McDevitt takes Gem court seat

The Associated Press. BOISE — It was typical Thursday that the newest member of the Idaho Supreme Court preferred to talk about his family and friends than himself.

Charles McDevitt, 57, a veteran Boise lawyer, legislator and businessman, was sworn in as the 46th member of the Supreme Court. It put the five-person court at full strength for the first time in more than three months, since May 27 when Allan Shepard died of a heart attack. And it also made the current court all appointed by Gov. Cecil Andrus.

As he was sworn in by Andrus, McDevitt said he's often asked why he wanted to run for the court, at the height of his legal career.

"I feel you have an obligation to pay your dues from time to time, and it seemed to be the time in our family," said McDevitt.

One of my concerns is access to these courts by all people at all times," the new justice said.

"I wish this court will attempt to do what I can...to make certain that these courts...remain open economically...as realistically," he said.

McDevitt takes office just 10 days after another justice, former Idaho Falls district judge Larry Boyle. He drew a laugh when he said he was assured by oyle that there would be no attempt to see who would have the largest family. Boyle has six children; McDevitt, from a Pocatello family of 12, has seven.

He spent most of his speech Thursday introducing members of his family, including the family of his late brother, Herman McDevitt, who died recently. He called Herman, a prominent Pocatello Democrat and ex-legislator, his mentor, and said his only regret was that his brother could not be present for his installation on the court.

Andrus administered the oath of office, and said later he was willing to take responsibility for the court, since he appointed them all.

"I have every confidence that the people of Idaho will be well served by this court," he said.

Not long ago, what happened to Ernest 'Polo' Staley would have been

unthinkable. Staley, a 30-year-old man from Tallahassee, Fla., was sentenced to life in prison without parole earlier this summer for dealing crack. He had no prior criminal record.

"I've represented people who took lives and received less of a sentence," defense attorney Robin Rosen complained after the sentencing in federal court.

But Staley was in the wrong place at the wrong time, doing the wrong thing. Laws against drug abuse in the United States have changed dramatically in the past five years. And while the only certain result so far has been overcrowded prisons and overburdened courts, prosecutors say they now have far more potent weapons with which to fight drugs than they had a short time ago.

"The laws have gotten tougher," acknowledged Hubert Williams, the former police chief of Newark, N.J., who now heads the Police Foundation in

Washington. "They are good and strong and effective for our purposes."

A decade ago, drug laws were in remission. The recreational drug use that had become popular during the late 1960s had fostered a new sense of permissiveness.

Marijuana was decriminalized in some states, and laws against it went unenforced in others. Strong laws against cocaine, heroin and methamphetamines remained in place, but the legal system was less eager than it once was to enforce

Bakker receiving mental evaluation; trial halts

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP) — Jim Bakker was committed to a mental institution in handcuffs and manacles Thursday after a psychiatrist reported the TV evangelist was hallucinating and covering in a fetal position in his lawyer's office.

U.S. District Judge Robert Potter suspended Bakker's fraud trial and ordered him taken to the Federal Correctional Institute in Butner for up to 60 days for psychiatric evaluation.

"Please don't do this to me," a sobbing, disheveled Bakker said as he was led from his lawyer's office by U.S. marshals to the courthouse for processing of the commitment order. He curled up in a fetal position in the back seat.

"Mr. Bakker, I'm going to have to ask you to sit up, please," a deputy marshal said.

After the paperwork was completed, marshals left for Butner, about three hours away, where Bakker would be spending his first night behind bars since the PTL scandal broke. The evangelist is accused of fleeing followers of his evangelical empire.

Dr. Basil Jackson, a psychiatrist who has been treating Bakker for nine months, told the judge that Bakker began hallucinating Wednesday after a former PTL executive testifying against him collapsed on the stand.

The witness was revived within seconds and said he was laid low by illness.

Mr. Bakker reported that when he left the courthouse Wednesday, suddenly people outside took on the form of frightening animals which he felt were intent on destroying him, attacking him and hurting him, Jackson said.

Jackson said Bakker's condition worsened overnight, even after he was given Xanax, an anti-depressant sedative. Bakker was not in court for the hearing.

On Thursday morning, Bakker was lying in the corner of his attorney's office with his head under a couch, hiding, Jackson said. "He was expressing thoughts that someone was going to hurt him."

"To put it in lay language, the man is stressed out," Jackson said later.

Prosecution and defense lawyers are under court order not to discuss the trial outside of the courtroom. But during the hearing, Assistant U.S. prosecutor Jerry Miller described the night behind bars since the PTL scandal broke. The evangelist is accused of fleeing followers of his evangelical empire.

War changed America's role in world, vision of itself

WASHINGTON — When Adolf Hitler's troops crossed into the stubble fields of western Poland on Sept. 1, 1939, The New York World's Fair was beguiling visitors with its vision of "The World of Tomorrow."

Now, 50 years later, the America you see around you may not bear much resemblance to some of the predictions of that exposition in Flushing Meadows, but it was shaped irrevocably by the world

conflict touched off in Poland. The fan-demonstrated that television pictures could be transmitted not only in the New York metropolitan area but to viewers all of 300 miles away. There were other glimpses of the future, some accurate and some not.

But as the New York Times observed in an editorial, the world

tomorrow still had "a great deal of unfinished business in it." In Baltimore, the young poet Karl Shapiro observed a robbery in his neighborhood, "an unheard of thing, an augury of things to come after the war."

The war, "to Americans of Shapiro's generation, the words would mean only one thing: World War II."

When it started, America was a nation of 132 million people, struggling out of the Great Depression. It had an Army of 189,639 men, including the Air Corps, and a Navy of 125,202. The federal government employed a civilian work force of 905,000.

Except for the wealthy and a handful of expatriate artists, few Americans went abroad. Republican

Alf Landon, warning in that last pre-war summer against being drawn into "the balance-of-power game" in Europe, said, "Never has there been a more urgent call to be Americans — first, last, and all the time."

Looking back at that time, Roger Beaumont, a Texas A&M military historian on leave to teach at the U.S. Naval Academy, said in a recent interview, "There was a long period of the United States having a very weak willingness to be involved in world affairs except during that very tiny moment during World War I, when the United States lunged onto the stage and then looked kind of bewildered and jumped back off again."

"We've got a completely different history behind us now," Beaumont said.

What a history! Pearl Harbor. Bataan. Rosie the Riveter. The

Europe marks war anniversary

FRANKFURT, West Germany — World War II began 50 years ago today.

One of many events marking the 50th anniversary will be a concert of blitzkrieg, Adolf Hitler's fearsome lightning war.

The Soviet Union called the conflict "the most horrible and destructive of all wars." An ultra-conservative West German Cabinet minister said Germans should not bear all the blame.

More than 50 million people were killed in the war touched off by the German invasion of Poland on Sept.

1, 1939. The Nazi extermination of 6 million Jews shocked the world like no other atrocity.

Major events are scheduled today in West Germany, East Germany and Poland, including an internationally broadcast concert in Warsaw conducted by Leonard Bernstein.

Pope John Paul II used the occasion to declare: "We have a duty to learn from the past so that never again will there arise a set of factors capable of triggering a similar conflagration."

In the statement issued last weekend, he called the Nazi slaughter of Jews something "which will forever remain a shame for

humanity."

John Paul is to address his Polish countrymen Friday evening by means of a huge television screen set up in Royal Castle Square in Warsaw's old city.

Tass, the official Soviet news agency, said Thursday: "The sad jubilee — 50 years since the beginning of the most horrible and destructive of all wars — requires that the world public not only learn the lessons of the past, but also determine guidelines for the future." Its commentary repeated Soviet calls for a reduction of armed forces and weapons in Europe.

E. German refugees will find open door

BOHN, West Germany (AP) — Hungarian and West German officials have worked out a plan that will let up to 20,000 East Germans leave for the West over the next few days, government sources disclosed Thursday.

West German Karsten Voigt, foreign affairs expert for the opposition Social Democrats, told reporters in Budapest senior Hungarian officials confirmed to him they plan to let out all East Germans who want to leave for West Germany.

"I assure that in a very short time East German

citizens (in Hungary) who want to go to West Germany will be able to," Voigt told the West German TV television network in an evening interview from Budapest.

About 10 percent of the 150,000 to 200,000 East Germans vacationing in Hungary are thought to be seeking passage to West Germany, and Bonn and Budapest have agreed to help them, the government sources said, speaking on condition of anonymity.

Both Hungary and East Germany are under communist governments and are in the Soviet camp. But Hungary is seeking closer ties to the West, while East Germany has shunned reform.

Noriega's picks lead Panama

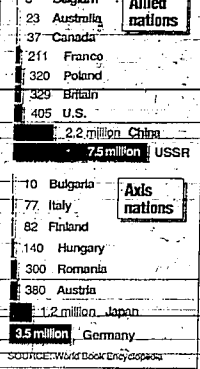

WASHINGTON — The latest attempt by the United States to oust Panamanian strongman Gen. Manuel Antonio Noriega from power ended in failure Thursday as Panama's Council of State appointed two men approved by Noriega as the nation's new president and vice president.
 The Panamanian Council said in a statement that Francisco Rodriguez, the controller general of the outgoing government, will be the new president, and Carlos Obaldia, a leader of Panama's current ruling party, will be vice president of a new provisional government. Noriega emerged from a Council meeting to personally confirm and endorse the choices.
 President Bush, speaking to

reporters in Kennebunkport, Maine, acknowledged he was frustrated by the failure of the U.S. effort against Noriega.
 "But he added, 'I am not going to give up on multilateral diplomacy. I am going to work with the leaders in this hemisphere, most of whom feel as I do about Noriega, to see if we can't help the Panamanian people get what they deserve, and that is a democratic society that stems from free, fair elections.'
 Bush administration officials indicated they will announce today what action they plan to take against the Panamanian regime. They would not comment on reports they may prohibit ships flying the Panamanian flag from entering U.S. ports.
 Under Panama's constitution, the winner of a presidential election was

supposed to assume power Friday.
 But the results of a presidential election held last May were nullified amid widespread charges that Noriega had rigged the balloting. No new election has been held.
 For the past few months, the Bush administration has tried to persuade the Organization of American States to bring about the formation of a new government not controlled by Noriega.
 Despite the inability by the OAS to negotiate a solution that would drive Noriega from power, Bush said, "we are going to continue to press the case in the OAS... (We) will keep working on it."
 Thursday's developments left Panama totally in the hands of Noriega, and the United States without any realistic options for forcing his downfall.

 "For most people my age, the war and its aftermath were the most intense experience of our lives," Telford Taylor, chief American prosecutor at trial of the 13 Nuremberg war-crimes trials, told our historian Studs Terkel.
 "By the time the war ended, 230,366 Americans would have died in combat, nearly as many as the total enrollment in the Army and Navy in 1939.
 Today, in a nation of 247 million people, more than 2.1 million Americans wear their country's uniform and 3.1 million work for the federal government as civilians. The latest Commerce Department figures for a 12-month period show 14.4 million Americans traveling abroad, not including trips to Canada and Mexico. The nation enjoys unprecedented affluence, but its cities are beset by crime and drugs.
 In world affairs, an American that has been reluctant to get involved emerged from the war to find itself a superpower confronted by another. In Korea; in Vietnam; in the Middle East; in Europe, it would be involved as never before.
 Television signals bouncing off satellites in space bring live pictures of turmoil abroad into American living rooms. The radar screens perfected during World War II to track enemy ships and planes now catch speeders on the interstate highway system, heirs to a legacy of Dwight Eisenhower. World War II general turned president.

Medellin bombing injures 13

BOGOTA, Colombia — A bomb strapped to an ice cream vendor's bicycle blew up at a paint factory in Medellin Thursday, wounding 13 people and causing \$300,000 in damage, Medellin's fire department said in a statement. About 20 cars were damaged, a police spokeswoman said on condition of anonymity.
 The bombing followed the first night of a curfew imposed in

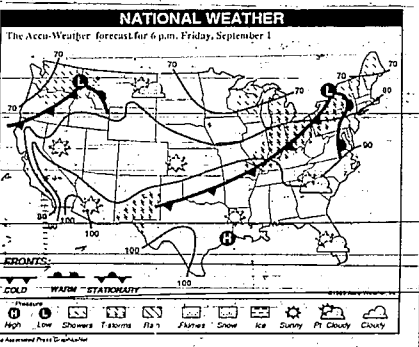
Medellin and eight nearby towns. Police reported a series of bombings that caused minor damage in Medellin as the curfew went into effect Wednesday night.
 About 530 people were arrested through dawn Thursday for violating the 10 p.m. to 6 a.m. curfew.
 In Washington, the Pentagon set Sunday as the target date to begin shipping weapons, aircraft and other supplies under President Bush's \$65 million military aid package for Colombia's war on drug traffickers.
 The bombing of the paint factory in Medellin was the latest in a two-week wave of assassinations, arson and bombings by Colombia's drug traffickers in retaliation for government crackdown on the

narcotics trade.
 Until Thursday, most of the bombings have been at night, although an Aug. 24 bombing of a political party headquarters in Medellin killed a man.
 The same group on Aug. 24 issued a statement declaring "total war" on the government in response to a crackdown on trafficking after the Aug. 18 assassination of Luis Carlos Galan, a leading presidential candidate.
 Just before the curfew went into effect Wednesday night in Medellin, country club grenades at a Medellin country club building. Two grenades exploded, but there was little damage and no injuries, a police spokeswoman said.

Neues Deutschland, the official newspaper of East Germany's Communist Party, said: "The most important historical lesson of Sept. 1, 1939, consists of never again letting fascism return."
 In Hitler's native Austria, which he occupied and annexed in 1938 without firing a shot, the popular tabloid Kurier is running a daily series called "Hitler's War."
 "It scarcely ever happened in history that the responsibility for a war was so clear," the newspaper said Monday. "It was, in the end, the work of one man. It was Hitler's war."
 Austria has claimed to be the detainee's first victim.
 News media, politicians and intellectuals in West Germany have used the anniversary for a review of Nazi atrocities.
 "Special events included a concert Thursday night in Frankfurt featuring violinist Anne-Sophie Mutter — and Polish composer Krzysztof Penderecki conducting his "Polish Requiem."
 As a gesture of reconciliation, the government said it was willing to return the Polish Embassy in Berlin, seized by the Nazis in 1941, to Polish ownership.
 At a service in Berlin, West German Jewish leader Heinz Galinski denounced the resurgence of right-wing extremism in Germany.

 established mandatory jail terms and fixed sentences for drug offenders, taking much of the sentencing discretion out of judges' hands.
 Similar laws have been passed by most states, and some have gone much further.
 "That's been the major outcry in the last decade — Let's get tough on the manufacturers and sellers. And now it's Let's get tough on the users too," said Bob Frothing, who follows drug issues for the National Conference of State Legislatures.
 In the past few years, Frothing said, virtually every state has raised the penalties for drug crimes that occur in or around schools. More than half have established stronger penalties for crack than for plain cocaine. Some have extended the death penalty to include murders committed during drug transactions.
 In the most recent wave of legislation, about two-thirds of the states have enacted laws allowing law enforcement officials to seize the property of drug dealers.
 "It's difficult to assess the effectiveness of these laws, and some people believe they have not been failures."
 "The problem we have is not the strength of the laws, but the application of the laws," said Williams of the Police Foundation.

 are accused of steering for their own use more than \$1 million of \$158 million raised from followers who gave \$1,900 for three hours' free judging each year for life at the minister's home.
 If convicted on all 24 counts, Bakker could be sentenced to 120 years in prison and fined \$5 million.
 Defense attorney George T. Davis told Potter that Bakker, 49, kept saying he wanted the trial to continue but was "on the floor in a fetal position."
 "If Mr. Bakker is handled gently and carefully he may be able to proceed with this trial," Davis said.
 The defense had tried to persuade the judge to allow Bakker to stay in a private institution.
 Last year, Bakker's wife, Tammy Faye, described a similar scene, saying in a fund-raising letter to supporters that her husband had stayed in a fetal position for hours after he was forced to leave the ministry in 1987.
 "She made no mention of Thursday's developments on the couple's daily religious broadcast."
 If Jessica Hahn, the woman who 1980 sexual encounter with Bakker led to Bakker's downfall, said in a 1987 Playboy interview that just after the trust, a fellow evangelist who had just come from Bakker's hotel room, said he was "lying in a fetal position in his room, saying he's happy."
 Jackson said his initial diagnosis was that Bakker was "actively hallucinating," suffers from "acute depression" and has episodes where he is unable to adequately judge and relate to reality.
 Nelson's collapse came the same day that lawyers confirmed that another key witness in the trial, former PTL second-in-command Richard Dortch, was being treated at a Clearwater, Fla., hospital for an undisclosed ailment.

New rule requires power cutoff during major maintenance

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Labor Department on Thursday gave 631,000 businesses two months to guarantee that all power to machinery is cut off during major maintenance and repairs.

It said the move would save 120 lives and prevent 60,000 injuries a year.

The rule issued by the department's Occupational Safety and Health Administration would add protections for 39 million workers, 3 million of whom are at the greatest risk because they service machinery, the government said.

OSHA said employers must guarantee that the machinery cannot be accidentally activated during repairs and maintenance and that workers cannot be exposed to electrical current during that work.

The rule requires most employers to guarantee the protection by installing locks that cut machines off from their power supply. It will cost the affected establishments \$214 million in the next year for the necessary equipment and training and \$135 million in subsequent years, OSHA said. Those costs will range from \$120 for small establishments — such as a small print shop — to \$29,000 for large plants with scores of machines, OSHA said.

The rule requires a decade in the making, is tougher in its final form than when proposed. The government initially said employers could either install locks to prevent accidental activation of equipment during repairs or place warning tags on the power source to alert workers that the machinery was being

worked on and was not to be activated.

The final rule places a greater emphasis on locks, allowing tags only when an employer can prove that equipment cannot be "locked" off a power supply or that its tag program is as effective as using locks. Because of the additional training required to meet that threshold, it would cost employers more to use tags than it would to install locks, said Alan McDonald, acting OSHA chief. He said 90 percent of electrically powered machinery is capable of being locked.

"We have so many fatalities, loss of fingers, crushed bones and other serious injuries because these precautions are not taken," McMillan said in an interview. "This will have a major effect on workplace safety."

The provision allowing use of tags will not apply to new equipment or machines that are taken off line for major modifications, McMillan said. In those cases, locks must be used.

The rule, which takes effect Oct. 31, also requires annual training of all affected workers. Employers also must inventory all equipment covered by the rule and establish a written plan for cutting off power during repairs.

The standard applies to most machinery used in manufacturing and in services such as industrial laundries. OSHA data show that packaging and wrapping equipment, printing presses and conveyors account for a high proportion of accidents for a high proportion of accounts blamed on a failure to cut off power during major maintenance and repairs.

WASHINGTON — It's back. Like the monster in a B-movie, the one dollar coin could once again rear its head — this time in the form of Christopher Columbus.

Despite the failures of the short-lived Susan B. Anthony coin and the Eisenhower dollar, a nationwide coalition of lawmakers and interest groups are pushing for a change in our nation's spare change.

Leading the charge is the Coin Coalition, a Washington, D.C.-based lobby firm that citizens groups that include everything from brass and copper suppliers and mass transit associations

to coin laundry operators and visually handicapped groups.

The groups say if the U.S. Treasury introduces the coin correctly, the plan will not only increase efficiency for retailers and consumers and save millions for vending machine operators, but reduce the federal deficit as well. "Its time to join almost every other industrialized nation that has replaced their dollar equivalent with a coin," said Dick Funk of the Chicago-based National Automatic Merchandising Association (NAMA), a coalition of businesses that utilize vending machines to sell cigarettes, candy, soft drinks and other items.

"It might not be popular at first, but in the long run the benefits far outweigh the costs,"

Funk said.

Contrary to popular opinion, a coin dollar would allow the average consumer to carry around less change and not more, says Rick Currie, president of Coin Controls, an Illinois company which makes components for vending machines.

Richard Torp, communications director for the Coin Laundry Association, coalition of over 3,000 laundry businesses, agrees.

"It's extremely expensive to collect, validate, count and process a dollar bill compared to the coin," adds John Shumacher, vice president of the American Amusement Machine Operators Association, which represents about 1,400 coin operated entertainment businesses.

Conflict-of-interest law was violated, judge says

WASHINGTON (AP) — A senior Energy Department official violated a conflict-of-interest law by participating in the award of a \$1 billion contract to a group of companies that included one of his former employers, a federal judge found.

U.S. Claims Court Judge Reginald Gibson, in a finding released Thursday, said Samuel Rouso had violated the federal statute prohibiting an Energy Department supervisor from participating in department decisions involving any energy company that the supervisor has worked for within the past year.

Rouso is acting director of the department office administering a program to evaluate Yucca Mountain, Nev., as a possible site for building the nation's first permanent repository for high-level radioactive waste from nuclear reactors.

Gibson's finding on Rouso was a central feature of a ruling he handed down last week that blocked the En-

ergy Department from giving a \$1 billion Yucca Mountain management contract to a group led by Bechtel Management Systems Inc., a subsidiary of the San Francisco-based engineering and construction giant.

Gibson agreed with a contention by TRW Inc., an unsuccessful bidder, that Rouso should not have been involved in weighing the Bechtel team's bid for the Yucca Mountain project.

The Cleveland-based company said Rouso had previously worked for one of Bechtel's partners, Science Applications International Corp., a San Diego-based engineering and consulting firm that has played a major role in the Yucca Mountain project as an Energy Department contractor since 1983.

Rouso declined to comment on Gibson's finding.

"I can't respond, since I'm a key party to the case," he said in a brief telephone conversation.

Stepparent families are up sharply

WASHINGTON (AP) — The number of American children living with stepparents has risen sharply, as women have children before marriage and parents change spouses, the Census Bureau reported Thursday.

The number of children under age 18 living with a stepparent jumped 11.6 percent between 1980 and 1985, increasing from 6,082,000 to 6,789,000, the bureau reported.

During the same period the number of children in biological families that is, children living with both their natural parents, slipped from 39.5 million to 37.2 million.

The findings on stepchildren were reported Thursday in "Studies in Marriage and the Family," the first of a new series of special topical studies to be issued by the agency.

The report contains sections on unmarried, single parents and married couple families. It summarizes information issued previously by the bureau, bringing together statistics on related topics in a single publication.

The rise in stepchildren has occurred during a period when more divorces were occurring, giving rise to second marriages.

Alleged gunman turns himself in


NEW YORK (AP) — The suspected gunman in the slaying of a black teen by a gang of whites walked into an uptown New York police station and surrendered Thursday after an eight-day manhunt.

My name is Joseph Pama. The New York City Police Department is looking for me for murder, the 18-year-old was quoted as telling a police officer about 2:30 a.m. in Oneonta, 160 miles north of New York City.

Pama returned to Brooklyn hours later to face a lineup and possible murder charges in the Aug. 23 slaying of 18-year-old Yusuf Hawkins, authorities said.

Pama's surrender came one day after Hawkins' funeral.

Six other suspects have been charged in the attack, which set off five days of protests and inflamed racial tensions in the city. Hawkins was shot and killed after being ambushed by a gang of up to 30 white youths carrying bats and golf clubs. He had arrived at the mostly white neighborhood with three black friends to answer a used-car ad.



Waning of communism is triumph of an idea

Fifty years today, the German Army invaded Poland and within weeks, had plunged the world into a war which would cost millions of lives and reshape the map of Europe.

Today, as its domestic problems mount and no easy solution is in sight, a preoccupied Soviet Union looks the other way while Poland and Hungary begin to pull away from the gravity of the Soviet orbit.

Nearby Latvia, Estonia and Lithuania stir with discontent. Rumblings of nationalism are heard throughout the vast Soviet empire.

The government quickly acquiesces to a miners' strike in Siberia as Western media bring a tantalizing picture of the world outside, a land of profits, consumer goods and entrepreneurial spirit.

In a fascinating essay in the summer issue of "The National Interest," a State Department theorist takes the idea further.

We are witnessing, says Francis Fukuyama, the end of history.

No, he does not mean the end of the world. We will still have drugs, crime, coyotes and rats to inherit the earth should we dissolve into a mindless pursuit of ever more wealth, consumption and sensation.

But perhaps we should stand back from the economic explanations of the cataclysmic changes which are happening and see them, not only as the triumph of economic capitalism over communism, but rather as the triumph of an idea.

That idea, says Fukuyama, is Western liberal democracy and its success is more a reflection of the power of the concept than the economic forces which accompany it.

Fukuyama draws in the notions of Hegel, the German philosopher who Marx supposedly overturned.

Liberal democracy, says Fukuyama, an idea which took root in England and France in the 1600s and 1700s, has demonstrated itself as the best idea. If, as Hegel believed, ideas determine material conditions rather than vice versa, in the long run the same idea will produce the same results throughout the world.

The result? An end to the history of man's ideological evolution and the emergence of what Fukuyama calls "the universalization of Western liberal democracy." (See excerpts on this page.)

The theory has, of course, its holes. There is little of Fukuyama's argument for unpredictability or irrationality, both of which surface in human affairs all too often, and often with unwanted results.

Also, there are sure to be those who will conclude, that if ideas are no longer evolving, then the pursuit of material goods is the highest goal of man.

Still, it is not hard to get into some heady thinking these days as we in America witness what looks very much like the collapse of communism.



We may be seeing end of history

The triumph of the West, of the Western idea, is evident first of all in the total exhaustion of viable systematic alternatives to Western liberalism.

In the past decade, there have unmistakable changes in the intellectual climate of the world's two largest communist countries, and the beginnings of significant reform movements in both.

But this phenomenon extends beyond high politics and it can be seen also in the ineluctable spread of consumerist Western culture in such diverse contexts as the peasants' markets and color television sets now omnipresent throughout China, the cooperative restaurants and clothing stores opened in the past year in Moscow, the Beethoven piped into Japanese department stores, and the rock music enjoyed alike in Prague, Bangkok, and Tehran.

What we may be witnessing is not just the end of the Cold War, or the passing of a particular period of postwar history, but the end of history as such: that is, the end point of mankind's ideological evolution and the universalization of Western liberal democracy as the final form of human government.

For Hegel, the contradictions that drive history exist first of all in the realm of human consciousness, i.e., on the level of ideas, not the trivial election year proposals of American politicians, but ideas in the sense of large unifying world

views...
Consciousness is cause and not effect... hence the real subtext underlying the apparent jumble of current events is the history of ideology.

Hegel's idealism has fared poorly at the hands of later thinkers. Marx reversed the priority of the real and the ideal completely, relegating the entire realm of consciousness — religion, art, culture, philosophy itself — to a "superstructure" that was determined entirely by the prevailing material mode of production.

Yet another unfortunate legacy of Marxism is our tendency to retreat into materialist or utilitarian explanations of political or historical phenomena, and our disinclination to believe in the autonomous power of ideas...

Indeed, there is on the right what one might label the "Wall Street Journal" school of deterministic materialism that discounts the importance of ideology and culture and sees man as essentially a rational, profit-maximizing individual.

The end of history will be a very sad time. The struggle for recognition, the willingness to risk one's life for a purely abstract goal, the world-wide ideological struggle that called forth daring,

courage, imagination, and idealism, will be replaced by economic calculation, the endless solving of technical problems, environmental concerns, and the satisfaction of sophisticated customer demands.

In the post-historical period there will be no philosophy, just the perpetual caretaking of the museum of human history...

Perhaps this very prospect of centuries of boredom... will serve to get history started once again.

It states, "subsurface migration of transuranic (TRU) radionuclides and volatile organic chemicals (VOCs) has occurred from TRU waste buried before 1970 at the RWMC. The two million cubic feet of waste contained at least 281 kg. (over 800 pounds) of transuranics and 48,400 gallons of organics.

The VOCs have reached the underlying aquifer, 580 feet below. The TRU radionuclides have migrated downward 110 feet and possibly as much as 240 feet."

The DOE scientists also wrote the Executive Summary Environmental Impact Statement on New Mexico's WIPP storage. Chapter 1, Page 1, states "these radioactive wastes pose a potential hazard to human health and safety so that they must be permanently isolated from the environment in which we live."

In Chapter 2, Page 1, the DOE scientists discuss burying more waste at INEL. They state "the possibility of geological storage at INEL has also been considered. However, this approach is technically unsuitable for the following reasons: There is no suitable geological environment at the INEL. The INEL is on the Snake River Plain and is un-

derlain by the very important Snake River Aquifer."

With a threat to their \$10 project, now Bush and McClure say \$400 million a year clean-up money is what we deserve.

With the DOE "estimate" for clean-up costs at \$100 billion, that's over a 200 year's funding rate! Don't worry, be happy. Now ever Admiral Watkins, DOE chief is asking for up to \$3.7 billion a year to research clean-up technology. If we wait five years, we can see if he is really serious; but it sounds good.

Call me crazy, but I'd like to see the money from Mr. "No New Taxes" first. Mr. Vesser, like Senator McClure, you confuse the short 12.3 year half life of tritium with the 21,500 year of half life of plutonium 239. Some parts of emerging drug strategy to remain under wraps

New varieties of narcotics make their appearance

WASHINGTON (AP) — Some sections of an emerging national drug strategy detail U.S. limits in attacking drug traffickers, growers and users, but will remain secret lest narcotics peddlers benefit from the information, an administration source said Thursday.

It had been learned previously that the revamped strategy President Bush will reveal next Tuesday will be tough on users, heavy on law enforcement and call for a new emphasis on treatment. Up to \$200 million in economic and military aid will be sent to Colombia, Bolivia and Peru to stop cocaine at its South American origin, sources have said.

On Thursday, the administration source, discussing the strategy on grounds he not be named publicly, said that portions of the document will be classified.

"This would include any information that would give an advantage to the narcotraffickers," he said.

It's a war, and you don't give all your plans to the enemy. You do want the narcotraffickers to know what the limits are," the source said. "We can't let them know how far we would go before retaliation or how far before we pump more money in."

As an example, the source said, the United States would not make public the government's possible actions if assassinations continued against judicial officials in Colombia, where drug traffickers have

WASHINGTON (AP) — A new generation of narcotics known as "crank," "craak" and "moon rock" is invading American streets along with smokable heroin, that addicts blend with crack cocaine, the Senate was told Thursday.

"The drug cartel, like any successful marketers of a product, are constantly working on new and improved models," Sen. Joseph Biden, D-Del., told a hearing of his Senate Judiciary Committee on new trends in narcotics.

Drugs to take hold in the 1990s could include an exotic South American compound called "bosco," and already addicts are purchasing a synthetic form of heroin known as "P-funk," witnesses told the panel.

Already-in-use are "crank," the

street name for methamphetamines; "craak," a mixture of crack and regular cocaine and "moon rock" or "speedball," a combination of crack and heroin, witnesses told the panel.

Blending crack and heroin staves off the suicidal depression, or "crash," that crack smokers experience almost immediately after the burst of euphoria they feel when the drug hits the pleasure centers of the brain, said Dr. Walter Faggitt, substance abuse services director at D.C. General Hospital.

William Hopkins, director of street research for the New York State division of substance abuse services, said heroin remains in wide use while being sold in new forms. One is called "this" or heroin in a straw. The powder is tapped into the straw and the ends heat sealed, he said.

Hopkins said peddlers now sometimes hand out business cards stating the street corner where they can be found. The cards sometimes contain partial phone numbers. "At the last minute, they add two digits," he testified.

Shipping by phone is then possible. "You can order drugs and a kit will deliver them to you on a bicycle," he said. When anti-drug rallies are held on notorious street corners in drug-copping areas, customers

are herded by "steerers" to sites a few blocks away where sales are going on, he said.

Heroin is flooding into the country and is found in increasingly pure forms on the street, witnesses told the committee. Hopkins said that for the first time since the 1960s, addicts are seen "padding out" on the street because of the potency of the drug.

He said young addicts are increasingly blending heroin and cocaine. "Some of these young users shoot, some of them snort and some of them smoke," he said. "Some smoke it on joints, some smoke it on tobacco, some smoke it on aluminum foil."

A blend of heroin and crack is burned on the foil while the users "put a straw in their nose and chase the fumes around the room," he said.

killed scores of officials and vowed total war on the authorities currently conducting a major crackdown there.

The source said the plan's sections on intelligence operations also will be classified. This, he said, will include how material is gathered, what it indicates and by whom.

It also will not reveal third-party countries that give information, the source said. The U.S. intelligence

community frequently relies on its allies to pass on useful secret data.

The document that Bush will unveil in his first nationally broadcast address from the White House draws from suggestions submitted to drug control chief William Bennett from agencies ranging from the National Security Council to the State Department.

Sections of the plan will remain classified that deal with precise ar-

rangements of drug operations and strength of U.S. anti-drug forces overseas, the source said. Some portions dealing with strategies at home also will remain under wraps.

The source used the example of Jamaican gangs involved in crack houses in the United States, saying: "We're not going to reveal how we're going to infiltrate or if we're going after their money laundering operations."

"The idea is to tell as much as possible to the people," the source said, adding that about 70 percent of the plan would be unclassified. "But it is obvious we can't tell all."

The plan attempts to lay to rest the political infighting among the various agencies involved in combating drugs. Sources say it calls for an increased role for the military, committing troops to more training of overseas forces and advising but

stopping short of direct intervention.

The strategy, according to sources, delineates the overseas operations of the Drug Enforcement Administration, the State Department, which runs drug eradication programs, and the CIA, which gathers intelligence data.

The CIA set up a Counter Narcotics Center in April to "combine operational and analytical support to our country's fight against international drug trafficking," according to spokesman Bill Devyne.

He said the plan is to unite the intelligence community — the Federal Bureau of Investigation, Defense Intelligence Agency, the National Security Agency, Customs and the DEA.

Attempts to stop the cocaine flow into the United States by working directly in South America were all but stopped earlier this year because of security threats to American personnel caused by leftist guerrillas operating in Colombia and Peru and a lack of concrete guidelines and cooperation among U.S. agencies.

At home, the crackdown on drug users calls for a program allowing judges to strip student loans and other federal benefits from drug offenders.

The draft of the strategy, leaked to the media in July, called for a 49 percent increase in treatment funds, \$925 million in 1990 compared with \$621 million in the current budget.

Detector won't find all bombs

WASHINGTON (AP) — A \$1 million bomb detector that the Federal Aviation Administration starts operating Friday at a New York airport is not sensitive enough to spot an explosive like the one that destroyed Pan-Am Flight 103 last December, Science magazine reports.

The magazine, the journal for the American Association for the Advancement of Science, said the bomb detector, called a thermal neutron analysis device, or TNA, is being set at a sensitivity that will uncover about 2.5 pounds of plastic explosives.

Science said that British experts believe the bomb that brought down Pan-Am flight 103 over Lockerbie, Scotland, on Dec. 21 contained only about one pound of explosive. The crash killed 270 people.

A TNA bomb detector has been installed in a special building at JFK Airport in New York and will go into operation for international TWA flights on Friday, FAA officials said. The agency said that it wants U.S. airlines to spend about half a billion dollars to install 491 of the machines at international airports over the next five years.

The bomb finder is a 10-ton, 13-foot-long machine. It uses neutrons, a type of subatomic particle, to probe luggage for the presence of nitrogen, a major component of explosives. The luggage passes through the machine on a conveyor belt and if nitrogen of a certain level is detected, the machine indicates the source, enabling operators to separate suspicious bags.

Science said the machine is so massive that it requires special construction to install, increasing the cost of deploying the \$1 million machine.

A problem with the system is that some types of fabric, leather and such things as plastic ski boots can have nitrogen densities as high as explosives.

"If heavy trunks and woolen clothing are involved, it becomes hard to distinguish a real bomb from background readings, creating false alarms," the magazine said.

To avoid an excess of false alarms, Science said the machine will be operated at a sensitivity to detect about 2.5 pounds of plastic explosives.

This sensitivity, the magazine said, will produce a false alarm rate of about 5 percent. On a fully-loaded jumbo jet, such a false alarm rate would represent about 30 pieces of luggage that would require special handling, the magazine said.

Raymond Salazar, the director of the office of civil aviation security for the FAA, acknowledged that the false alarm rate for the detector that goes into operation on Friday could be as high as 5 percent, but he declined to discuss the level of sensitivity used in the device.

EPA tightens controls on benzene releases

WASHINGTON (AP) — The federal government issued tighter controls Thursday on cancer-causing benzene, saying the new restrictions will eliminate 90 percent of benzene releases from industrial sources ranging from steel plants to service stations.

But the curbs are expected to be

quite easily — and they do not cover the primary source of benzene pollution, automobiles, the Environmental Protection Agency said.

Congress is considering legislation that would tighten air pollution standards, including provisions to reduce benzene releases from motor vehicles. EPA officials said the agency

also plans to announce separate regulations next month to reduce vapor releases — including benzene — from automobiles.

In its announcement Thursday, the EPA said new emission control equipment may force industry to spend nearly \$1.3 billion, with another \$200 million annually in main-

tenance costs. The regulations, some of which will become final immediately while others were expected to become final within six months to eight months, would cut industrial benzene emissions by 34,000 tons a year, or by about 90 percent, over the next two years.

14 injured when bridge collapses on parkway

LAUREL, Md. (AP) — A bridge being built over a major Baltimore-Washington artery collapsed during a rush-hour Thursday as workers poured concrete beneath debris. Fourteen motorists were injured. One victim, Kimberly Anderson of Elkridge, was listed in critical condition. She was one of five commuters in two cars caught under a hail of wet concrete, metal and wood on the Baltimore-Washington Parkway.

Ms. Anderson, 30, suffered multiple injuries, including head wounds and facial cuts, said Andy Trohanis, a spokesman for the University of Maryland Shock Trauma Center.

None of the other victims, including nine construction workers, had serious injuries, authorities said.

Investigators were focusing on the false work, or shoring, that supports the concrete road surface while it cures and sets. The workers had poured about 200 tons of concrete and were two-thirds of the way through when the bridge collapsed in

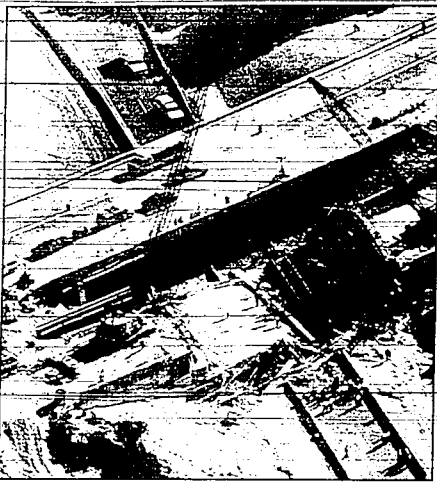
the middle, said Gene McCormick, deputy administrator for the Federal Highway Administration.

The shoring basically collapsed. We suspect the shoring is probably the cause of the failure. We have no specific conclusions at this point," McCormick said.

The shoring was a combination of timber members and steel members," McCormick said. "Conceivably — I am not suggesting this at all — something could have hit one of the support members and thereby led to the failure."

Early morning rush-hour traffic was heavy when the Route 198 span collapsed about 4:30 a.m. MDT. Rescue workers initially feared more cars may have been trapped under a 10-foot-tall pile of debris and carefully removed pieces of goopy concrete, wood and metal by hand.

By 9 a.m. MDT, however, rescuers said it appeared all the victims had been rescued. Heavy equipment was brought in to clean up the debris.

Young victim's notes yield clues to blaze

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — Investigators studying the cause of a New Year's Day house fire that killed 10 had an unusual piece of evidence: a journal kept by one of the victims, a 9-year-old girl.

Kimberly Smischney of Bemidji, described by her teacher as a child who loved to write, recorded in her journal how spooky it was that the lights at her cousins' home in Remer often flickered and popped.

Her notes helped the fire marshal's office determine that electrical problems may have caused the blaze.

She wrote many times about the house in Remer because she

loved it. She loved going down there," said Arlene Mullrann, who was Kimberly's third-grade teacher at Hagace May Elementary School.

Killed in the fire at the converted schoolhouse were Kimberly, her mother, father and 10-year-old brother, her four cousins and two neighbor children.

The blaze occurred during a holiday gathering at the home of Kimberly's aunt and uncle, who were out celebrating the aunt's 32nd birthday when the fire broke out.

Mrs. Mullrann said Thursday that Kimberly kept the journal as part of a class project.

Noriega has \$200-300 million, official claims

WASHINGTON (AP) — Calling him a man of "shameless excess," a top State Department official said Thursday that Panamanian Gen. Manuel Antonio Noriega has amassed a personal fortune of between \$200 and \$300 million from drug trafficking and other criminal activities.

Deputy Secretary of State Lawrence Eagleburger made the allegation in response to a challenge

from a Panamanian diplomat last week for the Bush administration to back up its claim that Noriega has a long history of involvement in drug smuggling.

Eagleburger spoke before a meeting of the Organization of American States' permanent council, which was convened at State Department request.

"Much of his presentation was devoted to repeating charges contained

in indictments handed down by two Florida grand juries in February 1988.

But no administration official had ever before offered an "official estimate of Noriega's wealth."

"By conservative estimates, we judge Noriega's personal wealth (much of it hidden in secret bank accounts abroad) to be at least \$200 (million) to \$300 million," Eagleburger said.

Pavarotti no longer welcome at Lyric Opera

CHICAGO (AP) — Tenor Luciano Pavarotti and his high C's have been banished from the Lyric Opera, where officials say they "fired" of hearing the same old song after he once again canceled his appearances for the season.

"Lyric Opera is now unwilling to take the risk of one more cancellation by Mr. Pavarotti," said general

director Ardis Kraunik. "I'm very sad about this. ... But I didn't have any choice."

The last straw came when Pavarotti, 33, canceled six performances as Cavaradossi in Puccini's "Tosca," scheduled at the Civic Opera House for late September and early October, citing an inflamed sciatic nerve, Miss Kraunik said.

Pavarotti has backed out of 26 of his 41 scheduled performances with the Lyric since 1981, she said.

Pavarotti's New York-based manager, Herbert Breslin, said he spoke with the tenor Thursday at his home in Modena, Italy, and Pavarotti issued a statement saying that he agreed "there should be no future collaboration" with the Lyric.

Canadian court won't hear Ng case

OTTAWA (AP)—The Supreme Court of Canada refused on Thursday to hear the case of Charles Ng, moving the former U.S. Marine a step closer to extradition to California to face 13 murder charges.

Ng can still appeal directly to Justice Minister Doug Lewis, who has the power to block extradition for any prisoner facing the death penalty.

Ng, 28, a native of Hong Kong who was educated in Britain, is charged with murder, kidnaping and burglary in the deaths of 12 men, women and children.

Eleven deaths involved sex slayings at a cabin 120 miles east of San Francisco. The 12th involved the slaying of a San Francisco disc jockey.

Ng is serving a 4½-year sentence for shooting a security guard in the hand in a bungled shoplifting attempt in Calgary in 1985.

Measles outbreak claims 28 lives

JAKARTA, Indonesia (AP)—An outbreak of measles in West Java has claimed 28 lives, all but one of them children, a newspaper reported Thursday.

The disease broke out in early August in three villages in Wanaraja district, about 100 miles southwest of Jakarta, and has afflicted at least 140 people, including the 28 who died, the daily newspaper *Pos Kota* reported.

Most of the victims were children who had never been vaccinated, the newspaper said, quoting unidentified sources at Wanaraja's public health center.

The lack of clean water was the cause of the epidemic, according to Kurnadi Sumawiganda, chief of the local health department in Garut.

Sheik recommends kidnapping pope

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP)—The pro-Franco leader of fundamentalist Sunni Moslems was quoted Thursday as saying Pope John Paul II should be kidnapped if he visits Lebanon's besieged Christians.

Sheik Said Shaaban also recommended that President Bush and President Francois Mitterrand of France be abducted as a means of ending support for Lebanese Christians and for Israel, the Beirut daily *Ad-Diyar* reported.

Syrian and Christian soldiers exchanged artillery and tank fire Thursday. Police said three people were killed and 24 wounded, raising total casualties since the artillery war began March 8 to at least 808 dead and 2,342 wounded. Nearly all the casualties have been civilians.

A mediation mission by French envoy Francois Scheer appeared to have collapsed, raising fears of intensified fighting between Gen. Michel Aoun's Christian army command and a Moslem alliance led by the 40,000 Syrian troops stationed in Lebanon.

Although Shaaban is a Sunni, he supports the radical Shiite Moslem goal of an Iran-style Islamic republic in Lebanon and has made several trips to Tehran.

Officials deny Honecker has cancer

BERLIN (AP)—Communist officials said Thursday that Erich Honecker was recovering "very slowly" from a gall-bladder operation, but denied reports the 77-year-old East German leader has cancer.

On Wednesday, Western media reported that Honecker's gall bladder operation two weeks ago had to be abandoned because of the "condition of the tissue." West German security sources confirmed they had information Honecker's operation had to be abandoned because of complications.

The mass-circulation West German newspaper *Bild*, said Honecker was "struggling with death. He is apparently incurably sick with cancer."

East German officials, speaking on condition of anonymity, said Thursday such assertions on cancer were "totally unfounded."

15 hurt as activists, workers clash

NEW DELHI, India (AP)—Opposition activists clashed with governing party workers in Calcutta today and 15 people were injured, news reports said.

The clash came one day after opposition groups called a one-day nationwide strike to protest the government of Prime Minister Rajiv Gandhi and his Congress Party. Clashes between rival parties left 12 people dead.

Today, Congress Party workers and members of the Marxist Communist Party battled with sticks and rocks for two hours on the streets in the eastern city of Calcutta, United News of India reported.

It said one Congress worker's house also was set on fire.

Calcutta is the capital of the West Bengal state, which is governed by the Marxist Communist Party, one of the four sponsors of Wednesday's nationwide strike. The other participants were the Communist Party of India, the centrist People's Group and the right-wing Indian People's Party.

Poland's lone rabbi won't join peace prayer

WARSAW, Poland (AP)—Poland's only rabbi said Thursday he won't join leaders of other religions in a prayer for peace marking the 50th anniversary of World War II's start because of a Roman Catholic convent at Auschwitz.

Organizers had pointed to the participation of the rabbi — a survivor of the Nazi death camp — as evidence that Jews were not boycotting the event, led by Roman Catholics and bringing to Warsaw representatives of many other faiths.

"I personally will not participate in the joint prayers. When I go to Auschwitz I cannot pray there because I am disturbed by a cross and the Carmelite convent there," said Rabbi Menachem Joskowicz.

"One cannot be barred from prayer at Auschwitz and at the same time participate in joint prayers in Warsaw," said the rabbi, who arrived in Poland in June.

The World Prayer for Peace was

designed to foster understanding among religions. Polish-born Pope John Paul II is to give an address via a giant TV screen in Warsaw's

Royal Castle Square on Friday, the anniversary of the German invasion of Poland that started the war.

"This is a moment for peace and reconciliation, a meeting of international friendship ... a day of peace, brotherhood of all the world's religions," said Roman Catholic Monsignor Pietro Rossano, rector of the Pontifical Lateran University in Rome.

But Jewish-Catholic relations have been strained by the decision by the archbishop of Krakow to abandon a 1987 accord to move the Carmelite convent from the perimeter of Auschwitz, and by a speech by Cardinal Jozef Glemp.

International Jewish leaders were invited to the event but said they could not come, said Mario Maraziti, a prayer day organizer.

Maraziti said the convent controversy "may be one of the reasons but not the only reason" for the lack of greater Jewish participation.

There are no Jews on the list of religious representatives for the event.

Maraziti said three representatives of the Jewish community were attending the conference but they were academic rather than religious leaders.

Jacob Neusner of the Institute for Advanced Study at Princeton University called the convent dispute a "heartbreaking conflict."

Joskowicz said he would instead lead services Saturday at Warsaw's only synagogue in memory of the 5,000 Jews who died fighting with the Polish army during the war. Events also are scheduled at the monument to the Warsaw Ghetto uprising and at the Jewish cemetery, large sections of which have become overgrown.

Organizers of the peace prayer scheduled a trip to the international monument at Birkenau, the main extermination camp for Jews in the Auschwitz complex.

Moldvianians protest language compromise

MOSCOW (AP) — Thousands of people in the republic of Moldavia surged into the streets of its capital Thursday night to protest a legislative compromise that will keep the Russian language a part of their everyday life, activists said.

Members of the "southern republic's" legislature voted to substitute Moldavian — similar to Romanian — for Russian as the language of government and economic affairs. But they ruled that both Russian and Moldavian could be used in everyday life.

"The people are scandalized. We need only one language," said Vasily Nestse of the pro-Moldavian People's Front, speaking by telephone from Kishinev, the capital.

Nestse estimated tens of thousands of people took to the streets outside the theater where the

deputies had met, and he played tape recording of the shouting masses. He said hundreds of police armed with clubs had formed a cordon around the building.

"If this decision is not reversed, we will start a general strike," he said.

The next step, he said, is secession from the Soviet Union.

"We are not a legal part of the Soviet Union," he said, pointing to the Soviet annexation of Moldavia from neighboring Romania in 1940 under the terms of the Nazi-Soviet non-aggression pact, which also put the Baltic states under Soviet control.

The legislators had been seeking a compromise that would placate both Moldavian nationalists and Russian immigrants. The Moldvianians are trying to shed what they see as decades of infringement on their

rights. The Russians feared they would be forced to learn Moldavian and went on strike at 200 enterprises in protest.

Representatives of both the Moldvian People's Front and the pro-Russian group Yedinstvo said Wednesday they saw support for the compromise.

The choice of language is an important issue for Soviets because many believe they were forced to adopt Russian even though their native tongues are vastly different and represent their distinct cultural heritage.

The legislature, or Supreme Soviet, gave the nationalists a zebra-cut victory in two of its three decisions Thursday.

It declared Moldavian the state language, to be used in "political, economic, social and cultural

Palace says royal couple to separate

LONDON (AP) — Princess Anne and Mark Phillips, the royal couple rarely seen together, on Thursday admitted the open secret of their life apart with a palace statement that they are separating, although they have no plans to divorce.

The announcement ended rumors of strife that have dogged Queen Elizabeth II's only daughter and her commoner husband for more than half their 15-year marriage.

It was the second time this century that a marriage in the immediate royal family has broken down. The queen's sister, Princess Margaret, separated from Lord Snowdon in 1976 and they divorced two years later.

"Her Royal Highness, the Princess Royal, and Capt. Mark Phillips have decided to separate on terms agreed between them," said the short palace statement.

If they want to file for divorce, British law requires them to live apart for two years.

Anne will live at the family estate Gatcombe Park in western England with their two children — Peter, 11, and Zara, 8 — while Phillips will move to a home nearby, the palace said.

Mark's father, Maj. Peter Phillips, said that his son will move to Aston Farm on the estate.

The decision to split up was "taken in principle earlier this year," added a palace spokeswoman. The queen, was saddened but understanding.







On-site disposal planned

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Toseco Army Depot's aging stockpile of nerve and mustard agents, 42 percent of the nation's chemical arsenal, will be destroyed on-site in a new \$138 million incineration plant, the Pentagon said Thursday.

In a report to Congress, the Office of the Secretary of the Army said none of the chemical munitions at the remote western Utah desert installation would be transported elsewhere for destruction.

While the decision did not address other sites where chemical weaponry is stored, it was considered a victory for those arguing in favor of on-site disposal at Topele, located 35 miles southwest of Salt Lake City, and seven other U.S. bases.

The Army has considered disposing of the weapons at regional facilities, or one national site — options which would have required potentially risky transport by air, rail, truck and barge.

Cindy Vaughn, spokeswoman for Aberdeen, Md., Proving Ground, the program manager for the Army's chemical demilitarization effort, said similar announcements are expected for the other sites where chemical weapons are stored, once environmental studies are completed.

The Army's decision followed recommendations contained in an environmental impact statement released in July.

The new plant will employ a construction work force of about 350, and once operational in December 1992, will have 400 employees.

Vaughn said site-specific EIS studies, such as the one conducted at Topele, also are planned for Aberdeen; Aniston Army Depot, Ala.; Lexington-Blue Grass Army Depot, Ky.; Newport Army Ammunition Plant, Ind.; Pine Bluff Arsenal, Ark.; Pueblo Depot Activity, Colo., and Umatilla Depot Activity, Ore.

Sheriff acted within the law, authorities say

OLYMPIA, Wash. (AP)

Thurston County Sheriff Gary Edwards acted within the law when he shot and killed an Idaho fugitive following a high-speed chase, Lewis County authorities said.

Edwards shot Robert Ray Brown, 35, on July 27 after a car chase that ended in rural Lewis County.

Lewis County Prosecutor Jim Miller said he reviewed the investigation conducted by the State Patrol and Lewis County sheriff's deputies and determined that Edwards was justified in shooting Brown.

The chase began when Edwards noticed Brown driving erratically. Brown jumped Edwards after the cars were stopped, and took a rifle from the sheriff. Edwards shot Brown with his service revolver.

Two rifles and two handguns were found in Brown's car after the shooting. It was determined Brown was wanted in Idaho and also faced a drug charge in Thurston County.

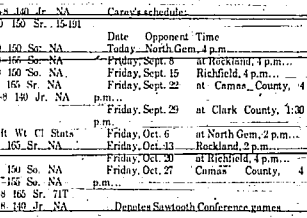

TF rolls over Jerome, 43-6

TWIN FALLS — It was simply a matter of give and take. Jerome's defense had to try to stop the three-back offense of Twin Falls and tried to keep the middle plugged. It was largely successful.

But that meant it had to give senior quarterback John Horner and his receiver corps some daylight and they had a field day that carried the Bruins to a 43-6 decision over the Tigers.

The victory, Twin Falls' first in three years in this series, was pretty much sapped up when the Bruin defense showed its dominance in the opening quarter when a couple of Jerome miscues helped Twin Falls into a 15-0 lead. Horner threw for three touchdowns in the second quarter to raise it to 36-0 in intermission.

In all, the senior quarterback had five touchdown passes in a 59-16 effort and had 130 yards in scoring passes alone.

"We knew that Jerome had a strong defense but we felt they'd be concentrating on the run because we feel that's our forte," said winning Coach Jon Jund. "We were able to spread them pretty thin and then throw to the open spots."

Jerome Coach Greg Trenary said he became increasingly pleased with his defense as the game wore on.

"We were just trying to play defense," he said of the run vs. pass options. "You have to do them both. It's just a case of experience. It takes time to grow up and some of these young men took a little longer. But I saw some things we can get honed down and I think we're going to be pretty tough."

Jerome's woes started early when a pair of penalties and loss of three yards pinned it back in a second-23 position on its own five yard line on its first possession.

Twin Falls' Devon Olson broke through to down Jerome quarterback Shane Burton in the end zone for a safety. And Twin Falls immediately marched 49 yards with the ensuing kickoff to start the scoring.

Alan Heck ran for 26 yards in four carries and Jerome contributed a penalty before Horner got his first scoring pass off to tight end Casey Teske, nine-yarder. The conversion attempt was muffed by the holder.

On its next possession, Jerome fumbled the ball away at its own 13-yard line and Twin Falls scored five plays later on a four-yard burst from Heck. Dave McClusky hit the first of five conversions.

Jerome broke the shutout early in the second quarter largely on a pair of passes by Burton. The first was a 30-yarder to Gary Showers and then five plays into the second period, he teamed with Eric Lett for 21 yards and the touchdown. The Tigers ran out of kick formation but were held by the Bruins.

Twin Falls was red-hot offensively in the second quarter, putting the ball into play just 11 times and scoring three touchdowns. The first was a 43-yard bomb to running back Forrest Ward, who took

a little 10-yarder, juked past two. Tigera and turned it into the homerun.

Owners must pay players \$10 million in conspiracy

NEW YORK — Baseball owners must pay players \$10,528,066.71 as compensation for the conspiracy against free agents between the 1985 and 1986 seasons, an arbitrator ruled Thursday.

Thomas Roberts, who heard the Collusion I case, issued a 30-page decision by overnight mail to the Major League Baseball Players Association and the owners' Player Relations Committee.

The Collusion I case, filed Jan. 31, 1986, affected 139 players. The case centered on Kirk Gibson, Donnie Moore, Carlton Fisk, Phil and Joe Niekro, David Palmer, Tim Lincecum and Don Sutton. Roberts, in an opinion issued Sept. 21, 1987, found that teams did not sign

free agents "through the conduct ... uniformly established and maintained."

"The right of the clubs to participate in the free agency provisions of the Basic Agreement was not to be determined solely for the benefit of each club," Roberts wrote in 1987.

The union had argued two methods for determining the damages against free agents in the conspiracy. Under one method of calculation, the union said players lost between \$15 million and \$20 million; under the other, the union claimed players lost between \$23 million and \$25.5 million.

Owners said that under the first method of calculation, players lost no more than \$2 million. Using the second method, the owners said players lost between \$2.2 million and \$4.4 million.

Notre Dame whips Cavs 36-13 in Kickoff Classic

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. — Yes, Virginia, Lou Holtz must have been kidding.

After losing seven top players before the season started, the Notre Dame coach said his defending national champions were not a Top 20 team. But the second-ranked Fighting Irish sure looked like one Thursday night as they routed Virginia 36-13 in the Kickoff Classic.

Tony Rice guided the Fighting Irish to touchdowns on their first five possessions and they coasted the rest of the way against a

team that is expected to contend for the Atlantic Coast Conference title.

"I don't know if we could have played better than we did in the first 25 minutes," Holtz said.

Virginia coach George Welsh, who team finished last season with five consecutive victories, also was impressed with Notre Dame. "They're very good, but I'm not sure we're as bad as we looked in the first half," he said. "We got dominated and I think it could have been a lot worse."

The game was all but over at halftime after Notre Dame raced to a 33-0 lead before a sell-out crowd of 77,323 at Giants Stadium.

For the second time the Spartan return specialist failed to hang onto the ball and when Travis Winslow recovered the fumble it was all over.

will bring more of the scenes that have become so familiar in the 1980s — wrangling between the administration and the lawmakers, late-night maneuvering and some sort of last-minute compromise that will keep the government lurching along.

Lots of people will pay no attention, and why should they? The debate over the deficit has been going on since the Nixon administration at least, and the situation never seems to change much.

Since early June, the central bank has reversed course, allowing rates to decline slightly, but MacReynolds noted, "They've only backed off part way."

Based on their statements, I don't expect them to ease further and unfortunately that could be a disaster for the economy," he said.

If weakness in manufacturing persists, it will lead to layoffs and a rise in the unemployment rate, he warned.

In two other signs of sluggishness, shipments of manufactured goods fell 1.9 percent, the sharpest drop since March 1988, and inventories shot up 1.1 percent, the biggest jump in five years.

A ramp-up in inventories without a corresponding increase in new orders can signal production cutbacks in the future as factories attempt to get rid of goods on shelves and backlogs.

The economists predicted that manufacturing will remain sluggish this year. The rise in the value of the dollar since late 1988 will take the edge off booming export sales, they said, and businesses, in turn, will purchase fewer capital goods, such as machinery and computers.

In July, orders for durable goods — items expected to last three or more years, fell 2.9 percent, a revision from last week's estimate of a 1.9 percent decline. Orders for nondurable goods fell 1.1 percent — in the key category of non-defense capital goods, a barometer of business investment plans, orders rose 6.7 percent in July.

Besides, whatever is done this fall, the underlying problem won't go away. "Any budget pain encountered in getting under the Gramm-Rudman ceiling for 1990 will be dwarfed by the agony coming down the track for 1991," observes the United & Babson Investment Report, a Boston-based newsletter.

In that fiscal year, Gramm-Rudman calls for a deficit of \$65 billion.

Some people trace the origins of the much-bewailed "breakdown of the budget process" to the mid-1960s, when the nation was faced with a choice of how to spend its large, but still finite, resources.

Should it build up its expensive role in the Vietnam war, or should it embark on a sweeping campaign to deal with domestic problems? Guns AND butter, decided President Lyndon Johnson.

The deficit widened with the recessions and oil crises of the 1970s, and got still worse during the "Reagan revolution" of the '80s.

Along the way, Americans have taken part in a long experiment determining what happens to their economy in a period of chronic deficits.

It turns out that policy measures taken in response to a deficit can cause severe economic slumps, runaway booms, or long periods of mere muddling through. They can foster rising inflation or declining inflation, higher interest rates or lower interest rates. In short, over the decades of the post two decades, the nation has witnessed just about every conceivable economic environment — except for the kind of calamity so many analysts have predicted.

Federal investigators still mulling cause of fatal helicopter crash

SPOKANE, Wash. (AP) — The possibility that a gunshot victim caused the in-flight destruction of a medical helicopter evacuating him from north Idaho to a Spokane hospital still has not been ruled out, federal investigators say.

Investigators from the National Transportation Safety Board and the Federal Aviation Administration continued Thursday to piece together clues to Sunday night's destruction of the aircraft over the remote mountains of north Idaho.

Arnold Scott, a Denver-based aerospace engineer for the NTSB, and the lead investigator in the case, said Thursday there are "no conclusions yet." He said all essential pieces of the wreckage, including a third rotor blade, had been recovered and assembled at a Spokane hangar.

"We basically are not looking any more at weather involvement and we're not looking at any more stories of the second aircraft" being involved in the crash, Scott said.

Investigators are still considering two theories: the possibility of foul play involving the prisoner or mechanical failure, Scott said.

There was no other craft in the area when the helicopter broke apart and fell from the sky, killing its crew of three and a sedated Canadian fugitive who had been shot in the chest hours earlier.

Scott said it's possible the main rotor blade severed the aircraft's tail section as has happened in other helicopter accidents. "But that's a secondary failure, and we're looking for the cause of the primary failure," he said.

On Wednesday, Scott said a scenario of patient Robert L. Adams disrupting the flight was unlikely because he was handcuffed and strapped to a stretcher when he was loaded onto the aircraft for a trip to Sacred Heart Medical Center in Spokane.

Adams, who fled into north Idaho earlier Sunday night after overpowering a U.S. Customs agent near the Canadian border, was seriously wounded when he burst into a home near Eastport, Idaho, and traded gunshots with resident Bob McGlocklin.

Also killed in the crash were pilot Pat Varea, nurse Lyn Gould and respiratory therapist Robert Siekerman, all of Spokane. Nearly 1,000 people, many of them Sacred Heart employees, attended a Wednesday memorial service at the hospital for the trio.

A joint memorial service was scheduled Friday at a Spokane church.

Craig calls for study of alternatives to local bombing range expansion

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Larry Craig, R-Idaho, has asked Interior Secretary Manuel Lujan to examine alternatives to the Air Force's proposed expansion of the Saylor Creek Bombing Range in southern Idaho.

In a letter to Lujan this week, Craig asked that the Bureau of Land Management be directed to study the proposal and alternatives "that will allow the Air Force to expand its new mission at Mountain Home (Air Force Base) while minimizing its impact on historic uses of public

lands in southwestern Idaho." The congressman said the study should take the form of an environmental assessment aimed at preserving existing public uses such as grazing and recreation.

"While I feel strongly that we must maintain a healthy national defense," Craig wrote Lujan, "I feel just as strongly that we cannot ignore traditional uses of public lands over vast acreages."

The Air Force wants to expand the bombing range to about 1.4 million acres, or about 10 times its current

size. A number of ranchers and other land users have objected to the plan. But Craig said a misunderstanding appears to have developed because of the Air Force's schedule of public "scoping" meetings, set for next week across southern Idaho.

"Some people seem to be concerned that this will be their only opportunity to make their opinions known about the project," he said. "In reality, this is the first step in a long process with many opportunities for public input."

Suspect faces robbery charge Zoo fires worker

WICHITA, Kan. (AP) — A 44-year-old prison parolee wanted in connection with a multi-state crime spree was charged with a Wichita bank robbery Thursday.

Federal authorities announced they charged William M. Severe, 41, of Evansville, Ind. with the Aug. 12 robbery of a Bank IV branch in southeast Wichita. About \$3,100 was taken. Severe still is at large.

U.S. Attorney Ben Burgess said Severe also is a suspect in shoe store robberies in Oregon, Idaho, Nevada and Colorado.

Three months ago, Severe was paroled from a Florida prison after serving part of a term for robbery.

according to Dan Jablonski, an FBI special agent in Wichita. Jablonski said Severe is believed to be driving a 1989 customized van stolen in Evansville. The van was used in the June 30 robbery of an Everett, Wash. bank, the agent said. Severe also is charged in that case. He is charged with kidnaping and attempted murder in Nevada in connection with the abduction of a woman near Lake Tahoe. Jablonski said the woman was bound with duct tape, rolled up in a blanket and dumped down a roadside embankment. A sawed-off shotgun was fired at her, but the blast missed, he said.

"He saw his dad coming to get him, saying 'your time is over,'" he said. "He believed it."

In the early evening he and Mary had been talking on the porch. He walked out to change the water in the garden behind their modest one-story house. He returned to the porch and rested his hands on a doorway, facing away from his wife. Then he turned around.

"He looked funny - like his face had changed," she said. "His facial features and everything - I didn't even recognize him any more."

He screamed and grabbed her. A neighbor called the sheriff's department at 6:50 p.m. Two deputies met her in the front yard. He was still behind the house.

Deputy Les Nye walked to the backyard of Gonzalez's house. A calm Gonzalez told Nye he hadn't argued with his wife.

Gonzalez led Nye through his house, opening doors and calling "mom," looking for his wife.

"He opened another door that I assumed was a bathroom," Nye said. "He turned back toward me and he had a gun - a long gun."

"He turned and raised the barrel with one hand."

Nye and Deputy Bret Wood escaped to their patrol cars, parked on Seventh Street by the house. Later, the officers split up, but Patrolman Harry Thompson was

pinned down by Gonzalez's gunfire at the same spot.

Several officers fired more than 10 shots as cover fire as Thompson escaped.

"Within minutes, several officers had surrounded the house and neighbors crunched in the far ends of their homes. Patrolman Tony Chupa could see Gonzalez step out of his garage, located behind the house. Blood covered his head and shoulders."

"That's when Gonzalez laid his rifle down," Thomas sprinted toward Gonzalez.

"We took it as an indication he was going to give up," Thomas said. But when Thomas saw Gonzalez, he had the rifle in his arms.

Deputies yelled at Gonzalez to put the rifle down. Another shouted "watch out, watch out, watch out" over the police radio.

Thomas started backing up. Gonzalez saw him.

"His rifle came to sights," Thomas said.

No one is sure what happened next.

Chupa, across the street, heard several shots. "Then I fired one round," he said. "Almost instantaneously, he fell down."

State Police Patrolman Steve Hobbs was halfway down the block on Seventh Street. He remembers

four to five shots.

"After the last shot, I fired one more time and he fell," Hobbs said. "Thomas fired three times. Gonzalez was dead when Thomas reached him."

Mary Gonzalez, who watched the hearing alone in the front row, talking during breaks to Prosecutor Stephen Bywater and Sheriff Billy Crystal, said she doesn't understand her husband's death.

"Right now I am bitter and that is all I can tell you," she said on the stand.

Crystal said he was relieved at the verdict.

"Something like this is always stressful," he said. "They (the deputies) initially got over it, then they got through it again is rough."

"We're trying to put it behind us, Spencer said. "It's too bad it had to end in the life of a human life."

Board seeks more details on Andrews' bid for second hearing

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — The Utah Board of Pardons, which denied William Andrews' plea to commute his death sentence for the 1974 "Hi-Fi" murders on Thursday, issued a mixed order on his bid for an unprecedented second hearing.

The board rejected two of the five arguments Andrews made in his petition of Monday, but said he could submit more detailed arguments on three points the board deemed "insufficiently specific," said Board Administrator Paul Sheffield.

Andrews, at nearly 15 years the nation's longest-standing "death row inmate," had faced execution by lethal injection on Aug. 22

at Utah State Prison for the killings of three people at Ogden's Hi-Fi Shop.

During a robbery, five people were forced to drink liquid drain cleaner and all were shot, but two men survived. Andrews' co-defendant and admitted triggerman, Pierre Dale Selby, was executed in 1987 after the board refused to commute his sentence to life in prison.

Andrews' commutation hearing was held Aug. 10-11, and the board announced its 2-1 vote to deny commutation on Aug. 18, but the 10th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals issued a stay based on Andrews' federal appeals the following day.

In its order Thursday, the three-member board dismissed Andrews' contentions that the hearing was improperly conducted while judicial appeals were pending and that his attorneys didn't have enough time to prepare and present his case.

"The board employed its authority to interpret the rules to allow the commutation matter to proceed simultaneously with intervening proceedings," the order said.

On the latter point, the board said it had exercised its inherent power to conduct a fair and impartial proceeding, noting the defense and prosecutor both had five hours to present their arguments and witnesses.

The board, however, said Andrews' attorneys could submit an amended petition by Sept. 15 to clarify the three claims it found "insufficiently specific" to allow a ruling. The state has until Sept. 22 to reply.

In those points, Andrews argued the board denied him due process by refusing to allow his attorneys to review information used to consider the case.

During the hearing, the board said a psychological profile of Andrews prepared the week before at the board's behest would not be given to defense attorneys or prosecutors.

Andrews also claimed the introduction of a partial transcript of an interview with a

prison social worker constituted forced testimony against himself, and that the board heard inaccurate information from witnesses.

Meanwhile, attorneys on both sides are to submit briefs Friday on Andrews' supplemental writ of habeas corpus, which is being considered by a federal magistrate who will make a recommendation to the U.S. District judge presiding over the case.

Andrews' original and supplemental writs then will be heard by the 10th Circuit Court in Denver, which has said it would expedite hearings once all the issues have been dispatched in federal court here.

Prehistoric blades give clues about migration

PULLMAN, Wash. (AP) — Prehistoric, ultra-sharp "microblades" that rival some of the most modern-day cutting tools provide a glimpse of the lifestyle of primitive people who wandered from Asia to the Pacific Northwest some 50,000 years ago, says a Washington State University archaeologist.

"This is the sharpest thing there is," said Robert E. Ackerman, as he looked over drawers of blades chipped from blocks or "cores" of obsidian, a hard, volcanic glass, and chert, a fine-grained, tough rock.

"This is sharper than any surgeon's instrument. In fact, it is now being used in some eye surgery."

The abundance of microblades and their cores found across the Soviet Union and into Alaska provide some solid clues for scientists studying how primitive people wandered from Asia to the Pacific Northwest, Ackerman said.

These microblade notes are very distinctive, like pottery, and thus help identify the cultures of the people who made them and the times in which they lived, he said.

Earlier this summer, Ackerman has a chance to share what he has learned from microblades and other stone artifacts with scores of other researchers from around the world at the Circum-Pacific Prehistory

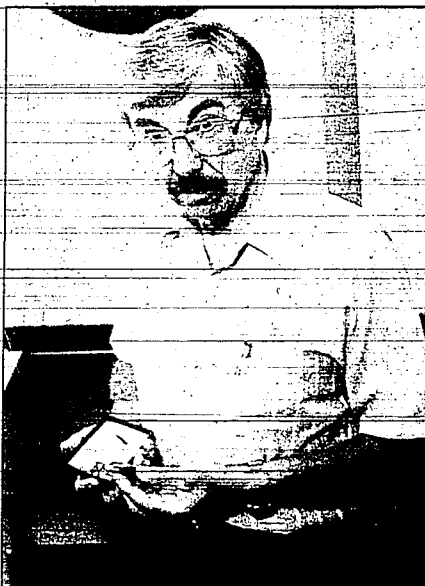
Conference in Seattle. The conference is one of the most comprehensive anthropological forums ever held in the state.

Ackerman and a Soviet researcher, Anatoly Derevianko, shared their perspectives on the land bridge that once connected Asia and North America at what is now the Bering Strait.

While a number of theories support the creation of the land bridge as the Ice Age lowered the level of the oceans, the trail of blades across the Soviet Union and into Alaska show a clear migration of people from 30,000 years ago to 12,000 years ago, Ackerman says.

Microblades were made by chipping flint from the edge of a core with a pointed instrument or hammer. Set inside a grooved bone or stick, the blade could easily penetrate an animal's skin and slice through internal organs and blood vessels as the animal moved.

Many of the blades were made of obsidian, a fine-grained volcanic mineral available throughout the Pacific rim's "ring of fire." And because the blades will not decompose, they have left researchers with a unique timeline showing how and when people crossed from one side of the land

Organization will offer on-site abortion services

SPokane (AP) — The scarce availability and high cost of abortions led to Planned Parenthood's decision to offer on-site abortion services at a clinic here, officials said Thursday.

The unanimous decision by the Planned Parenthood of Spokane and Whitman Counties board of directors was made after a year-long study indicated a need for additional abortion services in the area, said Joyce Cameron, director of community relations.

Abortions in the first trimester of pregnancy will be offered at an as-yet-undetermined site beginning in mid-summer 1990.

"We feel very strongly about the importance of our decision to meet the need for safe and legal abortions for some of our patients who depend on us for their medical care," said Dan J. Cadagan III, board president. "Our primary concern is to provide those patients with continuity of

care."

Anti-abortion protesters in recent years have targeted two Spokane medical centers where elective abortions are performed. Those demonstrations were not a factor in the board's decision to offer abortion services, although security needs were discussed with Spokane police, Ms. Cameron said.

"We've been in contact with the Spokane police for a long time because we have always been a possible target," she said. "The police have always responded and monitored our clinic when (anti-abortion groups) are staging an action. We will continue to have that relationship."

Pressure by anti-abortion groups and high medical malpractice insurance costs have caused some physicians to discontinue abortion services, decreasing the pool of providers, Cadagan said.

Toy company commends 12-year-old for heroism

SANDY, Utah (AP) — A 12-year-old Sandy Boy Scout who saved his 3-year-old cousin from the rushing, icy waters of southern Idaho's Worm Creek last Easter has been chosen Utah's recipient of the "GI Joe Search for Real American Heroes."

The award, presented by the Hasbro toy company, recognizes Jeffrey Anderson's heroism in rescuing his cousin, Cody Owen, from drowning after he slipped into the creek.

Because the steep embankment and deep water left him no place to jump in after the screaming, 12-year-

old boy required treatment for hypothermia, but otherwise was uninjured.

As part of his award, Anderson will receive an official GI Joe Medal of Commendation from Hasbro next month, officials of the Pawtucket, R.I., company said.

"Our brightest hopes for the future can be found in outstanding young people like Jeffrey," said Hasbro President Larry Bernstein. "The GI Joe Search for Real American Heroes" confirms that children today are bright, concerned and interested in making valuable contributions to

their communities. Hasbro is proud to recognize and honor this heroic child."

As a state award recipient, Anderson is eligible to become one of the Hasbro program's 10 national award recipients, who will be selected next month. National award recipients will receive a three-day trip to Washington, where they will be honored at an awards ceremony attended by government dignitaries.

Anderson was recommended for the national honor by Sen. Orrin G. Hatch, R-Utah.

Police seek 2 who may have seen slaying

SALEM, Ore. (AP) — Oregon State Police on Thursday released composite drawings of what they said could be two possible witnesses in the January slaying of state corrections chief Michael Francke.

The drawings, distributed at a news conference in Indianapolis, are in addition to an artist's drawing released earlier of a man seen in the corrections office building about a half hour before Francke was killed.

That drawing has been publicly circulated for several months.

Maj. Dean Renfrow, head of the state police criminal investigation unit, said none of the three men depicted in the drawings is a suspect in the murder.

Renfrow says they are drawings of people seen in the area whose identities investigators haven't been able to determine.

Mormons watching Colombian situation

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Mormon Church leaders say they are carefully evaluating developments in the troubled South American country of Colombia, but they have no plans to recall their 300 missionaries.

Bruce Olsen, managing director of public communications for the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, said Thursday that the South American North Area presidency has traveled to Colombia and is monitoring conditions together with the three mission presidents.

Coeur d'Alene teachers reject offer, vote to strike next week

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — Teachers rejected the Coeur d'Alene School Board's latest contract offer on Thursday and voted overwhelmingly to strike when school starts next week unless the district comes up with more money for salary and benefits.

"We hope the board now understands the seriousness of this crisis," teacher association president Bridget Hill said after 270 of the district's 312 teachers agreed to walk out next Tuesday.

"We are firm and united," Hill said. "The strike vote came after the school board came up with a substantially short teacher demand in its late Wednesday night offer. Ms. Hill said the proposal called for only half the money sought for premiums on extra-curricular duties, a third of the demand in benefits and a quarter of the increase in beginning salary."

She said the teachers were ready to renegotiate contract talks at any time but no new bargaining session had been set.

"The funds are available in the current budget to reach an agreement," she said. "We believe that this community respects its teachers and wants the board to make this a priority. The money is there. Now is the time for the board to offer the teachers what is both available and necessary for a settle-

ment."

Calling strikes illegal, Superintendent Merlin Ludwig said the district has the option of seeking a court injunction ordering teachers back to work, and state Schools Superintendent Jerry Evans backed up that assessment.

"Teachers do not have the legal right to strike," Evans said, although he admitted Idaho's district court judges have been reluc-

tant to order teachers back to work.

District attorney Charles Dodson maintained the teachers had already accepted contracts for the 1988-1990 school year when they signed "intent-to-return-to-work" statements last spring.

He also cited a state Supreme Court decision holding teacher contracts as binding even if the terms of those pacts have not been settled.

High court releases last decision Shepard wrote

BOISE (AP) — There is no rational reason for a state law to treat certain types of commissioned salesmen differently than other salesmen doing essentially the same thing, the Idaho Supreme Court says.

The court in the last decision written by the late Allan Shepard, on Thursday ruled unconstitutional a state law requiring employers of certain types of salesmen to be covered under state unemployment compensation statutes.

It was a 3-2 decision, with two dissenting justices holding that the Industrial Commission and Supreme Court shouldn't try to second-guess the Legislature whether it had a rational reason for making a distinction between certain types of salesmen.

Shepard, who served on the Idaho Supreme Court for more than 20 years, died of a heart attack May 27, Thursday prior to that. Ironically, on

the same day as his last decision was issued, Shepard's successor, was seated on the five-member court.

Boise attorney Charles McDevitt succeeded Shepard in a term that runs through 1992.

The Industrial Commission ruled that certain independent contractors of Bon Appetit Gourmet Foods, Inc., under a state law must be considered "covered employees" and the company had to pay unemployment taxes on them.

The ruling was based on a state law singling out agent drivers or commission drivers engaged in distributing meat, vegetable, fruit or bakery products, beverages or laundry or dry cleaning services.

Bon Appetit was described as a gourmet food business, which con-

tracts with independent agents to market products on a door-to-door basis.

The company contended the state law was unconstitutional on its face, because of the equal protection clause of the U.S. Constitution. The Supreme Court majority agreed.

"We are cited to and find no legislative statement of policy or public purpose for this particular classification," the court said.

Supporting Shepard in his last decision were justices Stephen Distline and Byron Johnson.

Dissenting were Chief Justice Robert Bakes and Robert Huntley, who retired from the court earlier this month.

Bank bad faith case goes to trial Oct. 11

REXBURG (AP) — Six weeks from trial, attorneys for David Steed and Associates and West One Bank said are wrangling over what can be introduced as evidence in a multi-million dollar series of lawsuits.

Six attorneys presented arguments Wednesday in 7th District Court.

Judge Grant Young said he would try to issue a written ruling on all of the motions in 10 days, and gave attorneys until Sept. 17 to finish the discovery process.

Nothing is going to prevent the

case from going to trial Oct. 11 as scheduled, Young said.

Steed and his partners, Clarence and Del Ray Holm of Idaho Falls, contend that West One, formerly Idaho First National Bank, acted in bad faith.

The bank filed suit against Steed and Associates in February 1987, alleging that the business defaulted on more than \$1 million in loans and seeking foreclosure.

Steed countersued, charging breach of contract, fraud and deceit by fiduciaries, constructive fraud and bad faith.

Kamiah merchants end cooperation with panel

KAMIAH (AP) — The Kamiah Chamber of Commerce has informed the Idaho Legislature's Indian Affairs Committee that it no longer will cooperate with an investigation of claims that Indian businesses receive a tax advantage because of state tax exemptions.

In a letter to the legislative panel this week, Kamiah merchants also said they would not submit additional business and employment records sought by lawmakers in an attempt to verify the claims.

Local business leaders have complained that a Kamiah store run by the Nez Perce Indian Tribes poses unfair competition because it is exempt from the state's 5-percent sales tax, or an 18-cent-per-pack tax on cigarettes.

"We don't feel the Indian Affairs Committee would vote to support legislation to lift tribal tax exemptions even if we could prove that all businesses in Kamiah would be out of business in five years," James Emmert, chairman of the chamber's Equal Rights Committee, said Wednesday.

But state Rep. Ray Infanger, R-Salmon, co-chairman of the Indian Affairs Committee, said he plans to ask Kamiah merchants and tribal representatives to continue working with his panel.

"It sounds like they are just like I've been several times in my life when I've gotten on my high horse," Infanger said. "If people are nice to me, I'll come off of it. That's the challenge of this assignment."

The Alliance of Idaho Tribes also asked the Indian Affairs Committee this week to put its efforts to resolve the controversy on a back burner, saying they were interfering with work on more pressing tribal issues.

Besides the tax exemption question, the legislative committee also

wanted the Kamiah business records to help verify a Nez Perce claim that the tribal store was started because Indians could not find employment at other local retail establishments.

The letter to lawmakers from the Kamiah Chamber of Commerce suggests that local businessmen provided much of the sales information when they appeared before the Indian Affairs Committee in Boise last year.

They also submitted some information during the 1989 Legislature when a measure that would have repealed the tax exemptions was being considered. That bill eventually died in the House.

"In regard to your request for employment information in the letter states, 'we find that business people are willing to hire Indian applicants. Numerous persons of Indian ethnicity are employed by Kamiah merchants.'"

The letter concludes by noting the potential for lawmakers to either subpoena the business records or obtain them from the Idaho Tax Commission.

After further consideration of the Indian Affairs Committee's request to subpoena Kamiah merchants' sales records, we feel it is not productive for us to meet with the IAC in the future," said the letter, signed by Emmert and Kamiah Chamber of Commerce President Greg Johnson.

They said Wednesday that merchants worked out their response to the committee's request during the past month.

"We've tried to be as articulate and as clear as possible in keeping this an economic issue," Johnson said.

"I just don't know that they're hearing what we've got to say. I feel they have their mind pretty well made up already."

Overconfidence, disregard blamed in fatal plane crash

ST. ANTHONY (AP) — Overconfidence in personal ability and disregard for a preflight briefing were apparently responsible for a fatal light plane crash 19 months ago in eastern Idaho, the National Transportation Safety Board said.

The NTSB's recently completed report on the Jan. 22, 1988, crash near St. Anthony said the plane's owner apparently overruled the other two Canadians aboard in deciding to take the most direct route from Great Falls, Mont., to Pocatello despite warnings that the weather was not favorable.

The single-engine aircraft, destined for Las Vegas, went down in a potato field west of St. Anthony in inclement weather, killing owner Phillip Miller along with Dale Ingelthron and Darwin Leimister. All three were from Medicine Hat, Alberta.

According to a statement given board investigators by Great Falls air traffic controller Frank Quint,

the three were told the direct route to Pocatello over eastern Idaho was not recommended that day and an alternate route through Wyoming should be used.

But Quint said Miller felt the alternative route was too far out of the way and while Leimister grimaced he reluctantly filed the flight plan via the direct route.

Quint said that just before the three took off he told Leimister, who appeared to be apprehensive about the decision along with Ingelthron, that if the weather began closing in he should "make a 180 and get out of there."

"My final statement was received with a nervous smile, a nod of the head and a barely audible, 'We will,'" Quint told investigators.

Crash witness Michael Hathaway of Hamer told the board that he saw a whirlwind at about the same time the plane went down and again later when a helicopter landed at the crash site.

Boise redevelopment wins award BOISE (AP) — Boise has won a prestigious national award for its downtown redevelopment work.

Mayor-Dirk Hemphre and Capital City Development Corp. Chairman Ron Kemler announced Wednesday that Boise has been awarded the James C. Howland Urban Enrichment Award by the National League of Cities.

The awards were given for four size categories. Los Angeles won the half-million population and above; Syracuse, N.Y., won for 100,000 to 500,000 population; Boise, won for 50,000 to 100,000; and Anniston, Ala., won for cities of fewer than 50,000 residents.

The award means national recognition, a plaque and \$1,000 to donate to a non-profit community organization.

Ada County plans courthouse bond

BOISE (AP) — Ada County plans to ask voters to approve a \$26 million bond issue for a new courthouse, expanded jail and work-release center.

County officials have not decided whether a new courthouse would go or what would be done with the current one. But Commission Chairman Vern Bisterfield said Wednesday that he hoped the state would by the aging building for office space across 6th Street from the Statehouse.

Bisterfield said no decision has been made on how many years the bonds would take to be paid off, but there also is no indication how much the bonds would cost the average taxpayer on property-tax bills.

Ex-campaign manager sues Leroy

BOISE (AP) — Former Republican attorney general and lieutenant governor David Leroy is being sued by his ex-campaign manager for unpaid fees stemming from an unsuccessful 1986 bid for governor.

Leroy, who lost to Democrat Gov. Cecil Andrus by just 3,665 votes, acknowledged his lingering campaign debt Wednesday and rehewed pledges to pay off his creditors.

But unwilling to wait any longer, Helen Chenoweth and Boise-based Consulting Associates have lodged a civil complaint against Leroy in 4th District Court.

Vern Ravenscroft, president of Consulting Associates, said the contract was with the company and he and Chenoweth were advised they had to file legal action by the end of August because of the statute of limitations.

Leroy said his "campaign debt," not including what "he owes Chenoweth, stands at roughly \$30,000. He declined to provide a total figure or to discuss the suit.

Malpractice suit targets magistrate

WALLACE (AP) — A Coeur d'Alene magistrate has found himself on the other side of the bench in a legal malpractice lawsuit, being heard in 1st District Court.

The complaint alleges that Magistrate Eugene Marano, when he was a practicing attorney in Coeur d'Alene, made a mistake that resulted in financial loss on the part of Coeur d'Alene resident John Marinas.

Bill Boyd, the Kellogg attorney representing Marinas, said Marano allegedly failed to file a financing statement with the secretary of state's office at the time he drew up a contract for Marinas to sell his interest in the Frontier Shakes business to a partner in November 1983.

The failure eventually led to Marinas' inability to collect money or repossess property of equal value when his former partner, Rick Schroeder, declared bankruptcy in December 1987, Boyd said.

The suit seeks damages equal to the unpaid balance on the \$10,000 debt, plus interest.

Brando claims he's done with movies



Marlon Brando says he's totally disenchanted with movies

TORONTO (AP) — Marlon Brando, who hasn't appeared on screen in nine years, says the film he just finished is the last he'll make — and it's a bomb.
"It's horrible," the Oscar-winning actor said of *The Freshman*. "It's going to be a flop, but after this, I'm retiring. I'm so fed up."
"This picture, except for the Canadian crew, was an extremely unpleasant experience. I wish I hadn't finished with a stinker."
His grey-hair-combed straight back, an overweight Brando wears a big red braze to ease muscles, strained while skating for the first time in 20 years — required of his role in the movie, in which he stars with Matthew Broderick.
Brando, 65, who shot the Tri-Star Pictures production in Canada for the last 12 weeks, also told the Toronto Globe and Mail that he's fed up with kvetching to the Hollywood publicity system and adores Canada.
"I've come from New York, which is a warthog straight from hell. To sing my swan song here is very pleasant," he said in the mumble that turned Broadway on its ear when he made his name on stage in the late 1940s.

Edie Brickell leads Bohemian life on the road of concerts

responsibilities and I think we have to be mindful of not only artistic freedom on one hand but of our public trust on the other. And that's a very fine line to walk.
Q: You are said to know government process "intuitively." Could better use of the process have prevented some of the problems the NEA is facing now?
A: I'd like to think so, although I'm a firm believer in the NEA's process. I think it has worked remarkably well. I'm sure you've heard the statistic that of over 85,000 grants were controversial. Over the last two years, there have been in the neighborhood of 300 grants that were these new grants in support of one exhibit that featured a work by Andres Serrano and a retrospective of Robert Mapplethorpe have been controversial. I would hate to see the process dismantled simply because of a couple of grants which have really struck a raw nerve.
Granted, the process perhaps could be fine-tuned and improved, but I think it's a good process.
Q: Does art — at least a small segment of art — need to be provocative?
A: Artists in my view are an integral part of society. They make us think. They make us confront some things we otherwise might not confront, and in doing so, they help us to better understand ourselves, and to help us to make the world a better place to live because it is better understood.

"Artists throughout history have frequently served to alert us to our failures and hypocrisies."
"Regardless of the rationale, it's still censorship," said Mike Green, curator of art exhibits at the College Southern of Idaho's Herrell Museum.

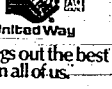

Rock 'n' roll camp caters to fantasy rockers but excludes the groupies

SAN FRANCISCO — The Episcopal priest in the red sneakers leaned into his guitar, (modestly) swung his hips and launched into a Rolling Stones classic.

Naturally, the fans went wild. Fantasy or reality?

For the Rev. Phil Roundtree, a guru who learned to play guitar in seminary, it's a little bit of both.

Nine "living-rock" rockers, including the rock 'n' roll reverend, have 13,500 spots at the first-ever Rock and Roll Fantasy Camp.

Hundreds of rock 'n' roll wannabes, ranging from actor Dudley Moore's 13-year-old son to a 67-year-old grandmother from Detroit, applied for one of the coveted spots in the two camp bands, which have named themselves Woodstock and the Happy Campers.

The campers, mostly in their 30s, are staying at the Phoenix Inn, a motel that caters to visiting rock bands. In addition to the daily rehearsal and record at Secret Studios with assistants from two celebrity coaches, drummer Mick Fleetwood of Fleetwood Mac and Craig Chiquito, lead guitarist for the Starship. At night, it's the VIP treatment at the city's rock nightclubs.

At the end of the week, the campers will take home a satin jacket, a T-shirt and a personalized videotape. Not included: groupies.

It's certainly like nothing I've ever experienced before," Roundtree said. "It's like a mass blind date. We have to see if we can get along, if we have the same tastes. I just pray we sound good."

The Happy Campers had only been playing for an hour or so. It was early. They weren't very good.

"That was pretty mediocre," said Rich Mikhos, the band coach. "You want to move on to the verses? You want to move on to lunch?"

Camper Suzie Keiston, a 25-year-old actress who sings and plays keyboard, is crawling around the stage and wrapping herself first around this man and then around that one. You kind of hope she stays away from the man in red sneakers.

One of Fleetwood's assistants remarks on her energy. She sings OK, too.

"I dance and act and this is an extension for me. I need this extension," said Ms. Keiston, who hopes eventually to produce her own album. "I need this so I can be even more crazy. Hey, you wouldn't want to be a chick alone with five guys all day?"

Later, Fleetwood walks into the studio. By now, the band has rehearsed two pieces, a John Hiatt song and Bonnie Raitt's "The Road." My Middle Name: Mikhos is feeling better. He's even smiling.

The Happy Campers prepare to play for Fleetwood, but they can't find Michael Coleman, a general contractor who's on guitar. Everything stops while Coleman gets Fleetwood's autograph.

At this point, the Happy Campers — an actress, a priest, a businessman, a general contractor and a systems analyst — have rehearsed for maybe three hours. Fleetwood tells them that Fleetwood Mac rehearses five to six weeks before going on tour.

"Obviously, there's no way a band can rehearse for the hours they have and have a formula accomplished," he says.

Back to work. Woodstock isn't the first band that rock 'n' roll writer Charles M. Young has played in. There was the Dry

Heaves back when he worked for Rolling Stone, and now the new group of rock critics he plays with in New York called Iron-Prostate.

Still, Young is nervous. "I'm a little panicky at going on stage Saturday night. There is no worse feeling than going on stage and knowing you're going to suck," he said. "Of course, part of the appeal of rock 'n' roll is the risk."

On this particular day, Woodstock is rehearsing the Leaves' version of "Hey Joe," "The Doors," "People Are Strange" and "Fever," the song made popular by Peggy Lee.

"This isn't just a rock and roll fantasy. This is a music industry fantasy," said Young, who writes regularly for Musician and Playboy. "There isn't a rock 'n' roll writer who've heard who didn't have this fantasy. If we could play guitar instead of playing a typewriter, do you think we'd be playing a typewriter?"

'When Harry Met Sally...' proves a true love story

The literate adult romantic comedy is not dead, only scarce now as always. And when one comes along, it is an occasion for a great cry of joy and full houses.

There are ecstatic shouts and full theaters for the Rob Reiner-Nora Ephron "When Harry Met Sally..." undoubtedly the literate adult romantic comedy of the year to date, linking the spirit of the great romantic comedies of Hollywood's past with the textures and realities of life in a later and less easily romantic time.

Some of the language in "When Harry Met Sally..." would not have got past Len McCarry, although at a time as Howard Hawks would have enjoyed the freedom to use it as censoring, the way it is used here.

There is a scene — I expect it will go into history as the Restaurant Scene — that would have given Will Hays, Joe Breen and the whole production-code staff collective apoplexy. But it is very funny and its punch line will join "Make my day" in the treasury of immortal movie quotes. "Make my night, sort of."

Like "Moonstruck" and "Terms of Endearment," "When Harry Met Sally..." can be said to address the difficulty of achieving love in a time when permissibility embraces everything except commitment, and sex has become a free-standing item related to nothing else.

Granted, things have already begun to change and it has been announced from various jostrums that the sexual revolution is over,

Yet we are not back in 1928 or 1938, not yet and not ever.

Harry and Sally can be seen as figures in a transitional landscape, trying to make their way from the strenuous demands of the anything-goes years to the heart's continuing demands for a singular, knock-out, take-all-of-me-love. It turns out, of course, that the hope of a steady relationship never really disappeared; it just waited on the

sidelines during the feeding frenzy. But while the eyes of history can be focused on "When Harry Met Sally..." what we have here are simply two charismatic individuals who talk wonderfully, appealingly and, above all, endlessly. The movie is articulation's finest hours.

Billy Crystal and Meg Ryan are working precisely the same turf as the glorious duos of the past: Cary Grant and Irene Dunne, Garry Cooper

and Jean Arthur, Spencer Tracy and Katharine Hepburn. The territory doesn't look or sound the same, but that's because the world doesn't either.

Yet the incidentals of language and even of the rites of courtship can't obscure the truth that the fundamentals don't change. The romantic impulse remains intact in Ephron's vision and so does a kind of battered but game innocence and optimism.

It struck me once that the movies had spent more than half a century saying "They lived happily ever after" and the following quarter-century warning that "They'll be lucky to make it through the weekend." Possibly now we are entering a third era in which the movies will be sounding a note of cautious optimism: "You know, it just... might... work."

Second-generation writers in Hollywood are relatively rare, but Nora Ephron is one. It is not clear whether the genetics or the home environment made the greater difference. But her parents, the writing team of Phoebe and Henry Ephron, wrote some of the brightest comedy around on Broadway and then in Hollywood; for nearly 30 years, until Phoebe died in 1971. Their credits include "Daddy Long Legs" for Fred Astaire and Leslie

Carmen, "Desk Set" for Tracy and Hepburn and "There's No Business Like Show Business" for practically everybody.

Daughter Nora, who was associate producer as well as the writer on "When Harry Met Sally..." has also written the semi-autobiographical comedy "Heartburn" and the gangster comedy "Cookie," which is due out later this summer. In collaboration with Alice Arlen she wrote "Silkwood," the angry drama with Meryl Streep as the woman mysteriously killed in a car crash after she blew the whistle on plutonium poisoning at the factory where she worked.

"Silkwood" reflected Ephron's own career beginnings as a newspaper and magazine journalist. The satisfaction and the sympathy engendered by "When Harry Met Sally..." depend importantly on the fact that her characters (including Bruno Kirby and Carrie Fisher in the parts that Jack Carson and Eve Arden might once have played, and probably did) arise from a foundation of an unstringently and accurately observed society.

The characters may be larger and God knows more valuable than life, but theirs is a recognizable yuppie world, real to the real Reebok.

Real Billy Crystal finally stands up in Rob Reiner-Nora Ephron movie

LOS ANGELES — You've seen him as Sammy, Grace, Tina and Fernando. Now the real Billy Crystal, more or less, stands up in a romantic comedy directed by his best friend, Rob Reiner. Some friend. Reiner talked to other actors before offering "When Harry Met Sally..." to his pal.

"It was awkward," Crystal recalls, "because when the project came to me, it wasn't as best friends. It was, 'I think you should do this film.' I knew he had seen other people, and I was just like, 'I didn't know the script, I just knew the age group and that the guy sort of was, and I thought, 'Well, why isn't he giving it to me?'"

"When he called me up to say, 'You got to do the movie,' he said, 'I had to go through the process of seeing other people that any director would do. I wanted you to do it, but I just had to make sure.'"

"I said, 'I don't know if it's my good; I have to read it and make sure.' I called afterward and said, 'I have to do it. But we got to start working together.'"

Nora Ephron ("Heartburn") had written a script about a couple who meet over the years and test his theory that men and women can't be real friends "because the sex thing gets in the way." A lot of the material stemmed from Reiner's own experiences with dating after the breakup of his marriage to actress-director Penny Marshall.

"My job was to get Rob out of the script and me in — of Harry in," said Crystal. "It was awkward playing moments that I knew had happened to Rob in his life, and he was on the other side of the camera watching me."

Having been married for 18 years, Crystal could not contribute his dating experiences.

"I think in the sense of humor, the deflection of his pain," he said. "Just in life find, that a laugh is the best medicine. This character, more than any other I've played, is me."

Meg Ryan plays Sally in the film,

which also features Carrie Fisher and Bruno Kirby as the couple's best friends.

Unlike his pal, Robin Williams, who performs maniacally in interviews, at restaurants and on street corners, Billy Crystal is reflective when he doesn't have a mike in front of his mouth. Next year marks his 20th year as an entertainer, and he was asked about the milestones in his career.

"You mean milestones?" he cracked lamely.

"I guess the first was in 1976, being bumped from the first 'Saturday Night Live' as a guest, which hurt a lot. Six months later I was on 'Soap.' Wonderful show. Four years playing the same character. Fine experience working with the talented actors and actresses in that show. Learned a lot about acting there."

"My own TV show was canceled in '82, but I learned a lot about myself on that show," he said. "I took about two years to do nothing but make myself a better performer. I didn't do much television. I wasn't doing films at all — I wasn't asked. I went on the road just to make myself better."

"I went back to 'Saturday Night

Live' as a host in '84, which was a personal vindication. Then coming on as a regular in '84-'85."

Everyone said, 'What are you doing that for? You don't need to do that.' I had to do that. I could do the things I'm doing now, but I didn't have a place."

During that memorable "Saturday Night Live" season, Crystal stretched himself with on-the-nose impressions of Sammy Davis Jr., Tina Turner, Grace Jones and, most famously, Fernando Lamas. Film work followed: "The Princess Bride" (with Reiner), "Running Scared," "Throw Momma From the Train" and "Memories of Me," which he co-wrote and co-produced.

"I don't give up," he said. "I'm a little bit of a pit bull with myself. If something's bothering me about the work and where I want to be in the business, I just latch onto something and I don't let go until it gets better."

'Mission Impossible' revival succeeds as show reflects changing attitudes

One of ABC's more pleasant surprises of the past season was the performance of its revival of "Mission: Impossible." Starting on Sundays, then moved to Saturdays, the adventure series wasn't a ratings barn-burner, but it performed adequately enough to be renewed. In true impossible Missions Force fashion, the stakes have been upped for the new season: "Mission: Impossible" has been moved to Thursdays, scheduled directly opposite NBC's "Cosby Show."

Long odds are nothing new to "Mission: Impossible," either in its plots or in its improbable revival. The new version of the series is a result of the prolonged writers' strike that delayed the 1988-89 television season. Desperate for something, anything, to put on the air, ABC hit on a new version of the 1966-73 CBS series, strictly as a stopgap measure. To almost everyone's surprise, there were enough nostalgia buffs and new fans to sustain the show.

The elements of "Mission: Impossible" have been updated, but they remain familiar to longtime viewers. Jim Phelps (played by Peter Graves) now receives his assignment via videodisc rather than tape recorder, but it still self-destructs in five seconds. The team still consists of an electronics whiz (Grant Collier,

played by Phil Morris, the real-life son of original "Mission: Impossible" high-tech genius Greg Morris), a master of disguise (Nicholas Black, played by Thao Penghills), a femme fatale (Shannon Reed, played by Jann Badler) and a muscleman for the heavy lifting (Max Harte, played by Tony Hamilton).

One thing that has changed over the years is the choice of targets for the IMF. When the series began in 1966, the issue of Vietnam was still in doubt, but few doubted America's ability to exert its will anywhere in the world. "Mission: Impossible" reflected this confidence. The missions were, by and large, mounted against smaller countries (judging from the actors' accents, all located somewhere in the Balkans) that were implicitly assumed to be in the Soviet orbit. Many of these countries were causing problems by "exporting revolution" or engaging in similarly sinister activities.

Toward the end of its original run in the early '70s, however, "Mission: Impossible" reflected the ambiguous Americans themselves were feeling about their foreign policy, in light of internal divisions on the Vietnam issue. It was no longer sufficient to simply target a government as "un-

friendly" and send in the IMF team to overthrow it. It was about this time that original cast members Barbara Bain and Martin Landau left the series. With replacements Lesley Ann Warren (herself replaced in 1971 by Lynda Day George) and Leonard Nimoy, the Force turned its attention closer to home, mounting domestic missions against organized crime. Somehow it just wasn't as much fun to watch the IMF take on home-grown baddies as it was when they were ranging the world in sneaky service to democracy, and the show breathed its last in 1973.

Today, the IMF has gone global again, but with a significant difference: The targets aren't systems or ideologies, but individual lunatic dictators and corrupt regimes. In one episode, they even cooperated with a Russian agent to foil a Gadhafi-like dictator's plans for a poison-gas complex. What a difference glasnost makes!

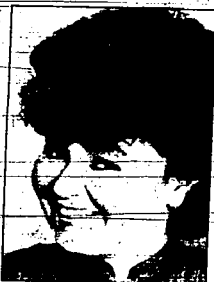

Paige energizes 'General Hospital'

Have you seen Aunt Iona on "General Hospital" lately? Smack in the middle of the summer doldrums, Janis Paige made her debut as Iona Huntington, eccentric owner of Windemere cottage on Spoon Island, playing mother hen to her niece Katherine, while irritating her friend Robert with her nosy ways.

In a jiffy, the energy level jumped when Janis got on camera. Actors perked up and so did viewers. Something was apparently going on. Call it personality, presence or plain old professionalism.

Janis Paige is back. She doesn't sing "Hey, There," the way she used to in the '50s as the star of Broadway's "Pajama Game," but the lady just knows how to make viewers take note. That's what she's been doing ever since her contract player days in support of Bette Davis, Olivia de Havilland and Ann Sheridan at Warner Brothers.

"I'm not sure who or what Aunt Iona is," Janis admits. "I think the writers are waiting to see what I do with her." That doesn't bother the lady. She's happy to be back at work during the best time of her life... a minor irritation is having to use her VCR.

"I need to tape my shows," says Paige. "But I don't know how. So I call a VCR doctor who comes out, fiddles with the machine, charges me \$69 and leaves. Nothing works. I'm mad."

On Sundays, Janis works out at Jane Fonda's Shop, and laughs when she remembers the old days at Warner's when boss Jack Warner used to yell, "Get that weight off."

"I've always had baby fat. Always been on a diet," Jane continues. "But in those days we just danced. No one lifted weights or heard of aerobics."

In those bygone days, directors huffed, actors offered support, and stars such as Bette Davis and Olivia DeHavilland stood up to the studio moguls, fighting for women's rights and better pay.

"We owe a lot to Bette and Olivia," Janis declares. "They had some power and used it. And directors like

Michael Curtiz stopped yelling. Zachary Scott and Jack Carson gave advice and affection. We don't see much of that today. What a pity!

The youngster from Tacoma, Wash., did it all backwards. She learned her trade in Hollywood at Warners and at MGM. Not waiting around to become a major star, Janis went to New York, got her first job within a day in Leland Hayward's "It Remains to Be Seen," and went on to star in "Pajama Game."

When the musicals became scarce on Broadway, Janis performed in Las Vegas, and on all the TV variety shows. After that, it was episodic TV such as "Trapper John, M.D.," a few short-lived series and now the soaps.

"I knew I had talent," Janis admits. "My late husband, Ray Guilbert didn't believe talent could be taught. He'd say 'You have to have discipline, but if you get too technical, the life goes out of a performance. When you lose that spark,

that fun, it never comes back." Janis has always worked on instinct when it comes to making choices. "The gut tells the head what to do."

She remembers jumping horses in class when she was 12 years old, learning to take one jump at a time, pausing with the horse, then moving forward. "I never got over that feeling," says Janis. "It still happens now and then at work. I haven't lost that, thank goodness. And I'm still here."

TV Guide cover combines pictures of Oprah Winfrey and Ann-Margret

LOS ANGELES — People who think Oprah Winfrey looks impossibly slim on the cover of this week's TV Guide are right — the talk show queen's face was superimposed on actress Ann-Margret's hourglass figure.

Appearing under the headline "Oprah! The Richest Woman on TV?" the illustration of Miss Winfrey in a gauzy dress atop a pile of money is not identified as a composite.

And TV Guide acknowledged Monday that unsuspecting readers might think it's a real photograph.

The lean body upon which Oprah's head rests is from a publicity shot of Ann-Margret, according to the actress' publicist, George Kirvay. The photo comes from a "Rockette" special Ann-Margret did about 10 years ago, Kirvay said.

"I think she was shocked," Kirvay said of Ann-Margret's reaction to TV Guide's cover for the Aug. 26-Sept. 1 issue. "If you look at the two pictures, they're identical. It's even her ring on Oprah's hand."

The formerly overweight Miss Winfrey, who lost 67 pounds on a diet in 1988, had no part whatsoever in the cover's making, said Christine Tardio, a spokeswoman for Miss Winfrey's Harpo production company.

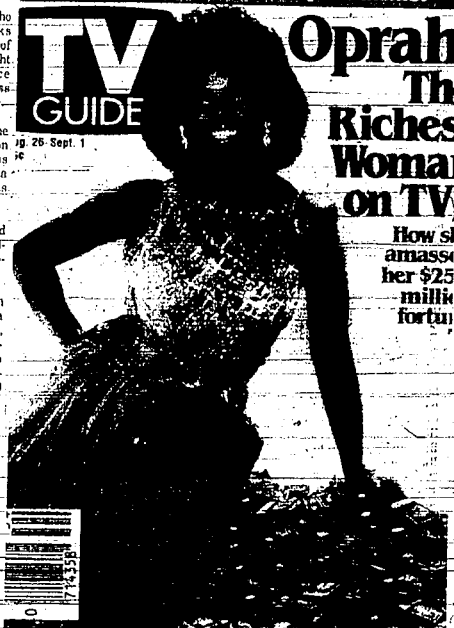
"Oprah would not pose on a pile of money like that nor would she pose in that revealing dress. It's not something she would ever do," Ms. Tardio said.

illustration could be mistaken for a photograph. He said an artist had used the Ann-Margret shot for creative inspiration.

"Ann-Margret should be thrilled because she's got another TV Guide cover," Sendler said.

"And Oprah should be thrilled because she looks terrific."

But Sendler reported that TV Guide had instructed the artist "not to use photographs so literally" in the future.

Teachers scrutinize Turner's ad-free classroom news show

NEW YORK (AP)—Teachers and administrators got their first look Monday at Turner Broadcasting System Inc.'s daily news show for use in classrooms, a commercial-free alternative to the news program Whittle Communications plans to launch next spring.

CNN Newsroom will be carried weekdays at 3:45 a.m. EDT on Cable News Network. The pre-dawn telecast is designed to enable teachers to tape the program and review it to see if all or part could be used in class that day.

The program was launched before the school year begins to give teachers and administrators a chance to determine if it fits with their lesson plans. Turner also gets a jump of several months on Whittle's ad-supported Channel One news program that begins nationally in March.

With the exception of commercials, the first 15-minute edition of CNN Newsroom resembled the 12-minute Channel One programs that Whittle Communications tested over seven weeks in six schools last spring.

Both programs are anchored by a youthful and demographically balanced team. The CNN Newsroom

anchors are Cassandra Henderson and Brian Todd, Turner Broadcasting employees selected from a group of more than 250 applicants.

The programs open with news headlines, contain filmed news footage, make liberal use of maps and carry several feature stories chosen and developed to appeal to teen-agers.

CNN Newsroom had an expanded feature on the career of Rep. Mickey Leland, the Texas Democrat who was killed in an airplane crash in Ethiopia.

It also had a feature on a Georgia high school teacher who gives his students practical experience in using the English language by having them research, write and edit stories for a folklore magazine he publishes.

And it had a feature on Chinese students who have found they must sit through lessons taught by the army in the aftermath of the bloody suppression of a student uprising this summer in Beijing.

During its test run, Channel One had features on the life of civil rights leader Martin Luther King Jr. and series that dealt with the environment and life in Russia for

teen-agers.

The services are delivered differently: CNN Newsroom arrives by cable or is taped off television at home, while Channel One is delivered by satellite.

Atlanta-based Turner said it has endorsements or pledges of support from cable operators representing nearly half the cable television households in the United States to deliver the program to schools.

Turner is paying the entire bill for producing the show and producing a teacher's guide by electronic mail. Whittle, based in Knoxville, Tenn., is providing both the program and delivery by using advertising revenue.

Whittle said only a fraction of the nation's classrooms are individually equipped with TV sets and that without them, teachers are unable to make the best use possible of the daily news service and other television programs.

Channel One schools get an average of \$50,000 in video hardware, including TV sets, videocassette recorders and satellite dishes in exchange for allowing Whittle to sell two minutes of commercials in each 12-minute news program to advertisers.

Group: TV minority portrayal unrealistic

WASHINGTON (AP) — A core of overwhelmingly white producers and writers are "creating characters in their own image," producing artificial portrayals of blacks and other minorities on TV, a women's group charged Wednesday.

Racial tension is commonplace in the real world, but virtually invisible among white and minority characters on entertainment television, concluded Sally Steenland, author of a Ford Foundation-financed study on how minorities are portrayed in the media.

The study — "Unequal Picture: Black, Hispanic, Asian and Native American Characters on Television" — was released by Wider Opportunities for Women, a non-profit group working to promote equality in the workplace.

Among its major findings: — Nine of 10 minority characters are middle class or wealthy where

in reality more than 40 percent of minority men and 60 percent of minority women have incomes below \$10,000 a year.

— "Most programs reduce injustice to individual conflict, denying the reality of oppressive social structures, except for a very few shows which present a multicultural world."

— Only situation comedies provide minority female characters as leading roles. "Almost three-quarters of all minority females on television are featured in comedies."

— Workplaces are portrayed as "egalitarian... with no hint of bias, even though whites are almost always in charge."

The study examined more than 150 episodes of 30 network television series featuring minorities in

recurring roles.

Of the 78 minority characters on prime-time TV, the study found that the overwhelming majority, 65 or 83 percent — were blacks. Blacks account for about 55 percent of the nation's minority population, according to Census Bureau data.

Hispanics accounted for only 12 percent of the minority characters on TV while they compose about 35 percent of the minority population. Asians, about 6 percent of the minority population, constituted about 4 percent of the minority characters on TV.

Native-Americans — Indians — constituted only 1 percent of the minority characters portrayed on in TV. In reality, native Americans

make up about 2 percent of the minority population.

Of the 162 producers working on the 30 shows, only 12 were blacks, Hispanics, Asians or Native Americans, the study said. And of the 12 minority producers, only four were women.

"No wonder TV's integrated world is such a happy one," said Steenland. "No wonder minority characters are nearly identical to their white buddies. White producers and writers are creating characters in their own image."

The study said the "token status" of minority producers and writers in television can be overcome only through more aggressive recruiting, hiring and promotion.
