1942, when the gleaming addition to the U.S. Navy was added to its aircraft carrier task forces, the Avenger was hailed as the dive bomber that could plug some critical holes in the war.

There were about 3,000 of them made by Grumman and General Motors, which had shelved its auto operations to jump into the war effort.

There are 30 to 40 left in North America, says Rob Werner, mechanic for Northwest Warbirds, the Twin Falls based company that restores TBM Avengers.

He is also the local Avenger expert. Twenty of the Avengers are still used in fires by the forestry service to air-bomb Canada. Two still are flying in the U.S. as agricultural sprayers. Others are in museums. Some are in parts and pieces.

ing-rebuilding-for Warbirds owner Gary Wolverton.

The Twin Falls Avenger, which counted 1,500 hours of flying time during the war, some undoubtedly from an aircraft carrier, will fly again in about two months, vows Werner.

A second Avenger sits idly by, also waiting.

The Avenger, says Werner, "had a lot of jobs." But it was most often used as part of a hunter-killer team of Avengers to torpedo ships and submarines.

Ceremonies will begin at 1 p.m. with McClure and Stallings as speakers. The Bureau of Land Management will transfer jurisdiction of the fossil beds to the National Parks Service, officially designating the site of the Hagerman Fossil Beds National Monument. Several federal and state dignitaries will also speak during the program.

Other events of the all-day celebration include an open house at the Hagerman Valley Historical Society Museum and live music in the park.

'Hee Haw's' Hager Brothers visit Jerome during Northwest tour

JEROME — Jon falls in love fast. Jim takes more time to get serious.

Jon likes to fly and has taken pilot lessons. Jim would rather ride a horse and do ranch work like roping and branding calves.

And the brothers part their hair on opposite sides.

"We're mirror twins," said Jim Hager during a stop in Twin Falls last week. "Jon being a left-hander, uses the right side of his brain and I'm right handed, so I use the left side, and the combination of both of us is one

good brain workin'." The twins, famous as entertainers on television "Hee Haw," have been performing together for 25 years. At age three, they were adopted by a Methodist minister and reared in northern Illinois. As adults, they attended college together and joined the Army, performing in USO tours as well as on European

radio and television. They later worked as regular performers at Disneyland in California.

The Hagers next joined Buck Owens on tours and were invited to join the cast of "Hee Haw" when it began.

Now, 13 shows are taped in June and another 13 are taped six months later. With re-

runs, "Hee Haw" airs on syndicated stations every week while its cast members have 10 months to go their separate ways.

The taping sessions are busy, said Jim, but the performers also have plenty of fun entertaining each other. He told about one time when Archie Campbell — in overalls — was sitting on a hay bale waiting between scenes. The Hager brothers quietly lit the bale on fire behind Campbell.

"By the time the heat sinks in and gets to his skin, we're long gone," Jim recalled, laughing. "He flipped over backwards, and his tongue came out."

Jim said one of his favorite on-camera

jokes was doing an impression of Twin Falls. Filmed from the waist up, the brothers fall over and drop out of the picture.

"We're the only ones that can do that joke," Jim said.

This month, the twins are touring the Northwest with stops in Pocatello, Seattle, Portland and other cities. They will be in Jerome on Tuesday. During their shows, the Hagers invite audience members to sing "The Hee Haw love song" and see who can do the best tongue splatter at the end.

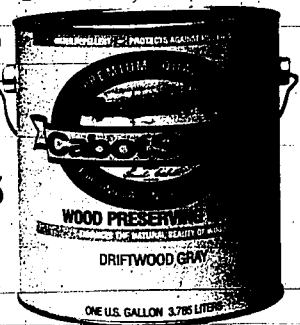

 "They would be way up high, flying in front of the ship," says Werner, using his hands to show the plane's flight. "Then it would dive straight down, level out and let go of its 1,200-pound torpedo."
 His hand dives towards the floor, levels out and all but drops a torpedo.
 The toughest dive bomber of its day, also the largest and first equipped with hydraulics to raise and lower the wings for aircraft carrier storage, the Avenger cost between \$10,000 and \$21,000.
 By contrast, today's USAF's F-16 costs about \$16 million.
 Here are some other differences between the Avenger and the F-16.
 The Avenger was classified as a bomber, torpedo dive bomber.
 The F-16 is classified as a fighter/attack aircraft.
 The Avenger had a pilot, turret gunner, belly gunner and bombardier.
 The F-16 is flown by a single pilot.
 The Avenger's top speed was 362 miles per hour.
 The F-16's top speed is above

Mach 2, twice the speed of sound, about 1,500 miles per hour.

The Avenger had .50 caliber cannons in the turret, mounted for rear protection, two .30 caliber cannons in the wings, could carry 127,000-pound bombs, or four 500-pound bombs, or one 1,000-pound bomb, or one 1,600-pound bomb, or one 1,200-pound torpedo.

The F-16 has M-61A1 20 millimeter cannons and can carry six AIM-9 infrared missiles, electronic measure pods, and 500 and 2,000 pound bombs.

The Avenger was built by Grumman and General Motors.

The F-16 is built by General Dynamics Corp.

The Avenger is driven by a Wright Cyclone 14 Aireraft Engine, a 14 cylinder two-row radial air cooled propeller with a supercharger.

The F-16 is driven by a Pratt and Whitney F-100 PW-200 turbocharged engine with afterburner producing 24,000 pounds of thrust.

For Werner and Vaughn Kilborn, the history behind the Avenger is "the main part of it."

There are the ghosts of turret gunners, pilots, bombardiers.

There are stories—behind—every plane.

Werner says he is prone to day-dreaming about the war and the role of the Avenger.

"I daydream what it was like during the war," he says, "with Messerschmitts coming at you."

"When we're flying in formation (with other Avengers) in a airshow, I swing the turret around and I shoot them down," Werner says.

"It's a good feeling to rebuild a part of history," he says. "What's good is going to an airshow and some of the older guys come up and say, 'I use to fly in that airplane.' I like that a lot."

By the way, there is one final difference between the Avenger and the F-16.

President Bush was shot down in World War II in an Avenger.

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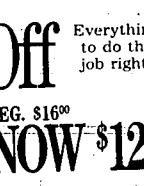
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Commemorating the mad magus: Friends remember Edward Abbey

EDITORS NOTE: Times-News correspondent Penelope Reedy attended the memorial for Western writer Edward Abbey, who is a personal friend of hers. This is her account of the memorial.

"...human society is like a stew—if you don't keep it stirred up you get a lot of scum on top."
—Edward Abbey, from "The Journey Home"

6:30 a.m., Saturday, May 21, 1989, Moab, Utah. The sun is still piercing us at its sharpest angle. The sky is black. The rock glows red as a luke-warm fire. The air is cool. I don my shawl and begin the trek up the "old" road, about a mile, where a sand system—powered by a car battery—has been set up at the base of a huge, smoothly sloping sandstone rock. The rock supports the 600 or so participants easily with plenty of elbow room. The graceful curves of Arches National Monument are at our backs.

Ed Abbey's friend, Ken Sleight, begins the memorial, setting a somber, personal tone for the gathering with memories of river trips, battered canoes and campfire conversation. Emotion makes it difficult for him to speak. There is music: Mozart. Amazing Graces. Old friends and "big wigs" take choreographed turns at the microphone. Wendell Berry, essayist and poet, has flown in from Kentucky to read his address. It's rippled with the sharpest imagery of the day, a Kantianerous manifesto that makes us laugh. He and Abbey had exchanged books and letters over the years, always intending to meet some day. Nature writer Arden Zoviger recounts her meeting with the Abbey on a river trip and remarked that like President Kennedy, Martin Luther King, and the bombing of Pearl Harbor, none of us would for-

get what it was we were doing when we heard the news that Ed had died. Poet Terry Tempest Williams distributed generic post cards so members of the "clan" might keep in touch. Naturalist Barry Lopez touched that Ed might be among the winds at his remark, a sudden gust of wind blew his speech papers from the podium, sending an acquiescent murmur through the crowd.

The evening before, as the moon rose whole and the sun set over the bony fingers of the Devil's Garden, it was whispered that this event might become a "Stieckstock." No one was quite sure what to expect. Any finger leafed thing could happen. Desert through satiated copies of "Desert Solitaire" and "The Journey Home," as the sky darkened.

A banjo was released from its case, a few beers drunk, the empty cans carefully banished to a garbage sack hung from a convenient snag. Abbey's mandate of "I recalled that he did apologize to me...in print, a truly rare occasion."

But under this morning's sun, the crowd which has gathered is a peaceful one. Their guru has taught them well the secrets of appropriate action. After the speeches, they disperse quietly in small groups to explore the rocks and to greet each other as the beat of conga drums echoes from the layered canyon walls. Several hikers remark that the yellow prickly pear has bloomed; an omen?

Later that night, at Pack Creek Ranch, the "lesser bigwigs" among the crowd had a chance to say their pieces. As I listened to an American Indian, to the editor of Western Touching, to the editor of Western American Literature magazine, Tom Lyon, deliver a telephone message from poet Gary Snyder, to Abbey scholar Ann Ronald read from her farewell to Ed set in Death Valley to a modern dance performer and read her poetry to the affectionate words of this struck floating over the crowd, I was adreück by the diversity

of the lives Abbey touched as author, friend and antagonist.

While mingling under the full moon, I came across Jim Hepworth, editor of Conference Press, Lewisville, Idaho. Gibbs Smith of Penguin-Smith Publishers, Layton, Utah, in shortly thereafter settled in New York, where, after 24 years, he will soon become an American citizen. Crossing time lines and language barriers, adapting to societies separated by thousands of miles and hundreds of years of history, Downey's art matured and expanded continuously, whether by exposure to Diego Velasquez's classical 16th-century paintings or to Andy Warhol's conceptual Coca-Cola bottles.

"The culture shock became an aesthetic spark," said the 48-year-old conceptual artist by phone from his New York studio recently. Yet, uniting the multiple facets of his background has proven impossible. In addition to the cultural chasm between his birthplace and his inherited homeland, there is the Irish heritage that gave the artist his surname, and French, Spanish and English ancestry too.

Ed was a man with a mission, consistently working to conjure up the truth; he was the mad magus dazzling us with plain language, forcing us to examine the motives of our habitual and often puppet-like actions. Juan Downey's art reveals influences of many cultures

Artist Juan Downey knows about culture shock. Born in Santiago, Chile, he left home at 21 for Barcelona, Spain. Uprooting again, he went to Paris a year later, then shortly thereafter settled in New York, where, after 24 years, he will soon become an American citizen.

Crossing time lines and language barriers, adapting to societies separated by thousands of miles and hundreds of years of history, Downey's art matured and expanded continuously, whether by exposure to Diego Velasquez's classical 16th-century paintings or to Andy Warhol's conceptual Coca-Cola bottles.

"The culture shock became an aesthetic spark," said the 48-year-old conceptual artist by phone from his New York studio recently.

Yet, uniting the multiple facets of his background has proven impossible. In addition to the cultural chasm between his birthplace and his inherited homeland, there is the Irish heritage that gave the artist his surname, and French, Spanish and English ancestry too.

After studying architecture (his father's profession) and print-making in Santiago, Downey focused on painting, drawing and prints when he arrived in Paris in 1962. Intrigued by movement and energy, he created:

Tragedy common in Wynette's life, songs

NEW YORK — Tammy Wynette's life has had as many turmoils as a country music song lyric. She had five marriages; her daughter, Tina, had meningitis as an infant—she had medical and painter-dependency problems; her house burned; 256 hours of tapes for her autobiography burned in another fire; and she filed for bankruptcy last fall.

A settlement was made in March, the settlement is withdrawn and she's able now to explain about protecting herself with chapter 11.

But Wynette isn't trying to change her image as the country queen of hurt and lonely. "It's often said I spoke for the wronged woman," she says.

Her current single, "Thank the Cowboy for the Ride," is cheerful. She has been happily married, since 1978, to George Richey, who manages her career. They met 22 years ago, when he was writing songs for her with record producer Billy Sherrill, who gave her the stage name Tammy-10.

She was born Virginia Wynette Pugh. "I think that's one reason our marriage has been good and lasted," Wynette says. "We were buddies first. We worked well together. We could talk."

"When Richey and I got married, Billy Sherrill said, 'There will be no more sad songs written.' He was right."

But she can still sing sad songs. "I remember how I felt when I wrote the song or what was happening in my life when I first heard it and recorded it. I couldn't get the feeling across to them (the audience) if I didn't go back and put myself in that position."

She and Richey wrote only one song on her new album. "When a Girl Becomes a Wife" for her youngest daughter, Georgette, who was married in March in Red Bay, Ala. Her older daughters are, Gwen, Jackie and Tina, who was married last

year. Wynette's new album, "Next to You," her first for CBS, does contain some heartbroken and wronged-woman songs, such as "You Left Memories Layin' (All Over the Place)" and "Liar's Roses."

"A sad song makes you reflect back on something in your life that has happened. You can feel part of that song," she said.

She was interviewed while in New York for her first appearance at the Bottom Line. Wynette is on a national tour these days. She tours 11 months a year in the United States and Europe, and takes off three weeks in December. "I've got a beautiful house in Nashville and I live on a bus."

The blond singer seems to glow with health. "It feels good to feel good," she said. "I haven't had any problems since surgery 2 1/2 years ago. I had one operation and formed adhesions, which caused the rest of the operations. I'm one of those people who fear scar tissue."

About filing for Chapter 11 bankruptcy, protection against credit-

ors, Wynette said she and her husband had money in the development of two Florida shopping centers. The first sold and all went well. When the second sold, she said, the money was dispersed to the other partners and her bank credit wasn't paid off.

"They were going to take everything we had and we didn't owe the money," she said.

"I think they thought we wouldn't want my name dragged through fighting that. Whether they dragged my name through or not, we had to do it. They wanted \$1.5 million. If you don't owe it, why pay it? We'd worked so hard to have what we had to let somebody take it. We made a settlement of \$460,000 in November and didn't get the paperwork done until March 9. We paid them and they're out of our life now."

Richey said three bankers were indicted in the case.

"We couldn't explain this while we were in litigation," Wynette said. "I had to just say, 'Yes, I'd filed for bankruptcy. It was horrible to have to go through it.'"

With the usual Memorial Day launching of Hollywood's parade of blockbuster summer movies, it is only appropriate that a string of interesting film footnotes show what is hot this weekend on television.

BEHIND THE SCENES — Thursday night's edition of CBS' "48 Hours" takes viewers onto the set of "Glory," a film in the making about black soldiers during the Civil War that stars Matthew Broderick and Morgan Freeman. Among the topics is the difficulty that black stunt men have finding work. And carrying the theme of discrimination in the industry further, CBS' "West 57th" news magazine Saturday is slated to include a story about racism in film and television.

ON THE MARQUEE — A trio of films screening on the tube mark distinct genres of filmdom. Friday on ABC, for example, the late Bruce Lee, king of the karate film, stars in "Enter the Dragon," a 1972 non-stop action adventure that is thought by many to be the best martial arts film ever made. Saturday on the cable Showtime network, the genre is John Waters (whose movies are hard to categorize any other way), with the cable debut of his "Hairspray." 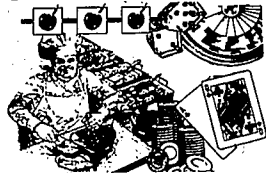

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Tried-and-true dominates Affiliates understanding of NBC excesses TV shows for next year

NEW YORK (AP) — Yes, those creative geniuses who come up with network television shows have been working overtime to create fascinating new concepts that will cause you, the loyal network television viewer, to ignore cable movies, sports channels and videocassette rentals and never get out of bed, if necessary, in order to watch the local network affiliate of your choice.

Only kidding. Despite proof that their audiences are tuning out, the networks apparently feel compelled for 1989-90 to cling to tired premises and spinoffs.

They apparently hope that will satisfy the critics, viewers, who seem to be on the screen for reasons that beg for endless research and discussion, seem to completely evade network executives still baffled that "Lonesome Dove" won its time period against "The Sex Tapes."

Oh, but how can you say that? Just look at this innovation on tap for next season.

ABC has "Free Spirit," a show about a housekeeper who's a witch. Now, that's quality entertainment! When's the last time you saw a television show about a witch? Well, 1972. "Bewitched." Of course, that was a good 17 years ago, and 17 years is a long time to go without a show about a witch.

CBS has "Wolf." This is a show about a cop who was framed and forced off the force and now works as a private investigator and hopes to clear his name. Hmm, sounds suspiciously like "Private Eye" on NBC two years ago.

Then NBC has "Sister Kate." This is a show about a nun. Yeah, yeah, "The Flying Nun," 1970. But this is different. This a nun with an attitude. Sally Field was a cute nun. Very different show.

Then there's "Nutt House" on NBC, a wacky Mel Brooks comedy about a bunch of madcaps who run a hotel. Sounds a little like "Fawlty Towers"? Who cares? Nobody watches British TV over here.

Well, CBS has "Rescue: 911," where you get to see real-life rescues, so unlike the real-life arrests on "COPS," or re-creations of real-life crimes on "Unsolved Mysteries" and "America's Most Wanted." These are rescues, see?

ABC's "Homeroom" is about an in-

ter-city teacher who uses humor to get through to his students. "Welcome Back, Kotter"? No way.

Teacher's name is Harper.

NBC's "Baywatch" is a really unique show about lifeguards. Oops, even NBC is pushing this show as a re-orientation of "CHiPs." Never mind.

NBC also has "Hardball," about two cops who are mismatched partners but eventually form a bond. It goes into the old "Miami Vice" time period. No, no, no, this is not a white cop-black cop deal. This is old cop-young cop.

Marce Carsey and Tom Werner are putting yet another standup comic in a prime-time sitcom. This time it's Jackie Mason in ABC's "From This Moment On." Well, it is hard to argue with success. Carsey's other comic —

Bill Cosby and Rosanne Barr. So it's back to twice.

Then there's ABC's "Living Dolls," a spinoff of "Who's the Boss?" And ABC's "Family Matters," a spinoff of "Perfect Strangers," and NBC's "Manacus, FBI," a spinoff of the miniseries "Favorite Son."

As usual, like grass sprouts working their way up through the concrete, there are a few unusual-sounding shows on the schedule:

"Life Goes On" is about a family with an 18-year-old Down's syndrome son and stars an actor who has Down's syndrome. It's on ABC, which put on the unique "thirtysomething" last season.

Hugh Wilson, who created the wonderful "Frank's Place" — canceled, of course; by CBS — has a new CBS comedy, "The Famous Teddy Z," about a hot-shot young Hollywood agent.

"Frank's Place" stars Tim and Daphne Reid also found a place in the new CBS schedule in "Snoops," an hour comedy-mystery that draws intelligent inspiration from Nick and Nora Charles.¹⁴

Steven Bochco ("L.A. Law," "Hoopman") has a show for ABC, "15-year-old medical intern," "Doogie Howser, M.D." It sounds ridiculous, but you can't say it's been done before.

SAN FRANCISCO — After a TV season whose prime-time fare included a Gerald Rivera special on Satanism, a made-for-TV movie provocatively titled "The Sex Tapes," the lurid miniseries "Favorite Son," and the oversexed nursing series "Nightingales," NBC and the president of its entertainment division, Brandon Tartikoff, have felt heat from the press, the viewers and the advertisers about the tarnishing of the No. 1 network's image.

But representatives of NBC's affiliated stations, who wound up their annual convention here Tuesday, seemed unfazed by the recent NBC-trashing and Brandon-bashing, preferring to accept apologies from network executives and their assurance that such a season would not happen again.

"If you're going to experiment and take some chances, you're going to get a few Geraldos," Rennie Corley, general manager of WXII-TV in Winston-Salem, N.C., said with a shrug. "And that's OK."

Echoed Jerry Eaton, program manager for KYW-TV in Philadelphia: "I certainly endorse the concept of taking chances, pushing the envelope. I don't necessarily approve of how that manifested itself last season, but not to try is to die."

"It's a big issue," conceded George Moyinhan, vice president of Group W Stations. "And there were a few cases where they went too far. But I think they (NBC) are truly sensitive to that."

In closed sessions with the affiliates, Tartikoff blamed last season's errors on the Writers Guild of America strike, which delayed scripts and prevented the network from having time to adequately police their content. Tartikoff also cited pressure on Hollywood producers to compete with cable as a reason for more lax standards on profanity, sex and violence. The executive pledged to beef up NBC's program standards department to the standard of a wartime army, rather than a peacetime army.

The affiliates seemed eager to accept the network's apologies. One station representative summed up NBC's last season philosophically: "They took a run at something, and it blew up in their face."

Even Corley, a voice from the heart of the hearland with his North Carolina station, said he prefers to encourage his viewers to practice their own censorship by turning off the set when they find programming they don't like, rather than threatening advertiser boycotts and attacking the network over unsuitable programming.

"I think that's ridiculous — why should I have to have someone like the Rev. Wildmon tell me what to watch?" Corley said, referring to Donald Wildmon, executive director of the Tupelo, Miss.-based American Family Association. "I would really hope the viewers would vote by turning the switch."

Corley said that his audience has protested some of the profanity that slipped into NBC scripts in recent months: "A lot of shows have 'son of a bitch' now as a matter-of-course. The folks back home just turn it off."

Jon Ruby, general manager of KVOA-TV in Tucson, Ariz., said of NBC's recent image difficulties: "I don't see it as a problem. Tartikoff made a couple of errors, and said he'd never do it again."

Harvey Libow, general manager of WSAV-TV in Savannah, Ga., said the press was more concerned about NBC's image than the viewers were. "I only heard from the press," he said.

Although calling NBC's airing of the Rivera Satanism special the "most egregious" error on the network's part last season, Francine Achbar, assistant program manager of Boston's WBZ-TV, said viewers attacked the station most aggressively because "Nightingales," largely because Boston is a medical center.

"When I called up my affiliate representative and told her I was getting 20 letters a day, she was surprised," Achbar said. "That is a regional issue."

But, Achbar added, her station's viewers also bombarded the station with complaints about the Rivera Satanism special and have recently complained about tasteless shows aired during the hours their children watch.

"Boston is a very conscientious, educated, sophisticated town where people do write and call quite vigorously," she said.

Rather than worrying about NBC's image in the world of entertainment television, the affiliates seemed more concerned about its news and sports departments. They fretted over how NBC's prime-time news show, "Yesterday, Today and Tomorrow" would do in the ratings when it debuts this summer.

They also worried whether NBC's intention to offset some of the cost of its coverage of the 1992 Summer Olympics by allowing some events to be aired on cable and pay-per-view would involve the loss of the most popular events. "I'm sure they (cable executives) are not going to want all archery and Greco-Roman wrestling," grumbled Greg Kelly of KCRA-TV in Sacramento, Calif., attending with his father.

Pianist blends pop with 'new age' music

He is the Michael Jackson of "new age" music, the top star in a genre that does its best not to stand out too much.

His latest album, "Cristofori's Dream," has been No. 1 on Billboard's new age albums chart for a mind-boggling 27 weeks. More than six months. Longer than any pop album has retained its top spot since Michael Jackson's "Thriller."

But it is still not always easy for pianist David Lanz to fill a concert hall.

It's based on radio play, primarily. Lanz said in a recent telephone interview from Boston, where his concert happened to be sold out. "We sell well all over the United States, but if people don't hear about it, they don't go. And radio is where people usually hear about it."

But even stations with a new-age "Wave" format have stopped calling themselves new age these days.

"The term has gone away," Lanz said. "It did have a negative effect because of bad press surrounding people like Shirley MacLaine."

New age these days not only means a kind of soothing instrumental music that falls somewhere between pop and jazz with a dash of classical pretension. It also takes in the whole line of spiritual ideas, books, crystals and — harmonic convergences — that many people would otherwise call Old Kookiness.

Lanz, 38, takes it all in stride.

While he continues to proudly identify his work as new age, he gently (gentleness is also an aspect of the music) pokes fun at other examples of the genre as "music to drivel or float over bodies to."

"Hey, you gotta make fun of it," Lanz said. "If you don't laugh at the stuff, what's the point? I mean, I've got a crystal."

What the heck. To me, a crystal is the new age lucky rabbit's foot."

New age music has been seen as "an illegitimate genre," Lanz said. "And I can see why. A lot of the music is pretty bad. But most rock is pretty bad, too. And like rock, the cream of the crop is great, but a lot of the stuff is pretty much forgettable."

Lanz, who lives in Seattle, has a

background in rock and pop. "In the mid-'70s, I was making a living playing in bar bands, cranking out whatever songs I needed to get my paycheck."

But as he started to check out philosophy, meditation and self-hypnosis, "I began a holistic approach to my whole lifestyle," he said. "I was looking at what people were doing with meditation music in civilizations with healing temples."

He began to hear the music of new age pianist George Winston, who just about defined the territory with his instrumental work.

"I liked the mood he was creating," he said. "It was nice music to get lost in. But there were no strong hooks and melodies like something you would hear on the radio."

So by infusing new age sensibility with pop hooks, "I felt like I was filling in a space."

About the same time, Narada Records was just starting in Milwaukee, and Lanz and another pianist, Michael Jones, were hired as the in-house George Winstons.

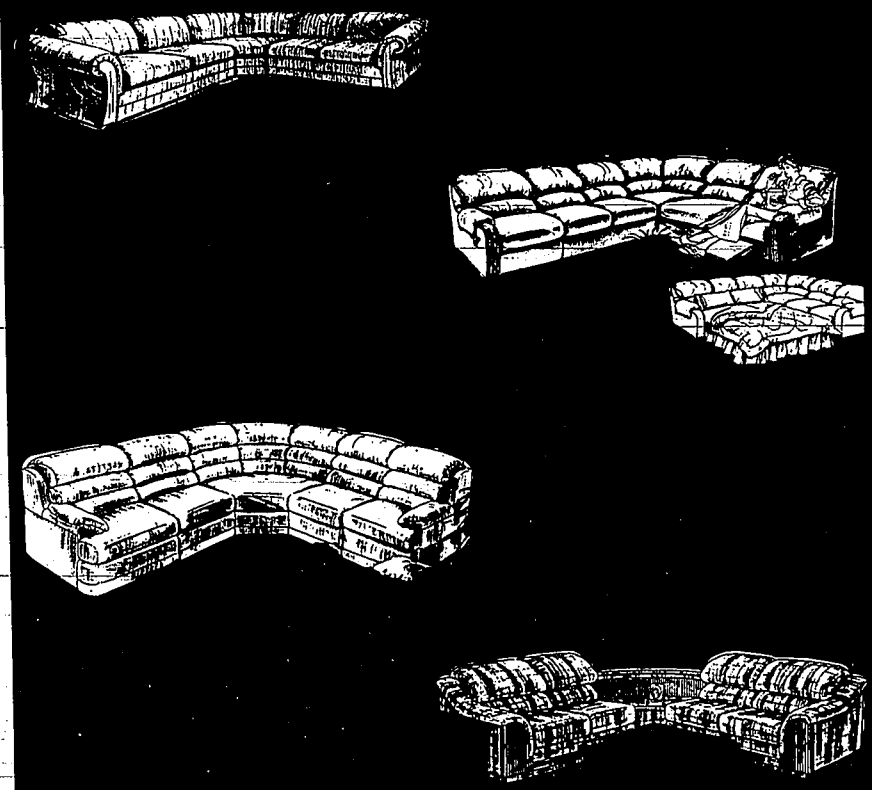
"We're both real different from George in subtle ways, but I can also see how we may sound alike to people who don't know the music — like Jeff Beck, Jimmy Page and Jimi Hendrix might all sound the same if you don't know rock guitar."

The fact that new age radio formats are now calling themselves "New Adult Contemporary" is only a slight setback, Lanz said. "You take two steps forward and one step backward. My idea is to infuse a shot of spirituality into a dying art form — pop music."

While hard-core new agers are not uniformly amused by his poking fun of their beliefs, he has also felt the heat from Bible-believers.

In Charlotte, N.C., they have a conservative Christian faction there that, if you say new age, it's like Satan," Lanz said. "I can understand them thinking that about heavy metal music, maybe, because they use some of the symbolism. But new age music?"

Indeed, what could be more harmless than the bubbly-piano, good-vibes sound track to the smiley holistic lifestyle than new age music? "I guess they get it over the crystals and the Shirley MacLaine stuff."



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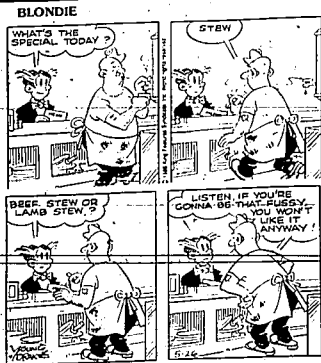
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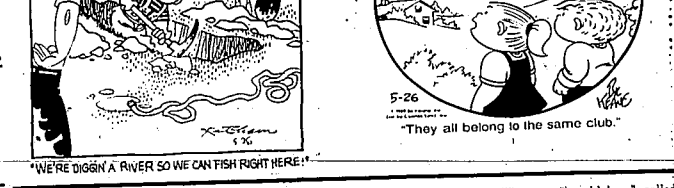
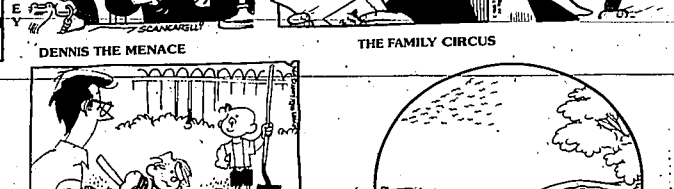
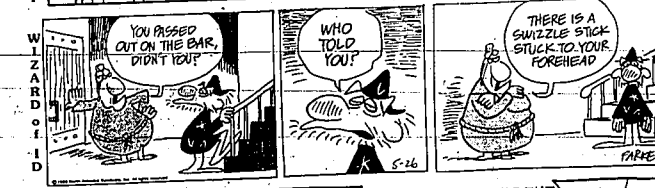
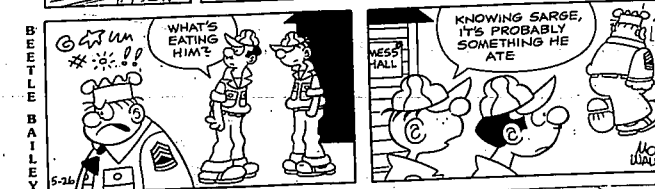
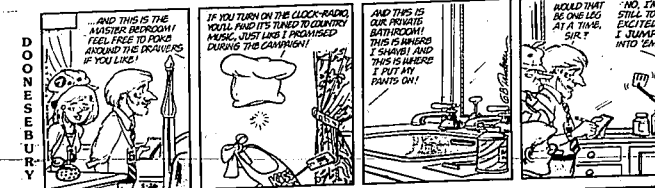
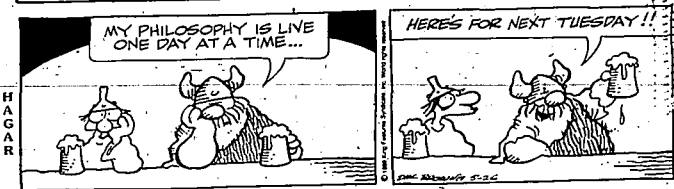
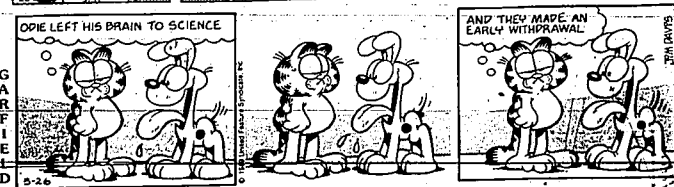
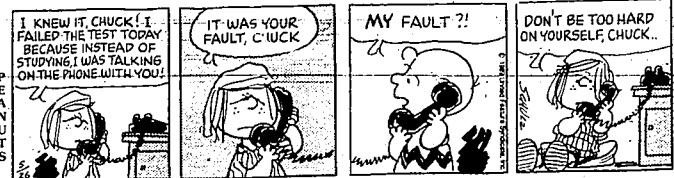

'Lost Angels'

New film with Donald Sutherland lacks focus

"Lost Angels," a new film by Hugh Hudson, seems to have no point of view. Some critics have already referred to the drama as an '80s version of "Rebel Without a Cause," but there is no one with whom you can sympathize in the film. The movie puts everybody down. Its aim is scattershot.

For a time, the psychiatrist is sympathetic. For a while, he is the only character you might think admirable, but we soon learn that he has failed as a family man and is a bonzo to boot. You can't blame him. His wife comes-on-like Conana the Barbarian, but then everyone comes on mean in this film, the kids, the parents, the schools and the people who manage the institution to which Tim Doonan (Adam Horovitz) has been confined. Tim is tricked into entering the institution. He thinks he is there for tests, but he is there for confinement, to get him out of the hair of his mother and stepfather, who are buffaloes by the boy. They cannot cope. If anyone in this film is sympathetic, it is they. They, too, are victims of the system, but then everyone is a victim in this film, beginning with Tim, who has gotten into trouble with the law time after time.

He has a brother who is slime, a young man who is into everything and wants to take his brother along with him. Andy (Dow Bloomfield) is even into murder, but Tim is not. He stops at that, and that is nice, because this may be the only evidence

we have that the kid may be worth saving. Hudson, who did "Chariots of Fire" and "Greylock," seems appalled by the behavior of the boy's mother and stepfather. He seems genuinely disturbed by the fact that there are parents who would confine their children to institutions of this kind. Actually, it doesn't look all that bad. The kids have a certain amount of freedom, and if they behave themselves, they get out. Meanwhile, the parents have some sense of mind. The boy's real father, a cop, seems to despise the kid, but then, he too may have been pushed too far. Like all the other characters in the film, he is unsympathetic. At times, "Lost Angels" plays like "Even Less Than Zero." There isn't one honorable person on the horizon.

Hudson says that the film is not about drugs; but they are a definite part of the picture. Pot and pills abound, and when Tim's girlfriend gets high on something, she drives the family's car into the pool. When her mother reacts with rage, daughter says, "But mother, it's just a car."

Maybe you have to live in California to appreciate that.

Horovitz, son of playwright Israel Horovitz and one of the Beatle Boys, a rap group, plays Tim with an air of indecision. At times, he seems more demoralized than disturbed.

Donald Sutherland is the shrink and Amy Locane (she will be in John Waters' new film, "Cry Baby") is the girl who gets Tim into trouble.

Cheryl (Loane) is only 15, but she has done a lot of hard living in those years. At start, she is companion to Tim's brother, then when circumstances cool that arrangement, the girl gets into bed with Tim.

The score for "Lost Angels" includes music that sounds as though it were written for a horror film, which the film wants to be but is not. It really isn't much of anything. Its heart may be in the right place, but its focus is fuzzy.

Michael Weller, who did "Moonchildren" and "Loose Ends," plays about the '60s people, did the script for the R-rated "Lost Angels," a movie in which the parents are veterans of the '60s. The film might have done something with that, but it doesn't. It doesn't do much of anything.

'Field of Dreams': Not enough magic

FIELD OF DREAMS (PG). A movie about crazy dreams and impossible reunions, "Field of Dreams" presents baseball as a kind of national sacrament, an instrument of near-holy reconciliation between the generations — with Kevin Costner as an ex-campus radical and Iowa farmer who receives heavenly instructions to construct a diamond in his cornfield and await some mysterious visitations. It is probably as heartfelt a movie as any major studio has given us recently, but the heartland setting is a little too underpopulated, the populist parable a little too bald, and the political conflicts avoided or softened. The movie doesn't quite reach the magical, Capra-esque fusion of fable and fantasy it wants.

THE ADVENTURES OF BARON MUNCHHAUSEN (PG). Terry Gilliam spins his yarn about an elegant old duffer who has waltzed round and round through the air with the goddess Venus, who has been to the moon and has the moon dust in his eyes, as round as the fullest moon. For all these, whom the modern world unsettles slightly, there is Munchausen.

DEAD CALM (R). Cracking-good thrillers are harder to find these days, possibly because the audiences for them seem to have gotten more demanding. Into this void sails "Dead Calm," a spare, smart, seductive piece of real movie making with (almost) every loophole covered, a superlative cast (Sam Neill, Nicole Kidman, Billy Zane) and enough tension to keep us all hyperventilating for hours. Directed by "Newsfront's" crackerjack Philip Noye.

DEPECHE MODE 101 (Times-rated Mature). Depeche Mode is a fascinating pop group, and director D.A. Pennebaker has done his share of interesting — musical documentary work, but their pairing is a classic oil-and-water mismatch. The band is

slick, synthesized, pre-programmed, hard to get to the bottom of; unslick cinema verite freak Pennebaker just lets the cameras roll and never even attempts to delve beneath the surface of the teen phenomenon. The concert footage isn't bad, but this is for diehard fans only.

DISORGANIZED CRIME (R). Pleasant but needlessly drawn-out caper comedy in which an ill-assorted bunch of crooks (Fred Gwynne, Ruben Blades, Lou Diamond Phillips, William Russ) attempt to rob a bank in a small Montana town, despite their lender (Corbin Bernsen) being chased by a pair of New Jersey cops (scene-stealers Ed O'Neill and Dan Roebuck). Written and directed by Jim Kouf, who also wrote "Crankshaft."

Howard Zieff's new comedy is so clearly derived from the movie "One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest" that you might begin to wonder when Jack Nicholson will show up. This amably slick farce stars Michael Keaton, Christopher Lloyd and Peter Boyle as a carnivorously funny trio with Stephen Furst playing the weakest role, although he has a great comic waddle, running along helplessly behind them like a chafed turtle.

HEATHERS (R.) A film that thinks of itself as black comedy; certainly some of the targets in Daniel Waters' script are overdue for a zinger or two: school cliques, unctuous teachers, parents who won't be parents, etc. The point of view is a wavel-mounted. He doesn't have the courage of his cynicism.

Directors of low-budget movies earn unusual praise at Cannes

CANNES, France—Imagine that you are looking at a satellite map of Europe with a circle drawn around the area known as the French Riviera.

Now, zoom in farther, to another area of Cannes, this one with a circle around a white spot along the beach. Hit the zoom button again—Zzzip!—and you see a large white tent with the sign "American Pavilion" over the door.

A peculiar noise rises, a drone that grows into a furious polyglotted babble. Something important is going on here as we cut to...

A dais with six film makers, their bodies backlit by the sun reflecting off the Bay of Cannes, and surrounded by reporters, camera crews and admiring film buffs. The admiration is palpable.

In Hollywood, most of these guys would be sneered at by studio guards, but in Cannes, where film makers are viewed as heroes on tight budgets, they have spent last week in the center of the universe. They are:

—Spike Lee, the hard-charging, uncompromising young-black film-maker who has miraculously gotten two major studios to finance movies—"School Daze" by Columbia and "Do the Right Thing" by Universal—that they couldn't possibly understand.

—James Jarmusch, a staunchly independent spirit whose last two movies—"Stranger Than Paradise" and "Down By Law"—barely earned back their minuscule costs, despite the raves of critics.

—Steven Soderbergh, a 26-year-old whose first film is one of the favorites to win the coveted Gold Palm Award here.

—Wayne Wang, a Chinese-American director with a genius for capturing moods of Chinese immigrants in the United States in ways that major studios don't know how to market.

—Charles Lane, who started his first feature on March 1 this year and is here 10 weeks later for its world premiere.

—And Ed Feldman, a veteran ("I'm older than anybody in this room") producer whose films include "Save the Tiger," "Witness" and the current hot potato—"Wired."

There are other things going on in Cannes, as there are in the rest of the galaxy, but for the moment, nothing is more important than the subject on the table—the essence of independent film making.

The subject is particularly hot this year because the 42nd Cannes Film Festival is uniquely blessed with American independent films.

Jarmusch, a huge favorite here since his "Stranger Than Paradise" stole the directors' Pavilion Trophy this year with "Mystery Train," Lee was also a "Cannes discovery" for "She's Gotta Have It," a Fortnight hit in 1986.

To the major studios, Cannes is an episode of "Fantasy Island." Nothing that happens here really happens... at least nothing that can be measured in any financial terms. The winner of the Gold Palm Award is about as exploitable commercially as the winner of a small-town bake-off.

There are different yardsticks in Cannes, at least where film makers are concerned, and what counts with these avid fans—the critics as well as movie goers—is purity of the spirit.

You can keep Steven Spielberg, or half of whatever he owns, the most envied person in Cannes may be Jarmusch, who has managed to make and get distributed four movies while maintaining ownership of the negatives.

Jarmusch broke that news during the independent film makers seminar at the American Pavilion Tuesday, unperturbedly making of himself the model of the complete independent. He writes his own scripts, directs them with total freedom and owns them forever.

The definition of an independent film maker has changed over the years and is still a little muddled. The traditional view is of a person making movies outside of the studio making system. Most of the panelists here said it has to do with creative vision and control.

"Independent film making is, trying to tell stories in different ways," Spike Lee said. "It's disheartening to me to see American independents doing things you can see on TV."

Lee is an independent working within the system. He made "She's Gotta Have It" on a budget of \$175,000 and got it distributed outside the system. But his second film "School Daze," was financed and distributed by Columbia Pictures. "Do the Right Thing," a cinematic anatomy of a race riot, was made by Universal and will be released in the United States June 30.

Most of the films that end up in the official programs at Cannes are independents. In most countries other than the United States, directors have creative control over their films by law, regardless of how they are financed. It is a condition of the

Berne Treaty, written a century ago to protect the works of artists.

Creative control in the United States is a contractual matter—that only the elite of the independents is able to negotiate. Soderbergh's first film, "sex, lies and videotape" has turned him into an instant star in Cannes, but he said he had no contractual rights to the final form of the movie took.

"The final cut belonged to (the producers)," he said. "But I was prepared to go public and have my name taken off the movie if they changed it. But it never came to that. I was left completely alone."

What the independents' seminar pointed out was that you are only as independent as the deal you can cut. In that sense, it's no different from working within the studio system.

The more money you need, the more help you're going to get.

Cannes is traditionally a hotbed of activity for another form of American independent—the specialty film distributor. In the past, they came here in force, scouted the films in competition and began bidding for U.S. rights to the ones that figure to go over with the art-house crowd at home.

The independents were elbowed out of the game by the major studios, classics divisions for a while, but came back strong a few years ago when the studios closed most of those divisions.

Orion Classics, the only studio specialty division, to succeed and survive, is still one of the leading buyers here. But the bidding wars have none

of the frenzy of the past and the prices—even for the most popular films—don't reach the same heights.

"If there's a film that's really hot, there will still be a lot of competition," said Amir Malin, president of Cinecom. "But there is the realization on a part of American independents not to be crazy any more."

Malin is one of the founders of Cinecom, the company that picked up "A Room With a View" a few years ago and made a killing playing it off slowly around the U.S. Malin acknowledged that that success got the small company thinking too big, and Cinecom made the same mistake that put many of its rivals out of business.

What Cinecom and others did, encouraged by the easy money available through video sales, was take "small" scripts that warranted budgets of maybe \$1 million or \$2 million, and ran the prices up by hiring stars considered necessary for video sales.

"We ended up in a no-man's land," Malin said. "There were all these films that didn't work theatrically or on video."

That fat video market has dried up for foreign and low-budget films. The video chains have acted into hit-or-miss inventories and the independent distributors have had to rethink their specialties.

'Miami Vice' passing marks end of an era

Detectives Sonny Crockett and Ricardo Tubbs rode off into the sunset on Sunday's final episode of "Miami Vice," and in a way their departure marked the end of an era. I watched the two heroes go with mixed emotions.

There are plenty of viewers, of course, who will say "good riddance." During its five-year run, many people came to see "Miami Vice" as the epitome of everything that is wrong with American television—and, by extension, with America as well. The show was altogether too violent. Too materialistic. Too obsessed with its own slick depiction of the glamour and sex and danger of big-time narcotics trafficking for civilized sensibilities.

Years ago my colleague Gwinn Owens, wrote a piece deploring what he called the "pornography of violence" in TV fare. Here is how he described his first and only encounter with "Miami Vice":

I tuned in recently and stumbled on one of those teasers that precede the opening titles of a show. I was unprepared. This is approximately what I saw:

"A small sailboat was skimming along the blue water under sunny skies. Aboard were two muscular, tanned young men in bathing trunks and a beautiful young woman in a scanty bikini. Altogether it was a scene of almost idyllic perfection."

"A small powerboat approached, and a friendly voice from it shouted: 'Aho! My we come alongside?' 'Certainly,' or words to that effect, was the response from the young man. A powerboat crewman grabbed the puny one of the sailboat, whereupon another man emerged with a machine gun and blew the young man and woman to bits.

"I snapped off the set, almost physically ill. To this day I don't even know what program I was watching. Presumably, such scenes are routine in adventure television."

Not routine, perhaps, but certainly more common on "Vice" than practically anywhere else on TV, then or now. Owens captured perfectly the aura of decadent luxury punctuated

by sudden, violent death that was "Vice's" trademark.

Another colleague remarked that he was astounded that blacks, Hispanics and women didn't protest the series' blatant ethnic stereotyping. Colombians were invariably ruthless, Haitians sinister, Cubans flaky.

Regarding women, "Vice" adhered to a classic madonna-whore formula: Bad girls were bimbos, prostitutes, gold diggers and operatives of assorted terrorist cliques; good girls were vice cops dressed up to look like bimbos, prostitutes, gold diggers and assorted terrorist operatives. Most times it was hard to tell which was which, and maybe that was the

point. Still, I'll miss Crockett and Tubbs. They taught us what drugs and violence had done to the country. One can blame "Vice" for exaggerating or distorting recent history, but not for causing it. "Vice's" shocking prurience stripped away illusions of innocence, and maybe that is why many people are glad to see it go.

Now everyone knows what a kilo of cocaine looks like and pistols have become a fashion statement among teens. But part of growing up is recognizing the reflection in the mirror. If only because "Vice" made the images so painfully clear, there is reason to lament its passing.

Life goes on, but Beijing residents report awareness

BEIJING (AP) — Buses and subways were running Wednesday and a line formed once again outside Kentucky Fried Chicken, a sign that pro-democracy protests have not brought everyday life to a halt in the capital.

But residents said the upheaval had changed their level of awareness and interest in current events.

As one 33-year-old shopper put it, daily life in Beijing continues much as it did before martial law was imposed Friday, but "the people aren't the same."

The Beijing International School, attended by most children from the English-speaking foreign community

in Beijing, announced it would resume classes Thursday.

School was called off a week ago because roadblocks set up by citizens trying to keep troops out of the city created traffic problems hazardous to children.

On Wednesday, most blockades were down and traffic appeared near normal. The official Xinhua News Agency reported 172 of 174 Beijing bus routes were in operation. The subway also returned to normal service.

The blockades — made of buses, road dividers, garbage cans and trucks — brought public transportation to a virtual halt for

three days. Many people relied on bicycles to get around, but others found it impossible to go to work.

The fashionable shopping street Wangfujing, just a few blocks east of Tiananmen Square — the center of the protests — was crowded with buses, street cars and shoppers.

"Department store shelves were full and stands were brimming with lunch boxes, roasted Beijing duck, popsicles and other popular food."

"The supplies of rice, oil, sugar and other things has been normal," said a 65-year-old Agriculture Engineering University professor visiting Wangfujing.

Earlier in the week, officials had

warned of imminent shortages of basic supplies if the roadblocks remained.

Music blared from stores selling cassette tapes, while customers shelled out \$46 for medicinal deer tail at the Yong Ren Tang Drugstore.

At the Kentucky Fried Chicken restaurant on the southwest corner of Tiananmen Square, about 30 people were lined up at the counter at 11:30 a.m. An assistant manager said business was returning to normal after sales dropped by about half during the height of the demonstrations.

A retired worker said his interest has expanded beyond economic news. "Now I read the news about politics," the student movement and the situation in other provinces," he said.

Chinese student travels 1,100 miles to become part of history

BEIJING (AP) — To get to Tiananmen Square, Ji Xijie took three trains, blocked railroad tracks for hours with his classmates, bounced along in a bus, and threatened a police officer with a beating.

But the student from Changqing, an industrial city about 1,100 miles from Beijing, finally made it to the heart of China's month-long student movement for freedom.

"I will tell my children about this with pride," said the 20-year-old junior from Changqing University surrounded by his classmates under a makeshift styrofoam tent. "I have come to Beijing to take part in a great revolution."

Ji is one of tens of thousands of students from outside Beijing who made the long march to the capital to demonstrate for a more democratic China and the resignation of Premier Li Peng and senior leader Deng Xiaoping.

The students' presence in Beijing has given the movement a boost now that thousands of others in the capital have returned to their schools, exhausted after sleeping for 10 days on concrete.

Indeed, the out-of-towners now make up more than half of the

students on the square, student leaders say.

Many traveled across the country for free because train clerks and ticket sellers also support the movement. Now they live on the good graces of Beijing residents who bring them noodles and steamed bread, and man the blockades keeping army troops out of the city.

Their travels have echoes in China's recent past. During the ultra-leftist Cultural Revolution, hundreds of thousands of students took to the road to visit the revolutionary sites. For many, the experiences on the road as Red Guards were formative ones.

For Ji, his travels to Beijing play the same role.

Ji and about 30 classmates started their trek to Beijing on Friday night, a day before Premier Li Peng ordered a martial law crackdown in Beijing to suppress the movement.

"By the time we left there was a news blackout on the movement throughout all of China," Ji said. "We just had to know what was going on."

On Sunday, they arrived in Loyang in Henan province, but police on orders to keep protesters from coming to Beijing forced them

onto a train returning to Changqing. They got off a few stops later and rented a mini-bus to head back to Loyang to get a train to Beijing.

"A police officer came to the bus station and said we couldn't go," Ji said. "We pleaded with him but he refused to give in."

Finally, the Sichuan students threatened him with a thrashing and he let them go. "That was very satisfying," Shi Zhifen, a Sichuan classmate, said with a smile.

In Loyang, they boarded another train, but it was stopped in Anyang, another Henan city.

"Police threw all the students off," said Ji.


Thousands of students then began a demonstration in the station, lying on the railroad tracks for seven hours until just before dawn Sunday. The railroad office relented.

"We had shut down the whole railway. There was nothing they could do," Ji said.

The band arrived victoriously in Beijing on Monday.

"I haven't taken off my clothes in five days," Ji said as he batted at a fly under the styrofoam roof. "But my spirit is strong. We will stay here until the government falls."

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
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Congress gets off to slow start

WASHINGTON — Yesterday was supposed to be National Tap Dance Day, but Congress never got around to proclaiming it. It's had trouble getting around to a lot of things this year.

This was going to be the historic, high-powered 101st Congress. So far, the annual session has been long on ceremony and heavy on in-triumph disputes.

Chief among them now is the ethics case against House Speaker Jim Wright of Texas, the top Democratic official in the government, struggling to hold onto his job.

As he tried to get the major charges dismissed, Wright's lawyer suggested to the ethics committee that the tough line against the speaker is part of the fallout from other episodes — such as Senate rejection

of the nomination of John G. Tower, a former Republican senator from Texas, to be secretary of defense; and the continuing effort to deal with the savings and loan crisis.

Along with those issues came one in which Wright himself played the leading role, the 50 percent congressional pay raise originally programmed to go through without a vote. It was derailed and defeated after a public outcry led the speaker to put it to a roll call.

Wright's own ethics case is a distraction or worse, although other Democratic leaders insist it has not diverted the House from conducting its regular business.

Three major measures that have passed this session are a \$1.17 trillion federal budget for the fiscal year beginning next Oct. 1, a measure

providing limited aid to the Nicaraguan Contras and a \$4.55 hourly minimum wage bill.

"It's no more smoke and mirrors than in the past," said Sen. Pete Domenici of New Mexico, senior Republican on the budget committee.

That doesn't add up to much of a season as Congress takes its Memorial Day recess. Early in the session, Sen. Alfonse D'Amato, R-N.Y., introduced his joint resolution to designate today as National Tap Dance Day, this being the birthday of Bill "Bojangles" Robinson, born in Richmond, Va., in 1878.

Rep. John Conyers Jr., D-Mich., introduced the resolution in the House, and added some more Bojangles lore. "He coined the phrase 'everything is copasetic,' which means it's going along just fine," Conyers said. "Unfortunately, this phrase no longer holds true for the art form he brought to near perfection."

Lobbyists practice the art of schmoozing over cocktails

WASHINGTON (AP) — Shoes shiny as mirrors, white teeth framed in sincere smiles and fingers groping for buttonholes, members of the American League of Lobbyists gathered to practice their bread-and-butter art of schmoozing.

Lobbyists seem to be everywhere in Washington, trying to influence legislators or government policymakers to give their clients a break. It's a tough job, especially if the client is unpopular or his cause unpopular. Often, success depends on knowing whose name to drop, which elbow to squeeze.

It also can be highly lucrative. "We don't starve," said public relations executive Marc L. Apter,

whose diverse clients include State Farm Insurance and the West African nation of Togo.

Apter was lobbying the lobbyists for business Thursday when more than 100 members of the league — representing special-interest groups from Mobil Oil Corp. to the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association to Girl Scouts of the USA — held their annual conference here.

They dutifully attended lobbying workshops on taxes, labor unions, the environment, foreign trade and Medicare. But they seemed happiest when they were schmoozing over cocktails and lunch.

It's such idle chatter that sometimes yields valuable tips and contacts in Washington's network of influence salesmen.

Among these garrulous birds, the usual plumage seems to be dark blue-suit, white shirt and red or yellow "power tie." Hair is trimmed tidily short. Laughter is hysterical, but when the talk turns serious, lobbyists crouch forward from the waist and stare in each other's eyes.

Their hands flutter in the air, single pocket change, brush-fore-leader-clamp-onto-hips, park all noses. With hardly a break in the chatter or a sideways glance, they extract business cards from coats or wallets — already bulging with other people's business cards — to exchange for yet another.

U.S. and Japan could be targeted as unfair traders

WASHINGTON — When President Bush met with his economic advisers Monday to discuss the possibility of charging "unfair" trading nations, he seemed struck by one of the arguments: The United States could be accused of hypocrisy if it blasts the Japanese for blocking imports. According to participants at the meeting, chief White House economist Michael J. Boskin noted that the United States maintains restrictions on imports of steel, autos and a host of other products. Defense Secretary Richard B. Cheney said the Pentagon is prohibited by law from buying supercomputers from any but U.S. manufacturers. And even Trade Representative Carla A. Hills, who favors taking a tough stand against Japan, described as disgraceful the existence of U.S. quotas on sugar imports.

"Maybe we ought to take action against a whole bunch of countries — including ourselves," Bush joked, according to one participant. In a more serious vein, the president mused that if his administration were to take action under the new trade law against Japan or other countries — the final list is expected to be released this week — perhaps it also should announce some relaxation of U.S. import restrictions.

The point about U.S. import barriers raised at the meeting is one that is often overlooked in the increasingly heated debate about trade. The United States has what is widely considered to be the freest and most open major trading market in the industrialized world. Advocates of

harsh measures against Japan and other U.S. trading partners like to suggest that the United States is being to a hopelessly idealistic policy in a world dominated by countries that dump their own products here and refuse to buy from America.

But in fact, said Robert Litan, a scholar at the Brookings Institution, "We're not any more of a virgin than anybody else."

Among the products that are restricted in some manner from import into the United States (aside from the ones cited at Monday's Cabinet meeting) are cheese and other dairy products, textiles and apparel, machine tools, beef, peanuts and ceramic tiles.

The focus on U.S. trade restrictions is likely to intensify as the government makes its decision about which nations to cite for unfair trading practices under the so-called Super 301 provision of the new trade law.

Ever since Congress passed the law last year, other nations have objected to the process and pointed out that the United States is less than pure.

"This Super 301 issue is going to end up highlighting the U.S.'s own trade barriers," said Gary Hufbauer, a trade specialist at Georgetown University. "If that happens, it will be a welcome event."

The United States' restrictions on imports are considerably less egregious than those of its main trading partners, especially Japan and the European Community, experts generally agree. The EC, for example, maintains an extensive web of agricultural subsidies and import quotas. Japan's trade barriers

tend to be "invisible," and thus particularly difficult to break down. For example, some Japanese companies maintain extremely close ties with each other and refuse to buy from foreign suppliers.

But the U.S. market is not the most open in the world; that distinction probably belongs to the smaller entities of Hong Kong or Singapore, experts say. They add that several other countries, including Austria, Switzerland and Sweden, are less protectionist than America.

Moreover, despite the free-trade rhetoric of the Reagan administration, U.S. import restrictions have been growing rapidly during the recent past. According to Hufbauer, the proportion of imports affected by substantial U.S. barriers rose to about 23 percent in 1988 from about 12 percent in 1980. Other estimates, including one by the World Bank, show a similar increase.

For example, the Reagan administration, pressured by Congress and industry, in 1986 negotiated a series of so-called voluntary agreements with a number of countries to restrict their exports of machine tools to the United States.

The network of U.S. import restrictions "imposes quite a cost on American consumers," Hufbauer said, because tariffs and import quotas tend to raise the price of foreign goods and the domestically manufactured items that compete with them. Using what he considers are very rough estimates, Hufbauer has calculated that these higher prices cost American consumers \$80 billion last year, up from \$30 billion in 1980.

Few E. Europeans see inside of the luxurious Grand Hotel

BERLIN (AP) — At the prestigious corner of Friedrichstrasse and Unter den Linden in East Berlin stands the Soviet-bloc's only hotel to earn Western recognition as one of the world's most luxurious.

But the Grand Hotel's 350 plush rooms and apartments are available only to the carriers of convertible currencies, such as dollars, and few East Europeans will brave the doorman's steely stares for a peek at the opulent Art Nouveau lobby.

Even all-business West Germany, the government is the owner and as such can smooth more than the sheets for its most valued clients.

The hotel's shiny black Mercedes limousines are virtually waved through border controls while other Western-travelers are forced to line up for the lengthy ordeal of passport checks and currency declarations.

Hotel staff can settle the details with the Foreign Ministry later.

Likewise, with a mere signature, they can arrange a visa extension or Western bank transfer — tasks that through the normal bureaucracy can take hours.

The Grand opened in August 1987 and last year earned the designation by the New York-based Leading Hotels association as one of the 200 best hotels in the world.

Its emergence typifies the kind of turkey business deal East Germany wants with the West.

While Soviet, Polish and Hungarian companies have been pressing for Western cooperation to develop and share new hard-currency sources, like tourist facilities, East Berlin's authorities are resistant to sharing control or profit.

"We have not been riding this fashionable wave of activity over

joint ventures," said the Grand's deputy director, Hartmut Kaske. "These countries running hotels and other businesses under joint ventures with the West do so out of economic necessity. We are not that weak."

Financing for construction of the hotel was arranged by the Japanese company Kajima, which built the Grand. The East German government has paid off the loan and the hotel's profits are channeled to it as reimbursement.

Kaske said in an interview the hotel will have paid for itself within 10 years, although its occupancy rate of less than 40 percent is well below that considered a break-even point for Western hotels. The hotel draws mostly businessmen and prominent visitors with its rates ranging from the equivalent of \$150 a night for the smallest single room to \$2,000 for one of the two penthouse suites.

William Conrad returns to TV in CBS' adventure 'Jake and the Fatman'

Talking to William Conrad, one somehow gets the feeling that "Jake and the Fatman" isn't his favorite show.

"I wasn't particularly pleased with it last year," he says. "But that has nothing to do with the quality of the show or how people are going to like it." He gives a short laugh. "I learned a long time ago that what I like may not be the same thing that everybody else likes."

On the Wednesday-night adventure series, which returned to the CBS schedule midseason after production was delayed first by the writers' strike, then by a teamsters' strike in Hawaii where the series had moved, Conrad plays tough, blustery prosecutor J.L. "Fatman" McCabe. Joe Penny co-stars as Jake Wolfe, whom McCabe often uses as a special investigator. But Conrad would rather be playing something a bit more high-brow.

"I don't watch network TV," he says. "I watch all the wonderful stuff that's on public TV. That's where I would like to be, doing that, instead of doing this kind of — stuff. But, what the hell. It's a living, as they say."

The 68-year-old actor, has been making a living from the airwaves since the mid-'30s, when he began working as an announcer on local California radio stations. He is best known for his starring role in the popular series "Cannon" (1971-76), but he also has a long list of directing and producing credits that he amassed in the '50s and '60s. Unlike most of today's stars, who "really want to direct," however, Conrad much prefers acting.

"If you're the director and it's a bad show, it's your fault," he says. "If it's a good show, it's the star's fault. Every time you open your mouth as a star, everybody comes and pats you on the head and tells you how wonderful you are. As a director, they throw rocks at you if you haven't done what they expect you to do. And you make 10 times as much money being an actor as you do being a director. Add all those together," Conrad starts to laugh, "and it's no mystery why I choose this."

Conrad is convinced that quality doesn't necessarily guarantee success on TV. "I did a wonderful show once called, 'Nero Wolfe,'" he recalls. "I wish it had been on for years. But we did 14 shows, and we couldn't get

arrested because we were up against probably the worst show that's been on television, 'The Dukes of Hazard.' They were the No. 2 show, because they were the lead-in to the No. 1 show, which was 'Dallas.' You can't fight things like that, you know. No matter what you do, you can't change it."

"Jake and the Fatman," he seems to feel, isn't nearly as good as "Nero Wolfe" — or as bad as "The Dukes of Hazard." "From what I can gather, half of our shows are quite good, and the other half are not," he says. "That's about 50 percent, which ain't too bad. But we all set out to do a good series. I don't know of anybody who's said, 'We're going to do the worst series that's ever been on the air.' We all try, and sometimes it works and sometimes it doesn't."

"I wish I could be more positive for you," he says as he concludes the interview. "But I am unfortunately one of those people who tells the truth. I can't lie about something."

Director Phil Alden Robinson, who adapted the novel for the screen, said, "Apart from legal issues, I have great empathy for J.D. Salinger's desire for his privacy. Since he's a person I much admire, I decided to make a screen character as far away from Salinger's persona as possible while staying close to the essence of the popular story."

Q: There's been a lot of talk about Bette Davis's careful prior selection and approval of the star presenters when she got the Film Society of Lincoln Center award recently — James Stewart, Geraldine Fitzgerald, Ann-Margret and director Joe Mankiewicz. Who did Bette say no to? — B.L.

A: Jodie Foster was suggested to Bette, and the film queen acquiesced; but Jodie was to be in London at that time, so it didn't pan out. Helen Hayes and Lillian Gish were brought up, but there's no love lost between Bette and those two icons, so they were nixed. Olivia De Havilland, who appeared with Davis on several occasions, was also disapproved, as was Mia Farrow. In addition, Bette didn't cotton to Ronald Reagan sharing the stage with her, because "he can't act." (Reagan was in the cast of Bette's hit, "Dark Victory.")

Q: What's become of Douglas Fairbanks Jr., that great Hollywood swashbuckler, who was so marvel-

ous in the 1939 classic, "Gunga Din"? Is he still alive? — G.R.

A: Fairbanks is 80, looks years younger. The only minor casualty of age that I could discern in a recent interview is an occasional memory lapse. Once married to Joan Crawford (from 1929-1933), he married Mary Lee Epling in 1939. The couple has three daughters, Melissa, Daphne and Victoria. Fairbanks recently signed on as movie host on the American Movie Classics cable channel. He has appeared in some 75 movies but rarely gets offered roles today. "I don't know why," said Fairbanks. He appears occasionally on TV.

Q: I read that "Pet Sematary," the scary new movie written by Stephen King, was filmed in Maine because the film's production designer discovered the town of Ellsworth to be an ideal locations site. Is this on the level, or were certain scenes actually shot inside the movie studio? — W.M.

A: "Pet Sematary" was shot completely on Maine locations, a major reason being that Stephen King is a devout Maine-lad and fiercely loyal to his state. He felt that only real-life Maine locales would add the necessary authenticity to his weird film. He seems to have been right: "Pet Sematary" is one of the biggest hits of the season.

'Generations' a soap within a soap

Producer Sally Sussman pokes fun at her trade in the new half-hour "Generations," offering a soap-within-a-soap storyline starring Barbara Rhoades, a busy TV actress from the '70s.

Barbara plays Jessica Gardner, a fading soap actress in "Tomorrow's Another Day." Her character Lacey, on the soap-within-a-soap, has just been hit by a bus and remains in a coma, which is convenient for her husband, who wants her dead because he's having an affair. The coma plot panics Jessica because she assumes she's about to be written out of the show. So she comes to Chicago to visit her old friend Laura McCallum and await the verdict. She will stick around and may even work in a soap based in Chicago.

"I knew Lacey before I even started as Jessica," Barbara explains. "We did the soap plotting first, then I was introduced to Jessica. I think they asked me for my sense of humor and my background. We'll find out as we go along. I know one thing, the male actors are tall so I expect to be around for awhile."

A big, buxom showgirl from Broadway's "Funny Girl," Barbara came West to Universal Studios in the early '70s and always had a problem because of her height — many of the guys at the time were shorter than she. (Asked once why small men seem to love big women, Barbara answered "It's simple: little guys make an extra effort. Women like that.")

Married to comedy writer-producer Bernie Orenstein, Barbara took six years off to raise her son. Now that he's in school, Barbara has gone back to work. Her first soap opera job is, oddly enough, on NBC's Stage 8, where her husband Bernie produced Jack Klugman's "You Again." Barbara was an occasional guest star.

"Generations" producer Sussman also worked for Bernie at one time, Barbara revealed. "Sally was a secretary. I think. Maybe she remembered me. I got a call from the soap and originally turned it down. I always rejected soaps before — but times have changed. The competition for over 35-roles is tremendous. Even movie stars are interested. I

used to be lazy. The thought of memorizing 25 pages a night lost its appeal, but I changed my mind."

Barbara admits soap work is tougher than prime time. "You have to memorize. I put my son to bed and then I go to bed, to study my lines. I wake up and study lines and by camera time, I've got them down."

Dancer Barbara retired her tap shoes for good. "I don't see any big musicals in my future," she says. "In Poughkeepsie, I took tap when it was out of fashion. My class consisted of my teacher and me. Tap may be back in but I'm not. My exercise consists of yoga, which has sustained me for 20 years."

Soap fans, look for Barbara — that is, Jessica; that is, Lacey — and watch a pro at work.

Gerald Anthony won an Emmy nomination for the role of Marco Dane in "One Life to Live" in 1982 and left the show in 1985 to go to Hollywood for a crack at prime-time. He was last seen in the recurring role (until he was killed off) of Father Peter Terranova in "Wiseguy." He also played the attorney who was the middleman in Ann and Stuart's adoption in "L.A. Law." Now he has returned to the part of Marco in "One Life to Live." You can bet that his character, who has always been on the shady side, will cause his share of trouble in Llanview.

China: Networks continue shooting despite crackdown on coverage

NEW YORK — Cable News Network anchor Bernard Shaw, still in Beijing, spent Sunday fully expecting the authorities to cut all phone lines out of China, cutting the last link of live reports by foreign broadcasters there.

And then, he said in a late-night phone interview, as Army troops massed to clear Tian An Men Square of hundreds of thousands of protesters, "We just sit here until the government feels it has control of the situation and can loosen the screws."

As he was speaking, CBS' Dan Rather was flying home from Tokyo. He left Beijing Saturday with news footage taped shortly after authorities ordered CBS and CNN to shut down their portable transmitters, and pulled the plug for NBC and ABC at the state-run China Central Television satellite uplink station.

The live shots of the CBS and CNN shutdowns Friday night — CNN was first to go at 10:05 p.m. EDT (11:05 a.m. Saturday in Beijing), followed by CBS at 11:49 p.m. EDT — dramatically symbolized the news dimout for American and other foreign networks.

But their reports continued by phone, with their networks showing photos of them, maps of Beijing, pre-shutdown tapes or fresh footage taped despite severe restrictions by Chinese authorities and "pigeoned" out of Beijing by departing staffers or travelers.

It all occurred in an extraordinary week for the networks — one that began with Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev's historic China visit, and evolved into high-tension confrontations that had exhausted reporters and producers working almost non-stop.

It was a particularly extraordinary week for both Shaw and Rather. The latter, in addition to signing off Friday as CBS' plug was pulled, also anchored a "48 Hours" special Thursday from Beijing.

"Unbelievable — we all came here to cover a summit and we walked into a revolution," Shaw told viewers shortly before CNN's satellite link was cut, preceded by



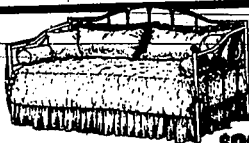

tions out of here and a shutting down of the airport," Shaw said Sunday. "I just regard it as standard operating procedure."
 Ironically, he spoke while watching reports on the situation both on CNN and CBS "Sunday Morning" newscast.
 That was possible because of a still-operating satellite reception dish atop the Great Wall Hilton in Beijing, CNN's headquarters there.
 On CBS' Sunday newscast, CBS Beijing bureau chief John Sheahan, was reporting live by phone of the possibility of a "massacre" in the streets when army troops moved to clear Tian An Men Square.
 Earlier Sunday, Shaw said, the government had briefly jammed reception of network newscasts dealing with the China story. That stopped, he said, "but I expect it to continue."
 Shaw and Rather were the only American network news anchors on the scene all week, NBC and ABC having decided to keep Tom Brokaw and Peter Jennings here.
 "We're getting our butts kicked," one stateside NBC producer

moaned to a friend earlier in the week.
 For NBC, the timing of its keep-Brokaw-here decision was awkward. Friday's plug-pulling in Beijing came as NBC's affiliates were gathering in San Francisco for their annual convention.
 But NBC News President Michael Gartner didn't think the decision was a mistake. "No, of course not," he said Saturday from San Francisco. Referring to NBC's staff in Beijing, including Asian veterans George Lewis and Kenley Jones, he said he was "happy with the work that everybody who's been over there."
 ABC sent a 30-man crew that among other things shot footage of CNN's plug-pulling, 20 seconds of which it provided CNN late Friday. But worried about a potentially explosive situation in Panama, the network kept Jennings here.
 ABC believed that the Soviet-China summit meeting earlier in the week was important, "but not enough to send an anchor," Robert Murphy, ABC News vice president for news coverage, explained Friday.

tions out of here and a shutting down of the airport," Shaw said Sunday. "I just regard it as standard operating procedure."

"Ironically, he spoke while watching reports on the situation both on CNN and CBS "Sunday Morning" newscast.

That was possible because of a still-operating satellite reception dish atop the Great Wall Hilton in Beijing, CNN's headquarters there.

"On CBS' Sunday newscast, CBS Beijing bureau chief John Sheahan, was reporting live by phone of the possibility of a "massacre" in the streets when army troops moved to clear Tian An Men Square.

Earlier Sunday, Shaw said, the government had briefly jammed reception of network newscasts dealing with the China story. That stopped, he said, "but I expect it to continue."

Shaw and Rather were the only American network news anchors on the scene all week, NBC and ABC having decided to keep Tom Brokaw and Peter Jennings here.

"We're getting our butts kicked," one stateside NBC producer

mourned to a friend earlier in the week.

For NBC, the timing of its keep-Brokaw-here decision was awkward. Friday's plug-pulling in Beijing came as NBC's affiliates were gathering in San Francisco for their annual convention.

But NBC News President Michael Gartner didn't think the decision was a mistake. "No, of course not," he said Saturday from San Francisco. Referring to NBC's staff in Beijing, including Asian veterans George Lewis and Kenley Jones, he said he was "happy with the work that everybody who's been over there...."

ABC sent a 30-man crew that among other things shot footage of CNN's plug-pulling, 20 seconds of which it provided CNN late Friday. But worried about a potentially explosive situation in Panama, the network kept Jennings here.

ABC believed that the Soviet-China summit meeting earlier in the week was important, "but not enough to send an anchor," Robert Murphy, ABC News vice president for news coverage, explained Friday.

HBO will launch comedy channel

NEW YORK (AP) — Home Box Office Inc., which provides the pay-television services HBO and Cinemax, said it plans to launch the first advertiser-supported channel devoted entirely to comedy starting this fall.

The new service, which would be given to cable operators to offer at no extra charge for subscribers to their basic service, would represent the Time Inc. unit's first venture into basic cable programming.

Backers of the project say comedy offers a distinctive new programming vehicle that could help cable operators draw new subscribers.

But the new service will have to fight for channel space with several other recently launched cable networks such as Turner Broadcasting System Inc.'s Turner Network Television, the National Broadcasting Co.'s Consumer News and Business Channel and an array of regional sports networks.

Michael Fuchs, Home Box Office chairman and chief executive, said in a news release cable operators told of the plans for the comedy service over the past several months have expressed "strong support."

Richard Behrs, president of the HBO comedy channel, said he has only just begun asking cable operators for commitments to carry the service and declined to say how many he has received.

Time also owns a cable operation, American Television and Communications Corp., that could provide several million subscribers to get the comedy channel started, however.

Behrs declined to say how much Home Box Office was prepared to spend to launch the service but said the company realized it may take a number of years to be profitable.

Home Box Office may also face competition from a rival comedy channel from the MTV Networks division of Viacom Inc.

Barry Kluger, a spokesman for MTV Networks, said MTV has been examining for five years the possibility of launching a comedy channel and may make a decision soon on whether to launch an all-comedy service.

Home Box Office currently includes comedy shows in its HBO and Cinemax lineups of movies, sports, music, drama, documentaries and special programs.

The comedy channel will feature hosts who will have their own shows usually running two hours and incorporating live performances with clips from stand-up performances, current comedy films, classic TV shows and theater. It will also carry an occasional full-length motion picture or situation comedy.

The rescue of Jessica McClure tops ratings

LOS ANGELES (AP) — ABC's docudrama of the rescue of Jessica McClure from an abandoned well in Texas was the most-watched program last week, but NBC pushed its ratings victory streak to 48 weeks.

"Everybody's Baby: The Rescue of Jessica McClure" was first in the A.C. Nielsen Co. ratings for the week ended May 21. It told how the people of Midland, Texas, rallied together to save the 18-month-old child when she fell 19 feet down an abandoned well on Oct. 14, 1987.

The ABC Sunday night movie knocked the two-hour wrap-up of NBC's "Miami Vice" to 21st place. The CBS movie "Mike Hammer: Murder Takes All," competing in the same time slot, was in 27th place.

ABC's "Roseanne" was second in the ratings. NBC's "The Cosby Show" was third and NBC's "Cheers" was fourth.

Two series ended the season last week in the Top 10. NBC's "L.A. Law," in which Ann Kelsey announced she was pregnant, tied for fifth place with ABC's "The Wonder Years." CBS' "Knots Landing," with the second part of its two-part cliffhanger episode, was in seventh place.

Other shows in the Top 10: CBS' "Murder, She Wrote" in eighth place, CBS' "60 Minutes" in ninth

place and NBC's movie about the abortion-rights battle, "Roe vs. Wade" in tenth place.

The NBC special "Kenny, Dolly and Willie: Something Inside So Strong" placed 18th. It starred Kenny Rogers, Dolly Parton and Willie Nelson.

NBC extended its winning streak in the A.C. Nielsen Co. ratings to 48 weeks with an average of 13.3. CBS was second with 12.0 and ABC third with 11.6. Each ratings point equals 904,000 households without television. The share is a percentage of sets in use.

NBC's average since the season began last Sept. 19 is 15.7. ABC is second with 12.7 and CBS third with 12.5.

Special Sunday telecasts of two popular ABC comedies, prior to "Everybody's Baby," didn't do anything like they did in their regular time slots. "Roseanne" finished its 40th place and "The Wonder Years" was in a four-way tie for 41st place.

Fox Broadcasting's "Married... With Children" was 47th, placing it higher than 29 shows on the three networks.

The five bottom network shows were: ABC's "The Electronic Time Machine," NBC's "The Absent-Minded Professor," ABC's "North and South, Book II, Part 2," ABC's "Mission: Impossible" and ABC's "Under Fire: The Real Story."
