The government plans to move waste stored "temporarily" at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory to this permanent waste repository in a salt bed one-half mile beneath the New Mexico desert. Andrus said. "The solution to this crisis is the Waste Isolation Pilot Plant," he said. "If transuranic waste cannot safely be stored at WIPP, I doubt that it can be safely stored anywhere." Andrus, however, was not happy with part of the impact statement because it does not specify the amount of waste to be shipped from INEL or federal funding for emergency training along transport routes. "In the event of an accident, the federal government must assume responsibility for any cleanup costs," he said.

While acknowledging that the government must first find a way to retrieve and repackage the waste before it can be moved, Andrus expects the government to move "all" transuranic waste from INEL. General Jim Jones, speaking for Attorney Jones, is concerned that the Energy Department is segmenting the impact of waste disposal, which leads to "skewed decisions and a lack of public confidence," Caldwell said. A single environmental impact statement

Few fires will burn unchecked

WASHINGTON — Completely a major overhaul of its firefighting strategy after last summer's devastating blaze at Yellowstone National Park, the Bush administration formally revised federal fire policy Thursday to restrict the number of natural fires that will be allowed to burn uncontrolled.

The change represents a significant modification of the federal government's controversial let-burn policy, which had permitted fires ignited by lightning to burn uncontested unless they threatened property or public safety.

While affirming a commitment to natural fires, the revised policy requires federal officials to vigorously combat such blazes unless they can prove that the fires will not get out of hand and would have a beneficial environmental effect.

The revision marks a "fundamental shift" away from a "general presumption that all fires are good fires," senior Department of the Interior official said.

Now, the official said, all lightning-caused blazes in federal lands are initially to be regarded as potentially dangerous wildfires. Only if they later are deemed to meet a stringent set of conditions would they be permitted to burn.

The revised federal policy, unveiled by Secretary of the Interior Manuel Lujan Jr. and Secretary of Agriculture Clayton K. Yentz, will permit natural fires to burn in national parks and forests for the first time since blazes raging out of control swept vast portions of Yellowstone last summer.

Government directives in force since then required that all lightning-caused blazes be suppressed, no matter what their size. That policy will generally guide federal officials through most of this summer, until individual fire management policies can be revised to meet the new federal standards.

Bush tries to fix ties in London

LONDON — President Bush sought to ease strains with Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher on Thursday and maintain a special relationship with her conservative government as he wrapped up his four-nation European tour.

While Bush mended fences after a tough session with Mrs. Thatcher, Secretary of State James A. Baker III challenged the Soviet Union to respond to the latest U.S. proposal for cutting American and Soviet troops in Europe to 275,000 on each side.

Brushing aside a cool reaction from Foreign Minister Eduard A. Shevardnadze as only preliminary, Baker said "the ball is in their court" and a response by them is now clearly called for.

He said Western experts will meet for three months at NATO headquarters in Brussels to flesh out Bush's arms-reduction initiatives, which include the projected troop cuts, so they can be formally presented by the Western alliance to the Warsaw Pact in Vienna on Sept. 7.

Bush, who flies home today, lunched with Queen Elizabeth II on duck with honey and brandy sauce in the chandelied second floor Music Room of Buckingham Palace after meeting with Mrs. Thatcher.

"It's only with friends that you can take the gloves and talk from the heart," Bush told reporters at the conclusion of his session with the prime minister at heavily guarded 10 Downing Street. "And I felt that I was with a friend today."

As the day wore on, the two leaders put the emphasis on the centuries' old ties that bind their nations.

At a evening dinner at 10 Downing Street where both Thatcher and Bush regaled the guests with jokes and anecdotes, each spoke seriously of what the Anglo-American relationship means.

"You always will be able to count on Britain when there is danger, when you need us. That's why the relationship is so special," Thatcher told Bush.

New rules to reduce student loan deficit

WASHINGTON — Education Secretary Lauro Cavazos on Thursday announced tough new steps to weed out schools that "promise to educate but deliver only a debt" and to reduce the \$1.8 billion student loan default burden on taxpayers.

"There is no shelter for the unscrupulous and no comfort offered to the irresponsible" in the Education Department's long-awaited package of rules, legislative proposals and administrative steps, Cavazos said.

"We are taking decisive action against those who cheat our citizens, those who promise to educate but deliver only a debt," he said. "We must weed out unethical schools and other program participants whose sole purpose is to profit at the expense of our students and the taxpayers."

The secretary said the overall default reduction strategy, including proposals that Congress would need to enact, would save \$5.4 billion over 10 years.

The new department rules, in the making for a year, dictate an increasingly tough series of corrective and punitive actions against schools with default rates ranging from 20 percent to 80 percent and higher.

Those above 60 percent, about 200 schools, will face limitation, suspension or termination from the government's massive student loan program starting Jan. 1, 1991. Schools at 40 to 60 percent, currently numbering about 450, must reduce their default rates by 5 percent a year starting in 1991 or face the same penalties.

All schools will have to provide counseling for first-time borrowers and those with default rates

above 20 percent must develop a default management plan.

Some 4.6 million students are expected to borrow money under the student loan program in fiscal 1989. The program is projected to cost \$5 billion this year, with 37 percent of the money going to cover defaulted loans.

For-profit vocational schools, which have an average 40 percent default rate, are singled out in some of the department's rules and proposals in an effort to reduce their disproportionate share of delinquent borrowers.

For example, all vocational schools regardless of prospective students on their completion and job placement rates. And the department is proposing a further requirement that all of them arrange for another school to complete their courses if they close in midsemester.

 cited Foley's strong record on farm issues. "He understands agriculture better than anyone in the House," he said.

Spalling noted that Foley's district, like his own, has a hospital that is strapped for funds because of low Medicare reimbursement rates.

"I guess a key point is that only one member in nine represents rural districts," Spalling said. "Foley represents one of those rural districts. That will make a difference for rural health care."

In the final rounds, Ojas, a 12-year-old sixth-grader, correctly spelled "anapnoeus," an adjective for something resembling soap, and Scott countered with the correct spelling of "ideaphoria," which is a capacity for creative thought or imagination.

Both spellers, however, missed "pasigraphy," which means an artificial international written language, and Ojas then missed the next word, "anecene," which means growing old.

Republican Craig has also worked with Foley, most notably on funding for a water quality study on the Lake Rand Otville river system, which flows into Washington and Montana. He said Foley will be more sensitive to the problems of states where the government owns much of the land than past House speakers.

"You really have to be born and raised in a Westerner to appreciate the balance—the environmental balance, the economic balance, Craig said. "That is critical in a

Energy Department officials say that WIPP will not open if it cannot be proved safe, and they would only be designated a permanent repository after the test and disposal phases," said John Arthur, of the department's Albuquerque operations office. "Environmental regulations will not

be compromised to meet programmatic schedule, and the Department of Energy will not proceed with any phase of the WIPP development until it has been determined it can do so safely."

"The Energy Department plans to move transuranic waste from INEL, Rocky Flats, Colo., Hanford, Wash., and the Savannah River Plant in South Carolina to the New Mexico site where it will be placed in tunnels dug out of a salt bed millions of years old.

Plans call for the first five years of operation to be devoted to determining the feasibility of long-term storage of radioactive waste in the salt bed. Transuranic waste will remain radioactive for hundreds of thousands of years. Government officials hope the salt will safely isolate the waste for at least several

thousand years.

Not everyone who spoke criticized the repository project.

Idaho Falls Mayor Tom Campbell said he was satisfied that "every precaution has been taken," and that officials seem to be genuinely concerned with public safety.

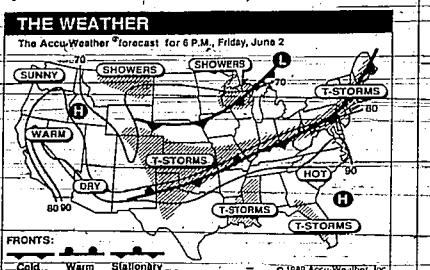
Roger Hayes of the Snake River Alliance, a statewide environmental group, said, "obviously something must be done with the waste, but it must be done responsibly."

Part of that responsibility must include contingency plans if WIPP fails, Hayes said. "The (Energy Department) must discuss what will happen if WIPP doesn't open."

Cliff Brady, member of Citizens for INEL, said, "it's nice that we can for once agree with environmentalists that the waste should be moved out of Idaho."

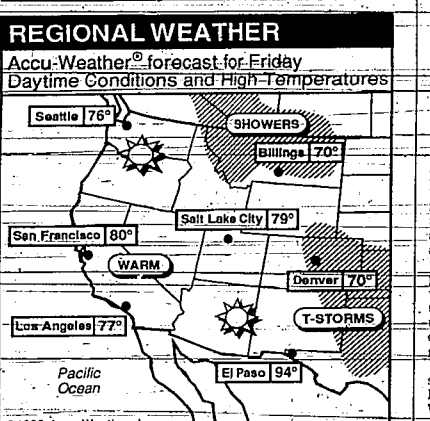

 lobbied vigorously for a strategy that recognized the ecological benefits fire can perform; expressed some relief that the government had not abandoned the let-burn policy altogether.

But they characterized the new policy as a step backwards. They voiced concern that cautious fire managers would now quell even the most vigorous lightning-sparked blazes out of fear of being disciplined by government superiors.

"Without a clear policy that supports the concept of fire," said Barry Flamm, chief forester for the Wilderness Society, "managers will now take the easy way out and fight all fires."

It took a real struggle to persuade fire people and administrators to let fire burn, Flamm said. "Now we have a presumption that fire is bad unless you can prove that it will do good things out there."

Ecologists argue that wildfires clear away dead timber and overgrowth and are vital to the rejuvenation of forests by promoting the growth of plants and shrubs that animals depend on but that could molder in the darkness of an aged forest.

However, the near-infernos that swept majestic Yellowstone last summer caused many to question whether the literal application of such a policy might endanger the nation's most valuable natural resources. Some of the most destructive blazes in the park were started by man, not nature, and others were fixed from the start.

Among the new guidelines apparently designed to minimize the number of natural fires that will be permitted to burn is a new directive requiring an on-site official to certify each day that a burning blaze remains within prescribed limits.

The change means that for the first time "there will be someone specifically held responsible" for decisions to let fires burn. Department of the Interior spokesman Steve Goldstein said.

Among the new criteria fire managers will be required to consider are the number of fires burning elsewhere in the country and the region, and the potential impacts of fires on visitors, national parks and nearby communities.

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Judicial Council will receive applications until June 16 from people who want to succeed Justice Robert Huntley Jr. on the Idaho Supreme Court.

Huntley has announced plans to retire effective Aug. 7 after nearly seven years on the court.

The Judicial Council will screen applications and conduct interviews before sending the names of two to four nominations to Gov. Cecil Andrus.

Chief Justice Robert Bakes, who serves as chairman of the Judicial Council, said Thursday the process of nominating a replacement for Huntley is under way. But the council has not started yet on nominations for a replacement for Justice Allan Shepard.

Shepard died last Saturday of a heart attack. His funeral was on Wednesday.

Officials warn against using Chinese mushrooms

BOISE (AP) — State health officials are advising food managers throughout Idaho to avoid using canned mushrooms imported from China after they were linked to food poisoning cases in other states.

Don Brothers, food program manager for the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare, said there is no information on whether the mushrooms have been distributed in Idaho, but there have been cases of food poisoning reported in Mississippi, New York and Pennsylvania.

Restaurants, schools, hospitals, jails and other institutions have been told to check inventories for the mushrooms shipped in four-pound, four-ounce cans with no brand names. The container codes include "TM-173" and "TM-172."

Closing of railroad would hurt economy, Andrus says

DRIGGS (AP) — Union Pacific Railroad's proposed closure of an eastern Idaho branch line would undermine the campaign to spread the economic recovery beyond the cities to the state's rural areas, Gov. Cecil Andrus claims.

Time, again, transportation capability has been identified as either a major incentive for economic

expansion to occur in Idaho, or it has been seen as a significant handicap, Andrus told an Interstate Commerce Commission hearing officer on Thursday.

"Transportation connections to rural areas of Idaho like Teton County are absolutely essential to the long-term development strategy currently being employed by the state of Idaho," the governor said. "It would be particularly damaging to have this critical rail line abandoned."

Union Pacific has petitioned the I.C.C. to close down the 41-mile branch line between Ashton and Teton as unprofitable. But while some major potato shippers have not objected, the state and local officials that the state has not burdened the railroad with regulations.

Bannock County denies claim of harassment

POCATELLO (AP) — Bannock County officials say an investigation indicates there's no merit to a claim, the letter said.

If they want to file frivolous lawsuits, they may have to stand the costs of filing them. They're going to have to pay the taxpayer back for filing things like this," Commissioner Tom Katsilometes said.

Congress is to blame for ethics troubles

Frustrated and angry by the biggest scandal in Congress in this century, House Democrats are lashing out at the most convenient target in town, the media, but from our perspective, it is Congress itself which is to blame for the turmoil and trouble of the past months.

The resignations of Speaker James Wright and the Majority Whip Tony Coelho are likely to be only the first, but both in our view, were both for the right reasons.

That suspicion extends to both parties and to both the House and the Senate, although Senators have been a bit more immune from scrutiny by their longer terms of office and by the isolation from the media back home which they enjoy in Washington.

Nonetheless, the collapse of Wright and Coelho sends the same message as the defeat of our own Rep. George Hansen in 1984: that no member of Congress, however powerful, is free from scrutiny.

Hansen was an inconsequential demagogue who preyed on our naive while he and his wife Connie enriched themselves through alliances with folks like Rev. Sun Moon and Nelson Bunker Hunt.

For much of his career, he tricked and cheated on both his finances and his taxes and he blamed everyone in sight for his troubles but himself. Is there anyone in Southern Idaho except Hansen Hard Cores who doesn't think we are better off for having given him the boot?

Sadly, this drama of Congress in the 1980s is not yet played out, folks. In our view, there are plenty of Wrights, Coelhos and Hansens left, both in the House and the Senate.

They know they aren't very visible most of the time to the local media back home. Hence, they feel confident that they can go wherever they want at the height of whatever special interest pays them; lead personal lives which would shame their own families and pad their life-styles with little more than profits from whomsoever has "bought" their services on any given vote.

All of this is kept from citizens by an entourage of retained staffers and local representatives, whose primary jobs are to hide the individual's foibles and to keep us all fed with a steady ration of daily baloney of the person's so-called "accomplishments."

And in case you're wondering, they're not all Democrats either, folks. Nor are they all from far-away, "Eastern" states.

The uproar this week over how Democrats Wright and Coelho were supposedly "victimized" has resulted in some noticeable silences from people who are usually quick to leap on the troubles of the other political party.

Could it be that they don't want to call attention to themselves by inference? Could it be that they too hear the tolling of a bell?

True INEL facts aren't so threatening

Danger, radioactive iodine-131! Has the INEL released harmful amounts of radiation to the public of eastern Idaho?

First, a case in point. An epidemic of near hysteria broke out when a plume of radioactive iodine 131 from the Russian Chernobyl plant reached the United States.

Drivers of people went out and purchased iodine supplements to "offset" the absorption of iodine 131. People were afraid to consume dairy products for fear of contracting thyroid cancer.

It wasn't fair to the public to frighten them so. Here's why.

The maximum radioactivity measured in the rainwater from the Chernobyl iodine plume over the U.S. was 0.00086 microcuries (millionth of a curie) per liter of water.

A healthy patient is given 90 microcuries of the same iodine 131 in a routine thyroid check. At about four liters per gallon, and using by pocket calculator, nearly 69,000 gallons of rainwater from Chernobyl would have to be consumed to equal the amount of iodine in a single thyroid check.

The benefits of using iodine 131 in thyroid checks is well known by physicians to far outweigh the hazards of not using it. Just as the hazards of drinking 63,000 gallons of water (enough to fill a large swimming pool) far outweigh the benefits of taking iodine supplements to avoid the absorption of the iodine isotope.

The INEL releases of 30 years ago would certainly be bearing cancerous fruitage by now if dangerous doses of iodine 131 were absorbed by people.

"This amount of time is a sufficient incubation period for radiation-induced cancers to form; especially those linked to iodine 131."

However, the cancer statistics for the state bear no such fruit, indeed, they are well below the national average. No one has implicated INEL as the cause for the lower-than-average cancer rate at its borders. We can all be sure that had the

rates exceeded the national average, some link would be found or concocted.

The hysteria since that have been shown at the INEL over the past two years have grown increasingly pathetic and unacceptably.

The sham environmentalists of the Snake River Alliance and other anti-nuclear groups have been disseminating worthless information.

The INEL has an excellent safety record and stands out as an example to the nation, yet the public has been led to believe the aquifer is now poisoned, the air polluted, and our children's lives forever ruined by inept procedures at the INEL. Such blatant misrepresentations are themselves a shining star of ineptitude.

The SIS is vital to our future nuclear deterrence strategy and therefore to our national security. Since 1967, the U.S. arsenal of nuclear weapons has been reduced by 8,000 warheads. Over the same time period, our nuclear stockpile has been reduced by 76%.

Norman Podhoretz, in an editorial in the Washington Post, quoted a recent poll taken for the committee on the present danger; it revealed that only 7% of the American people are aware of the true situation.

Only 4% of the respondents of the poll correctly said that our nuclear arsenal has decreased and is less powerful than 20 years ago.

Not a single one of the 802 persons polled knew that our nuclear stockpile's yield, measured in megatons, had decreased by 76% — not one.

Yes, the stockpile even decreased under Reagan (not counting the INF Treaty). The facts are plain and part of the public record, but somehow the public is not being adequately informed by the media.

Unfortunately, the Soviet arms buildup is less mythology and more plutonium. The Russians have relentlessly engaged in increasing their production and stockpiles of nuclear weapons.

material since 1948.

Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev can boast of having the world's largest industrial complex for the production of nuclear weapons materials and simultaneously enjoy a false image of "peace-maker." His image should match his deeds, not his pleasing words. I hope with the rear of the world that he is sincere, though few get to his position as a "chair boy."

We cannot let the Special Isotope Separator project slip away because an ignorant greenhorn yelled "Nuke" in our nuclear theater.

The decision to build the SIS was partially based upon classified information. Those who will tell us that the SIS is not needed obviously do not have access to the classified information on the subject, so who are they?

They are misinformed. The public record itself demonstrated the need for the project. Concern for the environment is not just a guise, but also a disguise for the one and only goal of SIS critics: universal nuclear disarmament. When public policy is at stake all of the facts must be considered, not just those that sell more print or express a biased viewpoint.

It is time for interested organizations, businesses, and individuals of the Magic Valley to band together and speak with one voice on this issue.

Myself and others are engaged in forming an emergency community task force to clarify the facts of the issue.

Information on plutonium toxicity, buried waste, and other environmental impacts of our nuclear industry, especially by the SIS, will be available from this task force — all of it documented. Any group or individual interested in this timely task force may contact me. All are welcome.

will have the ability to impart that knowledge to a classroom of public school students.

3. No change in standards should be a "short cut" to certification to fill a need for a shortage of teachers in certain academic fields.

Teachers throughout the state are expressing their concerns. I believe in our professional debate on this topic has the issue of the impact on the IEA been a concern. Our only concern has been the impact of alternative certification on our profession and those students in the public school classrooms.

Committee rejects 'voodoo accounting' rescue plan

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush's plan to keep \$80 billion in borrowed S&L rescue funds off budget to avoid swelling the federal deficit was rejected Thursday by a House committee whose chairman labeled the approach 'voodoo accounting.'

With only one Democrat supporting Bush's plan, the House Government Operations Committee voted 20-16 to include the initial \$60 billion taxpayer share of the bailout as part of the federal budgets for this year and fiscal 1990 and 1991.

The Ways and Means Committee took a similar posture earlier as the S&L measure wound its way through four House committees with shared

jurisdiction over parts of the complicated legislation.

Majority Leader Thomas Foley moved Thursday to speed the bill to the House floor for action next week — apparently Wednesday or Thursday — amid a new effort by Republicans to scrap regulatory and capital standards that Bush wants to impose on the industry.

The Senate has already passed its version, with Democrats falling 12 votes short of defeating the Bush accounting plan.

Meanwhile, Rep. James Quillen of Tennessee, ranking Republican on the Rules Committee, was snidely told by lobbyists to be working with Reps. Thomas Ridge, R-Pa., and Henry Hyde, R-Ill., to spearhead an effort to thwart Bush's plan for making the industry put up more money as capital.

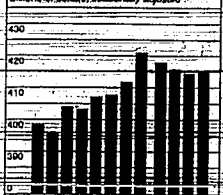
As approved by the House Banking Committee, the bill would require some 500 cash-poor S&Ls to come up with \$13 billion in new capital by 1995 as a buffer between loan losses they might suffer in the future and federal deposit insurance funds.

While Bush's capital requirement plan was never that specific, the president has actively embraced the leaps outlined in the House bill.

Bush and others have blamed the absence of that kind of capital cushion as the main factor behind the current crisis.

The insurance fund has an estimated deficit of \$35 billion to \$55 billion because of bad and often fraudulent lending by some 300 S&Ls primarily in Texas, California and Florida.

Workers' productivity takes drop

WASHINGTON (AP) — The productivity of American workers slipped in the first quarter while unit labor costs shot up more than 6 percent on an annual basis, the government said Thursday in a report analysts cited as proof both of a slowing economy and stubborn inflation.

The Labor Department's revised figures for the first three months of the year showed a 1.1 percent decline in non-farm business productivity at an annual rate, down from the 0.5 percent gain reported in preliminary first-quarter data issued last month.

Unit labor costs — a key determinant of overall inflation — rose a revised 6.6 percent on an annual basis in the quarter, said the government, which in the earlier report had pegged the increase at 5.7 percent.

In other economic data Thursday, the government reported a slim, 0.1 percent increase in construction spending in April after three straight monthly declines. The improvement in that sector, among those hardest hit by higher interest rates, was attributed largely to work on government projects.

The reports were in line with other data indicating a significant slowdown in the rate of economic expansion in the first quarter followed by somewhat improved growth in the first two months of the second quarter. Analysts expect today's unemployment report for May to put a more definitive stamp on second-quarter trends.

The economy is slowing down but it's certainly not stopping," said chief economist David Wray of DRF-McGraw-Hill of Lexington, Mass.

The 1.1 percent decline in productivity compared with a 1 percent annual gain in the fourth quarter of 1988 and an overall 1988 gain of 1.5 percent. It was the first decline in productivity since a sharp drop of 2.4 percent on an annual basis in the second quarter of last year. The revised data said the 1.1 percent decline resulted from a 2.2 percent increase in output but a greater increase, 3.4 percent, in the total hours worked.

The jump in unit labor costs was the biggest since the second quarter of last year as well; the government at that time reported a 5.8 percent increase on an annual basis. For all of 1988 unit labor costs rose 3.1 percent.

The revised numbers were not entirely unexpected.

Last week's downward revision of the gross national product for the first quarter brought predictions that the productivity gain reported in May's preliminary data was erroneous.

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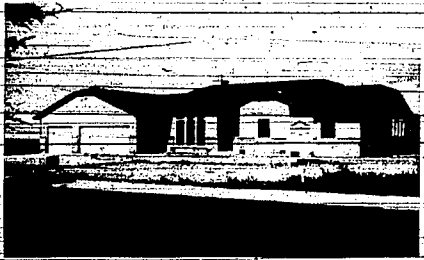

Quayle plans visit to Central America

WASHINGTON (AP) — Vice President Dan Quayle will visit Central America this month, on a four-day trip to show administration support for the newly elected president of El Salvador and rally opposition to Panamanian ruler Manuel Antonio Noriega.

The June 11-14 journey will include stops in Guatemala, Honduras, El Salvador and Costa Rica.

Quayle is to meet with the presidents of those countries, as well as political opposition and military leaders. He will also see leaders of the Nicaraguan Contra rebels, said his press secretary David Beckwith. He declined to say where that meeting would take place.

Thomas Foley to inherit speaker duties after Wright's resignation

WASHINGTON (AP) — The burden of ending what House Speaker Jim Wright called "this season of bad will" now rests with Thomas S. Foley, the Washington Democrat who will inherit Wright's job next week.

And virtually no one thinks there's a better man for the challenge.

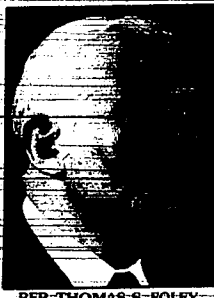
Foley, who presided over the House on Wednesday as Wright defended his honor and abdicated his office, will lay full claim to the accolade when he is formally elected to Congress' most powerful job. He will bring to the speakership a less partisan style that fits perfectly with President Bush's call for accommodation between the executive and legislative branches.

As House majority leader, Foley, 60, has won admiration from both sides of the aisle for his command of the art of negotiating skills. He is a master at finding consensus and striking compromise.

"Wright acknowledged in his farewell address that 'perhaps he had been too partisan, too insistent, too abrasive, too determined to have my way.' Foley is none of those things, as any Republican will tell you — to the dismay of some Democrats who will claim to the general.

Like Wright, Foley's political roots trace to the New Deal of Franklin Roosevelt, but he is no knee-jerk liberal — and wouldn't have lasted in the House if he were. Unlike most leaders whose seats are "safe," he is from a distinctly Republican and conservative district that has put him through many close elections, though he won last year by 77 percent.

Though hand-picked for the House's elite by Wright and his predecessor, former Speaker

To be next speaker of House Thomas P. "Tip" O'Neill, Foley never shared the penchant for bashing the Reagan-Bush administration or other Republican opponents. O'Neill admired Foley most for qualities he admittedly did not possess himself — meticulous craftsmanship of legislation, thorough command of the issues, attention to organizational detail.

"Tom Foley," O'Neill once said, in both cooperation and respect, "is a man who can see three sides of every issue."

"The reality is that in a modern, participatory Congress, the responsibility of leadership and the necessity of leadership is to constantly involve members in the process of decision and consensus," Foley says.

According to Rep. Pat Williams, D-Mont., the brother of Wright, Foley and soon-to-resign Democratic Whip Tony Coelho of California has worked like this: "Jim ... the

captain, Tony the oar drummer and Tom the navigator. Democrats in the House — and most Republicans have great respect for the navigator."

Foley's office furnishings reflect his eclectic approach. Instead of the big, imposing desk preferred by most members of Congress, he has a coffee table surrounded by enough sofas and chairs to accommodate at least 15 visitors. He does his paperwork at a small writing table in the corner.

And Foley and his coffee table have been at the center of some of the most important legislation invariably compromises, to emerge from Congress in this decade.

Just this year, Foley was host of the extraordinary talks that in mid-April produced a budget agreement for the next fiscal year, and he was pivotal in the bipartisan deal with the Bush administration over Central America policy.

A year earlier, he chaired the economic summit sessions that followed the October 1987 crash of the stock market. Prior to that, he engineered the final agreements on the Gramm-Rudman budget law, and arms control policies shared by Congress and the White House.

"Tom Foley is just a very able, capable individual," says Bob Mitchell of Illinois, the House Republican leader. "He's well-liked on our side, and he's also recognized as a very formidable opponent, one who will state the case well, and is eminently fair."

"He's a man of total integrity," said Senate Republican leader Bob Dole, R-Kan. "He knows the players, knows the issues." And this, from Rep. Henry Hyde, R-Ill. "I wish he were a Republican. If he were, he could be a presidential candidate."

GOP exploits Demos' ethics difficulties

WASHINGTON (AP) — Republican image makers are moving to exploit the ethics problems of House Democratic leaders, urging GOP lawmakers to use them as an argument the Democrats have raised too long.

"Power tends to corrupt, absolute power corrupts absolutely," says a briefing paper circulated quietly among Republican congressmen Wednesday as Speaker Jim Wright, D-Texas, prepared to resign.

The quote from Lord Acton, the 19th-century historian, was accompanied by repeated hints that the answer to the ethics mess could be a switch from Democratic dominance in the House to Republican control.

"The resignation of two of the top three Democrats in the House is the bitter fruit of 35 years of Democratic control of that body," said the paper designed to arm GOP lawmakers in the war of words raging over ethics.

It suggested that they say the Wright resignation, only days after Majority Whip Tony Coelho said he would leave the House rather than prolong the ethics issue in an expected investigation of his financial dealings, represented a genuinely sad moment in our nation's history.

But it also suggested the Republican House members give their version of who was at fault.

"Democrats would have the news media and the American people think that Wright and Coelho's fall has to do with 'ethical McCarthyism' and character assassination," said the paper. "This is absolutely false. Jim Wright and Tony Coelho's falls were character suicides."

Parents face charges of murdering infant

NORTH CHICAGO, Ill. (AP) — A couple who claimed their infant son was the victim of product tampering have been charged with murdering the baby formula laced with acid, prosecutors said Thursday.

Shella Smith, 26, and Ricky Irby Sr., 29, were charged in an indictment with a single count of murder.

On May 31, 1984, the parents were charged with abusing a juvenile petition after bringing their 3-month-old son, Quimby Irby, to a hospital

and claiming he had been poisoned by drinking baby formula, Cheney said. Tests on the boy's stomach found high concentrations of pure sulfuric acid.

But the evidence gathered during the investigation was lost and prosecutors decided to drop the case.

A break for prosecutors came in November when the U.S. Supreme Court in an Arizona case ruled that evidence lost accidentally does not prevent prosecution.

FDA approves engineered drug to fight anemia

WASHINGTON (AP) — A genetically engineered drug that can help reduce anemia in patients suffering from kidney failure and may also benefit cancer and AIDS patients was approved Thursday by the Food and Drug Administration.

"My life has been changed dramatically," said John G. Cole of the Avon Lake, Ohio, who took part in the clinical trial of the drug epoetin.

The new drug is a so-called natural human protein, erythropoietin, which stimulates the body to produce red blood cells.

Lack of those cells, which carry energy-giving oxygen around the body, is known as anemia. And since the kidneys produce erythropoietin, patients with kidney failure often develop anemia.

Food and Drug Commissioner

Frank Young said that in addition to about 85,000 kidney patients who should benefit from the new drug, it also may be useful to chronically anemic patients suffering from other diseases, such as cancer and AIDS.

The approval announced Thursday was aimed at kidney patients, and the drug was developed under an orphan drug program which gives companies financial encouragement to produce products to benefit relatively small numbers of people, generally fewer than 200,000.

But once approved for sale, physicians may use a drug for other purposes.

Cole, an editor at The Journal in Lorain, Ohio, described the drug as "great stuff."

Before entering the program, Cole said, "taking the trash out was a

difficult trip down the driveway and a walk on the beach, not taking his wife to wait for him.

Now, he said, he no longer requires weekly blood transfusions in addition to his dialysis, exercises three times a week, walks on the beach and works 50 to 55 hours a week.

"I never going to be able to play full-time basketball, my desire has limitations, but I can play half at game of half-court," he commented.

Young explained that anemia in most kidney patients has been treated by transfusions, which results in "ups and downs" in their energy levels. In addition, while blood is screened, their remains the possibility of infection from blood.

With epoetin, the body produces its own red cells, keeping energy at a

constant level and avoiding the need for transfusions in 95 percent of patients, he said.

The drug was developed in 1983 and the only problems reported in trials were those already seen in kidney failure patients who did not get the drug, high blood pressure, headache and chest pain and in some patients seizures.

Epoetin will be marketed by Amgen of Thousand Oaks, Calif., under the trade name Epogen.

Amgen said a typical patient will receive injections of the drug three times a week. The cost will range between \$4,000 and \$8,000 annually, the company said.

Young said a decision on whether the drug will be covered by federal assistance programs is under discussion.

Occidental agrees to help clean up Love Canal

BUFFALO, N.Y. (AP) — Occidental Chemical Corp. has for the first time agreed to take some responsibility for cleaning up chemical contamination at the old Love Canal industrial dump area, officials said Thursday.

Occidental has signed a consent agreement that calls for it to take over disposal of toxic wastes excavated from two creeks near the neighborhood in nearby Niagara Falls.

The agreement could save taxpayers up to \$20 million, said state Environmental Conservation Commissioner Thomas Jorling.

"We have succeeded in getting Occidental to accept some responsibility and take an active role in the remediation of Love Canal, even though the company continues to fight its liability for this natural disaster," Jorling said.

An Occidental subsidiary, Hooker Chemical Co., used an abandoned waterway project as a chemical dump in the 1940s. The dump was covered over in the 1960s and homes were built on the site in the 1960s. In the 1970s, toxic chemicals began seeping into basements and yards, causing health problems.

Occidental has taken the position that it was not responsible for the environmental disaster because it had sold the land and took no part in housing development at the site.

Under the agreement, Occidental will take contaminated sediment dredged from creeks north of the company's former chemical dump and store it at a newly constructed facility at its Niagara Falls plant. The sediment is contaminated with chemicals that seeped out of the dump or washed in from sewers.

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Another use would be to persuade the private banks that hold most of it to write off a part, in return for assurances that interest will be paid on the rest.

Cuba may subvert the peace process

WASHINGTON (AP) — The State Department said Thursday the capture of ammunition alleged to have been supplied by Cuba to leftist guerrillas in El Salvador contradicts Cuba's stated support for the Central American peace process.

Deputy spokesman Richard Boucher said that among the items seized by government forces on Tuesday was 1 million rounds of ammunition bearing stamps indicating they were made in Cuba.

The cache was found following a tip from a captured member of the FMLN guerrillas.

The discovery, Boucher said, "bolies Cuba's assertion of support" for regional peace agreements that reaffirm the principal of non-interference in the internal affairs of Central American nations.

World Bank releases \$10 billion for Third World debt

WASHINGTON (AP) — Representatives of 151 governments in the World Bank will make about \$10 billion available over the next three years to support Treasury Secretary Nicholas F. Brady's plan for cutting debt in the Third World, bank spokesman Frank Vogt estimated Thursday.

"Amounts for particular countries haven't been worked out yet because the board is going to consider three-year programs for the first time," he

added.

He said the 22 members on the Boards of Executive Directors soon will consider a one-year package of \$1.5 billion in loans to Mexico.

Under guidelines announced Thursday after more than two days of closed-door board meetings, 375 million of that new money will be available to apply to Mexico's existing \$108 billion debt.

The loan from the bank could help Mexico settle old debt at a

discount. Another use would be to persuade the private banks that hold most of it to write off a part, in return for assurances that interest will be paid on the rest.

Spain suffers strike by state workers

MADRID, Spain (AP) — Workers at the state-run Spanish television began a 24-hour strike for better pay Thursday, cancelling programming for only the second time since broadcasting began in 1966.

Thousands of rail passengers, meanwhile, braced for a one-day strike today at the state-controlled rail system as its 63,000 employees continued a long-running battle with management for better pay.

The strikes formed part of a six-month battle for higher pay by employees of state enterprises, who oppose the Socialist administration's efforts to keep pay increases moderate to contain inflation that is running at a 6.7 percent annually.

A rail spokeswoman guaranteed service on four international routes — Madrid-Paris, Barcelona-Paris, Barcelona-Bern, Switzerland, and Barcelona-Genève — as well as 19 night trains to and from major provincial capitals.

Military halts search for Marines

TOKYO (AP) — The U.S. military called off its search Thursday for 13 Marines and a sailor missing after their helicopter plunged upside down into the sea during a training exercise near Okinawa.

Seven other Marines and a sailor aboard the helicopter were rescued after the CH-53 Knight, based at Kaneohe Bay in Hawaii, crashed Tuesday night shortly after taking off from the USS Denver.

Four of the survivors were "stable and in good condition" at Camp Lester Hospital in Okinawa, said Maj. Kerry Gersthaeck, public affairs officer of the Marine Corps Air Station at Kaneohe Bay. The other four were treated and released.

By Thursday, the search for the missing men off Kyau Cape had yielded only four pieces of metal, all believed to be from the helicopter.

None of those presumed dead was from Idaho. Among those hospitalized was Lance Cpl. Marcia T. Cook, 22, of Bonneville County, Idaho.

Soviets continue troop withdrawals

MOSCOW (AP) — The withdrawal of Soviet troops from Eastern Europe and Mongolia is on schedule with the pullout of more than 100,000 soldiers as of Thursday, Tass said.

Col. Gen. Romanulav Omelchov said that as of Thursday, more than 3,350 Soviet officers and men had returned to the Soviet Union from East Germany, 1,000 from Czechoslovakia, 4,500 from Hungary and more than 2,800 from Mongolia, the official news agency reported.

The withdrawals are part of the overall reduction of 500,000 Soviet troops announced by President Mikhail S. Gorbachev at the United Nations in December. The pullout is being conducted in stages expected to last two years.

Soviet Union launches 3 satellites

MOSCOW (AP) — The Soviet Union has launched three Cosmos satellites into orbit, the Tass news agency said Thursday.

The satellites were lifted into orbit Wednesday on a single Proton rocket.

Cosmos-2022 and Cosmos-2023 will be used to test the equipment of the space navigation system Glonass, which determines the bearings of civil aircraft and marine and fishing fleets, the official news agency said.

Cosmos-2024 will be used to forecast the movement of spacecraft and for geophysical research.

Groups call for ban on ivory trading

GENEVA (AP) — International conservation groups called Thursday for an immediate ban on world trade in ivory to protect the African elephant from further slaughter.

The beast will be virtually extinct within 50 years at the present rate of killings, according to the World Conservation Union and the World Wide Fund for Nature, formerly known as the World Wildlife Fund.

Charles de Haes, director-general of the fund, urged governments to outlaw ivory imports immediately. Otherwise, the slaughter of elephants increases dramatically as poachers try to sell as much ivory as possible before anticipated a groom on an international trade ban in October, he said.

Iraq builds \$45 million clock tower

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP) — Iraq is building a \$45-million clock in Baghdad featuring a rotating gold-plated hands and a 14-ft pendulum, the Iraq News Agency reported Thursday.

The 167-foot clock tower is rising in the Harithiya district, overlooking the highway connecting downtown Baghdad with the international airport, the official news agency said.

At the base of the tower will be a museum, shopping mall, restaurants and conference halls, the report said. The ground floor of the building will be reserved for statues depicting major events in the "heroic life" of President Saddam Hussein, starting with his birth, it added.

Israelis try identity cards to quell strife

JERUSALEM (AP) — The army began issuing computerized plastic identity cards Thursday to Palestinians in an effort to gain greater control over the population.

Media reports said the Gazans would have to carry the cards at army checkpoints. Government officials have said they also expect the system to be used in the West Bank.

Last month, the army ordered all 50,000 Gazans with jobs in Israel to return home for a week. Several city governments and some factories began trying to replace Arab workers with Jews.

The latest move coincides with a demand by Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir for tougher army measures against the nearly 18-month-old rebellion against Israeli rule in the West Bank and Gaza, in which 503 Palestinians and 22 Israelis have been killed.

Israel captured the territories, where 1.7 million Palestinians and 70,000 Jewish settlers live, from Jordan and Egypt in the 1967 Middle East war.

"A way must be found to liquidate the intifadah," Shamir was quoted by the daily Yediot Ahronot as telling Defense Minister Yitzhak Rabin in a private meeting Wednesday. Intifadah is the Arabic word for uprising.

China may move to end student protest

BEIJING (AP) — About 300 army troops marched within a block of Tiananmen Square on Thursday, the clearest indication yet that the government was preparing to end the student-led movement for democracy.

National television showed hundreds of soldiers of the People's Liberation Army fast-stepping out of the city railroad station about 12 miles from the square, which students have occupied since they began their protests more than six weeks ago.

Student numbers on the square have fallen to less than 10,000, compared with up to 200,000 at the peak of their drive for more freedom and an end to official corruption.

Beijing citizens, in a show of support for the students, blocked troops from entering the city after the government declared martial law on Monday.

But residents for the moment have been subdued by a government propaganda campaign and warnings that participants in pro-democracy rallies face pay cuts and other punishment.

In a show of force Wednesday, a large procession of military motorcycles roared through the capital.

A city spokesman issued a stern warning Thursday to foreign journalists, saying they were banned from covering student protests and that all media coverage in the capital must receive prior approval by city officials.

Ding Weijun also said foreign journalists are not allowed to invite Chinese citizens to their offices, residences or hotels "for interviews or activities prohibited" under martial law.

The Foreign Correspondents Club of China said the regulations were a "deplorable case of press censorship and harassment," and urged the Beijing government to rescind the restrictions.

Ding's seven-point statement, read at a weekly Foreign Ministry briefing, expanded on martial law regulations banning foreign press coverage of the student protests. The restrictions include a ban on taking photographs and videotapes of military troops.

Beijing-based foreign journalists and hundreds more who have come to cover the protests had faced few problems until this week, when police warned at least two U.S. television networks and a Japanese network that their crews were

violating martial law regulations. They were told to cease all unauthorized reporting.

Police also summoned a correspondent for the Japanese daily Yomiuri Shimbun for a warning, and on Thursday the British Broadcasting Corp. was called in.

Late Thursday night, a few hundred students protested in front of police headquarters, claiming that officers had beaten a Japanese reporter and two students.

The confrontation between the students and authorities took a strange twist on Thursday when hundreds of students disrupted a pro-government rally in a village north of Beijing.

In another propaganda face-off, the students entertained thousands of children on Tiananmen Square to effect government charges they had disrupted Children's Day celebrations planned for the plaza, which the students took over on May 13.

Children brought pesticides, stuffed animals and money for the students, who signed autographs with such messages: "When you go to college may you never have to endure the hardship of a hunger strike."

Students block rally mandated by leaders

BEIJING (AP) — Hundreds of university students crashed a pro-government rally outside Beijing on Thursday and blocked several thousand workers and peasants from entering a stadium to take part.

"Chinese people, don't let the government trick you!" the students yelled. "Oppose government secret tactics!"

Inside the Astin Games Bicycle Stadium in Changping County, 15 miles north of Beijing, about 60 protesters wearing the new straw hats they received for participating listened to speeches supporting Premier Li Peng, who ordered martial law in the capital May 20.

Li and other hard-line Communist Party members are trying to discredit the student's movement for democracy, and gain the edge in a power struggle with moderates.

Outside the stadium, demonstrators were restless and many said they had been forced to attend some ate pesticides. Others hid their identity plates on the pavement and sat in the shade.

"We had to show up or else we'd lose a day's pay," said Li Jianguo, a truck driver who came with two colleagues. They sat in the cab of his truck.

"Look, I've come here, that's enough. No one is going to make me sell some kind of chant," said one of the students.

Others said they had been threatened with losing their jobs.

"Our country has many economic problems. If I lose this job I won't be able to find another," said a college graduate working in a government office.

Down the street, two farmers sat on the sidewalk and held little white flags that said: "Down with turmoil, support the Communist Party."

"I don't know why I'm here," said one, as he rolled a cigarette in newspaper. "My village head said,

gangs and singing Hebrew songs marched for two hours through Arab east Jerusalem under heavy police guard Thursday, marking the 22nd anniversary of Israel's capture of the Arab quarter.

Police fired tear gas and chased a young Palestinian into his home after a bottle and two rocks were dropped from rooftops on 50 Jewish marchers.

"Don't listen to your leaders. The government is corrupt," said one student to a nodding worker.

A local official came out and split the two groups.

"Now you listen to me," he shouted at the pro-government protesters. "I am your leader. No anybody else. Now repeat after me."

LEWISTON (AP) — Former congressional candidate and legislator Jeanne Givens of Coeur d'Alene will represent Gov. Cecil Andrus next month at a Western Governors Association session dealing with Indian issues.

Mrs. Givens, a member of the Coeur d'Alene tribe, will travel June 20 to Denver. Joining her will be Nez Perce Tribal Executive Committee Chairman Allen Pankham and Shoshone-Bannock Tribal Chairman Marvin Osborne of Fort Hall.

School withholds 2 diplomas

BOISE (AP) — A week after commencement, two Meridian High School graduates have yet to receive their diplomas because of their antics during the coronation.

Wendy Heaton put a "happy face" — the yellow-spheres with a grin — on the top of her mortarboard so relatives could spot her among the more than 300 graduates.

Gary Tanner had his diploma pulled because he uncashed a can of 5-ly String on some of his fellow graduates.

Group plans to turn INEL into campaign issue

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — An anti-nuclear group plans to turn a proposed Idaho plutonium-refining plant it opposes into an issue in Sen. Jim Exon's 1990 re-election bid.

But Elizabeth Paul, executive director of the Snake River Alliance, said Wednesday that whether the group opposes or supports Exon will depend on his position on the plant. The Idaho-based group has about 900 members, she said.

The main reason we're targeted, Nebraska is that Sen. Exon is chairman of a key Senate subcommittee, Ms. Paul said.

Exon, D-Neb., is chairman of the Armed Services subcommittee on strategic forces and nuclear deterrence, which will vote this summer whether to endorse the proposed \$3.1 billion plant.

"Outsiders have a right to come into Nebraska and try to influence the political process," Exon said in response to the group's plans. "But to put it bluntly, they don't know what they're talking about."

Exon said a statement issued by

the Snake River Alliance urged Idahoans to call members of Congress to shift their "treasures" down, "clean them up and don't build any more."

Exon said the production of tritium, which would be refined at the Idaho plant, is necessary to maintain a strong nuclear deterrent.

He said nuclear waste cleanup is a priority and that he has been a key supporter of cleanup funds. But, Exon said, the alliance is posing as a group concerned about cleanup when it really wants to eliminate all reactors and nuclear weapons.

Exon said the government can afford only one of the two tritium producing plants proposed. The other would be in South Carolina, a site Exon said he preferred.

Ms. Paul, who met here Wednesday with members of Exon's staff, said the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory, a nuclear research and development station near Idaho Falls is Idaho's No. 1 employer. The plutonium plant would be built at the same place.

Education official lauds value of Idaho education

TWIN FALLS — Idaho public education is a bargain, a state Education Department official says.

Idaho ranks ninth among the 28 states that use the American College Test for high school seniors, Lynn Langer Meeks said Thursday.

Speaking at the Twin Falls Education Association's annual recognition breakfast Thursday morning, Meeks said Idaho also ranks 14th in high school graduation rates. About 79 percent of Idaho students graduate, compared with the national average of about 71 percent.

Meeks, the state Education Department's English and language arts consultant, contrasted those statistics with per-pupil spending and the state's student-to-teacher ratio.

In 1987, 45 states had lower ratios — which means Idaho's classrooms are among the nation's most crowded. In spending per pupil, Idaho ranked 48th. The state's average teacher salary

ranked in the high 40s as well, with teachers in Idaho earning an average of about \$22,000 per year — compared with the national average of about \$28,000.

"Idaho's getting a lot for its money," Meeks said. "The Idaho teachers I meet are highly dedicated professionals who love their job."

Citing a study of college entrance exam scores, Meeks described what makes a school work. She said successful schools are safe and orderly and those conditions create an environment conducive to learning.

The schools that were rated as successful also had principals and teachers with high expectations. But the school must also emphasize basic skills as a foundation for higher thinking, she said.

When those things come together, kids get a good education, Meeks said. "And it's obvious that's been going on here in Twin Falls."

The early-morning meeting included a

Board OKs teacher contract Search begins for assistant superintendent

TWIN FALLS — The School Board voted unanimously Thursday to ratify a contract with teachers, and it gave administrators the go-ahead for a plan to involve community members in selecting a new assistant superintendent.

Keith Tolzin, whose July 1 promotion to acting superintendent will create the vacancy, said a screening committee of board members, the personnel director and Tolzin himself will do preliminary screening of the 12 to 15 applicants for Tolzin's job.

"We'll look at their credentials to make sure they have experience, to make sure they are certified and to make sure they have the skills and references we're looking for," he said.

He said the preliminary committee would cut the field of applicants to six or eight candidates, who will then have interviews with a community advisory committee, yet to be chosen.

Tolzin said officials haven't decided how to pick the community committee, but he said it would include at least one parent.

one teacher and a member of the administrative management team.

That committee will submit about three candidates for consideration by the School Board and administration.

"Although he said he could not release any names, Tolzin said the candidate pool includes some out-of-state residents, some Idahoans and even some applicants from within the district.

The teachers' contract that approved in its special meeting Thursday raises teacher salaries an average of 7 percent. Since the Twin Falls Education Association already has ratified the contract, the board's action wraps up the contract process.

"Negotiations went very well," said Superintendent Carl Snow. "The two-session negotiations were the shortest on record since 1974," he said.

The instructions from the board were to try to put as much into salaries as we could," Snow said.

The contract raises the base pay — which is used for figuring increments in the pay schedule — to \$15,300 from \$14,800. Starting pay in the district, however, will be \$16,000, as mandated by the Legislature this winter.

Rotarians risk life and limb to combat drugs

TWIN FALLS — Local Rotarians will be pedaling for donations during Saturday's Western Days parade to fund a drug and alcohol prevention school for local teenagers.

But a two-headed bike custom-built for the Rotarians has proven too much to manage.

Between 20 and 30 Rotarians will solicit donations along the Parade route, said Bruce Bacon, chairman of the Blue Lakes Rotary Club's drug and alcohol awareness committee.

The club is raising \$2,500 to hire a counselor to teach a Saturday substance abuse class once a month during the school year, Bacon said.

The class will be part of the Twin Falls School District's federally funded impact anti-drug program, said Marcia Lanting, the district's drug education coordinator.

It will target students who use drugs or alcohol but who don't need a supervised substance abuse program, Lanting said.

"We've found that all the kids we're counseling are using at one level or another," Lanting said. "But not all of them are in need of professional treatment."

The Saturday school will be aimed at changing these "high-risk" students' lifestyles, she said.

The impact program uses "care teams" in each school to identify students who may abuse drugs or alcohol. Team members then talk to the students and their parents if necessary. If a serious problem is found, the student may be referred to a local substance abuse treatment center, Lanting said.

Finances spell end of Jerome County Courier

JEROME — After six months of alternating hopes and struggles, the Jerome County Courier is officially shutting down operations.

"I have made the decision to shut down the paper for financial reasons," said Publisher Steve McMullen. "Last week, I thought I had lined up some tentative financing, but it fell through." A week ago, McMullen began printing the paper in tabloid format in an attempt to save money and regroup.

"The paper's closing date is effective today, and no more papers will be printed,

according to McMullen, who is president of Jerome Newspapers Inc., the corporation that owns the paper.

The Courier's telephone, which was recently disconnected, will be back in operation in the next couple of days for anyone with questions, he said. He also plans to send personal letters to subscribers explaining the plight of the paper.

"Our subscribers have been pretty supportive and positive," said McMullen, adding that he'll refund subscription money for unpublicized issues.

At the peak of operations, the Courier employed eight people. Several had been laid off during the last few weeks, and the remainder were laid off this week,

McMullen said. The first issue of the paper was mailed out Thanksgiving week last year.

McMullen plans to remain in the area, but has no immediate plans for the future. "I will probably go into some kind of business in Jerome, but I will not be in the field of journalism right now," he said.

McMullen is awaiting a trial date for two counts of grand theft. He is charged with illegally selling two pieces of equipment while he was publisher of the North Side News, the Gooding County Leader and the Lincoln County Journal. He has denied the charges.

Mushroom trial experts disagree

'Disorganization of people' heads for Jarbidge

MURPHY HOT SPRINGS — If you're considering heading to the Jarbidge area for the Fourth of July, be prepared to spend the holiday with 10,000 Rainbow People.

The counterculture group has chosen Robinson Hole, just across the Nevada border in the Jarbidge range as the site of its 19th annual gathering, traditionally held on Forest Service land.

The group, "a disorganization of people," is dedicated to world peace, brotherhood and sisterhood, according to John Caywood, a range conservation specialist for the Humboldt National Forest.

"We're approaching it from the perspective that they do have the right to peaceable assembly and free speech," he said.

Several arrests of people headed to the gathering have already been made, said Elko County Sheriff Jim Miller. In two

separate incidents men were picked up on previous arrest warrants, one involving sexual abuse, and two more people were arrested in connection with a car reported stolen in Kansas.

About 60 advance people are camped at the site, he said. As the weather improves and more people arrive, he expects problems with nudity and narcotics, he said.

Organizers have told him about 40

Officials will allow Feed and Ice fire to burn

TWIN FALLS — Firefighters, taking a new tack with the Twin Falls Feed and Ice building fire, are letting it burn itself out, the city fire division's commander said Thursday.

"We're just watching that fire so it doesn't go any place," said Commander Phil Clough.

Meantime, state fire marshals unable to get inside the building to investigate, have returned to Boise and will not return until the fire is out, Clough said.

Firefighters were continuing to pour 4,500 gallons of water per minute onto hot spots Thursday, with little effect, he said.

"I'd just draw and down and down (the fire) and when I stopped it came back up," said firefighter B.J. Hawkins.

Floors that were still standing were too

weakened to walk on and get to the fire, which is burning in the basement, Hawkins said.

"You go in there and you don't know if the floor is going in on you or not," he said.

The fire is burning a way huge wood beams and six-inch-thick cork insulation that is trapped under a collapsed roof.

"It's practically impossible to get to it, Clough said. "We're just keeping it from

Spud peeling becomes contract issue

NAMPA (AP) — There's more than one way to peel a potato and two different methods have become a major issue in contract negotiations between growers and processors.

Processors traditionally have used a hand-peeled potato in a separate inspection before being graded by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

In recent years, however, the industry generally has been changing over to a steam peeling process capable of removing less of the potatoes. That makes defects more visible.

Because growers are paid incentives for potatoes without bruises, and because the industry still is in the early stages of converting to the new peeling method, the issue has become a hurdle in contract negotiations this year.

Some processors are converting from the caustic lye peeler to a steam peeler and a whole lot of problems are showing up that weren't showing up before," said John Rooney, executive director of Potato Growers of Idaho.

"Despite their best efforts in recent years, farmers have been unable to reduce bruising. Their failure leads them to suspect the new peeling method is aggravating the problems," Rooney said.

Processors acknowledge that the steam method is capable of stripping away less of the potato than the older lye method. Growers are insisting that the "bruise-free" contract language be included, and processors take a minimum 10 percent off the spuds using the new steam peeling method.

"Growers have bought more expensive harvesters and pilers. They are using procedures and methods to reduce bruising but it hasn't helped," said Rooney. "The problem is getting worse, not better."

Earlier this year, PGI, which represents most southern Idaho potato farmers, turned down five firm offers from potato processors for the 1989 crop before they finally accepted an offer from Oro-Idaho Foods, Inc. It was for \$4.38 per hundredweight.

Changes in the "bruise-free" language of the contract were instrumental in gaining grower approval, Rooney said.

"The growers are saying, 'We can't solve (the bruise problem), so why penalize us for it?' Rooney said.

Ore-Ida spokeswoman Lauren Wilson acknowledged that the bruise problem was a major issue in negotiating this season's contracts.

"The company's Durley plant used steam peelers in its inspection room for the first time last year. The Ontario, Ore., plant will use steam peelers for the first time this year.

Differences over price and bruise-free language led to a breaking off of contract negotiations between PGI and the J.R. Simplot Co. earlier this year.

Spokesman Fred Zerza said Simplot has been using steam peelers for seven years. Growers have been offered contracts with fewer quality restrictions this year, he said.

"We recognize the bruise-free as a difficult incentive for growers to meet," he said. "Growers have felt they seldom could achieve the bruise-free criteria."

MOSCOW (AP) — A 1st District judge has sentenced two Juliettoma to prison for sexually abusing a 14-year-old girl, reminding them that society protects the young from such treatment.

Jeffrey Gripolds and Lonnie Powers each were handed prison sentences earlier this week. But how long they spend there will likely depend on their behavior behind bars.

Gripolds, 25, was found guilty by a jury in April of raping a 14-year-old girl twice in his Juliettoma trailer last November. Judge James Judd gave Gripolds a complicated sentence of 15 years for the two counts; with a minimum time of 16 months to be served.

Powers, 22, was found guilty of committing lewd conduct with the same girl. Judd sentenced him to 10 years in prison, with a minimum of three years to be served before he is eligible for parole.

But the judge retained jurisdiction over Powers' case, which means he could release him on probation after 120 days.

"Society has determined that we're going to protect our young people," Judd said. "We place the responsibility for that protection upon adults. It's clear in this case that you failed in that responsibility as an adult."

"There's just no good reason for a 22-year-old man to be messing around with a 14-year-old girl," Judd told Powers.

Defense attorney Allen Bowles, who represented Gripolds, noted the jury did not find that his client forced the girl to have sex.

"There have been constitutional challenges to Idaho's statutory rape laws, which state that no girl under 18 can consent to intercourse, Bowles said. In Florida recently, courts held a 15-year-old girl can decide to have an abortion and end a life, he said.

"But Judd said children are one of the "single-most precious commodities," and the Legislature has decided to protect them even "from their own willfulness."

COUNCIL (AP) — A New Mendocino man has been sentenced to up to a night in a prison for leaving a home on fire last October at his girlfriend's house.

Vincent Kentzel, 27, was sentenced Thursday by 3rd District Judge Dennis Goff to fixed two-year and indeterminate four-year prison terms for involuntary manslaughter.

Kentzel, who originally was charged with first-degree murder, pleaded "guilty" to the reduced charges April 10 in connection with the 1987 shooting death of Wayne Taylor, 33.

Taylor was killed at the New Meadows home of Kentzel's girlfriend, Tammy Oakley.

Besides the prison time and a \$1,000 fine, Goff ordered Kentzel to pay for Taylor's funeral and for counseling for the victim's son.

He could have been sentenced to a maximum of 25 years in prison.

Kentzel, who originally was charged with first-degree murder, pleaded "guilty" to the reduced charges April 10 in connection with the 1987 shooting death of Wayne Taylor, 33.

Taylor was killed at the New Meadows home of Kentzel's girlfriend, Tammy Oakley.

Besides the prison time and a \$1,000 fine, Goff ordered Kentzel to pay for Taylor's funeral and for counseling for the victim's son.

Clough said Jay Parsons, the building's owner, will have the building's walls knocked down.

The city may not be able to get inside the building to investigate until after Monday, he said.

Mike Stafford, owner of Stafford Construction, was at the building Thursday and said he is bidding for the demolition project.

He said the project could take about six weeks.

Allowing the building to burn will mean that much less material. Parsons will have to pay to have carted away, Clough said.

Hawkins said he has seen evidence that curiosity seekers have probed the ruins for mementos. Also, about a dozen cats who apparently have lost their home have been wandering forlornly around the building, he said.

for the Adams County Sheriff's Office.

But the gathering was also a boon for local businesses.

Business has already picked up at the Murphy Hot Springs hot tubs, cafe and swimming pool, said owner Anita Showalter. The Rainbow People she's met have been nice and have assured her they'll have 200 of their own people policing their group and keeping order, she said.

She has hired extra relatives to help at the family-owned business, at the group's suggestion, she said.

They've told her they plan to bus people down to the hot tubs during the gathering.

Miller said he is asking sheriff's departments in Northern Nevada and Southern Idaho, including the Twin Falls County department, for help with traffic problems and crowd control.

"We're going to plan for the worst scenario and hope it doesn't happen," he said.

Rainbow People organizers have told local officials they'd like a turnout of 20,000 campers, but Forest Service and Elko County officials say 5,000 to 15,000 campers is a more realistic estimate.

They will be camped in the canyon on the East Fork of the Jarbidge River, about eight miles upstream from Murphy Hot Springs, Caywood said. However, the campsite is only accessible by a 45-minute drive from the hot springs over rough roads.

The road from the rim of the encampment will probably be blocked off in July for safety reasons, and campers will have to walk the three miles into the camp, he said.

Less than half the students counseled by the care teams need professional treatment. Lanting said. The others will benefit from the new course, she said.

Students will be referred to the class by the impact teams, by local treatment centers or by law enforcement officials, Lanting said.

The Rotary Club became involved several weeks ago when Lanting and Pat Touchette of the city police spoke to the club, Bacon said.

"The club's parade motto will be 'Break the Cycle of Drugs,'" Bacon said.

Bacon was doing more breaking than cycling Thursday as he and fellow Rotarian Darlene Lassiter test-rode a customized bicycle designed for the parade by the Spoke and Wheel Bike Shop.

The three-wheeled apparatus is really two bicycles joined with a common wheel at the center, leaving the riders facing away from each other.

But balancing the bike proved difficult, and Bacon and Lassiter said they will probably replace the rear rider with a stuffed animal to make the driving easier during the parade.

Meanwhile, other Rotarians will bike along the parade route with cups, asking spectators for donations.

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Arrested environmentalist's attorney, wife claim he was target of FBI for his activism

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) — Earth First! co-founder Dave Foreman was targeted for arrest because of his role in the national environmental movement, his attorney and his wife said Thursday.

Foreman, 42, was arrested by the FBI early Wednesday and charged with conspiring to sabotage two nuclear power plants and an Energy Department bomb factory.

Foreman and three others were scheduled to appear Friday in Phoenix before U.S. Magistrate Morton Sivar, who is expected to set bond for the four defendants. The others arrested are Mark L. Davis, 39, Marc A. Baker, 37, and Margaret Katherine Millet, 35, all of Prescott.

Foreman's lawyer, James Alexander, said he would ask that Foreman be released on his own recognizance pending trial, but he said he would not be surprised if the prosecutor asks for a high bond.

"I think it's clear from the statements of the U.S. Attorney's Office that this was an attempt over

a several-year period to infiltrate this organization, and Mr. Foreman is merely a target of their focus because of who he is," said Alexander.

"He is the author of some ecology-oriented books; is a college-circuit speaker for the environmental issues and is known to be associated with the environmental issues in this country," Alexander said.

Alexander was joined in Thursday's press conference by Foreman's wife, Nancy Morton. Some members of the radical environmental group also attended.

Ms. Morton said she believed that her husband has been a target of the federal government because he is an effective speaker and spokesman. "I think they want to stifle Dave. Dave speaks very well," she said.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Roger Dokken said that the federal rules prevent U.S. attorneys from discussing their reasons for prosecution or the conduct of FBI agents.

FBI special agent Jack Loughney in Phoenix said only "we" charged Foreman. We stand on that."

Loughney said the case is continuing and more arrests might come next week.

Foreman, who worked as a lobbyist for The Wilderness Society for seven years, is considered a legend among many, said Earth First! member Rod Mondt.

Foreman was instrumental in the legislation creating the New Mexico Wilderness Act, which guaranteed the protection of the 700,000 acres of forest land, Mondt said.

Foreman also is a co-author of a book on ecological sabotage called "Ecodefense: A Field Guide to Monkeywrenching."

The organization's members said Thursday that they always worked on the assumption that an infiltrator was among them.

"When I got involved with Earth First! almost four years ago, one of the first things I remember being said in a meeting was that someone

was bringing up the worry that there was infiltrators," Jean Eisenhower said.

Someone else, possibly Ms. Morton, responded: "...Don't say anything in this big group that you wouldn't want the FBI to hear," Ms. Eisenhower said.

"It doesn't surprise me that there was an infiltrator. That's just part of the course," Mondt said.

He believes the government infiltrated the organization. "I suppose because the Earth First! movement and environmental organizations have become more vociferous in recent years."

Mondt fears that the arrests were meant to send a message to other environmentalists. "There's a chance that it will put out a message to environmentalists to perhaps stay in your place, or something like that."

Ms. Eisenhower believes the local group will continue its work.

"I don't think people are going to be doing anything differently. The only things we do in big groups are letter-writing, public hearings, protest signs. Sometimes (we talk about) the need for civil disobedience, but never in specific terms," Eisenhower said.

Divers able to recover body of man who tried back flip in 70-foot cliff dive

BULLFROG BASIN, Utah (AP) — Divers have recovered the body of a Salt Lake City man who died in a cliff dive at Lake Powell last weekend.


The body of Troy Nelson, 22, was located with an underwater scanning device and recovered by divers at 8:15 a.m. Thursday. Park Service

spokeswoman Karen Whitney said Nelson was reported missing by his companions Saturday afternoon after he did a back flip off a 70-foot cliff and didn't surface.

The accident happened in San Juan County about 12 miles up the lake from Bullfrog Basin.

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Nevada legislature OKs Ely prison despite concerns of some senators

CARSON CITY (AP) — A plan to build a \$19 million addition to the new maximum-security men's prison in Ely won final legislative approval Thursday following debate about the wisdom of building the prison in the isolated eastern Nevada area.

The Senate unanimously voted for AB387 to appropriate the money and the measure headed to the governor for his signature. But several members of the upper house complained it wasn't smart to build such a large prison in Ely because of a housing shortage in the rural mining town.

"It probably wasn't the best place to build a prison," Sen. Don Mello, D-Sparks, said. "There has been little cooperation from the people of Ely to house our (prison) staff."

Mello also complained that because Ely often has the coldest temperatures in Nevada, the state will be paying higher utility bills for the prison, which now has 500 beds and is scheduled to open early this summer.

Additionally, the state will be paying more money to transport prisoners to the Ely site, which is 177 miles east of Reno and 284 miles northeast of Las Vegas, the state's largest cities, Mello

complained.

Sen. Virgil Getto, R-Fallon, defended Ely, which is in his Senate district, saying the city's resources and housing have been overtaxed by a recent mining boom.

Getto also said the state would save on air conditioning costs because of the cooler Ely temperatures. The state's existing maximum-security prison is in Carson City, which also is far from southern Nevada, he added.

"A prison not supposed to be a convenience," Getto said. "It's supposed to be a punishment for a crime."

Sen. Nick Horn, D-Las Vegas, also defended lawmakers' original decision to build the \$40 million first phase of the prison in Ely. He said most states build minimum-security prisons in urban areas, medium-security facilities in outlying areas and maximum-security lockups in rural sites to protect people.

"It (the prison) also isn't as accessible to the press and media," Horn added, saying if a riot or other newsworthy development occurred prison officials could take care of the problem without media interference.

But Sen. Sue Wagner, R-Reno, said studies have shown that prisons should be built near population centers so inmates' families can visit and boost morale.

Senate Majority Leader Bill Raggio, R-Reno, said that under AB387, Lorton Construction of Salt Lake City, which built the prison, also will construct the additional 500 beds without the state going to bid on the project. That's necessary to save money and get the project built faster to ease overcrowding in the state's prison system with more than 5,000 inmates, Raggio said.

Passage of the bill also was contingent on an agreement Raggio reached with Assembly leaders who said they would endorse a \$5.6 million plan to begin site work on a new medium-security men's prison in Lovelock, Raggio said.

Assembly Speaker Joe Dini, D-Yerington, and Assembly Ways and Means Chairman Marvin Sedway, D-Las Vegas, also agreed to back building a women's prison in Pioche in the future unless they come up with a better alternative site before the end of this session.

Storage tank explosion kills 2 workers

LIBBY, Montana (AP) — Two men died Thursday after a storage tank at the Champion International Corp. lumber mill in Libby exploded, officials said.

Champion spokesman Tucker Hill identified the two as Robert Myrhang, 47, and Richard Salvhus, 31, both of Libby.

Hill said the two, who worked in the mill's maintenance department, were working on top of a tank that had once been used to store oil. They

were trying to remove a walkway that had connected the top of that tank to another tank, he said.

The tank exploded, but Hill said the cause has not been determined late Thursday afternoon. He said the tank had been used to store road oil, but was not being used.

Don Winkler, a deputy with the Lincoln County sheriff's office, said the men were working with a torch and apparently ignited fumes from the tank.


Hill said the accident occurred at 1:10 p.m. Myrhang and Salvhus were taken to St. John's Lutheran Hospital in Libby, where they were later pronounced dead.

Hill said he didn't know the gallon size of the storage tank, but said it was large enough for a person to stand on top of it.

Other workers were in the area, but no one else was injured, Hill said.

Farmers refuse depredation award

MONTEVIEW — Dawnella Barney of Montevideo said she and her husband Randall will refuse the \$1,325 wildlife depredation payment recommended by the Department of Fish and Game, and will fight to get what they feel they deserve.
On Wednesday, Fish and Game recommended paying less than 11 percent claims for wildlife damage in 1988. And the recommendation to the Board of Examiners whittled the Barneys' claim from \$121,537 to \$1,325.

The agency also recommended Burneys claim for further scrutiny along with 80 others, arguing that they received federal drought or crop-related payments for at least part of the damage for which they were seeking state compensation.
Other landowners defended their claims as proper. And some officials criticized Fish and Game for the reports.
The recommendations are for the last six months of 1988. Meanwhile, Auditor J.D. Williams said by the deadline Thursday afternoon, he received another 81 claims for 1988 damage, asking \$579,388. Of the total,

46 claims, asking \$446,584, were received in the three days before the deadline.
In all, he said, farmers turned in 198 claims for 1988 and 1989 damage, asking \$1,746,076 in damages.
Board of Examiners member Pete Cenarrusa, the secretary of state, said he's not impressed with the Fish and Game recommendations.
As one board member, I do not take much stock in Jerry Conley's (director of the Fish and Game Department) report," he said. "There are inconsistencies in the recommendations."

Cenarrusa, who has spent a lifetime raising livestock, said Fish and Game estimated antelope would eat about the same as sheep, 2 1/2 pounds per day. "An ewe would starve to death eating 2 1/2 pounds per day," he said.
Cenarrusa said Fish and Game also was wrong in dwelling on what the wild animals ate. He said the major damage was caused by animals trampling crops and bedding down in fields.
State Sen. Skip Smyser, R-Parma, issued a statement urging Conley to "lower the level of the award."

LEXINGTON, Ky. — Rick Pitino took over Kentucky's shaken basketball program Thursday with a warning to boosters to stay away from our practices, stay away from my players.

The former New York Knicks coach agreed to a seven-year contract, reportedly worth an estimated \$8 million, and inherited a program on three years' probation for recruiting violations. Part of the NCAA penalty includes a two-year ban on postseason play.
"No one will have anything to do with University of Kentucky basketball other than our coaching staff, athletic director, and certainly, our faculty," the 36-year-old Pitino said at a campus news conference.
Head boosters "come to the games and cheer as loud as you can. But stay away from our practices; stay away from my players."
"I think it's going to be a great challenge for all us — seeing something so rich in tradition brought back in a correct manner," he said. "The sanctions and probation just make it tougher, but we will overcome all obstacles to make Kentucky basketball rich again."
Athletic director C.M. Newton said he got the best man for the job.
"Today begins a new day in Kentucky basketball. Today is the first step in rebuilding this program," he said.
Kentucky was 13-19 record last season, its first losing mark in 62 years. And the Wildcats are close to being surpassed by North Carolina in victories, holding a 1,466-1,466 edge.

Among the awards he has received include Inland Empire League Sports writer's and Broadcaster's coach of the year, North Idaho Coach of the Decade for the 1980s and Idaho Sports Hall of Fame inductee. He also was named national coach of the year by District 7 of the National High School Coaches Association, and Idaho athletic director of the year.
He also was the first Idahoan selected as a member of the National Federation Baseball Rules Committee.

Mavericks' coach may not be in contention for Knicks position

NEW YORK (AP) — John MacLeod may have taken himself out of the running for the New York Knicks job.

The Dallas Mavericks coach told assistant coach Richie Adubato that he probably would stay with the NBA club though the Knicks have expressed interest in interviewing him for their vacant coaching job.

Adubato said MacLeod and Dallas owner Donald Carter met Wednesday night to discuss the situation.

John told me that he explained to Mr. Carter that he had made a com-

ment to the Mavs and that he is honoring that commitment, Adubato said.

MacLeod said that MacLeod told him he would issue a statement within the next two days to clear up the situation.

MacLeod was expected to meet today with team executives Norm Sonju and Rick Sund to discuss his situation.

MacLeod is the Knicks' leading choice to replace Rick Pitino, who left to return to college coaching at Kentucky.

"I have a commitment in Dallas," MacLeod said Wednesday. "It would be extremely hard to leave."

Sonju, the Mavs' general manager, said he expects MacLeod to stay in Dallas.

"In all our conversations ... John never gave us any indication of wanting to go anywhere else," he said. "I might be wrong, but I'd be surprised if he doesn't stay."

However, Sonju said he would not block MacLeod from interviewing for the New York job.

"I would never want to stand in the way of one of my employees being interviewed elsewhere," he said. "I've given permission in the past. But first, I want to talk with John."

Knicks general manager Al Bianchi, an assistant coach under MacLeod for 12 years at Phoenix, called Sund on Wednesday and asked for permission to talk with his old boss.

"I'm going to talk to Al because Al's a very good friend of mine, but that doesn't necessarily mean I'm going to New York to take a coaching job," said MacLeod, who has coached the Mavericks for the past two seasons.

"Yes, I did make the call, but any other speculation or comment about some of Dallas," Bianchi said.

If MacLeod decides not to seek the Knicks' job, there are plenty of other coaches interested in replacing Pitino.

Bianchi said Chicago Bulls assistant Phil Jackson and Detroit Pistons assistant Brendan Malone are both possible candidates.

Also believed to be in the running for the Knicks job are Atlanta coach Mike Fratello, former NBA coach Dick Motta, Suns' assistant Paul Westphal and North Carolina State coach Jim Valvano.

"I think the question is who's available," Bianchi said. "I can't say. This is the type of guy you're looking for. What I have to do is say, 'Who's available?'"

Agassi hopes for American victory at French Open

PARIS (AP) — Andre Agassi described himself as a "spoiled American" — determined to end the 34-years of futility for United States players at the French Open.

"I feel I have the mind to go all the way," the 19-year Agassi said after he beat Paolo Cane of Italy 6-2, 6-2, 6-3 Thursday, and led an American charge into the third round.

One of six American men in the round of 32, the most in five years and twice as many as any other country, the fifth-seeded Agassi has his heart set on being the first American since Tony Trabert in 1956 to win the French Open.

"I'm a spoiled American," he said. "We're used to having all the conveniences so when we don't we are disappointed."

Top-seeded Ivan Lendl, Czechoslovakian who has applied for American citizenship, victimized an American as he cruised to a 6-1, 6-5, 6-1 victory over Derek Rostagno and moved closer toward his fourth French Open crown.

Defending champion Mats Wilander, the fourth seed, who has failed to win a tournament in eight months, continued his improvement as he beat Diego Perez of Uruguay 6-3, 7-6, 6-3.

"I'm playing the best I've played in a long time," Wilander said. "I always play well here after coming off a bad season. I enjoy playing here much more and I want to win much more."

Agassi was joined in the third round by the newest U.S. teen-age sensation, 16th-seeded Michael Chang, who whipped fellow 17-year-old American Pete Sampras 6-1, 6-1, 6-1.

Unseeded Americans Jim Courier and Lawson Duncan also advanced with straight-set victories. Courier beat compatriot Jimmy Brown 6-0, 7-6, 6-1, while Duncan was a 6-2, 6-1, 6-3 winner over An-

drzej Szpanjdar of Canada.

Jay Berger, who ousted Jimmy Connors, and Jimmy Arias reached the third round on Wednesday.

Seventh-seeded Tim Mayotte was headed toward becoming the seventh American to make the third round, but his match against Ronald Agassi of Haiti was suspended by darkness in the fourth set. Mayotte was leading 6-3, 5-7, 7-6, 3-3.

Agassi, who beat Cane in the first round last year en route to the semifinals, said he has a new outlook.

"Although I beat Cane easily last year, everything was new and I wasn't comfortable until the quarterfinals," Agassi said. "Last year, being in the semifinals was enough for me. Now I feel I have the mind to go all the way."

"I'm confident against any player I have to play," he said. "This is the first Grand Slam in which I did so well, so there are many good memories. That creates a special feeling."

Agassi, who has been the subject of some critical press reports in America, said he feels more accepted in Europe.

"I get the best responses from the Europeans, especially in Italy, Germany and here in France," he said. "I depend on the U.S. for the criticism ... constructive criticism, supposedly. I doubt it."

"I want to make something clear. You can't blame the Americans, because we're spoiled. I am a spoiled American too. We're used to having all the conveniences, so when we don't, we're disappointed. When we do, we want to know what else we can have. The Europeans seem to appreciate more what they have. I'm working on that."

Agassi said he, Chang and Courier are part of a new American generation that can win on clay. Tony Trabert was the last American man to win in Paris when he captured the second seed of two consecutive titles in 1956.

The three of us have grown up differently but our games are well suited for clay so you'll be seeing more good results in the future on the slower surfaces," he said. "During the Connors-McEnroe era, the tendency was more towards the hard, faster courts, but I think the next generation will be more agile on clay."

Among the women, No. 12 Lori McNeil was the only seed eliminated Thursday. She lost 6-2, 6-1 to Maroon-Bollegraf of the Netherlands.

"I just had an off-day," McNeil said. "She forced me a lot and rushed me. I never settled down."

Her close friend, fourth-seeded Zina Garrison, was also in danger of being upset but came from behind to beat Cathy Gaverzio of Italy 5-7, 6-3, 6-2. No. 6 Manuela Maleeva of Bulgaria, No. 7 Arantxa Sanchez of Spain and No. 16 Susan Sloane of the United States also advanced.

But it was an unseeded 15-year-old who grabbed the spotlight among the women: Fank packed a side court to get a look at Monica Seles of Yugoslavia, who rewarded them with a 6-0, 6-2 win over American Stacy Martin.

With her pink outfit, ponytail, painted fingernails and punishing two-handed forehand and backhand, Seles is attracting more attention than Steffi Graf and Gabriela Sabatini.

But Seles, who trains at Nick Bollettieri's tennis academy in Florida, said she's keeping her sudden fame in perspective.

"They say that some players when they get good, their heads are in the clouds," said Seles, who beat Chris Evert six weeks ago in the Virginia Slimes of Houston final.

Texas coach: Best team won't appear at College World Series

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — The College World Series is supposed to determine the best team in college baseball. But Texas Coach Cliff Gustafson says that team isn't in the tournament.

On Thursday, Gustafson credited Louisiana State with ousting the team that he said was the nation's best in 1989 — Texas A&M.

"The Aggies were undoubtedly the best college team in the country this year," Gustafson said of Texas A&M, which failed to make the College World Series when it lost twice to LSU in the Central Regional.

"They were a great ball club and for LSU to come back and beat them twice at A&M ... is quite a feat for LSU and speaks quite highly for the job they've done there."

"They were a great ball club at A&M and it's a shame you couldn't see them in Omaha because of the type of team they had."

LSU Coach Skip Bertman said the two victories over A&M in the regionals were his biggest highlights as a college coach — including his days as an assistant under Miami coach Coach Roy Frazer.

Texas finished third in the South-west Conference behind Texas A&M and Arkansas, which won the North-east Regional to advance to the final eight.

"I felt all along that we might be better than a lot of people were judging us to be," Gustafson said. "And the reason we came in third was due to the fact that there were two great teams ahead of us in Texas A&M and Arkansas."

All eight coaches agreed that the absence of Texas A&M and Mississippi State, another powerhouse that failed to survive the regional play, leaves the favorite's role open.

Top-seeded Florida State received two endorsements — from Long Beach State Coach Dave Snow and from North Carolina's Mike Roberts, whose team opens the NCAA Division I championship tournament against the Seminoles on Friday.

Wichita State Coach Gene Stephenson said anyone could win.

"I would favor all the other seven," he said. "I think they're all capable of winning. But right now, I'd have to say Arkansas."

DES MOINES, Iowa (AP) — The governing board of the U.S. Olympic Committee begins on Friday a three-day session culminating in the selection of the American city to bid on the 1998 Winter Olympics.

"This is the first meeting in the four-year period and added to that is the fact we're picking the American bid city," said USOC president Robert Helmick, a Des Moines attorney. "Putting that together makes this a very important meeting."

Four cities are vying for the USOC endorsement to bid on the 1998 Winter Olympics: Anchorage, Denver, Salt Lake City and Reno, Tahoe.

Representatives from each city will have 40 minutes Sunday to pitch plans and financing arrangements to the 33-member USOC board. The board then meets behind closed doors to vote. A decision will be announced immediately afterwards.

The four cities were visited by a seven-member site selection team, which had wanted to recommend eliminating Anchorage and Reno, Tahoe, leaving only Denver and Salt Lake City to appear at Sunday's session.

But the recommendation was changed after committee members discussed the matter with Helmick, USOC executive director Baaron Pittenger and other USOC officers.

The site committee felt they should prioritize the bid-cities when they made their report to the officers," Helmick said. "We determined that since the Executive Board never authorized us to eliminate cities and that all four of them met the minimum standards, they should all be considered."

The committee is open and every city will have a chance to appear and have a full hearing."

Agassi hopes for American victory at French Open

PARIS (AP) — Andre Agassi, describing himself as a "spoiled American," is determined to end the 34-year drought for United States players at the French Open. "I feel I have the mind to go all the way," the 19-year Agassi said after he beat Paolo Cane of Italy 6-2, 6-3 Thursday, and led an American charge into the third round.

One of six American men in the round of 32, the most in five years and twice as many as any other country, the fifth-seeded Agassi has his heart set on being the first American since Tony Trabert in 1966 to win the French Open. "I'm a spoiled American," he said. "We're used to having all the conveniences so when we don't we are disappointed."

Trabert was the last American man to win in Paris when he captured the second of two consecutive titles in 1955. "The three of us have grown up differently but our games are well suited for clay so you'll be seeing more good results in the future on the slower surfaces," he said. 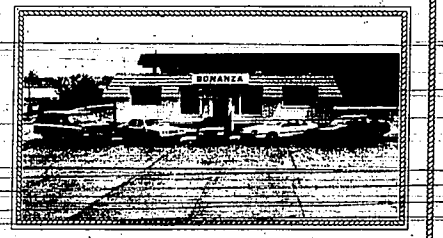

"They had to defend well and I had to be unlucky," complained an unhappy South. "I make the game in spite of the trump led by the defender, with the club ace doesn't hold the third trump." He was wrong on all counts.

East won his trump ace and led a second-trump. Declarer won in dummy and led the club king, hoping to ruff his other club in dummy. Unfortunately for South, East was and led his last trump, making it impossible for South to make the game. If South ran the diamonds to throw his last club, he would lose two spade tricks (he lead would be in dummy). And if he played spades first, the defenders would get the spade ace and a club.

Wore the trump leads too tough to overcome? Not really. East might have refused the first trump. That way the defenders would get trumps leads regardless of which defender held the club ace.

Hard work pays off for ceramic artist

KETCHUM — Pottery's functional purpose is cooking and eating. But for one Idaho resident, pottery is paying off in a big way.

In just seven years, 30-year-old Anita de Castro of Triumph has taken something she enjoyed doing and turned it into a bonafide trade.

"I wanted to do something where I'm my own boss," de Castro says with a sparkle in her eye, "and I didn't want to wait forever for the results."

Her ceramic creations fit the bill.

Potter, ceramic artist, ceramist, and ceramiciant are all terms to describe the type of artist de Castro has become, but she prefers to be known as a ceramic artist.

"Ceramicist" is the worst," she says with a laugh. "It sounds so precise and technical."

That is quite an ironic statement for someone whose precision and attention to form and technique are vital to her art. Along with these qualities, de Castro's intuitiveness and simplicity are what brings her pieces to life.

De Castro's work is not the wheel-thrown pottery which finds its way to sidewalk arts and crafts fairs.

She works with red earthenware clay, shaped over plaster molds and glazed with vivid, contrastingly-colored patterns. People recognize her works by the distinctive black and white designs of her show pieces.

She makes gallery-quality pieces and what she calls production pieces — made-to-order dinnerware place settings. While she prefers to create gallery pieces, "I don't burn out on it as quickly by decorating 10-zillion dinner plates," the high demand for her dinnerware leaves her stretched for time to accomplish all she would like.

Not wanting to dip herself into a rut, de Castro unleashes her routine creativity with new and challenging works.

She is being represented with seven other recipients of fellowships from the Idaho Commission on the Arts at Boise's Stewart Gallery in the Park Center Mall. The show runs through July 5, with an opening reception tonight from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m.

The pieces in this show are different from past offerings.

De Castro uses a coiled technique of molding the clay rather than the plaster molds, and instead of using glazes, she paints her designs with acrylic paint.

Her pottery has grown in size as well.

"Creating a World It Already Lives In" is a vase two feet high by one and a half feet around. Huge candleholders called "Bastions in the Night" look like chess castle pieces and hold large pillar candles.

Her presence in the Stewart Gallery's show comes as a result of her receiving a 1988 fellowship of \$3,000 from the Idaho Commission on the Arts. The fellowships, juried by out-of-state art dignitaries, were given to eight professional Idaho artists established in their careers and recognized for the sustained output of artists of exceptional talent.

In 1987, De Castro also received an exceptional award in the Boise Art Museum's Fifth Idaho Biennial Exhibition where she received an unprecedented three Awards of Merits for her entries.

While de Castro now sits calmly recalling her climb to recognition in her field, her mud-stained hands and fingertips belie the fact that she once was a dancer, a profession that never panned out well enough to suit her.

Rearred in Connecticut, for 10 years she studied dance and became a professional dancer in New York City, performing and touring with various dance companies, theater productions, films and nightclubs where she incorporated ballet, jazz, modern and Greek dance.

But the stress of competing with sometimes 500 other dancers for one part was overwhelming and de Castro called it quits.

In 1982 she went back to Europe where she had lived as a child until she was nine years old. Having taken several ceramics night courses, de Castro wanted to make a go as an artist, but wasn't certain where to establish herself.

Old friend and ceramist Jean Biagini in France suggested she try the Sun Valley Center for the Arts and Humanities.

Ten days later she found herself in Idaho and has been here ever since.

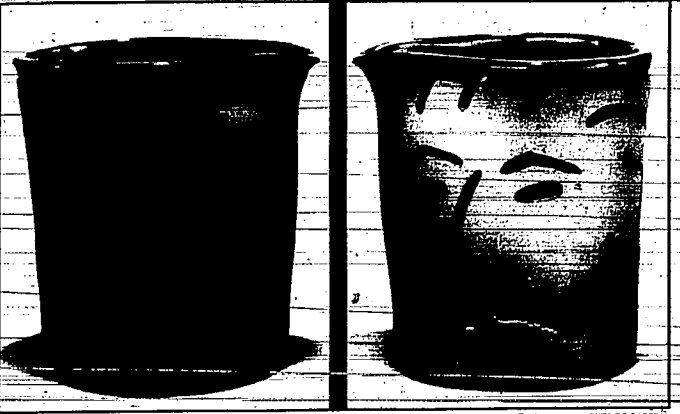

Actor James Garner learns to enjoy life after heart operations

NEW YORK — After years of toil, and following two heart operations, James Garner has a new way of working: He smacks golf balls and reads until his doorbell rings.

If his partner in a production company, Peter Duchow, is waiting outside, he knows it's time to dust off his actor's cap.

"I say, Go ahead, Pete, work. And

pretty soon it gets to the point where he has to get me in on it, and suddenly I'm working again and don't realize it," Garner says.

But slowing down wasn't easy for the 61-year-old Garner, who was once described as "the last real man in America." He might be 6-foot-3 and robust, but his body has been telling him to ease up for many years.

He was twice wounded during the Korean War, and was awarded the

Purple Heart each time. In his first-year on the hit TV series "The Rockford Files," Garner ripped up his knee. Always ready for an encore, he

did it again the next year. He's also broken his tail bone and his ribs, and injured tendons and ligaments. Add to that ulcers, arthritis, disintegrating disks in his back and occasional bouts of depression.

But the stakes escalated last year when he was hospitalized because of

a weakness in the aorta, the main artery carrying blood from the heart. He underwent a bypass operation and surgery on the aorta.

"It wasn't very good news," Garner recalled, wryly.

The operations slowed him down a little bit and "made me smell the roses a little more, I guess," he says.

Now, he's happiest when he's making a birdie on the golf course or when he's home quietly reading.

"Happiness for me is relief from stress," the actor said.

Garner gave up tobacco after 45 years, and plays with beads to keep his hands busy and away from cigarettes. But stopping smoking wasn't easy for an actor who first appeared on television in commercials, promising that "Winston tastes good like a cigarette should."

"That's the way I did it, and a year later they did a whole ad campaign

to cross 'like' out and put 'is' in its place," he recalled with a chuckle, although he's not sure whether it was wrong in the script or if he made it wrong.

Popularity of videos dictates film quality

HOLLYWOOD — "When the cause of the decline of Western civilization are finally writ," wrote Daily Variety four years ago, "Hollywood will surely have to answer why it turned one of man's most significant art forms over to the self-gratification of high schoolers."

Variety, the daily diary of the Hollywood dream, was essentially chastising its own readers for pandering to adolescent tastes with films that were low in protein and high in saturated fats. Movies, especially summer movies, were feeding young minds a diet of graphic gore, repetitive science fiction and voyeuristic sex comedies.

In making its doomsday prognosis, Variety made one questionable assumption — that commercial film-making is a significant art form, and overlooking a couple of related trends. Although Hollywood would be the last to know, American demographics were skewing older. The pool of easy-to-please teen-age consumers was shrinking while adults of all ages were returning en masse to movies via their handy videocassette recorders.

Video rentals have always been a little older (the major exception being Meir Hef, co-owner of a Los Angeles chain of video stores. "They would wait for movies to come out, and watch them at home. They rediscovered the pleasure of movies through video, watching films that weren't chopped up and interrupted by commercials. That got them going back to movies."

Teen-agers are still a dominant force in the market — witness the lineup of "big-brainer" sequels coming out this summer — but the video after-market has dramatically altered the makeup of the industry's consumer base and has prompted a basic change in the quality and variety of films being made.

Five years ago, the major studios were almost exclusively the manufacturers of teen-age toys. Adult theme movies were left to independent film-makers and boutique distributors, and summers were virtually conceded to people who were still growing up.

Pick a summer early in this decade and you'll have trouble finding a film that didn't include lasers, slit throats or giddy shower scenes. In 1983, Avedon Eberhart was modestly rewarded for releasing Ingmar Bergman's "Fanny and Alexander" during the summer, and a year later, Universal — dropped John Huston's "Under the Volcano" off at a few the-

aters.

It wasn't until 1986, however, when another Huston film proved to the industry that a good adult-theme movie could do good business during the summer. "Prizzi's Honor," a sophisticated-gangster comedy that also beat the odds against early re-

leases getting Oscar nominations, grossed nearly \$26 million.

Hector Babenco's "The Untouchables," and John Boorman's "The Emerald Forest" also did well that summer, and the ones on adult-oriented summer films was lifted. Last summer, there were more than a dozen certifiably "smart" pictures playing in theaters and a couple of them — "A Fish Called Wanda" and "Bull Durham" — did some smart business for their distributors.

Some of the other films released last summer, unthinkable choices three or four years earlier, were "Married to the Mob," "Turk 182," "The Last Temptation of Christ," "Eight Men Out," "Clean and Sober," "Crossing Delancey" and "Midnight Run."

TV producer, Don Mischer, will have to go heavily on production values to distinguish it.

Take musicals — the theater form that Broadway invented. The Tony Award for Best Musical used to go to a new show, like "Fiddler on the Roof" or "West Side Story." The leading contender for the best musical of 1989 is "Jerome Robbins Broadway." It features numbers from "West Side Story" and "Fiddler on the Roof."

Usually there are four contenders for Best Musical. This year, there were only three. Why? Probably because "Ligeia Diamond" might have received the fourth nomination, and everybody would have burst out laughing.

There won't be an award for Best

Book or Best Score this year, either. So much for the Broadway musical at the end of the 20th century.

Now let's look at the Best Play category. This used to be won by plays like "Death of a Salesman" and "Streetcar Named Desire" and "Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?" The play with the most nominations this year (seven) is — "Lend Me a Tenor."

Actually, it's more likely that this year's Best Play will be Wendy Wasserstein's "The Heidi Chronicles." It is useful and charming, and it is about something: woman's liberation as it has worked out in practice since the sixties. It's not a heavy-weight play, but it's a nice middleweight one, and it's good to have it on Broadway.

Where "A Heidi" come from?

Off Off Broadway: Playwrights Horizons. It also had a workshop at the Shubert Theatre.

That's typical these days. Year ago, plays were written directly for Broadway. Today almost all Broadway product — the word is used without irony or apology — comes from someplace else.

There are two ways to look at this change. Critics tend to say it means that Broadway has lost its position as the creative center of the American theater — that it has become a kind of shopping mall for whatever good, bad or indifferent stuff a producer has the money to bring in from "Nicholas Nickleby" to "Moose Murders."

But Off Broadway and Off Off Broadway get no recognition at all.

'Roadhouse' may be the worst movie of the year

For Patrick Swayze, the handsome actor who showed so much promise in "Dirty Dancing" in back-to-back pictures, "Roadhouse" is back to bad. It has little competition for worst picture of the year so far. Its

only pluses are a lot of unintended laugh lines.

"Roadhouse" is the embarrassingly awful tale of Dalton, a one-time philosophy student who made his fortune calling as a nightclub bouncer. Swayze as Dalton is not just any

bouncer, mind you. He's the ultimate "cooler," the bouncer that all others emulate. And he has the cuts, bruises, scars and attack marks to prove it. When the owner of a trashy, violence-ridden club decides to clean it up, he hires Dalton for the job. First, of course, he (and we) must watch

Dalton toss around a bunch of drunk cops, get stabbed in the arm and — before our very eyes — use needles and thread to stitch up his bloody wound.

The moviemakers behind "Roadhouse" take perverse pleasure in showing medical-technician closeups of oozing wounds. The patchwork script inflicted on us by David Lee Henry and Hilary Henken meanders from one barroom brawl to another, and throws in some sex, foul language and a slimy villain played to the hilt by Ben Gazzara.

With clichés flying, the actors actually mutter such lines as: "This town isn't big enough for both of us," and "This is our town and don't you forget it."

Swayze, who spends a lot of time with his shirt off and even shows some fannies, appears unsure if he's playing Rambo with Stallone-like grained muscles, or a cowboy hero of the past come to clean up this old town. Director Howard Herrington doesn't give him much help in defining the role, but neither does the script, which reads like a farmer for the town doctor, Kelly Lynch, and engaging in a gratuitously raunchy sex scene. What ever happened to the taste and sensitivity of "Dirty Dancing?"

In a fittingly disgusting finale, Swayze winds up in another fight

and rips out the windpipe of his opponent with his bare hands. Then he's a bloody mess under a cover at the home of the villain with blood and guts everywhere.

"Give me a break!" groaned a

viewer at a recent screening of "Roadhouse" as the audience began to laugh in all the wrong places. "Roadhouse" is rated R for sex, coarse and language, and never was such a rating more deserved.

'Cameron's Closet' is dull movie

CAMERON'S CLOSET (R) — An ancient demon takes up residence in a telekinetic 10-year-old's closet, which she uses to keep peeking into the lives of her parents. Kevin Costner as Mel Harris (whisper something) hardly elevates the dull, gory, proceed- ing-as-a-psychiatrist, low-budget, glibly-stumbled-upon redeeming element in casting Tab Hunter as a drooling zombie.

CRIMINAL LAW (R) — Gary Oldman is electrifying as a brash Boston attorney who successfully defends a murder charge only to become convinced he's building serial rapist-murderer. Unfortunately, the film itself is routine and obnoxious.

DEAD CALM (R) — Cracking-good thrillers are harder to find these days, possibly because the audiences for them seem to have gotten more demanding. Into this void sails

"Dead Calm," a spare, smart, seductive piece of real movie making with (almost) every loophole covered, a superlative cast (Sam Neill, Nicole Kidman, Billy Zane) and enough tension to keep us all hyperventilating for hours. Directed by "Newsfront" crackerjack Philip Nozles.

DISORGANIZED CRIME (R) — Pleasant but needlessly drawn-out caper comedy in which an ill-assorted bunch of crooks (Fred Gwynne, Ruben Blades, Lou Diamond Phillips, William Russ) attempt to rob a bank in a small Montana town, despite their leader (Corbin Bernsen) being chased by a pair of New Jersey cops (comedian stars Ed O'Neill and Dan Riebeck). Written and directed by Jim Kouf, who also wrote "Stakeout."

THE DREAM TEAM (PG-13) — Howard Zieff's new comedy is clearly derived from the movie "One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest" that you might begin to wonder when Jack Nicholson will show up. This

amiable slick farce stars Michael Keaton, Christopher Lloyd and Peter Boyle as a curiously funny trio with Stephen Furst playing the weakest role, although he has a great comic waddle, running along helplessly behind them like a chafed turtle.

FIELD OF DREAMS (PG) — A movie about crazy dreams and impossible reunions, "Field of Dreams" provides a total loss of cinematic function at Sacramento, an instrument of near- holy reconciliation between the gen-

erations — with Kevin Costner as an ex-convict rabid and Iowa farmer who receives heavenly instructions to construct a diamond in his cornfield and await some mysterious visitations. It is probably as heartfelt a movie as any major studio has given us recently, but the heartland setting is a little too underpopulated, the populist parable a little too bald, and the political conflicts avoided or softened. The movie's charm quite reaches the magical; Capra-esque fusion of faith and fantasy it wants.

'Indiana Jones' has 3rd best opening

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — "Indiana Jones and the Last Crusade" enjoyed the third-best opening night in movie history, according to box-office figures released Thursday.

Some moviegoers, including 40 fans at the Chinese Theater on Hollywood Boulevard, camped out overnight to be the first to see Jones' latest exploits.

Some admired themselves in Jones' regalia and a few even carried bull whips or replica revolvers for dispatching imaginary evildoers.

The third, and perhaps final, chapter in the adventures of the 1930s archaeologist played by Harrison Ford collected more than \$5.62 million on a 2,327 movie screens Wednesday night, \$68,000 less than opening night campaign "Return of the Jedi" and "Rocky IV."

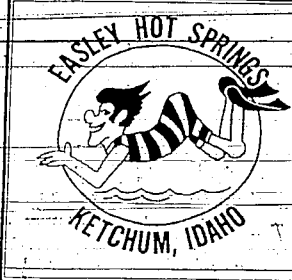

Dimpling said... He declined to say how much the new project would cost. Officials at the three major TV networks said that Nielsen was outlining the proposal for them later this week. But their initial response was cool. "I think that the 'if all goes well' is a big if," said Barry Cook, NBC vice president for media research. "Because there's a lot more to an audience measurement system than a technology."

"We would use this technology only in households where people had agreed to have the technology installed," John A. Dimpling, Nielsen executive vice president, told a news conference here. "We're not scanning the room to find out what they're doing," he added, only identifying, on a "second-by-second" basis, who is watching what program and when. If the technology and methodology and value for cost proves feasible, he said, the new system could start replacing the people-meter ratings technology three years from now. "If everything goes well, that's our goal — to have a passive system for measuring television audiences that would replace the current system."

Every year the cry goes up: Broadway is dead. The last good show was 30 years ago. No one goes to the theater any more.

This year, the cry was particularly strong, as critics and theatergoers alike clocked over high ticket prices, lack of originality and limited selection of shows. But there are still a few standouts, a few dark horses and enough suspense to make the past Broadway season—and the honors for that season—surprising and exciting. "The 43rd Annual Tony Awards," hosted by Angela Lansbury, will air Sunday, June 4, on CBS.

The most prestigious category is Best Musical. Musicals are traditionally the most expensive, most popular and slowest shows on Broadway. The two biggest shows to open this year were "Jerome Robbins' Broadway," which includes a bevy of musical numbers from such Robbins classics as "West Side Story" and "On the Town," and "Black and Blue," a glittery celebration of blues and jazz. Both are essentially compilations of old songs, leading some critics to argue that neither show should be eligible. Yet because of a lack of competition (the other nominee is "Starmites," a feeble comic-book fantasy), they are the top contenders. A hunger for nostalgic, old-fashioned musicals should also help propel

"Jerome Robbins' Broadway" to victory.

Best Play also carries a great deal of prestige. Wendy Wasserstein's "The Heidi Chronicles," an achingly funny slice-of-life about one woman over the course of several years, has already landed the Pulitzer Prize and is the clear favorite. Bill Irwin's brief, brash, avant-garde "Largely New York" is probably too experimental to receive serious consideration. The farce "Lend Me a Tenor" opened to mixed reviews, as well as the inevitable grumbling about British imports. And the one-woman show "Shirley Valentine" will not, for many people, fit the definition of a play.

An award with some real suspense is Best Performance by a Leading Actor in a Play. Although "Metamorphosis" received largely negative write-ups, dancer Mikhail Baryshnikov was widely praised for his amazingly athletic contortions on stage in his role as an insect. He has to be the favorite, but he could face stiff competition from "new vaudevillian" Bill Irwin ("Largely New York") and established stage actor Philip Bosco ("Lend Me a Tenor").

Best Revival of a Play or Musical might see some competition between

the widely praised American standard "Our Town," by Thornton Wilder, and the cheerful Yiddish play "Cafe Crown."

For Best Actress, Joan Allen ("The Heidi Chronicles") is the strongest contender, largely because of the accolades heaped on the play. But Pauline Collins ("Shirley Valentine") has emerged as a surprise favorite, because of her sustained humor and energy. And Best Supporting Actor or Actress in a Musical finds the nominees fairly evenly matched, although Jason Alexander ("Jerome Robbins' Broadway") and Ruth Brown ("Black and Blue") provide strong stage presences and memorable performances.

But the nice thing about the Tonys (or any awards show) is that it is still a competition, and anything can happen. Think about Truman and Dewey, and even "Starmites" can be seen in a different light.

ON THE COVER Angela Lansbury, a four-time Tony winner herself, will host "The 43rd Annual Tony Awards." It airs Sunday, June 4, on CBS.

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ABC holds unseen 'Lucy' shows

Q: Aren't there some never-shown "I Love Lucy" shows hidden in a secret vault at one of the TV networks? — B.I.

A: The news is intriguing. The unseen shows are not episodes in the classic original "I Love Lucy" series, however, but ABC's "Life With Lucy," Lucille Ball's last series, a flop. Thirteen episodes were filmed out of an originally scheduled 22, and of those 13 only eight were ever broadcast. The other five are still in a vault. Wonder what will happen to them.

Q: Is it true that Hollywood producers are avoiding Richard Pryor because of his personal quirks and drug history? — I.P.

A: There's no question that Pryor has given more than one producer major headaches and that his movie career has dipped in recent years. But he's still a star to be reckoned with. His latest film, "See No Evil, Hear No Evil," a comedy with Gene Wilder, is doing quite well, thank you; he's busy making another comedy with Hollywood's top star, Eddie Murphy; and Wilder, Richard's

Apart from getting their teeth capped, none of the studio's actors or actresses except Gable agreed.

As a result, producers are cutting costs by limiting star appearances and have cast Collins in only 13 of this season's 22 episodes. That's why you've been seeing less of her.

A: Don't be too hard on him. At 31 and the father of three, he's tired of the teeth jokes and the question, "Where's Marie?" Don, as he now prefers to be called, wants to be taken seriously as a popular musician-singer. Gone is the "Puppy Love" image of the '70s. Osmond's latest album, his first hit in years, is titled "Soldier of Love." Don is still the straight arrow that Donny was; he's just grown up.

NBC sweeps the top 10 slots with 'My Name is Steven'

NEW YORK (AP) — NBC swept the Nielsen top 10 for the second time in three weeks and won its 49th week in a row, taking the top two spots in the ratings with its acclaimed two-part movie "I Know My First Name is Steven."

"I Know My First Name is Steven," the fact-based story of teen-ager who returned to his family after seven years in the captivity of the pedophile who kidnapped him, had an average rating last week of 24.6 and a 39 share and was the highest-rated multipart movie of the season, second only to CBS' four-part "Lonesome Dove."

The rest of the A.C. Nielsen Co. top 10 were "Cheers," "The Cosby Show," "A Different World," "Golden Girls," "Dear John," "Empty Nest," "Hunter" and "L.A.

Law."

The 11th show was CBS' Sunday movie, "Kojak: The Price of Justice."

NBC won the week ending May 28 with a 14.1 rating to CBS' 10.1 and ABC's 9.1.

Three weeks ago, NBC had the top 11 shows and said the last time a network accomplished such a feat was 1979, when ABC had the miniseries "Roots II."

The "CBS Evening News" was atop the news ratings last week, when the uprising in China continued to be the big story. CBS had an average rating of 9.2 and a 21 share, "ABC World News Tonight" an 8.8 and 19 share, and "NBC Nightly News" an 8.4 and 19.

Each rating point equals 904,000 households with television.

PBS's "Living With Disasters" (Wednesday night) is the real thing. Earthquakes. Volcanos. Tornados and hurricanes, washing away beaches and the prime real estate that sits on them. Nature at work, with a fury beyond anything devised in Hollywood's special-effects studios.

The only trouble with "Living With Disasters" is that there isn't quite enough footage of the real thing for a thrill-seeking, movie-going viewer. What is there is fascinating:

—Japanese children who live in the shadow of Mount Sakurajima, a volcano that erupts 200 times a year, wearing hard-hats to school.

—Tunnels bored into the volcano to measure movement, enabling predictions that are 70 percent accurate.

—Observation cameras recording mud traveling down safety channels and tripping wires to alert residents that they are in danger of a potentially fatal mud slide.

—Japanese businessmen gazing in horror as the building where they are meeting begins to collapse during an earthquake.

—Armenians gathered around Mikhail Gorbachev as he tries to explain that Soviet scientists had no way of knowing that an earthquake was to strike their area.

—A Colombian child trapped in the ruins of her home, up to her neck in mud, but waving to news cameras. Sixty hours later she died, becoming one of 22,000 people in a village of 25,000 wiped out by a mud flow that came in the night, the result of a volcanic eruption in the Andes.

Like most of "The Infinite Voyage" specials, this one spends a lot of time with scientists. Perhaps that's a good thing. Scientists take a long-term view and offer suggestions, if not solutions.

North Carolina native Stephen Leatherman, director of the University of Maryland's Laboratory for Coastal Research at College Park, tracked the erosion of the beach at Ocean City, Md., with a computer program and then helped the town

with its potentially disastrous problem.

Ocean City, sitting on a barrier island 10 miles long and only half a mile wide, is home to some of the most expensive real estate on the eastern seaboard—its prime industry is tourism, and tourists come for the beach.

But the beach was eroding rapidly from the hurricanes that come up from the Outer Banks of the Carolinas. There, he said, erosion is claiming as much as 10 feet of shoreline a year, edging toward the beach homes built on pilings.

"Last summer," said Leatherman, "we did some reports showing Ocean City that they were terribly vulnerable. At Ocean City, the sand dunes were knocked down so people could build their houses closer in the building boom of the '70s. But now we're faced with lack of control."

Ocean City itself, he said, is appraised at \$2.5 billion, expensive real estate that sits in great jeopardy as the shore loses more than two feet each year. So Ocean City listened when Leatherman suggested that the city begin "beach nourishment," retrieving sand from farther out and rebuilding the beach. In the first phase of a long-term project, 2 million cubic yards of sand has been pumped in, adding 220 feet to the beach along the 8-mile stretch.

"The problem is that it's not cheap—\$12 million for 100 feet, eight miles wide, and they're not even finished," said Leatherman. "We have to continue to nourish that beach—it's not a permanent solution. Ocean City is between the rock and the hard place. It's a bad situation, with long-term recurring cost. The state of Maryland has had to pay the piper."

The entire project will cost \$60 million and require constant maintenance.

From June to November, the National Hurricane Center in Coral Gables, Fla., tracks the violent storms. The last disastrous hurricane was Camille, in 1969, which devastated the Gulf coast where it hit, but Leatherman says another storm is due soon — "it's only a matter of time."

Leatherman won't be watching

"Living With Disasters" this week. He is in China, lecturing at Beijing University. — "They're starting coastal developments," he said, "and we're going to try to work with them on that."

Hurricanes, of course, are not the only disasters that befall this planet. Earthquakes rattle the ground as the plates that form the continents shift periodically.

Some, as in the Midwestern and Eastern United States, haven't moved very much in recorded time. Others, such as those in Japan, Turkey, Northern Italy, China, Mexico City and, recently, in Armenia, have. In the United States, the San Andreas fault is due for another major move, according to scientists who track its shifts.

In Menlo Park, Calif., geologist-seismologist Allan Lindh works as chief scientist of the Parkfield Earthquake Prediction Experiment. What is so fascinating about tiny Parkfield, in California's agricultural valley near Fresno, is that it endures a quake with remarkable regularity—about every 22 years, measuring about 6 on the Richter Scale. The last earthquake in Parkfield was in 1966. "We don't know if the true inter-event time is 21 or 22 or 23 — one came early," Lindh said. "But in our hearts we think the next one will be this year or next."

Because Parkfield has no high-rise buildings to fall the people there are not particularly afraid of earthquakes. Lindh said they are also proud to be part of the Parkfield experiment. But children who attend the town's one-room school (kindergarten through sixth grade; all taught by Dwayne Hammond) practice earthquake drills periodically, since the school sits only 100 yards from the San Andreas faultline.

Lindh's staff of about 75 scientists is studying what kinds of signals precede a quake, making Parkfield the world's most intensely monitored earthquake zone.

Underground wires measure the movement of the plates and a laser tracks a movement as small as one millimeter over a span 7 miles wide between two hilltops.





 Roches, a singing trio of sisters with a decidedly different spin on the meaning of friendship; and a couple of kibitzing New York cabbies. But as interviewer-host of the show (to be broadcast between June 3 and 17 around the country), Winfrey brings the conversation back time and time again to her best friend; King.
 The show opens with what has to be much-edited-for-television chitchat — with King filmed in shorts and T-shirt in her Meriden, Conn. home, and Winfrey, in a bathrobe, kicking up her feet on the other end of the line in her Chicago apartment.

It was a late-night talk one stormy evening in November 1976 that brought them together. Winfrey, then the news anchor at WJZ in Baltimore, invited King, a production assistant at the station, to spend the night at her apartment rather than risk a drive home to Chevy Chase, Md. And they have been talking ever since.

"I talk to her so much that when she comes to town, there's not another thing left to say," said Winfrey over the phone from Chicago, as King, on the line in Hartford,

laughed.
 These are the almost umbilical ties that bind them, phone lines stretched between Baltimore and Washington, D.C.; Baltimore and Kansas City, Mo., and, in recent years, between Chicago and Hartford.

Winfrey, 35, and King, 34, say they have not missed calling each other more than a day or two in the past decade, calling sometimes two or three times a day.

And what, in heaven's name, do they talk about?

"We don't know anybody to gossip about," Winfrey said. "We don't have any mutual friends, so we talk about what happened on my show and what happened in her newsroom."

"It's not like we have exciting conversations," King added. "We talk about normal stuff."

Judging by the phone interview, scheduled for one hour but which ran closer to two, the Winfrey-King exchanges are something any pair of close friends could appreciate but something only these two could understand.

And they do go on.

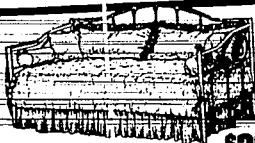

And Winfrey, a multimillionaire who is known to have bouts of Elvis-like generosity, once offered King \$200,000 a year to stay home with her children after King, who admitted she had been "boo-hoing" at length over the phone, voiced concern about the logistics of raising a second child when her first was just a year old.

King and her husband, Bill Bumpus, were not comfortable with the idea of accepting such a gift. So Winfrey instead opened an account for the purpose of getting King and Bumpus a life-altering live-in-nanny.

When it is pointed out that their friendship might seem saccharine to outsiders, King responds, "Oh, I know. I wish we had something to tell you that was really obnoxious."

But they don't.

Instead, they report, they have never had a fight (though they had a spat once when Winfrey left King but not some other friends) behind on a late-night visit to Quincy Jones).

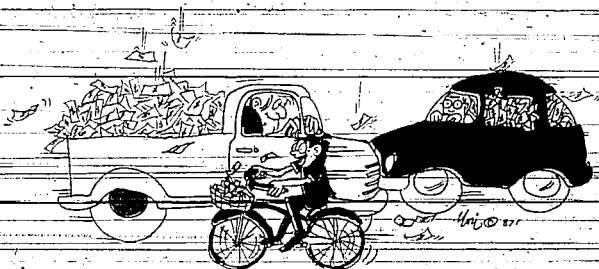
Some people, including one of Winfrey's ex-boyfriends who got the heave-ho, think it is a little much at times.

And some eyebrows undoubtedly will be raised when Winfrey discloses in the show, apparently for the first time, that the day King was married was "the worst day of my life."

"It's the first time I ever really brought it up," said Winfrey of that segment. "I really did think it would be the end of our relationship as I knew it. I didn't think our relationship was going to end; I just thought nobody is going to tolerate Gayle and I spending as much time on the phone as we do."

There is no denying that there is a special relationship.

King flies out once every six weeks, one of her two children in tow, to have her hair done by Winfrey's stylist in Chicago — a long way to go for a haircut, even if, as King says, "It's just an excuse to see Oprah."



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
