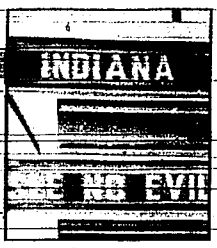

## House task force endorses Stallings' SIS plans

WASHINGTON — A House Armed Services Committee task force on Thursday endorsed the key elements of a compromise Energy Department budget scheme that Rep. Richard Stallings said will keep alive a proposed nuclear weapons plant for Idaho while increasing the money for radioactive waste cleanup.

together and won the backing of task force chairman John Spratt, D-S.C.  
Spratt, who had labeled the Stallings plan generally acceptable, called the task force action "a step in the direction Congressman Stallings wanted to go."  
Stallings, working with other Idaho leaders, put the alternative spending scheme together because Spratt's opposition to SIS construction threatened to doom the entire project.  
As expected, the panel cut \$75 million the Bush administration sought for actual

construction of the Special Isotope Separation project slated for the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory. Spratt had said earlier in the week he could not support actual construction financing, at least in the 1990 budget plan reviewed by the panel.  
That action was hailed by the anti-nuclear Snake River Alliance as "confirmation that the tide has turned against SIS," a \$1 billion laser-driven plutonium refinery.  
But while Stallings conceded the alliance had been effective in lobbying against SIS

construction, the task force backed his proposal to earmark \$10 million for further design work on the SIS, and it also joined Spratt in endorsing \$83 million for final work to develop the SIS laser technology.  
Since that development work will take another 16 months, Stallings said he did not "think you would have seen construction anyway since the technology hasn't been finalized."  
In addition, the task force endorsed the administration's full request of \$30.5 million for 1990 development of another Energy

Department nuclear weapons program — the next-generation reactor that includes an experimental facility at INEL to produce tritium for nuclear warhead. An attempt by Colorado Democrat Pat Schroeder to cut \$109 million from that program was narrowly rejected.  
From the money saved in denying construction funds for SIS, the task force earmarked \$35 million for radioactive waste cleanup at federal nuclear facilities throughout the country and \$20 million to

## 30 tons of fish die in ponds

FILER — An estimated \$60,000 of fish floated on their backs Thursday in three farm ponds north of town, apparently killed by an herbicide.  
To a small operator like Rick Eggleston, "it's almost devastating," Eggleston said. The 30 tons of fish, worth about \$1 per pound, were not insured.  
"Little insurance is available to cover such a loss," Eggleston said. "What is available is expensive, he said.

Eggleston and his wife, Cheryl, think the fish were killed by a chemical used to rid irrigation canals of moss. The farm ponds are connected with the Twin Falls Canal Co. system.  
Canal-maintenance workers were cleaning moss from an irrigation ditch Wednesday using a gas known as Magnacide H, which is injected into the canal water to kill moss, canal company manager Jack Eakin said.  
But he said he didn't know whether the work had killed the fish.  
"We do everything we can to avoid that," Eakin said. "But sometimes it happens anyway, he added.

Eggleston said he hopes the company will reimburse him for his loss.  
If they don't, "I'm dead in the water," he said.  
But Eakin said a 1978 agreement with the original builder of the fish ponds absolved the company of responsibility for harm to the fish from de-mossing operations.  
Eggleston said he has been asking the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency for years to ban the chemical.  
"I'll kill you dead in your tracks," he said.  
The poisonous chemical is said for control of submerged and floating weeds in irrigation

## Idaho, Boise State student fee boost gains board's OK

LEWISTON — The Idaho Board of Education on Thursday voted unanimously for a student fee increase at the University of Idaho and Boise State University.  
The board, meeting at Lewis-Clark State College, also approved new guidelines governing ownership of discoveries and inventions by state college and university faculty.  
The board is to take up the issue of presidential salary raises at BSU, Idaho State University and LSCS today.  
The education board also approved UI administrators' request to increase the school's full-time undergraduate matriculation fee by \$25 a semester, to \$270; non-resident tuition by \$100, to \$1,050; part-time undergraduate-matriculation by \$5 per credit hour, to \$55; and the graduate student fee by \$10 a semester, to \$175.  
The increases will raise about \$630,000 per year.  
The vote came after testimony from three UI students who opposed

the hikes and three who supported them.  
The proposal had sparked student protests in Moscow, and opponents said administrators failed to get input from foes of the hikes.  
Proponents said the increase is needed to maintain a quality education at UI. They spoke of dilapidated facilities, outdated equipment and teaching vacancies.  
Board member J. Ray Cox summed up the arguments of UI administrators when he said, "I don't think anyone who really wants an education is going to let \$5 prevent them from getting it."  
The new policy regarding inventions and discoveries is designed to encourage commercial development of new technology at the state's higher education institutions.  
It sets guidelines by which schools and colleges can take innovations to the marketplace and put them into commercial use.  
Under the policy, the institutions can grant rights to "owned

## Court bars rights law as harassment guard

WASHINGTON — The Supreme Court on Thursday upheld a key civil rights law as a weapon against private discrimination but barred its use to fight racial harassment such as assignment to menial tasks on the job.  
Civil rights groups, finding little solace that a larger defeat was avoided, expressed outrage and called the ruling the fourth major setback the court has dealt minorities and women this year.  
A newly solidified conservative majority led by appointees of former President Reagan is undoing civil rights progress that began in the mid-1950s, the groups said.  
"This Supreme Court term has been a disaster for all those committed to equal employment opportunity," said Benjamin Hooks and Ralph News of the Leadership Conference of Civil Rights.  
"In several rulings... a slim majority of the court has turned back the clock on advances which so many worked long and hard to

achieve," said Marcia Greenberger of the National Women's Law Center.  
The justices sparked an uproar in the civil rights community last year by announcing they would use the relatively obscure case of a black North Carolina bank teller to consider throwing out the 1976 ruling.  
Some of the outrage was muted Thursday when the court retreated from that threat. But civil rights activists angrily noted that Thursday's decision came on the heels of three major defeats for minorities and women's rights.  
Last January, the court banned racial quotas in the awarding of

## Bright lights can reset body clock, defeat jet lag

WASHINGTON — Overnight travelers to Europe arrive by dawn's early light, just in time to sink into the weary sluggishness of jet lag.  
There's a better way, says a scientist who is studying how to reset the body clock.  
Dr. Charles Czeisler and his colleagues have succeeded in moving test subjects' body clocks forward or backward with some consistency but only in carefully controlled experiments and not yet with enough precision to be a useful therapy for travelers.

Eventually, said Czeisler, a researcher at Brigham and Women's Hospital in Boston, scientists will be able to use light to treat jet lag, insomnia and other problems with the body's wake-sleep cycle.  
In a study to be published today, Czeisler said, he and fellow investigators have demonstrated that light of about the intensity of the rising sun can cause the body to reset its biological clock.  
When such light shows up at the wrong time, it can plunge the body's wake-sleep cycle — called the circadian rhythm — into a warring disorder that is out of phase with the sun. Airline travelers

know this as jet lag, but it's also a problem for night-shift workers and for thousands of people with sleep disorders, said Czeisler.  
The typical overnight airline trip from the U.S. to Europe, he said, aggravates jet lag for most people.  
"When you leave here to fly overnight to London, the light arrives over there at 6 or 7 in the morning," he said. "When you go outside, you are getting an exposure to light that is resetting you in exactly the opposite direction than what you wish to be set. It is resetting you for Hawaii, see CLOCK on Page A2

## Dogged police work collars suspects in pet extortion scheme

SPARTANBURG, S.C. — A neighbor who found a woman's missing dog forced her to increase her reward fourfold and set up a nighttime drop at a gas station, police said.  
But dogged police work resulted in the capture of four people on extortion conspiracy charges, and Sheila Hawkins got back her 5-year-old miniature Yorkshire terrier, Bentley, in good condition.  
The neighbor, 18-year-old construction

worker Ronnie Blackwell, told police he'd grown fond of the shaggy little dog he said he found by the public library nearly a half mile from Ms. Hawkins' home in this northwestern South Carolina city of about 44,000 people.  
"He said he had become really attached to the dog and felt if he kept upping the price, the lady would just think the dog wasn't worth it," city police Detective Audrey McNair said Wednesday.  
Bentley had been missing since June 8.

Ms. Hawkins, a 30-year-old hairstylist, put out fliers offering a \$50 reward for the dog's return.  
On Sunday, she received a phone call from a man who said he had the dog, and promised to bring him to her house for the reward, authorities said.  
Bentley never arrived. Instead, a woman called three times Sunday, told Ms. Hawkins, "We have the dog," and said \$50 wouldn't be enough, according to a police report. The woman identified herself as a

mother whose son had found the dog and was strongly attached to him.  
During one call, a man said Bentley's captors wanted \$200, the report said.  
Ms. Hawkins agreed to the price, but the dog wasn't returned. She said she offered the callers a puppy the next time she had Bentley but they weren't interested.  
On Tuesday, one of the captors' relatives saw a television news report on the missing dog, and apparently persuaded the four they'd better return it, authorities said. They

called Ms. Hawkins to say they'd return him that night.  
That evening, she got a call instructing her to go to a gas station to get her dog, but no money was demanded at that time.  
Detective McNair was at Ms. Hawkins' home when the call came. She accompanied her to the gas station, where the three people waiting were arrested.  
A fourth person, 18-year-old Rebecca Entsminger, was arrested when she showed up at the police station later.

# High court upholds paternity statute

The Washington Post — The Supreme Court Thursday refused to let a California man who is almost certainly a child's natural father establish his "paternity" rights because the child's mother was married to another man.

In a splintered 5-to-4 ruling, the court upheld the constitutionality of a California law that creates a conclusive "presumption" that a married woman's husband is the father of her child so long as he is living with her and not sterile or impotent.

The case, whose fact pattern more closely resembled a soap opera synopsis than a typical Supreme Court case, involved an "international model," identified as Carole D., who had an affair with a neighbor, Michael H., while living with her husband, Gerald D.

Carole gave birth to a child, Victoria, in May 1981. Blood tests demonstrated — 99.07-percent probability that Michael was Victoria's father. During Victoria's first three years, she and Carole lived on and off with Gerald, Michael and a third man. Carole reconciled

with Gerald in 1984.

When Michael sought to prove that he was the child's father and obtain visitation rights, Gerald argued that an 1872 state law required the finding that he was the child's legal father.

Michael then contended that by denying him the opportunity to prove his paternity, the law violated his constitutional due process rights. The California courts rejected his claims, and the claim by a lawyer appointed to represent Victoria's interests, that he should be granted visitation rights.

ditches and must be applied by a licensed professional applicator who must follow the label directions. Water samples from the ponds are on their way to a lab for analysis.

Expectation is concerned about more than just his fish. He said he

has asked the EPA about how much of the chemical may be getting into groundwater and drinking water supplies.

"Nobody can tell me what happens to cattle that drink it," he said. He also worries about kids fishing in treated canals. He fears kids might catch and eat fish that have

been poisoned but aren't dead.

The Eggleston, fearing the fish may be tainted, plan to dispose of them instead of selling them to local milk farmers, which commonly buy fish-processing waste.

"You dig a hole and bury them," Cheryl Eggleston said.

instead of Europe.

"That may be one reason that traveling to Europe is so difficult," he added.

Czeisler said that a flight that arrives in Europe later in the day would be easier on the body clock, but too little is known yet about the effects of light on human circadian rhythm to precisely adjust travel times.

"The system is much more complicated than we previously thought," he explained.

Czeisler said the scientists found that by carefully controlling the light exposure, they could reset the body clock of the test subjects in any direction, depending on when the light was applied.

He said exposure at one part of the cycle would move the body clock backward, an eastward time shift, and that exposure at another time would have the opposite effect. Exposure at some points in the biological day, said Czeisler, would cause no change.

public works project by state and local governments.

On June 5, the justices restricted the use of statistical evidence to prove an employer illegally relegates minorities or women to lower-paying jobs.

And just Monday, the court significantly expanded the power of white men to challenge court-approved affirmative action plans, even years after those plans took effect.

Writing for the court Thursday, Justice Anthony M. Kennedy said that — concern — for — precedent — compelled a reaffirmation of the 1978 ruling.

Even if that ruling was based on a mistaken interpretation of law, he said, "it is certain that it is not inconsistent with the prevailing sense of justice in this country. To the contrary, (it) is entirely consistent with our society's deep commitment to the eradication of discrimination based on a person's race or the color of his or her skin."

But Kennedy said allowing suits

for racial harassment was not envisioned by the 1866 law.

That spelled defeat for Brenda Patterson, a North Carolina woman who was a teller at a credit union. She sued under the 1866 law, seeking actual and punitive damages for alleged harassment.

Her assignment-to-sweep floors, she said, constituted impermissible racial harassment.

Her suit had been dismissed by lower courts.

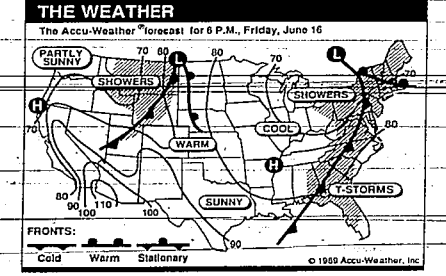
Kennedy said the 1866 law governs contractual rights — such as hiring and promotion decisions — and not other forms of conduct by an employer, such as assignments to tasks like sweeping floors.

A victim of racial harassment still could sue under the 1964 Civil Rights Act or various state laws. The 1964 act does not allow the recovery of punitive damages, while the 1866 act does. Also, the 1866 act applies to all employers, while the 1964 statute exempts employers of 15 or fewer people.

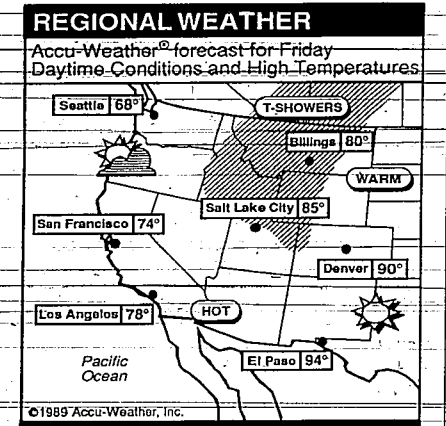
# Today's weather

## Cooler, scattered showers across region

**Twin Falls, Burley, Rupert, Jerome and Coaling:** Today much cooler. Partly cloudy with scattered showers and widely scattered thunderstorms. Highs mid 70s. West winds 20 to 30 mph. Tonight clearing and cooler. Lows in the 50s. Saturday sunny and warmer. Highs near 80. Camas Prairie and Wood River Valley:

**Summary:** The high pressure ridge over the Intermountain region Wednesday has moved to the east and is being replaced by a more southerly flow aloft. This flow is bringing moist and unstable air to Idaho.

Precipitation Thursday was confined mainly to the central mountains and northward, where some heavy amounts of rain were reported. Multin. has reported about an inch of rain and Lewiston has reported about two-thirds of an inch. Lightning detection equipment shows thunderstorms moving into western Idaho as well as the north central mountains. Temperatures around the southern portion of the state were in the 80s and low 90s. However, the northern portion under wet and cloudy skies made it only into the mid 60s.

The agriculture forecast for Southern Idaho — Percent of possible sunshine 50 to 60 percent today, 90 percent Saturday, 70 to 80 percent Sunday through Tuesday. Evaporation near normal Friday, above normal Saturday through Monday and near normal Tuesday. Sunrise departs Friday 5:50 to 5:55 and Saturday 4:45 to 4:45. Four inch temperatures will be 75 to 80 through Tuesday. Up to one-third of an inch of rain from showers and thunderstorms mainly Friday and

Sunday through Tuesday. Wind west 10 to 20 mph Friday with gusts to 40 mph in the east and Saturday variable 5 to 10 mph.

The hottest temperature in the state Thursday was 96 degrees at Mountain Home Air Force Base while Stanley reported the coldest at 42 degrees.

Elsewhere in the nation Thursday, the highest temperature was 117 degrees at Bullhead City, Ariz. The lowest was 31 at Shell Lake, Wis.

intellectual property" to research foundations for further development of transfer, can themselves act as licensees, can grant exclusive rights to a licensee, and can collect and disperse license payments to inventors, their departments and the school itself to fund research.

The policy also spells out conflict of interest instances under which a state education employee cannot participate in technology transfer deals, such as when a professor owns stock in a company involved in the transaction.

The policy adopted by the board merely sets general state guidelines.

It will be up to the individual colleges and universities to draw up specific details, which then must be approved by the board.

Idaho and Idaho State, for example, already have proposed policies under which an inventor receives a certain percentage of profits.

"This policy (adopted by the board) will be a significant boost to research for the state. It encourages faculty and students to not only make discoveries but to bring them forward," said Edwin House, dean of graduate studies and research at ISU.

In other action:

The personnel and administrative committee voted to recommend to the full-board adoption of a policy at Lewis-Clark State that bars a faculty-member staff from having an "amorous relationship" with a student who is enrolled in the person's class or is subject to that person's supervision or evaluation.

The finance committee heard a report that compared salaries at Idaho schools with those at "peer institutions." The report said fiscal year 1989 salaries at BSU, ISU, UI and LSCS were on the average 6.92 percent lower than those at comparable out-of-state colleges and universities.

spread up work on the Fuel Processing Restoration project at INEL, part of the government's uranium recovery modernization program.

Because of the complexity of the projects involved, the task force recommendations were expected to be endorsed by the full House, said Chuck Fant said.

Stallings had sought the money for the modernization project to offset the loss of jobs in eastern Idaho because of the bar on SIS. Under current budget rules, increased spending in one area must be offset by spending cuts in another.

recommended only \$35 million and left it to the department's discretion where to spend it. The department has already promised to spend \$466 million cleanup at INEL over the next five years.

Spratt said ultimately panel members hoped to add \$300 million to the department's environmental cleanup budget, but that will only be possible when the entire defense complex spending plan comes to a vote in the full Armed Services Committee or the House floor.

To head off an even deeper cut in the SIS budget, the task force made it clear that none of the \$40 million design money could be used for any work at INEL, including site preparation for the weapons plant.

Rep. Albert Bustamante, D-Texas, a staunch opponent of the SIS, had sought to cut the budget by \$105 million, leaving only \$10 million left for 1990 design work.

Idaho Sen. James McClure, a Republican who was consulted by Stallings on the alternative along with Gov. Cecil Andrus, said he discussed the Stallings proposal with Energy Secretary James Watkins, who "thinks they need a little bit more money and a little bit more flexibility."

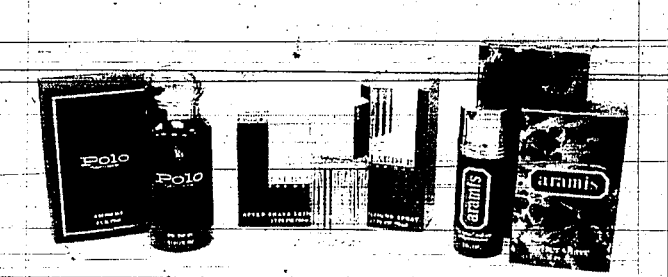
McClure said he would have no problem with the plan only if Watkins had been able to increase the SIS design budget to \$50 million to \$65 million so the project could be kept on schedule to begin operating in 1995.

# Critics assail DOE's plans to store radioactive waste at WIPP

SANTA FE, N.M. (AP) — Amid something of a carnival atmosphere, critics at a hearing here have taken turns lambasting Department of Energy plans to open the Waste Isolation Pilot Plant in southeastern

New Mexico. The first storm came Thursday at the opening of round-the-clock hearings on the project. Over 600 witnesses have signed up to speak. The DOE expects the Santa Fe hearings to continue through Saturday. "You must stop being so callous toward human life. You must stop being sloppy with your methods," Santa Fe City Councilman Peter Goodwin said, accusing DOE of losing its credibility in dealing with the thankless job of waste management. WIPP, east of Carlsbad, is a planned storage site for the Energy Department's transuranic waste — including clothes and tools contaminated by plutonium during weapons production. It would take waste from 10 sites, including the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory. However, WIPP was soundly criticized in Santa Fe, 300 miles north of the site. Opponents questioned if the 6.2 million cubic foot of waste bound for WIPP can be safely stored there or safely transported by truck through New Mexico.

## Briefly

### Woman faces desertion charges

POCATELLO (AP) — A 22-year-old Pocatello woman has been arrested on two felony charges associated with the abandonment of a newborn infant here last weekend. Bonneville County Prosecutor Larry Edholm said Thursday Susan Michelle McFarland, who lives in the building adjacent to the alleyway where the baby was found in a garbage bag Sunday, was arrested by Pocatello police.

She was charged with desertion of a child, a felony which carries penalties up to 14 years in prison, and causing injury to a child, which could bring up to 10 years in prison.

### Court rules on series of actions

BOISE (AP) — A separate series of events or actions must be proven to sentence a criminal defendant for both lewd conduct and rape in the same case, the Idaho Supreme Court says.

The court on Thursday unanimously upheld the convictions of Kurtie L. Bingham in a Bonneville County case. He was charged with kidnapping, lewd conduct and rape of a mentally retarded 12-year-old girl with the learning capacity of a 5-year-old.

But the Supreme Court unanimously vacated Bingham's sentence for lewd conduct, agreeing with the defense attorney that he should have been charged with one crime for what was essentially a single act.

### Teton is business council chairman

FORT HALL (AP) — Gilbert Teton is the new chairman of the Fort Hall Business Council, the governing body of eastern Idaho's Shoshone-Bannock Tribes.

Teton, 47, who won a seat on the council in a May 26 election, succeeds Marvin Osborne. Having previously served on the council in the late 1970s and early 1980s, Teton will hold the chairmanship for a one-year term.

### Lewiston woman dies in collision

PRESTON (AP) — A Lewiston, Utah, woman has died in a head-on collision near Preston, authorities reported.

The victim was identified as Ila Rogers, 64. The Franklin County Sheriff's Department said Mrs. Rogers was driving a vehicle with a boat in tow Thursday morning when the rig veered across the yellow line and hit an on-coming pickup truck.

### Nuclear plants need much closer oversight

To monitor safety violations at the Energy Department's Rocky Flats nuclear-weapons plant, the FBI had to resort to a spy plane.

A federal agent flew back and forth over the plant last December to collect evidence of illegal venting and dumping of toxic chemicals by another federal agency.

It was like an intelligence operation over a foreign country — the U-2 flights, for example, over the Soviet Union.

There could hardly be a clearer demonstration of the distance at which the nuclear weapons plants, a separate empire within the government, have managed to keep all the normal process of law enforcement.

The Justice Department swept into the plant last week with a search warrant and a team of 70 agents looking for evidence that Energy Department officials there had known for years about dangerous and illegal dumping.

This criminal investigation gives a new edge to a question that has been apparent for at least the past year:

How is the Secretary of Energy — and the federal government itself — to regain control over a maverick operation that, behind the veil of military security, has come to regard itself as beyond the law?

The extent of the health and safety violations at the nuclear weapons plants has been public knowledge for some time.

After much prodding from Congress, the Energy Department last September published a list of environmental hazards generated by the plants.

At the top of that list was Rocky Flats and the toxic chemicals that it has allowed to leak into groundwater — from which they may well have migrated into drinking water and into the crops being grown nearby. Rocky Flats is not in a remote area. It is 16 miles from Denver.

The present Secretary of Energy, Adm. James D. Watkins is a far stronger administrator and in every respect a tougher article than any of his predecessors in the Reagan years.

But he does not yet have a reliable grip on the weapons plants. There are some links missing from the chain of command.

While the criminal investigation proceeds, Watkins not only has to establish his own authority over these plants but also to demonstrate it clearly to a country that has increasing reason to be apprehensive.

He has to build into the system the kind of safety devices that will work reliably even under a less experienced and forceful secretary.

Although Congress last year established a safety board of outsiders — President Bush still has not made any appointments to it.

Putting that oversight board in business is one thing, along with much else, that the administration needs to accomplish quickly.

### Centennial Trail won't represent Idaho

In April 1987, the Idaho Trails Council — an umbrella organization taking in all types of trail users — endorsed the concept of an Idaho Centennial Trail.

The Lasting Legacy Committee of the Centennial Commission later proposed the Idaho Centennial Trail as an official Centennial project to "feature the best of Idaho's diverse scenic areas, cultural and historic sites (wilderness areas; Lewis-Clark Trail, Oregon Trail, etc.)"

The Idaho Department of Parks and Recreation was designated to implement the project. The National Park Service was signed on for technical

assistance; citizen (trail users) and agency committees representatives from each national forest and BLM district were formed to advise, help select the route, organize volunteers and meet National Environmental Policy Act requirements for developments on public lands.

In December 1988, the formal scoping document describing four possible routes was distributed for public comment. During the spring of 1989, in three meetings over a total of five days, the committees selected a preferred route, evaluating the four alternatives section by section using the Federal system of "Choosing by Advantages," which considers various factors, attributes and advantages to compute a numerical value for each route and theoretically arrive at the best choice.

The route selected is a reasonable choice between Canada and Hoodoo Pass (north of the Lochsa River) and from Nevada to Cape Horn (northeast of Stanley).

In Idaho's mid-section, however, the system chose to circumnavigate the entire Selway-Bitterroot and virtually all of the Frank Church-River of No Return Wildernesses, the largest nationally designated wilderness in the 48 states with world class scenery and large wild and scenic rivers.

Regardless of the system or reasons — and there are a couple, giving heavy weight to compatibility with current land management plans and Forest Service policy, for one — the result is ludicrous beyond comprehension.

Of all the outstanding projects in Idaho an official state trail would be expected to connect, these two wilderness areas would obviously be high on the list; yet the committee selected route goes out of its way to avoid them!

The justification is that: (1) policy and management plans discourage or prohibit designation of special trails in these areas; and (2) even if allowed such designation, it would attract additional people, adversely impact areas already on the threshold of overuse and require restrictions on the users. (Somewhere the original concept of picking a route that would best exemplify Idaho got turned around so that it would be the least bother to existing Forest Service plans and policies.)

Policies are changed and plans amended when there is good reason. Designating a special trail once in a hundred years to celebrate Idaho's Centennial should qualify as sufficient cause for modification.

As far as speculated overuse, if it occurs, the Forest Service has a whole suitcase of controls it can apply, as has been done in other areas, to hold impacts to acceptable levels.

One need look no further than the Pacific Crest Trail running the length of Washington, Oregon and California, states with populations many times Idaho's, to see a specially designated trail

through several wilderness areas where use constraints are applied as needed. The same can be done for Idaho's Centennial Trail.

Further, there are 28 trails totaling 2,616 miles with tie-in points in the River of No Return Wilderness and the Selway-Bitterroot probably has a similar proportion for its size. With this network available, certainly a routing can be worked out that will include representative sections of central Idaho wilderness and wild rivers, yet minimize designation of heavy-use trails.

Amendment to the River of No Return management plan will be required to accommodate the section of trail as proposed across the southern tip of the wilderness anyway, so wording to accommodate trail designation throughout is a minor change.

Regarding another weighty factor in route selection, the original concept recognized that while desirable to make the trail available to all users, restriction on vehicular travel (motors and mountain bikes) would apply on some sections (e.g., wilderness) and alternate routes should be provided for these trail users. This proposed routing actually provides such alternatives around the central wilderness — all that's needed is an acceptable route through the area.

An example that it can be done is the proposed route in the Sawtooths: one through the wilderness and alternate skirting the perimeter. Idaho's Centennial Celebration deserves a trail worthy of the name. Avoiding some of the state's finest outdoor resource does not hinder it.

To President George Bush:

In it, among other things, was the following statement: We are also pursuing the elimination of the U.S. Sugar Program through the agricultural negotiations in the Uruguay Round.

When you were a Presidential Candidate, we set together in a damp barn on a farm near Burley, Idaho. Part of the discussion centered on the U.S. Sugar Program as enacted in the 1986 Farm Bill.

I indicated to you that it had been an effective, no-cost program to the U.S. government and certainly had been a

Without Sugar beets, the bankruptcy rate and farm foreclosures would have been at a much higher level in our state.

We have seen no evidence of any of those kinds of adjustments being made by other sugar producing countries, so we would expect you to not use the U.S. Sugar

Program as the first step to be moved on the negotiating board.

The U.S. Sugar Program has supplied the

American consumer with an adequate supply of reasonably priced sugar, compared to sugar prices in other countries.

The economic impact of American agriculture would be devastating if the one million, three hundred thousand acres of sugar beets had to be planted to potatoes, dry beans, onions, etc.

We appreciate your interest and concern for the 12,000 farm families that raise sugar beets in the United States.

FCC stands firm on earlier ruling

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Federal Communications Commission on Thursday reaffirmed its decision to allocate to land mobile radio service a frequency band that previously had been available to amateur radio operators.

The commission's August 1988 action had been appealed by the American Radio Relay League and about 700 other amateur radio organizations and individual ham radio operators.

At Thursday's meeting, the FCC stood by its decision to maintain the 216-220 MHz band for maritime mobile communications, allocate the 222-223 MHz band — which earlier had been available to amateurs — to land mobile service and allocate the 222-225 MHz band exclusively to amateur service.

A number of other frequency bands also are currently allocated to amateur radio operators.

Vietnam to return American MIAs

WASHINGTON (AP) — Vietnam intends to return what it believes are the remains of 28 American servicemen missing from the Vietnam War, the Pentagon said today.

Pete Williams, the Defense Department's chief spokesman, said the repatriation would occur on June 21 in Hanoi, with the remains then being flown immediately to an Army laboratory in Hawaii for possible identification.

The repatriation will be the 10th since August 1987, when the United States made a special effort to enlist greater assistance from Vietnam in accounting for missing Americans.

The group of 28 is one of the largest ever returned by the Vietnamese government. The largest occurred last December and involved 38 sets of remains.

Reilly predicts costly toxic clean-up

WASHINGTON (AP) — The head of the Environmental Protection Agency predicted on Thursday that a long, expensive effort will be needed to clean the nation's toxic waste dumps and he suggested the public may have expected too much of the cleanup drive begun nine years ago.

"There's no magic wand that I can wave to make this problem go away," EPA Administrator William Reilly told a Senate subcommittee.

Meanwhile, the Supreme Court ruled 5-4 that states may be required through private lawsuits to help pay for cleaning up hazardous waste sites targeted under the Superfund law.

The justices decided that the Constitution gives Congress the power to strip state governments of their immunity from private lawsuits.

Senators' mail bills top \$52 million

WASHINGTON (AP) — Mass mailings by 100 senators during 1987-88 cost taxpayers more than \$52.7 million, the congressional watchdog Common Cause reported Thursday.

The 27 senators seeking re-election last year spent \$20.1 million of the total, an average of 48 cents per household, according to the Common Cause study.

House slams door on S&L amendment

WASHINGTON (A) — Armed with a veto threat by President Bush, the House on Thursday overwhelmingly defeated an effort led by Illinois lawmakers to weaken the chief reform measure in a \$167 billion taxpayer bailout of the savings and loan industry.

On a 326-91 vote, the House rejected an amendment by Rep. Henry Hyde, R-Ill., that could have allowed 211 S&Ls to escape a requirement calling for the industry to come up with \$5 billion in new capital by 1995 to hedge against loan losses.

Once more than a dozen other amendments are considered, the House is scheduled to vote on the entire 732-page bill Friday. The Senate passed similar legislation in April and lawmakers now plan on resolving differences in the two versions in July with hopes of enacting it before taking August vacation.

Basically, the legislation provides for spending \$25 billion, including interest, over the next 30 years to cover \$100 billion of federally insured deposits lost by S&Ls over the last

decade through risky and often fraudulent lending practices.

Only 66 of the House's 175 Republicans ended up supporting Hyde's measure after GOP Leader Bob Michel reluctantly switched sides in response to a strong letter from Bush appealing for support. Democrats voted 212-38 to reject the amendment.

Hyde's measure would have required federal regulators to grant hearings to marginally healthy S&Ls before phasing out exemptions to capital requirements granted by regulators in the early 1980s for "supervisory good will."

In a letter to Michel just before the vote, Bush said approval of the amendment "would render this bill unacceptable to me."

The president said that "going against the good will as capital is not justifiable."

There should be no mistake, Bush wrote: This matter goes to the very heart of my determination to clean up the abuses of the past among the savings and loans, about which every voter is entitled to be

outraged."

Bush also urged lawmakers to preserve his elaborate scheme for financing the bailout — the largest in the nation's history — by borrowing the money through private bonds to avoid swelling the federal deficit.

An amendment offered by Rep. Dan Rostenkowski, D-Ill., chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, and scheduled for a vote later Thursday would increase the deficit by \$4 billion over the next three years but exempt the spending from deficit-reduction targets.

"Maintaining bipartisan efforts to control our budget process is a critical objective to continuing a positive domestic and international economic climate," Bush said.

The administration, however, has acknowledged that the interest rates associated with the private bonds that Bush would use to raise the money would be higher than if it was borrowed directly through the Treasury.

The Congressional Budget Office has estimated the potential interest savings from Rostenkowski's men-

sure at \$4.5 billion, but Wall Street analysts say they could be as much as \$30 billion to \$40 billion over the 30 years.

In April, the Senate defeated by a 50-48 vote an effort by Democrats to make the bailout part of the deficit. And Sen. Phil Gramm, R-Texas, has collected signatures from 40 colleagues over the last week pledging to support Bush's financing plan.

Because it takes only 30 votes in the Senate to preserve Bush's approach, White House Budget Director Richard Darman on Thursday called the House's action "an utterly academic question."

Hyde said his "good will" amendment was intended only to grant the constitutional right of a hearing to the 8 percent of the industry that took over failing thrifts in the early 1980s.

Koop bids nation adieu; wants to remain public 'health conscience'

WASHINGTON (AP) — Surgeon General C. Everett Koop said Thursday he is leaving as the nation's most visible doctor with no regrets but wants to continue being the nation's "health conscience."

The pediatrician who has earned a reputation for straight talk about controversial issues said that after he leaves office next month he will write his memoirs and look for opportunities in every media form to deliver health messages to this country as long as people will listen.

"I would like somebody to say five years from now that when Koop left the office of surgeon general, he continued to be the health conscience of the country," he said at a breakfast session with reporters.

Koop said his most successful achievement as surgeon general was his campaign against smoking. He noted that during his tenure, the proportion of the nation that uses tobacco has dropped from 34 percent to 26 percent and the number of anti-smoking laws has burgeoned from 51 to more than 400 now.

Asked what was his biggest "turkey," he responded

self-assuredly: "I didn't know there were any."

Koop, 72, said he leaves government "with a very good feeling," satisfied that he has turned around most of the liberal critics who put up a firestorm of opposition to his nomination by President Reagan in 1981.

In the process, Koop has alienated many conservatives angered by his no-nonsense report on the AIDS crisis, which advocated use of condoms and sex education beginning at young ages, and his refusal to issue a report requested by Reagan on whether women suffer psychological harm from abortion.

"I never made any promises to espouse any causes, and all that I have done in this job is to face the issues that were there and to deal with them with as much integrity and honesty as I could," Koop said.

He said he learned much about his conservative supporters-turned-adversaries, and although Koop remains as adamantly opposed to abortion today as ever, he runs the heading into controversy with his prescription for the problem of unwanted pregnancies: the teaching of sex education and contraception.

## Trade gap narrows; dollar still a worry

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government said Thursday that the U.S. trade deficit narrowed dramatically to \$8.26 billion in April, its lowest level in nine months, but even the Bush administration is concerned that the strong dollar could stunt future progress.

April's deficit was down 3.4 percent from a revised March trade gap of \$9.54 billion, the Commerce Department reported. The improvement reflected a 0.8 percent increase in exports, to a record \$30.57 billion, and a 2.6 percent drop in imports, to \$38.81 billion, despite rising prices for foreign oil.

Commerce Secretary Robert Mosbacher hailed the report as evidence of "continued improvement in U.S. trade performance" but he added a caveat.

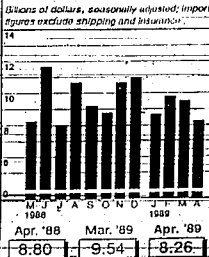
"While the April data are encouraging, it is always unwise to put too much weight on any one or two months' figures—in these volatile markets," he said. "The recent strength of the dollar lends us to be concerned about the economy's ability to sustain the excellent trends seen so far."

The Bush administration has been hoping for continued progress on narrowing the trade gap to spur economic growth. Last year's big 2.2 percent drop in the trade deficit from an all-time high of \$12.1 billion in 1987 accounted for nearly half of all U.S. economic growth.

Many analysts are concerned that the trade gap could start to widen again due to the recent strength of the dollar, which makes U.S. goods more expensive on overseas markets and imports cheaper for American consumers.

For the first four months of the year, the deficit was running at an annual rate of \$10.9 billion, well below last year's actual deficit of

\$119.76 billion. April's trade gap was the smallest since an \$8.02 billion deficit last July.

So far this year we're going great guns," said economist Maury Harris of PaineWebber Inc. in New York. "But eventually, this higher dollar is going to eat into exports."

Economist Cynthia Latta of Data Resources Inc. in Lexington, Mass., said that while U.S. businesses have improved their competitive position in the world marketplace, "we're not going to hold on to that competitive position if the dollar continues to rise."

However, William T. Archev, vice president of the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, said that with April's favorable report, worries about the impact of the dollar on the trade deficit have been revealed as exaggerations.

Analysts said the narrowing of the deficit so far this year "even as foreign oil prices have marched upward, has been partly a reflection of a general slowdown in an economy that is sucking in fewer foreign goods."

In another sign of a slowing economy, the Federal Reserve reported Thursday that the operating rate for U.S. factories dropped in May to 83.8 percent, down 0.3 percentage point from the previous month. The Fed also reported that the pace of industrial production held steady in May.

Analysts said the easing of factory use could help relieve inflationary pressures in the economy. On the trade front, imports fell in April to a seasonally adjusted \$38.84 billion, reflecting declines in sales of foreign cars, manufactured capital goods and agricultural products.

The dip occurred even though the bill for foreign oil jumped 9.9 percent to \$4.05 billion. The average price of a barrel of oil shot up 11.6 percent to \$17.45 in April—the first straight monthly increase.

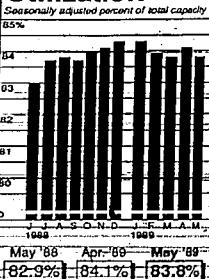
U.S. exports, meanwhile, hit a record \$30.57 billion in April as foreign sales of American-made industrial supplies, manufactured capital goods and consumer goods all increased.

As usual, the United States posted its largest trade deficit in April with Japan. But the \$1.89 billion gap was down sharply from \$1.22 billion in March.

Other large deficits were recorded with Taiwan, \$810 million; South Korea, \$545 million; Canada, \$477 million; and Brazil, \$365 million.

The nation's trade picture was helped by a second straight surplus with Western Europe. The surplus registered \$22 million in April and \$397 million in March.

On Tuesday, the government reported that a broader measure of U.S. trade worsened during the first three months of the year. The Commerce Department said the deficit in the current account was 7 percent larger than in the final three months of 1988. That deficit figure reflected improvement in merchandise trade but a widening of the deficit in the services category.

## Bush promises crime crackdown

GLYNCO, Ga. (AP) — President George Bush, promising "to stand up for the police officers," formally sent Congress a \$1.2-billion anticrime package Thursday, proposing tougher sentences for gun-related crimes and construction of more prisons.

Praising law officers as "domestic freedom fighters," Bush said, "Let's put the handcuffs on the criminals, not on the criminal justice system."

On the other hand, Bush said a person suspected of a crime "should be treated with respect and given his rights or her rights, even though the evidence looks overwhelming."

Bush unveiled his anticrime program a month ago but decided to make a special occasion out of the usually routine transmittal of the

plan to Congress. He flew nearly 1,000 miles to southeast Georgia to sign the draft legislation at the Federal Law Enforcement Training Center, where agents and police officers from 60 agencies and every state are enrolled.

In intense heat, Bush placed a wreath at the Peace Officers Memorial to the 39 graduates of the training center who have been killed in the line of duty.

Repeating a warning to criminals that he made earlier this year, at the funeral of murdered Drug Enforcement Administration Agent Envolett Hatcher in New York, Bush said, "Better that you had never been born than to attack one of America's finest."

## DOT considers random drug tests

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Transportation Department is considering expanding its drug-testing program to include random checks for alcohol abuse among 4 million transportation workers, Secretary Samuel Skinner told Congress Thursday.

The transportation secretary also said he would recommend that President Bush veto a House anti-drug bill if passed. He said the measure, which covers only railroad workers, would require the administration to start over on a drug-testing program it has already ordered.

Skinner made the announcement on alcohol testing before a Senate committee considering its version of

legislation to require random drug and alcohol testing throughout the aviation, railroad, shipping, pipeline, trucking and mass transit industries.

The Transportation Department last November ordered drug testing programs in private transportation industries beginning at the end of this year, but the programs face several court challenges. The Supreme Court has approved some drug testing but has yet to act on random testing.

The proposal to put random testing into law brought general support from transportation industry representatives and objections from groups representing employees.

## GOP leaders stand behind Atwater

WASHINGTON (AP) — State Republican leaders on Thursday generally backed GOP Chairman Lee Atwater, who has drawn Democratic fire in connection with a party memo that likened House Speaker Thomas S. Foley's record to that of a homosexual lawmaker.

"I think everybody agrees it was inappropriate and I think the proper action was taken with the resignation of an Atwater member and that's the end of it," Michigan State Republican Chairman E. Spencer Abraham said.

"I found absolutely nothing in it that was insulting to anybody," said Perry O. Hooper, GOP national committeeman from Alabama. "I have found nobody that was concerned."

Hooper, like several other Republicans gathering for the party's annual summer meeting, said that when he read the memo he interpreted it as a description of Foley's position on issues, not a reflection on his personal life.

On the other hand, Richard M. Rosenbaum, the national committeeman from New York, said, "I find what happened to be very embarrassing and regrettable."

Asked whether the incident would be damaging to Atwater, Rosenbaum said, "I don't know. It's still a little early to get real consensus."

President Bush said in a speech to a party fundraising dinner Wednesday night that Atwater is "doing a great job. The president made no reference to the Foley memo."

The memo depicted Foley as a liberal and compared his voting record to that of Rep. Barney Frank, D-Mass., an avowed, openly homosexual, said Mark Goodin, an aide to Atwater, resigned after saying he wrote the memo, which bore the heading, "Tom Foley: Out of the Liberal Class."

Some Democrats have asked Bush to let Atwater from his party post. Jennifer Dunn, the Republican national committee chairman from Foley's home state of Washington, said she had received "very low calls" about the memo.

# Gorbachev stirs hopes for trust, cooperation with Europe

BONN, West Germany (AP) — Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev on Thursday declared his first state visit to West Germany had yielded "a convergence of souls" that stirred hopes for a new age of trust and cooperation in Europe.

But while his four-day summit was drenched in an atmosphere of goodwill, Gorbachev gave no ground on the emotional issue of a reunited Germany — the issue of biggest concern to West Germans.

At a news conference capping his appearances in Bonn, Gorbachev dismissed the Berlin Wall as "no great problem," compared with other East-West differences, and sidestepped questions about the chances for reunification.

Those issues are of utmost importance to West Germans and Gorbachev's failure to tackle them could allow the aura of goodwill to slip.

Gorbachev enjoys more popularity among West Germans than any other foreign statesman, according to opinion polls, and most of that support is rooted in a hope that his reforms will some day lead to reunification with Moscow-aligned East Germany.

When the Kremlin leader was asked whether he thought Europe would ever again recognize a single German state, he gave a vague and traditional reply.

"The situation in Europe today was determined by historical realities," Gorbachev answered, referring to World War II.

He dismissed suggestions the Berlin Wall stands as a symbol of the Cold War and a time of less promise in relations between East and West.

"I don't think the Berlin Wall is the sole barrier between East and West," Gorbachev said at the news conference.

East Germany built the wall in 1961 to stem tide of migration, and Gorbachev echoed the Berlin government claim that it "took advantage of its sovereign rights" to build the wall, and that its removal depended on an end to the conditions that led to its construction.

Gorbachev suggested the wall should not be given too much significance in East-West relations, noting it was one of a number of differences.

"I see this as no great problem," he concluded.

Reflecting West Germans' eagerness to see the Soviet visit in the most positive light, Bonn government spokesman Hans Klein said he saw Gorbachev's response as containing rays of hope.

"The Soviet general secretary said this is something that can be overcome, something that can be solved," Klein said later.

Gorbachev told steelworkers in the industrial city of Dortmund in the Ruhr Valley that "What we've encountered here on your soil moved us a lot."

"We saw many faces, we looked many people in the eyes, we felt much sympathy, I would say a convergence of souls," he said.

Both Soviet and West German officials appeared to take special care throughout the summit to avoid controversy.

A joint declaration of goals for Europe, which Gorbachev described as the "most important accomplishment" of his summit, reiterated arms control objectives on which both the Warsaw Pact and NATO have similar approaches. Yet it omitted any mention of short-range nuclear weapons, over which the two blocs disagree.

Gorbachev appeared to welcome NATO's decision at a summit last month to allow negotiations on short-range weapons on a conventional arms basis to take effect.

He said the Brussels agreement contained "positive, constructive elements," but also criticized the Western alliance for retaining "a lot of elements of the old philosophy."

Despite the lack of movement on issues close to West Germans, the image of successful East-West diplomacy could offer political rewards for both leaders.

Chancellor Helmut Kohl's Christian Democratic party has lost badly in recent elections, and Gorbachev continues to face widespread resistance to his reforms.

Both Soviets and West Germans suffering insecurity about their standing in world affairs, and the outpouring of good feeling the past four days has boosted their sense of confidence.

# Soviets conclude Uzbek investigation into ethnic riots

MOSCOW (AP) — Premier Nikolai I. Ryzhkov told party activists in Uzbekistan on Thursday that corruption, political intrigue and ethnic hatred led to violence against minority Meskhi Turks.

Ryzhkov completed a four-day investigation of the rioting with a party meeting in the republic's capital of Tashkent, the official news agency Tass said.

"This was the work of ruthless and cruel hands of those to whom inter-ethnic enmity had always been the soil for the criminal mentality that everything goes," Tass quoted him as telling party officials. "Corruption and

shady economic and political dealings" played a role, he said.

Ryzhkov said the violence was well-planned and aimed at destabilizing the republic and the country. He did not identify any group or people he held responsible.

At another party meeting Wednesday near Fergana, the city hit hardest by the unrest, Ryzhkov said "party and government officials gave gasoline, transportation and vodka to attackers who killed Meskhi Turks."

Pravda, the Communist Party daily, said Thursday that prosecutors had arrested several hundred people on charges of

organizing pogroms and violent actions, and that proceedings had begun in more than 60 cases. Ryzhkov said attackers would be harshly punished.

About 100 people were killed, hundreds injured and thousands left homeless in the riots, which began June 3.

Uzbek militants have said that unemployment and poor food supplies caused anger that was vented in ethnic violence.

The late Soviet dictator Josef Stalin forced the Meskhi Turk minority to leave their homeland in Soviet Georgia in 1944 and resettle in Uzbekistan.

They now number about 360,000, and Ryzhkov said on Tuesday that a special commission would consider their request to return to Georgia.

Pravda quoted Lt. Gen. A. Amkiev of the Interior Ministry as saying that many of the 12,000 troops sent to the republic were guarding intersections and administrative buildings and patrolling streets in Fergana, about 1,500 miles southeast of Moscow.

Helicopters were being used to survey the city and a 10 p.m. to 6 a.m. curfew remained in effect, the newspaper said.

**Defector arranges visa for daughter**

LONDON (AP) — A former Soviet chess star who eloped with the captain of the U.S. men's team last year arrived Thursday from Moscow with her daughter to begin a new life in the West.

Elena Akhmirovskaya had returned to the Soviet Union from her home in Seattle on May 24 to arrange an exit visa for Dana, the 1-year-old daughter of her first marriage.

"This could have happened five years ago," she said, seated with her family in the back of a taxi as it drove away from Heathrow Airport. "Even now I couldn't imagine that it would be so easy to get every paper and every document."

John Donaldson, a 30-year-old international chess master, and Ms. Akhmirovskaya, 32, were secretly married during the Chess Olympiad in Salonica, Greece in November.

Donaldson said Thursday his first thoughts were for his reunited family. "Now I feel good," he said. "The last six months, without Dana have been especially hard for Elena."

**Australians protect Chinese official**

SYDNEY, Australia (AP) — Australia on Thursday granted asylum to a Chinese diplomat, but Prime Minister Bob Hawke refused to discuss news reports that the embassy in Beijing was harboring a student leader of the democracy movement.

A news report in Japan said authorities there were protecting a Chinese diplomat who asked for political asylum in the United States following China's effort to crush the movement.

Immigration officials in Denmark said nine Chinese citizens had applied for asylum.

**Divers blow up Beirut food boats**

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Scuba divers blew up three boats carrying badly needed food to the embattled Christian heartland Thursday, and two people died in a new round of Syrian shelling.

The motor-boats blew up at dawn in the southern port of Sidon, about 25 miles south of Beirut, after frogmen apparently attached limpet mines to the vessels, said a police spokesman on condition of anonymity.

One sailor was injured in the simultaneous blasts, the spokesman said.

The supply vessels were trying to get through the Syrian artillery blockade and bring fruit, vegetables and other supplies to ports in the besieged Christian region north of Beirut, the police spokesman said.

It was not clear which faction in Lebanon sabotaged the vessels.

**Hungarians rebury Nagy with honor**

BUDAPEST, Hungary (AP) — Imre Nagy, martyr of the 1956 uprising, will be reburied today as an "outstanding statesman" by the communist regime that executed him for treason 31 years ago.

Only a year ago, before Hungary's more liberal leadership changed the official view of history, police used clubs to break up a memorial demonstration.

Kiosks did a brisk business Thursday in Nagy buttons and in black-rimmed umbrellas bearing his picture or 565 on the national colors of red, white and green.

The city government said all public buildings would display black flags Friday.

Nagy was premier in 1956, when a popular uprising began Oct. 23 and was crushed by Soviet tanks on Nov. 4. He and his close associates fled to the Yugoslav Embassy, but later were seized by the Soviets while traveling outside the embassy with diplomatic escorts.

**Captors release Belgian hostage**

SIDON, Lebanon (AP) — Belgian physician Jan Cools was freed Thursday after 13 months as a hostage in Lebanon.

"I would like to thank everybody who helped in getting me released," Cools said, his eyes filled with tears. "I feel very happy to be free. I feel very tired."

He said his captors had treated him well.

Cools, 32, worked for the Norwegian humanitarian organization NORWAC and was kidnapped May 21, 1988. He spoke with reporters in the apartment of Mustafa Saad, whose Sunni Muslim militia controls this port city 25 miles south of Beirut.

**Tribesman ignores gold for water**

MUSCAT, Oman (AP) — An Omani tribesman who struck gold while digging a well said he would continue looking for water, a newspaper reported Thursday.

Rashid Nassiri was hunting for water with his brother when he unearthed gold deposits 70 feet down, the newspaper Oman quoted relatives as saying.

He handed his samples to the tribal sheik of Ibbri, a desert plain 200 miles west of Muscat, saying he was not interested in it, the family said.

Relatives quoted Nassiri, 35, as saying: "What will I do with the gold? For me, water is more precious than this glittering metal."

Government mineral officials were analyzing the find.

**Fishing laws anger Irish voters**

DUBLIN, Ireland (AP) — It's not the fish that are biting in western Ireland, it's the voters.

Anger about the government's fishing-license law was the oddest but hardly the least significant issue in Ireland's national election Thursday.

The nation's unwanted reputation as a net exporter of people was an issue, closely linked with continuing high unemployment.

Cuts in the national health service brought complaints of patients being left on gurneys because no beds were available, and every party promised to spend money to improve matters.

In western Ireland, the fishing license uproar dominated the campaign. "I am totally baffled by it," Prime Minister Charles Haughey confessed. "I think it's the most extraordinary development ever in Irish politics."

Haughey's government pushed through the license plan — 15 pounds (about \$20.25) a year for trout and 10 pounds (about \$13.50) for other fish, effective Jan. 1, 1988.

Outraged anglers aren't just refusing to pay. They've shut down fishing in trout-filled waters such as Lough Corrib, and with it the tourist industry.

**India appoints new U.S. envoy**

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — Kamesh Singh, a former government minister, has been appointed India's ambassador to the United States, the Foreign Ministry said Thursday.

Singh, 58, replaces Pratap Kishan Kaul and will begin his assignment shortly, the ministry said.

Singh was a federal minister from 1967 to 1977, heading the Tourism, Civil Aviation and Health ministries. He is from a family that once ruled the northern state of Jammu-Kashmir.

**Chinese begin issuing death sentences**



Man is sentenced to death for burning a train in Shanghai in first announced execution verdict under martial law

BEIJING (AP) — Arrested pro-democracy activists, with shaved heads and placards hanging around their necks were paraded on Chinese television Thursday, and three others were sentenced to death for torching a train during a riot.

The executions, ordered by a Shanghai court, were the first in the nationwide crackdown on the student-led demonstrations for a freer China.

Television news also said a student leader surrendered to authorities.

More than 1,000 people have been arrested nationwide since army troops and tanks moved into Tiananmen Square in Beijing on June 3-4 to suppress the movement.

The violent confrontation touched off demonstrations and riots in cities throughout China.

On June 6, crowds set a train ablaze after it ran through a barricade erected by demonstrators near Shanghai station, killing six.

Official media reported 21 railway security officials were beaten by protesters. It said the rail line was closed for 50 hours, nine train carriages ruined and 900 bags of mail burned.

The three condemned men "frenziedly smashed the railway carriages and set fire to police motorcycles and the carriages during the attack," the official Xinhua News Agency reported. "They also prevented firefighters from extinguishing the fire and beat them cruelly."

Xinhua identified the men as Xu Guoming, a contract worker at a brewery, Bian Hanwu, who is unemployed, and Yan Xuerong, a radio factory worker.

# Sam Wanamaker to build Shakespeare center Victor French, 54, dies

LONDON (AP) — Actor-director Sam Wanamaker celebrated his 70th birthday at a grand, breaking ceremony for a replica of William Shakespeare's Globe Theater.

After 20 years of planning and fund-raising, Wanamaker signed a \$30 million contract with a construction company to build his project close to the theater's original site on the south bank of the River Thames.

"This is the second most important day of my life," the American-born Wanamaker said at the ceremony Wednesday.

The most important day, he said, will be April 23, 1992, the scheduled completion date for his project, to be called the International Shakespeare Globe Center. April 23 is Shakespeare's birthday.

The complex will be a center for Shakespeare studies and will house two theaters, one of them a replica of the Globe, where Shakespeare's plays were performed in the bard's lifetime. It will also include an exhibition area, offices, restaurant, apartments and shops.

The original Globe Theater was built in 1599 and burned down in 1613. It was rebuilt, but was finally demolished in 1644. Wanamaker's complex is believed to be a few hundred yards from the original site. Archaeologists are working to locate the exact site.

Nearly are the recently excavated foundations of the Swan Theater, the only relic of a theater of Shakespeare's day to have been found.

**Who's reunion concert tour off to big start**

"I dropped my kid off and came flying," said Carol Alden of South Glens Falls, who'd gotten the news of ticket sales from a friend.

The British band opens its 36-date summer stadium tour June 21 in the 8,200-seat Glens Falls Civic Center on the edge of the Adirondack Mountains in upstate New York. A last-minute decision to make

fewer tickets available, including eliminating standing-room tickets, helped speed sales, event organizers said.

The band's stage was "so humongous," the center needed the extra space, said Event Coordinator Jeff Barrett.

Joe Patterson, 24, of Utica was first in line and forked over \$100 for four front-row seats, then pumped a clenched fist in the air to the cheers of the crowd.

"This," he said, "is awesome."

### Cellist Webber realizes \$125,000 from sale

LONDON (AP) — Cellist Julian Lloyd Webber sold a 280-year-old cello at auction Thursday for nearly \$125,000 to help pay for his divorce settlement.

The cello, made by Giuseppe Guadagnini in 1791, was purchased by a private German buyer, said a spokeswoman for Sotheby's auction house. But don't worry, Lloyd Webber still has a Stradivarius cello.

The younger brother of megamusical composer Andrew Lloyd Webber said recently that he was selling the cello to help pay for his divorce settlement. He and his wife, Celia, got a divorce in April after a 15-year marriage.

Lloyd Webber used the cello in many live performances and recordings. He was once quoted as saying, "The relationship between me and my cello is like a marriage. Nothing, and I mean nothing, comes between us."

The Sotheby's spokeswoman said the auction house was "very pleased" with the price, which exceeded the pre-sale estimate. She said Lloyd Webber's Stradivarius cello is worth at least twice the price of the-

Guadagnini. "Of course he is nostalgic about his cello but I think he feels it is a shame to have such a nice instrument unused," she said.

### Lee Iacocca warns TV execs to clean up act

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Lee Iacocca told television executives to start censoring their shows, or advertisers, including his own Chrysler Corp., may pull out their commercials. The Chrysler chairman said Tuesday that viewers are tired of trash TV and are venting their rage on the big advertisers with angry letters and boycotts.

"I don't want to be the censor; I want you to do it," he said in an address to the Hollywood Radio & Television Society.

Iacocca warned that companies such as Chrysler, which spends \$250 million a year on television, could withdraw advertising from objectionable programming if steps are not taken to tone down the "bedroom bingo" and violence.

"Help get me and every other sponsor, out of the censorship business," he said. "We don't want the job."

He agreed that some complaining viewers are "fanatics," but said most are not. "Don't write them off as a fringe group," he said. "They've found out they have clout and they're going to use it."

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Actor and director Victor French, the married co-star of "Highway to Heaven," and "Little House on the Prairie," died Thursday from lung cancer. He was 54.

French was admitted to Sherman Oaks Community Hospital on June 7, said John Rogovin, a hospital spokeswoman. He was diagnosed with lung cancer three months ago, said his business manager, Bob Philpot.

The actor was known early in his career as a leading television villain; appearing in more than 20 episodes of "Gunsmoke," directing five of "Bonanza."

He subsequently played the scruffy farmer Isaiah Edwards on "Little House on the Prairie," starring Michael Landon. Beneath his character's tough exterior, was a kind, gentle man.

French left the series in 1977. Landon in his own situation comedy, "Carter Country," playing a lovable redneck police chief in a city not far from Plains, Ga., home of former President Carter.

Several years after "Carter Country" was canceled by ABC in 1979, French rejoined "Little House" in 1982, staying with the series until 1983.

He teamed with Landon again on NBC's "Highway to Heaven" in 1984, playing Mark Gordon, a burly and bitter ex cop who was rescued from despair in the series by Landon's Jonathan Smith, an earthbound

angel determined to save ruined lives.

In a 1985 interview, French credited Landon with being "the first to see beyond my looks," pushing to get him the part in "Little House" that allowed him to branch out from villain roles.

"The network wanted a name actor; but Michael stood by his guns. That role changed my career," he said. "Michael is really my angel."

In addition to co-starring, French directed every third episode of "Highway to Heaven," with Landon directing the other two. French also played Agent 44 on "Get Smart" and appeared in the short-lived situation comedy, "The Hero" on NBC in 1966.

## Zsa Zsa Gabor threatens to sue Beverly Hills Police Department for her arrest

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A furious Zsa Zsa Gabor charged Thursday that a Beverly Hills policeman roughed her up during a traffic stop, impounded her \$215,000 Rolls-Royce and misplaced a diamond brooch, and she wants to sue.

"I look as if I was in a war. I'm cut where they put those cuffs on and I'm black and blue all over," Miss Gabor said by telephone from her Bel-Air bedroom, where she said she was nursing cuts, bruises and broken fingernails.

She was accused of slapping a policeman, but said she was defending herself.

"I tried to fight for my life," Miss Gabor said. "Why would I hit this gorgeous 6-foot-4 policeman with a gun in his pocket? This has gotten out of hand. This is uncivilized. Can you believe this is Beverly Hills?"

"I'm afraid now of a policeman. Dahling, my nails are all broken."

Miss Gabor was handcuffed and taken to police headquarters Wednesday after allegedly slapping a policeman who stopped her Rolls-Royce Corniche for expired license tags.

After the officer, whose name was withheld as a policy matter, stopped her on busy La Cienega Boulevard, he discovered the actress' driver's license had also expired, police Lt. James Smith said.

"He proceeded to run a check on the license plate and license and she told him she was in a hurry and she left," Smith said.

The officer, with red lights flashing and siren blaring, chased her for about two blocks until she pulled over. As she stepped out of the vehicle she slapped him, Smith said.

But Miss Gabor said she was dragged out of her car by the officer, who was screaming obscenities at her throughout the incident.

The Hungarian-born actress was booked for investigation of evading a policeman, battery on a policeman, driving without a valid license, driving an unregistered car and driving with an open alcoholic container. She was released on her own recognizance and ordered to appear in court on July 12.

Police refused to comment further on the incident.

Miss Gabor said she was handcuffed "so tight they cut my wrists" and forced to sit down on the

street while spectators gathered and police cars arrived.

"They all treated me as though I had cocaine or was a murderer, then they drove me away in a hot-pole car with no air conditioning," she said.

"I have contacted an attorney. I want the attorney to handle the whole thing. I am hurt and this shouldn't happen. I want my car, my expensive painting (in the car's back seat) and my diamond brooch back."

# Allegations of lax security surface at sub base

BAYVIEW, Idaho (AP) — The Navy is probing allegations that photos of a prototype sub were developed at a commercial lab and a secret propeller was shipped to Tennessee in a rented van, officials confirmed Monday.

Complaints of lax security were leveled by former and current employees at the David Taylor Research Center and apparently sparked a 9-month probe of alleged waste, fraud and mismanagement at the facility on Lake Pend Oreille.

George Guedel, manager of the base at the southern end of the 1,300-foot deep lake, said Monday he was

under strict orders not to comment on the investigation.

Guedel did say most Navy film is developed at commercial processors and that all base employees have adequate security clearances for transporting classified materials.

The Spokesman-Review and Spokane Chronicle newspapers reported on the investigation in a copyright story Sunday.

Since World War II, the Navy has tested submarine-silencing technologies at the Navy Ship Research and Development Center at Bayview, a cluster of barges and warehouses.

Currently, the Navy uses quarter- and fifth-scale models to test hull and propeller designs for its new silent-running Seawolf Class attack submarine.

The facility is here to do acoustic research. Anything you do here could be of value to the other side, so it's very important that what's done here be kept secret, said Capt. Gerald Davis, who oversees research at Bayview.

The project is considered classified, a designation for activities that "if released to unauthorized people, could result in grave damage to U.S. security," Davis said.

Although the hull's shape is important, the propeller is the key to the Seawolf's quiet running characteristics. Its configuration carries a higher security

classification than the hull, Davis said.

Officials at Tracor Inc., the Austin, Texas, parent company of Tracor Applied Sciences that operates and maintains the \$64 million submarine model "Kokanee," said the allegations were false.

"The company has conducted its own investigation and has not found any evidence of wrongdoing, with reference to those allegations," said Judith Newby, vice president for public relations.

She said the company has not been told it's under investigation.

In May, the Navy's Chang said in a letter to U.S. Rep. Larry Craig, R-Idaho, that some of the allegations made by Tracor employees had been substantiated by Navy investigators.

But Capt. Bob Hutton, an aide to Chang, said that the Bayview complaints were minor compared to some of the multi-million dollar procurement fraud cases the inspector general's office has investigated.

Concerns about security were voiced by several former Tracor employees, including Bob Thornton, 40, a retired Air Force staff sergeant fired Oct. 17, 1988, as the company's Bayview administrative coordinator.

Thornton said photographs of the submarine model were taken to a commercial processor in Coeur d'Alene and later offered for sale to base employees for personal use. Thornton said he lost his job

because he complained about security lapses and procedural mistakes to Navy investigators and a company hotline.

Mike McClure, manager of The Photo Place, said Tracor employees brought one or two rolls at a time for processing over a period of about two years.

McClure said he remembered seeing photographs of the side of the submarine model, both in the water and in dry dock. He said he could not remember seeing pictures of the model's propeller.

Thornton said he was also worried about the handling of a propeller for the Kokanee that had to be sent to Oak Ridge, Tenn., for repairs.

The propeller arrived at Bayview triple-sealed and under armed guard in a truck whose driver had to periodically check in with security forces, Thornton said.

In contrast, the five-ton propeller was loaded aboard a rented 24-foot truck for the trip to Martin Marietta Energy Systems at the Oak Ridge National Laboratory last October, he said.

Thornton said neither he, nor another Tracor employee, were armed for the cross-country trip that began Oct. 8.

Guedel and Tracor's Ms. Newby said Thornton's security clearance was adequate for the trip.

"There was no compromise, or even any risk of compromise of classified information," said Guedel.

# Great Salt Lake decline continues

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — The level of the Great Salt Lake continued to decline this month, and if northern Utah continues to receive hot, dry weather this summer, the inland sea should drop to the lowest level in six years.

The elevation of the lake at the U.S. Geological Survey boat harbor gauge Thursday was 4,206.35 feet above mean sea level, a drop of .15 of a foot in the last two weeks.

"It fell nearly 2 inches, which is not a surprising amount," said Bill Aldor, National Weather Service meteorologist. "It's not surprising because the temperatures have been above normal."

Precipitation during the first half of June also was below normal over most of the Great Salt Lake Basin. Most stations received between 20 and 45 percent of their normal monthly totals.

Brigham City had the least with only a trace of precipitation and Provo had the most at 86 percent of normal.

# Racist tracts inserted in newspaper delivery tubes

SUPERIOR, Mont. (AP) — Someone put racist tracts in newspaper delivery tubes on rural routes in parts of western Montana this week, and one newspaper publisher said legal action will be taken against anyone repeating the act.

A 12-page, tabloid-sized newspaper titled "Racial Loyalty" was found in delivery tubes owned by the Spokane Spokesman Review and the Missoulian newspapers early Tuesday morning in Mineral County west of Superior, said Robbi Smith of Superior, who delivers both papers to a total of about 150 customers in western Mineral County.

A similar tabloid, titled "Racial World," was found Wednesday morning in about 100 Missoulian delivery tubes on the rural route east of Superior served by delivery person Tammy McFarland of Alberton.

Several subscribers called the Missoulian circulation office to complain about the contents of the tabloids, which the subscribers described as offensive.

The Missoulian said it would take legal action against continued unauthorized use of the tubes, which are reserved for the delivery of that newspaper.

"The tubes are for our exclusive use and any further use is unauthorized," said Phil Blake, Missoulian publisher. "We're willing to take legal action against whomever is responsible if it reoccurs."

Responsibility for the circulation of the printed matter could not be immediately determined.

"Racial Loyalty" carries a credit to editor Will White Williams in Otto, N.C. There is no telephone listing in Otto for either Williams or such a church, a directory assistance operator said.

The tabloids, professional printed in two colors and with an attractive layout on newspaper stock, are filled with anti-Semitic and anti-black cartoons and editorial comment.

Equity payments paid to members are in addition to the regular milk prices. Members of the Caldwell-based cooperative receive earnings in proportion to how much milk they market through the cooperative. The payments range from \$2.27 to \$22,782. The average is \$1,175.

## Population, agriculture threaten water quality

**TWIN FALLS** - The increased population and greater concentration of agricultural activities in the Magic Valley are threatening local water quality, Thursday's Kiwanis meeting was told.

"Most people today generally want to see environmental protection and are willing to pay a reasonable price for it," said Mike McMasters, water quality field supervisor with the state Division of Environmental Quality.

The primary land use in the area is agricultural, and major water quality problems here are related to farm practices, he said.

One major contributor to water quality problems is the recent influx of new dairies

in Jerome, Twin Falls and Gooding counties, McMasters said.

About one new dairy a week starts up in this area, he said. Environmental regulations on dairies are recent in Idaho. In 1975 about 45 five-year permits were issued. During their terms no one inspected the dairies.

"This lack of enforcement led dairy owners to wonder if the regulations were ever going to be enforced, McMasters said. "Dairymen weren't sure if we were going to do anything" if they violated their permits, he said.

That is no longer true. Despite a shortage of manpower, the state and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency are going to keep a closer eye on dairies and feedlots in the Magic Valley.

Recently two dairies were fined by the

EPA and two more are being investigated, McMasters said.

About 240 Magic Valley dairies have more than 800 head of milking cows. Not all trouble hasn't been noticed before, he said, is "we haven't looked very hard at it."

Polluted surface water from dairies, feedlots, croplands and fish hatcheries has created huge mats of moss and algae on the Snake River, McMasters said.

"If you walk fast enough, you may be able to walk clean across the river on them by late summer, he said.

The last two dry years have let nutrients build up in the river and irrigation return-

the river. Those nutrients are normally washed out by high spring flows, he said.

Leaking underground storage tanks also threaten groundwater, McMasters said.

During the past year, 15 to 18 tanks have been pulled out of the ground in the Magic Valley and all leaked, he said.

"The potential is great for groundwater contamination" from those tanks; many of which contained gasoline or other petroleum products, he said.

New federal regulations require all underground tanks be evaluated and regulated by 1995. Older, leaking tanks must be replaced and owners of underground tanks must have \$1 million in financial liability insurance in case of spills or leaks.

## Speaker shares her experience with drugs

**TWIN FALLS** - When she was 6 years old, Mary Leach began to notice something was wrong at home.

Her parents were inconsistent. What she did one day earned praise, but the same action the next day earned a scolding. She later realized that her father was an alcoholic and that her mother abused drugs - legacies that caught up to Leach at age 27.

Leach, a recovering alcoholic and drug abuser, told about her life and her struggle against chemical dependency during a senior citizens workshop Thursday at the College of Southern Idaho. An administrator at the drug and alcohol treatment center, she also offered the seniors some tips to help avoid becoming chemically dependent.

"Abuse occurs with misuse," she told the group. "No person who ends up with chemical dependency and its side effects intends to be a professional abuser."

"Abuse is not a moral issue. The abuser is not a bad person," the former registered nurse said. "It means the person has a disease."

"This is not a good, bad or evil situation - this is a sickness," she said. "And the other side of sickness is getting well."

At age 27, Leach had her first sip of alcohol, a substance she had avoided because of her father's disease.

"That first sip led to another, until Leach had had four or five drinks more than anyone else at the dinner. Yet because of a chemical imbalance in her body, Leach did not feel the normal reaction.

"I felt a euphoria, that's the only way to describe it," she said.

Leach had embarked on her first of three bouts with chemical dependency. Leach continued drinking for nine years. Friends and family who warned her she may have had a problem were eliminated from her life.

During the last three years of her drinking, Leach suffered blackouts. The day after parties, co-workers would ask her why she did things she didn't remember doing. Her phone bills listed calls she couldn't remember making.

"Things began to get frightening at that point," she told the seniors. "I got help."

When she went in for treatment she was

## Tips from experience to avoid drug abuse

**TWIN FALLS** - The media has bombarded us into thinking if one little thing is out of line, we need medication to fix it or a major illness may ensue, Mary Leach told Y.E.E.P.I.E. conference participants Thursday.

After telling the story of her own alcoholism and drug abuse, Leach told the seniors she wanted to give them some information to help them avoid becoming chemically dependent.

"A lot of us think that every time we become uncomfortable, that the doctor can fix us pretty quickly," she said. "But not

every complaint needs fixing." It's okay to go through one or two days of sneezing and red eyes from allergies without taking medication, for instance, she said.

Here are some other general tips Leach gave about prescription and over-the-counter drugs:

- Be an intelligent and informed consumer. Ask your physician what the drug should do or feel like. Ask if it's OK to take it with other medications or if you can still have your cocktail at night.
- Tell your physician about other medication you may be taking.
- Don't keep over-the-counter or prescription medicine for very long, or

longer than the expiration date.

- Don't share your medication with others or borrow someone else's.
- Know how one drug will affect other medications you may already be taking. Aspirin, for instance, thins blood. So someone taking medication to thin their blood will be doubling their dosage every time they take an aspirin.
- Follow the directions. If your symptoms don't go away, don't increase the amount - see a physician.
- Keep a list of medications, dosages and prescribing physicians somewhere in a purse or wallet in case of an emergency.

## Hospital board OKs 2 bids for cancer center

The invitation to bid for the general cancer center contract will go out next month, Slabough said.

He said two Idaho firms and many out-of-state firms have contacted him for more information on the main project.

# Kimberly may rezone part of impact area from residential

**KIMBERLY** - Nearly 50 area residents packed into City Council chambers here to comment on rezoning a portion of the Kimberly impact area north of Addison Avenue to the Snake River canyon, which is currently zoned residential.

After about an hour of discussion, the council on Tuesday tabled the matter for 30 days so a study committee can be formed. One option is to devise a new zone to allow agricultural and residential uses. The committee will present its ideas to the Kimberly Planning and Zoning Commission within the next month.

More than a dozen residents of the area told the council Tuesday they want the land returned to agricultural zoning, which the council has been considering for some time and then giving the area back to Twin Falls County.

The area was zoned residential in 1980 and eventually included in the town's impact area, which gives communities some control over county property near town borders.

But council members began discussing earlier this year returning responsibility for the land to the county. Maintaining fire protection and other services to the area was becoming too inefficient, they said.

Consideration to release the land prompted discussions of changing its zoning back to agricultural. Many of those favoring the idea either own animals or live in mobile homes and were concerned that continued zoning as residential might create problems if they are shown to be out of compliance.

Justice Robert C. Huntley Jr. retires in August.

The state Judicial Council, which will interview candidates and submit two to four recommendations to Gov. Cecil Andrus, will accept applications for the vacancy left by Chief Justice Allan Shepard's death until July 3. Only one application is required for both spots.

Redman, 43, was overlooked for the court in 1967 when Andrus picked Byron Johnson.

Local politicians and attorneys want at least one of the two available seats to go to someone from the Magic Valley, which has no one on the current court.

Redman said many unknown factors make it "hard to assess" whether that sentiment will affect his candidacy.

"It could help, if (Andrus) decides to stick with the geographical imperative," he said.

Redman has been on the bench in Twin Falls for 10 years. He practiced law in the city for four years before becoming a judge.

Although he said he is well-qualified for the position, Redman admitted his chances may suffer from the fact that he is not a district judge.

The magistrate division is not looked upon with the same respect as the District Courts, he said.

The more academic atmosphere of an appellate court appeals to Redman, who frequently writes about judicial issues.

The death penalty is one of the issues likely to capture the attention of the court in the near future, Redman said.

Redman joins Twin Falls attorney Lloyd Webb as the only local hopefuls to announce their application to the court so far.

The Judicial Council will interview all candidates Aug. 3-4. If chosen to replace Huntley, Redman would face an election next May. The Shepard term runs through 1992.

drinking two fifths of vodka a day and weighed about 200 pounds, much of it water weight; she said.

After three months of detox and two months of educational treatment, Leach was sober. She went back to work for a family practitioner.

About a year later, under strain in her personal life, she stole a valium. Part of her knew there was a chance she could become addicted to drugs as easily as alcohol, but another side knew people took valium for legitimate reasons, she said.

Soon, Leach was writing prescriptions for herself under false names. Her actions didn't go unnoticed, and a physician confronted her. She denied her

problem. The physician turned the case over to the law, and Leach was arrested—and lost her nursing license.

She went through treatment again and has been sober and drug-free for 13 years.

For her own protection, Leach decided not to re-apply for her nursing license when she again became eligible after three years.

Her third struggle with chemical dependency was involuntary. Two years ago, Leach broke her neck in Florida. After surgery, the physicians prescribed morphine and Demoral to ease her pain.

She asked her doctor to take her off the drugs, told him she was a

recovering alcoholic and drug abuser and told him if he didn't do it now, she might never ask again.

"It's arrestable, but not curable," Leach said. "But I can share with you the fact that there is hope to get to the other side."

## Transportation Department seeks road bids

**TWIN FALLS**—The Idaho Transportation Department is advertising for bids on a number of road projects this summer in the Magic Valley.

Among the projects are seal coating about eight miles of Interstate-84 from the Wendell exit to the west Jerome exit, including the ramps at the Wendell exit, and about 10 miles of Idaho-46 from Johnson Hill north to Fairfield. This section will also receive about 1 inch

of scrub coating, which makes the road smoother.

Seal coating involves applying a thin layer of asphalt to the road and covering it with crushed rock chips. This prevents water from seeping into the pavement and causing cracks when it freezes. Seal coating is used to protect road surfaces and provide skid resistance.

Some projects will have about 2 inches of overlay across the width of the road to smooth it out and improve its strength.

The projects set for this summer are:

- Seal coating about eight miles of I-84 from the Wendell exit to the west Jerome exit, including the ramps at the Wendell exit.
- Seal coating about 41 miles of Idaho 75 from the North Fork Wood River to Stanley, excluding over Galena Summit.
- Seal coating about 5 miles on U.S. 20 from its junction with Idaho 46 to Fairfield.
- Seal coating about 13 miles on U.S. 20 from junction of Idaho 75 to Silver Creek.
- Seal coating and scrub coating about 5 miles of Idaho 46 north from Johnson Hill to U.S. 20.

• Seal coating and overlaying about 1 mile of I-25-30 in Hagerman, about 1 mile of Idaho 46 in Wendell and about 1 mile of the Wendell Spur.

The projects are scheduled to run from early July to late August and will cause minor traffic interference.

Each project will cost from \$300,000 to \$600,000. Deadlines for submitting bids are Tuesday for most projects and June 27 for some.

## Former UI employee wants to sever China pacts

**MOSCOW (AP)** — A former University of Idaho employee now teaching in China is calling for the school to sever all agreements with that nation following the bloodbath in Beijing.

But Idaho officials will continue to put on hold any decisions about future connections with Chinese universities until more information is available.

All friendship agreements with Chinese institutions only serve to promote the interests of Communist Party members who have repressed the recent student protests calling for democracy, said Diana Armstrong of Moscow.

"I'm writing to beg you to terminate all friendship agreements between UI and Chinese institutions," Ms. Armstrong said in her June 5 letter to the UI International Trade and Development Office and the College of Agriculture.

"Some would argue that such a move would further hurt the ones we want to help, further punish the innocent, i.e. the intellectuals," she said. "Unfortunately, this would not be the case. I have found that friendship agreements are used to reward good party work, to pay back favors, to secure same, not to train the most academically suitable."

Armstrong has taught for the past year at Northwestern Agricultural University of Shanxi Province, which renewed a five-year cooperative agreement with the UI College of Agriculture in May.

"I want to try to communicate to you the sense of agony, desolation and helplessness our students feel. And not only the students, of course, but a few brave professors."

Idaho's position is "to put everything we have on hold until we get a good read on what has happened and what will happen," said Al Lingg, associate dean of the

UI agriculture college.

"We simply don't have enough information on where that government is going at this time to make a decision," Lingg said.

The UI agriculture college has been the most active of various exchange programs between the school and Chinese universities, said Giovanni Fray of the UI International Trade and Development office. The other programs also are following the agriculture school's lead to wait and see what develops.

## Thunderstorms bring rain, threat of mountain flooding

**BOISE (AP)** — Severe thunderstorms blew into Idaho on Thursday, cutting power lines near

Cascade and prompting a flood watch in the central mountains. The National Weather Service issued a severe thunderstorm watch from 4:15 p.m. until 11 p.m. in the mountains north of Boise to 50 miles southeast of Great Falls, Mont. A storm warning was cancelled during the afternoon.

The Idaho counties under the storm watch were Ada, Adams, Boise, Canyon, Custer, Elmore, Gem, Idaho, Lemhi, Payette, Valley and Washington.

Almost a half inch of rain fell locally at the Lewiston airport at about noon on Thursday. Power lines were cut down as trees fell across Idaho 55 about four miles north of

Cascade Thursday afternoon, the Idaho State Police said. The road remained open through the evening, a dispatcher said.

The flood watch extended to Clearwater, Latah, Nez Perce, Lewis, Idaho, Adams, Valley, Lemhi, Custer, Clark and Butte counties.

The watch designation means conditions are favorable for storms or floods and residents should be on the lookout for threatening conditions, the Weather Service said.

Also warned to watch for flooding were the cities of Grangeville, Cascade, Lewiston and Salmon. The Weather Service asked people living near creeks or rivers in sleepier areas to be ready to move quickly to higher ground.

## Pratt trial proves expensive for county

**SANDPOINT (AP)** — The case against two brothers accused of killing a U.S. Forest Service officer cost about \$115,000, making the trial the most expensive in recent Bonner County history.

Prosecutor Phil Robinson said Wednesday that his office spent about \$100,000 to bring witnesses and try the case against James and Joseph Pratt for the first-degree murder of Brent "Jake" Jacobson.

Defense lawyers have submitted bills for an additional \$15,000 for

investigators and other costs, Robinson said.

James Pratt, 29, of Indian Hills, Colo., and Joseph Pratt, 27, Sandpoint, were found guilty June 8 of first-degree murder and 15 other felonies stemming from Jacobson's death and a robbery.

Robinson said taxpayers would not have saved much by having the Pratts tried in federal court, because the county would have had to prosecute all charges other than first-degree murder.

## Smoke jumpers observe 50-year mark

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — Al Cramer, a veteran of hundreds of parachute drops as a smoke jumper, still remembers his first leap from an airplane.

"In those days, we used a different kind of chute. It opened real hard," Cramer said, recalling the 1943 jump. "I saw black and blue and red. I made a standby landing. I woke up the next day with a great stiff neck, but I decided to give it one more try."

The next jump was a lot smoother and led to a 30-year smoke-jumping career for Cramer, of Sandpoint, who retired in 1975.

He hopes to be in Boise this weekend when some 800 smoke jumpers are expected to attend a reunion marking the 50th anniversary of the aerial firefighting technique.

Jim Blaine of Rathdrum also may be there. He's representative of the many smoke jumpers whose firefighting was confined to the summers of their college years.

Blaine, a logging contractor, was a forestry and business major at the University of Idaho when he jumped from 1963 through 1966.

"I came out of the Marine Corps before I went there, and there's a very similar camaraderie amongst the troops," he said.

It was also a great way for a boy from Twin Lakes, Idaho, to broaden his social horizons. The smoke jumper-ranks were filled with students and professionals looking for good-paying summer work or just plain excitement.

"At that time we had doctors, veterinarians, dentists, teachers, engineers, ranchers," he said. "We

had one guy who owned a hog farm back in Iowa. There were Cajuns from the bayou, Montana cowboys..."

The number of smoke jumpers has fallen in recent years, from 439 in 1967 to 350 this year. The numbers may increase as let-learn policies are re-evaluated in the aftermath of last year's Yellowstone fires, said Bill Ward, reunion chairman and business manager of the Boise Interagency Fire Center.

Cramer was with the Forest Service in Missoula, Mont., for 23 years, then spent the last eight years of his career in charge of Bureau of Land Management jumpers in Alaska. He recalled a lot of changes in the profession, mostly in safety equipment.

"When we started, our jumpsuits were made out of canvas and felt.

Then they went to Thinsulate. We got better helmets, masks. They improved the chutes," he said.

Cramer remembered the 1949 Mann Gulch fire outside Helena that was later the subject of "Red Skies of Montana," a 1952 film starring Richard Widmark, whom he remembers as "a real friendly guy."

Cramer didn't fight it, but two men who jumped with him on one day died at Mann Gulch the next.

Cramer doesn't know how many smoke jumps he made, though he was the first in Missoula to log 100 jumps.

"In all those years, they never got me in the hospital," Cramer said of his smoke-jumping career. "So I thought I was pretty lucky."

## Compromise could save Payette land-use battle

MCCALL (AP) — Groups battling over the Payette National Forest's long-range land-use plan have agreed to try negotiating compromises that could avoid long court battles.

"It would be a much better solution than letting a judge somewhere make the decision," said Dave Van De Graaff, regional timber lands manager for Boise Cascade Corp. at Emmett. "I'm pleased with the openness of everyone that has been involved, and I hope for the best."

The Payette Forest released a long-range management plan three years ago. Eighteen companies, organizations or individuals filed appeals. Forest officials say the 18

appeals were the most of any forest plan released up to that time in the Intermountain West.

None of the appeals held up implementation of the plan, but the outcome of the appeals could change some policies now in use.

Thirteen of the original appeals were dismissed or the Payette has negotiated with the parties involved, said Phil Gilman, lead planner for the national forest.

The remaining appeals cover both sides.

Evergreen Forest Products, Boise Cascade Corp. and Associated Logging Contractors, all timber-based groups, are appealing the Payette's plans for timber harvest

The timber projections either are too low, or do not provide enough guarantees for the industry, the appeals say.

Mountain States Legal Foundation, Denver, represents miners and ranchers who object to restrictions on those activities under the plan.

A coalition of nine sportsman and environmental groups and two individuals want a 10-year moratorium on activities on the South Fork of the Salmon River to allow time for salmon and steelhead runs to return to historic levels. The groups also object to plans to begin harvesting in a roadless area, the

French Creek-Patrick Butte area.

Spokesmen for both sides said they were optimistic they could resolve some of the differences. But a New York attorney who represents the environmentalists says there could be some problems.

He said the environmental groups are united in their position, but the timber interests are split, which could scuttle the talks.

"The key item for me is that even if we have disagreements, that we be handled professionally and that we work together to manage the forest in the best interest of the nation," said Bob Cusumano.

## Improved production method may cut steel costs

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Officials say a new way to produce steel products could cut production costs up to \$50 per ton, reducing industry expense and increasing the domestic steel industry's ability to compete on the world market.

The Idaho National Engineering Laboratory is managing the Department of Energy's Steel Initiative research project, and taking a major part in research. The first funding became available in March, \$1.6 million.

The technology being pursued through the program is a spraying process that sprays molten steel onto a cold surface to produce metal sheet with relatively little additional processing compared to current practices.

The conventional processing steps into a single process is expected to reduce capital

and operating expense and produce equivalent or superior product properties. But those involved say there are some significant technical problems to be solved.

The first phase will seek to produce a four-inch-wide sheet of steel with good quality and properties.

If the bench-scale system demonstrates the technology is both technically feasible and economically attractive, a second phase will study the process at a pilot-scale facility in a steel plant. It's expected to take \$30 million and five years to carry out the research.

The DOE Office of Industrial Programs is responsible for initiating programs under the Steel Initiative. That type of research requires industry to be an active party to the research, and contribute 30 percent to the program, either in

cash or in-kind contributions.

The spray-forming program has eight industrial participants. Air Products and Chemicals, Inc.; Ajax Magnethermic Corp.; A.O. Smith; Chaparral Steel Co.; Chrysler Motors Corp.; Ford Motor Co.; Geneva Steel and Haynes International.

Besides INEL, the Oak Ridge National Laboratory is participating in research, along with the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

Major problems to be resolved include designing a nozzle for spraying molten steel; controlling the environment while the steel is hot so that it does not oxidize; designing a surface that cools and shapes the molten steel spray and developing a control system that will allow the process to be operated continuously.

Both laboratories, and the university are working on nozzle design. INEL is leading the effort to design the system and to develop the process controls. The industrial

partners are assisting in all aspects of the research, including facility design and product evolution.

Officials said although the process is radically different, it might be suitable for retrofitting into existing production facilities.

## AFL-CIO seeks protection for threatened timber jobs

LEWISTON (AP) — The Idaho AFL-CIO has formally asked its national organization to help protect timber jobs threatened by a shortage of raw logs.

And it wants the labor unions in other timber-rich states to follow suit.

The resolution, sought by northern Idaho labor leaders Wednesday at the state convention in Lewiston, passed unanimously and without debate.

The organization earlier approved a resolution opposing the designation of federal forests for single uses, such as wilderness. A third resolution specifically against converting any more of Idaho's 9 million acres of roadless land into wilderness was withdrawn.

"I don't believe we should be so hardened that we're going to cut off our noses to spite our face," said Harold Klemm, a member of the state AFL-CIO's executive board. "We can't say that there are not other folks who have a valid interest in this type of an issue."

But the unresolved debate over wilderness combined with an

appeals process that can block access to roadless forest has helped create a shortage of trees. And that could lead to closure of sawmills and unemployment, he said.

The state group asked for legislation that would require a study of economic effects of the wilderness appeals process.

"There wasn't that much opposition to it," Klemm said. "A sympathetic ear is always there when you have the potential loss of jobs."

The next step involves gaining similar resolutions from the state organizations in Alaska, California, Montana, Oregon and Washington. Labor conventions in those states will be held this summer.

Last week, Judith Heh, secretary-treasurer of the Pennsylvania AFL-CIO, contacted the office of U.S. Rep. Peter H. Kostmayer, D-Penn. Heh attended the Idaho gathering. Kostmayer is the author of a 3.9 million-acre Idaho wilderness bill. Heh informed him her state's 1.2 million-member labor organization would stand behind Idaho loggers and sawmill workers.

From the parade, the Pistons went to their home court in suburban Auburn Hills for another celebration, which included a rousing speech by Mahorn, a 6-foot-10 forward who personified the team's Bad Boy image.

Then, at a locker room meeting just after that, Mahorn got the news.  
“It's a business deal,” he told reporters, “I'll be all right.”

Minnesota used its second pick for Corbin, another forward, who helped the Suns advance to the Western Conference Finals.

Minnesota's other selections included guard David Rivers of the Lakers, forward Eric White of the Clippers, forward-center Steve Johnson of Portland, forward Brad Lohaus of Sacramento, forward Mark Davis of Milwaukee, forward Scott Roth of San Antonio, forward Shelton Jones of Philadelphia, guard Maurice Martin of Denver, and 7-4 center Gunther Beckhe, whose rights were owned by Detroit.

## Nicklaus 1 back at soggy U.S. Open

PITTSFORD, N.Y. — The leader board at soggy Oak Hill on Thursday showed the first round of the U.S. Open golf championship putting true to form. At the top, after a 4-under-par 66, was an international star (Bernhard Langer), an obscure American pro (Jay Don Blake) and a player who needs to win a major in a major way (Payne Stewart).

Among those lurking just a shot back, at 3 under par, were a local hero (Joey Sindelar), a recent Open champ (Scott Simpson), the leading PGA Tour money winner (Tom Kite) and a legend (Jack Nicklaus).

“Mr. Nicklaus,” is how a U.S. Golf Association official made the news conference introductions for golf's grand master. Oak Hill is where the 49-year-old Nicklaus won the 1980 PGA Championship and finished second in the 1968 U.S. Open.

Nicklaus focused on golf for the last 10 days, to the point of taking a driver and 6-iron along on a Canadian fishing trip Thursday, he made four birdies and three fine par saves after a bogey on the first hole.

A bogey at the 18th hole kept the often-erratic Langer from the outright lead. Birdies by a staggering Stewart and creative Blake caused the tie at the top during a round surprising because it actually got completed.

Perhaps the weather gods also are fans of Nicklaus and, not wanting to see his early ending brilliance washed away, limited an expected day-long downpour to occasional drinchings.

Rain the previous two days allowed both sluggers and pitty-pat hitters to beat par. Wet fairways kept hefty drives from scooting into the rough. Greens were held long approach shots from those weak-of-the-toe and allowed everybody to actually put the ball during an Open instead of breathe on it heavily.

## Joyner-Kersey, Reynolds drop Mobil meet

HOUSTON (AP) — Jackie Joyner-Kersey and Butch Reynolds led a star-studded group of withdrawals Thursday from the Mobil Outdoor Track and Field Championships.

Greg Foster, Andre Phillips, Renaldo Nehemiah, Danny Harris, Antonio McKay and Raddie Haley also were among the late pullouts.

Prior to the meet, several world-class athletes, led by six-time Olympic gold medalist Carl Lewis, announced their intentions not to appear for various reasons.

In all, six of the eight U.S. gold medalists from last year's Olympics were missing. The absentees were Joyner-Kersey, Lewis, Joe DeLoach, Phillips, Steve Lewis and the retired Florence Griffith Joyner. The only two competing were men's hurdler Roger Kingdom and women's high jumper Lusia Ritter.

The winners of this meet qualify for the World Cup in Barcelona, Spain in September, but the large number of no-shows made certain that the U.S. team would be weak and inexperienced.

Joyner-Kersey, the 1988 Olympic champion in the women's long jump and sprinter pulled out of the 100-meter intermediate hurdles because of fatigue, a spokesman at the office of her husband and coach, Bob Kersey, said.

Last weekend, Joyner-Kersey ran the 100-meter high hurdles and the 400 hurdles in the inaugural Jackie Joyner-Kersey Invitational at Los Angeles.

Foster, the two-time world champion and 1984 Olympic silver medalist in the men's 110-meter high hurdles, withdrew because of foot problems, the spokesman for Kersey said.

Foster, who broke his left forearm twice in the past year, returned to competition last week and posted the year's fastest time, 13.19 seconds, in the Joyner-Kersey Invitational.

Reynolds, the world record-holder

and the Olympic silver medalist in the men's 400 meters, withdrew from the 200, reportedly because of a leg injury.

Phillips, the Olympic champion in the men's 400-meter intermediate hurdles, was entered in the hurdles and the flat 400 meters, but reportedly was suffering from a virus.

No explanations were given for the absences of Nehemiah, the world record-holder in the 110 hurdles; Harris, the 1984 Olympic silver medalist in the intermediate hurdles and the man who broke Moses' 122-race winning streak in 1987; McKay, a two-time Olympic gold medalist in the men's 1,500-meter relay, or Haley, a former NCAA champion in the men's 50 meters.

Among the other big-name athletes who said before the meet that they did not plan to compete were Edwin Moses, Mary Slaney, Evelyn Ashford, Al Joyner, Willie Banks, Valerie Brisco, Judy Brown-King, Billy Olson, Kevin Young, Danny Everett, Joe Falcon, Jim Spivey and Sydney Marc.

Two of the impressive performers among those present were crickets of the absentees, especially Carl Lewis. "I don't understand his reasoning for not running," said Dennis Mitchell, who won his 100-meter heat in a wind-aided 10.00 seconds. "You'll have to take that up with Carl."

Sprinter Dawn Sowell, pointed to the absence of Lewis and some of his teammates, including DeLoach, the Olympic 200-meter gold medalist.

"I don't know of their reasons for boycotting," said Sowell, the collegiate record-holder in the women's 100 and 200 meters, who won her 100 heat in a wind-aided 11.10.

Lewis originally said he was boycotting the meet because he was disenchanted with some policies of The Athletics Congress, the national

governing body for the sport and the organizer of the championships. Lewis later said he was not boycotting and would help support the meet, if TAC wanted, but he would not compete.

"Carl told you before this meet they would not show up," Joe DeLoach, manager of the Santa Monica, TC, said. "You've got political pressures and contracts."

"Carl doesn't lie to you. I knew they would be here."

TAC president Frank Greenberg said he spoke to Foster last week and he's 100 percent behind us.

"What happened to people like Foster and Jackie (Joyner-Kersey), they're all in shape, but not in real good shape. And they have to run a lot of rounds here."

Mitchell's time was not the fastest in the men's 100 heats, in which all four heats were wind-aided.

Daron Council produced the fastest clocking, 9.98, while Leroy Burrell also ran 10.00. Andre Cason was timed in 10.01, Brian Cooper in 10.06, Mark Witherspoon in 10.07 and Slip Watkins in 10.08.

The heats in the women's 100 also were wind-aided.

Sheila Echols, a 1988 Olympian, had the fastest time, 11.05, followed by Sowell's Louisiana State teammate, Ester Jones in 11.07.

The semifinals and finals in both sprints will be run Friday night.

The strong winds also were present during all three heats of the men's high hurdles and all three in the women's high hurdles.

Kingdom won his heat in 13:28, just ahead of Olympic teammate Arthur Blake (13:30). ## Raiders call Allen-to-Rams trade 'ludicrous'

LOS ANGELES (AP) — "That's ludicrous," an official of the Los Angeles Raiders said Thursday of television-radio reports that the team has talked with the Los Angeles Rams about swapping two of pro football's premier ball carriers — the Raiders' Marcus Allen and the Rams' Greg Bell.

The trade comment by Raiders executive assistant Al LoCasale, concerning the trade talk reported Wednesday night by several Los Angeles television and radio sportscasters, was one syllable longer than the Rams' statement.

"No comment," said Rams director of publicity John Osswald.

Bell said in a Thursday interview with Los Angeles radio station KNX that, "the news is news to me — I'm going to the Rams Camp (starting July 24) in the interpretation that I'll be as a free agent, but any NFL

team signing him would be required to compensate the Rams. Formerly with Buffalo, where he gained 1,100 yards in his rookie season, his Buffalo production diminished until he joined the Rams during the 1987 season as part of a three-team deal which sent running back Eric Dickerson from the Rams to Indianapolis.

With the Rams, Bell became one of the NFL's top rushers in 1988, his fifth season, gaining 2,122 yards rushing for 16 touchdowns along with 124 yards receiving passes for two touchdowns.

"We're in a contract stalemate right now," Bell said of his negotiations with the Rams. "As I look at it, things will get done in time."


LoCasale declined to give any information about Allen's contract status with the Raiders, but he said he has some obligation

remaining and that Allen is not on the list of those playing out their contract options.

Allen, the 1981 Heisman Trophy winner at Southern Cal, where he was coached by current Rams' Coach John Robinson, has been on the league's top performers for seven years. He was chosen NFL-most valuable player in 1985, and the MVP of the January, 1984 Super Bowl victory over the Washington Redskins, in which Allen gained 491 yards rushing.

Allen played with a cast on a broken wrist in 1988 and his production was lower than most of his Raider seasons. He gained 631 yards rushing and added 303 yards receiving, scoring a total of eight touchdowns.

He had post-season surgery on the wrist and his rehabilitation from the injury is proceeding, well, LoCasale said.

**GETTING A LINE ON ALIGNMENT**

If a car's steering seems to wander, the steering wheel does not center, or the tires wear unevenly, an alignment may be necessary. When cars used to have a full underframe, it was usually necessary to align only the front wheels. However, in these days of unibody (frameless) construction and front-wheel-drive cars, all four wheels need to be aligned. Each should be adjusted for toe in (the difference between the tires' leading edges and their trailing edges); caster (the forward or backward tilt of the spindle supports at the top of the wheel); and toe (the inward or outward tilt of the top of the wheel from a true vertical position). These adjustments should be preceded by a general alignment of the car's body and an alignment of the steering column within the body. This is not a job that should be done with skimping in mind.

# Lewis sets his sights on nationals

Paul Lewis is many people's dream about going to the Olympic Games and winning a gold medal. Chances to compete in the Olympics are few and far between, however.



## The Kids' Game

In the United States, only one out of 6,000 gymnasts gets a chance to go to the Olympics. Paul's James Lewis has just taken a step toward a dream of a lifetime.

Lewis, a 14-year-old Class II gymnast from Paul, recently qualified for the Junior Olympic National Gymnastics Championships in Oshkosh, Wis., after finishing third at the Northwest Regional Championships in Anchorage, Alaska. In the Northwest region, Lewis competed against gymnasts from Alaska, Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana.

When asked about qualifying for the national meet, Lewis said he's excited and nervous — but more excited. Lewis is the first male gymnast from Idaho to qualify for the national Junior Olympics. "I want to finish in the top half of my age group," said Lewis. "We plan to evaluate this year's meet and come back next year, and go for first," said Lewis' coach Andy Hambleton of Twin Falls.

Lewis' age group includes gymnasts up to 15, so he can come back next year and compete at the same level. This will give him experience that he can use to his advantage when he competes for another shot at nationals.

In Oshkosh, Lewis will be competing against about 100 gymnasts from around the country. He trains about four hours a day on weekdays, but Lewis doesn't plan to train as hard for nationals as he

did for regionals because he is also planning on going back next year. His goal is to get rid of as many mistakes in his routine as possible before he leaves for the Junior Olympics June 28.

Lewis began gymnastics at the age of 6. His strongest event is the high bar, on which he is the Northwest regional champion. He is

also strong in the vault, floor exercise and on the rings. Two of his major weaknesses, he said, are the parallel bars and the pommel horse.

Lewis has virtually no competition in Idaho; the closest is in Portland, Ore., where he finished second and third in two meets this year. He also finished first in a meet in Helena, Mont.

According to Hambleton, Lewis has enough talent to make his career as far as he wants to go.

The biggest obstacle at the moment is money. Lewis and Hambleton, who are seeking contributions from the public to fund Lewis' trip to the Junior Olympics, will need to raise about \$1,600.

Today's game was played in a Swiss team contest. One declarer played routinely and paid off to an alert defense. The other blew some smoke and made off with his vulnerable game.

At one table East won his spade ace as South followed with a routine four. Seeing little future in spades, East decided to switch to dummy's weak suit. A low heart went to the 10 and Jack, hearts were continued and the defenders took the first five tricks.

In the replay, South offered East some bait at trick one. Instead of following suit with his four, South dropped an enticing Jack. East now saw that he could establish his spades with more lead and risk that course, saving his heart ace as a sure entry. He got the heart ace eventually, but not before South rattled off eight minor-suit winners to go with his king of spades.

Should East have taken the bait when South dropped the spade Jack? Not so easy to answer without knowing this South. Against the spade continuation are two facts: Why would South choose bidding of one-no-trump over doubling for aces if he has held a doubleton in spades? And why would West lead the ace right instead of the trey if West actually held four spades?

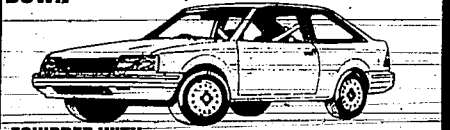

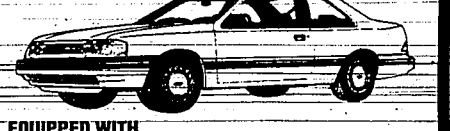

### Film censors restrict James Bond movie in England

**LONDON** — James Bond fans come up against some stiff opposition: the British Board of Film Classification. To Kill, which will have its world premiere June 13 in London, has been rated 15 in Britain. This prohibits anyone 15 or under from seeing the picture — the first such restriction for an 007 film, which traditionally gets a PG. The producer, Michael G. Wilson said that the producers attempted to appease the British censors by cutting 38 seconds of violence from five different scenes. But we reached a point where we thought the film would suffer.

Naturally, the rating is a disappointment, Wilson said. With an estimated 15 percent of the British population age 15 or under, he said, there are going to be a lot of disappointed young people. It's also going to cause some difficulty among older people. In Britain unlike the U.S., moviegoing is still a family experience. U.S. audiences get to see *Licence to Kill* when it opens here July 14 in more than 2,000 theaters rated PG-13.

### Sources say People bumped Costner from recent cover

**HOLLYWOOD** — Universal declined to comment, but sources say that Kevin Costner got bumped from a recent People magazine cover replaced by the face of Gilda Radner, following her untimely death. Meanwhile, it was learned, Peoples sister publication, *Time*, is interviewing Field of Dreams director and star Kevin Costner and the film, which has become the word-of-mouth hit of 1989.

*Time* never promises covers to celebs, so that is up in the air. *Time* film critic Richard Corliss said: "I'm not sure what play a story like that would get these days (with the China crisis). And if it does, I probably wouldn't tell you. Both *Time* and Newsweek, meanwhile, gave surprisingly generous coverage to Paul Bartels' Scenes from the Class Struggle in Beverly Hills, which opened nationwide on only one screen.

# Choosing movies for markets

Number of prints makes the difference in selection

**TWIN FALLS** — Twin Falls used to be a first-run movie market, but those days have faded, for the most part, to black.

As managing director of Interstate Amusement Inc. — the company that operates every theater in the Magic Valley — Larry T. Roper says he is aware area film fans want to see hit movies, and they want to see them fast.

But changes within the film distribution industry have tightened and delayed availability of all but the biggest movie releases, Roper says.

Moreover, theater operators' selections of films aren't dictated by what they personally want to book, Roper explains. "In today's business, it's what the studios will let you book" that determines what plays where, he says.

About three years ago, the industry began using what it calls "limited market release," Roper says. "The practice came about, he adds, because the studios "were making too many disasters, putting \$1 million into a movie, then not making a dime on it."

In limited market release, a distributor buys only 300 or 400 prints for the United States. More will be bought and distributed later if the movie does well. Meanwhile, the tighter release means markets like Twin Falls will likely be passed over for the initial stage of a film's release.

Not all movies open with a limited release, Roper says. When the distributor

Moviegoers say they are happy with the selections

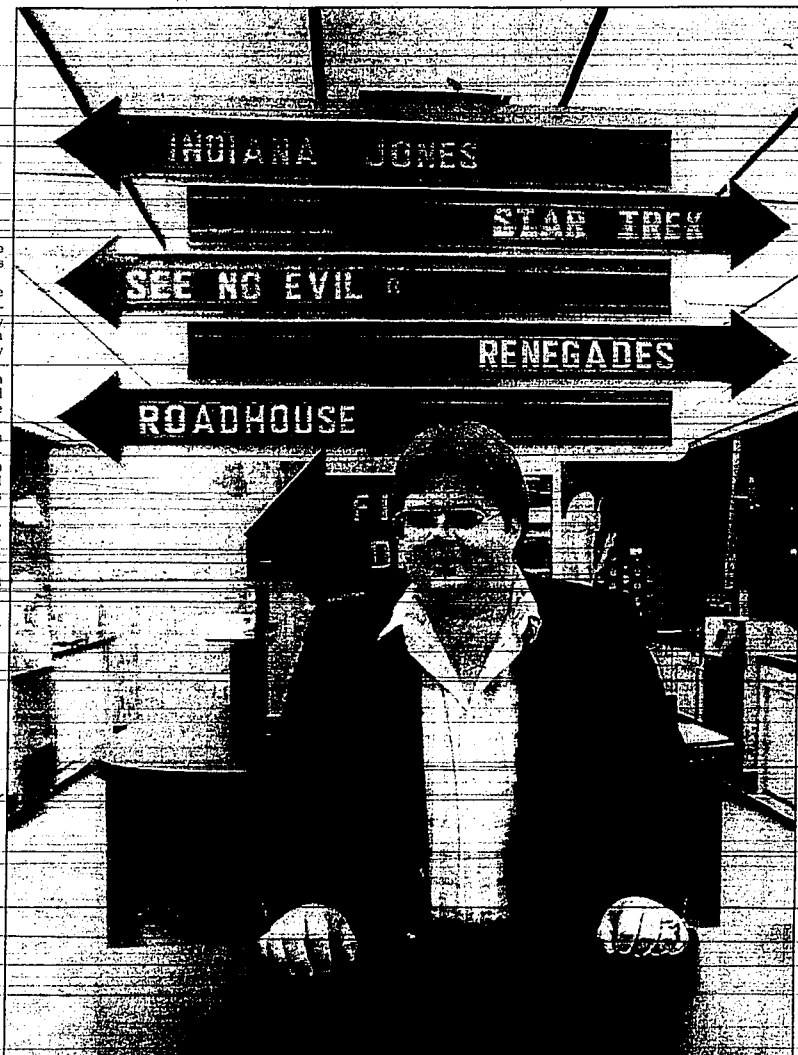

**TWIN FALLS** — Larry T. Roper of Interstate Amusement Inc. believes area moviegoers are fairly happy with the films his theaters are running. Most of his patrons say he's right.

An informal survey taken of people at the Twin Cinema 6 and Motor-Vu Drive-in revealed that area residents like the variety and choices of film fare available.

Statistics Roper cited may reveal why. Most larger cities have one theater per 12,000 residents. Twin Falls, with nine screens, has a theater for every 3,000 potential patrons.

Michael Wilbanks and Doug Johnson of Jerome took in a film at Twin Cinema 6 with their friend Monte Baird of Kimberly. Even though Jerome has a four-screen theater of its own, the men said they often travel to Twin Falls instead, since it is a

central location for the trio.

"Plus, there's always something to do afterward," noted Wilbanks.

Emilita Hudson of Twin Falls usually attends about one movie a month, but the summer crop of releases has kept her busier than usual. She had already seen "Indiana Jones and the Last Crusade" and "Star Trek V: The Final Frontier," so she

and her friends went to view "See No

Evil, Hear No Evil."

Hudson said she's happy with the selection of movies in Twin Falls, but she'd like to see films like "Amadeus" and "Gandhi" stay on a rea-screens longer than they usually do.

Tom Koluch of Twin Falls was taking his son, Christian, to see "Star Trek."

Asked if he likes the selection available, he said, "Generally not. There are a

lot of films they just don't get. I often go to Boise to see movies. But we still like to go to movies here."

# BSU radio station seeks audience in Magic Valley

**TWIN FALLS** — Boise State University's radio public radio station is extending its reach, and the Magic Valley is the first beneficiary.

KBSU, originating from the Boise campus at 90.3 FM, is now being picked up by KBSU, a "repeater" station broadcasting in southcentral Idaho at 91.7 FM. The 1,950-watt station is heard from a transmitter atop Jerome Butte.

Mike Exinger, assistant manager and program director of KBSU, says the station's presence in the Magic Valley marks the start of the BSU Radio Network. This summer probably in late July or August

additional "translator" stations carrying the network's programming are due to go on the air in New Meadows, Stanley, Challis and Salmon. The Stanley translator station will air at 108.3 FM.

The difference in repeater and translator stations is determined by their power, Exinger explains. A translator is a low-power station that can only rebroadcast signals sent to it. A repeater station has more power, is fully licensed and has the capacity to broadcast different programming than its originating station.

That means the network could air public affairs programming such as broadcasts of City Council meetings probably in late July or August

there are no current plans to do so. The capability could also help in times of trouble, Exinger adds. "If a specific crisis or emergency was occurring in Twin Falls, we could broadcast separate information for the Magic Valley," he says. "Part of our job is to serve the community."

David Goodwin, assistant to the general manager for the radio network, says the operation has heard some complaints about reception in the Magic Valley. He attributes the trouble to the weakness of the translators, however. This week, for example, the station was operating at only 50 percent power for several days.

The problems will be fixed, Goodwin says. "All we ask is that people bear with us," he adds.

Those who do will hear what might be the most varied programming in the state. Although KRIC from Ricks College in Rexburg can be heard on the airwaves here at 88.3, KBSU offers what Exinger calls "a much broader signal."

KBSU is on the air in the Magic Valley because people in the area asked for it, Exinger says. Many people already received KBSU via cable and wanted to hear it in their cars, too, he notes.

The station went on the air during the network's drive-for-listener support. "I thought we had pretty good response from the Twin Falls area," Exinger says. "Generally, it takes a while for people to hear it and decide to become members."

# French begin countdown until opening of the Opera Bastille

PARIS (AP) - The countdown has begun at the Opera Bastille. Some 150,000 hard hats are working double shifts putting finishing touches on the gleaming glass and steel structure scheduled to open July 13 as the French mark the bicentennial of their revolution.

French opera buffs hope the high-tech musical complex - built at the Galleries, Colleges and Revolutions - will restore the Bastille prison on July 14, 1789 - will finally put Paris on the international music map. For the moment, doubts remain.

The new Opera had been leaderless since last January when Israeli conductor Daniel Barenboim was fired because of what President Francois Mitterrand's representative said were his high fees and "elitist views" on opera.

Pierre Berge, the head of the Yves Saint-Laurent-fashion-empire and the man Mitterrand appointed to manage the project in its final days, said Barenboim's replacement would be someone who understood the president's wish to create a "modern and popular opera," accessible to the masses.

Five months of speculation and uncertainty ended last month when that someone turned out to be Myung-Whung Chung, a 36-year-old Korean conductor known for his skills as a pianist. Soft-spoken and unemotional, the new music director said he would be a team player eager to work "in harmony and unison"

with Opera Bastille administrators. Warning he would not get entangled in the political infighting that has beset the project from the start, he said, "If there is a fight, and I'll say it publicly right now, I won't fight. I'll just leave."

Although Berge declined to divulge Chung's salary, he said his five-year contract requires the maestro to be in Paris for 27 weeks a year.

for a minimum of 30 performances, Chung also let it be known he has his own ideas on "popular opera."

"Popular means the house is full and people are dying to get in," he said in an interview. "I'd like to broaden the opera-going public and see more young people and students in the audience."

Meanwhile, workers are busy getting ready for the inaugural concert.

knows a film is a sure-fire blockbuster, it will be widely released, and Twin-Falls moviegoers will see it just as soon as the folks in Boise and Salt Lake City.

The latest example is "Indiana Jones and the Last Crusade," Paramount ordered 2,300 prints of the Harrison Ford-Sean Connery film, and any market that requests one gets it. Roper says, "It paid off," he adds, noting the film made about \$100 million in its first 20 days, one of the best starts for a movie in Hollywood history.

Another of this summer's major films, "Ghostbusters II," opens tonight in Twin Falls as well as in the nation's major markets. "Batman," slated to open June 23, was ordered more than 4,000 prints for distribution, but Roper says he doubts that number is true.

But for all but the biggest films, the number of prints in circulation is the major determinant of when a movie will hit the Magic Valley. If there are 800 to 1,000 prints available, Twin Falls will probably get the film within four weeks of the initial release. Roper says, if there are fewer than 600 prints, it may take two to three months.

Sometimes, it takes even longer. "Amadeus," which won the Best Picture Oscar in 1984 opened at Thanksgiving that year, but was under such tight release that Twin Falls didn't get a print until the week after the Academy Awards the following March.

Some films may never get here. Roper calls last year's "Running on Empty" one of the finest films he's seen recently, but says it was never even offered to this market. Interstate Amusement does its bookings through a Chicago man who books films for 1,100 screens

across the nation. Roper says the booker handles 99 percent of the films himself, but if a movie is controversial - or requires unusual terms from the exhibitor, Roper himself will screen the picture, usually in Salt Lake City.

Even if Interstate Amusement had unlimited access to films, screening exactly which ones area moviegoers want is an inexact science, Roper says.

But there are some constants. People like adventure and getaway films, which explains the success of the "Indiana Jones" series. "It's a great two-hour escape," says Roper. "PG and PG-13 films consistently do better than R-rated pictures, although the Oscar-winning "Rain Man" proved a big exception. "Rain Man" was one of the biggest R-rated pictures Interstate Amusement ever had. I really don't know why," Roper says. "I thought it was very slow, very boring, but it appealed to a lot of people."

Westerns usually do well - but "Silverado" didn't. Clint Eastwood is normally a big draw, but "Pink Cadillac" isn't pulling big crowds. Roper says true-to-life or heavy-drama - such as "Fatal Attraction" and "Dunbar vs. Lintons" - don't go over well here, for the most part.

Roper's company has recently undergone misfortune in the form of fire and expansion with the addition of a sixth auditorium at its largest complex.

The addition of the sixth auditorium at Twin Cinema may be good news for area film fans who like more offbeat fare. Roper points to the baseball fantasy film, "Field of Dreams," as a movie that probably wouldn't have run as long as it has if the smaller

theater wasn't available. Roper was involved in the foreign film festival sponsored earlier this year by the Magic Valley Arts Council. The five-week series played to good crowds at the Mall Cinema, with about 125 people attending each week.

"It was our first attempt at something like that, and there is a market out there for it," Roper says. "I was surprised there was that much turnout."

The May 25 fire at the Mall Cinema was a blow to Interstate Amusement, but the downtown movie palace opens again tonight with Robin Williams' new film, "Dead Poets Society."

Roper clearly is in love with the historic building, which was built in 1920. He speaks with delight about how crews cleaning the smoke-damaged auditorium gave new life to the elegant former Orpheum.

Yet the future of film exhibition, he admits, is in multiplexing, the now long-established practice of putting two, four, six or more theaters under one roof. Although no plans exist now, Roper says the Twin Cinema - now Idaho's largest theater in terms of square footage and seating capacity - could enlarge again.

This building could expand very easily," he says. "It could go to 12 theaters, but Twin Falls has a tough filling seven."

Despite the trend toward multiplexing, Roper believes theater owners are swinging back toward building bigger auditoriums with larger screens.

"The movie industry has been centered on images being larger than life," says Roper. "The industry is going to have to come back around."

# The sun will come out tomorrow in Annie sequel

NEW YORK (AP) — Yes, Annie, there will be a "Tomorrow."  
"Annie 2," a sequel to the long-running Broadway musical about the world's most famous orphan, will open in New York next March after tryouts in Washington and Boston.

"This story is not really as much a sequel as it is a continuation," says Martin Charnin, lyricist and director of the original "Annie" which arrived on Broadway in April 1977 and ran for 2,377 performances.

"The new show, which is subtitled 'Miss Hannigan's Revenge,' is a Crackerjack box musical," says Charnin, who again will supply the lyrics and direction.

"The original 'Annie,' based on the fitzious Harold Gray comic strip 'Little Orphan Annie,' ended with the imprisonment of Miss Hannigan, the villainous matron who ran the orphanage, and the adoption of Annie by the wealthy Daddy Warbucks.

"In 'Annie 2,' which takes place six weeks after the original, Miss Hannigan is still in prison," Charnin says. "Her one dream is to wreak havoc on Annie and get revenge. She succeeds in doing just that. But there are many other complications that will keep you on the edge of your seat, I hope."

Rehearsals begin in October, with a first performance Dec. 14 at Washington's Kennedy Center Opera House, where the musical will play seven weeks, says Charnin.

It will then play Boston, probably at the Shubert Theater, for four weeks, before coming to Broadway, March 8, 1990. A New York theater has not been booked.

"Annie 2 was an agonizing show to write," Charnin says. "We went through three outlines and four drafts in seven years. Nobody wanted to go back and do it again unless we felt we had something quite specific to contribute and had a way to make it fresh and interesting."

The price tag also has changed. The original was budgeted at \$800,000. "Annie 2" will have a budget of \$6 million to \$7 million, says Lewis Allen, one of the producers. Much of the original production

Charnin and composer Charles Strouse will again supply the score, 19 songs in all. But don't listen too hard for "Tomorrow," Annie's song of hope that was the big musical hit of the first show.

"There's only going to be a hint of it in the new show," Charnin says. "It's like when you go to a wedding, even if they chose to play an original piece of music; somewhere in your head you hear Mendelssohn. Similarly, I don't think it's possible to go into 'Annie 2' and not, somewhere in your head, hear 'Tomorrow,' even if you don't necessarily hear it on the stage."

Dorothy Loudon will again play Miss Hannigan, a role which won her a Tony Award 12 years ago. Still to be cast are a new 11-year-

American Indian art. "The dolls are very colorful," said Woods, who added that they are made of cloth and feathers, with each piece having its own separate meaning. "At different times of the year, male Hopi dancers would dress in Kachina costumes and give performances. However, noted Woods, the Hopi Indians did not consider it proper to photograph Kachinas, so

# Fans find way to satisfy hunger for 'Star Trek' through books

LOS ANGELES (AP) — "Star Trek" fan J.M. Dillard was temporarily laid off as an English teacher at American University in Washington, when he decided to write a novel about the Starship Enterprise and its crew.

"I'd seen some of the other books, and I was a big reader of science fiction," she said, "and I thought, 'Well, why not?'"

After I finished it I submitted it to the publisher and heard nothing for 13 months. I figured that was the end of it."

But, one day, Dillard got a telephone call from Pocket Books informing her that "Mindshadow" had been accepted.

Thus, Dillard became part of one of the most successful series in publishing history and another extension of the 1960s television series, which was renamed as "Star Trek: The Next Generation," soon to begin its third year as the most popular dramatic series in syndication.

To date, Pocket Books has published more than 60 "Star Trek" novels, including four hardbacks, and sold an estimated 18 million books, according to "Star Trek" editor David Stern.

Every one of the novels published since May 1986 has been on the New York Times best seller list.

The books have become as successful as virtually everything else in the "Star Trek" venture. The fifth motion picture, "Star Trek: The Final Frontier," has just opened, with a box office gross of \$17.4 million in the first weekend.

Paramount Pictures makes the movies. Paramount Television makes "Star Trek: The Next Generation," and Pocket Books is owned by Paramount Communications Co.

"The current books began when 'Star Trek' creator Gene Roddenberry did the novelization for the first movie, 'Star Trek: The Motion Picture' in 1979," said Stern. "Prior to that, Bantam Books had published about a dozen 'Star Trek' novels."

The novelization of the latest movie, "The Voyage Home," is the latest novel to be published in the fall.

"It's a historical piece," said Dillard in a telephone interview from her home in Florida. "It fills in the gap between the end of the Enterprise's first five-year mission, marked by the cancellation of the 1960s series, and the first movie."

"It talks about the Enterprise coming home, how Capt. Kirk lost con-

mand of the Enterprise when he was talked into becoming an admiral and explains why Spock returned to his home planet of Vulcan."

Dillard, who has now written five "Star Trek" books, said she has a free hand in creating the stories as long as they don't contradict the established history of the ship and crew.

Stern said the books are written by

science-fiction writers, writers from other fields, and "Star Trek" fans.

D.C. Fontana, who wrote some of the most popular shows of the original series, wrote "Vulcan's Glory." The book, published in February, is still on the best-seller list at two major book store chains. It brought back Capt. Christopher Pike and "Number One," two characters from the original "Star Trek" pilot.

# Woman with herpes would like to talk to support group

**DEAR ABBY:** I am a woman in my late 30s, recently divorced after a nine-year marriage. I have been told I am attractive, personable and marriageable. So what's my problem?

A year after my marriage, I learned that I had herpes! My world came tumbling down. I had been a faithful wife, and the only way I could have gotten herpes was from my husband. He finally admitted that he had had mild symptoms when he met me, but didn't think it was anything to be concerned about. It wasn't easy, but we were able to live with it. After nine years of marriage, my husband told me he wanted to be "free," so we were divorced. As soon as our divorce was final, he remarried — as I suspect he had a lady waiting in the wings.

It has been two years, and I am having a hard time dealing with being single and having herpes. I hurt knowing that no man will want to

marry me knowing I have herpes. I have avoided forming any serious relationships for this reason. I feel totally alone, but I'm sure there are others in the same boat. Could some of your readers who have this problem share their solutions with me? Maybe it will give me some hope for my life, as I have no one to talk to I have so much love to give the right person, but I am afraid.

**DEAR ALONE:** You may feel alone, but you are far from it. An estimated 30 million Americans have become infected with herpes — although less than half of them are aware of it. The Herpes Resource

Center has a network of approximately 80 local support groups around the country. They provide information and emotional support, and offer an opportunity to talk about your situation (or listen to others) in a confidential environment. Sharing experiences and obtaining a broader knowledge of how the virus affects its victims' lives is the main theme of these meetings. Being able to talk with other people will relieve much of the stress, embarrassment and confusion about life with herpes. For a list of local support groups and a free pamphlet, that answers basic questions about herpes, send a

long, self-addressed, stamped (45 cent) envelope to: Herpes Resource Center, P.O. Box 13827-H, Research Triangle Park, N.C. 27709. The Herpes Resource Center is a program of the American Social Health Association (ASHA), a United Way agency.

## Singer tries to break out of 'soul' mold

needs. In Britain perhaps, but not in the United States.

**HOLLYWOOD** — Andrew Roachford, the lean lead singer and keyboard player for the British band Roachford, was sniping at today's soul music and American soul singers during a recent interview here.

"I got bored with soul," said the 24-year-old black Englishman.

This anti-soul diatribe surfaced while Roachford — who was very chatty — and often brash — was singing the blues about being pigeonholed as a soul artist.

"If you're black, supposedly you automatically like soul," Roachford noted sarcastically. "That's what a lot of whites think anyway. But I find soul music too sweet. What people like Luther Vandross and Freddie Jackson do is too sweet, it doesn't give any kick to it. It's just boring. It will put you to sleep. Bobby Brown is OK, but just OK."

"The way most soul music is now. If someone calls you a soul musician, that's almost an insult. I like soul music that grabs you — that jumps out at you. Like the way Little Richard used to sing. He was the most soulful singer I ever heard in my whole life."

Roachford, you see, is a rocker. "I'm trying to be like Sly Stone and they're putting me in a category with Luther Vandross or Bobby Brown," he said.

What Roachford does — as shown on the debut Epic album "Roachford," which features the current Top 40 hit "Uddly Toy" — is mesh R&B vocals with rock guitar, creating a searing funk-rock sound. Some of the material — all written by Roachford himself — is laced with blues — Roachford's personal favorite — and soul, but the dominant sound is rock, with guitar thundering throughout, boldly defining the music.

This rock-dominated sound plunks him into the rock category, basically a no-man's land for blacks.

"I'm very different," Roachford said, glowing a bit. "I'm black and I play rock. In people's minds, blacks and rock don't go together. Black rock star. That's hard for people to understand."

"Black people can play rock," he said. "People should listen to the album. Smugly," he added, "We're plo-

ing in America. Living Colour, with their Top 40 million-selling album "Vivid," has already proved there is room in the rock marketplace for a black band. Living Colour is also on Epic, which seems to have become the home of black rock.

Roachford, who grew up in a music-oriented family in a tough section of South London, has been into music — blues particularly — since he was a youngster. But in his teens, though, his tastes gravitated toward rock. "I've always been attracted by the aggression in rock," he said. "I like an edge to my music. I like it to have power and feeling, and a bit of thunder to it. That's rock for me."

When he decided to form his own band — which includes drummer Chris Taylor, guitarist Havi Gondwe and bassist Derrick Taylor, he finally settled on a rock-based sound.

"I knew it would be easier to get a deal if I played soul because it would be easier for a record company to market me as a soul artist," he said. "But I have to play music that is rock-based. It's the music I feel most comfortable with, the music that's the best form of expression for me."

England did not take to Roachford right away. Early last year, Roachford's first singles were ignored by English radio, but the band finally scored there in January. "Radio thought it was a bit of a risk — a black group playing rock, with rock guitar running through the music," he said. "They thought people wouldn't like it."

Undaunted, Roachford decided to take the music to the people, but finding places to play was a problem at first. "I couldn't play soul and hip-hop clubs because I play the wrong kind of music," he said.

"Touring with prominent artists like Eric Burdon, Trent Darcy — an ex-

perimental funk — also helped the band gain acceptance.

How is he regarded by black fans in England? "With mixed feelings," he said. "They're happy for my success, but some see me as a musician who's abandoned my roots. But that's ignorance talking. The roots of rock are blues, and blues is black music. But when you explain that, people don't want to hear it."

# Contemporary art boom leads to record prices for some work

With every crack of the auctioneer's gavel, the contemporary art market seems to be born anew. Here's a Richard Diebenkorn for \$1.43 million, a David Hockney for \$2.2 million, a Franz Kline for \$2.65 million, an Andy Warhol for \$4.07 million, a Francis Bacon for \$5.27 million, a Jackson Pollock for \$11.55 million — and these are just six of 42 contemporary artists records set last month in New York.

Where did these prices come from? What's driving the demand? Wasn't it only yesterday that the private \$1 million sale of Jasper Johns' "Three Flags" to three supporters of the Whitney Museum of American Art caused a sensation in the art world?

Well, actually it was 1960 — less than a decade ago, but during that time Johns' work has soared to \$17 million. And since 1983, when Willem de Kooning's "Two Women" sold for \$12 million and became the first contemporary artwork to reach the million-dollar mark in a public auction, 70 contemporary artworks have sold at auction for more than \$1 million apiece. The rise in the last two years is staggering: Only two contemporary works commanded more than \$1 million at auction in 1987; there was one in 1984, two in 1985, four in 1986, nine in 1987. That total jumped to 29 in 1988 and 23 in the first half of this year.

These figures pale in comparison to auction prices for Impressionist and modern art — 95 Impressionist and modern works brought more than \$1 million apiece last month in a three-day round of sales in New York — but the rise of contemporary art is astonishing because the test of time traditionally required to establish value has been dramatically compressed.

Charts of the top 20 art auction prices that used to be the exclusive province of Old Masters, Impressionists and modern artists now list one living artist, Jasper Johns, and Abstract Expressionist Jackson Pollock (who died in 1956), along with Impressionist favorites Van Gogh, Renoir and Monet and the modern giant, Picasso. Until May 31 when the J. Paul Getty Museum bought a Pontormo portrait for \$55.2 million, Old Masters had been bumped off

the charts.

While baffled observers recognize the smell of money, they are left with basic questions about the market and the forces that are fueling it. A series of interviews with dealers, art consultants, market advisers and auction house officials has produced the following observations and speculations on these queries:

How big is the contemporary art boom?

It's impossible to say except in relative terms. Estimates of the entire art market run around a few billion dollars worldwide, but contemporary art's portion of that has not been established. No agency keeps track of private sales, which account for the lion's share of the market.

Vastly increased numbers of collectors, galleries, museums and international art fairs indicate explosive growth, however. The best guess of Gilbert S. Edelson, administrative vice president-counsel of the Art Dealers Association of America, is that "the number of galleries in

Soho has tripled in the last five years and easily doubled along 57th Street" in New York.

Rising prices in public sales are a clear indicator of the boom. A list of records from Sotheby's May 2 contemporary sale, for example, presents astonishing jumps in price (without accounting for differences in quality) in 27 artists' work.

While contemporary art hasn't soared to the extremes of Impressionism — and the \$17 million Johns sold last November is seen as something of an aberration — auction house figures indicate that contemporary art has outpaced the market as a whole. In the last four years, Christie's international sales have increased more than threefold (from \$433 million in 1984 to \$1.41 billion in 1988) while the company's New York contemporary sales have multiplied nearly five times (from \$14 million in 1984 to \$67.69 million in 1988). This year's May sale of contemporary art totaled \$80.71 million, nearly double that of the May 1988 total of \$22.6 million.

## Rock singers follow risky trend of taking solo act on the road

During the past couple of decades, Neil Young has been by turns a tuneful folkie, country-rocker, proto-punk, technorokkie, retro-rockabilly and, lately, commercial-spurring big-band blues man.

In his current tour, he comes in quite another, increasingly popular guise: Solo.

Rockers itching to give a fresh context to their old songs — or to merely save the cost of a touring full-blown band — are clearing the stages of amps and wires and drum sets and multiple monitors, not to mention their musical colleagues, to appear solo.

Along

There is an implied sense of honesty and integrity appearing by oneself starkly on a stage with only a guitar. It gives one the freedom to change arrangements radically mid-song, or switch to another tune entirely, without the excessive facial cues to other musicians.

But there are also the pitfalls of a same-sounding-folk-evening-before-an-audience-that-might-want-to-rock; of performing without the net of other musicians' keeping one's time and place in a song.

It is risky but increasingly done.

Elvis Costello decided to go out alone on his spring college tour to promote his musically complex new album "Spice," which used contributions from dozens of musicians.

It worked so well that he will play his much larger summer tour alone as well — although half of the shows will involve a band called the Rudo Five, comprising Tom Waits' sideman Michael Blair and Marc Ribot as well as Pete Thomas, Jerry Scheff and Larry Knechtel.

During the college tour, Costello, besides accompanying himself on acoustic guitar, performed one of his old hits, "Pump It Up," with an electric guitar, backed by a harsh industrial backing track.

Opening for him on that tour, his ex-producer Nick Lowe performed solo as well. But besides accompany-

ing himself on electric rock guitar, Lowe did the more odd thing of backing himself on one song using only an electric bass.

Another Costello producer, T Bone Burnett, recently stood alone for a solo tour.

Al Anderson, the hulking guitarist of NRBQ, tried his hand at solo performing this year as well. And now that his second solo album, "Party Favors," has finally been released on Twin Tone records, he may be booking more dates, even though NRBQ is readying a new album for Virgin Records.

Graham Parker was encouraged by John Hiatt to try a solo tour. Al-

though he was skeptical of appearing without his backing band, the Rumour, Parker found he had freedom, alone with his electric guitar, to bring back old songs he would not consider performing months before with his band.

The resulting album, "Alive Alone in America," was critically praised and prompted a second solo tour to promote it.

These days, though, a solo acoustic turn is a usual staple of Bob Dylan's increasingly frequent tours. But this year, as last, he will be backed by the Trio of G.E. Smith, Kenny Aaronson and Christopher Parker.

# 'Indiana Jones' movie sells record amount of tickets

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — "Indiana Jones and the Last Crusade" bush-whacked moviegoers across the nation in its first weekend, selling a record \$6.9 million worth of tickets in six days.

The third installment in the adventures of Steven Spielberg's spry, fedora-wearing archaeologist topped the previous week, weekend and single-day movie admission records, according to figures released Tuesday.

"The Last Crusade," which opened May 24 at 2,227 screens, set a new mark for the largest single-day gate in movie history, selling \$1.2 million in admissions on Saturday alone. For the three-day weekend, it grossed \$2.4 million.

Last year's mega-hit "Rain Man," for comparison, collected only \$7 million in its opening three-day weekend.

The previous six-day record-holder, Paramount's "Indiana Jones and the Temple of Doom," gathered \$4.3 million in 1984, drawing \$1.7 million in a full week. The former single-day mark was held by Paramount's 1987 hit "Beverly Hills Cop II," which sold \$3.7 million in its first Saturday.

"The Last Crusade" will almost certainly become the first movie to gross more than \$50 million in one week.

"It's been fantastic," said George Pappas, assistant manager of downtown Philadelphia's Sameric 4. "On opening day, we had people lining up at 8:30 a.m. for the 8 p.m. show. First time I've ever seen that for a movie."

It haven't been home since last Wednesday" when the consistently sold-out show opened, said John Pellegrino, manager of the Lewis 34th Street Showplace in Manhattan.

"The Last Crusade's" fortunes were boosted by a barrage of Memorial Day vacations and higher ticket prices — \$7 was charged at some Los Angeles venues — in many of the country's movie houses.

No matter how high the price or how long the wait, audiences were determined to see Harrison Ford's Indy save the Holy Grail — said to be the chalice used by Christ at the Last Supper — from the Nazis.

At theaters in the Westwood district near the University of California-Los Angeles, lines for "The Last Crusade" snaked around the block throughout the weekend. The wait for late-night screenings in suburban theaters approached an hour. At the Mann Alex theater in nearby Glendale, the flood of fans drained the concessions stand of ice, hot dog buns and change.

Audiences at some theaters cheered even the movie's opening credits, greeted Ford's first appearance with whoops of joy and heartily applauded the introduction of co-star Sean Connery.

# 'Star Trek V' will please the Trekkies

"Star Trek IV" was well-received by the critics, many of whom were impressed by the humor in the script. That was probably why the producers, happy with the way the movie was accepted, decided to do "Star Trek V: The Final Frontier" with even more humor.

That may not have been the best of ideas. A little humor, here and there, is always an advantage, but in this instance, we have too much. That is not true of the entire film, but for the first 45 minutes or so, the new "Star Trek" sounds like an HBO comedy special, one of those shows that feature a succession of new stand-up comics.

Everyone in the new film is doing comedy, including Leonard Nimoy, as Spock. He, however, knows how to handle it. William Shatner and DeForest Kelley are not all that easy with it. They improve as the film moves along, but when we get down to the plot and the humor becomes more sparse, everyone does better. Those first 45 minutes are the least exciting.

That is not bad. "Star Trek V: The Final Frontier" is 108 minutes long, so most of it works. Most of it will please the Trekkies and others who enjoy the films for what they are.

The "Star Trek" movies have always made the audience work. The TV series did, too. The writers never pandered. They dealt with the mythical, the mystical, the philosophical and the theological, and the fans ate it up, just as they have devoured the motion pictures that have been based on the series.

Paramount was very sparing with the plot details of the new film. The most they would say was that the fifth in the feature-film series would take the crew members of the Starship Enterprise "on the most fantastic outer space adventure of all."

**HOLLYWOOD** — "The U.S. remains the source of software. Without software, communications technology is dead."

The first of these films, "Blue Steel," directed by Kathryn Bigelow and produced by Edward Pressman and Oliver Stone, is scheduled for release this fall. Jamie Lee Curtis stars.

CST Communications — formed by C. Rob, Sutory Ltd. and Tokyo Broadcasting System — got burned by losses when it invested \$15 million in three MGM-UA films. But the partners still think they can make money in Hollywood — and they're trying again with the same studio.

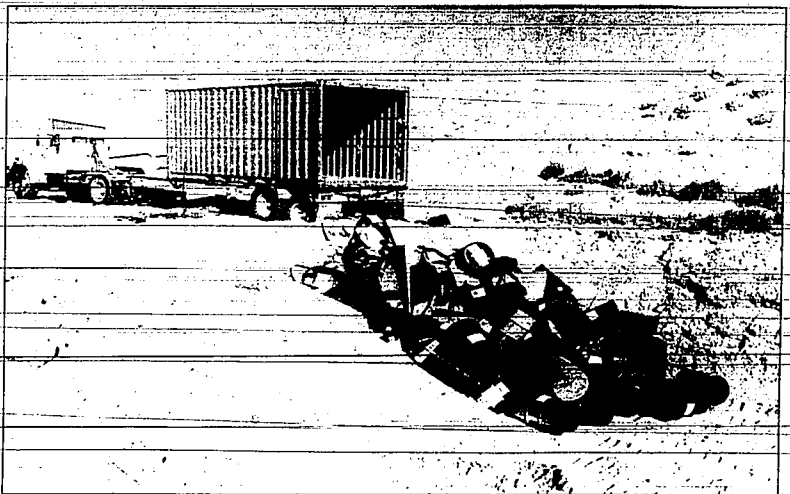

# ABC hits the beach with new drama about women who served in Vietnam

"Reflections of the way life used to be...

The Vietnam War has been dramatized dozens of times, but mostly from the point of view of the men who were fighting and dying. "China Beach" (airing Wednesdays on ABC) is about the women who came face-to-face with all of the war's extremes.

"Everything that you see on the show has really happened," says Dana Delany, who plays war-weary nurse Colleen McMurphy. "It's all based on truth, and that's because there's such a wealth of material out there. The longer we are on the air, the longer we can go on doing their stories."

Delany frequently gets letters from nurses who were in Vietnam. "They are always very pained," she says. "The nurses are just starting to deal with what happened to them. For a long time, they didn't feel like vets, because they actually weren't fighting. They were never trained for battle, which was ridiculous because they needed to defend themselves at

some point. But that was the '60s mentality."

The setting is China Beach, a hospital and recreational facility adjacent to the U.S. base in Da Nang. In the series, Delany's McMurphy deals with the conflict's uncertainties by limiting new relationships and suppressing her emotions. Other characters, who include the outwardly tough K.C. (Marg Helgenberger) and the personally ambitious Waylo Marie (Megan Gallagher), deal with it in different ways, but it affects all of them more than they are willing to admit.

"Any nurse going over there had to think of the people as the enemy because that was the only way to deal with war," Delany says. "The minute there were faces and names, then they couldn't deal with them. The same with the patients. Very rarely did they learn their names, because that would have been so hard. They chose not to know the names because of fear that they were going to come back in a body bag."

"It's just recently that they've been given that status and recognized as having as much stress as the men did," she adds. Where as the men had the combat to release their anger and their fears, the nurses had to

hold it all in. So in a way they suffered in an equally strong and different way."

Born in Manhattan and raised in Connecticut, Delany attended Wesleyan University, majoring in theater and working the summer-stock circuit between semesters. After graduation, she moved to New York and appeared in two soaps, "Love of Life" and "As the World Turns." Her other TV credits include "Moonlighting," "thirtysomething" and the TV movie "Liberty."

"Television has changed so much," says Delany. "It takes a lot more chances these days."

"I'm surprised how much I like my work," she adds. "I'm fascinated by it and I love doing all the technical stuff. And Jan-Wyatt, my technical advisor, says it's amazing how quickly I adapt to it. ## Have TV newsies gone mad for Madison Ave.?

### Analysis

A few critics got upset, but come on, was anybody really surprised when newswoman Linda Ellerbee sold her reputation for a cup of coffee?

Sure, it took a reported half-million dollars in java money from Maxwell House to get Ellerbee — a former network star and now a CNN commentator — to team up with "Today" show weatherman Willard Scott for a series of TV ads being broadcast around the country.

But everybody, after all, has their price.

And besides, Ellerbee has explained, she needed the money for her production company.

Ellerbee isn't alone. PBS venerable "This Old House" was almost torn asunder recently when producers at WGBH in Boston decided that host Bob Vila's cache of endorsements had undermined the show's editorial foundation. Vila, with 10 years of TV exposure under his work belt, is now free to nail down as many endorsement contracts for Time-Life how-to books and hardware store chains as he pleases.

Are Vila and Ellerbee letting America down?

Probably.

We could understand it when rock stars, never known for taking the

moral high ground, traded in their counterculture nights to Michelob.

But the Maxwell House ads, which normally have been perfect satirical fodder for a tongue-in-cheek tirade from Ellerbee, open up a whole new arena of marketing opportunities for TV news stars.

With penny-pinching honchos at the networks and legitimate ex-network newsies popping up in all manner of syndicated schlock, the Ellerbee commercial may only be the beginning.

Imagine, for instance, what Walter Cronkite, friend of the environment, sailor and, of course, "the most trusted man in America" (even if it was a decade or so ago), could do for a chemical company trying to clean up its image. Picture, if you will, what the merging of these two worlds, news and advertising — already on more than friendly terms in TV news — will look like.

Director to Cronkite: "So, Walter, can I call you Walter? Did you bring that sailor cap? We just gotta have the cap or we lose Maine, you know, all those sea states. They're killing us. Front office wants 'em off our backs, and you, Wally babe, you're gonna do it for us, aren't you? Look at that face (Ho gives Cronkite a light and loving slap on the cheek).

# NBC heads for 1-year top-ratings mark

NEW YORK (AP)—NBC, on the verge of marking one year after the A.C. Nielsen Co. ratings, barely hung onto first place last week with competition from two NBA playoff games on CBS.

NBC was also affected by President Bush's prime-time news conference, because it pre-empted part of the network's high-rated Thursday lineup.

NBC won the week ending June 11 with an average prime-time rating of 11.1. CBS had 10.8 and ABC 9.6. It was NBC's 51st win in a row. The last time NBC was out of first place was last June, when CBS had two games of the NBA playoffs also between the Los Angeles Lakers and Detroit Pistons.

The series so far has rated slightly higher than last year's. Tuesday's game ranked 16th in the Nielsens. Thursday's was tied for ninth.

NBC won on the strength of its regular series, even though they were in repeats. But ABC's "Roseanne" continued to top the summer rankings. NBC's "The Cosby Show" dropped to 11th place, which NBC attributed to the schedule shift for Bush's news conference.

The rest of the top 10, all repeats except for the NBA game, were: "Cheers," NBC; "A Place to Call Home," CBS; "Empty Nest," NBC; "Golden Girls," NBC; "Dear John," NBC; "Wonder Years," ABC; "Murder, She Wrote," CBS, tied with

The three-network share was only 58, typical of last summer. But big interest in news events, particularly China, apparently contributed to a 14 percent rise in viewership for the networks' evening newscasts, compared to the previous week. The CBS Evening News had a 9.8 rating and 21 share, barely edging the 9.7 and 21 for "ABC World News

Tonight." "NBC Nightly News" had a 9.0 and 18.

Each rating point equals 904,000 households with television. The share is a percentage of sets in use.

Fox got its highest share ever out of "America's Most Wanted" last week, an 18. It also made some inroads on Monday night with the second of its monthly theatrical movies. This one, "Big Trouble in Little China," got a 14 share.

## Summer continues to be network TV's dead zone

really doesn't have a fall season per se.

Once upon a time, the networks thought it would be a good idea to have a 52-week television season.

Yet the summer remains TV's biggest dead zone. And it should be.

Think of it, television in the fall, winter, spring and summer. Sounds like a fairy tale, doesn't it? Well, the way things have been going for the networks, it is.

In some ways, the recent misfortunes of the networks, including declining audience shares, a writers' strike and the death of some former golden nuggets such as ABC's "Moonlighting," serve as the best arguments against television gagging without end.

Despite the Big Three's efforts to pump original programming into the summer months, television still has the smell of a dumping ground with failed pilots, circuses of the stars and reality-based specials killing time until the fall. And on the far end of TV's summer vacation, NBC in particular has taken a liking to the idea of previewing new series in the weeks before they officially premiere on the fall schedule.

One of the most common excuses offered by producers, directors and actors associated with television projects of limited importance or quality is the same one most of us used in grade school when we didn't have our book reports ready: "There just wasn't enough time."

There are, of course, occasional new and exciting moments of summer viewing to be had in sports and news and on cable TV, which

NEW-YORK (AP) — Steven Banks is not easy to categorize. He's a comedian, actor, rock musician and impressionist. He's very funny and he has something to say.

His one-man tour-de-force, "Steven Banks' Home Entertainment Center," has been packing them in on the West Coast, and viewers of the Showtime cable network get a look-see beginning Saturday.

The hour-long show was taped on stage at Marines Memorial Theatre in San Francisco. This month, Banks begins an extended run at the Canon

Theatre in Beverly Hills.

The eccentric Banks' kitchen shelves are lined with boxes of Duncan Hines cookie mix, the sink is full of dirty dishes, and the walls plastered with posters of his musical heroes.

The slightest task, be it talking on the phone or typing, turns into a performance.

short amount of time the cast and crew have to throw their work together. Too often, the less-than-satisfying results show up on our screens.

When the writers strike finally ended this past season, many industry observers in Hollywood predicted that the quality of prime-time programming would suffer in the crunch to get shows back on the air.

First drafts would become final drafts, many warned, and viewers would be left out in the quality cold. Can you imagine, then, what state television scriptwriters and their shows would be in if they didn't have a break all year? How about giving us a rest?

Has anybody ever warned you against too much of a good thing?

Have you ever heard anybody say that about television? Probably not, because much of it is still not very good, which is why so many new shows are canceled out of the gate each year despite their expensive price tags.

Maybe, just maybe, if network television producers took a little more time with their series, there would be fewer cancellations and more viewers. And as a bonus we would probably have fewer Bob Hope birthday bashes and TV movies starring Jaclyn Smith.

There is a kind of supply-and-demand dynamic that keeps the networks going, especially since no one cable network has been able to come up with a sustained level of variety and quality to pull in huge groups of viewers the way the networks do.
