Wind belts Buhl

BUHL — A group of neighbors spent Thursday sawing fallen trees, talking with insurance adjusters and shaking their heads about a hit-and-run storm that ripped awnings off a swing set, turned down bedsheets and left behind thousands of dollars of damage.

An air vent dangled from the damaged part of the house and the front door couldn't be opened. Six other uprooted trees formed a jungle around the house.

"All I heard was a swish and then it was over," she said. Grosserhode's son, Francis, cut away with a chain saw at one of the fallen branches that dwarfed the house. A friend and a group of hired hands from a neighbor's farm helped with the cleanup as well.

No other homes were damaged in Wednesday evening's storm, but uprooted trees totaled Bertha Norris' chicken coop and crushed Wayne Johnson's horse trailer.

The wind lasted only about five minutes, witnesses said. Both Grosserhode and Galkin were convinced the sudden winds could have been a twister, but Bill Galkin with the National Weather Service's Kimberly station called the phenomenon a "microburst."

A microburst occurs when winds moving inside the thundercloud push their way through the bottom of the cloud, Galkin said.

Trees are heavy with leaves right now, Galkin said, and the ground is soft in irrigated areas, which makes trees more susceptible to being blown over.

He also said winds from microbursts can shift suddenly, which a lot of trees can't take. Galkin predicts the Magic Valley will continue to see fairly warm, 85-to-90-degree days with chances of thunderstorms, mainly in the early afternoon and evening, during the strongest periods of heating.

In addition to the wind, Wednesday's storm dropped heavy rains that overflowed ditches and caused mudslides that closed River Road East in the Snake River Canyon.

A 6-foot-high rock and dirt slide covered one section of the river.

front road, but about 15 smaller slides-and-waterfalls laced the rest of the road, which runs east along the Snake River beginning at Clear Lakes Avenue.

A Buhl Highway District worker Thursday used a backhoe to remove plugged culverts that funneled water under the roadway and to fill in areas of the road that had washed away.

No one answered at the highway district's office and it is unknown when the road will be reopened.

Sections of other less-traveled and private roads were washed out as well, said Jack Eakin, Twin Falls Canal Co. general manager. He said many of the canals' culverts plugged and some lateral ditches simply overflowed.

The storm wound its way along the Snake River canyon and through Jerome, Galkin said. But microburst winds usually die quickly, he added, explaining why the Jerome County Sheriff's Department received no reports of damage.

The Grosserhodes had no estimate of damage to their house. Johnson estimated his trailer, which was insured, suffered \$2,000 worth of damage.

"The tree wrinkled it up pretty good," he said. He said the water was coming down so hard he didn't even see the tree topple onto his trailer.

Norris, up the road, meanwhile said she's not sure where she'll house the 10 ducks that roosted in the crushed chicken coop.

A metal swing set in her yard was yanked from its heavy stakes.

Pakistan may be go-between for U.S., Iran

WASHINGTON — The Bush administration said Thursday there might eventually be direct U.S.-Iran talks on the Middle East hostages, while officials encouraged an intermediary role by Pakistan in the meantime.

"We're willing to have direct talks with Iran as long as they were authoritative officials who represented the government," said presidential press secretary Marlin Fitzwater.

Fitzwater suggested it was premature to expect such contacts at this point. "We're nowhere near that," he said.

"Still, the spokesman said, we would not be ruling out direct discussions of some future point."

The United States severed diplomatic ties with Tehran in 1979 after the Islamic revolution. The United States, if asked after the U.S. Embassy hostages a decade ago.

Meanwhile, Thursday, U.S. officials welcomed reports that Pakistani Foreign Minister Sahabzada Yaqub Khan would go to Tehran next week and be willing to serve as an intermediary in indirect talks between this nation and Iran.

A senior administration official said Pakistan's role could be critical in persuading Iran to pressure pro-Iranian groups into releasing Americans and Westerners held in Lebanon.

"Pakistan is a Moslem country with access and ties to other Moslem countries and with special knowledge of Iran's involvement" in the hostage situation, said the official, who declined to be identified.

A spokesman at the Pakistan Embassy said that "Since Pakistan has good relations with both Iran and the United States, it asked Pakistan would be willing to mediate in the hostage crisis."

Pair of Gem plants on 'Toxic 500' list

WASHINGTON — Five hundred industrial plants account for most of the toxic chemical releases reported to the government, and a third of the 10.3 billion pounds of hazardous wastes come from only 24 plants, a conservation group said Thursday.

The National Wildlife Federation analysis of government-toxic-release statistics said that the biggest polluters — the "Toxic 500" — were scattered in 44 states.

Two of those plants were in Idaho. Listed 184th was the Monsanto plant at Soda Springs, emitting 7.62 million pounds of waste, while the FMC Corp. plant at Pocatello was

328th at 4.14 million pounds. The dozen largest producers of toxic wastes, each releasing more than 100-million pounds, buried them on site or nearby or used a procedure of deep injection into the earth, prompting the conservation group to raise concerns about possible contamination of groundwater.

Industry representatives have defended such procedures as being safe.

According to the report, the 500 facilities released or buried 7.5 billion pounds of toxic wastes during 1987, more than 70 percent of the total releases reported to the

DC-10 safe, nation's top aviation official declares

WASHINGTON — The nation's top aviation official said Thursday that DC-10s are safe with no evidence to justify grounding the plane despite two incidents in a month involving explosive engine failure.

Federal Aviation Administrator James B. Busey defended the DC-10 at a news briefing as a government industry task force began examining possible design changes in the McDonnell Douglas plane and other wide-body jetliners to prevent explosive engine failures from disabling the planes.

"It's safe to fly. I would fly in the aircraft today," Busey said of the DC-10, less than a day after a Northwest Airlines DC-10 made a safe emergency landing in Denver with holes blasted in the housing of its tail-mounted engine.

"We know of no hard facts that would lead us to take action to ground the DC-10," the administrator said when asked about its safety. Busey formed a task force last month, citing the July 19 crash of a United Airlines DC-10.

Idaho fire crews 'turn corner'

Fire crews continued their advance against the worst of Idaho's major wildfires Thursday as cooler, moister air kept flames in check. Fire bosses predicted nearly all the blazes would be contained within a week.

"They're making a lot of progress," Payette National Forest spokesman Vance Persing said. "That rain really turned the corner." There were still hot spots on major fires in western and central Idaho, and fire strategists deployed bucket-toting helicopters to douse them with water. But the progress was evidence as total timber and

range still flame in the state dropped below 100,000 acres for the first time in a week.

"But the big concentration now is on mop up, and that's important because that's where they widen the lines and cool the fire," spokeswoman Marcia Nelson said.

Wildlife biologists, watershed specialists and resource experts were already moving through burned-out areas of the backcountry to begin rehabilitation. Stream-bed stabilization was under way, and near Idaho City, teams developed seed mixtures for charrad areas near Elk Creek. Thousands of pounds of grass seed and fertilizer were on order, and straw was being

spread on loosened hillsides to hold soil until new plants take hold. The wet weather system that began moving through the West on Tuesday allowed major gains against wildfires that just a week ago were raging over 220,000 acres. The Boise Interagency Fire Center, which coordinates the national battle against wildfire, said 116,000 acres were now burning and that number is falling constantly. Some 23,000 firefighters, backed up by federal troops and National Guardsmen, remained on the lines but mainly to mop up.

The Fire Center reported 38,000 lightning strikes during the 24 hours

Record beet crop for state

WASHINGTON — Idaho farmers are raising a record beet and near-record wheat and bean crops despite a dry July, the government reports.

The Agriculture Department's optimistic outlook on Thursday came as key commodity markets remained strong amid a second straight year of weather-induced setbacks for growers in other parts of the nation.

Department analysts, using Aug. 1 field conditions for their first beet harvest projection of the season, put the 1989 Idaho crop at over 4.3 million tons, 340,000 tons ahead of last year and 150,000 tons over the 1987 record. Harvested area was up 11,000 acres from 1988 to 177,000 acres, but yield was also expected to be

greater this year at 25 tons an acre. The dried bean crop was forecast at 322.6 million pounds, 1,920 pounds an acre, for the third largest crop the state has produced. The forecast for nearly 97 million pounds more than last year's output was fueled a 42 percent average increase as growers moved to cash in on their strongest market in eight years. The average price in Idaho has been over \$30 a hundredweight for the past five straight months. That is double the average a year ago.

Total wheat production was put at just under 94.3 million bushels, down slightly from the July forecast but nearly 19 million bushels over last year's harvest. It would be the third largest wheat crop on record with yields averaging 68.8 bushels an acre, also the third best ever.

Team examines blown DC-10 engine

DENVER (AP) — Federal investigators Thursday examined the battered tail engine of a Northwest Airlines DC-10 that made an emergency landing after the engine broke up.

None of the 256 people aboard was injured. A piece of the engine's tail cone was missing and there were numerous small holes in the engine cover, said Joseph Nall, a member of the National Transportation Safety Board.

The initial look at the aircraft shows relatively minor external damage to the No. 2 engine, Nall said after investigators inspected the plane in a hangar at Stapleton International Airport.

Stapleton spokesman Richard Boulware, who saw the damaged engine, said, "One of the holes was big enough I could have stuck my hand through."

Boulware said he also saw broken turbine fan blades inside the engine.

Officials declined to compare Wednesday's incident with the tail engine failure that preceded last month's crash of a United Airlines DC-10 in Sioux City, Iowa, that killed 111 people.

 Environmental Protection Agency last year under a new disclosure requirement that covered some 18,000 facilities.

The raw EPA figures were made public in June but no plant-by-plant breakdown was given along the lines of the federation's report, though the information was available in electronic form in EPA's open computer files.

Using the government statistics

and databank, the Wildlife Federation tabulated a list of the biggest polluters in a 486-page report titled "The Toxic 500."

According to the report, about 3.5 billion pounds of toxic wastes were produced by only 24 plants, with the dozen facilities each reporting the disposal — usually into the ground — of more than 100 million pounds of toxics. A total of 118 plants reported releases of at least 10 million pounds of toxic chemicals and each the 500-

polluters reported releases of at least 2.5 million pounds.

The releases, which are usually legal — included more than 300 different chemicals and metals, 39 of which are considered carcinogenic, or cancer-causing.

The biggest polluter on the list was the Alcoa plant in Point Comfort, Texas, which reported 465 million pounds of toxic wastes in 1987, almost all of it aluminum oxide burned at the facility.

Satellite hears emergency signals

ADDIS ABABA, Ethiopia (AP) — Crews searching for the plane carrying U.S. Rep. Mickey Leland and 13 companions were told a U.S. weather satellite picked up two emergency signals, one on Thursday and one early Friday.

The satellite was passing directly over Ethiopia when it picked up the second signal, far away from the first signal picked up Thursday but still boosting confidence that it came from the missing plane.

The satellite read the second signal as coming at 1 a.m. Friday (4 p.m. MDT Thursday) from about 100 miles north-northwest of Addis Ababa, capital of Ethiopia, where the Texas Democrat's plane vanished Monday. It was supposed to be going southwest, directly opposite from where the new signal was detected.

Officials believe the first signal came from 84 miles southeast of Addis Ababa. Both signals were far from the flight path Leland's plane would have taken to reach Fugido refugee camp for which Leland, chairman of the House Select Committee on Hunger, was camped.

The camp lies 480 miles southwest of Addis Ababa near the Sudanese border.

The Resolution Trust Corp. formed Wednesday when President Bush signed the landmark S&L legislation, said it shut down three small S&Ls in Florida, Texas and Illinois.

In all three cases, regulators transferred the insured deposits of the failed institutions to healthy banks or S&Ls and the branches of the closed units branches will reopen Friday under the names of the institutions acquiring the deposits.

The acquiring institutions all retain an option to purchase loans and other assets of the failed S&Ls. The government will have to sell what they don't take.

At the same time it disposed of three institutions, the Resolution Trust Corp. said it also took control of three additional institutions, keeping its list of problem S&Ls at 262 in 33 states.

Train crash death toll at least 112

GUASAVE, Mexico (AP) — Rescue teams searching along the San Rafael River on Thursday found bodies as far as 14 miles downstream from the site of a rail disaster that killed at least 112 people, the government news agency said.

The number of injured reached 205, the Notimex agency quoted state security coordinator Jose Carlos Saracho as saying, but hospital officials said most victims were treated for minor injuries and released.

The federal Transportation Department said the 11-car train, carrying about 350 people, plunged off a bridge Wednesday morning following torrential rains and fell about 25 feet into the river in northwestern Mexico.

S&L regulators close 3 companies

WASHINGTON (AP) — Regulators on Thursday closed the first of the problem savings and loans contributing to the \$20 billion a day in losses to the government borrowed the first \$5 billion installment of the bailout.

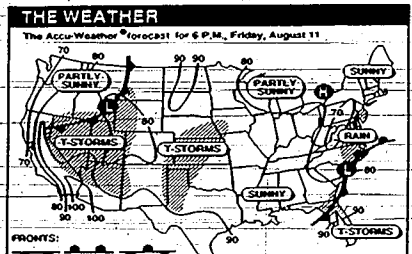

Summary: The National Weather Service says a low pressure was centered off the British Columbia coast and high pressure was centered over the Four Corners area.

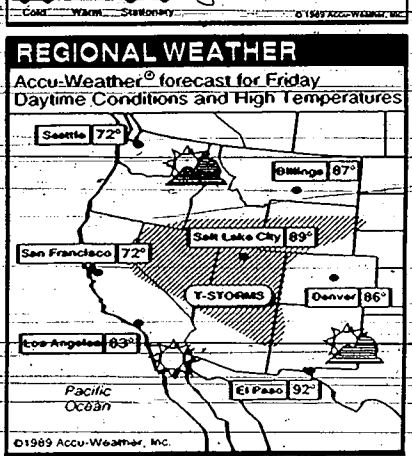
The moist and unstable southwest air flux resulted in the weather centers continued to breed thundershowers over the Gem State, especially in the south where brief heavy rain showers and hail were reported Thursday.

Thunderstorm activity is expected to be a little less active over the weekend.

Storm activity was heavy Thursday afternoon. Around Pocatello, heavy showers produced 3.0 inch of rain in about 20 minutes 1.25 inches of hail just east of the city. Numerous lightning strikes also were recorded over the southwest, southern and east central portions.

The pollen count in Twin Falls Thursday was 19 particles per cubic meter of air.

The extended forecast for Southern Idaho — Sunny but with widely scattered afternoon and evening showers and thundershowers Sunday through

 through midday Thursday, but officials said most of the 700 fires started around the West by those strikes were small enough to be easily handled.

Fire managers demobilized the 1,200 soldiers from the 9th Infantry Division and began shipping them back to Fort Lewis after wrapping up work on blazes in Oregon.

The hottest spots were still in western and central Idaho, where 9,600 firefighters and soldiers were still committed to the campaign against fires that were pushing resource losses toward \$100 million.

But improved conditions finally removed fire from immediate danger: dozens of cabins, lodges and other buildings that just days ago were threatened by flames.

The break offered by the cooler weather helped crews contain the 6,800-acre Curran Mountain southwest of Riggin's early Thursday; the 10,000-acre Emmett Complex of fires in Hell's Canyon on the Oregon border was targeted for containment late in day.

The 19,700-acre Warm Lake Complex east of Cascade should be contained by Sunday with the 44,000-acre Lowman Complex northeast of Boise reined in a day later.

 Winter wheat production remained unchanged at nearly 55.1 million bushels or 68 bushels an acre while spring wheat output was dropped slightly from July's estimate to 39.2 million bushels or 70 bushels an acre, a reflection of the dry July weather. Both forecasts are significantly higher than last year's crops.

The Idaho production differed dramatically from the national picture as drought devastated the winter wheat crop in Kansas for the second straight year to knock the

total harvest off 6 percent from last year's weather-slashed output. Increased spring wheat acreage resulted in more than doubling the estimated harvest from last year to this, but it was only enough to push total wheat production nationally up 13 percent from 1988.

The tight supply situation has kept prices strong in Idaho, and even though the mid-July market estimate for wheat slipped below \$4 a bushel for the first time in 34 months it was still as quarter higher than last summer's market that was already escalating because of the 1988 drought.

 and moved about 20 yards into Norris driveway; and the wings were torn off.

Norris said the wind blasted through her bedroom window, turning down the sheets and moving her husband's pillow to the foot of the bed.

The storm, which Idaho Power Co. officials say started about 4 p.m., also pushed trees into power lines. Sid Brewer, engineering supervisor, said crews worked until 1 a.m. to restore power to parts of Buhl, Jerome, the Mini-Cassia area and the Wood River Valley.

At the home Cindy Peterson rents, the wind crashed a trailer into the side of the house, and hay bales got flipped upward on top of a higher stack.

"I've lived here 33 years and I've never seen a storm like this," Grosserhede said.

PUC looks into US West price hike

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Public Utilities Commission wants to know why US West Communications has not given customers 30 days' notice regarding a price change.

The PUC recently learned that effective July 31, US West was increasing charges for work done on customer's premises and the customers would learn of the higher cost only after calling the company's repair center for service.

Under the Idaho Telecommunications Act of 1988, phone companies must give 10-days' notice for changes in long distance, WATS, private line and special access charges. But there is no such requirement on deregulated services such as repairs.

The PUC is asking US West to explain by Aug. 18 why it has diverged from its stated position.

Woman accepts manslaughter charge

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — A former Bonneville County woman accused of killing her husband has agreed to a plea bargain where her second-degree murder charge would be reduced to voluntary manslaughter.

Billie Arlene Woolf, 45, Reno, Nev., was charged this spring by a Bonneville County grand jury in the shooting death of Arland Woolf at their rural Idaho Falls home in 1987.

Under the plea bargain, the prosecution dropped the sentence enhancement for using a firearm in commission of a felony.

Bacteria cause Ashton boil order

ASHTON (AP) — Bacteria found in the city's water supply have Ashton residents under a boil order until further notice.

They were alerted Wednesday contamination had been found in a routine sampling of the municipal water supply.

City Clerk Elaine Olson said a bacteria count of two parts per million was found in a water sample Monday.

Pocatello won't pave Bonneville Park

POCATELLO (AP) — The city of Pocatello has called a truce over the move to turn Bonneville Park into a parking lot.

Pocatello has forgotten its proposal and will give the Greater Pocatello Senior Citizens more parking

around the Bonneville Community Center.

"Basically, we were glad to see the neighborhood rally and fight to save the park, and we apologize for being insensitive to residents' concerns," Mayor Dick Finlayson said following a Wednesday neighborhood meeting. "I guess we can run up the white flag and call a truce."

Melba motorcyclist dies in accident

MELBA (AP) — A motorcyclist was killed early Thursday and his female passenger suffered minor injuries in an accident on Idaho 45 just north of the Snake River, authorities reported.

The victim was identified as Sidney Thiel, 34, of Melba.

The Canyon County Sheriff's Department said Thiel was northbound toward Melba at a high rate of speed when the motorcycle spun out of control on some loose gravel and flipped.

Boise board members may face recall

BOISE (AP) — Critics plan to begin circulating recall petitions against six Boise School Board members in the wake of a judge's ruling that a state law restricting the right to oust trustees is unconstitutional.

While a conservative group pushing the recall hailed the decision Wednesday, School Board President Quentin Homer viewed it as "dangerous."

"It's going to create a chaotic situation" in which trustees will shy away from taking any action that could be perceived as even slightly controversial, Homer said.

Givens considers challenging Craig

LEWISTON (AP) — Former Democratic state representative Joanna Givens of Coeur d'Alene is exploring the idea of a second challenge for Republican Rep. Larry Craig's 1st Congressional District seat.

Mrs. Givens, who lost to Craig last year, on Wednesday announced formation of an exploratory committee. The 10-member group will assess her ability to attract financial and volunteer support for a 1990 race.

The committee hopes to raise \$5,000 to \$10,000 to allow Mrs. Givens to test the political waters throughout the 1st District.

Jones to challenge court ruling

BOISE (AP) — Idaho Attorney General Jim Jones is going to the U.S. Supreme Court in a bid to reverse a state Supreme Court ruling he claims "silences some of our finest sex abuse victims while benefiting their molesters."

Jones said Thursday the nation's highest court was being asked to overturn the June 13 Idaho Supreme Court ruling that voided the child sexual abuse conviction of a Boise woman charged with holding her 2½-year-old and 5½-year-old daughters while her live-in boyfriend sexually molested them.

The Idaho court's controversial 3-1 decision slapped strict limitations on the use of hearsay testimony in abuse trials, primarily statements from doctors, social workers or others relating comments about the allegations made to them by the child victims.

Chief Justice Robert Bakes said in

his scathing dissent that he had never seen any court in the nation impose the kinds of standards the majority set out in the case of Laura Lee Wright of Boise.

The majority said the current law allowed in using hearsay testimony violated the constitutional rights of defendants to confront the witnesses against them. Bakes maintained the new standards will limit that testimony to only spontaneous outbursts from the victims or responses to open-ended questions posed by a trained specialist during a videotaped interview.

"This case is a travesty," and we can't permit it to stand," Jones said. "Many sex abuse prosecutions will

have to be dismissed if prosecutors are unable to use incriminating statements made by children under 5 years of age.

In announcing his decision to go to the nation's highest court, Jones also questioned the motives of expert witnesses involved in the Wright trial, claiming they have demonstrated prejudice against abuse victims.

Jones raised questions about one of the experts because he "did work done by another man who was recently convicted of tampering with witnesses and evidence.

The day after the high court ruling was issued, 2nd District Judge John Bengtson halted a child molestation case to review its impact. He determined the hearsay testimony he had allowed would withstand the new test, and the defendant was ultimately convicted.

Rancher claims state pollutes creek

BOISE (AP) — A cattle rancher on Thursday accused the state of polluting Tenuille Creek and his irrigated pasture near the main prison, and he asked a judge to stop the illegal activity and order the state to pay him \$650,000 in damages.

Richard Money, who runs a 476-acre cattle operation adjacent to the prison, said the prison has been illegally discharging sewage into the creek and onto his land since at least 1985, and while former Warden A. Arava told him the state would do something about it 2½ years ago, no action has yet been taken.

With pictures and laboratory analyses to support the claims of illegal sewage discharge, the suit filed in 4th District Court accused Corrections Department officials of filing false reports with the federal government and failing to obtain required permits for expansion of the sewage facility to accommodate the new maximum-security prison opening this fall.

State officials had no immediate comment beyond a statement from Andrus administration attorney John Carter that the state knows of no damage suffered by Money due to the operation of the sewage system.






Retain grazing on public lands

Earl Etter, Sr.'s, July 27 guest opinion regarding use of our public lands was encouraging, if not entirely accurate.

It was encouraging to read Etter's promise that he and other sportsmen he knows would not "vote to deny grazing on public lands."

The Idaho Cattle Association in fact agrees with Mr. Etter. Cattlemen consider the true Idaho sportsman a fellow user of our public lands and an ally against the environmental extremists and so-called "animal rights" activists who clearly advocate banning or severely restricting grazing — and no doubt, some day, hunting — on our public lands.

Mr. Etter need look no further than the Wilderness Society, the so-called "Sportsmen's Coalition" (which shares Wilderness Society offices), the Committee for Idaho's High Desert, and eco-terrorist groups such as "Earth First!" to find those actively promoting severe cutbacks or outright removal of all cattle from public lands.

The beef cattle industry produces Idaho agriculture's No. 1 cash commodity, pumping over \$200 million a year into our state's economy. Obviously, should the environmentalist slogan "cattle free by '93" become reality, the economic damage to Idaho — especially in agriculture-dependent areas such as the Magic Valley — would be immense.

Just how immense is an indication of how inaccurate and misleading Mr. Etter's charges are.

He didn't even come close when he falsely stated that only about 5 percent of Idaho cattle are grazed on public lands.

With 70 percent of Idaho's land mass government-owned, and with private pasture scarce, a full 88 percent of all cattle raised in Idaho are grazed on public lands, the U.S. Department of Interior says.

Our cattle industry's dependence on public lands is not by choice, like most Idahoans, cattlemen wish less of our state's land area were owned and controlled by bureaucrats on the Potomac.

Mr. Etter further criticizes ranchers who pay lower fees for public rangeland than for private pasture.

A Utah State University study indicates such criticism is, again, misleading: "News coverage of the grazing fee controversy denies only the fact that private grazing fees greatly exceed those charged on federal rangelands. But federal grazing fees are only a small part of total costs paid by ranchers grazing live-

stock on public lands. Federal range permits also pay substantial non-fee costs they would not have to pay on private range leases.

Studies by USU, University of Nevada-Reno, and Colorado State indicate the rancher's expenses for grazing on public lands are substantially higher than private pasture.

The newest study, released in April by the University of Idaho, found that Idaho ranchers they studied paid total average expenses of \$15.31 per animal unit month to graze on private pasture, while total expense of grazing on public lands is substantially higher at \$17.54 despite the lower grazing fee.

Private pasture leases cover operation costs for which the pasture owner is responsible: repairs, maintenance, legal and accounting costs, interest, utilities, taxes, fuel, insurance, supplies, labor, depreciation, water, forage, roads, living facilities, livestock facilities and interior fencing.

The public lands rancher finances all such costs himself — with the additional costs of greater death loss, veterinary expense, travel, and labor due to the sheer expense of rangelands.

Congress recognized that public grazing brings a lower fair market price when enacting the current grazing fee formula, which this year established the \$1.86 per animal unit month cattlemen must pay to graze on public lands.

Mr. Etter's assurances that he personally does not support elimination of public land grazing rings hollow when he employs the rhetoric and reasoning of those who do. Still, despite his less than accurate charges, cattlemen are anxious to thank him at his word that he joins us in opposing "cattle free by '93."

Should advocates of the slogan succeed, we must be prepared to tell our public schools and other state services how to replace the tax revenues generated from the \$600 million Idaho's cattle industry produces each year through responsible use of our public lands.

Congress must protect civil rights

This past term the U.S. Supreme Court decided several cases that, for the first time since Reconstruction, make the elusive goals of equality and justice harder for minorities, women and the elderly to attain.

When read individually, these opinions appear to turn on what President Bush has described as "technical legal issues." But when read together, the decisions show a systematic tilt against civil rights claims.

The court's historic shift is reflected in three aspects of the cases decided. It interpreted statutes expressly designed to expand remedies for civil rights violations as having the effect of limiting the rights already available under existing law; it misinterpreted legislative history to give civil rights statutes the narrowest reach possible, and it showed a preference for civil rights claims by white men.

The court's inclination to read later statutes as limiting rights under pre-existing law was starkly presented in a case involving an important 19th century civil rights regulation known as Section 1981. The law of that era prohibits racial discrimination in the making and enforcement of private contracts and has proved a powerful tool for combating job-related race discrimination. Yet the court has now held that while this law prohibits racial discrimination in hiring, it does not protect employees once they are on board. This leaves no effective federal remedy for on-the-job racial harassment. Ironically, the court justified this cramped interpretation in part by treating the historic Civil Rights Act of 1964 as intending to limit, rather than expand, civil rights.

In two other recent cases, the court employed similar reasoning to shield government institutions or employees from liability in cases of racial discrimination. The decisions involved a second Reconstruction-era statute, known as Section

of older workers.

At the same time, the court created opportunities for one segment of society — white men — to re-litigate matters already resolved. Contrary to standard practice, the court gave unlimited time to white firefighters to initiate an attack on a settlement entered into as a result of a discrimination suit brought by black firefighters.

This decision was reached despite the fact that the white firefighters had knowingly decided not to participate in the original litigation.

On the same day the court decided a case involving women employees who were also attacking a discriminatory seniority system. There the court threw the suit out for being brought too late, even as it acknowledged that the discriminatory nature of the seniority system could not have been identified any earlier. One struggles to articulate the rule of law that would hold open the courthouse door for men but close it on women.

Fortunately, most of these cases involve misinterpretations of statutory rather than constitutional provisions. That means that Congress can and should reaffirm this nation's commitment to eradicating discrimination. In drafting a legislative response, Congress would do well to read these cases closely to ensure that any new laws are not as vulnerable as those on the books to the court's biased methods of interpreting and applying civil rights statutes. Once it was the Supreme Court that was the protector of civil rights. Today, it must be the people's branch of government — Congress.

Spending excessive; tax regressive

WASHINGTON — "In our public behavior — as, to some degree, in our private behavior — we consume today as if there were no tomorrow. We attend too little to the issues of investment necessary to make tomorrow brighter."

Says Spoke Richard G. Darman to the National Press Club two weeks ago.

Wise words. Too bad Darman doesn't hold a position of power in Washington. Like many director of the Office of Management and Budget.

Wait a minute. Darman is the director of the Office of Management and Budget.

A person could be forgiven for forgetting since Darman's counsels seem, so far, to have been little heeded by the administration he serves. If the Bush presidency, as Darman now claims, really means to seek a "New Balance," one that involves "more complexity, less simplification; more consensus-building, less polarization," such a shift away from fixation on short-term political advantage will be as welcome as it is overdue.

So far, the new fiscal wisdom (kinder, gentler, but unfunded — promises aside) is hardly in evidence in fiscal policy. The Bush administration got things off to an inauspicious start with its January budget that set new records for high-wire number juggling — creating, for example, a "black box" of programs from which Congress was, miraculously, to produce \$12 billion in savings.

Since Congress would have had to take all the heat from the public if it had wanted to be more honest, the predictable result was a budget agreement loaded with phony savings. Moreover, the administration is hoping to use more phony shifting \$3 billion in military payments back across the fiscal deadline from October into September and underestimating defense spending.

The savings-and-loan bailout, notes House Budget Committee Chairman Leon Panetta, provides another example of the White House "playing the game for PR advantage." True, the Bush administration, having no real choice, did face up to the need to prop up the dying system (but not before a year-end flurry of questionable multibillion-dollar deals kept the system afloat until the inauguration).

And true, the House wanted to exclude the costs

of the bailout from the Gramm-Rudman deficit-reduction targets (which are, in any case, at best a pious wish and at worst an inducement for costly finagling). But the Bush administration went much further to demand that the bailout costs be "put off budget." This plan, which Congress accepted in part last week under threat of a Bush veto, will actually add to the true taxpayer cost by setting up a private agency that will have to borrow at above-Treasury rates to finance bailout costs. Again, the administration, as Panetta observes, is "literally paying more to hide the issue."

The clearest sign that the administration is really committed to a long-term focus could come in a compromise on capital gains taxation. Bush came into office proposing to drop the capital gains tax to 15 percent from the 28 percent rate now paid by the wealthiest taxpayers (less 10 percent tax on face rate as high as 33 percent); but neither Congress nor the administration seems much concerned about that egregious inequity. The tax break was supposed to persuade so many investors to step up asset sales — never mind long-term investment considerations — that, despite the much lower rate, the Treasury would get a \$6 billion windfall next year.

But at what future cost? Not only would the short-term savings likely come at the expense of ultimate revenue losses (the Joint Tax Committee projects a six-year cost of \$24 billion), but they would reopen opportunities for tax sheltering that the 1986 tax reform supposedly closed.

If the administration is really interested in the long term, it will drop its plan in favor of one along the lines of the one that Ways and Means committee chairman Danny Rostenkowski, under pressure from both Republicans and dissident Democrats, has finally proposed: Such a plan would "drop the short-term windfall gimmick and instead end capital gains taxes to take account of inflation. To be fair in going about this — as well as to "unlock" long-held assets that might otherwise pass untaxed through inheritance — the adjustment would be applied, within limits, to investments made in the past as well as to those made in the future. An additional exclusion could

be provided for assets held several years in the future — the long-term new investment Darman says he wants to encourage.

More fundamentally, Darman and his administration should ask themselves how their fiscal plans square with their professed commitment to leading the country to needed sacrifice. Almost 60 percent of the capital gains cut Bush proposed would have accrued to the top 1 percent of taxpayers. (Numbers showing a broader distribution of benefits are based on faulty income statistics that exclude much untaxed income received by top-bracket taxpayers.)

This further favoritism would be added to a tax system already heavily skewed toward payroll taxes that fall most heavily on average wage-earners. As The Wall Street Journal's Alan Murray recently pointed out, taxes, other than Social Security taxes, are almost 20 percent lower relative to GNP than they were 25 years ago. Meanwhile, Social Security tax surpluses are financing shortfalls in other parts of the budget. This regressive tax shift would not be so worrisome if it were not being imposed on a U.S. income distribution that, by any measure, has become substantially more unequal over the past decade.

To the extent that declining real wages for average workers are the product of foreign competition, there is not a whole lot that the government can profitably do to cushion the impact. But there is no excuse for further pursuing Reagan-era tax and spending policies that not only helped to enlarge the burgeoning ranks of the nation's super-rich, but arrested progress in combating discrimination among the more rapidly-increasing super-poor.

If the OMB director wants to be more successful than his hapless predecessor, David Stockman, in changing public attitudes about public and private spending, he had better hope that he can succeed where Stockman did not — namely, in convincing his boss that commitment to solving the nation's problems needs to reach beyond the next election's news, and even beyond the next election.

Measles cases increase dramatically

CHICAGO (AP) — After an eight-year retreat, measles has launched a new assault on the United States, afflicting more than 6,400 people this year and killing as many as 26.

Officials are scrambling for new strategies against the old childhood nemesis.

The number of measles cases is 370 percent higher than it was at this time last year, said Dr. William Atkinson of the national Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta.

Immunization is the key — youngsters should get measles-mumps-rubella vaccinations starting at 16 months of age.

And even single-dose vaccinations aren't sure protection. After vaccinated high schoolers and college students started falling sick with measles early this year, the American Academy of Pediatrics in July recommended that all Americans under 32 get booster shots.

Man with gun threatens governor

PHOENIX (AP) — A man drew a gun on Gov. Rose Mofford at a restaurant Thursday, but no shots were fired and she was unharmed, her press secretary said.

The governor's security detail grabbed the man and pushed him to the ground, said the press secretary, Yada Manager. Manager said officers were holding the man for investigation.

The incident occurred in Phoenix, where Mofford and other state officials were at a task force meeting on state prisons. Manager said Mofford flew on to Yuma to inspect damage from a storm on Wednesday.

Suspect returns to Los Angeles

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Prosecutors pounced on a defense attorney's error Thursday and brought back to Los Angeles the man suspected of murdering "My Sister Sam" actress Rebecca Schaeffer.

District Attorney Ira Reiner said his office had raced to "snatch" 19-year-old Robert Bardo from Tucson, Ariz., after they realized his lawyer had filed a challenge to the extradition in the wrong court.

Bardo had been held in Tucson since his arrest last month in the July 18 slaying. Police said he was an obsessed fan of the 21-year-old actress, who was shot in the chest at the door to her apartment building.

Man kills wife, 2 co-workers in spree

ESCONDIDO, Calif. (AP) — A mailman apparently shot his wife to death Thursday, then drove to the Post Office with a cache of ammunition and killed two co-workers before shooting himself in the head, police said.

The gunman, John Merlin Taylor, 52, had discussed such a shooting spree two days earlier, a friend said.

Taylor was reported brain dead at Palomar Hospital, said police spokesman Susan Reiteron.

Bar association opposes amendment

HONOLULU (AP) — The American Bar Association's policy-making body has voted to oppose the adoption of a constitutional amendment against desecrating the flag.

The resolution, adopted in a voice vote Wednesday by the 456-member House of Delegates at the ABA's annual meeting, said the ABA was acting "in the interest of preserving intact the right to freedom of speech and expression."

The ABA also said it opposes any federal legislation making it a crime to desecrate the American flag as a political protest.

Bush names new Joint Chiefs chairman

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush named Army Gen. Colin L. Powell, a veteran of both the battlefields of Vietnam and the corridors of power in the White House, as chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff on Thursday.

Powell, 52, will become the youngest officer and the first black ever to hold the nation's highest military post.

"I am ready to go to it and I look forward to the challenges ahead," Powell said, standing alongside Bush and Vice President Dan Quayle at an afternoon announcement ceremony in the Rose Garden.

The nomination drew immediate praise on Capitol Hill and is expected to win confirmation easily in the Senate.

Sen. Sam Nunn, D-Ga., chairman of the Senate Armed-Service Committee, called Powell "an excellent nominee." Nunn said his panel would hold confirmation proceedings soon after Congress returns from recess in September.

Sen. John Warner of Virginia, ranking Republican on the committee, said: "He's eminently qualified. I've been present in the Oval Of-

fice and Cabinet room when military issues were discussed with the president. When he spoke, everybody listened."

"He has had vast military experience and his participation as security adviser to the president will add a unique dimension," said Sen. Carl Levin, D-Mich., another member of the committee.

to Ronald Reagan in the final year of that administration, was picked by Bush over more than 30 more senior officers.

Succeeding Adm. William Crowe Jr., who is retiring Sept. 30, Powell will be the chief adviser on military affairs to Bush and Defense Secretary Richard Cheney.

Bush praised Powell, a decorated veteran of two combat tours in Vietnam, as "a complete soldier" as well as a distinguished scholar. With an advanced degree in business administration, Powell is considered a military intellectual who is willing to express his views when asked but who does not have an ideological agenda.

"As we face the challenges of the 90's, it is most important that the chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff be a person of breadth, judgment, experience and total integrity," Bush said.

"Colin Powell has all those qualities and more," the president said.

Powell currently is commander of the Army Forces Command in Atlanta, responsible for the combat readiness of 1 million troops on active, reserve or National Guard duty. Powell took over the national security

adviser's job in November 1987, when Frank Carlucci left the post to become secretary of defense.

Along with Carlucci, Powell was credited with helping the Reagan White House recover from the Iran-Contra affair.

A military man said to be as comfortable in pin stripe suits as in combat fatigues, Powell is as highly regarded in diplomatic and foreign policy circles as he is within the military. He was a major figure in the planning of Reagan's national security strategy and for his summits with Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev.

Bush said Powell will be a key member of his national security team of "close-knit, experienced professionals" that includes Cheney, Secretary of State James A. Baker III, and National Security Adviser Brent Scowcroft.

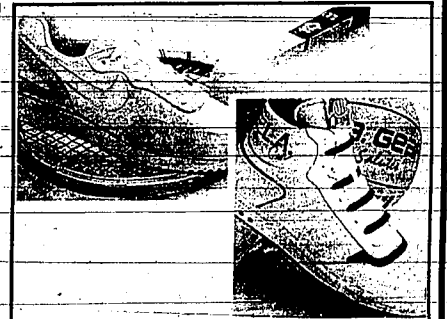
Powell fits the mold of his other colleagues, a group of like-minded pragmatists "who favor" consensus-building rather than confrontation.

Pentagon insiders said privately that Powell's promotion was likely to cause some discontent within the military because he was named to the four-star level only in April.

Chemical arms talks to resume

GENEVA (AP) — U.S.-Soviet negotiations on chemical weapons will resume next week, an American diplomat said Thursday.

A Soviet official said new agreements could be reached in the 10-day round, but the U.S. assessment was more cautious.

The talks are aimed at setting joint inspections of each side's chemical arms sites and settling disputes over how to monitor

stockpiles. The superpowers say such moves will help speed the Geneva talks on a global-ban of the weapons, where verification has been a point of disagreement.

U.S.-Soviet talks were expected to resume in the fall. Now, the new round precedes next month's meeting between Secretary of State James A. Baker III and Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard Shevardnadze in the United States.

Grenade attack wounds peacekeepers

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Grenades hurled by militiamen allied with Israel wounded two U.N. peacekeepers who tried to stop a roundup of Shiite Muslims on Thursday, the day after an Israeli convoy was bombed, a U.N. source reported.

Hezbollah, the pro-Iranian group believed to sponsor hostage-holders, took responsibility for the suicide truck bombing Wednesday, which wounded five Israeli soldiers and a member of the allied South Lebanon

Army militia.

Sheik Mohammed Hussein Fadlallah, spiritual adviser of Hezbollah, called it a "down payment" for Israel's abduction July 28 of Sheik Abdul Karim Obeid, a Shiite cleric affiliated with the organization.

The U.N. source, speaking anonymously, said two Norwegian soldiers with the U.N. Interim Force in Lebanon were slightly wounded when they tried to stop house-to-house roundups by the predominant

ly Christian militia.

He said the roundups were being conducted in Iblei, Sagi and Rashaya villages in the "security zone" Israel maintains just north of its border.

The S.L.A. militiamen threw hand grenades at the Norwegian soldiers manning a checkpoint there, said the U.N. source.

An Iranian newspaper said Thursday indirect talks between Iran and the United States on the hostage situation would begin within days.

Iran's official Islamic Republic News Agency quoted the English-language Tehran Times, which is close to President Hashemi Rafsanjani, as saying talks would be conducted through a third country, probably Pakistan.

Later Thursday, however, the agency issued a dispatch saying reports of talks with the United States were "suspicious" and quoted sources as saying none were being held.

20,000 on strike in Estonia

MOSCOW (AP) — Walkout spread Thursday in Estonia to include up to 20,000 workers, and protest leaders said they had no plans to call off the 2-day-old protest against a new election law, reports from the Baltic republic said.

An editor at Estonian Radio, Maarika Saarna, put the number of strikers at 20,000 but cautioned it could be exaggerated because it was based largely on reports from the strikers themselves.

Strike committee member Artur Kopykin refused to estimate the number of strikers but said 37 enterprises had joined the walkout. On Wednesday, 22 enterprises were reported on strike.

U.S., Soviet navies plan more contact

ISTANBUL, Turkey (AP) — The captain of a U.S. warship that recently visited the Soviet port of Sevastopol said Thursday there will be more contact between the U.S. Navy and the Soviets.

The next one might be a call by Soviet warships at the West Coast of the United States but Cmdr. Ronald C. Bagley, captain of the guided missile frigate USS Kauffman,

The Kauffman has anchored at the Bosphorus strait, which splits Istanbul, on its return from Sevastopol last week. It will head for the Mediterranean, where the U.S. 6th Fleet is based.

Polish groups attempt to build political coalition

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — Lech Walesa's bid for a government coalition without the communist party gained ground Thursday as Solidarity lawmakers discussed the proposal with the two smaller parties that hold the balance of power in parliament.

Competition between Solidarity and the communist Polish United Workers Party for the support of the two smaller parties, which each side needs to form a coalition, has produced a government crisis once unimaginable in postwar Poland.

Alexander Benkowski, Peasant Party parliamentary leader, held a hastily called meeting with newly elected communist Prime Minister Czeslaw Kiszczak, a government spokesman said. The state news agency PAP gave no details in a report on the meeting.

China expels entrepreneur from party

BEIJING (AP) — The ruling Communist Party expelled China's leading computer entrepreneur from its ranks Thursday for having supported the spring pro-democracy protests.

Police, meanwhile, said they had arrested another student leader.

Leading party theorists gathered to praise senior leader Deng Xiaoping's contributions to party theory in yet another sign of the growing official reverence being given the 84-year-old leader since he ordered the June crackdown on the student-led protests.

Officials also reported the executions of 18 convicted thieves or robbers, but said the crimes were not connected with the protests.

Xinhua said Wan Runnan, whose computer company, the Stone Group Co., was nicknamed the IBM of China, was expelled from the party and fired as Stone chairman.

Lottery's first game a huge success

"It was phenomenal," he said, "telling of how special deliveries of additional tickets had to be taken to the Franklin store. The city of Malad is 'not far behind' Franklin in ticket sales, Thompson said.

About 60 of the 204 \$5.00 cards from Game One are yet to be claimed, he said, and over more 8500 cards are not cashed in.

When you play, look at your tickets well," he added. "We've had a number of winners pulled out of garbage cans."

In general, Thompson said, the Idaho Lottery has done very well.

Thompson said 45 cents of every dollar spent on lottery tickets is returned in prize money. Five cents goes to the retail seller and the rest is divided among the state, lottery

administration, promotion, ticket production and distribution costs. During its first two weeks, more than \$1.1 million has been raised by the lottery, Thompson reported.

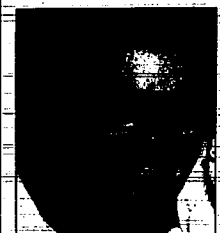

Andrews: Marriage would have saved him

POINT OF THE MOUNTAIN, Utah (AP) — Condemned killer William Andrews told the state Board of Pardons Thursday that had he married the woman he loved 16 years ago, he would not now be awaiting execution for the torture-slayings of three people.

"If I would have married her, I definitely wouldn't be in the situation I'm in now," he said. "Every woman has a very serious influence on her husband."

Andrews, 34, also told the board that while he regretted the crimes, he knew there was nothing he could do to comfort the victims' families.

"I don't think a simple heart-felt 'I'm sorry' would have a consoling effect on them," he said, adding that the tragic consequences of the slayings are "something I have to live with, or die with, if that's the case."

The testimony came as the pardons board began a scheduled two-day hearing to consider whether Andrews' death sentence should be commuted to life in prison.

After nearly 15 years on Utah's death row, Andrews is to die by lethal injection on Aug. 22 at Utah State Prison for his role in the killings of one man and two women during a 1974 robbery at Ogden's Hi-Fi Shop. Andrews' co-defendant and the admitted triggerman, Pierre Dale Selby, was executed in August 1987.

In addition to the commutation hearing, Andrews has an appeal pending before U.S. District Judge

David Sam. Sam has said he did not expect to rule on the habeas corpus writ until after the pardons board completes its work.

Andrews told the pardons board Thursday afternoon that while he carried a loaded gun into the Hi-Fi Shop, he never intended to use it, and that the slayings were never part of the plan — what was supposed to be a simple armed robbery.

"I realize that the crime I participated in was a brutal crime, but I didn't intend it to be such," Andrews said. "I do truly regret that the crime itself took place."

It was Selby, after Andrews had left the shop, thinking he would follow, who shot and killed the victims, Andrews said. He said he was unaware, until after his arrest, that anyone had died.

Andrews admitted pouring Drano into cups at Selby's insistence, but said he did not administer it. He said he knew that Selby was going to force the victims to drink the caustic drain cleaner, but didn't think it could kill them.

"I knew it would hurt these people, but I didn't know how badly," he said.

Prosecutors, in arguing for execution, say the drain cleaner was by itself potentially fatal.

Earlier Thursday, the board heard Andrews, several acquaintances and Andrews' half-sister recount the sordid poverty of his family of eight endured in a racially segregated Jonestown, La., neighborhood.

Blue Cross has insurance solution for Pocatello

POCATELLO (AP) — Blue Cross has approved its special and now says it can provide a cost-effective insurance plan for Bannock County employees.

Ron Torres, Blue Cross group sales manager, has presented the county commissioners with a proposal that would raise the county premiums by only \$5,000.

On last week, the company said that based on the county's high insurance usage and rising medical costs, premiums would be raised \$200,000 — or about 35 percent.

Spokesman Jim Borchers said then that for every \$1 Bannock County paid for insurance, Blue

Cross had paid out \$1.32.

The commissioners had begun looking for another carrier and received six proposals.

The commission also has been waiting to see what kind of health insurance package the Idaho Counties Reciprocal Management Program can put together. ICRMP,

which is a self-funded, statewide liability insurance pool, was formed three years ago when counties were priced out of the liability insurance market.

"Why has it taken four months to reach this point?" Katsilometes asked Blue Cross about the new package. "Why did we have to go through the 'sky is falling' routine to get to these figures?"

Torres said putting together various options for the county is complicated. Katsilometes emphasized the commission is still looking at other options.

Valley county jail may lose license

CASCADE (AP) — The Valley County Jail may be closed down due to safety and health problems, although Sheriff Lewis Pratt says he will not take that step unless forced to by a court order.

Pratt was notified last month by the Idaho County Sheriffs' Association that the Cascade jail would lose its certification as meeting minimum standards. The notification followed an inspection by an association official in June.

Among the violations were the lack of adequate fire escapes, no recreation yard or sufficient recreation time, and a poor heating system that contributed to prisoners' viral infections.

The loss of certification could open up the county to lawsuits, but Pratt said he would wait for a court order to close the jail.

Local ABC affiliate joins King Videocable lineup this week

TWIN FALLS — Cable television viewers will have another option as early as next week when King Videocable picks up KKVJ, the new ABC affiliate in Twin Falls.

Chris Talkington, King Videocable manager, said this week negotiations between KKVJ and King have moved "fast and furious." He said KKVJ station wants to expand cable coverage should be viewable on Channel 35 Tuesday or Wednesday.

The channel will be available only in Twin Falls, Kimberly and Hansen, Talkington said. At present, the

approximately 70 percent of Twin Falls residents who have cable cannot receive KKVJ, although homes without cable have had access to it.

KKVJ's move onto cable won't affect the presence of ABC affiliate KIVI of Nampa, which airs on cable Channel 6, Talkington said.

King Videocable will absorb the cost of putting KKVJ on the cable in Twin Falls, Talkington said. But if the station wants to expand cable coverage into other surrounding areas, it will be asked to help mount the cost, he added. The move comes as KKVJ begins to expand its physical and broadcast presence in Twin Falls.

The station is taking advantage of the two five-minute breaks in ABC's "Good Morning America" show to air "Good Morning Magic Valley" at 7:25 and 8:25 each weekday morning.

Many network affiliates use the time to air local news updates and weather. "We're trying to make it more fun, something positive to wake up to," said Dick McMahon, KKVJ general manager.

"Good Morning Magic Valley" is hosted by Greg Bedwell. Cameraman in tow, he's been recording community events throughout the area for segments on the show. Happenings featured so far have included Twin Falls Crazy Days, Filer Fun Days and the season's final Twin Falls Municipal Band concert.

The results range from silly (Bedwell asking people downtown what INEL stands for while wearing coat, tie — and boxer shorts) to sublime (beautiful twilight shots of the City Park bandshell against an indigo sky).

In a segment featuring the recent Art in the Park show, Bedwell walked around asking people, "We're looking for Art in the park. Are you Art?" "We're starting out very small, trying to get out with the camera and get the feel of living in Twin Falls, Idaho," and the Magic Valley, McMahon said.

KKVJ went on the air this spring after several delays prompted by a faulty broadcast tower. For most of its day, it rebroadcasts Pocatello ABC station KPVI, but McMahon said "Good Morning Magic Valley" and some other features have started to set KKVJ apart from its eastern Idaho cousin.

KKVJ airs several syndicated shows including "The People's Court" and "A Current Affair" — that KPVI doesn't

carry. McMahon said there are no plans to go head-to-head with KMYT in news coverage at this time.

"Channel 11 does a beautiful job with the news," he said. "We don't think we could step in and be a competitor right now."

Currently, the station airs Pocatello's newscast at 10 p.m. But McMahon said if a major event warrants coverage, the station will be on the scene and pre-empt the KPVI

news feed. This was done during the recent hostage-taking incident in the South Park area, he noted.

KKVI also is considering airing "counterprogramming" instead of news at 10 p.m. to give viewers a choice.

The station has set up offices in the Green Acres Office Complex, 1061 Blue Lakes Blvd. N. In addition to McMahon, who works full-time, the station has four part-time employees. The affiliate hasn't been soliciting local advertising, although McMahon

said last week it probably would start doing so once KKVJ is on cable. It does accept public service announcements from local organizations.

King Videocable's Talkington said KKVJ's move to provide local programming is positive.

"We welcome a diversification of programming," he said, especially if KKVJ offers increased regional coverage. "This can be a real asset to cable and its customers."

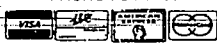

Golf immortals make charge at PGA

HAWTHORN WOODS, Ill. — Three of golf's greatest names — Palmer, Nicklaus and Watson — came from recent history and distant memory to capture the attention; if not the lead, at the PGA.

Never mind that Mike Reid and Leonard Thompson were the leaders. They were chased by three decades of golfing greatness, all together.

Arnold Palmer, 59 years old and 25 years past a victory in one of golf's major tournaments, and Jack Nicklaus, who has won more majors than anybody else, shot 68s and moved to within two strokes of the first-round lead.

Just ahead of them, one behind the leader, was Tom Watson — golf's all-time leading money-winner — and the successor to Palmer and Nicklaus as the sport's dominant player in the 1970s.

Palmer actually was tied for the lead until bogeying the last two holes on the Kemper Lakes Golf Club course. And he bogeyed them like the Palmer of old — gambling, challenging, attacking the flag.

He got into a bunker on 17 and couldn't get it up and down; it cost him a share of the lead.

On 18, just one shot back, he flirted with the water on his drive. His second shot was at the pin, but it drifted into deep rough about 15 feet from the cup. He chipped long and missed the 6-footer coming back, waving the putter in frustration as it came up short.

That bogey cost him a tie for second with Watson who, like Palmer, needs a victory in this tournament to complete a career sweep of golf's Grand Slam.

"They weren't bad shots," Palmer said. "I just hit them too hard. The adrenaline was flowing. I just misjudged my own strength," he said.

Palmer, whose last victory on the PGA Tour came in the 1973 Bob Hope Classic, made his round with a string of five consecutive birdies beginning on the fourth hole.

"I just got unconscious," he said, flashing that famous grin. "I haven't made that many birdies all this year."

Palmer shot two rounds in the 80s in the British Open and had an embarrassing 312 for four rounds of the U.S. Senior Open last month on his home course in Latrobe, Pa.

The 4-under-par effort — his first round in the 60s in this tournament since the third round in 1976 — left Palmer two shots off the lead.

As if in answer to a bugle calling through the mists of history, the "Arnie's Army" rallied to Palmer's side as word of his move spread with the speed of summer lightning.

They came by the dozens, and there he was, hitching the britches with that old familiar gesture and quick-stepping down the fairway.

Then there was another word: "Arnie's birdie three in a row."

Now they were in the hundreds and soon it was a stampede of thousands as the man who put the word "charge" in golf's lexicon called on the half-remembered magic he exercised in a different generation.

"Arnie! Arnie! Arnie!" they chanted as he strode from green to tee. They applauded his every move and howled in glee as the putter kept falling.

His heroics, and those of Watson and Nicklaus, overshadowed any other performances, including the 616 of leading money-winner Tom Kite and Chris Perry.

Could Palmer keep the gallery at this level until the final round?

"If I could play, and feel like I did today for four rounds, yes, I could win," he said.

Watson ripped his irons with that old-time precision in a 6-under-par 67.

"The best I've hit my irons in a year," said Watson.

'Shoeless' Joe is still an outcast

COLUMBIA, S.C. — Commissioner A. Bartlett Giamatti has turned down a request to consider reinstating "Shoeless" Joe Jackson to major league baseball, saying he did not "wish to play God with history."

Jackson, who died in 1951 at the age of 63 in his native South Carolina, was one of eight Chicago White Sox players banned from baseball for their part in the infamous 1919 "Black Sox Scandal."

In a letter to South Carolina state Sen. Ernest Passalunghi, Giamatti said he and other commissioners have received letters urging them to review Jackson's case. Passalunghi made the letter public on Thursday.

"For good reason, there has not been a reconsideration," Giamatti wrote. "I share the view that a resurrection by me of the case today would not be appropriate."

Passalunghi wrote the commissioner July 17 about a resolution passed by the state Senate in June asking Giamatti to reconsider Jackson. In his letter, the Charleston Democrat, who sponsored the resolution, asked the commissioner to consider Jackson's case.

"It is an issue of right and wrong, of fairness, of correcting a seventy-year wrong!" Passalunghi wrote.

Jackson and seven other Chicago players were accused of throwing the 1919 World Series to Cincinnati for money.

Dravecky wins his 1st game after surgery

SAN FRANCISCO — Dave Dravecky's comeback story had a conclusion so sweet only Dravecky himself could have believed it possible.

The battle with cancer that began on the operating table last fall ended in a joyous scene at Candlestick Park on Thursday with Dravecky hugging his teammates as the crowd cheered his courage and his familiar pitching savvy.

Just 10 months after having a cancerous tumor removed from his pitching arm, the Giants' left-hander took a one-hit shutout into the eighth inning and earned an emotional 4-3 victory. Dravecky allowed four hits in an eight-inning stint that doctors had said would never happen.

"I'm not one to shed many tears, but this has been a tremendously emotional experience for me," said Dravecky, who hadn't pitched for the Giants since May 1988.

Giants manager Roger Craig, a pitcher during his major league career, described it as one of the greatest thrills in baseball.

"I've seen a lot in baseball," he said. "Five World Series, and I saw Don Larsen throw a perfect game. But I don't think I've ever seen any game that had as much drama as this game today."

Even Craig didn't expect his former — and, after Thursday, —

9th of 28 1st-round NFL picks signs

It's nine down and 19 to go.

Wayne Martin signed a four-year contract with the New Orleans Saints on Thursday, reducing the list of unsigned first-round NFL picks to 19.

"We paid a lot of money for him but that's what you have to do these days," said Jim Finks, president and general manager of the Saint's. "We met the market and the market is steep now."

Martin, a defensive end from Arkansas, said he was happy with the agreement, worth a reported \$1.99 million.

His agent, Kevin Scanlon, said: "We didn't set the market, we just took part in it and it's the highest it's ever been."

Finks said the market is too high.

Experts: Save existing fish runs first

BOISE — Restoring salmon and steelhead runs above the three-dam Hells Canyon hydroelectric complex is technically feasible, but saving existing runs must take priority, fish experts agree.

Terry Holubetz, Region 3 fishery manager for the Idaho Department of Fish and Game, said Wednesday that remaining steelhead and salmon runs in the Northwest suffer from inadequate water flows for spring migration.

In addition, more fish-bypass systems in the lower Snake and Columbia river dams need to be constructed to bolster flagging anadromous runs.

"Unless we get improved fish flows and passage systems installed, none of these alternatives make much sense to pursue," Holubetz said. "Without these improvements, there won't be any fish stocks left in the Snake River."

More than a dozen federal and state fish biologists debated the feasibility of restoring fish runs above Hells Canyon in discussion Wednesday, the final day of the Salmon and Steelhead Congress sponsored by Sen. James McClure, R-Idaho. About 100 biologists and interested citizens attended the two-day meeting in Boise.

Salmon and steelhead experts estimate that fewer than 1 percent of the juvenile steelhead and salmon that migrate from Idaho to the Pacific Ocean each spring return to Idaho as adults two to five years later.

On Wednesday, Holubetz presented one possible scenario for restoring fish runs in the Payette River. He said adult salmon and steelhead could be trapped at Hells Canyon Dam and trucked to the tailwater of Brownlee Reservoir.

From there, the adults presumably would swim up the Payette River, climb a fish ladder at Black Canyon Dam and continue the journey upstream to find suitable spawning habitat.

Woodstock revisited

Pat Verstraete recalls attending the gathering mostly by chance

To hear Pat Verstraete tell it, Woodstock was no big deal. "It was not important to me. Woodstock was just another party," says Verstraete, who worked until recently as volunteer services coordinator for the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare in Twin Falls.

Verstraete, who grew up in Pennsylvania and attended the University of Pittsburgh, was working in the Catskill Mountains of New York in the summer of 1969, trying to earn money for college. She and two friends heard about the music festival in Bethel, N.Y., via signs on the road. "We all just jumped in the car and went," she recalls. "They didn't have tickets. But they wouldn't need them. Concert organizers had expected a crowd much smaller than the approximately 450,000 who showed up; once they realized how many people were coming, they decided the show would be free." Documentary films and books about Woodstock recount the performances of rock greats who were there. Oh, to have heard Jimi Hendrix play his twisted version of "The Star Spangled Banner," to have thrilled to Joe Cocker's primal rendition of "With A Little Help From My Friends," to have gasped as Country Joe McDonald led the crowd in his infamous "Fish Cheer."

But Verstraete heard none of them. The festival was spread out over 600 acres, and many in attendance were too far away to see

"I remember the rain. It was icky and muddy." But there was plenty of do-it-yourself music, she remembers, for many people brought banjos and guitars. Several friends had gone to the Newport Folk Festival in Rhode Island shortly before Woodstock and were planning on heading to New York for the big event on Max Yasgur's farm. But they decided they were tired and went home instead, Verstraete recalls. Verstraete, now 40, says she's amazed anyone still wants to hear about Woodstock, but her voice will probably be drowned out by the din surrounding the festival's 20th anniversary. Plans for an official Woodstock anniversary show have gone sour amid squabbling between Warner Communications — which owns the rights to the name Woodstock — and the festival's promoters. Nevertheless, the newsstands and airwaves are flooded with stories reflecting on the event, from a cover story in "Life" magazine to a segment on the ABC-News show "20/20." The attention paid Woodstock also

comes at a time when many styles from the '60s are undergoing resurrection: Tees sport tie-dye and Day-Glo T-shirts and other clothing and jewelry festooned with peace symbols. Modern-day rock and pop stars score big hits with cover versions of '60s songs, and some radio stations play nothing but oldies or "classic rock." Timeless tunes resurface in commercials for raisins, athletic shoes and sports cars.

But to Verstraete, an event that took place the spring following Woodstock — the deaths of four students on the campus of Kent State University in Ohio — made a far greater impact on her life and, she adds, on her generation. "It was real frightening, because we believed we were invincible, and all of a sudden people were getting shot. That was scary," she recalls. After the events of May 4, 1970, at Kent State, campus protests that had drawn tens of thousands of people became smaller. People were afraid of former President Richard Nixon, she says. "The ongoing war in Vietnam drove a deepening wedge between the generations. Ironically, Verstraete ended up

marrying a Vietnam veteran, a man she met after moving to Colorado following graduation. "One thing the '60s taught me was tolerance," she says. Despite the fact her husband had been in Vietnam — a war she opposed — Verstraete says she saw he was a "good person." She says generalizations about the baby boomers — the largest generation in U.S. history — are impossible to make. "When you talk about the Woodstock generation,

you're talking about the educated elite," she notes. "You're not talking about the farmer's sons, or about the guys who went to Vietnam. You can't stereotype a generation." While there's a popular impression that many former hippies and activists are now yuppies and stockbrokers, Verstraete says the people she knew in college are — no matter what they do — successful and committed. "They take pride in what they do,"

she says. "Even those involved in business activities have a social conscience." Still, Verstraete is disturbed that little difference has been made by the generation that said it would change the world. "It's amazing to me we can still have the size military budget we have," she says. "My generation is in control, and I can't believe we've elected people into office who vote for things like 'Star Wars.'"

Big business overwhelms Woodstock

BETHEL, N.Y. — Max Yasgur's old meadow, where thousands converged 20 years ago for three memorable days of music and madness, is usually quiet these days. Wind rustles through tall grass and weeds. Horses whinny from a stable across the road. Occasionally, a tractor drives by. With a little imagination, you could stride through the vast natural amphitheater, close your eyes and hear... the sounds of cash registers ringing and lawyers squabbling. That's what's left of Woodstock Nation. The communal spirit that characterized the classic 1960s "happening" seems buried under an avalanche of corporate fighting and marketing schemes. The overly sentimental can buy Woodstock T-shirts, Woodstock books, Woodstock posters, the original concert ticket, a Woodstock Frisbee, a Woodstock mug, a Woodstock knapsack, a Woodstock ring, a Woodstock vest and even a Woodstock car air freshener. "The New York State Thruway is closed, man!" Sure it is. It's full of mile-long counting reporters, dreamy nostalgia mongers, special-issue

magazine photographers, would-be sociologists, wily entrepreneurs and all manner of tie-dyed hangers-on, '60s throwbacks and '60s never-were's. As the younger Arlo Guthrie might have commented, "Lotta freaks!" And all of them beating another path in beat-up VW buses with peace signs, Indian-print curtains and frank flags flyin', to a place that ceased to exist two decades ago. What is it about Woodstock that compels us on its 20th anniversary, this summer to not only reconsider it but practically relive it — especially when it passed with only a slightly embarrassed salute a decade ago, when punk music seemed to have buried one and for all the dinosaurs of rock and the summer of love it fleetingly represented? Certainly, rock's biggest stars — played better gigs elsewhere (Nobody, except for maybe Sha Na Na, will tell you Woodstock was the highlight of their careers — several, including the Grateful Dead, the Who and the Jefferson Airplane, will tell you it was the site of their worst

performances ever). There were earlier rock fests — including the groove-making granddaddy of them all, the 1967 Monterey Pop Festival, which was notable in that it drew rock stars like Brian Jones to attend (whereas at Woodstock the rock gods showed up only to play and once they did their gig, largely took off as soon as possible). So why does Woodstock become so revered in history that we have special issues of Life Magazine, special issues of Rolling Stone, special broadcasts on MTV and VH-1, and special reporting in all kinds of newspapers. There is a temptation to say it is

because in the summer of moonwalks, Manson and Chappquiddick, everything in 1969 was historical. But Woodstock alone is such an artifact that even my nephew Andy, born five years after the fact, can talk about it now with impunity. "It was three whole days," he says in the measured way other young scholars would relate the events of the War of 1812. "It was really muddy, and it was total rock n' roll." "You learned this in school?" "In history." "Did they show the movie?" "The filmstrip. And we had a work sheet on it." See SUMMER on Page D5

"There are a whole lot more people doing it and they're not great," he explained. "But at the same time, they all sound alike. There's less identification. They all sound like Glen Campbell." The selection of music played by

country radio stations keeps getting smaller and smaller, Bare said, allowing the public to hear only a limited number of the industry's many talented artists.

The Ohio native describes his own style of music as "pretty loose" with "energy-packed" live performances. He prides himself in being independent and able to produce concept albums "with a theme that says something and holds together," rather than following the standard practice of trying to put 10 hit singles on an album.

"Chet Atkins allowed me to produce my own records," he said. "That opened a can of worms because then everybody wanted to do it."

Group wants an end to fascination with '60s

Kiss the '60s goodbye. Some nostalgia busters have arrived and are suiting up to make Baby Boomers' beloved sentimentality a thing of the past.

The National Association for the Advancement of Time — a group formed by John Kenney, 25, of New York; Bruce Elliot, 27, of Los Angeles; and Eugene Dillenburg, 29, of Chicago — has proclaimed Aug. 14-20 as "Boycott the Past Week."

During that period, the group wants Americans to "forget the past," Kenney says. Don't "listen to oldies radio, watch movies or TV series set in the past," read articles written about the past and when you see an

advertisement that's set to '60s music or totos, a '60s theme, change the channel or turn the page."

His group doesn't have anything against the '60s, "it's just the '80s preoccupation" with that period "that upsets us," Kenney says, explaining that "if nostalgia is left unchecked, people will begin to neglect the issues that face us in the present."

Lee Gold, an associate professor of psychiatry at the University of Southern California, agrees, observing: "The past has been romanticized. The good of days, which were not so good anyway, are easier to deal with because the present isn't comfortable for us. The '60s were when this generation came of age. So as we get older, those times seem more glamorous to us because of our youth."

Kenney says his group...with its "campaign," is seeking two results: "People will see how hard it is to avoid images of the past, and we hope some people will see how consumed they are and put an end to

their misery."

What do group members find especially annoying? "Oh, the Express commercials moving to the tunes of 'My Girl' and 'Be My Baby,'" Kenney says. "TV shows like 'The Wonder Years' and 'China Beach'; miniskirts; Batman T-shirts; and classic rock."

Since it began last March, the association has found a receptive ear among the media, receiving coverage in local newspapers and broadcast outlets, USA Today, the "Today Show" and "CBS This Morning." The publicity the group has received also has prompted heavy mail from those who want to join. The association claims it has 250 members nationwide, as well as in Canada and Australia.

Disney will expand its new studio theme park

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) — Heavy crowds and unexpectedly long waiting lines will soon force Walt Disney World to double the size of the entertainment portion of its new Disney-MGM Studios theme park, company Chairman Michael Eisner said.

"The demand for it has been even greater than our wildest hopes," Eisner said. "We do not want the lines to be that long. We are trying to rectify it as soon as we can."

Specific plans for the expansion, to be carried out in three years, will be announced in six weeks, Eisner said.

The \$500 million, 135-acre complex has two sections: the theme park, the site of most of the major attractions and the film production portion, where visitors ride-trams and walk through a backstage tour.

The studio park "needs to be on the scale of the other two parks" — the Magic Kingdom and Epcot Center, Eisner said.

Both are bigger and require more time for a visit. The Magic Kingdom's estimated capacity is 45,000 and Epcot's about 30,000. The studio theme park can handle about half the crowds of the Magic Kingdom.

JEROME When Bobby Bare recorded "Detroit City" in 1963, the nostalgic "I want to go home" refrain launched the hearts of many Americans.

"It was a time when people like myself were just moving around," Bare said in a telephone interview. "People from the South were moving north to find jobs and they got homesick."

"Gis sang it," he said. "I was doing a European tour during that time. I remember, in Berlin, watching a bunch of grown men with tears rolling down their cheeks (when they heard 'Detroit City')."

In 1964, Bare won a Grammy for that homesick hit and, since then, has recorded a number of offbeat songs that have met with mixed success.

"Drop Kick Me Jesus (Through The Goalposts Of Life)," "The Winner" and "Pour Me Another Tequila, Sheila" did well on the charts because of their curious

Revels in creative freedom since he started recording in 1958.

"There are a whole lot more people doing it and they're all great," he explained. "But at the same time, they all sound alike. There's less identification. They all sound like Glen Campbell."

The selection of music played by

country radio stations keeps getting smaller and smaller, Bare said, allowing the public to hear only a limited number of the industry's many talented artists.

The Ohio native describes his own style of music as "pretty loose" with "energy-packed" live performances. He prides himself "in being independent and able to produce concept albums 'with a theme that says something and holds together,' rather than following the standard practice of trying to put 10 hit singles on an album.

"Chet Atkins allowed me to produce my own records," he said. "That opened a can of worms because then everybody wanted to do it."

But, he added, the public would get a better show if more artists were allowed creative freedom rather than being strictly controlled by a handful of big commercial producers.

Bare is currently on a summertime tour of the Western states. At his shows, he sings "All

American Boy," "Shame on Me," "New Cut Road," "500 Miles," "Four Strong Winds" and other songs from the 40 albums he has produced during his career. The singer recently finished a new album produced by Chet Atkins, and he plans to record more Silverstein songs later this year.

At his home on Old Hickory Lake in Tennessee, Bare and his wife, Jeannie, have a store called "The Bare Trap" where they sell hundreds of teddy bears of all shapes and sizes. When he isn't working, Bare says he goes fishing "every chance I get."

Group wants an end to fascination with '60s

Kiss the '60s goodbye: Some nostalgia busters have arrived and are suiting up to make Baby Boomers' beloved sentimentality a thing of the past.

The National Association for the Advancement of Time — a group formed by John Kenney, 25, of New York; Bruce Elliot, 27, of Los Angeles; and Eugene Dillenburg, 29, of Chicago — has proclaimed Aug. 14-20 as "Boycott the Past Week."

During that period, the group wants Americans to "forgo the past," Kenney says. Don't "listen to oldies radio, watch movies or TV series set in the past, read articles written about the past and when you see an

advertisement that's set to '60s music or totes a '60s theme, change the channel or turn the page."

His group doesn't have anything against the '60s, "it's just the '80s preoccupation with that period that upsets us," Kenney says, explaining that "if nostalgia is left unchecked, people will begin to neglect the issues that face us in the present."

Lee Gold, an associate professor of psychiatry at the University of Southern California, agrees, observing: "The past has been romanticized. The good-'ol'-days, which were not so good anyway, are easier to deal with because the present isn't comfortable for us. The '60s were when this generation came of age. So as we get older, those times seem more glamorous to us because of our youth."

Kenney says his group, with its campaign, is seeking two results: "People will see how hard it is to avoid images of the past; and we hope some people will see how consumed they are and put an end to

their misery."

What do group members find especially annoying? "Oh, the American

Express commercials moving to the tunes of 'My Girl' and 'Be My Baby,'" Kenney says. "TV shows like 'The Wonder Years' and 'China Beach'; miniskirts; Batman T-shirts; and classic rock."

Since it began last March, the association has found a receptive ear among the media, receiving coverage in local newspapers and broadcast outlets; USA Today, the "Today Show" and CBS This Morning. The publicity the group has received also has prompted heavy mail from those who want to join. The association claims it has 280 members nationwide, as well as in Canada and Australia.

Disney will expand its new studio theme park

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) — Heavy crowds and unexpectedly long waiting lines will soon force Walt Disney World to double the size of the entertainment portion of its new Disney-MGM Studios theme park, company Chairman Michael Eisner said.

"The demand for it has been even greater than our wildest hopes," Eisner said. "We do not want the lines to be that long. We are trying to rectify it as soon as we can."

Specific plans for the expansion, to be carried out in three years, will be announced in six weeks, Eisner said.

The \$500 million, 135-acre complex has two sections: the theme park, the site of most of the major attractions, and the film production portion, where visitors ride trains and walk through a backstage tour.

The studio park "needs to be on the scale of the other two parks" — the Magic Kingdom and Epcot Center — Eisner said.

Both are bigger and require more time for a visit. The Magic Kingdom's estimated capacity is 45,000 and Epcot's about 60,000. The studio theme park can handle about half the crowds of the Magic Kingdom.

'The Abyss' groans with gadgets, proves overly sappy

HOLLYWOOD — "The Abyss" is the most hardware-cluttered movie imaginable, full of dials and wires and pressure locks and daunting technical gear, yet it leaves you feeling sappy euphoric.



This must be like rapture of the deep: Machines crash against other machines underwater with a slo-mo bounce and a bell-like clang-ging; the ocean begins to collect as many floating man parts as space and we look at it all being a little messy nice. "All stress washes away in this intense, mindless bluesness.

With all its numskulness, "The Abyss" is at heart a sweet movie, full of people dying and then living for love, and nothing new to add on the subject of other-worldings than "Close Encounters of the Third Kind" differed 12 years ago. "Give 'em a chance. You don't want them," they don't hurt you. Who knows, we might learn something from them."

But the climax of "Close Encounters" was breathtaking and the climax of "The Abyss" is downright embarrassing: in the light of day, its payoff effect looks like a

glazed ceramic what's-it-your 11-year-old made in a crafts class. It is critical, because the undersea effects are glowingly beautiful and one gimmick used by the "non-

terrestrial intelligence" (jargon theirs) is jaw-dropping. Perhaps, to keep us in its spell, this final effect should have surfaced at night.

In brief, writer-director James Cameron ("Terminator" and "Aliens") strands a nuclear submarine, armed with bomb-to-end-all-bombs, on a shelf in the Caribbean. Two teams are involved in a rescue against the

clock to get the device: the (mostly) hairy, brawny, wisecracking crew of Deepcore, a "submersible hyperbaric drilling platform" lodged at sea bottom — the gang we may think of as us. And there are the militaristic crew-cut Navy SEAL (Sea, Air and Land) commandos, who are definitely not us.

Threatening them all is a malady called High-Pressure Nervous Syndrome, a sort of underwater PMS, which causes irrationality and galloping Oliver Northism. There's also a hurricane battering the Navy forces topside. And that bomb.

Now you add the personalities. Returning to Deepcore during this crisis is Lindsey Brigman (Mary Elizabeth Mastrantonio), who seems to revel in her wide-spread reputation as "a cast-iron bitch." She has designed every inch of the steel monster and goes through it turning wheels and tapping valves like someone tiding up her kitchen after others have been messing in it.

Foreman of Deepcore's Bud Brigman (Ed Harris), her estranged husband, seemingly thrilled about the split. Head of the loyal SEAL opposition is Lt. Coffey (Michael Biehn), whose eyes begin rolling like marbles within minutes of arriving at Deepcore's niche on the ocean floor: Before long he is carving hash marks on his forearm with his assault knife. Not hard to tell where the nervous syndrome has struck.

Most prominent of the crew members are Catfish (Lee Burmester), Harris' huge, ginger-bearded decompression expert, company for his scarily swims; the

paranoid Hippo (Todd Graff), who has a pet white rat, and a roughneck, non-nonsense underwater tractor pilot, One Night (Kimberly Scott). If your heart sinks at names like this, it has every reason to. Not a single surprise of dimigoo or character awaits you.

As the men and women take to the depths in crab-like pods with pincer claws, or in extended-time diving helmets, or immersed in a liquid that lets Ed Harris "breathe fluid instead of air," we await the appearance of The Other. Imagine the surprise of discovering that it's a neon flittering Tinker Bell that leaves mortals all the better for encounters with its presence.

There are more: rounded glowing transparent creatures in sea shapes. Most mysterious of all these visions is something like a mercury-glass pseudopod; a probe with a worm-like shape that assumes any shape and moves with the liquidity of water.

This is the movie's payoff, and in this blue, watery womb-like state it is tempting to float free and just enjoy it and the picture's frail message about the power of love. If only Cameron knew what to do with his other-worldings; an explanation of their world, even a use for them except as a nifty, power-assisted flourish. So his picture simply drifts away.

Plans for a reunion festival were scuttled this year by people and events far removed from the original Woodstock: Like Pepsi ... and Madonna.

"The basic consciousness that it stood for has been muddled every year since it took place," said Richie Havens, whose performance opened the original concert.

Well aware of the propensity of Woodstock Nation to relive its past, original promoters Joel Rosenman and John Roberts had big plans for a Woodstock II. They wanted a series of concerts linked by satellite

all over the world, featuring original Woodstock participants and others.

"But anything they wanted to do had to be cleared by Warner Communications, the entertainment conglomerate to whom Rosenman and Roberts sold the rights to the Woodstock name in 1970.

Both sides came tantalizingly close to an agreement in March on a huge two-day concert in Washington, D.C., with multimillion-dollar sponsorship from Pepsi. That deal was never signed, and Warner partly blames an unwitting villain.

"Madonna," said Eric Frankel, vice president for marketing for Warner Bros. Pay-TV. He said Pepsi got cold feet about the Woodstock deal shortly after it pulled its series of commercials featuring Madonna following the religious controversy over her "Like a Prayer" video.

Warner thought any new festival would have to be a success to make money off the old one, through videocassettes sales of the movie "Woodstock," compact discs, books and the like, Rosenman said: The promoters thought a new concert would only enhance that ability.

Woodstock Ventures Inc., the two promoters' "partners" with Warner in making sure no other entrepreneurs try to capitalize on the Woodstock name. It's copyrighted, as is the famous logo of a bird perched on a guitar neck.

That's set up the possibility of a legal fight between the promoters and Havens, one of the performers who made the festival his special. Havens, John Sebastian, Melanie and other Woodstock or Woodstock-era musicians plan a "69-'89 Anniversary Celebration Concert" in New York's Central Park on Aug. 16.

name isn't being used, the promoters say it's clear. Both sides are threatening to get lawyers involved.

"These people are fighting over the name of something. They couldn't possibly fight over the spirit of it, because they probably weren't even there. The name doesn't mean you own the memories. Woodstock without the event is just 'Woodstock,'" Havens said.

"It's ugly, but what am I supposed to do?" Roberts said. "I suspect if he invented a fizzy brown soda and marketed it as 'Richie Havens' Coca-Cola,' he'd probably get a notice from Atlanta (home of the soft drink company).

Warner to scale back some of its Woodstock commemorative plans this summer, including canceling a two-hour, prime-time television special, Frankel said. The company went ahead with the "Woodstock Minutes" feature on MTV and VH-1.

Through its division, Licensing Corporation of America, Warner has permitted about a dozen companies to churn out Woodstock products, mostly clothing with the bird and guitar logo.

Some of the products, such as the Woodstock air freshener, make Roberts and other '60s veterans cringe.

Retail response to Woodstock items has been "nice," says Karen Lucas Spitz, a Licensing Corporation vice-president, though it can't compare with the company's current merchandising bonanza — items based on the "Batman" movie.

A Scholastic filmstrip "The farm was rented from Max Vangar, a dairy farmer — BEEPI!" and a mimeographed work sheet in Minnesota middle schools is probably the last thing foreseen by the organizers of the Woodstock Arts and Music Fair: An Aquarian Exposition, back in '69.

To hear them tell the story, once more with feeling in the recycled paperback "Young Men with Unlabeled Capital," they only wanted to raise some easy money to help establish a recording studio in Woodstock, N.Y., the arts community that had been suddenly frequented by such artists as Bob Dylan, the Band and Tim Hardin.

Yet the event became far bigger than that — far bigger than anyone imagined — and they lost enough money to forget forever the idea of a recording studio. The immediate \$1.3 million loss was eventually made up 10 years later by the resulting record and film documents, which ended up grossing \$60 million worldwide.

The original posters — with the famous logo — boasted the famous acts who appeared, a number of acts that never appeared for various reasons, and a few bands that were never heard from again.

But the success of some groups — if only for their inclusion in the movie and album — virtually began amid the mud, the rain and the sizzling stage.

Santitas, for one, had no contract until its splashy performance in Woodstock. Joe Cocker was essentially a non-entity. Sha Na Na was nothing more than a greased-up performing college prank until its last-minute Woodstock appearance (the group was second-to-last to go on) shot it to eventual "Hollywood Square" style status. The Who was paid a little more than \$8,000 to perform (the band members are making more from one row of seats in one night of their current summer stadium comeback tour, which will gross an estimated \$60 million). But its appearance — with the sun busting through Saturday morning during a song from "Tommy" — helped cement the band's reputation status for the "Woodstock" era.

juiling of activist John Sinclair on drug charges. It was an action Townsend called "the most political action I ever took in my life" and pointed out the utter lack of political intent in what Hoffman (and pundits thereafter) forevermore called the Woodstock Nation.

These kids — almost exclusively white and middle-class with the money, the time and the wherewithal to travel to the upstate New York backwoods — were rallying around the music and staying for the party.

So here's the reason we salute Woodstock today, the reason some even mega-hype it as the most important event in rock history: It simply brought to one place so many of these young people with their recently grown-out long hair, newly purchased love beads and freshly minted ideas of love, drugs and freedom.

Considered oddballs in their individual communities, these castoffs suddenly realized they weren't anywhere near being alone. Woodstock was bona fide proof of the youth culture for those who believed longhairs to be isolated weirdos.

And without police or any

semblance of the short-haired establishment, they seemed to make this congregation work.

That is to say, nobody killed anyone (although three people died), despite the cramped conditions, the horrible sound system, the blazing heat, the drenching rain; the engulfing mud and the utter lack of food, water, shelter and toilets.

There was certainly reason to worry: A third of the attendees had stormed the fences, never intending to pay. Earlier in the year, two were injured in riots and 250 were arrested at the rock fest in Palm Springs. It was worse at a Newport, Calif., fest, where 300 injuries, 75 arrests and \$50,000 in property damage were logged.

The bad taste of Woodstock in Bethel was palpable for a while, particularly in mounds of filth and garbage on what was once a peaceful dairy farm.

"There were porno-jobs only for a few thousand people. And the stench lingered for months. And it did ruin the crops," said Bud Feldman, a Bethel resident quoted in Jack Curry's new book "Woodstock: The Summer of Our Lives."

The flower children did not leave the sweet-smelling alfalfa field as he had found it, according to his wife, Anne Feldman. "All that summer and fall and into the next spring, if you drove in that area, the smell of human excrement was so extremely strong. It took about three years for it to dissipate. Every time it was warm, it just came up."

The site of the festival itself is something of a touchstone to rock fans — a plaque commemorates the field, which has since turned back to alfalfa, and it is rarely without visitors in the summer months. And there are new reports that Bethel officials are planning to ward off the hoards of fans — and reporters — coming to the Woodstock site Aug. 15 to 17 to relive the fest 20 years later.

So I ask nephew Andy — a representative of today's youth, the one who has seen the Woodstock filmstrip and done the Woodstock work sheet and who talks of growing out his hair — whether he would like to attend such an event in his lifetime.

"You kiddin'?" he says. "I'd stay home and watch it on TV."

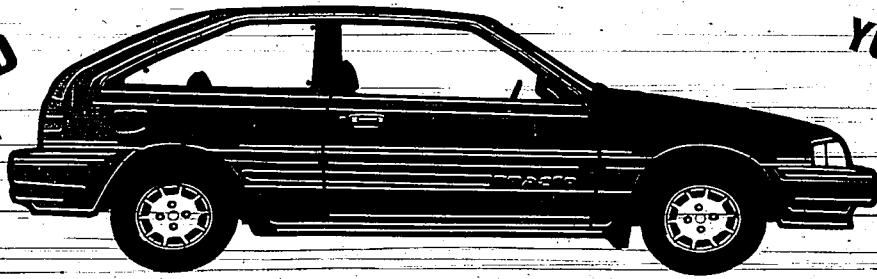

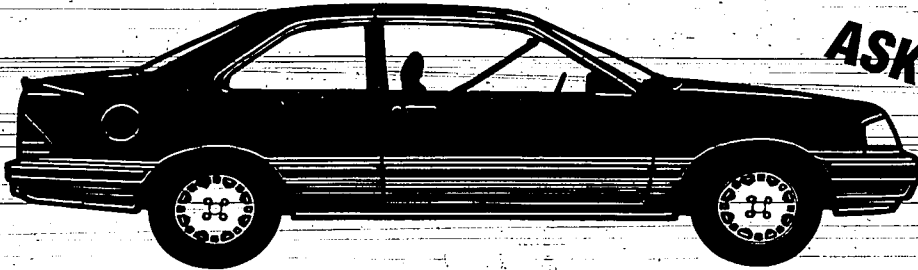

Reiser, Evigan play off one another in racier versions of 'My Two Dads'

Paul Reiser doesn't have any children, but after playing Michael, the straight-laced "dad" on "My Two Dads," returning to the NBC fall schedule on Sundays, he has a feeling he could handle any situation.

"I have the illusion that I'd be a good parent, because we have these 30-minute scripts that seem to handle everything quite nicely," he says. "If I have a kid, just give me half an hour, and I'll work everything out."

But the show is every bit as much about the relationship between the two dads, Michael and Joey (Greg Evigan) as it is about working at the problems of daughter Nicole (Staci Keenan).

"It's a strange animal, our show," says Reiser. "It's a family show, yet to me it's really been about two guys and their lives and where they are in their early 30s."

Reiser is looking forward to the show's third season.

"It's getting a lot more fun," he says. "We don't have to spend as

much time delineating characters or overcoming the obstacles of people's speculation about the show. Now people really don't care about that. They just know they like it."

The obstacle he's referring to, of course, is the show's peculiar premise — two bachelors raising a girl — who could be — the biological daughter of either one of them.

"In real life, you'd go, 'Couldn't you find some genetic test?'" Reiser says. "Probably. But then you'd have no show."

Nicole, who was 12 during the show's first season, jumped to age 16 in its second season. Has that changed the tone of the show?

"Yes and no," says Reiser. "I think that you can probably get a little racier. But the reality is that in television you can only get so racy anyway. As a parent of a 12-year-old, we're going to get a little worried about her being in a room with a guy. As the parent of 16-year-old, we're going to get maybe even a little more scared. But the broad strokes are the same: We did a show last year where she

and a couple of friends had had a couple of beers. Not only that, but one of the guys' older brothers had driven them home, and he had been drinking. We were faced with a full-time serious problem. It was not only

how do we handle this, but how do we not sound like everything our parents said that didn't work? And that's what I enjoy about the show. Our generation is — very parent-savvy. We're very aware of all the influences in parenting that we've had. How do you parlay that into being better parents?"

As the more uptight dad, does Reiser sometimes feel a bit hemmed in? "In the beginning I did," he says. "But I think that's loosened up quite a bit. And a lot of it is my personality. In the first year, Greg and I were talking. He said, 'You know, your wife, my wife, we should go camping. I've got an RV, it'll be great.' And before he could finish selling me, I was already coming up with problems. I go, 'I don't know. Does it have a shower? How does it work with a shower?' We started laughing. I don't think of my character as being a wet rag so much as practical and less spontaneous. And the show has been very careful to put forth the virtues of each character."

Anthony returns to 'One Life to Live'

In the world of soap operas, literally hundreds of actors come and go in the course of the plots and only a handful of them are remembered long after they leave. A case in point was the electric pairing of Judith Light as Karen Wollek and Gerald Anthony as Marco Dane in "One Life to Live." When these two talented actors let their characters fly, it was truly exciting to watch them month after month, year after year. Their tenure with the popular soap ended and, although Anthony's Marco stayed on for more tribulations, he too finally bid adieu to the soap.

Gerald Anthony, however, returned to the role of Marco in "One Life to Live" recently for what can be called an extended guest appearance. Now, many actors come back to soaps, reprising their roles but with Anthony, it's a bit different. He knows that he is only going to stay with the show until his present storyline comes to an end, which will probably be sometime in late September or early October.

"The big appeal for me to return," said Anthony, "was just that, a storyline that had a beginning, a middle and sort of an ending, even though I haven't really been told what the outcome will be exactly."

The personable actor admitted that he doesn't watch the soap every single day but he wanted to see how a particular scene had worked out and, since our interview was scheduled at the same time as the soap airs, I got a chance to watch an actor watch himself at work. It was very interesting and although I thought the scene went very well indeed, Anthony felt it could have been better. Forever the perfectionist. Perhaps that's one of the reasons Anthony keeps growing as an actor and has been able to go on to prime-time and movies — he always tries to do his very best.

Anthony admitted that when he left the soap, which had become a security blanket for the actor, it was rather bleak but there. He moved from New York to Los Angeles in his attempt to crack prime-time and movies and it wasn't easy. He

remembers a lot of auditions that didn't lead to a job. However, when he did start to get work, it was in some quality projects. He played Vinne Terranova's brother, the priest, in "Wiseguy," which is one of the best dramas on TV. He was particularly happy that he got to do such a wholesome character as Father Terranova since he had made his soap reputation playing a pimp, albeit one who turned over a new leaf as the soap progressed.

"I remember calling my mother to tell her I was going to play a priest, that really impressed her. I also got to play a lawyer in 'L.A. Law.' What could be better than a son who is not only a priest but a lawyer, all in the same year," Gerald joked.

Both his stint in "Wiseguy" and "L.A. Law" brought Gerald the kind of attention that had eluded him during the early months of his employment-seeking days in Hollywood. When you work for producers like Stephen J. Cannell and Steven

Bochco, it doesn't really get any better than that. Gerald Anthony said he is open to the idea of working in any series that these two top producers turn out. Anthony also branched out in films, having made "Secrets of the Ice Caves" in Chile. He plays an adult, as he puts it... somebody's father.

The actor saw some of the early shows of "One Life to Live" and was surprised how well some of them stood up. He said Judith and he just plunged right in and took enormous chances as performers. Not all of it worked, he confessed, but when it did, it was quite wonderful. Q: An article about Robert Downey Jr., who was in "Chances Are" with Cybill Shephard, claims that the 22-year-old actor appeared in the movie, "Baby, It's You," with Rosanna Arquette, six years ago. I remember that picture but can't remember Robert. Where was he hiding? — G.D.

A: Downey was in the 11th grade when he was cast in "Baby, It's You." After the film's release, his family and friends teased him because most of his scenes wound up on the cutting room floor. As Downey says, "My part was trimmed so heavily, you'd miss me if you sneezed. We all renamed the movie 'Maybe It's You.'"

Q: Who is the most popular actor

in the role of James Bond: Sean Connery or Roger Moore? — J.B.

A: Roger Moore. The Bond movies starring Moore dominate the list of highest-grossing movies in the series. "Octopussy" in 1982, with Roger aboard, is the most popular, with a U.S. box-office gross of nearly \$70 million. Box office returns on the current Bond, Timothy Dalton, are tentative but positive. The fourth actor to play Bond is George Lazenby, who appeared in "On Her Majesty's Secret Service" in 1969. David Niven also played Bond, in "Casino Royale" in 1967, but that spoof is usually not counted among "real" Bond movies.

FERGIE TALKS Sarah Ferguson, the Duchess of York, will hit the talk-show circuit this fall promoting her two children's books about Budgie, the little helicopter. Authors of books for tiny tots don't usually get invited to tea and talk on national TV, but Simon & Schuster, the books' publisher, find the royal connection irresistible. The royal family is probably worried, since Fergie is quite a free-wheeler.

CBS gives in to inevitable, agrees to marketing strategy with K mart

If there was one moment during the recent gathering of critics in Los Angeles that summed up the current state of television, it came during a CBS press conference about its big promotion for the fall.

George Schweitzer, the network's senior vice president for communication, is the type of executive who is usually introducing his bosses to the press for their sessions. But here he was conducting his own session, telling the more than 100 critics from around the country about the big game that CBS and K mart will be running together as the fall season opens in September.

Finally, after a half-hour or so of this stuff, one critic could take no more.

"I can't believe we're sitting here talking about his stuff," he spluttered. "I really can't, talking about contests and packaging and all that. What is happening to the American system of broadcasting?"

"I think that's a very good question to ask," Schweitzer responded. "And I would say what has happened is very simple. We've been used to a system where we had two other competitors for 35 years and it was very easy.

"We didn't have to do stuff like this. You never heard from people like me. We all just went on our merry way and if you didn't watch what was on CBS, you watched what was on NBC or ABC. It was all very simple.

"Look at what has happened over the last 10 years — independent television, cable television, VCRs. We have gone through a dramatic upheaval in our whole competitive process. What we're trying to do about it is get out there and not just reach out and touch people, we've got to reach out and grab them.

"It seems different because we've never done it before, but we must do it if we are going to sustain our backbone, which is television program-

ming. If we can't get people to sample our product, then we're going to see good programming and bad go down the drain before they're ever sampled."

Schweitzer had already explained all the wonderful things he had learned as he had educated himself in the ways of mass marketing. For instance, before he agreed to the K mart deal, Schweitzer was approached by someone who wanted

For its part, K mart gets mentioned every time CBS plugs the game and the promotion. You go to K mart to redeem your winning tickets. him to advertise CBS on kids' milk cartons. "He calls it the half-pint network" — another pushing ads on sugar packages, and even a proposal for putting the CBS logo and maybe a picture of Murphy Brown on the side of the Russian space shuttle.

In the end, Schweitzer said that CBS had to duke it out with NBC to get tied in with K mart sending NBC to Sears for its fall promotion scheme. He noted that 72 million copies of every K mart Sunday circular are distributed.

"It's the largest regularly circulated publication in the world," he said. "It takes 3 1/2 weeks to print it at 14 printing plants going 24 hours a day. The reach is unbelievable. By their statistics, which we've checked, 76 million shoppers go to K mart at least once a month. Fifty-eight percent of America shops there at least once a month. Only 2 percent of American shoppers have never been to a K mart. And we know who you are."

That K mart circular will carry promos for the CBS fall shows and, eventually, a number that will be used to play a game. Match all four digits of a number disclosed during a new CBS show and you win a big prize. Match three of them, and you win a smaller prize. Match two and you get a mug.

Fox, have similar promotional ties this fall as the race is on to generate some excitement about the fall season. But CBS' effort is probably the biggest and that's because that network is the most desperate.

It used to be that the best place to promote network television was, without a doubt, on your own network. But CBS' demographic profile has become so limited, and basically so old, that the network needs some way to reach out to younger viewers who never tune in to see the promos. The K mart deal is part of that.

"When you go to K mart you'll have 24 full-color, 5-foot by 4-foot giant posters of every new CBS program hanging from the center midway," Schweitzer said. "There will be 200 of these orange things which are called sign toppers. I'm getting this retail lingo down. Midway banners, sign toppers, pole poppers, PA announcements, videotapes in constant motion bag stuffers. This is it. It doesn't get much better than this.

"I've told Howard," Schweitzer said, referring to CBS president Howard Stringer, "that if things go bad, the two of us can always stock a K mart one day."

That probably wouldn't be that much of a change from what network television has come to.

"Roseanne," snubbed last week in the Emmy nominations, edged NBC's "Cheers" aside. "Cheers," last week's winner, fell to fourth

place for a tie with ABC's "Coach."

ABC and NBC each finished the week with four shows in the Top 10, but NBC still took the week and ABC was third behind CBS. It was the 59th consecutive victory for NBC.

was not a good week for original programming.

The NBC news magazine "Yesterday, Today & Tomorrow" made its debut in a tie for 19th place with ABC's "Full House." ABC's much-touted "Primetime Live" fared even worse. It was in 37th place.

The NBC summer series "13 East" dropped from 10th place last week to 35th place. Another NBC summer show, "Knight & Daye," remained in the middle of the ratings in a four-way tie for 50th place.

Fox Broadcasting Co.'s summertime jump in the ratings has apparently bottomed out. "Married... With Children" dropped to 38th place. "Totally Hidden Video" was in 46th place and "America's Most Wanted" was in that four-way tie for 50th place.

NBC won the A.C. Nielsen Co. survey with an average of 10.5. CBS was second with 9.4 and ABC was third with 9.2.

For the season to date, from Sept. 19, NBC had 14.7, ABC 11.8 and CBS 11.7. The ratings is the percentage of the estimated 90.4

million homes with televisions in the United States. The share is the percentage of sets in use.

NBC won the July sweeps, the least important of the four annual sweeps periods.

Here are the Top 10: ABC's "Rosanne," ABC's "Wonder Years," ABC's "Who's the Boss?," NBC's "Cheers" and ABC's "Coach" tied, NBC's "Golden Girls," NBC's "Perry Mason: The Case of the Lost Love" and CBS' "Murder, She Wrote" tied, NBC's "Empty Nest" and CBS' "Designing Women" tied.

ABC claimed first place among the nightly news shows. The ratings: ABC 9.4, CBS 9.1, NBC 8.6.

The lowest-rated network show of the week was ABC's "Chain Letter," a pilot show from last year. Here are the five network shows at the bottom of the chart: CBS' "Corn People," ABC's "Incredible Sunday," ABC's "Protect and Surf," CBS' "Beauty and the Beast" and ABC's "Chain Letter."

Nielsen to rate Hispanic TV

NEW YORK (AP) — Nielsen Media Research said Tuesday it has been selected to develop a national Hispanic television rating service, a development that could help Spanish-language television compete for advertising revenue.

The rating service will try to define the audience for Spanish-language programming among people who identify themselves as Hispanic.

Nielsen, the leader in English-language TV ratings for nearly 40 years, said it had signed a multimillion-dollar contract to develop the Hispanic ratings service with the two largest Spanish-language television operators, Univision Holdings Inc. and Telemundo Group Inc.

Executives of the two companies said the Nielsen Hispanic ratings will help attract spending by advertisers and agencies who in the past have been skeptical about the

estimated size of the Spanish-language TV audience.

Univision, a subsidiary of Hallmark Cards Inc., is the nation's largest Spanish-language communications concern, operating a TV network reaching 86 percent of the estimated 6 million Hispanic households.

Telemundo Group operates the nation's second-largest Spanish-language network, reaching about 70 percent of all Hispanic households.

Plans for the Hispanic ratings service, disclosed at a news conference, call for a pilot test beginning this fall in the Los Angeles area, which has a large Hispanic population. Nielsen plans to begin recruiting 200 families for the sample group there next month.

Nielsen plans to expand the service nationally to 800 Hispanic households in late 1990 or early 1991.

Nielsen's national sample for all programming is about 4,000 families.

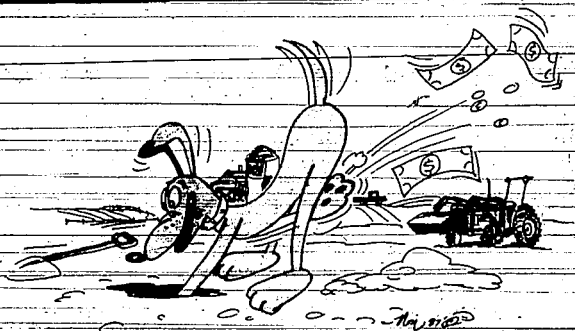
