Red tape, broken promises leave radioactive waste buried in Idaho

IDAHO FALLS — Movement of buried radioactive waste out of Idaho has been tied up with red tape and a string of broken promises.

When the government stopped burying long-lived radioactive waste in 1970, it promised Idaho the waste would be cleaned up by the end of the decade.

The first barrel has yet to leave.

"This problem has been evaded and postponed for years," the late Sen. Frank Church wrote to then Energy Secretary James Schlesinger in December 1971.

Church's sentiments are as pertinent today as in 1977. Since 1970, under five presidential administrations, government efforts to find a permanent home for Idaho's waste have left a trail of delay and disappointment.

Federal officials today have no definite plans to exhume the waste buried at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

Almost 20 years after promising to move the buried waste, the U.S. Energy Department is working on a plan that will look at alternatives that will include digging it up — but also will include leaving it where it is, said Leo Duffy, special assistant for waste management to Energy Secretary James Watkins.

Starting in 1952, the government buried transuranic waste — waste contaminated with heavy metals such as uranium and plutonium — generated at INEL and at a number of other federal nuclear installations.

At the time, officials regarded the burial as permanent.

"There was no intention by anybody in the past to retrieve

buried waste," Duffy says.

By 1970, however, the government had changed its mind.

In a May 26, 1970, letter, John A. Erlewine, assistant manager for Atomic Energy Commission operations, wrote: "AEC regards burial of solid radioactive wastes (at INEL) as constituting storage, not disposal."

That year the AEC predecessor to the Energy Department said it would dig up the waste buried in Idaho by 1980 and ship it to a permanent repository.

The government's promise, however, was based on a flawed assumption: that a federal repository would open in Kansas by the mid-1970s.

Seven years before, the government had begun investigating the Carey salt mine beneath Lyons, Kansas, for use as a disposal site for radioactive waste.

"When the salt mine repository is fully operative, AEC plans to store not only currently generated (transuranic) wastes but also to excavate, process and ship such wastes — which are being temporarily stored" at INEL, AEC Chairman Glenn T. Seaborg wrote to Church in 1970.

Satisfied it had the right site, the government paid \$3.5 million in 1971 for 800 acres of the Kansas mine. A Rhode Island senator pronounced it the most appropriate and safest place to store radioactive waste.

The Kansas geologists said the AEC had put less effort into scientific studies than into convincing the public the site was

That same year, however, the project dissolved when the Kansas Geological Survey discovered serious geological flaws.

The area was riddled with uncapped boreholes from past oil exploration, and 175,000 gallons of water disappeared unexpectedly in the mine.

Congress split on U.S. policy toward China

WASHINGTON — Secretary of State James A. Baker III appealed to members of Congress on Thursday to back the measured response of the Bush administration to abuses of human rights in China, and the House responded with a unanimous show of support.

But Senate Democratic leader George J. Mitchell of Maine called for a more forceful renunciation of the executions being carried out despite an appeal by President Bush to Chinese leaders to show clemency.

Mitchell, in a floor speech, said he understood "the delicate situation in which the president finds himself."

And, the majority leader said, "I support the stated desire to maintain, if possible, some relationship with the Chinese government."

But, Mitchell said, "I ask — I urge — the president to condemn these acts personally and in the strongest possible terms, to give voice to the feelings of the overwhelming majority of the American people."

Bush, meanwhile, told a luncheon in New York City "we're all very concerned about developments in China." Later, White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater

GATT demands U.S. end cane sugar limit

WASHINGTON — The United States received word Thursday that it must abandon its protective quotas on imports of foreign-grown sugar or make changes to bring them into line with international trading rules.

The order came from the Geneva-based General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade, the 96-country compact that administers world trading rules. The GATT Council, the organization's top policy-making body, approved a lower-level finding that the quotas were illegal.

Thursday's decision will not necessarily mean the end of the U.S.

sugar quotas, which have been criticized as one of the most egregious examples of U.S. protectionism. The order was based on relatively technical violations, which Washington believes it can easily correct.

But the GATT Council also opened the way Thursday for initial consideration of a more sweeping complaint by the European Community that would challenge the application to raw sugar imports of a 1955 loophole that has allowed Washington to maintain quotas on farm products.

U.S. officials say it is likely the

Legislators study ways to spend surplus

It appears there will be no shortage of proposals for the next Idaho Legislature to spend a budget surplus which has been estimated as high as \$50 million.

The Legislature's budget panel, the Joint Finance Appropriations Committee, spent two days this week

touring places where some of the money might be spent.

The tour by 14 of the 20 committee members included stops at Orofino, Grangeville and McCall.

At McCall, committee members looked at the state-owned site of a Girl Scout camp. The Land Board wants to raise the rent for the site, valued at \$3.5 million for more than

2,200 feet of Lake Payette frontage, to \$20,000 per year which Girl Scout officials say would force Camp Alice Pittenger out of business.

A bill was introduced last session appropriating \$3 million to buy the site so the camp could continue in operation. It went nowhere. At a recent Land Board meeting, the

'Batman' no joke to ex-Joker

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. — Hollywood's new gothic action-thriller "Batman" is nothing like the campy television series of the 1960s, and Batman's old TV nemesis found nothing to laugh about in the new Joker.

"This just hit me the wrong way," said Cesar Romero, the former Joker, played in the movie by Jack Nicholson. "This picture is dreary. The violence in it — goad God!"

The new "Batman" opens in 2,100 North American theaters Friday night, including the Jerome Cinema, poised like the dark avenger himself to make a killing at the box office.

Amid a summer slate of movie blockbusters, already shining like gold for major studios, the Gotham world of "Batman" glowers in its grim portrayal of primeval violence and urban corruption.

"This is a very serious, heavy crime drama," said Romero, a robust 82-year-old who just finished filming a cops and robbers movie in Pittsburgh called

"Simple Justice." Romero attended a media screening of "Batman" Wednesday night at the invitation of The Associated Press.

"It's not the Batman concept at all," Romero lamented. "And Nicholson, who is such a wonderful actor and who has done such good work, is just so violent."

"What was did was fun. It wasn't played that way. It was a spoof. It was fun. It was a comic strip."

Still, Romero added, "The picture will probably make a bloody fortune."

Indeed, entertainment industry insiders predict that "Batman" may gross more than \$20 million in its opening weekend.

The "Batman" Romero remembered was as much a reflection of its time as pop art and sunflower stickers

GNP growth masks slowdown

WASHINGTON — The U.S. economy expanded at a 4.4 percent annual rate in the first three months of the year, but the overall growth rate masked a significant slowdown in business activity, the government reported Thursday.

The Commerce Department said the gross national product, the country's total output of goods and services, rose at the fastest rate in more than a year during the first quarter.

However, more than half of the increase resulted from a statistical rebound from last year's drought, a one-time accounting change necessary to return expected farm

production this year to its pre-drought levels.

Discounting this change, the non-farm economy grew at a lackluster annual rate of 1.9 percent in the first quarter, down from a non-farm growth rate of 3.5 percent in the final three months of 1988.

The various changes left the GNP, after adjusting for inflation, at an annual level of \$4,077 trillion in the first quarter.

Economists have been predicting for some time that economic growth will slow markedly this year under the impact of high interest rates engineered by the Federal Reserve in an effort to cool off inflationary pressures.

On the inflation front, a price

index tied to the GNP rose at an annual rate of 4.6 percent in the first three months of the year, a less worrisome figure than a 5 percent increase estimated a month ago. The improvement came from slower price increases for farm products and industrial supplies.

The effect of the economic slowdown was evident in a companion report that showed the after-tax profits of American corporations fell by 1.1 percent in the first three months of 1989. The decline, which was revised from an even larger 1.7 percent estimated drop a month ago, was the first setback for corporate profits since a 2.5 percent fall in the first quarter of 1987.

Dangers from INEL waste loom large with public

TWIN FALLS - Late in May a tanker truck overturned near Fort Hall, spilling more than 10,000 gallons of ammonia and urea fertilizer, according to news reports. Had the spill occurred near water supplies, the liquid could have ruined drinking water sources for a year or longer.

The accident, though it didn't result in a disaster, illustrates a potential danger and backs up a point emphasized by supporters of nuclear energy:

Radioactive waste is far from being the only threat to the Magic Valley's drinking water.

According to a recent U.S. Geological Survey report, chemical pollution from agricultural sources and petroleum products presents a more immediate threat to Idaho's groundwater than radioactivity from the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

Still, though radioactive waste may not be any more dangerous than other industrial wastes, the threat to the Magic Valley's water sources from INEL's buried waste has some residents suspiciously eyeing the government's experts.

More than 73 percent of the respondents in an October 1988 Times-News poll of 403 registered Magic Valley voters favored cleanup of radioactive waste before any new projects were started at INEL.

Larry Cope, whose Clear Springs Trout Co. raises trout in water from the Snake River Plain aquifer, says that though "it doesn't make sense to use our drinking water supply as a septic tank," health threats from the buried waste are more perceived than real.

Mark Stubbs, Twin Falls County Republican Party chairman, has another view: Even a perception of contaminated irrigation water, he argues, could harm Idaho's agricultural economy.

"We don't need the actual risk to have a problem," he said. "We only have to have the threat of a problem."

Elizabeth Paul, executive director of the Snake River Alliance, a statewide environmental group, said what sets apart INEL's waste problems from other potential industrial pollutants is the secrecy, denial, lack of accurate information and a lack of outside oversight of Energy Department activities.

"We encourage the people of Idaho

to demand the resolution of all real and potential threats to our groundwater," Paul said.

But government officials point out that while Idahoans worry about perceived problems from INEL, the state has its share of real ones from other sources.

The elemental phosphorous plant of FMC Corp. and J.R. Simplot's fertilizer plant in Pocatello pump out plumes of particulates that include radioactive particles.

Both plants process phosphate rock, which contains small amounts of radioactive radium, thorium and uranium.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency is studying the effluents from those factories.

In another example of non-nuclear environmental hazards, underground fuel tanks at many gas stations throughout Idaho leak gasoline and other petroleum products into the ground, some of it getting into local water supplies.

Automobile travel, officials point out, is far riskier than nuclear waste.

Still, people drive many miles to public hearings to protest nuclear waste disposal.

One of those drivers is Jerome rancher Ernest France. He says he has no confidence in government assurances that radioactivity will never reach the Magic Valley.

From 1952 to 1970 the government buried more than two million cubic feet of transuranic waste - waste contaminated with plutonium and uranium - over the Snake River Plain aquifer.

That waste has begun to leak into the ground, and radioactive particles have been found halfway between the waste site and the aquifer.

France recalls when the government said plutonium from the buried waste wouldn't move through the ground at INEL.

It has done exactly that. Now, France points out, government scientists say the plutonium that did move into the ground won't move into the aquifer that waters his cattle.

"It just horrifies me to think that they can screw that up there at the other end," he said.

INEL struggles to overcome its past 'sins of emission'

TWIN FALLS - Having ignored scientists' warnings since 1948, while giving assurances that waste-burial practices were safe, the government still doesn't know the full extent of what lies buried under the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

Nor does it know how or why radioactive particles move through the ground.

But it has long known of the potential dangers of burying transuranic waste above a water source.

In 1948, a report done for the Atomic Energy Commission by the Safety and Industrial Health Advisory Board stated, "The disposal of contaminated (radioactive) waste in present quantities and by present methods (in tanks or burial grounds or at sea), if continued for decades, presents the gravest of problems."

As early as the 1960s - following floods in 1962 and 1969 and two 1966

fires in waste pits - Bruce Schmalz, INEL's now-retired head of waste management, warned of the potential for contaminating groundwater by burying long-lived wastes above the aquifer.

His concern has been echoed by other scientists familiar with the INEL.

"Over 20 years ago I recommended to the Atomic Energy Commission that the Radioactive Waste Management Complex was not a suitable location for permanent disposal of buried transuranic waste," said Jack Barraclough, a former U.S. Geological Survey hydrologist at INEL.

"Eventually flooding from local snowmelt or from the Big Lost River would provide the water for transport of the waste downward to the underlying Snake River Plain aquifer," Barraclough said.

In an April 27 letter to his

department, Energy Secretary James Watkins urged his effort to correct "problems predicted 40 years ago and apparently ignored."

"If we had been more sensitive to scientists, we wouldn't have the problems we have today," said Leo Duffy, Watkins' special assistant for waste management.

The 1948 Safety and Industrial Health Advisory Board report said many decisions on radioactive waste disposal relied on the "faith method" - officials "believed" it was safe.

Government officials and scientists over the years have issued assurances that radioactive waste posed no "significant" hazard. They said the technology for waste disposal was proven.

A long series of failures has since proved the experts wrong.

Yet the mistakes of a fledgling industry did not harm public trust as much as government secrecy about errors and potential health threats.

News stories in recent months have told of miscalculations and

cover-ups at government nuclear installations including Rocky Flats, Colo., the Savannah River Plant in South Carolina and the Hanford Nuclear Reservation in Washington.

In Idaho, when an experimental reactor exploded in 1961, officials did not inform Magic Valley residents that a cloud of radioactive iodine was heading their way.

In the Nevada desert during the 1960s and 1960s, the government tested nuclear bombs above the ground. Radioactivity from some of those blasts was detected by monitors at INEL, according to a former director of health physics there.

Government officials, however, maintain that no adverse health effects can be attributed to any of these events.

They point out that no statistical evidence links operations at INEL to cancer rates in Idaho. But that's all the statistics show - that no statistical evidence exists.

According to the vagaries of chance, cancer incidences in small populations - such as in many Idaho towns - could double or even triple without being statistically significant.

Five cancers in a town where one would be expected are no more unusual, statistically, than to have

no cases in five towns of similar size.

Radiation-related cancer data are based on a study of Hiroshima and Nagasaki survivors from 1950 to 1978. The study, however, relies on cancer deaths rather than cancer incidence.

Some types of cancer, such as thyroid cancer linked to radioactive iodine, do not necessarily result in death.

Idaho did not keep cancer incidence records before 1970. Nor has the government ever undertaken a study of health records of the population around INEL or its employees.

Don Ofe, the Energy Department's manager at INEL, says the site now must overcome the sins of the past. Some of those "sins of emission" were known in 1948, four

years before waste burial began at INEL.

"AEC isolated its projects, built plants which are a marvel of engineering and guarded them with extraordinary efficiency," a 1948 health advisory board report said.

"Their sins of emission, liquid, solid or gaseous, were diluted and isolated to what was estimated as perfectly safe. But AEC is now entering a phase in which their operations in this regard will soon be public property and they will be accountable to public health - a very severe critic."

Four decades later, the government is feeling the sting of that prophesied critic, as INEL and other nuclear installations face an increasingly skeptical and often hostile public.

previous promises to begin moving the waste by 1980.

In 1974, work began on a new repository in a New Mexico salt bed, and new commitments were made. Some called the project "Son of Salt Vault," but its formal name was the Waste Isolation Pilot Project - WIPP.

In a June 1975 letter to Andrus, R. Glenn Briles, the manager of INEL operations, blamed the delay on the Kansas repository failure. He said the government planned to start placing "significant" amounts of transuranic waste in the Waste Isolation Pilot Plant near Carlsbad, N.M., by 1980.

It was the first of many projected opening dates for WIPP.

Citing a National Academy of Sciences report pointing out the hazards of digging up transuranic waste, federal officials in the mid-1970s changed their emphasis to moving waste stored above ground to the repository and studying buried waste removal further.

Officials assured Church that

WIPP would begin accepting the stored waste by 1985 or 1986.

When the New Mexico repository didn't open on schedule, officials changed the opening to October 1988. But safety problems, political opposition and the failure of a waste transportation tank delayed the opening again.

The Energy Department and the National Academy of Sciences have given WIPP, the son of Project Salt Vault, the green light. The department now plans to open WIPP in September.

Little waste from Idaho, however, is expected to be placed in the new repository during the first five-year test period of this demonstration facility.

Rep. Richard Stenings has remarked a number of times about the New Mexico repository: "If it can't be stored safely at WIPP, it can't be stored safely anywhere on earth."

Federal promises notwithstanding, WIPP's eventual opening still is not guaranteed.

Recently four environmental

groups and the state of Texas notified the Energy Department of their intent to sue to force the government to comply with its own safety regulations.

Concerned Citizens for Nuclear Safety, the Natural Resources Defense Council, the Environmental Defense Fund, the Southwest Research and Information Center and the Texas attorney general have joined in the suit to require the government to show WIPP will comply with federal regulations before any waste is placed in the salt beneath the New Mexico desert.

If WIPP doesn't open, Idaho may well be stuck with the waste it has until another solution is found.

"The nation has to make some decision, otherwise rational defense and other nuclear energy programs will come to a halt," said state Sen. Laird Noh, R-Kimberly.

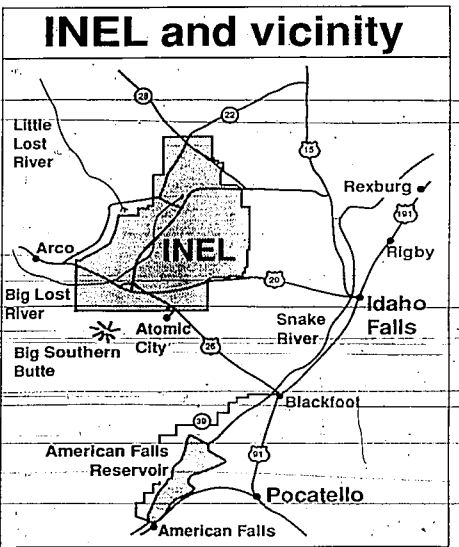
In the meantime, the waste lies in rusting barrels and broken boxes over the Snake River Plain aquifer.

Gathering information

This week's articles on radioactive waste at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory are based on thousands of government documents and interviews with present and past INEL officials.

The core of the information came from 1,800 pages of records released to The Times-News after the newspaper filed a formal request under the federal Freedom of Information Act.

The documents and interviews provide the Magic Valley with the first intensive examination of what lies buried above its aquifer.



Ryan blocks McKinney's execution

MOSCOW (AP) — Less than 48 hours before Randy Lynn McKinney was scheduled to die for killing a man eight years ago, U.S. District Judge Harold Ryan signed an order Thursday blocking the execution.

Ryan, who is conducting a trial at Moscow, signed a stay while he considers McKinney's petition for a writ of habeas corpus.

McKinney was scheduled to die early Saturday morning by lethal injection at the state prison south of Boise.

The stay noted that the petition was filed "on the virtual eve of the execution," preventing Ryan from rendering a decision on the merits.

But Ryan did not mention a controversial 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals ruling in an Arizona case that has cast doubt over the validity of Idaho's death penalty law.

In two recent cases, Ryan and Idaho's other federal judge, Marion

Callister, cited that ruling as a major reason why they blocked the scheduled execution of other convicted slayers.

Idaho's top legal officials contend a new U.S. Supreme Court ruling in Florida case wipes out most of the 9th Circuit's Arizona ruling. And Idaho and other states are asking the Supreme Court to directly overturn the appeals court ruling.

Kenneth Gallant, Legal Aid Clinic attorney at the University of Idaho College of Law, filed the petition for McKinney.

"He said he saw no particular significance in the fact Ryan did not mention the 9th Circuit ruling in his stay order."

"Without looking at the document, I can't really comment on that," said Gallant, shortly after the order was signed. He sent a messenger to federal court to pick up a copy of the

"I think that it means exactly what it says," Gallant said. "I have nothing further to add until I see the full thing."

Ryan's order Thursday said a cursory review indicated the McKinney petition might not be frivolous, or without legal merit, and a stay is necessary so he can study the petition in detail.

McKinney, 27, originally from Tulare, Calif., was scheduled to be executed at 12:01 a.m. Saturday for the 1981 robbery-killing of Robert Bishop, Pocatello, at a waste disposal site outside Blackfoot.

Accomplice Dovey Small also was convicted of the slaying, but she received a life sentence instead of the death penalty.

On Wednesday, Gov. Cecil Andrus entered the debate over the validity of Idaho's death penalty law. He urged the state's two federal judges to reject attempts to block

executions on grounds the law is unconstitutional.

The governor's unusual letter to Ryan and Callister said he believed a recent U.S. Supreme Court decision in a Florida case effectively overturned the 9th Circuit ruling last December. It voided the Arizona death penalty law because, like Idaho's, it allows a judge, not the jury, to decide if the death penalty should be imposed.

"The court indicated that judges may sentence convicted criminals to death without any input from a jury," Andrus said in summarizing the findings in the high court's May 30 opinion.

On Tuesday, the Legal Aid Clinic asked Ryan to stay McKinney's execution so the case and the state law could be thoroughly reviewed. The same day, the U.S. Supreme Court voted 7-2 against granting a

Merchants want tax-free status to compete with Indian stores

KAMIAH (AP) — Kamiah merchants have proposed a "tax-free zone" in town that would exempt all retailers in competition with Indian stores from collecting Idaho's cigarette and sales taxes.

The proposal, presented to the Legislature's Indian Affairs Committee meeting in Kamiah on Wednesday, is the latest in a dispute over tax breaks given to tribal stores.

James Emmert, chairman of the Kamiah Chamber of Commerce's Equal Rights Committee, said the exemption in Kamiah would cost the state up to \$300,000 annually in lost revenue. But untaxed transactions at tribal stores statewide already total up to \$13.5 million a year in

uncollected revenue, he said. "Why not spend another \$200,000 to \$300,000 to subsidize equality?" Emmert said.

State law exempts tribal stores from charging Idaho's 5 percent sales tax and an 18-cent per pack cigarette tax.

Fimmert's proposal would exempt businesses within a specific distance of the Indian retailer and selling merchandise similar to that offered at a tribal store.

It would probably apply only to Kamiah where the Nez Perce Tribal store, the Stop 'N Shop, competes with five grocery and convenience stores and to Plummer, where the Coeur d'Alene Tribe's Benewah Market rivals a convenience store.

4 finalists remain for ISU academic post

POCATELLO (AP) — The search for an interim academic vice president at Idaho State University has been narrowed to four finalists, including one faculty member, two deans and one assistant dean.

The finalists are Michael Gallagher, dean of the College of Business; V.P. "Harry" Charvata, dean of the College of Engineering; David Adlor, professor of political science; and Bernard Graham, assistant dean, College of Pharmacy.

EG&G Idaho scrapes for space for INEL

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — The addition of more than 325 employees this year and cramped quarters at Idaho National Engineering Laboratory offices have prompted EG&G Idaho Inc. to grab more than 60,000 square feet of office space in Idaho Falls.

EG&G, the U.S. Department of Energy's largest contractor at the INEL, has signed four leases for office space to house employees working on a series of projects.


"It's just a collective growth," Richard Rice, manager of EG&G's new program development department, said Thursday.

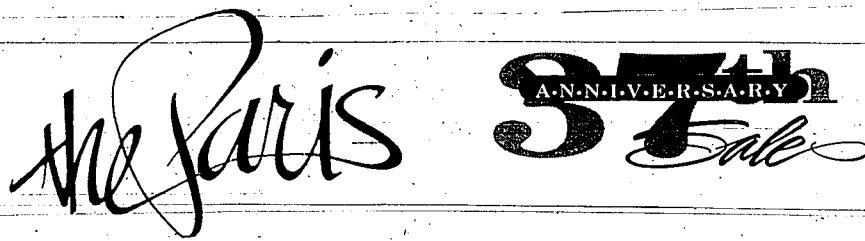

GTE wins right to bar competitor

BOISE (AP) — In a key test of the state's telephone deregulation law, Idaho utility regulators have ruled that GTE-Northwest may stop MCI Communications from carrying long-distance calls within GTE's northern Idaho service area.

But one member of the Idaho Public Utilities Commission called it a "hollow victory" for GTE.

"All things considered, it is not a moral victory," Commissioner Perry Swisher said in an opinion accompanying Tuesday's PUC order, since GTE itself has equated mandatory competition with progress in the

telecommunications industry.

PUC President Dean "Joe" Miller said in a separate concurring opinion that "although state law allows the practice, GTE's policy of blocking competitors from access to its long-distance lines amounted to seeking 'the protection of regulation to justify barriers to entry.'"

"I believe GTE would be much wiser to devote its efforts to solving the problems created by new entrants rather than attempting to suppress their existence," Miller said.

MCI Communications charged in a com-

plaint to the commission in February that GTE was unlawfully blocking MCI's ability to carry long-distance calls within northern Idaho.

GTE responded that its "certification of public convenience and necessity" gave it an exclusive franchise to carry both local and long-distance calls within its service area.

The PUC agreed with GTE. It cited the language of the Idaho Telecommunications Act, which took effect last July 1. The law allows phone companies to withdraw some services from the commission's rate-of-return regulation, but protects the monopoly

status of companies that remain fully regulated.

"The language is clear and unambiguous," the PUC order said. "The existing certificate constitutes an exclusive service franchise for all telecommunications services, and that term, as defined by the statute, clearly includes long-distance traffic."

Miller said it was "ironic" that the 1988 law forced the commission to make a decision less favorable toward competition than the PUC had made before the Legislature approved the statute.

Man held in drug case

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — A man wanted in connection with an illegal drug laboratory near Rathdrum, where two bodies were found, has been arrested in Medford, Ore.

Oregon narcotics agents on Wednesday arrested Larry D. Young, 41, of Medford, without incident a few miles north of the Oregon town. He was booked into the Jackson County jail, a jail clerk said.

An Idaho warrant for Young's arrest was issued Tuesday on charges of manufacturing methamphetamines and possession of ephedrine, a chemical used to make the illegal stimulant.

Young was to appear before a Jackson County judge Thursday as a fugitive and asked to sign a waiver of extradition. If he refuses, Idaho Gov. Cecil Andrus would have to issue a warrant to return him to Kootenai County to face charges.

Bill toughens penalties for tree spiking

WASHINGTON — Environmental activists who "spike" trees to prevent logging in national forests could be slapped with stiffer penalties under new legislation introduced Wednesday.

The bill, introduced by Rep. Charles E. "Chip" Pashayan, R-Calif., and cosponsored by Reps. Larry E. Craig, R-Idaho, and Richard H. Stallings, D-Idaho, increases the first-time penalty for spiking to a maximum \$20,000 fine and five-year prison sentence. Subsequent convictions for spiking could lead to a \$100,000 fine and 25-year prison sentence.

Pashayan's bill toughens a similar measure sponsored by Sen. James McClure, R-Idaho, that was included in the 1988 Omnibus Drug Act. The new measure also offers rewards of as much as \$5,000 for people who turn in tree-spiers.

"Tree spiking is the work of a small group of extremists determined to stop the harvesting of any trees," said Pashayan. "Responsible environmentalists who really want to accomplish something for our national lands are not involved in this."

Spiking is the insertion of foot-long nails into trees to discourage logging on public lands. The practice is particularly prevalent in the Pacific Northwest, where environmentalists have been fighting a bitter battle to stop timber companies from logging on public lands.

A spokesman for a mainstream environmental organization that also has expressed frustration about logging on public lands said he supports the Pashayan measure.

"We obviously don't endorse tree-spiking," said Jay Watson of the Wilderness Society's National Forest Action Center. "We're on record as consistently opposing activities such as tree-spiking that endanger human safety."

Thomas teachers approve contract

THOMAS (AP) — Teachers and officials of the Snake River District have ratified a new contract boosting the starting wage for teachers to \$15,470 per year, up \$320 per year.

A teacher with a master's degree or a minimum of 60 credit hours and a bachelor's degree who has been employed in the district 16 years, will make \$28,240, up nearly \$1,500 from last year.

The new agreement was ratified by the school board Tuesday after being approved by teachers earlier. The contract also sets up a sick leave bank in place of district-financed, long-term disability insurance, said superintendent Blair Widding.

Teachers worked four months without a contract in the last school year before a mediator was called in and a new contract was signed.

Germans scuttled Bismarck, explorer says

WASHINGTON (AP) — A deep-sea inspection of the Bismarck suggests that the most powerful battleship in Adolf Hitler's navy was sunk by its own crew rather than by the British in a celebrated battle, underwater explorer Robert D. Ballard said Thursday.

During a 90-minute news conference, Ballard described how he and his ocean-crawling robot located the Bismarck "sitting upright and proud" two weeks ago. Then, the American oceanographer, whose father was of British background and whose mother was of German heritage, addressed himself to the German people in German.

"I am an underwater explorer, not a treasure hunter," he said, translating himself back into English. "We found no human remains. We touched nothing and took nothing. ... The future of the Bismarck is in the hands of the German people."

He said he will disclose its exact location only to Germany so Germans themselves can decide whether to try to raise the ship, which sank after a battle May 27, 1941.

Ballard said under laws of the sea, the Bismarck remains the property of the German people.

The sunken battleship was discovered and photographed by the same remote-controlled robot that Ballard used four years ago to find the wreck of the Titanic, the British passenger liner that sank in 1912 after striking an iceberg.

Ballard, a senior scientist at the Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution in Massachusetts, said structural evidence satisfied him that the Germans scuttled the battleship rather than trying to surrender or allowing her to be sent down by British fire.

"Only scuttled ships tend to make it to the bottom in one piece," Ballard said. "It appears the crew opened it up along its entire length. It was clearly flooded, stem-to-stern."

"Maybe the Germans didn't want it taken as a war prize," he added.

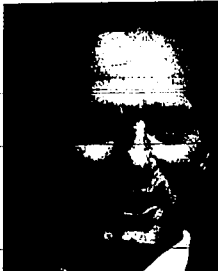
It is known that two years earlier, Hitler ordered the German pocket battleship Graf Spee scuttled after it was cornered in the neutral port of Montevideo, Uruguay, and attacked by British ships.

Hitler apparently wanted to keep the British from learning the secrets of the Graf Spee's construction and weapons.

In the 1941 battle, the Bismarck's

main guns were quickly knocked out and the attacking British ships were out of range of her secondary guns, Ballard said, so its was helpless and taking hundreds of hits — its sinking clearly inevitable. Rendered unsteerable by torpedoes dropped by tiny fabric-covered British biplanes, it was unable to escape. Asked if the German commander couldn't have surrendered by ceasing fire, Ballard said "in the faze of battle" in fierce seas it would have been unlikely that the British would have recognized that the

Germans were giving up.

Again, he speculated, perhaps the Germans did not want the ship's technologically advanced equipment to fall into British hands.

The Bismarck was found by Ballard in more than 15,000 feet of water about 600 miles west of Brest, France. He said it was in remarkably good shape, "elegant, well preserved."

Before the battle, British Prime Minister Winston Churchill had left convoys unprotected and thrown all his capital ships in pursuit with a ringing three-word command: "Sink the Bismarck!"

Of the Bismarck's 2,200-man crew, only about 115 survived. British ships picked up 110 survivors but left hundreds of German sailors still in the icy waters after spotting what might have been a German U-boat. German vessels later rescued only five more survivors.

The story has been recounted in books, songs and a movie.

The sinking occurred only eight days after the Bismarck left Gdynia, Poland, for her first operation.

If unstopped, it could have posed a critical threat to convoys of merchant shipping and undercut

British morale at a time when England stood virtually alone against combined German sea and air power.

The British sent the warship Hood after the Bismarck but within five days of going to sea the Bismarck had sunk the Hood in a three-minute engagement, with the loss of all but three of the vessel's crew of 1,419.

The Hood was a symbol of British sea power, and its loss stunned the British public and the war government and made sinking the Bismarck a mission of crucial importance.

Court says U.S. may seize suspects' money

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court, in a ruling expected to bolster the fight against drug dealers and mobsters, said Thursday that the government may seize money and property criminal defendants intended to use to pay their lawyers.

Ruling 5-4 in a pair of cases from Virginia and New York, the justices said the rights to due process and a lawyer's help are not violated when the direct or indirect proceeds of allegedly illicit activities are confiscated.

As it sped toward the expected end of its 1988-89 term next week, the court also:

- Narrowed a century-old federal law by giving cities important new protection against big-money damage awards when they are accused of violating people's civil rights.

In the latest in a string of setbacks for civil rights activists, the court said an 1866 law may be used to sue a city only if it can be proved the alleged civil rights violation was part of an official municipal policy. The court ruled against a former Dallas high school football coach who said he lost his job because he is white.

Ruled 6-3 in a free-speech case from New York City that communities may impose regulations aimed at keeping down the volume at rock concerts.

- Upheld a \$200,000 libel award against

Harte-Hanks Communications, but the decision did not appear to weaken significantly the news media's protections against such lawsuits. At issue in both legal-fee cases

were forfeiture provisions of key federal crime-fighting laws, the Continuing Criminal Enterprise Act and the Racketeer Influenced Corrupt Organizations law. Thursday's rulings also left states free to enact or enforce similar laws.

Justice Byron R. White, writing for the court, compared profits from drug sales to money stolen from a bank. A robbery suspect, White said, has no constitutional right to use funds he has stolen from a bank to retain an attorney to defend him "if he is apprehended."

White applied a similar principle to drug-trafficking profits. "A defendant has no right to spend another person's money for services rendered by an attorney, even if those funds are the only way that defendant will be able to retain the attorney of his choice," he said.

White rejected arguments that the right to an attorney deserves more protection than any other constitutional right.

The decisions said a criminal defendant's assets may be frozen before trial if there is probable cause to believe they were obtained illegally. Defendants who are acquitted may keep or recover their assets.

White was joined by Chief Justice William H. Rehnquist and Justices Sandra Day O'Connor, Antonin Scalia and Anthony M. Kennedy. Justice Harry A. Blackmun, in a dissenting opinion, said "it is unseemly and unjust for the government to biggar those it prosecutes in order to disable their defense at trial."

Armed forces' active-duty strength up

WASHINGTON (AP) — The active-duty strength of the nation's armed forces rose slightly in May with the greatest increase among Army personnel, the Pentagon said Thursday.

The Navy, Air Force, Army and Marine Corps reported 2,111,668 men and women on active duty as of May 31; up from 2,110,287 on April 30. A year ago, the Pentagon reported 2,100,025 men and women in uniform. Three of the services reported increases in strength during May while the Air Force reported a decrease.

The Army said it had 763,505 men and women on active duty as of May 31, up 1,717 from April 30.

Murderer agrees with own execution

CHARSON CITY, Nev. (AP) — A confessed double murderer said he found religion while in prison and became convinced he had no option but to be executed Friday for killing two men he thought were homosexual.

"Every man who has committed a crime of murder knows deep down inside he should die for taking another man's life," Sean Patrick Flanagan, 28, said Wednesday in an interview. "These men have no right to life."

Flanagan, 28, said he would not pursue appeals that could prevent him from death by lethal injection, scheduled Friday.

"There is nothing that could keep me from that. I'm paying my debt to society," he said. "If I had to live, I'd live. I do not have that choice."

Flanagan would be the fourth person put to death in Nevada and the 114th nationally since the 1976 U.S. Supreme Court ruling allowing states to resume use of the death penalty. He also would be the second person executed this week in Nevada.

Sled dog found alive after 18 days

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP) — A sled dog lost in poor weather during a climbing expedition on Mount McKinley has turned up, weak but alive, after 18 days on the ice-covered mountain.

Patricia and Jean-Francois Taveris of Chamonix, France, assumed the dog had fallen in a crevasse and died after it disappeared May 31. The Taveris and four dogs in harness when they started mushing up North America's tallest peak. On the sixth day of the journey, while descending to their camp at the 11,000-foot level after jerky supplies higher, they unhooked the dogs because of treacherous ice conditions.

A snowstorm forced the Taveris to hole up for the next four days. When they climbed to a medical research camp at 14,200 feet, they asked other climbers if they had seen the dog. None had and they assumed he had fallen to his death.

Smith appropriately receives roses

SKOWHEGAN, Maine (AP) — Margaret Chase Smith was sent 91 dozen roses in appreciation for her efforts to make the rose America's national flower.

The former U.S. senator, who is 91, accepted the gigantic bouquet Wednesday. Most of the roses will be given to nursing homes and a hospital.

Mrs. Smith said she had campaigned "for 40 years plus" in Washington to make the rose the national flower. It became known as her trademark.

"I always got it passed in the House, but never the Senate," she said. "Finally winning approval in both chambers, the bill was signed into law in 1987."

Court orders Yahweh sect to pay up

MIAMI (AP) — A federal judge has ordered the Yahweh sect to pay \$940,000 to tenants who lost their homes in a strong-arm eviction that ended in the deaths of two residents at a crime-ridden apartment complex.

The tenants' attorney called Thursday for a police investigation of the sect, saying the civil trial testimony demonstrated that the white-robed Yahwehs engaged in a policy of violence against those who opposed them.

They fire-bombed an entire block in Delray Beach, and they were involved in slayings in other cities, Thomas Eagles said. "I think the state and federal government need to carefully examine the judge's findings here."

Activists recall the Freedom Ride

PHILADELPHIA, Miss. (AP) — Hundreds of civil rights activists boarded buses Thursday to retrace the trail of the 1960s Freedom Riders and honor three slain volunteers.

Many carried with them a new attitude about this southern state. "I'm leaving with an improved image of Mississippi," said Minnie Sutton, 65, of New York. "This state has made strides forward although it looks like there's still a ways to go."

Sutton was among 470 pilgrims who arrived in a caravan of 13 buses from New York and Philadelphia, Pa., to attend ceremonies Wednesday in Philadelphia, Miss., honoring three civil rights workers who were slain 25 years ago.

On Thursday, 10 chartered buses left Meridian en route to Washington and additional ceremonies. The caravan, modeled on the North-to-South Freedom Rides of the 1960s, will end in New York later in the week.

Bush gets earful on drug problem

NEW YORK (AP) — A young man who lives in a homeless shelter told President Bush on Thursday that it's more profitable to sell drugs than work for the minimum wage.

"\$10 a week, that's no money," said 18-year-old Walter. "I can make \$100 in 15 minutes" selling drugs.

Winn admits influence gained funds

WASHINGTON (AP) — A former top federal housing official acknowledged using influence to get government funds for his projects but denied Thursday that any rules were broken in the process.

However, Philip Winn, who now is the U.S. ambassador to Switzerland, was greeted skeptically by members of a congressional panel investigating the Department of Housing and Urban Development.

"If it is your purpose to show how that is not the way things worked, you have a tall order, Mr. Ambassador," said Rep. Tom Lantos, D.

Bush backs bill aiding disabled

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Bush administration endorsed landmark legislation to bring millions of disabled Americans into society's mainstream but outlined disagreements over several provisions Thursday.

Attorney General Dick Thornburgh said the administration was in "full support" for comprehensive civil rights legislation for persons with disabilities and offered to work in good faith toward a "consensus" on areas of concern.

"We must end the anomaly of widely protecting women and minorities from discrimination while failing to provide parallel protection for people with disabilities," Thornburgh told the Senate Labor and Human Resources Committee.

He expressed concern over the scope of the public accommodations provisions, the size of businesses covered by the employment discrimination section and the inclusion of punitive damages as a legal remedy.

But the attorney general and representatives of disabled-rights groups played down the disagreements over the proposed Americans with Disabilities Act.

"It's a historic day, the administration and the legislature for mainstreaming disabled people," said Evan Kemp Jr., a member of the U.S. Equal Employment Opportunity Commission. "This is the first administration that has ever taken a disability bill seriously."

"I don't see any potential major areas of disagreement," said Pat Wright, Washington director of the Disabled Rights Education and Defense Fund.

David Runkel, Thornburgh's chief spokesman, said "there are some differences" but added that "I don't think anybody sees there's any insoluble problem at this time."

The bill would prohibit employment discrimination against people with disabilities by business with more than 15 employees.

Bush conflicts with court on flag ruling

NEW YORK (AP) — President Bush issued a strong personal dissent Thursday to the Supreme Court decision overturning flag-desecration laws, declaring that "flag burning is wrong, dead wrong."

Bush, who made the flag a major issue in his 1988 campaign, commented as he unveiled a nationwide volunteer program and asked Congress to appropriate \$100 million for it over the next four years.

In a speech to New York business and community leaders, Bush departed from his prepared text on the "volunteerism program" to comment on Wednesday's 5-4 Supreme Court ruling.

He stopped short of directly criticizing the court, saying he understood the legal basis of the decision.

"But, I have to give you my personal, emotional response," Bush said. "Flag-burning is wrong, dead wrong."

He was applauded vigorously by the luncheon crowd of about 1,000 when he concluded: "The flag of the United States is very, very special."

Bush frequently symbolically wrapped himself in the flag during last year's campaign, even giving a speech outside a New Jersey flag factory.

He repeatedly attacked his Democratic opponent, Massachusetts Gov. Michael Dukakis, for having retained a school pledge of allegiance to law.

The court's decision restricts the power of states to punish those who burn or desecrate an American flag.

China executes 7 more, arrests 13 on charges of spying

BEIJING (AP) — China executed seven more people Thursday for attacking soldiers who crushed the pro-democracy movement, and it charged 13 others with spying for Taiwan and helping the student protesters.

The executions continued despite mounting international condemnation of the government's crackdown on internal dissent.

The seven put to death by the state had been convicted of burning military vehicles when the army marched into Beijing on June 3-4 and drove thousands of demonstrators out of Tiananmen Square.

A poster board outside the Beijing high court was filled with small arrest notices, and those involving the condemned said they ranged in age from 18 to 33. There was a large red check, indicating execution, on each of the notices with the word "proclaimed." Soldiers later tore the notices off the board.

So far, 27 people have been put to death: the seven in Beijing, and on Wednesday three in Shanghai and 17 in Jinan.

The Shanghai residents were condemned of leading an angry mob

The 17 in the northeastern city of Jinan were among 45 people associated with the student

and riots after the military crackdown ended seven weeks of protests in Beijing.

Police since have arrested more than 1,600 nationwide for participating in what the government calls the "counterrevolutionary rebellion."

Many nations, including the United States, appealed to China for clemency for the condemned, and denounced the executions when the government carried them out.

Foreign Ministry spokesman Li Jinhua said Thursday it was "unwise and futile" for other countries to try to dictate how China should handle its domestic turmoil.

China hopes to maintain relations with the United States, but "we firmly oppose the American government interfering in China's internal affairs and exerting pressure on China," Li said at a weekly press briefing.

The Bush administration has cut off military sales and has refused contacts to protest China's suppression of the pro-democracy movement.

In announcing the arrests of the 13 people charged with spying for

Taiwan, national television news showed secretly filmed scenes of the accused mixing with demonstrators and joining in chants during rallies in Tiananmen Square. It also showed secret codes and invisible ink allegedly used by the men, all Chinese citizens.

China has maintained that the student protesters were manipulated by outside forces.

China's Xinhua News Agency quoted the State Security Ministry as saying that Taiwan ordered the alleged spies to "exploit the so-called 'democratic movement,' escalate it into an overall 'anti-Communist' movement and collect information for the Taiwan secret service."

National television also gave prominent coverage to a meeting of State Education Commission head Li Tieying and a delegation from the World Bank.

Li has been mentioned frequently in recent news reports, bolstering the critics' view that China's political hierarchy and may be headed for a position on the powerful Communist Party Politburo Standing Committee.

Tourists at French bicentennial find no room at the Auberge

PARIS (AP) — Tourists coming for the bicentennial of the French Revolution next month may find out that they picked the worst of times. They will have to stay in a hotel far from the capital. A parking space in Paris might be just as tough to get.

Motorcades for the 30 or so presidents and prime ministers will whiz through streets, and authorities will deploy 30,000 police — two-thirds from out of town — during the July 11-17 peak of festivities.

Tourists flock to Paris every summer, but officials say the number of visitors already is considerably larger than last year. During the bicentennial period, about 3 million tourists are expected to flood this city of 2.3 million people.

With a bit of luck, a tourist can still find a room this month. Next month — forget it.

"Impossible," says a woman at the hotel reservations center of the Tourist Office on the Champs-Élysées. "You'll have to go at least 100

kilometers (60 miles) outside of Paris. Paris is booked solid."

Many VIPs will be attending a July 14-16 summit of the seven major industrial nations, and their entourages will fill hundreds of hotel rooms.

Mikhail S. Gorbachev is coming to town July 4-6, followed by Corazon Aquino of the Philippines. Also attending celebrations are 10 African presidents, six North and South American presidents, six Asian presidents, and six prime ministers or presidents from Western Europe, with baggage. Among those attending is President Bush.

The elaborate preparations for the foreign leaders have left many people grumbling.

"Allowing a few dozen privileged people to be lodged and to move about tranquilly must not in any way be done to the detriment of hundreds of thousands of other people," elected officials from the Greens Party wrote to President Francois Mitterrand.

Conservative demands Greek leader resign

ATHENS, Greece (AP) — The leader of Greece's conservative party demanded Thursday that Andreas Papandreu resign as the interim premier because of a new banking scandal, the latest to occur under Papandreu's socialist government.

Papandreu later was admitted to an Athens hospital complaining of respiratory problems. Papandreu, 70, who underwent triple bypass heart surgery in September, was reported in excellent condition after he entered the hospital.

Constantine Mitsotakis said Papandreu was "responsible and guilty" in the scandal involving the state-owned Greek Mortgage Bank and the Atlantic Bank of New York.

History professor is killed in Jerusalem

JERUSALEM (AP) — A prominent Israeli history professor was stabbed to death in Jerusalem on Thursday, and police said they were investigating whether the killing was a terrorist attack.

In the occupied West Bank, Israeli troops shot a Palestinian man to death and detained 30 others during a raid on the village of Silwad, an army spokesman said.

Soldiers also shot and wounded six Palestinian youths in clashes with stone-throwers in the occupied Gaza Strip, Arab hospital officials said.

Panic spreads to airport in Soviet Central Asian town

MOSCOW (AP) — Panicked families crowded the airport in a Central Asian desert town where four people were killed in ethnic violence, official media reported Thursday.

The Communist Party newspaper Pravda said that although the town of Novy Uzen was quiet on Wednesday, its airport "is packed with families" trying to flee.

Pravda also said the disturbances had spread to settlements about 40 miles away in the Kazakhstan republic. About 500 people demonstrated in Zhetysai and two people were hurt in Munashi, the newspaper said.

It said ethnic Kazakhs in Novy Uzen demanded Sunday that all members of Caucasus ethnic groups be evicted within a week. More than one-third of Novy Uzen's 56,000 residents are from the Caucasus.

"The demand was accompanied by threats," Pravda said without elaborating.

The government newspaper Izvestia called the demand "anti-constitutional" and said it could not be met.

The violence began last Friday during a fight at a dance, and more than 50 police officers and soldiers were injured in rioting over the next four days.

Hundreds of Interior Ministry soldiers were sent to the town and authorities imposed a 9 p.m.-to-6 a.m. curfew.

Officials on Thursday tightened their control over Novy Uzen's water, sewer and electrical systems,

as well as food stores and a bread factory — all targets of rioters who want to "be able to dictate their own conditions to the authorities," Izvestia said.

Ethnic Kazakhs say the Caucasus settlers dominate the oil industry jobs on which the town depends and receive preferential treatment in housing and other benefits.

The settlers also have set up private businesses that sell supplies in the isolated desert town for exorbitant prices, Izvestia said.

Corrupt party and government workers in Novy Uzen also contributed to widespread discontent by "getting involved in dirty deals," the official news agency Tass quoted top Kazakhstan officials as saying.

In Alma Ata, the republic's capital, an ethnic Kazakh was named the region's new party chief to replace Gennady Kolbin, an ethnic Russian. He left the post to become chairman of the People's Control Committee, which monitors government ministries, Tass reported.

The appointment of Kolbin as party chief in 1986 touched off widespread rioting in Alma Ata that left hundreds injured and at least two dead.

The new party chief, Nursultan Nazarbayev, has been premier of Kazakhstan since 1984. The 48-year-old Nazarbayev was the first Soviet official to admit the 1986 unrest was ethnically motivated and not hooliganism, as press reports claimed.

Pope dedicates World Day of Peace to ecology

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Pope John Paul II has dedicated the church's next World Day of Peace to the ecological crisis, the Vatican said Thursday.

Stressing that the goods of the Earth must not be used "for selfish ends, for profit or power alone," the Vatican said the need to respect the

environment is a new challenge to peace.

"Peace with God the Creator, Peace with all of Creation" is the theme for the day, which the Roman Catholic Church marks on Jan. 1.

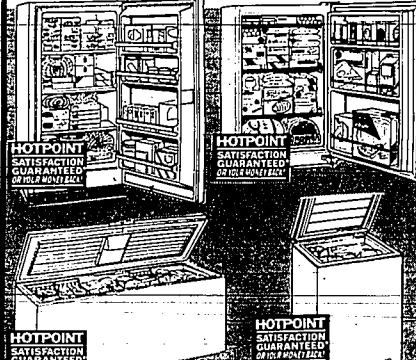

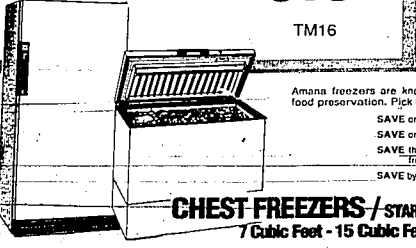

CARSON CITY, Nev. (AP) — A confessed double murderer said he found religion while in prison and became convinced he had no option but to be executed Friday for killing two men he thought were homosexual.

"Every man who has committed a crime of murder knows deep down inside he should die for taking another man's life," Sean Patrick Flanagan, 28, said Wednesday in an interview. "These men have no right to life."

Flanagan, 28, said he would not pursue appeals that could prevent him from death by lethal injection, scheduled Friday.

"There is nothing that could keep me from that. I'm paying my debt to society," he said. "If I had to live, I'd live. I do not have that choice."

Sled dog found alive after 18 days

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP) — A sled dog lost in poor weather during a climbing expedition on Mount McKinley has turned up, weak but alive, after 18 days on the ice-covered mountain.

Bat-Francois Taveris of Chamonix, France, assumed the dog had fallen in a crevasse and died after it disappeared May 31.

The Taveris had four dogs in harness when they started mushing up North America's tallest peak. On the sixth day of the journey, while descending to their camp at the 11,000-foot level after ferrying supplies higher, they unhitched the dogs because of treacherous ice conditions.

A snowstorm forced the Taveris to hole up for the next four days. When they climbed to a medical research camp at 14,200 feet, they asked other climbers if they had seen the dog. None had and they assumed he had fallen to his death.

China executes 7 more, arrests 13 on charges of spying

BEIJING (AP) — China executed seven more people Thursday for attacking soldiers who crushed the pro-democracy movement, and it charged 13 others with spying for Taiwan and helping the student protesters.

The executions continued despite mounting international condemnation of the government's crackdown on internal dissent.

The seven put to death by the state had been convicted of burning military vehicles when the army marched into Beijing on June 3 and drove thousands of demonstrators out of Tiananmen Square.

A poster board outside the Beijing high court was filled with small arrest notices, and those involving the condemned said they ranged in age from 18 to 33. There was a large red check, indicating execution, on each of the notices with the word "proclaimed." Soldiers later tore the notices off the board.

So far, 27 people have been put to death: the seven in Beijing, and on Wednesday three in Shanghai and 17 in Jinan.

The Shanghai residents were condemned of leading an angry mob

The 17 in the northeastern city of Jinan were among 45 people

convicted at a public rally of 10,000 of "seriously endangering public order." A local reporter said they were common criminals not associated with the student

movement, but a radio broadcast said they had taken part in disturbances in Shandong province.

Jinan, like many other Chinese cities, was rocked by demonstrations

and riots after the military crackdown ended seven-weeks of protests in Beijing.

Police since have arrested more than 1,600 nationwide for participating in what the government calls the "counterrevolutionary rebellion."

Many nations, including the United States, appealed to China for clemency for the condemned, and denounced the executions when the government carried them out.

Foreign Ministry spokeswoman Li Jinhua said Thursday it was "unwise and futile" for other countries to try to dictate how China should handle its domestic turmoil.

China hopes to maintain relations with the United States, but "we firmly oppose the American government interfering in China's internal affairs and exerting pressure on China," Li said at a weekly press briefing.

The Bush administration has cut off military sales and top-level contacts to protest China's suppression of the pro-democracy movement.

In announcing the arrests of the 13 people charged with spying for

Taiwan, national television news showed secretly filmed scenes of the accused mixing with demonstrators and joining in chants during rallies in Tiananmen Square. It also showed secret codes and invisible ink allegedly used by the men, all Chinese citizens.

China has maintained that the student protesters were manipulated by outside forces.

China's Xinhua News Agency quoted the State Security Ministry as saying that Taiwan ordered the alleged spies to "exploit the so-called 'democratic movement,' escalate it into an overall 'anti-Communist' movement and collect information for the Taiwan secret service."

National television also gave prominent coverage to a meeting of State Education Commission head Li Tiejing and a delegation from the World Bank.

Li has been mentioned frequently in recent news reports, bolstering theories he is rising in China's political hierarchy and may be headed for a position on the powerful Communist Party Politburo Standing Committee.

Tourists at French bicentennial find no room at the Auberge

PARIS (AP) — Tourists coming for the bicentennial of the French Revolution next month may find out that they picked the worst of times.

They will have to stay in a hotel far from the capital. A parking space in Paris might be just as tough to get.

Motoreades for the 30 or so presidents and prime ministers will whiz through streets, and authorities will deploy 30,000 police — two-thirds from out of town — during the July 11-17 peak of festivities.

Tourists flock to Paris every summer, but officials say the number of visitors already is considerably larger than last year. During the bicentennial period, about 3 million tourists are expected to flood this city of 2.3 million people.

With a bit of luck, a tourist can still find a room this month. Next month — forget it.

"Impossible," says a woman at the hotel reservations counter of the Tourist Office on the Champs-Elysees. "You'll have to go at least 100

kilometers (60 miles) outside of Paris. Paris is booked solid."

Many VIPs will be attending a July 14-16 summit of the seven major industrial nations, and their entourages will fill hundreds of hotel rooms.

Mikhail S. Gorbachev is coming to town July 4-6, followed by Corazon Aquino of the Philippines. Also attending celebrations are 10 African presidents, six North and South American presidents, six Asian presidents, and six prime ministers or presidents from Western Europe, with baggage. Among those attending is President Bush.

The elaborate preparations for the foreign leaders have left many people grumbling.

"Allowing a few dozen privileged people to be lodged and to move about tranquilly must not in any way be done to the detriment of hundreds of thousands of other people," elected officials from the Greens Party wrote to President Francois Mitterrand.

Conservative demands Greek leader resign

Panic spreads to airport in Soviet Central Asian town

ATHENS, Greece (AP) — The leader of Greece's conservative party demanded Thursday that Andreas Papandreu resign as the interim premier because of a new banking scandal, the latest to occur under Papandreu's socialist government.

Papandreu later was admitted to an Athens hospital complaining of respiratory problems. Papandreu, 70, who underwent triple bypass heart surgery in September, was reported in excellent condition after he entered the hospital.

Constantine Mitsotakis said Papandreu was "responsible and guilty" in the scandal involving the state-owned Greek Mortgage Bank and the Atlantic Bank of New York.

History professor is killed in Jerusalem

JERUSALEM (AP) — A prominent Israeli history professor was stabbed to death in Jerusalem on Thursday, and police said they were investigating whether the killing was a terrorist attack.

In the occupied West Bank, Israeli troops shot a Palestinian man to death and detained 80 others during a raid on the village of Silwad, an army spokesman said.

Soldiers also shot and wounded four Palestinian youths in clashes with stone-throwers in the occupied Gaza Strip, Arab hospital officials said.

MOSCOW (AP) — Panicked families crowded the airport in a Central Asian desert town where four people were killed in ethnic violence, official media reported Thursday.

The Communist Party newspaper Pravda said that although the town of Novy Uzen was quiet on Wednesday, its airport "is packed with families" trying to flee.

Pravda also said the disturbances had spread to settlements about 40 miles away in the Kazakhstan republic. About 600 people demonstrated in Zhetibai and two people were hurt in Munaishi, the newspaper said.

It said ethnic Kazakhs in Novy Uzen demanded Sunday that all members of Caucasus ethnic groups be evicted within a week. More than one-third of Novy Uzen's 56,000 residents are from the Caucasus.

"The demand was accompanied by threats," Pravda said without elaborating.

The government newspaper Izvestia called the demand "anti-constitutional" and said it could not be met.

The violence began last Friday during a fight at a dance, and more than 50 police officers and soldiers were injured in rioting over the next four days.

Hundreds of Interior Ministry soldiers were sent to the town and authorities imposed a 9 p.m.-to-6 a.m. curfew.

Officials on Thursday tightened their control over Novy Uzen's water, sewer and electrical systems,

as well as food stores and a bread factory — all targets of rioters who want to "be able to dictate their own conditions to the authorities," Izvestia said.

Ethnic Kazakhs say the Caucasus settlers dominate the oil industry jobs on which the town depends and receive preferential treatment in housing and other benefits.

The settlers also have set up private businesses that sell supplies in the isolated desert town for exorbitant prices, Izvestia said.

Corrupt party and government workers in Novy Uzen also contributed to widespread discontent by "getting involved in dirty deals," the official news agency Tass quoted top-Kazakhstan officials as saying.

In Alma Ata, the republic's capital, an ethnic-Kazakh was named the region's new party chief to replace Genady Kolbin, an ethnic Russian. He left the post to become chairman of the People's Control Committee, which monitors government ministries, Tass reported.

The appointment of Kolbin as party chief in 1986 touched off widespread rioting in Alma Ata that left hundreds injured and at least two dead.

The new party chief, Nursultan Nazarbayev, has been premier of Kazakhstan since 1984. The 49-year-old Nazarbayev was the first Soviet official to admit the 1986 unrest was ethnically motivated and not hotheadism as press reports claimed.

Pope dedicates World Day of Peace to ecology

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Pope John Paul II has dedicated the church's next World Day of Peace to the ecological crisis, the Vatican said Thursday.

Stressing that the goods of the Earth must not be used "for selfish ends, for profit or power alone," the Vatican said the need to respect the

environment is a new challenge to peace.

"Peace with God the Creator — Peace with all of Creation" is the theme for the day, which the Roman Catholic Church marks on Jan. 1.

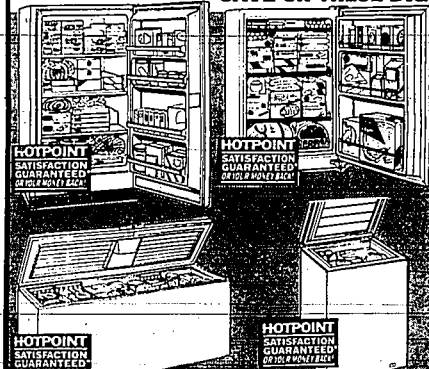
"The theme chosen by the pope, it said, is an invitation to reflect on the ecological crisis from a moral

perspective. "The Earth and all that it contains are a common heritage for humanity."

This should be the governing principle for the use of the goods of the Earth by nations and the international community to which these goods are entrusted," the Vatican said.

Big Wood fishing rules still stuck in litigation

COODING - Litigation to decide whether the Idaho Fish and Game Commission correctly imposed special fishing limitations on Big Wood River probably will carry beyond the 1989 season. That was established Thursday morning when 5th District Judge Phillip Becker set Sept. 22 for final oral arguments. Becker gave Idaho Sportsmen's Association attorney Keith Roark until Aug. 4 to file his next round of briefs and state attorney Stephen Goddard 30 days for

reply. Roark then would have until Sept. 14 for the final reply. Meanwhile, Becker dissolved the temporary injunction first issued to prevent the Idaho Fish and Game Department from enforcing the new commission-enacted fishing regulations but then left everything status quo by using his discretionary powers and issuing a stay. That means the fishing rules affecting Big Wood River remain under the 1988 stipulations. At the end, Becker also agreed to accept intervention by three interested Wood River groups, largely fly fishermen and

professional guides, on the side of the state. That followed a plea from attorney Ed Lawson. Roark said, "If you accept them as amicus, there is nothing I can say" but then told the judge he would fight any move to make the three "parties" to the suit. Earlier, Roark won a point when he was granted approval by Becker to take a deposition from Fish and Game research biologist Russ Thorow. Thorow conducted a three-year study of the Big Wood. He presented a talk and slides series to the commission during its April meeting in Moscow when the Wood River

regulations were enacted. Becker had said at the outset that "I will not substitute my decision for that of the Fish and Game Commission." He said his job was to determine whether the commission "used the right procedures" in arriving at the legislation. If it did, the decision will stand - even if I disagree," he assured the group. Roark based his pleadings for introduction of Thorow's study on that fact, noting the Thorow study was "the only scientific testimony available in the case. Without its introduction, all that was left" • See FISHING on Page B2

Law allows 30 days to title your vehicle

BOISE - Starting July 1, Idahoans who buy vehicles have 30 calendar days from the date of purchase to apply for titles or be penalized, under new legislation.

Only those cars, trucks, motorcycles, and trailers purchased July 1 or after will be affected, according to the Idaho Transportation Department.

New this year is a \$25 penalty for applications filed after the 30-day deadline. Those applying for a title 60 days or more after purchase will face a \$50 penalty.

Under the old legislation, only 10 days were allowed to apply for titles but there were no penalties.

"The intent of the new regulation is to encourage buyers and sellers alike to protect themselves by establishing clear lines of vehicle transfer in a timely manner," said Douglas Kraemer, chief of motor vehicles for the department.

Jerome's public defender won't renew his contract

JEROME - Attorney Dan Grober has decided not to renew his contract with Jerome County for the position of public defender.

"I took the position for one year, but I have decided to concentrate my efforts on my private practice for the time being," said Grober, whose one-year contract expires Sept. 30. He will continue in the job until then, he said.

County Commissioner Veronica Lierman said the commissioners are now interviewing applicants for the position. "When Dan decided to step down, we began receiving proposals," she said.

Deadline for all-day tour of INEL facilities is July 13

IDAHO FALLS - The deadline for signing up for a free all-day tour at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory, sponsored by the Greater Idaho Falls Chamber of Commerce, is July 13.

Information needed for the tour, set for July 27, will be name, social security number, date of birth, business firm and telephone number. Those on the tour must be at least 19 years old. Plan on doing a lot of walking and wear comfortable shoes and clothing. The tour will leave the Chamber office at 8:15 a.m. and return at about 5:30 p.m. Lunch will cost \$3.85.

Project managers will be available for questions.

PUC hearing will consider UP's Wendell-Bliss line

WENDELL - Union Pacific Railroad's plan to abandon 15 miles of its Northside branch line between Bliss and Wendell will be the subject of a public hearing July 6 in Wendell.

The Idaho Public Utilities Commission hearing will begin at 10:30 a.m. at the Wendell Elementary School multipurpose room, 150 Third Ave. East.

The purpose of the hearing is to determine whether abandonment would be adverse to the public interest. The commission will consider:

- 1) whether abandonment would adversely affect the area being served,
- 2) whether the line closure would impair market access or access of Idaho communities to vital goods and services, and
- 3) whether the line has the potential for profitability.

Air Force plans hearings before expanding range

MOUNTAIN HOME - The Air Force will hold full hearings and get local input before proceeding with planned expansion of the Saylor Creek Bombing Range south of the Mountain Home Air Force Base.

Rep. Larry Craig said the Air Force wants to expand the bombing range by more than 1.4 million acres, but has promised to pay attention to the concerns of local residents.

"An expansion of this sort would have to take into consideration existing land use and the requirements of the surrounding community," he said, after meeting Thursday with Air Force officials.

Air Force base realignment ordered by the 100th Congress will close many bases, but calls for increasing operations at Mountain Home. The Air Force is concerned that the existing Saylor Creek Range cannot accommodate the increased training requirements after realignment.

Officials will confer on Milner Dam renovation

TWIN FALLS - The board of consultants for the Twin Falls Canal Co. will meet next week to review and approve power plant construction and dam repair plans for Milner Dam.

Jack Eakin, the canal company's general manager, told a group of 40 people touring the canal system Thursday that company officials will meet with their consultants, a

design team from Morrison-Knutson Co. in San Francisco and a representative of the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission.

Eakin announced the latest developments at Milner Dam during the Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce's agricultural tour focusing on water and water power.

FERC has given the canal company approval to build a new electrical generating plant at Milner Dam, but it is also requiring the company to reinforce the 84-year-old earthen dam enough to make it

earthquake-safe. "They're cracking the whip," Eakin said. "They want us to start this winter, but winter isn't the time to do that sort of thing."

The company would like to begin repairs next summer if FERC will allow it to wait that long, Eakin said. The plan also includes moving the spillway.

The ag tour also examined the 8.2 megawatt power plant on the Low Line Canal south of Hansen and ended at the

College of Southern Idaho fish hatchery in Rock Creek Canyon.

A sometimes poignant history of the canal company was presented by Al Peters, 85-year-old retired canal company manager, at a luncheon before the tour. Several men have lost their lives working on the canal, Peters said. Most of them died while building thousands of miles of tunnels around and under the city of Twin Falls to lower the water table and drain water-saturated land.

Gooding sheriff's deputy faces a jury trial

GOODING - A judge on Thursday scheduled a three-day jury trial in September for a Gooding County sheriff's deputy charged with accepting a loan from a man he was investigating. At a short hearing Thursday, the attorney

for Gooding County Chief Deputy Carl Taylor entered an innocent plea for the deputy. Taylor, dressed in civilian clothes, did not speak at the hearing.

After the pre-trial conference, Taylor declined comment until the end of the case. Taylor is on leave without pay until the case is concluded, Sheriff Robert Aja said. Gooding Prosecutor Lynn Nelson on May

24 charged Taylor with accepting a \$6,000 loan from Arthur Troutner, a vice president at the Boise-based company TJ International. The charges' misdemeanor under an Idaho law that forbids public employees from accepting gifts from someone subject to the employee's jurisdiction.

Twin Falls officials give 911 one more look

TWIN FALLS - Law enforcement officers are giving a county-enhanced 911 system another look after voters defeated a sketchy plan last fall.

"It's an idea that people like," said Paul DuFresne, director of the city's public

safety department. A group of area police chiefs, representatives from the JIS-West-phone company and County Commissioner Jim Fraley met Wednesday to discuss the possibility of initiating another 911 proposal.

Last fall's unsuccessful proposal would have given county commissioners authority to place a \$1 surcharge on all phone bills, without spelling out what kind of a system voters would get. Commissioners could have chosen a deluxe system, called "enhanced 911," that costs \$200,000 to start and \$20,000 a month to maintain. Or they could have picked a less sophisticated system called "basic 911."

Jury decides against Farmers National Bank

TWIN FALLS - A jury has declared Farmers National Bank of Buhl guilty of fraud and unfair business practices in a lawsuit involving the bank and a local dairy. After a six-day trial and an afternoon of

deliberations, a Twin Falls jury ordered Farmers National to pay Joe and Lidia Cotta of Buhl \$295,500 in actual and punitive damages.

Terry Lee Johnson, the Cottas' lawyer, said there is some question about the total amount of the jurors' award, which should be decided in post-trial motions in the next few weeks.

But there is no question that his side successfully established fraud, he said. "We're very much surprised by the verdict," Farmers National President J.P. Hamilton said.

He added that the bank is still considering whether it will appeal. The dispute began in March 1985 when • See SUIT on Page B2

Depredation hearing generates suggestions

TWIN FALLS - Intensified livestock grazing would improve wildlife forage, a King Hill rancher suggested Thursday, offering one answer to Southern Idaho's wildlife depredation. Speaking at the fifth of six statewide hearings to gather public ideas for

incorporation into a depredation compensation management policy, rancher Charlie Kast said the pruning effect of heavy livestock utilization would increase both palatability and volume of feed for big game on critical winter range.

Kast said efforts should be directed at intercepting herds from Camas County's Bennett and Soldier mountains on their fall

migration onto private lands in hunting Unit 45 - north Glenns Ferry, King Hill and Bliss.

That unit probably has endured the heaviest predation of any section in the state. It has had complaints on deer, elk and antelope. More than half of the complaints received at the Idaho Fish and • See DEPREDATE on Page B2

Kimberly OKs school budget

KIMBERLY - The new school district budget here includes an average 6.83 percent pay raise for all district employees.

The School Board recently adopted the \$2.6 million 1989-90 budget, up about \$300,000 from last year. Most of the increase comes from additional state revenues. Superintendent Richard Bauscher said.

Under the budget, Kimberly teachers' minimum salary will be \$16,000, the Legislature's recommended minimum.

About \$23,000 of the salary total will be used for a new first- and fifth-grade teacher to lower the student/teacher ratios there, Bauscher said.

Bauscher said there will be between 21 and 22 students in each class in grades 1-3 next fall. To accommodate the addition of a new fifth-grade class, state monies will be used to purchase furniture. The class will require desks, chairs and lockers.

"We will be utilizing every room we have in the elementary building for classrooms," Bauscher said. One class will be held in what has previously been a store room, he said.

The budget also includes about \$28,000 for new textbooks, including those for math and all subjects in seventh grade, which is expected to

 Game Department Region 4 office in Jerome is in the area. Last year the region received 110 complaints and has averaged 61 since the 1982-83 winter.

Neibaur said. "That doesn't leave much for the other state programs that must be funded."

"About 60 percent of the people in Idaho don't hunt and I don't feel they should be burdened with the cost" of the compensation plan.

Region 4 Supervisor Carl Nellis told the group that 70 percent of the complaints received at the Jerome office concern deer, 18 percent elk and 10 percent antelope. Of the total complaints, three-quarters are concerned with haystack raiding "which, fortunately, is the easiest to answer," he said.

Some 11 percent concern cultivated crops, 7 percent concern ornamental shrubbery around homes and shelter belts, and 3 percent come from orchardists.

Nellis, whose chief work with the department has been big-game research, said since 1955 the department

has pretty well established that it can control the population of any species through hunting. He said the department could respond to any demands from the public.

"If they think we have too many, we can trim them back. If they want more, we can have more simply by reducing hunting pressure," Nellis said.

Answering a question about Kast's suggestion of more intense livestock grazing, Nellis said, "Cattle and deer are compatible — but not infinitely compatible."

"Cattle can improve resprouting of bitterbrush leaders and grass but they must be taken off those areas early to give the vegetation time to grow," he said. "I don't know when that is, but I suspect it is sometime in June."

He added changing grazing schemes on winter ranges has been proven a viable, beneficial practice for both wildlife and big game. But it requires

timely removal of livestock from the range — and well in advance of when owners would like to take them off.

He said some of the major problems can be circumvented as easily as buying some critical tracts.

"But that requires the wherewithal as well as cooperation from the counties," he said. "Counties are reluctant to lose lands off the tax rolls even though they receive all the fine money from our (Fish and Game) violations in lieu of taxes."

"That problem might be overcome by changing the formula so that counties could be paid according to the percentage of lands involved, rather than the percentage of violations."

The board has one meeting left in the six-session tour across the state. When all the testimony has been boiled down, the final policy will be developed by Northwest Renewable Resource Center of Seattle.

 Farmers National sold the Cottas 28 dairy cows it had acquired in a liquidation of another local dairy.

In papers filed with the 5th District Court, the Cottas said the cows had been diagnosed with staph when the bank knew the herd was diseased when it sold the animals.

Hamilton admitted the bank knew the cows were infected with some form of mastitis. But he contends there was a miscommunication between bank representatives and the buyers.

"We assumed that from their contract with the bank that they had all the information they needed," he said. Hamilton maintains that mastitis is a common problem at almost all dairies in Southern Idaho.

Staph mastitis is an especially virulent strain, and veterinarians disagree as to whether it can be cured. But all agree that infected cows must be segregated from healthy animals.

Hamilton said the infected herd was split among three buyers. "We had one dissatisfied buyer and two very satisfied buyers," he said.

In its nine-page verdict, the jury declared that the bank knew the cows were infected and that it was responsible for informing the Cottas.

The jurors also agreed that the Cottas had a right to assume the bank would pass that information along.

Lane Ranch subdivision opponents may turn to courts for help

SUN VALLEY - Opponents to the Lane Ranch subdivision are expected to ask the court to temporarily stop development until a court can determine the legality of the development can be answered.

The Sun Valley City Council on Tuesday gave final approval for the first phase of the subdivision by the same 2 to 1 vote under which the preliminary plan was approved.

In the interim a lawsuit has been filed by local residents challenging the legality of the city's action in approving the development.

Attorney Jim Phillips, representing the plaintiffs in their suit against the City of Sun Valley, told the council two legal concerns could negate the council's action.

A portion of the plat appears to be owned by Blaine County, in which case "no action can be taken by the developer until the plan is approved by the Blaine County commissioners," Phillips said.

Phillips' second contention concerned the developer's water rights to a small creek that runs through the subdivision.

The developer, River Run Development of Boise, plans to use the water to create a lake within the subdivision. Phillips questioned

whether the Army Corps of Engineers and Department of Water Resources had approved alteration of the wetlands that had previously existed around the old Elkhorn Pond, which once was filled by the altered creek.

The pond has since been drained to provide an area for a subdivision recreational facility.

Evan Robertson, attorney for the developers, said the matter of county ownership had been researched and that the property in question is not within the approved plat.

Robertson also said River Run has water

rights and that Oliver Dibble, chairman of the Sun Valley Planning and Zoning Commission, agrees.

Phillips said he plans to seek a restraining order to halt further development of the property until the courts settle the dispute.

"The original approval of the preliminary plat was flawed," Phillips said.

Sun Valley has 20 days to respond to the suit before a hearing is set. The suit was filed June 16.

During the public hearing on the final plat approval, one other person besides Phillips spoke in opposition to the project.

Sun Valley resident John Mehan

questioned whether council members were representing their constituents. "You had an obligation to determine a consensus as to how your constituents felt about this project. You did that. The results showed it's not appropriate for you to approve the project. Government is no longer representative in Sun Valley," Mehan said.

In other action, the council:

- Approved the rezoning of Parcel A in the Lane Ranch to allow space to be used for recreational development.
- Granted a request for 120 days the time for improvements at Lane Ranch, including landscaping and a bike path.

Castledford continues to deliberate 1989-90 school budget

CASTLEFORD - The school district's 1989-90 budget here has been returned to Superintendent Ron Erickson for some adjustments.

The \$923,044 budget contains a substantial cut-over from last year that most board members felt should be spent in the plant facility, maintenance and operations areas.

The district is facing substantial costs in repairing the elementary heating system and complying with

the state's asbestos-removal law.

Erickson will have an amended budget ready for a public hearing at 8 p.m. Tuesday in the school library.

The board on Tuesday rejected two bids it received for the removal of asbestos in the school because the bids exceeded the availability of funds in the district.

"We had several bidders come for our walk-through," Erickson told the board, "but only two submitted bids."

The board tabled the matter until possible alternative plans can be found.

The problems with steam leaks in the elementary building's 30-year-old heating system, however, cannot be solved until the asbestos there has been abated.

In discussing different methods of repairing the pipes, the board is considering abandoning the old underground steam line system and installing a new system that would be accessible for repairs.

No action on the repairs will be taken until estimates on installing a new system can be obtained.

In other business, the board

moved to offer contracts to Julia Vickers of Heyburn for the combination kindergarten/first-grade teacher and to Wendell Ahern of California for the Chapter 1 teacher.

Erickson reported that no one has been found to fill the social studies/physical education position. Rather than relist the position at this late date, the board voted to rearrange next fall's teaching schedules to attempt to fill the vacancy with teachers already on staff.

Bellevue voters to decide sewer system bond issue

BELLEVUE - Voters here will go to the polls Tuesday to decide whether they want a \$1.5 million bond issue to pay for a new city sewer system.

About 40 local residents attended a public hearing this week to talk with the council about the financing and the project.

The election is set for noon-9 p.m. Tuesday at City Hall. Voters must be registered and Bellevue residents for at least 30 days. People who own property in Bellevue but do not reside in the city are ineligible. Passage of the revenue bond requires a simple majority of those voting.

Mayor Wayne Douthit said he believes a majority of Bellevue residents would like a sewer system but added that "the \$2.50 a month cost for sewer service is a real concern."

"What happens if we don't put in sewers?" resident Tom Perry asked.

Jim Keller, a Forager Associates engineer, said Bellevue is the only city of its size in Idaho without a sewage processing system. "Eventually it's going to happen. A city this size is going to have to have some kind of system. It's not a matter of if; it's a matter of when. One day you'll have a system. You decide when," Keller said.

The state could restrict growth in the city at some point if it doesn't have a sewer system, Keller said. Should water contamination become a problem, adjustments would have to be made to the existing septic systems.

"Then our problem now is a possible no-growth restriction. It's not yet a health problem," Perry said.

Keller said growth, density and continued septic tank usage would eventually put the city in jeopardy.

Barbara Burk, who owns a trailer court, asked if she would be charged a full \$22.50 for each trailer

slot or whether there might be some adjustment. "If I have to pay \$100 a month for sewer service I'll vote no," Burk said.

The city would look at all alternatives of assessing costs, Douthit said. "All options are open, and we'll be fair," he said.

Other items discussed were:

- Homeowners discussing hook-up fees for those who tie into the city system within a reasonable amount of time.
- All city residents will be charged a fee regardless of whether they hook into the city system but unimproved property won't be charged.
- The cost for a homeowner to run the line from a home to the property edge could run from \$1.50 a foot.
- Running the sewer lines along one side of the city streets might be the most practical approach although the engineering firm said it would consider running the lines through alleys.
- The state can help low income homeowners pay their bills.
- Rejecting the Sluicewayhouse Canyon site was the only decision made on where the plant would be located.
- Federal dollars for sewer projects will dry up after Oct. 15.
- The type of processing plant would depend in part on the amount of land purchased. A simple aerated system needs less land than a Biolac aerated system, while a mechanical system, though being the most expensive, needs the least amount of space.
- Douthit encouraged the audience to support this bond issue, since passage would insure that the city qualify for grant money from the state. That grant money is earmarked to pay about two-thirds the cost of the system. "The state has committed to paying for the remainder of the system beyond what's raised by the bond issue. They won't commit, unless you commit," Douthit said.

Hansen School Board OKs pep club proposal

HANSEN - Hansen school kids will get a chance to cheer on their athletic teams next year with the trial of a new pep club.

The school board agreed at its recent meeting to give the club a try. Superintendent Richard Smith told the board that Senior/Junior High Principal Barry Espil had been working with Laura Watts, a senior, this fall to establish guidelines for the club.

"Laura really wants to get this one going," Smith said. Watts and Espil have selected several athletic events away from Hansen to attend. The school will provide a bus and driver for club members and a chaperone to attend some of the games.

In other matters, the board is considering how to spend one-time funds from the Legislature. A satellite learning program or upgrading the industrial arts program are two possibilities.

Members of the new pep club must attend at least 80 percent of the home games. At least about 20 students will be needed for a bus for a way game. And students must return on the bus.

Club trips will cost the school between \$40 and \$50, Smith said. Watts plans to begin fund-raising and a membership drive this summer, he said.

Keith Huettig, Valley School Board chairman and president of the Idaho School Board, presented the Hansen board with some options for bringing new classes to the district electronically. The board is looking at at least two other programs.

Using satellites, telephones and computers; such classes as German, Russian, advanced calculus and chemistry, and English and reading would be available in Hansen.

The goal is to deliver quality courses that can't be offered at smaller schools, Huettig said.

The board also is considering updating the industrial arts program, at an estimated cost of \$12,000-\$15,000, Smith said.

"The board is just looking at all the options," he said.

The program Huettig presented uses the Educational Satellite Network (ESN) to offer three types of programs: educational classes, training and enrichment programs, including those shown on C-Span and the Discovery Channel.

Program costs are dropping but are still expensive. The school can purchase equipment for \$7,595, plus \$1,000 installation to get started. The package would include a satellite dish, VCR, telephones, color monitor, computer printer and satellite controller.

Classes from Oklahoma State University, which developed the program, would cost about \$2,280 for a class of 10 students. Additional students will cost \$95 each extra. Textbooks and more computers for some classes also would be needed.

Phone connections may cost about \$20 per 45 minute session. Each time the class is aired, students are connected via telephone line to interact with the instructor or his/her assistants.

The satellite classes are aired one to two times a week, Huettig said. On other days students complete assignments using computers and/or textbooks. A monitor or teacher is on the room at all times, he added.

Valley schools recently approved the program and expect to complete hook up of their system early next month, Huettig said.

In other action:

- The board canceled its July 3 board meeting due to the July Fourth holiday. A special session will be called within the next two weeks.
- The board accepted the resignation of English teacher/librarian, Peggy Wittigen, who has accepted a full-time librarian position in Twin Falls.
- Four candidates for the vacant custodial position were interviewed Tuesday night and a selection may be made next week.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE

BOBBY WOLFF

How do you tell which is your stronger suit? It's not always the high cards or the length; often the best measure is the number of tricks the suit can produce.

South ruffs the third spade and draws trumps. He counts six trump winners and two aces for eight tricks; which minor suit gives him the best chance at two more?

If he chooses clubs because they look more solid, the game goes down. The finesse loses and South must still lose a diamond trick.

While a successful club finesse would land the game, the chances of finding the king with West are only 50-50. In the diamond suit, two additional tricks are available if at least one of the missing diamond honors is with West (75 percent).

After drawing trumps, South passes his diamond eight to East's queen and ruffs East's spade exit. Next he pushes the diamond jack through, and West is finished. If West's club suit is in his hand to repeat the finesse; if West covers, dummy's diamonds provide for the club discard.

Snake River Pottery gains new life

HAGERMAN — They left New York in 1941, newlyweds driving a Model A Sedan. They weren't altogether sure the car would last the trip.

They took turns at the wheel, stopping only in Cheyenne, Wyo., for some sleep. When they got to Idaho, they traveled the state, made love in the mountains and settled on the banks of the Snake River. From their serene homestead in the Hagerman Valley, Drich and Di Bowler became two of Idaho's most passionate champions of the arts.

Di passed away in 1986, and her heart-sick husband temporarily closed the Snake River Pottery they'd established in 1947 — just one of numerous projects they'd nursed along together.

But today, the pottery is open again, fueled by the dreams of Bowler and two young potters who now work in the studio.

Many of the dreams, in turn, are kept alive by the memories of Di. In her memory, the Snake River Pottery will dedicate its new 1,000-square-foot-plus addition during an open house Saturday.

Workers — mostly family friends — have been busting about this week to put finishing touches on the project. In their new studio, potters DiAnne Elasic and Ned Swisher work intently to complete pieces for the open house.

But in his comfy living room, Bowler, 73, relaxes in faded jeans, sneakers and a plaid shirt and talks warmly of his 46-year marriage to Di. They met in 1938 at a summer theater in New England, where both were working as scholarship actors. Two years later, they married and made that first trip west.

Bowler was an Idahoan, born in Shoshone, and educated at Gooding High and the University of Idaho. But when he brought Di, a Philadelphia native, to the Gem State, he saw his homeland with new eyes.

"I saw through her eyes," he says, smiling at the recollection of Di's first glimpses of sagebrush, wide open spaces and sunsets unlike any seen in the East. "It took Di to teach me."

The couple became founding members of the Moscow Tent Theater, Idaho's oldest repertory theater. After Bowler served in the Pacific Theater during World War II, the pair once again decided to return to Idaho, first for further studies in Moscow, later to the home on the river.

Each gave up a promising career in New York for Idaho. But neither had any qualms about the move, Bowler says. They reasoned they could always go back to visit "the old whore," as they affectionately dubbed New York City.

Di and Drich forged a partnership that Bowler says was always equal in all respects.

"She was a powerful, independent woman," he recalls. "I married a very liberated woman in 1940."

"When we came out (in 1946), we didn't know what we wanted to do. We bought a Jeep in New Jersey, and that left us only \$40. We had the idea we'd come west and explore," Bowler says.

They also had the idea they'd open a pottery. The University of Idaho didn't have much of a pottery department, but the Bowlers taught themselves. Drich built a kiln for advanced credit. His mother's work in pottery and jewelry making paid off, with some of the interest and skill passed that she had passing along to him.

"At first, they intended on having the fledgling pottery sustain them. The government gave veterans who started a business a \$500 grant."

"I didn't teach until we were desperate," Bowler says.

But with an income of only \$800 their first year, the Bowlers soon had to seek outside employment.

It was Di who first started teaching at Bliss High School. Drich took over in 1949 when they adopted the first of two children, Peter (who now is on the staff at the University of California-at-Irvine) and Pam (who now lives in Salt Lake City and works as a nurse's aide). Di stayed home to raise the children and further develop her skills as a potter.

The teaching led the Bowlers back into drama. A decade-and-a-half later, when Drich was teaching at Buhl, he, Di and H. Paul Kliss founded the Antique Festival Theater. The troupe, based in a school bus, traveled all over Idaho; presenting classical dramas. Teaching also took the Bowlers to Holland, where Drich worked as a Fulbright Exchange Teacher in the city of Hardwyck.

Studio will be dedicated to Di Bowler

HAGERMAN — Snakes painted on fenceposts slither toward the river, pointing the way to the pottery.

On Saturday, friends of the Snake River Pottery will gather to mark the dedication of new studio space to the memory of Di Bowler, who co-founded the business with her husband, Drich, in 1947. The open house is slated from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m., with the dedication set for 10 a.m.

From 2 p.m. to 4 p.m., Rose Creek Vineyards from nearby downtown Hagerman will join in the celebration with a wine tasting.

The addition has expanded and improved working conditions for potters DiAnne Elasic and Ned Swisher. The former studio space will become a showroom and gallery featuring a variety of crafts.

In their new studio, Elasic and Swisher command a stunning view of the Snake River as it sweeps around a bend below. In addition to more room, the studio also offers improved health and safety features, Elasic says. Exhaust systems will sweep out fumes and clay dust. A separate glazing room will allow increased production.

"Less conflict of space is the major gain," says Swisher. Both artists are hoping the ability to produce more functional, "bread-and-butter" pots will allow them the time, space and financial leeway to pursue "more artistic en-

deavors in clay," Elasic says.

Elasic came to Snake River Pottery in 1986, shortly after Di Bowler's death. A former student of Di, Elasic asked Drich if he would take her on as an apprentice. He did, and he now says she proved herself so invaluable that he soon started sharing the proceeds with her.

Swisher, a Twin Falls native, was fascinated with clay from his high school days.

He returned to Idaho after pursuing carpentry and electrical work in California, joining the Snake River Pottery in May 1988.

Although most potters prefer to work alone, it can get lonely, says Elasic. She says she's happy Ned has come aboard. Between them, they are now producing more than they can sell, she adds, and having a

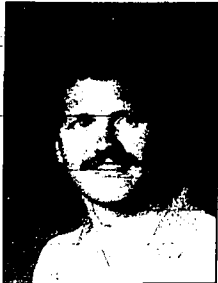

Networks take promotional steps to combat cable

NEW YORK (AP) — After years of sitting back and waiting for 50 percent of the television audience to automatically tune in to their new fall shows, the networks have had a rude awakening.

The audiences, faced with an ever-increasing number of entertainment choices, aren't automatically tuning in. The networks now have to work to win them over, and that has spawned an unprecedented burst of promotional innovation for the 1989-90 season.

Come fall, folks stopping in for a pizza will also receive an ABC promo tape. Shoppers can buy a blank Scotch videotape and get an NBC featurette, visit K mart and be greeted by CBS displays, go to a movie and see a commercial for ABC. Demonstrator television sets in Sears stores will be tuned to NBC, and Maxell tape packages will include pitches for CBS.

Last season, the three-network

share of the television audience dropped to 67 percent, from 71 percent the previous season. These A.C. Nielsen Co. figures reflect inroads by cable, independent channels and videocassette rentals in the last decade that have eroded the networks' traditional combined share that ranged up to 90 percent in the 1970s.

This summer and fall, the networks' promotional plays range from look-alike "new" reports on upcoming shows to marketing tie-ins with retail outlets and videotape manufacturers — on the assumption that viewers will buy the tapes to record the network's shows.

Mark Zakarin, vice president for marketing for ABC Entertainment, calls the new network strategy "guerrilla marketing."

"These used to be easy jobs," he said. "Used to be all you had to do was do your own on-air advertising and plunk an ad in TV Guide a couple of times.

"As our audience fragments," said Zakarin, "we gotta go out and find them wherever they are."

ABC plans to take out ads in TV Guide again this fall — with a difference. During the month of November — when important local affiliate ratings are measured — ABC's ads will include bar codes, similar to product price codes. The codes can be read by programming "wands" included with some Panasonic videocassette recorders. Run the wand over the bar code in the ad for, say, "thirtysomething," and the machine is programmed to record it. ABC viewers there are 800,000 such VCRs in viewers' homes.

CBS previously announced a promotional partnership with K mart Corp., and NBC followed suit with Sears, Roebuck and Co. ABC is still looking for a retail partner, but has other promotional plans, including the first-ever network commercial in movie theaters — a 60-second promo for its fall lineup that will begin run-

ning in 5,000 theaters in August.

CBS plans to run on its own airwaves "CBS Spolettes," advertisements designed to resemble news breaks, that feature reports on stars of upcoming CBS shows.

All three networks have cross-promotions involving videotapes.

CBS has joined Maxell in a marketing strategy that will include a plug for Maxell in CBS fall print advertising. A circular promoting CBS shows will be included in Maxell videotape packages.

"This is our way of pointing out to viewers that they need not miss any CBS programs — they can tape them

on Maxell," said CBS Vice President George Switzer.

But purchasers of 3M Scotch videotapes will get a pitch to record NBC shows. Purchasers of five-packs of Scotch videocassettes will receive a one-hour, NBC-produced promotional video, "Behind the Scenes at America's Favorite Network." A coupon in single-cassette packages will offer the video for \$5.95. Scotch packages will also include a printed insert promoting NBC's fall schedule.

ABC is participating in a promotional video distribution that also involves HBO and Paramount.

'Bye Bye Baby' is a real howl

Here are some capsule reviews of movies playing in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and the Los Angeles Times. Opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

BYE BYE BABY (R). A howlingly rotten Italian sex comedy with little sex and even less comedy. The dialogue sounds almost wholly improvised, in a *Cosmo*-style, by the English-as-a-second-language crew. Guest Americans Carol Alt and Brigitte Nielsen do seem to actually be reading lines; you can tell by the way poor Alt keeps flubbing them. A scream.

COLD FEET (R). Three enormously daff and funny actors, Sally Kellerman, Tom Waits and Keith Carlini, play partners in a bizarre emerald smuggling scheme. But just as the charm of these characters gets a chance to work, some flagrant crassness shrivels the moments. It's no secret that director Robert Dornhelm is unhappy with the released version, which certainly has none of the insights or gentle observations of his earlier films.

CRIMINAL LAW (R). Gary Oldman is electrifying as a brash Boston attorney who successfully defends rich aristocrat Kevin Bacon on a murder charge only to become convinced he's a budding serial rapist-murderer. Unfortunately, the film itself is routine and obvious.

DEAD CALM (R). Craving good things are harder to find these days, possibly because the audiences for them seem to have gotten more demanding. Into this void sails "Dead Calm," a spare, smart, seductive piece of real movie making with (almost) every loophole covered, a superlative cast (Sam Neill; Nicole Kidman, Billy Zane) and enough tension to keep us all hyperventilating for hours. Directed by "Newsfront's" crackjack Philip Nozce.

THE DEAD POETS SOCIETY (PG). Against the glacially perfect backdrop of a 1959 East Coast prep school, which director Peter Weir turns into an evil ice palace, star Robin Williams blazes like a poetry-spewing, stand-up comet: He is playing a rebel English teacher, whose motto is "Seize the day!" and who gets his students to drink a little too deeply from the Pterian Spring. Tom Schulman's brave, off-beat script has overly melodramatic twists, but it is a heartening cry of rage against conformism's brutalities and a moving elegy for every inspired teacher who made knowledge live. And, right now, Williams may be the most exciting performer in American movies.

THE DREAM TEAM (PG-13). Howard Zieff's new comedy is so clearly derived from the movie "One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest" that you might begin to wonder when Jack Nicholson will show up. This amiable slick farce stars Michael Keaton, Christopher Lloyd and Peter Boyle as a carnivorous funny trio with Stephen Furst playing the weakest role, although he has a great comic waddle, running along helplessly behind them like a chafed turtle.

EARTH GIRLS ARE EASY (PG). A jazzy, snazzy rock-musical comedy (Icenna Davis) who ushers three girly crazy extraterrestrials around after their crash-land in her pool: The material — script and songs by MTV's Julie Brown — is wedgie-thin and slushie-deep, but Julien Temple turns Los Angeles into a candy-frosted, super-slick dream mall.

They should have called it 'Ghostbuster II.' Singular. It's really Bill Murray's film. When he is on, the new film is amusing. When he isn't, it is so much slime.

"Ghostbusters II," sequel to the 1984 film, is better than the original, but that doesn't say much. The first film was at its best when Murray and Sigourney Weaver had the floor. Their footage was smart and smooth, and they brought the Hollywood comedies of the '30s to mind.

The rest was, well, slime, but it did big business, phenomenal business, and it remains one of the big mysteries of the 1984 movie season. It was a very ordinary film, but because it featured "Saturday Night Live" graduates, it attracted the audience of that show. Those who were not enamored of "Saturday Night Live" wondered what all the fuss was about.

The new movie reunites all the

stars of the parent film, Sigourney Weaver, Murray, Harold Ramis, Dan Aykroyd, Ernie Hudson and Annie Potts are back. Don't underestimate Potts' contribution. She has one of the better lines in the movie, but, curiously, it got no laugh.

Weaver is reappearing as Dana Barrett, the woman who was enamored of Venkman (Murray) in the first film. She is almost invisible in the second film, but she is nice to have around. She seems to know she is no more than decoration and doesn't seem to object.

Aykroyd, Hudson and Ramis are beginning to look a little too old for this sort of nonsense, particularly Aykroyd. Murray doesn't look any older than he did in the first film, but Aykroyd seems a little pudgier than he did. He also seems a bit tired. Well, he, too, is sort of in the background. This is Murray's film.

When the film begins, Murray is a parapsychologist who hosts a TV talk show about psychic phenomena. Stanz (Aykroyd) and Zeddemore (Hudson) are earning their pay by entertaining at parties for children.

Film breaks record for opening weekend

HOLLYWOOD—Soaring temperatures must bring out a taste for slime, or at least ectoplasmic ordination, according to this weekend's box office figures. "Ghostbusters II" burst ahead of all other films in ticket sales and broke records for the biggest non-holiday weekend opening.

But the sequel played on 1,073

more screens than its supernatural predecessor, and ticket prices have increased by more than 22 percent since the slime-busting foursome made their debut in June 1984. Roughly 2 million more people went to see "Ghostbusters II" than saw the opening weekend of the first "Ghostbusters," which went on to become the highest-grossing comedy of all time at \$220 million.

The latest installment garnered

about \$29.5 million in ticket sales on its first three days out, beating the original "Ghostbusters," which grossed \$13 million, according to John Krier, president of Exhibitor Relations Inc., which compiles box office figures.

"Ghostbusters II" also set an all-time record for a one-day opening, netting about \$10 million Friday, according to industry estimates.

The sequel, which like its predecessor was directed by Ivan Reit-

man and stars Bill Murray, Dan Aykroyd, Harold Ramis, Ernie Hudson and Sigourney Weaver, can be seen on 2,410 screens across the United States. The first "Ghostbusters" premiered on significantly fewer — 1,339 — screens.

"Sales for "Ghostbusters II" first three days narrowly beat out those for the opening weekend of "Indiana Jones and the Last Crusade," which made about \$29.4 million its first Friday through Sunday.

Answer: The father of game shows; Question: What is 'Face to Face'?

The answer: This 1946-47 NBC program began an unbroken 43-year string of shows specializing in greed, silliness and, sometimes, skill.

The question: What is "Face to Face"?

It's unlikely that this exchange will ever take place on "Jeopardy," which is up for a Daytime Emmy Award for Outstanding Game/Audience Participation Show. But "Face to Face" was the very first in what has since become one of the most mocked yet popular TV genres: the game show. The "16th Annual Daytime Emmy Awards" air Thursday afternoon, June 29, on NBC.

"Face to Face" had many elements that remain familiar today: A host with a great dental plan (Eddie Dunn), an attractive female sidoklok with ill-defined duties ("Sugar") ... and lots and lots of fabulous prizes!

Following in Eddie Dunn's footsteps today are hosts such as Alex Trebek ("Jeopardy"), Pat Sajak ("Wheel of Fortune"), Dick Clark ("\$25,000 Pyramid") and Vicki Lawrence Schultz ("Win, Lose or Draw"), all nominated for Daytime Emmys for Outstanding Game Show Host.

It's no secret why "Jeopardy" and fellow nominees "The Price Is Right," "The \$25,000 Pyramid," "Wheel of Fortune" and "Win, Lose or Draw" and their cousins are so popular with networks and syndicators. They cost peanuts to produce and generate elephantine profits.

But why do we viewers tune them in? Is it to rejoice when regular folks

win thousands of dollars in cash and merchandise? Is it to smile at others' good fortune when they're greeted by the magic phrase, "It's ... a brand-new car, Bob!"—Heck, no!—We watch for the chance to hurl invective at the screen.

When the "Wheel of Fortune" board shows "IN GOD WE -RUS-" and some hapless player guesses, "In God We Brush," do we sigh, "Ohhhh, too bad!?" Of course not. We yell, "You idiot!" and dream of the minicement we would make of these losers if only the producers would show the good taste to give us a call.

But there are shows, such as "Jeopardy" or the old "G.E. College Bowl," that actually offer the possibility that we may not know the answer. In such cases, we answer the few questions we can ("I guess we can see who the smart one is in this family, eh? Heh, heh, heh.") and respond to the remainder with something along the lines of, "It's not normal to know the capital of Togo! Doesn't this guy ever get out? Hey, buddy ... get a life!"

An important subcategory of game shows, of which "Win, Lose or Draw" is currently the most prominent exemplar, is the, "Boy, I May Not Be Much, But I've Never Acted That

Stupid" show. In these, prizes and intellectual prowess take a back seat to the spectacle of otherwise normal people behaving like gibbering chimpanzees. Other examples have included "Let's Make a Deal," "The Newlywed Game" and every show ever to have had Rip Taylor or Charles Nelson Reilly as a guest.

We don't know which show will take the Daytime Emmy. But we have a fantasy that the losing hosts will be lined up and told, "Sorry you didn't do better, but you've been wonderful sports! Sugar, what do we have for our runners-up?"

"It's the home version of the Daytime Emmy Awards Show, Eddie!" Turnabout, as they say in the game-show biz, is fair play.

ON THE COVER Alex Trebek, who has all the questions on "Jeopardy," has been nominated for a Daytime Emmy for Outstanding Game Show Host and his show has been nominated for Outstanding Game/Audience Participation Show. The "16th Annual Daytime Emmy Awards" air Thursday afternoon, June 29, on NBC.

and one of South Africa's most outspoken critics of apartheid.

Q: What about those rumors about Billy Joel and Christie Brinkley splitting up? — F.N.

A: Forget it. Joel and Brinkley are selling their New York apartment to Sting because Billy is building a country house for the family in Deal, N.J. Christie and Billy were seen recently at Patsy's, a favorite dining spot for the bi-coastal set, holding hands and kissing and hugging like newlyweds, much to the delight of the other diners, who were busy making glances.

Q: Everyone in this army barracks has a bet down on this but nobody can find the definite answer. You're our last resort. Whose album holds the record for the longest stay on Billboard's best-selling charts? — A.T.

A: And the answer is ... Johnny Mathis. His LP, "Johnny's Greatest Hits," has been on the charts for almost 10 years. The crooner, who'll be singing at the famed Concord Hotel in the Catskills over the big July 4 weekend, has chalked up sales of more than 100 million albums worldwide in the 30 years he's been a performer.

Q: Any chance that the great talent Carol Burnett will be back in a

regular weekly show? CBS is crazy not to do something with her. She was such a success on that network for years. — B.B.

A: Carol is coming back to the little screen, but on NBC instead of her old network. In the show, designed as a comedy version of the old "Loretta Young Show," Burnett will play a different character each week. According to Brandon Tartikoff, president of NBC's entertainment division, the characters that catch on with viewers will be brought back throughout the series.

A: No. John Cusack is a native of Chicago, where he still lives. A: Sandy is back home in Westport recuperating from surgery for ovarian cancer. This is a particularly serious form of the disease, and the one that killed Gilda Radner. Right now friends are standing by to help Sandy, who is 52, to take care of her mother, who lives with her and is not too strong, and to help out with the dozens of cats Sandy has given a home to.

Q: Wasn't Ginger Rogers suing Federico Fellini over his "Frid and Ginger" movie? Did she win? — D.V.

For the second year in a row, "Santa Barbara" leads the field with 13 nominations. Competitor "General Hospital" always thumps "Santa Barbara" soundly in the ratings, yet "GH" squeaks into Thursday's shindig with just two nominations — one for Best Soap and one for Female Juvenile.

Eleven-year-old Kimberly McCullough (Robin Scorpio) carries the "General Hospital" banner. "General Hospital," the daytime powerhouse in the '80s, is represented by a little kid among all those grown-ups.

Don't feel sorry for Kimberly being engulfed by glamour. A four-year veteran on "Hospital," Kimberly has learned how to steal scenes. After all, Kimberly has been on camera since the age of seven months, when she broke into the business via a diaper commercial.

"How embarrassing," says Kimberly. She prefers to chat about her days with Sylvester Stallone in the movie "Over the Top," or her time on "Fame" or her recent solo number in the Los Angeles production of "Les Miserables."

"I don't have a very strong voice," Kimberly admits; "so the solo was a surprise. By the end of the run, my voice was quite strong and I could hold my own."

At age six, Kimberly was tap dancing; at age seven she became Robin Scorpio, the new kid in Port Charles, about to suffer comas, kidnappings, and a bond with Tristan Rogers, the Australian heartthrob who plays her dad, Robert Scorpio.

What Tristan Rogers does, Kimberly does. Tristan doesn't bother memorizing his script because of the constant changes. Rogers works scene by scene, glancing at the script and then going out on the floor for the taping. Kimberly picked up

So is school. Kimberly's last report card boasted six A-pluses and four A's. When not at the studio with her tutor, Kimberly attends a Whittier, Calif., grammar school. If Mom, Susan McCullough, has her way, Kimberly will repeat the sixth grade, when she could easily skip a year, because she feels the jump to junior high and into the harsh world of teenagers is a little premature.

At age 11, Kimberly sees the world as her oyster. Anything is possible. To write a song, do a video, dance, grow up on TV, see the world or go into business. Any doubts? Don't be silly. According to Kimberly, you just do it.

Information about what she's like, so I turned to her old friend, Douglas Fairbanks Jr. Still dashing at age 80, Fairbanks described Garbo in surprising terms — "A nice, unpretentious person who is very private but very, very nice." Fairbanks recalled that an acquaintance once accosted Garbo on a New York street. After an extended, one-way conversation, the man asked: "Am I boring you?" Garbo's reply: "Yes."

Q: Judging by interviews, Jacqueline Bisset is a funny, wry lady. How come my favorite actress doesn't try comedy? Everything I've ever seen her in is heavy-duty drama. — R.G.

A: Bisset blames it on the fact that she's done so many dramatic roles, no one ever thinks of her for comedy. All those serious parts were becoming a millstone, but that will change, she says, with her latest movie, "Scenes From the Class Struggle in Beverly Hills," in which she plays a beautiful, rich widow who's a former TV sitcom queen. "My jaw really fell as I read the script, because it was so outrageous. The humor in this movie is so bawdy, with such dangerous edges, I thought it would be

fun; therefore, I jumped right in!"

Q: Someone told me that the great-looking prep school in the new Robin Williams movie "Dead Poets Society" was a fake that was done on a Hollywood movie lot. — J.S.

A: Not so. After looking at more than 70 schools, the film company settled on St. Andrews in Middleton, Delaware. So as not to disturb classes, they shot there during Christmas and Thanksgiving holidays. They did, however, build a classroom in Wilmington for Williams's teaching scenes. Curiously, it's the first major movie ever filmed in Delaware.

Q: We heard that Hank Williams Jr. got in trouble in Baton Rouge, La., about his airplane. What was that all about? — D.L.

A: Williams showed up for a concert, stumbled through 20 minutes of starting and stopping songs, and finally had to leave the stage. Some 7,000 outraged fans demanded their money back. Williams's plane was held until his agents agreed to pay \$125,000 to recompense the owners of the Baton Rouge arena, the site of the concert. A spokesman for the country singer said that the aborting

of the concert was due to Williams's personal problems and that his past troubles with drugs are behind him.

Q: What will NBC do next year, now that they've lost the major league baseball "Game of the Week"? — T.K.

A: The new sports president, Dick Ebersol, who used to be with "Saturday Night Live," has big plans for that time slot starting next April. They include a TV movie about Marilyn Monroe and Joe DiMaggio, the Masters All-Star Baseball Game, in which such past stars as Reggie Jackson and Vida Blue will play, and — wildcat-of-all — a triathlon, in which participants will "escape" from Alcatraz Island and swim across the bay.

Q: Is Don Johnson following in Paul Newman's footsteps and taking up racecar driving? — A.K.

A: No, Johnson is a powerboat fanatic interested in boat racing. He's just bought a new 50-foot speedboat and plans to compete this August in the Trump Castle race in Atlantic City, N.J. The boat is said to have cost \$1 million, and is named Mel — after Melanie, of course.

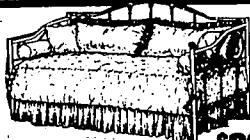

NBC sets Nielsen record with full year at the top of ratings

NEW YORK (AP) — Record-setting NBC has become the first network ever to spend a full year at the top of the Nielsen ratings.

Despite competition from the final game of the NBA playoffs on CBS and ABC's "Roseanne" in the No. 1 spot, NBC won its 52nd week in a row last week with an average, prime-time A.C. Nielsen Co. rating of 11.6. CBS had 10.2 and ABC had 9.2.

The last time NBC lost a week was last year during CBS' airing of the

seventh game of the National Basketball Association championship in which the Los Angeles Lakers beat the Detroit Pistons. This year, the Pistons knocked off the Lakers in a four-game sweep. Game four ranked fourth in the Nielsen last week with a 17.4 rating and 31 share.

NBC's celebration, which included giving employees the day off June 30, was besmirched only by the interloping "Roseanne" on ABC.

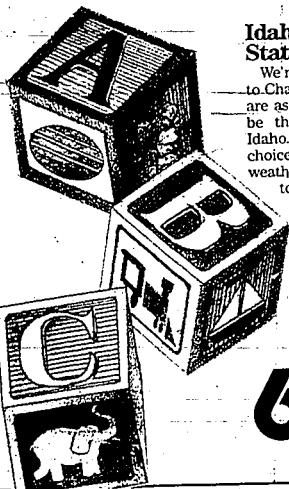

which edged "The Cosby Show" as the show with the highest rating in the past 52 weeks—even though it didn't premiere until last fall.

NBC's "The Cosby Show," was first in the Nielsens for 16 of the 52 weeks, but ranked second for the year and third last week. It had a higher share than "Roseanne" in both instances, because it is on at 8 p.m. (EDT) when there are fewer people watching TV than 9 p.m. when "Roseanne" is on.

The rating is a percentage of the estimated 90.4 million homes in the United States that have televisions. The share is a percentage of sets in use. A show can have a lower rating and higher share than another show by getting a larger percentage of a smaller available audience.

NBC said another reason "Cosby" fell behind "Roseanne" for the year was because the newer ABC show did not have to factor in a summer of reruns.

The top 10 shows last week were: "Roseanne" ABC, "Cheers" NBC, "The Cosby Show" NBC, "Detroit Pistons vs. Los Angeles Lakers" CBS, "Perry Mason: The Case of the

Murdered Madam" NBC, "A Different World" NBC, "Empty Nest" NBC, "Dear John" NBC, "Golden Girls" NBC, and "Unsolved Mysteries" NBC, which tied with "Newhart" on CBS.

In a demonstration of how time period makes the show, ABC's "Have Faith" tied for 15th when it was on Tuesday behind "Roseanne." But when it was moved into ABC's low-rated Sunday lineup, it fell to 76th and was the lowest-rated network show.

NBC's average rating for the 52 weeks was 14.4. CBS and ABC tied with 11.6 each. The combined network share for 52-week period was 65.

Last week, the three networks drew only 69 percent of the audience.

The top 10 shows of the year were: "Roseanne" ABC, "The Cosby Show" NBC, "A Different World" NBC, "Cheers" NBC, "Golden Girls" NBC, "60 Minutes" CBS, "Empty Nest" NBC, "Dear John" NBC, "Who's the Boss?" ABC and "Murder, She Wrote" CBS.

"NBC Nightly News" continued to lag in the news ratings, even with anchorman Tom Brokaw in China.

Fox forms children's TV cooperative that will aim at children age 2 to 11

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Television stations affiliated with the Fox Broadcasting Corp. announced on Wednesday the formation of a new children's television cooperative.

The Kids Network, due to deliver its first animated series to the 125 Fox stations in September 1990, will pool the resources of the Fox stations to produce network-quality programming for children age 2-11, said Mike Fisher, chairman of Fox's affiliate board.

"With all the Fox affiliates, we will reach 90 percent of the country," Fisher said. "I think the best way to think of it is that Fox is going to be the banker and the affiliates end up owning the programming."

The children's network will

operate as its own company, with profits divided among participating affiliates based on their audience delivery. Fox Broadcasting Corp. will manage promotion, marketing and program development.

The move is aimed to free the Fox stations from the costly practice of buying children's show from television syndicators. The Kids Network hopes to produce two hours of children's show daily.

"We've got at least the top 50 (children's TV) producers standing in line wanting to put their best foot forward with quality programming," Fisher said. "We can become really good broadcasters."

Lisa Bonet sues over photo

LOS ANGELES — Actress Lisa Bonet raised some eyebrows — and more than a little consternation on the part of her TV father, Bill Cosby — when she appeared last year in Rolling Stone magazine wearing nothing but a nose ring.

But celebrity must run in the family. Bonet's infant daughter, it seems, appeared in the Jan. 10 issue of the National Enquirer. This time, it was Bonet's turn to be annoyed.

In a lawsuit filed Wednesday in Los Angeles federal court, the actress claims that a photo of her 3-week-old daughter, Zoe, disappeared when she sent it in for processing at a Reseda, Calif., drugstore and subsequently surfaced on the pages of the supermarket tabloid.

Bonet, who also displayed the family anatomy as Mickey Rourke's co-star in the movie "Angel Heart," is seeking unspecified damages and a court injunction barring further use of the photo.

Bonet was joined in her lawsuit by her mother, Arlene Boney, who delivered the film to an Oso Drug Store in Reseda on Dec. 22.

When she returned to pick it up six days later, Bonet noticed that the tenth photograph — one of several featuring Zoe — was missing. So was

the negative. The photo appeared in the National Enquirer on Jan. 10.

Actually, the spread was modest by family standards, featuring Bonet, Zoe and Bonet's husband, musician Lenny Kravitz, and congratulating the infant on transforming Bonet "from a high-kicking hell raiser" to a "doting mother."

The family's happiness had been "marred," the magazine added, by a dispute between Bonet and Kravitz over how the child would be raised: Jewish, as Kravitz reportedly preferred, or Buddhist.

The lawsuit — in which Bonet and her mother seek unspecified general damages and \$5 million in punitive damages — does not mention the text or any of the two accompanying photos.

'Dynasty' may tie up loose ends

Q: Will there be a final "Dynasty" in which all the loose ends in the cliffhanger are dealt with?

A: There has been some talk at the network and from the producers about a two-hour TV movie that would wrap up the loose ends and officially end the series, which was canceled after nine seasons. However, a network spokesman says no final decisions have been made.

Q: What can you tell me about Scott Bakula, the star of "Quantum Leap"? He seems familiar but where have I seen him before?

A: Bakula, born and raised in St. Louis, began his career in hometown school productions (at the age of 13 he sang in "Amahl and the Night Visitors" with his church group and the St. Louis Symphony). He then moved to New York to begin a near-

decade of stage work. Bakula's next move, to Los Angeles in 1986, resulted in appearances on several TV series (including "Designing Women" and "Matlock") and the TV movies "The Last Fling," "The Infiltrator" and "I-Man." He is best known for having starred in two short-lived ABC series, "Gung Ho" (1986-87) and "Eisenhower and Lutz" (ABC, 1988), and for receiving a Tony nomination for the musical, "Romance, Romance."

Q: What happened to "Nightingales"? It suddenly stopped airing Wednesdays on NBC.

A: "Nightingales" was not renewed for another season, a victim of unimpressive ratings. Some have noted that other series with weaker ratings were renewed. It didn't help that this Aaron Spelling-produced series became embroiled in a controversy over steamy stories.
