Iowa jetliner crash survivors talk of miracles

United Airlines DC-10 Crash

With a failed tail engine, United Airlines flight 232 circled the airport for about a half-hour while the flight crew prepared passengers for a crash landing.

The tail engine failed and may have caused a hydraulic failure, crippling control of the aircraft.

Hitting short of the runway, the DC-10 aircraft crashed in an explosive fireball and cartwheeled down runway 22.

Everything appeared normal as the aircraft approached the runway. Shortly before touchdown the plane's right wing dipped with its nose down. The wing hit the ground and the jet flipped over, burst into flames and broke apart.

SIoux CITY, Iowa — Rescuers and survivors spoke of miracles, and investigators swept inch-by-inch through a cornfield Thursday looking for an explanation of the fiery crash of United Flight 232.

At least 76 people were killed, and up to 43 others were missing and believed dead in Wednesday's spectacular crash of a DC-10 jumbo jet.

Rescuers said many of those unaccounted for probably were trapped in a large silver and red-striped section of the charred fuselage that sat amid rows of corn 4 feet tall.

Officials gave conflicting reports Thursday on the number of survivors among the 293 people on board, with numbers ranging from 174 to 197. United later scaled back the high figure to 185, explaining that the flight crew had been mistakenly counted twice.

Some survivors just walked away from the wreckage.

Beginning at daybreak, National Guardsmen began collecting pieces of wreckage and carrying body bags to ambulances and refrigerated trailers.

The plane, crippled by a loss of hydraulic power, pitched violently to its right just a few feet from the ground, scraped its right wing, cartwheeled into a ball of fire and broke into pieces during an emergency landing about a 4-pm on a closed runway at the Sioux Gateway Airport.

Survivor Garry Priest, 23, of Northglenn, Colo., said those who got out of the plane saw what "looked like a war zone. Bodies, trash, magazines, luggage, and pieces of

bodies littered the area. It was the worst thing I've ever seen.

"We could not believe anybody could walk away from it," said Dr. David Greco, director of emergency services for the Marian Health Center and one of the first physicians on the scene.

Greco lauded the passengers and crew for maintaining calm and said the nature of the breakup of the plane largely determined the pattern of deaths and injuries.

The three members of the cockpit crew survived the crash, but Greco said the first-class section was devastated. Passengers in rows nine through 19 suffered no injuries or minor ones; he added, but "there was nothing left of the rear half of the aircraft."

"One section was thrown so far so fast that it never got involved in the fire," he said.

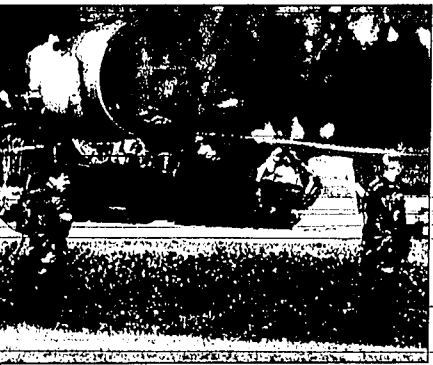
Tales of heroism abounded, beginning with praise for Capt. A.C. Haynos, a 33-year United veteran.

Gov. Terry Branstad visited Haynos' bedside and said at a news conference: "He was quite emotional about the situation and tears came to his eyes when he talked

Training, time, luck reduced crash toll

SIoux CITY, Iowa — The remarkably low loss of life in the crash of United Air Lines Flight 232 Wednesday was due to more than just luck.

It arose from the skill of the flight crew in the air and the rescue units on the ground, to the more than 30 minutes the rescue teams had to assemble at Sioux City airport as the crippled DC-10 slowly made its way to what would be a fiery crash landing and to the preparedness of the fire, police and National Guard units as well as the ambulance crews and the emergency physicians and nurses.

But luck did play a role. The fire in the plane developed slowly, enabling scores of passengers to exit. Many of the passengers scrambled into rain-soaked cornfields. Survivor Kevin Heckman said he believed the wet cornfield "saved them," preventing fires from spreading and engulfing passengers.

It also helped that the United flight crashed

only seven miles from two well-equipped trauma centers, buying doctors the "golden hour" that they said makes the difference in many trauma cases.

"If this was outside the area and we didn't have the resources so close by, it'd been a smaller town a half hour to an hour away, then that would have been a tremendous devastation," according to Dr. David Greco of Marian Health Center, one of two hospitals that cared for 88 of the most seriously injured.

The Wednesday crash of Flight 232 bound from Denver to Chicago was witnessed by dozens of waiting firemen, Air National Guard troops, sheriff's deputies and most of this city's policemen, all equipped to move in for immediate rescue efforts.

Greco, the physician in charge watched from a helicopter, then landed to direct an assembly line of a dozen ambulances and another dozen helicopters that shuttled to Marian and to St. Luke's Hospital, where 80 area doctors were

gathering at the time of impact.

Three hours and nine minutes after the crash, surviving passengers, even those with scratches or no visible injuries, had all been taken to hospitals or a college dormitory. According to United, 184 of the more than 290 people aboard the flight survived. Officials said 76 are known to have died; the rest are thought still to be buried in the wreckage.

To most of the rescue workers, the scene was eerily familiar. They had experienced almost the same events in the fall of 1987. But in 1987 it was a test.

It was a radio call from that disaster center that Sioux City Journal reporter Bill Zahren heard Tuesday afternoon, sending him to the airport with a photographer. At that point, the problem was listed as a fairly ordinary Code 2, meaning a "potential—but not necessarily inevitable disaster."

"But when I got nearly all the way there, they'd

Unrest threat to Soviet reforms

MOSCOW — Spreading strikes and ethnic violence have convulsed a dozen areas of the Soviet Union in the past month and may endanger President Mikhail S. Gorbachev's reform program by damaging an already shaky economy.

A few trainloads of scarce treasures like soap, meat and shoes may soothe some mining towns, but the government does not pretend there is enough to placate everyone.

By Thursday, the coal strike had spread to six regions from the far north to Siberia.

Ethnic violence has taken at least 132 lives and injured about 1,400 people in Uzbekistan, Kazakhstan, Tadzhikistan, the Nagorno-Karabakh region of Azerbaijan and the Abkhazian and Marnouli areas of Georgia.

Lack of coal threatens other industries, and saboteurs in Abkhazia have damaged the electric

power system.

Tourism, the mainstay of Abkhazia's economy, was ruined at the height of the season by armed rioters who fired on trains. Vacationers were trapped in popular Black Sea resorts without transportation or enough food.

Gorbachev said the spread of strikes "poses a threat to the implementation of plans projected by the policy of perestroika," his plan for reforming the economy and society.

Not long after he issued the warning on national television Wednesday, miners in four more fields joined the coal strike.

Leaders seeking a quick end to the strikes said the miners had legitimate complaints and yielded to their demands for more pay and other changes.

First the moon, then to Mars

WASHINGTON — Twenty years after man's first step on the moon, President Bush said Thursday Americans must commit to the permanent settlement of space, first returning to the moon and then embarking on a "journey into tomorrow," a manned mission to distant Mars.

The president offered no firm timetable or price tag for a program that could cost hundreds of billions of dollars but said it would be worth the cost "because it is humanity's destiny to strive, to seek, to find. And because it is America's destiny to lead."

His proposal was made in a

ceremony, on the steps of the National Air and Space Museum, marking the historic moment July 20, 1969, when American astronauts Neil Armstrong and Buzz Aldrin stepped on the moon's Sea of Tranquility to fulfill a pledge made eight years earlier by President Kennedy.

The two moonwalkers stood with Bush Friday, along with Mike Collins, the third Apollo 11 crewman who said, "We have rested on our Apollo laurels long enough; it's time to get moving again."

Bush's proposal — to establish a U.S. moon base early in the next century and then mount a manned Mars mission — likely will ignite a long national debate both in a

budget-minded Congress and among those who believe federal dollars should not be spent on costly space endeavors but on solving more earthly problems.

At a time of huge budget deficits, Congress already is balking at the start-up costs for NASA's \$30 billion space station, which Bush said was "a first and necessary step for sustained manned exploration."

Congress, he said, is "where the future of the space station — and our future as a space-faring nation — will be decided."

Bush offered few details and said he was leaving it to Vice President Dan Quayle, as head of the National Space Council, and to NASA to come up with "realistic timetables."

Some Twin Falls school administrators receive big pay hikes

TWIN FALLS — Some Twin Falls school administrators will receive pay raises of as much as \$8,250 this year, mainly to fix what officials call a long-standing salary discrepancy.

The School Board recently approved a 4.2 percent pay raise for all administrators. But four principals and a vice principal will receive considerably more because their pay has unjustifiably lagged behind their peers,

Acting Superintendent Keith Tolzin said Thursday.

"Some people were overlooked and we were not aware of it," Tolzin said. "We don't have an excuse for that."

The five are Gordon Armstrong, Bickel Elementary School principal; Ted Poppewell, Lincoln Elementary School principal; Dennis Santos, Morningstar Elementary School principal; Norman

Thomas, Twin Falls High School vice principal; and Norman "Duke" Wiseman, O'Leary Junior High School principal.

The mistake was found by an administrative committee assigned to compare Twin Falls salaries with other Idaho districts.

"Some of our old-timers hadn't moved up quite the same as others had, we discovered," said Morningstar's Santos, whose pay will rise \$8,215. "No one had noticed and salaries just never came up."

"When we brought it to our head

administrators, I felt they were understanding and could see where we were coming from," said O'Leary's Wiseman, who will earn \$8,250 more during the 1989-90 school year.

Armstrong's pay will rise \$6,045, Poppewell's \$7,285, and Thomas's \$6,600.

Although the five will receive no back pay, Santos said there were no hard feelings.

"We just felt we wanted to get it corrected and didn't even ask for back pay," Wiseman said.

Tolzin said the problem grew out of a

policy started in the mid-1980s. To correct previous inequities in the pay schedule, the district at that time began giving credit for up to four years of experience to administrators hired from outside the district and to administrators changing jobs within the district.

In the process, however, some administrators already working for the district were inadvertently shortchanged, Tolzin said.

Correcting the problem will mean

Senators find \$15 million for SIS

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Senate appropriations subcommittee has come up with an extra \$15 million to develop the Special Isotope Separation project at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

James McClure, R-Idaho, said Thursday the committee reversed some of the funding cuts voted by the House and approved \$138 million in fiscal 1990.

Of that total, the Energy and Water Subcommittees of the Senate Appropriations Committee allocated

\$55 million for the project's construction budget, \$15 million more than authorized by the House and Senate Armed Services committees.

"We strengthened our hands in the Senate," said McClure. "Today's action doesn't mean that final funding for SIS will be \$138 million, but it does mean that the funding situation is considerably brighter than it was last week."

McClure said the construction budget is the key to finishing the

project on time, because the entire project will be set back if a timely manner.

The Idahoan said he remains convinced that SIS, a plutonium-refining facility, is needed.

"Every study to date documents the need for plutonium at the time that SIS is scheduled for completion. That being the case, my support for SIS remains as strong as ever," he said.

Bomb damages LDS chapel; no one injured

SANTIAGO, Chile (AP) — A bomb attack Wednesday night on a Mormon chapel in southern Chile caused minor damage to the building and no victims, a church spokesman says.

A leftist guerrilla gang claimed responsibility for the explosion in Osorno, 556 miles south of Santiago, the third attack against a Mormon

chapel this month in Chile.

Police said the bomb was placed shortly before 9 p.m. at the main entrance to the chapel, in the center sector of the agricultural city.

A church spokesman in Santiago, Gustavo Barrios, told the AP the blast "caused minimal damage to our chapel and no one was hurt."

"I'd say it was a noise bomb,"

Barrios said. "It didn't even shatter window glasses."

He said around 200 people in the chapel "continued with the service after the explosion."

Press reports said the blast seriously damaged the chapel and caused panic among the people attending the service, but Barrios denied that.

Hero label fits pilot, friends, neighbors say

SEATTLE (AP) — United Airlines Capt. Al C. Haynes and his neighbors said Thursday that the hero label fits the pilot who was named the state's Little League Volunteer of the Year days before he lay on Flight 232.

The DC-10 Haynes was flying crashed Wednesday in an Iowa cornfield. Some survivors and Iowa Gov. Terry Branstad credited the pilot with bringing the crippled plane down from six miles up and saving their lives.

"Knowing him and the way he is, I would have wanted him to be the man behind the controls," said

Jim Chavez, who has worked closely with Haynes in the Little League for nine years.

Chavez said Haynes planned to umpire the district league championships on Sunday but it rained, so he promised to be back on Thursday to call the rescheduled games.

Instead, Haynes and his Seattle-based flight crew were hospitalized in Sioux City, Iowa, where the crippled plane down from Chicago flight came down.

"Friends said Haynes had a passion for flying since his days as a Marine fighter pilot during the Korean War."

additional pay increases for the five in addition to the 4.2 percent raises granted to all administrators.

The 4.2 percent raise boosted administrators' base pay by \$1,050, from \$24,600 to \$25,650. Teachers will receive an average 7 percent salary increase for the 1989-90 school year.

In addition to the base pay raise, all principals and vice principals will receive another boost this year in the form of an "assignment" factor.

They'll receive from \$1,000 to \$2,000 a year for extra activities and evening events they are expected to attend, Tolzin said.

"I think we all just felt that they were putting in enough extra time outside school duties that they should be compensated," said School Board member Lenore McKee.

The board also approved a \$70 increase in the additional pay given to administrators for each 15 post-graduate credits they earn. Like teachers, administrators are rewarded for additional education.

Administrators now will receive \$800 yearly for each additional 15 credits they earn, up to 45 credits, beyond a master's degree.

One administrator will take a pay cut. Carl Snow, who recently stepped down as superintendent to become high school principal, will see his pay drop \$6,820, from \$55,570 to \$48,750.

Frank Charlton, whom Snow replaced as principal, earned \$41,460. Board Chairman Calvin

Design of DC-10 under scrutiny

WASHINGTON (AP) — The crash of a United wide-bodied jet in Sioux City, Iowa, demonstrates a problem already highlighted in earlier major DC-10 accidents: the lack of an effective backup when the hydraulic system fails.

Other incidents prior to Wednesday's DC-10 crash, in which 119 people were either dead or missing, have a common thread in the loss of pilot control after a failure that would not ordinarily affect flight controls, such as loss of an engine or a cargo door.

Some of the cases did not cause heavy loss of life, but each has added to concern among government and aviation authorities over design of the DC-10 which the government grounded for more than a month in 1979.

A McDonnell Douglas spokesman said Thursday the out-of-production DC-10 is "as fit as any other" airliner and has flown 745 million passengers safely more than 7 billion miles. The spokesman, David Eastman, declined to comment on the Sioux City crash, except to say the manufacturer was cooperating in the federal investigation to determine cause.

Although investigators were looking at explosive failure of the plane's tail engine as the initial incident in the crash of United Flight 232 in Sioux City, they also were concerned about apparent collapse of the plane's hydraulic systems as its pilot was attempting an emergency landing on a Denver-Philadelphia flight.

The hydraulic systems link the pilot with wing flaps, tail elevators, rudders, brakes, and other devices that guide the airliner in takeoff, during flight, in landing and on the runway.

Federal Aviation Administration authorities said the DC-10's pilot first reported "uncontained engine failure," which means parts shot out of the engine, possibly damaging other systems and causing what the pilot later described as "complete hydraulic failure."

In 1974, loss of a cargo door caused decompression in a Turkish Airlines DC-10 over France. The plane's floor buckled, snapping hydraulic cables, and the airliner went out of control, killing 346 people. Previous incidents in the United States and Canada had pointed to a cargo door problem, but it and other problems were not corrected until after the Turkish crash.

On May 25, 1979, in Chicago, the engine of an American Airlines DC-10 broke loose and catapulted over the wing during takeoff, breaking hydraulic cables and causing a crash that killed 275 people. Investigators blamed faulty maintenance but also recommended design corrections. McDonnell Douglas spokesman

Eastman said he knew of only one design change that had occurred in the DC-10 since the Chicago crash, involving instrumentation that would warn the pilot when wing slats were improperly positioned.

The two incidents and the latest crash point to serious problems with design of the DC-10, said John Galipault of the Aviation Safety Institute, a nonprofit group that pushes for safer planes.

He said the common element in several DC-10 crashes has been loss of the pilot's ability to control the aircraft after a catastrophic failure in a single system.

"When that happens, the pilot becomes a passenger," he said. "It reinforces my concern about the airplane. It's too big, but it has a terrible safety record."

According to a National Transportation Safety Board analysis of the Chicago crash, the DC-10 has three hydraulic systems, each powered by two engine-driven pumps. It also has two electric auxiliary pumps. Further backup is provided by an air-driven system which includes a propeller dependent only upon movement of the aircraft through the air.

Problems with the pumps' design was found early in the 19-year-old history of the DC-10 and corrected, the board said.

But as accidents occurred, controversy over effectiveness of the DC-10's hydraulic system and its backups increased.

In 1982, McDonnell Douglas discussed possible design changes after an Air Florida DC-10 in Miami aborted its takeoff without injuries after a malfunctioning engine caused fan blades into the wing and caused hydraulic problems.

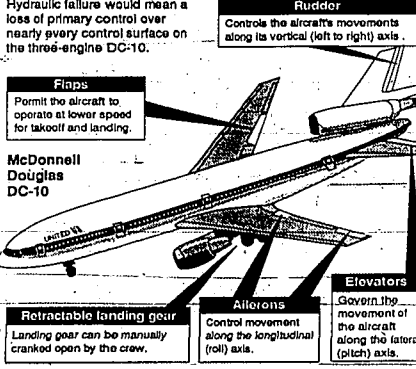
In July 1974, failure in a wing engine on a DC-10 en route from Miami to Los Angeles caused loss of hydraulic fluid because of damage to the wing.

After a March 1976 accident in which a flock of birds flew into a DC-10 rear engine, causing it to disintegrate, the safety board concluded that the engine could not safely tolerate such a massive ingestion of foreign objects.

Airliners can fly with one engine out, but there is concern with the DC-10 that failure of any engine which involves it coming apart endangers the hydraulic system.

Other wide-bodied jets, such as the Boeing 747, have differently configured hydraulic and engine systems, also with built-in redundant backups. A Boeing spokesman, David Jimenez, declined to discuss any differences between the aircrafts, saying it would be "like comparing apples and oranges."

What the Hydraulic System Controls

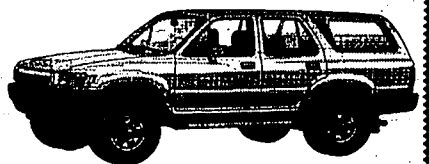


Former-engineer praises pilot

A United Airlines DC-10 bound from Denver to Chicago crashed on Wednesday after pilot A.C. Haynes, a 33-year United veteran, refused that he had a "complete hydraulic failure."

Senators find \$15 million for SIS

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Senate appropriations subcommittee has approved a \$15 million to develop the Special Isotope Separation Project at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

Sen. James McClure, R-Idaho, said Thursday the committee reversed some of the funding cuts voted by the House and approved \$13 million in fiscal 1990.

Of that total, the Energy and Water subcommittee of the Senate Appropriations Committee allocated \$55 million for the project's construction budget, \$15 million more than authorized by the House and Senate Armed Services committees.

"We've strengthened our hands in the Senate," said McClure. "Today's action doesn't mean that final funding for SIS will be \$138 million, but it does mean that the funding situation is considerably brighter than it was last week."

McClure said the construction budget is the key to finishing the project on time, because the entire project will be set back if site preparation isn't completed in a timely manner.

Bomb damages LDS chapel; no one injured

Barrios said, "It didn't even shatter window glasses."

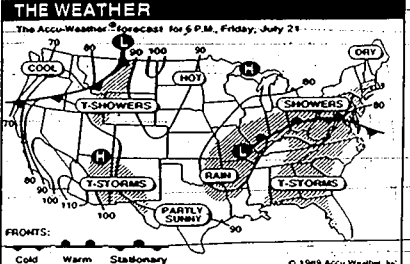
A leftist guerrilla gang claimed responsibility for the attack. The group is 550 miles south of Santiago, the third attack against a Mormon

chapel this month in Chile. Police said the bomb was placed shortly before 9 p.m. at the main entrance to the chapel, in the center sector of the agricultural city.

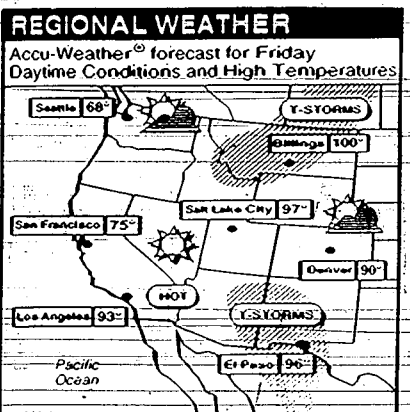
Prova reports said the blast seriously damaged the chapel and caused panic among the people attending the service, but Barrios denied that.

The United flight crew nearly managed to land the crippled plane, which apparently had lost most of its maneuverability because an exploding engine severed all three hydraulic systems. Capt. Al C. Haynes nursed the jumbo jet five miles closer to the airport than the crew first predicted.

Chavez said Haynes planned to umpire the district league championships on Sunday but it rained, so he promised to be "back on Thursday-to call the

match and games. Instead, Haynes and his Seattle-based night crew are hospitalized in Sioux City, Iowa, where a Denver-to-Chicago flight came down.

The Rev. Jack L. Heckert quoted First Officer W.R. Records as saying from his hospital bed, "If we could have had 10 more seconds, we could have put it on the runway."

Chavez said Haynes planned to umpire the district league championships on Sunday but it rained, so he promised to be "back on Thursday-to call the

match and games. Instead, Haynes and his Seattle-based night crew are hospitalized in Sioux City, Iowa, where a Denver-to-Chicago flight came down.

Many of the dead were killed when their seats came loose, sending them tumbling across the ground. Others were trapped in intense fires.

Chavez said Haynes planned to umpire the district league championships on Sunday but it rained, so he promised to be "back on Thursday-to call the

match and games. Instead, Haynes and his Seattle-based night crew are hospitalized in Sioux City, Iowa, where a Denver-to-Chicago flight came down.

Design of DC-10 under scrutiny

WASHINGTON (AP) — The crash of a United wide-bodied jet in Sioux City, Iowa, demonstrates a problem already highlighted in two other DC-10 accidents: the lack of an effective backup when the hydraulic system fails.

Other incidents prior to Wednesday's DC-10 crash, in which 119 people were either dead or missing, have a common thread in the loss of pilot control after a failure that would not ordinarily affect flight controls, such as loss of an engine or a cargo door.

Some of the cases did not cause heavy loss of life, but each has added to concern among government and aviation authorities over design of the DC-10 which the government grounded for more than a month in 1979.

A McDonnell Douglas spokesman said Thursday the out-of-production DC-10 is "as fit as any other airliner" and has flown 746 million passengers safely more than 7 billion miles. The spokesman, David Eastman, declined to comment on the Sioux City crash, except to say the manufacturer was cooperating in the federal investigation to determine cause.

Although investigators were looking at explosive failure of the plane's tail engine as the initial incident in the crash of United Flight 232 in Sioux City, they also were concerned about apparent collapse of the plane's hydraulic systems as its pilot was attempting an emergency landing on a Denver-Philadelphia flight.

The hydraulic systems link the pilot with wing flaps, tail elevators, rudders, brakes, and other devices that guide the airliner in takeoff, during flight, in landing and on the runways.

Federal Aviation Administration authorities said the DC-10's pilot first reported "uncontained engine failure," which means parts shot out of the engine, possibly damaging other systems and causing what the pilot later described as "complete hydraulic failure."

In 1974, loss of a cargo door caused decompression in a Turkish Airlines DC-10 over France. The plane's floor buckled, snapping hydraulic cables, and the airliner went out of control, killing 346 people. Previous incidents in the United States and Canada had pointed to a cargo door problem, but it and other problems were not corrected until after the Turkish crash.

On May 25, 1979, in Chicago, the engine of an American Airlines DC-10 broke loose and catapulted over the wing during takeoff, breaking hydraulic cables and causing a crash that killed 275 people. Investigators blamed faulty maintenance but also recommended design corrections.

McDonnell Douglas spokesman

Eastman said he knew of only one design change that had occurred in the DC-10 since the Chicago crash, involving instrumentation that would warn the pilot when wing flaps were improperly positioned.

The two incidents and the latest crash point to serious problems with design of the DC-10, said John Galipault of the Aviation Safety Institute, a nonprofit group that pushes for safer planes.

He said the common element in several DC-10 crashes has been loss of the pilot's ability to control the aircraft after a catastrophic failure in a single system.

"When that happens, the pilot becomes a passenger," he said. "It reinforces my concern about the airplane. It's too bad, but it has a terrible safety record."

According to a National Transportation Safety Board analysis of the Chicago crash, the DC-10 has three hydraulic systems, each powered by two engine-driven pumps. It also has two electric auxiliary pumps. Further backup is provided by an air-driven system which includes a propeller dependent only upon movement of the aircraft through the air.

Problems with the pumps' design was found early in the 19-year-old history of the DC-10 and corrected, the board said.

But as accidents occurred, controversy over effectiveness of the DC-10's hydraulic system and its backups increased.

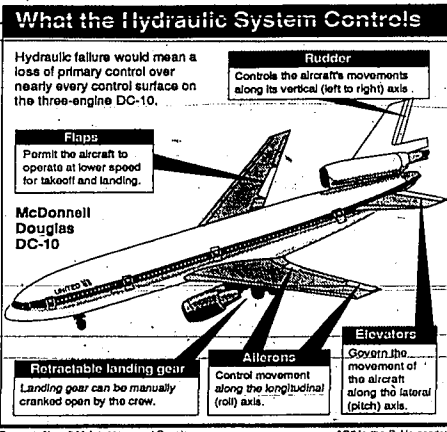
In 1982, McDonnell Douglas discussed possible design changes after an Air Florida DC-10 in Miami aborted its takeoff without injuries after a malfunctioning engine hurled fan blades into the wing and caused hydraulic problems.

In July 1974, failure in a wing engine on a DC-10 en-route from Miami to Los Angeles caused loss of hydraulic fluid because of damage to the wing.

After a March 1976 accident in which a flock of birds flew into a DC-10 rear engine, causing it to disintegrate, the safety board concluded that the engine could not safely tolerate such a massive ingestion of foreign objects.

Airliners can fly with one engine out, but there is concern with the DC-10 that failure of any engine which involves it coming apart endangers the hydraulic system.

Other wide-bodied jets, such as the Boeing 747, have differently configured hydraulic and engine systems, also with built-in redundant backups. A Boeing spokesman, David Jimenez, declined to discuss any differences between the aircrafts, saying it would be "like comparing apples and oranges."



Former engineer praises pilot

DES MOINES, Iowa (AP) — A Texas, retired flight engineer for pilot familiar with DC-10s says any American Airlines. "Without pilot who managed to get an airliner crippled as badly as United Flight 232 anywhere near an airport belongs in the aviation hall of fame."

"If he lost all three systems, then the world ought to be thankful that as many people survived that did," said Joe Sullivan of Richardson, Texas, a 33-year United veteran, who radioed that he had a "complete hydraulic failure."

INEL waste problem requires stance of responsibility

The pioneering cancer therapists Carl and Stephanie Simonon call the heart of their treatment "a stance of responsibility." When a woman or man with cancer accepts her own responsibility for the disease — for its origin and its course — she is in the stance from which healing begins. She is no longer a "victim"; recovery is her responsibility, not the doctor's. A stance of responsibility. I want to apply that to the Department of Energy, INEL and Idaho. Just after James Watkins was named the new U.S. Secretary of Energy, I saw a documentary on his odyssey in 1988 as chairman of the National Aids Commission. He began with the stance towards Aids and Aids patients most of us have — distant, disapproving, fearful. He ended listening to a gay touching dying man, talking openly about sex, and telling us our view of Aids is adolescent avoidance, leading to national tragedy. The program gave me hope, by re-

vealing in Admiral Watkins a strong heart, a clear mind and a deeply rooted stance of personal responsibility. The nation's nuclear weapons/waste enterprise is sick. The illness began long ago, though — the steady irruption of visible symptoms is recent. And today a cacophony of doctors are making diagnoses and prescribing treatments. The illness extends well beyond the Department of Energy, but DOE is at its core. Can the agency, in its head and heart, shed the victim's armor and adopt a stance of responsibility? It's Reagan era leaders — Don Hodel and John Herrington — didn't even try. I think Watkins is trying. His challenge will be to communicate that stance — by example, discipline, support and staying power — throughout the agency.

And what about Idaho — what is our responsibility? Let's start at the top. For over a decade, Jim McClure has been at the center of the U.S. nuclear weapons/waste enterprise. From 1980-86, he was the most powerful man in Congress, not just on INEL, but on the whole Energy Department. To all appearances (and we know Senators create their own appearances), he was a friend, confidant, and ally of Don Hodel and John Herrington. Today, it's clear neither Hodel nor Herrington came close to doing their job — Watkins says they left him "a shambles." That can only mean that McClure also did not do his. Leave aside the environmental effects, which are disputed. Under McClure's economic oversight, DOE got in a mess that will cost us all some \$100 billion to clean up. Does he bear any responsibility?

The question has barely been raised in Idaho. You'd expect Republicans to avoid it. But why have Democrats (except John Peavey) and independents (except) avoided it too? Is it laziness and timidity — or is it that examining McClure's responsibility might require us to also confront our own? Let's come to that. Sen. McClure, Gov. Andrus, INEL boosters, the Snake River Alliance, and Idahoans generally all agree that nuclear waste now stored at INEL should, and will, go somewhere else. Not, we all agree, in our backyard. My friend Deanna Smith of Boise has another idea. She suggests Congress establish a new national policy — that, by and large, each state is responsible for the nuclear waste stored and generated within its borders, whether at weapons or power plants. With some exceptions, state responsibility would be the rule.

There are several reasons to take this seriously. First, it describes the reality. The WIPP site may never open. If it does, odds are good it will not take all or even most of the INEL waste destined for it. And the high-level waste repository Congress shovled down Nevada's throat may also never open; at best it will be mired in dispute for decades. Whatever our wishes, INEL's waste inventory is ours to keep, and manage, for decades to come. Second, it helps us see new projects more clearly. As we decide whether the SIS, NFR and Rocky Flats replacement should be built here, we should decide conservatively, assuming that the waste each generates will stay here. There is after all no past record supporting any other assumption. Third, I like Deanna's idea because it forces responsibility, upon Idaho and other states. Today, we welcome INEL's per-

ceived benefits, yet insist that someone else, somewhere else, deal with its perceived costs. And we blame someone else — DOE, Congress, anti-nuclear, media — when those costs press upon us. We repeat that, is the 40-year-old attitude that created the situation we are in. This summer, Idaho is beginning the INEL oversight program adopted by the last Legislature. How will the keel be laid? If Idaho and Idahoans do not adopt a stance of responsibility towards INEL — its waste and its wealth — who will? Pat Ford, Boise, is former executive director of the Idaho Conservation League and was the principle author of Idaho's new law to establish state oversight and monitoring authority over the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

Education must adapt to changes in the workplace

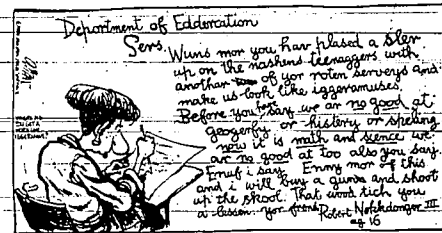
WASHINGTON — Millions of Americans are sitting in classes preparing for a workplace that is disappearing. Many find themselves in school curricula designed for assembly-line factory jobs. But all the new jobs are in services. Meanwhile, schools are preparing for Robin Williams's Dead Poets Society, not for Workforce 2000. A third of new workers are white males and a third white females. But, because most retirees are white men, only 9 percent of the net increase in the labor force between 1986 and 2000 will be white males while 56 percent will be minorities. Only about half of all high school students go on to college. One in four does not even complete high school, and the dropout rate among Hispanics approaches 50 percent. For his non-elite white half, which some call "the forgotten half," school is becoming less and less relevant. Their education does not prepare them for work in today's economy. As Al Shanker of the American Federation of Teachers reports, employers ignore courses selected and grades earned in high school when deciding who to hire. Between 1973 and 1986, the average inflation-adjusted wage of 20- to 24-year-old males with only a high school diploma fell by 28 percent. The falloff for high-school dropouts was 42 percent. Meanwhile, wages fell by only 6 percent for college graduates. Most

college graduates, however, are white. Unless the earnings of those without college educations rise, the gap between white and minority incomes will increase. Moreover, generating satisfactory economic growth will require a strong contribution from the "forgotten half." Since 1973, when the incomes of young males began to plummet, average growth of output per worker fell below 1 percent annually, meaning that the number of new workers was required to keep economic growth healthy. And that happened with the entrance of baby boom children and their mothers into the labor force. The era of rapid growth in the labor force, however, is over now. If families and the country want a high standard of living, we will have to get higher wages and more goods and services from each worker, college-educated or not. Going "back to basics" is no solution. Technology and international trade are transforming the basic skills needed in the workplace. The production process for this article no

longer includes a secretary typing from a penciled sheaf of yellow pages. Changes in technology are transforming large and small offices. A firm that supplies temporary office workers states that proofreading for meaning has replaced spelling ability as a priority secretarial skill. Yet, the school curriculum has not changed. And the National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP) finds that only 60 percent of whites, 40 percent of Hispanics and 25 percent of black 21- to 25-year-olds could find information in a news article or almanac. The factory floor has also changed. U.S. manufacturing, responding to the new focus on quality, uses statistical quality control. Even suppliers to the big firms — for example, a small company making door handles for Ford — have to grasp the principles of statistics. Yet the school curriculum keeps trigonometry while NAEP's survey finds that only 34 percent of whites, 20 percent of Hispanics and 8 percent of blacks could figure out the tip and change for a two-item restaurant meal. The Home Builders Institute is now teaching its members how to build a "smart house." A computer controls the house's temperature; ap-

pliances and compact disc audio systems. The workers need to know new digital technology. Unfortunately, the school's science department is still having them cut up frogs. Health care is the fastest-growing job market and now accounts for about 12 percent of the gross national product. Health spending consumes large chunks of the federal budget, and adds substantially to the price of all goods and services — \$300 to \$500 to the price of each car, for example. The system is loaded with new technology. Yet, 40 percent of nursing-home employees are assistants whose salaries are quite low and who often have limited literacy or English-language skills. If these workers enter the adult basic education (ABE) system, they will be urged to get their GED, a high school equivalency diploma. The relevancy of the GED material — abstract algebra, earth sciences and the like — to the high-tech medical world is scant. Meanwhile, NAEP finds that only 25 percent of whites, 7 percent of Hispanics and 3 percent of blacks can interpret a complex bus schedule. Little wonder that the dropout rate from the ABE course of study approaches 50 percent or that GED

courses go begging while tens of thousands wait to get into programs on English as a second language in Los Angeles. Education is more resistant to technology than any other sector of the economy. Offices, finance, manufacturing, housing, health, agriculture, retail and wholesale trade all are being transformed. The presses that will print newspapers in the year 2000 would shock the pressman of 1960. Yet school curricula — and their methods of delivering instruction — would hardly surprise those who studied from Poor Richard's Almanac. Curricula must be redesigned to prepare the "forgotten half" for tomorrow's workplace. Arnold Packer is a senior research fellow at the Hudson Institute.

Do you have any fire protection? If you live in town and pay property taxes, of which the city receives a nice chunk for fire protection, think about it. That's a question for the citizens of Hansen. When my house was on fire, January 10, 1989, I could not get help, as the one phone line into city hall was busy. There's one phone line for emergencies, city business, and conversations. I tried three times — still busy. As the sparks were falling down my neck, I phoned 911 and asked them to contact the Hansen Fire Department. They dispatched Twin Falls Mutual from Kimberly to my residence. My wife returned from her place of work and attempted to contact Hansen City Hall to find the line still busy. I called a Mutual from Kimberly where the ones who arrived and put out the fire. The fire truck from Hansen arrived at my residence, which is four blocks from the fire station, some 20 minutes plus after my wife arrived home; but the pump froze up and would not work so the truck was returned to the station. The city of Hansen was billed by Twin Falls Mutual, since Hansen was unable to respond and act; but the City Council refused to pay the bill. I was notified of this by mail on April 13, 53 days after the fire. This is very interesting, because if a citizen does not file a "Tort Claim" against the city for a bill within 90 days of the incident, they cannot file a suit against the city to collect the bill. If the city of Hansen, which is an incorporated city and receives your tax dollars as well as funds from government grants, is not responsible for providing a citizen with 24 hour protection or paying the bill when another fire department provides that emergency service, are they entitled to your tax dollars? Exactly what do they do with our tax dollars? What kind of a government system do we have in Hansen. Think about it. ART MITCHELL

Massage therapists honorable
Open Letter to the Twin Falls City Council and Times News: It's interesting to know that the City Council is concerning itself with "massage parlors." To our knowledge there have only been one alleged "massage parlor" in town, which reopened within two weeks of its closing after a police officer had been offered "special service for a price" by one of the employees. Now we, the undersigned, as legitimate massage therapists, are probably more concerned about the perception of our profession than anyone else. We are the ones who have to put up with the "massage parlor" wise cracks and the weirdos who have no idea what legitimate massage is all about. However, newspaper articles referring to massage parlors, masseurs, prostitution, communicable diseases, etc., by innuendo infer that anyone who does massage is suspect. Those of us performing therapeutic massage, which is becoming more and more recognized and recommended by the health industry for its therapeutic benefits, resent the implication that abuse is so widespread that all of us must be monitored, licensed, fingerprinted, checked for communicable diseases and prior felonies, etc. Why paint an honorable profession with such a broad brush because of the fact that prostitutes have called themselves "masseuse" the feminine form of masseur, a fact which seems to have escaped the Times News writer? For this reason, you will not often encounter the term "masseuse" in connection with therapeutic massage, despite its legitimacy. If these special regulations are to apply to massage therapists because of the abuses of a few, maybe we should regulate all city employees, bank personnel, anyone who has contact with the public, or handles public funds. Or perhaps we should just pass regula-

tions that punish the perpetrators rather than the innocent. This kind of obtuse thinking was responsible for a legal action which was taken against property owners, who had already dropped their lease to a porno book store; instead of against the hook store operators themselves. Now if the purpose of these regulations is to control prostitution, then perhaps that profession should be legalized so that it can be controlled by regulation. That would be better than attacking the legitimate and honorable profession of therapeutic massage and insulting everyone connected with it. There are several ways you can determine that you are dealing with a legitimate massage therapist: Membership in AMTA (American Massage Therapy Association), IMF (International Myomasotherapy Association), IMA (Idaho Myomasotherapy Association) or other recognized massage therapy organization; graduation from an approved massage school, such as our own Magic Valley Massage Institute under Mark and Susan Beck; regular daytime hours (with some leeway for the convenience of working people); referrals from friends; referrals from your doctor, chiropractor, etc. Yes, we would like to see some regulation and control over the profession of therapeutic massage to keep the citizens safe and to protect the public just as the legal, medical, architectural, engineering, and other professions have done. However, the professionals themselves can do much of the job of regulation than can politicians. Would you put your life in the hands of a doctor whose qualifications were determined by the city councilmen? Or would you trust, rather, the endorsement of the AMA and approved medical doctors. We find no fault with the City Council's own domain, but in this area, if you feel you must adopt regulations concerning professional massage therapists, please

INEL waste problem requires stance of responsibility

The pioneering cancer therapists Carl and Stephanie Simonon call the heart of their treatment "a stance of responsibility." When a woman or man with cancer accepts her own responsibility for the disease — for its origin and its course — she is in the stance from which healing begins. She is no longer a "victim;" recovery is her responsibility, not the doctor's. A stance of responsibility. I want to apply that to the Department of Energy, INEL and Idaho. Just after James Watkins was named the new U.S. Secretary of Energy, I saw a documentary on his odyssey in 1988 as chairman of the National Aids Commission. He began with the stance towards Aids and Aids patients most of us have — distant, disapproving, fearful. He ended listening to and touching dying men, talking squarely about sex, and telling us our view of Aids is adolescent avoidance, leading to a national tragedy. The program gave me hope, by re-

vealing in Admiral Watkins a strong heart, a clear mind and a deeply rooted stance of personal responsibility. The nation's nuclear weapons/waste enterprise is sick. The illness began long ago; though the steady irruption of visible symptoms is recent. And today a cacophony of doctors are making diagnoses and prescribing treatments. The illness extends well beyond the Department of Energy, but DOE is at its core. Can the agency, in its head and heart, shed the victim's armor and adopt a stance of responsibility? Its Reagan era leaders — Don Hodel and John Watkins — didn't even try. I think Watkins is trying. His challenge will be to commit to that stance — by example, discipline, support and staying power — throughout the agency.

And what about Idaho — what is our responsibility? Let's start at the top. For over a decade, Jim McClure has been at the center of the U.S. nuclear weapons/waste enterprise. From 1980-86, he was the most powerful man in Congress, not just on INEL, but on the whole Energy Department. To all appearances (and we know Senators create their own appearances), he was a friend, confidant, and ally of Don Hodel and John Herrington. Today, it's clear neither Hodel nor Herrington came close to doing his job — Watkins says they left him "a shambles." That can only mean that McClure also did not do his. Leave aside the environmental effects, which are disputed. Under McClure's economic oversight, DOE got in a mess that will cost us all some \$100 billion to clean up. Does he bear any responsibility?

The question has barely been raised in Idaho. You'd expect Republicans to avoid it. But why have Democrats (except John Peavey) and independent analysts avoided it too? Is it laziness and timidity — or is it that examining McClure's responsibility might require us to also confront our own? Let's come to that. Sen. McClure, Gov. Andrus, INEL boosters, the Snake River Alliance, and Idahoans generally all agree that nuclear waste now stored at INEL should, and will, go somewhere else. Not, we all agree, in our backyard. My friend Deanna Smith of Boise has another idea. She suggests Congress establish a new national policy — that, by and large, each state is responsible for the nuclear waste stored and generated within its borders, whether at weapons or power plants. With some exceptions, state responsibility would be the rule.

There are several reasons to take this seriously. First, it describes the reality. The WIPP site may never open. If it does, odds are good it will not take all or even most of the INEL waste destined for it. And the high-level waste repository Congress shoved down Nevada's throat may also never open; at best it will be mired in dispute for decades. Whatever our wishes, INEL's waste inventory is ours to keep, and manage, for decades to come. Second, it helps us see new projects more clearly. As we decide whether the SIS, NPR and Rocky Flats replacement should be built, we should decide conservative-generators will stay here. There is after all no past record supporting any other assumption. Third, I like Deanna's idea because it forces responsibility upon Idaho and other states. Today, we welcome INEL's per-

ceived benefits, yet insist that someone else, somewhere else, deal with its perceived costs. And we blame someone else — DOE, Congress, anti-nuclear, media — when those costs press upon us. We repeat, that is, the 40-year-old attitude that created the situation we are in. This summer, Idaho is beginning the INEL oversight program adopted by the last Legislature. How will the keel be laid? If Idaho and Idahoans do not adopt a stance of responsibility towards INEL — its waste and its wealth — who will? Education must adapt to changes in the workplace

WASHINGTON — Millions of Americans are sitting in classes preparing for a workplace that is disappearing. Many find themselves in school curricula designed for assembly-line factory jobs. But all the new jobs are in services. Meanwhile, schools are preparing for Robin Williams's dead Poets Society, not for Workforce 2000. A third of new workers are white males and a third white females. But, because most retirees are white men, only 9 percent of the net increase in the labor force between 1986 and 2000 will be white males while 56 percent will be minorities. Only about half of all high school students go on to college. One in four does not even complete high school, and the dropout rate among Hispanics approaches 50 percent. For this non-college half, which some call "the forgotten half," school is becoming less and less relevant. They work in today's economy. As Al Shanker of the American Federation of Teachers reports, employers ignore courses selected and grades earned in high school when deciding who to hire. Between 1973 and 1986, the average, inflation-adjusted wage of 20- to 24-year-old males with only a high school diploma fell by 28 percent. The falloff for high-school dropouts was 42 percent. Meanwhile, wages fell by only 6 percent for college graduates. Most

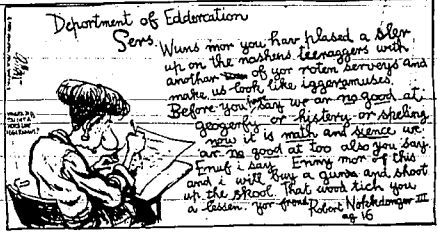
college graduates, however, are white. Unless the earnings of those without college educations rise, the gap between white and minority incomes will increase. Moreover, generating satisfactory economic growth will require a net contribution from the "forgotten half." Since 1973, when the incomes of young males began to plummet, average growth of output per worker fell below 1 percent annually, meaning that an influx of new workers was required to keep economic growth healthy. And that happened with the entrance of baby boom children and their mothers into the labor force. The era of rapid growth in the labor force, however, is over now. If families and the country want a high standard of living, we will have to get higher wages and more goods and services from each worker, college-educated or not. "Going back to basics" is no solution. Technology and international trade are transforming the basic skills needed in the workplace. The production process for this article no-

longer includes a secretary typing from a penciled sheaf of yellow pages. Changes in technology are transforming large and small offices. A firm that supplies temporary office workers states that proofreading has replaced spelling ability as a priority secretarial skill. Yet, the school curriculum has not changed. And the National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP) finds that only 60 percent of whites, 40 percent of Hispanics and 25 percent of black 21- to 25-year-olds could find information in a news article or almanac. The factory floor has also changed. U.S. manufacturing, responding to the new focus on quality, uses statistical quality control. Even suppliers to the big firms — for example, a small company making door handles for Ford — have to grasp the principles of statistics. Yet the school curriculum keeps trigonometry while NAEP's survey finds that only 34 percent of whites, 20 percent of Hispanics and 8 percent of blacks could figure out the tip and change for a two-item restaurant meal. The Home Builders Institute is now teaching its members how to build a "smart house." A computer controls the house's temperature, ap-

pliances and compact disc audio system. The workers need to know new digital technology. Unfortunately, the school's science department is still behind them cut up frogs. Health care is the fastest-growing job market and new accounts for almost 12 percent of the gross national product. Health spending consumes large chunks of the federal budget, and adds substantially to the price of all goods and services — \$300 to \$500 to the price of each car, for example. The system is loaded with new technology. Yet, 40 percent of nursing-home employees are assistants whose salaries are quite low and who often have limited literacy or English-language skills. If these workers enter the adult basic education (ABE) system, they will be urged to get "their GED," a high school equivalency diploma. The relevancy of the GED material-abstract algebra, earth sciences and the like to the high-tech medical world is scant. Meanwhile, NAEP finds that only 25 percent of whites, 7 percent of Hispanics and 3 percent of blacks can interpret a complex bus schedule. Little wonder that the dropout rate from the ABE course of study approaches 80 percent or that GED

courses go begging while tens of thousands wait to get into programs on English as a second language in Los Angeles. Education is more resistant to technology than any other sector of the economy. Offices, finance, manufacturing, housing, health, education, retail and wholesale trade all are being transformed. The process that will print newspapers in the year 2000 would shock

the pressman of 1960. Yet school curricula — and their methods of delivering instruction — would hardly surprise those who studied from . . . Poor Richard's Almanac. Twin Falls Mutual from Kimberly were the ones who arrived and put out the fire. The fire truck from Hansen arrived at my residence, which is four blocks from the fire station, some 20 minutes plus after my wife arrived home; but the pump froze up and would not work so the truck was returned to the station. The city of Hansen was billed by Twin Falls Mutual, since Hansen was unable to respond and act; but the City Council refused to pay the bill. I was notified of this by mail on April 12, 30 days after the fire. This is very interesting, because if a citizen does not file a "Tort Claim" against the city for a bill within 90 days of the incident, they cannot file a suit against the city to collect the bill. If the city of Hansen, which is an incorporated city and receives your tax dollars as well as funds from government grants, is not responsible for providing a citizen with 24 hour fire protection or paying the bill when another fire department provides that emergency service, are they entitled to your tax dollars? Senate compromises on PLO talks

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate, responding to a last-minute appeal from President Bush, on Thursday brushed aside an attempt to sharply curtail the U.S. dialogue with the Palestine Liberation Organization and adopted a less-restrictive compromise.

It first voted, 75-23, to shelve an amendment offered by Sen. Jesse Helms, R-N.C., which would have halted the U.S.-PLO talks unless the president could certify that the PLO diplomats present for such discussions had no links to terrorist activities in which Americans were killed, injured or kidnapped.

It then adopted, 97-1, a compromise offered by the chamber's bipartisan leadership which would stop the dialogue only if the president knew that one of the PLO negotiators was a direct participant in an act of terrorism, and only if Bush chose to advise Congress.

U.S. backs power transfer in Panama

WASHINGTON (AP) — Organization of American States foreign ministers, with the reluctant support of the United States, approved a declaration Thursday calling for a democratic transfer of power in Panama on Sept. 1, followed by free elections.

The ministers also extended to Aug. 23 the mandate of an OAS mediating team which has been trying to facilitate an end to the two-month-old political crisis in Panama.

The declaration was carefully crafted over two days and was as ambiguous enough to permit both the United States and the representative of Panamanian leader Gen. Manuel Antonio Noriega to join in support.

Privately, U.S. officials expressed dismay with the outcome, but Deputy Secretary of State Lawrence Eagleburger indicated in brief remarks that there were enough teeth in the declaration to warrant U.S. backing.

Uranium enrichment gets Senate OK

WASHINGTON (AP) — Over objections by consumer and environmental groups, the Senate on Thursday approved legislation designed to revitalize the government's money-losing uranium enrichment operations, which make fuel used in nuclear reactors.

The vote was 73-26. A similar bill in the House has not been voted out of committee.

The Senate measure would convert the Energy Department's uranium enrichment operations to a government corporation, a move that some consumer and environmental groups claim would amount to a \$9 billion bailout of the nuclear industry.

Lawyers try to stay killer's execution

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Defense attorneys for Hi-Fi killer William Andrews hope a federal judge will stay their client's Aug. 22 date with death, but have not ruled out returning to district court if necessary.

Robert Anderson of Salt Lake City, one of Andrews' lawyers, said Thursday he hoped that two U.S. District Court appeals will result in issuance of an injunction that will halt Andrews' planned execution next month.

Andrews, convicted in the 1974 torture-slayings of three people at the Ogden-Hi-Fi Shop, filed appeals late Wednesday that, petitioned for a writ of habeas corpus and alleged civil rights violations.

Clean air bill 'faithful' to Bush's promises

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government's top environmental official said Thursday the administration's clean air bill would be "faithful in every respect" to President Bush's promises, and indirectly criticized environmental groups that contend it has been watered down.

"There are no games," said Environmental Protection Agency Administrator William Reilly, who

dismissed environmentalists' stinging criticism as "inevitable pre-positioning" on the virtually completed legislation.

The effort to present one of Bush's major legislative initiatives in a positive light continues Friday, when the president holds a White House ceremony to announce the sending of his bill to Congress.

Environmental groups initially expressed skepticism when Bush

outlined his comprehensive proposal on June 12, but after preliminary language leaked out, the comments turned to slinging rebukes of the bill to combat urban smog, airborne toxic chemicals and acid rain.

In contrast to the environmental groups' vocal comments, industry has lobbied quietly, telling the administration — and repeating to reporters who asked — that the legislation has become too strict on

business.

A group of Republicans who appeared with Reilly Thursday at a news conference praised the bill, but kept repeating that the legislation wasn't perfect, lacking too cleanup timetables.

"The package does not pass all the tests," said Rep. Sherwood L. Boehlert, R-N.Y., who added that the bill would have been better if Bush and Reilly had written it alone.

New test shows AIDS patients possess more diseased cells

WASHINGTON (AP) — A sensitive new test shows that AIDS patients develop a reservoir of at least 1,000 times more diseased blood cells than previously believed, according to researchers at the National Institutes of Health.

Steven M. Schnittman, a researcher at the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases, a part of the NIH, said the study showed that in patients with AIDS the virus infects up to 1 percent — 1 of every 100 — of a type of blood cell called the T4 lymphocyte.

Previous studies, which made indirect measurements of the rate of infection, had determined that only 1 in every 10,000 to 100,000 of the T4 lymphocytes were infected with the virus in a patient with active AIDS, or acquired immune deficiency syndrome.

"The quantity of the virus (found in the study) was a lot higher than previously expected," Schnittman in an interview. "There are more cells infected, a greater proportion, than we knew before."

Schnittman said the PCR studies will enable scientists to plot the level of AIDS infection as a patient progresses from a point of showing no symptoms to where the disease becomes life-threatening.

In this way, he said, researchers could measure precisely the effects of drugs being tested to control or kill the AIDS virus.

More coal miners walk off as Siberian strikers get concessions

PROKOPYEVSK, U.S.S.R. (AP) — Coal miners walked off their jobs in five more regions, but the Siberian strikers who started the Soviet Union's worst labor unrest in decades were told Thursday to return to work by dawn Friday.

"We have agreed to interrupt the strike, not to end it," said Vyacheslav G. Akulov, a strike committee member in Prokopyevsk in Siberia's Kuznetsk Coal Basin.

The strike committee asked the estimated 150,000 strikers in the region to return to the pits at dawn Friday after a government and Communist Party commission

agreed to give them greater control over their industry, Akulov said. The commission also agreed to improve the miners' food, housing and working conditions.

President Mikhail S. Gorbachev has said the concessions granted the miners in the Kuznetsk region will apply to all miners nationwide. State-run TV repeated that promise Thursday night in an apparent effort to end the country's worst labor unrest since the 1920s.

Some Siberian miners have already returned to work. Tass said nine out of 11 mining centers were operating, and Prokopyevsk's

central Vostochny-Squars was empty Thursday night after nearly two weeks of rallies and demonstrations by thousands of strikers.

But the strike spread in other areas as miners raised demands similar to those of the Kuznetsk strikers, who began the walkout 10 days ago.

Miners in the northern town of Vorkuta, the Don River city of Roslavl and the Ukrainian industrial center of Dnepropetrovsk, walked out Wednesday with demands similar to those of the strike instigators in Kuznetsk, Tass reported. Dnepropetrovsk is in the

Donetsk coal basin, the nation's leading coal region.

On Thursday, more than 16,000 miners in Soviet Central Asia's Karaganda region, the country's third-largest coal field, refused to go down into the pits and were massing by the thousands for rallies, Tass and the government newspaper Ivestia reported.

Miners at three shafts in Chervonograd in the western Ukraine joined the walkout Thursday night, said Anatoly M. Dutsenko, a spokesman for the Ukrainian Helsinki Watch Group.

Official news reports did not say

how many miners were on strike nationwide. The coal industry employs more than 1 million workers.

Vorkuta workers striking at nine of the city's 13 mines asked the Kremlin for an "urgent resolution of the sharp economic and social problems of the coal sector, and also specific problems of workers of the far north," Tass said.

Miners in Roslav demanded extra pay for evening and night shifts, longer vacations and an increase in the price of coal to world market prices, the news agency reported.

Workers striking at 11 mines in

Dnepropetrovsk made 24 demands similar to those of the Kuznetsk miners, reports said.

Karaganda strikers said they walked out to protest incomplete news accounts of miners' demands in the Kuznetsk strikes, according to Tass.

The government compromised on most of the 39 demands made by the Kuznetsk miners, who walked off the job July 11. One of the biggest demands was for economic independence.

Akulov said that starting Jan. 1, the Kuznetsk coal basin will become economically autonomous.

Iran sends addicts to labor camps

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP) — About 55,000 Iranian drug addicts will be prosecuted and sent to labor camps next week upon expiration of a six-month grace period for them to kick their habit, it was reported Thursday.

The move was the second stage of an anti-narcotics crackdown launched in December to stamp out rampant drug addiction.

Law enforcement agencies will round up the addicts who have failed to overcome their addiction to send them to the labor camps to kick the habit, the Islamic Republic News Agency said in a report monitored in Cyprus.

4 die, 49 wounded in artillery duels

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Thousands of panicky civilians fled Beirut on Thursday after their neighborhoods were blasted in artillery duels between Christians and Syrians. Four people were reported killed and 49 wounded.

Tangles of flame shot up in the sky, and blasted buildings burned out of control. A police spokesman said some places were pummeled by shells at a rate of 30 a minute.

He said damage in Moslem west Beirut was much more severe than in Christian east Beirut. It was some of the heaviest shelling since the fighting broke out 18 weeks ago.

EEC opens trade talks with Soviets

BRUSSELS, Belgium (AP) — The European Economic Community said Thursday it had opened talks with the Soviet Union on a trade and economic cooperation agreement.

The two sides discussed trade, investment and economic cooperation, according to the EEC's executive commission. A further round of talks is expected in early October.

Franz Andriessen, EEC commissioner for External Relations, said in the 12-nation trade bloc wanted to conclude a 10-year agreement, which would not offer any trade concessions to the Soviet Union, but would include "most favored nation" treatment under international trade rules.

Railway workers end crippling strike

HARARE, Zimbabwe (AP) — Railroad repairmen returned to work Thursday, ending an eight day strike that crippled transport service, officials said.

About 2,000 normal workers reported for work and most others were expected to resume normal working schedules by late Thursday, a state railroad spokesman said.

More than 200 train drivers, brakemen, conductors and station staff who stopped work in sympathy with the repairmen also returned to their posts, the spokesman said.

Greeks blame fish-kill on Bulgarians

ALEXANDROUPOLEIS, Greece (AP) — "Tons of dead fish choked the Evros River on Thursday, and government officials blamed a battery factory in Bulgaria.

The river emanates from Bulgaria and serves as a frontier for Greece and Turkey.

An official of the Greek Fisheries Department in Evros province accused the Bulgarian battery factory of dumping chemical waste into the river, killing the fish.

The factory lies near the Greek-Bulgarian border and was the focus of attention last summer, when the same problem occurred.

United flight makes emergency stop

SYDNEY, Australia (AP) — A United Airlines Boeing 747 flying from Los Angeles to Sydney developed engine problems and made an emergency landing in Fiji Thursday, a newspaper said. No injuries were reported.

The Sydney Morning Herald, in its early Friday edition, did not specify the engine problems, give the flight number of the plane, or say how many passengers were aboard. The plane was scheduled to arrive in Sydney at 5 a.m.

French Resistance hero dies at 79

PARIS (AP) — Marie-Madeleine Fourcade, a French Resistance hero who was once smuggled out of the country in a mailbag to escape the Nazis, died Thursday in a Paris military hospital, friends reported. She was 79.

Mrs. Fourcade was admitted to the Val de Grace hospital on July 3. No cause of death was given.

When France fell to the Germans in 1940, rs. Fourcade and a few friends organized a resistance group called Alliance, which eventually numbered about 3,000.

Chinese begin media purge

BEIJING — China's hard-line rulers have begun a most sweeping purge of Communist Party newspapers, magazines and broadcast outlets since the billing power struggles of Mao Tse-tung's Cultural Revolution began two decades ago.

The purge is deeply permeated with a theme of revenge against journalists who reported factually about the student-led, pro-democracy demonstrations and in many cases joined them.

Three party-sponsored publications have been closed and scores — perhaps hundreds — of reporters and editors have been dismissed, demoted or otherwise disciplined, Chinese sources reported Thursday.

Thought-control squads, backed by armed soldiers, have been detaining journalists for questioning, singly or a few at a time; almost daily since early last week, the sources said. The teams often pick the journalists up from their homes at night if they cannot find them at their offices during the day, the sources said.

The entire senior editing staffs of two of the most influential Communist Party dailies in Beijing are under investigation, preparation for wholesale reorganization of their top power structures, one Chinese journalist reported.

The purge, the sources said, extends into all branches of party-controlled news reporting, including newspapers, magazines, wire services, television and radio.

"This time it's the real thing," one Chinese source said. "They are out to force a complete reversal of the direction the press has taken for the past 10 years, and at the top they know very clearly who they plan to get rid of. All they are doing now is building their cases and finding out who they should sack in the middle and lower ranks."

Soviet political problems put space program in doubt

MOSCOW (AP) — As President Bush announced U.S. plans Thursday for a manned outpost on Mars and sending astronauts to Mars, the Soviet Union is trying to come to grips with financial and political problems in its space program.

The Soviets, like the Americans, have considered a manned mission to Mars and have laid the groundwork with long-duration space station missions designed to test whether cosmonauts could withstand a long journey to the planet.

But as Bush marked the 20th anniversary of the Apollo-11 landing, Moscow is trying to decide whether it can afford expensive missions that once were routine.

Those included the launches of the first satellite, Sputnik 1, in 1957, and the first man in space, Yuri Gagarin, in 1961.

Once touted as proof of the superiority of socialism, a source of national pride and a sacred cow, the Soviet space program has now been criticized under President Mikhail S. Gorbachev's policy of

"glasnost," or openness.

With chronic shortages of everything from toothpaste to housing, Soviets are wondering whether the \$2.38 billion spent on the manned space program since 1966 is worthwhile.

Already, Soviet legislators looking for ways to cut a \$162 billion budget deficit have suggested slashing space spending.

In part for economic reasons, the orbital platform Mir — the showcase of the Soviet space program designed as the first building block of a permanently manned space station — has been without a crew since April.

Cosmonauts are not scheduled to re-enter the station until late August.

Adding fuel to the controversy were the November launch of the space shuttle Buran, whose development cost \$10 billion; the loss in September and March of two unmanned Mars probes, Phobos I and II, at a cost of a half-billion dollars; and embarrassing delays caused by technical problems and human error in the

landings of two crews from Mir last year.

Opposition also grew when Soviet space officials hungry for foreign currency chose a Japanese TV reporter, and not a Soviet who could only pay rubles, for the first commercial trip to Mir.

After 15 free flights with international crews, the Soviets are starting to charge foreign crews that want to travel to Mir, at a cost of \$10 million to \$12 million a shot.

The Soviet space agency Glavkosmos also is seeking foreign customers for satellite launching and hopes to sell crystals grown in Mir's zero-gravity for use in electronics. It also hopes to sell medicines manufactured on the space station.

The Japanese mission and a flight by an Austrian cosmonaut are scheduled for 1990 or 1991. An entirely privately financed trip, the first Briton in space is to accompany two cosmonauts to Mir in 1991.

As for the Buran, officials have not announced when it will fly again.

Jerome man faces check fraud, cocaine charges

JEROME—A Jerome man was arrested this week on four separate charges involving forged checks and cocaine possession, Jerome police reported Thursday.

Jose Luis Cortez, 24, was arrested Tuesday evening shortly after leaving Smith's Food King in Jerome, said Detective Don Magleby of the Jerome Police Department.

A Food King employee had reported that a man had tried to cash a forged check previously reported as stolen, police said. The check had been reported stolen from a local business while still blank, said Magleby, one of the arresting officers. Police also seized nearly half an ounce of cocaine with a street value of \$800-\$1,000, Magleby said.

Cortez was being held Thursday in the Jerome County Jail in lieu of \$25,000 bond, Magleby said. He has been charged with attempting to pass a forged check, possession of a forged check, possession of stolen property and possession of cocaine with intent to deliver.

Coroner to study shooting death of Boise man

PRAIRIE—A coroner's inquest will be conducted into the death of a Boise man who was shot over the weekend while fishing in Elmore County.

Stephen Jensen, 31, died at 9:30 p.m. Saturday when he was hit in the head by a .38-caliber bullet while walking in Smith's Creek, three miles north of the town of Prairie. The shot was fired by another Boise man who was target shooting nearby, Elmore County Sheriff's Detective Tom Berry said.

The man who fired the shot, whose name was not disclosed, had been shooting at cans attached to a tree. Jensen was about 115 feet away when the shot was fired, but was nearly impossible to see "through the thick vegetation."

Jensen's body was found about a half-hour later by other campers. The inquest may not begin for another two weeks, Berry said.

First Security Corp. reports 6-year-high earnings

BOISE—First Security Corp., parent company of First Security Bank of Idaho, this week reported income for the second quarter was the highest in 6 and a half years.

The bank earned \$107.7 million in the second quarter, up 5.4 percent from the \$7.04 million earned in 1988's second quarter, announced James E. Phelps, bank chairman.

Stockholders' equity climbed to \$399.01 million from \$374.20 million a year ago.

State board strips Shoshone jail of certification

SHOSHONE—The jail here can no longer hold prisoners for extended periods of time.

The Jail Standards Committee of the Idaho Sheriff's Association has decertified the county's two-cell jail as a short-term facility. The decision means the county can only keep prisoners while arrangements are made for their transfer to other jails.

In a letter to the commissioners, signed by jail standards coordinator Judy Felton of Twin Falls, the committee cites the "present staffing levels" at the jail as the reason for loss of certification. The staff cannot "adequately monitor prisoners in the

jail," the letter states.

The county has a three-man force, plus a dispatcher on a floor separate from the jail, and cannot monitor prisoners 24 hours a day.

Further complicating the picture for Lincoln County is the committee's recommendation that Lincoln County Sheriff Darwin Mills not use the Gooding County jail, which is under investigation for alleged poor conditions. Lincoln County has primarily used the Gooding jail, which charges relatively low fees, for its prisoners.

The Lincoln County commissioners are unsure how the committee's action will affect the county. Mills, at their request, is

preparing a written assessment of the county's needs and his proposals for dealing with the problem.

The decision to prevent use of the jail is "really quite a problem," Mills said. The jail was certified as a 72-hour holding facility but standards committee recommends not holding prisoners even two days. Finding space in other Magic Valley jails and then transporting prisoners to them is adding "hours and expense" to his operation, he said.

"I just don't have the manpower to spend the time necessary to take prisoners to Blaine County or Twin Falls," as well as shuttle the prisoners to court or work-release sites, Mills said.

Mills disagrees with the committee's recommendation that he not use the Gooding jail. "Lincoln and Gooding County have a good working relationship, going other places can be more expensive and take even more time."

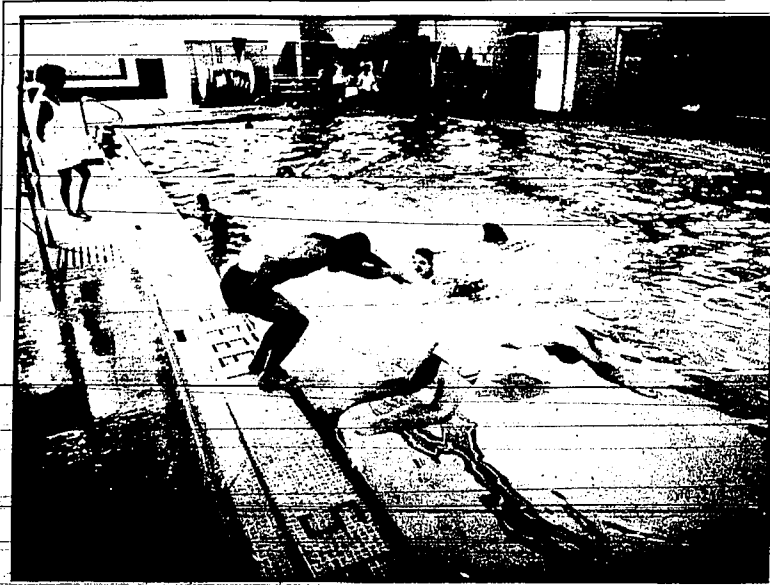
It costs Lincoln County about \$15 a day to house prisoners at the Gooding facility, about half what other county's charge, according to county records.

Ironically, the jail is located in the 1904 vintage Lincoln County Courthouse, which was built specifically to address a jail facilities problem.

The first permanent building was a lava rock jailhouse. The facility, built in the 1880s, replaced the railroad's holding cell, a hole in the ground next to the railroad right-of-way where prisoners could be easily guarded by a couple of armed men.

By the turn-of-the-century the jail, which used straw ticks for sleeping mats, was unsanitary and had been the site of several prisoner caused fires.

The county commissioners, concerned about liability, built the courthouse in 1904. Over the years the jail was moved from the top floor to the basement and now contains just two cells.

Using a specialized services approach, the YFCA hopes to regain swimmers to its indoor pool

The 'Y' hopes to find new niche

TWIN FALLS—Responding to a nosedive in swimming attendance at the YFCA since the city's pool opened, the service group's leaders hope to find a new niche.

"We anticipated it happening," said John Eschenburg, director of the YFCA. "We're looking for something a little more complementary for the city."

The Y is looking at how it can provide activities that do not conflict with activities already provided by private businesses or the city, Eschenburg said.

Since the city's pool opened on June 1, the number of YFCA afternoon swimmers

dropped to 15. Last summer the Y had between 30 and 70 kids each afternoon.

The number of swimming class students also dropped about 40 percent, Eschenburg said.

To compensate for revenue losses, YFCA administration laid off two full-time workers and it reduced the number of classes it offers.

Eschenburg said he promoted the city's new pool even though he expected it to have an impact on the Y. The pool's opening only means he can branch out into more specialized services.

He said the YFCA will likely offer more unique classes including one people with disabilities. It will cater more to special-interest groups like summer schools and

Boy Scout troops.

However, the service group will continue to offer swimming lessons, Eschenburg said.

Some kids prefer indoor lessons, which guarantee them 84-degree water and a warm exit. Because the classes are smaller at the YFCA, the children receive more individual instruction, he said.

In an indirect way the city pool, by introducing more children to the joy of swimming, could contribute to the number of children who decide to take winter swimming classes, he said.

The YFCA will also likely extend its day camp program, a summer day-care service that includes swimming, from four weeks to 12, he said.

Shoshone's year-long history project wraps up

SHOSHONE—The year-long Idaho Perspectives Project here ends Saturday with a community potluck supper.

The project, titled "A View of the Future Through the Traditions of the Past," began last July and was designed to help the community recognize values in its history that can be used to help economic growth.

"I wanted it to be something we did with, and for the community, something that would be of lasting benefit to the community," said Bob McCarl, of the Idaho Commission on the Arts, who designed and directed the project.

The project examined the traditions of

resource-based communities to discover ways to acquaint the community with its roots and use those traditions for economic development.

A community supper was selected as the final project event because historical research showed this type of event is traditional in the area. The supper is open to the public and will begin at 6:30 p.m. in Shoshone's Mary L. Gooding Memorial Park. Participants should bring a covered dish, dinner service and drink.

In addition to the community gathering, the event will include a panel discussion featuring McCarl, an economic planner and Jim Geuntry, College of Southern Idaho history instructor who is serving as the

project evaluator. The panel will explain the results of the project and offer ways to use the materials.

Also at the supper, the project collection, a group of more than 150 hours of tape recorded oral history, several original documents and more than 100 photographs, will be presented to the Shoshone Public Library as research materials.

A project index has also been prepared for the Idaho Ethnic Heritage Project to be used as part of that group's Centennial publication. The project tabloid, a published document featuring anecdotes and photographs from the project collection will be presented to the public, without charge, at Saturday's supper.

Local officials say the project has taught area residents more about the history and contributions Shoshone and surrounding areas have made to the development of southern Idaho.

Shoshone Mayor Tim Ridinger says he's noticed a more positive outlook among area residents and businessmen.

An Idaho Historic Marker detailing Shoshone's role as a historic railroad since 1885 and pointing out the town's special lava rock architecture is being prepared for placement this summer on U.S. Highway 93 just south of the city limits and a walking tour of the city's historic sites is being prepared by the county Centennial committee for distribution next spring.

The feud is over: local vets settle out of court

TWIN FALLS—Two local veterinarians who have been feuding over a pair of buildings for more than a year have ended their legal battle by settling out of court.

The dismissal of Dr. Robert Monroe's suit against Dr. David Stafford and of Stafford's counterclaim against Monroe came after months of legal wrangling and complaints of harassment from both veterinarians and their families.

Under terms of the settlement, Monroe was given back property he sold to Stafford in August 1978, said Randy Stoker, Monroe's attorney. Other details of the settlement are confidential, Stoker said.

"We're just glad it's settled," Monroe said. Although he refused to discuss details of the deal, Monroe said he was satisfied with the outcome.

Stafford declined to comment. Stafford's lawyer, Edward Lawson of Ketchum, could not be reached.

The case was dismissed with prejudice by 5th District Judge Daniel Mechl, meaning it cannot be refiled, thus closing the book on a bitter 16-month legal battle stemming from two buildings Stafford bought from Monroe nearly 11 years ago.

The buildings, located at 122 Trade St. off Kimberly Road, formerly housed the Magic Valley Large Animal Clinic. Stafford bought the buildings for nearly \$88,000 but stopped making payments when he still

owed \$71,500, according to court documents. On March 7, 1988, Monroe sued to foreclose on the two buildings. Three weeks later, Stafford filed a counterclaim, accusing Monroe of breaching their contract and making disparaging remarks about Stafford's business practices.

The claim also blamed Monroe for the poisoning death of Stafford's Arabian stallion and accused him of breaking into Stafford's new offices at least three times during 1987.

Those incidents were only part of a slew of harassment complaints that began flowing into the Twin Falls County Sheriff's Department from the Monroe and Stafford families in February, 1987.

Stafford's business was robbed; Monroe's

dog was shot. Stafford's horse was poisoned and killed; sugar was poured into the gas tank of Monroe's truck. Stafford received threatening phone calls; two of Monroe's rodeo horses were poisoned, although they eventually survived.

A string of incidents went unreported by the sheriff's department, and things have been quiet for several months, said Chief Deputy Harold Jensen.

Monroe confirmed the incidents stopped several months ago.

At the time, each man said he was suspicious of the other while denying any involvement in the incidents.

Both parties are anxious to put the whole affair behind them, Stoker said. "We want this one buried," he said.

Eying dust causing problems

RUPERT - Some residents here say dirt and sand are blowing across a highway and making life generally miserable.

About 25 angry residents of Simpson's Mobile Home Park told the City Council this week abnormal amounts of dirt and sand are blowing across Highway 24 from Rolling Jones Potato Co. into the yards, cars and homes.

"I've been shoveling the dirt off my walks all day," said Oneta Burgess, spokeswoman for the group. "Dirt is six inches deep in some places, she said."

The delegation stated that the

problem was not confined to windy days, but occurred on calm days as well.

"We keep our windows open because of the heat," Terrie Durmuss said. "The dust and dirt blows in on a daily basis."

Residents said they were concerned about internal and external damage to their vehicles, respiratory problems among seniors, harm to plants and shrubs, damage to the sewer system due to sandy run-off and general irritation.

Company official Roger Jones on Thursday refused comment on the matter.

Mayor Bill Whittom said the company has cooperated with the city in trying to reduce the problem

when it has arisen in the past. He will try to set up a meeting among residents and company and city officials.

The city tried to keep the sand and dirt down, but the city's sweepers cannot keep up, Whittom said.

GOODING - One of the oldest hotels in the area has become a bed and breakfast.

Else Bogger's Traveler's Rest was the "Gooding Hotel," originally called the Kelly Hotel when built in 1905 by William Kelly, and then remodeled and renamed in 1936.

Bogger acquired the hotel several years ago and has been operating it with apartments. She said she had hoped to have a hotel-type arrangement but has had very little over-night traffic.

The inn, whose grand opening is 7 p.m. Saturday, has two bed and breakfast rooms available with a potential for six more. Bogger will serve a fresh continental breakfast and plans to add ethnic sweateads and other specialties at a later time.

Other plans include two hostel rooms which she describes as "bunk-style" accommodations at lower rates. "These are very popular, especially with younger travelers in

Europe," she explained.

The inn will also include a tearoom where Bogger plans to serve afternoon tea. The room can be available for receptions and small meetings by appointment.

"One room of the spacious main floor has been converted into a specialty boutique called "From the Heart of Idaho" where local artisans sell their unique Idaho handicrafts and baked goods.

Bogger is an Idahoist instructor and also maintains a visitors center in the inn lobby. "This is a fascinating area and I love to tell people about it," she said.

Hospitals feud over expensive machine

MOSCOW, Idaho (AP) - Gritman Memorial Hospital at Moscow has gone ahead and wire plans to bring a mobile magnetic resonance imaging (MRI) unit to Moscow without consulting with hospital officials at Pullman, Wash., eight miles away.


"I'm not comfortable with the way this happened," said a disgruntled Pullman Memorial Hospital administrator Tom Newhof on Wednesday. "I thought we were going to at least talk."

But Gritman's decision to go solo on the mobile unit shouldn't end talks for a jointly operated permanent MRI facility, said Bob Colvin, Moscow hospital administrator.

Gritman's board of directors decided last week to sign a contract with Mobile Technology Inc., a California company that leases portable MRI units housed in semi-trailers. The unit will be at Gritman one day a week at a cost that Pullman officials peg at \$5,000 a day. Gritman officials have declined to

provide cost figures.

MRI is the next step in imaging technology beyond computerized tomography (CT) scanning. Area orthopedic surgeons say they now refer 10-12 patients a month to Spokane and Lewiston hospitals for MRI scans.

Will Idaho Lottery draw northern Utahns?

LOGAN, Utah (AP) — Only a few miles separate many northern Utah cities from Idaho and, as of Wednesday, the Idaho lottery.

Indeed, retailers in Franklin County, Idaho, which opened the lottery in last November's election by a nearly 5:1 margin, say Utahns seem more interested in playing the game than do local residents.

There are five lottery ticket outlets in the Franklin County community of Preston, and proprietors say the lottery has been a popular subject among visitors from the state. "We see a lot of customers from Utah buying fishing and hunting licenses," said Mary Ranson who works in a Preston country store. "Almost everyone who has bought a license or bait has had questions about the lottery."

"It will be really interesting to

see just how many more Utahns we get up here — since we've taken on beer sales on Sundays. You cannot believe the growth we have had in business due to Logan people," said Vicki Martin, a convenience store cashier.

Because the sale of beer and liquor was illegal in Cache County on Sundays, residents there had to travel to Brigham City or Swan Lake, Idaho, in Franklin County, she added.

However, Logan City and Cache County officials don't see much northern Utah support for the lottery. Logan Mayor Newell Daines said he doubts the game will be much of a draw for his constituents.

"Those who want to gamble may go, but I don't think there will be many," he said.

"I think it is a long way to go to

buy a lottery ticket," added Cache County Director of Economic Development Bobbie Coray, who said there probably won't be much local money spent on tickets, although interest may rise if advertising increases in the area.

Several residents said they may purchase game tickets while in Idaho, but few claimed an interest in driving to Idaho border towns to buy them.

"I don't think people will play the Idaho lottery. It's something we're not oriented toward. It's totally removed from us, something that happens back east," said Rhonda Roos of Logan.

"It's sort of a novelty," said Todd Nelson. "I don't think people will go out of their way to buy a lottery ticket ... I think they will play while buying gas or goods."

Lottery commission expects \$25 million from first-day sales

Winners of the largest prizes in Idaho's new lottery continued to trickle in on Thursday as state officials expressed optimism about the number of first-day sales.

The awarding of a lottery check to Linda Park, the state's first \$5,000 winner Wednesday and an Idaho Falls elementary school teacher, shows what a benefit the lottery proceeds will have on education, Lottery Director Wally Hedrick said.

"I'm very happy that this check is going to a school teacher," Hedrick said. "If it doesn't do anything for the low salaries for teachers, I don't know what will."

The Lottery Commission expected about \$25 million in sales the first year and an income of \$6.4 million to be split evenly between the school building fund and the Permanent Building Fund.

"I can guarantee a lot will go back into school supplies," Ms.

Park said of her winnings.

"I scratched off the first \$5,000 and said, 'I can handle that,'" she said. Idaho Match 3 rules dictate that the card must have three of any dollar figure to win. "I scratched off the second one and said 'Okay.' When I came up with the third I was in total shock," she said.

Hedrick was shooting for about \$1 million in sales the first 24 hours and anticipated announcing those figures on Friday. He estimated between \$750,000 and \$1 million were sold between Wednesday and Thursday morning, but decided to wait until Monday to say how many tickets were purchased that first day.

"I would have been happy with half a million," he said. While most states enter into their second game in about six to eight months, Idaho may be able to kick off its second instant-winner game in a month to 45 days, Hedrick said.

Kentucky still holds the record

of the largest per capita first-day sales of \$1.39 per person. But Hedrick said states with high sales the initial day usually saw an overwhelming majority for the lottery in their elections. Idaho passed its lottery by only about 15,000.

One \$5,000 winner had some difficulties when he drove to Boise to pick up his winnings.

Forest Tuckness of Dubois reportedly was in a traffic accident Thursday on his way to the Lottery offices in Boise, spokeswoman Kathy Showers said. He sustained some minor injuries and heavily damaged his vehicle, but was able to secure his \$5,000 check just the same.

One of the six \$5,000 winners by Thursday afternoon was a Salt Lake City stockbroker, while a member of a new crew from that city won \$600, Hedrick said. Retail outlets in Franklin County on the Utah border report strong sales of lottery tickets to Utah visitors.

Dry lightning sparks more fires in western, central Idaho

Fire bosses dropped smokejumpers onto dozens of lightning-spawned spot fires Thursday as another dry-lightning storm began sweeping across western and central Idaho.

"We've got lots of fire," said Dave Olson of the Payette National Forest, where an early morning storm sparked 60 new fires in the western and northern sectors of the 2.3 million forest in western Idaho.

"And we have a big thunder cell that's doing new fires in the south." Four smokejumpers turned in just 15 minutes. "We're scrambling right now to attack these new starts. Our resources are getting stretched a bit."

At least 70 firefighters were manning nearly 40 of the Payette blazes, and manpower was strung

out on a score of other fires in the Boise, Nez Perce and Challis national forests as temperatures remained in the high 80s and 90s. Two dozen firefighters were battling 10 blazes in the Boise.

The demand for smokejumpers to attack the blazes while they were still less than an acre each had depleted the manpower at the McCall smokejumper base, and fire bosses were seeking additional smokejumpers from other states. Ground crews throughout the region were placed on alert to step in if any blazes got out of hand.

Aerial tankers were bombarding some of the blazes with chemical retardant.

Although most of the fires were small, under new government guidelines as many as possible were being fought to avoid a recurrence of the devastation that occurred last

year across much of the West.

In the Nez Perce National Forest north of the Salmon River, smokejumpers were on five small spot fires, including two in the Selway-Bitterroot Wilderness. But fire bosses were focusing their attention on a five-acre blaze in rugged terrain just north of the river in the Gospel Hump Wilderness.

Five loads of retardant had already been dumped on that blaze, burning in the Salmon River Breaks just south of Johnson Butte, and spokeswoman Eli McKenzie said a 20-man fire crew was being helicoptered into the area to begin ground assault.

To the east in the Challis National Forest, eight smokejumpers finally controlled a spot fire in the Frank Church River of No Return Wilderness west of Challis.

New Florida gun law would not be feasible in Idaho, Jones says

POCATELLO (AP) — A Florida law that would jail gun owners who failed to keep loaded firearms secure may not be feasible in Idaho, despite the recent accidental shooting deaths of two Bannock County boys, Attorney General Jim Jones says.

He instead suggested a state education program involving law enforcement and sportsmen groups to teach people to lock up their guns. Jones said he would spearhead such a program.

Andrew Eldredge, 6, died Wednesday in a Chubbuck home, after he was accidentally shot by a 27-year-old boy. Authorities said the teen-ager was showing the 30.06 rifle to the victim and thought it was unloaded.

In June, 10-year-old Billy Little died from a head wound after a 16-

year-old neighbor shot him with a rifle while playing with the gun. The older youth faces an involuntary manslaughter charge.

Idaho, unlike Florida, imposes few restrictions on firearms. Municipalities also do not have the authority to set rules controlling firearms.

The Florida statute says that adults who fail to secure a loaded gun which is used by a minor in an accidental shooting could be charged with a felony and sentenced to five years in prison and fined \$5,000. It also is a misdemeanor if a minor displays a gun or threatens someone with it.

"If the state should ever consider legislation regulating firearms including a provision to jail gun owners, it should be done only after a careful and thorough review of the

problems," Jones said. "Rushing into any gun control proposal might only compound the problems."

Accidental shootings are the fifth-leading cause of death of American children under age 14.

"I seriously doubt the city would undertake a move to enact such an ordinance because it would have to be too specific and we don't have the manpower for enforcement," Pocatello Police Capt. Travis Wilhelm said.

"These kinds of incidents are so damned unnecessary but yet, it's almost impossible to regulate responsibility because any good firearm user knows to secure a weapon so kids can't get hold of it and misuse the weapon," Bannock County Undersheriff Bill Lynn said.

Boisean chosen for WIPP panel

BOISE (AP) — Boise attorney Newal Saugrey will be Idaho's representative on a five-member Department of Energy oversight group working on issues involving the Waste Isolation Pilot Plant in New Mexico.

The group will advise Energy Secretary James Watkins on environmental and operational issues concerning the plant, near Carlsbad. It is intended as a repository for nuclear waste, such as the radioactive material which has been stored at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory for decades.

The appointment was announced Thursday by Gov. Cecil Andrus. Andrus said Watkins asked the governors of New Mexico, Colorado and Idaho to appoint a delegate, and the secretary will appoint two others.

Shepard receives posthumous honor

BOISE (AP) — The late Allan Shepard, a 20-year veteran of the Idaho Supreme Court before he died of a heart attack May 27, has been given a posthumous state award for court administration.

The Kramer Award, named in honor of a former district judge at Hailey, Douglas Kramer, was presented Wednesday to Donna Shepard, the judge's widow, at the Idaho Judicial Conference at Elmore.

The administrative director of the courts, Carl Bianchi, said the selection committee decided Shepard should be honored because "his untimely death should not be allowed to diminish in any way recognition of his contributions and accomplishments."

Court limits bar exam requirements

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Bar Commission may bar someone from taking the Idaho bar examination only by issuing specific findings of fact and conclusions of law, the Supreme Court says.

The court on Thursday unanimously overturned the Bar Commission's refusal to allow Forrest L. Dexter to take the Idaho bar examination, required before a lawyer can practice in Idaho.

Dexter, 42, a member of the Washington State Bar and a graduate of the Gonzaga University School of Law, applied in 1987 to sit for the Idaho bar exam.

Opinion approves lobbying efforts

BOISE (AP) — There's nothing wrong with the Association of Idaho Cities and the Idaho Association of Counties, funded with dues from cities and counties, using that money to lobby the Idaho Legislature, an attorney general's opinion says.

Two conservative Republican state representatives, Myron Jones of Malad and Ron Vieselmeyer, Coeur d'Alene, asked Attorney General Jim Jones whether lobbying, in essence funded by public funds, is a proper use of tax money.

The opinion, prepared by Deputy Attorney General Daniel Chadwick, cited court rulings that it is.

Collision at Fort Hall kills 2 people

FORT HALL (AP) — Two people have been killed in a collision at an intersection on the Fort Hall Indian Reservation, the Idaho State Police reported.

The victims in Wednesday's crash were identified as Dyzell Mary Evening, 27, of Fort Hall and Columbo Cerino, 76, also of Fort Hall.

Quayle applauds flag respect drive

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — Vice President Dan Quayle has applauded a Coeur d'Alene newspaper's effort to encourage respect for the American flag.

In a letter to the Coeur d'Alene Press this week, Quayle called the effort "inspiring."

The newspaper has urged local residents to fly their flags Friday in protest of the U.S. Supreme Court decision that flag-burning is a legitimate form of political expression.

FDA order keeps drink locked up

BOISE (AP) — Thousands of bottles of a barley nutritional drink made by a Nampa manufacturer remain under house arrest by order of the Food and Drug Administration.

The agency filed a civil complaint July 6 in U.S. District Court against American Image Marketing Inc., maker of Barley Green. The green liquid made from barley is sold as a nutritional aid, but has not been promoted as therapeutic since July 1988, said Don Peterson of the FDA in Seattle.

Symms raps DOE chief over compromise

WASHINGTON — Sen. Steve Symms, R-Idaho, criticized Energy Secretary James D. Watkins Wednesday for accepting a House compromise funding proposal for the Special Isotope Separator.

By accepting a House Armed Services Committee plan to slash the funding request for SIS site preparation at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory in Idaho Falls, Watkins undermined efforts in the Senate Armed Services Committee to get back some of the funding, Symms said in an interview.

The Bush Administration's \$115 million request for site development for the plutonium refinery

was pared down to \$10 million by both the House committee and the Senate Armed Services Committee.

Symms said pro-SIS forces in the Senate could have pushed for more site preparation fund if Watkins had fought the House committee proposal.

"I feel that Admiral Watkins and the Energy Department should never have agreed to the House compromise," Symms said. "They should have said they had to have the \$115 million and stood their ground. And I think they would have got it. But by accepting the House compromise, they undercut us here in the Senate."

The Senate committee removed a House plan to freeze SIS site preparation, but it cut \$10 million

off the House recommendation to spend \$90 million for SIS research and development.

Despite the cuts in development funds, the Senate committee proposal is better for SIS because it allows site preparation, Symms said. "If we get started on site preparation, you demonstrate that you're moving forward," the Caldwell Republican said. "If all you do is study things, you never build anything."

Symms added that if construction begins on the project within the next year, SIS could be active by 1996.

But he acknowledged that the plan still faces a number of obstacles. Senators Edward Kennedy, D-Mass., and Carl Levin, D-Mich., are expected to challenge the current proposal in the full Senate.

Andrus, McClure resume campaign for Gem wild area plan

WASHINGTON — Idaho Gov. Cecil Andrus and Sen. James McClure, R-Idaho, told lawmakers Thursday the time is now or never for passage of an Idaho wilderness bill.

If Congress does not approve a wilderness bill, the fate of thousands of acres of Idaho forest will be resolved by federal judges ruling on an endless stream of land use litigation, Andrus said.

"Something has to pass this year to bring a resolution," Andrus said. McClure and Andrus pushed for approval of the

Idaho Forest Management Act of 1989, better known as the Idaho Wilderness bill, during a hearing held Thursday by the Senate public-lands, national parks and forest subcommittee.

"It is time we finally bring a degree of certainty to the management of these areas," McClure said. "Further delay will only result in the courts making the land management decisions that the Congress and the government land managers should have the courage to make."

The wilderness bill died in the Senate last year but McClure reintroduced it for consideration this

session. The bill was drafted as a bipartisan agreement between McClure and Andrus, a Democrat.



The proposal would designate approximately 1.4 million acres of Idaho national forest land as wilderness areas and would place management restrictions on an additional 761,000 acres.

These sites would be added to the 3.9 million acres in Idaho already labeled as wilderness areas. After those were set aside, the remaining 7 million roadless acres of Idaho forest would be released for multiple uses.

SHOSHONE — Top-seeded Buhl moved within one win of qualifying for the state "B" American Legion baseball tournament by defeating Wood River 14-5 in the second round of the Southern Region "B" tourney here Thursday.

In Thursday's first-round games, Twin Falls whipped Idaho Falls 9-1 behind the four-hit pitching of right-hander Matt Horner and Poacello hammered 14 hits in striking out Rebel left-hander Mark Knip.

It was the 15th straight victory for Buhl, now 26-9, which hasn't lost a game since dropping a doubleheader to Twin Falls in Buhl on the fourth of July.

The Indians will play the winner of this morning's 9:30 second-round game between second-seeded Poacello (32-13) and third-seeded Twin Falls (35-18) in the tournament semifinals here Saturday afternoon.

The district championship will be settled Sunday, with the top two finishers and host Twin Falls earning the right to advance to the state "B" in Twin Falls next week.

Obscure Briton leads at Troon

TROON, Scotland — Wayne Stephens, an obscure English pro, held a surprise lead but it was the American influence that favored the first round of the British Open.

There were hamburgers on sale in the tented village that follows the Royal Troon links along the Firth of Clyde.

There was American weather — warm, sunny, short-sleeve-summer weather — as opposed to the wind, rain and cold that so often follows this tournament to Scotland.

There were American-type scores; dozens of red numbers indicating subpar totals, blaring from the scoreboard.

And — most important of all — a large portion of the big board-listing the leaders was made up of American names.

Some of them were not completely familiar to the swarming, sunburned gallery of golf-mad Scots. But then, neither was that of Wayne Stephens.

The 28-year-old Stephens, who hasn't come close to winning a tournament in an 11-year career on and off the European tour, played the round of his life in a 6-under-par 66 that gave him a share of the course record and a two-stroke lead.

Stephens, who hasn't finished higher than 15th in his career, was a distant 16th among the European money-winners last year, has a best finish of 22nd this season and has made seven tries at the European Tour's qualifying school.

While his late rush — birdies from 12 and 18 feet on the 13th and 15th holes — put him clear of the field it was the American presence that dominated the first-day play.

Old pro Lee Trevino led the way as Americans, some of them mightily miffed by British press pronouncements of doom, took five of the first 16 places and accounted for 13 of the 41 men who broke par in a massive assault on a course robbed of its natural defenses by the absence of wind.

Trevino, a rejuvenated 49-year-old who hasn't won in five years, one-putted the last five holes in a round of 68 that put him in a seven-way tie for second with Spaniards Jose Maria Olazabal and Miguel Martin, Eduardo Romero of Argentina, Wayne Grady of Australia and Americans Paul Azinger and Fred Couples.

Tom Watson, whose fifth British Open victory in 1983 was the last by an American, scored an eagle-three and

Tyson rated 12-to-1 favorite over Williams tonight

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. — Mike Tyson is nervous about The Truth.

The 23-year-old heavyweight champion, however, says he is nervous before all of his fights, not just his title defense against Carl "The Truth" Williams on Friday night.

"You get a little jittery," Tyson said. "You feel this way for your first fight and for your 101st fight."

The scheduled 12-round bout at the Convention Center will be Tyson's 37th. He has a 36-0 record, with 32 knockouts.

"He was a 12-1 favorite to remain unbeaten.

Some of Tyson's opponents have been

nervous to the point of intimidation.

"The 23-year-old Williams appeared relaxed at the official weigh-in early Thursday morning at the Trump Plaza.

His moment of truth, however, won't come until the opening bell at about 10 p.m. when Tyson will come charging toward him.

"I'm sure he'll be aggressive early on,"

Williams said. "After that it's my show."

The challenger, whose ability to take a punch is questionable, also indicated that his fight plan is not strictly a defensive one.

"You've got to take a chance in there," he said. "No matter what happens, you can bet on one thing — I'll take a chance."

"I don't see anything he can do to win the fight," Tyson said.

There's a sucker born every minute in Oregon's lottery

Once again we turn gratefully to our sovereign sister to the west, the state of Oregon, for a brand new definition of the word lottery.

First, you must remember that it is Oregon that loves the spotted owl to the point of demanding no old-growth timber harvest anywhere in the state — but at the same time has absolutely no qualms in taking as much as 55 percent "incidental catch" of Idaho's steelhead and throwing them in "Pacific King Salmon" cans for public consumption.

The newest thing they've put out for public consumption is this definition of "lottery."

In this Oregon lottery, one can — using the point-spread as outlined from Las Vegas or Reno — select four to 14 National Football League games on a Sunday and make his own "lottery."

This is uniquely Oregon psychology because in all other 49 United States, this type of "lottery" is called a parlay. This is football betting at its wicked worst or best,

as the case may be.

Place it with a legal bookie in Nevada or the myriad illegal bookies in every other state. It will be called a parlay, believe us.

Now to prove the dedication to education — that panacea that allows even the most anti-gaming mind in the nation to perhaps rationalize lotteries — Oregon has stipulated that if you make a four-way parlay (oops, lottery); and if you hit that lottery within the specified point-spread parameters, the state of Oregon will reward you with eight-to-one payback.

Here again we find the naive of the average Oregon lottery producer extends well beyond even the casual football parlay

player because there isn't a bookie, legal or illegal, who won't pay 10 to 1 on a four-way parlay.

In fact, to give you an idea of how difficult it is to pick NFL football games with point spreads (and just as often without), consider what the cruelest illegal bookie will do with a parlay player.

First, a poorly number offer what is called a "teaser" in which the bettor tries to pick just two games. Say Steelers are 5-point favorites over Dallas and the Rams are 12-point picks over Buffalo. The bookie will let you shift six points within the teaser games.

going to demolish Dallas and you feel Buffalo is due for a good game, but you'd feel more comfortable with more points. You take six from the Steelers, leaving them a three-point favorite, and add them to Buffalo, giving it an 18-point bulge.

"That makes everything sound easy, doesn't it?"

But the bookie them will give you 21-1 odds that you're wrong.

Take it further. The bookie will give you 5-1 odds on a three-way parlay, 10-1 on a four-way, 20-1 on a five-way, 35-1 on a six-way, 60-1 on a seven-way and up to 300-1 on a 14-way parlay.

Now bookies don't stay in business losing a lot of leveraged bets.

But compare their largesse to the stinginess of the Oregon "lottery." Oregon will not accept anything less than a four-way and it pays, what it calls 8-1 odds on what everywhere else is paying 10-1. But, in reality, Oregon is only paying 7-1 because that extra buck is the one you put down to put the "lottery" in motion. Ergo, a bookie four-way parlay is 11-1 because you get the original bet back, too.

To give you yet another idea of

what a sucker bet a four-way parlay is, when Cactus Pete's had a sportsbook a couple of years ago, it would not accept game bets — only parlays.

There is good reason for that. A man is better off making 14 \$25 bets on individual games than one three-way or four-way parlay at \$100. He might win two or three parlays a year. It is possible to be over 60 percent on straight bets for good rickies.

Books stay afloat on two things — parlays and vigorish.

Vigorish is the 10 percent bookies charge losing bettors. You lost a \$100 bet, you pay the bookie \$110. You win a \$100 bet, he pays you \$100. It is the bookie dream to have \$50,000 bet with \$25,000 on winners and \$25,000 on losers. He automatically pockets \$2,500 and gambles nothing.

Now, here's another example of what a good bet a parlay is for the house. No bookie or sport book we've ever heard of charges vigorish on parlays!

The other thing you have to remember about the Oregon lottery is this: The state takes a certain percentage off the various lotto and numbers games it plays with its

residents. Theoretically, a specified percentage of all the money goes back to the public in winnings — a redistribution of wealth, as it were.

But in this NFL "lottery," the guarantee is that less than 5 percent of the total handle ever will be "won back" by the public. It is a complete governmental scam. If they don't allow straight-line bets, they are major cheats.

As we discussed this bona fide attempt to get into sports gambling by a state, an acquaintance noted "yeah, but we don't think that the state of Oregon ever will send someone to break your legs."

True, but the state of Oregon, unlike your bookmaker, will not let you bet on credit nor will it take a "lottery suggestion" from a hurry-cup call from a phone in the church library just before the 11 a.m. kickoff time — for game and services.

It is this type of blatant disdain by our governmental officials — and we currently see great perfection on all levels — that really makes you proud. Aren't they bright little boys? And, remember, they're just doing it in the name of education.

Players silent for N.C. State probe

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — The players on North Carolina State's 1968-69 basketball team refused to talk to state investigators looking into allegations of wrongdoing at the school, the head of the probe said.

N.C. State coach and athletic director Jim Valvano also refused to release business records requested by Samuel H. Poole, vice-chairman of the University of North Carolina Board of Governors and the chairman of the commission that conducted the probe.

"We did not get to talk to any of the current players," Poole said. "They just chose not to talk to us. We didn't ask for reasons. It's very unfortunate."

He said Valvano refused to allow the commission to examine records of JTV Enterprises, his private company. "We didn't have access to that information," Poole said.

Valvano did talk with commission members about matters not related to JTV Enterprises, Poole said.

Valvano could not be reached for comment.

Meanwhile, two former chairs of the Board of Governors, the top Democrat in the state Senate and the chairman of the NCSU Faculty Senate all said that C.D. Spangler Jr., president of the UNC system, should release a

written report of the commission's work.

The commission, which was appointed by Spangler in January, ended its six-month investigation on Monday, when members gave him an oral briefing of their findings.

Schottenheimer, who resigned as coach of the Cleveland Browns after an off-season dispute with owner Art Modell, said he'll coach what he's got.

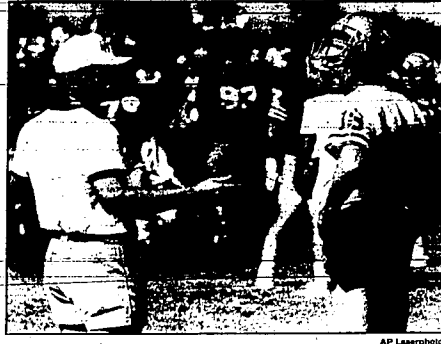

DANVERS, Mass. (AP) — Penny Hammel stayed hot, Kathy Postlewait kept cool after dunking her first shot in the water and both shot 5-under-par 67s on Thursday for a one-stroke lead after the first round of the LPGA Boston Five Classic.

Gindy Rarick, Amy Alcott, Donna White, Anne-Marie Palli and tour rookie Tini Barrett were tied for second with 68s over the 6,008-yard, par-72 Tara Ferncroft Country Club.

Of the top seven, only Hammel and Barrett played in the afternoon when conditions worsened as the wind picked up and a light rain began.

Hammel has done well in different conditions on various courses.

In the past three weeks, she tied for fourth at the du Maurier Classic, won the Jamie Farr Toledo Classic and tied for third at the U.S. Women's Open. Those performances earned her \$91,500 of her 1969

winnings of \$146,346. The Boston Five winner gets \$52,500 of a \$350,000 purse.

"A lot of people are saying, 'What did you do? What's happening with you?'" said Hammel, whose only victory in her other four years on the tour was at Toledo in 1968. "I don't want to figure it out."

Hammel started at the 10th hole and was five under par after her first nine. She took the lead by herself at six under when she bogeyed the 35-foot fourth hole, her 13th, with a 2-7 putt.

Despite bogeying the last two par-3s by two putts from 15 feet on the sixth and eighth holes, she was pleased.

"I was just mentally drained from those three weeks. I just wasn't mentally into it," Hammel said. "It came really easy."

Postlewait, winner of the Sara Lee Classic in April and the tour's 17th leading money-winner, rebounded

from her opening bogey with birdie puts from 15 feet and 30 feet on the second and third holes.

She also birdied the fifth and ninth holes, completing the front nine in 3-under-par 67.

She dropped back to two under when she bogeyed the 352-yard 11th by two putts from nine feet. But she reeled off birdies on the next three holes, which put her at five under. She made pars on the remaining four holes.

"This is a golf course that's known to give up a few birdies," said Postlewait, who tied for 20th at last week's U.S. Women's Open. "If you start around par (after the first round), you're a little bit down. I feel good, especially considering the way I started."

Tied at 69-two strokes behind the leaders, were Beth Daniel, Judy Rosenthal, Cathy Reynolds, Jody Marino, Loreta Alderete and Donna Cusano-Williams.

Pressure doesn't bother Agassi in Davis Cup showdown

MUNICH, West Germany (AP) — With John McEnroe out with a shoulder injury, the pressure is on Andre Agassi to lead the United States against defending champion West Germany in their Davis Cup semifinal.

"If Agassi isn't worried, I'm not," he said Thursday. "I don't think people are expecting as much now, so I can just go out and play tennis."

Agassi, ranked sixth in the world, will play No. 2 Boris Becker on Friday after American Brad Gilbert opens "the best-of-5 competition against Carl-Uwe Steeb."

Saturday, Ken Flach and Robert

Seguso of the United States put their perfect 10-0 Davis Cup doubles record on the line against Becker and Eric Jelen. The Steeb concludes Sunday with Steeb playing Agassi and Gilbert facing Becker, who won his third Wimbledon title this month.

The winner will play the survivor of the Sweden-Yugoslavia semifinal for the Davis Cup championship in December. The United States hasn't won the Davis Cup since 1982 and hasn't reached the final since 1984.

Even with McEnroe, it would have been difficult for the Americans to beat a Becker-led West German team on its home court. Without McEnroe, whose 54 wins are the most in U.S. Davis

Cup history, it will be an uphill fight.

"We know it won't be easy, but we are confident we can win," U.S. captain Tom Gorman said. "The players we have are very capable of winning three matches, and that's all that it takes."

The key may be Gilbert, who was named as McEnroe's replacement after Michael Chang and Tim Mayotte to enter the Davis Cup. Gilbert is ranked 14th in the world, three places below Mayotte and seven behind Chang.

If Gilbert loses to Steeb, the U.S. chances are slim. If Gilbert wins the opening match, however, it would give the American team a big boost going into the Becker-Agassi showdown.

McCallister's 65 leads Hardee's Classic by 1 over 3 others

COAL VALLEY, Ill. (AP) — Defending champion Jaime McCallister shot a 5-under-par 65 Thursday to take the first-round lead in the \$700,000 Hardee's Classic by one stroke over three golfers, two of whom were making their PGA Tour debut.

McCallister, who won this year's Honda Classic for only his second tour victory, had six birdies and one bogey on a windy afternoon under sunny skies.

One stroke behind McCallister were Curt Byrum, a non-winner after 67 years on tour, and two players making their first appearance on the PGA Tour —

David Toms and Cary Houghton, the pro at the American Legion public golf course in Kokomo, Ind.

"Considering the winds — I'd say 25 miles an hour — 65 is one of the best rounds I could have played," said McCallister, whose middle rounds of 62 and 63 last year here tied the PGA record for 125 for consecutive rounds.

But McCallister said he is used to wind golf courses.

"I'm just an average wind out there. But you never get comfortable with it, because it's really tough on your balance and it makes it extremely tough on putting," McCallister said.

Byrum is the only member of a trio tied for second to have tied it up in a PGA Tour event more than once.

"I've worked on being more compact on my swing. This was one of my better rounds this year. Changes in my swing have taken time to come around," said Byrum, whose best finishes were as a runner-up at the 1987 Memorial and here in 1986.

Byrum had four birdies and no bogeys over the 6,796-yard Oakwood Country Club course, which had been softened by rain on Tuesday and Wednesday.

Houghton, who made the field in the final qualifying berth, had five

birdies and a bogey in his first tour round.

"I'm pretty much enjoying it right now," Houghton said. "I always wanted to play out here, but didn't know if I had the ability."

Toms, a two-time All-American who graduated in June from Louisiana State and is playing with a sponsor's exemption, had seven birdies, one bogey and a double bogey on the par-4, 444-yard 14th hole.

"I didn't like the ruling on No. 14. I didn't get a drop in some muddy tracks and took a double bogey," Toms said.

At 67 were Rex Caldwell, John Adams and Dan Hallidson, a

resident of nearby Cambridge.

One stroke further back were Bob Eastwood, Donnie Hammond, Phil Blackmar, Lon Hinkle, Steve Hart and Tom Pernice.

Roger Maltbie — a five-time tour winner, including a victory here in 1975 — broke in a group at 70 that included Dr. Gil Morgan, golfs No. 20 all-time money-winner.

Mike Donald, who won the Anheuser-Busch Classic in a playoff against Tim Simpson on Monday, shot 71, one stroke behind Simpson.

This is the last year the tournament will compete head-to-head with the prestigious British Open.

Yastrzemski and Bench to share Hall of Fame honors Sunday

COOPERSTOWN, N.Y. (AP) — Johnny Bench and Carl Yastrzemski share a memorable World Series, the dream and now a place in the Hall of Fame.

Bench, one of the greatest catchers of all time, and Yastrzemski, the only American Leaguer to have 3,000 hits and 400 plus homers, will be officially inducted in ceremonies on Sunday.

Bench and Yastrzemski will be joined by former umpire Al Barlick and second baseman Red Schenck, who were elected by the veterans committee.

The election of Bench and Yastrzemski was no surprise. The number of votes they got was.

Bench received 431 votes from 47 ballots cast by members of the Baseball Writers Association of America. Yastrzemski got 421 votes from 47 ballots cast by sportswriters and teammates with the Reds. Rose, Morgan, Perez, Concepcion, Bench

In order to be elected to the Hall of Fame, a player must be named on 75 percent of the ballots cast. Of the recent 427 ballots this year, a player needed 336 votes to be elected.

Bench got 96.4 percent and Yastrzemski 94.63. Only Ty Cobb (98.2 percent) and Hank Aaron (97.8 percent) received higher percentages than Bench. Yastrzemski's percentage was the seventh-highest ever after

Honus Wagner (95.14), Babe Ruth (93.14) and Willie Mays (84.67).

Bench and Yastrzemski also set a record for number of votes received. Mays had the previous mark for most votes, with 409 in 1979.

Bench and Yastrzemski are new members of an even more exclusive group.

Mickey Mantle was my first idol, and I played with a lot of special people at Cooperstown. I grew up and my teammates with the Reds — Rose, Morgan, Perez, Concepcion, Bench

and Bob Feller were chosen and in 1982, Aaron and Frank Robinson made it in.

Bench and Yastrzemski were the 18th and 19th players elected in their first year of eligibility.

In 1975, the Red Sox and Reds met in the World Series with Cincinnati winning in seven games. Yastrzemski hit .310 in the Series and Bench drove in four runs.

"That will be one of the most memorable series of all time," Bench said. "And I think you'll see a few guys who played in that Series make it to the Hall of Fame."

After Hall of Famer Ted Williams retired '68, Yastrzemski led the field following the 1960 season. Yastrzemski took over and it was no time until he tamed the Green Monster.

At first, replacing Williams seemed impossible.

"Taking over Ted Williams' spot was the toughest thing I had to do —

it almost broke me — really," Yastrzemski said. "The first three months of the season I really didn't know if I could play in the big leagues or not."

Yaz finished with 3,419 hits and 452 home runs. He was named to 18 All-Star teams, won six Gold Gloves as American League Most Valuable Player Award in 1967, when he won the Triple Crown and led Boston to the pennant.

In 1967, Yastrzemski hit .326 with 44 homers and 121 runs batted in, but it was what he did down the stretch that got the Red Sox into the World Series. Yaz batted .444 with 26 RBIs in his last 19 games. In his last 13 at-bats, he had 10 hits.

He also holds league records for most intentional walks, 190; most at-bats, 11,988; most plate appearances, 13,990; and most games, 3,308.

Greenspan says feds are lowering rates

Bank profits surge 6.1% from 1988

WASHINGTON (AP) — Federal Reserve Chairman Alan Greenspan said Thursday the central bank has been pushing down interest rates in an effort to keep the country out of a recession and acknowledged the Fed's best efforts might not be enough.

After a year of raising interest rates to dampen inflationary pressures, Greenspan said, the Fed switched course in June and began lowering rates because of widespread signs of a weakening economy.

Greenspan, making his midyear report to Congress, indicated that the Fed stood ready to lower rates further, but he said its best efforts might not be enough to stave off an economic downturn.

"Some day, some event will end the extraordinary string of economic successes that has prevailed since late 1982," Greenspan said in testimony before the House banking subcommittee.

The Fed chairman said it was entirely possible that some Federal Reserve policy mistake could trigger a new recession despite the agency's best efforts to keep the current record peacetime recovery going.

"The Federal Reserve is committed to doing its utmost to ensure prosperity and rising standards of living over the long run," Greenspan said. "We do, however, face a difficult balancing act."

Greenspan said the Fed must weigh the dangers of a recession against the risk that too loose a monetary policy could spark a new inflationary spiral in the country.

Greenspan said the Fed's policies would be oriented toward avoiding "an unnecessary and destructive recession."

The Fed chairman's comments indicated that the central bank was likely to continue its policy of gradu-

ally lowering interest rates over the coming months. Greenspan said the Fed first began easing credit conditions in early June and eased again in early July.

Greenspan's remarks were the first official indication that the central bank had indeed reversed its year-long tightening efforts, although there was a widespread belief in financial markets that this was occurring.

Greenspan released a revised economic forecast which showed that the central bank still hopes to achieve a so-called soft landing in which growth will slow enough to cool inflationary pressures but not decline so much that the country is thrown into a recession.

The Fed forecast that the overall economy would grow at an annual rate of between 2 percent and 2.5 percent. This was lower than the administration's revised forecast on Tuesday that the economy would grow at a 2.7 percent rate this year.

The Fed also saw more dangers from higher inflation, forecasting that consumer prices would rise by between 5 percent and 5.5 percent this year, up from last year's 4.4 percent increase.

The administration is less concerned about an uptick in inflation, forecasting that consumer prices would rise 4.9 percent this year. In setting preliminary monetary growth targets, Greenspan said the Fed had decided to leave the growth rates unchanged for this year and next year as well.

For M-2, the measure of the money supply which includes currency in circulation and interest-bearing checking accounts, the Fed said it would aim for an increase of between 3 percent and 7 percent both this year and in 1990.

The central bank is charged with the primary task of guarding against

inflation by controlling how fast the money supply increases. The goal is to supply enough money to support healthy growth while making sure that inflation is not reignited by pumping too much money into the system.

The Fed's actions influence the cost of money — interest rates.

With the decision in early June to ease credit conditions—a variety of business and consumer interest rates have been falling and economists are predicting that the current Fed easing course will mean further declines in banks' prime lending rate and in mortgage rates over the next several months.

Some economists have complained that the Fed waited too long to begin lowering interest rates and has thus increased the chances that the recovery from the 1981-82 recession is in danger of ending.

Ronald Reagan, chief economist for the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, urged the central bank Thursday to aggressively lower interest rates "to combat recessionary pressures that threaten the economy."

However, other analysts applauded the steps the central bank has taken, saying Greenspan has wisely made small mid-course corrections rather than reacting too far in any direction.

Recent inflation figures look favorable. On Wednesday, the government reported consumer prices edged up just 0.2 percent in June, the smallest advance in 16 months. That followed news last week that prices at the wholesale level actually fell last month. Before the June slowdown, consumer prices were shooting up at the fastest pace since 1982. But economists believe the worst is now over for energy price increases caused by the clampdown on production by oil exporting countries, and in food costs, which were driven up by last summer's drought.

LOS ANGELES (AP) — First Interstate Bancorp reported a 6.1 percent rise in profits for the second quarter on Wednesday, boosted by a multimillion-dollar tax benefit from previous losses.

But banks in Arizona had a decline in earnings, and banks in Texas reported more losses, according to First Interstate.

The nation's largest retail banking system reported second-quarter earnings of \$104.1 million, or \$2.02 a share, compared with \$97.2 million, or \$2.09 a share, for the second quarter of 1988.

Second-quarter earnings include \$1.7 million, or 16 cents a share, from use of a previously unrecognized tax benefit from losses in other periods.

For the first half of the year, net income was \$235.3 million, or \$4.83 a share, compared to \$199.8 million, or \$4.29, a share in the 1988 period.

Earnings growth continued in large banks in California, Oregon, Nevada and Washington, and in most smaller banks in the 21 states First Interstate covers.

But First Interstate Bank of Arizona earned \$1.6 million in the second quarter, down from \$19.8 million for the 1988 period, due mainly to increased provisions for loan losses that could result from the state's depressed real estate market, First Interstate said.

First Interstate Bank of Texas showed losses that were blamed on that state's economic woes. A net loss of \$24.3 million was reported, compared with a \$1.1 million loss for the second quarter of 1988.

It's the perfect time to review your home insurance policy

We're now into the peak months for buying and selling homes. And while everyone is thinking about real estate, it's an excellent time to review the home insurance policies that protect you from such disasters as fire and theft, and from liability claims if someone is hurt while on your property.

It's prudent to set aside some time right now to review your insurance coverage. This applies whether you own your home or rent. Assume your house is totally destroyed. What would it cost to rebuild? Prudent homeowners buy insurance that would completely cover the cost of rebuilding. Consider your coverage with that amount in mind.

Once that basic limit is established, buy an insurance policy that automatically includes coverage for detached buildings on the property. This coverage for garages, storage sheds and even guest houses should be equal to 10 percent of the insurance on the

house itself. Also automatically include insurance for your personal property — furniture, clothes, stereos, bicycles and the like. If there is a total loss, your insurance company will pay a total amount equal to up to 50 percent of the insurance on the house. And there would be coverage to pay for additional living expenses while your home is undergoing significant repairs caused by a covered loss. To protect you against loss if you are sued by someone who was injured while at your house, personal liability coverage should be included in your basic homeowners policy. Under the liability section, determine how

much coverage you would like. Most policies offer at least \$100,000, with many people opting for \$300,000 worth of insurance.

How much depends on your potential exposure. You would determine the value of everything an injured person who sues you could get hold of, and then consider the likelihood of a judgement against you for that amount or a higher amount, advises Aetna Life & Casualty, headquartered in Hartford, CT.

What about medical costs for accidents that may happen to visitors even though you may not be negligent? Usually, there is a basic limit of \$1,000 per person for these payments. In addition to the basic homeowners policy, there are additional coverages you may choose to purchase.

A common coverage is a "valuable items" policy. This provides coverage for types of property that are limited in your standard

policy. Generally, these are such items as jewelry, furs, watches, precious and semiprecious stones, silverware and firearms.

For an additional premium, you can have full protection on these items and broaden coverage for a greater array of risks. Another option that homeowners can select is a "replacement cost" policy for the dwelling or its contents.

Replacement cost guarantees that the full cost of replacing your home will be paid. To be eligible for this coverage, you must purchase a limit of coverage on your dwelling that is equal to 100 percent of its replacement cost.

Similarly, replacement cost on contents, if you have it, ensures that if there is a loss, you will get enough money back to replace the contents with new items, up to the personal property limit on your policy. Under a standard policy, an insurance company will pay only on the depreciated value of an item

at the time it was damaged or stolen. When determining how much insurance you need, most homeowners concentrate on the cost of the house, but Aetna's Witt advises taking a close look at your contents. If you have expensive piece of antique furniture or simply lots of possessions, the 50 percent limit may not give you enough insurance.

The value of personal property can particularly important to renters or condominium owners, whose insurance is based on the value of your personal property rather than the structure.

In those cases, damage to a structure is usually covered by the building's owner or the condo association. The one exception is that condo owners generally are responsible for part of the structure within their unit.

Biggest Micron investor sanguine about company, despite price slides

BOISE (AP) — Micron Technology Inc. stock may be down, but industrial J.R. Simplot is sticking by his investment.

Simplot, a member of Micron's board of directors and its largest single shareholder, said Wednesday he bought 200,000 shares of the company last year.

"I think we've got the winner of the world out there, and I think we know what we're doing. I've got a lot of confidence," Simplot said.

Only a month ago, the price of a share of Micron was scraping against its 52-week high of \$25.75. Since then, the stock is down

sharply, reaching \$14.25 on Tuesday. It recovered Wednesday to \$15, up 76 cents on volume of 1.1 million shares.

The 80-year-old Simplot owns between 1.2 and 1.5 million Micron shares outright. He controls another 2 million shares held by his company, Boise-based J.R. Simplot Co.

The combined stakes are about 17 percent of the company's 38.1 million shares outstanding. Last week's purchase probably was made for about \$3.3 million.

"We've got people on both ends," Jim Gammon, manager of Piper Jaffray & Hopwood, said Wednesday.

"There are people taking a profit ... but a lot of people feel it is a very valuable long-term investment" and are buying.

"People are wondering why the stock has come from \$25 to \$15," said Cornelius VanLewegen, manager of the Shearson Lehman Hutton office in Boise. But, he added, the activity at his office has been on the buying side.

"The market has overreacted" to reports that Micron's earnings will suffer from softening prices for its dynamic random access memory chips, VanLewegen said.

"Our clients are looking at it as an

opportunity to buy at least in the short term."

Micron's fourth-quarter and fiscal 1989 end on Aug. 31. Some analysts have cut their earnings estimates as much as 77 percent.

A recent survey of five analysts by Zacks Investment Research Inc. showed a mean earnings estimate of 83 cents a share for the fourth quarter, compared with \$1.27 during the same period of 1988. The range was from 70 cents to 94 cents.

This week, one estimate, by Daniel Egan of Montgomery Securities in San Francisco, was slashed from 80 cents to 45 cents a share.

Zions reports \$6 million net income for first half

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Zions Bancorp. had net income of \$6 million or \$1.02 per share for the six months ending June 30, a 112 percent increase, corporate officials said.

Zions also reported net income of \$4.1 million or 70 cents per share for the three months ending June 30.

Those figures compare to net income of \$2.8 million or 48 cents per share for the six-month period a year ago and a net loss of \$32,000 or six cents per share for the same three months a year ago.

Net income for the six-month and three-month periods included extraordinary tax benefits from net operating loss carry-forwards of

\$830,000 or 14 cents per share and \$814,000 or 14 cents per share, respectively.

Zions Chairman Roy W. Simmonds said the company's net income margin remained strong at 4.89 percent during the six months ending June 30, compared to 4.59 percent for the same period a year ago, and 4.56 percent for the year ending Dec. 31, 1988.

Non-accrual loans continued to reflect improvement during the quarter ending June 30, 1989. They totaled \$56 million compared to \$58.4 million on March 31, 1989, and \$60.3 million on Dec. 31, 1988.

Non-performing assets totaled \$88.8 million.

South is a place where Jesus Christ and Judas Iscariot would be equals, with the betting odds in favor of Judas.

"I went with the odds," pleaded today's unhappy South. There was an element of truth in his argument, but the bottom line showed that he missed a sure bet.

East's queen won the first spade, and a spade return to West's ace allowed West to clear the suit. South led a low club to his king and a low club to dummy's ace, bringing a surprising discard from East. With no way to recover, South was forced to concede one down.

When East discovered that West had five spades, I played East for length in clubs. Had East held four clubs including the jack, I had to play clubs in that manner to pick up the suit. "South's explanation: 'Reasonable enough. However, South had time to get the facts. After winning dummy's spade king, South should have led a club to his king and returned a heart to dummy's 10. East wins and returns a heart to South's ace, and South repeats the discovery process in diamonds. A low diamond is led to dummy's 10 and East's jack, and South wins either red-suit return. South then 'cashes' his remaining red-suit winners, revealing West's final distribution. West is known to have started with five spades and only two cards in each red suit. Clearly he was also dealt four clubs, and South gets his answer on how to play that suit."

Orion declined to comment, as did representatives for Weird Al.

'Batman' gives impetus to more superheroes, heroines

HOLLYWOOD — Look for more superheroes — and a heroine — in the wake of boffo "Batman."

"Plastic Man," a fantasy figure with the ability to stretch his body into any position, is being developed by "Batman" producers Peter Guber and Jon Peters. The possible star: Pee-wee Herman. Guber-Peters are also at work on "The Flash."

Universal Pictures is considering a live-action production of "The Green Hornet." The crime-fighter, originally created for radio in 1936, is also going to "star" in a new series of comics.

Stan Weston, chairman of Leisure Concepts Inc., says that LCI and Hanna-Barbera have licensed the rights to the character from George Trendle Jr., son of Hornet creator George Trendle — and "a deal at Universal is pending."

Like Batman, the Hornet lacks superpowers but has crime-fighting gizmos, including a gas-gun that knocks out foes. The Hornet — who strikes at night — also has a special car (the Black Beauty) and an Asian sidekick named Kato, who will be a she in the new Green Hornet comic book series that debuts in August from the Chicago-based NOW Comics.

•Hended for syndication next year: another "Wonder Woman" series (Recall Lynda Carter as the superheroine of the series that ran from 1977-79). The series is for Warner Bros.-TV.

Shatner 'Star Trek V' book follows unsuccessful movie

HOLLYWOOD — A just-out book about the making of "Star Trek V" — by director and co-star William Shatner, and his daughter, LisaBeth Shatner — purports to tell the behind-the-scenes account of "the most spectacular 'Star Trek' movie yet."

Ah, the book — "Captain's Log: William Shatner's Personal Account of the Making of 'Star Trek V'" — was published by Pocket before the "spectacular" film's anticipated box office grosses didn't roll in.

In 4½ weeks, "Star Trek V" — generally panned by the critics — had grossed less than the previous films — just \$45.7 million and is spitting badly. Compare previous screen "Trek's": "II," \$82.2 million; "III," \$76.7 million; "III," \$76.4 million; and "IV," \$109.7 million.

Producer Harve Bennett argued, "You can't make those comparisons — not considering that this is the summer of the great (blockbuster) blitz. Relative to the box office of 'II' and 'III,' we are off just 18 percent. Being off 18 percent this summer is not exactly chopped liver."

As for the critical knocks singling out Shatner's direction, "Listen, I don't think there's one critic in the world who knows what the heck a director does," Bennett applauded Shatner for "creating a working environment of fun and energy — we had a good time."

Three Dog Night plays in Jackpot

JACKPOT, NEV. — The rock 'n' roll music of the early 1970s is alive and well for Three Dog Night.

"Right now, all the radio stations are playing songs from that era," says Cory Wells, a founding member of the harmonious band. "It's just as though those songs are top 10 songs today as they were then."

Three Dog Night, performing tonight in Jackpot and also in Boise later this month, plays "Joy To The World," "Mama Told Me Not To Come," "Never Been To Spain," "One," "Old Fashioned Love Song" and other singles that brought them fame.

In a telephone interview from Los Angeles Tuesday, Wells said his group sticks with its signature sound that produced 14 gold albums and nine gold singles for a total of more than 40 million records sold.

"At this point in our careers, it wouldn't be really smart or advisable to do songs other than the songs people are coming to hear," Wells said. "Those are the songs they want to hear, they want to remember."

The current Three Dog Night lineup features founding members Wells and Danny Hutton on lead vocals as well as original keyboardist Jimmy Greenspoon.

Chuck Negron, the band's third original lead vocalist, no longer performs due to ill health. Guitarist Michael Cunniff, bass player Richard Campbell and drummer Mike Keeley have joined the group since it reorganized in 1981 after a six-year hiatus.

The band first formed in 1968 after Hutton, a single artist hired for a Sony and Cher tour, met Wells, who was a lead singer of a band hired for the same tour.

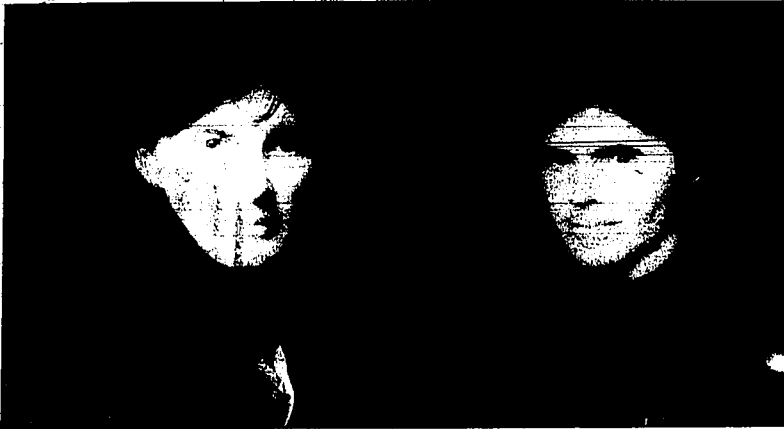
Hippie role-models Sony and Cher were "a lovely couple," Wells recalled. "I was madly in love with Cher and wanted to take her away from him (Sony)."

Wells said with a laugh, adding, "We were good friends. I was just kidding."

With the novel concept of showcasing lead singers who could also harmonize together, Hutton, Wells and Negron were successful right from the start. As Three Dog Night, they toured almost non-stop until what Wells calls "the rigors of the road" overwhelmed the musicians.

"Our stint was between 1969 and 1975," he said, "and it was continuous, ongoing, non-ending pressure."

"We were just physically, mentally and morally exhausted from what had gone

down. It was time to disband and to take some time out and have lives of our own."

Hutton, a native of Ireland raised in Boston, Mass., and California, took a long rest and then traveled through Central America, England and Ireland. Back in Los Angeles, he formed a management/booking agency and also recorded songs for movie soundtrack albums.

Wells, a native of upstate New York, packed his family into an automobile and leisurely toured the United States. Next, he traveled the world, fishing everywhere he could.

Today, in addition to playing music,

Wells is a field editor for "Outdoor Life" magazine and writes articles for various sporting publications. He has appeared on television shows such as "American Sportsman" and he recently filmed a "Country Sportsman" episode in New Zealand. An ardent and expert fisherman, Wells said his favorite place to cast a line is in Canada, where bass, northern pike and lake trout take the bait.

After years of their needed hiatus, the group members all felt a void in being away from the hectic world of pop music. In 1980, while meeting to handle some old business, the musicians decided to have a test rehearsal to see if "the old magic" was still there.

"I think there was apprehension at first, wondering if we would still be able to sound the same," Wells recalled. "But it was just like riding a bicycle. It all fell into place. Everything sounded exactly the way it did five years earlier and it was great."

Explaining his band's name, Wells said the Aborigines in Australia are nomads, who travel from place to place and sleep with their dogs for warmth.

"When they go to sleep at night, they take a dog with them and snuggle up to the dog to keep warm," Wells said. "And the Australians took that and made an expression, 'a three dog night,' meaning, a very cold night."

Since 1981, Three Dog Night has been touring five to six months a year, booked solid during that time, Wells said.

The group's schedule this week was to play in Los Angeles last night, at Cactus Pete's in Jackpot, Nev., tonight and again in southern California tomorrow night.

"We'll probably arrive (in Jackpot) only after midnight."

Blanc's voice gave life to characters

The question was one that master cartoonists and Academy Award-winning directors Ediz Freleng, Chuck Jones and Robert McKimson must have had rolling around in the backs of their heads for years.

Would Bugs Bunny, Daffy Duck, Porky Pig, Sylvester, Tweety, Foghorn Leghorn, Speedy Gonzales, Yosemite Sam, Elmer Fudd or any of the rest of the Looney Tunes-Merrie Melodies crew have been as funny or as endearing without the wonderfully versatile voice of Mel Blanc to back them up?

"Many (times) we wondered if the characters would have been as successful if we had had someone else other than Mel," Freleng said shortly after Blanc died in Los Angeles from heart disease and emphysema.

"Mel gave life to our drawings," he said. "For more than 50 years, Blanc took the Warner Bros. drawings of the aforementioned rabbit, duck, pig, cat, rooster, mouse, pirate and hunter and made them live and made us laugh, often to tears."

Blanc's death, combined with the passing last week of Jim Backus, who for many years was the voice of the nearsighted curmudgeon Mr. Magoo, and the death last May of Daws Butler, who was the vocal backbone of such Hanna-Barbera characters as Yogi B. Bear, Snagglepuss and Quick Draw McGraw, leaves the world of animation reeling.

"It's the end of an era," Freleng said. "They set a style that will remain forever."

Don Messick — the voice of such Han-

na-Barbera characters as Papa Smurf, Scooby Doo, Boo-Boo and Bumm-Bumm Rubble — worked with both Blanc and Butler. He remembers the two men fondly.

"Daws was probably my best friend from 1947 on," said Messick from Hollywood this week. "And Mel was always a gentleman who told excellent stories."

Butler worked for Hanna-Barbera for more than 30 years and also did the voice of cereal pitcher Cap'n Crunch and Snop (of Rice Krispies fame), but he never got the attention that Blanc did, though it was not for a lack of talent. Butler's signature "I'm-smarter-than-the-average-bear" tagline for Yogi, as well as his "Now, hooon on thair" for Quick Draw McGraw and "Exit, stage right" for Snagglepuss, were as funny, in the proper contexts, as Blanc's trademarks.

The difference was that Butler's characters were never as popular as Blanc's. While Yogi, the paunchy bear with an air of superiority and a developed sense of self — particularly where pie-eating baskets were concerned — and Snagglepuss — the Shakespearean actor trapped in a lion's body — were amusing, they never quite caught the nation's attention as did Blanc's Bugs or Daffy. Backus, who died at the age of 76 of pneumonia, never achieved the same status as Blanc, either. Instead the nation came to know Backus as the self-indulgent Thurston P. Howell III in the '60s series, "Gilligan's Island."

Although Backus tired of giving voice to the crochety Quincy Magoo later in life, he brought a wonderful spirit to the

Supporting actors have ability to steal the show

NEW YORK — Two of this summer's hottest sequels, "Ghostbusters II" and "Lethal Weapon 2," have received boosts from supporting players who never really wanted the parts.

Surrounded by Bill Murray, Dan Aykroyd and Sigourney Weaver, Peter MacNicol steals the movie as the villainous word-mangling art restorer, Janosz Poha, in "Ghostbusters II."

Joe Pesci, as the troublesome but lovable Leo Getz, fits right in with Mel Gibson and Danny Glover, the high-powered stars of "Lethal Weapon 2."

But, neither MacNicol or Pesci initially wanted the part. Why would MacNicol, an accomplished theater performer and featured player in the acclaimed film "Sophie's Choice," want to switch from Shakespeare to slime? After reading the script, he called his agent and told him to forget it.

Pesci enjoyed the comic police thriller "Lethal Weapon," but never imagined adding himself to the sure-fire team of Gibson and Glover. When his agent advised him a funny part was available in the sequel, Pesci was skeptical. After all, he was better known for playing tough guys in "Raging Bull" and "Once Upon a Time in America."

But both actors reconsidered. What impressed MacNicol about "Ghostbusters II" was the name, "Vigo of Carpathia," the evil spirit that haunts the film. His mind quickly filled in details. "I thought, 'What can I do with this Carpathia connection? Why does this art restorer know so much about this particular painting?'"

Maybe there's some kinship of country involved there. "This is all in a matter of seconds. ... I called back the agent and said I'd go in," MacNicol said.

Pesci, tired of scripts that were blatant imitations of "Jacy" LaMotta (the boxer Jake's brother) in "Raging Bull," took a liking to Getz and agreed to talk to producers Richard Donner and Joel Silver. Getz, in protective custody, is an accountant who has laundered nearly half a billion dollars in drug money from the organization that Gibson and Glover are trying to crack.

"I explained that I saw him very frantic and a big pest and a whiner, wanting to be a cop and a hero himself, knowing all about police procedures." I acted out a couple of bits for the character and they both started laughing. They said, 'What are we wasting time for? Let's get him in wardrobe, it's funny, let him do it.'"

Receiving the part was the first step for Pesci. He still wasn't sure if he would hurt or help the team of Gibson and Glover.

"I knew when I met Mel and Danny and hung with them a little bit if I could pull this off," Pesci said. "Mel and Danny had their own way of working; it's hard to break into something like that."

"They don't know where you're coming from. They're afraid to just say, 'Go ahead'."

Dick Clark takes 'American Bandstand' on cross-country tour

Dick Clark has no misconceptions about how the world views 'American Bandstand,' the vehicle that has kept his seemingly never-graying mug in the spotlight for most of the last 35 years.

"I used an analogy once in the early days where I said it was a stray dog that sort of wandered up on the doorstep and nobody paid a lot of attention to it and the family took it in and it became a part of the family," Clark said recently.

Now Clark has picked up the family mutt and taken it on a cross-country tour to celebrate the "Bandstand's" 35th anniversary, featuring the Spinners, the Guess Who, the Association and the Drifters.

For the uninitiated, the show that became "American Bandstand" was launched on a Philadelphia television station in September 1952. Four years later, Clark took over as the show's only host, and in 1967 "Bandstand" was introduced to a national audience on ABC, where it went to a five-day-a-week schedule before settling into a one-hour Saturday afternoon time slot.

The show remained at ABC until 1987, when the network attempted to cut the show to 30 minutes.

Clark, who had long ago taken over ownership of the show, balked and took "Bandstand" into syndication, remaining as host through all the years until this season, when "Bandstand" moved to the USA cable network with a new host, David Hirsch. At 26, Hirsch is the same age as Clark was when he took over the show in 1967.

During its 35-year history, "Bandstand" has embraced hundreds of thousands of fresh-faced teenagers who found the music of more than 10,000 performers "easy to dance to."

squat, nearsighted man who never could quite understand why the world was passing him by.

Freling called Blanc "a great actor and a very good friend." He specifically remembered Blanc's work on a short, "Birds Anonymous, where Sylvester is forced to join an Alcoholic Anonymous-like group to kick his craving for birds.

"Backus' turn as Magoo as Ebenezer Scrooge in "A Christmas Carol" remains a holiday staple and is heralded as one of the better adaptations of the Dickens classic, regardless of its form.

"That picture won an Academy Award for me," Freling said. "I realized he was really an actor when he did the dialogue for that picture. That was an outstanding piece of acting."

But it was Blanc who was the unquestioned champion of voice work in animation. Oddly enough, he was also an accomplished classical musician. He played the bass, violin and sousaphone for the NBC Radio Orchestra in San Francisco in the late 1920s.

Freling said that Blanc was hired in 1937 when the original voice of Porky Pig could not control his stuttering. Blanc quickly became the principal voice on Warner cartoons.

And during the next 50 years — from his first appearance as a drunken bull in "Picador Porky," to his last turn as the voice of Bugs, Daffy, Tweety and Yosemite Sam in "Who Framed Roger Rabbit" — Blanc turned the world on its ear.

Blanc, who recorded the voice of Barney Rubble from his bed in 1961 while recovering from a car accident, said once that his favorite character was the irrepressible Bugs, whom he endowed with a Brooklyn accent despite having never set foot in Brooklyn.

He said that the toughest voice he did was the cantankerous Yosemite Sam.

Warner confiscates Bat-items

NEW YORK (AP)—Warner Bros. has confiscated more than 40,000 bogus Batman items in nationwide legal actions against people taking advantage of its movie "Batman," a Warner spokesman said.

"We don't license schlock," said J. Joseph Bainton, counsel for Warner Communication companies. "My mother raised me to believe that stealing's wrong."

U.S. marshals helped seize T-shirts, hats, shorts, medallions and other rip-offs under a series of nationwide federal lawsuits since the first week in June, before the movie's June 23 opening.

The raids took place on the streets of New York, Philadelphia and Washington, D.C.; at flea markets in New York and Los Angeles; at manufacturers and distributors in New York, Los Angeles and Florida; at retail stores in New York; and through U.S. Customs in Los Angeles.

About 30 retail outlets in New York City are under court order to stop selling the rip-offs, said Bainton.

Continuing action around the country will help stem the tide of bogus Batman goods, said Dan Romanelli, Warner's president of worldwide merchandising.

Romanelli said the forgeries result in "many, many millions of dollars" in losses for Warner, LCA Entertainment, the licensing agent; and Comics, Wholesale domestic revenues for official Batman items are projected at \$250 million, he said.

Real Batman shirts retail for \$8 to \$18, depending on the manufacturer. The fakes go for about \$5.

From across the street, they look the same," said Bainton. But

he said the rip-offs fall apart quickly. And Romanelli said they are marred by "shoddy artwork" that is going to run as soon as it's washed.

"In one way, it's a nice problem to have because the fakes are a barometer for the market for the legitimate merchandise," said Bainton, who predicted sales would explode at Halloween.

Warner may donate the confiscated clothing to charity. "You hate to throw away clothing when there are so many people who need it," said Bainton.

Warner has hundreds of professional investigators around the country. And its employees report rip-offs they notice during their lunch hours.

Their reward, said Romanelli, will be "bat points to keep the Joker at bay."

Bainton said penalties are \$500 to \$20,000 for someone who sells rip-offs unknowingly; \$100,000 for someone who sells them willfully; and up to five years in jail for those who refuse to obey a court order.

Smithsonian tackles task of producing anthology of musicals

The making of intelligent musical anthologies has been raised to an art form by the people at the Smithsonian Institution.

They have already produced a definitive collection of classic jazz, another of country and western music, yet another featuring vintage American song.

Now these tireless compilers have minted a new collection that in many ways is their most ambitious and, because anthologists are so vulnerable to second-guessing, their most courageous.

"American Musical Theater: Shows, Songs and Stars" is a monumental 81-song survey of Broadway, from its European operetta-like beginnings in the first decades of this century, through the opulent "book shows" of the '30s and '40s; to the somewhat leaner and more topical works of the postwar period.

The set is issued in all three formats, on six LPs, four cassettes or four compact discs.

This is not necessarily Broadway's Greatest Hits. Instead, the specimens gathered on these recordings have been selected to illustrate the styles and the conventions, the traditions and the innovations that marked the musical comedy's evolution up to the mid-'60s, when the pre-emptive voice of pop and rock began to eat into Broadway's once-confident idiom.

It is hard to speak of highlights in a venture like this, as the set is itself a series of nothing but highlights. Just to suggest a taste, here is a sampling:

—Legendary music hall queen Lillian Russell performing her signature tune "Come Down, Ma Evenin' Star," the endearingly trestle ballad written by John Stromberg in 1906. Adding to the song's impact is the heart-rending Gilded Age story behind it: The manuscript was discovered in the vest pocket of the despondent composer's suit jacket after he committed suicide.

—Fred and Adele Astaire singing, with startlingly youthful voices, "Fascinatin' Rhythm," from the 1925 George and Ira Gershwin show "Lady, Be Good." It was George and Ira's first full-length collaboration for Broadway.

—Walter Huston (father of film director John Huston) doing his poignant sotto voce version of Kurt Weill's "September Song," from "Knickerbocker Holiday."

—Bill "Bojangles" Robinson tapping to "Doin' the New Low Down," from the all-black revue "Blackbirds '71 1928."

In addition, there are appearances by such worthies as Barbra Streisand, Carol Channing, Helen Morgan, Alvin Drake, Robert Preston, Ray Bolger, Eddie Cantor and Gertrude Lawrence, among many others.

The set is a particular monument to the talent and durability of two women whose presence lit the Broadway stage almost continuously during its salad days. Between them, Mary Martin and Ethel Merman are heard on 10 that is slightly more than 12 percent of the cuts offered.

Martin's naughty, career-launching rendition of "My Heart Belongs to Daddy" is here, as are "Speak Low" from "One Touch of Venus," "A Wonderful Guy" from "South Pacific," "I've Gotta Crow" from "Peter Pan" and "Do Re Mi" from "The Sound of Music." La Merm, meanwhile, is represented by her debut tune "I Got Rhythm" from "Girl Crazy," Cole

Porter's "I Get a Kick Out of You" from "Anything Goes," a rare duet with Bert Lahr) of "Friendship" from "DuBarry Was a Lady," "There's No Business Like Show Business" from "Annie Get Your Gun" and perhaps most eloquently, "Rose's Turn," the biting soliloquy from "Gypsy."

Dwight Blocker Bowers, the coproducer of "American Theater Music," says that even at 81 songs, the anthology had to exclude some cherished and seminal material.

"I was sad, for instance, to have to leave out Richard Rodgers' 'No Strings.' It was the only show, as you probably know, for which he wrote the lyrics as well as the music. It

would have been great to include, say, 'The Sweetest Sounds.'" Other important shows that missed the final cut, Bowers says, were "Penderfin," "Kismet," "Golden Apple" and "Lil Abner."

Bowers, who holds a master's degree in Theater History from the University of Connecticut, wrote the crisp and evocative 122-page book that accompanies the set. In it, he points out that the history of the American musical coincides, more or less, with the history of recording itself. The concept of an "original cast" recording of a show, however, dates only from about 1940, so the material prior to that time had to be assembled from 78s that, in the cus-

tom of the day, were independently made of a show's hit songs.

In many instances, although the stars were the same, the recording used studio arrangements rather than the orchestrations that would have been heard in the theater," Bowers says. "But they give us the authentic flavor."

In other cases, the recordings used were made from a show's initial London production, or from an important revival. The version chosen of "Old Man River," for instance, features Paul Robeson, who did not cre-

ate the part of Joe in "Showboat" (Jules Bliesoe did), but who starred in the 1932 revival and who became indelibly associated with the role. "This is a case where merit comes in — Robeson was simply 12 times better than anyone else."

Since the museum did not possess many of the recordings deemed essential, Bowers and his colleagues were obliged to seek out private collectors.

"We were lucky to find a lot of this stuff. There's one collector in the Washington area who has an espe-

cially fabulous collection," Bowers says.

As expected, Bowers says some listeners have questioned certain choices. For instance, people have wondered about the selection of "Mira" from Bob Merrill's "Carnival," when that show's one certified big tune was "Love Makes the World Go Round," or why the 1960 Julie Sylve-Campden & Green show "Do Re Mi" was represented by "Adventure" rather than the now-standard "Make Someone Happy."

New British bands demonstrate variety of American influences

HOLLYWOOD — Ry Cooder meets the Pretenders.

John Lee Hooker meets Lone Justice?

Or, maybe, Ennio Morricone meets the Cowboy Junkies?

Anyone attracted to those musical pairings should find "Southside," the debut album by a Scottish band named Texas, an especially inviting work. Already attracting considerable attention in Britain, the album is due in the United States July 25 from PolyGram Records.

The quartet's songs are fairly conventional offshoots of traditional blues-oriented statements of desire and regret.

But Ally McErlaine's bottleneck guitar work on such key numbers as "I Don't Want a Lover" and the instrumental title track echoes the tension of Morricone's spaghetti-Western film scores and the earthy, seductive feel of Cooder's most sensual efforts, including the sound track to the film "Paris, Texas."

However, Texas' most appealing element may be the way Shariene Spiteri's vocals combine the independence and bite of the Pretenders' Chrissie Hynde and the soulful rejoicing of former Lone Justice vocalist Maria McKee.

With so many influences in Texas' music, it is not surprising that some English critics argue that Texas —

formed two years ago in Glasgow — has nothing new to offer. New Musical Express, a leading rock journal there, found the group's live show — which included a cover version of Guns N' Roses' "Sweet Child O' Mine" — calculated and hollow.

But those are the same charges hurled by some U.S. critics at the Cowboy Junkies, the magnificent new Canadian band whose emotional purity on stage (the music is virtually all a shade of moody blue) has been branded simply a pose.

Even if sound does tend to overshadow the substance on "Southside," the sound — or style — is marvelously promising at times.

"You do hear a lot of blues influence," Spiteri has said of the band's style. "It's a music which affects me in a really personal way — but the art is in taking that and making it your own, making it newer."

About the band's name, she adds: "When you think of Texas you think of vast, open spaces and our music is very open. The guitars come across in really clear and you get a sense of openness listening to it."

At a time when most British bands conform to either arty alternative-rock guidelines or rapid dance-pop exuberance, Texas is one of several up-and-coming British bands that aim for rock's guitar-oriented, American-roots mainstream.

Two other promising groups in this loose-act contingent, Scotland's Deacon Blue and England's Diesel

Park West, also have new albums.

Deacon Blue's name may be from a line in a Steely Dan song, but the band's Ricky Ross seems more aligned philosophically with the rock-aspiration qualities of Bruce Springsteen and U2.

"When the World Knows Your Name," the group's new Columbia album, is due in stores next week and it is a convincing, eclectic affair — a bright array of moods and melodies that ranges from the near hoodlum lilt of "Queen of the New Year" to the tender, reflective "Orphans."

Ross does not write about racing in the streets or small towns a la Springsteen, but he injects in the music the themes — being true to an ideal and facing up to challenges — that are reminiscent of the ambition and scope of Springsteen's work.

Diesel Park West is even more immersed in Springsteen (the promised land expedition of "Live Like Princes") on the group's just-released "Shakespeare Albama" album, but there is also a touch of Kinks' social observation and wit in places, notably the satiric "All the Myths on Sunday."

The quintet, formed in the early '80s, is based in an industrial region of England, and the group's often provocative lyrics have a blue collar undercurrent.

"I try to write songs from my own experience, which has been working class, secondary modern, factory fodder," explains John Butler, the band's singer. "I live in a city totally geared to that system."



James Cotton bridges musical territory from traditional blues to fusion

James Cotton plays tonight

SUN VALLEY — The fifth performance in the eighth annual Sun Valley Music Festival will feature world renowned blues singer, songwriter and harmonica virtuoso, James Cotton, tonight at 6:30 p.m. at the Trail Creek Cabin Grounds.

Since 1966, Cotton has been leading the most successful blues band still performing. Cotton albums have been produced by Mike Bloomfield, Todd Rundgren and Allen Toussaint, and feature appearances by Johnny Winter and Steve Miller.

In the late 60s and early 70s, Cotton was a regular on the Fillmore circuit, appearing with The Grateful Dead, Quicksilver, The Jefferson Airplane, J. Geils and most frequently with Janis Joplin and Paul Butterfield.

In the 80s Cotton is showing no signs of slowing down — if anything just the reverse. In 1987, he received the prestigious W.C. Handy International

Blues Award for "Best Instrumentalist/Harmonica" and has recorded four albums in the past five years.

His latest album, "James Cotton Live" is an all-star session featuring Matt "Guitar" Murphy of Blues Brothers fame, and Luther Tucker. This album and "Take Me Back" both spotlight the traditional blues side of Cotton, while the previous two albums, "High Compression" and the Grammy Award nominated "Live From Chicago" showcase his young "get down and get funky" touring big band which will perform tonight. This band, which headlined the 1987 Chicago Blues Festival, is powered by the muscular drumming of former Muddy Waters sideman, Ray "Killer" Allison (Rocking-Tom).

'Karate Kid Part III' loses its kick

HOLLYWOOD — "The Karate Kid Part III" is one film too many. The fresh and inspired 1984 sleeper, a stirring, worthy crowd-pleaser, starred little Ralph Macchio as the new kid in town who defeats the high school bullies when coached in karate by Noriyuki "Pat" Morita, his apartment house handyman. It did cry out for a sequel, which took us to Okinawa for new and reasonably enjoyable adventures. Part III, however, is not merely a disaster of the most uninspired contrivances but is actually unsuitable for youngsters, the series' natural audience. The Karate Kid has gone the way of Rocky (whose series was also launched by director John Avildsen). Macchio's Danny La Russo and Morita's Mr. Miyagi are back from Okinawa and learn that Martin Kove's Kreese, the nasty proprietor of a karate studio where all those bullies are trained, has gone bankrupt because Danny defeated them all and became a karate champion. Leaving town, Kreese pays a farewell visit to his old Vietnam buddy Silver (a smirky, steely Thomas Ian Griffith), an industrialist. Silver, whose life Kreese saved in the war, is inexplicably a raging, ultrasadistic

psychopath. You would think that Silver would merely offer Kreese a job, but no, he sends him off to Tahiti for a vacation while he plots revenge against Danny with the relish of Ming the Merciless. Danny has reluctantly agreed with Miyagi that he should not defend his title — that the use of karate is to defend one's honor and not to win trophies. Sure enough, after some of the most labored and improbable plot maneuvering ever devised, Danny has to fend his title against a Silver clone (Sean Kanan). Two things make Part III objectionable for impressionable kids. First, it is absurd that as highly a principled a man as Miyagi would, after only the slightest protest, allow Danny to spend his college education savings on launching him in a banana tree nursery (which never, by the way, seems to attract a single customer). In short, the film gives the impression that if you are a whiz at karate you do not need a college education. Second, the monstrous Silver offers to coach the unsuspecting Danny in a manner that does serious harm to the youth.

Robin Williams' performance adds to 'Dead Poets Society'

Capsule reviews

THE DEAD POETS SOCIETY (PG). Against the glacially perfect backdrop of a 1959 East Coast prep school, which director Peter Weir turns into an evil ice palace, star Robin Williams blazes like a poetry-spewing, stand-up comic. He is playing a rebel English teacher, whose motto is "Seize the day!" and who gets his students to drink a little too deeply from the Pterian Spring. Tom Schultman's brave, off-beat script has overly melodramatic twists, but it is a heartening cry of rage against conformism's brutalities and a moving elegy for every inspired teacher who made knowledge live. And, right now, Williams may be the most exciting performer in American movies.

movie. Dennis Quaid gives a dazzling comic impersonation of "The Killer," Winona Ryder delicately etches his child-bride. Myra and Lewis himself re-records his old songs with all the old piano virtuosity and groin-stirring fury and passion.

HONEY, I SHRUNK THE KIDS (PG). Shrunken suburban kids, accidentally tossed out with the trash by their mad scientist daddy, try to fight their way back home through a yard turned into a jungle of monstrous bees and towering foliage. What happens to them is what happens to the movie: the humans shrivel into crawling pillies or caterwauling robots and the grass and the insects and giant cookies take over. It is a special effects marvel, no doubt — but the verbal jokes have the comic timing of a mating dance by blind, jealous elephants.

Bath, his Batpatent and his world heavyweight's Batbel, almost nothing is left of him but glittering blue-gray eyes and a voluptuously full mouth. If a costume alone could stop crime, this one would, because it almost stops Michael Keaton. In the opposite corner, wearing purple satin, clown white, green hair and a permanent rictus, is Jack Nicholson as the Joker. It is his energy that keeps the picture alive; it is certainly not the special effects, the editing, which has no discernible rhythm, or the flaccid screenplay

ending does not fall into generic kung fu silliness — this reunion of suicidal Riggs (Mel Gibson) and fatherly Murtaugh (Danny Glover) puts them through comic and crime-busting paces, as they battle a South African drug ring and team up with an embezzling mob accountant (Joe Pesci) to form a variation on the Three Stooges. Director Richard Donner and company make this a super-craze/rainmaker job; Gibson and Glover keep their cool and charisma

even when toilets fly past them. **PETER PAN (G).** Disney's upbeat, animated adaptation of Sir James Barrie's play remains one of the studio's most colorful and entertaining features. Captain Hook's battles with the Crocodile represent a near-perfect marriage of slapstick animation and a deliciously overstated vocal performance by the late Hans Conried, while the flying sequences offer the special, magic fantasy that can only be realized in

animation. **WEEKEND AT BERNIE'S (PG-13).** Lively, broad farce involving a pair of ambitious but naive junior executives (Andrew McCarthy, Jonathan Silverman) who find it imperative to sustain the illusion that their thoroughly corrupt and jaded boss (Tyler Kiser, hilarious), who has invited them for a weekend in the Hamptons, has not in fact become a corpse. With Catherine Mary Stewart.

GHOSTBUSTERS II (PG). It is almsheating time again and The Boys are back in ferocious form. One-line zingers ricochet around "Ghostbusters II" like ectoplasmic ghoules, contained in a production that builds to a grand finale even funnier than the guys' classic duel with the Stay-Puft Marshmallow Man. Over on the hardware side, this is one of those times when the Industrial Light and Magic crew succeeded totally. **GREAT BALLS OF FIRE (PG-13).** Writer-director Jim McBride turns the early career of rocker Jerry Lee Lewis — his rise to superstardom in 1957-8 and the scandals and censorship that sent him crashing down — into a sort of musical comedy cartoon full of bubble-gum gags and early MGM-style routines. Store limits record sales to minors

Over the past few weeks, Billboard magazine has been tracking several developments that, while not directly connected, suggest that the record industry is heading toward a showdown over its more explicit product.

Several weeks ago, Hastings Books and Music, a 119-store chain centered in the Midwest and Southwest, took the unprecedented step of attaching its own stickers to certain records — mostly rap, heavy metal and comedy — prohibiting their sale to minors. Some large chains (including the 235-store Camelot Music) had previously restricted sales of the few albums with parental advisories; those advisories were placed by the record labels themselves, part of the voluntary program instituted in 1985 by the Recording Industry Association of America under pressure from the Parents Music Resource Center, the PTA and other parental groups.

However, the Hastings move marks the first time a major retailer has instituted its own chain-wide "18 & Purchase" program. The stickers restrict sales of product with "explicit lyrics, graphics or satanic references in both music and books." Some (but not all) albums by such acts as NWA, Sodom, Ice-T, Eddie Murphy, Sam Sneed, 2 Live Crew and Sade's "By Your Side" are included. Leading the list with nine out of 74 listed titles: comedian Richard Pryor.

One Hastings employee said that the company was merely responding to escalating consumer complaints, and this week Billboard reports on subtle behind-the-scenes pressure being exerted on music dealers by mall developers, who traditionally have a great deal of control over what's sold by their lessees. Although such releases constitute only a small fraction of the overall record industry, they seem to be on the increase and, some feel, are becoming increasingly blatant in certain genres.

Since mall locations are high-volume centers, most retailers are not about to risk losing their leases just to sell a dozen 2 Live Crew tapes. One Camelot memo to major record distributors puts it succinctly: "We don't want to censor and pull product, but we don't want to lose these locations over this, either. And we don't need the extremely raunchy lyrics to have a successful music business."

All this activity may force the record industry into a more defined, more responsible position in regards to controversial recordings. For the most part, the labels have been dismissive of parental concerns, deferring to artists' creative freedom and control and trotting out the standard censorship defenses, usually attached to attacks on right-wing fundamentalists.

Adding to the tension is news of a 1987 report to Congress from an in-house legal research service suggesting that Congress does in fact have constitutional authority to regulate explicit recordings, to restrict minors' access to them, and to mandate content labeling or the display of explicit lyrics. All this based on lawmakers' authority to regulate interstate and foreign commerce. The report noted that such regulations would have to be narrowly focused so as not to infringe on adults' rights to the same material and indicated that suggestive lyrics, innuendo and double entendres would not be subject to legislation. But it did not actually suggest any such legislation, merely that Congress had authority to legislate. Critics of the report contended that some of its conclusions were constitutionally dubious and that while states have more leeway in restricting material deemed "harmful to minors," a rigorous federal law would have difficulty withstanding a constitutional challenge.

And finally, one of the ever-present elements of Supreme Court Justice Sandra Day O'Connor's dissenting proposal to combat drunk driving by limiting alcohol advertising revolves around concert sponsorship and celebrity marketing with obvious connotations in sports. This particular debate pits those who feel that such advertising is a promotional tool for the sport, and youth, etc. usage under attack against those who insist their audience of 18-24-year-olds is targeted to be of legal drinking age.

A: Other examples of this casting twist are: Mickey Rooney, who played the younger brother in the movie, "Ah! Keeping a notably low profile is the chief protagonist — former Cabinet Minister John Profumo. His transformation from fallen politico to a shining example of self-effacing public service, with his wife Valerie Hobson, the great British actress, always at his side, would make a great movie.

Television advertisers attempt to defend against the mute button

BOSTON — After years of worrying about "zappers" who use remote controls to make rapid-fire channel switches during commercials, television advertisers are facing another weapon: the mute button.

Some advertisers sound off against prospective muters, or deny they exist, but some industry observers claim the muting threat is having an impact on the modern commercial.

"You can see how much more entertaining commercials are now. That I feel is an indication that they are quite concerned, that they can't just present the product," said Camille Elebash, an advertising professor at the University of Alabama in Tuscaloosa.

"My guess is that the button has had a modest effect, no doubt about it. It's one of the factors influencing the reformatting of commercials, making commercials look more like rock videos, sportscasts or newscasts," said Everette Dennis,

executive director of the Gannett Center for Media Studies at Columbia University.

Mute buttons are becoming more widely available. In 1989, an

A.C. Nielsen survey showed 72 percent of a 4,000-person sample owned remote control mechanisms, compared with 23 percent of a survey group in 1985.

Bobby Calder, a professor of marketing and psychology at Northwestern University's Kellogg School of Management called the mute button's impact obvious.

"The traditional way (of advertising) is to very early on get attention, identify the product, but that may be precisely the kind of activity that signals people to turn off the sound," he said.

Advertisers can fight back, says Calder, with the same tactics they use against zapping, such as building interest slowly, telling some kind of story, or creating a commercial so cute that viewers just want to watch it.

Anheuser-Busch Cos. made such an attempt during this year's Super Bowl, with a series of commercials featuring a game between teams of animated beer bottles labeled Bud and Bud Light. If sports fans

watched the last spot, they knew Bud eked out a last-minute victory.

One recent campaign for Goodyear had no spoken words at all. Made by Hill Holliday,

Connors & Cosmopoulos Inc., the commercials flashed a series of images and questions, such as "Are you ready for a change?" accompanied by a hard rock musical track.

John F. Farrell, executive vice president and chief creative director for Hill, Holliday, said the threat of remote control muting had no influence on the campaign's style.

Zenith Electronics Corp. included a mute button on the first remote control device, introduced in the 1950s, and on every remote control the company issued thereafter.

One 1987 Zenith advertisement even urged consumers to "just touch a button to

shut off the sound of long, annoying commercials while the picture remains on the screen."

The growth in remote-control unit sales focused attention on channel zapping several years ago, but many in the advertising industry turn a deaf ear to the concept of consumer muting.

"My gut tells me that it's a non-issue. I just don't believe that people do that," said Allen Banks, a media director for Saatchi & Saatchi DFS Advertising Inc.

According to a 1986 survey by Television Audience Assessment, 40 percent of 3,000 day-time viewers sampled missed commercials, but muting or changing the channels accounted for only about 5 percent.

Other advertisers said they recognized the power of the mute button, but were resigned to its use.

"While zapping is more of a boredom mechanism, muting seems to be an issue of someone has something else to do. I think at that point we've lost them anyway," said Bill Oakley, the creative director on the Budweiser account and vice president of Darcy Masius Benton & Bowles-St. Louis.

Religious group seeks boycott of Clorax, Mennen companies

CHICAGO (AP) — A religious group on Monday called for a one-year boycott of the Mennen Co. and Clorox Corp. for advertising on television programs full of "sex, violence and profanity."

Christian Leaders for Responsible Television, or Clear-TV, said it asked more than 500 companies that advertise on network television not to sponsor certain programs during the sweeps rating period, April 27 through May 24.

Results from monitoring in 33 states "showed that Mennen and Clorox ignored Clear-TV's request not to advertise on programs high in incidents of sex, violence and profanity during the monitoring period," said Billy Melvin, chairman of the group and executive director of the Wheaton-based National Association of Evangelicals.

Programs the group found particularly offensive during that period included "Miami Vice," "Tour of Duty" and "Midnight Caller,"

Melvin said. Clear-TV describes itself as a coalition of 1,600 Christian leaders with constituencies totaling 60 million people. Its founder, the Rev. Donald Wildmon of Tupelo, Miss., is a vocal critic of "anti-Christian" television.

An anti-censorship group founded by television producer Norman Lear, People for the American Way, predicts the group's latest boycott won't have much impact.

"Past Wildmon boycotts have failed miserably at the checkout counter, and I expect this latest effort will fail as well," said Arthur Kropp, president of the Washington, D.C.-based group.

Morristown, N.J.-based Mennen issued a similar statement, saying in part: "The Mennen Co. has a long-standing policy of pre-screening programs and frequently declines to sponsor programs that do not meet its standards."
