## Twin Falls may obtain bridge with grant funds

applications for Idaho Community Development block grants.

Typically, such an invitation virtually assures applicants that their requests will be granted, said City Manager Tom Courtney. He said the bridge over Rock Creek, which would link Sixth Avenue West and Victory Avenue, would offer an alternative route to the Victory subdivision other than Russel Street. It will also be a good alternate route for

trucks that now cross the Singing Bridge to the city's industrial park, he said.

State officials have previously said they will soon decide whether to lower load limits on the Singing Bridge. That would require many trucks to find another route to the industrial park, trucking officials have said. "This is a really good project with long-term benefits to the city," Courtney said. "It will help open up the land the city owns east of the golf course for industrial expansion."

He said the city has also applied for a \$700,000 grant from the federal Economic Development Administration. Another \$200,000 would be paid with Universal Frozen Foods property taxes linked to its \$22 million expansion, he said. A new state law allows municipalities to earmark property taxes from new enterprises for improvements that help attract those enterprises. "If we are able to finalize the economic development grant, which we expect in a few

weeks, we will have the funding for the project," Courtney said.

City Engineer Gary Young said the city could begin construction on the bridge by next May and it could be completed in late October.

Courtney said the city's success in obtaining funding for the project is largely due to exceptional efforts by Young, Economic Development Director David

## Jury finds ex-deputy guilty of accepting loan during probe

GOODING - Carl Taylor, the Gooding County sheriff's former chief deputy, was found guilty Thursday of accepting a loan from a man his agency was investigating.

The three-man, three-woman Magistrate Court jury found Taylor was guilty of the misdemeanor charge of accepting a gift from a person subject to his agency's jurisdiction.

Taylor solicited a \$10,000 loan and accepted a \$6,000 loan in March from Arthur Troutner, the wealthy investor, founder and a vice president of TJ International, formerly Trus Joist. Taylor had been assigned last fall to investigate whether Troutner was providing alcohol to minors and making sexual advances toward them, according to court documents and testimony.

Taylor declined to comment on the verdict, and defense attorney Bob Bartlett said he was "disappointed" with it. Sentencing is scheduled for Sept. 28.

In court Wednesday, Taylor admitted seeking and accepting the loan but said, "I didn't think I violated any law."

The defense had argued that the Troutner investigation was open but inactive when Taylor solicited and obtained the loan. Special prosecutor Keith Roark, however, argued that

the nuance was a red herring. The statute in question doesn't distinguish between active and inactive, and nobody testified that the investigation was closed, Roark said.

"Don't let the red herring send you away from the woods," he said, drawing an analogy to the pungent fish once used to distract hunting hounds from the scent of foxes.

Roark argued that society requires investigative agencies to be fair and impartial. A deputy's duty is compromised by breaking the law and accepting a loan from someone under investigation, Roark said.

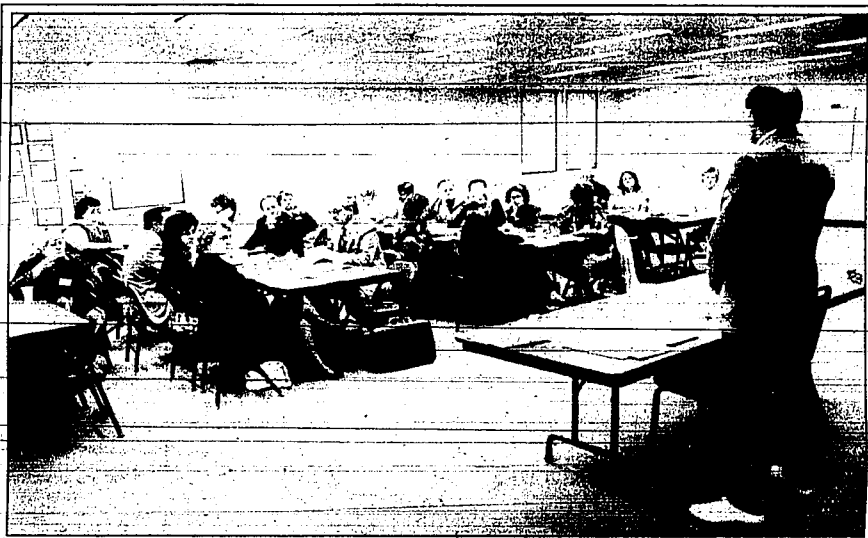
"If people who enforce law don't obey the law and respect the law, there will be no law," Roark said.

Troutner, one of the last witnesses called by Bartlett, made a 15-minute appearance in court Thursday. Before he testified, his attorney met behind closed courtroom doors with Roark, Bartlett and Magistrate Judge Barry Wood.

Roark said afterward they discussed what Troutner would be asked on the stand. Because Bartlett did not bring up the nature of the investigation against Troutner, Roark was barred from addressing it in his cross-examination.

But according to Taylor's report on an interview with one of the boys, entered into the evidence at the trial, Troutner regularly invited four boys

## Drugs In the Magic Valley, they are now available most any time, any place

TWIN FALLS - Anyone driving through the Magic Valley can go into a bar and within 10 minutes buy any quantity of any drug, says a local detective.

"Magic Valley is getting more and more like the big cities - it's no longer a little, small agricultural community," said Don Waldron, a Twin Falls police detective.

Waldron's comments Thursday prompted shocked responses from some of the 50 people attending a drug workshop sponsored by the South Central Community Action Agency. The people who use drugs aren't roaming the streets and looking the part, said Waldron, a 13-year veteran on the Twin Falls force with another 12 years' experience as a San Francisco detective. "They are doctors, lawyers, business people. People you wouldn't even think of," Waldron

said. "The workplace is full of drugs." The types of drugs, and their cost, have also changed, Waldron said. While powdered cocaine remains expensive at \$100 a gram (about an eighth of a teaspoon), "crack" cocaine costs only \$5 per "bit," or dose. Crack is produced by refining cocaine and combining it with other chemicals to produce hard, rock-like chunks. A gram of cocaine, once refined, can yield many \$5 "rocks."

## Man under mental treatment Printery rampage kills 7, wounds 13

LOUISVILLE, Ky. - A man with an assault rifle mowed down co-workers as he went from floor to floor "looking for bosses" at a printing plant Thursday, killing seven people and wounding 13 before taking his own life.

Police said Joseph T. Wesbecker, 47, had been on permanent disability, was being treated for mental disorders and reportedly had threatened the company. He carried several semiautomatic weapons and thousands of rounds of ammunition.

"I told them I'd be back. Get out of my way, John. I told them I'd be back," the gunman told fellow Standard-Gravure Co. employee John Tingle, who approached him before the 30-minute shooting rampage began.

"I said, 'How are you, Rocky?' Tingle recalled. "He said, 'Fine, John. Back off and get out of the way - all the way to the wall.'"

Tingle and other employees nearby then ran into a bathroom and locked the door.

adjacent to The Courier-Journal newspaper.

"We also found a fellow sitting in a corner that was just shuddering in fear," Abramson said. "He hadn't been shot, but he was in shock."

Five of the wounded were in critical condition with multiple gunshot wounds, hospital officials said. One person who was not wounded suffered a heart attack and was taken to a hospital.

"It looks like a battle zone... with the blood and the people involved there," Abramson said. "There were bodies lying across staircases. It was just frightening."

Wesbecker entered the building at 7:30 a.m. MDE with a duffel bag, an AK-47 semiautomatic rifle, two MAC-11 semiautomatic machine pistols, a .38-caliber handgun, a 9mm automatic and a bayonet, Police Chief Richard Dotson said.

"He was loaded for bear," Dotson said. It was unclear how many shots he fired from the AK-47, the same type of gun used by a man who killed five school children in Stockton, Calif., in January.

Wesbecker took an elevator to third-floor offices, pulled the rifle out of his bag and opened fire, police and witnesses said.

## Senate adopts ban on airline smoking

WASHINGTON - The Senate tentatively approved a ban on cigarette smoking on all domestic airline flights on Thursday as outnumbered tobacco-state lawmakers abandoned their fight against the broadened restrictions.

On a showdown 77-21 vote, senators forced a halt to delaying tactics their pro-smoking colleagues had hoped would wear out advocates of the ban and lead to a compromise. The Senate then formally adopted the restrictions on a unanimous voice vote.

"We didn't undertake that vote in the belief we could defeat" the proposed ban, Sen. Wendell

Ford, D-Ky., who fought the proposal, conceded afterward.

Sen. Frank Lautenberg, D-N.J., who sponsored the ban proposal and who cited health concerns about lingering cigarette smoke in airline cabins, said, "The issue itself carried the day."

The measure was part of an \$11.9 billion spending bill for next year's transportation programs that was nearing final passage.

On Aug. 3, the House approved legislation making permanent the current smoking ban on flights of two hours or less. The two chambers will have to hammer out a compromise before sending it to President Bush for his signature.

Spokesman Gary Miller of the Tobacco Institute, the cigarette industry trade group,

predicted that the two chambers would produce "a less extreme piece of legislation."

But Jo Ellen Deutsch, who as lobbyist for the Association of Flight Attendants worked for the restrictions, said she thought the total ban would get final congressional approval.

The Senate version would extend the ban to all U.S. routes 95 days after the bill becomes law. The current restrictions, which cover four-fifths of all flights, will otherwise expire next April.

As under current law, passengers caught smoking would be subject to \$1,000 fines and people found to have disabled smoke detectors in aircraft restrooms would face penalties of up to \$2,000. Paper stored in lavatories makes that part of an airliner the riskiest spot for a fire.

## Study says earnings rule cuts tax intake

WASHINGTON - The government would come out ahead if it repeated or relaxed a law that reduces the Social Security benefits of senior citizens who earn more than a limited amount of outside income, a group of House Republicans said Thursday.

GOP critics of Social Security's earnings test released a private study concluding that at least 700,000 retirees would rejoin the labor market if the law were scrapped. The new workers would generate more in income and payroll taxes than the government would pay out in increased Social Security benefits.

"The retirement earnings limit is a cruel penalty imposed on elderly workers," said Aldona Robbins, a former Treasury Department economist who co-authored the study. "It punishes the elderly but doesn't save the government any money."

The study was sponsored by two conservative-oriented research groups in Dallas, the Institute for Policy Innovation and the National Center for Policy Analysis, and released by a task force of the House Republican Research Committee.

Rep. Dennis Hastert, chairman of the committee's Task Force on the Social Security Earnings Test, said the study bolsters the case for legislation to repeal the limits and deflects

arguments the change would be too costly. "That's the importance of this study, that we can start to tell the White House, 'Listen, there isn't a revenue cost here,'" said Hastert, whose bill to eliminate the earnings test for those aged 65 and above has more than 130 co-sponsors.

"Eliminating the earnings limit is sound policy. It's basically a win-win situation."

Under current law, workers aged 65 to 69 lose \$1 in Social Security benefits for every \$2 they earn above \$9,800. The limit is \$6,400 for workers under age 66; there is no limit for those 70 or older.

Starting in 1990, benefits for those age 65-69 will be reduced by \$1 for every \$3 earned above the limit, which rises with growth in average wages.

## Mother Teresa develops chest pains, fever

**CALCUTTA, India (AP)**—Nobel laureate Mother Teresa developed chest pains and a high fever Thursday, less than a week after suffering a heart attack, and was in serious condition, doctors said.

"There is a heaviness in the chest," she said.

This is very serious," said Dr. K.K. Sinha, a cardiologist at the Calcutta hospital where the Roman Catholic nun is being treated.

Mother Teresa, 79, suffered a heart attack Sept. 8, three days after she was admitted to the intensive

care unit of the Woodlands Nursing Home with an irregular heartbeat, a blocked artery and high fever.

Doctors said her condition improved after they attached a temporary pacemaker and changed her medication.

Mike Guelker, who heads Canyon View Hospital's chemical dependency program, said crack produces a much quicker and "higher" high than straight cocaine.

A user will go through 10 to 20 chunks of crack a day, he said, because the huge high is followed by an equally substantial period of depression. Crack can kill an abuser within five years.

into his Hagerman home. The boys, one from Boise, three from Hagerman, were aged 14-17.

The first (sic) of the interview was that Art Troutner would allow the boys to stay at his residence and that he would furnish them with alcoholic beverages," the report said. "Most of the time the boys got really drunk."

"Also, Art has done some touching of the boys by patting them on the butt with his hand. He also grabs the boys on the inside of the thigh area

and squeezes the thigh with his hand ... Art does this with all the boys that stay at his residence ... Art gets these boys interested in being at his residence by buying them items such as alcohol, food and cigarettes."

No charges were filed against Troutner, Sheriff Robert Aja testified Wednesday that Aja's interviews with the other three boys failed to corroborate the first boy's story.

John Hepworth, Troutner's attorney, declined to comment on the

substance of the report. Troutner, 67, testified that when he loaned Taylor the \$6,000 at 8 percent interest, he didn't know he was under investigation.

Troutner also testified he made the loan thinking the sheriff's office, not wanting to contend with a lawsuit, would ensure that Taylor repaid the loan.

Taylor has been suspended from the sheriff's office without pay since July.

## Board seeks 25% funding increase

**MOSCOW (AP)**—With a state budget surplus of at least \$100 million looming, the Idaho Board of Education decided Thursday to request a funding increase of more than 25 percent for the college and university system next year.

The original requests submitted by Boise State University, the University of Idaho and Idaho State University, and about \$180,000 from Lewis-Clark State College. But it also added \$1 million to the initial request for \$4 million in system-wide research spending, up from \$2 million in fiscal 1990, and tossed in \$1.2 million more for special-education programs at the schools.

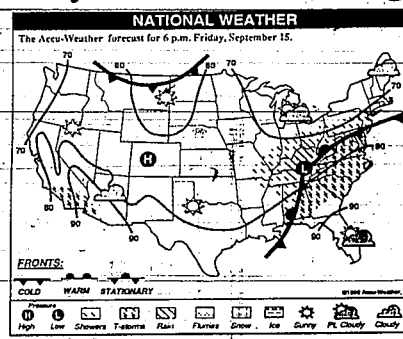

# Dortch tells of payoffs in Bakker's sexual tryst

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP) — Jim Bakker authorized the \$265,000 payoff in PTL funds to Jessica Hahn to keep her quiet about their sexual tryst, Bakker's former top executive testified Thursday.

Richard Dortch, a former PTL executive vice president, said the television evangelist told him: "I have not raped anyone or assaulted anyone, but there is a problem. ... Do what you have to do to get it solved."

Dortch told U.S. District Court jurors at Bakker's fraud and conspiracy trial that he told Bakker about calls from Ms. Hahn threatening a lawsuit over a 1980 sexual encounter she had with Bakker in a Florida hotel room.

Earlier, Dortch testified that Bakker oversold lifetime partnerships that had become the ministry's primary source of income used for operating expenses, but did not build lodging as promised.

Dortch, who pleaded guilty in August to four fraud and conspiracy counts in a plea-bargain exchange for his testimony against Bakker, said he paid Ms. Hahn \$2,000 from his own pocket and later borrowed \$10,000 from another PTL employee for Ms. Hahn in 1984.

Dortch arranged a February 1985 meeting in Los Angeles with Ms. Hahn's lawyer and handed over \$265,000. The money came from Roe Messner, PTL's contractor, who later billed the ministry for work never completed on PTL's Passion Play amphitheater.

# Bennett clashes with senators over drug funding

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senators searched Thursday for a compromise means of financing the war on drugs while drug policy director William J. Bennett clashed sharply with lawmakers over money and using U.S. radar planes against Colombian cocaine cartels.

"The president's plan is wholly inadequate," Sen. Orrin Hatch, R-Utah, said.

Majority Leader George Mitchell, D-Maine, told reporters, saying Democrats would work with Republicans to find alternatives to finance the effort.

House Democrats discussed financing also, and several emerging from a meeting said they could not support a proposal by the Senate Appropriations Committee chairman, Sen. Robert C. Byrd, D-W.Va., to cut federal programs one-half percent across-the-board to pay for a \$2.2 billion increase in the \$7.9 billion war on drugs.

House Democratic leaders said, however, they were still studying all of the proposals and had not discarded any.

The Senate minority leader, Sen. Bob Dole, R-Kan., met with Bennett and the White House budget director, Richard Darman, on ways of financing the drug plan.

# Bush, Shevardnadze to discuss nuclear arms, reforms

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush will meet with Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard Shevardnadze next Thursday to assure him the United States wants to move quickly on nuclear arms talks and supports reforms in the Soviet Union, the White House said Thursday.

Announcing the Bush-Shevardnadze talks, White House press secretary Marlin Fitzwater said the president wants to have a summit with Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev but that "there's no hurry, there's no pressing reason to push for a meeting if we're not ready from a substantive standpoint."

The White House meeting with Bush falls on the eve of two days of talks in Jackson Hole, Wyo., between Shevardnadze and Secretary of State James A. Baker III.

Baker and Shevardnadze are expected to discuss prospects for a

superpower summit. Barring a last-minute snag, they also are expected to sign a landmark agreement governing disclosure of stockpiles of chemical weapons and permitting inspection of their production facilities.

Fitzwater said it was uncertain whether the Baker-Shevardnadze meeting would produce a summit date.

"The president's view is that he is certainly willing to have a summit with President Gorbachev at any time that we feel that it's right, and both sides have substantive issues to discuss," Fitzwater said.

While acknowledging the

possibility of an agreement on chemical weapons, Fitzwater said he did not want to tie the possibility of a superpower summit to any single particular issue.

He said Washington and Moscow have similar desires for a summit.

While both sides want such a meeting, he said, "both sides want to have one that's productive and is timed to reach real progress in terms of our relations. And it's just a matter of deciding when that time is."

Bush and Shevardnadze will meet at noon MDT Thursday for talks that could run an hour long, Fitzwater said.

"The president would want to reassure him on support for the reforms in the Soviet Union and make sure there's no misunderstanding about our intention to move as fast as we can on arms control."

Last week, Shevardnadze accused the Bush administration of dragging its feet on arms negotiations. He said the United States and Soviet Union could "lose a lot" from what he called the cautious and indecisive position taken by the Bush administration.

Fitzwater said the United States rejects the foreign minister's criticism.

# Idaho bucks growth in Midwest, Northeast

WASHINGTON (AP) — The industrial states of the Midwest and Northeast are pulling out of the population doldrums and gaining people faster again, the Census Bureau reported Thursday.

Idaho, on the other hand, showed a slight decline in population.

The Great Plains, which had 994,000 people according to the 1980 census, had an estimated population of 1,065,000 in 1985. The estimate for 1988 was down slightly, to 1,005,000.

The industrial-based states of Indiana, Michigan and Ohio continue to recover from the early 1980s population losses, the bureau said. These three states added more population between 1981 and 1988 than in the previous five years combined.

In addition, the Northeast's population growth between 1985 and 1988 was the highest since the late 1960s, the Bureau said.

And the report came just one day after the bureau and the Department of Agriculture reported that the nation's rural population had halted its long-term decline.

Growth was sluggish in states with energy-based economies, the bureau added, particularly Alaska, Louisiana, Oklahoma, Texas, West Virginia and Wyoming.

But the other trends notwithstanding, the bureau noted that the nation's overall growth pattern continues to favor Sun Belt states like California and Florida.

At least since 1970, the Western region has remained the fastest growing section of the nation, with the South second, the bureau noted in the study "State Population and Household Estimates, With Age, Sex and Components of Change, 1981-88."


"The East-North Central states increased by 443,000 from 1985 to 1988 after population losses during the 1980-85 period," the report said. "Indiana, Michigan and Ohio added more population in the three-year period between 1985 and 1988 than in the previous six-year period."

## Misdirected, misinformed citizens can be a hazard to Idaho

On Sept. 10, a letter to the editor was published from Janet OCrowley entitled "Laser Warfare Poses Various Threats on Bomb Range." Ms. OCrowley was identified as the chairman of the Committee for Idaho's High Desert, and a resident of Pico. Her letter caused me to ask myself several questions and to search out the answers to those questions:

Question: Who is the Committee for Idaho's High Desert? Answer: It is a small group of Idaho citizens, who are very concerned about the quality of life in Idaho and who seek to preserve it.

Question: What is the source of their information, how reliable is it and who is providing them direction for their attacks on the military? Answer: Ms. OCrowley quoted extensively from a rather dated Navy publication, which was written by engineers and bureaucrats of the same native intelligence as those that draft OSHA standards. (You know, those wild and wags who, at one time, wanted dairy owners to post warning signs that cow manure was slippery when wet.)

The Committee's direction has been provided by a Ms. Grace Bukowski, who recently spent several days in Idaho meeting with various civic organizations in an effort to halt or obstruct the current efforts of the Air Force to expand their airspace over Idaho lands. Ms. Bukowski is the second highest ranking official of an organization call Citizen's Alert out of Reno, Nev.

Question: Who is Citizen's Alert? Answer: Citizen's Alert has been described in the Reno, Gazette as a "left wing" faction opposed to military expansion, for whatever purpose. Its president is an individual named Bill Fulkerson.

Question: What has Citizen's Alert accomplished in Nevada? Answer: Citizen's Alert has supported seven lawsuits against the

Navy in an effort to prevent and close the Navy's Supersonic Operating Area in northern Nevada. After the investment of tremendous amounts of time, effort and money, all of these lawsuits were dismissed and the Navy's position remained unchanged. The Federal Courts ruled that the Supersonic Operating Areas had been properly designated and utilized for the nation's defense.

Also, Mr. Fulkerson and several other individuals filed mining claims in the Navy's bombing range, know as Bravo 20, in an effort to stop the utilization of that properly designated range. That group then demanded that the Navy either stop their use of the range or condemn their claims and buy them out. This area had never been successfully mined for any precious minerals and was in the middle of the Carson Sink, an alkali/salt flat. After an additional investment of time and money, the Navy determined the true value of the claims as \$1, paid Fulkerson and his group that dollar and awaits the filing of a new frivolous lawsuit, underwritten by the American taxpayer.

Citizen's Alert has gone to great lengths to misinform the public on numerous military activities and has attempted to polarize the community with this misinformation.

Question: How has Citizen's Alert misinformed the public? Answer: A letter very similar to the one presented by Ms. OCrowley, on the hazards of "laser warfare," was published in the northern Nevada papers. It was then:

determined that the quotations were taken out of context and that letter, as well as Ms. OCrowley's letter, misrepresented the purpose of the lasers in combat.

The letter which was published implies that the lasers are utilized

for direct combat, something akin to Starwars. That is absolutely false; the lasers are used for a tracking system to guide bombs to the target. For this purpose, the lasers are of a very low power. Laser power is measured in jewels; the Navy aircraft at NAS Fallon, the A-6, F-14 and F-15, which utilize the lasers have a power of 18 to 22 jewels. This is very low power. For comparison purposes, the lasers used in laser level fields range between 10 and 14 jewels. It is not uncommon for downtown construction projects to have the areas under construction laser leveled prior to foundation work, without any concerns for public safety whatsoever.

One "accident" at NAS Fallon underscores the harmlessness of this power of a laser. At NAS Fallon, two technicians were working on a laser and accidentally triggered the mechanism, while looking directly at the projector. They suffered no damage to their eye sight or any other injury.

The Navy's self-imposed restrictions; quoted in the letter, is a simple case of a concern for safety, which is vastly overestimated. This is not unusual with the government's safety programs; remember the OSHA directives.

Question: Does Idaho need this type of information from outside agitators? Answer: No. These professional outside agitators, Citizen's Alert and their progeny, have not provided one meaningful service for the American taxpayer, nor have they succeeded in any of their attempts to stop the Navy from its mission. They have brought numerous lawsuits; the only results they have accomplished through them has been a very substantial waste of money and an inordinate amount of time taken away from the military personnel who responded to these suits. That time could have been much more profitably spent on their normal duties, providing for the nation's defense.

Question: What does this information cause me to conclude? Answer: The state of Idaho is going through a significant time of change. Two interests need to be balanced to ensure the state will advance, provide for our nation's defense and yet maintain the quality of life that all Idahoans have come to expect and enjoy. This balancing of interests can only be achieved through a sincere effort of cooperation. That last thing Idaho needs now is for a minority faction to divide us into two "armed camps." Such conduct will force each segment to take impossible positions and refuse to negotiate further. In essence, Idaho will be the loser if we don't cooperate for the common good.

Question: How do I know all of this? Answer: I was the Command Judge Advocate at NAS Fallon from May 1986 through September 1988. I was the on-site attorney that defended the Navy against the

numerous lawsuits mentioned above. I had day-to-day involvement in rebutting the false statements provided by Citizen's Alert to the local media.

I am pro-military and I do believe in a strong defense. I am an Idaho resident and I do believe in protecting the uniqueness and integrity of our great wonderland of scenic, agricultural and pristine splendor.

I believe in negotiation, and cooperation, through which both interests can be accommodated. I believe that the use of outside professional agitators will prevent this mutual accommodation and harm the future of Idaho.

Idaho - beware of Nevadans' bearing gifts of misinformation.

As we drive up the Wood River Valley and enter Ketchum, our attention is naturally given to Mt. Baldy. We dodge the unbelievable traffic on State Highway 75 and again look up at Baldy, not believing the amount of destruction that has taken place on that mountain.  
Trails cut through the forest, steel and concrete going up and down the mountain; and we wonder for who. The few skiers who utilize the mountain in the winter? They are just a few compared to the thousands who visit this area throughout the year.

As we get closer to Galena, we see these odd signs crossing the Wood River and wonder what are they used for? Of course, they are used for the nordic skier. They serve as an access to get not only the skiers across but for the groomer to travel on.

These are left in place for every one to observe all summer long.

By taking any number of old roads around Galena, you can observe where a system of trails has been cut wide enough for the groomer to go... the slash from this operation just piled up along the trails. 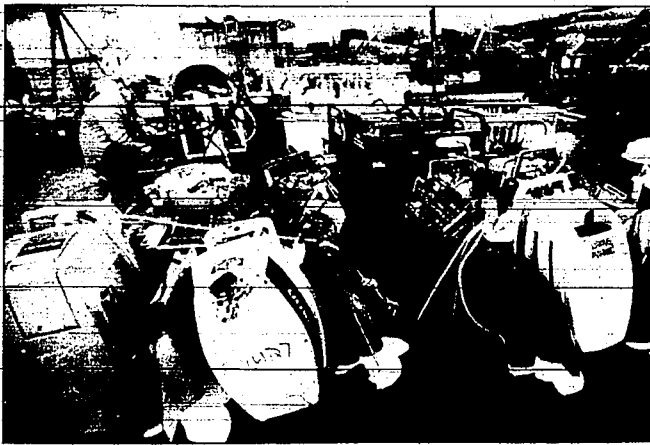

## Fishermen blast Exxon's oil cleanup efforts as harmful

VALDEZ, Alaska (AP) — Exxon's infusion of thousands of oil-spill cleanup workers and millions of dollars into Prince William Sound did as much harm as good, fishermen charged Thursday as the six-month cleanup ground to a halt.

"It's time that everyone realizes that no amount of money in the world is going to restore Prince William Sound to a pristine condition," said Riki Ott of Cordova District Fishermen United.

While about a third of the sound's fishing fleet worked for Exxon this summer, and in some cases profited handsomely, fishermen who opted to fish suffered from a restricted salmon season and a poor catch.

"With most of the sound closed for fishing, fishermen were forced to compete in a small area for a few fish. This year we were like rats penned inside a cage," said Dave Clark of the Prince William Sound Seiners Association.

In addition, businesses that depend on fishermen suffered because much of Exxon's cash was not spent on fishing supplies and gear, Clark said.

"The money spill has probably been as devastating as the oil spill," Clark said.

The fishermen's observations

came at a news conference as Exxon continued to return the last of the cleanup workers from oiled shorelines in the sound.

Exxon officials said they expect to declare the summer cleanup over Friday, 25 weeks after the tanker Exxon Valdez cracked open on a reef and spilled nearly 11-million gallons of crude oil.

While the fishermen did not criticize their colleagues for accepting Exxon's cash, they said the money has caused an emotional division between those who accepted and those who did not.

Fishermen scraping by this season fear they may be at a competitive disadvantage next year because they can't afford better boats and gear.

The money has become "just another stress factor" from the spill, Clark said. Ott said the cleanup effort stemmed more from public relations needs than environmental concerns.

Once the Friday cleanup deadline was set, Exxon began using warmer water and higher pressure to hose down the oiled shorelines faster, doing more harm than good, she said.

"The beach cleanup should not be evaluated on the amount spent, the amount of equipment and people

working on it. It should be evaluated on its effectiveness," Ott said.

Ott said her group favors a "permanent scaleback" of the cleanup, with smaller "strike forces" set up to respond to sensitive areas threatened by oil washing off the shorelines.

"We don't want thousands of people on the beaches again," she said. "It was about as bad as the oil spill itself."

At the height of the cleanup, Exxon had about 12,000 people working on the effort, about 3,000 of them on the shorelines.

The only tasks remaining as of Friday were mopping-up and shoreline treatment with fertilizer to stimulate microorganisms' attack on the oil, Exxon spokesman Jack Tucker said.

The final 700 shoreline workers will be returned to Valdez through Saturday, Tucker said. They will be joined by about 400 sailors and Marines who will arrive next weekend for three days of leave in the busy oil port.

Exxon officials have said they will monitor the spill over the winter and re-evaluate the need to resume shoreline cleanup next spring.

## Reagan meets with Yeltsin at a hospital

ROCHESTER, Minn. (AP) — Former President Reagan received a visit from Soviet maverick Boris Yeltsin Thursday at the hospital where he is recovering from brain surgery.

As Yeltsin arrived at St. Marys Hospital, the Soviet politician said through an interpreter that he had "no intention of discussing any business" with Reagan.

"It wouldn't be very tactful. He's recovering from an operation. I just want to have a courtesy call, that's all," said Yeltsin, who is on a speaking tour of the United States and had asked to meet with Reagan.

Reagan spokesman Mark Weinberg said the 78-year-old former president is recovering well from surgery a week ago by Mayo Clinic doctors to remove fluid caused when he was thrown from a horse July 4. Weinberg said Reagan might leave the hospital by the end of the week.

Reagan "has been following the visit with interest because U.S.-Soviet relations are of special interest and importance to him, and it's an opportunity to get Mr. Yeltsin's observations on what he has seen in the United States," Weinberg said.

The 58-year-old Yeltsin, an outspoken critic of some of Mikhail Gorbachev's policies, was ousted as Moscow's Communist Party chief in 1987 but was elected to parliament with overwhelming popular support.

WASHINGTON (AP) — A government project to outfit selected diabetic Medicare recipients with \$300 orthopedic shoes is raising concerns among doctors who say those excluded could face a higher risk of foot amputations.

"I find it morally unacceptable to deny a recognizably beneficial intervention to one out of every two people at high risk for amputation," said Stan Matek, executive director of the New York State Podiatric Medical Association.

But project staff members say it is a matter of some patients being given something extra, not

some losing a benefit, and that as a result of the study there will be a greater likelihood the government will buy special shoes for all such patients.

The demonstration project, begun last month, is selecting 27,000 diabetic Medicare patients in New York, California and Florida who have a high risk of hospitalization or amputation because of circulatory problems in their feet.

Half of these patients will be reimbursed by Medicare for up to \$300 for a pair of therapeutic shoes or inserts, and the other half will not, although they can still buy the shoes on their own.

The idea is to determine if the government would save money in the long run by providing shoes to such patients.

However, Matek objected to the random selection of beneficiaries, which he said could jeopardize the health of indigent patients who are not reimbursed.

He also called the study "sloppy science." Since Medicare patients in the study who are not reimbursed can still buy the shoes, and many likely will, a cost-effectiveness comparison of their group with the reimbursed group will not be valid, he said.

# Panel head: Pierce should admit mistakes

# House panel OKs tax change

WASHINGTON (AP) — Former HUD Secretary Samuel Pierce should stop defending his tenure and admit he made mistakes, the chairman of a House panel investigating the agency said Thursday.

"If he continues to claim he has done nothing wrong and that everything at HUD was right for the last 10 years, he will be very lonely," said Rep. Thomas Lantos, D-Calif. Lantos' comments came on the eve of Pierce's return to testify before a subcommittee investigating allegations of mismanagement and influence-peddling at the Department of Housing and Urban Development during his stewardship.

"I would hate to see an individual with a distinguished public career prior to his service at HUD to sort of

fade into American memory in an unfavorable light as he has done thus far," Lantos said.

"But he will have to do this for himself. ... He has not yet said 'mea culpa, mea maxima culpa, I have made horrible mistakes.'"

Lantos and other panel members stopped short of accusing Pierce of perjury during a May appearance before Congress, but said the former secretary faced a formidable task in explaining his involvement in a number of HUD decisions.

"Obviously we have sworn testimony that contradicts Secretary Pierce's sworn testimony," Lantos said.

Rep. Donald E. "Buz" Lukens of Ohio, the panel's ranking Republican, said the committee wanted to hear Pierce "address the apparent inconsistencies."

Lukens said he was not prepared to judge whether Pierce had perjured himself.

"It appears to me that while there has been greed and a great deal of unfair and unethical favoritism that the only law that may have been broken may be in the area of conflicting testimony," Lukens said.

Pierce spent the day huddled with his lawyer, Paul Perito, preparing for the hearing, the first by the subcommittee since Congress returned from a summer recess.

Perito did not immediately return a telephone call seeking comment.

Friday's hearing was to focus on Pierce's May testimony and his decisions to fund a North Carolina project supported by a former law partner and to lift restrictions on a mortgage company after he was lobbied by former HUD Secretary

Carla Hills, now the Bush administration's trade representative.

Pierce had said he was not a "hands-on" manager and took no direct role in HUD funding decisions.

A former deputy, however, later told Congress that Pierce personally ordered her to fund a \$15 million Durham, N.C., housing project that was opposed by several career HUD officials.

Pierce, in a Time magazine interview published this week, acknowledged overruling staff and ordering the project funded. It was supported by then-Durham Mayor Charles Markham, who practiced law with Pierce in the 1960s.

Pierce likely will be questioned about his decision to lift restrictions on Washington-based DRG Funding Corp.

WASHINGTON (AP) — In a major victory for President Bush, the House Ways and Means Committee Thursday approved a tax cut for capital gains despite vehement objections from Democratic leaders.

The proposal, which liberals claim is a giveaway to the rich, won by 19-17 as six conservative Democrats sided with the 13 Republicans on the panel.

The plan, co-sponsored by Reps. Ed Jenkins, D-Ga., and Bill Archer, R-Texas, would reduce the maximum tax rate on profits from sales of assets from the current 33 percent to 19.6 percent for 2½ years.

After that, the rate would be raised to 28 percent but assets would be "indexed" so that tax would not be paid on the increased value caused by inflation.

"The overall result would be similar to the effect of a campaign

proposal by Bush to reduce the capital gains rate to 15 percent without indexing.

"The provision was added in a closed-door session to a bill containing a variety of other changes in the tax law and in entitlement programs designed to help Congress meet its budget targets this year."

# Retail sales post rise; auto sales stay strong

WASHINGTON (AP) — Retail sales rose a moderate 0.7 percent in August because of strong automobile sales, the government reported Thursday; but analysts foresee growing sluggishness in the remainder of the year.

The Commerce Department said sales increased to a seasonally adjusted \$344.3 billion in August following a 0.5 percent gain in July. Sales had remained flat in June after rising 0.8 percent in May.

Analysts said the report was consistent with the so-called "soft-landing" scenario sought by the Federal Reserve as it moves to keep inflation under control while permitting continued, but slower, economic growth.

At the White House, press

secretary Marlin Fitzwater said the August figure was "an indication of continued but slow growth in the current economic expansion, which is now in its 82nd month, so it's good news."

Auto sales, which represent about 20 percent of retail sales, advanced 2.6 percent last month, driven by end-of-model-year sales incentives and the threat of steep price increases for 1990 models. Those sales had risen 1.7 percent in July.

But Michael K. Evans of Evans Economics Inc., a Washington consulting firm, said, "Auto sales have peaked. They came in low (in early September). October will be way down. So total retail sales will be down."

"I think we will see a decided weakness in auto spending in the fourth quarter," agreed Allen Sinai, chief economist of The Boston Co.

Excluding the automobile category, retail sales edged up only 0.2 percent in August.

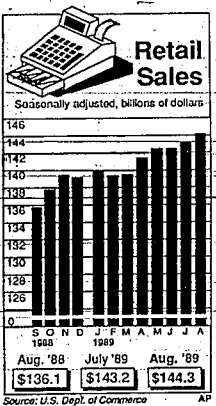
Sales of durable goods, big-ticket items including autos that are expected to last more than three years, rose 2.4 percent on top of an 0.6 percent gain in July. On the other hand, sales of non-durable goods fell 0.4 percent after rising 0.4 percent a month earlier.

"This is just the opposite of the pattern of many previous months," Sinai said.

Evans and William K. MacReynolds, director of forecasting for the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, attributed the strength in durable goods sales to lower interest rates and discount prices.

"Consumers are willing to spend money, but they have to be enticed," Evans said.

In the durable goods category, building materials advanced.

# World Briefly

## Accused-terrorist wants out of jail

ATHENS, Greece (AP) — A Palestinian accused in the bombing of a Pan Am jet asked Thursday to be released from prison while Greek detectives in the U.S. extradition request, his lawyer said.

Mohammed Rashid, 39, has been held in Greece since his May 1988 arrest on charges of planting a bomb on a Pan Am jumbo jet in 1982. A Japanese teen-ager was killed and 15 people were injured in the blast over Hawaii.

The Athens Supreme Court upheld a U.S. request for his extradition in May, but the final decision rests with the justice minister.

Greece's conservative-leftist government said in July that Rashid's extradition will not be decided until new elections are held by Nov. 5.

## Explosion in Pakistan kills 7

LAHORE, Pakistan (AP) — An explosion Thursday in a downtown store selling chemicals killed at least seven people and injured 20, police said.

A police official, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said authorities were investigating the cause of the explosion in the Pakistan Chemicals store.

Most of the bodies could not be identified because of the intensity of the explosion, the official said.

The injured were being treated for burn injuries and doctors said four of them were in serious condition.

## Entire family escapes from Romania

RIDDERKERK, Netherlands (AP) — Sixteen members of a Romanian family hid for two days in a truck carrying prunes to escape from their East bloc nation to the West, police said Thursday.

The emigrants, who included seven children, were in good condition when they arrived at the police station in this western Dutch town six miles south of Rotterdam on Wednesday night, according to spokesman Johan Emond.

Emond said the family, with children ranging in age from one to 11 years, paid the truck's driver \$325 for the trip, which began Tuesday in the western Romanian city of Timisoara.

## Landslide in Nepal leaves 16 dead

KATMANDU, Nepal (AP) — A landslide has killed 16 people in southwestern Nepal, the Nepalese national news agency RSS reported Thursday.

RSS said the landslide occurred Friday in Banjhang district, 288 miles southwest of Katmandu, swept away four houses and 25 head of cattle and blocked a small river.

## SWAPO guerrilla leader ends exile

WINDHOEK, Namibia (AP) — Sam Nujoma, leader of the SWAPO guerrilla movement, received a hero's welcome Thursday as he ended 30 years in exile to compete for political power in soon-to-be-independent Namibia.

Tight security measures were in force because of threats on Nujoma's life and the assassination Tuesday of Anton Lubowski, the only white with a leadership post in the South-West Africa People's Organization.

# East Germans still pouring into Austria

BUDAPEST, Hungary (AP) — East Germans made a last-minute dash for the border Thursday, with more than 100 per hour reported crossing into Austria in fear the Iron Curtain's hole to the West might close again soon.

Hungarian authorities said they had no plans to stop the exodus, which has prompted East Germans in Poland and Czechoslovakia to seek refuge in West German embassies in hopes they too will get to go West.

Poland's Foreign Ministry confirmed that some East Germans were at the West German Embassy in Warsaw. About 150 East Germans were reported in the West German Embassy in Prague, Czechoslovakia.

The Vatican newspaper praised Hungary's move, but a pro-Solidarity newspaper in Poland cautioned against Warsaw following Hungary's example.

After a brief lull in the refugee flow Wednesday, Austria's Interior Ministry reported Thursday that 100 East Germans an hour were arriving en route to West Germany.

West German border officials said more than 700 new refugees arrived overnight. Aid workers in Budapest,

where would-be emigrants register before going West, said 13,000 people had crossed since Monday.

The East Germans are automatically granted citizenship in West Germany and have been put up in camps and given assistance finding housing and jobs.

The reform-minded Communist government in Hungary opened its border to Austria at midnight Sunday, ending a weeks-long standoff that began when thousands of East Germans flooded the West German Embassy in Budapest seeking legal emigration.

Many had come to Hungary in May, after the country began dismantling barbed wire and other barriers along its westernmost border, and had been caught trying to cross to the West illegally. They feared they would be punished if they returned to their homeland.

West Germany's ARD television network reported rumors Hungary would close the border soon, but government spokesman Zolt Bajnok said he knew of no such plans.

Bajnok quoted Foreign Minister Gyula Horn as saying Thursday that "no decision has been made" on stopping the flow of East Germans.

East Germany accused Hungary of breaking an accord prohibiting unauthorized departures to the West of residents of the Warsaw Pact countries, and it filed a formal protest.

Hungary's Foreign Ministry said the government let the East Germans go in accordance with a U.N. human rights accord that outweighed its agreement with West Germany.

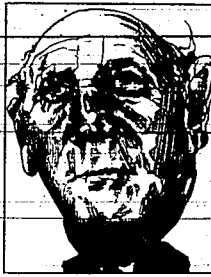


# De Klerk chosen president of S. Africa

CAPE TOWN, South Africa — National Party leader F.W. de Klerk was elected Thursday to a five-year term as president and was criticized immediately by conservative opponents for allowing a protest that drew an estimated 20,000 people.

Police allowed two smaller protests to go on Thursday, even giving flowers to leaders of one march. Anti-apartheid leaders announced plans for more activity Friday.

The Electoral College, dominated by Parliament members of the National Party, cast a unanimous vote for de Klerk, one day after the march in Cape Town. It was the largest legal protest march in South Africa's history.

Chosen S. African president the security forces. Ments called for immediate Parliamentary debate. In a rare move, the anti-apartheid

Democratic Party voted with the Nationalists to defeat the Conservatives' motion.

In carrying out his stated policy to allow peaceful protest, de Klerk faces opposition not only from right-wing parties but from the security establishment that enjoyed wide powers under former President P.W. Botha.

As de Klerk addressed the Electoral College, anti-apartheid organizations announced that more demonstrations and marches were planned in Pretoria and Johannesburg on Friday.

De Klerk, 53, has been acting president since Aug. 15, a day after he and other Cabinet ministers presented Botha to resign after 11 years in power. De Klerk is to be inaugurated Wednesday in a Pretoria church.

De Klerk, whose party was elected

by white voters, declared himself the leader of all South Africans, "not only those represented in Parliament."

"Our goal is that all South Africans, in a just and equitable manner, become part of the decision-making processes of South Africa," de Klerk said.

South Africa's 28 million blacks, the majority, have no vote.

Emergency regulations imposed to quell racial unrest have allowed police to ban all outdoor rallies; anti-government meetings in churches, universities or private homes; speeches they consider subversive; and news coverage of protests and police action. They also permit police to detain anyone without charge.

Newspapers say there is division in the Cabinet on how to handle peaceful protests.

# Colombia arrests 2 more wanted in U.S.

BOGOTA, Colombia (AP) — Colombia announced on Thursday the arrest of two men wanted in the United States as cocaine traffickers and said they were in a high-security prison awaiting extradition.

Gen. Miguel Maza Marquez, head of the Administrative Security Department and the man in charge of Colombia's anti-drug war, earlier said the arrests were "a major blow" to the Medellín cartel.

Maza said Pelaez Roldan "was much bigger" than Eduardo Martinez Romero, who was flown to Atlanta Sept. 6. Martinez is charged there with money laundering for the Medellín cartel, one of the world's largest cocaine organizations.

Pelaez Roldan and Guillermo Bueno Delgado were paraded before news photographers Thursday at the Administrative Security Department, Colombia's equivalent of the FBI, where officials said they had been held since their arrests this week.

A department spokesman said Pelaez Roldan would be extradited to Detroit, where he is wanted for "conspiracy and distribution of cocaine."

The Justice Department in Washington said Pelaez Roldan was convicted of drug trafficking charges five years ago in Detroit and faces 15 years in prison.

He was not, however, on the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration's

list of the 12 most-wanted Colombian cocaine traffickers.

The Associated Press has learned that the Justice Department has a wanted list of 82 lesser Colombian drug figures, which has never been made public.

Authorities said Bueno Delgado is wanted in Tallahassee, Fla., and San Francisco for "introducing 5,740 kilos of cocaine (12,528 pounds) and money laundering."

The communicate said Pelaez Roldan was arrested Wednesday north of Bogota and Bueno Delgado was captured in the southwest city of Cali on Monday. It gave no arrest details.

The department said the two were "in a high security prison while legal extradition proceedings are under way" and said U.S. officials were notified of the arrests.

Only photographers and no other members of the news media were allowed to view the men.

Photographers said Pelaez Roldan's forehead was gashed and that he threatened them with a walking stick.

# Poland makes protest against tourist beatings

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — The Foreign Ministry filed a protest Thursday after 30 Polish tourists said Romanian border soldiers beat them brutally with rifle butts after dragging them off a train, the state news agency PAP reported.

The tourists were traveling from Budapest, Hungary, to the Romanian capital, Bucharest, on Tuesday night when Romanian soldiers ordered them to leave the train, forced them to turn over their passports and kept them on a station platform while the train departed, according to the PAP report.

Boguslaw Miernik, a general director of Poland's Foreign Ministry, summoned Romania's charge d'affaires to demand an explanation, PAP said.

Miernik stressed such incidents "do not serve the friendly cooperation" between the Warsaw Pact allies, the agency reported.

It quoted Zapart as saying the soldiers fired tear gas and wielded their rifles to subdue other Poles coming to his aid. The group was locked in a waiting room, PAP reported.

Zapart said he was handcuffed to a chair and beaten repeatedly, PAP said.

It quoted Emilia Kwietniewska of Bialograd as saying she saw messages on the walls of the waiting room written in Polish about similar attacks on other Poles, including rapes and robberies.

Romania is a vehement opponent of recent East bloc reforms. Poland is at the forefront of the reforms, having elected the East bloc's first government not led by Communists.

# Troops trade artillery fire

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Syrian and Christian troops traded sporadic grenade and machine-gun fire Thursday, wading down their brutal bombardments as Arab mediators wrapped up another attempt to end the confrontation.

Police said seven people were wounded in the outbursts, which were limited to skirmishing across the Green Line that separates this city into Christian and Moslem enclaves.

By police count, 850 people have been killed and 2,652 wounded in fighting that has engulfed Beirut, the Christian enclave to the north and mountains east of the city since Christian Gen. Michel Aoun's army and the Syrians began fighting March 8.

The foreign ministers of Saudi Arabia, Morocco and Algeria ended two days of talks in the Saudi city of Jiddah and said they would submit recommendations on how to end the Lebanon bloodbath to their leaders. They did not give details of the recommendations but said an official communique would be released Saturday.

# Stalin-era bones haunt Soviets

MOSCOW (AP) — Near the Ural Mountains city of Chelyabinsk, skulls pierced by bullet holes were found where gold once was mined.

In Kolpashova, a Siberian village on the Ob River, excavations released a stream of mummified corpses to float down the river.

In the Ukrainian city of Poltava, diggers at a sand quarry uncovered a series of trenches full of bones — the remains of an estimated 5,000 people.

"This is a country built on bones," says Oleg Golovanov, a member of a group called Memorial that is dedicated to the memory of Josef Stalin's victims.

The bones lay undisturbed for decades while the Soviet government refused to acknowledge the estimated 20 million victims of Stalin's bloody years of terror.

Now they are coming back to haunt the country. About once a month for the past year, the official press has reported the unearthing of another mass grave as the Soviet Union reveals the horror of its past.

On Tuesday, Soviet television carried another report, this one about the return of 350 skeletons found on a mountain near Chelyabinsk. A correspondent said innocent "men, women, old people and even children" — possibly as many as 300,000 — were loaded onto trucks and shot at night.

The Memorial group found the remains buried in a former gold mine where authorities wanted to build a memorial. Now officials plan to turn the area into a memorial, the correspondent said.

A funeral ceremony is also planned Saturday for the remains of 540 of Stalin's victims found at a garbage dump in the Ukrainian coal center of Donetsk.

Golovanov coordinates efforts to track down the mass graves for Memorial, the national group lobbying to clear the names of Stalin's "enemies of the people," as well as help their families and those who survived years in labor camps.

He believes there could be as many as 100,000 unmarked mass graves left as a legacy from the purges, repressions and labor camps Stalin oversaw from the late 1920s until his death in 1953.

Press coverage of the graves began last year when a killing field was found in the Kuropaty forest.

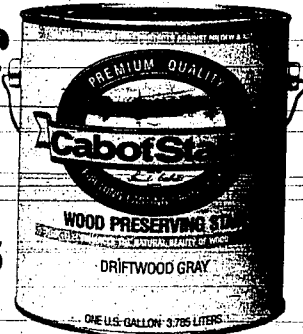

### Hailey gas prices lowest in the state

HAILEY - Gas stations here have the lowest prices in the state, while Idaho Falls has the highest and Twin Falls is just a few cents less, says Attorney General Jim Jones.

A gallon of leaded or unleaded gasoline sold Thursday for 98 cents in Hailey, but for \$1.16 in Idaho Falls, although a few stations dropped the price Wednesday to \$1.13, Jones said. Twin Falls prices range from \$1.09 to \$1.12.

Jones said he has no evidence of illegal price-setting agreements in Idaho Falls, but he said stations "can follow like sheep" without breaking the law.

"What happens in a lot of communities is there's one guy who's sort of a price leader," Jones said. "If it's just sort of a custom that's grown up in the community, that's not improper. Somebody's going to break the price sooner or later. They want more business, more customers."

### Falls/Eastland intersection to receive a signal light

TWIN FALLS - Construction has begun on the intersection of Falls Avenue East and Eastland Drive, considered by some to be one of the most dangerous in town, the city engineer says.

The \$191,000 project, which includes a new signal light, will be completed by Oct. 29, said City Engineer Gary Young.

He said Twin Falls contractor PMF Inc. will widened both streets at the intersection.

"It's perceived as a dangerous intersection," he said.

### USFS officials say roadless areas aren't wilderness

CHALLIS - Idaho's 9 million acres of roadless areas can't be managed as if they were wilderness, says a U.S. Forest Service official.

Carl Pence, Sawtooth National Recreation Area superintendent, told a hearing at Challis earlier this week that congressmen visiting wilderness areas have told him that the Forest Service can't manage roadless areas as "de facto" wilderness unless Congress acts.

He spoke at a hearing on development of a new travel plan for the Sawtooth National Forest. He hopes to have an update of a 10-year-old travel plan ready by next summer. Public comment will be accepted through Sept. 28.

Other hearings on the travel plan are at 10 a.m. in Room 106, Aspen Building, The College of Southern Idaho, Saturday, and in Pocatello.

### Hagerman seeks volunteers for 2 city service panels

## Yeutter announces wheat production increases

TWIN FALLS - Wheat farmers will have the option of increasing their 1990 production to allow the government to restock its wheat reserves, Agriculture Secretary Clayton Yeutter has announced.

"The wheat people will be disappointed in the announcement," said Tim McGreevy, Idaho Barley Commission executive director. "It means he's going to boost stocks."

Though a press release from Yeutter said the change will cause a slight increase in wheat farmers' overall income, McGreevy

was skeptical.

Boosting wheat stocks too high could lower the prices by creating an oversupply, he said.

Acres of harvested wheat could increase from an estimated 67.5 million acres to 69.6 million acres because of the program change, increasing production by 66 million bushels.

The Agriculture Department will dip into its reserve for some 3.6 million metric tons of wheat for this year and next to meet U.S. commitments for international food aid, a department statement said.

The action today does not suggest that we expect another year of less than average

wheat yields, nor will it boost stocks significantly," Yeutter said. "But it will help restore stocks to safer levels. In view of the tight U.S. and world supply and demand situation, we should give wheat producers the option to increase plantings if they wish to do so."

But McGreevy asked, "What is a safe level? We need some kind of supply management."

Less than two months ago, Yeutter said there would be no change in the 5 percent acreage reduction program for wheat.

Yeutter had said that farmers in the 1990 wheat program would be required to idle 5 percent of their wheat acreage to qualify

for federal price supports, so the maximum they could plant would be 95 percent of the base wheat acreage.

The change allows farmers to modify their original contracts so they can plant up to 105 percent of their base acreage instead.

Farmers have the option of staying with the requirements of their existing contracts or changing them to raise more wheat.

Acreage reduction program percentages for 1990 barley and oats will be announced Sept. 30.

"We're concerned about the barley end of it," McGreevy said.

The commission is hoping the set-aside on barley will be 12.5 percent.

Demoney has a bachelor's degree in physical education from Boise State University.

The fair is a great place to work because the job description varies frequently and you get to meet a lot of people, she said.

"You don't do the same thing every week," she said.

At times, a fair manager makes sure noisy organ or vegetable-sheer-booths are far away from hearing aid vendors. Later the same day, she could be working on a nifty contract checklist for a recording group. Once in Boise, a performer demanded M&Ms with one color removed.

She said as manager she does not plan to make big changes. Bill Baker was also

moved from head maintenance man to assistant manager.

"Dan has made a lot of changes in the past three years and Bill and I have been part of that," Demoney said.

The commissioners on Thursday also appointed Gene Schiffer on the Fair Board to replace Stan Snow on the Fair Board.

## Five Points intersection at heart of lawsuit

TWIN FALLS - The owners of several commercial buildings on East Five Points have sued Twin Falls and the state of Idaho for \$500,000, claiming the city's recent improvements to the intersection have destroyed their businesses.

When they bought the property, which includes the current Payless Shoesource and other buildings, Addison Avenue and Blue Lakes Boulevard provided easy access to the buildings, Nampa residents W. Roy and Evelyn J. Brown claim.

But now, median barriers and other intersection changes "have robbed the

property of its utility," said Lloyd Webb, the Twin Falls lawyer who represents the Nampa residents W. Roy and Evelyn J. Brown.

Southbound traffic on Blue Lakes Boulevard and eastbound traffic on Addison Avenue "can't turn into some of the businesses, the lawsuit points out. Eastbound motorists on Addison Avenue are out of luck.

"It's really left us with no avenue but to come back against the city and state," Webb said.

City Manager Tom Courtney and City Attorney Frits Worderich declined comment on the case, saying they hadn't seen the documents yet.

The Browns charge the city with what is known in legal language as "inverse condemnation" - when the government takes property without saying they're taking it, Webb said.

The Browns' property values have been substantially decreased because of rent reductions and their inability to find tenants, according to the civil lawsuit filed in Twin Falls County.

The city and state's activities and the resulting loss of money effectively means the government took the Browns' property without compensating them for the loss, the lawsuit alleges, and to further the damage, the city and state plan to widen Addison Avenue.

## Wendell school boiler poses a safety hazard

WENDELL - A large furnace that has heated the Wendell High School and adjoining gymnasium for more than 40 years has been declared unsafe.

Concerned of the potential for an explosion, the school district is considering operating the boiler at low pressure while trustees await inspection results to help them decide what to do. Regardless of whether the boiler is repaired or replaced, the district likely will have to ask for a supplemental levy to pay the costs, school officials said.

The school district's insurance company condemned the steel boiler after an annual inspection in August. The inside wall of the boiler is warped and bulged, Superintendent Larry Manly said, and the outside wall remains in question. Inspection of it will require removal of heavy asbestos insulation at a cost estimated at \$7,000 to \$8,000.

Stays between the inner and outer walls also may be damaged.

In 1981, the boiler lost its coolant and turned cherry-red from the uncontrolled heat, causing it to warp, Manly said. Since then, the boiler has had regular use but the

# Craig proposes advisory group on range

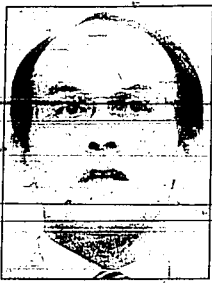

TWIN FALLS — Congressman Larry Craig has proposed forming an advisory group to hammer out problems with the Saylor Creek Bombing Range expansion.

The group's recommendations would have substantial impact on the outcome of the bombing range expansion, Craig said.

It would also mean that discussion and consideration of the range expansion could extend into 1991.

Plans to expand the Saylor Creek Bombing Range about 15 times its present size — from 120,000 acres to 1.8 million acres — have drawn bitter criticism from various ranching,

environmental and recreational groups.

Craig said he is troubled that the range expansion issue has been tied to the realignment of U.S. Air Force bases and the transfer of a fleet of F-15 fighters from California to the Mountain Home Air Force Base.

"This has served only to generate confusion and suspicion among concerned Idahoans," Craig said in a letter to Gary D. Vest, an Air Force deputy assistant secretary.

Congress has already approved the base realignment, Craig said in a telephone interview Thursday. But the expansion proposal is still in its early stages.

The Air Force has not yet formally approved Craig's group plan. But the congressman said Thursday that Air

Force officials told him "it's probably a pretty good idea."

He expects an Air Force decision by the end of next week.

While Craig described the group as still in the "formation" stage, he is proposing that it be chaired jointly by Air Force and Air Force Land Management officials.

He said members would include representatives from business, environmental, ranching and recreational interests and at least one county commissioner from each county that would be affected by the range expansion.

Group members would be selected by Idaho's congressional delegation, Craig said. The group might also include a state official appointed by Gov. Cecil Andrus.

"Conceptually it's a better approach to getting public opinion than what the Air Force is doing so far," said James O'Crowley, who chairs the Committee for Idaho's High Desert, "a group that has opposed the range expansion plan."

But O'Crowley does have a few reservations.

She would like to see the committee chaired by a neutral person. O'Crowley would also like to see someone other than Idaho's congressional delegation select the group's members.

"I don't trust the process given to the people who said they were originally in favor of it," she said.

# Stallings blasts Air Force for bombing range secret report

WASHINGTON (AP) — Suggesting

the Air Force broke its promise to tell the public exactly what it plans in its Saylor Creek bombing range expansion, Congressman Richard Stallings wants to know why a special description of the project and potential alternatives was withheld from the public.

In a letter sent to Deputy Assistant Air Force Secretary Gary Vest on Thursday, Stallings demanded an explanation of why the Aug. 31-dated report was not provided to officials at Mountain Home Air Force Base, the state's congressional delegation or the public in time for the initial hearings on the controversial proposal last week.

He maintained the report by Spectrum Systems & Software Inc., entitled "Saylor Creek Range Expansion Project: Description of Proposed Action and Alternatives," contained exactly the kind of "specific, detailed information that I believe the people of Idaho were entitled to review before the scoping meetings."

Stallings reminded Vest that when the Air Force rejected his request to delay the first round of meetings so people in Idaho could have more time to prepare he was told that the hearings would give everyone the chance to find out exactly what the Air Force was proposing. Yet, Stallings said, the hearings seemed

to do nothing but foster uncertainty and confusion.

"It is incumbent upon the Air Force to provide as much reliable and detailed information as possible to the public concerning this proposal," Stallings told Vest. "That would avoid the type of mistrust and uncertainty, which seems to have been created during the scoping process."

A day earlier, Congressman Larry Craig, who was also critical of the Air Force's handling of the expansion plan so far, said Vest had asked to come to Idaho personally to help resolve the problems. No date for that trip was announced.

The Air Force wants to expand the southwestern Idaho bombing range from 100,000 to 1.5 million acres and begin supersonic flights and live bombing runs to accommodate doubling the number of jet fighters based at Mountain Home Air Force Base.

The mere size of the expansion has ranked gentlemen who have been grazing cattle of the range involved, and the inclusion of supersonic operations along with the use of live bombs in training has turned environmentalists and some state officials against it. Even Gov. Cecil Andrus, who initially backed the plan, has called for major changes including a reassessment of the supersonic flight status.

# Heyburn takes action against sand hill area

**HEYBURN** — The fence surrounding the sand hills in Heyburn has not been popular with some residents here but it will remain.

The city and J.R. Simplot Co., which owns most of the land, earlier this year fenced off the hills, a popular spot for 4-wheelers, motorcycles and dune buggies, because of liability and law enforcement concerns.

The fence cut off access to river frontage, which includes a boat ramp. Also, the city had put in two restrooms and two floating docks, Mayor Harold Hurst said.

But the ramp is in poor repair and probably not usable and the restrooms were burned down by vandals early this year, Hurst said. The floating docks long since came loose and floated away, he added.

The city cooperated with Simplot in building the fence because it said the property has been a "headache" for the law enforcement department.

Hurst said there have been numerous drinking parties and bonfires in that area and Chief Police Robert Vasquez said people use the area for shooting firearms, which is illegal.

Simplot wanted to fence the property because of the liability concerns.

Hurst said area residents have complained about the sand stirred up by the vehicles.

City Attorney Steve Tufts said the city can legally fence off the property.

In other matters, the council decided a city ordinance governing trailer homes does not specify that trailers temporarily placed on local residents' property are only for visitors.

Councilwoman Bessie Hurless questioned whether a couple living in a motor home parked in a yard in the city violated the city ordinance.

The ordinance allows to stay in smaller motor home or trailers for seven days without a permit and an additional 21 days with a permit.

But the ordinance was intended only for visitors who live permanently elsewhere and the people in the motor home, the son and daughter-in-law of Police Chief Vasquez, are staying there while they look for an apartment for their move from California.

Other council members decided that the ordinance is not directed only at visitors and that Vasquez can stay for up to the allowed 28 days.

In other business:

Norma Morrison, the city's representative to the local Centennial Committee, will look at the possibility of having a soap box pine box derby and hiring a big band for next year's Heyburn Hoedown as Heyburn's contribution to the Centennial celebration.

Councilman Nile Bohon will outline to the council at its next meeting next year's recreation program, including his recommendation that the city drop the soccer program, which costs \$2,500 in insurance alone.

damage did not draw concern until this year's inspection.

Although the district doesn't know for sure whether the boiler has weakened the wall, the boiler, located in the basement at the north end of the junior high gymnasium, could possibly explode under high pressure, Manly said.

In addition, the asbestos around the boiler is an undesirable type that releases its dust even when wet with water. "I think the asbestos is a big concern," Manly said.

The board is awaiting the results of an inspection by a Boise engineering firm to decide whether to repair or replace the boiler. It may be another month before the district has the various cost estimates, Manly said.

He predicted that the district will have to ask voters for a supplemental levy to pay for a new boiler.

Meanwhile, the superintendent said he has been working with the insurance company on an agreement to operate the boiler under lowered pressure instead of turning it off during the night and turning it on high before school begins.

Portable heaters might be used to supplement low furnace heat, Manly said, adding, "The students may have to wear sweaters."

School Board Chairman Don Fowler said the board will proceed with plans for the boiler as soon as engineering specifications are received.

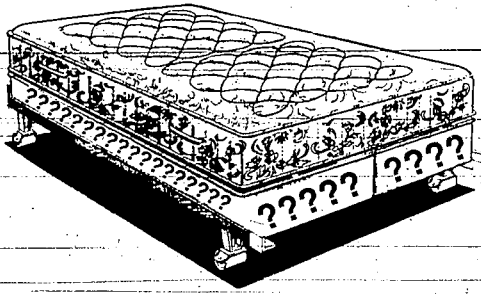

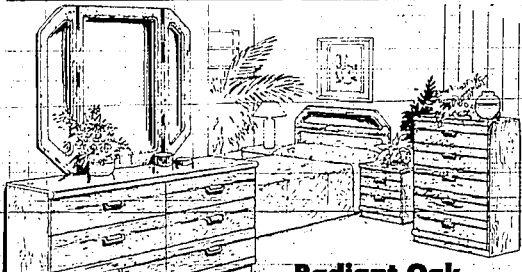

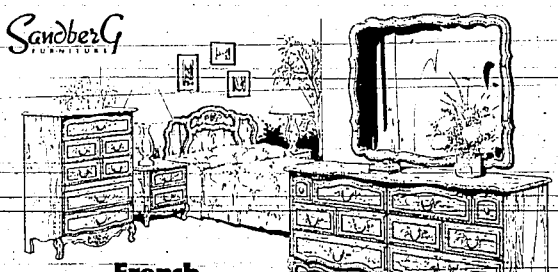

LEWISTON (AP) — Rather than use Idaho's budget surplus to provide property tax relief across the board, Sen. Ron Baizelbacher supports spending that money for taxpayers who approved school override levies.

In essence, Baizelbacher would use state surplus money to cut the property tax burden created by override levies.

Each will be interviewed separately by the Judicial Council, which must submit between two and four nominations to Gov. Cecil Andrus.

The yearling was shot shortly after searchers found the victim, Jake Gardipee of Evaro, north of Missoula. A trapper, Francis Cahoon, has been hunting a second mountain lion seen standing over the body and said earlier that at least two and possibly three lions were involved in the attack.

He reported finding no fresh lion tracks in the Evaro area Wednesday.

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Developers say a hydroelectric project proposed for Island Park won't meet the Henry's Fork of the Snake River, so they should be exempt from an Idaho Legislature ban on power projects on that river.

But representatives of sportsmen's and conservation organizations say a 4.8-megawatt power plant at Island Park Dam would jeopardize important recreational values of the Henry's Fork.

Their concerns centered on possible siltation of the river and on whether the project can be built without undermining the dam's integrity.

The testimony came at a hearing Wednesday night conducted by the Department of Water Resources.

Fall River Rural Electric Cooperative and Bonneville Pacific Corp. have been granted a federal license to build the project, but the 1989 Legislature made the Henry's Fork a protected river. The co-op wants an exemption for the Island Park project.

George Mangan, co-op manager, said water flows would continue to be regulated by the Fremont-Madison Irrigation Co. and the Bureau of Reclamation, owner of Island Park Dam.

The quality of the water would be enhanced for the fisheries below the dam, he said, based on construction specifications.

Bonneville Pacific would build and operate the dam for 35 years, then turn it over to the co-op, he said.

Bonneville Pacific's dam construction record is an issue with project opponents.

Bank robber good example for some

POCATELLO (AP) — Local police had a good example to use at a seminar here on fraud and bank robbery.

Pocatello and Chubbuck police offered a taped interview with Donald Sheriff, who robbed two Pocatello banks in 1988. He's now serving time in a federal prison at Leavenworth, Kan.

Police said he's been convicted of bank holdups in four states, including the two at Pocatello.

In the interview, Sheriff said he chose branch banks in or close to residential areas so that he could park his car a few blocks away or "get lost" among the houses.

He usually struck around 10 or 11 a.m. or just before 3 p.m. when the banks would be least busy.

# Corrections board budget up one third

BOISE (AP) — The Board of Corrections has endorsed a request for 31 percent more in spending power for the budget year that begins next July along with a \$17 million plan to expand current cell space to house 650 more inmates by 1993.

The board's unanimous approval of the 1991 budget blueprint on Thursday finalized action on a spending plan Corrections Director Dick Vernon said will bring the prison system up to safe standards and accommodate the steady growth of inmates into the early 1990s.

He said plans for the first piece of the expansion plan — a work center

at the old Fremont General Hospital in St. Anthony — were proceeding as some initial local opposition appeared to be easing.

The centerpiece of the budget package, which now goes to Gov. Cecil Andrus for his review, was some \$4 million for operating two minimum-security, 100-inmate honor camps and a pair of 100-inmate, minimum-or-medium-security housing units at the main prison complex south of Boise and for continued payments to county jails to house state inmates awaiting space in the prison system. In addition to operating money, the board wants about \$2 million to build

the honor camps and housing units. The overall budget proposal calls for increasing spending in the current year by some \$2.4 million to \$29.5 million and then hiking the total to \$38.8 million in the next year's budget, which lawmakers will write this winter.

Vernon told the board he expected the current prison population of about 1,700 to hit nearly 3,000 by the mid-1990s, and facilities must be in place to handle that growth.

Even with the new 250-inmate maximum-security prison opening next month, inmates awaiting space will again begin accumulating in county jails in January.

"I need a minimum of 420 beds by July 1991," Vernon said. "We've pretty well taken care of that with our work camps and drop-in units. But after that we're going to need some heavy beds."

Because of that, Vernon won board endorsement for \$15 million to add another pair of 125-inmate units at the new maximum-security prison to open by January 1991.

Although he said he did not want to be characterized as an alarmist, Vernon said the expansion plan is based on prison population projections that do not contemplate passage of any more laws for tougher criminal sentencing and represent the middle point between high and low population estimates.

Preliminary discussions were under way on the possibility of converting the hospital in St. Anthony into the first of the two honor camps, Vernon said, and "it looks pretty good."

# Hispanic leaders calling drug allegations garbage

CALDWELL (AP) — Hispanic leaders have taken issue with a once-confidential report from the U.S. Attorney's Office that blames Hispanic family organizations at least in part for an alarming influx of illegal drugs into Idaho.

"What he's saying is that we have a Mexican mafia," Camillo Lopez said. "That's pure garbage. The Hispanic community would not stand for that."

Lopez and Humberto Fuentes, director of the Idaho Migrant Council, have asked U.S. Attorney Maurice Ellsworth for a copy of the report that Ellsworth said was mistakenly released by the U.S. Department of Justice after he submitted it.

"It says — Hispanic family organizations and motorcycle gangs have played a major role in Idaho drug trafficking and that Idahoans remain relatively naive about the growing threat drug trafficking presents."

"We suspect that it's going to be weak in substance but strong on rhetoric," Lopez charged. "It's nothing but a racist report that has laid all the problem on the Hispanic community."

He maintained the percentage of Hispanics arrested on drug charges is probably about the same as in the white population, joining Fuentes in warning the claim could undo years of work to combat discrimination against Hispanics.

"To paint us different not only does a disservice to us, it knocks us back," Lopez declared.

# Inmate education an issue for state

BOISE (AP) — With indications that financial support for prison inmate education and training programs can dramatically reduce recidivism, the state Board of Corrections has called for a substantial increase in spending on those programs.

But even under the proposal approved on Thursday, the state will still be committing only about 3 percent of the money it spends for corrections on educating and training inmates so they do have a better chance of staying out of prison once they are released.

In an apparent attempt to build its

case for more state spending on education programs, however, the board directed Corrections Department officials to come up with more detailed information on the direct impact of educational programs on recidivism.

Of immediate concern is the possible loss of up to \$500,000 in federal money for the programs that officials would like to see the state pick up.

The jury is still out in Idaho on that issue, but a new study on inmates who completed the Robert Janss School program in the prison system indicates education or training has a significant impact on

chances for success after release.

The Robert Janss School program offers inmates the chance to obtain a regular high school diploma, a high school equivalency diploma, a pre-employment training certificate or an intensive two-week pre-release training course.

The program began in 1977 with the equivalency diploma and pre-employment training components added in 1983 and the intensive pre-release course three years later.

The study showed that of the 685 inmates obtaining their high school diploma or its equivalent, only 20 percent were returned to prison after their initial release.

# Coeur d'Alene ride will reach 50 mph

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — For those in the Coeur d'Alene area who want to celebrate and pop the cork, Silverwood Theme Park soon will have the Corkscrew.

The Corkscrew is a roller coaster and it is coming to Silverwood from Knott's Berry Farm in California, where the ride has been a popular attraction.

Silverwood owner Gary Norton took a ride on the roller coaster and decided to spend \$250,000 on it for his 1990 season beginning next June 15. The Corkscrew will shut down Sunday at Knott's Berry Farm, and crews will immediately start to disassemble it.

The roller coaster is 1,200 feet long, 70 feet high, and travels at a speed of 47 miles per hour.

# Scholar claims racial bias in professional sports

WASHINGTON — Could it be just a coincidence that 99 percent of the quarterbacks, 99 percent of the kickers and 97 percent of the centers in professional football in 1983 were white — while 82 percent of kickoff returners, 88 percent of running backs and 92 percent of centerbacks were black?

It could be, and it isn't, says sociologist D. Stanley Eitzen, who has taken on — and ripped to shreds — the proposition that the world of sports is at least one place in America that's free of racial discrimination.

Club owners, coaches, players and fans are united in the desire to win and so the color of the players doesn't matter as long as they perform — right?

Wrong, says this scholar, and tactically wrong for millions of black youngsters who put all their energies into preparing for a career as an athlete and wind up unable to play and unable to do anything else well enough to earn a living at it.

Eitzen is a professor of sociology at Colorado State University and a former president of the North American Society for the Sociology of Sport. When the National Academy of Sciences asked scholars and experts to write a report on the status of blacks in American society today, they turned out the research to black athletes.

The academy's final report, "A Common Destiny: Blacks and American Society," came out this summer. Its overall conclusion was that whatever progress was made in improving the status of blacks occurred before the early 1970s. Since then, "the status of blacks relative to whites has stagnated or regressed."

The report paid little attention to Eitzen's research on racism in sports, but the academy made a copy available to The Associated Press.

Eitzen is no more cheerful about the status of blacks in sports than the committee was about blacks in society overall, even though four out of five basketball players, half the football players and a fifth of the baseball players in the big leagues are black.

"Rather than being free from racism, sport as a microcosm of the larger society reflects the same racial problems," he says.

Applying sociology's use of statistics to sports, he concludes:

"If you are a black player, you've got to be considerably better than a competing white to be signed to a professional contract."

"If you're black, expect to play the less-prestigious positions: the ones that require brawn, not brains."

"Since those positions are the ones in which you'll take more physical punishment, your playing career will be shorter and your career earnings from sports less than if you were white."

"If you're the black parents of a talented athlete, think again if you believe that sports is your son's escape to the good life."

Sports as a "mobility escalator" — as an escape hatch — is a dead-end for almost all, he says.

The majority would be better off stretching their minds than their muscles; America doesn't have jobs for washed-out potential athletes who know nothing but sports.

"Many boys work very hard to become great in sport, but only a very few will be successful," Eitzen said. "They spend many hours per day developing their speed, strength and 'moves' to the virtual exclusion of those abilities that have a greater likelihood of paying off in upward mobility — mathematical reasoning and communication skills."

On the playing fields and courts, central positions calling for leadership and control go to white players, the research said, citing the statistics on football positions.

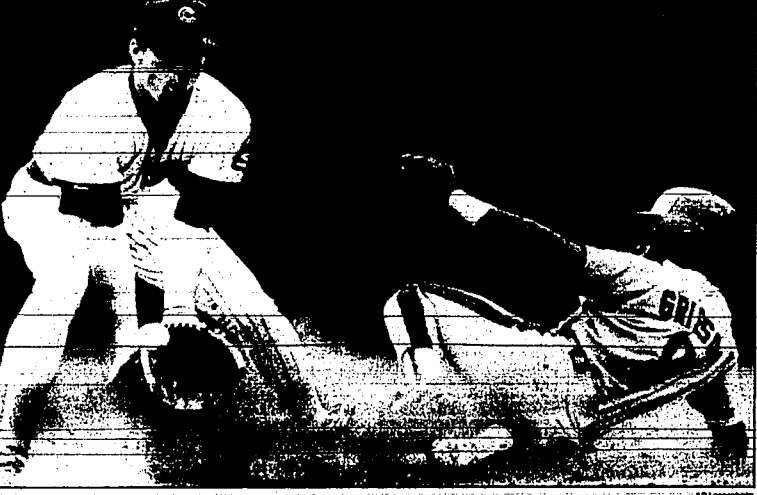
"It is inconceivable that blacks lack the ability to play these positions at the professional level," Eitzen

said.

"Blackish holders must, for example, have good hands, an important quality for pass receivers."

But a 1973 study of all players whose names appeared in the Football Register found that two-thirds of professional pass receivers were black while all the others were whites.

To show that "black players must be better than white players to succeed in the sports world," Eitzen cites research which compared big league batting averages. It shows that blacks batted, on average, 20 points better than their white counterparts.

# Baseball owners approve sale of Seattle team

MILWAUKEE — Baseball owners unanimously approved the sale of the Seattle Mariners to a group of investors headed by Indianapolis businessman Jeff Smulyan and Michael Browning, who promised Thursday not to move the team.

Smulyan and Browning purchased the Mariners from George Argyros, who bought the team in 1981 for \$13.1 million. The team was appraised at \$76.1 million in June.

"There is no question these two fellows love baseball and they made the commitment to me they will do everything in their considerable power to make Seattle a more successful franchise," newly elected baseball commissioner Fay Vincent said.

"We would like to build an organization that we think will be as strong as any in baseball," Smulyan, a broadcasting magnate, said. "We think there is a good foundation now and we want to build on it."

The Mariners are headed for their 13th straight losing season and are the only franchise in major league history never to have a winning season.

"The team, while it has not won as many games as it might, people

see it's a team on the verge," Smulyan said.

Vincent said baseball had the assurances of Smulyan and Browning that they would not move the Mariners out of Seattle, which already has lost one baseball team. The former Seattle Pilots played the 1969 season in Seattle before moving to Milwaukee and becoming the Brewers.

"There is absolutely no commitment on the part of baseball, implied or otherwise, to permit that transfer," Vincent said. "That is not something expected, contemplated or part of the arrangement."

"Those fellows have committed to us and me personally that they will do everything within their power to continue to maintain that franchise at an even stronger position. I have told them in no uncertain terms that that covenant, that commitment will be adhered to on their part."

Smulyan, 42, is head of Emmis Broadcasting Corp., which is the largest privately owned radio station chain in the country. Browning, 41, is president of Browning Investments, a real estate company.

Upon leaving Thursday's meeting, Argyros declined comment. Argyros was not popular in Seattle and often baited local officials over his lease and the Mariners' lack of success.

The original 20-year Mariners' lease, which Argyros renegotiated in 1985, runs through the 1996 season. The lease contains an escape clause that says if the Mariners don't draw 2.8 million over a two-year period,

they can be moved to another city.

The Mariners have drawn more than 1 million in each of the past five seasons and are expected to draw more than 1.2 million this season.

American League president Bobby Brown said he hopes the new ownership can resolve any past differences with county authorities and Kingdome officials.

"Without aping the merits of either side, I'm hoping all of this can get resolved and they can work together in a combined effort of cooperation that will enable the Mariners to enjoy the fruits of the relationship," Brown said.

He said baseball was impressed with the presentation of Smulyan and Browning.

"They're very upbeat about the whole area of the Northwest," Brown said. "They feel, and I think too, that the Mariners ought to be a Northwest team, not just a Seattle team."

He said Browning and Smulyan told the owners that there are 6 million potential fans within a 200-mile radius of Seattle.

"The idea that the market is tiny is perhaps a little misconception," Brown said. "They hope to be able to exploit that sort of data."

And Brown said Mariners' fans should not worry about the team being moved.

# Hagerman plays host to Raft River

"We have good turnout and good quickness, but we've lamed the ball over too much, and that's what beat us last week against Declo," said Richins. "If we're going to have a chance to beat Hagerman, we're going to have to get on the ball."

# Weiser's speed could trouble Twin Falls in key contest

TWIN FALLS — The fact that Weiser would square off in a one-game, no-rumors contest with the Twin Falls Bruins indicates clearly what the Wolverines have on their mind for tonight.

That's the opinion of Twin Falls coach Jon Lund as he tries to rally his troops from a 27-6 thumping at the hands of No. 1-ranked Centennial last week.

"Weiser has great speed running at his skill positions and a couple of those players are in their second and third starting years," Lund said. "This definitely is a Class A-2 team that is intent on improving its state recognition at our expense and unless we respond with respect and dedication, they will get it."

Weiser, the 1987 state A-2 champion, is ranked second among A-2 teams in Idaho by The Associated Press. Kickoff time is 8 p.m. in Bruni Stadium.

"This game was necessitated when Twin Falls' schedule maker blew up the yearly renewal with Minico and filled the second week with Centennial, the spot the Spartans held on the Bruins schedule last season. That explains why Minico played Preston last week and Twin Falls hosts Weiser Friday."

The Achilles' heel of the Bruins showed up last week when the offensive line was blown out of the stadium by the highly-regarded Centennial defense.

"We had one player who didn't make a block all night and another that got only a couple. The fact that they play side-by-side indicates what the problem was," Lund said.

"That's our assignment for this week — find someone who wants to play in the offensive line."

"Our other problem against Centennial was that defensively everyone was doing his own thing instead of team concept," Lund said. "We really did not play that badly — except on this game — then we stunk. On that option (quarterback Mark Auchampach ran for a 62-yard gain) we had two linebackers and if it had been a tackle busting into the same hole, if it had been a tackle busting into the same hole, we would have stuffed it. But since the linebackers weren't playing defense, they got the 62-yard run and the

two-touchdown lead. "It seemed like everything down someone made the big mistake of just wandering off on his own, leaving the whole defense vulnerable," he added.

Jund said the defense faces a stern test in the quick Weiser team, which is 2-0, having beaten perennial A-2 powerhouse Homedale 21-14 and Ontario Oct. 27.

Weiser has excellent running backs in Delon Walker, 2-5-foot, 11-inch, 180-pound senior, and two-year starter Angel Ramos, 5-10, 180-pound. "Walker has good speed with excellent moves. He is a constant breakaway threat. Ramos is more of a power-runner type but he possesses enough speed to break it open if he gets into the clear," Jund said.

Senior quarterback Andy Bumgarner brings two years' starting experience to his position. "He likes to get outside. We definitely must contain him," Jund said. "Because of him Weiser likes to run but they aren't hesitant about passing. They like to use the play-action passes and particularly look for their tight end."

That tight end is Morgan Shosh, 6-0, 180, while the speedy outside receiver is 6-0, 175-pound Beau Shamp.

"Weiser's Weiser is not a big team but like us they rely on their quickness. Their stats are the 4-4 defense that reads well. But it isn't that something you expect from a smaller, quick team as the season progresses."

"Weiser also likes to do things with the kicking game, fake punts, reverse and double-reverses, middle-buckle, all kinds of tricks. You have to be ready for anything," the coach added.

"I know they're not going to beat us because their coach told me last week they were really looking forward to coming to Twin Falls."

"The Bruins' three-back offense sustained a setback last week when senior Forrest Ward sustained a shoulder separation that could keep him out of the next three or four games. That means that Alan Heck will be taken from his defensive end position to concentrate fully on offense while the other halfback, Lyle Hasleby, will move into defensive end and help with the running.

# Astros' Mike Scott becomes 1st 20-game winner in majors

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Mike Scott has been called a lot of things in his career. But never a 20-game winner — until now.

Scott became a 20-game winner for the first time in his 11-year career Thursday, leading the Houston Astros over the Los Angeles Dodgers 11-3 on a day the World Series champions were mathematically eliminated from the National League West race.

## National League

"It's something that when you're done playing, you can look back and say, 'Yeah, I had one 20-game season,'" said Scott, 20-4.

"But I don't really look at goals during the season. Ever since I've been playing, the only goal I've had is to get into the playoffs and World Series."

Scott Biggio drove in six runs with two homers, including his first grand slam.

Scott, an 18-game winner in 1985 and 1986 — seasons in which he was accused of scuffling baseballs — allowed five hits over seven innings with four strikeouts and two walks. He held the Dodgers without a hit after allowing consecutive doubles to Eddie Murray and Mike Marshall with no outs in the fourth.

"I've had better days," said Scott, who clinched the 1986 West title with a no-hitter. "But when you get 11 runs, you throw strikes. If it's a close game and you throw the same pitches, you're probably going to get knocked around. But when I get that big of a lead, I just try to throw strikes and let them hit the ball."

"You don't go out there and say I'm going to win this many games or that many games, because pitchers don't win games," Scott said. "I haven't 10 20-game seasons. It takes nine guys out there to win a pitching. We won 20 games when I was pitching, but I'm not doing three striking out 27 guys or hitting the home runs."

Scott's victory made him the majors' first 20-game winner this year and the fourth in Astros' history following Ray Dierker, J.R. Richard and Joe Niekro, who did it twice.

The Dodgers' defeat, coupled with first-place San Francisco's victory, officially ended Los Angeles' hopes of winning another championship. No. 10, the 1987 champion has repeated since the 1977-78 New York Yankees.

Rookie John Wetteland, pitching before a season-low crowd of 13,026, hit his fifth

straight decision.

"I was throwing stop," he said. "I wasn't pitching my game. I'm a fastball pitcher, but I'm trying to learn to use different pitchers and I got my butt kicked. I'm trying to become a complete pitcher, and I'm taking my lumps. I know I'm going to have bad days, and some worse than this."

Rafael Ramirez scored three runs and broke out of a 4-for-40 slump with four hits, including an run-scoring double in the second inning and an RBI single in the fifth.

The Astros, who totaled 17 hits against five Dodger pitchers, chased Wetteland, 4-8, after 12-3 innings. They got six runs and five hits within the second, including Biggio's slam with two out.

Single by Glenn Davis, Ken Caminiti and Craig Reynolds pulled the Astros into a 1-0 tie and Ramirez's double put them ahead for good. Biggio, fighting a 5-for-36 slump when the game began, increased the margin to 8-1 in the fourth with another two-out homer.

Genald Young, who walked on a 3-2 pitch in front of Biggio's grand slam, capped a three-run fifth with a two-out, two-run double. The Astros scored eight of their runs with two out. It was Biggio's first multi-homer performance in 170 games.

and Andy Van Slyke hit consecutive RBI doubles in the seventh inning, and the Pittsburgh Pirates beat St. Louis 4-3 Thursday before the smallest baseball crowd in Busch Stadium history.

The Cardinals have lost five in a row, while the Pirates' three-game sweep stretched their winning streak to five. Pittsburgh beat the Cardinals for the 10th time in 15 games, knocking them 36 games behind first-place Chicago in the National League East.

St. Louis was only a half-game behind the Cubs last Friday after coming back from a 7-1 deficit to beat Chicago 11-8. During their losing streak, the Cardinals have scored nine runs.

Attendance was announced at 1,519. The

game was a makeup of Wednesday night's rainout, and the rescheduling was not announced until after midnight. The previous low was 3,380 on Sept. 27, 1972 against New York.

Todd Zeile's sacrifice fly in the sixth had given the Cardinals a 2-1 lead before the Pirates got four doubles and three runs off Ken Dayley, 3-4, and Dan Quisenberry in the seventh. Jose Lind doubled with one out to chase Quisenberry, and after pinch hitter Benji Drieland struck out, Hall, Bell and Van Slyke each doubled.

The win reduced the magic number to 11 for the Giants, who began the day with a five-game lead over San Diego in the National League West. The Padres, who start a three-game series in Candlestick Park on Friday night, hosted Atlanta on Thursday night.

Clark, who had three hits, reached in the ninth when his grounder skipped off third baseman Luis Quinones' glove for an error. Clark stole second as Kevin Mitchell struck

out and Matt Williams was walked intentionally. Brenly then hit a looping fly down the right-field line that right fielder Paul O'Neill couldn't reach.

Norm Charlton, 6-2, was the loser despite striking out a career-high 10 batters in 4-1-3 innings, including six straight between the ninth and 11th. Eric Camacho, the fifth San Francisco pitcher, worked a scoreless 12th to improve to 3-0.

Eric Davis, whose three-run homer in the eighth inning tied Wednesday night's game before the Giants won in the 13th, had three hits and drove in a run. He was 2-for-10 in the two-game series with five RBIs and three runs scored.

Clark singled, doubled and tripled and drove in two runs, raising his league-leading average to .341. Brett Butler also had three hits for San Francisco.

San Francisco tied it with two runs against starter Tim Lincecum in the seventh. Clark made it 3-2 with an RBI triple that ricocheted off the Giants' bullpen door near the right-field corner just as a reliever was changing in the ninth.

Gordon's breaking pitch, the talk of the

STOP SIGNS

## Arts and Craft Show gears up for 3rd year

**TWIN FALLS** — In the mood to start thinking about Christmas shopping? The dozens of creative people who plan to be on hand for the Twin Falls Arts and Craft Show would be pleased to help put your holiday preparations in high gear.

The show, now in its third year, runs from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Saturday and Sunday in the park. Co-directors Pam Webb and Donna Ferrenburg say they expect more than 60 artists and craftspeople to take part.

Booth fees for the show will again be donated to United Cerebral Palsy. Exhibitors may still sign up Saturday morning for the \$10 fee (concessionaires are charged \$25), but Webb would rather hear from would-be participants today. Call her at 734-8456 after 6 tonight — phone Ferrenburg at 734-2380 after 4 p.m.

Webb stresses that only handmade art may be sold at the show. "If they haven't made it, we don't want it," she says. The variety of items available will be wide. If lawn ornaments aren't your thing, perhaps paintings or fine leatherwork are.

In addition, there will be lots of food. Domino's Pizza expects to be on hand, and will be donating half of its proceeds after cost to United Cerebral Palsy. Other available goodies will include food from El Sombrero in Jerome, elephant ears, mini donuts, hot dogs, corn dogs, candy, popcorn

and beef jerky.

Webb and Ferrenburg hope the show grows each year. "Our goal is to fill the whole city park," says Webb. "I think we will within five years."

Here's a look at three exhibitors who plan to be at the arts and craft show this weekend:

### SUNSHINE LEATHER CO.

Country music drifts through the studio near Rock Creek, a perfect accompaniment to work that perfectly captures the spirit of the West.

"Diana and C.J. Hansen are the people behind Sunshine Leather Co., in operation now for four years. Diana says that when the couple started in business, a distributor told them 12 others were beginning similar operations in Idaho. Now, she says, they are the only one that has survived."

Diana attributes the company's success to the fact she and C.J. refused to go into debt to fund their ventures. They prefer to let the business grow at its natural rate, letting it pay for itself.

In crafting their saddles, harnesses, pack equipment, scabbards, holsters and other leather goods, the Hansens are living their dream.

"We both grew up with horses, guns and leather," says Diana, whose family was in the area before the Twin Falls tract was laid down. "We're both working with materials we love."

C.J. grew up in the area near Bear Lake in extreme southeastern Idaho. He started

learning the ropes of leatherwork as a child, later going to work for a saddlery in Utah. "The saddles were garbage," he says. "I knew I could build a better one."

About 75 percent of the Hansens' work is done on custom order. The goods are handmade from start to finish, and they are not cheap in any sense of the word. A travel bag costs \$450, but C.J. estimates he put a total of 120 hours into its creation. "Leather is a premium product anymore," he says.

The Hansens do a lot of repair work, too. C.J. has restored saddles dating back as far as 1870. They've shown their work at events throughout the Northwest and say a benefit of their travel has been meeting many customers who have turned into friends.

### JERI BUTLER

Jeri Butler of Twin Falls started showing her work at Art in the Park in 1978 and was a fixture at the show until organizers decided that her crocheted works were not "original" art and were therefore ineligible for the show.

Butler received a good dose of vindication last year, when she was nominated for a Governor's Award in the Arts. And although she's been invited back to Art in the Park, she's sticking with the Arts and Craft show instead.

She disputes the idea her work isn't a fine or original art. "A painter, for example, would have to paint a funny-looking deer or two to be original," she says.

Butler specializes in delicate crocheted doilies. She uses patterns dating back to

1897 and fine, years-old threads she often finds at estate sales. "That makes them antiques," she says.

But Butler cannot follow the patterns exactly. She is left-handed, so she has had to adapt directions and do her work backward. The disadvantage is she cannot teach crochet to anyone else. The advantage: No one can copy her work.

Butler does work in conjunction with Pat Heck on many projects. Together, they've crafted doilies, tablecloths, wall hangings, holiday ornaments and bedspreads.

With the help of her daughters Judy Aslett and Brenda Malone and granddaughter Jennifer Aslett, Butler also makes decorative, year-round wreaths with dried flowers. The fall is a particularly busy time for them. "We're kind of like elves at Christmas," says Jennifer. "And Grandma is Santa."

Crocheting has also proven good therapy for Butler, who has suffered carpal-tunnel syndrome and arthritis resulting from a thyroid condition. "The more I crochet, the less arthritis I have," she says, adding that the crafts have helped her regain a once-faltering grip.

### DAN EDWARDS

Although he's only been creating bronze sculptures since 1986, Dan Edwards already has had the thrill of knowing his work made it all the way to the White House.

Edwards, who lives south of Twin Falls, was selected several years ago to create a

## Emmy awards celebrate 50th anniversary of TV

**PASADENA, Calif.** — One year after they celebrated their 40th birthday, the Emmy awards salute television's 50th anniversary Sunday with an affectionate look at the past and honors for present-day excellence.

From Ralph Kramden to Heathcliff Huxtable, from Ed Sullivan to Arsenio Hall, from "The Growing Pains" to "Growing Pains," the 41st Annual Emmy Awards will span the years.

The Prime-Time Emmy show, to be televised live Sunday from the Pasadena Civic Auditorium by Fox Broadcasting Co., will also be notable for what it doesn't contain. For the first time, no clips will be shown from nominated shows. And it will have no production numbers — no song medleys, no high-kicking chorus line.

The CBS miniseries "Lonesome Dove" leads the nominations with 18. Other multiple nominations went to NBC's "L.A. Law" with 17, the ABC miniseries "War and Remembrance" with 15, ABC's "The Wonder Years" with 14, ABC's "Shirtsleeve to the Sea" with 13, and NBC's "The Golden Girls" and

Fox's "The Tracey Ullman Show" with 10 each.

"We're going to reach back and present some of the wonderful images, memories, faces, pictures and words that we've forgotten — but that we remember well and want to see again," said John Moffitt, co-executive producer with Pat Tourk Lee for the Academy of Television Arts & Sciences.

"Everyone seems to like the clips of the old shows. And everyone complains about the production numbers. We'll be able to take a long look at the past and still keep it to about three hours by eliminating the numbers and the clips of the nominated shows. Nobody'll miss those clips and it will speed up the show."

Lucille Ball, who died in April at age 77, will be posthumously honored with the Governors Award. She will be remembered with a five-to-seven-minute retrospective, including a clip from the pilot of "I Love Lucy." Bob Hope, her frequent co-star, will present the award to her husband, Gary Morton.

"She was doing films when other people were doing live TV, so there's an enormous

## Celebrities reveal all to pre-empt tabloids

**LOS ANGELES** — Call it tabloid backlash. Fed up with supermarket publications that peek into their bedrooms, hospital rooms and psyches, celebrities are striking back, telling their secrets before the tabloids can.

"Kate Jackson, one of TV's original 'Charlie's Angels,' chose last month to make public that she had just undergone a modified mastectomy after doctors discovered breast cancer. She said that she did so to help other women facing this difficult situation, encourage early detection of breast disease through mammography — and to save inquiring minds 50 cents." (The Star honored the story "Kate Jackson's Breast Cancer Heartbreak" on its Aug. 29 cover.)

Actor Michael J. Fox turned the tables on the National Enquirer in a piece written with his brother-in-law, Michael Pollan, managing editor of Harper's Magazine, for the June Esquire. They

described how they thwarted the Enquirer's assault at Fox's wedding last summer in Vermont with the aid of Los Angeles-based security consultant Gavin de Becker and by infiltrating the Enquirer's command post near the wedding site. They told of "a massive, multiple-front offensive" by the Enquirer, which deployed six helicopters, handed out wads of bills as bribes and even considered dressing a photographer in a llama suit and stationing him in a nearby meadow. All in pursuit of what Pollan and Fox called that "mutation of reality" that shows up at your local A&P.

Virginia King, mother of actress Demi Moore and mother-in-law of actor Bruce Willis, said that she was wounded by the Enquirer, then by the Star, after a "friend" apparently had tattled, for money, about her past. She steadfastly refused to talk to either publication. On Aug. 22, the Star ran a story about her "slide into alcohol abuse" and "her violent scrapes with the law." King, who is

# Hollywood finishes record summer with \$2 billion in ticket sales

**HOLLYWOOD (AP)** — The blockbuster action film "Batman" and the comedies "Honey, I Shrunk the Kids" and "Parenthood" helped Hollywood rack up a record summer gate of \$2.05 billion, according to recently released figures.  
The office revenues from Memorial Day to Labor Day were up 31.7 percent from last summer's record \$1.7 billion.  
"Batman" emerged as at least the sixth-biggest smash in movie history with ticket sales to date in excess of \$240 million.  
"Nobody in the business can predict how big a movie goes once it goes big," said Rob Friedman, president of worldwide advertising and publicity for Warner Bros. "Did we know 'Batman' was going to be a big movie? Yes. Did we know how big? You never know."

Exhibitor Relations Co. President John Krier, whose company compiles box office figures, said, "The popularity of 'Batman' created a lot of interest in other movies. And once people arrived, there was a little bit of everything out there, great variety."  
Among those contributing to the record season were adult moviegoers, who in recent years have stayed at home. "Although exact figures were unavailable, it is believed older patrons boosted the grosses of 'Dead Poets Society,' 'Parenthood' and 'Honey, I Shrunk the Kids.'"  
"I've always maintained that if there are good movies out there, people will go to them," said Si Kornblit, executive vice president of worldwide marketing for Universal, which distributed "Parenthood."  
The healthy summer season was

expected to lead to a record year at the nation's theaters, which took in \$4.46 billion last year.  
"In a summer stuffed with sequels, 'Indiana Jones and the Last Crusade,' 'Lethal Weapon 2' and 'Ghostbusters II' entertained capacity crowds for weeks."  
But it was original, uncollected programming such as "Dead Poets Society," "When Harry Met Sally..." "Parenthood" and "Turner & Hooch" that gave this summer's Top 10 list its real depth.  
Five summer movies surpassed the \$100 million mark: The top five, respectively, were "Batman," "Indiana Jones and the Last Crusade," "Lethal Weapon 2," "Honey, I Shrunk the Kids" and "Ghostbusters II." The titles accounted for 40 percent of all summer tickets sold.  
Rounding out the Top 10 were

"Dead Poets Society," "When Harry Met Sally..." "Parenthood," "Turner & Hooch" and "Star Trek V: The Final Frontier."  
Even though it finished in the Top 10, "Star Trek V: The Final Frontier" was not a huge hit, as were a number of other heavily promoted sequels. "Karate Kid III" and the latest James Bond installment "Licence to Kill" also failed to spin turnstiles with any consistency.  
"In the horror genre, the rereads 'A Nightmare on Elm Street 5: The Dream Child' and 'Friday the 13th VIII: Jason Takes Manhattan' did not make killings at the box office."  
Several other summer films featuring superstar names yielded benchwarmer business. The high-powered flops included Clint Eastwood's "Pink Cadillac," Sylvester Stallone in "Lock Up," "Casualties of

War" starring Michael J. Fox and Sean Penn, and Dennis Quaid's "Great Balls of Fire."  
Several industry observers have said the summer record was sparked by higher ticket prices, with some theaters in New York and Los Angeles charging \$7 per admission.  
The studios countered that today's movies must compete with pay-cable television and videocassette rentals.  
Warner Bros., propelled by "Batman" and "Lethal Weapon 2," led the studios in summer revenues. The studio accounted for 24 percent of all tickets sold.  
Disney, with no sequels and no overpublicized epic, quietly claimed the No. 2 spot with its "Honey, I Shrunk the Kids" and "Dead Poets Society."

Among the major studios, Tri-Star and MGM-UA had the most miserable summers, finishing last and next-to-last, respectively.

(On Sept. 5, the Enquirer can what the charge is a far-fetched account of their story under the headline — 'Star Sky & Hutch' Star AIDS Tragedy.' It got top billing over 'Malcolm Forbes Bites Liz: Don't Marry That Penniless Bum!' and 'L.A. Law Hunk Dumps Wife...')  
Such actions are being applauded by other Hollywood personalities who have tangled with the tabloids, among them Susan Dey of 'L.A. Law.'  
"What makes people feel better about reading the ramblings of other people?" she asks. "Why do you have to share the most intimate parts of your life with strangers?"  
Striking back at the tabloids is not new. In 1981, for instance, Carol Burnett won \$800,000 in a libel suit against the Enquirer, which she said had implied in a 1976 gossip item that she was drunk in a Washington restaurant.  
What has changed is the way in which it is being done. Celebrities who at one time may have ignored the tabloids print are instead stealing their thunder. And that's because today, the staff on which the

tabloids feed is apt to be far more devastating to the stars and their families than titillating gossip about who is being seen with whom. Like society at large, the famous are dealing with such issues as drug addiction and AIDS — and violence at the hands of the mentally disturbed.  
Enquirer editor Iain Calder did not respond to calls or a telegram requesting an interview for this story. Richard Kaplan, editor of the Tarrytown, N.Y.-based Star, said via a spokeswoman that "he doesn't want to make any comments."  
The Glasers said that they implored the Enquirer not to print a story, citing their own concerns for their son, who, like his mother, has not developed AIDS, but that their pleas were unsuccessful.  
Publicist Josh Baran, who encouraged the Glasers to come forward, said that other tabloids had been sniffing around, getting close. "But when an Enquirer reporter called to say he had their daughter's death certificate, Baran said, 'We knew we had to go public. They'd been dredging this moment for years.'"  
According to the story in the National Enquirer, a seemingly security-minded Michael J. Fox had a dozen security guards standing by at Cedars-Sinai Hospital while his wife, Tracy Pollan, gave birth in May to their son, Sam Michael Fox.  
De Becker, security consultant to Fox and numerous other stars, chuckled over that one — "They did not have anything remotely approaching 12 security personnel."  
But there were people present to intercept tabloid reporters, says De Becker, said, employed such tactics

as paying an orderly to snoop and pretending to be friends visiting chef Wolfgang Puck's wife, Barbara Lazaroff, who was also a maternity patient.  
But in De Becker's view, many of the papers' stories are not a laughing matter: "There's an unhappy marriage between cranks, crackpots, crazy people and the tabloids."  
Peter H. Brown, a Los Angeles-based free-lance writer and former Gannett reporter who wrote for the Enquirer for a short time, said: "You never have any legitimate sources. You say 'I'm from the National Enquirer' and everyone hangs up, even the police." Sometimes the Enquirer actually attributes its tips to the "gossip fairy."  
One Brown assignment was a story about Elvis Presley's ghost haunting the set of the 1979 Shelley Win-

ters-Kurt Russell film "Elvis." He recalled: "It wasn't good enough that people perceived Elvis' ghost on the set. The Enquirer wanted someone to have felt Elvis—Elvis had to have touched someone or pushed someone." Finally, he found someone on the set willing to say it.  
The Enquirer's rule, Brown said, was that "someone had to say everything on tape ... you had to get someone who was even in the least way connected with (a story) to say it, like a makeup person, anybody. It was usually someone talking about a rumor."  
He recalled being told during a visit to the Enquirer's Lantana, Fla., headquarters that the tabloid "hooks its readers and keeps them by touching on subjects that involve fear — fear of death, fear of illness, fear of rape, fear of God."

## Bunny Wailer returns to the stage

NEW YORK (AP) — Sixteen years ago, Bunny Wailer, Peter Tosh and Robert Marley released "Catch a Fire." The album catapulted the reggae trio to international fame.

A world tour followed. But Wailer, who is more at home in the hills of his native Jamaica than the concert stage, returned home and vowed never to go on the road again.

The mystical mountain man busied himself writing and recording songs on his own label, Solomonic, and farmed the land at the same time.

"I think I love the country actually a little bit more than the city," Wailer said. "It has more to do with life, health and strength. The city takes that away sometimes. The country is good for meditation. It has fresh food and fresh atmosphere — that keeps you going."

This year, he launched a tour to support his "Liberation" LP, which took him to 13 cities in the United States.

His recent performance at Radio City Music Hall with the Switch Dance Troupe marked his first New York appearance since selling out Madison Square Garden in solo concert nearly three years ago.

Wailer was born Neville O'Reilly Livingston 42 years ago. His career began in 1963 in a Kingston, Jamaica slum where he and his childhood friend, Robert Nesta Marley, teamed with Winston Hubert McIntosh, later to be known as Peter Tosh, to form the legendary group, the Wailers.

After the release of their first hit, "Summer Down" in 1964, the Wailers' popularity spread throughout Jamaica. By 1966, they had five records in the Jamaican Top 10. But the pulsating sound of reggae went largely unnoticed by the rest of the world until the "Catch a Fire" LP.

On their first tour, they met thunderous applause as audiences throughout the world jammed stadiums, packed concert and theater stages and lined dance halls to catch a glimpse of those "natty dreadlocks" from Jamaica.

While Marley and Tosh lost no time blazing international trails for themselves, Wailer headed for the Jamaican countryside to be close to nature.

Marley, whose "I Shot the Sheriff" was covered by such rockers as Eric Clapton, and who had become the biggest of the reggae stars, died of a brain tumor at the age of 36 in 1981.

Tosh, who left the Wailers in 1973 and formed his own group, World, Sound and Power, was nominated

for a Grammy for the LP "Captured Live" in 1985. He was gunned down and killed in his Jamaican home on Sept. 11, 1987 at the age of 42.

Marley and the Wailers did more to popularize and refine reggae than any other artists. They had hits with "Sir I U," "Get Up, Stand Up," "No Woman, No Cry" and "Could You Be Loved."

Bunny Wailer considers himself just as much a farmer as a musician, and helped provide food for victims of Hurricane Gilbert last fall.

"Sometimes people pay less attention to these things (food) but they turn out to be the most important things. I am a farmer," said Wailer, who was in the United States when the hurricane smashed into the Caribbean island.

Wailer chartered a jet, filled it with food and flew to Jamaica. When Wailer returned to his farm on the border of Portland and St. Thomas parishes, he found his home undamaged.

"Liberation," his fourth album on the Shanachi label, includes messages on hunger, drug abuse, apartheid and freedom. The LP also contains a copy of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights.

Based on the history it projects, it's taken 400 years to write," Wailer said in an interview. "When I said I was going into the studio, that only took four months. But to get all these things together, it has taken my lifetime and so many other lifetimes before."

Wailer was joined on portions of the "Liberation" tour by Tosh's son, Andrew, and the Grammy-winning Ziggy Marley, Bob Marley's son.

## Industry prepares for jukebox anniversary

LAS VEGAS (AP) — A San Francisco saloon owner applied some imagination to one of Thomas Edison's inventions a century ago and developed a machine that has nicked-and-dimed generations of Americans out of billions of dollars.

Some 7,000 members of the Amusement and Music Operators Association gathered in Las Vegas this week to pay homage to that innovation, the jukebox, now listened to by 75 million Americans each week.

Owners, distributors and manufacturers of coin-operated amusement, music and vending equipment at-

tended the convention to see what's hot in separating Americans from about \$7 billion annually in spare change. Industry sources say the 25,000 commercial jukeboxes in use bring in nearly \$1 billion of that.

The convention showcased the latest in video arcade games, but the jukebox was the star of the show as the industry geared up for the music machine's 100th anniversary.

On Nov. 23, 1889, Louis Glass fitted a coin slot on an Edison phonograph machine that played a song recorded on a wax cylinder. Glass installed listening tubes in the phonograph at

his Palais Royale Saloon in San Francisco. He called his innovation a "Nickel-in-the-Slot" machine and the idea gave birth to arcades featuring 19th century jukeboxes. The arcades became a forerunner to today's video game arcades.

Just as the music has evolved, so have jukeboxes changed.

Among the 50 to 100 machines featured at this year's show were jukeboxes in a modified tail section of a 1957 Thunderbird automobile, in the cab of a Chevrolet truck and in the stern of a boat.

Original jukeboxes offered a tune

for a nickel, then later for a penny as the fad caught on, but most of today's machines require at least a quarter — and many of them accept \$1 and \$5 bills.

The jukebox has evolved from wax cylinders to vinyl 78s to 45s and now compact discs. Some players offer video hits, an idea that isn't as revolutionary as it might seem.

"Edison came out with a machine in 1906 in which glass slides would flip in time to the music," says jukebox historian Charley Hummel of Wayne, N.J. "That was really the first video-type machine."

# 'Casualties of War' is DePalma's best

The following are capsule reviews of movies now showing in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and the Los Angeles Times. Opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

**CASUALTIES OF WAR (R).** Brian DePalma's bad-dream vision of the Vietnam War. Based on Daniel Lang's New Yorker reportage — about a reconnaissance squad that kidnapped, raped and murdered a Vietnamese farm girl — it turns into a hallucinatory battle epic with a screwy loose, a nightmare reeking with blood, tears and cold sweat. Michael J. Fox plays the role, a soldier obsessed with justice, with laid-back, tamped-in skill. Sean Penn, as the squad sergeant and chief rapist, bursts the boundaries of his, creating a blood-chilling macho paradigm. Easily DePalma's best movie: His flamboyant style and themes — guilt, voyeurism, violence, sex and special corruption — are all in place. But he doesn't have to reach for a shock. This devastating plea for innocence caught in the cross-fire has numbing force of its own.

**THE ABYSS (PG-13).** It's perfectly possible to have a mindlessly pleasant time in this intense *Tidy-Bowl* bluesiness. You just relax and let go. You may just wonder when you come out if you haven't pruned a little. Writer-director James Cameron's vision (carried with him not surprisingly since he was 17) is complete with men who say "Steady, big fella," to each other without a

trace of irony. Mary Elizabeth Mastrantonio and ice-blue-eyed Ed Harris do manage to bring fire to all this damp tinder, but it can't have been easy.

**HONEY, I SHRUNK THE KIDS (PG).** Shrunk suburban kids, accidentally tossed out with the trash by their mad scientist daddy; try to fight their way back home through a yard turned into a jungle of monstrous bees and towering foliage. What happens to them is what happens to the movie: the human shrivel into crawling piffles or caterwauling robots and the grass and the insects and giant cookies take over. It is a special effects marvel, no doubt — but the verbal jokes have the comic timing of a mating dance by blind, jealous elephants.

**PARENTHOOD (PG-13).** Those with "impossible" neon-haired teenagers, whose every sentence is punctuated by a slammed door, might swear that "Parenthood" was their group portrait. And adult children of alcoholics might claim the movie as their own after watching the emotional fallout from Jason Robards' boozy, indifferent attempts at fathering, four decades later. Director Ron Howard, who also created the film's original story with Lowell Ganz and Babaloo Mandel ("Splash," "Night Shift"), uses these bittersweet elements like smelling salts, to bring us around after the laughing gas effect of the jokes. Robards and a vestly

put-upon Eileen Ryan are parents of two sons: Steve Martin and young black abseep Tom Hulce, as well as two daughters: Diane West, whose husband has left her, and lovely newcomer Harley Kozak, whose husband (Rick Moranis) also, has not.

**SEA OF LOVE (R).** A slick, knowing genre film made fresh and diverting by a sense of humor and the bright presences of Al Pacino, Ellen Barkin and John Goodman. Barkin deftly handles the pivotal role as a stunning Manhattan businesswoman who may also be a serial killer whom Pacino's veteran cop is pursuing. Goodman is Pacino's witty partner. Satisfying as long as you don't ask more of it than simple escape.

**TURNER AND HOOSH (PG).** A dog-meets-cop version of "The Odd Couple," with Tom Hanks as a picky Felix type and a jowly, drooling, pugnicious Dogue de Bordeaux named Beasley as a slob Oscar. The co-stars generate some chemistry, but three teams of screenwriters have come up with a mystery story that could only bamboozle 12-year-olds who weren't paying attention, a love story that should melt anyone over or under 12 to sleep, and a dog story that dogs themselves might actually enjoy—if the pages were edible.

**UNCLE BUCK (PG).** Writer-director John Hughes has managed to fuse his two genres of choice, the clashing-family comedy and the tortured-teen pic, with mixed results. As the blue-collar relative from hell shunned by all but the youngest rela-

tions in his stuffed-shirt family, John Candy has never been more likable. But to get to the chuckles you have to wade through Hughes' favorite anti-dog stereotypes and then endure the pat of warm resolutions.

**WHEN HARRY MET SALLY... (R).** Genuinely witty dialogue is not exactly a staple of summer movies, but Rob Reiner's newest from Nora Ephron's screenplay bristles with it as broody Billy Crystal and sunny Meg Ryan meet, attract, then worry a lot whether lovers can be friends, and the reverse.

# Hanks, pooch have rapport

**HOLLYWOOD** — When Tom Hanks stares tearfully or fondly at his co-star in "Turner and Hoosh," a Dogue de Bordeaux named Beasley, you can sense a real connection. And when Beasley struts back — wattles matted with froth, huge red eyes in a Winston Churchill-ish glower — these two actors seem to have genuine respect for each other's abilities. Hanks shrieks; Beasley cocks his head. Hanks pants; Beasley barks. Hanks kvetches; Beasley sniffs. Hanks flinches; Beasley jumps on him and chomps jovially at his throat.

otherwise behaving like Walter Matthau un-leashed. There is another love interest in "Turner and Hoosh": a beautiful feisty veterinarian (Marc Winingham) who pops up as if by magic; she also, conveniently, has a gorgeous collie. But, basically, Hanks and Beasley are the whole show.

For a while, it's not a bad show at that. One reason "Big" worked well was the unself-conscious way Hanks projects boyish qualities of enthusiasm, curiosity, petulance, candor, spontaneity. He really looks and acts like a kid at heart and, in this movie, he looks like a fussybudget of a kid who needs a good, big, sloppy dog to warm him out. The production team behind them, with director Roger Spottiswoode and virtuoso camera-

man Adam Greenberg ("Near Dark"), gives "Turner and Hoosh" crispness and pace. Spottiswoode's movies are always beautifully edited, and there's a sheen to the images: When Beasley shakes his jowls, slow-motion sweat and drool fly off him like sunit beads in a beer commercial.

The basic plot of a man-dog team tracking criminals suggests movies don't actually influence each other but somehow break out all at once, like epidemics.

They work together with the seeming near-telepathic sensitivity of a long-time vaudeville partners. It's good that "Turner and Hoosh" has this chemistry at its center, due to the actors and to Beasley's ingenious trainer, Clint Rowe, because it is another movie that seems stranded without a script, somewhere south of the last deal and east of the fifth rewrite. It's the story of Turner, a small-town pier cop in a coastal city, who inherits the obstreperous pooch Hoosh after his master (John McIntire) is knifed in the aftermath of a mobby murder, leaving the faithful dog as sole eyewitness.

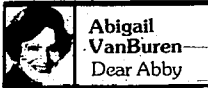

## Boomer baby books booming

In a circle they sit  
On the floor in the store,  
And their mommies and daddies  
Will pour out much more  
Of their two-income paychecks  
To score books galore  
In a trend that the  
Publishers surely adore.  
It may not be Dr. Seuss, but it's true.

As the parents of any 5-year-old who has attended a story hour can attest: Books for the littlesst of us have become very big business.

Sales of children's books are the fastest growing in the industry, publishers are expanding their children's divisions and bookstores catering to the small set are opening at a rapid clip. There are even several club books for young readers and readers-to-be.

The reason is obvious to anyone who has dropped by a hospital maternity ward lately or tried to find a baby-sitter on a Saturday night.

"We baby boomers are all breeding," actor Bruce Mahler said recently after a visit to Happily Ever After, a Los Angeles children's bookstore, to buy a present for his daughter Zahra's upcoming fourth birthday.

An estimated \$967.3 million will be spent this year on hard-back books for children and another \$536.5 million on paperbacks, according to the Book Industry Study Group, a non-profit research organization. That is up 15 percent for hardbacks and 156 percent for paperbacks compared to five years ago.

The boom in children's books has been aided by curriculum changes in schools that supplement textbooks with literature, a need by independent bookstores to specialize to survive the onslaught of well-financed chains, and the popularity of the public television show "Reading Rainbow," industry watchers say.

Children's publishing is different from the adult market and can be very lucrative for publishers, said Diane Roback, children's book editor at Publishers Weekly, the industry's trade magazine.

"In the adult market, a book will go to market and six months later if it hasn't taken off, it's dead," Roback said. "A children's book has at least 18 months" and many old favorites continue to sell well even though the

authors have been dead for decades, she said.

Consumers are also relatively insensitive to price increases on children's books, said Barbara Marcus, vice-president of marketing for Scholastic Books.

"The price insensitivity and longer shelf life makes it a profitable business," she said.

But the price of books is a concern; many parents say. The price of all books has risen steadily since 1984, but children's books are a relative bargain compared to other types of books, according to the 1988 Gallup Annual Report on Book Buying.

"I have trouble paying \$15.95 for a book my kid is going to outgrow in six months," said Terry Wang, a special education teacher.

Even for publishers, the business isn't exactly the goose that laid the golden egg. "Most children's books don't sell hundreds of thousands of copies," said Howland of Harcourt Brace Jovanovich.

The business can be tough for book retailers.

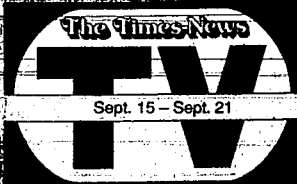

# CBS sets its newest offering 'Wolf' on San Francisco's tough waterfront

By WENDY WALLACE

Tony Wolf is a lonely man. Once a police officer, he was driven from the force after being framed on a drug charge and has dropped out of sight for two years. Now he wants only to return to San Francisco's North Beach district to mend relations with his embittered, Old-World father, Sal Lupo (Joseph Sirola) and to repair the family's dilapidated fishing boat.

"Wolf has a newness in life after having been a really intense, high-strung, regimented type of person," says Jack Scalla, who stars as the discredited cop in the new series "Wolf," airing Tuesdays on CBS. "He really invested a lot of himself emotionally into his work. It became his whole priority — to the point where he alienated his friends and family."

"And after being busted from the police force for conduct unbecoming an officer, his return home represents a trying to find out who he is now," he continues. "It becomes important for him and the people around him to maintain relationships, because he doesn't have this job anymore. He is coming back to put his life together with his father. That is his priority."

Set on San Francisco's rugged wa-

terfront, the adventure series centers on Wolf's attempt to return emotionally to his family. In an attempt to clear his name, Wolf reluctantly agrees to serve as a private investigator on particular cases for Dylan Elliott (Nicolas Surovy), the upper-crust attorney (now married to the younger sister of Wolf's ex-wife) who helped remove him from the force. "Wolf" will place much emphasis on family relationships, a topic very important to Scalla.

"Right now, the genre that seems to be working within television is family-oriented," says Scalla. "But in 'Wolf,' you see not everything turns out great. Tony challenges his father on a very honest level — he's bending over backwards to try and set things right. His father Sal is an older man who is so set in his ways. And Tony who is to slap his father in his face verbally. So you see a lot of emotional levels — including the pain that Tony goes through."

"A lot of people will relate to 'Wolf,'" Scalla adds. "Not everything will end on a great note. It is not love and roses. And hopefully everyone will grow together. It's important to me and those working on the show. There are a lot of fine lines for 'Wolf'

not to become another cop show."

Born in Brooklyn, N.Y., Scalla's first career was baseball. He pitched two seasons for a Montreal Expos farm team, but an arm injury led him to try modeling, then acting. He starred in the series "The Devil Connection" (with his mentor Rock Hudson, 1982), "High Performance" (1983), "Berrengers" (1983), "Hollywood Beat" (1983) and had recurring roles in "Remington Steele" and "Dallas" (1987). His TV work includes "The Starmaker" (1981), "The Other Lover" (1985), "Club Med" (1986), "I'll Take Manhattan" (1987) and "Remington Steele" (1988).

"What 'Wolf' will offer the viewer is the interpretation of Tony Wolf — no longer as a cop," says Scalla. "It is a real-life situation. It's about values, principles and finding out who we are."

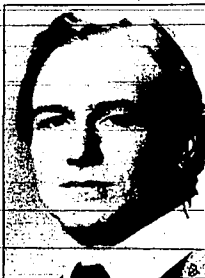

In fact, in his forthcoming film, "Look Who's Talking," they had to do some additional shooting later on, and you'll see Travolta has gone back to eating spaghetti. When it comes to his movies, that's another matter, as his advisers

seem to be geniuses at picking rotten or unsuitable projects. Alas, this latest one, I hear, is no exception.

# Ethnic comic Jackie Mason posed writing problems in 'Chicken Soup'

The shows that have been big hits for producers Marcy Carsey and Tom Werner — the one-two punch of "The Cosby Show" and "Roseanne" — took the work of stand-up comedians and translated it into conventional domestic sitcoms.

They faced a more difficult task with Jackie Mason. He was anything but a domestic-oriented comic. He was more of a lonely guy with the troubles of the world coming down on his head.

So they got veteran comedy writers Saul Turteltaub and Bernard Orenstein to take Mason's heavy ethnicity and turn his work into another conventional sitcom format — the odd couple. In this case it is Mason's Jackie Fisher, a very Jewish, very short middle-aged man, and Lynn Redgrave's Maddie, a very Catholic, somewhat tall and somewhat younger woman who lives next door.

The "I-say-tomato, you-say-tomah-toe" stuff goes further. He lives with his mother (nicely played by Rita Karin), she lives with her three kids from a marriage that has left her a widow. In the pilot, he has a health-induced mid-life crisis and

quits his job in the garment district, while she is fulfilled with her job teaching at a community center. His mother does not approve of his dating across religious lines, and her brother feels the same way.

The show is "Chicken Soup" and will run Tuesday evenings. With Mason, a rediscovered comic who is suddenly a superstar, at the center and, more importantly, with the time slot after "Roseanne," this looks like a can't-miss hit.

But it could miss. For starters, the whole format is forced. It looks all too much like the only thing that has attracted these two people to each other is the opportunity to do a sitcom together.

Wisely, Mason's character has been constructed just as Cosby's and Barr's were — as a funny person who is in the middle of this situation. That means they are allowed to be funny, to tell jokes, for everyone's amusement. But, at times, the jokes in "Chicken Soup" don't arise organically from the plot, they seem more like Mason suddenly going into a bit of his stand-up.

Indeed, "Chicken Soup" is constructed so that Mason gets to do straight stand-up at the beginning and end of each show, when he sup-

posedly goes up on the roof and talks to himself. Of course, he talks to himself with perfect timing and occasionally looks at the laughing audience and smiles, but who's to notice?

Unlike the comic characters of Cosby and Barr, the likable wise-cracking centers of families, Mason's stand-up character gets much of its humor from being uncomfortable in the world. Nobody tunes in week after week to see someone be uncomfortable. So the scripts must walk a thin line to keep Mason as likable as he is in this first half-hour while still giving him the vulnerable edge he needs to be funny.

Now, all those trepidations aside, the fact is that "Chicken Soup" has a well above-average number of laughs. Mason is no Robin Williams — at times his well-worn act makes Bob Hope look like a conceptual artist — but he is funny.

And funny is the bottom line on a comedy. Handled right, with the characters carefully developed, with the clichés and stereotypes narrowly avoided, "Chicken Soup" can be a nice show. Just don't expect a bowl of it every week to cure every disease known to man.

## Fatal Delta crash becomes docudrama

NEW YORK — Given TV's penchant for docudramatizing everything but the making of a docudrama, it was inevitable that the fatal crash of a Delta Air Lines jumbo jet in 1986 would become a fact-based TV movie.

Strange thing, though. There's a superior example of the breed in "Fire and Rain," the USA Network's made-for-cable version of that stormy-day tragedy as the big jet approached the Dallas airport. The crash killed 136 people on the jet and a motorist on the ground.

A fair number of docudramas tend to be excessively dramatic, full of screams, distortions on behalf of dramatic "truth," hokey dialogue, loud, hype-the-story music, and even bad acting.

But the two-hour "Fire and Rain" is pretty much the opposite, a thoughtful, surprisingly restrained drama by Gary Sherman that covers a lot in two hours with only a

few clinkers and with a generally solid cast.

Sensitively directed by Jerry Jameson and filmed in Dallas, its emphasis is not so much on the whys of the crash as its aftermath — the accident's traumatic effects on survivors, the families of the dead and injured, and even two volunteer emergency medical workers — well-played here by Charles Haid and Dean Jones — who do what they can to help after the tragedy.

Guilt, compassion, anger, anguish and helplessness — the whole emotional range is nicely stitched together, with some scenes that linger in the memory, like Jones near tears as he quietly puts a mud-spattered dead child into a black rubber body bag, one of many such bags lying on rain-damp concrete outside an airport hangar.

During the film's two hours, a cliché occasionally escapes. And it did not seem a wise idea to bring Angie Dickinson, David Hasselhoff and pop singer Patti LaBelle to the proceedings, Dickinson in a medium-size role, and the other two in small ones.



## 'Cheers' keeps NBC tops in Niensens

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The CBS Western series "Paradise" stamped into the Top-10 of the Nielsen ratings with a special two-hour Sunday premiere rounding up a number of Western stars from the past.

The show, which stars Leo Horsley, leaped to ninth place for the week ended Sept. 10 from a tie for 66th place the week before.

NBC's "Cheers" was first and "The Cosby Show" was second as ABC's "Roseanne" dropped from first the previous week to third. NBC won the week for the 61th consecutive week.

"Paradise" was lifted out of its usual place at the bottom of the ratings by a special season opener featuring Hugh O'Brian reprising his role as Wyatt Earp and Gene Barry in his former role as Bat Masterson. Other Western actors also appeared. The show's regular appearance Saturday will also feature several former Western actors.

CBS' "Rescue: 911," the only other premiere of the week, was in a three-way tie for 20th place. William Shatner is host of the show, which features real-life emergency rescue situations.

The week also saw Fox Broadcasting's Sunday-night "Married... With Children" return to the Top 20. It was in 17th place for the second time this summer, the highest a Fox show has ever finished.

Fox's "Totally Hidden Video" was tied for 33rd, "America's Most Wanted" was tied for 42nd place and "Open House" was tied for 51st place.

Here are the Top 10: NBC's "Cheers," NBC's "The Cosby Show," ABC's "Roseanne," NBC's "The Golden Girls," NBC's "Dear John," NBC's "Empty Nest," NBC's "A Different World," ABC's "The Wonder Years," CBS' "Paradise" and CBS' "60 Minutes."

The finish of "Paradise" and "60 Minutes" marked the first time since July that CBS had a show in the Top 10. CBS's prime-time programming Sunday was delayed because of the unruly of its coverage of the U.S. Open Tennis Tournament.

NBC was first in the A.C. Nielsen Co. survey with an average of 11.3. ABC was second with 9.9 and CBS was third with 9.1.

ABC had the highest rated evening news show with 8.7. CBS was second with 8.6 and NBC was third with 8.2.

The lowest rated network show was NBC's "Saturday Morning Preview." Here are the five bottom shows: NBC's "Saved by the Bell" preview, CBS' "Tour of Duty," CBS' "3 Star Comedy Edition," CBS' "Woodstock Special" and NBC's "Saturday Morning Preview."

## Lloyd Bridges plays lawyer who defends Ku Klux Klan member

LOS ANGELES (AP) — He was the most brilliant defense attorney in the state of Indiana and it was the most important case of his career, yet Lloyd Bridges plays him as a man who was happy to lose.

It was 1925, and Eph Inman's client was David Curtis Stephenson, grand dragon of the Ku Klux Klan and the most powerful man in Indiana.

The story of Stephenson's trial is told in the upcoming NBC miniseries

"Cross of Fire." He was tried for second-degree murder in the death of a young woman he had held captive and attacked.

"Eph Inman was considered the best lawyer in Indiana," Bridges said, "and Stephenson wanted the best for his defense. Eph was shrewd and folksy. We see that he was very clever, but he didn't have much to work with. Stephenson didn't have much character."

The anchorman was asked by a caller if the flap had affected his access to the White House for news.

"Does it affect my personal access

to the White House for news?

The answer is yes," Rather said. "Does it affect CBS News overall in their access to the White House? I think that is not yet clear."

He added that he hoped there had been no affect on access by other CBS News staffers.

King asked him if he'd attend a White House state dinner if he were invited to one.

"Well, I haven't been invited," Rather replied. "I'm not in the habit of turning down invitations I don't have."

"I think in the end he was glad he didn't succeed in getting him off. He lost very few cases. It was the most important case of its time and if he had won it would have been another feather in his cap."

The case destroyed the Klan in Indiana. Stephenson, angered that Gov. Ed Jackson wouldn't pardon him, released his "little black box." Its contents sent a congressman, the mayor of Indianapolis, the sheriff of Marion County and numerous other officials to prison. Jackson was indicted for bribery.

John Heard stars as Stephenson, Mel Harris is Madgo Oberholzer, the young woman who falls for the charismatic Klan leader, and David Morse is the small-town prosecutor who wins a conviction. The two-part, four-hour miniseries will be telecast this fall.

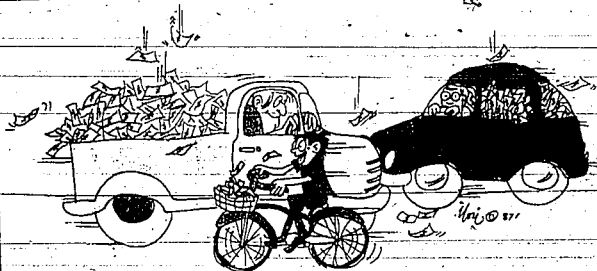
Bridges will also be seen later this season in the ABC midseason series "Capital News" and has just completed work on a feature film, "Joe Vs. the Volcano."
