Air Force suffers through 3rd scoping hearing

GLENN'S FERRY — In its rush to hold public meetings on a proposal to expand the Saylor Creek Bombing Range, the Air Force has neglected to properly inform the public, charged one local resident Thursday.

The Air Force has provided no definite answers on the effects of low-level supersonic flight, Robert Hill told a panel of Air Force officials at the crowded community hall in Glenn's Ferry.

The meeting was the third in a series to

hear public concerns about effects of the range expansion. Issues raised are to be answered in an environmental impact statement prepared by the Air Force.

"You have that information, you should have given us that before this meeting," Hill said.

Lt. Col. Jim Cooper of Mountain Home Air Force Base replied that the Air Force "can't assess that impact until we know the design of the range and target arrangements."

Hill, however, charged that the Air Force knew well the effects of a fighter jet flying faster than the speed of sound at 500 feet above the ground.

Low-level supersonic flight will not be covered by the first phase of the two-part impact study of the expansion, said Capt. Wilfred Cassidy, environmental coordinator for the project. The first phase will cover only impact with supersonic flight from 5,000 feet above the ground to 35,000 feet, he said.

The second phase will consider supersonic flight between 100 feet and 500 feet above the ground.

Hill said information about that kind of impact was needed if people are to make intelligent comments in the scoping process.

Lee Presley, a King Hill rancher, won a round of applause by likening the Air Force bombers flying to Owyhee County to do their business with a turkey farmer who got rich by sending his turkeys next door to "feed and crap." The turkeys would go next door and return home at night to sleep while the turkey farmer got rich.

The Air Force will send its planes to Owyhee County to "eat and crap," Presley said. But they go home at night to sleep, and

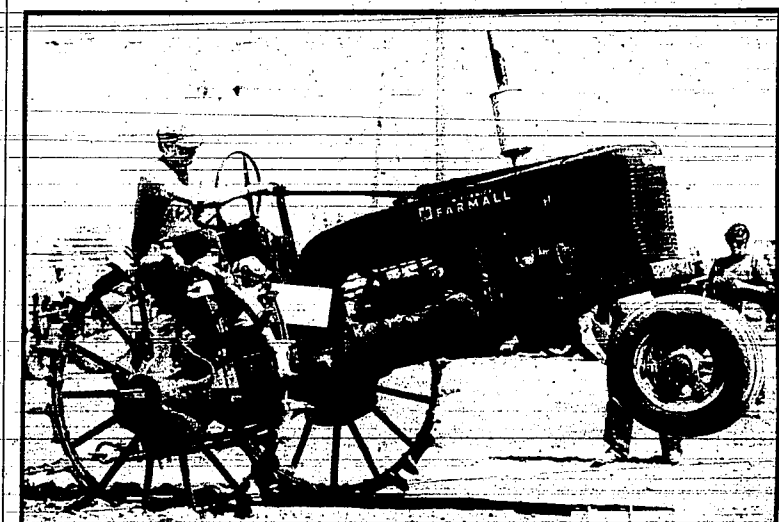
it's Mountain Home that gets rich, he said.

Others in the standing-room-only crowd of about 100 worried that the expansion would eliminate a way of life that was brought to southern Idaho by pioneers more than 100 years ago.

John Solosabal, a Glenn's Ferry rancher, said supersonic flights would make it impossible to live in his home of 50 years, he said.

"I don't think I could keep windows in my house," he said.

First antique tractor pull proves a crowd pleaser

FILER — An antique tractor pull is about as gripping as a football game. The spectators don't get excited until there are less than 10 yards to go.

But at that point, hold onto your hats. The crowd roars itself into a crescendoing roar, punctuated by helpful hints for the driver.

"Come on Kenny, bear down."
"Dig, Mike. Lean forward. Dig. Dig."

At the first ever antique tractor pull sponsored by the newly formed Magic Valley Antique Tractor Pullers Association Thursday, drivers and spectators alike were getting a feel for the sport.

"They're simple to drive. They just don't have a lot of horsepower," said Ron Brackett, who drove his Alia Chalmers WD-45 to a second-place finish. "You try to decide which gear'll go best in."

"There's a gut feel if you drive these tractors a lot and you just go with that," he said.

Forty-one old tractors of various ages and engine sizes took the challenge of dragging a weighted sled bearing several tons until they could pull no more and came

Navy faults suicidal sailor for Iowa tragedy

How does \$1.5 million for an irrigation plan sound?

WASHINGTON — Describing him as "a loner, a man-of-low self-esteem who talked of dying in an explosion in the line of duty, and being buried at Arlington National Cemetery," the Navy Thursday formally named Gunner's Mate Clayton M. Hartwig as "most likely" responsible for causing the turret blast aboard the USS Iowa April 19 that killed 47 sailors, including Hartwig.

The admirals who led and reviewed the Navy's four-month probe of the explosion said a combination of "irrefutable facts"

a n d circumstantial evidence led them to conclude that Hartwig, the captain of a gun crew in Gunner's Mate Clayton M. Hartwig, probably slipped a detonating device between bags of powder in the middle 16-inch gun of the turret's three guns, then operated loading machinery in

a way that caused the premature explosion.

Rear Adm. Richard D. Milligan, who headed the four-month investigation of the Navy's worst shipboard tragedy since the Vietnam War, made his case against Hartwig during a packed news conference at the Pentagon. He held up two books found among Hartwig's possessions which, the admiral said, showed that the 24-year-old petty officer "had a long interest in explosives" dating back to his boyhood when he blew up stumps.

"The books were 'Getting Even,' 'A Complete Book of Dirty Tricks,' and

an Army manual called 'Improvised Munitions Handbook.' Milligan said "these two books are very explicit on how to build such things as detonating devices."

Additional circumstantial evidence, the admiral contended, came from the FBI's National Center for the Analysis of Violent Crime whose "qualified psychologists" concluded: "Clayton Hartwig died as a result of his own actions, staging his death in such a fashion that he hoped it would appear to be an accident."

BAGHDAD — Iraq President Saddam Hussein has offered \$1.5 million to any Iraqi who can solve a 3,000-year-old puzzle — how King Nebuchadnezzar managed to water the fabled Hanging Gardens of Babylon.

Archaeologists are divided over whether the gardens, said to have graced terraces hundreds of feet above the palm-fringed Euphrates, existed. They reportedly were built by Nebuchadnezzar in the 6th century B.C. to enchant his homesick queen, the Median princess Amytis.

The ancient Greeks considered the gardens one of the seven wonders of the world, but Nebuchadnezzar made no mention of them in his detailed writings, and no conclusive evidence they existed has been

uncovered.

But the Iraqi government, which is rebuilding the city where Nebuchadnezzar ruled ancient Mesopotamia from 604 B.C. to 562 B.C., believes they did exist based on findings by German archaeologists with first excavated Babylon more than 75 years ago.

Hussein, who is known as Saddam in Iraq, said the Arab world announced a \$1.5 million prize for whomever comes up with the most plausible watering system, and \$750,000 to the runner-up.

The winning system likely will be used if the Iraqis decide to go ahead and reconstruct the hanging gardens as part of their effort to restore the crumbled city in what is now central Iraq.

Sailor's family reacts bitterly to Navy report

CLEVELAND — Clayton Hartwig's family today rejected the Navy's conclusion that the gunner's mate probably caused the explosion that killed 47 sailors on the USS Iowa by shoving a detonator between gunpowder bags.

"I never believed it right from the start," Kathy Kubicek, Hartwig's sister, said outside her father's home following a two-hour briefing by Navy officers this morning.

The family attorney, Craig Bruenahan, said Hartwig's relatives want a congressional investigation into the Navy probe of the April 19

blast aboard the battleship and repeated links to the news media from investigators.

"The Navy is kind of investigating itself and clearing itself," said Bruenahan.

Hartwig's father, Earl V. Hartwig, a Navy veteran, also said he didn't believe the Navy conclusion. "I think there was a powder explosion — accidental — that caused the explosion," Hartwig said.

The family was briefed at Hartwig's home by a three-officer team led by Capt. Douglas J. Katz.

"This is probably one of the hardest things I've ever done in my entire life," said Katz, who left the home a half hour before the Pentagon released

the report on the April 19 disaster off Puerto Rico.

The report said the exact cause of the explosion, the worst naval disaster since the Vietnam War, cannot be pinpointed since the sailors close enough to see what was going on, including Hartwig, were all killed in the fiery blast.

However, Rear Adm. Richard Milligan, presenting the conclusions in Washington, said there was much "circumstantial information" pointing to Hartwig.

He cited an FBI psychological profile of Hartwig with the opinion that he took his own life and hoped it looked like an accident.

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Las Vegas fire forces evacuation of Riviera

LAS VEGAS — A smoky fire raced through a construction area at the Riviera Hotel and Casino on Thursday, forcing the evacuation of 3,000 guests at the Strip resort.

The fire, reported at 10:20 a.m., sent thick smoke billowing hundreds of feet in the air. No injuries were reported, and the fire was put out in about two hours.

"We went through some pretty dark smoke getting out of the casino," said Dr. Paul Bender of Jefferson, Ind. "The hotel people should be given credit for getting people out in a non-panic way."

Arthur Waltzmin, Riviera chairman, said he went floor-to-floor with security officers, knocking on

doors to alert hotel guests.

The fire blackened the exterior of a section of the original hotel, a nine-story building built in 1933. The fire did not reach inside, fire officials said. Two other high-rise towers at the resort were not affected.

Hotel spokesman Dave Verbon said all occupants were evacuated "quickly and quietly." Mark Sterbens, hotel president, said the hotel's 2,200 rooms were sold out.

Sterbens said 50 to 75 people were damaged, and some rooms would have to be other hotels. The resort's hotels and restaurants were expected to reopen later Thursday.

"The first thing we did was secure all of the money (in the casino) and evacuate all the people," Sterbens said.

Study blasts federal Superfund program

SANTA MONICA, Calif. — The federal Superfund program has been "superlow" in cleaning toxic waste dumps and in making polluters pay for the work, according to a study.

In the program's first eight years ending last September, the Environmental Protection Agency finished cleaning only 31 dumps out of 1,175 on a priority list, according to the Rand Corp. study, to be released Friday. The list represents

only the worst of 30,000 dumps where waste ultimately may need to be treated or removed.

The report also found that EPA spent only \$2.6 billion of the \$4.5 billion in Superfund money from Congress during 1980-1988, and only \$1.6 billion went directly to cleanup work, with the rest spent on management and legal costs.

Finally, the agency recovered only \$230 million of the \$2.6 billion from polluters who are supposed to pay for the cleanup work, said the study

by Jan Paul Acton, of Rand's Institute for Civil Justice.

"Superfund has been superlow at cleaning up toxic waste sites, spending available funds and recovering its outlays from those who did the polluting," the non-profit, Santa Monica-based think tank said in a statement summarizing Acton's findings.

Other studies have criticized Superfund's pace, but Rand's is "a very good attempt" to statistically measure progress in cleaning dump

sites, said Walter Kovalick Jr., the EPA's deputy director of Superfund.

After he was appointed by President Bush, EPA Administrator William Reilly ordered an internal review that criticized Superfund.

Reilly pledged in June to toughen toxic waste cleanup enforcement. Kovalick said that despite problems, the cleanup effort isn't as bad as Rand's study suggests.

Senate guarantees rights for disabled

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate voted 76-8 Thursday night to approve legislation to guarantee 43 million disabled Americans — including most AIDS victims — rights to employment, transportation and the use of restaurants and other businesses.

Lawmakers debated the bill with sign language interpreters allowed on the Senate floor for the first time in the institution's history to make the proceedings available to deaf audiences watching in the galleries and on television.

Supporters likened the Americans With Disabilities Act to the Civil Rights Act 25 years ago that guaranteed blacks and other minorities their right to participate fully in American society.

"This bill responds to those 15 percent who are not," said Harkin, who also quoted the Health and Human Services Secretary, Dr. Louis Sullivan, as saying there is no medical reason for discrimination against AIDS sufferers.

The legislation prohibits employment discrimination by businesses with 15 or more employees, although the limit would be 25 employees for the first two years. All privately owned stores, restaurants and other businesses would be prohibited from discrimination, and existing facilities would have to make modifications to accommodate the handicapped if "readily achievable."

All new buses would have to be made accessible to the handicapped, with a six-to-seven-year grace period provided for in the bill. In addition, telephone companies would have to provide devices — at no special charge — to allow the deaf and speech impaired to communicate with others who are not so handicapped.

Voting against the measure were Helms, William Armstrong, R-Colo.; Gordon Humphrey, R-N.E.; James A. McClure, R-Idaho; and Malcolm Wallop, R-Wyo.; Christopher Bond, R-Mo.; Steve Symms, R-Idaho; and Jake Garn, R-Utah.

The act is a 20th century Emancipation Proclamation for people with disabilities," said Sen. Tom Harkin, D-Iowa, the bill's chief sponsor. Fifty-nine senators, both Republicans and Democrats, added their names to the legislation. An amendment made Congress subject to the law, although some senators questioned the constitutionality.

Sen. Jesse Helms, R-N.C., had challenged a definition of disabled that includes people with the AIDS virus, saying that 85 percent of people with the AIDS virus are

homosexuals or drug users.

Officials said scores of Iraqi engineers and architects have ideas on how the Babylonians did it, but they refuse to give details.

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causing the fire and blast from the five 110-pound bags of powder to shoot out the rear of the gun and into the turret.

After examination of bits of wire, sulfur and other material, Milligan said, the Navy concluded that the foreign material had to come from a device that Hartwig was in the best position to insert between the two bags of powder nearest the projectile.

The admiral said a detonating device that went off the bags of powder were compressed by the rammer could have been slipped into one of the lead foil packets that are inserted between the number one and two bags.

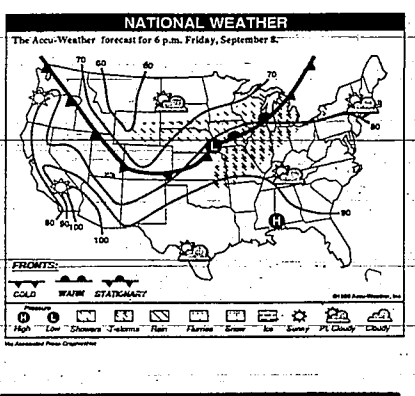

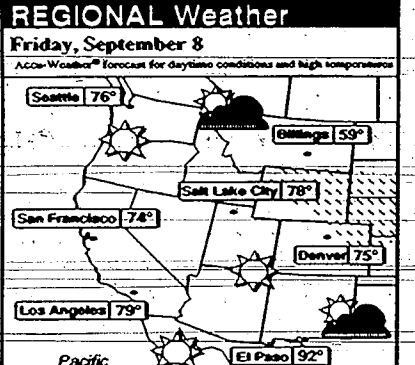

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Legislative committee votes against open records panel

BOISE (AP) — A legislative committee has decided that it does not want to create a new commission, board or individual to handle disputes over whether public records should be open.

The committee voted 8-4 on Thursday against creating "intermediate" panels to handle the disputes. That eliminated, at least for now, a proposal backed by newspaper groups to create a commission to deal with public record disputes. It also shot down a proposal to create the office of inspector general in the attorney general's office.

The 12-member committee worked all day Thursday on proposed legislation attempting to consolidate

and streamline state laws on which public records should be open. Currently, there are more than 100 state laws on the subject.

The last legislative session considered several bills on open records but wound up doing nothing when various news organizations could not agree.

That deadlock continued Thursday, but committee chairman Sen. Skip Smyser, R-Parma, promised that the committee would come up with something, even if it fails to please everyone.

"The committee will come up with a solution. I don't expect to please everybody in this room, nor will I try to please everybody in this room," said Smyser.

"We are elected by the people of Idaho to do what we feel is in their best interests. If that steps on someone's toes, so be it," he said.

The panel plans a final meeting next month to do a recommendation to the 1990 Legislature. It probably will go to the House State Affairs Committee, which handled last year's bills. That panel's chairman, Rep. Pam Bengson, R-Boise, is a member of the interim study committee.

Boise attorney Allen Derr presented a proposal he drafted, with support from the Idaho Press Club and the Idaho Newspaper Association.

It called for creation of an Open

Government Commission to review all state laws exempting public records from inspection, and to recommend to the legislature which ones should be kept and which ones should be eliminated. Any future exemptions also would have to be reviewed by the commission.

Legislative Council staffer Mike Nugent presented an 11-page law, drawn up at the request of Smyser, creating the office of inspector general to review disputes over open records.

The session, which was attended by at least nine lawyers, including four on the legislative committee, bogged down in a lengthy discussion over how to state simply that all official records should be open unless specifically exempted.

The Smyser legislation included a 43-line preamble stating that records should be open. It also contained 37 proposed exemptions.

"There's a lot of baffleleg in that section," said Rep. Patricia McDermott, D-Pocatello. She suggested a simple statement that all records are open unless specifically exempt, and list the exemptions.

"I don't know what's so complicated about that," he said.

Rep. Bush, attorney for the Idaho Allied Dailies, said newspapers want some sort of "balancing test" in the legislation, so the news media can go to court if necessary to force the opening of records if it can be shown

that the public interest outweighs an individual's right to privacy or an agency's need to withhold information.

"It probably would not be used often, but it is important that it be there," he said.

Rep. James Staicheff, D-Sandpoint, said he wanted to make the process simple and inexpensive, so "little people" could use it.

"They should be able to go to court at the local level, so they don't have to drive 500 miles to Boise and miss two days of work," he said.

He said the process should be as simple as possible. "It ought to be black and white as much as we can make it," he said.

Attorney general seeking \$1 million from state for emergency drug funds

BOISE (AP) — The \$2 million cash infusion President Bush's new drug strategy would provide the anti-drug campaign in Idaho is a step in the right direction, but Attorney General Jim Jones says state government will have to come up with even more money to make the campaign a success.

Jones said Thursday that he will specifically ask state lawmakers in January for an emergency \$1 million appropriation to augment drug enforcement efforts and then strongly support requests from the Health and Welfare and Corrections departments for nearly \$1.8 million more in the 1991 budget to

underwrite new drug treatment programs for juveniles and prison inmates.

"We cannot rely on the new federal program to meet the need we have here in Idaho," Jones said. "We've got to have additional resources."

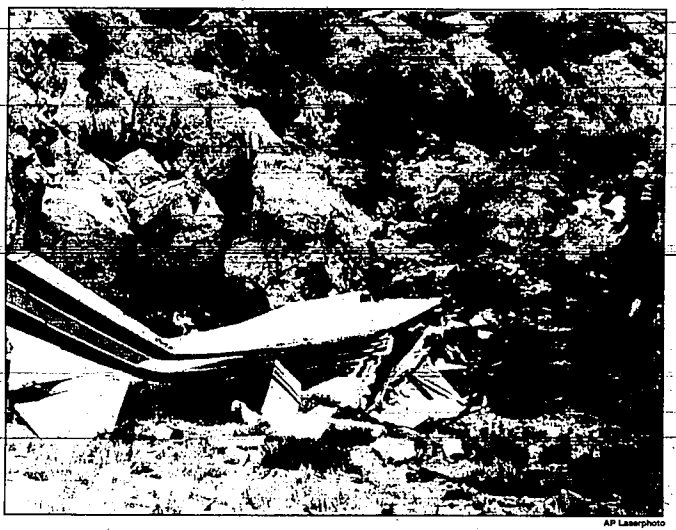
Jones said he had talked with members of the Legislature's budget-writing committee about the extra state support, and with huge surplus and signs the state economy will remain strong for another two years Jones said they indicated "a willingness to look at it."

"The attention that has been brought to the problem by virtue of the President's new drug strategy,"

Jones said, "is going to have an effect on what happens here in the state."

Calling drugs Idaho's number-one crime problem, the attorney general estimated that the Bush plan would increase annual federal support for local law enforcement from less than \$800,000 to more than \$1.5 million. Coupled with the additional \$1 million in state money he will ask for this winter and the tougher anti-drug laws already on the books, Jones said officials should produce "about the optimum drug enforcement program for the state."

"Drug enforcement is a necessity, not a luxury," he declared.

Fuel spill endangers Chinook salmon

YELLOW PINE (AP) — Diesel fuel spilled into central Idaho's Johnson Creek has apparently thoroughly mixed with the water, seriously endangering the entire year's worth of wild chinook salmon eggs in that stream, officials said Thursday.

Fish and Game Department spokesman Jack Trueblood said 41 wild chinook redds, or nests, were

situated just below White Horse Rapids, where the bulk of the 1,700 gallons of spilled diesel fuel was believed to have mixed with the water.

"The eggs are in a real vulnerable state because of their age," Trueblood said. "We don't dare excavate a nest to see if the eggs are damaged because the excavation would kill the eggs. The oil mixed

with the water could kill them, but we'll have to wait and see."

Federal and state fishery experts were researching reports on past hazardous spills to determine what the potential impact on the chinook redds might be, he said.

The first mortalities from Wednesday morning's spill were juvenile wild chinook salmon and steelhead.

Two die in Utah light plane crash; wing tip caught on side of canyon

STANSBURY ISLAND, Utah (AP) — A man and woman were killed Thursday when a small aircraft crashed on this Great Salt Lake island, the Tooele County Sheriff's Department said.

Sheriff Don Proctor said the charred remains of Joe B. Calvin, 40, of Fort Riley, Kan., and John R. Allen, 23, a Dugway school teacher who moved to Utah recently from Mancos, Colo., were found near the plane's wreckage at 9:23 a.m. MDT.

Proctor said Calvin, apparently on

vacation from his post with the 82nd Medical Detachment at Fort Riley, was thought to be piloting the single-engine PA24 Comanche when it went down in the island's Tabby's Canyon.

"It looks like he caught the right wing on a turn as he came out of the canyon," the sheriff said.

The Federal Aviation Administration had dispatched investigators to the island by Thursday afternoon, Proctor said.

Don McGurk, watch supervisor at the Federal Aviation Administration's

Cedar City Flight Service Station, said Calvin had filed a flight plan Wednesday evening stating his intention to depart from and later return to Tooele Valley Airport after a pleasure flight in the northern Utah area.

Tooele Valley airport is located just southeast of the crash site.

McGurk could not say for sure how many people were on board the plane, which seats four.

A thorough search of the crash site uncovered only two bodies.

POCATELLO (AP) — The Bureau of Land Management and U.S. Forest Service have given right-of-way authorization for J.R. Simplot Co. to build a \$30 million phosphate slurry pipeline from Soda Springs to Pocatello.

"We appreciate the interest and input we received from the public during our analysis of the project," Wallace Evans, BLM area manager in Pocatello, said Thursday.

The decision made Tuesday will allow Simplot to build a nine-inch pipeline from its Conda operation north of Soda Springs to its fertilizer manufacturing plant west of Pocatello. Construction of the 58-mile pipeline, which will cross 10 miles of federal land, is scheduled to begin in 1991.

Forester: Timber quota can be met
PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — The U.S. Forest Service can meet a timber sales quota being considered by Congress, the agency's regional forester for the Pacific Northwest said Thursday.

Doubt was cast over the agency's ability to sell 8 billion board feet of timber over the next 13 months after published reports quoting Forest Service officials said the sales program would negate the agency's plan for protecting the northern spotted owl.

Dam lock repair ahead of schedule
LEWISTON (AP) — Work to repair the damaged navigation locks at Ice Harbor Dam and open up the Snake River waterway is as much as one to two days ahead of the 20-day construction cycle, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers officials say.

But they caution that crews face a number of hurdles before the river is reopened to commercial traffic.

Key to the pace of the repairs will be testing of new equipment now being installed at the site, located three miles upstream from Burbank, Wash.

Bombing range expansion welcome, with reservations

Let me begin by saying that I have always been a strong supporter of Mountain Home Air Force Base. The base performs a critical national security function, but it is also a major employer and contributor to the Idaho economy.

I formed an Idaho Defense Task Force many months ago in order to better coordinate the cooperation of Air Force officials, Elmore County residents and the state of Idaho. This task force has identified opportunities for the expansion of Mountain Home Air Force Base which both help enhance our national defense and strengthen the Idaho economy.

I support the base realignment activities that transfer F-4 aircraft from George Air Force Base in California to Mountain Home and combines the mission of those aircraft with the tactical jamming mission of the EP-111 aircraft currently stationed at Mountain Home.

The positive economic impact of the relocation is extensive. The University of Idaho estimates that the move, when complete, will inject an additional \$83.4 million into the economy of Southwest Idaho.

Combine that with the current \$85 million annual impact of Mountain Home, and you can see the tremendous impact of this facility in Idaho.

In general, I believe the range can be expanded. But I also believe the proposal put forth by the Air Force demands substantial revision.

Just as the proposal by the Air Force to expand the Saylor Creek Range is preliminary, so are my comments about the project. I will direct my comments to two general areas: the process by which this expansion is considered and the on-the-ground effects of an expanded range.

Some members of the public objected to the short notice that preceded these meetings. There simply must be adequate time for all interested parties to be heard, and I encourage the Air Force to fully facilitate that public participation throughout the environmental impact statement process. The schedule for completion must be structured to give the

Air Force the best possible information on which to base decisions.

We cannot adhere to a schedule at the expense of collecting a useful information needed to establish an expansion at Saylor Creek that will minimize conflicts with ongoing uses like grazing, hunting and rafting; or with existing resources such as water, transportation systems and wildlife.

Air Force officials have indicated to me that they are prepared, indeed willing, to make significant modifications in the draft proposal. That is an indication to me that, with a good faith effort by all parties, an acceptable compromise is readily possible. A number of alternatives are possible.

My concerns center on the following issues:

• Size: The overall size of the expanded range must be re-examined. Again, Air Force officials have indicated a willingness to adjust boundaries. For example, moving the western boundary of an expanded range to the east of State Highway 51.

The Air Force has also expressed to me a willingness to move the range away from the

canyon area where critical wildlife habitat and outdoor recreation is well established.

• Impact on existing uses and development: To some, Owyhee County must seem like a huge, open range, bare of development. To those of us who know the area, it is anything but undeveloped.

It appears the draft proposal failed to fully take into account the expansion impacts on many existing uses and developments.

For example, there are numerous patented mining claims in some areas that would have to be purchased.

There is a major system of roads that would be impacted and stock-watering facilities criss-cross portions of the proposed range.

The impact of those current uses and developments demands further careful analysis.

• Supersonic flights: In earlier conversations with the Air Force, I received the impression that low-level supersonic flights would not be a part of this proposal, but apparently that is an element. This is of considerable concern.

I seriously doubt that low-level supersonic missions are compatible with existing uses in this area.

• Fire danger: An additional concern is fire. Use of live and inert ordnance can increase the fire danger. Fires are difficult to control in this dry, windy area. This sort of impact must be fully evaluated.

In summary, let me reiterate that the State of Idaho is ready to help accommodate an expansion of the Saylor Creek Range that meets the needs of the expansion at Mountain Home Air Force Base. The appropriate agencies, the departments of Lands, Fish and Game, Parks and others will work with the Air Force to help identify an expanded range that is in minimal conflict with the existing uses in Owyhee County. I offer my help in finding an acceptable compromise.

Gov. Cecil D. Andrus presented this statement this week to an Air Force scouting hearing on the proposed bombing range expansion.

Despite the headlines, kids don't control drug business

Continually, we get the impression from America's leaders that drug-taking and dealing are either bred in, or most deeply affect, children, and, more precisely, inner-city children.

And since inner city is code for black or minority, we are either shown or children when drugs are discussed, or led to believe that drugs and children or, more precisely, black children, go hand in hand.

Children killing children with guns or drugs is a horrific part of America's landscape. But why is it that children inevitably become the focus of discussions about drug-taking and drug-dealing?

While it is true, sadly, that the average age at which American children begin sampling drugs is 13 (alcohol begins at 12), it is also true that adults, not children, consume more than 85 percent of the cocaine sold in the United States.

It is also true that the drug business is a multi-billion-dollar enterprise involving hundreds of thousands of people here and in Europe, Africa, Asia and South America. The link between illicit

drugs and governments and the depth to which drugs permeate the economic structure of a country are so staggering that any association between drugs and children, and particularly poor or black children, pales in comparison.

Blacks and children generally, have about as much clout in the drug market as salespeople do in the revenues of the department stores that employ them.

Years ago, as basketball great Bill Russell reminded us, children in the city smoked a substance they called "weed." When it turned out that suburban children smoked that same cigarette, it came to be called "grass." When, at long last, adults confessed to their "recreational experiments," it was dubbed "pot."

The name changes hardly are frivolous. They symbolize the acknowledgment by the supposedly upright members of society of their use of illegal substances. Our culture, however, has not yet acknowledged all the culprits of cocaine. There is just too much

money and too many people to hide. Children selling drugs, some as young as 10, have told me their

regular client list includes physicians, dentists, lawyers, police officers, athletes, entertainers, accountants, corporate presidents, federal employees — all of them adults with access to money.

Children must be educated about and protected from drugs. But the realities of this culture cannot any longer be hidden or denied. Adults set the rules and become the role models. The kids merely mimic the adults.

Children must learn the truths as well as the metaphors of the intriguingly named drug-war, but emphasis must be placed first on the real combatants: rich adults in powerful positions. Drug-related gang slayings make for dramatic headlines and television footage. But the undramatic, unfilmable moment-by-moment business transactions that constitute drug traffic are where the men reside.

Children remain one of the last groups used as objects of stinging, belittling humor. They aren't all that loved in this country: their health, education, housing, employment and welfare have never been priorities.

We weep when children die, wince when they're injured, cheer when they win Olympic medals, but too many of us probably wish they had disappeared early in childhood (sometime around the terrible 2s or rotten 5s). We wish they would reappear early in their 20s with

rebellions dissipated, careers in hand, and all signs of puberty and acne vanished.

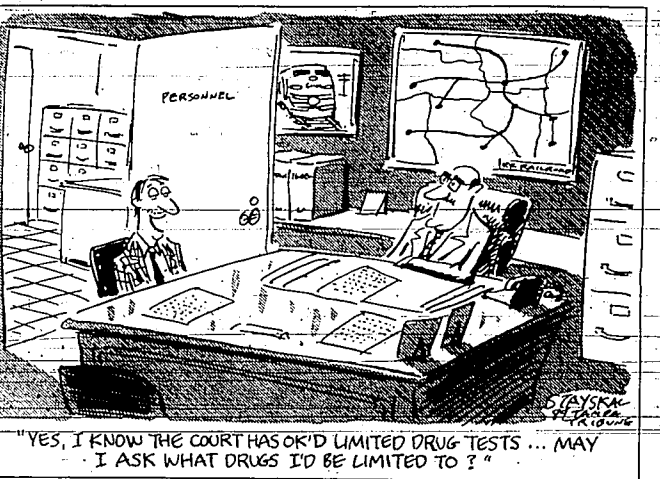
In the drug business, we would do better looking out for the kids, while looking directly into the eyes of their elders. When the White House staff prepares the president's next list of venues for drug speeches and

public relations campaigns, it may want to think less of high school auditoriums and graduation ceremonies, and more about

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American high schools need much higher academic standards

It is back-to-school time, and I am simultaneously exhilarated and indignant.

For me, the most hopeful noise in the world is the cracking of the glue on new textbooks. On opening day, even the surly barbarians of last spring are smiling. Colleagues are full of wows.

That explains the exhilaration. The indignation comes from our cowardly failure to face up to our shortcomings. American higher education is the best in the world, primary education holds its own, but secondary education is an embarrassment.

Most serious educators and our recent secretaries of education would agree, but neither the education establishment nor state legislators have produced measures that speak to the heart of the crisis, which is that our students graduate from high school not knowing much. There are at least four pretty obvious reasons for the nation at risk

badly educated and overburdened teachers, a namby-pamby weakness of will resulting in the fear of setting real standards, the lack of an enforcing national tradition of restraint and discipline, and a cultural disrespect for the life of the mind. Neither the educational establishment nor state legislators can do much to immediately correct the third and fourth problems, but they could help correct the first and the second.

The recent reform movement has prompted better teacher pay in some school districts as if that in itself will buy brains, gloss over difficult working conditions and create a profession. Money alone won't attract and develop talent. Most of the intelligent former teachers I have known say that they gave up on public high schools

because the social expectations were too high, the academic expectations were too low, the syllabus was out of their hands and there were too damn many papers to grade.

To attract and develop the best and brightest teachers, reformers will have to institute two bold but simple measures: First, halve the number of students in the classroom. Second, organize professional teaching schools.

The first measure would be even more expensive than increasing pay, but it would do more than anything else to improve working conditions. The main reason private schools offer superior education is that they have a much lower student-faculty ratio.

The second measure would cost nothing extra and could be achieved in a single, bold meeting. Eliminate the time-consuming and silly undergraduate education department requirements freeing

the serious students to pursue solid majors.

Then establish master of arts in teaching programs within existing graduate schools with selective admissions and tough academic requirements so that teachers-to-be, while taking a few courses in pedagogy, could specialize in a field side-by-side with future researchers, scholars and college professors in that field. With higher pay, better working conditions and more rigorous graduate training, teaching might at last have the prestige of the other professions, and prestige, after all, motivates.

To such teachers, well-prepared and issuing from the intellectual elite, the syllabus might be entrusted. They would be free to work with the texts that they deemed most useful and to develop the skills that they thought their students needed most, just as doctors and lawyers and engineers, while they must uphold standards of care, have

much independence in the manner of maintaining those standards.

But true reform would have to make demands of students as well. I would propose state achievement tests. Such exams might seem elitist in American eyes, and they are if by "elitist" one means selective of the intelligent and knowledgeable; but they are radically egalitarian in that natural aptitude and personal achievement carry the day.

Intellectual standards would probably offend the sappiest American notions about democracy, which would seem to be shocked by republicanism Thomas Jefferson's idea of the "natural aristocracy," the most precious gift of nature for the instruction, the trusts and the government of society."

The responsibility for the junior high situation lies directly with Richard Kugler, who has known about the faulty system since last spring.

Tritium production to resume in 1990

WASHINGTON (AP) — Production of a radioactive gas used to make nuclear warheads, interrupted for more than a year because of safety problems, will resume in the fall of 1990, Energy Secretary James D. Watkins announced Thursday.

Watkins said that power testing of the tritium-producing K reactor at the government's Savannah River complex in South Carolina would start late next summer, and that the two other active reactors there would be restarted at subsequent three-month intervals.

Production of tritium — originally thought possible to resume in the summer of 1988 — will start sometime in the October-December quarter of 1990, he said.

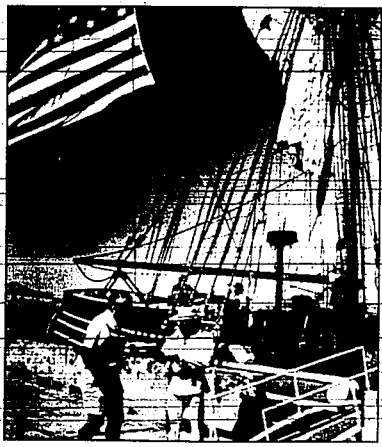
The reactors are the nation's only source of tritium, a man-made hydrogen isotope that is used to boost the destructive power of nuclear weapons using plutonium, and to power the even more destructive thermonuclear weapons.

All three have been shut down for more than a year and have been undergoing extensive repairs and improvements to meet Watkins' safety requirements.

Environmental groups criticized the Watkins announcement of a restart schedule, saying it would bring the reactors on line before all safety questions are answered.

"The Energy Department is certainly not putting safety first — restart is still number one," said Brian Costner, director of the Energy Research Foundation, a Columbia, S.C.-based group that wants the reactors closed down permanently.

Costner's group joined the environmental groups Greenpeace and the Natural Resources Defense Council in urging the Energy Department last December to compel Watkins to complete an environmental impact statement before restarting the reactors.

Senators approve insurance changes

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senate tax writers, yielding to loud complaints from many older Americans, indicated Thursday they would join their House counterparts and go along with major changes in Medicare insurance covering the costs of a catastrophic illness.

Several members of the Senate Finance Committee, however, rejected a revision approved by the House Ways and Means Committee to cut costs for the higher-income elderly but raise them for older people with lower incomes.

"I want to make it clear at the outset that, as chairman, I will oppose any increase in the flat premium paid by retirees of modest means," said Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, D-Texas, who heads the Finance Committee.

"We should neither repeal ... (catastrophic coverage) nor shift a greater share of costs ... to beneficiaries who can least afford them," said Sen. Spark Matsunaga, D-Hawaii.

Meanwhile, Republican congressional leaders met with President Bush at the White House. Sen. Pete Domenici, R-N.M., told

reporters afterward that several of the lawmakers told Bush the catastrophic care act "ought to be repealed in toto."

The program, enacted barely a year ago, is under fire from some older Americans who say they don't need the protection and from others — mainly those with higher incomes — who object that the coverage is financed only by the elderly and not by all taxpayers.

About two-thirds of the cost of the catastrophic care insurance program is paid by the 41 percent of older citizens whose incomes are high enough that they owe federal income tax of more than \$10. They pay a surtax of 15 percent on income tax above \$150, about 1.8 million of the 33 million Medicare beneficiaries will pay the maximum surtax of \$800 this year.

The surtax rate is due to increase to 28 percent and the maximum surtax to \$1,050 by 1993.

The rest of the cost is financed through a flat fee of \$4 per month per retiree. That fee is due to rise to \$10.20 by 1993.

Complaints from the elderly prompted the changes.

Bush pushes defense, drug policy, waves flag

BALTIMORE — President Bush pushed for support of increased defense spending and his new drug policy Thursday, calling for "freedom from fear of war abroad and drugs and crime at home."

Speaking at the 71st national convention of the American Legion here, Bush praised Colombian President Virgilio Barco for extraditing an accused major figure in a South American money-laundering operation run by the Medellín cocaine cartel there.

He said that the extradition Wednesday of Eduardo Martinez Romero, indicted in Atlanta, "sends a strong signal of the courage and

determination of President Barco and the Colombian government to deal with this scourge, which drugs are inflicting on all of us."

Bush pushed hard for his \$7.9 billion anti-drug plan and said that its implementation "will require the bravery" and "sacrifice" that Americans have shown before and must again.

"You, as veterans, know how battles are often fought, house to house, block by block," the president said. "Well, we'll win this battle the same way. We're going to win it kid by kid, neighborhood by neighborhood."

Citing a "new breeze of freedom" around the world, Bush said that the U.S. must remain strong.

PTL official denies knowing of Hahn payoff

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP) — A former PTL board member testified Thursday he didn't know about a \$250,000 payoff to Jessica Hahn until two months before Bakker quit the television ministry over the sex and money scandal.

"I never knew the name Jessica Hahn until January 1987," Ernie Franzone of Fort Lauderdale, Fla., said at Bakker's federal trial on fraud and conspiracy charges.

Other testimony centered on cash flow problems at the ministry, including problems at its flagship hotel at the same time Bakker was insisting on such touches as a \$15,000 chandelier, "despite millions of

dollars that were pledged daily."

PTL paid Ms. Hahn \$250,000 in 1985 to keep quiet about her sexual encounter with Bakker on Dec. 6, 1980, at a Florida hotel. Bakker resigned in March 1987 as PTL chief. The Hahn payment was made by PTL's builder, who then added the amount to his bill.

Bakker, 49, is being tried on 24 counts of fraud and conspiracy. Prosecutors say Bakker used nearly \$4 million in ministry funds obtained from the sale of partnerships in the ministry's hotel to bankroll his extravagant lifestyle.

Thursday was the first full day of testimony after the trial resumed

following Bakker's breakdown and commitment in a federal prison for psychiatric evaluation last week.

U.S. District Judge Robert Potter let the trial resume Wednesday, and denied a defense motion for a mistrial after a government psychiatrist testified that Bakker had suffered a "panic attack" last week but was competent to stand trial.

Bakker was composed during Thursday's testimony, taking notes and talking with his attorneys as witnesses testified.

Franzone, regional manager of the company that managed Bakker's Heritage Grand Hotel, said he wouldn't have approved bonuses for

Bakker, his wife, Tammy, and former PTL Executive Vice President Richard Dortch had been known about Ms. Hahn. Dortch has been sentenced to eight years in prison and fined \$200,000 for his guilty plea to four fraud and conspiracy charges.

"That would have been the red light for me," Franzone testified. "I would have taken another look at whether I would have stayed on the board."

Franzone also said he never remembered voting a bonus for Bakker — of more than \$100,000 although the board's minutes show Bakker got several of them.

Teacher strikes affect 160,000 students

Teachers strikes disrupted classes for more than 160,000 pupils in nine states Thursday, including a Rhode Island dispute, the school board labeled the state's first illegal strike in three years.

The union representing the 190 teachers in Bristol, R.I., called the job action that began Wednesday

in 1986. The two sides bargained over pay and other issues until early this morning and planned to go back to the table later in the day. Officials said that the School Committee may take legal action if the stoppage continues.

Hurricane Gabrielle lashes Bermuda

MIAMI (AP) — Tropical storm-force winds swept the island of Bermuda on Thursday, forcing boats to stay in port as a weakened Hurricane Gabrielle approached. Hurricane Felix, meanwhile, dwindled into a tropical storm.

Gabrielle was heading due north, with its center passing about 300 miles east of Bermuda late Thursday, forecasters said.

The hurricane's winds have

weakened from 135 mph to 116 mph, and were expected to remain steady until the storm passed Bermuda.

"The winds won't change much until it reaches cooler waters," said Bob Sheets, director of the National Hurricane Center.

Swells in Bermuda's harbors were reported at 10 feet, and the island's eastward reported swells of 15 to 20 feet. The high seas, combined with winds of 30 to 35 mph, prevented any

seagoing traffic around the island.

Otherwise, Bermuda's residents were making few preparations for the storm, Sheets said.

"Strong winds stretched as far as 1,000 miles from Gabrielle's center, reaching the U.S. East Coast."

"A ship 60 miles off the coast of Long Island reported seeing 12- to 15-foot seas," Sheets said. High seas were also reported off the coast of North Carolina.

Measles cases rise

ATLANTA (AP) — More than 10,000 measles cases were reported in the United States in the first eight months of this year — three times the number reported all last year.

The national Centers for Disease Control blamed the 1989 increase, which follows two years of declines, on the failure to vaccinate young children and ineffective vaccinations.

The CDC said that 10,115 cases of measles have been reported thus far in 1989.

Smetek was booked for investigation of weapons offenses. Bail was set at \$25,000.

"She just hopes that she seeks the help he needs," said Bateman's publicist, Cindy Guagenti.

Smetek kept police at bay for three hours, holding a loaded gun to his abdomen and forcing cancellation of a midway rehearsal. "He just wants to talk with her and indicate his love fixation with her," said Lt. Robert Peters.

Earlier this year, police said Smetek claimed to be a producer and tried to speak to Bateman at the "Family Ties" sound stage in Hollywood.

He first appeared outside the

Berkeley theater Friday, and Bateman "more or less brushed him off," Peters said. When she saw him the next day, she notified police, who questioned Smetek, but "he really hadn't committed any crimes."

Richard Griffoli, a spokesman for the theater, said the theater had hired security guards and circulated Smetek's description among employees.

"Justine was aware that he was pursuing her and took the situation seriously," said Guagenti.

"It's no joke," said Griffoli. "The type of thing is the worst scenario for a person in the public eye."

The incident was the latest in a series of security threats to celebrities.

Hispanic immigrants show power at polls

WASHINGTON (AP) — Hispanic immigrants register to vote at a significantly higher rate than most Americans and are "almost up for grabs" by both Republicans and Democrats because many have not decided which party they favor, a Latino group said in announcing results of a survey on Thursday.

The telephone survey of 1,635 immigrants from 17 nations showed that 81 percent of the naturalized immigrants are registered to vote, compared with 70 percent of the general U.S. voting age population, the National Association of Latino Elected and Appointed Officials said.

Forty-nine percent of those interviewed, all of whom were either naturalized citizens or legal permanent residents of the United States, said they had "no preference" between the major U.S. political parties.

"This is a large population that is almost up for grabs," said Rep. Edward Roybal, D-Calif., president of the association's educational fund, which conducted the survey.

Republicans and Democrats have an open field to go out into the Latin community and convince them that their party and platform is the best," said Roybal, a Hispanic from a Los Angeles district with the heaviest concentration of Hispanics in his state.

He said the Southwest, and California in particular, "will have a vast reservoir of people who haven't made their minds up yet, but they do register."

"Despite the myths of the past, they will be registering in high numbers and will be getting out

to the polls in high numbers," Roybal said.

The study gave no overall figure on the number of Hispanic immigrants in the United States, but said more than one-and-a-half million have legally entered the country in the past decade and they will soon be the largest ethnic minority in the country.

A study in April by the Center for Political Studies at the University of Michigan showed that among Hispanic citizens who had made a choice, 63 percent of Cubans considered themselves Republicans, 9 percent Democrats, 13 percent independents and 16 percent no preference.

The corresponding figures for Mexican immigrants were 42 percent Democrat, 16 percent Republican, 10 percent independent and 33 percent no preference. For immigrants from other Latin American countries, the figures were 34 percent Democrat, 28 percent Republican, 10 percent independent and 27 percent no preference.

The numbers don't add up to exactly 100 percent because of rounding.

Twenty-seven percent said they had attended political fund-raisers or contributed money, 9 percent had written letters on political issues and an equal percentage had taken part in canvassing or marching. Five percent said they had distributed political literature and 4 percent said they had helped people register or vote.

Roybal said he believed the survey indicates that more Hispanics will be elected to office in years to come.

Senators frank about drug ballot

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate, forced to choose between preserving its members' mass-mailing privileges and approving aid for drug rehabilitation programs, voted overwhelmingly Thursday to give \$46 million to help addicted pregnant women, mothers and infants.

Faced with a recorded vote on whether to slash money for unsolicited mailings, the Senate decided 83-9 to approve the amendment, which was attached to a \$2 billion legislative-expense budget-for-fiscal-1990.

Republicans, led by Sen. Pete Wilson, R-Calif., proposed the measure Wednesday. It was aimed at transferring to drug treatment programs a large sum of money from the account legislators use for their mailings.

The Senate scheduled a final vote on the overall legislative appropriations bill later in the day.

Smoke ban may hit all flights

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Senate committee agreed Thursday to permanently prohibit cigarette smoking on all domestic airline flights, expanding the current ban on smoking on trips of two hours or less.

The restrictions were included in a \$11.9 billion spending bill for fiscal 1990 transportation programs that the Senate Appropriations Committee adopted by a 17-0 vote. The measure is expected to reach the full Senate next week.

"It's time to get on with protecting public health and safety, and this is one way to make certain that happens," said the sponsor of the restrictions, Sen. Frank Lautenberg,

D-N.J.

By 18-11, the lawmakers rejected an attempt by Sen. Thad Cochran, R-Miss., to water down the proposal by making permanent the current ban on smoking on flights of two hours or less.

The issue, as usual, cut across party lines: Democrats on the panel opposed Cochran by an 11-5 margin, while Republicans did the same, 7-6.

The committee also rejected 15-8 an amendment by Sen. Ernest Hollings, D-S.C., that would have forbidden both smoking and alcohol drinking aboard airliners.

Current restrictions, which will otherwise expire next April, cover 80 percent of all U.S. airline routes.

Envoy hopes he can return to Beirut soon

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. ambassador to Lebanon, John McCarthy, said Thursday he hopes to be able to return to Beirut as soon as the situation is calm again.

McCarthy and 29 members of the U.S. Embassy staff were evacuated from Beirut Wednesday after a Christian commander in the embattled city had voiced threatening remarks.

McCarthy spoke briefly with reporters when he arrived at Dulles International Airport on a flight from Frankfurt, West Germany.

"An embassy has to rely on the host government authorities to provide protection," he said. "When we felt that that wasn't being provided any more, we had to leave."

Asked whether the United States is washing its hands of Beirut, McCarthy replied:

"Never. We're very interested in what's happening in Lebanon. We have a strong attachment to the Lebanese people."

The ambassador was asked whether the evacuation of him and the embassy staff would have any impact on efforts to free Western hostages believed held in Beirut.

Movements of Americans assigned to the embassy had been restricted to East Beirut.

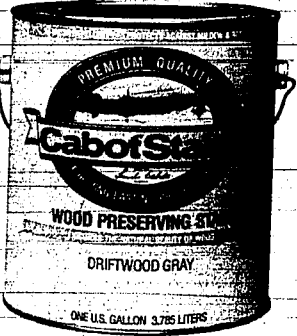
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Colombia offers \$250,000 for capture of two cocaine barons

BOGOTA, Colombia (AP) — The government offered a \$250,000 reward for the capture of two cocaine barons, and said today it would appoint a military mayor in a town infested with death squads employed by drug traffickers.

Meanwhile, a reputed money launderer for the Medellín cocaine cartel arrived in the United States, the first person extradited from Colombia during the recent crackdown on drug traffickers.

Two men on a motorcycle tossed a bomb made of dynamite at the Banco Central Hipotecario in Medellín, the cocaine center of the nation, said a Medellín police official who identified himself only as Cardona, his last name.

The blast Wednesday night caused \$45,000 in damage and came just a few hours after authorities defied drug traffickers' threats and carried out the extradition.

The government said Wednesday night that President Virgilio Barco would use his state of siege powers to name military mayors of violence-prone cities.

Today, Alvaro Garcia, spokesman for the governor's office of Boyaca state, said Mayor Marino Estrada of

Puerto Boyaca, 95 miles north of Bogota, would be summarily replaced by a military officer, Army Maj. Alvaro Mantalano.

Estrada was elected in March. Puerto Boyaca has been a stronghold of right-wing death squads that the government says are controlled by Colombia's notorious cocaine cartels, and it is in a region that is believed to be rife with cocaine-processing laboratories. In 1988, a judge ordered the arrest of Luis

Rubio, a former mayor of the town, on allegations of links to drug traffickers. Rubio fled.

The opposition Conservative Party issued a communique declaring that Barco's decision to impose military rule on some towns was unconstitutional.

Barco's Liberal Party has supported him in previous instances when he has named military governors in areas where leftist guerrilla violence has been

prevalent.

The decree is the latest in the extraordinary measures Barco has taken to quell violence by drug traffickers.

Eduardo Martinez Romero, who was flown out on Wednesday, is the first drug figure extradited to the United States under the special emergency powers decreed last month by Barco.

He arrived in Atlanta today under heavy guard.

Walesa worries about Germans

BOHN, West Germany (AP) — Solidarity leader Lech Walesa said Thursday he is concerned about "a few voices" in West Germany that question the legality of Poland's western border.

The Polish union leader and Nobel Peace laureate, delivering a speech in Bonn before about 1,000 people, also pleaded anew for major Western investment to help stave off the collapse of Poland's battered economy.

In Dusseldorf earlier Thursday, Walesa welcomed U.S. proposals to aid Poland, but said the United States and Europe should do far more.

Poland's new Solidarity-led government is struggling to revive the country's economy, weighed down by inefficient state companies, shortages of goods and a \$39 billion foreign debt.

Walesa stressed that reform could be in jeopardy.

Cosmonauts hook with space station

MOSCOW (AP) — Two Soviet cosmonauts successfully completed a series of maneuvers on board their Soyuz TM-8 spacecraft early Friday to dock up with the Mir orbiting complex, the official news agency Tass said.

Tass said the Soyuz capsule hooked up with the space station at 2:25 a.m. Moscow time (6:25 p.m. EDT Thursday), five minutes later than scheduled.

The cosmonauts carried out two maneuvers earlier Thursday to bring their craft close to the space station, Tass said.

"Everything is in order on board, and the cosmonauts feel well," Tass said.

Chinese jet pilot deserts to Taiwan

TAIPEI, Taiwan (AP) — A Chinese air force pilot who flew a MiG-19 jet to Taiwan said Thursday he defected because of his contempt for the Communist government after its suppression of a movement for democracy.

Li, Chiang Wen-hao, 24, told reporters he sympathizes with the soldiers who carried out the crackdown in June. For the defection, Taiwan will pay him 206 pounds of gold worth about \$890,000.

Ruling S. African party pledges reforms

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa. (AP) — The National Party government promised reform Thursday after suffering heavy losses in an election accompanied by protests and political violence in which 25 people were reported killed.

If the death toll is confirmed, it would be the highest in a 24-hour period since 69 blacks were shot to death during a peaceful protest in Sharpeville township in 1960.

In Wednesday's parliamentary election, the Nationalists got less than 60 percent of the vote for the first time since 1953. They lost nearly a quarter of their seats to an anti-apartheid party and to a far-right group that favors strict racial segregation.

Police used shotguns, tear gas and whips on anti-election protesters in black and mixed-race townships outside Cape Town.

Easa Moosa and Associates, a prominent Cape Town law firm, said 25 people were killed Wednesday night and early Thursday in seven townships on the sprawling Cape Flats. Activists blamed most of the killings on police.

Desmond Tutu, the black Anglican archbishop, said 23 people were

killed and "we expect the numbers of the dead to grow." The newspaper Grassroots said it had confirmed 15 of the bodies were in a mortuary.

One victim was a 69-year-old woman whose headless body was found riddled with bullets, said The Star of Johannesburg, the country's

largest newspaper. The Western Province Council of Churches said at least 100 people were injured, including children.

Leon Melet, spokesman for the Law and Order Ministry, confirmed 12 deaths. He said at least seven were related to black factional fighting and the others were being investigated.

"South African Press Association, an independent news agency, said the Cape Flats resembled 'a war zone ... as residents danced around dozens of burning barricades blocking streets in the area and police fired repeatedly at groups of youths.'

A mixed-race lieutenant said police caused riots Tuesday in the Mitchell's Plain suburb of Cape Town. Lt. Gregory Rockman said police were just hitting people. They couldn't care if they were innocent bystanders. It seemed to me that they were enjoying themselves, feasting on the people. You could just see the killer instinct in their eyes."

Activists said 11 people were reported killed Wednesday night in Mitchell's Plain. Police would not comment on Rockman's remarks.

Nobel winner Mother Teresa hospitalized

CALCUTTA, India (AP) — Mother Teresa, who won the Nobel Peace Prize for her work with the poor and destitute, has been admitted to the intensive care unit of a Calcutta hospital with a heart ailment, Mother Teresa, who was given the 1979 Nobel Peace prize, became ill Tuesday with high fever and an irregular heartbeat, but her condition is stable, said Dr. A. Bardhan, a cardiologist who treated the 79-year-old nun.

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Lebanese leader angry at U.S. decision to leave

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Gen. Michel Aoun said Thursday that U.S. foreign policy is "biased and shortsighted," then asked American help in what the Christian leader calls the war of liberation against Syrian troops in Lebanon. Aoun said the U.S. withdrawal of its last diplomats Wednesday was based on "rumors, false suppositions and unconvincing reasons."

He likened the 6-month-old battle between his 20,000 Christian soldiers and a Muslim alliance led by the 40,000 Syrians to what Americans' forefathers did ... 200 years ago" in the Revolutionary War.

Syrians and Christians exchanged artillery fire for five hours before dawn Thursday and police reported two dead and seven wounded. At least 830 people have been killed and 2,462 wounded since the artillery war began March 8. Nearly all the victims have been civilians.

The U.S.-trained general said he would welcome the return of

Ambassador John McCarthy and other American diplomats to Lebanon only if Washington recognized his Christian Cabinet as the legitimate government.

"His government competes for power with a Moslem Cabinet led by acting Premier Salim Hoss. McCarthy, who had been in Lebanon since the rival regimes were created a year ago, avoided taking sides by not presenting his credentials to either.

U.S. military helicopters evacuated the 30 remaining Americans from the U.S. Embassy compound in east Beirut on Wednesday morning.

"It is pitiful that American-Lebanese relations should deteriorate to that point due to the stubbornness of the American Embassy ... backed by a biased and shortsighted foreign policy," Aoun said.

He was clearly angered by the State Department's statement.

NATO proposal on hold

VIENNA, Austria (AP) — Greece's mistrust of its old enemy Turkey, a NATO ally, blocked Western plans to propose limits on military maneuvers, sources reported Thursday after talks resumed on reducing conventional forces in Europe.

The West had hoped to begin the third six-week round between NATO and the Soviet-led Warsaw Pact with proposals that would help maintain what U.S. Ambassador Stephen J. Loggier called the "breath-taking pace" of the 23-nation talks, which began in March.

On Wednesday NATO diplomats in Vienna and Brussels put the finishing touches on the Western

plan, described by senior officials as an unprecedented effort to curb military exercises on the world's most heavily armed continent.

Diplomatic sources said, however, that Greece felt NATO set the limits too high when it proposed requiring maneuvers to be announced in advance if 40,000 reservists would be called up or 1,200 armored personnel carriers used.

Greece sought lower limits because of concern about neighboring Turkey, the sources said.

Both East and West have said they will present proposals on verifying reductions in conventional forces.

Although she acknowledged that the logistics would be difficult, Prosecuting Attorney K. Ellen Baxter made the request because Hillman lives at home with his two teen-age children, one of whom is a 14-year-old girl.

"Defense attorney Randy Stoker said Baxter's request that Hillman not be allowed contact with his children, whom he raises as a single parent, was 'unconscionable,' and asked that his client be released on his own recognizance.

Committee tours health-care facilities

TWIN FALLS - A faded purple sign, a cram-packed kitchen and bare pipes greeted a visiting Legislative committee at the Purple Sage Manor shelter home Thursday - exemplifying the administrators' plea for increased funding.

Administrator Rulon Gilbert told legislators he gets a daily reimbursement rate of only \$18 per day per person, compared to the \$20 per day per person the state hospitals receive.

"This is a disgrace," Rep. Brent Brocksome, R-Boise, commented.

"We find ourselves stuck between a rock and a hard place," Gilbert said. "Expectations constantly increase, but in 13 years, I cannot recall Health and Welfare going to the Legislature (for increased

funding) for us."

The shelter home - a converted motel on Kimberly Road - houses about 27 mentally retarded and disabled clients.

Gilbert showed the state representatives and senators two rooms, a kitchen and eating area and a small recreational area where clients can relax.

The committee, assigned to study health care issues in the state, spent its second day of meetings in Twin Falls, touring health facilities and talking with various health care providers.

"The purpose of this (tour) is so the committee can physically see the facilities," said Brocksome, co-chairman of the committee.

Thursday's tour took the committee to all corners of Twin Falls, and out to Gooding County Memorial Hospital.

At Canyon View Hospital - a psychiatric

hospital and substance abuse rehabilitation center - Administrator Ken Deibert expressed several concerns, including a clause in many insurance plans that drops coverage for juvenile offenders who go through the court system and are placed in the state's custody.

But the state's Medicaid policy does not include reimbursement for the often needed psychiatric treatment of drug and alcohol rehabilitation for those juveniles either.

Including psychiatric treatment in the state's Medicaid policy is optional, Deibert said, but something the Legislature could change.

"It has a significant impact on the adolescent population," he said in a telephone interview.

He also talked with the legislators about the state's licensing policy, which does not

Maude paused. The two men faced each other.

Then Stubbs responded: "You want me to argue with you. But we're just here to listen."

Maude seemed to accept that, and before long was on his way.

Other fair goers chose to hurl their insults as they walked by.

"I don't talk to you Republicans," one man said.

But he won't be talking to many

Democrats at the fair either, as local party organizers opted for no booth this year.

This is the first year the fair board has charged political parties for booth space. Last year the Republicans and Democrats earned their way by turning old wagons into political outposts, Stubbs said.

This year's bare-bones booth, located north of the produce and merchant buildings, cost the county Republicans \$150, plus \$60 for insurance.

"If you didn't have it people would wonder if you don't care," Stubbs said. "Even if you just sit here talking with friends, you are showing your face."

Several state legislators, the county prosecutor and at least one county commissioner have all promised to take a stint at the GOP listening booth this week, Stubbs said.

To assess citizens' concerns, the Republicans are distributing a written questionnaire at the booth. Visitors are asked: "What do you feel is the number one issue(s) which can be influenced through politics?"

Stubbs has also started an index card file of fair goers' questions and comments.

One person requested congressional voting records. Another wants to know how to become a precinct leader. A third wants the federal government to stop sending so much money to Israel.

All will receive appropriate responses, Stubbs said - especially the one who wants to take on precinct work.

Maybe next year he or she can spend

some time at the booth.

Blaine County commissioners approve 6 percent budget hike

HAILEY - The Blaine County commissioners have approved a 6 percent increase in the county's coffers to arrive at a budget of \$5.02 million.

The commissioners this week authorized the budget and \$445,290 divide for the Blaine County Ambulance District following a public hearing Monday which no one attended.

This year the commissioners had a more sizeable purse to draw from since county income has risen because of additional taxes collected from the building boom experienced throughout Blaine County.

Last year's amended budget was \$5,285 million.

The budget includes an overall salary increase of 5 percent for county employees, although department heads are responsible

for divvying up the raises.

The Road and Bridge Department draws the largest portion of the budget, at \$933,168, a slight decrease over last year's \$935,679.

The commissioners fell the road and bridge department was operating at full capacity without adding additional personnel, Blaine County's administrative assistant, Chuck Corwin, said.

The General Fund is set at \$616,460, with \$85,000 set aside for contingencies. An additional expense coming from this category is the anticipation of a 20 to 30 percent increase for employee's health insurance. The county will also begin paying part of the cost of dependent coverage.

A change in accounting procedures has taken the jailer's salary out of the sheriff's budget. The jail budget is now \$155,300.

Sugar plant starting up

TWIN FALLS - The green flag is up on the sugar beet harvest as the first beets came out of the ground Thursday.

The Amalgamated Sugar Co. beet dumps at Bell Rapids, Murtaugh and the Black dump east of Eden opened Thursday morning as planned, said Leonard Kerbs, agricultural manager at the Twin Falls sugar factory.

The first dumps servicing the Paul plant open today, including the factory dump, the Schodde dump west of Paul and the Adalnde dump north of Paul, said Alan Swenson, the factory supervisor.

"This is what we call our early harvest," Kerbs said.

The beets being dug now are not fully mature, yet the yields from early fields are average only 3 tons less per acre than regular harvest fields, he said.

"People are still surprised and amazed at what yields we can achieve with these early harvested beets," Kerbs said.

The early beets will finish about Oct. 5 and the regular harvest will begin Oct. 6 or 7.

And while both Twin Falls and Paul factories will begin slicing beets Tuesday morning, the "sugar end" of both factories have been operating since late August.

The sugar end of the Paul factory started up Aug. 25, making granulated sugar from stored juice. The Twin Falls factory began the sugar end of its production Aug. 28, using "sugar extract from its molasses process."

This is the first time the factories have had the sugar end running before the beet preparation end, Kerbs said.

"We're anticipating a good harvest," he said. "The weather has been good to us. We're expecting average yields."

Shooting query slows from little public help

TWIN FALLS - An investigation of a shooting incident in the South Park neighborhood has been stymied by lack of cooperation from victims, Twin Falls police say.

On Aug. 22, gunfire erupted between occupants of the house at 217 Washington St. and passengers in a Ford Bronco that had pulled up in the driveway.

Benji Jasso, 19, and Eleazar Ruiz, 23, both of Twin Falls, were shot, Jasso in the chest and Ruiz in the foot.

Detective Jack Freeman, who is investigating the incident, said Jasso has gone to Texas, where he has family, and Ruiz has decided not to talk with police.

"I'm kind of at a standstill right now

until I can round up some witnesses," Freeman said.

Police think the shooting is related to an incident four days later, in which a Molotov cocktail was allegedly thrown at a pickup parked at 406 Gardner Ave., causing it to burst into flames.

Public Safety Director Paul DuFresne speculated that tension in the south Twin Falls neighborhood has been caused by the heat of the summer, drugs, and outsiders coming into the neighborhood for harvest.

"There are some good people down there," DuFresne said. "By advising police of brewing friction, he said, those people could help prevent future incidents."

"I'm just scared that they might continue," Freeman said. "I hope this is the end."

Child's life hangs in balance as court grapples with his parents' requests

SEATTLE (AP)—State and health officials have asked a court to require an Idaho child receive a life-saving bone marrow transplant from his sister against the wishes of the children's parents.

King County Court Commissioner Stephen Gaddis, acting as a temporary Superior Court judge, began a closed-door hearing on the possibly precedent-setting case Thursday. The hearing was recessed late Thursday afternoon and was scheduled to continue Friday.

Doctors say the transplant could save the life of Soran-Jensen, 12, who is suffering from aplastic anemia, a rare blood disease in which the bone marrow no longer can make blood cells.

Soran's parents believe he can be treated by a naturopathic physician, doctors and attorneys for Swedish Hospital Medical Center said.

Attorneys for the family members and the state Child Protective Services declined comment, citing confidentiality laws.

Naturopathy is a system of treatment of disease that avoids drugs and surgery and emphasizes natural agents such as fresh air, sunshine and foods that let the body heal itself.

It is not unusual for the courts to intervene when parents refuse life-saving treatment for children. But this case may set a precedent because the court also will

determine whether Soran's 6-year-old sister Adele should serve as the bone marrow donor.

Hospital officials said providing bone marrow is a relatively safe and painless procedure but the involvement of another juvenile whose life is not in danger complicates the legal issues.

Tests have shown that Soran's sister has perfectly matched bone marrow for the transplant.

The case is also unusual because Soran's parents do not object to the procedure on religious grounds. Their objections stem from personal preference.

The Jensens brought their son Soran from their home in Richfield, Idaho, to Swedish Hospital about 10 days ago on the recommendation of Salt Lake City doctors.

The chances that the bone marrow treatment will cure the boy are greater, than 50 percent, said Brian Goodell, executive director of Swedish Hospital and an expert on blood diseases.

If untreated, the disease is "almost uniformly fatal," he said.

Hospital officials asked for legal intervention when Soran's parents last week threatened to return to Idaho with their son.

"It would be suicide to take the boy home," said Graham Fitch, an attorney for Swedish Hospital.

At a Sunday hearing in a hospital ward, Superior Court Commissioner

Jack Richey issued a temporary restraining order preventing the removal of the child until the matter received full judicial review.

The same restriction was later placed on Soran's sister.

Soran is listed in stable condition, but physicians said his health could deteriorate quickly and a transplant could become difficult as early as a week from now.

Doctors also said the situation is complicated because a vital component of a child's recovery from a bone marrow transplant is parental support and cooperation.

Fitch said no court in Washington state has been asked before to intervene on behalf of the donor as well as the patient. But in a similar case, a Kentucky judge in 1969 ordered a 27-year-old retarded man to donate a kidney to his ailing older brother, Fitch said. In that case, the court ruled that the transplant was necessary because the retarded brother was dependent financially, emotionally and psychologically on his older brother.

Dr. Thomas McCormick, a medical ethicist at the University of Washington's school of medicine, said he knew of no case in which a juvenile had been ordered to donate bone marrow.

But there is strong precedence both legally and ethically that the state has the right to protect the vulnerable, McCormick said.

Bank robbery leaves guard dead; police still searching

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Two masked men trying to hold up an armored car opened fire inside Bank of America's world headquarters Thursday, killing one guard and wounding two others before fleeing on 10-speed bicycles.

An intensive search of the city's crowded financial district, involving police, FBI agents, transit police and the California Highway Patrol, was launched for the pair, dressed in blue jeans and baseball caps.

Brink's Inc. offered a \$100,000 reward for information leading to the apprehension of the suspects, described as white males in their 30s, said the armored car company's corporate vice-president, Buck Crebs.

An empty Brink's bag was found at the scene and some envelopes, their contents unknown, were missing, said officer David Ambrose. Neither authorities nor the bank would immediately release details on what might have been stolen.

"It looks like a well-planned, well-orchestrated robbery," said Deputy Chief Larry Gunnert. Ambrose said the ski-masked bandits apparently entered the 52-story building shortly before 10 a.m. through a sidewalk-level door on California Street, while the Brink's guards entered on Pine Street, a parallel street on the opposite side of the building.

The four apparently met near the rear indoor entrance to the city's main Bank of America branch. The robbers opened fire, hitting both guards, said Ambrose.

Robert Gee, 57, of San Francisco, apparently tried to intervene and also was shot, said Ambrose.

Brink's identified the dead guard as Joseph San Arriola, 53, of Vallejo, Calif. The father of six children, Arriola was a five-year veteran of the company.

Medfly spraying begins again

MOUNTAIN VIEW, Calif. (AP) — Agriculture officials plan to begin an air attack on the Mediterranean fruit fly Friday night, seven years after similar sprayings in the area wiped out an invasion of the voracious insects.

Only 16 medflies have been found so far, but those were enough for federal and state officials Thursday to seek a quarantine of fruit from a 60-square-mile area in Santa Clara County, southeast of San Francisco. The quarantine from San Jose to Palo Alto is voluntary until the filing becomes official next week.

Gov. George Deukmejian declared a state of emergency Wednesday, letting authorities spray the pesticide malathion without issuing an environmental impact report that could take months to prepare.

At 9 p.m. Friday, if the weather is good, two helicopters are scheduled to begin five hours of aerial spraying in a 20-million-acre area, against a bug that is capable of causing up to \$50 million damage locally to tomatoes, apples, peaches, grapes and other produce.

Millions of sterile medflies will be released in 10 days in a further attempt to stop the spread of the pests.

In 1980-82, the state sprayed 1,400 square miles in eight counties to wipe out a medfly infestation. That war cost \$100 million to fight and cost California growers another \$100 million in lost sales.

Medflies started showing up in traps Monday, and state officials Wednesday completed a ground spraying of malathion on a 200-square-yard area around a peach tree where the larvae were breeding.

Agriculture officials, who are checking 1,700 traps in a 81-square-mile area, warned residents to cover their cars and remain indoors during the aerial spraying on trees and lawns. The quarantine, the officials said, is necessary to prevent widespread infestation.

"It has to be emphasized that the reason the quarantine kept expanding last time is people kept ignoring our warnings about moving fruit out of that zone," said Greg Van Wassenhove, the county agricultural commissioner.

Statewide agriculture is a \$16 billion per year industry. Last year, Santa Clara County's agricultural production was worth \$142.5 million, with \$94.3 million of the total in fruits, nuts, vegetables and nursery crops.

WSU beats BYU in shootout, 46-41

PROVO, Utah — Brad Gossen passed for 317 yards and two scores and Steve Broussard caught a 66-yard scoring pass and ran for three other touchdowns as Washington State ran past No. 24 Brigham Young 46-41 Thursday night.

Gossen, a junior who was given the starting assignment after Timm Rosenbach turned professional last spring, threw scoring passes of 64 and 66 yards in the first half to Tim Stallworth and Broussard.

Washington State of the Pacific 10, 20, and Brigham Young of the Western Athletic Conference, 1-1, took turns getting the momentum before Washington State took control in the second half. BYU made a late challenge but ran out of time.

Washington State bounced back from a 21-17 halftime deficit as Broussard scored twice on 1-yard runs in the third quarter and kicker Jason Hanson booted a 58-yard field goal, breaking the school record of 57 yards set by Paul Watson in 1977.

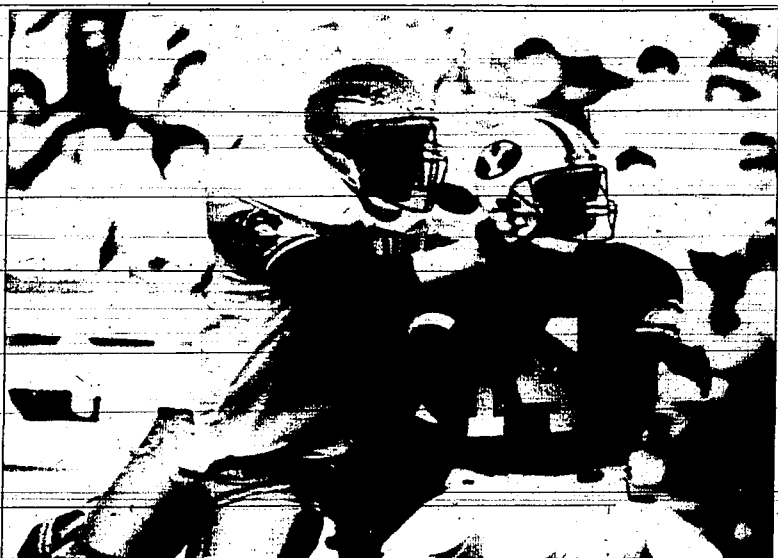
Hanson also kicked field goals of 22, 52 and 46 yards, tying a school record for the most field goals in a game, and extended his string of successful touchdown conversion kicks to a school-record 54.

On the next play, BYU's Ty Detmer threw his third interception into the hands of Jay Langevin, who scampered 78 yards to give Washington State a first down at the 4-yard line.

Broussard plunged over from the 1-yard line two plays later and Hanson added a 46-yard field goal for a 46-20 lead.

Bruins will face defending champion Centennial

TWIN FALLS — Here it is the second week of the football season and the Twin Falls Bruins find at least part of their play-off hopes riding against everyone's choice as the best in the state.

The Bruins, fresh from an opening victory over Jerome, will be at Boise State University Stadium at 6 p.m. today to take on the Centennial Patriots, a 44-16 victor over Coeur d'Alene in their season-opener last week.

"A loss certainly wouldn't kill our playoff hopes by any means but a victory would sure be a lot better," said Twin Falls coach Jon Jund, whose Bruins will be making their Class A-1 Division I Group A debut after a season-opening 43-6 victory over Jerome last week.

"I think both teams still have some things

"That speed along with good size and depth in the line will be the major test for the Bruins."

"Stopping (Kirk) Clifford, their returning leading ground-gainer, will be the main problem. They line him up everywhere. When he's in the backfield they usually run. When he's lined up outside they like to try to get the ball to him. Clifford and (205-pound tight end) Brent Barclay are their two major offensive threats," Jund said.

Running the show is return starter Mark Auchampach, who threw for 1,700 yards last year.

"We have to keep Auchampach from having a big night throwing the football.

"Centennial is a big club again," Jund continued. "Their defensive strength is their middle linebacker, Mike Cox who has good quickness, and two sound defensive tackles in 200-pound Lee Stredder and 230-pound Justin Pond. Their return good speed in the secondary is Orlando Piva, Brent Baxter and Ryan Rohde."

"Centennial is a very good defensive reading team, which is not unusual for a veteran team," Jund said.

"Looking at the things the Bruins must do, Jund said "we have to be patient offensively and we have to establish the running game. We would like to exercise ball control because of their explosive potential on offense."

Jund said a review of the Jerome game film indicated "we played a little better than I thought we did. We made mistakes but no alignment mistakes. We had some problems with their back-out offense but

that proved to be a problem of communication."

"We thought our defensive front — where we were able to use a lot of juniors and seniors — played well and that's very good because it means we can keep fresh defensive down linemen in the game at all times," he said.

"We certainly have no quarrel with Centennial being voted No. 1 (in the state Associated Press poll) at this time. They are the defending state champs with a lot of re-turnees. But we feel we play well with them. We managed to beat them last year. The thing is not to get mesmerized by the 'Boise syndrome'."

"I think a major key is eliminating all mental mistakes. It could be a great game," the coach concluded.

IAAF will punish Johnson's doctor McDonald makes his debut

BARCELONA, Spain (AP) — The International Amateur Athletic Federation promised Thursday to impose sanctions against the coach and doctor who administered Ben Johnson's steroid program.

Federation president Primo Nebiolo said once the IAAF is in possession of the report from the Canadian government inquiry into drug use by athletes, punitive action will be taken against coach Charlito Francis and Dr. Jamie Astaphan.

"When we have all the papers in our hands, we will be able to make a decision," Nebiolo said in an interview. "Be sure that we will do something. Be sure."

The IAAF decided Tuesday to strip Johnson of his 100-meter world record and to erase all global marks held by confessed steroid users from its record books.

Neither Francis nor Astaphan have IAAF affiliation, but Olan Cassel, an American member of the federation's 24-member general council,

said the body has the power to take action against coaches, trainers or doctors because of its overall jurisdiction over the sport.

Cassel said the IAAF can impose sanctions to ensure that any athlete associated with a doctor or coach who has admitted providing steroids is banned from competition and that such a coach or doctor is regarded as a person not grateful by the track and field community. He declined to specify what sanctions Francis and Astaphan might face.

John Holt of Britain, general secretary of the IAAF council, said in an interview that his organization could ask the Canadian Track and Field Association "to ensure Francis and Astaphan have no further part in the sport."

Should such action not be forthcoming from the Canadian association, "then the IAAF has power to take action against the CTFAs," Paul Dupra, president of the Canadian association, said his organization

would be stripped of any world, regional or national titles and medals.

While not as serious a problem as drug-taking, Nebiolo said under-the-table payments to athletes had gotten out of hand.

"We have rules by which money earned by athletes must go their federations," Nebiolo said, referring to the anti-doping system in track and field. "We know that sometimes the money does not go to federations but behind the table."

He said the United States housed the worst offenders.

"To be frank and sincere, the biggest problem we have is in the United States," Nebiolo said.

Nebiolo said a proposal to suspend athletes who refuse to fulfill their obligations will be on the agenda at the next IAAF Council meeting in Tokyo in January.

"We will take serious decisions from next year against athletes who do not accept to take part in national championships, or other official championships," he said.

IAAF general secretary John Holt said Nebiolo had written to all 181 member federations, urging strong action against athletes who commit

themselves to meets, then refuse to run.

"The president's letter made clear that where an athlete is selected for a national, area or world championship, or a match, the athlete is not permitted to renege on his or her obligation," Holt said.

"Track and field is not a professional sport and there is still an element of choice. But we are concerned for the good of the sport when an athlete promises to go to one meet and then decides, for reasons known only to himself, to go to another."

Holt said that Nebiolo, in his August 1 letter to the federations, stressed the need for unity to maintain high-quality fields in IAAF events.

Part of the text said too many athletes were ignoring their responsibilities to the sport and to the paying public.

"Regrettably, in certain events, there have been examples of athletes who were physically capable of taking part but have refused the request of their national federation," Nebiolo said in the letter.

"It's just a test of will," Sanders said of the process. "I'm not going to say I won. They got a helluva deal also. I feel like both of us are compensated well."

"I'm ready. I played every play in practice" Wednesday, he said. "I can start. I'm fine. Nobody believed I was in shape until I got here. Nobody wants to believe that. Now they know I'm in shape."

Fickle athletes may be punished

BARCELONA, Spain (AP) — World track's governing body warned Thursday it may suspend athletes who renege on their commitments.

International Amateur Athletic Federation president Primo Nebiolo said the IAAF would no longer tolerate the growing practice of athletes switching meets at the last moment just to earn more money.

A news conference, Nebiolo said the IAAF would view "very seriously" the cases of any athletes who do not fulfill their commitment to national federations and organizers of IAAF-sanctioned events.

"We are ready to suspend them," Nebiolo said. "It is not easy for us to stop this practice ... we are working on an agreement to allow suspension of an athlete who does not accept the rules."

On Tuesday, in a series of sweeping anti-doping measures, the IAAF stripped Ben Johnson of his track world records following the Canadian's positive test for steroids at the Seoul Olympics.

It also said Johnson and any other athletes who have testified under oath to drug use undetected by tests

Falcons give Sanders his wish

SUWANEE, Ga. (AP) — Deion Sanders got his April 21 wish Thursday — an NFL contract that made him an instant millionaire.

Sanders, the All-American cornerback from Florida State, got a \$2 million signing bonus with the Atlanta Falcons; part of a four-year package that will pay him about \$4.5 million.

"Nobody has ever gotten \$2 million up front," said Steve Zucker, Sanders' football agent. "It's the largest ever. Deion has a lot of pride."

"I'm ready to contribute any way I can," said Sanders, who the day after the April 23 NFL draft said he wanted a contract that would rhyme with his name — "Million, Deion."

Falcons coach Marion Campbell said there is a possibility Sanders will be used in Sunday's regular season opener against the Los Angeles Rams as a punt returner and possibly as a nickel back in passing situations.

"I haven't caught a punt in a

while, so we'll know in the next couple of days," Sanders said.

Sanders was playing baseball for the New York Yankees in Seattle on Wednesday night when he got word that Zucker and the Falcons had come to terms following an eight-hour negotiating session.

Sanders left during the third inning of the game and caught an overnight flight to Atlanta.

He didn't work out with the Falcons Thursday, but Campbell said he would get in some work Friday and Saturday.

"I'm glad that we finally got this thing done with Deion," Campbell said. "I'm glad to finally see him in the right kind of uniform."

"I'm happy to have the guy and he's going to help us tremendously," Sanders concluded that the worst thing he did was to get involved in the contract negotiations.

"When you're in there and they're telling you you're not, and you're thinking what you are, that's the worst part."

Good times beget fears with analysts

NEW YORK (AP)—In an economy without crises Americans might feel that something was missing, something wasn't right, something unseen and ominous lay in the future, and that something was about to happen.

The mood in itself might end the crisis shortage, since it might soon be documented as a decline of consumer confidence. But rarely do most Americans have to invent crises. "Experts" create a steady supply for them.

So far this year the experts have warned of recession, inflation, rising interest rates and a stock market collapse, and the probable reason for their recent reticence is that they, too, need an occasional rest.

That a recession would occur in the very near future is not the year began, since the expansion was 6 years old and looking rheumatic. That borrowing costs would rise seemed an equally safe forecast as well.

The experts gave the rationale: With unemployment down to just over 6 percent, the pool of productive workers was depleted, and that meant producer costs would rise. Producers would pass on the expense to consumers.

Simultaneously, statistics suggest-

ed that the economy's productive capacity was being strained. The factory utilization rate was up to 84.4 percent. Eighty-five percent had a magic figure; beyond that would come inflation.

Inflation and its buddy, higher interest rates, as most people realize, lead to recession. And even the more prospect of recession has been known to batter stock prices, housing, employment, tax receipts, confidence and more.

It was a crisis forecaster's economy, and they exploited it. When the economy failed to overheat, when the stock market reached a record high, they went to a huddle.

They are there now, studying the charts and graphs—contemplating the possibilities of a financial debacle, of a breakdown in trade with Japan, of a confrontation with Europe over the coming of a common market here in 1992.

Explanations for the crisis phenomenon are many, and they seem to bridge the gap between the two disciplines of economics and psychology. Among them:

"Good times beget fears, often expressed in the phrase 'this can't continue forever.' Bad times also gener-

ate fears, and those fears beget more. The latter is one reason why recessions seem to grow on themselves.

"Forecasters must forecast, because they are paid to do so. Success for a forecaster is in being first, in being right and being successful.

Success, however, isn't always determined by accuracy, as subsequent events show. Many work for financial firms where success is determined by the amount of publicity and revenues generated.

Often, a poor forecast is forgivable, but a dull one isn't. In fact, incorrect forecasts often are sufficient reason to offer still another, revised forecast.

"Americans, and probably most others too, focus on short-term economic information.

Boskin calls for lower interest

WASHINGTON (AP)—White House economic adviser Michael J. Boskin on Thursday urged the Bush administration to lower interest rates.

"My own personal view is if there are signs of softness in the economy from where we are now, that further easing would probably be appropriate," said Boskin, chairman of the Council of Economic Advisors.

"We see the economy is continuing to grow, albeit at a slower rate than the fairly rapid pace of 1987 and 1988," he said.

His remarks at a U.S. Chamber of Commerce "breakfast" came three weeks after White House budget director Richard Darman complained that the central bank was keeping interest rates too high and would have to bear

the blame if the country slipped into a recession after nearly seven years of economic expansion. President Bush later endorsed Darman's statement.

Boskin has generally avoided publicly criticizing the Federal Reserve, which is considered an independent branch of government, and his statement was muted compared to Darman's remarks.

"Picking fights between the administration and the Fed is the best game in town and I don't really intend to get involved. I think that's counterproductive," Boskin said.

"I'm sure the Fed is monitoring the data as closely as we are and I'm certain they will adopt a sensible monetary policy because they themselves have said that their goal is to try to achieve the maximum sustainable economic growth," he said.

Frozen pork belly futures soar

Future prices for frozen pork bellies soared the 2-cents-a-pound daily limit Thursday on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange on speculation that America's belly surplus could disappear in a package of food aid to Poland.

Frozen pork belly futures settled 2 cents higher across the board with the contract for delivery in February at 82 cents a pound. The rally helped lift livestock futures contracts: live cattle settled 12 cent to .56 cent higher with October at 72.70 cents a pound; feeder cattle were .30 cent to .58 cent higher with October at 82.05 cents a pound; live hogs were .05 cent lower to .40 cent higher with October at 39.75 cents a pound.

Soybean futures prices reached two-week highs on the Chicago Board of Trade, boosted by perceptions of increased foreign demand for U.S. soy products and a bullish harvest forecast from Memphis, Tenn.-based Sparks Commodity

Inc. Soybeans settled 4/4 cents to 3/4 cents higher with September at 55.95 3/4 a bushel; wheat futures settled 1/4 cent lower to 1/4 cents higher with September at \$3.97 a bushel; corn was 1 cent lower to 1 cent higher with September at \$2.36 3/4 a bushel; oats were 1/4 cent to 2 cents higher with September at \$1.36 3/4 a bushel.

The New York-Mercantile Exchange, West Texas Intermediate crude oil settled 4 cents lower to 3 cents higher with October at \$19.41 a barrel; heating oil was .11 cent lower to .04 cent higher with October at 55.50 cents a gallon; unleaded gasoline was .10 cent to .54 cent higher with October at 55.63 cents a gallon.

On New York's Commodity Exchange, gold futures settled \$1.40 lower across the board with October at \$362.30 a troy ounce.

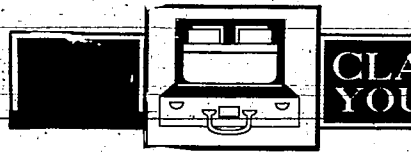

From the front page to a gallery wall

Times-News photojournalist Andy Arenz puts his best work on display at CSI

TWIN FALLS — Like most newspaper staffers, photojournalist Andy Arenz lives with the knowledge his best work usually ends up on the bottom of a bird cage or stuffed in a recycling bin shortly after it is printed.

But a one-man show starting today at the College of Southern Idaho's Sunspot Gallery, will give Arenz's audience a chance to appreciate his work in a new light, and for a bit longer than usual.

"Being able to shift a photojournalist's work from the forum of the daily newspaper to the gallery wall is always an intriguing experience for everyone," says Wesley Wada, gallery curator.

Arenz, who has worked at The Times-News since February 1985, had a chance to reassess his work for the paper as he selected the 17 photos for the exhibition. Although most of the photos originally appeared in the newspaper, several did not.

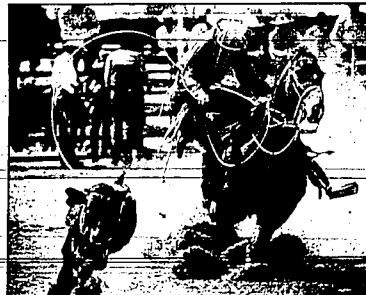
The fast-paced environment at a daily newspaper doesn't allow a lot of time for reflection, and photographers must usually rely on their gut reactions in choosing which photo will make it into print. "The one that looked good through the camera is the one you're most likely to use," Arenz says.

But in hindsight, he adds, the photo that didn't end up in the paper is sometimes a better picture. That's the case with an unpublished photo portraying a mother comforting her son, who got lost while on a school outing in the South Hills. The photo captures more emotion than the one that was in the paper, Arenz says. The sheriff's car seen out of focus in the background also made it a better news picture, he adds.

Other memorable photos in the exhibition include: "A picture of a boy and girl at an ice cream stand in Shoshone. Arenz says he

saw the scene en route home from a rodeo in Hailey and shot it from his car, taking only four frames.

"A portrait of Donald 'Cotton' Riley, a Richfield man who built a covered wagon to participate in a win train for the Montana Centennial. Taken in a dimly lit garage, the picture shows how a creative photographer can get excellent results under less-than-

ideal conditions.

"Several sports shots. Arenz captured a golfer trying to extricate his ball from behind a tree, jubilant baseball players celebrating a victory and a cheerleader consoling a heartbroken high school grifter after a defeat.

"A portrait of Twin Falls trumpet player Allen Vizzutti. He was actually wearing something that would be useful in the picture," says Arenz. The musician's dark, textured shirt was an effective counterpoint to a strong backdrop of venetian blinds.

Arenz became involved in his art while in high school, where he was among a lucky handful who signed up for a new teacher's class in photography. The following semester, 150 students wanted to take the suddenly popular class.

After high school, he attended Central Arizona College, where he worked for the campus paper and earned an associate's degree before going on to major in journalism at Arizona State University. He served an internship at the Phoenix Gazette before coming to The Times-News.

Arenz and co-worker Mike Salisbury usually shoot two or three assignments a day, or 13 or 14 in a week. Although his portfolio shows Arenz to be equally adept at action photos and portraits, he says he prefers spontaneous shooting situations.

Sex, violence nothing new to movie industry

HOLLYWOOD — Item: A recent national survey shows that the majority of Americans believe that there is too much sex, violence and profanity on the screen these days and that the overall quality of films is down.

Item: During a recent Columbia Pictures Entertainment stockholders meeting, a New Jersey man rose to complain angrily about the "rotten language and explicit sex and violence" in movies and urged the leaders of the studio to take a role in cleaning up Hollywood's act.

Item: Tom Pryor, the erstwhile editor of *Daily Variety* magazine, railed against the three deadly sins in a recent *Variety* column, saying that there "is a growing concern throughout the land over the vulgarity now commonplace on the screen under the pretext that this is how America speaks."

Item: The movie business is booming. This summer's box office grosses will shatter all previous records, and according to industry projections, the theatrical and video outlets for films will combine to take in more than \$8 billion in 1989.

Conclusion: You can never have too much sex, violence and profanity in movies, especially bad ones.

It is axiomatic in most commercial enterprises to have alone what is not broken, and in Hollywood, clearly the motivation to

"clean up its act" is missing. Movies are hot in the leisure time marketplace, and since there is no apparent increase in quality to explain the increase in foot traffic, consumers seem to be getting exactly the amount of sex, violence and profanity they want.

The greatest irony about the current backlash to film content is the Rip Van Winkle timing of the protesters. Sexual candor, blunt language and graphic violence have been staples of mainstream Hollywood movies for more than 20 years! What have you seen lately that is as violent as Sam Peckinpah's "The White Dawn" (1969)?

Which recent movie has dealt with sex as bluntly as Mike Nichols' "Carnal Knowledge" (1971), or as explicitly as Bernardo Bertolucci's "Last Tango in Paris" (1973)? When has the F-word count topped that in Sidney Lumet's "Dog Day Afternoon" (1975), or in George Roy Hill's "Slap Shot" (1977)?

To side with Hollywood on most issues is to risk acquiring fleas, but the rising hysteria over the graphic content of movies seems to be just one more attempt by the Morally Offended of the Reagan-Bush era to return us all to the square roots of the Eisenhower era, to the hot pot culture days of lava lamps and "Pillow Talk."

The problem is not that there is too much

Ronnie Milsap plays in Jackpot

JACKPOT — Ronnie Milsap says being blind has given him opportunities that he otherwise might not have had.

As one of country-western music's most successful artists ever, Milsap has never let his handicap make him take a back seat in life.

Milsap will perform at Cactus Pete's in Jackpot today and Saturday at 8 p.m. and 11 p.m. For ticket information, call 1-800-821-1103.

This son of a sawmill worker was born blind, a victim of congenital glaucoma. Raised in the Smokey Mountains of western North Carolina, Milsap's earliest musical memories are of the gospel music at tent revival meetings and of the bluegrass strains of local pickers.

At age six, he was sent to a school for the blind in Raleigh, N.C., where he entered a program of classical music training and became proficient on the violin and the piano. He also became an excellent guitar player. In high school, he sang in a rock group which played at local functions.

In his biography, Milsap says, "It's almost crazy to say it, but in some ways it's a blessing that I was born blind. I was totally taken out of the environment

that my father's family and all the generations before me had been in. If I had been born sighted in western North Carolina and gone through the public school system there, I certainly wouldn't be doing what I'm doing now."

After two years of study at a junior college in Georgia, Milsap turned down a scholarship to study law and instead chose to become part of Atlanta's musical scene during the early 1960s. He played in night clubs, worked in bands for other artists and eventually began

The Washington Post Soundtracks seem to be Prince's salvation: His so-so efforts for "Batman" have put him back in the public ear, though his songs barely figure in the blockbuster film (and intrusively so when they do). Prince's last album, "Love and Sex," only made it to No. 11 on the Billboard charts, but when the "Batdance" single and the "Batman" soundtrack recently stood atop their respective charts, and "Batman" was the top-grossing film in the country, it was only a second time that this particular dollar regime had been achieved in the same week (the other time was with the Beatles' "Help!" in 1965). It's unlikely, though, that "Batman" will match the level of "Purple Rain," Prince's 1984 blockbuster — that soundtrack sold more than 14 million copies, while the "Batman" album is just past the 2 million mark.

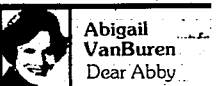

'Abyss' pleasantly mindless despite Mastrantonio, Harris

THE ABYSS (PG-13) It's perfectly possible to have a mindlessly pleasant time in this intense Tidy-Bowl bluesness. You just relax and let go. You may just wonder when you come out if you haven't pruned a little. **Writer-director** James Cameron's vision (carried with him not surprisingly since he was 17) is complete with men who say "Steady, big fella," to each other without a trace of irony. Mary Elizabeth Mastrantonio and ice-blue-eyed Ed Harris do manage to bring fire to all this damp tinder, but it can't have been

EDDIE AND THE CRUISERS II: EDDIE LIVES (PG-13) Michael Pare returns as the dynamic rocker of the 60s, who resumes performing under an alias 20 years after he was presumed drowned. Although the script could have used a polish and despite pedestrian directing, the film has a certain sweet squareness, as does Eddie himself. Luckily, Pare is terrific and the music rousing. With Marina Orsini, Bernie Coulson, and HONEY, I SHRUNK THE KIDS (PG). Shrunk suburban kids, accidentally tossed out with the trash by their mad scientist daddy, try to fight their way back home through a yard turned into a jungle of mon-

strous bees and towering foliage. What happens to them is what happens to the movie: the humans shrivel into crawling pillers or caterwauling robots and the grass and the insects and giant cockies take over. It is a special effects marvel, no doubt — but the verbal jokes have the comic timing of a mating dance by blind, jealous elephants.

LETHAL WEAPON 2 (R). Better than the first "Weapon" — because the dialogue is cleverer and the ending does not fall into generic kung fu silliness — this reunion of suicidal Riggs (Mel Gibson) and fatherly Murtaugh (Danny Glover) puts them through comic and crime-busting paces, as they battle a South African drug ring and team up with an embezzling mob accountant (Joe Pesci) to form a variation on the Three Stooges. Director Richard Donner

and company make this a super-craftsmanlike job; Gibson and Glover keep their cool and charisma even when toilets fly past them. But the violence seems wildly over-

scaled: a gaudy derivation of the great tradition of the Hollywood action movie. **PARENTHOOD (PG-13)**. Those with "impossible" neon-haired teenagers, whose every sentence is punctuated by a slammed door, might swear that "Parenthood" was their group portrait. And adult children of alcoholics might claim the movie as their own after watching the emotional fallout from Jason Robards' boozey, indifferent attempts at fathering, four decades later. Director Ron Howard, who also created the film's original story with Lowell Ganz and Babaloo Mandel ("Splash," "Night Shift"), uses these bittersweet ele-

ments like smelling salts, to bring us around after the laughing gas effect of the jokes. Robards and a vastly put-upon Eileen Ryan are parents of two sons: Steve Martin and young black sheep Tom Hulce, as well as two daughters — Dianne Wiest — whose husband has left her, and lovely newcomer Harley Kozak, whose husband (Rick Moranis) alas, has not.

TURNER AND HOCH (PG). A dog-meets-cop version of "The Odd Couple," with Tom Hanks as a picky Felix type and a jowly, drooling, pugnaeous Dogue de Bordeaux named Bentley as a slab Oscar. The co-stars generate some chemistry, but three takes of screenwriters have come up with an emery story that could only bamboozle 12-year-olds who weren't paying attention. A love story that should put anyone

over or under 12 to sleep, and a dog story that dogs themselves might actually enjoy — if the pages were edible.

WHEN HARRY MET SALLY ... (R). Genuinely witty dialogue is not exactly a staple of summer movies, but Rob Reiner's newest from Nora Ephron's screenplay bristles with it as broody Billy Crystal and sunny Meg Ryan meet, attract, then worry a lot whether lovers can be friends, and the reverse. Lovely ensemble work with Carrie Fisher and Bruno Kirby are just fight as a couple the audience is pushing together. Yes, with its Manhattan setting and "real" married couple interviews interlarding the action, it has an aura of Woody Allen, but with characters and dialogue this tonic, is that necessarily bad?

John Candy gives 'Uncle Buck' subversive comic energy

Director John Hughes and the giant, economy-sized funny man John Candy have come up with the right ingredients for that all too rare dessert — a light summer comedy seasoned with genuine laughs.

Candy is in top form in the title role in "Uncle Buck," playing a round-dish and all-around uncouth boor with a heart of gold. His subversive sense of humor mocks smug suburbanites living in their safe, little bourgeois world of white houses ringed by white picket fences.

Uncle Buck, a free-spirited 40-year-old bachelor, lives in a pigsty, drives a piece of junk that could pollute an army, nukes his laundry in a microwave, has never had a real job and lives off his winnings at the race track.

The middle-aged ne'er-do-well is pressed into baby-sitting his two young nieces and a nephew when his well-to-do brother and sister-in-law are called out of town.

From the time Uncle Buck arrives at his brother's posh white home in the suburbs, it is one disaster after

another. War breaks out on the home front when Buck clashes with his niece Tina (Jean Kelly), a beautiful, cynical, self-centered 15-year-old who is appalled by his sloppy habits.

Even worse, to the stomach-turning, mountainous meals that Uncle Buck cooks up, is his insistence on running a tight ship and keeping a close watch on Tina's lecherous boyfriend.

Underneath all of his blubbery 'gleaze, Uncle Buck is a strict disciplinarian and a moralist virtually concerned with other people's virtue. And that, of course, is much harder to put up with than slovenliness.

Since the PG-rated "Uncle Buck" is a formula comedy — a sitcom on the silver screen — it comes as no surprise that Buck and Tina become allies after a hard-fought cold war. And, naturally, both become better people for all this.

Buck finally sees the error of his ways and is reunited with his loyal, long-suffering girlfriend (Amy Madigan). He may even settle down in one

of those nice white houses where all of the families seem right out of "Leave It to Beaver."

But there are plenty of scenes and sight gags that transcend mere formula.

Among these are Uncle Buck, the consummate couch potato, meticulously vacuuming his clothing after pigging out on cereal; a gaggle of stylish high school kids scrambling for cover when Uncle Buck's pollution mobile backfires on the school grounds; and Uncle Buck putting a pompous, classic, anal-retentive vice principal in her place.

"Uncle Buck" is an extension of Candy's slob role in Hughes' "Planes, Trains and Automobiles." It's a much better part than some others that he has been smothered in.

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Writers' League chapter marks anniversary

TWIN FALLS — The Twin Falls Chapter of the Idaho Writers' League is marking its golden anniversary with a workshop this month and a special historical program in October.

Formed in the mid-1930s by a group of writers for the Twin Falls News and Idaho Evening Times, the chapter now includes about 16 people, according to Alice Behr of Richfield, who is the group's current president.

Most of the club members write for the fun of it more than for pay, although many have been published. The club's ranks include teachers, an office assistant and several retirees. They hail from all over the Magic Valley.

The workshop, slated Sept. 16 at the China Gardens Restaurant, will feature Albion writer Mary Langer Smith, who will describe her recent participation in Rescues de Santa Fe, a New Mexico writers' workshop. Smith has published seven inspirational romance novels. Four of them — "Wait for the Sun," "Moon for a Candle," "Divide the Joy" and "Ride with Wings" — were released by Zondervan between 1985 and 1987.

Inspirational romances were big for a few years, but the genre's impact has declined in the past few

years. "The market for the type of book I like to write doesn't exist anymore," says Smith.

So she has switched to mainstream fiction, and she's currently working on a book about the Comstock Lode. It garnered favorable reviews from her instructors at the Santa Fe workshop, Smith says, and she's now working with a tutor from the University of Utah to polish the manuscript before launching her search for a publisher.

Smith says she began writing fiction about 10 years ago when she realized she wanted to do more in life than teach mathematics, which she still does at Burley Junior High School. "It gave me a reason for getting out of bed," she says.

She used to write in the morning, but finds that's the best time of day to exercise. So now she writes in the evenings and on weekends, striving to finish five pages a day.

At next week's workshop, Smith will pass along some of the writing exercises she learned in Santa Fe. She'll also share some secrets about how to market work and how to handle rejection. Smith says she learned rejection often has nothing to do with a writer's talent.

The workshop is free and open to the public. It will be at 1:30 p.m., following a luncheon at 12:30 p.m.

In October, the chapter will hold its anniversary program Oct. 21 at its regular meeting spot, the Twin Falls County judicial annex by the courthouse.

League member Francis Harris — an 83-year-old Hansen retiree who recently completed her master's degree in health education from Idaho State University — is coordinating the program. She says she'll be drawing from memorabilia such as the scrapbook kept by early member Sudie Hager, a Kimberly teacher

who was later named Idaho's Poet Laureate.

League members also read about the group's history and activities of current participants via the newsletter "Writing Pursuits." The publication is edited by Bill White, a computer teacher in the Twin Falls Schools who also serves as the league's vice president.

Behr, the league's president, says the group hopes to boost its membership rolls during its golden anniversary year. "We're always trying," she adds. "It's open to anyone who is interested in writing, whether they've done any or not."

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'Steel Wheels' shows Rolling Stones are aging raucously

Keith Richards proved on his solo outing last year that simply the commanding, snaking chord of his guitar was enough to conjure up the years of rich Rolling Stones tradition.

Still lacking the expressive bluster of Mick Jagger's voice, the convincing snap of Charlie Watts' drums and the creative bopplay with Ron Wood's guitar, Richards was glad to join up with his old mates for a venture in the studio and on the road.

As the already-sold-out stadium dates have proven, the Stones could have launched their first tour in eight years and earned their \$60 million without recording a single note.

But offering a new product adds some credibility to their understandable desire (greed?) to tour. And working faster than they have since the beginning of their 26-year-old association, the Stones have turned out as credible a work as they have in years.

'Steel Wheels' will stand with very few albums — "Some Girls" and "Tattoo You" — as shining examples amid years of marginal work, inactivity and sloth.

Here is a Stones album that actually does justice to the wealth of early singles just re-released in a massive multi-CD package, while it still

flirts with a couple of new sounds, as well.

On earlier Stones albums and on his unsuccessful solo LPs, Jagger's idea of experimentation meant merely glomming hopelessly onto the latest fleeting trend (disco single, anyone?).

His difference with Richards' staid traditionalism made for some occasionally interesting creative tension. But more often, it resulted in an aimless morass representing too many of the band's post-'Exile on Main Street' years.

Of course, by then, the Stones had the luxury to spend months — even years — on records that were, by the time they were released, clearly not worth the effort.

The joy of 'Steel Wheels' is that it came together quickly enough over the winter and spring months to avoid the usual second-guessing and post-production pouting.

Here is a Rolling Stones album so stripped down that one track, the uncompromising "Hold On to Your Hat" features just a straight-ahead four-piece: Watts, Wood on bass, Richards and Jagger.

It is part of a scorching four-track opening that is designed to sock the wind out of the strongest naysayers, who will argue over the inevitable questions: Can the Stones still hack it? (Compared to what? Great White? Unfortunately, there is no competition.)

The ballads, too, are so convincing, so controlled in their way that a track such as "Blinded by Love" not only recalls "Lady Jane" and "Wild Horses," but deserves to stand with them.

There is a nod to their early infatuation with Chicago blues, too, in the roasty "Break the Spell" (tuned up "Fancy Man Blues," the non-LP flip side of the "Mixed Emotions" single).

The two songs Richards takes lead vocals on are both a cut above his already good "Talk Is Cheap" material, mostly because of the support of Jagger on backing vocals.

No one looks to the Stones for solutions to world problems, but "Rock and a Hard Place" addresses a number of social issues in a manner that suggests social consciousness but

never self-righteous smugness. The experimentalism comes on the dreamy "Continental Drift," which builds on the Eastern vocal inflection of Jagger by using the Moroccan Master Musicians of Jajouka in the background. Yet this new step, too, has a resonance to the Rolling Stones past; co-founder Brian Jones recorded the group before his death 20 years ago.

The other inevitable question raised by 'Steel Wheels' and its attendant tour is, of course: Can middle-aged wealthy guys rock out?

Can they still convert convincingly in the generally youthful field of rock? Throw this record on, Jackson. This ain't aging, it's seasoning.

Stones tour outdraws even the Who

PHILADELPHIA — Even after all these years, nothing shakes the rock world like a Rolling Stones tour.

The Who may be as prized by hard-core rock fans, and it may have sold out as many concerts (two) at 56,000-seat Veterans Stadium here this year, but the Stones generate more heat, especially outside the rock world.

Both bands landed on the cover of Rolling Stone magazine with their tours, but only the Stones made the cover of Time.

And there was no contest in terms of how many people were willing to shell out big bucks, according to Philadelphia ticket brokers.

"The demand for Stones tickets was so much greater than it was like the Who never happened," said a spokesman for Entertainment Plus, a local broker. Chris Lipton, owner of Good Time Tickets, agreed: "The most brokers around town were getting for top Who tickets was around \$200. With the Stones, you could double that."

Similar excitement is expected on most of the stops on a 36-city stadium tour that will be seen by an estimated 3 million people before it ends in mid-December.

Anticipating this demand, the tour's promoter, Michael Cohl, president of BCL Entertainment Corp.; reportedly guaranteed the Stones more than \$65 million to do the tour. At an average ticket price of \$28.50, the concerts will gross approximately \$85.5 million at the box office alone.

And that's just the beginning. T-shirt and merchandising income from the tour (applying the industry norm of \$12 per person for a stadium tour) could bring in another \$36 million. There will be additional millions from a pay-per-view TV special at the end of the tour and a "fashion clothing collection" due this fall from the Brockmeyer Group, a division of BCL.

As Keith Richards asked in a pre-tour interview, "Why is everyone making such a fuss about a bunch of middle-aged madmen on tour?"

The answer, in large part, can be traced to the appeal of the Stones' body of work — a history of great singles that stretches from "Satisfaction" and "Get Off My Cloud" to "Tumbling Dice" and "Start Me Up," as well as less consistent, but occasionally magnificent, albums: "Exile on Main Street," the band's 1972 two-record set, has frequently been hailed as the all-time rock album.

But there is another reason for all the interest in the Stones, and it's an issue that faces a lot of veteran bands these days: the nostalgia factor.

You can almost see Mick Jagger and Keith Richards, both of whom will be 46 by the end of the year, winking at the term.

Nostalgia is a quaint enough concept under most circumstances. No one objects to the nostalgic overtones at an old-timers' baseball game. Fans love the chance to cheer once more for Mickey Mantle, Willie Mays, Sandy Koufax and the other great names from sport's past.

Indeed, the real test of this tour isn't how many tickets the Stones

will sell — that issue was largely a foregone conclusion before the shows were put on sale.

The challenge of this tour is whether the Stones, after a quarter-century, can be more than nostalgia. If they can, the Stones will accomplish something that has eluded virtually all the band's own earlier rock heroes.

The great fear connected to aging in-rock has not turned out to be expanding waistslines or receding hairlines, but being viewed as nostalgia.

One reason Mick Jagger insisted on a new album to accompany the Stones' first U.S. tour in eight years was to combat the nostalgia inherent in doing-just-your-oldies, à la the Who shows.

While the Stones performed only three songs from the new album, "Steel Wheels," in the tour's opening shows here, more songs from the album will be added to the set as the tour proceeds around North America. Meanwhile, the band has carefully designed the show to make sure all aspects of the Stones' past are represented in the song selection — not just the most nostalgia-rich mid-'60s.

Richards acknowledged the nostalgia issue in interviews when he outlined the challenges facing the Stones at this point in the band's career.

"Rock 'n' roll is still only about 32 years old and it is still getting over its (pre)occupation with teen-age themes. The Stones are in a good position to help it grow up."

The recent Who tour was an encouraging sign that veteran rock artists can sidestep nostalgia. As the

band demonstrated, quality material can resist the nostalgia tendencies, especially if presented with a sense of continued passion and if the artist feels free to reinterpret the material. But the Who tour, for all the majesty of the Townshend songs, was a limited victory, a holding action of sorts, because it didn't deal with the issue of new material.

That is what adds an extra dimension to the Stones tour. There is not only new material, but a different attitude. Where the Who all but came on stage with their hands in the air saying don't be too hard on us because we aren't, after all, pretending to be a competitive band anymore, the Stones came out here with guns blazing.

They demanded to be judged by the same standards that would be applied to any new band. They wanted to show that musicians over 40 could compete and the songs could still connect.

The point wasn't lost on critics here, and the notices were uniformly positive.

Many of the older fans in the Veterans Stadium audience, too, seemed to look at music chiefly as a way to reminisce about the good old days.

Carol Perry, 41, said she paid a broker \$75 each for two Stones tickets just to hear the old songs. "It was great," she said after the opening-night concert.

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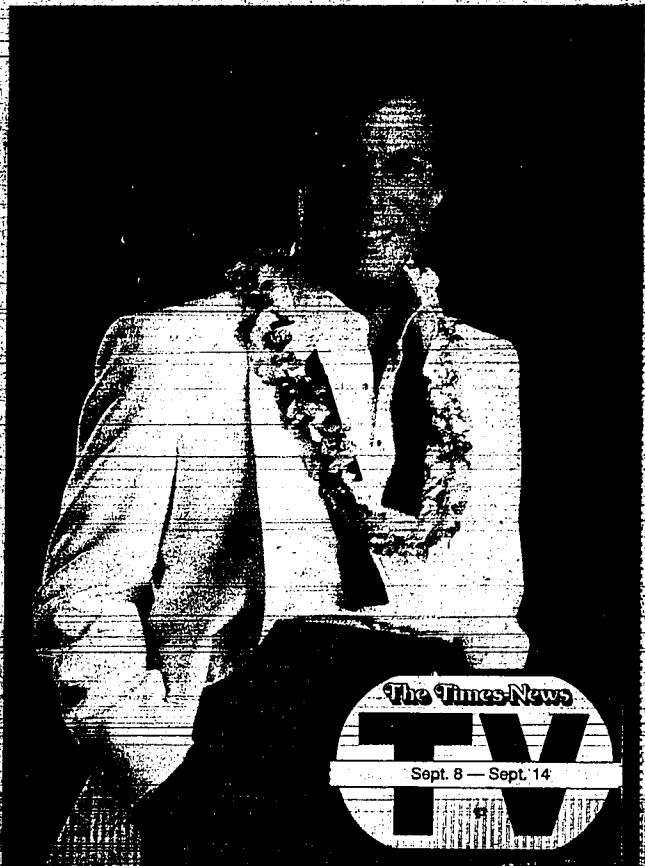

The new series for the upcoming TV season blend three-quarters of the ingredients of a traditional wedding: some things old; some things new; some things borrowed; but, thanks largely to letter-writing Michigan housewife Terry Rakolta, nothing blue.

Take "Island Son," the new CBS Tuesday-night series starring Richard Chamberlain. While Chamberlain himself certainly isn't old, he is one of a number of familiar TV faces launching new series this season. Something new? How about his character, a doctor who was reared by a Hawaiian family and who dabbles in holistic medicine? Something borrowed? Well, this isn't exactly miles removed from "Dr. Kildare," Chamberlain's first series. And "Island Son" borrows its locale from other shows whose lay of the land was in the land of the lei, ranging from "Hawaiian Eye" to "Hawaii Five-O."

Here's a look at the rest of TV's trousseau, arranged by category.

THE OLD: "Dynasty's" Stephanie Beacham will trade in her drop-dead gowns for a simple wimple in "Sister Kate" (NBC, Sundays), as a nun charged with the care of orphans. Gerald McRaney ("Simon and Simon") reports for duty in "Major Dad" (CBS, Mondays). He's a Marine officer who weds a liberal widow with three daughters. Lindsay Wag-

ner goes from bionic to biological as a zoo manager in "A Peaceable Kingdom" (CBS, Wednesdays). Harvey Korman and Cloris Leachman return in "Nutt House" (NBC, Wednesdays), as manager and head of housekeeping of a bizarre hotel. William Katt ("The Greatest American Hero") plays a "Mr. Smith"-type congressman in "Top of the Hill" (CBS, Thursdays). Tim and Daphne Maxwell Reid ("Frank's Place") play sleuth-mates in "Snoops" (CBS, Fridays). David Hasselhoff ("Knight Rider") and Parker Stevenson ("The Hardy Boys") make being a lifeguard seem like joining the Peace Corps in "Baywatch" (NBC, Fridays). And "Waltons" mom Michael Learned now broods over four teen models in "Living Dolls" (ABC, Saturdays).

THE NEW: "Life Goes On" (ABC, Sundays) features the family life of a couple and their 18-year-old son who has Down's syndrome. In "The Famous Teddy Z" (CBS, Mondays), Jon Cryer plays a mallroom clerk who lucks into a job as a high-powered talent agent. Jack Scalia is a San Francisco ex-cop in "Wolf" (CBS, Tuesdays). Steven Bochco's new series is "Doogie Howser, M.D." (ABC, Wednesdays), about a 16-year-old medical resident. "Family Matters"

(ABC, Fridays) is a family-oriented comedy. "The Young Riders" (ABC, Thursdays) revolves around the riders of the Pony Express. ABC might want to keep its fingers crossed; the real Pony Express only lasted a year.

THE BORROWED: "Free Spirit" (ABC, Sundays) is a rewritten "Bewitched." "Homeroom" (ABC, Sundays) rewrites every series about an idealistic teacher and a family member who wishes he'd make more money. "The People Next Door" (CBS, Mondays) is reminiscent of "My World and Welcome to It." "Rescue 911" (CBS, Tuesdays) is yet another cheesy wedge of reality. "Chicken Soup" (ABC, Tuesdays), for all its advance hoopla, is basically "Bridget Loves Bernie" for the older set. "Hardball" (NBC, Fridays) is another series about a grizzled cop and his free-spirited, apple-cheeked partner. And "Mancuso FBI" (NBC, Fridays) is a spinoff from the notorious "Favorite Son" miniseries.

Congress has yet to approve plan U.S. programming may invade Cuba with advent of TV Marti

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States is planning to use what may be the ultimate weapon against Fidel Castro's Cuba: television.

By the end of the year, a million or more Soviet-made TV sets are expected to tune in six hours a day, seven days a week to American-made news programs and the best reruns Hollywood has to offer, courtesy of the U.S. Information Agency.

Could programs such as "Dynasty," "Days of Our Lives" and pro bowling lure big Cuban audiences away from state-run TV?

Proponents say Cubans will flock to their sets, as they apparently did with Radio Marti, and take their first uncensored look at the outside world in 30 years.

But critics say TV Marti may harden anti-American attitudes in Cuba, violate international communications laws and cause massive headaches for Florida broadcasters who may find themselves blacked out by TV Marti's powerful signal or who may be bludgeoned by retaliatory broadcasts from Havana.

President Bush supports sending TV to Cuba, as do many members of Congress and Cuban exile groups.

But the plan has faced some powerful opponents, including Sen. Claiborne Pell, D-R.I., chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, and the National Association of Broadcasters.

After three years of rancorous debate over the wisdom of such an enterprise, the House and Senate this year voted money to begin TV Marti testing this fall.

But the Senate, before it appropriated \$7.5 million in July for a 90-day TV Marti test, agreed to hold up funds for full operation until the Senate Foreign Relations Committee holds hearings on whether TV Marti would violate U.S. treaty obligations.

The House earlier authorized \$32 million for TV Marti over the next two years, and the House and Senate measures are awaiting resolution in conference committee.

If the spending plan gains final congressional approval, the USIA will begin satellite relays of Spanish-language programs from Washington to a receiving station in Cudjoe Key, Fla. There, weather permitting, the signals will be fed to a transmitter aboard a giant balloon tethered two miles above the Atlantic, and thence to Cuba some 90 miles away.

Cubans, TV Marti backers say, are eagerly awaiting U.S. television.

"My understanding is they can't wait for it to start," Jacqueline Tillman, executive director of the Cuban-American National Foundation in Washington, said Wednesday.

"Radio Marti has, and hopefully TV Marti will as well, provide views to the Cuban people that they are not receiving."

Tillman said Radio Marti has helped nurture human rights groups, made the Cuban populace aware of the number of Cuban army casualties in Angola, the level of oppression in Cuba, AIDS and the new era of openness in the Soviet Union and East Bloc.

"All that news is frequently censored by the Cuban government media, so the promise of TV Marti, with pictures, is very important," she said.

Cuban officials have labeled TV Marti "anti-Cuban propaganda" and said they will take appropriate measures against it. When Radio Marti was launched in May 1985, Cuba briefly tried to jam the broadcasts.

The National Association of Broadcasters has lobbied against TV Marti, saying it could wreak havoc on U.S. stations, which already are

subject to periodic radio blasts from enormously powerful Cuban transmitters.

"The idea is technically flawed and there are no provisions to protect U.S. broadcasters from either direct interference from TV Marti's signal or retaliatory broadcasts from Cuba," NAB spokesman Walt Wurfel said Wednesday.

"Cuba has demonstrated in the past it has powerful transmitters that can cause interference to U.S. radio stations from Florida to North Carolina and as far west as Des Moines, Iowa, Wurfel said.

Some Cuban-American groups also oppose TV Marti.

Manuel R. Gomez, president of the Cuban-American Committee Fund, wrote recently in a New York Times op-ed piece that TV Marti violates a 1982 treaty that stipulates that normal TV transmission wavelengths are for domestic, national use only.

"The creation of TV Marti would surely be perceived by Cuba as a hostile act," Gomez said. "The Cuban community in the U.S. will suffer the brunt of Cuba's displeasure, as we did after Radio Marti, when Cuba virtually closed off all family visits to the island."

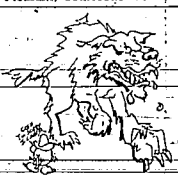

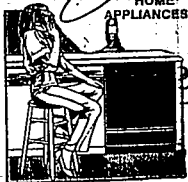

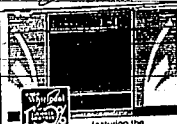

LOS ANGELES (AP) — An NBC News special on female juvenile offenders called "Bad Girls" made it into the Nielsen Top 10 among the sitcoms dominating the ratings for the week ended Sept. 3.

"Bad Girls," reported by NBC correspondent Deborah Norville, was tied for seventh place with ABC's "Who's the Boss?" It was the only original show in the Top 10 during this summer rerun period.

ABC's "Roseanne" was first again in the A.C. Nielsen Co. survey, followed by NBC's "Cheers."

Fox Broadcasting Co.'s highest-rated show, "Married... With Children," fell more than 20 places from last week, from 17th to 41st place. Still, most of the Fox shows held their newfound positions in the middle of the ratings.

NBC made it 63 straight weeks as the top network with an average of 10.6. ABC was second with 9.7 and CBS was third with 9.0.

The rating is the percentage of the estimated 90.4 million homes with televisions in the United States. The share is the percentage of sets in use.

The first of the new fall shows for the three major networks makes its appearance in the next ratings period. CBS' "Rescue: 911" had its

premiere on Tuesday. The following week five more shows will debut, and the fall season begins Sept. 18. Fox has gotten an early start with some of its shows.

NBC had seven of the top shows for the past week and ABC had three. CBS once again failed to make the Top 10. Its highest-rated show was "Designing Women" in 13th place, and in all it had four shows in the second 10. The Top 10 had 11 shows because of a tie for 10th place and the second block had only nine shows.

Here are the Top 10: ABC's "Roseanne," NBC's "Cheers," "The Cosby Show," "A Different World" and "Dear John," ABC's "The Wonder Years," NBC News special "Bad Girls" and ABC's "Who's the Boss?" tied, NBC's "Golden Girls" and NBC's "Empty Nest" and ABC's "Anything But Love," tied.

"The Joan Rivers Show," a new syndicated daytime talk show, premiered Tuesday with good ratings in the Nielsen overnight. It was first in six of 13 cities, according to Tribune Entertainment.

ABC was first among the evening news shows with a rating of 9.1. CBS was second with 9.0 and NBC was third with 8.6.

AP appoints writers

NEW YORK (AP) — The appointment of Jay Sharbutt as a television writer was announced on Monday by The Associated Press, which also said it will expand its New York-based TV staff to two writers.

Sharbutt joins the AP on Sept. 4 from the Los Angeles Times, for which he has covered television since 1983. The second TV writer will be Scott Williams, now a national editor in New York for the news service. Williams will transfer to the television beat later this year.

"This expansion of television coverage for our members is part of a general enhancement of AP's entertainment report," said William Ahearn, executive editor.

Ahearn said Sharbutt will be AP's lead television writer in New York, covering all aspects of the industry. He succeeds Kathryn Baker, who resigned to pursue a freelance writing career.

Jerry Buck will continue as an AP television writer in Los Angeles, where John Horn also covers TV as part of a general entertainment beat.

For Sharbutt, 49, it is a return to the AP's TV beat, which he covered from 1972 to 1978. He was AP's drama critic until 1983 and then joined the Times. Sharbutt joined the AP in 1966 as a newsmen in its Richmond, Va., bureau after working for The Ledger in Lakeland, Fla., and for The Orlando Sentinel.
