INEL, Gem air base on Superfund cleanup list

TWIN FALLS — The Idaho National Engineering Laboratory and the Mountain Home Air Force Base have been nominated to a Superfund priority list, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency announced Thursday.

Possible groundwater contamination has led the EPA to propose the INEL and the Mountain Home base for inclusion on the National Priority list of hazardous waste sites.

Past waste disposal practices at both

locations may have contaminated groundwater, possibly affecting drinking water and irrigation water, the EPA said.

Contaminants include organic solvents, heavy metals and radioactive materials at INEL and solvents and pesticides at Mountain Home.

INEL's inclusion comes as no surprise, said Terry Smith, with INEL's public affairs office. The facility has been working on hazardous waste cleanup for the past three

years, he said.

Inclusion on the National Priority List, created by the Superfund law to identify the most serious hazardous waste sites around the country, will focus additional attention on contaminated sites. It will not make a big difference in cleanup at INEL, said Steve Hill, with the state's Hazardous Materials Bureau.

The law does not allow Superfund money to be used at federal facilities; the Energy Department is responsible for funding cleanup at INEL out of its operating budget.

But inclusion on the list could provide some Superfund money to support the state

of Idaho's role in overseeing the cleanup and administering state hazardous waste laws, said Lynn McKee, director of the EPA's Boise office.

The state already is involved with current cleanup efforts at INEL.

INEL was proposed primarily because of contamination at three areas within the sprawling 894 square-mile Federal Energy Department facility:

- U.S. Geological Survey tests at INEL's Radioactive Waste Management Complex have shown carbon tetrachloride and trichloroethylene in the Snake River Plain Aquifer. Tests also have found plutonium

and other long-lived radioactive particles in shallow groundwater on the site, according to the EPA.

Most of the Magic Valley draws drinking and irrigation water from the aquifer, starting about 75 miles downstream from INEL.

- At INEL's Test Reactor Area, according to 1985 and 1986 USGS reports, hexavalent chromium has been found in drinking water wells. Hexavalent chromium is a form of chromium once used to protect reactor cooling systems from corrosion.

Safeguarding flag sparks hot debate

WASHINGTON — Impassioned pleas for a constitutional amendment banning flag desecration were met Thursday with equally passionate warnings that the proposed amendment is a dangerous reaction and what one senator called "a crass competition about who loves the flag more."

The chairman of the subcommittee that heard testimony on the amendment proposed by President George Bush urged caution.

"The Constitution ... is fragile and can be wounded by the votes of legislators caught up in the emotional whirlwinds of the moment," said Rep. Don Edwards, D-Calif., chairman of the House Subcommittee on Civil and Constitutional Rights.

However, House Minority Leader Robert Michel, R-Ill., and Rep. G.V. "Sonny" Montgomery, D-Miss., asked the panel to approve the constitutional amendment as a remedy to the Supreme Court's ruling last month that flag burning is protected as free speech.

"This is what the people want, and if we don't do something about it, they're going to do something about

it. They're going to get it one way or another," said Montgomery, who heads the House Veterans Affairs Committee.

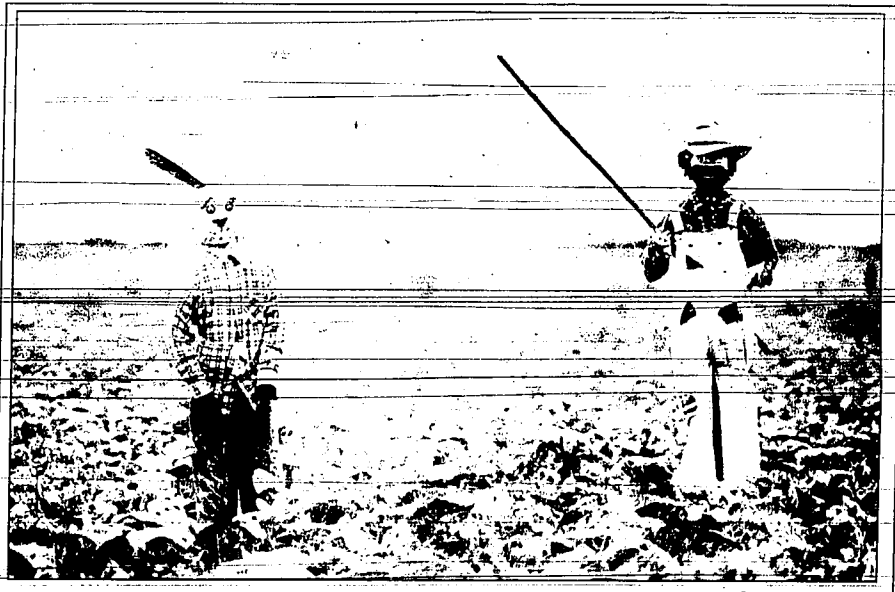
But the panel, which one Republican called a "graveyard for legislation," seemed inclined toward less-dramatic approaches. Several seemed to lean towards a statute sponsored by Senate Judiciary Committee Chairman Joseph Biden, D-Del.

Biden told the panel that his statute would pass constitutional muster because it prohibits flag desecration, but makes no reference to the impact of the desecration. One reason the Supreme Court struck down the Texas law, according to Biden, was that the law prohibited flag desecration that "will seriously offend one or more persons ..."

"Let's heal the wound, pass the legislation and move on," Biden said.

However, Michel said Biden's statute would not work and would only prolong the debate by throwing the issue back to the courts.

"There is no quick legislative fix on this issue," Michel told the panel. "Either we amend the Constitution — as grave and complicated an undertaking as that is — or else we let the decision stand. There is no middle ground."

Bush brings key to French party

PARIS — President Bush supplied the key to help unlock the biggest birthday party in French history Thursday as swanky dinners and the opera took center stage after the president's four-day trip to Eastern Europe.

Bush and more than 30 other world leaders were treated to a swirl of festivities celebrating the 200th anniversary of the French Revolution.

The events ranged from a ceremony commemorating the drafting of the French version of

American's Declaration of Independence to an offbeat parade celebrating the celebration Friday that will feature Russian dancers with a bear on ice, Britons marching under artificial rain and a Florida band moonwalking up the famed Champs Elysee.

Amid the hoopla of the birthday bash, more weighty issues were being discussed as well. The president's other reason for being in Paris was to attend his first economic summit of the leaders of the world's seven richest nations.

The 15th annual economic

Opera at Bastille uncorks 3-day blast

PARIS — France uncorked three days of bicentennial hoopla Thursday by inaugurating a gleaming, high-tech opera house at the site of the Bastille, the despised prison where its revolution began.

President Francois Mitterrand, President Bush, and their wives sat in front-row balcony seats at the Opera Bastille for an opening concert featuring singers Placido Domingo and Barbara Hendricks.

Also present were 32 other presidents and prime ministers

who came to Paris for this weekend's celebrations of the revolution's 200th anniversary and for the annual summit of the world's seven richest nations.

Sharpshooters were posted on rooftops and in windows of buildings surrounding the Place de la Bastille as the leaders arrived. Authorities have clamped tight and highly visible security around the capital this week.

Later Thursday, more than 100,000 people jammed into the large circular plaza for the

Stricken pilot survives long flight, crash

MIAMI — A small plane with a stricken pilot flew hundreds of miles down the Atlantic Coast on autopilot shadowed by military jets Thursday, finally running out of gas and spiraling into the ocean.

The pilot then emerged from the wreckage and swam toward his startled rescuers, authorities said.

Thomas Root, a 36-year-old lawyer from Alexandria, Va., was pulled from Bahamian waters by Air Force parachutists four hours after he had first radioed he was in trouble. He was first taken to Nassau, and a Coast Guard helicopter then flew him to Florida.

"For him to survive a crash like that, it just sent us all into shock," said Petty Officer Veronica Cady, a Coast Guard spokeswoman. "We didn't expect this story to have a happy ending."

Coast Guard Capt. Dr. James Rahman said Root may have passed out from carbon monoxide poisoning in the cockpit of his single-engine Cessna and that water splashing in his face apparently roused him.

Root was taken to Memorial Hospital in Hollywood, where he underwent exploratory surgery for possible internal injuries.

His wife, Kathy, 35, told reporters from the porch of the family home that her husband had been awake and talking to doctors. The hospital listed him in critical condition, but Mrs. Root said she was told his

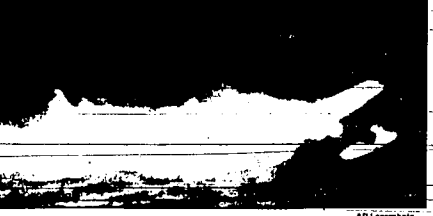
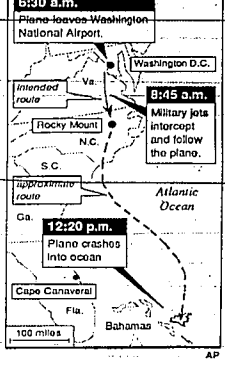
condition was serious to guarded.

She said she told hospital officials to send her husband the following message: "Root, you really did it this time."

The drama began about 6:30 a.m. MDT when Root, who had taken off from Washington National Airport about 4:30 a.m. MDT for Rocky Mount, N.C., radioed air traffic controllers in Virginia that he was having chest pain and trouble breathing.

"There was no further radio contact, and military pilots who tailed the plane reported he was slumped behind the controls as his plane flew south off the coast, occasionally getting within 100 miles of the shore.

Military pilots and rescuers trained to parachute into the ocean to save ditched pilots could only watch helplessly as their aircraft tracked the plane until it ran out of gas.

After more than 3 1/2 hours of radio silence, the plane spiraled into the water and Root was rescued, 800 miles from his original destination in North Carolina and 250 miles southeast of Miami.

"The words you keep hearing are, 'You're kidding,'" said Ms. Cady.

The Coast Guard said the plane went down about 15 miles east of the island of Eleuthera. "It spiraled into the water, so it didn't make the best of all possible landings," said Chief Petty Officer Lou Parra.

Coast Guard Lt. Commander Gary Poll, who was at the scene in a jet when Root crashed, said the plane

was at about 7,000 feet when it began spiraling in like a corkscrew and spinning down at about 2,000 feet per minute.

Poll said the nose and left wing hit the water at the same time and the plane swivelled on its belly on a 360-degree spin. He said it stayed aloft for several minutes and started to sink.

Air Force Sgt. Paul Hayden, one of four Air Reserve Technicians who parachuted into the water, said Root was first spotted swimming away from the wreckage dressed only in

Housing aide requests immunity

WASHINGTON (AP) — A top aide to former Housing Secretary Samuel Pierce wants immunity from prosecution in exchange for testimony implicating Pierce in the influence-peddling scandal at the agency, sources said Thursday.

The sources, who asked not to be identified by name, said Deborah Gore Dean has told congressional investigators she can testify that Pierce received funding for specific projects under the Section 8 Moderate Rehabilitation program.

The sources said Ms. Dean demanded immunity from prosecution in exchange for answering questions from the House subcommittee investigating abuses at HUD during Pierce's eight-year tenure as secretary.

Cuban war hero, 3 others executed

MEXICO CITY (AP) — A war hero who fought with Fidel Castro in Cuba's revolution was executed by firing squad at dawn Thursday with three other officers for smuggling tons of drugs into the United States, the official Cuban news agency said. The drug traffic has stunned and embarrassed Castro and his communist government, which for years denied U.S. accusations that Cuba was being used to smuggle cocaine and marijuana to the United States.

In a brief dispatch monitored in Mexico City, the Cuban news agency Prensa Latina said the sentences against Maj. Gen. Arnaldo Ochoa, Col. Antonio de la Guardia Pont, Maj. Amado Padron and Capt. Jorge Martinez had been carried out.

Ochoa was a trusted aide to President Castro, commanding Cuban forces in Ethiopia and Angola and heading a Cuban military mission to Nicaragua.

Biologists race to save rare trout

SILVER CITY, N.M. (AP) — Biologists on Thursday used long-handled nets to scoop an endangered species of trout from a creek polluted with ash from a nearby beater wild fire.

Firefighters mopped up blazes in five other Western states.

The Gila trout, lured into a clear section of Diamond Creek a day earlier, were collected along a three-quarter mile stretch and put in holding tanks on the sides of mules or horses to be taken eventually to an Apache fish hatchery.

Fires in Arizona, California, Colorado, Nebraska and Utah were largely contained Thursday. Firefighters mostly mopped up and monitored hot spots.

This form of chromium is highly toxic and has been linked to cancer in rats, lung cancer in chromate industry workers and kidney damage in humans. Because of its toxicity, hexavalent chromium no longer is used.

The EPA suspects the contamination at the Test Reactor Area resulted from nearly 17,000 tons of hazardous wastes dumped into the aquifer via a 560-foot injection well as well as several unlined ponds and ditches.

In addition to the chromium, contaminants including organic solvents, sulfuric acid, radioactive particles and laboratory wastes were disposed of in the well, according to the EPA.

At the Test Area North, trichloroethylene was found in the drinking water last December. Workers in that area drank bottled water until a water purification system was installed in February.

Though the solvent still is in the groundwater, the system removes it from the drinking water.

The EPA's proposals for inclusion on the National Priority List are open to a 60-day public comment period. After receiving comments, the EPA will decide which sites will be on the list.

Being on the list would make the site subject to the Comprehensive Environmental Response Compensation and Liability Act, or CERCLA for short.

Under CERCLA regulations, the EPA and the Energy Department would sign a three-party

agreement outlining each entity's authority and responsibilities in cleaning up hazardous waste sites. The regulations are clearer and easier to follow than rules now governing INEL's cleanup.

Past disposal practices at the Mountain Home Air Force Base have contaminated several wells with trichloroethane, a chemical used in fire extinguishers and as a solvent. The EPA suspects contamination at other locations as well.

The Air Force is investigating the problem, but details were not available Friday, said Tech. Sgt. Chris Aune, an Air Force spokesman.

Drinking water at the base has been tested and has met federal drinking water standards consistently, he said.

"There is no danger to any users of the (drinking water) system," Aune said.

Afternoon temperatures around the state were mostly in the 80s and lower 90s. Clouds and showers were more common over the northern Panhandle so the readings were only in the 70s.

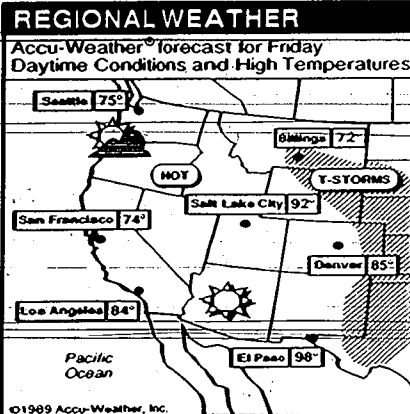
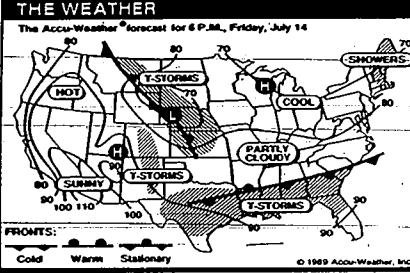

Root was pulled onto a raft and given first aid, said Hayden, based at the 301st Aerospace Rescue and Recovery Squadron in Homestead, about 20 miles south of Miami.

"He told us his abdomen is hurting a lot and we could see he was bleeding," said Hayden. "It was incredible. He had a sense of humor about it."

Rahman, the doctor who treated Root in Nassau, said Root was alert and could speak well but seemed to be in shock and had abdominal injuries and fractured ribs. Rahman said there was no indication of a heart attack and Root had no history of heart trouble.

"It's definitely a miracle he's alive. He's a little confused by it all," the doctor said.

After its distress call, the plane was intercepted by two Marine Corps F-A-18 jet fighters when it entered Norfolk Naval Station airspace at 8:45 a.m., said Lt. Cmdr. Mike John, a Navy spokesman. The pilots of the intercepting planes tried to contact the pilot by radio, he said.

The Cessna 210 Centurion can seat four to six people, counting the pilot, and cruises at about 190 mph. Bill Piernan, shift supervisor in the air traffic control tower at Washington National, told Raleigh radio station WPTF that the autopilot was set on a heading that would have sent the plane toward Bahamas.

"Put an airplane on automatic pilot and it's going to continue just exactly on the course that the automatic pilot is set for," he said.

At time of crash, Root was followed by a C-130 cargo plane from Homestead Air Force Base near Miami and an HH3 helicopter from Patrick Air Force Base, also on Florida's East Coast, said Lt. Col. Margaret Starck of Homestead. A flight surgeon was part of the rescue team, she said.

Idaho UP unable to abandon east Idaho tracks

BOISE (AP) — A federal administrative law judge has denied a bid by Union Pacific Railroad to abandon a 31-mile spur line through an eastern Idaho farm area.

Officials said Thursday they were notified that Paul Cross, administrative law judge for the Interstate Commerce Commission, has rejected Union Pacific's request to abandon a spur from Ashton to Tonia.

The railroad said the spur, which was shut down a couple of years ago, does not generate enough business to justify operation. Gov. Cecil Andrus, the Public Utilities Commission and other Idaho agencies contended there is plenty of business, but Union Pacific has deliberately discouraged potential customers to justify abandonment of the line.

"This is an important victory for Idaho and for adequate transportation service in the rural areas of our state," said Andrus. "Adequate rail service is absolutely essential to the future of our rural areas, and I am extremely pleased the strong case made by the state has convinced the

ICC to make the right decision."

The judge's ruling, which followed a hearing at Driggs, will stand unless amended or reversed by the five-person ICC within 30 days. The railroad also has 30 days to appeal.

Task force begins work on money needs of education

BOISE (AP) — A task force has started working on new ways to finance higher education needs in Idaho.

Board of Education President George Alvarez called the current system of financing those projects "grossly inadequate" Thursday as he announced formation of a 11-member task force of business, political and government leaders.

It met immediately, and Alvarez said the goal will be to come up with recommendations for the next legislature.

This year, there's an extra \$12.5 million for college construction. The 1989 Legislature appropriated it, on the condition that it would be financed only if there was a surplus in the state budget on July 1.

"While we're happy that the budget surplus will enable us to catch up on some of our critical capital projects, we still need a reliable, long-term plan to provide for construction and renovation," Alvarez said.

"We simply can't sit around and wait for a surplus year to show up. That's not good management."

He said he and other members of the Board of Education face \$111 million

in requests from the state-operated colleges and universities in the next six years, just to renovate existing buildings.

Another \$110 million is needed for new buildings over the same period, he said.

The Legislative Budget Office said it can identify \$25 million in immediate renovation needs, topped by the \$5.4 million request to update the Physical Science Building at Idaho State University.

The Permanent Building Fund is designed to finance state construction, and more than \$11 million per year goes into it. But it covers the budget of the Division of Public Works, and the state usually spends \$5 million to \$6 million on renovation and repairs. Idaho also must make \$3 million payments on bonds sold for a new state prison, and \$1.1 million per year on bonds financing renovation of the State School for the Deaf and Blind at Gooding.

Only \$3 million to \$4 million is available to finance new construction in most budget years.

The result, Alvarez said, is that the requests pile up.

NOW ready to fight threat of more abortion restrictions

BOISE (AP) — The Treasure Valley Chapter of the National Organization for Women is gearing up to fight what it sees as the threat of additional abortion restrictions in Idaho, the group's president said.

NOW will try to collect the needed 38,743 signatures to put a pro-choice initiative on Idaho's 1990 general election ballot, Lois Warner said Wednesday. The deadline for collecting the signatures is July 1990.

We are making an appeal to mobilize the people," Ms. Warner said. "The recent U.S. Supreme Court decision allowing the state

more power over reproductive decisions is an insult to women and men; an outrageous invasion of privacy."

If the Idaho Legislature does not place additional restrictions on abortion, Ms. Warner said, NOW will keep the initiative off the ballot.

"I think the initiative would fail miserably in any case," said state Sen. Rachel Gilbert, R-Boise, who opposes abortion except in cases of rape, incest or where a mother's life is at risk.

Despite pro-choice groups' efforts, state lawmakers will pass more

restrictive abortion laws, Mrs. Gilbert said.

She has called for the abortion issue to be included on the agenda if Gov. Cecil Andrus calls a special session of the Legislature this summer.

"If something isn't done in special session, this issue will consume the regular session," Mrs. Gilbert said.

"It's going to overshadow every issue."

NOW has enlisted support from the American Civil Liberties Union and Planned Parenthood of Idaho for its initiative drive.

"The ACLU believes that the right to choose an abortion is a constitutionally based, fundamental right of privacy of women to make decisions regarding their own bodies," ACLU member Ann Cosho said. "We don't think the people of Idaho are going to throw their rights out the window."

Private pay phones may go

BOISE (AP) — Privately owned pay phones that do not comply with state regulations will be disconnected starting Sept. 1, the Idaho Public Utilities Commission says.

The operators of these privately owned pay telephones are offering to the public a service closely tied to traditional telephone services in an environment in which substantial portions of the public are unaware that the service are no longer provided by a traditionally regulated utility, the PUC said.

The private phones must offer several services expected of public pay phones. They should meet Federal Communications Commission standards. They must allow a coin-free operator and an "911" or other emergency access.

State prison farm manager loses post

BOISE (AP) — The manager of the prison farm at the Idaho State Penitentiary has been fired after an investigation indicated he converted a bull that was to be slaughtered for personal use, Corrections Director Richard Vernon said Thursday.

Vernon said Millard K. Bright, who had managed the low-security prison farm since 1983, was placed on administrative leave on Monday and then was terminated Wednesday night.

Vernon said Warden Larry Wright was conferring with the Department of Law Enforcement and Canyon County authorities on whether charges would be filed in the matter.

Treatment for alcoholism must take much higher priority

For those who have been fighting chemical dependency and drug problems for more than two decades through treatment, prevention, education and law enforcement, the "War on Drugs" is not new.

The "War on Drugs" — a label coined under the Reagan Administration — is more accurately a declared war that a lot of people have been engaged in for a long time. Not to diminish its validity, it can certainly be said that the "War on Drugs" has already produced positive results. The most successful has been the great increase in awareness of these problems throughout this country.

This awareness has brought about a greater understanding of this complex issue and broader acceptability of chemical dependency as an illness which not only affects the individual but also the family and everyone he or she knows. This awareness has made it easier for the suffering addicted person to come forward for assistance.

There are, however, two major

shortcomings in this campaign. One, the lack of adequate focus on treatment, and two, the exclusion of the drug addict. Secretary William Bennett, in his role as successful administrator, has assumed the position of "Drug Czar" with little experience with these problems. Compounding his lack of expertise is the fact that none of the top aides he has selected are knowledgeable about drugs and addictions.

We are told that the "War on Drugs" is a three-pronged attack through law enforcement, prevention/education and treatment. Yet, up to this point, an irrational amount of emphasis has been placed on law enforcement.

Out of every federal dollar committed to this effort, 73 cents has gone solely to law enforcement-related activities.

Obviously, law enforcement is important. Those who commit criminal acts by

trafficking in illegal drugs should be apprehended and prosecuted.

But this does not respond to the millions of Americans now in the throes of addiction. The limited public funds available make it almost impossible for many of those who truly need and want help to enter treatment.

In Idaho, almost every treatment center which provides services for low income or indigent citizens has a long waiting list. This problem is quadrupled in states with much larger populations.

Since every program in Idaho has increased its outreach efforts to reach young people (causing a huge influx of adolescent admissions), the three out of 10 youths who need residential treatment cannot be admitted because there are no programs for kids from low-income families.

Most aware people know that the number one drug in this country is a legal one: alcohol. This drug causes more deaths each year than the total number of American

lives lost in the Vietnam War.

Yes, many people apparently can drink alcohol safely, but a large number cannot. The government is not placing adequate effort in the prevention and treatment of alcoholism.

Alcoholism plagues professionals in every field including public service continue to place our lives and security in jeopardy. Many of these same people boldly and loudly denounce drugs and quietly retire to their booze bottle.

Cocaine, crack, heroin are terrible drugs, but equal havoc is realized in nice communities like ours by young and old alike who are slowly drowning in alcohol.

The solutions are simple to state but will take courage to effect. Secretary Bennett needs to equitably address the "War on Drugs" from all fronts.

Treating those now afflicted; those who will in fact die if not helped in a humane and moral obligation. Rather than the wealth of

knowledge and expertise available in the treatment community.

In spite of the lobbyists, in spite of the fact that alcoholic beverages are legal, Mr. Bennett must not only communicate that alcohol is a drug and a deadly one, but that alcoholism can be arrested and treatment is available.

He must then do whatever is necessary to see that treatment for alcoholism and all drugs are not just available for the affluent but for everyone in need.

When we reach those now addicted, when we effectively provide prevention and education, we will substantially reduce the demand for drugs and thus lower the need for such extensive efforts in law enforcement. You cannot sell drugs to people who do not need them or want them.

Reagan's judicial legacy will extend far into 21st century

WASHINGTON (AP) — Ronald Reagan's imprint on the judiciary is far broader and deeper than his three Supreme Court appointments — in eight years he named nearly half the judges now on the federal bench.

His conservative legacy will extend well into the next century, ever more significant as the Supreme Court lessens the restraints its decisions have imposed on lower courts. That's been the trend in such recent rulings as those weighing against abortion, curtailing affirmative action programs and

permitting capital punishment of youthful and retarded murderers.

In a study of Reagan's judicial appointments, Sheldon Goldman, a political scientist at the University of Massachusetts, says they represent "a major and what is likely to be an enduring legacy."

Reagan named 346, or 47 percent, of the nation's active federal judges.

Goldman, writing in the journal of the American Judicature Society, says the Reagan administration set

up the most systematic philosophical screening process in U.S. history to check out candidates for judicial appointments.

It demonstrated the importance given judicial selection by the Reagan administration, and the recognition that the appointment process, by placing on the bench those opposed to the creation of new rights by liberal activist courts, could be used to achieve the administration's social agenda, Goldman says.

That process was slow, gradually gaining headway during the latter

years of Reagan's presidency, and accelerating this year, after President Bush had succeeded him.

Goldman notes that because the lower courts must follow Supreme Court precedent in their decisions, Reagan appointees could not change course on issues such as abortion and affirmative action until the high court modified its stand on them. Now that's happening.

Reagan named three new justices: Sandra Day O'Connor, Antonin Scalia and Anthony Kennedy, and promoted William H. Rehnquist from associate to chief

justice.

While that consolidated a conservative majority, the Reagan appointees succeeded justices who were themselves centrist or relatively conservative. It may fall to Bush to appoint successors to the three oldest and most liberal justices, all of them over 80.

"I want people who will interpret the Constitution and not legislate from the bench," Bush said as a candidate. That was vintage Reagan, as was his warning against liberal activists on the bench.

But as Goldman observed, the high court "has exercised its own brand of judicial activism" in rulings to undo earlier decisions on civil rights and other issues.

Goldman says the real impact of Reagan's appointments on district and appeals court decisions will be gradual, reaching into the 21st century, and likely to be reinforced by the judges Bush chooses.

Whether that's good or bad depends on the viewpoint of the person who is judging the trend.

"For civil libertarians this means that when the country celebrates the bicentennial of the ratification of the Bill of Rights in 1991, the courts will be dominated by those hostile to a liberal reading of those rights," Goldman says. "For judicial conservatives, this means a healthy return to government by the elected representatives of the people."

In the conservative view, such contentious issues as abortion, civil rights and capital punishment belong in the hands of politicians, voters and legislators, rather than in the hands of judges with lifetime tenure.

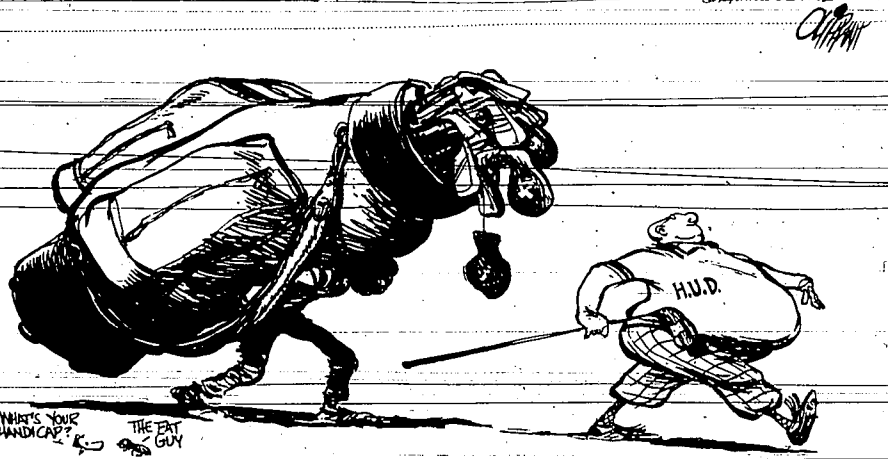
That's the line Justice Scalia followed in his separate opinion on the abortion decision. He said the court should have overturned its original abortion rights decision and thus yielded its control of what I believe to be, and many of our citizens recognize to be, a political issue.

Scalia is unwavering in that view. A decade ago, as a University of Chicago law professor, he advanced the same argument on federal rule-making.

"The main problem is that the agencies have been assigned too many tasks requiring judgments that are of an essentially political nature and that ought to be made by our elected representatives," he said then.

Not that elected representatives necessarily want to handle contentious, closely divided issues on which a vote gained may well mean a vote lost, too. By conservative reasoning, that's their problem.

Temperance won out at Constitutional Convention, 1889

BOISE CITY — July 15, 1889 — Delegates to the Idaho Constitutional Convention rejected a strong prohibition plank today.

During a generally mirthful session, members approved the language of the temperance plank of last year's Republican platform for placement in the Constitution.

The convention resolved itself into Committee of the Whole session to consider a prohibition resolution presented last week by the Women's Christian Temperance Union.

The resolution proposed a constitutional ban on the manufacture or sale of intoxicating liquors for use as a beverage.

It would have allowed the making or selling of liquor for purposes other than as a beverage only as permitted by the Legislature.

A move by George Ainslie of Boise County to indefinitely postpone consideration of the prohibition plank was defeated by a 19-23 vote.

Without debate, the portion of the proposal making it a criminal offense to make or sell drinking liquor was killed by voice vote.

Chas. A. Clark of Ada County

Calbreath IDAHO 1890-1990

proposed that the Republican Party's temperance plank be substituted for the WCTU provision on non-beverage uses. The proposal was adopted by voice vote.

"The approved language states, 'The first concern of all good government is the virtue and sobriety of the people and the purity of the home, which all legislation should further by wise and well-directed efforts for the promotion of temperance and morality.'" Clark said the language is identical to that adopted in the 1888 Republican Convention.

One hundred years ago this month, the Idaho Constitutional Convention met in Boise City to write a constitution for territory of Idaho. The above article, by the current Attorney General, Jim Jones, recreates some of the convention's actions.

Cheney says B-2 'essential'; issues plea for more funding

WASHINGTON (AP) — Defense Secretary Dick Cheney pleaded with Congress Thursday not to "nickel and dime to death" the B-2 stealth bomber.

Cheney said the radar-evading plane is essential for U.S. capability to "penetrate improving Soviet air defenses."

Testifying before the House Armed Services Committee, Cheney urged lawmakers to try to overcome "sticker shock" at the \$500 million to \$1 billion price for each plane and to restore some \$800 million the panel cut from the B-2 budget.

A prototype of the plane made its first taxi tests in Palmdale, Calif., earlier this week but has yet to make its maiden flight.

Recent figures have indicated that \$23 billion has been spent on the B-2 so far, much of it in secrecy, and there are estimates that it will cost an additional \$50 billion through the late 1990s.

Cheney told the House panel he could not guarantee against cost increases but said most of the major technical and cost overrun problems of the past are under control.

"It's time, however, that we move this debate from the question of simple cost to one of strategic value," he said. "The B-2 is an essential addition to our strategic bomber force if we are to have confidence in our ability to penetrate improving Soviet air defenses in the late 1990s and beyond."

The defense secretary made the appeal as both the Senate and House moved toward showdowns on the plane's place in President Bush's request for a \$256.6 billion Pentagon budget next year.

The Senate Armed Services Committee met behind closed doors Thursday writing its own version of a defense budget to be revealed Friday.

The House panel — over the vehement objections of its chairman — last month cut the administration's request for the B-2 from \$4.7 billion to \$3.9 billion while restoring \$300 million for a vertical takeoff plane and the F-14D fighter jet that Bush and Cheney wanted to scuttle.

Apollo 11 mission commemorates 20th

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — The Apollo 11 astronauts embark on a week-long sentimental journey Saturday, traveling to NASA space centers and the nation's capital to commemorate man's landing on the moon 20 years ago.

It was on July 20, 1969, that Neil Armstrong and Buzz Aldrin left the first footprints on the lunar surface while Mike Collins circled overhead in the Apollo 11 command ship.

The three will start their anniversary trip at the Marshall Space Flight Center in Huntsville, Ala., where a team headed by the late Werner von Braun, the one-time man rocket builder, designed the mighty Saturn 5 rocket that propelled them to the moon.

At Marshall they will meet with rocket pioneers and attend a reception and an open house where aspects of the flight, including the taking of the moon's flag of Tranquility, will be re-created by actors on a stage.

The astronauts will be at the Kennedy Space Center at Cape Canaveral on Sunday, the

anniversary of the launch. Against a backdrop of an unused Saturn 5, now a museum piece, they will make brief remarks and listen to a tape recording of the launch commentary in the minutes before the Apollo 11 liftoff.

The "taped liftoff" will occur at 7:32 a.m. MDT, precisely the time they left Earth.

Following the ceremony the spacemen will ride in a motorcade that will travel 20 miles to Cocoa Beach, where they will be feted at a luncheon.

On Wednesday, they will be in Washington for a gala evening reception at the Smithsonian Institution's National Air and Space Museum.

The next day, the anniversary of the moon landing, Armstrong, Aldrin and Collins will be joined by President Bush for a ceremony on the Mall in front of the museum.

Following the Mall ceremony the astronauts will fly to the Johnson Space Center in Houston, site of their Apollo training base and home for the Mission Control Center.

Immigration system revamp inches forward

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate moved slowly forward Thursday with plans to overhaul the immigration system, defeating an emotion-charged proposal to give extra credit in the competition for visas to those who speak English.

"By all means make classes available so they can learn English; but do not exclude people because they do not speak English," Sen. Paul Simon, D-Ill., said before the Senate rejected the plan, 56-43.

The bill would place an annual cap of 600,000 on immigration in each of the next three years, the first such limit in decades. That represents 106,000 more visas than were issued in 1988, but critics say the measure ultimately would exclude all but the closest relatives of American citizens and permanent residents of the United States.

The Senate approved a similar bill in 1988 but it died in the House. Sponsors are expressing optimism about their chances there.

Protein decoys may thwart AIDS virus

BOSTON (AP) — Fake proteins can jam the delicate machinery used by the AIDS virus to reproduce inside the body and could provide a new treatment — and — perhaps even the basis of a cure for AIDS, scientists report.

Despite the tantalizing results, researchers caution that the new approach, undertaken in the test tube only, could be years or even decades away from practical use.

In the work, described in two papers in today's issue of the journal Cell, scientists tinkered with two AIDS virus genes, known in genetics shorthand as tat and rev. Both produce proteins that are essential for the virus to churn out copies of itself inside the body.

The scientists found that by slightly scrambling the genes, they can make them produce proteins that don't work. But because the proteins look like the real thing, the AIDS virus is fooled into using them instead of its own natural proteins.

King Fahd calls for Islamic unity

MANAMA, Bahrain (AP) — King Fahd of Saudi Arabia called for Islamic unity Thursday as 1.8 million Muslims ended the annual pilgrimage to their holiest shrines guarded by anti-terrorism squads deployed after two bombings.

Fahd made no mention of the explosions Monday that killed a Pakistani pilgrim and wounded 16 other people near the Grand Mosque in Mecca, the birthplace of the prophet Mohammed. As twilight descended around Mecca, the army of pilgrims prayed before they slit the throats of more than 1 million sheep, cows and camels for Eid al-Adha, or the Feast of Sacrifice.

Grieving Iranians end mourning

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP) — Millions chanting "Death to America!" and beating themselves in grief surrounded the gold-domed tomb of Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini on Thursday to end 40 days of mourning for the founder of the Islamic republic.

His successor as Iran's religious leader, President Ali Khamenei, appeared in public for the first time since Khomeini's June 6 funeral and delivered a tirade against the "terrorists" of the United States and its allies.

The speeches by Khamenei and other Iranian leaders turned the religious ceremony into a rally against the United States, Israel and Saudi Arabia.

Parliament Speaker Hashemi Rafsanjani, seen as Khamenei's successor, was cheered when he appeared on a podium some distance from the grave, accompanied by bodyguards carrying automatic rifles.

Soviets may ease emigration rules

MOSCOW (AP) — A proposed liberalization of emigration laws has nearly quadrupled the number of Soviets seeking to settle in the United States, a U.S. official said Thursday.

About 33,000 Soviets moved to the United States in 1988. This year, Soviets are registering their intent to emigrate at an annual rate of 120,000, and that could reach a quarter-million by 1990, said Max Robinson, consul-general at the U.S. Embassy.

"The United States has a policy of giving all Soviets who seek to emigrate to the United States the chance to do so," Robinson said. "That dates back to a very recent time when we were engaged in a major human rights struggle with Soviet officials to free up emigration. They are doing so at rates that we did not expect but are delighted to see."

U.S. will not relax Middle East policy

PARIS (AP) — President Bush said Thursday the United States will not relax its policy on the Middle East to accommodate political turmoil in Israel, a nation he said is beset by "great difficulties."

Bush, talking with reporters on Air Force One as he flew here from Hungary, said Israel should go forward with elections among Palestinians in the occupied territories as a step toward peace.

And he said the United States will not change its policy of opposing Israeli settlements in the occupied territories. The U.S. view is that such settlements are obstacles to peace.

Bush's comments reflected the strain in U.S.-Israeli relations caused by the July 6 decision by Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir's right-wing Likud bloc to harden its stand on conditions for Middle East peace negotiations.

Travel agents ask China to fix image

BEIJING (AP) — Foreign travel agents Thursday urged China to end martial law in Beijing, lower prices and mount a public relations campaign abroad if it wants to lure back tourists scared by the crackdown on pro-democracy protests.

One after another, travel agents told Chinese tour officials their ideas for salvaging what both sides had expected to be a lucrative summer season.

"We need very practical solutions and we need them very quickly," said Peter Spreddborough of Silk Route Travel in Melbourne, Australia. "We may have lost the entire 1989-90 program. We've invested heavily in promoting China. The return will be zero for most of us."

His suggestion, echoed by many other agents, was for China to invest in overseas tour promotions, something China does not normally do.

British cosmonaut to be a billboard

LONDON (AP) — Britain's first cosmonaut, due to join a Soviet mission in 1991, may soar into space in a suit covered with commercial plugs in the style of a racing driver, an advertising agent said Thursday.

More than 11,000 people reportedly have applied for the honor ahead of Friday's deadline.

The advertising agency Saatchi and Saatchi has been involved in lining-up commercial sponsorship for the trip. Some sponsors may support scientific projects, others may simply want to be identified with the flight.

Flooding in China kills 367 people

BEIJING (AP) — Severe flooding caused by days of torrential rainfall in Sichuan province has killed 367 people, the People's Daily reported Thursday.

The heaviest casualties were in cities along Jiling River in eastern Sichuan, the newspaper reported. Officials say recent rains and flooding have been the most severe disaster to hit the province — China's most populous — in eight years.

Heavy flooding also has been reported in coastal Zhejiang and Fujian provinces, in the southeastern Guangxi Zhuang Autonomous Region and northeastern Qinghai province.

West makes new arms proposal to USSR

VIENNA, Austria (AP) — The West made a new proposal Thursday on reducing conventional arms in Europe, acting two months ahead of schedule in an attempt to hasten agreement.

A Soviet delegate said it contained nothing new. In Moscow, the Kremlin welcomed the effort to speed negotiations and said a deal might be possible within six months.

"We have no intention of delaying this important matter of reducing the level of military confrontation," said Foreign Ministry spokesman Gennady I. Gerasimov. He added, however, that it might be difficult to meet a Bush administration proposal to make the actual cuts by 1992.

He said the NATO ideas, in general, "are viewed by us as serious and constructive proposals, meeting our own proposals halfway."

Negotiators for the North Atlantic Treaty Organization offered the proposal on the last day of second-round talks on reducing conventional forces, giving the Warsaw Pact an eight-week recess to study it.

Oleg A. Grinevsky, head of the Soviet delegation, said agreement by 1990 "seems quite possible ... if all sides are agreeable."

He welcomed the NATO plan, but said he was "sorry" it did not go further.

The Western suggestion is based on a blueprint for deep reductions in conventional forces in Europe presented by President Bush at the NATO summit in May and endorsed by the alliance. Including combat aircraft and helicopters met a

longstanding demand of the Warsaw Pact. Edes said the West initially proposed including aircraft because their mobility posed verification problems in a zone stretching from the Atlantic to the Ural mountains.

Because of NATO's concession on the point, he said, its "political will to achieve agreement can't be doubted."

Bush's proposal in Brussels would put a ceiling on U.S. and Soviet troops in the reduction zone of 275,000 each. NATO said that would mean removal of 30,000 American soldiers and a cut by the Soviet Union of 325,000.

It also called for deep cuts in armaments, with equal limits on tanks, personnel carriers and artillery.

Chinese worker imprisoned for talking to Americans

BEIJING (AP) — China sentenced an office worker to 10 years in prison Thursday for telling an American television crew that the military massacred thousands of people in its attack on demonstrators in Tiananmen Square.

An intermediate court in the northeast port city of Dalian found Xiao Bin, 42, guilty of "spreading counterrevolutionary rumors." It deprived him of all political rights for three years.

The national evening television news showed Xiao, a junior section chief in a rubber factory, being led by police into the court to receive the verdict.

Xiao, in an interview with an ABC television crew, said 20,000 people were killed in the military assault to re-capture Tiananmen Square from students — demonstrating — for democratic reforms. In an emotional statement, he told ABC that military

tanks had run over people and troops had shot to death people wounded by beatings or gunfire.

China Central Television apparently intercepted the unedited video as ABC sent it by satellite to its New York headquarters.

The state-run television subsequently broadcast the interview and urged viewers to help find the man. Two women reported him within hours and he was arrested June 11. The women were commended and given cash rewards.

ABC said it was "deeply distressed" over the use of its tape and began covering the faces of students it interviewed.

China denies anyone was killed on Tiananmen Square. It says about 200 civilians were killed as troops battled rioters who threw stones and firebombs to stop them from reaching the square.

Chinese sources and Western diplomats have said up to 3,000 may have died when troops opened fire on unarmed protesters.

Earlier Thursday, the Foreign Ministry denied China has become a diplomatic outcast because of the bloody events at Tiananmen. A Foreign Ministry spokesman said most nations support China's tough measures to eliminate political dissent.

Spokeswoman Li Jinhua, asked at a weekly briefing how China reacts to the outpouring of international criticism, said: "Your assessment is different from mine."

"The fact is that there are only a

few countries who are interfering in China's internal affairs. The majority of countries have expressed their understanding, sympathy and even support for us."

She repeated China's protests to France for "harboring wanted dissidents Wu'er Kaixi and Yan Jiaqi and said France was guilty of "flagrant violation of international law and the norms governing international relations."

Most strong criticism has come from the West, although some communist countries such as Hungary and Yugoslavia also have deplored the loss of life in the Tiananmen attack.

"It just takes time when you have a main waterline break," Winn said. He cited the problems of working around other buried sewer, phone and gas lines. "It's a lot of handwork, so it's bound to go slow."

Big spenders still throng to Sun Valley, survey shows

SUN VALLEY — The average-size group visiting the Sun Valley during the recent winter season spent nearly \$5,000 during its average length of stay, according to a survey conducted for the Sun Valley-Ketchum Chamber of Commerce.

The average party was 2.7 people and the visitors stayed an average of 4.5 days in their visit to the ski resort, the survey shows. The top four categories of expenditures per group are: transportation, \$734; lodging, \$705; food, restaurant, \$321; and skiing tickets, lessons, \$320.

Other findings are that most residents were middle-aged, married, make more than \$100,000 a year and live on the West Coast; some visitors said access to the area was not as convenient as they'd like; and that friendly people and non-tourist atmosphere were advantages of the Sun Valley area over other ski areas.

The survey was conducted by Douglas Lincoln of Boise.

Murtaugh receives state grant for wastewater studies

MURTAUGH — The city was granted \$4,425 to help study proposed improvements in its wastewater facilities, the state announced this week.

Murtaugh will contribute \$1,475 to the project. The town's sewage lagoon occasionally overflows its banks and is being studied by the Snake River. The study will help determine the extent of repairs needed, estimated to cost anywhere from \$20,000 to \$200,000.

Gov. Cecil Andrus also announced a grant of \$165,000 to Malad and a loan of \$100,000 to Pierce, in northern Idaho. The grants are through the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare.

Visions West Bookstore pornography trial postponed

TWIN FALLS — The trial stemming from the city's lawsuit against Visions West Bookstore has been postponed until Oct. 24.

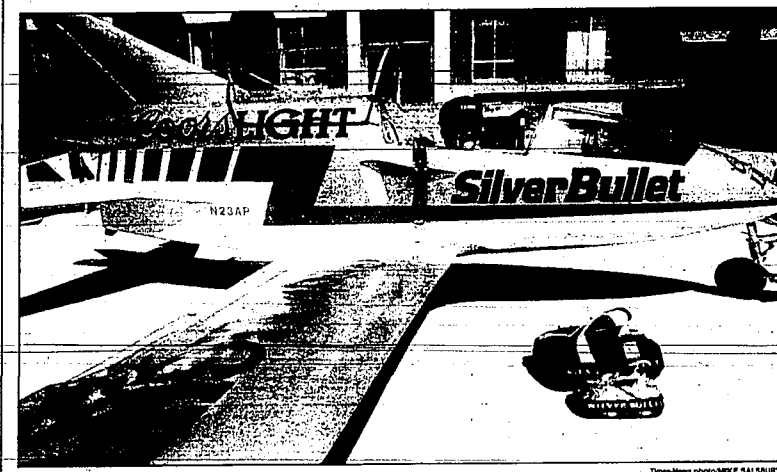

Silver Bullet visits Burley

BURLEY — At 12 feet long and just 4 feet high, the silver jet resembles something from a carnival ride.

While it may look like a toy, however, it doesn't perform like one.

The Coors Light Silver Bullet is capable of speeds of Mach 0.55 — 350 mph — and climbing to 26,500 feet. The jet features 30-degree reclined seating to reduce pilot fatigue during high-stress maneuvering.

Other features are a wrist-operated side stick flight controller and computer controlled automatic sequence start.

Flying the Silver Bullet is "kind of like flying a motorcycle," just a lot faster, pilot Tom Jones said.

Jones and the jet will be part of the Snake River Air Show this Saturday in

Burley. The jet is one of only five such aircraft in the world, three of which Coors owns.

"This airplane is the world's smallest man-carrying jet," Jones said. It weighs 432 pounds empty, lighter than many motorcycles. The jet's wingspan is 17 feet but the body, with wings detached, through a 4-foot-6-inch doorway.

"It flies different than any airplane I've flown," said Jones, who has piloted more than 75 aircraft. "This one is so tiny and you fly with a little tiny handle. It looks like a video game handle. To fly a jet aircraft that small is really strange."

The jet requires 1,800 feet of runway for take-off and can land in 1,000 feet. It is built of light gauge aluminum, similar to that used for Coors beer cans.

Jones has been flying for 18 years, the last three with the Silver Bullet program. He has been an aerobatic competitor

since 1980 and holds the National Aerobatics Champion title. He is ranked fifth in the world in the freestyle program and is a member of the U.S. aerobatics team, which won the World Championships last year in Calgary, Canada.

In all his airshows, Jones has had only one accident. "Several years ago I was flying in an airshow and I had an engine explode," he said. "The propeller came off and I came down with the plane through the roof of a hangar."

The Snake River Air Show begins at noon Saturday at the Burley Airport. Tickets are \$4 in advance, on sale at Burley Aviation, or \$5 at the gate.

Jones will talk over a public address system during his show. "I tell them what it looks like and feels like," Jones said.

Canal company wants spill rights defined

TWIN FALLS — Following a jury trial that found its members liable for a 1984 flood, the Salmon River Canal Co. is asking the court to help clarify its spill-rights on the Salmon Tract flood plain.

Lloyd Webb, attorney for the Salmon River Canal Co., said the suit he filed Wednesday is intended to provide at least some insurance that Salmon Tract farmers won't again end up on the losing side of a court battle.

"Salmon River wants the right to exercise what we think is our spill right," Webb said.

The suit, filed in 5th District Court, names as defendants more than 50 landowners and others with interests in the area flooded in 1984.

The company wants the court to declare it has the right to spill up to 3,360 cubic feet per second of water from the Salmon Dam.

In April a Twin Falls County jury found the Salmon River cooperative liable for up to 80 percent of the damages caused by a 1984 flood west of Twin Falls, which occurred after the canal company released water from its nearby full dam.

That water backed up behind a highway crossing more than 20 miles from the dam. The Buhl and Twin Falls highway districts started cutting into the crossing to release pent-up water, and when the flood waters rose to the level of the cut, the flood tore out the entire crossing, inundating irrigation pumps and land downstream with at least 7,500 cubic feet of water per second.

The jury pinned 40 percent of the blame on the highway districts, but a judge ruled later the districts didn't have to pay any of the damages.

An appeal is in the works, Webb said.

"We're not claiming anybody has the right to spill 7,500 cfs down the channel," he said. However, Webb added, at the time of the flood the canal company felt it was in a no-win situation.

"We were damned any way we did," he said.

A clarification of the canal company's spill rights might not solve all the problems if another flood loomed — but it's a start, Webb said.

John Hewarth, the attorney who represented the downstream landowners in the flood lawsuit, went out of town Thursday and could not be reached for comment on the new case.

Hailey airport expansion waiting for FAA approval

HAILEY — A half-million dollar expansion proposal, which would nearly double the size of the terminal at the Friedman Memorial Airport, is going to the Federal Aviation Administration for funding approval.

The decision came the day before a 13-member citizen advisory committee was scheduled to meet with the contractor who is studying the feasibility of relocating the airport.

Hailey resident Jon Marvel said he felt the Blaine County Airport Commission acted too hastily in sending the funding proposal onto the FAA, saying the results of the airport site study and updating of the master plan could make "an enormous impact" on the commission's decision.

Commissioner Senn McCoy, who made the motion, said the commission's decision

does not commit the airport to spend any funds, but is only the first step in the lengthy grant process.

The commission voted 5-2 Tuesday to submit a preliminary application for an FAA Airport Improvement Project grant for 1990 for the project. The grant would pay 75 percent of the bill with the airport contributing the remaining 25 percent.

The terminal expansion comes on the heels of a recent FAA directive to implement security checks on all departing passengers. Security has been in force at Friedman since May 1 this year.

Due to the heavy airline schedules and charter flights using the airport during the winter ski season, airport Manager Paschal Drake predicted the traffic within the terminal will be "chaos" due to the congestion in the terminal's limited space.

Commissioner Mary Ann Mix voted against the proposal, saying she would

INEL cleanup projects await nod from EPA

TWIN FALLS — A plan to clean up uranium-contaminated soil at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory is only the first of many similar projects over the next few years.

But before cleanup begins, the plans must be approved by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and the state of Idaho.

"The state's been very much involved in what we've been doing for the past several years," said Terry Smith of the INEL public affairs office.

The cleanup plan announced this week, part of a Compliance Order and Consent Agreement between INEL and EPA, is the first of 30 such plans, said Steve Hill of the state's Hazardous Materials Bureau. Completing these cleanup plans will take at least four to five years, "but that may be optimistic," he said.

The state regulates hazardous material sites including disposal sites at INEL, Hill said.

"The current cleanup plan involves a former plant disposal site near the Idaho

Chemical Processing Plant.

As part of an agreement with the EPA, INEL must complete a "teleguide plan" that outlines plans for investigating and cleaning up the waste site. Closure plans must be subject to public review.

Soil samples from an unrelated study in August 1985 showed the soil contained mercury in levels from 48 to 236 parts per billion. The EPA's limit for mercury in soil is 200 parts per billion.

The area was not tested for other hazardous materials, but the cleanup plan includes a complete analysis of hazardous chemicals in the area.

Investigators found no evidence the material had moved away from the area where it was dumped from 1982 to 1984, Smith said.

The cleanup plan states the likelihood of the contaminant moving into the Big Lost River or evaporating into the atmosphere is very small. It is also unlikely that the material will move down into the Snake River Plain Aquifer, 450 feet below.

Little precipitation falls in the area and the distance to the aquifer is thought to prevent contamination, the plan states.

Rainbows clear out, clean up

JARBIDGE — The exodus and the Rainbow era is almost over.

As the estimated 5,500 to 8,000 Rainbow Family members dribble out of their Nevada gathering place and through the Magic Valley, law enforcement agencies are breathing a collective sigh of relief.

The migration has been mostly peaceful, not marked by the accumulation of minor problems evident during the gathering.

"They passed out the ma'ic hat," and the freelancers got their fill," said Sheriff Tim Nettleton of Owyhee County. The "magic hat" is the Rainbow Family's informal means of redistributing money from those who have it to those who need it.

A few have lingered at Murphy Hot Springs, a resort area near the Rainbow campsite at Robinson Hole, Nettleton said.

But the U.S. Forest Service is pleased with the Rainbow Family's promised campsite cleanup.

"They're as good as their word," said John Caywood, resource assistant for the Forest Service.

About 150 people out of a cleanup crew of 300 remained at the family's campsite Wednesday, Caywood said. He expected the cleanup to be completed by the end of this week.

Twin Falls County Sheriff Jim Munn reported few problems after the gathering ended. Two Rainbows were arrested for disorderly conduct, he said, and a few more have a blemish through the county court system on misdemeanor charges.

Residents periodically called the sheriff's office and police with reports of people believed to be Rainbows loitering and panhandling. At least some of those reports were unwarranted.

Once, somebody called to report Rainbow people washing clothes in a laundry. Another time, a woman called to report a bus full of Rainbows parked near Sears on Main Avenue; they were waiting for an appointment to get the bus fixed.

Another resident called the sheriff's department to report Rainbows trespassing on his land. Deputies found Rainbows changing a tire.

Police Commander Pat Bermingham said his patrolman had few problems with the

STANLEY — There appears to be trouble in paradise as 30 property owners here have protested their property tax assessments.

Land prices in the Sawtooth National Recreation Area have climbed as the government buys local property to protect the scenery.

Custer County officials told the Idaho Tax Commission they are frustrated with the situation. Tax Commission member Bob Fry said if assessments make it uneconomical to stay in business, land prices eventually will reflect that.

Protests must be denied at the county level before an appeal can be filed with the state Board of Tax Appeals.

Armed Services Committee gives go ahead to SIS funding

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate Armed Services Committee voted Thursday to reverse earlier subcommittee action and provide \$132 million to keep the U.S. Department of Energy's Special Isotope Separation project on schedule.

The vote came during a closed session on fiscal 1990 funding for the plutonium refinery planned for the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

Of the total appropriation, the committee approved \$40 million for construction of the SIS — \$10 million more than recommended by an Armed Services subcommittee — and removed restrictions imposed in the House on use of the construction money.

The Senate subcommittee had recommended funneling the extra

\$10 million toward research on the SIS, which would use laser technology to refine fuel-grade plutonium for use in nuclear weapons.

"Every study to date that has analyzed this country's plutonium needs concludes we need the plutonium the SIS will produce," Sen. James McClure, R-Idaho, said after the full Armed Services Committee vote, which he called "good news."

The funding question now moves to the Senate floor.

Earlier, Department of Energy officials said more cuts in construction funding would mean significant staff cuts, delay the project and add millions of dollars to the \$1.2 billion price tag.

Energy Secretary James Watkins and other SIS supporters have called for a \$5 million construction budget.

Even that would be \$60 million under the Energy Department's original fiscal 1990 request, but would allow some site preparation work at the INEL.

According to a Department of Energy memo, a \$40 million construction budget would allow initial site development and completion of a preliminary analysis of the project's safety.

However, the memo said further cuts would trigger across-the-board staff cuts, delay plant construction by 30 months, increase project costs by hundreds of millions of dollars and curtail or halt plant design work.

The \$40 million also is essential to meet the Energy Department's proposed September 1996 startup date, the memo said.

rather see the money spent on a control tower for the airport.

"That's going to be just one more reason not to move the airport," Mix said.

Commissioner Rick Davis disagreed and said he was hesitant to compromise the security of the outgoing passengers without providing more adequate facilities.

Preliminary architectural drawings for the proposed expansion show a 2,000-square-foot section added onto the north end of the terminal adjacent to the rental car carrels. This waiting area would be

used for incoming passengers only. The present baggage claims area would be moved further north as well, but improved by enclosing some 2,600 square feet to get people out of the weather.

With this configuration, all departing passengers would continue to use the southern waiting room where screening equipment and security personnel are stationed.

Part of the problem with congestion at the terminal is the bulkiness of passenger's winter luggage — skis, boots and large suitcases.

If the project obtains funding and

is approved by the commission, additional modifications may be made to the preliminary drawings. Some commissioners wanted to see the width of the terminal increased as well, substantially adding to the cost of the project. Such a move would ease the flow of traffic around passengers waiting to check their baggage and tickets.

Commissioner Tom Blanchard suggested urging Horizon Airlines to initiate curbside checking for skis and other bulk items outside the terminal at its south end in an effort to help alleviate the current overcrowding.

Custer County takes hard line; rejects tax break requests

CHALLIS — Custer County officials say if the county starts waiving property taxes for companies or ranches going through hard times, pretty soon it won't have a tax base. Commissioners, sitting as the county's Board of Tax Equalization, voted this week to reject a request from Clayton Silver Mines for lower property taxes.

The company, which hasn't paid taxes for 1986, 1987 and 1988, owes the county \$27,291 plus penalties and interest. Citing "extraordinary financial hardship," it requested relief for 1986 and 1987.

The silver mine, which celebrated 50 years of operation in 1985, has been shut down for three years. The shafts have filled with water.

In a letter to Assessor Bob Savage, Clayton's chairman, H.F. Magnuson,

Wallace, asked that the mine and mill equipment and related buildings be reduced to 10 percent of their operating value.

Magnuson urged in a June 19 letter to state Tax Commission Appraiser Kathryn Roberts a reduction in the mine's 1989 assessment from \$497,166 to \$169,000.

Savage said the mine's value has been adjusted the past three years because it is not operating. The 1989 assessment was lowered nearly \$200,000 from the 1988 assessment of \$691,454. Magnuson sought to reduce the assessment further.

The commissioners said hardship exemptions traditionally are extended to individuals and granting Clayton Silver's request would set a dangerous precedent.

County Treasurer Judy Leuzinger said if all businesses in the county were allowed to claim hardship,

especially ranches, "We wouldn't have any tax base left."

Referring to the financial statements submitted by Clayton Silver, Commissioner Ivan Taylor said Magnuson was drawing a "pretty damn good director's salary for an insolvent corporation."

The board also denied Premiere Cable Services' assessment protest for its cable television systems in Challis and Mackay. The Roseville, Calif., corporation has joined with other cable TV firms around the state in protesting using the systems' income-generating potential to determine value.

The value arrived at by state Tax Commission representative Henry Nagle for the Challis system was roughly \$20,000 less than Premiere paid for the system two years ago.

Most of the precipitation, however, is concentrated during a wet season.

Three contaminated sites at INEL are considered serious — at the Test Reactor Area, chromium has been found in the groundwater; at the Radioactive Waste Management Complex organic solvents have been found in the aquifer; and at the Test Area North drinking waste has been contaminated with a solvent.

Though a drinking water

purification system has been installed at the Test Area North, these sites are considered serious because the pollutants have moved from the area where they were originally dumped.

These sites have prompted the EPA to nominate INEL for inclusion on the Superfund's National Priority List, which identifies the nation's worst hazardous waste sites.

Contaminants at other sites are not believed to have moved through

the soil, Smith said. Cleanup will involve determining the extent of contamination, excavating and disposing of contaminated soil and testing the area to make sure it is clean.

If the cleanup can't prove all the contaminants have been removed, INEL must implement a 30-year groundwater monitoring plan to insure the chemicals don't migrate into groundwater or the Snake River Plain Aquifer.

Coast guard says no oil leaking from damaged Exxon Valdez

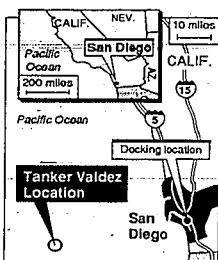
SAN DIEGO (AP) — Preliminary tests showed no oil in a slick from the Exxon Valdez, the Coast Guard said Thursday, but the damaged tanker will remain outside San Diego Bay while more tests are conducted.

The tests conducted by a Coast Guard laboratory conflict with the preliminary conclusion of the state Fish and Game Department's lab.

State officials said traces of petroleum were discovered in samples taken from the 18-mile-long slick that developed when the Valdez arrived off San Diego from Alaska on Monday.

The Coast Guard test also used a sample from that slick to determine the results indicate no presence of oil, Coast Guard Cmdr. Jack Scarborough said. They indicate the presence of some unidentified organic matter.

A team of federal and state scientists, coordinated by a specialist from the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, has been assembled to analyze fresh samples from subsequent Valdez discharges.

"There are questions that have been raised relative to the sampling procedures used by both laboratories," said Pete Bontadelli, director of the state Fish and Game Department. "That is the reason we are establishing a single, coordinated team so we can resolve the question once and for all."

The Valdez was towed 2,600 miles to San Diego from Alaska, where it was responsible for the nation's worst oil spill. The vessel was damaged March 24 when it struck a reef in Alaska's Prince William Sound, spewing nearly 11 million gallons of oil.

Coast Guard officials have barred the Valdez from entering San Diego Bay for repairs until they are sure it poses no environmental or navigational threat. The ship remained about 50 miles off San Diego on Thursday.

"We're quite comfortable with where it is and until everyone understands what the analysis tells us. We are in no hurry to move," said Frank Iarossi, Exxon Shipping Co. president.

Before the Valdez can enter the harbor, five steel slabs that peeled away from its hull during the trip from Alaska must be removed so it can navigate the shallow harbor channel. For the safety of the divers, the salvage work must be performed in a sheltered cove or inlet, but officials don't want to move the ship until they determine what's being discharged.

Judge denies bail for suspect in F-16 jet engine theft

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A federal magistrate on Thursday denied bail for a suspect in the theft of three F-16 jet fighter engines and ordered his co-defendant held in a halfway house pending trial.

The two Hill Air Force Base security policemen were indicted Thursday for the July 3 theft of the engines in the culmination of an FBI sting operation targeting military pilferage at Hill, other Utah installations and elsewhere.

Airman-1st-Glass-Brian-David-Roth, 22, of Chesterland, Ohio, was charged with 22 counts, one involving the engines and 21 related to alleged thefts of a variety of military equipment since 1987.

Senior Airman Danny Joe Stroud, 23, and his wife, Kimberly, 22, each were named in one count involving the engines, valued at \$2 million each. The FBI said Stroud was born in Wichita, Kan., and had family in nearby Newton.

people. The FBI said the operation was aimed at servicemen, civilians and wholesalers in stolen military goods.

Roth and the Strouds were charged with selling or disposing of government property valued at more than \$8.1 million, including the three engines, a flight-line tow tractor and three engine trailers. Mrs. Stroud's alleged involvement was not explained.

Roth and Stroud were charged with aiding and abetting each other in stealing and selling \$64,000 worth of Zenith computers.

Roth was named in Counts 3 through 22, which charged theft of such items as a combat helmet, chemical protective clothing, military supplies, aviation instruments, radios and bullet-proof vests.

The airmen were arrested Monday at a restaurant in Bountiful, a community between Salt Lake and the northern Utah base. Roberts said the arrests were made after Roth had telephoned agents and said he wanted to meet to discuss more money for the jet engines, which he earlier had agreed to provide for \$300,000.

U.S. Magistrate Ronald Boyce refused to grant bail for Roth based on the testimony of an FBI agent at a Wednesday detention hearing, but said he likely reconsider the matter later.

"Roth is ordered detained because the indictment gives probable cause and because of statements made to FBI agents and because he was in possession of a .44-caliber handgun at the time of his arrest," Boyce wrote in the order.

Special Agent Donald Roberts said that in taped conversations with undercover agents before his arrest, Roth said he would "run and not be found" if caught.

Boyce ordered Stroud held under 24-hour supervision at a halfway house pending the trio's Sept. 18 trial. Mrs. Stroud was released Wednesday.

Federal prosecutors said 12 other indictments also had been handed up against a yet unidentified

Investigators have identified up to 100 suspects as a result of Operation "Punchout," the two-year joint operation between the FBI, the Department of Defense and the Air Force, said Robert Bryant, agent in charge of the FBI's Utah office.

FBI spokesman Len Barry said about 45 military enlisted personnel and three civilians were under investigation there.

To front the operation, the FBI established a business called "Military Surplus Brokers" near the base, which bought \$600,000 worth of goods from all branches of the military for \$80,000, he said.

Police have suspect in Green River murders investigation

SEATTLE (AP) — A former Spokane law student has emerged as a "viable suspect" in the Green River Task Force investigation of the nation's worst serial murder case, court documents show.

A truckload of boxes containing crime reports, maps, credit card receipts, 1,800 videotapes, 15 police badges and two Seattle police uniform shirts was removed during a search of two Spokane residences Wednesday, according to an affidavit filed to support a search warrant.

The items belonged to William Jay Stevens III, 38, currently serving a one-year term in the King County Jail for the burglary of a police equipment supply store in Seattle in 1989.

Police say Stevens walked away from a work-release program in 1981 and was not located until late December, when he was in his final year at the Gonzaga University law school. He was arrested and returned to jail Jan. 9.

The tip to Stevens whereabouts came in a call from Portland, Ore., after a "Manhunt" television program about the Green River killings, police said.

Stevens has not been charged in the Green River investigation.

The multi-agency task force was formed in 1982 after the bodies of the first five victims were found near

the south King County river. A Green police has described it as the nation's worst unsolved serial murder case, involving the killing of 41 women and the disappearance of at least eight others, mostly young and almost all linked to prostitution.

Most of the bodies were found in the Seattle area. Four were found in Portland, Ore.

The warrant for the search of Stevens' parents' house and a house he rented near Gonzaga said there was "probably cause to believe that the crime of murder—has been committed."

Green River investigators have long theorized that the victims might have been lured into the killer's car by someone posing as a police officer or otherwise in a position of trust.

"One of the things that was speculated... the killer could be a cop or someone posing as a cop," said King County Police Capt. Bob Evans, commander of the task force.

Evans said police had a tremendous amount of information to review might need require two months to conclude the investigation of Stevens.

Part of the investigation includes a time-line which traces his travels from Seattle to Portland to Vancouver, British Columbia, and to Spokane.

The 405 entries on the 1981-88 time-line "tended to place Stevens in the

area during the time space of a Green River victim's disappearance," the affidavit said.

"None of the documented contacts, telephone records or credit card charges served to eliminate Stevens as a suspect in any of the Green River cases," the affidavit said.

"Instead, interviews and records have produced the following facts that tend to establish that Stevens is a viable suspect in the Green River homicides," the document said.

"Prior to Stevens' arrest, Spokane police determined that he owned a former Everett, Wash., police car which had been equipped and made to appear like a real police car.

"The police car had been falsely registered by Stevens, who had represented himself as the police chief of Spangle, a town 15 miles south of Spokane.

Rock Springs a disaster after flood

ROCK SPRINGS, Wyo. (AP) — Sweetwater County and Rock Springs officials on Thursday declared the community a disaster area in the wake of a flood that filled basements, moved cars and left 6 inches of mud on some streets.

The thunderstorm that sent a "wall of water" through Rock Springs also was being blamed for a train accident that killed a Union Pacific conductor.

Jack Zimmerman, Sweetwater County emergency management coordinator, said Thursday that he had no reports or injuries inside the city.

But a damage assessment team determined Thursday that the flood damaged about 200 buildings, including 136 homes, and some 165 vehicles.

Union Pacific spokesman Mark Davis said conductor Scott Leatham, 34, of Rock Springs, was killed when the locomotive he was operating collided with an empty rail car that had been pushed into a locomotive's path by strong winds accompanying the thunderstorm.

Also injured in the 7:15 p.m. Wednesday accident was brakeman Robert Hammonds, 27, of Cheyenne, said Davis. Hammonds had a broken

left arm and dislocated left elbow set in surgery at Memorial Hospital of Sweetwater County in Rock Springs. He was listed in stable condition Thursday in the hospital's intensive care unit.

Davis said a "microburst" of wind apparently lifted the 25-ton car off its wheels and caused it to leave the track. He said the National Weather Service describes microbursts as a concentrated blast of air, possibly as strong as a mini-tornado.

A damage assessment team was in Rock Springs to determine the impact of the flood on public and private property.

Moscow pool repairs may not be worth the money

MOSCOW (AP) — The city of Moscow will try to fix a leaking swimming pool for under \$30,000. But if repairs cost more than that, the Chorny Park facility probably will be shut down and a levy election scheduled for a new pool.

"At what point do you stop pouring money down a rathole?" Parks and Recreation Director Randy Rice asked council members Wednesday.

The pool leaks about 16,000 gallons of water daily, probably from a broken pipe underneath. The water ends up in nearby Paradise Creek. The gutters and other parts of the pool also require repair.

The latest repairs could range more than \$80,000, Rice said.

The council's draft 1990 budget does not include pool repair money. But at a budget hearing Wednesday, Councilman Gene Traverser suggested earmarking up to \$30,000 in a reserve fund for the renovation.

If the repair costs greatly exceed \$30,000, Traverser and Councilwoman Mardi Baron agreed the pool should be closed.

A levy election could then be held to determine whether city residents want to pay for a new pool. Traverser said Ms. Baron suggested joining with the Moscow School District to build a year-round swim center.

Smith takes Amateur in cliffhanger Derby Days get going in Jerome

BOISE — Just seconds after the improbable became highly possible, the impossible returned at the Idaho Women's Amateur Golf Championships.

After seeing a six-stroke lead melt to one, tournament leader Jean Smith of Boise was trying to nurse that final stroke down the par-five, 18th fairway of the Plantation Country Club against just-graduated Ginger Lowe of Boise.

Lowe, who flirted with but avoided a water hazard on her second shot on 18th, drilled a 150-yard approach shot to within four or five feet of the cup. Smith, who has just seen the Capital High product drain birdie putts of equal or greater length on a couple of previous holes, was 120 yards short-of-the-green with a more difficult entry angle.

"I wasn't thinking about that (Lowe's putt)," Smith said. "Her biggest shot of the tournament. I was just trying to get the right line. There was a huge water sprinkler between me and the pin and I knew if I could stay on that line, the ball should wind up close."

The approach shot hit a few feet in front of the cup and checked up almost immediately on the second bounce — perhaps 24 inches away for virtually a tap in birdie — and an eventual two-stroke victory when Lowe couldn't get her once important and now-relevant putt to drop.

So ended one of the major comebacks of recent years in the state tournament. There were few that gave Lowe or Kristen Fenwick any real chance of erasing the six and seven stroke advantages Smith had going into the final day.

But Smith, after seeing definitely-makable birdie putts stay out on the first two holes, did an uncharacteristic thing — going four over par.

That led both Lowe and Fenwick climb

back into the game and Lowe then almost kicked the door down when she made three birdies in the first six holes on the back side to pull to within two and then one.

Smith said "my putter just never went well all day. I had my chances but it just never happened."

She made a good uphill putt for a stroke-saving bogey on No. 9 and then knocked in another eight-footer for a birdie on 10 that allowed her to offset Lowe's birdie effort.

On No. 9, Smith was wisely upset when she chucked an approach chip into the sand trap between her and the green — a distance of about 10 feet. "I haven't missed a chip like that in a long time. I was trying to do something I shouldn't have been trying," she said.

Although she appeared to have been playing conservatively, she threw a little caution to the wind when she went for the pin on No. 11, which she hit through — it is guarded by a pond on the left. The pin was on the left side of the green.

"I had to," Smith said of that rather audacious move when a shot for the green and a safe two-putt par seemed in order. "The pond was never a concern. I just wanted to make a consistent swing."

It was a good swing and gave her an eight-foot birdie chance but again the putter balked.

But although Lowe succeeded in taking two strokes off the deficit after that, Smith said she began feeling a little better because "I felt I started playing a little better over the last four holes."

Lowe, who has accepted a golf scholarship at University of New Mexico in Las Cruces, couldn't find in herself to feel badly about the outcome, pointing out she had trimmed five strokes off a lead held by a veteran and determined opponent.

"I did have a sinking feeling," she admitted with a smile concerning that chastising approach shot. Smith delivered on No. 18. "I knew she was a

tough competitor and I wasn't surprised that she hung right in there."

Going into the day, Lowe said she felt "I needed a three-under to have any chance of winning it. That would have given her a tie, even with Smith's closing birdie."

And she agreed that her putting was a major contributor to the round.

"I just wanted to concentrate on the second-nine birdie putts. I felt good standing over the putter all day," she said.

Which prompted her father, Wally Lowe, Jr., also a championship flight golfer, to note "I taught her how to putt. So why can't I putt like that?"

King takes early lead in Women's Open

LAKE ORION, Mich. — Betsy King, playing in the afternoon under breezy, cool and overcast conditions, put up a scintillating par and took a one-stroke lead on Marie-Laure de Lorozi de Taya, who played two groups in front of her and

turned a 69 in her Open debut.

Jane Geddes, the 1988 champion, was the only other one in the 158-player field to break par of 35-36-71. Thirteen more matched par, including defending champion Liselotte Neumann.

Nancy Lopez, another looking for her first Open victory, was the sole leader after a birdie at No. 10 got her to 2 under par, but she played the last eight holes 4 over-to-drop back to 73.

The Maryland residents, Tina Barrett of Baltimore and Kim Williams of Bethesda, each shot 78, with Williams' round marred by an 8 on the par-3 13th hole.

The two pacemakers achieved their positions about the only way possible on this links-type course, where the fairways are bounded by few trees and stretches of a tall unforgiving fescue grass that has been allowed to grow wild.

In 14 previous Open, King, 33, averaged 75.4 for her opening rounds. The only sub-par mark was a 71 at Baltusrol in 1985, and she wound up tied for eighth.

Enjoying her finest season on the Ladies Professional Golf Association tour with four victories and the money lead, King is taking aim at one of the few titles to escape her.

As late as Wednesday afternoon, she said she didn't have a handle on how to play this 6,108-yard course, located about 35 miles northwest of Detroit.

"It's hard to tell how an Open course will play ahead of time because it's always different when it actually starts," she said. "And today, I played about as well as I can."

She wrested six birdies from the layout, then gave two back with bogeys at two of the three holes where she failed to reach greens in regulation.

"The key to any good round is to putt well, and I did," King said. "I had two 20-footers and a 25-footer each from behind the hole. That's where you don't want to be, but I just got the ball rolling and it fell in."

Wednesday, she worked for about 90 minutes with her driver, and said she felt better mechanically during the round. "At least I hit it better than in the practice rounds, and I only hit one ball in the junk," she said.

Depredation payments may amount to 42%

REXBURG — Even though their claims are valid, farmers asking the state to pay for damage caused by game animals over the past year may get no more than 42 percent of what they're asking.

The Legislature didn't appropriate enough money to pay all the claims, state Auditor J.D. Williams said Wednesday, after visiting eastern Idaho farmers who submitted depredation claims.

Forty-two percent is the ratio between the \$1.2 million in 1988 claims and the \$500,000 the Legislature appropriated, Williams said.

Farmers who claimed \$600,000 in losses in 1988 probably are out of luck, Williams said. "The Legislature gave priority to 1988

damages and is not expected to appropriate any more.

It was a precedent-setting action, the first time the Legislature has declared the state responsible for wildlife damage and appropriated money to pay for it. A sportsman-lawdowner task force is negotiating over what should happen in the future.

Williams spent Tuesday and Wednesday visiting farmers in Arco, Howe, Turretton, Mud Lake and Rexburg who submitted large claims for damage to crops, fences or equipment.

Most of the damage was caused by elk and antelope that congregated in large numbers on lowland farms because of last summer's drought. As the animals searched for food and water, they

destroyed alfalfa and grain fields, knocked down fences and ruined sprinkler pipe and other equipment.

The most unusual claim, Williams said, came from Rexburg farmer Delroy Ward. A herd of elk got into his grain storage facility near Rexburg during the winter and destroyed thousands of bushels of barley.

Ward is claiming a 16,000-bushel loss in 1988, although he estimated a considerably higher loss in 1989 because he cannot find a buyer for the contaminated grain.

Ward said he left the door of the metal storage building open about three feet to allow air to circulate and keep the grain from sweating. Perhaps hundreds of elk went under the door and trampled over the piles of barley for more than 100 feet, bedding down on the grain.

Training camp looms for NFL, free agents

Reggie White and Mike King are threatening to stay out of the Philadelphia Eagles' camp; Phil Simms' agent says Simms may do the same when the New York Giants begin practice. And only 35 of the NFL's 324 draft choices had been signed by Thursday.

It's the fourth straight year since the demise of the USFL that training camp openings loom with so many unsigned players. It leaves agents fuming at general managers playing hardball.

It also comes under the category: "What else is new?"

The process is complicated by the new 80-man training camp roster limit established by the owners last March. Many teams are already at the 80-player level and each new player they sign means they will have to cut someone else. Washington, for example, has 87 players under contract plus 10 unsigned rookies and three unsigned veterans.

"It's unbelievable," agent Leigh Steinberg says. "They just don't seem ready to do any business."

Actually, Steinberg has already done business, which may be one reason for the slow pace.

He represents Troy Aikman, the UCLA quarterback who was the first player taken in the draft by the Dallas Cowboys. Before the draft, Aikman signed an \$11 million, six-year contract, making him the highest paid rookie in history. Steinberg has also negotiated a \$10 million, five-year deal for Houston quarterback Warren Moon.

Only one other first-round draft choice in addition to Aikman has signed — wide receiver Andre Rison of Indianapolis, who agreed to a \$3 million, five-year deal shortly after the draft. Rison was the 22nd player chosen and his signing led to grumbling that he cost Aikman had already inflated the cost of doing business.

Mechanical engineers call for effort to halt global warming

WASHINGTON — A national group of engineers, urged by a White House official to take a stand, called Thursday for actions to combat overheating of the Earth without waiting for absolute proof it is happening.

The steps should include efforts to improve the cleanliness of coal burning, to increase use of nuclear energy and to plant more trees, according to the report released by Ernest L. Daman, president of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers.

While there are still scientific uncertainties about the "greenhouse effect," there is enough evidence to show that the amount of carbon dioxide in the atmosphere is increasing, said A. Alan Moghissi, who headed the society's risk analysis task force.

"A prudent course of action may consist of assuming that adverse effects may take place and that corrective actions may be necessary," said Moghissi of the University of Maryland-Baltimore.

The society released a position paper entitled "Energy and the Environment," including a wide-ranging series of recommendations for improving energy efficiency as a means of helping the environment.

Daman said the decision to issue a position paper on global climate, a controversial issue for several years, had generated debate within the 116,000-member society of mechanical engineers.

However, he said White House Chief of Staff John Sununu, an engineer and a member of the society, helped spur the group to action.

The engineering society's report deals with the theory that increasing carbon dioxide in the atmosphere could cause the climate to warm, melting polar ice caps, disrupting farming and leading to other major changes in society. Carbon dioxide allows shortwave radiation from the sun to pass through to the earth but blocks the long-wave radiation from earth that ordinarily travels out into space.

Many scientists believe that this change will result in an increase in the average temperature of the Earth, although others say too little is known to reach any conclusions yet.

The mechanical engineers conclude in their study that research should be accelerated on the greenhouse effect, including an international agreement on restoration.

Other proposals put forth by the engineers include:

- Incentives for improving the efficiency of coal-burning plants.
- Substantial research to develop safer nuclear reactors, based on currently operating reactors.
- Development of technology to improve the fuel efficiency of automobiles.
- Continued support for the development of renewable energy systems.

Underwater volcanic eruption shakes Izu peninsula of Japan

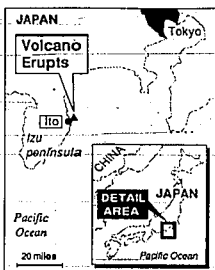
TOKYO — An underwater volcano erupted, Thursday off southern Japan, spewing plumes of smoke and ash into the air and creating tremors that shook the Izu peninsula.

There were no reports of injuries or damage, but callers jammed telephone lines for hours after the eruption a mile off the coast of the city, a seaside resort 62 miles southwest of Tokyo.

Hundreds of Ito's 72,000 residents fled, and city officials were considering evacuating people living near the shore, according to the Japan Broadcasting Corp. The Central Meteorological Agency issued a navigation warning to ships in the area.

The volcano erupted at 6:30 p.m. TOKYO time on the ocean floor at a depth of several thousand feet, the Meteorological Agency said.

"Right now, we don't know if this will lead to another, larger eruption and can only tell people there to watch for further warnings," said an agency official. "Obviously, there



messages asking callers to try later to a "extremely crowded line."

Along with the strong jolt of the eruption, slight tremors, possibly caused by the volcano, were felt throughout the evening, said the official from the Meteorological Agency.

Seismologists were surveying movements of underground magma in the area. Large movements of magma can cause earthquakes, which often precede volcanic eruptions.

More than 20,000 earthquakes have been recorded around Izu over the past two weeks.

An official of the Seismic Division of the Central Meteorological Agency, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said the nature of the quakes had changed since Tuesday night, with the most frequent quakes occurring more recently and lasting up to 20 seconds.

On Wednesday, there were eight such tremors recorded, he said. Between June 30 and noon Thursday, 22,328 tremors were recorded off the Izu peninsula.

Today's West got everything he was looking for against South's game, but South still had 10 tricks. Obviously West had his sights on the wrong goals.

West won his diamond king, cashed two top trumps and led a third trump to West's queen. West led a caged spade, queen to East's ace, and East returned a diamond for West to ruff. West then led to cash his spade king on the ruffing trick, but South ruffed and claimed, dummy's diamonds providing for two club discards.

West was philosophical about accepting his fate. "I gave it every chance," he said. "Had I led the spade king instead of the queen, I probably wouldn't have enjoyed the diamond ruff."

West missed the "best defense" once during the play and again at the end. A defender with four of South's trumps usually finds it best to play a forcing game rather than trying for a ruff. And in today's layout, the forcing defense wins the battle.

Against the lead of the spade king, South ruffs East's spade ace at trick two, cashes two high trumps and puts West on lead with a third trump. West punches South with an other spade, and South gives West's last trump. However, when diamonds break 4-1, South is left with only nine winners, down one against the forcing game.

HOLLYWOOD — NBC is developing a two-hour movie that will chronicle the rise of ice skating star Tai Babilonia and her descent into drugs, alcohol and attempted suicide. Babilonia began a slide into chemical dependency and depression that ended with her recovery last year.

The TV movie, likely to air during the 1990-91 season, will spend the first hour focusing on her start in skating, her pairing with Gardner and the crashing blow at the Olympics, an NBC representative said. Hour two will concentrate on her decline, with an upbeat ending as the skater returns to the ice.

Although there has been no casting, Tai and Randy will not play themselves, said a staffer at Spectator Films, which is producing the movie. But the pair will perform their own skating sequences.

'Fire' draws mixed reaction

HOLLYWOOD — "Great Balls of Fire," which opened recently to dismal ticket sales nationwide (\$5.6 million in five days from 1,417 screens), got a mixed reaction from the folks in Jerry Lee Lewis' country. Samples:

Intensity characterizes JUMP Company musical

TWIN FALLS — One word is painted on Robin McCracken's t-shirt.

Intense.

And as the JUMP Company prepares for its summer musical, "Grease," no word is more apt.

"I've never had a more enthusiastic cast," says McCracken. Ask the youthful players in her charge, and the consensus is clear: The admiration is mutual.

The players will open "Grease" Thursday for a five-night run on the College of Southern Idaho's Fine Arts Auditorium stage. At the company's first dress rehearsal this week, the mood was, well, intense.

"The cue for tonight is 'If I feel stupid, I'm probably doing it right,'" McCracken tells her players. "I want you to let loose."

McCracken shouts her orders in clipped, no-nonsense tones. "I certainly hope you're getting into character and not talking about your date tomorrow night," she says.

The young thespians love it. "The kids feel a freedom in the discipline to work their art," she explains. McCracken may be the drill sergeant of Magic Valley drama, but her troops are more than willing.

And "Grease," the '50s musical, is a play tailor-made for the 56 kids who comprise JUMP Company this year. Chosen from about 150 who auditioned for roles in April, the cast has been rehearsing since May. Working with them behind the scenes are another 20 to 30 teens.

It means giving up a lot, but these kids don't seem to mind.

Tickets

"Grease" will be presented July 20-24 at College of Southern Idaho's Fine Arts Auditorium. Curtain time is 8 p.m.

Tickets, \$5 for adults and \$4 for senior citizens, are available from cast members and at Judy's Bookstore, Vicki's Flower Basket, Ann's Hallmark and Andrew's Hallmark in Twin Falls; Sav'Mor Drugs in Buhl; and Mr. Florist in Jerome.

On Thursday night, one \$20 family ticket will admit all members of a household. Sunday, July 24, will be group night; tickets will be half-off for any group of 10 or more that includes at least one adult.

"I haven't seen my family or friends for two months," says Tona Studebaker, who plays Sandy. "But it's worth it because it's my favorite thing in the whole world. I think about it all day and I dream about it all night."

JUMP Company participants must be between 12 and 18 years old. They can participate in the production the summer after high school graduation, but must leave the troupe after that.

Darren Olson, who plays Roger, was a charter member of JUMP Company when Marty Mend started the group six years ago. "But this is it," he says. "I'm excited about this year."

Model for teacher in 'Dead Poets' is now university professor

STORRS, Conn. — Samuel F. Pickering Jr. is not above telling a lie to make a good story better, and he encourages the students in his writing course to do the same.

"You've got to lie to give the illusion of truth," the English professor tells his students at the University of Connecticut.

Given that philosophy, it's not surprising that Pickering finds himself caught up in the excitement over a bit of fiction written by a former student. The teacher John Keating, played by Robin Williams in the movie "Dead Poets Society," is modeled after Pickering.

Like Keating, Pickering has been known to do the unusual in his classroom. He's lectured from a desk top, from outside a window or while wearing wastepaper baskets on his feet. He also returned to his prep

school as a young teacher after studying in England. But unlike the movie, there was never any conflict between Pickering and school administrators, and he left the school on good terms.

"Whatever of me is in that character has got to be small," the 47-year-old Pickering said during recent interview at his home. "I was a kid and he was a child. Twenty-three years ago. How much of me could there be in the movie? Not very much."

The screenplay was written by Tom Schulman, who was a 15-year-old student at Montgomery Bell Academy in Nashville, Tenn., when he took a course from Pickering. Pickering, who had returned to the United States after a year of study at Cambridge University, taught at the private school for just one year, 1965-66.

Schulman has acknowledged Pickering's influence on his life and the screenplay, and

has said much of his love for language and literature originated in that course.

Pickering hasn't seen the movie — his three children were sick and now he's in Canada for the summer. But many of his friends in Nashville have seen the film, and they immediately recognized Pickering as the inspiration for the movie's teacher. The friends began talking and soon the news media picked up on the subject.

"I don't mind being the center of attention if I can control it, but I can't control this," he said of the numerous inquiries he's received from reporters and acquaintances.

Pickering, who was born and raised in Nashville, is puzzled as to why he had so much influence on a former student and how it was that his friends so readily saw him in the movie. He's also flattered.

"I'm the most ordinary guy in the world," he said as he draped his leg over the arm of

a chair and picked at a hole in the knee of his jeans. "Sometimes people remember me, and I don't know why. I don't know if I did anything special then as a teacher. I was young and lively."

What he does in class is unplanned, he said. He does many unusual things to get his students to think for themselves, but a bad back has forced him to abandon such acrobatics as desktop lectures. His classroom is also on the second floor now, making the leaps from windows unwise.

"Sometimes you get bored in the classroom," he said. "This semester when my class was over, the last class, two girls in my class jumped up and gave an imitation of me right in front of the class. They got A's. You'd think they might get F's, but I've learned since."

Pickering bursts into laughter after telling the story. He laughs often and easily

as he recalls the past. He finds many things humorous in life and often downplays his own accomplishments.

Since leaving Montgomery Bell Academy, he has completed a doctorate and taught in Syria and Jordan and at Dartmouth College. He's been at the University of Connecticut since 1973, where in addition to teaching, he's become well-known as an essayist.

He writes about his three children, his wife, his mother and father and ordinary things in life. His writing, as might be expected, is humorous and self-critical, but also laudatory and philosophical. He has published three books of his essays and is working on a fourth. He plans to write an essay on the celebrity that has come to him in the wake of "Dead Poets Society."

His most recent book, "May Days" (Uni-

A handful of adults help out with the productions. Among them this year are Dennis McCracken, musical director; Ann Miles and Valerie Williams, in charge of costumes; David Ley, stage manager; Rick Rowe, lighting director; and Mike Redman, who is handling sound.

"Grease" is the story of Danny and Sandy, two young lovebirds whose true feelings for each other are tempered by the first commandment of teen life: Be Cool.

The musical features lively dancing (check out the boys in "Greased Lightning") and good-time, classic rock 'n' roll. Although the play enjoyed a long and successful Broadway run, the story is even better known through the 1978 film starring John Travolta and Olivia Newton-John.

The selection of "Grease" has been questioned by some adults in the community, the kids say. The original version's rough language and sexual innuendo have been tamed. But the cast, crew and adults associated with "Grease" defend the musical's message: that even the so-called "bad" kids have their good sides.

"I believe so strongly in youth and what they're capable of doing," says McCracken, "who directed JUMP Company's 'Seven Brides for Seven Brothers' in 1988 and 'Bye Bye Birdie' in 1987.

"Kids drink and smoke sometimes," she adds; "she doesn't believe that's right, but it is that, worse than gossiping and backstabbing?"
"The play is quite different than the movie, and I cut out anything I thought was questionable," McCracken says. "If I thought it was questionable, I wouldn't have chosen the show."
"You can do dance shows with kids that you can't do with adults," says JUMP Company president Vera Redman, explaining how the company hopes to find musicals that give as many kids as possible a chance to perform.

"They love the music," Redman continues. "It's upbeat and it's fun to do '50s stuff. That's really why we chose the show. The community will

not be offended."
David Steinocker, who plays Danny, says he started rehearsals somewhat prejudiced against the "stoners," the '60s equivalent of the '50s "greasers." But through preparing for the play, he says he has developed a sense of empathy for his peers.

Of her character, obnoxious cheerleader Patty, Emily Hansen says, "She's a real good-golly, but she's the worst person in the play."
The young actors regard theater as serious fun. McCracken demands their attention and commands their respect. "She's like a fellow actress," says Pamela Buckland, who plays Rizzo.

McCracken says she used to worry about how parents would react to her driven manner. Now, she notes, "I find I get incredible support from parents."
As for the kids, "They know what I expect and that I demand a good show," McCracken says. "They know I'm not going to let them go onstage looking bad."

The louder the better

Car audio systems judged on volume, sound quality, workmanship

TWIN FALLS — Music breaks the stillness of a Sunday morning. It isn't the church choir, or bells pealing from the steeple. It isn't the sound of grandma's soft soprano as she makes breakfast. It isn't birds singing sweetly outside the window.

It's the strains of INXS, Pink Floyd and Great White bouncing off the asphalt in the Magic Valley Mall parking lot. Bass guitars and drums punctuate the air and pump the senses. To car audio aficionados, Sunday morning never sounded sweeter.

The occasion was the first Sound Off Competition held by the audio store The Sound Co. Auto audio systems from five states gathered at Magic Valley Mall for the daylong event, which attracted more than 60 entrants and a good crowd of spectators.

Run under the auspices of the International Auto Sound Challenge Association Inc., the Sound Off rated mobile audio systems on a thorough list of criteria. Although volume was one factor, the sound systems had to pass muster in many other ways, too, using standardized tapes and compact discs.

The judges — local radio and television personalities and professionals from the audio industry — also considered a variety of sound quality measures, including frequency separation and absence of noise.

The best systems didn't only sound great — they looked great, too. Competitors won points for installation expertise, such as making sure wires were hidden from view. As John Kern, an audio factory representative, noted, "You can't just slap a pair of speakers in the car." The judges also evaluated "ergonomics," or how easily the system can be operated by the driver.

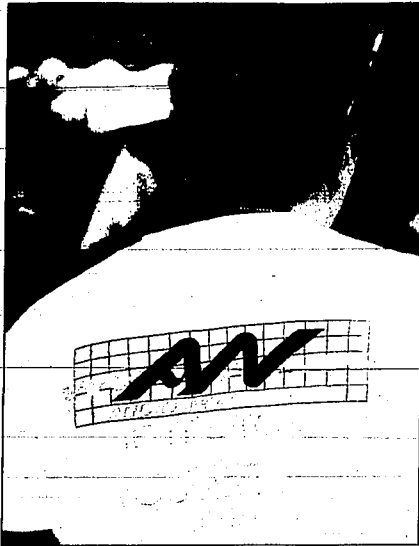
Car sound challenge competitions have been held for five or six years. Jeff Maxwell, a manufacturer's representative for Sony, said the events were started by audio dealers who wanted to give customers a chance to show off their sound systems.

The competitions are particularly popular in California, Texas and Arizona. An event held in June in Phoenix drew between 400 and 600 vehicles and 40,000 spectators, Maxwell said.

Winners of events around Idaho will convene Sept. 17 in Boise for the final Idaho Nationals event. Whoever has racked up the most points in state competitions will win a trip to Hawaii.

Many participants in Sunday's "Sound Off," the first sanctioned event of its kind in Twin Falls, were competing for the first time. But some had taken part the day before at a similar event in Boise.

One such veteran (and the win-

ner-of-both-Boise's event and the 500-100-watt category in Twin Falls) was Fred Nichols of Nampa. Nichols has entered seven Sound Off events and won five, driving a van owned by Paul Brog of Nampa.

Nichols figured the 1,000-watt system in the van took about five years and at least \$12,000 to install. All eyes (and especially ears) were on Nichols when he and the van rolled into the Twin Falls Bank & Trust lot at the mall.

On the other end of the spectrum was Greg Goetz of Kimberly who proudly said, "I've probably got the cheapest stereo out here."

Referring to his 240-watt system as a "Heinz 57" because of the variety of component brands, Goetz said it cost only about \$650 to put together. He saved money by installing it himself, along with his brother.

Goetz said he entered the Sound Off "just for the fun of it. It's something to do, show off the goods a little and see what everyone else has, see whose father owns which stereo store."

Aside from the Brog van, winners at the Sound Off included Kurt Tomson of Moscow (265-500 watts); Joseph Cooper of Caldwell (101-250 watts); Mike Austin of Phoenix, Ore. (61-100 watts); and Andy Resh of Idaho Falls (1-50 watts). Austin also won the Judge's Choice award for the best system overall, and David Bailey of Idaho Falls took first place in the pro di-

vision. The Sound Off also featured displays by several car audio component manufacturers. By far the most popular was a van featuring the Punch line of amplifiers made by Rockford Fosgate.

Rockford Fosgate is apparently to car audio what Steinway is to pianos and Lamborghini is to world-class autos. Audiophiles can rhapsodize about the sound clarity and subtleties of the amplifiers, but the company's literature makes it clear the awesome, chest-thumping bass is the primal attraction.

"Rockford-Fosgate... For those who think too much is just right," reads the front of a company brochure. On the other side, however, it says, "Continuous exposure to sound pressure levels over 100 dB may cause permanent hearing loss.... Use common sense and practice safe sound."

Doug Fulwider, one of two judges from Audio-Northwest in Washington state, said kids want their systems to deliver music, not just volume.

Auto audio systems have grown in popularity, he added, because the car, van or truck is a more private preserve than a living room. Auto audio gives the listener a chance to listen to music without affecting other people.

Until the windows are rolled down, that is.

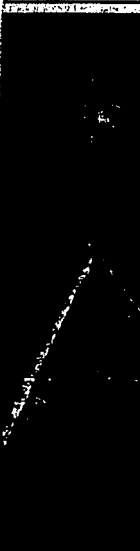

Americans celebrate 20 years since greatest voyage of exploration ever

Thursday, July 20, is the 20th anniversary of the first landing of human beings on the moon. CBS marked the event a week early with the two-hour special "The Moon Above, The Earth Below." As of the last week in June, however, ABC had announced no plans for any commemorative programming, but, if you want to see how NBC originally covered the event, you can on cable's Arts & Entertainment Network. Hosted by Edwin Newman, A&E plans to rebroadcast NBC's coverage of the liftoff, moonwalk and splashdown of Apollo 11 on its anniversary dates: July 16, 20 and 24. And on July 19, most PBS stations will broadcast "The Other Side of the Moon," about the lives of eight astronauts who trod the lunar surface.

It's hard even for older Americans to remember the panic that a football-sized metal sphere caused on Oct. 4, 1958. Sputnik I was the first artificial satellite to orbit the earth.

And it was launched by the Soviet Union at the height of the Cold War. Americans looked up into the night sky and imagined the little 184-pound ball peeping down at them. Television ran worried reports about a "science gap." The Space Race was de-

clared, and television had its first big ongoing story.

As with all great triumphal drama, the beginning was bleak. In 1959, while the Soviets launched the Luna probes, which bypassed, then landed on and returned from the moon, the U.S. space program struggled to get off the ground—literally. The lingering televised image was of American test-rockets exploding on their pads.

But then, in true hare-and-tortoise fashion, the Space Race tightened. All was gloom after Yuri Gagarin's first orbital flight on April 12, 1961. But Alan Shepard's 15-minute space flight brought cheers three weeks later. Furrowed brows met Titov's 25-hour flight in August 1961, followed by huzzahs for John Glenn's orbital flight in February 1962. When John Kennedy vowed to land a man on the moon before the end of the decade, no one doubted the vital importance of the mission. As Lyndon Johnson put it in May 1963, "I, for one, don't want to go to bed by the light of a Communist moon."

Hardly anyone noticed that, at some point, the Russians just dropped out of the race. Their Soyuz

program was more interested in developing space-station capability than lunar colonies.

Nevertheless, when Neil Armstrong took his small step and large leap, it was a cathartic culmination of many things: the personal bravery of Armstrong and his forerunners, our role as a world power, the search for America's place in history, it was the greatest voyage of exploration ever undertaken. So if Walter Cronkite choked up on the air, who could blame him?

Later, of course, it all changed. When astronauts on subsequent Apollo missions took to driving golf balls and bouncing around on "moon buggies," the moon began to seem less like a great adventure than a Great Adventure, a theme park in space. We began to forget the names of the men we had anointed as our national saviors. But that says more about us than about their achievement.

he-man Sylvester Stallone. Am I wrong? — M.G.

A: I think any man who chooses to be an actor must have at least a smattering of artistic sensitivity. A: Dennis Mural of Industrial Light and Magic, whose credits include the "Indiana Jones" and "Star Wars" films, told me that the slimy river was the movie's big challenge. Part of the solution was to use "diamond dust," a material that lends sparkle to metallic paint. "We added different colors of diamond dust to the liquid, which flowed along and was churned up by pumps. Filming at a certain speed makes the river look as though it's actually boiling and churning."

Q: Is it true that Jaclyn Smith has left her husband and two kids? — L.R.

A: Smith, who appears in the upcoming TV movie "Blood Knot," has two children: Gaston, 7, and Spencer Margaret, 3. Her husband is British-born photographer Anthony Richmond. 2 comedy networks vie for viewers; experts predict only 1 will survive

NEW YORK — In what may prove to be the *Humorfight* at the OK Corral, two cable-TV companies here are preparing to launch 24-hour-a-day comedy channels. While both conceivably could survive, many industry executives predict that only one of them will get the last laugh.

The battle pits two of the cable industry's most successful program suppliers against one another. In one corner: Home Box Office and its Comedy Channel, which is scheduled to be launched this fall. In the other: MTV Networks and its HA TV Comedy Network, which will arrive early next year.

The rivalry extends far beyond the comedy ring. MTV Networks, which operates the MTV, VH-1 and Nickelodeon cable networks, is a division of Viacom International, which also owns Showtime and the Movie Channel, which have long labored in HBO's shadow among pay-TV services. In May, Viacom filed a \$2.4 billion lawsuit against HBO and parent Time Inc., charging that they had engaged in "predatory and exclusionary acts" against their competitors. HBO has termed the suit "totally baseless."

Though the formats of the two services will differ, the companies cite basically the same reason for developing advertiser-supported comedy channels — that just as there proved to be a market for all-news CNN, all-sports ESPN and all-music MTV, there is bound to be one for a form whose popularity is easily gauged by network programming, motion pictures and nightclubs.

As Dick Beahrs, president of the Comedy Channel, observes, comedy "is probably the last bastion of network programming that has not been fully exploited by cable."

The idea of 24-hour-a-day comedy may boggle the mind, he says, "but when I first heard of ESPN being 24 hours of sports in 1979, I thought

somebody must have been smoking something. And I'm a sports junkie." ESPN is the nation's largest cable network, serving 56 percent of the nation's homes.

The certainty that viewers could find comedy on TV, regardless of when they switch on the set, is another major selling point, says MTV Networks president Tom Preston, who is overseeing the HA TV effort. "It's really that constancy, we feel, that's going to give you enough of an

as we did with rock 'n' roll on MTV," Preston said.

Neither Preston nor Beahrs would say how much their channels will cost to start. But as with other new ventures, they will run in the red for several years and possibly longer.

Preston notes that the cost could be defrayed by co-production deals and even co-ownership of HA TV by other companies. His company is talking with "several" large cable operators about "a possible equity

audience to make the thing ultimately profitable," he says.

Details of what the HA TV Comedy Network and the Comedy Channel will offer are still sketchy, although each says no R-rated fare will appear because each, unlike pay channels where viewers make a deliberate choice to accept such programming by sending in their check each month, is on basic cable and thus available to all cable viewers, young and old alike.

The Comedy Channel seems to be taking a leaf from MTV's format. It plans to have six to 12 comedy hosts — or "comedy jocks," as some call them — introducing the material and performing their own jokes too. There'll be clips of comedy films, classic TV comedy shows, stand-up comedy performances and full-length comedy movies, Beahrs says.

The HA channel, says MTV's Preston, will offer long and short-form programming, sketch comedy, stand-up performances and movies and situation comedies either made for HA or bought in syndication. There'll be no comedy hosts; per se, but there will be new comic personalities on the network. "We see a large role for performance comedy,

interest" in the new channel, he says, declining to identify them. This might also help circumvent the advantage that the Comedy Channel will have by getting out of the blocks first.

The key question as to cost, says one cable executive, is how much each company will have to pay for what it shows. Original programming is costly, he says, and if they start "bidding against the broadcast market" for recent films, syndicated shows or reruns of network fare, "you are going to run into some very hefty price tags."

An even bigger problem, however, will simply be getting the new services on cable systems that have become increasingly crowded with other offerings, among them NBC's business channel CNBC and Ted Turner's TNT movie channel in just the past seven months.

While newer cable systems have a capacity for 70 channels or more, the industry average is 36 channels. Older systems are being upgraded, but right now, MTV's Preston acknowledges, cable is pretty tight in terms of channel availability. "I think there's a bottleneck existing in terms of channel capacity."

The Disney Channel presents version of 'Great Expectations'

HOLLYWOOD—Pip to his great and loyal friend Herbert Pocket: "Let's drink to 'expectations.' Especially to Disney-style 'Great Expectations.'"

After several movie versions, Charles Dickens' memorable novel has been transferred to cable television as a rich, eloquent, voluptuously full-figured miniseries on The Disney Channel. Flawed, yes, but also a real looker, vibrantly acted, gorgeously filmed, true to its literary source and well worth the six hours' viewing commitment.

Anthony Calf is a pip of a Pip as another of Dickens' orphans, this one introduced to us as an 8-year-old living with his tyrannical sister and her cashily gentle and kindhearted husband; village blacksmith Joe Gargery. Young Pip's encounter with the escaped convict Magwitch in a graveyard and later with the elderly recluse Miss Havisham and her young female ward, Estella, will set him on a course ultimately leading to London and an empty, unhappy life amid genteel society, far from his working-class origins.

Supported in high style by an unknown benefactor, Pip is hardly an enviable hero. His values are

false, and his expectations — merely to win the love of the fetching, but icy, unreachable Estella and to live a gentlemanly life of ease without working — are shallow. Indeed, before understanding the errors of his self-obsessed ways, he becomes a social snob so contemptuous of his humble background that he rejects those who have sacrificed most in his behalf.

Pip's unlikely journey toward revelation is what makes "Great Expectations" so intriguing and is what this longer TV production, written by John Goldsmith and directed by Kevin Connor, is able to explore much more extensively than previous screen versions.

"Great Expectations" features a kettie of superior performances besides Calf's as the adult Pip.

Jean Simmons makes a fine Miss Havisham, the cruelly sadistic and miserably unhappy witch of "Great Expectations." This shuttered, curtained, decaying relic of a woman is...withered and yellowed-as-old paper inside dark, musty Satis House, where she exists in self-imposed isolation from society and sunlight, bitter and loathing, still in the wedding dress and veil she wore when jilted at the altar in her youth.

Kim Thomson is the vision of

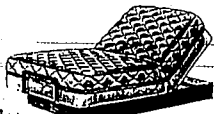

hard, predatory Estella, at once luminous and void as Miss Havisham's vehicle for vengeance against males, reared to enthrall and then abuse them, to touch hearts and be heartless, to be loved and be loveless. "I can feel nothing," she says coolly.

In a sense, Estella is hardly more a vicarious creation of Miss Havisham's than Pip is of the volatile Magwitch; ably played by Anthony Hopkins. It is this growing varmint's enduring appreciation of a kindness by the 8-year-old Pip (Martin Harvey) that will largely shape the destiny and expectations of the mature Pip. And if it is the kindness of guileless Joe the blacksmith, nicely rendered by John Rhys Davies, that Pip will later reward with condescension.

The late Ray McAnally makes perhaps his last small-screen appearance a suitably compelling one as the cautious, keen-minded, ambiguous attorney Jaggers, a relatively minor character who nevertheless becomes the plot's

connecting hub. It was one of McAnally's great strengths as an actor that he never showed everything, his expressive eyes seeming always to hint at unrevealed mysteries.

This miniseries rendering of "Great Expectations" contains confusing mysteries of its own, such as how only Pip seems to age over the course of 25 years. Although cinematographer Doug Milson ("Lonesome Dove") provides the production with a fine look, moreover, there are occasional lapses in texture. When the young Pip's sister (Rosemary McHale) complains about him being "grimy with dirt from head to toe," he looks as fresh-scrubbed as a choirboy.

Meanwhile, there's a point-to-be made here about color vs. black-and-white. If over-a-story would be even more effectively and dramatically told in full, living black-and-white—a la David Lean's brilliant 1946 movie version of "Great Expectations" in which Simmons played Estella—it is this story.
