Missing boy slept much of time in mine shaft

SALT LAKE CITY — When 10-year-old Joshua Dennis was rescued from an abandoned mine after five days, he had long since exhausted his tiny supply of licorice but thought he'd been missing only a couple of days.

"Mostly I just slept a lot of the time. I got tired of looking around and just sat there," the boy said Thursday. "I wasn't feeling very lonely or scared ... but I cried once."

His feet mottled purple with mild frostbite and propped on a pillow, Joshua spoke from his hospital bed just 24 hours after rescuers found him on a ledge some 2,000 feet inside the mine where he got lost during a scouting expedition. "I was just following the wall," after being

He'll do just fine," Dr. Ted Jenkins said. The boy's father, Terry Dennis, said Joshua went into the Hidden Treasure mine with 10

bite-size pieces of licorice in his pocket. He separated from his father inside the mine last Friday night, he said. "There was a whole bunch of exits and I went down the wrong one."

Joshua is in good condition and expected to go home to suburban Kearns over the weekend, his doctor at Primary Children's Medical Center said. "He's squared away ...

After five days, hope had all but vanished that the boy would be found alive. Then a search team that had passed within 150 feet of him in half a dozen sweeps heard his faint cry and discovered him on the ledge.

Joshua said that during his vigil he had heard

Singing Bridge replacement tops Idaho list

TWIN FALLS — Replacing the Singing Bridge is Idaho's No. 1 bridge construction priority, and work on the new bridge will begin a year earlier than planned, a state official said.

In addition, inspectors have decided not to lower the existing bridge's load limits — preventing costly detours for trucks.

Phil Batt, a member of Idaho's Transportation Board, said Thursday the board had voted to move up the starting date for a replacement bridge in 1993. It had been planned for 1994.

"We treated it the best we could for a big project like that," Batt said. He said the board's decision to boost the project's priority was based on a department rating this year of 4 on a scale of 100.

The \$3.5 million price tag on the project will take all the federal money the state receives for bridge replacements for the year, he said.

Meantime, after extensive repairs to the Singing Bridge this summer, state officials decided Wednesday that the bridge is strong enough that it does not require lower load limits.

"For now, things will remain normal, but I can't tell you what it

will be six months from now," said Doug Chase, bridge maintenance engineer.

City Manager Tom Courtney said the repairs are good news. "We were very concerned that they would change the load limits," Courtney said, the bridge, which crosses Rock Creek at the south end of town, is heavily used by trucks traveling to and from the city's industrial park.

"Had they changed the load limits it would not have been the end of the world but it would have caused us to change routes and cost us more on gas," said Mike Johnston, Universal Frozen Foods plant manager.

Earlier this year, the bridge's poor condition indicated the state would likely have to lower the bridge's load limits this month, said Jeff Miles, former bridge inspection engineer for the Transportation Department.

But Chase said this summer repairs restored the bridge to the same condition as when the current load limits were set.

Chase said his office fed a computer the results of an inspection two weeks ago at the Singing Bridge that followed extensive welding and joint repairs on the bridge.

Because of the bridge's condition, the state will inspect it twice a year instead of only annually, Chase said.

Even in death, Marcos unwanted exile

HONOLULU — Ferdinand E. Marcos succumbed to cardiac arrest Thursday, but even in death he remained an unwanted exile; his remains barred from U.S. air lanes, his political legacy still stirring passions in his Philippine homeland.

Marcos, who ruled the Philippines for more than 20 years before being ousted in February 1986, died at 12:40 a.m. Thursday at St. Francis Medical Center. He was 72.

Doctors said kidney and lung failure and a widespread infection contributed to the cardiac arrest listed as the cause of death.

The canny, combative politician, who governed at times as a democrat, at times as a dictator, died without facing trial on U.S. criminal charges he plundered the Philippine treasury.

While Marcos spent nearly 10 months in the hospital, his family begged Philippine President Corason Aquino to let him come home to die, but she refused.

Mrs. Aquino took office as a result of the popular revolt that drove Marcos into exile, and her government has survived six armed attempts to overthrow it. She said she refused again after his death to allow his burial in the Philippines for the sake of "the tranquility of the state and the order of society."

Philippine opposition leaders urged her to reconsider.

"It is just so wrong. It is his birthright. He is a Filipino, the greatest Filipino," said Joe Lazo, president of the Honolulu group of friends of Marcos.

Later Thursday, the Federal Aviation Administration in Washington prohibited any aircraft from flying Marcos' remains out of the United States for the Philippines.

saying it would "create a danger to the safety of the aircraft and persons involved."

Lazo said family and friends would pay respects at Marcos' hilltop home overlooking downtown Honolulu and the Pacific Ocean. Marcos' remains, in a polished wooden casket, were taken by hearse to the mansion Thursday morning.

The house will be open to mourners 24 hours a day until Sunday, then his body will be taken to a local mortuary for viewing through Thursday, Lazo said.

Mrs. Marcos did not want reporters and photographers to view the body in a group Thursday, but said journalists could come in later without their cameras and notebooks, Lazo said.

A funeral Mass is planned for next Friday, but there are no definite plans for burial, Lazo said. He said Mrs. Marcos would keep trying to bring her husband back to his homeland. "She knows that's what he wanted."

Marcos' mother, who died in May 1988, has been embalmed several times and lies unburied because Marcos was not allowed into the Philippines for the funeral.

Tomas "Buddy" Gomez, Philippine consul general in Honolulu and an outspoken Marcos critic, said he would not attend the memorial service and urged Mrs. Marcos not to "exploit her husband's death."

Marcos' death was confirmed at about 1:15 p.m., when his son, Ferdinand Jr., emerged from the intensive care unit and said his father had been taken to "a higher place."

alike will look beyond the man to see what he stood for — his vision, his compassion and his total love of his country," said the composed younger Marcos.

Marcos' family had told doctors to do everything they could to save his life, and life-support equipment was not turned off until after Marcos died, Peyuan said.

A staunch U.S. ally during his presidency, Marcos claimed he was tricked by U.S. authorities into leaving his homeland. But he said he had no hard feelings toward former President Reagan or President Bush, who as vice president traveled to Manila in 1981 and praised Marcos and his government for "your adherence to democratic principles."

House approves capital gains tax cut, hands Bush a victory

WASHINGTON — The House easily approved a 30 percent cut in the capital gains tax rate Thursday, handing President Bush a major victory on one of his campaign pledges and delivering a stinging blow to the new House Democratic leadership team.

The temporary capital gains tax cut, contained in a \$16.6 billion budget-cutting bill, was endorsed when the House voted 239 to 190 to defeat an alternative sponsored by the Democratic leadership.

The Democratic plan would have raised billions through higher taxes on the nation's wealthiest taxpayers and used the money for deficit reduction and for an expansion of partially tax-deferred Individual Retirement Accounts (IRAs).

The lopsided defeat suffered by House Speaker Thomas S. Foley, D-Wash., and his leadership team was engineered by an almost solid phalanx of Republicans and 64 Democratic defectors, the bulk of them southerners. Only one Republican voted for the Democratic alternative.

The issue next goes to the Senate, where many lawmakers predicted it will be equally difficult to resist the siren call of a tax cut that in the

short run would raise revenue for the Treasury because it encourages the sale of stocks, bonds and other assets even if it would add to the huge federal deficit in the long-term.

"We are addicted to short-term fixes that make people happy, and it's haunting us," said Rep. David E. Bonior, D-Mich.

Senate Finance Committee Chairman Lloyd Bentsen, D-Tex., who has proposed an IRA plan of his own as an alternative to the capital gains cut, said "I think it will be a very close fight over here."

Many House members predicted that the ultimate result of the political struggle over taxes and the budget would be an amalgam of both a capital gains cut and an expanded IRA plan, a prospect that would have serious consequences for the federal deficit.

"This is going to put tremendous pressure on the Senate for passage of capital gains as well," said Rep. William H. Gray III, D-Pa., the Democratic whip. "I wouldn't be surprised if the other body doesn't vote for both."

Thursday's vote on capital gains represented the first major confrontation on fiscal policy

between the Democratic-controlled Congress and the Bush administration and could sour relations heading into next year, when the White House and Capitol Hill face an even more daunting budget choice.

The tax cut approved Thursday permits taxpayers to exclude from taxable income 30 percent of their taxable gains between now and the end of 1991. The top capital gains rate would fall from 28 percent to 19.6 percent, but would return to 28 percent in 1992, when the tax on newly acquired assets would be indexed to inflation.

Because of the expected increase in transactions in stocks, bonds, real estate and other assets due to the reduction, the plan is estimated to raise about \$9.4 billion in the first three years. After that, however, it is estimated that it would lose about \$5 billion a year.

In Charlottesville, Va., for the education summit, President Bush hailed the vote as "a step forward for economic growth, new jobs and American competitiveness..." The cut, said Republican leader Robert H. Michel, R-Ill., "will give us more growth, more jobs and help us all the more to be competitive in an increasingly competitive world economy."

City shares 23rd place with Pocatello in nationwide cost survey Living is cheap in Twin Falls

TWIN FALLS — Twin Falls is hanging right in there as one of the cheapest places in the United States to live.

A recent survey found Twin Falls to be tied with Pocatello as the 23rd cheapest place of 269 urban areas surveyed across the nation. Living in Twin Falls costs 9.2 percent less than average.

Pocatello beat out the rest of the nation for the cheapest housing — a whopping 29.8 percent less than average.

The survey taken in July solidifies Twin Falls' reputation as an inexpensive town. Six months ago, Twin Falls was the 11th cheapest place in the survey at 9.9 percent below average.

Twin Falls' ranking has varied from 11th cheapest to 30th cheapest in recent surveys.

Every six months, the American Chamber of Commerce Researchers Association studies costs of living in various U.S. cities. The latest survey was published in March.

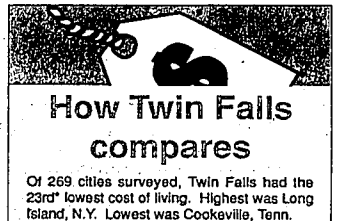
Only groceries cost more than average in Twin Falls — and only by seven-tenths of a percent. Housing costs measured in at 25.3 percent below average, and utilities were 14.6 percent below average.

The other categories — transportation, health care and miscellaneous goods and services — were about 5 percent below normal.

Boise, the other city surveyed in Idaho, came in at 95.1 percent of average. The survey doesn't attempt to measure taxes or wage scales.

The survey found the nation's cheapest

Train-fire truck crash kills 3, injures 150

CALVERTON, Va. (AP) — An Amtrak train smashed into a fire truck at a railroad crossing Thursday night and derailed, killing three people and injuring more than 150 passengers. At least two of the dead were in the firetruck.

Both engines and 11 cars of the southbound Crescent, bound from New York to Atlanta and New Orleans, derailed when the collision occurred about 7:40 p.m. in this northern Virginia town about 40 miles southwest of Washington, D.C., said Amtrak spokesman John Jacobsen in Washington.

The train was carrying 379

passengers and a crew of 20, he said. Five cars of the 16-car train remained on the track, said Pat Jeffrey, another Amtrak spokesman.

Two of the dead were on the fire truck, which was responding to a call from the nearby town of Calteit when the accident occurred, said Sgt. Butler Grant of the Fauquier County Sheriff's Department. It was not immediately known whether the third fatality was also a firefighter.

WRC-TV in Washington reported that four others on the firetruck were unaccounted for.

Fauquier Sheriff's Deputy R.R. Crawford said 150 or more people

on the train were injured. They were transported to nearby Prince William Hospital in Prince William County and Fauquier Hospital in Warrenton.

Dr. Thomas Ryan of Prince William Hospital said the hospital had treated about 26 people, "most minor." Steve Givens, a Prince William spokesman, said three were in serious condition and the hospital expected a total of 34 injured.

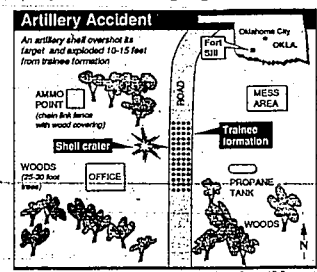
One passenger, in critical condition with head injuries, was flown by helicopter to Fairfax Hospital in Fairfax County, said spokeswoman Mary Stuart-Rick.

Mortar shell kills 2 soldiers at Georgia post; Oklahoma artillery mishap probed

FORT STEWART, Ga. (AP) — A mortar shell exploded and killed two Fort Stewart soldiers during a training exercise Thursday, a day after three soldiers died in Oklahoma when an artillery shell overshot its target.

The Fort Stewart soldiers were killed while firing 4.2-inch shells at the base's mortar range, said Lt. Colonel Herbert Blanks, spokesman for the Army Safety Center at Fort Stewart, which sent a team of investigators to Maj. Donald Keeling, spokesman at Fort Stewart, said the mortar that exploded Thursday morning could have been faulty or one of the victims might have made an error setting the timing fuse on the device.

"At this point, we really don't know what happened, but they were the ones handling the munitions," he said. Keeling said mortar rounds can be set to explode either in the air or on impact. But it was not known yet whether the round exploded in its tube or after being detonated at the base near Savannah in southeastern Georgia.



Officials said the round from a howitzer overshot a target area by about one-half mile and fell 10 to 15 feet behind the soldiers, who were in formation.

Hennies said investigators hadn't determined which artillery was involved in the accident. Post spokesman said 105mm, 155mm and 8-inch howitzers were being fired Wednesday.

Blanks said the two accidents were not similar.

"They heard a whistle of incoming, a yellow blast and then they were blown off their feet," Col. William Gonzalez, commander at Reynolds Army Hospital at Fort Sill, said some of the soldiers told him. "It's amazing what the power of a shell can do."

Jon Long, another post spokesman, said the accident site was about four miles from the populated area of the post, which has 21,000 soldiers.

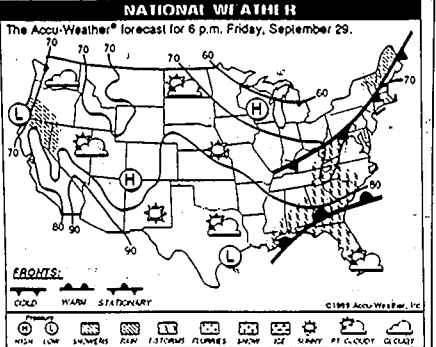

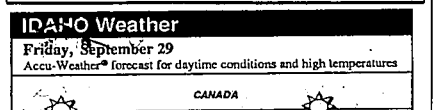

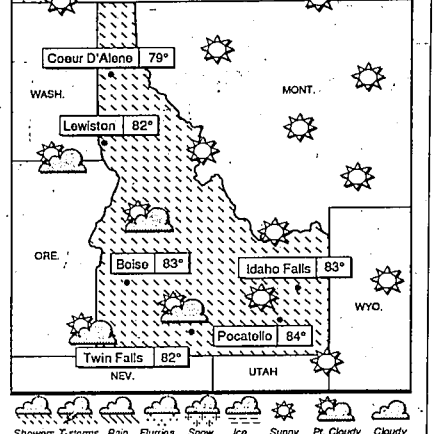

In addition to electronic warfare live ammunition has been proposed for the Saylor Creek range. During recent interviews with the Times-News, Air Force officials said they would like to see the area serve as a 21st century training ground.

Erickson said conventional battlefield munitions have failed to obtain information used by the Air Force in narrowing its choice to Utah for the projected \$3 billion simulated combat test range for sophisticated weaponry and aircraft.

Erickson said conventional allied organizations, and the citizens of this state will no longer tolerate being treated like ignorant rubes, nor will we tolerate the efforts of the military to use our lands and our skies for a giant military playground," he said.

Hill Air Force Base spokesman Lon Barry said the Air Force had no immediate comment on the lawsuit.

The Air Force has delayed its release of a draft environmental impact statement on the giant

project, Barry said. No formal public hearings have been held. Some local Utah officials and residents have attended introductory "scoping hearings," he said.

Dick Hector, chief of the electronic combat project division at HAFB in Ogden, said the draft impact statement probably will be released in December.

Erickson wants access to information that he believes will be excluded from the document but that he contends will show the Air Force and DOD had been planning to construct the battlefield in Utah long before plans were announced in 1987.

Similar freedom of information requests have been made in Nevada in connection with a Navy electronic battlefield outside Fallon Air Base near Reno. Another similar Utah project is being proposed in North Carolina.

"So it's either Utah or nothing and for them to pretend otherwise is a sham," he said. "They can't justify it to the people of Utah or the court."

He said if that is the case, the FOI lawsuit could result in another lawsuit claiming the agencies violated the National Environmental Policy Act.

The proposed battlefield has drawn the ire of cattle ranchers in western Utah and the Juab County Commission, which claims the Air Force has begun construction on some "threat sites" before any public hearings were held.

Many of those sites are on Bureau of Land Management or state-owned properties surrounding the sprawling Utah Test and Training Range in the west desert.

Hector pointed out that much of the air space above those sites has a military special use designation.

Military flights have upset members of the Utah Cattlemen's Association, who complain their herds are being bothered by supersonic flyers.

"This is rural America under siege by the military," complained Erickson. "It's time to draw the line in the sand."

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Feds investigating Grand Canyon Airlines Twin Otter crash

TUSAYAN, Ariz. (AP) — A survivor of the crash of a sightseeing plane at Grand Canyon Airport said Thursday she saw the pilot struggling with the controls before the aircraft "got straight up" and flipped over and crashed to the side of the runway.

Meanwhile, federal investigators went to the scene of Wednesday's crash, which occurred as the Grand Canyon Airlines DHC-6 Twin Otter was landing after a flight over the Grand Canyon.

John Lauber, a National Transportation and Safety Board member, told reporters that federal investigators, along with representatives from Pratt-Whitney, which is the engine manufacturer, and de Havilland of Canada, which built the aircraft, expect to remain on the scene for four or five more days.

However, Lauber said it would be about nine months before the NTSB determines what caused the twin-engine plane to suddenly veer away from the runway and crash.

Lauber said transcripts of radio traffic between controllers and the pilot revealed nothing unusual. "They were cleared to land and that was the last communication with the aircraft," he said.

"The investigation will be made 'somewhat more difficult,'" Lauber said, because no flight data recorder equipment was aboard

the aircraft. The devices aren't yet required for the DCH-6, but will be next year, he said.

Lauber said investigators hadn't yet spoken to any of the survivors.

However, from her bed at Flagstaff (Ariz.) Medical Center, crash survivor Katherine Mayes told reporters she had heard and felt the right wheel of the aircraft touch the runway and skid.

The 66-year-old retiree from Nashville, Tenn., said she saw the pilot struggling with the airplane's controls just before the airplane "went straight up."

She said she braced herself and heard a buzzing sound that penetrated the entire aircraft before it flipped over.

Ms. Mayes, who suffered a broken pelvis and a severely bruised right shoulder, crawled out of the wreckage.

"I crawled as far away as I could and I waited for the medics. I'm sure they got there as fast as they could, but it seemed an eternity," Ms. Mayes said.

Her three traveling companions, all lifelong friends, also survived.

Also Thursday, Coconino County sheriff's officials released a list of 20 of the people on board. The names of the survivors, said to be a woman from Scotland, was withheld pending notification of relatives, officials said.

Those listed as killed included William Welch, 47, of Sedona, Ariz., the pilot, and Keith Crosson, 43, of Kailua Kona, Hawaii, the co-pilot.

Also listed as dead were Lorraine Murphy, 75, Ransom Lake, Wis.; Barbara Marchand, 61, Meriden, Conn.; Eugenia Sheehan, 78, Youngstown, Ohio; John Sutton, 65, a Modesto, Calif., city councilman; his wife, Donna, 63; Helen Zuckerman, 64, Boca Raton, Fla.; and Joyce Jones, 52, Woodbridge, Va.

Survivors were identified as: Susan Cline, 42, Farmington, Mich.; Virgil Jones, 54, Woodbridge, Va.; Ellen Newman, 75, Youngstown, Ohio; Katherine Mayes, 66, Nashville, Tenn.; Florence Bickley, 63, Manchester, Conn.; Mary Shaver, 57, Nashville, Tenn.; Minnie Bowden, 59, Murfreesboro, Tenn.; Catherine Hampton, 55, Walnut Creek, Calif.; Joanne Pemberton, 57, Murfreesboro, Tenn.; Julius Zuckerman, 67, Boca Raton, Fla.; and Jesse Murphy, 75, Ransom Lake, Wis.

The injured suffered fractures, lacerations and head wounds, said hospital spokeswoman Ann Hartman-Kolucky. Three were in serious condition, one was in guarded condition, and seven were stable.

Governors, Bush agree in framing national goals for public schools

CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va. (AP) — Hearing President Bush's warning that the nation is imperiled when children "emerge into adulthood ignorant and unskilled," the nation's governors joined him Thursday in framing national goals for improving America's public schools.

The objectives, product of a two-day education summit, range from reversing a dropout rate that sends nearly one youth in three into the job market without a diploma to making

educators more accountable for their pupils' classroom performance.

At a convocation with the governors, a beaming Bush sported a blue and orange striped necktie in the colors of the University of Virginia, site of the summit, and declared himself pleased by "the commitment, the creativity and the knowledge that my fellow chief executives bring here to this education reform agenda."

A joint statement agreed upon by

Bush and the governors put special emphasis on expanding pre-kindergarten programs that prepare poor youngsters for schooling.

Bush and the governors also said they wanted to cut through federal regulations and "swap red tape for results."

Gov. Terry Branstad, a Republican from Iowa, said the summit marked the first time governors and a president had agreed upon "specific results-oriented goals" for education — historically a matter under local control.

But Democratic Gov. Richard Celeste of Ohio said the jury was still out on whether Bush had earned the title "education president," he said the administration "painted itself in a corner" by foreclosing the possibility of spending more on schools.

"The president would have been better served if somebody had said, 'Look Mr. President, we can do without these three stealth

bombers,'" Celeste said.

Republican Govs. George Deukmejian of California and Thomas Kean of New Jersey cautioned that the proposed reforms may be resisted by professional educators.

"They like the status quo," Deukmejian said. "The difficulty is going to be that there is going to have to be some restructuring, some accountability, some redirecting of funds, to meet the primary objectives."

Provisions of tax, entitlement bill before the House

WASHINGTON (AP) — Here are some of the major provisions of the tax and entitlement bill before the House.

Several of the provisions, including the catastrophic illness coverage and child care, are subject to amendment or change before final passage of the bill.

CAPITAL GAINS
The bill would reduce the maximum tax rate on profits from the selling of capital assets, such as real estate and stocks.

Through the end of 1991, the current 33 percent top rate would be reduced to 28 percent. The rate would then be raised to 28 percent and the basis of assets "indexed" so that profit caused entirely by inflation would not be taxed.

The change is expected to bring the Treasury additional revenue in the next three fiscal years — \$2.9 billion in fiscal 1990, \$3.8 billion in fiscal 1991 and \$2.7 billion in fiscal 1992 — as people take advantage of the lower rate and increase their capital activity.

After the initial increase, the government's income would drop sharply with losses of more than \$5 billion projected for fiscal 1993 and 1994.

CATASTROPHIC HEALTH
The bill would cut in half the surtax paid by the wealthiest 40 percent of retirees and increase the flat monthly catastrophic premium paid by all but the poorest Medicare beneficiaries. It will allow retirees to turn down catastrophic coverage only if they drop out of Medicare Part B, which pays physicians' fees.

CHILD CARE
The bill includes competing child proposals that will be settled in a House vote next week.

In one version, the Head Start program for pre-school children would be expanded into a full-year, all-day system, along with additional child care in the schools and state grants for child care chosen by parents.

The other would provide an additional \$16 billion in tax credits and state-administered grants to lower-income families over the next five years to help improve child care for working parents. It would liberalize the earned-income credit, which benefits low-income working families with children.

The credit, worth more to larger families, would

could range up to \$1,790 a year for those with three or more children. A new credit of up to \$430 a year would help families with children under the age of 6.

CORPORATE TAXES
The bill includes about \$6.3 billion in net revenue increase for fiscal 1990, including the capital gains cut.

Significant among the others are repeal of the completed-contract method of accounting, by which big defense contractors may defer taxes; eliminate special tax benefits for banks to lend money to Employee Stock Ownership Plans; and an interest break on big banks' large loans to developing countries.

The bill would also require companies to move quickly to give the government the payroll taxes they withhold from employees, and would repeal a 1986 tax law provision aimed at ensuring that employer-financed health plans don't discriminate in favor of higher-paid employees.

The bill would extend the 25 percent deduction for health insurance premiums paid by self-employed workers, due to expire this year. A variety of existing tax-code incentives would be extended, including authority for state and local governments to issue tax-exempt bonds for low and middle-income housing, a research and development tax credit and a break for employer-provided educational assistance.

EXCISE TAXES
The bill would cancel a scheduled reduction in the 8 percent tax on airline tickets and 5 percent tax on air freight. The 3 percent federal tax on telephone service, scheduled to expire at the end of next year, would be made permanent.

OZONE LAYER
The bill would levy \$4.3 billion in new taxes over the next five years on profits of companies making ozone-depleting chemicals.

The Bush administration sought the measure, which targets windfall profits that chemical companies could earn after an international treaty reduces supplies of chlorofluorocarbons. The chemical industry denies there will be windfall profits.

CFCs destroy the ozone layer in the stratosphere and increase risk of skin cancer.

A similar provision is pending before the Senate.

PENSIONS
The bill would put new restrictions on employers, seeking to terminate pension plans, in order to discourage companies from using those assets for other purposes.

AGRICULTURE
The bill would change the system for paying deficiency payments to some farmers, reducing the fiscal 1990 deficit by changing the calculations and shifting some of the costs to fiscal 1991.

STUDENT LOANS
The bill would institute a six-month amnesty program for people who defaulted on their student loans. The loans and interest could be repaid without additional penalties during the amnesty.

FAIRNESS DOCTRINE
The Fairness Doctrine, which required broadcasters to allow time for opposing viewpoints, would be re-established. It was abolished during the Reagan administration.

DIAL-A-PORN
The bill would require telephone companies to block access to "Dial-A-Porn" services unless a customer requests such access. A more sweeping ban on all such services passed in the last Congress was ruled unconstitutional by the Supreme Court.

SOCIAL SECURITY
The bill increases to \$10,440 by 1991 the amount that a Social Security recipient may earn without having benefits reduced, a \$600 increase. The Social Security Administration would be made an independent agency, removed from the Department of Health and Human Services.

TONGASS FOREST
The provision would cancel two long-term

contract with timber companies that have been harvesting trees from the Tongass National Forest at cut-rate prices and open logging to competitive bidding.

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Biggest perestroika achievement symbolized by Soviet Union's press

MOSCOW — Today we are moving away from the trance into which Soviet society once lapsed — either on orders or from sheer fright — to a concrete assessment of all that has happened to us.

We are reading our press with unprecedented attention; we are peering intently into the TV screens. We are rethinking ourselves and our place in life.

Transforming society and telling the truth are daunting propositions in the Soviet Union, where we still have laws — never formally renounced — that could land half, if not all, of the most fervent glasnost supporters in jail.

Confusion reigns in the house under reconstruction. Apart from looking for new paths to the future, there is a hunt for those who would like to arrest the positive changes in the Soviet Union. That is why it lives amid constant attempts to slow it down, to apply the brakes.

The Soviet press symbolizes the biggest achievement of perestroika. For the first time, the press represents a threat to those who would like to arrest the positive changes in the Soviet Union. That is why it lives amid constant attempts to slow it down, to apply the brakes.

The relationship between events and the reporting of events is traditionally complicated. In the absence of even a hint of a law on the mass media (although the Soviet legislature is working on one), too much depends on the boss and his whim.

There were times when the bosses loved us! This love reached its peak 10 or 15 years ago, when the press was swimming in a torrent of sunny news. The Soviet people read the papers meditatively while standing in endless lines and at best their attitude toward the press was that of compassion. But the bosses loved us!

It was then that one of the most ridiculously showcased publications, Ogonyok, received the country's highest decoration, the Lenin Order. The magazine was horrible, but eminently tame, which was the reason it received the order. Ogonyok's tales of prosperity flowed merrily on; to express doubts of the actual existence of prosperity was not only unpatriotic but also subject to legal action.

Repression is not the only weapon against the media. They can also be pampered and domesticated.

It seems that Soviet society has a stable, unchanging optimism. Sometimes the bulk of optimism is in the upper levels of power, and sometimes it flows downward, to the people, leaving the leaders in a state of deep worry.

In this country, the population has never rejoiced as a whole. In the years of terror, Josef Stalin and his team beamed from countless posters and official photographs. Today, as we move tortuously toward democracy and renovation, the bureaucracy demonstrates profound pessimism or even outrage. The picture of a beaming leader today is a rarity.

The bureaucrats had been building the country for themselves. Now they are doomed to fight to the death. They have no choice.

But this is also true of the rest of the country. Having started to think and analyze, the people cannot stop, no matter who tells them to do so.

With this new habit of thinking, we are making discoveries that add little to our feeling of comfort. For instance, we have recognized that there are a great many dishonest people among our leaders. The main criterion for selection to the top jobs in this country was always the ability to obey, rather than brains or original ideas. Unquestioned loyalty to ideological dogmas was always worth more than professionalism.

That was true everywhere. When I entered the editorial office of Ogonyok for the first time, I asked for a special Central Committee decree that had been adopted on the subject, or perhaps it was simply the initiative of my overzealous predecessor. "There was no special decision," was the answer, "but no one has objected."

It is necessary to mention that my predecessor, who successfully killed the old Ogonyok, was pensioned off with the title of the Hero of Socialist Labor?

Even in this time of change, the official "fighting unit" functions as before. I refer to the Communist Party's daily Pravda, as well as subversive television and radio.

People in this country had long been accustomed to a precooked dish of news, instead of separate components with which everyone makes his own meal. The country lived on a diet of commentary rather than reporting. But a new generation of readers is emerging along with a new generation of reporters.

The bureaucrats open their mailboxes with trepidation every morning. This is not so much because some unexpected article or a block-busting interview might appear. The problem is that social control is slipping from their grip.

A process of serious, dignified thinking is going on in the country, and this is reflected in the mass media. The censors remove one, two or more articles, but this no longer changes the overall situation. With the absence of a press law, the relationships between the editor and the censor are full of mystery and half-legal actions, relying for the most part on the temperaments of both.

Freedom of expression is a complicated phenomenon in a country unable to feed its population and apprehensive of awakening thought. We are trying to steer the middle course between China and Poland. The Communist Party does not intend to lose its monopoly on power as in Poland, but neither does it plan to support its authority with tanks as it did in China. This makes the press the crucially important instrument.

We are building the country. We are trying to create a new society, where time-honored traditions and institutions will be given new places and functions.

I am editing a magazine that fights for this goal in the new society and for the new place in it for ourselves. "Please, don't be afraid," the readers are encouraging us. "Write the truth!" This is a completely new situation in the Soviet press: We now depend on people who are craving the truth. Let it be forever!

Marcos plundered his nation, left it in ruin

Former Philippines President Ferdinand Marcos, who died Thursday, will be praised by some as a friend of the United States who helped his nation make the transition from conquered Japanese territory in World War II to American ally of the post-war years.

But his accomplishments, if that's what they can be called, in bringing stability and order to his nation, were overshadowed in our view, by his sorry record as a vicious dictator and thief who, with his wife Imelda, plundered his own land and left it in near ruin.

Marcos's death this week came three years after he was forced into exile by a popular uprising, led by the widow of the man his soldiers murdered on orders from his high command; he left a country mired in poverty and threatened by communism while he and his pudgy wife travelled the world in high style.

Since his 1986 overthrow by Corazon Aquino, Marcos has remained sequestered in Hawaii, fending off inquiries by Philippines officials into the vast sums of money he plundered from his country and hid overseas, some of it apparently in American bank accounts and real estate.

Those investigations will undoubtedly continue and through them, we may finally all learn the true extent of his thievery.

The occasion of Marcos' death has elicited faint praise for the man by governments around the world, and there are sure to be comments from politicians on the American right who will honor him even more.

He was a particular darling of the right-wingers in the Senate, who have long had a curious ability to overlook the most odious of dictators, as long as they are "anti-communist" enough.

The Marcos story of a corrupt dictatorship can be found in all other parts of the world, from Vietnam to South Korea, from Taiwan to Panama, from Cuba to Cambodia. The story does not distinguish between capitalism and communism.

It is already apparent that much of Marcos' claims about himself were based on deceit and outright lies. He once said Fidel Castro was the only politician he respected because he knew the value of deception. Hey, Ferdinand, we can nominate a tax!

Years from now, when the principal players are long gone, we think historians will have a solid fix on Marcos, his reign and the decrepit state in which he left his country.

He will be seen, we suspect, for the odious petty dictator he was, a man whose removal from power rightly freed his nation to find a better destiny.

His passing, in our view, should be not so much a cause of mourning as it ought to be a time of reflection on how and why we Americans came to support such individuals.

Quit wasting so much time, spend it writing more letters

The mail carrier was once a heroic figure, braving sleet and fog and dark of night to keep our ancestors in touch with the world. Now, he has become a garbage man in reverse, delivering the stuff instead of collecting it.

I am sure postal employees are no happier about this than the rest of us. They must surely hanker after the days when people ran smiling out of their houses to grab the day's mail, just the way you see it in old black-and-white movies. "As long as there are postmen, life will have zest," wrote William James in the last century. Not any more: The average homeowner today is more likely to hide in the basement when the postman (or woman) calls.

You feel the change most when you have to sort through the mail that has accumulated during summer vacation. This year, ours weighed 12 pounds, including the bathroom scale, and there was nothing of the slightest interest in it. In three weeks, our mailbox had attracted dozens of catalogs, charity appeals, utility bills and advertising messages, all addressed personally to us by computers, and not a thing from a real human being.

This tidal wave of junk is all that is left of the old habit of correspondence. Letters used to bring news from loved ones and lovers, stories from travelers, ideas and

opinions to think about and argue with, support and encouragement, and some-thing to do. That is why we used to look forward to the mail delivery like a meeting with an old friend.

Of course, you have to send letters in order to receive them and, in this frenetic decade, who has the time to write letters? The answer is: almost everybody.

If you add up the hours you spend watching TV, cutting the grass, flatter- ing the cat and having anxiety attacks — all a pure waste of time — you will discover enough free hours in the day to keep up a correspondence like Napoleon, who was reputed to have written more than 50,000 letters in his busy lifetime.

Letters are intimate and personal. The mere fact of writing a letter to someone implies that you care enough to spend the time, and that you have something more meaningful on your mind than a greeting-card message.

The final degradation of the letter must be those already-written note cards that contain messages like: "Our innermost thoughts and feelings are things we usually keep to ourselves. But with you I can share everything." Such ready-packaged sim-

mexy rings as true as a computer-printed expression of concern about your health from an insurance company.

The best personal letters have something of Dale Carnegie, something of stream-of-consciousness, something of a report from the battle zone, something of a confession and something of an editorial. In other words, the ideal letter flatters the receiver, tells some secrets about the writer and is full of the kind of news you cannot find in your morning paper. A letter like this challenges you to come up with a worthy response.

Letters are the real diary of our lives and relationships. Phone calls and computer messages leave no traces, no history, behind them, which explains their attraction for illicit lovers.

But there's maybe your love will not leave a trace either, unless you write it down? In your old age, when all the other fires have burned low, you'll still have your love letters to keep you warm — if you wrote any.

Hundreds of romantic plots depended on love letters like Emma Bovary's, lying like a time bomb in some forgotten drawer. Letters lost, letters found, or letters mailed in the wrong envelope. Will future romance novelists have to depend on system errors in computer networks to separate their hero and heroine and bring them together again?

Love itself was different when people conducted their affairs by letter. For separated lovers in America's early days, correspondence was the central fact of their relationship, allowing the couple to learn each other's minds and characters. Lovers would correspond if they were apart for only a few hours, and the whole process induced a delicious state of suspense.

The mail carrier was love's messenger, until the railways and the phone made it possible for lovers to be always together, and discover their hidden shallows.

If this seems like pure nostalgia, consider that letters are still by far the cheapest form of communication. You can send half a dozen massive pages to your California lover for 25 cents, which must be the biggest bargain anywhere. If you could only persuade your teenagers to write to their friends instead of phoning, you could save the price of a new car within a year, and they would shoot to the top of their English classes.

The art of letter writing is not completely lost. People do write me about my columns, and I appreciate it. Mostly these are helpful letters, pointing out the fatal flaws in my logic and the dismal wrong-headedness of my opinions. But, in general, we seem to be doomed to an eternity of soulless electronic communication.

Unless, that is, we can overcome the junk mail problem and bring the post office back up to its old standards. The postal system used to be more efficient. Sherlock Holmes would place an advertisement in the morning Times, and wait eagerly for replies in the afternoon mail. Now he would have to cool his heels for most of the week, and would probably miss the solitary letter in a pile of catalogs. Three, four and even five deliveries were once common in British and American cities. Even today, the British have two deliveries.

I know the U.S. Postal Service cannot afford a second delivery, so here is my modest proposal to bring back letter-writing and restore the mailman's status as a bringer of news.

First-class service should be reserved for letters that contain bulk mail without computer-generated addresses. The first-class delivery would thus be small, but all guaranteed as good stuff, or at least worth the effort of opening it.

All other mail should be consolidated at each post office distribution center, and trucked directly to the mailbox where it is going anyway. The time and effort saved could be put to good use: writing letters.

Time to let Washington know how citizens feel about IRAs

Individual retirement accounts may be making a comeback, and it is time for citizens to let the folks in Washington know how they feel about that possibility.

Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, D-Texas, has proposed enhancing the IRA as a way of staving off President Bush's call for restoration of capital gains taxes.

Not wanting such "fat cat" taxes, the Democrats had to come up with an alternative appealing that it would carry the day. The IRA has been the main engine of enthusiasm that greeted Bentsen's proposal and has since given way to the frenzied inertia that passes for work in Washington.

In its brief unfettered lifetime, from 1982 to 1986, the IRA was a tremendously popular retirement savings vehicle, as well as the only true tax shelter available to the middle class. Individuals could extend \$2,000 a year in earnings from taxes if those funds were put into a qualified IRA; better yet, the investment earnings on IRAs were sheltered from taxation until the funds were withdrawn.

Sadly, IRAs were a partial casualty of the 1986 tax-cutting Congress, in approving much lower tax rates, also leading to curb tax benefits, both to save money and to make the tax system fairer for everyone.

As a result, complicated new IRA rules were enacted. For employees not covered by any type of qualified retirement plan (mostly the self-employed these days), there were no IRA changes.

But for most income earners — those with 401(k) plans and other employer saving plans — the deduction for IRA contributions was sharply limited.

Single taxpayers start losing deductibility when their adjusted gross incomes cross \$25,000, at the rate of \$200 in IRA deductibility for each \$1,000 of income. Thus, when single incomes reach \$35,000, there is no deduction allowed for IRA contributions. Married taxpayers face a similar situation when their joint income reaches \$40,000, and lose all deductions at the \$50,000 level.

Although IRA earnings are still deferred from taxes until retirement, the curb on tax deductibility has sharply reduced the use of IRAs as a retirement savings vehicle. At the end of 1988, the deduction for individual funds, the volume of sales of mutual-fund products for IRA accounts plunged 41 percent in the year ending April 15, 1988, which was the first full tax year fol-

lowing narrowing of the IRA rules.

Now, there was a stock market crash in that period, which may have detracted from the IRA's appeal. But there is nothing about that in a safe mattress. But there is little doubt the tax-law changes badly tarnished IRAs.

And, as you probably know, there has been growing concern these past few years about the low rate of personal savings in the U.S. economy. Americans been saving only a few percent of their disposable income, thus providing a small pool of savings for reinvestment in the economy.

(Money spent on the consumption of food, cars, houses and the like can also find its way into investment spending, of course, as the companies receiving our payments use some of the money to pay for capital projects. However, a large and growing pool of personal savings — money NOT spent on current consumption — is an essential source of stable capital that can be placed directly into bonds and other long-term investments or loaned but by financial service firms.)

The personal savings rate has risen somewhat in the past year or so, but remains between one-third and one-half the level in most other industrial economies. With Uncle Sam already soaking up so

much capital to fund its massive budget deficits, a low pool of personal savings robs the private sector of needed investment capital funds to invest costs for the funds that are available.

Now, you may yet be able to witness a wonderful ideological donnybrook over why our national savings rate has plunged and what role the demise of the capital gains tax played in this process. Certainly, there is lots of ammunition available for those favoring a return to some form of a tax break for profits earned from long-term investments.

There is the obvious, namely that our reduced savings rate has occurred in roughly the same time frame as the disappearance of capital gains taxes. That argument tends to get drowned out by naysayers who claim that it is just a rush to push through yet more tax breaks for the rich.

A more effective tack may be for capital gains supporters to use a return to capital gains taxation as a way of actually raising "junk bond" financings and other perceived abuses of the financial system that are linked to short-term, greed-induced investment schemes.

By providing clearly superior tax treatment to long-term investments, backers can say, a return to capital gains taxation can help bring about the desired refocusing

of investment markets to longer time horizons.

Sounds good, but I am not so sure I buy the wisdom, setting up a scale of holding periods in Washington whose votes would match seems likely to distort economic behavior in unpleasant ways we're not smart enough to predict.

I am confident that making IRAs attractive to middle-income and upper-middle-income taxpayers will add substantially to the national pool of savings, while also providing a badly needed source of additional retirement income.

There is a valid question of whether all wage earners have the expertise to oversee the proper investment of their IRAs. I would like to see IRAs enhanced and linked with voluntary employer-assisted investment programs, perhaps similar to those now offered with 401(k) programs.

But what I want isn't nearly so important as what you want, and whether you're willing to communicate your desires to the people in Washington whose votes will ultimately determine whether there are changes in IRAs, capital gains or any other tax provisions.

Anti-AIDS drug to be made available

WASHINGTON (AP) — A promising new anti-AIDS drug still in the early stages of testing will be made widely available while safety and effectiveness trials continue, the government announced Thursday.

The plan for expanded distribution of didoxynosine, or ddI, marks the first time an unapproved, experimental AIDS drug will become so widely available so early in testing.

Didoxynosine has stirred much anticipation and expectation in the AIDS community because early study results have shown it may be effective in stopping replication of the AIDS virus with fewer side effects than zidovudine, known as AZT, the only FDA-approved drug to combat the AIDS virus.

Senate approves hurricane aid

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate on Thursday approved \$1.1 billion in emergency aid for victims of Hurricane Hugo as the White House announced that President Bush will inspect the storm damage in South Carolina.

It was the largest such disaster-relief measure ever approved by either chamber of Congress, according to Bill McCada, a spokesman for the Federal Emergency Management Agency.

The aid, which was expected to win quick approval in the House, was attached to a stopgap spending resolution intended to keep government agencies operating when the new fiscal year begins Sunday.

Cervical cancer kills 4,500 each year

ATLANTA (AP) — Cervical cancer kills about 4,500 women each year in the United States, most often in the Southeast, federal health officials reported Thursday.

The disease, the risk of which increases with the number of sexual partners, killed an average of 4,543 American women each year in the period 1984-86, the U.S. Centers for Disease Control said. Average mortality rates were highest in the Southeast, from the District of Columbia to Louisiana.

Nine Southeastern states and the District of Columbia were among 13 with annual cervical cancer death rates of more than 45 deaths per million women. The nine states were Alabama, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee and West Virginia. Others were Alaska, Maine and North Dakota.

Diuretics may raise heart attack risk

NEW YORK (AP) — Patients taking diuretics to combat high blood pressure were urged Thursday to ask their doctors about a new study showing that the drugs may increase the risk of a heart attack.

Doctors estimate that 15 million Americans use diuretics, the most commonly prescribed medicines to treat high blood pressure. The study, published Thursday in the New England Journal of Medicine, found that while the drugs do indeed lower blood pressure — thus lowering the risk of a heart attack — they also do two things that raise the risk of a heart attack.

The drugs raise the blood levels of cholesterol and other fatty substances called triglycerides, and they interfere with the body's use of insulin and sugar.

Miscarriages not greater in Louisiana

ST. GABRIEL, La. (AP) — The rate of miscarriages in this section of Louisiana's Chemical Belt is no greater than in any other part of the country, Tulane University scientists said.

The university's School of Public Health and Tropical Medicine began the study nearly two years ago after informal research by a St. Gabriel pharmacist logged more than 60 miscarriages by 50 women over three years.

One hundred residents attending a community meeting to hear the report Wednesday night didn't like what they heard.

Congress told HUD losses may hit \$7 billion

WASHINGTON (AP) — Disclosure of massive FHA mortgage insurance losses — half to fraud and mismanagement — has tripled to nearly \$7 billion the cost to taxpayers of the still unfolding scandals at the Department of Housing and Urban Development, officials said Thursday.

Previous estimates had put the total cost at \$2.2 billion for the widespread fraud, influence-peddling, insider-dealing and mismanagement at HUD during the Reagan administration that has been uncovered since last spring.

But new estimates Thursday put the tab at \$6.9 billion, including at least \$3.2 billion in newly uncovered Federal Housing Administration losses to defaults on home mortgages in 1988 and anticipated FHA losses this year of up to \$1 billion.

Rep. Charles Schumer, D-N.Y., chairman of a special House Budget Committee task force examining urgent fiscal issues in the wake of the savings and loan aid farm credit crisis, called it a conservative estimate.

"It sounds like a reasonable estimate to me," Paul Adams, HUD's inspector general, told the panel.

Adams is the official whose report last spring

on favoritism in the granting of housing rehabilitation grants touched off an avalanche of congressional and Justice Department investigations into abuses at HUD under former Secretary Samuel Pierce Jr.

Comptroller General Charles Bowsher told the panel the chief causes of the FHA mortgage insurance losses totaling \$4.2 billion last year were the same as those that set off the S&L crisis that will cost taxpayers a minimum of \$1.7 billion under a bill passed by Congress last month.

Some of the shortfall stemmed from homeowners in economically strapped areas of the country being unable to make their house payments, Bowsher said.

But he said at least half of it was due to mismanagement at HUD, plus fraud and undercapitalization by private insurers who started writing FHA coverage in 1983 under the Reagan administration's efforts to privatize the program.

"You have to monitor what's happening in the private sector when you delegate to the private sector," Bowsher said, "it's just like the S&Ls. We don't know what's happening with the programs. No one reports a problem until they have

to write a check."

Schumer, whose panel is examining taxpayer exposure to abuses in several supposedly fee-based, self-financed government insurance programs, said the FHA losses "combine the worst of the S&L fiasco and the HUD scandals."

Bowsher said the two other government insurance programs now most vulnerable because of poor accounting practices are the guaranteed student loan program in the Department of Education and the Pension Benefit Guaranty Corp. in the Labor Department.

— About \$960 million of the FHA losses was attributed to the so-called co-insurance program initiated by HUD in 1983.

Basically, it allows private lenders to write FHA insurance coverage for 80 percent of a home, assuming only 20 percent of the risk themselves but collecting large fees up front in the form of points.

But because many private lenders have little or no money of their own at risk as capital in the enterprises, the government often gets stuck for the full tab if the borrower defaults.

Bush, governors like Head Start but money lacking

CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va. (AP) — Head Start, the federal pre-school program, was singled out for praise

by governor after governor at the education summit, but there was no indication they had persuaded President Bush to provide enough money for all poor toddlers to attend.

Bush, in his speech Thursday, made a point of noting that his education proposals to Congress last spring included "an increase in funding for Head Start."

And Bush's chief of staff, John Sununu, said the president was impressed by the governors' praise of early childhood programs such as Head Start and suggested he would continue to make that a top budget priority.

However, Bush's proposed increase — about \$250 million for a \$1.2 billion program — falls far short of what many governors and educators say is needed.

"It is a good program, it works, but it is not available except to about 27 percent of the (eligible) students," complained Colorado Gov. Roy Romer, a Democrat.

Other governors, said Bush's press secretary Martin Fitzwater, also indicated to the president during summit working sessions that "early child" programs, including Head Start, can be critical in terms of ultimate educational success for children who would otherwise start school at a disadvantage to kids from well-off families.

And a list of goals, drafted by White House aides and a delegation of leading governors at the summit, included helping all children prepare for school through nutrition programs, Head Start care for needy preschoolers and other programs aimed at overcoming the effects of poverty.

But, again, no talk of full funding.

Arkansas Gov. Bill Clinton, a Democrat, recalled that during the presidential campaign Bush said he favored the idea that all disadvantaged 4-year-olds be covered.

However, Clinton indicated that governors spending much time fighting for funding for Head Start at the summit would have been "a very foolish expenditure of our time when we have so much more to fight over, argue about or work through."

"There's a difference of opinions among Democrats and a difference of opinions among Republicans,"

said Clinton. "Gov. (Carroll) Campbell (a South Carolina Republican) and I would like to see our children covered with Head Start funds but it's a mistake to think that's the sole subject of the summit."

Head Start, begun as part of President Lyndon Johnson's War on Poverty in 1965, serves about 452,000 youngsters, including 13 percent handicapped. Estimates are that there are 2.4 million eligible

children.

About \$1.2 billion was spent on the program this year. The National Education Association estimates about \$6.3 billion is needed to serve all eligible children aged 3 through 5.

"Certainly Head Start has been a fine program," said Education Secretary Lauro Cavazos in an interview. "The problem that we're getting into is the funding issue again."

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World

Gorbachev protege heads party in Ukraine

MOSCOW (AP) — The conservative chief of the Ukrainian Communist Party lost his position as boss of the Soviet Union's strongest political machine Thursday in a progressive protege of President Mikhail S. Gorbachev.

Gorbachev sharply criticized the dictatorial style of the ousted official, Vladimir V. Shcherbitsky, who ran the Ukraine and its 50 million people with an iron hand for years.

He was retired in a meeting of Ukrainian Communists, which Gorbachev attended.

The new Ukrainian party boss is Vladimir A. Ivashko, who was Shcherbitsky's second-in-command and who three weeks ago used the

pages of the daily newspaper Zvestia to sharply criticize absolute commanders unresponsive to the public.

Ivashko, an economist and engineer, was chosen in a competitive, secret ballot, the Tass news agency said.

Shcherbitsky was expected to lose the Ukrainian job after he was retired from the Soviet Union's ruling Politburo last week in a shake-up that cemented Gorbachev's hold on power.

The meeting Thursday of the Ukrainian Communist Party Central Committee was highlighted by Gorbachev's warning to Ukrainian Communists to stop fighting reform groups and start listening to their ideas and complaints.

"Either we recognize the right of others to independence of thought and actions, either we lead active work to gain public opinion and public sympathies to our side, and multiply — leading — forces — of perestroika, or we turn into a limited

organization, merely claiming a leading role," Gorbachev said in a speech broadcast on national television.

With the exception of Gorbachev himself, Shcherbitsky was last member of the Politburo picked by the late President Leonid Brezhnev, whose rule is now officially termed the "period of stagnation."

Activists in the Ukraine blamed the 71-year-old Shcherbitsky and his men for slowing economic and political reform.

Private home ownership sought

MOSCOW (AP) — Soviet socialism should get out of the housing business and turn it over to a system condemned for decades as the root of evil — private ownership, a lawyer was quoted as saying Thursday.

The lawyer, A. Movye of Moscow, said in the Communist Party daily Pravda that giving away millions of state-owned apartments to their occupants would save the cost of maintaining them, make people more mobile and save the hassle of selling individual apartments only to those who can afford full price.

Besides, he argued, people have already paid for the basically shabby array of state-owned apartments through a variety of indirect taxes. People also pay a nominal rent. Pravda ran Movye's lengthy article on its second page, under the headline "More Profitable To Give Than To Sell" and with the sub-heading: "For The Agents of the Supreme Soviet." It appeared the newspaper was endorsing the idea, but it might merely have been endorsing discussion of the issue. Movye's proposal came at a time when some members of the Supreme Soviet legislature are urging that a measure of private property be reintroduced into a system that has established most forms of private ownership.

S. African mine town march site

KIMBERLEY, South Africa (AP) — Clerics led an estimated 7,500 blacks on an anti-apartheid march through this conservative mining town Thursday, and police stood aside as part of a new policy to allow peaceful protests.

The demonstration began in the black township of Galeshewe and moved into Kimberley, where protesters handed a list of demands to police that included lifting the state of emergency and freeing activists detained without trial.

Marchers sang and danced and some carried the banners of the outlawed Communist Party and the African National Congress guerrilla movement.

Volunteer marshalls guided the marchers. Police were present but did not intervene, and no incidents were reported.

Several dozen whites joined the march.

There have been a series of mass demonstrations across the country since President F.W. de Klerk announced Sept. 13 that authorities would not break up peaceful protests given prior approval by the government.

Most approved rallies in the past two weeks have been peaceful, except for some minor looting at a march last week in the southeastern city of Pietermaritzburg.

The demonstrations have spread from the major cities of Johannesburg, Cape Town and Durban to smaller, more conservative towns such as Kimberley, Oudtshoorn and East London.

They are part of a nationwide protest campaign launched in early August by anti-apartheid groups opposed to the system of legal racial segregation that denies the black majority a voice in national affairs.

Acts in rioting net life terms

BEIJING (AP) — Two people were sentenced to life in prison and three others to jail terms of five years to 12 years for "hoiiganism" during rioting in the Chinese city of Xian this spring, an official report said.

Liu Gang and Sun Guanghu, who received the life sentences, were accused of leading others to attack stores and the railroad station during the April riots, said the report in Wednesday's edition of the Legal Daily.

Three other people were given jail terms of five years to 12 years, the newspaper did not say when the sentencing took place or give any details about the defendants.

Liu Gang also is the name of a student on China's list of most-wanted leaders of the spring democracy movement. The Liu Gang mentioned in the Legal Daily report is not believed to be the same person.

Army pilots unhurt in chopper crash

MANAMA, Bahrain (AP) — Two U.S. Army pilots were rescued unhurt from the Persian Gulf after their small helicopter crashed during a night patrol exercise, the Navy said Thursday.

The OH-58D helicopter was operating from the missile frigate USS Rentz when the crash occurred, 65 miles northeast of Bahrain about 10 p.m. Wednesday, said Petty Officer Joseph Bartlett, spokesman for the Navy's gulf-based force.

A Navy helicopter from the Rentz recovered the two pilots, whose identities were withheld.

The Army helicopters, part of a special operations unit based at Fort Bragg, N.C., are equipped to fly in darkness with little noise.



Moving gasoline tanks for safety is hazardous job

TWIN FALLS — New safety regulations have sent gas station owners scurrying to unearth old fuel tanks, but a bungled job might blow up half a city block, a state fire official warns.

"We haven't been asked to investigate an accident yet," said Don McCoy, Idaho's deputy state fire marshal. But McCoy has heard about mishaps involving tanks — including one fatal accident in Wyoming — and he's concerned.

Because new federal regulations will affect an estimated 75 percent of the underground tanks in the state, McCoy has spent the past three months leading workshops on the proper handling of underground fuel tanks. A meeting in Twin Falls Wednesday night had the largest turnout so far, McCoy said.

The new regulations mandate that all underground tanks carry a \$1 million liability policy by Jan. 1, and that has caught the attention of many, McCoy said.

Speaking Wednesday to 48 station owners, contractors and others with

underground fuel tanks, McCoy related a story about what happened in one Idaho town — though he wouldn't give its name.

Contractors, supervised by local fire officials, dug up a 2,000-gallon fuel tank with about 700 gallons of gasoline still in it. They didn't know exactly what to do with the bulky beast, so they hauled it to a vacant lot on the edge of town and spiked it with seven sticks of dynamite, McCoy said.

That got rid of the tank, but also many windows in town, he said.

The audience laughed at the story, but it was about the only time during the two-

hour meeting that anyone cracked a smile. The audience members learned that old tanks hold a multitude of dangers — including environmental contaminants, dangerous inhalants and volatile explosives.

They spent most of their time poring over government handouts and shaking their heads.

"You aren't the only ones upset or confused by this," McCoy assured them.

New directives from the Federal Environmental Protection Agency call for

Teacher lobbies

for help in child-care

TWIN FALLS — A Twin Falls High School teacher lobbied for more federal assistance for child-care programs during a trip to Washington, D.C., this week.

Representing the Idaho Education Association and a member of the National Education Association's Congressional Contact Team, Roy Nicholson met with Idaho Congressmen Richard Stallings and Larry Craig on Tuesday afternoon to ask for their endorsement on the Early Childhood Education and Development Act, H.R. 3.

Nicholson said the bill, which will be debated next week in the House, calls for \$1.7 million to expand Head Start, provide resources for child-care programs in public schools and to help low-income families with child-care costs.

"Child care isn't just an issue for working mothers," Nicholson said. "It's an issue for the education community, the business community and the community as a whole."

Stallings and Craig were "very positive" about aiding child-care programs, he said.

Former deputy receives

30-day jail term, probation

GOODING — Carl Taylor, former Gooding County chief deputy who was convicted earlier this month of accepting a loan from a man his agency was investigating, was sentenced Thursday to 30 days in Twin Falls County Jail and one year's supervised probation, according to special prosecutor Keith Roark.

Fifth District Magistrate Judge Barry Wood suspended 26 days of Taylor's sentence, however, and Taylor will only spend four days in jail, Roark said.

Although Wood did not impose a fine, Taylor must pay the county for the cost of his public defender.

A six-person jury found Taylor guilty of accepting a \$6,000 personal loan this spring from Arthur Troutner, a vice president of TJ International, formerly Trust Joist, whom the sheriff's department was investigating for possible lewd and lascivious conduct charges.

In making his ruling, Wood rejected a motion by defense attorney Bob Bartlett to dismiss the guilty verdict.

Castleford arrested

on 2 drug-related charges

TWIN FALLS — A Castleford man was arrested on two drug-related charges early Wednesday, according to police and court papers.

Michael Ray Robbins, 20, was charged with possession of paraphernalia after Twin Falls police saw a pipe in his pickup, which was parked, empty, next to 265 Sunnyview Court and reported as "suspicious" to police at about 3 a.m., reports say.

When Robbins' vehicle was inspected later at the police station, officers found 1 ounce of marijuana, packaged in baggies of smaller quantities, papers say. Robbins was then charged with possession of a controlled substance with intent to deliver.

Arizona man arrested

in drug raid pleads guilty

JEROME — Lawrence Aubur of Arizona, arrested in July with three other people during a drug raid on a Jerome home, has pleaded guilty to possession of cocaine.

Aubur, originally charged with possession of cocaine with intent to deliver, reached a plea agreement with Prosecuting Attorney John Horgan and was sentenced by 5th District Judge Phillip Becker to three years' supervised probation.

Ferrell Freestone of Jerome, one of three others arrested with Aubur, pleaded guilty to the same charge earlier this month. He is currently awaiting sentencing, expected to occur before the end of the year.

TJ International expansion

bond bid receives approval

TWIN FALLS — TJ International's bid for \$8 million in industrial-revenue bonds was approved Thursday.

Boise-based TJ International had applied for the bonds to expand its plant in south Twin Falls. The bonds will be issued by the Twin Falls Industrial Development Corp., and paid for by TJ International. No tax money will be issued to pay for the bonds.

The Industrial Development Corp.'s board of directors approved the bonds after a short meeting Thursday. If markets for its windows continues strong, the company hopes to have 150 workers on board next year, up from about 83 now.

Prospectors' murder suspect ruled out of case

ELKO — A likely suspect in the deaths of two Twin Falls prospectors has been ruled out, an Elko County sheriff's detective said Thursday.

Detective Mike Kolsch is still optimistic about resolving the case, however.

"You may hit a wall four or five times, but you're going to get through," Kolsch said.

Russell Elmer Boyd, 64, and LeViri Elmer Tolman, 65, were recreational prospectors from Twin Falls who went on a one-day expedition to Nevada on Aug. 18.

Their bodies were found two days later off Highway 93, 17 miles south of Jackpot, killed by gunshot wounds, to the heads.

Kolsch said he had been investigating the possible involvement of a 31-year-old man whose car broke down a mile from where the bodies were found.

Mark McInerney, believed to be from

Washington state, is in jail in Pocatello on unrelated charges, according to Pocatello police Detective Scott Shaw. McInerney had used four names in his travels through Nevada the week of the killings and carried a gun, Kolsch said.

The man's car broke down the day an autopsy showed the prospectors died, Kolsch said.

This week, Kolsch interviewed the passenger in McInerney's car, clearing McInerney of the killings.

"At this point in time I believe he was not involved in it," Kolsch said.

Kolsch has contacted the Federal Bureau of Investigation and other law enforcement agencies to try to determine whether Boyd and Tolman could have been killed by a serial killer.

He also has asked the television show "Unsolved Mysteries" to publicize the case to elicit tips from the public.

"It'll come together. I have faith in it," he said.

Jerome County to pay parts of murderer's court defense

JEROME — Jerome County will have to pay at least part of the bills for a convicted murderer's defense of a state prosecution appeal.

The Idaho Supreme Court ordered the county on Wednesday to pay attorney Greg Fuller for the time he spent defending against a state attorney general's appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court.

The dispute was a continuation of the Jerome County Commission's reluctance to pay Fuller's bills, part of the \$160,000 cost of Jaimi Charboneau's death-penalty case.

Fuller said the order means he will get about 50 percent of what he had asked for from the county. Fuller had asked for \$8,000 for federal court work.

Charboneau, 29, was convicted of first-degree murder and sentenced to death in the 1984 death of his former wife, Marilyn Arbaugh, 36.

But the Idaho Supreme Court overturned Fifth District Judge Phillip Becker's death sentence and ordered a new sentencing hearing. Attorney General Jim Jones, upset at the ruling, appealed it to the U.S. Supreme Court. Fuller appealed portions of the lengthy ruling as well.

Fuller asked to be paid for three blocks of work: responding to the attorney general's appeal; filing his own appeal; and preparing arguments that he should be paid.

The Idaho Supreme Court in its order granted Fuller's fees for defending the attorney general's appeal. It didn't rule on Fuller's bill for his own appeal, so what will happen there is uncertain.

Teachers will receive supplies requested

CASTLEFORD — School teachers here will get their requested classroom supplies and instructional materials. The School Board decided at a special meeting Tuesday to find the funds needed to meet the teachers' requests.

Several unhappy teachers, supported by members of the community, told the board last week the budget allocations for the current school year were not made in the best interests of the students. They presented a list of items not funded in the budget they said they needed to teach effectively. The list included workbooks for the elementary school's new reading program.

The board voted to take funds that were earmarked for carryover to fill the teachers' requests and to make needed equipment repairs at the school. The board also decided to buy a washer and dryer for the home economics room. The total is about \$10,000. Acting Superintendent Kelly Murphey estimated.

Elementary students, K-eighth grade, will receive new reading workbooks and also a new spelling program.

"The whole end result was very positive," Murphey said.

Murphey praised the community for its interest in the school.

"It's their school, we just run it for them," Murphey said. "If the public doesn't know about problems, then they might not get addressed."

Building owner does not condone porn sale

TWIN FALLS — The owner of a building on South Blue Lakes Boulevard that houses a new bookstore apparently related to the closed Visions West Book Club says he does not want the community to think he condones the business' activity.

Bill Nichols owns a building at 214 Blue Lakes Blvd. S., but not the business on the site. The Index bookstore, which is owned by Tom Fernandez.

A Times-News headline Thursday incorrectly identified Nichols as the store owner.

In a letter to Fernandez recently, Nichols warned Fernandez that he did not want the property used to house a porno shop.

He directed Fernandez not to conduct any activity that causes ill-will toward the owners of the building or other occupants of the building by neighbors or the community at large.

"I don't want a crusade on my corner," Nichols concluded.

Fernandez also took issue with Thursday's story.

He said Thursday that he had not said that Lyle MacNicol of Jerome was the owner of Visions West, an adult bookstore

that closed last week at 711 Shoshone St. S. He also denied saying that Regal Consultants, 1292 Addison Ave. E., is his answering service.

He said while he is moving his business into The Index, his secretary answers a phone in the same office used by Regal Consultants.

His telephone number is "the same as Regal Consultants'."

Fernandez said he does not know who owned Visions West, where he once worked. County records list MacNicol as the owner, but MacNicol has said he signed the ownership certificate only to shield the

actual owners.

Meanwhile, Fernandez said The Index is near opening. He said his shop's adult section, an 800-square-foot back room, will be off-limits to children.

City Attorney Fritz Wonderlich said he will discuss the new bookstore's opening with the City Council, which will decide whether to investigate The Index to determine whether it violates the state's local planning act.

The act prohibits stores that sell obscene materials from locating within 2,500 feet of schools or churches.

County stops tax increase

RUPERT — Minidoka County has decided to roll back a \$3 million increase in the property tax evaluation of a local cable television company, to settle a lawsuit over the increase.

TCI Cable and the county agreed to the settlement, which will save the cable company about \$42,000 per year in property taxes, officials said.

As part of a statewide effort to move cable television systems closer to what state tax officials felt was market value, TCI in Minidoka was raised by the state Tax Commission

\$3 million to about \$4.7 million.

—Minidoka Prosecutor Charlie Creason Jr. said when TCI filed a lawsuit protesting the increase, the county asked if the state would defend the case since it involved a state agency.

Creason said when the county was advised the state would not defend the lawsuit, he started negotiations to settle. He said the county has agreed to drop the state's assessment increase, and the cable company has agreed to waive court and legal costs.

Hebourn may receive new fire station

HEYBURN — The city may soon have a new fire station if the Minidoka County Fire Protection District has its way.

Dale Child of the district asked the City Council Wednesday to consider building a new fire station because the current space is too small. The city provides two bays for parking two fire trucks, but Child said there is no room for firemen to train or clean their equipment.

The council agreed to meet with the fire district representatives prior to the Oct. 25 council meeting to discuss the request.

In the meantime, the council will begin looking for property and Child said he would check to see what kind of financial help the district could provide.

Child asked the city to build a new building for Mayor Harold Hurst said the district must help with the project.

If the building is built, it would provide three parking bays so the district could put a tanker truck in Hebourn and adequate meeting and clean-up room.

The council decided to have the state surveyors arbitrate on a discrepancy between a surveyor hired by the city and a surveyor hired by Simplot.

The city agreed to pay the \$1,000 fee to have the state arbitrate the boundaries in hopes that it will prevent future problems.

The city hired Durrell Moon several months ago to survey the city before they began putting in more sidewalks and curb and gutters.

Recently J. R. Simplot Co. hired another surveyor to clarify their property lines so they could build a fence. Both surveyors surveyed the same ground but arrived at different conclusions.

One surveyor says a boundary line separates the two boundary lines, Hurst said.

In other action:

- The council voted to remove what is left of an old boat ramp and the foundations of two restrooms that were built on the city's riverfront property about 25 years ago.
- The city cooperated with Simplot recently in building a fence around the city's waterfront property and the sand hills, which prompted complaints from some local residents because it cut off access to the Snake River there.
- The council agreed to a rotating schedule until the end of the year for a program designed to provide 24-hour access to city services.

City Superintendent A. Hodge presented a plan that would allow for one city employee to be on call for a week at a time during the night. The employees would be compensated with a day off. If the employee does have to go out on a call during the week, he will also be compensated for the time put in.

- The city agreed to donate \$250 to the annual Festival of Trees in Burley.
- Mayor Hurst asked Councilman Nile Bohon to look into how the 911 emergency number affects the residents of Hebourn. Hebourn shares a phone company with Burley, but since Hebourn is in Minidoka County, emergency services and vehicles must come from that county. When a Hebourn resident dials 911, the call will ring in to the Burley emergency services where it must be relayed to those same services in Minidoka County.

Buhl will use Pet Milk school grant to launch alternative unit

BUHL — Thanks to a grant from Pet Milk's parent company, the School Board has decided to begin its alternative school on Wednesday and rely on cost-cutting and community support to make up for the loss of state funding.

The cost to run the school for one semester is estimated at \$8,400. Superintendent Eugene Pyles said. But the school doesn't qualify for state funds available for the special program because the 14 students signed up and lower-than-usual classes per week combine to put Buhl under the minimum requirement.

Pyles was notified Wednesday morning that the district would receive a \$5,000 grant from Pet Milk's parent company the Whitman Co.

Although this is \$3,400 short of the total needed, Pyles recommended that the school be started with six classes and a reduced amount of administrative and counseling time. "I think the longer we wait, we might lose some of the people who are interested," he said.

The alternative school program is especially suited to the needs of students who left school early but now wish to finish their diplomas, who found it difficult to adjust to the regular school atmosphere or who found themselves, at graduation, short a few credits.

There hasn't been anything else available in this state. High School Principal Jack Crippen said. "This does, I think, really fill a hole in the educational system, and can be of benefit to a lot of students."

Pyles hopes enrollment will increase after the program gets going, enabling the district to qualify for state funding. In the meantime, he has plans to seek further operating funds from community sponsors.

The alternative school will offer six classes: two sections of English and one each of math, science, social studies and reading. Because of the varying needs of students, most work will be done as independent study. Each class will meet twice weekly, Monday and Wednesday, Tuesday and Thursday, from 3:30 p.m. to 6 p.m.

TWIN FALLS — Leonard Aranda, successfully rehabilitated following a devastating automobile accident, has been named recipient of the F. Dwain Pruitt Client of the Year Award by Magic Valley Rehabilitation Services.

Aranda, who was not present during the awards ceremony, was honored by the rehabilitation staff for overcoming both vocational and self-esteem problems to become one of the best workers employed at Hamilton Manufacturing, said vocational-rehabilitation counselor Beth Bowman. "He has worked extremely hard and has been very self-motivated," she said. "You don't get too many people who come in with the wheels already spinning, but all Leonard needed was a push and a little confidence and support."

The father of two young children, Aranda sustained a head injury in a 1978 accident that left him with memory and learning problems. He advanced through various steps in his rehabilitation program until he eventually entered Hamilton's placement program, where he has been employed since last October.

More than 50 people were on hand Wednesday at the Canyon Springs Inn to witness this year's rehabilitation awards presentation. Other awards presented were:

- Advocate of the year — The Sawtooth National Forest Service for promoting various projects that aid the disabled. Forest Supervisor Roland Stoltenberg accepted the award.
- Outstanding employer of the year: To Cactus Pex's in Jackpot, where 12 disabled people were employed in various jobs during this year. Personnel administrator Nancy Graybill accepted the award.

all underground fuel tanks out of service for a year or more to be removed, repaired or replaced and then filled with an inert substance.

Tanks that have been removed must be thoroughly purged, labeled and properly disposed of, McCoy said.

Anyone thinking about removing or filling an old underground tank must file a form 30 days before removal with Idaho's Bureau of Water Quality, McCoy said.

It's also a good idea to contact the local fire department ahead of time and to arrange for a department representative to be on site when the tanks are uncovered. Twin Falls Fire Inspector Rex Champney said the city requires permits for tank installation, repair or removal.

Permits also are mandatory in unincorporated areas governed by city rules.

Kerr-McGee added to cleanup list

SODA SPRINGS (AP) — The Kerr-McGee Chemical Corp. plant near Soda Springs has been formally added to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's Superfund cleanup list.

The plant becomes Idaho's fifth site on the EPA's National Priorities List, which was created by the federal Superfund law to identify places around the country seriously contaminated with hazardous waste.

Thursday's action indicates the EPA intends to ask Kerr-McGee to investigate the extent of local groundwater contamination from the company's production of vanadium pentoxide.

The chemical is used in catalytic converters for automobiles, as an ultraviolet screen in the production of automobile glass and other industrial applications.

US West announces rate reduction

BOISE (AP) — U.S. West Communications has announced an average 18.5 percent reduction in the rates it charges long-distance companies for access to its local telephone network, effective Sunday.

The cut in "recurring switched access" rates for more than 20 long-distance companies operating in Idaho will mean a \$452,000 reduction in revenue for U.S. West.

The price change, announced Wednesday, is the first for U.S. West since it implemented deregulation provisions of the Idaho Telecommunications Act of 1988 in April.

Murder hearing set for Lewiston lad

LEWISTON (AP) — A Second District Court Judge has set Oct. 11 for a preliminary hearing date for a Lewiston youth who is charged with first degree murder in connection with the shooting deaths of his parents.

Charged with the killings is Bradley R. Thomasson, 17. He is charged with shooting his parents, Ray E. Thomasson, 56, and Judith Ann Thomasson, 50, last week. Each had been shot numerous times.

The deaths were reported by Bradley Thomasson, who informed police he had just gotten out of bed and found his parents had been shot.

He was arrested later the same day and charged with two counts of first-degree murder.

State looks at charges against city

BOISE (AP) — The attorney general's office may be taking another look at allegations by a Pocatello man that city officials have violated state laws.

"At first, we were talking criminal proceedings, but in light of the new information, our probe might delve into possible civil violations by the administration," said investigator Russ Renuau.

Pocatellan Al Brewster in February presented Bannock County Prosecutor Larry EchoHawk with a six-page allegation against city officials, and then pressed for an attorney general's investigation when EchoHawk didn't act.

The renewed interest came Monday after the attorney general's office was presented with new information, Renuau said.

Western Farm Service fined for acid

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Public Utilities Commission has fined Western Farm Service of Idaho Falls \$2,000 for hauling sulfuric acid illegally.

In an agreement signed Sept. 18 by company manager David G. Beesley and approved Wednesday by the PUC, Western Farm Service will pay the fine to the state general account.

In a news release, the commission said Beesley admitted his company broke several state and federal laws and motor carrier rules.

Council to re-write jet ski ordinance

MECALL (AP) — Controversial wording in a proposed ordinance limiting the use of jet skis at Payette Lake will require that the measure be re-written, city officials say.

Bud Schmidt, McCall City administrator, said the term "jet ski" is a proprietary trade name and cannot be used in a law.

The rejected ordinance called for jet skis to idle through a 400-yard buffer zone on the south rim of the lake, within the city limits.

Safety was cited as the primary motive for the restriction, but residents and businesses also have complained about the noise level, Schmidt said.

"It appears to me that the case has been made that some sort of regulation is necessary," Schmidt said.

Judge says state can regulate insurance

BOISE (AP) — States have authority to regulate insurance matters within their borders, and Idaho's involvement in an international takeover battle is not some sort of "obnoxious extra-territorial sweep," a federal judge says.

U.S. District Judge Marion Callister on Tuesday signed a written order formally denying a motion by a Bermuda-based group attempting to take over B.A.T. Industries. The judge ruled from the bench earlier in the month, but didn't file his written order until this week.

The Bermuda-based group, Hoylake Investments Ltd., wants to take over B.A.T. Industries. Idaho is

involved because B.A.T. Industries last year took over Farmers Group, Inc., which owns Farmers Insurance. Farmers has a regional operation at Pocatello, with more than 500 employees.

Callister said Farmers is Idaho's second-largest insurer of homes and automobiles, with more than 200,000 property and casualty policies in force along with about 8,000 life insurance policies with a face value of more than \$320 million.

Hoylake tried to block the Idaho Department of Insurance from holding hearings on the takeover, to determine if it was in the best interest of Idaho residents. Included in the takeover proposal would be

the sale of Farmers Insurance to a French insurance company, Axami Assurance.

Callister said the Constitution's commerce clause generally forbids states from regulating commerce beyond their borders, but insurance is an exception.

In the 1943 McCarran-Ferguson Act, Callister said Congress removed all commerce clause limitations on state authority to regulate and tax insurance companies.

"In the present case, the Idaho Act is not engaged in an obnoxious extra-territorial sweep," Callister said. "Rather it is simply providing protection to Idaho policyholders in light of a potential change in control

of an Idaho insurance company."

He rejected Hoylake's argument that the deal was strictly United Kingdom, with one British company trying to take over another, and "little" Farmers simply attached to the tail of "mammoth" B.A.T.

"The foreign ownership of Farmers does not dilute the Idaho Act's protection of Idaho policy holders, and hence the McCarran-Ferguson protection from commerce clause attack remains intact," he said.

Federal judges in most of the other states involved have ruled the same way.

The next Department of Insurance hearing in the matter is scheduled in November.

Andrus praises Bush's attitude toward education

CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va. (AP) — It's obvious that the Bush administration has elevated education and its problems to a higher level of attention than it has received from past administrations, Gov. Cecil Andrus says.

"It appears we finally have education at the same level of attention" as things such as bailing out savings and loan companies and B-1 bombers, the governor said Thursday.

"That's a first and it was very important," Andrus said.

Andrus and the rest of the nation's

governors attended a two-day education summit at the University of Virginia at Charlottesville. State Superintendent of Public Instruction Jerry Evans was among top education officials attending.

People shouldn't think that the conference will provide a "quick fix" for education, Andrus said, but it appears it's a step in the right direction.

"It was a good session. What we really did is make the determination that hopefully, in the very near future, that no children in America will be forsaken or forgotten. That literacy is

important, not only to our society, but very important to employers as they look at the work force," Andrus said.

Andrus said the Louisiana governor drew a laugh when he said to Bush, "Watch my lips, send more money."

"His willingness to focus his attention and the attention of his Cabinet on education for two days is very significant," the Idahoan said.

"It will be a while before we can evaluate what we have done, but this level of attention always helps."

Andrus said he and the others asked for more flexibility in administering federal programs. As

an example, he said with Title I money, the state can buy computers to use with disadvantaged children during school hours — but can't use the same computers at night for adult education.

"He also agreed that they would maintain the current level of support or greater, and wouldn't cut education to balance the federal budget," Andrus said.

"It's a good step for education, but nobody should be looking for a quick turnaround," Andrus said. "All these things will help."

Analysts divide in Micron Tech shareholder lawsuit

BOISE (AP) — Analysts are divided over a shareholder lawsuit against Micron Technology, Inc., but most said charges of insider profiteering are groundless.

"The allegations are quite severe, but I feel personally they are not merited," said analyst John Nebens, with Arneson, Kercheville, Ebernberg and Associates, San Antonio, Texas.

Last week, lawyers for Brooklyn, N.Y., businessman Myron Schonfeld filed a federal court lawsuit against six officers and directors of Micron, the Boise-based microchip manufacturing company.

"I don't feel that this guy has a watertight case. I'd hesitate to point to Ward and Joe (Parkinson) as putting over a scandal on anyone," said Lenny Goldberg, New York analyst for Kidder Peabody.

Ward Parkinson, co-founder of the company, resigned earlier this year. His twin brother, Joe Parkinson, is

chairman and chief executive officer.

Both were named as defendants in the lawsuit, along with Thomas Trent, chief technical officer; James Garrett, executive vice president; and board members Allen Noble and Thomas Nicholas.

The company has declined to discuss the lawsuit, but says it will fight the allegations. Schonfeld charged that he and possibly hundreds of other shareholders were

induced earlier this year by the defendants to buy Micron stock at artificially high prices.

The lawsuit contends the price was inflated by unrealistic statements about business conditions and Micron's prospects.

Knowing that prospects for DRAM (dynamic random access microchips) prices were dimming, the defendants allegedly sold more than 427,000 shares of their personal stock at inflated prices, the lawsuit

alleges.

Proceeds of the sale were more than \$8.5 million. After the sales, Micron's stock fell sharply. The stock on Wednesday closed at \$12, about half its 1988 high.


Schonfeld said he bought 1,000 shares on June 20 for \$21.75, and has lost \$8,000.

Analysts said shareholder suits often come when stock prices fall. They often are viewed as frivolous, the analysts say.

But the high court called for a Clark County District Court hearing on an injunction against a 12-year-old NCAA order that Tarkanian sit out for two years as coach of the "Runnin' Rebels" because of recruiting violations.

The NCAA won a U.S. Supreme Court ruling last December that it didn't have to provide coaches due process rights. The NCAA then asked the Nevada Supreme Court to lift the lower court injunction which prevented UNLV from suspending Tarkanian.

Secret East German report alleges Flojo took steroids

HAMBURG, West Germany (AP) — A secret East German report on the 1988 Seoul Olympics alleges there is evidence that triple gold medalist Florence Griffith Joyner used performance-enhancing drugs, the West German magazine Stern said in Thursday's issue.

The Hamburg-published magazine said the East German report contends that Griffith Joyner's thigh muscles expanded by two inches in one year.

"Such growth is possible only with a helping substance," Stern quoted the report as saying.

One week ago, Stern published allegations by sprinter Darrell Robinson that he bought growth hormones for Griffith Joyner in Thursday's issue, Stern said Robinson received anonymous death threats after his interview.

Air Friesz soars in prime time victory

MOSCOW — His passing may be impressive; but quarterback John Friesz's timing is impeccable. Friesz threw for a career-high 437 yards here Thursday night as Idaho withstood a late-game Montana rally for a 30-24 Big Sky Conference football victory before a national television audience, a performance that almost certainly bolstered his stock as a possible NFL first-round draft choice.

"I'm not on top of it all across the country, but he's certainly a great quarterback," said Montana coach Don Reed. "He'd be an outstanding pro quarterback. I tell you that. He's big, strong, physical and he has a lot of poise back there. If the pros can measure a guy — which they don't do often enough — on third-down success rather than how many touchdowns he throws or how many interceptions or what his percentage is, which they tend to do, they would find John Friesz, a tremendous — capital T — quarterback."

Friesz, a senior, was 28 of 51 with two touchdowns before 13,000 fans and a prime-time ESPN audience. Idaho moved to 3-2 overall and 2-0 in Big Sky play. Montana fell to 3-2 overall and 1-1 in conference games.

The game was a rematch of last year's first-round game of the NCAA Division I-AA playoffs, won by the Vandals.

"I don't know if we beat the second-best team in the conference tonight," said Idaho coach John L. Smith. "They might be the first-best team. We might have beat the first-best team in the Big Sky."

The Grizzlies trailed 24-0 in the second quarter, but cut the Idaho lead to 30-24 in the fourth quarter on a Lorenzo Glenn seven-yard touchdown pass from Grady Bennett with 2 minutes, 11 seconds left.

Bennett also had a good night passing, completing 33 of 53 passes for 370 yards and so it is little wonder

"I don't know why we let them back in the game," said Smith. "I thought we had it going so good. I think they deserve a lot of credit. Just look at what they did defensively in the second half. They took away the run, they forced us to have to pass the football and they got after us with some

Managers test their faith in Jays-Orioles showdown

Toronto manager Cito Gaston and Baltimore's Frank Robinson were both early believers.

Now they get to test their faith as the Blue Jays and Orioles settle the American League East in a weekend showdown starting tonight at the Toronto SkyDome.

Entries will be in one game, is trying to defy its own history while Baltimore hopes one of its greatest turnaround in baseball history will be enough to win the division.

Seven months of work, down to three games — and maybe a fourth if a playoff is necessary Monday in Baltimore.

The Orioles went into this season determined not to dwell on their recent past. Robinson said a good feeling in spring training, despite the fact that Baltimore had lost 107 games — 101 under Robinson — the year before.

"I liked the direction the ballclub was headed," Robin-

son said. "We made some moves and I was excited about coming back. Last year wasn't as bad as it seemed. The players tried and the effort was there."

This year, Orioles quickly made it from worst to first. They have already won 32 more games than they did last year, one short of the major league record, Baltimore has won six of 10 against Toronto this season.

No matter who wins, some history is assured. A ball manager will be in the playoffs for the first time.

On Wednesday night, both clubs used a combination of power and pitching to give themselves momentum heading into the weekend.

The Camas-North Gem loser will drop into a tie with Carey and the winner of today's Rockland-Richfield game, with Camas and North Gem both scheduled to play rematches against Carey, Rockland and Richfield.

In Camas, the Cowboys will see essentially the same type of team they beat twice last year en route to the state eight-man playoffs. After Sierra homered, Pete Incaviglia walked, Mike Stanley tripled and Eckersley relieved Scott Coolbaugh hit a sacrifice fly for the final run.

Stewart, 21-9, who will start next Tuesday night in Oakland when the A's open the ALCS, matched his career high in victories. His 62 victories over the last three seasons are the most by any pitcher in the majors.

Boston took a 4-0 lead in the second on a two-run single by Romine and Cerone's fourth homer.

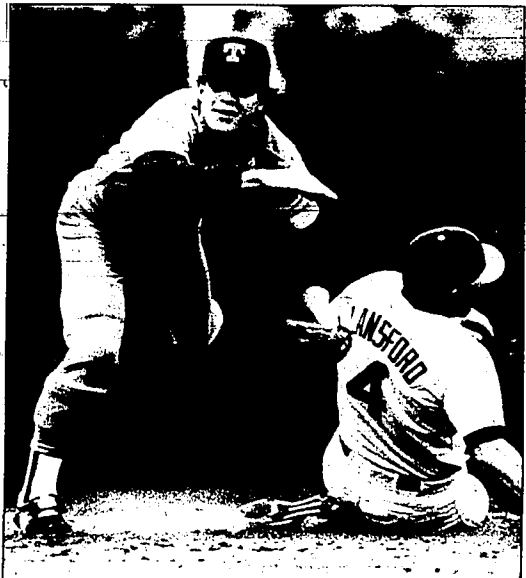

IDLE THINKING

Even though a battery is standing idle and not providing power it may gradually lose its charge. This standing loss occurs because of the slow chemical action that takes place inside the battery between slight impurities in the batteries metals and the electrolyte. This is one reason why many batteries are of the "dry" charge type. They contain fully charged elements which are sealed airtight. Only when the battery is purchased does it receive electrolyte which allows it to become fully activated as a fully-charged new battery. After that, the car owner should make sure that the top of the battery is clean and free of water. A wet battery will lose slight amounts of current between its terminal posts. Sulfuric charge is highest in warm weather. Therefore, idle batteries should be stored in a cool place.

ANSWER: One spade. A dog of a response, but just strong enough to scrape up a response in the five-card major.

All bridge players make mistakes. Those who are fortunate make them when only a part-score is at stake. The unlucky ones falter when big numbers beckon. Today's declarer was one of the unlucky ones. See if you can spot where he went wrong.
1. South won the spade lead and knocked out West's diamond ace. West returned a spade to South's ace and South tried three top hearts, looking for a 3-3 split. When they split 2-2, South cashed his top club and led a third club toward dummy's Q-10. After much anguish he went up with dummy's queen, and East's discard was bad news. No other chances were left, and South was forced to settle for only 11 tricks. How should South have known to finesse dummy's club 10?
2. Staring at the ceiling or consulting the percentage tables won't do. What will help is counting one or both of the opposing distributions. First he playing the two top clubs, South added a third spade and a third diamond. The lights go on when East discards on the spade and West discards on the diamond. West is now known to have started with five spades, two hearts and two diamonds. How should South know East is known to have begun with two spades, four hearts and five diamonds. Therefore, he holds only two clubs.
3. The rest is easy. Cash the ace and king of clubs, and then take the finesse against West's known club holding.

Julie Scott enjoys best of both art worlds

KETCHUM — Julie Scott exemplifies a person who can be successful in commercial art, cross over that sometimes-forbidden threshold into the world of fine art and make that a success as well.

Art galleries would like to make it an either/or situation: Either you paint fine art, or you do commercial art.

But Scott likes to eat and enjoys a roof over her head, so she does both. And she's good at both.

"It takes off the real urgency to make money painting," Scott says.

Now 32, Scott's fine art paintings have evolved in four short years to the point where the demand for more paintings is greater than her time to create them. She still pursues her talent for producing commercial art, however, by doing illustrations for various national publications, including Playboy, Outside, Powder, the Washington Post Magazine, Saturday Review, Byt, as well as many corporate publications.

Fueled with a life-long interest in artwork encouraged by her parents, she received her bachelor's degree in fine arts from Tufts University, an affiliate of the School of the Museum of Fine Arts in Boston, Mass.

Scott then came to live in Ketchum to pursue her illustration career with little notion of creating gallery-quality work. The paintings she hung on her studio walls were done more for therapeutic value than anything else, she says.

It was upon the urging of Karen McCall, then director of the Sun Valley Center for the Arts and Humanities, that Scott put together enough paintings for a one-woman show. That was in 1987. She hasn't stopped since.

Many of Scott's distinctive figurative paintings depict her view of the West and of the Idaho she loves and calls home. They are a far cry from the traditional western scene of a cowboy riding into the sunset or majestic mountains towering over calm streams and meadows.

Scott's paintings are a vibrant jumble of mythical creatures — half animal, half man — with the backgrounds and landscapes scattered with objects, designs and markings which show her unique interpretation of living in the West.

Her trademark has become a discarded Coors beer can lying around some corner of most of her paintings.

Scott says she didn't mean to create an image which was suggestive of a larger meaning, one which some people interpret almost religiously. "I just started it out as a Coors can lying along the side of the road, and it doesn't mean any more than that."

The can, coupled with other objects of waste or disregard, relate to man's intervention on nature, Scott says.

Although not an adamant environmentalist, Scott says she paints what fascinates her, but doesn't convey a painting with the intent to convey some hidden social message. That comes later with the painting's interpretation by the viewer.

"I work in metaphor, or so it seems," she says. "Sometimes I'm not even aware of what all the images really are saying... A lot of times the images, the composition fascinates me, or juxtaposing this with this is somewhat interesting. So I don't try to create metaphors."

Scott says she gets many of her ideas from the world around her. On a recent trip this summer to the Bennett Hills north of

Gooding, Scott examined the petroglyphs left by Indians long since gone.

Not knowing their meaning, Scott was attracted to the shapes and geometric designs and incorporated them in several of her new paintings.

Other times, Scott gets ideas right before she falls asleep at night and tends to remember them the next morning to bring them back to life in her paintings.

"I don't question what the juxtaposition of the elements in the composition might mean to one another," Scott says. "Sometimes they're down right scary. I'm surprised because I never intended to do that."

Scott also has fun naming her paintings.

The very fact that galleries require a name for each painting amuses her since, she says, a painting's intent is to create a visual communication and then you have to place a name tag on it.

"Tellophony," "Bone Ode," "Scramble Ball," "Still Water, Mud Bottom," "Summon the Gods," and "Some Function of Control" are a sampling of the titles which give a little insight to the nature of Scott's paintings.

When it comes to a choice between illustration and fine art painting, Scott says it would be difficult. The feedback she receives from having her paintings shown publicly is vital to her.

"Fine art is relaying your innermost ideas with other people and having those reflect on that," Scott says. "It's a nice connection with people."

Several of Scott's paintings can be seen soon in a special exhibition at the Herrett Museum on the CSI campus. The Centennial Edition II exhibit will run from Oct. 17 to Nov. 22 and will feature the works of Scott and four other Idaho artists.

She has had individual exhibitions at Ketchum's Sun Valley Center Gallery, the Art Attack in Boise, and the Koplín Gallery in Los Angeles. Her work has also been included in group shows at the Boise Art Museum, Boise Gallery of Art, Moscow's Pritchard Art Gallery, Missoula Museum of the Arts, and others in Massachusetts and Washington, D.C.

Trying to make ends meet by pursuing a full-time career in art can be rough, but Scott is giving it her best shot.

"You've got to have a really strong passion to stick with it," she says, "and if you don't you're really gonna get hurt by it. You've got to have that faith behind you, because there's a lot of rejection and a lot of criticism. You can't take it personally."

"Girl on the Billboard" also was a crossover hit that advanced on the pop music charts, and Reeves said he has the truck drivers to thank for his first major success with that 1965 song.

Some of Reeves' other country songs include "Belles of Southern Belle," "Philadelphia Phillies," "Down in the Boondocks," "Lover's Question," "Second Fiddle to a Steel Guitar," "Cotton Pickin' Chicken Pickin'" and "Looking at the World Through a Windshield."

In 1966, the energetic singer/piano player joined the Grand Ole Opry. Last Friday, the Opry show televised on The Nashville Network presented Reeves as the solo and featured entertainer.

In his stage shows, Reeves hosts on piano and fiddle and says he likes to do impersonations of a about dozen other entertainers, including Jerry Lee Lewis, Fats Domino, Ray Charles and several movie stars.

Nancy McKeon takes on role of a battered wife in 'Cry for Help'

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Nancy McKeon was so frightened the first time she read the script for "A Cry for Help: The Tracey Thurman Story" that she couldn't look at it again for a week. The NBC movie, to be broadcast Monday, tells the story of a Connecticut woman who in 1983 was permanently crippled and almost killed by her estranged husband after police ignored her pleas for protection.

"It was a scary story for an actor to do," McKeon said. "But I also felt it was too important to let go. I talked to Tracey and that convinced me to do it. For a woman who's gone through all that, Tracey is very strong," said McKeon.

She has a great perspective on things. People need to see that someone who went through that can come back and have a positive attitude. People need to see there's someone that strong out there. The actress, in which Thurman was stabbed by Tracey and suffered a broken neck, lost her partially paralyzed. Thurman's lawsuit against the Torrington, Conn., police prompted reforms in police response to domestic violence there.

"They told her she'd never walk, but she can walk. Her left side can but she has no feeling. Her right side does not function and is hypersensitive. Her 3-year-old son watched while his father did this to his mother. He's still trying to get through those feelings," McKeon said.

"This is not a fun movie. People are going to watch it and see parts of their own lives in it. "The Tracey Thurman Story," which stars Dale Midkiff as the husband, Buck, and

scheduled as a midseason replacement for NBC.

She was to play Tess McGill, the role that brought Melanie Griffith an Academy Award nomination. Harris Kattelman, president of Twentieth Television Corp., said in a statement that a new actress would be cast in the role. McKeon will remain under contract to Twentieth to develop a television series.

McKeon has been working as an actress since she was 2. Her brother, Philip, was on Alice and now divides his time between acting and working as an assistant director.

"I grew up in Queens, so I feel at home in New York," she said. "We lived in Forest Hills, and when they still had the tennis tournament, there some of us kids ran a parking concession. We'd save spaces on the street and charge \$5. Those were my hoodlum days."

"Philip and I did commercials and modeling in New York. He was in a couple of plays. I was 12 when Philip got Alice and we moved here. I didn't work for a long time because nobody knew me. Then I started doing things for Aaron Spelling like "Starsky and Hutch," "The Love Boat" and "Fantasy Island." I started "Facts of Life" when I was 14."

McKeon came into "Facts of Life" when it was revamped at the end of the first season. She played Jo, the tough kid from the Bronx.

"I think they thought I'd play off well against Blair, who was spoiled and rich," she said. "I wasn't too enthusiastic about doing it. I thought I'd only have about a half a life. A show. Then when I got the script I saw it was a character I could play."

Now you can preview records

ALBANY, N.Y. (AP) — Music fans no longer have to judge a record by its cover.

A new company is offering consumers the chance to sample portions of albums using their touch-tone telephones. At 89 cents a minute, a nimble-fingered fan can form musical opinions for less than the cost of a single.

"With the cost of compact discs and the large market out there, this gives a listener a chance to hear an album before he buys it," said Mark Munson, marketing director for Music Systems Inc.

The Fort Lauderdale, Fla., company has been operating its special charge 900 telephone line since the beginning of August. About 5,000 people a week are calling to hear a little music, Munson said.

Music Line is the little brother of the party lines and rock headlines that have boomed in popularity during the past few years with the press of a button.

Callers who hook into the system are asked to choose from among more than 100 albums in categories such as rock, heavy metal, rap, progressive and so-called black music.

Once the selection is made, a 10- to 15-second snippet of each song on the album is played. Callers can move on to another song or album with the press of a button. The average caller stays on the line for about four minutes.

"We sampled the 15 seconds that hopefully are the most indicative of the song," Munson said. "We don't just start at the beginning."

Albums on the playlist range from such hit artists as Prince and the New Power Generation, the Traveling Wilburys, and Madonna, to more obscure newcomers such as rappers Three Times Dope and independent label rockers Nirvana.

A group of Harvard Business School students were the brains behind the idea. They started a telephone line in the early 1980s, but it folded due to high costs. A 900 telephone line is considerably easier and cheaper to run.

With radio stations increasingly reluctant to play more than one or two songs from an album, Music Line performs an important service, Munson said.

One act that's generated a lot of calls, he said, is Elektra Records recording artists 10,000 Maniacs. Curious fans can easily find out through Music Line that despite the name, 10,000 Maniacs is actually a literate folk-rock band, he said.

"Elektra is intrigued by the idea that they are on the system," Munson said. "That kind of a response is good. They see it as a valuable service."

But the group's manager, Peter Leak, said he's not certain he likes the idea of someone outside the group selling about 10,000 Maniacs songs into the 15 seconds they consider most important.

"Hearing 15 seconds of each song on each album isn't hearing the whole album," said Leak, whose New York End Ltd. also manages the Cowboy Junkies, another band featured on Music Line. "To imagine that it does is not being realistic."

It's much preferable, he said, for a fan to slip on a pair of headphones in a record store and hear as much of the album as possible. Many record stores used to have "listening booths" where customers could do this.

Music Line has no formal relationship with record companies, but marketing departments in several companies are eagerly providing the phone service with compact discs and promotional materials, Munson said.

That's obviously in their best interests, he said, because listeners who like the 15-second snippets will go out and buy the records.

The Band is also the oldest continuously active unit in the Marine Corps. John Phillip Sousa directed the Band from 1880 to 1892. It was while he was leader of the Marine Band that he began to write the marches that were to earn him the title of "The March King."

Sousa also organized the Band's first concert tour which took place in 1891.

The Marine Band currently performs more than 600 commitments annually. These performances range from a solo pianist or harpist to the full concert band. The band has a number of performing ensembles including the concert and marching bands, chamber orchestra, string ensembles, dance bands, and a dixieland band. Members of the band may play in several or all of these ensembles, making versatility an important requirement for each member.

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World's most famous 'Dear John' letter sheds new light on Ernest Hemingway

"I am writing this late at night after a long think by myself and I am afraid it is going to hurt you, but I'm sure it won't harm you permanently...."

WASHINGTON — It may be the most famous "Dear John" letter of the 20th century — written to a handsome young war veteran by the pretty nurse who had tended his injured hands overseas. Kept by its embittered recipient for more than half a century and long thought lost, the letter sheds new light on one of literature's legendary love affairs, and on the little-known woman from Washington who spurned a writer to greatness.

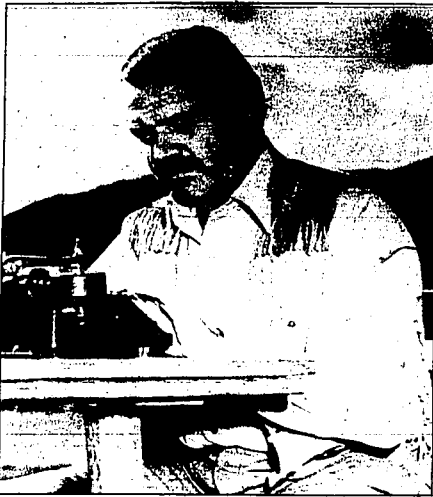
Papa's nurse, it appears, was a good girl after all.

The letter, dated March 7, 1919, was sent to Ernest Hemingway by Agnes Hannah von Kurovsky, the Red Cross nurse who cared for him in an Italian hospital during World War I and ended up breaking his heart. It was von Kurovsky on whom Hemingway modeled the heroine of perhaps his most famous novel, "A Farewell to Arms."

Though references to his sixth-month wartime romance and subsequent rejection crop up frequently in the novels and stories that have made Hemingway the most influential of modern American writers, the name of the nurse he loved was virtually unknown until 1961, when Ernest von Kurovsky died only five years ago, the true nature of their relationship has remained cloudy, possibly because her time with him was so brief and so long ago.

In "Hemingway in Love and War," scheduled for publication next month by Northeastern University Press, Northeastern Professor James Nagel and retired diplomat Henry Villard, who was hospitalized with Hemingway in 1918, produce surprising new evidence of just what von Kurovsky was thinking at the time of her 1918 writings.

In "A Farewell to Arms" and in letters and conversations, Hemingway throughout his life portrayed their romance as an affair of deep physical as well as

emotional passion, and his nurse as an inventive (not to say acrobatic) partner capable of making highly satisfying love in a narrow hospital bed to a man with one shrapnel-damaged leg in a splint.

Von Kurovsky's letter of rejection, however, together with 51 others to Hemingway and a heretofore unknown diary she kept during his hospitalization in Milan, indicate that her relationship with her 19-year-old patient (she was 26 at the time) wasn't as tempestuous as Hemingway's fiction would have readers believe.

The diary, which runs from her departure for Europe in June 1918 to October of that year, paints von Kurovsky as rather giddy and flirtatious on her first trip abroad but strictly within the strict-laced conventions of the time. She voices

wariness of a patient getting "spoony" around her and pronounces herself "disgusted" at another patient and nurse, she discovers "having a high old time ... in a chaise longue on the balcony. ... It was so common. I couldn't get over them."

As for Hemingway, he "was furious" at the couple on the balcony, she writes, and though the diary charts a growing attraction toward the patient she refers to repeatedly as "the Kid" there is no evidence in her writing of anything more physical between them than kissing and hugging. Propriety, apparently, wasn't the only reason.

"I know that I am still very fond of you, but it is more as a mother than as a sweetheart ...," she wrote in breaking off their relationship. "I can't get away from the fact that you're just a boy — a kid. I somehow feel that some day I'll have reason to be proud of you, but dear boy, I can't wait for that day and it is wrong to hurry a career."

Reproving him for acting in the past "like a spoiled child" toward her, she announced plans to marry and urged the aspiring young writer to forgive me and start a wonderful career and show what a man you really are."

Hemingway's sister Marcelline remembers him vomiting after he read the letter. His son Jack calls the loss of von Kurovsky "the great tragedy" of his father's early life. Decades later the writer, whose two-

fisted lifestyle often belied the sensitivity of his prose, was still referring to it in his writing. He apparently never showed her letter to anyone.

Hemingway, who had volunteered to drive Red Cross ambulances in Italy, had been in the country barely a month when he was hit by an Austrian trench mortar while distributing chocolate and cigarettes at the front.

Though struck in the legs by more than 200 pieces of shrapnel, he carried a wounded Italian soldier another 150 yards to safety, receiving in the process machine-gun slugs in his right knee and foot. He was the first American wounded on the Italian front (though another had been killed) and arrived at the hospital a genuine hero.

On Aug. 25 she announces, "Now, Ernest Hemingway has a case on me, or thinks he has. He is a dear boy and so cute about it...."

If the language of the diary is girlish, von Kurovsky's letters to Hemingway later in the year are warmer and more effusive. They chart an increasing emotional involvement, and indicate some physical longing as well. One undated missive to "Dear Old Furnace Man" says she has "need of a bit of steaming.... This is what comes of refusing and turning you down. The Woman Pays."

But though she professes her love and refers to herself periodically as "Your Missis," she also betrays a continuing concern about his youth, addressing him as "Mr. Kid," "Dear Boy" and, ironically, "Old Master," "Old Cuss" and "Maestro Antico" (Mr. Antique).

As Hemingway scholar James Nagel points out in his essay concluding "Hemingway in Love and War," the overriding concerns of the diary and the letters, far surpassing her references to her romances, are her personal and professional growth and development, her discovery of her own identity and her prospects for the future. In all that, Ernest Hemingway was to play but a small, if enduring, part.

Hemingway returned to the United States in January 1919, expecting Agnes to follow in a few months for the marriage they had begun to talk of in their letters. But hardly had he boarded the Giuseppe Verdi for the voyage home than the tone of her letters changes. She still professes love, but confesses that "Somehow I'm not a bit anxious to get home" and remarks blithely that another American has been "teasing me about my fondness for Italian officers."

"Dear Ernie," she continues, "you are to me a wonderful boy, and when you add on a few years and some dignity and calm, you'll be very much worthwhile." The two months later came the rejection letter.

Northwest's John Daniel finds himself as a writer

LAKEVIEW, Ore. AP) — Once he started writing poems out in the juniper trees and bitter brush of the high desert, John Daniel didn't feel like he had to scale the sheer granite walls of Yosemite Valley anymore.

"The great attraction of creative writing is that it is exhilarating," said Daniel. "It's as exciting as rock climbing or mountaineering. Both are an ascent. When you climb a mountain, you often start in the dark and reach a peak where the whole landscape is revealed to you."

Tall and rangy at 41, with a beard and short hair flecked with gray, Daniel was sitting in the dark mess hall of Camp Cottonwood in the mountains west of Lakeview, where he spent two weeks this summer directing an arts camp for kids.

His path to writing was far from direct.

"I didn't get into it through the academic chute," said Daniel, who dropped out of Reed College in Portland, although he had been valedictorian at his high school in Bethesda, Md.

"I majored in drugs, self-doubt and confusion and I didn't last long," Daniel said.

It wasn't until he had refused to be drafted during the Vietnam War, studied classical guitar, worked on a logging crew, trusted his life to a rope on the rock walls of Yosemite Valley and crept into boxcars as a railroad detective in San Francisco that he started thinking of himself as a writer.

"I really owe it to the railroad," he said.

In 1970, he landed a job with the Transcontinental Freight Bureau in San Francisco. His job was to see that shippers were shipping the freight they said they were. He spent weekends rock climbing at Yosemite.

After two years, he transferred to Klamath Falls, on the eastern slope of the Cascades and the edge of eastern Oregon's high desert.

"I would walk around the yards a little bit and crack a few cars," he said. "I worked three hours a day for about five years."

The job gave him the time to begin writing seriously, concentrating on short fiction.

"I also had these impulses that weren't stories," he said, "I thought maybe they were poems."

Daniel quit the railroad in 1978 to concentrate on writing and moved into a cabin on a ranch owned by his friend. He stayed there four years, teaching writing part time in the Lakeview schools.

"What I found myself writing about was the landscape: the sage and junipers, stoves and the weather," Daniel said. His work, "December in the Oregon Desert," looks humbly at that landscape:

"This space could wear out eyes and ears and leave you wandering wild as sage, your pale skin cured red."



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Larry McMurtry's son James sticks to lyrics of the small town

From Auburn, N.Y., James McMurtry reports on the day-to-day fortunes of a traveling musician. "We're playing at a club called Cassidy's. The opening act is Monday Night Football. I thought it was a band, but it's not."

His imagination runs with this image. He imagines a rowdy brawl at the game's conclusion. "This may be the last interview. It could get rough. I don't know," McMurtry says.

This is the kind of scrap of plain old life that McMurtry thrives on and builds on. Like his father, Pulitzer-prize winning author Larry McMurtry, James turns small things, small people, small towns into compelling stories about home and resignation and flight.

But while his father writes big, James stays small. In this generation, the McMurtry storytelling gene expresses itself in spare, compact lyrics. In such smallness, he mines a meager, hard-won richness that his father has praised and compared to his own early work.

The people in McMurtry's songs are forced from truth, and his own extrapolation of the truth.

"Mostly I make them up. I base the characters partly on people I know. I take little bits of reality and then fictionalize them for the sake of the song, as (Texas songwriter) Townes Van Zandt might say. The song builds itself. I get too close to one direction. If I get too close to reality, I'm apt to fight the song. I let the 'song have its way,' McMurtry says.

McMurtry's empathy for his

characters is clear, even in songs that came about in an accidental way. His own favorite, "Crazy Wind," was born of an image of tailights disappearing in the dark. As an abusive husband drives to the early shift, his wife is left with a hard decision: to survive or not to survive.

As her husband before her, the woman gets in the car and goes, counting her distance from pain by the "thousand little towns" she passes through. It is one of few, small victories in McMurtry's bleak universe.

"That one was a hard one to write. It was kind of like (building) a stone wall. Everything took a long time trying to make the words fit and still get the story across," he says.

No academic, McMurtry led a wandering life after a stint at the University of Arizona in Tucson. He

played backup guitar for old-time fiddlers and accompanied himself at a Tucson cafe and an Alaska roadhouse. He came home to paint "The Wastland" on the McMurtry family ranch outside Archer City, Texas, and picked up work playing covers in a San Antonio club. There, McMurtry also labored over his own songs, borrowing from an odd lot of thoughts and observations, scribbled on fragments of this and that — his collective memory's disorganized filing system.

In 1988, McMurtry was one of six winners at the Kerrville Folk Festival in Texas, a proving ground for other famous Texas musicians including Michelle Shocked, Lyle Lovett and Nanci Griffith. It was a validation of his songwriting talents, and McMurtry set his sights on Nashville, Tenn.

During an East Coast gig backing up Kinky Friedman, McMurtry's attention took a surprising turn. He had sent a tape to musician John Mellencamp, an acquaintance of his father. After a little prodding, Mellencamp finally listened to the tape and immediately called James.

McMurtry, 27, soon found himself back at The Wastland, writing songs under deadline, in time for a recording session at Mellencamp's home studio in Bloomington, Ind.

"Too Long in the Wastland," produced by Mellencamp, has received widespread and enthusiastic attention for its simply wrought tales and its spartan, folk rock backdrops by Mellencamp's band, McMurtry's "language," a

New York Times reviewer wrote, "as plain as dirt, and the metaphors connecting the physical and spiritual weather are not overworked. At the same time, each song is an integral vignette rich with detail and emotional nuance."

Favorable comparisons of McMurtry's work with fellow singing storytellers John Prine, Guy Clark and Van Zandt are OK by him.

"That's fine," he says with a bemused laugh. He is equally unabashed by criticism that his singing is bland and colorless. "If I was much of a singer, I wouldn't have to write," he says, in a typically laconic response. "I don't worry too much about it. I gotta do what I do. I have to stop thinking about what people are picking at. It really gets to my head and makes it hard to work."

McMurtry seems well aware that as a son of a celebrity, he got a big break.

"There are a lot of song writers out there and plenty of songs being written. Most aren't getting record deals, because their songs don't sound immediately commercial. If Mellencamp hadn't listened to the tape and known what he could do with it..." McMurtry knows he would be in the same boat.

McMurtry is currently on the road, opening for Jerry Jeff Walker and Adrian Belew, among others. It is not apparent from his excruciatingly shy phone manner, but McMurtry says he gets a real charge out of performing.

Except that now he is newly married to a graduate student in Austin, and the "separation is kind of a drag." His wife is studying to be an exercise physiologist at the University of Texas. "She needs a real job so she can support me," McMurtry says in his quiet, ironic way.

Lenny Kravitz hopes to move beyond the 'Mr. Bonet' slight

LOS ANGELES — "Excuse me, Mr. Bonet..."

That's the way someone mistakenly addressed singer-songwriter Lenny Kravitz, who's been married to actress Lisa Bonet of TV's "The Cosby Show" for nearly two years.

"Hell no, I don't like that kind of thing," snapped Kravitz, leaning back in his chair as the waiter served him an order of pasta during lunch last week. But his mood immediately softened. "I know why it happens. She's famous and I'm not — yet."

Kravitz, 25, is banking on his new debut album, Virgin Records' "Let Love Rule," to shoot him to stardom. He's doing a club tour now to promote the album.

Bonet isn't his only famous relative. His mother is actress Roxie Roker, who plays Helen Willis on "The Jeffersons," the long-running CBS-TV sitcom that's now in syndication.

Kravitz downplays both star connections. The media, though, haven't. The album is virtually a one-man Kravitz show: He wrote and produced all the songs and played nearly all the instruments. (Bonet wrote lyrics for two of the songs on the album — "Rosemary" and "Fear.")

But a recent TV news feature — ostensibly about the making of Kravitz's video for the album's title song — focused entirely on Bonet, who directed the clip, with barely a passing mention of Kravitz and not a single note of his music heard.

"I don't want to look like I'm riding her coattails," said Kravitz, who, with Bonet, has a 9-month-old daughter. "I have to make my own way."

People also remark on not just his relatives but his appearance: A gold ring pierces his left nostril.

Anticipating the umpteenth question about it, he said: "Yes it hurt a bit when it was done. The reason I did it was because it was something a little different that I wanted to try."

That doesn't ring isn't the only thing about Kravitz that's unusual. Like Tracy Chapman, he's

challenging the notion that black artists have to play traditional black music. His style is more white than black. A troubadour in '60s, he's a hippie troubadour with psychedelic leanings, singing about peace and love, attacking racism in a song called "Mr. Cab Driver," which, he said, is based on an actual experience with a New York cabbie who wouldn't stop for him.

He's even got a song called "Flower Child." The influences on "Let Love Rule" are more '60s — from John Lennon and the Beatles to R&B great Curtis Mayfield — than contemporary, though his vocals sometimes reflect Prince.

"People have gotten on me about the hippie stuff, singing about love and optimism," Kravitz said. "They say I'm unrealistic, that the world is screwed up, so just accept it. But I believe the messages I'm putting out. Maybe I'm living in a dream world, like the hippies in the '60s. But what's wrong with dreaming? You have to dream about these things first before they ever become a reality."

Smallish and slender, Kravitz is the forceful, fast-talking, somewhat hype-like — but endearing, except when talking about his music. Then he becomes passionate.

Since his mid-teens, he has asched to be a pop star. "I was attracted to the cool style, the girls, the rock 'n' roll life style," he recalled.

But record companies weren't interested in his music, which back then reflected the English new-wave scene. "I was offered deals but only if I changed my music," he said. "I was doing this trendy, British thing and they wanted me to do whatever black radio was doing at the time. I refused."

After 10 years of dickering with labels, he finally signed with Virgin. "They didn't categorize me," he said. "They wanted me to do the music I wanted."

By his own admission, his music is more geared to alternative-music radio stations, with pop-radio possibilities. But for most black stations, it's simply too alien to their formats. According to Kravitz, Virgin's radio promotion executives indicated their doubts about getting black-radio airplay for his album. Black airplay, though, is very

important to him. "I'm black, so I want my music on black radio," he said. "But maybe, the way things are on radio, I'm being unrealistic."

'A Cry for Help' docudrama shows how a battered woman fights back

According to some reports, 6 million American women are beaten each year by men they know.

On Monday, Oct. 2, NBC will air "A Cry for Help: The Tracey Thurman Story," a docudrama about a battered woman who fought back through the courts. The movie stars Nancy McKeon as Tracey Thurman and Dale Midkiff as her husband Buck. Bruce Weitz plays the lawyer who takes Thurman's case.

Tracey Thurman was just 17 years old when she left her Torrington, Conn., home. Her travels eventually led her to St. Petersburg, Fla., where she met and married a troubled construction worker named Buck Thurman and gave birth to a son named C.J. But the couple's relationship was far from ideal; Tracey suffered repeated beatings at the hands of her husband. In October 1982, Tracey left him, taking C.J. and returning to Torrington.

"It wasn't easy for me to knock on my friend's door and ask for help," Thurman remembers. "But it was something I had to do for C.J., if not for myself. I understood that Buck was abusive because of his childhood,

and I suddenly realized I was subjecting C.J. to the same thing, continuing the cycle of violence."

But that's where "A Cry for Help: The Tracey Thurman Story" really begins. Buck Thurman followed Tracey back to Torrington, where he continued to harass and threaten her. Tracey's complaints to the Torrington police resulted in a restraining order that forbade Buck from seeing or harassing her, but unfortunately, that was the full extent of the protection she received.

On June 10, 1983, Buck Thurman attacked Tracey with a knife at her home in broad daylight. By the time police responded, 47 minutes had elapsed. Tracey Thurman had 13 stab wounds in her back and a broken neck. Scarred and paralyzed, she resolved to fight back.

Thurman sued the Torrington police department for failing to protect her, and in 1985 a jury agreed with her. The case pushed the state of Connecticut to pass what became known as the "Thurman Law." That law, which marked a departure from the prevailing hands-off attitude toward domestic violence, guarantees women protection from abusive spouses and has become a model for similar

laws in many other states.

Tracey Thurman's fight goes on. She was in the hospital for seven months recovering from her wounds and has spent hundreds of hours in ongoing rehabilitation therapy.

McKeon, who prepared for her role by spending time with Thurman, comments that, during filming, "You constantly say to yourself, 'I can walk away from this at night,' but this is someone's life and they can't just pick up and say, 'OK, it's a wrap,' and walk away."

"She's come a long way," McKeon continues. "They told her she'd never walk again. But she got up and started walking with the full leg braces and crutches and the help of three people. Now she walks. She's a strong lady."

Thurman, who is now a spokesperson on family violence, says, "It's not easy to leave (an abusive relationship). But once you make the decision to go, you are in control of your life again."

'Cosby Show' returns to No. 1 spot

LOS ANGELES (AP) — "The Cosby Show" turned up the Nielsen ratings heat with its sixth season premiere, taking its first No. 1 spot since February and pushing "Roseanne" into No. 2. "Chicken Soup" showed signs of chilling.

"The Cosby Show," featuring the return of Lisa Bonet's character Denise with a new husband and child in tow, had a 26.1 rating and 44 percent of the Thursday night audience for NBC. "Cosby's" last No. 1 rating was Feb. 27.

NBC had six of the Top 10 shows, including returning veterans "Cheers," "The Golden Girls" and "Matlock." ABC had three shows and CBS had one.

Ratings are the percentage of the estimated 90.4 million homes with television sets in the United States. The share is the percentage of sets in use.

New shows in the Top 20 were a premiere of "Hardball" on NBC, in 16th place, and CBS' "Major Dad," which captured 20th place.

Promotional hoopla, gimmicks getting viewers to sample network TV shows

The bells and whistles the three major networks set off to get people to pay attention to their new season premieres appear to have done the job as the network share last week was 71.9, the highest recorded since the 1988 World Series.

That means that of all the sets in use during prime time, 71.9 percent of them were tuned to one of the three networks, compared with last season when the network share dropped into the mid-60s, or last summer when it dropped perilously close to 50. And that encouraging number was in a week when, despite all the hoopla, most established shows were still in reruns.

That share number shows that the networks' heavy use of promotional gimmicks, most notably CBS' contest tie-in with K mart and NBC's similar arrangement with Sears, got people's attention.

That comes as a relief to the networks since a year ago the entire fall kickoff campaign was canceled by the prolonged writers' strike. New series and new episodes of returning series came out in dribs and drabs, allowing independent stations, cable channels and alternative uses such as rented movies to cut further into the network share.

Last year, all three networks, but particularly third-place CBS, failed to get their new shows sampled adequately. The idea behind all the promotion is to deliver viewers to the shows for that first viewing, and then it's up to the shows to keep them.

So, an initial high rating for a show is not necessarily good news if it's followed by a low rating. That means the show was sampled and people didn't seem to like what they saw. The numbers will be followed closely in the next few weeks as the networks know that in the increasingly cluttered TV environment, if they don't get you hooked with the first three or four episodes, they are probably not going to get you. It could be time for the quick hook.

Going by the first looks at the new season's numbers, one show that is off to a good start is CBS' "Major Dad," while one show that might be

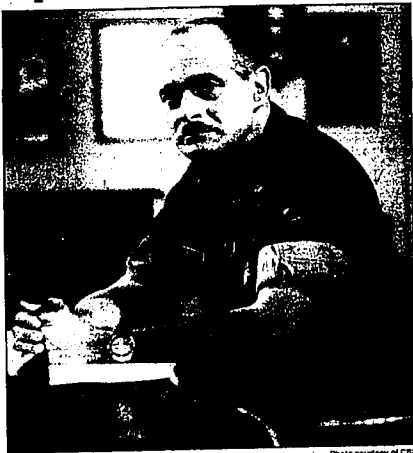

See how these numbers track. "Major Dad" was introduced in a special show previewing CBS' newcomers hosted by Angela Lansbury that ran in the "Murder, She Wrote" time slot Sunday, Sept. 17. That show got a 15.5 rating and 25 share.

The next night, "Major Dad" premiered in its regular Monday night slot to an even higher number, 16.2 and 26, good for 20th spot in the week's numbers. That knocked the season premiere of NBC's "ALF" down to 34th and helped bury the return of ABC's "MacGyver" in 60th spot. That is impressive work for a newcomer.

"The People Next Door," the CBS show that followed "Major Dad," also had a decent number (14.6-23), ahead of its NBC competition, "The Hogan Family." This is called "good sampling" and, even if people were just watching to match their K mart

contest numbers, the network has to be very happy.

Now, let us follow a different track for NBC's "Sister Kate." This show had two special previews, one after "The Golden Girls," the next following "The Cosby Show." For those two outings its numbers were 19 and 36, and 23 and 38. In other words, a lot of people got to sample it.

But, when "Sister Kate" debuted in its Sunday night slot, the place "Family Ties" held last year, it fell drastically to an 8.9 rating and 15 share. Now, NBC can point to a football run-over and a terrible lead-in as mitigating circumstances, but don't think for a moment that the network programmers aren't quite worried about "Sister Kate," sitting as it does in that crucial spot on the lucrative Sunday night. It could get the early hook before it is allowed to drag down the numbers of the most-watched night of the week.

The highly touted "Chicken Soup," in the highly desired post-"Roseanne" slot on ABC's Tuesday night, also showed some problems. Its first outing, it recorded a 21.8 and 34 share to "Roseanne's" 25.9 and 40. The second week, "Roseanne" stayed steady at 24.7 and 38, while "Chicken Soup" dropped to 18.4 and 29. A couple more weeks of a downward trend and the network might not want to waste this time slot on a losing proposition.

ABC is happy with the family drama "Life Goes On," which, though it dropped far from its two previews when it went to its regular Sunday night slot, the 10 and 18, it recorded against "60 Minutes" is better than anything else ABC has had there in years.

Shows that have gotten sampled and now will be closely watched for

signs of acceptance or rejection include CBS' "Island Son" with Richard Chamberlain, "Wolf" and "The Famous Teddy Z," NBC's "Nutt, House" and "Hardball," and ABC's "Doogie Howser, M.D."

Those that are still having trouble attracting a first look because they debuted in tough slots include ABC's "Free Spirit," CBS' "Snoops" and "Top of the Hill" and NBC's "Baywatch." They will be watched to see if their relatively meager numbers grow or diminish.

With the baseball post-season about to scramble the schedule, and with the networks eager to maintain this premiere week momentum in this increasingly competitive environment, changes could come quickly.

So if you want to make sure you see all the new shows, check them out soon.

24.7 rating and a 38 percent share of the audience, according to figures released Monday by the A.C. Nielsen Co.

Comic Jackie Mason's "Chicken Soup," after placing No. 2 in the ratings last week behind "Roseanne," fell to 14th place in its second week. "Chicken Soup" follows "Roseanne" on Tuesday night, but lost 6.3 rating points in the transition, with an 18.4 percent rating and 29 share.

"Chicken Soup" played opposite a season premiere of "Matlock" on NBC and CBS' new series, "Wolf."

A special Tuesday preview of "Doogie Howser, M.D.," producer Steven Bochco's latest entry for ABC, landed in eighth place. The show about a teen-age doctor got a 20.7 rating and a 32 share of the audience. Its regular time slot is Wednesday night, where it earned a 14.4 rating and 23 share for 33rd place.

NBC also scored with its 15th anniversary show for "Saturday Night Live," broadcast in prime time

Sunday night against ABC's "The Preppie Murders." The "Saturday Night" special was No. 8, while the movie about the slaying of a young socialite in Central Park was 26th.

The Top 10 shows and their ratings were: "The Cosby Show," NBC, 26.1; "Roseanne," ABC, 24.7; "Cheers," NBC, 24.1; "Golden Girls," NBC, 23.5; "Sister Kate," NBC, 23; "Murder, She Wrote," CBS, 20.7; "Doogie Howser, M.D.," ABC, 20.7; "Saturday Night Live 15th Anniversary Show," NBC, 20.3; "Matlock," NBC, 19.6; and "Who's the Boss," ABC, 19.5.

New shows featuring television veterans did not grab top spots with viewers. NBC's "The Nutt House," starring Cloris Leachman and Harvey Korman and produced by Mel Brooks, checked in at No. 24.

"Island Son," marking the return of Richard Chamberlain to series television was in 42nd place for CBS. "A Peateable Kingdom," starring onetime bionic woman Lindsay Wagner, was a less-than-overpowering 66th place for CBS.

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
